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McClure plans to retire at end of Senate term

BOISE — Three-term Republican U.S. Senator James McClure announced Friday he will retire at the end of this term instead of seeking re-election.

"Perhaps it's time to make my own timetable," said McClure, who turned 65 last week and is in his 24th year in Congress.

"Primarily, there comes a time somewhere when it comes time to make a change," McClure told a news conference jammed with politicians from both parties and supporters. "I'm not retiring, I'm changing jobs, perhaps for one with less pressure."

His announcement touched off an immediate scramble among potential successors, since Idaho's primary election is less than five months away, and the ripple effect was expected to impact most Idaho major races in the 1990 election.

Five-term Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, was expected to announce for the GOP nomination next week and Republican Attorney General Jim Jones also indicated he planned to enter the race. Democratic Rep. Richard Stallings said he was considering the possibility.

McClure, a lawyer, served three terms in the House before winning election to the Senate in 1972. He was re-elected twice after that, with only token opposition, and was considered unbeatable if he had run again.

In 1981 he started a six-year stint as chairman of the Senate Interior and Natural Resources Committee, and said Friday when the GOP lost control of the Senate in 1986, the job became a little less attractive.

"It might be different," he said, his decision to retire, if Republicans still controlled the Senate. "There's a dramatic difference between being in the majority and the minority. It's more rewarding when you control the agenda as the majority."

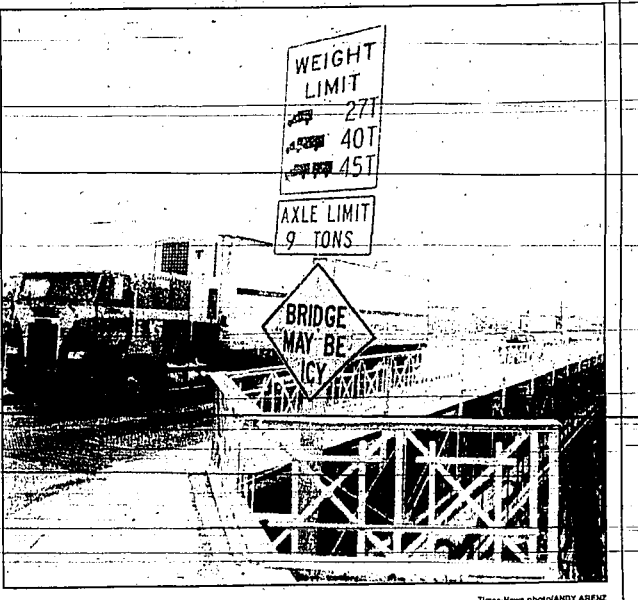
He said the fact he would be 72 by the end of the next term also was a factor.

"I suspect you have to get to be age 65 before you really appreciate how life looks at age 65 as compared to 45 or 55. It does look different," he said. "Your perspectives are different."

He said President George Bush, a personal friend, was among those calling him Friday urging him not to retire. But McClure made light of it, saying that was to be expected.

"The president told me the country would collapse tomorrow if James McClure were not in the Senate," he said.

Industry executives plan Singing Bridge fund effort

TWIN FALLS — Angry executives of local industries have vowed to lobby the state Legislature to use tax surplus money to speed up the Singing Bridge's replacement.

"We plan on lobbying loud and hard to get funding for this bridge," said Mike Johnston, Universal Frozen Foods plant manager. "It's going to cost some severe financial problems if this is long-term."

The state has \$100 million in surplus state taxes that the Legislature will have to decide what to do with.

John Lively, manager of Western Dairyman Cooperative, said poor access to the company's plant could jeopardize the plant's chance at a \$40 million expansion.

He said the company, which processes cheese and whey products, has plants in five Western states that are vying for the expansion, planned sometime in the next five years.

Western Dairyman officials will decide within a year whether — and where — to build the new automated plant, Lively said. It eventually could quadruple the plant's output, though it would bring few new jobs, he said.

Meantime, city and Twin Falls Highway District officials designated several truck detours for the Singing Bridge once lower weight limits come into effect Monday.

"Trucks coming from Interstate 84 would either go down Blue Lakes Boulevard to Orchard Drive or east on Pole Line Road to Eastland Drive and head south to Orchard Drive and then turn west to Washington Street South."

"Trucks going coming to town on Kimberly Road would go south on Eastland Drive or Blue Lakes Boulevard South to Orchard Drive and then head west to Washington Street South."

