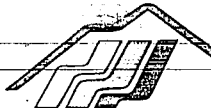

House passes pay raise, income limit

WASHINGTON — House members voted Thursday to raise their pay by more than \$30,000 a year over the next 13 months — to above \$120,000 a year — while revising ethics rules to put new limits on outside earnings.

The bill was passed 252 to 174, just 10 months after intense public criticism forced the House to reject a larger pay increase.

The new proposal sped through the House with strong support from the leaders of both parties and an endorsement from President Bush. A slight majority of Republicans voting opposed the bill despite Bush's stance.

The Senate was expected to consider it today.

"I can understand and sympathize with people in my district who make 15 and 20 and \$30,000 a year who would have trouble understanding why this kind of pay level is needed," said House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo.

"But," he told his colleagues, "in your heart and in your mind you know it's the right thing to do."

Rep. James A. Traficant, D-Ohio, took a different view.

"I understand the game — we come with ethics reform and we sneak in a pay raise," he said.

The complex, 100-page pay and ethics package was announced by Democratic and Republican leaders Wednesday, but copies were not made available to the public until debate was well under way Thursday.

Public criticism, some of it galvanized by broadcast talk-show hosts, helped lead to defeat of a proposed 51 percent congressional pay raise earlier this year. But there was no time this time.

"Without public hearings, without a decent interval of time for the American people to digest it, the House Leadership railroaded it through," complained consumer advocate Ralph Nader, who opposes congressional pay increases.

But Ann McBride, senior vice president of Common Cause, the self-proclaimed public interest organization, hailed the action as "moving toward a time when we will have government fully compensated by the public, and not vice versa."

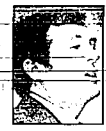
Idahoans vote against pay increase

WASHINGTON — Both of Idaho's House members sided with a minority of Congress in opposing a plan to give themselves a pay hike and revamp congressional ethics rules.

Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Rexburg, said he liked the ethics reforms in the package, which passed 252-174, but opposed the pay raise.

"I felt torn because the ethics package was good but I was uncomfortable having the two tied together," Stallings said.

last Winter failed after a firestorm public criticism.

Some senior House members had also threatened to vote against the ethics package if it was split from the pay raise, Stallings said. "They had more to lose," he said.

Stallings said he would have likely supported the package if it had just called for a cost-of-living increase. He also would have favored upping just the salaries of some top elected government employees, such as Energy Department and National Institutes of Health scientists, so the federal employees would not be drawn to Congress.

Hawkins attorneys may adopt farmers' bankruptcy plan

FILER — Hawkins Co. Ltd. may abandon its own bankruptcy plan in favor of one backed by farmers, a company lawyer said Thursday.

"What we're thinking about doing is actually withdrawing our plan," Hawkins Co. attorney Jim Tucker said Thursday.

Tucker said his firm will try to coordinate its efforts with attorneys John McLanson and Bob Weaver.

The two Bull attorneys, hired by some of the farmers, wrote the plan farmers indicated they liked best at a Wednesday meeting.

Hawkins Co. attorneys called the meeting with growers Wednesday night at Filer High School after farmers questioned the company's plan to settle the failed warehouse's bankruptcy estate.

The company's attorneys had hoped to learn how farmers wanted to distribute about \$6 million of bean proceeds from the estate. Then, they said, they would try to alter their formal court plan to cater to farmers' desires.

What they learned was that the approximately 200 farmers at the meeting liked Weaver and McLanson's plan.

Weaver and McLanson incorporated parts of an informal proposal by the growers into their formal court plan, one of three that U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Alfred Hogan approved last week for a vote by growers and creditors.

The Weaver-McLanson plan was the last to be filed, Weaver,

speaking at the growers' meeting, said he waited until growers had worked out a preferred distribution plan before filing his formal court document.

Under the Weaver-McLanson plan, growers who had beans from the 1988 crop year would receive \$1.50 per sack of beans more than growers who stored beans from pre-1988 beans. Pre-1988 beans would receive \$17.39 per sack and 1988 beans would receive \$18.89 per sack, regardless of variety and before administrative claims.

"It also takes a somewhat controversial stand and treats various bean purchasers, such as Klein Brothers of California and Twin Falls attorney Kent Taylor, about the same as growers. However, those depositors wouldn't share about \$500,000 worth of bonds with farmers."

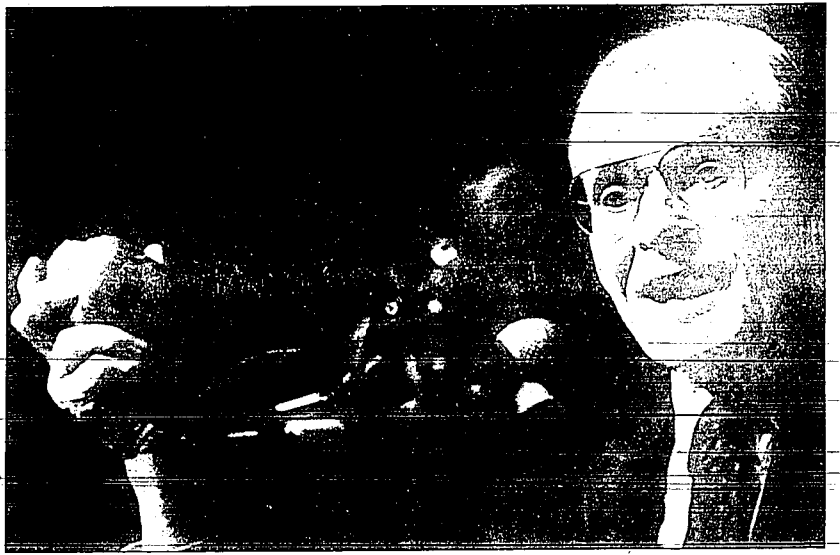
"What I'm hearing is that growers are dissatisfied that Klein and Taylor would receive the same amount," McLanson said Thursday. But he and Weaver adopted the formula "in order to get the matter done as quickly and as fairly as possible."

Hawkins Co. had proposed carving off about \$300,000 — which company lawyers emphasized Wednesday was negotiable — to pay certain costs and to turn over the rest of the money to farmers.

Hawkins Co. will probably withdraw its plan, Tucker said.

"I don't want to say it's written in stone," Tucker said. "Right now it's likely. I think we've pretty well decided."

Butz looks to new frontiers of challenge for agriculture

TWIN FALLS — Former Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz picked an apple off his lectern.

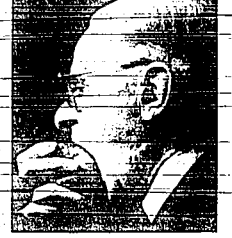
He took a bite and praised U.S. agriculture because he knew no worms had burrowed into the apple.

"God put the worm in there and man took it out,"

he said.

Butz's apple chomping was part of an intimate but forceful defense of the state of U.S. agriculture at a speech to about 100 people at the College of Southern Idaho. It's an agricultural system that costs the consumers only 12 percent of their take-home pay for food and provides a clean, safe food supply, he said.

Contraceptive vaccine 10 years in future

WASHINGTON — A vaccine developed using genetic engineering techniques produces long-term contraception in female mice, but use of a similar vaccine to provide birth control for women is probably at least a decade away, researchers reported Thursday.

The contraceptive vaccine works by preventing fertilization of eggs by sperm, rather than by interfering with development of the fetus after conception or inducing abortions.

Findings from the research, carried out by scientists at the National Institute of Health, were published in Science, the journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Asked how long it will be before the work may lead to development of a human contraceptive vaccine, researcher

Jarriren Dean said: "Well in excess of a decade, but that's just speculation."

In the meantime, he said, "I think that it has potential application probably in veterinary medicine and agriculture. But our layer here, as basic scientists, is that these studies will stimulate investigations into these types of immunologically based contraceptive agents."

The researchers focused their attention on the zona pellucida, a layer of proteins surrounding egg cells produced by the ovaries in all female mammals. One of the proteins serves as the receptor for the male sperm cell when fertilization occurs.

They had shown that NIH and elsewhere had studies at NIH and elsewhere had shown that if the zona pellucida is coated with certain antibodies — proteins that produce specific immune-system reactions — injected into test animals, then sperm cannot fertilize the egg.

U.S. seeks probe of priests' deaths

WASHINGTON — The United States said Thursday it will ask for an investigation into the killing of six Roman Catholic priests in El Salvador, and will accelerate deliveries of military aid to government forces there.

"We do not know who committed this barbarous act, which we condemn in the strongest possible terms," said State Department spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler.

A Jesuit priest, who spoke only on condition he not be identified, told reporters in San Salvador that a witness saw 30 uniformed soldiers enter the grounds of the University of Central America shortly before the six priests and two university

Both the Salvadoran government and its armed forces denied any involvement in the incident.

White House Press Secretary Marlin Fitzwater condemned the killings in a statement late Thursday and said the Salvadoran government was reported to have begun an investigation.

"We condemn in the strongest possible terms the outrageous murder of Father Ignacio

Elacuria, rector of the University of Central America, and the other Jesuit priests in El Salvador," Fitzwater said.

"We understand that the Salvadoran government has begun an investigation and we will be watching this investigation closely."

Ms. Tutwiler said U.S. Ambassador William Walker will ask the Salvadoran government for a "full inquiry" into killings at the university. She said Walker intended to raise the matter directly with Salvadoran President Alfredo Cristiani on Thursday.

The Conference of Major Superiors of Men, representing 260 religious orders, condemned the killings and called for renewed efforts to negotiate a peace in El Salvador.

Sen. Barbara Mikulski, D-Md., said she and Rep. Joe Moakley, D-Mass., had sent telegrams to the Salvadoran government and Father E.M.N. guerrillas asking them to respect a Red Cross request for a 72-hour cease-fire to allow

evacuation of civilians and the wounded.

She said the Bush administration should do everything it can to halt the fighting and arrange negotiations.

Pete Williams, spokesman for Defense Secretary Dick Cheney, said the Pentagon is accelerating delivery of military assistance previously requested by Salvadoran authorities.

Ms. Tutwiler said the request from San Salvador included riot control equipment and light weaponry.

"I understand some of the equipment is new but other items have been on request for some time, and we are merely speeding up delivery," Williams said.

The administration has requested \$370 million in economic and military aid next year for El Salvador, which the United States regards as its closest ally in Central America. Of the total, \$85 million is arms aid.

Ms. Tutwiler said the United States is confident of the Christian government's ability to defeat the guerrillas who began a major offensive earlier this week.

Fighting rages in San Salvador

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — Fighter jets bombed rebel positions in parts of San Salvador and troops battled guerrillas block by block Thursday in efforts to break the largest offensive of the decade.

Armed men meanwhile entered the grounds of Jose Simeon Casas Central American University before dawn and killed and mutilated six Jesuit priests, their housekeeper and his 15-year-old daughter.

—Reports of fighting in the countryside were sketchy, but at least 800 people have died and 1,600 have been wounded since the offensive in all 14 provinces began Saturday night.

—Casas leaders have acknowledged they cannot win the 10-year-old war militarily but launched the offensive to prove the army also could not win and that rightist President Alfredo Cristiani would be unable to govern without a

role in government for their Farabundo Marti National Liberation Front.

—Although only 1,500 guerrillas are thought to be involved in the attack in San Salvador, the entire outfit of 1 million people seemed besieged. Virtually nothing was open and the sounds of combat were everywhere.

A-37 fighter-bombers screamed overhead, followed by thundering explosions as bombs dropped.

—“We were caught in the crossfire,” said Angel Eraso, clenching his teeth on one hand and a bag of clothes in the other. “It was a horrible night.”

Residents of one neighborhood who had been without food for days looted a marketplace.

—“We have no food, no money, nowhere to go,” sobbed Adilia Hernandez, from Zacamil, a northern neighborhood held by the guerrillas since Saturday night.

—Amnesty International, the London-based human rights group,

said 50 civilians took refuge Thursday in a suburban church. The church was surrounded by troops and there are three Jesuit priests inside, the rights group said. The report could not immediately be independently confirmed.

The army wants the people to come out; those inside are afraid to because one of the priests was accused of plotting to overthrow Cristiani, Amnesty said.

The siege came hours after a witness said uniformed government troops killed the six Roman Catholic priests. The government denied the accusation and said the crime was “intended to destabilize the democratic process and increase even more the climate of anguish” created by the rebel offensive.

The guerrilla offensive was launched three days after the guerrillas canceled peace talks with the government following a Oct. 30 terrorist bombing that left 10 dead at a union hall.

Atoll residents say island not safe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Residents of Rongelap, a tiny Pacific atoll, contended Thursday that their island remains unsafe nearly four decades after the U.S. government tested a nuclear bomb in the area.

“The Rongelap people wish to return home,” said Ron Anjain, who represents the Rongelapese in the Marshall Islands government. “However, we will only return home if Rongelap Atoll is determined to be safe.”

Such a determination could be made only through a comprehensive radiological survey of the atoll, which has not been done since the so-called “Bravo” test irradiated the area in 1954, he told a House inter-committee hearing.

The Reagan and Bush administrations have contended that Rongelap is safe for habitation. Roughly 350 Rongelapese, concerned about incidents of leukemia and thyroid cancer, evacuated the island in 1985 to live on Mejoto, another island.

Officer fears threat, kills 2 boys

HASTINGS, Minn. (AP) — A veteran police officer killed two 13-year-old boys with a single shotgun blast to their backs after one of the youths pointed a screwdriver at him and he mistook it for a gun, authorities said Thursday.

This Yang and Baser, who were suspected of auto theft, were shot Wednesday with a 12-gauge shotgun fired by Inver Grove Heights officer Kenneth Murphy, according to Mark Shields, superintendent of the state Bureau of Criminal Apprehension.

“Officer Murphy, fearing his life was in danger, discharged his weapon,” Shields said at a news conference.

However, the killings angered members of Minnesota’s Southeast Asian community, who said Murphy had used unnecessary force.

Judge orders subpoena for Reagan papers

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge Thursday approved a subpoena that would compel former President Reagan to produce some of his records by next Wednesday for the Iraq-Cuba criminal case of John Poindexter.

U.S. District Court Judge Harold Greene granted a petition by lawyers for Poindexter, who was Reagan’s national security adviser. In the past, the lawyers have said they want portions of Reagan’s diaries and notes he took at key meetings with Poindexter.

The judge did not say how narrowly or broadly under the subpoena was.

In a two-paragraph order, Greene said Poindexter “may serve upon former President Reagan and upon the archivist of the United States the subpoenas ... submitted to the court.”

—The return date for those subpoenas shall be Nov. 22, 1989, said Greene.

The judge ruled last month that Poindexter is entitled to subpoena “specific, relevant documents” bearing on the criminal charges against him.

“I have no comment,” Theodore Olson, a lawyer for Reagan.

by special interest influence money.

—The bill would increase salaries in the House, for federal judges, and for top executive branch officials by at least 35 percent and often by closer to 40 percent.

Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, said the Senate would consider the bill Friday. However, it was not clear what raises or honoraria limits the Senate might include for itself.

The Senate could give itself a smaller raise, as it did earlier this decade. Senators were paid less than House members for about six months seven years ago before senators approved a catch-up raise.

—The House bill provides for a 7.9 percent cost-of-living hike by

January. On Jan. 1, 1991, a 25 percent raise would be given — on top of whatever cost-of-living increase is given to rank-and-file civil servants at that time.

Assuming a 4 percent 1991 civil service raise, House members who now make \$89,500 likely would see their pay increase to about \$125,000.

However, lawmakers who currently add to their incomes with honoraria for speeches would have to give that up. Current rules allow House members to pocket honoraria totaling up to 20 percent of their salaries, while senators can keep 40 percent.

Gephardt cited the honoraria rules as a key reform which would raise public confidence in Congress. He implored House members to have courage to vote for the package.

Hawkins Co. failed last year when a year-end inventory found the warehouse short of beans. Hawkins Co. filed for bankruptcy to avoid a “fire sale” liquidation of beans that would have destroyed the local bean market, Tucker said.

In the midst of Wednesday’s meeting, farmers also heard one explanation of how Hawkins Co. had become 114,000 sacks short of beans.

—The former manager, Jerry Hawkins, would consistently pay many farmers between \$5 and \$7 more than the market price for their

beans, acting warehouse manager John Cato said; But then Hawkins apparently would alter records to exaggerate the number of beans purchased, Cato said.

“Consequently, he got shorter and shorter and shorter,” Cato said. When bean prices doubled, the warehouse failed, he said.

“In the last year, \$1.25 million was paid out to you people out there for which no beans were taken,” Cato said.

The Times-News was unable to reach Hawkins, and his attorney, Blair Clark, didn’t return phone calls Thursday.

He criticized “demagogues” who play on what he characterized as “unreasonable fears, such as the National Resources Defense Council that condemned the use of the ripening agent Alar on apples.

Others want to ban chemicals, period, he said.

“I’m going to make them quit,” Butz said. “Those guys are trying to put the worm back in my apple.”

Butz, who resigned in 1976 from a congressional reign as secretary of agriculture, challenged students at his lecture to conquer what he called the new frontier of agriculture.

“It’s a frontier of the mind. Of discovery,” he said. “It’s the frontier we’re going to use to meet this challenge.”

The world, with a population expanding by 1 billion people every decade, must feed its population with the same amount of land and the same amount of water it currently has, he said. Modern, capital-intensive and chemical-intensive agriculture is the answer, he said.

“We feed on science. We feed on technology,” he said. “But the challenge ahead is to do it even more efficiently.”

As agriculture secretary, Butz was a champion of the midsize, mixed-of-crops farming strictly as a business. He still is.

He even applauded the fact that a diminishing percentage of the U.S. population is on farms now.

A family farm is a farm big enough to support a family, he said. But the political definition, he said, “is a unit small enough to starve a family to death slowly.”

“We don’t have family farms today,” he said. “We have families with farms.”

The audience questioned Butz on a variety of issues, from government programs to foreign aid aimed at agriculture. Butz responded with answers applauding the marketplace.

“If agriculture in developing or poorer countries becomes as efficient as the United States, they will have more money to buy U.S. agriculture products such as meat and eggs, he said.

And government planning hurts farmers, because they can’t look into the future, he said.

“Government planning is essentially backward looking,” he said.

The lecture was sponsored by the College of Southern Idaho and the Twin Falls County Farm Bureau.

private industry.”

However, he said other members favored separating the pay raises of Congress and federal employees “for both philosophical and political reasons.”

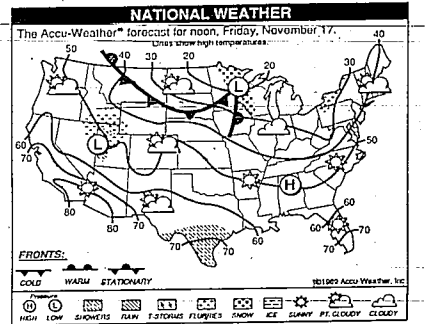

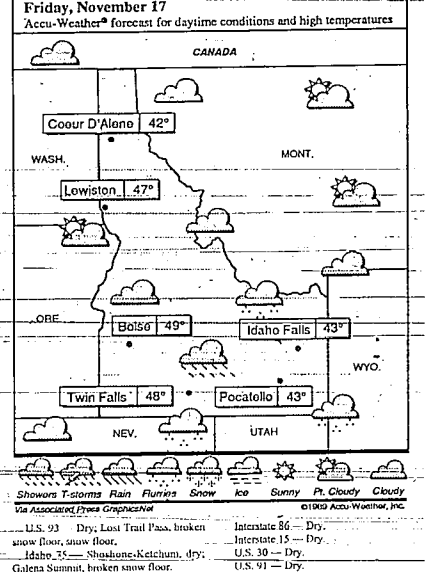

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Huntsville tornado kills 17, leaves hundreds homeless

HUNTSVILLE, Ala. (AP) — National Guardsmen stood watch against looting Thursday while work crews dug at the debris of a 250-mph tornado that struck virtually without warning, leaving 17 people dead and about 1,000 homeless.

