Candy bears hold their universe together at Harrison School Pupils learn space-related subjects

TWIN FALLS - Some people say the moon is just a slab of green cheese. But a group of Harrison Elementary School fourth-, fifth- and sixth-graders knows gummi bears taste better than green cheese any day. The Young Astronauts Club used multi-colored gummi bear candies, along with toothpicks and bamboo skewers, to depict the moon, Venus, Pluto, Saturn and the other planets of the solar system Thursday. The club is part of an international program sponsored by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration to pique kids' interest in math, science and space-related subjects. And it seems to be working.

"I want to be an astronaut one day," said 11-year-old Rich Merriam. "I've always been interested in space," said 10-year-old Christopher Deuel as he poked toothpicks into a red gummi bear to make a lunar vehicle. "And when I grow up, I want to either design spacecrafts or ride in them." He excitedly told about a recent visit to a Jerome observatory sparked by the club's last speaker. "I got to see Mercury. It was the first planet I ever saw," he said. At the club's last meeting, a Magic Valley Astronomy Club member talked about his Jerome observatory, the stars and the planets, inviting the students to view the stars and planets through his telescope. Cathy Lundin, the Idaho State University education student who brought the Young

Astronaut program to Harrison, said the program provides them with an experience for the kids. "And because it's a small group, we can do more one-on-one teaching," she said. "The kids will be getting a lot of information other children won't receive just in the classroom." Fourth-grade teacher Joyce Becht, the club's chapter leader, described the program as a "supplement" to regular curriculum. "I think it's just great," she said. While the kids worked diligently on their solar system project, asking one another for advice and talking about what it would like to fly to another planet, the program got its most enthusiastic support from 9-year-old Becky Hayes. "Science is so awesome."

House passes bill protecting American flag

The Baltimore Sun WASHINGTON - The House of Representatives embraced a ban on the burning or defacing of U.S. flags Thursday, sending its landmark work to the White House for President Bush's signature. The 371-43 vote constituted Congress' most recent - but by no means final - answer to a decision rendered by the Supreme Court in June that struck down the Texas flag desecration law and effectively nullified similar statutes around the nation. Thursday's action also represented the culmination of an uproar that the high court's decision triggered around the country and, especially in Washington. "This is the least we can do to protect the sanctity of the flag," said Representative Butler Derrick, D-S.C. Indeed, the nation's elected leaders may do more Monday, the Senate is supposed to vote on a constitutional amendment that would empower states and the federal government to pass similar statutes. The House itself is expected to consider the constitutional amendment at a later date. But Rep. Ted Weiss, D-N.Y., insisted that the House proceed to improve on the Constitution or the Bill of Rights. "Only after a proposed amendment has won the support of a two-thirds majority in the House and Senate, as well as the legislatures of 38 states, does it become a part of the Constitution." Bush has often stated his support for such an amendment, though Thursday House Speaker Thomas Foley, D-Wash., said that he thought the president would sign the statute into law. But a number of lawmakers who supported the measure openly predicted that it would fail the constitutional free speech test without the protection of a special amendment. "To those who believe we can overturn a Supreme Court decision at this time by statute," said House Minority Leader Robert Michael, R-Ill., "I can only repeat the immortal words of the farmer who, asked directions, said, 'You can't get there from here.'"

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Andrus finally receives his phone call on waste

The Associated Press BOISE - Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus has finally been contacted by White House Chief of Staff John Sununu about the federal government's joining radioactive waste storage problem. But the Democratic chief executive, who brought the issue of nuclear weapons waste disposal to the national forefront when he first banned further storage in Idaho a year ago, said Sununu did not ask him to lift that ban during the Thursday afternoon telephone conversation. "He simply called to say I need you to bring me up to speed on this issue as you see it," Andrus said. "I made a few recommendations." The Bush administration, searching for a place to store low-level nuclear waste from the Rocky Flats weapons plant in Colorado until a permanent repository opens, said on Wednesday Sununu would consider Andrus and the governors of six other states in a bid to convince them to take some of the excess waste temporarily. But Andrus was out of his office all day Wednesday, first in eastern Idaho for an Energy Department meeting during which no mention was made by state department officials about taking any more waste and later in San Francisco for a political fund-raiser. Waste from Rocky Flats, the nation's only facility making plutonium fissioners for nuclear warheads, has been temporarily stored at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory until last October when Andrus refused to accept further shipments. He imposed - the ban after government missed another deadline to open the permanent waste dump had first promised the state by the end of the 1970s. The governor relented in February for national security reasons, agreeing to accept 12 more shipments of waste through August while the government tried to get the

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Panel objects to Gem water quality rules

BOISE - Committees of the House and Senate have filed formal objections to proposed administrative rules implementing the agreement to preserve the quality of Idaho's waters, throwing a wrench into the historic consensus on the issue among government, industry and environmental interests. The objections were approved Thursday by the Senate Health and Welfare Committee and the House Environmental Affairs Committee after the Idaho Mining Association broke with other interests to complain about various provisions of the regulations drafted by the Health and Welfare Department. An attempt to file a similar objection from the natural resource committees of both chambers failed when the bid was not supported by the needed number of members on the Senate

Resource and Environment Committee. The corresponding committees from both houses must agree for a legislative objection to be filed. Although the objections are only advisory, Senate Health and Welfare Vice Chairman Denton Darrington, D-Idaho, said the department will give more weight to his than just one more page in 50 reams of public testimony. Public hearings on the rules begin later this month, and if they are not ultimately adopted by the Legislature they will automatically be voided. Sen. Mark Callabretta, D-Osborn, said the department should help steer the department toward drafting final regulations that will pass legislative muster. The regulations would implement the 1989 state law setting up a process for identifying rivers, streams and lakes that need to be monitored to assure water quality is maintained

amid various uses and developments in and along them and protecting the most outstanding rivers and streams from any further development at all. Among other things, Mining Association Director Jack Lyman said his members objected to provisions calling for unfilled public meetings to monitor waters for monitoring inclusion of lakes, swamps and wetlands in that category, the absence of criteria for requiring monitoring or banning development altogether, no assurance that development would be stalled while efforts were under way to prohibit further development and no method of reopening to development a river that had previously gained protected status. State Water Quality Chief Al Murrey countered those objections. He said more than the six public meetings sought by the association were needed to assure adequate public access to the process.

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Nation's corn crop 7.45 billion bushels

WASHINGTON - Farmers are harvesting a corn crop estimated at 7.45 billion bushels, up 51 percent from last year's drought-plagued harvest of 4.92 billion bushels, the Agriculture Department said Thursday. Moreover, the latest estimate, based on Oct. 1 field surveys, was almost 2 percent more than the 7.32 billion bushels forecast a month ago. At 7.45 billion bushels the harvest would be the largest since the 8.25 billion bushels of 1986. The record was the 1985 crop of nearly 8.9 billion bushels. "The crop is being harvested at a slower rate than normal due to the lateness of the crop in some states," the department's National

Agricultural Statistics Service reported. "By Oct. 1, 16 percent of the crop had been harvested in the 19 major producing states, compared with 34 percent last year and the average of 22 percent." Corn yields were estimated at 114.4 bushels per acre harvested, up from 112.4 forecast in September and 84.6 bushels in 1988 but still below the record of 119.4 bushels per acre in 1987. As livestock feed, corn is the largest and most important U.S. farm crop. It is an essential ingredient for the production of meat, poultry and dairy products. Consumer food prices, which rose an average of 4.1 percent in 1988, are expected to go up 5 percent to 7 percent this year, according to department economists. Soybean production, a source of high-protein

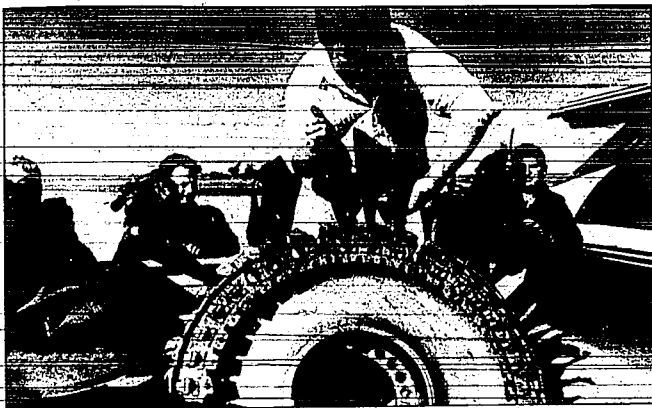
meal and vegetable oil, was estimated at 1.93 billion bushels, up 24 percent from last year's harvest of 1.54 billion bushels and 2 percent above the September estimate of 1.89 billion bushels. Yields were estimated at an average of 32.6 bushels per acre this year, compared with 26.3 bushels in 1988 and the September forecast of 27 bushels. The record was 34.1 bushels per acre in 1985. Despite the greatly improved yields of major crops, parts of the country still suffer from long-term effects of the 1988 drought. And that raises questions about future harvests. "We always start looking ahead to next year, and we're not out of the woods yet, in the sense

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Real or not, virus bugs computer users

NEW YORK - Fears that a computer virus will trash information on some personal computers are overblown, experts said Thursday, but some alarmed users have taken steps to make sure they don't wake up Friday morning in the morning. "Our advice to people is stop worrying," said Dennis Steinauer of the National Institute of Standards and Technology. "People should make a backup copy of their files and don't call me in the morning. There's virtually no way it can spread around and cause any significant damage at all. But others feel the threat is real from the so-called Columbus Day virus, programmed to activate after computers' internal clocks hit 12:01 a.m. Friday and begin doing its dirty work when an operator begins using an infected program. "We're talking about a conceivable disease that is absolutely indiscriminate," said Winn Schwartau, president of American Computer Security Industries in Nashville, Tenn. "It's not going to be Armageddon today or tomorrow. But if you ignore it and you're infected, the risk is high for getting your data destroyed," Schwartau said. By coincidence, more than 2,000 of the nation's top computer security experts convened their annual meeting Thursday in Baltimore, Md. Few, if any, opted to stay on the job because of the virus threat, according to the sponsoring National Institute of Standards and Technology and the National Computer Security Center. Only a tiny fraction of the nation's 40 million users of personal computers are expected to catch the virus, officials said.

Kemp's reform proposals run into Congressional opposition

WASHINGTON (AP) — Housing and Urban Development Secretary Jack Kemp ran into opposition Thursday from members of Congress to some of the measures he is recommending for cleaning up his scandal-ridden department.

Both Republicans and Democrats on the House Banking Committee sharply criticized Kemp's proposal to target more of the politically popular Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program to strict antipoverty efforts.

"That was not the original intent of that program — a targeted war on poverty," said Rep. Chalmers Wylie, a Republican on the banking panel, which has oversight responsibilities for HUD.

"To stifle the certain degree of flexibility that CDBG has with its intentions would be absolutely outrageous to me," echoed Rep. Mary Rose Oaker, a Democrat from Cleveland. "I don't want to see some guidelines changed to inhibit my city's opportunity to use that money."

Under current regulations, only 60 percent of the \$3 billion that HUD funnels annually to state and local governments through CDBG grants for downtown revitalization projects must directly benefit poor people.

As part of a 58-point plan to address widespread fraud, mismanagement and influence-peddling at HUD during the Reagan administration, Kemp last week proposed raising poverty-related targets for CDBG grants and housing subsidy programs to 75 percent.

"To avoid both the appearance and reality of favoritism," Kemp also proposed eliminating as political "slush funds" the discretionary programs that allow HUD to ignore merit-and-competition requirements in awarding community development and housing grants.

"I want to kick politics out of those decisions," he said Thursday. "There would be no decision at HUD by Kemp, staff, assistants or anyone based on who you know, what political party you belong to, how many consultants you hire or how much you pay them."

While generally praising the thrust of Kemp's proposed reform measures, members of Congress as well as several mayors have fought the last week over the prospect of removing politics entirely from the process.

"Since the loss of revenue sharing, many mayors have used this as revenue sharing," Wylie told Kemp.

Investigators discover pre-existing crack in engine disk from DC-10

WASHINGTON — Federal investigators said Thursday that they have found a pre-existing crack in the DC-10 engine disk recovered from an Iowa cornfield but that it is too early to say whether it caused the crash of United Flight 232 in Sioux City in July.

Preliminary evidence indicates the crack occurred before the engine exploded 37,000 feet over northwestern Iowa, sending the jumbo jet to a violent landing that killed 112 of the 296 onboard, said National Transportation Safety Board spokesman Ted Lopatkiewicz.

The size, nature, age and reasons for the crack have not been determined at this time, he said.

Investigators also have not determined whether the crack was the starting point for the disk rupture known to have blown apart the engine, shooting shrapnel that severed the plane's hydraulic control lines and crippled the jet.

The crack is on the surface of the bore area of the disk, an area similar to the inside of a donut around the hole. The crack extends from the front to the back of the disk and radially toward the rim, Lopatkiewicz said.

Investigators could not say whether the crack could have been detected before the accident, he said.

Metallurgical tests are to be conducted to determine how and when the crack occurred.

Meanwhile, the Iowa farmer who found the disk and other engine parts Tuesday said she received a check Thursday for \$116,000 in reward money from the engine's maker, General Electric.

"I was speechless," Janice Sorenson said in a telephone interview. "I never dreamt we'd ever see it or find it. It never entered my head."

Sorenson was driving a combine through the cornfield when it met resistance and she saw the disk and a half-dozen blades embedded in the ground.

GE had offered \$279,100 in rewards for pieces of the tail-mounted engine, \$50,000 for the disk and the rest for scores of other parts including fragments of 38 missing fan blades. For example, GE offered \$1,000 for each of 20 missing bolts and \$1,000 for 20 each of missing nuts.

Intensive examination of Sorenson's 460-acre farm turned up much of the missing fan assembly, a veritable treasure of engine pieces.

Sorenson said she and her husband, Dale, had not decided what to do with the windfall. "I'm sure we'll be very practical about this," she said. "We're very practical people. This will not change our lifestyle at all."

House asserts right to investigate CIA

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Thursday asserted a right to delve into CIA classified investigation reports as part of its responsibility to oversee the agency.

The action came in a bill authorizing activities of the nation's intelligence agencies for fiscal 1990, which began Oct. 1. The overall bill, most of which is classified, was approved on a vote of 369-31.

While the total amount the United States spends on intelligence activities is secret, reports put the figure at somewhat more than \$25 billion. Most of the money is tucked away in various Pentagon accounts and covers everything from personnel and spy hardware, such as satellites, to covert operations overseas.

Language in the bill would require the CIA to submit to the House and Senate intelligence committees twice a year a list of all investigation and audit reports prepared by the agency's inspector general and to turn over any report requested by either committee.

The Bush administration contends the requirement is an unconstitutional intrusion on its authority and could jeopardize the confidentiality of investigative reports. Administration officials say the provision would be cause for a veto.

The provision is the result of a long-running dispute between the spy agency and the House Intelligence Committee. Rep. Dave McCurdy, D-Ohio, said the committee voted unanimously to slap the new requirements on the CIA, "not so we can mount a fishing expedition, but to assess the adequacy" of the agency's own internal controls.

House access to CIA investigative reports has been "a matter of some sensitivity" to Director of Central Intelligence William Webster, McCurdy said.

The Senate Intelligence Committee is at work on its own version of the bill, which would make the agency's inspector general more like the independent auditors at other federal agencies, including a requirement that the person be confirmed by the Senate. That version of the bill is expected to be sent to the full Senate next week, and differences in the two bills will ultimately have to be worked out in House-Senate negotiations.

The Senate panel has not had the same difficulties as its House counterpart in gaining access to investigation reports, according to a committee aide.

Dealing with another issue that has been contentious, the committee built safeguards into the bill to prevent the Bush administration from funneling any covert-aid-to-political opponents of Nicaragua's leftist Sandinista government.

Pentagon claims Soviets increasing aid to Nicaragua

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union apparently approved Senate requests for restricting delivery of Soviet bloc weapons and equipment to Nicaragua despite pledges to halt its arms shipments to that country, Pentagon officials said Thursday.

"If present trends continue, 1989 could exceed 1988 in total tonnage and dollar value of Soviet bloc military shipments to Nicaragua," the Pentagon said in a report.

Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev told President Bush in May that the Soviet Union had suspended weapons shipments to Nicaragua at the end of 1988.

However, the Soviet Union has sent the leftist government in Managua some \$500 million in various other forms of military aid this year, U.S. officials have said.

"Evidence is circumstantial, but we believe the Soviets have approved and may be orchestrating the delivery of Soviet bloc lethal aid to the Sandinistas through Cuba," the Pentagon said.

