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## U.S. forces mop up, press search for Noriega

### Nerve center total wreck

PANAMA CITY, Panama — The "Comandancia" complex that was the nerve center for Manuel Antonio Noriega's regime is a dank and gutted ruin, bristling with U.S. soldiers trying to root out the last snipers of the dictator's forces still roaming the city.  
A group of reporters, escorted into the area for a look at the sites of the heaviest fighting in the U.S. invasion, were hustled "back into the van" with a warning from soldiers: There was occasional sniper fire from a high-rise apartment building that makes a backdrop to the comandancia.  
The entrance to the area, a poor section of Panama City called Chorrillo, was littered with the wreckage of three cars. Across the intersection, someone had painted on the bottom of a billboard: "Yanqui go home."  
Soldiers backed a tanklike personnel carrier into the burned-out remains of a laundry, commanding a view of a nearby intersection. Up the street a hydrant gushed water into the gutter, adding to the stench of the burned and soaked rubble. Streets were filled with twisted corrugated

metal roofing, burned stocks of weapons, pieces of blocks and tile. High-rise buildings were deserted and large portions of the area had been reduced to blackened rubble and twisted pipes.  
Outside the comandancia on an iron fence was strung with colored lights for Christmas. Walls were blackened or pocked with 50 caliber bullet holes, or simply blown away. The roof was twisted and iron bars hung limply from the windows. Said one soldier: "There was an awesome amount of firepower put on this place."  
At the edge of the rubble of the several blocks around the comandancia was a grisly scene from the early fighting: A compact car, mashed to one-third its height with a body sprawled across the remains of the front seat.  
Soldiers explained that when the U.S. assault moved into the area, a patrol found the auto with its occupants handing out AK-47 assault rifles to Noriega fighters. One U.S. armored personnel carrier just rolled over the car, a soldier said.  
Thirty feet down the street was a similarly squashed hulk of another small car.

**PANAMA CITY, Panama** — U.S. troops ducked occasional gunfire in mop-up operations Thursday and ringed the Nicaraguan and Cuban embassies with armored personnel carriers in case the elusive Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega was inside.  
Thousands of U.S. servicemen swept into the capital on the second day of their huge offensive, encountering some shooting by Noriega-loyalists and hunting for missing Americans believed to be hostages.  
Looters swarmed the streets like locusts. Thousands, from children to grandparents, stripped store shelves down to bare wood on Central Avenue.  
Panama officials said U.S. troops had military control of Panama City. They said most units of Noriega's Defense Forces had fled into the jungles, and U.S. troops may be ordered to follow them.  
They reported 21 Americans killed, 208 wounded and four missing in two days of fighting.  
Figures for Panamanian casualties were hard to come by. An exhausted emergency

room doctor at Santo Tomas Hospital, the one nearest Panamanian Defense Forces headquarters, said 80 dead were brought in and "about 1,000" injured were treated.  
"He could give no breakdown of civilians or military. The civilian paramilitary "Dignity Battalions" and some of Noriega's elite units, such as the Machos de Monte, wear civilian clothing.  
China on Friday came to Noriega's defense, saying U.S. troops invaded because the Panamanian strongman opposed U.S. attempts to gain permanent control over the Panama Canal. The official Xinhua News Agency called it a "rather novel and sensational" cliché that America sent troops to bring to trial "what it called a 'drug trafficker'."  
In Managua, the Nicaraguan capital,

officials ordered troops and armored vehicles to encircle the U.S. Embassy because of its embassy here was surrounded by American forces.  
Defense Secretary Dick Cheney said in a TV interview that reinforcements sent to aid the troops based in Panama may be able to leave "within a few weeks." Earlier, officials said they hoped the action could take three days.  
A Spanish photographer was killed and an English photographer was injured Thursday during a crossfire between U.S. troops who mistook each other for Panamanian forces in the Marriott Hotel parking lot, other journalists said.  
New President Guillermo Endara, sworn in by a Panamanian judge, as U.S. forces invaded at midnight Tuesday, announced an 18-hour curfew that ends at 6 a.m. Friday. It had no immediate effect on the crowds.  
Scattered bursts of gunfire came from the poor neighborhood of San Miguelito and from a central hotel district taken over temporarily by armed Noriega supporters. They did not appear to be seeking

### Pentagon fears long-term Panama fight

WASHINGTON — Pentagon officials fear actions by Noriega loyalists — taking Americans hostage, perhaps, or attacking the Panama Canal — could force U.S. troops to transform their "mop-up" operation into a long-term guerrilla engagement.  
The nation's military leaders were looking at Thursday's Day 2 of "Operation Just Cause" as crucial in the battle for control of the Central American nation, said one high-level military official.  
The fear is that unless Manuel Antonio Noriega's supporters are captured and dispersed, they could continue to threaten Panamanian citizens and the lives of the 35,000 Americans living in the country, or at the least offer a serious disruption to any return to normalcy at the canal and

elsewhere, officials said.  
"This is a key day because it will determine whether the Panamanian Defense Forces and the dignity battalions are consolidating, or whether they remain as pockets of resistance that can be cut out and neutralized," said the highly placed officer, who spoke on condition he not be identified by name.  
"Asked how long he believed the strike force of thousands of U.S. troops will remain in the country, the official said, "I don't think anybody here knows."  
Remarking that the forces were going house-to-house in their efforts to clean out the remaining Noriega loyalists in Panama City — and could be forced to search the countryside in search of the deposed general — the official said, "It's not just a mop-up

operation anymore."  
Asked if U.S. military units might well be facing a protracted guerrilla battle in urban and country areas in their search for Noriega, the official answered, "Yes. It very well may be."  
President Bush, asked at a session with reporters whether he believed the intervention would become a guerrilla operation, said, "I don't think so," adding that Noriega has been stripped of his communications capabilities and the support of military forces that would allow him to mount an opposition in the countryside.  
"He hasn't been in a jungle in a long time. And it's tough living, and he's been living high off the hog of the Panamanian people. And so we don't expect" a kind of mountain guerrilla organization to arise reminiscent of that led by Cuba's Fidel Castro in the 1950s.

### Bush says U.S. will stay until job is complete

WASHINGTON — President Bush vowed Thursday that American troops would secure Panama "as long as it takes" to capture Manuel Antonio Noriega.  
"He said the loss of American lives in combat has been worth it" and "ended the U.S. commitment open-ended."  
Expressing sorrow over the deaths, Bush said "military casualties are a burden which a nation must endure until its presidents have to face up to, but which we can never accept."  
Several congressmen called for the troops to be brought home quickly, though one — Rep. Les Aspin, chairman of the House Armed Services Committee — said some might have to remain as policemen until "Christmas eve a year from now."  
Bush said the operation was "open-ended as far as going after Noriega, open-ended as far as restoration of order in Panama."  
A day after ordering 9,500 fighting men into

### Scientists find master gene

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. — Scientists believe they have discovered the master builder of the immune system.  
It is a gene that allows disease-fighting blood cells to recognize and remember an ever-changing menagerie of germs.  
The gene ceaselessly reshuffles the genetic library inside newly made white blood cells. This way the body can use a limited amount of genetic material, or DNA, to concoct endless assortment of antibodies capable of zeroing in on bacteria and viruses that it has never before encountered.  
Researchers described the work as an important discovery that should greatly improve understanding of how the body arms itself against infection. Although it does not immediately open up new ways to treat disease, it may someday allow medicine to fine tune the body's weapons to improve health.  
The gene — dubbed the recombination activating gene, or RAG-1 — was discovered by David G. Schatz and Marjorie Oettinger, graduate students at

the Whitehead Institute for Biomedical Research. They described their work in Friday's issue of the journal Cell.  
"It's one of the top 10 or 20 discoveries in the history of immunology," commented Dr. Michael Lieber of Stanford University. "It deals with the basic way that our bodies make antibodies in the most fundamental sense."  
The researchers believe that the gene makes all or part of an enzyme called recombinase, which cuts and splices bits of DNA. These scraps of genetic material are assembled into new genes, which in turn provide the danger-sensing radar for B cells and T cells, the body's principal warriors against invading microbes and cancer.  
B cells work by secreting uniquely shaped chemicals called antibodies. Occasionally, an antibody encounters a microbe with a spot on its surface that is a mirror image of the antibody. When this happens, the antibody latches onto this spot, known as an antigen. This marks the invader for destruction by other soldiers in the immune system.

### Romanian forces fire on crowds

VIENNA, Austria — President Nicolae Ceausescu sent tanks into the streets of Bucharest Thursday and security forces with submachine guns fired on young demonstrators protesting his iron rule, killing at least 13 people.  
Peter Tomice, a Yugoslav journalist in the closed country, said an armored vehicle crushed two students, other students rushed to their aid and security forces opened fire, killing or wounding about 20 people. He said other people were shot down, but he did not have a casualty count.  
Clashes were reported in at least two other cities Thursday. A Polish couple interviewed by Hungarian television said that in the eastern city of Arad, soldiers fired on about 3,000 demonstrators.  
They said they saw some students

ordered out of a college, made to stand up against a wall and shot dead. When the alleged shooting occurred was not clear.  
American diplomats counted at least 13 people killed by automatic weapons fire and said more were possible, according to State Department spokesman Richard Boucher.  
Jonathan Lamb, first secretary at the British Embassy in Bucharest, told British Broadcasting Corp. TV that two of his colleagues had seen the bloodied bodies of eight or nine young people with head wounds, and guessed there could be many more.  
It was the first violence in the capital since hundreds, possibly thousands, of anti-Ceausescu demonstrators reportedly were shot and killed by security forces last weekend in the Transylvanian city

of Timisoara, 500 miles from Bucharest.  
By 3 p.m., the official Yugoslav news agency Tanjug and the Bulgarian state news agency BTA said from Bucharest, firing had stopped. Elderly people urged troops not to act against the protesters, BTA said.  
By early evening, however, Yugoslav radio and Tass reported more bursts of automatic weapons fire.  
"The streets are becoming more and more animated," Tass said, adding that Romanian state TV had not begun its customary broadcast at 8 p.m.  
The demonstrators "are surrounded by Romanian army soldiers, special troops armed with truncheons and plastic shields and security forces," Tass said. "Choppers are patrolling over the city."

# Panama's new leaders meet legislators

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — Panama's newly installed leaders met with members of the last legislative assembly and other public figures under heavy U.S. guard Thursday, trying to gain control of the country and declaring a dusk-to-dawn curfew.

Gunsshots echoed in the streets outside as President Guillermo Endara and Vice Presidents Ricardo Arias Calderon and Guillermo Ford presided over the meeting, which contained the raucous spectacle of U.S. soldiers in jeans, sweatshirts and other civilian clothes sprinkled throughout it.

In his speech to an audience of about 200, Endara held out an olive branch to followers of deposed dictator Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega.

Endara, his vice presidents and members of the audience sang with special feeling their national anthem and one line in it, "We have finally achieved our victory."

and hauling away goods from virtually every shop in the city.

The new government, by the accounts of most foreign observers, overwhelmingly won an election on May 7, but Noriega cancelled it and continued his rule.

At the time, Endara and Ford were beaten by members of one of Noriega's "Dignity Battalions," units which are still wreaking havoc in the aftermath of the U.S. military takeover that started early Tuesday.

Two close aides of Endara, jailed by Noriega over a month ago, appeared suddenly at a podium at the start of the session and were embraced by Endara and his two vice presidents to a warm ovation.

The two men, Miguel Batista and Ivan Mojica, were spirited away by Noriega's police.

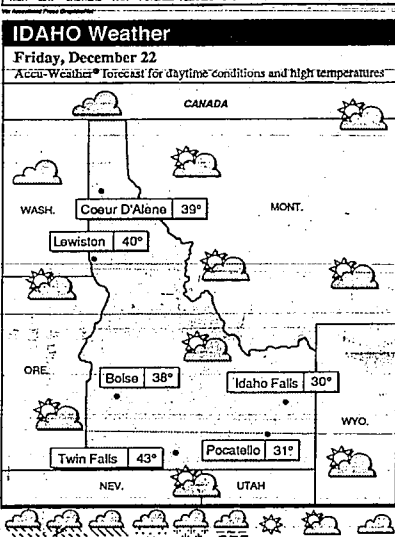
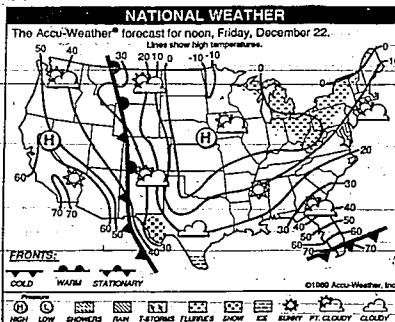
The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 51 degrees at Mountain Home. Idaho Falls and Ketchum reported the coldest at 6 degrees.

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confrontation with U.S. forces, however, but vandalized and looted hotel rooms and stole cars.

In Chitre, 100 miles southwest of Panama City, a Panamanian Defense Forces officer said the garrison of about 200 men had not been attacked.

"We are with ... (Noriega) until the last bullet. We are ready for the gringos. We are waiting for orders. If we have to fight we will fight. If we have to withdraw, we will withdraw," he said.

In David, 230 miles west of Panama City and 30 miles from the border with Costa Rica, residents who by telephone said Noriega supporters controlled the streets and very little looting had occurred.

A U.S. military source at Southern Command said Noriega's brother-in-law, Lt. Col. Aquilino Steiro, was involved with some of his men in La Chorrera, 25 miles west of Panama City.

It was unclear if Noriega remained in control of the Defense Forces. In a clandestine radio broadcast late Wednesday, he called for a guerrilla war against the United States.

U.S. officials said 59 Panamanian soldiers had been killed and 66 wounded. Officials said American troops had taken about 1,500 prisoners in the first 36 hours of armed combat.

After rumors spread that Noriega or other members of his high command were in the Nicaraguan and Cuban embassies, U.S. troops surrounded the missions.

Israel television reported from Jerusalem that Noriega had been spotted within the last 24 hours on the luxurious island of Contadora, 40 miles south of Panama City. It was Noriega and Mike Harari, a former Mossad intelligence agent and top Noriega aide, were planning to escape to Nicaragua.

In Managua, Foreign Minister Miguel D'Escoto said: "We have ordered exactly the same thing as we have done here, around the U.S. Embassy, as was done in Panama City."

He said he warned U.S. charge d'affaires John Leonard "any consequences resulting from the movement of Panama City will have the same consequence here."

U.S. troops were reported searching for American hostages. Defense Department spokesman Pete Williams said reports surfaced of Americans held against their will.

Bush. Defense Secretary Dick Cheney, in a separate session with reporters, said that while major resistance from the Panamanian military had been broken, he could "not rule out any possibility" of such things as terrorist attacks.

"It's still a situation in which there is ongoing conflict and firefights," said Cheney said, acknowledging the possibility of individual terrorist strikes and the taking of U.S. hostages.

"Clearly, we haven't resolved all the potential situations where there may be Americans being held," Cheney said. "We are aggressively working every one of those cases."

He said in comments to a group of news service and newspaper reporters.

At a public briefing on Thursday, Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams struck a positive note, saying that "the organized resistance" has ceased at this point and that the "objective of the day" was to support the establishment of a democratic government under the newly sworn and U.S.-supported president, Guillermo Endara.

Williams did acknowledge, however, that there was "some conflict continuing" with some members of the Noriega's "dignity

batallions" — the "his armed supporters in civil garb — that remain in Panama City." At the briefing, Army Gen. Tom Kelly, the joint staff's director of operations, advised reporters that there was no time estimate available for when the increased U.S. forces might withdraw.

"We don't have a time line," Kelly said. "They will be there until the job is done."

Rear Adm. Ted Sheaffer, who also briefed reporters, said U.S. military officials still think Noriega is inside Panamanian borders.

"We believe he is in the country," Sheaffer said. "Bill S. Robert Kasten, R-Wis., expressed concern over a long-term engagement.

"If there is an engagement, middle and end to American military involvement it is far better than having this thing dragging out over weeks and months," Kasten said.

Another senior Pentagon official, who also spoke privately, said he was confident that the specialized U.S. military units on Noriega's trail will ultimately be successful.

"But they'll get him," he said. "Noriega is noisy, blustery, and has such a big ego that it is nearly impossible for him to travel incognito," the official said.

Panama, to join more than 13,000 already stationed there. Bush said the military mission "is not over, but pretty well wrapped up."

Bush made his remarks at a White House news conference at the hour a military aircraft arrived in Dover, Del., bearing the bodies of some of the Americans killed in Panama.

The Pentagon said 21 troops had been killed in action, 208 were wounded and four were missing.

Bush said that with Noriega on the run and Endara, in place, "the government is beginning to function and the man (Noriega) controls no forces. And he's out. But, yes, I won't be satisfied until we see him come to justice."

Asked if the attempt to catch Noriega had been worth the loss of life, Bush said, "I have to answer: Yes, it has been worth it."

U.S. officials said 59 Panamanian soldiers had been killed and 66 wounded. Army Lt. Gen. Tom Kelly said U.S. troops had taken 1,500

prisoners, most of them regulars from the Panamanian Defense Force.

The Pentagon said the U.S. offer of a \$1 million bounty for Noriega had prompted many calls but no results.

"We've had a lot of nibbles," said Rear Adm. Ted Sheaffer, an intelligence specialist for the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

"Suddenly the number of reports on his location has gone up dramatically," he said. "A lot of it turns out to be very bogus."

Bush said, "That's 31 million bucks I'd be very happy to sign the check for," and he joked that Noriega's wanted poster "will be in every post office in town."

