Senate victory keeps Bush China policy intact

WASHINGTON — The Senate on Thursday narrowly upheld President Bush's veto of a bill protecting Chinese students from deportation.

That left his China policy intact and gave him a victory in the year's first test of strength with the Democratic-controlled Congress.

Senators voted 63-37 to override Bush's veto, four short of the two-thirds necessary. Both Idaho senators, Republicans Steve Symms and James McClure, voted with the president.

The action came a day after the House had voted overwhelmingly to reject Bush's veto, and followed an intense White House lobby.

In a televised appearance just after the vote, Bush said, "We will continue to urge China to respect the human rights of its citizens." He hailed the vote as "reaffirming our commitment to Chinese students in this country as well as the goal of improving

relations with China."

Bush then invited the 37 Republican senators who voted with him to the White House for beer and pretzels.

Haiching Zhao of the Independent Federation of Chinese Students and Scholars, which represents Chinese students studying in the United States, said he was "gravely disappointed" by the vote.

Before the Senate roll call, Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, said that while Bush has voiced support for democratic reform in Eastern Europe, "this veto sends a contrary message to the millions of students and workers in China who

are struggling for democracy in their country."

But Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., the minority leader, said the congressional showdown was the equivalent of "throwing out the first ball" of the 1990 election season and was being used by Democrats to force GOP senators to cast "a tough political vote" to support the president.

"It's not China policy, it's American politics," Dole said.

Just before the vote, Bush had publicly renewed his promise that the 40,000 Chinese students in the United States would be fully protected even without the legislation. "No

student, as long as I'm president, will be sent back," he said.

The 390-25 House vote on Wednesday prompted immediate criticism from the Chinese foreign ministry in Beijing. A spokesman there said the House was "fully revealing its anti-China position" and was risking damage to relations between the two countries.

But Sen. William Armstrong of Colorado, a Republican who opposed Bush, said, "The House put itself squarely on record in support of human freedom ... and made it clear it is not willing to be accomplices" to repression of dissent.

Flu bug poised for new assault on Magic Valley

TWIN FALLS — Start taking those vitamins now. An influenza bug that has hit people across the nation is in the Magic Valley, says a state health official, but is probably just beginning an attack that could be fatal to a few.

"The Magic Valley was one of the last places in Idaho to have identified the influenza virus," said Robert Medlin, Idaho Department of Health and Welfare immunization coordinator. "And I would suspect that it's just starting to build in the area, if it follows the trend of other communities."

Based upon when the first case of the influenza was reported locally, Medlin said the area is on the verge of an increase in cases.

Medlin warned that the flu — dubbed "Shanghai" flu, but officially called A-H3N2 — could be fatal to certain people, especially those with heart or lung problems, asthma or diabetes.

Anyone with those problems, on chemotherapy or over the age of 65 should get an influenza vaccination, said Cheryl Becker, a public health nurse with the South Central District Health Department.

Healthy adults can usually weather such influenzas, she said.

Although the Shoshone School District shut its doors for one day last week due to absences, Becker said there were some symptoms that indicated an intestinal virus was at work in Shoshone as well as the influenza.

Researchers for the Atlanta-based Center for Disease Control said Thursday the flu has reached the epidemic stage, with a key indicator — a deaths-from-flu index — at its highest level in at least eight years.

Including Idaho, 18 states are reporting "widespread" flu.

Bush unveils 2nd phase of drug war

WASHINGTON — President Bush, claiming his anti-drug fight already is showing signs of success, Thursday unveiled Phase II — same policy, more money.

The new plan contains no major new policy departures, but requests a substantial increase in funds, roughly \$2.1 billion more than the amount Congress appropriated for this year's anti-drug programs.

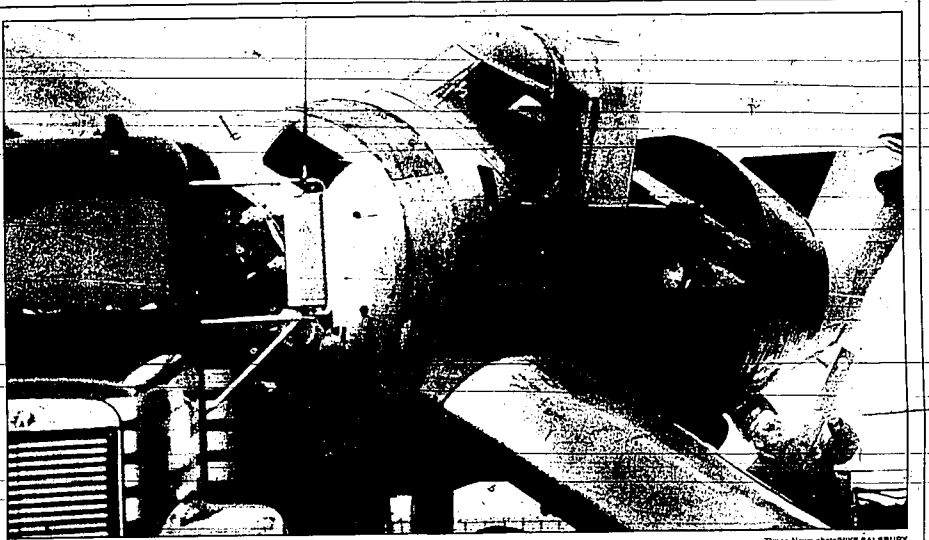
"We've made some notable progress," Bush told members of the American Newspaper Publishers Association as he announced his plans, but "it's clear we're only getting started."

Later, in a press conference, Bush described the anti-drug fight as "the big one ... a test" for his administration and "every state, every local government, the people."

In the meantime, however, the cost of the anti-drug effort will continue to escalate. For next year, Bush will ask for \$10.6 billion, according to the new plan, up from an \$8.5 billion appropriation for anti-drug programs for this year and a separate \$1 billion for building new prisons that was appropriated in 1989 to be spent over the next several years.

About 29 percent of the money will be spent overseas on

Moscow seeks crisis settlement

MOSCOW — Signs grew Thursday that the Kremlin is maneuvering toward a negotiated settlement of the crisis in Azerbaijan by trying to divide moderate and more militant factions.

The government appeared to be seeking a compromise as snipers continued to fire on Soviet forces, a general strike still paralyzed Baku and other major cities and an Azerbaijani Popular Front leader threatened Moscow with a civil war that would become a "second Afghanistan."

Developments in Moscow and Baku indicated that Kremlin officials were using a two-pronged approach to resolve the confrontation, now approaching its third week.

While continuing a military

crackdown on radical Azerbaijani nationalists, the government praised "healthy elements" of the Popular Front and the Interior Ministry suggested that with its help, the present curfew could be lifted.

As Moscow's forces arrested more militant nationalists and seized large quantities of arms and explosives, the Azerbaijani Communist Party, which has been at the center of much of the unrest, expelled its leader and pledged reform.

And Azeri and Armenian vigilantes, who had been involved in cross-border clashes along the frontier between the two republics, agreed to a cease-fire supervised by Interior Ministry troops.

It was not clear whether the moves had come in time to avert further violence.

Andrus tentative about helping ease bridge woe

TWIN FALLS — Gov. Cecil Andrus told about 25 truckers and city officials Thursday he understands the economic problems created by lower load limits on the Singing Bridge but is tentative about whether he can do anything.

"I don't want to mislead anyone in this room but I will go back to the (Idaho Transportation Board) Andrus said. "I wish there was an easy answer to this."

The truckers and officials told Andrus, in town on a visit, the detour could cost industrial park businesses an additional \$1.5 million in expenses.

The Idaho Transportation Board pledged last week to consider requests by local leaders to help maintain detour routes to the Singing Bridge, to move up the bridge's 1995 replacement date and to help pay for streets approaching the proposed Victory Bridge over Rock Creek, the best alternative route.

Engineer Loren Thomas said the board has already authorized assisting with road maintenance, either with money or materials.

Mayor Tom Condie seemed to underline the desperation city officials feel about the bridge's status when he quipped, "We'll rename the bridge the Cecil Andrus Bridge."

Andrus said he sees a difference between problems faced by other communities needing bridge replacements and Twin Falls.

"No one has to explain the problem," he said. "We see it."

Universal Frozen Foods Manager Mike Johnston said company officials regret their decision to build a \$25 million expansion in the industrial park.

Had company officials known about the bridge problems they would not have chosen to expand in Idaho, he said.

Something-for-everyone school construction bill wins first nod

BOISE — A bill offering money to every Idaho school district for construction has been given preliminary approval by a House committee.

Legislation sponsored by Rep. James Stoicheff, D-Sandpoint, changes the formula for distribution of profits from the state lottery. Stoicheff wants to put the estimated \$7.7 million now destined for the public school construction fund through the school distribution formula.

Earlier Thursday, the state Board of Education took the first steps toward adopting a formula for allocating the money under current state law. Districts will have until



May 1 to apply for the funds which will be available July 1.

Members said the May deadline was set to fall after the Legislature so it could be determined if the law would be changed.

"Everybody gets a little help, a little money to build buildings," said Stoicheff. Rep. Dean Haugenson, R-Coeur d'Alene, said spreading the lottery money over all 115 school districts would not allow much for any district.

"Dropping a few nickels in the pot is not going to meet the need," he said.

"An extra \$5,000 isn't a few nickels to the Madama School District," said Rep. Wayne Sutton, R-Midvale.

Under the Stoicheff proposal, districts would get the following amounts: Boise, \$682,118; Meridian, \$495,598; Pocatello, \$471,035; Blackfoot, \$174,677; Idaho Falls, \$347,834; Bonanzaville, \$271,677; Nampa, \$277,022; Caldwell,

\$150,526; Cassia County, \$181,223; Coeur d'Alene, \$203,474; Post Falls, \$108,236; Moscow, \$88,683; Madison, \$156,477; Minidoka County, \$179,194; Lewiston, \$135,835; and Twin Falls, \$225,038.

Meeting at Boise State University, the education board gave initial notice of rules it plans to use to allocate the money. Final adoption could come in March.

The criteria include need, a district's past efforts to raise money for school construction, ability to use the money and whether the state funds would give districts an opportunity to reduce student-teacher ratios. School officials said the rules call for a 25-75 percent grant with local districts pro-

viding 75 percent of the cost of a construction project.

Bob Dutton, associate state schools superintendent, said the school construction fund would provide a "hammer" to get local school levies approved.

Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans said the Legislature is "engaged in a philosophical debate" whether to spend all of the lottery profits in school districts with the most critical need, or give all the districts a little money.

"I think you could make a good argument either way," he said. Evans said it's about 50-50 whether the existing law would be retained.

**ISU drops idea after BSU protest**

BOISE (AP) — In the face of opposition from the University of Idaho, Idaho State University at Pocatello has temporarily dropped its proposal to offer a bachelor's degree in engineering management. Meanwhile, Boise State University is moving towards proposing a bachelor's degree in manufacturing technology without any UI opposition. Michael Gallagher, ISU's academic vice president, said the bachelor's program in engineering management would respond to the needs of those eyeing management positions at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory at Idaho Falls.

**Idaho judge wants abusers treated**

BOISE (AP) — The chief justice of the Idaho Supreme Court is calling for a greater state commitment to alcohol and drug abuse treatment, maintaining that's the only way to rein in the state's exploding prison population. "Approximately 90 percent of all of the defendants in the criminal justice system are there directly or indirectly as the result of alcohol and drugs," Robert Bakes told lawmakers Thursday in his annual State of the Judiciary address. "Without adequate programs to break the cycle of substance abuse and criminal conduct, particularly for defendants in their early adult years, we will not be able to stem the ever-increasing flow of repeat offenders who will be clogging the prisons of this state, creating an ever-increasing demand for the construction of even more secure confinement facilities," he said.

**Lawmaker thinks tax limit not fair**

BOISE (AP) — An eastern Idaho lawmaker says he thinks a property tax limit enacted by voter initiative is shifting an unfair tax burden to certain property owners. Rep. L. Ed Brown, R-Pocatello, on Thursday asked the Revenue and Taxation Committee to introduce legislation removing many of the tax exemptions given homeowners under the so-called "50-50" initiative. It grants homeowners a property tax exemption up to \$50,000 or 50 percent of property value, whichever is smaller. Brown withdrew the proposal for revisions after members noted it should start at the beginning of a tax year. The original version carried no emergency clause, so it would have gone into effect July 1 along with other new state laws.