Campaign turns wild in a hurry

BOISE — A ho-hum election year just got wild.

Although Attorney General Jim Jones, Torment of Eden, may be the only candidate alive, Magic Valley contributors to the upcoming U.S. Senate race, McClure's retirement will be seen as an open door of opportunity for local legislators and political hopefuls.

"There will be such a revitalization in the Republican Party at all levels," state Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo, said Friday.

Darrington, who stood among the state's Republican leaders during McClure's Boise press conference Friday, makes no secret about his political ambition.

GOP leaders predict wide-open scramble for party nomination

BOISE — Republican leaders say they expect a wide-open scramble for the party's nomination to succeed the retiring Sen. James McClure.

His decision that could have an impact on other national, state and even legislative races.

"I expect a very open primary," said state Senate President Pro Tem Michael Crapo, R-Idaho Falls. "It will be an aggressive, spirited primary."

State Republican Chairman Randy Ayre said he would make no attempt to limit the field for the GOP nomination. "I will talk to the candidates to urge them to very carefully assess the political waters to make certain they have the resources and the background to make the race," he said.

"In terms of trying to limit it (the field of candidates), not directly," Ayre said.

It appeared neither party would have a shortage of candidates, even with potential successors to McClure having less than five months to prepare for a primary election.

"I would expect to see a lot of people from every area of the state looking at this, from both sides of the ticket," said Crapo. He said he expected both party nominations to be contested.

Former governor John Evans, who lost a U.S. Senate bid to Republican Sen. Steve Symms four years ago, said he was keeping the option open of running for Congress or the Senate.

But he said he was surprised that McClure waited so long to make up his mind, because it handicaps Republicans hoping to make the race. He said he worked two years on his Senate campaign, because it takes that long to raise the money.

The early favorite was five-term Republican Rep. Larry Craig from Idaho's 1st District, the same job McClure held when he won the Senate seat in 1972.

Craig called the decision by McClure and his wife to retire "a surprise."

Nation's jobless rate holds steady

WASHINGTON — The nation's unemployment rate held steady at 5.3 percent last month as gains in service industries offset the ninth consecutive monthly drop in manufacturing jobs, the Labor Department said Friday.

The steady civilian jobless rate, which ended 1989 just under the level where it began, gave private analysts hope that the economy's current sluggish growth will not worsen into a recession.

"That's a good number and it certainly suggests that the economy isn't falling out of bed," said Robert Dederick, chief economist for the Northern Trust Co. of Chicago.

In other good economic news, the Commerce Department said Friday that orders to U.S. factories for manufactured goods, which have been lackluster in recent months, shot up 2.4 percent in November to a seasonally adjusted \$239.7 billion, their best showing since April.

The increased demand was widespread across most industries, led by another big jump in orders for aircraft. Economists said the rise in orders, if it continues in coming months, should halt the slide in manufacturing employment, probably by the middle of next year.

Analysts were still concerned that the slowdown in the overall economy, which many feared would last until the spring, would translate into higher jobless rates in the months ahead.

During all of last year, the unemployment rate fluctuated in a narrow range within a tenth of a percentage point of 5.3 percent, except for

Dress code snags priest

DAYTON, Ohio — A priest asked to give in his parish post for enforcing a dress code banning shorts and miniskirts said Friday the archbishop who made the request will face an "angry Christ."

The Rev. Roger Griese of Sacred Heart Roman Catholic Church "has been asked to leave," said Rita Reilly, spokeswoman for the Archdiocese of Cincinnati, which includes Griese's 80-member church in downtown Dayton. She refused to say what his response was.

A published report said the head of the diocese, Archbishop Daniel Pilarczyk, had ordered Griese to give up his post, effective last Wednesday. The Rev. Daniel Conlon, chancellor of the archdiocese, declined to comment.

Griese, pastor of Sacred Heart for 21 years, came under fire for denying communion to worshippers wearing clothes he considers inappropriate for church.

Griese released through a spokeswoman, he accused the "middle of character assassination."

"I do not hate Archbishop Pilarczyk," Griese said. "I have only pity for him since he will have to face an angry Christ in judgment."

No deals on Noreiga trial, president says

WASHINGTON — President Bush said Friday he is "not seeking a deal" on a reduced charge for Manuel Antonio Noreiga and vowed to "bend over backwards" to avoid saying anything that would interfere with the deposed Panamanian ruler's trial.