Noriega is under indictment in the United States on drug charges. The general dropped from sight and eluded capture as American troops landed in Panama.

# OAS split on move

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Organization of American States suspended its Thursday session five minutes after it opened, as representatives divided on the wording of a resolution to condemn the U.S.-military intervention in Panama.

OAS Chairman Angus Abgett Khan of Trinidad and Tobago said he had been approached by several delegations asking for more time before beginning debate on the resolution submitted Wednesday by Nicaragua. He did not say when the session would resume.

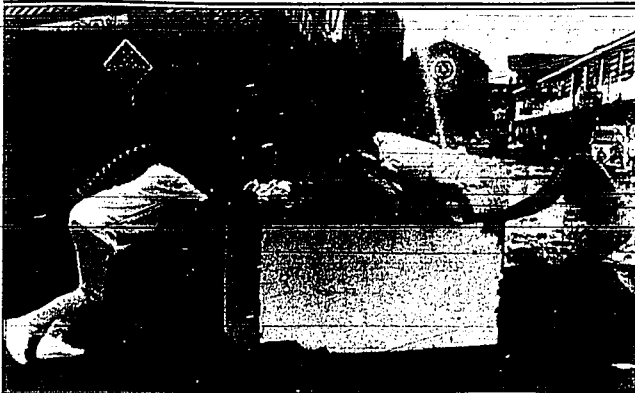
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Panama City residents take advantage of confusion in the city to haul looted goods along a street Wednesday

## Panama City looters open shop with goods stolen from the rich

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — In a shantytown named Brooklyn and in a half-dozen other slums, hundreds of people set up shops on the sidewalks Thursday, with merchandise looted from the rich stores.

They were hawking everything from designer brassieres to French champagne and Gucci watches — all at bargain-basement prices.

The alleys of the slum called Brooklyn were crowded with buyers and sellers, haggling and bargaining, while the wealthy stores on Avenida Espana, Panama City's main thoroughfare, were stripped bare.

All day Wednesday, while fighting raged between U.S. troops and Defense Forces loyal to strongman Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega, mobs out of the dirt-poor barrios invaded Calidonia, Avenida Central, Transmisiona, Supercentros, Almateneos and other stores.

They carried off everything, from TVs and stereos, to cellular phones, mattresses and even huge refrigerators and washing machines, from clothes to designer shoes and Barbic dolls.

Some even set up shop in the doorways of their wooden shacks. Many people deplored the massive robbery and said they were ashamed of it, but for a neighborhood such as Brooklyn it appeared to be a Christmas boon.

Virtually all the residents are without work. They lost their jobs when the U.S. imposed a trade embargo last year, one of a series of Bush administration measures to pressure Noriega out of power, plunging Panama into a severe economic crisis.

"He doesn't have any running shoes for me, but I ordered a pair for tomorrow," a buyer, about 30 years old, explained to a visiting reporter, pointing to one of the stall vendors.

"It'll be only \$5," another vendor nearby said as he draped a girl's dress over his arm, trying to convince a prospective client.

"Too expensive," said the client, a housewife. They stared haggling. She, like almost all Panamanians these days, did not want to give their names.

A small house was filled with women buyers. The owner was selling designer brassieres at \$2 apiece. The buyers rummaged through boxes full of them, looking for their sizes.

At another store, men jostled each other, trying to buy some of the best brand shaving lotions and perfumes, at a fraction of the regular price.

"Look," a young man said, proudly showing a visiting reporter a gold watch. "I bought it for \$20, the salesman didn't even realize it is a Gucci."

A middle-aged matron doing her Christmas shopping was all smiles. "I bought it for \$8," she said, pointing to an imported turkey that costs at least \$40 in regular stores.

But another woman about her age, looking down at the scene from a nearby balcony, shook her head in dismay. "It makes feel like sitting down and crying," she said sadly as a couple of handcars were dragged down the street full of looted merchandise.

## Pentagon: Reporters access hurt

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams said Thursday that "incompetence" explained why U.S. forces invading Panama had allowed only limited access to an accompanying pool of reporters.

"There really is no excuse for it," said Williams when asked why pool members had been restricted largely to interviews with U.S. Embassy officials during most of the first day of the invasion.

Asked why the pool had not been allowed to observe U.S. forces who engaged Panamanian Defense Forces, Williams replied simply, "Incompetence."

"That's my anger coming out," said Williams, adding that Pentagon officials had demanded that the U.S. Southern Command, based in Panama, allow the reporters more access to the fighting.

"We got angry with them in spades," he said.

Realizing that his comments might anger military officers, Williams hastily added: "In a sense, I understand it, because they had an operation going on."

Williams spoke at the close of a news conference at which top military officers also were asked why they had not taken more steps to protect U.S. reporters, who were not members of the pool, from being taken hostage at the Marriott Hotel.

The spokesman and other senior Pentagon officials said the first objective of the invasion force had been to disperse the Panamanian Defense Forces and occupy their base, which they said they accomplished on Wednesday.

## Smithsonian workers safe, awaiting pickup

WASHINGTON (AP) — Eleven people associated with the Smithsonian Institution were reported free but awaiting pickup by U.S. troops a day after Panamanian forces abducted them, President Bush and Smithsonian officials said Thursday.

"They have been released by the Panamanian Defense Forces," said Madeleine Jacobs, a Smithsonian spokeswoman.

## Legal grounds for Panama intervention not airtight

There will be much hand-wringing in the coming days over the legality of the United States' intervention in Panama. The legal gymnastics once again will frustrate those who, for example, wanted international lawyers to shut up during the Grenada invasion in 1983. But there is every reason to weigh the political expediency of such actions against the legal defenses erected by government officials.

Four justifications have been offered by the Bush administration to legitimize this extraordinary operation. They are: to protect American lives, to defend democracy in Panama, to apprehend the indicted drug trafficker Manuel A. Noriega, and to protect the integrity of the Panama Canal Treaty. Secretary of State James A. Baker III described the action as fully in accord with international law. He stressed the inherent right of self-defense under the U.N. Charter.

The first justification, to defend American lives, is premised on hundreds of cases of harassment during the last two years, the murder of a U.S. Marine over the weekend and an intelligence report about a planned urban commando attack on U.S. citizens. As threatening as these actions are, the administration will be hard-pressed to prove that a full-scale invasion of Panama and the installation of a new government there were essential for the defense of American lives. Other alternatives short of invasion (such as evacuating all Americans to U.S. bases) could have been more proportional responses to the threats posed by Noriega's soldiers.

The second justification, to defend democracy in Panama, has enormous popular appeal and moral legitimacy. But most international law scholars agree that the U.N. Charter does not endorse the unilateral use of military force to install democracy any more than it does to promote

other forms of government. Perhaps someday operations to promote democracy will be launched with the approval of relevant multilateral bodies, but that day has not yet arrived.

The pursuit of Noriega, which frames the third justification, is premised on an undisclosed set of legal claims. The Office of Legal Counsel of the Department of Justice has issued three opinions this year that attempt to establish the legality of seizing Noriega or taking actions that might lead to his death. These opinions remain classified and therefore are shielded from the critical scrutiny of legal scholars.

We can glean, though, from press accounts and congressional testimony that the Department of Justice is reaching its opinions on the basis of what might be possible under narrow readings of federal law, but unacceptable under international law. Until these opinions are released to the public, we are similar opinions to the Office of Legal Counsel during the Iran-Contra investigations; the administration's

justification will ring hollow for international lawyers.

The final justification may offer the best case under international law. The United States exercises a panoply of rights and obligations in Panama as a user and guarantor of the security of the Panama Canal. The U.S. Southern Command in Panama is authorized to use military force to meet the danger resulting from an armed attack or other actions that threaten the security of the canal. U.S. forces also are authorized to guarantee the security of themselves, their dependents and their civilian components.

If the canal's operations are interfered with, the United States can use military force to reopen the canal or restore its operations.

Last Friday, Panama's National Assembly, hand-picked by Noriega, approved a resolution stating: "The Republic of Panama is declared to be in a state of war while the aggression (of U.S. economic sanctions) lasts." The Panama Canal Treaty prohibits Panama from adopting or

enforcing any law or decree or taking any action that purports to interfere with the exercise by the United States of its rights under the treaty or related agreements.

There are plenty of provisions in the Panama Canal treaties that prohibit any American intervention in the internal affairs of Panama or any action against the territorial integrity or political independence of Panama.

But other provisions stress the neutrality of the Panama Canal and the obligation of each party to ensure that neutrality. Noriega's state of war could not be tolerated very long if the canal's neutrality were truly to be protected.

Nonetheless, the treaties do not grant carte blanche for U.S. interventions on the scale currently under way.

The coming days will be critical in establishing a lasting legal foundation for this politically momentous action.

I have met several college representatives from around the state, and they all asked where I previously worked.

When I mention Idaho, they say that their education graduates consider Idaho the last place to ever apply to.

School administrators here openly say that they are needing good teachers (and in our case, counselors) and that they are seeking the best from Idaho and Montana, where salaries are so low.

Washington has a program where the state compensates the local districts for the difference it costs them to hire an experienced person versus a beginner, so they have no reason to hire "rookies."

In our opening faculty meeting, the assistant superintendent commented on all the people they hired from Idaho this summer.

I know of at least one other new person in the Wenatchee district who is a native of Burley, and I know of four people within a 10-mile area here who are from Idaho and Montana. And those are only the ones I know so far!

This year, the Legislature required that the school districts in Idaho raise the starting pay to \$16,000 minimum for new teachers. That falls right into place for states like

Washington, as new teachers can go to Idaho to get experience at your expense and then the best can be hired here after they are proven to be good!

I am very worried about the future in Idaho. I left behind many good teachers, parents and students—all of whom are still very dear to me.

It hurts me to hear these kinds of comments made; and it hurts even more to live here and see how true they are!

I hope you will truly consider a consistent effort to upgrade funding for education in Idaho, not just for salaries but for books, computers and materials, too!

The teachers in Washington are considering a statewide strike because their salaries have fallen from fifth in the nation to 21st.

Where does that leave Idaho when teacher salaries there have ranked among the lowest five states in the nation for several years now?

When I first started teaching in Twin Falls in 1973, I bought a new car for \$3,000. My salary that year was \$6,000.

Now that same car costs \$15,000 (the cost has gone up five times), but does a beginning teacher in Twin Falls now make \$30,000? Does an experienced teacher with a master's degree make \$39,000? The answer is "no" to both questions.

How can you expect to keep good teachers without any commitment to them?

The people I saw leave Twin Falls High School for other states in the 15 years I taught there (I spent one year as a junior high counselor, also) were some of the best teachers I have ever known.

That was where our concern began.

Now that I find myself on the outside looking in, my concern is greater than ever. Our teachers today are facing more problems in schools than ever before—drugs, dysfunctional families, teenage pregnancies—and yet the pay is not even beginning to keep up with inflation.

Colleges are finding that more and more students are deciding not to go into education.

So what happens when the good people who are left leave for better paying jobs in neighboring states?

The students and teachers in Idaho deserve more and it is never going to happen until the people are ready to make a commitment to pay more money to improve education.

We pay no income tax in Washington, but the sales tax is 7.5 percent and is applied to services as well as goods. License plates for our vehicles cost four to six times more.

I am willing to pay that kind of money to support education, for it is the future of our nation—and you! It is going to take more than talk to make the needed changes.

**Other certification no panacea**

In response to the editorial about alternative certification, I am writing in defense of the College of Education.

As a prospective teacher in the College of Education at Idaho State University, I would like to refute the misconceptions that teachers are not professionals, that their methods are trivial, and that the purpose of education is to fill the head with isolated fields of knowledge.

The purpose of education is to teach kids to think, read and study and to provide learning experiences.

Learning experiences are not meant to be an end in themselves; rather, they are to exercise and develop cognitive skills such as analysis and synthesis, which results in integrated thought—not isolated knowledge.

I would also like to point out research which supports the benefit of educational training.

A study by Leinhardt, Smith and Greene, 1985-86, found that those with a background in education have "... a better understanding for problems in teaching. They work from integrated principles instead of facts and specifics in each situation.

They are more able to focus attention on being creative and dealing with new problems as they arise. They also waste less class time.

The role of a teacher is also much more than a person with knowledge in a content area.

A teacher must determine how each student learns best, motivate the students, manage and supervise the class, be an effective leader, be sensitive, flexible, and a good listener on the part of the students.

I would also like to add the following points:

1. Japanese students have a very high suicide rate;
2. Curriculum is not always written by experts on learning.

My experience with professors without teaching certificates has been that the ones who care take time to learn effective teaching methods.

Effective methods enhance the learning of content material.

But those who do not think that this is important and it doesn't effect their jobs

any. Effective teaching seems to be optional when a certificate is not required. With certified teachers, there is more accountability for good teaching—not just content knowledge.

For example, a university teacher I had with a Master's degree in the area he attempted to teach was unprepared for students' responses, was unorganized, failed to manage the class effectively and said "as far as" at least 50 times in 15 minutes—which was very distracting.

He has poor teaching methods and probably has just for the 10 years he has been teaching. I learned what not to do from that teacher.

Why should we assume that alternative certification is the panacea for problems in education?

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# U.S. troops encounter fire during searches

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. forces encountered sporadic firing in Panama City on Thursday while trying to recover American hostages, capture ousted strongman Gen. Antonio Manuel Noriega and restore democracy, Pentagon officials said.

There were the three main objectives of the more than 20,000 U.S. troops, who on Wednesday dispersed the Panamanian Defense Forces. A key to restoring order was gaining control of the streets of Panama City, where looting was reported earlier.

U.S. forces were in control of several key points in the city, including the legislative building, said Pentagon spokesman Pete Guillerman. Endara, the new U.S.-backed president, would go there during the day.

Lt. Gen. Tom Kelly, director of operations for the Joint Chiefs of Staff, also said U.S. troops were protecting the Panama Canal against sabotage by Noriega loyalists. He rated the chances for successful attacks as "low — not impossible, but low."

He said all Panamanian bases were

in U.S. hands, although "some shooting" was reported in the city. "It appears there is some resistance that is organized and that isn't," Kelly said. Noriega was not believed to be in command of any units that were resisting, he said.

"We do not think he is effectively in command of anything at this time," he said. Rear Adm. Ted Shearer, an intelligence specialist with the joint staff.

The latest U.S. casualty count stood at 19 killed in action, 117 wounded and one missing. The first American dead was being flown back to Dover Air Force Base in Delaware later in the day.

In addition, the wife of a U.S. serviceman was dead. The woman, a school teacher, was believed killed by fire from Panamanian Defense Forces, said Kelly, but no further details were available.

"We don't think she was shot deliberately," Kelly said.

U.S. officials put the casualty count for Panamanian Defense Forces as 59 killed, 66 wounded.

U.S. forces captured 1,500 Panamanian soldiers, but were unsure how many Noriega loyalists

remained at large. Snipers were spotted clad in the black uniforms of Panamanian special forces, Shearer said.

He reported sporadic fighting, saying "people or the tops of buildings are the kind of thing I'm talking about." Snipers were reported at the Caracol Hotel in the city.

U.S. intelligence was tracking dozens of reported sightings of Noriega, the rate of which increased sharply after the Anticristians offered a \$1-million reward for him, said Williams.

The Pentagon believes Noriega still is in Panama, despite reports that he had fled to Colombia, the Dominican Republic or Mexico, said Shearer.

"The lives of American hostages became a prime concern for U.S. forces as the fighting died down," Williams said there were reports of an unknown number of Americans being held in three separate incidents.

"We take them all seriously," he said. Those held were said to include a group of Smithsonian Institution scientists and John Myerson, a CBS News television producer.

U.S. troops freed 29 Americans and 35 foreign nationals, mostly Panamanians, from the Marriott Hotel in Panama City late Wednesday night, but Williams said a list of the evacuees was not available.

Overall, 35,000 U.S. citizens live in Panama, and "there are Americans scattered throughout the city," said Williams, defending the failure of U.S. forces to protect the Marriott and the Smithsonian installation early in the fighting.

The U.S. plan, completed in the first day of the invasion, was to capture Panamanian bases, including Noriega's headquarters, known as the Comandancia, said Kelly.

The chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Gen. Colin Powell, said that since the invasion began at 11 p.m. MST Wednesday, U.S. troops had collected further evidence of drug trafficking by Noriega.

The troops discovered a large cache of documents in the Comandancia, and they will be studied "for possible use in any trial against Noriega, indicted in the United States on drug charges," said Williams.

### Panama would try Noriega

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The designated U.N. envoy of the U.S.-installed government in Panama said Thursday that if Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega is captured, he should not be extradited to the United States but tried in Panama.

Later Thursday, the Security Council began a new session of debate on the Panama invasion. But it was expected to postpone discussing the thorny issue of which government to recognize — Noriega's or the U.S.-backed government of Guillermo

Endara. Eduardo Vallarino, a self-exiled Panamanian businessman who is the new U.N. envoy, was nominated by Panama's U.N. ambassador by Endara's government, installed by U.S. troops at a military base Wednesday.

Vallarino said Panama's Constitution prohibits extradition. If Noriega is captured by occupying U.S. forces, he said, Panama would protest his extradition to face narcotics charges in the United States.

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## Operations interrupted by snipers

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — Flying bands of Noriega loyalists "getting their last lick" shot from the rooftops, and the U.S. ambassador—predicted—life in Panama will continue to be dangerous for some time.

Continuing flight prevented a helicopter from dropping off a small U.S. media contingent at Patilla Airport. The chopper touched down briefly but was waved off.

Reporters saw American soldiers pressed behind concrete walls and running between buildings near the control tower. Officials said there were snipers on rooftops in the area.