**Ski resort finds mediation fruitless**

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — An attempt to iron out a legal dispute between local residents and owners of the Grand Targhee Ski resort over expansion of the facility has been terminated after no agreement could be reached on guidelines for the talks. "We never got to the substantive issues," said Tim Mealey, associate director of Keystone Center in Keystone, Colo. "The process never really got off the ground." Resort owner Mory Bergmeyer and the Citizens for Teton Valley, along with the U.S. Forest Service, hired the mediator two months ago to try to settle the dispute, but citizen's group president Boyd Bowles said, "We never even got close to discussing any issues."

**Medical school seat swap pondered**

POCATELLO (AP) — Nevada is contemplating offering Idaho two seats at its medical school in exchange for guaranteed access to Idaho State University's College of Pharmacy. But Pharmacy Dean Arthur Nelson said the deal involving four to six pharmacy seats for Nevada students and two medical school seats for Idaho students at the University of Nevada-Reno will be put off until 1991 because it needs approval of the Nevada Legislature which is not meeting this year. Idaho students have one of the lowest acceptance rates to medical schools in the country because the state does not have a medical school of its own, Nelson said.

**GOP leader won't seek seat in Congress**

BOISE (AP) — Post Falls attorney Chuck Lempestis, the vice chairman of the Idaho Republican Party, said Thursday he will not run for the party's 1st Congressional District nomination. But state Agriculture Director Dick Rush said he's nearing a decision whether to seek the Democratic nomination in the same race, and will take a week of vacation next week to tour the district seeking support. Jeanne Givens, the former state legislator from Coeur d'Alene who ran for the congressional seat two years ago, also said Thursday she will announce her decision whether to run this year next Wednesday. Lempestis, who lost a primary election battle four years ago for the GOP lieutenant governor race, had been considering running for the seat being vacated by Rep. Larry Craig. Craig, the five-term

incumbent, and Attorney General Jim Jones both are running for the nomination to succeed Sen. James McClure in the Senate. Lempestis circulated a statement Thursday bowing out. A spokesman said Lempestis and his family planned a vacation in Hawaii starting Friday. So far, that leaves the race to succeed Craig in the 1st District congressional seat to state Sen. Skip Stryser, R-Parma, who announced last week. But Rush took a day of vacation Thursday and met with top Democrats in the House and Senate. "I'm still seriously considering it," he said, when asked whether he told the Democratic caucuses he was a candidate. Rush said he will take vacation time next week and tour northern Idaho to gauge support. So far, he said, the reaction has been very

positive. And although Gov. Cecil Andrus will take no position in the primary election, Rush said he has been "very supportive." If he announces, Rush said he will leave his job as agriculture director. Much of his salary comes from farm groups. "I would not want to use their money to run for public office," he said. Mrs. Givens, when asked if she was still considering a race for the Democratic nomination for the Craig seat, said, "You bet. Don't count me out." She said she has had an exploration committee working since August on the race. "We have been working very hard," she said.

At Rexburg, Jones said that before any big cuts are made in defense spending, the United States should conduct a comprehensive national defense risk assessment. He said it is likely that some current weapon systems can be cut or scaled back, "but a game plan should be developed so that any cuts or reductions are made pursuant to a realistic strategy." ## Tort reform issue still needs attention from Legislature

Just over two centuries ago, Benjamin Franklin stepped out from the Philadelphia Statehouse following the construction of our country's Constitution.

An old lady asked, "What kind of government do we have?" Franklin replied, "A republic, if you can keep it."

Today, the principles set forth by our own founding fathers are being fought for worldwide. The evening news is a testimony to that fact. Ours is the oldest living, working constitution in the world.

Two-thirds of the world's 140 constitutions have been written or revised since the year 1970.

The explosion of civil lawsuits over the past 20 years has created a legal liability crisis that is clogging our courts, bankrupting businesses and destroying the

very fabric of the life we come to enjoy. It's hard to believe this can all be credited to tort laws that are unfair and inequitable.

In 1986, Congress decided the solution to this crisis was up to the states.

The business and professional community in Idaho formed a powerful coalition and was fortunate to pass some good legislation to establish fault and limit some awards.

This year, we will return to the Legislature with a four-point bill to strengthen our reform. We plan to:

- Limit the liability of volunteers and board members, such as scout masters and school board members, and this includes officers and directors of non-profit

corporations and organizations who serve without compensation. You may remember that in 1987 we provided some immunity for officers and directors of charitable organizations. This measure will expand that protection.

- Remove the sunset on non-commercial damages. 1987 legislation capped pain and suffering awards at \$400,000. Our opposition instituted an index for inflation and a 1992 termination of the law. Currently, the cap is at \$418,122.
- We will allow the index, but remove the sunset. To date, there are no cases working their way through trial.
- When we do have a case, the courts will decide if we have a constitutional, to whom it applies and how. The majority of states have upheld a broad-based cap. Washington

and Kansas have not.

- This law provides reasonable compensation and, at the same time, some predictability of the system.
- The law will not apply to cases of action before July 1987.
- Prohibit double recovery from collateral resources. Under Idaho law, a jury is not told if an injured party has already been compensated for injuries.
- In 1987, we tried to give the jury that information.
- This measure will provide for an "offset" - saying that the judge should subtract money already received.
- Define "acting in concert" - to mean "pursuing a common plan or design to commit an intentional tortious act and actively taking part in it."

In 1987, we repealed the Joint & Several Act in order to establish fault.

- The acting in concert definition was removed by the opposition.
- This clarification would preclude multi lawsuits of perhaps the manufacturer, the wholesaler, the retailer, etc., unless the court could prove they acted together with intent to harm.
- The liability crisis hurts us all. Resolving it is critical to our economic health. Your participation in our government is critical to our freedom.

**New wall goes up in Jerome**

As the Berlin Wall is being torn down in Germany, a new one is going up in Jerome County. This wall is being created by our county commissioners wanting an ordinance added to the county zoning laws aimed directly at the dairymen and anyone who raises livestock.

The purpose being to force everyone who has livestock to buy a yearly permit and pay a charge (tax) on each head of livestock so they can raise the money to hire someone to catch any violators.

The zoning laws have been amended several times since they were put on the books in 1957. All for the same reason, to get stronger teeth so they could be enforced. They have never been enforced before, and there's laws in the ordinances now - as well as state and federal laws - that can solve the problems if anyone is violating the laws.

This is discrimination pure and simple against us that choose to make a living in agriculture. When lawyers, bankers and those in environmental offices speak out against the proposed ordinance knowing it could cause financial problems for the whole county, everyone should be concerned. Many dairymen and ranchers could be denied a financial loan simply over the penalties of huge fines and going to jail that's wanting to be put in the regulations law.

The dairymen didn't create the problems. The county commissioners are the ones to blame, along with the past two zoning administrators they put on the county payroll. They were not worth their weight in salt and created problems by working on the buddy-buddy system. A good example is business without a permit in an A-2 agriculture area was not violating a law as long as the invoices were taken onto a county road to be signed. No county can be run with this kind of mentality.

The county had a task force recruiting dairymen here from out of state. Now that they have come, pay taxes, create jobs and spend their money here, the county commissioners want to put financial burdens and restrictions on all livestockmen and try to cover their own mistakes that they have allowed to happen in past years.

They will also cover their own tracks by allowing the zoning board that is not elected by the people to have the final say on issuing permits. This sounds unconstitutional, since the county commissioners were elected to run the county. We have a county attorney, sheriff and court system to enforce laws. We all pay taxes to pay their wages and it is grossly unfair to pay a tax on every head of livestock to pay somebody else to do what the county commissioners were elected to do.

What we do need is capable county commissioners to manage the county instead of creating a jumbled up mess like we now have. It is now run on who you know, not what you know.

**Consumer waste campaign mounted**

NEW YORK (AP) — A consumer group mounted a complaint campaign Thursday against manufacturers of disposable and non-recyclable products, charging that wasteful packaging depletes resources and jams the nation's landfills.

The New York Public Interest Research Group published a 20-page guide to what it called the worst of environmentally damaging packaging, listing toll-free telephone numbers of the products' makers and urging calls of complaint.

"Consumers need to send these companies a clear message that they don't want and don't need these so-called convenience items and overpackaged products," Steven A. Romalewski, author of the guide, said in an interview.

Some of the guide's examples are familiar targets of environmentalist criticism, including disposable diapers, disposable razors, plastic utensils, polystyrene foam packages and so-called degradable plastic bags.

It also faults specialized convenience products, such as Eastman Kodak Co.'s Fling disposable camera; Quaker Oats Co.'s Aunt Jemima Pancake Express, with mix for six pancakes and a throwaway plastic mixing bowl; and Heinz U.S.A.'s plastic ketchup bottles.

**Compound stops AIDS reproduction**

WASHINGTON (AP) — A synthetic compound has shown in laboratory experiments to prevent reproduction of the AIDS virus in a way different than AZT, the only anti-viral drug now approved for use against AIDS, researchers announced Thursday.

The compound, a manmade peptide called U-81749, appears to block the final stage of a process the AIDS virus uses to reproduce itself in human cells. AZT, or zidovudine, attacks an earlier stage in the life cycle of the virus.

"It (U-81749) drastically slows down and reduces the number of mature viral particles you get in an infection," said Leonard Post, director of infectious disease research at the Upjohn Co., where the compound was developed.

Post said the compound works by inhibiting the action of protease, an enzyme used by the AIDS virus to process proteins during the final stages of its reproduction. The result, he said, is that the virus cannot make mature copies of itself, and this prevents the spread of infection to other cells.

**\$4.8 billion new Star Wars budget**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration will propose increasing spending for Star Wars to about \$4.8 billion in the military budget for fiscal 1991, congressional sources said Thursday.

The budget total for the Strategic Defense Initiative program is about \$1 billion more than the Democratic-controlled Congress approved last year, and is certain to come under attack in the climate of a diminishing Soviet threat to the West and increasing budget constraints.

President Bush will unveil his proposed budget Monday, spelling out the details in his State of the Union speech Wednesday.

Congressional sources, who spoke on condition they not be identified, said Defense Secretary Dick Cheney would push for full-scale development of SDI that favors the "brilliant pebbles" plan, a system composed of many small ground-and space-based interceptors that would sense enemy ballistic missiles. The interceptors would ram the missiles, causing them to explode.

**Senator wants chemical use changes**

WASHINGTON — Charging that pesticides and fertilizers are poisoning the nation's drinking water, the chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee said Thursday the 1990 farm bill must address the environmental consequences of chemical use.

Citing a new Department of Agriculture study estimating that 50 million Americans drink water from areas that may be contaminated by agricultural chemicals, Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., said, "We can no longer claim 'insufficient data' as an excuse for federal inaction."

Leahy's comments signaled that the 1990 bill to reauthorize farm price support and subsidy programs will squarely deal with the heavy use of fertilizers and pesticides by American farmers.

Debate over that issue will touch off a heated battle between environmentalists who would like to regulate farming practices and farmers and officials who want to rely on education of farmers to modify chemical use.

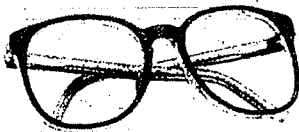
**Lightning strike injures 11 at plant**

Workers at Precision Twist Drill Co. were trying to help overnight employees leave the plant. Six inches of snow fell overnight, said Art Beck, company president.

Police said 11 people were taken to hospitals. Four were treated for cardiac problems, said Carol Weisbruch, community service police officer in Crystal Lake, 35 miles northwest of Chicago.

**Bush announces \$1 billion in Panama aid**

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush on Thursday announced he will offer a \$1 billion aid package to help Panama recover from the U.S. military invasion and achieve "as close to instant relief as we can extend."

Bush said the package, which needs congressional approval, will include \$500 million in humanitarian assistance for housing, emergency public works, business assistance, loans and export opportunities.

Another \$500 million would go to balance of payment support, public investment and economic restructuring needed following the invasion and two years of economic starvation due to U.S. economic sanctions against the regime of Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega.

Bush said some of the \$1 billion would come from foreign aid to

other countries, but he did not specify how much or say which nations would be affected.

Bush said he called the U.S.-installed president of Panama, Guillermo Endara, on Thursday morning "to assure him of our continued support of his efforts to establish democracy in Panama."

"Part of this effort involves the establishment of a healthy economy," he said.

# Deficit law faces challenge

WASHINGTON (AP)—The chairmen of Congress' two budget committees advanced separate plans Thursday to replace the Gramm-Rudman deficit-reduction law with different proposals for shrinking the government's persistent shortfalls.

One of the plans, by Senate Budget Committee Chairman James Sasser, D-Tenn., would dangle the possibility of \$17 billion in cuts in the Social Security payroll tax as a reward for each year lawmakers enact \$30 billion in budget savings.

