Son's recovery delights parents

SEATTLE — A Magic Valley couple who objected to a bone marrow transplant for their 12-year-old son are delighted after the operation at his chances for recovering from a potentially fatal illness.

Doctors say Soren Jensen of Richfield has a better than 80 percent chance of recovering from the preleukemia condition that brought him to the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center.

Soren received the bone marrow transplant from his sister Adelle-66 on Sept. 29. But that was only after a dispute in court.

Soren's parents, Frank and Nan Jensen, brought him to Seattle for the transplant but changed their minds when they learned how difficult the 100-day treatment would be: chemotherapy, nausea, burns from radiation treatment, isolation.

They decided they wanted their boy treated instead

by a Idaho naturopath.

"We just wanted to try something else before they took such drastic measures," Nan Jensen said this week in the couple's first public statement about the rare case.

"We would never put our son at risk," added Frank Jensen, who works at a cheese factory in Richfield. "We believe that we have the right to disagree with the medical establishment and that we should not be forced to do anything and everything they tell us."

"They have been wrong more than once in the past," he said.

When the Jensens prepared to take Soren home to be treated by a naturopathic physician, a King County judge made Soren a ward of the state.

The couple then spent two days in court fighting with the state Child Protective Services over whether they could be forced to allow the transplant.

King County Superior Court Judge Stephen

E. German atop Berlin Wall

BERLIN — East Germany opened the Berlin Wall and its other borders Thursday, and its cheering citizens crossed freely to the West for the first time since 1961.

Hundreds of people danced on the wall.

Late Thursday and early Friday, exultant East Germans coursed through Berlin Wall checkpoints and others entered West Germany at other border crossings.

Near Brandenburg Gate, East Germans raced through streams of police water cannon and were pulled up the wall by the young West Germans atop it. Some Germans used hammers to chip away at the barrier for keepsakes or in their own small way try to destroy the intangible symbol of East-West division.

The sight of jubilant people prancing and dancing atop the wall was a heady sight for years, had been unthinkable only hours earlier.

At about 100 East Berliners at the Brandenburg Gate chanted: "Open the gate! Open the gate!"

Hundreds of West Berliners took advantage of the newly opened borders during the carnival-like atmosphere to head in the opposite direction and catch a glimpse of the other side of the divided city.

"What joy! This is the best thing that happened in 100 years!" yelled a West Berlin man as he crossed into what had once been forbidden territory.

Hundreds were seen on the Friedrichstrasse subway in West Berlin and East Germans also were allowed for the first time at Checkpoint Charlie, the famed Friedrichstrasse crossing run by the Allied military.

Many hugged and kissed strangers, while cars packed with East Germans and others paraded down the streets of West Berlin.

"It's crazy! It's crazy!" shouted one young man as he sat in the back seat of a car with his parents after a brief trip past the once-impenetrable Berlin Wall.

His parents said they just wanted to see the West — and then drive back. They declined to give their names.

"We heard it on TV. We just decided to go over and have a look," said the young man's father. "We want to show our son a little bit of

All apparently were arriving without visas, although visas technically were necessary under regulations announced earlier Thursday. A spokesman for the West German border police in Braunschweig said the East Germans had been allowed over the border there without visas.

East German radio announced that East Germans would be required to get a visa for such trips beginning this morning.

Navy starts rounding up stray bombs

Report overstated reactor benefits

TWIN FALLS — The Energy Department gave Congress a false impression that a nuclear reactor planned in eastern Idaho would directly benefit commercial power technology, according to a government report.

While benefits from building and operating the New Production Reactor at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory could be applied to commercial reactors, the NPR program "does not include technology transfer as part of its mission," a General

The newly released report criticizes the Energy Department's selection process for New Production Reactor technology. It cites an overly optimistic construction schedule, low or unrealistic construction cost estimates and the impression of benefits to commercial nuclear power.

One of the benefits associated with the "modular high-temperature gas-cooled" reactor technology proposed for the INEL reactor is the demonstration of "inherently safe" technology for commercial power production.

Soviets aim lasers at U.S. aircraft

WASHINGTON — Social ships apparently aimed lasers at U.S. military aircraft in the Central Pacific on four occasions in the last three weeks, at least temporarily impairing the eyesight of an American crewman, the Pentagon said Thursday.

The four incidents, the first Oct. 17 and the most recent Nov. 1, occurred west of Hawaii in an area where Soviet intelligence vessels often monitor Soviet missile test splashdowns. U.S. spotter planes work in the area observing the Soviet vessels, Pentagon officials said.

Pentagon officials declined to speculate on the motivation for the incidents. Although shipborne lasers are designed to gauge distances or guide weapons, military experts say they can be used to blind or disable the pilots of aircraft.

An Air Force pilot was temporarily blinded in a similar incident in October 1987 and the Pentagon has repeatedly complained to the Soviets about laser "illumination" of American and other Western aircraft.

An administration source said that U.S. officials would protest the Soviet action privately at a meeting next week in Moscow on preventing dangerous military incidents. But the official said that the administration would not lodge a formal diplomatic protest.

Food costs lead price rise

WASHINGTON — Wholesale prices rose 0.4 percent in October as the biggest spike in food costs in 22 months offset the positive effects from moderating energy prices, the government reported Thursday.

While the increase in the Labor Department's Producer Price Index was double what economists had been expecting, most of the increase was due to a 1.4 percent jump in food prices. Inflationary pressures are threatening to get out of hand.

The 0.4 percent October rise was down from a giant 0.9 percent September increase and many economists predicted that the news on inflation will continue to improve in coming months as a slowing economy takes more pressure off prices.

For the first 10 months of this year, prices at the wholesale level have been rising at an annual rate of 5.2 percent, compared to an increase of 4 percent in 1988.

State University, said that he looked for wholesale inflation to return to an annual rate of 4 percent in 1989.

"Assuming that food and energy prices remain relatively stable, we expect further moderation in prices," he said. "We don't see any reason for prices to vault upward."

Virtually all of the price pressure last month came from a sharp 1.4 percent jump in food costs, reflecting a 18.9 percent increase in vegetable prices. That was due to weather problems in California and Florida. Fruit, pork, and fish prices also took a jump upward.

The overall food advance was the biggest since a 1.5 percent spike in January 1988, but analysts noted that food costs had actually dropped in three of the previous four months. They called the October increase a temporary aberration and not a signal of spiraling food costs ahead.

Energy costs, which had soared 6.5 percent in September, moderated in October by a modest 0.2 percent advance. Gasoline prices rose 2.3 percent

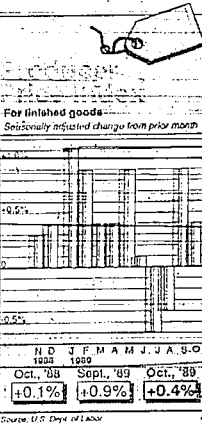
but the cost of heating oil fell 2.5 percent, while home heating oil prices edged down 0.5 percent.

Wholesale prices, excluding energy and food costs, were up a tiny 0.1 percent in October. Many analysts consider this figure a better gauge of underlying inflationary pressures because both food and energy prices are volatile from month to month.

Seasonal prices fell by 1.4 percent in October as the new models were introduced, reflecting efforts by automakers to overcome sluggish demand by keeping a lid on price increases.

Economists said the October wholesale price report provided support for the decision this week by the Federal Reserve to lower interest rates in an effort to spur the economy.

While the Bush administration has been pressuring the central bank to lower rates in order to keep the country out of a recession, the Fed had been resisting those moves because of fears that inflationary pressures were still too high.

Gaddis gave the couple a week to see if the naturopathic treatment would work. When the herbal treatments did not significantly improve Soren's condition, the Jensens allowed the transplant.

A bone-marrow transplant involves giving the patient chemotherapy and radiation to kill the diseased marrow, then injecting about a pint of healthy marrow from a healthy, compatible donor. It is the only proven treatment for Soren's condition.

The Jensens have found naturopathic treatments helpful for minor injuries and illnesses and believe such "natural" remedies go hand-in-hand with their Christian faith.

"Believe me, they never lost sight of Soren's welfare through all of this," said Dr. Dan Labriola, immediate past president of the

Washington — Association — of Naturopathic Physicians and one of the naturopaths who worked with the Jensens.

Labriola and Dr. Annie Maguire have continued to give herbal medicines through the transplant treatment. The Jensens are certain they have helped Soren in his relatively complication-free recovery. Hutchinson Center physicians say they aren't sure.

The Jensens, Soren and his five brothers and sisters are delighted Soren probably will get out of the

hospital in a week to begin his two-month out-patient treatment while living in a Seattle apartment.

"It's boring in here," Soren said from his bed in Swedish Hospital, which houses many Hutchinson Center patients. "I miss my own clothes. I've only got a pair of socks that are my own in here."

When Soren begins his outpatient treatment, his mother will stay with him while her husband will take the other children home.

Some of Soren's medical expenses are covered by health insurance. But the Jensens are worried about the more than \$30,000 in bills that are not covered. They wonder, too, how they will afford the phone calls and trips back and forth to Seattle for Soren's check-ups once he returns home.

"We're just hoping for something," Jensen said.

Attack jet explodes, crashes into Atlanta suburb apartments

SMYRNA, Ga. (AP) — A military jet exploded in the air and crashed into an apartment complex in this Atlanta suburb Thursday evening, engulfing several buildings in a fireball that left authorities uncertain about the number of casualties.

Officials could confirm no deaths while firefighters battled the raging blaze and offered estimates ranging

from four to 12 injured. A witness said he believed at least one man was unable to escape an apartment.

Capt. George Brogdon of the Smyrna Police Department said several injuries were serious. Among the injured was the pilot, who was in critical condition with burns and internal injuries after ejecting from the

plane.

The report said.

The gas-cooled reactor is designed to be immune to meltdown. If something went wrong, it automatically would shut off the fuel rods.

The Energy Department reported to Congress on the New Production Reactor project in August 1988.

The department's selection criteria and statements to Congress, "standing alone," leave the impression that the benefit is only achievable through the New Production Reactor program," the report says.

But the department for several years has been researching a commercial gas-cooled reactor. The department's commercial version of the reactor would provide the same benefits as the New Production Reactor, the GAO report says.

The program is not associated with the New Production Reactor and may produce results sooner, the report says.

Department officials told the

GAO that the civilian program will be more helpful to commercial development than the production version because the civilian program includes certification and licensing by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, the report says.

The Energy Department has been funding civilian reactor development since the late 1950s.

The department is considering building two types of reactors at two locations to produce tritium, a radioactive form of hydrogen, for nuclear weapons. One, a heavy-water reactor, would be built at the Savannah River site in South Carolina. The gas-cooled reactor, INEL is the other.

"I am convinced the construction of this second reactor, the mobile high-temperature gas-cooled reactor, will have a positive and far-reaching effect on the nation and Idaho into the next century," Sen. James McClure said in testimony at a November 1988 hearing on the project.

"This technology will not only provide our strategic materials, but it will prove that nuclear energy is a valuable, viable source of energy for safety and environmental reasons," the Idaho Republican said. "I think this reactor technology has tremendous potential for commercial application as well as defense."

McClure aide H.D. Palmer said that any significant development of the modular high-temperature gas-cooled reactor would contribute new information "that could have benefits in commercial reactors."

The Energy Department has made a final decision on New Production Reactor technology or eventual location of those reactors. The department has only started an environmental impact statement must be completed and evaluated before the final decision is made.

Department officials connected with the NPR program were unavailable for comment Thursday.

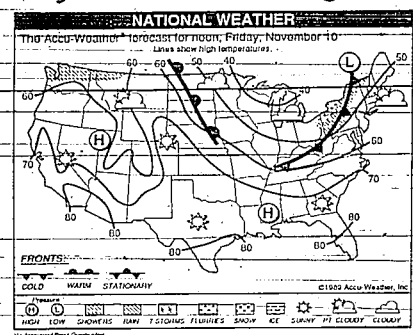

Due to computer difficulties at the National Weather Service, national temperatures were not available Friday evening.

