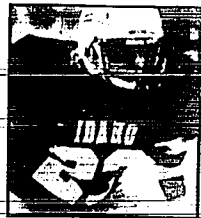


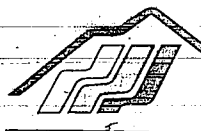

## Holiday sales jump for Twin Falls stores

TWIN FALLS — Following on the heels of last year's Christmas buying boom, some retailers thought holiday sales would be down this year.

But tallies the day after Thanksgiving, traditionally the biggest shopping day of the year, proved them wrong as businesses reported increases ranging from "just slight" rises to 20 percent jumps.

No businesses contacted Friday reported

a drop in sales compared with the same day last year.

"Sales are basically up," said Ed Hinkle, manager of Claude's Sports in the Blue Lakes Mall. "They're probably up by 15 percent."

"We are crowded," said Doug Sharp, manager of The Bon Marche at the Magic Valley Mall. "This is terrific. We're doing great and we're up about 20 percent."

Sharp said he was surprised at the increase, especially when the area has two

## Dubcek returns to Prague as Czechs oust hard-liners

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia — Hard-line Communist Party chief Milos Jakes resigned Friday—forced from power by a week-of-massive-pro-democracy-protests that surpassed even the "Prague Spring" of 1968.

Jakes became the third Soviet bloc leader to be swept out of office in a stunning five-week wave of political upheaval that has washed over the Communist world in Eastern Europe.

The party Central Committee elected little-known Karel Urbanek, member of the party's ruling Politburo only since October 1988, to replace Jakes who resigned Friday, along with the rest of the 13-man Politburo and Secretariat.

At the end of a 16-hour closed-door session that lasted until early Saturday the Central Committee reshuffled the Politburo, shrinking it to nine members. It elected Urbanek and five holdovers along with three unknown new men, Josef Cizek, Miroslav Huscava and Miroslav Zajic.

Premier Ladislav Adamec, who broke with years of policy Friday by meeting opposition activists, was among those Politburo members who lost their seats, meaning a new premier will likely be named soon.

Thousands of people poured into Wednesday's square to take Friday-night dancing, singing and popping champagne corks at the news of the old Politburo's resignation. The joyous celebration — one week after police clubbed peaceful protesters — capped a day in which 30,000 people jammed the square for the triumphant return of Alexander Dubcek, the bold reformer ousted in 1968.

## Army may feel sharpest cuts

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney, providing the first public signal of the Bush administration's priorities in an age of shrinking defense budgets, said Friday that the United States must preserve its naval supremacy and modernize its strategic nuclear weapons.

Implicitly, that could put the burden of budget cutting primarily on the Army.

Declaring that the role of U.S. ground forces in Europe is "up for grabs," Cheney suggested that the priority is with the "Angels Times that the task of maintaining ground forces on the Continent could be left to the NATO allies."

He called his comments "a reflection of the strategic situation: We are the major maritime power, just like the Soviets are a major land-based power."

According to Cheney, one possible future for NATO would give Washington's North Atlantic allies the principal role in defending European soil, while the U.S. would focus on naval and air forces in the alliance.

"Should the U.S., as some have suggested, take on a role that emphasizes more heavily the U.S. obligation in the naval area and in

## Darman forces agencies to fight for slice of pie

WASHINGTON — White House Budget Director Richard Darman has hatched a novel two-track approach for President Bush's new budget that will force federal agencies to compete to fund their high-priority programs, officials said Friday.

Darman's strategy, revealed in a letter sent earlier in the week to Cabinet secretaries, has left agency budget officers scrambling to meet the new requirements in time for submission of the administration's 1991 budget to Congress on Jan. 8.

Budget officers from various agencies were spending the holiday weekend at their desks, working to meet a Monday deadline for submitting their budget appeals to the Office of Management and Budget, headed by Darman.

The agencies submitted their initial requests to the agency on Sept. 1. Last Monday, they got the bad news on what reduced funding levels the budget office will be recommending.

Along with the proposed funding levels was a letter from Darman explaining a new appeal process the agencies must follow in trying to overturn budget office decisions.

In his letter, first revealed in Friday's Washington Post, Darman said that the agencies seeking increases "will have to compete with each other for resources that are in a limited pool."

In an interview taped for weekend broadcast on Cable News Network, Darman outlined his reasons for the change.

"Previously, 'An agency would recommend a very big increase. The Office of Management and Budget would say, no, no, that's too much, and then the fight would be within that range. And it was a tendency for presidents to come along and split the difference, so you would always be leveling up," Darman said.

"What this is saying is, if anybody has ideas for meritorious investment, as they see it, fine. Let's have them compete against all other ideas and in the end we'll take the best ideas."

## Former drunken drivers gear up for highway sobriety campaign

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. — Members of Drunk Drivers Against Driving Drunk say they hope their painful experiences will encourage others not to flirt with the dangerous pastime of drinking and driving.

"We're like blood brothers," said member Larry Carlisle. "We've been to the pits and now we've been able to get our lives back together again and we want to be able to go out into the community and tell them and explain to them why (drunken drivers) have to be controlled. I think somebody who's been through it three times has got a pretty good insight into it."

DDADD, made up of about a dozen people, including advisers, was formed three years ago by people who had been sent to the Western Massachusetts Correctional Center for multiple drunken driving offenses, group coordinator Roy Carter said. However, the group is not affiliated with the center, which was created to house the increased number of people sent to jail when Massachusetts toughened its drunken

## Hard liquor drinking at 30-year low

ATLANTA — American consumption of hard liquor has fallen to its lowest level in three decades, federal health researchers reported Friday.

The national Centers for Disease Control reported that per-capita consumption of distilled spirits in 1986, the last year for which complete statistics are available, was the lowest since 1959.

The average American drank 0.85 gallons of spirits in 1986, the lowest since 1959's 0.84 gallons, according to researcher Darryl Bertolucci of the Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health Administration.

Preliminary statistics indicate that the decline continued in 1987, to 0.83 gallons, Bertolucci said.

Distilled spirits are hard liquors such as whiskey, rum, vodka or gin. Beer and wine, which are fermented but not distilled, are considered separately.

However, CDC statistics show that consumption of alcoholic beverages as a whole is on the decline.

In its weekly report, the CDC said the drop in consumption of distilled spirits between 1985 and 1986 was the sharpest

in a fatal crash.

"My story was that I had a 32-year history of abuse of drugs and alcohol and I reached a point where I was convicted of three DUI's in the course of 18 months," he said. The loss of his home, friends and possessions coupled with a barrage of counseling helped him admit to having a problem, Carlisle said.

"I was lucky," he said, "I drove many times under the influence of alcohol but fortunately I never hurt any one."

The 51-year-old tool-and-die maker said he got away with driving drunk for more than two decades, but tougher driving laws promoted by Gov. Michael S. Dukakis sent him to the correctional center. "It's the best thing that Dukakis did," he said.

Despite its masculine sounding acronym, the Western Massachusetts Correctional Center said the name wasn't meant as a challenge to the well-known MADD, Mothers Against Drunk Driving.

DDADD was formally incorporated in August under the name Former Drunk Drivers Against Driving Drunk, Carter said.

Anne Russell, assistant director of public affairs at the national headquarters of MADD in Hialeah, Fla., said the concept of former drunken drivers voluntarily engaging in educational efforts appeared to be new.

Ellen Naponcetta of the local chapter of MADD said she thought the appearance of DDADD was a good thing.

"They are taking responsibility now for their choices," she said.