"It is unlikely that either the Eastern bloc nations or Cuba would act on their own — in contravention of clearly articulated Soviet policy — to boost military shipments to Nicaragua."

The Pentagon said that during the first nine months of the year, Soviet military deliveries are "down by about 50 percent, but Eastern bloc deliveries have increased by about 35 percent, essentially offsetting the decrease."

Don't sell the rancher short

There needs to be an understanding between the cattlemen, environmentalists and the general public in regard to what the cattlemen are doing, what they are trying to do, and what is being accomplished.

Cattlemen are people, just like anyone else trying to root a living from Planet Earth. We know if we do not take care of Planet Earth, it cannot take care of us.

According to geological surveys made by the Bureau of Land Management and other research, we turn back the pages of history one hundred years or so to the days of the trappers, where we find most of the beaver gone from southern Idaho.

This trapping was done to provide a buffer zone between the competing fur companies. Thus the beginning of stream-bank erosion, caused by elimination of the beaver dams which destroyed stream-bank stability.

The miners and early settlers trying to rest a living from a harsh land also left their mark on land and stream beds. One account of covered-wagon days tells of the dust that never settled on hundreds of miles of trail comes through southern Idaho.

Slides shown by Dave Krosting of the BLM gave us pictures of riparian areas taken in the 1950s and the same areas taken today. Through the cooperation of ranchers and the BLM, these stream beds have had a tremendous comeback. However, there is room for more improvement.

We, the cattlemen, realize the general public is not aware of the expertise of riparian cows on the desert. This is evident from letters one reads in The Times-News. With the cooperation of the BLM and secretaries of local cattlemen's associations, there are some facts pertinent to the expertise of ranchers who run cattle on the desert.

When the Taylor Grazing Act went into effect in 1934, ranchers were allotted grazing rights. Currently, state land can be rented to the tune of \$400 a section. Today if a minimal-unit month (AUMs) are available to buy them run around \$100 per AUM. One cow requires five AUMs for a season and the grazing fee yearly is \$1.86 per AUM.

Thus, for one cow the fee is \$9.30. For 100 cows, a rancher will pay \$930 per year for the right to use the range. Ranchers using these permits have no title to any BLM ground or any improvements they implement on the range.

The Milner Cattlemen's Association's books for the past eight years show a total of \$17,949.71 that ranchers have spent to improve the range. Advisory board monies totaling \$2,630.47 were spent for range improvements.

These monies are a percentage of grazing fees that are turned back to the association for range improvement. The above-mentioned funds were used on four pastures for fencing, watering, and other improvements, sorting corral, cattle guards and six ponds. These ponds are also used by

waterfowl and other wildlife. The labor for these projects was provided for by the ranchers.

The Star Line Cattlemen's Association's books show, during a 25-year period, a total of \$117,000 of ranchers' money spent to improve the range. This includes: four wells, 50 miles of pipeline, seeding, and water troughs.

This also includes 20 shares of Big Wood canal water at \$200 per share. This canal water was turned into Star Lake to maintain a Wildlife Refuge. The maintenance on this 20 shares each year is \$11.75 per share, totaling \$235 for ranchers' pay. Each rancher is assessed by the association from \$1 to \$2 on each AUM owned, to pay for repairs, etc., on the water system and fences.

To replace gas motors and electricity for these wells will cost the ranchers \$50,000 at 11 percent interest for a period of five (5) years. Ranchers also supply the labor for these improvements.

The "71" Livestock Association of the Three Creek area has a good working relation with the BLM and the Forest Service. The Affiliated Management Plan (AMP) gives flexibility to improve the range.

Five Devil Creek ranchers - in 1979 through 1981 - funded, constructed and maintained the "71" Creek water trough. Total cost of the project was \$300,000. Another two miles of pipeline was installed this fall with a total cost of \$9,664.57. The Devil Creek project consists of some 50 miles of pipeline, 25 water tanks, and two miles of water trough.

The "71" Reservoir, a natural snow run-off pond, backs water up 1/2 mile. It is 300 yards across and six feet deep at the dam. Ranchers suggested to the BLM that they run a pipeline, water reservoir to a trough for livestock.

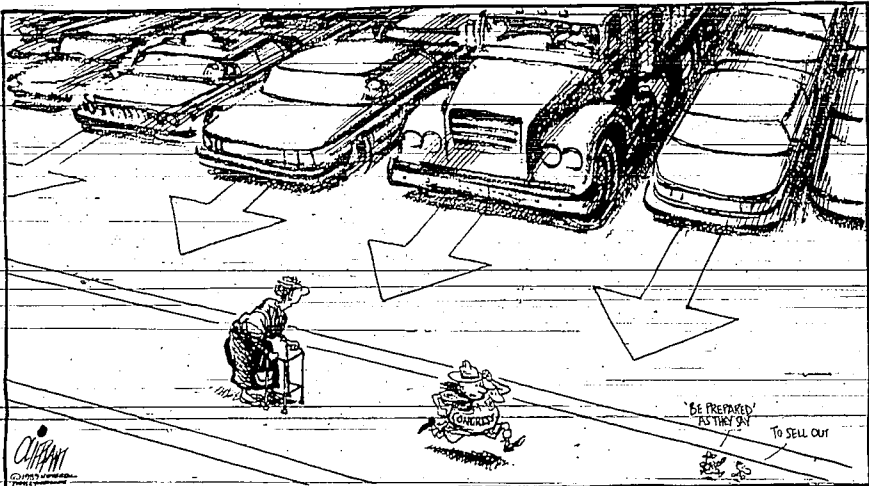
This was done and an island pushed up in the middle of the reservoir as a haven for waterfowl. The reservoir was then fenced. No livestock can enter this Wildlife Refuge.

Based on these projects, there are other similar projects: Jim Bob Pipeline, Inside Desert Pipeline, and Diamond A Pipeline.

Dear readers, do not sell the rancher short. We are spending thousands of dollars restoring riparian areas, providing alternative water sources, reseeded rangeland; and remembering that grass is a renewable resource. We carefully rotate cattle throughout the grazing season.

Our grazing season extends from May to October. Since we are protecting precious resources of water and grass which provide our livelihood, wouldn't you consider us environmentalists?

We don't care about each other

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1, 1989, may be remembered as the day we finally admitted, right up front, that we don't care very much about each other. At least not enough to help pay each other's medical bills.

The admission came on a vote in the House of Representatives that repealed the central features of the 1988 Medicare catastrophic-illness insurance act, a repeal only partially justified by the Senate's decision, two days later, to preserve certain core features of the program.

This was, of course, far from the first time that a voracious interest group marched to Capitol Hill to protest its own pocket books. But the significance of this victory of pressure-group politics is more sharply focused because this was the first time that Congress had sent the bill for a social good directly to those it was meant to help. And the intended beneficiaries shot it back marked "return to sender."

It was, as Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., described it last week, "a wonderful learning experience for Congress." But it would be a serious loss, and not only for the elderly, if the only part of the lesson that stuck with the pupil was that it's tough to get the public to face up to the costs of running a decent society.

In fact, the lesson was far more complex: What you had in the catastrophic-illness program was a billion-dollar misunderstanding.

Congress thought it was enacting a measure that would be popular with one of its favorite beneficiary groups, the elderly.

After all, Congress had the assurances of the American Association of Retired Persons - the most potent lobbying arm for senior-citizen causes - and it was following the lead of a popular president, Ronald Reagan, who had made the program his crowning social-policy initiative.

What Congress (and the AARP) failed to realize is that while the elderly were glad to accept the new benefit, they, or at least the most vocal among them, were not ready to have to pay for it - especially since the program promised far more than it delivered. In the spirit of the old Reagan line, I claimed that the measure would provide "the last full measure of security" for elderly people, keeping them from having to make "an intolerable choice between bankruptcy and death."

In fact, the measure, even as sweetened by Congress, made only a modest extension in Medicare coverage for the potentially most catastrophic drain on the elderly's resources - long-term nursing home care. Moreover, the progressive surtax that Congress added to fund the program fell most heavily on a group of the elderly that was with

higher incomes, who didn't see much benefit in the new coverage to which the surtax applied. Of course, Medicare as a whole is a splendid buy for senior citizens at all income levels. Private "Medigap" policies carry a far higher markup for sales, advertising and administration and frequently provide inadequate overlapping benefits, but most of the surtax-payers already had more or less adequate private "Medigap" policies, to fill in where basic Medicare leaves off.

Still, the new provision offered was truly valuable, especially to the perhaps 20 million elderly with little or no coverage beyond Medicare and the far larger number of workers who will retire in future years with few if any employer-provided retirement benefits. And the principle of user taxation, progressively related to ability to pay, was an addendum to social program theology worth preserving. It is not an infallible rule, but it's a pretty good reality check: If many of the people who benefit directly from a program can't afford to pay for it - but don't think it's worth spending their own money on - then there are more pressing collective needs for the society to address.

Senate Republican leader Robert Dole summed up the situation nicely last week: "We promised too much, we taxed too much, but let's not throw it all out."

The problem in the House, anyway, was that the leadership simply wasn't up to the task of sensible reform. In the face of lawmakers' even conflicting, White House leadership - and an avalanche of protest from the elderly, much of it misinformed but no less vociferous - the House simply voted for repeal by an even more lopsided majority than the one by which it had embraced the program little more than a year before.

"Two rounds in two weeks," said Rep. Sandy Levin, D-Mich. "Last week on the capital-gains tax roll-back) we had fragmentation; this

week, total retreat."

The Senate managed to look not quite so foolish. It turned down a sensible compromise measure, proposed by Sen. David Durenberger (R-Minn.) and backed by Senate leaders of both parties, that would have scaled back nonhospital benefits but retained, at a greatly reduced level, the surtax. (The White House added its share to the general fund when the Office of Management and Budget weighed in with a last-minute letter undercutting earlier statements by Human Services Secretary Louis Sullivan in support of the Durenberger plan). But the Senate finally adopted an amendment sponsored by Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., that preserved the core hospital coverage and some peripheral benefits - but left them financed solely by a flat monthly levy on all the elderly, poor and rich alike, that may well prove inadequate to cover even in the remaining benefits.

The only winner in this debacle was, unfortunately, the so-called National Committee to Restore Social Security and Medicare, the direct-mail lobby led by James Roosevelt that scared thousands of elderly people into believing that they would face hefty new tax bills whenever fact, three-fifths of the elderly would have been exempt from the surtax and only the wealthiest 5 percent or 6 percent would have paid the full \$800 a person.

But this may prove a Pyrrhic victory. For if, in the future, the Roosevelt lobby and its following really do want to do something for the elderly - and has in mind sending the bill to the already hard-pressed average worker or his competition-driven employer - it may find the envelope back in its own mailbox. And it will be stamped "return to sender."

Ninety percent of Shoshone Creek is private property, although not fenced separately or posted; the public is welcome to use it for camping and picnicking. (Please take your disposable diapers and beer cans with you.)

Since all the fish I have ever seen need

water, it is hard to make a fishing area out of Shoshone Creek since most of it dries up every fall. I know, the cattle drank all the water.

Laddering won't be required

To Mr. Bob Burks, Wendell: Our Fishery's staff has made several surveys trips into Box Canyon in the last year to assess trout reproduction above the Clear Springs diversion; available spawning habitat between the diversion and the falls, and spawning use of the stream below the diversion.

As a result of these assessments, which documented movement of spawning trout up Box Canyon to the diversion, we have requested Earl Hardy to provide screening and laddering on his new hatchery diversion. Because of reproduction and downstream

movement of juvenile fish above the diversion, we will require Clear Springs to provide and maintain screening of their diversion. Reproduction above the diversion, however, occurs primarily above the falls. Between the diversion and the falls, high water velocities and large substrate size provide little spawning opportunity for trout. In the face of lake waters, we will not require laddering of the Clear Springs diversion at this time.

Should conditions change in the future (flow reductions to Hardy's proposed hydro project and placement of spawning-sized gravel) which would result in significant spawning opportunity between the diversion and the falls, we may require laddering at that time.

Scientists try to understand the universe

Tests uncover 3 families of matter

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Physicists trying to mimic the birth of the universe inside an atom smasher said Thursday they found strong evidence that the building blocks of matter belong to only three families, a discovery that "puts a lid on the complexity of nature."

"This brings us closer to really understanding the physical universe and how it's put together," said Burton Richter, a 1976 Nobel laureate in physics and director of the Stanford Linear Accelerator Center 30 miles southeast of San Francisco.

Experiments on the 3-mile-long, \$125 million Stanford Linear Collider showed the odds are 25-to-1 that there are only three families or "generations" of fundamental particles that make up matter, physicist Michael Riordan said by telephone from Stanford.

"It means that somehow the universe is comprehensible, that it's not a total mystery, that it can be grasped by the human mind," Riordan said. "It puts a lid on the complexity of nature at its most fundamental level."

Until now, atom smasher experiments indicated only that there were no more than five or six families of fundamental particles, such as electrons and quarks, said University of Chicago astrophysicist.

The universe contains more matter than antimatter. If there were fewer than three families of basic particles, the universe would contain equal amounts of matter and antimatter, said David Schramm, a University of Chicago astrophysicist.

Because matter and antimatter destroy or "annihilate" each other, existence of fewer than three families means "we wouldn't be here," he said. "The whole universe would be filled with radiation and very little else."

On the other hand, if the building blocks of matter belonged to more than three families, the universe would contain more helium gas than it does, Schramm said.

Everyday matter is made of four particles belonging to the first family. They are up quarks, down quarks, electrons and electron neutrinos. Electrons and electron neutrinos are both particles in the family called "leptons."

Protons and neutrons in the nucleus of an atom are made of the two types of quarks. Electrons orbit the nucleus. Electron neutrinos are produced by exploding stars.

The second family of particles can be found today only in atom smashers and cosmic rays from space. The particles are the strange and charmed quarks, and two leptons named muons and muon neutrinos.

Particles in the third family — first discovered in the mid-1970s — are the bottom quark, the yet-undetected top quark, the tau lepton and the tau neutrino.

They can be created today only in atom smashers but, like the other families of particles, existed naturally in the first few seconds after the "big bang" that scientists believe created the universe roughly 15 billion years ago.

Bush in South fighting to retain GOP seat

GULFPORT, Miss. (AP) — President Bush is fighting to retain a congressional seat for the GOP, hunted for votes Thursday for Tom Anderson, an underdog Republican whom Bush said is needed in Congress to help fight drugs and hold the line on taxes.

Bush journeyed 800 miles aboard Air Force One to this Gulf Coast port for a 30-minute campaign rally to try to keep the seat of the late Rep. Larkin Smith in the Republican column in Tuesday's special election.

Later, Bush flew to Newark, N.J., en route to New York to help raise upwards of \$1 million for Republican Rudolph Giuliani for his longshot run for mayor. The president also planned brief appearances for Rep. Guy Molinari, R-N.Y., running for borough president of Staten Island, and for Rep. Jim Courter, R-N.J., seeking the governorship of New Jersey.

He also used the gulfport campaign rally to confirm what aides announced Tuesday he will attend the drug summit called by the presidents of Colombia, Bolivia and Peru.

Bush voiced hope the summit "will bring us to a new level of international cooperation in this war we must win" against the drug cartels.

He came to this Mississippi port town with Republican Party Chairman Lee Atwater in tow to

boost the chances of Anderson, the Oct. 3 open primary, was less than 50-50.

Bush, in his speech before several thousand people under sunny skies at gulfport Jones Park, tried to downplay party labels, saying Anderson embodies "Mississippi values, traditional values."

The candidate himself, who trailed Democrat State Sen. Gene Taylor in

comparisons. "There is a difference between the two candidates," said Anderson.

"The party of Michael Dukakis, Walter Mondale and Ted Kennedy belongs to Gene Taylor. My party is the party of President George Bush," Anderson said he was "the only candidate who will sign the no-tax pledge." Mr. President, read your

lips. We need to cut taxes."

Anderson, who was ambassador to Barbados from 1984 to 1986, also vowed to "do everything we can to make drugs eradicated from this country."

Bush repeated the no-tax increase vow that was a hallmark of his own campaign last year, saying, "We cannot tax our way to higher growth. And I will not do that as president."

Defense Department employee dies without getting flight home

WASHINGTON (AP) — A terminally ill Defense Department employee whose request to be flown to his Massachusetts home on an Air Force plane was turned down has died, his doctor said Thursday.

The Air Force said last month that Avram Brody did not meet the criteria needed for such a government-paid flight, which it estimated would cost \$30,000.