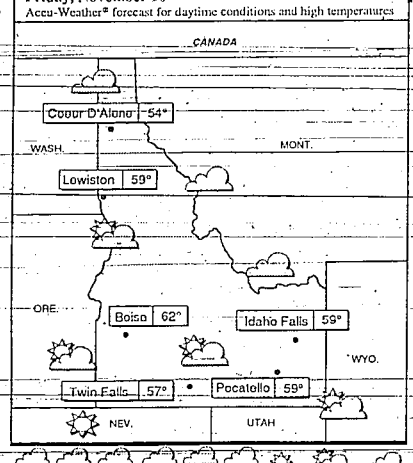

search and cleanup code named Operation Ugly Baby is a routine exercise to ensure people's safety and the public wasn't informed of the effort in order to keep the cleanup away from the media.

"We did not consider this the best interest to the public," Rackwitz said. "We don't want people out there if they don't have to be. We were afraid it might draw people."

The Nevada cleanup exercise has located more than 2,000 pieces of bombs, missiles and shrapnel outside the range. Though most of the bombs used on the range is inert, some of the errant bombs were exploded, said Olin Briggs, public information officer at the air station.

Though sweeping the range is a regular occurrence, some of the bombs were more than 20 years old, he said. It pilots miss the range and report it, the bombs are promptly picked up, Briggs said. "But if they miss and don't report it the Navy has no way of knowing of those missing bombs."

But Gov. Bob Miller expressed his concern that the live bombs could fall into the wrong hands. And U.S. Sen. Harry Reid and Richard Bryan, both D-Nev., have written Navy Secretary H. Lawrence Garrett demanding full disclosure about where the bombs are and why they were allowed to sit for years.

Miller said he was briefed this week by the Navy about the cleanup that involves as many as 2,000 pieces of ordnance found so far, some of which have been tagged as dangerous to be detonated on site.

Miller told military officials he was alarmed about the danger the ordnance poses to citizens who might go onto the Bureau of Land Management areas where the bombs have been dumped, mostly east and north of Fallon.

He expressed concern "some people will take the live ammunition as souvenirs."

Air Force officials in Idaho have tried to allay some Idahoans' fears that bombs from an expanded range in Owyhee County would likewise miss the range. The reason for the large size of the proposed expansion (1.5 million acres) is partly to prevent that sort of thing from happening in Idaho, officials have said.

Larry Henry, Miller's press secretary, said officers with the state fire marshal's office have been sent to oversee the Navy cleanup that is long overdue.

"Some shells have been out there for years," Henry said. "The governor is extremely angry and thinks it's incredible the Navy didn't notify anybody, including us."

But Rackwitz said the removal is being done by the Navy's Explosive Ordnance Disposal detachment to lessen the threat to people.

"Concern for public safety is always our highest priority," he said. "We want to do all that is humanly possible to avoid situations that might hazard the public."

Base spokesman Susan Reinhardt, said information about the search was released after a Reno television station learned of the sweep.

"According to our regulations, when a story breaks, you can't give an exclusive on a story that might be of large media interest," she said.

Fallon Mayor Robert Erickson said the Navy "has always been a good neighbor."

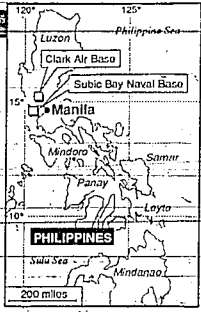
Bush confident base pact will be reached with the Philippines

Philippine Bases

Under the pact, the United States maintains Clark Air Base, the Subic Bay Naval Base and four other smaller U.S. facilities in exchange for about \$480 million in annual aid. The bases employ nearly 79,000 Filipinos who earn a total of \$100 million a year.

The four other smaller U.S. facilities are:

- **Camp John Hay:** Situated in Baguio City, 130 miles north of Manila, this garrison is used as a rest and recreation station for U.S. military and civilian employees in the Philippines.

Senate passes ban on smoking

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate on Thursday approved a smoking ban for nearly all domestic airline flights, a broadening of restrictions that signals a victory by health advocates over tobacco interests.

The prohibition, fought strenuously earlier this year by the cigarette industry and lawmakers from tobacco states, was adopted on a voice vote with no comments by outnumbered opponents.

Efforts to block the ban were dropped in recent weeks after earlier votes indicated overwhelming congressional sentiment for the restrictions.

Program trading under fire in Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Treasury Secretary Donald Regan told a House panel Thursday that a planned bill to limit computer-driven stock trading doesn't go far enough and suggested a ban on program trading.

He targeted index arbitrage, in which speculators try to take advantage of inconsistencies between the stock and futures markets by simultaneously buying in one while selling in the other.

Critics claim index arbitrage widens price swings and drives small investors out of the market. Rep. Edward J. Markey, D-Mass., chairman of the telecommunications and finance subcommittee, plans to introduce legislation to restrict program trading during times of extreme market turbulence.

Cheney approves cutback in military dependents

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Dick Cheney has approved a proposal from the top U.S. commander in Panama to cut the number of military dependents in the troubled region, the Pentagon announced Thursday.

Cheney's decision means that the majority of U.S. service personnel in Panama will not be accompanied by family members and that only about 300 to 500 men and women in so-called "key and essential positions" will be allowed to bring dependents.

The withdrawal of dependents began last spring following a series of incidents, including harassment and assaults against Americans. But Regan, the former head of Merrill Lynch & Co., said the proposal "is more of a partial solution to the problem and, if enacted, may not cure it."

Specifically, Thurman recommended that tour lengths for U.S. servicemen and women be shortened and that those without families be given the shorter tours, thereby reducing the number of dependents.

Mrs. Aquino emphasized the themes of trade and investment. "We will raise particularly the means by which the Philippines and the United States can cooperate in more ways to our mutual economic benefit. We shall explore the means to increase trade between two countries with long historic ties and deep cultural affinities."

Bush and Mrs. Aquino met privately in the Oval Office during the morning. A state dinner in her honor was scheduled Thursday night.

Mrs. Aquino's ambivalence about the U.S. military facilities reflects the existence of an influential minority in the Philippines that believes the bases infringe on Philippine sovereignty.

U.S. and Philippine officials signed a \$25 million aid agreement Thursday to lay the groundwork for telecommunications, transportation, energy and other infrastructure projects.

While Congress rushed through a \$200 million aid package for the Philippines after Mrs. Aquino took office, there is less eagerness now because some lawmakers believe economic reform and increased trade would improve living standards there more than additional economic aid.

Nevertheless, Mrs. Aquino commands a considerable measure of good will both in the United States and in other Western democracies.

For instance, the Bush administration has pledged itself to seeking from Congress \$1 billion over five years as part of a Philippine assistance program, sponsored by the United States, Japan, Australia and several European countries that aims to contribute \$10 billion to the Philippines, staggering under a \$10 billion debt.

Law begins to view women as containers of a commodity — the fetus

The debate about abortion has deflected attention from a growing political problem concerning its counterpart, pregnancy, and from the larger meaning of reproductive technology in general. When childbearing was unduly glorified, women were valued for their reproductive abilities and little else. But today's views of motherhood may be worse for women. Now that childbearing has been reduced to a technological achievement, and reproductive abilities are commodities that can be bought, women are even losing their value as childbearers. Because there is a market for (white) babies today, the fetus is increasingly valued, while the women in whom it resides and grows are increasingly devalued. The law is beginning to regard them as mere containers for the really precious commodity, the fetus.

Barbara Rothman, a sociologist and author of "Recreating Motherhood," fears that pregnant women are fast becoming viewed as unskilled workers on a reproductive assembly line. They are blamed for producing "flawed products," that is, fetuses with defects or

damaged newborns. "America is developing a legal and medical system to monitor pregnant women, control them, keep them in line with 'fetal-abuse' statutes," she says. In the meantime, people conveniently overlook the cause-of-most "flawed fetuses" — the appalling lack of prenatal services for millions of women. Many people, heartened by recent advances in prenatal technology, are sympathetic toward the "fetal rights" movement. Shouldn't the fetus be protected from a mother who cannot or will not take care of it properly? Shouldn't doctors get a court order to treat a diabetic pregnant woman who does not seem to be taking care of herself to stay in the hospital during her pregnancy? Before you say yes, consider this: Who will care for the other children of that pregnant diabetic? Should doctors have gotten a court order to force a pregnant woman to take thalidomide, or to lose

occasion, it is the death of a baby. It is not a contradiction that women take motherhood seriously and yet may have abortions casually. The relationship between motherhood and abortion is like the relationship between marriage and divorce: In societies that take marriage most seriously, the divorce rate is highest, because people must have away-out-of-their-minds reasons for divorcing. The current focus on abortion therefore obscures the larger issues of reproduction in general — and who controls it. The evidence of this assertion is clear from the majority of anti-abortion groups that work as feverishly to deny women birth control as they do to deny them abortion. These groups have also succeeded in preventing the United States from giving aid to other nations that are trying desperately to limit their starving populations. This is not a controversy about when life begins. It is a controversy about woman's place: at home with children, or participating in the public sphere? It is not a debate about whether women

should or shouldn't have abortions, since they always have and always will. It is a debate about female sexuality and whether women may be permitted to enjoy sexuality without fear of unwanted pregnancy. It is not a debate about the "right to life," since many anti-abortion groups would condemn fetuses to die — of famine or malnutrition. It is a debate about who may make decisions about life — the mother's life as well as the fetus'. If women and men do not confront these larger issues, society will continue down its current path, moving toward a chilling invasion of privacy into women's bodies and a relegation of women's rights to third place after men and fetuses. A far more humane path would permit diversity and choice, both for women who do not want to be forced into motherhood and for women who do not want to be forced out of it.

U.S. must maintain influence in Europe

The only thing worse than not consulting the Japanese, a government colleague of mine used to say, is consulting the Japanese.

So it is with America's allies in Europe. Too much leadership is bullying or high-handed; too little is weakness or indecision.

Now is the time for the United States to let its European allies take the lead over Eastern Europe, but it is not the time for us to leave Europe to the Europeans.

If the United States need no longer be the Atlantic Alliance's CEO, it must remain the chairman of the board.

The reason is the center of Europe, the two Germany. The underlying question is whether the nature of the state system in Europe has changed enough — or is in the process of doing so — so that old worries are no more.

The postwar division, for all its unhappiness, did solve Europe's historic problem. Dividing Germany and embedding the western half in NATO created, as the old saying had it, a Germany that was strong enough to stand up to the Soviet Union but not so strong as to threaten Luxembourg.

Such concerns may be old-fashioned. After all the Federal Republic is a secure democracy, now and it is not as if Europeans have learned nothing from the last 40 years. The European Community, for all its shortcomings, is an impressive achievement in cooperation.

Yet in this century, Europe's record at ordering its affairs when left alone is unimpressive, to put it gently. For all the euphoria over freedom's march in Eastern Europe, there are more than a few echoes of the period between the Wars. Now, as then, German influence — this time West Germany and primarily economic — is spreading.

As the hand of the Soviet Union lightens there, old antagonisms are resurfacing, most notable that between Hungary and Romania.

France-German ties that exist now are a far cry from the period before World War II. Still, the Franco-German connection is weak and uneven, its ups and downs determined all too visibly by cycles of French concern over its neighbor.

More to the point, there is no strong Anglo-French understanding to serve as an anchor in the European Community for the Federal Republic.

Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher has stubbornly pursued her own view of Europe, akin to that of Gen. Charles de Gaulle, as one of sovereign states, not supranational institutions. Whatever the merits of her vision, it has taken Britain out of the game, leaving a vacuum at Europe's center.

All politics is local politics, Tip O'Neill is credited with saying, and that seems true in spades for Mikhail S. Gorbachev. He seems so preoccupied with reform at home that he has little time for even those foreign relations that have been most critical to Moscow — Eastern Europe.

Implicitly, he seems to be saying that he will deal with Eastern Europe, even perhaps Germany, later.

He does have 400,000 Soviet soldiers in East Germany; while his spokesmen occasionally hint that Soviet troops might leave Hungary and Poland, East Germany is never on the list.