Thousands of people have filled the streets of Prague and other cities demanding democratic reforms and the end of the Communists' monopoly on power. They have been the largest demonstrations in the nation's history.

Jakes have underestimated completely the process taking place in Poland, Hungary and especially recently in East Germany, and their effect and influence on our society," said Jakes.

In December 1987, Jakes was named Communist Party chief to succeed Gustav Husak, who came to power in April 1969, eight months after the Soviet-led invasion of Czechoslovakia.

Jakes, 67, is a bureaucrat and party functionary whose speech and personality have made little or no public impact despite his long years in high office.

Dubcek, 67, made his first public appearance in Prague since the party purge in June 1970. Since his ouster, he has "worked" as a low-level employee of the state forestry services and has lived in virtual seclusion.

"Dubcek, Dubcek!" and "Long live Dubcek!" the flag-waving crowd yelled as he appeared in Wenceslas Square, the site of repeated pro-democracy demonstrations. He urged them to unite to improve the country.

"The ideal of socialism with a human face is living in the conditions of a new generation," Dubcek said. "We must unify to raise our country to a higher level."

CAMP DAVID, Md. (AP) President Bush and British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher discussed the NATO alliance amid rapid East bloc changes Friday — and were described as "in very close accord" — as he prepared for his talks next week with Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev.

On an issue of crucial concern to Western allies in Europe, the two leaders agreed on the need for European stability as NATO faces the changes in Eastern Europe, presidential press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said after the 44-hour meeting.

Mrs. Thatcher told reporters after the talks that "NATO is absolutely vital for continued stability of Europe." She said the allies have agreed on a strategy of, "Don't disarm too fast ... so that neither their security nor our security is in jeopardy. That's absolutely vital."

President Bush also sought to play down the importance of results from the summit next weekend. "I don't

think there will be a great deal of difficulty or sudden surprises," she said at a press conference in Washington.

Fitzwater said that among other topics, "The president and prime minister discussed reforms underway in the Soviet Union and agreed on support for glasnost and perestroika, new Soviet openness and economic restructuring." They both emphasized the pursuit of democracy as the first step in the reform process, "in talking of East-West relations and European stability, he said.

The two leaders, joined by advisers, talked on a snowbound day at Bush's country retreat, where the president and his family are spending a long Thanksgiving holiday weekend.

"I'm just interested in getting the views of the prime minister on the rapid changes in Eastern Europe and the strength of the alliance and everything else. So we've got a good full agenda," Bush told

reporters after Mrs. Thatcher arrived by helicopter.

Mrs. Thatcher, in her news conference later described their talks as "very relaxed, very valuable."

Bush, lightly clad in a sports jacket against the frigid temperatures, and Mrs. Bush, in a down jacket, along with their daughter Dorothy LaBond, greeted Mrs. Thatcher and her entourage and then drove in golf carts to their house.

Bush told Mrs. Thatcher, "I'm so glad you're here. This is so timely," an apparent reference to summit talks with Gorbachev next weekend on ships in the Mediterranean off the coast of Malta.

Mrs. Thatcher had been expected to emphasize her view that the Soviet Union and the moves toward democratic reform in Eastern Europe should not lead to a weakening of the NATO defensive posture.

Later in the interview he said, "The U.S. is now and will continue to be the preeminent naval power in the world," even as cuts are made in the overall defense budget. "In addition, he said, "we're going to want to make sure our strategic nuclear capability," adding finally that the preservation of adequate conventional forces would be another demand.

Cheney's views reflect those of many lawmakers and defense analysts, who have said that as budgets shrink and the Soviet military threat to Western Europe diminishes, the United States may plot a return to an American reliance on light mobile nuclear forces, which are useful in Third World brush fires, and on nuclear systems, which are relatively inexpensive to build and operate.

"There is an irreducible minimum of defense capability that the United States is going to require, no matter what happens in the Soviet Union," Cheney said. "We are a superpower, and we're always going to want to have the capacity to deploy military force to safeguard American interests and to preserve our capacity to influence events in the world," he added.

jubilation crowd. Later, when he heard the news of the resignations, Dubcek and top officials at the party conference turned to their feet, shouted "Hooray!" and hugged each other joyously.

Urbank, 48, is the former party leader of the Czech republic. He was a surprise choice to break with the rigid policies in place since Warsaw Pact tanks crushed Czechoslovakia's reforms in 1968. His selection, on a vote of 136-7, seemed designed to boost the party's flagging standing after a week of nationwide calls for its reform-resistant leaders to resign.

Jakes said the party had not instituted reforms quickly enough and had underestimated the effect of the pro-democracy movement sweeping Eastern Europe.

In Washington, the State Department said it hoped Urbank "will act swiftly to address the long-awaited desires of the Czechoslovakian people for civil liberties, political freedom and basic human rights." British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, also in Washington, said, "We have great hopes that Czechoslovakia will also become a democracy."

In a terse dispatch, the official news agency CTK announced: "The general secretary of the Czechoslovak Communist Party, Miroslav Jakes, and all other members of the ruling Politburo and Secretariat submitted their resignations so that a new leadership of the party could be elected, Jakes said he hoped the newly elected organs of the party would continue to carry out the implementation of the process of restructuring and democratization."

Restructuring and democratization have been key terms used by Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev, who has inspired the reforms that have swept through his own nation, Poland, Hungary, East Germany and Bulgaria.

Czechoslovakia's leaders, who were installed after Warsaw Pact tanks crushed Dubcek's "Prague Spring" reform movement in 1968, had resisted most of the reforms adopted by their formerly hard-line Communist allies. Earlier this year, however, they allowed thousands of East German refugees to pass through Czechoslovakia on their way to West Germany.

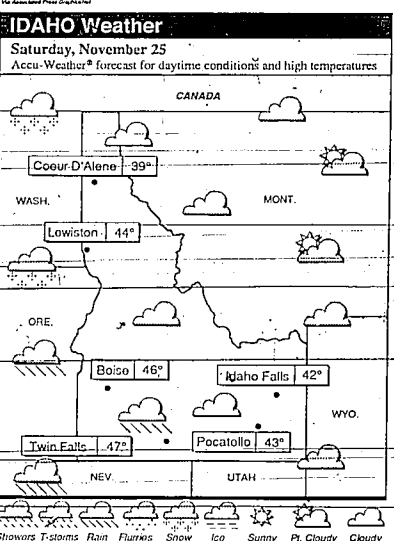
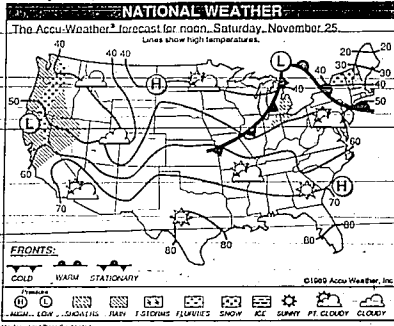

## Shopping

Large liquidation sales have accompanied closure announcements by The Mode Ltd. and The Paris Co. Downtown merchants emitted enthusiasm about sales Friday as well. Friday's sales are an indication of a pessimistic retail outlook, which fits with this year's economic trends for Twin Falls County.

In the third quarter, from July to September, retail sales were up about 3 percent, or \$4.5 million, according to the Idaho Department of Revenue and Taxation.

The fourth quarter's results won't be in until the end of the year. "If the pattern stays and continues, then we anticipate an awfully strong fourth quarter," said Jon Osban, manager of the Jerome Winslow's Department Store.