"With this shift, every working man and woman in America will become part of a constituency for fiscal responsibility, because they have something to gain from deficit reduction," Sasser told reporters.

The other plan, offered by House Budget Committee Chairman Leon Panetta, D-Calif., would lower the amount of deficit reduction required each year, but stiffen the rules by which the cuts are calculated.

The proposals come at a time that increasing attention on Capitol Hill is being focused on the credibility of the budget process.

Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., has justified his plan to slash the Social Security tax by contending that the retirement system's huge surpluses make the overall federal deficit seem smaller than it really is.

Bipartisan criticism has also been leveled at Gramm-Rudman, which requires a series of declining deficit targets culminating in a balanced budget in 1993.

Legislation enacted last year that claimed a savings of nearly \$2 billion simply by shifting the money-losing Postal Service "off-budget" was merely the latest device budget writers have devised to evade the law's intent. The actual deficit has exceeded Gramm-Rudman's targets every year since the legislation was passed in 1985.

Both Panetta's and Sasser's plans would abandon the automatic spending cuts that Gramm-Rudman requires in most federal programs, should the law's deficit targets not be technically met.

Sasser's proposal would require Congress and the president to agree to \$30 billion in deficit reduction each year. It does not address how those savings would be found, the key question that bedevils lawmakers and the administration every year.

## Thais get label information missing in U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP)—American food companies are providing more information to some foreign consumers than to U.S. customers about what's in their products, a private consumer advocacy group said Thursday.

The Center for Science in the Public Interest said it has found labels of some American processed foods sold in Thailand that include percentage-ingredient labeling that the food industry has opposed as too costly and intrusive to add to product labels here.

"The labels of almost all processed foods sold in Thailand, including well-known American products, disclose the percentage of each major ingredient contained in the product," the center said in a statement.

"It's not in the consumer interest to put that kind of clutter and detail on labels," said Roger Coleman, spokesman for the National Food Processors Association.

"To do this kind of labeling does nothing but add to the cost and confusion for consumers," added Coleman. "It masks the kind of important information the consumer really wants."

"We really can't comment until we do some research," said Coleman, a spokesman for the Grocery Manufacturers of America, a food trade group.

However, Goldberg acknowledged GMA's opposition to percentage-ingredient labeling on U.S. food products.

## Israeli found dead had links to cartel

MIAMI (AP)—An Israeli businessman reportedly linked to mercenaries who trained Medellin drug cartel gunmen was found dead at the airport here, stuffed into the trunk of a car, police said Thursday.

The body of Arik Afek was discovered after Metro-Dade police received complaints of an offensive odor coming from a car in the Miami International Airport parking garage, police said. The cause of death was not immediately announced, but was being investigated as a homicide, police said.

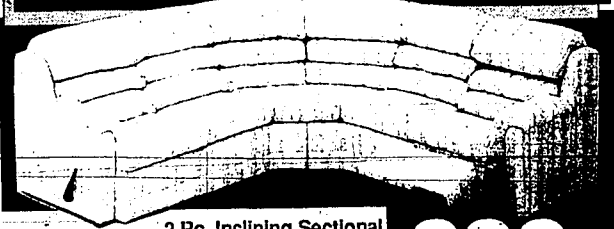

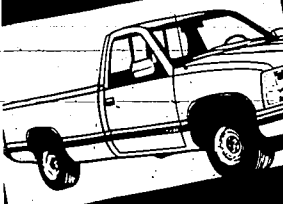

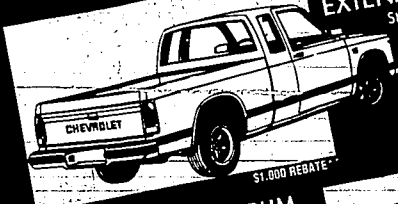

### Hospital case should go before jury today

**TWIN FALLS** - A jury is expected to begin deliberations today to determine whether a local hospital should pay damages to the family of a man who died after his oxygen tank was unplugged and he was moved.

The family of Daryl Manning, who died in April 1987, is suing the Twin Falls Clinic and Hospital, two nurses employed there and five other unnamed health care providers, according to the complaint. Manning had been hospitalized at the clinic for chronic lung disease and on doctors' orders received 24-hour oxygen, the complaint says.

On April 20, 1987, two nurses disconnected the oxygen and attempted to move Manning, 67, down the hall, despite protests from Manning's wife and daughter that he would die, the complaint says.

Manning died shortly after he was moved into the hall, the complaint says.

In 5th District Court, the family seeks compensation for negligence, gross negligence, infliction of emotional distress and attorney's fees. Their attorney, Ken Pedersen, said he expected to forward the case to the jury today.

### Police seeking more clues in explosion at local school

**TWIN FALLS** - An apparent explosion, possibly from a pipe bomb, blew a hole through a piece of playground equipment Wednesday evening at Sawtooth Elementary School.

"Our main concern was getting maintenance to get it out of here," said Principal Randy Rutledge. "We didn't want any kids to cut themselves on the jagged edges."

The explosion punched a hole through a metal dish called "the crow's nest," Rutledge said. The dish was removed after police collected evidence, Rutledge said.

He said neighbors reported hearing noises around 7:30 and 9 p.m. A school janitor also heard something around 7:30. Police are not yet sure what caused the damage, although it is believed to have been some type of bomb.

The police department's laboratory is analyzing some material picked up from underneath the dish, but a report is not ready, Paul De Fresno, the city's police and fire chief, said. Police have some potential suspects, he said, but he asked for a phone call from anyone who saw anything suspicious Wednesday evening, or at any other time.

### Gooding representative gets new panel positions

**BOISE** - Rep. Thomas Morrison, R-Gooding, received new House committee assignments this week. Morrison, who already sits on the Commerce, Industry and Tourism Committee, will add the Agriculture Affairs and State Affairs committees to his duties.

"He'll no longer serve on the House Transportation/Defense Committee," Morrison said Thursday, that he asked for the agriculture seat after Rep. Gary Robbins was removed following his switch from Republican to Democrat. "I wanted to be sure the Magic Valley didn't lose that seat," Morrison said.

Morrison didn't ask for the State Affairs assignment. Republican Party leadership has decided that all abortion-related bills go before that committee. Sen. Morrison, who describes himself as having a "tendency toward being pro-life," expects to have a lively session.

### Pedestrian killed by truck identified as Burley man

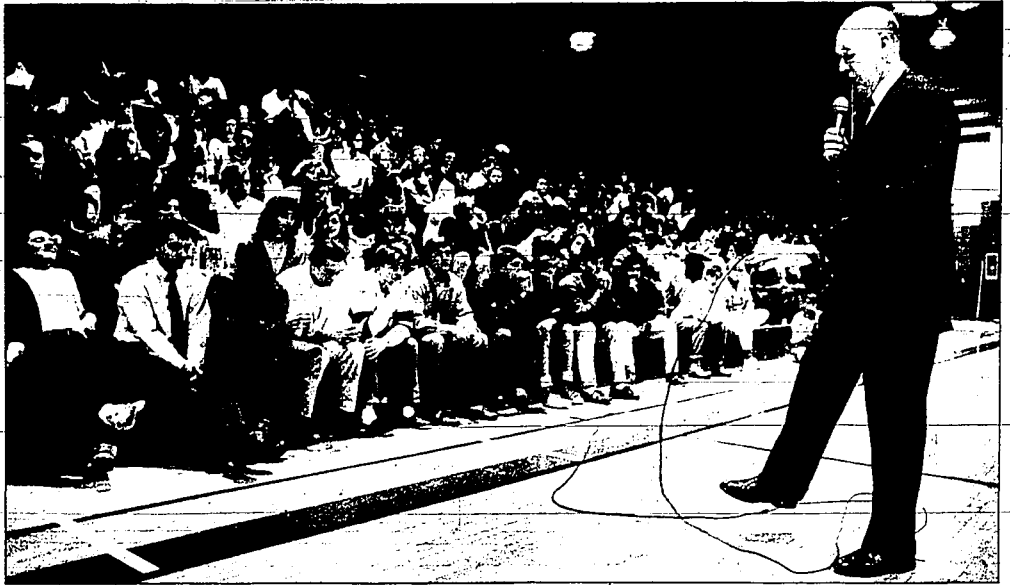

## Robbins bill would repeal Idaho's abortion 'trigger' law

**BOISE** - Rep. Gary Robbins, D-Twin Falls, said he will introduce a bill in the House State Affairs Committee today to repeal Idaho's dormant abortion law.

"It's an obnoxious statute," Robbins said. "It shouldn't be on the books."

Idaho's so-called "trigger" law would go into effect should the U.S. Supreme Court reverse its Roe vs. Wade decision that currently guarantees abortion access. The Idaho law would carry criminal penalties for women undergoing abortions as well as for people who perform the operation.

A bill similar to Robbins' already has

been introduced in the Senate with the backing of nine Democratic senators. But Robbins said it's unlikely that bill will get out of committee.

Under an agreement struck between Republican and Democratic legislators, any abortion bill introduced in the House State Affairs Committee will be included in public hearings to take place in late February.

Although two Twin Falls Democrats

already have announced they'll challenge Republican incumbents in the fall elections solely on abortion issues, Magic Valley legislators say they hope to avoid single-issue campaigning.

Robbins, who has been an outspoken advocate for the pro-choice contingent, said he's not planning to make abortion the cornerstone of his campaign next year - "if the Republican-turned-Democrat decides to seek re-election."

"I don't think any legislative race should be a single-issue race," Robbins said. "Any candidate that has just that on their agenda shouldn't be running."

## IEA official says teachers, school boards can both learn to negotiate

**TWIN FALLS** - Teachers and school board members can learn about negotiations together, in the same room, says an Idaho Education Association official.

The idea behind a public offer made recently by Terry Gilbert, Idaho Education Association's regional director, for a joint negotiations training session.

"Frequently, teacher negotiators have observed that if the negotiation process were more open - if negotiators for both sides were better informed about negotiations - the process would work

better," Gilbert said in a press release.

"School board members are just like teachers," he said. "Teachers have to have some training in the art and science of negotiations and so do board members."

Generic topics such as how to write proposals and counterproposals, verbal skills and learning about the laws surrounding teacher-school board negotiations are some of the things that could be addressed during the joint session, Gilbert said.

Gilbert said a school board could bring in its own expert to work with his office on scheduling and organizing the training sessions, forming an agenda and other logistics of the proposed joint session.

Although school officials and school board members said the proposal sounded like a good idea, they said they couldn't pledge 100 percent support without hearing all the details.

"I think anything that would help make negotiations less adversarial would be an advantage to the board and teachers," James Cobble, Gooding's superintendent, said. "I think we're working toward a common goal, but sometimes negotiations get in the way of that."

Although the Idaho School Board Association already provides some training for school boards, Cobble said, he's

## Officials say no SIS funds in '91 budget

**TWIN FALLS** - Nuclear weapons opponents are dancing in the streets.

The Idaho congressional delegation said this week they believe the new federal budget for next week will include no funding for the proposed Special Isotope Separation project.

"If what we have learned is correct, it appears that there will be zero funding in the budget for construction of the SIS project," senators James McClure and Steve Symms said Thursday in a joint statement.

That was acceptable to them, the senators said, based on a variety of global developments and budget issues.

"This has been a long-hard campaign, and it feels great to win," said Snake River Alliance Executive Director Ljz Paul. "We believe that construction funds for this porkbarrel relic of the Cold War will never be seen in the federal budget again."

Rep. Richard Stallins said earlier this week that he thought the SIS would not be in the new federal budget.

Rep. Larry Craig said the action is understandable, in light of the national budget problems and recent developments in eastern Europe.

But he added, "It will be important to consider other major projects to guarantee jobs and the future vitality of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory."

"INEL has diverse capabilities important to this nation's scientific and technological future, and these must continue to be used for our future success," he said.

The SIS project would use a laser isotope separation process to refine weapons-grade plutonium from existing stocks of fuel-grade plutonium owned by the Energy

## Candidate: Idaho has plenty of wilderness

**TWIN FALLS** - Idaho already has plenty of wilderness land, says a candidate for the state auditor's office, and that's an opinion he would carry with him as a member of the five-person Idaho Land Board.

"I'm for multiple use of lands," said Eldon C. Goughly, 49, of Preston. "We shouldn't tie any more land up with

wilderness."

"Too much wilderness land stagnates businesses such as timber, mining and grazing interests," said Goughly, a Franklin County businessman.

Goughly, a Republican, stopped in Twin Falls Thursday during a whirlwind tour of the state to announce his candidacy for the state auditor's office.

Democratic incumbent J.D. Williams is organizing a campaign but has not formally announced he will run for re-

election.

