Noriega, attorneys challenge U.S. jurisdiction

MIAMI—Fallen Panamanian dictator Manuel Noriega told a federal judge Thursday that he is a political prisoner and refused to enter a plea to charges he took \$4.6 million to turn his nation into a way station for the cocaine trade.
 "General Noriega refuses to submit to the jurisdiction of this court... because he is a political prisoner brought to this country illegally," Noriega attorney Frank Rubino told U.S. District Judge William Hoeweler.
 The judge then entered an innocent-plea for Noriega.
 Rubino said during the half-hour hearing

 that the general had been told Wednesday that protection would be withdrawn as crowds surrounded the Vatican Embassy in Panama City. He said Noriega surrendered to avoid further bloodshed.
 However, the archbishop of Panama said the surrender followed Noriega's realization he had lost all support.
 In Washington, a senior Bush administration official said the Vatican Embassy had been planning to order Noriega to leave at noon on Thursday had he not surrendered to

U.S. authorities. That previously undisclosed ultimatum may have been the final straw that prompted the surrender, the official said.
 Noriega was dressed in olive-green trousers and a khaki uniform shirt with a general's four stars on the epaulets. He walked into the courtroom without handcuffs or shackles. When questioned by the judge, he stood with a military bearing, hands clasped tightly behind him.
 He answered softly in Spanish and stared at the judge, showing no emotion. Noriega listened to a translation of the judge's questions through head-phones, which he

removed when he answered.
 U.S. marshals stood against the doors of the courtroom, which was filled with reporters.
 The defense said the case could take one month to prepare and six months to try. U.S. Attorney Dexter Lehtinch said he thought the trial would take only two months.
 Noriega is accused of accepting \$4.6 million in bribes from Colombian drug cartels to aid and protect their smuggling and processing - charges that carry 145 years in prison and \$1.1 million in fines.
 A bond hearing was waived until it is requested by the defense. Noriega, who gave

his age as 51 although some records indicate he may be older, will be held without bond. He also faces drug charges in Tampa.
 Rubino said U.S. marshals have assured that Noriega can be made available to "discuss" matters within a half-hour to an hour. Noriega will first be held at an undisclosed location in the Miami area, said Rubino.
 Administration sources said Noriega was assured he would not be tried under a statute that carries the death penalty for drug-related killings. The law was passed in 1988, after his indictment, and he has not been

McClure may clear air today on his future

BOISE — Aides to Republican Sen. James McClure refused Thursday afternoon to comment on widespread reports that McClure has decided not to seek a fourth Senate term this year.
 Boise television station KTVB quoted "political sources," as saying they believed McClure has decided to retire after serving 24 years in Congress.
 Sources said they understood McClure planned to make his intentions known today.
 At the same time, Idaho Republican leaders across the state reported being contacted by two potential successors, seeking support for the GOP nomination in Idaho's primary, less than five months away.
 But neither Rep. Larry Craig, a five-term congressman from Idaho's 1st District, nor Jim Jones, Idaho attorney general for the last eight years, said he had any firm information that McClure planned to step down.
 McClure aide H.D. Palmer said he was swamped by telephone calls throughout the day, asking whether the senator has decided to retire. But he said, "I have nothing to confirm."

CSI, North Idaho share highest Gem student loan default rate

TWIN FALLS—The College of Southern Idaho has tied for the highest student-loan default rate among Idaho's colleges and universities.
 CSI and the North Idaho College both have 23.6 percent default rates.
 "We're not happy with that but it wasn't totally unexpected because of the nature of our student body," Dave Perkins, CSI's director of financial aid, said.
 As part of the federal government's effort to whittle away at the default rate, institutions are lined by state in a first-of-its-kind report compiled by the U.S. Education Department. The report is based on the number of students who left the institutions in 1987, and whose loans then defaulted in 1987 or 1988.
 Under the government's loan program, the students actually borrow the money from a bank or lending institution, and the government promises to repay the loan in case of default.
 In 1989, the government spent \$8 billion to cover student loans that had gone into default, Phillip Cautchen, a federal Education Department spokesperson, said.
 And the experts estimate 188,000 will eat \$13 billion of taxpayer funds in 1990, Cautchen said.
 Why didn't the high default rate surprise CSI officials?
 "Community colleges deal with a large number of high-risk, non-traditional type students," Perkins explained.
 In other words, it's the philosophy of the community college to have an open-door policy and we

Drug dens health law targets now

SEATTLE—People who want to make crack must get a permit and open their drug dens to health inspections or face fines of \$10,000 a day under new regulations intended to help police gain entry to crack houses.
 The King County regulations take effect April 1, allowing time for them to be amended and maybe even scrapped after a review by prosecutors, said Charles Kleeborg, environmental health director for the county and Seattle.
 "It's not really an April Fool," Kleeborg said Thursday.
 Kleeborg, a lawyer, said preliminary research indicated there was no similar measure on the books anywhere in the country.
 Seattle-King County Health Department director Dr. Bud Nicola explained that health officials would be notified by police "that a crack operation was going on in a house."
 The department then would notify the owner of an apparent violation of health regulations and order him to produce a plan for reducing the health risk. A \$100-review-fee also is required.
 "We would not expect to get a plan," Nicola said. "We would then start the fine process."
 The measure offers another way for police to gain entry to crack houses.

Increasing revenues forecast for Idaho

BOISE—Commerce Director James Hawkins, bubbling over with optimism about Idaho's economic prospects, told a special-legislative committee Thursday that state revenues could grow by nearly 9 percent in the current budget year.
 The revenue forecast, the first to be provided to the Joint Committee on Revenue Projections, was significantly higher than any mentioned by other analysts, including those who are putting together Gov. Cecil Andrus' estimate.
 But Hawkins said, "We have just touched the tip of the economic iceberg.... Economic development is really happening in urban and rural Idaho."
 His projection, reinforcing the bright economic picture business and government leaders have been painting for the 14-member panel this week, pushed general tax collections during the current budget year to \$841 million. Other informal estimates have ranged between \$815 million and \$830 million. The state repaid some \$770 million from the tax system last year.
 Hawkins forecast would increase a cash surplus already estimated at a record \$100 million to around \$125 million and open the possibility that Idaho's tax-structure could produce as much as \$900 million for the spending year that begins July 1.

Lithuanians stand fast in talks with Gorbachev

MOSCOW—Leaders of the renege Lithuanian Communist Party refused Thursday to back down from their decision to break away from the Soviet party and said they had won assurances from Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev that no harsh punishment against them would be taken.
 After a five-hour meeting at the Kremlin, the Lithuanians indicated that they would continue to negotiate a compromise with Moscow to defuse the situation, which has presented Gorbachev with perhaps his most challenging political crisis.
 Lithuania is worried that the Lithuanian breakaway will set a precedent for the Soviet republics, and particularly for Latvia and Estonia, the other two separatist-minded republics on the Baltic coast.
 Meanwhile, the Estonian Communist Party Central Committee decided Thursday to hold a conference Feb. 9 to discuss the future of its party, and to follow that with a formal party congress on March 23, Tass reported.
 Estonian party boss Valno Valjas, speaking at the plenary meeting, backed calls for a looser structure of the national party organization

Azerbaijani demonstrators withdraw

MOSCOW (AP) — A protest organizer said Azerbaijani demonstrators began drawing back from the Soviet-Iranian border Thursday after trying for four days to force open the frontier crossing and reunite with their brethren in Iran.

The KGB sent border troop reinforcements to the area Wednesday to stop protesters from smashing

guard towers and security alarms. The newspaper Rabochaya Tribuna, or Workers' Tribune, reported Thursday. "The border posts themselves are under threat and the rampaging ruffians have gone so far as to promise retribution against the soldiers of the border patrol and their family members."

But writer Yusuf Samedoglu reported by telephone Thursday from Baku, capital of the republic of Azerbaijan. "The situation is stabilizing. People are gradually going home."

Savili A. Perets, deputy director of the official news agency Azerinform, also said in a telephone interview from Baku that the border area was calming down.

Panama success may hurt later on

WASHINGTON — President Bush may pay a heavy long-term price for his triumph in Panama, sealed with the surrender of Manuel Noriega.

Panama, for all its interest to Americans, still represents a major concern beyond the "door" where the main drama — perhaps the most significant of our era — is playing out in Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union.

By his bold, and ultimately successful, assertion of raw power on America's doorstep, Bush may unintentionally have opened the door to a resurgence of Soviet power in restive republics in the Baltic or in Azerbaijan, at a time when the United States would vastly prefer peaceful change.

Nor is it beyond imagination that Mikhail Gorbachev might feel far freer to exert force in turbulent Eastern Europe, despite frequent

pledges in recent months that he would not do so.

The implicit messages that Bush has sent worldwide by the Panama invasion are first, that the age of power politics is not past as far as he is concerned; and second, that the United States believes Central America falls in a U.S. sphere of influence.

But Eastern Europeans have been seeking an end to power politics and an end to the principle of spheres of influence, which to them has meant Soviet domination.

So far Bush has not paid a heavy political price on the world stage for his Panama adventure. But his Organization of American States and the United Nations slapped the U.S. with condemnatory resolutions, but that was it.

Our Western European allies essentially kept mum.

The question, however, is whether Bush may have unleashed forces he did not intend. Gorbachev so far has been able to restrain Soviet generals. But no one outside the Kremlin can be sure how strong his hand may be.

The Baltics and Azerbaijan could be on the verge of a major Soviet breakdown. Lithuania is seeking to break its formal ties with the Soviet Union, producing a crisis atmosphere in Moscow. Gorbachev has called for a meeting with the Lithuanian leadership to negotiate a compromise.

If he fails, it could mean the beginnings of disintegration of the great nation itself, which Gorbachev can not, and does not, want. Power can not be ruled out, which would force Eastern Europe into new and dangerous turmoil.

Neighboring Latvia and Estonia are also threatening to break ties with Moscow.

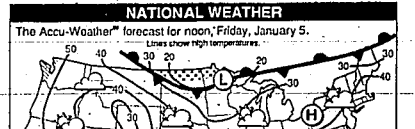

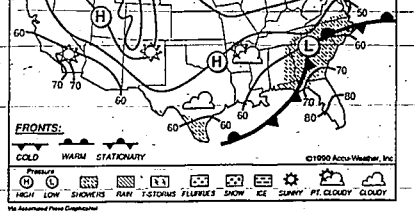

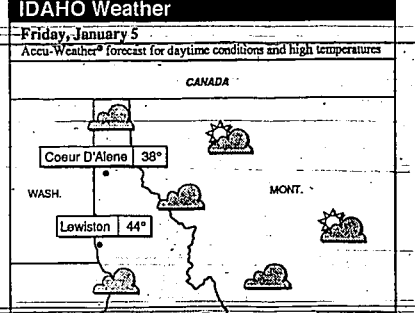
High pressure building over the state will bring only scattered showers today with more rain and snow over the coming weekend.

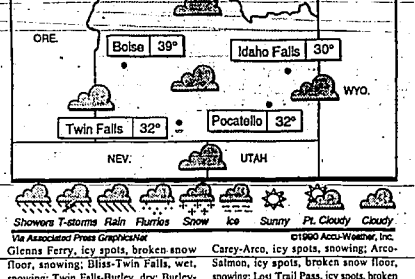

chared over it.

Noriega surrendered Wednesday night to U.S. troops outside Panama City's Vatican Embassy 10 days after he took refuge there, and was flown into Homestead Air Force Base south of Miami under cover of night Thursday.

U.S. marshals with binoculars scanned the downtown area continuously from atop the federal courthouse and patrolled halls in plain clothes, but otherwise were inconspicuous in what Hoeveler said was an effort to treat Noriega like any other defendant.

Exactly a year ago, Hoeveler ruled the United States has jurisdiction, rejecting defense claims of immunity for a head of state. The judge said the State Department never recognized Noriega's political legitimacy.

Several experts in international

law said Noriega has little basis for the claims. It is not clear if such immunity exists, they said, but if it did, Noriega probably wouldn't qualify because the crimes—allegedly committed were not part of his official duties.

"As far as I know, the things Noriega is accused of doing have nothing to do with his being a head of state," said Alfred Rubin, a professor of international law at the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts University.

Noriega co-counsel Steven Kollin has noted other potential legal pitfalls in the case, including extreme pressure and Noriega's links with U.S. intelligence agencies, but U.S. Attorney General Dick Thornburgh said he was confident the case was solid.

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said President Bush and other White House officials would

be careful about what they say lest they prejudice the trial.

Justice Department spokesman David Runkel said that Noriega was not formally placed under arrest until the C-130 he was aboard was taking off from Panama. Runkel said U.S. officials decided to make the arrest in American territory.

The general gave up, still wearing his military uniform, after realizing even his supporters and turned against him, the archbishop of Panama, Marcos McGrath, said Thursday.

"The people feel a sense of peace knowing that the monster is leaving our land," said Panamanian President Guillermo Endara.

The indictment against Noriega names 15 other people, including the reputed head of the Medellin cocaine cartel, Pablo Escobar Gaviria.

Reports circulated through Idaho political circles that McClure planned an announcement Friday.

The senator, who has been spending much of the congressional recess at McCall, has been unavailable.

McClure, who turned 65 last week, has been pondering his political future for some time. He said in an interview last month he was torn between a desire to pursue other things or return to Washington.

McClure, a moderate, has had only token Democratic opposition the last two elections and was considered almost unbeatable if he decided to run again.

McClure's decision is critical to Idaho's 1990 election. The positions of both Craig and Jones would open up if they ran for the GOP nomination to succeed McClure, and other candidates have said they are waiting for McClure's announcement before deciding which race to enter.

Some Republicans have reported considerable unrest in the party because McClure's long delay in announcing his plans has left little time to mount major campaigns for the House, Senate and other races.

State Agriculture Director Dick Rush said he's looking at running for the Democratic nomination, although he said Thursday afternoon he might look at a congressional bid if Craig's seat were open. Idaho Falls negotiator David Steed has formally announced as a Democrat.

Boise attorney David Leroy, the former lieutenant governor, attorney general and GOP governor nomination in 1986, also has indicated he might be seeking the Republican nomination for the Senate if McClure does not run.

McClure, a native of Payette and a lawyer, was a city and county prosecutor before being elected to the Idaho Senate in 1950. He was elected to Congress in 1966 and served until he won the Senate seat in 1972 when Republican Len Jordan retired.

When Republicans won control of the Senate after the 1980 election, McClure was chairman of the Interior and Natural Resources Committee from 1981-87. He remains ranking Republican on that panel, and is ranking Republican on the Interior subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee.

Andy Anderson, head of the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho, also forecast continued growth but maintained that "some things happening in the state that are driving sales tax construction and other things aren't sustainable."

Because of that he projected growth in general state tax receipts at around 6 percent. That would put current-year revenue at about \$822 million, keeping the surplus at just over \$100 million, and receipts for the new spending year at \$871 million.

Andrus will issue his forecast next Wednesday, and it will be up to the committee to determine the estimate that will be used to guide budget-writers during the election-year session.

Other economists have roughly estimated revenue for the new budget year in a range of \$865-million to \$885 million, expecting some slowing in the state's economic resurgence. Even at that rate, analysts believe the state would meet its spending demands and still have the

huge cash surplus to handle projects that were ignored during the years of economic problems.

Kelly Matthews, chief economist for First Security Corp., told the committee Thursday that Washington and Oregon mark the brightest economic region in the nation, but he said the anticipated national economic slowdown will take its toll.

"We're not an island," he said. "There has to be some impact. ... Idaho will have a pretty good year in 1990, but we will not duplicate the growth rates of 1989."

Hawkins' optimism underscored the feelings of the state's retailers and potato growers, who see another strong financial year ahead.

But tempering that outlook was state Employment Director Julie Kilgour, who predicted that the average annual unemployment in 1990-would increase-for the first time in four years.

"We no longer question that Idaho is in a true economic expansion similar to that at the end of the 1970s," Mrs. Kilgour told the committee.

that degree or certificate, Perkins said, the student probably won't be able to secure the employment expected and will have a difficult time repaying the loan.

