## Delay WIPP opening 2 years, panel advises Energy secretary

WASHINGTON — A blue-ribbon panel of advisers to Energy Secretary James D. Watkins has recommended a further delay of at least two years in starting operation of a defense nuclear-waste dump in New Mexico, a panel member said Thursday.

The suggestion, if accepted, would mean the department would have to arrange temporary storage of nuclear wastes for much longer than currently planned, said Leonard Slosky, a member of the advisory panel.

The site, known as the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant and situated just north of the Texas border near Carlsbad, N.M. is designed to store drums of plutonium waste from nuclear weapons

manufacture for thousands of years in caves of bedded rock salt.

Watkins had told Congress earlier this month that he expected to have to persuade seven states to accept some excess waste starting next April until about September 1992, when operational testing of the permanent repository would start. Governors of the seven states have told Watkins they won't take the waste.

The seven states are Washington, Idaho, Colorado, New Mexico, Nevada, Tennessee and South Carolina.

The \$800-million Carlsbad installation was supposed to have opened a year ago, and as recently as June Watkins was saying it would open in September of this year. In early October Watkins said he hoped to accept experimental shipments next July but could not say when full-

scale operation should start.

Four of the five advisory panel members told Watkins in a private meeting Tuesday that the operational testing should be put off at least an additional two years to 1994; Slosky said, in part because the results of some scientific experiments won't be known before then.

The four also said they believed that the first phase of experiments would take longer than the department has planned, and that the tests should be broadened.

Slosky said only Robert Bishop, representing an industry group, disagreed with the recommendation to put off the operational testing — essentially an effort to show that the waste can be safely loaded, shipped, unloaded, deposited in the dump and, if necessary, retrieved.

## Investigators search naturopath's offices

TWIN FALLS — The offices of a Twin Falls naturopath were searched Thursday as part of an investigation of a suspected illegal medical practice, a state investigator said.

James Solomon is under investigation on suspicion of fraud, dispensing prescription drugs illegally and practicing medicine illegally, said Russ Reneau, chief investigator for the state attorney general's office.

Investigators obtained a search warrant on Wednesday for Solomon's offices on Addison Avenue East, and they searched three buildings Wednesday night and Thursday.

Randy Everitt, the criminal investigator for the attorney general's office who headed the search, declined to comment.

No charges have been filed, said Michael Kane, chief of the attorney general's criminal division.

The investigation was initiated a month ago by the attorney general's office at the request of Solicitor General Lynn Thomas-Reneau said. It is being conducted with the help of the Federal Food and Drug Administration, the Twin Falls County prosecutor, the county sheriff's department and city police, he said.

Naturopathy, the practice of healing human illnesses naturally, is illegal in Idaho, Reneau said.

He calls himself a doctor of naturopathic medicine, Reneau said. "It is my understanding that he has never been

## Fay on 15-member Gem education panel

BOISE — Two of Idaho's top officials say they want to focus the state's efforts to improve education.

"I'm fond of saying that if you don't have a target, you will miss it every time," said Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans. "Now we will have a target."

Evans and Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday announced formation of a 15-person task force on education. Its assignment will be to plan for the future of public education. It's an offshoot of the pair's visit earlier this month to President Bush's national education conference in Virginia.

Chairman of the study panel will be Helen

Werner, Boise, a retired educator and former deputy superintendent of public instruction under Edwin

Legislators include Rep. Jim Hansen, D-Boise, and his uncle, Sen. John Hansen, R-Idaho Falls.

Others are Boise businessman Skip Oppenheimer; Gary Fay of Twin Falls, a member of the state Board of Education; Darrell Deide, Caldwell, was schools superintendent; Beasley High School Principal Carol McWilliam and Gene Hill, vice president and Idaho chief executive officer for US West Communications.

Other members are Leonard Kucera, Moyle Springs, president of the Idaho School Boards Association; Larry Selland, executive president of academic affairs at Boise State University; Jennifer Boyd, Nampa High School teacher and

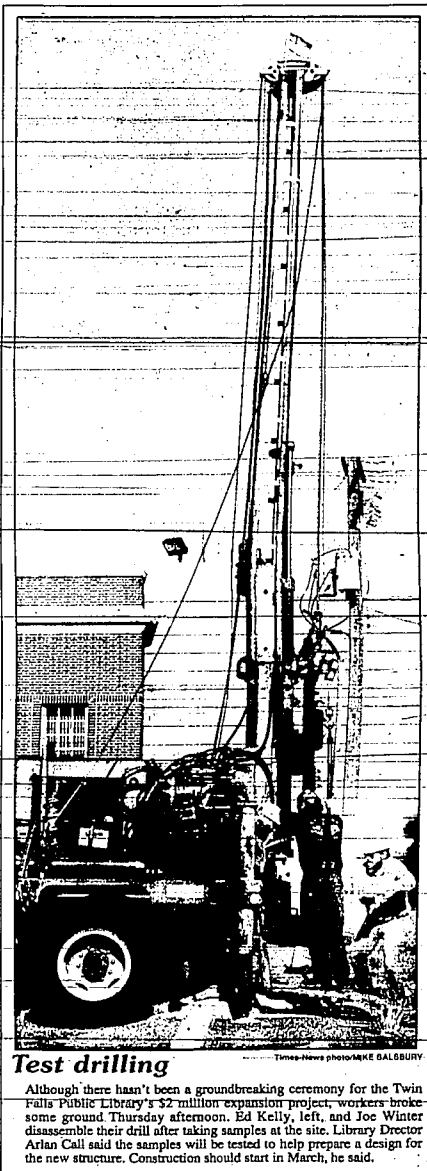
John Stedman, Boise, network printer operations general manager at Hewlett-Packard.

The other members are Jody Clark, president of the Boise Education Association; Marilyn Feeney, a teacher at Centennial grade school in Lewiston and Virginia Johnson, educator and a member of a Coeur d'Alene parents organization.

Evans and Andrus said many people have a "clear vision" of what they want to do about education, but there's nothing to pull the views together.

When asked why they want to add to the many studies that have been done on education in Idaho in recent years, Evans said, "So that we all are pulling in the same direction."

## USSR to pull nuclear subs from Baltic

MOSCOW — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev announced Thursday that the Soviet Union will withdraw all its nuclear-armed submarines from the Baltic Sea in a step toward making Northern Europe a nuclear-free zone.

Gorbachev, pressing the Kremlin's overall disarmament drive and its goal of a world eventually free of nuclear weapons, said the Soviet Union had already removed or repositioned all its tactical nuclear missiles capable of striking Northern Europe.

He said the Soviet Union was also preparing to "eliminate certain classes of sea-launched nuclear weapons," presumably cruise missiles, from the Baltic Sea region.

The Soviet leader, who is visiting Finland, said the Soviet initiatives were intended to give momentum to the movement to rid the Baltic and, if possible, all Northern Europe of nuclear arms.

"We are prepared to come to an agreement with all the nuclear powers and the Baltic states on effective guarantees for the nuclear-free status of the Baltic Sea," Gorbachev said, addressing 1,500 Finnish politicians, businessmen and community leaders in Helsinki, the Finnish capital.

He said the Soviet Union was taking these steps to follow up a speech he made two years ago in the Soviet port of Murmansk proposing the

## Moderate growth for U.S. economy

WASHINGTON — The U.S. economy shrugged off Hurricane Hugo and the poorest trade performance in six years to grow at a moderate 2.5 percent annual rate from July through September, the Commerce Department reported Thursday.

The department said that the increase in the gross national product, the country's total output of goods and services, was accompanied by a dramatic slowing of the inflation rate. A price index

tied to the GNP rose at an annual rate of 2.9 percent, the slowest in three years, as both energy and food costs moderated.

The combination of moderate growth and lower inflation was hailed by the Bush administration, but many private economists said "the big deterioration in the trade deficit and a buildup of unsold business inventories" posed significant threats to the economy in coming months.

The stock market, reacting to the negative aspects of the GNP report, turned down. The Dow Jones

industrial average of 30 stocks lost 39.55 points.

Most of the economy's momentum in the third quarter came from a boom in consumer spending, reflecting a rush to take advantage of end-of-model-year price discounts. Purchases shot ahead at an annual rate of 5.8 percent in the third quarter, the fastest advance since the early part of 1988.

Car sales in the first part of October have taken a nosedive and because of this analysts believe that consumer spending, which accounts

## Environmentalists balk at Bush call for pesticide rule changes

WASHINGTON — President Bush called for legislation Thursday that would allow dangerous pesticides to be taken off the market more quickly, saying the government's ability to ensure a safe food supply was being called into question.

But his proposed changes in how pesticides and other chemicals on foods are regulated were criticized immediately by environmentalists and some members of Congress who said provisions of the president's plan could instead make foods

less safe. White-Bush's proposal to streamline regulation was, critics said, would allow provisions of his plan would ease the risk levels used to determine if a pesticide is to be banned and also would have the government preempt state pesticide-control laws that often are stronger than federal rules.

The president, in announcing the proposed legislation, alluded to widespread publicity earlier this year over the use of Alar on apples and the government's inability to remove the cancer-causing chemical from

the market swiftly. These stories have fueled the public concern about cancer risks, and more important for us, have called into question the government's ability to ensure a safe supply of food for our citizens," said Bush in brief remarks at a White House photo session with administration officials and members of Congress involved in food safety issues.

Bush said he was convinced the country has "the safest food supply in the world" but that there also are "valid concerns about the government's slow and cumbersome process

for removing pesticides from the market." The proposed food safety package, which administration officials said would be sent to Congress within weeks, includes:

- Redefining the criteria to be used for temporarily removing, or suspending, from use a pesticide that poses a possible health hazard, making it easier to get the chemical off the market even though formal proceedings might still be under way.
- Streamlining the procedures under which a dangerous pesticide may be permanently removed from the market.

Officials said the new process would reduce by at least half the four-to-eight years it often takes for a chemical to be banned.

# Non-smokers over 40 may use pill, advisory panel tells FDA

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Food and Drug Administration advisory panel approved Thursday that the advantages of birth control pills outweigh the possible risks of heart attack and stroke for healthy women over 40 who don't smoke.

The Fertility and Adjuvant Health Drugs Advisory Committee then voted to recommend that the currently recommended age ceiling of 40 for healthy women who don't smoke be abandoned.

But the committee said women over 45 who do smoke should not use birth control pills and the FDA should maintain its recommendation to that effect. Smoking has been shown to increase the risk of blood clots in older users of the pill.

An estimated 1 million to 1.5 million women could be affected by

the end of the age 40 limit for pill use by non-smokers if the FDA accepts the committee's recommendation.

"We feel now that with lower-dose pills being used the risks that have been demonstrated in the past (with higher-dose pills) should be much less," said Barbara Hulka, chairwoman of the panel and of the epidemiology department at the University of North Carolina School of Public Health.

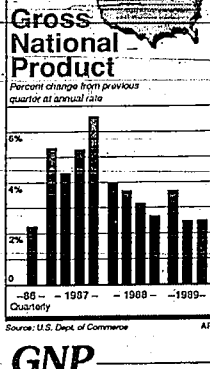
"Older women need contraception, and you have to weigh the risks and the benefits," she said. "When you look at the whole picture, oral contraceptives may be the best bet for older, healthy women."

The committee agreed that while there may be some increased risk of

heart attack and stroke for women over 40 on the pill, the risks associated with abortion as well as pregnancy carried to term are greater for this age group. Studies also have shown that use of the pill offers some protection against cancer of the uterus and ovaries, and is the most effective method of contraception.

Panel members noted that their decision was based on little new data on incidence of disease among pill users. Instead, it was based primarily on "informed opinion," and the assumption that the lower doses prescribed now will carry lower risks.

Of primary concern for older women on birth control pills is the possibility increased risk of cardiovascular problems.

For two-thirds of the overall economy, it will be substantially weaker in the final three months of the year.

Allen Sinai, chief economist of the Boston Co. said, he was looking for the economy to grow at an average 1 percent annual rate in the October-December period and he forecast that this would be followed in 1990 with two consecutive mild recessions.

"I think we are in for something between a recession and a soft landing," Sinai said. "Businesses are facing a profits squeeze, residential construction is weak and there is a major slowdown in exports. We are flirting with a recession."

The Bush administration rejected the recession talk.

On Capitol Hill, Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady, testifying about the Friday, the 13th stock market plunge, said he continued to believe that the market's tailspin was not signaling that anything was fundamentally wrong with the U.S. economy.

Talking to reporters, Brady said, "We have good solid growth in this country and ... inflation is lower than what people expect it to be."

He said that growth could slow in the fourth quarter but the country would not dip into a recession.

In other economic news Thursday, the Labor Department said that major contract gains in bargaining settlements negotiated through the first nine months of this year provided for annual wage increases of 3.1 percent.

In a second report, the Labor Department said the cost of imported goods dropped a sharp 1.3 percent in the third quarter, reflecting the stronger dollar.

# House votes to imitate payments to internees

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House voted Thursday to begin making \$1.2 billion in reparation payments next year to Japanese-Americans who were confined to camps during World War II, a debt that supporters said is long overdue.

Lawmakers agreed 249-166 to provide the money, rejecting conservatives' arguments that the compensation is unjustified; the payments would steal money from other government priorities.

"Do you evaluate these payments above child care?" asked Rep. Harold Rogers, R-Ky. "The defense of the country?"

The 60,000 surviving internees would each receive \$20,000 checks under a 1988 law. The legislation approved Thursday provides \$500 million for the payments in the fiscal year beginning October 1990, the same amount the following year

and the remaining \$200 million beginning October 1991.

About 200 survivors of the Japanese-American internment camps die each month. Proponents of the reparations said it was only fair to make the payments quickly.

"This body cannot prevent the deaths of elderly loyal Americans," said Rep. Norman Mineta, D-Calif., who as a child was kept in one of the camps. "But Congress can make the effort to disperse the redress compensation as quickly as possible."

The government set up the camps for 120,000 Japanese-Americans in 1942 after war broke out with Japan. Rep. Robert Matsui, D-Calif., said his sister and parents were confined to a camp for 3½ years, even though all of them were born and raised in Sacramento, Calif.

licensed as a medical doctor.

Naturopathy is licensed in six states and some Canadian provinces,

said Ann Hoyland of the National College of Naturopathic Medicine in Portland, Ore. Two additional states have closed laws, meaning the practice is legal but no new licenses are available, she said.

Naturopathy is legal in Oregon and Washington, and Utah is one of the states with closed laws, she said.

Hoyland said naturopathy is practiced legally or illegally in most states, with about 1,000 practitioners nationwide.

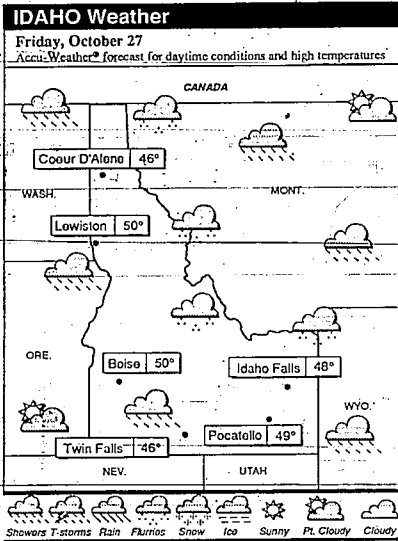
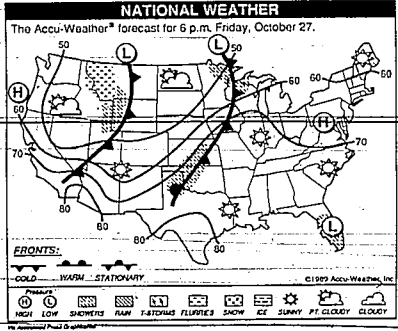

# Aid approved; Bay area looks ahead to holiday, World Series

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — President Bush's signature Thursday added \$3.45 billion to help Northern California heal the wounds of a killer earthquake, as residents and businesses tear down what can't be fixed and look to the emotional salve of a World Series and Halloween.

Crews were starting to tear down some of the "unsafe" buildings — those determined unsafe — and demolition went on at a 1½-mile stretch of Interstate 880 in Oakland.

For the first time since the Oct. 17 quake, tolls were charged on the Golden Gate Bridge on Thursday, partly because an average of \$107,300 a day had been lost and partly because the free ride seemed to encourage driving at a time when officials are trying to persuade people to use public transportation.

The quake closed the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge and parts of several highways, including a collapsed section of Interstate 880. While officials have reported record use of mass transit, commuter roads have been clogged daily.

Bush signed the aid bill just nine days after the 7.1 magnitude temblor rocked the area and called it a sign of bipartisan compassion, but one California congressman predicted his

delegation would be back, hat in hand, in the spring.

