## U.S.-Cuba tensions higher after diplomats detained

**PANAMA CITY, Panama** — U.S. troops briefly detained two Cuban diplomats late Thursday as simmering diplomatic tension between Cuban and American representatives here flared into the open.  
The incident provoked fears that the Cuban government might retaliate against U.S. diplomats in Havana as well as fuel resentment of the local diplomatic community against the American invasion of Panama.  
"It was the second such incident this week between U.S. troops and Cuban Ambassador Lazaro Mora who is said to be providing refuge in his residence for about 65 Panamanian supporters of ousted military leader Manuel Antonio Noriega, including Noriega's wife, Felicidad.  
U.S. officials said the detention came when Mora and the embassy's second in command, Alberto Cabrera, were leaving

the ambassador's residence about 4:15 p.m.  
The officials said Cabrera was unable to produce diplomatic identification and was detained. He and Mora, who chose to accompany his colleague, were placed in a U.S. armored vehicle, taken to the Cuban Embassy for Cabrera to retrieve his credentials and was released; the U.S. officials said.  
Cabrera, however, told The Miami Herald that a U.S. soldier standing guard stopped the two and took Cabrera's credentials.  
Cabrera said the soldier told him he was on a list of those to be stopped. Cabrera was taken to a holding area and detained for an hour, then released without explanation.  
"We don't know if this is a new provocation," Cabrera said. "We are sure that this is a violation of international convention."  
U.S. troops have ringed the Cuban, Nicaraguan and Libyan embassies since

the first day of the U.S. invasion that ousted Noriega.  
On Tuesday, according to a senior U.S. official, American troops stopped Mora's car outside his residence and took into custody Toti Suarez, a former member of Panama's Defense Forces and a leader of Noriega's paramilitary Dignity Battalions.  
The latest incident with the Cubans came on a day there were reports of the capture of other close Noriega associates.  
Panama's banks also opened for the first time since the invasion, but they were warned that they should be ready to freeze accounts of depositors being investigated for drug dealing.  
The biggest catch reported among Noriega collaborators was Mike Harare, a former Israeli intelligence officer who had become one of Noriega's closest confidants.  
Harare was taken into custody Wednesday, according to the official, who said he was unable to provide information about the circumstances.

## Kimberly man dies in crash in Washington

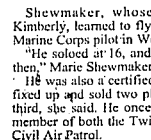
**KIMBERLY** — The widow of a Kimberly man who was killed in a plane crash Tuesday night said the way he died was appropriate because he was an avid flyer.

"At least he was doing what he loved," Marie Shewmaker said.

Kim Shewmaker, 34, was one of six people who died when their commuter flight crashed and burned in a sagebrush field short of a Tri City Airport runway in Pasco, Wash.

Marie Shewmaker said her husband was headed home from Richland, Wash., where he was based as a United Express pilot. He had left Kimberly on Saturday to work over Christmas, and was supposed to return home Thursday, which would have been his fourth wedding anniversary.

Shewmaker, whose family runs a farm in Kimberly, wanted to fly from his father, who was a Marine Corps pilot in World War II.  
"He soloed at 16, and he's been flying ever since then," Marie Shewmaker said.  
He was also a certified airplane mechanic. He had fixed up and sold two planes and was working on a third, she said. He once was a flight instructor and member of both the Twin Falls Flying Club and the Civil Air Patrol.

Shewmaker worked on the family farm until 1985, when he became a full-time pilot. His first flight instructor job was for the Yellowstone National Park fire in the summer of 1988. His work took him to Ecuador before he joined United Express as a pilot in May.

His older brother, Glenn Shewmaker, recalled that

## Dictator's followers fight on; kin jailed

**BUCHAREST, Romania** — Fighting broke out in the capital Thursday night as forces loyal to ousted dictator Nicolae Ceausescu ignored a government ultimatum to surrender or die.

The government arrested three more relatives of the executed ruler Thursday and his oldest brother was found hanged in Vienna — an apparent suicide — as the family that ruled Romania for nearly a quarter-century continued to unravel.

The revolutionary leaders also plotted with citizens to stop seeking bloody revenge against Ceausescu loyalists.  
Hungarian media, meanwhile, said Ceausescu personally gave the orders to fire on pro-democracy protesters during the wave of demonstrations last week that toppled him from power.

Despite reports that tens of thousands may have died in the week-old revolt, new estimates indicated that the total figure may be much lower.

"Sniper fire rang out during the day as a deadline passed for Ceausescu loyalists to surrender. Fighting broke out in at least two places in the capital as night fell."

Gunfire was heard for 10 minutes near the television building, where the new government is based, and secret police suddenly opened fire outside the downtown Communist Party headquarters. It was not immediately known if there were casualties.

The extent of the fighting was not known, and it was unclear how many loyalists, if any, accepted the new government's offer to surrender.

The revolutionary government on Tuesday gave Ceausescu loyalists until 5 p.m. Thursday to lay down their arms or face execution. The government said if the loyalists surrendered they would be guaranteed fair trials.

The secret police, widely hated by Romanians, have kept up their fight largely out of desperation because of fears they will face reprisals.

Bucharest radio broadcast new instructions for guards at checkpoints to inspect vehicles flying white or Red Cross flags to make sure they were not carrying Ceausescu loyalists.

The radio also warned citizens to stay off the streets after 5 p.m. In another development Thursday, a chartered Romanian airliner on a relief mission crashed in bad weather about 40 miles from Bucharest, killing its crew of six Romanians and its one passenger, British free-lance photographer Ian Parry, news reports said.

Parry, 24, was on assignment for The Sunday Times. The plane was bound for Belgrade, Yugoslavia, to collect medical supplies.

A government communique read on radio called on citizens to stop taking the law into their own hands when they caught Ceausescu loyalists. "We fervently call for an end to acts of revenge and for the achievement of national reconciliation," it said.  
The heavily armed secret police have been staging their guerrilla attacks by using a vast network of secret tunnels built for them by Ceausescu.  
Ceausescu and his wife, Elena, were executed Monday by a firing squad for genocide and other crimes against Romania.

## Australian quake kills 9, causes \$1 billion damage

**NEWCASTLE, Australia** — Rescuers crawled through the rubble of a workers' club Friday seeking victims of Australia's first fatal earthquake.

The quake killed nine people, injured 107 and devastated sections of the nation's sixth largest city.

State police headquarters in Sydney, 75 miles south of Newcastle, revised the death toll in Thursday's quake from 11 to nine, but said more people may be trapped in the wreckage of the Newcastle Workers' Club.

A preliminary estimate put overall damage

from the quake at \$1 billion.  
The quake was sent in to stop looting. The tremor toppled buildings, crumbled walls, damaged pipes and knocked out power. From Texas, President Bush sent a message of condolence to Prime Minister Bob Hawke.

Britain's Queen Elizabeth II also sent quake condolences.

Two floors of the workers' club collapsed into the parking basement, where 24 cars lay under broken concrete slabs, police said. Six bodies were taken from the club. Most were elderly women who met Thursdays to play bingo after getting their pension checks, a

## Federal budget often produced with system of smoke, mirrors

**WASHINGTON** — If there were a truth-in-packaging law for federal spending, President Bush's forthcoming budget proposal might have to carry this warning label: "This plan is optimistic at best and is likely to bear only a partial resemblance to reality."

Bush is expected to propose \$30 billion to \$40 billion in savings when he submits his \$1.2 trillion spending blueprint for fiscal 1991 in late January. That would meet a requirement in the Gramm-Rudman deficit-reduction law that the projected 1991 shortfall not exceed \$64 billion.

The numbers make the proposal sound like a tough attempt to mop

up the government's red ink, which has been about \$150 billion annually for the last three years. But a look back at how the administration and Congress went about their budget work for this year is instructive in assessing how the plan for next year may be translated into reality.

White House and legislative budget writers began the year by agreeing to use a set of optimistic economic assumptions that let them shrink the size of the anticipated 1990 deficit.

By projecting 1990 economic growth of 3.4 percent and inflation of 3.5 percent — both of which now call for lower government spending and higher revenues than are likely to occur. Look for a repetition of the

age-old tactic next year.  
Fiscal planners were also able to take advantage of technical budget rules to chip away at their projections of red ink.

In one case, the Pentagon "saved" nearly \$3 billion by shifting a payday from a Monday in early October to a Friday in late September. The reason: the new federal fiscal year begins Oct. 1.

In another instance, of the many billions of dollars the government expects to spend to bust out bankrupt savings and loan associations this year, only about \$1.4 billion of it will show up on the budget. The reason: Bush and Congress agreed that the bulk of the operation would be

## \$25 billion annual tax hike sought to erase federal deficit

**WASHINGTON** — The chairman of Congress' Joint Economic committee called Thursday for a "package deal" of a tax increase up to \$25 billion a year and equally large spending cuts to break a deadlock between President Bush and Democrats on Capitol Hill over how to reduce the \$152 billion budget deficit.

The recommended compromise would not require raising individual income tax rates, said Rep. Lee H. Hamilton, D-Ind., who made his proposal in the chairman's annual report. He did not specify what taxes should be raised, saying that there was a "long list" of possibilities that could be considered by Congress and the administration.  
But he said that a package totaling \$40 billion to \$50 billion — equally divided between spending cuts and tax increases — would put the government "on a glide path toward a balanced budget." He added, "It's

do-able."  
Hamilton also strongly opposed a Bush-backed reduction in capital gains taxes as "unfair, costly and ineffective." The opposition reflects the views of the Democratic leadership on an issue sure to be revived in 1990.

"At present, the deficit is like a hot potato passed back and forth between the administration and the Congress, as each seeks political advantage, or at least the avoidance of political pain," Hamilton said in his summary.

"If this game continues, we will all get burned," he warned.  
The president, whose antagonism to new taxes is well known, has shown no inclination to accept similar advice from Democrats in the past. Both Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., and Senate Democratic Leader George J. Mitchell (Maine) have said that no tax increase could pass Congress without active White House leadership.

# Latvia dumps party supremacy rule

MOSCOW (AP) — Latvia on Thursday joined its Baltic neighbors Lithuania as the second Soviet republic to abolish the Communist Party's constitutionally guaranteed supremacy, local activists and journalists said.

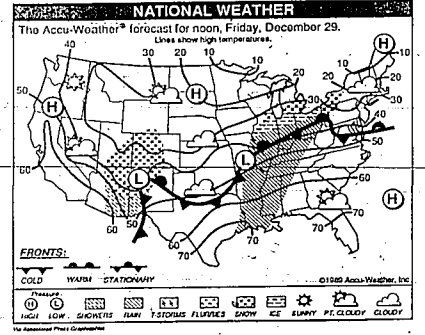
The decision to join Lithuania and much of Eastern Europe in abolishing the Communist Party's leading role came after a stormy debate lasting more than three hours, Koziols said.

The change is expected to reduce the party's grip on all spheres of life in the republic on the shores of the Baltic Sea. Like its neighbors Lithuania and Estonia, Latvia has a broad-based movement seeking independence from the Soviet Union, which forcibly annexed all three nations in 1940.

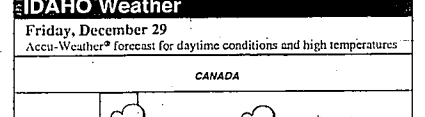

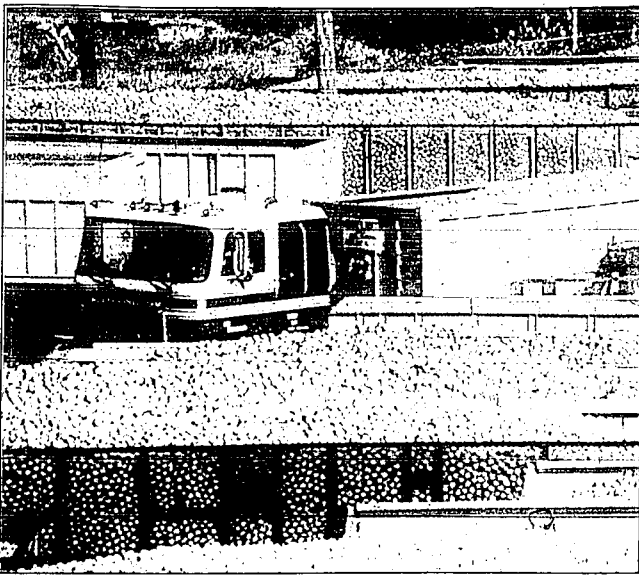

## Florida governor declares entire state disaster area after freeze

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Gov. Bob Martinez declared the entire state a disaster area Thursday because of the record-setting Christmas freeze, a move that could open the door to federal loans for growers who lost crops.

Martinez signed an executive order declaring the disaster and sent a letter to U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yuetter asking for approval of the loans, after he toured freeze-damaged vegetable farms in southern Florida.

"From what I have seen, there is no question that Florida has suffered devastating losses and that our state is a disaster area," Martinez said.

"We must now do everything we can to help those whose lives and livelihoods have been ravaged by the unmerciful weather."

There is no estimate yet of the cost of the freeze. State agriculture officials will assess each county for the exact losses, which would be needed before a federal declaration is made. That could take two or three weeks.

The hard freeze Saturday and Sunday nights damaged Florida's 700,000-acre citrus belt as well as winter vegetable crops, much of which would have gone to markets in the Northeast.

Florida's tropical fish industry, sugar cane crops and plant nurseries also suffered heavy losses.

Higher vegetable prices have already been reported, but the impact on citrus prices could be minimal because of a large juice reserve and the quick processing of frostbitten fruit into juice

concentrate.

The governor's order affects all 67 Florida counties and opens the door to a possible disaster declaration by President Bush.

A declaration would make unemployment assistance, direct grants and other assistance as well as Farmers Home Administration loans available to growers.

Martinez previously declared a statewide emergency that waived truck weight restrictions so growers could quickly haul their citrus to processing plants.

Jon Peck, the governor's press secretary, acknowledged that previous disasters this year — Hurricane Hugo, the California earthquake — could make it more difficult to obtain freeze relief because of depleted funds.

## Group claims mail bomb attacks

ATLANTA (AP) — A group calling itself Americans for a Competent Federal Judicial System has claimed responsibility for mail bombs that killed a federal judge and a civil rights lawyer, a federal official said Thursday.

At Adams, a spokesman for the Postal Inspection Service in Atlanta, said the claim was made in a letter received Wednesday by WAGA-TV in Atlanta.

Mark Hoffman, news director at the TV station, declined to release details of the letter, which Adams said was postmarked from Atlanta.

Adams would not say to whom the letter was addressed.

FBI agent William Hinshaw, who is coordinating the FBI's investigation in Atlanta, refused to comment.

Adams said federal investigators don't know anything about the group.

However, sources close to the investigation said last week that follow-up threatening letters received by targets of the mail bombs contained references to "Americans for a Competent Judiciary." At the time, the FBI said it did not know the

significance of the references.

Authorities have been investigating a series of mail bombs that killed Judge Robert Vance of the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals at his home near Birmingham, Ala., on Dec. 16 and Savannah, Ga., lawyer Robert Robinson two days later.

Two other bombs were safely removed from the 11th Circuit building in Atlanta and NAACP headquarters in Jacksonville, Fla.

Investigators believe the attacks may have been carried out by white racists.

## Airline warns of bomb threat, continues flight

WASHINGTON (AP) — Northwest Airlines took the unusual step Thursday of giving passengers the option of canceling reservations on one of its international flights because of a bomb threat.

Airline reservations clerks were advising callers of a "security threat" against Saturday's Flight 51 from Paris to Detroit. The Federal Aviation Administration said it had been informed of the telephoned threat and was helping ensure stepped-up security in Paris. The airline said the flight would still fly, but gave customers options for making other travel arrangements.

"This is an unusual threat in the fact that it's very specific, directed at a specific flight on a particular day, and that is what adds to the precautions that we're taking surrounding it," said Northwest spokesman Douglas Miller in St. Paul, Minn.

Miller said the airline received a phoned threat that a bomb would be aboard the flight. He said Northwest informed the FAA, FBI, CIA and foreign agencies that would be involved, but he would give no other details about the threat, including where or when it was made.