"Our case is strong, our resolve is firm and our legal representations are sound," Bush told a nationally televised news conference after discussing Noreiga's prosecution on drug trafficking charges with Attorney General Dick Thornburgh.

Bush also announced he is dispatching Vice President Dan Quayle on a fence-mending tour of Latin America "within the next several days" to explain the U.S. military action and muster support for the new Panamanian government of Guillermo Endara.

Bush said he had "no immediate plans" to visit Panama. However, an administration official who declined to be identified, said a presidential visit is under consideration and that Panama might also be included on Quayle's itinerary.

The president called revitalizing Panama's economy "a major priority" to help it recover from the U.S. military invasion and economic sanctions. He did not put a price tag on the U.S. aid, but some estimates for the damage have run as high as \$2 billion.

Even as he savored Noreiga's capture, Bush said he would be "ever mindful" of the legal process from now on, suggesting he would refrain from his previous characterizations of Noreiga as a "thug" and criminal.

"He is now in custody. Time for rhetoric is over," he said.

Bush said he was convinced Noreiga would get a fair trial and "I am going to bend over backwards and not answer hypothetical questions or not do anything that might prejudice that."

"With Noreiga securely in U.S. custody in Florida, Bush said he hoped to bring U.S. combat troops home from Panama "as soon as possible." But he declined to give a timetable.

Still, he ruled out a long-term peacekeeping role for U.S. troops. "I'd like to see their police forces, whatever emerges, reconstituted," Bush said. Noreiga's Panamanian Defense Forces were decimated in the U.S. military action.

Bush said the some 12,000 troops stationed at U.S. bases in Panama before the invasion would be left there, but would not serve a police role.

Some 2,900 combat troops were brought home this week, leaving about 24,500 military personnel, according to the Pentagon.

In an opening statement at his news conference, Bush said, "Our government is not seeking a deal with Noreiga. Our policy remains that we have brought him to this country for prosecution."

"We are committed to a fair trial and to providing all the protections guaranteed by the U.S. Constitution and laws," Bush added.

Idaho had record agriculture year in 1989, committee told

BOISE (AP) — Idaho agriculture turned in its most lucrative year ever in 1989, posting record receipts for several key commodities, and farm experts believe conditions will remain right for another solid year in 1990.

"The outlook for 1990 appears to be good for most of Idaho's farm products," University of Idaho Agriculture Dean Larry Brannen told a special legislative committee on Friday.

"Total cash receipts from agriculture in Idaho in 1990 will probably not exceed the excellent receipts in 1989, but major decreases are not expected."

Brannen and Idaho Cattle Association Vice President Gary Glenn were the latest experts to give their economic outlook to the Joint Committee on Revenue Projections.

The university's preliminary estimates of cash receipts from agriculture for 1989 put the total at nearly \$2.9 billion, a 25 percent increase over receipts for 1988.

"Record values were recorded for the state's top two cash crops — potatoes at \$630 million and wheat at \$400 million, Brannen said. Receipts from cattle and calves also hit their highest level in recent history at \$680 million.

Significant increases in receipts were also recorded for barley, hay, dried beans and hops.

"There may not be the same profit-making opportunities available" this year as last, Brannen said. "Total cash farm receipts, however, will probably remain stable in 1990, ... (but) rapidly rising production costs will probably result in stable income."

Salmon Council at odds with mayor

SALMON (AP) — The Salmon City Council is trying to calm the turbulence erupting after Mayor Eddie Guyton's first couple days in office.

The council met in an emergency session Thursday, precipitated by Guyton's latest attempt this week to fire City Clerk Jim Johnston.

Guyton said he wanted to fire Johnston because he feels the town needs someone with banking and accounting experience. His substitute appointment, Clinton Smith, is a retired banker.

Guyton wrote Johnston a letter of termination despite a unanimous vote by the council at Tuesday's

meeting to retain him as clerk.

"In his first 24 hours as mayor he about rendered the city right to its knees," said Steve Lish, finance committee chairman.

According to Idaho law, the mayor has authority to remove any appointed official with a majority vote by the council. The board can remove an appointed official with a unanimous vote.

On Thursday, the council reiterated its support for Johnston and also reversed an order Guyton made Tuesday to disband all standing committees until further notice.

