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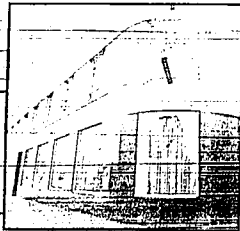

Bush orders defense spending of \$292 billion

WASHINGTON -- President Bush, handing his budget director a victory over his defense secretary, has set a military spending limit of about \$292 billion for fiscal 1991.

That decision that is expected to force deeper personnel cuts than the Pentagon had planned for the coming year, according to defense department officials.

Bush's decision cuts the military's spending ceiling for 1991 by about 2 percent below current inflation-adjusted levels, and signals that overall defense spending through 1994 will be sharply lower than he

projected in the early days of his administration.

After weeks of intense jockeying between Office of Management and Budget Director Richard G. Darman and Defense Secretary Richard B. Cheney, Bush has made clear he is siding with Darman's deficit-reduction efforts instead of maintaining the defense buildup of the Reagan era.

Bush's decision will intensify the search for weapons programs to eliminate or cut. Among the most expensive and

controversial systems immediately affected is the Air Force's B-2 Stealth bomber, projected to cost at least \$70 billion for 132 aircraft.

In the overall defense spending contest, Cheney had been pushing for \$297 billion in spending, while Darman argued for a \$290 maximum. Bush's decision came after a Tuesday meeting with Cheney and Darman. Cheney has been brazening the Pentagon's military leaders for stiff budget cuts over the next several years, but defense officials said Bush's decision to limit 1991 fiscal year spending to slightly more than \$292 billion likely will result in larger manpower cuts than planned for next year.

Cheney, who received the final budget figure from Bush Wednesday, met with his top advisors Thursday to grapple with the budget issues, according to defense department spokesman Peter Williams.

Bush's spending of about \$292 billion is \$5 billion more than the spending limits set by Congress for the 1990 fiscal year, but represents a decrease in Pentagon buying power of about 2 percent because it does not keep pace with inflation.

But only half of the budget equation has been resolved. While Bush set the spending limits for 1991, he has yet to make a decision on the Pentagon's budget authority the amount of money the military is

allowed to commit for purchases and services for the year. The outlay figure, however, is considered more critical to the deficit debate because it involves money that will actually be spent during the year.

Cheney, who has said he will not submit an "unrealistic budget" with spending requests far higher than those he expects Congress to recommend, says weapons and manpower cuts for the next several years.

The defense department is preparing budgets through 1994 that project a decline after inflation "close to 2 percent."

Endowment fund high on schools' wish list for 1990

Educators covet Lottery, surplus funds

TWIN FALLS -- Distributing Lottery funds equally and investing surplus tax money in an education endowment fund topped a wish list that school officials presented to legislators Thursday night.

School officials from around the Magic Valley also asked for teacher negotiation reforms, and one local lawmaker argued for greater accountability over student activity money.

Kent Fletcher of Cassia County's school board backed a proposal to change how Lottery funds will be distributed to school districts.

Under the proposal, sponsored by Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo, the annual distribution would follow the state's usual funding formula, instead being decided by the State Board of Education.

Steve Tolman, a Twin Falls School Board

member, pointed-out-that-about \$5 million of the Lottery's profit will go to education this year enough to build only 18 elementary schools.

Tolman also described a plan to put half of the expected \$100 million in surplus state tax money into an endowment fund. School districts could collect the interest each year, he explained.

But legislators told the group that endowments don't go over well in the Legislature.

"That's just the way the game's played," Rep. Gary Robbins, R-Dietrich, said. Legislators told the group to prepare an alternative. They suggested a "rainy day" account might be more successful.

Teacher association demands have become more militant and teacher negotiations aren't serving students' best interests, Minidoka school board member Russ Holland said.

He asked lawmakers to keep budgeting money for specific uses, because earmarked money can be kept off the bargaining table. The Legislature also should be more specific in what can be negotiated each year and should set bargaining deadlines, he said.

Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, brought up a topic not on the agenda. A Senate subcommittee has proposed tighter controls on student fees, yearbook checks, gate receipts for school events and other student activity funds.

Noh noted that in Idaho, extracurricular activity totals about \$46 million. The proposal would set rules on how money is recorded and who can write checks for incidental expenses. And it would require monthly reports to school boards.

Earlier in the day, business people at a Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce forum told lawmakers that the state Tax Board has run amok.

Lithuanians want competing parties

MOSCOW -- Lawmakers in the Soviet Baltic republic of Lithuania, rebelling further against Kremlin rule, voted Thursday to abolish the constitutional provision guaranteeing the Communist Party the leading political role there and authorized the formation of competing parties.

The legislative action echoes recent moves in Eastern Europe to strip Communist parties of an automatic right to rule, and it clears the way for re-establishment of a "multi-party" political system in Lithuania, which was absorbed into the Soviet Union in 1940 after two decades of independence.

The move will also greatly increase pressure on the Kremlin to include multiparty democracy in President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's power-sharing reforms, which many radicals feel must be taken much further if they are to succeed in reshaping the country.

But Lithuania's action is certain to provoke an angry protest by the

central leadership, which is strongly opposed to any change in the party's constitutional status as "leading and guiding force of Soviet society," as the Soviet Union's federal constitution puts it.

Central authorities may consequently declare it unconstitutional, as they have done with a number of other steps taken by Lithuania, the neighboring Baltic republics of Estonia and Latvia and the southern republics of Armenia, Azerbaijan and Georgia to proclaim their political autonomy.

Lithuania had been warned last week by Vadim A. Medvedev, a member of the party's ruling Politburo, against any further "stepping up of attempts to weaken or even to break the republic's ties with the center" for such separatism could lead to "tragic consequences." Nevertheless, amendments approved in the republic's Supreme Soviet, or parliament, in a dramatic reflection of the rising nationalism, which many Soviet observers fear

Workday starts an hour earlier in 1990 planners

BOSTON -- Just when you thought you were leaving the workaholic 1980s behind, comes a chilling sign that rampant careerism may be here to stay.

The decade in which power breakfasts nudged aside three-month luncheons may have left an indelible mark on our culture. Come January, faithful users of the Week-At-A-Glance appointment calendars will find that daily starting times in one of the most popular versions have been changed from 8 a.m. to 7 a.m. The end of the day is an hour earlier -- at 7:30 p.m.

"We're not a 9 to 5 society anymore," said Mike Kinnick, marketing director for Keith Clark, the Sidney, N.Y.-based company that makes the calendars.

Customers complained their day started before the 8 a.m. time listed in the planner, he said. "We heard from customers and

we decided to make the change. I think as our society gets more intense, people are just starting to work more and go to work earlier," Kinnick said.

But at least one customer was dismayed. Barbara Zuck Locker, 37, who has used the Week-At-A-Glance for seven years, was disturbed when she noticed the shift in times in the 1990 calendars that she wrote a letter to The New York Times that appeared this week.

"Alas, 1989 days began at 8. Now, my book-calendar informs me, I can go home at 8:45. That's OK. But do I really want to begin my mornings in the 1990s at 7 a.m.?" she said.

Locker fits the stereotype of the '80s woman. She is a psychologist in private practice in Manhattan as well as a corporate psychological consultant and director of employee assistance programs at Citicorp.

Women 'spoiled' life of Montreal gunman

MONTREAL -- The gunman who ranged through the University of Montreal's engineering school and killed 14 women carried a suicide letter complaining that women had spoiled his life and he was seeking revenge, police said Thursday.

The young killer, identified Thursday night as Marc Lapin, also wounded nine women and four men before killing himself Wednesday in the worst mass murder in Canadian history.

As he roamed through the modern, six-story engineering building firing a rifle, Lapin ranted, "I want the women" and "You're all a bunch of feminists! I hate feminists!" witnesses told police. One of the wounded sustained a critical but stable condition Thursday. The rest were out of danger.

Little was known of the killer's background, but the Canadian Broadcasting Corp. said police confirmed his identity through his mother and quoted detective Sgt. Robert Fuller as giving the man's name as Marc Lapin.

In his letter, Lapin said he was committing a "political act" in killing the women because "feminists had always ruined my life," police reported.

Senior police investigator Jacques Ducheneau told a news conference Lapin used a .223-caliber Sturm Ruger semi-automatic assault rifle.

Lapin also carried a hunting knife and sheath, two boxes of bullets and a 30-bullet clip.

He was described as being about 5-foot-9 inches, weighing about 160 pounds, with brown hair and blue eyes.

Ducheneau said the rifle "is the type of weapon you can buy for hunting reasons" in Canada with proper certification.

Andre Tessier, director of operations of the Montreal police, told reporters Lapin had obtained a permit for the rifle. "Canada's gun-control laws are generally stricter than those in the United States," Ducheneau said "It was quite clear" that a three-page handwritten letter signed "Marc" and found on Lapin's body was a suicide note. He said it specified Dec. 6 as the date for Lapin's

death. He said it contained the names of 15 women that were believed taken from a newspaper, but declined to elaborate except to say not all were public figures.

Ducheneau told reporters the letter said Lapin was seeking revenge on women. "He mentioned in the letter that he did that because of political reasons. He said feminists kind of spoiled his life and he hasn't been happy in life for the last seven years," the officer said.

"I think he blamed women in general, saying that if his life was ruined it was mainly because of women," Ducheneau told reporters.

The letter also mentioned former army Cpl. Denis Lortie, who was sentenced to life imprisonment after killing three people and wounding 13 in 1984 with submachine-gun fire in the Quebec legislature.

Copies of the letter were sent to a psychiatrist and a graphologist for analysis. Ducheneau said Lapin identified himself as a student but did not specify a school.

New vaccine initial step to beating AIDS

WASHINGTON -- Researchers have developed a vaccine that prevents monkeys from getting AIDS, an achievement scientists have hailed as the first truly promising step toward creating a human AIDS vaccine.

Until recently, pessimism has dominated the field, and many of the world's most prominent AIDS researchers doubted that finding a vaccine to prevent AIDS was possible. Despite their current excitement, experts still stress that they are years away from proving an effective human vaccine.

But the new work provides the

first compelling evidence that a vaccine can protect animals from infection with a close genetic relative of the virus that causes AIDS in humans. More than a dozen efforts had failed.

"This is a giant leap forward for AIDS vaccine research," said Anthony S. Fauci, director of AIDS research for the National Institutes of Health (NIH), which funded the work. "We now have unambiguous proof that an animal can be protected from a challenge with the virus."

Michael Murphy-Corb and her colleagues at Tulane University had made their vaccine from an inactivated form of the simian immunodeficiency virus (SIV).

Anti-Aquino coup continues in Cebu; civilians return to Makati

MANILA, Philippines — Civilians took over Manila's main financial district Thursday afternoon, hours after 418 rebel soldiers surrendered and ended their five-day occupation of hotels and other high-rise buildings.
 But the sixth and bloodiest coup attempt against the government of President Corason Aquino was still on in Cebu, the central Philippines city 350 miles south of Manila.
 Mrs. Aquino, who has called on

citizens to join her in a rally in the Makati financial district this afternoon, swore in a commission Thursday to investigate the coup attempt.
 Mrs. Aquino declared a nationwide state of emergency Wednesday and asked Congress for powers to take control of key utilities and other businesses that could be struck down, bankrupt or so corrupt they cannot perform their services.
 Thursday, Manila regional government officials announced

plans to begin this weekend to arrest anyone who violates price controls that were slapped onto essential commodities like rice and kerosene this week.
 Negotiations broke down late Thursday in the attempt to end the Cebu stand-off at Mactan Airbase, where the commanding general has threatened to blow up all 16 military aircraft on the ground there.
 Brig. Gen. Jose Comendador, the base commander, with some 400 men under him, said that he intended to "stand pat" and continue to

demand the resignation of Mrs. Aquino.
 "The events in Makati are just a tactical retreat," he told one television station.
 Brig. Gen. Renato V. Palma, who has been assigned to negotiate with Comendador, said that he plans to "exhaust all peaceful means to solve this crisis" but is prepared in the end to "use any course of action" that will regain the airbase.
 Television reporters have said that a single rebel "armored personnel carrier has stood for four days,

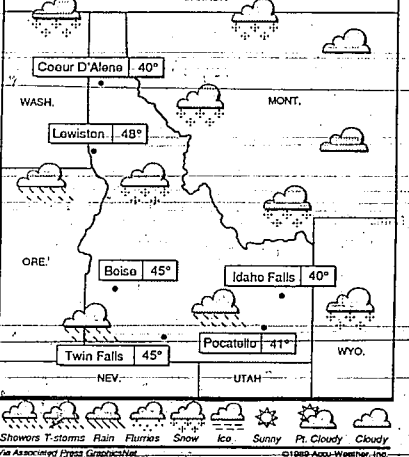
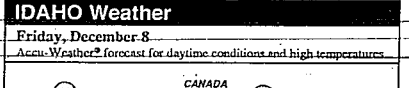
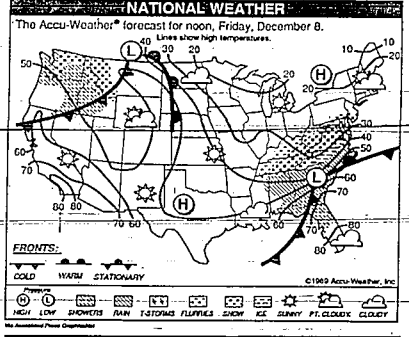
facing four government armored cars at the bridge between Mactan Island and Cebu.
 Some 20,000 residents have been evacuated from Mactan Island in case of hostilities. Most are staying at schools on the other side of the strait.
 In addition to the military planes that Comendador has threatened to blow up, 12 Philippine Airline craft, including two Boeing 747's, have been stranded at Cebu since the coup began last Friday.
 The government resumed domestic flights Thursday on an almost-normal schedule, the exception being service to and from Cebu, which is served by Mactan.

that cashiered Lt. Col. Gregorio "Gringo" Honasan, leader of the fifth coup attempt against the Aquino government in August 1987, also was the leader of this month's coup.
 But he and other officers say they have no idea of Honasan's whereabouts.
 Florendo said about 3,000 service members took part in the sixth coup attempt, making it the biggest since Mrs. Aquino became president in 1986. The biggest previous number of military participants had been the fifth, in August 1987, in which about 2,500 participated.
 He said that by Thursday night, the death toll, not including rebel forces, had reached 83 — 43 civilians, four policemen and 36 government soldiers.

 Accountants, car dealers and others told the legislators that state auditors "arbitrarily and unjustly" enforced complicated and confusing regulations.
 In some cases, the business' only recourse is an expensive lawsuit challenging the legality of the rules, many said.
 "The state tax commission has taken steps to encourage taxpayers," complained David Cooper, a Twin Falls accountant.
 The lawmakers urged those attending the forum to contact them as soon as they perceive problems with state agencies — preferably in the rule-making phase.
 Speaking for the chamber, Executive Vice President J. Kent Just told the lawmakers that the Magic Valley would like to see some of the state's budget surplus spent on highways.
 The chamber wants to see the Singing Bridge rebuilt, supports Buhl's efforts on the Clear Lakes Grade, and wants some of the surplus diverted into a College of Southern Idaho building fund.
 The chamber's meeting also gave the legislators a brief opportunity to share their priorities for the upcoming session. Legislators' plans include:
 • Examining just how the state's budget surplus came about and finding the best way to use the funds, said state Rep. Celina Gould, a member of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee.
 • Finding solutions for Idaho's medical insurance crisis, said state Sen. Joyce McRoberts, a member of Senate Health and Welfare Committee.
 • Helping counties afford tough new solid waste disposal regulations, said Rep. Ralph Peters, a member of the House Local Government Committee.
 • Dealing with wildlife depredation, said Rep. Doug Jones, a member of the House Agricultural Affairs Committee.
 • Maintaining the autonomy of city and county elected officials, said Robbins, a member of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee.
 • Continuing to secure state oversight on activities at the Idaho-National Engineering Laboratory, said Sen. Larry Anderson, chairman of the Senate's Health and Welfare Committee.
 • Helping Idaho business by increasing funding to the state Department of Commerce, said Rep. Lee Barnes, a member of the House Committee on Commerce, Industry and Tourism.

 will lead to an effort to declare its independence from the Soviet Union within a short time.
 In their first vote, 243 deputies voted to delete from the present constitution the provision that had declared "the guiding role of society, state and public organizations belonging to the Communist Party." Only one deputy voted to retain the language, and 30 abstained.
 The lawmakers then voted, 259-0 with 19 abstentions, to substitute new wording that gives "to all parties and organizations equal rights in the framework of the Lithuanian constitution and laws of the republic."
 "This issue has long been solved for all Lithuania," deputy Romualdas Ozolais, a member both of the Communist Party and the new Lithuanian movement Sajudis, declared during the debate on the amendments. "It is only the Supreme Soviet that has not yet made the decision."
 Most of the lawmakers are also party members and owe their positions won in uncontested elections several years ago to the party organization that nominated them. New republican elections are planned for February, and the party knows that it will have great difficulty in winning against Sajudis, which took most of the seats contested in parliamentary elections last spring.

