

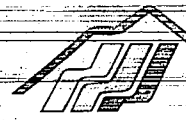

Both sides cheer agreement on funds for SIS

TWIN FALLS — Both sides are cheering a congressional conference committee that hammered out an agreement Thursday on funds for the Special Isotope Separation project. The committee agreed to require Energy Secretary James Watkins to certify a national security need for the proposed laser-driven plutonium refinery at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory before site preparation can begin.

"We see this as another indication that the SIS may never get built," said Elizabeth Paul, executive director of the anti-nuclear weapons group, Snake River Alliance. The \$40 million already appropriated for site preparation in 1990 can't be used until the secretary declares the project is essential to national security and essential to meet national plutonium needs. But U.S. Sen. James McClure, a lone-time advocate of the project, also is claiming victory. "The goal of the opponents of SIS has been to completely eliminate any

opportunity for site preparation work to begin," the Idaho Republican said. "The agreement reached by the Senate and House will allow site preparation work to begin, once verification of the national security needs are made." And he is confident the secretary will certify the project. Over and over, the national security need for this facility has been made by the responsible national security officials in the government," McClure said in a news release following Thursday's decision. Paul is equally certain that the energy secretary can't certify the project on the

basis of a need for plutonium. With more than 20,000 nuclear weapons already in the nation's armory, a case cannot be made for more plutonium, she said. They've had nine years since the project was launched and they haven't made a case, but research on the process continues. Paul said. With tensions easing between the United States and Russia, it's even less likely the secretary would be able to make a case, she said. "We think Congress made a real good choice," Paul said. Site preparation would be a waste of taxpayer money, she said. The plant would refine weapons-grade

plutonium from existing stocks of fuel grade plutonium using a high-energy laser. It will not produce new plutonium. This process, she said, has already been proven to a value has not been tested, but research on the process continues. Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in California is the lead contractor. The committee also agreed that no additional money could be obligated for construction of site preparation unless the secretary certifies that the technology has been proven and all environmental regulations have been met.



Following death of Michael Haymore on Halloween Twin Falls High returns to normal as police complete investigation

TWIN FALLS — As Twin Falls police wound up their investigation of the Halloween-night accident that killed 15-year-old Michael Haymore, life at Twin Falls High School began a slow return to normal Thursday. While many students stayed out of school altogether and there were a lot of tears, Thursday, Principal Carl Snow said. "We're back to classrooms today." Some students returned on Monday, he postponed, Snow said. Between 400 and 400 students said counselors at school Wednesday, and counselors will continue to be available to talk with students. "This will be something we'll carry on for quite a while," Snow said. Michael Haymore, a senior at Twin Falls High School sophomore, was killed when he fell from a pickup Tuesday night. Haymore and five friends were driving around town stealing pumpkins to set in a pyramid around the entrance of the high school, Twin Falls County Councilman Cal Edwards said. The boys were also throwing pumpkins at mail boxes, and when the accident occurred at 10:38 p.m., they were driving about 20 mph south on the 2100 block of Hill-Crest Drive, said Twin Falls police officer Ron Eberstrom, the chief investigating officer. Defense budget compromise still in danger

WASHINGTON — House and Senate conferees completed work Thursday on a \$305 billion defense budget but cautioned that spending cuts required under the Gramm-Rudman deficit reduction rules could imperil the measure's parity with other appropriations. Senate Armed-Services Committee Chairman Sam Nunn, D-Ga., warned that mandatory budget cuts under Gramm-Rudman could slash as much as \$18 billion from Pentagon spending this year and force the military to reduce troop strength by

10 percent of more. "I would be very surprised if they can maintain this size military in the current fiscal era," Nunn said at a press conference announcing the military spending agreement. They're going to have to make some cuts, but from the current 2.1 million men and women in uniform. And the troop cuts will be permanent, Nunn warned. "There is no such thing as temporary layoffs in the military," he said. The \$305 billion represents a 1 percent decline from last year's spending level after adjustment for inflation. This 1990 will be the fifth straight year that defense

spending has declined in real terms. As expected, the administration's "Star Wars" space defense plan took a \$4-billion cut from the White House request but the B-2 stealth bomber program won a strong endorsement from lawmakers. Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney, in a statement issued from Australia where he is meeting with defense officials, said that the spending package "sounds fairly good" except for the sharp cuts in "Star Wars" funding. But his comments suggested that President Bush would sign the bill if it passes the House and Senate as expected.

Bush, GOP admit defeat on capital gains tax cut

WASHINGTON — President Bush and Senate Republicans offered Thursday to end their fight to attach a capital gains tax cut to current debt legislation, all but conceding defeat for the year on what has been Bush's top legislative priority. "We have tried to work constructively and cooperatively with the Congress in a true spirit of bipartisanship," said a statement from the president. "Now the stalemate must be broken. With an increase in the national debt limit needed next week to avert a default by the

Treasury, Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., told Democrats that Republicans would agree to limit amendments to the debt-ceiling legislation to those respecting a Medicare tax to finance catastrophic illness coverage and a tax provision opposed by business. "No capital gains amendment will be offered," he said on the Senate floor minutes after a meeting with top White House officials, including Chief of Staff John Sununu, Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady and budget director Richard Darman. Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, who met Thursday evening with House

Speaker Thomas Foley, D-Wash., and other Democratic leaders, said afterwards they were "heartened by the statement made by the president." "I think he would make a counter offer to Dole and we're not rejecting anything," he declined to offer details. Democratic sources, speaking on the condition of anonymity, said they found the GOP proposal attractive. They wanted, however, to make sure the legislation would end the "lock-down" attempts to win approval of a capital gains tax cut, such as a pending amendment to attach it to a bill providing aid to Poland and Hungary.

KGB answers Soviets' queries

MOSCOW — Five KGB officers sat under the bright lights Thursday for a questioning that touched on some of the Soviet Union's most sensitive secrets. The five were not accused traitors, nor were they among the "leaked" secret services counterintelligence officers trying to bring out a confession. They were answering questions from the Soviet public in a trial of its kind nationwide called program of a Soviet TV studio. If the spokesmen for the five KGB departments didn't reveal how many agents are working abroad as diplomats or trade representatives, how many have been killed or defected in recent years, nor the size of the KGB budget, they at least showed off the KGB's new atmosphere of

openness. "Today the KGB is not asking the questions," national TV commentator Vladimir Lyetov said, opening the 75-minute program that preceded the evening TV news. "Today they are being asked questions." Questions from around the country, taken by a group of telephone operators seated behind the panel, were written out and read by Lyetov. That eliminated the possibility of direct exchanges between the officers and their questioners. Questions touched the personal lives, families, and living conditions of KGB officers. Details of the secret service's foreign activities as well as its activities inside the Soviet Union. "Svetlana Maliviyenko, a vocational school student from Tvergrad, asked about the

Nevada nuclear tests safe, committee concludes

WASHINGTON — There is no evidence to show that underground nuclear tests in Nevada jeopardize the health of nearby residents, although radioactive materials have periodically been released by the blasts, a congressional study concludes. The report by Congress' Office of Technology Assessment said that since 1970 the underground tests have released about 54,000 curies of radiation, an amount the study said would give a resident living near the test site all that time about the same exposure to radiation as a single X-ray.

The report, released this week, said there is no need to improve radiation containment procedures in connection with the tests, but it suggested that the government abandon its practice of keeping such tests secret. "The secrecy associated with the program is largely ineffective," the report said, adding that public concern about such tests could be reduced. "If citizens were told of the tests, for the most part, word of the tests becomes publicly available anyway because workers are evacuated from the test site and the underground explosions are detected from seismic signals. The study had been requested by Sen. Orrin

Hatch, R-Utah, who said the findings demonstrate that "no significant health risks are likely to result" from the underground tests at the Nevada Test Site. More than a dozen nuclear weapons are detonated underground each year at the Nevada Test Site. The tests are used to develop new weapons and assess the effects of nuclear explosions on military equipment. The congressional study said elaborate efforts are made to prevent radiation from being released. The 54,000 curies released from 126 tests since 1970 compares to more than 12 billion

Jaguar joins Ford in surprising reversal

LONDON (AP) — Jaguar PLC said Thursday it was joining the Ford Motor Co. fleet in a \$2.5 billion buyout, a surprising reversal that saw Ford winning over a venerable luxury car maker that once labeled it an unwanted automaker.

The deal, which combines the vast resources of the American automaker with the high style of the much smaller British firm, is expected to further the interests of both companies in the growing international market for luxury cars.

"The partnership we are proposing will enable Jaguar to grow and become increasingly competitive," Lindsey Halseghren, chairman of Ford Europe, said at a news conference.

Jaguar and its friendly talks with the automaker had been expected to result in a GM stake of possibly 30 percent.

But General Motors concluded Jaguar was not worth the \$13.58 a share Ford offered to pay.

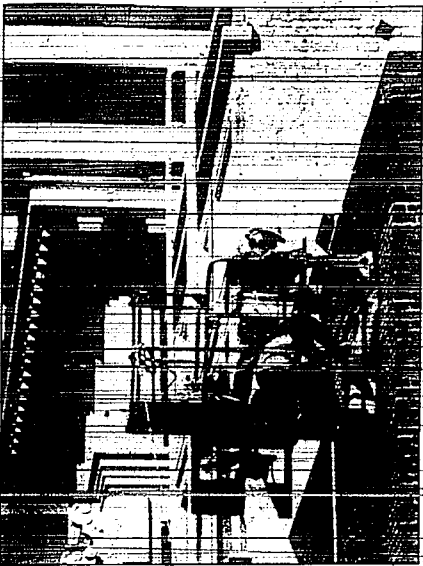
"After an intensive review of Jaguar's products and plants and in view of the losses currently being sustained by them, together with Jaguar's uncertain future cash and other requirements, GM concluded that the maximum value that could be assigned to all of the Jaguar shares was very significantly below the \$10.50 pounds (\$13.35) being offered," a GM statement said.

Jaguar finished at the equivalent of \$13.02 a share Thursday on London's Stock Exchange, down from Wednesday's close of \$12.26.

Analysts said that although Ford was not Jaguar's first choice, the British carmaker should thrive under its ownership.

Jaguar saw its pre-tax profit drop by nearly 6 percent in the first half of 1989, largely due to slumping U.S. sales. It has been lunking for 18 months for a partner to provide financial and technological support to help it regain its "golden share" power to veto any Jaguar takeover.

Jaguar Chairman Sir John Egan told a news conference Thursday that he regretted Jaguar's loss of independence, but he said Ford offered a good price and made guarantees about operating independence.

State considers tax hike for quake relief

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — State lawmakers convened a special session Thursday to discuss ways to pay for earthquake relief, including boosting the state's sales tax in time for Christmas shopping.

At the same time, Marilyn Quayle was headed to farming communities south of San Francisco that were among the hardest hit by the Oct. 17 quake. The wife of Vice President Dan Quayle has made disaster relief her personal cause.

Damages from the earthquake have been estimated at more than \$7.1 billion. Gov. George Deukmejian wants to raise \$800 million for the state's share of earthquake relief by raising the sales tax charged statewide by a quarter percent, from 6 percent to 6.25 percent.

"Our state has pulled together like a family during this period of pain and suffering, and I am personally very proud of the way our state has risen to the challenge," Deukmejian said in a written message to the Legislature.

Lawmakers convened about midday to weigh dozens of other measures aimed at helping the quake victims. The session is expected to last two or three days.

Deukmejian and the Legislature's top four leaders agreed earlier this week to propose a 13-month sales tax increase. They want the tax to begin Dec. 1 and end Dec. 31, 1990.

to take in two holiday shopping periods.

Any increase must be approved by two-thirds of each legislative house. While the state sales tax is 6 percent, the total sales tax charged in some counties is higher because of locally levied sales taxes.

"We have learned a lot and we suffered a very severe blow on Oct. 17. We need ... to make ourselves whole again," said Sen. Leroy Greene as the special session opened.

Mrs. Quayle was scheduled to meet with civic and government leaders and residents in Hollister and Watsonville after her arrival Thursday afternoon.

Her first stop was in Hollister, a farming town of about 20,000 that suffered an estimated \$100 million in quake damage, said David Edge, chief administrative officer for tiny San Benito County.

"We understand that she works very hard in disaster relief programs and that this isn't just a publicity stunt to make the Bush administration look good," Edge said.

"We are expecting a very knowledgeable lady who can help us understand the cause of the bureaucratic red tape and get on the road to recovery."

In Watsonville, an agricultural community of about 28,000 residents, Mrs. Quayle planned to meet privately with local disaster coordinators, said Watsonville City Manager John Radin. She also was to tour the Red Cross shelter at Ramsey Park, where more than 300 people still live in canvas tents.

Dakotas celebrate mutual birthday

BISMARCK, N.D. (AP) — Bells, sirens and thousands of children's voices rang out across two states Thursday as both Dakotas marked their 100th birthdays. Each was admitted to the union on Nov. 2, 1889 — though residents continue to argue good-naturedly about which really was first.

Proxy Express riders carrying messages between the two states "ran flat out" trying to emulate the riding of their predecessors, and the events of 1889 and other pioneer milestones were re-enacted.

North Dakota Gov. George Sinner kidded his South Dakota counterpart, Gov. George Mickelson, after Mickelson arrived a few minutes late for a morning radio show in which the governors wished each other's states a Happy Birthday.

"I thought it was appropriate that you got in a minute or two late," Sinner told Mickelson. "We did some research, and it turns out that North Dakota was actually the first of these states to become states, and so that minute or two was just exactly right."

Officials said not even President Benjamin Harrison, who signed the Nov. 2 proclamation that created both states, knew which one came first even though North Dakota was admitted as the 39th state and South Dakota as the 40th.

President Harrison really did kind of a wonderful thing when he shuffled those papers and didn't let anybody know who was first," said Jim Sawyer, assistant director of the South Dakota Centennial Commission.

Panel to probe target charges

WASHINGTON (AP) — A presidential commission will look into a contentious Pan American World Airways that U.S. officials were warned that Flight 103 was targeted by terrorists before it blew up over Scotland, two commission members said Thursday.

At the same time, 100 members of some of the 270 people killed in the disaster accused the government of "negligent disregard for airport and airline security and terrorism and a lax government response" to the Dec. 21 bombing.

The seven-member commission on air terrorism will look into a Pan Am crash that 36 hours before the crash the Israeli intelligence agency Mossad warned U.S. authorities of a possible terrorist attack, Sens. Frank Lautenberg, D-N.J., and Alfonse D'Amato, R-N.Y., told a news conference Thursday.

Lautenberg and D'Amato also said the commission will investigate Pan Am's contention that West Germany's investigative agency reported "suspicious circumstances" at the Frankfurt airport loading area.

Letters/Public safety director should not toy with safety in police shift changes

Changes could lower morale

As I see it and as I feel it, Twin Falls Public Safety Director DuFresne is toying with the very safety he is expected to maintain. Mark my words: he will reject the police officer's shift proposal out of hand.

The Director that is considering their proposal at all is questionable; consider it a ploy to satisfy public sentiment for the moment. I believe that Mr. DuFresne has never considered and will not consider their proposal seriously.

