Tiny helicopter crashes near Hansen, claims life of Twin Falls man

HANSEN - Emergency crews fought a desperate battle to revive a Twin Falls man in a windswep field west of Hansen Thursday. But Coroner Cal Edwards said 39-year-old Preston Stanger had died instantly from massive chest injuries when his tiny gyro-copter crashed just before 2 p.m. Clustered around the wreckage, emergency crews from Kimberly, Hansen and Twin Falls tried to resuscitate Stanger. Technicians applied cardio-pulmonary resuscitation, hooked up intravenous fluids and administered oxygen, while others worked to free his body. Efforts to revive him continued at the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, but his injuries were too extensive, Edwards said.

Stanger apparently took off in a single-seat gyro-copter from the driveway beside his parents' house near Hansen. He made a couple of turns above the field behind the house, said Jack Cooper of Hazelton, who works nearby and saw the small craft go down. "It looked like he was trying to land when the craft pitched up and rolled over," he said. From Cooper's vantage point it looked like "he came down upside-down," he said. Cooper is an emergency medical technician in Hazelton and was one of the first to arrive at the scene. He began resuscitation efforts. The gyro-copter is an "ultralight" helicopter-like craft lifted by helicopter blades, pushed by a smaller airplane propeller and steered by a rudder. Its triangular metal frame has three small wheels with a seat mounted in front of

the small motor. Sheriff Jim Munn said he didn't know whether the crash was caused by mechanical failure or "if the wind caught it." "It'll have to be looked at by an expert," Munn said. He said the National Transportation Safety Board would be contacted to investigate the accident. Stanger is survived by his widow, Ellen, their four children and his parents, Floyd and Nadine Stanger. Stanger, an avid outdoorsman, was born and raised in Hansen. He was a truck driver for Consolidated Freightways and a dealer for Air Command Gyroplane, Ellen Stanger said. The couple also ran a playground at their home, she said. "He loved farming, he loved the outdoors, he loved people, he loved life," his widow said.

'Independence' talk, warning for Lithuanians

VILNIUS, U.S.S.R. — Mikhail S. Gorbachev told independence-seeking Lithuanians Thursday that a faceoff with Moscow could lead to tragedy, but he also said a law is being prepared that would permit the republic to secede from the Soviet Union. "It was not clear from the Soviet president's comments how free Lithuania would be under the framework he envisions. About 300,000 Lithuanians jammed central Vilnius late Thursday in a candlelight demonstration for freedom at the conclusion of the first day of Gorbachev's three-day visit. "We have been tied together for these 50 years, whether we like it or not," Gorbachev told a crowd after placing a wreath at a monument to Vladimir Lenin. But he also told a meeting of Lithuanian intellectuals that "I am for self-determination all the way to secession," according to Lithuanian TV correspondent Eduardas Potesnikas. Lithuanians say they want to restore the independence they had between the world wars. Soviet dictator Josef Stalin absorbed Lithuania along with the two other Baltic states, Latvia and Estonia, in 1940

under a secret agreement with Nazi Germany. Lithuania, the southernmost of the Baltics, is about 600 miles west of Moscow. Gorbachev reiterated his opposition to the independence drive, which he has said could cause a breakup of the Soviet Union, but said he would not stand in the way of the Lithuanian people's will. He said he had ordered that a law be written and published establishing a mechanism for secession from the Soviet Union, a right guaranteed by the country's 1977 Constitution but not recognized to date. He did not spell out how the machinery for secession worked. In an interview with Britain's Independent Television News, Soviet Foreign Ministry spokesman Gennady I. Gerasimov confirmed Moscow was preparing the law. "You must think about the interests of the other party too, so there must be mechanism for divorce, so to say," the spokesman said from Vilnius, Lithuania's capital. The ITN reporter asked if the draft law meant a law of total independence. "We have an article in the Constitution. According to this article, every republic has the right to secession, to go away. The right is there," he said.

Most Americans didn't plan on jobs they hold

WASHINGTON — A majority of American workers are doing what they do for such reasons as simple chance or lack of choice, while just 41 percent hold jobs that they had planned, according to a poll released Thursday. The results indicate "that many people are trapped at less than they could do," said Sharon Danann, research director at a Cleveland-based group called 9 to 5: National Association of Working Women. "I don't think it bodes well. People aren't looking at their job as a life's development, as a way to grow," she said. "They're not dreaming of the stars." The survey of 1,350 people was conducted last October by the Gallup Organization for the National Occupational Information Coordinating Committee, a panel of job information. The poll, which asked a variety of job-related questions, had a margin of error of plus or minus 4 percentage points.

Other findings showed that about half of Americans say job stress affects their health, personal relationships or their ability to do their job; nearly one-third of the work force expects to change jobs within the next three years; and that 65 percent said that given a chance to start over, they would try to get more information about career options. While 41 percent of the employed respondents consciously chose their job—career, 18 percent got started in their present job through chance circumstances, 12 percent took the job only available and the rest were either influenced by friends or relatives. "There's a real dilemma, the labor market isn't matching up well with what people are trained to do," said Jim Green, a labor historian at the University of Massachusetts. He said the results may indicate that many people view their jobs as "necessary evils." Green and Ms. Danann said part

Tearful widow forgives husband's heroin supplier

HAILEY — The widow of a man who died from a heroin overdose tearfully testified Thursday that her life has been "devastated," but that she forgives the man who sold the heroin to her husband. "I've had to work on anger and forgiveness," Lynn Bishop said at a sentencing hearing for Steven Rosenberg. Looking directly at the man, Bishop continued, "I've had to forgive you, Steve, and I do." But Bishop's message — and testimony by Rosenberg, his friends and father that he is remorseful for mailing the heroin — did not pre-

vent a District Court judge from imposing a three- to nine-year sentence, a \$5,000 fine, and \$3,250 in court costs. Rosenberg, 37, lives in Hawaii but owns a house in Ketchum. He pleaded guilty in August to delivery of a controlled substance, heroin. A year ago, Rosenberg mailed about a gram of Persian heroin from Hawaii to a friend in Bellevue, Charles Klein. Klein died of a heroin overdose on Jan. 31, 1989. Next to his body, a Blaine County sheriff's deputy found a handwritten letter from Rosenberg, explaining to Klein how to smoke the "stuff." "I just don't think remorse is a strong enough word for how I feel," Rosenberg said.

Rosenberg will not go immediately to prison. Fifth District Judge George Granata Jr. attached a "rider" to the sentence: Rosenberg is to attend a drug-treatment program at the North Idaho Correctional Institution at Cottonwood, and if he receives favorable reviews after six months, Granata will consider placing Rosenberg on probation. Although delivery of heroin is punishable by life imprisonment under Idaho law, Rosenberg's attorney, George T. Davis of Hawaii, said a plea bargain stipulated that Blaine County Prosecutor Ned Williamson would ask for only a three-year fixed sentence and not file any manslaughter charges. • See DRUG on Page A2

FDA ban on using Jarvik heart could put brakes on research

WASHINGTON — The Food and Drug Administration's ban on use of the Jarvik artificial heart could slow research in the field but probably won't affect patients needing temporary implants, medical experts said Thursday. But a major user of the device said he might defy the ban. "The FDA, in a letter sent earlier this week and disclosed Wednesday, withdrew Symbion Inc.'s approval for continued investigational uses of its artificial heart, both as a permanent replacement and a temporary bridge for patients awaiting a human heart transplant. "By removing the Jarvik, you take the first and main artificial heart player out of the ballgame," said Dr. Jack Kolff, a professor of cardiac

surgery at Temple University in Philadelphia, whose father, Dr. Willem Kolff, developed the first artificial kidney in 1943. "That leaves a bit of a vacuum for those researchers who think there may be a future for an artificial heart," he said. Dr. Antonio Gotto, chief of internal medical services at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston and past president of the American Heart Association, said that because of the availability of alternative temporary heart-assist devices the FDA's action probably won't have an impact on heart patients. "But it does represent a setback in terms of time toward eventually get-

ting a completely implantable heart," he said. The Jarvik heart, named after its inventor, Dr. Robert Jarvik of Utah, gained household recognition after it was implanted in Barney Clark on Dec. 2, 1982. He lived 112 days, his new heart tethered to a bulky external power system, before he succumbed to multiple organ failure. Clark was the first to person to receive a permanent artificial heart. Several others since Clark received the artificial heart, but recipients have been plagued by blood clotting and strokes. In Tucson, Ariz., Dr. Jack Copeland, head of the heart transplant program at the University of Arizona, said the ban means he, and his staff could be faced with the

Abortion foes try 'moderate' tack as legislators convene

Anti-abortion groups intend to project a more moderate image this year as they lobby state legislatures after the aftermath of the Supreme Court's Webster decision. But they will face re-energized opposition, not just from pro-choice groups but from their own movement's hard-liners. With public opinion polls showing a majority of Americans in favor of legalized abortion, some anti-abortion groups have scaled back their goals to restrictions they believe are publicly acceptable. Those measures — including bills banning abortion as a form of birth control and requiring minors to get parents' permission for an abortion — will face legislators in most states when 1990 sessions begin this month. Virtually every legislature that is meeting this year will consider some form of abortion legislation, and it will be a major issue in many states, including

Alabama, Illinois, Maryland, Michigan, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Oklahoma, Rhode Island and Virginia. "This issue is the most controversial issue any legislature will deal with in the next decade," said Alabama state Sen. Chip Bailey, who opposes abortion. Alabama's legislature will consider two bills aimed at banning abortion as a means of birth control, but it legal only in certain cases. Anti-abortion groups already are battling over what those exceptions should be — one sign of a rift that seems to be growing. One group, Alabama Citizens for Life, supports a bill that would allow abortions in four instances: rape, incest, when a woman's life is in danger, or when a pregnancy would produce an infant with "profound or irremediable" deformities. But another group, the Alabama-Pro-Life Coalition, opposes abortion in cases involving defini-

Flooding eases over Northwest

ELMA, Wash. (AP) — Flood waters receded Thursday in parts of the Northwest, and thousands of people began returning home to contend with the damage caused by rain-swollen rivers.

Three people were killed in Washington state and millions of dollars of property damage occurred when rivers ran over their banks after four days of heavy rains. The rains slackened Wednesday and flood warnings remained Thursday on just three rivers: the Chehalis, White and Snohomish.

Oregon also sustained millions of dollars in damage and weather contributed to the deaths of three people. Residents along the northern Oregon coast were cleaning up damage from high winds and heavy rains.

Rain was forecast for Thursday night, but not as heavy as the earlier storms, the National Weather Service said. However, officials warned that high tides along the Washington coast could exacerbate flooding at Grays Harbor and on the lower Chehalis.

The Chehalis had the worst flooding, along with a tributary, the Skookumchuck, flooding scores of homes and much of the business district in Chinook, 80 miles south of Seattle. An estimated 3,000 of Lewis County's 57,000 residents were forced to leave their homes.

High water also closed Interstate 5 at Chehalis, 4 miles to the south,

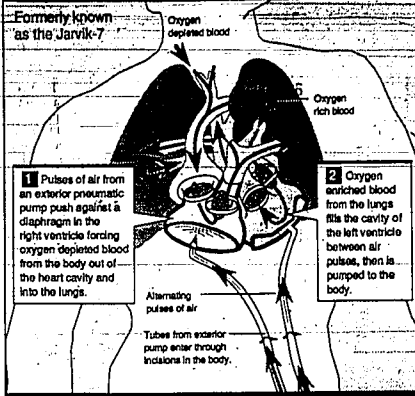
Wednesday morning. State officials said the water was receding on the freeway, but the main route between Portland, Ore., and Seattle remained closed.

The Chehalis' flood surge Thursday soaked the small towns of Oakville and Porter, about 20 miles southwest of Olympia, and was expected to reach Aberdeen and Grays Harbor on the Pacific coast Friday.

Oregon Gov. Neil Goldschmidt planned to tour his state's northern coast Friday. He declared a state of emergency in the two affected counties Tuesday.

Many of the 37 evacuees in Oregon's Clatsop and Tillamook counties began heading home.

Columbia closes in on quarry

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — The space shuttle Columbia gained on its quarry Thursday in its orbital pursuit of an 11-ton satellite that the astronauts hope to capture and remove from burning up in the atmosphere.

Commander Dan Brandenstein and pilot Jim Wetherbee fired the shuttle's orbital engines three times Thursday to put the shuttle on a near-collision course with the satellite they have been catching up with since liftoff Tuesday.

As the astronauts ended their workday Thursday afternoon, Columbia was 218 miles from its target and closing at a speed of about 24 miles per 91-minute orbit.

"Tomorrow's a big day, so get a good night's sleep tonight," said Jim Voss, the shuttle communicator at Mission Control.

"We had an excellent day and we're looking forward to tomorrow," replied mission specialist Bonnie Dunar.

When the shuttle was launched, it entered orbit 1,725 miles behind its quarry, but it has flown in a lower orbit than LDEF so it could circle the Earth faster and catch up with the satellite.

Eight more maneuvers were planned for early Friday before Brandenstein would assume manual control of the shuttle for the final approach to the Long Duration Exposure Facility, which is the size of a small school bus.

"The orbiter continues to perform very well, orbiter and crew," flight director Bill Reeves said during a press briefing late Thursday afternoon. "Everything is good for the rendezvous tomorrow."

Flight director Al Pennington said Thursday that when the shuttle is about 400 feet away from LDEF, the crew "will get a good look at the sides of it. At that point in time, he (Brandenstein) will have a good visual image of what he's going in for."

Once within range of the target, the plan was for the shuttle to fly in formation 35 feet from LDEF while Dunar uses the orbiter's 50-foot robot arm to reach out and grab the satellite, expected at 7:48 a.m. MST today.

"After snaring the satellite, she will turn the arm slowly for four hours so LDEF can be photographed.

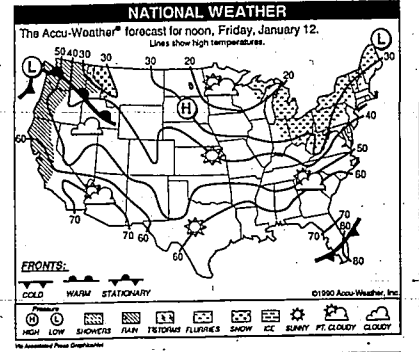

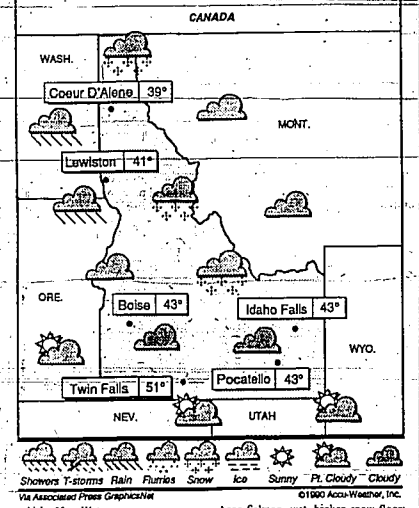

decision of "putting a device in anyway," either an artificial heart or related heart pumping helper, in a critically ill patient.