Guyton made repeated attempts to

fire Johnston even before he took office as mayor. He also effectively terminated the appointment of city attorney Jordan Smith.

Guyton wrote Smith a letter in November, saying his services would not be needed, and Smith made other commitments.

Lish said the council had become very united since the city found itself near default about 16 months ago.

"We just spent the last year to 16 months becoming reputable," said Lish. "I, with a clear conscience, cannot support something that's not better than what we have."

2 die in Boise freeway accident
 BOISE (AP) — Two Washington residents have been killed in an early-morning freeway accident on the outskirts of Boise.

Ada County Coroner Erwin Sonnenberg identified the victims Friday as Carlos Gonzalez, 33, and his son, Carlos Jr., 12, both of Moses Lake, Wash.

Idaho State Police officers said a semi-trailer truck operated by Dennis O. Miller, 61, Anaheim, Calif., skidded on the icy highway and slid across the median into the path of the oncoming Gonzalez vehicle, causing a head-on collision.

Pocatellan named to Travel Council
 BOISE (AP) — Everett Jordan, general manager of the Quality Inn at Pocatello, is the newest member of the Idaho Travel Council.

Gov. Cecil Andrus announced the appointment on Friday. Jordan replaces Lewis Pope, Montpelier, who resigned last year.

The Idaho Travel Council allocates money from Idaho's hotel-motel tax for tourism promotion.

Angstadt new mayor of Pocatello
 POCATELLO (AP) — After an election and a runoff, Peter Angstadt has officially become Pocatello's mayor, succeeding Dick Finlayson.

Also taking the oath of office during a Thursday City Council meeting were councilmen Babe Caccia, former Idaho State University athletic director and coach; Roger Chase, a J.R. Simplot Co. employee, and Earl Pond, a re-elected council member. The four were sworn in by 6th District Judge Peter McDermott.

Caribou County nods Sunday liquor
 SODA SPRINGS (AP) — The Caribou County Commission has approved the sale of liquor by the drink on Sundays, but the ordinance only affects one business.

City businesses will still have to seek approval from their city councils.

The Cedar View Supper Club is the only business impacted by the new ordinance.

Caribou County Clerk Myrna Archibald said several bar owners had asked for the change, noting that nearby Lava Hot Springs had adopted a similar ordinance which could draw customers to that resort community and possibly put intoxicated drivers on the highway.

Damages sought for jail miscarriage
 COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Attorneys for the city and county are reviewing a claim filed by a 23-year-old woman who discovered she had a miscarriage after serving a night in the Kootenai County Jail.

Pattie A. Lehto said Thursday that a doctor told her she might have miscarried her baby before she was taken into custody.

Lehto alleges that jailers refused to let Mrs. Lehto visit her doctor last July even though they had been told her 4-month-old pregnancy was considered high risk and she had begun bleeding vaginally.

The woman said jailers told her she couldn't meet her doctor because she hadn't filled out the proper form.

Hendricks was headed west on Interstate 84 at 5:30 p.m. when her pickup went off the road between Jerome and Wendall, Jerome County Chief Deputy Sheriff Mike Alonzo said.

The pickup rolled 1 1/2 times and landed on its roof, Alonzo said. Hendricks, who was not wearing a seatbelt, was thrown from the vehicle. She was transported to St. Benedict's Family Medical Center and then to Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, Alonzo said.

Magic Valley jobless rate continues to fall

TWIN FALLS - Warm weather contributed to continued exceptionally low December unemployment figures in the area - and 1.7 percent below last year.

It's the lowest rate since August 1978, Labor Market Analyst Lon McDonald of the Twin Falls Job Service said. The December unemployment rate for the Magic Valley - which the Job Service defines as Twin Falls, Jerome and Gooding Counties - was 4.1 percent.

That's half a percentage point lower than November's rate. A year ago, the December 1988 rate was 5.8 percent.

"Exceptionally good weather in December caused workers in construction and other industries to continue working when in normal years there would be layoffs," McDonald said. "This caused a rosy employment picture in November to become even better in December."

Although some companies consider a 4 percent figure to

be close to full employment and won't look at expanding into those areas, Twin Falls Economic Development Director Dave McAlindin called the figure good news.

"The objective is to employ the people of the area, so you can't help but feel good about the fact that unemployment is so low," he said. And a recent economic study by the FHH Fantus company of Chicago pointed out that higher unemployment in outlying counties means the workers are available for potential new companies in Twin Falls.

