Bush 'ready, confident' on departure

Gorbachev calls for 35-nation conclave

WASHINGTON — President Bush headed Thursday for his first summit with Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev, saying the two have a "powerful and historic opportunity to work for peace."
"I'm ready and confident," Bush said at a farewell ceremony in the White House Rose Garden a few hours before departing Andrews Air Force Base, Md., aboard the presidential jet. He labeled himself and Gorbachev as "envoys for positive, productive change."
He praised Gorbachev as a man

"looking for ways to keep reforms moving forward, and I'm looking for ways to promote democracy and freedom."
"And today," the president said, "the people of Berlin toast the dawn of a new Europe."
Aboard Air Force One shortly after takeoff, Bush told reporters, "We're about on the same wavelength, from what I've heard from the briefings" by European leaders who had recently spoken with Gorbachev.
Half a world away, authorities on the Mediterranean island of Malta were busy mobilizing the military —

and even the boy scouts — in preparation for the superpower leaders.
Not even a shortage of tiny, wavy Soviet flags was enough to hamper the preparations, said Eddie Stafface, who reported selling 160 American and Maltese flags a day from his little toy store behind the Palace of the Grand Masters in Valletta.
Bush and Gorbachev will meet Saturday, beginning 11½ hours of talks over two days on warships anchored off the Mediterranean island of Malta.

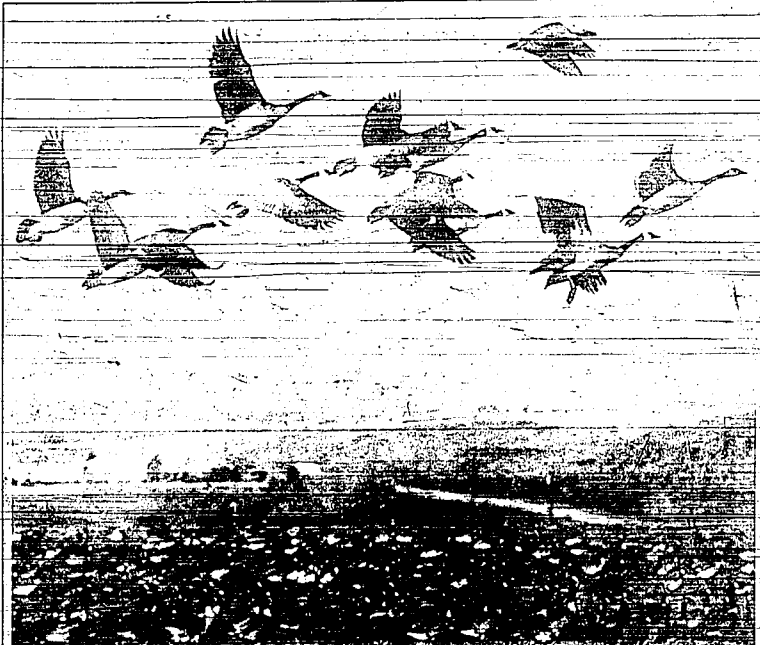

ROME — Declaring that the world is on the "threshold of an entirely new era," Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev called Thursday for the convening as early as next year of a 35-nation European summit that would include the United States.
The Soviet leader made his proposal in a wide-ranging address in which he described his vision of a new Europe as a "commonwealth of sovereign democratic states" to replace the East-West division of the

continent. He said that during the course of "an extraordinary and very significant year," the socialist countries of Eastern Europe have been "crossing the line beyond which there is no return to the past."
In what Soviet officials said was an allusion to growing pressure for German reunification, Gorbachev said that "clumsy behavior or provocative statements must not be allowed to endanger the advent of

this truly historic change."
"Any attempts," the Soviet leader warned, "to extract selfish benefits from these events, to use what is happening for one's own gain; to tilt the events solely to one's own advantage, are fraught with chaos."
Speaking on the eve of his meeting with Pope John Paul II — the first direct encounter between the leader of the world's original Communist state and the leader of 850 million Roman Catholics — Gorbachev acknowledged that the Soviet Union had taken a mistaken

Rebels bomb palace in bid to oust Aquino

MANILA, Philippines — Rebels bombed the presidential palace Friday and blasted the only operating government TV station off the air after mutineers seized the headquarters and two broadcast stations in a bid to overthrow President Corason Aquino.
Mrs. Aquino vowed to smash the "shameless and naked attempt" to drive her from power, but provincial Gov. Rodolfo Aquinaldo said the military was committed to ousting her and rebels were moving artillery and armor from his region into the capital.
The coup attempt, which has left at least 10 dead and 60 wounded, was the most serious since a civilian-military uprising swept Mrs. Aquino to power in February 1986 and forced the late President Ferdinand E. Marcos into exile.
Loyalist troops sealed off Malacanang Palace and residents began evacuating for fear of attack as pro-government snipers took positions in the area.
Most banks closed and some with automatic teller machines ran out of cash as panicky customers withdrew their funds.
The U.S. military restricted travel by its 40,000 troops, military dependents and Defense Department civilians stationed at the six bases here.
U.S. Embassy spokesman Jerry Huchel warned Americans living in Manila to stay in their homes as violence escalated. Up to

100,000 other U.S. civilians live in the Philippines.
A rebel spokesman said on radio station DXL that the mutineers will soon "enjoy the fruits of our hardships."
"Let's pray together for the enlightenment of those people pretending to be leaders like Cory and their henchmen," he said.
Later, a military helicopter dropped a bomb on the rebel-held government television station. Rebel helicopters bombed the Philippine Constabulary headquarters at Camp Crame, setting the main building ablaze.
Other bombs landed across the street at Camp Aguinaldo, the armed forces headquarters.
A rebel bomb also damaged the transmitter of RPN television, knocking off the air the only station the government could use to broadcast assurances to the public and appeals to the rebels to surrender.
Witnesses reported two pro-government soldiers who were killed during sporadic clashes near the state radio-television station, which the rebels held. While no official casualty figures were available, accounts from witnesses, reporters and hospitals showed at least 64 were wounded.
The military chief of staff, Gen. Renato de Villa, conceded that the rebels seized Villamor Air Base, headquarters of the Philippine air force; the government

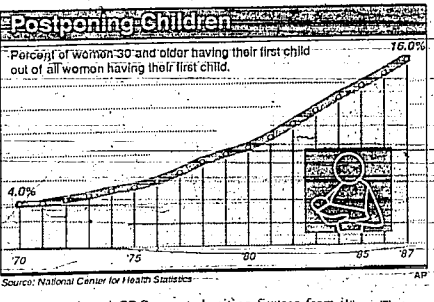

'Thirtysomething' birth trend continues

ATLANTA — The "thirtysomething" trend toward postponing childbirth is borne out in new federal health statistics showing the percentage of women having their first child after 30 jumped fourfold between 1970 and 1987.
At the beginning of the '70s, just 4 percent of American women having their first child were 30 or older, but by 1987 it was 16 percent, the national Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday.
More than a quarter of a million women 30 and older — 250,304 — gave birth for the first time in 1987, compared with just 56,728 in 1970.
That happened while the actual number of women in their later childbearing years soared. In the wake of the baby boom of 1946-64, the number of women between 30 and 44 rose from 17.7 million in 1970 to 28.1 million in 1987 and the proportion who were childless at age 30 rose from 15 percent to 31 percent.
The increase was also noted in the overall birth rate for women 30-34, which fell from 73 per 1,000 women in 1970 to 52 by 1975, but rose back to 71 in 1987.
"A large proportion of the overall increase in birth rate for women aged 30-34 is attributable to an increase in the rate of first births," the Atlanta-



based CDC reported, citing figures from its National Center for Health Statistics. Eighteen women out of every 1,000 between ages 30 and 34 gave birth for the first time in 1987, compared with just eight in 1975.
The trend is likely to continue, the CDC said, noting that the proportion of college graduates among women 30-34 rose from 16 percent in 1975 to 24 percent in 1987.
"These women are marrying at older ages," the agency said. "Therefore, women in their 30s, of higher socioeconomic status, will likely account for an increasing proportion of first births."

And half of the childless women between 30-34 say they intend to have at least one child, the CDC noted.
First-time mothers over 30 are "still not the norm," said Stephanie Ventura, a researcher with the NCHS. "Most women are still in their 20s when they're having their first child."
For example, in 1987, 9.8 million infants were born in the United States; 1.6 million were first babies, and only 250,000 were first babies to moms 30 or older.
"Nonetheless, theirs is the only age group showing an upturn in fertility in recent years," she said. "The first-birth rates for women in their 20s have remained largely constant since 1970."
The age of a mother is important because older mothers are at increased risk of having children with a variety of birth defects, including Down's syndrome, or having babies born underweight.
But another trend "has tended to offset some of that elevated risk," Ms. Ventura said: Older first-time moms tend to be better educated, healthier women.
Half of first-time moms over 30 are college graduates — 49 percent in 1987, compared with just 19 percent of first-time mothers in their 20s, the CDC said.

Letter carriers pay if mail goes astray

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Suburban postal carriers had such customers for wrongly delivered mail that the program, intended as only a 60-day trial, continue indefinitely, officials say.
Since late September, every properly addressed letter delivered to the wrong address in suburban Worthington has cost carriers 25 cents out of their own pockets, but most carriers say they don't mind. They say their customers are not fussy.
"It's just a small way of telling our patrons that we are concerned about our jobs, and we try to do a decent job," said Tom Harris, a letter carrier for six years. "We want to be known as the whole postal system is not lousy."
The 60-day trial program, modeled on one in Highpoint, N.C., was supposed to end last Saturday.
Union and postal officials say the program has been successful, considering the 125,000 pieces of mail the branch handles a day.

"People are taking a lot of pride in what they do, and it's worked well for them," said Douglas Gully, president of the Letter Carriers local, that represents Worthington branch employees.
Harris said he had only one errant delivery during the two months of the program.
"I must have misread it," he said.
During the first 60 days of the program, participating postal workers paid customers a total of \$11.44 for 43 pieces of wrongly delivered mail, station manager Robert Summers said. Most of the mistakes occurred in the past three weeks as substitutes filled in for vacations and illness of regular carriers, he said.
The number of customer complaints has dropped from an average of 10 calls per week to one call a week since the program began, Summers said.
Of the branch's 45 mail carriers, 25 participated in the program. Carriers at the station Wednesday who did not participate declined to be interviewed.

Watkins visits Rocky Flats today

DENVER — Energy Secretary James D. Watkins plans to travel here Friday to confront one of his department's major headaches: the Rocky Flats nuclear arms plant, the nation's only source of the plutonium "triggers" needed to detonate atomic bombs and missiles.

Facing increasing demands in Colorado that the plant be shut down because of health and environmental concerns, Watkins plans to confer with a special safety-review team he dispatched earlier this month. A shutdown would stop all new plutonium production pending the nation's nuclear deterrent.

Watkins also is to meet with Colorado Gov. Roy Romer, who has criticized the plant's safety record.

The Energy Department announced Wednesday that the plutonium works at Rocky Flats have been shut down since Nov. 13. The plant routinely suspends work at the end of each year to take inventory of plutonium materials on hand. Officials said the current shutdown is for standard inventory purposes and also is aimed at instituting up-to-date safety procedures.

Rep. David E. Skaggs, D-Colo., who represents the plant's nearest neighbors, said he found the Energy Department announcement "completely mystifying." Skaggs said he had asked the department several times since Nov. 16 to shut the plant for a safety inspection but was never told that a shutdown was already in effect.

"If what they did on Nov. 13 was really a shutdown for safety reasons, why didn't they tell anybody?" Skaggs asked.

The Energy Department has faced major safety and pollution problems at several of the 17 plants where it constructs nuclear weapons for the Defense Department. But Rocky Flats has been a problem, partly because of its role in the weapons-making process and partly because it is within 40 miles of Denver.

Fallen crane operator had alcohol woes

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The operator of a crane that collapsed and killed five people said he was considering entering an alcohol treatment program to "dry out" after his work on the high-rise was over, his brother said Thursday.

The crane operator, Lannie Boggess, was among those killed in Tuesday's accident. He had twice tried to commit suicide during the last nine months and had been hospitalized for psychiatric observation twice since March, according to court documents obtained by McClatchy Newspapers.

Boggess, 45, died with three other construction workers and a school bus driver when the 240-ton crane he was operating plunged 16 floors in the bustling Financial District.

Boggess' brother, John, said the machine operator had a drinking problem and suffered from stress related to his high-risk job.

"He told me he was considering admitting himself to an alcohol program to dry out after this job was over," said John Boggess.

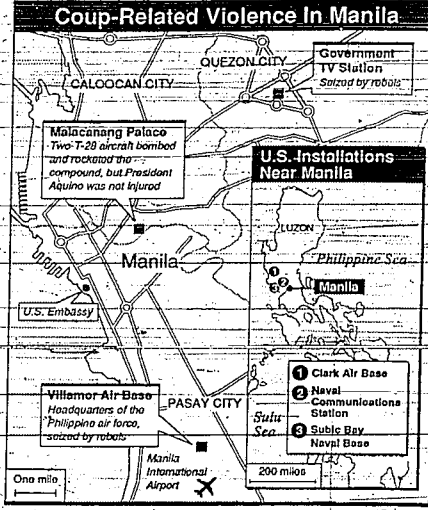
The San Francisco coroner's office said Thursday that an autopsy would attempt to determine Boggess' blood alcohol level at a time of death. It will be made public in two to three weeks, the coroner's office said.

Family members were also concerned about, perhaps, a heart problem or stroke, John Boggess said from his home in Exeter, a small city in the San Joaquin Valley. But he conceded he had no specific information that his sibling, a heavy smoker, had a heart condition.

The month-long case concerned about eight, charged John Boggess, a sales executive. He attributed his brother's problems to "a bitter divorce and the stress of a high-risk job."

Authorities were checking into reports that Boggess was seen slumped over the controls as the crane began its plunge.

Boggess was in the crane's cab 200 feet above the ground when the accident occurred. The crane was being raised from the 16th floor to the 20th floor of a high-rise under construction.

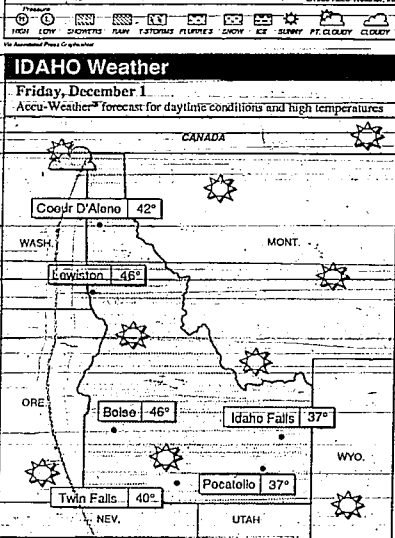
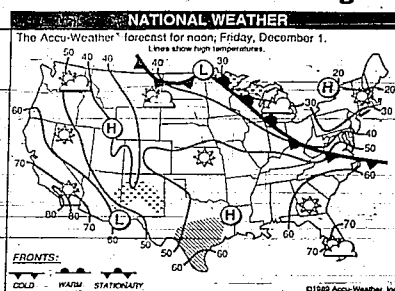
High clouds covered the state by midday Thursday with a few lower and level clouds in the north and along the Montana border. Smoke continued to be trapped in some of the southeastern valleys. Visibility was reduced to less than a half mile at times in the Pocatello area.

Late morning temperatures ranged from 11 degrees at Idaho Falls to 34 degrees at Lewiston. Overnight lows were mostly in the teens and low 20s in the western sections and in the single digits in the central mountains and the Southeast. The state low was 8 below zero at Stanley.

broadcast center; a private TV station; and parts of Ninoy Aquino International Airport. The airport was closed to all flights.

Who was leading the mutiny was unclear. Rebel soldiers would not say. They were believed loyal to renegade Lt. Col. Gregorio "Gringo" Honasan, who led an August 1987 coup attempt in which at least 53 people were killed.

De Villa estimated rebel strength at about 800. A mutinous captain put the figure at 2,000. De Villa claimed troops remained loyal in northern Luzon, Mindanao and in the southern Luzon command.

Louise Syngco, deputy presidential spokeswoman, said Mrs. Aquino was safe but said those in the besieged palace were fearful of going outside.

When they saw the attack on the palace, mutineers at the government TV station cheered and shouted "Cory is dead! Cory is dead!"

Aguinado, governor of Cagayan province and a former colonel, said in a radio interview that soldiers in his northern-Luzon area supported the mutiny. "We are bringing in artillery and armor."

The government appealed to mayors to mobilize local police forces. Mrs. Aquino asked Filipinos earlier Friday to "support our democracy in this hour of challenge."

Public discontent with the Aquino government has been growing because of rising prices, a critical shortage of electricity in Manila, allegations of corruption and deterioration of the city's transport system.

Addressing 300 administration officials, Bush said: "This meeting represents a point of departure, the beginning of a process as full of promise as any that we've ever known."

And given the remarkable and rapid change in Eastern Europe," he said, "our meeting will be yet another important step in this long but hopeful journey toward a Europe that is indeed whole and free."

The discussions are expected to focus on the reforms in Eastern Europe, negotiations to cut nuclear arms and conventional forces, trade issues, and regional disputes, including a U.S. complaint about Soviet-made weapons shipped to El Salvador.

Bush praised Gorbachev for his "efforts to relax the grip of the centralized government to move toward pluralism and the free enterprise system."

Calling the changes in the Soviet Union "dramatic," Bush said, "I believe the people of Europe can see that Mr. Gorbachev and I — East and West — are not in some kind of competition. Rather, we're both working to make the world a more peaceful one."

Bush, who originally described the summit as an informal, get-acquainted meeting, used the word "historic" three times to describe the talks.

As Bush was preparing to leave, Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, and 32 other members of Congress urged him to give priority in his talks to ending the rule that imposes high U.S. tariffs on Soviet imports.

The president has authority to waive the Jackson-Vanik Amendment, a provision in the trade law that denies "most-favored-nation" status to the Soviets because of their limits on emigration.

It will be the first superpower summit since Gorbachev met then President Reagan on New York's Governor's Island on Dec. 7, 1988. Bush, vice president at the time, sat in on those talks.

Bush was to arrive in Malta at mid-morning Friday after an all-night flight from Washington. He planned to fly out to the American aircraft carrier, the USS Forrestal, to meet with crew members and officers and to deliver a speech.

Bush and Gorbachev will meet on Thursday night to formally discuss a guided-missile cruiser. On Saturday they will hold talks on the Soviet ship, the Slava, and in the evening will have a dinner on the USS Slava, the Belknap, the flagship of the U.S. fleet in the Mediterranean.

The second and final day of talks will be on the Belknap.

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former defense company official pleaded guilty Thursday to conspiring to make illegal campaign contributions and to obstructing the FBI's investigation of Pentagon procurement fraud.

Labor inspector warns Congress

WASHINGTON (AP) — The labor Department's inspector general on Thursday warned Congress of continued problems in labor oversight, civil-training programs and said the agency was "naïve" in relying on civil instead of criminal remedies for most of its enforcement actions.

But in sending the report to Congress, Labor Secretary Elizabeth Dole offered a lengthy rebuttal of the major criticisms, taking issue particularly with the inspector general's insistence that problems with the nation's \$2 trillion private pension system rival those blamed for the savings and loan crisis.

Satellite fall expected Friday night

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Solar Maximum satellite, lost about 20 miles altitude in a 24-hour period Thursday, prompting the U.S. Space Command to predict that it will fall to Earth about 8:45 p.m. MST on Friday.

Most of the satellite will burn up in the atmosphere but up to a dozen larger pieces, weighing up to 100 pounds, may survive. Officials weren't ready to say in what part of the satellite's track they might come to Earth.

