Modular reactor has edge

IDAHO FALLS — If the federal government builds just one New Production Reactor, a modular design proposed for Idaho might have the edge, says a top Idaho National Engineering Laboratory official.

The Department of Energy now plans to build two NPERs — a heavy water reactor at South Carolina's Savannah River Plant and a high-temperature gas-cooled reactor at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

In an interview, Jim Zane said the gas-cooled reactor "looks more and more like a viable solution."

The gas-cooled reactor design may be further along at this time, and its costs might be more predictable, Zane said.

Another advantage may be the gas-cooled reactor's power production capability. All things being equal, Zane said, the Energy Department might lean toward one reactor design that could also produce electricity. The gas-cooled reactor could generate enough power for the Energy Department to recover its costs within a 20-year period, he said.

While the DOE now plans to build its gas-cooled reactor in Idaho, it might not necessarily stay that way.

The INEL is "very capable" of building a gas-cooled reactor, and would be a contender for the project, Zane said.

Ex-chief seeks fines owed city

TWIN FALLS — Former police chief Tim Qualls, who retired this spring with plans to continue part-time detective work for the city, has been assigned instead to collect outstanding traffic fines.

"It's something that's got to be done," Qualls said. "I'm not too happy about it, but I told them I'd do it."

Qualls is a 38-year veteran of the Twin Falls police force. He trained with the Secret Service in comparing handwriting on forgeries, and he has testified here and in neighboring states as an expert in fingerprint and handwriting analysis.

Qualls said he has done "very little criminal investigation" since becoming a part-time consultant. Paul Du Fresne, who replaced Qualls as the city's director of public safety, said Qualls was chosen for the assignment because his police experience makes him familiar with the court system and the people involved in it.

"Tim's certainly got ample qualifications to handle it," Du Fresne said.

And the project suits Qualls' part-time schedule, he said. Qualls, who retires in March, works about 20 hours a week as a consultant for the city. He was contracted for investigative work and projects for \$18.77 an hour, City Manager Tom Courtney said.

"We felt it would be a very good assignment for him and overall, in the long run, benefit the city," Courtney said.

Thousands rally to mark ruling

WASHINGTON — About 75,000 abortion opponents — close to a record number — rallied behind the White House and marched to the Supreme Court Monday to mark the 17th anniversary of the court's landmark 1973 decision legalizing abortion.

"They waved banners, prayed, sang 'God Bless America' and welcomed words of support from President Bush, who said the anti-abortion protest movement 'reminds Americans, especially young Americans, of the self-evident moral superiority of adoption over abortion.'"

However, abortion rights supporters made sure their voices also were heard.

While Bush was speaking, Planned Parenthood urged Americans to call the White House switchboard to register their support for legal abortions, and a group of 100 Republicans who favor abortion rights picketed at the Republican National Committee.

Shortly before Cardinal John O'Connor of New York and former New York Gov. Hugh Carey spoke to the crowd of abortion opponents, a small group of abortion rights advocates put up a memorial to women who have died from illegal or botched abortions.

Similar anti-abortion rallies and abortion rights demonstrations were held around the country Monday.

This year, the abortion opponents' rally and Bush's message took on added political significance because of the Supreme Court's decision last summer in Webster v. Reproductive Health Services to give more leeway to individual states to restrict abortion.

"Since the Webster decision I feel politicians are kind of on the line," said Elmer Feldkamp, the postmaster of Baileyville, Kan., who traveled to Washington for the rally.

"The ones that have been waffling are going to get beat," he said.

Political consultants agree with him.

"Dancing around just does not work with the voters," said Republican political consultant Ed Male. "It raises the issue of integrity and honesty. If you move around then you tend to start looking like an opportunist with your finger in the wind."

Individual politicians need to take a stand, but Republicans as a party are moving away from categorical positions on abortion. Party chairman Lee Atwater reiterated last week that there was room under the GOP umbrella for politicians regardless of their stand on abortion.

The Republicans' public disavowal of a strict anti-abortion stand follows defeats of anti-abortion Republican gubernatorial candidates in Virginia and New Jersey and strong support for Republican women politicians who support abortion rights.

However, leaders of the National Right to Life Committee praised the party and especially Bush for his continued support. "Bush has shown himself to be a strong pro-life leader," said Burke Balch, state legislative coordinator for the group.

Many of the abortion opponents at Monday's rally said the Webster decision had given them new hope, but that they had not taken advantage of it.

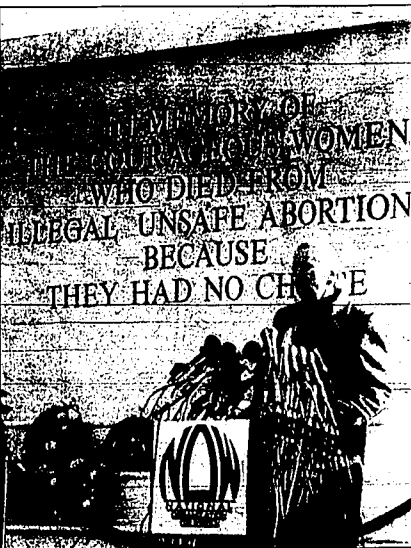
"Webster brought out the pro-abortionists," said Mary Manno, a Washington native who was marching for the first time. "So, I thought this year it was important to come, to counter the pro-abortion marchers."