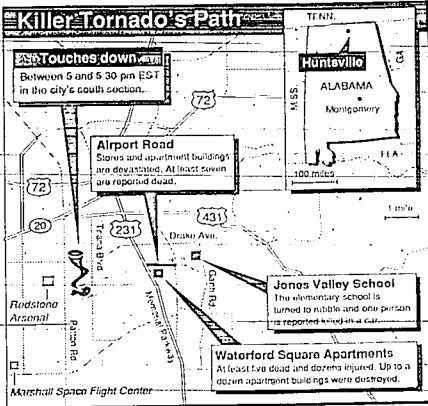
No bodies were believed left in the rubble, but portions of the city resembled a bombing target. A shopping center and clusters of apartment buildings were leveled. Cars were piled atop each other. Utility poles had been snapped like twigs.

The National Weather Service said the tornado path had covered between eight and 10 miles and that its wind speeds were as high as 250 mph.

"It's like taking six to 10 city blocks and putting them in a blender and putting it on liquefy," said rescue worker Holt C. Hays.

The storm system that struck Huntsville — a violent clash of unusually warm and cold air — continued its march north on Thursday, leaving seven schoolchildren dead in Newburgh, N.Y., collapsing homes in New Jersey and shattering skyscraper windows in Philadelphia.

A truck driver died when his tractor-trailer overturned in high winds on a bridge connecting Elizabeth, N.J., and New York City. A New York City woman died after being hit by a steel beam blown off

Tornadoes were reported Wednesday in Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia, South Carolina, North Carolina, Kentucky and Indiana. Altogether, the storms were blamed for at least 26 deaths and more than 500 injuries over the two

days. In West Virginia, high winds believed to be tornadoes swept Jefferson County, near Louisville, Ky., early Thursday, injuring four members of one family; two seriously.

In Alabama, Gov. Roy Hunt said he would ask President Bush to open the door to millions of dollars in federal relief. Mayor Steve Hettinger said no firm damage estimates were expected until Friday, but he put the number of homeless at 1,000.

Hunt assigned nearly 200 Guardsmen to assist in the cleanup and help law officers guard against looting. Police spokeswoman Susan Williamson said there had been minor looting the night of the storm but no arrests.

The temperature, which had risen to 73 before the storm Wednesday, plunged into the 30s early Thursday while rescuers worked through the night under the glare of floodlights.

The lights, powered by generators, produced an eerie glow in an area that was otherwise largely without power. Tall cranes lifted the heavy rubble, while workers with flashlights picked through the smaller pieces.

As daybreak came, people began returning to the scene, some to look for valuables in ravaged cars or businesses, others simply out of curiosity. Many carried cameras or videocassette recorders.

Police Maj. Robert Muder said there was no indication that anyone was left in the rubble.

"We don't have any reports of people missing," he said Thursday morning.

Muder said 463 people were injured and more than 150 of those

required at least overnight hospital treatment. Authorities had said 19 people were killed but later lowered the death toll by two.

All but one of the victims, who ranged in age from 7 to 67, were killed along Airport Boulevard, a busy thoroughfare that seemed to be a guide for the tornado's on-tedeadly march.

The other victim perished on the city's outskirts, authorities said.

Most of the dead were in apartments and stores that were torn into twisted wreckage, or in cars blown off the pavement.

Two schools that were in the swifter's path sustained heavy damage.

In one, Jones Valley Elementary, about 30 pupils in extended hours programs or kindergarten-level day care huddled in fear. Six children were injured.

School wall collapses in deadly storm, killing 7 students, injuring 18 others

NEWBURGH, N.Y. (AP) — A glass wall blew in on a school cafeteria during a severe thunderstorm Thursday, killing seven children and injuring 18, authorities said.

"It was a very quiet thing and there wasn't anything anybody could do about it because it happened all at once," said Mayor Donald Presutti.

Rescue workers dug through the debris with a backhoe at East Coldenham Elementary School. State Trooper Robert Gillespie could not say whether more victims were believed to be in the rubble.

It was not known how many students were in the cafeteria when the storm came in a wall of windows during lunch.

The storm system was the same one that moved through the South

on Wednesday, spinning off tornadoes that killed 17 people in Alabama.

State Police and survivors said they believed the school was hit by a tornado, but the National Weather Service said it could not confirm that until investigators went to the scene.

Faye Goldstein, a district spokeswoman, put the number of dead at seven and said 18 other students were injured and taken to four hospitals. Their conditions were not immediately known.

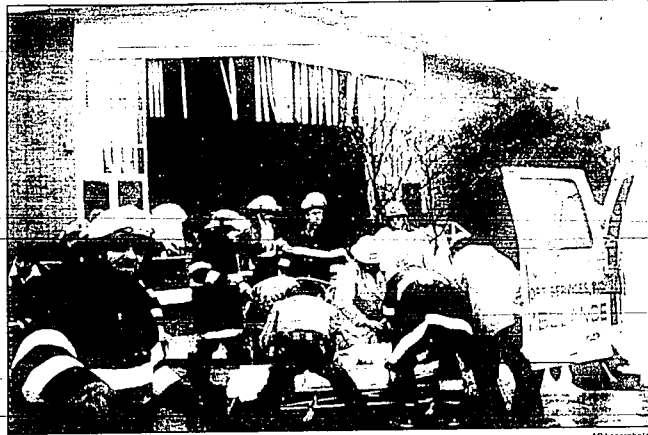
"There are a lot of broken legs, broken ankles, arms, some head contusions, various other traumas to the body," the mayor said. "The wall

was blown down and they were in having lunch. It was right during lunch time."

"I saw a tornado come and I saw everything flying down," said one youngster, Brian Schwartz. "It looked like a tornado. All kinds of glass fell down and these little things, papers that were hanging on the windows, came down. I didn't even look back."

A nearby resident said he helped firefighters pull bricks and other rubble off children.

"The second kid that in my arm, he wanted to go to his mom, and he was crying," Vincent Sisko said. "Utility workers clocked winds at 58 mph in the Newburgh area."

Bush seals lips on anti-Noriega operation

HOUSTON (AP) — President Bush on Thursday brushed aside questions about a newspaper report that the CIA has launched a \$3 million operation to overthrow Panamanian Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega.

"If there were a covert operation, would I discuss it ever? It wouldn't be covert if I ever referred to it," Bush told reporters traveling with him on Air Force One.

Bush flew to Houston to serve as an honorary pallbearer at the funeral of C. Fred Chambers, a former oil field business associate and friend of more than four decades.

As for Noriega, The Los Angeles Times reported Friday that a CIA operation against the Panamanian leader was being undertaken with the approval of congressional oversight committees.

Bush would not be drawn into discussing the story.

"There will be no such discussion of anything, which means I am not confirming nor denying," Bush said. In Washington, Vice President Dan Quayle also declined to comment directly on the report. But when asked if it was proper for the United States to try to get involved in an effort to oust Noriega, he replied:

"It's certainly proper for the United States to state the policy very clearly, and that policy is that the sooner Noriega leaves power, the better off the people of Panama are going to be, the better off the people of Central America are going to be."

In regard to congressional involvement in any decision, he said, "The policy on Panama and other issues are very closely coordinated with the Congress. This president insists on consultation and he has gone out of his way to consult with Congress on this and other

operations." The newspaper said there was a covert operation against Noriega with no restrictions other than an order prohibiting Noriega's assassination. U.S. troops could be involved, the account said. "It is an unimpeded effort to try to topple Noriega," the Times quoted one unidentified source as saying. "We're going into it with the understanding that there may be loss of life, though the effort will be not to kill anyone."

The United States has been trying to oust Noriega since he was indicted on drug-trafficking charges in February 1988 by federal grand juries in Miami and Tampa, Fla.

The newspaper said the covert operation has been dubbed Panama 5 — a reference to past actions against Noriega. Critics have said the Bush administration did too little to help dislodge Panamanian

military officers during a failed Oct. 3 coup attempt.

In Texas, Bush attended a private hour-long funeral for Chambers of St. Michael's Catholic Church.

The two men met in the 1950s in the oil fields of Midland, Texas, where both were beginning oil-industry careers.

They continued the friendship in Houston through the 1960s and, as recently as June.

Television rapes, brutality now wear thin 'education' guise

In the past seven weeks, I have witnessed five women being beaten and raped. In the past couple of years, I have seen a dozen or more similar incidents.

I don't live in a particularly bad neighborhood. I just watch a lot of TV.

Sexploitation on television is nothing new. Nor are TV serials and after-school specials that deal with Difficult Subjects like rape and domestic violence.

In an unfortunate turn of events, these have become a staple of the made-for-TV movie ("The Burning Bed," starring Farrah Fawcett, has become a classic of this type).

These movies are often promoted as raising the interests of women, and many networks follow the broadcast with phone numbers of social service agencies, hot lines, and counseling groups.

Public-interest packaging aside, these movies are easily recognized for the ratings-craving TV fact they really are.

There is nothing wrong with trying to boost ratings, and it is certainly no sin to insult viewers' intelligence; it is quite another matter to bombard them with degrading and exploitative material.

There are a few TV "heroes" who recently The Wall Street Journal's Martha

Bayles and The Washington Post's Tom Shales — who have criticized this trend of sensationalizing rape, but the glut of movies on the subject continues.

There are two convincing pieces of evidence that the makers of these movies haven't the slightest interest in dealing with the issues, and have a very large interest in titillation:

- 1) The victim is always gorgeous. Since, in truth, many homely women are sexually assaulted, and most abused wives do not resemble Farrah Fawcett, one must assume that producers feel it will be more "pleasing" to watch a beautiful woman be beaten or raped.
- 2) The actual assault scene is usually slow and graphically — I am tempted to say too long — depicted. Scenes of apples, crows details have absolutely no bearing on the larger issues that are allegedly being addressed.

What are these purported Larger Issues? "Cry for Help," The Tracey Thurman Story (Oct. 2, NBC) professed to concern itself with the inadequacies of the police and legal

systems in dealing with domestic violence cases.

"Settle the Score" (Oct. 30, NBC) professed to expose the narrow-mindedness of rural America.

"When He's Not a Stranger" (Nov. 6, CBS) professed to examine the difficulties in prosecuting cases of acquaintance rape.

"Cross of Fire" (Nov. 5-6, NBC) professed to describe the rise and fall of the Ku-Klux-Klan.

"Cast the First Stone" (Nov. 13, NBC) professed to show how organized religion fosters sexual intolerance.

What were the most memorable aspects of these movies? "Cry for Help" showed numerous graphic assaults, culminating in a scene in which the ex-husband stabs his former wife, slits her throat, and kicks her savagely as she lies bleeding on the ground.

"Settle the Score," in which a woman is raped by — extra exploitative points here — her own brother, showed numerous flashbacks to the victim's struggle, with close-ups of her flailing hands, bound at the wrists with thick rope (the justification for this repetition probably being that rape victims continually re-live the horror).

"When He's Not a Stranger" showed a college football hero pin an attractive co-ed

to the bed; a close-up revealed him pulling down her panties and beginning to unzip his trousers.

Depicting such minor technical details can hardly serve an educational function, except perhaps for children who may be watching (nine o'clock isn't very late).

The two-part "Cross of Fire" used the Klan as a vague backdrop for a psychopath's repeated sexual assaults on a naive and virtuous heroine.

The details were spared: viewers learned exactly how much the victim bled on the bathroom floor and precisely where on her body she was bitten (as one would expect from a movie of this sort, pretty much everywhere).

"Cast the First Stone" (Nov. 13, NBC) derived its salaciousness not from a graphic depiction of the rape, but in the viewer's knowledge of the irrefutable purity of the victim: she had recently left a convent and was a self-proclaimed virgin (who unfortunately had a habit of picking up hitchhikers; thus revealing her virginity with regard to an entire genre of horror film as well).

What compounds the inherent offensiveness of these movies is the veneer

of public respectability they have managed to achieve in the media — as if to depict brutality in a realistic manner is, in and of itself, a public good.

There are real social and legal issues surrounding the abuse of women.

These issues are dealt with, competently and responsibly, in women's magazines.

The tremendous range of magazines ensures that articles on these subjects are read by women of all ages, races and economic groups.

As opposed to TV, these articles are reaching those who have a genuine need to know — as opposed to a prurient desire to watch —

To posit, for a fleeting moment, that any of these movies bears a useful public message, just what would that message be? That it is wrong to rape, brutalize or commit incest.

Is such a message really edifying? Are there really competing forces out there who are arguing the virtues of such behavior? Only in Hollywood, it would seem.

Pesticide proposals are ignoring the true risks

Back in 1958, Congress followed the urgings of Rep. James I. Delaney of New York and prohibited cancer-causing pesticides in processed food.

But a failure of government to apply the law to hundreds of pesticides that were already on or coming on the market left the public unprotected.

Now the Bush administration, in its pesticide proposal unveiled last month, has joined Rep. Henry A. Waxman, D-Calif., and Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., in calling for the repeal of the "Delaney Clause" in exchange for a misleading and ill-conceived "negligible-risk" standard concerning pesticide residues in food.

The differences in the safety standards of these proposals are a matter of nuance — all give the highly-politicized Environmental Protection Agency discretionary authority to allow pesticide residues at levels posing "acceptable" cancer risks, as determined by the highly questionable mathematical models and rubber numbers of risk assessment without adequate provisions for vulnerable groups such as children and the elderly.

The administration's "negligible risk" proposal allows one or more additional cancers per 100,000 people for one pesticide on one food item, equivalent to at least 35 excess cancers among the U.S. population. The Waxman-Kennedy proposal calls to allow one additional cancer per 1 million people.

Under the administration's proposal, and based on EPA's own estimates, residues of 60 carcinogenic pesticides on 30 foods would result in about 64,000 excess cancers a year, more than 10 percent of all current cancer deaths. However, both proposals ignore additional exposure to carcinogenic pesticides in water and air, other environmental and occupational carcinogens and other non-carcinogenic synergistic interactions from these multiple exposures. The proposal further:

ignores other toxic effects.

Worse, the Bush administration proposal would also deny states the right to set higher standards of protection than the federal government. State authority in this area serves as an important check on the federal branch, and in most cases precipitates belated and reluctant federal action.

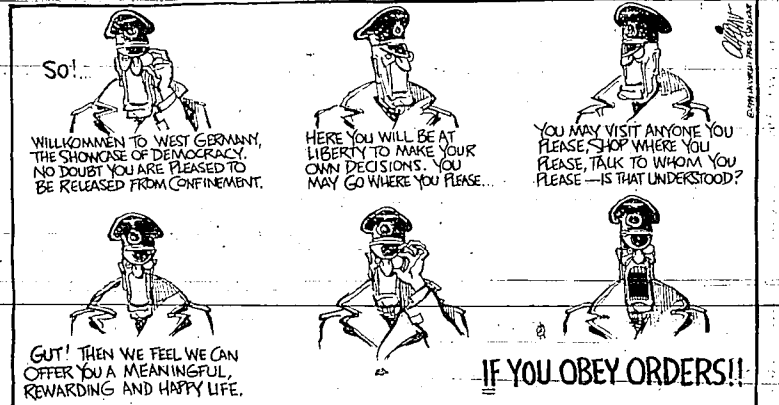
Florida acting on ethylene dibromide in 1983 and Massachusetts acting on Alar in 1986 served to draw national attention to issues on which the EPA has been dragging its feet for decades.

The administration plan gives more discretionary authority to federal agencies that have abused the public trust on safety issues. These agencies will then be free to fling upon the regulatory floodgates to "negligible risk" levels of innumerable carcinogens in food, water, air and the workplace, and thus contribute still further to the cancer epidemic now striking one in three and killing one in four Americans.

Consumers have already seen through this political short-termism. Sales of apples fell off dramatically when consumers became aware of Alar residues. Some stores have committed to shifting out of the sale of foods treated with cancer-causing pesticides.

It is the federal government that must now use its regulatory and enforcement powers to join in a major drive to rapidly phase out of use carcinogenic and toxic chemicals in pest management and the production of the nation's food.

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Lafayette Square means freedom

WASHINGTON — In a week when the Berlin Wall came tumbling down, an awesome display of mankind's yearning for freedom, it seems fitting to check in on Washington's premier symbol of democracy.

This title belongs not to the White House, not to the Capitol. Rather it goes to Lafayette Square, that graceful patch of green across Pennsylvania Avenue from the White House that for over a century has drawn the disaffected, the dispossessed and the obsessed — among others.

The bankers, business people and bureaucrats who eat lunch there on sunny days appear assiduously oblivious to the odoballs sharing the park with them.

But every now and then, someone tries to take in the larger picture.

Bruce Laigner, the charge d'affaires at the U.S. Embassy in Tehran who spent 444 days as a hostage, was sitting on a park bench Monday, eating his sandwich and reading his newspaper as he dazed about once a week.

He said he is moved by the proximity of powerful institutions, protesters who challenge them, organizations that try to influence them, and the sense of history.

"It's the freedom the park symbolizes," he said, explaining what draws him to the park. "I think anyone can fully appreciate freedom unless

he's been denied it."

Since then, it has been the people's forum, used in myriad ways, to influence what goes on across the street.

Elder statesman Bernard Baruch met with White House officials on one of its benches, now marked with a bronze plaque to the "Benefit of Inspiration."

The 1960s and 1980s brought tent cities to protest poverty and homelessness, Wednesday, the General Union of Palestine Students demonstrated there.

The Close-Up Foundation, which brings high school students here to see their government at work, shelters them in the square to meet protesters.

"We like to use it as a spot to talk about different forms of influencing government," said Jeffrey Gordon, a Close-Up leader. "From here we'll go up 16th Street to Lobbying Row — it's a way of showing what works and what doesn't."

Monday, the students drifted to a man who calls himself "Song," a former orphan at the White House between two plywood signs saying, "We need a clean-up. Not a build-up." "They, what are you protesting?" a jaunty teenage boy asked. "Hey, what should be protesting?" responded Song, in his Zen-like way.

Concepcion Picciotto, like Thomas, is undeterred. She has been there, witnessing for peace out and an injustice since 1981.

She wears a helmet, covered by a wig and scarf, because she says she has been harassed and beaten.

She hands out pacifist literature and small stones decorated with doves and the word "peace" in several languages.

"The other day, a man walked past her papers and yelled out, 'Don't let any of that trash get loose!'"

"Why don't you wake up?" she responded. "Missolini would never permit that," the man retorted.

"He means he would never permit freedom," Picciotto muttered.

Navy defends conclusion that troubled sailor caused Iowa blast

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy on Thursday defended its conclusion that a troubled seaman apparently caused the deadly blast aboard the USS Iowa during a firing test. The Navy's defense is being questioned by skeptical lawmakers there is "no other cause for this accident."

"We have excluded all other possibilities," Rear Adm. Richard Mulligan, who spearheaded the Navy's inquiry into the April 1989 explosion that killed 47 sailors, told the Senate Armed Services Committee.

"There is no other cause for this accident," he said.

According to the Navy's findings, gunner's mate Clayton Hartwig most likely caused the blast by inserting a detonator between the first and second bags of gunpowder rammed into the 16-inch gun.

"In all honesty, we looked for another possibility but we could not find one," said Mulligan, who used diagrams, a video and segments of the blasted projectile to make his case.

He described Hartwig as a "person of limited friendships, introverted, a loner," who was upset over the breakup of a friendship with another sailor.

But Sen. Alan Dixon, D-Ill., chief reporter that Hartwig spent several hours the night before the incident

discussing a possible transfer to London with another sailor, and was unaware he would be assigned to the gun turret until a few hours before the firing.

"It's a remarkable thing that the night before he was discussing a good time on leave," Dixon said, and "the next morning he was not listed (to work in the turret)."

"This is an extraordinary manipulation of events... I find it difficult to understand."

Earlier in the session, lawmakers questioned Adm. Carlisle A. H. Frost, the chief of naval operations, about his unprejudiced order on Tuesday requiring all Navy personnel to put aside their normal duties and conduct a safety evaluation.

The decision was prompted by a recent series of accidents that have hit the Navy since the Iowa incident. "There is no central thread, no commonality" among the accidents, said Frost, who cited mechanical failure, acts of God or problems with personnel as the likely causes of the accidents.

Not counting the Iowa explosion, the number of sailors killed during training or normal operations in 1989 is the lowest in five years, Frost said.

He said the accidents will have no

bearing on a possible decision to mothball four Iowa class battleships, but budget constraints may force the service to decommission the World War II-era gunships.

