## Troop cut plan boasts 'flexibility'

WASHINGTON — Defense Secretary Richard B. Cheney pledged to Congress Thursday that the Bush administration, mindful of the possibility of German reunification and total Soviet military withdrawal from Eastern Europe, would remain "flexible" on reducing U.S. troops in Europe beyond the latest proposal by President Bush.

His assurance appeared to contradict private administration assurances to key U.S. allies that no further troop cuts will be sought in the foreseeable future, and a statement by a senior administration official at the White House Wednesday that Bush's latest proposal leaves "a residual (force) that we think we can stick to."

International sensitivity to the issue of U.S. troop strength in Europe was reflected Thursday in competing statements emanating from world capitals, ranging from a British assertion that there can be no more cuts to a Soviet assertion that Bush's new offer is "the ceiling, not the floor."

In his first appearance on Capitol Hill to unveil the 1991 defense budget, Cheney, with Gen. Colin L. Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, initially described President Bush's offer to reduce U.S. forces to 225,000 as the minimum-credible U.S. presence in Europe to carry out NATO's current defensive mission.

Powell, in particular, said he would stand like a stone wall to avoid reductions beyond the withdrawal of 80,000 additional troops Bush offered in his State of the Union address Wednesday.

But Senate Armed Services Committee Chairman Sam Nunn, D-Ga., and Sen. Albert Gore Jr., D-Tenn., warned Cheney and Powell that any assertion of "minimum" forces needed in Europe could be rendered quickly irrelevant by the fast-paced events.

"If all Soviet troops are pulled out of Eastern Europe, East and West Germany are unified, then how long are you going to keep 200,000 American troops in Europe?" Gore asked.

Gore, borrowing Cheney's phrase that it is "important to put a floor under our presence in Europe," asserted that "these levels are going to become a ceiling" as the United States and Soviet Union seek to bypass formal arms-control negotiations.

## Lotto takes off fast all over Idaho

EDEN — Snow-covered roads and bad weather Thursday morning may have hampered local Super Lotto ticket sales on the new game's first day, but the new multi-million-dollar lottery took off running in most parts of the state.

"Considering the early hour we began, I'd say we're off to a great start," Wally Hedrick, Idaho Lottery director, said.

"Overall, I think the entire state showed very strong sales," Kathy Showers, an Idaho Lottery spokeswoman, said.

Locally, however, the expected crowds never showed up.

"It's been quieter than we thought it would be," said Faye Featherly, a

manager at Eden's Travelers Oasis Truck Stop. "With the bad weather not a lot of people were out and about."

Some local retailers interviewed Thursday agreed with Featherly's theory, while others blamed the restrictive hours for poor sales. Unlike the scratch-off games, Super Lotto tickets are sold only from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Still others said perhaps word about the new game didn't get out to all Idahoans, or perhaps people will wait until after Saturday's first drawing to buy tickets.

Statewide, as of 5 p.m., with three hours of selling time left, about 41,000 one-dollar tickets had been bought. Hedrick had predicted sales would reach between \$40,000 and \$50,000. Showers said, so things went well Thursday.

Would-be millionaires ate up 162

tickets in the first minute of sales and 1,000 tickets in the first five minutes, Showers said.

Ticket buyers interviewed Friday said they were excited about the new game because of its multi-million-dollar jackpot. But they said they would continue to buy the instant-winner scratch-off tickets as well.

"I'll probably buy them both as long as the money holds out," said Dick Hamilton of Filer, who plunked down \$5 for Super Lotto tickets and held a handful of instant-winner tickets as well. "As long as it goes for education, it's worth it."

At the Travelers Oasis truck stop, the main early rush was in-house. Odds workers crowded to the counter to buy their tickets, but other ticket buyers were scarce.

"It's our employees that are going

nuts," cashier Maxine Winterholler said.

At the Kimberly Road 7-Eleven Store in Twin Falls, only four people showed up for the Super Lotto kickoff, Owner Linda Stewart said. But she said she thought sales would pick up in the afternoon, and by 12:30 p.m. customers had purchased 88 tickets.

And at 6 p.m., after the usual after-work crowd had stopped at Burley's Overland-Road 7-Eleven, one of Idaho's top five ticket vendors, sales there had risen to 321.

While Manager Carl Wiberg said he had a few lines of ticket buyers during the day, the crowd was below what he had expected.

But like other retailers, Wiberg said he has high hopes for the new game.

"I think the state of Idaho has a winner on its hands," he said.

Following nearly a month of speculation

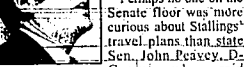

about whether the Democratic congressman would jump from the House to run for Sen. James McClure's U.S. Senate, Stallings' agenda settled some bets.

The congressman will make four stops today — including an 11:15 a.m. appearance at Twin Falls Canyon Springs Inn. His travel plans are limited to Idaho's 2nd congressional district.

Stallings press secretary Melodic Rydalch said it's a "safe assumption" that her boss will announce that he has decided to run for re-election to the House.

Perhaps no one on the Senate floor was more curious about Stallings' travel plans than State Sen. John Peavey, D-1977, who said Thursday that now he's

With 17 years in the Legislature, Peavey said he'd like to move to a congressional office.

It's in his blood, he said. Peavey's grandfather and stepfather served in the U.S. Senate, and Peavey said some of his most pleasant childhood memories include roaming the nation's Capitol.

Since beginning his own political career, Peavey has made himself noticeable in the Legislature. He organized a group of 17 Idahoans to challenge Idaho Power on its water rights protection policies at Swan Falls Dam, south of Boise.

More recently, Peavey has been an outspoken opponent to bringing the now-defunct Special Isotope Separation Laboratory to Idaho's National Engineering Laboratory.

He has said cleanup should be a priority at the INEL site.

Peavey said there are some within the state party who are discouraging him from jumping into the U.S. Senate race. As a minority leader, Peavey would be a loss to the Senate Democrats, where the Republicans hold a slim 22-19 majority.

Former Democratic Gov. John Evans has

## 'Bonnie, Clyde' robbery suspects in custody

BOSTON — A man and woman sought by police in 33 robberies in five states were arrested Thursday after allegedly slashing a store owner in Orange, Conn., who resisted their demands for money.

Ellen Marks, 50, and Edward Arango, 46, were apprehended Thursday morning by Milford, Conn., police, minutes after allegedly had struggled with and cut the owner of the Men's Discount Shoe Outlet during an attempted robbery.

It was the first time that anyone had been hurt in the series of robberies in which Marks and Arango, whom some have dubbed "Bonnie and Clyde," are suspects.

Marks and Arango spent Thursday night in the Orange police lockup, awaiting arraignment Friday.

Police said Fenmore-Pucklin, 64, of New Haven suffered severe cuts to both hands when he fought off Arango, who they said had put a knife to the store owner's throat. Pucklin was treated at Yale-New Haven Hospital.

Officer Raymond Curley of the Orange police said that after the couple fled without taking any money, Pucklin sought help at the shop next door and police were called.

About 20 minutes after Orange police put out a bulletin, Milford Officer Robert Moran saw a car matching the suspects' vehicle from the Orange assault.

## Initial claims on budget surplus offered in Senate

BOISE — Senate budget writers have introduced the first two bills laying claim to a piece of the state's record cash surplus.

Meanwhile, Health and Welfare Director Rich Donovon steeled them on Thursday against prospects that the programs he oversees will demand ever-increasing general tax support in the future.

Despite an effort by Republican Herb Carlson

of Eagle to derail them, the Senate Finance Committee introduced bills that would earmark \$10 million from the surplus to the counties for

solid waste management and \$6 million for construction of regional juvenile detention centers.

Carlson said there were too many questions still to be answered about overall handling of the \$126.3 million surplus to begin considering bills claiming pieces of it, and some members worried that the action would encourage other lawmakers to offer their own options for disposing of the one-time cash windfall.

Before the session began, budget analysts esti-

## Scientists want stronger efforts to avert warming

WASHINGTON — More than 700 scientists, including 49 Nobel laureates, on Thursday called on President Bush to exert stronger leadership in dealing with global warming.