"Just as Roe drained the pro-choice movement of energy, Webster drained the pro-life movement," said Marjorie Hershey, a professor of political science at Indiana University, in a telephone interview.

GOP senators allow Demos' bills to stand

BOISE — The Senate Republican majority, concerned about generating even more publicity for its plan to manage abortion legislation, has allowed two Democratic bills bucking that plan to remain alive.

After a 20-minute closed-door meeting on Monday, the GOP took no action to kill the two bills introduced last week by Democrats who are angered over the majority plan to limit the initial abortion debate to the House.

With a 23-19 majority, the Republicans could have reinforced that management policy by voting to kill the bills before they were assigned to the Senate Staff Affairs Committee.

Senate President Pro Tem Michael Crapo, R-Idaho Falls, said the decision not to contest the introductions came after Democratic leaders said

Wilderness bill tops list of Idaho issues in Congress

WASHINGTON — Visions of an Idaho wilderness bill, an expanded Saylor Creek bombing range and a coin honoring Idaho's centennial will be filling the heads of some Idaho members of Congress during the 1990 session.

But the primary battle in Congress is likely to be fought over the national budget.

Congress — accused of being ineffectual during 1989 — may continue to face deadlines on major issues as members operate under the shadow of looming 1990 elections

and the rising federal debt, observers say. Congress reconvenes Tuesday after a two-month recess.

"Everything we do will be driven by the budget," said Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho. "The deficit is outrageous. That means that what we do in Eastern Europe, what we do for education, what we do for environmental cleanup will all be affected."

"At some point we're going to have to face it (the rising national debt) and the longer we put it off the more painful it's going to become," Stallings added. "It's like putting off that cancer operation."

Although lawmakers and analysts project a

so-called "peace dividend" — money saved as the defense budget declines with the thawing of the Cold War — some say even this may not lessen the weight of the budget crunch.

"I'm not sure there is going to be that much of a peace dividend," Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, said. Much of money to be spent for defense over the next five years is already in the pipeline, he said.

Probably the biggest and most emotional Idaho legislation to be considered by Congress in 1990 is the wilderness bill drafted by Gov. Cecil Andrus, a Democrat, and Republican Sen. James McClure.

The proposal — which would set aside 1.4

million acres of Idaho forest lands for inclusion in the National Wilderness Preservation System — was approved by a Senate panel last fall but key senators remained pessimistic about its chances.

Environmentalists say the bill will not sufficiently protect Idaho wilderness while industry representatives say it sets aside too much land.

McClure, who announced earlier this month that he would not seek reelection this November, acknowledged that his "lame duck" status could hurt his chances of pushing

Azerbaijanis march, mourn, threaten to secede

MOSCOW — Up to 2 million wailing, black-clad Azerbaijanis marched through Baku on Monday to mourn those killed when Soviet troops put down a nationalist revolt, and the republic's legislature threatened secession if Moscow did not pull out its soldiers.

In further defiance of President Mikhail S. Gorbachev, Lenin's legislators declared Moscow's state of emergency void. Militants vowed to keep up crippling strikes in Baku, an oil center of 1.8 million people on the Caspian Sea, until troops leave.

Communist leaders from Soviet Armenia and Azerbaijan took a tentative step Monday toward ending 10 days of ethnic warfare, agreeing to withdraw armed groups from areas along their border, Tass said. But activists in Armenia and Azerbaijan said they doubted the truce would be kept.

The official Soviet news agency reported 12 more people killed in ethnic clashes Monday on the border of the two republics, raising the toll since Jan. 13 to 167. Soviet officials said 83 of those were from the Soviet assault on the Azerbaijani capital Saturday, including 14 soldiers and members of their families.

More than 500 have been wounded in the conflicts.

Tass said the 12 new deaths occurred when Armenian militants fired on an Azerbaijani village in the Volchy Votro border area.

Azerbaijani activists told a Moscow news conference Monday that 3,700 died when Soviet troops entered Baku, Tass said, but emphasized this was an unconfirmed figure. An emergency overnight session of the Azerbaijani Supreme Soviet legislature demanded full withdrawal of Soviet troops from the republic, with the exception of border districts with Armenia, said Baku lawyer Viliyad Mamedov, who attended the 11½-

hour overnight session. Lawmakers also demanded lifting of the curfew and state of emergency in Baku and other areas of Azerbaijan, which Moscow imposed without the approval of Azerbaijan authorities, Mamedov said in a telephone interview.

If those demands are not met, Mamedov said, the legislature will consider voting to secede from the Soviet Union.