What the economy was doing didn't matter to kids showing parents favorite toys Friday at The Toy Shop in Bliss. Manager Shanna Harvey said "Holiday Barbie," a special edition, has topped little girls' lists of top toys, while Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles action figures have earned the top spot among boys.

Electric trains are "really hot" this year as well, Harvey said, as are several dolls such as "Little Miss Makeup," "PJ Sparkle!" and "Billion Babies."

Empty parking stalls were scarce Friday as shoppers looked for Christmas bargains and holiday gifts. Malls teemed with shoppers of all ages, most carrying multiple packages as they strolled through stores.

Despite the lack of snow, sporting goods stores said sales were brisk Friday. "We were expecting a little drop today just because there's no snow on the ground," Claude S. Sports Hints said. "The weather was a 'standing room only' in his store Friday."

Kathy Harris of Kathy's, a Main Avenue clothing store, said sales were up, just a touch, from the same day last year. "I think our economy is the farm economy and I think they've had another good year," Harris said. "And that's bound to help Christmas sales."

In addition to clothing, knickknacks and sporting goods, big-ticket items sold well Friday also. Robert Gillespie, owner of Banner Furniture, described the day as "exciting and sales were good." He said sales were probably up a little bit, attributing the increase to both the store's recent move to Main Avenue and the economy's health.

Dennis Blevins, manager of Blevins clothing store downtown, summed up the day: "We're going against a really big day last year and we're holding our own," he said. "We feel really good about that."

**'Slinky' animal pull toys recalled**

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than 40,000 models of a classic American toy have been recalled because paint used on them may contain too much lead, according to the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

The agency also says hundreds of thousands of clown dolls are being recalled because they pose a choking hazard.

The makers of "Slinky" animal pull toys, a variation on the standard accordion-like wired toy, are voluntarily recalling them because the red paint used on the eyes, tongue and cheeks may contain a higher percentage of lead than the agency allows.

CPS' standards limit to .06 percent the lead content of paint used on children's items.

The 43,000 Slinky toys sold since 1986 have red and white pull cords and come in the form of a train, worm, seal, frog, caterpillar, dolphin and kitten. They are made by James Industries Inc. of Hollidaysburg, Pa.

**Stranded murderer dies of leukemia**

DENVER (AP) — Doctors tried for five years to fuse the 10 personalities of Ross Carlson so he could stand trial for the murder of his parents. His attorney believes death succeeded where the doctors failed.

"I think death was the final solution that caused the fusion of the personalities, which the state hospital refused to do," said Walter Gerash, who represented Carlson throughout the case.

Carlson died Thursday at University Hospital of complications from leukemia. He was 19 when the crimes were committed, and 25 when he died.

He was charged with the Aug. 18, 1983, killings of his parents, Rod and Marilyn Carlson, whose bodies were found beside an isolated road in Douglas County, just south of Denver. They were found face down, shot to death.

**Stranded expedition returns from pole**

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Eleven journalists and one scientist were flown to Chile on Friday after being stranded for about two weeks in Antarctica, a spokeswoman for a South Pole expedition announced.

The group had been dropped off at a camp of the International Trans-Antarctic Expedition on Nov. 8, and was supposed to be picked up about four days later. But the expedition's plane was grounded when it ran low on fuel and was forced to land on remote King George Island, off the west coast of Antarctica.

With the plane finally refueled this week, the dozen people were picked up and taken to the expedition's base in Punta Arenas, Chile, spokeswoman Cathy de Mott said in St. Paul. All were reported to be in good health.

**Nicaragua issues visa to U.S. attache**

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — The Sandinista government has issued a visa for a new U.S. Embassy military attache for another quiet attempt to warm diplomatic relations between the two countries.

According to one source, Nicaragua recently offered to exchange ambassadors, but the report could not be immediately confirmed.

Both countries expelled each other's ambassadors in July 1988, along with seven other diplomatic officers apiece.

U.S. Army Lt. Col. Dennis Quinn, the new military attache, arrived in Nicaragua two weeks ago, as soon as his visa was issued by the Nicaragua government, said a U.S. Embassy spokesman who spoke on condition his name not be used.

**3rd victim sought in demolished boat**

AVALON, Calif. (AP) — The Coast Guard searched Friday near Santa Catalina Island for a third person who may have been with a couple found floating dead amid the mysteriously demolished remains of their boat.

Two bodies were found Thursday afternoon and the search for a third began after relatives of the victims were contacted, said Petty Officer Dennis Ramirez.

Investigators could not say whether the cabin cruiser Lucky R was destroyed in a collision or by explosion. However, there was no sign of fire and the bodies were not burned, Ramirez said.

**Congressman's autopsy results clear**

HATTIESBURG, Miss. (AP) — Toxicology tests showed no abnormalities that could be the cause of an Aug. 13 plane crash that killed Rep. Larkin Smith and his pilot, the coroner said.

The tests turned up no drugs or alcohol in either man's blood. Perry County Coroner Randall Carnahan said Wednesday night. He also said carbon monoxide levels were within normal limits.

**Judge dismisses Iran-Contra trial of CIA man**

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge threw out the Iran-Contra case against a former CIA station chief Friday, two days after Attorney General Dick Thornburgh barred courtroom use of classified information on CIA facilities and programs in Central America.

U.S. District Court Judge Claude Hilton said criminal charges against Joseph Fernandez focusing on his help to Oliver North's secret Contra resupply network must be dropped.

Classified material the government refuses to divulge "is essential to this defendant," said the judge.

Associate independent counsel Lawrence Shtasel asked Hilton for more time to work out a compromise with the CIA to preserve part of the case, but the judge refused, saying his rulings about classified information in the Fernandez matter "have been known" for "quite some time." They were issued in July.

Iran-Contra prosecutors will try to revive the case in the U.S. Court of Appeals in Richmond, Va., where they filed a notice of appeal following the session before Hilton in Alexandria, Va.

Shtasel complained that Thornburgh and U.S. intelligence agencies "have made bringing this case to trial extremely difficult."

The office of independent counsel Lawrence Walsh has called the data

the government is protecting "fictional secrets" that are widely known to the public.

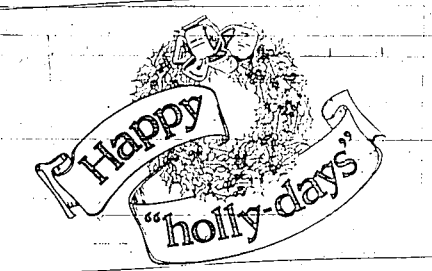
The information protected by an affidavit Thornburgh filed Wednesday concerns the locations of three CIA facilities, including stations in El Salvador and Honduras.

The government also is refusing to allow details to surface about three CIA programs in Costa Rica, the country where Fernandez was CIA station chief.

Fernandez's defense in part is that some of his activities on behalf of North were intertwined with initiatives by Costa Rica to protect itself from possible invasion by Nicaragua. Fernandez asserts, for example, that he did not lie when he told the CIA inspector general that an airstrip built by the North network was an initiative of the Costa Rican government.

North, the former White House aide, is appealing his conviction on three charges: destroying government documents, aiding and abetting in the obstruction of Congress, and accepting an illegal gratuity.

Last July 24, the day Fernandez's trial was to begin, Hilton rejected a last-minute proposal by the Justice Department and independent counsel to substitute numbers for the CIA facilities and to drop part of one charge dealing with an airstrip to



avoid delving into the programs. The Justice Department delayed the Fernandez case for four months by seeking to appeal Hilton's rulings, but was turned away by the appeals court in Richmond, Va., between the Justice Department and Walsh's office worsened during the delay, and the independent counsel's office wasn't shown the attorney general's affidavit until it was filed in court.