Only by taking action now can we insure that future generations will not be put at risk," said the appeal sent to the president by the scientists, who represent a broad range of disciplines from medicine to physics. The group included more

than a third of all the members of the National Academy of Sciences.

The expression of concern from the scientists came days before the opening of a new round of meetings of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, which is examining global warming and effective responses to it.

The Washington proceedings, which are expected to be attended by representatives from more than 60 countries, are part of an effort to draw up an international agreement, perhaps next

year, on what to do about global warming.

Many environmentalists have chided Bush for failing to endorse specific reductions in so-called "greenhouse" gases, especially carbon dioxide. Some European countries have argued that industrial nations should commit themselves to at least a 20 percent reduction in carbon dioxide emissions by the year 2000.

But the Bush administration has argued against such a commitment because no determination has been made on the economic impact of such curbs.

# U.S. seeks anti-missile control bomb

The Washington Post reports on a new missile control bomb developed by the U.S. Energy Department's nuclear weapons laboratories. The bomb is designed to destroy incoming Soviet missiles at a distance of 100 miles.

**Hypervelocity Glide Vehicle.** would enable U.S. satellite or manned U.S. airplane flying over Soviet Territory to use sensor control devices to maneuver the plunging warhead from an American international ballistic missile so it could engage a Soviet target 10 times that of current anti-ballistic missile. The department also wants \$1.1 billion next year, a 10 percent increase from this year, to continue production of eight types of nuclear warheads.

## Baker approves 35-nation summit

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Secretary of State James A. Baker III gave qualified approval Thursday to a proposal by Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev for a 35-nation summit meeting next year to sign a treaty to reduce troops and tanks in Europe.

Baker told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that such a meeting could also provide a framework to deal with the question of German reunification.

But he said the Soviets first must agree to the principle that free elections are a human right.

## Bank vault yields ex-official report

**LONDON (AP)** — The coded telegram from Mikhail Gorbachev regarding the assassination of Russian Gen. Vladimir S. Baklanov in 1918 has been found in a bank vault among papers left by the original investigator of the crime.

The papers were hidden in the vault for nearly 70 years, a state paper official said Wednesday on April 5. Gorbachev said Thursday. The document would not disclose the owner's identity or say where the papers were concealed.

"The owner knew that his uncle called them his 'dynamic papers' but was bringing them to us, we had no idea of what they were," said John Stuart, Gorbachev's confidant on Russian art and history.

## Savage says assault charge dropped

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Rep. Gus Savage, D-Ill., said Thursday the House ethics committee had dismissed a complaint that he sexually assaulted a Peace Corps worker in Zaire. A source close to the investigation said that he had finished his preliminary investigation of the subject, but did not immediately issue his findings and refused to reveal its conclusions.

The House source, speaking only on condition of anonymity, said of the Peace Corps worker, "She was unwilling to testify. She did not want to pursue it."

## Mexico won't charge ex-official

**MEXICO CITY (AP)** — Mexico said Thursday it will not charge the Mexican citizens, including two former top-level Mexican bureaucrats, who were indicted in Los Angeles in the torture-slaying of U.S.-drug agent Enrique Camarena Salazar.

"We are not going to file any complaints at this time," a spokeswoman for the Attorney General's office told The Associated Press. "They were members of the past administration."

Miguel Barra Herrera, former chief of Federal Judicial Police, and Miguel Aldana Ibarra, who headed the Mexican branch of the international police agency Interpol, live in Mexico City and served in the administration of former President Miguel de la Madrid, who left office 13 months ago.

## Darman asks AARP to oppose cut

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Budget director Richard G. Darman called on the nation's largest senior citizens organization Thursday to help fight a proposed Social Security tax cut that he said would inescapably threaten benefits.

"I would urge you to consider ever so seriously what really is at stake here," Darman told leaders of the American Association of Retired Persons. "This is not something to play around with."

The administration is fighting a proposal by Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., that would roll

negotiations to reduce their forces unilaterally in response to revolutionary changes in Eastern Europe.

Evans added to this warning, saying the U.S. Army could become the only military force on the Continent with no Soviet threat and "no allies" as the European governments rush to disarm.

Cheney said the Bush administration would certainly continue to look for future reductions in Europe.

In other developments during the four-hour hearing Cheney acknowledged that he has yet to find \$85 billion in cuts to meet his goal of providing Congress with defense budgets that decline at 2 percent a year from now until 1994. He also said he has had "difficultly explaining" to the Navy that it does not need all 14 of the aircraft carrier battle groups now in the fleet.

The administration was heavily criticized by conservative and liberal members of the Armed Services Committee for seeking \$50-million in research and development funds for new short-range nuclear missiles, and nuclear artillery shells to be deployed in Central Europe. West

German officials have said they will not accept the new missile, which is planned to replace the aging Lance.

"Several senators attacked Bush administration plans to increase funding by nearly \$1 billion for research on space-based strategic defense, the Strategic Defense Initiative, Cheney said "we do need to ramp-up" funding for the "Star Wars" program so Bush can make a decision in his first term on whether to deploy the first space-based antimissile system. Cheney said he believed "deeply" in the strategic defense program.

# Critics see gap between budget goals, available greenbacks

WASHINGTON (AP) — Education leaders and Democrats in Congress Thursday decried a yawning gap between President Bush's soaring goals for America's schools and the 2 percent increase in his education budget.

"They asked where the money would come from to meet Bush's aims of reducing the dropout rate, desegregating and making U.S. children world-class in math and science by the turn of the century."

"There is a yawning gap between the rhetoric of President Bush's education speeches and the funding levels he offers in his budget," said Albert Shanker, president of the

American Federation of Teachers. Rep. Pat Williams, Mont., said that parents and students "need to have explained to them: How is a 2 percent increase for the Pentagon a major cut while a 2 percent increase in education is a major increase?"

Secretary Laura F. Cavazos defended Bush's approach, insisting, "It's not a matter of dollars."

another billion and another billion. That is not going to solve the education deficit," Cavazos told reporters at a White House briefing on Bush's six education goals.

"The way math and science are taught must be radically changed, he said. Just putting more dollars into the current system is not going to make good mathematicians of students," said Cavazos, adding, "They probably won't be able to do it."

Bush unveiled the goals four months after agreeing at the education summit with the 50 governors in Charlottesville, Va., to produce the first performance goals

for the nation's schools.

The National Governors' Association will not vote on the end product until their winter meeting at the end of this month, but Cavazos said the goals have the backing of a governors' task force on education.

Those goals were: Terry Branstad of Iowa, Bill Clinton of Arkansas, Carroll Campbell of South Carolina, and Brent Gardner of Washington.

He attended the State of the Union and Bush saluted them for their role. "We still have a lot of work to do" in drafting detailed objectives on how to reach Bush's lofty goals, said Cavazos, but he added that he expects no major changes.

Despite his insistence that more money is not needed to meet Bush's goals, Cavazos stressed that the Education Department's proposed \$24.6 billion budget for fiscal 1991 "is the largest education budget that this nation has had," and includes "very healthy 6.2 percent increase in discretionary programs."

Overall, Bush sought \$500 million or 2 percent more for the Education Department. He also requested an extra \$500 million for Head Start, which is in the Department of Health and Human Services budget.

Asked why the education budget would rise at a slower pace than the

3 percent rise in overall federal spending, Cavazos said, "his department is paying lower interest rates on student loans than it once was. He denied that aid to college students was being reduced."

"The way that you really become the education president is to change the educational system so it's a positive system. It's an effective system," said Cavazos, who said federal spending on schools surged 26 percent after inflation in the 1980s.

Bush, in his address, said, "Real improvement in our schools is not simply a matter of spending more. It is a matter of asking more."

# Iran Contra figure Hakim gives up \$7.3 million, gets probation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Iran-Contra middleman Albert Hakim was placed on two years probation and fined \$5,000 Thursday after giving up his claim on what prosecutors said was \$7.3 million in arms-deal profits now frozen in Swiss accounts.

The Iranian-born businessman, who pleaded guilty Nov. 21 to illegally helping supplement Oliver North's government income with a \$13,800 home security system, bitterly attacked the government after his sentencing.