"We can't predict because there is about a six-hour margin of error in our calculations," said Capt. Thomas Nicimann, spokesman for the space command. "That's four orbits of Earth."

More than 80 percent of the satellite's path is over water and the chances of debris hitting anyone are considered remote. The only parts of the United States under Solar Max's ground track are South Florida and the extreme southern parts of Texas and Hawaii.

Government defends CIA missions

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department denied on Thursday that the crash of a CIA plane in Angola indicated the United States was acting like the Nicaraguan government it has accused of helping leftist rebels in El Salvador.

Department spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler refused to confirm publicly, as other officials have said privately, that the plane was on a covert CIA mission to resupply Angolan rebels.

However, she responded to suggestions at a news briefing of a parallel between the crash and a similar incident over the weekend involving equipment that U.S. and Salvadoran officials say had been earmarked by Nicaragua for leftist rebels in El Salvador.

Carter sibling diagnosed with cancer

ATLANTA (AP) — Gloria Carter Spann, the last surviving sibling of former President Jimmy Carter, has been diagnosed with pancreatic cancer, the same disease that killed their father, sister and brother and contributed to the death of their mother.

Mrs. Spann, 62, is a patient at Emory University Hospital in Atlanta, according to a statement from her doctor, released Thursday by the Carter Presidential Center.

The statement from Dr. Martin York said the cancer has spread to Mrs. Spann's liver, but "she is in excellent spirits."

States reap windfall as penalties forgiven

WASHINGTON (AP) — California and New York are the biggest winners, but all states will reap dividends from a decision by Congress forgiving \$1.4 billion in hotly-contested federal penalties under a major family aid program.

The penalties were owed by all 50 states because of alleged overpayments to beneficiaries under Aid-to-Families-With-Dependent-Children, the federal-state welfare program for children who lack parental financial support.

About 3.7 million families receive AFDC, the nation's largest cash assistance program.

The biggest penalty to be wiped out belonged to California — \$308.7 million, according to Federal Funds Information For States, a research group. New York owed \$285.9 million, Michigan \$134.0 million and Ohio \$107.6 million.

Idaho's penalty was listed at \$2.4 million. No state had avoided the

penalties, although South Dakota owed just \$13,000 and Nevada owed \$18,000.

Forgiving the debts and reforming the way states are penalized for overpayments "is extremely significant," said Alicia Pelrine of the National Governors' Association.

"This is something we've been pushing for for years. It's a tough, technical, gut-it-out issue," she said. "We were delightfully surprised."

John Jerry Friedman, deputy secretary for income maintenance at the Department of Public Welfare of Pennsylvania, which saved \$92.3 million.

"Obviously if we were forced to pay up, it would have made our system hemorrhage. It would have been disastrous," Friedman said. He said the state had been preparing to challenge the debt in court.

The \$1.4 billion is an estimate that includes only state overpayments

made from the 1981 through the 1987 fiscal years.

When figures for the 1988 and 1989 fiscal years are totaled, the amount of forgiveness could run as high as \$2.2 billion, according to the Office of Management and Budget.

The AFDC amnesty provision was contained in a \$14.7 billion budget bill passed by both houses of Congress last week in the rush to adjourn before Thanksgiving.

OMB had backed a cheaper AFDC plan that did not include a full waiver of states' obligations, according to OMB spokeswoman Delores Spitznagel. Still, she said, the budget measure is expected to be signed by the president.

"The revenue losses caused by the amnesty plan are more than offset in the measure by dozens of deficit-reduction provisions, including the extension into February of spending cuts imposed in October under the

Gramm-Rudman deficit-reduction law.

The issue of AFDC overpayments has long caused rancor between states and the federal government.

Since federal money is involved, the government monitors the program and assesses penalties when states accidentally make overpayments to beneficiaries or grant aid to people who do not qualify.

Under program regulations in effect since 1983, any state with an error rate of 3 percent or above is subject to penalties and interest.

But states have long held that the 3 percent "tolerance level" is arbitrary and ignores the realities of administering the program.

States cite compliance figures showing that 41 states could not manage error rates of less than 3 percent in any year during the period.

November sales show surge, slight gain

The nation's big retailers posted mediocre November sales results, but in a favorable one for the holiday season, selling picked up late in the month.

The tallies provided the first glimpse of how retailers are doing at their most important time of year. Most of the reports included sales during part of the Thanksgiving weekend, when shoppers typically begin buying holiday gifts.

Hungary expels ex-CIA defector

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former CIA agent who fled to the Soviet Union just before he was charged with passing secrets was recently ordered expelled from Hungary, U.S. officials said Thursday.

The U.S. government urged Hungary to permanently bar Edgar Lee Howard, a defector who wanted on an espionage charge who has made extended visits to the eastern bloc country since his defection in 1985, said the officials, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Howard, 37, eluded FBI surveillance near his home in Santa Fe, N.M., and fled the country two days before he was charged in a warrant with passing secrets to the Soviet Union.

He later turned up in Moscow and the Soviet Union announced nearly a year after his defection that it had given Howard political asylum.

Howard is charged with selling secrets to the Soviet Union for \$6,000 in 1984.

He is said to have exposed the network of CIA contacts in Moscow.

"I think it's tough and go. A lot of the discounters and big department stores have serious concerns for good reason," said Gary Saunders, a retail analyst for the investment firm Josephthal & Co. "The likelihood is that it's going to be a very tough Christmas."

Clothing stores fared better than general merchandise chains, continuing a pattern that has persisted almost all year. Costly goods intended to last for several years, such as refrigerators or carpeting, moved the slowest.

"The November sales results showed modest gains with spending on durable goods continuing to be quite weak," said Merrill Lynch & Co. analyst Jeffrey Feiner. "There was some noticeable improvement late in the month which justifies a more positive outlook for the Christmas season."

Business between Thanksgiving and Christmas can account for as much as half of a retailer's yearly profit. Forecasters say the economy's weakness will make shoppers hold back a bit this year and holiday sales are expected to rise only about 5.5 percent after 1988's surprisingly strong 9 percent gain.

Department stores that must generate cash to meet their parent companies' debt payments are especially aggressive with markdowns. Stores near only owned

by Campeau Corp. or R.H. Macy & Co. Inc. must cut prices to stay competitive.

The nation's largest retailer, Sears, Roebuck and Co., said sales sagged 1.3 percent in the four weeks ended Nov. 25 to \$2.65 billion compared to November 1988.

A switch to a low pricing policy and the discontinuation of huge sales this year has made Sears comparisons with last year's results difficult.

K-mart Corp., the second-largest U.S. retailer, said sales rose 7.2 percent to \$2.42 billion. K-mart's four-week sales period ended Nov. 22, so it didn't include any portion of the Thanksgiving weekend. Most other retailers had results through last Saturday.

No. 3 Wal-Mart Corp. reported a 27 percent November sales increase to \$2.6 billion.

Among stores heavily oriented toward apparel: Dayton Hudson Corp. reported an 8.4 percent November sales gain to \$1.13 billion.

J.C. Penney Co. Inc. said its November sales rose 6.6 percent to \$1.48 billion. May Department Stores Co. reported a 6.6 percent November sales pickup to \$867.7 million.

Specialty apparel retailer Limited Inc. said its November sales rose 14 percent to \$410 million.

U.S. bans vessels with Panama flag

WASHINGTON (AP) President Bush, trying to tighten the economic screws on Panama's Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega "and his puppet regime," on Thursday banned Panamanian-flag vessels from entering U.S. ports after Jan. 31.

"This ban is consistent with international efforts to further isolate the Noriega regime, which is currently shunned by the democratic nations of Latin America and around the world," the White House said in a statement.

The ban, announced as Bush prepared to leave for his weekend summit at Malta with Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev, is in addition to a wide array of U.S. economic sanctions already in place against Panama.

In the statement, the administration renewed its determination "to assist the Panamanian people in their endeavor to bring about Noriega's departure and the establishment of democratic institutions responsive to the will of the people."

The president has been urging Panamanians and defense forces to drive Noriega from office, since last May after abortive elections there.

However, Bush has been criticized by Democrats in Congress for not acting more decisively in taking advantage of last month's attempted coup.

Noriega, who is under indictment in the United States on drug-trafficking charges, has resisted 2 1/2 years of U.S. efforts to oust him. The new ban on Panamanian shipping will deny Noriega and his puppet regime tens of millions of dollars of revenue, the White House statement said.

Summit results affect Idaho, too

This weekend, on two naval ships off the coast of Malta, the leaders of the world's most powerful nations will meet in an effort to chart a new world order for the 21st Century.

The results of the summit between President George Bush and Soviet General Secretary Mikhail Gorbachev will help set the course of events for the world our children and grandchildren will inherit.

Will it be one of peace or war? Prosperity and initiative? Individual freedom or servitude? Will they make way for the soaring flight of human aspiration which is now sweeping Europe? Are they able to lead their respective nations into the new era, using converted defense dollars to reduce deficits, improve health services, build education and widen opportunities for human potential?

The answers will reach into every corner of the world, including Idaho. Already, the pace of change is raising serious doubts about the proposed Special Isotope Separator, which was planned for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Next on the list is a second plutonium weapons plant; military lobbyists want two, one in South Carolina and one in Idaho, but the likelihood of even the first being built is fading with each new event in Europe.

We believe Idaho will be fortunate indeed if neither the SIS or the production reactor is built here.

But in their place, we Idahoans have an opportunity to build an economy which relies on our traditional natural resources as well as tourism. First, we must be wise enough to protect both our environment and our quality of life.

We have long opposed both the SIS and the production reactor as unnecessary to the nation's defense and because both would have severe environmental and waste disposal consequences at a time when the INEL already has tons of stored and buried waste to handle.

Rep. Richard Stallings came close to writing off the SIS project this week, saying that the apparent crumbling of communism made the need for the project much harder to justify.

Congress this fall approved SIS planning money, but only if the Secretary of Energy certifies the project as necessary. A report this week indicates that no such certification is likely.

This weekend, the attention of millions of people will be focused on two world leaders, meeting off an obscure Maltese fishing village in the Mediterranean.

But as we watch and listen, we should also remember how Idaho's future is tied to fast-moving events.

Feed grounds could be moved back far enough that they wouldn't interfere with traffic on Highway 75, also not inflict any problems with winter recreationists in the Stanley Basin, nor offer any competition with livestock.

As to competition with livestock - in my opinion, they are the root of the problem in the first place by overgrazing of wildliferange ranges. So how could they now be competition? It's no secret that overgrazing is the real cause of winter feeding of big game, not only here but in Wyoming, Colorado and other western states.

I request that the Idaho Fish and Game Department, in cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service install permanent winter feeding stations for elk in the Stanley Basin that will not interfere with any other winter activities in the region.

The state of Wyoming has been feeding elk on 23 feeding stations for decades, and it's been very successful in establishing the largest elk herds in the world; and from personal contacts there, these stations are not a problem with any other winter recreation or livestock problems.

In fact, it was because of livestock depredation of the winter range that feed stations were installed back as far as 1919. Of course, all this entails work, sometimes known as a dirty work among many federal agencies - which may be the problem in the first place, if you catch my drift!

Summit offers chance for future arms cuts, new era of East-West relations

Malta may be end of Yalta

Coming as it does during great upheavals throughout the Communist world, this weekend's U.S.-Soviet shipboard summit near Malta has a chance to start a total restructuring of the superpower relationship and a new era in East-West relations. Malta may come to symbolize the beginning of the end of Yalta's sinister legacy.

While his predecessors were prisoners of Marxist-Leninist dogma, Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev has proven to be a visionary in international politics. Even among people who always believed Communists could not be trusted, he has established a degree of admiration mixed with grudging trust.

Although it was not apparent at the beginning, his "new thinking" is grounded in the Kremlin's realization that many of Marx's theories and Lenin's practices are worthless in resolving today's threats to human life - nuclear destruction and environmental hazards.

This weekend's summit comes at a crucial point in Gorbachev's 4 1/2 years of Kremlin leadership. The transformations he has started throughout the communist world are moving at lightning speed. But at home, his reforms have failed so totally to raise living standards that most Soviet citizens glumly believe that things are getting worse.

Some things do not change even in the era of perestroika and glasnost. The Soviet

and Moscow desperately need a sense of certainty about the nature of their respective defense budgets over the next five to 10 years.

Both have serious economic problems, both want to substantially reduce arms, but neither can make a full-fledged commitment without assurance that the other is doing the same.

The goal for this summit should be a plan for systematic arms reductions over the next decade. That is the only way in which both superpowers can have confidence that they can significantly cut defense spending and not be at a military disadvantage.

Six months ago, Bush's proposal to reduce U.S. forces in Europe by 50,000 and withdraw substantial military equipment was seen as too far-reaching. Now it appears there can be agreement on such a plan by May.

At this summit, Bush and Gorbachev should make plans to move immediately to a second phase of conventional force reductions in Europe, to go beyond the nuclear arms cuts planned and to agree on procedures for verifying all of this.

This is also the time for Bush to

demonstrate that U.S. support for Gorbachev's reforms goes beyond rhetoric. The president ought to make specific proposals to increase trade with the Soviet Union and grant Moscow "most-favored-nation" trading status.

In the larger sense, there is a need for the Soviet Union and the United States to have a broad understanding of what the dramatic changes in Eastern Europe mean, especially the possible reunification of Germany.

Bush and Gorbachev are as much spectators as actors.

But the influence of the two pre-eminent nuclear powers shouldn't be underestimated. Their cooperation is essential to keep this extraordinary period of change from splitting out of control.

Arms pact affects deficits

In fact, there is a shadow over Malta, not that American policy is everything it should be, but the shadow is of Moscow's making.

Malta summit seen as spur to arms control

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush's Mediterranean summit with Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev could speed up a timetable for new superpower accords slashing arsenals of nuclear, conventional and chemical weapons.

"It would seem like all the signs are pointing to quick resolution," said James Rubin, assistant director of the Arms Control Association of Washington. "But a summit resolution to move to completion of all three is the best we should hope for."

Bush has stressed that the summit will not focus on arms control and that he was "not going to surprise" the Soviets with any flashy proposals.

Gorbachev, however, is known for doing the unexpected, and his may try to pressure Bush into talks on naval power. The U.S. Navy has met tonight, and the Reagan and Bush administrations have resisted

having this put question put on any arms-control negotiating tables in the past.

The general subject of arms control, nevertheless, a key issue in center-stage when the superpower leaders meet. Gorbachev, in a joint statement Thursday with Italian leaders, expressed hope for agreements by the end of 1990 to cut conventional and chemical weapons — and a third deal to sharply reduce strategic-arms stockpiles.

Bush and Gorbachev have said that the next summit, to be held in the United States next spring or summer, might be used to sign a proposed Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty (START). This would slash superpower nuclear arsenals by 50 percent, to 6,000 warheads per side.

For the first time since Gorbachev met tonight, and the Reagan and Bush administrations have resisted

proposal, otherwise known as Star Wars, and that's a good omen for START.

The Soviets said in September they were removing a major START obstacle by dropping their precondition that the United States agree not to violate the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty, which restricts strategic defenses.

Instead, the Soviets have reserved the right to rearm if the United States violates ABM by deploying Star Wars defenses.

The Soviets also agreed to include submarine-launched cruise missile (SLCM) in a separate agreement rather than in START. The United States has balked at curbing that class of weapons.

In September, the United States also removed a major obstacle to START — dropping its demand to ban mobile missiles. The Soviet Union

has deployed two such systems, the U-10-warhead SS-24 and the single-warhead SS-24.

Congress has approved funding for two comparable U.S. weapons, and the U.S. Air Force announced Wednesday that it is designating sites to deploy 50 mobile versions of its 10-warhead MX missiles, which have been housed in silos up to this point.

On conventional arms, the Western and Eastern military balances have made steady progress in multilateral talks to sharply reduce forces in Europe, with only one major issue dividing them, the definition of an offensive aircraft.

The North Atlantic Treaty Organization wants the Warsaw Pact to cut 7,000 planes, versus a reduction of 1,000 for the West. But the Kremlin says many of its planes, such as trainers, should not be counted, and that NATO has an advantage of up to 13,600 aircraft.

The two sides also have proposed different methods of counting troops, with NATO seeking a limit of 275,000 deployed by either superpower in Central Europe. The Warsaw Pact wants its proposed ceiling of 300,000 to cover British and French troops in West Germany. That would mean a reduction of about 30,000 U.S. troops in Central Europe and 325,000 for the Soviets.

Malta mobilizes to receive summit crowds

VALLETTA, Malta (AP) — Long experienced in dealing with invaders, the Maltese are blocking off roads and mobilizing the military and even the boy scouts — to get ready for this weekend's superpower summit.

They're also churning out T-shirts.

Prime Minister Edward Fenech Adami declared his island nation set for the arrivals Friday of President Bush and Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev for their talks aboard warships anchored in a Maltese harbor.

"The arrangements have gone beautifully," Fenech Adami told a news conference Thursday.

Malta's entire 120,000-man military and most of its 1,000 police officers have been assigned to security tasks for the meeting, manning roadblocks and checkpoints and making round-the-clock patrols on land and at sea.

Even a shortage of tiny, wobble Soviet flags hasn't been enough to hamper the preparations, said Eddie Stafface, who reports selling 160 American and Maltese flags a day from his little toy store behind the Palace of the Grand Masters in Valletta.

"They never sent the Russian ones," Stafface said of his Italian suppliers. "When Soviet sailors come ashore, they normally don't have money and want to exchange — traded for home penants with Gorbachev's face on them. But I've sold all them already."

The Maltese government has come up with enough large Soviet and American flags to decorate the public buildings in Valletta, a capital of steep narrow streets lined with

other stone buildings.

The stark, almost treeless setting could be mistaken for North Africa, "if it weren't for the Christmas decorations strung across the main shopping streets in this heavily Roman Catholic country. And the signs in the distinctive Maltese language, influenced by Arabic, Italian, French and English. St. John Street, for instance, becomes Triq San Gwian.

At a shop around the corner from Triq San Gwian and just up from the deep harbor, Joseph Civilli also had no Soviet flags, but was making up for it with colorful T-shirts showing Bush and Gorbachev floating along in separate fishing boats shaking hands over the water in front of a Maltese cross.

"The whole world is looking at Malta, I think. It's great," said Civilli. "Tell your president to bring peace to the whole world. We've suffered a lot from wars."

Malta's waters have been thousands of years ago, with Greeks, Etruscans, Carthaginians, Romans, Arabs and Normans among the conquerors.

In the 16th century, the knights of the Order of St. John — later known as the Knights of Malta — built the impressive fortresses that still dominate Valletta's rocky skyline, and fought off the Ottoman Turks.

Napoleon eventually kicked out the Knights of Malta, then Lord Nelson kicked out the French. Malta was still under British rule through World War II, during which it survived ferocious bombing to remain a key Allied outpost in the Mediterranean, just 58 miles south of Sicily.

Among the buildings badly

damaged by German and Italian bombing was the 16th-century hospital of the Knights of Malta, now rebuilt into a conference center. Its 530-foot-long Main Ward has been lined with tables and telephones for the 2,000 journalists accredited to cover the Gorbachev-Bush encounter from shore.

Joining them are promoters of Maltese business opportunities eager to take advantage of the sudden attention — and a few dozen khaki-clad scouts given the week off from school to man stands at the center.

The Soviet missile cruiser Slava and the USS Belknap, a guided missile cruiser, are anchored in

Marsaxlokk Bay, a harbor at the southern tip of Malta, about a 30-minute drive from Valletta.

Two small Maltese patrol boats sailed around the two warships Thursday, making sure no pleasure boats wandered nearby.

Some roads are already blocked to traffic, and more will be shut through the weekend, forcing the Anglican Cathedral in Valletta to cancel church services this Sunday.

Still, hundreds of curious tourists and local people have already made the trek to look out from a one-story fishing village at the ship, bristling with armaments in the harbor.

