Soviet dissident, physicist Sakharov dies at 68

WESTWOOD, Mass. — Andrei Sakharov, the physicist who helped develop the Soviet Union's hydrogen bomb and later won the Nobel Peace Prize as an international symbol of human rights, died at age 68, his relatives reported Thursday.

Sakharov, who was elected to the Soviet Parliament formed under President Mikhail S. Gorbachev and became one of its leading voices, died in his sleep in Moscow, relatives said.

Liza Semenyon, 34, the daughter-in-law of Sakharov's wife, Yelena Bonner, said Bonner called about 4 p.m. MST on

Thursday to notify the family of Sakharov's death.

Ms. Semenyon lives with her husband, Alexey Semenyon, in the Boston suburb of Westwood. Bonner's daughter, Tatiana Yankelevich, lives in nearby Newton.

"I don't know what more to say," Ms. Semenyon said. "She didn't give any more details."

Attempts to reach Sakharov's home in

Moscow by telephone were unsuccessful.

Sakharov had suffered from angina, but during a visit to the United States in December 1988 doctors at Massachusetts General Hospital performed cardiovascular tests and determined he did not need heart surgery or a pacemaker.

In Washington, White House spokesman Roman Popadiuk read a statement praising Sakharov as "a historical figure who will be long remembered for his human rights efforts in the Soviet Union: His voice was an important dimension in the contemporary changes under way in Soviet society."

Selfless, brave and determined, the stooped, disheveled dean of Soviet dissent

lived to see many of his dreams come true and his own people begin to acknowledge his greatness, as the rest of the world had done earlier.

But Sakharov was never satisfied, saluting reforms but faulting their inadequacy. He constantly challenged even Gorbachev, the man who turned many of his dreams into reality and set him free after nearly seven years in exile.

Indeed, Sakharov's tireless activism continued almost until his death. On Tuesday, he engaged in an angry exchange with Gorbachev in the Parliament over the party's monopoly on political power. Sakharov proposed the Congress debate

not only the monopoly issue but "all the articles hindering the passing of the laws of the land, property and other bills promoting perestroika."

Gorbachev told Sakharov, "I am under the impression that neither you nor we will know how to realize your suggestion. Who is to define what articles to exclude?"

Sakharov then turned to Gorbachev and launched a stack of telegrams in support of his position.

"You come to me. I will give you three files of telegrams," Gorbachev retorted. Nevertheless, Gorbachev brought Sakharov's proposal up for a vote. It was

Zoning panel tables Twin Falls County dairy ordinance

TWIN FALLS — Zoning board members tabled a proposed dairy ordinance after members of an ad hoc committee told them that dramatic pre-hearing changes to their proposal would prove disastrous to dairies.

"The way this is right now there isn't going to be an existing livestock confinement operation in Twin Falls County in a year," said Mike Quesnell, who was a member of an ad hoc committee that made recommendations in July for restricting dairies and feed lots.

He said since the committee made up solely of members with ties to the dairy industry, made its recommendation to the county Planning and Zoning Board, it has been dramatically altered.

"Quite frankly I don't recognize this document," he said.

The zoning board tabled the proposed ordinance until its January meeting and set a work session to study the issue prior to the meeting. Lee Taylor, county zoning administrator, said the ordinance is necessary because the county does not have any zoning for dairies.

The proposed ordinance has provisions for appeals. It also includes a penalty clause in which violators of the ordinance can be fined up to \$300, imprisoned for up to 30 days or both.

The rules prohibit livestock operations within one mile of cities. They also require a special-use permit inside city impact areas.

About 70 people packed a

courtroom in the county's judicial annex Thursday for a public hearing that did not get started until 9 p.m.

Quesnell agreed that the ordinance is necessary but as writer would jeopardize every dairy in the county.

He said as it now reads, any dairyman can lose his grandfather rights if he makes improvements to his dairy.

"You mean if I want to remodel my milk shed I can lose my rights?" he said. "In my opinion it should not go to the commission for approval."

Attorney Gary Atkinson, who was also on the ad hoc committee, said the changes made to the committee's recommended ordinance are likely unconstitutional.

As the ordinance is written, if someone sells a livestock operation, it is necessary but will have to go through a public hearing process to obtain a permit.

The ordinance was drawn up to protect dairy owners, as well as rural home owners, Atkinson said.

"It was meant to be an incentive to control growth," he said. "This will be a negative incentive to any agricultural business in Twin Falls County."

Attorney Harry DeHaan, who owns a dairy in the county, said the proposal should regulate dairies according to performance, not by arbitrary distances.

"You're going to rule out a lot of things that make sense just because you have some arbitrary figures," he

Shevardnadze plans a visit

BRUSSELS, Belgium — NATO foreign ministers said Thursday that Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze would make an unprecedented visit to the alliance's headquarters next week.

Shevardnadze's request for a meeting next week at the North Atlantic Treaty Organization overshadowed the opening day of talks at which U.S. Secretary of State James A. Baker III called for a larger political role for the alliance.

Baker called Shevardnadze's visit "a good thing" and said, "It's very natural in light of the changes that are taking place and continuing to take place."

It would be the first visit by a Soviet foreign minister to the headquarters of the Western military alliance, a sign of the remarkable events unfolding in the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe.

"This is a beautiful symbol of the growing cooperation between what can no longer be called the two (military) blocs but let's say East and West," said Belgian Foreign Minister Mark Eyskens, whose government was instrumental in arranging the visit.

Shevardnadze already was scheduled to be in Brussels on Monday and Tuesday to sign a new trade and economic cooperation agreement with the 12-nation European Community. The accord will expand commercial ties between Moscow and prosperous Western Europe.

NATO spokesman Robin Stafford said officials were trying to arrange a meeting between Shevardnadze and NATO Secretary-General Manfred Woerner.

Shevardnadze also was expected to meet informally with the ambassadors of all 16 NATO nations. A senior Canadian official suggested the Soviet official's visit might be more of a courtesy call.

"I really don't expect it will be a deeply substantive meeting because it's not what the Soviets are looking for," said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity. "They are not planning to negotiate with NATO."

The Western foreign ministers began their talks by agreeing to submit a draft arms control treaty to Warsaw Pact negotiators in Vienna. NATO negotiators then placed the draft on the bargaining table in Vienna, several hours after the Warsaw Pact offered its plan.

Idahoans vote regularly

WASHINGTON — Although Congress was accused of general ineffectiveness in 1989, lawmakers from Idaho and the rest of the nation got high grades in at least one category — showing up to vote.

This year the 535 members of Congress posted a combined attendance record unmatched since the journal "Congressional Quarterly" began keeping track of the data in 1953.

Idaho's four-man congressional delegation attended votes between 96.8 and 98.9 percent of the time, records roughly consistent with national trends. Each showed a marked improvement from the previous two-year period, according to figures compiled by Legi-Slate, a private congressional record-keeping service.

Pentagon adopts plans for capturing drug lords

NEW YORK — The Pentagon has authorized plans by military units to capture fugitive drug criminals in foreign countries, according to a report broadcast Thursday.

CBS News reported that, among the units to receive the authorization is the special Delta hostage rescue team formed after Americans were taken captive in Iran.

The news program said the U.S. military became involved after an informant told the U.S. government last summer that Pablo Escobar, one of the kingpins of the Colombian drug trade, was hiding at a seaside villa in Panama.

CBS said troops and helicopters moved to a U.S. base in nearby Puerto Rico to prepare for an

attempted capture Labor Day weekend only to abort the plan because there was only a 70 percent chance the informant was correct.

As it turned out, Escobar was not in Panama that weekend, the report said.

CBS did not identify its sources, referring only to officials. Maj. David Super, a spokesman for the Pentagon, told The Associated Press on Thursday that he knew nothing about the CBS report or any such authorization for U.S. troops.

Chief Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams said, "We do not comment on such matters."

"We cannot comment on possible contingencies or operations. The bottom line is, no comment," said deputy White House spokesman Roman Popadiuk.

WASHINGTON — Some get right to the point, telling Santa what they want — "a doll and a best friend," "to get my cast off."

Others ask only for the clothes their parents can't afford.

Some are concerned that Santa find their house — and get in when he arrives. Every single one has been good.

Such are the letters to Father Christmas, "Santa this year I don't want toys," wrote Michelle. "I need a coat for me and

my brother ... my mother is good but she can't buy me a new coat, but I know you can."

Donna, the mother of "two beautiful little girls whose father has deserted them," asked Santa to explain why Christmas is not just a time for presents but also a time for sharing and being with your family. It is so

hard for children to understand why Santa skips our house."

By Christmas, the Postal Service estimates, 250,000 children will have sent letters to the North Pole.

Every year, many requests are opened at local post offices and passed on to his helpers — social service agencies, charities, community groups and people with deep pockets.

This Christmas, many of the letters are being opened by his elves in Atlanta, where the Coca-Cola Co. and its employees have contributed money and manpower to

screen Santa's mail and to be sure he knows where he is most needed. The company is donating 5 cents for each letter received, up to 2 million letters, to The Marine Corps Reserve Toys for Tots Program.

What are the elves reading? Letters like these.

Andy, 4, asked for a shaving kit, "so I could shave my face with daddy," and for "a pretend blender."

A note with no name — but Santa knows anyway, doesn't he? — asked how he and the reindeer were doing and then told him,

just so he'd know, that "somebody here was a little bad this year, but it could not be me." The child with no name asked for a computer and cross-country skis, among other things.

Like-wise, Caitlin wrote: "I have been a good girl, My brother has not."

Desiree asked for "a doll and a best friend." Katie said: "I just want to get my cast on my arm off, I also don't want my sister to get married."

Shayla wanted to be sure Santa had directions to her house.

Chain bankruptcy threat worries suppliers, could affect Idaho

NEW YORK (AP) — A suggestion by retailers owned by deeply indebted Campeau Corp. that they may take refuge in bankruptcy court incites concerns among suppliers Thursday and increased chances that shipments could be halted.

One of Campeau's major factoring companies, which act as financial middlemen between manufacturers and retailers, said it no longer would extend credit on merchandise bound for Campeau's many department stores.

Several apparel and accessory manufacturers said they were

keeping in close touch with executives in charge of Campeau's U.S. retailing operations. Bills have been paid on time so far, they said.

The suppliers, whose fates are tied to retailers, expressed hope that business would not be disrupted as Campeau copes with a worsening cash shortage.

Retail analysts said disclosures by Campeau's Federated Department Stores Inc. and Allied Stores Corp. of deepening financial difficulties were unsurprising given the fierce competition taking place in the industry.

Federated and Allied said in

documents submitted to the Securities and Exchange Commission that their cash could run out by March or sooner and that they might seek protection from creditors under Chapter 11 of the federal bankruptcy code.

The move would permit Campeau-owned retailers to remain operating while their Canadian parent company sorted out its financial problems. As the heart of the trouble is the massive debt Campeau acquired in taking over Federated in 1988 for \$6.7 billion and Allied in 1986 for \$3.4 billion.

Among the stores operated by

Allied is The Bon Marche, which has outlets in Twin Falls and Boise. A threatened inability to meet interest payments on junk bonds sold to pay for the acquisitions forced the Toronto-based retail and real estate company to turn to outsiders for help earlier this year.

Canada's Olympia & York Developments Ltd. came to the rescue with a \$250 million loan to Campeau. As part of a deal for an additional \$800 million next year from Olympia & York, Campeau put the Bloomingdale's department store chain up for sale in September. About a half dozen bidders are

evaluating the chain and Campeau has said a final sale could be arranged by February.