At Monday's mass rally in Baku, demonstrators carried posters reading, "Gorbachev is the butcher of the Azerbaijani people" and "Azerbaijanis will not succumb to tanks," said Shain Gajiyev, a Baku journalist.

**Boise businessman mulls Senate bid**  
BOISE (AP) — Ward Parkinson, who with his brother Joe founded the multimillion-dollar Micron Technology Corp., apparently is considering a bid for the Republican nomination for the U.S. Senate.  
Sources Monday indicated Parkinson has contacted a number of top Republicans, seeking support. Telephone calls to his office were referred to a Boise number, which was answered with a "Parkinson for Senate" recording.  
Parkinson could not be reached to confirm his plans.  
If he enters the race for the GOP nomination for the Senate seat being vacated by Sen. James McClure, it would become a three-way battle that could get bigger. Five-term GOP Congressman Larry Clark announced his nomination on Jan. 8, and Attorney General Jim Jones launched his bid one week later.  
In addition, state Sen. John Hansen, R-Idaho Falls, has been considering the race and may be encouraged to get in if there are at least three other candidates.  
No Democrats have formally announced. Democrats said earlier they are waiting for the results of polling before deciding who to support for the Senate race. Rep. Richard Stalling of the 2nd District and former governor John Evans, a Burley banker, are considering the race.

**Caldwell man sentenced up to 10 years**  
NAMPWA (AP) — A Caldwell man has been sentenced to up to 10 years in prison for the suffocation death of a 13-month-old child.  
Stanley V. Barnes, 28, was sentenced by 3rd District Judge Gerald Weston on Monday. He originally was charged with the first-degree murder of Justin Rawson, but pleaded guilty to a charge of felony injury to a child.  
Weston sentenced Barnes to a fixed five-year term in the Idaho State Penitentiary with an additional five years indeterminate. Barnes had warned the court his ex-father-in-law, a prison guard had threatened his life.  
Barnes was living with Debra Rawson, the child's mother, when the death occurred on Feb. 22, 1989. The couple told police the baby was blue when they found him and attempted to revive him.

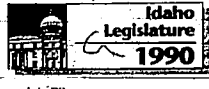
**Man arrested in connection with killing**  
POCATELLO (AP) — A Pocatello man has been arrested in connection with the execution-style killing of a man whose decomposed body was found in the hills south of town several months ago.  
Ricky S. Beebe, 19, was arrested Monday afternoon on a charge of first-degree murder. Magistrate Wesley Crowder ordered him held without bond and set a preliminary hearing for Jan. 31.  
Police said Beebe was being held in the Bannock County on an unrelated burglary charge before the murder charge was filed.  
The break in the murder case came over the weekend following several interviews with unnamed individuals, said Bannock County Sheriff Bill Lynn.

**Panel approves boost in exemption**  
BOISE (AP) — A proposal to boost the homestead exemption — the amount of home and personal property not subject to attachment for debts — has been endorsed by a committee of the Idaho House.  
The Revenue and Taxation Committee on Monday unanimously gave do-pass approval to legislation sponsored by Rep. James Stoiceff, D-Sandpoint, boosting the homestead exemption from \$30,000 to \$50,000.  
If the legislation becomes law, the first \$50,000 in property valuation will not be subject to attachment to pay debts. However, Stoiceff said the exemption does not erase attachments or liens through contracts such as mortgages.  
Stoiceff said the "homestead exemption" has been in state law since territorial days, but the amount allowed has not kept up with inflation.  
The level was \$10,000 for many years but Stoiceff said the value of the average Idaho home is nearly \$60,000 now.

**Judge sets sentencing for murder case**  
PAYETTE (AP) — A Fruitland man accused of killing his pregnant teen-aged daughter has pleaded guilty to first-degree murder, Payette County officials say.  
Rocky Allen Adams, 37, entered his plea at a Monday morning hearing in 3rd District Court. Judge Dennis Gott scheduled sentencing for March 5.  
"We will be asking for the death penalty," said Payette County Deputy Prosecutor Greg Frites. If Adams decided not to plead guilty, jury selection in his trial would have begun on Tuesday.

**Educators press for huge budget hikes**

BOISE (AP) — Top education officials pressed state lawmakers on Monday for dramatic increases in state aid, while Gov. Cecil Andrus made an election-year plea for legislative spending restraint.  
On the first day in a week of hearings before budget writers, both Board of Education President George Alvarez and state Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans said the spending blueprint for the year that begins in July offers Idaho the chance to take another major step toward improving education.  
"This year we obviously think we have some opportunities to develop the system and develop some excellence along the way," Alvarez told the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee.  
In the House, meanwhile, the huge Republican majority began closed-door discussions on how to dispose of the state's record \$126.3 million surplus. But GOP Caucus Chairman Bruce Newcomb of Burley said the majority reached no consensus. House Speaker Tom Boyd of Genesee was away from the Capitol because of the death of his mother last week in Filer.  
At the same time, Andrus repeated his willingness to work with the Legislature on a state budget acceptable to all sides. But amid an unprecedented cash surplus and solid revenue prospects for the future, he urged restraint as spending was on the verge of bumping up against a little-known limit set a decade ago.  
Possibly concerned about legislative largesse just months before the general election, Andrus sent letters to the chairman of the House and Senate budget committees, reminding them of the 1980 law limiting state spending to a percent of Idaho's total personal income.  
The governor has proposed a 1991 budget for continuing government programs and services of just under \$880 million, sweetened with another \$24 million in one-time expenditure authorizations from the surplus. The 1980 limitation would cap spending