The 25-year-old man died of a brain tumor Wednesday night at his home in Palmdale, Calif., Dr. Abdullah Errukh said in a telephone interview.

"This one's a real sadness for the family. It's a heartbreaking time," said Brad Pearson of the Massachusetts Office for Handicapped Affairs, who lobbied for the Brody family.

"I'm going to wonder probably for the rest of my life if we didn't do too little or too much. Even if we could have gotten them home."

Pearson said the Air Force regulations "ignored a very sad and simple reality."

The Air Force had said it would allow such a flight for uniformed personnel, for someone whose

illness had been caused by his work or if the flight would save a life. Brody, the Air Force said, did not meet any of those criteria.

Also intervening in Brody's behalf were Sen. John Kerry, D-Mass., several members of the House of Representatives and White House aide Andrew Card, a Massachusetts native.

Bishops call for revised sex ed stand

NEW YORK (AP) — The U.S. Roman Catholic Church should drop its qualified support for teaching about condoms in public schools as a way of preventing AIDS, and should urge that youngsters be taught chastity instead, a committee of bishops said Thursday.

"There is no such thing as safe, or safer, sex. That's an illusion," said Archbishop Roger Mahony of Los Angeles, chairman of the Ad Hoc Committee on the HIV Statement. HIV is the virus that causes AIDS.

The committee's draft statement revises an earlier document released by the church's 50-member Administrative Board in December 1987, which said the church could tolerate public schools' providing information about condoms as long as sexual abstinence outside of marriage was presented as the "only morally correct and medically sure way" to prevent AIDS.

The board's document was criticized by some conservative bishops who said it would be misinterpreted as condoning sex outside marriage and artificial birth control. Cardinal Joseph Ratzinger, head of the Vatican Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, also chastised the administrative board for not consulting with the Vatican.

In spring 1988, the National Conference of Catholic Bishops decided to draw up a new statement.

The revised statement — "Called to Compassion: A Response to the HIV/AIDS Crisis" — will be presented to the conference at its fall meeting Nov. 6-9 in Baltimore. The committee drafting the statement was made up of Mahony, Cardinal Joseph L. Bernardin of Chicago, Cardinal Bernard F. Law of Boston, Archbishop William H. Keeler of Baltimore and Bishop Raymond W. Lessard of Savannah, Ga.

The wide-ranging statement also opposes universal mandatory AIDS testing, calls for increasing federal funds for AIDS research, and denounces violence and discrimination against AIDS victims as immoral.

"We are called to be a people of compassion, after the teachings of Jesus," Mahony said.

Where the new statement differs from the earlier document, titled "The Many Faces of AIDS: A Gospel Response," is mainly in its stand on condom education in public schools, and in a larger sense, the role of Catholic bishops in public policy debates.

The first document approached condom education as the lesser of two evils in reducing the risk of AIDS in students who are unlikely to remain chaste.

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World Over 100 injured in brawl

LISBON, Portugal (AP) — A bar fight exploded into a sprawling rampage involving hundreds of American and British seamen that left cars overturned, windows smashed and more than 100 people injured, police said Thursday.

Police said they arrested 21 U.S. and British sailors after an estimated 500 seamen brawled Wednesday night along Lisbon's seedy, harbor-dockside. One mob of sailors stormed a police station and smashed a motorcycle, authorities said. There were also reports of indiscriminate beatings by police.

Accounts varied considerably of what started the rioting street fights. British authorities claimed primarily American seamen were involved.

In Washington, Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams said 12 U.S. sailors were treated for injuries. He said 40 sailors had to be hospitalized for injuries such as damaged spleens or possible concussions.

Williams said the brawl was being investigated but that there were several versions of what he called "a very confused situation." Portuguese police said four police officers and three civilians were among the injured.

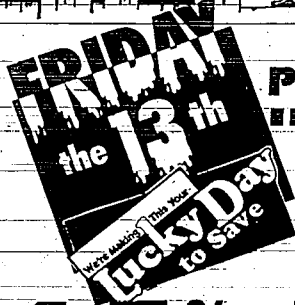
Paulino Cardoso, duty officer at Lisbon's security police, said the melee broke out after three black American seamen attacked a white U.S. sailor at the Passos Bar in the gaudy, neon-lit Cais do Sodre area. That account could not be confirmed.

Another Pentagon official who asked not to be identified, said the injured included officers, a chaplain and intelligence officers, who were trying to calm a confrontation that apparently arose after some type of disturbance and the police tried to clear the area of sailors.

The official said there were reports that indicated police were responsible for "severe indiscriminate beatings."

"People who were told to spread eagle were beaten on the ground," the official said. "They just beat people, they didn't care who."

Fighting spread from bar to nightclub along the narrow, cobbled streets of the riverside area about 9 p.m., Cardoso said.



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Shamir says conference unnecessary

JERUSALEM (AP) — Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir said Thursday a meeting of the Israeli and Egyptian foreign ministers to revive Middle East peace efforts, proposed by the United States, was an "inflated" and unnecessary idea.

It was his first response to the suggestion last week by Secretary of State James A. Baker III in connection with the Egyptian proposal for a meeting in Cairo between Israel and a Palestinian delegation.

In Baghdad, Iraq, PLO sources said chairman Yasser Arafat would be under pressure from other Palestinian leaders at a meeting next week to take a tough line on Palestinian-Israeli talks.

Shamir said in a speech in the Raanana suburb of Tel Aviv that Israel wants to meet with Palestinians to discuss procedures for elections in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, a key element of an Israeli peace plan set forth in April.

Strengthened storm moves to Vietnam

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — A strengthened Typhoon Dan roared toward Vietnam today after killing at least 30 people, injuring 57 and leaving 142,000 homeless in the Philippines, officials said.

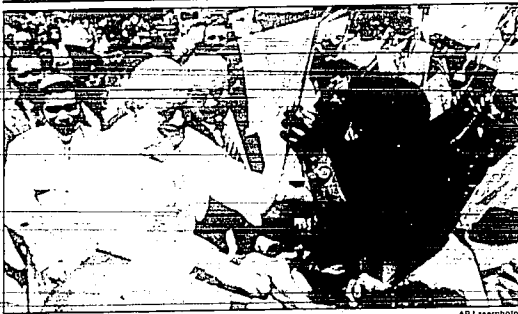
At least 33 fishermen also were missing after Dan battered Manila and southern areas of Luzon Island Wednesday with 62 mph winds. Forecasters said winds increased late Wednesday to 74.4 mph, making Dan a typhoon.

Electricity had still not been restored today to wide areas of Manila. About 95 percent of the Manila area, which has a population of more than 7 million, lost power Wednesday as strong winds ripped down power lines.

Red Cross spokeswoman Lourdes Masing said 14 fishermen were missing aboard seven boats that disappeared in Subic Bay west of the capital.

Fight breaks out in front of Pope's altar

DILI, Indonesia (AP) — A melee of flying chairs and windows broke out in front of the altar Thursday as Pope John Paul II was finishing his blessing to a crowd of 100,000 in Dili, capital of East Timor.

Four women were reported hospitalized with injuries, suffered after being crushed in the surging crowd during the battle between plainclothes police and chanting youths who oppose Indonesian control of the former Portuguese colony.

No arrests were reported and the pope did not appear to be in danger at any time.

The trouble began when about 20 young men shouting, "Viva independence!" and "Viva il papa!" unfurled a banner in front of the altar and hauled chairs at policemen.

Plainclothesmen floored the youths and seized their banner. The crowd scattered and about 100 more young men joined the fray.

Police confiscated the film of some photographers after the fighting ended about 15 minutes later.

One banner read, in Portuguese, "Fretin! Welcomes You." Another said: "John Paul, Savior of East Timor." Fretin is the independence movement that has fought Indonesian rule since annexation in 1976.

A non-Indonesian priest said it was clear the protesters respected the pope because they did not act until the Mass was over.

In a similar incident in April 1987, leftists opposed the Chilean government there in rocks at police during a papal Mass in Santiago. Security forces responded with tear gas, some of which wafted toward the altar.

On Thursday, white-cassocked priests and seminarians moved quickly to calm the crowd and the pope was escorted to his car, surrounded by Vatican and Indonesian security men. John Paul is on a 10-day tour of

South Korea, Indonesia and Mauritius.

During four days in Indonesia, the pontiff has urged the government of the world's most populous Muslim nation to protect human rights in East Timor. The local Roman Catholic church and the human rights group Amnesty International say violations include mass arrests, torture and "disappearances."

The protesters, supporters of Fretin, got to within 100 feet of the steps of the altar, where the pope watched in sweltering heat that reached 100 degrees.

Girl Scouts, who had acted as ushers in front of the altar, wept as they were caught up in the melee.

In his homily, John Paul made no direct mention of Indonesian rule over East Timor, which neither the Vatican nor United Nations recognizes, but referred instead to "those who have responsibility for life in East Timor."

Appeals court frees man convicted in Palme killing

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — An appeals court on Thursday freed a 42-year career criminal convicted of killing Prime Minister Olof Palme, ruling there was not enough evidence to blame him for the crime that traumatized Swedes.

Christer Pettersson, who maintained his innocence throughout his sensational trial, walked away from Kronoberg prison hours after the Svea Appeals Court threw out his July conviction.

Prosecutors had charged that Pettersson, who has a long criminal record and a history of drug and alcohol abuse, gunned down the popular and dynamic Swedish leader on a Stockholm street in 1986.

Pettersson had been sentenced to life in prison and had been in solitary confinement since his arrest in December.

"I'm surprised. I never really believed I would be acquitted, although I am innocent," Pettersson said, following his release, the national news agency TT said.

Thursday's ruling could dash any hopes authorities have of bringing Palme's killer to justice. It is the biggest setback in a three-year investigation that critics have said was bungled from the beginning.

The appellate court decision was somewhat foreshadowed by the July conviction: Although six lay jurors found him guilty, the two professional judges on the eight-member panel voted for acquittal.

Prosecutors could appeal the court's ruling to the Supreme Court. But it would likely free the

appeal only if it would be the basis of a legal precedent or if it were considered a special case.

Prosecutor Joergen Almbalt said the prosecution would not decide whether to go to the Supreme Court until the appeals court issues its formal written verdict, which is due Nov. 2.

Prime Minister Ingvar Carlsson vowed to press ahead with the hunt for Palme's killer. "The work in this investigation must continue with full force," Carlsson said.

Though it delayed releasing details of its decision until Nov. 2, the appeals court apparently found the prosecution's circumstantial case too thin. Pettersson was convicted even though no motive was established, no weapon was found and no witnesses testified to seeing the Swede fire five shots at Palme.

The court's decision is that the investigation into the case is insufficient for a conviction, which means that Pettersson must be released immediately, appeals court president Birgitta Blom said.

Palme, a four-term prime minister and prominent international figure active in socialist causes, was shot from behind at close range on Feb. 28, 1986, as he walked home from a late movie in downtown Stockholm with his wife, Lisbeth.

The appeals court decision added to a hopeless and nuclear department, which is the investigation into the first murder of a national leader in 200 years, a killing sometimes compared to the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

Police have been condemned for ineptitude in the case. In June 1988, Justice Minister Anna-Creta Leijon, admitting frustration over police handling, says forced to resign for bypassing legal authorities and approving a private investigation.

Authorities spent a year pursuing various conspiracy theories that subsequently proved groundless. Kurdish rebels, Iranian radicals and right-wing police were among those considered suspects in the killings.

Pettersson's release left police apparently at a dead end after the largest manhunt in Swedish history and 43 months of work.

Mrs. Palme, the only witness close to the scene, testified she was "100 percent certain" it was Pettersson she saw starting at her from a few feet away after her husband fell to the ground, mortally wounded.

She can never testify against anyone else, experts said.

One of the difficulties is that most of the witnesses have been used in court. They carry very little value as evidence, assistant national police chief Ulf Karlsson said.

Police would have to produce compelling forensic evidence or new witnesses to bring another suspect to trial, he said, though he added that detectives were still searching for the missing

murder weapon and fingerprints. Legal expert Claes Borgstrom said Pettersson, if he sued, would probably get "the highest damages ever awarded (in Sweden) for deprivation of liberty."

East German Shakespeare's theater believed to be found

split surfaces, reports say

BERLIN (AP) — A high-ranking East German official Thursday rejected the democratic reforms embraced by some of the nation's Communist allies and said socialism will continue to dominate society.

Another top official said the government will listen to "all parts of the population" clamoring for change as long as they are not committed to scrapping the current social order.

Despite the staunch public commitments to socialism, there were signs of strong discontent within the leadership over how to grapple with the growing public demands for a freer society. Reports persisted that 77-year-old Erich Honecker, the nation's hard-line leader, was in trouble.

West Germany's mass-circulation Bild newspaper, quoting unidentified Communist Party sources, reported Thursday that Honecker would be replaced Oct. 18.

Eduard Lintner, the inter-German affairs spokesman for Christian Democratic delegation in the West German parliament, was quoted in the daily Passauer Neue Presse as saying Honecker's departure was "immediately at hand."

East German Communist Party sources say that an increasing number of high-ranking party officials are displeased with how Honecker handled the recent wave of pro-democracy protests and the exodus of tens of thousands of citizens to the West.

The East German state-run news agency ADN on Thursday carried a routine dispatch that omitted Honecker's title as head of the Communist Party, the most powerful of his two posts. ADN usually refers to him as both head of the Communist Party and head of state.

Honecker's picture has not been carried on the front pages of party newspapers for two days, although he is usually featured there daily.

The West Berlin newspaper Der Tagesspiegel reported Thursday that a "strong majority" in the 21-member ruling Politburo favored Honecker's departure.

After what sources said was a volatile meeting, the Politburo on Wednesday promised to examine the causes behind the emigre exodus and the pro-democracy protests and said the government would be willing to discuss reforms.

But in a commentary published Thursday in the newspaper, Central Committee member Otto Reinhold emphasized "the leading role of the party" in bringing about any change.

Reinhold said he wanted to distinguish the role of the party in East Germany from the "ever-increasing variety" of changes in other Socialist countries.

LONDON (AP) — Beneath a parking lot, under a smelch of hazelnuts perhaps left by unending drama patrons, archaeologists believe they have found the remains of William Shakespeare's Globe Theater.

"Certainty is a scarce commodity in archaeology but the probability is very high," said Harvey Sheldon, a senior archaeologist at the Museum of London. "Essentially, this is the site where the Globe ought to be."

A plaque put in place in 1909 by the Shakespeare Reading Society of London identified the likely site of the most famous Elizabethan theater on the south bank of the River Thames.

On Thursday, the hopes of Shakespeare lovers were rewarded with the first glimpses of three chalk and brick foundation walls that Sheldon said were part of the back of the theater.

"Finding the theater as a tower is very important," he said. "Clearly, the importance in terms of scholarship can only come from investigation."

The Globe was built in 1599 by Cuthbert and Richard Burbage and a company of actors, including Shakespeare. Little was known about the shape except that it was described as "the wooden O" in the prologue to Shakespeare's "Henry V."

Sheldon said: "If you look at the

outline (of the remains) from the top, you'll see it is actually beginning to make the O shape or the polygonal shape."

A second piece of evidence was the discovery of a large quantity of crushed hazelnut shells near one wall, he said.

Hazelnuts were the Elizabethan equivalent of popcorn, and Sheldon said the shells appear to have been used as a building material, possibly to level the theater's floors.

The Globe became one of the most popular theaters of its day and saw the first performances of Shakespeare's great tragedies—"Hamlet," "Othello," "King Lear" and "Macbeth."

During the first performance of Shakespeare's "Henry VIII" on June 29, 1613, a common that discharged set fire to the theater and it was destroyed. "The only injury, according to a contemporary account by Sir Henry Wotton, was to a man whose breeches caught fire but had the 'provident wit' to put it out with bottle ale."

The Globe was rebuilt the following year on the old foundations, and again was a hit with audiences who paid 1 penny for the pit, 2 pence for the gallery, and 3 pence for a seat. The most privileged members of the audience sat on stools on the stage.

But the Puritans, who were against public displays, helped push an ordi-

nance through Parliament in 1642 banning stage plays, and the Globe was closed, along with other theaters. It was demolished two years later.

Archaeologists knew the general location of the Globe but it was the sale three years ago of the Courage brewery by owners Imperial PLC to the British conglomerate Hanson PLC that led to the excavation of the brewery's parking lot this summer.

Sheldon said the remains were discovered in the northwest corner of the lot, the last section on the 21,500-square-foot site to be cleared of concrete reinforced with metal.