Belknap sailors rush to prepare ship for superpower meetings

MARSAXLOKK BAY, Malta (AP) — A Marine captain drilled the honor guard in crisp salutes while sailors scrubbed and painted the USS Belknap Thursday for President Bush's shipboard summit with Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

The almost 600-member crew aboard the guided missile cruiser worked around visiting reporters and a tour of Soviet sailors and officers to spruce up the Belknap and prepare its rooms for the heads of state.

"Of course the real importance of this visit is not the ship itself, but the president of the Soviet Union and the president of the United States meeting on this ship," said Capt. John Sigler, the commander of the Belknap.

"We feel very honored to be a part of this hopefully very historic moment," he added.

When Bush, a former Navy aviator, first steps off a helicopter onto the deck of the Belknap, he'll be able to see a hand-lettered "Beat Army" poster pasted to a bulkhead.

Bush will sleep in the quarters of Vice Adm. J.D. Williams, the 6th Fleet commander, meet privately with Gorbachev in the admiral's small dining room and be host for a state dinner prepared by White House chefs in the crowded confines of the officer's mess.

The Belknap is anchored a few hundred yards behind the Soviet missile cruiser Slava, where Gorbachev will be host on Saturday

for talks with Bush in richly paneled wardrooms appointed with plush furniture and oriental rugs.

By comparison, the site of Saturday's state dinner in the Belknap wardroom is spartan. The walls are white and varnished with artificial paneling. A Soviet and American flag are displayed below one porthole. Two tables, one seating 20 and the other 10, are crowded into the room along with a large milk cooler that can be hidden with a navy blue curtain.

Sigler, who was to visit the Slava later Thursday, said he had heard the Soviet warship had more creature comforts. "I heard they have a sauna for example," he said.

"I think we are comfortable," he added. "I don't feel at a disadvantage. I just think there is a different emphasis here than there."

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush on Thursday reluctantly signed into law a bill creating a new independent inspector general within the Central Intelligence Agency, two years after such a move was called for by congressional investigators of the Iran-Contra affair.

The new law is the first of three Iran-Contra related measures Bush was expected to sign, even though his administration believes the bills place unwarranted restrictions on its foreign policy activities.

Still pending, but expected to be signed by Bush, is a foreign aid bill that includes a

wanting against using U.S. aid money as leverage to induce recipients to carry out American policy goals that otherwise would be forbidden by U.S. law. The provision is a reaction to President Reagan's apparent use of aid money as a reward to Honduras for harboring the Nicaraguan Contra rebels in its territory along the Nicaraguan border.

Also pending is a bill that would impose criminal penalties on any official who permits sales of restricted arms to terrorist countries, a list that now includes Syria, Libya, Iran, North Korea, South Yemen and Cuba. The measure seeks to eliminate

loopholes like the ones that permitted the arms-for-hostages deal with Iran.

Creation of the new inspector general's office, similar to the oversight posts at other government agencies that review federal programs and seek to ferret out abuses, was part of a broader bill authorizing U.S. intelligence activities for the coming year.

While the precise spending authorized by the bill is secret, it reportedly involves between \$25 billion and \$30 billion for intelligence collection and analysis, updated spy satellites and other hardware, and covert operations overseas.

In a statement, Bush said the new inspector general post "could impair the ability of the CIA to collect vitally needed intelligence information by creating a perception that confidentiality cannot be guaranteed."

To secure cooperation, the CIA "must be able to assure foreign individuals and organizations that their identities, the fact of their association with the United States, and the information they provide are not subject to exposure," added Bush, himself a former CIA director.

A day earlier, CIA Director William

Webster said while the provision could damage confidence of foreign intelligence services in U.S. ability to keep secrets, he would seek to rebuild safeguards against compromising intelligence sources and methods.

"If it becomes law, we will do our best to make it work," Webster said.

Bush said his objections were mitigated by a provision that would let the CIA director kill any inspector general's investigation he believed might compromise national security interests.

AIDS may relate to deficiency of protein molecule, expert believes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Reduced levels of an important protein molecule may play a role in the collapse of the immune system in patients infected with the AIDS virus, according to a study at the National Institutes of Health.

Dr. Ronald G. Crystal, a researcher at the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute, one of the NIH agencies, said a deficit of glutathione was found in a group of patients infected with the AIDS virus and he suggests that this "may be one clue about why the immune dysfunction occurs" in victims of the disease.

In a study to be published Friday in the British medical journal *Lancet*, Crystal and seven other researchers report that they measured the levels of glutathione in the blood and lung fluids of 14 patients infected with the AIDS virus and compared the results with studies of 19 patients not infected with AIDS.

Crystal said that patients who were "seropositive," or infected with the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) that causes AIDS, had glutathione levels reduced by one-third to one-half of what is normal.

"What we found is that the glutathione

level in seropositive people was low, suggesting a systemic deficiency of glutathione," said the researcher.

The patients in the study infected with HIV had normal levels of lymphocytes, a disease-fighting white blood cell attacked by the AIDS virus, and their disease had not progressed to full-blown AIDS.

Crystal said glutathione is a common protein molecule whose precise function in the body is not known, but earlier research has proven that it is important in the body's shield against infection.

"It seems to play an important role in

allowing the immune system to function normally," said Crystal. "Nobody knows why or how, but ... the immune system does better when glutathione is around. There's a lot of evidence of that."

A deficiency of glutathione, he said, may be a clue in a medical mystery that has puzzled AIDS researchers for years.

Crystal said that early in the course of an AIDS virus infection, there "clearly is immune dysfunction," but, yet, there typically are very, very few cells that are actually infected with HIV. How the disease could compromise the immune system with

so few "soldiers" attacking the body's cells has been one of the unanswered questions about AIDS, he said.

"There has got to be ways that the (HIV) infection amplifies itself in terms of its effect on the body," said Crystal. "This (the glutathione deficiency) may be one clue about why the immune dysfunction occurs."

The scientist emphasized that finding the exact role that reduced glutathione plays in the course of an AIDS virus infection will require a great deal more research before there could be any clinical application.

Czechoslovakia to dismantle fortified border with Austria

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — The government said Thursday it would begin the "removal of technical equipment" on the frontier with Austria, which bristles with barbed wire strung between concrete pylons.

He did not say whether similar action would be taken on the long, fortified border with West Germany.

Hungary started tearing down its border barriers with Austria in May, and tens of thousands of East Germans fled across the frontier to the West before the East German government abolished travel restrictions.

The official news agency CTK said six political prisoners were released and that President Gustav Husak granted amnesty to Stanislav Devaty, a former spokesman for the Charter 77 human rights group who went underground weeks ago, and another activist.

State radio said Marxism-Leninism was being abolished as a compulsory subject at universities, meeting a demand from students, and faculty members would be hired on the basis of professional qualifications rather than Communist Party membership.

Economy Minister Komarek, a reform-minded Communist, said opposition leaders see as a possible reform, cautioned against too much compromise in negotiations for reform with Adamec.

He spoke one day after Parliament rejected provisions from the constitution that guarantee

the Communists a monopoly on power.

Whatever the change in its constitutional status, the party has 1.7 million members and controls the official media, police, armed forces and appointments in every operation from factories to village schools.

"The structure of power remains intact," Komarek said. "It is only the facade which has collapsed, and the structure of power has receded into the background."

"Too many compromises are made, too much is spoken, too little is done. Releases are still possible."

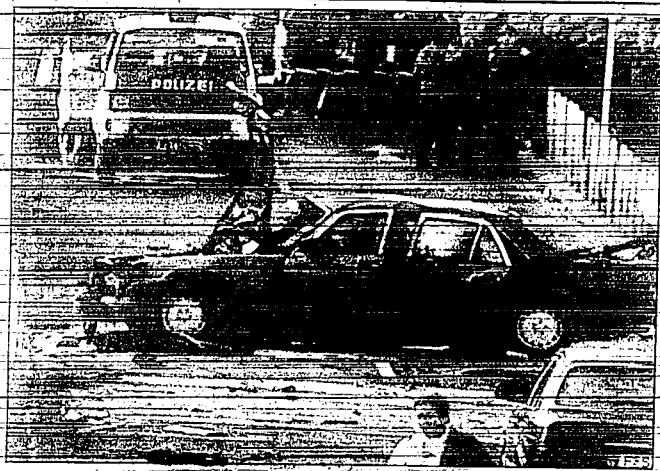

Terrorist bomb kills chairman of W. Germany's largest bank

BAD HOMBURG, West Germany (AP) — The terrorist Red Army Faction, dormant for three years, killed West Germany's most powerful banker Thursday by blowing apart his armored Mercedes with a light-sensitive bomb on a bicycle.

Alfred Herrhausen was chairman of Deutsche Bank, West Germany's largest, and one of Chancellor Helmut Kohl's chief economic advisers.

Police said the bicycle-bomb apparently was placed on a street of the spa town outside Frankfurt, where the 59-year-old banker lived, and detonated by a sophisticated light-beam device as he drove by on his way to work.

They said it was the first time terrorists had used such a detonator in West Germany.

Federal criminal police offered a reward of up to \$2.2 million, one of the largest ever in West Germany.

Police with helicopters were searching for two men seen leaving the area. A stolen white Land Rover believed to have been used in the

ashnikov assault rifle.

Chancellor Kohl, his eyes filled with tears and his voice breaking, condemned the "cowardly and brutal murder" of his personal friend.

Parliament interrupted debate for five minutes in honor of Herrhausen.

In Washington, State Department spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler said, "We deplore this terrorist act and stand ready to assist in any way that we can."

Herrhausen, the best-known figure in West German business, advised Kohl and frequently accompanied him on trips abroad.

The full strike financier had led Deutsche Bank on an aggressive expansion aimed at putting it among the world's top 10 or 1 banks.

He also had urged more investment in the Soviet Union and other parts of Eastern Europe.

Recently, he had recommended West German investment in East Germany.

Kohl called his friend "one of the foremost spokesmen for West German industry in the whole world."

Deutsche Bank owns large interests in many leading West German companies, including Daimler-Benz, the largest conglomerate.

Herrhausen arranged the biggest industrial restructuring in West German history, the merger of Daimler-Benz with aerospace giant Messerschmitt-Boelkow-Blohm.

The banker sat on many company boards, and last year became the sole chairman of Deutsche Bank, which he joined in 1969.

Leftists often have criticized Deutsche Bank for its investment policies and as what they call a symbol of imperialism.

The Red Army Faction was born in the 1960s and has a long history of attacks on West German business and political figures, as well as U.S. military targets.

Its last known operations were the murders in 1986 of Karl Heinz Beckurts of the giant Siemens industrial concern and diplomat Gerd von Braunmühl.

The Red Army faction was believed connected with an unsuccessful attempt on the life of Finance Ministry official Hans-Tietmeyer in September 1988.

Red Army is notorious in Europe

WEST BERLIN (AP) — The Red Army Faction has gained notoriety as one of Europe's deadliest leftist terrorist groups in two decades of bloody attacks on West German and American targets.

Prosecutors said the group claimed responsibility for Thursday's bomb attack that killed Alfred Herrhausen, chairman of Deutsche Bank, West Germany's largest, and one of Chancellor Helmut Kohl's closest economic advisers.

The Red Army Faction, which had been relatively inactive the past three years, began operating in the late 1960s. It was known then as the Baader-Meinhof group, named after its founders Andreas Baader and Ulrike Meinhof.

It gained a reputation as a brutal, well-organized group that struck at the heart of West Germany's industrial and economic power by targeting leading managers for assassinations.

American military targets have also come under Red Army Faction attacks in the group's "anti-imperialist struggle."

Most of the original Red Army Faction leaders have been killed by police or have died in prison. Authorities say the group is now believed to consist of a core of 20 to 30 members.

The group's first action came in April 1968 with arson attacks on two Frankfurt department stores.

The group changed its name to the Red Army Faction in 1971 and a series of assassinations and bomb attacks followed.

On May 11, 1972, five bombs exploded at the U.S. Army's 5th Corps headquarters in Frankfurt, killing an American officer and injuring 13 other people.

In April 1975, Red Army Faction terrorists occupied the West German Embassy in Stockholm in an attempt to free imprisoned fellow terrorists. Two diplomats and two terrorists died in an explosion during the siege.

The year 1976 is remembered as a particularly bloody period, when Red Army Faction attacks shook the foundations of West Germany's society.

"For a long time, the Deutsche Bank and Herrhausen in particular, have been targeted by the Red Army Faction," said Hans-Juergen Foerster, spokesman for the chief West prosecutor's office.

The explosion turned Herrhausen's armored limousine into a heap of twisted metal.

His driver, Jakob Nix, was seriously injured, but police said his condition was not critical. Security agents following in another car were unhurt.

A letter found at the scene claimed responsibility on behalf of the Red Army Faction, West Germany's deadliest terrorist group, of which little had been heard since 1986.

Foerster, the prosecutor's spokesman, said the letter "was not typical" of previous Red Army Faction claims because it did not explain motives. After previous attacks, the terrorist group left lengthy statements giving detailed reasons for the actions.

He said the letter was signed "Commando Wolfgang Beer," for a suspect in an investigation of the Red Army Faction, and carried the Red Army Faction symbols: a star-shaped symbol and a drawing of a

Quest for reform hits industrial center

OSTRAVA, Czechoslovakia (AP) — This steel and coal town in Moravia has always been a Communist Party stronghold, but even new party leader Karel Urbanek's roots in the region aren't enough to stem the quest for reform.

The winds of change are strong even in this major industrial center, although "we are always days behind Prague," said Dusan Kubat, a journalist and staunch supporter of the Civic Forum reform movement.

The Civic Forum was a major force in the pro-democracy demonstrations that led to the downfall of former party chief Milos Jakes. He was replaced by Urbanek, who is from

Bojkovice, a village in southern Moravia.

"The situation is more complicated here," said Kubat. "But people are more conservative. So I think most workers are already with us."

Workers crowding a beer hall appeared to support his assessment.

"I am happy that the young ones started the fight," said steelworker Josef Koukl. "I am already 40 but I would like to join them. Everybody who has a sense of justice should join them."

Stanislav Novak, a 40-year-old father of two, put down his glass of plum brandy and nodded. "I would

like my children to live in a better world."

The Civic Forum's call for a two-hour general strike Monday was heeded by most plants here, with at least 20,000 workers taking to the streets after sirens signaled the start.

At the Zarubek coal mine, however, the management "did not let us gather and waited until the last moment before it allowed a group of miners to come up to take part in the strike," said a technician met at the mine who refused to give his name.

A rumor spread among miners that participants would lose their Christmas bonus of up to \$900.

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Americans flee El Salvador as fighting reaches their homes

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — Hundreds of Americans fled this embattled country Thursday, fearful of the combat by leftist rebels that has shattered the tranquility of their upscale neighborhoods.

The Roman Catholic Church's Legal Aid office, meanwhile, issued a report concluding that government soldiers carried out the Nov. 16 massacre of six Jesuit priests and their two domestic employees.

"I'm not coming back," said Kate Lewis, a teacher at the American School, as she carried her 8-month-old baby Cassandra down Mirador Street to where a U.S. Embassy official was waiting for her and her barefoot husband, William.

Other Americans on their way out flashed a V-for-victory sign at the International Airport and shouted, "We'll be back after Christmas!"

The Lewis' home, and up to 30 or 40 others in the exclusive Escalon neighborhood in the city's western sector, had been taken over before dawn Wednesday by leftist guerrillas.

The rebels from the Farabundo Mari National Liberation Front, or FMLN, observed a six-hour truce beginning at 6 a.m. (5 a.m. MST) in their 20-day offensive to permit evacuation of all those who wished to leave.

Although some guerrilla snipers were still barricaded in several sumptuous homes, most of the rebels

Soviets deny U.S. charges of aid to Salvadoran rebels

ROME (AP) — A Soviet official on Thursday denied an accusation by U.S. Secretary of State James A. Baker III that Moscow has broken its promise to see that no Soviet-made arms reach Salvadoran rebels.

Baker said Wednesday that President Bush would complain about the matter when he meets

with Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev during their summit off Malta.

Baker said the Soviets have promised to prevent Marxist Nicaragua from shipping Soviet arms to rebels fighting the U.S.-backed government in El Salvador, but that the practice continues.

The armed forces said five soldiers and 12 guerrillas were killed in Wednesday's fighting. Reporters counted the bodies of at least 10 soldiers. They saw only one dead guerrilla — a woman still clutching her U.S. combat knife.

Assault-rifle fire could be heard only occasionally in an area of winding, hilly streets as army troops cautiously advanced.

The FMLN is maintaining a constant siege of the capital, which is the neurological center of the nation. The fuse of a social time-bomb has been lit," said the insurgents on their clandestine radio.

About 20 U.S. citizens were among scores of people who took advantage of the truce to leave Escalon. Many waved white flags, and carried small bundles as they walked past a burned-out light tank, dead soldiers and guerrilla barricades of expensive cars with their tires shot out.

Manuel Vides, a 48-year-old businessman, used his 9mm pistol in a 20-minute gun battle with rebels who tried to enter his home. He surrendered after they blasted a light anti-tank rocket off the facade of his house.

"They spared my life, and I have to thank them for that," he said.

Some 100 U.S. Army Col. George Myrus, the former military attaché at the U.S. Embassy, his wife, Rosie, said several wounded guerrillas were treated in the home. The colonel lugged a single suitcase down the street as they and their three children evacuated Thursday.

A young Salvadoran man whose house was occupied described the guerrillas as "very respectful."

"But the very act of invading a civilian neighborhood and turning it into a combat zone is a great maliciousness on their part," he said.

Many had earlier taken refuge in the embassy or the headquarters of the U.S. Agency for International Development and others, both well away from the fighting.

Speaking by telephone from Yerevan, Dulyan said a "massive crowd" of tens of thousands of Armenians rallied outside Yerevan's House of Political Education, where the lawmakers were meeting, to demand the resolution be adopted.

After hours of heated debate, the lawmakers voted to establish a commission to work through the night to draft a response to the Moscow-based Supreme Soviet's resolution, the Armenian journalist said.

Armenians rally for independent republic

MOSCOW (AP) — Tens of thousands of Armenians rallied Thursday in Yerevan and demanded that their lawmakers defy Moscow by declaring the ill-named Nagorno-Karabakh region part of a "unified Armenian republic," local journalists said.

Unconfirmed reports from the Caucasus region in the southern part of the Soviet Union said as many as three people were killed in violence erupting from the sovereignty quarrel over the predominantly Armenian district inside the neighboring republic of Azerbaijan, adding to a 22-month toll of about 100 deaths.

In Moscow, the Soviet legislature on Tuesday overwhelmingly approved a resolution disbanding a special commission that had imposed

direct Kremlin rule on the hilly region of 160,000 people, which was made part of Azerbaijan in 1923 because of its overwhelming Armenian majority.

The resolution passed by the Soviet legislature says the area is part of Azerbaijan, as provided in the 1977 Soviet Constitution, and will now be controlled by local government bodies under the supervision of an all-union commission.

Instead of calming the situation, the Supreme Soviet's resolution exacerbated it, a government spokesman said.

"One has to regret that passions are flying high and the people do not understand the very meaning, the very sense of what this deeper contains," Foreign Ministry Yuri A. Gremitskikh said in Moscow.

In Yerevan, Armenia's capital, the republic's Supreme Soviet legislature and lawmakers from Nagorno-Karabakh met in a special session to debate the Moscow legislature's resolution, said Armen Dulyan, a spokesman for the republic's official Armenian news agency.

Levon Ter-Petrosyan, a member of the Soviet Congress of People's Deputies, presented a draft resolution that would declare Nagorno-Karabakh part of a "unified Armenian republic," Dulyan said.