"I have been abused by two presidents," Hakim said after his appearance before U.S. District Court Judge Gerhard Gesell. "I'm talking about President Reagan and President Walsh," he said, the latter referring to independent counsel Lawrence Walsh, who directs the Iran-Contra investigation.

"The American public has had enough of this soap opera," Hakim said.

Hakim, who could have been sentenced to up to a year in jail and a \$100,000 fine on the misdemeanor charge, is the sixth person sentenced in the Iran-Contra affair. No one has been sent to jail.

Richard Janis, Hakim's lawyer,

said his case was "a monument to the hypocrisy of a system that permits individuals to face criminal charges after they, in good faith carried out the requests of their government."

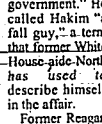
Hakim, a "fall guy," a term that former White House aide North has used to describe himself in the affair.

Former Reagan National Security Advisor John M. Poindexter still faces trial, on Feb. 20.

Shortly after the Iran-Contra affair erupted in November 1986, Swiss authorities placed a hold on \$7.3 million contained in accounts of the Enterprise, a financial network of offshore companies Hakim helped set up for use in the affair. With interest that amount has grown to \$9 million.

Hakim and two Swiss-based lawyers working with him are claiming part of the money, said Mary Belcher, a spokeswoman for the Iran-Contra prosecutor's office.

He agreed to let the U.S. government have \$7.3 million, while

he will split \$1.7 million with the two lawyers, Willard Zucker and Philippe Neyroud. The Justice Department approved the deal Monday. Zucker says he is owed \$800,000 while Neyroud says he is owed \$120,000, said Belcher.

The U.S. government now will try to persuade the Swiss to unfreeze the accounts.

Belcher said \$7.3 million was all that could be identified as Iran arms sale proceeds and that "we are satisfied with the agreement."

Despite the fact that Hakim and his lawyers stand to collect the remainder.

Gesell also placed one of Hakim's companies, Panamanian-based Lake Resources Inc., on probation and ordered that the corporation be dissolved. Lake Resources had pledged \$10 million to the U.S. government. Property in the division of Iran arms-sale profits to the Nicaraguan Contra rebels.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Dick Thornburgh asked a special court Thursday to appoint an independent counsel to investigate allegations of criminal wrongdoing by former Housing Secretary Samuel R. Pierce Jr.

In a letter to the House Judiciary Committee, Thornburgh said the special counsel would investigate allegations that Pierce and other HUD officials "may have committed the crime of conspiracy to defraud the United States or any other crime" in administering the "moderate rehabilitation" federal housing program between 1984 and 1988.

But the attorney general said he found no reasonable grounds to believe that further investigation is warranted of allegations that Pierce

lied during congressional testimony.

The attorney general's move came after the Justice Department's criminal division conducted a preliminary inquiry into allegations that Pierce lied to a House subcommittee when questioned during the awarding of grants by the Department of Housing and Urban Development during his tenure.

# Bush calls Salvadoran leader 'shining example' Press allowed at drug summit

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush on Thursday called El Salvador's President Alfredo Cristiani "a shining example to all of us" of democratic commitment, as the administration proposed a \$62 million boost in aid to the Central American nation.

The State Department said the administration is proposing \$284 million for El Salvador in economic aid for fiscal 1991 compared with \$229 million for the current year. Military aid would rise slightly to \$91.4 million from the current \$84.6 million, if Congress approves.

There is concern within the administration that congressional skepticism about human rights abuses in El Salvador, and in particular the slaying of six Jesuit priests last fall, might prompt a scaling back of El Salvador's aid package. Officials hope the arrest of eight military men in the case by Cristiani's government will diffuse the criticism.

Bush sought to make clear

that he is squarely behind Cristiani, praising him at a photo-op for his diligence in the Jesuits' case.

Cristiani said his talks at the White House and on Capitol Hill did not focus on the aid question as much as on efforts to restart peace talks with the leftist guerrillas battling his government.

However, he told reporters, any cut in aid by Congress would send negative signals to the rebels that would impede efforts for peace talks.

On Capitol Hill, Cristiani met with key House Democrats including Speaker Thomas Foley, D-Wash.; Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., and Rep. Joseph Moakley, D-Mass., head of a House task force on El Salvador.

# Attorney says Contras executed U.S. volunteer

MIAMI (AP) — An attorney charged Thursday that new information points to Contra military leader Enrique Bermudez as the official who ordered the killing of a U.S. volunteer building a rural dam in Nicaragua.

Benjamin Linder, 27, of Portland, Ore., died April 28, 1987, when the U.S.-backed rebels attacked the hydroelectric dam in northern Nicaragua. Linder's family contends the engineer was abducted, tortured and executed, but the Contras said he was armed and died in a firefight between rebel and Sandinista government troops.

The family has filed a \$50 million wrongful-death suit in federal court in Miami against the Contras and their leadership, including Bermudez. The Contra leader was last heard from in Miami.

"This was not just an attack on a

dam ... this was an attack to assassinate a man's family attorney," Michael Ratner told U.S. District Judge Stanley Marcus. "Linder was taken alive and executed subsequently, and Enrique Bermudez gave the order."

The charge was based on a deposition from Ermin Cardenas, former head of operations for the Contras, and later given amnesty in Nicaragua. Cardenas, who died shortly after giving his statement, said Bermudez had ordered Linder killed to sabotage the dam project, and congratulated the patrol's commander afterward. Bermudez continues to head the rebel military.

Thursday's hearing came on the family's request to amend the suit with the Cardenas deposition, thus making it more specific, instead of basing it on general claims that the Contras routinely conducted such

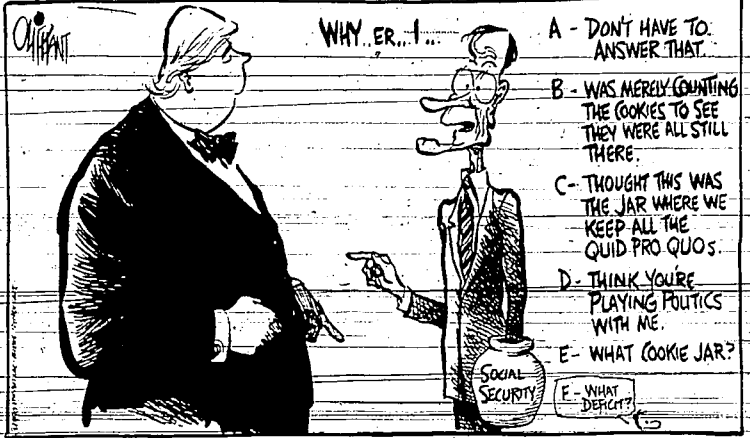

**Grassburning not a high time**

Because most Magic Valley residents probably haven't experienced a grass burning season, I felt they might like to know what it is like.

Here in Coeur d'Alene, the burning season can run from Aug. 15 to Sept. 15 (or longer), depending on the weather. Late summer days here are beautiful and pristine, much like the ones in Twin Falls. However, when field burning begins, a beautiful blue fall morning usually becomes a typical day in Los Angeles by lunch time. The air turns smoky brown, visibility is decreased substantially, people with healthy lungs cough and those with respiratory illnesses

suffer. Tourists cancel their reservations and leave.

The EPA monitors the burning and issues permits when the conditions - such as prevailing wind which carries the smoke away - are right. The problem is the wind changes or dies and the smoke doesn't blow away, it hangs. Wet weather can also interfere with burning. If there has been a string of rainy days during the burning season, it's almost certain the best spots on one will be filled with smoke.

Don Jacklin, President of Jacklin Seed, has said that field burning puts less particulate matter into the air per year than a tilled field does. While this is certainly a true statement, it misses the mark. Field burning concentrates the smoke in a relatively short time period where wind-blown soil erosion is a gradual, yearly release of material. By comparison, field burning is a much stronger, more irritating dose of air pollution. The news is that Mr. Jacklin has hired a public relations expert to help promote his cause. As Jacklin's

representatives meet with local groups, the people of the Magic Valley might be one thing in mind. When it comes to blowing smoke, these people are the best.