"And I think our decision right now would be to go ahead and use the device. ... We have good data, good statistics, we're happy with the way the devices have worked, we think we can save lives," Copeland told a news-conference at which he presented imminent candidate Paul Sicola, 48, of Old Bridge, N.J., who has been kept alive for 119 days with a ventricular assist device.

Sicola said he would advise FDA to "leave the system alone."

Copeland stirred controversy once before, using a different artificial heart without approval to keep a patient alive for 11 hours while he awaited a transplant. His team has used Symbion hearts in seven patients and assistance devices in 14.

The FDA said that during two inspections of the Tempe, Ariz.-based company's facilities last year, it had found "some serious deficiencies" in manufacturing quality control, monitoring of research sites, servicing of equipment, training of personnel and reporting of adverse reactions to FDA.

"The agency felt the deficiencies were great enough that risks to patients were outweighing benefits," said FDA spokesman Jeff Nesbit.

He said the letter was sent Monday.

Symbion issued a statement saying it had received the FDA notice and would "release further information at the appropriate time."

Dr. Donald Olsen, director of the University of Utah's Institute for Biomedical Engineering, said he was "surprised and disappointed" by the FDA's action and hoped it would not hurt future federal funding of artificial heart research in general, particularly for totally implantable devices.

The permanent Jarvik heart consists of a first-stage pump that is implanted into the chest and which is attached to two plastic tubes connected to a compressed-air power system contained in a large cart.

mities. Legislators are caught in the middle — and not happy to be there. If I had any advice, I'd say to the people interested in this to get together and decide on legislation that might get through the legislature," said House Judiciary Committee Chairman G.J. "Dutch" Higenbotham.

The Alabama split mirrors a national debate about the direction of the anti-abortion movement, which has been stung by a strong pro-choice backlash in the six months since the Supreme Court upheld Missouri's abortion law.

Some groups remain zealously committed to fighting abortion in all forms, while others, such as the National Right to Life Committee, are now willing to compromise.

More medical anti-abortion groups believe there can be no compromise in an issue with such strong religious and moral overtones.

Pro-choice advocates tend to dismiss such distinctions, and recoil at the notion of "moderate" anti-abortion legislation.

To strike back, pro-choice advocates are proposing legislation in at least five states, Illinois, Michigan, Maryland, New Hampshire and Ohio, that would guarantee a woman's right to an abortion.

They also are taking the battle to court, and won an early victory Thursday when a federal judge blocked sections of Pennsylvania's tough new abortion law from going into effect. Those sections require women to notify their husbands and wait 24 hours before having abortions.

Most of the action around the country is being propelled by the anti-abortion movement, however.

of the reason people are in jobs they never planned is because most new hiring created are in the service industry.

"Those are dead-end, nowhere jobs. That's the opposite of what we need right now. All the predictions (for the 1990s) are for higher skills, sharp-as-a-tackles. We need jobs that we can really throw ourselves into," Ms. Danann said.

Juliette Lester, executive director of the committee that had the poll conducted, said those results demonstrate the need for government and job counselors to improve the way they educate the public about career options.

She said only 21 percent of those without a high school degree had planned their jobs and 25 percent of that group had taken the only jobs they could find.

In a separate finding, 25 percent of employed adults who responded said job stress or pressure had interfered with their off-the-job relationships, 20 percent said it had affected their physical health and 20 percent said it had affected their ability to do their job.

But responding to the same question, 48 percent reported little or no job stress over the past year. The total exceeded 100 percent because of multiple responses.

Ms. Danann said more Americans are probably suffering from job-related stress than admit it.

"There's lots of people who probably don't realize that's what it is, that their job is full of interruptions, or that they have multiple bosses telling them it's priority work, and that it's driving them nuts," she said.

Davin, who defended television evangelist Jim Bakker this fall on wire fraud charges, and associate counsel James Risch of Boise sought probation for Rosenberg. The defendant told the court Thursday that he has begun treatment for his drug addiction and would like to talk to school children about the destructive ramifications of using drugs.

Dressed in a dark blue suit and looking tanned, Rosenberg told the court that he began smoking marijuana at age 19, then tried LSD and cocaine. At age 25, he said, he began smoking heroin, which he said he would use "three or four days, a couple of times a year."

But Rosenberg, dark-haired with graying temples, said he hasn't

touched any drugs since he was arrested. A father of a 5- and 7-year-old, Rosenberg described an alcoholic wife whose drinking in the past year has been "out of control." In asking for probation, he said he didn't want to leave the children in her care.

But Lynn Bishop, who was separated from Klein when he died, reminded the court that despite Rosenberg's remorse, many suffered from his mother's death.

"It's been the most difficult thing I've ever gone through," she said, testifying for the prosecution.

Davis said he will not appeal the sentence because he believes Rosenberg will be granted probation after the six-month treatment period.

Bush objects to Social Security tax cut

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration found itself arguing against a politically appealing tax cut Thursday as it denounced a proposed rollback of Social Security payroll taxes as a Democratic ploy to "fiddle around" with the nation's retirement system.

Presidential press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said the administration opposes a plan by Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., to repeal this year's Social Security tax hike and to further cut the rate next Jan. 1.

"Mr. Moynihan's got a lot of ideas, and we'll let the Democrats have those ideas," Fitzwater said.

Bush's "no-new-taxes" philosophy does not apply to the Social Security tax increases, which were scheduled to take place anyway, administration officials said.

Moynihan's plan, which is fast gaining support from business and conservative groups, would cancel the Jan. 1 increase that raised the Social Security tax rate to 7.65 percent from 7.51 percent.

FCC to study cable monopoly rules

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cable television may need competition at the local level, the Federal Communications Commission said Thursday in deciding to study possible changes in rules that allow just one cable system in most communities.

The commission, in a 4-0 vote, said the study of competition in the cable industry was required by "changed circumstances in the video marketplace" since Congress passed the 1984 Cable Act.

The act said there need be only one cable system in any community served by three or more broadcast stations. That, plus local franchise agreements that would be unaffected by changes in FCC rules, has meant most communities now have only one cable system.

So many customers have subscribed to cable that it now is the primary way viewers watch television in the United States. Consumer-interest groups and critics in Congress worry about cable's increasing power in the marketplace, while customers increasingly complain of high prices but poor service.

Arsonists attack 5 black congregations

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Five fires in west side churches that have predominantly black congregations were the work of arsonists, but no motive has been established, investigators say.

"In a couple of cases, a flammable liquid was used to get it started. In the others, some scraps of wood and paper were set," Fire Department Capt. Mike Brown said Tuesday.

"At this point, we have no reason to believe this is anything but random acts of vandalism," Brown said.

Not everyone shares that theory. "If it's random vandalism, then why aren't white churches burning?" asked Mattie Jones, a member of the Louisville-based Kentucky Alliance against Racism and Repression.

Cause of sickness eludes scientists

ATLANTA (AP) — Federal scientists are not sure, despite two months of investigation, why more than 1,000 people have gotten sick after taking the health food supplement L-tryptophan.

"In a couple of cases, a flammable liquid was used to get it started. In the others, some scraps of wood and paper were set," Fire Department Capt. Mike Brown said Tuesday.

Within weeks of those reports, cases were spotted in 49 states, all but Alaska. As of Tuesday, 1,046 had been reported to the Centers for Disease Control. One fatality has been confirmed, and at least six more deaths are believed linked to L-tryptophan.

Portugal, U.S. discuss Angolan fighting

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush and Portugal's prime minister, Anibal Cavaco Silva, discussed prospects Thursday for ending the fighting in Angola, but "didn't agree on absolutely every point," an administration official said.

Assistant Secretary of State Raymond Seitz refused repeatedly to say where the president and prime minister differed on developments in the former Portuguese colony.

Cheney: Pentagon reform will save billions

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Dick Cheney, attempting to cleanse the Pentagon of the specter of bloated budgets and "\$600 toilet seats," predicted Thursday he'll save \$39 billion and cut 42,000 jobs by trimming the department's massive purchasing bureaucracy over the next five years.

"Real changes are being made... that we believe will improve Pentagon management and help make it possible for us to buy what we need at lower cost, in less time and with greater assurance of quality," Cheney told reporters as he offered a six-month update on efforts to restructure purchasing systems.

He had few details to offer, however, saying precise plans must

await the release of the President Bush's fiscal 1991 budget later this month.

Asked about the possibility of additional base closures, Cheney said the budget will include "extensive" closures to aid his overall cost-cutting effort. When asked to define "extensive," the secretary quipped, "more than two."

Bush asked Cheney to undertake the reform effort as part of a major review spurred by weapons procurement scandals that rocked the

defense establishment. Cheney also has been eager in the face of congressional budget-cutting pressures to show that he is working to pare down the military's fiscal hangers.

When Cheney first undertook the purchasing reforms, some members of Congress complained that the effort wasn't deep enough to radically reform the system.

Their opinions apparently hadn't changed Thursday.

On Capitol Hill, Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, charged that Cheney's defense management review "offers no blueprint for implementation."

Attached to his statement was a

copy of a two-page letter to Cheney, dated Tuesday, in which leading members of the House and Senate Armed Services committees expressed concerns that "effective implementation of (of reform) recommendations will be difficult."

"The Defense Department needs to take these efforts the one necessary step further and formulate a plan of action to put these recommendations into practice," the lawmakers wrote.

Cheney said that the job of reforming the department's purchasing bureaucracy is difficult, as well as changing the public image created by procurement scandals that disclosed high-priced purchases of such items as hammers and coffee pots.

126 counties lose federal aid for homeless

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some 126 counties — including three from Idaho — that got aid for the homeless last year through a program created by Congress have been dropped for 1990.

They include 20 with double-digit unemployment and one with a poverty rate of 42.7 percent.

Among those dropped were Bannock, Bonner and Nez Perce in Idaho.

Advocates for the homeless, as well as local officials in the 30 states hit by the cutoff, are protesting. But program administrators say they are merely fulfilling a mandate to target the aid to the nation's worst-off areas.

Congress didn't cut funds for the \$124.9 million Emergency Food and Shelter National Program. The 126 jurisdictions lost out when they fell below eligibility levels for local poverty, unemployment or the size of the overall labor force. Some may still get limited grants from a separate fund set aside for underfunded areas.

Twenty-eight new counties became eligible this year.

The rejected counties are as large as Oklahoma's Tulsa County, including the city of Tulsa, and as small as Madison Parish, La.

Madison has unemployment and poverty rates of 16 percent and 42.7 percent respectively. But the parish, which got \$22,000 in 1989, lost its eligibility because it had fewer than the required total of 1,000 people unemployed, according to the program's figures.

The United Way was no happier in the urban county of Tulsa, where officials complained to federal administrators in a Nov. 30 letter: "While on the face of it, this (denial) would seem to be a positive reflection of an improving local economy, nothing could be further from the truth."

Program staff director Wylie B. Cooper said in an interview, "Communities change in what's happening. Last year, Texas was incredibly hard hit, and this year it is beginning to recover. That happens all over the country because the money is designated for the most

critical need areas."

But Jim Cieciar of Tulsa's United Way said there have been new job layoffs in his area.

The national program's Cooper said the system was designed "to supplement and extend" efforts on behalf of the homeless and that the government cannot guarantee funding to individual counties beyond one year.

"The flip side of predictability is being unable to respond to change," Cooper said.

But Rep. Paul Kanjorski, D-Pa., said, "You don't suddenly become a non-needy area. There ought to be a way to come down slowly."

Grant money may be used to buy and distribute food, run homeless shelters, assist with mortgages-or-help the poor pay energy bills. Counties don't apply for grants. Rather, they are told if the formula qualifies them for money, and then must come up with a spending plan.

This year, 882 counties automatically qualified for aid compared with 980 in 1989, said program aide Sharon Baibley.

The National Alliance to End Homelessness, a private research and assistance group, estimates as many as 2 million people are homeless for at least a portion of the year, and says the number seems to be growing.

Cooper said the rule would be reversed if the national board determines at its Jan. 19 meeting that it is unfairly preventing needy counties from obtaining funding.

Madison, Luzerne and the other counties and parishes may still get aid from set-aside funds, although probably not as much as last year.

HUD revamps to cut waste

WASHINGTON (AP) — Housing and Urban Development Secretary Jack Kemp announced plans Thursday to revamp his department's financial management to "guarantee that the day of abuse, waste, fraud and lack of accountability is over once and for all."

Kemp said he is beginning a nationwide search, led by leading figures in the accounting profession, to consider applicants for the new position of chief financial officer of the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

He said the non-partisan search team also will recommend candidates to serve as comptrollers in the department's five major divisions: Housing, Community

Development and Planning, Public and Indian Housing, Government National Mortgage Association, and Administration.

All six of the new officials will be required to be certified public accountants, Kemp said.

Kemp made his announcement at a luncheon meeting of the Association of Government Accountants, pledging to "seek the best men and women from every sector."

Most Americans favor term limit for legislators

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than two-thirds of Americans surveyed said they "favor a constitutional limitation on the number of years a person can serve in Congress, according to a Gallup survey released Thursday.

The poll, conducted for the National Federation of Independent Business, found 70 percent of respondents favored in general a limitation on House and Senate members, while 28 percent opposed, and 2 percent had no opinion.

Asked if they would support establishing a 12-year limit on service in the House and Senate, 58 percent said yes and 40 percent opposed.

The National Federation of Independent Businesses, an association of small business owners, also had the Gallup Organization Inc. put the questions to members of Congress. It reported surveying 158 Congress members, and finding 73 percent opposed and 23 percent favored a 12-year limitation.

It surveyed 21 of 100 senators and found 52 percent favored a limitation and 48 percent opposed — but the Gallup Organization said it surveyed too few for the results to be considered a reliable reflection of Senate opinion.

Changes in retail buying may spell doom of some chains

This is the current state of the store: Glitzy Bloomingdale's got so strapped for cash last year, some designers complained they were not being paid and cut off further shipments; meanwhile, the decidedly downscale Wal-Mart continued to make its owners one of the richest men in America. Retail is becoming a tale of two worlds—the best of times for the tube-socks-and-Maybelline purveyors like Wal-Mart, the worst of times for some of the high-end chic-meisters like Blooming's.