The reasoning behind the schedule change is to maintain a high standard of police protection during peak hours. Consider for a moment how any employee of any company in any profession will react when their work schedule is dictated such that he/she has little social life with the spouse, spends little time with the children and seems to spend nearly every day at work.

Now add to the equation the situation that a police officer is in. He or she must deal diplomatically and professionally with life and death or other emergency situations day in and day out. They operate in a very visible and public capacity. Is this individual going to operate at the high level expected of a person in this position? In general, I think not; nor would I realistically expect it.

Studies have indicated that work schedules as proposed by Mr. DuFresne is not the optimum; indeed, they are advised against for reasons of detriment to employee

morale.

Is this the type of schedule that should be inflicted on public safety officers? The argument against seems to be in the best interest of all concerned. We could also add the age-old argument: "If it ain't broke, don't fix it."

Mr. DuFresne, the arguments presented against your proposed changes seem to outweigh your arguments for the changes. Please listen to the police officers and their families; keep them happy, keep your public safe.

Marilyn Scott says she knows 25 people personally that would be willing to take responsibility for the children that otherwise would have been abandoned.

Well, being "willing" and actually doing something are not the same thing.

How many does she know personally who have actually adopted an unwanted child or, better yet, a welfare family? How many littered women and children have been helped by the people she knows personally? How many have volunteered to babysit for a single mother as she can work? How many pregnant teenagers have they taken in? How many unwanted children has Marilyn sent to college? How many miserable foster children has she known personally?

The issue here is not abortion. The issue is

choice. Birth control fails. Women conceive unwanted children even with the most sophisticated efforts not to.

More specifically, the athletes that are recruited by CSI are expected to conduct themselves at a certain level of discipline, or they will no longer experience the advantages of this fine community or the junior college athletic program.

The college recruits athletes from outside the state to form a well-rounded, balanced team. We are giving kids an opportunity to

be in one of the finest athletic programs in the nation and, hopefully, they will go on to make this area proud of their success. To limit recruitment of athletes to the state of Idaho is a narrow-minded approach that limits the interaction and sharing of experiences by all young people.

To the east, Idaho State reports a 1-15 mix of native Idaho talent compared to outside talent. CSI enters the recruiting program with five of the 12-member squad being in-state athletes.

I think the numbers show that Idaho is willing to attract ample outside athletic ability. I'm sure you will find this recruiting policy to be a national trend in almost every college athletic program.

We should be proud that our state is able to offer young men and women high caliber athletic and academic programs.

House Demos request special prosecutor to investigate Pierce

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressmen Thursday asked the Justice Department to appoint a special prosecutor to investigate former HUD Secretary Samuel R. Pierce Jr. The Democrats said evidence gathered by House investigators probing allegations of massive wrongdoing at the Department of Housing and Urban Development suggests possible perjury and conspiracy to defraud the government by Pierce or other former top HUD officials.

Their request to Attorney General Dick Thornburgh triggers a requirement under the federal independent counsel law that

Thornburgh told Congress within 30 days whether he finds grounds to open a preliminary investigation.

Justice Department spokesman Daniel Eframian said he had no immediate comment on the request.

Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., one of the congressmen making the request, said "Sam Pierce, entrusted with programs for the poor and powerless, instead gave those programs to the very rich and

the best politically connected."

"There is ample evidence of wrongdoing at HUD, but there is something wrong at the top," he said.

"The only way to get to the bottom of the mess at HUD is through the appointment of an independent counsel."

Robert Plotkin, one of Pierce's lawyers, said he would delay further any congressional testimony by the former secretary, who has invoked his constitutional rights and refused to testify before a House panel.

"Normally when you convene a grand jury, as would be the case under a special prosecutor, you already have some evidence or

some idea that some unlawful act occurred," Plotkin said. "I'm unaware of any wrongful act that any Secretary Pierce has done."

Schumer and Rep. Bruce Morrison, D-Conn., said 19 of the 20 Democratic members of the House Judiciary Committee had signed their letter to Thornburgh.

The chairman, Rep. J. James Florio, Texas, who is hospitalized, was the only one missing.

Under the independent counsel law, a majority of the members of either party on the committee can trigger the first-step review by the attorney general. If Thornburgh opens a preliminary investigation,

he has 90 days to conduct it and decide whether to ask a three-judge panel of the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to appoint a special prosecutor, formally known as independent counsel.

Schumer and Morrison said they met with Thornburgh on Wednesday and informed him their formal request would be made.

They also had a preliminary conversation with Thornburgh, who believes the Justice Department has "turned up the burners and they are indeed actively investigating every area of wrongdoing at HUD."

However, the two congressmen said the law requires a special prosecutor if Pierce, as a recent

Cabinet secretary, is to be investigated. The special prosecutor could also probe other former top HUD officials.

Pierce testified voluntarily last May before a House Government Operations subcommittee probing the HUD scandals. But when he was subpoenaed "for further appearances," this fall, Pierce invoked his Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination and refused to testify.

Three other former top HUD officials, including his two former top executive assistants Deborah Gore Dean and Lance Wilson, have also invoked the Fifth Amendment and refused to testify.

Senate fails to force cost disclosure

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators made clear Thursday they want House members to join them in disclosing mass mailing costs, but refused to force the issue in order to avoid scuttling a deal to cut the taxpayer-financed mailings in half.

Senators voted 64-35 to table in effect a rejection — an amendment by Sen. Gordon Humphrey, R-N.H., that would have required the House disclosure.

Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., warned that the House would reject a conference agreement to cut mass mailings from six to three annually per member if senators attempted to change House rules.

Reid, the chief Senate negotiator of the mail reduction agreement, said that while he and other senators fought earlier for Humphrey's plan for quarterly disclosure, they were

unwilling to jeopardize the compromise now. "We have gotten from the House all we're going to get," said Reid.

"The Conference we had with the House was brutal. The House had the feeling we should clean up our house before we left them to do it."

Humphrey, however, argued, "We have to say we're not going to be blackmailed. I suggest we have the guts to stand up to the blackmail of the House."

The vote was the latest development in the continuing debate over changing one of the "ironclad" legislative rules, mailings, usually newsletters, addressed to postal patrons throughout their states or districts. The mailings always rise in an election year because they are considered a great advantage to incumbents.

Members of each house, however, have used the mail debate to threaten changes in the way

other chamber does its business. Senators don't like the idea that only their rules require disclosure of mailing costs by each member. The House objects to senators' use of money from honorary, political action committees and party campaign committees for office expenses.

While the House has approved a non-binding agreement with the mass mail reductions, the Senate debate is continuing. It was unclear when the Senate would decide to either accept the agreement or buck the issue back to the House.

In addition to the mass mail reductions, the conferring agreement would establish for the first time separate House and Senate mail accounts; limit the size of newsletters to two sheets of paper; establish a voluntary procedure for keeping mail costs within their budget and strictly enforce a prohibition against postal patron mailings 60 days before an election.

Witnesses say Soviet glasnost isn't perfect

WASHINGTON (AP) — Witnesses told Congress Thursday that political repression and human rights abuses were common in the Soviet Union despite Mikhail S. Gorbachev's new policies.

All of the witnesses before a House Foreign Affairs subcommittee acknowledged that there have been significant and unanticipated human rights advances under the leadership of the Soviet president.

But all said that the new freedoms of glasnost have been incomplete and halting.

"It's a case of two steps forward, one step back, and every day's newspaper is evidence of that," said Holly Burkhalter, Washington director of Helsinki Watch, the observer group that monitors human rights developments in the Soviet Union.

Rep. Wayne Owens, D-Utah, the subcommittee's chairman, outlined the Soviet Union, including the expansion of legitimate private enterprise, broadened religious rights, a more independent press, greater freedom of expression, a less oppressive KGB, psychiatric reforms and a dramatic increase in emigration.

But Owens and the witnesses said the silver cloud has a dark lining.

"Paradoxically, glasnost has sometimes led to increased human rights abuses, as the authorities have countered with new types of

repression, including the killing of peaceful demonstrators," Burkhalter said.

Longtime political prisoners have been released since 1982, at least 400 "prisoners of conscience" remain imprisoned.

"Soviet authorities have increased short-term detentions, holding as many as 150 people a month for up to 15 days," she said.

"It is clearly a means of attempting to suppress the political expression of common views," she said. "It is a very unwelcome new human rights abuse in the Soviet Union."

Although the Gorbachev government has taken important steps to curb the use of psychiatry to control political dissenters, about 50 detainees, those released often in psychiatric institutions for political reasons, she said.

"While many such persons have been released and while there has been a sharp decrease in new detentions, those released often remain registered as psychiatric outpatients," which means restriction of their political rights, she said.

In addition, Soviet psychiatrists continue to use "painful and debilitating drugs considered to have no medical value in the West," she said.

She also cited the reported use of gas against a nationalist demonstrator in Soviet Georgia last April, noting that opposition sources say at least 37 people were killed.

Author of Iowa blast report defends conclusions

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rear Adm. Richard Milligan said Thursday he has "no fear" of investigations by skeptical members of Congress into his report on the battleship Iowa explosion.

"I think the ultimate conclusion is going to be that they are going to support my investigation" and conclusion that gunner's mate Clayton Hartwig most likely caused the April 19 blast that claimed 47

lives, Milligan said in an interview.

Since Milligan, a 30-year Navy veteran who oversaw the Navy's technical and criminal study, issued his report on Sept. 7, it has been questioned and criticized by members of Congress, Hartwig's family and the sailor's former shipmates.

At the time it was issued, Navy officials acknowledged that their evidence was circumstantial, given the fact that all the witnesses, including Hartwig, died in the explosion.

Even though the report said it could not pinpoint the exact cause of the blast, it said the explosion was "unintentional" and that Hartwig was "the most likely person with the necessary knowledge and possible motivation to accomplish" it by inserting some type of detonator between the bags

of gunpowder in one of the ship's 16-inch guns.

The admiral said the Navy, at the suggestion of the FBI, has conducted additional tests on the material found inside the battleship's Iowa gun.

Milligan said that while he was not a liberty to divulge the outcome because the report is being studied by his superiors, he is familiar with the findings.

"I am not aware of anything that would cause me to change my report after 38 months," he said. "We will come up with nothing that will change the findings of fact, opinions or recommendations that I had before."

The Senate and House armed services committees plan to hold hearings, while Congress investigative arm, the General Accounting Office, has already

begun an inquiry.

Several members of Congress from Ohio, Hartwig's home state, have been outspokenly critical. And Rep. Nicholas Mavroules, D-Mass., chairman of a House Armed Services subcommittee, is reviewing the matter, he said "seriously questioned" the admiral's conclusion that the blast was a willful act of sabotage.

Mavroules cited an FBI report that said its laboratory investigation on the mater was inconclusive.

"I have evidence," Milligan said in the interview.

The admiral said that his conclusion was a painful one for him to reach, but that he was "forced into it" by the evidence he uncovered.

Experts predict more active sun

WASHINGTON (AP) — In a two-day period last month, energetic particles from the sun bombarded Earth and its atmosphere at a level not reached since satellites have been in orbit, a scientist said Thursday.

He predicted things will get worse.

"We've had some unprecedented high levels of solar activity this year, starting in March," said Joe H. Allen of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. The March event was described at the time as a flare 36 times the size of Earth, possibly the largest ever recorded.

In August, Allen said, solar activity rivaled that of 1972, a landmark high. Then, he added, "the September event was larger and the October one was so much larger that it made us forget September."

Allen predicted record or near-record levels of activity in the next two to three years.

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Iranian radicals plan anti-U.S. protest to mark embassy seizure

TEHRAN, Iran (AP) — Radicals plan an outpouring of hatred Saturday to mark the day the U.S. Embassy was seized in 1979. Rafezani dropped as interior minister, will address a rally outside the former embassy building, which militants stormed Nov. 4, 1979. He is the president's main rival and has close links to Shiite Muslim fundamentalists holding Western hostages in Lebanon last month, meeting with Shiite leaders. The reason for his visit was not clear, but speculation arose that it concerned the 18 Western hostages, who include eight Americans.

Ebanon. It will be the first public appearance by Mofattahi, 43, since he was pushed out of government in August and leads the "pragmatists" who seek to end Iran's isolation. Radicals have whipped up anti-American passion for days, undermining what had appeared to be a government attempt at moderation on the 10th anniversary of the beginning of 444 days in captivity for 52 Americans. Workers strung scores of cloth banners Thursday between the maple trees lining Taleghani, a broad avenue that runs past the embassy's main entrance.

Among the inscriptions were "No relations with the United States" and "Strike down global arrogance to protect the Islamic revolution." Promoters call Saturday's anniversary "the national day of struggle with global arrogance and the world-deavouring United States." Global arrogance, like "The Great Satan," has become a synonym for the United States.

Rafsanjani is trying to revive the moribund economy after a true last year in the eight-year war with Iraq and has sought better relations with the West, in part to secure help with a rebuilding program estimated to cost \$400 billion. Revolutionary hard-liners fear opening up to the world will dilute the ideological purity of the fundamentalist revolution. Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini led from the takeover of Iran in February 1979 until his death June 3. Rumors had spread that Mofattahi was under house arrest, but he turned up in

Since becoming president, Rafsanjani has made tentative offers to help obtain their release if the United States met certain conditions. Diplomats consider the radical attempt to make Saturday's anniversary a show of anti-Americanism "a kind of show-down with the pragmatists."

Crowd protests ban on Marco's body

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Thousands loyal to Ferdinand Marcos trenched the edge of the capital Thursday after a 10-day march to demand his body be returned from Hawaii, more than a month after the president died.

A military official warned soldiers against participating in a Marcos rally planned for Friday and billed as an anti-government gathering.

Marchers left Marcos' hometown of Batangas, 250 miles north of Manila, on Oct. 24 to stage President Corason Aquino to lift her ban on bringing Marcos' body to the Philippines.

Police said about 3,000 Marcos loyalists reached suburban Valenzuela late Thursday. They planned to hold a mass rally Friday in suburban Quezon City to demand that Marcos and living members of his family be allowed to return to the Philippines.

Marco died Sept. 28 in Honolulu, where he lived since his ouster in 1986.

Malta turns its vision westward

ROME (AP) — The decision to hold next month's superpower summit in Malta has loosened ties with Washington, a few years ago when the Mediterranean island was under fire for its close ties with nearby Libya.

But ever since the Socialists were voted out in 1986 after 16 years in power, Malta has loosened ties with Col. Muammar Gaddafi and moved closer to the United States and Western Europe.

Diplomats say the island's improved ties with Washington, its central location in the Mediterranean and its official policy of neutrality and non-alignment apparently played a role in the decision to hold the Dec. 2-3 shipboard summit by President Bush and Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev in Maltese waters.

"This would have been virtually inconceivable three years ago," a Western diplomat in Valletta, the Maltese capital, said Thursday.

Malta still has extensive trade and commercial ties with its southern neighbor Libya, but political and military relations have been downgraded.

"There is this impression, formed abroad, that we were too closely aligned with the Libyans," Prime Minister Edward Fenech Adami said shortly after his Nationalist Party swept to victory in May 1986. "This will not happen under the new government."