Perkins' theory holds true when other states' default rates are studied.

In Oregon, for instance, the average student loan default rate for two-year public institutions was about 25 percent, while the rate for four-year institutions was about 6 percent.

In Washington state, the two-year schools earned an average of 17 percent, the four-year schools 3 percent.

Almost as high on the default list as community colleges are private schools such as beauty and broadcast schools.

Twin Falls' Mr. Juan's College of Hair Design had the highest default rate of any school in Idaho: 33.3 percent of students with government-guaranteed loans default.

Mr. Juan's Manager J.R. Scholtes said the school's rate is so high because, "I think the group of people we attract aren't as motivated as

other students."

He said the school's dropout rate is about 85 percent.

But both Scholtes and Perkins say new federal rules will help decrease their default percentages.

Both CSI and Mr. Juan's now have to sit down and talk with loan applicants before as they enter and then they leave the schools, telling them of their responsibilities to repay the loan and the consequences of default — which now includes being put on a nationwide computerized "bad credit" list.

"While the entrance and exit interviews have forced CSI to add a half-time employee, Perkins said schools do have a responsibility to help keep defaults to a minimum.

"I think they are putting an extra burden on us, more so than on the banks, but the banks don't really get to see the student very often — everything is done by letter communication."

"We pass out the checks and this is about the only place we can guarantee a one-on-one interview process."

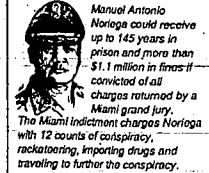
WASHINGTON (AP) — Prosecutors facing a minifield of legal challenges to their drug cases

against Manuel Antonio Noriega combed CIA files Thursday for secrets that defense lawyers might be able to expose at his trial.

Manuel Antonio Noriega could receive up to 145 years in prison and more than \$1.1 million in fines if convicted of all charges returned by a Miami grand jury.

- Specifically, it accuses him of:
- Accepting a \$4.6 million bribe from Colombia's Medellin drug cartel to protect shipments of cocaine, launder money, supply drug laboratories and shield drug traffickers from the law.
- Allowing smugglers to use Panama as a way station for U.S.-bound cocaine.
- Utilizing his official positions both before and after his takeover in 1983 to provide protection for international criminal narcotics traffickers.
- Arranging for the shipment of cocaine processing chemicals, including those seized by Panamanian authorities.
- Laundering cartel narcotics proceeds in Panamanian banks.
- Allowing cartel leaders to shift operations to Panama to escape a crackdown in Colombia after the assassination of that country's anti-drug minister of justice.
- Traveling to Havana so Cuban President Fidel Castro could mediate a dispute with the Medellin cartel after Panamanian troops seized a drug laboratory that Noriega had been paid to protect.
- A grand jury in Tampa also indicted Noriega on three counts of marijuana trafficking. That indictment alleges he arranged to import more than 1.4 million pounds of marijuana into the United States and accepted a \$1 million bribe from drug dealers for allowing them to smuggle drugs and launder cash in Panama.

What's more, there is the potential problem of finding a jury for a man publicly branded as a thug by President Bush.

Earlier this week, Dexter W. Lehtinen, the U.S. attorney in Miami and the prosecutor overseeing the case against Noriega, came to Washington to join in the review of CIA documents that might pertain to the case, said Justice Department spokesman David Runkel.

"It would be our intention to review material which may be relevant," Runkel said of the review, which began this week.

Prosecutors from Miami and Tampa, where Noriega faces a second set of charges, as well as Justice Department officials are going over files at CIA headquarters, Runkel said.

The review, which would normally occur before an indictment is returned, is being conducted to determine if there are indigent documents that Noriega could obtain for his defense because of the extensive dealings he once had with the CIA as an informant.

The deposed Panamanian ruler is expected to try to force the dismissal of the drug-trafficking charges against him by threatening to disclose sensitive information about his longstanding relationship with the CIA.

But Attorney General Dick Thornburgh, in an appearance on ABC-TV's "Good Morning America" Thursday, indicated the review had not turned up anything so far that would hobble the case.

"Obviously, we can't anticipate what General Noriega may raise by way of defense at trial, but suffice it to say at the moment that there's nothing that's come to our attention that would indicate that this trial can't go forward," the attorney general said.

Runkel stressed that Noriega would have to show that any secrets

he thinks are in the CIA's possession are relevant to the charges that he provided a haven for Colombian drug lords and shared in their profits.

"This is a drug case and I would assume that any documents which anyone would seek to introduce have to meet the test of relevancy," Runkel said.

To show relevancy, Noriega would have to demonstrate that the CIA was a partner in drug operations and subevidence "is just not there," said one Justice Department official, speaking on the condition of anonymity.

Besides CIA secrets, prosecutors face a number of potentially serious legal issues that are expected to be raised by Noriega's defense lawyers. One is the issue of pre-trial publicity that will most certainly be raised in light of statements since the U.S. invasion of Panama made by Bush and others in the administration.

Before Noriega gave himself up, Bush said that the general should be "brought to justice for poisoning the children of America" with illegal drugs and that the Vatican, in whose embassy Noriega took refuge, had a history "of giving asylum to people who are fleeing — even thugs like Noriega."

After Noriega's arrest, White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater told reporters, "You can expect the president and all of us to be very careful in the days ahead not to offer any comments on the case that might prejudice it in any way."

The Justice Department's Runkel, who himself once called the ex-ruler an "international thug," has now taken to describing him as a "defendant of allegations of criminal conduct."

Thornburgh, noting that pre-trial publicity did not prevent trials of Watergate defendants, expressed confidence that statements about Noriega wouldn't jeopardize the courts' ability to pick impartial jurors.

"We've had numerous cases

Panama's next task is economy

Freed of strongman Manuel Noriega, Panama now faces the formidable task of rebuilding an economy battered by a U.S. economic bulldozer and a three-year political crisis.

Many of the country's key industries have been ravaged since June 1987, when former Col. Roberto Diaz Herrera publicly accused Noriega of rigging the country's 1984 elections, of drug trafficking and political assassination. Diaz Herrera had been second in command to Noriega, and his charges set off street demonstrations and a summer of unrest.

Impact on the service-based economy, which had helped give Panama the highest per capita income in Central America, was swift as nervous investors shifted billions of dollars out of that international banking center to Miami, New York and Switzerland.

"Immediately a confidence issue was raised and the major exodus of money took place in the second half of 1987," said Emmanuel Roussakis, a finance professor at Florida International University in Miami who has studied capital flight in Panama.

"Money is a very nervous commodity. Once confidence is shaken, investors and foreign depositors react immediately." International banking, which had provided about 8,000 high-quality jobs, was "basically gone," said Amber Moss, dean

of the University of Miami's Graduate School of International Studies and Panamanian ambassador to the United States from 1978 to 1982.

Local deposits plummeted by almost 40 percent from 1987 to 1989, according to a study completed in October by Panamanian economist Guillermo Chapman.

Chapman, recently dispatched by Panama's newly installed President Guillermo Endara to help coordinate U.S. aid, also found that construction nearly came to a halt. Building permits in Panama City, strongly linked to the banking industry's growth, dropped 93.4 percent during the same period.

In late 1987 the United States cut off economic and military aid and suspended Panama's sugar export quota. Following indictments against Noriega in two federal courts in Florida in February 1988, the United States imposed a broad package of economic sanctions against the country in March of that year. The moves failed to displace Noriega but they decimated many local firms and also hurt U.S. companies doing business with the country.

Sugar exports dried up, diving by a stunning 94.4 percent while the value of goods imported into the country — Florida's ninth largest market — fell 34 percent from 1987 to 1989. Panama's gross domestic product dropped by at least 20 percent in 1988, and unemployment is now running at 20 percent.

Noriega proud, alone as defeat neared

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — The general wore his uniform, proud to the last.

But Manuel Antonio Noriega was a defeated man when he surrendered to U.S. troops in the dark of night to face drug trafficking charges in the United States.

With family, friends, cronies, lovers, money and admiring crowds gone, the former strongman had no place to turn. "I will pray for you every day," the Rev. Javier Villanueva told the ousted dictator as they walked Wednesday night to the black-robed gates of the Vatican Embassy.

"Crucifix" answered a visibly moved Noriega, according to the parish priest who was a key player in talks to get Noriega out of the mission.

Together in pitch blackness, they made the 20-yard walk to Avenida Balboa, where soldiers waited to handcuff him. A week before, the troops had shot out the lights with tear gas.

"He did not know the terrain and he stumbled twice. It must have seemed to him he was entering a dark tunnel," said Villanueva.

The jaunty general with the reputation for fearlessness and for the delight he took in twinking a superpower's nose had been toppled by a force of 20 U.S. invasion, a revelation of just how helpless he was if a U.S. president got serious.

Before fleeing to the embassy, he hid out for four days. U.S. military officials said he drove around in circles, nervous and agitated, unable to even risk calling his top officers for fear of betrayal.

Isolated in the Vatican embassy where he escaped the dragnet of U.S. soldiers on Christmas Eve, he was also snubbed and expelled in the country he ruled with an iron fist since 1983.

He was alone on the inside and alone on the outside. Even the priests who granted him asylum reminded him he was an unwelcome guest. The hospitality was minimal.

"He could not ask for anything special," said embassy spokesman Jose Cubillas. "He was a vegetarian but he did not get vegetarian meals." For most of his last week, the general did not sleep.

Noriega lived in a small room on the second floor in the east side of the white-stucco building. It had a bathroom, a broken TV set and a Bible. He could not see out through the opaque window.

But he could hear the music. Through four of his 10 days inside the embassy, U.S. soldiers barged in with rock rap and country music, shouting him with tunes such as "Voodoo Child" and "You're No Good," reminding him he had

"Nowhere to Run. Nowhere to Hide."

He also heard the latest news: his top aides were falling into U.S. hands like dominoes and the gringos, he allegedly acquired through cocaine deals were being frozen in European banks.

Helicopters hovered and armored tanks rumbled up and down the street.

He made a few telephone calls, but then the lines were pulled to prevent him from shuffling his fortune stashed in bank accounts.

Villanueva said Noriega kept to himself and hardly talked to anyone, not even to the handful of top aides huddled up in the compound with him.

He had also portrayed himself as the man who could save Panama from being overwhelmed by the gringos, the man who would fulfill the historic mission of his generation as his mentor Omar Torrijos had so devoutly wished.

But in the end he was alone, separated from his lover and from his wife and three daughters, who sought refuge inside the Cuban Embassy. Many of his cronies and

friends were scattered in embassies throughout the capital.

The last day of Noriega's stay inside the mission was perhaps the loneliest, as 20,000 people filled the streets and shouted "Assassin!" "No more!" and "Out of the nunciature!"

If he had any supporters, they were silent.

"He saw himself as something of an emperor in this part of the world, shattered," said Archbishop Marcos McGrath on ABC's "Nightline."

Shrouded by palm trees, the gates of the Vatican embassy opened and closed Wednesday. The papal nuncio, in his long white robe, came in and out, talking to U.S. Army officials.

Panamanian sources said one of his last conversations was with his longtime mistress Vickie Amado. The U.S. Southern Command had tried to convince her to lure Noriega out. But she didn't.

The sources said that during a 10-minute conversation, she told him, "The decision is in your hands." Gen. Maxwell Thurman, head of the Southern Command, agreed: "People have to make up their own minds."

The man who survived two coup attempts and humiliated the United States eventually made his decision.

Skinning the anti-fur brigade

Magic Valley residents shouldn't have any trouble deciding where their interests lie in the national fur-coat debate. Those shrill voices calling for an end to commercial use of animal products are not on our side.

Animal-rights activists have a hard time explaining why they have targeted fur coats for political attack - instead of, for instance, running shoes with cowhide leather, or pillows of goose feathers, or jerky.

But, the reasoning is fairly easy to guess. Like anyone else, the animal-rights activists fight their battles where they think they can win.

Furs, as a luxury item, are a fat target for moral outrage. The general public will more readily denounce the few who wear mink than the many who wear Reeboks.

More important, perhaps, is the squeamishness of urban dwellers. Many urbanites don't know anybody who works in a meat-packing plant, and most of them didn't raise 4-H animals when they were kids.

Squeamishness makes a difference. Mink and fox and other fur-bearing creatures are cute. In the court of public opinion, being cute counts.

Of course, a genuine moral issue is involved. The issue is really several questions in one: Is it wrong to kill animals so that humans may be fed, clothed, shod, comforted and - in the case of fur coats - decorated?

For most people, the answer is neither yes nor no, but "It depends."

Most people would be glad to shun products made from endangered species, as well as goods produced with needless cruelty. Few people would justify the wanton killing of elephants for their ivory or the shooting of bald eagles for their feathers.

So far so good. Beyond that point, however, the moral footing becomes less firm.

Some people would say killing for food and clothing is OK, but killing for vanity is not. But if that's so, are leather cowboy boots more moral than the snakeskin models on the next shelf?

And when we talk about eliminating an industry that breeds fur-bearing animals specifically for harvest - and that handles those animals with respect and decency - then we step blindly upon logic's slippery slope.

The fur industry has counterattacked its critics with the slogan, "Today fur. Tomorrow leather. Then wool. Then meat." The slogan may exaggerate, but not much.

As one animal-rights activist told *The Times-News* recently, "You have to pick the industries that are the most vulnerable, that are least easily defended."

Mink farming surely is one of those vulnerable industries. But look around our valley at what may be tomorrow's targets. Cattle. Sheep. Trout. Dairy products. Alligators, if one local visionary has his way in the near future.

It is no rhetorical excess to suggest that the animal-rights lobby's most extreme members would like to abolish all those industries, leaving Americans to eat soybeans and wear canvas deck shoes.

To those folk, the chief difference between a mink coat and a hamburger may be what they think they can accomplish, and when.

Shooting victim, suddenly a suspect, kills himself

BOSTON (AP) — A businessman who was seriously wounded and his pregnant wife shot to death Oct. 23, threw himself to his death off a Boston Harbor bridge Thursday after police concluded he had lied and zeroed in on him as a suspect.

The body of Charles Stuart, whose frantic call to police from his car phone after the shootings drew nationwide attention, was identified after being pulled from the water.

"Basically, it's fair to say, he could not handle the allegations or statements made about him," Suffolk County Prosecutor Newman Flanagan said, describing a suicide note found in Stuart's car at the bridge.

Stuart, 29, had told police that he and his wife, Carol, who was seven months pregnant, were shot by a robber who commanded their car after they left a childbirth class. Their son was delivered by Caesarean section but died 17 days later.

Stuart flung himself from the 300-foot Tobin Bridge hours after what prosecutors said was a dramatic disclosure that swung the focus of the investigation to him.

Flanagan said the story Stuart initially told about being shot by an assailant who had entered the couple's car "is not true." He said the case was still active and other people were being questioned, but he gave no details.

He would not confirm reports that a brother of Stuart's had given police the information that turned suspicion on Stuart.

Officials said Stuart apparently

knew he was a suspect. Police in his hometown of Reading, a Boston suburb, had watched his home overnight, but he did not go there, and attempts to find him early Thursday were unsuccessful.

"I would say the whole town is shocked. They were portrayed as a model couple," said Wally Arsenault, a restaurant manager in Reading.

John Vajdic, who lives across the street from the Stuar's slate-blue home, said: "At this point, I still don't know what to believe. I still wonder what is the truth."

The shootings of the prosperous suburban couple — he a fur store manager and salesman, she a 30-year-old lawyer — in an inner-city neighborhood drew cries of outrage

about city violence from around the country, as well as charges from blacks and others that the outrage was spurred in part by racism.

Stuart's dramatic call to police on a car phone after the shootings was about 10 minutes to figure out where he was, from clues such as the sound of sirens over Stuart's car telephone.

Stuart had been shot in the abdomen, his wife in the head.