Indeed, the air in department stores today is filled with more than sprays of scent from those perfume guerrillas who ambush you with samples.

You can practically smell the desperation even though you seem to be on sale; they cannot get rid of the stuff fast enough.

But at least those stores are still open, unlike Altman's in New York and, soon, Hutzler's in Baltimore, which are joining the ghosts of retailers past.

And those stores that have not closed are, appropriately enough, for sale.

Some of the nation's premier stores, including Blooming's, Saks Fifth Avenue, Bonwit Teller, Chicago's Marshall Field's and Houston's Sakowitz, are on the block. The nation's retailers are in a wavering, uncertain state of flux.

There are several things going on here—the changing (dying?) nature of America's downtowns, for one, has slowly eroded the center role that those once-grand cathedrals of consumerism played.

The downtown department store, where you bought your graduation dress, where your grandmother bought you tea room lunches, has given way to a diaspora of antiseptic suburban malls with their tiresomely cute boutiques and McFood courts.

And now we are reaching critical mass—there are just too many malls, too little time.

It is hard to pinpoint when it all started to seem obscene.

Maybe it was Godiva chocolates, or designer dresses that cost a week's paycheck, or BMWs with sticker prices rivaling the gross national product of some Third World countries.

Whatever it was, it led to what the economic types call "consumer resistance."

Meaning we said, no, thank you, and walked out without buying anything.

That was a switch from the '70s, when ever-rising inflation meant that we paid the asking price because next year it would be higher.

And while this resistance was felt in many aspects of buying—note that we now keep cars seven years on the average, compared with the 5½ years in 1985—perhaps the hardest hit were the clothing stores.

The case study that master's of business administration candidates of the future will furrow brows over is the 1987 debacle of the minkist.

The designers ruled the mill was back; the stores stocked them to the hilt... and the customers left them to languish on the racks.

Talk about miscalculating your market. The knee-baring that was perfectly acceptable when you were in your teens or 20s and rebelling against the establishment was ridiculous two decades later when you were a professional or a mother or, horrors, part of the establishment itself.

So now they have come up with another gimmick:

The basics are back. (If, indeed, they ever left.) The white T-shirt. The non-stonewashed jeans. The flat shoes.

And, in fact, the back-to-basics theme has become a selling point at stores like The Gap, which based an entire, and very successful, advertising campaign on the

glamour of the plain.

But it is too soon to spread rumors about the demise of the upscale department store, and the Darwin law will take over—the fittest will survive.

There are a couple of things going on here—the move toward smaller stores with a single focus, the trend in department stores toward stocking more conservative, less risky clothes.

As a result, some retailers no doubt will get caught in the evolutionary process and make like the dinosaurs.

They will go extinct, because, after all, how many stores do you really need?

As comedian Steve Wright says: "You can't have everything. Where would you put it?"

Environmental cares a '90s growth industry

Look around to the smog, the jagged Hinkley slays of solid waste and the hungry CFCs munching on the ozone layer and, all of a sudden, the phrase "a good environment for business" takes on a whole new meaning. The 1980s had entrepreneurs; the 1990s will have copreneurs.

The environmental and ecology movements have long had their articulate and charismatic visionaries—the Rachel Carson, the Amory Lovinses, the Paul Ehrlichs, and the rest.

What these movements have been missing, however, are visionaries with a feel for markets and technologies along with the ability to translate ecological ideals into economic realities. There is not yet a Steven P. Jobs or a H. Ross Perot of the environment—an ecopreneur who can simultaneously excite both the media and the marketplace. But there will be.

To be sure, an ever-evolving web of government regulation is spinning an infrastructure that encourages ecopreneurial investment and innovation.

Environmental quality standards create market opportunities even as they address ecological concerns.

Nevertheless, these standards don't reflect a "no growth" mentality as much as they do an emerging consensus that we'd be smarter to help manage the environment than ignore it. Building those management tools and technologies represents a chance to build a new global industry.

That's one reason why venture capital—normally the source of seed funding for high-tech ventures such as genetic engineering and silicon chip design—is beginning to spill into the environment.

"You go where the waste is," says Oliver Nicklin, managing partner of the Chicago-based Environmental Venture Fund, a 2-year-old, \$40 million venture capital fund that Nicklin claims is the first focusing purely on ecopreneurial opportunities. "It's almost a bit of a perpetual growth industry."

Where venture capitalists once thought ecopreneurialism a crazy idea, Nicklin reports that today he is invited to speak at industry functions, and some of the most

prestigious names in venture capital now invest in his fund's deals. "Estimates are that this industry is anywhere from \$40 billion to \$60 billion in size and growing," he says. "You can make a lot of money if you have even a small piece of that."

Browning-Feris recently launched a medical waste division that grew from "zero to a \$100 million business in less than 24 months," says corporate head William Ruckelshaus, who stresses that there are numerous opportunities for both market segmentation and technology application in the waste management field.

He sees an increasing role for genetically engineered waste-gobbling microorganisms in the "bioremediation" of waste products.

Similarly, "if someone came up with a viable substitute for CFCs (the refrigerant chemical that has been linked to ozone depletion) that would be a huge market and if acid rain legislation passes, that also creates enormous economic opportunities."

In the same way that genetic engineering technology has created a fundamental discontinuity in the agricultural and medical industries, this new Greening of America creates a fundamental discontinuity in public attitudes that makes a fast-growth ecopreneurial industry a genuine probability.

Yes, there are established businesses such as Browning-Feris and Waste Management, but with the shifts and swirls in attitudes, legislation and technologies—not to mention the influx of risk capital—today's status quo doesn't stand a chance.

The Apple Computers, Genentech and Federal Expresses of the environment are likely to be born in this decade; the children of 1960's idealism and 1980's Greed. That's not a bad pedigree at all, especially if it helps us breathe easier. Trend isn't destiny—but this time, we better hope it is.

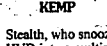
As an old NFL quarterback, Kemp must have caused mini-riots in Buffalo Bills' huddles ("Jeez, Jack, shut up and call the play.")

You may think this is not your problem. When it is someone you love in need of emergency flights or a transplant, it will be. This is the time to make your legislators listen. If you have had a transplant patient in your family or a friend in medical crisis, call or write your legislators and the governor today.

In the past year, the Magic Valley Children's Medical Fund has been contacted by six transplant families and two emergency flights.

This crisis is nothing new to us: We have been handling calls from across the state for seven years.

E: German leader plans security force

EAST BERLIN (AP) — Communist Premier Hans Modrow on Thursday defended his plan for a new internal security force and tried to quell growing dissent by indicating the opposition could have a part in his government.

Thousands of people formed a human chain around Parliament after Modrow's speech to legislators, and a non-Communist partner in the coalition government repeated threats to quit the Cabinet.

An independent trade union movement threatened to call a nationwide strike Jan. 25 if Modrow fails to prove the state secret police force has been dissolved.

In a nearly 90-minute speech before the national Parliament, Modrow defended his authority and appealed for national unity to fight the economic and political problems threatening his shaky government, which came to power after the fall pro-democracy movement.

"I cannot recall becoming premier through a coup," he said. Modrow did not rule out the resignation of his transitional government for "compelling reasons" but said he expected it to last until nationwide elections planned May 6.

Medellin murder toll passes 4,000

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — A record 4,015 murders were committed in the cocaine capital of Medellin in 1989, authorities said Thursday.

Colombia's efforts to fight the traffickers gained a boost with the Defense Ministry reporting delivery of seven more U.S. helicopters, part of a \$60 million aid package. So far, 19 helicopters have been delivered.

The city morgue in Medellin said murders increased last year to 4,015 from 3,299 in 1988, a rise of 22 percent.

Gunfire caused 3,546 of the deaths, said Cesar Augusto Giraldo, the head of the morgue. He said he does not break down the deaths according to types of violence and could not say how many were drug-related.

New president meets foreign minister

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — The new president on Thursday decreed prison terms for those who stole relief goods, and he met with the French foreign minister — the first such Western official to visit Romania since its popular revolution.

A senior official also said that 10,000 people died in the revolt that toppled dictator Nicolae Ceausescu. President Ion Iliescu has declared Friday a day of mourning in Romania for those who died.

The French official, Roland Dumas, conveyed a message from French President Francois Mitterrand pledging support for the "consolidation of the conquests of the popular revolution and for political stability," the official Rempres news agency said.

At a later news conference, Dumas said projects under discussion included a development bank and health-related programs, but declined to elaborate.

Fallen Bulgarian leader faces charges

SOFIA, Bulgaria (AP) — Ousted Communist leader Todor Zhivkov is likely to face charges of abuse of power, fraud and violating human rights, a member of a parliamentary commission said Thursday.

The inquiry might stop short, however, of unearthing irregularities by Communists still in power, said Petar Beron, a commission member and pro-democracy activist.

"It's not an easy job," Beron said, because some of Zhivkov's associates "are still very much at large."

He said the commission was also looking into "the drainage of public money" by Zhivkov.

Saudis deny holding political prisoners

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (AP) — Officials Thursday rejected an Amnesty International report charging the government has detained and tortured hundreds of political opponents, and they denied the kingdom holds political prisoners.

A high-ranking government official said the report did not take into account that Saudi Arabia follows Islamic law.

In a document released Thursday in London, the human rights group said more than 700 people were detained in Saudi Arabia without trial between 1983 and 1989, most of them Shiite Muslims.

Panther sparks animal control demands

ROME (AP) — Demands for controls over ownership of exotic animals escalated Thursday after a mysterious black panther eluded a dragnet on the outskirts of Rome.

Newspapers published grainy photos of a black animal running in a wooded area Wednesday in what they said was the eighth sighting of the panther since Dec. 27.

Police and forest rangers equipped with nets went to the area on the northern edge of the capital but the panther escaped into the woods.

President helps level Noriega defense HQ

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP) — President Guillermo Endara and Vice President Ricardo Arias Calderon began demolishing Panama's old Defense Forces headquarters Thursday, swinging sledgehammers at what they called the core of the Noriega dictatorship.

The building is to be replaced by Democracy Plaza and part of a housing project for poor families whose homes were destroyed in the Dec. 20 U.S. invasion that ousted Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega from power.

"From the ashes of militarism, a new era is born in which the state is for the well-being of the people," Endara said.

The top officials of the new civilian government bashed away at a small wall until it was destroyed, kicking off demolition of a square block of buildings. However, plans

to dynamite some of the buildings Thursday afternoon were postponed because there were too many people in the area.

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Tons of papers litter the floors of the two-story building, its remains looted by hundreds of Panamanians earlier in the week.

Changes in retail buying may spell doom of some chains

This is the current state of the store: Gilzly Bloomingdale's got so strapped for cash this year, some designers complained they were not being paid and cut off further shipments; meanwhile, the decidedly downscale Wal-Mart continued to make its owner one of the richest men in America.

Retail is becoming a tale of two worlds—the best of times for the tube-socks-and-Maybelline purveyors like Wal-Mart, the worst of times for some of the high-end chic designers like Bloomingdale's.

Indeed, the air in department stores today is filled with more than sprays of scent from those perfume guerrillas who ambush you with samples.

You can practically smell the desperation — everything seems to be on sale; they cannot get rid of the stuff fast enough.

But at least those stores are still open, unlike Almay's in New York and, soon, Hilder's in Baltimore, which are joining the ghosts of retailers past.

And those stores that have not closed are, appropriately enough, for sale.

Some of the nation's premier stores, including Bloomingdale's, Saks Fifth Avenue, Bonwit Teller, Chicago's Marshall Field's and Houston's Sakowitz, are on the block. The nation's retailers are in a wavering, uncertain state of flux.

There are several things going on here — the changing (dying?) nature of America's downtowns, for one, has slowly eroded the central role that those once-glamorous cathedrals of consumerism played.

The downtown department store, where you bought your graduation dress, where your grandmother bought you tea room lunches, has given way to a diaspora of antiseptic suburban malls with their irresistibly cute boutiques and McFood courts.

And now we are reaching critical mass — there are just too many malls, too little time.

It is hard to pinpoint when it all started to seem obscene.

Maybe it was Godiva chocolates, or designer dresses that cost a week's paycheck, or BMWs with sticker prices rivaling the gross national product of some Third World countries.

Whatever it was, it led to what the economic types call "consumer resistance."

Meaning we said, no, thank you, and walked out without buying anything.

That was a switch from the '70s, when ever-rising inflation meant that we paid the asking price because next year it would be higher.

And while this resistance was felt in many aspects of buying — note that we now keep cars seven years on the average, compared with the 5 1/2 years in 1985 — perhaps the hardest hit were the clothing stores.

The case study that master's of business administration candidates of the future will furrow brows over is the 1987 debacle of the miniskirt.

The designers ruled the mini was back, the stores stocked them to the hilt... and the customers left them to languish on the racks.

The knee-baring that was perfectly acceptable when you were in your teens or 20s and rebelling against the establishment was ridiculous two decades later when you were a professional or a mother or, horrors, part of the establishment itself.

So now they have come up with another gimmick:

...The basics are back. (If, indeed, they ever left.) The white T-shirt. The non-stonewashed jeans. The flat shoes.

And, in fact, the back-to-basics theme has become a selling point at stores like The Gap, which based an entire, and very successful, advertising campaign on the

glamour of the plain.

But it is too soon to spread rumors about the demise of the upscale department store. Rather, it seems the ranks will thin out and the Darwin law will take over — the fittest will survive.

There are a couple of things going on here — the move toward smaller stores with a single focus, the trend in department stores toward stocking more conservative, less risky clothes.

As a result, some retailers no doubt will get caught in the evolutionary process and make like the dinosaurs.

They will go extinct, because, after all, how many stores do you really need?

Environmental cares a '90s growth industry

Look around to the smog, the jagged Himalayas of solid waste and the hungry CFCs munching on the ozone layer and, all of a sudden, the phrase "a good environment for business" takes on a whole new meaning. The 1980s had entrepreneurs; the 1990s will have entrepreneurs.

The environmental and ecology movements have long had their articulate and charismatic visionaries — the Rachel Carsons, the Amory Lovinses, the Paul Ehrlichs, etc.

What these movements have been missing, however, are visionaries with a feel for markets and technologies along with the ability to translate ecological ideals into economic realities. There is not yet a Steven P. Jobs or a H. Ross Perot of the environment — an entrepreneur who can simultaneously excite both the media and the marketplace. But there will be.