"Libya has helped us a lot in the past and we shall maintain our friendly relations," he added. "But Maltese policies will no longer be identified with Libyan policies. Malta should not align itself, particularly in a military way, with Libya."

One of Fenech Adami's first official acts was to scrap part of a 1984 friendship treaty with Libya calling for exchange of military and security information. It was under this pact that Malta gave advance warning to Libya of the U.S. air raids on Tripoli and Benghazi in April 1986.

Maltese air traffic controllers told their Libyan counterparts that warplanes were approaching, but Libya apparently didn't act on the information and was surprised by the bombing raids, which President Reagan said were intended to punish Tripoli for its alleged support of international terrorism.

Brazilian trainer crashes into factory

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — An air force training aircraft crashed into a beer warehouse in southern Brazil on Thursday, and the pilot was killed after ejecting from the plane, officials said.

The two-engine Brazilian Tucano plane crashed shortly after takeoff from the Cindaeta-2 air force base in the southern city of Curitiba, 520 miles southwest of Rio, said Sgt. Edison Jose Tavares.

"His engines stopped, all I heard was a whistling overhead," said Arnaldo Lima, an employee at the warehouse. "Then it smashed straight into the factory and burst into flames."

The pilot, who was testing the \$2 million plane, tried to parachute to safety but was hurt in the fall and died en route to the hospital, Tavares said.

The cause of the crash was under investigation.

Turkish daily pays damages to Ozal

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — A court Thursday ordered an Istanbul daily newspaper to pay the equivalent of \$8,700 in damages for insulting President-elect Turgut Ozal's family in a series published in May.

The court said the articles in the newspaper Sabah defamed Ozal and his wife Senem.

Sabah was banned from publishing the series after the first two parts, accusing his wife and aides of corruption, appeared in the newspaper.

The series alleged that a foundation set up by Ozal's wife to work on social issues such as birth control actually provided financial and political benefits for members.

Ozal had asked for damages of about \$34,800.

Ten other suits against newspapers by Ozal are pending in the courts.

Honecker's wife gives up post; Krenz promises new travel law

BERLIN (AP) — The wife of ousted Communist Party leader Erich Honecker lost her cabinet post in a series of top-level resignations that swept through East Germany on Thursday as the pace of change gained momentum.

New party leader Egon Krenz said his government wants a closer tie with the European Economic Community and called for a quick trade agreement. He also discussed reforms with Poland's new prime minister.

Krenz promised to announce an "opening" of travel to the West, according to Martin Bäumemann, an E.C.C. commissioner from West Germany who spoke with the East German leader.

"Thousands of East Germans were waiting, however, and poured into neighboring Czechoslovakia after Krenz lifted a month-old travel ban. The East Germans hoped to follow countrymen who have fled West."

An opposition leader threatened to abandon their 40-year monopoly on power.

Several longtime party officials surrendered their positions as the pressure for reform intensified.

Margot Honecker's resignation was announced by the state-run

news agency ADN following a cabinet meeting. Mrs. Honecker, 62, had held the post since 1963.

Two regional Communist Party bosses were replaced; the chief of the Communist-controlled trade union federation stepped down and the leaders of two Communist-allied political parties resigned.

Among those who resigned were

Heinrich Homann, the 78-year-old leader of the National Democratic Party, and Gerald Goetting, the 66-year-old chief of the Christian Democrats.

Both men also were among the nation's four vice-presidents.

All recognized political parties in East Germany are allied with the Communists and have closely followed the dominant-party doctrine. But in recent weeks some of the non-Communist parties have begun to assert their independence.

Homann and Goetting were believed to have resigned under pressure from party members. The two parties have a combined membership of slightly more than 200,000.

Annelis Kimmel, 55, became the first woman to head the nation's 8.6 million-member, state-run trade union federation when she was elected to replace Henry Fisch, a former party boss, occupying membership of slightly more than 200,000.

Fisch, 62, who headed the organization for 14 years, also is a member of the Communist Party's policy-making Politburo. It was not immediately known if he would lose that post as well, or whether Mrs. Kimmel would gain that seat if he did.

More Germans flock to embassy

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — More than 1,300 young East Germans jammed the West German Embassy on Thursday to seek new lives in the West and many scoffed at promised reforms in the communist homeland they left behind.

At least 8,000 East Germans swarmed into Czechoslovakia after East Germany lifted a month-old travel ban on Wednesday, the official East German news agency ADN said. It is the only country East Germans can visit freely.

Most of those flooding into East Germany lived in their early 20s. At least 300 to 300 children could be seen behind a fence playing peacefully in the embassy grounds.

"We want reforms without borders," said one of the new

arrivals, a 24-year-old trucker from Leipzig.

"I don't believe that anything will change here," said another young man who declined to give his name. "The reforms are only for the outside world."

As darkness shrouded the embassy, East Germans continued to arrive with at least 20 people gaining entry in just one 15-minute spell.

The refugees simply walked through the giant wooden doors of the Palais Lobkowitz, the elegant Baroque palace that houses the West German Embassy in Prague's ancient Mala Strana district.

A Czech policeman outside the embassy said he and his colleagues had orders not to interfere with any East Germans seeking entrance because this was a matter for the two

Germans alone.

Several refugees chatted with reporters through the railings of the embassy garden, some sipping beer and listening to music. Others waved from upper-floor windows in the embassy.

Shipments of tents were ordered from West Germany to cope with what embassy sources expected would be a renewed influx over the weekend. West German Red Cross helpers and medical supplies were dispatched from Bonn.

East Germany has agreed to allow East Germans at the embassy and at the West German Embassy in Warsaw to renounce their citizenship and go to West Germany, which automatically gives them a new passport and assistance in starting a new life.

Jack Van Bek of Jerome, Jim Stewart of Stewart Farms Inc. in Nampa and Joe Zimmerman of Nampa received plaques recognizing their compliance Thursday from Robie Russell, the EPA's Northwest regional administrator. The presentations were made at the annual meeting of the United Dairyfarmers of Idaho in Boise.

Russell said the awards were based on EPA field inspections of dairy operations nominated by the University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service. In addition to the three main recipients, five other Idaho dairies received special recognition for their waste management compliance: Mike Smeethers of Twin Falls; Bill Noyvinger of Goodwin, Galen, City of Fish Lake; Dale Plince of Larrystyle Farms Inc. in Nampa; Ed Saxton of the Blackfoot Valley Dairy in Blackfoot.

Judge declares a mistrial Wednesday in cocaine case

SHOSHONE — The trial of a Hailey man charged with possession of cocaine was declared a mistrial Wednesday, 5th District Judge J. William Hart said.

Saying he had to hear the case in a future trial, Hart would not elaborate on why he declared a mistrial. Neither the prosecutor, Blaine County's Fred Dator, Ned Williamson, nor the defense attorney, Victor Rosito, could be reached for comment.

Roger Kim Fairchild, 37, was arrested in June after authorities found more than 3 pounds of cocaine, 3 pounds of marijuana, several guns and \$2,500 cash in his mobile home.

The trial has been rescheduled for Nov. 27, Hart said.

INEL finds steel pipes that don't meet steel standards

ARCO — Routine maintenance at the Idaho Chemical Processing Plant at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory turned up some old pipes that no longer meet environmental regulations.

The stainless-steel pipes, used to transfer liquid high-level radioactive waste, were installed when the building was built in the 1950s.

Though the pipes were not leaking, current regulations require all such pipes be inside a "secondary containment" that would safely trap any leaks, said INEL spokesman Nick Nichols.

The plant's nuclear-fuel-processing and liquid waste solidification functions, already shut down for the maintenance, will remain shut down until the pipes are replaced or rerouted inside the building.

The cost of the plant is operating normally, Nichols said.

"Everybody's still going to work," he said.

Federal judge blocks Box Canyon diversion dam

BUHL — A federal judge in Boise has temporarily blocked construction of a diversion dam on Box Canyon Creek.

Visiting U.S. District Judge David Ezra of Hawaii issued a preliminary injunction Monday, saying that irreparable harm to the canyon would occur if construction of the dam were allowed before a determination of the validity of challenges to the project.

Local citizens, the Hagerman Valley Citizens Alert and the Idaho Conservation League filed suit in August against the Bureau of Land Management, the Army Corps of Engineers and developer Earl M. Hardy of Boise.

hatchery in nearby Blind Canyon. The canyons are on the Snake River near Buhl.

The suit alleges that the federal agencies failed to properly assess environmental impacts from the project and that mitigation plans are inadequate.

The injunction does not halt the project.

No trial date has been set.

Memorial tree honors child who was hit by car

Ash tree planted at Morningside for Allison Hall

TWIN FALLS — Allison Hall will not be forgotten.

She will be remembered when a seedless ash tree blooms each spring at Morningside Elementary School.

She will be remembered when kindergartners wait for rides home in the tree's shade.

And she will be remembered each time teachers use the tree to help youngsters better understand death.

The tree was planted during a short ceremony Thursday at the front of the school, just outside the kindergarten classrooms.

A plaque in memory of Allison, the 6-year-old Morningside kindergartner killed while walking to school Sept. 22, rests at the tree's base.

"I didn't realize so many people cared," Allison's father, Randy Hall, said after the ceremony.

"I don't think there's anything you can say to express your feelings," said Vickie Hall, Allison's mother. "She was a beautiful little girl."

The tree-planting project was initiated by Twin Falls High School's Future Homemakers of America class.

The group sold and delivered balloons with messages at the high school, raising \$150.

Local businesses picked up the rest of the memorial's tab. Sunset Memorial donated half the cost of the plaque and electronic equipment. Kelly Gardner Center covered the big chunk of the tree's cost, and Gem State Welders Supply donated the helium

for the balloons, said Nancy Blake, the FHA adviser.

"When we first heard about Allison's death, we were really sad," said senior Roxie Matkin, one of the project's organizers. "It'll be a symbol that Allison isn't forgotten."

Matkin was the only person present to shout "Tuesday night's death of high school sophomore Mike Haymore. She said his death made Allison's death "especially hit home."

Senior Nicole Stauffer, another of the main organizers, said the tree planting was inspired by another memorial tree located at the high school.

"It's just something the kids can see," she said.

While two Kelley Garden employees shoveled grass and dirt to make a hole for the tree, kindergartners, first-grade and fourth-grade teachers led their classes around the digging to view the plaque.

Kindergarten teacher Julie Leiva said she didn't think the kids really realize what's happened and are too young to really understand death. But she said the tree's annual cycle will help her explain death to her students.

One kindergartner asked his teacher if Allison was buried there when he saw the plaque.

Deva Ward, Allison's kindergarten teacher, said she explains the tree's annual cycle well.

"They talk about her every day," she said.

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Two challenge Rupert mayor in next week's vote

RUPERT — Former City Councilwoman Jane Dombek and current Councilman Joel Rogers are challenging Mayor Bill Whitton in next week's election because they say changes are needed in the way Whitton conducts city business.

"I want to offer to the constituency something they have never had before, and that is a mayor with regular office hours," Dombek, a councilwoman for 10 years, said. "We have close to a \$9 million budget to administer, and I don't think it can be done on an occasional basis."

The city's mayor position, technically is part-time — it pays \$120,000. But Dombek said her definition of part-time is a part of every day. "I think it needs daily attention."

Whitton has not been able to offer that to Rupert residents, Dombek said, because of his commitments to his business and family and because he is often out of town. The mayor should be at the city building on

a regular basis, she said.

Rogers says Rupert city employees need more leadership. "We need to set up guidelines so they know what's expected of them and they can know what they can expect of us," Rogers says. "Our city employees are very good. The city is run well, but I think we could do better."

Whitton disagreed with the contentions of his challengers. He is available to his constituency and city employees, he said and spends about 30 hours a week on city business. He added that he doesn't have to be in City Hall to conduct all city business, a point with which Dombek disagrees.

Further, Rogers' City Hall has no mayor's office. If the mayor is going to be in the city office "all the time," Whitton said, "you're going to have to have someplace to park your carcass." The close proximity of his private office to City Hall, he said, is a boon to the city. "I see no reason to come in and build a Taj Mahal in City Hall," Whitton says.

On another issue, Rogers, a city councilman for two years, said the city needs to be more responsible in applying for grants. "I would like to designate a need before we go looking for the money. At times, we have just plain gone too far."

The current A Street project is an example of lack of direction and planning, he said. "We've been fooling around with that for five years. Every three or four months we run into a hoop that the government requires us to jump through."

The city followed a grant agency suggestion to set a minimum of \$150 to offer property owners for land acquisition, only to find out it could have set any minimum it wanted, Rogers said.

"The council is so in tune with jumping through the hoops that there was no question," he said. "Some of the property we acquired was only 10 feet, but we had to offer \$150." He voted against the minimum, he said.

He also cautioned against applying for too many grants, because of associated costs the city will always have, such as for

engineering studies for grant-funded projects.

Rogers said, in order for business to expand in Rupert, the city needs to remove some sundry, but not necessary, taxes to help commercial electric rates.

The electric rate "isn't a problem," Whitton said. "I've shown a lot of people our rate structure and I don't get that as a question," he said.

"The city does need to work on the availability of adequate water and sewer supplies," he said. "We need to improve that so we can attract industries," Whitton said. "We're working on that. I hope to come up with some grant money or low interest loans."

All the candidates said the city and other government agencies need to cooperate more, particularly in regard to solid waste disposal and streets.

Dombek wants to see the city concentrate on improving facilities it

Consumers asked to watch for contaminated mushrooms

TWIN FALLS — There have been no local reports of food poisoning, but health officials are asking consumers to watch for contaminated Chinese mushrooms that have affected as many as 100 people in the nation.

Officials also are cautioning people about recently recalled packages of Gerber rice cereal for babies.

"The whole goal is to just get the food off the market," said Jerry Schultz, the South Central Health District's environmental health director.

Dangerous toxins have been found in the mushrooms being recalled by the Food and Drug Administration, imported from 10 plants in the People's Republic of China.

The specific mushroom in question are 6-ounce cans with the code "Q1."

16-ounce cans bearing the code "T1" or "T17," 68-ounce cans with the codes "FM," "T3," "T17," "M2," "B2," "L1," "Q15"

Consumers asked to watch for contaminated mushrooms

and "R12."

The largest cans are typically used in schools, restaurants and institutions, according to the Health and Welfare Department.

Meanwhile, Gerber has voluntarily issued a recall of 8-ounce packages of its rice cereal after discovery of a mechanical failure. The failure had allowed metal filings to be mixed in with the rice.

Boxes with codes S1 through S8 and a "better used by" date of "24 Aug. 91" should be returned to the supermarket for a refund.

Gerber reported the incident to the FDA, but the FDA ruled the metal filings are not a hazard, Schultz said. Gerber decided to recall the rice anyway.

There have been no reports of the rice in the Magic Valley, Schultz said, but that could be because it has not been publicized much.

Anyone finding either the rice or the mushrooms is asked to call Schultz at the health district, 734-5900.