Military officials of the Southern Command confirmed that a journalist had been killed near the Marriott Hotel, but could not say immediately who it was.

However, Spanish ambassador Tomas Lozano said Juan Antonio Rodriguez, a photographer for Spain's largest newspaper, El Pais, was killed Thursday during a cross fire between U.S. troops in the hotel parking lot.

Troops from the 82nd Airborne Division freed 29 U.S. citizens and 35 foreign nationals from the Marriott, where they had been trapped for 36 hours since the military operation began early Wednesday, military officials said.

U.S. Ambassador Arthur Davis, back in Panama after a seven-month absence, predicted there would be retaliation from troops loyal to Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega, who was ousted by U.S. forces.

"I think this is a very difficult time for security because of retaliation," Davis said.

The ambassador left Panama in May, the day after Noriega voided elections observers said he lost. Davis said he was bringing an economic recovery proposal to Panama's new leaders, including the \$700 million in assets freed by President Bush's decision to lift economic sanctions.

Indeed, it was by pretending that Noriega had been killed, U.S. soldiers—bluffed—Panamanian soldiers into freeing two American women held hostage more than six hours in an airport terminal.

Mary Rebhan, 24, of Hollywood, Fla., and Tam King, 23, of Dallas, told reporters they were wearing shields by 30 armed Noriega loyalists who held up in a sweltering customs room at Omar Torrijos International Airport when American forces moved in.

The two women went to the airport Tuesday evening to pick up Rebhan's brother, flying in for her wedding at the end of the month.

"They had us in choke holds for most of the time," Rebhan said. "They made us kneel down and held guns to my back and to her head," King said.

American troops began to arrive in force to take over the airport, but the Panamanians held them off with the women.

"For six hours they made us keep kneeling," King said. "The Americans. They're going to kill us and the children if you don't," Rebhan said.

Just before dawn, the Americans set a deadline of 6:30 a.m. for the men to surrender and told them they were surrounded and that Noriega was already dead. In fact, Noriega's whereabouts was not known.

The Panamanians gave up, leaving the room with the women held in front of them.

# Coming of winter stirs little interest from chilled Americans

Winter began Thursday but almost no one stopped to notice. It was too cold.

The onslaught of record low temperatures that has plagued much of the nation for 10 days sent another throng across the border, closing hundreds of schools from

Montana to the Eastern Seaboard, freezing an Amtrak train in its tracks in North Dakota and threatening Texas' citrus crop.

But the double wallop of frigid temperatures and high polar winds blamed for more than 40 deaths nationwide was expected to slacken after Friday, promising a Christmas that would be merely seasonably

cold, forecasters said.

"We're going to moderate right into Christmas," said National Weather Service forecaster Steve Kahn in Chicago. "Temperatures have stopped falling — they are going to rebound a little bit."

That was small comfort across the Midwest and West, where wind-chills Thursday dipped to as low as

83 below in North Dakota, more than 70 below in Minnesota and Nebraska and 61 below in Illinois.

In Havre, Mont., an overnight low of 43 below broke a record for the day set in 1884. Chicago set a new record with a minus 13, colder than in 1872, when the previous record of 12 below zero was set.

Record lows recorded Thursday also included 20 below zero in Omaha, Neb.; 19 below in Dubuque, Iowa; 17 below in Des Moines; and 7 below in Topeka, Kan.

Weather service officials warned that the subzero temperatures combined with stinging wind could cause frostbite in a matter of minutes.

Chicago police opened station doors to the homeless seeking shelter while waiting for vans to take them to city-operated warming centers. At least 10 people have died of exposure in the Chicago area since the cold snap began, said a spokeswoman for the Cook County Medical Examiner's office.

Among the deaths elsewhere were two elderly Pittsburgh-area women whose space heaters, their only source of heat, were not enough to withstand the cold, officials said. "Basically it means they froze to

death," Deputy Coroner James Gregg said.

Winter officially began at 2:22 p.m. MST Thursday, but it clearly had its own timetable: By mid-morning, hundreds of schools had

been closed in Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, Kansas, Missouri and New York state.

Some school officials said they did not want young children waiting for buses or walking to school.

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## Study shows errors in test for AIDS

CHICAGO (AP) — Six of 13 laboratories gave results that were wrong or incomplete when testing blood for the AIDS virus, a researcher said Thursday.

Laboratories frequently return their results to doctors and hospitals with "so much gibberish on the report that it hides and obscures the data," Dr. Abram Benenson of the San Diego State University School of Public Health said.

He and his colleagues, reporting in this week's *Journal of the American Medical Association*, urged supplemental tests to ensure correct results.

They further suggested that criteria be developed to enable laboratories to lessen the number of "indeterminate" results they report, and say with more certainty whether a person does or does not carry the AIDS virus.

In the summer of 1988, the researchers provided medical facilities with specimens that carried the human immunodeficiency virus.

The medical facilities — hospitals, clinics and a doctor's office — were subsequently asked to submit the samples to the laboratories they generally rely on when testing for the AIDS virus. The 13 laboratories were not told the samples were part of a study.

The medical facilities were all in San Diego County while some of the laboratories were elsewhere in California and in two other states.

Benenson said in a telephone interview that, in normal procedure, most laboratories first test for the virus using an enzyme immunoassay, or EIA, test and, if that test is positive, repeat it again. If the second test is also positive, labs often then use another test — frequently one used by the Western blot — to verify the results.

The problem with the Western blot test, Benenson said, is that it has had inconsistent criteria which made a positive determination a matter of interpretation.

Of the labs 13 reporting back in the study, all reported positive results to the EIA test on the sample that in fact did, carry the AIDS virus.

But, at the next stage in which the positive result is verified by a second kind of test, the 13 labs did not do as well, the study said.

Eleven used Western blot testing to back up the EIA results. Of those, five reported the specimen was positive; five reported indeterminate results, and one lab returned the raw results to the physician and told him to do his own interpretation, the study said.

One of the labs did no confirmatory test, and one used an immunofluorescence test to correctly confirm the positive result.

## Court orders verdict change for convict

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The Florida Supreme Court on Thursday ordered an innocent verdict for a former Army "Soldier of the Year" sentenced to die in the 1978 murder of a young Walt Disney World worker.

The court, in a unanimous ruling, said there was insufficient evidence to convict Robert Cecil Cox, 30, a former Army Ranger. The ruling vacated Cox's death sentence, reversed his conviction and ordered the trial court to acquit him of all charges.

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# Consumer spending rises sharply, shows bright spot in economy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumer spending rebounded 0.7 percent in November from its sharp fall a month earlier, the government reported Thursday, and analysts said it continues to be one of the bright spots in a slowing

economy. "It suggests that while we have some weak areas in the economy, particularly in the manufacturing sector, that the consumer has not turned off completely," said David Jones, an economist with Aubrey

G. Lanston & Co. in New York. The Commerce Department also reported an 0.8 percent increase in personal income in November, but some analysts questioned whether income growth will soon begin to weaken and thus cause a decline in

spending. The report said consumer spending rose at a seasonally adjusted annual rate to \$3.54 trillion, a 0.7 percent increase and the steepest gain since a 1 percent jump last March.

The advance was a rebound from a 0.2 percent decline in October, which was the first decrease since a 0.1 percent dip in September 1988 and the largest drop since a 1.4 percent fall in January 1987.

Consumer spending, which has been a major factor for the economic growth during the first nine months of the year, is watched closely as a barometer of economic health because it accounts for about two-thirds of the nation's economic activity.

## Judge sets Poindexter trial back

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge Thursday delayed the start of John Poindexter's Iran-Contra trial and demanded to see excerpts from former President Reagan's diaries and notes, which Poindexter wants to use in court.

U.S. District Court Judge Harold Greene said, "President Reagan shall produce for the court's ... inspection" by Jan. 7 some of the materials sought by Poindexter. Greene will then determine whether the material is relevant to the criminal charges against Reagan's former national security adviser.

Greene moved back the Jan. 22 starting date of Poindexter's trial until Feb. 20, saying a delay is necessary because of pending issues. These include Poindexter's subpoenas, approved by the court, seeking Reagan's documents as well as his personal testimony at trial.

Greene quashed major portions of Poindexter's motion to examine documents from the former president, but kept in place the most-sensitive sections, those dealing with Reagan's diaries, notes and notebooks.

"The court is not disposed to requiring President Reagan to make wholesale production of documents which ultimately may turn out to contain little or no material evidence," said the judge.

"The obvious answer to this dilemma is an ... examination by the court of the relevant excerpts from the former president's diaries, notes and notebooks to determine whether they contain specific evidence that should be produced," said Greene.

Greene said "legal and historical precedents indicate" that a review by the judge is appropriate "of the presidential papers at issue."

The judge said that he will review the Reagan documents and "render a decision on ... parts of the Reagan diary, notes and notebooks that must be made available" to Poindexter.

Poindexter obtained court approval to issue the subpoena for Reagan's documents by submitting a secret paper outlining what he believes they contain.

## Hunts agree to lifetime trading ban, penalties

DALLAS (AP) — Nelson Bunker Hunt and William Herbert Hunt, whose empire collapsed after an alleged attempt to corner the silver market, have accepted a lifetime ban on trading commodities futures and agreed to pay a \$10 million penalty.

The settlement, reached with the Commodity Futures Trading Commission, will help speed the "brothers' emergence" from bankruptcy protection. The former billionaires filed for Chapter 11 protection because of lawsuits over their silver speculation.

Under the CFTC agreement, announced Tuesday, the Hunts neither admitted nor denied guilt but consented to findings they violated the Commodity Exchange Act by manipulating the price of silver.

The CFTC in 1985 had filed a complaint seeking more than \$50 million in fines from the Hunts.

Bunker Hunt's bankruptcy cleared the end last week with U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Harold Abramson's approval of a reorganization plan. Herbert Hunt's case may end this week.

Under the CFTC agreement, filed as part of the bankruptcy case, the Hunts agreed to pay the \$10 million out of future income, gifts and inheritances once they emerge from bankruptcy.

## Quake hits Alaska

WASHINGTON (AP) — An earthquake measuring 5.2 on the Richter scale occurred Thursday near McGrath, Alaska, the U.S. Geological Survey reported.

The epicenter was about 30 miles southeast of McGrath, and the quake was felt strongly in the McGrath area, according to a survey. Numerous quakes have occurred in this region in the past, it said.

There were no immediate reports of damage or injury, the survey said.

# DOE silent on Research Council report

### Will respond later to a recommendation that SIS plutonium refinery is not needed

TWIN FALLS — A recommendation that could spell doom for an Idaho plutonium refinery garnered no immediate response from the federal Energy Department Thursday.

"DOE intends to produce a detailed response to the committee's recommendations within 30 days," a department press release said.

"That is the official position of the Energy

Department, and officials will make no further comments on recommendations to put the Special Isotope Separation plant on hold," said Will Callicott, DOE spokesman in Washington, D.C.

Response to the report released Wednesday by the National Research Council — research arm of the National Academy of Science — was sporadic and varied.

"The SIS is, and has always been, unneeded," said Liz Paul, executive director of the Snake River Alliance. "It is

time to put it in the bad idea pile along with the nuclear-powered airplane."

The council's report questions the need for additional weapons-grade plutonium for the nation's nuclear stockpile and the need for additional capacity to refine and reprocess plutonium. It recommends postponing plans to build new plutonium-refining facilities.

"To our knowledge, no compelling need for this material has been demonstrated, nor are there currently foreseen uses for the SIS facility after the reactor-grade plutonium

has been processed," the report states.

That statement reflects the position the Snake River Alliance, a statewide environmental group, has voiced since the battle over the siting of the SIS was joined.

"It looks like it'll end up where it belongs, in the junk heap," Paul said. "The program just never could hold water. It was based on pork-barrel politics."

In a prepared statement, Rep. Richard Stallings said, "I have always maintained that the future of the SIS project hinges on

## Solomon pays his debt; civil complaint now moot

TWIN FALLS — No further action will be taken in a civil complaint that sought \$2,400 from a local naturopath because the doctor, James Solomon, has paid the debt.

The complaint sought payment for "naturopathic formulas" and "instruments" that Solomon contracted to buy from a former employee.

The employee died this summer, but her son filed the complaint in 5th District Court on Nov. 30 through an attorney.

Solomon had 20 days to respond to the complaint, and he paid the debt Dec. 1, before he was even served papers, said the attorney, Brit D. Groom. The complaint was dismissed the next business day.

Solomon is awaiting trial on criminal charges of practicing medicine without a license and grand theft by deception.

## Local Army recruiter says that 'No news good news'

TWIN FALLS — A Twin Falls Army recruiter concerned about friends in Panama said on Thursday that "no news is good news."

As long as their names aren't on the casualty lists that the public can phone, they are likely safe, said Michael D. Mitchell, staff sergeant at the Twin Falls Army-Navy recruiting center. Mitchell doesn't know of anyone from the Magic Valley area who is in Panama. Although military troops are busy now, he said that they'd make contact with family as soon as possible.

## BID enlarges its board, chooses 4 new members

TWIN FALLS — The Business Improvement District has enlarged its board of directors and elected four new members to three-year terms, Manager Betsy Florence said Thursday.

# Hero

## Burley man gets unexpected reward for saving woman's life

BURLEY — Panic hit Scott Walter Asson just as he had pulled the woman from the sinking car. He realized he would have to swim them both to shore.

"It just passed before my eyes: I could die," the 21-year-old Burley resident said, recalling a day in October 1988 when he saved a woman's life.

"To this day, I give all my credit to God," he said Thursday. "He helped me. He saved my life. I was just concentrating on Him. That's all I could think about."

Asson was among 20 people honored this week by the Pittsburgh-based Carnegie Hero Fund Commission for risking their lives trying to save others.

Each person honored, 7,405 since industrialist Andrew Carnegie

established the commission in 1904, receives a \$2,500 cash reward and a medal.

It had rained all day Oct. 14, 1988, in Phoenix, Ariz., and roads had flooded. Asson, who had lived there since August, had just turned onto Indian-Bend Road. Tired of driving, he pulled over to let his girlfriend take the wheel, and he watched as events unfolded.

Ahead of Asson, the road had been blocked. Beyond the road block, the road dipped and was flooded from water rushing across it and down a drainage wash, beside a hotel, to a lake.

Meanwhile, Nancy Lippert, 46, was driving home from Scottsdale Community College, where she teaches English. She was heading west, toward Asson, on Indian-Bend Road, the barricade from her direction had been

# Minidoka waits advice on farm building rules

RUPERT — County planning commissioners will wait for legal advice before making any decision on their efforts to gain better control over agricultural buildings.

The commissioners decided this week to delay a decision until they hear from Minidoka County Attorney Charles Creason on the legal standing of an alternative proposal from farmers for some regulation of agricultural buildings.

The proposal is a response to the commission's discussion of changing the county code currently exempting all farm buildings from meeting the Uniform Building Code.

The commissioners have dismissed requiring all buildings larger than a certain size meet the code, which farmers say would be too expensive.

Commission Chairman George Falkner told the five or six farmers at Wednesday's meeting that the commission welcomed their involvement in the issue. "We haven't got a perfect solution yet, but let's get it as near to perfect as possible," Falkner said.

The proposal, from a group of about 15 farmers, would still exempt most farm structures from the building code, but would require inspections for structures used as secondary agri-businesses and initial permits for buildings more than 400 square feet.

County Building Inspector Bill McClung said he favors removing all exemptions, but made a few changes to the farmers' proposal for the commission to consider.

"The exemption would apply only to buildings on property zoned strictly agricultural."

"This could be a problem, some commissioners said, because some farms are on land zoned commercial and industrial."

Building permits would also be required for detached private garages, attached garages and habitable structures.

John Rensburg III, leader of the farmers who drafted the proposed ordinance, said permits shouldn't be required for detached garages because that would include the numerous repair shops farmers use to work on and store farm equipment.

The initial building permit farmers would allow, costing not more than \$25, would be required before construction could start.

The permit would alleviate three of the county's concerns: setbacks and easements and put the new building on the tax rolls, McClung said.

Rensburg said the ordinance would be clearer if it defined a farm, farmer, farm structure and secondary agri-business.

McClung said he did not include these definitions because it was difficult to write them accurately.

Rensburg said he is willing to negotiate on some of the finer differences between the farmers' and McClung's proposals.

McClung repeated his belief that all agricultural buildings should fall under building codes. "I still feel like we are picking out one industry and saying, 'You don't have to comply.'"

# Jones: States need to take more control, and are

TWIN FALLS — The United States is a superpower with an "overextended empire" that has lost control of its money and its resources, Idaho Attorney General Jim Jones said.

Citing drugs and water as issues of primary concern, Jones told about 60 Kiwanis Club members at the Turf Club Thursday he sees a positive change in states taking greater responsibilities.

Despite the fact that the Bush Administration has vowed to win a war against drugs, it doesn't have the money to do so, Jones said, so states will have to do much of the work.

Federal funds to boost law enforcement, develop drug treatment programs and create public awareness of the drug problem have been taken from other federal programs, Jones said. Those who have lost out are not pleased, and the federal government doesn't have enough to go around, Jones said.

"I guarantee you the federal government has overextended itself and states are going

to have to pick up the slack," he said.

Jones wants the state Legislature to make \$1 million available from the general fund next year to help law enforcement fight drugs.

"In my book, it's not a luxury, it's a necessity for better drug enforcement," he said.

Also, he said, western states and the federal government are in the midst of ongoing battle over water rights. The federal government, which has the greatest number of claims in the Snake River Adjudication, wants special treatment and doesn't want to pay filing fees.