Stuart wrote a statement for his wife's funeral in which he said, "For us to truly believe, we must know that (God's) will was done and that there was some right in this mess of acts. In our souls, we must forgive this sinner because he would too." The couple had been married four years.

Student boycott suspended

SELMA, Ala. (AP) — A black student boycott protesting the ouster of Selma's first black school superintendent was suspended in its second day by organizers who said they would sue the school board.

The Selma school board, which had been called a "very successful" though class attendance appeared to increase substantially compared with the 25 percent absentee rate the first day. He said the boycott was being suspended until Jan. 16 because exams are coming up.

Sanders said a federal lawsuit would be filed later today challenging the 1977 city law that created Selma's majority-white school board.

Black members of the board resigned after the six-white members voted Dec. 21 not to renew the contract of Superintendent Norward Russell.

Bush proclaims special week

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush issued a proclamation Thursday marking Jan. 7-13 as National Law Enforcement Training Week.

Congress earlier passed legislation designating the week. "The responsibility of law enforcement officers with the knowledge and skills they need, law enforcement training helps them to protect our homes, businesses and communities," the president said.

"This week we recognize the dedicated men and women who provide this training, as well as the hard-working individuals who participate in it."

Bush will appoint Matthews

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush said Thursday that he will appoint Mary Matthews Rafter of McLean, Va., to the National Council on Disability.

He also announced two reappointments to the council: Chairwoman Sandra Swift Parrino of Briarcliff, N.Y., and Atvis Kent Waldrep Jr. of Dallas, president of the Kent Waldrep National Paralysis Foundation.

Libyan sanctions tighten

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush on Thursday extended sanctions against Libya under national emergency procedures, saying the North African nation "continues to use and support international terrorism."

Bush, in a letter to House Speaker Thomas S. Foley and Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, said he was continuing the economic sanctions imposed Jan. 7, 1986, by President Reagan. The sanctions would have expired Jan. 7 without the

executive order to extend them.

Bush said the government was utilizing the National Emergencies Act "to deal with the unusual and extraordinary threat to the national security and foreign policy of the United States ... by the actions and policies of the government of Libya."

The sanctions include: freezing of Libyan assets in U.S. banks; a ban on sale of weapons to Libya; a ban on trade; curtailment of travel by Americans there; a ban on credits or loans to the Libyan government by U.S. interests; and suspension of contracts relating to activities in Libya.

Keating's son-in-law testifies

WASHINGTON (AP) — A son-in-law in charge of buying and selling land in Phoenix-millionaire Charles H. Keating's now-collapsed real estate and savings and loan empire said Thursday he was advised by attorneys he did not need appraisals on the deals.

Testifying in Keating's suit to overturn a Federal takeover last April of Lincoln Savings and Loan Association, Robert M. Wurzbacher Jr. also said he did not investigate the ability of some buyers of the land to repay loans from the thrift financing the deals.

"But, he added, 'as far as I know' the thrift complied with all state and federal regulations in using Lincoln and its federally insured deposits to carry out an estimated \$1 billion in land, stock and other transactions between 1984 and 1988."

Keating and his son, Charles H. Keating III, were scheduled to testify later Thursday in U.S. District Court here as subpoenaed government witnesses.

Activist group hurls criticism

WASHINGTON (AP) — A human rights group Thursday accused the Bush administration of "widespread disregard for human rights," saying it was soft in its response to the crackdown on pro-democracy demonstrators in China and an apologist for military abuses in El Salvador, Guatemala and the Philippines.

The two-volume report by Human Rights Watch did say there were "bright spots" in President Bush's rights policies toward Eastern Europe, South Africa and Burma, but criticized the administration's dealings in most of the 50 nations covered.

"Unfortunately, our review of the public positions taken by the Bush administration during its first year reveals a widespread disregard for human rights," the report said.

"Its insistence on seeing the world in geopolitical terms, and other priorities, gave rise to a striking silence on abuses in many countries, and a frequent refusal to adjust U.S. policy in light of those abuses."

Black organization cancels meeting

PHOENIX (AP) — An organization of black journalists canceled its national board meeting here because of the suspension of a state holiday in memory of the late Martin Luther King.

Directors of the National Association of Black Journalists had scheduled their quarterly meeting for Jan. 12-14 in Phoenix. The King holiday was to have been celebrated Jan. 15.

"At a considerable cost to NABJ, we have canceled ... because we cannot in good conscience spend our money and do business in a state which will not commemorate the values of truth, freedom and justice that the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. so courageously embodied," NABJ President Thomas Morgan said in a statement.

Poles fear shortages, empty stores

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Shoppers have virtually emptied State Store 122 of its goods because the switch to a market economy is driving prices up and Poles figure everything will cost more next week.

"I had heaps of sugar and flour, enough to last three months, but when the year came to an end people bought everything out within a week," said Teresa Sasin, who manages the food store.

"The day after New Year's I had a delivery of 500 kilos (1,100 pounds) of sugar and it sold out within an hour," she said, gesturing toward the empty shelves. "Same with eggs. Ten crates were sold out in an hour." Similar scenes have been reported in state-run grocery and meat stores around the nation Thursday as customers stocked up before prices are raised again. Some stores closed because they had nothing more to sell.

Shamir accused of inciting threats

JERUSALEM (AP) — A legislator of the center-left Labor Party on Thursday accused Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir of helping incite death threats against liberal legislators who supported a peace demonstration in Jerusalem.

Police Commissioner David Krauss ordered an official inquiry into police behavior during the peace demonstration Saturday in Arab east Jerusalem. Police fired rubber bullets, tear gas, and water cannons, and beat demonstrators with clubs. About 15,000 peace activists tried to form a "human chain" around the walled Old City. Shamir characterized Parliament members who supported the demonstration as "traitors."

Honecker freed from house arrest

BONN, West Germany — Erich Honecker, the deposed Communist leader of East Germany, has been released from house arrest, the chief of the national criminal police reported Thursday.

Honecker, 77 and ailing, had been confined to his home since Dec. 5 while the new government investigated charges against him of corruption and abuse of power.

Helmut Netteg, chief of the criminal police, said Thursday that the decision to place Honecker under house arrest "had no legal basis." He said that he did not know whether Honecker, who was arrested Oct. 18, was still the subject of an investigation.

Filipino hopes to negotiate with U.S.

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — The foreign minister said Thursday he hoped U.S. military base negotiations that were stalled by last month's coup attempt could begin before March.

Foreign Secretary Raul Manglapus also said a committee created by President Corason Aquino would meet next week to prepare negotiators for the exploratory talks.

Under a 1947 agreement, the United States is allowed to maintain Clark Air Base, Subic Bay Naval Station and four other smaller military facilities. The Philippine government must notify the U.S. government by September 1990 if it will allow the bases to remain after their lease expires in 1991.

Pope will visit Angola next year

LISBON, Portugal (AP) — Pope John Paul II will visit the African nation of Angola next year, the Angolan state news agency reported Thursday.

The report, monitored in Lisbon from the Angolan capital of Luanda, cited a statement from the Roman Catholic Auxiliary Bishop of Luanda Pedro Luis saying the Pope had accepted an invitation from President Jose Eduardo dos Santos.

Troops seek bodies in Pakistan train crash

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP) — Soldiers with acetylene torches cut into crushed railroad cars Thursday searching for victims of Pakistan's worst train wreck, which officials said killed at least 210 people and injured 700.

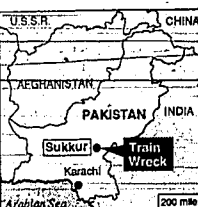
Television showed rows of bodies wrapped in blankets near the wreckage of an overcrowded 16-car passenger train that was switched onto the wrong track early Thursday and struck a freight standing in a village station.

The locomotive was overturned and several cars were crushed or ripped open. Bodies, baggage and debris were strewn near the wreckage.

Officials at the scene said 210 people were known dead and Pakistan Railways said rescuers had recovered 165 bodies. The engineer of the passenger train survived.

The passenger train Zakaria Bahaudin, named for a Moslem saint, was on a 500-mile overnight run south from Multan to Karachi with many more passengers than its 1,408-seat capacity, said Muktar Ahmad Abassi, regional traffic officer for Pakistan Railways at Sukkur, 225 miles north of Karachi.

When it approached Sangi village in Sindh province, which it was supposed to bypass, an improperly

switch threw it onto a siding, where an empty 67-car freight train was standing, he said.

Abassi said the passenger train was traveling at least 35 mph when it hit the freight, and the result was "the worst rail accident in Pakistan's history."

The first three cars, built to hold 88 passengers each, were devastated and the next two were badly damaged, Abassi said. The last eight cars remained on the track and later were towed to Karachi.

Most of the dead were in the first three cars and many passengers in the next two were seriously injured, officials said.

Medical workers said hundreds of people went to Sangi and Sukkur to

donate blood in response to an appeal on Pakistan radio.

Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto expressed "her deep sense of shock and grief," said a statement reported

by the official Associated Press of Pakistan.

Ms. Bhutto dispatched her railway minister and other authorities to the scene to start an investigation.

Czech finance minister says Comecon now useless

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — Finance Minister Vaclav Klaus said Thursday there is no reason for the continued existence of Comecon, the East bloc economic alliance, and he said Czechoslovakia would quit the organization unless it is overhauled.

Finance Minister Vaclav Klaus, an outspoken advocate of free-market reforms, also announced the devaluation of the Czechoslovak crown by 18.6 percent against

Western currencies. A Polish newspaper-quoted Klaus as saying Czechoslovakia would propose the dissolution of Comecon when the alliance meets in Sofia on Tuesday.

Asked at a news conference whether Czechoslovakia would propose the alliance be disbanded, Klaus replied: "Comecon cannot function, the way it is now and there is no reason for its existence

anymore." "I don't have to call it dissolution, but if all our proposals are accepted, it will not be the same organization," he said.

Klaus, 49, who was appointed Finance Minister in Czechoslovakia's reformist government last month, is a non-party economist who was forced to serve as a lowly bank clerk for his beliefs through the 1970s.

Czechoslovakia will propose the abolition of a whole range of agreements concluded earlier between Comecon members, Klaus said.


Those agreements "are so far binding our hands," he said, adding that if the Czechoslovak proposals are not accepted, "we are ready to get out of such commitments unilaterally."

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Idaho Briefly

INEL subject of GAO investigation
IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The General Accounting Office will launch a lengthy investigation of Naval nuclear facilities by the end of January, including the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, according to a published report.

The GAO investigation may take up to a year, the Schenectady (N.Y.) Gazette reported Thursday.

"We're looking at environmental, safety and health issues at the Navy nuclear propulsion facilities," GAO spokeswoman Laura Korpelson told the Gazette. "It's basically an extension of our work at other (Department of Energy) facilities. We just have never looked at the Navy propulsion facilities."

Malad will have new interstate sign
BOISE (AP) — The Malad Chamber of Commerce is more than a little pleased the state will allow a city sign on Interstate 15 to funnel visitors into town.

The 10-by-30-foot sign, hoisted into place 2 1/2 miles south of Malad last May, had been in jeopardy because of the Transportation Department's claim of violated state and federal regulations.

Officials said because of the sign's size, it was of commercial classification, and therefore should be placed on commercial property.

Since there is virtually no commercial land along the freeway near Malad, it created a dilemma for the chamber, which raised money for the sign.

Sandpoint resort project scrubbed
SANDPOINT (AP) — A proposed waterfront resort that would have been the largest such development in the city's history has been scrubbed, officials said.

John Murry, the local developer of the project, turned a thumbs down Wednesday morning at his office when asked about the status of the \$78 million Chateau Pend Oreille project. He said he was too busy to talk and could not be reached for comment later.

City officials admitted they had been skeptical of the project to build a 218-room hotel, a 144-slip marina and a 7,000-square-foot convention center.

"The city has never considered Eldorado to be a serious investor," said Mayor Ron Chaney, referring to the San Diego-based financier of the project, Eldorado Asset Management Co. "Their project as presented lacked credibility."

Nampa adopts new energy code
BOISE (AP) — Nampa officials have adopted the Northwest Energy Code, making it the first city in the Treasure Valley to take that step, the Idaho Department of Water Resources says.

The code, initiated by the Bonneville Power Administration in 1987, is a set of energy-efficient building standards for new, electrically-heated homes in the region.

Test results show homes built under the NWEC cost up to 50 percent less to heat and cool.

Twenty-three jurisdictions in Idaho had adopted the code leading up to Nampa's move on Tuesday.

Nampa Mayor Winston Geering said the NWEC-built homes are more comfortable and less expensive to heat or cool.

Lawmakers want extra landfill funds
BOISE (AP) — Two eastern Idaho lawmakers propose legislation they hope will help counties cope with the cost of closing landfills and opening new ones in the face of new federal rules.

Sen. Rex Furness, R-Rigby, and Rep. Stan Hawkins, R-Ucon, said Thursday they will ask that \$10.4 million from the state surplus be turned over to counties with solid-waste disposal problems.

District 7 Health Department officials said 21 landfills in the area do not comply with the new regulations and could be targeted for closure within two years.

Tribe official arrested, later resigns
LEWISTON (AP) — Gordon J. HighEagle says he resigned this week from the Nez Perce Tribal Executive Committee to pursue career options, not because he was arrested on a charge of drunken driving last week at Moscow.

HighEagle, 39, of Lapwai, resigned Tuesday morning from the tribe's nine-member governing group. But he says NPTEC members did not ask him to do so because of his arrest early Dec. 29 for alleged inattentive driving and driving while intoxicated.

Abandoned child progressing well
BOISE (AP) — Eddy Tuinman, the 7-year-old boy found whimpering in nothing but a T-shirt at a highway rest area, has regained his health in the intervening year. He is learning sign language — and trust.

"When we assess kids, we have a range of what they may be able to do," said Mary Anne Saunders of the Idaho Health and Welfare Department. "He is progressing well within the expectations."

Known only as "Johnny Doe" when he was found suffering from beatings and a cigarette burn on his body at the rest area east of Boise last Jan. 4, Eddy remained a mystery while he was treated at a local hospital.

Surplus might fund juvenile centers
POCATELLO (AP) — The hopes of county officials for new regional juvenile detention facilities currently rest with a Boise legislator.

Republican Rep. Shielia Sorenson is drafting legislation which could allocate \$7.5 million statewide for detention facilities. The funds would come from the \$100 million state surplus expected by next summer, Bannock County Commissioner Val Arvas said.

Indians will fight water agreement

FORT HALL (AP) — The Shoshone-Bannock Indian Tribes will go to court next week to argue that a Northwest agreement hurls their migratory fishing interests, tribal attorney Howard Funke says.

Four Indian tribes, the Bonneville Power Administration, the Department of Interior and other water users in 1988 signed a ten-year agreement which set water spill levels on Columbia and Snake river dams.

The 9th Circuit Court approved the pact which supposedly increases the survival rates of young salmon and steelhead in their downstream migration. Involved in the agreement is an inter-tribal fish commission composed of the Nez Perce, Umatilla, Warm Springs and Yakima tribes.

But Funke, who will argue the case next week in Seattle's 9th Circuit Court of Appeals, said the agreement focuses on downriver fish harvest, rather than building up the stocks of wild fish. In addition, he believes the Sho-Ban tribes were purposely excluded from the accord because of conflicting upriver and downriver interests.

"The way they've negotiated, the terms within it, and the way they've operated show they are trying to serve their own interests. There isn't enough focus on preservation and rebuilding of fisheries," Funke said. "We say it's illegal, and the plan ought to be thrown out and redone."

Funke said three parties will appeal the fishery plan: the Shoshone-Bannock and Makah tribes and state of Idaho. Both sides in the dispute use the hydroelectric dams have killed millions of smolts, but Funke said the plan does not provide adequate solutions for the problem.

"Under the Columbia plan, they are only giving lip service to rebuilding," he said.

Idaho Deputy Attorney General Clive Strong agreed that current framework does not address Indian interests.

"Idaho, being the last user along with the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes, is heavily dependent on the lower states. The present plan is focused on lower harvests, not upriver," said Strong.