Federal judges lean on Idaho for more mental health services

BOISE (AP) — A three-judge federal appellate panel has dramatically expanded the coverage of a 1983 class action lawsuit settlement requiring the state to improve mental health services for troubled juveniles.

The decision by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals partially overturns a 1986 ruling by U.S. District Judge Marion Callister.

That order severely restricted the agreement's provisions that juveniles under 18 be housed in state facilities for mental health problems be segregated from adults, housed in the least restrictive environment and provided individualized treatment plans.

State Department of Health and Welfare officials said they intend to appeal the Oct. 23 ruling written by Judge Myron E. Blanton and endorsed by Judges Dorothy Nelson and Robert Boevecher.

"We believe the court's decision is erroneous as a matter of law and as a matter of fact, and we expect to file a petition for rehearing," Health and Welfare spokeswoman Mary Keltz said Thursday.

Until the court acts on that petition, she said, the department plans no change in its procedures for handling the 30 to 40 juveniles covered by the agreement at any given time.

Idaho Legal Aid Services attorney Howard Beldeford said the appellate order would increase from just a few dozen to as many as several hundred the number of juveniles guaranteed the protections and services outlined in the original settlement.

Beldeford maintained that while the state has made improvements in handling distributed juveniles, it still does not fully comply with the settlement worked out over six years ago.

The appellate panel ordered Callister to hold a new hearing on compliance with the order, and Beldeford said a legal conference

toward that end was set for next week. Legal Aid lawyers went to court against the state in 1980, demanding improved mental health services for all troubled juveniles in state institutions.

The class action was prompted by past state handling of mentally ill juveniles that included housing them in facilities with no specialized treatment programs and with adult mental patients with histories of child sexual abuse.

Some of the adult patients have had sexual encounters with or have inflicted injury on these children, the appellate order noted.

After nearly three years of legal maneuvering, the state finally agreed to the settlement requiring separation from adult patients, less restrictive housing arrangements and individualized treatment programs. But it won repeated stays of implementation pending appeals that were

not resolved for three more years. At that point, the state asked Callister to restrict the coverage of the settlement, admitting that if he failed to do so the state would not be able to comply.

Callister ruled on New Year's Eve 1986 that the order would not cover juveniles who were residents of other states just prior to their admission to an Idaho institution, those admitted to institutions only for diagnosis to determine if they were mentally ill, those admitted to institutions under state laws other than the Mental Health Act, those admitted to institutions not charged with treating mental illness and those voluntarily admitted.

The three-judge appellate panel upheld Callister's exclusion of juveniles who had been residents of other states just prior to admission and those admitted to institutions not charged with treating the mentally ill.

But its order said Callister erred in excluding voluntary commitments and juveniles just undergoing diagnosis, and it said juveniles admitted to institutions under laws other than the Mental Health Act also should be included if they ultimately were diagnosed as suffering from mental or emotional problems.

The decision said Callister interpreted portions of the 15-page settlement out of context with the overall result both parties to the agreement intended to achieve.

By excluding voluntary commitments, the appellate court found no rational justification for differentiating between that group and those ordered into institutions under the Mental Health Act.

"Voluntarily committed children are not subject to the abuse, including sexual abuse, by adult patients, and they have the same right under the Idaho Code to demand the care that is given to involuntarily committed children," the decision said.

Jury begins deliberations in nation's longest-running trial

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Jurors in the McMartin Pre-School molestation trial began deliberations Thursday after 2 1/2 years of testimony involving child rape and satanic rituals.

The marathon trial, spawned by the complaints of one mother and characterized as a modern day Salem, has drawn lawyers from across the country to a trial that began at 4 p.m. as the longest criminal proceeding in U.S. history.

Jurors met briefly before going home. Deliberations were to resume Friday.

The case has lingered in the courts in various stages for nearly six years and cost taxpayers more than \$15 million. Deliberations began after Superior Court Judge William Pounds read 32 pages of instructions to the panel.

The McMartin investigation ignited a wave of hysteria in Southern California and nationally. It set the standard for widespread fear among working parents that their children might not be safe in the private schools they picked to care for them.

But the case also drew attention to allegations about abuse at the McMartin school, a rash of reports of child molestation at other day care centers surfaced.

More than 1,000 pieces of evidence have been entered and 124 witnesses testified.

A jury of 12, plus six alternates began the trial in April 1987. During the years since trial began, job problems and illness plagued the

jurors, leaving the bare dozen panelists needed to deliberate and avoid a mistrial.

The trial began in August 1983, when Judy Johnson, mother of a child at the school called Manhattan Beach police. She told the department's sex abuse and juvenile investigator that her son's bottom was red and that he had spoken of a prosecutor of "meeting hundreds of lots at the school during a five-year period.

Children gave investigators accounts of satanic rites and animals tortured to frighten them into silence.

Mrs. Johnson, suffering from alcoholism and mental problems, died at the age of 44, a few months before the trial began in April 1987. Defense attorneys contended she was unbalanced and that the case that emerged was largely the result of her increasingly bizarre allegations.

Children's Institute International, an agency for abused and neglected children.

Based on those interviews, prosecutors initially concluded that hundreds of acts of child abuse had occurred at the school founded in 1958 by Virginia McMartin Buckey and mother of Peggy McMartin.

Virginia McMartin, elderly and confined to a wheelchair, was among the seven staff members arrested in February 1984. Charges later were dropped against her and

four other defendants because of what District Attorney Ira Reiner said was an "incredibly weak" case.

Defense attorneys contended the Children's Institute interviews were based on leading questions by people who were not authorized criminal investigators and therefore were not valid.

When the case finally came to trial in 1987, the focus of the prosecution had narrowed. What had originally been hundreds of counts of child molestation was pruned to 64 counts, and a shared count of conspiracy between Raymond Buckey and his mother.

Snake River Alliance joins call for closure of Rocky Flats plant

BOISE (AP) — The anti-nuclear Snake River Alliance has joined a score of other national and regional groups in calling for the closure of the Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant in Colorado.

In a letter to Gov. Cecil Andrus and six other governors who have rejected the Bush administration's request to temporarily store radioactive waste from the Rocky Flats plant, the Idaho-based group and the others warned that the nuclear waste storage problem was about to reach crisis proportions.

"We're calling for a moratorium on production of these items which generate the waste," Fritz Bjornsen said Thursday in releasing the letter.

Andrus focused national attention on the radioactive waste disposal problem in California counties when the federal government told Idaho, with over 4 million cubic feet of nuclear and hazardous waste stored within its borders, would take no more.

He related only temporarily, and waste shipments, mainly from Rocky Flats, ceased for good in late August.

He took the step after the government repeatedly missed deadlines for opening a permanent waste dump in New Mexico. The dump, near Carlsbad, now is scheduled to open next July. But Andrus has said he expects that deadline to be missed as well.

With storage space at Rocky Flats expected to be exhausted by next March, the Bush administration last month contacted the governors of Nevada, New Mexico, Colorado, South Carolina, Tennessee and Washington, asking them to temporarily store Rocky Flats waste.

Andrus was not asked to accept more waste because he has made his position clear and the other six governors firmly rejected the administration's bid.

In their letter, the environmental groups warned that the federal government could be prompted into forcing states into taking waste simply to keep Rocky Flats open into next spring. Because of persistent problems in opening a permanent dump, any temporary storage site would effectively become a permanent one, they contended.

Los Angeles Herald Examiner closes; last edition Thursday

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The last edition of the once-powerful Los Angeles Herald Examiner hit streets Thursday, but only briefly as souvenir seekers cleaned out most newsracks shortly after dawn.

Entrepreneurs were reportedly getting as much as \$20 a copy for the papers with a bold "SO LONG, L.A." headline.

Some kid on fraternity row flagged down the Herald truck when it got here this morning and bought six bundles (of 50 papers each), said Gary Pine at the sports information office at the University of Southern California.

"The last we heard, he'd sold three bundles — at \$20 a copy."

At a Herald Examiner building downtown, crowds jammed a lobby to buy papers. Some, like Robert Fregoso, purchased whole 50-paper bundles for the normal 25-cent-a-copy.

"I've read the Herald all my life," said Fregoso, 43. "I used to sell them on the street 35 years ago — for a dime."

Fregoso said he was going to give the papers away to his best customers at Ricky's, a cocktail lounge he runs.

Morning sales at the spot where Fregoso picked up his papers were as brisk as 1,000 copies an hour, Herald Examiner employees Helen

Cruz said.

The Herald Examiner was born in 1962 when the morning Examiner, founded by newspaper baron William Randolph Hearst in 1903, was merged with the evening Herald-Examiner, founded in 1877 and became the city's sole afternoon paper.

The Herald Examiner and its predecessors were a huge part of the city's newspapering lore.

Thousands of dollars were once kept in a safe in case Hearst needed quick cash or a reporter had to be bailed out of jail.

The Examiner had scooped on everything from the "Black Dahlia" murder case to the explosion of the first H-bomb.

But the problems at the Herald Examiner, once the largest afternoon paper in the country with a circulation of more than 700,000, were long-standing.

Officials acknowledged in announcing its closure Wednesday.

At the same time Hearst merged the two papers into one afternoon daily in 1962, Times Mirror Company merged its Times and Mirror into the morning-delivery Times. That started a gradual slide in circulation and advertising away from the Herald Examiner.

Admitted killer Stout wanted final shootout with FBI before taking life

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Admitted killer Steven Ray Stout told detectives he was tired of running and wanted to die in a shootout with the FBI agents who arrested him for the murders of his mother-in-law and her daughter.

"I told the FBI he had had 30 seconds — they wouldn't have taken me alive — I was going to shoot it myself," Stout told detectives in a taped interview shortly after his arrest nearly a year ago in Gulfport, Miss.

The interview was played in court Thursday before 3rd District Judge James S. Sawaya, who will decide whether to sentence the 33-year-old West Virginia man to life in prison or the death penalty.

Stout pleaded guilty in September to one count of first-degree murder and one count of second-degree murder for the Jan. 23, 1988, bludgeoning and stabbing deaths of Bonnie Craft, 41, and Maureen Turner, 19, in their West Valley City mobile home.

After the murders, Stout fled and hid out for five months in the hills of the Webster Springs area of West Virginia before revealing to the Gulf County Sheriff's Office his whereabouts.

He had been placed on the FBI's list of 10 Most Wanted fugitives shortly before his case was detailed on the television program, "America's Most Wanted."

The woman with whom he had been living was a former state police officer after seeing the program.

Asked why he had not fled when the program aired, Stout replied, "Just got tired. I knew that I couldn't live any kind of a normal life. Just tired."

Although he declined to discuss the murders during the Dec. 13, 1988, interview with West Valley City detectives, Stout acknowledged he had a bad temper and had wanted his estranged wife, Sharon, to suffer in the knowledge that he remained at large.

At that time, he, I just wanted to hurt her. I really wanted Sharon to hurt like I hurt," Stout told the detectives, even to the point that he contemplated a secret suicide that would leave her always wondering when he would show up.

Stout's wife was a step-daughter of Mrs. Craft.

The murders occurred just before Stout was arrested for molesting a violating a court order that he stay away from his wife, and at a time when the couple were feuding over visitation rights involving their son.

Stout had been convicted of involuntary manslaughter in the 1970 shooting slaying of a man in Ohio and served three years of a four-to-25-year sentence before his release on good behavior.

The northern office will have about 125 administrative and staff members when the census is under full steam. Some 150 people in north-central Idaho will be hired on a part-time basis to work in the field.

The problem with Lewiston, said census spokesman Bob Clingman of Seattle, was that only two property owners submitted bids. One bid, from the state of Idaho, was \$30,000 over the census budget while a second, from a private property owner, was \$150,000 too high.

U.S. Attorney Maurice Elsworth said the grant will go to the Council on Domestic Violence for programs providing services to victims of reservation crimes. The Idaho council will select organizations or tribes to receive money in the form of subgrants.

Building council seeks share of surplus

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Legislature will be asked to put more than \$28 million in surplus funds into a \$45.5 million state program of construction, preventive maintenance and asbestos removal next year.

The Permanent Building Fund Advisory Council on Thursday voted unanimously for a list of projects for the next state budget.

The recommendations go into the governor's budget proposal, but the council's budget rip-up to the 1990 Legislature.

The Division of Public Works recommended spending more than triple the amount the state has been providing on preventive maintenance for its \$1 billion worth of public buildings and structures.

The Legislature has approved \$4.6 million, \$4.6 million and \$4.5 million for preventive maintenance in the last three years, 1987-1989, the request will be for \$16 million.

Public Works Director G. Anne Barker said the state has been putting off large preventive maintenance projects for years. With some of the projects, "We need to do it now or we are in a lot of trouble," she said.

The Building Fund gets about \$11 million per year but this year will have \$16.7 million, because it expects to get \$4.9 million from the new state lottery.

The priority list approved Thursday calls for \$16.1 million for preventive maintenance, \$2.6 million for asbestos abatement and \$500,000 to start work upgrading, repairing and removing underground storage tanks owned by the state.

That in essence uses up all the money in the fund, and would require the Legislature to appropriate surplus funds to pay for all new construction. Latest budget estimates are that the state will have a two-year surplus of \$102 million by the end of the next budget in July.

Council Chairman Bob Peyron, Pocatello, said he thought it was a good idea to place priority on preventive maintenance instead of new construction.

"We're on the right track with preventive maintenance," Peyron said. "We have some expensive buildings, and we have to start maintaining what we do have."

Council member state Sen. Don Mackin, D-Moscow, called it a

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Bangerter introduces new economic plan

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Gov. Norm Bangerter Thursday unveiled a three-pronged development plan aimed at uniting government and private industry in a common effort to boost Utah's economy over the next several years.

Bangerter outlined the plan, which he described as a revised version of the goals of his first term, during a news conference attended by about 75 economists, business owners and representatives of state agencies and the Legislature.

"The plan will be no better than the people in this room," the governor said. "The economic blueprint is an aggressive agenda to move this state forward with one voice and one mind."

Bangerter said the first goal was to increase the average Utah household income \$5,000 a year by 1995 to match the national average. He said that was particularly important since Utah households are the nation's largest.

Next, Bangerter said, the public and private sectors would be encouraged to share the common economic mission of creating more jobs, since government alone cannot

achieve robust development. Finally, he said, the state must concentrate on providing the roads, water systems and other facilities necessary to lure new businesses to the "latter-day state."

Utah must be "aggressive and forward-looking" — a competitor and a player with every other state in the country and every area in the world, Bangerter said.

Bangerter said the inch-thick document had been compiled over several months. He said nearly 80 expert witnesses had appeared at four hearings and dozens of business and government leaders had reviewed the draft plan and offered suggestions.

In closing, Bangerter said Utah's bid for the 1996 Olympic Winter Games was a vital part of the state's development drive because the facilities as well as the events themselves will boost tourism and revenues.

Bangerter said he was fairly confident of the success of a non-binding referendum asking voters whether the state should pursue its Olympic quest with the use of taxpayer money.

Bonneville Power plans no increase until 1991

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Jim Jura, administrator of the Bonneville Power Administration, said today that the agency finished fiscal 1989 in the black and plans no rate increases through September 1991.