The thick smoke lifts in waves only to hang or settle back to earth if the wind dies. If the wind doesn't die, then the smoke drifts wherever the wind takes it. Either way, you breathe smoke, eat smoke, smell of smoke and swim through air so thick you can't see your neighbor's house at times. If you have any respiratory problems, you are warned to stay inside, but even that doesn't help.

The temperatures during August are in the 80 to 100-plus range during the day, so unless you have an air conditioner, you trade the smoke for the unbearable heat.

You can expect those with respiratory diseases to experience a lot of difficulties. Some people suffering from allergies also experience difficulties; even people with no respiratory diseases or allergies complain of burning eyes, nose and lungs.

During this time, you can forget about doing anything outside. No golf, baseball, tennis, hikes, bike rides, walking, etc. All businesses related to outdoor activities really lose money during this time, which really causes its share of problems. Then - on top of all this - if the fields aren't done by the end of August, they will burn on into September. Why is it that other states that have even more crops than this one don't like to burn their fields? Why can't a better way be found to kill the dandelions and vermin in the fields? The only answers we seem to get over here are either it's just the way it's always been done or we're working on it. Meanwhile, we live with the smoke and all the adverse situations it causes.

# Bush's troop withdrawal proposal

Western Europe supports the idea, but stresses it wants U.S. presence, too

Pullout would cause major changes in West German economy, other areas

LONDON (AP) — Western European leaders on Thursday supported the U.S. proposal for significant new troop withdrawals from Europe but, amid hints of anxiety, stressed they want a continued American presence.

Britain said it hoped this was the last reduction planned by Washington.

The Soviet Union welcomed as a sign that "things are changing for the better" the proposal by President Bush to cut troop levels in central Europe to 195,000 for each superpower — below the 275,000 being negotiated at talks in Vienna.

But Soviet Foreign Ministry spokesman Gennady Gerasimov complained the plan did not go far enough, adding: "We must continue to have as our goal no foreign troops on foreign soil."

"It must be the ceiling, not the floor," said Gerasimov. "You can note in his (Bush's) speech he needs American troops in Europe for here to eternity. This is not a good sign."

Some analysts said the Bush plan signaled the beginning of the final withdrawal of American troops from Western Europe — dreaded by many of the U.S. allies in NATO — as well as the departure of all the Soviets.

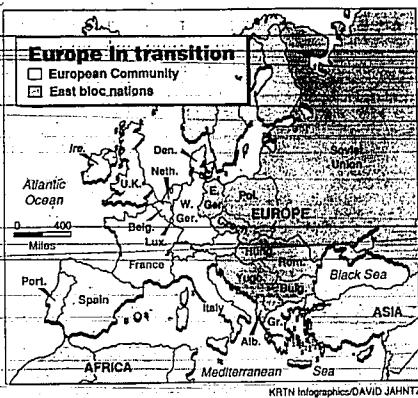
"I personally would be surprised if the Soviets have any plans to pull 195,000 soldiers left in East Germany within the next two to three years," said Francois Heisbourg, director of the London-based Institute of Strategic Studies.

"I think the Soviets will be lucky if there is a symbolic contingent left, a Soviet Guantanamo," he said, referring to the U.S. base in Cuba.

In London, Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher said Britain attached "great importance to President Bush's assurance that the new figure will be a floor and that no more reductions are envisaged."

"This will ensure a continued, strong American presence in Europe," added the statement from her Downing Street office.

Thatcher aides said Bush telephoned her Saturday to discuss the proposal, and "we indicated our support."

The United States has 305,000 troops in central Europe, and the Soviet Union has 565,000. Another 30,000 U.S. troops in Britain and southern Europe are excluded from the Bush proposal.

West Germany, where most of the U.S. troops are deployed, backed the proposal. Defense Minister Gerhard Stoltenberg called it "a balanced combination of disarmament policy and unequivocal recognition of the West's defense readiness and alliance solidarity."

West German enthusiasm for troop pullouts by both sides reflected eagerness for unification with East Germany, where 380,000 of the Soviet troops on foreign soil are stationed.

Two other East bloc nations, Czechoslovakia and Hungary, have demanded that the Soviet forces leave their soil.

Other European NATO allies are concerned about being dominated by a powerful, single German state. The

fears are heightened on a continent that was overrun by Nazi Germany in World War II.

They are also worried about the United States detaching itself from Europe as the Soviet military threat diminishes with the collapse of a string of Communist governments in 1989.

Belgium and the Netherlands followed Mrs. Thatcher's cautious line.

There have to be talks on the withdrawal of troops, and Lippesse, a unilateral initiative," said Belgian Foreign Affairs Minister Mark Eyskens.

FRANKFURT, West Germany (AP) — Drinking beer, paying rent, buying clothes and furnishing their apartments, U.S. soldiers account for about \$2 billion in annual revenues alone in one West German state.

Nationwide, the more than 250,000 GIs, their family members and civilian U.S. military employees spend several times that amount each year.

For the tens of thousands of West Germans whose livelihoods depend on the presence of the U.S. military, President Bush's troop reduction proposal Wednesday signaled a possible major shift in their lives.

While the Yankees aren't going home just yet, the European nation that grew up with U.S. troops is beginning to contemplate an end to a larger part of their sometimes controversial presence.

The occupation troops turned allies are still a daily fact of life, whether it's a fatigue-clad GI riding the S-B subway home from Frankfurt or the young soldier's wife in Bibburg learning German from her landlord.

Cars with the familiar black-and-white, American-style license plates crowd the autobahn highways, while any simple receiver can pick up the military's AFM radio network.

Mad. King Ludwig-Neuschwanstein Castle — faithfully copied in Disneyland — is one of several meccas for soldiers and their families every year.

The U.S. military has also been the target of criticism and even rage, during the anti-missile protests of the 1980s and the low-level training flights that angered civilians.

Farmers and villagers complain about tanks on manure-covered fields and crunching pavement. Deadly collisions occur every year. Saturday night brawls involving GIs are common, especially in large cities such as Frankfurt.

But in the smaller towns, where economies have grown up around the U.S. military bases, meaning those municipalities will have a seven harder time in the event of reduction tens of thousands of troops.

In Rhineland Palatinate state, the U.S. military installations have a

very important economic meaning, says state Interior Ministry spokesman Juergen Dietzen.

He said 21,000 West Germans work at U.S. bases in the southwestern state, which has nostalgic ties with the United States because of the massive emigrations decades ago. In Rhineland Palatinate alone, the number of soldiers is 67,000, while there are 70,000 family members and 8,000 U.S. civilian workers at the bases, Dietzen said.

"They go beer drinking, wine drinking, they go out to dinner, buy coats, purchase furniture, rent

apartments," Dietzen said, recounting the impact on the economy. "They are store customers and order-handlers."

Dietzen estimated total expenditures by the soldiers themselves, family members and U.S. support civilians come to more than \$2 billion.

The U.S. military itself kicks in another \$400,000 to the economy in Rhineland Palatinate, he said.

Nevertheless, state residents are happy to see any reductions to help the process of disarmament during improving East-West relations, he said. "In a country with the high density of troops and weapons in Western Europe, disarmament is a popular priority."

Officials caution that Bush's proposal to bring down the troop superpower strength in Central Europe to 195,000 for each side is just that — a plan waiting to be discussed and accepted by the Soviets. Any withdrawal likely would take years.

Cmdr. John Woodhouse, U.S. military spokesman at the European Command in Stuttgart, cautions that the numbers have not been itemized completely.

Virtually all of the Central European reductions would come from West Germany, which had nearly 255,000 U.S. troops last year, Woodhouse says, because only small units are based in Belgium and the Netherlands. That could lead to the withdrawal of nearly 60,000 U.S. servicemen from West Germany, Woodhouse says, if the reductions occur.

A huge reduction could drastically cut down on the 70,000 West Germans working for the U.S. armed forces. One town already feeling the pinch is Zweibrücken, where the U.S. Air Force Base with 3,500 servicemen recently was targeted for shutdown by 1993 even before Bush's speech.