Miami community activists react to the guilty verdict in the William Lozano manslaughter trial

Jury finds policeman guilty while uneasy Miami watches

MIAMI (AP) — A Hispanic policeman was found guilty of manslaughter Thursday in the deaths of two black men, and black leaders praised the verdict as a just response to the shooting that set off three days of racial violence.

Miami Officer William Lozano, 31, showed no emotion when he heard the verdict in the Jan. 16 deaths of motorcyclist Clement Lloyd, 23, and passenger Allan Blanchard, 24. The two counts carry a total maximum sentence of 45 years.

A circuit judge Joseph Parina deferred adjudication on the jury's findings, an administrative formality to allow a pre-sentencing investigation. He ordered everyone involved to return to court Jan. 24. Lozano remained free on \$10,000 bond and had to surrender his passport.

The televised verdict by the six-member, multi-ethnic jury brought relief to an inner-city black community that feared the trial would spark another round of racial unrest.

"It just shows that our system works if people will give it a chance to work and that there are other ways of impacting the system than through violence," said Willie Sims, a black community leader who is a member of Dade County's community relations board.

He said that by mid-afternoon there had been no reports of violence.

Miami has been racked by racial unrest four times this decade, including riots in 1980 and 1984, sparked by acquittals of police charged in the deaths of blacks.

But community leaders praised the presence of two black jurors and

the almost gavel-to-gavel live broadcast coverage of the trial as reassuring the community the verdict would be fair.

"We were relieved that justice had been served," said George Lubrin, Blanchard's brother-in-law.

"We are very satisfied that the verdict came back guilty on both counts, and that the trial itself was very fair," said Barry Greff, attorney for the Lloyd family.

Some police were dismayed, feeling Lozano was defending himself.

"Most of my members are in shock. We all felt William Lozano was justified," said Richard Kinne, head of the Fraternal Order of Police, which represents most of the city's officers.

Asked what the average officer thinks, Kinne replied: "He's seriously thinking what he's going to do in a life-threatening situation. They could become concerned and hesitant out of the street."

The jury had deliberated six hours Wednesday and reconvened Thursday, deliberating for an additional 1 1/2 hours.

Defense attorneys and Lozano's family did not offer comment, but left the courtroom quickly, his wife in tears.

Lozano, who remains suspended with full pay, talked about his case later at his attorney's office.

"It was not given a fair trial from the beginning. There was a lot of evidence denied and quashed," he said. "We're going to look for a new appeal based on the circumstances." He would not elaborate.

Official says Nicaragua abuses election process

WASHINGTON (AP) — A senior State Department official said Thursday the Nicaraguan government has embarked on "a clear pattern of abuses" designed to intimidate opposition political activists and voters before February's national elections.

John Bolton, assistant secretary of state for human rights and democracy affairs, said the political opposition has grown to represent a real threat to continued Sandinista power in Nicaragua, and the government has responded with "tactics designed to discredit, confuse and intimidate the

opposition and its supporters."

Bolton also released a letter he had sent this week to Elliot Richardson, the chief U.N. observer of Nicaragua's elections, detailing more than a dozen attacks and threats aimed at opposition political figures and their supporters in recent weeks.

Bolton said the incidents would make it difficult for Richardson, a former attorney general, to certify following the Feb. 25 voting that the elections were free and fair in accordance with a regional peace agreement signed by the leftist

Sandinista regime and its four Central American neighbors.

In a speech at the State Department, Bolton said that Virgilio Godoy, the vice-presidential candidate of the opposition coalition UNO, had been stopped by soldiers on Nov. 26 in the town of Pantasma. When Godoy complained that two of his soldiers had been beaten and detained by the army, the soldiers responded that the opposition had been throwing rocks and then threatened to fire on the candidate and his party.

68 rights workers killed in 1989

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sixty-eight human rights monitors were killed worldwide in the last year, double the number in the previous 12 months, an international human rights monitoring organization said Thursday.

Human Rights Watch said 63 of the killings were in countries usually considered to be democratic, but added in its annual report that "the danger in democratic countries ... is, of course, not an argument in favor of dictatorships of the right or of the left."

The organization said it had little or no information on persecutions of human rights monitors in Albania, Iran, Iraq, North Korea, Romania or Saudi Arabia because it is virtually impossible for citizens in those countries to monitor government activities.

Nevertheless, the report said, "the dangers that attend efforts to monitor and defend human rights in some 'democracies' should give pause to those who have celebrated the democratic tide that has swept across the world in the 1980s."

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Anti-Aquino coup continues in Cebu; civilians return to Makati

MANILA, Philippines — Civilians took over Manila's main financial district Thursday afternoon, hours after 418 rebel soldiers surrendered and ended their five-day occupation of hotels and other buildings.

But the sixth and bloodiest coup attempt against the government of President Corason Aquino was still on in Cebu, the central Philippines city 350 miles south of Manila.

Mrs. Aquino, who has called on

citizens to join her in a rally in the Makati financial district this afternoon, swore in a commission Thursday to investigate the coup attempt.

Mrs. Aquino declared a nationwide state of emergency Wednesday and asked Congress for powers to take control of key utilities and other businesses that become strikebound, bankrupt or so corrupt they cannot perform their services.

Thursday, Manila regional government officials announced

plans to begin this weekend to arrest anyone who violates price controls that were slapped on essential commodities like rice and kerosene this week.

Negotiations broke down late Thursday in the attempt to end the Cebu stand-off at Mactan Airbase, where the commanding general has threatened to blow up all 16 military aircraft on the ground there.

Brig. Gen. Jose Comendador, the base commander, with some 400 men under him, said that he intended to "stand pat" and continue to

demand the resignation of Mrs. Aquino.

"The events in Makati are just a tactical retreat," he told one television station.

Brig. Gen. Renato V. Palma, who has been assigned to negotiate with Comendador, said that he plans to "exhaust all peaceful means to solve this crisis" but is prepared in the end to "use any course of action" that will regain the airbase.

Television reporters have said that a single-rebel-armor- personnel carrier has stood for four days,

facing four government armored cars at the bridge between Mactan Island and Cebu.

Some 20,000 residents, have been evacuated from Mactan Island in case of hostilities. Most are staying at schools on the other side of the strait.

In addition to the military planes that Comendador has threatened to blow up, 12 Philippine Airline craft, including two Boeing 747's, have been stranded at Cebu since the coup began last Friday.

The government resumed domestic flights Thursday on an almost-normal schedule, the exception being service to and from Cebu, which is served by Macair.

Brig. Gen. Oscar Florendo, spokesman for the armed forces, said that military officials are sure

that cashiered Lt. Col. Gregorio "Gringo" Honasan, leader of the fifth coup attempt against the Aquino government in August 1987, also was the leader of this month's coup.

But he and other officers say they have no idea of Honasan's whereabouts.

Florendo said about 3,000 service members took part in the sixth coup attempt, making it the biggest since Mrs. Aquino became president in 1986. The biggest previous in terms of military participants had been the fifth, in August 1987, in which about 2,500 participated.

He said that by Thursday night, the death toll, not including rebel forces, had reached 13 — 43 government policemen and 36 government soldiers.

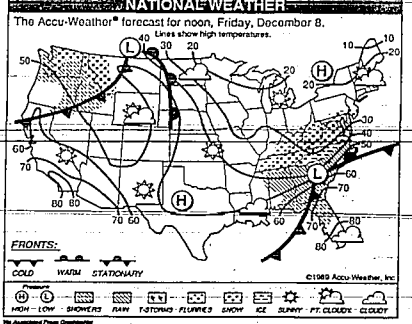

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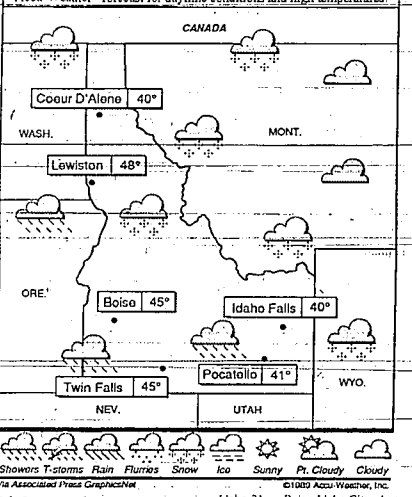

Accountants, car dealers and others told the legislators that state auditors "arbitrarily and unjustly" enforce complicated and confusing tax regulations.

In some cases, the business only recourse is an expensive lawsuit challenging the legality of the rules, many said.

Jury finds policeman guilty while uneasy Miami watches

MIAMI (AP) — A Hispanic policeman was found guilty of manslaughter Thursday in the deaths of two black men, and black leaders praised the verdict as a just response to the shooting that set off three days of racial violence.

Miami Officer William Lozano, 31, showed no emotion when he heard the verdict in the Jan. 16 deaths of motorcycleist Clement Lloyd, 23, and passenger Allan Blanchard, 24. The two counts carry a total maximum sentence of 45 years.

The almost gavel-to-gavel live broadcast coverage of the trial was reassuring the community the trial would be fair.

"We were relieved that justice has been served," said George Lubrin, Blanchard's brother-in-law.

"We are very satisfied that the verdict came back guilty on both counts, and that the trial itself was very fair," said Barry Greff, attorney for the Lloyd family.

Some police were dismayed, feeling Lozano was defending himself.

The reaction from Colombians in Miami was immediate. "Colombian-oriented radio station, WOCN-AM received 200 calls in the hour after the verdict, said afternoon news coordinator Fernando Escobar.

"They were unanimous, not one call was against Lozano. People were expressing their sadness, some were even crying," he said.

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Circuit Judge Joseph Farina deferred adjudication on the jury's findings, an administrative formality to allow a pre-sentencing investigation. He ordered everyone involved to return to court Jan. 24. Lozano remained free on \$10,000 bond and had to surrender his passport.

The televised verdict by the six-member, multi-ethnic jury brought relief to an inner-city black community that feared the trial would spark another round of racial unrest.

"It just shows that our system works if people will give it a chance to work—and that there are other ways of impacting the system than through violence," said Willie Sims, a black community leader who is a member of Dade County's community relations board.

He said that by mid-afternoon there had been no reports of violence.

"Miami has been racked by racial unrest four times this decade, including riots in 1980 and 1984 sparked by acquittals of police charged in the deaths of blacks."

But community leaders praised the presence of two black jurors and

"Most of my members are in shock. We all felt William Lozano was justified," said Richard Kinne, head of the Fraternal Order of Police, which represents most of the city's officers.

Asked what the average officer thinks, Kinne replied: "He's seriously thinking what he's going to do in a life-threatening situation. They could become concerned and hesitant out in the street."

The jury had deliberated six hours Wednesday and reconvened Thursday, deliberating for an additional 1 1/2 hours.

Defense attorneys and Lozano's family did not offer comment, but left the courtroom quickly, his wife in tears.

Lozano, who remains suspended with full pay, talked about his case later at his attorney's office.

"I was not given a fair trial from the beginning. There was a lot of evidence denied and quashed," he said. "We're going to look for a new appeal based on the circumstances."

We need to know more about methods of assessing risk

WASHINGTON — Once again, Congress is trying to decide what will kill you. The specific issue this time is the regulation of pesticide residues in food, and as the debate proceeds, plenty of statistics and double-ended-point figures will be cited on all sides.

framework for regulatory decisions. But many public-health experts — including the Environmental Protection Agency officials themselves — complain that the current system is far from ideal.

The problem arose again recently when the Bush administration announced its intentions to overhaul the nation's pesticide laws. Two other bills pending in Congress take different approaches.

All three plans attempt legislative definitions of "negligible risk" — that is, legal maximum levels for a pesticide residue remaining on food.

Unfortunately, the whole effort is so mired in data deficiencies and definitional discrepancies that it's impossible to predict accurately what would happen to chemicals currently on the market under any of the plans, or precisely what impact the proposals would have on public health.

For a start, epidemiological evidence linking cancer in humans with various environmental pollutants has only been demonstrated convincingly in about two

dozen cases such as cigarette smoke and asbestos.

Science still doesn't know a lot about the various mechanisms that cause cancer or farm tumors, and there are obvious moral prohibitions on testing potentially carcinogenic pesticides in food on real people.

Instead, scientists use rodents. (Rabbits and dogs are used for other kinds of toxicity testing, but rodents are the animal of choice for cancer.)

While this may sound reassuringly straightforward and scientific, there are a lot of pieces missing, adding up to a layer cake of uncertainties.

Rodent surrogates. Cancer in animals may or may not be produced by the same mechanisms that affect humans.

How dependably can we extrapolate from high exposures fed to rodents over a lifetime to low exposures over a lifetime in humans? (And which humans, since individual sensitivities vary widely?) There are no definitive answers to these questions.

Dietary patterns. The standard for determining the amounts and types of foods Americans eat comes from the Department

of Agriculture's food-consumption surveys from 1977-78 — patterns in place before a surge in consumption of fresh fruits and vegetables (along with widespread concern about cholesterol) revolutionized the nation's diet.

Missing information. In addition, pesticide residue data generally come from EPA's tolerances — the maximum allowable levels — which most likely overestimate the actual amount present on the food at the time of consumption.

Potential bias. Many scientists, regulators and — not surprisingly — chemical manufacturers believe that current risk-assessment methods vastly overestimate actual risk because of the upper-boundary assumptions that are plugged into the calculation.

Many environmentalists and public-health activists, on the other hand, believe the risks are underestimated because of the outdated human-consumption data and the fact that EPA has not historically delineated subpopulations that eat more of a given food than others.

But since very few of the assumptions are definitive, there are many ways in which

they can be juggled to reach completely different conclusions about risk.

In a forthcoming book, "Chemicals in the Human Food Chain," Sandra O. Archibald, an assistant professor in the Food Research Institute at Stanford University, and Carl K. Winter, an extension toxicologist from the University of California at Riverside, reassessed the risks posed by pesticides used on several food crops that were examined in the National Academy of Sciences' 1987 report.

Deliberately using excessive assumptions in order to set priorities for improved regulation, NAS calculated that tomatoes constituted the largest oncogenic risk of the dozens of foods it investigated.

Archibald and Winter recalculated the risk from tomatoes, using actual residue data from FDA's Los Angeles laboratory. Instead of NAS's estimate of 859 additional cancers per million, Archibald and Winter got 32 additional cancers — 2,600 times less risk.

Human health should be judged in terms of human benefit, fit and under conditions acceptable to consumers.

European events don't negate need for strong U.S. defense

WASHINGTON — As the stunning events in Eastern Europe continue to unfold, it is becoming clear that the wolves are circling the U.S. defense budget.

Some stalk these dollars from altruistic motives, such as shifting more to child care, health programs and other social agenda items.

Others, however, see the diminution of the Warsaw Pact threat as their best chance to renege their dream of emasculating the "twisted" Pentagon.

Both these groups are wrong. The daily headlines may be exciting, but they don't excuse rashness or misplaced logic. It is incumbent on the administration to seize the lead and to inject some good sense into the argument.

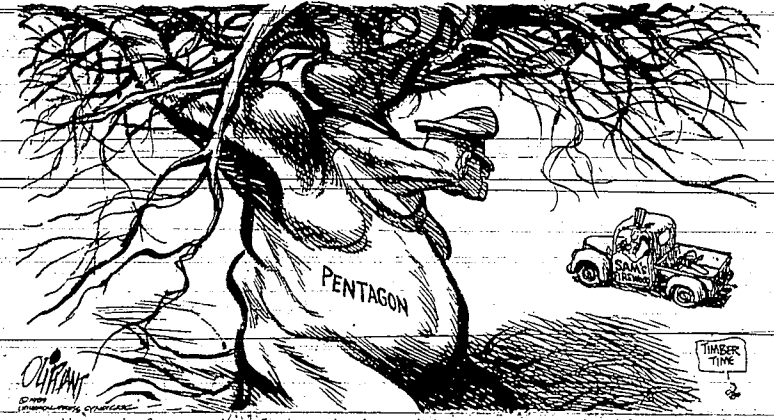
This is the time to "walk, not run, to the exit" in realigning American defenses and to ensure that the outcome is shaped by a solid strategic rationale, rather than by non-security issues.

While it is appropriate to modify our defense posture as the Warsaw Pact threat diminishes, the future is still plagued by uncertainty.

We were happy when Nicaragua's dictatorship was crushed by popular forces in 1979. We're not so happy with what replaced it.

In the same fashion, we have to be cautious in making assumptions about America's defensive needs in the 1990s and beyond. No matter how appealing the prospects of a world with no Soviet threat, it isn't here yet.