Goughly said his degree in accounting, minor in economics and business experience of 20 years makes him the best qualified candidate for the job.

Active in the Republican party, Goughly has been active in Farm Bureau; served on the state Tax and Resolutions Committee and has been a district chairman and state committee man for the party.

The state, he said, could be getting a better return on its \$280 million endowment funds through better investments.

But he had no criticisms of accounting or audit practices at the state level, although he said he would urge the state to hurry along implementation of a new computer system that would be available to other government entities.

Calling himself a "watchdog," Goughly said he would keep close tabs on budgets and state money spent.

# ISU dean of agriculture makes legislative points with potato

**BOISE**—When the dean of the University of Idaho's College of Agriculture came calling on legislative budget writers Thursday, he brought along a potato. "Let me tell you, it's not possible to produce this potato without chemicals," said A. Larry Branan, holding the spud high in his right hand. "I have no fear of the potato. But the consumer of the '90s will want a potato without chemicals."



Appropriations Committee for enough money to expand university-sponsored agricultural research programs and to fund agriculture extension offices that give information and help to farmers throughout the state. "Being environmentally conscious in the '90s will be good business," Branan assured

lawmakers in presenting a \$20.4 million budget package. That budget includes a few programs that will benefit the Magic Valley directly, Branan said in a later interview. Those programs include: A \$325,000 Food Safety and Toxicology Laboratory that would provide analysis of food products, soil and water samples. The lab would begin its work by focusing on "minor use" pesticides — chemicals that are used on potatoes and other Idaho crops, Branan said. Later, the team would

concentrate on genetically engineering disease-resistant plants and animals. \$49,000 Aquaculture Extension Program — that would provide for a Hagerman-based researcher to work closely with the aquaculture specialists at the College of Southern Idaho. A \$130,000 Water Quality Assurance Program that would, among other projects, enable researchers to study run-off from Magic Valley dairies. A \$382,500 Crop Management Program which would let extension agents help helping bean and sugar beet growers in the

Twin Falls area as well as farmers in other parts of the state. Those programs, with the exception of the Safety and Toxicology Laboratory, were not recommended by Gov. Cecil Andrus in his 1991 budget. Of the \$18.9 million the governor did set aside for agricultural research and extension programs, \$144,000 — a little less than half of the college's original request — is allocated for safety and toxicology research. The JFAC committee will begin voting on budget requests by the middle of next month.

## Magic Valley area not affected by mail changes, official says

**WASHINGTON** — The U.S. Postal Service's plan to eliminate some areas in which it promises overnight and second-day mail delivery won't affect the Magic Valley. "We'll still be able to make Boise and Pocatello overnight, while anything east there (in the city) will be two days just like it is now," Twin Falls Postmaster Lorenzo Palagali said. He added, "Salt Lake is two days for us and will remain that way." Letters mailed early in other Magic Valley towns arrive in Twin Falls for the overnight shipment to the two cities. But letters mailed from Boise to Pocatello will become a two-day delivery, he said. "It's one day now."

General Anthony Frank said. "I know what carriers want most is dependability," he said. "Just tell me how many days ahead I have to mail my mother's birthday card," he said. By concentrating its resources on smaller areas, the agency hopes to better keep its delivery promises, explained Frank. And to keep them honest, the agency is hiring an outside firm to measure its performance and report the results publicly. "The effort to make service more consistent comes just two months before the Postal Service is expected to apply for a rate increase to take effect in 1991. The more concentrated service was tested on New York City over the past year with only one complaint, Frank added. Similar plans will be instituted across the nation between June and the end of the year, he said. "We've already done 29,000 interviews with the public," said Frank of the research that led to

planned changes in delivery. The biggest complaint? Inconsistent service. Sometimes a letter mailed across town would arrive overnight, sometimes the second day. Sometimes it took a week. "People said they want consistent delivery," Frank explained. They know when their check or magazine or other regular mail is sent, and they want to be confident of when it will arrive. "Just tell me how many days ahead I have to mail my mother's birthday card ... just tell me, I want to be sure it's there," Frank quoted as a typical complaint. "Second, he said, was that people want their mail delivered at the same time every day. 'I wouldn't have guessed that that would be No. 2,' he added. "They don't want to go out there and see it empty." "And the third thing they say is they want local mail delivered overnight," he said.

## Heyburn officials sworn in, hear water metering plan

**HEYBURN** — The City Council witnessed the swearing in of two re-elected council members, elected a council president, listened to a presentation on water meters, heard a report on a study of the city's sewer system and discussed plans for a new fire station this week. Harry Badger was re-elected council president and City Clerk. He Despain swore in council members Badger and Bessie Harless. The council then listened to a presentation by Neptune Systems of a water metering system. The council has been looking into different metering systems before it prepare specifications on a system for the city. CH2M Hill engineer Rick Bishop gave a report to the council on a sewer updating plan. The city has already received a 75 percent grant to pay for the

study, and now they will look into financing to make the recommended changes in the system. The most critical phase of the updating would be to correct violations in the waste water system, Bishop said. He said this phase would cost \$472,000 and it could be funded through a loan program at 4 percent interest. That would translate into a raise of \$2 to \$3 in user fees. He also told council members they could opt to do more of the suggested repairs if they are willing to raise user fees. The council scheduled a public hearing on the sewer project for 4 p.m. Feb. 28 at the city office. Mayor Harold Hurst noted that a house on the property east of City Hall will be burned Saturday by the fire department. The city plans to build a new fire station on the property. The cost of the fire house was estimated at about \$60,000. Hurst said a city will be opening bids for the building on March 23 and the council will act on the bids March 28.

## Indian massacre commemoration could see tribal confrontation erupt

**PRESTON (AP)** — The Northwestern Band of Shoshoni Indians is planning a ceremony commemorating the 1863 Bear River Massacre of 400 of their ancestors in southeastern Idaho, but their opinions on the event are sharply divided. A large contingent of the band based in Brigham City, Utah, will participate in the event on Friday, but many are angry about a protest at the first major event in the region to mark Idaho's centennial. The dissidents claim it is disgraceful to honor U.S. soldiers for their senseless massacre of

Indian women, children and elders. But Allie Hanson, president of the Bear River Battle Creek Monument Association, says the ceremony is not a re-necantment or celebration. "On Jan. 29, 1863, U.S.-Army California volunteer and Northwestern Shoshoni clashed in a bloody battle five miles northeast of what is now Preston, leaving 400 Indians and 22 soldiers dead. Some 350 current tribal members are direct descendants of those who died. Frank Timbimboo, chairman of the tribal business council for the Northwestern Band of Shoshoni

Indians, believes the dissenting group "has its own reasons" for protesting, "but when you look at this overall, I think they're stopping the progress there to have the site become a national monument." The site is proposed as a National Historic Landmark by the National Park Service. If it receives that designation, a new plaque with a more complete explanation of the event will be erected. The monument there now "doesn't say much about Indians," Timbimboo said. "It just honors white soldiers. The new monument would tell the Indian side of it."

## Panel pushes education fund increase

BOISE (AP) — A special committee named by the state Board of Education is recommending an unprecedented infusion of funding for building projects at Idaho's colleges and universities, and commitment to a costly continuing program of maintenance and renovation.

The plan, expected to be complete within about two weeks, was developed by the 11-member Blue Ribbon Committee on Capital Financing for Higher Education. The plan includes four legislators, four business executives and three state agency officials. Ted Crumley of Boise Cascade

Corp. is chairman of the committee and presented the draft report Thursday. Ed Cisek, the Board of Education's chief fiscal officer, said the board's staff is drafting legislation to implement the plan. Among its recommendations: About \$70 million should be allocated immediately to address the maintenance and renovation backlog at the state's higher education facilities. A continuing "Higher Education Capital Improvement Fund" should be established, with at least \$12 million a year allocated annually from the Permanent Building Fund.

But it does not have authority over purely radioactive waste. As a top priority, the plan recommends a comprehensive health-risks study including environmental assessment of the Snake River Aquifer and an inventory of air emissions from the INEL. The plan was developed after Andrus asked the 1989 legislature to authorize an oversight program. Lawmakers agreed to the proposal and directed the governor to prepare a plan for presentation to this year's legislative session. "The development of the oversight framework has already resulted in improved coordination of existing programs that evaluate, monitor and regulate INEL through (state) Department of Health and Welfare permit actions," the governor said. Andrus said the state is involved in extensive negotiations with the Department of Energy to update existing monitoring and oversight agreements and provide federal funding to support that effort. Idaho also is working with the Energy Department and the Environmental Protection Agency

on an agreement for a full environmental cleanup at INEL. The governor said his goal is to have that cleanup completed by the end of the decade. "It is important to our economy and to research and development on a whole range of issues. But, there have also been environmental mistakes made in the past and they must be cleaned up," Andrus stated. Since 1954, long-lived radioactive wastes have been shipped to INEL for storage from other federal nuclear installations. The first 18 years those wastes were buried in shallow trenches. "INEL is a tremendous resource in Idaho," Andrus said at a Kiwanis Club luncheon in Twin Falls Thursday. "But it was not designed to be a waste dump." Andrus reiterated his October 1988 ban on importation of radioactive wastes for storage. "My views haven't changed," he said. "The borders of this state remain closed to waste that anybody wants to bring for the purposes of storage." At the high school, Andrus urged the seniors to graduate and then either join the work force or

continue with their education in Idaho. "I'd say don't let us down, but I know you won't," he told the seniors. "You will build a stronger Idaho than we know now." "I'd hate to see us put forth an investment in you to see you move away." He praised teachers and told the students that Twin Falls has the reputation of being a good school district. Andrus joked with the students, who greeted him with a standing ovation. In opening, he told them he had been warned about the school's "wild hair" day theme. Pointing to his retreating hairline, he said he had shaved his forehead so he would fit in. The governor encouraged the seniors to register to vote and hinted about his own campaign. Andrus has not formally announced, but he told the seniors he will be running for reelection. In 10 years, he told the seniors, they will be running Idaho. "At that point," he said, "I'll be retired and fishing. But if you mess up, you're going to hear from me."

"certainly willing to look at the proposal." Robert Lanfing, Flier's School Board chairman, said if the proposal is approved, it is in the right manner it could be beneficial to both groups. And Flier Superintendent Dave Teater said he thought the idea has potential, but the training would have to be unbiased to work. Teachers seemed even more enthusiastic in support. # GOP senator blasts Democrats as tax cut chances grow dim

BOISE (AP) — A member of the Senate tax committee blasted the panel's Democratic minority Thursday for what he called its disrespectful attempt to torpedo the committee chairman's \$51.3 million tax-cutting package.

Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus also took the opportunity to enter the debate after sitting on the sidelines for the last several weeks. He told state leaders in Twin Falls that the tax package would effectively

than 24 hours earlier to use an attorney general's opinion to kill the

siphon money away from education.

In the Senate, Twin Falls Republican Larry Anderson demanded an apology from the Democrats for their attempt less

than 24 hours earlier to use an attorney general's opinion to kill the package just as a scheduled public hearing began on the bills exempting food from the sales tax and rolling corporate and individual income tax rates back to their 1986 levels.

"That information was not shared with the chairman or the other members of the committee before the hearing started," Anderson said in a statement from the Senate floor. "That letter was pounced on the chairman, and I think that showed a lack of respect."

At issue was the attorney general's opinion saying the bills sponsored by Chairman Rachel Gilbert, R-Boise, were unconstitutionally introduced in the Senate. It said all tax-changing measures must be initiated in the House.

The opinion, sought by Democrat Ralph Lacy of Pocatello, was issued just hours before Wednesday's hearing. Mrs. Gilbert, a potential candidate

for the GOP nomination to face Andrus in November, continued to dismiss the document as just one more lawyer's opinion, but she conceded there was little chance for approval of the corporate or individual income tax measures and a compromise could well be forced on the sales tax exemption.

"The two sides in this committee were politically oriented," Anderson declared. "After a brief discussion, Assistant

Democratic Floor Leader Marguerite McLaughlin of Orofino said there was apparently a misunderstanding about what occurred at the hearing. She said those involved would meet privately to resolve any problems.

Anderson maintained "protocol was smashed" by Wednesday's incident. Republicans united to hear off the Democratic attempt to kill the bills on Wednesday, postponing any action until at least next week.

# Battle sends rule bill to Senate

BOISE (AP) — After the first partisan political battle of the session, the Idaho House passed a new measure to give itself more power over agency rules.

Rep. Michael Simpson, R-Blackfoot, the bill's sponsor, said it may be "the single most important issue facing this legislative session, and it may have the longest-reaching impact."