"The situation is alarming, since we have to find substitute jobs for the West German civilian workers," said Thilo Huble, spokesman for the town located in the far southwestern part of the country.

## Construction growth slowest in 7 years

WASHINGTON (AP) — Construction spending advanced last year at its slowest pace since the 1982 recession, the government said Thursday.

Analysts blamed the weakness on high interest rates, overbuilding and a sluggish economy.

The Commerce Department said residential, non-residential and government construction spending totaled \$414.7 billion, a 1.2 percent increase over 1988 but the smallest gain since a 5.1 percent decline in 1982.

Contributing to the poor showing was a 0.6 percent decline in December spending, which was buffeted by record cold weather over most of the country east of the Rockies.

Spending totaled a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$414.6 billion in December, nearly erasing a 0.7 percent gain in

November. It was the lowest one-month increase since a decline of 1 percent last June.

Analysts said Federal Reserve actions that kept interest rates relatively high through most of the year not only made construction more expensive, but also slowed the economy and thus made sales more difficult.

"Plus, you had a number of good years of construction" leading up to 1989, said David Berson, chief economist for the Federal National Mortgage Association. "Eventually you have all the houses and office buildings that you need. You run out of pent-up demand."

Because of the lessening demand and the state of the economy, Berson said, "1990, at best, will be about what it was in 1989 and could even fall a little bit."

## House Democrats honor Parks for civil rights role

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rosa Parks, whose refusal to move to the back of the bus 35 years ago was a key moment in the civil rights struggle, was honored Thursday by House Democratic leaders, who said she had changed the nation.

"Rosa, let me thank you personally for sitting down so long ago so I could stand here today,"

said Rep. Bill Gray, D-Pa., the House Democratic whip, who credited her with triggering changes that have allowed blacks such as himself to attain high office.

Mrs. Parks' 77th birthday on Sunday will be marked by a black-tie national tribute at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington.

In anticipation of that event, House Speaker Thomas S. Foley and other House Democrats appeared with Mrs. Parks at a news conference.

"Sometimes it takes one person to say no, and a whole series of events follow," said Foley.

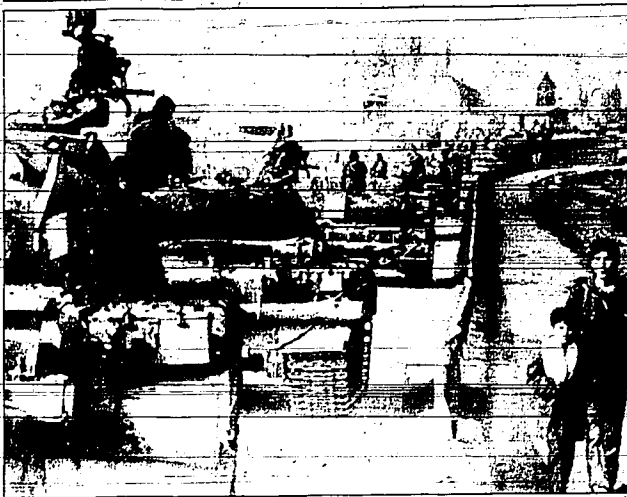

### 3 more killed in Yugoslavian violence; death toll now at 21

PRISTINA, Yugoslavia (AP) — Trainloads of Serbs fled Kosovo province as protests by ethnic Albanians resulted in three more deaths Thursday, the official news agency Tanjug reported. The nine-day toll now stands at 21. Soviet-made T-54 and T-72 tanks patrolled streets and air force jets and helicopters filled the skies as demonstrators gathered at noon in towns across Kosovo, an impoverished region adjacent to Albania where 90 percent of the 1.9 million people are ethnic Albanians. Two deaths occurred in Podujevo, 20 miles north of the provincial capital of Pristina, during a five-hour demonstration, Tanjug said. The protesters were killed as demonstrators attacked a column of military and police vehicles, the Belgrade daily Borba reported in Friday editions. The third death Thursday occurred in Magura, a village near Lipjan, 11

miles south of Pristina, Tanjug said without giving particulars. An Associated Press reporter saw columns of army tanks and armored personnel carriers approaching from the direction of the Serbian republic, of which Kosovo is an autonomous province. Military jets flew overhead. Tanjug said about 700 Serbs were evacuated Thursday, including 400 children. Tanks also were deployed in February and March 1989, during a spasm of ethnic violence connected with constitutional changes made by Serbia in an attempt to gain greater control over Kosovo. Twenty-eight people were reported killed last year. Two shifts of miners refused to enter pits Thursday at the Slatina mine at Trepa near Titova Mitrovica, 25 miles north of Pristina, as a gesture of homage to dead protesters, Tanjug reported. The agency said they also signed

a human rights declaration. Last year's ethnic strife began with an incident at the mine in February. During the miners' protest, police fired tear gas to prevent about 2,000 ethnic Albanians massed at the outskirts of Titova Mitrovica from entering the city, the news agency reported. Before the latest deaths were announced, the provincial government said 18 ethnic Albanians had been killed since the violence began Jan. 24. It said 54 ethnic Albanians and 45 policemen had been injured. Ethnic Albanians want more autonomy, a halt to political trials, release of political prisoners and an end to the 60-year-old state of emergency. Official media have described the region as verging on civil war. Yugoslavia's central government said Thursday the situation is "further deteriorating."

## East German premier appeals for talks to reunify 2 Germanys

EAST-BERLIN (AP) — East Germany's Communist premier on Thursday appealed for negotiations with West Germany to forge a "united fatherland" that eventually would be neutral and governed from Berlin. West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl welcomed the call to discuss reunification, but rejected the call for military neutrality. "Such a proposal contradicts the logic of the pan-European process of unification," Kohl said. He added that a single German state in the heart of Europe could not afford to be isolated. East German Premier Hans Modrow called for "a reasonable view on the issue, earlier this week" for reunification to be mutually determined, apparently

hoping to gain control over the galloping pace of events drawing the two Germanys together. His announcement marked a turnaround in the Communist-dominated government's position on the German question. The East Berlin leadership had previously resisted reunification efforts as premature and destabilizing. But mounting economic woes and an accelerating exodus of thousands of skilled workers to the West are forcing the nation's interim leaders to address public pressure for a merger with prosperous West Germany. Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev also has softened his view on the issue, earlier this week he said reunification was inevitable.

At a news conference to announce his plan, Modrow rejected suggestions that he was angling to win votes for the Communist Party, which is threatened by opposition groups in East Germany's first free elections set for March 18. Kohl flew to West Berlin to meet with East German opposition leaders to discuss possible campaign assistance for their challenge of the Communists. He said he would discuss reunification with the new government elected in March. Modrow cautioned that German reunification must be carried out carefully to avoid stirring up fears among neighboring nations that a powerful German state would rise and threaten them.

### De Klerk wants Mandela freed, may pick date

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — On the eve of a speech that could outline South Africa's future, President F.W. de Klerk on Thursday reportedly was trying to decide when to release jailed black leader Nelson Mandela. De Klerk addresses a new session of Parliament on Friday and is expected to make major announcements, possibly dealing with Mandela's release, the legalization of banned opposition groups and at least a partial lifting of the state of emergency. There were widespread reports that De Klerk and Mandela would meet Thursday, but the president's office said no meeting took place and none was planned before the opening of Parliament. A mass protest march is scheduled to coincide with the speech, and on Thursday a magistrate approved the march despite the organizers' refusal to request permission.

## Bulgarian premier resigns under fire

SOFIA—Bulgaria (AP) — Premier Georgi Atanassov, a holdover from the era of disgraced leader Todor Zhivkov, resigned along with his Communist-controlled cabinet on Thursday. Bulgarian state radio reported late Thursday. He and the 22-member government had been under increasing pressure to resolve Bulgaria's labor strife and other economic ills. Their departure clears the way for creation of an interim government to run Bulgaria until elections later this year. The Communists have proposed such a government to

share power with the opposition. The radio and state news agency BTA said the resignations became known Thursday night during an emergency, closed-door Communist Party congress. Neither made clear when the resignation occurred. Atanassov's departure was earlier reported by an official source, speaking on condition of anonymity. Delegates to the party congress remained in session and were expected to continue meeting into Friday. On Thursday, they approved moderate reforms before starting the secret session to elect the party leadership. Also, a reform faction of the Communist Party decided it would split off and form a new socialist party, a spokesman said.