The reality is that the Kremlin will maintain what it considers a prudent mix of conventional and nuclear forces for the



foreseeable future. More significant, the Kremlin will not dismantle its impressive mobilization system, which can call up the Soviets' vast pool of military experience in a crisis.

It is not a comforting thought, but the fact remains that there are still serious challenges ahead in Eastern Europe, Poland, East Germany, Czechoslovakia and Hungary will all be there.

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As America's defense posture is reshaped, we should also insist that both the administration and Congress first agree on a realistic timetable and a thoughtful strategic rationale to guide the cuts.

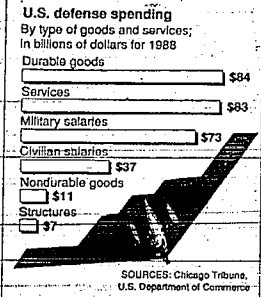
Air Force may stretch Stealth program

WASHINGTON (AP) — Air Force Secretary Donald Rice said Thursday that he's looking at stretching out purchases of the costly B-2 stealth bomber, and that building all the radar-evading planes the service wants "is something that doesn't need to be decided for quite a few years to come."

The Pentagon has invested about \$23 billion in the program and hopes to purchase 132 bombers at a cost of about \$70 billion. But Capitol Hill lawmakers are professing "sticker shock" over the price tag — estimated to be \$530 million for a single plane.

Given the current climate of budget cutting and the recent reforms sweeping Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union, the plane's critics have scoffed at the idea that the Air Force will ever get all the B-2 bombers it says are needed.

The secretary, at a meeting with reporters, said that he believes the full contingent of 132 planes is necessary and that the bomber is an essential part of the Pentagon's plans for a nuclear deterrent force, even if arms control agreements are reached with the Soviet Union in the coming year on conventional and strategic nuclear weapons.



The secretary said the Air Force must do a better job of making its case for the controversial program. "The Air Force has to work harder than we've

done to make it clear we understand the major investment the taxpayer is making here, and that we expect to utilize that aircraft" to the maximum, he said.

Asked whether the service intends to "stretch out" purchases of the plane, and whether the 132 number was "up in the air," Rice said:

"We are... looking at the option of procuring it over a longer period of time... we're interested in doing that only if it can still be done efficiently," he said.

"I think 132 is a good number and if it were to be questioned, it is something that doesn't need to be decided for quite a few years to come," he added.

In July, Air Force officials reminded members of Congress that stretching out the program over a number of years could raise the aircraft's price, considerably.

Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, said that by his calculations, a single B-2 could cost about \$1 billion.

The Pentagon is proposing spending about \$24 billion over a three-year peak period for the bomber.

Titan 3 rocket launch delayed 1 day

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Martin Marietta has delayed launch of its first commercial Titan 3 rocket 24 hours until Friday night, company officials said Thursday.

The postponement was called when pre-launch checks detected a computer software problem that might have prevented deployment of one of two communications satellites. The rocket is carrying payloads for the Japan Communications Satellite Co. and for the British Defense Ministry.

Although there was a "low probability" the software could have caused a problem, "the company made a decision to postpone the launch because it does not want to accept even a small risk," said Ed Browne, president of Martin Marietta Commercial Titan Inc.

JCSAT-2 will complete a two-satellite Japanese domestic network, providing telephone, television, facsimile and high-speed data services. It is operated by the Japanese Communications Satellite Co.

World population growth slowing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The world's population is expected to grow by about a billion people in each of the next three decades but won't be increasing as rapidly as it has been, the Census Bureau said Thursday.

Currently at 5.2 billion people, the world's population is expected to grow to 6.3 billion by the year 2000, 7 billion by 2010 and 8.3 billion by 2020.

More than nine out of 10 new arrivals will be in developing countries, the bureau said.

Even with the addition of a billion people every 10 years, the planet's overall growth rate will fall to lower levels than at present, the agency said.

Worldwide population growth was 1.7 percent in the 1980s and is expected to be 1.8 percent in the 1990s, then to fall to 1.4 percent between 2000 and 2010 and to 1.3 percent from 2010 to 2020.

Program may push harmful drugs

WASHINGTON (AP) — A massive government cholesterol education program may be encouraging widespread use of unnecessary, possibly harmful drugs, the chairman of a House health subcommittee said Thursday.

"This raises some troubling questions," said Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., after a hearing by his Energy and Commerce subcommittee on health and the environment at which experts offered differing opinions on the risks of high cholesterol.

1,000 attend memorial services at Pearl Harbor

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii (AP) — A thousand people gathered at two sites on Thursday to remember the "day of infamy" that killed more than 2,000 servicemen and brought the United States into World War II.

Ceremonies on the 48th anniversary of the Dec. 7, 1941, Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor included a moment of silence and a 21-gun salute.

Simultaneous ceremonies were held by the U.S. Navy aboard the USS Arizona Memorial, where about 100 guests attended, and onshore at the Arizona Memorial Visitors Center.

The shore ceremony open to the public and sponsored by the National Park Service, which runs the center, attracted about 900 people.

Adm. Huntington Hardesty, commander of U.S. forces in the Pacific, spoke at the Navy ceremony, alluding to the new peace initiatives between the East and West blocs.

"As the opportunity arises to reduce tensions and the potential for open conflict, we should seize it and support it," he said.

The speaker at the public ceremony was retired Rear Adm. Victor Dybdal, who was a gunnery officer aboard the USS Helm during the attack.

In all, 19 ships were sunk or damaged and some 2,900 men died on the day President Franklin Roosevelt said would "live in infamy."

The sunken Arizona is the final resting place for 1,102 Navy men and Marines.

Armenia remembers date of massive quake

LENINAKAN, U.S.S.R. (AP) — Bells tolled, thousands wept in the graveyards, and plaintive chants filled the streets Thursday as Armenia marked the first anniversary of the earthquake that killed 25,000 of its people.

In this mountain city, officials stopped the town clock forever at 11:41, the minute disaster struck, and held a moment of silence.

Only muffled sobs broke the stillness.

"If only it could all have been a dream, and we could wake up and have everyone here again," Armenian poet Maro Marzarian told a crowd of several hundred gathered to dedicate a memorial to Leninakan's thousands of dead.

In a snowy cemetery just outside of town, women sobbed at the gravesites, some of them caressing photographs etched on the tombstones, and men stood stony-eyed and silent. Many graves held unidentified corpses, with markers reading only "238, woman" or "453, child."

"Your soul hurts so much you just can't express it," said Lillia Stepanian, 45, whose brother, Zilrik, and his family were crushed to death in their Leninakan apartment.

"You remember that on this day, at this time, they were already gone," she said. "At this time one year ago I was standing by our house, only it wasn't a house any more."

She said Zilrik's 3-year-old daughter could be heard crying from the ruins of the house but rescuers

She and her mother moved to Zilrik's wife had been due to give Armenian capital of Yerevan until birth to a second child three weeks later. Leninakan housing could be built for them — which they don't expect any time soon.

"And the people left alive have

The earthquake measuring 6.9 on the Richter scale killed at least 25,000 people, left 20,000 missing and destroyed the homes of 500,000 more.

In the nearby village of Spitak, where the quake destroyed virtually every house, residents dedicated a new church of galvanized steel. Standing above a hillside crowded with graves, it shone in the sun under Thursday's bright blue sky.

Armenians stopped work Thursday to honor the dead, and Armenian TV broadcast a program on earthquake damage and reconstruction.

After the quake rocked Armenia with such devastating force, the Soviet Union opened its borders to foreign assistance for the first time, accepting the help of thousands of experts, including rescue teams, doctors and construction specialists.

More than half a billion dollars in assistance poured into the disaster area from overseas, altering the course of East-West relations as generosity and mercy overcame years of Soviet propaganda depicting Westerners as greedy and hate-filled.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Gennady Gerasimov said Thursday that foreign assistance as of mid-October totaled \$586 million. The most generous donors were Italy, with \$95 million, West Germany with \$84.5 million, the United States with \$42 million, Britain with \$36 million, Czechoslovakia with \$34.5 million, East Germany with \$30 million and France with \$28 million.

Singh visits temple to quell Sikh secessionist violence

AMRITSAR, India (AP) — Prime Minister V.P. Singh visited Sikhism's holiest shrine, the Golden Temple, on Thursday in a major initiative by his government to end the lingering secessionist campaign by Sikh militants.

It was the first visit by a prime minister to the Golden Temple in more than five years, since shortly after a bloody army raid that led to the assassination of Prime Minister Indira Gandhi.

"Too much bloodshed has taken place," the Hindu prime minister told about 20,000 Sikhs inside the 14th century shrine. "The time has come to win the hearts of the people."

In New Delhi, a judge formally

dropped charges against four Sikhs accused of participating in the Oct. 31, 1984, assassination of Mrs. Gandhi.

Mrs. Gandhi was shot and killed by two Sikh bodyguards ordered by the army attack she ordered on the Golden Temple in June 1984 to drive out Sikh militants using it as a base.

One assassin was shot and killed by security men. The other was convicted along with an accomplice and both were hanged in January.

Conspiracy charges were later filed against four other Sikhs. Last week, the government said it would withdraw the charges in a conciliatory move toward the Sikh community.

50 die as bus falls off bridge into river

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP) — An overcrowded bus was knocked off a narrow bridge into a river, killing at least 50 people, newspapers reported Thursday.

The bus driver was trying to get around a stalled car on the bridge at Majidun, near Lagos, when the bus

was struck from behind by a truck and knocked into the river.

The newspapers said the bus was supposed to carry 40 passengers but was believed to have been carrying twice that number.

No other details were immediately available.

China says Cold War continues

BEIJING (AP) — China said Thursday the Cold War will continue as long as a "few countries" — apparently the United States and the Soviet Union — continue to try to influence events in other countries.

"The practice of power politics will eventually jeopardize the relaxation of the international situation and only lead to a continued Cold War," Foreign Ministry spokesman Jin Guibiao said at a weekly news briefing.

Jin was responding to a question on whether the Malta summit between President Bush and Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev signaled an end to the Cold War.

"The international situation is undergoing major changes at present," Jin said. "Hegemonism is finding its

spring-tougher and tougher. However, power politics hasn't entirely resigned itself from the historical arena."

He added: "In the international relations, it's still easy to see attempts made to interfere in other's internal affairs

by means of one sort or another, violating the norms governing international relations."

The Chinese government's only previous comment on the summit was that it hoped the results "will genuinely help relax and stabilize the world situation and will not harm the interests of any third party."

Asked which superpower was more responsible for prolonging the Cold War, Jin said only: "In this world of today there are very few countries that are in a position to practice power politics. We are against whomever practices power politics."

Through much of the 1970s and 1980s China claimed that Soviet "hegemonism" was the biggest threat to world peace. However, Moscow and Beijing this year normalized relations after three decades of animosity, while Beijing's relations with Washington have plummeted following the military crackdown of the pro-democracy movement this spring.

Iraq fires orbital boosters, missiles

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iraq claimed Thursday it has test-fired two long-range missiles and successfully launched a rocket able to carry satellites into space, developments that could affect the Middle East's military balance.

Hussain Kamel, minister of industry and military industrialization, said the three-stage rocket was launched Tuesday from the Al-Anbar space research center 50 miles west of Baghdad.

He also claimed in a statement broadcast by state-run Baghdad Radio that Iraq has test-fired two surface-to-surface missiles with a range of 1,240 miles.

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E. Germany eyes free elections

EAST BERLIN (AP) — The Communist Party agreed Thursday to cooperate with the opposition, after 40 years of ruling East Germany with Stalinist orthodoxy, and both sides proposed elections in May and agreed to rewrite the constitution.

The Communist Party may even follow the Hungarian party in changing its name.

The first talks between party and opposition delegations were held after publication of the new Communist program and produced an agreement to recommend that Parliament schedule elections May 6.

They also agreed on the need for a new constitution, but no details were released.

About 2,500 people marched to the site of the talks in a Lutheran Church building and chanted, "Free elections! Free elections!"

Lt. Gen. Wolfgang Schwanitz, chief of state security, said angry citizens had stormed secret police facilities in four cities, inflicting "numerous slight injuries to our colleagues."

He said the situation was at "the threshold of escalation," and aggressive acts against his forces could "have unforeseeable consequences for the country."

The government has warned against growing violence for several days, but few cases have been documented. Opposition leaders in Suhl claimed police dispersed angry citizens with tear gas.

In an interview on East German TV, Communist Premier Itans Modrow appealed for calm while expressing support and sympathy for activists angered by mounting reports of ousted officials thwarting investigations into alleged corruption.

Czech premier quits in leadership shuffle

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — Premier Ludislav Adamec resigned Thursday while still bargaining with a powerful opposition that demanded the Communists form an acceptable government or suffer another general strike.

Adamec, 63, announced his resignation at a meeting with non-Communist party officials about changes in the government, said Bohuslav Kucera of the Socialist Party. He quoted Adamec as saying a new, younger leader was needed to

achieve a compromise. President Gustav Husak asked Deputy Premier Marian Calfa, 43, to take over and continue searching for a solution, the official CTK news agency reported.

Calfa, a Communist, has attended with opposition leaders, who rejected Adamec had been expected to name a new government Friday that would involve some form of power sharing with the opposition, which in

a few weeks has become strong enough to break the Communist Party's 41-year monopoly on power.

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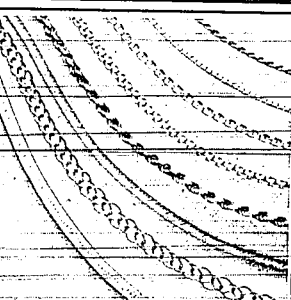

Evans agrees with Andrus on surplus

Ex-governor would use \$100 million for 1-time expenses

TWIN FALLS — Former Gov. John Evans may grumble over something Idaho's present governor has said or done, but when it comes to spending the state's budget surplus Evans absolutely agrees with Cecil Andrus.

"That \$100 million should be used for one-time expenditures," Evans told a group of Twin Falls business people attending a leadership workshop Thursday.

Evans, who became Idaho's 26th governor in 1977, remembers the lean years during the early '80s when the state had a tough time meeting the state Constitution's balanced-budget mandate.

"Several years, we got down to the wire," he said. "Although some legislators say they are shuddering at the specter of divvying up the mountain of money, Evans calls the surplus a marvelous opportunity.

If Evans were still at the helm, he'd see that the funds were used for highways, school buildings, bridges and law enforcement, he said.

He also would see that some of the money were made available to cities and counties in the form of matching grants.

Andrus probably will receive a more detailed account on what Evans would do with the surplus — the former governor said the two Democrat leaders talk regularly.

Haffner pleads guilty to manslaughter count

TWIN FALLS — A killer diagnosed as schizophrenic pleaded guilty Thursday to voluntary manslaughter as part of a plea bargain.

The state agreed to recommend a five- to seven-year sentence for Roy W. Haffner. Haffner will receive credit for jail time he has served since his arrest in November 1987.

Rockne Lammers, Twin Falls County state attorney prosecutor, called it "a just resolution to the case." Public Defender Michael Wood said he couldn't comment until Haffner has been sentenced.

Under questioning by 5th District Judge Daniel C. Meehl, Haffner said he stabbed Jesus Hernandez, 60, one time above the heart and left the 9½-inch blade in the man's chest. The stabbing took place in Haffner's rented house at 449 Fifth Ave. W., on Nov. 10, 1987. Several psychiatrists have since concurred that Haffner suffers from schizophrenia. He told one doctor that his teeth electrically stimulated his brain and he complained of pain he thought was caused by an implanted sex organ. Haffner, 49, was initially charged with first-degree murder, but a magistrate judge dismissed the charge in January 1988,

based on a psychiatrist's testimony that Haffner was incapable of premeditating the killing. The psychiatrist had been called by the prosecution. The state filed a second-degree murder charge just days later, but proceedings were delayed as psychiatrists continued to evaluate whether Haffner was mentally competent to stand trial. Haffner's plea bargain reduces the second-degree murder charge to voluntary manslaughter. The reduced charge requires intent, but when Meehl asked Haffner Thursday whether he intended to kill Hernandez by stabbing him, Haffner paused, then said he didn't remember.

To show intent, Lammers told the court that Haffner had been seen with Hernandez the day of the stabbing, and that Haffner had told relatives that there was a man in his house he didn't want there, and he was going to kill the man. Lammers also said Haffner phoned police and told them he was going to leave the man's body outside for police to pick up if they didn't come and get him before he was killed. Then Haffner, who appeared with a severely heard and was cuffed at the wrists and ankles, said he had intended to stab Hernandez over the heart. Meehl ordered a presentence investigation. Wood said Haffner could be sentenced to a mental hospital or to prison.