"We have done a little better than a down payment," said Democrat Vic Fazio. He said the current bill would help provide "some sustenance, some security, and some comfort in their hour of need."

"Clearly his signing this bill shows he hasn't forgotten us and has continued to keep his eye on Northern California," San Francisco Mayor Art Agnos said.

Aid has come in many forms: The Red Cross has collected \$7 million.

Costa Rica said Thursday it is sending 2,500 pounds of coffee beans to San Francisco, a city where just about every coffee shop has a cappuccino machine.

Enough donated food has been

stockpiled in Watsonville, a hard hit community south of San Francisco, to feed the whole city of 27,000 for two months, the Salvation Army said.

And the 26 Major League baseball teams pledged \$1.4 million for relief from the quake — which caused an estimated \$7.1 billion in damage.

The third game of baseball's World Series is set for Friday in quake-damaged Candlestick Park, and ushers will carry flashlights just in case. Many say the game is a chance for the Bay area to show America it is recovering, and perhaps give a boost to the hobbled tourism industry.

"We Are the New Survivors," proclaims a headline in Thursday's San Francisco Chronicle, noting residents can now put their thumbs under their suspenders and be counted along with those who survived the great quake of 1906.

However slowly, the area is recovering, as are some of the victims.

Dockworker Buck Heltn, rescued after four days in the rubble of I-880, remained in serious condition Thursday in Oakland's Highland General Hospital. But his kidney function has returned to normal, and he is conscious most of the time, said

spokewoman Pat Pino.

Six-year-old Julie Berumen and his sister Cathy, 8, were in good condition and improving, said Children's Hospital spokeswoman Diane Luzzari. They lost their mother in the freeway collapse. More than \$25,000 has been donated to a fund for them.

But police said six people remained unaccounted for, and the death toll held at 63, including 39 from the collapse of double-decked I-880. The search for more bodies was delayed because the road was too slinky.

Nearly 14,000 people were reported homeless.

In Watsonville, hundreds of them still are camped in makeshift tent cities, though people leave each morning for work in produce canneries, said City Clerk Lorraine Washington. The downtown business district remains closed.

Officials fearing dangers from open cooking fires want the campers to move to the three official shelters. But some people say they're too frightened of another quake to go indoors and others are afraid to leave the possessions — including furniture and televisions — they brought to the tents.

## California faces future calamities, say experts

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A repeat of the great San Francisco earthquake of 1906 is unlikely for decades, but scientists say there's a 50 percent chance within 30 years of another as strong as last week's — only closer to the city and much more deadly.

Chances are even better — 60 percent — that the next catastrophic quake, a big one measuring 7.5 to 8.3, will occur by the year 2018 on the San Andreas fault in Southern California.

"Everybody who lives in California should be ready for an earthquake at any time, and that means tomorrow," said Don Anderson, director of the California Institute of Technology's seismological laboratory. "Just because someone says there is a 30 percent probability of a big earthquake in the next 30 years doesn't mean it won't happen tomorrow."

Probabilities for quakes that could kill thousands of people in California

were listed in a 1988 U.S. Geological Survey report and remain unchanged by the Oct. 17 seismic upheaval that claimed at least 63 lives in the San Francisco Bay area, said USGS geophysicist Jim Dieterich.

Dieterich is the lead author of the study, which represented a consensus of leading scientists.

The report predicted a 30 percent chance by 2018 for a magnitude 6.5 quake on the segment of the San Andreas that caused last week's quake. The jolt measured 7.1, suggesting the forecast was conservative.

The earthquake "makes one realize these forecasts are serious and reliable," said Cal Tech geologist Kerry Sieh, among a dozen co-authors of the study.

"The chance of another destructive or more destructive earthquake in the Bay area is still high, and the chances in Southern California are even higher," he said.

## Reagan thanks students for aid

TOKYO (AP) — Ronald Reagan met Thursday with 13 university students who have volunteered to help Californians clean up after the earthquake, and said they were among the "most inspiring" young people he had ever met.

The former president had no official appearances scheduled for Thursday. His wife, Nancy, was interviewed on a television network owned by the Fujisanki Communications Group, which engaged the Reagans for the nine-day visit and is reported to be paying them \$2 million.

Fujisanki, Japan's largest media conglomerate, has not confirmed the

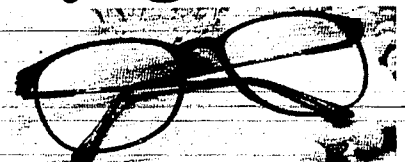
fee, but company officials have said the visit is costing about \$7 million.

The Reagans and their Japanese hosts have used the opportunity to praise the close ties between the two nations, and have avoided mentioning theory trade problems.

Of his encounter with the Chuo University students, Reagan said:

"I have just met with one of the most inspiring groups of young people I have ever encountered. Their trip to San Francisco is a most eloquent statement about the special friendship between the people of Japan and the people of the United States."

## Bush forced into addressing progressive agenda

Pressing realities causing a new agenda.

A little more than 100 years ago, the Republican Party had won six straight presidential elections and seemed securely entrenched in the White House. Conservative politics was triumphant and business interests dominated both major parties.

But an era marked by greed, corruption and speculation was soon shattered by citizen movements — populists, grangers, greenbackers — that arose outside of the established parties and ushered in an era of progressive reform in everything from trust-busting to women's suffrage.

Now a century later, much evidence suggests not only that the widespread reports of liberalism's death are wildly exaggerated, but that a conservative decade is making way for a new era of progressive reform.

A good indication is the Bush administration. In barely 200 days since his inauguration, George Bush has walked away from much of the conservative agenda, discarding central themes of the Reagan refrain.

The president is popular, but his approval comes from using liberal applause lines: power in education, action on the environment, commitment to public education, a war on drugs, investment in infants and children.

Shifting political currents and pressing realities are forcing Bush and his handlers to address what is essentially a progressive agenda.

What are these new realities? The Cold War is waning and the communist bloc is opening up to the West. The American economy is weakened by debt and dissipation at the very moment it faces new global competition with Japan and Europe.

Environmental degradation is no longer a nuisance, but a threat to our very survival. Growing economic inequality at home offends our sense of decency and undermines our future.

Or take an example closer to home. In the late 1970s, corporate managers launched a renewed offensive against organized labor and government regulation. Today, with skilled labor at an increasing premium, the Frank Lorenzo style of slash-and-burn management has become the norm.

Corporate leaders now sound the call for massive new public spending on infrastructure and education.

Last fall, a "National Leadership Commission" stocked with business executives endorsed a public guarantee of basic health care for every American.

Some conservative strategists even favor government initiatives on environmental and consumer protection to quiet public alarm.

Not surprisingly, the Bush administration has dressed it up in these changing fashions. But in sampling short-term popularity, the president must be aware of the long-term problems for conservatives by giving legitimacy to public agenda that progressives are better able to address than is his own administration.

A progressive call for more investment in public education is more compelling.

The administration also faces a growing clamor for other massive public expenditures (not to mention the \$150 billion savings and loan bailout and other scandal pay-backs coming due from the Reagan years).

New public investment inescapably poses the question of who bears the burden.

Then the president will face a very difficult political climate from the growing discontent Reagan. The class war waged by Reagan on the poor and working people has reached its limits and meets with increasing popular distaste.

The plight of the homeless offends even the most callous. The struggle of the workers fighting (such as keeping the S&T bailout "off budget") has allowed Bush to duck the problem in his first year, but inevitably the bills coming due from his promises and his predecessor's failures will make tough choices inevitable.

In the 1970s, liberals suffered from a middle-class protest against inflation-driven tax burdens. In the 1990s Republicans may face

the wrath of the vast majority of working people against a tax structure now obscenely regressive.

Republicans have enjoyed electoral success by pitting the working class against the poor, white against black, patriot against peace-maker.

Democratic legislators, frozen by phantoms of the past and finances of the present, are unlikely to lead a progressive challenge to the administration.

A continuation of slow growth with regional dislocations, another year of presidential posturing without policy, of liberal rhetoric and conservative priorities, of drift without direction, of unmet public needs and unfair private burdens may suffice.

The ground is shifting under the administration even as it celebrates the most recent public-opinion poll. The party or the leader that understands the new realities and gives voice to the new public temper can transform American politics in the 1990s.

## Child-welfare system forgetting the children themselves

We are forgetting the most important people in our child-welfare system: the children themselves.

Our current child welfare system is in a state of crisis. Its policies are woefully out-of-touch with the sorry realities that now confront many children. So harsh are those realities that I believe it is time to reintroduce, in a new, more humane form, an institution many had hoped would never be needed again: the orphanage.

We need orphanages, or their modern day equivalent, simply because, for a growing number of children, they offer a safer, better refuge than the current alternatives — foster care or a return to the biological family.

And that requires rethinking some of the fundamental tenets that now guide our child-welfare system.

It is true that part of the problem is that the system's resources are inadequate, the staffs undertrained and overburdened.

But a more basic problem is that, in a well-meaning effort to recognize the rights of parents and the potential benefits of a family setting, we have consigned infants and youths to a foster-care system that, by its design, cannot provide the continuity and care so many children desperately need.

Let me tell you a story that illustrates the sad realities these children face.

Recently, I was at a youth center in northwest Washington located in the midst of one of the city's worst drug corridors. A majority

of the children are from poor families. Some have been abused, some are in the environment, commitment to public education, a war on drugs, investment in infants and children.

The parents, according to the people who run the center, leave the children all day without food or money, while they go in search of drugs at a nearby open-air market.

While I waited for my son to finish basketball practice, I saw a little 4-year-old boy, wiry and slight of build, struggling to carry an infant girl on his hip. As passive as any parent to a newborn, he clung to her as he played with his friends, chasing across the gymnasium floor trying to turn money from adults by flying from the cart on nearby toys or to play video games in the rec room.

"Hey, what in the world are you doing with this baby?" I inquired. "Whose child is this?"

"She's my baby sister," he explained cheerfully. "I'm babysitting with her 'til Mama gets home."

I was so alarmed that I offered to hold the baby while he played, thinking that his mother would appear momentarily to take her child home. But this little man-child would not allow me to hold his sister, for, he explained, she was entrusted to his care alone.

When a group of girls of 6 to 8 years old grabbed the baby from his arms and ran into the bathroom to change its filthy diaper, he

Nationwide, we must spend \$65 billion annually just to stay even, according to the National Council on Public Works.

There is speculation that safety improvements on the collapsed Interstate 880 freeway were deferred because of inadequate state funds, a direct consequence of the fiscal myopia celebrated by California politicians and voters alike over the past decade.

Now, in the wake of a trans-shipment of the state's fiscal priorities, we are facing the question that won't go away: Who pays?

If anything, the quake response will lead local Californians about how difficult it will be to address transportation improvements so critical to the state's safety and economic security.

What these children need is permanency, but the chances are that it will continue to be difficult to find adoptive families for these so-called high-risk youngsters.

I advocate that we bring back the orphanage — not the huge, dehumanized ware-houses of old, but small-scale, caring institutions that can offer children, and their siblings, a place that they can count on to nurture them.

There are models available. Since 1969, for example, a program called The Villages in Tulsa, Okla., ran a program in which a married couple is paid to become the surrogate parents of a group of children, including siblings, whom they raise to adulthood.

Their success has been remarkable. Some graduates of the program have gone on to college, and all are functioning as successful adults because they had permanency in their lives.

It is hard for people of liberal instinct — myself included — to prescribe a remedy for other people's children that we would not choose for our own.

But no one would prescribe the current set of destructive alternatives, which so many children are being consigned.

We need to get our priorities straight. Whose rights come first? The parents? The "system's"? Or the child's?

## Quake shakes U.S. into realizing decay of transportation system

Perhaps it requires a 7.1-magnitude earthquake to shake Americans into paying attention to our decaying transportation system.

Just a few years ago, one of the most popular buzzwords in Washington was "infrastructure." Capitol Hill and the press corps were awash with study after study illustrating the deteriorating state of our bridges, highways and railroads.

In a nation where swift and safe transportation is essential, those reports added up to trouble, with a capital T. Unfortunately, solving the great infrastructure crisis added up to dollars, with a capital D. And so the president, Congress and legislatures alike swept the crisis under the rug.

But the Northern California quake changes the politics, and the reality, of addressing our infrastructure dilemma.

According to the Federal Highway Administration, more than 132,000, or 23 percent, of America's

bridges are structurally unsound; one fails every two days.

Two-thirds of the interstate highway system is in substandard condition.

The Army Corps of Engineers has concluded that there are 3,000 unsafe bridges in the nation, but, in a comforting thought to those who live in earthquake-prone regions.

Nowhere is a quality transportation service more essential to productivity and competitiveness than in California, which has experienced a jobs-and-reputation explosion in the 1980s.

Between 1964 and 1984, the state highway system grew by 29 percent.

But over the past two decades, traffic has grown five times faster than capacity. In another 20 years, there will be 1 million more Californians driving 41 percent more cars

Congress will waive restrictions on how much California can receive in emergency federal transportation aid and not require the typical matching monies from state and local governments.

But future federal support will demand substantial local shares — and that means taxes and user fees.

Now, while the terrible tragedy of the Nimetz Freeway is fresh in our

mind, it is the time to begin serious planning, including discussion of how to fairly finance improvements and expansions to our infrastructure.

We need an infrastructure improvement policy in California and throughout the nation that doesn't depend on the next quake to generate public support.

4. Full disclosure of insurance information. In general, the commissioner is re-

quired to hold a public hearing on the proposed change whenever it exceeds certain percentages. Additional information is authorized to hold a hearing whenever requested by a consumer.

5. The insurance commissioner is to be elected by the people, thereby making him more responsible to the people of the state.

In summary, this measure if passed, would force insurance companies to reduce rates for certain types of insurance — including motor vehicle, fire and liability.

This initiative is clearly needed and with the help of the citizens of Idaho, we can send a message loud and clear to the insurance companies and our state representatives and senators that we are tired of paying an unfair user's fee to use our own highways.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former HUD Secretary Samuel Pierce informed a House subcommittee today he will again refuse to answer its questions about mismanagement and political favoritism at the department he led for eight years.

Because he plans to invoke his constitutional right against self-incrimination, Pierce, through his attorneys, asked the panel to cancel a hearing Friday and another session next week at which he has been subpoenaed to testify.

Pierce, who headed the Department of Housing and Urban Development throughout the Reagan administration, said that forcing him to appear would subject him to unnecessary adverse publicity and be "punitive."

It was not immediately clear whether the subcommittee would grant the request, but a congressional aide said there were no plans to cancel Friday's hearing.

Pierce's attorneys, in a letter to the House Government Affairs subcommittee on employment and housing.

"Upon the advice of counsel, Mr. Pierce will again invoke his rights under the Fifth Amendment of the Constitution. Mr. Pierce is concerned that there continues to be an atmosphere wherein he remains a target of the subcommittee hearings."

The attorneys, Paul L. Perito and Robert Protkin, asked the subpoenas be vacated.

The spat between Pierce and the subcommittee has brought the investigation to a crossroads. The former secretary and three of his deputies have refused to cooperate with the panel and some members say it should move past the investigative phase and work on reform initiatives.

But its chairman, Rep. Thomas Lantos, D-Calif., has raised the possibility of granting immunity to two former Pierce deputies who also have refused to testify in hopes their accounts would shed light on Pierce's role in fraud, mismanagement and influence-peddling at HUD.

After Pierce refused to testify last month, several subcommittee members questioned whether he had waived his constitutional protections when he appeared before the panel voluntarily in May.

Pierce's attorneys disputed such interpretations of the law and House rules and Lantos said he would rule on the question. He informed Pierce's attorneys of his finding today, but they declined to discuss it.

A congressional source, however, indicated that Lantos had concluded he could compel Pierce to testify but was inclined not to do so.

Pierce's latest move comes as his attorneys stepped up their effort to defend him by challenging the sworn account of a former HUD official, Shirley Wiseman, who said Pierce personally ordered her to falsify a North Carolina project over the objections of several department officials.

Prior to her testimony Pierce, in his initial appearance before the subcommittee, said he took no direct role in funding decisions. Lawmakers who have accused the former secretary of misleading them possibly committing perjury often refer to Wiseman's account.

In 1985, when HUD's inspector general questioned Wiseman about the project, she said Pierce's top aide spoke to her about approving it but never mentioned a conversation with Pierce, according to the notes of the investigator who interviewed her and a memo he prepared for Pierce's lawyers.

Perito said Pierce acknowledges supporting the development, the conversion of a housing mill into housing, but cannot recall the conversation she told Congress took place.

# Agents raid stores selling supplies to grow marijuana

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal drug agents raided stores nationwide Thursday to seize equipment they said was being sold to grow marijuana indoors, and also arrested more than 100 people at indoor pot-growing sites, the Drug Enforcement Administration said.