In the SEC filings made public Wednesday, Federated and Allied said bankruptcy court protection would be an alternative if lenders won't ease debt repayment terms. Federated owes creditors \$1.15 billion by the end of April and Allied faces debts of \$633.7 million due by the end of March.

Failing a rescheduling of the payments, Campeau would consider selling other holdings besides Bloomingdale's, missing money by taking out mortgages on its stores or

possibly seeking bankruptcy-court protection in the 17-store Bloomingdale's chain, Federated operates Abraham & Straus, Burdines, Lazarus, Rich's and Goldsmith's. Under the Allied umbrella are The Bon Marche, Jordan Marsh, Mass Brothers and Stern's. The two combined have about 100,000 employees and 260 stores.

The second largest factor in the country, Chicago-based Heller Financial Inc., shut off credit lines to Campeau suppliers as of Thursday morning.

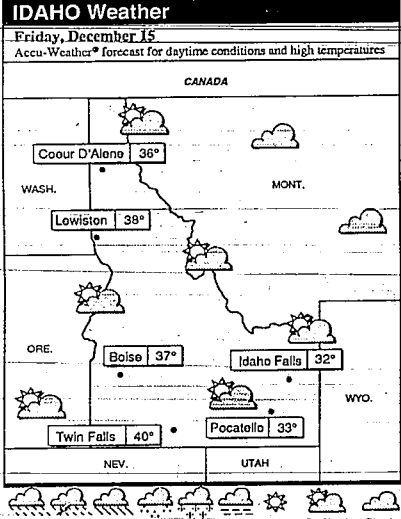
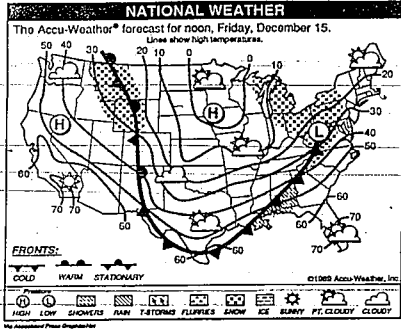

High pressure to the west centered over the Washington coast will continue the northerly flow aloft over the state. More surface wind than in the past few days has mixed the lower layers and allowed temperatures to warm statewide Thursday especially across the south where temperatures are running 5 to 10 degrees warmer than Wednesday.

The only precipitation reported was again mainly along the eastern Idaho border and north central mountains. High temperatures Thursday through 3 p.m. included Coeur d'Alene, 33; Lewiston, 43; Boise 43; Pocatello, 40; and Mountain, Home 52.

The weather pattern shows little change over the next five days with precipitation continuing along the eastern border. Inversions will remain under the high pressure.

Rep. Larry Craig, Republican, boasted the most-improved record this year, jumping from 90.7 percent attendance in the previous Congress — the lowest of any Idaho lawmaker — to a delegation-leading 98.9 percent record in 1989.

On the Senate side, Republican Sen. James McClure posted a record of 98.1 percent this year, up from 91.25 percent over the 1987-88

period. Sen. Steve Symms, also a Republican, saw his record rise slightly from 94.25 percent over the previous two years to 96.8 percent in the latest session.

Overall, U.S. senators voted about 98 percent of the time, the highest average on record. There were 312 Senate and 368 House votes called in 1989.

Rep. Richard Stallings, Democrat,

went from a 93.7 percent record in 1987-88 to a 97.3 percent attendance rate in 1989. The 435 House members averaged attendance records of 94 percent, tying the 1984 record.

Analysts credit the improved voting records with revised congressional schedules that allow lawmakers to spend more time in their home states.

"If a dairy lagoon is built the right way you will have no problems but if a lagoon is too shallow or deep it can stink to high heaven."

Local activist Bill Chisholm agreed that the ordinance probably is not ready to be passed by the board. "This may not be the perfect proposal," he said. "But you are headed in the right direction."

He said such an ordinance is needed to protect home owners from problems already existing in Jerome County due to explosive growth there.

"We have to recognize they have rights," he said.

Jerome County is also considering adopting a new livestock containment ordinance that is much more restrictive than the current one.

Chisholm also suggested that the county form a new committee that includes a broader representation than just people with dairy ties.

Quensell pleaded with the board to table the proposed ordinance.

"I consider this nothing more than a few notes to the ordinance that should be drawn," he said.

Before the board accepted testimony Thursday, Taylor read two pages of amendments to the nine-page proposal.

Among the changes, an applicant for a livestock operation permit will have to submit a map including surface contours, soil depths and types and size and location of natural drainage points of the site.

The plan would have to be prepared by a licensed engineer, architect or contractor.

Sakharov's early fame was not as a political activist. He first became known as a brilliant scientist, inducted into the Academy of Sciences in 1953 at age 32, the youngest-ever member. He had been born in 1921 in Moscow and like his father became a physicist.

In 1948, he joined physicist Igor Tamm in developing the hydrogen bomb and for the next 20 years lived a privileged life — in a good apartment, driver, high salary and government awards. But, like Albert Einstein, Sakharov began to worry about the morality of developing weapons of mass destruction.

He had his first major brush with top Soviet officials in 1961.

Marie wrote to Santa very much for all you do for all the people in the world. I'm very content in life. I don't want to ask for anything. I'd just like to encourage you to keep up the good work!

She drew a heart next to her name.

Justice Department probes antitrust violations in air fare boost

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department is investigating whether some airlines violated antitrust laws when they raised fares earlier this year, department officials said Thursday.

The department's antitrust division has asked several airlines to submit information about how they determine fares, including any correspondence between carriers about increases that took effect Sept. 29, airline officials said.

Several airlines increased fares on some routes between \$10 and \$80, depending on how many days before departure tickets are purchased.

An antitrust expert who spoke on condition of anonymity said the government was probably examining the industry's practice of reporting fare increases before they take effect.

Under this theory of antitrust violation, the pre-publication of fare increases to travel agents and an industry clearinghouse called the Airline Tariff Publishers Inc. would be viewed as a "facilitating device" for price fixing, the expert said.

While "it would be difficult to prove an agreement" among airlines to raise fares, the Justice Department might try to show that the pre-publication of fares is way to signal price increases, this expert said.

An airline would "run a price up the flagpole. If everybody salutes it, it goes into effect," the expert said. If no one follows suit, the airline is free to cancel the planned increase.

Justice Department spokeswoman Amy Brown said civil investigative demands were sent to "a number of carriers within a short period of time after the Sept. 29 effective date."

She declined to say which airlines received the orders or to give details of the inquiry.

"We have complied with requests for information, but we really don't see any basis for the investigation," said David Messing, spokesman for Continental Airlines.

Delta, Northwest and American, which was the first to indicate it was raising fares, also acknowledged receiving requests for information.

Three other airlines that the Wall Street Journal reported were subject to investigation — USAir, United and Trans World — declined comment.

The public affairs department at Pan American, also cited in the Journal report, said no spokesman was immediately available.

Jim Lundy of Delta said the Justice Department asked for any correspondence between Delta and other airlines over fares.

"There was none," he said.

The order also asked for information about the airline's ticket-pricing operations and the way it makes decisions on fares, along with the process used in determining the Sept. 29 increase.

Inventory increase a warning

WASHINGTON (AP) — Business inventories climbed to their highest level in two months in October, the government said Thursday, and some analysts said that while the boom has not reached dangerous heights yet, it was flashing warning signs.

"We have not reached the point where we need to call out the Marines, but there are some warning signals," said Robert G. Dederick, chief economist for The Northern Trust Co. in Chicago.

On the other hand, economist Michael P. Niemira of Mitsubishi Bank in New York said that while businesses need to be cautious, they have better inventory control now and should be able to correct problems before they become too serious.

The Commerce Department said inventories climbed 0.4 percent to a seasonally adjusted \$793.9 billion in October after remaining flat in September. The September report was revised from a 0.2 percent increase reported earlier and followed a 0.4 percent advance in August.

Business sales, meanwhile, dropped 0.7 percent to a seasonally adjusted \$519.2 billion in October after falling a revised 0.7 percent in September. September sales originally were reported to have fallen 0.3 percent after rising 3 percent in August.

The October business activity produced a slight increase, to 1.53, in the ratio of sales, meaning it would take 1.53 months to exhaust inventories at the October pace. The ratio was 1.51 in September and 1.50 in August.

If inventories were to pile up excessively, it could mean cutbacks in production and a loss of jobs, perhaps leading to a recession. However, neither Dederick nor Niemira found the ratio at a dangerous level yet.

Niemira suggested it reflected the end of the slow-growth cycle and predicted that "things will begin to look better in 1990."

In fact, things began to look better on Wednesday when the Commerce Department reported an 0.8 percent improvement in retail sales in November, the highest in four months, as shoppers began the Christmas gift-buying season.

That and other recent economic indicators suggest the existing in Federal Reserve interest-rate policies, analysts say. The Fed had kept a tight rein on credit for more than a year to slow inflation, but began loosening its grip last June, permitting short-term rates to fall gradually.

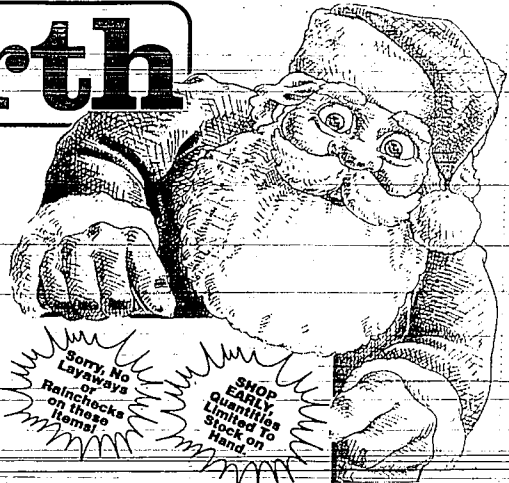
The October report showed retail sales advanced 1.3 percent, while retail inventories edged down 0.3 percent.

Immigration laws keep business acumen, skills out of U.S.

If the young Albert Einstein appeared today as a grad student who wanted to make his career in America, he probably couldn't get a green card.

Unless Albert had a guaranteed job or friendly relatives here, back he goes to Europe — no ifs, ands or buts. But he's a genius? Doesn't matter — our country has an immigration policy that deliberately discriminates against people with brains and skill.

Roughly 650,000 people a year are granted legal immigration status in this country. Less than 6 percent of them are admitted on the basis of expertise — like a Rupert Murdoch.

Family connections or political oppression matter most. Our immigration system is so skewed that an aspiring immigrant's knowledge and entrepreneurial drive are virtually irrelevant to the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

"We're surprisingly unaccommodating to business-related immigration," says Arthur C. Helton, who teaches immigration law at New York University.

That's crazy. From its earliest days, this country's leadership in technical innovation has depended on a flow of brilliant immigrants looking for a chance they could never get at home.

We entered the Industrial Revolution in 1789 when Samuel Slater escaped to Rhode

Island from England with plans for textile mills tucked securely in his head. Without empires from Hitler's Europe, America doesn't build the atomic bomb and establish primacy in the physical sciences.

And ironically without the Werner von Brauns, we have no space program or man on the moon. Computer technology? Our lead can be traced to immigrants like An Wang and Intel's Andrew Grove.

Most of our policy has ignored that heritage. "Our immigration policy certainly isn't dedicated to the entrepreneur," says Peter H. Loewy of Fragomen, Del Rey & Betsman, a Los Angeles-based law firm handling corporate immigration.

For the last 20 years, we've paid far more time, money and attention to illegal immigration.