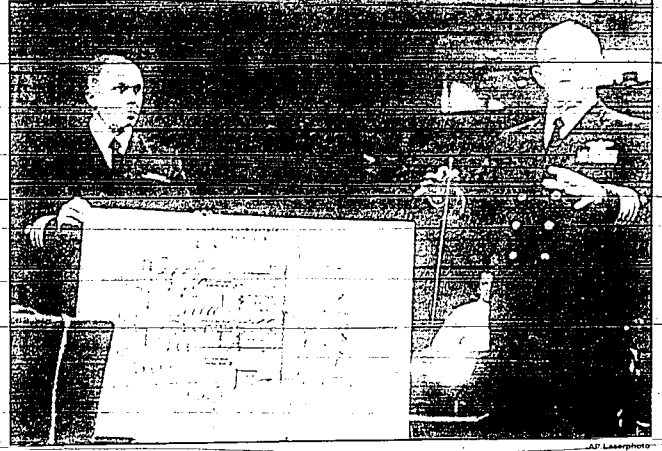
"Everything is up for grabs today as we face a smaller out-year budget," Frost said.

Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the panel, said the hearing, the first in a series, was held to determine "any kind of serious underlying problems" in light of the accidents and to evaluate the safety of the Iowa and sister battleships.

In testimony about the Iowa, Mulligan said additional technical tests conducted since he issued his report on Sept. 7 found "unique foreign material" on the projectile from the exploding gun barrel that would not have been present during a normal firing.

The next tests identified the material as iron wires coated with calcium, chlorine and oxygen, which would be produced by "some types of non-electronic explosive devices," Mulligan said in his statement.

"There was no mechanical or electric problem that could cause ignition," the rear admiral said, discounting theories that friction, a burning ember or the gun's electrical system caused the blast.

Walesa holds West liable for Poland

WASHINGTON (AP) — Solidarity leader Lech Walesa declared Thursday "the Iron Curtain is no more" but also said Poland's experiment in democracy fails for lack of economic support.

"If we do not succeed in evolution, a revolution may come," Walesa told a packed luncheon at the National Press Club before turning to the New York Times for the leg of his weeklong visit to the United States.

Lionized during four days in the nation's capital, Walesa met with President Bush, addressed a joint session of Congress and received the honors of U.S. senators. The president hailed him as "America's special guest" and Congress gave him repeated standing ovations.

He also found time to tape a 30-second commercial for the AFL-CIO's "Union Yes" advertising campaign. In the ad he speaks in Polish, through a translator, until the end when he grins, switches to English and gives the "Union Yes" slogan.

The taping took about 90 minutes, partly because Walesa had such trouble pronouncing "union."

At the press club, Walesa repeated his call for Americans to invest in Poland to protect the fragile beginnings of democracy. Walesa said he would not be to blame if the peaceful evolution degenerates into chaos.

"I will defend myself and ... my defense will be as follows: 'We have done everything. We have fulfilled all your conditions and we have stretched out our hands. But there was no other hand to take it.'

Animated despite his hectic schedule, the Solidarity leader conferred with his press club audience and said Polish reforms so far represent "a beautiful house of cards" that will not survive without "economic concrete."

"The Iron Curtain is no more," declared Walesa, an embassy for the "East bloc's" first non-communist led government.

"We have fought and we have won. But the victory is mostly a theoretical victory. I call it a beautiful house of cards."

 - Nov. 14** Fire breaks out on the USS Incheon, an amphibious assault ship undergoing maintenance at the shipyard in Norfolk, Va., headquarters of the Atlantic Fleet.
 - Nov. 14** An F-14 crashes into the Gulf of Mexico 60 miles northwest of Key West, Fla. The two-man crew bail out and are not seriously injured. At the same time, a technician at the Naval Surface Warfare Testing Center in White Oak, Md., is slightly injured when two grams of an experimental explosive detonates in a laboratory.

Sailors swamped on safety day

NORFOLK, Va. (AP) — A Navy boat with 10 sailors aboard was swamped as it returned to base Thursday to take part in an unprecedented, two-day "stand down" that had sailors around the world brushing up on safety.

In Navy wardrooms and engine compartments, flight decks and hangars, crews were busy in lectures and training. The Navy ordered the halt to normal operations Tuesday after a rash of 10 accidents over the last three weeks killed 10 people and injured at least 71.

The 36-toot Navy Seafox was swamped in stormy weather on the nearby York River and headed for Cheatham Annex near Williamsburg. The 10 sailors aboard the Seafox were picked up by a Virginia Institute of Marine Science vessel that was in the area, said Lt. Cmdr. Steve Bunker, an Atlantic Fleet spokesman in Norfolk. None were injured.

A Seafox is a twin-engine boat designed for special warfare operations.

A second Seafox is towed to float even when flooded, said Burnitt. They were roomed from training in Maryland.

"At no time was it a life threatening situation," he said.

Meanwhile, aboard the guided missile cruiser USS Josephus Daniels docked at the Norfolk Naval Station, Petty Officer Mike Ballard instructed seamen in damage control.

Again and again, Ballard walked sailors through the proper way to wear firefighting equipment and the necessary checks for each safety device.

Every sailor is trained in damage control, according to Lt. J.g. Paul Ward, the ship's assistant damage control officer. He said the ships runs a daily fire or rescue drill. Ward

saw the stand-down as a good way to stress safety to all hands.

"Our job is to carry out our mission while sustaining damage. Everyone here has to be a capable firefighter. When there is a fire on board, you can't just run away ... There is nowhere to run," Ward said.

Throughout the ship, sailors gathered in compartments for talks about electrical safety, fire aid and weapons handling.

While sailors were going to school aboard the Daniels, 30 miles away at the Oceana Naval Air Station the pilots of Squadron VF-11 were at their ready room paying over data on the flight performance of the F-14 Tomcat.

The squadron already had been scheduled for a safety inspection Friday by the Naval Safety Center, so the stand-down did not affect the flight schedule. One pilot characterized the exercise as a "two-day stand-around."

IBM investigated for sales

WASHINGTON (AP) — The General Services Administration is investigating International Business Machines Corp.'s sale to the government of used computer equipment marked as new, GSA officials said Thursday.

IBM says it told the GSA about the problems two years ago.

The investigation by the agency's inspector general is also trying to determine if IBM violated the Buy American Act by incorrectly certifying that more than half the components of some products it sold

the government were made in America.

Audits of three computer contracts, each worth \$700 million to \$800 million a year, are being conducted by the inspector general of GSA, officials told the House Government Operations national security subcommittee.

"It appears that IBM has violated the terms of its contracts with the government and may have violated federal law," Assistant Inspector General Edward F. Flefferon told the subcommittee.

Disability study sparks debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lawmakers questioned eligibility for the nation's \$19-billion-a-year disability insurance program Thursday, after a congressional study found that many people being rejected are often in bad shape as they receive benefits.

More than half of a sample of applicants denied benefits under the Social Security Disability Insurance Program are not working, 80 percent perceive their health as fair to poor, and 61 percent had total family income below the Census Bureau's poverty level, according to the General Accounting Office study.

Among those rejected, according to a supplement to the study prepared by the Senate Special Committee on Aging, was a man (identified when asked) fell on him during a welding accident in 1979.

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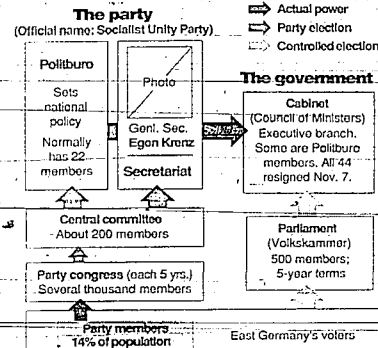

E. German amazed at speed of changes

East Berlin — Andreas M., an East German University functionary, remains excitedly happy and utterly amazed at the government relaxed travel restrictions on its citizens. East Berlin has become something between a way-station on a historic pilgrimage and the newest hot spot on the tourist circuit. Andreas sits in the cafe of the Hotel Unter den Linden, rocking back forth in his plush seat and smiling and marveling at the group seated with him: a farmer from Morse Bluff, Neb., an arts student from Cleveland; two law students from the Free University of West Berlin; and a reporter from Baltimore. "I don't believe it," Andreas says. "It's impossible. We are sitting here together in the same city." They had met a quarter-mile west at the Brandenburg Gate, where people wait on both sides of the Berlin Wall for the opening of the

most symbolic passage between East and West.

The opening of the Brandenburg Gate, which seems imminent, will mark the real end of the Berlin Wall and signal the unity of the German people.

"I see it as the end of World War II," says Tom Hruza, the farmer from Morse Bluff. So do many Germans.

"I grow row crops back home," Hruza says, "soybeans and corn." He has traveled widely in East Europe. He's sort of an amateur historian of the East bloc. "The mental changes here in the East are profound," he says. "The first time I was in Russia — six years ago — people wouldn't speak to you."

Now he's having a beer in the capital of what only last week had seemed one of the most rigid countries in the East.

A little earlier, looking west toward the Brandenburg Gate, Hruza had said, "The implications of the split are tragic. The wall is a tragedy."

WEST BERLIN (AP) — The East German leadership agreed Thursday to give more than one-third of the seats in the new Cabinet to non-Communists, who now have only four, sources involved in the negotiations reported.

Sources in the Liberal Democrats, one of four small parties that have been allied with the Communists, said Premier Hans Modrow would reduce the Cabinet from 44 members to 26 or 27, and assign at least 11 ministries to non-Communists.

Chancellor Helmut Kohl of West Germany said people of East Germany must decide on German reunification, but the top Kremlin adviser on German affairs ruled it out.

Nikolai Portugalov said in an interview with the Soviet news agency Novosti there will be two German states "for the foreseeable future and also in the long term."

Mass emigration and pro-democracy protest have created great pressure for reform in East Germany. The Liberal Democrats have said they will ask Parliament on Friday to eliminate the constitutional provision of a "leading role" that guarantees supremacy to the Communist Party.

Liberal Democrat Party chief Egon Krenz had agreed to support a Cabinet with more than one-third of the seats held by non-Communists.

That would allow the ruling party to retain its dominant role while appearing to respond to demands for more democracy. Previous governments have dutifully carried

out the wishes of the ruling Politburo.

Non-Communists in the Cabinet still are likely to share many of the party's views, which leaves little hope that the demands of New Forum and other unofficial political groups will be addressed. New Forum and the others have pressed for legal status and inclusion in government affairs, and are not expected to settle for mere redistribution among existing political groups.

Manfred Gerlach, leader of the Liberal Democrats, said he would urge other parliament deputies Friday to vote for removal of the "leading role" language from the constitutional, which could open the way to a multiparty system.

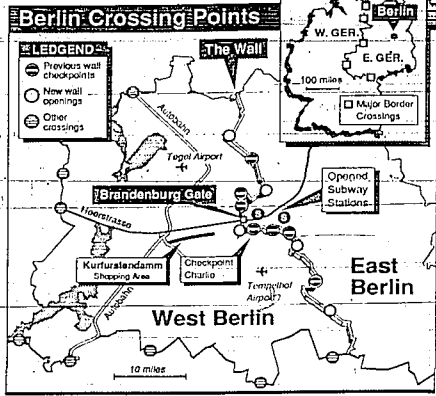
Gerlach's party and the other three small allies of the Communists were formed to give an impression of variety in East German politics, but the Liberal Democrats have grown more independent during the recent turmoil.

In a report on the coalition talks with Krenz, the official news agency ADN said the government planned to name a committee of activists from several groups to propose democratic changes.

It added, however, that proposed reforms would be considered "at several parliament sessions," indicating significant action could not be expected soon.

Kohl addressed the West German parliament in Bonn for the first time since East Germany lifted travel restrictions on its citizens a week ago and opened the Berlin Wall.

He said East Germans "must be able to decide for themselves which



path they want to follow in the future. They know best what they want. That pertains also to German unity, to the question of reunification."

A report of the speech on East German state television emphasized Kohl's conciliatory remarks, including an offer of humanitarian aid and the statement that "no one should force anything" on East Germany.

Foreign Secretary Douglas Hurd visited West Berlin on Thursday and toured the wall in the British sector of the divided city. He said

Kohl: E. Germans must settle reunification issue

BONN, West Germany (AP) — Describing socialism as a "total failure," Chancellor Helmut Kohl said Thursday the East Germans must decide for themselves whether to unite with West Germany.

The Soviet Union is firmly opposed to German reunification, and some Western countries are nervous about the idea. Kohl said he would respect every decision made by the people of the German Democratic Republic (East Germany) in free self-determination.

He said West Germany's call for sweeping economic reform in East Germany was not an example of meddling, but a recognition of disastrous results from communist rule.

"We don't want to impose our ideas on anyone," he said. "But no one can seriously dispute that socialism has proven itself to be a total failure. Everywhere in the world, not just in the GDR (East Germany), it has failed."

the opening of the Communist country's borders and a series of other reforms.

Michael S. Gorbatchev insists that sweeping changes in the Communist world are not an admission that socialism was a mistake. The Soviet president also has warned the West not to gloat over what would seem like its victory in the Cold War.

Gerbachyev on Wednesday said talk about reunification "would mean interference in the affairs" of

East Germany and West Germany. On Thursday, Soviet Central Committee adviser Nikolai Portugalov said reunification won't happen even in the long-term future.

"Reunification in the form in which certain nationalists in the Federal Republic (West Germany) envision it doesn't fit in the concept of the German states, neither East or West," Portugalov told the Soviet news agency Novosti.

"Therefore I think that for the foreseeable future two German states will exist as sovereign and equal."

Bulgaria ousts 3 'old guards' in liberal move

SOFIA, Bulgaria (AP) — The Communist Party on Wednesday ousted the ruling Politburo, ousting three old guard members and replacing them with liberal communists likely to back new leader Petar Mladenov.

The one-day session of the party's policy-making Central Committee was called less than a week after party leader Todor Zhivkov was removed after 35 years in power.

Zhivkov, one of the Soviet bloc's most rigid leaders, resigned Nov. 10 and was replaced by Mladenov, 53, the former foreign minister who is considered more open to reform.

The Central Committee ousted three members of the 10-member Politburo with close ties to Zhivkov and named four new members. One of the seats filled was the one held by Zhivkov.

The committee also accepted a proposal that Mladenov be nominated to replace Zhivkov as head of state.

Removal from office was Politburo member Milko Balev, 69, a close associate of Zhivkov who for many years was his private secretary. Also ousted was Dimitar Stoyanov, 61, a former interior minister.

Western analysts speaking on condition of anonymity said Stoyanov was associated with the widely condemned forced assimilation of the 1.5 million-member Turkish minority.

Also removed was Grisha Filipov, 70, a former prime minister who was responsible for economic policy.

Balev, Stoyanov and Filipov were also expelled from the Central Committee.

Peika Danchev, a non-voting member of the Politburo who was also ousted, BTA reported.

The new Politburo members are the current foreign trade minister, Andrei Lukanov, 51, who is considered a liberal.

The others promoted to the ruling body were Natcho Papazov, Panтели Pachov and Mincho Yovchev.

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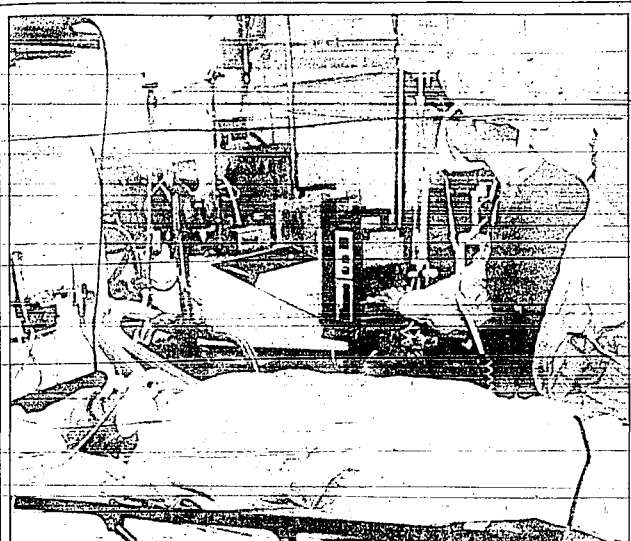
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A nurse attends Hanna Khader, a Palestinian man who received a heart from an Israeli soldier.

Israeli heart donation transcends Middle East strife

JERUSALEM (AP) — The heart of an Israeli soldier ambushed and killed by Arab guerrillas was sewn into the chest of a Palestinian on Thursday, a gift of life that family members said transcends the bitter war between Arab and Jew.

Hanna Khader, 54, a former hotel manager from Israeli-annexed east Jerusalem, was recovering in stable condition in the intensive care ward at Hadassah medical center. Khader's family said. "God, I don't really know what to say," said his daughter, Jamilla. "We thank the family that agreed to give the heart to a human being without looking if he were an Arab or a Jew."

Khader's wife, Mary, said: "I can't tell you how happy I am. He's a human being and there is no difference between a Palestinian and an Israeli in such cases."

Jamilla told Israeli radio the family learned from the media that her father's heart donor was a slain Israeli soldier.

She indicated her family had some concern that they could be targeted by Palestinian or Islamic radicals for accepting an Israeli's heart, but said, "In such cases we can not mix politics with medicine. I hope that the events (in the occupied territories) will end and everything will return to normal," she added.

The heart was removed from Sgt. Zeev Traum, 40, after he died Wednesday night of a head wound suffered after Palestinian guerrillas raked his patrol with machine-gun fire during an ambush Monday. Israeli radio said. A second soldier also was killed.

Traum, an army reservist and father of four, was the 42nd Israeli to die in the violence of the 23-month Palestinian uprising against Israeli rule. At least 615 Palestinians have been killed by Israeli

troops or civilians in the bloodshed. Another 146 Palestinians were slain because they were suspected of collaborating with Israeli authorities.

The family "agreed immediately to make the donation simply out of pure generosity, but they are in mourning and don't want to talk about it," an Israeli official said.

Hadassah hospital took the unusual step of asking doctors and spokesmen not to comment on the transplant. Israeli radio said, apparently because of the operation's sensitive political nature.

An official at Meshay Yodfat, a small collective farm where Traum raised flowers for export, said the family is refusing to comment on the transplant.

Israel radio said Traum's condition began deteriorating rapidly Tuesday night and doctors asked the family to agree to donate his heart to one of dozens of Israelis and Arabs waiting for a transplant.

The family agreed and Khader was chosen as a recipient because his body tissue closely matched that of Traum.

"The heart was flown in as a special ice chest by an Israeli military helicopter from Soroka hospital in Beer Sheva to Jerusalem's Hadassah hospital at midnight Wednesday night and the 4-hour transplant was immediately performed.

It was the ninth heart transplant performed in Israel but the first known case since the uprising began of an Israeli donating an organ to a Palestinian.

Germans return to reform-minded East

EAST-BERLIN (AP) — Diethard Wietsche has gone back to East Germany, where he says he spent 10 years in prison for trying to escape, because he is disappointed with life in the capitalist West.

He says he now has hope for promised changes in his Communist homeland.

Wietsche was one of about 60 East Germans who had arrived by Wednesday at the East Berlin center where the government welcomes back prodigal sons and daughters.

"Every day about 30 people knock on the door here and ask to re-enter the German Democratic Republic," said Peter Heyn, deputy chief of the center in Berlin's northeastern Buch district. "The climate in the Federal Republic (West Germany) has gotten colder."

He predicted the center soon would reach its capacity of 150 people.

It is not clear how many of the East Germans who fled to West Germany this year might return home now that Communist leaders in East Berlin have opened the borders to free travel and promised a more open society.

About 200,000 East Germans, most of them young and skilled, had emigrated to their rich western neighbor this year before the authorities buckled under the pressure of a peaceful popular revolt and threw open their borders.

West Germany's ZDF television network said Wednesday about 7,000 disillusioned East Germans were expected to turn their backs on their rich neighbor, but officials on both sides of the border said there

were no signs of a major organized return for the time being. ZDF gave no source for its report.

An air of old-style secrecy surrounded the East Berlin government returnee center, East Germany's only one until the national Red Cross started setting up several of its own this week.