To the untrained eye, the corner site near the south end of Southwark Bridge looks like a "deep hole" with the remains of concrete pillars and rows of bricks.

With help from Sheldon, one can spot an outer brick wall. A middle wall 3 yards long and made of gray white brick blocks is believed to be part of the first Globe theater, while an inner brick wall, 1 yard long and with a layer of crushed hazelnuts, may be part of the second Globe, he said.

Roy S. Rojas, 38, of Gooding, was killed just before midnight when his car drifted

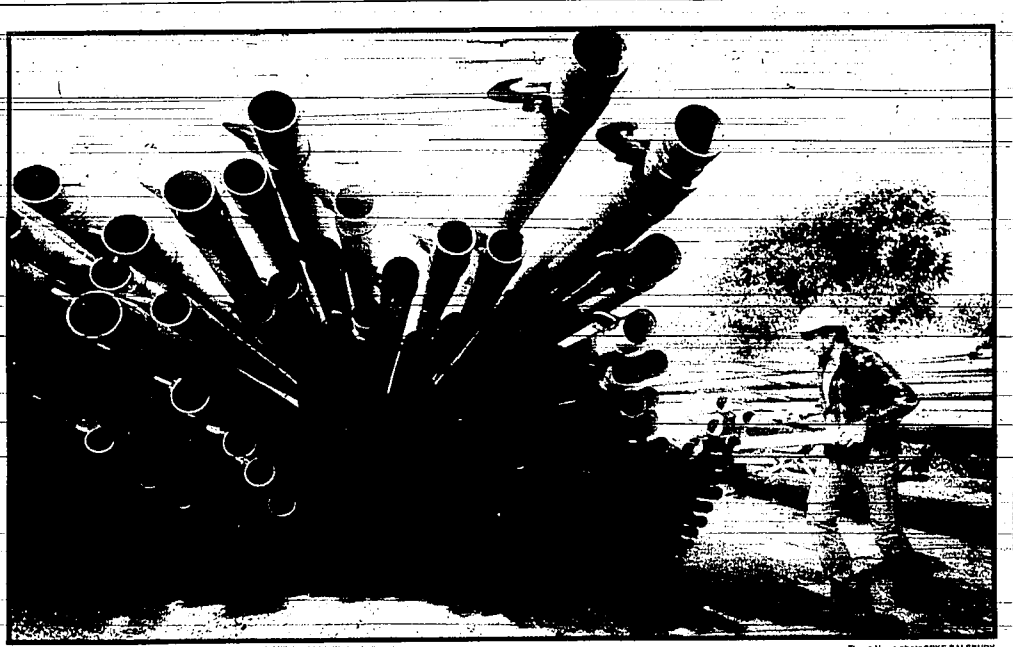
the right side of the freeway, he overcorrected twice and the car rolled over 2 1/2 times, the dispatcher said.

State gets advice on improving children's programs

TWIN FALLS - Money was the bottom line Thursday night as children's services professionals and members of the public offered advice to the state on improving children's programs.

"We are forced to do more and more and more with less and less," said Pat

Traugher, a 17-year veteran Health and Welfare Department worker.

She gave examples of programs that have been eliminated when funding was yanked, and programs that cannot fulfill their goals because of financial constraints.

A crowd of more than 50 applauded Traugher and others who spoke. Here are a few highlights of the testimony:

- Foster parents are still in short supply,

said Pharis Stanger, regional volunteer coordinator for the Health and Welfare Department.

Both Stanger and Ann Martin, who with her husband provides a foster home for teenage boys, suggested foster care be treated as a profession, with enough reimbursement to cover one wage earner's salary.

• Several who testified called for more

mental-health services for child-abuse victims.

• Just as many said the Guardian Ad Litem program - a program in which a volunteer becomes a child-abuse victim's advocate - should not have to fight for funding each year but should be fixed recipient of state money.

"It is a necessity, not a luxury," said Dr. • See HEARING on Page B2

Heyburn Council approves truck stop, with restrictions

HEYBURN - The City Council gave the go-ahead Wednesday to a truck stop complex planned for the intersection of Interstate 84 and Highway 30, but with some restrictions.

The council unanimously approved a special-use permit to Keith Couch, provided the facility have a 6-foot chain-link fence surrounding it and a buffer of trees and use city water and sewage facilities. Couch also must cooperate with the local highway district to provide safe

access to and from the truck stop and provide water control in case of storms.

Several residents with property adjacent to the planned development asked that the chain-link fence have barbed wire at the top.

The city delayed a decision on the barbed wire to see if it would be liable if people were injured.

The planning commission recommended the special-use permit instead of having the land rezoned because it would allow restrictions. Portions of the land are zoned agricultural, residential and commercial.

Without the permit, the land would have

to be zoned light industrial.

Couch plans to build a gas station, recreational vehicle park and restaurant. Future possibilities include a truck repair shop, truck washing facility and fast-food restaurant.

Couch's old business, Couch Equipment Co., was destroyed by fire in late May on part of the 50-acre site.

Since part of the land had been platted as the Midway Subdivision in 1967, the council, first, had to vote to vacate the plat. He still needs approval from various city departments for parts of the project.

In other matters, the council will look

into what can be done to increase the efficiency of Heyburn calls to the 911 emergency number, based in Burley.

When Heyburn residents call "911" for their police or fire departments, the Burley operator routes the calls through Rupert police or fire department dispatchers.

The same process is used for Heyburn residents who call for a Rupert ambulance.

Calls for a Burley ambulance are automatically sent through by means of a computer.

"We hope it goes through," Howard said. "We believe in what we're doing."

County takes option on building

TWIN FALLS - Police Commander Pat Bermingham has resigned after more than 20 years on the Twin Falls Police, Public Safety Director Paul DuFresne said Thursday.

DuFresne said he received Bermingham's letter of resignation Wednesday, and in it Bermingham indicated "personal reasons" for his decision.

DuFresne said the resignation came as a surprise, and he didn't press Bermingham to elaborate on his reasons.

"I have to respect his privacy," DuFresne said.

Bermingham was unavailable for comment.

"It was with regret that I accepted his resignation. He leaves a hole in the department," DuFresne said.

"I think overall he was a good officer," agreed former Public Safety Director Tim Qualls, who was

Bermingham's boss before retiring earlier this year.

Lt. Robert Hodge has been named acting commander, and no plans for a permanent replacement have been made, DuFresne said.

Bermingham, who was commander of the road patrol division, had been with the police department since 1967.

In September 1986 he was indicted by a federal grand jury for making false statements on an expense account.

Specifically, Bermingham claimed \$132 in expenses for appearing as a witness for the U.S. government at a trial in Boise.

But a U.S. District Court judge dropped the indictment that December, upholding the city's handling of the matter. The city had agreed that Bermingham would be suspended for 30 days, receive a reduction in pay and have a letter of reprimand placed in his personnel file.

Bermingham is currently on leave, and will finish up before the resignation takes effect, DuFresne said.

The city received a letter rejecting its \$555,100 Economic Development Association grant.

The grant was denied because Pet Inc., a major beneficiary of the grant, could not guarantee that warding it wouldn't result in jobs being lost in other states, according to a letter from the EDA.

The City of Buhl's application for EDA assistance is, therefore, denied.

Idaho maximum security institution dedicated, opening slated

BOISE (AP) — Inmates are scheduled to begin arriving Nov. 1 and training will begin in earnest next week for the 453-member staff at the new Idaho Maximum Security Institution, which was dedicated Thursday.

"I'm happy. I'm ready to get to work," Warden A.J. Arave said after the dedication ceremony at the \$23 million prison, near the main state penitentiary south of Boise.

Gov. Cecil Andrus and

Corrections Director Richard Vernon cut the ribbon at the entrance to the prison, flanked by more than 100 correctional officers in dress-blue uniforms and chain-link fence covered with spiral razor wire.

Members of the state Board of Corrections, and the Permanent Building Fund Advisory Council also participated in the ceremony, as well as William Agee, chairman and chief executive officer of prison contractor Morrison Knudsen Corp.

All the speakers expressed mixed emotions about completion of the project started in 1987 in an effort to ease pressure on the state's overcrowded prison system.

"I would like to see your cooperation move toward the handling of more nuclear wastes than the human wastes we have here," Andrus told Agee. "I would sincerely hope that we would not be required to do much more with a security level of this type."

But Vernon said the "heavy duty" cell space for 254 additional inmates provided by the facility eases a unique situation in Idaho, if only for a short time.

"The nice thing about this facility is, probably for the first time in Idaho history, our department will be truly in balance," with adequate space for all classifications of inmate from minimum to maximum custody.

"The prison was built as part of a

package of construction with an \$8 million, 100-bed expansion of the Idaho Correctional Institution at Orofino. With the renovation of two older cellblocks, the new maximum security facility will provide space for up to 326 inmates.

It also was built to accept the addition of two "pods" of cells later, which would increase the capacity to 500 beds.

Agee called the new prison "a top-notch institution," with state-of-

the-art security and life-safety features not available in any other state institution.

"The transfer of prisoners from existing facilities to the new beds will allow more than 220 state inmates to be moved back to the prison system from county jails. But Vernon said at its current growth rate, Idaho's prison population — already over 1,800 — will outstrip available space by the end of the year.

Congressmen seek tax break extension for power project

WASHINGTON — Democratic Reps. Richard Stalling and Pat Williams of Montana asked Congress Thursday to approve a \$1 million tax break extension for an Idaho hydroelectric project, which they said would provide electricity and jobs for eastern Idaho.

Testifying before the House Ways and Means Committee, Williams blamed Congress for delaying the Island Park Hydroelectric Project near Yellowstone Park by mandating stringent environmental safeguards.

While trying to meet these environmental provisions for the project missed the December 1988 completion deadline for a \$1.1 million energy tax credit, that

expired Dec. 31, 1988.

"We asked them up on the carpet and made them make sure they were environmentally sound and then we jerked the rug out from under them by ending the energy tax credit," Williams said.

Without an extension for the tax credit until 1991, the project may not be able to continue, he added.

Acting committee chairman Rep. Charles Rangel, D-N.Y., assured Williams and Stalling that the project had the committee's support. But he warned that the tax extension proposal might face tougher hurdles in the Senate.

The hydroelectric plant would use its next to an existing dam on Henry's Fork River, near Ashton, Idaho. It was first proposed by the Fall River Rural Electric Cooperative in 1985 and would provide electricity to about 3,000

to 3,500 homes and businesses in Eastern Idaho and West Yellowstone.

Williams said congress mandated unusually stringent licensing standards for the project in 1986 because the river had exceptional fishery, wildlife and recreational value and was being considered for wild and scenic designation.

He said the Cooperative had met all environmental requirements and asked that the tax break be extended until 1991. He said the \$1 million would "almost precisely" pay for water quality studies and monitoring instruments mandated by Congress.

Williams said the project would provide construction and maintenance jobs as well as cheaper electricity for the area.

Wheat harvest remains third largest on record despite rain, drought losses

BOISE (AP) — Unusually heavy late summer rain in the north and persistent drought in the southeast took its toll on Idaho's spring wheat crop, but the latest government harvest estimate projects this year's overall wheat crop as the third largest on record.

"The Agriculture Department also increased its production estimates for

an already expected record beet harvest and the second-best-dried bean crop on record.

Based on Oct. 1 field conditions, Agriculture Department analysts said on Thursday cut its estimate for spring wheat production to 37 million bushels, down nearly 6 percent for the estimate made just a month ago.

The average yield dropped from 70 to 66 bushels an acre, but with acreage at its highest level in seven years, the crop would still be the four largest on record.

At the same time, analysts biked their projection for the winter wheat crop by more than 1.4 million bushels to 56.7 million, the second largest winter wheat harvest ever. Yields were increased two bushels an acre to 70 bushels.

be 24 percent larger than a year ago, mainly due to a dramatic increase in acreage.

The report does not consider the damage to the mature wheat caused by the heavy northern Idaho rains, estimated in the millions of dollars due to slashed values.

But continued dry conditions in other major producing states have limited the national wheat rebound from the 1988 drought and kept the wheat market strong, offering most Idaho growers the chance for a second straight year of profit. The market averaged \$3.95 a bushel in mid-September.

The government estimated the sugarcane harvest at just over 4.4 million tons, a record fueled by yields averaging 25 tons an acre statewide.

The projection for the dried bean harvest was increased 4 million pounds to 344 million from the September estimate as the yield rose 50 pounds to just over a ton an acre to rank as the second highest ever.

Youth admits guilt in murders

LEWISTON (AP) — A Lewiston teen-ager gave two versions of how his parents died before confessing to their killings, a city police officer says.

Bradley R. Thomasson, 17, has been bound over to 2nd District Court on two counts of first-degree murder for last month's shooting deaths of his parents, Ray E. Thomasson, 56, and Judith Ann Thomasson, 50.

Lewiston Police Sgt. Russell Ellis said at Wednesday's preliminary hearing that Thomasson first said he woke about 5 a.m., went upstairs and found his father in the hallway, bleeding from a head wound.

He then found his mother in the bedroom, also injured, and telephoned police.

"He said he didn't know what happened other than he found his parents with bullet holes in them," Ellis said. "He changed his story and told me he saw the individual who had shot his parents."

State appeals funding cut

BOISE (AP) — The state Health and Welfare Department will file its appeal next week seeking to overturn the federal government's decision to cut off just over \$1 million a month to Idaho State School and Hospital for violating patient treatment standards.

But while the department remains confident it can win the administrative appeal, Deputy Director Allen Korhonen told legislative budget writers on Thursday alternative plans are being developed to continue caring for the facility's 200 severely handicapped patients if the federal cash eventually stops.

In spite of the support the institution's operations received at a public hearing earlier this week in Nampa, Korhonen said that "has not relieved the pressure nor has it put us any closer to a resolution."

He said the alternatives that will be given to the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee in January will focus on how long the state might have to provide all the money to keep the facility running if federal aid ends and just how much money would be needed for that period.

The federal government formally identified the facility for federal aid in August and what state officials maintain were unjustified or technical violations. But the federal financial support, which accounts

for about 75 percent of the institution's operating budget, will continue until a decision is made on the administration appeal. Korhonen said that could take as much as another year.

"In the meantime, we are taking every action we can to get ISSH into compliance," he said. The government decertified the institution for failure to meet requirements for actively treating the patients to ensure they reach their full development potential.

Korhonen said any requirement for total state financing of the facility would be only temporary, federal funds will last.

"We're going to get back into this program," he said. "The only question is when."

Some patients could be moved to private facilities as they are created, he said, and payment for their care would come from another program that remains heavily financed by the federal government. Korhonen said the state will attempt to move as many of the facility's patients as possible into private care over the next several years.

But there will always be a need for some capacity at the Idaho State School and Hospital because there will always be some people so profoundly disabled they need that level of care," he said.

Suspect charged

WALLACE (AP) — An Enaville man was charged with two misdemeanors in a shooting that seriously wounded two people, and law enforcement officials searched for more charges to file against him.

Richard Gary Timken, 47, was released on his own recognizance after he was charged Tuesday in First District Court with two counts of injuring another person by discharging a firearm.

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National GOP, Owens exchange salvos over free mail privileges

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Republican Congressional Committee and Utah Democratic Rep. Wayne Owens have traded political salvos over lawmakers' alleged abuse of their free-mailing privileges.

On Wednesday, the NRCC issued a press release calling Owens a hypocrite for saying publicly that he opposes abuse of "franking," or free-mailing, after he had voted recently against reducing funds for franked mail.

Owens countered that if that makes him a hypocrite, then Republicans are hypocrites, too. Even though they may vote to cut funding for mass mail, they still are sending plenty of newsletters and town-meeting notices, he said.

NRCC Co-Chairman Ed Rollins started the exchange when he complained that on Sept. 25, Owens

voted to keep \$45 million in the congressional account for free mailings instead of giving it to the war on drugs.

After that vote, Owens issued a statement saying in part that he still considered "abuse of the franking privilege to be unacceptable and have voted to eliminate it" previously, and would vote for similar future bills, if well-written.

"This is a case where Wayne Owens is telling his constituents what they want to hear, but doing exactly the opposite in Washington," Rollins said. "Only the Times or several others where Wayne Owens has promised the frank. Three times last year he voted against cutting the frank by \$20 million, \$10 million and \$5 million, all on the same day."

In the past two years, records

show, Congress has voted 10 times on issues dealing with the franking privilege. Owens voted to maintain or expand the frank eight times, voted to reduce it once, and was absent on one vote.

In contrast, Rep. Howard Nielson, R-Utah, voted to cut the franking privilege in all 10 instances and Rep. Jim Hansen, R-Utah, voted to cut it five times and was absent for the other five votes.