Nagorno-Karabakh's Armenian population, supported by Armenia, has demanded that it be annexed to Armenia because of what it calls years of "whitewash neglect" by Azerbaijan authorities.

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Britons train for Soviet space mission

LONDON (AP) — The two British finalists for a joint space mission with the Soviet Union in 1994 flew to Moscow on Thursday.

Helen Sharmam and Timothy Mace were chosen from 13,000 applicants seeking to become the first Briton in space.

The candidates will train at the Gagarin Center near Moscow for 18 months, learning Russian and practicing experiments along with physical preparations for the flight, organizers said.

Only one will be chosen for the eight-day mission aboard the Mir space station. The other will be a backup.

"I don't know exactly what is in store for us but there will be a lot of physical training and we will have to think about navigation and how to fly the spacecraft," said Ms. Sharmam, 26, a food technologist from London.

Mace, of Hampshire, a 33-year-old advanced instructor in helicopters and the British freefall parachuting champion, said: "I'm very excited and looking forward to the challenge."

Mother Teresa to receive pacemaker

GALCUTTA, India (AP) — Mother Teresa, who suffered a heart attack in September, will receive a pacemaker in an operation on Friday, her doctor said.

The 79-year-old Roman Catholic nun was taken to Woodlands Nursing Home Wednesday night, said Sister Dorothy, a member of Mother Teresa's Missionaries of Charity.

Mother Teresa fell ill Wednesday hours after she met with the first time since she left the nursing home Oct. 14, said Dr. Ashim Baralun. He added that she was resting Thursday and that her condition was normal.

Sister Dorothy said a special prayer for Mother Teresa was conducted Thursday at the Mother's House of Charity, a headquarters of her worldwide charity that cares for the destitute and the dying on six continents.

Mrs. Dukakis, 52, a recovering alcoholic, has kept a low profile since she was rushed to Brigham and Women's Hospital on Nov. 6 after ingesting the toxic rubbing alcohol. Dukakis later termed the incident "a slip," or relapse into drinking.

MCI founder donates \$3 million to college

WILKES-BARRE, Pa. (AP) — William G. McGowan, founder of MCI Communications Corp., has donated \$3 million to King's College, the largest gift in the small Roman Catholic school's 43-year history.

McGowan's gift will help endow new faculty positions and help pay for a \$6 million home for a business school to be named McGowan's honor, said the Rev. James Lackenmier, King's president.

"The confidence that his gift represents in the college's ongoing development is encouraging," Lackenmier said.

McGowan, a Wilkes-Barre native who graduated from King's in 1952, founded MCI in 1968 and is chairman of the board and chief executive officer of the telecommunications company.

MCI recorded \$5.1 billion in sales last year.

Unusual Philadelphia pub offers beer brewed right on the spot

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — In Revolutionary times, every Philadelphia neighborhood had its own brew pub, where a patron could stop for a pint of beer freshly brewed that day.

Prohibition seemed to put an end to that, but now there's a place where someone again can watch beer tapped directly from the brewing tanks; the Samuel Adams Brew House, a collaboration of David Mink, owner of the Sanson Street Oyster House, and Jim Koch, founder of the Boston Beer Co., which brews Samuel Adams beer.

A pleasant smell of brewing permeates the air, and the vats are enclosed behind a glass partition, readily seen by patrons. The tanks have a direct pipeline to the taps at the bar's counter.

The beer "comes all of five feet from the brewery to your glass," Koch said.

"Freshness is the key ingredient," said Mink. "It makes such a difference."

Of the bar's three traditional beers — a golden ale, an amber, and a porter — the porter drew the most raves from patrons at Wednesday's opening.

Rightly so, since the beer took a silver medal last October at the Great American Beer Festival in Denver, said Jim Pericles, the brewer.

One patron, Rich Wagner, described the dark brew "pleasant with a rich, clean flavor."

Wagner, a home brewer, said Philadelphia once was known for its porters.

"It's a shame that the porters died out earlier in the century, but now we've got one back," he said. Another patron, Dan Allan of Philadelphia, was glad that brewing in general had returned.

The city was a major brewing center through the 1800s, when a large influx of German immigrants brought their tradition with them.

Most of the smaller brewers died out by the turn of the century. Even the major ones have died out; the last brewer, Schmidt's, closed in 1987.

Brew pubs started, like most U.S. trends in California, when that state eliminated Prohibition-era legislation banning such establishments, said Dan Fink, staff member of the Association of Brewers, a Boulder, Colo.-based research and marketing institution.

The pubs do well in a variety of large cities like San Francisco and Chicago, but also are picking up in places like Tempe, Ariz., and Lawrence, Kan., Fink said.

Plans are already under way to bring another brew pub to Philadelphia.

Florida may force release of captive dolphins

BALTIMORE — The National Aquarium here has finally captured at least two dolphins for its new Marine Mammal Pavilion, but may be forced to release them under orders from the governor of Florida.

The aquarium's capture team, headed by San Diego veterinarian Jay Sweeney, captured the dolphins in an unannounced operation earlier this week in Tampa Bay and

transferred them by truck to Hawk's Cay, a resort on Florida Keys.

"There, they are to be acclimated to captivity before being flown to Baltimore for the pavilion's opening next spring.

The aquarium team had moved to Tampa Bay in order to evade the Sea Shepherd Conservation Society, a group that is vowing to stop the capture of dolphins.

The Florida Department of

Natural Resources is now arguing that the aquarium's permit to ship the dolphins required that they be shipped from Charlotte Harbor, 100 miles south of Tampa Bay.

Gov. Robert Martinez, in a letter Wednesday to Thomas Gardner, the executive director of the Florida Department of Natural Resources, said that the shipment of the dolphins from Tampa Bay instead of Charlotte Harbor, "would be a breach of state law."

Fire that hit solon's home ruled accident

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. (AP) — A fire that damaged the home of a legislator who had tried to keep a state university from putting on a play about AIDS and homosexuality was declared accidental Thursday.

Fireplace embers landed in the back yard Wednesday night by one of Jean Dixon's children ignited leaves and scrap wood and spread to the state representative's home.

Chief Fire Marshal Dale Britz said, "After investigators had been called in to determine whether the fire was set, like a blaze on Nov. 15 that destroyed the home of a student who had led a campaign in support of the play, I was Kramer's."

The Normal Heart

Fire Chief Phinston estimated damage Dixon's home at \$5,000 to \$10,000, mostly involving the attic and exterior.

There were no injuries. Dixon and her husband were away at the time, but five Dixon children ranging from 7 to 20 years old were at home with an adult friend, the fire chief said.

A neighbor discovered the fire about 12:40 a.m. and alerted those inside, who included three sleeping children.

Dixon, a Republican, was among the most vocal opponents of a presentation of "The Normal Heart" at Southwest Missouri State University on Nov. 15-20.

She objected to use of a public facility for a play that presents homosexuality as an acceptable lifestyle.

Kramer and his supporters accused her of censorship and said the play, which quickly sold out amid the controversy, helped educate students about AIDS.

Few show at state officials' INEL hearing

TWIN FALLS - Only a handful of people showed up Thursday evening to hear state plans for oversight at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

The goal of a state oversight program is to provide the people of Idaho with a reliable and independent source of factual information about INEL, said Steve Hill, manager of the program.

Five state officials presented plans for the program and listened to public comment.

State legislation has mandated a comprehensive oversight program be developed and that program must include

public participation.

"Public input is a very important part of the oversight program," said David L. Humphrey, appointed by Gov. Cecil Andrus to coordinate the program.

The state will monitor air and water quality and track health risks. State officials also will gather its own data if they find gaps in INEL's data. They will examine appropriateness of test wells and test-and-analysis methods.

Experts in various fields will look at the natural and human influences on the environment, hydrogeologist Warren Burris said.

The oversight program also will be involved in INEL's own cleanup plans.

Richard Schultz, director of the state

Division of Health, said the state will try to track possible health effects from radiation at INEL. His staff will develop a computer model that will reconstruct the overlapping and cumulative effects on people in the path of those emissions.

The Health Division also will look at health records to find evidence of cancers, Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, congenital defects and stillbirths.

The results of both methods would give a way of estimating population health risks.

Another important health study would be to collect information about past off-site radiation releases to allow possibly exposed people to be screened for early detection of cancers or other complications, Schultz said.

Dr. A.C. Emery, a Twin Falls physician attending the meeting, is not certain that data can be obtained accurately from INEL.

"The Energy Department won't tell the information about emissions," he said. The information about past releases is most important to warn those who may have been exposed, he said.

"I think we can forgive what happened in the 1950s, but we should let the people know who may be at risk," Emery said. "If we don't get that information, we won't get anywhere."

Deputy Attorney General Lee Caldwell said the state has sufficient legal authority to oversee a federal facility.

Federal sites normally are shielded from

Roving Frisbee flier fascinates students doing tricks with 'futuristic' plastic disk

TWIN FALLS - Billed as one of the few full-time professional flying-disk specialists in the country, Shane Smith says he'll keep flinging Frisbees until he falls "flat over on my face" or "as soon as I lose my magnetism with kids."

The way an audience of Robert Stuart Junior High School students reacted to his demonstration Thursday, the latter doesn't seem likely.

Even Smith's "stogehands" - a group of boys selected to chase stray Frisbees and to tote equipment - seemed to follow the 32-year-old around in awe.

Smith said he scours the country in the seven-year-olds "Sugar Baby" doing demonstrations for audiences of all ages for about \$150 a group.

So why the Frisbee?

Smith isn't sure when he threw his first

flying disk - probably at 10, 11 or 12. But he didn't get hooked until he grew up and moved to Venice Beach, Calif., site of the world championships.

Soon he was out on the beach throwing with the pros, and he decided to try to make a living at the sport.

Frisbee is the sport of the future, Smith said.

And he said he thinks the Frisbee is "futuristic," and the "shape of things to come" - that all space flight will one day be based on disk-shaped objects.

With about 15 shows a week, Smith said he has stuck with Frisbee through "feast and famine," although he has had to take on odd jobs once in a while to make ends meet.

Smith was born in Salt Lake City, but most of his childhood years in Reno, Nev., and in North Carolina. He lives out of a camper he pulls behind his van, and said he enjoys traveling.

Thursday, using 10 student volunteers and two teachers from the audience, Smith showed off his own tricks and then tried to teach his audience how to do them.

Some of the tricks were easier than others, as the volunteers soon discovered as they tried to mimic Smith's moves.

The most difficult seemed to be a "body roll." The Frisbee leaves one hand, rolls across the back and ends up, somehow, in the other hand.

His favorite shows are those he does for kids, Smith said.

He works through a national agency that helps schools schedule assemblies. Student activity funds paid his fee Thursday.

Smith said he hopes his shows will inspire others to take up the sport he loves.

"If a group of kids are hanging out at a park and remember me and remember the tricks I taught them, and start playing around with a Frisbee, then it will have been worth it," Smith said.

DOE silent on possible SIS holdup

"It's inappropriate at this stage to comment on specific matters during budget preparations, even for an unnamed senior agency official," said Will Callcott, spokesman for the department.

A Washington Post story this week quoted anonymous sources in the Energy Department as saying Secretary James Watkins had no immediate plans to certify the plant. The Post identified its sources only as senior agency officials and congressional sources.

The effect of recent political changes in the administration for nuclear weapons is uncertain, but those events may spell the end of the Special Isotope Separator project, Rep. Richard Stullings said Thursday.

"We would like to refine weapons-grade plutonium from stocks of fuel-grade plutonium.

The Energy Department, however, is not

Solomon owes \$2,400, civil complaint claims

TWIN FALLS - A civil complaint against local naturopath James Solomon seeks payment for "nuturopathic formulas" and "instruments" that Solomon contracted to buy from a former employee.

The complaint was filed in court Thursday by Scott Moon, the son of Solomon's former employee, the late Beth Moon. It seeks the \$2,400 balance of a \$6,000 contract that Solomon and Scott Moon signed in August.

Brit D. Groom, Scott Moon's attorney, said Solomon was purchasing formulas that Beth Moon developed while she worked for him before her recent death. Solomon was also buying a financial interest he believed she held in his treatment

machines, Groom said.

The machines were among those confiscated last month by state investigators in a criminal case against Solomon.

"According to Moon's complaint, filed in 5th District Magistrate Court, Solomon paid \$3,000 up front and agreed to pay the balance with weekly \$100 payments for 30 weeks. But according to the complaint, he made only two further payments: \$500 on Oct. 2, and \$100 on Nov. 10.

Based on Solomon's depositions, Groom demanded the \$2,400 balance on Nov. 14 and went to court Thursday after Solomon didn't respond.

In the criminal case, Solomon, 62, faces two misdemeanor charges of practicing medicine without a license and two felony counts of grand theft by deception.

After an investigation into Solomon's naturopathy practice, prosecutors say that Solomon illegally diagnosed and treated two patients for cancer and other diseases.

His treatments, which prosecutors say were ineffective, include following a diet, taking liquid drops and using electronic machines that emit radio frequencies.

"In all fairness to Dr. Solomon, he had other things on his mind and I understand that," Groom said. "That's why we really weren't pressing him to stay current."

But now Groom and his are eager to finish processing Beth Moon's estate.

"This is just basically a simple collection action.

Solomon, who had not received a copy of the complaint Thursday afternoon, said his payments were current and that he owes only about \$400. He said he recently sent a

payment, inquired about his balance and has been waiting to hear from Groom.

"I also feel this is a conspiracy," he said. "I think it's related to his (Moon's) aunt. I think they planned it."

Nadine Tolman, who is related to Moon by marriage, testified for the prosecution at Solomon's preliminary hearing on grand theft charges.

Solomon said Tolman and Moon must have known that state investigators would confiscate everything he is purchasing from Beth Moon's estate.

But he says the complaint will go to court. In their past business dealings, Solomon was "always straightforward and honest," he said. "I have no reason to expect different this time."

Solomon has 20 days to respond to the complaint.

Cocaine seller given 10 years

State crew seeks new bridge site

TWIN FALLS - A state engineering crew is surveying Rock Creek Canyon this week to find a suitable location for the Singing Bridge's replacement.

Jim Huff, district location supervisor for the Transportation Department, said he began surveying Thursday and his work could take about a week.

He said he is plotting canyon features for about 500 feet in each direction. The work will not affect traffic on the bridge, he said.

District Engineer Loren Thomas said the state will build the new \$3.5 million bridge either next to the existing bridge, or in the same location.

The second option would require finding a detour during construction.

"Essentially we are looking at the same alignment where it is," Thomas said.

The state Transportation Board voted in September to upgrade the project to the highest priority in the state.

At the time, the board moved the starting date up for a replacement bridge one year to 1993.

Thomas said although the final design date is scheduled for 1993, construction may occur earlier or later than that.

"Numerous things between now and then could happen to move it up," he said.

The \$3.5 million price tag on the project will take all the federal funds the state receives for bridge replacements for the year, he said.

Thomas said before a decision is made to place the bridge, the state will hold public hearings, probably in two years.

Official: Expect gridlock in Salt Lake if I-15 not expanded

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Motorists will face gridlock within 10 years if Interstate 15 is not expanded, more buses are put in operation and a light-rail system is built, a transportation task force chairman told a Salt Lake County board Tuesday.

The \$774 million cost may be shocking, said Lowell M. Durham Jr., head of the Transportation Implementation Council.

"But without massive expansion, county roadways will be clogged and air pollution will increase," he said.

The task force, created by the county and the Salt Lake Area

Chamber of Commerce, also recommends spending another \$44 million each year for at least 11 years to improve streets outside I-15 and State Street corridor.

"Much of I-15 within Salt Lake County has outlived its design life," said Durham. "The reconstruction of I-15 is not an option."

Many in the crowd of 150 applauded Wednesday night when a speaker blasted the proposed light-rail system.

"Where's the public good going to be?" asked a resident of Big Cottonwood Canyon.

"If there is one, I haven't seen it here tonight."

Durham said improving I-15 "without building a companion light-rail system would be shortsighted."

Terry With, a task force member, said a light-rail system isn't needed until the county population reaches at least 1 million.

The task force estimates the county's population will grow by 65 percent, from 619,000 people in 1980, to 1 million by 2010.

Subsidies for motorists traveling on an improved I-15 will be \$800 per daily trip, said With.

By contrast, costs for a light-rail system will be \$15,000. "A light-rail system is too extravagant," he said.

The task force recommends building two additional lanes on I-15 and improving interchanges on the freeway.

The light-rail system would be built along the Union Pacific railroad tracks west of the freeway, from the downtown business district to 10600 South in Sandy.

The task force had already backed away from endorsing a North Temple interchange, strongly opposed by the Mormon Church area residents and the Salt Lake City Council.

"I'm opposed to the North Temple interchange," said neighborhood council member Stan Penfold. "And

I'm tired of being asked to respond to a written proposal I have not been allowed to be involved in."

Financing for the corridor would come from a combination of federal money and increases in local taxes and fees.

This would include an additional one-quarter of 1 percent Salt Lake County sales tax and hikes in the state gas tax and state vehicle registration fees.

Former Democratic legislator Sam Taylor of South Salt Lake said he would support a light-rail system if employers initiate a 4-day work weeks, more direct bus routes are opened, public buses are used to

transport schoolchildren and mass transit riders don't have to pay fares.

Bountiful resident Jack Billings waved his bus pass and reminded spectators that fewer than 12 of them use the bus or car pool to work.

Commissioner Mike Stewart had questioned the crowd for Billings, and fewer than a dozen raised their hands when asked who used mass transit.

Salt Lake City resident Frank Dumont suggested that parking lots be closed to public employees.

"Let them ride the bus," he said. "Then maybe the rest of us will follow."

Town pulls miracles for people in need

COUNCIL (AP) — At the entrance to a city, a sign welcoming visitors proclaims, "Council — We Care."

The 900 or so residents of this west-central Idaho town have proven that in spades in recent months.

This time, they have provided clothing, food and emotional support for Jack and Dec Page, whose remodeled house burned down the day before Thanksgiving.

At the same time, the town so far has raised about \$50,000 toward the \$160,000 needed for a summer cabin on their property.

The efforts come less than a year after more than \$150,000 was raised in seven days to prevent the community hospital from closing.

"The people of this town have been just wonderful. I could never thank them enough," Dec Page said. "When Jack and I just wanted to sit down and give up, they wouldn't let us."

The Pages' four boys, who range in age from 21 to 33, and some friends spent the whole summer building a large addition onto their house.

Everything was complete except for the painting of two bedrooms when the fire struck.

While the original house was insured, the addition was not, they said.

The loss was the family's second tragedy in one year. Jack is disabled, having lost an eye in a World War II, lost an eye in an ATV accident last November.

"I think I've just about had it

with November," he said. "Next year we just want to skip it."

The couple spent Thanksgiving weekend at a son's home. When they returned, they found a small summer cabin on their property stocked with food and other necessities by townspeople, and their power and water switched over.

"We used to look around at the house and see the work of our family. Now we look around and see all the good things from our neighbors. It really helps us to keep going," Dec said.

Council residents are taking care of most of their own, too. Dave Kesler was in St. Luke's City on Wednesday for tests to determine what kind of heart he needs for a transplant operation.

"He's down there now because of the money that's been raised," Kesler's son Bradley, 16, said.

"They needed that much of a down payment before they could put in the request for a donor."

Staffers at the Boise Cascade timber mill in Council recently worked a Saturday and donated their earnings to the fund for Kesler, and the company matched their donation.

"They said he's a good type for the transplant, and should be able to find a donor," Bradley said.

Council residents are also trying to keep the Council Community Hospital, which has been losing money, from closing.

Lutheran Health Systems Management of Fargo, N.D., agreed to take over the management of the hospital if the community could raise \$150,000.

Investigator says 'copter needed to climb

PARK CITY, Utah (AP) — A helicopter that crashed when a cable snagged a trailer apparently did not go high enough to force going snagged on a trailer, snappin' up into the rotor and brought down the copter.