at \$894 million once various authorized adjustments are made.  
While there was no fear that the 1991 budget would hit that ceiling, some administration officials were concerned about pushing 1991 spending further could cause state budgets in the mid-1990s to be capped by the limit.  
"Crafting a budget is never easy, and this year required as much cutting and adjusting as any other year," Andrus told Sen. "Awards Party" Melba and Rep. Kathleen Gurnsey, R-Boise. "That limitation was fully taken into account as I prepared the executive budget. ... I, and members of my staff, stand willing to assist you at any time."  
With 75 percent of all general state revenue going to its programs, education would clearly be a victim of any


**Legislative-budget writers concerned that college presidents were muzzled**

BOISE (AP) — The state Board of Education's executive director is reassuring legislative budget writers that there has been no attempt this year to muzzle the funds-seeking presidents of Idaho's four colleges.  
Rayburn Barton told the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee on Monday that the board has only asked the presidents to support its budget plan to avoid any suggestion that the schools are fighting among themselves for available state aid.  
"We think it is very important that we work for all of higher education, not just one institution over another," Barton said.  
House Appropriations Vice Chairman Mack Neihaur, R-Paul, said he had been told the presidents of the four schools were advised not to contact members of the budget committees or respond independently to questions from committee members.  
But even after Barton's explanation, Appropriations Chairman Kathleen Gurnsey, R-Boise, expressed concern that budget writers were no longer receiving candid comments about spending from the presidents.  
"Nothing more has been done this year to the college presidents than has been done in any other year," Barton said. "It is not an easy thing to do to muzzle a college president."  
He said the board only wanted to avoid the kind of infighting that developed two years ago between

**Authorities nab Butte County man after chase**  
ARCO (AP) — A high speed chase involving speeds of more than 100 miles an hour has resulted in the arrest of a young Butte County man after an incident centering on the Challis High School girls' basketball team.  
Butte County Sheriff's deputy Cary Van Eiten said Josh N. Ford, 18, was cited for driving with a suspended license, reckless driving and fleeing a police officer.  
The incident started when Ford and two passengers, Jarrod Davis, 15, and Stacy Davis, both of North Fork, followed a Challis High School bus carrying the girl's basketball team south on Highway 93 from Challis. The three allegedly had been gesturing toward the girls, passing the bus, then allowing the bus to pass them, Van Eiten said.  
When the bus reached Mackay at 2:35 p.m., a faculty member called authorities. Butte County Sheriff's Deputy Chris Merrill spotted the bus and car in Arco, and started chasing Ford.  
Ford fled north from Arco on Highway 93, and Van Eiten said he set up a road block three miles north of Arco.

year, we will come back next year, we will come back the year after... until sooner or later we have victory." Norma McCorvey, the woman who was the "Jane Roe" in Roe vs. Wade, was a keynote speaker at a pro-choice rally that drew about 1,000 people to the steps of the California Capitol in Sacramento.

"We're still fighting and will continue to fight as long as the fight must go on," she said. "The straw that broke the camel's back." Sarah Weddington, the Texas lawyer who argued Mrs. McCorvey's case before the Supreme Court, told a breakfast in Dallas: "We are here to say we won 17 years ago today, and we will win again."

The Roe vs. Wade anniversary has become an increasingly important day to those debating the future of abortion in the United States. This year's commemoration carried special weight because of last summer's Supreme Court ruling in Missouri's Webster case. That ruling, which opened the door for states to impose some restrictions on abortion, was the biggest legal victory in decades for anti-abortion forces and led to speculation that the high court would overturn Roe vs. Wade.

Town divided over sub testing plans

KETCHIKAN, Alaska (AP) — The Navy's search for a quieter nuclear submarine is causing a ruckus in this port town. Residents are divided over Pentagon plans to measure the noise of Seawolf-class attack submarines in the rich fishing grounds that support the town's economy.

"It's going to seriously hurt our economy as far as tourism, sport and commercial fishing industry goes," said Jack Lee, a member of the Ketchikan Gateway Borough Assembly and one of the project's most outspoken critics. Lee added that the community "also has some very valid concerns about safety" about "our inability to evacuate in light of the Navy's pathetic safety record."

Army, FBI sweep warehouses for bombs

Thomas Trout, Parks and Recreation Council member, said the project will develop in three phases.

## Darrington bill puts state in charge of fuel tanks

BOISE — The Idaho Senate on Monday approved a resolution designed to allow the state, rather than the federal government, to police underground fuel storage tanks.