## Ceausescu tried, but he couldn't topple the castle

The end of Romanian dictator Nicolae Ceausescu's regime began on the morning of Dec. 16 in front of the Hungarian Reformed Church in the Transylvanian city of Timisoara.

The pastor of the congregation, the Rev. Laszlo Tokes, and his family were about to be evicted by the police and exiled to a remote village. Tokes, a human-rights advocate, chose to resist.

"My church is a castle, and the castle is under siege," he said. "It is the castle of Timisoara. Perhaps it must fall. However, if it does not fall, it may be a signal, a signal for upright Romanians."

And so it was. Around the church, a human chain of 200 parishioners soon swelled into a mass of 4,000 Orthodox Christian Romanians and Protestants.

It was the massacre of this group of believers by the Securitate and these Christians' gift of their lives on the altar of human rights that spelled the doom of Ceausescu's bloody reign in Romania.

The secret trial and execution of Ceausescu and his wife Elena were acts of revenge and created a precedent that bodes ill for the prospects of a peaceful transition to democracy in Romania.

The country is desperately poor, the people are cold and hungry. They must be fed, kept warm and prevented from unleashing a reign of terror against the Securitate and the hundreds of thousands of its former collaborators throughout Romania.

The new leader, Ion Iliescu, may be, as the facile headlines have it, a "Gorbachev ally." However, he is a Communist who may not last longer than did Egon Krenz in East Germany. Troubled times lie ahead.

Still, with all his horrors and the gruesome toll in human lives, the Romanian events carry with them seeds of a better future for the people of Eastern Europe, and perhaps the Soviet Union as well.

The luminous courage of Tokes and his supporters proved, yet again, that no force can resist an idea whose time has come.

heroism of Romanian army conscripts and that of the young people of Timisoara, Bucharest, Brasov, Arad and Sibiu remind us that freedom does not come cheap in that part of the world.

For Romania to be free, Hungarians had to die in October 1956; tens of thousands of Czechoslovaks had to suffer imprisonment and joblessness after the crushing of the Prague Spring in 1968; thousands of Solidarity activists were subjected to imprisonment and torture through most of the 1980s.

In the last 12 months, hundreds of thousands of Hungarian, East German and Czechoslovak citizens risked their lives on the streets of Budapest, East Berlin, Leipzig, Prague and Bratislava for their freedom and, eventually, Romania's.

The Romanian uprising could be the last nail in the coffin of Stalinism in Eastern Europe.

The still-powerful forces of the old regimes of East Germany, Czechoslovakia and Hungary are now certain to face political annihilation in the forthcoming free multiparty elections in 1990.

Political parties with names like "Marxist-Leninist," "Revolutionary" and "Socialist Workers" will be swept into the dustbin of history. These will be replaced by the people's forums — the Hungarian Democratic Forum, the East German New Forum and the Czechoslovak Citizens' Forum.

History is being made in Eastern Europe while the United States is preoccupied with, and is occupying, Central American banana republics.

Thus far, Mikhail S. Gorbachev, the leader of the other superpower, has kept his "intense personal friendships" with our control and wisely declined Washington's knee-jerk invitation to send Soviet troops into Romania. Today the Baltic states of

Lithuania, Estonia and Latvia are "Russia's Panama."

Instead of sending in the army to put down the rebellious Lithuania

Communists, Gorbachev is flying to Vilnius to negotiate with them. With luck, he might really earn Time magazine's Man of the Decade honor.

## The New Army: Smaller, fast-acting, Third World protection

Peace on Earth can give a general a tension headache. What can you do when the enemy starts beating his sword into stock shares, scheduling free elections and standing in line for a job at the Moscow McDonald's?

You invade Panama. OK, maybe that's cynical. After all, President Macho is the one who gave the orders to start shooting in Panama. But I can't help thinking that the generals, who used to argue against invading Panama because of the inferior-conditioned jungles, are using Panama as Operation Justify Our Budget.

I caught a bit of a press conference by Army Lt. Gen. Tom W. Kelly, the director of operations for the Joint Chiefs. When Kelly gave a brand-name plug to the invasion force's equipment, the subtitle rang out loud and clear: See, Congress? Our nice, new weapons worked. And you thought it

was all a waste of money, just because everybody knows the Russians aren't coming. And you better be dippy up the peace dividend. Rambo's back, and we've got him. It's like baking soda. When Mom started selling bonds and stopped baking cookies for the Beaver, soda makers said it was falling. So they started selling baking soda as a deodorant for the refrigerator. Sales picked up.

The Pentagon has a similar problem. American taxpayers are increasingly reluctant to pay for more than 300,000 troops, armed to the gills with high-tech whizzbangs, sitting in Europe waiting for the Warsaw Pact to invade.

The East Germans already invaded. In the immortal writing on the Berlin Wall: They came, they saw,

they did a little shopping. If Gorbachev is kicked out by neo-Stalinists, what Commie rat would have the guts to order his men to march West?

Gen. Carl E. Vuono, the Army chief of staff, is the strategic planner in charge of repackaging the Army for the new market. In "A Strategic Force in the 1990s and Beyond," Gen. Vuono argues that the new, improved threat to U.S. national security is drugs, terrorism and Third World instability. The solution: a smaller, quicker Army that can fly to a "low intensity conflict" — like, for instance, Panama — blast the locals and get home before Bob Hope can call his travel agent.

"Tired of those irritating Third World dictators? Sick of the sneers of pimple-faced drug runners? Just call for The New Army. When it absolutely positively has to be over-thrown overnight, The New Army. Overwhelming. Overnight."

(The Marines are ticked. They think rapid deployment is their job, and they want the frequent flight points.) Gen. Gordon R. Sullivan, the Army's deputy chief of staff for operations and plans, said last week that the Army should be trained to intervene in the Third World, fight drugs — and help clean up after earthquakes and hurricanes. "The Army must maintain its relevance to respond to various requirements," Sullivan said.

In other words: We're desperate for something to do. Maybe it's a coincidence that just as the Pentagon's five-year budget is in the works, the Army gets to show how quickly it can scramble into action in a Third World hot spot. (The Marines got to go, too.)

Panama also shows the limits of military power. We can blow things up. We can't create democracy with tanks, helicopters and gunships. "I'm no pacifist. I want to have a

few missiles, just in case, and some troops who can go to small countries and shoot people, if that's truly necessary to protect American lives or interests.

In Panama, with the usual-a-lot-of-Americans at risk and a declaration of war from a vicious guy like Noriega, the case for armed intervention of some sort was reasonably strong.

Intelligence gathering, or the New Army, is not the best way to deal with Third World instability, drugs, terrorism or earthquakes. Foreign aid, drug rehab, decent intelligence and the Red Cross would buy more national security for our money, if that's what's at stake.

And cutting the military-industrial complex down to a rational size would enable us to enhance our national security by cutting the deficit, thereby strengthening the economy, or investing in education. Former Defense Secretary Robert

McNamara, and Lawrence J. Korb, assistant defense secretary in Reagan's first term, told Congress recently that Pentagon spending could be cut in half in the next 10 years. Cut 5 percent — \$15 billion — annually every year, and you get to \$150 billion by the year 2000.

Defense analyst William Kaufman also concluded in a Brookings Institution study that defense spending could be cut in half over 10 years, for a total savings of \$500-billion to \$800 billion by 2000.

In 1976, we fought the Cold War on a paltry \$195 billion, in 1990 dollars. The Pentagon budget now — with peace breaking out all over — is \$305 billion, larger in constant dollars than it was in 1968, at the height of the Vietnam War.

Peace doesn't come free, but it shouldn't be this expensive.

## Connection from plant to Highway 93 is the logical choice

Writing this, I'm going to quote in a corner like Wild Bill Hickock didn't, to keep from being shot in the rear.

Populated territory to the north and northwest has done much to add to the northeastern Nevada economy.

Now the Elko County seat is betraying it. Booming from gold mining, Elko with its 17,000 people wants to harbor all the business from the Steam Power Company, including coal-fired, eight-generator plant at Thousand Springs.

Thousand Springs is between Wells and Jackpot on U.S. Highway 93 North. The project, which could cost in the neighborhood of \$6 billion, would employ hundreds of people for many years — of constructionists for years. Elko would corner this by having

the access road built from the site to Interstate Highway 80, which connects Salt Lake City, Utah, with Reno, Nev., west. Interstate 80 bisects Elko and would be 75 miles west of the proposed intersection.

Better that the connection be, as proposed by Steve Powers with Highway 93 somewhat north of the entrance to the Winnepup Ranch (one owned by Jimmy Stewart, the actor, and now part of the power project's territory). For one thing, that would cost \$5 million less.

Has the federal government imbued counties and states with lavishness? The 93 connection would serve Wells, Nev., at the intersection of I-

80 and 93 just as well, since either access would be 25 miles. Drivers would have the wheel to the right from the access to I-80, to the left on 93. Would that be so difficult?

Highway 93 has always been a good feeder of Jackpot, Wells and Elko. Why attempt to disadvantage it at this point? Further, Elko has continuously benefited from a direct route, Nevada 225, to Boise, Idaho.

The state capital, which feeds traffic from Washington and Oregon. Twin Falls — with its cargo airplane, railroad and truck routes, is the logical supply center for Thousand Springs.

It's only 77 miles straight as a die north from the proposed access connection. It siphons from the north through Twin Falls, a city of 28,000 on Interstate 84.

Elko is too small and Salt Lake City too far for such daily services. Almost unending contractor supplies will have to be delivered as well.

Much improvement work has been done by Idaho on the highway, which bisects Jackpot at the Nevada border, during the past two years; and more is scheduled. "Let's all look to the long-term pic-

ture." Al Huber of Jackpot and member of the Jackpot Town Advisory Board since its founding in 1972 until earlier this year advises. (Jackpot is unincorporated. The board advises the Elko County Commissioners on wanted actions or restrictions.)

"If the plant ultimately happens," Huber writes, "it will be the forerunner of much development in Elko County. Access to 93 will generate more business for both Wells and Elko. In fact, the added travel could well make Wells, now 1,000 population, into a city."

And he appends, "You addressing Mel Steninger, publisher of the Elko Daily Free Press) believe that Jackpot and Twin Falls would benefit from a 93 access."

"Would it be bad if Twin Falls benefited? Hasn't Elko County gained very greatly over many years from all the business coming to us from there? Everyone knows it has."

Further, "Whenever and Montello might benefit some from an I-80 access, but most of you (referring to Elkoans who have spoken out) do not seem to think this is a great concern. Apparently, you do not think

workers will opt to live in Montello (on the Nevada-Utah border with highway service to I-84, eastward) or Wendover (on I-80) and consequently take their business to Utah."

"You seem to believe that if the developer will assume the added cost of \$3 million to put the access to I-80, that this will be adequate compensation to all Elko County for all time. You call attention to all the benefits the plant will bring to our mutual county, even though it may becalomsion-ary."

Huber points out that prevailing winds are to the northwest, rarely south toward Ely (in Nevada on 93).

The plant will use low-sulphur coal from Wyoming and Utah, already subscribed, and will have scrubbers.

Richard Carson, chairman of the Jackpot Board, feels consideration of north 93 is being left out of current negotiations and aims to elaborate at the Jan. 4 meeting in Elko of the county commissioners.

Jay Snyder, Jackpot, coordinator between Elko County and the Board, assures various merits — as well as demerits — of the access will be considered at length.

"Whatever way it is put together, the sum and substance fits together that the northeastern corner of Nevada is destined for exciting economic growth. So be it."

but the fight may be harder than they think. Believe it or not, the pollution released into the air is allowed under law. In order for a plant to emit anything into the atmosphere, an air-quality permit must be obtained. The permit will only be granted after it is determined the facility will not exceed any of the air quality standards applicable to the area.

Since I'm going to school in Montana, I am unsure of the regulations that govern emissions in this area.

However, my recommendation would be to get the state and local governments to

pass tougher emissions laws. Another area that should be attacked is wood-stove smoke, as that is the main pollutant in the air during the winter time.

The fight to get cleaner air will be tough, but I'm sure it's possible to win it — especially with the emphasis on cleaning up the environment right now. Good luck.

And now New Year's Eve is upon us, with its traditions of making merry and welcoming the new year with champagne toasts. Your New Year's Eve celebration shouldn't end in a disaster on the ride home. If you've been drinking, give your keys to a non-drinking friend or call a cab — even if

you don't feel drunk. Your blood alcohol level could be higher than you think and your driving impaired. You could take a taxi home or you could ask to stay the night at your host's home, or better yet, celebrate without alcohol and avoid being on the road altogether.

"And if you do have to drive, make sure you wear your safety belt. Only 9 percent of the intoxicated drivers who had fatal crashes in 1988 were wearing safety belts. Who knows how many of them might still be alive today if they had? Happy New Year.

# Administration seeks help in rebuilding Panamanian economy

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has asked Japan to help rebuild Panama's shattered economy and has dispatched a team of experts to assess the costs of repairing the devastation caused by last week's military invasion, officials said Thursday.

Representatives from the Treasury, State and Commerce departments have begun deliberations on long-term plan to repair the damage wrought by two years of U.S. economic warfare against former Panamanian ruler

Manuel Antonio Noriega.

The Panama Economic Reconstruction Committee, the name for the inter-agency task force, is holding meetings this week with a three-man Panamanian team headed by a leading economic planner, Guillermo Chapman.

That task force will travel to Panama next week to review the situation, said a State Department official who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The focus of the Panamanian-American meeting is the transfer of

some \$400 million in Panamanian government money frozen last year in the United States. President Bush last week ordered the funds released, but the process is expected to take several weeks, administration officials said.

The administration, in talks both before and after the operation that removed Noriega from power, urged Japan to help Panama, said a Japanese Embassy official. "The U.S. expects Japan to play a significant role," said the official who spoke on condition of

anonymity.

Japan stopped its aid to Panama six months ago because of the instability created by Noriega, who has been twice indicted in the United States on drug trafficking charges. The Japanese official said that once his government recognizes the new Panamanian government installed with U.S. support last week, "we will offer new economic programs."

Japan has a strong interest in Panama's stability because many Japanese expatriates on the United States pass through the Panama

Canal.

To meet an urgent need for funds, the United States transferred \$5.82 million in money confiscated from Noriega to the new government headed by Guillermo Endara, an American military spokesman in Panama City said Thursday.

The immediate U.S. priority is to assess the direct damage from four days of bombing and shooting, which destroyed homes and offices and left thousands homeless, and from several days of extensive looting.

Alfredo Maduro, president of the Panamanian Chamber of Commerce, said Thursday that insurance brokers had estimated losses from looting or other damage to businesses in the capital at \$750 million to \$1 billion.

Maduro said businessmen planned to ask the United States for "something like a Marshall Plan for Panama" to recover.

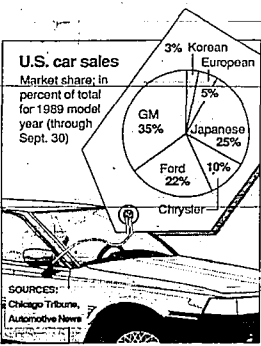
An estimated 570 people, of them 23 American servicemen, were killed in the military operation launched last Wednesday to remove Noriega from power in Panama.

# Forecast shows growth in 1990, except in cars, construction work

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. industry should enjoy its eighth consecutive year of rising sales in 1990, but the growth will be sluggish, with automaking and construction particularly hard hit, the government said Thursday in its annual forecast of winners and losers in American business.

The Commerce Department predicted that 150 of 193 manufacturing industries it surveyed would enjoy rising sales in the coming year, but the other 43, such as manufacturing, industries will experience either no sales increase or an actual drop in sales.

The median growth rate for manufacturing sales was projected to be 2 percent in 1990 from an estimated 2.2 percent rise in 1989 and a 2.5 percent median increase in sales in 1987. The median is the point where half the companies had larger sales increases and half had smaller increases.

Overall, in 1990 we see continued but slower growth for the vast majority of industries, both manufacturing and services," said Commerce Undersecretary J. Michael Ferrer. "Dominating growth are the high technology and health related industries."

In manufacturing, the big winners in 1990 were forecast to be the makers of surgical and medical instruments, with a projected 10 percent rise in shipments, followed by makers of surgical supplies, with an expected 9 percent rise in

shipments.