Idaho's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate plunged another two notches in December to close-out-1989 at a record-low 4.5 percent as the number of workers without jobs hit its lowest level in over a decade.

In addition, the Department of Employment said on Friday that the number of Idahoans with jobs hit its highest level in eight months.

Idaho's 4.5 percent jobless rate was nearly three-quarters of a point below the December 1988 rate, marking the

32nd straight month that current unemployment levels have run below year-earlier averages.

The continued string of strong employment pictures underscored by the December statistics confirmed Employment Director Julie Kilgrew's projection earlier this week that the annual average unemployment rate for 1989 would hit a record-low 5.2 percent, down seven-tenths of a point from the 1988 average and almost half of the average posted during the peak of Idaho's employment crisis in 1982.

Magic Valley's average unemployment rate for 1989 was 5 percent.

The downward trend of Idaho's jobless rate continued to buck the nation's performance. The country's December unemployment rate remained constant at 5.3 percent, but it was buttressed by the return of 55,000 striking East Coast telephone workers. The national figures showed the manufacturing sector losing strength, another signal of the anticipated slowdown in the nation's economy.

County considers stricter canyon-rim building rules

TWIN FALLS - For safety and aesthetics, a new county ordinance would make it more difficult to build homes close to the Snake River Canyon rim.

Experts are worried about the safety factor of building close to the canyon rim, said Robert Pettygrove, who was the Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning Board chairman until his term ended last month.

The ordinance under consideration by the board mostly regulates dairies, but also includes the tougher distance restrictions.

attraction is an aesthetic problem," City Engineer Gary Young said. The city already has such an ordinance.

The zoning board will consider the ordinance at 7:30 p.m. Thursday in the courthouse's judicial annex.

"We just want to bring the county's ordinance into compliance with the city's," said Lee Taylor, county zoning administrator.

Several houses that were built before city and county ordinances were passed in the early 1980s are as close as five to 10 feet from the rim and have decks jutting out over the edge, said LaMar Orton, the city's community development director.

Young said a foundation of one home built near the canyon rim has cracks that coincide with trucks in the

rock below.

A survey of the canyon rim by the U.S. Geological Survey, which prompted the zoning ordinances, concluded that it is relatively unstable, he said.

Based on the study, in 1981 the city passed an ordinance restricting construction within 100 feet of the rim without a geological survey.

With a survey, homes can be built within 50 feet of the rim under the city ordinance, Orton said.

The county passed a similar ordinance that restricted house construction within 100 feet of the rim, but with a geological study and county approval, people could build within 30 feet of the rim.

Local business people air sales-tax gripes

TWIN FALLS - For nearly two hours Friday, state officials listened to local business people complain about members' sales-tax regulations and collection practices.

"It's taking a lot of fun out of being in business," Jim Tarter of OK Auto Systems said.

The roomful of Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce members were upset at recent audits by the Idaho Tax Commission they call unfair and too vigorous. They didn't like recent regulations written by the commission that businesses consider confusing.

A tax commissioner, charged with enforcing 170 pages of regulations, disputed con-

hasn't been audited. But he shared the forum with several who have.

"He had dollar signs in his eyes," Connie Shankey of Shankey Trucking said. "I ended up giving \$12,000."

The chamber has supported a state Taxpayer's Bill of Rights, after several of its members complained about the Tax Commission's actions.

Some businesses that sell a variety of goods and services under complex regulations are having a hard time complying with new rules.

"We are just confused as to what we are to collect taxes on," Tarter said. "What we're doing right now is just tax everything we can."

 The affected employees hold temporary positions they received through the intercession of politicians, said Patricia Santo-Tomas, head of the Civil Service Commission.

Gorbachev trims schedule to work on internal crises

MOSCOW (AP) — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev canceled meetings with foreign guests to concentrate on domestic crises, a source said Friday, and news of the schedule change triggered a steep drop in the Tokyo stock market and unsettled Wall Street.
 Gorbachev put off engagements with foreign visitors, including British opposition leader Neil Kinnock, to deal with border riots in Azerbaijan and the breakup Communist Party of Lithuania, a senior official said.
 News of the schedule change was not reported by Soviet media, but it was felt abroad.