Moldavian party chief replaced, criticized for slowing reforms

MOSCOW (AP) — Moldavia's Communist Party chief was removed Thursday after activists criticized him for slowing reforms in his republic, wracked by ethnically motivated strikes, clashes and demonstrations.

The republic's policy-making Central Committee "relieved" Senyon K. Grossu as its first secretary because of a transfer to another job, Tass said. It did not identify his new post, but the director of the republic's official news agency said Grossu would work in Moscow in a yet-to-be determined job.

Grossu's replacement is Pyotr Luchinsky, 49, who has been official in the republic in the republic of Tadzhikistan, Tass reported. Like Grossu, Luchinsky is an ethnic Moldavian.

Moldavia is one of the many ethnic trouble spots in the Soviet Union, where the population is clamoring for more control over its culture, economy and politics, and is running into opposition from ethnic minorities led by Russians.

The Tass report did not hint the Moldavian party was unhappy with Grossu, but activists on Sunday began circulating a petition demanding removal of conservatives among the republic's top officials.

Grossu and three of his deputies were on the list because he was an "inactive arch-conservative" blamed for economic, ecological and political problems, said Konstantin Bogdanov, a spokesman for the grassroots group People's Front that organized the petition drive.

The People's Front began the campaign after a Nov. 10 brawl between police and protesters that left almost 200 people injured. The

Five charged in conspiracy to sell banned goods

WASHINGTON (AP) — Three South Africans and two Americans were indicted Thursday for allegedly conspiring to export \$50 million worth of U.S. missile-guidance equipment to South Africa through Israel.

The five were charged as part of an ongoing Customs Service undercover operation in which agents pose as arms brokers in an attempt to stop the illegal export of high-technology items and military

hardware from the United States.

The missile-guidance devices, consisting of gyroscopes manufactured by Northrop Corp., were destined for Armscor, the South African national arms company, according to the indictment. They were to be used in the production of missiles designed to knock out the Soviet T-800 battle tank.

The defendants told customs agents their work was approved by

South African government officials, according to an affidavit filed by a customs agent in the case.

The conspirators had supplied material to the South Africans in the past and the South African government is "going to have a lot of business flowing our way," one of the conspirators, Frank Randazzo of Virginia, told the undercover agents, according to the affidavit.

Iran-Iraq peace talk efforts fail

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — A U.N. envoy said Thursday the latest effort to revive peace talks between Iran and Iraq have failed.

In a statement issued by the United Nations in Baghdad, Swedish diplomat Jan Eliasson said he has ended his 17-day round of negotiations.

Eliasson said that during his shuttle between Tehran and Baghdad, which included 12 meetings with officials of both countries, he focused on how to implement a U.N. resolution outlining a permanent peace accord.

"In the course of my talks with the representatives of both governments, I suggested ways to move the talks forward within the framework of (U.N. Resolution 598) in order to achieve a comprehensive and lasting peace in the region," he said.

De Klerk opens beaches, vows end to segregation of facilities

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — President F. W. de Klerk on Thursday declared all beaches open to blacks, and he promised that the law allowing racial segregation of public facilities would be repealed as soon as possible.

"There is no alternative for South Africa but the road of reconciliation, of creating opportunities for all the people of this country in a way which is fair, just and equitable," he said.

"The time has arrived to repeal this act," he said, referring to the Separate Amenities Act which his National Party put into law in 1953, allowing white local governments

to force the country to bar blacks from parks, libraries, swimming pools, civic centers, buses and public toilets.

The act cannot be repealed formally until Parliament reconvenes Feb. 2. De Klerk's declaration "that all beaches will henceforth be accessible to all members of the public" also requires action by municipal and provincial authorities.

In many communities, most or all public amenities are open to all races, but whites-only facilities persist—in the capital, Pretoria, in many rural towns, and in several small industrial cities where the far-right Conservative Party took power in municipal elections last year.

The proposed repeal of the Separate Amenities Act "is the beginning of the end of a separate ethnic community life," said Koos van der Merwe, chief spokesman for the Conservative Party, who urged whites to oppose de Klerk.

Mr. de Klerk is placing South Africa on the road of a totally racially mixed South Africa, which will inevitably be governed by a black majority.

The repeal would still leave major areas of segregation in South Africa — residential neighborhoods, medical care and public education. It also would leave intact the political system that gives the 5 million whites domination over the 32 million blacks, Asians and people of mixed-race.

De Klerk, who took office in August, said his announced goal was "in line with our stated goal to eliminate discrimination."

They were the latest in a series of moves aimed at enhancing the prospects for black-white negotiations on a new constitution that would extend political rights to blacks while protecting white interests.

The government is in the process of designating certain neighborhoods as multiracial, although it says whites will retain the option of living in segregated areas.

De Klerk has given no signal that public schools and hospitals will be integrated, nor hinted at repeal of the Population Registration Act, which officially classifies all South Africans by race.

"For the white group, clinging to power means accepting the risk of — more than that, of facing — a revolution," de Klerk warned.

Italian train collision claims at least 12 lives

CROTONE, Italy (AP) — Two passenger trains collided head-on in southern Italy today and police said at least 12 people were killed.

Hospital officials said 31 other people were injured and feared more victims could be buried under the wreckage of one of the cars.

The crash between the two local trains occurred just south of the town of Crotona, a coastal city in the southern tip of the Italian peninsula. The cause was not immediately known and the state-run railroad opened an investigation.

First reports said one of the trains had just departed the Crotona station headed to Catanzaro.

Police initially reported 15 people were killed but Pino Pugliese, president of the state health agency in Crotona, said there were 12 dead — nine women and three men.

Trains on this run are normally crowded during the lunch hour because schools and many offices are only open in the morning. Casualties were believed to have included school teachers and possibly some students.

American, West Germans safe; terrorist claim exposed as hoax

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — An American woman and two West German friends were reported safe Thursday, the day after a previously unknown group claimed to have kidnapped them.

Police said they had not been abducted.

Deborah Fahrend, 54, of San Francisco; Mounir Shamseddin Sami, 39, a naturalized West German born in Lebanon, and Sami's 7-year-old son, Daniel, born in Berlin, were in Jounieh, a Christian port north of Beirut.

A police spokesman, whose name cannot be revealed because of regulations, said the case "involved a robbery report."

"We are investigating to find out what whether they were robbed or their passports were just stolen," he said, and refused to elaborate.

A statement Wednesday claimed a group called The Organization of Just Revenge kidnapped the three "because of their activities in Lebanon." The 30-word typewritten statement in Arabic was put in the mailbox of a West German news agency along with photocopies of their passports and visas.

Both the police spokesman and Wolfgang Gottelmann, the West German ambassador, said Ms. Fahrend and the Samis were in good health and planned to leave by sea for Larnaca, Cyprus, when weather permitted. They would not say where the three were staying in Jounieh.

The U.S. Embassy in Beirut has been closed since Sept. 22.

Gottelmann said by telephone:

"They are free. They presented themselves this morning at the consular section of the embassy after they had read the reports. They had not been robbed. They were already back in east Beirut to return to Cyprus when the claim was issued. They had come to Lebanon to see the man's family."

"The American lady was a friend of the family," the ambassador said. "They cannot explain how this happened. I doubted this thing from the beginning."

A Sami family source, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the three telephoned from the West German Embassy in east Beirut to say they were fine.

According to the relative, Mounir Sami said they were "robbed by gunmen" but "he didn't say where they were robbed. It seems to me who robbed them also took their

passports, photocopied them and issued the claim hoping to make some money."

The photocopies showed they arrived in Jounieh by sea from Larnaca on Nov. 3.

JONESBORO, Ark. (AP) — Debbye Turner says her biggest surprise after becoming Miss America was how little it changed her.

"I always had this image of Miss America being superhuman," she said. "She was bigger than life and perfect. ... But what I found is, I'm still just Debbye. Being Debbye was enough to win the title and has been enough to carry the title."

Miss Turner, 24, returned to Jonesboro, where she grew up, for a two-day celebration that ended Thursday.

The events in Jonesboro marked Miss Turner's second homecoming since her crowning two months ago. Last month, she was honored in her adopted town of Mexico, Mo., where she lived while attending the University of Missouri-Columbia Veterinary School of Medicine.

Although she entered the Miss America pageant as Miss Missouri, Miss Turner said Wednesday that Jonesboro is home.

MADRID, Spain (AP) — Paraguayan author Augusto Roa Bastos on Thursday won the Cervantes Prize, popularly known as the Nobel for literature in the Spanish language.

The 72-year-old author is best known for his 1974 historical novel "I, The Chief," about the 19th century Paraguayan dictator Jose Gaspar Rodriguez de Francia.

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Bishop denies pro-choicer communion

SAN DIEGO (AP) — A state assemblywoman has been barred from receiving Communion in the Roman Catholic Church because of her pro-choice stand on abortion in her campaign for the state Senate.

Assemblywoman Lucy Killea was notified Wednesday of Bishop Leo T. Maher's order that she refrain from receiving Communion until she rescinds her advocacy of abortion rights, which she says she will not do.

Maher's action is the first such sanction imposed on a Roman Catholic elected official in the United States over the abortion issue, said Frances Kissling, who heads the Washington-based Catholics for a Free Choice.

Killea, a Democrat from San Diego, said she would abide by the order and not take Communion, but will continue attending Mass. She suggested Maher overstepped his authority, saying his letter was "a little uncalled-for."

"He's telling me as a public official what I should be doing," she said. "I'll accept his restrictions if he can tell me what to do in terms of my religious practices."

However, she said the directive will not affect her view on abortion, adding that she came to it "after a lot of thought."

"Of course, I know (Maher) doesn't approve of my position, but I was startled by the rather drastic measures."

Killea noted that nationally prominent Catholic political figures who do not take Communion as she does on abortion rights never have been disciplined by the church.

"Mario Cuomo hasn't had this problem, nor has Ted Kennedy."

The right of women to obtain an abortion has become a central issue in Killea's campaign against Republican Assemblywoman Carol Bentley to represent the 39th Senatorial District. The special election, to replace a senator who was appointed a judge, is set for Dec. 5.

Maher's order was prompted by Killea campaign commercials highlighting the differences between her and Bentley's position on abortion. The television commercials were first broadcast Tuesday.

In his letter, Maher said Killea's advertisements and statements place her "in complete contradiction to the moral teachings of the Catholic Church."

"Consequently, I have no other choice but to deny you the right to receive the Eucharist," he wrote.

Killea consistently has voted for abortion rights legislation since her 1982 election to the state Assembly, but has not been particularly outspoken on the subject until the current campaign.

The sanction against Killea is the first salvo in an intensified anti-abortion campaign agreed to by Catholic bishops at a meeting in Baltimore last week, Kissling said.

"The bishops have been sorely stung by the large number of Catholic politicians who not only disagree with them on the question of abortion," she said. "And, as is typical, they have chosen to make their first example a woman."

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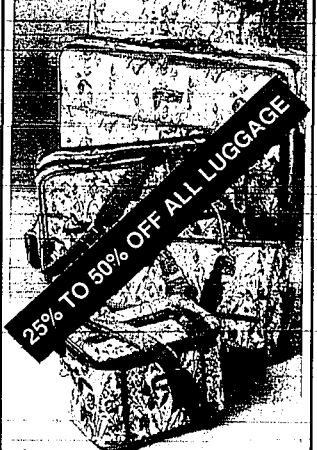

Solomon bound over on felony charges

TWIN FALLS — Naturopath James Solomon should stand trial on felony charges, a judge ruled Thursday.

At the end of a preliminary hearing, 5th District Magistrate Judge R. Michael Redman determined there was enough evidence to send Solomon's case to District Court for trial.

Asked to comment afterward, Solomon said, "Not guilty."

The evidence presented at the preliminary hearing, he said, "is in my favor."

Solomon, 62, faces two felony counts of grand theft by false pretenses and deception. Prosecutors allege he charged patients for useless treatments for cancer and other diseases.

He also is charged with two misdemeanor counts of practicing medicine without a license.

In testimony Thursday, a former patient and employee of Solomon's said that he twice treated her for cancer, but now she doesn't believe she ever had the disease.

Nadine Tolman, who worked for Solomon from May 1987 to August 1989, also testified she recently began to doubt

Defense lawyer Tom Clark of Lewiston asked that everyone involved in the case, including attorneys, be

A potential witness, Arnetta Boyd, received a telephone call Wednesday night from someone who purported to be Randall Everett, the state's chief investigator in the Solomon case, Clark

In the past year, Tolman said, she has researched how stress affects the human body and she realized that pressure in 1983 from the deaths of three relatives and caring for four grandchildren had caused her fatigue.

"I'm sure that was the reason I was run down more than the illness," Tolman said. "The mental strain and the way I was

Meanwhile, physicians at the medical center ran more tests on the liver and found the main artery was defective. When the Mays arrived and were told of the defect, they barely caught the Lear jet as it headed back to Idaho.

Despite the disappointment, the trip brought reassurance that Jory would eventually get a new liver.

"You know he's up there on the list to get the call, so as soon as another one that matches him comes in, we'll get another call," Judy May said.

Psychologist quizzing aspiring SWAT members

TWIN FALLS — A psychologist who specializes in law enforcement is interviewing police aspiring to be part of a new city SWAT team.

Eric Nielson, a Salt Lake City psychologist, is also reviewing the police department's chain of command to suggest possible improvements.

"We're having Nielson design a team-leadership approach for us," City Manager Tom Courtney said. "We're trying to apply some well-proven management techniques that have worked in the private sector."

While Nielson is in town this week, he will interview police officers to see whether they would be suitable on a SWAT (special weapons and tactics) team.

"A person on a SWAT team must have good 'impulse control' and have good social skills.

He must have an exceptional ability to work in a team, Nielson said.

Paul Du Fresne, the city's police and fire chief, said a SWAT team member also must be exceedingly patient.

He said because of his own impatience and independent nature, he likely would not be a good SWAT team member.

Those characteristics seem to be contrary to a great number of police officers, who are often independent, Nielson said.

He said the team will likely consist of six members.

Nielson also is helping the police and firefighters adjust to management changes.

Nielson said since Du Fresne replaced the retiring Tim Qualls in the spring, the department has understandably undergone some changes.

"The change has been stressful to a lot of

people if you're someone," he said.

Some of Du Fresne's changes have caused conflicts with officers — most notably a dispute over work schedules.

As the department evolves to conform with Du Fresne's new leadership style, Nielson will make suggestions to help smooth the transition and enhance leader functions, he said.

Du Fresne has said that he likes to involve the entire department down to the patrol officer in making decisions, to draw out their creativity.

That team-leadership approach to management is effective, Nielson said.

"That's not the way the old organization ran at all," he said.

He said already a departmental director sets and implements policy and seeks new resources.

The day-to-day decision making should rest with the people beneath him, he said.

Nielson said he has interviewed about 25 people in the department, extracting from them what they feel are the department's strengths and weaknesses.

He will interview anyone else who wants to talk to him, he said.

He said the city's desire to find its own weaknesses so that it can improve is a healthy way to run any organization.

He compares the process the department is undergoing as preventative medicine, instead of surgery.

One less attractive way to bring a department in line with a new leader's management style is to purge "uncooperative" members by retiring some and relegating others to obscure positions, he said.

"That hasn't happened here," he said. "It's a good organization," he said. "You have real good people."

State tells local school boards to resolve dispute

GOODING — The state told two local school boards Thursday to work out between themselves a long-standing dispute over the desire of some parents in the disputed area to send their children to other schools.

The State Board of Education voted to "strongly encourage" the two boards, from Shoshone and Dietrich, to work together to provide transportation for the children in Hidden Valley.

The board tabled the matter until its next

meeting and asked for a progress report.

The board, meeting in Gooding Thursday, listened to two sides argue whether part of the Shoshone district should be annexed into the Dietrich district. The majority of the property owners in the disputed area sent letters favoring annexation of the land, valued at \$3.5 million.

"This is the second time that we have petitioned the state school board for annexation into Dietrich," Afon Van Tassel said. "They pushed us into this corner, until this is the only answer — We want our property annexed."

Shoshone Superintendent Wayne Waddoups said his district has sought a number of solutions to the problem, including providing transportation and tuition for students attending school out of the district.

"We've struggled with that situation, trying to find what might be the answer," he said. "We think that the only real solution to this problem is for those people out there in Hidden Valley to accept the fact that they're in the Shoshone School District and try to make it work."

At issue is an area in the southeast section of the Shoshone district that is

closer to the Minidoka and Dietrich schools. Many residents there say they want their children to attend those schools because they are closer and because their ties are stronger to communities other than Shoshone.

The Shoshone School Board has paid for bus service for these students to the other schools but this spring voted to stop the service and prohibited those districts' bus companies from entering the Shoshone district.

The district said it was concerned about the economic impact of the loss of the 20 or so students when it comes to state funding.

YFCA expansion plans include indoor tennis courts, day camp

TWIN FALLS — The YFCA is financially stable, says its director, but it isn't resting on its laurels — it's planning two expansions that include indoor tennis courts, a donated "Hydrotube" slide, sand-volleyball courts and a shelter-type structure for a day camp during the summer months.

"We could sit here like we are now, or we could develop more programs and have more chances for success," Director John Eschenburg said.

The plans, all for the current YFCA site on Elizabeth Boulevard, were announced Thursday at a mid-morning press conference.

The indoor tennis courts, a set of two costing a total of \$250,000, are scheduled to be completed by the summer of 1991, the architect, Richard Heindel of Twin Falls, said.

The second expansion, construction of the "outdoor recreation area," will be built as the money comes in or as soon as \$100,000 can be raised. The YFCA will kick-off fundraising for the recreation area Jan. 1, said Tom High, current YFCA board president and the soon-to-be donors committee chairman.

Membership fees will not rise to pay for the expansions, nor will the YFCA use funds from charitable organizations such as the United Way, Eschenburg said.

Instead, users fees and donations will pay the way.

Already, \$50,000 has been raised in donations from 24 individual tennis players in the community and the Twin Falls Tennis Association players for construction of the indoor courts.

Farmer's National Bank has joined the YFCA in the other \$200,000 for the indoor tennis courts project.

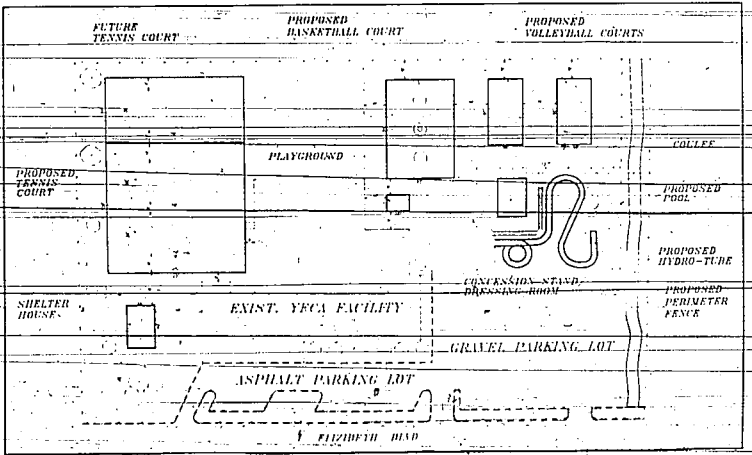
To pay off the loan and maintain the courts, special memberships will be sold to those who want to use the courts and a court fee of \$10 for each 1½-hour will be charged.

Already 90 of the 110 tennis memberships available have been sold, Eschenburg said. The memberships are going for \$350 per year for a family or \$230 per year for a single membership.

Eschenburg said people will have the option of purchasing either a tennis membership, a regular membership, which does not include tennis court privileges, or a combined membership, which includes access to both the courts and the rest of the facilities.

The yearly membership fees and hourly court costs will cover operational costs, including loan payments.

A third court may be added in the future. Eschenburg said he hopes the outdoor recreation project will also be off the ground

Man accused of 3 child murders confesses to 1st

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP) — Wesley Allan Dodd told a sheriff's investigator that he strangled a 4-year-old Portland boy after picking him up at a playground and molesting him, a court document alleges.

An affidavit in support of a search warrant and related documents were made public Thursday by District Judge Randall Peck.

Dodd said he kept Lee Joseph Iseli in his apartment overnight and killed the boy Oct. 30 because he was afraid he would be discovered if he set the child free, the affidavit says.