To be sure, an ever-evolving web of government regulation is spinning an infrastructure that encourages entrepreneurial investment and innovation.

Environmental quality standards create market opportunities even as they address ecological concerns.

Nevertheless, these standards don't reflect a "no growth" mentality as much as they do an emerging consensus that we'd be smarter to help manage the environment than ignore it. Building those management tools and technologies represents a chance to build a new global industry.

prestigious names in venture capital now converge in his fund's deals. "Estimates are that this industry is anywhere from \$40 billion to \$60 billion in size and growing," he says. "You can make a lot of money if you have even a small piece of that."

Browning-Ferris recently launched a medical waste division that grew from "zero to a \$100 million business in less than 24 months," says corporate head William Ruckelshaus, who stresses that there are numerous opportunities for both market segmentation and technology application in the waste management field.

He sees an increasing role for genetically engineered waste-gobbling microorganisms in the "bioremediation" of waste products. Yes, there are established businesses such as Browning-Ferris and Waste Management, but with the shifts and sways in attitudes, legislation and technologies — not to mention the influx of risk capital — today's status quo doesn't stand a chance.

The Apple Computers, Genentech and Federal Express of the environment are likely to be born in this decade; the children of 1960's Idealism and 1980's Greed. That's not a bad pedigree at all, especially if it helps us breathe easier. Trend isn't destiny — but this time, we better hope it is.

E. German leader plans security force

EAST BERLIN (AP) — Communist Premier Hans Modrow on Thursday defended his plan for a new internal security force and tried to quell growing dissent by indicating the opposition could have a part in his government.

Thousands of people formed a human chain around Parliament after Modrow's speech to legislators, and a non-Communist partner in the coalition government repeated threats to quit the Cabinet.

An independent trade union movement threatened to call a nationwide strike Jan. 25 if Modrow fails to prove the state secret police force has been dissolved.

In a nearly 90-minute speech before the national Parliament, Modrow defended his authority and appealed for national unity to fight the economic and political problems threatening his shaky government, which came to power after the fall pro-democracy movement.

"I cannot recall becoming premier through a coup," he said. Modrow did not rule out the resignation of his transitional government for "compelling reasons" but said he expected it to last until nationwide elections planned May 6.

Medellin murder toll passes 4,000

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — A record 4,015 murders were committed in the cocaine capital of Medellin in 1989, authorities said Thursday.

Colombia's efforts to fight the traffickers gained a boost with the Defense Ministry reporting delivery of seven more U.S. helicopters, part of a \$60 million aid package. So far, 19 helicopters have been delivered.

The city morgue in Medellin said murders increased last year to 4,015 from 3,299 in 1988, a rise of 22 percent.

Gunfire caused 354 of the deaths, said Cesar Augusto Giraldo, the head of the morgue. He said he does not break down the deaths according to types of violence and could not say how many were drug-related.

New president meets foreign minister

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — The new president on Thursday decreed prison terms for those who stole relief goods, and he met with the French foreign minister — the first such Western official to visit Romania since its popular revolution.

A senior official also said that 10,000 people died in the revolt that toppled dictator Nicolae Ceausescu. President Ion Iliescu has declared Friday a day of mourning in Romania for those who died.

The French official, Roland Dumas, conveyed a message from French President Francois Mitterrand pledging support for the "consolidation of the conquests of the popular revolution and for political stability," the official Romsprex news agency said.

At a later news conference, Dumas said projects under discussion included a development bank and health-related programs, but declined to elaborate.

Fallen Bulgarian leader faces charges

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FDA recall of Jarvik heart stuns Utah researchers, causes fear

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The federal government's recall of the Jarvik artificial heart has stunned Utah researchers, raising fears that funding for study of other, more promising models may dry up.

The Food and Drug Administration, citing "serious deficiencies," withdrew approval for all uses of the air-driven, plastic device, formerly known as the Jarvik-7 and currently called the

Symbion-7. It was the first-sized Jarvik-7 that was implanted into Dr. Barney Clark at the U of U Health Sciences Center on Dec. 2, 1982. The Seattle-area dentist, the first man to receive a permanent artificial heart, survived 112 days before dying of multiple organ failure.

Dr. Donald Olsen, director of the school's Institute for Biomedical Engineering, said he was "surprised and disappointed" by the FDA's

decision. However, he stressed that while the Jarvik-7 had its genesis at Utah, the university's researchers no longer use the device.

"I'm surprised and disappointed. I've spent 20 years of my life, full-time, working on artificial hearts," Olsen said Thursday. "But I would like to make sure (people) know that the artificial heart did not fail; it was a failure on the part of Symbion to meet the requirements of the FDA" for improving the Symbion-7.

Symbion Inc., of Tempe, Ariz., has declined to comment on the decision beyond acknowledging it had been notified by the FDA.

Olsen said recall of the Symbion-7 will have no direct effect on the U of U's artificial heart program, which has moved on to study of a new generation of heart replacement devices. Currently, Utah researchers are focusing on the new Utah-100, primarily for future use as a bridge-to-transplant.

Olsen said two models of the Utah-100 — one air-driven, requiring external heart drive hoses, and another, hydraulically driven version — that would be fully contained within the recipient's chest — are being used in animal experiments.

It is the hydraulic model that has generated the most enthusiasm. Under a five-year, \$5.6 million National Institutes of Health grant, Utah researchers are seeking to

develop a totally implantable artificial heart.

Olsen said that in addition to Utah, scientists at the Hershey Medical Center of Pennsylvania State University; Abtomed Inc. of Danvers, Mass., and the Cleveland Clinic in Ohio, are studying totally implantable hearts. Researchers from the four sites are to report on their progress at the American Society of Artificial Implantable Organs April conference in Washington.

Agents say IRS illegally taped meet

POCATELLO (AP) — Nine Internal Revenue Service officers and agents, including the nation's top IRS officer in 1989, are accusing the IRS of illegally taping a Pocatello meeting last August.

A lawsuit and demand for jury trial was filed in U.S. District Court in Pocatello Wednesday by attorney Lowell N. Hawkes for James Quam, John McCracken, Mark Senff, Debra Gerber, Linda Warren, Michael O'Neil, Michael Herring, Bert Lott and Jeffrey Siebrecht. All are from Pocatello.

Last April, Quam was selected the top IRS revenue officer out of 68 districts in the nation and was given the Michael Dillon Memorial Award during a ceremony in Washington. Revenue officers collect fees for the IRS.

The lawsuit filed Wednesday charges that on Aug. 24, IRS equal employment opportunity committee members secretly taped a meeting they had with the nine plaintiffs after assuring them anything said would be confidential.

Merry Trudeau, an IRS spokeswoman in Boise, said Wednesday that the IRS couldn't comment on the complaint until it is served and can be studied by attorneys.

The complaint states that the IRS has refused to return the tape or copies and transcripts to the plaintiffs. It said the agency's own operating manual prohibits all "non-consensual monitoring" of telephone and non-telephone conversations.

The plaintiffs, who are suing with the IRS total of 60, are asking that the IRS be required to identify everyone who used the recording and why it was made, and that it be ordered to enforce its own rules and take appropriate measures to remedy what happened.

Church reaches suit settlement near court date

MESA, Ariz. (AP) — The Mormon Church has reached an out-of-court settlement in a lawsuit filed by a woman who accused church officials of failing to report to law-enforcement authorities that a man had molested her daughter.

The settlement was reached Tuesday, the day trial was scheduled to start after a July 1988 ruling by the Arizona Court of Appeals that compelled two Mormon bishops and another church official to give testimony about conversations they had with a church member, Richard Kenneth Ray, who, according to court records, told them he was molesting children.

The appeals court ruled that Arizona's clergyman-penitent privilege of confidentiality did not apply, saying Ray had waived the privilege by disclosing the conversations to Mesa police after he was taken into custody.

Man who left child faces new charges

BOISE (AP) — Edward Donald Tuinman, convicted of abandoning his 4-year-old son at a highway rest stop near Boise a year ago, will face first-degree assault charges in Yakima, Wash.

Steve Keller, Yakima County deputy prosecutor, said Tuinman, serving a 10-year sentence in the Idaho penitentiary for felony child abandonment, was arrested last week and will be arraigned there.

Tortured and emaciated, Tuinman's son, Eddy, was found at the Black's Creek rest stop Jan. 4, 1989.

Keller said Tuinman is "basically being charged with inflicting the injuries the boy was suffering from when he was down there (in Ohio)." Tuinman will be transported to Yakima next week.

House panel OKs game tag bill

BOISE (AP) — The first bill to clear the Idaho Legislature this session on wildlife depredation may be a House measure allowing the Fish and Game Commission to lower big game tag fees for emergency depredation hunts. Such hunts were necessary last winter when deer antelope and elk invaded private farms in search of food.

The House Resources and Conservation Committee on Thursday approved a pre-filed bill and sent it to the House floor for a vote with a do-pass recommendation. It will be sponsored by Rep. JoAnn Wood, R-Rigby.

Gem court rules in medical case

BOISE (AP) — Physicians may not escape liability for medical malpractice simply by exercising "best judgment" in caring for their patients, the Idaho Court of Appeals has ruled. The three-member panel Thursday said that 4th District Judge George Carey erred by not clearly instructing a jury also to consider the "applicable standard of care" required in Dr. Edward J. Kiefer's treatment of Richard Leazer. Chief Judge Jesse Walters wrote in the unanimous opinion that physicians "may evade liability for utilizing best judgment only when that judgment constitutes choosing between one

of several medically acceptable courses of treatment, each of which represents reasonable care for the patient."

Sheriff denies framing suspect

NEZPERCE (AP) — Lewis County Sheriff Donald Fortney says he did not frame George Junior Porter for the murder of Theresa L. Jones of Kamiah.

The sheriff's testimony came during the second week of Porter's first-degree murder-by-torture trial in the 2nd District Court. Porter, 34, is accused of beating Jones to death about Dec. 21, 1988.

Porter's attorney, Wilfrid W. Longteig of Craigmont, accused Fortney of framing Porter because Fortney refused to give up his preconceived ideas about the case.

Teen's murder confessions stand

LEWISTON (AP) — The jury that will hear the case against Lewiston teen-ager Bradley R. Thomsson will be chosen outside of Nez Perce county to guarantee a fair trial, but confessions made to the police stand.

Thomsson, 17, faces two counts of first-degree murder in the deaths of his parents, Ray E. and Judith Ann Thomsson. Second District Judge Ron Schilling ruled

Wednesday against a motion by public defender Jeff M. Brudie that statements Thomsson made to the police the day of the alleged crime should not be admitted as evidence at the trial.

Nez Perce taking gaming survey

LEWISTON (AP) — The Nez Perce Tribe is surveying residents on and around the reservation to see how receptive they would be to tribal gaming operations.

About 1,500 surveys were mailed randomly to residents in north central Idaho and of the Clarkston and Pullman areas.

The surveys ask 25 detailed questions meant to determine attitudes toward gaming and help determine a possible market for any tribal gaming.

Court denies new trial request

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Court of Appeals has ordered 7th District Judge H. Reynolds George to consider again whether convicted murderer Scott D. Bean should be resentenced in light of a codefendant's recanted testimony.

But the court on Thursday unanimously upheld George's decision to reject the Idaho Falls man's request for a new trial on a charge of first-degree murder in the October 1981 stabbing death of Neal Walker of Ucon.

PUC seeks information about phone use privacy

BOISE (AP) — Idaho utility regulators say they want to know how new telephone services being offered could affect the privacy of the state's phone users.

Local and long-distance phone companies were asked by the Idaho Public Utilities Commission this week to answer a series of questions about such services as Automatic Number Identification, Calling Party Identification and others now available or planned for the future.

"The identification of the calling number may be used for a variety of purposes," the PUC said in an order starting its investigation. "In its most benign form, an individual purchaser of the service can decide in advance whether to answer a telephone call, thereby increasing the customer's ability to screen out unwanted calls."

help businesses in marketing by immediately identifying the telephone numbers of actual or potential customers, or of rivals relying on that information.

"This is also a darker side to ANI," the PUC said. "Social workers, policemen, battered spouses and other persons who must periodically deal with dangerous persons would give up the anonymity of their business or home telephone numbers to any such person who purchased ANI service or the right electronic device."

The privacy of people with unlisted or unpublished numbers also could be compromised when they call other phone customers who subscribe to ANI service, the commission said.

Its order cited a history of sensitivity to telephone privacy issues dating back to 1982.

Lawyers ask Kiebert case remain open

SANDPOINT (AP) — Attorneys for newspapers in two states have asked a magistrate to keep open a Friday court hearing on sex charges against Idaho Transportation Director Kermit Kiebert.

Attorneys for The Spokesman-Review and Spokane (Wash.) Chronicle and the Idaho Statesman newspapers filed briefs Thursday seeking to keep the Bonner County District Court hearing open. The motions are scheduled to be heard at 10 a.m. Thursday.

Saying publicity could harm Kiebert's chances for a fair trial, Briest River attorney Nick M. Lamanna last week asked Magistrate Paul McCabe of Coeur d'Alene to close the Bonner County District Court preliminary hearing.

Kiebert, 47, a former five-year state senator, has on leave without pay from his \$65,000-a-year job since his arrest at his Boise office Dec. 5 for investigation of sexual abuse and lewd conduct.

"Publicity that could emanate from an open preliminary hearing in this case poses special risks of unfairness because it may consist solely of the victim's testimony and no other evidence," Lamanna said in the motion filed last week.

Bonner County Prosecutor Phil Robinson said Thursday the victim, now 16, is willing to have an open hearing.

"As far as I'm concerned, I don't think the judge can close it, based on what's in the record," Robinson said. "We're not agreeing to it (closing the hearing), nor will we stipulate to it."

Preliminary hearings in Idaho present evidence to determine whether there is probable cause that the person charged with a crime should be bound over for a district court trial. "Preliminary hearings are a dress rehearsal" for a trial.

Robinson said he would call no more than three witnesses, including the alleged victim and a counselor. Lamanna has indicated he would not call any witnesses.

Idaho Power to build new Boise offices

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Power Co. plans more than \$24 million worth of new facilities in Boise.

The utility announced Thursday the Board of Directors has approved a new corporate headquarters office building in Boise, with construction scheduled to start this spring.

Once the new building is complete, Idaho Power plans to build an employee parking garage at an estimated cost of \$3.2 million and begin a \$2.6 million general renovation of the existing headquarters building.

The new corporate headquarters building will replace a structure erected in 1951. The new building is to be on West Idaho St. between 12th and 13th streets. The nine-story building will have about 218,000 gross square feet of space.