"I have to smile at the hypocrisy charge because the Republicans who cause the NRCC to make such charges, continue to use the frank while studiously voting to cut it down," Owens said.

Spokesmen for all three Utah members of the House said they continue to send out newsletters and town-meeting notices.

Mayoral candidate says dam site is unsafe, risks contamination

SPRINGDALE, Utah (AP) — A dam constructed last year by the Springdale Consolidated Irrigation Co. has come under fire from former Mayor Bob Ralston as being unsafe and hazardous.

Ralston contends the reservoir was built on a site used as a dump for 70 years by the town and by Zion's National Park.

Ralston, seeking election to his old job, says possible hazardous waste may include lead, paint, and PCBs from electric transformers. State Water Resources Board spokesman Dennis Strong says the agency does not know until after construction that the site may have been built on a land fill.

In comments published Thursday in The Daily Spectrum, he said that the agency was told about the possibility just six weeks ago.

However, Ken Gardner of ARIX Engineering in Salt Lake City, the firm hired by the irrigation

company to design the dam, said he knew there was a dump at the site, "but it was excavated prior to construction."

Strong said the matter has been referred to the State Health Department's Bureau of Water Pollution Control.

As for hazardous wastes, irrigation company board member Ardell De Mille, a former national park employee, says none were dumped at the site. He says he understood that all electrical transformers were shipped to a hazardous waste site after they were discarded by the National Park Service.

De Mille says the site was used as a dump for household garbage, Zion Lodge garbage and by former pig farmer. He said the other park refuse was buried at or near the Grafton Gravel Pit on national park land.

Fines from PEPCON explosion cut

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Nevada officials have agreed to reduce the fines imposed on PEPCON as a result of the May 4, 1988 explosion that killed two people and injured more than 300.

The Nevada Division of Occupational Safety and Health cited PEPCON for 30 violations in July 1988 and suggested fines of \$36,000.

In an agreement worked out with the company, the state is now seeking \$12,820 in fines.

The state amended its complaint Wednesday before the state Occupational Safety and Health Review Board.

In the amended complaint, the division repeated various allegations of violations of federal safety standards, but downgraded some of the violations from "serious."

Company vice president Keith Rooker said Wednesday the company will probably agree not to challenge further the state's findings, but will specify that any agreement is not an admission of charges.

"The plant was not an unsafe plant," Rooker said. He said the Wednesday before the state challenge, only to put an end to the matter.

"This is not a productive activity either for us or for the state," Rooker said of the hassle over state citations. "We're not going to be conducting an ammunition perchlorate operation in Nevada."

PEPCON has since moved to Cedar City, Utah and has been renamed Western Electrochemical Co.

The plant manufactures ammonium perchlorate, a rocket fuel oxidizer used in the space shuttle and military rockets.

The blast at the PEPCON plant in Henderson, Nev., caused an estimated \$73 million in damage.

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BYU sets \$50 hike in tuition

PROVO, Utah (AP) — Undergraduate tuition at Brigham Young University will be increased \$50 per semester for the 1990-91 year, the school's trustees have decided. Under the decision, undergraduate tuition at the Mormon Church-owned university will rise to \$950 per semester. Tuition for advance-standing students will increase to \$1,110.

Board rejects Andrews' request for commutation

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The state Board of Pardons today rejected death row inmate William Andrews' request for an unprecedented second commutation hearing in a 2-1 vote mirroring its original decision to deny clemency. Board Chairman H.L. "Pete" Haun and member Ed Kimball concurred in the decision, with Victoria Palacios dissenting as she did following Andrews' Aug. 10-11 commutation hearing. Andrews, condemned for the torture-slayings of three people during a 1974 robbery at Ogden's Hi-Fi Shop, was spared an Aug. 22 execution date when a federal appellate court issued a stay pending resolution of his appeals.

State police take dead owl seriously

ALSEA, Ore. (AP) — A man who hung an owl carcass from a sign reading "Have you shot a spotted owl today?" says it was just a joke, but Oregon State Police, game officers charged Woodruff with possession of a protected species. After investigators went to Woodruff's property and confiscated the carcass, they found that it was a great horned owl. They said the owl probably had been struck by a vehicle after it swooped too low over the highway. Woodruff said an acquaintance found the owl carcass last week and gave it to him to go with his sign. He said he has put up other signs about the spotted owl to provoke reactions from people passing by his property. Capt. Daniel Brosnan, the assistant director of the state police Fish and Game Bureau, said the owl was "prank-wash-funny." "We don't have much of a sense of humor when it comes to wildlife violations," Brosnan said. The great horned owl is protected by both state and federal laws, Brosnan said, but Woodruff probably will not be charged with federal violations because the owl was not killed intentionally.

NEW YORK (AP)—Outfielder Jesse Barfield, who became a free agent at the end of the season, signed a three-year contract Thursday to remain with the New York Yankees.

Barfield came to the Yankees on April 30 in a trade with the Toronto Blue Jays. He played in 120 games for New York, hitting .240 with 18 home runs and 56 RBIs. For the season, he hit .234, with 23 homers and 67 RBIs.

Cobb kicked off No. 6 Vols football team for violations

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP)—Reggie Cobb, the top rusher for sixth-ranked Tennessee, was kicked off the team Thursday by coaches Johnny Majors for an unspecified violation of team rules.

Majors did not say what the violation was, but that the dismissal is permanent.

"I regret that action is necessary," Majors said. "But our rules are for the welfare of the team and the total university. They must be obeyed."

Cobb, a junior from Knoxville, was suspended by Majors in February for an unspecified violation of team rules. Newspaper accounts said the violation involved testing positive for illegal drugs.

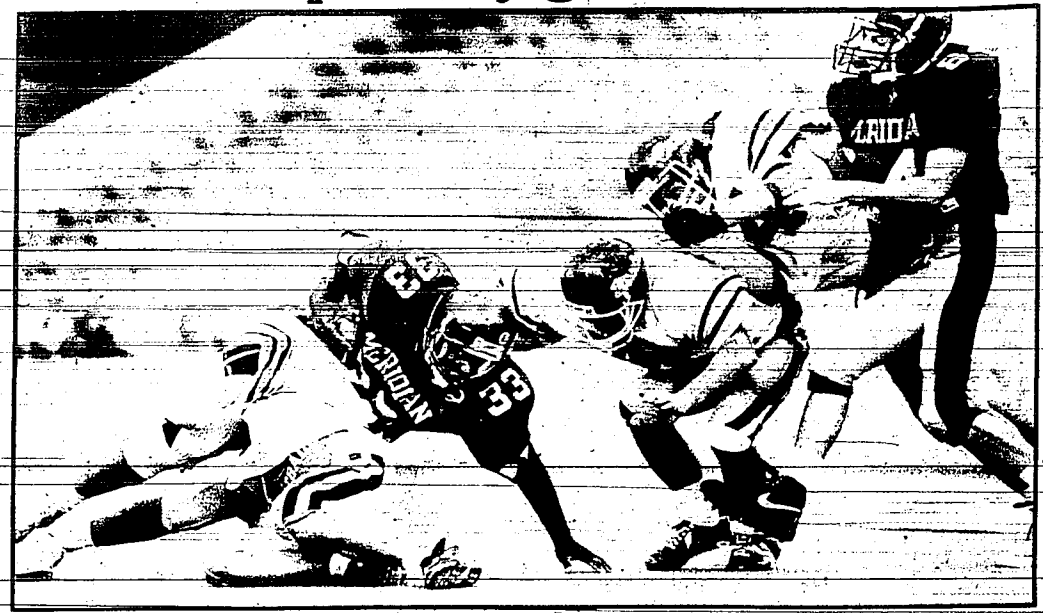

Cowboys deal Walker to Vikes in huge 'mind-boggling' trade

IRVING, Texas — After weeks of negotiations, the Dallas Cowboys Thursday closed one of the biggest trades in team history by paying running back Herschel Walker more than \$1.2 million to leave.

Walker, who led the NFL in rushing last year, was sent to the Minnesota Vikings for five players and several future draft picks in a deal Cowboys coach Jimmy Johnson called "mind-boggling."

"It's shocking, but I do want to play football," Walker said.

Cowboys owner Jerry Jones said the deal, which the two teams have talked about since June, was completed Thursday when he agreed to pay Walker an undisclosed amount of "exit" money.

"We paid Herschel under the do-right rule. It was very important he feel very good about the Cowboys when he left," Jones said.

Sources close to the deal said Walker was paid at least

\$1.2 million, with one saying "other considerations would work the total package up to around \$1.4 million." Walker was on the fourth year of a five-year contract worth \$1 million a season.

"It was very unique and in everybody's interests," Jones said. "It was something of a sacrifice to give away a player of Herschel Walker's stature. We took a lot of time doing because we had a lot of feelings for Herschel's feelings."

They're (Dallas) doing something great for the Dallas Cowboys, and that's why people should respect their decision because they are trying to better the Cowboys," Walker said.

Herschel's a great player with a great attitude," Johnson said. "It was difficult for him but he's going to a team that can contend for a Super Bowl. We're rebuilding."

Johnson said an agent told him, "It's the greatest trade in NFL history."

Part of Magic Valley goose season opens Saturday

JEROME — A small portion of Magic Valley will usher in the 1989-90 goose hunting season this Saturday.

The vast majority of the area will remain closed for another two weeks.

The goose opening Saturday will concern only Camas County and that portion of Blaine County that lies north and west of U.S. Highway 93.

Craig Kvale, Region 4 wildlife manager for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, said remaining closed is the remainder of Blaine County and all of Gooding, Lincoln, Mimioka, Jerome, Twin Falls and Cassia counties.

The early hunt, largely targeting production and populations from the Hill City Marsh and Mormon Reservoir, gives hunters in that area a "little" extra time to pursue their sport. That country generally freezes up well ahead of the rest of Magic Valley. When Mormon becomes ice-coated, the birds move out.

The reservoir and lands immediately surrounding it remain closed, giving the birds a daytime loafing sanctuary and providing field hunting opportunity.

Things have returned to normal as this year's nesting pair census saw the number of geese apparently setting up households return to about 185 — very close to the long-term average of just over 200.

A year ago that number had soared to over 400 as apparently drought conditions that dried up more remote waters forced incubating geese to the only available water areas.

"It is nice to be back to normal. That 400 figure was very uncomfortable to live with and it remains speculation that the two-year drought was the reason," Kvale said.

The daily bag limit remains three geese, of which only two may be dark or Canada species.

"This allows a hunter to pick up a snow goose is one happens to come by. It's a rare thing but it does occur," Kvale said.

He noted that hunters planning on pursuing geese in Elmore County had best arm themselves with regulations and become acquainted with them because that area is under a wide system of geographical and bag limits changes. In fact, it is perhaps the first in the state to have "staggered" bag limits.

Kvale said that the usual regulations apply — a hunter must have a federal and state duck stamp that may be held more than three shells, including one in the chamber.

The Idaho Fish and Game Commission refused to go along with federal guidelines that would have restored the 30 minutes before sunrise. Therefore, hunting hours in the state remain sunrise to sunset.

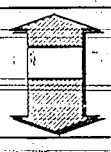

Boise Cascade reports 3rd quarter profit drop

BOISE (AP) — Boise Cascade Corp., already coping with union problems in the expansion of its Minnesota paper mill, has reported a 12.6 percent drop in profits for the third quarter of 1989.

The Boise-based wood-products company on Thursday announced earnings for the July-September period totaled \$62.8 million, down \$9 million from the same three-month period a year ago because of a sluggish paper market and sharply higher wood-fiber costs.

The earnings decline broke a string of 11 straight quarters in which profits exceeded year earlier levels.

"It's unlikely that we'll see any significant short-term improvement in the supply-demand balance for our paper grades, and in fact, we could see further modest softening in the markets for some of the grades we manufacture," Boise Cascade Chairman John Fery said.

Fully diluted earnings per share of common stock for the quarter dropped to \$1.30 from \$1.53 a year ago.

The summer profit picture, based on a fractional sales increase to nearly \$1.1 billion, left earnings for the first nine months of the year at \$216.3 million, still \$2.6 million ahead of the 1988 pace. Sales through September totaled nearly \$3.3 billion, up nearly 7 percent from a year ago.

In Minnesota, the company has been embroiled in a dispute between

local union construction workers and the Alabama contractor and the nonunion workers it imported to build a \$500-million expansion to the International Falls mill. Boise Cascade has tried to distance itself from the dispute, labeling it a matter between the workers and the construction company. It settled a contract with the mill workers last spring, agreeing to bonus provisions.

Slowing demand for paper products at some new capacity was going into production and high wood-chip costs slashed operating income by 31 percent from the paper segment, which generates over half of Boise Cascade's profits.

But Fery said the positive effect of higher prices and healthy demand for wood products was partially offset by increased delivered-log costs.

"We also expect a continued escalation of delivered-log costs in the Pacific Northwest although at a rate slower than that of the first nine months of the year," he said.

And the financial activity in the wood products segment was up a dramatic 800 percent from a year ago, when the company was suffering through a nine-week strike at 15 Northwest mills.

But Fery said the partial effect of higher prices and healthy demand for wood products was partially offset by increased delivered-log costs.

Rabbitt Twin Falls concert comes before 'Jersey Boy'

TWIN FALLS — Country stars often have a new record in pitch when they go out on tour. But Eddie Rabbitt's upcoming album, due in the College of Southern Idaho, will beat his next album release by several months.

That means fans who attend Rabbitt's concert Wednesday will likely hear sneak previews of some songs from Rabbitt's upcoming disc, as well as classic hits such as "Drivin' My Life Away," "I Love A Rainy Night" and "Every Which Way But Loose."

Rabbitt will be accompanied by his band, Hare Trigger, which includes Lee Garner, lead guitar; Don Barrett, bass guitar and vocals; Jimmy Hyde, drums; Pete Pinney, steel; rhythm and lead guitar; Gene Sisk, keyboards; and Bill Rehrig, fiddle.

While in Idaho, Rabbitt said he and his wife, Janine, will make a side trip to Pocatello to visit her sister, Denise, who is a teacher there.

Meanwhile, "Jersey Boy," Rabbitt's 15th album, is due in December or January. It will mark his debut on Universal Records, and although Universal is a new label, it isn't exactly an upstart outfit.

"Universal is part of MCA Records, so it really isn't that new a label. It was just another branch of an already-established record label," Rabbitt said in a telephone interview. Eddy Raven and the Gatlin Brothers are among other acts on Universal's roster.

Rabbitt speculated that MCA's large country roster and major successes with its acts were the primary reason for the founding of Universal.

"You can't have the first 10 records be all MCA records. . . . It would rattle nerves around the business," he said.

"They made me an offer I couldn't refuse, actually," said Rabbitt. Universal's president, Jimmy Bowen, is a good friend of Rabbitt's; so is the new label's head of artists and repertoire, James Stroud, who played drums on many of Rabbitt's

"In country music, you're dealing with albums that go anywhere from platinum down to gold, down to silver, down to . . . cardboard," he said, laughing. "You don't know where the album is going to sell."

"But creativity can make up for lack of capital. "We're hopefully getting known for making the uncommon video," said Rabbitt, whose video for his 1988 cover version of Dion's "The Wanderer" won Music Video of the Year Award from Music Row Magazine. "I don't like to do videos unless

'Peanuts' gang celebrates 40th

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Good grief! Charlie Brown is 40 years old!
"Yep, Charlie and the rest of the 'Peanuts' gang hit the big 4-0, a milestone that usually is a good deal of soul-searching in most folks."
"Just don't expect to see it mentioned in the award-winning strip."
"A comic strip should not make self-conscious statements," says Charles Schulz, 67, creator of the "Peanuts" characters who appear in more than 2,000 newspapers in 68 nations. "There will be nothing in the strip."
But that hardly means the milestone will pass unnoticed. An exhibition is slated for the Louvre in Paris, and half time at the Super Bowl next January will feature a birthday extravaganza.
"I'm temporarily" the story of Charlie, Snoopy, Lucy, Linus and friends can finally be told. The whole truth comes out in the shy cartoonist's biography, "Good Grief: The Story of Charles M. Schulz."
The book, by Rheta Grimsborough Johnson, is a first-time story. Phyllis Henri of Phoenix, a sister company of the Scripps Howard newspaper chain, Schulz draws for the United Press Syndicate, a Scripps Howard subsidiary.
"Publishers have wanted to do a biography of him for years, but he hasn't wanted to authorize one," she said.
"That made the difference this time." I liked her right away," Schulz said of Johnson, a columnist for the Memphis Commercial Appeal.
"Good thing, too. There's no approval or disapproval of my work going for Schulz who can tell the tale some day."
"When I retire that's the end of the strip," said Schulz. "It's in my contract." Also in his contract is the clause "I was mainly my children's idea," said Schulz, a father of five. "They didn't want anyone but dad drawing it."
It is a strip that's become a household name, and one that's brought Schulz international fame. He won the Reuben Award, comic arts highest honor, in 1955 and 1964. In 1978, he was named International Cartoonist of the Year, an award voted by 300 comic artists.