At the other end of the spectrum, makers of household washers and dryers were forecast to fare the worst, with a projected 5 percent drop in shipments, followed by glass manufacturers, whose shipments were expected to be down 4.9 percent. Both of those industries are tied closely to housing construction, which is expected to perform poorly next year.

The projections are included in the 31st annual "U.S. Industrial Outlook," which will go on sale to the public starting in February. The

survey also covered 157 service industries, the fastest-growing sector of the U.S. economy over the past decade.

The government projected that the big winners in services would be in the information field, including satellite communication and electronic information services, both with projected revenue increases of 20 percent.

Computer software, data processing, management consulting and public relations, medical services, and the cable television industry were all projected to enjoy growth rates of 10 percent or higher.

Two key sectors of the economy, autos and construction, were expected to have another poor year in 1990.

For motor vehicles, the report projected that car sales would fall by about 1 percent to 9.9 million units next year after falling by 1 percent in 1989, a decline which followed four years of record or near-record sales.

Car imports were expected to hold steady at about 28 percent of the market in 1990, with Japanese luxury cars continuing the trend of replacing European luxury autos as favorites of U.S. buyers.

Construction was forecast to show no improvement in 1990. The value of residential construction was expected to rise, although the number of units will decline. That disparity is explained by the fact that the fewer homes being built will be larger and more expensive.

# Castro set to hit U.S. nuclear plant in '83

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Cuban general who defected three years ago has said that President Fidel Castro was prepared to launch an air strike against a nuclear power installation in south Florida if the United States had blockaded Cuba during a tense period in 1983.

Gen. Rafael del Pino, the highest ranking Cuban defector, said that Castro was worried about a possible U.S. blockade of Cuba at the time of the U.S.-led invasion of Grenada in October 1983.

Del Pino said Castro summoned the high military command and ordered them, as a contingency, to have the computers aboard MIG-23 fighter planes programmed to fly to a nuclear energy plant in south Florida.

An air strike was to have been ordered if there were "some type of blockade of Cuba, some type of reaction on the part of the United States, a product of the situation in Grenada," he said.

The invasion of Grenada generated anxiety in Cuba because the two governments had established

close political and military ties. Cuban officials were concerned that Cuba might be the next target of the Reagan administration.

Del Pino commented in an interview with Radio Marti, the Voice of America broadcast operation to Cuba. A transcript was made available Thursday.

The spokesman at the Cuban diplomatic mission in Washington attached to the Czech embassy was not available for comment on del Pino's allegations, his office said.

The installation del Pino was referring to apparently was Turkey Point, about 24 miles south of Miami where two nuclear generators are located. The facility is operated by the Florida Power & Light Co. and is adjacent to Homestead Air Force Base, which closely monitors all incoming flights in the area.

According to del Pino, the Cuban MIGs are equipped with conventional as opposed to nuclear bombs.

# Small quakes raise big fears

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — A series of small earthquakes rattled Southern California on Wednesday and Thursday, raising scientists' concern somewhat about the possibility of a major jolt.

A quake measuring 4.3 on the Richter scale jolted people awake at 1:41 a.m. Thursday in an area stretching about 120 miles from Los Angeles to east of Palm Springs. No injuries or damage were reported.

That quake was the largest of about 10 that began Wednesday afternoon and were centered in an area seven miles from downtown San Bernardino, said seismologist Kate Hutton of the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena.

# Court asked to keep spill facts secret

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Exxon Corp., Alyeska Pipeline Service Co. and other defendants in more than 150 lawsuits resulting from the Exxon Valdez oil spill are asking that all evidence be kept secret until the cases go to trial.

The order, requested earlier this month, has come under fire from the state and other plaintiffs, who contend that Alaska's legislative responsibilities and the public's right to know demand release of such information.

Superior Court Judge Brian Shortell is scheduled to rule on the secrecy order next month. Violating the secrecy order would result in contempt charges.

As requested by the oil companies, the order would bar all parties from disclosing virtually anything learned during the discovery phase of the litigation.

It would apply to legal motions, corporate records and sworn statements of company officials.

Attorneys say the lawsuits may not go to trial for a decade, and most probably will be settled out of court.

A secrecy order could prevent the public from learning exactly what caused the March 24 wreck of the Exxon Valdez, why efforts to clean up and clean up the nearly 11 million gallons of crude oil from Prince William Sound failed.

Even the state would be forbidden to disclose what it had learned about the spill. Critics of the request said that would impair the ability of lawmakers and environmental officials to do a better job of regulating the industry.

National Wildlife Federation President Jay Hair calls the proposed order a "distasteful and obnoxious attempt to hide the facts from the American people."

"These oil companies are terrified that the public could learn the complete details about what they have done," he said.

John Peterson, a management consultant for Exxon, said release of large quantities of internal business records could result in disclosure of trade secrets — even if the individual documents contained no information.

Competitors could piece together bits of bits of information, creating a mosaic of Exxon operations that would betray trade secrets, he said.

**Rebels in Kenya capture 3 key towns**

**Nairobi, Kenya (AP)** — Rebels fighting for 14 years to turn Ethiopia into a socialist state claim to have captured three key towns and are making perhaps their biggest push yet against the foundering government's spirited forces.

The rebels claim to be battling the Marxist government's troops along the nation's main north-south highway and are fighting within 100 miles of the capital of Addis Ababa, Western diplomats said Thursday.

The escalating bloodshed comes as a devastating drought threatens to bring famine to 4 million people, most of them in northern Ethiopia, where the rebels are based.

The rebels, the Tigre People's Liberation Front, say that in the last 10 days they have captured the garrison town of Debre Tabor in northwest Gonder province and the towns of Rabel and Mehal Meda in the same province.

Addis Ababa is located in Shoa province.

**33 die in tropical cold wave in Asia**

**Dhaka, Bangladesh (AP)** — A cold wave in normally tropical northern Bangladesh has killed at least 33 people in the past week, a newspaper reported Thursday.

Temperatures in the region have hovered at about 42 degrees Fahrenheit since Monday, and the New Nation newspaper said the victims were laborers and other poor people unable to protect themselves from the cold.

At least 18 people were reported killed in the Kurigant district, 150 miles north of Dhaka, in the past three days, the English-language daily said.

Another 15 deaths were reported from the Pabna and Rangpur districts, also in the north.

**Floods uproot thousands of Brazilians**

**Rio de Janeiro, Brazil (AP)** — Flooding worsened through Brazil's normally arid northeastern region, forcing more than 200,000 people to flee their homes, many by canoes and rowboats, a city official said Thursday.

At least 24 people drowned or were buried by mudslides or collapsing houses, according to unofficial reports.

Rain-swollen rivers overflowed and hit 175 cities and towns in eight of Brazil's 26 states, civil defense spokesman Silvio Reiner said by telephone from Brasilia, the capital, 745 miles northwest of Rio.

In northeastern Bahia state, 105,000 people were driven from their homes after more than two weeks of heavy rain, he said.

Worst hit was the historic city of Cachoeira, 930 miles northeast of Rio. The Paraguaçu River overflowed and covered much of the city, considered a national historic monument for its 18th century Portuguese colonial houses and churches.

**Bulgarians rally for speedy reforms**

**Sofia, Bulgaria (AP)** — Thousands of Bulgarians demonstrated in a park Thursday to demand that the government move more quickly to bring democracy to their country.

At a second rally in Sofia, thousands of ethnic Turks and other Muslims demonstrated against government persecution and also demanded more democracy.

The rallies came one day after the ruling Communist Party Politburo on Tuesday agreed to talks with the opposition beginning Jan. 3.

The party agreed to the negotiations after Podkrepa, an independent trade union, threatened to call strikes unless talks were held.

**Dubcek elected leader of Czech parliament**

**PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP)** — Alexander Dubcek, the champion of the "Prague Spring" reforms, triumphantly returned to Prague Thursday as the leader of parliament after two decades in forced obscurity.

"This is a moral satisfaction to the hundreds of thousands of people who have upheld the ideals" of political pluralism and individual freedom, Dubcek told legislators after he was unanimously elected by the 269 deputies present.

The televised vote by the Communist-dominated 350-member Federal Assembly for a man ousted and banished by authorities would have been unimaginable just two months ago.

Dubcek's political renaissance is just the latest in a series of historic political victories for Czechoslovakia's pro-democracy movement. Since mid-November, it ousted the hard-line Communist leadership and installed a reform government dominated by non-Communists.

Czechoslovakia's changes have come amid democratic reforms in Poland, Hungary, East Germany, Bulgaria and Romania this year.

On Friday, the parliament was to meet Prague's Hradecny Castle to elect playwright and opposition leader Vaclav Havel as president. Havel is to be inaugurated immediately after the vote.

Deputies voted Thursday to amend the presidential oath to be taken by Havel to eliminate the pledge of allegiance to socialism.

In his acceptance speech before parliament, Dubcek praised the peaceful revolution as a continuation of the reforms that began in 1968 and were crushed by a Soviet-led invasion.

"The deep changes in society ... have resulted in my return to the responsible work in the highest

legislative body in the land," Dubcek said. "The autumn of 1989 developed the ideals of the Prague Spring of 1968 and inspires our nation today toward new creative actions."

After the Soviet-led invasion, Dubcek fled, ousted as Communist Party chief, expelled from the party, and sent to work as a forestry manager in Bratislava where he was kept under police surveillance. Although renowned abroad, he was excluded from the state-controlled media in Czechoslovakia.

He recaptured the spotlight Nov. 24, speaking to 250,000 pro-democracy demonstrators on Prague's Wenceslas Square.

Next to Havel, Dubcek is the second most powerful symbol of reform in Czechoslovakia and is the favorite son in his native Slovakia.

**E. German paper warns of neo-Nazi tendencies**

**WEST BERLIN (AP)** — An East German newspaper on Thursday warned of growing right-wing extremism in the country, and the official news agency reported that a memorial to the Soviet soldiers who fought the Nazis had been defaced.

A researcher who requested anonymity told the newspaper Jung Welt that neo-Nazi groups were growing in and creating a "pogrom atmosphere."

The newspaper said the researcher, a sociologist, wished to remain anonymous because of threats from right-wing extremists.

Jung Welt also printed a letter it said was received recently.

"We are not to be stopped anymore," said the hand-written letter, signed with the Nazi salute "Sieg Heil" and carrying a swastika in the bottom left corner.

East German opposition leaders and the coalition government late Wednesday issued a joint statement expressing "deep concern" over the increase in neo-fascist incidents.

The statement said 44 acts of violence by suspected neo-Nazis were registered by police in 1988, while there were already 144 such incidents by the end of November this year.

The official news agency ADN said vandals in East Berlin defaced a 40-foot bronze statue of a Soviet

soldier carrying a child, a monument to Soviet soldiers killed in the 1945 battle to liberate Berlin from the Nazis.

One spray-painted message scrawled overnight said, "Occupiers Go Home," and another said, "Blast the last prison of peoples, the USSR," ADN said.

The agency said the slogans were removed but officials had temporarily closed the park.

East Germany is the Soviet Union's most important strategic ally in the Warsaw Pact, and the Soviets keep about 380,000 troops in East Germany, according to Western estimates.

In the Jung Welt interview, the unidentified researcher said that in early 1988 there were about "1,000 organized neo-fascists, but their numbers now are much larger, not including their sympathizers."

He said most of the extremists were between 18 and 26 years of age and were particularly aggressive toward foreigners and leftists, "who for them represent slovenliness, disorder and dirt."

**Chinese police alert to keep movement out**

**BEIJING (AP)** — Premier Li Peng on Thursday ordered the People's Armed Police to keep alert against subversion, and the Foreign Ministry vowed that political changes in East Europe won't affect China.

Chinese authorities are raising defenses — with both surveillance and by ideological work — against any renewal of pro-democracy protests inspired by Romania's example.

Work units began holding political meetings to instruct their employees not to let the ouster of Romania's hard-line president, Nicolae Ceausescu, shake their faith in socialism.

More plainclothes police were seen on Beijing's college campuses, where several anonymous, illegal posters have gone up in the past week mocking Ceausescu and urging China to learn from Romania.

At Beijing University, Qinghua University, Beijing Normal University and other colleges whose students led massive pro-democracy protests in Beijing in the spring, Romania was the main topic of conversation, with most students expressing joy over Ceausescu's ouster.

Several Chinese and Western sources said independent marches to celebrate events in Romania but were found out and stopped. The reports could not be independently confirmed.

The Beijing city government reiterated Thursday that it or the central government must approve any gatherings or demonstrations in Tiananmen Square, the focal point of the spring protests. The central government recently approved a law making most demonstrations illegal.

The official Xinhua News Agency said Li, party General Secretary Jiang Qemin and top military and police officials met with the party committee of the People's Armed Police, an armed force separate from the army that is responsible for guarding state installations and putting down major disturbances.

# State officials object to high tax ranking

### Parents file suit over boating death.

**BOISE (AP)** — The parents of a Spokane youth who died when his motorboat hit a log boom on Lake Coeur d'Alene have sued the company pulling the logs.

John Lucassen and Linda Silverman filed suit Dec. 19 against Lafferty Transportation Co. in U.S. District Court in Boise.

Lucassen's stepson, 16-year-old Bryan Lucassen, died the night of Aug. 9, 1988 when the family powerboat struck a mile-long log boom being towed in a channel between Arrow Point and Kidd Island. A passenger, Matthew Howard, 16, also of Spokane, suffered cuts and bruises and was treated at a local hospital.

Investigating officers said the boom was being towed by a tugboat and reportedly was well-lighted.

But the plaintiffs contend in the suit Lafferty was negligent in not illuminating the boom well enough to warn boaters. They have asked for damages to be determined at the trial.

### BSU ready to open technology facility

**BOISE (AP)** — Boise State University's new \$4.9 million, 63,000-square-foot College of Technology building is ready to open for business Jan. 15.

Boise State President John Keiser showed off the facility Wednesday, and said he has high hopes for the added opportunities it will bring to local higher education.

"The big thing is that it will provide what everyone wanted — service to students in areas of technology that had been missing in the Boise area," Keiser said. "It's a major step for us. I think it likely will be a model for the Northwest very soon."

The College of Technology will include University of Idaho four-year programs in computer and electrical engineering as well as Boise State's two-year pre-engineering program.

### Boise man honored for anti-drug work

**BOISE (AP)** — Boise policeman Jerry Lister is among 50 Americans recognized by USA Today for anti-drug work as nominees for the newspaper's Drug Buster awards.

Lister, 40, began PAVADA, Parents and Youth Against Drug Abuse. The group has provided drug education to approximately 11,000 people, USA Today said in its Wednesday edition.

"I started it, but it wouldn't be nearly the organization it is without the volunteers," Lister said.

### Man dies in accident near Orofino

**OROFINO (AP)** — A Pierce man was killed and a woman was seriously injured in a two-car accident on a county road 12 miles east of Orofino, Clearwater County Sheriff Nick Albers said.

Eugene F. Burch, 57, died about 4:16 p.m. Wednesday at the scene of the accident, Albers said.

A passenger in the Burch car, Priscilla C. Burch, 59, also of Pierce, was hospitalized in serious condition Thursday at St. Joseph Regional Medical Center in Lewiston.

The driver of the second car, William House, 29, of Lewiston, was taken to Clearwater Valley Hospital in Lewiston and released later.

**BOISE (AP)** — Idaho officials are unhappy with an article in the latest issue of Money magazine indicating the state has the nation's fifth-highest taxes.

"We have a low cost of living with moderate taxes, and that's not reflected in this article in an accurate way whatsoever," Jim Hawkins, director of the state Department of Commerce, said Wednesday.

The article, titled "Taxes You Can No Longer Ignore," includes a ranking of the 50 states and the District of Columbia, based on the income taxes, sales taxes and gasoline taxes a family earning about \$60,000 a year would pay.

But Hawkins said that is not a fair way to compare Idaho to other states. "Anybody can play the number game. It's how you want to focus it," he said.

Hawkins cited another national survey that compared the overall cost of living for a family making \$20,000 a year in one major city in each state. Boise ranked 37th, with the cost of living at 95 percent of the national average.

Manchester, N.H., on the other hand, was one of the more expensive places to live, Hawkins said, with the cost of living at more than 120 percent of the national average.