He added his office will argue that when the U.S. District Court approved the plan, it was required, but failed, to consider the third-party interests of Idaho and the Shoshone-Bannocks.

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Officials investigating Yellowstone attack

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) — Rangers in Yellowstone National Park are trying to locate a coyote that attacked a cross-country skier not far from the Old Faithful geyser complex.

The attack Wednesday evening sent a 27-year-old Illinois man to a Montana hospital for treatment of lacerations and puncture wounds to his head, neck and arms. The attack was the boldest by coyotes that in recent weeks have approached park visitors for handouts.

Brian Dean, of Oaklawn, Ill., was reported "in a bad condition Thursday at Bozeman Deaconess Hospital," said Yellowstone spokeswoman Joan Anzelmo.

"We have not had anything this severe in a very long time ... there have been no severe attacks during the 1980s," Anzelmo said today. "Each year we have 'beggar coyotes' that have been fed and approach people occasionally, and attack them, to a lesser degree than this attack."

"Frankly, each year we receive reports from visitors and employees about bold coyotes, approaching them or running into them," she said.

Dean, who works for TW Recreational Services, the park's concessionaire, was skiing on the Myrtle Falls trail near Biscuit Basin in the park's interior about 4 p.m. Wednesday when he saw a coyote

lying on the trail in front of him. Anzelmo said the animal attacked Dean before he had a chance to stop or detour around it. The coyote knocked him to the ground and attacked him repeatedly while Dean beat the animal with one of his skis, she said.

"The animal was curled up, laying down, and as I understand it from the description, he was upon the skier before he knew it," said Anzelmo.

Dean, who was able to ski to a nearby road where a snowmobiler gave him a ride to the Old Faithful complex, initially was treated by park rangers and then taken by snow coach to West Yellowstone, Mont., and then to Bozeman.

Finding the coyote that attacked Dean won't be easy because the animals, which average 30-40 pounds, look similar, said Anzelmo. Whether the skier is treated for rabies will be left up to doctors to decide, she said.

Anzelmo said that in the last 10 days or so there are four coyotes in the Old Faithful and Biscuit Basin areas have been approaching people looking for handouts.

A week ago a mother used a ski pole to fend off a coyote that charged her young son near Biscuit Basin, and in another incident one of the animals jumped over the top of a woman sitting on a bench near the Old Faithful geyser, said Anzelmo.

Lawmakers vow to keep Heber Creeper going

HEBER CITY, Utah (AP) — Efforts to keep the popular Heber Creeper steam locomotive on its rails have won support from three state lawmakers who say they are exploring several funding options.

Reps. Glen Brown, R-Coalville, and Beverly Evans, R-Altamont, and Sen. Alarik Myrta, R-Altamont, promised a crowd of more than 300 meeting here that they would draft legislation for the upcoming Legislature to keep the 90-year-old tourist attraction running in Utah.

One option the legislators said they would study involves state purchase of Heber Creeper and its lines, with the state then leasing the rail road. The price tag for that proposal is estimated at \$1.9 million.

Another possibility is a legislative purchase of the system at state-appraised value, after which a private sector concessionaire would be sought to run the railroad.

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UVCC won't sell to BYU

OREM, Utah (AP) — A proposal to sell Utah Valley Community College's Provo campus to Brigham Young University has all but been abandoned by the junior college's administration.

Instead, UVCC officials have decided to lease space to other schools and are focusing attention on continuing education-related programs on the Provo property.

UVCC President Kerry Ramesburg discussed selling the campus to the Mormon Church-owned university with former BYU President Jeffrey Holland. After Rex Lee replaced Holland, UVCC officials broached the idea with BYU's new administration.

In early autumn, UVCC officials were hopeful BYU would buy the campus, but the university — following a serious review of the proposal — decided it would be too expensive and inefficient, said BYU spokesman Paul Richards.

At the time, UVCC thought it had other potential buyers, but most of them did not know the extent of needed refurbishing of the campus, or that UVCC would need to gradually phase out its use of the building, officials said.

Dick Van Zomerem, UVCC assistant vice president of administrative services, said estimates of refurbishing the building run between \$2 million and \$3 million.

Snowfall contributes to accident increase

TWIN FALLS - After an afternoon snowfall, almost a dozen vehicle accidents, including one that sent someone to the hospital, kept Magic Valley law enforcement officials on their toes Thursday.

Details of an accident in Jerome County that sent at least one person to the hospital were not available at 8:30 p.m.

An Elmore County dispatcher said six accidents or rollovers, none with serious injuries, occurred on Interstate 84 between 7 and 7:30 p.m.

An Idaho State Police dispatcher reported four accidents or slide-offs on the Interstate in Gooding and Jerome counties between 6 and 7:30 p.m. None of them caused serious injuries, she said.

Snow levels looking bleak throughout southern Idaho

TWIN FALLS - Snow levels in southern Idaho look bleak so far this year.

Last January, snow in the mountains and hills surrounding the Magic Valley was at or above normal levels, soon to drop and water content.

This year most places measured by the Soil Conservation Service are less than half of what they ought to be.

Last year Magic Mountain had 42 inches, or 11.1 inches of water, by this time. But this year it was a meager 11 inches containing only 3.3 inches of water.

But it is still early in the winter and one or two good storms could turn the picture around.

Historically, however, Idaho has received about half the moisture it's going to get by the middle of January, according to the Soil Conservation Service.

As of Wednesday, water content in snowpack at southern Idaho monitoring stations included: Magic Mountain, 42 percent of normal; Deadline Ridge N., 36 percent; Deadline Ridge S., 49 percent; Langford Flat Creek, 0 percent; Bear Creek, 61 percent; Goat Creek, 70 percent; Pole Creek Ranger Station, 88 percent.

PUC reschedules hearing on Pocatello bus service

POCATELLO - The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has rescheduled a public hearing on a request from Greyhound Lines Inc. to drop bus service on Interstate 86 between Pocatello and the freeway interchange east of Burley.

The hearing will be Feb. 6, with two meetings, one at 1 p.m. and another at 7 p.m., both at the Quality Inn. The hearing had been scheduled for Tuesday.

No advance sign-up is required to testify. The city of Pocatello has become a formal party to the case, allowing the city to cross-examine witnesses, argue motions and participate in any settlements. PUC spokesman Gary Richardson said.

If the request is granted, bus passengers traveling along the interstate system through southern Idaho would have to be routed down through Ogden, Utah.

Officials in Pocatello and the Minnicassia area have said they oppose the idea. Greyhound officials say they want to drop the route because it has not been profitable.

Area United Way reveals its slate of 1990 officers

Proposed new board members are Gene Hoskins of Universal Frozen Foods, Tammy Gooding of KEGZ radio, and Dave Wood of First Security Bank.

Blackfoot man dies in 1-86 one-vehicle truck accident

RAFT RIVER - A Blackfoot man has been killed in a one-vehicle accident on Interstate 86 near Raft River.

Authorities identified the victim of the midnight Wednesday accident as Daniel Green, 40.

They said Green was eastbound on the interstate when his pickup truck went out of control, rolled across the median and into the westbound lanes.

Jerome Council rehires works director

JEROME - The City Council rehired Public Works Director Lanny Sloan late Thursday two days after it fairly rebuffed him during the new administration's first meeting of the year.

The council returned from a 20-minute executive session and voted unanimously to give Sloan a two-year contract. They gave no explanation to members of the public who packed the meeting room in the wake of Tuesday's actions.

The council on Tuesday refused to approve Mayor Gerald Ostler's reappointments of Sloan and City Clerk Marilyn Bragg. Later in the meeting, the mayor refused to reappoint Police Chief Greg Will.

In rehiring Sloan, the council also hired

Dora Harris, a former employee, to work in the city clerk's office, but made no decision on a permanent replacement for Bragg or Will.

It is unclear whether Harris' appointment will help with the vacancy in the clerk's office. The town is unable to pay its bills without a city clerk, Ostler said.

"The city has come to a grinding halt," Ostler said earlier yesterday. "That can't continue very long."

Payments on several bills were to come due within 48 hours of the Tuesday meeting, Ostler said. Delays in payment mean penalties will be added to the amounts due.

The police and public works departments were apparently still operating Thursday, despite lacking permanent department heads. Ostler named Capt. Jay Gardner to temporarily run the police department.

Ostler has 10 days from Tuesday to make other appointments. If the council doesn't confirm those by majority vote, council members can nominate and vote on candidates themselves.

Some residents were calling the suspended appointments the "Tuesday Night Massacre."

Elected officials had few explanations for the incident, however.

Ostler shied away from specifics but said Will was not reappointed because, "I would have been hard-pressed to work with him because of instances that have come to the surface in the past," Ostler said.

He said Will had received repeated oral reprimands from Ostler - who previously served as councilman and police commissioner - and from former Mayor Ralph Peters. The reprimands concerned "inappropriate acts" rather than

administrative lapses; Ostler said, but said he doubted Will would talk about it.

"I've never heard him admit anything yet," Ostler said.

Will said he had no idea what Ostler was referring to. "First of all, I don't know what he's talking about," he said. "It's probably best not to comment."

Will said he had expected to be reappointed. "He hasn't said a word to me - not since the day he got elected," he said. "I was kind of shocked myself. I thought I was doing a pretty good job."

Asked whether the mayor withheld his name for appointment as a sort of revenge on the council for rejecting Bragg and Sloan, he said, "You could put two and two together."

Ostler denied any revenge motive. "I can swear to the fact there was no revenge," he said. See JEROME on Page B2.

County office in Buhl closed by leak

BUHL - The county assessor's satellite office in the basement of City Hall is closed until further notice while workers replace a heating pipe that flooded the floor.

A 25-foot length of pipe that returns heating water to the building's boiler sprung a leak Thursday morning at about 9:30, Fire Chief Mark Grimes said.

Grimes cited age as the cause of the

problem.

"The line's been here since the building had its first boiler," he said. "It's been leaking slowly for years."

Grimes was unable to assess the damage, but said the drivers' license offices may have suffered from the amount of water pouring in.

Those offices were closed early Thursday afternoon and will remain closed until further notice.

The building's boiler will have to be shut off for at least a day to repair the line, he said.

"Other city operations will be in full force," Grimes said, despite the lack of heat.

The old line will be abandoned and a replacement run above the floor.

The City Council has discussed Buhl's aging City Hall in recent months.

The city has commissioned tests on the building, all part of an effort to decide whether the structure should be repaired or replaced.

The building's stability is about 12 percent of what it should be, according to one series of recent tests.

State says area securities fraud case tops for '89

TWIN FALLS - For the second straight year, Idaho Department of Finance has named a local case as the year's top case of securities fraud.

There are some reasons for that: the department's Wayne Klein said.

Many of the schemes the department has filed lawsuits over are "directed at the rural areas, farmers - small town kind of people," said Klein, chief of the department's Securities Bureau. "They know each other, they're friendly, they're open and they're proud of that."

"They ought to be, but it makes them a little too trusting."

That trust, combined with religious pitches to a population of church-goers, makes the Magic Valley a prime fleecing ground, Klein said.

"Nobody suggests people in the Magic Valley are foolish investors or are unwise. It's just that other people are exploiting them," Klein said.

The department's Securities Bureau

picked an ongoing Blaine County lawsuit as its top action of 1989. The lawsuit alleges that Lawrence W. McGary, a Ketchum-based mining promoter, sold unregistered limited partnerships in Idaho mines.

McGary has denied any wrongdoing in the pending lawsuit, which was filed in May. The department alleges that investors in Idaho, Texas and Florida invested \$4 million in McGary's companies, Shama Resources Limited Partnership and Marantha Management Corp.

In 1988, the department named a Carey-based scheme as its top case. Four Carey residents were sued for selling worthless "right drafts" drawn on a non-existent Mexican bank to pay off loans. Fifth District Judge Daniel Mechl ruled the scheme illegal.

Yet another top-five lawsuit was over a multi-level, coin-selling program involving about 250 Magic Valley residents. In that case, the Department of Finance and the attorney general's office obtained a preliminary injunction against Santa Rose

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Court finds cattle sale was improper

BOISE (AP) - A livestock auction yard had no right to sell off cows for one family because the woman they purchased the cattle from did not waive her security interest, the Idaho Court of Appeals has ruled.

The appellate court on Thursday remanded Linda Newgens's suit against OK Livestock Exchange in Caldwell back to 3rd District Court, which had granted a summary judgment to the livestock yard.

In 1983, Linda Newgens and her former husband sold a herd of dairy cows to Lewis and Dolly Nunes.

The sales agreement allowed the Nunes to sell any remaining cows, although they had to replace the cows with productive animals within five days.

The "loan and security agreement" the Nunes executed stated they would not sell or offer to sell the stock without the Newgens's permission.

In 1984, the Nunes sold the entire herd of stock without the approval of Linda Newgens, who bought her husband's interest.

All the cows sold by OK were purchased for slaughter and not for resale, the court found.

Newgens brought suit against the company for what she termed illegal conversion of productive cows.

Even if, as OK Livestock contends and as the district court found, written consent was given to sell nonproductive cows, that consent cannot be construed to authorize sales of productive dairy cows, the court said.

BOISE (AP) - The Idaho Cattle Association is condemning President Bush's new Richard Sweigart bill, for supporting Nevada wilderness bill, ranchers fear will create federal water rights in the West.

Brickett called Bush's signing of the Senate bill "extremely disappointing" despite his campaign promises to protect state water policy.

Department of Agriculture's Robert Brickett, ICA president, said the bill "will take away the water rights of ranchers."

Hanford walk area contamination found

PASCO, Wash. (AP) — Radioactive contamination has been found in an area where Hanford nuclear reservation employees may have walked during their lunch break, a Department of Energy official said.

The 47 radioactive surface spots — ranging from "very tiny" to about four square feet — were found during a project to identify contaminated sites, the Energy Department's Roger Freeburg said.

Freeburg, branch chief of the Energy Department's environmental restoration division, said the surface spots found just north of the reservation's 300-Area raise concerns about a possible health hazard to humans, although radioactivity levels are not believed to be dangerous.

The 300-Area is in the southeastern corner of the 560-square-mile reservation, near the northern city limits of Richland. It is where laboratories and offices are located.

Paul T. Day, project manager of the Hanford Environmental Protection Agency office, said more such contaminated spots are likely to be found as cleanup efforts continue.

The Energy Department, EPA and the state Department of Ecology last May signed an agreement calling for radioactive and hazardous wastes at Hanford to be cleaned up over the next 30 years.

Hanford officials are required to hold meetings every three months to update the public on the cleanup. At Wednesday night's meeting, they said the program is on schedule.

Another meeting was scheduled tonight in Vancouver. Nuclear wastes have been accumulating at Hanford, the most contaminated of all Energy Department facilities, since the World War II Manhattan Project that developed the atomic bomb.

Milestones established by the Tri-Party Agreement have been met, said Ken Morgan, an Energy Department spokesman.

Morgan said 29 wells to monitor underground water migration were drilled last year at a cost of about \$125,000 each. Another 30 wells will be drilled this year.

Samples of the radioactive wastes still stored in the single-shell tanks at Hanford were taken and will be analyzed to determine how to dispose of the nuclear waste inside.

Morgan said there are 149 single-shell tanks at Hanford and some of them have leaked their contents into the surrounding soil.

In February, a large-scale demonstration will be conducted of a process, called vitrification, that turns waste into a glass-like form, Morgan said. Mobile vitrification equipment will be used on mixed hazardous wastes.



Dinosaur find adds to evolution theory

DENVER (AP) — The discovery of the fossilized bones of a giant meat-eating dinosaur predating the fearsome tyrannosaurus rex strengthens the theory that dinosaurs evolved rapidly before becoming extinct, a scientist said Thursday.

The bones of an Epanterias were found at the top of the Morrison Formation deposit, an ancient-saline-lakebed near Fort Collins, by a paleontology team from the University of Colorado Museum in Boulder.