It's time to change focus. If you believe that our global competitiveness depends on our "human capital," then we've got to consider an immigration policy that's designed to attract the world's best and

brightest. [Eh? You bet. The point is not to turn one's back on the

huddled masses yearning to breathe free but to also be pro-active and extend a welcome to immigrants with intellectual capital and ambition to burn. Why shouldn't we offer the best of both worlds — a refuge for the world's oppressed and an opportunity for the world's gifted?

This country needs the sort of dynamism that these immigrants could provide. Let's welcome them.

Look at Eastern Europe. There are hundreds of thousands of scientists and engineers, both superbly educated and technically proficient, in Hungary, East Germany, Poland and Czechoslovakia.

Yes, dramatic market reforms are now under way. But does anyone honestly believe that a Hungarian engineer with a great idea will get venture capital?

Or that West Germany will cheerfully absorb all the engineers that East Germany has to offer? Emigration is limited but not possible.

Why shouldn't these highly trained people look to the United States to enjoy the risks and benefits of a market economy? What's more, why shouldn't we encourage this as a matter of policy?

It's not as if Germany and Japan — our leading economic rivals — want to compete

with us for all this talent and brains. They're historically immigrant-averse. Great. Let's go with our strength. We know how to cope with immigration; we know how to provide a chance to those from other lands. Let's use immigration policy as a tool to enhance our competitiveness in cutting edge technologies and not primarily as a source of cheap labor.

Let's send a message to the world that we value the skilled, educated and hard-working mind — and that we're prepared to reward it with the gift of opportunity and citizenship.

"We shouldn't put any barriers in place for those who can meaningfully contribute to our economy," says National Science Foundation Director Erich Bloch, himself a German immigrant. "We only hurt ourselves when we do that."

The Simpson-Kennedy Immigration Act of 1989, which overwhelmingly passed the Senate this summer, is a small but important step in recognizing the strategic economic importance of immigration policy.

The bill, which goes to the House next year, marks the first shift away from the purely family-centered immigration policy of the past 25 years by adding 104,000 new slots for immigrants who can bring special skills to this country.

Half those slots go to companies hiring professionally trained foreign nationals. The bill also sets up a point system for

evaluating "independent immigrants," and, as in Canada, confers legal status on foreign entrepreneurs who set up businesses that employ at least 10 Americans. Capitol insiders say the bill has a shot.

The Bush administration, much thus far, would be smart to make Simpson-Kennedy its own and champion merit-based immigration. It's a natural for the "Education President." Go on an extra step: Give people with masters degrees and Ph.D.s in science and engineering automatic green cards.

Let's be a magnet for technical talent in Asia, Africa, Europe and Latin America. A possible brain drain? We'll see. Our universities already educate some of the finest minds the world has to offer. What's wrong with keeping a few more of them here after they graduate?

Other countries will be sharp enough to recognize that their empires will want to maintain ties and trade with their homelands.

The world is becoming more open — and more competitive.

We need all the bright, skilled and motivated people we can get. Our legal immigration policy is badly broken. Let's fix it. Now.

Mandatory coverage is raising costs for health care in Idaho, the nation

With medical costs rising out of sight, the United States is in for one of the worst health care crises in its history. The causes are many: expensive medical technology, federal and state budget cutbacks, the maldistribution of medical and health services for those unable to afford needed care to name just a few.

The bottom line is 36 million Americans — nearly 200,000 in Idaho alone — have no health insurance. Hospitals are jammed with people who cannot afford the high cost of private care.

Clearly, it is time for a solution. And that solution must involve the cost of insurance — not cost shifting.

Idaho already is ahead of most states in holding down the number of costly mandated coverages it requires in group insurance plans.

But the Legislature could do even more to cut the cost of health care by eliminating mandated coverages altogether, which would pave the way for a no-frills, low-cost group policy.

Mandated coverages, which include substance abuse treatment, physical therapists and mental health counseling, are an often overlooked contributor to high medical in-

urance costs. Eliminating them would allow insurance carriers to once again offer basic health care plans that would be affordable to small businesses and therefore increase the number of people with basic health insurance.

A November 1988 study by the National Center for Policy Analysis revealed that as many as 9.3 million people lack health insurance because state government regulations, mainly in the form of mandated coverages, drive premiums too high.

In Idaho, which has only a handful of mandated coverages, barely 5 percent of our uninsured owed their status to the high cost of mandated coverages.

But the array of mandated coverages is marching our way. State legislators in Idaho and across the country are adding more and more items to the already long list of coverages.

In 1981, legislators added physical therapy. Since 1976, the number of mandated coverages nationwide has skyrocketed from 30 to 686.

Last year, Idaho rejected a bid to add licensed professional counselors to its mandate menu, but lawmakers also defeated a bill requiring mandated coverage measures to undergo cost-benefit analyses prior to introduction.

The fact is, special interest providers are about the only ones benefiting from mandated coverages.

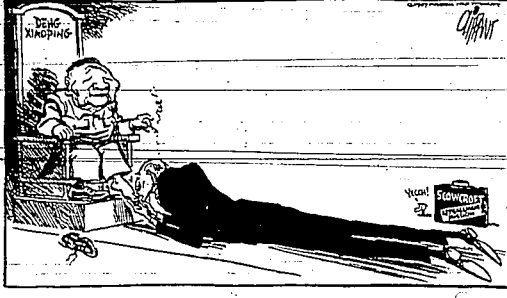
Small businesses that continue to provide costly insurance (the majority) have less profits available for expansion.

Driving down the cost of insurance would add useful revenue for expansion and job creation, as well as return premium tax dollars to the state.

By adhering to a free market philosophy, we can help drive down the cost of insurance for business owners and allow them into the market.

Rather than force small business to shoulder the burden of the health care crisis, we should encourage it to be a part of the solution.

Gonzalez pledges to fix Fed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Banking Committee chairman said Thursday that he will begin an effort to reform the Federal Reserve Board, saying the "splendid isolation" of the central bank "won't continue forever."

"I recognize the need to give the Federal Reserve room to operate and make objective judgments," said Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez, D-Texas, a longtime critic of the Fed.

"But, this doesn't have to mean... (it) operates as some separate government, free to veto economic policy spelled out by the administration, the Congress—and the American people at the voting booths."

On another matter, Gonzalez prodded President Bush to re-evaluate the administration's "Pollyannaish" view that a \$50 billion savings and loan bailout is sufficient.

Bush suggested earlier this week that the \$50 billion the government is borrowing to close S&Ls through September 1991 may fall short. However, a day later, his spokesman, Marlin Fitzwater, backtracked, saying the president had no plans to ask Congress for more money.

Gonzalez, in a speech to the Consumer Federation of America, offered few specifics on how he would restructure the Fed, but afterward mentioned expanding the board to include representatives of interests other than banking. Consumers, builders, manufacturers and other groups hurt by high interest rates have long sought more influence over Fed policy.

The seven Fed board members in Washington are appointed to 14-year terms by the president and once in office cannot be removed. The boards of the 12 regional banks that comprise the Federal Reserve System are dominated by members chosen by bankers.

Gonzalez, through most of his 28-year career in Congress, has been frequently critical of the central bank for fighting inflation at the expense of economic growth. When interest rates soared in the early 1980s, he introduced legislation to impeach Paul Volcker, then Fed chairman.

A bill introduced this year by Rep. Lee Hamilton, D-Ind., and Byron Dorgan, D-N.D., would force the Fed to announce the results of closed-door sessions immediately rather than with the current six-week lag. It also would require it to meet regularly with administration officials.

However, Gonzalez said the approach was "fragmentary" and that he would launch a long-term effort to comprehensively restructure the Fed, starting with hearings and studies next year and legislation after that.

"The splendid isolation of the Federal Reserve won't continue forever," he said.

Gonzalez's effort may get some sympathy with the Bush administration, which has complained periodically about the Fed's tight-money policy. Housing Secretary Jack Kemp has suggested that administration officials should have more influence over monetary policy.

However, the chairman of the Senate Banking Committee, Donald W. Riegle Jr., D-Mich., and the panel's senior Republican, Jake Garn of Utah, have said they would oppose any attempt to weaken the Fed's independence.

Long-lasting tranquilizers increase risk of hip injury in elderly

CHICAGO (AP) — Elderly people who use certain long-lasting sleeping pills or tranquilizers, including Valium, are 70 percent more likely to fall and fracture their hips than those who take no such drugs, a new study says.

But similar, shorter-acting medications in the same drug family — the benzodiazepines — carry no

such risk and should be prescribed instead to older people who need such medications, the study said.

About 250,000 elderly people fall and break their hips annually in the United States, resulting in monetary costs of \$6 billion and human costs of earlier disability, earlier placement in nursing homes and earlier death for many, a co-author

said.

Hip fractures can mark "the beginning of the end" for such people, said the co-author, Wayne A. Ray, an associate professor of preventive medicine at Vanderbilt University School of Medicine in Nashville.

The study appears in Friday's *Journal of the American Medical Association*.

It estimated that 10 percent to 15 percent of people over 65 take benzodiazepine drugs, the most commonly prescribed tranquilizers and sleeping pills because of their effectiveness and relative safety.

"All have the side effects of reducing coordination and alertness," however, Ray said in a telephone interview Thursday.

Not all benzodiazepines stay in the body the same length of time

The long-acting ones are present for days, while the shorter-acting ones are largely eliminated within hours, he said.

Ray and his colleagues studied all the hip fractures in people 65 and older recorded between 1977 and 1985 in Saskatchewan, Canada, an area chosen because of the completeness of its medical records.

The researchers compared use of benzodiazepine tranquilizers and sleeping pills among 4,501 hip fracture victims ages 65 and older with a control group of 24,041 Canadians matched for comparison.

"Among persons over 65 using the long-acting drugs, there was a 70 percent increased risk of hip fracture," Ray said.

"In contrast, the persons using the short-acting drugs had no significant risk in the increase of hip fracture

compared to people not using these drugs."

The long-acting drugs are no more effective, but they were developed first, and some doctors are still prescribing them to the elderly, Ray said.

He estimated thousands of hip fractures could be prevented each year if use of the long-acting drugs were discontinued in the elderly and patients were switched to shorter-acting drugs or helped to sleep or

relax by making lifestyle changes, such as reducing caffeine intake, getting more exercise and going to bed later.

Three drugs accounted for 95 percent of the long-acting drugs taken by subjects in the study: diazepam, marketed as Valium; flurazepam, marketed as Dalmane; and chloridiazepoxide, marketed as Librium.

All are manufactured by Roche Laboratories of Nutley, N.J.

Alaskan volcano blows ash plume 7 miles high

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Redoubt Volcano erupted Thursday on the west side of Cook Inlet, hurling volcanic ash seven miles into the air and prompting the evacuation of seven oil workers as a precaution.

The volcano, which last erupted 23 years ago, is 115 miles southwest of Anchorage.

"We had confirmation from a Mark Air pilot who sighted an ash plume at 35,000 feet," said John Davies, state seismologist. "As far as I know, no health advisories have been issued yet. We'll wait and see how much ash gets into the air."

Seven of 11 workers at the Drift River oil storage facility, the nearest habitation some 20 miles from the volcano, were evacuated as a precaution because of the danger of flooding, said Harold Mouser, the manager of Cook Inlet Pipeline Co.,

operator of the facility.

"Our people have seen nothing, they felt nothing," he said.

He said some of the workers were evacuated in a light plane that had gone to the site for a routine grocery delivery, and the others were transported in a plane sent because of the eruption.

The oil facility was closed. Mouser said a helicopter was standing by for possible evacuation of the four employees who remained at the site as monitors.