## Soviet cosmonaut takes test ride on new 'space motorcycle'

MOSCOW (AP) — A Soviet cosmonaut took a spin in space Thursday on a special motorcycle designed for rescuing spacemen. Officials said the vehicle's maiden journey outside the orbiting station Mir was a success. Flight engineer Alexander A. Serebrov rode the cycle as far as 30 yards away from the giant station, while mission commander Alexander S. Viktorenko stayed at Mir's exit hatch and monitored the cycle's operations. Soviet TV interrupted its regular programs several times during the day for special coverage of the five-hour spacewalk. Live pictures showed Serebrov, 45, attached to a tether anchored on Mir as he prepared to ride the cycle. A taped report showed the cosmonaut, with his left side in the sun and right in shadow, slowly riding away from Mir, his image growing smaller. A correspondent emphasized the drama of floating in space while connected to Mir only by a rope. He told viewers in the nighttime newscast "Vremya" it was "risking and dangerous work." But Tass said the results of the 30-yard test ride and three five-yard trips were good. "Its easy

operation and good maneuverability" were confirmed, the news agency said. Further tests are planned Monday. It's not much of a motorcycle by Earth standards; it actually looks more like a floating armchair, weighing 485 pounds with 32 motors. The cycle is designed for repairing satellites and rescuing spacemen in distress. It can rotate and move to a maximum distance of 50 yards away from Mir. The device, formally known as the Cosmonaut Movement System, is similar to the Manned Maneuvering Unit that U.S. space shuttle astronauts have used, Soviet officials say. The cycle was delivered to Mir on Dec. 6, after two delays. It originally was scheduled to blast off last April but it wasn't ready, and a second launching planned for September was scrapped because of problems with its electronic docking system. The 20-ton Mir was designed to be permanently manned, and was host to a record yearlong flight by two cosmonauts in 1988. But it was unexpectedly mothballed in April because the module and another add-on were not ready and keeping a crew aboard would have cost money.

## Soviets may pull troops from Baku

BAKU, U.S.S.R. (AP) — The Soviet military commandant expressed hope Thursday that by mid-February troops could begin returning home and authorities could lift a curfew imposed after violent ethnic clashes in Azerbaijan. Representatives of Armenia and Azerbaijan prepared to open peace talks Friday across the Soviet Union in Riga, capital of the Baltic republic of Latvia. A spokesman for the Azerbaijan People's Front accused President Mikhail S. Gorbachev of evading its Communist hard-liners by

sending troops to occupy Baku, and added, "Gorbachev's hands are now bloody." Lt. Gen. Vladimir S. Dubynsky told the first foreign journalists permitted to visit Baku since the Jan. 20 there are "many positively inclined forces trying to normalize the situation and end the curfew." He said the 11 p.m.-5 a.m. curfew might be lifted within two weeks. He said tensions would have to ease further, including an end to leaflets appealing to Baku workers to strike to protest the military presence.

## Soviet paper blasts Politburo member

MOSCOW (AP) — A new paper on Thursday published the strongest criticism to appear in the Soviet press of Politburo member Yegor K. Ligachev, accusing the conservative of opposing democracy and deceiving the people. A picture accompanying the editorial in Moscow News underscored the criticism, showing the silver-haired Ligachev giving a Nazi-like salute, with one

arm stretched to the ceiling at a 45-degree angle. The article accused him of a wide range of sins, including glorifying dictator Josef Stalin, disregarding the people's will, lying and clinging to socialist ideals now under general attack. It was unusual not only for its harsh criticism of a standing Soviet leader — a virtual taboo even with Mikhail S. Gorbachev's policy of

glasnost or openness — but also for its timing. It was published just five days before the Communist Party's powerful Central Committee, of which Ligachev is a member, holds what is expected to be a fiery session where progressives hope to present an alternative platform. Rumors are rife that hard-liners might try to make a power play. The analysis was given great prominence.

# Griffith claims 3rd-grade play launched his ability as a comic

NEW YORK (AP) — Andy Griffith credits a grammar school performance and the fact that he hated being laughed at as the impetus for his acting career.

"I was laughed at all the time" as a child, the 63-year-old actor said in a Feb. 4 interview in Parade magazine. He recalled an instance during a third-grade play that made him realize he could make people laugh with him, instead of at him.

"I discovered that I could control why they laughed by doing something overt to make them laugh," Griffith said. "I was being laughed at, I hated it, so I made an adjustment to control the situation. All comics learn that."

The result was a successful career that included eight years as Mayberry's lovable sheriff on "The Andy Griffith Show," a host of specials and most recently a lawyer who always gets his clients off the hook in "Matlock."

## Michael Manley's wife receives divorce OK

KINGSTON, Jamaica (AP) — Prime Minister Michael Manley's wife was granted a divorce on the grounds their 17-year marriage "has broken down irretrievably."

Beverly Jois Anderson, 48, the prime minister's fourth wife, told Divorce Court Judge Courtney Orr that Manley's political career and frequent travel contributed to the breakdown of their marriage.

She said the couple's children, David, 8, and Natasha, 15, would currently live with her, would be allowed to regularly visit their father until custody is decided.

## Simpson, Bruckheimer, Paramount make deal

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Dan Simpson and Jerry Bruckheimer, producers of "Top Gun" and "Beverly Hills Cop," have signed an exclusive agreement with Paramount Pictures to make at least five films.

Their "box office" hits include 1983's "Flashdance" (\$209 million worldwide box office gross), 1984's "Beverly Hills Cop" (\$312 million), 1986's "Top Gun" (\$351 million) and 1987's "Beverly Hills Cop II" (\$281 million).

Their only flop was 1984's "Thief of Hearts."

The deal was struck after months of negotiations with Paramount and other studios. The terms were not disclosed.

"We ended up with what we were after from the beginning — freedom," Simpson said.

Unlike most producers under contract to a studio, Simpson and Bruckheimer will develop and make motion pictures without the advice and consent of Paramount executives.

Paramount will provide financing in the range of \$20 million per film and then market and distribute the finished products.

# Recalling civil rights struggle, 4 men re-enact historic sit-in

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — The dramatic lunch-counter sit-in 30 years ago that helped ignite the 1960s civil rights movement surprised everyone, even the four black participants who re-enacted it Thursday at Woolworth's.

"We were scared," recalled Franklin McCain, one of the four college students who staged the first lunch counter sit-in on Feb. 1, 1960. "All I wanted was a Coke and a doughnut."

"If someone had come up behind me and said, 'boo,' I probably would have fallen off the stool," said another protester, David Richmond.

When McCain and his three college friends took their same seats Thursday, they were treated like celebrities. A black Woolworth executive greeted them before they sat down to a breakfast of eggs, grits, bacon and coffee.

McCain, Richmond, Joseph McNell and Jibreel Khazan, formerly Ezell Blair Jr., were surrounded by dozens of reporters and spectators when they ordered food from two women who worked there on Feb. 1, 1960.

Woolworth Vice President Aubrey Lewis noted that 30 years ago, he

"... would have been denied service. I'm proud you had the courage to open the doors for a movement," Lewis said.

While they waited for their meals, some spectators began singing "We Shall Overcome." Outside there was more singing, directed by the NAACP, and some bystanders carried placards saying "Feb. 1, 1960. It seems like only yesterday but it could be tomorrow" and "The only thing that's worthwhile is change — Remembering Feb. 1, 1960."

One thing that hasn't changed much is the lunch counter, which looks about the same as it did in 30-year-old news photographs about the sit-in. But now, black and white customers sit side by side on the chrome and red vinyl seats, ordering food and discussing sports and events of the day.

When the four North Carolina A&T State University freshmen refused to leave the whites-only counter 30 years ago, their sit-in touched off similar protests across the South.