The discovery a year and a half ago was only the third of an Epanterias, according to Robert Bakker, a research associate at the museum, who announced the find Wednesday.

Bakker identified the giant member of the allosaur family from a jawbone and parts of the neck and tail vertebrae.

Bakker said the discovery strengthens the theory that dinosaurs extant in the Morrison Formation, which dates to 130 million years ago, and elsewhere in North America

evolved rapidly. "On average, the rule is that big animals tend to get bigger until they go extinct. The incredible size of Epanterias indicates there was some sort of an evolutionary arms-race going on," Bakker said in a telephone interview from Boulder.

The Epanterias, which weighed about four tons and was 50 feet long, could have eaten about 40 tons of meat annually, and its ability to expand its enormous jaws — much like modern-day snakes — would have allowed Epanterias to gulp huge bites of prey easily.

The Morrison Formation, about 50 miles north of Denver, contains up to six distinct dinosaurian fauna from successive time periods, Bakker said.

The other two discoveries of Epanterias fossils were in 1877 near Canon City, 80 miles south of Denver, and in 1934 in the Oklahoma panhandle.

Epanterias apparently was the last and largest species in the line of allosaurs, carnivorous dinosaurs that walked on their hind legs, Bakker said.

DNAP, based in Cinnaminson, N.J., is engaged in a joint project with E.I. DuPont Co. to grow, process and market canola.

Canola is a strain of rapeseed offering an edible oil that is lowest in polyunsaturates among vegetable oils. Health-conscious consumers are driving food processors to use such oils to minimize blood-cholesterol buildup.

DNAP has established a headquarters in Idaho Falls. The company eventually plans to build a crushing plant in that city to extract oil from canola seed. This year, the company will subcontract crushing to another processor, Van Dam said.

Although farm contract terms are not yet complete, Van Dam said growers will probably be getting 11 1/2 to 12 cents per pound. Plus, the company will arrange to pick up the harvested crop at each contractor's farm.

Under irrigation, growers can reasonably expect yields of 2,000 pounds or better per acre, he said. An experimental plot in Kimberly yielded 2,300 pounds per acre last year, he said.

"If we can't grow 2,000 on irrigated land, we'll be in trouble because we're not going to be able to compete with other crops," he said.

The contracts will include a guaranteed per-acre payment. A seed payment of perhaps 5 or 6 cents per pound will come on top of that. There also will be quality incentives, with higher prices paid for crops testing with greater oil percentages.

Canola is a complex crop. Most of Idaho is zoned for production of industrial rapeseed, a strain producing an inedible oil with high levels of erucic acid. Pollen from either strain can upset acid levels in a nearby crop of the other strain and thereby ruin both crops.

Farmers wishing to grow canola face several challenges: In the Magic Valley, farmers

must consult personally with neighboring growers to determine whether others will be growing industrial rapeseed. The Idaho Department of Agriculture will not allow plantings of canola within one-half mile of rapeseed, according to Dr. Roger Vega, administrator of plant industries.

"We're probably going to come in there on tiptoes to make sure we don't upset anyone," Van Dam said.

No canola may be planted in the southwest portion of Idaho, where potato could contaminate seed-production fields of other cabbage-family plants.

Canola has a tiny seed. The seed bed must be firm. Planting depths should be no greater than three-quarters of an inch. Seedling emergence declines at a depth of 1 1/2 inches.

A cool-season crop, canola must be planted early in spring, no later than the first week in May, but preferably in the first week of April. High mid-summer temperatures can cause flowers to fail to produce seeds.

At harvest, the crop is swathed and stacked in windrows. Combine-harvesting is difficult because the crop is rarely uniform throughout a field and dried seeds may shatter. Stacking allows the crop to dry and become more uniform before threshing.

Fertilizer requirements are about 10 to 20 percent higher in canola than for barley, Van Dam said. Most critical are nitrogen and sulfur.

Van Dam said the company will offer plenty of support, though. "It's really important that whoever contracts with us this year has a good year," he said.

DNAP and DuPont expect eventually to have a "vertically integrated" operation in place for marketing canola from Montana, Idaho and Washington. The companies will sell certified seed, contract with growers, pick up the crop, process it, and market it to food processor, Van Dam said.

Swerving van led to huge cocaine bust

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Law officers pulled over Fernando Antonio Largo-Montenegro's Volkswagen van last October because, since it was top-heavy with 220 pounds of cocaine, it kept drifting across Interstate 70's center line, a federal prosecutor says.

U.S. Attorney Dec. Benson told jurors that the illegal drug, with an estimated street value of \$30 million, was discovered after Emery County Sheriff's Deputy Richard Graham pulled the swerving vehicle over on Oct. 2, 1989, 33 miles east of Green River.

However, Largo-Montenegro's attorney, James Esparza, contended that Largo-Montenegro is innocent of cocaine possession and intent to distribute illegal drugs charges. He said his client was tricked into

driving a drug-laden vehicle across-country. Benson said Largo-Montenegro was driving 50 mph when Graham pulled back onto I-70 after stopping a car for speeding. Graham followed a while and saw the van veer several times into the opposite lane of traffic on the freeway, which at that point had only two lanes, and then drifted onto the emergency strip on its own side.

Wondering if the driver was under the influence of an intoxicant, or perhaps too tired, Graham stopped him. Largo-Montenegro produced a driver's license with his fake name and an address in West Hollywood, Calif., Benson said Wednesday.

He said the van was registered to another man who lived in New Jersey, but Largo-Montenegro had

the title, and said the car had been sold to him. The deputy said Largo-Montenegro appeared nervous and that his hands shook. Graham asked routine questions about alcohol and other matters, and Largo-Montenegro kept strong eye contact when answering, but when Graham asked him if he had any drugs, he dropped his eyes and answered no.

Suspicious, Graham asked if he could search the van, and Largo-Montenegro gave him permission. The deputy noticed that the top vent did not connect with the inside of the vehicle, and he opened it, Benson said.

Stuffed in the vent was a blue vinyl bag, and as Graham felt it, he detected square packages, "in the way cocaine is usually wrapped,"

Benson said. In Castle Dale, armed with a search warrant, officers removed the cocaine from the vent. The record for a Utah drug bust is 100 kilograms.

Esparza said Largo-Montenegro, 29, is an illegal alien from Mexico, a plumber living in North Hollywood. The fake name was used because he is in the country illegally, he said.

In September 1989, Largo-Montenegro talked with some friends about buying a van for his plumbing business. Somebody told him about one that might be available. He then negotiated with "Richard" by telephone, and the deal was that if Largo-Montenegro would drive the van across the country to New Jersey, he could have it, Esparza said.

Police find 3 more bodies near Ohio barn after tip

KIRTLAND, Ohio (AP) — Investigators unearthed three bodies Thursday near a barn on property once occupied by a religious group, bringing to four the number of bodies discovered at the site in two days.

Kirtland Fire Chief Richard Martinic said the discovery of the bodies resulted from a tip from an

anonymous informant. None of the victims was identified Thursday afternoon. He said the ages and sexes of those found Thursday could not be immediately determined.

"We can't tell what they are yet. They were down about four feet. They had rocks on top of them, and they were back-filled with clay,"

said Martinic. Lake County Coroner William C. Downing said the informant had told police that the bodies of the man's wife and three children could also be found there.

On Wednesday, authorities found the man's body on property owned by a former lay minister of the Mormon church, said Date

Luffman, president of the local congregation of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints.

Luffman said Jeffrey Lundgren, who was rejected by The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, left the Mormon church to form what was known locally as "the Lundgren cult."

laws. The case involved 128 alleged victims and \$2 million. L.F. Thompson & Co. — The unlicensed San Diego brokerage firm sold worthless and unregistered penny stocks to some 100 customers for \$150,000.

Wind River Mining — The state obtained judgments against nine


defendants in this California mining scheme. They had sold dirt from a Washington mine that was milled in Idaho, claiming it contained a substantial amount of gold. It reportedly held only an insignificant level. The case is continuing against others. Seven victims lost \$50,000 to Wind River.

NCAA sparks protest with award

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — The selection of former President Ronald Reagan for the NCAA's highest honor has spurred several female delegates to organize a protest at next week's convention in Dallas.

University of Texas women's athletic director Donna Lopiano says she and others will be at the convention because Reagan set back the women's athletic movement during his eight years in the White House.

"As far as opportunities for women, as far as minority opportunities during Reagan's administration, they weren't very good. In fact, they were awful," Lopiano told the Austin American-Statesman.

"There will be a very low-key protest, but a very well warranted one," she said.

The National Collegiate Athletic Association will meet in Dallas Sunday through Tuesday to discuss new legislation and to honor Reagan with the Teddy Award, named for former President Theodore Roosevelt. The award, presented since 1967, is given to a "distinguished citizen of national reputation and outstanding accomplishment," according to NCAA spokesman Jim Marchiony.

Motta to take the reins in Sacramento

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Dick Motta, who has coached three other NBA teams, was named today to coach the Sacramento Kings.

The Kings, whose 7-20 record is the third worst in the league, said Motta will take over from coach Jerry Reynolds after tonight's game against Denver.

'93 All-Star Game slated for Baltimore

NEW YORK (AP) — Major league baseball awarded its 1993 All-Star Game to Baltimore Thursday, where it is expected to be played in Camden Yards, the city's projected new baseball stadium.

The facility is scheduled to be completed in time for the 1992 season. It will be the second All-Star game for the city, which hosted the American league's 4-3 victory in 1958.

Next summer's game will be played in Chicago at the Wrigley Field, followed by the Toronto SkyDome in 1991 and San Diego's Jack Murphy Stadium in 1992.

Johnson awaiting word from report

NEW YORK (AP) — The attorney for suspended Canadian sprinter Ben Johnson said Thursday he has not been contacted about a possible match race against Carl Lewis in September.

Lewis' business agent, Joe Douglas, has been quoted as saying that he had discussed the possibility of a multimillion dollar match race with at least six groups if Johnson regains his eligibility when his two-year suspension expires Sept. 24.

"We have had no involvement in any discussions," attorney Ed Futerman said by telephone from Canada.

"Our only priority at this time is to await the outcome of the Dublin report and see if Ben is reinstated as an amateur athlete in Canada."

The report, following months of inquiries into amateur athletics in Canada headed by Charles Dublin, is expected in a couple of months, Futerman said.

Most coaches opposed to late playoff

NEW YORK (AP) — Division I-A football coaches generally are opposed to a post-season playoff, a survey by the American Football Coaches Association shows.

The survey of NCAA head football coaches show 72 percent against a playoff after the bowl games. Sixty percent opposed a playoff plan that incorporated the bowl games.

Sixty-seven I-A coaches responded to the survey. Of those, 28 were opposed to a playoff in any form, responding negatively to 28 play-off questions. Ten head coaches were in favor of a playoff in any form, responding "yes" to both playoff questions.

The survey also showed head coaches at levels strongly endorse freshman competing in varsity sports. Eighty percent of Division I-A coaches responding favored freshman eligibility, while it was favored by 18 percent of Division I-AA, II and III coaches.

CLEVELAND (AP) — It's been an eye-opening year for Bernie Kosar, who learned the hard way that even the most devoted fans can lose their patience.

Kosar, 26, has taken the Browns to the playoffs in each of his five years in the NFL. Even so, he was being booed heartily by his hometown fans late in the season when Cleveland's offense went through the worst four-game slump in franchise history.

"I block out the fans during a game, whether you're home or away, because you can't get too caught up in that kind of situation," Kosar said this week as the Browns prepared to play host to the Buffalo Bills in a playoff game Saturday.

"You've got enough to concentrate on when you're on the field."

But it's no secret that Kosar was deeply disappointed when fans who had made him a local folk hero began chanting for backup quarterback Mike Pagnel during the second half of the season.

A local television station polled its viewers and found that Kosar was favored over Pagnel by only a 51-percent to 49 percent margin. For a couple of weeks, Coach Bud Carson joined the doubters and said it was possible he might turn to Pagnel.

Kosar, in fact, was benched for the fourth quarter of Cleveland's 21-0 loss to Cincinnati on Dec. 3, the first time the Browns had been shut out in the Kosar era.

Through it all, it was clear Kosar wasn't throwing criss, and gradually it became known that he had bruised his elbow when he hit the turf in a Nov. 12 victory at Seattle. The injury was followed by 20 quarters without a touchdown pass.

"I think for a while there he was hurting more than he would let anybody believe," owner Art Modell said. "I think he's a great quarterback, a born leader, and given the right supporting cast, he can continue to win for this team for years to come. I have not lessened my appraisal of Bernie Kosar one bit."

Pagnel pretty much kept out of the controversy while Cleveland was scoring 37 points over four games — a tie and three losses — and though there was reportedly some private grumbling in the locker room, the situation never escalated the way the bickering among Buffalo's offensive players did this year.

"We still stuck behind 'BK' because we've all been in slumps ourselves. We've all been banged up before," receiver Reggie Langhorne said. "We knew he was giving all he had to give."

Kosar's elbow continues to bother him, and he rested it all of last week after the Browns clinched the AFC Central Division title with a 24-20 win at Houston. He resumed throwing this week when the team traveled to Dallas for two days of workouts in warm weather.

The injury is not related to the sprained elbow that forced Kosar to miss most of the first half of last season. And in spite of his slump, he still managed to complete 59.1 percent of his passes for 3,533 yards in 1989.

His quarterback rating of 80.3 placed him fourth in the AFC, right behind Buffalo's Jim Kelly at 86.2.

"The elbow's been about the same the last couple weeks," Kosar said. "I think the main thing is, I'm more accustomed now to the way it's feeling. It won't be completely healed until the offseason. But I'm accustomed to it, and the week off did help."

Denver faces the 'no respect' syndrome

DENVER (AP) — They're playing a familiar tune in Denver this week: the old we-don't-get-any-respect number.

This time, part of the fallout is due to the relatively weak play of all AFC teams, none of which is held in the same regard as the San Francisco 49ers or New York Giants of the NFC.

Given the fact that the AFC has won the last five Super Bowls, the AFC's sad-sack reputation is perhaps deserved.

Denver, which entertains the Pittsburgh Steelers in playoff action Sunday, is a major contributor to that state of affairs.

Denver lost by sizable margins in two of those five Super Bowls. Despite finishing this season with the best record in the AFC in 11-5, the Broncos failed to beat the two best teams in the AFC East — the Giants and Philadelphia Eagles.

The Broncos placed only four players on the Pro Bowl team — the same number as the 5-11 Phoenix Cardinals.

"Over the last five years, we've won as many games as anyone," Broncos linebacker Karl Mecklenburg said. "I don't know what it takes to get more recognition, more respect. Winning the Super Bowl, I guess."

"There's no question we feel we have something to prove," quarterback John Elway said. "We know what it feels like to get to the Super Bowl and finish second. You don't get any respect after that."

Defensive end Ron Holmes, acquired by the Broncos from Tampa Bay early this season, said he has heard demeaning comments about the AFC for years.

"People used to say the AFC is all finesse," Holmes said. "Well, I can show you a season's worth of bruises. Football is football."

The Broncos will have to wait at least until Jan. 28 to redeem themselves. In the meantime, they have the AFC's hottest team to contend with.

Pittsburgh knows something about no respect. After losing to Cleveland 51-0 and to Cincinnati 41-10 in the first two games of the season, the Steelers were the laughingstock of the NFL.

But they rebounded from that disastrous start — and from a 34-7 loss to Denver midway through the season — to win five of their last six games and eke out a playoff berth in a wild-card game last week. Pittsburgh outlasted Houston 26-23 in overtime.

CARLSBAD, Calif. (AP) — Bobby Nichols and Bruce Crampton battled back from early problems Thursday to gain a share of the first-round lead in the Seniors' competition of golf's Double Orange of Champions.

Crampton had a double bogey on the first hole and Nichols had to overcome a string of three consecutive bogeys to post rounds of 71, one under par.

Crampton and Nichols, among the longest hitters on the Seniors Tour, each scored five birdies on a course much longer than they normally encounter.

