### Thousands rally to mark ruling

WASHINGTON — About 75,000 abortion opponents —
close to a record number — rallied behind the White House
and marched to the Supreme Court Monday to mark the
17th anniversary of the court's landmark 1973 decision—
legalizing abortion.
They waved banners, prayed, sang "God Bless America"
and welcomed words of support from President Bush, who
said the anti-abortion protest, movement "reminds'
Americans, especially young Americans, of the self-evident
moral superiority of adoption over abortion."
However, abortion rights supporters made sure their voicess also were heard.
While Bush was speaking, Planned Parenthood urged
Americans to call the White House switchboard to register
their support for legal abortions, and a group of 100
Republicans who favor abortion rights picketed at the
Republican National Committee.


The Republicans' public disavowal of a strict anti-abor-tion stand follows defeats of anti-abortion Republican gubernatorial candidates in Virginia and New Jersey and strong support for Republican, women politicians who sup-port abortion rights.

However, leaders of the National Right to Life Committee praised the party and especially Bush for his continued support. "Bush has shown himself to be a strong pro-life Teader," said Burke Balch, state legislative coordi-nator for the group.


Many of the abortion opponents at Monday's rally said the Webster decision had given them new hope, but that they had not taken advantage of it.

"Webster brought out the pro-abortionists," said Mary Manno, a Washington native who was marching for the first time. "So, I thought this year it was important to come, to counter the pro-abortion marchers."

"Just as Roe drained the pro-choice movement of energy, Webster drained the pro-life movement," said Marjorie Hershoy, a professor of political science at Indiana University, in a telephone interview.

### Panel approves boost in exemption

BOISE (AP) — A proposal to boost the homestead exemption — the amount of home and personal property not subject to attachment for debts — has been endorsed by a committee of the Idaho House.

The Revenue and Taxation Committee on Monday unanimously gave do-pass approval to legislation sponsored by Rep. James Stoicheff, D-Sandpoint, boosting the homestead exemption-from \$30,000 to \$50,000.

If the legislation becomes law, the first \$50,000 in property valuation will not be subject to attachment to pay debts. However, Soicheff said the exemption does not erase attachments or liens through contracts such as motteners.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The "Soviet threat is diminishing," but America should beware of dropping its defenses so low that it has a "hollow Army," the top U.S. military officer said Monday, "Although the Soviets retain a significant military capability, the political likelihood of them using that capability paginsts us or outlies in Europe is less than it has been in decodes," said Gen. Colin L. Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Not only is the Soviet Union changing, but its Warsaw Pact allies also are forming independent ideas of their defense needs, Powell said in his first public remerks since attending a meeting of military

"I don't believe I am telling you anything new when I say that, as a political and military matter, the Soviet threat is diminishing," Powell said in a speech to the Reserve Officer Association.

"The reality is that we must plan on our defense budget going down several percentage points every year for the foreseeable future."

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration said Monday it will move to end controls on overseas sales of computers and other technology readily available to the public.

The policy overhaul will have an immediate effect on much of Eastern Europe but no Immediate effect on the Soviet Union. Meanwhile, several U.S. officials have opened talks in London to prepare for joint steps by 17 nations to accelerate delivery of advanced technology to such countries as Poland, Hungary and Czechoslowkia.



Denton Darrington, R-Declo, calls for the state's Department of Health and Welfare, through its Division of Water Quality, to work with the federal Environmental Protection Agency to find an acceptable, way to enforce regulations governing underground storage tanks.

underground storage tanks, intended to curb environmental damage from leaks, require most tank owners to obtain \$1 million\* in environmental damage insuance, Industry officials fear that the cost of complying with that provision and other could force many service station operators out of business.

"This is the first of several pieces of

legislation we'll likely see this year on the tremendous problem of underground storage tanks," Darrington said.

The state can buy some time for its underground tank owners if it makes a good-faith effort to work with the EPA on ways to enforce the regulations, Darrington said.

It would be best if the state, and not the federal government, enforced these regulations, he said.







### Court allows Alabama to fly Confederate flag

MONTGOMERY, Ala. — A federal appeals court conceded that the Confederate battle flag that flies atop the Alabama Capitol is offensive to many people; but declined to get involved in the dispute.

The 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, in a ruling made public Thursday, said the flying of the Rebel banner on public buildings does not violate the Constitution, as alleged by the NAACP and 14 black stafe lawmakers.

The Atlanta-based appeals court upheld a district court decision in favor of the state, rejecting claims that the flag display violates the First, 13th and 14th

violates the First, 1911 and amendments.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, alongwith the 14 legislators, sued the state to remove the Confederate flag, which files on top of the Capitol dome with the American and state flags.

One of the legislators, Rep. Alvin Holmes, said no decision had been made on an appeal, but he hopes the case is taken

to the U.S. Supreme Court.

"The issue of the Confederate flag is not going to go away. We are going to continue our efforts to remove it because it represents slavery and oppression toward black people. It's hurting the image of the state, "Holmes said.