"We did get some encouragement on the first day and we got it from quarters you wouldn't ordinarily expect it to come from," McCain said.

"There was a little old white lady of oh, 75 years of age, who came over and placed hands on our shoulders and said to us, 'Boys, I'm so proud of you. The only thing I regret is that it didn't happen 20 years earlier.'"

"People took us for granted because we were poor youth, freshmen in college," Khazan said. "In America, people don't really believe young people can do anything to make positive change in society."

"We've achieved some rights, but there's many more rights that haven't been achieved."

Elizabeth Koopman, an education professor at Guilford College, recalled reading about the protests back in Michigan.

"It shook the world," she said. "You knew it was coming, like the Berlin Wall bursting open."

Geneva Tisdale, who is black, was working at Woolworth on Feb. 1, 1960. She remembers the four students coming in that day. "I thought they were joking," she said Thursday. "I never thought they were serious."

"Another counter worker, Ima Edwards, who is white, said she didn't see it blossoming into this."

### Twin Falls ranks high in new construction

**TWIN FALLS**—Only Boise had more commercial construction in 1989 than Twin Falls, spurred by the first stages of an \$18-million expansion at Universal Frozen Foods.

Twin Falls, with its \$12 million in construction permits, edged out third place Tampa, with \$11.9 million, according to First Security Bank's monthly construction report.

Twin Falls had \$5.5 million in 1988 commercial building permits.

Blaine County's \$58 million in residential construction also beat out every location other than Boise.

### Pesticide users must meet federal EPA regulations

**BOISE**—Farmers injecting pesticides into irrigation water must comply with federal Environmental Protection Agency regulations even though Idaho regulations won't be operational before 1991.

The agency requires that farmers use backflow prevention valves whenever they inject pesticides into the irrigation water, Bureau of Pesticides Chief Rodney Awe said.

Such valves prevent the chemicals from entering the water source. Idaho regulations would define the correct type of valve to use and would require their use when fertilizers are injected as well, Awe said.

### Man indicted in drug case ordered held without bond

**BOISE**—The fifth and last person indicted recently on federal drug-trafficking charges must remain in jail without bond until a trial in March, a U.S. Magistrate has ruled.

Thomas Rudy, 50, of Burley, appeared before U.S. Magistrate Michael A. Stoll on Wednesday after turning himself in to authorities.

Rudy was indicted on charges of conspiracy to deliver controlled substances, two counts of distributing cocaine and five counts of using a telephone to commit a felony.

More charges are being considered by the grand jury, Assistant U.S. Attorney Victor Stiles said.

Four other Mini-Cassia area men were indicted and arrested Jan. 19 on related charges.

They are also in the Ada County Jail until a March trial.

### Gooding man awaiting sentencing for sexual abuse

**GOODING**—Jason Dee Spencer, 20, who has pleaded guilty to two felony counts of sexual abuse of a child under the age of 16, is awaiting his sentencing date.

Spencer was originally charged with five felony counts of lewd and lascivious conduct with minors, both male and female, ages 2-7, according to court records.

He was living in Richfield at the time. He pled guilty to reduced charges of two counts of sexual abuse, carrying a maximum jail term of 15 years, according to court records.

Maximum punishment for lewd and lascivious conduct is life imprisonment.

A pre-sentencing investigation is being held, Lincoln County Prosecuting Attorney LeRoy Lovind said.

Fifth District Judge Phillip Becker denied the request of Public Defender Severn Swenson to release Spencer prior to sentencing.

According to affidavits filed in the case, Spencer sexually abused the children and threatened them with knives, guns and beatings between June 6-30, 1989.

Spencer had a prior juvenile record for similar occurrences, court records show. A mental examination was requested, but never ordered.

Spencer's parents said that he had been diagnosed as borderline mentally retarded.

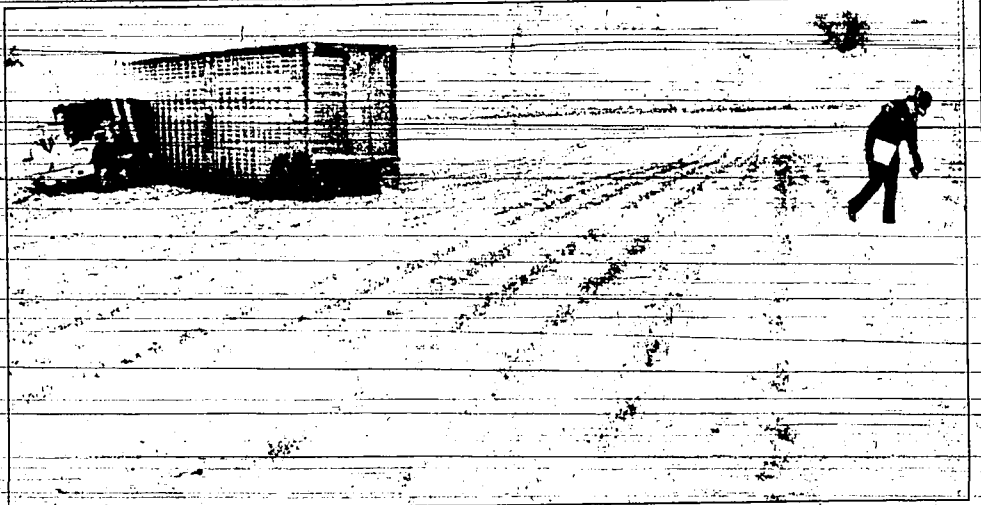

## INEL cleanup gets \$62 million federal boost

**TWIN FALLS**—The Idaho National Engineering Laboratory came out on top when the federal Energy Department doled out extra cleanup funds.

INEL will receive \$62.3 million more for nuclear waste cleanup from a \$357-million increase in nuclear waste funds approved by Congress last year, according to Idaho Democrat Rep. Richard Stallings.

But the money was not allocated to individual sites until this week, he said.

Stallings called the money "good news for the people of Idaho," in a Thursday

press release.

"An effective waste management plan is necessary to restore public confidence, protect the environment and reduce health risks," he said.

The \$357 million was approved in addition to the president's 1990 budget for nuclear waste cleanup at all Energy Department sites.

"Many people have told me that nuclear waste cleanup should be a top priority and should not take a back seat to new production facilities," Stallings said.

"The people of this country are crying out for help and are looking to the Congress and the Department of Energy for

leadership and action," Stallings wrote to Energy Secretary James Watkins in an Aug. 2 letter.

"It is imperative that adequate resources be available for both environmental compliance and waste cleanup activities," he wrote. "This effort will not be cheap."

Stallings told Watkins that INEL should receive a minimum of \$60 million of the extra money approved by Congress.

"The money will be used for environmental restoration—cleanup, waste management operations and cleanup technology development.

Part of the \$357 million will be used to develop alternative storage facilities for

long-lived plutonium contaminated waste that results from weapons production.

About 5 billion cubic feet of this waste is now buried and stored "temporarily" above ground at INEL while it awaits construction of a permanent waste repository.

The Savannah River Site in South Carolina was next in line for money with \$60 million and the Rocky Flats plutonium trigger plant near Denver was third with \$56 million in extra cleanup funds.

Stallings said the president's 1991 budget is expected to include \$425 million for INEL waste cleanup and management.

## Ketchum man burned as he warns his neighbors of fire

**KETCHUM**—A fire that destroyed a condominium unit and partially burned another was caused by a paper bag full of ashes from a fireplace, Ketchum Fire Chief Tom Johnson said.

Clem Hamar, 40, who reported the blaze, was burned while warning other residents inside the Crystal Villa II, at 100 Wood River Drive. He was treated at the scene by emergency medical technicians for burns on his neck caused by falling roof tar.

## House Education Committee passes bill which might help CSI nursing students

**BOISE**—The House Education Committee passed a bill Thursday that could provide tuition for College of Southern Idaho nursing students.

The bill, introduced by Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, amends an existing law that allows the state to forgive school loans made to teachers and nurses who are from Idaho and who work in the state for at least two years after graduation.

The problem with the current law is that the loan can be made only to recent high school graduates and has excluded most CSI nursing students, Black said.