The resolution, written by state Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Deer, calls for the state's Department of Health and Welfare, through its Division of Water Quality, to work with the federal Environmental Protection Agency to find an acceptable way to enforce regulations governing underground storage tanks.

The new federal regulations on



underground storage tanks, intended to curb environmental damage from leaks, require most tank owners to obtain \$1 million in environmental damage insurance.

Industry officials fear that the cost of complying with that provision and others could force many service station operators out of business.

"This is the first of several pieces of

legislation we'll likely see this year on the tremendous problem of underground storage tanks," Darrington said.

The state can buy some time for its underground tank owners if it makes a good-faith effort to work with the EPA on ways to enforce the regulations, Darrington said.

It would be best if the state, and not the federal government, enforced these regulations, he said.

"If we allow the EPA to enforce, they're going to come in with a hydrogen bomb approach and will drop a bomb on somebody."

The resolution generated some floor debate, as Democrats objected to language

within the resolution requiring the Department of Health and Welfare to submit any underground tank enforcement program to the Legislature for approval.

Some argued that the state Constitution forbids the Legislature from making rules by resolution — which makes the rules immune to a governor's veto. A state Supreme Court ruling is due any day on that rule-making-by-resolution question.

Senate Democratic Minority Leader John Peavoy, D-Carey, said the Legislature could consider its oversight role after the Supreme Court rules. Meanwhile, he said, the resolution to work with the EPA will help out small station owners.

The resolution now moves to the House.

## After 2-year wait, barley growers to repay USDA

BURLEY — Apparently, the money really is due, finally.

Barley growers are returning 2-year-old money to the U.S. Agriculture Department — \$10 million that is due because the government underestimated 1988 barley prices.

"I'm really surprised that after this hit, there hasn't been more barley farmers raise hell," Burley farmer Ron Hepworth said.

On Jan. 10, barley farmers across Idaho received bills demanding repayment of \$10 million in deficiency payments advanced by USDA in 1988, when the government gave barley farmers 30.4 cents per bushel as an loan against expected price-support payments.

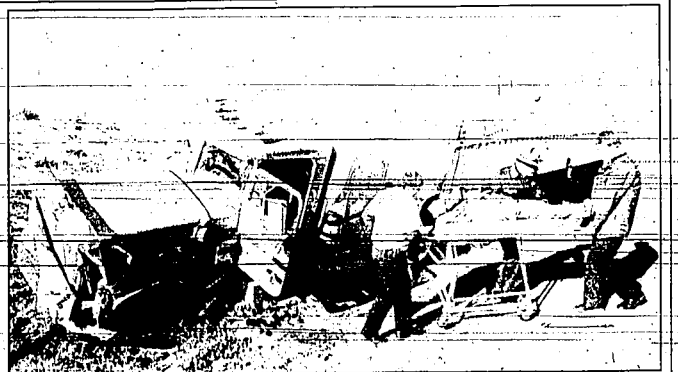
After the 1988 crop was in and prices were surveyed, however, the government computed barley's average market price at a whopping \$1.02, above the government-predicted market price.

So USDA is asking for the 30.4 cents per bushel back. For people like Hepworth, who farms 4,200 acres, 30.4 cents per bushel can add up to a big bill.

"Do you know anyone who can lay \$20,000 down on the table and walk away?" he asked.

The problem is that feed-barley growers never saw the

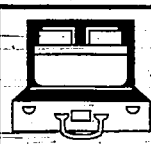

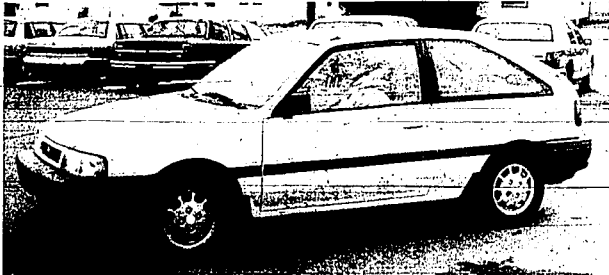

## Frederick's changing image of store from naughty to suggestive

NEW YORK — It was Frederick Mullinger, founder of the lingerie den Frederick's of Hollywood, who said: "Fashions change, but sex is always in style."

True, perhaps, but apparently no longer in the naughty way for which Frederick's is famous.

Four years ago with profits that were "sagging like an old fan-dancer's funny," new chief-executive-officer-George Townson gave Frederick's a remarkable makeover.

As stores such as the Limited Inc.'s Victoria's Secret grew in popularity, Townson realized that "the Frederick's of Hollywood concept was out of date and out of sync with contemporary mainstream attitudes toward sex and sensuality," he said.

Added Frederick Marx, a marketing consultant from Bloomfield Hills, Mich.: "It used to be if someone got a gift from Frederick's of Hollywood, you'd want to go in a closet to open it."

So Frederick's began a four-year turnaround, trading its somewhat raw image for one that is merely suggestive.