The U.S. Geological Survey had warned pilots Wednesday that there might be an "ash hazard" from the 10,197-foot volcano.

Gritty volcanic ash is abrasive and can damage aircraft engines.

Davies said seismologists had been monitoring activity at Redoubt Volcano, and activity increased about midday Wednesday.

Brady has right hip replaced

WASHINGTON (AP) — Treasury Secretary Nicholas F. Brady successfully underwent elective surgery Thursday to replace his arthritic right hip, the department reported.

"Everything went fine," said a department official, who declined to be identified. "The secretary's doing great."

It is uncertain when Brady will be released from the hospital, but recovery is expected to last three to six weeks, the official said. During that time, Deputy Secretary John Robson will serve as acting secretary.

Despite his absence from the department, Brady will remain in touch with Treasury officials and take part in major decisions just as

he does when traveling outside the capital, officials said.

Among the pending decisions are the fiscal 1991 budget, which President Bush plans to send to Congress on Jan. 22, and the contents of Bush's State of the Union address.

Paycheck seeks reduced sentence for shooting incident in bar

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Johnny Paycheck's lawyer asked the Ohio Supreme Court to knock down by three years a maximum 9½-year prison sentence the country singer received for shooting and wounding a man in a bar in 1985.

Ralph C. Buss told the justices in arguments Wednesday that Paycheck should not have been given a mandatory three-year sentence for use of a firearm.

Paycheck originally was charged with felonious assault with a gun, but a jury convicted him of a lesser offense of aggravated assault. The defense has contended the lesser charge did not provide for the firearm specification.

In February, the singer began serving a 7½-to-9½-year sentence in the Chillicothe Correctional Institute in southern Ohio. The conviction stemmed from an incident in which Paycheck shot a man in a bar.

The 48-year-old Paycheck, whose real name is Donnie Lytle, is best known for his 1978 hit "Take This Job and Shove It."

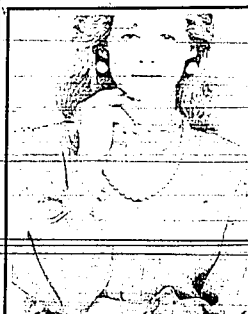

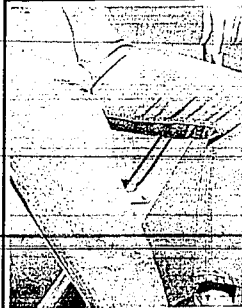

Theft charge filed against Jerome man is dismissed

JEROME — A charge of grand theft filed against Steve McMullen in October has been dismissed.

Jerome County Prosecutor John Horgan said the charge was dropped but would not say why because an investigation is continuing. He was charged with taking \$500 in funds paid to the North Side News, while he was publisher, by Magic Valley Publishing Co. for a book the newspaper contracted to have printed, according to court officials.

McMullen said he is not surprised the charge was dropped. "I felt from the start that it would end up being dismissed or that I would be vindicated in court," he said.

A sentencing date for a second charge should be set within the next few days. McMullen has pleaded "no contest" in Gooding County 5th District Court to the sale of two pieces of publishing equipment at the time he was publisher of the North Side News, the Gooding County Leader and the Lincoln County Journal.

Adams Petroleum seeking to swap South Hills parcels

William Carter, 47, Walla Walla, Wash., was struck by the shudder when a piece of the ceiling collapsed on him Friday. He was among a crew gutting the old jail cells in the county building.

Carter was transferred from the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center and had surgery on Tuesday, his boss, contractor Bob Jackson, said.

Demolition of the old jail has been halted until it has been inspected for safety.

BLM advisors target Air Force on range

BOISE (AP) — An advisory council for the Bureau of Land Management has named one of its members to a citizens' group on the proposed Saylor Creek bombing range expansion.

But the council on Thursday voiced a chorus of concerns over how the Air Force is handling the enlargement of the range over much of south-central Idaho.

"With all the range expansions nationwide, they (the Air Force) would have more ranges than in World War II when the country was at war," said Andy Anderson of Boise, the council member named to sit in at the working committee's formation today.

Today's meeting in Boise is expected to attract Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, and Gary Vest, deputy assistant secretary of the Air Force.

The Air Force initially suggested increasing the range from about 100,000 acres to 1.5 million to accommodate an electronic bombing facility.

Four public scoping hearings on the first part of the project's draft environmental impact statement produced a storm of flak from ranchers, conservationists and even Gov. Cecil Andrus.

"They've handled it so badly. They're not leveling with us on what they need," said Gene Davis, a council member and Bruneau rancher.

The Air Force intends to complete the first tier of its EIS in mid-January, a month later than expected, said Boise District BLM Manager Dave Brunner.

It will offer some suggestions about the

project with "Tier 2" later addressing specifics such as range size and controversial low-level supersonic bombing runs across the desert.

The scoping meetings on that second phase should occur in the spring, Brunner said.

The advisory council approved a resolution asking the Air Force to conduct two environmental statements: one on the range expansion and the other regarding the transfer of F-4 aircraft from California's George Air Force Base to the Mountain Home Base.

The Air Force essentially has complied, Brunner said.

A second resolution requests the military to do more research on the effects of the bombing on livestock, wildlife and other

Chamber sees area job growth

TWIN FALLS — Over the next two years, expect 1,350 new jobs in the area, at least.

That's a conservative estimate, according to the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce.

But the chamber, interpreting results of a business-retention survey released Thursday, isn't banking on new businesses. Instead, that's what 168 local businesses responding to a mail survey say they want to do.

"We're very excited about the results," Gary Garmand of Garmand Marketing Inc. said. Garmand chaired the chamber's retention committee.

Fifty-seven of the firms said they planned to expand, and 94 expected to hire more employees. Only 11 expected to lay off workers.

But, according to Garmand, 21 percent indicated the expansion would require more land — which could be a problem.

"We don't have many empty buildings," he said.

The chamber conducted a two-pronged retention study this fall.

The detailed results of a shorter mail survey and sketchy results from detailed interviews with 49 firms were released in detail at a press conference Thursday.

Chamber Executive Vice President Kent Just said complete results from the interviews would be released as the chamber compiles them over the next few weeks.

The committee's work will continue as it analyzes the results and decides what can be done to help existing businesses.

A few areas stood out enough for Just and Garmand to emphasize Thursday.

"We have effectively used up a whole lot of our labor force," Garmand said. "That's very good, but with our growth, we have some real challenges ahead of us."

Just pointed out criticisms of local education.

"Those students who want to get into entry-level jobs have got to be better qualified," Just said, indicating businesses need to work with local schools, he said.

And Garmand said transportation could be improved.

"We need to work on U.S. Highway 93, our major link to Southern California, one of our major markets," Garmand said.

Twelve of the 49 businesses that participated in the extensive interviews cited quality of life as a major asset.

Other assets were low-utility costs, climate, recreation, market access, a high-quality labor force, a good tax climate and Idaho's right-to-work law.

At least three businesses cited one of those factors in the survey.

Fund cuts hurt Region IV development

TWIN FALLS — A couple of funding cuts forced Region IV Development Association on Thursday to spend less time helping towns get government grants.

The association, charged with fostering Magic Valley economic and community development, has lost \$32,000 from two government sources. Executive Director Joe Herring told his board members,

"If either one of those programs was lost, I could absorb it." Herring said. But with both gone, some changes will have to be made, he said.

The not-for-profit association's board decided to emphasize managing

government loans for business and economic development. That activity generates money for the association.

Region IV's directors also decided to start charging for a program that helps local businesses tap into federal contracts.

"What we're doing now is responding to an immediate crisis," Herring said. "This will focus efforts more toward small-business development than to community development."

One of the cuts was in the "procurement" program that helps businesses get federal contracts.

Herring estimated that the \$19,000 of procurement money Region IV received translated into \$4 million to \$5 million in federal contracts for the region.

The federal Economic Development Administration also cut its aid to Region IV by \$13,000.

The association helps cities, counties and businesses with planning, writing and administering grants, job training, loan packaging and other economic-development assistance.

"What you're saying is we're going out to sell loans like any other finance company," board member Warren Scholl of Wendell said. "That's nothing wrong with that."

But other board members were worried that less time would be spent helping communities with grant applications, and Region IV for the first time may have to decline grant-assistance requests.

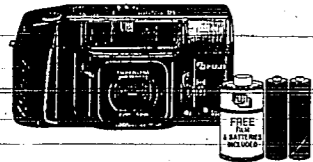

Lewiston firm faces penalty for spill

BOISE (AP) — A Lewiston-based trucking company, Freightways, Inc., faces a state fine of \$20,000 for failing to clean up debris spilled into the Weiser River Aug. 19, the Department of Health and Welfare says.

The agency said Thursday the spill occurred 11 miles south of New Meadows on U.S. 95, and included four cases of toilet paper and cellof fuel.

Environmental officials said Adams County removed five cases of toilet paper after Freightways failed to do so, but diesel-fuel remains along the river bank.

Official advises dumping sewage plan

BOISE (AP) — Ada County Commissioner Mike Johnson has advised Boise to give up its plan to buy two farms north of Star as a place to spread treated sewage sludge.

"My suggestion to them is to drop the project and pull out," Johnson said Wednesday. "Nobody is going to do that thing."

But Mayor Boise Dirk Kempthorne defended the plan to purchase 1,940 acres of land on which to spread the sludge, which goes by the trade name SOICON, as a soil conditioner.

He cited the Environmental Protection Agency's approval of the project.

"I guess I would say I'm always interested in Commissioner Johnson's opinion, and I'm equally interested in his proposal for a long-range solution to this," Kempthorne said. "It's something that, as far as the method, is environmentally sound."

Conservationists withdraw legal claim

POCATELLO (AP) — As a gesture of good faith, conservationists have withdrawn their claim for \$96,000 in legal fees and expenses in connection with a negotiated settlement of a lawsuit over Idaho water quality laws.

The Wetlan, policy analyst for the Idaho Conservation League, said the claim was withdrawn Tuesday. Victor Sher, an attorney for the Sierra Club Legal Defense Fund, Inc., submitted the claim for legal fees and other expenses he said were incurred in filing and then negotiating a settlement to a lawsuit against the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

Conservationists filed the action because Idaho wasn't complying with the federal Clean Water Act. The suit forced the state to draft a plan to protect streams, lakes and wetlands from pollution from such general sources as farming, timber and mining.

City Council approves corrections plan

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — With two opposing votes, the St. Anthony City Council has approved a proposed lease to the Department of Corrections can use the former Fremont General Hospital building as a prison work camp.

The state has agreed to re-roof the building at an estimated cost of \$80,000, but the amount of in-kind services the state would provide in lieu of cash rent has been reduced, City Attorney Jack Hoopes said.

Instead of a five-man crew working 40 hours a week, the state would provide the city a three-man crew, which cannot displace city workers.

The West revisions were approved in a 4-2 council vote Tuesday night. Councilmen Boyd Yancey and Scott Kamachi voted against.

BSU gets good accreditation report

BOISE (AP) — Boise State University has received high marks from the Northwest Association of Schools and Colleges in an accreditation report that noted much progress since a similar report five years ago.

President John Keiser said Thursday the university's accreditation has been renewed until 1994. The review team said the school has made considerable progress in addressing areas of concern since the 1984 accreditation, particularly in the hiring of female faculty and administrators, the increase in research by faculty and addition of graduate programs.

Boise resident dies in Utah crash

TOOELE, Utah (AP) — A University of Utah student from Boise, Idaho, died when his car rolled and landed upside down in the Great Salt Lake, the Utah Highway Patrol says.