Dodd is also accused of the stabbing deaths of William J. Neer, 10, and Cole L. Neer, 11, both of Vancouver. However, the documents released Thursday made no mention of their deaths.

The bodies of the two brothers were found Labor Day in a

Vancouver park a few blocks from Dodd's residence.

Dodd, a 28-year-old Vancouver man who is accused of first-degree aggravated murder in the deaths of the three boys, told Clark County sheriff-investigator David Trimble that he saw Iseli at a southeast Portland school playground on Oct. 29, the affidavit said.

"Dodd said he asked Iseli if he wanted some money, and wanted to play some games," Trimble said in the affidavit. "Dodd said that Iseli took his hand and he led him to his Ford Pinto station wagon which was parked on a nearby street."

According to the affidavit, Dodd told Trimble he took the boy to his apartment, where he repeatedly molested the child. During part of the ordeal, the boy was tied to Dodd's bed, the document said.

"Dodd said that he and Iseli if he would like to spend the night with him, and that Iseli did not want

to his older brother would miss him," Trimble said. "He said that he convinced Iseli to stay by promising him a toy and dinner."

Trimble said Dodd told him he took the boy to a nearby store and to a fast-food restaurant for dinner, then returned to the apartment.

During the night, Dodd said he told the boy, "I'm going to kill you in the morning," but the boy "expressed disbelief" so Dodd assured him that he would not kill him," according to the document.

Trimble said Dodd told him he didn't know what to do with Iseli in the morning. He considered releasing the boy but "decided against this option as he feared that there was too much risk of his discovery."

Dodd told the investigator he strangled the boy and placed his body in a closet, then went to work, the document said. When he returned, he dumped the body along

a road near Vancouver Lake, west of Vancouver, about a mile from where Dodd worked at a shipping clerk in a paper-handling business.

According to the affidavit, Dodd told investigators they would find under his bed a briefcase containing newspaper articles about the kidnapping murder of Iseli, Iseli's fingerprints, photographs of the boy and a diary detailing the crime.

Dodd was arrested Monday night after allegedly trying to abduct 6-year-old James Kirk of Washougal from a Cannes movie theater. Dodd moved to Vancouver about four months ago. He also had been arrested in Seattle and Benton County, Wash., and Lewiston, Idaho.

The affidavit said Kenneth Bruce Harrison, a tenant in an apartment neighboring the suspect's, told police he saw a small, blond boy in Dodd's apartment in late October.

Trimble said in the affidavit that Dodd told him he first had gone to southeast Portland to look for boys to molest on Oct. 28, but didn't find anyone and returned the next day.

She hasn't paid for any care or treatment since May 1988, she said, because she began working in his laboratory and got the tinctures for free.

Now, she doesn't believe the tinctures are effective.

"I don't understand how the tinctures work," she said.

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Utah to tear up costly experimental road

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — An experimental surface has been placed on a stretch of Interstate 15 for less than three months, but transportation officials are prepared to remove every trace of what remains.

Eugene Findlay, director of the Utah Department of Transportation, says he is personally devastated that the experimental Syn-crete surface has deteriorated so rapidly between 5900 South and 3300 South, which was being repaved at a cost of \$1.5 million.

He said he would recommend this week that the state road commission approve as much as \$900,000 in additional tax money to grind away the material.

Findlay recommended to the commission that we take out 100 percent of the outside (right) lane, 75 percent of the middle lane and 30 percent of the inside lane," Findlay said.

"I really feel we need to make a decision soon. We've got to do something before winter sets in," he said.

The department earlier had estimated that just 20 percent of the material had failed. But time and weather — the two factors Syn-crete was supposed to resist — have boosted the deterioration of the thin-bonded overlay that officials had hoped would put Utah on the map for innovative highway rehabilitation.

Findlay estimated that about 50 percent of the Syn-crete has failed to hold. But because of the hopelessness that motorists must do to avoid ever-widening holes in the road surface, Findlay said he would characterize the project "closer to 75 or 80 percent failure."

Meantime, legislative auditors are poring over UDOT records to determine why and how the \$1.5 million experimental project was approved and what the results have been.

Wayne Welsh, legislative auditor general, said the legislature's audit subcommittee of the legislative management committee requested an audit in mid-October.

As it stands, taxpayers could foot the bill for the entire project, and the road still needs to be resurfaced. Originally estimated at \$1.5 million, the state has paid out \$1.3 million on the contract to date, along with an additional \$200,000 for patching various areas.

Findlay said removing most of the remaining material will cost from \$300,000 to \$900,000. Welsh said he is uncertain whether the committee pays a specific charge to look at the lack of liability in the contract for the Syn-crete supplier, Hodson Chemical Construction Corp.

During a recent meeting, legislators asked Findlay why UDOT didn't ask for some performance assurance from Hodson, requiring that the company bear at least some of the cost if the resurfacing material didn't hold up.

UDOT is "in the process of negotiating with Hodson Chemical and will look at the other contractors to see if there's liability that they should share," Findlay said.

"There is nothing specifically (about liability) in the contract," he said. "Nothing could have been written in the contract because it was realized from the beginning that we were talking about an experiment."

He said the department is relying on the implied warranty and trying to determine if it was properly applied.

But Owen Hogle, vice president of Hodson Chemical, insists the company has no legal obligation for any costs associated with repair work on the failed project and doesn't intend to pay.

He said that because the project was experimental, the state agreed up front to assume the liability. Hodson earlier had declared the project a 90 percent success, but Hogle said this week that his company now considers it a failure by a "minimum 30 percent,

maximum 50 to 60 percent."

Hodson originally predicted a 2 percent failure rate. Hogle attributes the failure to a variety of factors, including the temperature of the slag and the amount of water added to it.

"Our product has not failed. Our product has performed to what all the previous (UDOT) tests showed it should. The procedure failed," he said.

"Now many companies will come in and when an experiment is done — where the manufacturer is the contractor and they call all the shots — they do everything," Hogle said.

"We were not allowed that under this. Instead, UDOT insisted that the construction work on the project be put out to bid," he said.

Such bidding is required by state law, and although Hodson Chemical is a licensed contractor, it did not bid on the project. And Hogle argues that because Syn-crete itself didn't fail, the company should be paid in full for its product.

4 Oregon prison officials suspended

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — Four prison officials have been suspended pending an investigation into possible wrongdoing, the state Department of Corrections said Thursday.

A statement issued by department Director Fred Pearce's office said the inquiry was being conducted jointly by the agency's internal affairs unit and the Oregon State Police.

The statement contained no details about the possible wrongdoing by the four officials, however.

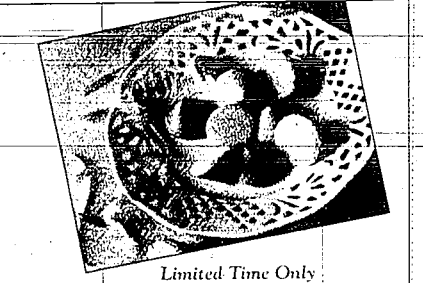
"The Department of Corrections is not releasing further information until the investigation is completed," Pearce's statement said.

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Arizona faces \$70 million fund shortfall

PHOENIX (AP) — Gov. Rose Mofford formally called the Legislature into special session on Thursday, asking lawmakers to pass an auto-insurance bill and to speed up tax collections to cover an estimated \$70 million shortfall in the current state budget.

Mrs. Mofford and legislative leaders agreed last week to hold a quick special session beginning Tuesday to deal with auto insurance and short-term budget problems, including supplemental appropriations for some agencies.

They also agreed to begin a longer session Dec. 14 on long-term budget and tax issues.

A bipartisan group of legislators who've worked on the insurance bill since late last month reached a final agreement on Wednesday, and a proposed budget-balancing bill was distributed among lawmakers on Thursday.

The auto-insurance bill is similar to a proposal drafted last month by

Sens. David Bartlett, D-Tucson, and Bill De Long, R-Tucson.

Its key provisions call for advance approval of insurance rates by the state Department of Insurance, create a consumer-advocate's office and a fraud unit within the department, and strengthen the state's mandatory auto-insurance law.

The bill also would attempt to make auto insurance more affordable by allowing low-income drivers to buy reduced liability coverage.

Mrs. Mofford said she decided to include auto insurance in the special session instead of waiting for the regular session, which convenes in January, because it appears there is bipartisan support for the bill.

"Why Wait?" the governor asked. "The motorists and citizens of Arizona would never forgive us if we allowed this rate-saving opportunity to get away from us. The longer we wait, the more it

costs."

The budget-balancing plan also appears to enjoy bipartisan support. Republican and Democratic legislative leaders expressed approval of the plan after discussing it during meetings with Mrs. Mofford and her staff earlier this month.

It would accelerate sales-tax collections from businesses with a tax liability of at least \$100,000, would require individual income-tax payers with incomes of at least \$100,000 to make estimated quarterly payments, and speed up collections of the premium tax for businesses with a liability of at least \$2,000.

The package would raise an estimated \$85 million. Although some lawmakers also had wanted to include spending cuts in the budget-balancing package, Democrats opposed the idea, and Mrs. Mofford said she had decided to make whatever cuts are necessary

through executive order.

The savings will be accomplished through such actions as freezing state hiring and deferring equipment purchases, Mrs. Mofford said. She said a detailed plan would be unveiled at a news conference on Friday.

"I have had several conversations with legislators and state agency directors in the last few days," Mrs. Mofford said. "No one was eager to repeat the budget impasse we faced last session. By imposing spending cuts through executive action, we can better establish what our priorities are for next year's session."

All state agency heads were requested last week to institute a hiring freeze and to submit contingency budget reduction plans based on cuts of 1 percent, 2 percent and 4 percent, Mrs. Mofford said.

The governor also said lawmakers may be asked to provide supplemental appropriations for some agencies.

McClure backs off wilderness image

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. Sen. Jim McClure is debunking rumors he is willing to pass a wilderness bill at any expense.

Speaking Wednesday to the Idaho Falls meeting of the Idaho Cattle Association via satellite, McClure said he would try to stop any wild bill that sells out Idaho interests.

"If this bill gets off the rails back here, I'll do everything that I can to stop it," the Idaho Republican said. "I think I'm in a position to say that while I can't make guarantees, I can come pretty close to guaranteeing that's exactly what will happen."

He said he had heard some rumors

circulated around the ICA that he would agree to any wilderness boundaries to push a bill through Congress.

McClure and Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus have crafted a measure that sets aside 1.4 million acres of additional wilderness. The senator said there is little room for

negotiation over the compromise bill.

"Grazing is protected in this bill," McClure said. "Also maintained is predator control, access to water and salt for livestock and whatever access is necessary to grazing allotments within proposed wilderness."

by next spring. But a base of \$100,000 is needed to start the project, he said, so the timeline will depend on fund-raising successes.

The outdoor area would also be maintained through the user fees and day camp fees, he added.

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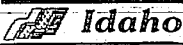

Idaho wants federal royalties, rents

BOISE (AP) — The state of Idaho says the federal government may owe nearly \$300,000 in rents and royalties from federal mineral leases.

Under the federal Mineral Leasing Act, the state gets half of the rent and royalties the federal government receives for leases on federal lands in Idaho.

State Treasurer Lydia Justice Edwards said Thursday she has asked the Federal Minerals Management Service, Denver, to review discrepancies in the payments for 1974, 1985 and 1986. Idaho mining companies provided information to help find the errors, she said.

"This is only the first step. Right now, we are asking questions about this \$298,000 because we cannot account for it among the funds that the state of Idaho has received," she said.

Mrs. Edwards said when she was elected, three years ago, she promised an audit of the money received from that source.

Ranchers want mutilations probed

MONTPELIER (AP) — A delegation of ranchers wants Bear Lake County to allot more money for the investigation of some 20 cattle mutilation incidents.

About \$10,000 worth of butchered cattle have been found in the Noonan area, 15 miles northeast of Montpelier in southeastern Idaho.

Ranchers said the animals are generally female, with one ear completely removed. Earlier mutilations included cutting the tail and genitals. The cattlemen have offered a \$5,000 reward through the sheriff's office for information leading to convictions.

The landowners want investigators assigned to the case with night surveillance equipment.

Bear Lake County Sheriff Brent Bunn asked the ranchers to report any more deaths immediately so forensic tests can be done on a "fresh animal."

Some may be afraid to provide information because of fear of retaliation by those involved, the ranchers said.

Senators praise merits of nominee

WASHINGTON (AP) — Idaho's U.S. senators say Judge Edward Lodge is one of the most qualified nominees to come before the Senate for confirmation.

Lodge, 55, a federal bankruptcy judge in Boise, has been nominated by President Bush as a district judge at Boise. He appeared before the Senate Judiciary Committee Wednesday.

On Thursday, the committee gave Lodge unanimous voice vote endorsement and sent the nomination to the Senate floor for a vote. Congressional staffers said they were uncertain when that would come, but an effort would be made to get the nomination confirmed before next week's scheduled Senate recess.

Lodge was introduced to the Judiciary Committee by senators Steve Symms and James McClure. "Certain nominees never has been before this committee a more-qualified or better-prepared candidate for nomination and confirmation as a United States district judge," said McClure. "This is a man with wide experience and a wide reputation."

Lodge is to succeed U.S. District Judge Marion Callister, Boise, who has moved to senior status, semi-retired with a reduced workload.

Lodge has been a bankruptcy judge since last year and before that spent a quarter-century as a state judge. He was a star football quarterback at Boise Junior College and a trial attorney before entering the judiciary.

Idaho's economy sunny; Banker

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's economic climate is still sunny, although Pocatello has not shared in the financial bounty, bank officials say.

"In Pocatello, Idaho's economy would have to be described as very good," said Gene Shultz, vice president of economic analysis for West One Bancorp. "However, the gains are not evenly distributed geographically."

Shultz spoke Wednesday at the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho's annual conference.

Employment in the state is up 14,000 workers since 1988, real personal income increased 4.5 percent and taxable sales grew 12 percent, Shultz said.

Pocatello's economy, however, is characterized by its ups and downs, said Rich Maraffio of First Security Bank. He said the closure of the Kraft Foods cheese plant, then its takeover by Ore-Ida, "typifies what is happening in the area."

The economic strength seems to have centered in Boise and Idaho Falls, as well as the tourist destinations of Coeur d'Alene and Sun Valley-Marriott said.

The economy of Idaho Falls is very stable due to the proximity of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, Shultz said.

Nitrates in water might pose threat

FORT HALL (AP) — Nitrates in some drinking wells on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation may pose a "small immediate health threat" to young children, a U.S. Public Health Service report says.

Micky Rathsum, the agency's field health director, said the report was submitted to Shoshone-Bannock Business Council Chairman Gilbert Teton.

It concluded that children under one year of age may develop methemoglobinemia or "blue-baby syndrome" from drinking water which contains high levels of nitrates. They often derive from farm chemicals sprayed on fields.

Under the blue-baby syndrome, a child's blood is unable to carry oxygen, which may cause the child to suffocate in extreme cases. Rathsum said a child must drink more than two quarts of contaminated water per day to be at risk.

However, the presence of nitrates in wells indicates other hazardous chemicals also may be there, he said. The report recommends the tribes take immediate steps.

Arizona man presumed drowned

PECK (AP) — Nez Perce County authorities say a Mesa, Ariz., fisherman is missing and presumed drowned after a boating accident on the Clearwater River about a mile east of Peck.

The name of the presumed victim was not released pending notification of his family.

Two other men, one a fisherman from Orange County, Calif., and the other a fishing guide from Orofino, were taken to Clearwater Valley Memorial Hospital by Orofino ambulance following the mishap Wednesday.

Tip Huffman from California suffered mild hypothermia.

Senate panel criticizes IEA for control of money

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The chairman of the state's Senate Education Committee has bashed the Idaho Education Association for having "too much control over taxpayers' money."

But an IEA member listening to Sen. Jerry Thorne, R-Nampa, at a Bonville County Republican Women's luncheon in Idaho Falls on Wednesday says she is frightened that Thorne holds his post.

The Legislature's last year appropriated \$12 million in one-time money to cover various expenses other than salaries, and Thorne said lawmakers were criticized by the IEA for attaching "strings" to the budget.

"I hope there are more strings, and they should be longer," he said. "Maybe there should be ropes."

Thorne also said the teachers' union's primary purpose in recent years has been "to extract money from the beleaguered taxpayers."

The average annual teacher salary is \$22,000, which is \$10,000 more than the state's per capita income, Thorne said.

According to the Department of Employment, the per capita figure includes non-working children and elderly people.

Thorne said he was not implying that teachers are overpaid, but added they were being paid well, according to the state's ability to pay.

Thorne's talk drew fire from a teacher in the audience who is a member of the IEA board of directors and a participant in a local bipartisan effort to work on education issues.

"It has nauseated me to hear what you have said," said Maureen

Senate Democrats want 'report cards' for schools

COPYBOISE (AP) — Democrats in the Idaho Senate want to enact some sort of "report card" for Idaho's schools, so each school can be graded on such things as student achievement and reduction in dropout rates.

That was one of six points in an education platform announced by Senate Democrats at news conferences in Boise and Coeur d'Alene.

Democrats, who trail the majority Republicans 23-19 in the Senate, plan a strong bid in the 1990 election to win control of that chamber for the first time since 1958.

Boise and Coeur d'Alene are expected to be the major battlegrounds, and it was in those communities where the Democrats held news conferences to discuss their educational goals.

At Coeur d'Alene, senators Mary Lou Reed and John Stocks said the Democratic legislative package is patterned after successful educational programs from other areas and recommendations from Idaho and national groups.

Sen. Mike Burkett of Boise and Sen. Claire Wetherell of Mountain Home continued the Boise meeting.

The platform calls for legislation requiring school districts to prepare a six-year plan for improvement.

It would require districts to assess current conditions and programs, identify areas for improvement and preparation of long-range action plans.

The Democrat platform suggests pilot projects for educational improvement, with 10 projects to be funded at \$50,000 each.

Nampa superintendent won't leave, despite sizeable 'no confidence' vote

NAMPA (AP) — Nampa School Superintendent Youngerman says he won't step down as head of the school district, even though teachers have almost-unanimously given a vote of no confidence to his administration.

Some 200 teachers voted nearly-unanimously on Tuesday and the remainder of the 350 teachers were to vote on the issue Wednesday, with results due either Thursday or Friday, said Bob Simpson, president of the Nampa Education Association.

"I'm disappointed," Youngerman said of the 198-2 vote. "I'll work through this. The board has indicated to me that I have their full support and confidence."

Youngerman said he believes the vote stems from a tense round of contract talks that ended in October with a ratified agreement.

In late September, teachers approved a contract that would have required the district to pay part of instructors' union dues, but the School Board rejected that pact.

"I do think this is, in part, the aftermath of a fairly difficult and long negotiations process," he said. "It's an unfortunate aftermath."

But Bruce Boyd, an elementary school teacher who helped organize the vote, said plans for a no-confidence vote were under way before bargaining began.

BLM policies to lean more toward wildlife

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — In the future, the U.S. Bureau of Land Management will insist on giving wildlife and recreation equal consideration with industry, state BLM Director Delmar Vail has told the Idaho Cattle Association.

And former national BLM Director Robert Burford told the ICA meeting Thursday in Idaho Falls that adhering to multiple-use range management is the only way the cattle industry will survive.

BLM Director Cy Jamison has sent the message the concept of multiple use will have a broader definition. Congress and a changing society have dictated that a "multiple-disciplinary" approach is necessary, Vail said.

Among the Idaho issues are: Demonstrations have proven grazing can help riparian, or streamside, land and the cattle, Vail said.

Wild horses are not considered a significant problem in Idaho and the situation is under control with the annual roundup and adoption of 150-200 head, he said.

Two environmental impact statements will be completed on the proposed expansion of the Saylor Creek bombing range for Mountain Home Air Force Base. He said there will be a chance for the public to be involved.

Vail said the BLM is not going to fight the U.S. Air Force over the bombing range expansion. The military has proposed increasing the range by 1.5 million acres, to the anger of ranchers and environmentalists alike.