Downtown sees surge of business relocations

"I think downtown is in a definite upswing right now," Business Improvement District Manager Betsy Florence said.

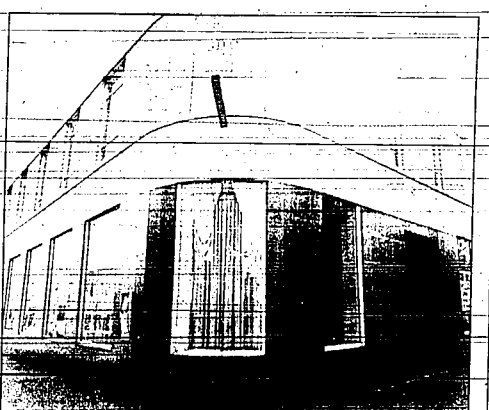
What's apparently happening is that furniture stores are increasing their downtown presence, and office space is being snatched up.

Key Bank of Idaho, 220 Shoshone St. E., announced Wednesday it plans to relocate to the old Idaho First National Bank building on the corner of Shoshone and Main Avenue. Key Bank bought Idaho Bank & Trust Co. one year ago.

Key Bank plans to spend \$250,000 renovating the building, according to a press release. It will lease part of the building from Twin Falls attorneys John Herpin and John Lezamis, who bought the building in early 1988.

Beef raised about cows in 'park' area

TWIN FALLS — The federal government could take back land near Crystal Springs, that is set aside for a county park if cattle don't stop moo-oo-ing in it.

"If it's not used in the use that it was intended for, the BLM will take it back," said Sharon LaBrecque, a real estate specialist for the Bureau of Land Management.

LaBrecque said the land that was loaned to the county in a "patent" procedure for park development in the late 1960s has recently been inappropriately used for grazing.

Darrell Heider, the county Parks and Recreation director, said he did not know about the grazing before the BLM notified the county of the problem.

He said the BLM park, which has not been developed, is about a mile upstream from Crystal Springs.

"It's the only good access to that part of the river," he said. "It's a very significant site."

The county has plans to develop the park with picnic tables and a beach dock. Heider has done so, however, because the county does not own land access to the property and neighboring landowners refuse to allow access, Heider said.

The county has been trying to hang onto the property on the chance that someday someone will buy the adjacent property and

Wood preservative suspected of causing cancer

WASHINGTON — A common wood preservative that has been used by 10 Idaho firms is a major source of suspected cancer-causing dioxin, but remains largely unregulated by the federal government, according to a report by the environmental group Greenpeace.

Among the Idaho companies is Pentia Post of Tuttle.

Pentachlorophenol, a pesticide and preservative known as "Penta" that is used to treat utility poles, fence posts and railroad ties and other wood products, has

also been fingered as a cause of skin disorders, infertility and large-scale deaths of wildlife, the report says.

Pentia's effectiveness in killing so many different types of living organisms should have served warning of its dangers to humans and other unintended living targets," the authors maintain.

But, due to intense lobbying by the wood industry, Pentia has largely avoided strict regulation by the Environmental Protection Agency, the 150-page study states.

Greenpeace argues that "inherent weaknesses" in U.S. environmental laws, such as the use of cost-benefit considerations, have allowed economic

interests to override effective protection of the environment.

At Tuttle's Pentia Post, soil has been contaminated with Penta and dioxin because of "indiscriminate disposal of drippage and spills," the report states.

Brian Ravenscroft, who manages the plant, said there were no problems with the plant presented to health inspectors.

A May 1985 EPA site inspection of Pentia Post showed the plant did not qualify for inclusion on the EPA's Superfund National Priorities List of hazardous waste sites, said Mark Masarik, chief of the EPA Boise hazardous waste section.

The inspection did not turn up any significant health hazards, Masarik said. It did, however, recommend another inspection of the plant's chemical handling practices. Whether that inspection was done and what it showed could not be verified Thursday.

Another Idaho Penta user, Union Pacific Railroad of Pocatello, is on the Superfund list. Greenpeace, citing EPA reports, maintains the rail company dumped sludge from an oil-water separator into a pond, contaminating local wells with Penta, oil and grease.

The report states that six Idaho wood-

Government defends route used for nuclear waste train

WASHINGTON (AP) — Despite inadequate guidelines, the government selected a good route for a 10-state train trip for debris from the Three Mile Island nuclear plant to an Idaho laboratory, the Department of Transportation says.

The DOT, reacting to opposition from residents and lawmakers in a handful of the affected states, concluded in a 47-page report this week that the Energy Department made a "reasonable" choice when it selected the route. The multiple objective route selection criteria.

However, the report also said, "During the course of planning the

shipping campaign, the Energy Department did not have well-developed operational guidelines for route selection."

The report said population exposure was not a significant factor in the route selection.

The Energy Department is 3 1/2 years into a program to haul 300,000 pounds of damaged radioactive fuel by train from the crippled TMI Unit 2 reactor in Middletown, Pa., to the Department of Energy's National Engineering Laboratory, 2,400 miles away.

The fuel passes through Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Missouri, Kansas,

Nebraska, Colorado and Wyoming.

At the INEL, the material is analyzed by EG&G Idaho Inc., an Energy Department contractor hoping to learn more about the chain of events in 1979 that resulted in the nation's worst commercial nuclear accident.

Twenty trips, each taking about five days, have been completed by the Conrail and Union Pacific railroads. Two more are scheduled, Mary Wells, spokeswoman for TMI, said Thursday.

The report noted that the Energy Department "encountered opposition to the route, which passes through

several large cities (Pittsburgh, Indianapolis, St. Louis and Kansas City). Most concerns were from the St. Louis area, and to a lesser extent, Pittsburgh areas and by the states of Kansas and Illinois."

In the small Indiana community of Avon, near Indianapolis, residents became alarmed when they learned in 1986 that the nuclear freight would pass within several hundred yards of 3,000 students at four local schools.

Several public meetings were held, and the Energy Department delivered remarks of explanatory literature to sootie residents.

The fuel, along with metal debris from the plant, is contained in canisters secured inside layered stainless steel and lead casks designed to withstand accidents.

Because of its confidence in the casks, the Energy Department did not use population exposure as a major determining factor in choosing the route, DOT said.

The DOT study was prompted by a request from Sen. John Danforth, D-Mo., for an "independent assessment of the route."

In its examination, DOT concluded that the track quality was high and that the trips were being

accomplished with only a single switch of rail carriers, from Conrail to Union Pacific.

While it found the safety risks acceptable, DOT said the public "influenced by the nature of the material, apparently perceives a risk higher than that based on technical considerations."

However, DOT also said that Energy Department poorly documented its route selection decisions and lacked "proper guidelines. About two years after the route was planned, the department issued guidelines for routing such shipments.

Mormon church won't oppose liquor law revisions, officials say

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The Mormon Church will not oppose legislation that would do away with minibottles and "brown-bagging," measures intended to tighten the state's control of liquor consumption, officials say.

The Utah-based church advises its 6.7 million members to abstain from alcohol, tobacco and caffeine, but acknowledges the "contrary

preferences of others," Bruce L. Olsen, managing director of public communications and special affairs, said Thursday.

"The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints has determined not to oppose the proposed legislation as presently drafted," Olsen said in a departmental statement. He said it was being given to all members of the Legislature.

"In stating its position, the Church observes and maintains the legitimate and traditional role of churches to voice their positions on issues of social and moral concern," he said.

Utah lawmakers long have been sensitive to the church's position on a variety of issues. Utah's population is about 70 percent Mormon and more than 90 percent

of its lawmakers are church members.

The proposed legislation was drafted by the Alcoholic Beverage Control Task Force. It would require licensed private clubs and restaurants that now sell mixed drinks using 1.7-ounce minibottles to install metering devices that will dispense one ounce of liquor.

The bill, which is to be presented to the Utah Legislature in January, would ban "brown-bagging" — where a customer brings liquor into an establishment and buys setups with the contents of minibottles of wines that could be brought to restaurants.

Tavern owners now licensed to sell only beer and setups have said they can't afford to buy the metering devices, which would slash their profits or drive them out of business.

The church statement quoted a U.S. Department of Health and Human Services statement calling alcohol a "deadly drug" that when abused has an impact on children, families and society.

It also quoted former U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop as saying alcohol is an addictive drug. In the alleged war on drugs, alcohol enjoys a "battlefield exemption," Koop said.

"Concern over the growing effects

of alcohol abuse has triggered a groundswell of public sentiment in favor of careful regulation of alcoholic beverages and responsible law enforcement," Olsen said.

He said the legislation appears to conform to Utah's long-standing practice of allowing wines and spirits to be sold only in state-operated liquor stores and its policy of "neither promoting nor encouraging its sale."

The bill also would put a cap on "dram shop" liability, or the amount for which an establishment can be sued if a customer drinks too much and becomes involved in, for example, a traffic accident.

Salvation Army says there is no cash quota for its bell-ringers in Twin Falls

TWIN FALLS — Though the Salvation Army commander in Pocatello has set 560 daily donation goals on holidays for bell-ringers Christmas kettles, no such quota exists in Twin Falls.

Instead, Lt. Rob Noland said, the local Salvation Army monitors kettle locations each year, either on a daily basis.

"If the traffic pattern changes, then we move the kettle," he said.

In Pocatello, however, Capt. Ron Gilden contends he's just practicing good business in requiring each bell-ringer to bring in \$60 a day.

"Our business practice requires that our costs should not exceed 50 percent of what we bring in," Gilden

said.

Noland concurred that the Salvation Army does feel obligated to collect as much money as possible.

"Since the public is giving us money, we don't want to put all that toward the cost," he said.

Although many volunteers ring bells for the Salvation Army, the organization hires unemployed people during the week when volunteers cannot be found.

Noland said some bell-ringers can pull in more donations than others. That's because some people are more friendly and outgoing than others, he said.

Recently, written warnings have gone out to the minimum-wage bell-ringers in Pocatello who "are not making the grade."

The wife of one disgruntled bell-ringer, who said her husband was told he would lose his job if his collections did not pick up, claimed Gilden's quota policy has prompted some bell-ringers to quit.

Gilden acknowledged that one woman has quit, but other bell-ringers have had no trouble meeting the daily quota. He said the complaining worker, who was not identified, takes too many breaks, leaving his station unattended.

"I've placed him at various sites and his collections are always less than what was taken in the day before or the day after he was at the site," Gilden said.

"Some of these people fail to realize that if they want welfare, they should come to our welfare office," he said.

Idaho officials learn federal funding will help ensure safe waste transport

BOISE (AP) — The federal government has advised Idaho federal funds will be made available to states to ensure safe transportation of high-level nuclear waste to a planned storage facility in New Mexico.

Gov. Cecil Andrus and the governors of six other states last summer expressed concern about shipments to the planned Waste Isolation Pilot Plant in New Mexico, saying they would need federal money to pay for the transportation.

Andrus said Thursday he has received a letter from Energy Secretary James Watkins saying money will be available.

Andrus said Watkins said he found that the federal government's recommendations in agreement with

polices he is setting for the agency. "I believe cooperative federal-state initiatives to ensure safe transportation offer the highest probability of success, and I have identified department funds to support that effort," Andrus quoted Watkins as saying.

Andrus said current information indicates that when shipments begin to the New Mexico facility, they could amount to 230 truckloads of radioactive nuclear waste per year from nuclear research centers such as the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory in eastern Idaho and installations in other states.

This fiscal year to carry out the inspection, safety enforcement and emergency response programs needed to prepare for the shipments.

Andrus said he and the other governors were worried about accident prevention, independent state inspection of drivers, vehicles and shipping containers, procedures to keep shipments off the road during bad weather or road conditions, criteria for safe parking locations, advance notice of shipments and improved state emergency response capability.

The other states are Washington, Colorado, Utah, New Mexico, Wyoming and Nevada, the governor's office said.

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McClure joins cry for silver price probe

SPOKANE (AP) — U.S. Sen. James McClure on Thursday joined mining industry leaders and another Idaho congressman in calling for an investigation into possible manipulation of silver prices on commodity exchanges.

"I support what Congressman (Larry) Craig has called for in terms of a congressional investigation of manipulation," McClure, R-Idaho, told a news conference at the Northwest Mining Association convention.

Craig, R-Idaho, who is scheduled to attend the convention Friday on its closing day, has said he plans to propose that Congress hold hearings into trading practices on the New York Commodities Exchange and other trading floors.

He has said there is evidence that major industrial silver users had

tampered with the market. "I think it is important for us to determine whether or not the forces that shape prices in markets are subject to any kind of manipulation," McClure said. "I believe there's enough reasons raised by enough people to justify an investigation into whether or not there are other artificial impacts on the market that have kept the price at such low levels for so long."

Sunshine Mining Co. Chairman Michael Boswell told the convention Wednesday that a group of

"powerful and devious" silver users have kept prices depressed by manipulating the market, promoting commodity contracts for more of the precious metal than can be delivered.

The Silver Users Association, a group of 24 companies including Kodak Corp. and Polaroid Corp., "would have no problem" with an investigation, Vice President Walt Frankland said Thursday in a telephone interview from the association's Washington, D.C., office.

"We don't get involved in the market," Frankland said. "Very few of our people trade on the exchanges."

"I just think it's so incomprehensible to think that a user is able to control the price of a raw material on which he is so seriously

dependent."

Frankland said if the silver market is depressed, it's because of oversupply at a time when industrial use of silver is increasing slightly but has stayed well below its peak in the early 1970s.

"Consumption is down, supplies are up, and inflation fears are currently very slim at the moment, and therefore investors are not showing much interest in silver," Frankland said, adding that the mining industry "can't seem to come to grips with these three factors."

McClure said the federal government's selling of its surplus silver may be the biggest factor keeping the silver market depressed.

He said putting surplus silver into coinage would be more profitable and less disruptive to markets.

Lewis faces life term; some charges dropped

BOISE (AP) — Charges of knowingly exposing someone to the AIDS virus and possessing child pornography have been dropped against George Frank Lewis, the admitted Boise homosexual convicted this week of sexually abusing a 15-year-old boy.

A charge of possessing child pornography also has been dropped against Lewis' roommate, Michael Carver, who was convicted in January of causing a fatal accident in downtown Boise by dressing in women's lingerie.

"The problem is that it is nearly impossible to prove who the material belonged to without one of them testifying against the other," Ada County Deputy Prosecutor Jay Rosenthal said Wednesday in announcing the decision.

The child pornography charge carries a maximum prison term of five years.

Rosenthal said if he had been convicted, the charge involving exposure to the human immunodeficiency virus could have meant a 15-year prison term for Lewis.

A trial on that charge began earlier this fall, but 4th District

Judge Robert Newhouse cited extensive publicity on the case in declaring a mistrial.

Lewis, 52, faces a possible life prison term for the child sexual abuse conviction when he is sentenced Jan. 22 by 4th District Judge Deborah Bail.

Meanwhile, members of Boise's gay community said Wednesday that much of the publicity surrounding Lewis' child abuse trial failed to distinguish between homosexuality and pedophilia.

And they said the publicity would increase misunderstanding and homophobia among heterosexuals.

"The vast majority of gay people are responsible citizens who do not approve of exploiting children," said John Hummel, board member of the Idaho AIDS Foundation.

"The issues of child abuse and homosexuality became confused. It really was a media circus."

"If he had molested a girl instead of a boy, there would not have been nearly as much publicity," added Ann Dunkin, adviser to the Boise State University Gay and Lesbian Alliance.

Bishop calls for abortion opposition by solons

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Bishop Tod Brown said he agrees with national church leaders that Catholic lawmakers have a moral responsibility to work for legislation opposing legalized abortion.

"It's a tough issue, but we have to stand up and be counted," Brown, spiritual leader to Idaho's 75,000 Catholics, said Wednesday.

"I would hope legislators on the state level would oppose abortion."

The bishop said he was unaware of any of Idaho's dozen or so Catholic legislators taking an active, public stance in favor of the right to choose abortion.

But if any did, Brown said he was not sure how he would respond.

A Catholic legislator in California recently was refused communion and others in Rhode Island have been banished from any mention in a church newspaper for their support of legalized abortion.

1990 Legislature will choose points of new depredation law

BOISE (AP) — It will be up to the 1990 Idaho Legislature to decide what parts of a package of recommendations on dealing with wildlife depredation become state law, says a state senator.

A landowner-sportsman coalition has come up with proposals on how to handle future payments to landowners for damage by wildlife, and how to prevent such damage in the future. The package of recommendations was presented to a legislative committee at the Statehouse on Thursday.

Sen. Herb Carlson, R-Eagle, chairman of the panel, said the proposals will be sent to the relevant committees of the Legislature for action next session.

"It does represent a balance of opinion, something we can live with," said Frank Gaffney, his Seattle-based Northwest Renewable Resources Center conducted the negotiations which led to the recommendations. "We do have a consensus," he said.