Bonneville Power Administration is the federal power marketing agency in the Pacific Northwest. The agency markets power generated by a network of hydroelectric dams on the Columbia and Snake river systems.

"After a thorough review of our finances, we decided we have the financial strength to extend rates for two more years," Jura said in a written statement. "We made it through 1989 by managing our way through some difficult situations: a vigorous cold snap in February, the third year in a row of low streamflows and a drop in sales to California."

Preliminary figures show BPA ended the year with net revenues of \$39 million, \$45 million below expectations.

Low water flowing through the Columbia-Snake rivers system forced BPA to suspend some sales to California, cutting expected revenues from sales outside the region to \$81 million, about \$85 million less than expected.

BPA also spent about \$99 million, \$28 million more than expected, to buy energy during the year.

Strong sales to aluminum companies and Northwest utilities partly offset the cost of buying power and the shortfall in sales outside the region, Jura said.

Aluminum and utility sales were \$87 million more than expected. "We are happy to be in the black, but we could be doing better," Jura said. "We are still in a fragile financial situation."

"We must keep a close eye on the Columbia River's flow and the amount of power available," he said. "We will continue to monitor their impacts on our finances."

BPA had a fiscal 1989 budget of \$2 billion.

Depositor who refused class action gains full judgment

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A thriftee depositor who sued rather than participate in the class action that resulted in a settlement with the state has a full judgment from the court.

"We just wanted to get our money back," said Doug White, an attorney who sued the state on behalf of his wife, Carolyn, and their children. "We won a 100 percent judgment. So I believe we're better off than had we joined in the class-action suit."

The Whites lost \$43,217 they had in Charter Thrift & Loan in Bountiful, one of five thrifts closed by state officials as insolvent in July 1988.

Second District Judge Douglas C. Kirby by their week granted the Whites' motion for summary judgment, awarding them the full

amount they claimed they lost. The 15,000 depositors in the class-action suit agreed to settle with the state last year for about 90 percent of the amount they lost in the thrifts.

"We were the only ones who decided to sue on our own," he said. "And I believe we made the right decision."

White alleged fraud on the part of the state in his suit, claiming state officials had misled the parent company of Charter Thrift and Loan insolvent on July 1, 1986, and had taken control of the thrift.

His wife deposited the money after that date and nobody told her the deposit was in jeopardy, White said.

That fact, he said, gave him legitimate grounds to allege fraud on the part of the state.

Delay frees vandalism suspect

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The Utah Court of Appeals has ruled prosecutors waited too long to appeal a judge's dismissal of four charges against a southern Utah man in a Burn Trail vandalism case. Grant S. Johnson, who lived in an environmental enclave near Boulder at the dirt road's northern end, had been charged with damaging four bulldozers on Dec. 2, 1988.

The equipment was to have been used on a controversial grading project on the 66-mile-long scenic trail. However, a 6th Circuit Court dismissed the charges at preliminary hearing, citing insufficient evidence.

The Garfield County prosecutors attempted to reopen the preliminary hearing to present additional evidence, but the judge said the new evidence was essentially the same as that presented at the first hearing.

Prosecutors appealed the judge's dismissals to the appellate court, but a three-judge panel refused to consider the matter because the appeal had not been filed within the required 10-day period.

The judges also refused to consider appeals by both prosecutors and Johnson on suppression-of-evidence questions raised on separate drug-related charges.

Utah firm signs Navy contract

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The Utah Navy Research Institute has won a Navy contract worth up to \$15 million to build helicopter simulators, Rep. Howard Nielson has announced.

The contract will be carried out by Eyring's Simulation Systems Division at Midvale, the 3rd District Republican said Wednesday in Washington.

"This is a milestone for Eyring. It marks the acceptance of Eyring as a major producer of military systems simulation products" for the Department of Defense," he said.

The trainers will simulate the performance of the new SH-2G LAMPS MK1 helicopter used in anti-submarine warfare, mine hunting, ship tracking and search and rescue operations.

The first phase of the contract calls for Eyring to build one simulator with the possibility of contracting for four more.

A statement from Nielson's office quoted Eyring as saying the contract calls for Eyring to hire about 20 engineers to work on the project as well as other pending contracts.

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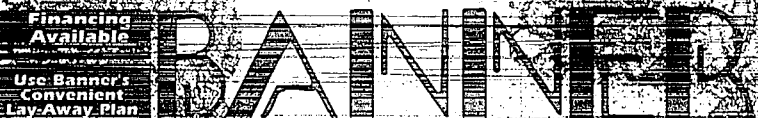

Grant helps Indian crime victims

BOISE (AP) — A federal grant of \$115,000 will be used to help victims of crimes on Indian reservations in Idaho, officials say.

U.S. Attorney Maurice Elsworth said the grant will go to the Council on Domestic Violence for programs providing services to victims of reservation crimes. The Idaho council will select organizations or tribes to receive money in the form of subgrants.

Building council seeks share of surplus

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Legislature will be asked to put more than \$28 million in surplus funds into a \$45.3 million state program of construction preventive maintenance and asbestos removal next year.

The Permanent Building Fund Advisory Council on Thursday voted unanimously for a list of projects for the next state budget. The recommendations go into the governor's budget proposal, but the decisions will live up to the 1990 Legislature.

The Division of Public Works recommended spending more than triple the amount the state has been providing on preventive maintenance for its \$1 billion worth of public buildings and structures.

The Legislature has approved \$4.6 million, \$4.6 million and \$4.5 million for legal fees over the last three years. Next year, the request will be for \$16.1 million.

Public Works Director G. Anne Barker said the state has been putting off large preventive maintenance projects for years. While some of the projects, "We need to do it now or we are in a lot of trouble," she said.

The Building Fund gets about \$11 million per year but this year will have \$16.7 million because it expects to get \$4.9 million from the state.

The priority list approved Thursday calls for \$16.1 million for preventive maintenance, \$2.6 million for asbestos abatement and \$500,000 to start work upgrading, repairing and removing underground storage tanks owned by the state.

That in essence uses up all the money in the fund, and would require the Legislature to appropriate surplus funds to pay for all new construction. Latest budget estimates are that the state will have a two-year surplus of \$102 million by the end of the next budget in July.

Council Chairman Bob Peyron said he thought it was a "good target" to place priority on preventive maintenance, instead of new construction.

"We're on the right track with preventive maintenance," Peyron said. "We have some expensive buildings, and we have to start mending what we do have." Council member state Sen. Don Mackinn, D-Moscow, called it a

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Bangerter introduces new economic plan

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Gov. Norm Bangerter Thursday unveiled a three-pronged development plan aimed at uniting government and private industry in a common effort to boost Utah's economy over the next several years.

Bangerter outlined the plan, which he described as a revised version of the goals of his first term, during a news conference attended by about 75 economists, business owners and representatives of state agencies and the Legislature.

"The plan will be no better than the people in this room," the governor said. "The economic blueprint is an aggressive agenda to move this state forward with one voice and one mind."

Bangerter said the first goal was to increase the average Utah household income \$5,000 a year by 1995 to match the national average. He said that was particularly important since Utah households are the nation's largest.

Next, Bangerter said, the public and private sectors would be encouraged to share the common economic mission of creating more jobs, since government alone cannot

achieve robust development.

Finally, he said, the state must concentrate on providing the roads, water systems and other facilities necessary to lure new businesses to the Beehive State.

Utah must be "aggressive and forward-looking — a competitor and a player with every other state in the country and every area in the world," Bangerter said.

Bangerter said the inch-thick document had been compiled over several months. He said nearly 80 expert witnesses had appeared at four hearings and dozens of business and government leaders had reviewed the draft plan and offered suggestions.

In closing, Bangerter said Utah's bid for the 1998 Olympic Winter Games was a vital part of the state's development drive because the facilities as well as the events themselves will boost tourism and revenues.

Bangerter said he was fairly confident of the success of a non-binding referendum asking voters whether the state should raise its sales tax to meet the needs of taxpayers.

Bonneville Power plans no increase until 1991

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Jim Jura, administrator of the Bonneville Power Administration, said today that the agency finished fiscal 1989 in the black and plans no rate increases through September 1991.

Bonneville Power Administration is the federal power marketing agency in the Pacific Northwest. The agency markets power generated by a network of hydroelectric dams on the Columbia and Snake river systems.

"After a thorough review of our finances, we decided we have the financial strength to extend rates for two more years," Jura said in a written statement. "We made it through 1989 by managing our way through some difficult situations: a vigorous cold snap in February, the third year in a row of low streamflows and a drop in sales to California."

Provisionary figures show BPA ended the year with net revenues of \$39 million, \$45 million below expectations.

Low water flowing through the Columbia-Snake rivers system forced BPA to suspend some sales to California, cutting expected revenues from sales outside the region to \$81 million, about \$85 million less than expected.

BPA also spent about \$99 million, \$28 million more than expected, to buy energy during the year.

Strong sales to aluminum companies and Northwest utilities partly offset the cost of buying power and the shortfall in sales outside the region, Jura said.

Aluminum and utility sales were \$87 million more than expected. "We are happy to be in the black, but we could be doing better," Jura said. "We are still in a fragile financial situation."

"We must keep a close eye on the Columbia River's flow and the aluminum power requirements," he said.

"We will continue to monitor their impacts on our finances," BPA had a fiscal 1989 budget of \$2 billion.

Depositor who refused class action gains full judgment

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A Utah depositor who refused to participate in the class action that resulted in a settlement with the state has a full judgment from the court.

"We just wanted to get our money back," said Doug White, an attorney who sued the state on behalf of his wife, Carolyn, and their children. "We won a 100 percent judgment. So I believe we're better off than had we joined in the class-action suit."

White lost \$43,217 he had in Charter Thrift & Loan in Bountiful, one of five thrifts closed by state officials as insolvent in July 1986.

Second District Judge Douglas Cornaby this week granted the White's motion for summary judgment, awarding them the full amount they claimed they lost.

The 15,000 depositors in the class-action suit agreed to settle with the state last year for about 90 percent of the amount they lost in the thrifts.

"We were the only ones who decided to sue on our own," he said. "And I believe we made the right decision."

White alleged fraud on the part of the state in his suit, claiming state officials had declared the parent company of Charter Thrift and Loan insolvent on July 1, 1986, and had taken control of the thrift.

His wife deposited the money after that date and nobody told her the deposit was in jeopardy, White said.

That fact, he said, gave him legitimate grounds to allege fraud on the part of the state.

Delay frees vandalism suspect

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The Utah Court of Appeals has ruled prosecutors waited too long to appeal a judge's dismissal of four charges against a southern Utah man in a Burg Trail vandalism case.

Greg S. Johnson was found in an environmental enclave near Boulder at the dirt road's northern end, had been charged with damaging four bulldozers on Dec. 2, 1988.

The equipment was to have been used on a controversial logging project on the 66-mile-long scenic trail.

However, a 6th Circuit Court dismissed the charges at preliminary hearing, citing insufficient evidence.

The Garfield County prosecutors attempted to reopen the preliminary hearing to present additional evidence, but the judge said the new evidence was essentially the same as that presented at the first hearing.

Prosecutors appealed the dismissals to the appellate court, but a three-judge panel refused to consider the matter because the appeal had not been filed within the required 10-day period.

The judge also refused to consider appeals by both prosecutors and Johnson on suppression-of-evidence questions raised on separate drug-related charges.

Utah firm snags Navy contract

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Utah's Eyring Research Institute has won a Navy contract worth up to \$15 million to build helicopter simulators, Rep. Howard Nielson has announced.

The contract will be carried out by Eyring's Simulation Systems Division in Midvale, the 3rd District Republican said Wednesday in Washington.

"This is a milestone for Eyring. It marks the acceptance of quality systems major products of quality systems simulation products for the Department of Defense," he said.

The trainers will simulate the performance of the new SH-2G LAMPS MkII helicopter used in anti-submarine warfare, mine hunting, ship tracking and search-and-rescue operations.

The first phase of the contract calls for Eyring to build one simulator with the possibility of contracting for four more.

A statement from Nielson's office quoted Eyring project coordinator Mark Compton as saying the company will be hiring about 20 engineers to work on the project as well as other pending contracts.

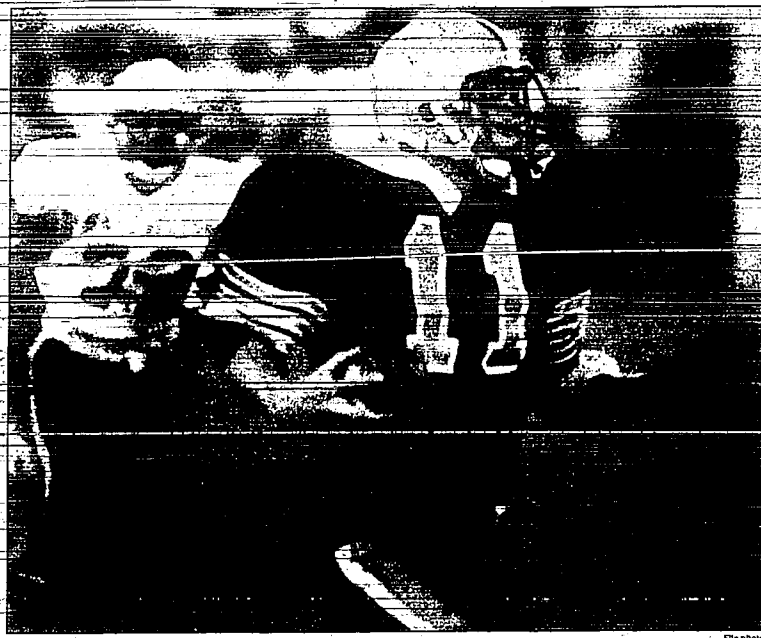

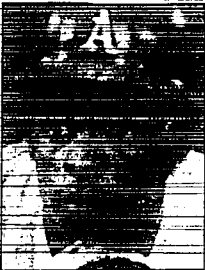
Henderson enters name for free agency

They may be different numbers of they may be the same. You certainly give the home club every opportunity to meet their figure before you even talk to other clubs."

"Once you begin discussing if some club meets a predetermined figure, which may be higher and which may not be, then the player signs. You don't run back and forth trying to run one club against the other."

Henderson said he works hard to get his agent back to the market at the right money.

roughly doubled, and Hagerman has gone from 1-8 to 7-2.

The thing that makes Hagerman to tough is their sweep, and the Engles kid is probably the key to that," said Rimrock coach Bob Murray, whose Raiders lost 32-0 to the Pirates on Sept. 8. "They outman most A-4 teams, and the Engles kid has good enough speed to get outside or cut back. If you don't keep him contained, you're not going to beat them."

Engles isn't exceptionally fast — 4.7- or 4.8-second speed in the 40-yard dash — but he has the fast corner drier to finish sixth at the state track meet last spring in the 400-meter dash in a time of 51.7.

"He doesn't have breakout speed, but he has good quickness and good enough speed to get out of the hole," Clark said. "Especially when he gets some blocks from our offensive line."

The Pirates' offensive front averages 220 pounds, which is exceptional for an A-4 school.