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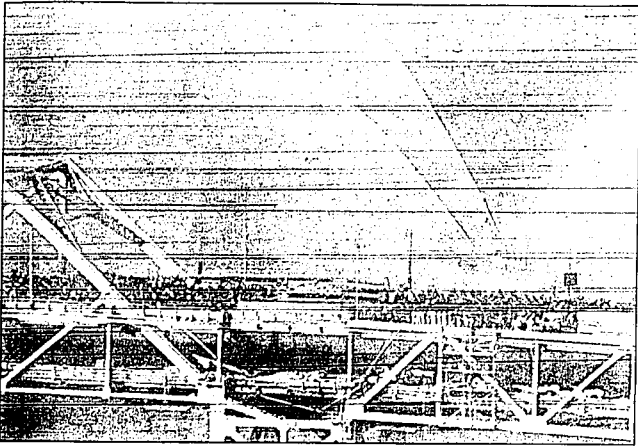
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Foot traffic takes over bridge for day before reopening



Thousands jam repaired San Francisco-Oakland bridge as fireboat joins in celebration with water sprays

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Thousands of festive people stayed on the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge Thursday, commemorating the quick repair job that will enable commuters to return to the span this week for the first time since the earthquake.

Celebrators paid \$5 to walk over the bridge to witness the final stages of the quick repair job that will enable commuters to return to the span this week for the first time since the earthquake.

"I was on a bus when the bridge broke, about 150 yards from where it broke," recalled Susan Palumbo, 42, of San Francisco, as she stood on the bridge today. "We had to get off the bus and walk to Treasure Island and then to San Francisco."

"It was scary. I didn't feel the quake, but I waited for the aftershock to take the bridge down. I feel safe now," she said.

The 53-year-old bridge, one of the world's most heavily traveled, is scheduled to reopen at 11 p.m. Friday, said Bob Halligan of the California Department of Transportation.

Gov. George Deukmejian and Mayor Art Agnos and Lionel Wilson of San Francisco and Oakland, respectively, were among the dignitaries on the program for today's ceremony near the site of the collapse.

In the early stages of the repair, state Department of Transportation officials said they hoped to have the bridge reopened by Thanksgiving.

Samuel Skinner, the U.S. Secretary of Transportation, congratulated Caltrans after observing the final stages of repair work on Tuesday and said, "We've beaten the bureaucracy on this one."

Some local officials grumbled about the ceremony, saying the bridge could have been opened to cars Thursday instead of Saturday.

Officials expected the road traffic backups to end Monday morning when motorists pay their \$1 tolls to cross.

In recent weeks damage has been detected in many of the approach ramps, on either side of the bridge, so delays aren't likely to end.

Officials said it seems like an excellent time to get reliable, timely public transportation in place.

Bates plans to call for a toll increase, to at least \$2, when the transportation system is launched.

The bridge was carrying an average of more than 760,000 vehicles every working day before the quake. It opened on Nov. 17, 1936.

In the past month, commuters who normally drove the bridge to work had to use alternate routes, longer and much slower because of increased traffic.

The Bay Area Rapid Transit system, which has an underground tube below the Bay, has set records during the bridge closure, with as many as 345,000 passengers riding BART trains some days.

For the bridge repair, the first step was to make sure the damaged decks didn't fall through to the bay. Working around the clock, crews cut the damaged upper deck into two pieces, then used a crane to lower them to a barge below.

Other steps involved installing new girders, placing 20 new I-beams, lowering 11 precast deck sections and pouring concrete between them.

Judge says his orders were met Contempt citation falls for Lafferty's lawyers

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A federal judge has revoked the civil contempt-of-court citation he issued last month against two attorneys representing condemned killer Ronald Lafferty.

On Oct. 3, U.S. District Judge J. Thomas Greene ordered Previo lawyers Michael Espin and Gary Wright to pay \$250 each for alleged failure to take seriously three unspecified prior orders of the court.

Lafferty is appealing the death sentence he received for the deaths of his sister-in-law, Brenda Wright Lafferty, formerly of Kimberly, Idaho, and her infant daughter, Erica.

Lafferty and his brother, Dan Lafferty, claimed to be acting under divine orders when they killed the two in American Fork on July 24, 1984.

Dan Lafferty was sentenced to life in prison.

Following Greene's order, Espin and Wright promptly paid their fines, but now the judge has changed his mind.

His latest ruling in the matter says that the citations "are purged, quashed and removed, and the fine assessed as to each ... ordered to be remitted by the court of this court."

The reason, Greene added, was the "timely and full compliance with prior orders of this court ... to the satisfaction of the court."

Ecclesia founder wants his children back

OREGON CITY, Ore. (AP) — Eldridge J. Broussard Jr., founder of the Ecclesia Athletic Association, said Wednesday he would live with his children if the state returns them to him.

Broussard testified in a custody hearing involving his children that he would allow them to attend public school if that were a condition of their return.

He also defended the right of parents to discipline their children, adding that Ecclesia members had adopted a policy that parents would be able to discipline only their own children.

Broussard's daughter, 8-year-old Dayna L. Broussard, was beaten to death in the group's Sandy farmhouse Oct. 13, 1988, while her parents were in Los Angeles.

Fifty-three children from the Ecclesia Athletic Association, including four Broussard children, were taken into state custody after the girl's death.

"I feel that corporal punishment as

a last resort is very necessary," Broussard testified in Clatskanie County Juvenile Court.

He said he had used a paddle or a belt for discipline, "but contrary to popular opinion, in the latter part of 1986, I decided not to use punishment at all."

Broussard took the stand on behalf of his wife, Dayna, who was called to testify by the Children's Services Division but deferred to her husband.

Wednesday was the third day of a hearing before Judge Robert J. Morgan to determine when the Broussard children should be returned to their parents and under what conditions.

The hearing was scheduled to resume today.

Broussard resisted some state efforts to investigate his family situation, partly because he said the agency was wrongly treating him and other Ecclesia members as individual families, rather than as a single extended family.

He said Wednesday the agency was ignoring the "interdependent nature and spiritual nature" of the group.

The agency wants the Broussards to participate in an evaluation by a child psychiatrist, but Broussard said he could not do so unless he was allowed to interview the psychiatrist about his religious convictions.

Broussard also took issue with the agency because he said officials would not let him participate in matters involving group members as their spiritual leader.

Four adult members of Ecclesia, which evolved from the World Christian Center in Los Angeles, were convicted of manslaughter in the death of the Broussards' 8-year-old girl. The four are in prison in Oregon.

The six-year-old Ecclesia children remain in state custody in foster care in the Portland area, 12 are in state custody and living with relatives in California, and two have been released from state custody to their parents.

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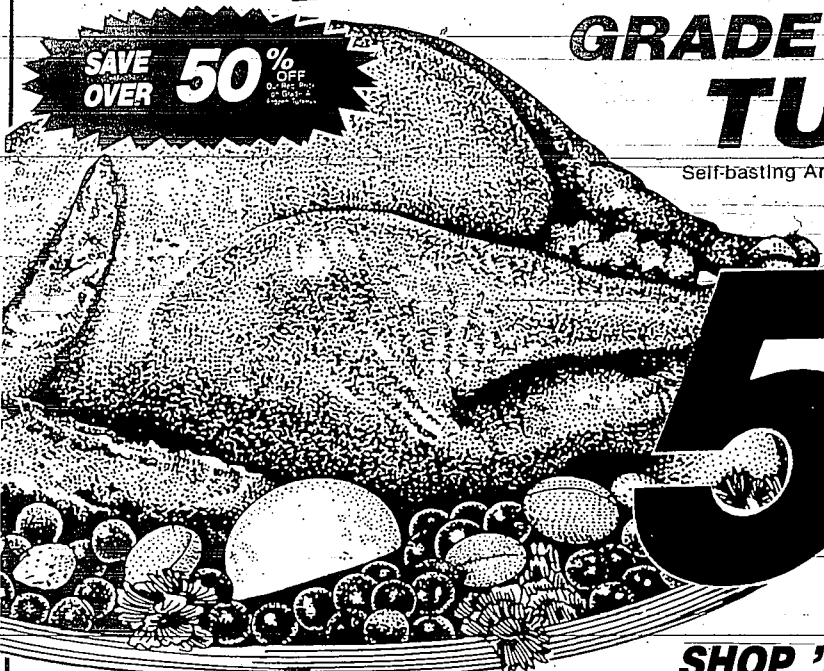


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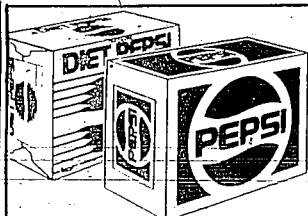
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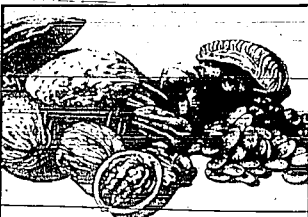
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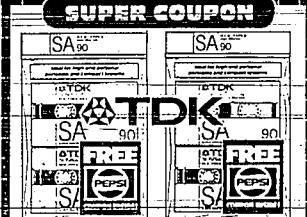
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House panel nods centennial coins for Northwest states

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House subcommittee approved on Thursday the minting of silver coins to mark the centennial of six northwestern states but deleted a provision calling for the first coin in this country made of palladium.

The deletion of palladium sets up a possible conflict with the Senate version of the bill, which was approved in July and includes the provision.

Palladium is mined in this country only in Montana, one of the six states

celebrating the 100th anniversary of their statehood.

Government witnesses testifying before the House subcommittee last month questioned the ability of the Stillwater mine in Nye, Mont., to supply the precious metal. South Africa and the Soviet Union provide 90 percent of the world's supply.

Even if U.S. palladium is used, it must be refined in Belgium.

Treasury officials also raised questions about the suitability of palladium coins for

minting because the metal, although considered soft, is too hard and brittle.

They said countries that have minted palladium coins have had limited success.

Rep. Richard H. Lehman, D-Calif., chairman of the subcommittee on Consumer Affairs and Coinage, said he would try to move the bill through the committee and the House floor for a vote before Thanksgiving.

The 90 percent silver dollars would be engraved with a regional logo on one side,

according to the bill authorizing them. The reverse side would carry a bust of Thomas Jefferson and a bust of Lewis and Clark overlooking the Missouri River.

The commemorative coins will bear the words "Northwest Centennial" and "Statehood 1889-1890." A design will have to be selected by the Treasury Secretary after consultation with the U.S. Fine Arts Commission.

The six states celebrating the 100th anniversary of their statehood are Idaho,

Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Washington and Wyoming.

Of the proceeds from the \$7 surcharge on the commemorative coins, \$1.5 million would go to the "Documents West" exhibition program administered by the Idaho Centennial Foundation. The excess funds will go to the federal treasury.

The subcommittee version deletes a requirement that the price of the proof sets be pegged to the fair market value of the silver.

Staged collision helps crash effects study

BOISE (AP) — The rumbling of the freight train, the shrill of its whistle and the horrible sounds of fracturing glass and metal filled the air near Boise Wednesday, but the train-school bus collision caused no injuries.

The event was a staged collision between a freight train and empty school bus and was designed as part of a rail-crossing safety program.

"I hope not only our bus drivers but all motorists will look at this and realize there can only be losers when you try to beat the train," said Bill Staker, co-owner of Brown Bus Co., which donated the 20-year-old bus.

The wreck was one of the first ever staged in the United States of a train-school bus accident, Union Pacific officials said.

—It was put on as part of a rail-crossing safety program, "Operation Lifesaver," and was jointly sponsored by U.P., Idaho State Police, Boise State University Institute of Traffic Studies and the Brown Bus Co.

The scene after Wednesday's crash left some of the 50 spectators gasping.

The train slowly accelerated from a half-mile away—About 200 feet from the bus, traveling 30 mph,

engineer Mike Wall applied the brakes, but the train kept going.

The diesel hit the front third of the 65-passenger bus, knocking it 30 yards into a freshly plowed field, and then continuing another 700 feet before stopping.

One seat was knocked from the bus and left sitting near the tracks. Broken glass from windows and bits of metal were strewn about.

A huge hole was left in the right side of the 16,000-pound bus, where the diesel had rammed into it.

The impact was directed at the front of the bus rather than in the middle because U.P. officials worried the train could be derailed, spokesman Ed Trandahl said.

"The diesel received minimal damage to its front-end snowplow. As for the bus, Trandahl said, it's safe to say such an accident with students aboard would have had tragic results.

"You easily could've had deaths in this one or had a lot of injuries," he said.

Officials said the crash at the Midland Road crossing north of Nampa served several purposes:

To promote "Operation Lifesaver" by demonstrating for the media and public the tremendous forces

involved in a train crash and the inability of a 1,543-ton train to stop quickly.

To allow accident reconstruction experts from ISP and the traffic institute to compare computer analysis predictions of an accident with a real-life crash.

To obtain videotape footage for

use in safety training presentations to be produced by the ISP, Union Pacific and Brown Bus.

"People must realize that trains simply cannot stop in a short distance," said Ed O'Hara, U.P. superintendent of the Nampa service unit.

Madison added to Gem listing

BOISE (AP) — Madison County is Idaho's newest Gem Community.

In a Rexburg ceremony, Gov. Cecil Andrus added Madison County to the list of communities working for economic development through a state program.

Andrus said Madison County qualified because of an "aggressive, locally based economic development effort."

The Gem Communities program was started last summer and 28 communities have applied for participation.

Eight communities have been certified to date.

"Building partnerships among the business community and local and state government is the proven path to building a stronger Idaho economy," said Andrus.

"Over the past two years we have seen a number of examples of a local economic development project blossoming when business and government at all levels pull together," he said.

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New Kootenai jail sees overcrowded weekends

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The \$5 million Kootenai County Jail, built 2½ years ago, was expected to meet the county's detention needs for a decade.

But the jail was overflowing with prisoners last weekend, and it was not the first time.

"On the weekends we are inundated with inmates," Kootenai County sheriff's Capt. Tom Dickson said. "It happens frequently; enough that I'm really concerned."

The facility is designed to house 123 prisoners. But with 134 people locked up last weekend, a few inmates had to sleep on mattresses on the floor, Dickson said.

"We felt that that building would last us 10 years," said Kootenai County Commission Chairman Frank Henderson. "But there are a lot of things that have happened since the jail opened that we didn't bargain for."

When blueprints for the facility were being drawn in 1987, the county planned on housing about 50 inmates during weekdays and 70 on weekends.

But Henderson said officials did not expect the Legislature to mandate jail sentences for drunken drivers.

Increased police patrols also have escalated arrest rates in the county, as well as population growth.

"With those people has come an increase in activity, and that activity hasn't always been law-abiding," Henderson said. "The combination of all these factors has really kicked our projections in the head."

He said he has been discussing the problem with local judges and other county commissioners, but no immediate solutions have been proposed.

Judges in the 1st Judicial District said they are aware of the problem, but there is little they can do about it.

"The question is, should a judge, when sentencing a criminal, have to consider whether there is enough space in the penal system to accommodate that prisoner?" asked Judge Gary Hamlin, administrative judge for the 1st District. "The answer to that question is no."

Tax activist calls \$7.50 award victory of a kind

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — First District Magistrate Peter Hutchinson has awarded local tax activist Ron Rankin \$7.50 from a man who tore up leaflets Rankin distributed at a Coeur d'Alene School Board meeting in August.

And Rankin said even though the amount of Tuesday's award was small, the ruling backed up his position that Rob Spafford's actions amounted to "censorship by vandalism."

"There's a matter of principle here," he said. "The money is insignificant."

Rankin alleged in a small-claims suit that Spafford, the husband of a teacher in the Coeur d'Alene School District, tore up 50 copies of a newsletter he had placed on audience chairs at the board's Aug. 28 meeting.

"The newsletter, called Vox Pop, carried a story with the headline, '15 Tricks that Teacher Unions Play on School Boards.'"

Spafford argued in his defense

that he did not believe the fliers were still Rankin's property because he already had distributed them.

"It just seemed like something I could do to antagonize Mr. Rankin," he told Hutchinson.

The magistrate ruled that the newsletters remained Rankin's property until they were in the hands of people for whom they were intended.

He ordered Spafford to reimburse Rankin for the cost of reproducing them. However, he refused to order payment of nearly \$100 in additional costs sought in Rankin's complaint.

Spafford said he fought the issue in court because he did not want Rankin to bully people with lawsuits or the threat of legal action.

"Mr. Rankin's aim in life seems to be to destroy rather than to build," he said. "I think he makes a habit of using the court system to intimidate people."

Currently, the Idaho Supreme Court is considering whether to reinstate a libel suit against Rankin.

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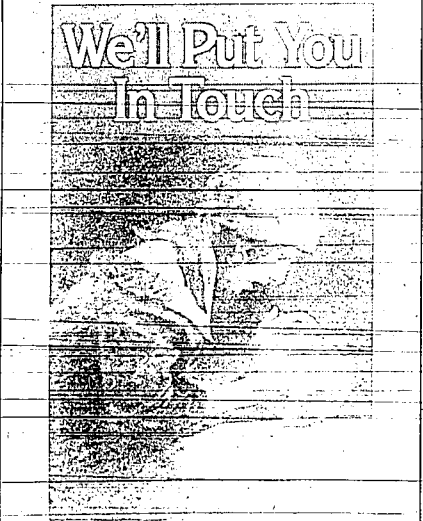

Receivers Dunn, Allen keep Idaho in control

MOSCOW — Try to find even a part-time armchair quarterback who hasn't heard of Idaho quarterback John Friesz, and you'll find yourself a sports nut.

But two names that have been veiled in somewhat obscurity — in shadows of Mr. All-Everything Friesz — are two major reasons why the Vandals cannot be currently ninth on the NCAA's career passing list.

Ahead of such luminaries as John Elway, Jim McMahon and Senior Lee Allen and sophomore Kasey Dunn are the cream of an incredible Idaho receiving corps that has simply destroyed the opposition in Idaho's last eight games. Record after record has been broken, but even more noteworthy, Idaho Airlines has done what most people (this includes Vandal fans) ten years ago would have thought impossible, surely unattainable and downright folly to even conceive such a big score three consecutive Big Sky championships. Four in the last five years. Bronco lovers can gloat all they want about the past; the glory days, the national championship in 1980, but BSU hasn't beaten Idaho since 1981.

The '80's have been a decade of the high-octane passing in both the college and professional ranks and Idaho has done it — under three head coaches — better than any Big Sky club. This has earned the Vandals a reputation and an attractiveness to lure talented receivers such as Allen and Dunn to Moscow.

Allen came here from Kennedy High School in Seattle, by way of Eastern Washington. After a spending a year with the EWU Eagles, Allen, a

5-foot, 10-inch wide out, opted to give up a year of eligibility and come to the Palouse, to a more receiver-friendly program under then Head Coach Keith Gilbertson, than that of the run-oriented offense of EWU.

"The (Allen) wanted to win," Dunn says jokingly when he and Allen were interviewed Tuesday after practice. Allen then adds, "They (Idaho) were to me, at an upper level (of competition and regard) because Eastern was independent and these guys (Idaho) were in the Big Sky...and the passing game."

Dunn, a 6-2, 202-pound-sometimes-wide-out, sometimes flanker and sometimes tight end came to Idaho two years ago after an illustrious career in not only football, but basketball and basketball as well, at North Kitsap High School, north of Seattle on the Puget Sound. He was recruited thru Washington State.

first-year Idaho Head Coach John L. Smith says of Dunn before crossing the State line, Smith was assistant head coach at WSU under Dennis Erickson. The Cougars however, ended up not pursuing Dunn "and that's when Idaho picked up a great player," Smith says.

The acquisition of both Dunn and Allen has definitely paid off for the Vandals. Both are riding the crest atop Big Sky and NCAA lists for reception yardage. Allen with 1,139 yards and Dunn with 984. Contest with Boise State vital for Vandals' playoffs

MOSCOW — It is the end of the Friesz era, perhaps the continuation of the Idaho era and certainly a most important stepping stone toward any postseason playoff sites and pairings.

When the University of Idaho, ranked fourth in the country among NCAA Division I-AA teams, entertains 20th-ranked Boise State at 8 p.m. MST Saturday in the Kibbie Dome, the outcome will mean very little to the conference and postseason world at large, but a great deal within the state and recruiting boundaries.