The raids, code-named Operation Green Merchant, involved 65 commercial businesses in 22 states as well as more than 100 indoor cultivation locations in 46 states, said a federal enforcement official close to the investigation.

"A marijuana legalization advocate said the raids were just 'a publicity stunt.'"

"We have over 100 already arrested and we expect an additional 100," said the law enforcement source, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The stores raided "range from mom-and-pop to something equivalent to a K-Mart," said the source.

"We have established through the

advertising and other means, that these stores do sell the indoor cultivation apparatus and give advice about its use for the cultivation of marijuana," said DEA spokesman Frank Shults. "They openly do it."

The DEA used undercover agents in every store to determine whether the owners knew the equipment — such as lighting, irrigation and ventilation apparatus — was being used for indoor marijuana cultivation, the source said.

The stores were located in Alaska,

Arizona, California, Colorado, Georgia, Illinois, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, South Carolina, Texas, Virginia, Washington and Wisconsin. "Doug McVay of the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws, said the raids on stores were 'a publicity stunt, a largely ineffective one' and 'silly, really silly.'"

"I can understand the DEA's

frustration," McVay said. "It's true, some of this equipment is being used for (indoor marijuana) cultivation. On the other hand, dirt is used for indoor cultivation. I don't think we're going to stop people from selling dirt."

An increasing number of U.S. marijuana growers have been moving their plants indoors because of extensive aerial surveillance that enables officials to spot drugs grown outside.

**Brady favors trading halt powers for SEC**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Treasury Secretary Nicholas S. Brady said Thursday that the Securities and Exchange Commission should have the power to halt stock trading in market emergencies.

Brady noted that SEC Chairman Richard C. Breeden said just a day earlier that he doesn't want such authority.

But the treasury secretary said the Bush administration backs bills in Congress to strengthen the SEC in

the belief that government's initial response to market emergencies should come "from a regulator with expertise and proximity to the markets."

Testifying before the Senate Banking Committee in support of the legislation, Brady said the 190-point slide in the Dow Jones industrial average on Oct. 13 had not altered his belief in the soundness of the U.S. economy.

But he said the "tailspin" did point up the need for changes in market

regulation.

He supported legislation introduced by Sens. Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., and John Heinz, R-Pa., to give the SEC emergency powers to restrict or halt trading, a power vested now only in the president.

Brady, in a letter accompanying his testimony, noted that the legislation would give the president power to terminate SEC emergency actions and would require presidential approval for any trading

halt lasting longer than 24 hours.

He said the administration supports other provisions of the legislation to:

- Give the SEC authority to request reports on large securities and options trades.
- Set rules for regulators to use in assessing the financial soundness of the parent holding companies of brokerage houses.
- Provide for improved coordination in the clearing and settling of market transactions.

**Hungary on favored trade list**

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush Thursday extended most-favored-nation trade privileges to Hungary and made it the first country to be freed from a 1974 law denying U.S. trade credits to most communist nations.

Three days after Hungary declared itself a democracy, the president signed a series of proclamations in a Rose Garden ceremony exempting Hungary from the so-called Jackson-Vanik amendment.

The action gives Hungary full access to U.S. markets and the lowest possible tariff rates, putting them on an equal basis with major U.S. trading partners.

"Hungary fulfilled its part of the bargain. And I'm here to fulfill our

part of the bargain," Bush said.

The Jackson-Vanik amendment to the Trade Act of 1974 denies trade benefits to nations that restrict emigration. It is named after its congressional sponsors, the late Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., and former Rep. Charles Vanik, R-Ohio.

The sanctions have been the centerpiece of U.S. trade policy toward the communist world and remain largely in place against the Soviet Union and most nations in Eastern Europe.

Bush said that Hungary, under liberalizing legislation approved by its Parliament on Sept. 26, now meets the free-emigration requirements of U.S. law.

**Hugo's toll may exceed \$8 billion**

WASHINGTON (AP) — When it's all counted up, the damage from Hurricane Hugo may exceed \$8 billion, the director of the National Hurricane Center said Thursday.

Robert Sheets told a Senate subcommittee that damage from the September storm could climb to the \$8 billion to \$10 billion level, in his opinion.

The insurance industry is currently estimating losses at \$4 billion, Sheets said. "In the past we have found that total losses get close to two to three times the insurance loss," he told the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science and Transportation.

"We've never seen such massive damage as with Hurricane Hugo," said Sheets, who has toured the damaged regions, including South Carolina's coastal zones.

Sheets said the nation was somewhat lucky with Hugo, because the storm struck in such a way that the most powerful wind and waves slammed into the Francis Marion National Forest, an area with few human residents.

If it had struck a major metropolitan area, the destruction would have been much greater, he said.

Sheets' comments came at a hearing on modernization of the National Weather Service, and he pointed out that improved weather radars planned for the future will make hurricane forecasting easier and more accurate.

Sens. Albert Gore Jr., D-Tenn., and Ted Stevens, R-Alaska, questioned the proposed cuts in Weather Service offices planned over the next decade under the modernization.

The improved technology will mean that the National Weather Service will be able to give the same or better service with fewer offices, contended John Knauss, director of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

"The whole point ... is to provide better service," he said. "We guarantee we will not provide any less service in any location. If we can't do that, we will not close the station," Knauss said.

Stevens indicated disbelief, saying that cutting from 10 weather stations to three in Alaska could have serious results in a state where aviation and fishing are major activities.

Elbert W. Friday, director of the National Weather Service, said new radar systems will dramatically improve forecasting of storms. In tests at Norman, Okla., the radars improved prediction of severe weather from 58 percent to 91 percent, he said.

**House passes farmer break**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House on Thursday gave a break to farmers who are growing substitute crops on land where drought destroyed or damaged earlier plantings.

The bill essentially eases restrictions put on the federal disaster aid package passed earlier this year by Congress.

It is intended to protect the many farmers who are making a profit if any profit on the second crop from losing the disaster payments they expected from the first crop.

The legislation was approved Wednesday by the Senate and passed the House on voice vote with minor technical amendments. It now goes back to the Senate for approval, which is expected to come easily.

The Agriculture Department has been planning to deduct 75 percent of the gross value of any replacement crop from such a farmer's disaster aid check.

Under the bill, that system would be modified.

Farmers would have no payment deductions if the replacement crop failed to produce more than 50 percent of the county average yield for the second crop.

Kyle Williams, 32, is charged with purchasing prescription Darvon, generic Darvon with codeine, Tylenol with codeine and generic Tylenol with codeine from a local pharmacy this summer. Authorities allege in court papers that he told the pharmacist he was picking up the drugs, all opiates, for someone else.

### Judge finds drug evidence insufficient for prosecution

**TWIN FALLS** — District Judge Wednesday threw out a drug case, saying the prosecutor hadn't provided enough evidence to support the charge.

Bernardo Garza, 26, of Buhl, was accused of a felony charge of delivering a controlled substance, marijuana. He was arrested in May for bringing his brother a pound of marijuana, concealed in a closed diapers bag, which his brother in turn sold to undercover police officers. The incident occurred in January, according to records.

Fifth District Judge Daniel C. Hurlburt Jr. made the ruling in the second day of Garza's jury trial after Garza's attorney, Michael Wood, moved for acquittal. Wood argued that Deputy Prosecutor Rockne Lammers failed to prove the accused was Garza knew the contents of the bag.

### Accident involves 10 teens; girl spends night in hospital

**BURLEY** — Ten Burley teenagers were involved in a car accident Thursday morning, and one girl was hospitalized overnight with injuries.

Seven teenagers were treated at Cassia Memorial Hospital, Heather Osterhaut, 16, was in stable condition Thursday night, a spokeswoman said.

The accident occurred at 8:08 a.m., when a pickup going north on Scholastic Ave. carrying three teens, was hit by a sedan carrying seven teens that was headed east on 16th Street, a Cassia County sheriff's deputy said. Aside from Osterhaut, who was a passenger in the pickup, six teens were treated and released from the hospital, a spokeswoman said.

No citations were issued Thursday.

### Savings and loan cutbacks won't affect local branch

**TWIN FALLS** — Layoffs and other cutbacks announced by the head office of the Benj. Franklin Federal Savings and Loan Association won't affect its Twin Falls branch.

"We don't have any extra people any way," Branch Supervisor Joan Lenker said.

The Oregon-based Benj. Franklin announced a cost-cutting program on Wednesday, including employee layoffs, in an effort to meet requirements of new federal thrift legislation.

So far, the restructuring has eliminated 40 jobs, about 65 percent of them in the Portland area. The company has about 1,300 employees.

### Police charge man with robbery in railroad yard

**TWIN FALLS** — A man described by police as a transient faces a robbery charge, according to court papers.

Roy Lee Pritt, 22, is charged with beating another man and stealing his shoes, wallet, belt, hat, keys and knives, police say. Police said the incident occurred on Sept. 15, when the men were drinking together in the railroad yard east of Shoshone Street.

In Magistrate Court Thursday, a public defender was appointed for Pritt and he requested a preliminary hearing.

# Sunday blackout plan worries church

**JEROME** — A local minister, trying to keep darkness from descending on his flock, pleaded with Idaho Power to leave the lights on Sunday morning, but to no avail.

Pastor Vern Bishop worries that a planned Sunday morning blackout of about 4,700 customers will keep people from going to church and that churches may be unheated.

Though Steve Cooper, the utility company's Twin Falls manager, is aware of the problems the outage will create, "at the present time I haven't changed my mind," he said Thursday.

Idaho Power Co. plans to shut off the power in Jerome from 7 to 10 a.m. to work on power lines. The blackout will cover an area approximately from the center of Jerome and five miles north, six miles west, two miles south and one mile east.

"We're trying to pick the time that affects the least number of people," Cooper said.

But Bishop, pastor of the Pentecostals of Magic Valley, said, "If Sunday morning affects the least amount of people, then we're in trouble."

He's not critical of the power outage, but the timing's terrible," he said.

Bishop worried that people's alarm clocks wouldn't go off and that people planning on going to church would have no lights or hot water. Though his church in Twin Falls, eight-to-10 families come from Jerome, he said.

He contacted the Idaho Public Utilities Commission and the state attorney general, but neither could help.

Bishop isn't alone in his concern about powerless parishioners. Father Roy Ziemann of the Calvary Episcopal Church in

Jerome was unaware of the coming blackout, but "I would be very unhappy about that," he said.

Idaho Power plans to begin work at day-

light or about 7 a.m. But in response to Bishop's concerns, the utility will call in a line crew from Twin Falls to speed up the job. The work should be completed and the

power back on by 10 a.m., Cooper said. The work will increase the electrical capacity of power lines coming into Jerome and improve service, Cooper said.

# Lottery players won't see sports betting in Idaho

**TWIN FALLS** — Lottery games that allow players to bet on professional sporting events aren't feasible in Idaho and won't be offered, the state lottery's director said Thursday.

"Once you start doing sports action you have the human element involved" — including the possibility of throwing games and shaving points, Lottery Director Wally Hedrick said during a visit to Twin Falls.

In a morning interview and a luncheon speech to the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club, Hedrick said that Idaho's lottery is what Idahoans had in mind when they approved

a state lottery last year.

Nor will Idaho's lottery activities expand to include casino games, video poker or bingo, Hedrick said. All of those things are beyond what the people and the Legislature authorized the lottery to do, he said.

"The thing about our lottery is that it's totally random — a game of chance," Hedrick said. "There's no potential for human manipulation of the outcome."

Though some Idahoans campaigned fervently against allowing a state-run lottery, more than a few seem to have overcome their objections, helping the lottery get off to a healthy start.

Hedrick said \$3 million in tickets have been sold since the lottery began in July — far exceeding his projection of \$25 million

in the first year.

"We're a real success story," he said. "Obviously people who voted against the lottery are buying tickets."

Judging by the number of tickets sold, Idaho has taken to the lottery with more enthusiasm than Montana or South Dakota, Hedrick said.

Ticket sales in eastern Idaho, a pre-election bastion of anti-lottery crusaders, are keeping up with the rest of the state. The Magic Valley is also holding its own in ticket sales, Hedrick said.

The Magic Valley can claim two of the state's top 10 lottery retailers. The 7-Eleven Store in Burley holds the No. 6 slot, with the Traveler's Oasis Truck Stop in Eden

close behind at No. 7.

The top slot belongs to the La Tienda convenience store in Franklin, at the Idaho-Utah border. More than 560,000 tickets have been sold in that town of 461 people, Hedrick said.

Overall, Utahns comprise about 5 to 7 percent of those who buy Idaho lottery tickets, Hedrick said.

"They seem interested in playing and, their money is welcome here," he said.

La Tienda's owner has printed T-shirts that say, "Welcome to the home of the Utah Lottery." And Hedrick said the owner is planning to add on a lottery room to his store, where players can scratch and win inside and out of the cold.

# Ketchum candidates back bond issue

**KETCHUM** — Four candidates vying for two open seats on the City Council all support a \$2.2 million bond issue on the November ballot to buy up federal land within the city limits.

The issues of parking, downtown development and affordable housing, however, are not in agreement on the candidates.

The time for parking studies is over, said Gary Coles, a former justice of the peace in Gooding County and security officer for 23 years with the Sun Valley Co. Coles listed curbs and gutters as a high priority for the downtown area, but said he wouldn't support parking meters as a way to raise revenue to pay for the improvements.

Clint Jacobs, an attorney, and former resident of Ketchum who lived in Seattle for several years before recently returning to the Wood River Valley, viewed the parking problem from a different perspective.

Jacobs saw the council as promoting bus service then building parking lots to ac-

commodate more automobile traffic. "We should be encouraging locals to take the bus," Jacobs said.

Local businessman and eight-year resident Frank Janda said the city should restrict parking for specific periods of time to free up more space for shoppers and tourists. Janda also advocated a regular bus route to Hailey and Bellevue.

Incumbent Suzanne Ors, who just finished a four-year term, said the current council has made great strides in providing adequate parking. Also, in a town with so many physical fitness advocates, it was hard to believe that walking a few blocks would generate any kind of opposition, she said.

Concerning downtown development, Ors criticized the current council for allowing the projects, partly, he said, because the city should have required adequate parking on the site.

Jacobs called for "a balancing act of controlled growth," while insuring that new

construction resulted in "quality" structures.

Coles felt that growth needed to be controlled, but in responding to a question from the audience, she opposed a moratorium. "Our Planning and Zoning Commission is fantastic and has addressed the growth problem," Coles said.

Ors said she and the council have funded open spaces within the city, but added that urban growth is the city's greatest threat. "We do need cooperation among all the government entities in the valley," Ors said.

The growth has created a crunch in affordable housing in the valley.

Ors said a relaxation of some building ordinances, such as allowing accessory apartments, might be a first step. This would allow a residence to have more than one kitchen, thereby creating multiple residences out of single homes.

Ultimately, the private sector, already becoming desperate for employees, will have to step in and help the city find solutions.

# Resorts plan to open for Thanksgiving

**BOISE** — Idaho's recent drought may be just a bad memory since the state received its first good dose of snow.

The rain that fell on the valleys Wednesday brought nearly a foot of snow to the 9,151-foot summit of Sun Valley's Bald Mountain above Ketchum.

"It turned the whole mountain white," a Sun Valley spokesman said.

Although Sun Valley was dusted with snow earlier this month, Bogus Basin north of Boise and Brundage Mountain near McCall got their first shot of the year with less than an inch in this week's storm.

"It's snowing big, wet flakes," said Lew Peterson, a Bogus Basin spokesman at Pioneer Lodge, midway up 7,582-foot Shafer Butte.

Brundage spokesman Gary Erter said the top half of the mountain was dusted with snow. "It's knee-deep on a big," he said.

Sun Valley, Brundage and Bogus all plan Thanksgiving openings, although they may open the weekend before if snow depth permits. After two consecutive drought winters, all the resorts opened the week before Thanksgiving in 1988 with ideal conditions.

Grand Targhee, east of Idaho Falls, also got a dusting, officials said. Targhee, which traditionally receives more than 500 inches of snow a year, plans a Nov. 17 opening.

National Weather Service officials said the 30-day forecast from mid-October to mid-November calls for above-average precipitation and near-normal temperatures.

# Heyburn may gain new fire station; buys property

**HEYBURN** — The city may soon have a new fire station, providing city officials and the Minidoka County Fire District can come to terms on who will pay for what.

The City Council, eager to secure a site, voted Wednesday to spend about \$15,000

to buy the property adjacent to the city office, council chambers and post office to build the fire station. There is a small home on the property that would need to be moved or torn down.

But it asked the Fire District to reimburse the city for the funds. Mayor Harold Hurst has said the district should contribute in some way to getting the new facility built.

Fireman Dalo Childs said the district doesn't have the funds now and wouldn't commit anything until he meets with other firemen. He said he will let the city know the decision.