The CBS Special "A Charlie Brown Christmas" won a Peabody award in 1966.
Charlie Brown, the round-headed kid who seems to court bad luck, was inspired after a friend at an school and is Schulz's alter ego. Snoopy was inspired by a dog he had as a child. The other characters all have distinct personalities and eccentricities.
"Somehow the strip wouldn't be the same if Charlie hadn't kicked the football — or Lucy didn't yank

the way."
Schulz studied art when he was in high school, after he saw a "Do you like to draw?" ad.
"The truth is, I wasn't a very good student," he said.
His first professional job was doing lettering for drawings in Times Square. Topix, a Catholic comic book. He later taught at the Art Instruction School, and sold cartoons to the Saturday Evening Post.
His cartoon feature, "Li'l Folks," which ran in the Saturday Evening Post, was developed for St. Paul Pioneer Press in 1947. The strip was sold to a syndicate in 1950, and the name changed to "Peanuts."
"The artist... was someone who in 1947-48 was estimated by Forbes at \$62 million, is almost a natural resource in the wine country city of Santa Rosa, about 50 miles north of San Francisco."
He spends much of his time at his Redwood Empire Ice Arena, where he frequently plays hockey or sips coffee at the rink's Warm Puppy snack bar.
The actual drawing of the strip takes place in his office at 200 Snowy Place, a single-story, stone-and-redwood building. It's appropriate that the little beagle's mannequin get the nod for the office. It was the Snoopy and Red Baron episodes that really put the strip into orbit.
Snoopy, until then just another pish-pish, became a World War I flying ace in October 1945 and piloted the strip to its pinnacle.
"It worked beautifully, so beautifully that nothing's ever been duplicated," LeBlond recounts.
"Although the book contains stories about all the strip's characters,

the most interesting is about a character never shown — the "little red-haired girl" who is Charlie Brown's unrequited love.
"Peanuts" began syndication on Oct. 2, 1950. 38 days after Schulz's proposal of marriage was turned down in his native St. Paul, Minn., by Donna Mae Wood, the original red-haired girl.
"It's heartbreaking," said Schulz, who proposed five years after playing as a catcher in a half-track, and an infantryman during World War II. "It's something you never get over, but I think the only purpose in recounting the story was to show how experience prompts a cartoonist's adventures."
Johnson, whose book discloses that the artist suffers from depression, says Schulz's life contains many "reactions he translated to the strip."
"Rejection is his specialty. Losing his hobby, He has spent a lifetime perfecting failure," she said.
At first Johnson thought the artist was kidding, about Wood's turning him down. "He talked about it a great deal, but I said 'last year,'" she said in an interview.
"Along with depression, the artist also has bouts of agoraphobia, the fear of being alone in public places from which escape might be difficult."
"The sight of a career hobby," for example, puts Schulz in a sweat," says Johnson.
"Such fears and troubles are too bad," says one reviewer. "Yet there would not be Schulz." "Mania" got to the world without the sensitivity that so limits his personal life.

they're going to be really neat. It's going to be just another video I say skip it, forget it."
The video "On Second Thought" was shot in black and white, with a setting of a male betwee 1985 TV country show called "The Good, the Bad and the Ugly." Rabbitt explained.
"All my band had their hair cut and we started to dress in the '50s. They're wearing '50s clothes, all the instruments are from the '50s," he said.
But Rabbitt didn't get his hair cut. "That's the only thing about it that has my head, and that's back in '50s." The whole show is back in the '50s, and I'm this new guy who looks kind of weird for those days."
Rabbitt has a reputation as a tireless worker. Before releasing his own debut record, which came out in 1975, he penned hits for many other acts including Flipsy Daisy, who recorded "Kentucky Rain." Others who have scored hits with Rabbitt tunes include Reba McEntire.

sap, Willie Nelson, Tom Jones, D. Hawk and the Oak Ridge Boys.
For the past decade, however, recording and touring have taken time away from songwriting, and Rabbitt keeps most of his songs "for himself." My most recent priority to write 20 or 30 songs in a year, then pick out the 10 best for the album."
"But I don't have 10 best, they just don't cut it out of me."
Rabbitt has had his name for favorite songs from a career spanning more than two decades of songwriting and nearly 15 years of recording.
"I like everything I write. I wouldn't record it if I didn't like it, because I do for me. I like it more than most like kids. I hate to say even a favorite over another because it might get its feelings hurt."
Asked about the legendary six-week workdays he frequently began early in his career, Rabbitt laughed and said, "Twenty-four hour days, thirty-six hour days. Those were the real days."
"I still work real hard, in fact, I'm working more now than I did then."

he said. "To keep in shape to name every day. He's also known as an avid cyclist, and he watches what he eats, taking his own cache of natural foods — high-fiber cereals, cookies and water-pickled tuna are favorites and he'd go on them."
"The road will kill you if you just sit in buses and motel rooms all the time, waiting to go on," said Rabbitt, who plays about 150 to 120 days each year, often performing two shows a night. "You just turn into a dog, a road dog."

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fifteen years ago, an adolescent's spinning head terrified movie audiences throughout the world. The ghastly specter of possession chills and chilled its way through "The Exorcist." Well brace yourselves, horror movie fans. "The Exorcist: 1990" is on its way.

William Peter Blatty, who wrote the original from his novel of the same name, has written this third sequel, based on his 1983 novel, "Legion," and is directing. Although "Legion" does not concern possession, Blatty has added an exorcism to his script.

William Kinderman, the rump-led police detective who had a role in "The Exorcist," investigates a series of ritualistic murders in "The Exorcist: 1990."

Blatty shot on location this summer in the Georgetown University area, where he once went to school and where much of the original 1974 film was also made.

which released the first movie starring Linda Blair, Ellen Burstyn and Max Von Sydow, to do "Exorcist II: The Heretic." The sequel was written by William Goodhart and directed by John Boorman and was both a critical and commercial failure.

Blatty won an Academy Award for "The Exorcist," which also received six Oscar nominations including "best picture" and "director" (William Friedkin).
Locations for the new movie have included Holy Trinity Church and the original Georgetown General Hospital, which will again be a hospital in the movie, although it is now a dormitory for male and female Georgetown students.
Blatty says there will also be a scene on the long stairway where Father Damien Karras tumbled to his death in one of the most hair-

raising scenes of the original.
Members of the cast include George C. Scott and Viveca Lindfors, as well as Georgetown students making their debut as extras and former Surgeon General C. Everett Koop in a cameo appearance as himself.

"I think the sequel is playing a larger and larger role in American society," Koop told publicists for the film in a video interview. "I think there are some things about it that are hokey, but there is a very real satanic worshiping group of people in this country, and I have been involved in public health issues that deal with that three times in eight years."
"I think Shakespeare was right when he said that we don't know everything in earth and heaven. I'd say we only have a very small smattering of what's really yet to be known."

In the movie, Koop, who left office in July, has coffee with a priest in the Commons, a restaurant near the campus.

The bearded pediatrician said his literary agent called him and said the filmmakers were "looking for some-

one recognizable because they wanted to authenticate a shot to make people feel that as extras and former Surgeon General C. Everett Koop in a cameo appearance as himself.

The shooting came during the break between spring and summer terms, so disruption on the university campus was held to a minimum, said Betsy Wittleder of the school's public information office.
On one recent afternoon, Blatty, wearing jeans, sneakers and a Georgetown baseball cap, filmed a scene in which Lindfors, in a nurse's uniform, walks down the front steps of the hospital with a storm, carrying a bag in her hand.

"We want it to be an extraordinarily good film, and we want to scare the pants off the audience," he said.
Blatty thought the details of "Exorcist II" put a stigma on the current project. "But if the film is good; if (the stigma) will vanish overnight," he said.

The original "Exorcist" also received its share of brickbats from critics.

Michael Billington of the Illustrated London News said, "It exploits the subject of diabolic possession without telling you anything about

it." Stanley Kauffmann, said, "The Exorcist" makes no sense," although he conceded that "if you want to be shaken, it will scare the hell out of you."

Despite the mixed reviews, the film grossed a reported \$160 million worldwide, a record at the time.

The film told the story of a girl, played in both 1974 and 1977 by Linda Blair, who is possessed by the devil and causes several violent deaths. Blair, whose career plunged after the "Exorcist" movies, is not in the "third" film—besides Scott and Lindfors, the cast also includes Ed Flanders ("St. Elsewhere") and Sylvia Sidney.

"The story that I had constructed just didn't have any place for her," Blatty said. "Rather than taking a character I had to use and then trying to build a story around her, I thought the faithful thing to do was to create a great story and see who fits into it. Linda did not, unfortunately."

Blatty said the sequel will begin where "The Exorcist" ended and will follow the story of "Legion" except for "a totally different ending." The story involves a friendship be-

tween a police lieutenant, played by Scott, and a priest, played by Flanders.

"There will be one, I hope, breathtaking moment at the end of the film, an effect that has never been seen before," the director said. "I hope we can do it."

But the film will not emphasize the spectacular special effects that helped make "The Exorcist" such a hit.

"This one does not rely upon spinning heads for shock," he said. "The terror is in the shadows in the mind."

"There is almost no act of violence," said Scott. "I think it goes to a different level than your normal spooky picture."

But don't worry. It's going to be scary anyway, said Blatty. "It's pure entertainment that uses theology only as it contributes to the excitement."

"I have independently counted 30 shocks, or little jumps out of the seat, some much higher than others."

CD reissue of rare 'Astaire Story' is bright-sounding, spirited

Fans would beg, borrow, steal to get their hands on "The Astaire Story," the superb 1952 Verve release featuring Fred Astaire's singing and ad lib tap dancing backed by pianist Oscar Peterson and an all-star jazz combo.

Through the '50s and '60s the limited printings of "The Astaire Story" became collectors' items.

Everybody knew about the celebrated album, but only a fortunate few actually got to savor it as a personal possession. And the most cruel among these select sadist-possessors flaunted their vinyl treasure in front of covetous friends. Few, if any, were foolish enough to lend it to anyone, even to close relatives.

Astaire in his 1959 autobiography, "Steps in Time," noted that condensed versions of the original set were later released, including "Mr. Top Hat" and "Easy To Be True." More recently, a boxed set of three LPs was released in 1978.

And now, at long last, in this age of the CD, PolyGram Verve has reissued "The Astaire Story" in a clean, bright-sounding double CD package that contains 34 vocal and four instrumental, including three with tap dancing solos.

It is still gorgeous sounding and every bit as fresh as the imperishable Astaire-Ginger Rogers flicks. At the same time, Columbia Records has doubled Astaire fans' pleasure by reissuing another long-out-of-print reminder of his status as a great jazz-inspired pop singer with "Starring—Fred Astaire (A Columbia Years Series Release)." This delightful compilation consists of 36 selections recorded from 1936 to 1940 on a double CD vinyl and

cassette, unlike "The Astaire Story," which is available only on CD.

Astaire, who died at 88 in 1987, was such a brilliant dancer that his skills as a first-rate jazz singer were overshadowed.

As a dancer, he was unlimited. Anything was possible. As a singer, he was severely limited technically. His voice was a small, sometimes uncertain instrument, short on range and volume.

Nonetheless, his light, graceful delivery—impeccable enunciation, fluent phrasing and knack for rhythmic "exotic sophistication" and swing.

As a singer, he was most influenced by Bing Crosby. Not the luddite-daddy Crosby of later years, but the young, jazz-binge of the early 1930s—the Bing influenced by Louis Armstrong. Armstrong, was the fountainhead, the Pops and patriarch for jazz and pop singers from the late 1920s on.

Astaire brought his unique rhythmic sense to bear on the lyric and melody.

His voice was as wonderfully plain and "American-sounding" as Hoagy Carmichael's or Johnny Mercer's. He could also put on the ritz and sound as debonair as such proper Anglos as Noel Coward or George Shearing.

Astaire made the lyrics and melody come alive dramatically. Yet his very minimalist embellishments never strayed too far from the composer's and lyricists' original intent.

Irving Berlin once said, "You give Astaire a song, and you could forget about it. He sang it the way you wrote it."

Tapping out the words with casual, almost conversational grace, he pulls you into the song's story line. He knows how to stretch or contract

recordings just before filming "The Bandwagon."

He sings dozens of great standards, including "Isn't This a Lovely Day," "Nice Work If You Can Get It," "Night and Day" and "Dancing in the Dark," and improvises tap dances that play off drums and bass.

As writer Leslie Gourse says in her history of jazz singers, "Louis' Children: American Jazz Singers," Astaire's chic style "made jazz singing seem as respectable as light opera in a country that still regarded other jazz musicians as folk artists."

Astaire's supporting players are enormously inspired by this consummate jazz stylist. Obviously they accepted him as a bona fide jazz singer. Much of their accompaniment is quite extraordinary.

Peterson plays pearly, single-note lines that have the snap of a Nat "King" Cole piano solo. Tenor saxophonist Fip Phillips, in some of the most beautiful moments of his long, distinguished career, plays passionate, lyrical solos.

Clarke Shavers, a fine trumpeter whose rightful place in jazz history got lost in the shuffle somewhere between the preeminence of Roy Eldridge and the dominance of Dizzy Gillespie, is marvelous. And guitarist Barney Kessel, bassist Ray Brown and drummer Alvin Stoller are perfect accompanists for Astaire's svelte vocals and fine foils for his jazzy ad lib dances. His crackling tap solos swing like drum breaks by Count Basie's percussion master, Jo Jones.

The warm rapport between Astaire and these jazz at the Philharmonic all-stars lifts the session to those rare, joyous heights achieved in Billie Holiday's celebrated Columbia recordings with Teddy Wilson, combos in the 1930s.

The Brunswick reissue consists almost entirely of songs from Astaire films, including 30 from six RKO Radio Movies, ranging from "Top Hat" in 1935 to "Carefree" in 1938.

In contrast to the small group settings of the Verve recordings, Astaire is accompanied by five dance bands. The jazziest are two selections with the Benny Goodman Orchestra in 1940.

The other bands are staid society orchestras, much like what one might have heard in the fanciest hotels and posh clubs of the period.

The jazziest of these is led by Ray Noble, the dapper British band leader, songwriter and composer.

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All the orchestrations are interesting, even if they sound quaint to the modern ear. Some of the best arrangements are by Johnny Green, a band leader whose flashy piano style is an amusing complement to Astaire's vocals and dancing feet.

Astaire always minimized his talent as a singer. But these invaluable reissues attest to his proper place in the pantheon of American jazz and pop singers.

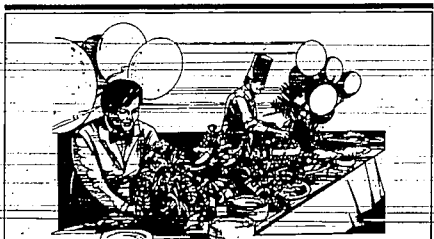

New Annie chosen

NEW YORK (AP) — The sun has come out "Tomorrow" for an 11-year-old Missouri girl; who was chosen to play the world's most famous orphan in "Annie 2," a \$7 million musical opening on Broadway in March.

Danielle Findlay of Lee's Summit, Mo., will have a new mongrel as her faithful companion in the sequel to the smash Broadway musical "Annie," which arrived in New York in April 1977 and ran 2,377 performances.

Nearly 400 girls were auditioned for the lead role in New York, Washington and Los Angeles before Danielle was chosen.

The lead character's dog, Sandy, is being replaced by a mixed-breed named Beau, who was adopted at a tender age by trainer Bill Berloni. Berloni trained the original Sandy, who is now 16 or 17 "and quite arthritic," said David Powers, the show's press agent.

The new show, subtitled "Miss Hannigan's Revenge," takes place six weeks after the original musical, which ended with the imprisonment of Miss Hannigan, a villainous matron who ran an orphanage, and the adoption of Annie by the wealthy Daddy Warbucks.

It's based on the famous Harold Gray comic strip.

Dorothy Loudon will again play Miss Hannigan, a role which won her a Tony Award in 1977. Harve Presnell will portray Daddy Warbucks.