The Tokyo Stock Exchange recorded its sharpest drop on Friday since Oct. 16, plummeting 438.12 points, and analysts put the plunge down to concern about Gorbachev's fate. A slight decline in stock prices on Wall Street and a steep drop on the Hong Kong exchange were also attributed to the Soviet leader's schedule changes.
 "To Japan, the worst thing that could happen to the world scenario would be for Gorbachev to drop from sight," Chris Schreiber, an investment analyst with New Japan Securities, said in Tokyo.
 The market reactions pointed up how closely Gorbachev is linked by many in the capitalist world to the success of the reforms and improved East-West relations he has pursued since coming to power in March 1985.

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — Western politicians said Friday the plan to hold elections in only three months could give the interim leadership an unfair advantage, and they recommended international supervision of the vote.
 U.S. Rep. Frank R. Wolf, R-Va., said Romania's new political parties lack the "tools of democracy," and proposed a referendum on the election date. New parties have asked that elections be delayed beyond April so they will have time to organize.

Swedish cop freed of theft charges
SKOVDE, Sweden (AP) — A policeman with a sweet tooth was turned in by his partner for shoplifting a two-cent piece of candy, but the state refused to prosecute the case, it was reported Friday.
 The two officers went into a closed candy store in November to investigate a burglar alarm, which turned out to be faulty, the IT news agency said. On the way out, one officer took a piece of candy, and was charged with shoplifting by his partner, IT said.
 Prosecutor Krister Wacem said the charge was dropped because the candy store owner

China predicts win over capitalism
BEIJING (AP) — Socialism is not to blame for China's poverty, and the nation will eventually triumph over its capitalist rivals, the Communist Party daily newspaper said Friday.
 The lengthy commentary in the People's Daily came less than a month after a small group of university students, in a bold gesture of dissent, unfurled a banner in front of the state television station reading "Motherland, why are you so poor?"

20 abducted in Colombian drug conflict

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Drug traffickers in Medellin have abducted at least 20 people, including members of Colombia's richest families, as part of their terrorist war against the government, police said Friday.
 Most of the victims were kidnapped in the last two months in Medellin, the center of the country's cocaine trade, said a police spokesman in Medellin.
 The spokesman, reached by telephone, refused to identify himself.

A statement sent by the Medellin cartel said traffickers had ordered the "leaders of working-class neighborhoods to take members of the traditional oligarchy hostage."
 Half of the ransom paid by family members for the release of the hostages will be used to finance the war against the government of President Virgilio Barco, said the communiqué, published Friday in local newspapers.
 The cartel said it would use the other half of the ransom to finance the construction of housing for its needy. The communiqué did not mention the amount of ransom demanded by traffickers.

The cartel offered no explanation as to why it would need money at a time when its reputed leader, Pablo Escobar, has a personal fortune estimated at \$2 billion.
 Government officials have suggested that Escobar's cocaine smuggling business has been hurt by the government's war on drugs but it appeared the wave of kidnappings was the Medellin cartel's latest attempt to pressure the government into abandoning its war on drugs.
 Barco launched the offensive in August after traffickers killed Sen. Luis Carlos Galan, a leading presidential candidate. Authorities have confiscated hundreds of properties allegedly belonging to the traffickers, extradited 11 drug suspects to the United States and killed one leader of the Medellin cartel, Gonzalo Rodriguez Gacha, in a gunfight.

Vietnamese flee to country they backed in war

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Hundreds of Vietnamese who helped the Americans during the Vietnam War, and paid for it with years in "re-education" camps after the Communist victory, are en route to new lives in the United States.
 Three chartered jets brought the first 150 former army inmates and their families to Bangkok from Ho Chi Minh City, formerly Saigon, on Friday and 151 more were expected Saturday.
 Nearly 2,000 Vietnamese, including family members, are scheduled to leave their homeland by March, said the U.S. State Dept. head of the Thailand office of the International Organization for Migration. His agency handles medical processing and transportation of the refugees.

Murders most gory

Police link suspect, 11 slayings

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — A paroled murderer charged in the slayings of eight women was ordered held without bail Friday and authorities say they have linked the man to a total of 11 killings over the last two years.

The break in the serial slayings was "just a matter of luck," said one of the police officers who spotted the suspect's car from a helicopter.

After his arrest, Arthur Shawcross, 44, of Rochester made statements about the slayings and told police where to find three bodies, said Police Chief Gordon F. Uriacher, who refused to say if the suspect confessed.