Idaho Power said the company's 500 general office employees, who perform engineering and administrative tasks, outgrew the present building years ago and now are located in seven different buildings in west Boise.

The company said space in the new building not needed immediately will be leased until needed.

The employee parking garage will be on Idaho St. between 13th and 14th streets and the present headquarters building is at 13th and Idaho.

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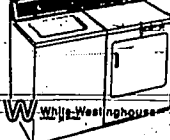
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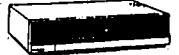
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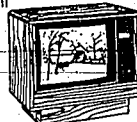
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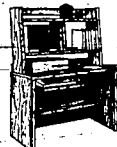
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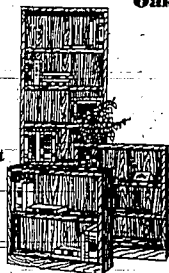

Bean prices jump; so do area farmers

TWIN FALLS — A sudden surge in pinto and pink bean prices has traders and farmers anxiously watching the markets, hoping prices stay strong. "They're up so high I don't know where they're going to go from here," said Gerwin Woodland of Berger and Co. in Jerome.

In Denver, pinner bids on pinto beans rose \$2 Thursday to \$35 per hundredweight, a price that several Magic Valley warehouses quoted as well. But Idaho pink bean prices were

unchanged during the day, staying at \$30 after rising \$2 since Friday, Woodland said. Experts attributed the price jump to shortages brought on by drought-damaged yields in the Dakotas. Strong demand from Mexico also contributed to the surge, with one Agriculture Department agency predicting Monday that 1990 exports to that nation would triple 1989's 50,000 metric tons.

The lingering Midwestern drought knocked average yields in the Dakotas down to four or five hundredweight sacks per acre, Woodland said. Even though acres harvested were up by 25 percent from the previous growing season, the decline in

yields partially offset that gain. Nationwide, bean yields typically average 12 to 13 sacks per acre. Idaho averages about 20 sacks per acre.

Shortages of one bean variety typically push prices up in all varieties, Kimberly farmer Derald Glenn said. He probably won't switch from pinks because they yield better in the Magic Valley than the higher-priced pintos.

"The extra yield will offset the increase in price," he said.

Besides, Glenn also grows garden-bean seed under contract. Last year, those varieties brought anywhere from 20 cents to 45 cents per pound, he said. This year,

competition for bean farm land will push seed bean contracts upward, he said.

In Mexico, pinto beans are a staple food. Although that nation has severe debt problems, the Mexican government's trade organization has managed to find money for spot purchases on the world market and forward contracts of U.S. beans, according to BH Davis, agricultural minister at the U.S. Embassy in Mexico City.

"People make priorities," he explained. But those contracts are not bringing the high prices available on the U.S. domestic market, Davis said.

"Basically, as I understand it, the U.S. ...

Applications sought for top school post

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls School Board Thursday night voted to open application for the job of superintendent — but with a specific invitation to Keith Tolzin, acting superintendent, to apply.

"In no way should this be taken as a vote of 'no confidence' in Dr. Tolzin," board member Steve Tolman said.

Calvin Lamborn, board chairman, agreed, saying, "And as far as I'm concerned he would definitely be a finalist."

"But they said they wanted to open the position to outside applicants 'to give more credibility to the position.'"

"The board has several times before appointed people from within and there has been a lot of criticism," Lamborn said. "We need to build the credibility and if Dr. Tolzin applies and is rehired, then he will have gained more credibility."

The board did not open the positions last April because it was too late to begin a comprehensive search for candidates, Lamborn said in a telephone interview after the executive session.

Tolzin, reached at his home by telephone, declined to comment.

Tominaga garners position on key state House panel

BOISE — In the sometimes deafening clamor for state funds, the Magic Valley just got another voice, with state Sen. Lynn Tominaga's appointment to the Legislature's Joint Finance and Appropriations Committee.

Although the House and the Senate give their approval to the state's budget, it's the Joint Finance and Appropriations Committee that actually controls the state's purse strings.

The full Legislature seldom quibbles with the committee's recommendations, except on education and health and welfare budgets, Tominaga said.

For the past two years, Rep. Mac Neibaur, R-Paul, has been the Magic Valley's lone representative on the joint committee.

Neibaur, who serves as the committee's vice chairman, says he's often frustrated because the committee membership is stacked in favor of eastern Idaho. Sometimes it seems that budget appropriations reflect that eastern Idaho bias, he said.

"Tominaga's appointment will give us the strength to combat all that," Neibaur said. "But it doesn't give us strength to swing any big deals."

Tominaga's appointment also gives the Magic Valley its first senator on the committee in two years.

Shoshone closes all schools as flu outbreak takes toll

SHOSHONE — The school district's doors will remain locked today due to a flu outbreak that has hit more than 25 percent of the high school's students.

Superintendent Wayne Waddoups said in addition to the 25 percent who stayed home from school Thursday, another 10 percent shouldn't have been in class. All the district's schools are closed. All activities, such as basketball practice and games, have been canceled, Waddoups said. But school is expected to resume Monday.

Drug task force planning to expand

TWIN FALLS — The Magic Valley Drug Task Force plans to expand with full-time officers to increase its effectiveness, officials announced Thursday.

"Our problem was not having the full-time bodies to follow a case wherever it goes," Paul Du Fresne, Twin Falls' police and fire chief, said. "It just wasn't effective."

The task force, the combined effort of seven local counties, will be staffed by two full-time drug investigators, one from the Twin Falls Police Department and one from the Cassia County Sheriff's Department.

The Twin Falls officer will remain on the department payroll, while about \$9,000 remaining from a grant received last year will help pay for the Cassia officer, Du Fresne said.

Later this year, the task force's board of

directors hopes to increase the full-time regular staff to five, which would increase the annual cost of the program to an estimated \$70,000 to \$90,000 — requiring additional funds.

A sixth officer would be a supervisor, from the state Bureau of Narcotics, but that will depend on the agency's funding.

Officials hope to obtain federal grants and allocations from the Legislature.

JEROME — A number of Jerome residents calling themselves "disgruntled citizens" want their police chief back.

Betsy and Tony Junier are heading up a petition drive to ask the City Council Tuesday to rehire former Police Chief Greg Will.

Will was not reappointed by new Mayor Gerald Ostler as police chief this year at the new administration's first meeting of the year — a move that residents now refer to as the "Tuesday Night Massacre."

At the same meeting, on Jan. 2, the council failed to rehire Public Works Director Lanny Sloan and City Clerk Marilyn Bragg. Sloan was later rehired, while Deputy City Clerk Helen Paoli, appointed to replace Bragg, resigned.

"We will use petitions to put some pressure on the mayor on Tuesday," Betsy Junier said, noting that she has already collected 60 names just by walking down Main Street. "We feel (the mayor's) decision is not fair, and he doesn't give us answers why."

Ostler told a packed Jerome special council meeting Jan. 4 he decided against

reappointing Will over concerns for his job performance.

He has refused to answer specific questions on the matter, citing the advice of City Attorney Rob Williams, though he has said that Will has received repeated oral reprimands from himself and from former Mayor Ralph Peters and that "inappropriate acts" were involved.

The silence irks Junier. "I feel if the man has done something wrong, the people should know; but, so far, the council and mayor have been in a closet by themselves, and people don't know what's going on."

Stallings, Evans consider Senate runs

BOISE — Democratic Rep. Richard Stallings said he'll decide in the next two weeks whether he'll run for the Senate.

"It's going to take some deep introspection," Stallings said Thursday during a meeting with reporters. "I guess it boils down to where I can be of the most service."

Should Idaho be surprised to see a 1990 Stallings for Senate campaign? "Yes," Stallings said.

"To be very honest, being a senator has not been a lifelong dream of mine," he said. Stallings, who will complete his third term in Congress, said there are good reasons to stay in the House of Representatives. As a member of the majority party, Stallings said he's poised for a subcommittee chairmanship.

Stallings' decision and that of former Gov. John Evans, who is also considering a run for Sen. James McClure's open seat, may hinge on a national Democratic Senate Campaign Committee poll to be released before the end of the month.

During a telephone interview Thursday, Evans said he'll wait on the poll before he makes any decisions. And he suspects Stallings will do the same.

The two talked about their plans Wednesday night and agreed a primary would not be in their best interest, Stallings

said. Even though the national Democratic Party is pushing him to run, Stallings said he may not make the race if Evans, Idaho Agriculture Director Dick Rush or another strong Democrat became a candidate.

State Sen. John Peavey, D-Carey, said he also has been encouraged to enter the Senate race. But Peavey is not interested in "creating" a primary either.

Would he run for Stallings' 2nd District seat should the congressman run for the Senate? "Peavey's only reply was a smile."

"If it was from INEL you couldn't tell,"

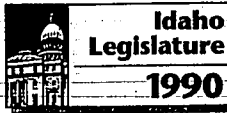

New revenue update suggests state surplus is still growing

BOISE (AP) — Updated state revenue figures released Thursday show a new unanticipated cash surplus may be developing, but Andrus administration analysts, who upped the surplus ante to \$125 million just a day earlier, quickly cautioned that it was too early to determine whether more excess cash will materialize.

The latest revenue update covering the final six months of 1989 — the first half of the state's budget year — put total tax collections at \$383.1 million, \$3.1 million ahead of the pace of the administration's revised estimate that was issued on Wednesday with the governor's election-year budget plan.

Earlier in the day, Gov. Cecil Andrus' budget director began campaigning for legislative adoption of the administration's comprehensive state spending blueprint that calls for major hikes in education aid, help for hard-pressed local governments, a first-of-its-kind public works program and expanded services in areas ranging from



health care to public safety and environmental protection.

But Charles Moss acknowledged to legislative budget writers that while Andrus attempted to take care of all the major needs of the state in his mixture of grants from the record surplus and continuing support from another bright revenue forecast, not every program or issue was addressed. "There are a lot of legitimate needs out there that weren't met," Moss told the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee. "It's tough to put all the needs of the state in that budget. Because of that, I think you will find it just as hard this year to craft a budget as

you have in the past." But the Republican-controlled committee had few questions about the overall \$880 million budget for the year that begins in July and the proposed disposition of the record cash surplus.

Figures from the state Tax Commission showed personal income tax collections, which account for 45 percent of total general revenue, exceeded the six-month benchmark by nearly \$3 million while the much smaller category of miscellaneous revenues was running nearly \$2 million ahead of the administration's revised estimates.

Partially offsetting those gains was the corporate income tax, which was running \$1.2 million behind the six-month projection, and the sales tax, which lagged the benchmark by \$500,000.

But the figures on sales tax collections, which account for 37 percent of all general revenue, reflected only sales from November, when retailers reported limited activity as consumers appeared to be waiting

for lower prices in pre-Christmas sales. Under the state's collection system, tax receipts on sales in one month are not reported until the following month.

"We understand December sales were strong," Michael Ferguson, Andrus' chief economist, said. "We hope that will correct itself."

But Ferguson also said that the boost in individual income tax receipts was the result of higher than normal tax payments before the end of the year, possibly reflecting attempts by some taxpayers to offset federal taxes.

He pointed out that paycheck withholding tax payments, which account for the bulk of personal income tax collections, were not higher than projected.

"Although we're a little ahead of where we predicted we'd be, I feel the revenues are coming in pretty close," Ferguson said.

In addition, he pointed out that the weakness in corporate tax collections could be aggravated in the future by business use

of stockpiled state investment tax credits. During the first full year of Idaho's economic resurgence, 1988, corporations claimed \$17.7 million in direct credits against the state taxes they owed for that year. That amount was up by some 50 percent over the credits claimed the year before.

"There is likely to be a bigger increase as we go into tax year '89," Ferguson said, because of the continued improvement in the economic and the profitability of Idaho businesses.

Andrus had campaigned to repeal the credit for the first 2½ years of his present term, calling it a tax gimmick that benefits only a handful of major corporations.

But after being rebuffed repeatedly by a unified Republican legislative majority and at the same time seeing the state's economy take off and tax revenues surge, Andrus told business leaders last June he was abandoning the credit-repeal drive.

Council may have new funds for construction

BOISE (AP) — For years, members of the Permanent Building Fund Advisory Council presided over the biggest "wish list" in state government.

State agencies routinely submitted proposals for new construction, knowing there was little chance of getting them funded because there were many more requests than money available.

But now the council's priority list may become more feasible.

Gov. Cecil Andrus on Wednesday proposed a four-year, \$143 million state construction plan, using some of the estimated \$125 million state surplus available this year.

The council reviewed that program Thursday, and Public Works Director Anne Barker said the money should help the state meet some long-standing needs.

"The staff will not be overburdened by it," she said. "We are delighted to have it come."

The Andrus proposal calls for \$10 million per year for preventive maintenance. "That's double what we have had in the past and should allow us to address the problems," Barker said.

Sen. Don Mackin, D-Moscow, called the Andrus proposal "a very visionary plan. It shows a commitment," he said.

Barker said the Legislature and state government cannot commit future legislatures to pay for projects. "This (the Andrus four-year plan) allows us to say we agree to continue some of these projects until they are completed," she told the council.

The Andrus plan also calls for \$1 million per year for asbestos abatement, \$500,000 per year for underground fuel storage tank cleanup and \$4.5 million per year to pay for bonds for the renovation of the state School for the Deaf and Blind at Gooding, the new maximum security state prison and the College of Technology Building at Boise

State University. After those obligations are met, Barker said the plan allows for an average of \$18 million per year of new projects.

She told the council on Thursday that an architect has been selected to design remodeling of Fremont General Hospital, St. Anthony, into a prison work center. The architect will be Sundberg and Associates, Idaho Falls.

The Department of Corrections hopes to move into the facility by July 1, Barker said.

The construction program also calls for \$937,500 for planning and design on a new 160-bed women's prison facility.

It is scheduled to be constructed just south of the Boise Airport; a few miles north of the main state prison.

Barker said after a prison consultant

helped with the planning, the cost has been estimated at \$10 million.

In the fiscal year 1992 budget, which starts July 1, 1991, the Andrus plan calls for \$5.3 million for construction, with another \$3.7 million in the next fiscal year for the women's prison.

Barker said the construction plan also calls for \$8.2 million next year in grants to counties to help meet juvenile detention and jail problems.

It would be the first time the state has gotten into a grant-program-for such projects, she said.

She said the governor's priorities are to meet the problems local government now faces in meeting juvenile detention needs, to adopt statewide standards for such facilities and to regionalize the facilities.