New Hampshire is ranked as the least-taxing state in the Money

magazine survey.

The Money article notes that its rankings could be skewed by a number of factors. Connecticut, for example, rates 45th, which would suggest that its taxes are low. That ranking came largely because the state has no tax on wages or salaries.

But Connecticut levies a number of user fees, taxes a wide range of services, charges a 10-percent tax on amusements and has steep personal-property and capital-gains taxes, according to the article.

Teresa Tritch, the reporter who wrote the article, and Deborah Lohse, who compiled the rankings, said the magazine's rankings tried to compare apples to apples — which meant leaving out taxes that vary within states like property taxes and focusing on a few basics.

## Tribes have need for Indian graduates

**MOSCOW (AP)** — Demand is high among the nation's Indian tribes for native American graduates in natural resource management, but finances remain the major barrier to tribal members getting that degree, officials say.

The Coeur d'Alene, Nez Perce and Shoshone-Bannock tribes in Idaho want Indians to manage their natural resources, but only one of them — 36 professional natural resource management jobs is held by an Indian.

"As of now, we are short of those people," Allen Pinkham, Nez Perce Tribal Executive Committee chairman, said.

Leonard Johnson, associate dean for academics and continuing education at the University of Idaho's College of Forestry, Wildlife and Range Sciences, said the job market for Indian graduates is excellent.

"They probably would be able to look at two or three options of where they would like to go to work and the type of job they could go into," Johnson said.

But there is little in the way of

financial assistance for tribal members seeking a natural resource management degree, according to James Fazio, who heads Idaho's wildland recreation management department. There is no specific state aid for potential students from Idaho tribes, Fazio said, and federal assistance funneled through the U.S. Forest Service to recruit high school students into natural resource management programs in college has been diverted to recruiting Indians from junior colleges to four-year schools.

## Air Force request may hurt schools

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Whether the Air Force seeks 396 or 455,000 acres for an electronic battlefield in the west desert, the potential impact on Utah's public school lands needs to be taken into account, a state official says.

A recent letter from a top Bureau of Land Management official indicated that as much as 455,000 acres could be withdrawn from public use for the combat range. But the Air Force has downplayed that estimate as a "worst case" scenario.

The original proposal calls for the withdrawal of 396 acres for siting equipment for the combat range.

"If they withdraw 455,000 acres of land, it could impact up to 50,000 acres of school trust lands," said Karl Kappe, policy integration manager for the Division of State Lands and Forestry.

The trust lands now are producing money for public education through mineral and grazing leases.

School trust lands are scattered throughout the state, based on an agreement between Utah and the federal government going back to statehood.

In the 1980s, the state received 320 acres near Lakepoint that is suitable for evaporation ponds, in exchange for school lands already "captured" with the High Line fence.

If more trust land is taken by the Air Force to create an electronics combat test range, the state probably will be looking for another land exchange to recover the revenues lost from grazing and mineral leases, he said.

But the most likely procedure would be to ask Congress to supervise an exchange. "Given the history of negotiations with the federal government on trust lands, we wouldn't rely on them," Kappe said.

## U of I receives research grant

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — The University of Idaho and a citizens' organization have benefited from grants awarded by the Northwest Area Foundation in Minnesota.

The Foundation was established in 1934 by Louis Hill, son of James J. Hill, builder of the Great Northern Railway. It supports projects that improve local economies, natural resource conservation and the arts.

Some 50 grants have been awarded this year, totaling more than \$6 million. The Foundation, with assets totaling more than \$220 million, makes grants in Minnesota, Iowa, the Dakotas, Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

The UI College of Forestry, Wildlife and Ranges Sciences will receive \$22,105 for a program to add value to Idaho forest products.

New technology would help mid-sized businesses increase employment and stabilize communities.

Some \$120,000 goes to the Idaho Citizen's Network Research and Education in the fall. It will increase the ability of Idaho residents to take part in policy-making regarding groundwater.

The U.S. Postal Service and all other federal, state, and county offices will be closed Monday. No mail will be delivered. Trash pick-up schedules will be pushed back one day. Banks will not be open.

### Area lawyers give support to Bistline re-election bid

TWIN FALLS - Two Twin Falls lawyers have joined the committee supporting re-election of state Supreme Court Justice Stephen Bistline.

Monte Carlson and Susan Roy join Twin Falls attorney Lloyd Webb in supporting Bistline's bid to remain on the state's highest court.

Bistline was appointed to the state Supreme Court in 1976 by Gov. Cecil Andrus. He has been re-elected twice without opposition and will be up for re-election again in November.

State Sen. C.A. "Skip" Smyser, R-Parma, has indicated an interest in Bistline's post.

Former Idaho Supreme Court Justice Robert Huntley and former district judges Arnold Beebe, Blackfoot, and Dar Cogswell, Sandpoint, have also added their names to the re-elect Bistline committee. In an announcement Thursday, former state Board of Education Chairman Eugene Miller, Coeur d'Alene, and former Idaho Supreme Court Clerk R.H. "Bill" Young, Nampa, said they will support the justice.

Young, a Republican who served as speaker of the Idaho House, noted Bistline was appointed by Andrus, a Democrat, but stressed the non-partisan nature of the race.

### Early morning burglar nabs equipment from Burley store

BURLEY - A music store on Overland Avenue was burglarized early Thursday morning, a Cassia County Sheriff's detective said.

The thief or thieves broke two windows and entered the House of Music between midnight and 7:30 a.m., the detective said. Stolen were T-shirts, CD players, cassettes and jewelry. Some of the items were recovered in an alley in the 1000 block of Overland Avenue.

The detective did not know the value of the stolen merchandise, but said the department is investigating and has suspects.

### Minor earthquake rumbles through Custer County

CHALLIS - An earthquake measuring 3.5 on the Richter scale shook Custer County Tuesday night, but no injuries or damage were reported.

Jan Spiker, a Custer County sheriff's dispatcher, said the quake hit at 11:13 p.m. and was centered about 10 miles northwest of Challis.

"We're had a number of calls," she said Wednesday, "but so far we've had no reports of injuries or damage - just a lot of shaking."

A quake measuring 7.3 centered southeast of Challis near Mount Borah killed two children on Oct. 28, 1983.

### INEL grant to aid brain cancer research at WSU

ARCO - The Idaho National Engineering Laboratory has awarded a \$450,000 grant to Washington State University for ongoing cancer research.

The money will support the research on the Boron Neutron Capture Therapy to cure a form of brain cancer that does not respond well to surgery.

Although the project began in March 1987, the treatment phase of the research only got under way in August. The technology is being used on dogs diagnosed as having tumors and referred to the WSU animal clinic.

A non-radioactive isotope of boron is injected into the cancer victim, which migrates to the tumor.

## Idaho may initiate gas station insurance pool

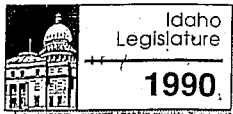
TWIN FALLS - If Idaho's Legislature heeds service station owners' pleas for help, the price of gasoline may rise a penny a gallon.

If the Legislature doesn't establish a state insurance fund for underground fuel storage tanks, the price of a gallon of gasoline could rise even more.

New federal regulations covering underground fuel storage tanks have sent service station owners, highway districts and school districts scrambling to buy \$1 million in liability insurance as mandated by the Environmental Protection Agency.

Many tank owners are finding the price of those policies beyond their reach.

Jim Lynch, who owns eight Mr. Gas service stations in Burley, Rupert and Twin



Falls, said an insurance company told him it would charge \$300,000 a year to insure his underground tanks.

"That's great, if I could raise the price of gas \$2 or \$3," Lynch said. "But you're not going to pay that."

State Rep. Ernest Hale, R-Burley, spent the summer serving on an interim committee studying how the new federal regulations will affect Idaho.

"It's a sticky mess," Hale said. "A lot of station owners are going to throw up their

hands."

Hale said his committee plans to introduce a bill calling for a state insurance pool covering underground tanks. Lynch said the proposal he's seen calls for a 1 cent per gallon tax to help fund the pool.

"We'll all be paying for a cleaner environment," he said.

Because the EPA regulations go into effect in early April, Lynch said station owners hope the Legislature acts early in the session on establishing a state insurance pool.

Underground fuel storage tanks won't be the only pressing environmental issue the Legislature will face when it reconvenes Jan. 8. Magic Valley lawmakers say the counties also desperately need their help to meet new EPA mandates on solid waste disposal.

The Legislature may be asked to help

fund regional dump sites.

"If it takes \$4 million just to put in a new garbage pit what does a county like Camas or Lincoln do?" said state Rep. Ralph Peters, R-Jerome.

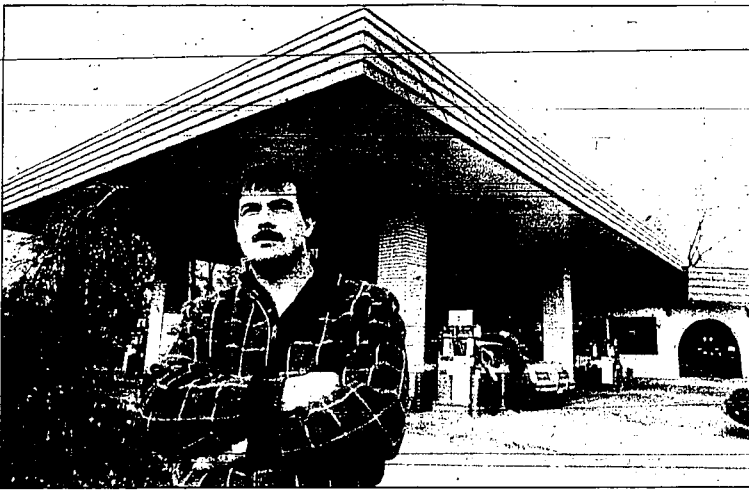
"We're going to have to have some cooperation on this thing," said Peters, who last month retired as mayor of Jerome. "It's going to be a real headache," he said.

To help counties with their solid waste problems, the public could be asked to recycle their trash. But area lawmakers say the Legislature won't force them by passing a mandatory recycling law this year.

Idahoans may be offered some incentives to recycle, however. State Sen. Lynn Tomingna, R-Rupert, said he'll poll his colleagues to see if there would be support for a bottle bill.

State Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, said

## Organic crops may receive state certification

TWIN FALLS - State Sen. John Peavey would like crops grown without chemicals to receive an "organic" stamp of approval from the state.

Peavey, D-Carey, a member of the Senate Agriculture Affairs committee, said he'll introduce a bill in the upcoming legislative session to establish a state certification for organically grown products.

As consumers demonstrate they are willing to pay more for chemical-free foods, an official state organic crop certification could be an economic boon to Idaho farmers, Peavey said.

The certification would help those who truly grow organic products, he said. It would also help weed out those who mislabel their crops as "organic."

"There's a lot of cheating in that area," he said.

Last year, Idaho's Legislature passed several new laws affecting agriculture, including restrictions on the application of farm chemicals, an indemnity fund to protect farmers from warehouse bankruptcies -

## After the fire: Equipment can't be repaired, losses high

BUHL - The owner of B & L Meat estimates that a Christmas night fire caused \$185,000 in damage to his meat-processing plant.

Jim Killinger doubted that any of his equipment in the building could be repaired.

"I think it's going to be a scratch situation," he said Thursday.

But and Fire firefighters spent almost three hours Monday night dousing the blaze, which was caused accidentally by an air compressor.

He visited the site on Thursday "and saw things melted down," he said.

"Looking at the surface, you might think you can salvage some things, but I don't

think so," he said.

The fire flared up early Tuesday morning but was quickly extinguished, and flared up again Wednesday night.

Buhl Fire Chief Mark Grimes said smouldering insulation caused Wednesday's fire, which was put out in about an hour.

Grimes said the sawdust insulation makes flare-ups a possibility for several

more days.

"I wouldn't doubt it if we get another call in a week or so," he said.

Killinger said he expects to rebuild the meat-processing plant in the next four to six months. Weather could delay the project.

"It's kind of hard to pour cement when there's frost on the ground," he said.

## Tiny mistletoe causes big problems

SUN VALLEY - A tiny little plant is destroying some of Bald Mountain's biggest - and most visible - trees.

Dwarf mistletoe is the kistkin cousin of Christmas-mistletoe. But this sap-sucking parasite eats no festive purpose.

It is the No. 1 forest disease in the Pacific Northwest.

And it is relentlessly killing the tall Douglas firs that line Bald Mountain's world-famous ski runs, branch-by-branch, tree by tree, grove by grove.

"Some stands are just stands of snags," said Butch Harper, recreation specialist with the Ketchum Ranger District.

The U.S. Forest Service, with the help of the Sun Valley Co., has focused its dwarf mistletoe attack on the infested trees of Bald Mountain.

"No matter where you go on the forest, you find dwarf mistletoe. Forest Service spokesman Ed Waldappel said. But "Bald Mountain is an extremely valuable mountain. If there was no ski area, doubt that we'd have that concentrated an effort."

Dwarf mistletoe has caused more loss of growth each year in conifers than the total growth loss from fire and insects. In the West alone the annual loss is estimated at \$2.2 billion board feet, according to Forest Service figures.

In Idaho, dwarf mistletoe has infested more than 3 million acres, or 30 to 40 percent of the state's forest land, according to the Forest Service.

All conifers are vulnerable to the parasite, but each of the 32 varieties of dwarf mistletoe found in North America attacks only one kind of tree. Douglas fir mistletoe does not affect other conifers.

A project to eradicate the parasite on the famed mountain began in 1983. Each year, crews remove diseased trees and

dead wood from the forest floor to reduce the danger of wildfire.

Though fire is the only natural control, "we can't afford a wildfire on the mountain," Waldappel said.

The removed trees are replaced with trees such as lodgepole pine or Englemann-spruce, which are not susceptible to the Douglas fir dwarf mistletoe.

Sun Valley Co. takes the trees off the mountain. Useless wood is burned, and the rest is cut up and sold as firewood.

The project's goal is to preserve the continuity of timber along and between ski runs on the mountain.

"I don't think we're winning," said Max McKinnon, Sun Valley Co.'s director of mountain operations.

Losing stands of trees could mean the loss of windbreaks on some runs. The trees also help hold the snow to reduce avalanches, and their shade keeps the snow longer in the spring.

But loss of the trees is mostly an aesthetic loss.

"It's not going to bother the skiing," McKinnon said.

Other types of dwarf mistletoe also are a problem in the Sawtooth National Forest.

The incidence of lodgepole pine dwarf mistletoe in southern Idaho is highest in the South Hills. But lodgepole mistletoe is easier to treat, Hoffman said.

A survey of part of the South Hills earlier this year showed that more than half the stands of lodgepole were infested with the parasite.

Bur firefighters to remove the infested trees seem to be working. A survey of the same area 11 years ago showed about 80 percent of the stands were infested, Hoffman said.

## Parasite spreading with fervor

TWIN FALLS - Stealthily, relentlessly, dwarf mistletoe cuts its way into the heart of Idaho's forests.

The small, yellowish parasite with tiny scale-like leaves can be seen growing out of tree branches, in summer, fruits mature in the form of pea-sized capsules. When the capsules are mature, the slightest movement will cause them to explode, each spitting out a single wheat-grain-size seed.

The seed sails as far as 30 feet, often landing in a nearby tree.

When the sticky seed lands on a tree

branch, it sends a root-like growth into the branch. The growth spreads and causes conspicuous swellings and dense, bushy growth in the branches known as "witches'-brooms."

Some of the "witches' brooms" in Bald Mountain Douglas fir reach 200 to 300 pounds each, Forest Service plant pathologist Jim Hoffman said. The parasitic growth starves the tree from the top down. It slows growth and causes branch and stem deformity, loss of vigor and premature death.

Historically, wildfires have kept the parasite in check, but more effective fire

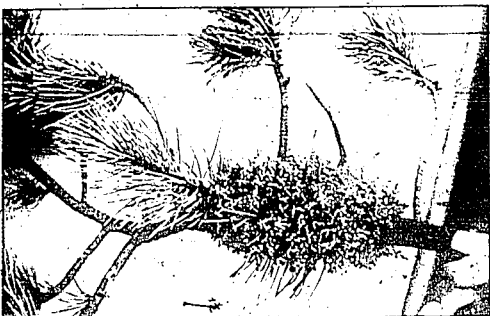

# Central American expert links Mormon attacks to CIA fear

POCATELLO (AP) — An Idaho State University specialist on Central American affairs thinks recent attacks on Mormon churches in that region may be related to a perception that church representatives are working for the United States' Central Intelligence Agency.