"Authorities said the driver, Jeffrey B. Watson, 21, was pinned in his vehicle under water after he lost control. The car was traveling in excess of 100 mph at the time of the accident," said UHP Trooper Brad Clayton.

Ms. Tirrong, 21, was in a car that missed a curve on Idaho 21 about seven miles north of the Ada County line, police said Wednesday.

The car veered off the road and landed upside down in a creek, Idaho State Police said.

Scientist disputes Chernobyl danger findings

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A Ukrainian scientist who left the Soviet Union after the Chernobyl nuclear disaster questions its government's response and estimates of the resulting death toll.

"Nobody will repeat this mistake in the United States, I hope," said Vladimir Nesterenko to a Wednesday meeting of scientists in Idaho Falls.

They are members of the Instrument Society of America, as well as health physicists. Some work at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory nuclear site.

When Chernobyl's No. 4 reactor exploded April 26, 1986, it spewed 152 metric tons of materials into the sky. It also spread radioactivity over Scandinavia, Eastern Europe and parts of the Soviet Union.

But at first, the Soviet government said little about the mishap. People ate food and drank milk as normal, not knowing these products could be contaminated, he said.

In Kiev, 80 miles to the south, the city's 2 million residents hid away from the radioactive fallout. But

many of the 100,000 people closer to the reactor lived in wooden summer homes, and had no chance to hide.

Three years later, some farmers have returned to their old houses, but some residents have never come back. Tourists are not allowed into the area.

"Still it's like a dead city," Nesterenko said. "It's a very sad picture."

Nesterenko, then an employee with the Soviet Union's energy department, arrived at Chernobyl in May 1986. A nuclear chain reaction continued at the damaged reactor which gave off a "terrible heat" that hampered workers. In October 1986, the reactor was buried in concrete.

Nesterenko later had a chance to leave the Soviet Union.

"I took a tourist trip on a cruise ship and I did not come back," he said.

He left with an array of scientific data on the accident. Looking at the results, he questions the Soviets' estimates that 31 people died of radiation exposure after the blast.

Coeur d'Alene attorney appointed to state Senate

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Coeur d'Alene attorney David Davis is the new state senator from District 2, succeeding John Stocks, who resigned to take an education job in Wisconsin.

Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday appointed Davis, 38, to fill the State's vacancy in the Senate. The term runs until December of next year, when all 126 state legislators start new terms.

The district covers Kootenai County. Stocks was elected in 1988 and served only in the 1989 session before resigning effective Friday.

"Denny Davis" will be a tremendous addition to the state Senate," Andrus said, in announcing the appointment. "He shares my commitment to a quality, properly educated educational system and a strong economy that produces good jobs."

"I know that we will be able to count on his support on issues that are important to children," the governor said, in a prepared statement.

He also has a deep commitment to maintaining Idaho's quality of life.

Andrus said Davis had the strong endorsement of the District 2 Legislative Committee, which submitted his nomination.

It was the third appointment to the Idaho Senate within a few weeks, all of them Democrats. Andrus said he didn't expect that to have an impact on the party's hopes of erasing the 23-19 GOP margin in the Senate in the next election.

It is no secret that we have recently lost some able members of the Idaho State Senate, but in every case we have come forward with talented and committed replacements," he said.

Davis is a partner in the law firm of Hax and Davis in Coeur d'Alene. Another partner, Jay Cox, is on the state Board of Education.

Davis is a Fruitland native and has degrees from the University of Idaho.

Silver City's historic buildings offered to residents

BOISE (AP) — The owners of old buildings in the historic Owyhee County town of Silver City will have a choice in January to buy the lot where they sit, the Bureau of Land Management says.

The BLM will hold non-competitive sales of the 59 lots in the old mining town between Jan. 16-30, said Connie Kingston, Owyhee County families took over the old buildings as summer cabins and have been paying property tax on them.

BLM Advisory Council on Thursday. "It is a non-competitive bid at market value," she said. "They will have one shot." If they do not comply, they will be trespassing on U.S. property.

The town declined from its gold rush days of the 1800s to a ghost town in recent years. Many Owyhee County families took over the old buildings as summer cabins and have been paying property tax on them.

But they now have to buy the lots from the federal government.

The lots run up to about one-half acre and are lost between \$350 and \$700. All have some kind of building on them, Kingston said. Paying property tax is the proof required to take over the land, she said.

The town is on the National Register of Historic Places. By giving the property owners a stronger stake in Silver City, they will help maintain the historic value of those buildings, she said.

In other matters, Kingston said the NISCO DeLamar Co. has submitted plans to the BLM to create an open-pit gold and silver mine on Florida Mountain west of Silver City. The proposed Stone Cabin Mine would feature conventional ore milling and a cyanide heap leaching operation, while disturbing about 250 acres of the mountain.

Former head joins university to study, teach

MOSCOW (AP) — Former University of Idaho President Richard Gibb will teach two seminars, conduct research and help with a number of other projects at the Moscow school this coming spring, university officials say.

"It's the equivalent of a full-time teaching load," Academic Vice President Thomas Bell said Wednesday.

For the past semester, Gibb said he has been away from the campus much of the time to avoid imputing on his successor, Elisabeth Zinser. She took over as president in late July.

Gibb said he has been preparing for his return to the classroom since officially stepping down after 12 years as president. He visited eight other land-grant universities and helped with a project to improve teaching of mathematics and the sciences in public schools.

"It isn't a matter of dusting off your old notes and starting from there," he said of his preparation.

Gibb is making \$52,500 a year as a distinguished professor of higher education. He reports directly to Bell.

During the spring semester, Gibb will teach a graduate seminar in higher education administration and another seminar on policies in agricultural economics, Bell said.

The former president also will serve on doctoral candidates' committees and provide guest lectures in some courses in the College of Education; conduct research in agricultural economics and help out in the College of Agriculture's farm management public service program.

"If you had a player as dominating as Willie Mays, he would be a four-million player in my opinion," Reich said. "A player as spectacular as Willie Mays in a big market, who could do that much for a team — let me just tell you this: If Willie Mays came along today for a five-year deal, he would sign in the 20s, I'd guarantee you that."

If Mark Longston is worth \$3.2 million, how much would Brock Feller get if he pitched today? Would Lou Brock get more than Rickey Henderson? Would Eloy Face make more than Mark DeRosa?

"I'd like to have a base salary of 2 million, 2.5," Feller said the day after Davis agreed to his record deal for \$13 million over four years. "And bonus clauses for every win over 15 plus attendance clauses. Hopefully, it might run to 3 million, 4 million if I performed."

Injury prone Tudor signs 1-year deal with Cardinals

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Pitcher John Tudor, frequently disabled in recent seasons, signed a one-year contract Thursday for a guaranteed \$450,000 with his old team, the St. Louis Cardinals.

The left-hander, disabled most of last season and 1987, became the third free-agent pitcher signed by the Cardinals in the past three weeks. The Cardinals signed Bryn Smith on Nov. 28 and Frank DiPino on Wednesday. Tudor will receive \$450,000 in salary and signing bonus for 1990 and could earn an additional \$900,000 in performance bonuses. Last season, he was paid \$1.1 million by the Los Angeles Dodgers. Tudor's agent, Stephen Freyer, said his client was very interested in pitching for the Cardinals again. "From the get-go, he wanted to go back there."

He probably could have gotten a better deal with one of two other clubs, but St. Louis is where he wanted to be," Freyer said. Tudor, with a 105-68 career record, is one of three pitchers the Cardinals hope can rebound from injuries. Danny Cox and Greg Matthews are the others.

Tudor helped lead the Cardinals to the World Series in 1985 and 1987, but his injury problems began in 1987. He was on the disabled list from April 20 to July 30 after New York Mets catcher Barry Lyons collided with him in the Cardinals' dugout and broke fractured a leg. The 35-year-old left-hander was traded to the Dodgers for first baseman Pedro Guerrero in August 1988.

Guerrero went on to lead the Cardinals to RBIs in 1989 and finished third in voting for the National League's Most Valuable Player award. Tudor went on the disabled list with an elbow injury and missed nearly all of last season. Tudor pitched in six games at the end of the season for the Dodgers and had a 3.14 earned-run average in 14 1/3 innings.

Gottfried fired after Pittsburgh falls in rankings

PITTSBURGH (AP) — University of Pittsburgh coach Mike Gottfried, whose bowl-bound Panthers fell out of the Top 10 after blowout losses to Notre Dame and Miami, was fired Thursday, according to several broadcast reports.

Radio station WTAE, WTAE-TV and KDKA-TV reported that Gottfried was asked to resign Thursday by Athletic Director Edward Bozick, but refused. Bozick then reportedly fired Gottfried,

who never had a losing record at Pitt but failed to restore the national prestige the school enjoyed under former coaches Johnny Major and Jackie Sherrill.

WTAE-TV reported an unidentified Gottfried assistant confirmed the firing.

There was no word on whether Gottfried, who was given what was described as a lifetime contract in April 1988, would coach the 23rd-ranked Panthers against Texas A&M in the John Hancock Bowl on Dec. 30 in El Paso, Texas.

Gottfried's 26-17-2 record is nearly identical to that of predecessor Foge Fazio (25-18-3), a former Pitt assistant who also was fired after four seasons.

Pitt's consistent inability to beat nationally ranked teams under Gottfried led him to be labeled as "Mediocre Mike" by several columnists. Pitt is 7-3-1, but was beaten 45-7 by No. 4 Notre Dame, 24-3 by No. 2 Miami and 16-13 in the final game by No. 18 Penn State. The Panthers also tied West Virginia 31-31 after trailing 31-9 with 10 minutes to play. Gottfried was heavily criticized after he ran three straight plays up the middle and set up for a tying field goal with 2 1/2 minutes remaining rather than play for a victory against Penn State. The Lions then drove the length of the field to kick a last-minute, game-winning field goal.

Some oppose the lower basin states taking precious water rights Proposal to lease Colorado River water renews fears

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A proposal to lease surplus Colorado River water is rekindling old fears of lower basin states taking precious water rights.

These fears in the past have undermined various proposals for the states in the upper Colorado River Basin — Utah, Wyoming, Colorado and New Mexico — to temporarily lease their surplus water to the rapidly growing cities in the lower-basin states of California, Nevada and Arizona.

The upper-basin states are afraid that once San Diego, Phoenix and Los Angeles get control of the water, they'll refuse to give it back.

The latest idea has the support of former Govs. Scott M. Matheson of Utah, Ed Herschler of Wyoming and Bruce Babbitt of Arizona.

"This deserves an examination," said Matheson. "It will take time, careful education and evaluation."

The new plan is being promoted by the Resource Conservation Group (RCG), a Colorado partnership that hopes to earn a profit by acquiring a large pool of water in the upper Colorado River Basin and leasing it to customers in the lower-basin states.

The former governors have been hired by RCG to help prepare and win political support for the proposal.

Roland Robison, director of the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation's Upper Colorado Region, said he's interested in this new plan.

"We've reached a state where we need to take a serious look at

better ways to utilize our water," he said.

D. Larry Anderson, director of the Utah Division of Water Resources, said he and the representatives of other upper-basin states are waiting to see a written proposal from RCG before taking a position on the plan.

"We're keeping an open mind," he said.

Gerald R. Zimmerman, executive director of the Upper Colorado River Commission, said Western water officials "have been, at best, skeptical of the concept of marketing upper-basin water to the lower-basin states."

The plan was first discussed publicly Nov. 16 during a meeting of the Upper Colorado River Commission's legal and engineering committee in Albuquerque. RCG is expected to present a detailed written proposal to the commission in January.