"These guys want to freeload off of us," Jones said. "That's the kind of attitude we have to break."

Jones said states should continue to fight to regulate its own water, and a case before the U.S. Supreme Court could ensure that.

And saying the federal government violates more environmental laws than anyone else in the country, Jones said federal programs to protect the environment need to be tailored to each individual state's needs.

# Release of plutonium documents months off

## Fund shift halted

**POCATELLO (AP)** — Pocatello Mayor-elect Peter Angstadt has called a halt to shifting funds from the city's utility accounts to special projects, including the Bamcock Development Corp.

"Diverting money from the water, sewer and garbage revenue accounts not only is questionable, but inappropriate," Angstadt said Thursday.

"There are just too many questions about whether we should be taking those funds. I think it would be best to halt the practice completely," Angstadt said. "The controversy generated about the procedure also is hampering our ability to conduct business."

The mayor-elect emphasized he is committed to continued funding for the BDC economic development, and in the future that appropriation will come from the city's general account.

For the past three years, city officials have used utility funds to finance economic efforts, equipment purchases or street sweeping. About \$250,000 has been spent on those programs in the past year.

Enterprise, or utility, funds, are self-supporting through collections for water, sewer and garbage services.

**RICHLAND, Wash. (AP)** — While the U.S. Department of Energy has announced it will declassify top-secret documents about plutonium production, officials say actual release of the papers is months away.

The documents to be released as scientists at the Hanford Environmental Dose Reconstruction Project request them, Energy Department officials say.

John Till, chairman of the panel overseeing the dose project, said such requests are months away.

"This is so new that I don't know how we'll deal with it at the moment," Till said recently.

The panel does not have any specific documents in mind at the present time, Till said. But they will be particularly interested in any

papers showing how much radioactivity was released at Hanford nuclear reservation over specific periods of time, he said.

Hanford is a federal plutonium production site where reactors have made that key ingredient in nuclear weapons since World War II.

A previous mass declassification of documents in the mid-1980s included startling revelations about past Hanford radiation releases, including a deliberate release experiment known as the "Green Run."

"I'll send him the expected few bombshell revelations from the new documents."

"It's likely a lot of it will be very boring reading," Till said.

Ken Morgan, a DOE spokesman in Richland, agreed.

"You're mostly going to get higher and higher levels of detail," Morgan said. "The outline of what happened is already understood."

That would be in contrast to some recent revelations about past plutonium releases.

A Congressional report issued last week said the U.S. government failed to inform nuclear bomb factory workers after learning in the late 1940s that releases of radiation from the facilities, including Hanford, posed serious health risks.

The report indicated the federal government knew more about health dangers than has been acknowledged.

At Hanford, the report found that

between 1945 and 1951, significant quantities of radioactive particles were found to be leaking from two plutonium chemical separation plants.

The Dose Reconstruction Project is charged with estimating the amount of radiation, particularly iodine 131, that may have reached the public from past Hanford operations.

A separate study by the Centers for Disease Control is looking at rates of thyroid disease in the region since iodine 131 attacks the thyroid.

At the request of Till, Energy Secretary William Watkins in December decided to release documents on plutonium production

and radioactive gas releases from Hanford between 1944 and 1960.

Production figures have long been among the nation's most closely guarded secrets because they could help an enemy estimate the size of the U.S. nuclear arsenal. But Till has said the panel needs the information to accurately estimate radiation doses.

Morgan said the production data will not be declassified and released in one lump in part because of a lack of funding.

The Energy Department in Richland does not have the staff to undertake a mass survey and declassification of 16 years worth of documents, Morgan said.

## Depositions to be taken Hero in Rockland school case

**ROCKLAND (AP)** — Seminary classes by the Mormon Church are being halted this week in Rockland's schools, but that has not stopped a lawsuit by two families over separation of church and state.

Rockland School Board trustees have voted to terminate an agreement in which the church rented space from the schools to conduct religious classes. Those classes will begin again in January in a different location.

Connie and Clayton Brown and their daughter, Joyce Long, and Carol Haynes and her son, John, have filed a suit in U.S. District Court through the American Civil Liberties Union.

They oppose holding church classes in the school, conducting school awards ceremonies in the LDS chapel and putting church information on the school bulletin boards. They are asking for \$100,000 in damages and contend the town is shunning them because of the suit.

The rental agreement came about initially when the LDS ward across the street from the school was closed.

The board also passed a resolution directing all school employees to refrain from proselytizing or encouraging secular religious activities in or on school premises, or at an official district-sanctioned activities.

knocked down, so she proceeded down the dip.

A pickup that had run the eastbound roadblock temporarily blocked the way for a moment, but once the pickup passed Lippert's car, the waves knocked her car off the road.

As Lippert's car slid backward down the wash to the lake, Asson and another stopped motorist jumped out of their cars and ran after it.

After stopping at the hotel to phone 911, Asson ran down a grassy slope to the lake, where Lippert's car sat, front end submerged, 100 feet from shore.

Asson said he immediately tore off his outer layer of clothing and swam to the car, thinking he could simply open the door because the water only reached the sill. He couldn't get the door open.

He swam away, found two rocks to use to break a window and then swam back.

The car was filling with water, and Lippert had climbed into the back seat where there was a 6-inch

pocket of air.

"Her eyes were just huge," Asson said. "She was scared, I could tell."

Asson, knowing that breaking a side window would cause the car to splinter and smash the rear window instead.

"The car just went down so fast," Asson said, and as he pulled Lippert into the lake, he sensed she was panicking, and he did, too.

"I've never been so scared in all my life," he said.

The other motorist, a middle-aged man, tired quickly and was unable to help.

Asson tried to help Lippert to shore the way he had come, but the current wouldn't let him. He realized he needed to make a decision about what to do, and, recalling his father's words to not panic in a crisis, he started to swim with the flow of the current to some bushes about 75 yards away.

"I never felt so much pain," he said. Though not a particularly religious man, Asson concentrated on God and kept swimming.

Asson, who said he was surprised and honored by the award, said he

knew he was being considered but doesn't know who nominated him.

"It was proud of what I did, I felt good. I didn't feel like a hero, I would expect anybody to do that," he said. "I just knew that she was out there and somebody had to do something or she'd die."

The car was never found.

Asson became friends with the other motorist who tried to help, and he said Lippert still keeps in touch.

"I'm just glad there are people like Scott around," she said in a phone interview from Phoenix.

Asson plans to save the award money for now, and either invest it or use it to go to a school in Michigan to learn the business of selling cars. Now living in his hometown of Burley, he sells cars for his father at Bonanza Motors. He hopes one day to open his own dealership in Phoenix.

Asson said he'd relive the day anytime.

"I've always said I'd give my life for anyone," he said. "There's no greater love."

## Idaho fossil may be 'missing link'

**POCATELLO (AP)** — A fossil that may provide the "missing link" in the history of horned dinosaurs sat in an Idaho Falls woman's garden for nearly three decades before it was donated to the Idaho Museum of Natural History, officials say.

The fossil, which involves part of the hip and the first vertebrae of the tail of a small dinosaur, is believed to be 100 million years old.

That makes it the oldest ceratopsian, or horned dinosaur, fossil ever found in the Western Hemisphere.

It now is on display in the

Pocatello museum.

Laverne Sauters discovered the fossil while cleaning up a yard in the Grays Lake area of eastern Idaho.

She kept it in her garden for 27 years, before showing it to an Idaho State University graduate student who told her it might be scientifically significant.

Mrs. Sauters donated the fossil to the museum, located on the ISU campus, where preparator Allen McCurdy spent a year restoring it.

The museum then sent it off to biology and anatomy professor

David Weishampel of Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore to be studied.

Weishampel put its age at 100 million to 105 million years old. All previous ceratopsian finds in the hemisphere have been dated as no older than 80 million years old.

That makes the Grays Lake items could be the link in the history of horned dinosaurs like triceratops in this part of the world, said William Akersten, vertebrate paleontologist at the museum.

"It may not be, but it's enough to prompt us to look for more," he said.

the Department of Energy's success in convincing Congress that there is a compelling need for plutonium.

The report's assessment of the need for plutonium will be an important part of discussions in Congress over the future of the SIS, the Idaho Democrat said. He plans to meet with the council after the holidays.

Rep. John Spratt, D-S.C., chairman of a special House committee on defense nuclear facilities, said in an Associated Press article that the report's conclusion about plutonium supplies, combined with congressional resistance to adding more capacity, make it "very unlikely that the Special Isotope Separation plant will be built."

Sen. James McClure, a staunch supporter of the SIS project, could not be reached for comment, but his press aide said the senator's support for the project has been based on the judgment of the need for plutonium made by the Nuclear Weapons Council.

The council is made up of Defense and Energy Department officials, whose judgment is based on secret information about the demand for plutonium for the nation's nuclear weapons stockpile.

The National Research Council did not have access to that secret plutonium-demand information but felt it was not needed to assess the need for plutonium.

"The current supply of plutonium and the current capacity to process virgin and recycled plutonium from reprocessed weapons scrap are adequate to meet the demand for maintaining a stockpile similar to the current one," the council's report said.

"You don't need to look at the demand to see that," said Richard Meservé, a lawyer and nuclear physicist who served on the council.

The Energy Department's plutonium-refining facilities at the Savannah River Site in South Carolina and the Los Alamos National Laboratory in New Mexico provide ample capacity to process plutonium, the council said.

Though it will not produce plutonium, the SIS would increase the amount of plutonium available for producing new weapons by refining weapons-grade plutonium

from reactor fuel.

But that capability adds another dilemma.

"It has nuclear proliferation implications," Meservé said.

Technology for converting reactor fuel into weapons materials would form a potential bridge between the civilian fuel cycle and weapons production," the council said.

"Any decision to proceed with the SIS facility must explicitly consider the implications of the technology for nuclear proliferation," it said.

Another federal project to convert a partially completed civilian power

reactor to produce nuclear weapons material has been all but ruled out because of nuclear proliferation concerns.

The reaction to the council's report at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory where the SIS is to be built was business as usual.

"We don't set national policy here at INEL," spokesman Nick Nichols said. "Until we receive other direction from DOE headquarters, we'll proceed with our authorized SIS program."

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# Navy finds many live bombs on BLM land

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) — The Navy has found thousands of live bombs, including fuzes and rockets in a sweep of public lands around its Fallon Naval Air Station "bombing" ranges, a spokesman said Thursday.

The search by more than 275 sailors, aided by Navy air crews, Nevada National Guard members and bomb disposal experts, turned up about 123,375 pounds of ordnance scrap metal, 1,389 live bombs and 2,230 duds.

In addition, searchers found 28,136 rounds of ammunition ranging from rifle rounds to machine gun rounds and 40-millimeter cannon rounds, said Capt. Rex Rackowitz, Fallon NAS commander.

The inventory of the material found during the sweep of some 68,000 acres of land, was made public a week after the cleanup of stray bombs was suspended for the winter.

Rackowitz said the land is "92 percent clear of surface ordnance... While we cannot guarantee 100 percent effectiveness, these areas are much safer now than they were before the sweep."

Rackowitz also noted that in nearly 50 years of military

bombing operations in the area, nobody has been harmed by off-range ordnance.

The federal Bureau of Land Management plans to keep the land surrounding the ranges temporarily closed to the public in case undiscovered surface ordnance remains. There also are concerns about bombs that could be buried underground.

The Navy plans to return to the area in April to check again for ordnance.

The BLM's Bob Stewart said the land would be reopened next summer and "can't be permanently closed without congressional approval."

While the Navy has finished its clean-up efforts for now, the state Environmental Protection Division still is considering fines against the military that could run as high as \$10,000 a day.

Some of the bombs may have been dropped as long as 30 years ago, and Dodgion has said the Navy apparently knew for years that its pilots had dropped bombs that accidentally wound up on the public lands outside the practice ranges.

The clean-up project, "Operation Ugly Baby," started in secret in late October.

# Idaho Board of Education reconsiders alternative teaching certificate question

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Board of Education will reconsider its earlier refusal to allow new rules allowing alternative certification of teachers.

In a telephone conference Thursday, the board voted 7-1 to take the matter up again at its January meeting in Boise. The lone dissenter was J. Ray Cox, Coeur d'Alene, who contended that the board already has discussed and decided the matter.

But board members Colleen Mahoney, Lewiston; Roberta Fields, New Meadows; and Diane Bilyeu, Pocatello, who earlier voted against adoption of the new standards, on Thursday voted to bring the proposal up again.

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Both Jerry Evans, state schools superintendent, and Board President George Alvarez, who conducted the meeting at Boise, said they didn't think much more than a dozen persons per year would use alternative certification, if it is approved.

Alternative certification is seen as a way that people with college degrees could teach without going through formal teacher certification courses. Under the proposal, a would-be teacher would have to demonstrate qualifications, work under close supervision of a committee, take teaching method classes and complete teaching coursework within two years.

In October, a 4-4 tie vote failed to approve new rules which critics said had been in the works three years.

"We basically are starting as if

this were a brand new proposal," said Evans.

Some members indicated they wouldn't approve alternative certification unless it included a stipulation that the whole process be reviewed later to see if it is effective.

"Is this forever-and-always?" asked Mrs. Mahoney. "Can we withdraw it later?"

"I don't think any board can adopt a rule which is forever and always," said Evans. "There is nothing standing in our way down the road of simply withdrawing the rules."

Alvarez said it appeared a couple of the board members felt some sort of alternative certification should be in place, despite their earlier vote.

"I think the action was taken because one or two of the members had second thoughts about having something in place," he said.

"I don't think it's going to be

widely used. I think it's a pretty tough rule," said Alvarez.

"I'm convinced it's more than a token move," said Evans. "It is a workable alternative certification route proposal. However, I'd have to say it's very demanding."

"When you talk about two full summer sessions and two years of supervised work... I would be surprised as well if the number in any one year ever exceeded 12 to 15," he said.

Evans said teachers have opposed the proposal.

He said they have gone through a very demanding course before winning certification. "They are not convinced that someone should be able to step into the classroom that has not followed a similar course,"

# Class action suit filed over Utah records seizure

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A federal class action suit has been filed against the state of Utah over its seizure of the psychiatric records of more than 2,000 mental health patients.

The suit, filed in U.S. District Court Thursday on behalf of six patients, alleges the state is invading their privacy and interfering with the

confidentiality of their relationships with their doctors.

The suit contends the records were seized as part of a state investigation of a psychiatrist concerning possible Medicaid fraud. The plaintiffs say that probe does not involve them, specifically, since they never have received Medicaid benefits from the state.

"No agency of the state welfare program has paid for any of the psychiatric or related services" for the six plaintiffs, who are identified only by initials and counties of residence.

Defendants are Sally Valdez, an agent with the Utah Bureau of Medicaid Fraud, Department of Public Safety; Dennis Kroll,

attorney for the division, and several other unidentified persons.

Billing documents, lists of patients, computer storage devices and other information seized by the state under Sept. 29 search warrant contained detailed records of the named plaintiffs plus more than 2,000 additional patients of the treating psychiatrist, the suit says.

# Resentencing hearing conducted for convicted Idaho murderer

BLACKFOOT (AP) — His poetry and behavior at the Idaho State Penitentiary show convicted murderer Richard Leavitt should not be sentenced to death, the Blackfoot man's supporters testified at a resentencing hearing.

But Bingham County Prosecutor Thomas Moss argued Thursday that Leavitt should once again receive the maximum sentence for his crime, and that his resentencing was required only because of a legal technicality.

Leavitt, 31, was convicted of first-degree murder and sentenced to death for the July 1984 slaying of Danette Jean Elg, 31, whose mutilated body was found at her blood-spattered home in Blackfoot.

But the Idaho Supreme Court overturned the death sentence last

spring, ruling that it was imposed improperly. The high court said the sentencing judge failed to weigh each mitigating factor against all aggravating factors and may not have adequately considered the option of a life prison term in Leavitt's case.

He was ordered resentenced before 7th District Judge H. Reynold George, who said he would rule later after hearing testimony Thursday from Leavitt, his mother, prison guards and others.

Leavitt's mother, Marjorie Leavitt, told the judge that her son began writing poetry in 1978 and has continued to develop his craft since being in prison.

"He really started writing when he was incarcerated," she said. "He's got five or six books that contain

his poetry and a couple more in the works. We have two of his poems that have been made into songs."

Mrs. Leavitt also said her son has continued to maintain his relationship with his youngest son, and recently has built a strong relationship with his older son. She also described how he helps lift the spirits of fellow inmates at the penitentiary south of Boise.

Under cross-examination, Mrs. Leavitt said her son's divorce from Kathy Leavitt was because she had to "make a life for herself" after Leavitt's murder conviction.

The fact that Leavitt was married was considered a mitigating factor in his original sentencing.

Sue Watkins of Blackfoot testified Thursday that she had met Leavitt shortly before Ms. Elg's death and

had been corresponding with him since his arrest. His letters have been uplifting, Ms. Watkins said.

"The letters I remember the most, I reread my Mustang and he wrote me a poem about it, a very beautiful poem," she said. "He's my friend."

In his testimony, Leavitt complained that rape and arson allegations against him had come up during previous hearings in his case, even though he has never been convicted of either crime.

"All throughout my proceedings those same things keep being brought up," he said. "I've always thought that a person's innocent until proven guilty, but this keeps being brought up."

Moss said it was raised in

Leavitt's presentence report that he had been charged twice with rape but never convicted, and that he had been involved in an arson investigation but never charged.

Leavitt read some of his poetry on the stand and said he takes every opportunity he can to work and keep busy at the penitentiary.