But Rep. Joan Wood, R-Rigby, complained that she felt the committee's report went beyond what the Legislature authorized last session in a resolution she sponsored.

She said the resolution said the negotiators were to look at ways of compensating landowners for

damage caused by wildlife, and not to come up with long-range plans and recommendations about wildlife management.

She said the entire package appeared to be presented on a "take it or leave it" basis.

"That's outside the role and mission, as far as I can remember carrying the bill," Mrs. Wood said.

She said it was wrong for legislators to be presented a package of proposals and be told they must accept it all or upset a delicate, negotiated balance.

Last session, Mrs. Wood sponsored legislation that eventually resulted in a \$500,000 appropriation from Fish and Game Department funds to repay landowners for damage caused by marauding wildlife. Landowners submitted \$1.3 million in claims, and only a portion of them were paid.

The new proposal calls for a formalized system to deal with the claims in the future. They would require an appropriation of \$200,000 in Fish and Game funds for the first year of claims and a \$1 million appropriation in state funds to start a trust account to handle larger claims.

But Gaffney said the recommendations have three major parts, and paying for wildlife damage would be only the last resort.

The first section recommends "a strong new partnership" between sportsmen and landowners to avoid the problems of depredation. The second outlines Fish and Game's response when landowners report wildlife damage.

It was that response last winter that triggered the debate, Mrs. Wood and others complained that Fish and Game did little for landowners reporting wildlife damage.

The report also contained recommendations for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. The federal nuclear research center in eastern Idaho's off-limits to most hunting. Adjacent landowners have said large herds of wildlife, mainly antelope, have built up on INEL.

In tough winters, the landowners say, the wildlife has poured off INEL onto private property, causing such damage.

By far the largest claims presented this year for wildlife damage were for farms and ranches bordering INEL.

Gaffney said the recommendation for INEL expressed the "collective frustration" of the negotiators for the wildlife situation on the federal property.

He acknowledged that the recommendations carry no weight, because the state can't order INEL to do anything.

Energy surplus shrinking quick

BOISE (AP) — The Northwest economic recovery is rapidly depleting what was once an energy surplus, an Idaho member of the regional energy council says, and state utility regulators assume if Idaho's hydropower utilities turn to coal for more electricity the plant will be built in Wyoming's Powder River Basin.

"We can no longer count on the luxury of a long-term surplus to postpone the day when we will have to examine new sources of energy," said Northwest Power Planning Council member Jim Goller, who spoke to regional leaders in Boise on Thursday.

"A smaller energy surplus doesn't give a lot of time to energy decision makers who must examine their options and make resource choices," Goller said.

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Earth First! renews logging protest

LONGVIEW, Wash. (AP) — Four Earth First! members protested exports of raw logs Thursday by chaining themselves to the necks of more than six hours to 60-foot cranes aboard a ship at the Port of Longview.

The protesters, wearing hard hats and chained with heavy locks, prevented 50 longshoremen from loading the ship, which is to carry the logs to China.

Around noon, the four men climbed down from their perches after sheriff's deputies sealed the 30-ton cranes and negotiated with them.

They were arrested and led away in handcuffs, but also were given coffee.

One of the protesters freed himself with a key, but the others had to be cut free, said Cowlitz County Sheriff's Lt. Mike Riley.

Sheriff's Lt. Bob Swanson said the four were booked for investigation of interference with an owner's control of property, and held on \$15,000 bail each.

He identified the four as Brian S. Nedweski, Jerry E. Ward Jr., James E. Nauta and Mark R. Lipe, all of Portland.

Ten other Earth First! members handed out news releases at the wharf. They said they chose Thursday, the 48th anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor, because Japan and the United States are now waging war on the environment.

"We wanted to make a point that every time a log gets exported, a job gets exported," said Leslie Strenswear, a Portland member of the environmental group.

Hemstreet said people blame the spotted owl and environmentalists for the loss of jobs.

St. Anthony makes new prison offer

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — The St. Anthony City Council has sent the state another lease proposal to turn the vacant Fremont General Hospital building into a prison work center.

But in approving the new lease proposal Wednesday, the city retains the option of negotiating with others for the facility if the state doesn't become a tenant.

The new proposal was on the agenda for discussion at Friday's Board of Corrections meeting in Boise. Both the Fremont School District and a nursing-home have discussed making a proposal for the building.

The Department of Corrections proposes to convert the structure, which has been vacant for three years, into a work center for 100 minimum-security inmates.

The state plan calls for inmates to spend 4-10 months in the program which will involve manual labor in Targhee National Forest when weather permits, and education programs in the winter.

The lease must be approved by the departments of Corrections and Administration, and the Legislature must approve money for remodeling.

The biggest change in the latest lease proposal deletes a requirement that the city replace the roof before the state moves in.

The council now says the state will get a roof that doesn't leak, and the state can make roof changes as it remodels.

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GOP, Demos meet in Pocatello to address leadership changes

POCATELLO (AP) — Senate Democrats and Republicans, both facing shakeups in the ranks of leadership, will meet in Pocatello this week, a month before the 1990 Legislature convenes.

Idaho's 23 Republican senators will choose an replacement for Majority Leader Roger Fairchild when they meet Friday. Fairchild last month announced his desire to resign from the Senate to run for the GOP nomination for governor probably against Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus.

Senate President Pro Tem Michael Crapo, R-Idaho Falls, said Sen. Mark Ricks, Rexburg, and Sen. Rod Beck, Boise, are the frontrunners to replace Fairchild.

Beck, serving his second term as chairman of the State Affairs Committee and vice chairman of the Finance Committee, Beck chairs the Human Resources Committee and sits on the Finance and Local Government-Taxation committees.

Crapo said since a majority leader does not chair a Senate committee, the election could have a ripple effect on committee leadership.

"All kinds of little shifts are possible," Crapo, who is president pro tem in charge of appointing committee chairmen. "But I don't expect a dramatic reorganization in the Senate."

Sandpoint teacher tops list for House vacancy

SANDPOINT (AP) — A civic leader at Sandpoint High School tops the list of nominees being submitted to Gov. Cecil Andrus to fill the state House seat left vacant by the resignation of Democratic Rep. Tim Tucker of Port Hill.

Democratic leaders in Bonner and Boundary counties have chosen Monica Beaudoin, 37, as their number-one recommendation to replace Tucker, who was appointed by Andrus last month to the state Senate.

Crapo said he doesn't expect the shift in leadership to stall the continuity in committee work.

"A number of strong people can step in and take the reins of leadership. There will be a change, but not an injurious change," he said.

Crapo said the recent resignations of three Senate Democrats leave three seats vulnerable. Republicans hold a 23-19 edge in the Senate and all members are up for re-election in 1990.

"An incumbent has an advantage in an election, and those three seats will not be taken by incumbents. That opens new areas of concern for the Democrats and new opportunities for Republicans," he said.

Also on the panel Andrus will have before him are Bonner Ferry businessiman Orrin Everhart, 52, and Florence Carter, 72, of Sandpoint. Bonner County Planning Commission member Linda Tauber and former Bonner News Digest editor Dick Wolff also campaigned to make the list of nominees.

Beaudoin described herself as a strong advocate for working people, pledging to campaign hard to retain the seat in next fall's election.

John Stocks, Coeur d'Alene; Karen Cooke, Priest River, and Gail Bray, Boise, all recently resigned from the Senate.

Sen. Ralph Lacey, a four-term Democrat from Pocatello, said that while incumbents hold an advantage in an election, he doesn't believe Republican challengers will win the three seats.

"It's very definite we'll have good candidates for those positions," Lacey said.

Democrats will have to choose a new assistant minority leader to replace Mrs. Bray, but Lacey doesn't think that decision will be made in Pocatello on Saturday. He predicted the post will be filled when Democrats meet in Boise next week.

Lawmaker readies schools presentation

MOSCOW (AP) — State Rep. James "Doc" Lucas, R-Moscow, plans to use graphic evidence next month to persuade Idaho lawmakers to spend more money on education or prepare to pay much higher bills for welfare and corrections.

But state budget analysts say circumstances other than education spending have significantly contributed to spiraling welfare and prison costs.

Lucas has prepared a series of 22-by-28-inch charts that show the spending curve for prisons and welfare rising in recent years.

He said Wednesday that intends to present the charts to members of the Legislature's budget-writing Joint Finance Appropriations Committee, on which he serves.

"The same curve, if you could draw it, is going to work for a lot of things," Lucas said. "That's a piece of the pie you're not going to give to education. You're not going to give it to any discretionary fund. It's down the black hole to Calcutta."

Among the statistics he has graphed are:

- Medicaid expenditures jumping sixfold from 1972 to 1986, from \$10 million to \$60 million, and more than doubling to \$130 million since then.
- Corrections spending increasing from \$10 million to \$40 million a year during the 1980s.
- Idaho's prison population growing so fast that another 400 beds will be needed by 1995.

Corrections Director Richard Vernon has said he will need space for 400 additional inmates by mid-1991.

Lucas said those numbers all point to society's failure to motivate young people to succeed, and that includes providing them with the best possible education.

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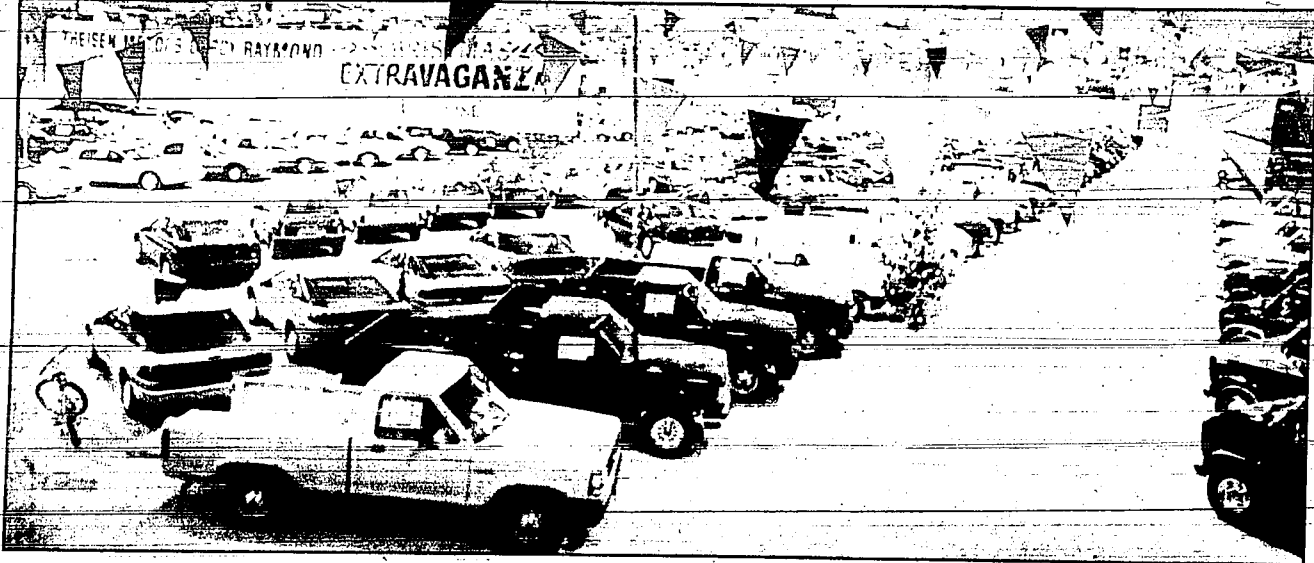

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

Dear Mr. Wolff: There any law that restricts the amount of time taken for each bid by a slow player? We have one player who runs the fun by taking too much time.

It's Madeline's Praxitelle, Ala. ANSWER: At duplicate, each round is timed and the average allowed to bid and play one hand is about eight minutes. At rubber bridge, the laws are not as clear, since no game director is present. However, the Proprietors do include a statement banning any remark or action that "might cause annoyance or embarrassment to another player or might interfere with the enjoyment of the game." Excessively slow bidding and play can certainly be placed under this heading.

Dear Mr. Wolff: East-West, vulnerable vs. non-vulnerable, made a doubled major-suit game with two over-tricks. What's the score?

Debbie with Overtricks, Plymouth, N.C. ANSWER: The trick score is 240 points (120 times 2), the overtrick score is 400 (200 times 2), the rubber bonus is 700, and 50 points are for making a doubled contract. The total: 1390 points plus prior net score.

Dear Mr. Wolff: For slam purposes, how do I evaluate my high cards in a side-suit in which partner's bidding identifies a singleton?

Good and Bad? Heaton, Texas ANSWER: If you hold the ace and no other high cards, it may be a very useful holding. A holding of K-Q, K-Q or K-J-10 does not rate to be as valuable. Better to have no high cards opposite the singleton so that

the high cards you do hold are all "working" cards (helping to solidify partner's suits).

Dear Mr. Wolff: After a one-of-a-kind opening and a one-level major-suit response, I always played a jump to game in the major as showing 20 HCP plus four-card support. Have requirements been lowered at duplicate?

Big Fish, Corpus Christi, Texas ANSWER: Many duplicate players use unusual jumps called splinters (e.g., 1♠-1♦-1♣) to describe very strong raises, with singletons. This allows them to use the direct jump to game in the major for strong balanced hands and the jump to four in the opening minor suit to describe a pre-emptive distributional raise of the major (e.g., ♠-K-Q-7-5, ♠-7, ♠-A-K-J-10-9-7, ♠-6-2).

Dear Mr. Wolff: Partner jumped to three spades after his RHO opened one spade. I was looking at the Q-J-10-8 of spades. What would you have guessed?

Cold Water, Twin Falls, Idaho ANSWER: I would have known my partner and my LHO to answer that one. It's possible that opener psyched and partner has long spades, but that seems farfetched. I would guess that partner is playing a new treatment, asking me to bid three no-trump with spades stopped. (He has a long running minor.) Even if I have guessed wrong, a retreat to four spades by partner cannot be too horrible. Insist on a discussion to agree upon methods before the next deal.

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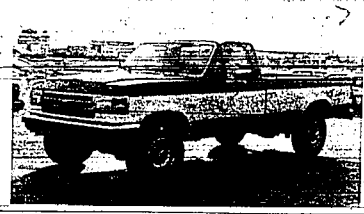

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THE ACES ON BRIDGE

BOBBY WOLFF

"There is always a heavy demand for fresh mediocrity. In every generation the least cultivated taste has the largest appetite."

A mediocre plan will not get today's job done. Hoping for dummy's diamonds to be the main source of tricks is reasonable. However, if cannot hurt to establish a fallback position.

South wins the first heart and counts his winners. He has three major-suit winners, he hopes to develop four diamond winners and he has a sure ace of clubs. Since this totals only eight, it's clear that he must also plan on a club finesse. If he gets this far, he should be on his way to scoring the game. How should he attack in diamonds?

If he passes his jack, East ducks as West starts a high-low signal and the game slips away. Another diamond, another duck, and it's time for the club finesse. This wins, but that's the last of the good news. Neither minor suit can produce, and South is held to seven tricks.

The way to preserve options in both minors is to start with South's diamond jack to dummy's queen. If East wins, the club finesse brings in nine easy winners. So East ducks. South counters with a winning club finesse. Another diamond, another duck, and another club finesse. This time, South can cash his club ace and concede a club, and he has his nine winners.

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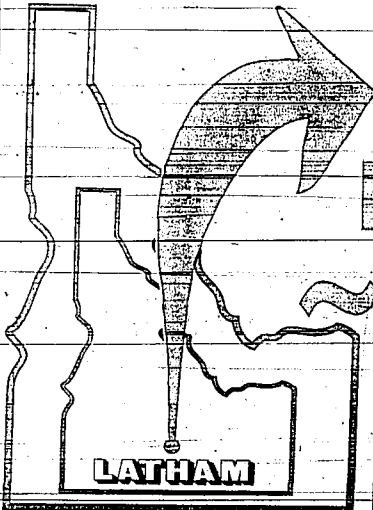

Chorale prepares Christmas concerts

TWIN FALLS — A slight frown crosses Carson Wong's face as he exhorts the chamber orchestra players to refine a passage of Saint-Saens' "Christmas Oratorio."

"Make it sound a little bit more like a sigh," he says. The musicians oblige. Voices blend with the strings and organ to create a sublime seasonal blend. All they need now is an audience.

Ninety-nine members strong this season, the Magic Valley Chorale will present its annual Christmas concerts at 8 p.m. Saturday and 3 p.m. Sunday in Fine Arts Auditorium on the College of Southern Idaho campus.

Wong, who has directed the ensemble for 10 years, says most of its members come from the community although about 10 are College of Southern Idaho students participating in the Chorale for academic credit.

The group has had as few as 60 people, and as many as 120 singers in past years. In addition to this weekend's performances,

Wong says the Chorale plans an April concert that will focus on patriotic music in celebration of Idaho's Centennial.