Kent A. Borchard, vice president of RCG, said at the November meeting that his company is interested in acquiring two types of water.

First is unused water in upper-basin reservoirs.

For example, Herschler said as much as 50,000 acre-feet of surplus water is available in Wyoming's Fontanelle Reservoir. This is enough to supply the annual needs of some 200,000 to 250,000 people.

The second type of water sought by RCG is that being used to irrigate low-value crops in the upper basin.

Borchard said RCG proposes to

enter into water purchase contracts with a large number of ranchers, but only take an individual rancher's water every third year.

By drying up a third of the ranchers annually, RCG officials believe they can provide a dependable water supply to the lower-basin customers without destroying the agricultural base of the communities in which they are purchasing water.

While drying up one-third of the ranches each year would decrease agricultural production, Borchard said it would have "no significant impact" on rural communities.

The rancher selling his water "may potentially make more money in the year that the water is taken than he would make in the years that it isn't taken."

"So, his actual money available in the local community would be greater under this plan," he said.

RCG officials offer an incentive for the upper-basin states, too. They pledge to place an unspecified percentage of their profits into an escrow account for the construction of state water development projects.

RCG officials declined to discuss the quantity of water they planned to offer to lower-basin states or the price of that water.

They said, however, that they expected to make a "reasonable return on investment" from the transaction.

Borchard stressed that the leases would be temporary and the upper-basin states could get their water back when they needed it.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — In a decision Solomon might admire, a judge Wednesday authorized Mrs. Santa Claus to share equal gift-giving Christmas rights with her famous husband, and declared their sleigh "community property."

Counties group concerned about proposed waste legislation

LEWISTON (AP) — The Idaho Association of Counties has raised questions about whether counties would be able to afford a solid waste management bill proposed by state Rep. Deanna Vickers, D-Lewiston.

In a letter to Mrs. Vickers dated Nov. 29, Association Executive Director J. Charles Holden and Tony Poinelli, the group's deputy director, said they were concerned about her plans to incorporate a recycling

provision in her bill.

However, Mrs. Vickers said Wednesday that the IAC officials may be misinterpreting the issue. By clarifying it, she said, she hopes to retain the organization's support when she brings the measure to the Legislature for a second time next month.

A similar bill stalled in committee during the 1989 session.

Mrs. Vickers' bill comes in

response to federal environmental regulations, set to take effect in 1991, that will escalate the cost of running landfills. ASU's facility, many small landfills may close and counties may resort to regional facilities.

Mrs. Vickers' plan calls for the state to spend \$1 million during the next two years to help local and regional groups establish plans to meet the challenge.

In those plans, local officials

would spell out how they will reduce the amount of waste generated, increase the amount of recycling or waste reprocessing and recover energy from waste. The plans would rely upon landfills for waste disposal only as a last resort.

But the IAC letter contends that may impose too many requirements on some counties.

"Our concern for mandating recycling is based upon a consensus that a successful recycling program requires a large enough population,

the letter says. "It is important to establish the cost and demonstrate the effectiveness of the program before imposing it on all the counties."

Holden and Poinelli added that markets for recycled waste are unstable. Without stability, recycling efforts will fail, they said.

"At this time, counties are making substantial investments in closing landfills and developing new sites," the IAC officials wrote. "Counties are unable to raise additional funds for these new requirements which are

already mandated. The imposition of further requirements will have enormous consequences on county budgets and operations."

Mrs. Vickers said the letter did not necessarily mean the IAC was withdrawing its support for her legislation.

"I consider them very important allies in any solid waste issue because the counties are statutorily responsible for the disposal of solid waste," she said.

Official criticizes fertilizer firms for backing down on Alar issue

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Environmental policy should be guided by science, not emotion, the head of the nation's Agricultural Marketing Service said as he criticized fertilizer distributors and manufacturers for backing down on the Alar pesticide scare.

"It's a sad day when Jane Fonda and Meryl Streep set environmental policy," while farmers — the ultimate environmentalists — sit idly by," Daniel Haley said Wednesday in a speech at the Far West Fertilizer and Agricultural Association annual convention and trade show. "We should live and die by science."

Haley, administrator of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's marketing service, ripped the National Resources Defense Council, a group that used actress Streep to announce last February that apples tainted with Alar could cause cancer in children. Apple inventories soon rose, a federal bailout was enacted and Uniroyal Chemical Co. voluntarily pulled Alar off the market.

The manufacturer and growers should have held firm to scientific evidence that showed insignificant levels of harm from Alar, Haley said. As a result, consumers have forgotten the agricultural chemicals provide large volumes of inexpensive, pest-free food, he said.

"These chemicals were meant to be toxic ... and kill targeted pests," Haley said.

The former director of the California Department of Food and Agriculture said the agriculture industry needs a base of statistical evidence to refute claims made by NRDC and others.

But one state official attending the convention said the data is often conflicting.

"We can get scientists all at the same table, discussing the same problems, and each of them has different data," said James Combs, administrator for the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. "It's difficult to know whom to believe."

PRESTON (AP) — Costly federal environmental regulations may force a fifth of all Idaho service stations to close and another 20 percent to stop selling gasoline, an official with the Idaho Petroleum Council says.

Dave Mabe, executive director of the council, met Wednesday with local officials and businessmen. He said 10 percent of the newest service stations in Idaho meet new Environmental Protection Agency standards for underground storage tanks.

But the rest, he said, will have to close, quit selling gas, or need outside funding to come into compliance.

Several groups said Idaho businessmen should not be required

Jack Barraclough, a hydrologist with EG&G, a contractor at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, said although the same environmental standards apply in each state, groundwater contamination differs. Bulgarians jeer outside Parliament, shout down party leader

SOFIA, Bulgaria (AP) — More than 50,000 of Bulgaria's newly vocal citizens jeered and whistled in the square outside when Parliament decided Thursday it could not legally repeal the Communist monopoly on power for another month.

New party chief Petar Mladenov, who has promised reform, tried to address the crowd later and was shouted down.

"We will do our best to meet the demands of the people for democracy!" he called out. The crowd responded, "We don't want you!"

He shouted back: "We want to assure you of our responsibility for the fate of Bulgaria, that we all want democracy! If you do not believe us, this could lead us to tragedy!"

The crowd's answer: "Resign! Resign!"

About half the crowd in the square had heeded a call to disperse from Zhelev, an opposition leader, by the time Mladenov and other officials emerged from the building.

Mladenov rose to power when Todor Zhivkov, who ran a Stalinist state for 35 years, was forced out Nov. 10. He has promised dialogue

with independent groups and free elections by May.

On Wednesday the policy-making Central Committee voted to relinquish the party's leading role, as parties elsewhere in Eastern Europe have done.

Parliament approved a Communist Party motion Thursday to discuss removing Article 1 of the constitution, which guarantees party supremacy, but members said action could not be taken immediately.

Stanko Todorov, the speaker, said the constitution requires that any motion to change must be voted upon between one and three months after it is made.

While the members deliberated inside, the crowd in the square chanted "We are here!" and "Come out! Come out!" Some formed a human chain around the building.

More protesters arrived. Deputy speaker Atanas Dimitrov went out and accepted a resolution from Zhelev outlining demands for reform: abolition of the party's lock on power, talks with the opposition and free elections.

It was the same manifesto approved Sunday at a cheering, snow-swept rally of 50,000 people

in the heart of Sofia.

At the three-day meeting that ended Wednesday, the Central Committee accepted the essence of the demands.

Alexander Dimitrov, a parliamentary deputy, challenged the decision to postpone a vote on the party monopoly.

"If we are talking about a democratic society, (people will) ask what we are about if we don't repeal Article 1," he said. "If our electorate outside is to respect us, the first step is to cancel Article 1."

Dozens of deputies took the floor, a new experience in a chamber where hands had been raised automatically for so many years to approve Zhivkov's orders.

Membership changes also are on Parliament's agenda, which means Zhivkov's son, Vladimir, and Miiko Balev, a close associate, probably will lose their seats. The party expelled them Wednesday.

Members also are to consider removing clauses on anti-state activity from the penal code and passing new laws on assembly and association. Original plans were for a two-day session, but it could extend into the weekend.

After the agenda was adopted Thursday, speaker Todorov declared the assembly should end its practice of voting unanimously by show of hands. "Voting without thinking" had been harmful, he said.

"The people ... require us to do

Family enjoys 1st holiday in West

WEST BERLIN (AP) — Christine Eckermann remembers that in East Germany, "you had to make a decent one."

Eckermann, her friend, Uwe Buschard, and her six children have few regrets about coming West on Monday.

In good spirits, they talk about how they'll bring Christmas to their temporary home: two rooms in a shabby, former hotel requisitioned for refugees by the Red Cross.

Eckermann and Buschard, both 30, don't have much spare room in a roughly 218-square-foot space they share with three of the children at night.

But amid the beds, baby crib, scuffed hotel chairs and bargain-basement wardrobe, there will be a tree with ornaments and their presents.

"We're going out in a Christmas touch," Eckermann said, sitting in the shabby building in a central West Berlin residential neighborhood, where about 50 refugee families live. "The Red Cross also will be giving out presents."

"I'm not going to be homesick," said the former factory worker. Her friend agreed.

A few blocks away, West Berlin's Kurfuerstendamm shopping street is aglow in ornamental lights, a lavish display of wares for West Germany's traditional season of expensive presents and big family dinners.

Though Eckermann and Buschard may not be top-notch Western consumers yet, he has landed an electrical engineering job with a monthly take-home pay of about \$110. And his food and lodging provided by the Red Cross, the couple also benefits from West Germany's generous family support programs and Eckermann's alimony payments.

"I assume, if we pay the Red

Cross something for room and board, it won't be very much. Otherwise, we're doing fine," she said.

Christmas Eve has always been a family feast for Eckermann and she's confident it will remain that way. Unlike East Germany's new travel freedom, she said she expects her mother to come over for the celebration.

Eckermann and Buschard packed up the children and moved to West Berlin the day after the Communist authorities opened the Berlin Wall on Nov. 9.

She and Buschard, who divorced his first wife in 1984, had a four-room apartment in suburban East Berlin, but they were not happy.

"It was on the sixth floor, with no elevator, no balcony, cracks in the walls — just the way they build in the east," she said.

"No playground, just other apartment buildings all around. I waited seven years to get that apartment."

A strong Protestant tradition has survived in East Germany despite 40 years of Communist control, with Christmas marked in public and private as it is in West Germany.

But it's not the same, Buschard said.

"By now, stores (in East Germany) don't have presents anymore. A little chocolate Santa Claus costs six or seven marks (\$3.35 to \$3.95), then they later rewrap them to sell as Easter bunnies," he said.

"Packing for toys is so gray over there," added Eckermann.

Eckermann's children — three boys and two girls aged 2 1/2 to 14 — are not shy about their wishes. Six-month-old Samira, the couple's first child, sleeps peacefully in her crib.

Ronny, 11, sporting a New York Yankees baseball cap, wants a bicycle. "Christmas will definitely be better this year," he said.

E. Germany pressured to drop secret police

EAST BERLIN (AP) — Reform activists scored another victory for democracy Thursday by pressuring the government into abolishing the hated secret police agency that tried to suppress their peaceful revolt.

The decision to shut down the Office for National Security came out of negotiations between Communist leaders and opposition groups, and amid increasing threats against secret police officials by citizens angry about previous excesses.

The Interior Ministry said threats and attacks against secret police have increased at an "alarming rate," and wanted East Germans against trying to take the law into their own hands.