Childs told the council about a month ago the city needs a new station. The existing one is too small for new equipment the department will need and has no room for

training or clean-up, Childs said.

City officials Wednesday looked at plans for a three-bay building, with a training room, estimated to cost about \$50,000. But the council said the city should have an additional bay to prepare for possible future expansion. No additional cost estimate was available.

## State wants U.S. to pay filing fees

BOISE (AP) — The state of Idaho has asked US District Judge Daniel Hurlburt to require an estimated \$11 million in water rights filing fees from the federal government in the Snake River Basin Adjudication. In a 97-page brief submitted Wednesday, Attorney General Jim Jones' office argues that Congress intended federal authorities to defer to state water law, including the observance of filing fee requirements in river adjudications. Idaho law outlining the massive process of sorting out thousands of water rights claims in the Snake River Basin treats federal claimants the same as others who are required to pay fees, according to the brief. Federal attorneys filed a petition with Hurlburt in July, seeking exemption from payment of the fees.

"The Justice Department apparently feels that the United States should not be required to pay the Snake River adjudication," Jones said Thursday in a news release. "Despite the fact that the U.S. has a tremendous volume of claims to process, which will necessitate large state and court expenditures, they want to get by on the cheap by not having to pay the filing fees that every other party is paying." The government wants to share in the benefits without sharing in the burdens. If the fees can get off-see-free on fees, that will just increase the burden on all other water claimants." The Idaho brief contends that the federal government will benefit con-

siderably from the adjudication process, and so should pay its share. The benefits will include a legal debt to the state, including reserved-right claims, which will make them enforceable under state law. "The United States currently pays adjudication filing fees for reserved and appropriate rights in Colorado and Arizona, and has paid adjudication filing fees for appropriate rights in California, Montana, Nevada and Oregon," according to the brief. Jones' office contends the U.S. Justice Department has misread the federal McCarran Amendment in asserting that it should be exempt from the fees "by reason of its sovereign-

# Lawmaker: Northwest must act in concert

SEATTLE (AP) — Northwest states and provinces are specks on the globe's economic map, but put seven of them together and they'd pack a punch tough to ignore, says the mastermind behind a regional cooperation conference.

"We have the critical mass to be very successful in global trade and economics," state Sen. Alan Bluelchel, president pro tem of the Washington Senate, said Thursday at the start of the Pacific Northwest Legislative Leadership Forum.

"It takes 12 million people to be a major player," he added. "Individually, none of us is big enough to crack the overall market."

But put Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Alaska, British Columbia and Alberta together, with almost 15 million people, and the region could work as a funnel of trade to and from Pacific Rim nations and Europe, Bluelchel said.

Already the Northwest Power Planning Council coordinates energy matters in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and western Montana, and the Northwest Economic Partnership coordinates some British Columbia and Washington investments and

marketing of biotechnology, tourism, aquaculture, computer software and fashion and textiles.

But in the other states and Alberta, expand the focus, and a Northwest Economic Community could be born, Bluelchel said.

Now is the time, he added, since the 1992 trade unification of the European Economic Community is expected to present unprecedented competition in world trade.

Economies wouldn't be the only emphasis of a Northwest union. Coordinating efforts in education, in research and development and in management of solid and hazardous waste could also be goals.

Ken Stratford, president of the British Columbia Economic Development Association, said he'd like to see the beautiful Pacific Northwest become the world center for environmental sciences.

The technology is here, he said, it's just a matter of coordination and marketing. It would be a way for the region to "make a lot of money with a clean conscience."

The three-day forum brings together about 60 representatives from the seven states and provinces.

The goal is to exchange and discuss ideas for cooperation that could be followed up with legislative committees working across borders.

Full implementation of a congressional union could take 10 to 15 years, Bluelchel said.

Neal Peirce, a syndicated columnist who just published a series of articles on Puget Sound growth, said in his luncheon speech that regionalism is taking on new relevance.

Peirce said he thinks the Northwest could be helped if corporations would put more of their office and assembly operations in rural areas. He praised Boeing for its Spokane plant and Seafair Bank for placing its credit card services in Spokane.

Rural areas need jobs and can provide cheaper labor, while cities growing faster than they can handle, he Seattle, would get some relief, he said.

Both Bluelchel and Peirce emphasized that the mainstay of economic development is the development of people, and that means improving education.

"If the Puget Sound region wants to be a global magnet, it needs hundreds of multilingual people ... and

it needs to educate its young people for the future. That's not going to," said Peirce.

Linking libraries of Northwest universities by computer, coordinating research and development efforts, and increasing student exchanges would all be helpful, Bluelchel and others said.

Participants said they found the Northwest Economic Community concept intriguing.

"In a state our size we can't afford to do our own thing," said Sen. Delwyn Gage, Montana Senate majority leader. "Our economy is not doing real well. We have a population of 800,000 and it's going down ... It would help us if we're networked with the rest of the Northwest."

"We go off by ourselves" to market agricultural products and other things, said Rep. Thomas Boyd, Idaho House speaker, Idaho, a state of 1 million people, "doesn't have the resources to promote good and services."

Alaska's oil production and state revenue are down, said Rep. Sam Cotten, Alaska House speaker.

# Private group launches rocket

OREANA (AP) — The largest private rocket in Idaho history blasted through a window in the rainy weather on the Owyhee Desert after its launch was scrubbed twice in the past year.

"We made history tonight," said Herbert Law of Meridian on Thursday evening. The Omega IV took to the sky at 6:45 p.m. and reached an altitude of 25,000 feet over southwestern Idaho as storm clouds raged in.

Law and a handful of other rocket enthusiasts tried to launch the Omega last December and in June of this year. The first time, bad weather stopped the event and failure to ignite the solid-fuel rocket prevented the second.

Only one stage of the two-stage construction was used Thursday night, Law said. The rocket blasted off minutes before another bank of clouds closed in from Oregon.

"It pushed us right to the latest we could launch," Law said.

The rocket carried a parachute, although the participants lost sight of the Omega within seconds. Ken Kaag of Boise and the Voice of Idaho Amateur Radio Club were on hand to track the signal sent out by the spent rocket.

Federal Aviation Administration officials in Seattle said last year that the Omega may be the most ambitious rocket project ever staged by a private party in the United States. The group needed air clearance at launch time to avoid hitting a whole in the wing of a passing airplane.

# County won't take more waste

CALDWELL (AP) — After allowing a load of asbestos from Alaska to be dumped at the county landfill, the Canyon County Commission has decided to refuse any further shipments of solid waste from out-of-state county areas of southwestern Idaho.

An ordinance banning shipments from outside Canyon, Adams, Gem, Washington, Owyhee and Payette counties was approved Tuesday, effective Nov. 1, Commissioner Joyce Chase said.

"She said the decision stemmed from public reaction to the recent disposal of a truckload of asbestos from Fairbanks, Alaska."

# Bush to name judge

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush has agreed to appoint U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Edward J. Lodge to fill a vacancy on the U.S. District Court in Idaho.

The White House informed Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, late Thursday that Bush would appoint Lodge on Friday to fill a position left by U.S. District Judge Marion J. Callister's decision to accept senior judge status in July.

Lodge, 55, of Caldwell, Idaho, was appointed to the U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Boise last year after 23 years as a judge in Idaho's 3rd Judicial District.

McClure recommended Lodge to succeed Callister in June. He was selected from more than a dozen candidates. Callister has assumed a senior status where he can handle cases at his discretion, Lodge said.

"I know it was personally very difficult to make a decision," Lodge said of McClure. "He had several very qualified candidates."

The senator said Thursday that he was unsure whether the Senate would be able to confirm the judge's appointment before it adjourns.

"We're going to make every effort to do it, but it's going to be questionable whether we can get it done

this late in the year," McClure said.

"I'm hopeful that it will proceed," Lodge said. "It's very possible that it could happen this year." He said he spoke to Bush on Thursday, but was unsure how the appointment would be announced.

Lodge grew up in Caldwell and was an All-American quarterback at the old Boise Junior College before graduating with a teaching certificate from the College of Idaho. He earned his law degree from the University of Idaho in 1960.

After several years in private practice and probate court, Lodge became a district judge in Caldwell in 1965, a post he held until 1988, when he was selected as Idaho's second bankruptcy court judge.

Lodge has been praised by attorneys and judges alike as a traditionalist. Perhaps his most famous case was the trial of Claude Dallas, convicted of manslaughter in the shooting deaths of Idaho Fish and Game officers Conley Elms and Bill Poage.

Following a sensational trial, Lodge handed down three consecutive 10-year prison terms to the mountain man.

# Ontario prison plan brings recall petition

VALE, Ore. (AP) — A petition to recall the county judge and a county commissioner has been filed by a group opposed to the selection of Ontario as the site of a new state prison.

The group, Citizens to Recall Liqueurance and Cox, has 90 days to gather 1,322 signatures to force a recall election against County Judge Maxwell Liqueurance and Commissioner Don Cox.

Maligne County Clerk Deborah DeLong said the petition was filed Wednesday at the county courthouse in Vale.

Gov. Neil Goldschmidt two weeks ago announced the selection of a site northwest of Ontario as that of a new medium-security prison that eventually could house as many as 3,000 inmates.

Recall leaders Todd Heinz and Larry White, both of Ontario, claimed the two county officials acted irresponsibly on the prison issue.

They said a referendum should have been put before voters to

gauge public sentiment about the prison before the Maligne County Court supported the plan.

According to the petition, the county also should have provided an impact statement indicating the economic and environmental effects a prison could have on the community.

The petition takes county officials to task for not conducting enough public hearings on the issue and says they improperly used taxpayer money to promote, investigate and campaign for the prison.

Support for the prison was identified by the county from an improper and less than adequate sample," the petition said.

Liqueurance and Cox are members of the court, the county's three-member governing board. The other member, W.C. "Bud" Hamrick of Jamieson, was not included in the recall effort.

Liqueurance denied the petitioners' allegations.

**Committee to study effects of prison**

**LEWISTON (AP)** — A special Orofino committee will form this week to get some answers to their claims that the state prison in town has destroyed their peace and their property values.

"We're not going to just let it lie," said Orofino Police Chief Eric Childers, chairman of a local advisory board for the prison located at State Highway North.

Idaho Corrections Director Richard Vernon met with about 20 people Wednesday in Orofino, including several from the Dunlap Road Citizens Group.

**Group seeks recall of 6 board members**

**BOISE (AP)** — A group will go to court next week in its effort to recall six Boise School Board members over the district's sex education courses.

The Pro-Family Coalition of Ada County turned in recall petitions in September, but board Clerk Sharon Hooks said they were technically invalid.

Linda Anderson, spokesman for the group backing the recall, said the group will ask a court to force the clerk to canvass petitions bearing 2,306 signatures.

Ms. Brooks said the petitions were invalid because each listed all trustees targeted for recall instead of having each on a separate petition as required by state law.

Magistrate Darla Williamson will preside over next Thursday's hearing.

There must be 2,244 valid signatures to authorize a recall election for Board President Quentin Homer and trustee Lonnie Grisham, and 815 for trustee Bev Harad. That's 20 percent of the votes cast in their last election.

**Hatchery construction put on hold**

**LEWISTON (AP)** — Construction of an important new steelhead and salmon hatchery at Ahsahka on the Clearwater River has been put on hold until a dispute about bidding for the project is resolved.

The General Accounting Office has until Dec. 22 to decide on a protest filed in August by Humphrey Construction of Woodinville, Wash.

The company complained about a U.S. Army Corps of Engineers decision to award the project to Morgan and Oswood Construction of Great Falls, Mont., based on a corrected bid.

Morgan and Oswood originally bid \$15,583,040 for the project. A Corps examination of the bid revealed several clerical errors that were corrected.

The discovery of an error in part of the project to build seven homes for hatchery workers also led to that portion being dropped from the contract.

**Judge denies plea for softer sentence**

**BOISE (AP)** — A judge has denied Edward Tuimaini's plea to soften his prison sentence for abandoning his developmentally disabled and abused son last winter at an Ada County freeway rest stop.

Fourth District Judge Alan Schwartzman said Wednesday a reduction "would depreciate the seriousness of the crime, irregardless of the defendant's current institutional adjustment and newly emerging repentance."

In June, Schwartzman ordered Tuimaini, 29, to serve 3½ to 10 years in prison.

The illiterate transient pleaded guilty to abandoning his mute 7-year-old son at the rest stop on Interstate 84. Eddie was found Jan. 4 in a soiled T-shirt, beaten and burned.

**Bray resigns from state legislature**

**BOISE (AP)** — Sen. Gail Bray, D-Boise, assistant Democratic floor leader in the Idaho Senate, has announced her resignation from the Legislature effective Tuesday.

At an emotional Statehouse news conference Thursday, the former lawmaker from District 19 said she wants to spend more time with her family, but that she may return to politics after at least a five-year hiatus.

"I have my life to give to politics, only a few more years to give to my children, my husband and my mother," Bray said. "I'm going to do that, and I'll be back."

**Hayden Lake man sentenced 25 years**

**COEUR D'ALENE (AP)** — A Hayden Lake man was sentenced to 25 years in prison for rape, kidnapping and sodomy, and the judge ordered the man to be tested for the AIDS virus.

Scott Maland, 32, was convicted last month of attacking a 19-year-old woman whose car had run out of gas on Interstate 90 in the Spokane Valley in May.

At his trial and sentencing, Maland maintained the woman consented to have sex with him after he picked her up along the highway and offered to help her.

**Bidders question construction award**

**POCATELLO (AP)** — Area contractors are questioning the U.S. Postal Service's decision to award a major construction project in Pocatello to an out-of-state bidder who submitted one of the most expensive proposals.

Four Idaho construction companies bid on the one-story, 64,000-square-foot mail distribution center now under construction. But the job was awarded to Christians Brothers Inc., a Salt Lake City company that built a similar facility two years ago in Provo, Utah.

The Christians Brothers bid was for \$4.4 million, while Brennan Construction of Pocatello bid about \$4.3 million and Ormond Construction of Idaho Falls bid \$3.9 million.

"It's beyond comprehension that they would say 'We'll go for this one' at half a million more, or 12 percent of the project, when we were within their own preferred site location area," said Reed Miller, project development manager for Ormond Construction.

"Yes, I think someone could have had a very

poor site so they chose another one — but not within that range of dollars. The majority of bidders used the same parcel that we did, so we're not alone in feeling this way."

Because the Postal Service stopped receiving federal tax dollars in 1970 and now operates on revenue from mail services, it is not subject to normal government bidding procedures.

But contractors will question the sizeable bid disparity. They also wonder why the Postal Service would prefer a parcel of land along Hillene Road, where a house had to be razed to accommodate the building, instead of a site in Chubbuck, where the majority of professional contractors chose to base their proposals.

Postal Service officials have been tight-lipped about the specifics of the Pocatello project. But they say the unsuccessful contractors need to look at the project as a whole, not just at the differences in the bids or the superficial site differences.

"Our facilities are not awarded to the lowest bid because number one, you have to consider the loca-

tion that is proposed and what area the facility is going to serve," said spokeswoman Betty Bryant in Washington, D.C.

"If one contractor offers you something central, you're going to look at it and say 'I'm going to save all this time on travel and on gas.' That's all a part of the package," she said.

One of the reasons contractors are frustrated is that several of them spent thousands of dollars preparing proposals, obtaining permits, conducting environmental studies and meeting other requirements.

"The contractors feel that they've been defrauded, taken advantage of," Miller said. "We think the decision was made well before our price even came in."

William Wengley of the Office of Government Liaison responded to a recent letter on the issue from Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, by saying all contractors' offers were "accepted and evaluated on the merits of their submission and not on the location of their firm."

**Court says threatening constitutes firearm use**

**BOISE (AP)** — The Idaho Court of Appeals says a gun does not have to be fired to be "used" in the commission of a felony.

The appellate court ruled 3-1 on Thursday to uphold Gary John Cates' conviction for aggravated battery and indeterminate sentences totalling nine years, including a three-year enhancement for using a firearm.

Cates appealed his conviction and the sentence handed down by 6th District Judge William Woodland for the May 1985 battery of a teen-age girl in Pocatello.

He argued among other things that evidence at this jury trial failed to prove any deadly weapon was used, which would elevate the crime to aggravated battery. And even if a gun was used, Cates said, prosecutors failed to prove the weapon was "operable."

But in a majority opinion written by Chief Justice Jesse Walters, the Court of Appeals said a jury found that Cates "used" the gun simply by displaying it while questioning the victim and by threatening her with it during a "subsequent physical encounter" involving an alleged rape.

"Although the weapon was not the instrument of physical contact with the victim, the jury reasonably could have found that the weapon was employed to intimidate the victim, causing her to endure physical contacts which she might otherwise have resisted or attempted to evade during Cates' physical contact with her," Walters wrote.