For its holiday offering, the Chorale plans to perform two works by contemporary composer and arranger John Rutter; a Briton who Wong says ranks among the most popular choral composers.

The Chorale will be joined by a brass ensemble for Rutter's "Gloria." The group also will perform the composer's arrangement of "Joy to the World," a selection of sacred carols and hymns including such familiar songs as "O Come, All Ye Faithful," "Silent Night," "How Great Our Joy" and "Rise Up, Shepherd and Follow."

Phyllis Van Nest and the Magic Valley Chamber Orchestra will accompany the Chorale on the "Hallelujah Chorus" from "The Messiah" by Handel and "Christmas Oratorio" by Saint-Saens. Soloists for the "Oratorio" will be Carol Barness, soprano; Linda Stevenson, mezzo-soprano; Lori Van Rinsum, alto; Jack Van Buren, tenor; and Roger Vincent, bass.

The featured singers are among the oldest and newest members of the Chorale.

Vincent, for example, founded the Chorale in 1973 and directed it for five years. The Filer resident says he saw a need for a group to perform classical vocal music in Magic Valley—and believes that need still exists.

In years gone by, Vincent says, churches often performed vocal masterworks. But congregations' tastes, he adds, have turned toward more contemporary music, so it is

largely up to the Chorale to expose younger listeners to oratorios and serious religious music.

Vincent — also a founder of the Diletantes — spent seven years touring the nation on the Community Concerts circuit as a member of a male quartet. In addition, he has soloed three times with the Boise Philharmonic and has appeared with the Rockford (Ill.) Choral Society.

Barness, the soprano soloist, has been a Chorale member "off and on" for the past

10 years. Also a resident of Filer, she has performed with Northwest Opera and took the role of the mother in the association's 1988 production of "Amahl and the Night Visitors."

Van Rinsum, alto, is soloing with the Chorale for the first time. She moved to Twin Falls a year-and-a-half ago from Kalispell, Mont., and was seen in this year's Diletantes production of "The King and I," in which she played Lady Tiang.

Syndex ruling will curb cable program duplication

TWIN FALLS — It's official. Syndex is on the way.

Syndex is shorthand for a Federal Communications Commission ruling called Syndicated Exclusivity that will go into effect Jan. 1. The policy deals not just with syndicated programming, but with network shows, and it means much of what is now available on out-of-town network affiliates must soon be blacked out by the nation's cable operators.

Currently, King Videocable is required to black-out programming that airs on Boise's KBCI (channel 17 for King subscribers) or Salt Lake City's KSL (cable channel 23) when the show is airing on local CBS affiliate KMVT at exactly the same time.

Syndex expands the non-duplication policy by permitting local broadcasters to re-

quest a blackout of any programming that airs from one day before to seven days following its showing on the local affiliate.

For example, under the current regulations, King Videocable has been able to air the CBS Morning News starting at 5:30 a.m. on KSL and 6:30 a.m. on KMVT. Under the new regulations, King will have to intercept KSL's signal.

Both KMVT and KKVJ, the local ABC affiliate, have requested this protection. Both stations also requested protection of syndicated shows to which they have exclusive rights in the Twin Falls market.

Syndex applies only if the local affiliates ask for the protection. "But from that point on, it's out of our hands," says Vincent Thompson, general manager of King Videocable in Twin Falls.

As a result, all but a few hours of shows now airing on KSL, KBCI and KIVI (the ABC affiliate in Boise — channel 6 for

King subscribers) will be blacked out. The accompanying chart lists the programs that will be affected. The schedule may vary from week to week, mostly due to seasonal changes in sporting event coverage.

"People are not really losing programming because of this," says Thompson. Viewers who are used to watching a favorite show on KSL, KBCI or KIVI will still be able to see those programs, albeit probably on a different station at a different time.

Syndex was challenged by the National Cable Television Association, but the District of Columbia court of appeals upheld the ruling last month. Thompson says King Videocable is employing several areas to alert customers to changes the ruling will prompt.

King plans to insert an explanation of Syndex in its January billing. The cable

company has also started airing advertisements on ESPN, CNN, TBN and USA networks telling more about the ruling. In addition, Thompson says he has mailed letters about Syndex to local government officials.

When KSL and KBCI are blacked out, they will be replaced with a black screen bearing a message, probably explaining Syndex and KIVI, on the other hand, will be replaced by KKVJ's signal.

The protection accorded by Syndex has been sought by local broadcasters ever since the advent of cable television and its power to import distant signals.

Through Syndex, local affiliates will be able to protect their exclusive rights to programs and, consequently, guarantee advertisers an audience for those programs in any given market.

Chapman's blazing debut was hard act to follow in 1989

Unlike Tracy Chapman last year, no pop newcomer made the cover of Rolling Stone magazine in 1989. That is not unusual, however, because few debut artists during the last 20 years have had the widespread and immediate impact of the socially conscious singer-songwriter, whose debut album sold more than 6 million copies. Only about a dozen artists, in fact, have ever graced the cover of rock's most-celebrated journal within 12 months of the release of their debut albums. It is as hard to predict long-range commercial success as continued critical impact.

album that "seemed to appeal the most to the public. The danger, however, is that the sound, which soon grew tired of the sound. With critically admired artists, the problem is often a loss of inspiration or fresh ideas. Still, the best barometer in evaluating new talent is creative energy—an elusive mixture of originality, craft, passion and ambition that is summed up by a favorite word of critics: vision. The following artists demonstrated enough of that individualism and promise to distinguish themselves from the hundreds of others who make their debuts this year. Although some of the selections had earlier releases on small, independent labels, they are considered part of the Class of '89 because they all made their major-label debuts during the last 12 months. The artists include:

Neneh Cherry's "Raw Like Sushi" (Virgin) — Some readers got upset last summer when the Los Angeles Times entertainment section proclaimed this international woman of pop (she was born in Stockholm, raised in New York City and now resides in London). "The Jon Mitchell of pop," most certainly, Cherry's music—with its percolating synthesizer pulse and streetwise swagger—is far from the graceful poetry and generally polite folk trappings associated with most contemporary pop. Claimed work, but there is a thoughtfulness and challenge to much of Cherry's music that makes the comparison valid. Cherry may sing about bits of the Mall rather than Ladies of the Canyon, but she deals with relationships and sexual stereotypes with insight and imagination.

Lenny Kravitz's "Let Love Rule" (Virgin) — In a frustrating yet seductive debut, Kravitz sounds so adult in obvious influences (especially the sparse, confessional compositions of John Lennon's most intimate works) that you wonder why someone didn't keep him in the studio a bit longer to give him time to find more of his own voice. Kravitz sounds very young on the album, closer to the formative 21 than his actual 25 — an age at which Springsteen gave us "Born to Run" and Lennon was already heading down Highway 67. If all this raises questions about his future, Kravitz's intensity and desire demand your further attention.

N.W.A.'s "Straight Outta Compton" (Ruthless/Priority) — If any newcomer deserved the cover of Rolling Stone in 1989, it was this Los Angeles rap outfit. Like a fist in society's face, this tenacious, incendiary look at Southern California gang attitudes is violent and unsettling — outrageous in its blatant refusal to condemn the behavior that is tearing communities apart, riveting in its portrayal of the anger and aggression of those gang members. The language is wildly offensive and the images are terrifying, but it still gained enough of a following to sell nearly a million copies. The album, which hits home with the urgency of an award-winning documentary crew, not only raises questions about gang attitudes, but the allowable limits—and responsibilities—of pop artists.

Tom Lone's "Loc-Ed After-Dark" (Delicious/Vinyl) — The real star here may prove to be producer/rangers Matt Dike and Michael Ross (Dike's 1989 credits also include producing the second Beastie Boys album) or words-man Young M.C. (who contributed to the raps for "Funky Cold Medina" and "Wild Thing"), but Lone carries the whole thing off with the humorous lover-boy persona of Reggie Van Gown. Alternative: Young M.C.'s own album, "Stone Cold Rhymin'."

45s will soon be seen only in movies

That stack of 45s near your stereo will, from this time forth, do nothing more than date you. The 45 single — that plastic disc of pleasure, memory and lots of great rock 'n' roll, the one-time currency of 20 years — has had its much quicker than anyone imagined. The 7-inch, 45-rpm single, with its ungainly 1-inch hole, is disappearing from the music scene after having marked its golden anniversary. Its replacement? The cassette single, which almost nobody calls by its industrial moniker "cassingle," but just about everybody who still buys singles seems to prefer. Introduced just seven years ago with "Vacation" by the Go-Gos (and initially not well received), cassette versions of some new singles now outsell the vinyl versions 10 to 1, companies say. The number of cassette singles shipped were up an astounding 30 percent during the first half of 1989, compared with the same period last year, according to figures recently released by the Recording Industry Association of America. The number of 45s shipped from January on line was down nearly 40 percent by comparison.

And that was all before a number of midsummer boosts for the cassette single: • In August, "Me Myself and I" by De La Soul and Whistle's "Right Next To Me" were the first two songs on Billboard's Hot 100 charts not available on 7-inch vinyl; they were released on 12-inch vinyl and cassette. • Capitol Records started releasing new singles by Jon Butcher, by Squier and Crowded House on cassette single only. It also ceased production of oldie 45s with the exception of 10-Beats songs—Meanwhile, it released on cassette a number of oldies from Neil Diamond, Gene Vincent and the Knack, among others. • Warner Bros., the largest record conglomerate, announced it will phase out 45s in 1990, perhaps as soon as Jan. 1. • Columbia also set different retail policies for record stores that would encourage more sales of cassette singles over remaining 45 singles. • By late summer, major labels stopped sending 45s to radio stations; by far stations prefer the singles on compact disc for its increased fidelity and resistance to scratches. • Record companies say they will continue making 7-inch 45s for jukeboxes if nothing else. But compact disc jukeboxes are reported to be so much in demand that the days of the 45 rpm jukebox seem numbered as well. • And perhaps the last nail in the coffin: "Listen to Your Heart" by Coffey recently became the first No. 1 single on the Billboard charts available only as a cassette.

Go to your neighborhood record store and you will find an increasing number of empty slots in the Billboard-based Hot 100 shelving system. And not because No. 23 or whatever is sold out. Instead, there is usually a little card informing consumers that No. 23 is not available as a 45. More telling, many stores have built new shelves to accommodate the cassette singles by chart position. Because of 45s gained its popularity about the same time as the dawn of rock 'n' roll, it has been synonymous with what Casey Kasem would call the "rock 'n' roll era." The 45 itself was once a new format that, 50 years ago, began to challenge the then-dominant 78 rpm disc. RCA came out with the 45 to compete with Columbia Records' newly announced 33 rpm records. The original 45 was much like the disc we are all familiar with: 7 inches round, with the 1-inch hole in the center. Sure it looked funny, RCA really expects the best."

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Wendell's Sites joins movement to support Western music

WENDELL — Singing cowboys of the nation are concerned that the Country side of Country-Western music seems to be taking over.

But these minstrels of the range don't aim to let that happen. They say most of today's Country songs center on the love lives of urban dwellers, while Western songs about ridin' down the canyon to watch the sun go down are collect-

ing dust in the radio station archives. Cowboy singer Ernie Sites of Wendell said he and other Western musicians have banded together to promote a rebirth of Western music. "This is the music of the Western land and of those who work and live on it," he said. "It is particularly true not exclusively the music of the cowboy, music that was born in the 1800s and reached its peak in the early days of radio and television."

But songs about the beauty of the American West, led away as Gene Autry and the boys rode off into the sunset and people lost touch with the land.

"We want to bring back heroes for our children, heroes who wear white hats and say 'Thank you,'" Sites explained. "We want to promote Western music so that when you turn on the TV or the radio, these songs will still be there and have a place in society for us, for you and I and for our children."

Sites recently participated in the First Annual Western Music Festival in Tucson, Ariz. The Sons of the Pioneers, Rex Allen Sr., Patsy Montana and Riders in the Sky were a few of more than 60 western groups and individuals who took the stage at the mid-November festival.

Muzza Bram and the Little Brown Brothers also performed. With songs about stars, guitars, blue prairies, cattle roundups and wild horses, these entertainers are keeping the spirit of the old west alive, Sites said. "I'm sold on Western music," he added. "Kids need to hear this stuff.

It's very positive and uplifting. It brings you to life."

"Since it was incorporated as a non-profit organization in March, the Western Music Association has grown rapidly to about 300 members, with an audience of more than 7,500 at the November festival, WMA President Tom Chambers said in a telephone interview.

"We realized there is still a great demand for Western music, as opposed to Country," Chambers said, explaining why he, Rex Allen Sr. and Roy Kraft organized the WMA. "It represents an idealistic morality and attitude toward conservation, the land, nature, God. All of that ties into one. I think it's just wholesome American."

The WMA advisory board includes such greats as Dale Evans, Roy Rogers, Michael Martin Murphy, Gene Autry and Chris LeDoux.

Chambers said the association is planning to make a roster of its best performing members and send them as a group to tour the United States and, eventually, take the music abroad. He noted that Sites is likely to be invited to join this "prestigious" group because, at the festival, he emerged as one of the most popular artists. "We're very much behind what Ernie does."

With live performances across the country, the WMA hopes to recreate a public demand for Western music. Then, Chambers said, "It's a natural progression that we'll again start hearing Western songs on the top 40 radio."

The WMA is looking for supporting members and also for new musicians or songwriters who can specialize in this distinctive Western art form.

"There's an awful lot of talent out there that we have yet to uncover," Chambers said.

Those who want more information can write to the WMA at 5601 N. Hacienda del Sol Road, Tucson, Ariz., 85718. Like the cowboy poetry movement, Western music is starting to

gather a strong following, Chambers said.

"I think we're kissing cousins, to say the least," he said. "We include cowboy poetry at our events, as do all of the poetry gatherings including some Western music."

In Idaho, Sites plans to promote his own Western recordings, "Cowboy Classics" and "Rage of the Sage," by performing as much as possible. Sites and The Snake River Wranglers will sing cowboy ballads old and new at 7:30 p.m. Dec. 15 at the Ace Theater in Wendell. They also plan recitals of poetry and humorous stories of the west.

"When I entertain at the Idaho Rocky Mountain Ranch (near Stanley), I meet a lot of people from all over the U.S. and various places of the world," Sites said. "And they recognize the Western music. Some of them don't know it, but there's none of them that don't love it. They come away with a deep feeling of appreciation for the words and the feeling that they get inside."

The American West, he said, has always been a symbol of the best America has to offer: freedom of spirit and the endless scenic majesty of plains, prairies and mountains. And the stucco-shooting, fall-in-the-saddle image of the cowboy embodies the very essence of the American spirit and integrity.

Sites says he hopes to help preserve and promote the music of this unique and important heritage. He wants to introduce new generations to the Roy Rogers' style of good, clean living, and give people songs for everyone to sing.

Reciting some of his own poetry, Sites said,

"I'm an Idaho boy and I take a lot of joy in watching the old sun set. On the desert plains or the Sawtooth range. It's something that you don't forget."

Special aims to reinforce belief in Santa Claus

NEW YORK (AP) — It is a solemn moment in the show, "Hodding Carter III, a top official during the Carter administration, is puzzled why the Pentagon, the State Department and the White House won't comment on Santa Claus."

But then, the show, anchored and narrated by former NBC correspondent Jack Perkins, is about Santa Claus, a syndicated one-hour special called "There Really is a Santa Claus." Airing on various nights this month on stations in 123 cities, it's a light-hearted "documentary" about various facets of the man in the red suit and white whiskers, all of it an effort to prove he exists.

Celebrities like Edward James Olmos, Mickey Mantle and Loretha Lynn are participants, as are men of learning, one of whom believes in the possibility of flying reindeer.

Even police in Fairbanks, Alaska, get in the act. One, responding to a call, asks a homeowner, deadpan: "He actually was on your roof, or a sleigh?"

And, of course, kids periodically get a say in all this. The men of learning include, a Dartmouth University professor, John Rassias, a Santa Claus expert, and a Santa's helper, Dr. Carl Anderson, a psychologist who wrote his University of Texas dissertation on Santa Claus.

The reason he did that, Anderson explains, is that "I was struck by the intensity of the children's belief and the joy and excitement that they experienced when they visited Santa."

Conceived and produced by David Lowe Jr., a former "60 Minutes" staffer, the show examines the matter of Santa—from all angles—his origins, his flying reindeer, how he knows if you've been naughty or nice, and so forth.

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In a section dealing with how Christmas toys get to be fortunate kids, it also slips in a gentle plug for the Marine Corps Reserve's Toys-for-Tots campaign, founded 42 years ago by retired reserve Col. Williams Hendricks.