"It was a little bit longer, the guys are a fully-tough and long," Nichols said of the La Costa Country Club layout.

The 20 winners of 1989 Seniors Tour events are playing the same tees as those used by the 33 regular tour winners who are competing in a separate but simultaneous event. The 7,021-yard length, made more severe by recent rain, compares with the courses of 6,400-6,500 yards usually played by the over-50 set.


Defending Seniors champion Miller Barber and Butch Baird shared second at 72, the listed par. Chi Chi Rodrigue, George Archer, Gene Litterer and Don Bies were next at 73.

Charles Coody had a share of the top spot until he made a triple-bogey 7 on the final hole.

Bob Charles of New Zealand, winner of five tournaments and the Seniors Player of the Year title in 1989, is not competing.

Declining issues outnumbered advancing by about 7 to 5 in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 645 up, 924 down and 418 unchanged.
Volume on the floor of the Big Board came to 177 million shares,

against 192.33 million in the previous session. Nationwide, consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 239.28 million shares.
Analysts said the market appeared to be suffering, a bit paradoxically, from signs that the economy was maintaining stronger-than-expected momentum as the new year began.
That dampened hopes for any further easing on the Federal Reserve's credit policy, and raised new questions about the outlook for interest rates.

It often takes "new" blood to pump life into a stale situation, to see an old problem with a fresh outlook and attack it with vigor. Christine Golden and Tim Fry, newly transplanted Magic Valley residents, are doing just that, and singles in this area aged 18 to 80 are about to reap the benefits. The two are working independently, but both have come up with unique business ventures geared for the special needs of singles. Fry's singles' library, First Impressions, opens its doors today, and the first issue of Golden's magazine, "People to People," will be available at no cost in area stores by the end of next week.

Golden, who came to Kimberly via Arizona and Fry, who now lives in Elmer, are both singles themselves and realized that what this area really needed was a network to get people who are alone together with others who share their interests.

Singles interested in joining Fry's library may come to First Impressions, located at 141 Shoshone St. N., Suite 201A (above Aroma Restaurant) — with a recent picture of themselves beginning today. They then fill out a questionnaire and are assigned a library number. No names or phone numbers are available to anyone but the librarian. A \$30 fee is required for a three-month membership, which enables patrons unlimited access to the nameless photos and questionnaires of the other participants.

Fry is soft-spoken but very adamant that this is not a dating service; it's simply a place where people can make a first impression without having to be present — a place where they may state freely what they enjoy about life and what they don't and have the security of anonymity and the knowledge that only those truly interested will view their call.

"Most singles aren't really looking for romance," says Fry, himself having suffered a painful divorce. "They're looking for a friend, someone to play tennis with, talk on the phone, with or go to a show with."

He adds that the bar scene really offers little for singles in the way of true relationships, and older singles who have been hurt by a relationship or have lost a spouse need a place that avenue for meeting new friends. He hopes the simple-format of his questionnaire will weed out the jokesters and offer area singles the opportunity to meet some really great people.

Patrons of the library must be between 18 and 80 years old and ready to tell about their hobbies, their interests, their basic

personality type, qualities they feel make them special and unique and what things they look for in a member of the opposite sex on a first face-to-face meeting — how they come to their first impression of others.

First Impressions' hours will be, from 12:30 to 8 p.m. on weekdays and from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturdays. The phone number is 733-0536 and Fry is offering a \$10 discount to the first 100 singles who sign-up and \$5 off if two or more sign up together after the first 100. He only hopes the singles of the Magic Valley are as ready for his library as he is.

Golden is crossing her fingers, too. She's worked hard and is finally ready to get bids for the printing of "People to People's" first edition. She's picked the brain of Barbara Homan of The East County Chronicle in Kimberly for tips, studied other state singles' publications, advertised for participants for the magazine's personal profiles, written articles and found distribution points.

Golden knows what it's like to be single. "It's almost like being unemployed," she

says. "The longer you've been that way, the less an employer wants to hire you. You start feeling like you're not worthy of a job (relationship). And that's just a crock!"

Her magazine will be free, but putting a personal file in the monthly publication will require a fee — \$20 for one month, \$35 for two, \$55 for four and \$75 for six. So far, Golden has profited from as far away as Alaska, California and Arizona. She wants the magazine to be local but also far-reaching. Singles from this area may want to see a new state through the eyes of a new friend, and singles from out of town may decide the Magic Valley has a lot to offer.

"Like Fry's library, Golden's magazine offers anonymity. Here, too, the publisher becomes the go-between. Interested participants may call the office at 423-6352 and set up a time to answer questions about themselves and their likes and dislikes. Larson, 'The Far Side' back in action

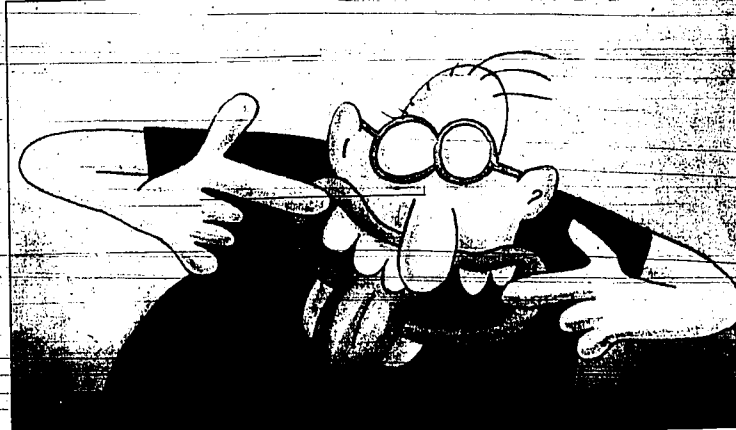
SEATTLE — A particular look appears on the face of Gary Larson as he takes another bite of his steak in an intimate Seattle restaurant.

The expression, something akin to a baby catching sight of its first soap bubble materializes as the creator of "The Far Side" begins a tale about a type of catfish found in the Amazon, one of the spots he and his wife visited during his recent sabbatical.

The 39-year-old cartoonist explains that this spiny-finned specimen swims into the privates of animals to plant its eggs. He stops to mull; looking like his own drawing of Einstein before a blackboard filled with formulas proving that time actually is money.

"Ah, yes, Nature. 'Ha,' he says with a satisfied smile. "And they say it's a God." Of course, there's a God. It is the same omnipotent being who pulled a shimmering Earth out of a cosmic oven in a Larson drawing while musing, "Something tells me this thing's only half-baked." And it is the same one who returned to his heaven New Year's Day, with one appearance — the finest Gary Larson cartoon after a 14-month hiatus.

Refrigerator doors will be populated by fresh absurdities — cows that stand on hind legs, lions that attack tourists' car doors with coat hangers and dinosaur seminars ("The picture's pretty bleak, gentlemen... The world's chances are slim, but the dinosaurs are taking over and we all stop to train about the size of a walnut"). Once again, morning rituals in offices across the nation will be disrupted with bursts of laughter and the refrain: "Have you seen 'The Far Side' today?" Larson's lifestyle only hints at the bizarre brilliance that has led to his cartoon's syndication in more than 900 news-

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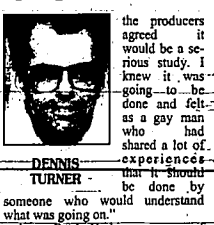
'Hudson' screenwriter's life has many parallels with Hudson's

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Screenwriter Dennis Turner at first turned down an offer to write the screen biography of Rock Hudson because he had also led a double life.

"I said no a few times, but they kept coming back," Turner said. "I'd given up. I said no because I didn't know how seriously they wanted to treat his homosexuality. I didn't want to do a travesty of his life, nor did I want to do an exploitation story because it was too close to my own life."

"I didn't want it to be like the 'Liberace' movies where they didn't adequately acknowledge his homosexuality. If you're going to do a Rock Hudson movie it didn't make sense to me not to go into all the corners."

"I was persuaded when ABC and

the producers agreed it would be a serious study. I knew it was going to be done by someone who would understand what was going on."

Actor Rock Hudson was one of Hollywood's most handsome and virile screen-lovers whose secret life as a homosexual became public knowledge when he became stricken with AIDS. His death in October 1985 helped create an awareness of the disease.

The two-hour "Rock Hudson" will be telecast on ABC Monday. It stars Thomas Ian Griffith as Hudson; Daphne Ashbrook as Phyllis Gates, his former wife who did not recover; Mary Christian, his companion, who later successfully sued the estate; and Diane Ladd as his mother.

Andrew Robinson, who played Librarian in one film version, is Henry Wittson, the agent who changed Roy Fitzgerald's name to Rock Hudson.

NBC also has a Rock Hudson project in the works, based on "Rock Hudson: His Story," which Sara Davidson wrote in cooperation with Hudson and his estate. The movie is currently in development with unannounced plans for production.

Turner said he felt his own background would help him bring an understanding to the story. "I had been married and had children," he said. "I'm a recovering alcoholic and I was an alcoholic who did not recover."

"We're both products of the 1950s, although he was older, and we both suffered in that secretive environment."

"You felt you were the only person on the planet who was gay," the thought-of-being excluded, said Turner. "I think he and Phyllis were eating away at him and they ultimately killed him. He would not reveal his personal life, even to his closest friends. I think the fact that he couldn't be truthful contributed to his drinking. The alcohol in turn contributed to his promiscuity. He was incapable of having a long-term relationship with anybody. I don't

think he was living the kind of life he wanted. It destroyed him."

Turner said he interviewed Phyllis Gates, Marc Christian, and others who knew Hudson. The screenplay is also partially based on Gates' book, "My Husband Rock Hudson."

"The story takes him from 21 to 58," he said. "It begins in 1948 when he got his first job in a movie. He had one line in 'Fighter Squadron,' which starred Edmond O'Brien and Robert Stack."

"His homosexuality had already manifested itself by then," said Turner. "I think he and Phyllis loved each other. They had a romantic relationship before they married. Rock wanted to be straight, he wanted to

have a family. He gave it his best shot."

"I want this movie to show the complexities of a man who happened to be gay and a human being. I'm tired of the media, and I guess the everyday population, treating gays or any minority as a stereotype, a joke or a walking disease. I wanted to show that keeping secrets, not being able to be honest, not choosing not to be honest, is destructive to everyone."

A former New York playwright, Turner previously has written such film projects as "Poor Little Rich Girl," "The Long Hot Summer," and "Between the Dunes and the Dawn." He's also a former staff writer for "Dynasty," where he met Hudson when he was on the show in the 1984-85 season.

Artist, 81, is finally finishing WPA mural

MUSKOGEE, Mich. (AP) — In a musty basement storage room of the Muskogee County Museum, surrounded by mannequin parts and antique canoes in disrepair, Wilfrid Berg is picking up where he left off 55 years ago.

The 81-year-old artist is finally getting the chance to paint the second of two murals commissioned from him in 1934 by the Works Progress Administration for the children's reading room at the city library.

"I had the sketches done. I was all ready to do it back then, and then the money ran out," said Berg, a slight man with white hair and sparkling blue eyes.

The WPA, a New Deal program of Franklin D. Roosevelt to help economic recovery from the Depression, notified the Lake Michigan city it was eligible for mural funds. At the time, artists were being put to work on murals in public buildings nationwide.

Berg, then 26, was contacted, and "the next morning I was looking for

a spot," he recalled.

The children's reading room of the Heckley Public Library was chosen.

The WPA commissioned two murals for opposite walls of the room. Above old bookshelves, Berg finished one, now mounted on the west wall. Called "The World at Your Door," it features people of different nations in native dress.

He recalls being paid either \$100 or \$200 for that project before funds ran out. He worked five more weeks on his own time to complete it.

The second mural — featuring characters from classic children's literature — was canceled.

"I put the sketches away and forgot about it. But really, it's something I always wanted to do," Berg says as he glances at his sketches of intermingling characters such as Pinocchio, Robinson Crusoe, Peter Rabbit, Cinderella and Huck Finn.

Library officials had been trying to find the sketches for the 29-foot mural for two or three years before they surfaced at the adjacent

Muskogee Museum of Art a couple of years ago, said Dale Pretzer, the library's director.

"It was like looking for a lost manuscript that's a sequel to a great book," Pretzer said.

Once the sketches were found, there still was the challenge of finding funds for Berg to take up his task again.

Along came Muskogee residents Shirley and Daniel Rappoport, longtime supporters of the library; which is celebrating its centennial in 1990.

"My children loved that library so much as they were growing up," said Shirley Rappoport, a retired schoolteacher. "When we found out about the other mural and that the artist was still alive, I thought it would be such a lovely gift for the centennial celebration."

She won't say how much she is contributing for the work, calling it a modest amount.

Meanwhile, Berg, dressed in blue jeans and a denim shirt, is working in his makeshift studio seven hours a day, and is expecting to finish the

project in about four months.

"I don't move quite as fast as I used to," he said with a smile.

"He is keeping the mural's original colors, old lithographs, framing and support his love of creating art. Although he's been painting most of his life, recognition has come only in the last few years."

He recalls taking odd jobs — truck driving, house painting, framing — to support his love of creating art. Although he's been painting most of his life, recognition has come only in the last few years.

In 1988, the art museum featured his varied work — including watercolor drawings, articles, health cartoons — in a one-man show, "Wilfrid Berg: A Muskogee Treasure."

Few cartoonists have made such an impact in a single decade. A man whose 14 cartoon collections have sold 15 million copies here and abroad, he is a publishing gold mine. His creations are copied on T-shirts, cups, calendars and, for the first time this year, Christmas cards. Three of his publications are reported to be simultaneously on the New York Times Paperback Best Seller list — "The Pre-History of the Far Side" is there at present. He won the National Cartoonists Society's award for best syndicated panel of 1985 and 1988. A museum exhibit opened 14 cities ago by the California Academy of Sciences, featuring more than 400 of his cartoons, just completed its tour of the nation.

What other cartoonist can claim an insect named in his honor? In this case, Strigiphilus larsoni.

"Even he is sometimes shocked by the inhumanity of what his mind has spawned: 'I wanted it to be fun, but this whole thing has become such a little empire.'"

Burnout from nine years of a cartoon-a-day deadline finally drove Larson away from the drawing board, he says. His new obligations will be restricted to turning out five originals a week; papers will also publish "classics" (he blanches at the

term) reruns.

Although aware that others who have taken time off from their strip, such as "Doodlesby" Gary Trudeau, have returned changed artists, Larson says he doesn't know what the ramifications of his time off will be yet.

He may do fewer cows, he says. "But millions of people have been waiting for a new batch of cows for 14 months, he is reminded. The term millions is particularly odious to him. He wavers, then capitulates.

"Well, maybe I'll do more cows."

Unlike the social commentary of a Trudeau or Berke (married to the former's Bloom County), Larson's burnout deals in sheer, apolitical weirdness, one that both shocks and tickles with obtuse perspective. Who else would draw disappointed sharks suddenly finding out why swimmers have been fleeing? Why? One day, a fish is sinking out I wonder how many times that's screwed things up?"

His unique, sometimes macabre humor also has generated controversy. Many of the newspaper polls that place him among reader favorites list Larson, which is just the way the buffalo chips have fallen.

"I never sat down and said you know, what the world needs is a

good, sick cartoonist," he says. "This is just a kind of humor that was in my family when I grew up. My Mom and Dad and brother laugh at my work when they understand it. Or when I understand it. It wasn't until later that I was described in words like 'offbeat' and 'bizarre.'"

He still enjoys remembering a hearty letter from a woman who thought one of his drawings made her feel schizophrenic — like her son. But most criticism he cheerfully discounts. His first complaint came from a woman upset with a drawing of Santa Claus studying a cookbook titled "Nine Ways to Serve Venison."

"She was very offended and wanted to know how she was supposed to explain this to her 5-year-old. I thought, come on, lady. It's like, now this 2-year-old is going to grow up and take a shot at the president."

Anyway, he takes solace now knowing that none of it matters against the grandeur of environments such as Africa.