State seeks school fund cut

ELK RIVER (AP) — The Idaho Department of Education wants to cut more than \$250,000 from the Elk River School District's budget, contending it has too few students to qualify for even minimum state funding.

The district is appealing the move, which would strip the tiny northern Idaho school of almost 75 percent of its annual budget.

An attorney will take Elk River's case before the state Board of Education Jan. 25 in Boise.

Local school administrators say the effort is aimed at forcing Elk River to consolidate with a neighboring district.

"The problem is we only have two kids in the high school," said Margaret Planagan, Elk River School Board president.

Lawmaker revives initiative change

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Lee Barnes says he thinks supporters of initiatives should have to demonstrate statewide support before they can put such measures on a ballot.

The Bush Republican is reviving legislation to require the sponsors of initiatives to obtain signatures from at least 33 of Idaho's 44 counties. It also would require at least 5 percent of the people who voted for governor in the last election to sign the initiative petitions in each county.

Current law requires only that sponsors obtain signatures equal to 10 percent of the vote cast for governor in the last election, which this year would be 38,743.

At least two initiatives are in circulation, one setting up a citizens committee for legislative reapportionment and the second removing most restrictions on abortions.

The Barnes proposal also would not allow more than 20 percent of the total signatures to come from one county.

He said it is easy for sponsors of initiatives to attend events such as the Western Idaho Fair at Boise and obtain thousands of signatures.

"That doesn't really represent statewide sentiment," he said. "Sponsors should be able to show wide support to get a measure on the ballot."

The proposal is similar to legislation rejected by the Legislature five years ago.

Barnes said he probably would seek to have it introduced through the House State Affairs Committee.

Residents happy with house numbers

HANSEN — After 70 hours of work, 251 houses south of Highway 30 have new reflective house numbers.

"The residents were really thrilled and thought the system was a good idea," Alice Perkins, who headed the project to simplify the town's address system, told the City Council this week.

She began the project nearly a year ago to renumber the houses to aid emergency vehicles with locating residents. US West Communications supplied the reflective signs, which can be seen easier in the dark.

The City Council voted to pay Perkins and her husband, Bob, \$250 for installing all of the house numbers last month.

Perkins is still working on a map of the new numbers. Delivery vehicles may match old addresses to new ones at the City Office.

The city has ordered more street signs for residences north of the highway, Mayor George Urie said.

These new signs, which will not change addresses there, will be delivered soon, Perkins said.

In other business, the city's financial position in fiscal year 1989 is improved over the previous year, accountant Mark Holmstead told the council.

"I see your little town in pretty good financial condition," Holmstead said. The city is in better shape now than it was a year ago, he said. The general fund has increased \$15,000 over the prior year. The street fund is down a little, Holmstead said. The other funds are about the same, he said. Holmstead said the city is fairly liquid and that they stayed within their budget for last year.

The city's new computer system will help Hansen's accounting procedures, Holmstead said.

In other matters: The council also approved a 4 percent wage increase for City Clerk Darlene Miller and Police Chief Daniel Kennedy.

Isenhart presented Urie with two commemorative stamps for the Idaho Centennial and asked the council to work with the library board and the post office to celebrate the establishment of the post office on June 7, 1905. Anyone interested should contact Isenhart.

Bengals break the ice with victory over NAU

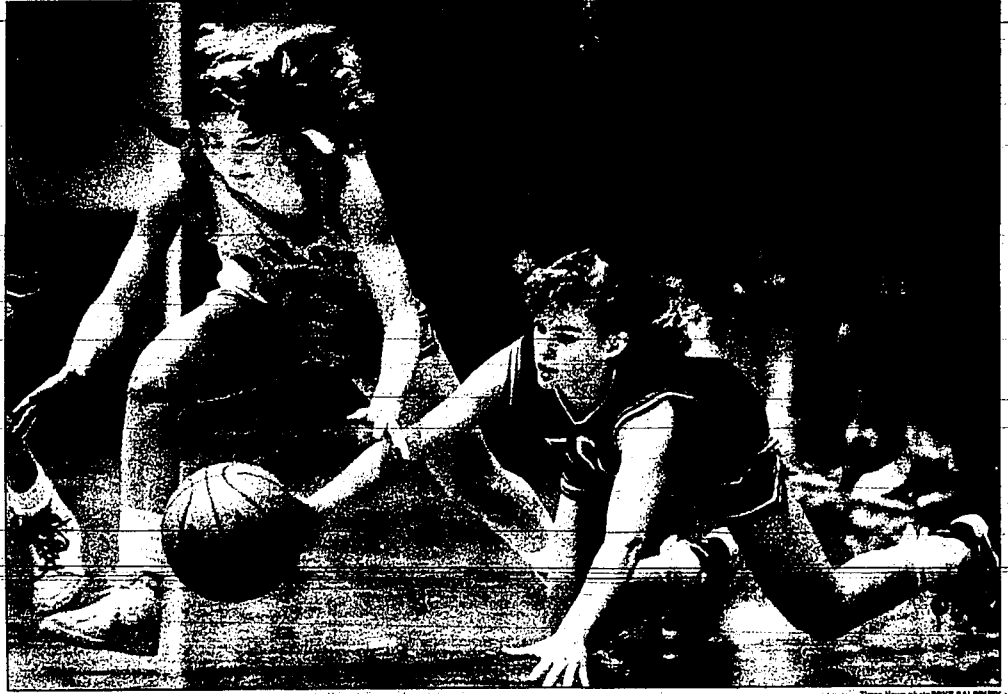

Murray had seven of those 11 points, heading to a game-high 18.
The Axers fought back, closing the gap

to a pair at the break, but ISU began the second half with a 9-2 run.

Idaho State built up a double-digit lead in the second half and cruised to the win, thrilling the crowd of 2,580.

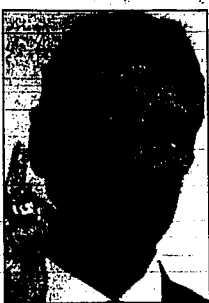

Alabama hires former Phoenix coach Stallings to replace Curry

Stallings, who coached at Texas A&M and in the NFL before he was fired by the Phoenix Cardinals midway through this past season, was named at a news conference by a gathering of former Alabama stars, including Lee Roy Jordan and Bart Starr.

The news conference was called to introduce Stallings, the choice to succeed Bill Curry and restore Bryant-style unity to the football program, which Curry left Sunday to become coach at Kentucky.

"You know, I'm not Coach Bryant," Stallings said. "Everybody has to coach their own personality." But he recounted the strong influence Bryant had on him as a player and coach, and said that moving into Bryant's old role is "a dream come true."

The announcement ended four days of speculation over who would step into the role once held by Bryant, who won five national titles during his 25 years as the Alabama

SEC Coach of the Year honors.

"This is a time to look to the future instead of trying to second-guess the past," said Alabama president Roger Sayers.

Stallings did not mention Curry, but he commended Curry's final team, saying they "obviously played well last year" to win the SEC and go to the Sugar Bowl.

His goal now, he said, is "to get everybody pulling together."

He said he had asked Jimmy Fuller, an Alabama assistant who also played under Bryant, to remain on the staff. But he said he had hired no other assistants as yet.

The 54-year-old Stallings played under Bryant at Texas A&M from 1954-57, started his coaching career under Bryant there in 1958 and followed him to Alabama later that year.

In 1965, he returned to Texas A&M as coach and stayed until he was fired in 1971 with a 27-45-1 record.

Stallings was an assistant to Tom Landry with the NFL's Dallas Cowboys for 14 years and, in 1985, became coach of the Phoenix Cardinals, turning in a 22-34-1 record until the team fired him this season.

This time, Memphis State took an 80-78 lead on Elliott Perry's jumper with 1:14 left, but Tulane broke a full-court press and held the ball until Christian hit the long shot.

Perry missed a short shot following a Memphis State timeout, but the ball went out of bounds off a Tulane player with two seconds left. However, the Tigers threw away the inbounds pass and Tulane ran out the clock.

Tulane took a 32-31 lead with 3:55 left in the first half and held it until 6:15 left in the game, when John McLaughlin hit a jumper to give Memphis State a 72-70 lead.

Indiana 77 Northwestern 63

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP) — Eric Anderson led an 18-2 second-half run with six points as No. 13 Indiana topped a 10-point deficit into a 77-63 victory over Northwestern on Thursday night that made Bob Knight the winningest coach in Big Ten history.

Lewis says Johnson took 2nd drug

WASHINGTON (AP) — Olympic gold medalist Carl Lewis says he is sure Canadian track star Ben Johnson supplemented his steroid use with an unspecified amphetamine before competing in the 100-meter race at the 1988 Olympics. Lewis made the allegation during an interview with Washington Post reporters and editors, which was published Wednesday. "Everybody talked about it and knew it," Lewis was quoted as saying. "Five weeks earlier in Zurich, he had the same lead over me in Seoul and he lost it. Five weeks later, he has the same lead and doesn't lose an inch." Johnson defeated Lewis in their meeting at the 1988 Olympics with an amazing time of 9.79 seconds. But he was discovered to have been using anabolic steroids in the weeks prior to the race and was stripped of his gold medal. Johnson's attorney, Ed Futerman, denied both charges. Futerman said the drug tests in Seoul "speak for themselves."

Dantley, Mavericks work out deal

DALLAS (AP) — The Dallas Mavericks and Adrian Dantley have apparently worked out a \$1.25-million deal that allows the forward to become an unrestricted free agent at the end of the season. If National Basketball Association officials approve the arrangement, Dantley will forfeit that amount in guaranteed pay from Dallas in order to test his value on the open market. The 35-year-old forward, who has a contract through Feb. 28, said he wants to play for a team that will make better use of him. Utah dance ensemble will perform

TWIN FALLS — The Magic Valley could claim to be dance capital of the West for the coming week.

On Wednesday, the Ririe-Woodbury Dance Company from Salt Lake City will arrive for three days. The ensemble, one of the nation's best-known dance groups, will conduct lecture-demonstrations in the Twin Falls schools before capping its stay with a performance next Friday as part of the Arts on Tour series.

Meanwhile, Oregon dance artist F. Charles Hubbard came to town Monday and will spend a month working with students at Sawtooth Elementary School. Hubbard is the school's third artist in residence, and it's his second time in Twin Falls. He served a residency at Lincoln Elementary two years ago.

In a phone interview this week, Joan (she pronounces it "Jo-ann") Woodbury explained that she and Shirley Ririe founded the company that bears their names in 1964. But

they've been working together since the early 1950s.

At first, Ririe-Woodbury was primarily a weekend project for the women, who were — and still are — faculty members at the University of Utah. In the early 1970s, the company was accepted into the National Endowment for the Arts' then-newly created Artists in Schools and Dance on Tour programs.

From there, Ririe-Woodbury evolved into a full-time ensemble. The dancers are now on the road about 30 weeks of each year, touring nationally, and the ensemble also presents a variety of special events in its hometown.

At its performance in the College of Southern Idaho's Fine Arts Auditorium next week, Ririe-Woodbury — featuring Paul Callahan, Karen Canino, Janice Haws, Keith Johnson, Jameson King and Karin Ramos — will present seven dances.

The opening piece, "In Stages," is one of two on the program choreographed by Woodbury. Although it was first performed in 1986, Woodbury says "In Stages" — like many other works she has done — "rumbled around" her

Resident dancer says arts can help 'problem' kids

TWIN FALLS — Hyperactive kids can't settle down long enough to learn. "Problem" pupils drive their parents and teachers crazy. Despite renewed interest in math and science, American students can't keep up with the competition from abroad.

The solution to these and a myriad of other educational woes?

"You've gotta have art." F. Charles Hubbard, a dancer from Portland, Ore., spends about half his year working with students. This week, he began a monthlong residency at Sawtooth Elementary School. Hubbard has seen firsthand the benefits the arts can bring to schools.

First, he says, the arts can help children who find school dull. Some students are not attuned to learning via traditional means. Hubbard cites himself as an example. As a child, he received academic A's and B's, but his marks for "citizenship" were unsatisfactory. He often finished his lessons ahead of schedule. With time on his hands, he'd sometimes be disruptive.

"In sixth grade, he finally had a teacher who suggested a better use for that spare time, telling Hubbard to start a



Hubbard shows students how not to sit when resting school newspaper. When Hubbard completed his work, he was allowed to roam his school looking for stories. Later, participation in a school musical fulfilled the same purpose. "The arts gave me a way not to be in trouble," he recalls.

Arts can be even more valuable for students who have trouble learning, period. Nationally, 25 percent of students drop out of school. "There needs to be something done to try and turn that curve around," says Hubbard.

"It's a realization that, especially with at-risk students, they get turned on through the arts and stay in school."

"Dropout rates aren't as big a problem in rural areas and small towns. But arts education is valuable there. Hubbard explains, because access to arts is often limited. For many children, meeting and working with an artist will indicate to them for the first time that it is possible to actually make a living in the arts.

Finally, the arts promote learning that goes beyond black-and-white "right" or "wrong" answers.

Schools in the United States have boosted math and science curriculums, but American students still fall behind those from Japan and Germany. Hubbard says he thinks it is because U.S. schools produce "imitators, not innovators." Through the arts, he adds, students learn creative problem solving.

There is growing interest in using the arts in schools, says Hubbard. The new head of the National Endowment for the Arts, John Frohnmayer, is "very much focused to-

Business problems force Billy Joel to tour

Through those trendy Ray Ban sunglasses that he has made so popular, Billy Joel's puppy-dog eyes have seen it all.

And sometimes, he just rings up these shades to shield himself from a world he sees as both bad and good, hopeless and hopeful.

His latest album, "Storm Front," a swirling package of mixed emotions that features a crimson hurricane warning flag on the cover, has one simple message:

"The storm hits, there's a period of calm, and then it's coming back harder than ever in the opposite direction." Joel said from his hotel room in Hartford, Conn. "But that doesn't mean you stay in bed. You have to get up and go out and fight the elements."

It is a story that Joel knows all too well. The quintessential mix of balladeer and rocker, Joel's twisted, 20-year path to success tells the story of Everman.

and commercial success, his ballyhooed marriage to mod-Christie Brinkley and his current sold-out "Storm Front" tour, Joel said he has the same problems as everyone.

He says he has been robbed and needs to tour because the money. "It goes back to the early 1970s," Joel said. "I signed away everything — copyrights, publishing, record royalties, you name it."

And now he wants it back. "Those songs are my children," Joel said. "They belong to me, and I will never give up trying to get them back." Joel has filed a \$90 million lawsuit against his former management company claiming fraud and breach-of-fiduciary responsibility.