"This is all speculation, but I have heard that Mormon missionaries are alleged to have worked with the CIA," Mary Jane Hogan, an assistant professor of history at Idaho State, said Thursday. "I don't know if it's true, but the perception in Latin America is certainly there."

But a spokesman for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints

reiterated that such a perception is false.

"That's a charge that those who are opposed to the work of the church have made from time to time, and it's absolutely false," Jerry Cahill said. "The sole responsibility of our missionaries is to spread the word of Jesus Christ. They are instructed not to get involved in any activities whatsoever while they are in foreign countries, and that includes political activities of any kind."

Ms. Hogan said the balance of power in Latin America is shifting from the traditional Catholic Church to various fundamentalist Protestant

faiths while the Catholic Church has been split between the traditional and what is called 'liberation theology' that has prompted some priests to resort to violence to defend the rights of the poor.

"When you take the resurgence of evangelical Protestant faiths, the schism within the Catholic Church and the general attitude toward the United States, the LDS churches are a pretty obvious target," Hogan said.

Former Pocatello mayor Donna Boe has traveled to Latin America several times in recent years and found most Latin Americans highly suspicious of the United States.

# DOE criticizes fight over nuke dump

CARSON CITY, Nev. (AP) — Nevada's lawsuit against federal Energy Secretary James Watkins to block construction of a high-level nuclear dump in this state is "without legal merit," the DOE said Thursday.

The agency issued a statement adding that it is "conscientiously" attempting to carry out a law enacted by Congress in 1987 to conduct scientific studies to ensure the dump

site at Yucca Mountain is suitable.

The state's actions have frustrated DOE from carrying out the will of Congress, the agency said following the lawsuit filing by Nevada Attorney General Brian McKay.

The suit was filed after Gov. Bob Miller rejected four permit requests by the DOE to study the suitability of the proposed Nevada site for the nation's first high-level radioactive waste dump.

The DOE said it's required by federal law to get the environmental permits in order to conduct the site characterization studies also required by Congress.

McKay filed the suit in the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco, seeking a declaration that the 1989 Legislature gave Congress formal rejections of the proposed Yucca Mountain dump location.

# Symms: Communism's fall result of Reagan's stance

WASHINGTON (AP) — Taking a swipe at Time magazine, U.S. Sen. Steve Symms says former President Ronald Reagan should have been named "Man of the Decade," not communist leader Mikhail Gorbachev.

"I'm flabbergasted," he said in a letter to the weekly news magazine. "Time has named communist dictator Mikhail Gorbachev 'Man of the Decade.' For what? For finally being forced to capitulate to the human and economic disaster

The decade of the '80s was America's decade and America's leader, Ronald Wilson Reagan, deserves the recognition ...

"You can credit Gorbachev with being smart-enough-to-realize he couldn't win the cold war when it left his people cold, hungry and miserable."

"I'm disappointed" the Department of Agriculture took four months to decide the issue, but the decision is better late than never," Andrus said.

The ten counties covered by the designation are Boundary, Bonner, Benewah, Kootenai, Latah, Lewis, Clearwater, Idaho, Nez Perce and Shoshone.

### Soundtrack already in stores but film release date delayed

HOLLYWOOD — The soundtrack to "Last Exit to Brooklyn" is already in record stores — but the release date for the film has been pushed back yet again. Selby's R-rated adaptation of Hubert Selby's gritty novel, directed by Ulrich Eidel ("Christiane F."), is now due in April.

Selby's book delved into the seedy, violent life on the far side of New York City's East River, set against a raging dockworker's strike during the Korean War. In the film, shot on location in the decaying Red Hook section of Brooklyn, Jennifer Jason Leigh portrays down-and-out hooker, Tru-hi-la, and Alexis Arquette the junkie transvestite, Georgette.

"It's pretty graphic," said Cinecom executive Richard Abramowitz. "I was even surprised that it got an R (from the MPAA ratings board). If there was an X rating for language alone, this would sure get it — and then there's the violence, sex and drugs. Imagine if all the worst in humanity came into one place at one time. That would be "Last Exit to Brooklyn."

Executive producer Anna Gross, however, insisted the film is not exploitative, including a game-tape sequence near the movie's end. "There is nothing in it that wasn't in 'The Accused,'" she said.

### 'Blaze' having love affair with Louisiana community

HOLLYWOOD — "This is probably the most exciting and glamorous thing that's ever happened to our community."

That's how film commission co-chairman George Wyatt summed up the love affair between the community of Winnfield, La., (pop. 7,500) and "Blaze" — just released in major cities but still unseen by Winnfieldans.

Winnfield is hometown — and final resting place — to Earl K. Long, the legendary Louisiana governor who made headlines with his love affair with stripper Blaze Starr. It's also where about 60 percent of the movie was filmed.

What's being touted as "A Winnfield Celebration of 'Blaze'" will take place Monday night in neighboring Alexandria (48 miles to the south), site of the newest walk-in theater (Winnfield only has a drive-in).

## Party, but don't party until you're plastered

WASHINGTON — Holiday season is a time for socializing, but the joy of visiting friends and relatives can turn to tragedy if alcohol is overused and partygoers then take to the highways.

Americans drive millions of miles during this season, often in bad weather, and drinking or using drugs can only increase the danger by slowing reflexes.

That doesn't mean alcohol has to be banned. Many people consider special drinks an integral part of the season.

But moderation is important. And travelers are best advised to select a designated driver — someone who won't drink — and then drive everyone home. The job can be rotated among people from day to day so that anyone who wants to drink will have the opportunity.

It is important to know your own capacity for alcohol, and to stick to a limit at parties.

Remember, alcohol is alcohol, whether in the form of

beer, wine or distilled liquor. A serving of each contains nearly the same amount of alcohol.

In addition, the way the drinks are handled is important.

Never drink on an empty stomach, for example, cautions the Distilled Spirits Industry Council. Food cuts slow down absorption of alcohol. Especially good are high protein items such as cheese and meats.

And pace yourself by sipping drinks slowly during the evening.

If drinking mixed drinks, choose non-carbonated mixers, since carbonation can speed the absorption of alcohol into the blood stream.

Mood can also alter the effects of alcohol, with people who are tired, tense or upset likely to feel the effects more quickly.

People who do not usually drink often need to be especially careful with alcohol because it can affect them more quickly than they may expect.

And be very wary of mixing alcohol with drugs, prescription or otherwise. The result can be deadly.

Hosts need to have plenty of non-alcoholic beverages on hand for guests who prefer them, as well as food.

Only refill glasses when asked. That way, guests do not feel pressured to drink.

Measure alcohol, don't just pour it out. It's hard for guests to pace themselves if they don't know how much alcohol is in each drink.

The National Clearinghouse for Alcohol Information suggests avoiding after-dinner drinks in favor of coffee or other non-alcoholic beverages. And cut off alcohol about an hour before the party is to end.

If someone has had too much to drink, stop serving him or her. And when they leave, arrange for someone to drive them home or call them a taxi. This is a service to the friend and others on the road.

Illnesses states the host of a party where alcohol was served can be held liable for injuries caused by a drunken guest who tries to drive home.

Finally, remember that the only cure for drinking too much is time.

## New Year's Eve just like any Sunday in many states

It's 9:59 p.m. on New Year's Eve in Little Rock, Ark. At a downtown bar, the revelers are already chanting. It's closing time. "... four ... three ... two ... one ... it's closing time!"

New Year's Eve or not, when it's Sunday in Arkansas, the bar closes at 10. Most states have some sort of law restricting liquor sales on Sundays. So when New Year's Eve falls on a Sunday, as it

does this year, it's a less-than-festive holiday for those who make a living selling alcohol.

In Idaho, the state liquor stores will be closed New Year's Eve, as they are every Sunday. Bar and restaurant patrons can purchase beer and wine, but in many locations, they won't be able to buy hard liquor at their parties.

In 1987, the state legislature amended Idaho law to allow counties to decide whether liquor may be sold on Sundays. No such sales are allowed in Twin Falls County,

according to Nathan Corder, special agent for the Idaho Alcohol and Beverage Control Division in Twin Falls.

Jerome County does allow Sunday sales, but the city of Jerome does not. "It's really been a nightmare for us to keep track of 44 counties," says John Gould, deputy assistant director of the Beverage Control Division in Boise.

Still, he says the fact New Year's Eve falls on a Sunday this year won't present any special problems for the division. Corder agrees, saying his office will be

treating this Dec. 31 "no different than any other Sunday."

Judy Buscher, manager of the state liquor store at 412 Second Ave. W., Twin Falls, says she expects both today and Saturday will be busy days for the store. Normally, Friday alone is the busiest day, she adds.

The liquor store does not change its hours for the holiday weekend. It will be open from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m. today and Saturday. Buscher says she believes tougher drinking-out-the-influence laws have prompted

many people to plan private parties at home instead of venturing out on the roads New Year's Eve.

Liquor stores in New York City are posting signs to remind their customers to buy early. In Grand Forks, N.D., Happy Harry's Bottle Shop is taking out newspaper advertisements with a similar reminder.

Still, owner Hal Gershman said, "No matter how much advertising you do, and how much you try to tell people, there are still 60 percent of the people who don't pay attention and just show up at the last minute."

Although North Dakota has among the nation's toughest blue laws, the Legislature did agree this year to allow bars and taverns to apply for special Sunday permits.

But some communities, such as Minot, opted against issuing the permits, much to the dismay of bar owners.

"We're put in an unfair disadvantage to the other major cities," complained Jim Mellow, manager of the International Inn-in-Minot, which caters to Canadian tourists. "The people I have talked to are bypassing Minot and heading to Bismark or Williston."

In Alabama, where restaurants and nightclubs can't sell alcohol between 2 a.m. and midnight Sunday, some places will hold parties the night before. Others will start their festivities at midnight. As in several other Southern states, private clubs are exempted from the law.

Chris Fuller, general manager of American Pie, a 2-month-old Mont-

gomery nightclub without a private license, said he'd throw a bash on Saturday night.

"But it's just not going to have the same whiz-bang as New Year's Eve," he said. "Obviously, it's a big party, that sounds pretty good."

In some states, such as Pennsylvania, specifically exempt New Year's Eve from blue laws. In Baltimore County, Md., liquor store owners successfully sued this year to open, arguing that a convoluted liquor law was intended to exempt New Year's Eve from Sunday restrictions but unintentionally had the opposite effect.

"We're real happy. The customers are happy," said Craig Button, president of the Baltimore County Licensed Beverage Association, after a judge ruled that the stores could

open. "It's the second biggest day of the year for us (after Christmas Eve). It would have cost us a lot of money."

In South Carolina, the executive director of the state Hotel and Motel Association said she feared that restrictions on public venues selling liquor on Sundays would lead to an increase in drunken driving.

"What happens is so many people might have spent the night in the hotel rather than drinking and partying and driving on the road," said Susan Young, the association's executive director.

Others noted that South Carolina's blue laws send some people over the border into less-restrictive North Carolina to drink.

Not all liquor sellers are upset about being forced to close. Robert

McIntyre, the owner of Old Town Liquor in Englewood, Colo., said his was quite content to spend this New Year's Eve in the quiet of his own home.

McIntyre said he wasn't worrying about any loss in business. "It's just going to be the nicer for me," he said.

# Christmas exhibition delves into past, future

# Golden Globe nominations kick off award season

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — "Born on the Fourth of July," "Glory" and "When Harry Met Sally..." scored the most honors in Golden Globe nominations, announced Wednesday by the Hollywood Foreign Press Association.

The two war-oriented films, one about Vietnam, the other on the Civil War, were nominated five times each, along with the modern romance comedy.

They were followed by "Dead Poets Society," "Do the Right Thing" and "The Little Mermaid" with four nominations apiece.

The Golden Globes, first of the Hollywood award season, often serve as a bellwether to the Oscars, though the foreign press members are noted for eccentricities.

The Golden Globes divide films and star performances into two categories, drama and musical or comedy.

The nominees include: Motion Picture (Drama) — "Born on the Fourth of July," "Crimes and Misdemeanors," "Dead Poets Society," "Do the Right Thing," "Glory."

Motion Picture (Musical or Comedy) — "Driving Miss Daisy," "The Little Mermaid," "Shirley Valentine," "The War of the Roses," "When Harry Met Sally..."

Actress Performance (Drama) — Sally Field, "Steel Magnolias," Jessica Lange, "Music Box," Andie MacDowell, "sex, lies and videotape," Michelle Pfeiffer, "The Fabulous Baker Boys," Liv Ullmann, "The Rose Garden."

Actor Performance (Drama) — Tom Cruise, "Born on the Fourth of July," Daniel Day-Lewis, "My Left Foot," Jack Lemmon, "Dad... Al Pacino, "Sea of Love," Robin Williams, "Dead Poets Society."

Comedy — Pauline Collins, "Shirley Valentine," Meg Ryan, "When Harry Met Sally..." Meryl Streep, "She-Devil," Jessica Tandy, "Driving Miss Daisy," Kathleen Turner, "The War of the Roses."

## Burning down the house with a new Latin beat.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — For-saking African rhythms, jazz arrangements and avant-garde electronics of previous Talking Heads and solo efforts, David Byrne's latest musical safari has brought him to the seductive beats of Latin America.

**Uses Latin American beats** what is allowing people to go on.

"It's a little different, maybe," Byrne said from the stage of the Pantages theater to the bobbing concertgoers below. "But maybe not," he quickly added, springing into another conga-faced tune.

Those familiar with the hybrid tastes of Byrne, the lead singer of Talking Heads, knew just what he meant. Although his new album, "Ri:et Mono," is infused with merengues and sambas, it's about as traditional a record as any he's made.

"I'm not trying to convert people, or educate people or do any of that kind of stuff," Byrne said in an interview while stopping in Los Angeles during a national tour this fall. "For me, it's purely something I'm getting a lot of enjoyment out of — music that I think is deep and fun. It's what I want to do. It's not as though I'm saying, 'Now, I want to tell you about this! You must sit down and listen!'"

Byrne is the latest American artist to use Latin sounds in pop music in the 1980s. Others have included Paul Simon, who has worked with Brazilian star Milton Nascimento, Quincy Jones and the Manhattan Transfer. Madonna recorded a song, "La Isla Bonita," which had a Latin flavor, and Linda Ronstadt put out an album of Mexican favorites taught to her by her father.

"Unlike the contemplative, occasionally downcast themes cascading through Byrne's prior work, "Ri:et Mono" carries both invigorating lyrics and beats. In "Don't Want to Be Part of Your World," for example, he sings of children escaping an imperfect life to a place "free from greed and hunger, free from hate and war."

Twenty-five years after Brazilian music first caught American ears with the quiet strains of bossa nova, a second Brazilian invasion is occurring. Brazilian superstars such as Djavan, Simone, Caetano Veloso and Nascimento have been signed to American labels and are touring the United States.

Latin music has likewise grown in popularity, with the arrival of crossover artists such as Miami Sound Machine and Reuben Blades. The co-founder of the 14-year-old but now idle Talking Heads, Byrne has directed the film "True Stories," acted in public television's "Trying Times," and composed the scores for the Twyla Tharp dance "The Catherine Wheel," Robert Wilson's opera "The Forest" and the movies "The Last Emperor" and "Married to the Mob."

## Rappers, rockers, crooners flock to Baker

NEW YORK (AP) — In the home of producer Arthur Baker, near Woodstock, N.Y., are crates containing more than 10,000 records. In midtown Manhattan, the location of Baker's Shakedown Studio, nearly as many musicians have passed through.

Bruce Springsteen, Bob Dylan, Miles Davis and Paul McCartney are but a few of the artists with whom Baker has worked, remixing songs or producing albums.

Rappers, rockers, crooners and funksters have all gotten a boost from Baker's studio expertise and pounding drum sound that's best described by the Hall and Oates album he produced, "Big Bam Boom."