**Officials find link between drug and blood disorder**

ATLANTA (AP) — Federal health officials said Friday they have found "statistically significant evidence that the nutritional supplement L-tryptophan causes a painful blood disorder now reported in 427 cases and at least one death."

The studies appear to have very strongly linked the actual taking of these tablets and capsules with the disease. Centers for Disease Control researcher Dr. Henry Falk said. It now "seems extraordinarily likely" that taking L-tryptophan causes the blood disorder, he said.

The disorder, known as eosinophilia-myalgia syndrome, brings an abnormally high number of white blood cells called eosinophils, and causes severe muscle pain or myalgia.

L-tryptophan is a building block of protein, which is found naturally in a number of foods. Pills and capsules containing doses of the substance are taken by some people for insomnia, depression, premenstrual syndrome or weight control.

Since reports of L-tryptophan and the blood disorder surfaced in New Mexico several weeks ago, hundreds of case reports have come into the CDC, with most cases occurring after July of this year, Falk said.

A 58-year-old New York woman who died from the disorder in September is the first confirmed fatality in the outbreak, and several other deaths are still under investigation in other states, Falk said.

The Atlanta-based CDC, in its weekly report, cited studies in New Mexico and Minnesota which "establish a statistically significant association" between the product and the disease.

In New Mexico, each of 12 blood-disorder patients studied from May 1 to Nov. 11 had used L-tryptophan. In Minnesota, another 12 cases were investigated, and again, all had used L-tryptophan.

The studies show a "causal relationship," said Falk, director of the CDC's Environmental Hazards and Health Effects Division. "We don't yet know what exactly about those tablets and capsules has caused the disease."

The disease has now been reported in 43 states and the District of Columbia. The number of L-tryptophan users nationwide remains unknown, but it appears to be large, Falk said.

Some of the first potential cases of L-tryptophan-related EMS could not be confirmed. But all state health departments now have a detailed definition of the disease, and states are reporting new cases daily, Falk said.

Minnesota researchers, in a recent follow-up study, found that 20 of 30 EMS cases were among patients using brands of L-tryptophan from one particular manufacturer.

## Animal rights activists protest fur sales 1st day of Yule season

Animal rights activists held demonstrations around the nation on Friday to protest fur sales on the opening day of the holiday shopping season, hoping to shame shoppers into abandoning their quest for fur-lined garments.

Game show host Bob Barker, the host of "The Price is Right," led 2,500 activists down New York City's Fifth Avenue to tell shoppers the price is always wrong when it comes to buying fur.

It was Barker's second year leading the "Fur-Free Friday" protest, now in its fourth year.

Demonstrators also marched in Harrisburg, Pa., Corpus Christi, Texas, and Syracuse, N.Y., and protests were scheduled in dozens of other cities around the nation, according to Trans Species Unlimited, animal rights group.

In Harrisburg, where about 75 people marched, protesters filled a black coffin with about \$10,000 worth of mink, fox, and rabbit furs. The furs were splashed with red paint to signify blood and a nearby sign said, "Fur is murder."

An organizer of the protest, the Rev. Marc Wessels of Philadelphia, said the furs were donated by people who had abandoned their fur-wearing ways and joined the animal rights movement.

In New York, standing behind Barker was Gary Kaskel of Manhattan, who walked with his two pet fitch ferrets, which are related to the mink and are often used for furs.

"It's a good image to let people see the animals alive," said Kaskel, petting the animals. "People don't see the animals in the traps, so you have to let 'em see them alive, see how sweet they are."

In front of Kaskel, five women dressed as skeletons marched carrying a sign which said, "Fur is Dead!" Others in the crowd, which stretched for four blocks, held signs reading "Fake People Wear Real Fur" and "Fur Belongs on Its Real Back."

Protester, Nancy Winters, a Manhattan novelist, said she put away all her furs — including "a sable you would die for" — after rethinking the issue last year.

There were few confrontations between the marchers and fur-wearing shoppers.

## Baby found in garbage bag fine, family who found him gives thanks

NEW YORK (AP) — A baby found wrapped in a garbage bag on a snowy sidewalk began recovering from hypothermia Friday and the family who found him said they would give "Thanksgiving" during their postponed Thanksgiving celebration.

"It was a beautiful Thanksgiving after all because we saved a baby's life," said Floucella Saunders, whose nephew Robert Saunders, 31, tore through several bags of garbage to find the infant.

The baby, estimated at about 2 hours old, was dumped in a plastic bag in the stack of garbage on a snowy curb outside the apartment building where Mrs. Saunders lives.

Another abandoned infant was discovered Thursday in a cold apartment in New Haven, Conn. The girl, about 3 weeks old, was in fair condition Friday at the Hospital of St. Raphael.

Police in New York were trying to find the mother.

The infant, called Baby Bob in honor of Saunders, suffered from exposure to the cold, but was in stable condition Friday at Lincoln Hospital, said Jasmine Collazo, a hospital spokeswoman.

The newborn's temperature dropped well below normal and did not register on a thermometer, said Dr. Jonathan Golden. A few more hours on the freezing sidewalk would have been fatal, he said.

New York City had its first white Thanksgiving in 51 years. The 47 inches of snow was a record for Nov. 23 and for Thanksgiving Day. The day's high was 31 degrees.

The boy was born after a full-term pregnancy and weighed 5 pounds, 5 ounces, when he got to the hospital, Golden said.

The baby was discovered after two children, Parod Mallory, 13, and his sister Felicia, 4, heard wailing and traced the cries to the garbage pile, said police Sgt. Raymond O'Donnell.

The children alerted Saunders, who was walking up the block to join his aunt for Thanksgiving dinner.

"I ripped through all the bags and at the bottom of one bag there was another bag with the baby," said Saunders. "I yelled up to the women to get the cops and an ambulance."

"We were all so excited — you would have thought we all gave birth to the baby ourselves," Mrs. Saunders said.

"This all happened just before we were going to sit down before dinner," she said. "We couldn't eat then because it was a terrible thing to see the baby that way."

## China executes 2 for kidnap, sale of women

BEIJING (AP) — Two brothers were executed and a third was sentenced to life in prison for kidnaping and selling 51 women, it was reported Friday.

Wang Zhong and Wang Hong were executed Nov. 10 after being convicted in the northern province of Shanxi of abducting women in other provinces, the newspaper Legal Daily said.

The men, in southwest China's Sichuan province, were put to death in September for heading a ring that kidnaped and sold 24 women, including 22 who suffered mental disorders.

The government, in its latest anti-crime campaign, has listed the kidnaping of women and children as one of the "six evils" to be combated. The others are prostitution, pornography, drugs, gambling and swindling people through superstition.

The Legal Daily said kidnap gangs of up to 100 members are operating in every Chinese province, with 90 percent of their victims being peasant girls.

The measures used to entice women include offers of jobs, marriage and free travel. "They use sweet words and talk of love to seduce young women, and then kidnap and sell them. They kidnap women who are dull-witted and suffer from nervous disorders. They use violence to kidnap and sell women," the newspaper said.

Many women are resold several times and raped, it said.

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

### Skull found in river that of Rupert man

RUPERT - A skull found in the Snake River near Swan Valley in 1985 apparently is that of a Rupert man who drowned seven years ago, Bonneville County authorities say.