"After I signed everything away, my ex-wife (and former manager, Elizabeth) got half of anything else, and nine years of mismanagement dug me deeper into the hole," Joel said. "I'm not a business-

man, as you can tell — I'm a piano man. But fortunately I can keep playing the piano long after these people have outlived their usefulness."

Therefore, this 18-month jaunt that will span the globe — the tour that Joel swore two years ago that he would never undertake — is a direct result of his business failures.

Joel says it is not the loss of money that angers him the most, it is the loss of time with his wife and their 4-year-old daughter, Alexa Ray.

"It's the one thing that I'm most bitter about with these people who did this to me," Joel said. "It's not just the money — it's what they've done to my life. I always wanted my kid to have a father and now she doesn't."

"But I'm going to make sure my family stays together," Joel said. "You see, if they screwed up my family then they'd really win."

ward arts in education," Hubbard notes.

Hubbard is one of 14 members — and the only performing artist — now serving on the NEA's overview panel. The group met recently in Washington, D.C., and Hubbard says he sees a move toward "not just more residential, but putting arts into schools in a more serious, interdisciplinary manner."

Anna Marie Boles, arts education director for the Idaho Commission on the Arts, agrees. Global events of the past few months — graffiti and impromptu song fests at the fall of the Berlin Wall, for example — show that arts reveal how a culture views itself.

"Arts express the heart and soul of the people," says Boles. "Students need to have that background, not just to be audiences, but to be able to be members of the world community."

In addition to Sawtooth Elementary, a number of other area schools are taking part in the Arts-in-Education program. Among them:

- Lincoln Elementary in Twin Falls was a pioneer in the field, and the school is now in its fifth year of participation. Arrangements for this year's residency remain incomplete, but Vickie Ainsworth — a former program coordinator — says Lincoln will host an artist before the end of the school year. Linda Smith and Louise Miller are coordinating the L.O.D.F. program at Lincoln this year.
- Ainsworth says she developed a slide show on Lincoln's program that Boles used to help boost arts education before the state legislature.
- Lincoln and Sawtooth also have "Art Moms" programs in which parents volunteer their time to promote arts in the classroom.

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Veterans prevail in Grammy nominations

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Don Henley's socially conscious "The End of Innocence" album was nominated for four album Grammy Awards on Thursday and a host of other aging pop music legends grabbed most of the other key nominations.

Henley's album earned nominations for album of the year and best male rock performance. The title track was put in competition for record and song of the year. The latter is a songwriting nomination shared with Bruce Hornsby.

The 32nd annual Grammy Awards will be presented Feb. 21 and broadcast live on CBS-TV.

A scattering of newer faces won prime nominations, but many went to such veterans as Bette Midler, Bonnie Raitt, Tom Petty, Billy Joel and Linda Ronstadt. Even the Rolling Stones got a nomination, for group rock performance on their "Mixed Emotions" single.

Midler was caught by surprise when her "Wind Beneath My Wings" single from the movie "Beaches" earned record, song and female pop performance nominations.

"To tell you the truth, I haven't been paying a lot of attention — I have a lot of things going on, with the baby and everything else," Midler said by telephone from her home here as 3-year-old Sophie cried.

The late Roy Orbison was nominated for pop vocal performance for the single "You Got It" and twice with pals Petty, George Harrison, Jeff Lynne and Bob Dylan for their "Traveling Wilburys" collaboration.

The nomination list for male rock performance typified the aging face of the awards: Henley, Petty, Neil Young, Lou Reed and Joe Cocker.

The National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences announced the nominations at a news conference with host singer Olivia Newton-John and producer Quincy Jones. The announcements experienced delays when a Grammy placard on the podium kept falling off.

There were 388 nominees representing 113 record companies. French Chorus, Ted Nugent, Milli Vanilli, Soul II Soul and Tone Loc were nominated as best new artists

The "Batman" movie soundtrack produced seven nominations, including four for rock star Prince. He was listed for producer of the year, male pop vocal performance, male rhythm & blues performance for the single "Batdance," and for "Parlym" as best song written for a movie.

The rock band Fine Young Cannibals, featuring the sensuous vocals of actor Roland Gift, was nominated for best album for "The Raw & The Cooked" and for best record and pop group for the single "She Drives Me Crazy."

Ronstadt's work drew multiple nominations: song of the year and duo pop performance for "Don't Know Much," and female pop vocal for the album "Cry Like a Rainstorm-How Like the Wind."

Joel's decades-summing single "We Didn't Start the Fire" was tabbed for best record, song and pop male vocalist.

Petty was nominated for his "Full Moon Fever" album and the single "Free Fallin'" was given the nod for male rock performance.

Raitt was nominated for her album "Nick of Time" and for female pop vocalist for the title track and female rock vocal performance for the album.

Irish rockers U-2 earned a scattering of nominations, including rock group performance for the LP "Rattle and Hum," and in the same category was picked for the single

"When Love Comes to Town" with B.B. King and lead singer Bono were also nominated for best song written for a motion picture for "Angel of Harlem," from the movie "Rattle and Hum."

Mike and the Mechanics were nominated for best record and song for the single "The Living Years" as well as pop group performance and short form music video.

"The Living Years" is a personal story about the singer's relationship with his father. "I think it's one of those songs that sort of reaches anybody," said Mike Rutherford from his cottage in the English countryside.

In the rhythm and blues category, best vocal performance nominations went to Janet Jackson, Aretha Franklin, Natalie Cole, Anita Baker and Vanessa Williams.

Franklin was also nominated twice in the R&B duo performance category for singles with James Brown and Whitney Houston.

Janet Jackson's "Miss You Much" also drew a songwriters nomination. Her "Rhythm Nation" track from the album of the same name was up for an instrumental arrangement Grammy and for best long-form music video — pitting her against brother Michael's "Moonwalker" video.

Bobby Brown, Al Jarreau, Luther Vandross and Smokey Robinson were R&B male vocal nominees.

'Centennial Edition III' Third in series of exhibits includes neon, paper art

TWIN FALLS — Works in clay, neon, paint and paper will be on view as the third of four Centennial shows opens at the Herrett Museum and Art Gallery.

Mike Green, associate professor of art at the College of Southern Idaho and curator of Herrett exhibits, says the quartet, represented in the show "would be on anybody's list of Idaho's top artists."

"Centennial Edition III: Killmaster/Peter/Takahara/Wray" will open Tuesday with a reception for the artists from 7 to 9 p.m. The public is invited, and refreshments will be served.

John Killmaster, a Michigan native, has taught at Boise State University since 1970. Although his work has changed over the years, landscape has remained his central theme.

Well known as a painter and enamel artist, Killmaster's art career began in Detroit, where he studied at the Society of Arts and Crafts. He worked as a commercial artist for 10 years before entering Hope College in Michigan. He later earned a master's degree from the Cranbrook Academy of Art. He now lives in Boise.

Max Peter, another Michigan native, was chairman of the College of Idaho art department from 1953 through 1985, when he retired and moved to Florence, on the Oregon coast. He holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Michigan and a master's from the California College of Arts and Crafts.

A painter and papermaker, Peter has exhibited widely throughout the United States. He won a Governor's Award for excellence in the arts in 1972 and developed the first handmade paper mill in Idaho at the College of Idaho in 1978.

John Takahara, best known for his innovative work in porcelain, has taught at Boise State University since 1963. Born in Korea, he holds a master's from Los Angeles State College and previously taught at Montana State University and the University of Florida.

Takahara developed methods of using porcelain for raku, a low-fired technique of pottery making, and paints with Chinese calligraphy on white porcelain — a practice he compares to painting on canvas.

In 1980, the Boise artist began to

experiment with unglazed pottery and adopted a firing method that utilizes charcoal, rice straw and wood ash for surface decorations.

George Wray of Moscow has been teaching at the University of Idaho since 1969. While in graduate school at the California College of Arts and Crafts, Wray — previously a traditional painter — became interested in the Pop Art movement.

The paintings of Robert Irwin prompted Wray to explore the possibilities of using neon in his own paintings. Eventually, Wray became increasingly interested in light as subject matter, and neon became his primary medium. Area art aficionados know Wray by "Cruck," his neon installation on the outside wall of the Herrett Museum.

"Centennial Edition III" will continue through Feb. 22. Gallery hours are 9:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesday, 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Wednesday through Friday, and 1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. Saturday. The museum is closed Mondays.

Iacocca wrote decade's best-selling book

Who wrote the best-selling book of the 1980s? Was it the master of the macabre, Stephen King? Or the inventor of the techno-thriller, Tom Clancy? Or maybe the mistress of breathless romance, Danielle Steel?

Wrong, wrong, wrong. It was Chrysler's Lee Iacocca. According to an end-of-the-decade best-seller list compiled by Publisher's Weekly, the book industry's trade journal, the best-selling hardcover book in the

1980s was "Iacocca: An Autobiography" by Iacocca with William Novak. The 1984 release sold more than 2.5 million copies.

Novelists such as King and Clancy couldn't even compete with the runners-up on the non-fiction list: Bill Cosby's 1986 "Fatherhood" (2.3

million copies); Robert Kowalski's 1987, "The 8-Week Cholesterol Cure" (2.2 million); and Harvey and Marilyn Diamond's 1985 "Fit for Life" (2 million).

Clancy's 1989 thriller "Clear and Present Danger" clocked in at 1.6 million copies by year's end, making

it the No. 1 fiction bestseller of the decade. It was followed by King's 1989 "The Dark Half" (1.5 million) and 1987 "The Tommyknockers" (1.4 million). Jean Auel's 1985 "The Mammoth Hunters" (1.35 million) edged out Steel's 1989 "Daddy" (1.32) for fourth place.

Successful buddy-cop movie 'Tango' is funny, energetic

"Tango and Cash" may be just another in a long line of buddy-cop movies, but it's a good one — fast, funny, with frenzied action that establishes a tempo that never slackens.

Of course, you have to approach it as a cartoon. That's the way it plays. All you are expected to do is give the boys license and let them run with it.

The "boys" are played by Sylvester Stallone and Kurt Russell, who are supposed to be Los Angeles cops who make daily headlines with drug busts. A drug king, played by Jack Palance, wants the two men out of the way, but he doesn't want them killed. That would make them martyrs, he says. Instead, he decides to frame them. That will put them in prison where paid goons can take care of them.

"Tango and Cash" do go to prison, but this is no ordinary prison. Perret (Palance) has access to the establishment. He seems to be able to come and go as he chooses. When his goons have the two cops cornered, he appears on the scene, inside the prison. You won't believe this, but you have to remember that it is all comic book.

The prison footage is brutal enough, but it is brief. And because you know the film's producers don't want any of this to be taken seriously, you know the two cops will be rescued, just as the hero is always rescued in the comic book, at the very last moment.

The two men do escape, and it is exciting footage. On the outside, they go after the guys who helped frame them. When they finally make it to Perret, he is living in a fortress on an abandoned air field and the movie then looks like "Mad Max." At other times, it plays like the James Bond movies, "Bulman" and Bruce Lee's "Enter the Dragon." It also plays like "Beverly Hills Cop," something the producers hoped to emphasize.

The music, for instance, sounds like the score from the Eddie Mur-

phy film, and the attitude is about the same.

Stallone was supposed to act in "Beverly Hills Cop" before the role went to Murphy. As Tango, he proves he can do that kind of role. With short hair and a yuppie appearance, he goes on about stocks and bonds, and when Cash (Russell) becomes too friendly with Tango's sister, Tango begins to behave like an older, conservative brother.

"Tango and Cash" may give Stallone the break he needs. Not that he really needs one, but the role does take him away from the Rocky-Rambo roles with which he has become very closely identified.

The script makes one amusing reference to the "Rambo" movies. You

will have to hear it for yourself. Russell and Stallone make a good team. If this film makes it, look for them in another. The finish to "Tango and Cash" plays like a segue to a sequel.

Teri Hatcher plays Tango's sister. The character she plays gives Tango and Cash further reason to kid each other, insult each other, which they do, but it's all good-natured.

Palance, who doesn't work that much, is ideally cast as the crime king. If you are looking for someone to play a comic book villain, Palance is your man. No one hisses the way he does.

If you're searching for an action film, one with a liberal helping of comedy, "Tango and Cash" is it.

'Magnolias' ends up as vaudeville

STEEL MAGNOLIAS (PG). In Robert Harling's movie adaptation of his play, his yammering sextet — Sally Field, Shirley MacLaine, Olympia Dukakis, Daryl Hannah, Dolly Parton and Julia Roberts — do too much prancing and sashaying and elbowing that the film, set in small-town Louisiana, turns into Southern-fried vaudeville. These belles should take their act on the road as tag-team wrestlers.

ALWAYS (PG). A better title for Steven Spielberg's remake of the 1943 Spencer Tracy movie "A Guy Named Joe" might be "Forever," which is roughly its running time. All of us who fell under Holly Hunter's spell in "Broadcast News" and stuck to her through "Miss Firecracker" are in for a rough time of it. Cuteness turning over to is not a pleasant sight. Richard Dreyfuss can do no better than his dialogue or his situation — or of his direction, and all of that is, as they say, loath-rotting.

BACK TO THE FUTURE, PART II (PG). If "Back to the Future" made you bored and queasy, then the time-traveling inventiveness in its sequel comes as a pleasant surprise. Of course, if you were among the 92 percent of the world who loved the ride in Dr. Emmett Brown's diabolical DeLorean back

IN 1985, then "Part III" is your oyster. Well, your hamburger with onions. If it proves anything, it's that director Robert Zemeckis is getting cooler and even more adept at controlled mayhem. With Michael J. Fox, Christopher Lloyd, Lea Thompson.

BLAZE (R). The raucous and selectively true story of the love affair of Earl K. Long, the 63-year-old governor of Louisiana, and red-haired, 28-year-old burlesque queen Blaze Starr. Paul Newman throws himself into bringing every eccentric, disrespectful quirk of Ol' Earl to life and he succeeds fiercely well. With her tumbling red hair and her pansy-shaped face, Lolita Davydovich is luscious and endearing all at once. The one who has pulled back is writer-director Ron Shelton. How the maker of "Bull Durham" could have come this close and then have tip-toed away from a portrait as wild and as flamboyant as his subjects is a question to ponder.