Boise State is playing almost only in the role of a spoiler for many tangible reasons. Idaho has already clinched a third straight Big Sky Conference football championship and a berth in the postseason NCAA Division I-AA playoffs, but still to be answered is whether Idaho will get to host a first-round playoff game next week.

Perhaps as meaningful as any of the above, it

would mean an eighth straight victory for the Vandals in this series.

Avoiding the latter statistic is the most important task for the Broncos, who have a remote possibility of being invited to the 16-team postseason I-AA party. That's unlikely, and would require a Boise State win combined with losses by at least three of the teams ranked ahead of the Broncos Saturday, on the final day of the regular season.

The surety is that perhaps the only missing factor in Idaho coach John L. Smith's makeup as he prepares is that this will be the last time he'll have the arm and leadership of senior John Friesz in a regular season game.

"Winning this game is important to our recruiting just as beating Idaho State was important," says Smith. "Just being able to beat them both is a big deal because you can turn to the in-state prospects and tell them we are the major program in the state."

That helps later. There are more current perks.

 Lakeland, 11-0, is ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press poll this year and will play the Idaho A-2 state football championship game at Bonners Ferry and he responded with 240 yards in 16 carries and five touchdowns.

Gators decline bowl invitation

Game cancelled after measles attack
BOSTON (AP) — Northeastern University officials decided to cancel the final football game of the season at James Madison after blood tests showed 21 players had not developed antibodies to the measles virus.
 "We were going to play it up until the coach came to me and said it's a safety issue," said Northeastern coach Irwin Cohen, who announced the decision Thursday after a meeting with Coach Paul Pavlak. "That transcends all bounds of how important it is to play the game."

None of the players, including 10 starters, had actually become sick by Thursday, but Massachusetts health officials had refused to allow them to travel out of state.
 Northeastern officials had hoped to convince James Madison to play the game on the Huskies' home field, but the Dukes wanted to play the game at Harrisonburg, Va., since it was the final game for seniors and a special day for members of the school's band.

for his staff were Jackie Morse, bench coach; Tony Perez, hitting instructor and first base coach; and Sam Perlozzo, third base coach.
 Perez is the lone holdover from the staff of former Reds manager Pete Rose, who was fired last month. Aug. 24 for alleged betting on baseball games. Perez's former manager Marge Schott had told Perez he would be retained.
 Williams also served as the Reds' pitching coach in 1984 under Vern Rapp. Williams was fired with Rapp in August 1984 when Pete Rose took over as player-manager.

Survey of NFL players reveals nearly one third took illegal pay

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Nearly one-third of current and former NFL players responding to a survey said they accepted illegal payments while in college, 53 percent of them say they are in the wrong with breaking NCAA rules to get extra cash.
 The study also found cheating to be most pervasive in major conferences, particularly the Southeastern Conference, where 67 percent of the league's former players said they accepted under-the-table payments to augment their scholarships.
 The study by Allen L. Sack, a sociology professor at the University of New Haven, was based on responses from 1,182 active and retired NFL players — roughly a third of the 3,500 contacted.

Of those, a substantial underground economy that's likely to be unexplored, Sack said.
 "I think the problem with the system is that it's not working for athletes and degrading for higher education," he said Thursday, in a telephone interview from the New Haven campus.
 David Bernstein, NCAA assistant executive director for enforcement, said he had not seen the study, but expected that someone at the NCAA would review the findings.
 "I don't know how to react for sure," he said.
 Sack said the respondents indicated that the "vast majority" of illegal payments were made by alumni, although coaches also reportedly made improper payments. Payments were made by sliding cash under dormitory doors, or in congratulatory envelopes for athletes, Sack said. One player said he typically found cash in his locker every Monday before practice and fees. A college player who accepts payment to play can be forced to forfeit his scholarship, and his school could face disciplinary action by the NCAA.

Seventy-eight percent of those responding said they thought the financial aid and provided student-athletes under existing NCAA rules was inadequate to meet their needs. Sack said the NFL Players Association provided him with the names and addresses of 3,500 former and current NFL players, each of whom was mailed a questionnaire. The respondents ranged in age from 22 to 40 years old.
 He said the players' association agreed to participate because it wanted to learn how widespread the use of agents was among college athletes. Sack said 17 percent of the players said they had been approached by agents while undergraduates, another NCAA violation.

The survey found that 83 percent of former SEC players who responded knew of athletes who took illegal payments, while 67 percent of the former SEC players admitted to receiving payments, Sack said.
 But among SEC players older than 30, 53 percent said they knew of athletes who accepted illegal payments, while 38 percent admitted to taking any money, Sack said.
 "Something started happening in 1965. Maybe it was TV or aggressive recruiting. I don't totally understand it myself," Sack said.
 Mark Womack, SEC associate commissioner, said he "had planned" at the study and doesn't believe it provides an accurate reflection of illegal payments in his conference. He said the percentages are "way too high."

Womack noted that only 115 former SEC players responded, while a total of about 2,500 football players have played in the SEC since 1965, he said.
 The database is probably not a good indication of the college scene," Womack said in a telephone interview from his Birmingham, Ala., office.
 He said the study also could be skewed because it focuses only on "superstar" college athletes — the ones who typically go on to the NFL. He also contended that these top players are the most likely of all college athletes to cheat.

In the Big Ten, 48 percent of the former conference players responding said they knew of athletes who took illegal cash, while 36 percent admitted to putting the money in their own pockets.
 Fifty-nine percent of former Pac-10 players said they knew of others who broke the rules, while 39 percent admitted to being recipients of illegal payments.

Networks intrude on the NFL's attempts to speed up games

 In the NFL's repeated attempts to speed up games, one of the things it has tried to do is get the networks to make its commercial breaks efficiently.
 "It's been a losing battle," he said.
 After all, the networks pay the bills — about \$17 million per team per season.
 "We get very few letters about it," said Val Enebreck, the NFL's director of broadcasting. "The biggest complaints are from local affiliates whose time is being cut into long

kickoff commercial."
 The first has been observed most of the time, the second has not. Since 1984, there have been other modifications — cutting from 22 to 16 the number of commercial breaks but increasing the time. But none has curtailed the networks from running rampant, particularly in deliberately making time available during game-viewless time and more commercial.
 That is, even though there are supposed to be four breaks per quarter, on late games, the networks tend to go through the first quarter with no breaks, then, as the early game ends, have continual commercial breaks through the end of the half.
 "We've had dialogue with them," Piniella said. "They're supposed to have four commercial breaks in each quarter. But if you have a long

running early game — one that goes overtime, for example — sometimes it turns out 18 — no commercials in the first quarter, eight in the second. Then you wipe out the whole first half."
 An example:
 Sunday's New England-New Orleans game on CBS ended about 1:20 p.m. EST. When the network cut into the second game, all were close to the end of the first quarters and, in the Phoenix-Dallas game, at least, they were doing the Score commercial, kickoff, commercial routine.
 Moreover, because of commercials, there can be breaks as long as seven or eight minutes, with perhaps two or three plays squeezed in.
 At the Vikings-Rams game two weeks ago, for example, the Rams scored with 51 seconds left in the

first quarter after a long drive that allowed no time for commercials. There was, naturally, a commercial break.
 Then the Vikings went 1-2-3 and punt without using up the rest of the quarter. Again, with 8 seconds left on the clock, the networks cut into the Rams run one play and the quarter ended in time for more commercials.
 The NFL is expected to get much more money than it gets now when it negotiates a new TV contract after this season, after all, baseball and basketball already have received massive increases.
 Enebreck said that doesn't necessarily mean more commercials.
 "We don't like it, the network doesn't like it and the advertiser doesn't like it when you're stopping games all the time," he said. "But if the money of the game is such, you periodically have to intrude."
 And he added:
 "The reason you get to see 85 games on free TV in some markets is because of the packages we can sell. The only reason we sell is that the networks can sell it to advertisers."

Printing deadline postpones Tyson-Ruddock bout

EDMONTON, Alberta (AP) — The Canadian promoter of Mike Tyson's scheduled heavyweight title defense against Donovan "Razor" Ruddock said Thursday that the fight has been postponed.
 Tyson's fight with Hideo Hasegawa at Madison Square Garden in New York City was postponed after Tyson's manager, Don King, said it could not proceed with a Jan. 20 date for the bout because of a printing deadline for his January program schedule, Stevenson said.
 Don King, Tyson's promoter, supported the decision. Bill Clayton, Tyson's manager, could not immediately be contacted.
 The bout originally was scheduled for Saturday, but was postponed after Tyson became ill. It was tentatively scheduled for January.
 Stevenson said HBO telephoned him Wednesday and gave him only 45 minutes to resolve outstanding matters for the fight. He said he was unable to contact financial backer Ed

Beam, on vacation in Phoenix.
 Stevenson also said he could not explain why neither King nor HBO Sports president Sam Altman had been contacted about the fight earlier. In any event, he said, other complications would probably have caused a postponement. HBO officials could not immediately be reached.
 Stevenson suggested that the fight would have been held at the 14,000-seat Northlands Coliseum for that date, but he said King was concerned that it could conflict with a possible bout in Tokyo with James "Buster" Douglas in February.
 Stevenson said he expects many of the 10,000 people who bought tickets to ask for refunds. He said he still believes there is a 70-percent chance Tyson will fight Ruddock in Edmonton within the year.
 "I believe Don King recognizes a moral and ethical, if not legal, obli-

gation to bring MK2 Tyson to Edmonton," Stevenson said. "I hope it's Razor Ruddock he fights here — because I think he's the fighter with the best chance of beating Tyson at this time."

'Blunderland' targets nuclear issues

TWIN FALLS — The familiar Lewis Carroll characters are there: Alice, the Mad Hatter and the Cheshire Cat.

But this isn't "Alice in Wonderland." It's "Alice in Blunderland," a whimsical musical morality play that examines the all-too-serious possibility of nuclear annihilation.

"Alice" will be presented at 7 p.m. Saturday at First United Methodist Church, 360 Shoshone St. E., by Mad Hatter & Associates Theatre Group. The troupe is affiliated with Focus on Peace and Justice, a Burley-based group that has previously performed the musical on its home turf and in Boise.

In the musical, Alice enters Blunderland seeking truth. She is directed on her journey by the Cheshire Cat, a journalist who knows what is really going on but who prints only what sells newspapers.

The Rabbit is the only one in Blunderland who understands the truth about "fairy dust." He frantically shares his concern with Alice, but she is confused by her encounters with Tweedledum and Tweedledumber. These two superpowers are in fierce competition, forever building big stockpiles of "fairy dust."

Alice struggles with what she has learned, trying to decide what she could do — or whether she should do anything at all. The Cat reassures her that no government or corporation can stand up to people who follow their convictions. The play's point is that, like Alice, every individual can make a difference.

The local production of "Alice" grew out of the Focus group's frustration following local hearings in 1988 for the Special Isotope Separation and Composed Isotope-Driven plutonium refinery at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

"We had a hard time reaching people," says Hondo. In largely conservative southern Idaho, she adds, the anti-nuclear community has long been perceived as including mostly anti-establishment ex-hippies and former flower children.

"You couldn't hardly get to the issue because of the perceptions," she says.

A friend from Hondo's church gave her a tape of the "Alice" soundtrack, and she immediately thought the play could prove useful in getting people to look beyond the stereotypes.

Written by Tim DeFrasco and Tom DeFrango of Stow, Ohio, and first produced there in 1981, "Alice in Blunderland" has since been seen in 25 states and Australia.

A production kit for the musical cost \$175, more than Hondo or Focus could afford. But an application to the Peace and Justice Committee of the Oregon-Idaho Conference of the United Methodist Church netted a \$400 grant to defray production costs, and Focus also expects a grant of \$350 from a Territory Resource, a foundation that supports social change organizations in the Northwest.

"Alice" boasts at least 26, most of whom are also working behind the scenes, says Hondo. And she's heard that her

10-year-old daughter, Amy Hondo, plays Alice, is the youngest person yet to take the role.

The purpose of presenting "Alice in Blunderland," says Hondo, is "to get people aware and start asking their own questions."

The troupe has so far presented the musical before audiences totaling about 350 people. Many who come to see the play are already against nuclear proliferation, Hondo notes. But the presentations have also drawn those who don't know much about the issue.

Reaction has been positive, Hondo adds.

"People love it — it invokes all the emotions. We've had a standing ovation every time we've performed it," she says.

"Some people say I had no idea," and they ask us for more information," she says.

Admission for "Alice in Blunderland" is by free will donation. The evening's program will also feature the presentation of three 1999 "Wage Peace" awards by the Earthrise Institute and the Magic Valley Peace Committee. The recipients are Gov. Cecil Andrus, Liz Paul, executive director of the Snake River Alliance, and N.S. Nookkenvel, environmental reporter for The Times-News.

New books capitalize on outdoor beauty

TWIN FALLS — Two new books celebrating the beauty of Idaho are on the market in time for holiday gift giving, and the man who took the photographs for one of the volumes will be in town Saturday.

Jeff Gnass, photographer of "Idaho Magnificent Wilderness," will be at Judi's Bookstore, 120 Main Ave. N., from noon to 1:30 p.m. and at Walden Books in the Magic Valley Mall from 2 p.m. - 4 p.m.

"Magnificent Wilderness" is true to its title, boasting lavish color photos of sites both famous and seldom seen. A portion of the book's proceeds is being donated to the Idaho Centennial Commission.

The other new book is "Your Land: The National Forests in Idaho." Published by Peak Media in Hailey, it features photos and commentary on each of the state's national forests, detailing recreational and other uses.

"Chance placed me in Idaho while growing up, and uncertainty brought me back after college," Boise environmentalist and writer Pat Ford wrote in his foreword to "Magnificent Wilderness." "But at some point intention took over and I realized I would be staying. The places you see in this book, and others like them, are the reason why."

As a child, Gnass lived for a year in Idaho when his father was working at the Anderson Ranch Dam. Now living in Orville, Calif., Gnass spent three years returning to Idaho and making more than a dozen extended trips into the state's backcountry while creating the book, packing in as much as 50 pounds of photographic equipment.

Among the areas of southern Idaho represented in the book — published earlier this year — are Thousand Springs, Big Jack's Creek Canyon, Massacre Rocks State Park and Brunson-Dunn State Park. A lot of respect to the book reveals a panoramic scene of City of Rocks bathed in autumn color. Another striking photo shows a lioness pine tree lit at sunset in Craters of the Moon National Monument.

In an interview Thursday, Gnass said the City of Rocks frontispiece is his favorite image in the book. "The big problem I had was getting over my awe of the place," he noted.

City of Rocks boasts what Gnass called "national park-caliber scenery, although that probably shouldn't be advertised be-

cause it would be overrun with people. It's a special place," he said. Gnass also rec-ommended studying light. "So much of photography is literally of light, recording light," he noted.

By virtue of his photos alone, the book makes a case for safeguarding more of Idaho's lands via officially designated wilderness. But Gnass put his sentiments in words, too. In the preface, he wrote of his dismay at those who "would plume these last unspoiled areas for the chance of a few more board feet of timber or tray ounces of ore."

"I use my photographs to communicate my feelings," he said Thursday. "If I move someone with the framing of the camera or

Barbershop harmonies to blend this weekend

TWIN FALLS — For the past 25 years, barbershop singers in the Magic Valley and across the country have aided the Institute of Logopedics, a Wichita, Kansas-based program for people with severe communication handicaps.

This weekend, local people will be able to see a result of that help when 11-year-old Lindsey Pollard serves as special guest for the Magichords at their annual "One More Time" concert.

The concert will also feature One More Time, a championship quartet from Salt Lake City that boasts a quarter-century of more than a century of barbershop singing experience.

Lindsey, a student at the Institute, was born with severe motor handi-caps. "Doctors said she'd never pick a dime up off the floor, never turn a door knob," says Magichords member Barb Huish, who is also an international trustee for Harmony Foundation, the Barbershop Society organization that works with the Institute.

Lindsey's family brought her to the Institute at age 4, and she has made extraordinary progress, says Huish.

Huish has met Lindsey twice, once at an international barbershop singing contest and again at a dinner in Wichita. On the latter occasion, he recalls, Lindsey sang, receiving a standing ovation for her efforts. The little girl turned to her mother, Judy, who accompanies her on piano and said, "I pulled out the microphone." "Mom, they loved me!"

"She didn't know any different," says Huish. "She's a remarkable young lady." Huish invited the Pollards to Twin Falls for this year's show and, although she has not yet made any arrangements, she accepted.

Barbershop quartets affiliated with the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barbershop Singing in America and the communities who support them — have given \$8 million to the Institute since 1964, according to Huish. In 1988 alone, the Barbershop Society gave \$1 million to the center, which serves 25 children and adults.

Joel song puts history in verse

Past! Pay attention, teachers, parents and sundry other old dudes. The code phrase is, "You can look it up." Say it when some kid with ear-phones on asks what the heck rock singer Billy Joel is talking about when he sings "We Didn't Start the Fire" from his latest album, "Storm Front."

For Joel may have unintentionally provided a powerful teaching tool with the single "We Didn't Start the Fire" from his latest album, "Storm Front."

In rhythmic rhyme, Joel ticks off American cultural benchmarks for the last 40 years, which happens to correspond to the singer's own span of years on the planet.

The song is all over the radio, and Joel performed it in his guest spot on NBC's "Saturday Night Live."

The verse cited above, for example, is for the year 1950. That was the year Sen. Joseph McCarthy began hunting for Communists behind every desk. Nixon came to national prominence in the same cause, the Studebaker hit the streets, television began flickering in many households, Korea became the war-that-was-not-a-war and Monroe starred in no less than six movies staged in her own particular, ahem, impet.

Hey, you can look it up. Get the idea? We keep hearing that today's young people, plugged into rock and tuned out by television, lack a sense of history. Well, taking "We Didn't Start the Fire"

through a verse, by verse search of common reference works would provide exposure to some fairly important developments in world affairs, from space exploration to politics.

And even we who are Joel's age or older might find some references only vaguely resonant and benefit from some rocking research.

Fast forward to Joel's reprise of 1957, for example: "Little Rock, Pasternak, Mickey Muntle, Keroauc, Sputnik, Chew En-Lai, Bridge on the River Kwai."

Did you get them all? An Arkaias civil fights landmark, the Soviet Union's satellite flight and Alec Guinness' popular movie were easy. But Beat Movement writer Jack Kerouac and Russian author Boris Pasternak in the same year?

One of them wrote the bible of an earlier generation's drop-out desire, and the other penned an indictment of the Russian revolution and, a year later, would be forced to return a Nobel Prize for literature.

Hey, you can look it up. Sadly, Joel's verse that most people will not need to research is the last one, which covers more or less where we are these days:

"Whod-of... Bourines... Sallys... Ride... Heavy... Metal... Suicide... Farewell... debts... Homeless... vets... AIDS... Crack... Benie Goetz... Hypodermics on the shores, China's under martial law, Rock and Roller... Cola Wars, I can't take it anymore."

Don't look it up. Look around.

NEW YORK (AP) — In the beginning there was Joan Ganz Cooney and a secretary. Then came Big Bird, Bert and Ernie, the Cookie Monster and more. They still ask if you can tell them, please, how to get to "Sesame Street."

Millions of kids — many of whom now are adults — know the way well. The series started its 21st year Monday on public TV, having grown to a staff of 92, including 10 writers and 13 Muppet players.

For some time now, its audience has been more than American. Its English-language version is seen in more than 80 countries, and it has 15 international co-productions, its makers say.

But it's still aimed at kids aged 1 through 5, particularly those of poor, inner-city families. And the goal of the one-hour series is the same now as in 1969: To teach as well as entertain.

Now costing \$12 million annually to make, 80 per cent of that from commercial licensing of its characters and 20 per cent from PBS stations, according to its makers, it began with definite marching orders.

"I said, 'Let's do a kind of "Laugh-In" for kids,'" recalls Cooney, the founder and since 1988 chairwoman of the Children's Television Workshop, maker of "Sesame Street" and subsequent teach-the-tykes shows.

Here, walk to "Sesame Street" began when it was a TV consultant for the Carnegie Corporation, a foundation she joined after writing a study called "The Potential Uses of Television in Preschool Education."