The show has its faults, mainly that it gets a bit too cutesy now and then. But on balance it's a pretty good holiday special, particularly for folks who may find watching reassuring in a world that sometimes seems populated by Grinchies.

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Traditional holiday specials shine despite commercialization

"It's a Wonderful Life," on PBS. The perennial yuletide movie with Jimmy Stewart discovering his place in life during the holidays has popped up already here and there this season, but is getting this airing during PBS pledge drives.

The other holiday film fixture, "A Miracle on 34th Street" (the 1947 original with Edmund Gwenn, Maureen O'Hara and Natalie Wood) may also be found in numerous airings, but is scheduled in a colorized version Dec. 17 on the

TBS basic cable service. In addition, a not-to-be-remade from 1973, with David Hartman, Suzanne Davidson and Sebastian Cabot, is on the USA Network the same day.

"How the Grinch Stole Christmas," scheduled Dec. 9 on the TNT cable channel. The Dr. Seuss tale is a fairly sharp satire on the commercialization of the holiday.

"The Christmas Wife," on the HBO premium cable service Dec. 13. The original drama premiered last year and is a fine character study of loneliness intensified and eased by the holidays, with Jason Robards as a widower who hires a shy woman to spend Christmas with him.

"Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer," Dec. 15 on CBS. He had a very shiny nose, you recall, and Rudolph's narration of the song written by Johnny Marks has made this animated special a holiday regular since its first airing in 1977.

"I Love Lucy Christmas Special," Dec. 18 on CBS. This one is irresistible. The network promises a recently "discovered" episode of the beloved series that was never included in rerun syndication packages and has not been aired intact since Dec. 24, 1956.

Containing flashbacks to previous Christmas episodes, the show is said to feature Lucy, Ricky, Ethel and

late Jimmy Durante, originally aired in 1959.

"A Christmas Carol," Christmas Eve on CBS. First aired in 1984, this is the version of Dickens classic in which George C. Scott became the quintessential Scrooge.

"Peanuts" comic strip characters, the show first aired in 1965 and is entertaining modern youngsters just as easily as it did then.

CBS is also following the airing with "Frosty the Snowman," another animated entry with narration by the

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late Jimmy Durante, originally aired in 1969.

But to be fair, there are some seasonal shows on TV in the coming weeks that have earned status as holiday classics or otherwise seem worthy of watching. From the annual "A Charlie Brown Christmas" to any of a number of versions of Charles Dickens' great "A Christmas Carol."

In chronological order as currently available, here are some of the season's treats. "The Frugal Gourmet: A Colonial Christmas," on PBS. Produced in the Governor's Palace at Colonial Williamsburg (Va.), the cooking show with Jeff Smith features traditional holiday fare, such as spit-roasted turkey and lamb and maple-syrup candy cooled in snow.

"Evening At Pops," also on PBS. Among a number of musical specials, this one seems most representative, with the Boston Pops Orchestra in concert with the Vienna Choir-Boys and the Tanglewood Festival Chorus.

Other musical interludes that sound worth a listen include "A Dancer, Paul and Mary Holiday Concert" from New York's Lehman Center (on PBS), "Julie Andrews: The Sound of Christmas" on ABC Dec. 13, and "Christmas at Kings," a live Christmas Eve special on PBS stations from England's King's

Old classic songs always come home for Christmas season

ALBANY, N.Y. — The tinsel is on the tree, the egg nog is poured and the yule log aglow. All you need is something on the stereo to complete that holiday mood.

There's always Bing Crosby's time-honored croon of "White Christmas," Nat King Cole's voice remains forever strong on "The Christmas Song," Elvis Presley's "Blue Christmas" still tugs at hearts.

If you're thinking they don't make them like they used to, you're right.

"It's been a long time since something's come along that's become a classic," said Joel Whitburn, whose Milwaukee-based Record Research Inc. monitors what's hot and what's not in the music world.

Money pressures and the daunting prospect of competing with still-popular standards from decades, even centuries, ago mean that few artists even try to write new holiday standards today.

"If you're going to write a whole bunch of new Christmas carols, who cares?" said Nebraska-based composer Chip Davis.

Davis, who records as a one-man band under the name Mannheim Steamroller, is responsible for one of the few holiday music success stories of the 1980s. He records instrumental "New Age" versions of Christmas classics specifically designed for compact disc players.

With record companies releasing classics by Crosby, the Carpenters, Johnny Mathis and Phil

Spector every year, it may be a surprise to learn that Davis' 1984 release, "Mannheim Steamroller Christmas," and his 1988 recording, "A Fresh Aire Christmas," were the top two selling holiday albums last year.

It was for Davis.

"I didn't really expect it to do anything because that was just a known thing that this sort of junk just croaks," said Davis, who was advised against recording holiday songs, of how Christmas music fares in the marketplace.

"Christmas albums were pretty much considered death in the industry," Davis said. "If you did a Christmas album, it was like signing off."

The Mannheim Steamroller records wed the old and new in a combination perfect for listeners too old for rock 'n' roll novelty records and too young for Lawrence Welk.

Orechestras, synthesizers and electric guitars are used in instrumental versions of classics and a few new compositions.

Davis' records, along with George Winston's "December" album on Westbound III Records, are expected to be hot sellers again this year.

"It has broad appeal," said Geoff Mayfield, associate research director for Billboard magazine. "If you like traditional Christmas music, that's what it's about, but it's presented in a new way. People with gray hair can like it. And if you're a kid you can sit through it, and it doesn't have to sound like Mitch Miller."

Holiday records have always been a strange stepchild of the music

industry. Artists compete during a compressed time period to sell music to be heard in the background at a few parties then tossed into closets for 11 months.

This kind of high-risk, low-return work makes many songwriters run in the other direction, Davis said. "You get stepped on," he said.

"They're probably some of the most difficult types of songs to write and have catch on because there's such an established litany of old material that people are fond of," said David Melles, artists and repertoire coordinator for Rhino Records.

The all-time champ of the modern era is Irving Berlin's composition of "White Christmas," heard first in the 1954 movie "Holiday Inn." The song has sold in excess of 100 million copies, with Crosby's version accounting for about 30 million, Whitburn said.

The Christmas song that's sold the most copies since 1955 is a little less revered — it's the novelty record "The Chipmunk Song," first released in 1958, Whitburn said.

Most of the Christmas records that are played repeatedly on the radio these days date from the 1955-65 decade. They include "Jingle Bell Rock," "Silver Bells," "The Little Drummer Boy," "Please Come Home for Christmas," "The Christmas Song" and "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree."

In fact, of the Top 10 best-selling Christmas songs for what Billboard magazine defines as the "rock era" (1954 and after), only one is from after 1970. That's the barked version

of "Jingle Bells" by the Singing Dogs.

The only new song of the 1980s to show any staying power is Elmo and Patsy's warped "Grandma Got Run Over by a Reindeer" from 1983. The jury's still out on "Do They Know It's Christmas—the Band Aid song that launched the rock 'n' roll philanthropy trend of the 1980s.

Mannheim Steamroller and other "New Age" records will face stiff competition this year from teenage chartbusters New Kids on the Block.

They've released a Christmas album with several new compositions by their behind-the-scenes guru, Maurice Starr, and yes, another version of "White Christmas." It already achieved the relatively rare feat of appearing on Billboard's top album — not Christmas album — chart in October.

Other artists planning new Christmas records this year are Kenny Rogers, Randy Travis, Wynnton Marsalis, Ricky Van Shelton, Leon Redbone and Roger Whittaker.

Some record companies are hoping creative approaches to packaging will gain them a niche in the Christmas market. Motown Records is releasing a collection of songs from many of its artists, including Smokey Robinson and the Temptations. TVT Records is presenting a sampling of Christmas songs sung by soap opera stars.

Rhino Records, known for its aggressive repackaging, will present "Bummed Out Christmas," a collection for Christmas cynics featuring such songs as "Santa Came

Home Drunk," "Christmas in Prison" and "Somebody Stole My Santa Claus Suit."

Rhino's collectibles also feature "Hillbilly Holiday," "Cool Yule" and albums by Dr. Demento, Spike Jones, James Brown and the Three Stooges.

Rhino is not neglecting new material; it's releasing a collection of new recordings by Dr. John, Nicolette Larson and the Roches. But McLees said there's not much of a market out there anymore for new Christmas songs.

"It has to be a great song to break through and come back every Christmas," he said.

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Horowitz always a hero to trusted piano technician

NEW YORK (AP) — If a man can't be a hero to his valet, can a pianist be a hero to the technician who tunes his piano?

Yes, both a hero and a friend, says Franz Mohr about the late Vladimir Horowitz.

Mohr, chief concert technician at Steinway & Sons, accompanied the pianist to performances that included his heraldic comeback at Carnegie Hall in 1965, his 1986 Moscow concert and two appearances at the White House.

In his last season, Horowitz, four days before he died, during a Wednesday session for a new recording at Horowitz's Manhattan home. When Mohr arrived Friday for another session, he was told that Horowitz had practiced for half an hour but didn't feel well. The pianist died suddenly Nov. 5 while discussing with his wife, Wanda, a menu for that night's dinner to which they had invited pianist Murray Perahia.

Horowitz was in a class of himself," Mohr said. "He had tremendous command when it comes to technique. Many young artists have technique today, too. But nobody has such a wide range of color like Horowitz. He had from super-pianissimo to a super-pianissimo so soft it hardly exists. When he played his last European tour, in 1987, he played Liszt's "Consolation" with such command it made

you cry.

"He played dangerously in a way, in his phrasing and his tempos, almost many times to the breaking point but never over it. He had such clarity. In fast passages you heard every note. Many pianists smear-through. Even now, at 86... he was tremendous. Listen to his last recording, "Horowitz at Home," Unbelievable."

They were friends, too, Mohr said. "Many times I'm invited for dinner after a concert. We had the Horowitzes for dinner at our home. They appreciated my family very much. I have two boys in the piano business, in leading positions I would say. My daughter is getting married in February. Wanda said they would come."

"We were the best critic for him. He listened to her. She is profound and knows music. My wife and I love her, too."

Horowitz's own piano, a wedding gift when he married Wanda Tescanini, in 1933... was moved from his home to the basement of the Steinway showroom three years ago. His last recording was done on a new piano from Steinway.

Generating to Horowitz's piano, which he always took with him on tours, Mohr said: "He was planning to take this piano again on tour. I prepared it for him. He was coming in this week to look at it. He said

soon he would play in Berlin, Hamburg and Amsterdam, maybe London."

Asked whether Horowitz was even-tempered or volatile, Mohr said: "I would say that being such a genius, as he really was, a man of his caliber would change emotionally hour by hour. You see it in his playing. He never played the same piece the same way."

"Of course he could blow up or get excited on the spur of a moment that some little thing is not just right. That can happen but it's understandable."

"For a technician, he was very easy to work with, because he was consistent in what he did. He always had his rehearsal at 4 p.m. Saturday and his concert at 4 Sunday. He never practiced the day of the concert. He said if he didn't know the piece the day before, he shouldn't play it."

Mohr has traveled with pianists, some of them famous, who played every day, on whatever piano was available and often practiced so close to the time of the concert that he had no time to prepare the piano.

"Tuning is extremely important," he said. "An action has more than 10,000 parts, consisting of wood and felt, therefore subject to changes in humidity. You have constantly to check the regulation of the instrument, especially a pi-

ano which travels. In Russia I had two sets of tools with me, plus quite a few parts, like strings."

Mohr is nervous only for the first few bars. Then, when he hears the piano sounding all right, he relaxes and enjoys the music.

He started his music career in performance, studying violin in his native Germany. "I had problems with my left wrist. I came to the painful conclusion I couldn't pursue a musical career. I was already 22 when I went into this (tuning) I worked my way through the factory. Some technicians shrink from contact with musicians but Mohr relishes it."

Steinway moved him to New York in 1962. "My predecessor was Bill Hurter. He was legendary. He had traveled all his life with Rachmaninoff. When he retired, I took over as chief concert technician."

Mohr recalled one Horowitz incident with a smile: "He made me pretty famous. When he played in Berlin, it was a tremendous success. I came home on Monday. He called me. "You have to come back. I play a second concert. He said to the press in Berlin, 'If Franz doesn't come back, there won't be any second concert.' It ended up on TV and all of that."

'Gone with the Wind' plagiarized

PARIS (AP) — Novelist Regine Deforges plagiarized the classic "Gone with the Wind" for her best-seller "The Blue Bicycle," a court ruled Wednesday.

The publisher to pay Margaret Mitchell's heirs \$333,000 in damages and interest.

The American Trust Co. Bank, which holds the film rights to "Gone with the Wind" had sought \$833,000 from Ms. Deforges and her publisher, Editions Ramsay.

Ramsay President Frank Spengler said the company and Ms. Deforges would appeal the ruling issued in West Germany and unavailable for comment, he said.

"We feel we're innocent," Spengler said in an interview.

The books are both great novels but they are very different, and so are their heroines. By nature, Lea is an optimist, and Scarlett is more Anglo-Saxon, hard-driving, determined and power-hungry.

Lea's story is this way: "The Blue Bicycle" is a historical novel smattered with psychology and emotion while "Gone With the Wind" is a psychological novel cloaked with history," he said.

In a judgment issued by Judge Nicole Antoine, the court concluded "The Blue Bicycle" constituted an "illicit reproduction" of "Gone with the Wind."

"Based on a comparative study of the two works, it is clear that what Regine Deforges borrowed from Margaret Mitchell's work and incorporated into "The Blue Bicycle" is perfectly identifiable and rises to the most important elements of Mitchell's novel," the statement said.

The court said Deforges copied the "general intrigue, plot development and narrative progression, the physical and psychological characteristics of the major figures, the relationships between the characters, several secondary characters, a large number of characteristic situations, the explicit and the expansion of numerous scenes and key dramatic

moments" of "Gone with the Wind."

There are similarities. "The Blue Bicycle," which has sold millions of copies since it was published in 1983 as the first part of a trilogy, set during the Nazi occupation of France.

Its heroine, Lea Dolmas, is the beautiful, headstrong daughter of a southern winter. Like Scarlett O'Hara, her carefree youth is interrupted by the horrors of war.

The opening scenes of garden parties, pretty dresses and breathless suitors are reminiscent of the American South. And France, like the United States in the Civil War, is divided: "Pro-Vichy Petainists condemn Charles de Gaulle's freedom fighters. Collaborators and militia men hunt down Jews and resistance."

Lea slides with the underground, roaming the Bordeaux countryside on her blue bicycle carrying secret messages.

Like Scarlett, Lea wants the one man she cannot have, Laurent d'Artilat but married the sweet, fragile and morally upright Camille, who bears an uncanny resemblance

to Melanie.

Deforges' French-style Rhett Butler — Francois Tavernier — is a swarthy, cigar-smoking rogue who miraculously turns up whenever Lea needs him.

The case has been long and complicated because there are few precedents. French law forbids plagiarism, but it does allow pastiche, a centuries-old literary term defined as a "humorous" take-off or remake of a recognizable original text.

Mitchell's heirs saw nothing funny about "The Blue Bicycle," despite Ms. Deforges repeated assertions that her novel was meant as a pastiche.

"I know what plagiarism is and it's a very bad thing," Deforges said when the case went to court two years ago. "From the beginning 'The Blue Bicycle' was intended to be a pastiche. I never said it was supposed to be anything else."

The court rejected her argument, saying the differences between the two works were "undeniably secondary and inoperative given the extent of their similarities."

Rights to films change hands

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS has bought rights to the summer blockbuster hit, "Batman," and Ted Turner's cable company has bought rights to 1,000 films from Columbia Pictures Television, CBS and Turner officials said.

The officials wouldn't disclose the purchase prices, but Susan Tick, a spokeswoman for CBS in Los Angeles, characterized as "just silly" an report that said CBS paid up to \$20 million for "Batman."

She said she didn't know when CBS will air the film. One executive who asked not to be identified said the network probably won't broadcast the film until 1992.

The cable rights purchase by Turner's year-old Turner Network Television cable channel and TBS, the network's oldest, is for films dating from 1935 to 1983.

They range from "Tootsie" to "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington." The majority of the films will air on TNT.

Rights to show the films begin in January and extend through May 1999.

Turner's film library already includes the pre-1986 MGM and pre-1950 Warner Brothers films and a number of RKO titles.

In a statement, Turner Broadcasting System, which owns TNT and TBS, said the Columbia purchases represent the largest movie package ever licensed from a single Hollywood studio in the history of basic cable.