The continuing stream of East Germans fleeing their county is a reminder of just how unpredictable the future will be, and how fast that future may arrive.

The best of America's experts on East Germany, who are disappointingly few in any case, were badly wrong about the events of this summer and fall; a year ago they were talking of East Germany's "success."

That East Germany — Prussians, after all — would be satisfied because their standard of living was better than Poland's seems laughable in retrospect.

It should at least make me for humility and an awareness that whatever designs we conceive will be badly wrong.

Yet that is no excuse for not thinking ahead, still less for leaving it all to the Europeans. When President Bush meets with Gorbachev, reassuring him that the West has no designs on Eastern Europe is important. But reassurance and listening "do not miss anything," as the president put it, are not enough.

He needs to indicate America's willingness to stay in Europe, with military forces, for some time to come. He needs to stress that our primary goal in Eastern Europe is political and economic change — "Finlandization," though he would not put it that way — not dismantling the military alliances; that can come later, if at all.

So, too, while the United States cannot be in the position of preventing its German ally from achieving its dreams about countrymen to the east, the President also needs to be plain that the questions at issue are not ones for Germans alone. Other Europeans have large stakes. And so does the transatlantic chairman of the board.

Disease outbreak leaves ill effects on Colorado town

LAMAR, Colo. (AP) — An outbreak of Legionnaires' disease suspected of causing 17 illnesses and three deaths after a class reunion has scarred the image of this agricultural community as a wholesome convention site.

"There's concern, grave concern, over what this will mean to the community," said Darlene Hamilton, manager of the Chamber of Commerce in Lamar, population 8,600, which depends heavily on tourism and conventions.

City administrator Roy Lauricello said the town still was reeling from a decision by a bus manufacturer to lay off 200 people last year.

Eighty-five people were laid off Monday when the Best Western Cow Palace Inn closed voluntarily while health officials took more than 200 samples from air conditioning ducts, water and the cooling system, breeding grounds for the bacteria that cause the disease.

The samples are being analyzed at the federal Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, which expects to have preliminary results next week. Health officials expressed confidence that the Cow Palace will then reopen, after any sources of the bacteria are sterilized.

More than 250 people from 21 states attended a Lamar High School reunion Sept. 22-24, held for classes of 1941 and earlier at the Cow Palace. The motel has about 300 guests per night and brings an average of one convention a week to Lamar, a highway crossroads town 220 miles southeast of Denver.

Six cases of Legionnaires' disease have been confirmed among 17 people who came down with pneumonia-like symptoms after attending the reunion. Three of those sickened have died, and two of the deaths involved confirmed cases of Legionnaires'. The other four people, with confirmed Legionnaires' disease recovered.

Two other people got the disease after staying at the motel prior to the reunion. However, health department officials said Thursday those cases cannot be linked directly to the motel.

House passes \$305 billion defense bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House on Thursday approved a \$305 billion defense bill that would cut President Bush's request for Star Wars by \$1.1 billion, the first budget reduction in the program in six years.

"I'm very unhappy with the final product. We made too severe a cut in the SDI budget line," Rep. William Dickinson of Alabama, ranking Republican on the House Armed Services Committee, said about the Strategic Defense Initiative, popularly known as Star Wars.

"We cut in the wrong places. We played politics with this bill," said Dickinson, who nevertheless voted to adopt it.

By a vote of 236-172, the Democratic-controlled House adopted legislation to provide many of the funds Bush sought for the MX and Midgetman nuclear missiles and the B-2 stealth bomber and restore money for four of the 10 conventional programs the president tried to kill.

The bill goes to the Senate for consideration. Among the provisions is \$4.3 billion for the B-2, \$430 million less than the administration requested for the fiscal year that began Oct. 1.

The bat-winged aircraft has come under attack on Capitol Hill for its expensive pricing of about \$530 million a copy. The bill provides money for two bombers in fiscal 1996, one less than the administration sought. However, the legislation accepts Bush's proposal for contracts for five bombers in fiscal 1997.

The bill provides \$4.8 billion for Star Wars, about \$279 million less than spent in fiscal 1989 and the first year since President Reagan proposed the anti-missile shield six years ago. Bush had sought \$4.9 billion for the program.

Approximately \$1.1 billion is included for two land-based nuclear missiles: the multiple warhead, rail-garrison MX and the single-warhead, truck-based Midgetman. The bill limits about \$150 million for the administration's request for the two weapons and adds \$100 million imposing a 50-mile cap on the MX.

Party leaders working on Congressional pay raise

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker Thomas S. Foley said Thursday that Congress will consider giving itself a pay raise even if it fails to resolve the budget crisis that is squeezing federal programs.

But other lawmakers said passing the pay raise and ethics reform package is already a politically dicey proposition and could fail unless Congress first puts the government's fiscal affairs in better order.

Foley, D-Wash., has been meeting with leaders of both parties in an effort to push through a pay raise this year as part of a package that also would tighten congressional ethics regulations, including clamping down on accepting fees for speeches to interest groups.

Foley and House Republican leaders have been working with the White House to craft a package acceptable to the Senate and to President Bush.

Last week, Bush spokesman Marlin Fitzwater indicated the president's willingness to look at such a proposal but the president himself was silent.

"I think when the time comes... the president will be forthcoming in his support," Foley said.

Members of Congress are paid \$89,500 a year. A plan to boost salaries by 51 percent was killed earlier this year after a storm of public protest.

Hugo report puts damage at \$4 billion

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — The first comprehensive report on Hurricane Hugo's assault on South Carolina puts the damage at \$4 billion and estimates more than 40,000 people will need counseling.

The two-inch-thick report produced last week by the State Budget and Control Board gives a snapshot of the state through Oct. 27, five weeks after Hugo blew ashore. It covers preliminary damage assessments and relief efforts from 25 agencies.

The report is expected to be updated as more precise assessments become available.

Soviets sell dismantled facility parts

MOSCOW (AP) — Missile carriers, generators and mobile barracks will go up for grabs in a Moscow park this month as the Soviet Union's first equivalent of a military rummage sale, organizers said Thursday.

The exhibit, which opens Nov. 28, is aimed at selling off reusable parts of intermediate-range nuclear missile installations that were dismantled under a 1987 superpower treaty.

It is also meant to pave the way for broader sales of equipment that will no longer be needed as the Soviet Union cuts its military forces and future treaties rule out other types of weapons, said Elvin Kalinin, one of the fair's organizers.

The money the fair is expected to bring in this year will go in part to help support servicemen who are discharged as a result of the cutbacks, Kalinin said.

The Soviet Union is in the process of reducing troops and tanks in Europe and Asia, and it has shifted from aggressive arms-race rhetoric to espousing a doctrine of "reasonable sufficiency."

Cleaning delayed for Trevi Fountain

ROME (AP) — Technicians working to clean the statues that adorn the Trevi Fountain in Rome have discovered that corrosion in the metal supporting clamps has left several of the marble figures dangerously unstable.

The discovery means the year-old project to clean the landmark will have to be postponed until next year while technicians turn their attention to replacing the clamps, the daily newspaper La Repubblica said Thursday.

The 18th century masterpiece is the work of the celebrated architect Nicola Salvi, who won a competition sponsored by Pope Clement XII to build the fountain. Salvi did not live to see the monument finished.

Antonio Giuffrè, a member of the architecture faculty at the University of Rome, will take charge of the project to replace the corroded braces.

"The statues will be only partly dismantled, the pieces being then reset using titanium clamps," he said.

Picasso's stolen artworks recovered

GRASSE, France (AP) — Investigators Thursday recovered the \$17 million in artworks stolen from Pablo Picasso's granddaughter, finding them at the home of a restaurateur, who was then arrested, police said.

The restaurateur, who lives in nearby Pradet, was not identified. Two other men — both security guards at Marina Picasso's villa in Cannes — also have been arrested in the theft Sunday, police said.

One of the guards, Serge Clouzeau, was on vacation when the robbery occurred; the other, Daniel Jaguin, had gone shopping for a loaf of bread.

Mrs. Picasso was not home at the time.

Police identified the missing works only as seven paintings by Pablo Picasso, a Brueghel, an Odilon Redon, three lesser-known 19th century works and a bust by sculptor August Rodin.

Nicaragua insists Contras disband

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Nicaragua's foreign minister said Thursday his government will meet Contra demands for a truce and amnesty if the rebels agree to bring disbanding by the end of the month.

The U.S.-backed Contras and Nicaragua's leftist Sandinista government began their first direct talks in more than a year Thursday in an effort to end an 8-year-old war that has taken an estimated 12,000 lives.

U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar and his Organization of American States counterpart, Jose Clemente Buena Soares, opened the meeting, then turned the mediation effort over to aides.

Deng gives up last formal party position

BEIJING (AP) — Deng Xiaoping, China's senior leader, passed his last formal leadership post to his chosen successor Thursday and the Communist Party laid out an austere economic plan for the next two years.

Deng, 85, resigned as chairman of the party's powerful Central Military Commission in favor of party chief Jiang Zemin. He still leads the State Military Commission, a virtual mirror of the party group, but said in a letter released Thursday he also would leave that job.

The move solidifies Jiang's position and appears at least to suspend a reported power struggle between him and President Yang Shangkun. Jiang, 63, had not held a national post until his elevation to party leader after the pro-democracy movement was crushed in June.

Foreign diplomats and Chinese sources agree Deng is likely to remain the leading voice in party and government affairs, as he has been since leaving the Politburo and Central Committee in 1987.

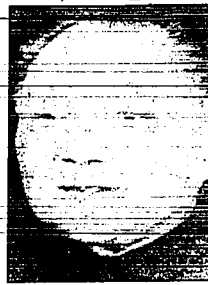
Yang, an 82-year-old former general with strong army connections, was named vice chairman of the Central Military Commission, which sets military policy. He is reported to have sought the chairmanship to consolidate his power base.

In another concession to Yang, a mastermind of the June military crackdown, his younger brother Yang Bubing, an army political commissar, was appointed secretary-general of the commission.

Although Deng described Jiang, a former Shanghai party boss with a

weak power base in Beijing, as the "nucleus" of the new leadership, many feel the party leader's political fortunes are tied to Deng's physical health.

Xinhua, the official news agency, quoted Deng's resignation letter, dated Wednesday, as saying: "As early as 1980, I proposed reforming the leadership system of the party, and state and abolishing the life-long tenure of leading posts."

"I have insisted on not taking up day-to-day affairs and have been looking forward to completing the succession of the older generation by the younger generation as soon as possible and realizing my aspiration of completely retiring from the leading posts."

The Central Committee praised Deng as the "chief architect in all aspects of the party's and army's works."

A lengthy communique said he was "an outstanding Marxist, a

staunch communist, a brilliant proletarian revolutionary statesman and military strategist and a long-tested leader of the party and state."

It said economic reforms Deng began a decade ago would continue, but for at least two years the people must "lead a thrifty life" to fight inflation of nearly 20 percent annually, to-rapid growth and corruption.

The party outlined goals of lower consumption, tighter financial control, realigned industrial structure and increased production.

Deng's letter, in turn, lauded Jiang, a former Shanghai party boss and mayor who became head of the 48 million-member party after Zhao

Ziyang was dismissed in June. Zhao Deng's former protégé, was accused of being too close to the pro-democracy movement.

Of the party leadership, Deng said it had created "a leading nucleus headed by Comrade Jiang Zemin and it is now already carrying out its work effectively."

Although it is possible Yang has been shunted aside, his strong military ties are important because the army's power was enhanced by the brutal June crackdown in which hundreds of people, at least, were killed.

In addition to having his brother beside him as the military commission's secretary-general, he has an ally in the army chief of staff Chi Haotian, said to be his son-in-law.

During the student-led protests that began in April, Deng and Yang were the party military commission's chairman and junior vice chairman respectively. They prevailed over Zhao, the first vice chairman, in having martial law declared and ultimately sending in troops.

Such a graphic illustration of how leaders could summon the army to support their policies, gave the commission new eminence in the party power structure.