Also Thursday, West German Economics Minister Helmut Haussmann met with Communist

Premier Hans Modrow and the two sides agreed to set up a joint economic commission and broaden cooperation.

Haussmann said more than 40 percent of West Germany's booming industries have expressed interest in expanding their businesses into a reformed East German economy.

The Interior Ministry said posters have appeared on factory walls calling Communist Party and secret police officials "traitors who deserve the death penalty."

In Dresden, about 50 people dragged one man out of his car and tied a towing cable around his neck, shouting "Communist swine, we'll hang you!" the ministry reported in a statement carried by the official ADN news agency.

A lynching was prevented by a

man who managed to bring the crowd under control, the report said.

Elke Guenther of New Forum, the largest of East Germany's pro-democracy groups, praised the dissolution of the hated "Stasi" secret police as a concession that may ease some of the mounting tension.

"This is not just an advance for the opposition, but for all of society," she said.

Ms. Guenther said the secret police had harassed leaders of the reform movement until several weeks ago, when the swelling force for democratic change managed to force the ouster of Erich Honecker's 18-year, hard-line leadership and burst open the door to the West.

The State Security Ministry that ran the hated secret police already

had been downgraded to the National Security Agency and about 10,000 agents had been sent to work in the industry.

Dozens of soldiers stood guard around the massive gray concrete secret police headquarters in East Berlin, searching the bags and boxes of those entering and leaving the building after the decision to shut down the service was disclosed.

A spokesman in the press office of the security agency said the government would divide the agency's responsibilities among other ministries.

"This decision is another consequence of the round-table talks," government spokesman Wolfgang Meyer said at a news conference.

Former officer admits murder under orders

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — A former police officer pleaded guilty Thursday to the murder of an anti-apartheid activist, saying he belonged to a police assassination squad and acted on orders from superiors.

Activists for years have suspected the existence of police death squads, but Butana Nofemela's statement marked the first time anyone confessed in court to serving on such a unit.

In another development, recently freed African National Congress leader Walter Sisulu said the government "will try to drive a wedge between his jailed colleague, Nelson Mandela, and militant black leaders outside prison."

Sisulu, a co-defendant of Mandela's who was freed in October after 26 years in prison, said he was surprised 40 years of Wednesday's meeting between Mandela and President F.W. de Klerk. But Sisulu said the talks did not contradict the ANC's position that conditions are not yet right for negotiations with the government.

The government always wants to drive a wedge between him and leaders outside," Sisulu said in a radio interview. "We are quite aware of that and I think Mr. Mandela is very much aware of that."

Michener writes novel on 'Caribbean'

MIAMI (AP) — The riots on St. Croix that followed Hurricane Hugo, and the racial unrest that threatens this city today, grew from centuries-old seeds sown in a paradisaical region as detailed in James A. Michener's latest novel, "Caribbean."

The Pulitzer Prize-winning author spent three years traveling among the "chain of lovely jewels" and researched more than 400 books to put together a 667-page novel that chronicles more than six centuries of civilization and destruction in the region.

"The idyllic portrait is only partly true," said Michener, 82, as he and his wife, Mari, prepared to set sail on a five-week cruise to the islands he described in his book.

"There were undoubtedly fine black-white relationships and many were friendly ... and yet each one of the islands had eight or 10 insurrections," he said. "There's a dichotomy there that I think we all are engaged in."

Michener explores the contradictions of the region using his patented blend of fact and fiction. Historical figures such as Christopher Columbus, Adm. Horatio Nelson, Fidel Castro and Gen. Toussaint L'Ouverture, who outfought French, Spanish and British armies in what is now Haiti, brush against imaginary characters that range from a Mayan priestess to a Jamaican Rasta.

How the Caribbean islands can be so beautiful and yet so violent is the central question of the book. In scene after scene, men and women of ambition build dreams, only to be crushed by tyrants.

"In the short run, brutality always wins; it takes longer for amity to prevail," he writes, describing how the Carib Indians cannibalized the primitive Arawaks, who as the islands' first residents were satisfied with planting vegetables and watching the sun set each day.

The message resonates throughout the island's history, demonstrating the legacy of harsh colonial rule provides both a charm and a curse for the islands of today. Michener draws clear lines from the slave rebellions to contemporary scenes in which poverty-stricken blacks prey on tourists, even though the visitors provide desperately needed cash to their island economies.

"The history of this land, and of all the islands Spain has captured in this lovely sea, will involve the slow and even reluctant admission that the big black man-down-the-hill-as-a-son-of-a-bitch says a rather forward-looking 16th century priest of Michener's invention, ruminating on the atrocities Columbus ordered against Indians, and the oppression his descendants would force on slaves.

Michener, a lifelong Quaker, says he grew to love and fear for the people of the islands during his research, which brought him to back streets and poorer areas American tourists rarely see on their Caribbean vacations.

"I see people beating their brains out to figure out what they're going to do for money," said

Michener, who has several characters suggest all the islands would prosper if the United States inflated the price of Caribbean cane sugar.

But because the U.S. sugar industry won't allow it, the region is headed for revolution, or worse, according to a Haitian-American professor who flees her island as a child and returns the same way Michener did this week, as a guest lecturer on a cruise ship.

"So we stagger along toward a disaster whose timing we cannot predict, but whose coming is inevitable. We're a fleet of magnificent islands, lost in the sun," she says in the book.

Michener also examines Miami, the destination of refugees from every wave of unrest in the area, through the eyes of a Cuban-American doctor trying to reconcile his two cultures.

The doctor admits that he and other white Cubans secretly despise the Cubans who came to Florida later in the 1980s. He is beautiful, because many of the newcomers are black. And yet he despairs when his white, non-Latin friends suffer "Hispanic Panic" and flee to Latin Beach.

Michener, who traveled to Havana in search of a sugar plantation to describe in "Caribbean" and co-wrote "Six Days in Havana" as a spin-off of the larger novel, also sends the doctor to Havana on a mission from President Reagan to discuss normalizing relations between the United States and Cuba.

The issue is considered incendiary in South Florida's Cuban exile community, but Michener's feelings are clear.

"Miami, perched at the tip of a great continent, striving to retain its Anglo-Saxon character, and Havana, located on the edge of a glorious island and determined to protect its Spanish heritage. ... They should have enjoyed a symbiotic relationship of mutual reward."

He blames the Castro revolution for making intercourse between the two natural neighbors impossible, "to the grave detriment of each."

Michener has published 36 books since winning the 1947 Pulitzer Prize for "Tales of the South Pacific." And despite a quintuple coronary bypass operation in 1986 and a hip replacement the next year, he plans to keep working, as a "Professor Emeritus Emeritus" at the University of Texas.

"I'm feeling good, I'm a little unsteady on my pins, but I take a long walk, every night," said Michener, who swears he hasn't decided what the subject of his next book will be.

'Miss Daisy' takes top Griffith Award

NEW YORK (AP) — "Driving Miss Daisy," Bruce Beresford's movie based on Alfred Uhry's Pulitzer Prize-winning play, has won the D.W. Griffith Award for best movie of 1989.

Morgan Freeman, who portrays the elderly chauffeur of an eccentric Southern Jewish matron in the movie, was named best actor, and Michelle Pfeiffer received the best actress prize for her role as the singer who perks things up for Beau and Jeff Bridges in "The Fabulous Baker Boys."

The annual awards, given out by the National Board of Review, were announced Wednesday.

"Driving Miss Daisy," which also stars Jessica Tandy as Daisy Werthan and Dan Aykroyd as her son, is the story of the 25-year relationship between Miss Daisy and her chauffeur-woman into the fabric of change in the New South.

NEW YORK (AP) — Frankly, many may not care very much. But it is the 50th anniversary of some of Hollywood's greatest movies, beginning with "Gone With the Wind."

Those who do care, however, are in for a nostalgic treat. Publishers, never shy about commemorating an anniversary of any sort, have gone all out for this admittedly special year.

A simple listing of the films made in 1939 that have become classics would make a book in itself, which is about what Ted Sennett has done in "Hollywood's Golden Year" (St. Martin's Press, \$29.95). There's "Gone With the Wind," of course, but also "The Wizard of Oz," "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington," "Stagecoach," "Wuthering Heights," "Gunga Din," "Knute Rockne, All-American." Barr looks for vengeance in 'She-Devil'

HOLLYWOOD — In "She-Devil," the feminine mystique meets its match. As Ruth, the dumpty malcontent whose accountant husband Bob (Ed Begley Jr.) leaves her for Mary Fisher (Meryl Streep), a famously feisty author of romance novels, Roseanne Barr swaggers onto screen and wreaks ungodly revenge. Her mission has rabble-rousing mass appeal. She's intended as a humorous stand-in for all the women who have ever been rejected in favor of someone younger, shapelier, bluffer.

Review

In her TV series "Roseanne," Barr's roly-poly bulk isn't played for virtuosic and vengeance the way it is here. Beneath the wisecracking, she's soft and sensual on that show, and her big, edgy bear of a husband played by John Goodman, is a perfect counterpart — his bluster is as transparent as hers.

In "She-Devil," Barr's stridence is unimpeded, and director Susan Seidelman encourages our identification with her solitary fury. But Seidelman also can't resist scoring points against Ruth. She encourages our physical repulsion to the character, and so we are continually subjected to immense, looming close-ups of Ruth jutting her pudgy face at us (She has a large mole on her up-

per lip, and more than a hint of mustache). Her unattractiveness represents women's worst fears of how their philandering husbands view them, but Seidelman appears to be on the razzing. As feminist polemic, "She-Devil" is dubious indeed.

Are there two actresses further apart than Roseanne Barr and Meryl Streep? The high anticipation for this movie is largely based on their pairing. But, except for an early sequence where they first meet at a book party at the Guggenheim Museum — Ruth, in her floral print dress, accidentally spills wine on

Mary Fisher — they hardly have a moment together.

The gloriously scathing 1983 novel upon which the film is based, Fay Weldon's "The Life and Loves of a She-Devil," does not allow for much interplay, either, and, in literary terms, the separations work (It also won in the 1986 A.E. BBC-TV miniseries of the novel). Ruth's guerrilla missions require her to be at a distance they are more fun that way, and more invidious.

But it is a waste to have Barr and Streep in the same movie and then set them to shadow-boxing. We want to reveal in the loony clash of

opposite acting styles, by Barryman and her screenwriters. Barry Strugatz and Mark R. Burns, haven't shaped the material accordingly. A few fantasy confrontations might have helped, because the film, even at its most "realistic," is such a hot-pink, high-camp fantasy anyway.

The funniest sequences in the movie take their cue from this camp floridness. Everything about Meryl Streep's stony and full of feminine filigree; she has created herself in the self-adoring image of her own romantic heroines. But, of course, it's all such an elaborate act.

Thanks to Ruth-the-fantasy bottoms out, and Ruth and Bob's children, and Mary's unwanted decrepit mother (Sylvia Miles), intrude on Mary's seaside Long Island estate. Mary's demureness snags. Her fragile fealtory voice begins to bark with annoyance. Streep may surprise audiences with her come zing here, although she was funny in her brief, explosive scene as Lillian Hellman's friend in "Julia," and slyly hilarious, too, as the lawyer in "The Seduction of Joe Tynan."

Streep is such a studied, meticulous actress that, at times, her performance seems like an impersonation of funniness rather than true funniness. But she is so adroit that it's tough to tell the difference. Playing high-style knockabout comedy comes naturally to Streep, or at least it comes naturally to her performer's sense of craft.

Begley at first dubious about 'She-Devil' role

LOS ANGELES — When Ed Begley Jr.'s manager first suggested the actor was being considered to co-star in a comedy with Meryl Streep and Roseanne Barr, Begley was dubious.