Killed in the crash Tuesday was Craig Badami, 37, vice president of marketing for Park City Ski Resort and director of last weekend's World Cup competition at the resort.

He was the son of Nick Badami, owner of the ski area and the Alpine Meadows Ski Corp. in Lake Tahoe, Nev.

Five others were injured.

The crew had been dismantling and transporting a sound system

used during the races from the base of the mountain. Witnesses said the crew was taking off for another load when 50- to 60-foot gear cable snagged on a trailer, snapping up into the rotor and brought down the copter.

The helicopter came down about 150 feet west of the parking lot, near the base of the Three Kings ski lift, sending fragments of metal 1,000 feet from the crash site, Bell said.

The Three Kings run was not open for public skiing and no one on the ground was injured.

He (the pilot) climbed to about 30 feet and started to go forward,

and that wasn't high enough to clear the trailer," said Verlin Tranter, National Transportation Safety Board investigator.

The hook got caught on a small house trailer and after it got free, it shattered one of the blades," he said.

Once that happens, "it puts the aircraft out of balance, and you feel a great vibration and you lose control."

The helicopter, an Aerospacial Alouette SA316, was owned by Rocky Mountain Helicopter of Provo.

Passengers Michael Simonsen, 29, Kearns, and Ed Pratt, 38, Salt Lake

City, remained in serious but stable condition at the University of Utah Health Sciences Center in Salt Lake City, said hospital spokesman Reid Jensen.

At LDS Hospital in Salt Lake City, Lynn Gillies, 49, Fairfield, the helicopter pilot, was in critical but stable condition with abdominal injuries, and David Simonsen, 26, Salt Lake, was in fair condition.

Tribal prosecutors seek warrant for MacDonald's son

WINDOW ROCK, Ariz. (AP) — Special tribal prosecutors on Thursday applied for an arrest warrant to return suspended Navajo Chairman Peter MacDonald's son to the reservation to face conspiracy charges.

MacDonald on Wednesday pleaded innocent to 107 criminal counts, but his son, Peter "Rocky" MacDonald Jr., also facing charges, failed to appear for arraignment.

Judge Robert Yazzie of the tribe's Window Rock District Court didn't immediately rule on special prosecutor Mark Donatelli's application to have Rocky

MacDonald brought to the reservation.

On Oct. 11, the elder MacDonald, leader of the nation's biggest Indian tribe, was charged by special prosecutors with 107 offenses, including conspiracy, bribery, fraud, extortion and election-law violations.

Most of the criminal charges focus on the tribe's 1987 purchase of an Arizona ranch from non-Indian middlemen who made a \$7.2 million profit when they sold the property after buying it less than a day earlier.

Rocky MacDonald and suspended vice chairman Johnnie R.

Thompson also were charged. Thompson pleaded innocent Nov. 17 to 15 election-law violations.

Rocky MacDonald, charged in connection with the ranch purchase, failed to appear for an Nov. 17 arraignment, causing Yazzie to reschedule it for Wednesday.

On Wednesday, however, Rocky MacDonald failed to appear and his attorney, Donald Benally, filed a motion asking that the charges be dismissed.

Benally challenged the tribal court's jurisdiction, noting that his client has lived recently in Phoenix and San Jose, Calif.

The Tribal Council place the elder MacDonald, tentatively scheduled for a Jan. 29 pretrial hearing, on administrative leave Feb. 17. The move followed allegations aired during U.S. Senate hearings that he had accepted bribes and kickbacks.

MacDonald has denied any wrongdoing.

Several witnesses, including Rocky MacDonald, testified during the hearings — that bribes and kickbacks were an accepted way of doing business on the Navajo Reservation.

From Burley to Pocatello, the highest average load was seven passengers last August and the lowest 1.3 in April of this year.

Frank has mixed feelings about the proposed change. "It seems to be a vital link between 1-80 routes and 1-84 routes," he said. "But, if there's only that many people riding each

day, I can't really blame them for cutting back."

City officials will attend the hearing, he said. "I suppose I would not support the change because there is some link-up between here and Eastern Idaho and if they cut that then there'll be no commercial transportation."

LuBoono said that while the bus is not heavily utilized, it offers bus-ramp transportation to western Idaho if the airport is closed by weather. It also offers an option to low-income residents and students who may not be able to afford plane fare, he said.

Ellsworth, U.S. attorney for Idaho, investigated prosecutors said, and investigators seized a total of 16 pounds of cocaine. It was the largest cocaine seizure from one person in Idaho history, prosecutors said.

Flores-Ramirez pleaded guilty to a charge of conspiring to deliver cocaine and was sentenced earlier this month to 124 years in prison.

The two arrests culminated several

months of investigation led by Idaho Organized Crime/Drug Enforcement Task Force. Local, state and federal agencies cooperated.

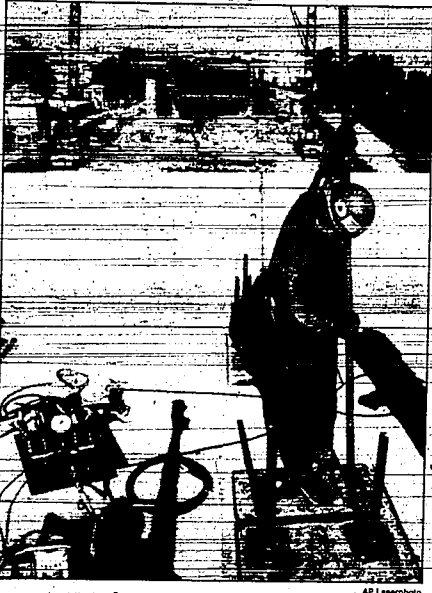

Nimitz Freeway undergoes shakedown

Los Angeles Times' OAKLAND, Calif. — The double-decked Nimitz Freeway, or at least what is left of it, suffered a magnitude 7 earthquake Thursday afternoon — for two hours.

No. Mother Nature was not wreaking some strange vengeance on the remnants of the freeway that collapsed and killed 41 people during the magnitude 7.1 earthquake that shook the Bay Area Oct. 17.

Rather, it was a team of civil engineers from University of California, Berkeley, and the California Department of Transportation who were shaking an isolated, block-long section of the freeway to determine why a mile-long section of it collapsed during the October tremor.

By doing so, they hope to learn how to retrofit other freeways in the area — and throughout the state — so that they are less likely to collapse in a future quake.

During the next two to three weeks, the research team will gradually increase the amount of force applied to the Nimitz segment each day until they get up to about magnitude 7.5.

Eventually after the supporting columns have been reinforced using techniques that are expected to be applied to other damaged freeways, UC Berkeley civil engineer Jack Moele and his colleagues will shake it even harder to see whether they can make it collapse despite the reinforcements.

If it does collapse, the engineers will know they will have to explore other types of reinforcement. But it won't collapse very far.

Construction crews have created a strong supporting structure under the top deck and, if it fails, it will only fall about 6 inches or so. "The most anyone will hear is a dull thud," Moele said.

Television crews and reporters who flocked to the test site here Thursday hoping to see the structure swaying violently were disappointed.

A motion sensor on one end of the freeway, looking something like the antenna of a car radio, swayed back and forth, but the movement of the structure itself was not readily apparent.

During the shaking, workmen casually walked around on the top deck, monitoring instruments and taking pictures with television cameras, seemingly oblivious to the simulated quake.

Others went on with preparations for the ultimate test, in which powerful hydraulic jacks will force the top deck from side to side in an effort to knock it loose from its foundation.

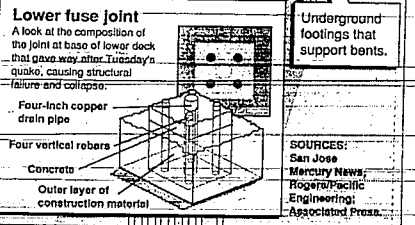
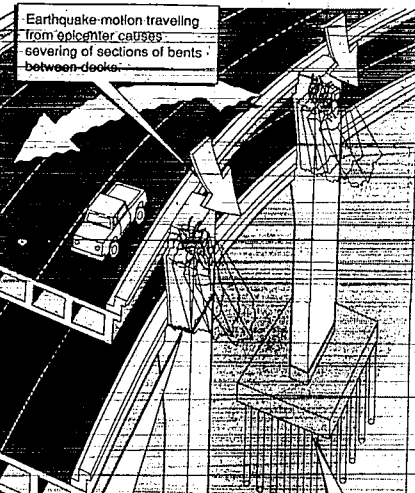
The force for Thursday's simulated quake, however, was provided by a deceptively simple apparatus: two off-center weights connected to a two-part vertical shaft axis firmly attached to the top deck of the freeway.

As the motor-driven shaft rotated weights in opposite directions, it applied a sideways force to the freeway similar to that produced by a wet blanket in an out-of-balance washing machine, Moele said.

To increase the size of the simulated quake in the coming weeks, the workers will simply add more weights to the shaft.

The highway was constructed of reinforced concrete. Columns called "bents", spaced about every 90 feet along the road, supported the two road decks.

BOISE (AP) — Milton Erhart, the Boise stockbroker who seeks the Republican governor nomination, says a tax exemption to encourage the production of alcohol has cost Idaho \$20 million that is badly needed for roads and bridges.

Erhart continued on Thursday to object to Idaho bills promoting the use of ethanol and featuring the name of Gov. Cecil Andrus, a Democrat, said the use of ethanol picture on the apparatus was an attempt to indirectly allow corporations to contribute to the Democratic governor.

"The governor is deliberately clouding the issue by claiming that promoting ethanol is no different than promoting potatoes and apples."

"Potato and apple growers do not receive tax exemption from the sale of their product. Lethanol does," he said.

"I am strongly in favor of reducing carbon monoxide levels in the state of Idaho, but ethanol should play on the same level as methane use in the state."

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EPA wants to restrict crop fungicides

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Environmental Protection Agency plans next week to take the first steps toward restrictions on fungus-controlling chemicals used by thousands of Idaho potato growers, Sen. James McClure says.

McClure said Thursday he asked the agency in a letter to delay the action for at least 90 days so it can be determined if the chemicals really pose a threat to human health.

He made the same request in a meeting Thursday afternoon in a meeting with an EPA official.

McClure said in a prepared statement that EPA plans to issue paperwork on Monday to limit use of the chemical group known as EBDGs. Commercial brand names for the fungicides include Manezeb, Maneb, Metiram and Zineb.

He said limits should not be set on the chemicals until after ongoing surveys of chemical residues. Preliminary results are not expected until January.

McClure said cancelling use of EBDGs will cause substantial losses next year to Idaho potato growers, since growers used the chemical in this year's growing season. In addition, he said, "the residue levels of these chemicals is negligible at best, and the need to encourage this label for potatoes is in question."

EPA's concerns stem from a substance called ETU (ethylene thiourea), created when EBDGs break down and which have been found to be cancer-causing in laboratory rats and mice.

To determine residue levels, EPA has taken measurements at the time of harvest.

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3rd suit filed as Canyon jail dispute grows

CALDWELL (AP) — A second lawsuit has been filed, accusing the Eastern County Commission of acting illegally in putting together its plan to build a new jail.

Four architectural and contracting firms asked the Third District Court on Wednesday for more than \$700,000 in reimbursement for jail proposals they submitted to the county last summer.

The companies are CSHQA Architects of Boise, Lombard-Conrad Architects of Boise, Dana-Larson, Reubal and Associates of Nebraska and Phelps Inc. of Colorado.

The county chose a proposal submitted by Western Corrections Group of Santa Fe, N.M. Western Corrections' contract was later rescinded because the group's architect James Parkey and contractor Layton Construction were not licensed in Idaho.

Although the contract was ended, Western Corrections President O. Wesley Box was hired to manage the project.

The latest suit alleges the commissioners illegally hired Western Corrections and then failed to correct its mistakes by hiring Box. It claims Box, as an individual, never submitted a proposal or cost estimate and should not have been hired.

The firms claim they should be paid for their original proposals since the commission did not give them a "fair chance" in the bidding process.

Employees sue defunct newspaper.

BOISE (AP) — Former managers and sales employees of The Idaho Times, which ceased weekly publication last month, have sued the newspaper's owners unpaid wages and expense reimbursement.

The suit, filed in U.S. District Court, also charges the owners with triple damages from Idaho Publishing Limited Partnership. The suit was filed after managing owner John Mattus of Houston failed to respond to demands for nearly \$15,000 workers claimed they were owed.

The suit is just the latest financial development for the partnership, which also owns Boise radio station KLCI-FM under the name Idaho Broadcasting Co.

Key Bank of Idaho claims it is owed more than \$700,000 on unpaid loans, and has accused Mattus of filing false financial statements.

Man takes wrong-way trip on interstate

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — An elderly man thought he was going to a North Spokane shopping mall to get his watch repaired when he wound up driving the wrong way on Interstate 90 and collided with a car, Idaho State Police said.

John D. Swank, 79, of Spokane, appeared disoriented to operate a pickup vehicle moments after the head-on collision in the westbound lanes four miles west of here Saturday, Cpl. Jay Komosinski said Wednesday.

"After talking with him, I don't think he should have been driving that particular night, he is normally confused," said Komosinski. "He was extremely confused. I'm not sure the accident caused the confusion. I got the feeling that he is normally confused."

The driver of the car, 18-year-old Melissa Goebel of Long Lake, Wash., has been in a coma since the accident and remained in critical condition Wednesday at Kootenai Medical Center. The Mead High School senior was expected to be transferred Thursday to Sacred-Heart Medical Center in Spokane, her father said.

ISU affows applied technology degrees

POCATELLO (AP) — The Idaho State University Faculty Senate has given approval to five bachelors' degrees in applied technology programs, to be offered through the College of Arts and Sciences.

The approval means success may be near for a year-long attempt by ISU to offer vocational and technical students the chance to earn bachelors' degrees in about four years.

Faculty members earlier rebuffed an effort to turn the ISU Vocational-Technical School into a four-year, degree-granting college. Among objections from members of the university's curriculum council were the need to waive some general education requirements, dropping the number of upper-division courses required for vocational students, and the fact that many vocational faculty members do not have

Group urges U.S. control over farm policy

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — An Idaho farm advocacy group wants farmers to pressure Congress for a trade agreement that doesn't undercut U.S. control of its farm products.

Phil Lansing of Boise, an Idaho Rural Council organizer, criticized the U.S. negotiating position on the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade at an Idaho Falls meeting Wednesday.

Negotiators from 96 nations are discussing revision of GATT in Geneva, Switzerland. A portion of the trade agreement affects farmers. The Rural Council is concerned that the Bush administration's

stance will severely hurt family farmers.

Idaho's congressional representatives expressed support for GATT's overall goals, but said they would back the measure if it hurts Idaho's farmers.

Lansing said the U.S. proposal for GATT dramatically changes import and export rules for American commodities. The U.S. proposal, which the Rural Council president wrote in a recent editorial, makes it illegal for any nation to have price support programs or import limits. It also bans export limits by poor countries during food shortages, Lansing said.

The administration's aim is to expand free trade and reduce trade barriers among nations. Lansing said the council doesn't oppose free trade, but it wants to remain control of farm policy within each nation.

Farmers are worried that a revised GATT agreement would dictate U.S. farm policy, he said. Negotiators want to reach an agreement by late 1990.

Pam Bakewell, Rural Council president, wrote in a recent editorial that the GATT measure could have severe consequences for Idaho farmers. She wrote that the agreement, if it goes into effect as the administration plans, could hurt simply not the case.

the wool, sugar beet, dairy, beef, honey and wheat industries by opening the U.S. market to imports at lower costs.

Rural Council members say that if the GATT measure goes through as proposed and is accepted by Congress, multi-national corporations will be able to control commodity prices through high-volume trade purchases.

J.D. Palmer, spokesman for Sen. Jim McClure, said in an interview that if there's a belief that control over farm policy would transfer from Congress to an international trade negotiating body, "that's simply not the case."

Student asks for university finance probe

MOSCOW (AP) — The University of Idaho's outgoing student body president is asking the student senate to call for a legislative audit of the school over how student fees are being spent.

"Meanwhile, the Idaho Board of Education's internal auditor says she will begin looking next month into how student fees are collected and used at all the state's four-year schools."

"We realized more and more that some things just don't seem right with regard to the university's finances," Tina Kagi, UI student body president, said Wednesday.

"What I would like to see is an independent audit (on) how the university is handling its accounts, where it's being spent and if it's being spent in the proper manner."

The UI financial vice president, Joseph Geiger, said he believes the university has complied with every state Board of Education rule.

UI students have voted overwhelmingly against taking the state to court over fee increases implemented this fall. Ms. Kagi backed the suit.

Last summer, the Education Board approved fee increases of \$25 per semester for resident undergraduate students, as well as differing hikes for others.

Arthur Andersen and Co. in Boise currently is the Education Board's external auditor of Lewis-Clark State College, Boise State University and Idaho Technical College and the UI.

The company will be paid about \$236,900 to conduct audits at those schools in this fiscal year. The external audit tests every revenue and expense category at each school, said Stacy Pearson, the Education Board internal auditor. UI, BSU and ISU also have their own internal auditors, she said.

Specialist seeks fungicide, but is concerned about other wastes

CALDWELL (AP) — The U.S. Bureau of Land Management is using radar to search for about 30,000 pounds of a fungicide buried 12 years ago in or near a Caldwell-area landfill.

Paul Seronko, BLM environmental protection specialist, said his agency is looking for several hundred drums of the chemical Polyram, a substance he said has been found to cause cancer.

FMC Corp. applied for and received permission from the county and state governments to dump the material at the Central Cove landfill seven miles southwest of Caldwell in 1977.

"However, when the trench was dug, it may have been on BLM land instead of property used for the landfill," Seronko said.

The old Caldwell dump is split into two sections. Seronko said. The old and new sections were divided by a narrow strip of BLM land.

"It (the fungicide) may have been dumped illegally on BLM land," Seronko said.

"The BLM is a government entity, and we are the landowner in this case," Seronko said. "The BLM is looking out for public health — that's No. 1 with us."

The fungicide itself may not be the biggest health risk in the area, though, he said.

"Polyram is relatively insoluble and probably is not a big threat," Seronko said. "But the old part of the dump is what actually scares me most."

He said during the time the landfill was open, from 1966 to 1983, dumping there was relatively unchecked.

According to the preliminary investigation, septic sludge, numerous pesticide containers, liquid dairy sludge, manure, meat packing plant sludge and hazardous household wastes probably were dumped.

However, with the fungicide potentially on BLM land outside the established landfill, there is a possibility a cleanup will be initiated if the ground and water are contaminated.

"Powers greater than me will decide what will be done with it," Seronko said. "It is my understanding that the county dug the trench and FMC did the dumping, so it's unclear who would be liable for the cleanup costs."

To locate the barrels, Ecology and Environment Inc. of Seattle will use "ground penetrating radar units" that send signals into the ground to locate subterranean features, such as the barrels or the trench.

"We originally asked for legal guidance because several teachers requested that the dues money be paid directly to them," said Dehryl Prosecutor Greg Bower says he can "do not apply to teachers because 'Tony' Dennis, deputy superintendent for Boise schools.

As a result of Bower's finding, the School District will pay the first half of an estimated \$310,000 in union dues to the Boise Education Association. The remainder is due by Feb. 1.

In light of Mr. Bower's opinion, we're required by the contract to continue the current practice."

Eight teachers asked they be paid their portion of the dues money — \$257 per employee this year — directly.

This year, the district will pay 69 percent of employees' union dues.

Caldwell landmark closes doors

CALDWELL (AP) — Caldwell's best known landmark — the historic Sartoga Restaurant — is going out of business.