In the southwestern city of Chengdu on Thursday, an official said six people had been executed for participating in riots in June. The executions brought to at least 18 the number of people put to death in China after the pro-democracy movement was crushed.

Hardliners gain in Jordan vote

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — Islamic fundamentalists took more than one-third of the Parliament seats in Jordan's first general election in 22 years and many former officials won narrowly or lost, according to results Thursday.

The outcome appeared to be a setback for King Hussein, who had urged voters not to mix religion with politics.

It also was a disappointment to the women who ran and voted in their first national election: None of the 12 women among 647 candidates for the Parliament won a seat.

Victors included several men once imprisoned on political grounds and one convicted in an attack on an Israeli airline office in Athens.

The new 80-seat Parliament seems certain to be more assertive than the often passive legislature dissolved last year.

Board chairman calls BPA claim 'bunk'

LEWISTON (AP) — "Just bunk" is how the chairman of the Idaho Water Resources Board has labeled Bonneville Power Administration's claims that a state-sponsored \$3.2 million hydroelectric project near Orofino will disrupt Northwest electricity rates.

"Any first-grader with general math is going to tell you that's not going to happen," said Gene M. Gray of Payette. That's because the 2-megawatt plant, to be located near the Clearwater Fish Hatchery, is relatively small and its effect upon BPA's system will be negligible, Gray said in an interview.

While the amount of energy involved is small, the plant could be the first of many and that generally worries BPA. BPA director of staff Tom H. Blankenship, who manages the BPA district office at Boise.

Death Row inmate not allowed to marry

BOISE (AP) — The Department of Corrections won't allow Death Row inmate Thomas Eugene Creech to get married, and a state senator says it's a good decision.

Idahoans believe "prisons are for punishment," and should not be used as "state-operated Holiday Inns," Sen. Skip Smyser, R-Parma, said in a letter to Corrections Director Richard Vepton.

Creech, who has been under death sentence since a 1981 prison slaying, asked permission recently to get married. Boise attorney Rolfe Kehe, who has represented Creech in the past, would not identify the prospective bride.

Registration fees to be used for project

BOISE (AP) — Money from registration fees for recreational vehicles will be used to fund a \$64,650 improvement project adjacent to Lake Coeur d'Alene, state officials say.

The Panhandle National Forest will use the grant to improve Bell Bay campground. Improvements will include drilling two wells, road and campsite improvements, picnic sites.

The grant was one of five awarded by the Department of Parks and Recreation.

The others:

- Spring Valley Reservoir, Latah County, Fish and Game will use a \$11,000 grant to provide electrical service and a well.
- Big Springs Campground, Bannock County, Pocatello's Ranger District will use a \$19,000 grant to install new water system at Big Springs Campground on Pebble Creek.
- Hawkins Reservoir, Bannock County, Burley BLM District will use \$19,700 to provide road and camp spur construction, installation of handicapped paths, installation of sun shelters and other minor improvements.

Phosphate plant told to clean up act

BOISE (AP) — The J.R. Simplot Co. phosphate plant near Pocatello has been put on notice by state and federal environmental agencies that they expect major air-pollution problems or face fines up to \$25,000 a day.

The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare said Thursday that Simplot has been given 30 days to stop violating air pollution standards at the plant west of the city.

"We're looking at lack of reasonable controls on particulate emissions from the processing and excessive release of sulfur dioxide from the sulfuric acid plant," John Ledger, chief of the state Air Quality Bureau, said in a news release.

A notice from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency gives the company 60 days to submit detailed compliance reports. But Simplot spokesman Fred Zerza said most of the problems cited already have been addressed.

Ex-pageant director refuses story

BOISE (AP) — The former director of the Miss Idaho USA pageant says she was not "ousted" from her post by the pageant's parent organization, Miss Universe, Inc.

Craig Jessen Wednesday refuted an Oct. 14 story that appeared in The Idaho Statesman said she was ousted from the post, which she had held five years.

"People involved with the state pageant told The Statesman she was forced out. She could not be reached then for comment.

Ms. Jessen said in a phone interview from New York City, where she now lives, that she left the pageant in 1988 because "I needed a job that paid me an income."

Abortion may have no impact on Idaho campaigns

A pro-choice stand on abortion helped elect Democrats in the Virginia and New Jersey gubernatorial races and in the New York mayoral contest, but it's unclear whether abortion as a campaign issue will have much impact on Idaho, advocates on both sides of the abortion debate say.

"I really don't think anything that's happening in the East is going to have much effect on Idaho," said state Sen. Rachel S. Gilbert, R-Boise, a pro-life legislator and potential GOP gubernatorial candidate.

The prevailing logic behind the elections Tuesday is that pro-choice voters had become galvanized by this summer's U.S. Supreme Court ruling in which states were given broader powers to limit abortions.

Meanwhile, Idaho has a reputation for electing

state legislators who oppose abortion.

Election results in other states may not change many opinions in the Statehouse. But it creates a more favorable climate for pro-life legislators to express themselves, said Jane T. Crosby of Boise, legislative coordinator for the Idaho branch of the National Organization for Women.

"I think Idaho politicians are going to base their decisions on what they hear from their constituents," Ms. Crosby said. "I think they will be hearing from people who favor choice more than they have in the past."

Pro-life advocates counter the wrong interpretation is being placed on the national off-year election results. Anti-abortion organizations did not get involved in the New Jersey and New York City races, contends Kerry Ann Uhlenkott, of Grangeville, legislative coordinator for Right to Life of Idaho Inc.

Where they did get involved Virginia and abortion advocates nearly pulled off an upset by closing Wilder's victory margin to within 6,500 votes, she said.

"The pro-life movement made a major difference in the work they did during and prior to the weekend," Ms. Uhlenkott said. "In fact, I'm encouraged by it because when the facts got out, people went to the polls and took how close it is."

If the elections provoke a response in the Idaho Legislature, it will be limited mostly to those lawmakers representing urban districts, said pro-choice state Sen. Matt Calabretta, D-Coburn.

"I don't think it's going to drastically change what we do in the '90 session," Calabretta said. "Not in these politicians, because I think they're pretty set. But that's where the potential is for challengers through the years, not just in this year."

Wildlife in danger if agriculture interests get their way

POCATELLO (AP) — A member of the blue-ribbon committee created to find a solution to Idaho's big game depredation problem says wildlife will be the losers if agriculture interests have their way.

"There are organizations that would like nothing better than to see our elk herds, our deer herds and our antelope herds basically decimated," said Eric Kraska, a Pocatello veterinarian. "You are going to have to be vigilant every day or your hunting

opportunities are going to vanish."

Kraska, a member of Pocatello's Wildlife Council, was one of six people appointed to the depredation negotiating committee by the state Department of Fish and Game. The panel also included six members appointed by the Idaho Department of Agriculture.

The committee completed work this week on its recommendations to

the 1990 session of the Idaho Legislature.

Kraska said Wednesday that he could not discuss details of the agreement until it is reviewed by a legislative oversight committee. In general, he said he believes the agreement overstates the problem but that supporters should be happy with its opposition to reducing the state's big game herds.

"When you see this agreement, you are going to see compromise,"

he told the Region 5 Wildlife Council.

Kraska said there probably will be some efforts to modify the agreement, but it eventually should be accepted by state lawmakers as a reasonable approach to compensating farmers and ranchers for damaged caused by marauding big game.

"My gut feeling is that there is going to be a lot of whining and complaining; but in the end I think it will be accepted," he said.

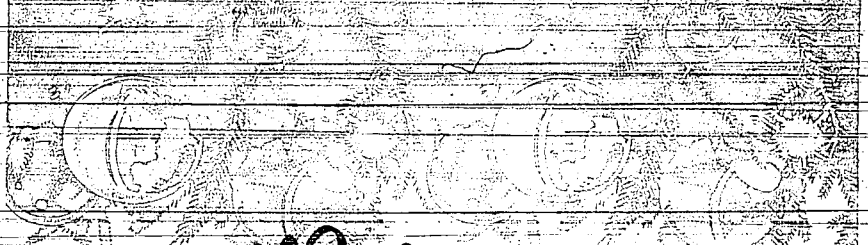

Judge approves 3 proposals in Hawkins case

BOISE — Just as a rough form of democracy is about to enter the Hawkins Co. Ltd. bankruptcy case, a farmer's frustration and emotion broke Thursday into normally dry federal-court proceedings.

Grant Atkinson of Buhl, who has stood up alone in court before to argue that U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Alfred Iliagan must strive to resolve legal issues surrounding warehouse-bankruptcy law, threw in the towel.

Through tears and a broken voice, the husky Atkinson read from a few sheets of legal paper, standing before a microphone just behind the line of lawyers waiting to argue their case.

"Not believing we could have met the task of setting a precedent, I will not ask or seek any producer to compromise their position," Atkinson said.

He handed a check to Hawkins' attorney Jerry Lensen to cover accounts receivable the company claimed he owed, and rushed from the courtroom.

Meeting set for Wednesday

Hawkins has scheduled a meeting at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday at the Filer High School Auditorium. The meeting is open to the public and Hawkins' lawyers wish to discuss possible settlements.

"God bless you all," he said on the way out.

Atkinson spoke at the beginning of a hearing to discuss settlement proposals for the failed Hawkins bean warehouse.

Hagin approved Thursday three formal proposals to file the bankruptcy case, meaning that sometime in the future growers and others involved will be able to vote on which one they like the best.

A small knot of farmers cornered lawyers after the hearing to ask what the sometimes caustic legal arguments meant and, among themselves, talked of frustration and disappointment with the legal system.

"There are financial hardships out there," Farmer Roger Vincent said. "The emotional hardship, the stresses, are quite indescribable."

Farmers have completed a full bean harvest without money from the beans they had stored in Filer. Frustrated and angry, they have watched the bankruptcy court struggle with uncertain results.

Iliagan's move came 10 months after the failed Filer bean warehouse filed for bankruptcy and 13 days short of one year after Hawkins suspended trading in light of a bean inventory shortage.

The case has gathered a head of steam over the past several weeks. Three formal court proposals have been filed to resolve the case, growers have written an informal and simple proposal and Hawkins has indicated a willingness to negotiate.

Group calls for panel to evaluate refinery

TWIN FALLS — An Idaho group is calling for a "blue ribbon panel" to evaluate a proposed plutonium refinery in the state before the federal government rushes to judgment on the project.

Nuclear Organics To Educate on the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory said on Thursday the Department of Energy assigned a similar panel of citizens to review a permanent nuclear waste repository slated for New Mexico.

"Idaho deserves the same blue ribbon treatment" on the Special Isotope Separation plutonium refinery, group member Dr. A.C. Emery of Twin Falls said in a news release.

"We need some answers that are open and honest, that will stand up to independent review," he said.

House and Senate conferees supported the funding that would include site preparation for the SIS, although the measure would still need to pass both chambers before going before the president. It also would require Secretary of Energy James Watkins' verification that the nation needs the refined plutonium for its nuclear weapons stockpile.

Ex-governor back at work after irregular heartbeat

BURLEY — Former Gov. John Evans was briefly hospitalized with an irregular heartbeat, but he's back at work at D.L. Evans Bank.

Evans, 64, said his heart was racing when he woke up Nov. 3. He decided to go to Cassia Memorial Hospital, where he was kept overnight for observation.

Doctors concluded non-prescription cold pills that the former governor took to alleviate flu symptoms had caused the irregular heart beat and he was released with what Evans called a "clean bill" of health Saturday.

Evans spent 33 years in public office before he was defeated by Sen. Steve Symms in a run for the U.S. Senate in 1986.

Last month Evans confirmed that local Democrats were trying to nudge him back into the spotlight. Evans said he had no plans to run for office, but would "never say never."

Brackett says Owyhee County ranchers good land stewards

TWIN FALLS — Owyhee County ranchers have tried to be good stewards of the land and have made many improvements, the president-elect of the Idaho Cattlemen's Association said Thursday.

"Now, the Air Force wants to bomb it," Bert Brackett told the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club.

The fourth-generation Three Creek rancher is among those opposing the Air Force's proposed expansion of the Saylor Creek Bombing Range. In his talk Thursday, he noted that the Air Force plans overlapping studies of the proposal.