"I think Brad was the first to tell us that that one of the reasons we've been so much more success-

ful this year is that we've got a great offensive line," said Clark.

Engles, who doubles as a cornerback on defense, has worked on both his speed and strength since the end of last season.

"Track really helped me," he said. "I think that's the reason of last year I improved a lot. Then last summer we went on a weight program. As a team, we got a lot stronger."

But the two biggest reasons for the extra year's experience, Engles said, themselves they could win.

"This is the same group of guys running the same defense and the same offense as a year ago," he said. "The difference is that we have the extra year's experience. There are six seniors and most of us have been playing together for three years, plus we have a lot of juniors who played last year. We've just come together as a team."

The last ingredient fell into place when the Pirates beat Rimrock in September, and convinced themselves that Hagerman's 13-year run of losing seasons was about to come to an end.

"I think most of us thought last spring that we would be a lot better, but we had to win a few games before we'd sink in," Engles said. "We lost to Rattl-River, and then we beat Oakley over there in a tough game where they were that close to running away. Our defense had to hold them and we did, and that was a big win. We came back, but I think going to Murrough got us up to beat that the playoffs."

It wasn't easy to get into the playoffs this year, and I think losing to Murrough kind of broke the kids' spirit," said Clark. "Woody is a tough kid who can play with injuries and has the kind of a kid who will overcome some adversity to do the things he has to do to win."

The other thing is that he's good in the classroom, as are all our seniors this year," Clark continued. "He's a good student and he works hard and it shows on the football field."

Engles and his teammates have dedicated this season to Hagerman High sophomore Willie Harrison, who is suffering from cystic fibrosis,

Harbison, who serves as a student leader, is frequently too ill to attend the Pirates' games, but he shows up anyway.

"Willie is a big incentive for us all," said Engles. "He only misses games when he is in the hospital."

We're all real close to him. He's brought us a lot closer as a team."

And for the long-suffering football fans of Hagerman:

"It's great," Engles said. "Every body in town is excited. This year has been a lot more fun."

TWIN FALLS — "Mary, Mary" marks a new beginning of sorts for Magic Valley Little Theatre.

The play isn't all that different in style from Neil Simon's "Chapter Two," which the Little Theatre presented last fall.

It's a sophisticated, adult comedy revolving around the relationship between Bob McKellaway and his former wife, Mary. Separated nine months and recently divorced, the two must meet to put their records in order. Much to their dismay, however, they seem to have entirely resolved their feelings about the other.

Ruling would mean fewer channels to choose from

Senior discounts

TWIN FALLS — Local King Videocable subscribers may have the luxury of selecting programming from three CBS affiliates and two ABC stations. But if a Federal Communications Commission ruling goes into effect Jan. 1, the out-of-town stations will largely be "blacked out" by request of the local filitees.

Cable subscribers received this short notice with King's most recent mailing: "An FCC ruling called Syndicated Exclusivity, or Syndex, will go into effect Jan. 1, 1990. Syndex gives TV stations the authority to require cable systems in their areas to 'black out' syndicated and network programming to which they have exclusive rights."

Lee Wagner, general manager of KMVT, says that broadcasting — like any other business — must seek to protect its investment, and Syndex would serve that purpose.

"When a station buys rights to a program, it is also buying the exclusive rights to that program in its given market. Stations show the program in that market. Stations use that contract to attract viewers and, consequently, advertisers who will pay for the privilege of knowing they are reaching those viewers," Wagner explains.

When cable companies import distant signals, "this is obviously going to dilute the advertisers' seek," says Wagner. Local stations have been seeking protection such as that offered by Syndex since cable became a serious factor, at least 10 or 15 years ago," he adds.

TWIN FALLS — King Videocable has broadened its discount policy for senior citizens.

The cable company previously gave a price break to people 65 or over with a total household income of \$14,000 or less. The income limit is now \$14,000, according to Vince Thompson, acting general manager.

The policy gives seniors a 10 percent discount on basic cable service. It also includes free installation or a free transfer of service from another address.

If Syndex is upheld by the courts, KSL's "M*A*S*H" segments will be blacked out since KMVT has exclusive rights through July 1992 to the show.

In fact, much of the programming available now on the front-line signal will be blacked out. An estimate based on one week's worth of programming shows just about 20 percent of KBCI's programming and 34 percent of KSL's fare will remain intact under Syndex, Thompson says.

Neither Thompson nor Wagner would speculate on which way the court will rule on Syndex. "It's just close of a call," says Thompson. "If the new regulations take effect, King would have to black out KBCI signal. Further, Syndex would require King Videocable to black out any programming to which KMVT and KXVI (the local ABC nonduplicated protection policy, that means blocks out any CBS program airing on Boise's KBCI (channel 12 for King subscribers) or Salt Lake City's KSL (cable channel 23) when it is airing on KMVT, the local CBS affiliate, at exactly the same time of week.

Noah Adams, staffers arrive in Boise Monday

BOISE — A few weeks ago, Newsweek magazine published an article titled "America's Outback," a grim portrait of the area it called "the Great West." Now, the magazine is planning to feature Idaho, Maine or Florida had to come away convinced the region — which includes Idaho — is about ready to dry up and blow away.

Art Silverman, BSU Radio Network managing editor, says "All Things Considered" host Noah Adams, producer Art Silverman and several other NPR staffers from Washington, D.C., will arrive Monday in Boise to prepare for the broadcasts.

But Hoyt and her staff of four reporters have been working on the project since January, preparing a variety of stories that will air during the week-long broadcasts.

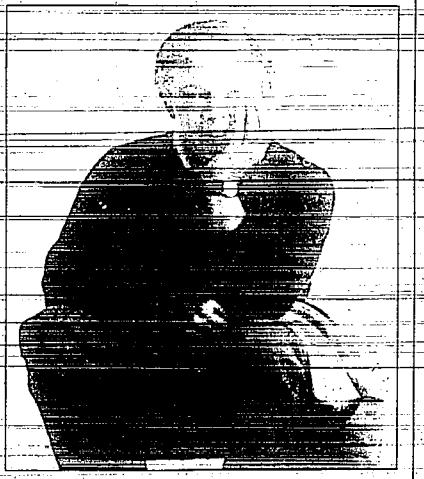
Silverman suggested the idea of a show on the centennial states to all NPR member stations in the region some time ago, according to Hoyt. "We jumped on it," she says. Hoyt and Silverman had worked together on a number of projects in the past; in addition, BSU Radio is one of only two NPR stations in the region with satellite up-link capability.

Reporters from NPR stations in North and South Dakota, Montana, Washington and Wyoming will add to the report. Stories will be heard on "All Things Considered," which airs from 7 p.m. to 9 p.m. weekdays, as well as on "Morning Edition," heard weekdays from 5 a.m. to 9 a.m., and "Weekend Edition" on Saturday and Sunday from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m.

The technology and teamwork that sold NPR on coming to Idaho ought to help dispel Newsweek's bad publicity.

"Just the fact we were able to put this program together counters the Newsweek article," says Hoyt. "People will be hearing that Boise and Idaho."

Kravitz won't play 'Mr. Bonet'

NEW YORK (AP) — Name-dropping is a favorite pastime in the entertainment business, and musician Lenny Kravitz has a few at his disposal.

There's his wife, actress Lisa Bonet, of NBC's "Different World," his mother, Rosie Koker, who played Helen Willis in the long-running TV sitcom "The Jeffersons," and his father, Sy Kravitz, a former NBC executive.

But the younger Kravitz, who also goes by the name Romeo Blue, prefers discussing a few well-placed strangers, such as John Lennon, Jimi Hendrix, Bob Marley and Lou Reed, all influences for his debut album, "Let Love Rule."

"I'm not hip on the way records sound today," the 25-year-old Kravitz said, "all this digital and sampling everywhere."

"My record sounds like the kind you just drop a needle on and play. I grew up on records that sound like this. I don't think records sound any better than in the late-'50s or early '60s."

He makes his point on the record's opening track, "Sitting on Top of the World," proudly performed in three parts — his voice crackling early in the song.

"I dreamed the whole song," he said, "and I hummed it into the tape recorder. I did it one live, in one take, with just guitar and mike. Someone told me to get rid of the crack in my voice, but I liked it that way."

Kravitz thinks of old girlfriends with a fondness. "I was with 'Rosemary,'" and gives Bonet her due on "I Build This Garden for US," the last song to make the record.

"The lyrics were just killing me," he said. "I wrote the hook, but there were spaces missing everywhere. I

stayed up for two days and drove myself crazy. I was ready to slash my throat. The last night in the studio I finished it and did the vocals."

Kravitz grew up in New York and Los Angeles and at age 10 was already learning guitar and writing. He spent time as a classical musician, performing with the California Boys' Choir, and appearing on records with Zubin Mehta. By high school, however, Kravitz was a born-gain rock 'n' roller.

"From the time I graduated from high school until now, I think I turned down about eight record deals," he said. "They wanted trendy black music, which I hate. This is too white. You have to get your black back first, then you can cross over. Everybody has to get yourself a drum machine and make yourself a funk record."

That was a big issue. But what I'm doing is black music anyway, rhythm and blues, rock 'n' roll. People think if you don't sound like Bobby Brown, it's not black music."

He spent time in the studio recording songs meant for his specialty: when a friend heard a tape and passed the word around that a promising new star was waiting to be discovered. After meeting and falling in love with Bonet, Kravitz was an even hotter property.

"Being that I was married to her, people were interested in what I was doing. I was on the cover of all these magazines, just because I was married to her. Who is this guy?"

Bonet not only brought him more needed publicity, but helped Kravitz find himself as a musician.

"When I first met Lisa, I was a studio musician, but I still didn't know what to do, because I played funk, rock, jazz, whatever and could play all sorts of instruments," said Kravitz, who plays all the instruments on "Let Love Rule."

"We're so similar, I saw myself in her, a reflection of myself. All of a sudden I knew what I had to do. After she was finished with her show, I started writing and looking myself in a studio. My writing came back and I started building up these tunes."

Kravitz's nasal vocals on "Let Love Rule" and "Be" recall Lennon and Elvis Costello, and "Mr. Cab Driver," an angry talking blues, has the man-of-the-street feel of Red's best-known songs.

"I got 'The Best of Lou Reed' and 'Walk on the Wild Side.' This blew my mind. I fell in love with that. Lou Reed was a real rock 'n' roll sound, getting that message over. But I don't think about doing a Lou Reed-sounding record, certain sounds just come out of me."

He vows to include other musicians on his next record and is touring with a 10-piece band. Kravitz hopes to "win over fans who know him only for the names he can drop. What if I came out to see you because your wife is so-and-so? If that's what brings people out, fine. I'd say, 'But I've got something to say. I'm not interested in being Mr. Bonet.'"

Alzheimer's patients respond to innovative arts program

WASHINGTON (AP) — The classroom is alive with activity and chatter. Women lean forward, intently pasting together fabric, paper and cardboard. Others draw with bright markers. Some sit with unlit joints just to be there.

Florence Skuce, 93, gently claps her hands and inspects the small notebook she has created. "My book," she squeals. "Hooray."

Dorothy Ewin, 89, says she may use her notebook to record "little positive bits of things that are coming up."

Emilia Maryman, 93, does not speak, but grins broadly at her finished product, assembled with lots of help from workshop leaders.

Within minutes, Dorothy has forgotten where her notebook came from. Others, too, soon will forget.

"The workshop, however, has been a success," says Skuce.

Alzheimer's patients participate without complaining, frustrated at tasks that are too difficult.

"We try to bring out whatever is left in people," said Lolo Samoff, a 73-year-old retired scientist and acting sculptor who works for the Aging.

"You have to be a little bit more patient, a little bit more repetitive, but they will do more very beautiful things."

Working with the arts has a "soothing effect" on the Alzheimer's patients and reduces their agitation, even though the classes themselves may be forgotten because of memory impairment, Mrs. Samoff said.

"They are incredibly happy when they can accomplish something, but you don't expect that they will remember. We just live in the moment."

Mark Rooney, a painter and art teacher who is Arts for the Aging's program director, said many patients learn — and progress — during workshops, though some may never make it past drawing even the basic border.

"One student makes Jackson Pollock-type scribbling through the class period, then holds it up with a sweet smile to ask, 'Is this what you wanted?'"

Rooney is fascinated with the work of eccentrics such as Pollock and Vincent van Gogh and sees Arts for the Aging as an opportunity to study that art in progress. "I personally respond to their art because it is very honest. It's not contrived in any way."

An estimated 2.5 million to 3 million Americans have Alzheimer's disease, the most common cause of severe intellectual impairment in older people. The numbers are expected to mushroom as the nation's population ages.

At first, individuals may experience only subtle changes in memo-

ry. But as the disease progresses it can cause serious forgetfulness, confusion, loss of initiative and changes in personality and judgment that leave patients unable to care for themselves.

Bodil Meloney, a sculptor and part-time executive director of Arts for the Aging, said it is one of many support systems family members need as they struggle with the daily demands of caring for a loved one who is losing his or her mind.

"It is as if a small egg in the whole thing. The artwork seems to calm them down, they are pleased with what they have done."

Samoff started Arts for the Aging "like everything else in my life — by mistake." She said she happened to answer the telephone at the Art Barn, a community-run art gallery when the National Institutes of Health called six years ago seeking someone to teach an art class for Alzheimer's victims.

That pilot program was so well received that she began organizing similar workshops from the Art Barn last year. She created a separate non-profit organization "dedicated to enhancing the lives of the aging through art."

Arts for the Aging, financed entirely by private grants and donations, celebrated its first anniversary with a gala benefit Oct. 11 at the West German Embassy that featured an exhibit of artwork by Alzheimer's patients.

The program now sends paid artists into 10 adult day care centers in the Washington area and Samoff hopes to export the idea to other parts of the country. Arts for the Aging also plans to create a pamphlet for teachers and caregivers at senior centers around the country and is seeking financing for a research project with Georgetown Medical Center's Department of Gerontology to evaluate the effect of artistic stimulation on Alzheimer's patients' behavior.

In addition, the Corcoran School of Art in Washington is offering a new course using teaching methods developed by Arts for the Aging.

One week participants may help make a quilt, another time they will learn pantomime, sometimes they hear stories — often they paint or draw.

The program succeeds where countless other arts and crafts projects "never seem to achieve anything but frustration," reports Sarah O'Brien of the Bethesda Fellowship House, an adult day care center in suburban Maryland. The artists "allow the often unusual creativity seen in Alzheimer's participants to flourish and then attempting to stiffen it with conformity."

Melissa Brown, recreation director for June House, another center given by Arts for the Aging, said it gives patients with intellectual problems a new way to express themselves.

"Even the cognitively impaired el-

derly have the ability to appreciate art. Art can reach the emotional side of them, which can still be functioning and in need of being utilized."

Artists who conduct the workshops are specially trained to teach the aged and to help even Alzheimer's patients participate without complaining, frustrated at tasks that are too difficult.

"We try to bring out whatever is left in people," said Lolo Samoff, a 73-year-old retired scientist and acting sculptor who works for the Aging.

"You have to be a little bit more patient, a little bit more repetitive, but they will do more very beautiful things."