In dissent, Judge Roger Swanstrom said he did not believe Cates' threats constituted "use" of a deadly weapon.

**Idaho fatalities decrease**

**BOISE (AP)** — The 65 mph speed limit on rural freeways, linked to at least 600 traffic fatalities nationwide in the past two years, according to a National Highway Traffic Safety Administration report.

But an Idaho official does not think the speed limit has had much effect on the state's traffic deaths.

"If there's a change in the number of fatalities (in Idaho), it is so small that it can't be attributed to speed," said Joe Fisk, deputy superintendent of the Idaho State Police.

The report, released this week, said three times as many motorists are speeding now as when the speed limit for Interstates outside of metropolitan areas was 55 mph.

Combined with the greater gap between speeds of the fastest and

slowest drivers on Interstate highways, the higher speeds led to an "increase in the likelihood and severity of collisions," the report says.

Fisk said deaths from Idaho traffic accidents actually dropped during the past year, from 206 through September 1988, to 174 through September 1989.

"Such a change may be a large percentage, but it's not actually a large enough number to be significant. I don't believe speed contrib-

uted all that much," he said.

The federal report indicated that while six states in the study reported fewer traffic deaths on affected roads, 17 showed at least a 50 percent increase since 1986, when the limit was 55 mph.

**Environmentalists claim IMA waging sneak attack**

**BOISE (AP)** — The Idaho Mining Association is being accused by environmentalists of waging a "sneak attack" on a compromise water-quality plan.

In a Wednesday public hearing in Boise on the state's new water antidegradation plan, several negotiators said the association, by raising concerns to the format two months after parties adopted it, may undermine that effort to reach middle-

ground by industry and conserva-

tionists.

"The IMA's opposition amount to a bad-faith abuse of the negotiating process," said Will Whelan of the Idaho Conservation League and one of the seven negotiators.

The plan is designed to protect Idaho's streams, lakes and wetlands from pollution by "non-point sources," such as mining, logging and farming.

**PUC looks into power fluctuations**

**BOISE (AP)** — Carson H. Bradley of Citrus, a Preston-area farming community in southeastern Idaho, says his electrical and electronic equipment is suffering a lot of damage because of surges and fluctuations in power from Utah Power and Light Co.

He complained to the Public Utilities Commission and as a result, the PUC has ordered the utility to answer questions about the quality of its service to rural areas and how it deals with claims of damage to customer equipment.

UP&L has until Dec. 6 to respond. In an Oct. 9 letter to the PUC, Bradley complained of destructive brownouts and power surges. He tried to collect for damaged equipment through small claims court but was told laws protect the utility.

"We average a major outage once every two weeks," he said. "When they have a brownout, our motors are burned up. When they have a power surge, our electronic equipment is destroyed."

The PUC said it was to know what

**Personal care legislation gets final touches**

**BOISE (AP)** — A legislative study committee is putting final touches on legislation to improve personal care services for the elderly, physically or otherwise disabled people.

But it won't be without cost. Health and Welfare spokesman Linda Caballero said Thursday it will cost \$2.85 million, including \$734,000 from general state revenues to pay for payments to personal care providers. That includes an effort to boost the hourly wage of those providers, she said.

The estimated cost of providing case management services to recipients "to insure that their needs are met in the most appropriate, cost-effective manner possible" is \$890,000 for the next fiscal year, \$237,500 from the state general fund.

Ms. Caballero also estimated it will cost about \$65,000, half from the general fund, to hire two new staffers to write waivers seeking approval of home and community-based services, instead of institutionalization.

Expanded "respite care," giving a break to parents, children or others who provide personal care, would cost \$239,000, \$142,000 in state funding, she said.

The suggested legislation will be presented to the next session of the Legislature.

The goal of the proposals is to expand the personal care services available to people at home and avoid the need to put them in an institution to receive the services.

# Wyoming sends investigators to Evanston on explosion case

EVANSTON, Wyo. (AP) — Four state investigators, including an arson expert, were sent Thursday to look into the explosion at an Amoco gas processing plant that killed one man and injured 11.

Tim Reikofski, an fire-arson investigator based in Pinedale, was sent by the State Fire Marshal's office in answer to a request from the Wyoming Occupational Health and Safety Commission, according to Airmelia Lovato in the Fire Marshal's office.

Two safety investigators on assignment in Afon were sent down to Evanston to meet another investigator from Cheyenne, according to Steve Foster, assistant administrator for the health and safety office.

## Accused youth receives no bail

LEWISTON (AP) — Bail for a Lewiston teen-ager accused of killing his parents has been denied, although 2nd District Judge Ron Schilling has allowed a psychiatrist as an expert witness.

Bradley Thomasson, 17, is charged with two counts of first-degree murder in the Sept. 22 shooting deaths of Roy and Judith Ann Thomasson at their Lewiston home.

Authorities earlier testified Thomasson first said someone else killed them, then admitted to shooting the two following an argument with his father.

Schilling on Wednesday refused defense attorney Jeff Brudie's request for bail set at \$25,000. He did allow a psychiatrist to evaluate Thomasson.

## Craig picks manager

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Larry Craig says a former member of his Washington staff will head his 1990 re-election campaign.

Craig said Thursday Jeff Malmen, Boise, will serve as campaign manager and has opened a campaign office in Boise.

Malmen has worked for the Craig staff in Washington as a legislative assistant and also worked on the staff of Sen. Steve Symms and for the Idaho Republican Party.

He said Craig plans a "classic grassroots campaign."

Ohio "O.J." Reed of Evanston was killed in the blast when he was trapped beneath a wall that was toppled by the force of the explosion.

Two of the four men in the Utah Burn Center have been identified as Bill Rhodes, 44, of Chico, Texas, and

Bill Roberts, 42, of Evanston.

And a spokeswoman at LDS Hospital in Salt Lake City said the condition of Dale Price, 49, of Painted Post, N.Y., was upgraded from serious to serious but stable overnight. Price suffered rib and shoulder fractures and facial cuts in the incident.

Amoco officials suspect the gas leak that led to the explosion was caused by a faulty valve, but they did not know on Thursday what ignited the methane gas explosion.

"Had it not been for some unusual event, the gas might have simply escaped and been vented outside of the building," Amoco spokesman Dick Brewster said Thursday. "This is one of those tragic things where there shouldn't have been ignition and there was."

Brewster said Reed was among the 15 workers in the plant's gas compressor building, about one-quarter mile from the plant's main building, who tried to leave the building when a natural gas leak was detected.

# Official meets with opposition leaders

BERLIN (AP) — A Politburo member met with pro-democracy leaders Thursday, a first for the orthodox Communists who run East Germany, and authorities urged reform activists to stop voicing their demands in street protests.

Egon Krenz, the nation's new leader, spoke by telephone for 20 minutes with Cancellor Helmut Kohl of West Germany, the haven for tens of thousands of East Germans who fled their homeland in search of freedom. It was their first contact since Krenz replaced Erich Honecker as party chief last week.

ADN, the official news agency, said the national lawyers' union issued a statement calling for multiple-candidate elections and public control of vote counting. The two-hour meeting between Guenter Schabowski and two leaders of New Forum, largest of the new pro-democracy groups, was the first of a series of meetings between the ruling party Politburo with the opposition. New Forum is officially banned, although tolerated, and the party had said it would not talk to opposition groups.

Party Central Committee building, that the "talks were open and constructive."

"We presented New Forum's concepts and ideas," he said. Asked why Schabowski invited them, Reich said: "He told us he wanted to begin a new political course and wanted to learn about the whole political spectrum here."

"He said Schabowski assured him the government's new initiative in dialogue as a way of solving the nation's problems "was a real change and not a tactical move."

When asked if he believed that, the scientist replied: "We will see. I can say cautiously that I have a positive impression."

Official recognition of New Forum was discussed, Reich said, but Schabowski told him it was "beyond his capacity." The organization was banned last month.

ADN reported that Reich and Pflugbeil, described as "members of an initiative group that calls itself New Forum," had met with Schabowski.

New Forum, which advocates democratic change within the communist system, claims more than 15,000 members.

Krenz hinted Wednesday the opposition might be included in discussion of reform, but repeated that the Communist Party's leading role in society was not to be questioned.

# Bush spurns talks with Ortega at summit

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (AP) — Costa Ricans are throwing a fiesta for hemispheric leaders to celebrate their century-old democracy, but President Bush is arriving with a diplomatic dance card that leaves no room for Nicaragua's Daniel Ortega.

The Marxist president of Nicaragua made clear his eagerness to confer with join the U.S. president when 18 heads of state gather Friday for a two-day "summit of the Americas." Bush, under heavy pressure from domestic conservatives, is spurning Ortega's advances.

"I have no agenda with Mr. Ortega," Bush said during a White House interview with Latin-American journalists on Wednesday.

"We're not going down there to have some battle with Mr. Ortega. I'm not uptight about his being there," Bush said in the interview transcript released Thursday.

"I'm going to be polite, charming," he said. "If I did have an encounter (with Ortega), it would be very firm."

"Everybody knows we have a tense relationship, so I don't want to act like we're walking around there in great harmony, because we're not," the president said.

Bush is flying here with a different agenda, ready to discuss the challenges to hemispheric democracy from drug trafficking and burdensome foreign debt payments, and to champion the anti-Ortega campaign of Nicaraguan opposition.

Hundreds of Costa Ricans painted fences, repaired streets and cleaned up the face of this capital city of 1-million residents, and 4,000 armed policemen guarded roads, bridges, hotels and other strategic locations.

"The leaders of drug traffic have put a price on the heads of some of the presidents," said Information Minister Jorge Urbina, explaining the tight security precautions.

Bush also was expected to push for increased isolation of Panamanian Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega, whom Bush is trying to oust through regional pressures. Noriega wasn't invited to San Jose.

Neither were Cuba's Fidel Castro or the leaders of Haiti and Chile, because none assumed power through popular elections.

There was no fixed agenda for the two-day meeting which Costa Rican President Oscar Arias will open at midday Friday. The hemispheric leaders will be seated around a common table for lunch, dinner and a lengthy working session the first day.

On Saturday, when a plaza will be dedicated honoring 100 years of democratic government in this Central American nation of 3 million, Bush plans to confer with Mrs. Chamorro, publisher of the opposition newspaper in Nicaragua, at a breakfast for political leaders.

Bush last week signed a \$9 million bill to provide election-related assistance that will benefit Mrs. Chamorro's presidential campaign in the Feb. 25 election. U.S. officials have complained that the ruling Sandinista government's opponents have been denied sufficient access to the Nicaraguan news media.

Bush also will meet with Panamanian presidential candidate Guillermo Endara, whom the United States recognizes as the president-elect of his country.

Nicaraguan officials are eager to open talks with the Bush administration on a "normalization of relations." The United States, which regards Nicaragua as a threat to national security, has waged a proxy war against the Sandinista

government by financing the Contra guerrilla forces.

Last March, Bush reversed eight years of President Reagan's policy by endorsing a diplomatic rather than a military solution to the Nicaraguan conflict.

"This would seem an opportunity to open a process of conversation," Nicaraguan ambassador Saul Arana told a reporter in advance of the San Jose meeting. "Nicaragua has always wanted to talk to the United States."

Secretary of State James A. Baker III, who will accompany Bush here, has said the president will not hold any private talks with Ortega in San Jose.

"I doubt he would refuse to speak if spoken to," Baker said, "but he's not going to meet with him and he's not going to be extending any particular courtesies in that direction."

Plans for a joint communiqué expressing support for democracy and "environmental protection, proposed by Arias, were abandoned after Bush refused to sign any statement that bears Ortega's signature.

In addition, the Bush administration on Wednesday extended for another six weeks a 1985 trade embargo against Nicaragua, and complained to the Soviet Union that the Sandinistas were still shipping Soviet bloc weapons and ammunition to Marxist rebels in neighboring El Salvador.

# Report says martial law in China to be lifted soon

BEIJING (AP) — Martial law, entering its sixth month in Beijing, will be lifted soon, the People's Daily newspaper reported Thursday. "I cannot offer a timetable," government spokesman Yuan Mu told the newspaper. "(Martial law) is for a limited time and it seems that it will be lifted before very long."

He said the government already had reduced the scope of martial law "and will continue to do so" as the capital becomes more stable.

Yuan spoke Wednesday with journalists from the Nihon Keizai Shimbun, Japan's leading economic newspaper.

He noted that many foreigners have urged martial law be lifted in order to increase confidence in the government.

"We understand their feelings and will consider their suggestion," he said, but added that China would not yield to sanctions or other pressures. Although Western countries have never listed conditions, diplomats say privately that they are unlikely

to resume normal relations with China until martial law is lifted.

Premier Li Peng declared martial law in most of Beijing on May 20, when tens of thousands of college students occupied Tiananmen Square in the city center and demanded democratic reform. However, it was enforced only after June 3-4, when the army shot its way into the city, killing hundreds and perhaps thousands of people.

Under martial law, the army banned marches, strikes, class boycotts, giving speeches, distributing pamphlets, spreading rumors and other destructive actions.

It also banned foreign reporters from conducting interviews or making tapes or shooting videotape on the streets or at government offices, schools and factories. Enforcement of the ban has relaxed since midsummer, but all interviews still must be approved by martial law headquarters.

# 54 die in Taiwanese plane crash

TAIPEI, Taiwan (AP) — A China Airlines Boeing 737 carrying 54 people crashed into a mountain and burned Thursday just after taking off from the eastern city of Hualien, and all aboard were feared dead, officials said.

All on board were Taiwanese except for a passenger identified as a businessman from California. The airline gave his name as J. Wayne Phillips, 46, a vice president of Universal Paint Corp. in City of Industry, outside Los Angeles. A

company secretary said Phillips was in Taiwan on business.

The jet was en route from Hualien to Taipei, 93 miles away. Witnesses on a nearby highway said they could see the flames from the wreckage.

Hualien police said about 130 rescuers rushed to the crash site near Chia Min, a village of about 2,000 people. The site was accessible only by foot. It was expected to take them hours to reach the plane, and they were slowed by rain and darkness.

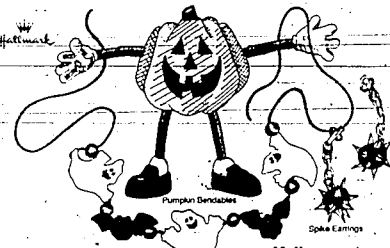

# Tagliabue chosen NFL commissioner

**CLEVELAND** — Paul Tagliabue, a Washington lawyer and one of Pete Rozelle's top advisers, was elected NFL commissioner Thursday, ending a four-month deadlock and allowing Rozelle to fade into retirement.

Tagliabue, the candidate of the insurgents who had blocked Jim Finks' election in July, was elected by a vote that Rozelle said was slightly less than unanimous after a five-member committee agreed unanimously to recommend him.

The committee worked nearly all night to resolve the differences between the so-called "old-guard" owners who supported Finks and the insurgents, mostly newer owners and those who had been left out of the decision-making process. They supported the 48-year-old Tagliabue even though he has been a league office insider for nearly two decades.

couldn't be elected, they agreed to support Tagliabue. It came 219 days after Rozelle announced his resignation last March 22.

"I'd prefer to talk about right guards and left guards than old guards and new guards," said Tagliabue, who flew in from Washington after he was notified around 10 a.m. that he had finally been selected.

"To me this is a minor problem of bringing people back together. I think it was a one-time issue, selecting a commissioner. I don't really see a split. I don't expect it to be permanent or produce blocs of any kind."

That was also the sentiment of those involved, including Finks supporters.

"The truth of the matter is that Paul Tagliabue is as much 'Old Guard' as anyone," said Modell, one of the members of the committee that first recommended Finks and one of the principal targets of the insurgents.

"Paul Tagliabue and I have worked together for years."

The deadlock over the selection of the league's seventh commissioner and its first

in 30 years began July 6, when 11 owners blocked the election of Finks, the president of the New Orleans Saints. He was the only candidate of a 6-man selection committee composed entirely of owners who had 20 years or more in the NFL. It included Modell, Mara and Dan Rooney of Pittsburgh, who chaired the committee that finally broke the impasse.

A second, more broadly based committee, then recommended Finks, Tagliabue and two others. An impasse set in, with the insurgents backing Tagliabue, one of Rozelle's closest advisers over the past decade.

In fact, the impasse often seemed to be more over the differences between the two sides than over the two final candidates.

"My congratulations go to Paul, he should make an outstanding commissioner and should serve the NFL for years to come," said the 62-year-old Finks, who on Tuesday turned down an offer to become "president for football operations" under Tagliabue.

Five into two won't go. So coaches and athletic directors in the Magic Valley Conference are something their heads over what happens if the conference ends in a five-way tie and how the league will decide two representatives to

## Jerome, Buhl battle for trip to state A-2 grid playoffs

**JEROME** — It certainly isn't unusual for a trip to the state Class A-2 football playoffs to ride on the outcome of a Jerome-Buhl football game as it does tonight.