The first part of a two-part environmental impact statement will lead in part to a decision either to proceed with the expansion or to seek an alternative.

The second part, dealing with expansion details, would begin in the spring of 1990. But the first part is not expected to be completed before June 1990, he said.

Purchase may cause name change of Ketchum bank

KETCHUM — The name of a Ketchum-based savings bank could be changed after its parent company completes a purchase by a Seattle-based bank holding company.

Mountain States Savings Bank, with offices in Ketchum, Hailey and Gooding, could soon become part of the bank holding company Security Pacific Bancorporation Northwest of Seattle. Mountain States was acquired by Coeur d'Alene-based Mountain West Savings Bank last October.

And Mountain West announced recently it has reached an agreement with \$10.1-billion Security Pacific to be purchased for \$31.5 million.

Day-care operator charged with battery, injury to child

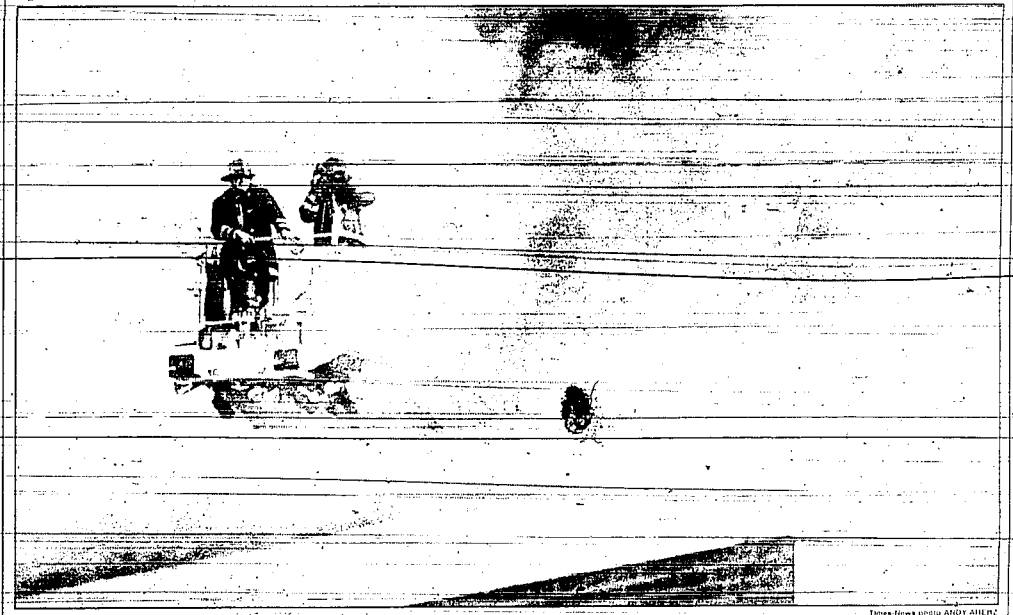
KETCHUM — A Blaine County day-care operator, Paul Cutler, 33, of Ketchum, is charged with two counts of battery and two counts of injury to a child.

Youthful Fairchild hungers for Idaho's top job

TWIN FALLS — Without even one gray hair to grace his temples, Roger Fairchild acknowledges he may be a little young to run for governor.

At age 36, Fairchild has a family and food-processing business to take care of. As a republican senator with nine years' experience in state government, Fairchild has many election years ahead.

He became Senate majority leader last December in a leadership shakeup that resulted from last November's defeat of Senate President Pro Tem James Risch. His legislative career also has included terms as chairman of the Senate Judiciary and Rules Committee, and he serves on the Senate State Affairs and Transportation committees.

But Fairchild is hungry for Idaho's top job. Hording enough to resign his seat effective Jan. 10 in order to go after what he wants.

"If I thought Gov. Andrus was doing a good job, I wouldn't be running," he said several times during a Twin Falls interview Thursday.

Branding Andrus the "consummate, cunning politician," Fairchild said it's time to shake up a long-established administration.

Fairchild also accused Andrus of political grandstanding when he prohibited boxes of nuclear waste from entering Idaho. He said the governor has put Idaho on a road that could be "economically and environmentally dangerous."

Fairchild faults Andrus for failing to take the lead on education and on health-care issues, such as extending state funding for in-home attendant care or seeing that everyone in the state has access to health insurance.

He also blames Andrus for the dismal condition of Idaho's roads, sewers and other crumbling infrastructure.

If Fairchild should become governor, he said, funding for road improvements won't be based on political favors. And he promised, only half jokingly, that money won't be used for highway signs bearing the governor's name.

The Department of Energy may just become tied up with the gas-oil-gas-oil-and-abundant-on the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, Fairchild contends.

"An abandoned site is never going to be a cleaned-up site," he said. "That's not what we want here."

What he does want is credible information on what's going on at the nuclear laboratory and waste site, Fairchild said.

He believes the state is in a position to strike a deal with the DOE. If Idaho accepts temporarily waste storage and other operations at the INEL site, Fairchild said, it would be made incentive to clean up the site and keep it clean.

Fairchild also accused Andrus of overstepping poor political judgment when the Air Force announced plans to expand the Saylor Creek Bombing Range outside of Mountain Home.

Andrus came out in support of the expansion earlier on, but "did a complete flip-flop" after putting a wet tarp over the wound, Fairchild said.

Suggesting that the military may be holding talks with the Third World country, Fairchild said he thinks the Air Force should have to prove that it needs the base expansion.

Buhl man in jail after 3 cocaine-related charges

TWIN FALLS — A Buhl man was in the Twin Falls County Jail Thursday night in lieu of \$50,000 bond after being charged with three felony cocaine-related charges.

Armenio Avelar, 24, who helps run the family dairy, was arrested Wednesday on charges of conspiracy to deliver a controlled substance, delivery of a controlled substance and failure to permanently affix official insignia, Idaho's tax on all illegal drug exchanges.

Fifth District Magistrate Judge R. Michael Redman refused a motion Thursday by Avelar's attorney, Harry DeLaan, to reduce the bond, set by a District Court judge in an arrest warrant.

DeLaan called two family members and a friend of Avelar to the stand to testify that Avelar, who owns a dairy with his

family and has lived in Buhl for eight years, would not leave town if released on his own recognizance.

"He's always home and he wouldn't do that to me and the kids," said the writer, Cecilia Lopez.

Avelar, who has no prior criminal record, is a legal resident of the United States but a citizen of Portugal, DeHaan said.

Avelar's arrest stems from a state Bureau of Narcotics investigation of a Kimberly man, who was arrested in September on similar charges, said local bureau agent-in-charge Merrill Kelley.

"During the investigation we were led to believe that there were kilos of cocaine involved," Kelley said.

TWIN FALLS — Weldon D. Haskins, a retired Twin Falls Bank & Trust executive and manager, died Wednesday at his home of natural causes. He was 71.

"He never declined and tried individual to the institution and was well respected by his customers and employees," Curtis T. Eaton Sr., Twin Falls Bank & Trust chairman and chief executive officer, said Thursday.

After two days in California, Haskins received a wire that read: "If you like Twin Falls Bank & Trust in 1939."

Agencies urged to combine new police, juvenile center

MOSCOW (AP) — The Moscow police chief is urging Latah County to house a new juvenile justice center in a proposed city police station that might be built in Moscow.

But while county commissioners like the idea of placing the two departments in the same building, they told Chief David Cameron Thursday that they don't know if the county can afford its share of the estimated \$2.3 million price tag.

In a meeting with Cameron, the commissioners noted that the state Legislature may be willing to pay for a juvenile detention and youth services center to serve all of northern Idaho. Planning has already begun for a proposed regional center in Post Falls that could serve the 10 counties north of Riggs.

Latah County, however, would probably have to pay the full price if it built a juvenile center for its own use.

The city also has to decide whether it can afford a new police station. Preliminary plans are to ask voters to support bond levies that would pay for a new swimming pool and renovate the Community Center into city hall offices.

Nevertheless, the commissioners agreed with Cameron that the city and county should ask the Legislature or the Idaho Commission on Children and Youth for \$25,000 to plan for a center, or to look at other options. Construction likely would require approval of a bond levy by city or county voters, or both.

The need for juvenile detention centers in northern Idaho has been acute since Gov. Cecil Andrus signed a 1988 order, in compliance with federal law, that prohibits officials from holding children under 18 in county jails built for adults.

Latah County has been sending juvenile offenders to detention centers in Boise and St. Anthony since the order took effect last year. A facility in Post Falls would serve the same function, but would be closer and would save the county some expenses. It also would allow juveniles to be housed closer to families, attorneys and other community services.

The commissioners and Sheriff Ken Buxton, however, said a Moscow youth services center would be the best alternative. Ideally, the center would be big enough to house juveniles from other counties, which would help underwrite some of the building's expenses.

However, Cameron said Latah County could keep the center full with its own kids, particularly since eight of the estimated 12 beds would be used for runaway, abused or other children who are not security risks.

Mistrial declared in Todd Bridges trial

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A judge declared a mistrial Thursday in the assault trial of Todd Bridges after a jury deadlocked on the final charge against him. The actor was cleared to be released on \$25,000 bail, his lawyer said.

The eight-woman jury had acquitted the 24-year-old actor on Tuesday of attempted murder in the nearly fatal shooting of a convicted cocaine dealer in a South Los Angeles drug den.

The actor's release was being arranged late Thursday, his attorney said.

Bridges, best known for his role as Gary Coleman's older brother Willis in the NBC-TV series "Diff'rent Strokes," also was acquitted of attempted voluntary manslaughter.

The jury disclosed at the time that it was deadlocked on the charge of assault with a deadly weapon, 8-4 in favor of acquittal.

But the trial judge, Superior Court Judge James M. McKeown, ordered the jurors to resume their deliberations on the assault count. Jurors said Thursday that several more ballots were taken, but they remained deadlocked 8-4.

Bridges was gratified, real pleased," defense attorney Johnnie L. Cochran Jr. said Thursday. "He just wanted to get out. He wants to put his life back together."

The prosecutor, Deputy District Attorney William Hodgman, said he was surprised and disappointed by the acquittal verdicts and mistrial.

The district attorney's office likely will decide next week whether to retry Bridges on the assault count, Hodgman said.

"My recommendation is to let it go," the prosecutor added. "A single assault charge would be less complicated to prosecute, and I think we stand a better chance," Hodgman said.

The prosecution had argued that Bridges shot Kenneth "Tex" Clay eight times at close range in a dispute over the actor's BMW automobile. Clay denied he had stolen the car in his testimony during Bridges' preliminary hearing, but reversed himself during the trial.

Judge approves settlement for flight attendants

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A federal judge Thursday approved a \$2.55 million settlement for 117 female flight attendants who sued Pan American World Airways for using stricter weight standards for them than for men.

U.S. District Judge Thelton Henderson said the settlement was fundamentally fair and highly favorable to the attendants despite objections from six women whose damage claims were fully or partially denied.

The settlement will be shared by 117 women who were suspended, fired or denied promotions because of the weight policy, said Kathleen King, an attorney for the Independent Union of Flight Attendants.

Pan Am also agreed to liberalize weight standards for current or future employees.





Judge upholds drug tax

LEWISTON (AP) — A 2nd District Court judge has ruled that Idaho's innovative tax on illegal drugs does not violate a person's constitutional rights.

The first person to be charged under the illegal drug tax stamp law in the state, which went into effect July 1, was Victor H. Smith of Lewiston. His lawyer, Charles M. Stroschein, had challenged the constitutionality of the law.

In this type of law it first appears there is "something illogical" about it, Judge Ross Selig said, but the U.S. Supreme Court has ruled there is nothing wrong with a state imposing a tax on illegal activities.

According to the law, anyone who fits the definition of a drug dealer has to purchase stamps, which can be done anonymously, and attach them to a package or container of illegal drugs in such a way it cannot be opened without destroying the stamps.

A person does not actually have to deal in drugs to be classified a dealer under the law. Anyone who possesses more than 42 grams of marijuana, or seven or more grams of cocaine, is considered a dealer and has to buy the stamps.