THE LITTLE MERMAID (G). Directed and written by John Musker and Ron Clements, with a yeoman team of animators, designers and craftspeople, this impudent, grandiose, multilevel crowd-pleaser shares with the classic Disney animated features of the '30s and '40s a sense of over-reaching, of grabbing every snazzy effect possible within old-line narrative forms. Ariel, the saucy heroine, is a sexy honey-bunch not much like the sad noble

sea-maid in Hans Christian Andersen's original story. But there is a primal power that most recent Disney cartoons lack: Midway through, Sam Wright, who is the voice of a hypersensitive crab named Sebastian, leads a calypso number called "Under the Sea" — an infectious show-stopper by songwriters Howard Ashman and Alan Menken — and afterwards should have any audience in his pocket.

THE WAR OF THE ROSES (R). In the hands of director Danny DeVito and writer Michael Leeson, this story of Oliver and Barbara Rose is biting and vicious, a styptic pencil on the battered face of "civilized divorce." It's also thoughtful, laughingly funny and bravely true to its own black-and-blue comic vision. Although Michael Douglas's performance has been calibrated to give some idea of Oliver's charm, you could call Oliver an insensitive, workaholic, self-centered, countless tox. Kathleen Turner's Barbara may be sexually triumphant, but she is socially unsure and after all these years with Oliver, her self-esteem has vanished. If you're tired of cloying Christmas eggnog, "War" is Christmas spirits of ammonia.

SUN VALLEY — Jim Whittaker, the first American to climb Mt. Everest, will present a program highlighting the goals and progress of an international effort known as Earth Day 20 - International Peace Climb 1990.

On Wednesday, the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities will host Whittaker, who first climbed Everest in May 1963 and later led the first American ascent of K-2 in 1978.

Whittaker, America's Himalaya impresario turned diplomat, along with his wife, photojournalist Diane Roberts, will present the slide/lecture program in the Continental Room of the Sun Valley Inn at 7:30 p.m. Cost for the program is \$6 or

Award-winning team readies comedy for premier in high-profile time slot

New television shows are a lot like chili: The first taste seldom tells you just how good — or bad — a batch you've got on your hands. The real flavor tends to emerge only over time and repeated samplings.

And they're like chili in another way, too: A slapdash affair thrown together with whatever comes to hand is as likely — some say more likely — to result in something palatably memorable as a meticulous recipe with the finest ingredients lovingly simmered to perceived perfection.

NBC faces a high-profile example of this culinary conundrum with the debut of its new series, "Grand" on Thursday, Jan. 18.

"Grand" is a half-hour semi-serialized comedy set in a fictional Pennsylvania city in decline. It takes off from the interlocked lives of three families of varying socioeconomic levels. Single mother Janice Pasetti (Pamela Reed) lives in a trailer park with her daughter, Edda (Sara Rue), while earning a living as a housekeeper. One of her employers is Harris Weldon (John Randolph), a piano-factory owner and leading citizen who is fighting a losing battle against foreign imports. In the time-honored tradition of the sitcom rich, he is saddled with a lackadaisical son (Joel Murray) and sarcastic aide (John Neville). Janice also works for Harris' niece, Carol Anne Smithson (Bonnie Hunt), who is obsessed by the ticking of her biological clock, and her new, upwardly mobile husband Tom (Michael McKean).

Nothing special about any of this, right? But then, there was nothing particularly special about the idea of a family sitcom, either — until produ-

cers Marcy Carsey and Tom Werner spun that drop into the gold of "The Cosby Show" and "Roseanne." And guess who the executive producers of "Grand" are? Right the first time. Not only that, The Cos himself is executive consultant (whatever that is), and the series was created by Michael Leeson, who won a pair of Emmys for his writing on "Taxi" and "The Cosby Show." So which is it: the perfect recipe that will take home the ratings blue ribbon, or the proverbial too many cooks spoiling the chili?

For an extra pinch of spice, NBC has endowed "Grand" with its best time slot, like a millionaire who leaves his entire estate to his cat. It may be the most valuable 30 minutes in television, nestled between blockbusters "Cheers" and "L.A. Law," where "Lifestyles of the Impoverished and Wretched" could land regularly in the Nielsen Top 20. Good and faithful NBC servant "Dear John" has been

booted into the Wednesday slot between "Night Court" and the foundering "Quantum Leap," where the One-Two-One Club might find more to worry about than where their next dates are coming from.

That "Grand" has reaped this bounty could mean one of several things: NBC thinks it has a real skyrocket on its hands and wants to give it the biggest send-off it can, or "Grand" is the biggest bomb since "Fat Man and Little Boy," and the network is scrambling desperately for something, anything, to save it. Or it could be that "Grand" is a nice little show that will run out its three or four seasons and serve the greater purpose of cementing relations between NBC and hitmakers Carsey-Werner.

Time will tell. Chili, anyone?

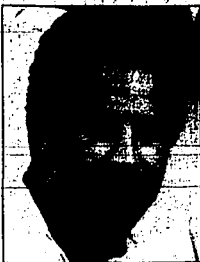

CBS film crew comes to E. Idaho to film rescue story re-enactment

ISLAND-PARK, Idaho (AP) — An approaching storm stopped us if on cue, clearing the way for filming to begin on a segment of the CBS program "Rescue:911" featuring local residents and their role in rescuing an injured snowmobiler.

A film crew began work Monday on a re-enactment of the rescue of Bob Collins, 44, a Salida, Colo., man who was critically injured last March 17 when he lost control of his snowmobile and hit his head on a tree.

Collins was wearing a helmet, but still suffered extensive head injuries. He has only fleeting memories of what took place during the eight days following the accident while he was being treated at Eastern-Idaho Regional Medical Center in Idaho Falls for a severe skull fracture, a broken jaw and broken bones behind his right eardrum.

"How do you say thanks to someone who has saved your life?" Collins said Monday. "I feel a tremendous debt to these people. Words simply cannot express the

thanks that I feel."
 The "Rescue:911" segment, directed by Mark Cole of Los Angeles, is expected to air in six to eight weeks. Filming was expected to continue through Thursday.

The film crew arrived in Island Park last week. Besides re-enacting the accident, they interviewed members of the Island Park Quick Response Unit and other snowmobilers involved with Collins' rescue.

The actual participants in the rescue operation are portraying themselves in the filming, and even Collins' wrecked snowmobile will be included in scenes after the crash to add to the realism.

Stunt rider Lane Perrish of Ketchum will portray Collins before the accident. Monday's filming included the crash re-enactment, which required Perrish to ride a snowmobile over a 20-foot embankment.

Collins will be featured in the interview portion of the program. A professional skier, Perrish said he was contacted by the Idaho Film Bureau to stage the riding

stunts needed in the filming. "I mostly have been called to fall off snowmobiles," he said. "I rarely have to ride them over an embankment."

The rescue was brought to the attention of program directors by Ed Wright of Ammon, an emergency medical technician who happened to be snowmobiling in the same area. Wright administered first aid to Collins and helped keep him warm until more help could be summoned.

Wright and Steve Jones of Idaho Falls, who went for help, will portray themselves, as will Island Park Quick Response Unit volunteer EMTs Bobbie Killmer and Mick Blackburn of Island Park and Ed Brashier of Ashton.

Janes is the editor of Snowmobile West magazine. He and Wright were shooting photos for the magazine when they found Collins, who had been with his wife on a guided snowmobile tour through Yellowstone National Park sponsored by a leading snowmobile manufacturer.

ABC introduces new programming to break middle ratings position

LOS ANGELES — These days, ABC is the network in the middle.

Its ratings are OK, not nearly as strong as NBC's nor as weak as CBS'.

Its new programs are decent, not nearly as bad as they once were but not as good as they might be.

And, as you might expect, Bob Iger, president of ABC Entertainment, is a middle-aged, middle-of-the-road, middlebrow guy — not much of a showman, but not a mere businessman, either.

Iger talked to TV critics the other day about ABC's season to date and its upcoming shows. Mostly he wanted to focus on the so-called second season, when ABC has a full slate of new shows to introduce: three hour-long dramas, two half-hour dramas, an hour-long action show and two half-hour comedies. He's optimistic, as all network execs must be.

"I can't wait to get these shows on the air," he said.

Although there's only one show he's actually created from start to finish since becoming chief programmer last March — "America's Funniest Home Videos" — Iger is responsible for selecting the rest of the mid-season lineup, even those shows developed before he arrived.

And it's a mixed bag.

ABC is trying to position two hour-long dramas, "Capital News" and "Equal Justice," as "quality" shows but, as always, quality is in the eye of the beholder.

Both would seem to have all the ingredients: big ensemble casts, settings with potential for drama, and producers with the right pedigrees.

"Capital News," about reporters and editors at a Washington newspaper, comes from David Milch, a "Hill Street Blues" alumnus, while "Equal Justice," about a city prosecutor's office, is the creation of Thomas Carter, who played basketball on "The White Shadow" before directing the pilots of such estimable shows as "St. Elsewhere" and "Miami Vice."

Yet neither show is quite as good as we expected them to be. "Equal Justice" is watchable, but the plots are predictable and some of the characters are so forgettable that they could use name tags. It's as if the producers set out to make a grittier version of "LA Law" but couldn't pull it off.

As for "Capital News," the real problem is that reporters don't do much. They (we) mostly observe what's going on. These newsroom types, though, are richly drawn, particularly a gossip columnist named Milles Plato, who has the tenacity of

a Bob Woodward, the dress style of a Tom Wolfe and the ethics of a National Enquirer snoop. He's a great character.

Where Iger will find room for these dramas is another matter. "We could use an eighth 10 o'clock time period," he said. ABC probably will take its Monday movies off the air in March and then temporarily dislodge either "China Beach" or "thirtysomething." The problem is that ABC loaded up its schedule with sitcoms last fall, creating a glut of hour-long shows for mid-season.

"H.E.L.P." is yet another new hour awaiting a slot. It's a straight action show, with plenty of stunts, about an emergency unit of fire fighters, police officers and paramedics in New York. Nothing you haven't seen before.

More intriguing are ABC's two half-hour dramas, "Elvis" and "Brewster Place." The "Elvis" pilot is well-made, and the stories about the young Elvis — the series is set in the early 1950s — are less kitsch (and less sordid) than the sad tales of the aging King. "This was Elvis as Marlon Brando and James Dean," said Jerry Schilling, a longtime Presley pal and co-producer of the series. A young actor named Michael St. Gerard makes a soulful Elvis.

Winfrey gets 2nd job with 'Brewster' role

HOLLYWOOD — Oprah Winfrey is going to be a very busy woman in March when the series version of her miniseries "The Women of Brewster Place" starts production.

The half-hour-drama-series for ABC will be filmed at Winfrey's new studio in Chicago, where she also produces her daily talk show.

"The way we've designed it is that Oprah, first and foremost, will continue to do her daytime talk show," Reuben Cannon, producer of the series, told a press conference here.

"She loves the show and she'll continue to do it. She has a contract through 1993. The production

schedule has been designed so that she will record her talk show Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday and on Wednesday afternoon, Thursday and Friday, she will be filming "Brewster Place."

Cannon said that Winfrey's schedule will still allow her to appear in much of the series, noting its half-hour length.

"It takes anywhere from 4½ to 5 days to film the series," Cannon said. "The fact that we have her 2½ days out of the week allows us in 22 minutes to get quite a bit of film on her. There will be no lack of Oprah's on-camera involvement."

"Her involvement as a star and as executive producer will be constant," he added. "She's not just the star of our series; she's the fran-

chise."

The series carries the name of simply "Brewster Place," a change from the miniseries title that is significant.

"Some of the criticism we took on the min-series was because the story was told from a particular point of view, that of the women of Brewster Place. The black male roles were either absent or they were not positive," Cannon said.

"I trust that we will not receive that criticism in the series because we have wonderful black male role models, in particular one character named Ralph Thomas; a new character who has moved from the South up north to Brewster Place and, in an effort to achieve a dream for his children, has to work two jobs."

General Foods to warn public of fake taste test

BOSTON (AP) — The maker of Sanka acknowledged Tuesday that a national ad appearing to show an impromptu taste test for the decaffeinated coffee was really staged with actors.
 General Foods USA said it will alter its ad following an agreement with a Massachusetts state official who criticized the ad as misleading.
 "Viewers have come to expect that participants in any taste test are real consumers stating their honest opinions, and not paid actors extolling the product with comment supplied to them by the advertiser," said Mary Ann Walsh, the state's secretary of Consumer Affairs and Business Regulation.
 The ads, which are broadcast nationally, will have the word "dramatization" superimposed at the bottom of the screen for three seconds as the commercial begins, according to the agreement between Walsh and General Foods.
 "We really do not think that any changes in the commercial are

required, either by testimonial guidelines or for the protection of the consumer," said General Foods spokesman Cliff Sessions. "But in a spirit of cooperation we are adding the caption, and to avoid any possibility of viewer confusion."
 Set in a New Jersey railroad station at 7:14 a.m., the commercial features people stopping at a table set up with Sanka cups and containers.
 "This is great," says one person. "What is this?" others add. "Delicious." "You know this smells really good." Says another: "No way, this isn't Sanka."
 Federal guidelines apply to commercials that identify the person approving the product, or those which make competitive claims, Sessions said. Sessions said the Sanka ad does neither.
 General Foods, Young and Rubicam, the company's advertising agency, and all three networks approved the ad before it aired, Sessions said.

CNN will provide news to Vietnam via satellite

WASHINGTON (AP) — Turner Broadcasting System said Thursday it had won its battle with the Bush administration over providing Cable News Network and a satellite receiving station to Vietnam.

The Atlanta-based Turner said the Commerce and Treasury departments, which had refused Turner's request on grounds the deal would violate a strict U.S. trade embargo against Vietnam, finally agreed Thursday to allow the company to deliver its 24-hour cable TV news channel to Vietnamese Television.

In return, Turner will drop a lawsuit it filed last week in U.S. District Court against the Treasury, Commerce and State departments seeking an injunction to overturn the government's refusal, said Bert Carp, Turner's vice president for government relations.

Turner had said it would provide the earth receiving station at no charge and the CNN signal for the price of 50 Vietnamese dong a year, which is less than one U.S. penny.

But the administration, in agree-

ing to the deal, said Turner will not be allowed to collect any payment, according to an administration official who spoke only on the condition of anonymity.

The administration official said that in making its decision, the government considered "the importance of having U.S. news programs in Vietnam." At the same time, the administration stuck to its guns over "strictly prohibiting" any money changing hands, the official said.

Treasury Department spokesman Larry Batdorf said he would have no immediate comment.

Congress had amended the trade embargo in 1988 to exempt information materials from trade sanctions. The adminis-

tration had interpreted that to mean physical materials such as books and videocassettes could be exchanged with Vietnam, but not "immaterial" commodities, including TV signals.

Vietnam already provides videocassettes to Turner for "CNN World Report," Carp said.