"It's a long story and there's no one reason why we have to close the restaurant," owner Gene Hemenway said Thursday as the restaurant prepared for an indefinite closure. "We've exhausted all other alternatives."

Work needed on Portneuf, says expert

POCATELLO (AP) — An out-of-state expert says eastern Idaho's Portneuf River is degraded about as badly as any river he's studied because of historic farming practices.

Former Montana State University geotechnologist professor Donald Reichmuth says it would take several months and an estimated \$20,000 to improve erosion problems in the river. He's owner of Geomax, a Hazeman, Mont. river restoration company.

"People are afraid of doing something innovative or different," he said. "They are more comfortable doing what their father or grandfather did."

The Portneuf runs from a reservoir in Caribou County to near Lava Hot Springs and through Pocatello before emptying into American Falls Reservoir.

Reichmuth said the river's upper section can be restored to its former status as a blue-ribbon trout fishery, and also benefit farmers and ranchers — if corrective measures are taken from Chesterfield Reservoir downstream to Lava Hot Springs.

Reichmuth was hired by the state Fish and Game Department to identify the river's problems and propose a solution.

"When he evaluated the river in April, Reichmuth concluded the river channel is too straight and steep. That causes bank instability and stream bed erosion. He also discovered that the loss of vegetative cover is contributing to erosion and warm water."

"If you control those two, you would have a totally different environment up there," he said.

Bank erosion was precipitated earlier in the century when irrigators channeled the river to improve water velocity.

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1,200 angry Kansas demonstrators seek property tax relief

TOPEKA, Kan. (AP) — Angry demonstrators demanded property tax relief on the steps of the Statehouse Wednesday, with many at a tax protest rally shouting "throw Mike Hayden to make an appearance."

After the rally, about three dozen people went to the governor's office and demanded to see Hayden, but were met by the governor's chief of staff, Dennis Taylor. He said Hayden was out and attempted to defuse the throng's anger.

A couple of hours later, however, Hayden met with about a dozen of the protesters in two different sessions.

"He mostly listened to us," said Betty Rutke of Emporia. "We got his attention, I think. He's got to be concerned that he isn't going to be a state, he's going to have a ghost state."

The governor said he wasn't asked to speak at the rally and wasn't aware those attending it had shouted for him to appear.

"They've got some real legitimate concerns," Hayden said after meeting with the smaller groups.

"I've made every effort to be open in our administration," he added.

Leaders of the Kansas Association of Realtors, the main organization promoting the rally, and a few lawyers addressed the crowd, which was estimated by Capital Area Security police at between 1,200 and 1,500.

Some people came by bus from Wichita and the Kansas City area.

Nestor Weigand, a Wichita realtor, told the crowd the Legislature made a mistake when it placed the reappraisal and classification amendment on the November 1986 ballot.

Some 75 percent of the voters approved the amendment.

"Sometimes we elect people to office who refuse to listen," Weigand said.

"The message we're going to send to the Legislature is simply this: Listen to us, do not ignore us."

"Don't just ask what your constituents can do for you, but what you can do for your constituents. Do not give us taxation without representation."

The rally, organized by a group called "Citizens for Fair Taxation," was held while the Legislature's Joint Study Committee on Reappraisal and Classification was holding hearings inside the Capitol.

They were called because of the uproar over increased property taxes.

Park Service studies the cracks in famous Mt. Rushmore faces

MOUNT RUSHMORE NATIONAL MEMORIAL, S.D. (AP) — Round, black markers dotted the tree-stone faces of four U.S. presidents Thursday as a project got under way to develop a long-term maintenance plan for Mount Rushmore.

National Park Service employees and workers from an engineering firm carefully positioned the markers on the 60-foot-tall granite faces of the photographs in a helicopter could take close-up pictures Friday of cracks that may threaten the structural integrity of the Shrine of Democracy.

"The ultimate purpose is so we can actually map those cracks and make models of the mountain and then analyze those models to determine what potential movement and instability is there," said Dan Wenk, Mount Rushmore superintendent.

The black markers, 15 inches around, will become reference marks in the photographs.

Each fall, workers seal cracks in the faces with a mixture of granite dust, white lead and insected oil to keep out water that would freeze and lessen the damage when cool weather makes the rock contract.

It was decided two years ago that a comprehensive examination of the popular tourist attraction and a maintenance plan was needed, Wenk said.

Monthly measurements since 1980 of a prominent crack on the forehead of George Washington's likeness indicated the potential instability of the fissure, he said.

A scientist projected that the crack would widen one-quarter of an inch every 200 years, Wenk said.

"There has been no discernible damage to the memorial to date, and this will allow us to make certain we can preserve it," he said.

A structural analysis of the



portraits of Presidents Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln and Andrew Roosevelt drilled and blasted into a mountainside in the Black Hills should be done by next fall, Wenk said.

They are largest carved figures anywhere in Washington's face as high as a five-story building, bigger than any sphinx in Egypt, and the monument can be seen for 60 miles.

Wenk said the estimated \$350,000 cost of the project will be paid by the private Mount Rushmore National Memorial Society.

The non-profit group has served as a benefactor to the monument since 1930.

Work on Mount Rushmore began in 1927 by sculptor Gutzon Borglum and was finished in 1941 by his son, Lincoln.

The Black Hills memorial attracts about 2 million visitors a year.

The monument was the scene of a climactic final battle in "North by Northwest," Alfred Hitchcock's classic 1959 thriller starring Cary Grant.

A golden anniversary celebration is being planned for 1991, Mount Rushmore never has been officially dedicated, and Wenk said it is hoped President Bush will agree to do the honors for the 50th anniversary.

Transformer, ceramic companies pick Pocatello

POCATELLO (AP) — U.S. Transformer, a Minneapolis-based company that reconstructs large power transformers, has established an operation at the Entawny West Industrial Center that will employ about 60 workers here.

And-city officials announced Wednesday that Cerate Inc., a subsidiary of a Connecticut ceramic tile manufacturer, has finalized financing to open another Gateway West business that will employ 60 people at first and could reach 100 new jobs in two years.

Earl Swift, New Jersey industrial park developer who bought the PAFCC complex earlier this year, said U.S. Transformer is starting up in Building 37 after responding to Swift's ad in a trade publication.

"They rebuild power transformers for utility companies and so forth, it's big stuff," Swift said.

He said he is now negotiating with the company for four or five months. "I believe once they get into full production capacity, they will employ around 60 people."

Originally, U.S. Transformer was to share Building 38 with Cerate, but both wanted to leave room for expansion.

Establishment of the two companies in the former Naval Ordnance Plant will increase rail and motor freight traffic to and from Gateway West, he said, estimating that they will bring the sprawling project's total occupancy up to about 30 percent.

U.S. Transformer has located managerial staff in Pocatello and Cerate should start installing equipment in February, including a kiln from Italy. Production should begin in six months.

Cerate will be installing state-of-the-art equipment that will enable the production of high-quality tile that can be widely marketed throughout the United States, said Mayor Dick Finlayson.

Cerate decided to move to Pocatello because of its proximity to white clay in Wyoming.

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Zions Securities Corp. has unveiled plans for a \$10 million renovation of the ZCMI Center that is intended to give the 15-year-old shopping complex a new look and some 20 new stores.

The project reflects a carefully planned contribution to the history, tradition and long-term preservation of downtown Salt Lake City, said W. Kent Mosey, president of center owner Zions Securities, the real estate arm of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

At the same time, the ZCMI Center will move into the next decade in visual presentation and retailing, he said.

Construction is scheduled to get under way in November.

Plans for the 600,000-square-foot mall feature a redesigned interior, a new food park and garden, four fountains and new entry ways on South Temple and Main streets.

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Orofino prison screens nodded

OROFINO (AP) — Not satisfied with a proposal for putting up a barrier of trees to screen off the Idaho Correctional Institute at Orofino, nearby residents have left a public meeting threatening a lawsuit.

The citizens advisory board for the prison, however, gave the go-ahead Wednesday to Idaho Corrections Director Richard Vernon to proceed with a barrier between the prison and residents of Dunlap Road, as well as Orofino High School.

The barrier is to consist of trees and large bushes. Trees as large as 25 feet tall may be planted to provide quick screening from sights and sounds.

"I think this meeting was just as

big a force as some of the others we have attended," Bob Smith, a Dunlap Road resident, said after the Wednesday meeting. "It's been five years and they haven't done anything but talk."

Resident Jerry Musselman read a statement: "The Dunlap Road citizens group will take this case to court in order to receive fair compensation for the losses we will be taking due to the prison location and its direct effect on property values."

A ton claim already has been filed against the state, he said.

"Mr. Musselman, you are going to have to play it out as you can," board president Marvin Lambrecht told him, adding the board would

work with the Corrections Department to solve some of the problems.

Dunlap Road residents have publicly accused the state of renegeing on its promise to be a good neighbor. They say the proximity of the prison has reduced property values and prisoners assail them with offensive language.

They suggested the state buy their eight homes for \$1 million, but Vernon rejected the idea, saying it was not in his power.

After listening to Musselman, Philip Presnell of Lewiston, one of three members of the Corrections Board, said that because of the threat he may recommend the department do nothing to change the situation.

Former Green River suspect cleared

SEATTLE (AP) — A man originally termed a "suspect" in the Green River serial killings no longer is a suspect in the case, the commander of a task force investigating the murders said Thursday.

King County Police Capt. Robert Evans told KING-TV that records removed from William Jay Stevens II's home and other information gathered by detectives has eliminated Stevens as a suspect.

Stevens, 39, is being held in the Spokane County jail awaiting trial on federal firearms charges resulting from guns found at his Spokane home during a search by the Green River Task Force and Spokane

police.

Stevens was arrested in January and has been investigated in connection with the deaths and disappearances of 49 women, most of them prostitutes, who vanished from 1982 to 1984 mostly in the Seattle area.

The case, named for the south King County river where the first five victims were found, is the worst known, unsolved serial murder case in the United States.

Stevens was not charged with any of the killings and has said he is innocent.

Stevens was indicted by a federal grand jury in October on three counts of being a felon in possession

of a firearm. The charges stem from 29 handguns that were seized from his room at his father's Spokane house after Stevens was arrested.

His trial has been moved from Spokane to Tucson, Ariz., because of extensive pre-trial news coverage.

Stevens came to police attention after the television show "Manhunt" broadcast details about the Green River killings and asked the public for tips.

Stevens, who was a law student at Gonzaga University in Spokane at the time of the broadcast, had escaped from a King County work release center in 1981 while serving time for a 1979 burglary of a police equipment supply company.

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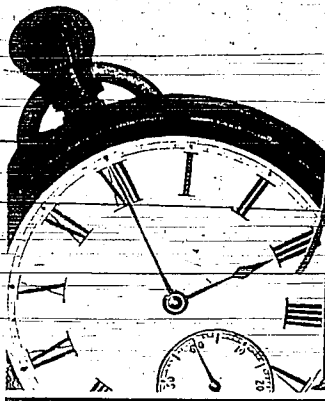
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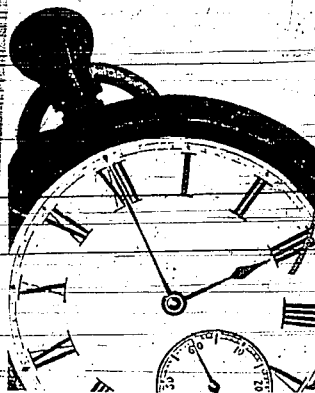

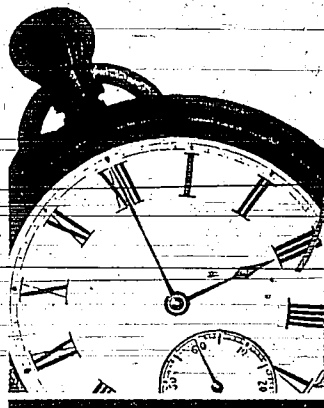

Region-18-of-the-National-Junior-College-Athletic-Association-probably-offers-the-best-upper-division-junior-college-basketball-of-any-region-in-the-nation, though the have-continue-to-struggle.

Some teams are legitimate contenders, others mere pretenders, and while virtually all feature talent well worth the price of admission, the College of Southern Idaho mystique still holds sway in the men's game.

Under Fred Trenkle, the region's top coach again in 1989, the Golden Eagles won their 15th regional title in 21 years, 102-93 over Dixie College.

In fact, twice in the last three years CSI and the Rebels have met to decide the regional basketball championship. Only Salt Lake Community College, in 1988, interrupted that series.

Dixie and Utah Valley figure to carry the "southern" division banner this season, but the stiffest competition is expected to come from the poised and talented Ricks Vikings.

Ricks
Gary Gardner is a secure coach. He's

compiled a 166-94 record in eight years at the Rexburg school — and he's clated over current prospects.

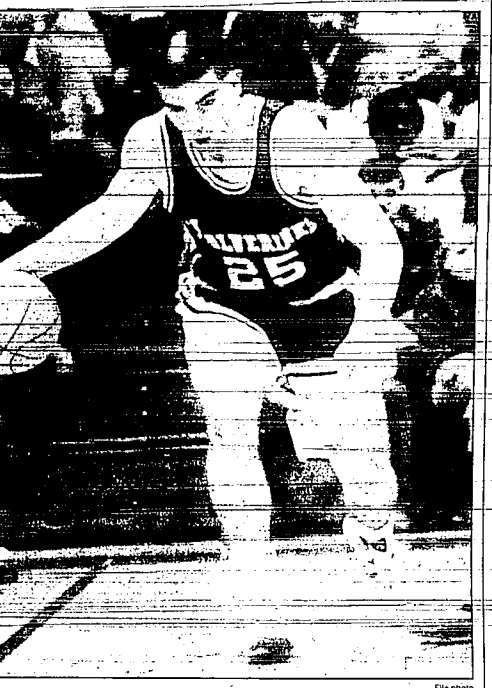
"In my coaching career at Ricks, we have never before had this many starters returns," he said. "These players have a lot of experience and know what it takes to win. And to win in our league it takes talent, determination and luck."

The Vikings are coming off a 12-20 (6-12 regional) season, in which they were decimated by injuries, but should return to form in '89-90 with four returning starters and the best overall height of any team in the region.

Top gun Keegan Kane, a 6-foot, 4-inch Idaho Falls sophomore, canned 62 of 108 three-point attempts (57.4 percent) to pace the region a year ago. His 19.5-point scoring average was good for fifth place in the region and he registered 19 blocked shots on defense.

Back in the fold as well are 6-5 Bob Holker, a second-team all-region player who was eighth in regional scoring at 18.2 points and averaged 7.6 rebounds. Dispellng an old myth, 6-10 Ken Jackson was in the top 10 from the foul line (75.6 percent) while 5-11 point guard Rod Dixon had 6.6 points and 4.9 assists per game, the alignment's only top 10 performer in that category. The fifth starter, 6-6 soph Paul Davis, started on the Vikings 1986-87 team.

Top newcomers include Clint Bailey, a 6-6 freshman who twice led Jerome High School to state, and frontcourt mates Tom Call and Jared Miller, both 6-8. Holker's

Wholesale coaching changes leave a multitude of questions to be asked about Region 18 women's basketball this year.

In all, six new coaches dot the 10 conference-member schools, including DoHaven-Hill at defending regular-season and regional tournament champion Northwest Idaho.

CSI's Ben Stroud and fifth-year Ricks coach Lori Woodland are the northern incumbents while only Tom Perkins and Jean Widdison, at Utah Valley and Salt Lake Community College, respectively, remain at the helm in the south.

The women play a four-team

tournament for the right to advance to national competition and it's the national division's turn to play host.

The women's game is long advanced past the delicate stage so, while the coaches give CSI and Ricks a slight edge in a free-toss game that includes North Idaho, the site could well be determined by which team turns out to be the most physical.

Ricks
The 17-10 Lady Vikings were the only team to finish in both regular and post-season play.

There's just one starter back from a team that finished 13-5 in league play, but she's a dandy. In addition, Woodland can call on six other sopho who show considerable talent and she feels that her recruiting year was superb.

"We were able to sign some top high school athletes, girls recruited by four-year institutions," she said.

Millie Ostler, a 5-foot, 11-inch forward who led Greer to the Idaho

7-3 championship two years back, was a first team all-region and all-tournament selection last year. The region's fourth-best scorer at 15.6 points, she is also the best returning rebounder with 7.4 per outing.

Other returning sophomores include Nikki Baldwin, who averaged almost 10 points last year, Kate Orme, Michelle Tilton, Tami Fowers, Becky Rees and 5-11 Shirley Pedersen.

"All of them are greatly improved," noted Woodland. "I think Shirley has surprised us most. She is really going to be tough in the forward position."

Topping the recruiting list are a pair of guards just one inch shorter than Ostler and Pedersen, Becky Entwistle of Lake Oswego, Ore., and Jennifer McDonough from Boise.

Utah Valley
The presence of four players who were at least part-time starters holds a return to prominence for the Lady Wolverines despite Perkins' protestations that it's "an average UVC team."

Don't be misled by his lamentations. Through six seasons Perkins' teams have lost but 28 of 142 contests.

Seven players over 5-10 — including a pair of footers and a 6-foot, 1-inch freshman — enhance the likelihood that Utah Valley will improve on an already enviable 11-7 and 17-8 record.

The return starters, like their teammates all natives of the Beehive state, are 6-0 Kim Saarr, 5-11 Erin Menson and 5-8 guards Kim Blackburn and Joanne Uley.

Volleyball notable Julie Trane, at 5-8, is one of the brightest lights in a freshman class that includes 5-11 forward Jaime White, 5-9 guard Tomika Young, 6-1 center Wendy Taylor, and 6-0 Kris Young.

"The team is very young and four players played volleyball," Perkins added. "So it depends on how soon those four can con-

I-AA player of the year award goes to Idaho quarterback Friesz

MOSCOW — University of Idaho quarterback John Friesz was named the "Coaches Choice" College Football Player of the Year for NCAA Division I-AA at a press conference Thursday in Detroit.

The press conference was held at the Detroit Athletic Club, although the senior from Coeur d'Alene will be officially presented the award at the American Football Coaches Association national convention Jan. 8.

Winners in each of the NCAA's four divisions receive the awards, as planned by the nation's 3,300 AFCA coaches.

"It's obviously an honor, but when you win this award like this, you have to give a lot of credit to your players and coaches," Friesz said. "And not just this year's players and coaches."

"It's kind of a career award. You have to be consistent, and that's really hard for a lot of other coaches. You can credit all the way back to coach

(Dennis) Erickson, who started it all," he said. Erickson has moved up from Idaho to Washington State to a dazzling season at Miami.

This season, Friesz, passed for 4,041 yards, becoming only the eighth player in NCAA history — and third in I-AA history — to hit 4,000 yards in a single season. He finished his career with 10,697 regular season yards, ranking him third all-time in I-AA history.

Friesz also ended up with a total of 24 school records, 18 conference marks and five I-AA standards, most of them this season.

But Friesz said the award was more the result of his college accom-

plishments than just this season. In his 35-game regular-season career, he completed 801 of 1,340 (59.3 percent) for 10,697 yards (305.6 per game), 77 touchdowns and 40 interceptions. He also averaged 383.8 yards in four I-AA playoff games including 420 in last week's career-ending 38-21 loss to Eastern Illinois.

"I just feel real fortunate to be in such a winning program like Idaho, and with the type of offense it has," he said. "It really allows you to display your talents on the field."

With Friesz as a starter, Idaho won 81 percent of its games, or 29 of 36. He was 27-5, or 84.3 percent, in regular-season games, leading Idaho to three

consecutive Big Sky titles.

Ahead is the possibility of other honors, including inclusion on All-America teams and the Sports Network Walter Payton Award, which is also given to the top I-AA player.