Marijuana is taxed at the rate of \$3.50 for every gram, and cocaine at \$200 for a gram.

The penalty for not having affixed the stamps is an amount equal to the tax on it, as well as up to five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine.

Boise teachers reach accord with district

BOISE (AP) — A one-year pact has been approved by Boise teachers, ending a half-year-long conflict and giving the teachers a new 3 1/2 percent pay increase, along with making permanent a 4 1/2 percent temporary increase received last year.

But along with the ratification, came a message by way of a non-binding advisory question on the ballot that "alarmed" school administrators.

By a vote of 912 to 188, Boise teachers Wednesday accepted a settlement based on Portland fact-finder John Abernathy's recommendations.

The non-binding advisory question on the ballot asked whether the teachers would teach next fall without a new contract. More than 60 percent of the 1,100 teachers who cast ballots said they wouldn't, setting the stage for another round of turbulent talks.

"The last thing I wanted to do was to settle now so that they could strike next year," said Boise School Board Trustee Rory Jones.

But Jody Clark, president of the Boise Education Association, said trustees and administrators are jumping to gloomy conclusions. She said many teachers requested that the question be put to a vote.

"This has been a painful process," Clark said. "What teachers are saying is, 'Let us begin bargaining in the spring. But let's not make the classroom teachers worry about it once we're into the next school year.'"

Teachers authorize strike for wage hike

MARSING (AP) — Marsing teachers, who say they are paid more than \$2,000 below the average teacher's salary in Idaho, have unanimously approved a strike authorization vote.

Marsing teachers have been working this year without a contract. The school board wants to delete major sections of the master contract and freeze the salary base, said Jackie Roeser, chairman of the Marsing Education Association's Crisis Committee.

"The teachers need to maintain the same contract they had last year and negotiate a salary increase," Roeser said in a prepared statement issued Thursday afternoon.

BOISE (AP) — A Boise man has been arraigned on a charge of aggravated battery in connection with the stabbing of a patient in St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center.

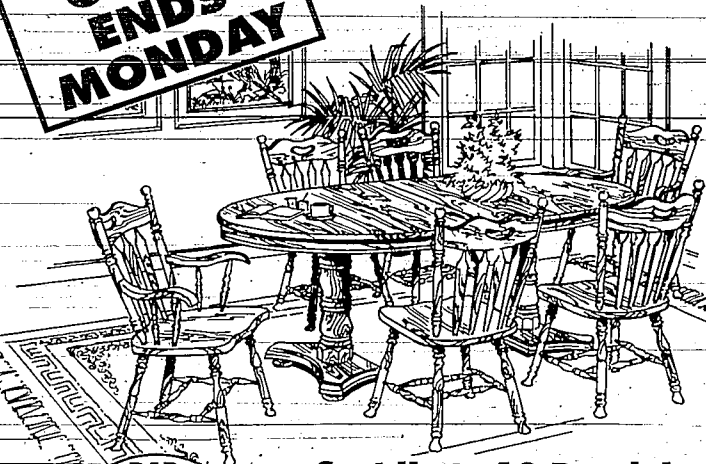

TWIN FALLS — He's been a state senator, a United States cabinet member and governor of Idaho. But this weekend, Cecil Andrus will take on a whole new role that of symphony guest artist.

The governor will be on hand to serve as narrator of "Lincoln Portrait," an orchestral composition by Aaron Copland, when the Magic Valley Symphony presents the first concert of its season at 8 p.m. Saturday.

Although he has often been called upon to make introductions, the governor says Saturday's concert will mark the first time he will be a performer. "Lincoln Portrait," premiered in Cincinnati in 1942, features excerpts from speeches by the nation's 16th president, Abraham Lincoln, was a Republican and

Andrus is a Democrat, but the Idaho governor agrees, the famous statesman transcends political affiliations.

"The life of Abe Lincoln stands on its own," Andrus says. "He's a president who is revered by all."

The two men have something besides public service in common: Like the frontier-born, rail-splitting Lincoln, Andrus is no stranger to an axe. He spent his boyhood on a farm in Greenup, a logging country, where his father operated a sawmill, and he later worked as a lumberjack and himself operated a sawmill at Orofino.

Andrus says that following his most recent re-election in 1986, he has tried to make an enhanced commitment to the art-

In the past year, the state has received \$1 million from the federal Commission on the Arts, which used the 1985-86 fiscal year to provide \$100,000 to make a first ever allocation of grants specifically aimed to improve Idaho's culture.

He says he sees his visit Saturday as an extension of that commitment and hopes that the plans more farmland involvement in arts events "where I can and should see."

Waylon Jennings dispels image as outlaw singer

JACKPOT, NEV. — Waylon Jennings once had his picture on the cover of a magazine, looking very mean under a headline calling him "Outlaw."

"What the people didn't know," Jennings says, "was the reason I looked so mean was I had just touched my nose to the microphone and got shocked real bad. Calling it Outlaw Country worked. It was great for selling music."

Jennings, performing today, Saturday and Sunday at Cactus Pete's in Jackpot, says his label of "outlaw" was used by producers to merchandise and sell records.

"I've never paid any attention to all that," Jennings says. "And I've never taken part in the social end of this business—the cocktail parties and all that."

In a written biography, the country singer says he has never been a humorist and has learned not to take himself too seriously as an entertainer.

In his 30-year recording career, Jennings has had 16 number one singles including "I've Always Been Crazy," "Amazing," "Annie's Living Long Like This" and "Theme Song From The Dukes Of Hazzard." In duets with Willie Nelson, he had hits with "Good Hearted Woman," "Luckenbach, Texas," "Just To Satisfy You" and "Mamas Don't Let Your Babies Grow Up To Be Cowboys." With his wife, Jessi Colter, he reached the top in 1976 with "Suspicious Minds."

Jennings was Country Music Association's Male Vocalist of the Year in 1975 and has won several other awards, but he says the highlight of his career was selling four million albums.

"That was something great because you know somebody laid their money down for that. That's something real," he says. "As far as awards are concerned, that's the only one I keep up with."

Along with his recording career, Jennings admits to a 20-year history of alcohol and drug addiction.

"Drugs and drinking messed up my life and messed up my success," he says. "That's a part of my life that's gone and dead and will never come back."

Now drug-free and sober, Jennings lives

with Jessi and son Scooter in Nashville, Tenn. His agent Brenda Holly says the singer tours "all the time." Jessi travels with him and sometimes performs as his opening act.

In 1955 at age 20, Jennings was working in Texas as a radio jockey when he met rock singer Buddy Holly. Holly taught Jennings how to put different rhythms in country songs and to be not afraid of crossing stylistic borders. Holly produced Jennings' first record in 1958 and he gave Jennings a job playing in his band.

After Jennings' death, the first marriage of J.P. "The Big Bopper" Richardson took his place on the plane that crashed in February, 1959, killing Holly, Richardson and Ritchie Valens.

"I gave up my seat to the Big Bopper," Jennings says. "But the kid just jumped on the bus and plopped down. That's a bunch of bull. The Big Bopper, Holly, wasn't anything like him. Buddy was a very happy person who loved music and loved living."

When Jennings was 19, he was involved in a crash and "never did know where to put it in my life" until a fatal necking one time in Beaumont, Tenn.

"Usually people can't even get to our bus because we have so much security around it," he says. "But this kid just jumped on the bus and plopped down. He said, 'My name's the Big Bopper. I and I want you to tell me about my daddy.' Of course, I knew he knew that he had had taken my place on the plane. It made my blood run cold. I had a bad feeling about it. I was a craps-taking son of a gun. He was a good boy. We talked for a while. His mother was pregnant with him when he was 12. The Big Bopper had talked about the fact that he was going to have a baby, and I had him about that. Then we got through and he got up and shook hands with me. For some reason, I knew that it was all right. I knew that he didn't hold anything against me."

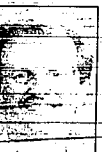
"Prancer" is the story of a little girl who wants to believe and does believe," says Cosgrove, who condensed the 14 hour screenplay into a 28-page book.

But Cosgrove liked the screenplay and wanted to prove to Hollywood and publishers that a nice-book — not just a commercially-oriented book — could be created from a movie script and done in such a short time.

Writing at first for children, he has since branched into fiction, he wrote the kinds of stories he had dreamed — as a child and had "floating around in my head."

"I like to write stories that flow. A benchmark of writing that I write is that if you read it out loud, it's really fun to do," says Cosgrove.

Virtuoso performer Vladimir Horowitz was one of a kind

Vladimir Horowitz, who died on Sunday one month after his 85th birthday, was well known as Vladimir Horowitz.

There was no other pianist like him. Chances are, there never will be.

He played by his own rules, even at his worst. At his best, he played magnificently. That puts it, as they say, mildly.

Once established and universally adulated, he played only when he pleased (in later years at the odd hour of 4:30 on Sunday afternoons). He played only what he pleased. He played only what he pleased. Legends can afford to be choosy.

No one played faster or slower, louder or softer, smoother or rougher than Horowitz. He respected no conventional limits.

No one played with such mechanical virtuosity. No one played with such dazzling individuality. No one played with such ineffable accuracy. No one played with such abiding expressive allure.

No one could understand. They still make great pianists — pianists who like Horowitz, seem to command at least 40 fingers of flexible steel.

However, they no longer make pianists with faces like Horowitz's.

It was a profile predicated on insipid egocentricity. Horowitz may have been a deep thinker. More important, he was a deep dreamer. Inhibition was not his forte.

He made the commonplace seem elegant, and the significant seem ethereal. When drama was called

for, he thundered until the heavens shook. He was a poet — and a sentimentalist — who could make a soggy dirge like Schumann's "Traumerei" sound like lofty poetry. He could make the sparkles of Moszkowski fly like exquisite missiles from another world.

He could almost make "The Stars and Stripes Forever!" — in his own bravura transcription, naturally — sound like music. He even could convince us that Ditzler really intended the most seductive of Camerons

to be not a mezzo-soprano vamp but a chatty pianist.

No one played a Chopin nocturne as Horowitz did — with as many moonstruck colors, as sensations a rubato and with as many subtle nuances. No one brought the same passion to Rachmaninoff (a personal friend), the same nobility to Beethoven, the same sensitivity to Schumann, or the same warmth to Brahms.

Like all giants, he had his detractors. They complained, with good reason, that Horowitz played Mozart as if that unfortunate composer had the bad taste to be born a century too early. They griped, reasonably, that Horowitz distorted the likes of Scarlatti and Clementi with Romantic anachronisms.

His critics lamented his disdain for modernism, although they had to note that he did introduce Samuel Barber's Opus 26 Sonata to the world in 1949. They did document

his abiding tendency toward superficiality, on occasion, for its own slick and shimmering sake.

Horowitz certainly wasn't a scholar. He wasn't a stylist in matters of authentic performance practice. A product of his time, he remained to the end a charter member of the I-play-it-this-way-because-I-feel-it-this-way club.

Some of his playing may have been eccentric or mis-gauged or even wrongheaded. During periods of fragile or declining health, his playing suffered obvious technical lapses. But Horowitz was never boring.

Everyone knows the lore about his foibles. He commanded, and blithely received, astronomical fees. He insisted on traveling — even to Russia — with his own entourage of sycophants and engineers; his own food and his own piano. Reliable sources insist that it was a carefully doctored instrument that helped manufacture the fabulous and possibly unnatural Horowitz tone.

He was a shrewd showbusinessman. He made sure that every herculean feat of his twilight years would be recorded for a grateful posterity on videotapes as well as recordings.

He struck poses of disarming modesty on the stage and, sometimes, in interviews. But, spurred ever onward by his stubbornly watchful wife, Wanda Tuscanini, he could act like a tyrant or spoiled brat or both behind the scenes.

Critics saw him at other artists' concerts. On the other hand, he did enjoy outings at nightclubs or discos. According to longstanding rumors substantiated by his biographers, he enjoyed the company of doing boys as well as adoring women.