Most of the original production team will return for "Annie 2," including lyricist Martin Charnin and composer Charles Strouse, who wrote the score. Charnin also will direct.

The new production goes into rehearsal next month and begins an out-of-town tryout Dec. 22 at Washington's Kennedy Center. It opens March 1 at the Marquis Theatre in New York after several weeks of previews.

Champion fiddler to play in hometown Wendell

WENDELL National fiddling champion Joe Sites has played more often with stars in Nashville than he has in his home town of Wendell.

Both tomorrow, he and two other national champions will put on a rare local performance.

Don't expect to hear the Old Time Fiddlers' style of playing, Sites says. Saturday's show will have concerted arrangements performed on 250-year-old Italian violins, accompanied with big black Gibson guitars.

"It's not what they're accustomed to around here," he says. "It's a completely different style of music. It's precision fiddling. It's a lot more intricate."

Sites, Tim Hodgson of Pocatello and Rick Youngblood of Newport, have performed together for several years. Each has won the title of National Champion at the annual competition in Nashville, Tenn., but none of them are professional musicians.

In 1974, Sites placed second in the state of Idaho. The next year, he entered national competition and placed down the line at 32nd.

"Talk about an eye-opener," he says. "I found out I didn't know much."

After practicing hard for a year, Sites returned for the 1976 contest and placed 31st.

Full of drive to get better, the aspiring fiddler headed for contests in Texas, where he taught some fiddle

experts, age 60 to 70 years old. Major Franklin, Benny Thompson and Dick Barrett were considered to be the best, and Sites says he felt like a puppy dog that was lucky to spend time with these masters.

"I didn't join them, I just kind of hung around and stayed out of their way," he recalls. "I kept my mouth shut and kept my fiddle put away and listened. It was different. It's not like taking piano lessons."

On his own, Sites worked hard to catch the style of the talented Texans and eventually they admitted him into their playing circle.

At the 1977 national contest, Sites placed 12th. In the following years, he placed steadily higher and finally captured first place in 1987 and again in 1988.

Meanwhile, the Wendell man

traveled from coast to coast, entering 30 to 40 fiddling contests every year and playing with an impressive list of country music stars. He performed at the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville, and in Idaho he won the state championship four years in a row.

This year in Tennessee, in a contest with a wide field of aggressive young professional musicians, the Idaho amateur placed second in the nation.

Sites says he is not a professional musician because traveling is "a pain" and the income-eater all expenses are paid—really not very much.

"I did it for awhile," he says, referring to his "road-band" days. "It's fun, but then once you get married and have kids, it's a different story. Fiddling competition has changed quite a lot in the last few years, says Sites, who now attends only one or two contests annually.

"There's a lot of politics involved now," he says. "It's taken the fun out."

On stage, Sites says he strives to maintain the integrity of the masters who taught him. "I don't dance," he says. "I'm not an entertainer. I'm a fiddle player."

Hodgson is a winning fiddler who specializes in show tunes. Now a student at Idaho State University, he has performed with Sites for 12 years.

Youngblood, the 1983 national fiddling champion, is a banking professional who still takes time out to share the stage with old friends. His

father, Dwayne Youngblood, also is a national fiddling champion. About nine years ago, Sites visited his friend Gary Loranger, a professional guitarist who lives in Hagerman. Loranger, who formerly owned a music store in California, was impressed with Sites' musical skill and dedication, so he gave the fiddler a very old violin, a special instrument Loranger had traded for 30 years earlier.

Describing this early European violin, Loranger says, "It has a lot of power, but it's very, very sweet. The lower notes almost have a cello sound. It's not a very attractive violin, but it sounds great."

"Sites says the dark old fiddle has a honky-tonk sound and is moody, just like a person. "It's funny," he says. "It can communicate with you. It's like a dog. You can tell if it likes you."

Hodgson and Youngblood also play very old violins. Hodgson's Carlo Bergonzi instrument was crafted in central Italy nearly 300 years ago.

As the three musicians play single and twin fiddles, they take turns strumming back-up on prized vintage guitars.

"That old Gibson sounds like a big old marching band," Sites says. With the Italian violins, "it's a match made in heaven."

The Wendell Community Arts Council has sponsored several musical plays and talent shows. Proceeds of Saturday's show will help buy additional sound and lighting equipment for the Wendell theater.

Clarence Clemons prefers to be known as Mr. C

NEW YORK (AP) — The King of the World, The Master of Disaster, The Big Man. After more than 20 years in rock 'n' roll and almost as many nicknames... Clarence Clemons prefers the simple tag, Mr. C.

"All these names, it's a heavy cross to bear," said Clemons, the smugly supporting star of Bruce Springsteen's E Street Band. "I think about all that stuff, but Mr. C has evolved and he's the guy who combines all these things."

Size, power and all-night parties are part of Mr. C. Personality counts, too. As Clemons says, it takes someone special to play the saxophone.

"You got to have an urban attitude. He's a streetwise person," he said. "I don't know whether the saxophone made me this kind of person or if I was just born to play a saxophone. It's an extension of yourself."

"Nobody played instruments in my family. My father got that idea and said he wants his son to play saxophone. I wanted an electric train for Christmas, but he got me a saxophone. I flipped out."

Clemons prides himself on being a survivor, staying on scene even when music involved far more than the simple joy of playing the sax. On tour now with Ringo Starr and a band that includes Joe Walsh, Levon Helm and Rick Danko, Clemons is getting those old feelings back.

"Every night when Levon Helm breaks into 'The Weight,' I catch myself," Clemons said of the Band's drummer. "When Rick Danko goes

into his bass, I have flashbacks to when I was young and wild and didn't understand a thing."

"You need to go back a little bit and remember how it was and how screwed up it got. It was a wonderful time. This whole tour is bringing back this stuff."

Clemons also reaches back on his third solo album, "A Night With Mr. C," which recalls a few other nicknames — such as King, as in King Curtis, whose sweet saxophone was featured on hit by the Cowbirds Sam Cooke, Aretha Franklin and many others. Clemons covers Cooke's party classic "Twistin' the Night Away."

"King Curtis is my mentor," Clemons said. "I try to pattern myself after his style. He made a live record that's one of my favorites, 'Memphis Soul Stew' and 'Soul Serenade' are two songs that made me understand the kind of music I liked."

Junior Walker, Motown's hottest sax player of the 60s is acknowledged with Clemons' version of

"Shogun." Clemons also sings "Quarter to Three," a hit for Gary "Big Boy" Bonds, and does a duet with pop star Kim Carnes, on his own "Dance, Dance, Dance."

"Singing's one of the hardest things," Clemons said. "It was terrible, the first few times. I was so depressed I went into the house and didn't come out for six months. That still lingers in the back of my mind. I sang in the church choir and was a great singer. I felt comfortable singing."

On stage, Springsteen loves to remember the time he and E Street guitarist Steve Van Zandt were on the boardwalk outside a New Jersey club at four in the morning. Through wind and pouring rain, a large man appeared, dressed in white, carrying a saxophone.

That, Clemons agrees, is how he and "The Boss" first met, back in the early '70s — the short, skinny guitarist and his towering sideman. Like Springsteen, Clemons has some stories to tell. There was the time the E Street Band appeared on the same

bill as rock 'n' roll pioneers Chuck Berry and Jerry Lee Lewis.

"It was at the University of Maryland and we were Chuck Berry's band," Clemons recalled. "Ten minutes before the show, no Chuck Berry. Five minutes later he walks in with his guitar, complains about something, and sends it back. He comes back and we walk on stage."

The bass player (Gary Tallent) walks over to him and says, "Hey, Chuck what are we going to play? Chuck says, 'and says, 'I think we're going to play some Chuck Berry music.' We played the whole set with no rehearsal, no nothing. He never told you the next song."

The rest quickly became history. By 1975, critic Jon Landau had dubbed Springsteen "the 'future of rock 'n' roll," leading to simultaneous covers on Time and Newsweek, "Born to Run," featuring Clemons blistering solo, was an instant rock anthem, even gathering support as the official song of Springsteen's native New Jersey.

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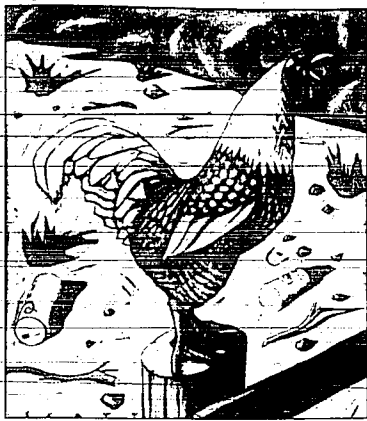
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Julie Scott's 'Fly By Night'

TWIN FALLS — Four more Idaho artists will be in the spotlight as the Herrett Museum opens the second in its series of Centennial exhibitions.

"Centennial Edition II: Aihart/Scott/Sher/Shurtlett" concentrates on sculpture and painting that explores figurative motifs, both human and animal. The exhibit will open Tuesday with a reception from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. The public is invited, and refreshments will be served.

David Aihart, born in Hamilton, Mont., holds a bachelor's degree from Boise State University and is a member of the Art Attack Gallery in Boise. His work is figurative and often involves self-portraits.

"My theme is people," Aihart has said. "People are the most complex and varied subject matter available to an artist. There are extreme differences in appearance, psychology, roles and the situations—of individual lives."

Julie Scott of Ketchum is a graduate of Tufts University, an affiliate of the School of the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston. Her paintings depict her view of the West, combining human and animal motifs in a way that is often humorous.

Using bright, psychedelic colors and bold patterns, Scott's paintings are narrative in nature and often suggest environmental concerns.

Cathy Sher of Lava Hot

Springs was born in Chicago Heights, Ill., and has degrees from Illinois State and Idaho State universities. She now has a home and studio in Lava Hot Springs and is the ceramics director of mural design for Suenaga Masonry in Pocatello.

She creates complex and delicate ceramic sculptures that depict animals, vegetables and landscape forms in unusual combinations. She is best known for her flamingos and potatoes, which she uses together in mythological and historical arrangements.

Cheryl Shurtlett of Boise was born in Ontario, Ore., and earned degrees from Boise State University and the University of Oregon. She is currently an associate professor of art at BSU.

"The subjects of my drawings and paintings are drawn from personal experiences and childhood memories," she says. "Each work therefore has a specific personal meaning for me that is as difficult to put into words as it is ridiculous to try."

Shurtlett has exhibited widely, and one of her works was chosen for the catalog cover of "Sawtooths and Other Ranges—of Imagination—Contemporary Art from Idaho," an exhibition organized by the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C.

"Centennial Edition II" will run through Nov. 22. The Herrett is open from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesday, 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Wednesday through Friday, and 1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday.

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Rolling Stones should gross \$90 million

NEW YORK — When the Rolling Stones pulled into Shea Stadium Tuesday night for the first of six sold-out shows, underneath the sound of music was the clink of coins, the ruffling of cash. Lots of it.

The Stones are expected to earn an estimated \$90 million from the 29-city North American "Steel Wheels" tour, which Tom Duffy, talent editor at Billboard magazine, said will be the top-grossing tour by a major rock group — raking in more than Michael Jackson or Bruce Springsteen.

That's because the aging rockers will profit not only from ticket and merchandise sales, but also from an innovative slew of promotional gimmicks, including department store tie-ins and "900" number telephone promotions.

"The Rolling Stones name was once synonymous with drugs and decadent excess. But today it means money," Forbes magazine said in a recent cover story on the self-proclaimed World's Greatest Rock-and-Roll Band.

New York City stands to collect an estimated \$2.6 million for hosting the tour and an additional \$2 million in fees for police, security, electricity and other expenses.

Shea Stadium is owned by the Department of Parks, and Joanne C. Inoué, assistant parks commissioner, says the department's take in rent-and-parking fees will be about \$1 million, which is "25 percent more than we've ever made for a

concert." The city also will bring in \$1.3 million from sales taxes on ticket sales for the six shows, and about \$322,000 in sales taxes on merchandise such as T-shirts, posters, buttons and headbands.

"We figure the average concertgoer spends about \$10 each on merchandise," Duffy said. "That means \$30 million for the tour. But that may be low because in some cities, people spend a lot more."

At Shea Stadium, the math works out as follows: a sellout crowd is 65,000 seats. Six dates (Tuesday

night, Wednesday night, Oct. 25, 26, 28 and 29) equal 390,000 fans. At an average of \$10 per head, that's \$3.9 million in merchandise sales.

But if the Stones experience in Philadelphia last month is any indication, the \$10 average is low. In the tour's first night at 55,000-seat Veterans Stadium, more than \$1.5 million worth of merchandise was sold — a record for that venue.

In addition to the \$70 million Toronto-based promoter Michael Kohl guaranteed the Stones would make from ticket and merchandise sales for the tour, the band has con-

tracted its own package of lucrative deals. Anheuser-Busch paid more than \$6 million to make Budweiser the official U.S. tour beer, according to Forbes.

And in addition to the stadium-sold merchandise, the Stones and Brockum Group, the merchandise arm of Kohl's company, are selling an extended line of "Rockwear" to fans via major retailers such as Penney's, Jordan Marsh and Macy's. The clothing line includes everything from \$5 bandanas to more pricey sweaters, jeans and bomber jackets for \$450.

In addition, Budweiser, The Stones and AT&T are splitting the \$1 per call they get from a "900" number callers must dial to enter a contest for a "private concert" with Mick, Keith & Co., Duffy said.

Sales of the new "Steel Wheels" album are also lucrative. Assuming a probable royalty of \$1.25 per disk, and sales of 3 million records, that's a take of more than \$5 million this year, estimates Forbes. Add to that another estimated \$2 million the group gets per year in royalties from their list of old albums.

Of course, the group does have some overhead. From the gross should be deducted costs such as travel, promoter Kohl's take, agents' and managers' fees, staging and lighting as well as salaries paid to technicians, road crews and stage hands. Forbes estimates that the band will actually wind up with \$43 million before taxes.

'Innocent Man' mixes conventions, realism, viciousness

The following are capsule reviews of movies now showing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

AN INNOCENT MAN (R). This cautionary thriller by director Peter Yates, with Tom Selleck as an airline mechanic framed and imprisoned by two gonzo cops, has a chance to be a canny blend of gutsy melodrama and "accuse" against the prison system. But, by the end, it's gone as sick and corrupt as the crafty old con F. Murray Abraham plays, promiscuously mixing up the

genre conventions and the gamy jail-yard realism into a startlingly vicious and even somewhat racist brew. Morally, this movie is guilty as hell.
THE ABYSS (PG-13). It's perfectly possible to have a mindlessly pleasant time in this intense Tidy-Bowl blueness. You just relax and let go. You may just wonder when you come out if you haven't pruned a little. Writer-director James Cameron's vision (carried with him not surprisingly since he was 17) is complete with men who say

"Steady, big fella..." to each other without a trace of irony. Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio and ice-blue-eyed Ed Harris do manage to bring fire to all this damp tinder, but it can't have been easy.
BATMAN (PG-13). When millionaire Bruce Wayne puts on his Batsuit, his Bataunetics and his world heavyweight's Babeli, almost nothing is left of him but glittering blue-gray eyes and a volitionally full mouth. If a costume alone could stop crime, this one would, because it almost stops Michael Keaton. In the opposite corner, wearing purple skin, clown white, green hair and a permanent rictus, is Jack Nicholson

as the Joker. It is his energy that keeps the picture alive; it is certainly not the special effects, the editing, which has no discernible rhythm, or the flaccid screenplay.
BLACK RAIN (R). Director Ridley Scott gives this simple, simple-minded fish-out-of-water thriller with Michael Douglas as a macho, motorcycle-cop set loose in Japan with some leftover plot from "The Untouchables" — so much style and dazzle, the movie becomes a triumph of matter over mind. It's like film noir cubed: Osaka and Tokyo are converted into a futuristic, fantasy city on the "Blade Runner" level, none blaring through a wilderness of

rainy streets and towering angular architecture, where bad yakuzas and good cops (Ken Takakura) duel in the webbing. The movie is a blast of pure sensation: stallion but scintillating.
PARENTHOOD (PG-13). Those with "impossible" neon-haired teenagers, whose every sentence is punctuated by a slammed door, might swear that "Parenthood" was their group portrait. And adult children of alcoholics might claim the movie as their own after watching the emotional fallout from Jason Robards' boozey, indifferent attempts at fathering, four decades later. Director Ron Howard, who also created the film's original story with Lowell Ganz and Babaloo Mandel ("Splash," "Night Shift"), uses these bitter-sweet elements like smelling salts, to bring us around after the laughing gas effect of the jokes. Robards and a vastly put-upon Eileen Ryan are parents of two sons: Steve Martin and young black sheep Tom Hulle, as well as two daughters: Dianne Wiest, whose husband has left her, and lovely newcomer Harley Kozak, whose husband (Rick Moranis) alas, has not.