A state police source, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said Shawcross had confessed to 11 slayings.

Authorities had been investigating the deaths and disappearances of 16 women in the Rochester area since March 1988. Uriacher and Monroe County District Attorney Edward R. Reilly said five of the slayings are not related to the others.

"The number that he's responsible for we believe that Uriacher said 'We've said all along that we don't believe all these cases were related, and that's the way it turned out.'

Most of the women Shawcross is accused of killing were involved in prostitution and drugs, police said.

"He went to them posing as a 'john' (customary) was able to get them in the car, then took control of them and took them to various locations, wherever it might have been," State Police Superintendent Thomas Constantine said in Albany. "In most cases, the death was strangulation."

Constantine also said some victims were murdered in their homes. He pleaded innocent to eight counts of second-degree murder in Rochester City Court on Friday. Judge John Manning Regan ordered him held without bail. A preliminary hearing was scheduled for Wednesday.

Shawcross was also charged with one count of patronizing a prostitute.

Officials charge 13 with death of 5 found at commune leader's farm

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Thirteen former members of a religious commune have been charged with murder or conspiracy after the bodies of a family of five were found buried at an Ohio farm rented by the group's leader.

Seven of those charged were arrested in the Kansas City area by Friday afternoon, said George Rodriguez of the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms in Kansas City. Six others were being sought.

"Two of those arrested have confessed to their participation in the mass murders," Rodriguez said at a news conference. He said authorities have a motive but would not disclose it.

The Cleveland Plain Dealer, quoting unnamed police sources, said the five may have been killed as part of a religious sacrifice. Rodriguez said federal authorities would not comment on that report for fear of prejudicing juries.

No federal charges were filed in the case, and Rodriguez said the defendants will be extradited to Ohio to face state charges.

The bodies were found Wednesday night and Thursday at a farm near Kirklind, Ohio, a suburb of

Cleveland near Lake Erie.

The dead were identified tentatively as Dennis Avry, 49; his wife, Cheryl, 42; and their three daughters, Trina, 13; Rebecca, 9; and Karen, 5. Rodriguez said the family, originally from Independence, had lived off and on at Lundgren's farm in Ohio and were killed sometime in mid-April.

Rodriguez said the Avryes were members of a splinter religious group led by Jeffrey Lundgren, a former lay minister of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, which is based in Independence.

Authorities would not say how they had been killed.

The Plain Dealer quoted a police source as saying cult members had to perform a sacrifice before traveling west "where they would be cleansed and could search for a 'golden sword'" which was not further characterized. A neighbor said the group apparently left the farm in April, or about the time the Avryes were believed to have been killed.

Lundgren, 39, and his wife, Alice, 38, were among those charged and were being sought Friday. Lundgren was charged with five counts of aggravated murder, and his wife was

charged with five counts of conspiracy to commit aggravated murder.

Dave True, a spokesman for the ATF in Kansas City, said Lundgren was thought to be somewhere in Missouri.

Most of those charged, including the Lundgrens, were originally from the Kansas City area and members of Lundgren's church.

Lundgren left the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints in 1988 after his ministry credentials were revoked and formed his own religious group, said Dale Luffman, president of the northeast Ohio chapter of the RLDS. The RLDS is separate from the Salt Lake City-based Mormon Church, or Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, though they share some beliefs.

The new splinter group apparently disbanded late in December after members became disgruntled over "sexual indiscretions," according to a report Friday in The Kansas City Times.

An ATF agent received a tip about the bodies Dec. 31 from someone who was not part of the commune. The agent notified Ohio authorities, Rodriguez said.

AIDS 'cousins' common in prostitutes

CHICAGO (AP) — Two distant cousins of the AIDS virus that usually are carried by drug users are also fairly common among female prostitutes, say researchers who interviewed and tested more than 1,300 prostitutes.

The study released Thursday, done by researchers at the federal Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, expands the groups considered at risk for the viruses and further underscores the importance of public-health efforts to prevent their spread, said Ivin Chen, an outside expert who also has done research on the viruses.

The viruses, called HTLV-I and HTLV-II, are transmitted much like the AIDS virus: through shared hypodermic needles, sexual intercourse and from infected mothers to their babies.

Quavle to mend Latin America fences

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush said Friday he will dispatch Vice President Dan Quayle on a fence-mending trip throughout Latin America in an effort to counter negative reaction to the U.S. military invasion of Panama.