But Democrats called the legislation approved Thursday on a straight party-line, 58-21 vote an unconstitutional attempt by the majority Republicans to get around the separation of power between the three branches of government.

"It's an unprecedented usurpation of the executive function and it will be costly," said Rep. Jim Hansen, D-Boise.

The legislation now goes to the Senate, where Republicans have enough votes to get it passed but not enough to sustain a veto if

The Legislature has been trying for years to get more authority to revoke or amend rules and regulations adopted by state agencies. A lawsuit pending before the Idaho Supreme Court asks whether legislative action on rules must be by legislation, subject to a veto, or can be by resolution with no review by the governor.

The bill approved Thursday moved through the House quickly. It was first introduced at a meeting of the House Ways and Means Committee on a 4-3 vote Thursday morning, with Democrats opposing. Then it was sped toward debate and final passage, with Democrats

objecting all the way. Current state law says agency rules are valid unless specifically rejected by the Legislature within a certain deadline. Simpson's proposal turns that around and says the rules may be temporary only unless the Legislature extends them by resolution.

Democrat Floor Leader Jim Stotcheff, D-Sandpoint, argued it would cause many problems to allow the Legislature unlimited authority to change agency rules, even those adopted many years ago. If such review were limited to a year or so, Stotcheff said he could support the proposal.

"I do believe in legislative oversight," Stotcheff countered. Hansen said if the Legislature had to sit through hearings on all agency rules, it would require a full-time staff and the Legislature would have to become full-time.

# Budget man defends school spending

BOISE (AP) — The chief budget officer for the state Board of Education mounted a vigorous defense of the board's stewardship of state allocations for higher education, saying it's reflected lawmakers' wishes.

"We've been very good custodians of that money, and I don't feel there has been any transgressions of legislative intent," Ed Cisek told the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee on Thursday.

His defense was prompted by questions from the committee during the budget presentation of University of Idaho President Elisabeth Zinsler, who continued the campaign for state aid in excess of Gov. Cecil Andrus' recommendation for a 14 percent

increase. House Appropriations Chairman Kathleen Gurnsey, R-Boise, and Vice Chairman Mack Neibaur, R-Paul, both expressed concern that the board, apparently at the direction of the governor, decided to divert \$200,000 from university research to a rural economic development program.

Citing comments only moments before about how every dollar the state spends on research attracts two dollars or more in private grants, Mrs. Gurnsey said, "I don't understand why the board just rolls over and plays dead."

Neibaur raised his questions in conjunction with the committee's traditional method of giving the board full discretion on how to use the state aid rather than tying strings

to the money as it does for many other agencies.

But Cisek pointed out that budget writers never discussed the research money or its use for investigating rural economic projects.

Assistant Senate Democratic Floor Leader Marguerite McLaughlin of Orofino contended that if those rural research projects result in breathing new life into small town economies, they will pay back at 10 to one.

And Ms. Zinsler, making her first budget presentation since taking office last summer, said that as long as the projects have passed a peer review to assure their high quality, research in rural economic development is just as important as in many other areas. It was the only confrontational moment during the university's presentation.







## Richfield girls return to subdistrict title

GOODING — After a four-year absence, the Richfield girls' basketball team returned to the District 4 Class A Northside-Subdistrict girls' basketball tournament Thursday night.

The Tigers, not nailing it down until Becci Brown drilled a three-pointer with 1 minute, 59 seconds left, topped the upstart Bliss Bears 26-18 and will go into next week's district finals in Murtaugh as the No. 1 seed.

The district finals, slated Wednesday and Thursday at Murtaugh, will pit Richfield against the Southside Subdistrict champion in the first round with Bliss meeting the Southside runner-up at 7 p.m. The winner of the second game will become district champion and automatically advance to the state tournament in Lewiston next month.

The loser of the subdistrict championship game will drop back to play the winner of the game between the two second-place teams. That winner will secure the other berth in state while the Thursday night winner will move on to yet a third chance of going to state by meeting a challenger from District 5 on Feb. 3 in a one-game

playoff in American Falls. Neither team warmed up to the shooting task Thursday night until Richfield broke away from a 14-14 third-quarter tie, to 36-26 in the final eight minutes. And seven of those came in the last 1:51, including the only three free throws converted in the low-fouling game.

The scoring lethargy was probably best summed up in the second quarter when Bliss went 5:10 without a point and yet wound up in a tie when Debbie Werry broke the drought.

Richfield took the lead for keeps when Shannon Schoolcraft opened the last quarter with a long shot and Malinda Ward posted up out of her guard position for a close-in turnaround.

After Bliss' Rachelle Owensley scored, Brown gave Richfield a five-point advantage with the only three-pointer of the night.

“That kind of mentally took care of us,” said Bliss coach Dina Butler, who is stepping down after seven years at the Bliss helm to devote her time to raising a family.

Butler said she felt the mental aspect of the game weighed against her charges since their surprise upset of Dietrich Wednesday night with a 5-1 record.

## Eagles to confront archrivals Ricks, North Idaho

TWIN FALLS — The historic archrivals are coming to town this weekend to test the No. 1-ranked College of Southern Idaho Golden Eagles.

CSI's basketball team, both men and women, will be hosting North Idaho and Ricks College on Saturday in Region 18 action. The women's games will begin at 5:15 p.m., followed by the men's games at 7:30.

The CSI men, ranked No. 1 in the Na-

tional Junior College Athletic Association poll for the 528th straight week, have a two-game cushion on both NIC and Ricks, the current runnersup in the northern division of Region 18. With that kind of leeway this doesn't add up to the make-or-break aspects that face the Golden Eagle women.

Coach Ben Stroud's women carry a 5-2 regional record into the fray, two games behind possessing and undefeated Utah Valley but tied with Ricks, North Idaho and Salt Lake Community College.

The women's outlook for postseason play will have the top four teams in Region

18 advancing to regionals with the best record in the north getting the best designation. All the 5-2 teams are northern division clubs.

Both Stroud and men's Coach Fred Trenkle note that the usual Region 18 rule of “don't lose at home, get a breakthrough on the road” applies.

In the men's standings, CSI is 7-0 in region games and both Ricks, which was upset at home by Snow last weekend, and North Idaho are 5-2. They played each other once, North Idaho winning by 11 points in Coeur d'Alene. But Ricks, despite losing

that home match which hurts, stayed in the hunt because it had road breakthroughs at Salt Lake and Utah Valley.

“North Idaho is a very strong, good rebounding team with excellent depth,” says Trenkle, whose ballclub is 19-0 overall. “They have a solid starting five that has size, quickness and shoots well. They back them with a seemingly inexhaustible supply of 6-foot, 6-inch to 6-7 guys off the bench. North Idaho is led by redshirt transfer (from Montana State) Felix McGowan.”

## CBS's Madden follows the games without knowing names, numbers

“What John Madden does for CBS is hard work. Really.”

On Sunday, for example, when Madden's big voice is testing the “BOOM!” control on your television, he basically will be analyzing, the Super Bowl without paying attention to the names and numbers on the jerseys. Think that's easy?

Explaining strategy and technique is one thing. Quickly picking out names and numbers, as his eyes hunt from the field to his monitors to a sideline and back to the field, is quite another, even with the help of spotters.

So he has learned, a la Raiders play-by-play man Bill King, to identify body types.

“I think I probably learned that from Bill King,” said the former coach. “Bill King used to come to training camp to see what the guys look like — what they look like and how they run.”

To become that familiar with the Denver Broncos — a team usually covered by NBC instead of CBS — Madden has to study a fair amount of film. But his 49ers' expertise doesn't come automatically just because they're generally a CBS attraction.

“Why not? Well, among other reasons, teams change during a season. Tracking the changes, or at least catching up with them every so often, is part of the job, too.”

“The biggest example (of how the 49ers changed) is how (tight end) Brent Jones has become a bigger part of the offense,” Madden said. “Or how (fullback Tom) Rathman

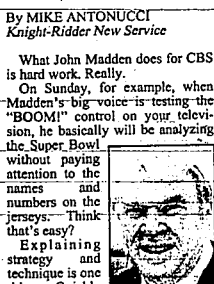
has become a receiver. That changed all during the year.”

Although Madden and his play-by-play partner, Pat Summerall, don't see any team week-in, week-out, he feels obligated to understand the nuances, as well as the basics, of offenses and defenses.

“There are some subtle things — different types of pass rushes,” he said, still dwelling on the Niners. “(Charles) Haley (at end) for speed outside; (Larry) Roberts for power; (Pierce) Holt in the base defense. (Jim) Eusebio gives ‘em one thing at a time: tackle, (Pete) Kugler, another.”

It's not as if Madden goes to a couple of practices, does the NFC championship game and then — BOOM! — he's ready for the Super Bowl.

It just sounds that way, which is obviously a large part of the reason for Madden's success.

HAGERMAN — It's safe to say tonight's Magic Valley Conference boys' basketball showdown between Castleford and Hagerman will be a sellout by its scheduled start at 8 p.m.

The Wolves and the Pirates, 1-2 in the Magic Valley Conference standings and 4-5 in

The Associated Press A-4 poll, will collide in a rematch of Castleford's 58-46 victory in Castleford on Jan. 3.

A win would for all practical purposes wrap up the Magic Valley Conference championship for the Wolves and the top seed and first-round bye in next month's District 4 Class A-4 Southside Subdistrict basketball tournament. A loss would make things interesting.

## Vandals eye tough matchups against Weber, EWU

It's showdown time in the Big Sky Conference, Part II.

The first-comes-two-weeks-ago when confronting Idaho and Eastern Washington visited Montana and Montana State generally considered the toughest road trip in the Big Sky. Eastern came away 2-0, Idaho 1-1.

But the Eagles lost at home in overtime to Nevada-Reno last weekend, so both EWU and Idaho will go into this weekend

with one conference loss apiece.

Against that background, the Eagles will visit Idaho Saturday, 24 hours after the Vandals host Weber State, which is in sole possession of third place in the Big Sky with two losses.

“It's an unbelievably big weekend for us,” said Idaho coach Kermit Davis. “We have two of the premier teams in the conference coming to town back to back, and these are games we need to win.”

EWU is 6-1 in the Big Sky in the wake of an overtime victory over Weber State in Cheney, Wash., Wednesday night; Ida-

ho is 6-1. Weber State is 3-2.

“We can't afford to lose at home,” said Davis. “We have to take care of business because in the second round (of the regular season) we have five of our eight games on the road. We can't afford any surprises at home.”

In another Big Sky game Wednesday, Montana buried Idaho State 102-76 while Northern-Arizona lost a non-league contest to Texas Southern, 70-67. Boise State was scheduled to play a conference game at Nevada-Reno in Reno Thursday night. Although Idaho and Eastern are statisti-

cally the two best offensive teams in the Big Sky and the Vandals and Weber are among the best defensive teams, Idaho faces significant matchup problems with both opponents.

“Weber has good inside players, better size than we have,” said Davis. “Eastern has excellent quickness, probably one of the quickest teams we'll play this season.”

Weber is rebounding better than any Big Sky team except Montana, and doing it largely with newcomers to Denny Huston's program.

19-point forward from Poplar, Mont. "He's very active and is a dangerous shooter from anywhere," Trenkle said.

The big guy is 6-8, 230-pound Arnon Duzewich, a Brazillion, who is averaging 13 points but game but is the region's top rebounder and shot blocker. "He had 25 points, 15 rebounds and 10 blocks against Snow last weekend and he's had a 22-rebound game so he's a dandy," Trenkle said.

John Patton, a 6-7 transfer from Oregon State, runs the high post at a 13-point average clip. Fred Butler, a 6-1 Maryland product, averages 9 points and runs the one-guard front and Jeff Listrono, who had a big shooting display in regionals last year, is averaging 9 points.

"Judging from everything I've read or heard since last August, this is the game Ricks has been pointing

to all year," Trenkle continued. "In fact, they've told their fans to get to the gymnasium by 4 p.m. and fill up the lower section."

Ricks is familiar to Trenkle from several standpings. It still prefers the quicker offensive game, goes to early offense and has the shooters to take the perimeter farther back than most teams.

More to the point, the Vikings return two of the best jump shooters in the region in 6-4 Keegan Kane (21 points per game) and Bob Holker (17 pp). Those two combined for 56 points in a 135-point blitzing of Dixie last weekend.

Also back is Rod Dixon along with 6-10 Ken Johnson, who had a big game against CSI last year. But Johnson is on the bench, replaced by return missionaries and freshman Jared Miller, a 6-8 Utahn who Trenkle calls probably the best big man in the region.

"Miller is a big strong, mature man. He can shoot it, he'll take it to you and he rebounds," Trenkle said.