Detective Kent McCandless of the Bonneville County Sheriff's Department said Friday the skull was determined to be that of 23-year-old William Blayne, who drowned Sept. 5, 1982.

Sheriff's reports at the time said Blayne and three companions were thrown from a rubber raft after it struck a pillar of the Swan Valley Bridge. The others made it to shore, but Blayne was last seen floating downstream. His body was never recovered.

In August 1985 a Pocatello fisherman found the skull in the river and turned it over to the county but attempts at identification were inconclusive until University of Idaho anthropologist Donald Tyler tentatively identified it and Idaho Falls dentist Steven Klingler made a positive identification, based on a computer-enhanced photo of Blayne's face.

### BLM closes lands while Navy retrieves its bombs

FALLON, Nev. - The Bureau of Land Management has closed 3,840 acres of public land while the U.S. Navy cleans up errant bombs, live and inert, that have fallen outside the naval bombing range.

Citizen Alert, a Nevada military watchdog group, has asked the Federal Aviation Administration, the Navy, Nevada Gov. Bob Miller and other government agencies to permanently close Bravo 16 Bombing Range used by military pilots from Fallon Naval Air Station.

A 1984 FAA investigation of special airspace use at Fallon recommended the Navy relocate the Bravo 16 range, because the range boundaries do not fit flight activities used at the range.

"Navy aircraft spill out of the area," the FAA report said, according to Citizen Alert.

A 1982 Navy study found Bravo 16 airspace to be smaller than the Navy's minimum required for safe bombing operations.

Instead of following the FAA recommendation to close Bravo 16, the Navy has requested a 31,303-acre expansion of the range, said Grace Bukowski of Citizen Alert.

### Youth's bail set at \$5,000 on felony forgery counts

TWIN FALLS - A Twin Falls youth appeared in court Friday on three felony charges of forgery, according to court papers.

Mario Hernandez, 18, 227 Ninth Ave. N., is charged with cashing three checks of \$25 each in January. The checks, made out to Hernandez, were drawn on K49AZ-TV's payroll checks, and the signature of Gala Tique, station manager, was forged, according to court papers. Hernandez worked at the station at the time.

A District Magistrate judge on Friday set Hernandez's bail at \$5,000 and appointed a public defender.

### Forest Service would like input on elk feed program

FRANKLEY - The elk are hungry. And the Forest Service wants to know what people think of its feeding program.

The Forest Service and the Idaho Department of Fish and Game have fed wintering elk during four of the last 10 winters when natural forage on winter ranges was not enough. The agencies plan to continue feeding the elk during severe winters.

Problems associated with the elk feeding include public safety near the feeding site along Highway 75, soil erosion, vegetation damage, litter and unsightly hay storage. Other problems include conflicts with winter recreationists' competition with livestock, noxious weeds and campground damage.

## INEL plans for waste cleanup published

TWIN FALLS - The Idaho National Engineering Laboratory has a plan to clean up its act - with part of it already under way.

The plan is in four newly published volumes in loose-leaf binders, outlining proposed plans to identify and clean up contamination within the 890-square-mile site.

It describes ongoing and planned cleanup at more than 326 potentially

contaminated sites. Officials expect only a small number of those sites to require "remediation," or cleanup and restoration.

At the top of the list of major issues at INEL is buried radioactive plutonium-contaminated and chemical wastes.

"Waste disposal practices at the INEL have the potential to impact the water quality of the Snake River Plain Aquifer," the plan's introduction says.

Though the waste poses no immediate health threats, according to officials, top priorities include evaluating long-term threats to health and the environment and

bringing the waste site into compliance with the law.

Plutonium from the waste has migrated into the sediments and cracks between health layers beneath the buried-waste site. Organic solvents from the waste have moved down to the aquifer, but have not been found above federal drinking-water standards.

Cleanup of the long-lived, plutonium-contaminated wastes buried in trenches and pits from 1952 through 1970 has come under the jurisdiction of the Environmental Protection Agency and the state of Idaho

since the site's inclusion on the Superfund National Priorities List.

An agreement on authority over that cleanup is yet to be negotiated between the state, EPA and INEL.

The plan's proposed activities include:

- Removing spent reactor fuel from storage pools at INEL's Idaho Chemical Processing Plant that do not meet earthquake standards. The pools will be abandoned after stored fuel is removed.
- Replacing all the liquid high-level waste storage tanks at the chemical plant.

## New Hansen English program working well, educators claim

HANSEN - A new English program designed for students having difficulty keeping up with most other students appears to be working, teachers say.

"Progress is great," ninth-grade teacher Pat Younger said.

## Twin Falls considers leaving self-insurance path

TWIN FALLS - The city has saved \$1 million by covering its own liability in the past four years.

But city leaders worry about the potential big claim that could force the council to raise taxes to pay for it. They're considering switching back to regular insurance.

"I have a problem with being uninsured," Mayor Doug Vollmer said. "If I voted today, I would vote for getting the insurance. I wouldn't run my business, without liability insurance."

In early 1986 the city began socking away its own fund to cover liability risks

after its insurance company stopped offering coverage to Twin Falls and several other cities.

During the time the city has covered its own liability its costs have been a fraction of what premiums would have cost.

Plus, Twin Falls has earned a total of \$72,282 in interest from a \$400,000 reserve fund that has been built up since the city began insuring itself.

If the city receives a judgment that exceeds the \$400,000, it would have to raise taxes to pay for the claim, City Manager Tom Courtney said.

By state law the city cannot be sued for more than \$500,000 except in federal lawsuits, which have no limit.

"The fully insured program would have cost the citizens between \$715,552 and \$954,215 more than the self-insured program," Courtney said in a Nov. 1 memo to the City Council.

In fact, with the \$6,000 deductible included in an insurance policy, none of the city's claims would have been paid for by the insurance companies in four years.

For instance, in 1988 the city's liability costs included claims of \$48,689 and administration costs of \$18,150. But the reserve fund made \$22,931 in interest.

Deducting that leaves total expenses so far of \$43,908.

That total, however, could rise because the statute of limitations for 1988 claims has not expired, Courtney said.

If the city had been insured, however, its

expenses would have been: \$250,000 for its premium, \$48,689 for claims that did not reach the \$5,000 deductible and \$5,512 for administration. The total would have been \$304,201.

Public Entities National Co. has offered a much-reduced premium of \$180,000 a year through Obenchain Insurance. It also has a \$5,000 deductible.

Tim Obenchain, president of Obenchain Insurance, said the city has done an excellent job controlling its claims, but because claims may not surface for as long as seven years, the city's costs for a given year could rise dramatically.

"He also said the city has been fortunate that it has not experienced some of the

TWIN FALLS - Less than two years after he announced he wouldn't seek a second term in Idaho's House of Representatives, Russell Newcomb is back.

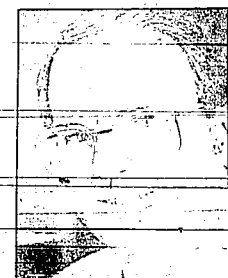

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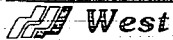
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# Utah University officials optimistic about future fusion funding

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — University of Utah officials say they are confident they will begin the next year with enough private funding to keep research alive at the National Cold Fusion Institute. James Brophy, the school's vice president for research, said Friday the institute is expected to receive a \$300,000 two-year grant from the Electric Power Research Institute, which conducts studies for the nation's utilities.