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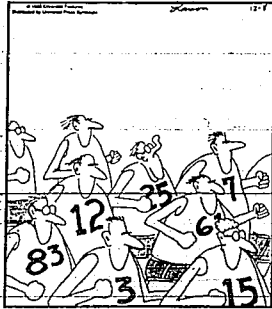
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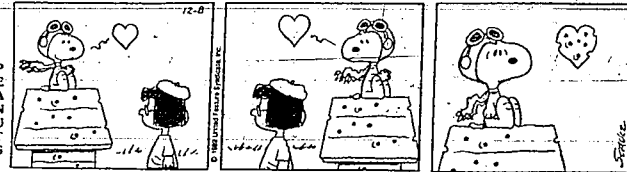

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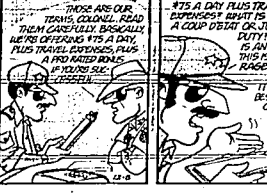
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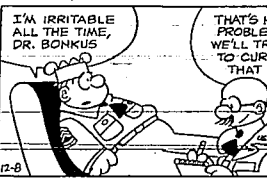
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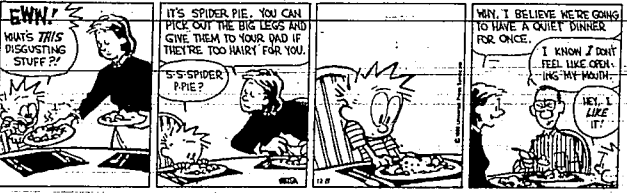
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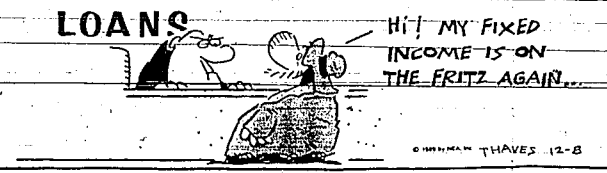
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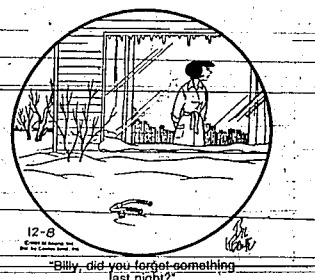
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Griswolds go on 'Vacation' again in split-level holiday comedy

HOLLYWOOD — John Hughes, Hollywood's resident humorist of the terrors beneath suburban's halcyon surfaces, has at them again in the somewhat funny, sometimes tasteless "National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation."

Hughes' typical all-American family of previous Vacations, the Griswolds — headed by Clark (Chevy Chase) and Ellen (Beverly D'Angelo) — have only to hunt for Christmas trees or settle down to dinner for something awful to

happen. The Christmas turkey dries up. Thousands of house lights explode and sets Grandpa (William Hickey) on fire.

Every ladder Clark climbs up collapses. Every yuletide decoration clunks him on the head. Hordes of relatives keep pouring through the door, a parade of undesirables that includes lusher, adde-brains and a matriarch (Mae Questel) who ties up her cat in Christmas packages and humbles into the Pledge of Allegiance when called on to say Grace. Worst of all is the sudden arrival of Clark's belching bucko of a country cousin, indigent Eddie (Randy Quaid), who shows up in an RV with a full chemical toilet and plops himself and his family of four down for the duration, leaving and handing over his gift list.

This hideous vision of a suburban Christmas gone totally amok is, syntipally of Hughes, encased in a sentimental overview — like a Norman Rockwell portrait with a punk rock backbeat, and spidery nibbling through the frame.

In Hughes' movies, the teen-agers are usually realists, even when they are romantics, and their parents are usually crazy — maybe because they would rather be teen-agers. But, here, Chase's Clark is a mixture: a crazy romantic. There's such a fiery obsessiveness behind his desire,

constantly thwarted, to construct the ideal Christmas that, in a way, he's like Terry O'Quinn's homicidal dad in the "Stepfather" movies. Hughes and director Jeremiah Chechik, must know this; they deliberately mix up horror movies and sentimental family comedies in their imagery.

Chase has not been on a roll lately, and to say that in "National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation" he is funnier than in his last six movies combined may sound like high praise, until you remember those six movies. "Caddyshack II" alone almost throws them into the "minuscule" laugh range. But here, he does what he does best: fit-out slapstick and subversive tear-downs of his own smooth image. This sweet, goofball, manic middle-class dandy brings out his sharpest reflexes and gets good support from D'Angelo, the bulging-eyed slab-in-excessus Quaid, and from Questel and Hickey as his dotiest relatives.

Chechik, making his feature debut is a TV commercial-music video specialist; he's done the glibly-romantic "Night belongs to Michelob" spots. And the incongruous elegance of his style — the grandiose frames, loaded with squeaky-clean suburban iconography — makes a good setting for Hughes' flautulent grotesques.

On the cross side there is some failed "Fish Called Wanda" style

vicious animal slopstick, the usual loose multisketch Hughes construction and sophomoric badinage and so much bathroom-level humor that it is no surprise when the sewer flows sky high.

That is the oddest thing about Hughes' satiric slant on suburbia: his

commingled desire to celebrate it and blow it up. Throughout the film, there is a suggestion that Clark wants desperately to be free of his family, like the children's swingers next door — which may be why those two are the most horrifically abused people in the entire movie.

'Dad' deals frankly with growing old

DAD (PG), "Dad" wants desperately to deal frankly with that part of old age that every one of us fears: intrusive medical procedures, pitiless physicians, loss of our abilities and our very functions, the encroachment of real or imagined terrors. The fact that all these terrors are mirrored in Jack Lemmon's performance and in the interaction between him and Ted Danson is all to the credit of director-adaptor; Gary David Goldberg, of television's "Family Ties." But also at Goldberg's door is the fact that the film eventually succumbs to a prettified sentimentality that its performers have gone to some lengths to avoid.

ALL DOGS GO TO HEAVEN (G), This new animated feature from Don Bluth ("The Land Before Time," "An American Tail") is only moderately enjoyable. The animation is of variable quality, the songs are eminently unumimable, and the visuals are not eye-popping. Burt Reynolds provides the voice for Charlie, the heaven-bound mutt who befriends an orphan girl, and other familiar vocal cords, including those of Dom DeLuise and Melba Moore, also make appearances.

BACK TO THE FUTURE, PART II (PG), If "Back to the Future" made you bored and querulous, then the tumbling inventiveness in its sequel may come as a pleasant surprise. Of course, if you were among the 92 percent of the world who loved the ride in Dr. Emmett Brown's diabolical DeLorean back in 1985, then "Part II" is your oyster. Well, your hamburger with onions. If it proves anything, it's that director Robert Zemeckis is getting cooler and cooler with every controlled mayhem. With Michael J. Fox, Christopher Lloyd, Lea Thompson.

THE BEAR (PG), Jean-Jacques Annaud's adaptation of the (1916) James Oliver Curwood novel about a fierce grizzly and a lovable cub pursued implacably by two

hunters through the Canadian Rockies — is one family film with spit-purity and power. You'd have to go back to the first half of 1979's "The Black Stallion" to find something comparable. The spectacular setting — actually the Bavarian Alps — is bathed in frosty clear light, caught with glacial purity by the great cinematographer Philippe Rousselot. The two bears — big Bart and little Duke — are tremendous camera subjects and the script, by Polanski's scenarist, Gerard Brach, is full of life-embracing idealism and a touch of dark, sophisticated wit.

GROSS ANATOMY (PG-13), This comedy about medical students subjected to learning pressures and the horrors of dissection, tries to mix the academic soup opera of "Paper Chase" with the jock irreverence of "MASH" and winds up dead on the table, twitching with spasms of programmed mirth. Christine Lahti is slogged down in the John Houseman crackly mentor role, the romantic scenes have a deodorant-and-sickness and the young medical students themselves — self-centered, callous, shallow, preoccupied with career and money — aren't the kind you'd be pawing around your pancreas in any emergency.

Actress Frances Bavier dies

SILVER CITY, N.C. (AP) — Frances Bavier, the Emmy Award-winning actress remembered by millions of TV viewers as the lovable Aunt Bee on "The Andy Griffith Show" in the 1960s, has died at age 86.

Bavier died at home Wednesday, said Leslie Fletcher of Smith and Buckner Funeral Home.

She had been released Monday from a hospital, where she had been treated for almost two weeks in the coronary care unit.

Actor-singer Jim Nabors, when notified of her death at his Hawaii home, recalled that Miss Bavier was very good to me when I first started out and I was totally inexperienced in the business.

"She was always one of my favorite people," said Nabors, who played gas station attendant Gomer Pyle in the series. "I am a better person for having known her."

He said she taught him a lot about "personal kindness," adding: "During my free time she taught me about antique shopping."

Bavier, a New York City native who would have turned 87 this month, attended Columbia University and was a graduate of the American Academy of the Arts.

She had more than 20 years of stage experience, including stints in vaudeville and on Broadway, where she appeared in such productions as "Kiss and Tell," "Point of No Return" and "The Lady Says No."

She became famous for her role in the popular show starring Andy Griffith as a North Carolina sheriff. She portrayed the devoted aunt, who was known for her Southern cooking and who helped raise the widower Sheriff Andy Taylor's son, Opie, portrayed by Ron Howard.

She continued in the role in the short-lived series

"Mayberry RFD." She won an Emmy for the role in 1967.

"The Andy Griffith Show" was in the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings top 10 during its entire run, from October 1960 to September 1968, culminating in a No. 1 ranking in its final season.

"Although she was born in New York and lived in Hollywood during her acting days, Bavier, as Aunt Bee, often spoke of 'going shopping in Silver City.'"

She had visited the mill town of 5,000 in 1963 while dieting at Duke Medical Center. She retired here in 1972 when she left Hollywood. She made a cameo appearance in the 1974 movie "Benji."

"I fell in love with North Carolina," she said in a 1981 interview. "All the pretty roads and the trees. I, like a child, came here looking for a fairyland."

It wasn't quite like the fictitious Mayberry — fans continually rang her door bell — but she adjusted to her new home and never left Silver City.

"Sometimes people just gawk and gape," she said in a 1972 interview, "and sometimes they're utterly charming and sweet."

In the 1981 interview, she said, "I know how people saw me as Aunt Bee. I'm still a compassionate person. That's how I want them to remember me."

During her recent hospital stay, Bavier received many cards, letters and flowers from fans.

Andrews, Burnett celebrate lasting friendship in musical comedy special

Julie Andrews and Carol Burnett, two of musical comedy's greatest leading ladies, will be reunited for their first joint television special in 18 years on "Julie & Carol: Together Again" (Wednesday, Dec. 13, ABC). Their previous specials aired in 1962 and 1971.

"I first saw Carol at an audition in New York in the 1950s," recalls Ken Welch, who, with his wife, Mitzie, wrote and produced this special. "I told her she was great, and around six weeks later she called me, and I became her vocal coach. She wasn't getting hired; no one noticed her comedic talent. So Mitzie and I wrote her some material. The Welch's have written for Burnett ever since."

Burnett's friendship with Andrews goes back almost as far. Thirty years ago, a mutual friend brought Andrews to see the Broadway musical comedy "Once Upon a Mattress" in which Burnett was starring. At that point

Andrews was already a veteran performer, having starred in the stage version of "My Fair Lady." "Julie was born in a trunk," says Ken Welch. "She has show business in her veins."

This special was taped in June before an audience at the Pantages Theater in Hollywood. In an hour of comedy, song, and nostalgia, the entertainers celebrate their friendship. The program begins with a reminiscence of previous joint appearances, then moves into a lively rap number celebrating motherhood and middle age, an unorthodox tea party, a medley of songs from the 70s and '80s, and a country-style rendition of "Phantom of the Opera."

Andrews and Burnett appear without any backup dancers or singers. There was never a need for anyone else, the Welch's explain. Both women have a strong stage presence and relate well to each other, so having them alone on stage seemed appropriate. "This show is about their relationship," Mitzie Welch says. "They bring out the devil in each other, the outrageous. They have both matured in a strong, healthy way." Indeed, over the years, the two stars have become more alike in voice, mannerisms, and even appearance. Although the previous specials played

off the differences in the entertainers' personalities, the best moments of "Julie & Carol: Together Again" focus on their similarities. Fans will enjoy the rap number, which depicts several youth vs. maturity, mother vs. daughter scenarios.

The final skit presents "The Phantom of the Opry," a country-style version of "Phantom of the Opera." Burnett plays one tough Opry singer, complete with lacquered hair, while Andrews is the cowed backup. "Get out of my spotlight," orders the imperious Burnett.

Andrews and Burnett exude joy in each other's company. Mitzie Welch says, "With Julie, Carol has courage. Julie brings out her creativity." Carol Burnett describes the show as "two friends in a sandbox playing. It's two women who act like kids, who aren't afraid to act silly or to let the little kid in them out. It's a romp with two buddies."

ABC drops 2 series, adds 'Father Dowling'

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC, which canceled Jackie Mason's "Chicken Soup" last month, on Tuesday canceled two more new series, "Homeroom" and "Living Dolls," and added two new series, one an NBC castoff.

ABC also said it is moving "Mission: Impossible" from Thursdays to Saturdays as of Jan. 6, and taking "Mr. Belvedere" off the air after the show's Dec. 30 telecast. It will bring that show back

later this season.

ABC's new series are "Father Dowling Mysteries," starring Tom Bosley as a crime-solving priest, and the self-explanatory "America's Funniest Home Videos," which had strong ratings as a Nov. 26 special.

Bosley's series, which NBC aired last year, now will air Thursdays on ABC, and debut on Jan. 4. ABC's other new show will premiere Jan. 14, when ABC's new "Free Spirit"

also will be moved up by a half-hour to a new 8:30 p.m. EST time period Sundays.

The two canceled ABC series were among last week's lowest-rated network shows. The network's changes raised to seven the number of new network shows dropped since the season began in September. NBC earlier canceled "Nutt House," and CBS axed "The People Next Door," "Peaceable Kingdom" and "Top of the Hill."

NBC leads with Thursday lineup

LOS ANGELES — NBC's Thursday night shows, led by "The Cosby Show," were the most popular in the Nielsen ratings for the week ended Dec. 3, its 10th victory in the 11-week-old season.

All five NBC Thursday shows made the Top 10 as NBC won the week by a wide margin. ABC was second and CBS was third.

"Cosby" was first, followed by NBC's "Cheers" and a preview of its new Sunday comedy series "Ann Jillian." ABC's "Roseanne" was fourth.

Rounding out the Top 10 were NBC's "Dear John," NBC's "The Golden Girls," CBS' "Murder, She Wrote," NBC's "L.A. Law," and CBS' "60 Minutes" tied with ABC's "The Wonder Years."

The "Ann Jillian" preview behind "Cosby" was the highest rated network preview since March 1988. In its debut at its regular Sunday time slot it placed 52nd, but improved the rating for that time slot.

NBC took the week with an average of 15.4 in the A.C. Nielsen Co. survey. ABC was second with 13.2 and CBS third with 11.6. A ratings point represents the percentage of the nation's 92.1 million households tuned to a show.

For the season to date, NBC leads with 15.0, ABC is second with 13.4

and CBS is third with 12.3. NBC also won the November sweeps, a ratings period used to determine advertising rates.

Thursday's shows are the most watched, although the Thanksgiving holiday week before took its toll of viewers. The next most popular night is Tuesday, where ABC has its comedy blockbusters led by "Roseanne."

In a day-by-day look at the 40 top shows, six of them are on Thursday, including five in the Top 10; eight are on Tuesday, including two in the Top 10 and four in the next 10; seven are on Monday, mostly in the middle ranks; five are on Sunday, including two in the Top 10; four are on Saturday, including one in the Top 10; seven are on Wednesday, and three are on Friday.

Another view of the top 40 shows has NBC dominating the upper ranks. In the first 10 NBC has six shows, ABC and CBS two each; in the second 10, NBC five, ABC five and CBS none; in the third 10, NBC five, ABC three, CBS two; in the fourth 10, NBC one, ABC four, CBS five.

The NBC Monday night movie, "Little White Lies," starring Ann Jillian and Tim Matheson, was 17th for the week.

ABC's "Hallmark Hall of Fame" presentation of "The Shell Seekers," starring Angela Lansbury, tied for 22nd with NBC's "Night Court."

Among the evening news shows, the ABC "World News Tonight" was first for the ninth straight week, including two ties with CBS. Its lead over the second place news show is the greatest since the ABC news show began in 1952. ABC was first with 11.5, CBS was second with 10.3 and NBC was third with 10.2.

Fox Broadcasting Co.'s "Married ... With Children" was 54th and Fox's highest-rated show by a wide margin.

The bottom five network shows were ABC's "Free Spirit," CBS' "Tour of Duty," ABC's "Mr. Belvedere," ABC's "Homecoming" and, in last place, ABC's "Living Dolls."

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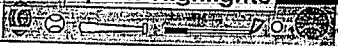

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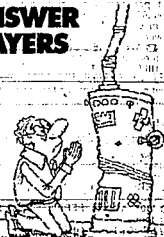