Al-yes, Nature.

"It's wonderful that there's still a place in the world where you can't step out of a vehicle without the risk of being eaten," he says. "I'm glad there's still a place like that. It puts things in perspective."

Paramount must release Murphy contract details

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Paramount Pictures must make public details of comedian Eddie Murphy's \$8 million-plus contract for acting in the 1988 hit film "Coming to America" as well as a dozen other confidential financial documents, a judge ruled Wednesday.

Without a month's 13 contracts, profit-participation statements and other financial data that the studio tried keeping under court seal in the trial of columnist Art Buchwald vs. Paramount will become public record, ruled Harvey Schneider, a Los Angeles Superior Court judge, following a hearing.

The Los Angeles Times, in a 22-page brief filed last week, formally challenged Paramount's attempt to keep 17 documents secret. Schneider ruled Wednesday that four of the most sensitive financial documents in the highly publicized case now pending in his court would remain under seal, at least for now.

Schneider dismissed Paramount's claims that disclosure of most of the contracts filed in connection with the breach-of-contract case would do any damage to Paramount's ability to compete with rival film studios. He cited Murphy's contract as an example. Schneider said that the contract might show the "nuts and bolts" of how the star of "Coming to America" accrued his earnings, but the actor's salary (\$8 million) plus his profit participation in the film's revenues taken in by the movie were both already disclosed during trial testimony.

The judge put Murphy's total take from the movie at between \$16 million and \$18 million, including TV licensing fees, foreign ticket sales and videocassette revenue. The fantasy about an African prince who comes to New York to find his princess has grossed more than \$300 million, according to Buchwald's attorneys.

Arguing on Paramount's behalf, attorney Robert Draper claimed that disclosing any of the documents would compromise the studio's "trade secrets" by giving rival studios a glimpse into how Paramount puts together a successful motion picture.

Buchwald and producer Alain Bernheim sued Paramount for \$5 million on grounds that the studio used the "murderer's" original story, titled "King for a Day," as the basis for "Coming to America" but refused to pay them in accordance with their contract. Their 1983 contract says that the studio was to pay them 19 percent of any net profits that resulted from a movie based on Buchwald's story.

Paramount dropped its contract with Buchwald in 1985. Murphy subsequently went on to claim sole story credit for conceiving the concept for "Coming to America."

Though the movie ranks among the 20 top-grossing movies of the 1980s, it has yet to earn a net profit, according to testimony in the two-week trial that concluded last week.

The four documents Schneider refused to unseal Wednesday included "confidential documents which disclose the structure of Paramount's negotiations on 'Coming to America,'" according to a declaration by Paramount's chief legal counsel, A. Robert Pisano.

"I've never had a baby before on a show," said Duffy. "In the next several weeks, she'll have two on 'Newhart' and in a CBS movie, 'The Love Boat: A Valentine Voyage,' on Feb. 11."

"I guess I'm pregnant," she said. The entire "Newhart" show is built around the birth. "When I go into labor, Michael tries to tape the birth with his video camera. I get mad and throw him out of the delivery room," she said.

Michael does everything in excess, Duffy explains. "He shows up with a 15-man news crew, a scrubbed down and wearing green surgical gowns."

Duffy declined to give any details about the child, saying, "If you want to know the sex of the baby, tune in." The baby, however, will be on view briefly in the next episode. The focus of the show goes back to Bob Newhart and those at the Stratford Inn in Norwich, Vt.

It'll be the second birth on a CBS comedy this year. Charlene Frazier stillfields played by Lucille Ball gave birth to a special one-hour episode of "Designing Women" this past Monday. On the show, she's married to Doug Barr, but in real life she's married to Richard Gilliland. They had a son, Connor Douglas, in October.

Combining pregnancies, real and fictional, is nothing new for television. On NBC's "Cheers," Caria (Rhea Perlman) has had three babies. Jane Carr of NBC's "Dear John" and Anne Scholten of ABC's "Ally" have had real babies on their shows to coincide with real births.

Duffy is married to actor-writer Jerry Lacy.

This is expected to be the final season for "Newhart" now in its seventh year. But it is one of the highest-rated shows on third-place CBS and might be invited back.

Duffy has a development deal with CBS for her own series next season. Should "Newhart" return, she can choose to continue to remain in her role and postpone her own show.

"I'm not tired of Stephanie, I don't mind doing it, but I don't want to try to squeeze every last drop," she said. "I'd like to leave the audience wanting more."

"I'm looking at a lot of ideas for a half-hour comedy show. I have my own ideas, but mostly about the kind of character I want to play. I want to play someone who grows up with Stephanie, but I was someone with an edge like she has."

She would also like to return to doing some drama. Her previous series, "Wizards and Warriors," in which she played a spoiled princess, was also a comedy. She has played dramatic roles in such movies as "Night Warning," "Cutler's Way" and "Battle Beyond the Stars," the miniseries "The Blue and the Gray" and various TV series and movies. She was on two soap operas, "Love of Life" and "The Doctors."

Duffy and her husband appear together in "The Love Boat: A Valentine Voyage."

"We play expectant parents," she said. "He's a chef on the ship, and I come along to be with him. Of course, we have the baby on the ship. I was seven months pregnant when we took the cruise to the Caribbean. The cruise was the excitement to do the role. I took my mom and daughter."

'Batman' helps bring record profits to theaters

LOS ANGELES (AP) — North America's movie-theaters reaped a record \$5 billion-plus at the box office in 1989, powered by the punch of Batman and other highly promoted action films.

Despite a lackluster Christmas holiday season, summertime moviegoers spun the turnstiles at such a dizzying pace that the box-office record of \$4.45 billion from 1988 was smashed, according to recently figures released.

The box-office total, based on industry estimates, was set by fewer films: 446 features made their debuts in 1989, down 13 percent from the previous year.

In the studio-by-studio race, Warner Bros. was No. 1 with an estimated 17.1 percent share of all U.S. and Canadian tickets sold.

The studio's "Batman" was the year's biggest blockbuster. Its \$25.12 million in ticket sales was fifth-highest in history.

Disney, which some analysts didn't expect to be competitive, finished fifth with a healthy 13.8 percent share.

Although part of the revenue surge is attributable to higher ticket prices, admissions are projected to be greater than last year.

In large part, the record year was propelled by expensive and savily marketed star vehicles such as "Batman," and "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade," which made \$196 million and "Lethal Weapon 2," which collected \$147 million, according to trade publications and private research firms.

Right behind, the lightly regarded "Honey, I Shrank the Kids" emerged as 1989's No. 4 film with receipts of \$130 million. It was followed by the 1988 holdover "Rain Man" \$127 million.

"I think 'Honey, I Shrank the Kids' was a terrific surprise for us," said David-Hoberman, president of Walt-Disney Pictures and its Touchstone pictures division. "I think there is a market for good, original films."

"I think 'Honey' and 'Dead Poets Society' were out there competing with a lot of sequels and enormous budget films and they competed pretty nicely in that marketplace."

The rest of the year's top 10 were "Ghostbusters II," \$112 million; "Look Who's Talking," \$109 mil-

lion; "Parenthood," \$95 million; Touchstone's "Dead Poets Society," \$84 million; and "When Harry Met Sally...," \$91 million.

Owing partly to cold weather and that Christmas fell on a Monday, this year's holiday season was off from a year ago. The scarce hit included "Back to the Future Part II" and "National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation."

The box-office figures only hint at the film industry's robust health. Home video and cable television receipts now account for about 57 percent of studio revenues, compared with about 30 percent earned at movie houses, according to Paul Kagan Associates.

Some analysts believe Hollywood's record year might mean studios will produce and release fodder.

"Most of these movies never should have been made," said A.D. Murphy, who follows box-office revenues for Daily Variety.

"Rain Man" released first in 1988, was widely praised by reviewers. And several critically acclaimed films, such as "Do the Right Thing," "The Fabulous Baker Boys" and "Heathers" — did modest business. Among independent films, the top performers were "sex, lies and videotape" with \$24 million and "Women on the Verge of a Nervous Breakdown" with more than \$7 million.

Hungarian film surprisingly successful in U.S. theaters

BOSTON (AP) — "A Hungarian Fairy Tale" has become a real-life moneymaker at specialty theaters since its first show in the United States in museums a little over a year ago.

An allegory about individuals struggling for identity in a bureaucratic world, the 1987 film by Gyula Gazdag was released commercially in this country late in 1988.

Now showing in Boston for an open-ended run, and is getting a marketing boost from the popular revivals in Eastern Europe that have dominated headlines in recent months.

With just three copies of the film shown in 26 weeks, it's worth of \$110,000 in ticket sales, said Morton Wax of the New York-based distributor, MD Wax Courier Films.

"It's a great film," said Bob Smith, film coordinator at the Boston Museum of Contemporary Art.

Anybody looking at it with the headlines in their mind will see how much this artist dealt with what was happening before it happened.

"This is a very subversive film in deed."

Gazdag's films have been suppressed in his native Hungary for a time. The very making of "A Hungarian Fairy Tale" was a measure of the new freedoms in Hungary.

Gazdag, who is teaching two semesters of filmmaking at the University of California, Los Angeles, said in a telephone interview that the reception gratified and surprised him.

"I didn't expect that American audiences can be sensitive for a small, black-and-white subtitled Hungarian movie. In fact, there is a tiny film like this in film."

As the 42-year-old director put it: "It's about looking for an identity, and that's what's going on in Eastern Europe right now."



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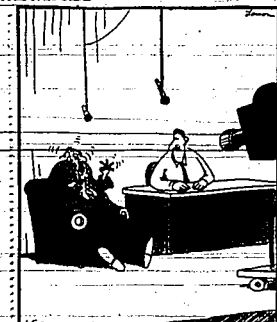
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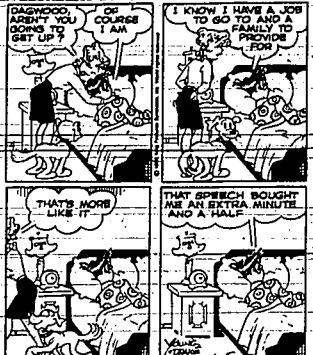
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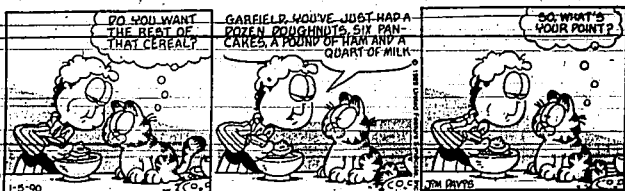
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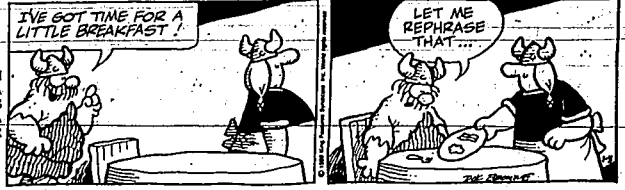
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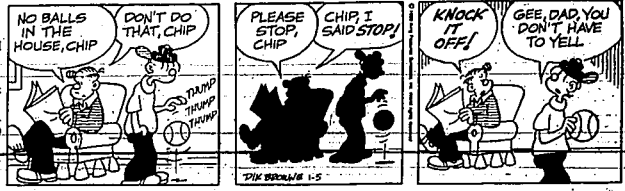
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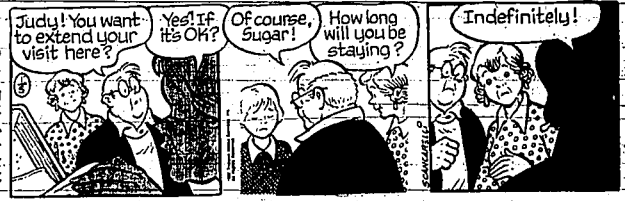

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Spielberg's 'Always' updates sentimental 1943 Tracy film

HOLLYWOOD—A better title for "Always," directed by Steven Spielberg, might be "Forever," which is roughly its running time.

Strange: the material that directors seize upon to update "A Guy Named Joe" was dreadful the first time around, a soppy 1943 movie in which flying ace Spencer Tracy was killed and allowed by crusty old angel Lionel Barrymore to come back to help new pilot Van Johnson become the best shot that Tracy himself had been.

At the same time, Tracy helped his love, ferry pilot Irene Dunne, get over her grief at his death and made his own rightful farewell.

This bathos might work in wartime, except that Dalton Trumbo's dialogue, paraphrased only slightly, about the wave of free children who would take to the free air that Tracy was helping keep free in the name of freedom, was questionable even then. And the film's vision of the uses of heaven prompted critic James Agee to call it "stonily impious."

Working from a screenplay by Jerry Belson, from material begun by the late Diane Thomas, Spielberg has made the story almost intact and is an homage to those Victor Fleming-Howard Hawks kind of films, has created a world in which nothing feels right.

Richard Dreyfuss is now our flying ace, and since there is not a popular war to throw him into, he drops

Nevertheless, Dreyfuss and Hunter are one fun couple, matching cuts for cute, spunk for spunk. He has even thought up a great present for her birthday: a white dress, in the spirit of the white dress Karen Allen wore on the run through most of "Raiders of the Lost Ark." The kind of clinging white dress that makes audiences perk up, and Hunter gurgles "Gurl clothes!"

So, Dreyfuss is cool. He is supportive. He will make sacrifices for his girl, D'rina. All he cannot say is the "I" word, as in "I love you," although you and I and that yellow Caterpillar tractor over there know gosh darn well he does.

All of us who fell under Holly Hunter's spell in "Broadcast News" and stuck to her through "Miss Firecracker" are in for a rough time of it. That wonderful directness and energy, that crackly voice and careening timing—bolting to the end of the road and setting her feet there before she drops off the end of it—have been pushed into mannerism. She has a terribly affecting moment as, in that white dress, she dances to "their song," and Dreyfuss, dead and invisible, dances with her. But cute-

ness turning overripe is not a pleasant sight.

Opposite her is the pro himself. Richard Dreyfuss has made his career breathing reality into schlock, giving heart and warmth and sometimes a cutting edge to not-great material and making it seem better and finer and truer than it is. And he's really in peak form here, even if he is a little bookish for a "flyboy." Of all of them, Dreyfuss is the one who

hits us with a sense of loss; even with Hunter winking away at his side, it is his face and voice and eyes that draw us. But he can do no better than his dialogue or his situation—or his director, and all of that is, as they say, tooth-rotting.

As the next flyboy in line for D'rina, newcomer Brad Johnson fits the description "big lug" eerily well. He is forgettable in a motion picture. That leaves Lionel Barrymore's role

as the angelic averser. Director Spielberg has had a nice idea of turning this over to Audrey Hepburn, who is warmly offhanded and wears white nubby sweaters and pants. Then he reasoned her in what looks like the set for a Glade commercial—all Astorurf and fake daisies—had her trim Dreyfuss' hair as her first, unfathomable angelic act, and called her "Hap." It's tough to smile through plaque like this.

Finally, there are vast fiery action sequences, unclear edited, involving the safety of brave firefighters who have barely met and cannot be persuaded to care about.

So we have got an unrealized heaven and a banal and noisy Earth.

That leaves only hell, and that may feel realized enough by those who pay money to see this gargantuan PG-rated nonsense.

'Little Mermaid' has qualities of classic Disney animation

subjects and the script, by Polanski's scenarist, Gerard Brach, is full of life-embracing idealism and a touch of dark, sophisticated wit.

NATIONAL LAMPOON'S CHRISTMAS VACATION (PG-13): Writer-producer John Hughes takes the Griswold family (Chevy Chase & Co.) on another vacation: a hideous vision of a suburban Christmas gone totally amok, amid a family of howling grotesques and one catastrophe after another. Sometimes funny, sometimes tasteless. The movie's sadism and slapstick are encased, as usual with Hughes, in a sentimental overview, like a Norman Rockwell portrait with spiders nibbling through the frame.