But Buhl coach Jerry Ennis would like to be surrounded by players as his counterpart Greg Trenary will be in the final team huddle before kickoff at 7:30 p.m. at Murray O'Rourke Tiger Stadium.

At that point, the injury list will read Buhl (7 five starters), Jerome (0). The Indians will have just 24 men in uniform unless senior tackle Greg Paulsen gets late medical approval to play on a leg injury.

Buhl, 4-4, or Jerome, 5-3, will advance to the state A-2 playoffs and will host the runner-up from District 5, probably Snake River, in first round of the playoffs next week. The game will also be for the South-Central Idaho Conference championship if Ironmanning, Burley loses to Mountain Home Friday.

The Buhl sophomores got the weekend started with a 20-6 win over Jerome Thursday night.

"The last three weeks have been a disaster," says Ennis. "We went five weeks without an injury. Since then we've had seven go down, five of them starters."

Ennis said that while each injury has hurt Buhl, the Indians have been able to shuffle personnel here and there, received some great substitute play from reserves and covered with a little increase in offense and enthusiasm.

But then last week, junior Andy Yost left the South Fremont game with a knee injury that will shelve him for the season.

"Even with these other injuries, I thought our chances of winning this one were good. But when Andy went down, well, it just makes it a lot tougher."

Yost had 134 yards in seven carries to that point and had seasonal stats of 109 carries for

613 yards.  
"I just can't replace that kind of production," said Ennis. "It means we'll have to ask Ryan Bybee to carry the load both ways."  
Bybee, a backup fullback and starting inside linebacker, had that duty to do last year but to ashima wasn't able to continue.  
"In the first couple of games he had to take himself our four times because he simply couldn't breathe. I'm sure he's in better condition now and the weather is just what he needs. It's asking a lot of him against competi-

tion of this caliber," Ennis said.  
On the other side, Tremary said, "We're as healthy as we've been all year. We'll have (wideout Eric) Lott back (from an early-season injury)."  
The thing Tremary says Ennis must do is exactly what Ennis said would let them do—run the football.  
"We have to be able to run the ball. Just get down, open up some holes and come straight at them," Tremary said. "We have to win this game with the run."  
"Their running worries us most," says Ennis. "(Junior Gary) Showers is

improving rapidly now and we see that they're getting (usual tight end) Tracy Dixon in on some running plays with end-arounds and lining him up back there at times."  
"In eight games, Showers has carried the ball 94 times for 709 yards this season, an average of 7.5 yards per carry. Dixon has caught 15 passes for 238 yards and a touchdown."  
Neither team comes into the game with a big reputation for throwing but both coaches maintain they are no equals about doing it.  
Shane Burton (42-108, 771 yards, nine interceptions, eight touch-

downs) handles Jerome's throwing and Ennis has shown a preference for looking to Dixon first. Lately Showers has come into the receiving corps and Jason Wilson never left. Wilson has caught nine passes for 185 yards and three touchdowns as well as carrying the ball 46 times for 284 yards and a touchdown.  
"Burton is a much improved thrower from early in the year and we have to be able to put pressure on him," Ennis said.  
Similarly, Tremary calls Buhl's Dan Winth an improving passer with the ability to go deep. Winn has complet-

ed 70 of 170 passes for 971 yards, eight touchdowns and seven interceptions.  
"We think stopping the Winn to (Jeremy) Schabot deep routes is a defensive key for us along with stopping their crossing action in the backfield with the unbalanced power 1," Tremary said.  
Schabot has caught 21 passes for 367 yards, but Ennis says the emergence of Dan Wilson as a tight end the past three weeks has put extra teeth into the Buhl passing game. Wilson has caught 13 passes for 193 yards.  
"Everyone knew that Winn had a

preference for going deep. Now he's reading better and throwing the shorter routes well," Ennis said.  
"The other factor in this equation, both coaches agree, is the suggestion of the weather that it could be wet and stormy Friday night."

"I had to think twice before I switched a kid who set a school record in passing to running back," said second-year coach Jeff Savage. "But we lost the three kids who we had thought would be playing running back on the varsity this year, and with (junior) Justin Robinson coming up at quarterback, we felt we had to make the change."  
"I think this was OK," said Allen, who hadn't played running back since the fifth grade. "It's been a different experience and it's been fun."  
"Allen hasn't been alone in transforming last year's winless Bobcats into the state's first winning team since 1958, but it's far from being the catalyst. To understand why, look back 12 months.  
A year ago, Savage came to town and installed the run—and-shoot offense, an approach absolutely new to the players in the Magic Valley program. The necessary ingredients for the run—and-shoot are quickness and strength.  
Allen, like many of his teammates, had plenty of the former but little of latter.

"Jason weighed 132 pounds and he could bench (press) 130 pounds," recalls Savage. "He was real small and weak. He got thrown around like a rag doll, had teeth bashed, everything. Then he went to work in the weight room. He got to 152 pounds and he can bench 200."  
"Jason gets a lot of touchdowns on breakaway runs, but he can get the tough yards too," said Savage.  
"Coach Savage is committed to the weight program, and I'd say that's the biggest reason for Jason's improvement and the improvement of our team," said Jones. "He's just a lot stronger, tougher and harder to bring down."  
He's also just about the ideal back for the run—and-shoot.  
"There are three kinds of running backs," said Savage. "The first kind runs right over you, runs in a straight line and gets yards by size and strength. The second kind runs around you, gets yards by speed. The third kind, and the fastest, is the kind who sees the field, who knows what is developing and reacts to it. That's the kind of back Jason is. I've been coaching eight years, and he's only the second one of that kind I've had."

Allen also plays cornerback, where he has 19 unassisted tackles, 42 assisted tackles and an interception.  
"Yeah, I get tired," Allen said. "A lot of times when I go back on offense from defense, I'm hopping for a pass play."  
Allen carries a 4.0 grade-point-average and wants to attend the Air Force Academy, where an underused option quarterback named Dec Dowis plays football.  
"Knowing Jason, I think he'll probably get said 'yeah, if I get first and if he still wants to play football, who knows? He's small, but everybody in the Air Force Academy is small (by college football standards). Right now Jason weighs one pound less than Dowis."  
For now, Allen and his teammates, who play their last regular-season game tonight in Mountain Home, can only sit and wait to see if the Tigers beat Caldwell next week, giving Burley a shot at a playoff for a berth in the playoffs.  
And savor his school's second winning season in the '80s.  
"I kind of had a feeling we were going to win everything around this year," he said.

**THE ACES ON BRIDGE**

Who is more foolish, the child  
afraid of the dark or the man afraid  
of the light? — Maurice Frechill.

South saw only the bogey man in  
his play of today's game. He had  
good reason to fear an enemy ruff;  
he had no reason not to calmly  
count his possible losers.

East overtook West's spade king  
and shifted shrewdly to his diamond  
five, announcing (silently of course)  
to one and all that this was a  
singleton.

Declarer won in dummy and led a  
tempting trump 10, East refusing  
the bait and playing his trump six  
with no concern. South couldn't be-  
ar losing to a singleton honor with

West, so he won his ace and led back  
another trump, hoping to find a lit-  
tle luck. No deal. East won his  
trump queen and switched to clubs,  
netting the defense a plus score.

South's fears were unfounded.  
Suppose he had lost to West's hypo-  
thetical singleton trump honor.  
What would have happened? West  
would have returned a diamond for  
East to ruff but that would have  
closed shop. South would have won  
the next trick and drawn the last  
trump, and dummy's fifth diamond  
would have taken care of South's  
club loser.

Note the effectiveness of the  
North-South pre-emptive auction.  
East-West can make four spades  
but neither player has an easy entry  
into the auction.

## A capella ensemble kicks off series

TWIN FALLS — Serving as educators as well as entertainers and artists, Chanticleer — billed as "America's premiere vocal ensemble" — will kick off the 1989-1990 Arts on Tour season Monday.

Slated for an 8 p.m. concert at the College of Southern Idaho's Fine Arts Auditorium, Chanticleer is based in San Francisco. But Music Director Joseph Jennings said in a phone interview this week that the ensemble was performing in Wichita, Kan., when the earthquake struck Northern California last week.

Calls made to Chanticleer's office for an interview originally set for last week didn't go through. But Jennings said the office and singers' homes made it through the temblor without too much trouble. "Everything stood up well," he noted.

Chanticleer, named after the comic rooster in Geoffrey Chaucer's "Canterbury Tales," is an all-male "orchestra of voices" that performs a capella, or without accompaniment.

The group began in 1978 when director Louis Botto invited several singers from San Francisco's Grace Cathedral and the San Francisco Symphony Chorus to an informal reading of early- and Renaissance music. He was impressed enough by the results that he booked the group into a concert hall.

For several years, the ensemble kept a fairly low profile around its Bay-area base. But in 1980, the group landed a contract with Columbia Artists Management, the organization that puts together Community Concerts packages. Chanticleer's fortunes were further bolstered that year when conductor Robert Shaw heard the group.

"It was one of the most beautiful musical experiences of my life," Shaw said after the show. "The audience was mesmerized."

Chanticleer is still best known for its interpretations of centuries-old music. Its program here will include works by composers such as Thomas Tallis (who lived circa 1505-1585), Orlando Gibbons (1584-1625), William Byrd (1543-1623) and Andrea Gabrieli (1533-1585).

But the ensemble isn't rooted entirely in the past. Chanticleer is known to have a soft spot for spirituals and gospel music, and it will also perform barbershop tunes, folk songs, Cole Porter and "With a Poet's Eye," a modern work by a young 20th-century composer, Gary John Franklyn.

Chanticleer, Jennings explained, is part of a four-ensemble consortium that regularly commissions works by contemporary composers; the other participating groups are the Plymouth Music Series of Minnesota (which commissioned the "Franklyn" work), New York City's Gregg Smith Singers and the Washington Oratorio Society.

## Hollywood makes money going straight to videos

It was supposed to be John Travolta's big comeback film. After four years away from films — the mega-flop "Perfect" had been his last picture — the actor who was once Hollywood's darling was scheduled earlier this year to make his glorious return to the silver screen.

Instead, he was back on the little screen. Paramount's "The Experts," a comedy directed by Dave Thomas (of television's " SCTV ") never made it to major theaters. There was no world premiere, no advertising blitz, no wide release in 1,000 cinemas across America.

The film can now be found at the friend-

ly neighborhood video store.

"The Experts" joins a long list of films, featuring name stars, that distributors deem — usually after test previews in selected cities — not to be worth the millions that a national advertising campaign would cost. Instead, film companies cut their losses and issue the movies to video stores.

These straight-for-almost-straight-to-video films can generally be divided into three groups.

First there are those with substantial budgets and star names, such as "The Experts," that are never given any national theatrical marketing but do receive special attention to problems in ideological tendencies.

The receptiveness to the wide chronological variety of Chanticleer's programs "depends on the audience," Jennings explained. "Some concert patrons attend specifically to hear one kind of music or another, but leave with an appreciation of

## Newly creative Chinese filmmakers face censors

BEIJING — Uncertain times lie ahead for China's movie industry, which faces new political constraints just as a generation of young, ambitious directors strives to compete on international screens.

Like others in the art world, studio heads and directors are waiting to see the full impact of the crackdown on liberalism that has followed the June crackdown on student-led demonstrations for democratic reform.

The early signs have not been encouraging. The central government's Film Bureau, which supervises all movies, has fired the head of the Beijing Film Studio for unspecified political errors, and sent a special team led by bureau director Teng Jingxian

to "rectify" the studio. Liu Cheng, in charge of censorship at the bureau, said he sent "urgent telegrams" this fall to China's two most innovative studios, the Xian Film Studio in western China and the Pearl River Film Studio in Canton, warning them to "pay special attention to problems in ideological tendencies."

Asked what that meant, Liu laughed and said, "When they see (the warning), they understand."

Film officials did not even try to select this year's best movie in the Golden Globe competition, China's politically charged version of the Academy Awards. The selection was hard enough in past years, when awards were sometimes delayed for months while officials debated the political merits of the nominated for artistic reasons. This year, officials said no movies were accept-

able. All studios, like other work units, have been ordered to hold special classes to study recent Communist Party documents on the battle against "bourgeois liberalism," or anti-socialist ideas, and the need for art to serve socialism.

Liu said at the Film Bureau, the classes take up two half-days a week — far more than ordinary work units.

Two of China's leading film directors were overseas when the crackdown began, and one, Chen Kaige, has said he won't return. He plans to make a documentary about the June army attack on Beijing protesters, in which hundreds and possibly thousands were killed.

The other, Xian studio head Wu Tianming, has not been in touch with his studio since he left for Canada in April to attend

the opening of a joint Chinese-Canadian movie about China's first emperor.

Studio officials say they don't know if Wu will return, and Liu acknowledged it was "hard to say" if Wu would be allowed to keep his job if he did. Wu's blunt criticisms of government censors' long have gotten him in trouble, and his studio's movies have angered some officials by depicting rural poverty and mindless bureaucracy.

But Apple believes the straight-to-video market is still the primary province of independent productions. "It's rare when a major studio cannot produce a theatrical release," he says. "We were very surprised to see what happened to 'The Experts,' having a very minor release in Texas."

The majority of straight-to-video titles are "Fat Guy Goes Nutzoid," "Attack of the Killer Bimbos" and "Surf Nazis Must Die." "Video has caused a lot of these movies to be made that wouldn't have been made before because there is a fallback position (for revenue)," says Steven Apple, executive editor of Video Insider, a trade magazine for the video industry.

# Burke wins friends, praise as TV character with 'Up' syndrome

**UNIVERSAL CITY, Calif.** — The waitress wants to shake his hand. A lady from Ohio comes that she just loves his show. It is all too new and too exciting for Chris Burke, but these accolades and the fact his stylist says he is doing broadly, pumps his well-wishers' hands, says happily, "Thank you, Chris Burke. This is my dad." Preciate it, thank you. Hope you like the second episode.

Burke is having a swell time being a television star, but there's more to his glee than that: He's proving something. A man edges up to the restaurant table where Burke is demystifying a plateful of ribs to introduce his son; who looks to be teaged and who solemnly says, "You do a good job." The teenager, Burke's father comments quietly after including a few words about shakes and thans, has Down's syndrome. "You mean 'up' syndrome," Chris counters.

syndrome ("just a mild case of it," he insists) and has struggled with the mental retardation that accompanies it. Corky, the TV character who is being "mainstreamed" into a public high school, is supposed to be 18; Burke turned 24 last month and has always attended special schools.

Burke says that though they are very much the same likable young man — full of good humor, encircled by family, focused on the sunny side.

Burke's manifest amiability, in fact, is the reason a show called "Life Goes On," starring the actor, Michael Brave-man, had cast him in a pilot two years ago, having located him through a mutual acquaintance involved both in television production and in Down's organizations.

"Chris was on screen about six scenes and he was terrific," Brave-man recalls by phone. "He was so ingenious and appealing; he jumped off the screen."

The pilot went nowhere, but ABC programming execs wondered if there weren't another project Brave-man could build around Burke. The resulting family drama is a murder, but anyone who calls to integrate a mentally retarded actor into

the cast. "We knew it was risky," Brave-man says, "but why not give it a shot?"

The show shone in the ratings on its premiere outing but has, as expected, dropped off since moving to Sundays, opposite "60 Minutes"; critics' opinions aside, the network decision to cancel or to bump it off-looms in late fall.

But for Burke, the experience has already been life-altering. A year ago he walked every weekday morning from his family's apartment on Manhattan's East Side to the College of Education building, where he ran the elevator. He liked his job, cared for the disabled children he worked with as a volunteer, took courses in improvisation and filmmaking at an afterschool program for the handicapped. But this, this is something altogether different, another universe. "If it goes well," Burke announces gaily, "it's 'Hello, Hello...'"

Burke appeared in school plays like "The Emperor's New Clothes." This didn't prepare him, of course, for the rigors of shooting 13 episodes of a TV series. It's hard to learn lines? "Yes, it is."

Burke nods. "Learning it by heart or the top of your head. I do have this dialogue coach" — he spells her name out carefully, as he is wont to do. He has an acting coach too. He knows everyone's proper title and credits and whether he or she has ever won an Emmy.

The show's writers try to keep Burke's workload manageable. "The scripts are very carefully structured for him," Brave-man explains. "He has a presence in a lot of scenes where he doesn't have many lines. The other characters carry the bulk of the dialogue. I don't want to diminish his role at all — he does a lot of work — but we have to respect his limitations."

It has meaning to him beyond his own success. Chris Burke was born pre-nursing, when society was less prepared to help children with Down's syndrome live in the wider world. "Going back to his time, even doctors were not very sensitive," his father, Frank, recalls. "Many would tell you, 'You know, you should consider institutionalizing him.'"