Disappearing behind the control board doesn't appeal to Baker. Emotional, hard-headed and opinionated, he believes in the producer as collaborator, even star.

"The producers who turned me on were (Kenny) Gamble and (Leon) Huff, Thom Bell and all those Philadelphia guys," Baker said in a recent interview at Shakedown.

"Norman Whitfield of Motown was a big influence. All those producers made producer-oriented music. The producers would write the songs, arrange them and do the whole thing. That's what I aspire to be."

Baker has no catch phrase like Phil Spector's "Wall of Sound" or Motown's "Sound of Young America." If anything, the producer sees walls as something to be broken down, not constructed. That's why he calls his new record "Mergers."

"My album is representative of the music I like," Baker said. "If you come out to my house and see my records, you know my influences. This album is the merging of lots of different music."

"What I focused on was writing really good songs and making an album that I found listenable and enjoyable. The next album I'd like to

combine some different elements and make new music."

Shirley Lewis, Tim Valentine and John Warren are featured singers. Al Green's soaring vocals carry the album's first single, "The Message Is Love," but the song took months to record.

"We first did a reading and then he sang it through and it was really good," Baker said. "He said, 'OK, Al Green ain't going to sing it much better than that ... But he didn't get the melody, he rewrote it."

"He goes back and sings the melody but it's horrible. I ask him, 'Do you think we can get the other Al Green?' He sang it again and it was great. Then I had to do some more over-dubbing. We ended up doing two takes in Boston and four in Memphis."

Conflicts in the studio don't faze Baker, who has seen them from all angles, settling creative differences and causing some, too. Cocaine was a problem, he admits, and nearly ruined his career after a run of hit records in the mid-1980s. He's

five again." Baker, a Boston native, made his breakthrough in 1981 with Africa Bambaata's "Planet Rock," an early rap record. He was soon one of the industry's hottest producers and remixers, asked to edit extended versions of songs from Springsteen's "Born in the USA" album. Dylan, McCartney and Hall and Oates also wanted his services.

In 1985, he helped produce the "Sun City" record, assembling a remarkable collection of musicians, including Springsteen, Davis, U2's Bono and Ruben Blades — to perform material attacking South Africa's apartheid system.

In a studio crammed with stars, no one was received more than the avestruck Bonnie Raitt and contributed a horn part to a jazz track that appeared on the album.

"We asked Miles if it was OK to have a guy in the studio with a video camera," Baker recalled. "He starts playing and while he's playing, he goes, 'You can't come in here, you're the wrong color.' I thought he was talking to the video guy, who's white."

LOS ANGELES — The voice of the people has selected the voice of the people: U2. Ireland's clamorous crusaders of social consciousness and Christian conscience, has been voted the pop artist of the '80s by the Los Angeles Times readers, who submitted 1,724 ballots.

The top five finishers — U2, Michael Jackson, Bruce Springsteen, Madonna and Prince — compose a quintet whose impact on the spirit and style of the decade was substantial and inarguable. The order of finish forms a sort of alternating current of impulses: an agenda of social activism in the first, third and (sometimes) fifth spots, and a celebration of celebrity, ambition and eccentric individuality in the second, fourth and (sometimes) fifth spots.

The vote, and the comments submitted by the electorate, support the widely held view that the decade's major development was the return of political and social causes to

the mainstream pop arena after a decade of frivolity.

Time and again, U2's supporters cited the band's idealism and its focus on big issues. "Rick Adams calls them 'a band who stood

for their ground, drew attention to the troubles of the world, and whose lyrics inspired me to strive for excellence in everything I do."

Roseanne Ochoa said: "The '80s will be remembered as the decade where a generation

woke up and became aware of the troubles in the world around them, and no band symbolized that more than U2."

Other partisans of the Irish quartet caution that we shouldn't separate the band's ac-

tivism from its art. "They have combined music that sounds great with music that says something," wrote Cathy Orth. And Matt Prince believes that "kids will listen to songs like 'Bad,' 'Sunday Bloody Sunday' and 'Bullet in the Blue Sky' like we look back to the best of the Who, the Stones and Led Zep."

Springsteen inspired similar sentiments from his voters, while Jackson and Madonna earned much of their support simply for being successful, and for forging themselves into pop-culture icons. As Mark Andrew put it, "The pop artist of the '80s wasn't the best singer, songwriter, musician or performer, but the Best Package... Madonna."

Fittingly, the contradictory Prince inspired the most wide-ranging and provocative comments, touching on his technical virtuosity, his influence on commercial pop music, his own sales success, his versatility and his mystery. Summarized LeClair Pearson: "He was prolific, he was unpredictable, he was his own man. There is only one Prince."

## Kentucky Headhunters get your attention

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — You start with the name: the Kentucky Headhunters.

Images of barefoot, spear-carrying warriors in loincloth.

"It makes people think we're wild, naked, hillbillies," says Richard Young, a member of the five-member band from Glasgow, Ky., whose music is as intriguing as their name.

The five are a newly signed recording group who play country, rock 'n' roll, bluegrass, blues and jazz.

"We offer a blend of Merle Haggard, Bill Monroe and Led Zeppelin," says Doug Phelps, whose brother, Ricky Lee, also plays in the group.

"Basically what we're doing is taking bluegrass music and making it jazzy," Young says. "John Lennon has done it and all those people over there. They would take a bluegrass

song and make it up-tempo."

Now about the name.

The group, nicknamed "the Heads," took the name from a music term believed to have originated from the blues great Muddy Waters.

The term "headhunters" apparently came about when Waters' band displaced local, less proficient groups as Waters' band toured the country.

The proud Kentuckians added their state to the term and their memorable name was born.

"This is the first thing that catches everybody's attention," Ricky Lee Phelps says.

Says Young: "I called one guy at a radio station and he said he opened our record just because of the name. He said it sounded like something out of National Geographic."

Adds group member Greg Martin with a chuckle: "We've got every-

body scared to death. They think, 'Headhunters!'"

The group, whose members are in their late 20s to mid-30s, has been together four years. Their first Mercury-Polygram album is "Pickin' on Nashville" and the first single released from the LP is "Walk Softly on This Heart of Mine."

The band consists of four guitars and drums and occasionally an harmonica.

"It's aggressive music, but it's a bunch of hillbillies playing it," Ricky Lee Phelps says.

Drummer Fred Young, Richard's

brother, says, "We all grew up using the outhouse."

"We've all run out of toilet paper out there," Richard adds.

The band plays a mixture of music ranging from Jimi Hendrix's "Wait 'til Tomorrow," to Cream's "Crossroads," and country standards such as "Oh Lonesome Me" and "Wildwood Flower." They close their performances by saluting their home state with "My Old Kentucky Home."

Ricky Lee Phelps adds an entertaining touch to their performances, by pulling an array of props out of a trunk on stage.

## Pennsylvania considering warning labels on albums

Pennsylvania could become the first state in the union to mandate warning labels on albums. A bill recently passed by the state's House of Representatives would require manufacturers or distributors to place fluorescent yellow parental warning labels on albums, cassettes and CDs that contain explicit lyrics. The label would identify lyrics that describe, advocate or encourage suicide, sodomy, incest, bestiality, sadomasochism, adultery, rape or sexual activity in a violent context; involuntary deviate sexual intercourse; murder, ethnic intimidation; the use of illegal drugs; or the excessive use of alcohol. The label would list most of these offenses, even if only one were appropriate to a particular album.

The bill, sponsored by Rep. Ron Gamble, was defeated when it passed through a Pennsylvania House subcommittee early in December, but was tacked on as an amendment to Senate Bill 938, a popular drug bill. The amendment would be retroactive, presumably affecting back catalogues of disparate folks, from Hank Williams and Barry White to Charlie Daniels and N.W.A.; it also specifies that the la-

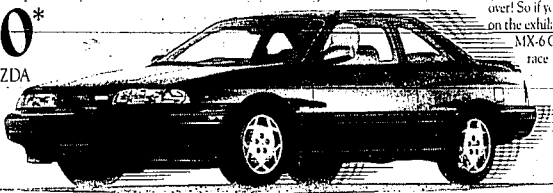
bel be placed on the front of the package, with black lettering of number 12 type or more and that the words "warning" and "parental advisory" be one-half inch high. A retailer found guilty of selling a product that a manufacturer failed to label could be fined up to \$300 and sentenced to 90 days in jail.

The Recording Industry Association of America, which four years ago instituted a voluntary labeling system for albums containing explicit lyrics, is planning to challenge the constitutionality of the bill should it become law.

The National Association of Record Merchandisers is organizing protests by retailers, noting that never before have retailers been required to know the lyrics of everything they sell, or to provide judgments on the suitability of lyrics — particularly in such a rigid context. "This bill will have a chilling effect," says Martin Markowitz, vice president of marketing for the regional branch of WEA. "For fear of going to jail, record retailers may very well limit the types of music they carry, thereby restricting what adult consumers in Pennsylvania may buy. It is a frightening step towards the use of very basic American freedoms."

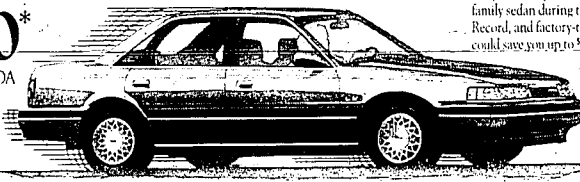

# Game over: There's little that's magical in 'The Wizard'

**HOLLYWOOD**— Video games, and the kids obsessed with them, are the main subjects of "The Wizard." But it is inevitable that the movie itself become a video game, with the movie-makers ramming us through the story, trying to jam down all our buttons?

"Rain Man" may be one of the models for "The Wizard," but the treatment is closer to "Pac-man." The characters don't really interact. They keep moving forward, gobbling up the plot as they go. By the time they've moved from the Nevada deserts to the gaudy glamour centers of Los Angeles, for a championship called Video Armageddon, the story has been chewed to pieces.

"The Wizard" is bright, fast and energetic, but there's not much real life to it. It's another movie that's disappeared into its own marketing hook: Three kids on the road, living and loving, racing toward personal redemption and video ascension.

In the movie, brothers Corey (Fred Savage) and Jimmy (Luke Edwards) flee from their desert homes to save the socially-alienated Jimmy from an institution. Though they're brothers, they live apart. Corey with his rowdy blue-collar dad Sam (Bean Bridges) and brother Nick (Christian Slater); Jimmy with his prim mother (Wendy Phillips) and prickly stepfather (Sam McMurray) in an uptight yuppie environment that's driving him buggy.

Soon, there's a set of crisscrossing, cross-class pursuits. Dad and brother are after them in a pickup truck; Mom and Step-dad have hired a Blue Meanie of a Bounty Hunter (Will Seltzer), who practically cackles with villainy, while engaging in a set of Laurel-and-Hardy car-destruction duels with Sam and Nick.

Probably, the kids run into their main game competitor at a truck stop: video genius Lucas (Jackey Vinson), with his power glove and "Spaghetti Western" introduction. Filling out the road team — playing Dorothy Lamour to their Bob and Bing — is the feisty Haley (Jenny Lewis), whose kissing lesson for the swaggering Corey provides one of the film's few highlights.

Producer-writer David Chisholm knows all the road movie archetypes. Rock music pumps up the backgrounds, the children are rescued by truckers and bikers. But perhaps he knows them too well. "The Wizard" not only recalls the basic situation of "Rain Man," it also recalls "Midnight Run," "Twins," "Things Change," "Hollywood or Bust" — all those other "on the road" movies where a glib smoothie (like Savage) and an awkward or shy natural genius (Edwards) flee through the desert, pursued by authority figures or crooks and heading toward gambling elites and jackpots.

There's not a speck of originality or a squib

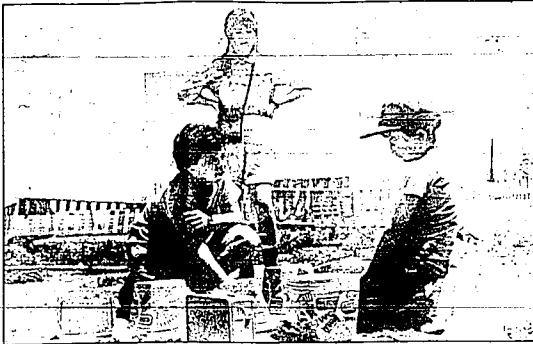

of spontaneity in this kiddie-kiddie "buddy-buddy" movie. Director Todd Holland, making his feature debut, and Chisholm both show a certain superficial verve, but the script is too frail for a movie, too dense for a video game, and most of the actors are too good for this picture.

## 'All Dogs go to Heaven' moderately enjoyable

**ALL DOGS GO TO HEAVEN (G)**. This new animated feature from Don Bluth ("The Land Before Time," "An American Tail") is only moderately enjoyable. The animation is of variable quality, the songs are eminently unhumane, and the visuals are not eye-popping. Burt Reynolds provides the voice for Charlie, the heaven-bound mutt who befriends an orphan girl, and other familiar vocal cords, including those of Dom DeLuise and Melba Moore, also make appearances.

**BACK TO THE FUTURE, PART II (PG)**. If "Back to the Future" made you bored and queasy, then the tumbling inventiveness in its sequel may come as a pleasant surprise. Of course, if you were among the 92 percent of the world who loved

the back in Dr. Emmett Brown's diabolical Delorean back in 1985, then "Part II" is your oyster. Well, it's that director Robert Zemeckis is getting cooler and even more adept at controlled mayhem. With Michael J. Fox, Christopher Lloyd, Lea Thompson.

**THE LITTLE MERMAID (G)**. Directed and written by John Musker and Ron Clements, with a yeoman team of animators, designers and craftspeople, this impudent, grandiose, multilevel crowd-pleaser shares with the classic Disney animated features of the '30s and '40s a sense of over-reaching, of grabbing every snazzy effect possible within old-line narrative forms. Ariel, the saucy heroine, is a sexy money-bunch not much like the sad noble sea-maid in Hans Christian Andersen's original story. But there is a primal power that most re-

cent Disney cartoons lack. Midway through, Sam Wright, who is the voice of a hypersensitive crab named Sebastian, leads a cat's-paw num. "Under the Sea" — an infectious show-upper by songwriters Howard Ashman and Alan Menken and afterwards should have any audience in this pocket.

**LOOK WHO'S TALKING (PG-13)**. Movies in which animals or babies speak their thoughts in voiceover rarely work, but part of the strength here is that Bruce Willis, as the sperm-fetus-baby, isn't always talking. There's enough fairly witty interplay between him Kirstie Alley and senior John Travolta that the movie could conceivably work even without the baby chat. Another unexpected strength of this unexciting comedy is that it's as much from the woman's point of view as the infant's, thanks to writer-director Amy Heckerling, whose own mothering experiences account for much of the script's casual insight.

## 'Christmas Vacation' leads for 3rd weekend in a row

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)** — "National Christmas Vacation," featuring Michael Douglas and Kathleen Turner as the feuding couple, was the nation's favorite film at the holiday box-office, leading all other movies for the third weekend in a row.

"Christmas Vacation" grossed \$7 million over the four-day weekend to outperform the new adventure movie "Tango & Cash." The latter film, pairing Kurt Russell and Sylvester Stallone as cops who don't always see eye-to-eye, collected \$6.6 million.

In third place with \$5.5 million was

the black divorce comedy "The War of the Roses," featuring Michael Douglas and Kathleen Turner as the feuding couple. It was followed in fourth place by "Back to the Future Part II," with Michael J. Fox, on revenues of \$4.1 million.

"Always," director Steven Spielberg's remake of the 1943 film "A Guy Named Joe," opened quietly in fifth place with a gate of \$3.7 million. In sixth was the animated film "The Little Mermaid," which made \$3.3 million.

In seventh was the ensemble tear-jerker "Steel Dawn" on \$2.6 million. "Blaze," the chronicle of Louisiana Gov. Earl Long's affair with young stripper Blaise Starr, landed in eighth with \$1.7 million and is the season's biggest flop.

## Local man has song recorded on new compilation album

**TWIN FALLS** — Twin Falls resident Bill H. Miller recently had a country song recorded on a national record album.

Although he has no musical training, Miller is a talented singer and he worked on the song "Mr. Blue" for several years.