Four prison guards, who testified from Boise over a telephone connection to the Blackfoot courtroom, called Leavitt "friendly" and said he had caused no problems while at the penitentiary.

"Mr. Leavitt's never been a management problem," said Officer Robert Cheney. "He's been an easy inmate to work with."

Bingham County Public Defender David Parmenter urged George to consider that kind of testimony and sentence Leavitt this time to a fixed life prison term.

"He's taken every advantage he can be to be industrious, and taken every advantage he can to produce his poetry and drawings," Parmenter said. "If the court is considering the death penalty, I think it's important to understand he's now re-establishing his relationship with his older son," Parmenter said.

But Moss argued that Leavitt's personality had not changed since being imprisoned, and that he had been writing poetry before his original sentencing so it should not be a factor in the resentencing.

# Witness claims fear stopped him from intervening in beating death

LOGAN, Utah (AP) — A witness to the October beating death of a worker at a northern Utah brine shrimp camp has testified he did nothing to intervene because he feared for his own life.

Richard Anderson, 37, of Salt Lake City, testified Thursday in a preliminary hearing for four fellow workers charged with second-degree murder in the Oct. 25 death of Miguel Ramirez.

Ramirez was killed at Western Brine Shrimp Camp on the northern shore of the Great Salt Lake in Box Elder County.

Charged are William Robert Cummins, 28, Philadelphia; Donald Wayne Brown, 33, of Conroe, Texas; Billie Donal Cayer, 46, of Salt Lake City; and Raymond Phillip Cabutian, 25, of Salt Lake City.

Anderson identified the four as the men he saw beating Ramirez. He said that afterward, Brown came to the trailer Anderson shared with two other men and said, "You boys didn't see anything tonight, did you?"

"We answered no because we were afraid," Anderson testified.

He said Brown smelled strongly of alcohol, and that he saw the four defendants return to their own trailer and start drinking again.

Anderson said he and his co-workers had Ramirez get up, go to his own trailer, get a drink of water and start trying to clean himself up.

"After that, Mike came to our trailer and said, 'I need a drink of water and he asked us to call 911 because he couldn't breathe,'" Anderson said.

"He then fell over on a pallet in front of our trailer, and when we checked his pulse and couldn't find one, we decided to take off in the company truck and go for help."

In other testimony, Box Elder County Sheriff's Deputy James D. Summrell, one of the first lawmen to arrive at the camp, said he stopped a

distance away and observed the scene through his rifle scope.

"I could see what looked like a Mexican lying still on a pallet in front of a trailer," he said. "I also saw three or four other men outside, but then they entered a trailer while I was watching."

Deputy Roger Olsen said he was the first to check Ramirez' vital signs and found him with no pulse and extremely cold.

A representative of the state medical examiner's office was to take the stand Friday on the fourth and final day of the hearing.

In other matters, Anderson, who had been held in the Box Elder County Jail for two nights to assure his presence in court — was allowed to return to Salt Lake on the condition he check with local lawmen daily.

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# Nation Briefly

## Boyd: 1990 good year for education

MOSCOW (AP) — The odds are 1990 will be a "pretty good year" in the Idaho Legislature for the state's colleges and universities, although probably not as good as they would like, House Speaker Tom Boyd says.

The Idaho Board of Education is seeking 27 percent more money for the state's higher education system in the fiscal year that begins July 1. It is requesting \$144.6 million from state lawmakers, not including money for cost-of-living raises or salary equity.

But Boyd said Wednesday in Moscow that 27 percent might be a little high, and 10 to 15 percent might be closer to what lawmakers will approve.

"It's not going to please everybody, but it is not going to close any doors," the Genesee Republican said.

The speaker said Gov. Cecil Andrus probably will trim the Board of Education's request "considerably" before it is presented to legislators when they convene next month.

## Students receive shots, back in class

MERIDIAN (AP) — Two Meridian elementary school students who were suspended because they had not been fully immunized have returned to class, with their shots.

"We're relieved not to have to go through the expulsion process," Meridian Superintendent Nick Hallett said Wednesday. "Our hope is we don't have to expel any students."

Meridian School District is the first large district in the state to enforce Idaho's immunization law. It requires proof of immunization for diseases such as measles, mumps and whooping cough within 60 days of admission to kindergarten through the fifth grade.

The two students at Ridgewood Elementary School were suspended Monday. But the children's parents had them vaccinated Monday evening, and they were back in school Tuesday.

BOISE (AP) — Cindy Estey of Boise, a 20-year-old sophomore at Boise State University, has won the title of Miss Idaho USA for 1990.

About 400 people watched eight women compete in the pageant Wednesday night at the Morrison Center for the Performing Arts.

Ms. Estey, who is majoring in marketing and communications, will represent Idaho in national competition in Kansas next March.

"I have to get excited to do myself prepared," Ms. Estey said after winning the state competition, the first pageant she had entered. "I've always wanted to do one since I was a little kid," she said.

## Air advisory issued for 2 counties

LEWISTON (AP) — The Idaho Air Quality Bureau has issued another air stagnation advisory for Nez Perce and Clearwater counties, the second this month.

The advisory, issued Wednesday, bans open burning in the two counties. Homeowners with woodstoves are also asked to voluntarily cut back on burning firewood if possible.

The major pollution problem is particulates, small particles from burning wood, dust and industrial pollution in the air. The major sources of particulates are wood-burning stoves and open burning.

Terry Christianson, an Air Quality Bureau official based in Coeur d'Alene, said if homeowners must use woodstoves, they should avoid banking the fire at night and give it sufficient air to provide good combustion.

## Kiebert defense fund established

SANDPOINT (AP) — An account has been established at a Sandpoint bank to help pay the legal defense of Kermit Kiebert, the suspended Idaho Transportation Department director charged with sexually abusing his daughter.

The "Kermit Kiebert Defense Fund" at the First National Bank of North Idaho was started by Dick Wolff and Florence Carter of Sandpoint.

"We're trying to make sure (Kiebert) has enough money on hand to do what he wants to do," Wolff said Wednesday. "He is without an income and needs to defend himself."

Kiebert, 47, was suspended without pay from his position with the Transportation Department after being arrested Dec. 5 on two counts of lewd and lascivious conduct with a minor and one count of child sexual abuse.

## Grant to build Dover water system

DOVER (AP) — Federal money will be used to build a new water system for this tiny Bonner County town, where residents have had to boil their drinking water for the past three years.

Farmers Home Administration has awarded a grant and loan totaling almost \$763,000 to fund construction of a new community water system, Mayor Bill Jones said Wednesday.

Dover, two miles west of Sandpoint on the Pend Oreille River, draws its domestic water from the river.

Residents have had to boil their drinking water since the Idaho Division of Environmental Quality found contaminants in it three years ago.

## Sears halts all sales of blow-up space toy

BOISE (AP) — Sears, Roebuck and Co. has confirmed it is immediately pulling off the market a toy that simulates a rocket booster blowing up.

The decision came in the wake of four Boise children's complaint that the toy represented "sick humor" in light of the 1986 explosion of the space shuttle Challenger and the death of its seven-member crew.

Sears spokesman Gordon Jones said Wednesday in an interview from Chicago, that the "Blasting Blaster" toy is "removed from sale. We will not fill orders."

Jones said the toy was pulled "out of concern that we may have offended some customers."

These include the Sanders brothers, Jared, 13, Seth, 9, Spencer, 5, and Cody, 3, sons of Christi and Gary Sanders of Boise. The boys spotted the toy in the Sears holiday

Wishbook catalog and wrote Sears and President Bush to complain.

"We don't want children learning to blow up space shuttles!" they wrote.

Jared praised the withdrawal of the product, but said, "That's something they should have thought of earlier."

Jones said the company has received between 10 and 100 complaints in letters from other customers, and took action because of them.

The toy was advertised in the Wishbook as "simulating a countdown gone awry. Construct the rocket pad and prepare missile for launch. Ticking timer detonation device destroys the entire structure."

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration got the Sanders' letter to Bush and submitted a complaint of its own.

## Television to re-enact Boise church suicide

BOISE (AP) — The apparent 1982 suicide of an unidentified man in a Boise church will be re-enacted on national television in February.

A film crew completed work Tuesday on the tale of a man found dead Dec. 4, 1982, under a pew in Sacred Heart Catholic Church.

The Boise footage, featuring church parishioners and local policemen, is scheduled to be aired Feb. 7 on NBC's "Unsolved Mysteries."

"The parish and I were willing to be involved in 'Unsolved Mysteries' and the re-enactment of all this in hopes that we would be able to find his family and in a sense return this person who was entrusted to us back to his family," the Rev. W. Thomas Faucher said Wednesday.

The body of the tanned, neatly dressed and apparently fit man in his late 30s to early 40s was never identified, Police said the signature "Wm. E. Toomey" on a typewritten suicide note probably was not a true name. A fingerprint check with the FBI and the Idaho Crime Bureau produced no leads.

"The man came to our church, killed himself in the church by taking cyanide, left a note and a considerable amount of money (\$1,900)," Faucher said.

## High court returns flood suit to district

BOISE (AP) — A divided Idaho Supreme Court has sent part of lawsuit over 1984-85 flooding in eastern Idaho back to district court.

The Supreme Court ruled 4-1 on Thursday to overturn a 7th District Court ruling granting judgment against a lawsuit filed by property owners after Mud Lake flooded in 1984-85.

On the single issue of inverse condemnation, whether the property owners' land was improperly used, further court hearings were ordered.

The Supreme Court upheld the rest of Judge Grant Young's ruling in favor of the state and water and canal companies. It was filed by Joe and Ella Marty, Carl and Gladys Lundholm, Keith and Deanna Rudy, Paul and Deoina Gunderson and Duane and Ramona Lundholm.

The court concluded the various agencies involved were immune from liability for actions they took to prevent failure of the dikes impounding Mud Lake.

Chief Justice Robert Bakes said he supported the lower court ruling on inverse condemnation, holding that the director of the Department of Water Resources is a "representative" of the governor in

disaster operations. Bakes also was the lone dissenter in a second ruling Thursday. It reinstated Anthony G. Cootz' long battle for a court hearing over disciplinary action taken against him at the Idaho State Penitentiary six years ago.

Cootz claimed he was improperly ordered to serve 60 days on discipline for kicking a correctional officer. Previously, he lost decisions by a hearing officer, a magistrate, a district judge and the Court of Appeals.

But the Supreme Court ruled 4-1 Thursday that he was denied due process and should be granted a new hearing.

The court said the hearing officer failed to list reasons why he convicted Cootz on the disciplinary charge, and also improperly refused to allow Cootz to call as witnesses the sergeant involved and another inmate.

The majority said prison inmates have procedural rights like any one else, and it was improper for prison officials to decline to produce the sergeant at the disciplinary hearing because it was his day off and an inmate, because he was transferred "somewhere else."

## Crash site known to be unsafe

CALDWELL (AP) — The Caldwell railroad crossing where four people died Tuesday night is the seventh-most dangerous in Idaho, according to the Idaho Transportation Department.

But despite appearing on the state's list of the 100 most dangerous crossings for three years, the Ustick Road site has not been reviewed for improvements.

Caldwell Mayor Pete Cowles said Wednesday that the city would not immediately improve the crossing. But responsibility for the oversight that led to Tuesday's accident was difficult to pinpoint Wednesday.

Local, state and railroad officials agreed only that train-car accidents are preventable if motorists pay attention to the dangers of locomotives, which simply are unable to stop in time.

## Utah company seeks permission to supply Idaho county with gas

PRESTON (AP) — A Salt Lake City natural gas supplier could warm up part of Franklin County, Idaho with its product if federal, Idaho and Utah regulatory agencies go along with the idea.

Mountain Fuel Supply Co. met with local officials in Preston last week over its proposal to serve the Idaho towns of Franklin, Whitney and Preston on a line from Richmond, Utah.

The Cove, Utah area also would be connected to the pipeline. The company plans to canvass door-to-door about 1,200 customers

Jan. 8 through Jan. 20 in the proposed service area to determine the feasibility of the project. Local Idaho officials have tried to coax either Mountain Fuel or Intermountain Gas Co. to come into the county, without success. Intermountain's lines run as close as the Grace area north of Preston.

## Simplot gets state permit for air quality

POCATELLO (AP) — The J.R. Simplot Co. fertilizer plant at Pocatello has been issued an operating permit from the Idaho Air Quality Bureau despite environmentalists' objections.

John Ledger, bureau chief, disclosed Thursday the permit would be issued promptly and would require pollutants from Simplot's plant to be reduced by 4,000 tons a year, but allows nitrogen oxide emissions to increase by 500 tons annually.

Earl Mapes, regulatory affairs director for Simplot's Minerals and Chemicals Group, said company specialists are reviewing the 70-page document.

"I think it's about what we expected to see," Mapes said. "I don't think there are any great surprises in it, at least in the permit."

The Citizens Task Force on Air and Toxics criticized issuance of the permit and said the plant is breaking fluoride emission standards by at least 20 tons a year. It also said the state has not taken any action against Simplot, despite the violations.

Last month, the Environmental Protection Agency cited Simplot for 30 alleged air quality violations.

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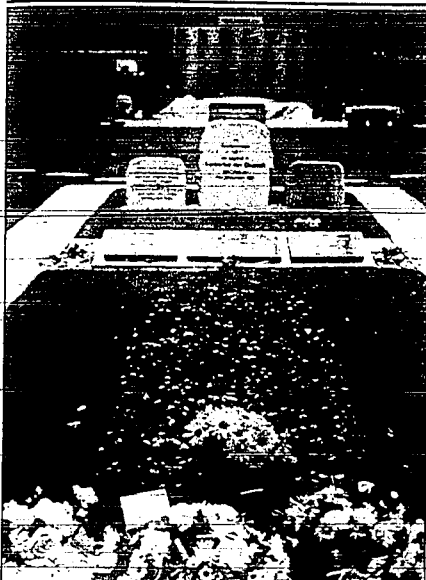

## Town holds memorial for Flight 103 victims

LOCKERBIE, Scotland (AP) — A tiny path of candle lanterns lit a granite memorial Thursday as grieving relatives and local residents marked the first anniversary of the Pan Am Flight 103 bombing over this Scottish town.

The 270 lights — one for each victim killed — flickered into the night after local clergymen dedicated the memorial in a 19th century graveyard during a day of somber and poignant commemoration.

At least 200 American relatives joined in the services. "We remember that dreadful night a year ago," said the Rev. Cameron Gibson, a local minister. "As we sit here Pan Am 103 was already in the air flying over Britain."

Gibson spoke at an evening commemoration in an isolated stone church, Tundergarth, overlooking the field where the cockpit fell from the jumbo jet. It was blown apart by terrorist bomb in a radio cassette player.

Earlier, some 500 people gathered in biting cold at a simple dedication of the memorial in the Dryfesdale Cemetery, one mile outside Lockerbie.

While this might be a traumatic experience for us, the worst has

already happened," said George Williams of Joppa, Md. His only child, a 24-year-old U.S. Army lieutenant, was on the flight.

"When we go home we'll feel a whole lot better," added Williams, 58, who came with his wife, Judy. Vapor trailing from two aircraft

overlaid formed a cross in what appeared to be a coincidental tribute.

All 258 people aboard the New York-bound Pan Am jet died and 11 others died on the ground as the jet exploded over this small town in southern Scotland.

After a year of painstaking investigation, the bomber has not been identified. But suspicion points to an extremist Middle East terrorist group, the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command.

As darkness fell, an American couple, Paul and Eleanor Hudson, lit 270 lanterns along a path leading to the memorial and in a circle before it. Their 16-year-old daughter, Melina, was aboard the flight.

Classmates at Melina's school, the Albany Academy for Girls, in Albany, N.Y., made the lanterns, which were sand-filled bags with candles inside. Each was inscribed with a "dove" and the name of a victim.

## Gorbachev blasts Lithuania's break

MOSCOW (AP) — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev blasted Lithuania's Communists on Thursday for breaking with the national Communist Party in their drive to restore their republic's sovereignty.

The national Communist Party Central Committee scheduled an emergency meeting to discuss the historic defiance.

Rimantas Kanapenas, a spokesman for Lithuania's political group Sajudis, said Gorbachev summoned Lithuanian members of the national parliament to protest Wednesday's decision by the Lithuanian Communist Party Congress to end subordination to the national party

and declare itself independent, with its own rules and program.

"The Kremlin had warned of 'great trouble' ahead for the Lithuanians, and it came fast.

Gorbachev told the Congress he shared the "concern and alarm" of many Communists about Lithuania's action and said the ruling Politburo decided to call an emergency meeting of the Central Committee, its parent body, on the issue "in a few days."

Kanapenas said Gorbachev telephoned Lithuanian party chief Algrdas Brazauskas in Vilnius, the republic's capital, shortly after the 855-160 vote to break away from the national party.

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## Mandela reunited with friend

PAARL, South Africa (AP) — Jailed black leader Nelson Mandela held an emotional reunion Thursday with an ailing, 84-year-old white woman who was his co-defendant in a landmark anti-apartheid trial 28 years ago.

Helen Joseph, who in the 1960s was one of the first whites banned by the government, spent four hours with Mandela in Victor Verster

Prison near Cape Town.

"He was in very good form, full of jokes, full of laughter," Ms. Joseph said outside the prison gate. "He looks forward to coming home, but he doesn't know when it will be."

She described the meeting as a "wonderful, friendly, loving visit." Mandela, 71, heads the outlawed African National Congress guerrilla

**Still divided in spirit, Berliners count mixed Christmas blessings**

**EAST BERLIN (AP)** — It would seem at first glance that Lillie Berger has much to be thankful for this Christmas.

An amnesty for political prisoners has freed her younger son, and the parting of the Berlin Wall has brought home the older one she feared she'd never see after his escape to the West in July.