When she left to start the show, she told its producers it should have animation, puppets, a studio, "and let's not have a single host. Let's have at least four hosts who will be

men, women, black, white, Hispanic, and so on."

Having decreed a pre-Jesse Jackson-Rainbow Coalition, she also wanted each show periodically "interrupted" by "non-commercial" to teach letters and numbers, "the basic education snippets that still air on the show."

And the installation of Jim Henson's Muppets, "was a very artistic decision" in the show's success, says Cooney, a former reporter from Phoenix, Ariz., who also has been an NBC publicist and public TV documentary maker.

Interestingly, Henson's Kermit the Frog, never was a regular. He only was a guest visitor to a CWV spokeswoman says, and he still hops in now and then.

There have been some additions and changes, the biggest of the latter the expanded range of what Cooney calls "curriculum aims."

"Among other things, today's 'Street' watchers get a taste of math and science."

And, Cooney says, they also see teen-agers, a student from Japan, and people with various disabilities, from Down's syndrome to hearing and vision problems. There also are segments on emotions.

"We've dealt with death, with love and marriage, with pregnancy and childbirth, with adoption, with anger," she says. "We also have a goal of teaching children to cooper-

ate — we consciously model the acceptance of all people, of treating people kindly."

Like Oscar the Grouch, Cooney can get a tad testy, but mainly at those who say the first piece of "Sesame Street" has led to the MTV Generation of short attention spans. A bum rap, she submits.

"Street" has longer pieces now, she says, with virtually every show

given a "plotted story line all the way through" that is interwoven for the educational "non-commercial."

"We didn't make MTV possible," she says. "She thought she had made it clean in many speeches, she adds, that "we followed Laugh-In. We followed the revolution of TV. We did not create the revolution in television."

A recent development — the Cable Monster — and such child get cable channel as Nickelodeon and its "Bugs Bunny" and "Road Runner" returns have had an impact on the "Street" audience, but only in the afternoon, she says.

"Our 'Sesame Street' morning audience is not attracted, and that's all ways been our biggest audience," she says. Not '30 in the afternoon, when the pre-schoolers' older brothers and sisters come home from school.

They tend to take over the set. With cable added to their viewing choices, the competition is strong, not only against "Nickelodeon" but also CWV's older-kids' math show, "Square One TV" and its science show, "3, 2, 1 Contact."

As it starts this season, "Street" will portray more teen-agers, and have two new topics, "the environment and geography. The latter, she says, is because "we know our children are not learning geography."

The former, already a semiregular story on network newscasts, is joining the "Street," Cooney says, because "we feel that for their survival, the children had better learn about the environment."

Warhol brother does his own pop art

SMOCK, Pa. (AP) — Paul Warhol swats at bees and plays with pet chickens at his 38-acre farm as he paints pictures of bean cans and ketchup bottles.

It's a long way from the New York art world of his late brother Andy Warhol, and Warhol insists he's not trying to capitalize on the success of his late brother, the American master of pop art.

"I'm painting for my own self-satisfaction because I like it," Warhol said. "I'm not trying to profit or ride on Andy's coattails. I don't want to copy."

Yet Warhol's Heinz vegetarian baked beans and Heinz ketchup bottles, painted on stark white canvas, easily bring to mind the Campbell's soup can image Warhol made into a pricey museum piece.

More than two years after he died at age 58 following gall bladder surgery, Warhol's works are hotter than ever, and the ghost of the Pop icon seems to be everywhere. His "Shot Red Marilyn" fetched \$4 million at Christie's earlier this year, and the publication of his infamous diary has tongues wagging around the world.

Last year, Sotheby's sold \$25.3 million of items from the Warhol estate, including cookie

jars in the shape of pigs and puppies and early 19th century Baltimore furniture. Warhol was on the cover of Newsweek, ABC's "20/20" did a feature on him and Business Week and Forbes wrote about the 10-day auction of the media superstar who wedded fine art to popular culture.

After all, silk-screened Brillo-boxes and Campbell's soup cans weren't exactly considered art before Warhol.

Warhol's paintings may never hang in museums, but that doesn't bother him.

"I didn't want to do anything like the Campbell's soup can. That was Andy's trademark," Warhol said. "It's a lot of fun. If I can sell a few, fine. If I can't, so what?"

Warhol already has a collector, a friend in the metals recycling business who paid \$350 apiece for three paintings, one of them signed, "Andy Warhol's brother." Several other people have agreed to pay \$1,000 for ketchup paintings, Warhol said.

"They didn't get any of Andy's so they figure the closest they can get would be getting one of mine," Warhol said.

Warhol said he never understood why Warhol, born Andrew, Warhol, tried to shroud his past in mystery, rarely referring to his years growing up in Pittsburgh's Soho district and

other parts of town.

Warhol, 67, was the oldest of the three sons of Czech immigrants. Warhol said that when they were growing up, he gave his brother tips on art and bought him paint-by-number sets and movie magazines.

On cold winter nights with no radio and little to do, he recalls sitting in the kitchen near the coal stove, tracing the Sunday comics and drawing.

"Andy wasn't much involved in sports. What do you do in the winter time? You sit at the table. You draw pictures," he said.

Later, Warhol said he paid his brother \$2 a day to help him sell fruit in the city's warehouse Strip District. Warhol was a student at the Carnegie Institute of Technology, and art clashed with enterprise. "What did Andy do?" Warhol said. "He brings his sketch pad along. I'd be shouting, 'Cantaloupes, peaches, apple, corn.' And meanwhile, Andy's sketching."

After graduating, Warhol left Pittsburgh for New York City, changed his name and rarely returned to Pittsburgh.

Warhol always wanted to dabble in art, but raising seven children and running a scrap metal yard in Pittsburgh left little time for hobbies.

Funding is restored for AIDS art exhibit

NEW YORK (AP) — The National Endowment for the Arts reversed itself and awarded a \$10,000 grant to an AIDS art exhibit just hours before the show was scheduled to open.

Endowment chairman John E. Frohnmayer, who toured the show and discussed the grant with a group of New York City artists on Wednesday, announced the decision.

"After consulting with members of the National Council on the Arts, several of whom have also seen the show, I have agreed to approve the request of Artists Space ... and will release the grant for the exhibition only," said Frohnmayer. The endowment said it will not fund the show's catalog, which Frohnmayer has called too political to merit federal support.

The show, "Witnesses Against Our Vanishing," opened Thursday at Artists Space, said Susan Wyatt, the private gallery's executive director.

Frohnmayer had said at a Wednesday news conference that he planned to discuss the funding issue with members of the endowment and "reflect on what I've seen" in a

quick tour Wednesday morning.

"The part of the show I've had a chance to see lacked artistic merit," Frohnmayer said.

The show, featuring works by 23 painters, sculptors and photographers that portray the effects of acquired immune deficiency syndrome on the arts community, was interrupted by the funding controversy, Wyatt said.

Frohnmayer said last week that the endowment was withholding the \$10,000 because the show's content differed from what its grant application said—and because the show lacked artistic merit.

The endowment had approved a grant in May for the show, which has some sexual images. But since then, Congress has passed a law putting limits on federal support of art that could be deemed to be obscene.

Frohnmayer has objected to the catalog for the AIDS exhibit for its denunciation of Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., chief sponsor of the anti-obscenity law, and other public figures, who have taken a conservative position on the AIDS issue.



Home taping cuts sales up to 22 percent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Home taping may be causing as much as a 22 percent loss in prerecorded music sales, a congressional report said.

The report, which Congress will use as it considers possible legislation dealing with existing taping and future taping from new technologies such as digital audio tape and erasable recordable compact discs, showed 41 percent of people over age 10 had taped recorded music in the previous year.

That compared with 21-22 percent in a 1976-79 survey, but was about the same as 1982, the Office of Technology Assessment said.

The survey also found that most people tape from their own record-

ings or those of family members and that they think the practice should continue to be allowed without extra compensation to recording artists or manufacturers. But, overwhelming-

ly, they thought taping for sale was wrong.

"Tapers—and non-tapers—agreed that taping to save money was acceptable, but taping to make money was wrong," the study said.

"It is noteworthy that none of the alternative approaches of limiting recording technology or imposing new fees seemed to have an identifiable constituency among the public," OTA said.

In general, tapers, purchasers of prerecorded products and non-tapers seemed to feel that it

was fair to leave current home taping practices unchanged.

OTA, which advises Congress on technological issues, said the survey was conducted by phone with 1,501 people last September and October. The margin of error was plus or minus three percentage points.

OTA found that 57 percent of those who had taped in the previous year thought they could have bought the material if they had wished. Of those, 49 percent said they would have bought it if they had been unable to tape. In 77 percent of the cases in which the taper could have purchased, the taper said that it he or

she had bought the recording, it would have been in addition to other recordings purchased, rather than in place of them.

In recent years, Aumont has appeared in French television regularly and on American TV in such shows as "Hill to Hill" and "The Love Boat."

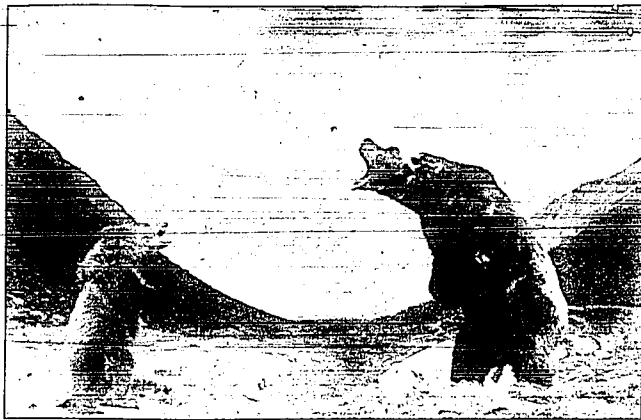

Moviemaker pursues quest to film 'something different'

LOS ANGELES — French filmmaker Jean-Jacques Annaud recently talked about why he has spent the last 10 years making three highly original films, "Quest for Fire," "The Name of the Rose" and "The Bear."

"I always see audiences begging for something different," he said. "It's difficult to make something different today. Many films have been made, and there are many good filmmakers around. To bring something fresh to the screen is difficult, let's face it."

"This is what pushes me. It's so pleasant seeing people come out of the cinema having the impression that they discovered something new. They are happily surprised, and I think that's a great reward."

"The Bear" is unquestionably different. Based on the old James Oliver Curwood novel, "The Grizzly King," it tells the battles of a small cub and a huge male bear against hunters and nature. The film already has grossed more than \$100 million in Europe.

"The large part of the battle is to explain to the public the nature of this film. It's an entertainment, it's not documentary. It's not the old-fashioned Disney animal picture. It's not a wilderness picture," he said.

"When I tell people my last film is about two bears, they're convinced it's for kids. It's not a National Geographic (television) special. How can I explain to people that it is something that they have not seen yet? Unfortunately we arrived here, the Hollywood Reporter said it was similar to 'E.T.' Thank you."

Annaud's history with "The Bear" dates back to 1981, when he had finished his prehistoric adventure, "Quest for Fire." He fell in love with Curwood's book, then was sidetracked by "The Name of the Rose."

"The Bear" was launched in 1986. Annaud, himself a bear of a man with curly, graying hair and a charming accent, plunged himself into the new project, exploring locations, checking out bear trainers, steeping himself in animal behavior.

"The Bear" was filmed in Europe, the Dolomites from May 18, 1987, to the following Sept. 21. The difficulties with animals, weather and managing a 200-person crew were enormous, but Annaud was exhilarated by his actors.

"Bears are very fascinating animals," he said. "They are as intelligent as dogs, but they have something dogs do not: They spend a lot of their time standing up. Because of that, there is immediate identification with human beings."

"Take a lion. A fascinating animal, but it remains about a bear is a beast in the four-leg version. Very hairy. Very noisy. It's fascinating, he's so powerful. Suddenly, he stands up (Annaud demonstrates, beaklike). The front legs look like arms. They use their paws like arms. Their claws like fingers. If you see a bear eat an apple, it's just like a human."

The two principals were played by Bart, a Baltimore Zoo grizzly trained by Doug Seus of Utah, and Douce ("sweet"), a cub from a French zoo. Were there days when the two stars simply didn't want to act?

"Of course," said the director. "Any star you work with has bad days. Stars are very temperamental. So are bears. You cannot push them."

In any case, I would not advise a director to push a star. A star must be happy in front of the camera — especially when they are bears and they can kill you if you're not.

"I swear that if you try to get something from an animal, who is not in a good mood, not only will you not get it that day, you will never get it. What you have to do is organize the set so the animal will be happy with its own instincts, digging in its own nature to discover what it would do in such a circumstance. He would in effect rewrite the script."

He cited the example of a scene in which the grizzly scratches its back on a tree. The scene took days of preparation: finding a tree with rough bark, laying a cement platform at the base and covering it with moss, surrounding the tree with rocks, putting sand on the bear's back so it would itch. A few seconds on the screen, the scene took a day to shoot.

"My first concern with the film was that no animal would get hurt," said Annaud. "Second concern, although there is no Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Technicians nor Actors — because they're not endangered species — I was very worried about working every day with those enormous monsters."

He became more worried toward the end of shooting because no incidents had occurred. One girl had tried to remove her finger from the cub's mouth and nearly lost her finger when the cub bit down. The only other casualty was Annaud himself. He "foolishly" posed for photographs with Bart in the cage. Like some stars in the movie, Bart turned on his director in a bad mood.

'Bear' stays unsentimental

HOLLYWOOD — In a world squandering its natural resources and slaughtering its wildlife, we sometimes sentimentalize over the carnage. As we strip the land, we mourn its passing. As we kill off one species after another, we chuck, often impotently, over their destruction.

Remarkably, Jean-Jacques Annaud's new film, "The Bear" avoids most of these sentimental traps. Based on a 1916 children's book by the American naturalist James Oliver Curwood, it is the story of two bears — a fierce grizzly and a lovable cub — pursued implacably by two human hunters in the Canadian Rockies.

And though the outline of the movie's story — the cub Youk losing its mother in a landslide triggered by her addiction to honey, its introduction to the wounded grizzly will-the-relevant-relationship — may suggest a male-bonding version of "Bambi," the material never gets weepy or cloying. Annaud and his collaborators charge it with a sweep and exhilaration starting for a family-oriented movie. You would have to go back to the island section of Carroll Ballard's 1979 "The Black Stallion" to find something comparable.

Part of that exhilaration comes from the landscapes: Inspired by the paintings of Albert Bierstadt and Caspar Friedrich, Annaud shot much of "The Bear" in the Bavarian Alps, in a spectacular environment of 10,000-foot-high peaks, snowy slopes and pine forests. The cinematographer, the great color stylist Philippe Rousselot ("Diva," "The Emerald Forest"), bathes them in frosty daylight.

Some of the exhilaration comes from the astonishing empathy the movie develops with and between

the bears — partly, of course, through sheer trickery (the many dubbed yaps and yelps of adorable Youk), but also through staggering work by trainers Doug and Lynn Seus and Clint Younggreen. When you watch Youk waving goodbye to some human friends, craning to get a better look and then slumping dejectedly to the ground, you never think of how he is being manipulated. The action and the shot have an almost magical rightness.

And much of the charges comes simply from the movie's philosophy, the reverence for life in the Curwood quote — "The greatest thrill is not to kill but to let live" — used as the epigraph. The film makers insist you watch the animals, make you see the world through their eyes, romping with them, running tearful

ly or attacking in anger, mourning death or curling up gratefully together in the chilly darkness — even, in some surreal sequences, dreaming their dreams.

Equally, we get the viewpoint of the two hunters (Jack Wallace and Tetchy Karyon). These men are not drembedded villains. Their pursuit of Youk comes not through viciousness but vendetta and pride; they want to avenge the horses and dogs he has clawed or killed. He is also, for them both, a symbol of prowess and mystical strength.

Kaar (played by the Montana-based Kodiak, Bart) becomes like the master warrior of a Kurosawa film. When he rubs his back magnetically against a staving tree, it is a gesture of goodly machismo that un- like Toshio Mifune's shoulder twitch in "Yojimbo."

New miniseries brings fifth Krantz husband, wife collaboration to TV

Nice work if you can get it: You write a best-selling novel; your husband buys the rights and produces it for TV.

No wonder Steve and Judith Krantz have homes in Los Angeles AND Paris. The husband-and-wife duo have collaborated to bring four of Judith Krantz's five novels to television in what is undoubtedly a marriage made in fiscal heaven.

But don't be envious. Although the money is good, the creative relationship must put a tremendous strain on the marital relationship, right? We mean, writers rarely agree with the on-screen interpretation of their work, so one would guess that the "Steve and Judy Show" is not all roses. Tell us, Judy, you and Steve have all kinds of fights and disagreements; don't you? Come on now, admit it. It's like the Battling Bickersons at the breakfast table, right?

"Oh, no," says the glamour queen of pulp, whose adventure-romances "Scorpions," "Princess Daisy," "Mistral's Daughter" and "I'll Take Manhattan" have all been made into miniseries. When one of her books is adapted by her producer-husband for TV, Krantz insists the only thing she gets obsessive about is — are you ready for this? — wardrobe.

"I always want to see the actresses dressed the way my characters are in the book. And I want to see their hair exactly the same. And I get nuts when that doesn't happen."

Krantz's latest book to come to television is "Till We Meet Again" (CBS, Sunday, Nov. 19, and Tuesday, Nov. 21), starring Michael-York and Courteney Cox. Bruce Boxleitner and Barry Bostwick in the usual story of "romance, adventure, and betrayal" set against "the sweeping events" of two World Wars. Like a Krantz novel, the five-hour miniseries is entertainment, not art, designed to serve a mass audience's taste for romantic trash and escapist fantasy.

"Till We Meet Again" is the story of the de Lancel women — mother Eve (Lucy Gutteridge) and her daughters Delphine (Mia Sara) and Freddy (Cox). Eve is a Paris dancehall performer — a floozy by the convention of the day — who falls in love and marries Paul de Lancel (York), a widowed diplomat, and heir to a French champagne dynasty. Because executive producer Steve Krantz insists American audiences have a difficult time with French accents, British actors play the parts of Frenchmen with mixed results, and that's putting it kindly. York and

Hugh Grant (as de Lancel's son, Bruno) seem hopelessly miscast.

As the story develops, Freddy de Lancel discovers a passion for flying. She becomes a Hollywood stunt pilot and, during World War II, a transport pilot ferrying planes for the RAF. Bostwick and Boxleitner play stereotypical American flyboys with the stereotypical flyboy names of Mac and Jock.

Despite Krantz's success in bringing her books to the small screen (CBS made the commitment for "Till We Meet Again" from galley proofs before the book was even published), the author insists she has never written a book with TV in mind.

"I make an absolutely conscious effort to forget that there's a possibility of it becoming a miniseries, because then I would be writing the framework for a miniseries when what I'm trying to write is simply a book that will be read."

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Harry may have lost her 'biting edge'

NBC takes big lead in ratings; Cosby heads list of six comedies in top 10

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Nielsen ratings for last week looked like a replay of the week before as NBC led the way with six of its half-hour comedies at the top.

NBC's "The Cosby Show" was first and ABC's "Roseanne" was again in fourth place. Every show in the Top 10 was a regular series. Eight were repeaters from last week.

NBC took a commanding lead in the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings for the week ended Nov. 12 with an average of 15.4. ABC was second with 12.7 and CBS was third with 11.8. A rating is the percentage of the nation's 92.1 million homes tuned to a show.

The Top 10 were: NBC's "The Cosby Show," NBC's "Cheers," NBC's "A Different World," ABC's "Roseanne," NBC's "Golden Girls," NBC's "L.A. Law," NBC's "Dear John" and "Empty Nest" tied, CBS' "60 Minutes," and NBC's "Unsolved Mysteries" and ABC's "The Wonder Years" tied.

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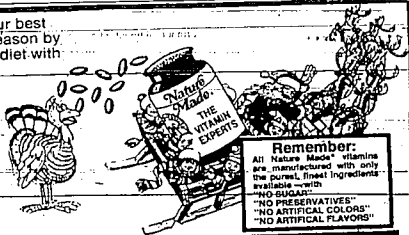

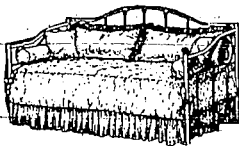