He seemed indomitable. Amid reports of a nervous disorder, he disappeared from public view for a long time in the 1960s, only to return in better form than ever before. He played one tour late in his career that seemed to document a tragic

loss of prowess, then undertook another comeback that made happy hours of all the doomsayers.

He hobnobbed with the creme of society, even with royalty, and showed no outward signs of awe. According to John Pinter, the long-suffering record producer, Prince Charles of Great Britain once visited the Horowitzes after a concert and invited the couple to Buckingham Palace for a drink.

"I don't drink," the pianist brashly apologized.

"Then we'll make you some,

borscht," the prince countered.

"Ligh," responded Horowitz, making a sour face.

Undaunted, the prince of pianists did visit the Prince of Wales and Lady Diana the next week. Noblesse obliged on several levels. But Horowitz pointedly declined any refreshments.

"He always adhered to his standards,"

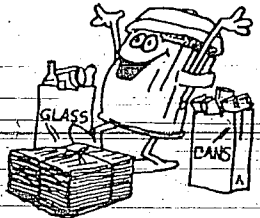

Paula Abdul goes from Laker Girl to singer at top of the charts

LOS ANGELES (AP) — When Paula Abdul was a child, she dreamed of following in the footsteps of singing and dancing legends as Gene Kelly, Fred Astaire and Judy Garland.

Today, it looks as if the diminutive 26-year-old vocalist and choreographer could be well on her way. Abdul's debut album, "Forever Your Girl," has sold more than 2 million copies with three No. 1 singles: "Straight Up," "Forever Your Girl" and "Cold Hearted." A fourth single, "The Way You Love Me," is also burning up the charts.

To top it off, she recently won three MTV awards for her music and videos, and even more recently won an Emmy for her choreography of "The Tracey Ullman Show."

She is understandably overwhelmed. "I feel redundant when I keep saying, 'I'm overwhelmed' or 'I'm excited,' but it's really something you can't explain," she said. "It's just an inner feeling that you have. You smile and you laugh and you think, 'I'm a real-lucky girl.'"

Abdul has come a long way from her days cheerleading for the Los Angeles Lakers, considering it was an opportunity she almost missed.

She heard about the audition and went with her girlfriends, but became discouraged when she saw hundreds of Laker Girl hopefuls milling about waiting for their chance to perform.

"I drove the girls that were auditioning with me so I had to wait for them. And at the very last second, after hours, I said, 'What the heck, I'm just gonna go ahead.'"

"I was a big basketball fan,"

said, "I was a huge Laker fan and we each would get two season seats. What more could you want? The Lakers were really hot."

Soon after being selected as one of the 12 cheerleaders in 1981, the choreographer left to get married. She asked a very young Abdul to take over the job.

Like everything she commits herself to, Abdul devoted herself to getting the Laker Girls noticed. She incorporated traditional cheerleading with jazzy dance steps and savvy street moves.

The fans did notice — and the offers started pouring in for Abdul to choreograph. She helped smooth out dance steps for a music video by the Jacksons and did some commercial work. Then she choreographed the videos for Janet Jackson's "What Have You Done for Me Lately?" and "When I Think of You," among others.

"I wasn't looking to become a choreographer really," Abdul said. "These were little jobs that came my way and it was something that was good money and it was fun."

Besides choreographing videos for Jackson, ZZ Top and the Pointer Sisters, Abdul arranged dance steps for Aretha Franklin, Kool and the Gang and George Michael concert tours.

She also choreographed two films: "The Running Man" and "Coming to America." She became so busy she had to say goodbye to the Laker Girls.

But with the looming examples of Kelly, Garland and Astaire, Abdul still was drawn to song.

Abdul laughed as she talked recently about her break into the recording business. She said the

record company executives who worked with her on music videos kept asking, "So what do you want to do when you grow up, Paula?"

She would respond: "I want to be an artist on your label."

Finally two executives too her seriously and signed her to a recording deal. "Forever Your Girl" was the result.

"I remember thinking when I was making the album, 'Look, I'm having a good time doing this but it would be really wonderful if I really sold albums.' It would be wonderful if I had hit songs," she said.

The album has since produced the three hits, and probably will generate a few more.

"You feel like, 'Well, gosh, I have a No. 1 single, that's really great.'"

Then you have another single that comes out and it goes No. 1 and you freak out," she said. "I freaked out. I couldn't believe it. Then you have a third one that goes No. 1 and you go, 'Oh my God, I'm dreaming.'"

Abdul never expected such quick success when she was a young girl taking "hotns and honks" of dancing lessons and dreaming of Hollywood in her San Fernando Valley neigh-

borhood. Her dark good looks come from a Brazilian and Syrian father, and a French Canadian mother. She said when she was little, her mother warned her about the perils of show business and urged her to have an other dream.

Abdul seriously took the advice and went to California State University, Northridge, where she entered the radio-TV film program.

"I still had a strong love of song and dance and acting, but I knew it was a pipe dream because then I would maybe have a career as a sports commentator."

"Unfortunately," for the sports world, she never took that career track — and now prefers cloverleafs and sunsets while trying to find time for herself. After a recent early morning photo shoot, Abdul admitted she was pressed for time because she had to catch a plane to Paris.

"It gets—dramatic," she said. "When it gets to be a little bit too much that's when I have to back out, at least for a day, because I don't want it ever to be tedious. I want to always feel the way I'm feeling now."

HAGERMAN — Gouger's Bend, the original name of Hagerman, is offering a pioneer style dinner on Saturday evening.

"A foot-stomping, hand-clapping international dinner has been planned as a community get-together," says M.J. Freeman, an organizer of the dinner. "It will be a fundraiser for Idaho's birthday celebration next year."

The dinner, along with an auction, will be held at Coliharp Opera House in Hagerman's American Legion (Hall) from 5:30 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

Live music will be played by the Old Time Fiddlers, spelled at intermission with accordian playing by

Anita Standal and Barbara Albert. Dinners representing the pioneer ethnic groups of Gouger's Bend will be served by today's clubs and churches.

The Lions are preparing Mexican food, the Eastern Star and Masons will serve Hawaiian delights and the Catholic church will offer Basque cuisine. It will be Danish food from the American Legion, Swedish from the LDS Church and Italian from the Senior Center. Breads from around the world will be prepared by the Grange and Reorganized LDS. The local historical society will serve beverages, while a variety of desserts will be offered by the Methodist Church, the Christian Center and the Odd Fellow and Rebekah Lodges.

Freeman says cost is \$5 per adult.

Young'ns age 12 and under will need \$3. Those under age 4 don't have to pay and families can get in for \$20.

In addition to the dinners, each organization will donate one table decoration and a special item to be auctioned off during the evening. Freeman says the public, including all miners, freighters, farmers and those who have just come off the Oregon Trail, are welcome to pull up a chair and break bread with the other pioneers.

"It will be an ethnic dinner you'll long remember," says Freeman. "Many of our residents brought the recipes from the old country when they wound their way West."

She says Hagerman was called Gouger's Bend because of all the placer miners here in the 1870s and

'80s, panning along the riverbanks for very fine flour gold.

"Some made a decent wage," Freeman said, "but no one got rich."

The rock wall opera house, built about 80 years ago, was the community center for all social events, including dances, fish-fry dinners, graduations, funerals, plays and, in later years, movies and roller skating.

The 100 Greatest Albums of the '80s appears in the Nov. 16 issue. The Clash, a now defunct band

whose lyrics featured aggressive working-class politics that became the staple of the punk movement, recorded "London Calling" in 1980.

The rest of the top-10 in descending order, are: "Purple Rain," by Prince and the New Power Generation; "The Joshua Tree," by the Irish rock group U2; "Remain in Light," by the

Talking Heads; "Graceland," by Paul Simon; "Born in the U.S.A.," by Bruce Springsteen; "Thriller," by Michael Jackson; "Murmur," by R.E.M.; "Shoot Out the Lights," by Richard and Linda Thompson; and "Tracy Chapman," by folk singer Tracy Chapman.

The surprise listing is the record by the Thompsons, whose album didn't make the charts but was critically acclaimed in 1982.

Nostalgia was a big factor on the list. Forty-nine of the albums were released from 1980 through 1983.

The five 1989 releases on the list are by artists who made their claims to fame during an earlier time: "New York," by Lou Reed, No. 19; "Oh Mercy," by Bob Dylan, No. 44; "Graceland," by Neil Young, No. 65; "Steel Wheels," by the Rolling Stones, No. 87; and "Full Moon Fever," by Tom Petty, No. 92.

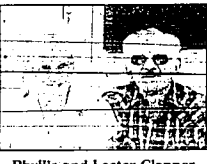

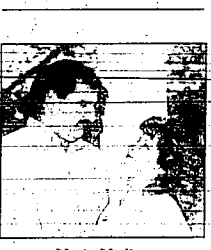

Reagan apologizes to Hollywood, but wants change

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Former President Reagan apologized to the entertainment industry for his recent criticism of American TV and movies, but said Hollywood should clean up its sometimes racy fare.

"I'm sorry that what I've said about this industry may have been misunderstood and I apologize to anyone who may have taken any offense. That certainly was not my intention," Reagan said.

Reagan's speech to more than 1,000 members of the Hollywood Radio and Television Society was billed as the "unfinished business of his presidency," but the focus instead was on his comments in Japan last month denigrating the quality of

U.S. film and TV productions.

Reagan said in Japan that he supported Sony's \$3.4 billion acquisition of Columbia Pictures Entertainment Corp.

"I don't think there's anything wrong with that," he said in a television interview broadcast there Oct. 25. "I'm not too proud of Hollywood these days with the immorality that it shows in pictures, and the vulgarity."

"I just have a feeling that maybe Hollywood needs some outsiders to bring back decency and good taste to some of the pictures that are being made."

Reagan began his speech last Tuesday at the Beverly Wilshire Ho-

tel with his apology.

"I'm sorry I was a little tardy in getting here today," he said. "You see my dentist was running late he had a little difficulty in removing from my mouth the last piece of shoe leather I acquired in Japan."

"If I had he did though, otherwise I wouldn't be able to enjoy this wonderful lunch — there's nothing like a crow soufflé followed by humble pie."

The former president also defended the \$2 million Japanese company paid him for a series of appearances last month.

"That's what was offered, and I didn't protest, even though I knew there was an actor in Hollywood who got \$3 million for just doing a Toyota commercial there," Reagan said. "I just thought that in 16 years I hadn't made any kind of money."

Among the Hollywood elite were Aaron Spelling, Grant Tinker, Brandon Tartikoff, Fred Silverman and Stephen Canell.

Reagan told them the industry should act voluntarily to police vulgarity and tastelessness to avoid government intervention.

"The federal government has tried

to interfere too much and too often," said Reagan, who pushed deregulation during his eight years in the White House.

"Censorship or restriction should be within," he continued, suggesting a voluntary code of behavior and rules.

Reagan said he was appalled by what he sees in movies and on television.

"You can call me a blockhead or a prudery or what, but if I was afraid a script and told I had to say those words I would have turned down the script," he said.

'Talking' still tops

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The love-over-dippers comedy "Look Who's Talking" grossed more than \$11 million for the fourth weekend in a row, joining an elite list of box-office blockbusters, as "The Bear" moved up to second place on the leader boards.

"Look Who's Talking," starring Kirstie Alley, John Travolta and the voice of Bruce Willis, collected \$11.5 million and has now made nearly \$60 million, according to figures released Monday by Entertainment Data Inc. and Exhibitor Relations Co.

According to Entertainment Data, only six other films since 1982 have surpassed the \$11 million mark each weekend for a month: "E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial," "Return of the Jedi," "Chubasco," "The Untouchables," "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade," and "Batman."

Weekend business for the Top 10 films was up 39 percent from a year ago.

"The Bear," the live-action drama about two bears being pursued by hunters, jumped to second place with \$11.1 million in wider release.

With a strong per-screen average of \$4,851 in its second week of release.

In third was director Wes Craven's "Shocker," a story about a murderer who more or less appeals his death sentence. "Shocker," falling 26 percent from last weekend, reported a gate of \$4.1 million.