STEEL MAGNOLIAS (PG): In Robert Hartling's movie adaptation of his play, his yammering sextet—Sally Field, Shirley MacLaine, Olympia Dukakis, Daryl Hannah, Dolly Parton and Julia Roberts—do so much prancing and sashaying and elbowing that the film, set in small-town Louisiana, turns into Southern-fried vaudeville. These belles should take their act on the road as tag-team wrestlers.

TANGO AND CASH (R): The summit meeting of Russian director Andrei Konchalovsky and Sylvester

Stallone produces not cinematic gloss, not the same old dopey, recycled car-chase thrill. Mismatched cops, surrounded by clichés, explosions and wild jailbreaks, duel omnipotently drug czars, while continuously and willfully wise-cracking. Konchalovsky shares direction with Peter MacDonald and Albert Magnoli; Stallone, playing a natty dude, shares star-time with scruffy Kurt Russell. The movie pulverizes them all.

THE WAR OF THE ROSES (R): In the hands of director Danny DeVito and writer Michael Lessen, this story of Oliver and Barbara Rose is biting and vicious, a styptic pencil on the battered face of "civilized divorce." It's also thoughtful, laceratingly funny and bravely true to its own black-and-blue comic vision. Although Michael Douglas's performance has been calibrated to give some idea of Oliver's charm, you could call Oliver an insensitive workaholic, self-centered, countless lox. Kathleen Turner's Barbara may be sexually triumphant, but she is socially unsure and after all these years with Oliver, her self-esteem has vanished. If you're tired of cloying Christmas eggnog, "War" is Christmas spirits of ammonia.

WE'RE NO ANGELS (R): Great

ensembles don't necessarily make great films. And "We're No Angels" is not what we should have expected from a summit meeting among

Robert De Niro, Sean Penn, director Neil Jordan, writer David Mamet, cinematographer Philippe Rousselot and the others.

'War of the Roses' hits No. 1

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—The dark divorce comedy "The War of the Roses" jumped to the No. 1 spot at the nation's theaters over the New Year's weekend, and Hollywood concluded its best year ever with ticket sales in excess of \$5 billion.

Directed by Danny DeVito and starring Michael Douglas and Kathleen Turner, "The War of the Roses" collected \$10.5 million over the four-day holiday weekend, according to figures released by Exhibitor Relations Co.

The box-office receipts in excess of \$5 billion for 1989 broke the previous record of \$4.46 billion from 1988.

The year's top film was "Beverly Hills Cop II," which topped the box office with "Tango and Cash," the police buddy picture with Kurt Russell and

Sylvester Stallone, finished second with ticket sales of \$9.6 million.

Disney's animated "The Little Mermaid" continued its strong run, landing in third with receipts of \$9.2 million. In fourth was the time-travel sequel "Back to the Future Part II" with a gate of \$8.14 million. The movie should join the \$100 million box-office club next weekend.

"National Lampoon's Christmas Vacation" collapsed from first place to fifth with \$8.09 million. In sixth was Steven Spielberg's "Always."

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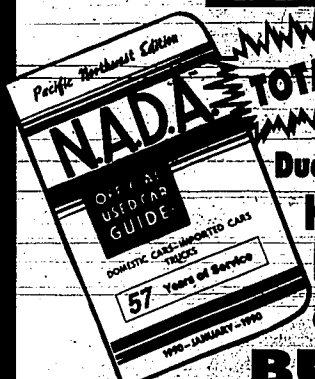
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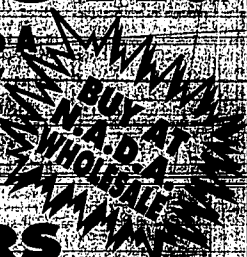
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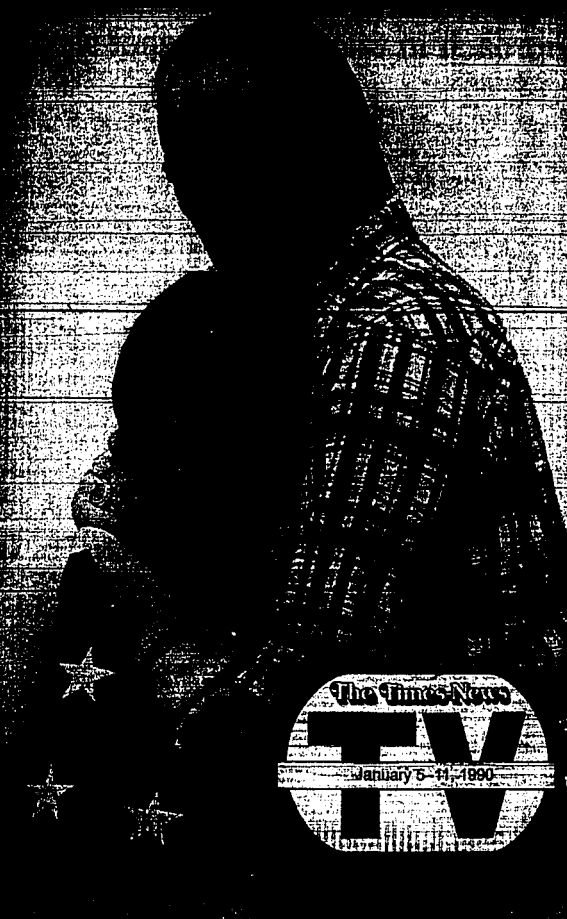

'Miami Vice' producer takes different approach in tale of DEA agent slaying

By LYNN HOOGENBOOM

Michael Mann, the producer/director best known for "Miami Vice," has a strong personal stamp. But Elizabeth Pena, who stars in his latest production, the three-part NBC miniseries "Drug Wars: The Camarena Story" (airing Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, Jan. 7, 8 and 9), says it's not in his usual mold.

"I think it's very different than anything he's done," says Pena, who had not yet seen the completed project when we talked to her. "I'm sure that once it's out the pace will be there, but I think the story itself and the combination of actors he chose are a little different from the norm."

The story, based on the book "Desperados" by Time magazine reporter Elaine Shannon, revolves around drug enforcement agent Enrique "Kiki" Camarena, who was abducted on Feb. 7, 1985, in Guadalajara, Mexico. His body was discovered a month later, 20 miles south of Guadalajara. There was ample evidence that he had been tortured.

In "Drug Wars," Elizabeth Pena plays Camarena's wife, Mika, Steven Bauer plays Camarena, and Craig T. Nelson and Treat Williams play the agents who headed the search for Camarena. Since Mann was directing the NBC movie and series pilot "Hanna" at the time "Drug Wars" was shot, it was directed by Brian Gibson.

But don't think for a moment that Mann wasn't fully involved. "He wasn't physically there on the set all the time," says Pena, "but he double-checks things from costumes to props. Everything. It's amazing how he can split himself into 12,000 people. He knows exactly what he wants, and he also knows exactly what he doesn't want. And he doesn't hesitate to say it."

The atmosphere on the set was somber. "It was always very kind of funeral feeling the entire time," says Pena, "which I found really interesting."

We couldn't help wondering, though, whether projects like this might not tend to glamorize the drug trade and the use of firearms, even while depicting the arrest of drug dealers.

"I pray to God not," says Pena emphatically. "That's not the intention of this one. We were all very thorough in our investigations. We tried to portray everything very truthfully. And it isn't very glamorous at all."

Pena, who is perhaps best known for her roles in the feature films "Down and Out in Beverly Hills" and "La Bamba," is named after the town of Elizabeth, N.J., where she was born. But not long after her birth, her parents moved back to Cuba, where Pena lived until she was 8.

"I remember things like the mangoes," she says. "I remember the No. 100 bus. And the immediate neighborhood I lived in the last four years — with my eyes closed, I could tell you where the grocery store was and where the park was. And what our little home looked like. But it's just really little-kid memories — very patchy."

When she was 8, her family moved to Manhattan, and the culture shock was severe. "First of all, English

sounded like everyone was chewing on honey," she says. "Also when you're in Cuba — at the time I was there — you have very little knowledge of things outside the country. So coming here was 'Alice In Wonderland' time. My God, Woolworth's was Saks. 'Look at all those balls!'"

New NBC miniseries raises visibility of head of Drug Enforcement Agency

WASHINGTON (AP) — Drug Enforcement Administrator John C. Lawn generally keeps a low profile. He speaks in a quiet, husky voice as he guides the actions of agents throughout the world, trying to keep them safe in the field and supported in Washington.

But when a miniseries on the 1985 murder in Mexico of DEA agent Enrique "Kiki" Camarena airs on NBC, in January, he could become something of a national hero.

The miniseries depicts Lawn tussling with Mexican officials who stonewall efforts to find Camarena and his killers, and going public to criticize those officials over the objections of Reagan administration officials.

At the conclusion of a National Archives screening, a choked-up Lawn told the audience of about 100 DEA and Mexican Embassy officials that it was "an extraordinary piece of work."

The miniseries is based on the book "Desperados" by Elaine Shannon and tells the story of Lawn and Camarena, who was kidnapped Feb. 7, 1985, in Guadalajara.

A Mexican pilot who had worked with DEA agents there, Alfredo

Zavala Avelar, was kidnapped a few days later. The bullet-riddled bodies of the two men, showing signs of torture, were found March 5, 1985, wrapped in plastic bags and dumped on a ranch 60 miles southeast of Guadalajara.

Lawn was the DEA's deputy administrator when Camarena disappeared. By the time the agent's body was found, Lawn was administrator. It was his first crisis.

DEA Deputy Administrator Terrence Burke called the film "powerful," but operations director David Westrate said "there's a lot of pretense in there." Lawn said privately the miniseries was "about 80 percent accurate," which he considered commendable for television.

The Mexican Embassy minister for narcotics affairs, Gustavo Gonzalez Baez — appointed by the new administration in Mexico that has cracked down on drug traffickers and corrupt officials — said Americans "are accustomed to seeing this kind of series and they realize this is not reality, this is just amusement."

The movie, he said, suggests "that all the Mexican authorities were involved in protecting drug traffickers, and that is absolutely inaccu-

rate."

Gonzalez Baez noted that drug traffickers Rafael Caro Quintero and Ernesto Rafael Fonseca Carrillo, along with several Mexican judicial police officers, have been convicted and sentenced to long terms in connection with the murders.

Although the miniseries is generally grim, the National Archives audience found some humor when suddenly, up on the screen in living color, was William von Raab, the former U.S. Customs Commissioner, playing himself as he vowed to shut down the U.S.-Mexican border with car-by-car searches to put pressure on Mexican officials. The audience's disbelief at seeing von Raab on the screen began with a murmur and grew into surprised laughter, drowning out von Raab's lines.

Lawn, a 54-year-old ex-Marine who goes by the name "Jack," seems somewhat abashed at being, in the words of one observer, "canonized on television."

It may be because the subject matter is so difficult.

In an interview before the screening, Lawn said the loss of any of his 2,900 agents is the toughest part of

NFL Monday Night takes top ratings for ABC amid holiday week of reruns

LOS ANGELES — Football defeated entertainment reruns in the Nielsen television ratings for the holiday week-ended Dec. 31.

ABC's NFL Monday Night Football game between the Cincinnati Bengals and the Minnesota Vikings was the top show of the week in the A.C. Nielsen Co. survey.

NBC's prime-time rerun of Sunday's AFC Wild Card game between the Pittsburgh Steelers and the Houston Oilers drew even more viewers, although the networks disputed whether that made it the No. 1 show.

The game ran 61 minutes into prime time after 7 p.m. Sunday and was listed first in Nielsen rankings released by NBC and CBS. ABC does not include spillover shows in its ratings, and Nielsen's own release didn't include the rerun game.

"My philosophy is that everything on the air after 7 p.m. Sunday and after 8 p.m. the rest of the week should be counted," said Arnold Becker, CBS vice president for television research. "Once you begin to leave things out, different people

his job.

"When you talk to families, the first question I have gotten from each of the families — the nine recent funerals that I have presided over — the question has always been, 'Is what he did important? Will it make a difference?'"

It started with Camarena's wife, Mika.

"Her initial response was, 'Please assure me that Kiki will not just become a number. It has to mean more than that.'"

In Camarena's case, it has meant more, in large part because the DEA

was determined to uncover who was responsible.

"Many individuals in the international community have said, 'The Mexican government has lost hundreds of people. The Colombian government has lost hundreds of people. Why pursue Camarena?'"

Lawn recalled.

To Lawn, Camarena "was a symbol (that) we in the law enforcement community, domestic and international, depend upon one another."

"Kiki depended upon law enforcement counterparts in Mexico who failed that trust," Lawn said. "And that's the reason we had to pursue it with vigilance."

Doctor hurries baby's birth to be 1st in 1990; displays child on program

ANAHEIM, Calif. — A doctor at a birthing center on the grounds of Melodyland Christian Center timed the delivery of a baby on New Year's Eve so he could take the infant next door and display her for a midnight religious service being broadcast to a national television audience.

Dr. Charles Wesley Turner Jr., a 64-year-old physician who boasts of delivering more than 18,000

babies during his 41-year career, said Tuesday that he administered a "saddle block," or epidural anesthetic at the base of the mother's spine, and used forceps to remove the baby, Myra Kristine Palmer.

Turner then swaddled the 6-pound, 12-ounce infant in a blanket, tucked her in a Christmas stocking and ran about 150 feet outside to another building, where the church service was being conducted.

"We had her (the mother) push at 11:59," Turner said. "I put the forceps on an," pulled (the infant) out. We had her at 15 seconds after midnight.... I used the forceps because I wanted to have the first baby in the New Year. And this was a planned delivery," he said.

"I was highly jubilant," Turner continued. "The congregation yelled and screamed and applauded. And everybody wanted to see the baby."

Both parents were present during the delivery and gave their consent, Turner said.

"I felt a little funny because he took her and ran off with her," said Brigitte Elke-Palmer, the newborn's 25-year-old mother. "But he

(Turner) wanted to have her on TV. It was a special feeling for everyone to see the baby."

When told of the New Year's Eve delivery, Dr. Thomas J. Garite, chairman of obstetrics and gynecology at University of California, Irvine, Medical Center in the neighboring city of Orange, said, "It makes me raise an eyebrow or two."

Garite said a forceps delivery is as safe as a spontaneous birth provided it is performed when the baby's head is far enough down in the birth canal.

"Obviously, the ethical question that comes into play at this point is whether or not the mother was fully informed that (the forceps delivery) was being done for that reason," Garite said.

However, Garite questioned the use of the "saddle block" anesthetic.

"It frightens me that somebody's giving saddle blocks in a birthing center," Garite said. While UCI is considering opening a birthing center, the university would "never consider" using such an anesthetic there because of the possibility of

BMI, HBO extend licensing agreement

NEW YORK (AP) — Home Box Office and music syndicate BMI extended a licensing agreement for one month, sidestepping a court order that could have temporarily barred HBO from broadcasting films with BMI songs.

Lawyers for the two companies announced the agreement Tuesday at a hearing in a lawsuit BMI brought against HBO last week.

In the lawsuit, BMI had asked a U.S. district judge to bar HBO from transmitting BMI songs after Dec. 31, 1989, when the companies' licensing agreement ended. It noted that several films in HBO's January schedule include BMI-copyrighted songs.

Robert Sisk, an attorney for BMI, said the companies reached the agreement on Friday, a day after the lawsuit was filed. Sisk said negotiations would continue on a new licensing contract that would extend past the end of January.

A court hearing was scheduled for

Jan. 29. The suit was filed amid efforts by BMI to boost its cable television levies. Beyond raising basic rates, BMI wants to collect from local cable systems as well as from cable programmers. It now charges just programmers.

"The only concern I would have is whether or not the warmth of the baby is protected adequately," Garite said, noting that newborns do not control their body temperatures very well. "You have to be real careful in taking the baby away at that point."

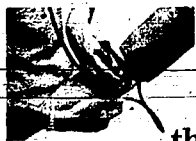
"I told him (Turner) if we have a baby at the midnight hour, it'll be extraordinary for our service," the pastor added.

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