Like many East Germans, Mrs. Berger is grateful for the first fruits of reform that have eased a life of torment and allowed a holiday reunion of her family.

But the division of Germany now runs through her heart, with one son lost to a new life in Hamburg and the other committed to the revolt for change at home.

"I have nothing to be happy about this Christmas," said Mrs. Berger, whose lined face and red-rimmed eyes testify to 53 years of hardship and worry. "For me, this year has been like 1945. Everything in my life has been ruined."

Despite the heartening hurtle toward democracy that has engendered new hope for a united Berlin, an atmosphere of anxiety pervades both sides of the city, deeply scarred by four decades of division.

Christmas and the approaching new year are a time for reflection, and burdened and preoccupied Berliners this year are counting mixed blessings.

A glittering consumer wonderland has danced before the eyes of millions now free to travel West, to see what they cannot yet have.

Champanne celebrations and the euphoric street party that erupted when the wall fell on Nov. 9 have given way to West Berlin resentment of the daily invasions of frustrated consumers.

"My daughter is a physician who earns a good salary and has everything our life lins to offer. But she says she feels like a second-class citizen when she comes here," said Maria Schwage, 74, of Dresden, who was shopping with her grandson at West Berlin's famed Ka-De-We department store.

"As a pensioner I was able to travel before the reforms, and I must say the atmosphere is now very different," she said.

No East German visitor can miss the discouraging glances of the red-haired hostess passing out Christmas cake nibbles as inducement to buy gourmet "baumkuchen" for \$17, a fortune in the eyes of most East Germans.

Cheap goods like 55 umbrellas and fake gold necklaces have been relegated to sidewalk sales bins, encouraging the crowds of cash-strapped East Germans to do their window shopping outside.

Little remains for the holiday season of West Berliners' spirit of sharing that choked millions with emotion seven weeks ago, when Stalmsit bounds, were broken by the forces for freedom.

"There is a lot of dissatisfaction over the hectic nature of this Christmas," said Ziegfried Kasper, a West Berlin cab driver born in a far corner of the former German empire

in what is now Soviet Russia. "As an immigrant myself, I feel empathy for those coming over," Kasper added. "But this is not the kind of reunification many people expected."

East and West Berlin have been released from forced division, but their differences remain apparent and will take years to overcome.

West Berlin is awash in light and bustle, its neon-flanked shopping boulevards strewn with fresh evergreens, its light standards beribboned in red, gold and green.

Handmade ornaments are hawked from rustic wooden booths at the central Christmas market and an aroma of plenty fills the damp, cold air, pungent with hot-spiced wine and sizzling sausages.

Along East Berlin's Karl Marx

Allee, a monotony of white lights illuminates the grimace of the confined city that is ominously quiet in the last days before Christmas.

Poorly stocked stores are being spurned this year by a people so free on the West, and political turmoil has cast a shadow of uncertainty over the very survival of the East German nation.

"What I feel mostly is fear," said Ursula Engel, a well-traveled researcher for Leipzig's Institute for Foreign Studies. "No one knows where we are going, yet we are racing ahead with all speed."

With the breaching of the wall a bitterness has been loosed among many of the middle-aged, who have sacrificed their prime years to a socialist system now being swept into the scrapheap of history.

**Jeers halt Ceausescu address**

**VIENNA, Austria (AP)** — For the first time that anybody could remember, Romanian President Nicolae Ceausescu was interrupted at a public speech by boos and jeers that began a huge demonstration against him in Bucharest Thursday.

Dressed in a black Persian lamb hat with matching coat collar, Ceausescu, 71, was about three minutes into one of his typically rousing speeches when, according to a Yugoslav journalist in the front row, a crowd of young people quickly joined by hundreds of sympathizers marched close by.

All that viewers on state television and listeners on state radio knew of the demonstration was the muffled sound of boos and jeers before live broadcast abruptly stopped.

Ceausescu, Romania's hard-line leader for 24 years, was midway through a sentence thanking the organizers of his own rally on the square in front of his official residence, the elegant palace that until the Communist takeover in 1947 housed the nation's kings.

Radio and TV quickly switched to stirring patriotic songs. But Hungarian TV showed more footage of a disconcerted Ceausescu, clearly aware something was amiss, and a man advising him, "Come inside."

Three minutes later, the broadcast resumed, again catching Ceausescu midway through a sentence, this time a stirring appeal to defend "the independence, integrity and sovereignty of Romania."

Eastern Europe's longest surviving ruler has made many such appeals in his 24 years as the autocratic boss of a Communist state.

The appeals are intended to touch the raw nerve of Romanian nationalism, long played upon by Ceausescu in his vision of a great Romania with himself as its undisputed greatest leader over.

But the increasing hardships he has imposed on 23 million people, and the reported massacre of unarmed civilians in the west Romanian city of Timisoara last weekend, apparently have united ethnic Hungarians, Germans and Romanians in revolt.

According to reports from East bloc journalists in Bucharest, the crowd that interrupted Ceausescu's speech was undeterred by tear gas grenades.

About 25 minutes after his mass rally drew to a close, thousands of mostly young people marched down the nearby central Magheru boulevard, chanting "Down with Ceausescu!" and calling for the "liberation" — or "freedom" — that is coming to their East European and Soviet neighbors.

Submachine gunners and tanks fired to push the crowds back, and bursts of automatic weapons fire were heard as the protesters moved toward an intersection ringed by the imposing buildings of the university, the National Theater and the 22-story Intercontinental Hotel.

There, according to a Yugoslav journalist, the crowd was encircled by tanks, riot police, troops and special security forces.

Ron Castle said he begins work on the display before Thanksgiving, sometimes spending three or four hours a day. He does all the work himself, but credited Evelyn with originally setting the project in motion.

"My wife kept after me to put lights and stuff up," he said. "It was mostly her idea."

Castle said his favorite parts of the display are the animated Santa Claus and a shovel-toting snowman, both doing what could be the Peppermint Twist on the lawn. He's also partial to this year's new addition — a big, shiny sign spelling out Merry Christmas that Castle himself fashioned from plywood, foil and lights.

Castle said many cars drive by the display each week, some coming from as far away as Boise. Passersby are greeted with Christmas music although, Castle said, "We don't run it real loud on account of the neighbors."

The display falls prey to an occasional prank. The Castles awoke one recent morning to find their snowman had migrated to a neighbor's yard.

Castle said he is not sure how much the display cost to put together. "I've never sat down to figure it out," he noted. But he estimated that he spends another \$50 to \$100 each holiday season on improvements and repairs.

Runner-up in this year's contest is the Bob Latham Jr. home at 3237 Woodridge Drive in Twin Falls. Gene Huggins nominated the display.

The Lathams' roof is lined in green lights with a star shining in white, and four columns at curbside are wrapped in swirling motion-light. A truck outlined in red lights, a nativity scene, candles, two Santas and twinkling pine trees complete the display.

## Center finds noise relief for parents at concerts

**LANDOVER, Md.** — While the heavy metal rock band Motley Crue sent 16,000 screaming teen-agers into high-decibel heaven, Phil and Kathy Hawkins sat across the hall writing Christmas cards in a quiet parlour reserved for the kids' chaperons.

The Hawkinses joined more than 200 other parents recently in the "Quiet Room" at the Capital Center, a suburban Washington arena that says it pioneered the idea of providing a noise-free sanctuary for parents who drive their children to rock concerts.

Since the Capital Center opened its quiet room in October 1986, similar facilities for parents have spread to arenas in many other major cities. They include the Spectrum in Philadelphia, the Great Western Forum at Los Angeles, Madison Square Garden in New York, the Superdome in New Orleans, the Miami Arena, the Palace in suburban Detroit, the Scope at Norfolk, Va., the Richfield Coliseum in Cleveland and the Nassau Coliseum in suburban New York.

"We always had people dropping off their kids and then driving home again until the concert was over," said Matt Amodeo, a

Capital Center spokesman. "Rather than drive long distances, some parents would sit in their cars and wait for three hours."

When some parents began huddling in the lobby for warmth, Amodeo and his colleagues invited them into the arena's Colleague Club restaurant, where they were offered hot snacks and soft drinks, magazines and low-volume TV sets.

Three years later, Amodeo says, veteran rock concert chaperons greet each other like old friends. Some of the single parents who met in the Quiet Room are dating now. It's become a place to read, doze, write letters, cut a business deal or fill out income tax returns.

"I'm impressed. This is wonderful," said Ruthie Moore, a visiting nurse who drove her 16-year-old son, Chris, and two friends from the far-away Mount Vernon area of Virginia. She spent her first evening in the Quiet Room doing needlework.

Moore and other parents say they like the Quiet Room because they are close enough to their children to know they are safe, yet far enough from the musical maelstrom to hear only the muffled thumps from the megawatt bass speakers.

Outside the doors, the Capital Center hall was filled with whining, stomping "metal-heads" wearing the de rigueur outfits of true believers — torn jeans, leather jackets, black miniskirts, fishnet stockings, yards of Spandex and pounds of mascara.

Braces and bellybuttons abounded. Brian Hopkins, 15, of Crofton, Md., said he was ready for "lots of loud music and fun." Aaron Platt, 15, of Reston, Va., stuffed cotton in his ears in anticipation of "a whole lot of loud music, craziness and cigarette smoke."

Just as Lesia Morgan, 15, and her sister, Tina, 13, were watching Motley Crue raise the roof with "Shout at the Devil," their parents, Dennis and Sandy Morgan of Mechanicsville, Md., were dealing another hand of gin rummy in the Quiet Room.

"Any music we like they don't want to buy," sighed Dennis, who prefers country and golden oldies from the 60s.

"This is a good place to do some mindless paperwork," said Richard Kenney, 12, opening his briefcase over a supper of pretzels and ginger ale. Still wearing his business suit, Kenney had raced his 15-year-old son to the concert from a high school bas-

ketball game in suburban McLean, Va. Hawkins, a Coast Guard commander who lives in Woodbridge, celebrated his 43rd birthday by writing Christmas cards with his wife while their son, Gary, 15, attended the concert. "I'm having a quiet birthday this year," he said.

It was the fourth chauffering stint for Clare Weiland, a dietitian from Waldorf, Md., who drove her 14-year-old daughter, Kay, and two friends to the show.

Weiland spent the evening reading an Eric Segal novel while listening to her favorite Kenny Rogers and Neil Diamond tapes on a portable cassette player.

"I remember my first night here," she said. "I sat in my car out in the parking lot. It was freezing cold. I wore thermal underwear and layers of clothing, and brought a thermos full of hot tea. I had a little lamp attached to my paperback so I could read."

Mrs. Weiland smiled. "Crazy, right?" she said. "But I'd rather sit out in the cold than listen to that music."

More than 15 galleries will host opening receptions with the featured artists present for consultation and complimentary beverages and hors d'oeuvres will be served. Most of the galleries are within walking distance of one another. The shows will run through mid-January.

The work of Joe Baker, a contemporary Western artist from the Phoenix area, will be featured at the Sun Valley Center Gallery through January.

His new work, oil pastel drawings, mural and small canvases, thematically represents the relationship between animals and light and the rituals of fire. Cats and retrievers, crows and monkeys are among Baker's subjects and are drenched in color and vibrant light.

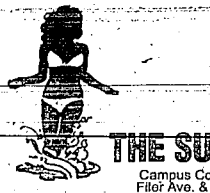

## Grade-school punk band has LP out, MTV video

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — When the punk rock band "Old Skull" began performing at local clubs, J.P. Toulon's hands were only big enough to play three chords on the guitar, and the group got paid with McDonald's happy meals.

Today, the three prepubescent punksters have a music video on MTV for their debut LP, "Get Outta School," and practice in J.P.'s basement on high-tech equipment donated by sponsors. They even were paid \$1,000 for a 30-minute performance in New York.

"Old Skull" — guitarist J.P. Toulon, 10; his brother, bass player Jamie, 9, and drummer Jesse Collins-Davies, 10 — has been together for three years. The trio is managed by J.P.'s father, Vern. "Get Outta School," which was recorded more than a year ago and released last spring, has sold about 30,000 copies.

"People will buy your first album because you're young and new and they think, 'Oh, how cute,'" said Jesse, a fifth-grader. "But now they want to hear real music and that's what we're trying to do. Our last record — we just played anything."

"On the first album, the band sings, and screams, about such issues as the homeless and AIDS. In "Homeless," J.P. howls into the microphone amid screeching guitars and bashing drums.

"I hate you Ronald Reagan!" he shouts at the end, with a look in his eye that tells you he means it. "Reagan's out, dude," Robin Davies, Jesse's father, said at a recent after-school practice. "I know," J.P. responded. "I still hate him."

The band performs fun, silly songs, too.

"Hotdog Hell" gives the audience more than just music for slam dancing, a popular form of dancing for punk rock enthusiasts.

"It's usually our last song," said Jamie, a fourth-grader. "We throw hot dogs into the crowd. It's funny. Then they throw them back at us and we fight back — we throw them back again."

But the band has gained more popularity on the East and West coasts than at home in Madison, Davies said. "On the coasts they tend to get caught

up in the media like L.A. and New York. In Madison, they don't get caught up in it, which is good, actually, for the kids. In Madison they're more grounded."

The band has received more than 400 fan letters from around the world, including one from a boy in Greece.

Both fathers, who also are musicians, insist their children are treated just like other students at school and have not been changed by their success.

"I know it's crazy, but things are absolutely the same," Toulon said. "If anything, they're sick of it (media attention). There's been no brown heads."

Amid school, soccer, karate and skateboarding, the boys practice weekly and travel about one weekend a month to Minneapolis, Milwaukee, Chicago and other nearby cities. They usually play in bars or nightclubs.

Despite some criticism for allowing their children to play in a punk band, the fathers said they believe "Old Skull" is a positive aspect in their sons' lives.

"It's really opened a lot of doors for J.P.," Toulon said. Although he's never acted before, J.P. has auditioned for the lead role in "Motormama," an action film from the producers of "Platoon."

J.P. and Jesse also write most of the band's songs.

"We write about what we see and feel," Jesse said. "We write about what we think is important."

"We're trying to be more serious than we are," said J.P., a fifth-grader. "But it's hard, because we're only kids."

What timely topics can we expect "Old Skull" to be shrieking criticism at on the next album?

"I wrote a song about the stealth bomber," Jesse said. "It's called Money Waste."

# Marriage takes beating in 'Roses'

—If the American marriage is frail and on life support systems, then "The War of the Roses" is the sneak attack that pulls all the plugs. Pay no attention to its frenzied trailer, which makes it look like an interpersonal destruction derby. In the hands of director Danny DeVito and writer Michael Leeson, "The War of the Roses" is biting and vicious, a sly pencil on the battered face of "civilized divorce."

It is also thoughtful, ingeniously funny and bravely true to its own black-and-blue comic vision. How could the marriage of Oliver and Barbara Rose go wrong? Upward bound from his first casebooks at Harvard Law School, Oliver (Michael Douglas) and outstanding college gymnast Barbara (Kathleen Turner) meet on Nantucket in a bidding war over a bit of 16th century Chinese ivory.

Quickly in lust, they progress to marriage, the perfect junior partnership, the perfect set of children — one boy, one girl — the perfect old Washington house, even the perfect flowering career for Barbara (when the children are older. Then, the perfect pitfall.

The blindsided Oliver does not have a clue why, which is exactly the point. Although Douglas' performance has been calibrated to give some idea of Oliver's charm, particularly with his success-dressed peers, you could call Oliver an insensitive, workaholic, self-centered, countless fox.

With the boss over for dinner, Oliver prods Barbara into telling a family anecdote, then cuts in to tell it faster and funnier himself. He battles her first business steps, using her contract papers to squish a fly. Then after 18 years he wonders how Barbara, having been given everything, including a live-in housekeeper (the marvelous Marianne Sägebrecht, fine but overused), could possibly want anything more from life.

When it turns out that what Barbara wants is out, and waiving alimony or a share of his business, asks only for their house — which she has turned into a showplace — the lines are drawn. He would rather die than let her have it. She feels exactly the same. Then DeVito, in an evil turn as Oliver's friend and divorce lawyer, discovers a little-used statute that allows the husband to continue to reside in a contested house. Now let the mayhem begin.

Begin it does, escalating into tactics Medea might have admired — and may even have used. This is not comedy in the Ealing Studios tradition; it's comedy in the tradition of the Three Stooges armed with tire

irons. It may fright the genteel, but it won't surprise anyone who saw DeVito's "Thous Mamma From the Train." Because Adler's novel is better basic stuff, "War" is far funnier verbally, but it's something more than punishing comedy. It's tag-team comic cliff notes on the death of marriage and the emptiness of perfection among the have-it-all, and it can scare you silly.

The beauty of Leeson's script, from Warren Adler's same-named novel, is that it builds slowly, to Barbara's breaking point, allowing us to wince along with her at Oliver's every patronizing act. The tenacity of DeVito's direction, steady as a thumb pressing on a bruise, keeps the tone brutally consistent. If he had backed away or softened at any point, including our last sight of the Roses, the picture would have gone gurgling down the drain. Amazingly, for a film of the kind, gentler DeVito (and the film's producers) stand firm.

No one will ever call DeVito a discreet director — not with his low angle shots suggesting a weasel's sly view of life, or his shot of Nantucket through the V of Barbara's legs as she shows off with a headstand for Oliver's benefit. Yet DeVito also manages to suggest layers to both the potentially unlovable Roses, not only to Oliver but to Barbara as well.