Woody Allen's melancholy comedy "Crimes and Misdemeanors" is now the director's biggest hit since 1986's "Hannah and Her Sisters." "Crimes and Misdemeanors," with Martin Landau, Angelica Huston and Alan Alda, had ticket sales of \$2.7 million in limited release on 440 screens.



'Dad' combines unsentimental acting with sentimental end

HOLLYWOOD — "Dad" wants desperately to deal frankly with old age. Not just the wise old Patrician-commercial variety, with golden oldsters arm in arm, but the part that every one of us fears: intrusive medical procedures, pills to the loss of our abilities and our very functions, the encroachment of real or imagined terrors.

Review

The fact that all these terrors are mirrored in Jack Lemmon's performance as 75-year-old retiree Jake Tremont, and in the interaction between him and Ted Danson, who plays his son, is all to the credit of the film's director-adapter, Gary David Goldberg, of television's "Family Ties."

Lemmon's work is extraordinarily notably unsentimental for an actor who has, at times, become awash with sentiment and something of a marvel physically. It is nice too that Goldberg has been true to the essence of the character of Jake's wife, Bette (Olympia Dukakis), who is through and through, a really nasty piece of work. In the original novel, her son dispassionately describes his mother's 50-year-long run as a wife as "a simple matter of miscasting."

But also at Goldberg's door is the fact that the film has no clear through-line that it branches off onto limbs that should have been pruned back, and that eventually it succumbs to a prettified sentimentality that its performers have done to "some lengths to avoid."

Goldberg has picked a diabolically difficult book to adapt: William Wharton's 1981 novel of the same

name, with more than a hint of personal experience about it. The book too is cluttered and diffuse, but it still has nice, uncompromisingly rough edges to it that this film adaptation has played away. It was an honest, painful record; it has been nudged into family-style uplift.

Everything is now within our experience, or within the experience of a devoted television viewer. Rather

than an expatriate American painter with children and a French wife, Danson's John Tremont is now a Wall Street go-getter, attached unthinkingly to his company and detached from his family. It includes his ex-wife and his teen-age son, Billy (Ethan Hawke, of "Dead Poet's Society"). Useless to wonder, or worse, why the country lawyer has a painter, or why we had to suffer again through the cliché of the overachieving American executive who can't feel but will learn to.

It is Dukakis' heart attack that brings Danson to California. But it is his father's deteriorating condition that shocks him into staying a while.

After more than 40 years with a dominating, overprotective wife, any will that the elderly man had has been eroded. He cannot even pick out his pajamas or butter his toast.

While his mother recovers in the hospital, as a part of a conscience, Danson taps through to the man he once knew — bringing him back to a degree that Danson's sister the splendid Kathy Baker) and brother-in-law Kevin Spacey) could almost miraculously. The line between late sitcom timing and truth is a fine one, and for the most part, truth wins out. These scenes may be kitsch, but it's kitsch that works. It's sweet to see the habits and bywords that once linked these men surfacing again.

Then medical handbilling by a stubborn, hellbent doctor reduces Lemmon to still life necessity, wiping out the loving advancements his son has made and taking the story into new areas, a violent roller coaster ride full of them.

Disaster. Shamalike doctors. Recovery. Violent scenes of behavior. Fathers and sons, doctors and sons, Susis and fathers. Wives and husbands. Mothers and Sons. Mothers and neighbors. Much of a mother's — No movie can retain its intent with this much chattering up the plumb line of its story. "Dad" certainly can't. And that's without even doing much with the subplot about Lemmon's "successful schizophrenia."

His 40-year retreat from his wife's nagging is powerful and completely imaginary other. He is a farmer in rural New Jersey.

It's a pity, because there are individual moments here of surprising tenderness and compassion. It's unlikely that anyone who sees it will forget Lemmon's physical repres-

sent, in which he literally seems to shrink to an 80-pound wraith, or the moment in which Danson climbs onto his father's bed for the sort of farewell that most sons (or daughters) wish they could make.

These truths don't seem to satisfy the film makers, though. (This is a movie made under Steven Spielberg's Amblin banner, after all.)

'Bear' is spectacular, witty

The following are movies currently playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times reviewers.

THE BEAR (PG), Jean-Jacques Annaud's adaptation of the (1916) James Oliver Curwood novel — about a fierce grizzly and a lovable cub pursued implacably by two hunters through the Canadian Rockies — is one family film with epic purity and power. You'd have to go back to the first half of 1979's "The Black Stallion" to find something comparable. The spectacular setting — actually the Bavarian Alps — is bathed in frosty clear light, caught with glacial purity by the great cinematographer Philippe Rousselot. The two bears — big Bart and little Douce — are tremendous camera subjects and the script, by Polanski's scenarist, Gerard Brach, is full of dark, sophisticated wit.

BLACK RAIN (R), Director Ridley Scott gives this typical, simple-minded fish-out-of-water thriller — with Michael Douglas as a macho, motorcycling cop set loose in Japan

with some leftover plot from "Coogan's Bluff" — so much style and dazzle, the movie becomes a triumph of matter over mind. It's like film noir cubed: Osaka and Tokyo are converted into a futuristic fantasy city on the "Blade Runner" level, neon blaring through a wilderness of rainy streets and towering angular architecture, where bad yakuza and good cops (Ken Takakura) duel in the wobbline. The movie is a blast of pure sensation; shallow but scintillating.

FAT MAN AND LITTLE BOY (PG-13), With co-writer Bruce Robinson, director and co-writer Roland Joffe understands fully the temptation of an intellectual to play God as one with irrevocable consequences for the planet. But while his film makes that point with the fullest poignance, it also takes until its last quarter to gather its power, and its poetic eye is paired with a flat voice and an oddly tin ear. Dwight Schultz's J. Robert Oppenheimer is a believably complicated figure, a commanding, prideful

prickly egghead. Paul Newman as Gen. Leslie Groves — unconcerned only at being bulky — is one of his biggest stretches and most complex achievements.

IMMEDIATE FAMILY (PG-13), What in the sweet name of goodness is it doing here, movie theater? You expect writing this leaden from the grimest ghettoes of television. Obviously, the film's cast of heavy hitters — as warm loving folks, Glenn Close and James Woods are crucially miscast — has boosted it over the fence and in to the local 14-plexes. Don't let that sway you. Mush is still mush, even when it's directed by "Heart Like a Wheel's" Jonathan Kaplan. But not all the performances are actingly high-minded. Mary Stuart Masterson's teen-ager is by turns cooey, lost, suspicious, yearning and coming to maturity before our eyes.

LOOK WHO'S TALKING (PG-13), Movies in which animals or babies speak their thoughts in voiceover rarely work, but part of the strength here is that Bruce Willis, as the sperm-fetus-baby, isn't always talking.

'Small Sacrifices' portrays ordinary people in story of actual murder case

By A. A. Hugenboom

"I immediately saw Farah Fawcett as Diane Downs," says Suzanne de Passe, the co-producer of "Small Sacrifices," a two-part, true-crime docudrama airing Sunday, Nov. 12, and Tuesday, Nov. 14, on ABC. "And my first instinct paid off, something that doesn't often happen in this business." Emmy winner David Greene directs, and John Shea, Gordon Clapp and Ryan O'Neal also star.

O'Neal makes a special guest appearance as Lew Lewiston, the reluctant lover for whom Diane Downs would do anything. Casting the Lewiston part was more typically difficult. Filming had already started, and de Passe and co-producer Louis Rudolph had yet to find the ideal actor for the small but vital role. One day, O'Neal visited Fawcett on the set, de Passe had a brainstorm, and the final piece clicked into place. "Then we knew the casting god or goddess was on our shoulder," de Passe recalls with a laugh.

"Small Sacrifices" opens in May 1983, when Diane Downs drove her red Nissan Pulsar to a hospital emergency room in Springfield, Ore. "He shot my children," she frantically explained as desperate doctors fought to save the lives of her two surviving children (the third was already dead). Even that evening, Downs' response to the tragedy aroused some suspicions. She showed almost as much

concern over the bullet holes in her car as for her children.

Assistant-DA Frank Joziak (John Shea); Investigator Doug Welch (Gordon Clapp) and the police initially searched for a "bushy-haired stranger" who Downs claimed shot her kids. But they soon shifted their focus to Downs' inconsistent statements. Their investigation uncovered Downs' troubled past (portrayed by Fawcett in numerous flashbacks). To escape an unhappy home, she tumbled into a tempestuous marriage; searching for fulfillment, she became a surrogate mother even as she neglected her own children. And she pursued a clinging relationship with a lover (O'Neal), who wouldn't leave his wife.

Joziak and Welch were convinced that Diane shot her own children to encourage Lewiston (who had told her, "I don't want to be a Daddy") to leave his wife for her. But without the murder weapon, it was doubtful that they had enough evidence to secure a conviction.

But as Joziak uncovered Downs' unstable past, little 8-year-old Karen Downs began to emerge from the trauma, with the help of a devoted foster family, an excellent psychiatrist, and a genuinely concerned Jo-

zink. She began to remember what actually happened that horrible night.

Joziak needed Karen's testimony, but he refused to risk the little girl's fragile progress by making a quick arrest. Unfortunately, John Shea plays this humane hero with nothing more than a series of smoldering stares. Indeed, with the exception of Gordon Clapp's Doug Welch, the good characters of "Small Sacrifices" are dull and one-dimensional.

Like all good true-crime drama, "Small Sacrifices" titillates and horrifies, while simultaneously moving the viewer with portrayals of ordinary people, like Frank Joziak, responding to the horror with extraordinary humanity. For co-producer Louis Rudolph, the message of "Small Sacrifices" is "Don't be pessimistic. What came out of this darkness of evil was that the Joziahs became more in touch with their humanity."

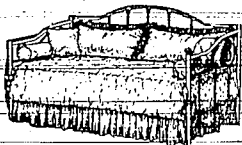

Women's group finds no progress in TV season

WASHINGTON (AP) — Network television took a couple of steps backward this year in its treatment of women, according to a women's group that this past Monday turned thumbs down on "Major Dad," "Chicken Soup," "Doogie Howser, M.D." and "Baywatch."

Of the 26 new television programs on the fall lineup, "not one show was a step forward for women," said the National Commission on Working Women of Wider Opportunities for Women.

Whereas progress had been made in previous years in getting away from stereotypical views of women, particularly the "sexually aggressive female," new TV shows this year went "from mediocre to awful," said Sally Steenland, media director for the women's organization.

"Major Dad," "Chicken Soup" and "People Next Door" are "straining viewer credibility" with unlikely romances between the lead characters, and "Doogie Howser, M.D.," "Baywatch" and "Living Dolls" contain objectionable "double entendres and smarmy sex," the group said.

CBS has canceled "People Next Door."

Entertainment programming broke no new ground in terms of race either, the group said.

"As in the past, most minority characters on new shows are black, and most of them appear in all, or mostly, black shows."

"At best, the new season has given us the status quo. At worst, television has taken a step backward from the progress it made last year," actress Linda Lavin said in remarks prepared for delivery Wednesday at the group's 11th annual Women at Work Broadcast Awards program.

The only new shows that got good marks were "Life Goes On" and "Alien Nation."

ABC's "Life Goes On," starring Christopher Burke as a teen-ager with Down's syndrome, was cited for its "credible exploration of family issues."

"Alien Nation," a Fox Broadcasting Co. show about aliens living on Earth, was praised for being "in many ways an allegory about racism."

The group bestowed its 1989 Commissioners Award on actress Dana Delaney for her portrayal of Army nurse Colleen McMurphy on ABC-TV's Vietnam War drama, "China Beach."

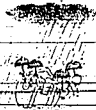

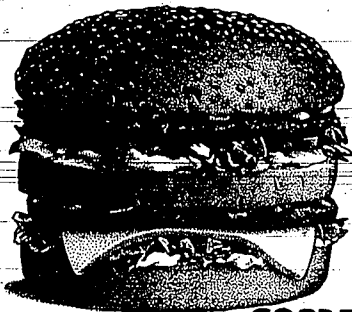