Friesz has been selected to play in the East-West Shrine Game in Palo Alto, Calif., on Jan. 21, and the Blue-Gray Game in Montgomery, Ala., on Christmas Day. He will be joined by his Vandal teammate Lee Allen in the Blue-Gray.

"It's probably going to mean a lot on draft day and things like that, so I'm a little bit nervous about those

aspects," he said. "But I'm excited about it. Helping out the kids in the hospital at the East-West Shrine game is important to me."

The Shrine Game benefits the 22 Shriners Hospitals for crippled and disabled children in 23 states and North America. Last year, \$301,000 was raised, as well as a total of \$10 million in the event's 65-year history.

"When you're still trying to look forward, if you look at your accomplishments so much, you start to get complacent and content with what you've done instead of trying to continue on," he said.

Friesz, Hauck named Big Sky's most valuable

BOISE — Quarterback John Friesz, whose record-setting career anchored three consecutive Big Sky Conference football titles for the Idaho Vandals, was named on Thursday the league's Most Valuable Player on offense during the 1989 season.

Friesz, who earlier in the day was chosen as Player of the Year in NCAA Division I-AA, was the unanimous selection for the MVP award to become the first player in Big Sky history to claim the honor for three straight seasons. He was the unanimous choice this year.

On defense, the league's coaches picked Montana free safety Tim Hauck as the Most Valuable Player, the first time that award has been won by a back-to-back seasons by the same player, while freshman quarterback Fred Gatlin of Nevada

Reno was picked as the league's Top Newcomer.

Friesz, a 6-4, 216-pound senior from Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, led the nation this year in total offense, averaging 350 yards a game, and the Big Sky in passing efficiency, compiling 61 percent of his passes for a league record 4,041 yards. It is only the eighth player in NCAA history to pass for over 4,000 yards in one season. In 425 passing attempts, he was intercepted just eight times while completing 31 times for touchdowns.

His senior season performance was highlighted with Greg Wyatt of Northern Arizona as the all-time Big Sky passing leader with 10,697 yards.

With Friesz at the helm, the Vandals were 29-7 overall and 22-2 in the league although his final game in the first round of the I-AA championship playoffs ended in a 38-21 defeat to Eastern Illinois.

Hauck, a 6-1, 180-pound senior free safety

from Big Timber, Mont., anchored the Montana defense that was the best in the nation against the rush, allowing just 70.2 yards a game. Credited with seven interceptions himself, he led a secondary that picked off a league-high 26 passes, including a Big Sky and I-AA record 10 against Boise State.

For the season he was credited with a team-leading 129 tackles, including 64 solo stops. He had four tackles for losses of 14 yards, six pass deflections, three blocked kicks, three forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

Houston's Ware leads race for Heisman Trophy

NEW YORK — Houston quarterback Andre Ware has emerged as the clear front-runner for the Heisman Trophy, according to a newspaper poll.

The record-breaking junior held a big lead over his closest challengers in a USA Today survey of 163 Heisman voters this week. The winner of college football's top award will be announced Saturday at the Downtown Athletic Club.

Ware received 58 first-place votes and 262 points in the poll, which surveyed 18 percent of the 918 eligible voters. West Virginia quarterback Major Harris was second in points with 162, five more than Indiana running back Anthony Thompson. Thompson had more first-place votes than Harris (31-

23), but Harris was the second and third choice on more ballots.

As in the real Heisman balloting, a player got three points for a first-place vote, two for second and one for third.

Notre Dame quarterback Tony Rice was fourth in the poll with 16 first-place votes and 118 points. Next were quarterback Dee Dowis of Air Force, running back Emmitt Smith of Florida and quarterback Darrin Hogan of Colorado.

Dowis received 44 points, while Smith got 31 and Hogan 29. But Hogan had the most first-place votes of the trio with five; Rice, Dowis and four more than Smith.

Last week, polls showed Ware and Thompson running neck and neck with Rice third. But Ware apparently surged ahead last Saturday,

when he had a big game while Thompson and Rice struggled.

Ware passed for 475 yards and four touchdowns in a 40-24 win over Texas Tech. Thompson was held to 97 yards on 28 carries in a 17-12 loss to Purdue and Rice was limited to 106 yards passing and 50 yards rushing on 20 carries in a 27-10 loss to Miami.

Ware has established seven NCAA records this season and has a chance to set eight more Saturday in Houston's final game against Rice.

"His statistics are so overwhelming that it is swayed a close decision," the poll's pollster, Heisman voter Doug Dougherty of the Roanoke (Va.) Times & World-News.

If Ware wins the award, he would be the eighth junior to do so and the first winner from a school on probation.

Wildlife haunt new downtown gallery

TWIN FALLS — Wildlife art is probably the most popular genre among Idahoans. But finding work that is as true to art as it is to wildlife is sometimes a difficult task.

"Wildlife art has an abundance of people who are masters of fine art mediums. But there's very little fine art work being done," says Blaine Billman, a local man who is nationally known for his own work in the field.

The reason, says Billman, is the commercialization and conservation of the wildlife art world. Certain ideas and subjects — mainly spotting themes — are repeated. "They're done and overdone," Billman adds.

To give area wildlife art aficionados a wider view of what's being done in the field, Billman unveiled Call of the Wild, a gallery and shop at 131 Main Ave. E. It opened at the beginning of November and will stay in business through the holiday season.

There are 18 artists represented in the gallery. Two of them, Tony Znaniecki and Ted Smith, will join Billman for a special show from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday. Znaniecki — also known as Tony Zenan — recently moved from Grand Junction, Colo., to Boise. He and Billman met about five years ago at a wildlife art show in Peoria, Ill., and they hit it off immediately.

One reason he invited Znaniecki to Twin Falls, Billman says, is he's simply "a guy who I like." In addition, he notes, Znaniecki employs lighting techniques in his work such as filtering and rays of light — that Billman says few other wildlife artists use.

Smith and Billman have also known each other for years. Tired of driving long distances to shows, the two were responsible for starting the Idaho Wildlife Art Show six years ago. It is held annually the weekend after Thanksgiving at the Red Lion Inn, Riverside in Boise.

An Idaho resident since 1940 and a former paint store manager, Smith now spends his days transforming wood into carved birds at his studio in Boise. He spends up to 100 hours on each bird he carves. In addition to offering a showcase for

others, Billman says he wanted to open the gallery to give his own work a presence in town.

"I spend so much time out-of-state that a lot of folks don't get a chance to see what I do," he says, noting that through the shop he has been able to touch base with his collectors and meet people who were not yet familiar with his work.

Artists represented at Call of the Wild are from Idaho, Oregon, Washington, California and Minnesota. The shop also includes wood sculpture by Larry Heiner of Twin Falls, a line of "House Mouse" cards and calendars from Connecticut and hand-painted wildlife ornaments from China. With its open space and uncluttered feel,

Call of the Wild offers patrons an opportunity to look at artwork from afar and up close. Billman hangs a magnifying glass by some of his own works so visitors can examine the intricate pointillism he employs. Pointillism, he says, "is a wonderful way of getting a real variety of tones and textures." Due to the amount of time he spends on a single artwork — more than 1,000 hours in one instance — Billman must charge his work at an extraordinary rate. He has sold four originals per year. But Call of the Wild shoppers can also find Billman's work on 75-cent notecards and small, moderately priced prints. Billman moved to Twin Falls from Okla-

lahoma in 1978 and taught sixth grade at Harrison Elementary until 1981, when he started to pursue art full time. Just two years later, he was selected to be among the artists featured in "Savannah and Other Ranges of Imagination: Contemporary Art from Idaho," an exhibit at the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of American Art. When he moved here, says Billman, wildlife gave him a much greater appreciation and respect for life. Realizing that, he adds, helped him respect his talents and devote himself to art. Billman goes to the source for his inspiration. He works from photographs he has

Mud makes magic

Even mud can take on some magic in the hands of a master artist.

Disney, Bluth vie in cartoon wars

The 'toon wars have resumed. The dignified Walt Disney studio, whose founding genius virtually invented the genre with 1937's "Snow White" offers "The Little Mermaid," a lush version of the classic Hans Christian Andersen story.

And the disaffected ex-Disney animator Don Bluth, who fled to found his own studio in Ireland, released through MGM, "All Dogs Go to Heaven," a more contemporary and rambunctious tale of a couple of irreverent New Orleans hounds and how they learn what's really important in life. Does this sound familiar?

Last year, though, in the spring, the two studios went to head and 'toon to 'toon with Disney's "Oliver & Company" and Bluth's "The Land That Time Forgot." The Disney film got generally better reviews and ended the season having made a tad more money, though each

film generated more than \$50 million in revenues.

Can it be that the two studios are on unfriendly terms? "I have no animosity toward Disney," says Bluth, who, 44 years ago, after a stellar career as an animator and an animation director, left the studio to work independently. "Competition is good in a friendly way because it causes everything to grow."

But Disney sees it the other way: They think they're the only guy in town. Roy Edward Disney, Walt's nephew, vice chairman of the Disney board of directors and head of the studio's animation department, has a slightly different explanation.

"No, it's not exactly coincidence that the two films are coming out at the same time. But whatever Don was doing, we would be releasing 'Mermaid' now. This is the time of year when you most want to do it, to take advantage of the Thanksgiving season."

Theories of animation vary between 2 studios

Andreas Deja, an animating director on "The Little Mermaid" and Don Bluth, whose studio is releasing "All Good Dogs Go to Heaven," are competitors in the marketplace, but their comments on the art of animation are remarkably similar.

Each of the animators has a great Disney movie experience in his background. For Deja, it was seeing "The Jungle Book" when he was 10 in his German homeland.

"It was one of those key experiences," he said. "Then I knew exactly what I wanted to do."

For Bluth, of a slightly older generation, it was "Snow White."

and the fluidity of the highest professional level of animation.

But however similar they are in background and outlook, they work under slightly different systems: In the Bluth process, animators work on sequences, and in the Disney one, they work on characters, although Deja concedes that does change on a picture-by-picture basis.

He, for example, drew King Triton, the Little Mermaid's father, throughout "The Little Mermaid." "That way," he says, "we get more consistency. Sometimes with different people drawing the same characters, the subtleties of walking or moving become lost and the general level of continuity is lost."

For Bluth, who has had to train a generation of Irish animators to his exacting standards, it makes more sense to encourage versatility. "We have a formula for each of our characters," he says, "and if we can teach our animators the formula, then they can do anything."

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Book describes Korean War experience

DEAR ABBY: Last year you solicited contributions for the Korean War Veterans Memorial. Your readers responded with a total of more than \$350,000. You are to be congratulated.

Abby, the Korean War has a very special meaning to me because I am a Korean man who fought in that war. I was a young medical student when the United States drafted me. I was small town in North Korea in 1950. I quit medical school to join the Korean army. (We North Korean refugees were forced to fight for South Korea and from front line.)

Miraculously, I was one of only 26 survivors from the refugee forest. When I left my home in North Korea, I promised my mother that I would return in three days. Little did I dream that 23 years would pass before I could return to my homeland. After the war ended, I found myself on the streets of Seoul, broke, with little hope of fulfilling my dream of returning to North Korea and becoming a doctor. Then fate intervened when a former professor, whom I accidentally met on the street, offered me a job and the opportunity to apply to a local medical

school in Seoul! If the old saying "Adversity builds character" holds true, I am a prime example because I not only graduated from medical school magna cum laude, I was offered an internship at Barnes Hospital in St. Louis, Mo. — half a world away in the United States of America!

Today, I am a well-established physician and have authored several textbooks on cardiology, which is my specialty. I have a thriving office practice and am enjoying a splendid home life with my wife and our two sons in Long Beach, Calif. I salute all American servicemen and women who participated in the Korean War, which gave freedom to hundreds of thousands of refugees like myself. They were forgotten — those of us who fought, it will never forget it. Abby, I know that you have very

little time for outside reading, but I am taking the liberty of sending you the book. I wrote titled, "The Three Day Promise." It is the story of my life.

Art museums, galleries will observe AIDS day

NEW YORK (AP) — Hundreds of museums, galleries and other institutions plan to observe "A Day Without Art" today to mourn artists who have died of AIDS and for the art that might have been.

Plans include darkening galleries and removing or covering artwork. Some organizations will mount special exhibitions or hold seminars, memorial services. Others will close for the day.

"Our aims are to honor and recognize friends and colleagues who have died or are dying, and to seek greater support and understanding from an ill-informed and sometimes hostile public," said Thomas W. Sokolowski, director of the Grey Art Gallery and a member of Visual AIDS, a group of art professionals who organized the event to coincide with the World Health Organization's second AIDS Awareness Day.

The group also hopes to use the prestige of art organizations to add weight to calls for more AIDS services and research, said another Visual AIDS member, Philip Yenawine, who also is director of education at the Museum of Modern Art in New York.

"The real tragedy is not that we have lost people who everybody knows," Yenawine said. "For every Rock Hudson, there's been 500 or 5,000 maybe that have died young enough in their lives that their careers have not come to public attention."

More than 600 art institutions take part in the observance, including about 150 in New York.

At the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Pablo Picasso's portrait of Gertrude Stein will be taken down for five days. A sign in its place will explain the painting has been re-

moved "to symbolize the losses the art community is currently experiencing because of AIDS."

The Guggenheim Museum will hang a black banner on its Fifth Avenue facade. The Museum of Modern Art and the Jewish Museum plan memorial services.

Sections of the NAMES Project Quilt, which memorializes people who have died of AIDS, will be on display at The New York Historical Society, the Cooper-Hewitt Museum, the American Craft Museum and the Museum of American Folk Art.

Elsewhere: About 50 art museums and galleries in New England will observe the day. In the courtyard of Harvard University's Fogg Art Museum, empty chairs will be set to represent Boston-area artists affected by AIDS. Panels of the NAMES Project Quilt will be hung at Boston's Museum of Fine Arts.

A coffin will be placed in the center of the gallery at the University of Florida at Gainesville.

The Dallas Museum of Art will install a digital counter enumerating the worldwide AIDS toll and erect black walls with the names of artists who have died of AIDS at the entrances.

The Louisiana State Museum will place mourning wreaths on the historic houses it administers around New Orleans.

The J. Paul Getty museum in Malibu, Calif., will dim the lights in its photography galleries.

The Los Angeles County Museum of Art and the city's Museum of Contemporary Art will waive their admission fees and suggest the museum be donated to the AIDS Project — Los Angeles.

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Twin Falls author publishes book on little-known area history

TWIN FALLS — Local author James Varley has taken what he calls "an obscure piece of Utah history" that has somehow gotten dropped through the cracks and written a scholarly history of the Civil War era — Brigham and the Brigadier.

The Brigham of the book is, of course, Brigham Young, early Mormon prophet and president. The brigadier is Brigadier General Patrick Edward Connor, who marched his regiment to Utah to protect the Overland Trail and to telegraph during the Civil War from three times. "Successionists, Indians and Mormons, who were very much thought to be disloyal to the Union," says Varley.

Varley spent four years researching and writing his book. From 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday, he will be at Judi's Bookstore in downtown Twin Falls to autograph books and visit with patrons.

Varley says he has tried to make the book fair. "I think it's balanced and I tried to keep it that way so everybody would buy it and nobody would feel as though I had distorted history. All my sources are pretty impeccable."

Although born and baptized a Mormon, Varley says he has since turned to another religion. Varley is

a retired military man and became interested in Connor while doing some historical reading. He says he pored over files and books at the Utah Historical Society and the LDS Church Archives, as well as in California libraries to get his information.

"Brigham and the Brigadier" tells how Connor marches his regiment across California and Nevada and establishes first Fort Ruby south of Twin Falls, then the soldiers march on to Salt Lake City and establish Fort Douglas on the slope of a hill where Connor positions artillery which "would command the Mormon Capitol," Varley says with a laugh.

What ensued over the next three years was a lot of show and posturing by Connor as well as Brigham Young, with Young making various

attempts to have the military ousted and Connor overreacting to the attempts, says Varley.

Connor's influence in Idaho history is also told in "Brigham and the Brigadier." In January of 1863, Connor marched his men through "some intense cold to Bear River, north of Preston, and surrounded an Indian camp where the regiment slaughtered anywhere between 224 to upward of 300, including a fair number of women and children," says Varley. That area is presently being con-

sidered by some as worthy of national monument status.

Connor and his men were responsible for establishing the Soda Springs area and starting mining there as well as at Goose Creek Mountain south of Burley. In Utah they began the first mining in Cottonwood Canyon and Brigham Canyon.

According to Varley, Connor hoped the mining discoveries would draw a large non-Mormon population to the territory and "thus over-

come" or overthrow Brigham's influence.

Varley is presently at work on another "obscure history" which he uncovered while writing "Brigham and the Brigadier." It tells the story of Joaquin Murrieta, a Mexican bandit in the gold rush era.

Varley was raised in Pocatello and attended the University of Idaho. He and his wife Peggy have lived in Twin Falls for 13 years. Varley has been active in the Dilettantes and the Magic Valley Symphony.

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

'All Dogs Go to Heaven' stays too safe, lacks imagination

HOLLYWOOD — I've always loved the idea of feature-length animated movies more than I've loved the movies themselves. Although there are many notable exceptions, animation seems to work best in the short-form; few feature-length animated movies have the sustained snap and invention of, say, the best Disney and Warner shorts.

This is to some degree a matter of economics. The cost of producing an animated feature is so prohibitive, and the labor so painstaking, that most film makers opt for the com-

mercially safe "family entertainment" mode. Irreverence is generally the first casualty of the long form. "All Dogs Go to Heaven," the latest animated feature from Don Bluth ("The Land Before Time," "An American Tail"), is in the comfy, fun-for-the-entire-family category. Except, as is so often the case with such movies, it's not really a whole lot of fun for anyone. The animation is so carefully drawn that the story is a garbled pastiche of "Oliver Twist" and "Little Miss Marker"; the songs, including four by Charles ("Annie,"

Strouse, are eminently unhumable. Adults probably won't find the story transporting enough to stifle yawns; children won't pop their eyes at the animation.

Even on a product tie-in level, the film falls short. Charlie, the junkyard dog at the film's center, is rather many and unconvincingly. Do the Wendy's executives who sprang the marketing tie-ins with this movie really believe that rubber figurines of a flea-specked mutt will sell burgers? The most memorable thing about Charlie is that he is voiced by

on-screen — sort of — since "The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas" and before that, "A Long Long Love." Some milestones are milestones. Charlie and his dachshund chum Icky (Dom DeLuise) break out of prison at the start of the film and make their way back to the Louisiana nightklub Charlie co-owns with the bulldog Carface (Vic Tayback).

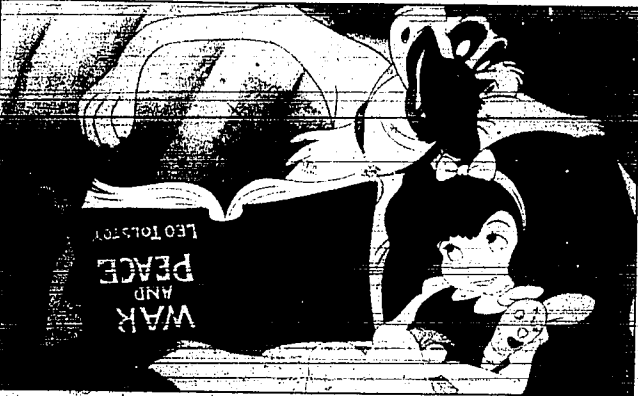
When Charlie is rubbed out by Carface, he zooms off to heaven, where he prouettes with a cloud-borne greyhound angel (Melba Moore) before sneaking back to Earth for some pay back. There, he snatches from Carface's clutches an orphan girl; Anne Marie (Judith Barsi), who has the ability to talk to animals — which comes in handy when betting on rat races and kangaroo boxing matches.