Turner's Barbara may be sexually triumphant, but she is socially unsure and after all these years with Oliver, her self-esteem has vanished. She is a woman who may not have been born to money, but who has learned fast and has poured years of studying and collecting into decorating her house until it could pass any Georgelown dowager's inspection. No wonder when Barbara's finished "doing" every room, there is nothing left to hold her interest. (This house,

the work of production designer Ida Random, art director Mark Mansbridge and set decorator Anne McCulley, is dead-on. It captures up museum-perfect but sterile perfection; the essence of the slick map-drop-dead environment.)

# Reviewer for Times kills shows

NEW YORK (AP) — Can a bad review kill a good show?

A growing number of Broadway producers, writers and theater people say the answer is yes — if it's in the hands of critic Frank Rich.

The long-simmering debate boiled over recently when British playwright David Hare's latest drama, "The Secret Rapture," closed shortly after Times drama critic Frank Rich scoldingly panned it as "coarse agit-prop" and "so pallid an imitation of life."

Rich was not the only critic to voice unfavorable opinion. The Daily News called the play "too calculated, too schematic"; New York Newsday called it flawed but fascinating.

But as Bernard Gersten, executive producer of Lincoln Center Theater, put it, Rich uses "hydrogen bombs where ordinary old-fashioned artillery would do."

Hare, best known for his 1978 play "Boys in the Trees," fired off a letter to Rich, calling him irresponsible and "gratuitously abusive." Rich responded with a letter acknowledging "the consequences of my reviews," but considering himself honorable to express his opinion.

The feud landed on the front page of the trade newspaper Variety; excerpts from both letters were printed in such diverse publications as The Wall Street Journal and the Village Voice.

Hare's sentiments are not uncommon in the theater world, where shows are becoming more expensive — both to produce and to see. The complaints are usually expressed privately, but some people are speaking out.

Katharine Hepburn gave the producers of "A New Good" a favorable quotation to use in their advertising after Rich trashed the drama last month.

"It's difficult and discouraging for any play to be mounted now — it costs so much — and people don't always go," she told columnist Liz Smith. "So I wanted to say that people have to make up their own minds. They have to read more notices than just one critic."

The 40-year-old Rich, who joined the Times in 1980, has eluded that is unfavorable among critics in any other major art form.

When reviews are mixed, said press agent Merle Debuskey, "You'll find the show either succeeds or fails on what the Times critic has said."

Rich described this season's "Prince of Central Park" as "a numbing evening of...guileless amnesia" and the play failed after four performances. He called rock star Sting "a stiff" and his show, a revival of "3 Penny Opera," an "inert gray mass." Despite a \$4.5 million advance, it closes New Year's Eve after only a two-month run.

But a rave from Rich can translate quickly into box office dollars.

"City of Angels," a new musical, without a word of review — taking in about \$18,000 a day in advance ticket sales before it opened, according to general manager Ralph Roseman. The day after it opened to mixed reviews — but lavish praise from Rich — the box office take was \$324,700.

Although impossible to quantify, many in the theater world believe Rich also has closed a good number of shows.

In his letter, Hare said much of the problem is Rich's unwillingness to pull punches when he writes a bad review.

"It is not your job to make my play run," he wrote. "But nor is it your job to close it. And you did close it. Not by what you wrote, but by the manner in which you wrote it."

Yet a bad Rich notice is not always fatal. Lewis Allen, producer of "A Few Good Men," said his box office is struggling but alive for his show, a drama about military justice.

Rich has had little affection for Andrew Lloyd Webber, but the British composer's "Phantom of the Opera" is still the hottest ticket on Broadway and "Cats" has been running since 1982.

Rich declined to be interviewed for this story. In his letter to Hare, however, he acknowledged the influence of the Times, adding, "its credibility is a trust that all its writers work hard to preserve."

Hare called on the Times to find a replacement for theater critic Walter Kerr, who provided a second opinion with his scathing reviews for the Sunday paper before retiring in 1983.

# Los Angeles critics announce picks

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Do the Right Thing" did just that for the Los Angeles Film Critics Association as the controversial film about racial tensions scored honors as best picture of 1989 and best director for Spike Lee.

"Do the Right Thing," set on the hottest day of the year in New York, also won awards Saturday for Danny Aiello for best supporting actor and for the musical score by Lee's father, Bill Lee.

Andie MacDowell, who played the sexually frustrated housewife in "sex, lies and videotape," shared the best actress honor with Michelle Pfeiffer, the sultry lounge singer in "The Fabulous Baker Boys."

Daniel-Day Lewis won best actor for his portrayal in "My Left Foot" of Irish writer/painter Christy Brown, who was born with cerebral palsy. Brenda Fricker, who played

Brown's mother, won best supporting actress.

Best screenplay went to Gus Van Sant and Daniel Vost for "Drugstore Cowboy," about narcotics burglars in the early 1970s.

Michael Moore's quirky "Roger and Me," about Moore's efforts to show General Motors head Roger Smith the economic devastation his company brought to Flint, Mich., won for best documentary.

He sandwiched another field goal between buckets by freshman David Anderson and the last moment of competitiveness came when Doug DeVries scored to slice the CSI lead to 24-21.

# Dallas, Philadelphia players fined for fighting

Probe finds no evidence behind bounty charges

IRVING, Texas — Ten players from Dallas and seven from Philadelphia were fined by the NFL for fighting in a Thanksgiving Day game which sparked accusations that Eagles coach Buddy Ryan put bounties on certain Cowboys.

The fines against the Cowboys totaled \$6,500. Guard Nate Newton got the stiffest fine — \$1,500 — for coming to the aid of quarterback Troy Aikman when Eagles linebacker Britt Hager threw Aikman down after a play had been whistled dead.

After the game, won by the Eagles, 27-0, in Dallas, Cowboys coach Jimmy Johnson accused Ryan of offering rewards if one of his players could "level" either Aikman or Dallas placekicker Tony Zendejas.

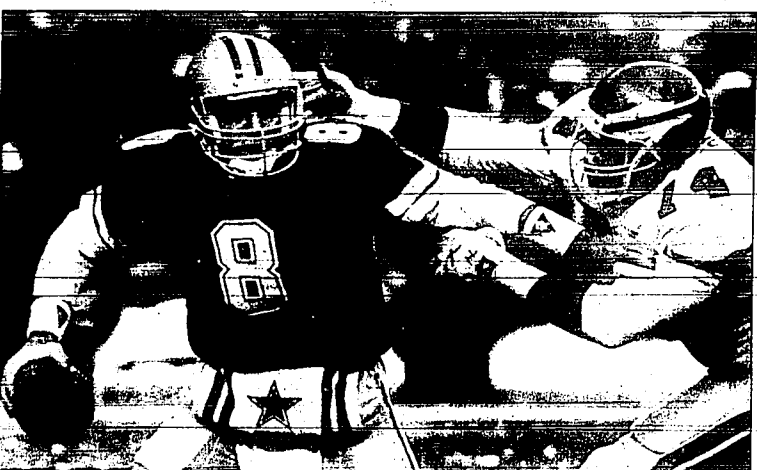
The league said Dec. 8 that its investigation found no evidence rewards had been offered for knocking Aikman and Zendejas out of the game.

The teams played again at Philadelphia Dec. 10, with the Eagles winning 20-10. Other Cowboys fined were Kevin Gogan, Tom Raftery, Daryl Johnston, Ken Norton, Cornell Burbage, James Dixon, Crawford Ker, Mark Tuinei and Junior Taulatula. Gogan was fined \$1,000 while the others received \$500 fines each, according to a letter sent to the Cowboys by the NFL office.

The Eagles would not release the names of those fined.

"That's our policy," club spokesman Ron Howard said. "Basically, it's none of your business."

But a source close to the club, who asked

not to be identified, said the Eagles fined included all four of the defensive front four tackles Mike Pitts and Jerome Brown, and ends Clyde Simmons and Reggie White. Pitts received the largest of the fines, \$1,000, the source said. Amounts of

the other fines were not known.

The NFL letter sent to the Cowboys says Toney was fined for a fight he had late in

the game with Norton.

Zendejas joined Johnson in accusing the Eagles of putting bounties on several Cowboys, including Aikman and Zendejas. The letter made no reference to bounties, however.

# Idaho's Friesz makes AP All-American team

Record-setting quarterback John Friesz of Idaho and Maine tailback Carl Smith, the division's leading rusher and scorer, were named to The Associated Press Division I-AA All-America team on Thursday.

Friesz, who set or tied five I-AA marks this season, led the division in total offense for the second straight year, finishing with a 350-yard per game average. He was second nationally in passing efficiency, completing 269 of 425 for 4,041 yards and 31 touchdowns. Friesz finished his career with 10,697 passing yards, fifth-best in NCAA history.

Smith rushed for 153 yards per game and 20 touchdowns. He ran for 100 or more yards in eight consecutive games, including a 245-yard, four-touchdown performance against Rhode Island.

Two defensive players — tackle John Jurkovic of Eastern Illinois and safety Tim Hauck of Montana — made the team for the second straight year.

Idaho, Montana, Maine, Georgia Southern and Appalachian State each have two players on the team. The squad includes four juniors and two sophomores — Smith and punter Pumpy Tudors of Tennessee-Chattanooga. The juniors are running back Joe Ross of Georgia Southern, receiver Daren Altieri of Boston University, defensive end Giff Smith of Georgia Southern and offensive tackle Al Juicevicus of Eastern Kentucky.

Rounding out the receiving corps are Peter Macon of Weber State and Lee Allen of Idaho. Macon led Division I-AA with 92 catches for 1,047 yards and Altieri was second with 75 catches for 868 yards. Allen led all receivers in passing yardage with 1,168 on 64 receptions.

Ross was fourth nationally in rushing with 1,354 yards and helped lead Georgia Southern to its third national championship in five years.

Joining Juicevicus on the offensive line are Bryan Russo of Villanova; Kirk Serafford of Montana, Derrick Graham of Appalachian State and Scott Hough of Maine. The placekicker is Ryan Weeks of Tennessee Tech, who made 16 of 21 field goal attempts and 17 of 18 extra points.

Rounding out the defensive line are Delaware's Mike Renna and Furman's Kelly Fletcher. The linebackers are Paul Solits of Youngstown State, Darion

Conner of Jackson State and Darrell Jordan of Norfolk State.

In addition to Hauck, the defensive backfield features Keith Collins of Appalachian State, David Whitmore of Stephen F. Austin and Dave Murphy of Holy Cross.

Tudors was the division's top punter with a 43.3 average.

# NBA begins suit to keep basketball out of lottery

PORTLAND, Ore. — The NBA filed a lawsuit Thursday attempting to stop the Oregon Lottery from including professional basketball in its Sports Action betting game.

The lawsuit, filed in U.S. District Court in Eugene, contends the Oregon game violates federal anti-gambling statutes a Oregon Constitution. It also contains a point-spread betting on NBA games is unfair commercial exploitation of the league's property rights and an infringement on the trademarks of the league and its teams.

The lottery commission voted unanimously Dec. 11 to add the NBA to the Sports Action contest, despite the league's promise to fight the move-in court.

The commission decided to omit Portland Trail Blazers games. Lottery director Jim Davey said the Blazers were left out of the game as a courtesy to the state's only major professional franchise.

Sports Action is scheduled to begin including NBA games in January.

"We regret having to bring this lawsuit," NBA Commissioner David Stern said in a

prepared statement. "However, as we have repeatedly stated, the NBA cannot sit idly by while a government agency misappropriates our rights."

"We believe most people in Oregon do not favor betting on NBA games, and to them we apologize for having to take this action. Unfortunately, the decision of the Lottery Commission has left us with no choice."

The Sports Action game, the first of its kind in the country, allows people to wager at least \$1 on three to 14 professional football games. To win, a person must pick all games correctly against point spreads set by Las Vegas oddsmakers. NFL officials opposed the game, but the league did not file suit to try to stop it.

Since the game began in early September, sales have exceeded \$5 million, with nearly \$2 million distributed to intercollegiate sports programs at Oregon's public colleges and universities.

The 1989 Oregon legislature authorized the lottery commission to set up a sports-oriented game and ordered proceeds to go to the sports programs at the state's colleges and universities.

# Brooks signs 3-year deal with Dodgers

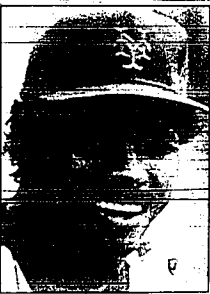

# Atlantic 10 ask Penn St. to exit by June 30

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Big Ten-bound Penn State has been sent a letter by Atlantic 10 officials suggesting the school leave the conference by June 30, The Pittsburgh Press reported today.

The decision was reached Wednesday in a telephone conference call involving the athletic directors of nine of the 10 conference schools; the newspaper reported. Penn State, which announced Tuesday it would join the Big Ten, declined to participate in the call.

The Providence Journal-Bulletin reported today that Rhode Island athletic director McKinley Boston told Commissioner Ron Bertovich to tell Penn State to sever its ties with the Atlantic 10 after this season.

"The conference does not support their lame-duck status," Boston said. "We are 100 percent against it. If they are leaving, they should just go. Basically, they should be through when their commitment to us runs out on June 30."

Penn State has said it intends to remain in the Atlantic 10 through the 1990-91 season, but Atlantic 10 commissioner Ron Bertovich, who is currently negotiating future television contracts, also said he doesn't like the Nittany Lions' lame-duck status.

Penn State president Bryce Jordan has declined to reveal the school's plans concerning the Atlantic 10, saying, "I just wouldn't be interested in commenting until I saw the letter."

Should Penn State inform each Atlantic 10 member of its withdrawal by Dec. 31, it can leave the league as of June 30. If Penn State waits until June 30, it will have to wait until June 30, 1991 or 1992.

Penn State could conceivably begin competing in some Big-Ten sports next fall, although it cannot start playing conference teams in basketball until at least the 1991-92 season. It expects to begin competing in football in the mid 1990s.

Some Big-Ten schools are booked through 1998 with three-conference games and eight conference games a year.

Other schools in the Atlantic 10 are Rutgers, Duquesne, George Washington, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, St. Bonaventure, St. Joseph's, Temple and West Virginia.

**Foreman loses training days to flu**  
ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — George Foreman will miss a couple of days of training for his Jan. 15 fight against Gerry Cooney because he is suffering from the flu, Caesars Atlantic City announced Thursday.

Caesars is the live-site promoter of the scheduled 12-round heavyweight bout at the Convention Center.

Meanwhile, promoter Bob Arum announced that Judge Anthony, Gibson of the Superior Court of New Jersey, Atlantic City, has denied a request for an injunction to stop the bout.

Ali and Muhammad and Bahr Mohammed contended they had contracts with Foreman and sought an injunction against the former heavyweight champion, Arum's Top Rank Inc. and Caesars World. They charged Foreman owed \$150,000 in advance training payments for fights that have never happened.

### 3 D.C. colleges form new conference

WASHINGTON (AP) — Catholic University will join five other NCAA Division III schools to form the Capital Athletic Conference, with league competition to begin next winter, the school's athletic director said Thursday.

Fred O'Connor said the charter members of the conference include Gallaudet University, Marymount University, Mary Washington College, St. Mary's College (Md.), and York (Pa.) College.

The six schools will compete in 13 men's and women's sports and conduct each season with a conference tournament-championship, beginning with the 1990-91 winter season.

"We are very excited to be a part of this new conference," said O'Connor, who will serve as conference president. "All these institutions possess a mutual commitment to a balance between academics and athletics."

### E. Germany backs Olympics in Berlin

EAST BERLIN (AP) — The East German sports federation said Thursday it supports a bid by Berlin for either the 2000 or 2004 Olympic Games, and West German sports officials welcomed the announcement from the other side of the divided city.

"Our position is quite clear," said Werner Neumann, a member of the secretariat of the East German sports federation, DTSB. "There is a growing interest from our side on this project."

"We favor the Olympic Games in Berlin whenever they would be given to us."

Neumann's comments, and a statement released by the DTSB saying it supports the idea of staging the Olympic Games in Berlin and Berlin West, were believed to be the first official DTSB comments supporting a Berlin Olympics.

Manfred von Richthofen, president of the West Berlin sports federation, said a committee should be set up to examine the possibility of a Summer Olympics bid for the city. He said he would meet Jan. 10 with East Berlin counterpart Rudi Emsmeyer.

Witt Laume, president of the West German Olympic Committee, said he welcomed the East German support for a Berlin Olympics. He said he would meet with DTSB officials in January to establish contacts between the groups.

### Agency to handle trades with West

EAST BERLIN (AP) — East Germany created an agency Thursday to handle player and team exchanges with Western nations and a leading sports official said he hopes Americans soon will be competing in his country.

The agency will negotiate with Western clubs for the purchase of East German soccer players, cyclists and other athletes, as well as promoting visits by foreign sportsmen to East Germany.

"We must try to bring in money, because we have some sports — like you have in the United States — that can't make money," said Werner Neumann, a member of the secretariat of the East German sports federation, known by its acronym, DTSB.

Neumann said in an interview at DTSB headquarters that East German athletes will be marketed and sold to the West in exchange for badly needed Western currency.

## Herzog finds game now has speed limit

Whitely Herzog, manager of the St. Louis Cardinals, said the days of baseball teams running to victory are over.

"Baseball is changing again," Herzog said. "I went to Kansas City and put in a running game. I came to St. Louis and stole 300 bases. We found ways to manufacture runs. But you can't run that much anymore."

"I know we worked real hard in spring — training, practicing, cheating, balking, (making) quick pitches so we can keep runners closer. So does everybody else."