Gone from the famous Frederick's of Hollywood catalog are most of the risqué, sex-oriented novelty items that would be considered offensive by mainstream customers, Townson said.

Come, too, are the nude photos and sex-oriented copy such as the "Dress for Sex" Catalog of August 1985, which offered as an exclusive feature advice on sex from Dr. Ruth Westheimer.

Today's Frederick's catalogs feature softer, more sensual photos that show models in poses "that hide private areas when the outfits don't," said Townson,

who shared his company's makeover strategy with thousands of retailers here attending the annual convention of the National Retail Merchants Association.

Frederick's 155 retail stores also got a makeover as part of the strategy shift.

When Townson took over in 1985, most of the stores displayed sleazy-looking mannequins and hadn't had a fresh coat of paint or new carpeting in years.

"They drove away customers and were an embarrassment to our employees," Townson said.

Take a look today at the Frederick's of Hollywood store at Northland mall in Southfield, Mich., for example, and you'll see some of the changes: Warmer lighting, softer colors and more elegant displays invite even the most refined customers into the store.

The stores, in fact, look a lot like Victoria's Secret, which shares 48 mall locations with Frederick's.

"Actually, we look for them. We'd like to be right next to them, or across from them," Townson said, adding that Frederick's sales increase when there is a Victoria's Secret in the same mall.

Trading sleaze for sensuality has paid off handsomely: Frederick's stock price, which had fallen from \$7 a share to less than \$2 in the mid-1980s, is trading at about \$13; sales are up 70 percent; and profits are at record levels, Townson said.

The cleaned-up catalog and remodeled stores have also helped dump Frederick's trashy image, which Townson said hurt efforts to advertise in certain media, open stores in prestigious shopping malls and rent mailing lists from topnotch catalog companies.

## Court allows Alabama to fly Confederate flag

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — A federal appeals court conceded that the Confederate battle flag that flies atop the Alabama Capitol is offensive to many people; but declined to get involved in the dispute.

The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, in a ruling made public Thursday, said the flying of the Rebel banner on public buildings does not violate the Constitution, as alleged by the NAACP and 14 black state lawmakers.

The Atlanta-based appeals court upheld a district court decision in favor of the state, rejecting claims that the flag display violates the First, 13th and 14th amendments.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, along with the 14 legislators, sued the state to remove the Confederate flag, which flies on top of the Capitol dome with the American state flags.

One of the legislators, Rep. Alvin Holmes, said no decision had been made on an appeal, but he hopes the case is taken

to the U.S. Supreme Court.

"The issue of the Confederate flag is not going to go away. We are going to continue our efforts to remove it because it represents slavery and oppression toward black people. It's hurting the image of the state and hurting industry coming into the state," Holmes said.

The appeals court suggested that those who oppose the display go through the Legislature to get it taken down.

"It is unfortunate that the state of Alabama chooses to utilize its property in a manner that offends a large portion of its

population, but that is a political matter," the court said.

The NAACP said the flying of the flag amounted to use of state property for racially discriminatory purposes; violated the 13th Amendment ban on slavery as it was viewed by many blacks as a symbol of slavery; and violated free speech because salutation of the American flag was inhibited by those who oppose the Confederate flag.

The 11th Circuit rejected all three arguments.

## Discount chain's founder undergoes cancer therapy

BENTONVILLE, Ark. — Sam Walton, the 71-year-old founder of the Wal-Mart discount chain empire, has undergone treatment for bone-marrow cancer, a company spokesman said Thursday.

Walton, once the richest person in America, has received two sessions of chemotherapy and some radiation therapy since Sunday for multiple myeloma, said Don Shinkle, a Wal-Mart spokesman.

Myeloma is a malignant tumor in the bone marrow. It is generally made up of abnormal plasma cells.

A Wal-Mart statement said Walton was expected to recover fully from treatment he underwent in Houston at M.D. Anderson Hospital.

It is the second time Walton has faced cancer. In 1982, he was diagnosed as having leukemia and also was treated at M.D. Anderson. The leukemia has been in remission for several years.

"Along with Mr. Sam's doctors, we are very encouraged that because of early detection and treatment a full recovery is expected," the statement said.

"His doctors have advised him that they have had good success treating this type of

cancer if it's detected in time," Shinkle said. "He is in very good spirits."

Shinkle said Walton probably would spend another couple of weeks in Houston.

"The bottom line, we hear from the doctors, is that they caught this in time, in the early stages," he said.

Walton had experienced aches and pains for several months, but felt better after the therapy, Shinkle said.

"I feel so much better already," Walton said in a two-page memo to Wal-Mart employees.

Shinkle said the memo was issued

because Walton wanted employees to hear news of his illness from him, "rather than have them to hear a lot of rumors, because many might be exaggerated or untrue."

Shinkle said Walton may be initially slowed down, but that he expects to resume visiting outlets in a few weeks, a common Wal-Mart practice. After this week's treatments, Walton visited a Sam's Wholesale Club in Houston.