Last year, he decided to copyright his song. Soon afterward, the Rainbow Record Company of California wrote to ask for a copy of the song. After receiving Miller's copy, the company offered to record the song on an album titled, "Hollywood Gold."

Miller agreed, and the company \$300 in production costs, and his song, along with 15 others, was cut on the album. Various unknown artists sing the

songs, including Miller's "Mr. Blue."

According to Miller's contract, 25,000 albums will be made and distributed nationally. For each album sold, a royalty of \$2.12 will be divided among the songwriters who contributed to "Hollywood Gold." If the records sell well, more will be cut for further distribution.

Miller said he got a free copy of the album and is happy with the production work. The record will be for sale at a music store in Burley and at another one in Twin Falls, but Miller did not know where or when or how much they will charge.

The songwriter does not expect any royalties until March at the earliest, and he is realistic about what profits he might gain.

"I'll be lucky and tickled to death if I get 100 bucks out of it," Miller said. "But I made a promise to myself to do this."

Miller has written several other songs and says he plans to copyright them also. The writer said he would rather spend the money to promote his work than to leave it on a shelf and never know how successful it could have become.

Singing a verse of "Mr. Blue," Miller says,

"I'm running around with Mr. Blue and Mr. Heartache is here, too."

"I'm so lonely dear, I feel like I could cry."

"I'm living at heartbreak hotel and I'm not doing very well. As you can see these great big teardrops in my eyes."

## 'Reader's Catalog' lists 40,000 titles

Josiah Epstein has had a lot of good ideas in his long-publishing career.

He launched the first quality paperback line, Anchor, at Doubleday. He started the New York Review of Books. He developed the Library of America, a uniform series of works by America's great writers.

And now his latest braintrust, "The Reader's Catalog" (\$2.95, distributed by Random House), is making waves in the publishing world.

The concept behind the annotated mail-order catalog is simple: to be, between two covers, the equivalent of the best general-interest bookstore.

The catalog lists more than 40,000 books in print in 208 categories — from New Zealand literature to cookbooks — and makes it easy to order them. They can be ordered directly from the catalog's New York office or from your local bookseller.

First published in October, the catalog has already gone back to press for a second printing, which will put 90,000 copies in print.

The catalog's New York office reports it is filling between \$3,000 and \$3,000 worth of book orders a day, and that doesn't include sales of books that result from catalog readers asking their local bookstores to order for them. In the latter case, the bookstore, not the catalog, gets the sale.

The impetus for the catalog came from Epstein's concern that few readers have access to sophisticated and varied backlist titles. Backlist titles are books still in print, but not current, which today usually means more than six months old. While many backlist titles may be in some bookstores in paperback (sometimes, hardcover) form, many more are harder to find.

Epstein, editorial director and vice president of Random House, noticed that large, independent bookstores

such as the Tattered Cover in Denver and Northshire in Manchester Center, Vt., have done extremely well carrying extensive backlists.

"It's almost as if there is a new generation of American readers, more sophisticated and eclectic, than we've ever had before," Epstein says.

But many readers don't have access to such an extensive variety of titles, either because they live near chain bookstores, which emphasize current best-sellers, or because there are no bookstores nearby.

Enter the Reader's Catalog. Epstein also hopes the catalog will encourage publishers to keep many more backlist titles in print.

"I hate the idea of somebody spending 15 years writing a book and it having a shelf life of six months," says Epstein, who has worked with such authors as Vladimir Nabokov, Norman Mailer and E.L. Doctorow. "That happens over and over again, and it's worse than heartbreak. It just kills you, makes you want to go into a different business."

A brief few glimpses of high school basketball will offer a little variety change from college bowl games on TV — but only on Friday night.

The Twin Falls Bruins will be hosting the Meridian Warriors with Jerome traveling to Burley and Piler visiting Buhl.

Twin Falls, which swept Centennial and Capital on the road and then took last week off, will be looking at one of the higher-powered offenses in the state.

The Warriors racked up 100 points

against Mountain Home two weeks ago, leading Coach John Astorquia to surmise controlling the tempo against them would be to our advantage. Mountain Home tried to run with them and was swept away.

The Warriors boast two players off Idaho's BCI tournament of last summer in 6-7 Bob Gwyn and 6-2 Robert Craven.

"Gwyn is not really an inside player despite his height," says Astorquia. He is more a finesse player than banger and much better facing the basket. Craven is an excellent jump shooter in the 12-15-foot range and penetrates very well. He's been

their leading scorer."

The Warriors also are expected to start 6-5, 195-pound Scott McConnell who is the banger and rebounds hard. The other wing is handled by junior Mike Gould, 6-3, who has been in double scoring figures his last four times out. John Khaddabi, a 5-11 guard, is noted for his quickness, defense and penetration.

"Meridian consistently looks to run. If you can slow them down they go into a 1-4 offense and look for penetration first. The next step is screen and roll. But they are a good rebounding team and very good in

transition so they don't get into halfcourt offense too much."

"Defensively, they've shown more than than zone," the coach continued. "Their other strength is an ability to pressure the ball well — individually more than double teaming or zone pressing."

Astorquia said the Bruins would continue their preferences of the past few games and that means taking the ball inside.

"Most of the good things that have happened for us happened after we took the

## Burley Bobcats hold back Pocatello girls to take 47-33 win

BURLEY — Surviving a near disaster second-half start, Burley held Pocatello to a single basket over the final eight minutes Thursday to claim a 47-33 victory in a key Region III girls' basketball game.

The win pulls the Bobcats even with Pocatello at 3-2 in the region, in a tie for second behind 4-0 Highland. But, with only regional counters against the Rams on the road and Minico at home, the playoff picture has brightened considerably.

"We don't lose many at home," said Burley coach Gordon Kerbs. "It would be nice to start off (the regional playoffs) here."

Burley, now 9-3 overall, used a 10-2 run midway through the first period to put in a one-point deficit into an 11-6 lead, then overtook by 11, at 25-14, on two Rebecca Hamby free throws 4 minutes, 36 seconds before intermission.

With 6-foot, 1-inch senior center Pauline Semons scoring four points in a 6-0 Indian burst the visitors cut within five at intermission.

Natalie Frazure got Pocatello's first basket of the second half and Semons hit the front end of the bonus to cut the Burley lead to 29-27 with 3:52 showing in the third quarter as the visitors began to capitalize on their height advantage inside.

"With the exception of about a three-minute span of the second and that four

minutes in the third period, we played pretty well," Kerbs said. "Execution wise the first half was good. We had a few breakdowns, but no complaints whatsoever."

At that point Stephanie Jensen, whose 15 points left her the only player on either team to reach double figure scoring, took command, hitting twice from just inside the three-point line to fire an 8-0 Bobcat burst which extended the margin back to nine.

It became a five-point game one more time as Pocatello got the next four points, but Angie Tubbs' layin with 2:57 left to play was all the Indians, who fell to 5-8 in all games, could muster thereafter.

"We played some good defense tonight," Kerbs added. "Pocatello has some good athletes. We shut down their inside game in the first half, but they made some good adjustments. They blew whatever weakside half we had completely away for awhile. A 5-7 girl on a six-foot center isn't going to get it done."

Scoring was sparse in the junior varsity prelim, won 17-12 by Pocatello.

## Mississippi shoots down Air Force in Liberty Bowl

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Randy Baldwin rushed for 177 yards and two touchdowns and John Damell gave Air Force a lesson in aerial assault Thursday night as Mississippi dumped the Falcons 42-29 in the Liberty Bowl.

Damell, who completed 19 of 33 passes for 261 yards and one touchdown, led the Rebels (8-4) on drives of 70 and 67 yards on their first two possessions as Mississippi built a 14-3 lead over the Falcons (8-4-1).

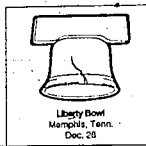
Damell peppered the slower Falcons' defensive backfield with passes to Willie Green and Reid Hines, opening up the line

of scrimmages for Baldwin's slashing runs.

With Damell and Baldwin drawing the bulk of the Falcons' attention, flanker Pat Coleman turned in a pair of sparkling scoring runs that sealed victory.

Coleman scored on a 58-yard punt return in the second quarter and added an 11-yard touchdown on a reverse that catapulted Mississippi into a 35-15 lead at the end of three quarters.

Baldwin, whose status had been questionable before the game due to turf feet, set

a Rebels bowl-game mark with his rushing total and became the first Rebels rusher to gain more than 100 yards in a game this season. He had scoring runs of 23 and 21 yards among his 14 carries.

The Mississippi defense limited Air Force quarterback Dee Dowsis, who has

rushed and passed for more than 1,000 yards this season.

Dowsis hit seven of 16 passes for 86 yards, including two interceptions, and ran 18 times for 92 yards and one touchdown.

It took the Rebels only five plays to cover 70 yards on the game's opening drive, with Damell connecting with Hines for a 32-yard scoring pass just 1:07 into the first quarter.

After Air Force countered with a 37-yard field goal by Joe Woods, the Rebels upped their edge to 14-3. Damell took the Rebels from their 33 to the Falcons' 23 with three completions.

On fourth-and-2 from the Air Force 23, Baldwin got his first touchdown when he ran around his right end and outraced a defender to the corner of the end zone.

Dowsis then guided the Falcons 66 yards

## Texas Tech overwhelms Duke in All American Bowl, 49-21

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — James Gray, major college football's fifth-leading rusher this season, ran for a record 280 yards and scored four touchdowns Thursday night leading Texas Tech to a 49-21 victory over Duke in the All American Bowl.

The decision gave Tech a 9-3 record, while Duke fell to 8-4 in what could be Coach Steve Spurrier's final game with the Blue Devils. He said he will announce within a few days whether he will take the coaching job in Florida, where he won the Heisman Trophy in 1966.

Gray, who gained 1,509 yards for the 24th-ranked Red Raiders, scored from two, 54, 18 and 16 yards. His 280 yards, on 33 carries, was a personal high, eclipsing 234 yards against Arizona in the Raiders' opening game. He also surpassed the All American Bowl record of 276 by Texas A&M's Curtis Dickey against Iowa State in 1978.

Gray's first three touchdowns and a 36-yard pass from Jamie Gill to Travis Price gave Tech a 28-0 lead before Dave Brown threw two scoring passes for No. 20 Duke. Brown passed 30 yards to Bud Zuberer and 25 yards to Dave Colonna to make it 28-14 at halftime.

Tech's Brian Dubiski intercepted Billy Ray's pass at his 31 on Duke's first possession, and Tech moved 69 yards to Gray's 2-yard touch-down TD run. Gill passed 36 yards to Price and Gray gained the other yards on nine carries.

Gill set up his scoring pass to Price with completions of 19 yards to Anthony Lynn and 17 to Price.

Early in the second period, Tech's Stephen Weatherpoon knocked the ball away from Chris Brown. Dubiski recovered at the Duke 46 and Gray ran 54 yards off right tackle on the next play.

## BYU needs defense against Penn. St.

SAN DIEGO — Coach LaVell Edwards is a realist who knows his Brigham Young defense must stay favored Penn State if the Cougars are to have a chance Friday night in the Holiday Bowl.

"One of the keys from our standpoint will be how well we defend them," Edwards said Thursday. "If we do well on defense, we'll have a good shot at winning. To me, that's the most intriguing aspect of the game."

But asking a team that allowed more than 26 points per game to stop an opponent whose superior schedule featured the likes of national powers Notre Dame and Alabama may be asking a bit much.

The oddsmakers would seem to agree. No. 18 Penn State, despite its 7-3 record, is a 3-point choice over the 1-9th-ranked Cougars, who finished 10-2 and won the Western Athletic Conference crown.

The Cougars must stop or at least contain senior Blair Thomas, the second-leading rusher in Penn State history with 3,301 career yards. Thomas has gained 1,341 yards in 1989, including 100-yard efforts in each of his last six games.

But Penn State coach Joe Paterno says his team's recent success on the ground guarantees nothing against BYU.

"I think their defense is solid against the run," Paterno said. "We're not going to try to run the ball down their throat. They're tough against the run."

BYU features sophomore quarterback Ty Detmer, the national leader in passing efficiency. The Nittany Lions counter with a defense that has allowed just 11.8 points per game.

"They have an outstanding defense and we have a good offense," Edwards said.

Penn State will start sophomore quarterback Tony Sacco, who completed 56 of 137 passes for 675 yards and six touchdowns this season. His backup is senior Tom Bill, who hit on 43 of 88 passes for 605 yards and three touchdowns.



# Sanders blasts through season; named offensive rookie of year

NEW YORK (AP) — It's hard to imagine anyone having a better rookie season than Barry Sanders. Sanders led the NFL with 1,470 yards, just 10 behind league leader Christian Okoye of Kansas City. Sanders also helped make the Detroit Lions a competitive team again.

Sanders, going from recording collegian to sensational NFL rookie, was named the Offensive Rookie of the Year by The Associated Press on Thursday.

In balloting by 70 sports writers and broadcasters who cover the league, Sanders was a near-unanimous choice with 69 votes. Wide receiver Andre Rison of the Indianapolis Colts received the other vote.

Sanders, who rushed for 2,628 yards and 39 touchdowns — both NCAA records — in winning the Heisman Trophy at Oklahoma State in 1988, was the third selection in last April's NFL draft. He held out through training camp, but it didn't slow him at all.

"It's a tremendous honor," Sanders said. "But it is really an indication of how our offense played as a whole."

"I didn't feel at a disadvantage by missing training camp. I missed a little hitting. That didn't pose many disadvantages at all as far as the offense. I was able to learn as I went along, week to

proved that we are a good team in the second half of the season."

Sanders proved he could carry a rushing attack by himself. He averaged 5.3 yards a carry and scored 14 touchdowns.

He probably could have passed Okoye's total, but Sanders sat out much of the second half in Detroit's rout of Atlanta on Sunday.

"It wasn't a goal of mine," he said of leading the league in rushing. "I didn't set any statistical goals. I didn't have any particular mark."

"My feelings were that the game was over and there was no need to play anymore. People are going to take it differently. Some will respond negatively and some will respond positively. I wasn't trying to send any particular message."

Sanders broke the Lions' rookie rushing record, set by Billy Sims, who also followed his Heisman Trophy season by winning NFL rookie of the year honors. Sims was one of Sanders' idols, but he claimed such personal achievements were no big deal.

"A lot of individual accomplishments don't mean much if the team is successful," he said. "If there was something that I wanted my teammates to feel, that would be it."

So, apparently, did the Lions, who won their final five games to escape last place in the NFC Central. They run a shoot attack going in the second half of the season, thanks greatly to Sanders.

"That's the best way to go," he said. "Of course, we want to progress each year and that is something we will be shooting for. I know the team would like to improve the record and make it a winning ball club."

"I would have liked for our record to be better. We certainly

# San Francisco enters playoffs in a league all by themselves

The San Francisco 49ers seem to be in a league of their own as they enter the National Football League playoffs — so much so that perhaps an appropriate title for this spectacular is the 49ers and the Nine Spectaculars.

The 49ers, attempting to become the first team in a decade to repeat as Super Bowl champions, posted a 14-2 regular-season record. They were two games better than any other team in the league and heat four of the other nine playoff teams.

The 49ers, game of six division champions with a bye Sunday when the two wild-card games will be played, are on much more of a roll than they were a year ago, when they started 6-5, won four straight and then lost their regular-season finale to the Los Angeles Rams, 38-16. That loss knocked the New York Giants out of the playoffs, forcing Giants quarterback Phil Simms to complain that he watched the 49ers "play down like dogs" against the Rams.

This year, the 49ers routed the Chicago Bears, 26-0, in their finale, even though they already had clinched home-field advantage throughout the National Football Conference playoffs.

"In some respects, that was a very decisive win. But, as coaches, we look at certain things that we can do better," said George Seifert, San Francisco head coach. "And we'll have to do them better in the

playoffs."

If the 49ers do as well as they did in the regular season, that will be good enough.

They even seem to have history on their side. The NFL has a record of ending a decade with a team winning back-to-back titles.

The Philadelphia Eagles did it in 1948-49, the Baltimore Colts did it in 1958-59 and the Pittsburgh Steelers did it in 1978-79.