"To some degree I am concerned," about that reaction, Bush told a White House news conference. "Because I am well aware of how our friends south of our border, including my friend President (Carlos) Salinas (of Mexico) look at the use of American force anywhere. So I am concerned about it."

Keating denies using S&L for own gain

WASHINGTON (AP) — Phoenix millionaire Charles H. Keating Jr. on Friday denied "with all my heart and soul" that he used a tax-sharing arrangement at his Lincoln Savings and Loan Association to siphon off \$94 million.

The arrangement between the now-collapsed Irvine, Calif., thrift and its holding company, American Continental Corp., is a centerpiece of regulators' contention that Keating was illegally using Lincoln as a "piggybank" for his massive real estate ventures.

Artificial heart recipient dies at 57

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The nation's longest surviving artificial heart patient died Friday in St. Louis, less than four months after undergoing a second heart transplant, doctors said.

Carolyn Stadler, 57, of St. Charles, who survived with the Jarvik-7 artificial heart for 440 days before a donor heart was found, suffered cardiac arrest Friday morning, said Stephanie Farrar, a spokeswoman for St. Louis University Hospital.

Mrs. Stadler, who originally was diagnosed with a degenerative heart condition called idiopathic cardiomyopathy, received her first heart transplant June 30, 1988. Her body rejected the heart and it was replaced with the Jarvik-7 on July 6, 1988.

Madam wants to go free for help

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A madam who admits furnishing call girls to wealthy clients shouldn't be prosecuted because she helped police track down a terrorist and reported on drug and sex criminals, her lawyer said Friday.

Elizabeth Adams claims she and police had an arrangement by which they would ignore her business if she supplied law enforcement with valued information garnered from clients through "pillow talk."

Argentine caught exporting computers

MIAMI (AP) — An Argentine was placed on probation for two years Friday for conspiring to export an IBM computer system valued at \$500,000 in violation of export control laws.

Jorge Stein, 34, of Buenos Aires was charged in October 1989 with attempting to export the computer system to Bulgaria after shipping it through France.

Stein pleaded guilty to the conspiracy charge. A Miami company, Dinoral Corp., which also entered a guilty plea in the case, was fined \$20,000.

Stuart was only 'routine' suspect in wife's shooting

BOSTON (AP) — The man who said he used police with his car phone and said a black robber had abducted and shot him and his pregnant wife was only a routine suspect in the case until his own brother gave police evidence of an elaborate, grisly hoax, officials said Friday.

Charles Stuart killed himself Thursday after learning his brother had revealed evidence against him in the Oct. 23 killing of his wife, Carol. Stuart had been seriously wounded himself. While hospitalized he wrote a moving letter to be read at his wife's funeral. Then he made a dramatic appearance at the deathbed of his newborn son, who was delivered by section, after the shootings and died 17 days later. And he gave a description of a black man as the killer.

"He thought he had the perfect crime ... the eulogy at his funeral that he had a friend read ... This guy had a perfect crime," said Reading Police Chief Edward Marland. Paul Leary, first assistant Suffolk County district attorney, said although there were some apparent discrepancies in Stuart's account, investigators felt they were not significant enough to pursue. He would not elaborate, citing a grand jury investigation.

But Leary said Stuart was a routine suspect from the beginning because investigators always checked out husbands when wives are killed.

"No one was ruled out," Leary said. "I am told (investigators) checked out that which was at the crime scene and also went back into the personal lives of these individuals and found that they were something just short of a storybook-type couple, according to relatives on both sides of the family."

John Dawley, who had served as Stuart's lawyer, said that until this week's developments in the case, he "had no reason to believe this was anything but a random act of violence."

Jack Levin, a professor at Northeastern University and expert on crime, said if Stuart was his wife's killer, the crime was so premeditated and elaborate it could

only be the work of a sociopath — "the last people you expect. We're talking about the cream-of-the-crop in killing."

The scales tipped when Stuart's brother, Matthew, 23, went to police Wednesday.

The younger Stuart told police his brother asked him to meet him the evening of Oct. 23 in the city's

Mission Hill area, which is where the shooting took place, said Matthew's attorney, John Perenyi.

The Stuarts had been at a hospital for birthing classes. Stuart told police a gunman forced them to drive to the Mission Hill area and robbed and shot them. When police found them, Mrs. Stuart was near death in the passenger's seat.