"We have been told they are going to find us and Texas A&M

University," he said. "They just want to be sure that we aren't duplicating each other's efforts."

Utah electrochemist Dr. Stanley Pons and British chemist Martin Fleischmann announced last March they had achieved a sustained nuclear-fusion reaction in a simple experiment.

The Utah Legislature later appropriated \$5 million to finance fusion institute, with \$500,000 earmarked for patent research and applications, but private money has been long in coming.

EPRI money could be a boon to Texas A&M fusion researchers, who said Friday they've had to cut back on their experiments.

"At the moment we don't have the same high level of activity that we had in March, April and May," said Supramaniam Srinivasan, deputy director of the Center for Electrochemical System and Hydrogen Research.

Texas A&M and Stanford fusion researchers, who have been successful in duplicating major aspects of the Utah fusion

experiments, have been hampered by lack of federal financial support and private commercial collaboration.

Unlike the Utah researchers, who received \$7.5 million in state funds for their work, those other states have relied primarily on small university allocations and a few grants from the Department of Naval Research and the EPRI.

"Texas is pretty much a shoestring operation now," said Gene Charleston, science writer at Texas A&M, where four groups have

reported the most positive fusion results to date.

Texas A&M researchers not only have replicated the heat production of the Utah experiments, but also have detected the presence of substantial amounts of tritium, considered a sign of a nuclear process.

Srinivasan said Texas A&M, like Utah, sought state support to open a fusion center, where the four groups of fusion scientists could collaborate.

The university asked the Texas

Legislature for funding last June, but while officials say they're still studying the request and add that the federal Department of Energy also would have to approve the funds.

However, the DOE's Energy Research Advisory Board recommended no special funds be earmarked for cold fusion and that the government not establish any.

## Phoenix officials worry of possible summer drought

PHOENIX (AP) — Phoenix doesn't have a finished plan to deal with long-term drought, but city officials say they could need one next summer unless the state receives considerable rainfall.

A proposed Drought Management Plan and Ordinance is now being reviewed by the City Council's natural resources subcommittee and is expected to go before the council itself next year.

"We've had one of the lowest years of inflow on record for the Salt and Verde (river) systems. Next summer could be a problem... we might be where we're at an alert stage," said Bill Mee, water conservation and resources administrator.

Mee said the decision to implement the drought plan depends on the Salt River Project, which delivers most of Phoenix's water. Within the next few weeks, SRP is expected to set allocations for Phoenix for next year based on the amount of water it has in its reservoirs.

The closest to a drought the area has come recently was in 1977, when area lakes and SRP's reservoirs were so low that boat docks were stranded as the shoreline receded hundreds of feet. But it rained

before city officials had to worry about delivering water to customers.

"We have one of the most erratic water supplies in the country. We've had the wettest and driest years back to back," Mee said.

The proposed drought plan focuses on education, conservation, discouraging waste and finding new sources of water. City staff members don't recommend water rationing, instead recommending "higher water prices" to cut usage. "But rationing was to be considered in a severe drought, the proposed plan suggests an 80-gallon-per-person-per-day limit. Phoenixians now use about 250 gallons per day."

And under the proposal, people who waste water could have their supply turned off by the city if they continued to violate emergency standards.

Brenda Chapman, water resources information officer, said residents must learn that Phoenix faces a serious water shortage and must believe they can play a part in reducing water consumption.

"The city itself must make an effort to eliminating water waste by drying decorative fountains.

## Lewiston, Australian teachers swap for year

LEWISTON (AP) — Australian native Helen Cooper knew something was wrong as she was driving through Lewiston recently.

She noticed other cars were heading directly at her.

She soon realized the problem; she was driving on the street's left-hand side as she would in Australia, which is opposite of American driving norms.

Fortunately it was a Sunday and traffic was light. But Cooper later found herself in the same situation at Seattle.

"What a nightmare," she laughed.

But that's a small glitch in what essentially has been a dream year for Cooper, 25, a teacher from Woodridge, Australia, a suburb of Brisbane.

Since last December, she has been teaching third-grade classes at Clarkston's Grantham Elementary School through an exchange program that sent Grantham teacher Carrie Warren to Australia.

During the swap, Warren is paid by the Clarkston School District and Cooper is paid by her school. Cooper's pay doesn't go far here because she is paid in Australian currency; an Australian dollar is worth about 75 cents U.S.

Cooper is scheduled to leave for home shortly before Christmas, with stops planned at Vancouver, B.C. and Hawaii.

"I'll be sad to leave. I probably won't see these people again unless they come visit me," Cooper said in a recent interview.

But she won't miss the cold weather she experienced in the

Lewiston-Clarkston Valley, something that is nearly unheard of in Australia. In her home territory winter lasts about two weeks.

"You ski there in T-shirts and shorts in the middle of winter," she noted.

So Cooper wasn't prepared for last winter's unusually intense cold spell.

"Even the river froze. It was amazing. It was horrible," she laughed.

Otherwise the adjustment of moving to a rural area from Brisbane, a city of 1.5 million residents, has gone smoothly. Small towns are nothing new to Cooper, a six-year teaching veteran who once was principal and teacher at an isolated eight-student school.

When it came to sports, "the whole school was the team," said Cooper, who graduated from high school at 16 and began teaching at 19 after earning a required three-year teaching diploma.

But the American educational system has offered some interesting changes. In Australia, textbooks are not used to teach children in first through seventh grades.

Instead, the so-called whole language approach is based on teacher lectures and on activities.

Also, report cards and letter grades aren't used.

Written evaluations are given, with each child's progress in skills monitored.

The idea is to have students take responsibility for themselves, which they need to learn to cope with life after finishing school, Cooper said.

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## Federal officials satisfied with Palo Verde nuclear plant's performance

WINTERSBURG, Ariz. (AP) — The Palo Verde Nuclear Generating Station's overall performance has been satisfactory recently and the installation of new top managers is a positive move, federal regulators said Friday in an annual assessment.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission's latest "systematic assessment of licensee performance" report, dated Wednesday and released Friday, covers the 12 months that ended Oct. 31. Regulators spent 2,384 hours on the assessment, concentrating most on plant operations and safety and quality verifications.

Palo Verde's overall performance was found to be satisfactory and "directed toward safe facility operation," NRC Regional Administrator J.M. Mathis said in a letter accompanying the report.

The report said Palo Verde was troubled by "the momentum of previously existing weakness"

through the first half of the assessment period, but noted that "in recognition of the magnitude of the problems at the site, (Arizona Public Service Co.) instituted numerous changes in Palo Verde management."

Phoenix-based APS is the leader partner in a utility consortium which owns the three-reactor plant located approximately 50 miles west of downtown Phoenix. Other participating utilities are located in Arizona, California, New Mexico and Texas.

The NRC report cited the May appointment of William E. Conway, as Arizona Nuclear Power Project executive vice president in addition to numerous other personnel changes in ANPP's executive ranks.

"Most changes appeared to be positive in nature" despite the disruption of management continuity, the report said.

The new Palo Verde management

team, although as yet unproven, "was receptive," to NRC initiatives and appeared eager to improve identified weaknesses, as it continued to implement existing improvement programs, the report said.

Conway was reviewing the assessment Friday and wouldn't comment on it until after meeting with regulators next month, ANPP spokesman Mark Fallon said Friday.