"May I interrupt?" Chris asks, and launches into a long account of a

television movie called "Kids Like This," starring "the Emmy Award-winning actress" Tyne Daly. "Back in the early '40s they used to call Down's syndrome infants and babies mongoloids," he goes on.

"It's very hard for parents. In 'Kids Like This,' the mother says, 'How would you like to have your kid called retarded?' Dana's syndrome-kid-sen-tence is like Corky. That's the way I feel about it... For those kids who have Down's syndrome, to give them a chance."

Frank gently picks up the story, how New York's special ed program at the time would have required hours of bus-riding, how mainstreaming barely existed, how Chris instead went to special schools in New York and Massachusetts and

graduated from the Don Gunnella School in Springfield, Pa.

How much better it is to be recognized by ticket agents at airports and to receive letters of encouragement and praise. (How many? Chris "Thousands!" Dad: "Maybe around 25 or so.") A few parents of children with Down's syndrome have written to complain that the character Corky is a "high-functioning" — that some children with the disorder are more severely retarded. At the National Down's Syndrome Society in New York, however, staffers exult that "Life Goes On" shows a young man who is giving the capable, fully human in a way television rarely has recognized. "I think he's going to be a role model for so many people," Brave-man says. "He knows how far he has come."

movie industry, more accustomed to socialist morality tales.

Young directors at other studios joined the movement to make realistic movies of modern life, adopting first techniques from abroad, and finally, China's film industry had finally matured.

No movies of the new school have been released since the June crack-

down, only copies of the Communist revolution timed to celebrate the 40th anniversary of its victory in October 1949.

But Wang Jin, vice president of the Pearl River studio, said in an interview that he had already approved a movie the studio shot before June depicting smuggling and other illegal activities.

Last spring, Pearl River released what it billed as China's "first sex movie" in a story of a marriage in a 1940s fishing village. "I think we can still make this kind of movie," Wang said.

But the studio will no longer test the censors by sending their love scenes it thinks likely to be cut — it will make the cuts itself, he said.

Directors Yan Xueshu and Zhou Xiaowen at the Xian studio also said they hope to continue their experimental work.

"Movements happen. We are used to them," Zhou said. If the government insisted on changing a movie he made, he added boldly, "I'd resign." "And start your own studio?" Yan asked him sarcastically.

are from independent producers, most agree.

"Videos have become today's drive-ins," says film maker Gorman Bechard of Waterbury, Conn. Bechard, who produces and directs such low-budget independent films as "Psychos in Love" and "Galactic Goals," says Hollywood films that did not quite make it were once moved to the "B" circuit, the bottom movie of a double bill or the late show on television. When a film was a major embarrassment, sometimes the studio would not release it at all.

Tom Ginzadowski, another independent film maker based in Meriden, Conn., says major studios have realized the potential for low-budget films for the video market. Now, he says, the market is overrun with "A" film that failed in previews.

Among the more notable major studio films that went straight, or almost straight, to video are:

- "Walk Like a Star" was how MGM made a major film role for the disgraced Blake Edwards film "A Fine Mess." Mandel was actively promoting the film,

"The Men's Club" spent eight of the video stores despite its impressive cast: David Dukes, Richard Jordan, Frank Langella, Harvey Keitel, Roy Scheider, Treat Williams and Craig Wasson.

"John and Tate," Roy Scheider and Adam Baldwin's "Full Metal Jacket" kidnap young-Harley Cross and embark on a trip across the Southwest.

Now all straight-to-video movies are awful, although they are often

associated that way by the company they keep.

Films such as "Tape Heads," "The Wizard of Lunches," "Sly People" and "Prince of Pennsylvania" have their cult supporters who feel that in their abandonment to video, gems can be found.

"Everyone likes to point to 'Brazil,'" Bechard says. "That was a major film which the studio (Universal City Studios) didn't want to release and was set to go straight to video." The director, Terry Gilliam, wrote a copy of the video, showed it to Los Angeles film critics, who named it best picture of the year. It forced the studio to give it a theatrical release. other styles they had heard.

"We broaden our audiences' perspectives," said Jennings. But the educational process isn't forced; a viewing of a videotaped Chanticleer performance revealed an ensemble of men who enjoy what they do and an audience clearly appreciating the group's efforts.

Chanticleer is actually two ensembles: an eight-man chorus and a 12-man group. The eight-man ensemble that will be appearing in Twin Falls includes countertenors Kenneth Finch and Foster Sommerland; tenors Kevin Baum, Matthew Thompson and Neal Rogers; baritone-Glad-Romney; bass-baritone-Frank Albers, who also serves as assistant conductor; substituting for

Jennings, who will not be on tour; and bass Karl Schmidt.

In the coming months, according to Jennings, Chanticleer plans several singing sessions (the ensemble already has made two recordings, including two for the prestigious Harmonia Mundi label). It'll be returning to Europe to participate in a Voices Festival in Holland, and it will visit several residences in schools both in the Bay Area and other cities on the tour itinerary.

Chanticleer is the only full-time choir in the United States that is not associated with another company, and it's the only one of its kind paying its singers a salary. "This is all we do for our singers," Jennings says. "We exist as a singing organization."

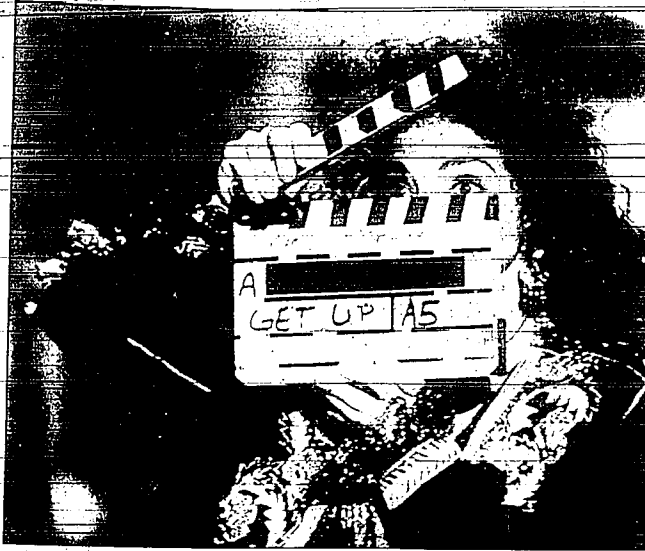

## Gloria Estefan's Spanish versions of her songs bring wide support

MIAMI (AP) — With the recording of two of the Miami Sound Machine's latest songs in Spanish as well as English, Gloria Estefan's return to her roots is not only a nice gesture, but smart business.

Estefan, a Cuban immigrant, recorded and released her hit song "Don't Want to Lose You" in English and Spanish this summer. Another song, "Oye Mi Canto" ("Hear My Voice"), was just released in Europe with the bilingual touch. Even the music videos were done in both languages.

pected to have grown only 9.9 percent.

And that Hispanic population is younger than the overall population, which translates into more sales and more exposure.

Irish rocker Laura Branigan said she hopes to capture a bigger Hispanic market by making two separate albums. Branigan, who recorded "Gloria" in 1982, is working on two albums that will have the same music but English lyrics on one and Spanish on the other.

"I just thought it was a little plus," Estefan said prior to leaving on a European concert tour. "I don't want to alienate my Spanish fans because they have been good to me for a long time."

The Miami Sound Machine is one of the first major rock groups to put both a Spanish and English version of the same song on one LP.

"Cuts Both Ways" has hit the top of the charts, and the compact discs and cassettes have the two different versions.

"What is happening for the Spanish-speaking people is they feel proud about it because you didn't forget them, so you identify with them," said Emilio Estefan, Gloria's husband and music producer who also is a Cuban immigrant. "For the American people, it's something new. And they like it."

That tested true when Estefan and the group recorded and released "Anything for You" in both English and Spanish a couple of years ago.

"Anything for You" in English was a hit, and the Spanish version gave it that final kick," said Larry Stessel, vice president of West Coast operations in Los Angeles for CBS records, the label that distributes the Miami Sound Machine.

That "final kick," perhaps, is coming from the growing audience of Hispanics in the United States. The U.S. Census Bureau estimates the country's Hispanic population will have grown by 34.5 in the last 10 years. Yet, the total population is ex-

and released the songs to radio listeners in both languages at the same time, Estefan said.

"We don't do it because it's more commercial or because we want to sell more albums. We do it because it's very natural for us," Estefan said. "People feel proud about it, and we feel very lucky that we've been able to do something for our people."

And it's that sensitivity that makes Gloria Estefan and the Miami Sound Machine unique, Stessel said. If Don Jovi wanted to record and release a song in both English and Spanish, Stessel said it might not work as well.

"I don't think that it's necessarily where rock 'n' roll is going. I think it gets back to what comes naturally," Stessel said. "Gloria does it because she's Cuban. This is something she does naturally."

## Manny's caters to music stars

NEW YORK (AP) — Henry Goldrich is the guy who told Harry Chapin that "Taxi" ran too long to be a hit. He's also the guy who kicked George Benson out of his store because of that amazing guitar.

Back in the '60s, I told Paul (Simon) that Simon and Garfunkel was a lousy name. And I still think it is," says Goldrich.

Fortunately, musicians want instruments and not advice from Goldrich — which is why his music store, Manny's on West 48th Street, has served everyone from Dizzy Gillespie to Guns N' Roses in the past five decades.

The Beatles invaded Manny's before they did the rest of the country; these '60s Beatlemania buyers hit guitars there, Mick Jagger was looking for the right ax for this year's Stones' tour when he ran into Bo Diddley. David Johansen has been a customer since he was a New York Doll; he visits, now as Buster Poindexter.

"The Who" when they were in town, doing the show — they were in here. Except Daltrey. He bought a guitar once and never played it," says Goldrich, dropping names as fast as Clapton works a fret board.

"They came to my son's bar mitzvah; flew over. They're friends."

Goldrich, a gray-haired, bearded man with a slight pot belly, is the son of the original Manny and current keeper of the family business.

His dad established the store in Harlem 54 years ago, and they became a 38th Street fixture in the late '40s. The musicians followed and never left.

"It's word of mouth. We have a very long and great reputation," says Goldrich, whose earliest recollection of the store involve a nosing John Coltrane asleep on an upstairs couch.

Manny's customer list reads like a history of American music: Charlie Parker in the '40s; Buddy Holly in the '50s; Eric Hendrix in the '60s; Paul Simon in the '70s; David Byrne in the '80s. Most have provided autographed pictures, an invaluable collection that covers the walls of the store.

Elvis Presley is the only big rock star who never walked in the store. "We delivered stuff to his hotel," says Goldrich.

Manny's and Rudy's Music-Stop across the street still cater to the big names, but most of their old neighbors are gone. There were once 25

music stores along the strip that comprised the Big Apple's bandstand. Today, a half-dozen remain, the rest replaced by the westward creep of Rockefeller Center and the eastern wave of grocery stores and fast-food joints.

Such intrusions don't mean the area has lost its magnetism for musicians, who still pass through midtown construction and the surrounding porno shops to check out what's what.

"Go to West 48th Street to look at all the guitars and amps. Go to Manny's and Rudy's. Look at all the great new equipment. That's my idea of a good time," Lou Reed told Rolling Stone. Most musicians heed his advice.

Guns N' Roses featured the store in their video for "Paradise City." Soviet rock star Boris Grebenshchikov hit the 48th Street shops shortly after arriving in the United States to examine the merger of music and capitalism. Mark Knopfler turned the time into a sideman at Rudy's Music Stop.

Part-time Rudy's worker Jack Somi met Knopfler through the makeup and hair salon, Dine Strahl's, which began frequenting in 1979.

## Boy George hopes for comeback

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Boy George, the androgynous former president of Culture Club, is trying to climb back up the pop charts after surviving the crushing downers of heroin addiction and the overdose deaths of two friends.

"I'm totally relaxed about my life," he says, declaring a new state of mind. "I'm totally relaxed about what I am and what I do and what I feel."

Boy George has come to the United States on a temporary visa, the first time he has been allowed to do so since his 1986 conviction for heroin possession in England.

The conviction, which led to the disintegration of the hit-making Culture Club one year later, forced the singer into a rehabilitation program. Treatment was complicated by the drug-related deaths of two close friends, one at Boy George's London mansion.

During a recent visit to Los Angeles, Boy George, whose real name is George O'Donoghue, described himself as happy and healthy, with an understanding that life isn't always perfect.

"I think a lot of the things that happen to me are self-created," he said. "There are still days when I get

out of the bed on the wrong side and everything goes wrong. That happens to all of us."

His current solo album, "High Hat" was released to favorable reviews earlier this year but didn't get much airplay in this country. He hopes his U.S. visit will spur interest in a soon-to-be-released single, "Whisper."

The singles, previously released from the album were "quite funny" and didn't appeal to Top 40 radio stations, he said. He also believes some radio programmers don't think the public can forgive him for his past problems.

But Boy George doesn't seem concerned that his popularity might have waned over the past three years.

"I have a place in the music industry," he said. "I have a really good following — a loyal following. I think you really can't ask for more than that."

Now 28, Boy George hit the music scene at the start of the decade as a backup singer with the British group Bow Wow Wow. In those days he was known as Lieutenant Lush. He eventually formed his own group, the Sex Gang Children, which later evolved into the interna-

tionally successful quartet Culture Club. Boy George assumed the role as the group's most visible member, attracting attention with "gobs-of-makeup and a smooth-as-silk voice in a 6-foot frame."

"If you look at the pop industry, not a lot of people stick out as being particularly interesting," he said. "I think at the time we were the most colorful thing happening."

Culture Club's four albums — "Kissing to Be Clever," "Colour by Numbers," "Waking Up With the House on Fire" and "From Luxury to Heartache" — quickly became bestsellers in the first half of the 1980s. This was largely due to a unique style that combined pop, funk, reggae and soul.

Boy George, however, remains humble when it comes to Culture Club's popularity.

"We were really lucky. We were just in the right place at the right time," he said. "It's a bit like trying to catch a taxi."

But the Culture Club's taxi took a wrong turn.

In July 1986, Boy George was arrested in London for heroin possession. He pleaded guilty to the charge, was fined \$370 and agreed to enter a treatment program.

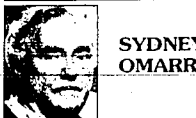

# City gangsters, Kentucky backwoods clash in 'Next of Kin'

"Next of Kin" is about families. One is a family of gangsters. The other is a country clan. Each has its own code, and when both square off in Chicago, each brings the weapons it knows.

This clash of cultures is an inter-

esting concept, and this is an interesting war, but the film doesn't always work. As a mixture of heavy drama and humor, it misses.

Other directors have managed to do this — combine the two styles — but director John Irvin ("Raw

Deal") and writer Michael Jennings don't quite achieve their goal. The lighter scenes play nicely, but the heavier ones are too heavy, and all this makes for an uneasy mix.

Most of the film, however, is exciting. The first half-hour is strong, but beyond that the movie hops along, dropping body after body.

Patrick Swayze stars. He plays

Truman Gates, a Kentuckian who has left home to join the Chicago police department. His younger brother is also in Chicago. When mobster hijack the younger brother's truck, he is executed by one of the major members of the gang.

When word of the killing reaches Kentucky, a third Gates brother travels to Chicago. He wants the killer, and he intends to wage this war in his own way. In one scene, he destroys a number of pinball machines. It's very heartening. In his own way, Brian (Liam Neeson) is someone you might want to know.

He isn't, however, always careful, so his brother the cop beats some sense into him in a bar. Convinced, Brian agrees to do it the right way, but you really can't take the man's word. The code of the mountain is strong, and when it calls, Brian listens. He wants to even the scales. He knows who the killer is, and he intends to take the man down.

The final showdown takes place in a cemetery. This is supposed to have its humorous side, but it doesn't quite work because there has been too much killing along the way. If the writer and director had gone easier on the mayhem, the face-off in the graveyard would have been much more amusing.

As it is, you do laugh, but uneasily. While the gangsters use the weapons they know, the mountain men — whose ranks, by this time have swelled to use the weapons they know. No sense in telling you what they are. It's best you see all

this for yourself.

The movie is not without its clichés. We have all those eating scenes that are mandatory in a gangland movie. We also see Gates, wife and threatened by the bad guys (the "Blackboard jungle" legacy) and when Joey, chief bad guy, listens to music it is Mario Lanza singing something from "The Student Prince." The gangsters in the older movies always listened to opera. Here, it is opera. Progress.

One of the film's more iron lines is delivered by Joey, who tells the gang leader the mountain man: "These guys are crazy," he says. "They don't give a damn about anything." That's the sort of thing that is

always said about the Mafia. Here, it is said about the mountain people, and the point is well made. Each society has its code.