With Anne Marie in tow, Charlie and Icky put their new-found booty into their own nightclub, Charlie's Place. But then innocence rears its ugly head. Anne Marie wants Charlie to find her parents. And she disapproves of gambling.

Considering how integral Anne Marie has been to Charlie's betting success, her sudden disapproval has

When animation falls short, as it does here, we feel the lack more severely than we do in a live-action film, since the expressive possibilities of animation seem limitless. Virtually anything can be made to happen.

A great animated film delineates the enchantments and poetic leaps of imagination that are central to a child's fantasy life — and an adult's fantasy life. That's why, when we're in the process of reevaluation, we feel as if our childhoods have overwhelmed us. Suddenly everything is possible. In "All Dogs Go to Heaven," the possible is the mundane.

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French collector puts his Art Deco works up for sale

PARIS (AP) — More than 400 Art Deco furnishings and objects from one of the world's largest private collections go to the auction block soon in what experts are calling the sale of the season.

The collection, estimated at about \$10 million includes a pair of gilded bronze fire dogs sculpted by Gustav Miklos, 14 lacquer panels by Jean Dunand and 66 pieces of furniture crafted by master cabinetmaker Emile-Jacques Ruhlmann.

"There is no collection like this in private hands anywhere in the world," said auctioneer Jacques Tajan, who is to hold the gavel on Dec. 13 at the Hotel Georges V.

The collection was assembled over 25 years by Alain Lesieutre, a 59-year-old former dealer who admits he'd rather buy than sell.

Lesieutre said putting up his treasures — among the world's rarest and most beautiful objects from the 1930s — is not easy.

"Yes, it's a heartbreak to see my house emptied of all these things," he said in an interview at his Left Bank apartment, which looks more like a museum than a private home. "But it's a chance for me to pursue my other passions, which are collecting paintings from 1890 to 1950."

Lesieutre was among the first French collectors to appreciate Art Deco. In his "The Spirit and Splendor of Art Deco," published by Paddington Press Ltd., he described the style as "the last attempt made in Europe to create a full-blooded, perfectly coherent decorative style, with its own completeness, its own internal logic and its own dream."

"I love the quality of the materials and the purity of the lines," he said. "At its best, the furniture has the clean, simple grace of the Louis XVI style, without the fussiness."

The collection includes a one-of-a-kind coffee table and a roll-top desk in Mahogany ebony-banded with ivory inlay, both by Ruhlmann.

Art Deco aficionados will love the gold jewelry by surrealist artist Max Ernst, glassware by Galle

Art Deco reached its culmination in the 1925 Exposition des Arts Decoratifs, scheduled originally to take place in 1914 and called off because of World War I. The show also gave the style its name.

John Tesh doubles as composer

LOS ANGELES (AP) — John Tesh is best known as co-host of "Entertainment Tonight," but he's no "Johnny One-Note."

Tesh is an Emmy-winning composer who recently scored his first movie, "Limit Up," with Dean Stockwell. His album, "Garden City," named after his hometown in New York, is also just out.

"In the past I've composed mostly for television sports shows," he said. "Scoring a movie is very different from doing an album. You do an album for yourself. You decide what it should sound like, how long the pieces will be."

"With film you work for the director. He tells you what he wants. But it's a tradeoff because you get to work with pictures. It forces you to work in ways you hadn't thought about."

Tesh spends most of his time as co-host with Mary Hart of the daily syndicated "Entertainment Tonight." However, he's been an avid musician all his life and wrote five years as a CBS Sports reporter he composed the music for the shows he worked on.

In 1987 he won an Emmy for best original score for the Tour de France bicycle race. He also did the on-the-scene commentary.

"When I went to CBS Sports I was hired as both an announcer and composer. I did a lot of their sports themes. When I went to France for the bicycle race I took all my instruments and whacked away. I reported

on the race, wrote all the copy, wrote all the music, played it and did the mix for the recording."

"That sums up what I do well. I allow me to use all my talents. I'm a reasonably good writer and a reasonably good performer. When I won the Emmy it surprised me. I'd never known that I was just the co-host of 'Entertainment Tonight.' People took a second look. I got an agent and the assignment for 'Limit Up.'"

Tesh grew up on Long Island, where he studied music with teachers from Juilliard and was twice named to the New York State Symphonic Band. He majored in music and communications at North Carolina State University.

"I grew up influenced by the Beatles and the Stones. In elementary school, for music I picked drums. My second choice was guitar, which they didn't offer, and my third was trumpet, which is what I got. I had already been studying piano."

"When I joined a rock band nobody was playing keyboard then, so I got my dad to loan me money for a

Magnus chord organ. On our gigs I'd stick a microphone next to it to amplify the sound. It worked on air instead of electronics so it didn't sound instantly. I had to play ahead of the rest of the band."

In college, Tesh began announcing at school dances, then became a disc jockey on the school radio station. His first job after college was as a producer and reporter on a television station in Raleigh, N.C. He soon became anchorman at \$125 a week. Next, he went to Orlando, Fla.

"I only stayed there five months. I considered myself a serious journalist and I left after the general manager wanted me to cover his wife's garden party. I went to Nashville as anchorman. My weather reporter was Pat Sajak and my co-anchor was Dan Miller, who's also on 'The Pat Sajak Show.' Oprah Winfrey was on the TV station across the street."

"I kept doing music on the side. I always wanted to be a successful musician. I nearly went to a station in Milwaukee but I'd also sent an audition tape to CBS and I was hired for their New York station. From there I went to CBS Sports."

He was working on an event in London in 1986 when he got a call from Paramount Television asking him to come to "Entertainment Tonight."

Disney moves to music mainstream

BURBANK, Calif. — In a widely expected move, Walt Disney Co. announced that it will wade into "the mainstream" of the recorded music business by starting a new label to be run by Peter T. Paterno, an industry lawyer who has represented heavy-metal acts.

Disney, which already owns the largest children's music company in the world, recently told Wall Street analysts that it would enter the industry's "mainstream," and Paterno said last month that discussions about his hiring were under way.

In a prepared release, Disney Chairman Michael D. Eisner said the Burbank-based company elected Paterno from scratch because a wave of mergers "has driven the cost of entertainment stocks. I don't doubt their abilities to do much of our

feasibility." The name tentatively selected for the new unit is Hollywood Records, the company said.

Some industry executives have questioned whether image-conscious Disney has the stomach for hard-rock albums, which have drawn fire from pulpits and Capitol Hill, but Disney has apparently given its answer with the hiring of Paterno, whose clients include Metallica and Guns N' Roses, which became a phenomenon several years ago with its "Appetite for Destruction" album.

A start-up operation is "difficult, but they've always been in the record business," said Gordon Crawford, a senior vice president of Capital Research Co. who specializes in entertainment stocks. "I don't doubt their abilities to do much of our

thing." Crawford continued, praising the Eisner-led management. "Since taking over the company, they've done everything right."

Eisner said he expected the launch to cost less than one motion picture movie, which averages about \$18 million these days, but the costs could be even lower. Warner recently reached an agreement to spend \$50 million to \$60 million over a five-year period to launch a new record operation with former MCA Records chief Irving Azoff, an industry source said.

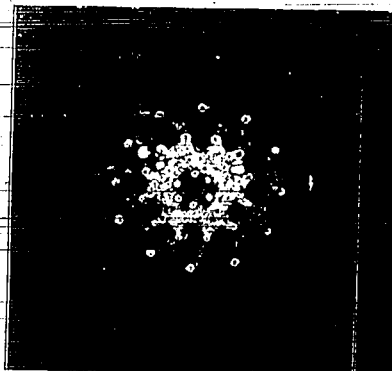

'The Shell Seekers' sets Lansbury in voyage of discovery and renewal

It's nice to see that Hallmark still cares enough to sponsor the very best.

"The Shell Seekers," the 162nd presentation of the "Hallmark Hall of Fame," airs Sunday, Dec. 3, on ABC. It's a powerful story of the interior odyssey of Englishwoman Penelope Keeling, whose near-fatal heart attack leads her to re-evaluate her troubled relationships with her children and to search for an indefinable something she has lost in the course of her life. Angela Lansbury gives a bravura performance as Penelope, a woman who has lived-to-give-all she could to her children, only to find them in the end miserable and resentful, and herself bewildered.

"I think it's a universal truth that parents and children often grow up not really understanding each other."

Lansbury says that all children should grow up like us, and when they tend to veer away and pursue their own lives and their own interests, part of us is sort of taken aback that they haven't chosen to tread in our footsteps. In the case of "The Shell Seekers," the children felt

that the mother had sort of ignored them and gotten on with her own life. She hadn't. She'd been terribly conscious of them. And of course the story is about her trying to bring everyone together before her own life comes to an end, and to see them happy. Because she believes the choices they have made have not brought them happiness.

Heart sick that she has not been able to convey the joy of life to her children that was her own mother's legacy to her, Penelope embarks on a voyage of self-discovery that leads her to Cornwall, where she spent a happy youth, looking for a hidden clue in the past that might help make sense of the present. For company, she takes along young Antonia (Sophie Ward), a young friend who is living with Penelope after a family tragedy, and Danus (Mark Lewis Jones). Penelope's gardener with whom Antonia has fallen in love.

While in Cornwall, Penelope meets by chance Richard (Sam Wanamaker), her old flame from the days of World War II, in whom she confides her troubles and her quest. Their dialogue has a dream-like quality - fittingly, because their love was destined to end in reverie and remembrance.

After her meeting with Richard, and watching (and nurturing) the deepening love between Antonia and Danus, Penelope knows what she must do. She finds what she has been missing. And she returns home to face her children in a meeting that none of them will ever forget.

This tale of dreams, regret and renewal is ideally suited to the small screen, and Lansbury wonders why there aren't more like it on television. "Time and time again," she muses, "I've been absolutely amazed how a simple, loving, emotional story will grab an audience better than anything - better than violence, better than shoot-'em-ups, better than comedy, in many instances. (The audience) wants to feel that people are depicting a character with real human emotions, real human values. It's about the human condition, about the story."

It is indeed.

three more books, acting now and again and having my children come and visit. I'm also looking forward to having a lot of freedom."

Q: With all those '60s rock groups going back on the road, what about The Beatles? There has certainly been talk. — S.L.

A: And there's been even more talk. This summer Paul McCartney discussed the possibility. However there's a clinker: Lawyers at the firm that handles Apple, the Beatle's recording company, are not sure Paul, George Harrison and Ringo Starr could tour as The Beatles. That name is owned jointly by McCartney, Ringo Starr, George Harrison and the estate of John Lennon. The executor of Lennon's estate is Yoko Ono, who hasn't always been too friendly toward her late husband's associates.

Q: What's this about one of Johnny Carson's wives being in such desperate shape that she's camped out among the homeless in a Los Angeles park? — B.L.

A: Joanne Carson, Johnny's second wife, confesses that as a teenager she found herself at odds with the world — "due to circumstances beyond my control" — and camped out, homeless, in Plummer Park in West Hollywood. Joanne tells me her life was turned around by a kind woman who took her in, got her a job and then convinced her to return to school. Joanne recently returned the favor, in a way, by spending a night in the same park to dramatize the plight of the homeless. As Carson's ex-wife, Joanne is amply provided for financially for the rest of her life.

Q: Has Farrah Fawcett broken up with Ryan O'Neal, her longtime boyfriend, because they argued all the time during the shooting of a movie they recently made together? — G.S.

A: Farrah and Ryan have been living together for the last 11 years. The arrangement has had its ups and downs, the biggest "up" being the birth of the couple's young son. Another admittedly less lofty up has been the fact that Ryan and Farrah actually work well together professionally. They really surprised themselves with "Small Sacrifices," the TV movie that they both co-starred

Q: Wasn't Jack Nicholson going to make another "Easy Rider"? That picture certainly did wonders for his career, but maybe he's too big a star right now. — S.L.

A: You may be right. I hear Peter Fonda has been trying to get together with Nicholson but so far nothing has happened. In Jack's defense, everybody is after him with projects these days.

Q: Which is the largest resort hotel in the world? — N.A.

A: For decades it's been the Concord Hotel at Kiamesha Lake, N.Y., in the Catskill Mountains, with 1,250 rooms and 175,000 square feet of meeting and exhibition space — and it's soon to be joined by three more giants: Donald Trump's Taj Mahal in Atlantic City, Hawaii's Hyatt Regency and, largest of all, will be Steve Wynn's Riviera in Las Vegas which, when completed in 1991, will have 5,000 guest rooms and a 120,000-square-foot casino!

Soap opera scene

Lehmann's fingers led to acting gig

Next week on "General Hospital" there is concert pianist Kate Delafield falling off a roof with Robert while chasing Olivia. Dangling on a hospital ledge, Robert proposes to the lady.

Only in the afternoon would a gifted musician be treated in such cavalier fashion. But "Hospital" writers refuse to see Edie Lehmann's Kate as a fragile, sensitive character to be protected at all costs.

Just a year ago, concert pianist Edie Lehmann, a very hot commercial jingle singer in Hollywood, agreed to play the hands of Katherine Delafield on the show during a concert scene. But Edie, a tall, blond beauty and a former California Junior Miss, convinced Tristan Rogers (Robert) that she belonged in front of a camera. Boss Wes Kenney agreed after a screen test, and soon Edie replaced the original Kate.

Edie was awful at first since she had never acted in her life, but with coaching from Tristan and Kenney, the pianist now works all the time on the show.

"Acting is not acting," says Edie. "The idea is to tell the truth. Be honest. When I start posing I know it's all wrong."

By this time soap fans know Edie's enthusiasm as Kate who seems about to land love Robert unless Tangeneva's prediction of doom comes true. However, those same fans fail to spot Edie's voice in current Ford, Pontiac and Chevy car commercials.

You see, Edie is moonlighting on the soap. After "GH" shuts down for the day, Edie dashes to a recording studio for commercials. She's part of a small group of singers who come in cold and can do rock, country, blues, jazz — any style the sponsors order — right on cue.

In the very lucrative jingle business the only time wasters are indecisive sponsors who don't know what they want. The talents can't afford to waste a second, and Edie, a fast learner, switches styles without blinking.

She also has perfect pitch and can tell others when the timing or sound goes awry. When the sound is off-

key on purpose, Edie adapts, but inside she rebels. Fifteen years ago, Lehmann put aside the concert world for the buck-making jingle business and won't give it up, not with those juicy residuals rolling in.

The pianist makes a bundle with commercials, more than she does on "General Hospital," and if push comes to shove, the soap world loses out.

"I'm learning my trade as an actress. I can be fired any minute," says Edie. "But I have my first career to fall back on. The jingle business is like the soaps. You work fast, energize quickly and give total concentration. No time for practice, mulling-over or fooling around. I like that. I want to know everything. And now I'm watching people and watching myself. I'm anxious to get

beyond self preoccupation."

When told editors cut portions where Kate throws back her head and laughs because it's not flattering, Edie protests: "What's wrong with that? It shouldn't always be lovely. I want them to see the character, warts and all."

Listen to Kate closely in the afternoon, and then see if you can spot her voice in prime-time commercials. Those spots are everywhere, but odds-against-picking-out Edie Lehmann's voice are about 100 to 1.

Christy Brown, the Irish painter/writer, Daniel's dedication to his craft is such that, to insure complete authenticity, he spent the entire seven weeks of shooting in a wheelchair just like Brown. He also mastered the technical difficulties of the role to such an extent that he was actually able to write and paint with his left foot as Christy did. Day-Lewis became so accomplished at painting this way that in the art exhibition featured in the film there's a mix of original paintings by Brown and a number of works by Day-Lewis done with his skilled left foot.

Q: As a musician and jazz buff, I like Lionel Hampton's new autobiography "Ham." But I wonder why there are no mentions of the rampant discord that existed within the legendary Benny Goodman quartet, which was composed of Goodman, Hampton, pianist Teddy Wilson and Gene Krupa on drums. Why did

Hampton so completely let Goodman off the hook, when their internal differences were well-known to any jazz musician of that era? — G.A.

A: Because Lionel is a gentleman and didn't want to take up past feuds. Tenth is Benny Goodman, an intense perfectionist, often fought with members of his quartet. Actually, the only one he acknowledged as his peer was Hampton. Goodman treated Krupa and Wilson condescendingly as merely sidemen. This mutual antagonism became so great that Goodman didn't attend Krupa's funeral.

Q: They say Gary Bussey has lost an enormous amount of weight. Does that mean he's still having problems after that terrible motorcycle accident? — D.J.

A: No. Blame it on last summer's 130-degree heat in Oklahoma where he was shooting his new movie

"Home Grown," an action drama. Bussey says he's lost 30 pounds there and he's trying to shed another 20 because he wants to look lean and mean on his new Harley.

Q: What's George Burns really like? He comes across to me as lovable, but maybe with an edge the public doesn't get to see. Am I right? — E.M.

A: Burns can frequently be outspoken and impatient when dealing with professional people — and, at age 93, why not? Recently Burns was on the West Coast, recording a telephone patch plugging his new autobiography to be used later as a radio commercial. The director on the phone in New York discovered how impatient George can be. When Burns was advised to keep his patter within a certain time frame, George remarked, "I talk the way I talk and I can't confine it. Why don't you cut your part short?"

Thanksgiving 'Tune out' helps ABC's 'Roseanne' claim top spot for week

LOS ANGELES — ABC can thank the Thanksgiving holiday for putting "Roseanne" back in first place in the Nielsen television ratings for the week ended Nov. 26.

"Roseanne" was first and "The Wonder Years" was second as NBC's strongest night, Thursday, suffered from holiday tune-out. "Coach," which made its debut behind "Roseanne" in place of "Chicken Soup," tied for eighth place.

No NBC Thursday show made the Top 10. "Cheers" was 13th and a rerun of "The Cosby Show," first in recent weeks, was 14th. "I. A. Law" tied for 17th, "A Different World" tied for 25th.

Although NBC had only two shows in the Top 10, "Empty Nest" and "The Golden Girls," it still won the week. Viewership for the entire week was down by about 2 million households.

NBC was first in the A.C. Nielsen Co. survey with an average of 13.8. The previous week NBC had an average of 16.0. ABC was second with 12.9 and CBS was third with 12.3. The ratings represents the percentage of the nation's 92.1 million television households tuned to a show.

BBC discusses working with American networks

NEW YORK (AP) — While Britain's House of Commons was opening its doors to global TV last Tuesday, a top BBC official said the BBC is talking with U.S. networks about co-producing shows for domestic and foreign markets.

Long-term deals could help control costs, said Michael Checkland, director general of the British Broadcasting Corp., and "together we could sell to the expanding European market."

Referring to recent loosening of restrictions in Eastern Europe, he also asserted that "the opening of the Eastern bloc presents new opportunities for us both."

The non-commercial BBC primarily is supported by yearly fees of about \$100 per household. With changes coming in British broadcasting, including more commercial channels, the BBC is seeking new sources of income.

It already has deals with U.S. cable networks and PBS that account for half its co-production business. Checkland said in a luncheon speech here to the International Radio & Television Society.

"We are talking to the networks to see if we can do business with them,

too," he added. "I very much hope we can ... long-term deals between us are certainly in both our interests."

Meeting later with reporters, Checkland said the BBC had a few co-productions on individual programs with U.S. networks about 20 years ago but nothing since.

Now, he said, BBC and CBS officials have been discussing long-term co-production possibilities in recent weeks, and "we're just generally talking" about that with ABC and NBC.

Although he described the CBS talks as "positive," he declined to be specific. "I think we're making progress, but haven't got to the very point where we have to make an announcement," he said.

In his speech, Checkland also said the BBC plans to start developing a World Television News Service similar in editorial philosophy to its World Service that radio listeners have heard for years.

He later told reporters that the new service wouldn't start before the end of 1990, and wouldn't be a 24-hour service "at this stage." Instead, he said, it probably would start with three half-hour programs a day.