Unique doctors tend to movie personnel

BALTIMORE (AP) — When a medical emergency occurs on the set of a movie, it's not always part of the script.

So when Dr. James D'Orta is not setting a broken bone at Baltimore's Franklin Square Hospital or patching up a shooting victim at Georgetown University Medical Center in Washington, the emergency medicine specialist usually can be found on a movie set.

D'Orta is the founder of LifeStar International, a Washington-based medical consulting firm that expands the walls of the emergency room to movie sets.

And his colleagues have provided advanced planning and emergency medical care on the set for three recent movies: "Licence to Kill" and "Arnold Schwarzenegger's 'Total Recall," both filmed in Mexico; and "The Abyss," an underwater thriller filmed in an abandoned nuclear power plant that was converted into a film studio in Gaffney, S.C.

When the thick banks of skyscrapers," said D'Orta. "Producers with vision can see the necessity of taking preventive measures to ensure the safety of their crews. It's several hundreds of millions of dollars of movie budgets that we're protecting."

According to the New York-based Center for Safety in the Arts, more than 1,000 injuries are reported each year in the U.S. film industry, and

since 1980, at least 19 people have been killed at helicopter accidents on movie sets. Actor Vic Morrow and two children were killed in 1982 during the filming of "Twilight Zone: The Movie," and five people died during the filming of "Chuck Norris' 'Delta Force 2'" in the Philippines last May.

D'Orta, 38, started the company after accompanying his producer, Albert Guback, to Manila, Missouri, to film another James Bond movie, "The Living Daylights," released by United Artists in 1987.

It was D'Orta's job to keep the new James Bond, Timothy Dalton, and the rest of the cast and crew in good health while the movie was filmed in the oasis of Ouzazate, in the Sahara Desert. Time lost on the set because of injuries or illness cost more than \$250,000 per day, or about \$500 per minute. The doctor's work also took him off the film set and into what he described as "a real-life James Bond drama."

He was approached in the desert by soldiers who were seeking help for the victim of a motorcycle accident, the guard to the prince of Bahrain.

"They said, 'The prince will give you anything if you will come and help us,'" D'Orta said. "When we got there, the prince was begging me to help the man and the guy was lying unconscious on the street. He had a blood clot on the brain."

To the amazement of passersby, D'Orta inserted an intravenous needle and hooked the patient to a cardiac monitor. The 007 airplane was summoned to take the guard to hospital in Rabat, Morocco.

Mission accomplished, D'Orta left the hospital, but was stopped by soldiers demanding his passport.

"I told them, 'I'm back in the desert on the movie set,'" D'Orta said. "They put me in a room where I sat and drank tea for six hours until the king gave permission for me to leave."

D'Orta's patient recovered after surgery.

D'Orta drafted Dr. Craig Peetel, an emergency physician at George Washington University Medical Center in Washington, and Vincent Young, a Harvard business graduate, and founded LifeStar.

D'Orta, Peetel and a network of hundreds of emergency physicians throughout the country have traveled to movie sets in such places as the Philippines, Austria, Tangiers, Mexico and the Soviet Union. In addition to motion pictures, the company also provided medical consultation for Amnesty International's 1988 Human Rights Now! concert tour, which featured in major cities all over the world.

D'Orta also helped coordinate emergency medical teams after the 1985 earthquake in Mexico City, and was part of a group of physicians who traveled to the Soviet

Union after last fall's earthquake in Armenia.

"The thing that makes us different from other entrepreneurs and businessmen is that we're truly practice medicine," D'Orta said. "That gives us more credibility."

LifeStar uses computer links to the World Health Organization, the Centers for Disease Control and the State Department to analyze everything from rumors of an outbreak in Grenada to reports of a new outbreak of resistant malaria in Zambia.

The company checks each person's immunizations, types their blood and has access to blood that has been screened to be disease-free by U.S. and British standards.

Because many medications in the United States don't have exact equivalents in other countries, LifeStar sends along a well-stocked portable pharmacy. Detailed plans are made for rapid transport to medical facilities in the event of injury or illness, and once the filming begins, LifeStar physicians remain on the set.

LifeStar's prices vary depending on the size of the production and the risks and planning required, Young said.

"Any major film production can afford us," Young said.

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Shock art disturbs many because of danger, cruelty to animals

BOSTON (AP) — Practitioners of shock art have dined barefoot on glass and bitten the heads off live animals. Now, one of them faces possible arrest for lighting fireworks on his chest, again raising the question of how much is too much.

Shock art can appear in mild forms such as that practiced by David Davis, who has dined out on poetry while adding poured water on his head. It can be as severe as Chris Burden's being taken to a Volkswagen or having someone stab him.

The practice of defining new art forms by shocking people set off a national debate recently over public funding of an exhibit by photographer Robert Mapplethorpe, which featured homosexual and sadomasochistic photographs.

"Some art might shock and disturb

people, and that's certainly a valid reason for art to do," said Jimmy Aellig, executive director at Boston's Dance Umbrella, which recently featured a Japanese artist who danced barefoot on glass. "He is actually composing on the glass," said Aellig.

The limit, however, is "when people are placed without knowledge in a position of danger themselves," he said. "Whether that can be classified as art or not, it's inappropriate."

Joe Coleman may have provided the acid test in Boston: Athlete Greg Cottman crossed the line by endangering his audience.

Cottman, who appeared before a small audience at the Boston Film and Video Foundation, bit off the head and front legs of a white mouse and hugged one spectator after he

poured a bucket of blood over himself. He also ignited fireworks on his chest and some burning shards landed in the audience.

"It was definitely a terrifying experience," said Viveca Gardner, 23, a financial writer in Somerville. "We weren't protected, and we were definitely in danger."

One of the smoldering pieces flew into the face of Robin Brown, who sat near Gardner in the audience. She said she brushed it off her cheek and it then landed on her skirt and burned a hole the size of a dime.

"If it had landed on my eye, it definitely would have blinded me," said Brown, 23, an editor for a market research firm in Cambridge.

Fire officials said they would press for charges in the case. Lighting fireworks inside is illegal, as is setting fires without a permit or a fire

detail present, Fire Chief Howard Ferguson said Wednesday.

"We are trying to find out how many things we can charge them with," said Ferguson, who admitted authorities had not yet determined whom they would charge. They also can't find Coleman, who is based in New York, Ferguson said.

Animal rights activists, patrons and even some leaders of the arts community say Coleman went too far.

Gue Thornton, head of the state Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, said "there's a lot of concern about 'use of animals in artistic acts and movies,' and I think a lot of the industry is trying to be responsible."

The head of the Boston Film and Video Foundation disavowed any connection with Coleman. Anne

Maris Stein said the Coleman performance was the independent project of a foundation member, and the act was not funded by the public sources which support regular foundation work.

"While she said she generally believes in letting people decide for themselves what they think is art, the foundation would not permit acts which could endanger the lives of people or involve cruelty to animals," said Coleman's performance.

'Halloween 5' producer worried about box office

HOLLYWOOD — Moustapha Akkad, producer of "Halloween 5: The Revenge of Michael Myers," is accustomed to instilling fear into his audiences. Now, his audience is frightening him.

"Halloween 5" opened a week ago, just a couple of weeks after two other horror sequels, New Line's "Nightmare on Elm Street 3: The Dream Child" and Paramount's "Friday the 13th: Part VIII — Jason Takes Manhattan," opened to disappointing ticket sales.

"There is this nervousness," Akkad said. "The producer is crossing his fingers that the reason for the audience boredom with the genre, maybe it was the quality of the films, he says, or the fact that both opened during one of the most competitive summers in recent movie history."

"We hope it's one of these reasons," Akkad said. He will find out in the coming weeks, as the box-office results for "Halloween 5" roll in.

The Syrian-born Akkad is on his own with "Halloween 5." He doesn't have a big studio, independent movie company, like New Line, behind him. Two years ago, Akkad bought the rights to the film from his original partners — including the first film's director, John Carpenter, its co-writer, Debra Hill, and its executive producer, Irwin Yablans.

At that time, the partners were scabbling about the future of the "Halloween" series, in part because of the disappointing box-office take of "Halloween 3," which adopted a completely different story line than its predecessors. Entertainment Data Inc. says that "Halloween 3" sold \$14.4 million worth of tickets in 1982, while "Halloween 2" had taken in \$25.5 million at U.S. theaters the year before.

"After 'Halloween 3,' we couldn't agree on how to proceed," Yablans said. "We had become rich and comfortable, and suddenly everyone was an artist."

The rights to "Halloween" went

on the auction block, but no major studio bids for even Universal, which had distributed the second and third installments. Akkad came in and topped bids by several independent companies.

"For four years, we didn't do any 'Halloween's," says Akkad. "But I believed in it. It's not a genre creation or anything. But whenever Halloween season comes around, audiences want something like this."

The first "Halloween" and the only one directed by Carpenter, was one of the most financially successful independent movies ever made.

The production budget was only \$300,000 and it grossed about \$4.4 million at American theaters alone.

The villain of "Halloween" is Michael Myers, who as an 8-year-old murdered his sister after catching her in bed with her boyfriend. Much of the first "Halloween" takes place 15 years later, after Myers has grown into a murderous figure known as the Slime. The film starred Jamie Lee Curtis as a virginal high school girl that Myers pursues, and Donald Pleasence as Myers' psychiatrist.

Group asks Japanese to show more movies

TOKYO — In this otherwise dynamic and cosmopolitan capital, the last picture show normally starts at 7 p.m. That makes Jack Valenti mad. Not that Valenti, president of the Motion Picture Association of America, often finds himself in Tokyo trying to catch a 9 p.m. movie. But as head of the companion Motion Picture Export Association, Valenti worries about the ghostly movie houses across this nation of 120 million as a lost opportunity for Hollywood and a trade barrier to American exports.

Recently, Valenti visited Japan to urge its studios and movie house owners to show films at 9 p.m. and maybe even later.

"Nowhere else in the world does this occur," Valenti said. "In every major city of the world, including elsewhere in Asia, there's a 9 p.m. show."

Valenti said he believes the Japanese market, already second only to the United Kingdom with more than \$100 million in annual billings for American movies, could expand by more than 10 percent if theaters added an evening show.

There is, at least, no question about the popularity of foreign movies here. Last year in Japan, foreign movies ranked second ("The Last Emperor"), third ("Rambo 3") and fifth ("Fatal Attraction") in box-office sales.

But a mixture of tradition, regulation and native caution greeted what Valenti called his "passionate" espousal. Kichi Saito, secretary general of the Union of Exhibitors Association of Japan, said his members are not in a hurry to change their ways.

"The Japanese reality is difficult and different compared to the U.S., and this is what we have explained to Mr. Valenti," Saito said. Saito said many Tokyoites must continue an hour or more to work and to downtown and so find a midnight ending for a movie too late. In addition, Tokyo's trains begin shutting down around midnight, which also explains why Japanese major league baseball games are called after 12 innings even if the score is tied.

Although thousands of Japanese can be seen wandering the nightlife quarters of Ginza and Shinjuku long after most movie houses have closed, they are more interested in drinking than in watching movies, Saito said. And young people, he said, would rather watch videos at home.

As a result, he added, the number of movie houses has declined from a peak of more than 7,000 to about 2,000 today and the annual number of ticket sales from more than 1 billion in the late 1950s to only 150 million now.

But Valenti said the same decline in movie attendance occurred in much of the world, including the United States, and then was reversed by theaters refurbishing themselves and their marketing methods.

Simply Red: Americans don't get it

It's been three years, two No. 1 hits and 3 million albums since Simply Red entered the American pop music scene, but few seem to know who they are. The band that fills sports arenas elsewhere in the world plays the small Palladium in Los Angeles, and the moderate Warfield Theater in San Francisco. The band's narrow-minded radio programming, "Radio stations everywhere else in the world are very eclectic in their musical choice and taste," said the 29-year-old, red-haired singer, and songwriter. "They play a whole range of different types of music. In America, our music doesn't suit their programming."

I still maintain that the public doesn't get it. It's not that we're perceived as a slow-balled band. Simply Red's American hits, "If You Don't Know Me by Now," and "Holding Back the Years," are showcase songs for Hucknall's smooth, soulful vocals. But they tell only half the story.

The music of the six-man ensemble bears little resemblance to most contemporary music. Simply Red packs everything from jazz to soul to pop to reggae, and does it extremely well. 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'Look who's talking' is a surprising, yet uneven comedy

Miniseries delves into the career of a Klan leader that ended in murder

America is not fond of its demagogues. After they fall from favor, most of them are relegated to a few footnotes in the history books, while most of us try to pretend they never existed. That's why the NBC miniseries "Cross of Fire" (airing Sunday, Nov. 5 and Monday, Nov. 6) is so unusual. It takes a hard look at an American demagogue, Ku Klux Klan Grand Dragon David C. Stephenson (played by John Heard), and the sordid incident that brought him down.

By all accounts, Stephenson could be very captivating. "I think that most people found him to be a very magnetic personality," says Mel Harris, who plays Madge Oberholzer, the woman who was instrumental in his downfall. "Very charismatic and wealthy and well-placed and intelligent."

That a respectable young woman like Madge Oberholzer even knew Stephenson, tells us, perhaps better than anything else, the extent to which the Klan had become assimilated into American life during the

early 1920s. Besides being racist, this incarnation of the Klan was virulently anti-Catholic and anti-Semitic, and it tapped into a strong fundamentalist, small-town resentment of the "immoral" big city. The Klan dominated politics in a number of states, but none more so than Indiana, where Stephenson controlled the governor, most of the representatives, and both U.S. Senators.

Not too much is known about Oberholzer. She was 28 years old, unmarried, and had a job in the office of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. And she went on a few dates with Stephenson.

"I think that she was probably a bit smitten with him," says Harris. "He certainly was (considered) quite a catch. And I think something in him struck a chord."

At some point though, Oberholzer tried to distance herself from Stephenson, and Stephenson reacted violently. With the assistance of some henchmen, he forced her aboard a train, where he raped and brutally assaulted her. When he wouldn't let her go after the assaults, she managed to get hold of some poison (bichloride of mercury) and took it.

"I think she felt that she was in a situation that was so dire to her that

the choice was to go through it again and again for who knows how long or to die," says Harris. "And for her the better option was to die."

She didn't die right away, though. Stephenson kept her prisoner for another few days, and by the time he released her she was beyond medical help. She died several weeks later, but not before dictating the complete story of what had happened to her to prosecuting attorney William H. Remy, one of the few officials in the state who was not controlled by Stephenson.

Even after he was charged with murder, Stephenson was convinced that he could get away with it. What he didn't realize was that Oberholzer's story would tap into the same moralistic fervor that had originally fueled the rise of the Klan.

"I don't know that she felt that she was pulling him down and his whole system with him," says Harris. "My belief is that she just felt that was the truth; and it needed to be told."

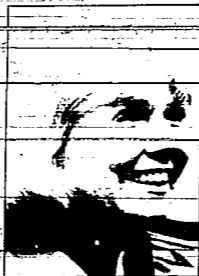

Lester jumped into "Santa Barbara"

Eat your heart out "Young and Restless" fans: Terry Lester's Jack Abbott jumped ship and he's showing off on "Santa Barbara."