As an example, Herzog points to the Cardinals' Vince Coleman, whose stolen-base total last season was a career-low 65 — 45 fewer than his 1985 total.

"He just can't get the jump he used to get," Herzog said. "I'm not sure if Herzog is just the direction the game is taking, and because of it, we're going to have to change the concept of our offense. Speed will still be important, but maybe not base-stealers. I still want to be aggressive and go first to steal. But we won't steal as much."

Does that mean an end to "turf teams," which gear their offenses to artificial home surfaces?

"You build your club to the dimensions of the ballpark, not the surface," Herzog said. "If Fenway Park had artificial turf, I wouldn't want a speed team. The key to having a good team on turf is that you have to have a real good throwing shortstop, because he needs to play deep and make a lot of

throws from the hole."

Trivia-time: On Dec. 22, 1969, who set a National Collegiate Athletic Association record by making 30 of 31 free throws?

## Florida probes infraction charges against ex-coach

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP)

University of Florida investigators are examining records to determine if former basketball coach Norm Sloan violated NCAA rules by arranging the purchase of a plane ticket for ex-Gators star Vernon Maxwell in 1987.

The Gainesville Sun reported Thursday that a document found at the offices of the University Athletic Association strengthens suspicions that a rules infraction may have occurred in connection with a ticket purchased on Maxwell's credit at a Boston Celtics basketball camp.

The newspaper said the discovery Wednesday of an invoice for another airline ticket to Boston indicates that two tickets were bought, apparently by Sloan and Maxwell could fly together on Aug. 1, 1987. If Sloan or the university paid Maxwell's airfare, it would be a violation of NCAA rules that school officials apparently did not know about when the coach was forced to retire nearly two months ago.

University officials declined comment. Efforts to reach Sloan, who has moved to North Carolina, were unsuccessful.

University Athletic Association officials said they knew only of a \$241.49 airline ticket charged to Sloan's Athletic Association expense account but with Maxwell

listed as the passenger. They speculated the ticket, bought in June 1987, may have actually been for Sloan.

But on Wednesday other documents were discovered that showed Sloan had purchased his own ticket for the trip to Boston, the newspaper said. Sloan's reservation was made on July 13, 1987, at a cost of \$297.47. The return leg for the trip was later changed, and the cost was bumped to \$415.49.

Though Sloan was forced into retirement last October because of other suspected NCAA rule violations, Florida and NCAA investigators are still trying to identify any other rule violations.

A spokesman for the NCAA said that while rules allow players to attend one professional summer camp, a coach or university cannot pay for his expenses.

The Sun reported that both tickets were paid for by the Athletic Association. Sloan told the newspaper she doesn't know how the ticket for the athlete was ever approved because, according to records, it was not accompanied by a required form giving the reason for the trip.

Although he had not seen the latest evidence, Senior Associate Athletic Director Jeremy Foley said the incident now appears more likely to be a violation.

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# Christmas shopping: Retail stores need strong finish

With the holiday shopping season winding down to its final weekend, retailers need a clutch performance to pull off a winning Christmas.

Analysts say they expect sales

of 5 percent to 8 percent for the season. Profits, however, have been squeezed by sharp markdowns aimed at bringing more customers into the stores.

Still, a strong showing in the last few days could swing some companies' bottom lines "from mediocre to good," said Irving J. Weintraub, the Los Angeles director of retail ser-

vice for the Deloitte & Touche accounting firm.

"The last week is critical," added Craig Gordon, head of Grostrouts Research in San Francisco. "A larger and larger group of people are making last-minute purchases because time has become more precious with more two-income families."

Last year, a final-weekend surge

gave retailers a healthy increase in profits and lifted general merchandise sales increases to nearly 9 percent over the previous year. Until then, it had seemed like a mediocre season.

This weekend's sales could have added importance for weaker retail concerns — particularly Campeau Corp. The Toronto-based company, which last week disclosed a widened loss of \$186 million for its third quarter, has said it might seek bankruptcy court protection for its Allied Department Stores and Federated Stores divisions as soon as late January.

Traditionally, about 50 percent of the annual profits at Campeau's department stores and other major-retail chains come in the quarter that includes Christmas.

Among the other major department store operators hoping for a boost from the holiday shopping season is R.H. Macy & Co. This month it reported a first quarter loss of \$33.1 million. In November, Carter Hawley Hale Stores posted a loss of \$13.9 million for its first quarter.

Some analysts predict steeper markdowns over the final weekend of Christmas shopping.

"The reality is that there is a lot of merchandise on the floors of the stores, and if you want to get people to buy it now, you've got to lower prices," Weintraub said.

Others said, however, that most retailers do not appear to be desperate to drum up business. Consequently, they said, consumers generally will not see across-the-board price cuts in the 50 percent range until after Christmas, if at all.

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## But reportedly shoots some of its own Romania blasts U.S. in Panama

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Romania on Thursday condemned the U.S. invasion of Panama as "brutal aggression" as its own security forces reportedly shot to death several civilians protesting the hard-line Communist regime.

A commentary in the Communist Party daily Scinteia and all other state-run media carried an article headlined, "An inadmissible act of outstanding international gravity — the U.S. aggression against the republic of Panama."

The commentary expressing the official view said Romania had "repeatedly called for 'renunciation of measures of force and threat of force' and for resolving interstate disputes 'by peaceful means only.'"

"All the much more reprehensible are the U.S. actions of 'brutal aggression as they were

# Noriega at large as tips pour in

WASHINGTON (AP) — One Panamanian caller said Manuel Noriega had escaped to Mexico.

Another knew the neighborhood where he was holed up in Panama City.

A third was sure he was in the countryside away from the capital.

U.S. forces on Thursday were sifting through a confusing array of tips, rumors and suspicions phoned in by Panamanians eager to collect the \$1 million bounty offered by the White House for information leading to Noriega's capture.

"As word of the reward spread Wednesday night, U.S. telephone operators began getting 'lots of nibbles. A lot of it turned out to be very bogus," said Rear Adm. Ted Shearer, an intelligence specialist for the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

"Shearer said callers had fingered Noriega in at least 12 locations throughout the country, at 10 sites in Panama City and in three foreign countries — Colombia, the Dominican Republic and Mexico.

U.S. officials said they believed Noriega had not left the country.

After rumors spread that Noriega or other members of the Panamanian Defense Forces' high command were in the Nicaraguan and Cuban

\$1 million price tag on his head embassies, U.S. troops in armored personnel carriers surrounded the two missions.

But despite the massive dragnet, U.S. hopes lay almost solely on getting a reliable tip.

"We're looking for him very hard," said Lt. Gen. Tom Kelly, the Pentagon's operations chief. "Of course, that's all contingent on intelligence."

American interrogators questioned

hundreds of captured Panamanian soldiers, seeking clues about Noriega's plans, said one official who asked not to be named.

"Kelly said American forces were turning on all our looking, listening, and hearing devices to see if we can 'pick' up Noriega."

Special Forces units were reportedly deployed to look for Noriega, aided by infantry troops of the 7th Army which are especially trained for urban warfare.

White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater conceded that finding Noriega in Panama City would be difficult. "In a city of a million people, it's not hard to hide out," he said.

Pentagon officials also held out the possibility that U.S. troops may have to stalk Noriega or his loyalists in Panama's jungles.

Although he is vastly outnumbered — some 24,000 U.S. troops are now in his country — Noriega is a former head of Panamanian military intelligence and was a paid informer for the CIA in the 1970s.

"He's a crafty devil, as you know," said Kelly. "He grew up in a very tough academy, so he's been

used to this for many years."

"He had a pattern of moving from place to place, even at night, sleeping at four or five different places in one evening," said Defense Secretary Dick Cheney.

Kelly said U.S. forces "thought we had a pretty good idea" where Noriega was on Tuesday night just before the start of the invasion, but "we went there and he wasn't there."

From hiding, Noriega continued to taunt the United States with an ominous message on a government-run FM radio station.

"We're in trench warfare now and we will maintain the resistance," he said. U.S. officials said they believed the rallying call had been taped and was not aired live.

It was unclear whether Noriega had substantial forces under his command.

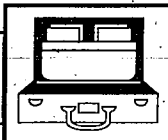
"He probably still has some bodyguards whom he pays," said Kelly, but "he probably doesn't occupy an inspirational role" with most forces because he cannot pay them.

Noriega has vowed to fight to his death, and those who know him well say he would resist capture at all costs.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

Dear Mr. Wolff: We use a jump to two no-trump by an unpassed hand to show the equivalent of the 'old-fashioned' forcing major-suit raise. (We play limit raises in the majors.) If opener jumps to game in his major after the two no-trump response, does this show extra values?
Two Jackers, Jackson Springs, N.C.
ANSWER: No, it does not. Any jump to game to show minimum opening values and little interest is a slam.
Dear Mr. Wolff: At duplicate, I passed originally with this holding:
♦ 9 7 5
♦ A K Q
♦ 6 K 10 2
♦ 4
Partner opened one spade, RHO bid two hearts and I jumped to three spades. Partner bid game, and RHO bid five hearts. With both sides vulnerable, what should I have done?
That Spot, Pasadena, Pa.
ANSWER: Although this hand holds good offensive potential, I would double. The double is not a command, merely a caution to partner. The main reason for the double is my lack of only three spades but four of RHO's trumps, coupled with a solid suit to lead (diamonds). Partner may expect at least one more spade if I pass the decision to him.

# Repeat of Muppet Christmas special reflects recent merger with Disney

They put this deal together quickly, and let me tell you, I'm pleased," says Muppets creator Jim Henson in a curiously familiar-sounding voice over the telephone from a home he owns in London.

"We originally made 'A Muppet Family Christmas' for ABC two years ago," says Henson. "But now that we're newly allied with Disney, Michael (Eisner, the company's CEO) and Jeffrey (Katzenberg, its president) decided they'd like to go with it again on 'The Magical World of Disney' (airing on NBC, Sunday, Dec. 24).

ABC aired it originally at the beginning of December, but the scheduling of it this year on Christmas Eve is especially timely," Henson says. "After all, the show's about a family gathering."

"You quickly get the feeling that Henson, who lends his voice to Kermit the Frog, would rather talk about the members of his extended Muppet family than the news-making, multi-million-dollar deal that made his Henson Associates a part of the Disney Company family a few months ago.

While Henson says the repeat showing of "A Muppet Family Christmas" on the Disney hour is the first on-air

display of the megamerger, there are many original joint projects in the works.

If Mickey and Minnie Mouse need a formal introduction to Kermit, Miss Piggy and the rest of Henson's magical creations, then "A Muppet Family Christmas" is ideal. "It's the only thing we've ever done that features all the Muppet characters," says Henson proudly.

In the cozy holiday story, Fozzie Bear brings all his main Muppet friends - Kermit, Rowlf, Gonzo, the Swedish Chef and, of course, Miss Piggy - to his mother's home to celebrate Christmas. Who should come carolling by, but Henson's "Sesame Street" characters - Bert, Ernie, Big Bird, Oscar the Grouch, Cookie Monster, et al.? And whom do Kermit, and his miniature frog nephew Robin find inhabiting a hole in the basement of Fozzie's mother's home? Why, The Fraggles, of course. At one point in this memorable Christmas Eve, Kermit, Rowlf and the gang settle down with some eggnog to watch their younger selves in home movies as Henson's most adorable and recent creations, "The Muppet Babies" of animated Saturday-morning cartoon fame.

Moreover, Mickey and Minnie might learn quite a bit about the special charm of the Muppets from this hour-long special. Unlike most other Christmas TV specials, "A Muppet Family Christmas" has a minimum of sappiness and a maximum of sly humor and charm. The Swedish Chef can't figure out what to make for Christmas dinner - until he meets Big Bird. Bert and Ernie meet Fozzie's mother's houseguest (and the only human to be featured as a character), Doc (Gerry Parks). "D" is for 'dog,' 'O' is for 'orange,' and 'C' is for 'car,'" says Bert. "Letters are a big deal where we come from."

Henson remembers the making of "A Muppet Family Christmas" as a special joy for his original Henson Associates family. "We made this in the Toronto area, and it was the only time we had all the company's puppeteers together. It really was a family feeling, just right at Christmas."

# 'Days' returns to classic plot styles

Enough of sinking ratings! "Days of Our Lives" has seen the light. Action-adventure plotting gets the old heave-ho in 1990, as "Days" goes back to basics — strong families and colorful romance.

After playing copycat for two seasons, following the leader by dumping its old format for the trendy action-adventure angle, NBC realizes it's time to cut its daytime losses, admit a mistake and go back to what works.

Step No. 1 was rehiring Al Rabin recently. As supervising executive producer for 15 years, Al got the hook nine months ago. He was considered too old-fashioned and perhaps not trendy enough.

Al took the firing in stride. Perhaps he wasn't the right man after all these years. He exited and came back like a gentleman. "I had forgotten how much I missed running the show," he said recently. "I'm happy to be back. The show got off track a little."

None of that "You should have listened to me ... I told you so."

Rabin is above gloating. He merely takes action, announcing that Julie's Susan-Seaforth-Hayes—who married nightclub owner Doug Williams (played by real-life husband Bill Hayes) in one of TV's biggest weddings 13 years ago, returns to the show for a Feb. 1 reunion with viewers.

Susan is Rabin's first salvo. Fans, the good old "Days" are back. More action for Roman Brady (Drake Hogestyn), front-and-center storyline for Patch (Stephen Nichols) and Kayla (Mary Beth Evans), Shane (Charles Shaughnessey) and Kimberly (Patsy Pease) over the holidays. Even Emilio Ramirez (Billy Hufsey) has earned his spurs.

Al Rabin admits the change from glitzy adventure yarns to basic emotional conflict should be interesting. He is certain story fundamentals beat trends on a day-in-and-day-out basis. Rabin also bets on personality and basic drives and dismisses chase and gimmicks.

Al also conducts a juggling act.

Rumors of the old-regulars-being-relieved of their roles filled the soundstages at one time, forecasting a flat-out housecleaning. However, youth did not take over, and with Susan Seaforth emoting, the old guard needn't panic.

Demoted only to be called back in a crisis, Al Rabin plays Santa Claus. He's a wise veteran rather than a brash, red-checked-new-guy-on-the-block outfit to make a name for himself.

### CHANNEL CHATTER

Auditions for soap actors are as grueling as in any medium. However a recent one took place for "Guiding Light" producers and it was unusual enough to be talked about among the other actors. Alison Dougherty decided to do a stand-up comedy routine as her audition for the role of Rae Rooney. She impressed the powers-that-be and won the part. The character of Rae was introduced doing a stand-up routine at the

Heartbreaker Cafe.

# ABC doesn't fear Barr will leave network

NEW YORK (AP)—Roseanne Barr's threat to leave her top-rated "Roseanne" doesn't worry ABC's programs chief, who said Tuesday he assumes she'll do a third season of the television comedy series.

Robert A. Iger said he hasn't discussed the matter with Barr, but just "took a wait-and-see attitude. I'm not that worried."

"I'm outta there," Barr said earlier this month on NBC's "Today" show when asked what she'd do with her television career if her movie "She-Devil" was a hit. If the movie flopped, she said, "I'm

going to leave TV anyway."

"I've spoken with her since that quote. ... I didn't address that comment at all," Iger said. "I just let it go."

"She has a contract to do the program and I assume she'll be back."

Iger, ABC Entertainment president, spoke at a news conference where he also said:

ABC has ordered eight episodes of "Elvis," a new half-hour dramatic series about rock idol Elvis Presley's early years in the mid-'50s. The new show may premiere in February, rather than

March, when ABC's other mid-season replacement series will begin.

James L. Brooks, writer of such TV comedy hits as "The Mary Tyler Moore Show," "Taxi," and "The Tracey Ullman Show," has signed an exclusive ABC deal to develop comedies for the network.

He's "not aware of any backlash" from ABC affiliates over the network's unusual decision earlier this year to try selling programs to its network rivals, including NBC, with whom ABC is working on a development deal.

# 'Roseanne' takes top ratings position; Bundy family pushes Fox into top 10

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Two sitcom housewives, ABC's "Roseanne" and Fox's Peg Bundy of "Married ... With Children," stirred up wings in the Nielsen ratings for the week ended Dec. 17.

"Roseanne" pushed NBC's "The Cosby Show" out of the top spot for the first time since Thanksgiving. "The Cosby Show," first for the last three weeks, was third behind "Roseanne" and NBC's "Cheers."

ABC continued its domination of the evening news. Its "World News Tonight" had a rating of 11.0. CBS was second with 10.4 and NBC was third with 10.2.

In the season to date, "Roseanne," starring Roseanne Barr, is slightly ahead of Cosby. Each show has won six times and "Cheers" was ahead once.

"Married ... With Children" scored its highest rating ever for Fox Broadcasting Co. and came within striking distance of the Top 10. Its one-hour Christmas special, with guest star Sam Kinison joining regulars Katey Sagal and Ed O'Neill, got a rating of 18.4 and ranked 13th.

The Fox show edged out Bob Hope's Christmas show on NBC and such favorites as ABC's "Who's the Boss?" and "Coach" and NBC's "In the Heat of the Night" and

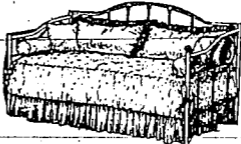

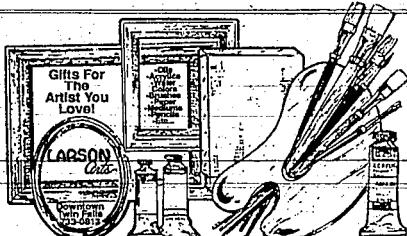