The 49ers, who are considered by many to be the team of the decade, can join Pittsburgh as the only four-time Super Bowl champion.

The 49ers also can become known as one of the best post-World War II teams, joining the 1946-55 Cleveland Browns, who won four titles in the old All-America Conference and three NFL titles, the Green Bay Packers of the 1960s, who won five titles and the first two Super Bowls, and the Steelers of the 1970s, who won four Super Bowls in six seasons.

That's why all the focus is on the 49ers, who will play either the Philadelphia Eagles or the Minnesota Vikings in their first playoff game. If they win, they'd face either the Vikings, Giants or Los Angeles Rams in the NFC title game.

Of those four teams, the Rams seem to have the best shot of upsetting the 49ers. They handed the 49ers one of their two losses this season and could have swept them if they hadn't blown two 17-point leads in the second game.

The problem for the Rams will be getting to the NFC title game. They will first have to win at Veterans Stadium in Philadelphia, then at Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, N.J.

The weather is likely to be nasty in both places, and the Rams aren't noted for playing well in cold weather. They barely beat the New England Patriots, 24-20 in Foxboro, Mass., Sunday.

The 49ers beat the Giants and Eagles during the regular season, and the Vikings would have to face San Francisco on the road at Candlestick Park.

The 49ers beat the Vikings, 34-9, in the playoffs last season. The Vikings, whose home is the Metrodome in Minneapolis, have become such a dome team that they're 1-8 in their last nine outdoor games.

The Vikings upset the 49ers two seasons ago in the playoffs, 36-24, at Candlestick when the 49ers were finishing the season by hitting 10 of 21 passes against the Bears before coming out early in the third quarter. It wasn't vintage Montana, but it was good enough to enable him to set the record for quarterback rating.

With 112.4, Matt Ryan of the Cleveland Browns had the old mark of 110.4 in 1960.

# Chiefs linebacker takes defensive rookie honor

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Linebacker Derrick Thomas, the pass-rusher from Alabama who played a major role in the resurgence of the Kansas City Chiefs, was named Thursday as The Associated Press Defensive Rookie of the Year.

Thomas, the first defensive player chosen in the draft, led the revitalized Chiefs' defense with 10 sacks and 75 tackles and provided the inside pass rush they lacked for more than 10 years.

Thomas was an easy winner over Denver safety Steve Atwater for the award, collecting 43 1-2 votes from a nationwide panel of sports writers and sportscasters who cover the NFL. Atwater received 22.5 votes. Just last week, Thomas was named to the Pro Bowl.

Regardless in his sideline-to-sideline pursuit, Thomas helped surround a mediocre offense into the AFC's No. 1 defense this year.

"I have no regrets about this season at all, except that we failed to get into the playoffs," Thomas said. "I don't even regret the incident against San Diego when I got thrown out of the game (for kicking). I think you have to be in a position, at least once, to find out how you act in situations like that. I'm sorry it happened, and I paid the price."

Denver coach Dan Reeves already is naming about Thomas.

"Derrick Thomas is on his way to being one of the greatest linebackers in this league, if he's not there already," Reeves said. "His desire to improve led Thomas

to purchase a portable VCR this year to study films of upcoming opponents. He and his tape machine became constant companions — on the team plane, on the bus, at home.

"I'm going to try to remember every tendency my opponent has," he said. "I watch the tackles — how they set up, how they block, how many people beat them on different downs, and what the particular situation is. Then I go back and study the quarterback, how he reacted on different downs in different situations."

"Everything was so new to me. It wasn't until about the sixth game that I really got to the point where I felt comfortable, where I could make my own decisions out there. In college, holding isn't permitted. Here, it is permitted. But next year I'll know what to expect. My goal next year is to be the best I can be."

Carl Peterson, the Chiefs' first-year general manager, was one of those responsible for the selection of Thomas.

"You always hope your No. 1 pick is going to turn out to be a Pro Bowl player and a top rookie," said Peterson. "But it gets down to the individual. All of them have God-given talents but it's the guy who applies himself and wants to take the extra step. (Alabama Coach) Bill Curry told us, 'You can't work this guy too hard.' Derrick didn't go through his rookie year without making some mistakes, some big mistakes. But over and over again, he brings you notice about Derrick is that he has a burning desire to be the very best."

"The disturbing aspect of it all is that a lot of these players aren't ready to make that transition. There are about 10 to 14 who will make it, but you don't hear about the ones who don't. They are the ones who lose a year of eligibility and a chance at obtaining a degree."

Nearly a month ago, NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue said he would go to court if a high number of underclassmen enter the draft.

Tagliabue sent a letter to NFL. Last week, emphasizing that the league has not changed or abandoned its established eligibility rules. He also sent a copy to BLESSTO and National, two scouting combines.

Joe Brown, NFL director of communications, said Tagliabue would regard "very seriously" any charge made by a college coach or athletic director that NFL personnel were trying to entice or encourage underclassmen into leaving.

# College juniors may jump to beat possible wage cap

A potential cap on rookie salaries in 1991 may create a mass exodus of underclassmen from the college ranks into the National Football League draft in April, forcing the NFL to seek to protect its rule that excludes underclassmen from the draft.

Scouts, sports attorneys and high-ranking league officials estimate could try to make the jump. The number could include quarterbacks Major Harris (West Virginia), Jeff George (Illinois) and Scott Mitchell (Iowa) and linebackers Keith McCants (Alabama) and Junior Seau (Southern Cal.) and running back Emmitt Smith (Florida).

An NFL rule states that to be eligible for the draft, five years must have elapsed since the player's class first entered school or he must have used all his collegiate football eligibility; or he must have graduated or must plan to graduate by the start of the 1990 season. Through the years, there have been limited exceptions.

But this year, agents are applying pressure to the underclassmen, saying salaries comparable to the 1988 and 1989 seasons will be available in 1990, but there is a steep pay scale being implemented in 1991.

"If that wasn't a risk these kids face, you wouldn't see so many

# Communism fall tops decade's stories

The overwhelming story of 1989 was the disintegration of communism in Eastern Europe and Mikhail S. Gorbachev's efforts to lead the Soviet Union into a freer society, according to a poll of Associated Press newspaper editors and broadcast news directors.

The communist turnaround received 3,256 points, almost the sum of the two stories that finished second and third, the crushing of China's Tiananmen Square pro-democracy movement, and the Alaskan oil spill.

The China story narrowly outpolled the oil spill in editor interest, 1,690 points to 1,687.

In the poll, 315 editors and news directors ranked the stories. A first-place vote earned a story 10 points and a 10th-place listing one point.

Five developing stories were not on the ballots, which were due by Dec. 15, five days before the United States invaded Panama and seven before the bloody ouster of dictator Nicolae Ceausescu in Romania.

The top 10 stories:

1. When Mikhail Gorbachev rose to power in 1985 and gave the world two new words, glasnost and perestroika, no one could have guessed

the incredible changes that would burst forth, like a genie from a bottle, four years later.

But there it was in 1989: thousands standing in the streets of Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria and East Germany, demanding a voice in government, a more open society, and eviction of the old Communist guard. In Poland, Solidarity won an election and began to build economic ties with the West to try to pull the country out of poverty.

In the Soviet Union, Gorbachev had to slow the rate of change while he struggled to improve the economy with links to the West. But even there, ethnic republics pressed for more independence.

2. Beijing was host for the first Chinese-Soviet summit in 30 years, but the historic event was upstaged by the drama unfolding in Tiananmen Square.

For seven weeks, the hundred-acre square had been occupied by thousands of demonstrators, demanding greater democracy and humiliating the government. For seven weeks, the government had responded with tolerance and restraint.

Then, at 2 a.m. Sunday, June 4, barely two weeks after Gorbachev left Beijing, a convoy of trucks accompanied by 10,000 foot soldiers

of the People's Liberation Army swept through the streets and opened fire on the crowds.

By 5 a.m., the square was empty, except for the charred hulks of vehicles and debris left by the protesters. Hundreds — perhaps thousands — were dead.

3. Early on March 24, the tanker Exxon Valdez strayed off course and struck a reef in Alaska, spilling 11 million gallons of crude oil into the pristine waters of Prince William Sound.

The spilled oil contaminated 1,000 miles of coastline and killed tens of thousands of shore birds, including 138 bald eagles.

Volunteers from the tower 48 states, responding to news photos of oil-soaked otters and crippled birds, joined Alaska fishermen hosing down beaches, rescuing wildlife and wiping off rocks, one at a time.

Ultimately, more than 2.6 million gallons of oil was recovered.

The worst oil disaster in U.S. history sullied Exxon's reputation as well as Alaska's coast. It also resulted in criminal charges against Exxon Valdez Capt. Joseph Hazelwood, 42, who was fired amid allegations he'd been drunk at the time of the accident. His trial is scheduled to begin Jan. 22.

4. As 58,000 fans packed San Francisco's Candlestick Park with 21 minutes to go before the start of the World Series' third game between the Oakland A's and the Giants, television screens across America suddenly went black.

The nation's next look at San Francisco was a city in darkness except for a fire fed by open gas lines in the Marina District and the headlights of thousands of vehicles inching along in countless traffic jams.

The earthquake, centered 75 miles south of San Francisco, measured 7.1 on the Richter scale, the strongest to hit the United States since the Alaska quake of 1964. It lasted 15 seconds, killed 67 people and injured 3,000 others. Property damage was placed at \$7 billion.

A 50-foot section of the Bay Bridge collapsed, as did a few apartment buildings, and a 1.5-mile stretch of double-decker Interstate 880 toppled onto the lower roadway, crushing cars and trapping motorists.

5. When the Supreme Court opened the door for states to regulate the standards for abortions within their borders, limiting the 1973 Roe vs. Wade decision, it also moved the battleground between pro-choice and anti-abortion advocates to state legislatures and state elections.

The anti-abortion side wanted to require teen-agers to seek permission from their parents for abortions, or married women to seek their husband's OK. Other questions focused on the use of federal funds for abortions.

The issue was sure to affect state and congressional elections in 1990.

August, in response to the assassination of a leading presidential candidate.

Within four months, 10 middle-level drug suspects had been extradited to the United States. Drug traffickers retaliated with a campaign of bombings and shootings that included a Dec. 8 car-bomb attack that killed 63 people. The government also blamed the druglords for the Nov. 27 bombing of an Avianca jetliner near Bogota, which killed 107.

The government claimed a major victory in December with the killing by security forces of Gonzalo Rodriguez Gacha, a billionaire leader of Colombia's biggest cocaine gang, the Medellin cartel, and the man accused of directing the campaign of terror.

7. For a week in September, Hurricane Hugo cut a wide swath of destruction along a 2,300-mile path from the Caribbean to the Carolinas. The storm killed 56 people in the Caribbean and 40 more on the mainland, despite an exodus of residents along the Southeast coast.

In hard-hit St. Croix, 90 percent of the houses and buildings were destroyed by Hugo's 200-mph winds. Hundreds of looters plundered stores of everything from food and clothing to VCRs and jewelry in the aftermath of the storm, prompting President Bush to send Army

troops, FBI agents and federal marshals to restore order in the U.S. territory. Officials say it could be spring before power is restored. Full recovery could take years.

In South Carolina, the storm did nearly \$6 billion in damage. Hugo demolished downtown Charleston, which had not been hit by a major hurricane in 30 years. It also left homeless an estimated 16,000 South Carolinians, many of them beach residents who vowed to rebuild.

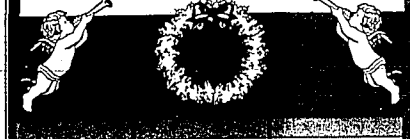

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

"A stone thrown at the right time is better than gold given at the wrong time." - Persian proverb.

When you know that partner's opening lead was a singleton, should you grab the lead as soon as possible to give partner his looked-for ruff?

Dummy's diamond jack holds, and it's obvious that West has led a singleton. Why would West choose to lead dummy's suit if he held K-7-2 and why would South finesse holding a singleton star?

When dummy's lone trump is led, do you rush in with the ace to give partner his ruff? If you do, West gets his ruff early but South gets his game. West switches to a club, but is too late. South wins his ace, collects the trumps with his king and claims an easy overtrick.

If East plays low on the first trump, there's likely to be a different ending. The finesse goes to West's queen, and West shifts to clubs, establishing a club trick for East and paralyzing South. Whatever South does, he can no longer succeed. When East wins his trump ace, he gets a club trick in addition to West's diamond ruff, and instead of scoring an overtrick, South is left on a trick short!

ANSWER: One no-trump. Do not by pass the descriptive rebid in favor of bidding another minor. If game is on, it's more likely to be in no-trump than in a minor suit.

# College football picture comes down to 2 New Year's Day bowl contests

The unofficial college football national championship will hinge on two New Year's Day bowl games. The Sugar Bowl (airing on ABC) features seventh-ranked Alabama (10-1) against No. 2 Miami (10-1). In the Orange Bowl (airing on NBC), fourth-ranked Notre Dame (11-1) plays undefeated, No. 1-ranked Colorado (11-0).

Should Colorado defeat Notre Dame; it will finish the season ranked No. 1, a remarkable turnabout from the early '80s. Colorado's success has been fueled by the memory of quarterback Sal Aunese. Before dying earlier this year of cancer, Aunese, in the tradition of Notre Dame's Gipper, asked his teammates to win the Orange Bowl. Quarterback Darjan Hagan now imitates Aunese's cadence in his signal-calling, and Aunese's locker has been turned into a Plexiglass-surrounded shrine.

A Notre Dame Orange Bowl victory would cloud the national championship picture. A Miami Sugar Bowl victory, coupled with a Notre Dame win, would probably give the Hurricanes the No. 1 spot. With a stingy, top-ranked defense and exciting quarterback Craig Erickson recovered from broken knuckles, Miami convincingly beat Notre Dame in November.

Should Miami lose to Alabama and Notre-Dame beat Colorado, Notre Dame will probably attain the No. 1 spot for the second consecutive year. No team since the Oklahoma Sooners of 1955-56 has won back-to-back consensus national titles. Quarterback Tony Rice and big play specialist Rughib (Rocket) Ismail are two Irish players to watch.

In the Rose Bowl (airing on ABC), No. 3 Michigan (10-1) plays 12th-ranked USC (8-2-1) in a rematch of last year's game. A win this year would make Michigan the first Big Ten team ever to win consecutive Rose Bowls. Michigan's only '89 defeat was against Notre Dame, so the Wolverines' hopes for a national championship depend on an Alabama victory in the Sugar Bowl and the Orange Bowl ending in a tie.

In other New Year's Day bowl games: Auburn (9-2) takes on Ohio State (8-3) in the Hall of Fame Bowl (airing on NBC). Auburn is coming off a thrilling win over the state-rival Alabama and will be determined to prove that victory no fluke.

The Cotton Bowl (airing on CBS) pits ninth-ranked Arkansas (10-1) vs. No. 8 Tennessee (10-1). Tennessee, Auburn and Alabama finished in a three-way tie at the top of the Southeastern Conference - the first in 50 years. Both Tennessee and Auburn will want to prove the Sugar Bowl committee wrong in selecting Alabama to represent the Southeastern Conference.

The Citrus Bowl (airing on ABC) features 14th-ranked Virginia (10-2) against No. 11 Illinois (9-2), and the Fiesta Bowl (airing on NBC) presents No. 5-ranked Florida State (9-2) against Tom Osborne's No. 6 Nebraska Cornhuskers (10-1). In November, Florida State beat Miami in the Hurricanes' only loss.

As usual, the cry for a coherent college football playoff system will arise. Third-ranked Michigan is locked into a game with a 12th-ranked school; and, most frustrating

of all, the two most important games are being played at the same time. But the bowl committees and conferences are not about to change a system that produces so much revenue for them. Meanwhile, the dedicated college football fan will have to channel-hop or put an extra TV in the room.

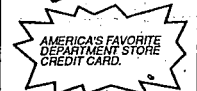

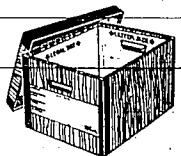

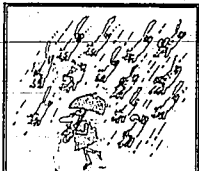