Adam Baldwin is Joey, and Michael L. Ballou is the hotel clerk who puts in the call that brings the remaining mountain men to Chicago. Helen Hunt is Truman's wife. The minute she announces that she is pregnant, we know what is going to happen.

"Next of Kin" is a mix, one that could have been better than it is. As it is, it is seriously flawed, although not to the point of disaster.

"Next of Kin," which carries an R rating, is showing at theaters across the country.

# 'The Bear' achieves power, epic quality

The following are capsule reviews of movies now showing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**THE BEAR (PG).** Jean-Jacques Annaud's adaptation of the (1916) James Oliver Curwood novel — about a fierce grizzly and a lovable cub pursued implicitly by two hunters through the Canadian Rockies — is one family film with epic purity and power. You'd have to go back to the first half of 1979's "The Black Stallion" to find something comparable. The spectacular setting — actually the Bavarian Alps — is bathed in frosty clear light, caught with glacial purity by the great cinematographer Philippe Rousselot.

The two bears — big Bart and little Bruce — are tremendous camera subjects and the script, by Polanski's screenwriter, Gerard Brach, is full of life-embracing idealism and a touch of dark, sophisticated wit.

**BLACK RAIN (R).** Director Ridley Scott gives this typical, simple-minded fish-out-of-water thriller — with Michael Douglas as a motorcycle cop set loose in Japan with some leftover plot from "Coogan's Bluff" — so much style and dazzle, the movie becomes a triumph of matter over mind. It's like film noir cooked in Osaka and Tokyo are converted into a futuristic fantasy city on the "Blade Runner" level, neon blaring through a wilderness of rainy streets and towering angular architecture, where bad yakuzas and good cops (Ken Takakura) duel in the webbing. The movie is a blast of pure sensation: shallow but scintillating.

**AN INNOCENT MAN (R).** This cautionary thriller by director Peter Yates, with Tom Selleck as an air-line mechanic framed and imprisoned by two gonzo cops, has a chance to be a canny blend of gutsy melodrama and "I accuse" against the prison system. But, by the end, it's gone as slick and corrupt as the crafty old con F. Murray Abraham plays, precociously mixing in the genre conventions and the gangly jail-yard realism into a startlingly vicious, and even somewhat racist, brew. Morally, this movie is PG, as well.

## Rock and Roll Hall of Fame will induct 8 new members

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Who, Bobby Darin, the Four Tops and Simon and Garfunkel were among eight recording artists selected to the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

The hall will be inducted in January in New York City along with The Four Seasons, The Kinks, The Platters and Hank Ballard in the class of 1990.

Their selections bring to 43 the number of recording acts chosen for the hall of fame.

In addition to the eight inductees, three "early influencers" were selected to be honored at the as-yet-unbuilt hall of fame and museum in the past three years.

Louis Armstrong, jazz musician Charlie Christian and blues pioneer Ma Rainey.

This year's selection of inductees was announced at a news conference by Paul Shaffer, band leader on NBC's "Late Night with David Letterman" and musical director of the rock hall induction ceremony.

"This is a big year for me, personally. It's starting to move into my era," Shaffer quipped. "The first album I ever bought was a Four Seasons Golden Hits. I still have that record I bought."

"Bobby Darin was an idol of mine. I love the Four Tops, Simon and Garfunkel, Hank Ballard. ... I'm thrilled with this year's inductees," he said.

Rock music historian Norm N. Nite, who has two syndicated radio "rock 'n' roll" oldies shows, called the latest group of selections "a good cross section" of musical style. Nite, a member of the rock hall board, said the class represents an effort to honor entertainers who are long overdue for recognition.

"We're trying to get caught up on a lot of people owed getting in. As years go by, it will get tighter and tighter," Nite said.

Two songwriting teams will be inducted in the non-performing music industry category, although some have been important performers as well. The writers include the teams of Brian Holland, Lamont Dozier and Eddie Holland, and Gerry Goffin and Carole King.

Groundbreaking for the \$48 million hall of fame and museum is set for next year in downtown Cleveland next to the Cuyahoga River. Larry Thompson, who is heading a fund-raising effort in Cleveland, said he hopes to reach an interim goal of \$40 million by Nov. 15.

## Viewers dislike video ads

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Consumers have had it with commercials on the videocassettes they rent, even as more car and soft-drink spots are being spliced onto movie tapes.

Sixty-six percent of VCR owners surveyed say they fast-forward through commercials at the beginning of rented movies, according to a Nielsen Media Research study released at a recent Video Software Dealers Association convention.

And more than 60 percent of those surveyed say they zip through coming attractions.

Despite the renters' unhappiness, though, the commercials won't be going away anytime soon.

MCA Home Video's upcoming release of "The Land Before Time" will carry a Pizza Hut pitch. "Rain Man" features a Buick plug. A Fish Called "Wanda" hypes Schweppes, and "Young Guns" hawk's Nestle.

"A number of promoters created a ruckus at the convention by offering to open prerecorded cassettes and at-

tach commercials for local merchants.

Video Air Time of Midland, Texas, will put spots for florists, bowling alleys, attorneys and department stores on any cassette where there's room.

"We're offering the video store owner an additional source of revenue," said Terry Mathis, Video Air Time's vice president for franchising. "The video store owns the cassette. And if we didn't make an unauthorized infringement of the copyrighted material, we have violated no law."

Video Air Time charges about \$20 per commercial per cassette, of which the store owner receives about \$1 a tape.

Paramount Pictures has filed a \$1 million lawsuit against St. Louis-based Video Broadcasting Systems, alleging that the company has placed commercials on "Beverly Hills Cop II," "Raiders of the Lost Ark," and "Eddie Murphy Raw" in some mar-

# 'The Final Days' offers an emotional treatment of Nixon's Watergate years

So you never thought you'd shed a tear for Richard Nixon? Well, get out the Kleenex.

On Sunday night, Oct. 29, when ABC airs "The Final Days," even die-hard Nixon bashers might be hard-pressed to keep a dry eye. Television may be lousy at conveying ideas, but when it comes to eliciting emotion, stand back. Cold objectivity tends to melt when you see the effect of larger events on mere mortals. In "The Final Days," with his health ruined, his energy sapped, his mental state at the brink of dementia, even Richard "I Am Not a Crook" Nixon becomes a tragic figure.

Yet, "The Final Days" is not a whitewash. Far from it. The beauty of this spellbinding TV movie is that it is compassionate without being sympathetic, and there is a big difference. Just because we see Nixon bend and snap under tremendous personal pressure — at one time he sobs as he gets then-Secretary of State Henry Kissinger to kneel down with him and pray — doesn't mean that this is a case of TV revisionism. The wrongs are not righted. The lies, the abuse of power, the breaches of the Constitution, are evident for all to

see. The danger is: Will people see them, or will they come away with a purely emotional response and consider Nixon to be merely a victim of circumstance?

Carl Bernstein, who, with fellow Washington Post reporter Bob Woodward, broke the Watergate story and wrote the book on which the movie is based, thinks not.

"There's no question about the criminality, about the venality, about the self-pity, about his putting his own interests in front of the presidency," Bernstein says. "I feel very strongly that people who watch this really won't come away, I hope, saying that Richard Nixon was a wonderful president."

He admits, however, that "The Final Days" is human drama that "is empathic to the whole family, including Richard Nixon."

Outstanding in his portrayal of the impeached president is character actor Lane Smith. He plays the role convincingly yet subtly, without the cartoon histrionics of Nixon impersonators. Only once, in the final scene of the movie, do we see the patented Nixon victory sign with arms outstretched in a big "V" over his head — and even then it is shown from behind. Smith should be a run-

way Emmy favorite with the role.

"I approached it from several directions," says the veteran actor. "First, I had to get the physicality of Richard Nixon. I had to get that physicality in my soul and then throw it away. I mean, we're dealing here with a man who was terribly isolated. You're dealing with someone who is suffering tremendous loss in his life, someone who hits the bottom, what might be called incomprehensible demoralization. So what I had to do was parallel those things in my own life. It was just a tremendous intense experience."

Bernstein said he and Bob Woodward were reluctant to have the book made into a movie because of the suspension of disbelief that would be required to accept an actor as the former president.

"And then Woodward and I saw this (Smith's) performance, and we were incredulous. You think he is Richard Nixon."

# Be patient with NBC's 'Generations'

It's been seven quiet months for Chicago's middle-class white and black families, the Whitmores and the Marshalls, on the new NBC soap "Generations." And still no fireworks: Or jolts of racial tension.

Following the adage "from riches to rags in three generations," NBC is playing it safe with youngsters as the soap troublemakers, not the successful hard-working parents.

The Whitmore and Marshall offspring seem to be a spoiled, pampered lot. Adam Marshall (Kristoff St. John), a handsome promising college student, is now driving a cab after a drug bust and an affair with an older lady Doreen Jackson (Jonelle Allen). Sam Whitmore (Kelly Rutherford), daughter of lawyer Rebecca (Pat Crowley), cheats in college, beds her professor Rob and schemes to blackmail Rob, a drinker who married another drinker for her money.

Sweet, aimless youngsters finding their way, created to entice the sought-after youth audience. Apart from a few racial tensions, usually played down, the show grown-ups follow the expected soap denouements — boredom with marriage, drink, jealousy and the need to be socially acceptable.

So far, being middle class means a certain respectability for both blacks and whites, plus preachy talks about being honest with one another. Only a few racial references crop up as Ruth Marshall (Joan Pringle) is about to buy the old Whitmore estate where Ruth's mother Vivian (Lynn Hamilton) served as housekeeper and kept an eye on daughter. But Ruth's vision is spoiled at the fast minute when white Rob and Jessica make a surprise purchase. Black dreams must wait.

However, the sight of black real estate magnate Henry Marshall's wayward pregnant wife Doreen being bullied by a white maid Hilda under Henry's orders, does bring a reverse visual touch.

Otherwise, it's oh so quiet on "Generations." No one wants to face the devastating despair of inner-city life. Seeing attractive blacks sharing the screen with handsome whites is sufficient.

That's the trouble. Be patient, but

don't expect boldness on Streep and Roseanne Barr. "Generations." It isn't in the cards.

# Paramount, MCA explore fifth network

NEW YORK (AP) — Paramount Communications Inc. and MCA Inc.'s television divisions have told station executives about a plan to offer prime-time programming two nights a week as a step toward creating a fifth TV network, industry executives said Friday.

The network would compete with NBC, ABC, CBS and Fox Broadcasting Co., the executives said.

Reports of plans for the network were carried earlier this week by Daily Variety, the trade newspaper, and several major newspapers subsequently carried similar accounts of the plans.

But the Los Angeles Times reported Friday that the deal apparently had fallen apart.

Citing an unidentified source familiar with the deal, the Times said there was a "so-called programming service that had been on the boards, but a snag developed in the agreement between Paramount and MCA, as a result of which this activity has been discontinued."

A spokeswoman for Paramount said from Los Angeles that her company does not comment on rumors or speculation. Shelly Schwab, president of MCA TV in Los Angeles, did not return a phone call and other persons in the company said they were not authorized to comment on the reports.

Brad Turell, a spokesman for Fox Broadcasting in Los Angeles, said "some of our affiliates have been contacted by Paramount an MCA

about whether they would be interested in carrying some prime-time programming.

Michael Fisher, president and general manager at KTXL in Sacramento, Calif., and head of the Fox affiliates board, said at least one Fox affiliate identified told him that Paramount and MCA executives had described plans to make two nights of prime-time programming available starting Jan. 1, 1991. He did not identify the affiliate.

Paramount and MCA planned to provide movies on Wednesday nights and TV series Friday nights, Fisher said. A third night of programming would be made available about six months later, he said.

## Earthquake knocks out World Series coverage, ABC slips into last place

LOS ANGELES (AP) — NBC climbed back on top of the Nielsen ratings and ABC slipped to the bottom in an unusual week in which the San Francisco earthquake rocked television schedules.

ABC seemed certain to repeat its victory of the week before, when it ended NBC's 68-week winning schedule. But the earthquake last Tuesday forced postponement of the World Series just as the third game was getting underway in San Francisco's Candlestick Park.

NBC's "Cheers" was first for the week ended Oct. 22, closely followed by "The Cosby Show," ABC's highest-ranked show was its Monday Night Football game between the Los Angeles Rams and the Buffalo Bills.

NBC was first in the A.C. Nielsen Co. survey with an average of 14.1. CBS was second with 12.6 and ABC third with 12.1. The ratings represent the percentage of the nation's 92.1 million household tuned into a program.

Tuesday comedy lineup was preempted, first by the planned World Series and then by special coverage of the earthquake.

The Tuesday night pre-game show tied for 44th place.

The networks' special coverage of the earthquake was not ranked by Nielsen because it was unscheduled and not sponsored. The network evening news-shows, however, had nearly five million extra viewers who tuned in because of the quake. ABC was first, followed by CBS and NBC.

The San Francisco Giants and the Oakland Athletics are not due to resume World Series play until Friday. The resumption depends on the weather and repairs to the ballpark.

Here are the Top 10: NBC's "Cheers," NBC's "The Cosby Show," NBC's "A Different

World," NBC's "Golden Girls," NBC's "Dear John" and CBS' "60 Minutes" tied, NBC's "Empty Nest," NBC's "Unsolved Mysteries" and CBS movie "Do You Know the Muffin Man?" tied, and ABC's Monday Night NFL Football.

The networks all had follow-up coverage of the earthquake with special reports and in regularly scheduled news magazine show. Here's how they did: ABC's "20-20" in a tie for 20th place, CBS' "48 Hours," 29th, ABC-News special report 34th, ABC's "PrimeTime Live" in a tie for 37th place, and NBC's special report 43rd.

Fox Broadcasting's "Married...With Children" was its highest-rated show. It tied for 45th place. Its next highest show was "Open House" in a tie for 69th place.

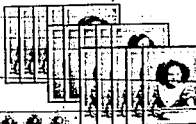

## Pauley looks to life beyond 'Today'

STAMFORD, Conn. (AP) — NBC's Jane Pauley said Friday she is looking forward to a future at NBC News beyond her role as co-anchor of the morning "Today" show.

But in a speech to 300 woman managers, the popular TV personality did not say what type of work she would do in the news division.

"My horizons have expanded," Pauley said at a luncheon address to women executives in Stamford. "It's no longer Jane Pauley, 'Today' show. Now it's Jane Pauley, NBC News. Imagine the possibilities.

"For the first time in 4,750 days, I'm thinking beyond today. I'm looking toward tomorrow," said Pauley, who declined to answer reporters' questions afterward.

Pauley, who turns 39 in two weeks and celebrated her 13th anniversary with "Today" on Wednesday, alluded several times in the 20-minute speech to her impending career change.

Her next move has been the subject of speculation since "Sunrise" anchor Deborah Norville joined the "Today" show. Norville, 31, was given a \$1 million salary in swapping duties with "Today" news anchor John Palmer in August.

Pauley, who makes \$1.2 million

per year, has two years on her NBC News contract, and she told the Washington Post earlier this week that she intends to stay with the network, although she will probably leave "Today" by the end of the year.

Pauley has said there is no friction between herself and Norville, nor with co-anchor Bryant Gumbel, although she told the Post it "was a real blow" to hear that Norville and Palmer had switched jobs.

NBC's latest statement, issued Wednesday, said, "Conversations about specifics are concluding now and we expect to announce our mutual plans shortly."

## Utah students get taste of Hollywood

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Tooele County students became stars this week when producers used them to make a television commercial for British Airways.

Hugh Hudson, director of the Academy Award-winning "Chariots of Fire," will have filmed as many as 5,000 young Utahns for the ads scheduled to be aired worldwide later this year.

In return, some schools will be

receiving contributions that cover programs and projects not funded by other revenues — such as computers and band equipment.

"Besides the money, it's a wonderful experience for these kids," said Eileen Rencher, spokeswoman for the Utah Board of Education. "They have the opportunity to see how commercials are made and to work with people like Hugh Hudson."

The director, whose credits also

include "Greystoke: The Legend of Tarzan," wore a cap with ear flaps down against a blustery wind as he guided 350 blue-clad youngsters from several Utah schools marching down Salt Lake City's Main Street Sunday.

"We're seeing a steady increase in commercial production," said film development director Leigh Vonder Esch, citing 19 major commercials that were filmed in Utah in the past fiscal year, which ended June 30.

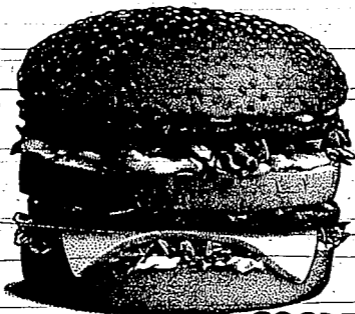