"The calls continued over the weeks, and Begley remained skeptical. When a script was reported imminent, he told his manager, 'Good. You know, I've got that little letter hole in my door. You put the script right through that little slot when you get it.'

To Begley's astonishment, the script, "She-Devil," arrived from Orion Pictures.

"One day I was set to do a videotape here in L.A. It was sent to (director) Susan Seidelman in New York. She apparently liked it and wrote to Meryl she liked it. Then I met with Susan Seidelman and I liked her and she liked me. The next thing I know, I was working on the picture," he recalled.

Begley was cast as an ambitious accountant who leaves his slovenly wife (Barr) for the self-enchanted author of romance novels (Streep). Barr then becomes the title role, cooking up diabolical plots as revenge on her faithless husband and his willful temptress.

Thus Begley appears throughout the film with both stars, who meet only briefly. Critics have marveled that he has so continually been heretofore hidden on the screen behind accents and heavy dramatics.

"She's done great comedy work over the years on the New York stage and Yale and drama school. I remember seeing her in the lanky, straw-haired actor. People who were fortunate enough to see that know her well in the world of comedy. She'll do more; she's great. I don't think there's anything she can't do."

Begley said her comedy often broke him up on the set, "but I got my revenge: I beat her at Scrabble, often."

About Roseanne Barr: "It was her first motion picture, and she was wonderful to work with. I think she did a terrific job and hopefully she'll do more. She certainly has conquered the world of television. You can't do any better than she's done, going against a show like 'Cosby' ('The Cosby Show') and doing well. 'I've seen the show quite a bit."

It's constantly funny and insightful. I think if television again, I'd like to do that."

"Until 'She-Devil,' Begley was best known as the smart-talking Dr. Victor Ehrlich on "St. Elsewhere," which brought him Emmy nominations during each of his six seasons on NBC. He has also played character roles in films such as "The In-laws" with Peter Falk and Alan Arkin, "The Accidental Tourist" with William Hurt and Geena Davis and "Scenes From the Class Struggle in Beverly Hills" with Jacqueline

Bisect.

Begley grew up in the San-Fernando Valley during his father's heyday as a top character actor in films (Academy Award, supporting actor, "Sweet Bird of Youth," 1962). Begley Sr. made no attempt to influence his son's choice of career, but the

boy knew at age 10 that he wanted to act.

"I know what it was, going in," he remarked in an interview. "I knew there would be autographs requested; I knew everything that went with it. I can't have the excuse that some actors legitimately have."

Gross proves there is life after sitcoms in Twain's trip back to Arthur's times

By CONNIE PASSALACQUA

"Is there life after 'Family Ties'?" Well, feel my (beating) heart!" Michael Gross saves the interviewer's breath by rhetorically asking himself the question he must get every time he talks to the press. For Gross, who played father Steven Keaton on the hit sitcom for seven years, likes to talk.

Since the poignant farewell episode last spring, Gross has worked non-stop on other projects. He is determined to play different types of roles. "I got into the business because of the kaleidoscope of humanity," he says. "Gross' first twist of the kaleidoscope away from the world of the Keatons finds him in legendary, sixteenth-century England as King Arthur in an ersatz remake of Mark Twain's "A Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court" (Monday, Dec. 18, NBC). The Connecticut Yankee, a middle-aged industrialist played by Will Rogers and Bing Crosby in the 1931 and 1949 movie versions, respectively, is this time played by Keshia Knight Pulliam (Rudy on "The Cosby Show"). Says Gross, "In Keshia, the story has a new slant, because you're looking at Arthurian England through the eyes of a child. She expects Camelot to be a fairy tale. But it isn't! There's great

deprivation of the peasant class and a real disparity between the lives of the nobility and the lives of the peasants. There's the inherent unfairness of someone who's born into a class system and must remain in that position for the rest of their lives. So an excellent comment is made here by casting the role with (Keshia)."

Gross' regal role remains similar to the Arthur of the original Twain classic. "When someone came up with the idea of (my playing) Arthur," Gross recalls, "I said, 'Ooh, ooh, this is gonna be fun with a capital F!' Actually, here Arthur is demystified and humanized. I look at it as the education of a king." Gross feels that Arthur, a commoner who became king when he pulled the legendary sword Excalibur from the stone, "isn't reigning terribly well. I chose to play him as a man who isn't in touch with what's really going on in his kingdom. It's a real Reagan-kind-of thing. What's going on in the White House? What's going on beyond the moat?"

Little Karen Jones (Pulliam's character) leads Arthur on a tour of the kingdom to reacquaint him with his subjects, and she helps to thwart a plot to overthrow him by magician Merlin (Rene Auberjonois) and the evil Morgana (Jean Marsh). In making the TV movie, Gross embarked on

his own journey to Hungary. "I thought we were going there to work in a fine, old castle. Well, I get there and I find out my 'castle' is really in a studio! Actually, this 'castle' has been used in many other projects and offers magnificent, fully decorated rooms — like the Great Hall. Keshia's big problem in Hungary was that she couldn't find anyplace to get a good hamburger."

Gross' next role (which he calls "tres bizarre; tres, tres bizarre") is as a survivalist in "Tremors," a movie produced by "Aliens" co-producer Gayle Ann Hurd. "My character has every gun ever made and keeps shooting them," Gross says. "He's about as violent as Steven Keaton was non-violent."

Gross adds that he welcomes the image change because "even though I loved 'Family Ties,' it was like chicken. I love eating chicken, but I don't want to eat it every night after seven years."

James sees room for growth in role

In describing his character of Blake Stevens in "As the World Turns," Peter Francis James calls him "a Republican businessman" and then sits back and grins, waiting for it to sink in. Actually, Blake is just that, a man who knows what's required of him to make it up the ladder of success without skipping any rungs and without faltering.

"There's a certain amount of amoral, not immoral, but amoral activity in the business world and Blake knows what's expected of him. As a black man in that arena, he makes some concessions which perhaps aren't expected of others but he is nobody's lackey, not even Lucinda's. I find my character interesting and I see that he has a wide potential for growth."

Peter's parents are both lawyers and his upbringing, in a suburb north of Chicago, was privileged (his exact word). He feels absolutely blessed that his parents instilled a sense of fair play in him and his five other siblings. The six James children all proved to be achievers, but Peter is the only one who opted for the life of an actor. His acquaintance with acting began in junior high and continued throughout his high-school days. Actually, Peter's original plan after high school was to go right into pre-law and one day join his parents in their chosen profession. However, after enrolling in college, he began to have withdrawal symptoms about acting. He was totally surprised that it should affect him in that manner. However, being wise beyond his young years, he decided to listen to his inner thoughts and find out what one does in order to become a good actor.

"I knew that I was interested in becoming a classical actor and that meant Shakespeare and the Greeks, so I asked around and found out that the Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts was one of the best schools and I applied. I had to do an audition and to my amazement, I was accepted. My time at RADA in England was wonderful and I probably could have stayed in England and worked but I had to come back home, to the United States. I worked in a number of regional theaters over a period of 10 years and came back to New York to

There are no ego games and the whole cast is very talented. I am happy that my first significant experience on a soap is a positive one and I look forward to the months and years to come."

NBC slates news report with drug miniseries

BURBANK, Calif. (AP) — NBC Entertainment president Brandon Tartikoff said Monday a news tie-in would follow the network's miniseries on the murder of DEA agent Enrique Camarena.

The first episode of the three-part, six-hour "Drug Wars: The Camarena Story" on Sunday, Jan. 7, will be followed by a special report anchored by Tom Brokaw, Tartikoff announced.

"There's no more important subject in America today than the war on

drugs," he said. "I think this miniseries will focus that nation's attention on it. It will make an important statement."

"Drug Wars," based on the book "Desperados" by Elaine Shannon, tells of the murder of Camarena of the Drug Enforcement Administration in Mexico on Feb. 7, 1985, and the effort to bring his killers to justice. It stars Steven Bauer as Camarena, Elizabeth Pena as his wife, Mika, and Craig T. Nelson and Treat Williams as drug

agents.

Tartikoff was asked about the appropriateness of using NBC News to support an entertainment program.

"I don't think it's any different than when we did an AIDS tie-in after Early Proctor's report on abortion after 'Roe Vs. Wade,'" he said. "I think viewers have a clear idea of the separation of news and entertainment. I think it will be controversial, but the controversy won't be over confusing viewers."

Cosby leads NBC to another victory: says he wants to return next season

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Bill Cosby, who says he wants to come back for another season at NBC, led the Nielsen television ratings again for the week ended Dec. 10, according to figures released Tuesday.

Cosby has told NBC that, contrary to published reports, he was not considering taking his top-rated comedy series to CBS as part of the network's attempt to buy Carsey-Werner Co.

"The Cosby Show" was first, closely followed by NBC's "Cheers." ABC's "Roseanne" was third.

NBC won another sweeping victory in the A.C. Nielsen Co. survey with an average rating of 14.2. ABC was second with 11.9 and CBS third with 11.3. A rating is the percentage of the nation's 92.1 million homes tuned to a show.

The network is also ahead for the season. The ratings: NBC 15.0, ABC 13.3, CBS 12.2.

The Top 10 holds no surprises. NBC's entire Thursday schedule, plus two comedies from Saturday, are included. ABC has one show and CBS has two.

NBC slates news report with drug miniseries

BURBANK, Calif. (AP) — NBC Entertainment president Brandon Tartikoff said Monday a news tie-in would follow the network's miniseries on the murder of DEA agent Enrique Camarena.

The first episode of the three-part, six-hour "Drug Wars: The Camarena Story" on Sunday, Jan. 7, will be followed by a special report anchored by Tom Brokaw, Tartikoff announced.

"There's no more important subject in America today than the war on

drugs," he said. "I think this miniseries will focus that nation's attention on it. It will make an important statement."

"Drug Wars," based on the book "Desperadoes" by Elaine Shannon, tells of the murder of Camarena of the Drug Enforcement Administration in Mexico on Feb. 7, 1985, and the effort to bring his killers to justice. It stars Steven Bauer as Camarena, Elizabeth Pena as his wife, Mika, and Craig T. Nelson and Treat Williams as drug

agents.

Tartikoff was asked about the appropriateness of using NBC News to support an entertainment program.

"I don't think it's any different than when we did an AIDS tie-in after 'Early Frost' or a report on abortion after 'Roe Vs. Wade,'" he said. "I think viewers have a clear idea of the separation of news and entertainment. I think it will be controversial, but the controversy won't be over confusing viewers."

Cosby leads NBC to another victory; says he wants to return next season

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Bill Cosby, who says he wants to come back for another season at NBC, led the Nielsen television ratings again for the week ended Dec. 10, according to figures released Tuesday.

Cosby has told NBC that, contrary to published reports, he was not considering taking his top-rated comedy series to CBS as part of the network's attempt to buy Carsey-Werner Co.

"The Cosby Show" was first, closely followed by NBC's "Cheers." ABC's "Rosanne" was third.

NBC won another sweeping victory in the A.C. Nielsen Co. survey with an average rating of 14.2. ABC was second with 11.9 and CBS third with 11.3. A rating is the percentage of the nation's 92.1 million homes tuned to a show.

The network is also ahead for the season. The ratings: NBC 15.0, ABC 13.3, CBS 12.2.

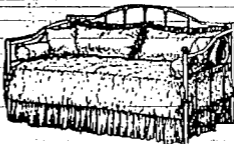

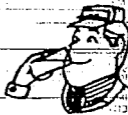