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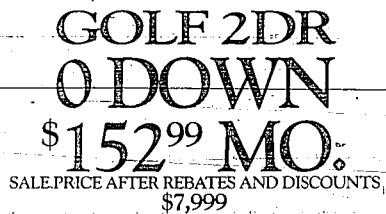


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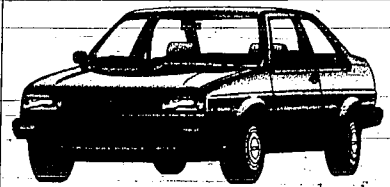


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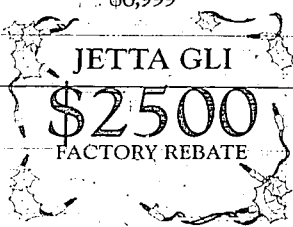
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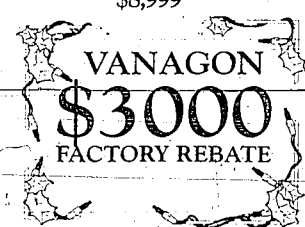


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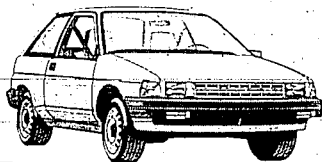
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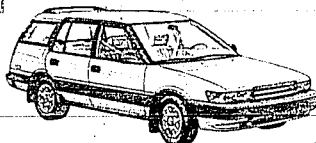
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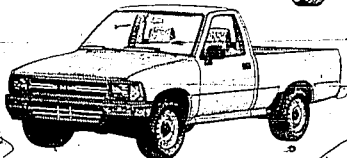
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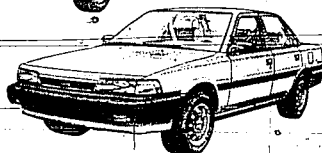
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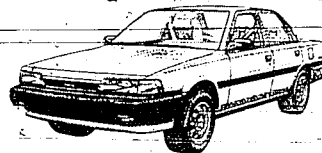
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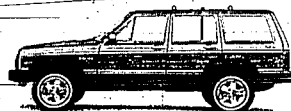
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

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

# Oliver steps out of Friesz's shadow

## Idaho cornerback ties for 2nd in Big Sky pickoffs

MOSCOW — A defensive back on John Friesz's football team can't expect a lot of attention, but even Friesz says Charlie Oliver is underrated.

"I think he's been underrated too," said first-year Vandal coach John L. Smith. "I think he's the best corner in the league."

The 6-foot junior Idaho cornerback from Spokane, Wash., finished the regular season with seven picks, the last coming against Boise State in the regular-season finale last weekend. That feat tied with Kurt Schult of Eastern Washington and Tim Hauck of Montana for second in the Big Sky Conference in pass interceptions and ninth in the nation.

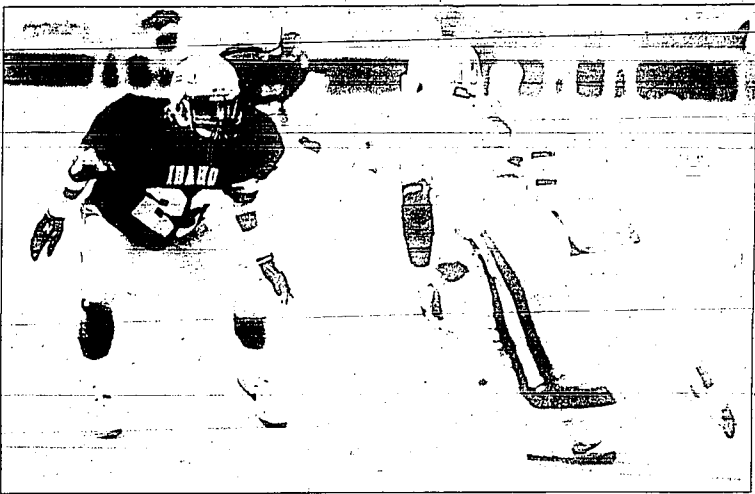
Oliver is a big-play man on a defense that takes chances. Idaho finished seventh among the nine teams in the Big Sky in total defense and eighth out of nine in pass defense. That notwithstanding, the Vandals had the third-best ratio of turnovers to turnovers allowed in the league this year and the 10th-best in the nation. Opposing offenses scored on just 30.8 percent of their possessions and converted 36.5 percent of their third downs to first downs.

Lacking exceptional size, great speed or a lot of experience, the Idaho "Black Hole" defense has to gamble frequently with blitzes, stunts, and zone defenses. Sometimes it gets burned, opponents completed 59.7 percent of their passes against Idaho this fall, the most in the Big Sky — but the Vandals still managed to outscore their foes by an average of 10 points a game this year.

"That's just part of playing here," said Oliver. "It's an offensive school at which the offense usually gets the recognition. The defense is not there saving... not really saving the game, but (not) letting them score just enough points (for Idaho) to win."

"We're a big-play defense. I think," he continued, "and we usually give up a lot of yards or what not, but when we have to have a big play, we usually get it. When we need a sack, we usually get it, when we need an interception... most of the time."

## Vandals face another tough defense versus E. Illinois

MOSCOW — Once again Idaho quarterback John Friesz will get the chance to chew up another good defense this afternoon.

The record-setting Vandal senior quarterback has done that many times before, of course. But he didn't exactly do it last Saturday against Boise State in Idaho's final regular-season game, and the challenge provided by Eastern Illinois today in the first round of the NCAA Division I-AA football playoffs may be more formidable.

"It's been a long time since we lost at home," said Friesz, who has passed for 4,041 yards as a senior and finished with 10,697 career passing yards, edging former Eastern Illinois quarterback Sean Payton for fifth place on the all-time list for all NCAA divisions. "We feel real comfortable wearing our Black jerseys and having the crowd behind us."

Friesz, who ranks third on the I-AA career list, threw for 31 touchdowns and had eight pass interceptions this season. But last week the Broncos limited him to 307 yards, his second-lowest total.

## Kansas soars past St. John's to take NIT

NEW YORK — Mark Randall scored 25 points and unranked Kansas-Idaho 25-15, John's 66-57 Friday night for the preseason NIT championship, the Jayhawks' third straight victory over a nationally rated team.

Kansas, which beat No. 2 LSU and No. 1 UNLV to reach the NIT final, took advantage of four long scoreless streaks by St. John's, including an 8-0 run that turned a one-point deficit with 6:07 left into a 63-56 lead with 2:08 to go.

St. John's guard Boo Harvey, academically ineligible in 1988-89 and the first

game this season, scored 17 of his 28 points in the first 11:12 of the second half as the Redmen rallied from a 38-25 deficit at halftime, cutting the deficit to 62-51.

Lawyer, 164, Gaudin and another 6-5, 5-11 before five straight points by the Redmen put them ahead 56-55 with 6:07 remaining.

Randall had seven of his 17 first half points during the 10-0 run, giving the Jayhawks a 34-19 lead, matching their largest of the game.

BOSTON (AP) — Reggie Miller scored 19 of his 30 points in the second half and the Indiana Pacers beat the Boston Celtics for the second time in four days with a 118-111 NBA victory Friday night.

Miller, the Pacers' leading scorer at 24 points a game, hit two 3-point baskets among his 14 third-period points and the Pacers led 84-81 after three periods.

# Dallas 99 Minnesota 89

DALLAS (AP) — Rolando Blackman scored 23 points and the Dallas Mavericks built an 18-point first-quarter lead and rolled over the Minnesota Timberwolves 99-89 Friday night.