The other starter is 6-5 Clint Bailey, a Jerome freshman who is averaging 8.1 points per game but had 22 in the Snow game last Saturday.

"Bailey has filled a very big role for the Vikings," said Trenkle. "It is seeing that the ball gets to where it should be and he's making his shots and handling his share of rebounding."

"We know Ricks is going to play hard so that means we have to play defense and hold them to point totals that we handle," Trenkle said. "They are an emotional team with great outside shooting and I've never seen a team as capable of eating up a deficit as Ricks has over the years. We just have to keep them from getting into that scoring rhythm they can."

The CSI women got some good news in midweek when freshman guard Candace Lords returned to practice. She sustained a knee injury during a game last week.

"We definitely need her because these two teams have a couple of the best guards and quickness of any teams we face," said Stroud.

Ricks will be trying to accommodate playing without top gun Millie Ostler who underwent surgery after a knee injury last week.

# E. Germany embraces capitalism, wants to reunite

EAST BERLIN (AP) — East Germany began tearing down barriers to free enterprise Thursday in order to lure money from abroad and spur employment at home; a major shift toward capitalism caused by a crumbling economy.

An influential politician who recently quit the Communist Party, meanwhile, predicted that East Germany's reunification with West Germany is inevitable.

Communist Premier Hans Modrow will visit Bonn on Feb. 13-14 to meet with West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl and discuss the economic and political problems in East Germany, Kohl chief of staff Rudolf Seiters announced.

It would be the second such German summit in two months.

## Wall pieces bring \$29,000

EAST BERLIN (AP) — Western buyers are paying nearly \$30,000 for large segments of the Berlin Wall, an East German newspaper said Thursday.

Helge Moebius, an official of the East German foreign trade company Limex-Bau, told the Berliner Zeitung newspaper that the 2.7-ton segments of the wall are bringing between \$11,800 and \$29,400 each.

The newspaper did not say how many pieces have been sold so far.

The concrete wall sections, each about 10 feet high and six feet wide, are being sold to collectors from the United States, Britain, and other countries.

## Briefly

### Namibians consider new constitution

WINDHOEK, Namibia (AP) — A democratic, Western-style constitution was formally presented Thursday to the Constituent Assembly, which is expected to approve the document and set a date for independence, probably in March.

Unlike most constitutions in Africa, the document sets a limit of two, five-year terms for the president, who is to be chosen through national elections. However, to avoid the need for an immediate election, the first president will be chosen by Parliament.

The constitution also says Parliament can impeach the president by a two-thirds vote. It prohibits capital punishment.

The first president is expected to be Sam Nujoma, leader of the South-West Africa People's Organization. SWAPO waged a 23-year guerrilla war against South African rule that ended in April.

### European storm, rain claim 44 lives

LONDON (AP) — A fierce storm with torrential rains driven by winds of up to 110 mph cut a trail of destruction across southern England and into Europe on Thursday, killing at least 44 people in three countries.

A reactor chimney was blown down at the Paluel nuclear power plant in France. State-owned Electricite de France said the plant was shut down immediately and any possible hazards would be monitored.

Police said at least 32 people were killed in England and winds of 90 mph snarled rail, subway and road traffic.

Lashing rain smashed windows in central London, tore off roofs and knocked down scaffolding and billboards. Pedestrians clung to one another to keep their feet. Electricity went off for 250,000 people in western England. Six people were reported killed in France, including a 12-year-old girl crushed when wind blew down a wall in a school courtyard, and more in the Netherlands.

### Chad releases detained U.S. citizens

MARIETTA, Ga. (AP) — Three Georgia Lockheed employees detained in the African nation of Chad since Jan. 5 left for the Congo on Thursday and a connecting flight to Paris, a Lockheed spokesman said.

The five were to have left Sunday but authorities in Chad delayed them. Lockheed spokesman Dick Martin said they left late Thursday morning EST.

They had been detained in a contract dispute with the government involving destruction of a maintenance manual for a new C-130 transport plane the government had purchased from the company, based in Marietta, Ga.

The five had been detained at police headquarters in the Chadian capital of N'Djamena from Jan. 5-15 and kept under house arrest at a hotel since then.

### Crew rescued from damaged ship

TOKYO (AP) — Two helicopters rescued all 23 crew members Thursday from a 7,027-ton Liberian cargo vessel that was taking on water off western Japan, the coast guard said.

The crewmen from Hong Kong, the Philippines, Burma, China and Britain all were in good condition after being rescued from the Maritime Gaudencia, said Toshiyuki Ito, spokesman of the Maritime Safety Agency's regional headquarters in Maizuru, western Japan.

The ship was in the Japan Sea, less than a mile from western Japan's Kyoto prefecture, when it radioed for help shortly after midnight Wednesday, Ito said.

# Actress Ava Gardner, 67, dies of pneumonia at London home

HOLLYWOOD — Ava Gardner, the showgirl's daughter whose specialty in films was the sly-eyed, saucy beauty whose business ranged from Mickey Rooney to Frank Sinatra, died Thursday at her home in London.

She was 67 and died of pneumonia, a recurring illness she had been battling for several years.

Famed for her natural beauty and understated acting style, she became equally known for the men she attracted. They ranged from orchestra leader Artie Shaw, whom she also married, to Spanish matadors whom she did not.

Never considered a great actress in the classic sense of that word, she brought to her more than 60 pictures a magnetic quality that proved box-office prosperity.

She spanned a generation of sex kittens and love goddesses between Rita Hayworth and Marilyn Monroe before settling in Europe in the 1960s.

In an interview in 1982, Miss Gardner said that she would happily have traded her career for one happy, long-lasting marriage: "One good man I could love and marry and cook for and make a home for, who would stick around for the rest of my life."

"The trouble was that I was a victim of image," she said. "Because I was promoted as a sort of siren and played all those sexy broads, people made the mistake of thinking I was like that off the screen. They couldn't have been more wrong. ... I was a country girl and I still have a country girl's rather simple, ordinary values."

The country girl was indeed that, born Ava Lavinnia Gardner on her family's farm in Smithfield, N.C., the youngest of five children. Her father lost his farm when she was 2 years old and was forced to grow tobacco and cotton for shares of those crops.

After her father's death in 1938, her mother ran a boarding house for minimal money and the young Ava remembered later the taunts of her classmates when she was forced to attend high school in tattered clothes.

On a visit to New York, her brother-in-law, a commercial photographer, took a number of portraits of her.

One of them was sent to Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, which ordered a screen test.

Her first film was "We Were Dancing" in 1942, a stylish romantic comedy with Norma Shearer and Melvyn Douglas.

But her reputation as a sex goddess was launched in the 1946 film "The Killers," co-starring Burt Lancaster.

## Czech head wants new peace meet

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — President Vaclav Havel of Czechoslovakia proposed Thursday that his country, Poland and Hungary join in union to "return to Europe" following decades of Soviet domination.

He also called for an international "peace conference" that would put "the definite period mark to World War II and the Cold War and the artificial division" of Germany and Europe.

The goal is clear, Havel said. "We want to belong to a Europe that is a friendly community of independent states, a stable Europe, a Europe that does not need protection from superpowers because it is capable of defending itself by reconstructing its own security system," he said.

The ongoing Helsinki Treaty process and parallel disarmament talks should be accelerated to prepare the way to the peace conference, he said.

"Then both military pacts could be dissolved and the process of all-European integration could be started," including the unification of Germany within the present borders of East and West Germany, he said.

The former dissident playwright, elected president last month after Czechoslovakia's peaceful anti-Communist revolution, told the Polish National Assembly that joint action to rejoin Western Europe would avert rivalry among Eastern Europe's democracies.

## Refugees wait as U.S., Britain argue

GENEVA (AP) — An international meeting has ended in dismay, and the fate of thousands of Vietnamese refugees hangs on a dispute between the United States and Britain over whether they should be sent home against their will.

starting date for mandatory repatriation of Vietnamese who do not qualify for refugee status in Hong Kong, a British crown colony.

The U.N. refugee office had proposed the six-month suspension of repatriations as a compromise between U.S. demands and Britain's argument that only immediate deportations would deter another mass influx of boat people to the overcrowded colony.

Britain returned 51 Vietnamese to their Communist homeland in December under an agreement reached with Vietnam last year.

"There is no objective justification for a delay in mandatory repatriation, but in the interests of consensus we were prepared to agree on a moratorium," said Robin McLaren, head of the British delegation.

Although the two-day meeting ended without agreement, it marked the first international consensus that Vietnamese deemed to have fled for economic rather than political reasons should be returned even against their will.

The United States relaxed its opposition to forced repatriations and told the meeting it would not block international consensus on forcible return of economic refugees, according to sources present at closed session. For the first time at an international gathering, Vietnam also agreed to take back thousands of the emigrants as part of a U.N.-supported program. It said none should arrive before Oct. 1, however, to allow time for preparations to absorb them.



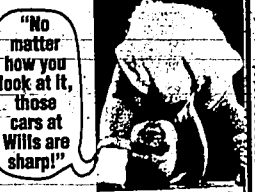

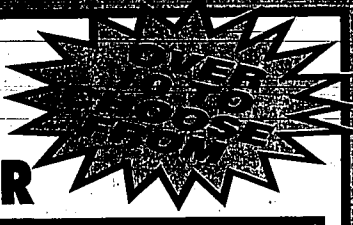

## Poetic cowpokes converge on Elko

ELKO, Nev. — With a grin on his wizened face and a glint in his eye, Gene Ferguson presses "play" on his hand-held tape recorder.

Ferguson of Oroville, Calif., reckons he's written 1,000 poems and songs in his 74 years in the cattle business. "They wake you up at night," he says.

One of the latest — "Don't Shift the Gears if You've Had Too Many Beers" — is on this tape, and Ferguson aims to try and get the song heard by someone important this week at the Sixth Cowboy Poetry Gathering.

Elko has a special place in Ferguson's heart: Forty years ago, he wrote a song called "Pauline" about a raven-haired miss he met here. Ferguson says the song, set to the tune of "Sweet Betsy from Pike," was recorded by Tex Ritter.

Time has taken its toll on Ferguson, who had open-heart surgery a few years ago. "That old story you can't hurt a cowboy really isn't true," he muses in a poem he says he dictated to his nurse while in the hospital.

But Ferguson still has dreams. This week, Elko is the city of dreams for some. For many others, it's just a darn good place to spin some yarn, sing some tunes and have a heckuva great time.

Traffic in already-booming Elko was thickening like chili Wednesday evening as cowpokes and ranchers from as far away as Arkansas rolled into town for the gathering, widely known as the cowboy cultural event of the year.

In the Elko Convention Center, hub of the gathering, the lobby was packed with people scanning the crowd for old friends. Some were making new friends, too. Ferguson had already struck up a conversation with Kathy Mrautnich, a junior-high-math and French teacher from Richmond, Calif.

"This is my one holiday during the school year," says Mrautnich, who is attending her fourth gathering. She was first drawn to the event by an interest in Western folklore and culture she adds.

Cyd McMullen, a festival staff member, says about 8,000 people are expected at this year's gathering. The first event, held

in 1985, was intended as a one-time happening. But it drew between 3,000 and 4,000 people and loads of publicity, and the cowpokes clamored for more.

Among the earliest arrivals at the gathering Wednesday were Owen and Irene Barton of Twin Falls, who attend every year.

Barton was a featured poet at the 1985 gathering. A stroke he suffered two years ago forced him to decrease his involvement. He hadn't even planned to go this year.

"What did change my mind?" Barton asks his wife. "Oh, you just can't stay away," Irene says, laughing.

The Bartons recently moved into Twin Falls after years of running the Diamond A Ranch in Owyhee County. McMullen says Barton is "very good and honored among his peers." He's published one book of his poems, entitled "Saddle Talk," and he and Irene hope to put together another volume.

He gives Irene credit for salvaging his work. "I'd just write 'em and throw 'em in the wastebasket," he says, but Irene and their children would fish the poems out and put them away for safekeeping.

"Every one of those poems is true to life," says Barton. "I've wrote about my old horses, my old gun, my old dog..."

Like most everything else in Nevada, the gathering runs 'round the clock. Everyone seemed ready to party Wednesday night. "You're here and I'm here and we're gonna have a great six nights and three days," festival director Hal Cannon told the audience at a cowboy song fest that officially opened the proceedings.

During the day, open readings and jam sessions are held at the convention center and in the junior high school and police station. In the evenings, special programs are planned in the convention center auditorium.

Wendell-musician-Ernie Sites was among those featured in Wednesday's show, and he entertained the crowd with tales of riding herd along the Snake River and doing the "Sagebrush Boogie."