Walton has been known to drop in on local Wal-Mart managers with little advance notice to stay in touch with the retail business at the customer level.

Hey, don't get it wrong. We'd love to have gone through what you went through.

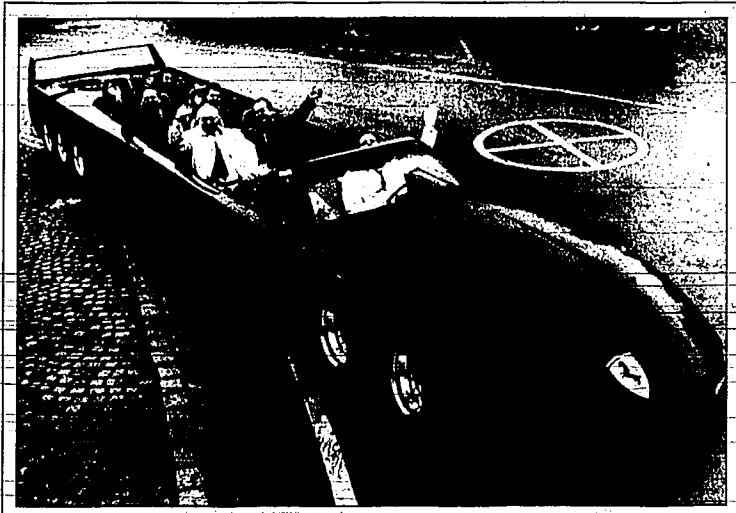
We'd love to be in labor for 27 hours, waiting so long that the hospital grounds crew could hear us while they're backtracking the parking lot.

## \$400 in change won't make bail

PORTSMOUTH, R.I. — Police knew something was up when a man arrested for allegedly robbing vending machines tried to make bail with \$400 in change.

After questioning Gregory R. Rosa, 25, for several hours, police said they discovered an interstate ring that allegedly had been milking soda vending machines for two years along "routes," they set up to collect change.

"Some of them would stop at \$700 a night, others wouldn't stop until they reached \$1,000," he said. "For some of these guys, it was a full-time job."

Police said the gang, using nearly 200 stolen vending machine keys, had apparently robbed thousands of dollars in change from machines in Rhode Island, Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Connecticut. The gang operated out of Lawrence, Mass., police said.

Vicerra said a thief would try to open an outdoor vending machine with different keys until it fit. He said a group of keys will fit most of the machines made by the same company.

Police arrested Rosa, of Dancut, Mass., on Sunday when he was spotted fleeing from police after he was hooked near some vending machines.

After being arrested, Rosa asked for a backpack in his pick-up truck so he could pay bail. Police found about \$400 in change inside, along with keys used in vending machines.

Rosa and a passenger, Jason N. Perez, 20, of Providence, were charged with larceny, receiving stolen goods and possession of burglar's tools.

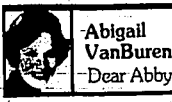

## Metal 'warehouse' is odd new Palo Alto structure

PALO ALTO, Calif. — City planners aren't sure what to make of it. Neighbors aren't sure what to call it. But Tom Taylor has a purpose and a name for his shiny new residence. "We call it our warehouse," he said. Squeezed into a narrow commercial lot right next to an office building, Taylor's creation, a 35-foot mass of shimmering corrugated metal and blue trim, is giving many a passer-by cause to pause.

Hands on hips, Mike Walters of the neighboring Summerhill Development Co. studied the "warehouse" at the Palo Alto Central complex. "I've seen 'em in the Midwest out in the middle of farm country, but I

never would expect to see that in the middle of Palo Alto," he said. "I can see the city letting him get away with a lot of things but not that!" Such comments do not bother Taylor, 32, a marketing product manager for Hewlett-Packard Co. in Mountain View and a book binder by hobby. "I think it's fabulous. I love to do things that elicit these types of comments," said Taylor, who is the kind of person who wore stultic to his high school graduation.

The Taylors' project began when they were looking for a warehouse to make into a home. Failing that, they looked for a place to build a home that looked like a warehouse. They broke ground last April Fools' Day. "April 1st has always been a significant date in our lives," said Taylor, a native Palo Alto who was determined to stay in this area. "It's always been a tradition for us to do something-for-April First." But why this look? "We both really like large open spaces," Taylor said. Rather than stay in their typical 1,400-bungalow. "We really wanted something that was very industrial and very firm. When designing it, we went for something with low maintenance." With the steel siding, "We will never have to paint it," he said.

Most of what is visible from Sherman Avenue is a 1,500-square-foot garage and workshop, which is separated from the main house by a courtyard. But inside, the three-story residence

continues its machine shop ambience, from its white fluorescent lights and 300-watt halogen lamps overhead, to its industrial vinyl floor in the kitchen and bathrooms. Throughout are sundry oddities such as a 450-pound stone fireplace mantel that is actually part of an old San Francisco curb. In the back yard — a 10-foot-wide space between where the house ends and a parking lot blacktop begins — is a sandbox made from a cut-up telephone pole.