Minnesota trimmed a 15-point deficit early in the fourth quarter to 90-79 with 4:03 left. But Dallas' Herb Williams hit an eight-foot bank shot with 1:51 left and Sam Perkins added a close-range basket 18 seconds later.

**Ashton board requests name change**

ASHTON (AP) — Sixteen months after Ashton Memorial Hospital closed its doors to acute care patients, its board is asking corporation members to clear up the name.  
 Members of the corporation backing the hospital will vote Dec. 4 whether to change the word "hospital" to "facility" in the articles of incorporation to allow the building to be used for a nursing home and chemical dependency treatment center.  
 The emergency room and acute care portion of the hospital were closed in July 1988 because of funds, but the nursing home continued to operate. A chemical treatment center opened in January 1988 and now occupies the former Ashton Medical Clinic building across the street.

**City encounters purchasing conflicts**

CALDWELL (AP) — A recent policy intended to save Caldwell taxpayers money has developed into a quandary for both the city and Councilman-elect John Murdoch.  
 Caldwell officials, in an effort to standardize departmental spending and save some money, created a centralized purchasing policy earlier this year.  
 The policy names D & B Supply Co. as a primary vendor for tools and hardware items. Murdoch is co-owner of the store.  
 Though Caldwell's purchasing policy was set up before Murdoch's Nov. 7 election to the City Council, Idaho law prohibits city officials from taking part in contracts or sales involving their private interests.  
 "If our company is able to save the city money, then that becomes a prudent decision on their part and that's what I was elected to do," Murdoch said.  
 Caldwell City Attorney Skip Snyder is currently researching the issue, officials said.

**Brewster excluded from runoff vote**

POCATELLO (AP) — Even if Al Brewster gave a successful write-in campaign on the Dec. 5 ballot to become Pocatello's mayor, his votes would not be counted, the Idaho attorney general's office says.  
 The runoff election is between Peter Angstadt, Idaho State University housing director, and incumbent Dick Finlayson. Finlayson failed to gain 50 percent of the vote, plus one, in the general election he re-elected to office.  
 "The language of the law is very clear: no write-ins are allowed in a runoff election," Deputy Attorney General Eric Nelson said in a legal guideline to city officials. "The purpose of a runoff election is to let voters pick the top two vote-getters and the election is limited only to the top two candidates."

**Archeological dig begins near Troy**

TROY (AP) — A new archeological site is being unearthed near Troy. The digs revealed an arrow point made of translucent obsidian the day the excavation began in early November.  
 "It's neat, because there isn't any obsidian around here," said Lee Sappington, a research associate for the University of Idaho Anthropology Laboratory. "The nearest obsidian is probably in northeast Oregon," he said.  
 Sappington is supervising the systematic excavation of earth and the meticulous sifting for artifacts at what is thought to be the site of a 3,000-year-old hunting camp on a pine-shaded terrace beside a grassy creek.  
 The site was found earlier this fall during a routine check of the land where Troy's new sewage treatment lagoon will be constructed next spring. According to federal law, archeologists must search for artifacts at the site of any new project that uses federal dollars.

**Judge allows Burger King picket**

POCATELLO (AP) — Former employees of a Pocatello Burger King may picket the restaurant, but must not harass customers or workers, 6th District Judge William Woodland has ruled.  
 He made his decision following a Wednesday hearing in which young defendants were admonished to clean up their behavior in court.  
 From Nov. 11 to Nov. 13, nearly 20 ex-Burger King employees marched in front of the fast-food establishment following a dispute with management over wages, hours and other grievances.  
 On Nov. 14, Jet Enterprises Inc., doing business as Burger King, requested an injunction to stop the protest. The company charged employees were blocking driveways, blocking or restraining patrons, and intimidating or coercing customers to not patronize Burger King.  
 Manager Beverly Cragan testified Burger King suffered a 30 percent drop in sales those three days.

**U.S. 89 moves to expressway status**

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — Although only one of seven interchanges recommended for U.S. 89 is on track for completion in the next two years, a state highway official says motorists eventually will see the road made into an expressway.  
 "It's going to have to be phased in," said Dyke Lefevre, director of the Utah Department of Transportation's District One office here.  
 "We need to prioritize, but we will be implementing other recommendations," he said. "Unless there's a change in the funding program, I'm sure we're looking at at least a 20-year plan for full implementation."

**Cocaine ring suspects face life sentences**

NAMPA (AP) — Seven suspects accused of operating a multi-million dollar Canyon County cocaine ring have been formally charged with crimes which could put all of them behind bars for life.  
 Authorities allege they are part of the "Hernandez drug ring" and sold about \$1 million worth of cocaine per month.  
 The seven were indicted by a Canyon County grand jury in November and arrested Tuesday in the Nampa area.  
 Ezequiel "Zeke" Delarosa Hernandez, 30, pleaded innocent to charges of conspiracy to deliver cocaine. The maximum penalty for the charge is life in prison and a \$25,000 fine.  
 Police believe he is the leader of the ring. He is being held in lieu of \$1 million bond.  
 Ezequiel's brother, Raul Delarosa Hernandez, 28, pleaded innocent to

three counts of delivering cocaine and three violations of the stamp tax act. He faces a maximum of three life sentences and \$90,000 in fines and is being held on \$150,000 bond. Both brothers were acquitted of a shooting at an Ada County tavern that left one person dead.  
 The arraignment of Guadalupe Javier Mendoza, 24, was continued until next week. He is charged with conspiracy to deliver cocaine and faces life in prison and a \$25,000 fine.  
 He is being held on a \$150,000 bond.  
 Mario Reyes, Rosario "Chayo" Reyes, Wencesloa Gabriel Hernandez and Daniel Cortez Alvarez were granted court-appointed public defenders by 3rd District Judge Dennis Gault.  
 Mario Reyes, 24, is charged with three counts of delivering cocaine and three counts of aiding and abetting its delivery. He could receive up to six life sentences and \$140,000 in fines. He is held on \$150,000 bond.

**Church gives up estate involved in investigation**

NEWPORT, Wash. (AP) — A Pend Oreille County religious estate at the center of a sex crimes investigation has been transferred to a newly established trust, public records show.  
 County authorities who have been investigating activities at the C.E. Hobbs foundation since July and legal experts said the transfer may be an attempt to protect church founder Clifford E. Hobbs from civil lawsuits or actions from the Internal Revenue Service.  
 The sexual misconduct investigation has centered around young women who left the congregation and claimed they had been sexually exploited as teenagers by adult church members during "sharing sessions" condoned by Hobbs at the hedonistic sect.  
 Charges of sex crimes involving minors were filed in Spokane County last week against four church members, two of whom had previously been charged with similar offenses in Pend Oreille County.  
 Hobbs and his C.E. Hobbs Foundation of Religious Training and Education filed a quit-claim deed on Nov. 14, releasing church property to the Religious Freedom Trust, records show.  
 The action means Hobbs, who turns 67 on Monday, apparently has relinquished financial interest in the \$10 million complex he developed on 10 acres along the Pend Oreille River north of Newport.  
 The deed of the newly established trust lists Hobbs' son, Donald G. Hobbs, and his son's companion, Peggy Lee Hobbs, as sole trustees. Donald Hobbs was named as vice president of the C.E. Hobbs Foundation in documents filed with the state of Washington and the IRS.  
 "This type of transfer, particularly at this point in time, merits further examination," county Prosecutor Tom Metzger said.  
 "They're entitled to their own speculation, but they don't know the facts," said Spokane tax attorney Robert Kovacevich, who drafted the quit claim deed.

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
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