But later at night, the action shifts to the Stockmen's Motor Hotel a few blocks away, "our unofficial, semi-headquarters," jokes cowboy singer Don Edwards. There, **• See POETS on Page D2**

## Slim Whitman takes country music around world

JACKPOT — The career of country-western singer Slim Whitman began typically, but an unusual turn was in store for him.

In 1948 at age 23, the native of Tampa, Fla., had served in the Navy during World War II and was working at a Tampa shipyard, practicing jodeling while on the job.

By popular demand, Whitman began singing on local radio and television shows. He soon had a recording contract, was a regular on the Louisiana Hayride television show and became a member of the Grand Ole Opry.

With successful concerts and an ardent fan club, Whitman's career was progressing fine. Then, in 1955, his agency began getting a lot of unusual telephone calls and letters, requesting tours from Slim Whitman. The demand was unusual because it was from Europe, where no American country-western artists had ever performed on tour.

"They didn't even know what country-western was," Whitman said in a telephone interview from his home in Florida. "So we started checking to see why they wanted us over there and we found out that we had a record setting right on top of the pop charts over there, which was 'Rose Marie.' We checked sales and found that we had sold more than a million records overseas, and that was unheard of."

So Whitman took his band to the British Isles, Ger-

many and other European countries. His 1956 10-week tour was sold out before he arrived, his two-week concert stay at the huge London Palladium was sold out and his song, "Rose Marie," stayed at Number One on the British pop charts for 11 weeks, still the longest number one ever.

What was the attraction? Perhaps it was the fascination of seeing a man standing over six feet tall, weighing more than 200 pounds, singing in three octaves and jodeling tender love songs in high falsetto.

"I'm slim only in name," Whitman said. "I've always believed in fitness, so I've never been a skinny guy. I was a baseball player."

Whitman's producers put "Slim" instead of "Otis" on his record labels, and the new name was his forever.

The black or white suits Whitman always wears add trademark to his stately stage presence.

"The fans that have been around for years know that I will come out in one of those colors," Whitman said. "And I always play a white guitar."

actually decreased a bit because people couldn't get motel rooms — all available lodging was filled by people who had come to town to work in the gold mining boom.

Continued from Page D1 wanted to set himself apart from the multitude of singers on the Louisiana Hayride.

"They had a lot of artists dressing in all colors: red, blue, green," he recalled. "We started looking at all of that and, to be different, we came up with the colors of black and white. So we got into neckties and we stood out among the pack, you might say, and it worked. People said, 'Hey, we like those colors,' so we stayed with them."

Fancy black and white suits were made for Whitman and the band by the star's wife, Jerry.

The other trademark of this blue-eyed gentleman is his selection of songs. He states matter-of-factly that he must love a song before he ever performs or records it. Some of his most popular songs include "Indian Love Call," "Love Song of the Waterfall," "Danny Boy," "I'll Take You Home Again, Kathleen," "Secret Love" and his theme song, "I'm Casting My Lasso Towards the Sky."

In his career, Whitman has sold more than 60 million copies of the 65 albums he has recorded and has won an impressive collection of awards. For eight consecutive years, he was named "International Artist of the Year." Slim said if he had it to do over, he wouldn't change anything, except that he might work a little harder.

Whitman sometimes tours with his son, Byron, who is even taller and can sing an octave higher than his father.

"A lot of times when I'm singing, I'm singing high, but Byron is

singing up above me in harmony," Whitman said. "It sounds like he is in another range, and, on a lot of songs, he is."

"When he gets above there in another range, it's kind of earth-shaking. It's awesome to me, really, that it's happening."

Whitman said his son is a good songwriter and a talented musician. "He's a very good entertainer. A big guy," Whitman said. "He's a good looking guy. He looks like me."

Maintaining an individual style has always been very important to Slim Whitman. "I've never really paid too much attention to the record companies' ideas," he said. "I had ideas of my own and I used them."

To the frustration of his record companies, Whitman refused to record songs he did not like, or aim at the bigger, mass-over market of record sales by adding orchestration and moderating his style.

He said, "Once you go with a thing in your mind and you're sure you're right, then you go. And I don't think any artists should let anybody sway them."

Whitman continued performing in Europe during the 1960s and '70s, when he set an international record for having the most number one albums.

Since the early 1970s, England has held annual country-western music festivals and an ever-growing variety of C & W artists perform at the festivals and tour the rest of Europe.

"Now a lot of them (American country-western singers) are popular there," Whitman said. "But the biggest ones here are not the biggest

over there. It's kind of a strange thing."

In 1980, an American marketing firm decided to advertise Whitman on national television, and the promotion sold more than four million albums.

"The older people started that commercial because they wanted to buy my records but they couldn't find any," Whitman said. "A lot of the younger people would say, 'Hey, where did this guy come from?' but the older people said, 'I wonder where he's been?'"

Many of old western classics Slim sings, such as "Red-River-Valley," are new to younger generations, and he laughs that "the kids" keep asking him if he wrote that song.

In October, Whitman was on tour in Australia. This month, he and Byron — along with a six-man band — are playing in Las Vegas, Nev., and at Cactus Pete's in Jackpot. After taking off the month of February, they will start a European tour in March. Jerry travels with her husband and son on most of their overseas tours.

Whitman said he likes to spend leisure time on his boat near where he lives in the Florida Keys.

"We'll go out on the ocean and try to outsmart fish," he said.

At home, this happy yodeler takes down his Christmas-lights-in-mid-January and does chores around the house "just like any other husband," he said. "It keeps you sane."

## Auction benefits Blackfeet

**BROWNING, Mont. (AP)** — A California art auction this Saturday could raise \$5,000 or more to support the storytelling and oral history traditions of the Blackfeet Indians.

Western artist Howard Terpning says he will donate 10 percent of the proceeds of the auction of his painting "Hail Marks" to the Piegagan Institute of Browning, which educates young Blackfeet in the tribe's storytelling and oral history practices.

The Greenwich Workshop Inc., whose galleries in Carmel, Calif., will host the auction, said the painting is expected to draw bids of more than \$50,000.

The painting depicts a Blackfeet brave wearing hides dyed with red dye signifying hail, which in Indian lore will rain upon their enemies and help bring about their defeat.

Terpning, an Arizona artist who specializes in Indian customs, culture and traditions, said he feels it is important to help the Blackfeet preserve oral history because past generations had no written language. Oral histories carry the culture of the tribe.

"The risk is that the Indians will lose a vital part of their heritage if this practice is not kept alive," said Terpning. "It would be a loss

for all of us because it relates to one phase of our history that is uniquely American."

Terpning cited the example of George Kicking Woman, a 77-year-old Blackfeet medicine man who was the subject of an earlier

Terpning painting.

"When a person like George Kicking Woman passes on, his legacy of the medicine man will pass with him," Terpning said. "The risk is that a wealth of unrecorded history will be lost."

## Landon directs TV movie with Art Carney

**LOS ANGELES (AP)** — Michael Landon sat on the floor in the tiny, darkened editing room and watched two key dramatic scenes in the NBC movie "Where Pigeons Go To Die."

On the monitor screen, Art Carney as "Da" lies motionless in a hospital bed as his 10-year-old grandson, played by Robert Hy Gorman, tells him about the performance of Dickens in a homing-pigeon race. The boy is thrilled when his grandfather, who's had a stroke, mumbles a few words.

Then, the boy watches from hiding as he sees for the first time that his own father, played by Cliff De Young, loves "Da" as much as he does.

It's an emotional moment, and even the editors, who've seen it dozens of times, watch silently.

Landon directed the movie, which airs Monday, and adapted the screenplay from the book by R. Wright Campbell. He also narrates and plays the adult grandson who returns 40 years later to sell his grandfather's house and is overwhelmed by memories.

It's the first thing Landon's done since completing the NBC series "Highway to Heaven" last year. After more than 30 years in television without a lull ("Bonanza" 1959-73, "Little House on the Prairie" 1974-83 and "Highway to Heaven" 1984-89), Landon took six months off to travel and relax.

"I was having dinner one night with Melissa Sue Anderson, who was on 'Little House,' and her fiancé," he said. "She said she'd read 'Where Pigeons Go To Die' and thought I might like it. I did and I bought the book. It had been around for a while. It had once been optioned with John Wayne in mind for the grandfather."

"I loved the simplicity of the story. I loved the way the boy's love of his grandfather is tied in with his pet homing pigeon. I like the way the narration brings the story together. There are no big-deal things going on — just some little things, like the way the boy sees his father shave his grandfather and sees his love, too."

Landon said he felt particularly lucky that he was able to get Art Carney, who won an Oscar for his role in "Honey and Tonto" in 1974. "I'd always thought of him for the

part of the grandfather," he says.

"He's a lovely guy to work with." The movie also brings Landon together with composer Leonard Rosenman, who wrote the score.

"He wrote the music for 'East of Eden' and I've been humming it for 20 years," Landon said.

Landon's producer, Kent McCray, and his wife, Sue McCray, his cast-

ing director, sent a recording of the "East of Eden" theme to Switzerland and had a special music box made. Landon collects music boxes.

The movie was filmed on location in Lawrence, Kan., and in Kansas City.

Landon said he's worked so often with animals that he had little trouble with the pigeons, cat and hawk in the movie. He left it up to his long-time animal trainer, Gary Gero, who went to Kansas early to get the pigeons acquainted with the area.

"A pigeon is not exactly the Albert Einstein of the animal world," Landon said, "but Gary was able to get them to do some remarkable

things. He set up the big pigeon race where hundreds of pigeons compete."

"He's extremely kind to the animals. I never want any animal put in jeopardy and he feels the same way."

# 'Tremors' is a zippy, cheerful, not-too-gory monster movie

**HOLLYWOOD** — Most horror movies take place in the dark. "Tremors," a jocular good-time monster film with surprises up its sleeve, is set in the clear day, in a desert landscape that seems to stretch endlessly toward the Sierra.

In this National Geographic wasteland, full of vast cliffs, buttes and canyons of rock, nothing, so it seems, can hide. The air is so clear, the terrain so vast, that the little desert town slumped in the middle of it — sarcastically named Perfection — seems invulnerable to sneak attack. Except, of course, from below.

That's where producers-writers S.S. Wilson and Brent Maddock and director Ron Underwood bring the assault on their nine complacent Perfectionites. That subterranean menace comes from four huge earth-worms: 30 feet long, ravenously hungry, with huge spits, sticky tentacle-tongues that grab victims and suck them down.

These worms, ingeniously designed by Tom Woodruff and Alec Gillis, have a lot more personality than the ones in "Dune." For one thing, they're frighteningly fast and

agile, tunneling under the desert with terrifying speed; executing all sorts of clever ruses and stratagems, tearing up the phone lines, closing the roads. Gradually they pin their victims down in a small area, driving them up to the roofs or onto the huge rocks. The worms can't see — which is their fatal flaw — but they hear everything, nailing their prey from the ground vibrations. In this isolated, paralyzingly sunny landscape, they're the ultimate burrowing-from-within terror: the earth sinking back.

This is Western territory, and Wilson and Maddock infuse "Tremors" with a comic-Western sensibility. The characters are a bit reminiscent of the old "Andy Griffith Show." The heroes are bumbling handymen named Valentine and Earl (Kevin Bacon and Fred Ward) and they keep playing kid games and teasing each other. How they keep busy at all in a town with barely a dozen people is an unsolved mystery.

The heroine is a city girl who seems to exist as a feminist refutation of Valentine's bosomy playboy-blondie fantasies: Finn Carter as discomfubulated but plucky seismic

scientist Rhonda LeBeck. The action is big and garish and the narrative pattern — the isolated community under siege by out-of-scale monsters — goes all the way back to '50s horror movies like "Attack of the Crab Monsters" or "Tarantula."

Most recent movies that try to revive the spirit of those postwar-nightmare pictures fail because they can't recapture the right kind of innocence. They get too knowing or over-scaled, or they let the gore-masters take over. But "Tremors"

suggests the early '60s as well. Like Hitchcock in "The Birds," the film makers make their beleaguered community a cross-section of the obsessive, over-fortified survivalists (Michael Gross and C&W star Reba McEntire), the rustic store owner (Victor Wong), a cute Spielbergian mother and child and an obnoxious teen-ager who keeps crying wolf.

There's even a moment if we all pull together, we can survive any catastrophe. This is a pop-populist horror movie. It isn't that the ten-

sions that pull people apart, but the bogymen that drive them together. At the end, even the survivalists put the community's interests first, leaving their bomb shelter and joining a mass action.