## Contaminated land hazard to buyers

A legal shift away from the old caveat emptor, or "buyer beware" rule, was one of the most notable movements in the housing market of the '80s, but home buyers still make a big mistake if they depend too much on the law to solve problems with homes. Buyers need to be especially on guard when it comes to property that might be contaminated by radon, lead in water, asbestos, buried gasoline or oil tanks, and other environmental hazards, according to William J. Anya, a lawyer who specializes in environmental issues. Environmental defects cannot always be uncovered by even a close inspection and sometimes require special tests or research. "Checking out a caveat emptor (by court rulings) isn't really doing much for homeowners," said Anya, a staff lawyer for Attorneys' Title Guaranty Fund Inc. of Champaign, Ill., a title-insurance company. He is an adviser and specialist on environmental aspects of real estate ownership and transfer. "The only way buyers can protect themselves is to insist on checking properties before they buy." Anya said a "second generation" of national and state statutes and court rulings, most passed or made in the '80s, gave home buyers legal teeth against sellers who misrepresent properties or fail to disclose defects. Pennsylvania and New Jersey have some of the toughest laws, he said. "However, I think if someone buys a property in Pennsylvania with a high level of radon, for example, they are going to have to clean it up themselves or try to overturn the contract. It might cost \$1,500 or \$2,000 to fix the problem, but it will cost every bit of that for a lawyer" to try to overturn the contract. Anya said title insurance also provides only limited coverage against losses from environmental contamination. "Title insurance only insures the state of the title at the time of sale," he said. "Environmental problems noted in public records at that time would be covered. But the policy will not cover any problems that existed on the date of sale but were not disclosed or discovered — until a later date."

**Yugoslav party gives up monopoly**

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — The Communist Party voted Monday to give up its 45-year-old guarantee of power, and liberals said they would set their own ideological course, which could lead to a split in the ranks.

Delegates to a party congress overwhelmingly favored asking Parliament to remove the constitutional provision that guarantees a power monopoly. The measure was an amendment to a reform document yet to be approved.

**Chess champ condemns Soviet action**

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet Premier Mikhail Gorbachev Monday condemned the storming of his native city of Baku by Soviet troops, saying too much force was used and it came too late to save the Armenians.

Kasparov, who is of Armenian and Jewish descent and once wrote that his roots were in the Moslem capital of Azerbaijan, volunteered to mediate the ethnic dispute, which he said could spread and lead to a "bloodbath" across the Soviet Union.

At a Moscow news conference marked by an even-handedness seldom seen in the two-year Armenian-Azerbaijani conflict, Kasparov said there were plenty of Interior Ministry troops and police in Baku before Saturday's attack. Yet they took no armed action against the roving squads who reportedly killed at least 67 Armenians and ravaged 1,200 apartments in a six-day campaign of terror.

**Israelis release Palestinian activist**

JERUSALEM (AP) — Faisal Hussein, a leading Palestinian activist and potential peace negotiator with Israel, was freed from jail Monday. The United States had called his detention an obstacle to Middle East diplomacy.

In a related matter, Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir threatened to resign if he loses a vote of confidence in his right-wing Likud bloc. Likud leaders will meet next month on motions by hard-liners that Shamir's peace plan be dropped.

**E. German Cabinet opens to opposition**

EAST BERLIN (AP) — Communist Premier Hans Modrow agreed Monday to open his Cabinet to the pro-democracy opposition, and former leader Egon Krenz apologized for his role in past secret police operations.

Modrow and Krenz spoke during negotiations on East Germany's future government with the opposition groups, which immediately took up Modrow's offer.

Pro-democracy activists took to the streets at least eight cities after nightfall, with more than 100,000 demonstrating in Leipzig against the Communists. The official ADN news agency reported other protests in Berlin, Cottbus, Dresden, Halle, Potsdam, Schwerin and Suhle.

**Dismantling efforts to free Berlin of wall**

WEST BERLIN (AP) — East German border guards began tearing down a 330-yard section of the Berlin Wall on Monday night to begin replacing the barrier with a metal fence, a West German official announced.

The dismantling work began along the Kreuzberg district that borders the

well in the southeastern sector of the city. The work was led by a spokesman for the West Berlin city government.

Kolhoff said an East German border official told him other sections of the wall would be torn down shortly as well, but he was not specific about when that would occur.

Communist hard-liners last year during a peaceful popular revolt, has been trying to appease an opposition movement that is upset with the pace of promised reforms. Modrow's move came one day after the No. 2 figure in the Communist Party quit and joined the Social Democrats.

Until Monday, reformist groups formally had resisted joining

Modrow's government, partly out of fear that they would be held responsible by voters for the mess left by four decades of Communist rule.

The Social Democratic leader, Ibrahim Boehme, said a coalition was possible if all parties and groups are prepared to enter the government on an emergency basis, without weeks-long negotiations.