SEA OF LOVE (R). A slick, knowing genre film made fresh and diverting by a sense of humor and the bright presence of Al Pacino, Eileen Barkin and John Goodman. Barkin deftly handles the pivotal role as a stunning Manhattan businesswoman who may also be a serial killer whom Pacino's veteran cop is pursuing. Goodman is Pacino's witty partner. Satisfying as long as you don't ask more of it than simple escape.
WHEN HARRY MET SALLY (R). Continually witty dialogue is not exactly a staple of summer movies, but Rob Reiner's newest from Nora Ephron's screenplay bristles with it as hoosy Billy Crystal and sunny Meg Ryan meet, attract, then worry a lot whether lovers can be friends, and the reverse. Lovely ensemble work with Carrie Fisher and Bruno Kirby are just right as a couple the audience is pushing together. Yes, with its Manhattan setting and carefully crafted interludes interlarding the action, it has an aura of Woody Allen, but with characters and dialogue this tonic, is that necessarily bad?

'Talking' adds talking baby to old idea

Remember the "Bachelor Mother" kind of movie in which Ginger Rogers seeks a husband so her baby will have a father?

"Look Who's Talking" is a 1989 replay with all the old gimmicks intact ("I don't like to fly," she insists. Next scene, she's flying in his plane). The only innovation in the baby talks. Not only that, the voice is that of Bruce Willis. The title, get it?

It's a pleasant sitcom with amiable performances, especially by the four infants who play Mikey. The scenes under the titles will no doubt arouse controversy. A large round object floats amid turbulence, undulating at the bottom of a pit. A flock of flittering, chattering plovers enters the space, and one of them joyfully discovers the round object and climbs inside. A new kind of sex education throughout the film, the voice of Willis makes comments, enjoying his nine-month swim, complaining about his abrupt emergence, conversing with other infants and generally observing the human comedy. The one-liners wear thin, but some of it is funny stuff.

Mikey's mother is Kirstie Alley, a thirty-something accountant who has been impregnated by her client, a lecherous, charmless fast-food entrepreneur (George Segal). When she goes into labor, she calls a New York cab driver by John Travolta,

who races her to the hospital, then dons a mask and gown and witnesses the delivery.

As you can guess, he falls for Kirstie and her baby, but she considers him a loser. He becomes the siter while she prowls for prospective fathers, not realizing that Travolta is really a struggling flight instructor. To illustrate his compassion; there is a subplot about his concern for his senile grandfather (Abc Vigoda).

Any Heckerling ("Fast Times at Ridgemont High") directed her own script, a loose affair that allows the actors to ad lib aimlessly. The veracity of the film was not helped by filming it in Canada. The producers saved money, but there's no way that Vancouver can double for Manhattan.

Kirstie Alley manages an endearing portrait of the beleaguered mother; she's as appealing on the big screen as she is in "Cheers." Travolta is so laid back that he seems invisible at times, but it's good to see him back. Olympia Dukakis has some bright moments as the wry, wrying grandmother.

"Look Who's Talking" is a TriStar release produced by Jonathan D. Krane. The rating is PG-13, mostly for adult situations. Running time: 103 minutes.

"Sea of Love," with Al Pacino as an undercover cop who falls for serial-murder suspect Ellen Barkin, was third with \$5.8 million.

In fourth place was "Parenthood" with \$3 million, followed by "Uncle Buck" with \$2.8 million, "Sea of Love," "Parenthood" and "Uncle Buck" are all from Universal Studios.

TV faces Proper burning of flag seems to be disrespectful

sponsor scrutiny

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Networks began the new TV season with a new fact of life: increased sponsor scrutiny of the shows on which their ads appear.

The heads of the networks insist there will be no censorship by advertisers or pressure groups, but they also say they're looking more closely at shows of questionable taste. The question is whose "taste" will prevail?

NBC Entertainment President Brandon Tartikoff, whose network moved earlier in the season to ban controversial TV movie about abortion, "Roe vs. Wade," without sponsorship. If it came to that, said he was concerned about a possible trend toward programming-by-buyer-cott location.

"What you become concerned about is sort of a new McCarthyism," he said. "What I was fearful of is, today 'The Sex Tapes,' tomorrow 'Dear John.'"

Last season, sponsors balked at so-called "trash TV" fare, but also at "Roe vs. Wade," because of the subject and the critically praised miniseries "Lonesome Dove," because of its authentically raunchy Western dialogue.

But the network bosses said advertisers, from whom the networks draw their revenues, have the right to withhold sponsorship of shows to which they object and in fact have always shied away from certain programs.

"We get advertiser pullout all the time," said CBS Entertainment President Kim LeMasters. "That is a normal landscape for network executives." Some advertisers, he said, will not advertise in any show that has water in it, or it has certain cars in it that are offensive to them.

Advertiser boycotts don't become tantamount to censorship. LeMasters said unless the network bows to the pressure. Of controversial shows, he said, "That is our ultimate message."

CBS Broadcast Group President Howard Stringer sees advertiser sensitivity as part of a larger viewer "revolt" against sexually explicit or violent fare.

"The message to the creative community is again that taste, albeit difficult to define, still revolves around quality, and that the audience is smarter at that than you tend to think," he said.

"We can defend ourselves when we put something on the air that's really worth defending. And some of the sitcoms in which (sex) is a one-track theme, alienate the viewers."

NBC President and Chief Executive Officer Robert C. Wright, a former GE executive, said advertisers are simply responding to consumer desires and don't have any sinister intent to censor what's on the airwaves.

"They scare off real easy when it comes to having their company's name associated with something, even though it might not have any real impact. What I have been trying to do is get them to focus in on that and say, listen, investigate the real facts. Try to make a more informed opinion."

The networks believe that allowing advertisers to pre-screen shows will help educate them. But at a meeting of television executives this summer, concern was voiced that pre-screening would be an even bigger step toward censorship.

No, say the network executives. Advertisers will complete shows and they will go on the air regardless of their reaction. They hope pre-screening will let advertisers make an informed decision and counteract any biased information from special-interest groups.

"Overall, I think they (advertisers) have pretty strong feelings on their own, and they don't need any help from the outside," said ABC President John Sins. "When they do make a decision, obviously, it's in the interest of third parties who want this to make it appear that that pressure has been primarily responsible for it."

At the critics meeting, Terry Rakolta, the Michigan housewife, who organized a boycott of the hit Fox comedy "Married... With Children," had backed off some of her earlier criticisms and now advocates policing the airwaves only during "family" viewing hours.

"What we're saying is self-regulate," she said. "You know the boundaries. We're not in the line-drawing business. You draw the line."

The networks apparently plan to do that. Tartikoff told the critics, "I do think there were some instances, as I'm sure, having read a lot of your individual columns, you felt, too, that there was some line-crossing and some shows that were ill-advised to have been broadcast in the form that they were, and we've recognized that."

Stringer said the bottom line is, as always, viewer discretion.

"The Prize Pulitzer" portrays the seduction by excesses of the rich

Roxanne Dixon was a young woman of 22 in 1974. Herbert Pulitzer was a 43-year-old millionaire and grandson of a newspaper magnate. The two fell in love, married and had twin sons. Everything seemed perfect, but, after the birth of their children, Herbert became increasingly possessive and jealous, and Roxanne was seduced by the excesses of the very rich in Palm Beach.

"In the story, we meet Roxanne right before she meets Herbert," says Perry King, who stars as Herbert Pulitzer in "Roxanne: The Prize Pulitzer," airing Monday, Oct. 16, on NBC. "In Herbert, Roxanne met the most wonderful man in the world. He was older, which was something that seemed right for her. He was a good, hard-headed businessman, a man of great wealth and strength, and, according to her, the most beautiful man that she had ever met. She loved him and he loved her. Everything seemed perfect to her."

"Roxanne: The Prize Pulitzer," based on Roxanne Pulitzer's best-selling book about her marriage, tells how what began as a fairytale romance turned into a national scandal when the marriage ended in divorce and a bitter custody battle for their sons. Chynna Phillips also stars as Roxanne Pulitzer.

"(Director) Richard Colla took a

very different approach," says King. "He never wanted to see me act, so he insisted that both Chynna and I play the central truth for each moment and not give the performance. I did it and I'm glad I did, because it was a very exciting process. Richard wanted to make a love story about two very real people who loved each other, which is also like what Roxanne Pulitzer wrote about in her book. Two very real people truly in love, but who couldn't make it work."

The Pulitzers were not well-known outside Palm Beach during their marriage, yet their divorce trial garnered scores of national headlines.

"I think it was a story that fascinated people because it is important," says King. "If it hasn't happened to you, then you know someone who it has happened to. Two people who loved each other very much but couldn't get along. Years ago that didn't seem to happen. But nowadays we need each other, but we can't seem to get along. It's a problem that no one much deals with. That's what happens in 'The Prize Pulitzer,' and it's a much better story for that. As Richard called it, 'It's Cinderella after the ball.' And after the line 'And

they lived happily ever after,' what happened?"

The real Roxanne, King assures us, is not the woman she appeared to be in the newspaper headlines. "I got to know the real Roxanne Pulitzer, because she helped us with the film," says King. "Everybody in the film really loved her. She really tried very, very hard in her book to be objective. She said the main reason she wrote the book more than anything else is for her sons. She knew they would come that they would read that book, and she wanted it to be what she meant to say to them more than anything else."

"She wanted her shot. She wanted to say her side. And just as objectively as she could, she presented it from her point of view. She seemed willing to say 'Well, this thing happened and that's what I thought. That's what I did. Everything's in the book.'"

The budget was tight, it was explained, but Brando liked the movie and his role. The flick was made, with Marlon sacrificing his salary up front; he worked gratis on the film. If "Season" makes money at the box office, Marlon will eventually get a cut.

Q: What's the word on the breakup of Ed McMahon's marriage? Is it for good? —H.V.

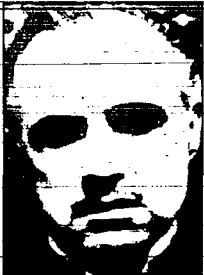

Koslow's child won't grow up on TV

In Hollywood the child-actor question never goes away. Is it good for the child, or is he robbed of those precious days of youth?

Lauren Koslow, who plays Margo, assistant to fashion-king Eric Forrester on "The Bold and the Beautiful," thinks it's a bad idea. Yet Lauren's baby son Zachery plays Margo's baby son Mark on the soap. Zach's grandparents on the East Coast approve because they can see Zach on the screen, but Zach's father, Nick Schillace, wants the baby at home.

It all began when Lauren became pregnant. The show's writers followed Margo's pregnancy on the air and the birth of Mark, fathered by fashion-designer Clarke.

When Lauren returned to work a mere two weeks after bringing Zach into the world, the actress was asked if she would allow her baby son to play Mark on camera. Lauren declined and worked with a set of twins on camera, which is customary.

After eight months, Lauren brought Zach to work so he would always be nearby. Flourishing under the attention, Zach seemed very much at ease with the company, so Mom agreed to playing Mom on camera for a while.

Zach's mother hovers closely. "Zach is so much fun. He's so happy discovering things. I don't want to miss a moment. But as soon as he is aware, I will stop the on-camera work. By the time Zach is 3 he will be far from a TV stage."

Lauren feels uneasy watching child actors perform with mothers hovering off camera. Darryl Hickman, her drama coach, has spoken of his childhood acting days, and Lauren is convinced center stage is not the place to grow up.

"We've heard all the horror stories going back to Jackie Coogan," Lauren notes. "I've never seen an actor who wasn't wounded in some way by working as a child. Neither has Darryl."

Meanwhile, on camera the Margo-Bill Spencer-Clarke triangle grows tighter. In the beginning Margo was

NBC continues lead in Niensens race

LOS ANGELES (AP) — NBC carried the American and National League permanent playoffs, which struck out much of its usual lineup, but it still managed to hold onto first place in the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings released Tuesday.

"The Cosby Show" went to bat for NBC, but in the absence of "A Different World," "Cheers," "The Golden Girls" and others; ABC pulled to within 8 of a point.

ABC had seven of the Top 10 shows, including "Roseanne" with a No. 1 rating and the highest numbers in the show's history. CBS' "Murder She Wrote" took 10th place.

ABC's jubilation may be short-lived. It has the contract to carry the World Series games, a "Bays-bull" match between the Oakland Athletics and San Francisco Giants.

The last such regional contest in 1985, between the Kansas City Royals and St. Louis Cardinals, went seven games and was a ratings winner for ABC. But the A's-Giants contest has the disadvantage of being on the West Coast.

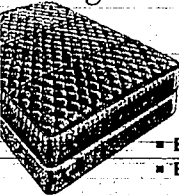

Pauley's 'Today' future uncertain

NEW YORK (AP) — With Jane Pauley's 39th birthday looming and her 13th year on "Today" noted, the only question Wednesday was whether she'd stay on the top-rated, troubled morning show. Neither the nor NBC would say.

All NBC News would say in response to a published report that Pauley probably would leave the show at year's end was that Pauley, who has two years left on her contract, would stay at the network.

"As Jane Pauley has stated, she will be staying on with NBC News," NBC said in a statement. "Conversations about specifics are concluding now and we expect to announce our mutual plans shortly."

Pauley, who didn't return phone calls on the 13th anniversary of her joining the show, reportedly has been upset over changes at "Today," including a switch of news anchors in which "NBC News at Sunrise" anchor Deborah Norville last month was made the "Today" news anchor.

That job had been held by John Palmer, a former White House correspondent, since 1982. He now anchors the earlier "Sunrise."

There has been speculation, about which NBC won't comment, that Norville is being considered as the next "Today" co-anchor. She was

given a five-year contract in August. Peggy Hubble, an NBC News spokeswoman, declined to say Wednesday when or if Pauley will be leaving "Today," which she co-anchors with Bryant Gumbel.

"We're discussing her role with NBC News," Hubble said. As for "Today" and Pauley, she said, "I think it's premature to make any specific announcement." She said she didn't know when one would be made.

NBC News president Michael Gartner, NBC Sports president Dick Ebersol, who oversees "Today," and

Pauley's agent, Ralph Mann, did not return calls. Secretaries said the three executives were out.

Pauley, who turns 39 on Oct. 31, succeeded Barbara Walters, the first female co-anchor of "Today," in 1976.

At that time, Walters left to join ABC after 15 years on "Today," on which she started as a writer. She now co-anchors "20/20" for ABC News and celebrity interview specials for ABC Entertainment.

Both Pauley and Norville, 31, came to NBC News after anchor work at NBC-owned WMAQ-TV in Chicago.

"This World Series is not a regional matchup," insisted Jack O'Hara, ABC's director of sports programming. "The two teams are national attractions with very recognizable superstars," he said in a statement.

ABC also has advantages, including games scheduled for Saturday and Sunday night, and the prospect of high scoring, hard-running games.

"If ABC called us up and said, 'Hey, we don't like this Oakland-Giants matchup, we'd take it,'" said Preston Beckman, NBC's vice president of sports audience research.

NBC led the three networks for the 68th consecutive week, with an average rating of 15.2 and a 26 audience share. ABC followed with 14.4 and 24 share, and CBS was third with 12.6 and 21.

The ratings are the percentage of the estimated 90.4 million homes with television sets in the United States. The share is the percentage of sets in use.

Former Texas judge to be CNN co-anchor

NEW YORK (AP) — A former Texas judge with no news background and veteran newsmen Bernard Shaw will co-anchor Cable News Network's "The World Today" when the weeknight news show premieres Monday.

Catherine Crier, 34, was elected in 1985 as a state district court judge assigned to Dallas. She resigned last month and became a CNN staff member Oct. 1.

The new anchor team was announced Tuesday by CNN, whose new one-hour program will start at 6 p.m. EDT. The second half hour will directly compete with the nightly

newcasts of CBS, NBC and ABC, but only in Eastern and Central time zones.

Those networks, which at 6:30 p.m. EDT give their affiliates the first of two "feeds" of their nightly 30-minute newcasts, tape-delay those programs for broadcast three hours later on the West Coast, sometimes updating them with live reports.

In contrast, CNN's "The World Today" will air live nationally. Crier will co-anchor the program from CNN headquarters in Atlanta, with Shaw, who has 25 years in news in Washington, D.C.

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