Maddock and Wilson, who wrote the "Short Circuit" movies, are keyed in to small-town rhythms and sensibilities and, though they are imitating hack writers here, at least they are. They are also well-served by the cast in general and by Underwood, who keeps everything loud, fast and shiny. There's even a genuine battle of wits going on between the humans and the worms. If the humans mostly make dopey decisions and the worms show uncommon cunning and resistance, they're still more interesting opponents than the slaughtered lambs and nightmares from hell in most other horror movies.

"Tremors" (rated PG-13) probably isn't for aesthetes or sophisticates, even slumming ones — though they may enjoy it, too. In this cheerful, unsadistic monster film, there's nothing oozy-sick or over-gory. Though the worms, or "graboids" are a fairly repulsive creation, they aren't the slimy ceceli-beebs popular since "Alien." It's a zippy melodrama for small-town America and small-towners at heart: well-executed kitsch for audiences that will still be amused at the notion that the bugs are getting so big, they'll drag us all down.

**INTERNAL AFFAIRS (R)**, Two cops on opposite sides of the law — one a corrupt opportunist, one his investigator — get tangled up in another of those doppleganger-melodramas where pursued and pursuer become one. Richard Gere as the sexy bad cop, and Andy Garcia as the his gloowering nemesis are magnetic actors, but the story, weirdly chopped up, simply floats away from them, and director Mike Figgis ("Stomach Monday") doesn't give it enough swanky style to disguise the emptiness.

**THE LITTLE MERMAID (G)**, Directed and written by John Musker and Ron Clements, with a yeamer team of animators, designers and craftspeople, this impudent, grandiose, multilevel crowd-pleaser shares with the classic Disney animated features of the '30s and '40s a sense of fever-reaching, of grabbing

every snazzy effect possible within old-line narrative forms. Ariel, the saucy heroine, is a sexy honey-bunch not much like the sad noble sea-maid in Hans Christian Andersen's original story. But there is a primal power that most recent Disney cartoons lack. ## Ray Charles to perform in Sun Valley

**SUN VALLEY** — Musical legend Ray Charles will sing in Sun Valley's Lighthouse Room on Saturday, but both shows have sold out.

## Photography innovation earns Oscar

**BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP)** — The inventor of a vibration-free camera shared the top engineering Oscar in scientific and technical awards announced Tuesday by the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.  
 The Wescam Camera System, invented by John Leavitt and developed by Isteec Inc., allows cameras to operate on moving vehicles without the shaking or jitter being transmitted from the vehicle to the camera.  
 The camera system earned an Academy plaque, as did the makers of a new sound-dubbing machine, a high-speed camera, a programmable camera support system and a mobile camera platform.

# CBS producer brings feelings of fans into coverage of championship game

"I'm a fan and my decisions in the truck are those of a fan," says Bob Stenner, the producer of CBS's Super Bowl XXIV game coverage on Sunday, Jan. 28. Along with director Sandy Grossman, Stenner will determine what viewers see and hear during the game. "We try to entertain viewers, give insights into the game and the personalities that play the game, and teach people to understand the game," he says.

During the game, Stenner and Grossman communicate with announcers. Pat Summerall and John Madden through headsets, but they keep their comments to a minimum. "Our goal is to make the viewer feel that Pat and John are just two guys talking about football in their living rooms," says Stenner.

According to Stenner, the key to a successful broadcast is "keeping things on an even keel," especially in the Super Bowl when everyone feels extra pressure. "Football coaches

usually say, 'We will do what got us here,'" says Stenner, "and for us it is the same thing. A few years back, each network tried to outdo the Super Bowl coverage of the year before, but then you end up with more equipment than you can handle."

Stenner and Grossman will be assisted by the usual complement in the truck. A switcher handles five tape machines and a clicker machine. A set-up person and an audio person handle any technical problems, and assistants communicate with people on the sidelines and in the broadcast booth. Throughout the season, Stenner and Grossman have worked with a core group of five cameramen. All assignments are worked out according to the game situation. "For example," Stenner explains, "if Sandy says, 'Goal line,' each cameraman knows exactly what his responsibilities are in that situation." These assignments are consistent all season, so cameramen will react without having to stop and think about where to point the camera.

"For the Super Bowl," Stenner says, "everything gets magnified. The teams are in town for eight days, and all week crews will be talking to players and gathering information that we normally would just do on Saturday." This broadcast preparation is similar in nature to what is done during the season, though. In meetings with the coaches and players, the CBS production team will be apprised of special plans and crucial matchups. Acting on this information, Stenner will determine the coverage. For example, he might choose to examine a key matchup on the line. Then, at some point in the game, an isolated camera will focus on this matchup — perhaps for a series of plays.

Commercial breaks offer quick moments for evaluation and review. Along with Summerall and Madden, Stenner determines what to focus on when the broadcast resumes. He reviews what has been covered so far and compares that with the originally planned coverage.

If he and his crew clearly present what the participants later say were the key matchups and important plays, calls, and turning points, Stenner will consider the broadcast a success. Football does have one advantage: "At least there will be a game," Stenner says. "When I produce the Daytona 500, we sometimes have a rain delay and several unplanned hours to fill. Now that is really difficult."

## Some cable viewers outraged over 'syndex'

WASHINGTON — The public will forgive Washington for wars or taxes, but when the government comes between Americans and their favorite TV programs — look out!

A firestorm of outrage is igniting parts of the country over new Federal Communications Commission rules called "syndicated exclusivity," or "syndex," which force cable television companies to drop some programs if they're also broadcast by local TV stations.

Complained one outraged viewer in a letter to the FCC, "Programming in general has diminished in quality to the point where, for the first time in our

lives we are tuning the television off and reading instead of wasting our time."

So far, response to the complaints is fragmented. A staffer for a House telecommunications subcommittee said he'd heard nothing, even as fierce resistance rises up in small cities and rural areas from Georgia to California.

A protest by thousands of cable subscribers in Kalispell, Mont., peaked last week with the arrest of Mark Leim, 30, on charges of felony intimidation for allegedly suggesting that somebody might blow up the transmitter of local station KCFW. He was being held Friday on a \$20,000 bond.

Leim was upset because the

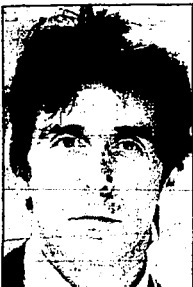

# Hayes returns to old role on 'Days'

Julie's coming home Tuesday, January 30. "Days Of Our Lives" begins the '90s with Susan Seaforth Hayes returning to Salem as widow Julie Williams, wealthy and powerful, ready to flash those huge eyes and toss her weight around.

It's been six years since Susan got the gate on "Days" after a 20-year run. The accent was on youth, and, refusing to sit quietly on the sidelines, Julie went to work for Bill Bell across town in CBS' high-rated "The Young and the Restless."

Bill Bell first hired Susan for "Days" when he hired Susan's mother, writer Elizabeth Harrower. Then Bell hired Bill Hayes, who became Susan's husband Doug Williams in a splashy '76 wedding two years after the two actors tied the knot in real life.

No wonder Susan likes Bill Bell. Still, the soap tycoon is difficult to read, and after four years Bell lacked a story for Susan on "Restless" and let her go. Was Susan through? Not if you check her bloodlines—Mother—Elizabeth Harrower, who became head "Days" writer for a spell, is still churning out copy on "Generations." At 72, Elizabeth is the one of oldest steadily employed writers in town.

So it's natural for daughter Susan to come back strong, giving old timers a familiar face to enjoy again on "Days." Youth isn't the only way to go in the soap world. We need the Jeanne Coopers, the Frances Reids and the Susan Seaforth Hayes for balance.

The message is clear. You don't kick the role models out. They're not washed up because their characters offer stability, which we apparently need: Before Susan became Julie Williams on "Days," the literate lady considered teaching history. The soap world won out.

History still lurks in the background, and so does the urge to farm. "I know nothing about farming," Susan declares. "But I've always wanted to do it." A prim history teacher rumbling along on a tractor? It hardly fits the dramatic,

flamboyant Seaforth personality, a lady who can't walk down any street in the country without being recognized.

Fans in the heartland, take heart, Julie's back, ready to upstage the youngsters. Husband Bill Hayes may be next if Julie's fans respond. But, so far, Bill hasn't been asked. But then again, Julie IS coming back as a widow.

### CHANNEL CHATTER

Richard Roundtree, who has been "Shaft" on the big screen and one of principals who made TV history in "Roots," recently joined the cast of NBC's new soap

"Generations." Roundtree plays Daniel Reubens, a doctor who has been in seclusion for 15 years, after being blamed for a murder he didn't commit. Roundtree should prove a very welcome addition to the fine cast.

One of the best villains on "All My Children" or any other soap, for that matter, was Billy Clyde Tuggle, as portrayed by Matthew Cowles. # NBC comedy 'Grand' debuts in top 10, pushes 'Dear John' into slump

LOS ANGELES (AP) — NBC's new comedy "Grand" premiered in fifth place and "Dear John," the show it displaced on Thursday night, plummeted in the Nielsen television-ratings for the week ended Jan. 21.

"Dear John," in ninth place the week before, was in a three-way tie for 33rd place in its new Wednesday night time slot. Its rating fell from 19.8 to 14.1.

"Grand" got a 21.4 rating for its debut. And even with its rating dip, "Dear John" improved NBC's Wednesday night slot, finishing two ratings points ahead of the show it replaced, "My Two Dads," which moved to Sunday.

Fox Broadcasting's "The Simpsons" and "Married ... With Children" came in ahead of "Dear John," which had been regularly in the Top 10.

"Cheers" from NBC was first and NBC's "The Cosby Show" and ABC's "Roseanne" tied for second.

NBC was first in the A.C. Nielsen Co. survey with an average of 14.6 ratings points, while ABC claimed second place with 13.5 and CBS dropped to third with 12.8. A ratings point represents the

"As a policy we can't discuss specific numbers, but I can acknowledge that we have received many calls during the telecast and this morning protesting the fact that the program contained offensive language," network spokeswoman Janice Gretmeyer said this morning from New York.

Guns N' Roses, with a reputation for raunchy behavior, won two awards during the Monday night ceremony at the Shrine Auditorium, one as favorite heavy metal group and the other for best heavy metal album, "Appetite for Destruction."

The band was cut off in mid-sentence while accepting its first award when guitarist Slash used a profanity.

Slash and fellow band member Duff "Rozzo" McKagan stumbled to stage and draped themselves over the speaker's stand to accept the second award. They were quickly

cut off when they began using profanities again.

The three-hour telecast was shown live in the East. The offensive language was edited out of the tape-delayed West Coast version.

"We regret that last night's telecast of American Music Awards contained some offensive language," Gretmeyer said. "This has not happened before in the 17 years that the awards show has been on the air and we will take precautionary measures to see that it will not happen in future telecasts."

ABC may use a seven-second delay in the future, she said.

A receptionist at Geffen Records, the band's label, said telephone lines were jammed at the company's Sunset Boulevard offices and no one was available for comment.

"Live programming leads to spontaneous occurrences and unfortunately last night's was regrettable," Dick Clark, producer of the show, said in a statement. "We will take all steps possible toward preventing a recurrence."

Paul Sheffrin, a publicist for Clark, said Clark's office had received numerous calls complaining about the language, but he couldn't

determine how many. Five months ago, dick clark productions was victimized by comedian Andrew Dice Clay when he used a profanity on the MTV Video Music Awards. The Sept. 6 show was also televised live nationwide on cable's music channel. MTV officials announced afterward that the comic was banned for life from the cable channel.

local cable company had to drop transmission of the "Alf" comedy show, a favorite of their 9-year-old son, explained Leim's wife, Patty. "It's really stupid," she said.

The new FCC rules went into effect Jan. 1, after more than two years of hearings and an unsuccessful court challenge.

Pushed by the former chairman of the FCC, a Reagan appointee named Dennis Patrick, the rules were designed to correct what he believed was a competitive mismatch between local TV stations and cable companies.

Broadcasters and the movie industry supported the change, even though they knew there were going to be some short-term

dissatisfaction," said Ben Ivins of the National Association of Broadcasters.

But cable companies fought it all the way. "We said this was going to have an enormous impact on the subscriber that they weren't taking into account," said Seth Davidson of the National Cable Television Association.

The new rules prohibit cable companies from carrying certain syndicated programs, such as popular re-runs like "Cheers," if the local on-air broadcaster has obtained the local rights to the program.

Other related new rules prohibit the cable company from carrying network programming from a distant station, if the local TV station also carries that network programming.

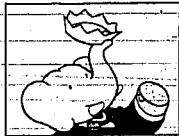