"I've gone from the hip opportunist to a square and scholarly opportunist," says Lester, describing Lane Davies' former character, lawyer Mason Capwell. "My Mason may be pretty square, but he's a scholar and a sophisticate. You can't say that about Jack Abbott. There's no comparison."

Lester admits Mason is a little warped, and that adds to the actor's pleasure on "Santa Barbara." "We adhere to the history of Mason feuding with C.C., his father, but I've been given license to make the character mine. I'm doing at least 22 pages a day and I never felt so alive. On "The Young and the Restless" it wasn't uncommon for me to be finished by 11 in the morning. Here we rehearse all day and tape later. And I was afraid I might be bored."

If Terry is not kidding himself, it pays to change. Nine years of Jack Abbott ought to be enough. Where do you go for the next pine? Last January, Lester told boss Bill Bell he would leave

"Y&R" when his contract ended in August. By summer Terry had a deal with "Santa Barbara" to replace Lane Davies, off on a world tour.

"I admired "Santa Barbara,"" Lester declares. "Particularly the actors. Everybody took chances. It was daytime's Saturday Night Live." The writing was tongue-in-cheek and often literary; I remember hearing mention of Goethe and Gilbert and Sullivan. I couldn't believe my ears."

Gossip has it Lester, the show's big wage earner, was displeased with "The Young and the Restless" storylines for Jack Abbott and bigger chunks for Bell's daughter, Lauralee, as Cricket, a rape victim. Naturally Bell denies such bias.

For "Santa Barbara," lifting Terry Lester is another coup, almost equal to those Emmys. But even Lester can't do much to help those ratings or the daily pounding "Santa Barbara" takes from "General Hospital." "No move is in sight," says Lester. Sponsor Procter & Gamble also controls lead-in "Another World," and does not

Mom moves from outrage to leader of organization that targets trash TV

BLOOMFIELD HILLS, Mich. — Late afternoon: Kids home from school. It's the time of day when Terry Rakolta used to let her three unwind in front of the TV set for an hour.

But that was last year, before she had her distressing encounter with "Married ... With Children" and turned crusader for "responsible television," before she went to bed each night perusing studies of the mass media.

That was before she fully realized that children were being exposed to — well, let's take a look at what kids in suburban Detroit see at 4:45 p.m. — Rakolta switches on the Quasar.

Oprah Winfrey. "You know what they had on yesterday?" Rakolta says. "Girls that had sex — and babies — with their fathers." It was after an Oprah-led discussion of sexual addiction that Rakolta's protective instincts were first triggered; her daughter, then 8, worriedly asked

her whether it was true that women had sex with dogs. "I hadn't even talked to her yet about sex with people." She clicks the remote control.

A syndicated episode of the sitcom "Night Court." Dan, the highest-testosterone attorney, is vainly attempting to seduce Christine. Amusing, but "I think it's inappropriate for kids," Rakolta says. "This is adult humor, the networks say it's adult humor, but local stations are showing it in the afternoon."

"Inside Edition." The anchor says that tomorrow viewers will learn about the healthy teenager who developed a sore throat and died within days, allegedly prompting his father to threaten the boy's physician. "Kids see this day-in-and-day-out," is Rakolta's comment. "Death, death."

Had Terry Rakolta known that she was going to become notorious, she would have done things differently. Last winter, when it occurred to her to grow furious about television, she would have picked on a show that offended her because of its violence. Instead, she focused on the bawdi-

ness of "Married ... With Children," which led to her being labeled a humorless prude.

She would have been sophisticated about the way broadcasting and advertising work, been ready with all the facts and figures she's now scrambling to amass.

But how could she know? She was the wife of a wealthy contractor, a mother who supervised her children's homework nightly, a golfer and grower of roses, a charity woman who tried to avoid public speaking.

A quite likable woman, Rakolta was not a humorless prude, but she knew rather little about the issues on which she was suddenly expected to comment. Nothing in her theretofore private life had prepared her to be extolled on the Senate floor by Sen. Jesse Helms or branded "Mrs. Khomeini of Bloomfield Hills" in the pages of her local newspaper. "People thought I was an activist," she says. "I was just a concerned viewer."

But her incendiary letter-writing campaign to sponsors of the show that offended her, and their deferential response, followed by her appearance on the front page of The New York Times and her chats with Larry King, Ted Koppel et al., have given Rakolta a national soapbox. As the new TV season unfurled, she was still trying to figure out just what to do with it.

Rakolta now has an official title. She is president of Americans for Responsible Television, the fledgling organization she announced at a press conference last May, intended to be a watchdog group based in Washington. She's had titles before, but more along the lines of co-chairwoman of the local Grand Prix Ball.

She looks the young clubwoman in her carefully applied makeup and stylish suit; maybe it's the Alice in Wonderland hair that makes her look younger than her age, which is 45. Or maybe it's having money.

Her husband, John Rakolta Jr., presides over his family's construction firm, the state's largest, with contracts worth nearly \$500 million

Q: What's this about Ryan O'Neal quitting acting to become a professional boxer? — B.Q.

A: At 48, Ryan has no illusions about his chances as a pro athlete. He's always been a boxing fan though, and has, on occasion, stepped into the ring himself. He also has a reputation in Hollywood for being fast with his fists. Ryan still loves professional pugilism. He told me recently that he loves to coach boxers and reads the sports pages of every newspaper to keep on

top of the boxing news.

Q: Can you tell me something about Chynna Phillips, the young actress who I see occasionally on TV? Is she married? — C.B.

A: Chynna, 21, had a starring role in the TV flick "Roxanne," the Prize Pulitzer, and is considered one of Hollywood's sexiest young actresses. She's single, considers herself motivated, fun to be with and determined. She is also shy, hates to eat liver and hopes she never has to live through a divorce. In short, she's a delightfully kooky young woman — people in high school thought she was "really weird" — with a spine of steel.

Q: Is it true Bette Midler will have a major role in the next Woody Allen film? — K.B.

A: Not exactly. Allen's about to direct his next secret project in early 1990 and as far as we know "the Divine Miss M" isn't part of the cast. However, both Allen and Midler

have been talked about to star in "Scenes from the Mall," to be directed by Paul Mazursky next summer for Disney. Essentially a two-character comedy, which all takes place in a mall, of course, it's about a couple facing a serious rift in their relationship. Midler would play a best-selling writer of "pop" psychology books and Allen, a lawyer.

Q: I recently saw the comedy "Look-Who's Talking" and noticed that Bruce Willis received special credit as the voice of the baby. Is this a first? — A.O.

A: Almost, as best I can determine. Though Chill Wills made a lot of hay as the voice of Francis, the Talking Mule, he never received screen or ad credit for his work. Not until John Candy was a talking horse in the 1988 movie "Hot to Trot" did an actor receive recognition and publicity for doing the voice of a role.

Mom moves from outrage to leader of organization that targets trash TV

BLOOMFIELD HILLS, Mich. — Late-afternoon—Kids home from school. It's the time of day when Terry Rakolta used to let her three unwind in front of the TV set for an hour.

But that was last year, before she had her distressing encounter with "Married ... With Children" and turned crusader for "responsible television," before she went to bed each night perusing studies of the mass media.

That was before she fully realized that children were being exposed to — well, let's take a look at what kids in suburban Detroit see at 4:45 p.m. Rakolta switches on the Quasar.

Oprah Winfrey. "You know what they had on yesterday?" Rakolta says. "Girls that had sex — and babies — with their fathers." It was after an Oprah-led discussion of sexual addiction that Rakolta's protective instincts were first triggered; her daughter, then 8, worriedly asked

her whether it was true that women had sex with dogs. "I hadn't even talked to her yet about sex with people." She clicks the remote control.

A syndicated episode of the sitcom "Night Court." Dan, the highest-testosterone attorney, is vainly attempting to seduce Christine. Amusing, but "I think it's inappropriate for kids," Rakolta says. "This is adult humor; the networks say it's adult humor, but local stations are showing it in the afternoon."

"Inside Edition." The anchor says that tomorrow viewers will learn about the healthy teenager who developed a sore throat and died within days, allegedly prompting his father to threaten the boy's physician. "Kids see this day in and day out," is Rakolta's comment. "Death, death, death."

Had Terry Rakolta known that she was going to become notorious, she would have done things differently. Last winter, when it occurred to her to grow furious about television, she would have picked on a show that offended her because of its violence. Instead, she focused on the bawdi-

ness of "Married ... With Children," which led to her being labeled a humorless prude.

She would have been sophisticated about the way broadcasting and advertising work, been ready with all the facts and figures she's now scrambling to amass.

—But how could she know? She was the wife of a wealthy contractor, a mother who supervised her children's homework nightly, a golfer and grower of roses, a charity woman who tried to avoid public speaking.

A quite likable woman, Rakolta was not a humorless prude, but she knew rather little about the issues on which she was suddenly expected to comment. Nothing in her theretofore private life had prepared her to be extolled on the Senate floor by Sen. Jesse Helms or branded "Mrs. Khomeini of Bloomfield Hills" in the pages of her local newspaper. "People thought I was an activist," she says. "I was just a concerned viewer."

But her incendiary letter-writing campaign to sponsors of the show that offended her, and their deferential response, followed by her appearance on the front page of The New York Times and her chats with Larry King, Ted Koppel et al., have given Rakolta a national soapbox. As the new TV season unfurled, she was still trying to figure out just what to do with it.

Rakolta now has an official title: She is president of Americans for Responsible Television, the fledgling organization she announced at a press conference last May, intended to be a watchdog group based in Washington. She's had titles before, but more along the lines of co-chairwoman of the local Grand Prix Ball.

She looks the young clubwoman in her carefully applied makeup and stylish suit; maybe it's the Alice in Wonderland hair that makes her look younger than her age, which is 45. Or maybe it's having money.

Her husband, John Rakolta Jr., presides over his family's construction firm, the state's largest, with contracts worth nearly \$500 million

last year, according to one trade journal. They live in an elegant Tudor home that she will no longer allow reporters into because of the threats she has received; instead, she borrows her sister's home or business office.

She dislikes dwelling upon matters of socioeconomic status, fearing stories that portray "a wealthy woman but there trying to tell you what you can see and hear."

In fact Rakolta spends a good deal of her time trying to explain what she is not. She is not politically motivated and has never participated in a political campaign, she says, though her other sister is married to former Michigan Gov. George Romney's son, and the Rakolta and Romney clans are close. (The Federal Election Commission, however, records a \$1,000 contribution to George Bush's primary campaign in Terry Rakolta's name.)

She is a Mormon but "not overly religious," an often-overlooked distinction between Rakolta and other TV castigators like the Rev. Donald Wildmon.

She is not a Puritan either, she insists; she watches "L.A. Law" and appreciates "Lonesome Dove" and doesn't object to penis jokes on "Saturday Night Live," because it is

on late at night.

She goes to 60 movies a year including, recently, Spike Lee's "Do the Right Thing." She discovered, watching too many scenes of actresses wearing garter belts, that she's a feminist.

"She's not a rigid, uptight, conservative person," says a friend of 20 years, Suzy Farberman. "In private conversation, four-letter words fly freely from her mouth."

What Rakolta is, Farberman says, is "somewhat of a mother lion." This is a parent who, worrying about her college-student daughter from her second marriage, falls asleep in the girl's bed to ensure a chance to check her breath when she comes home late. (Rakolta has had three marriages, the first one lasting only a few months after college, this one entering its 15th year.)

She has banned MTV for her younger children and jettisoned HBO after it showed the movie

"Porky's" at 8 p.m. "There's a lot of things I see and read that I wouldn't want my 8-, 10- and 11-year-old to see," she explains. Last January "Married... With Children" was added to that list.

It was a Sunday night, and Rakolta, checking the listings for something she and her kids could watch together while she puffed

along on her exercise treadmill, thought the Fox network comedy sounded appropriate.

Deciding she was wrong early in the episode, Rakolta sent her kids from the room but kept watching, unnerved. "It was about a man who wanted a discontinued bra as a birthday present for his wife," which involved visiting a "Frederick's of Hollywood-type store," she recalls.

"They had a man watching porno movies walking around bent over, with an erection. They showed a male stripper going into the wife's home and stripping to a G-string. They had a man in the store wearing a garter belt and nylons. A young woman with her back to the camera removed her bra and asked these two complete strangers, 'Do you think my boyfriend will like the way I look?'"

In later conversations what emerges from her recollection is a sense of having lost control. "It's my living room," she remembers thinking. "It's 8:30 Sunday evening. How come this is coming into my living room?"

The next day Rakolta fired off 20 outraged letters to the show's advertisers, accusing them of "pandering to and supporting soft pornography" and threatening boycotts of their products.

Cable TV mogul Turner calls himself 'news king'

ATLANTA (AP)— Cable TV mogul Ted Turner proclaimed himself "news king" last Thursday, declared the Ten Commandments obsolete and said he'd pay cold, hard cash for a happy way to end the world.

Turner — chairman of the Turner Broadcasting System, which includes WTBS, creator of Cable News Network and owner of two Atlanta sports teams — told members of the National Newspaper Association that the biblical Ten Commandments do not relate to current global problems, such as overpopulation and the arms race.

"We're living with outmoded rules," Turner said. "The rules we're living under is the Ten Commandments, and I bet nobody here even pays much attention to 'em, because they are too old."

"When Moses went up on the mountain, there were no nuclear weapons, there was no poverty. Today, the commandments wouldn't go over. Nobody around likes to be commanded. Commandments are out."

So Turner listed 10 rules of his own.

He called them "the Ten Voluntary Initiatives" and said they would have people vowing, among other things, to help the

downtrodden, "love and respect Planet Earth" and limit their families to two children.

"We are in deep, deep trouble as a species on this planet," he said. "The tremendous challenge is: are we going to survive? Or are we going to collapse?"

Turner also said he wants somebody to come up with a positive way for the world to end and has been thinking about holding a contest someday that would pay \$500,000 to whoever writes the best ending.

"What we've been taught in church and in school is that the world is going to end in disaster anyway," he said. "The world's gonna be destroyed by fire; not everybody in the world believes that."

Turner, who started TBS with a family-owned outdoor advertising company and a local independent television station, told the newspaper group that he ventured into broadcasting almost on a lark.

"I did all this mainly as an adventure, just for the pure old hell of it," Turner said. "That's the main reason I did it. And I was amazed when it worked, if you want to know the truth."

"I said I'm going to get this news thing down. Someday I'm going to be the news king. Then CNN came along and now I am the news king."

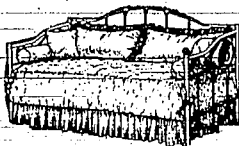

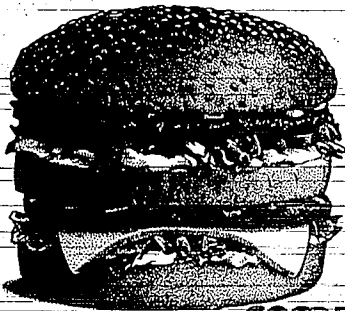
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