"The typical CSI nursing student is 30 years old—not a recent high school graduate," he said. "When you put a program in place that nobody can qualify for it's not much of a program."



CSI nursing department Chairwoman Karine Sinton was pleased by the news that the bill had made it out of committee.

"We have a significantly non-traditional student group," she said.

No students applied for the loan forgiveness program last year because they could not qualify.

Out of the approximately 100 students currently attending CSI's nursing programs, Sinton said more than half would be able to take advantage of the modified program.

Students must still prove they're academically motivated before their loans

are forgiven.

"They would be required to maintain a grade-point average of 3.0 or better in their first two semesters and for each semester remaining in their coursework."

The bill does not change the status for teachers.

Only high school graduates who have earned a 3.0 grade-point average or higher will see their student loans forgiven.

Some committee members questioned Black about why teachers weren't included in the changes.

He responded that the bill was specifically designed to address problems with the nurses.

Richard Chilcote, president of the Idaho Education Association, said his group may come back and ask legislators to make the same changes for teachers.

The bill will next come up for a full House vote before it is sent to the Senate.

# Suit filed over train derailment, pipeline explosion in California

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Residents of a neighborhood that was devastated by a train derailment and subsequent gas pipeline explosion sued Southern Pacific railroad and the pipeline company for negligence Thursday.

The suit, filed in Superior Court on Wednesday, names Santa Bernadino, alleges "negligence and conscious disregard of safety" by the railroad and Calnef Pipe Line Co. in the fatal accidents, said attorney James H. Davis.

The amount sought for general, compensatory and punitive damages was not specified, Davis said. Others named in the suit include the city and county of Santa Bernadino—the chairman of Southern Pacific and other individuals.

Four people died and 30 were injured on May 12, 1989, when a freight train roared out of control down a mountain pass and derailed, throwing rail cars into the neighborhood.

Brake failure and a flawed estimate of the load carried by the train contributed to the derailment, according to testimony at federal

hearings held last summer. Thirteen days after the derailment, an underground fuel pipeline near the accident site exploded, killing two people and injuring 31.

Calnef examined the pipeline, which supplies 30 percent of Las Vegas gas, after the derailment and declared it safe.

Federal investigators have said they believe either the impact of the train accident or heavy equipment used to clear up debris from it weakened the buried pipeline, ultimately causing it to explode.

However, testimony during the hearings held by the National Transportation Safety Board failed to establish a causal link between the two disasters. An NTSB report on the hearings is pending.

Most of the 90 families represented by the lawsuit lived on Duffy and McDonald streets, Davis said. A total of more than 20 homes were destroyed in the derailment and pipeline explosion, and the area remains a "total desert," he said.

"Twenty years of my life I've lived there, and it all went up in smoke," Nancy Fricks, a former Duffy Street resident, told a news

conference Thursday. "And they don't even want to compensate us for anything."

Calnef claimed that Calnef has offered her \$43,000 for her lost home, but she contends it was worth \$87,000.

Other plaintiffs in the lawsuit live on adjacent streets and alleged that their property values have dropped and they have suffered emotional distress, Davis alleged.

"We were wrong," there were numerous claimants damaged or injured as a result of the derailment," responded Southern Pacific spokesman Bob Taggart. He said 200 claims have been settled so far, and that the railroad remains anxious to reach a "mutually satisfying settlement" of others.

"If we're unable to do that, a jury will decide," he said. Calnef spokesman Richard Kline said the company had filed the lawsuit yet and couldn't comment on it. But he said the company has worked to help residents recover from the accident by providing financial and medical assistance and offering to pay market value for homes destroyed in the blast.

## RENO, Nev. (AP) — Some inmates of the Washoe County Regional Jail went cold turkey Thursday.

In addition, sheriff's department workers were forced to cut down on cigarettes under a new strict smoking policy.

The policy, banning smoking in jail facilities and designating only a few smoking areas for employees, was intended "to provide a smoke-free and healthy environment" in the department's four main buildings.

Under Sheriff Dan Coppa said a few inmates and workers don't like the new rules, but crowded working conditions and an overcrowded jail have been making it more difficult for non-smokers to breathe.

"What we have found is there is a handsome body of inmates and employees that don't smoke and crowded conditions," Coppa said. "We were getting ventilation problems and complaints."

The federal Centers for Disease Control reported last July that Nevada had the second-highest lung cancer death rate in the nation, based on 1986 figures. The CDC reported Nevada's rate was 68.3 deaths per 100,000, compared to the national average of 55.7.

The jail, built for 458 inmates, held 618 Thursday when the no-smoking policy went into effect following a gradual decrease in cigarette sales in the facility to encourage people to start cutting back, Coppa said.

# Phosphate company to build new sulfuric acid plant at Conda

SODA SPRINGS (AP) — Nu-West Industries Inc. has sold its Florida phosphate properties for \$17 million and plans to invest up to \$45 million in a new sulfuric acid cogeneration plant at its Conda phosphate fertilizer complex.

More than 100 people will be involved in the 18-month construction project near Soda Springs, and as many as 25 employees will be added to Nu-West's 400-member payroll after completion in 1992.

Nu-West President Craig Harlen and Gov. Cecil Andrus announced Thursday.

"This is more good news for southeast Idaho. It's strengthening and expansion of an already existing industry," Andrus said.

"What they want to do is bring all their growth and assets really to the cash cow," the strong energy in that company.

Nu-West will start immediately on what is expected to be a six-month design and engineering phase of the cogeneration plant.

The facility will produce about 2,500 tons of sulfuric acid per day, and use excess steam and heat from the plant to produce about 26 megawatts of electricity.

Company officials earlier estimated cogeneration would save Nu-West up to \$8 million in annual power costs. The Conda plant consumes about 120 million kilowatt hours of electricity.

"It will not only supply all our sulfuric acid needs in Conda, but will generate all the electric power we need here at the plant, plus leave us quite a bit for export," Harlen said.

Nu-West, which revived the Baker Industries plant at Conda in September 1987, acquired a Pascagoula, Miss., fertilizer plant from Mississippi Chemical for \$27 million in April 1988 and a Florida mine and 4,500 acres for \$4.75 million a month later.

On Wednesday, the company disclosed that it agreed to sell its Florida mine, a refining plant and stock facilities to Gulf Atlantic Corp. for \$17 million in cash, debt assumption and long-term notes.

Nu-West has been unsuccessful in its attempts to sell the Mississippi property and could put it into bankruptcy soon, said Harlen, who also serves as Nu-West's chief executive officer.

He emphasized that the Pascagoula plant was operated as a wholly-owned and independently financed subsidiary called Nu-South Industries Inc.

"It's a real shame the company lost so much money. We'll have to write off the Gulf Coast operations," Harlen said.

"The impact of the bankruptcy should have no effect on Nu-West Industries."

## House bill would open tax records

BOISE (AP) — State law enforcement officials are after the income tax records of suspected drug dealers, and a House committee has introduced a bill that would pave the way for release of the information.

Richard Cade, deputy director of the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement, said Wednesday that tax records will help the state investigate and prosecute drug offenders.

Currently, a court order is required for release of such records, which are governed by strict confidentiality rules.

The bill, introduced by the House Revenue and Taxation Committee, was criticized by a spokeswoman for the Idaho Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union as an infringement on the constitutional right to privacy.

Similar agreements allowing the exchange of information already exist between the state Tax Commission and the departments of Health and Welfare and Employment.

Cade said the tax records will be sought only when police are already investigating a drug suspect.

"We will not go on fishing expeditions," he said. "It would not be a random search."

**Idaho Legislature 1990**

Tax Commissioner Robert Fry said the commission would insist on protections ensuring confidentiality of tax records.

"We're very concerned about people's confidence in the confidentiality of their tax information," he said.

But Janet Grepps, legislative coordinator for the Idaho ACLU, said the bill "raises serious constitutional privacy concerns."

She said the computer age has made collection and dissemination of information much more intrusive.

"What we're concerned with is the collection of information done in a 'Big Brother' fashion," Ms. Grepps said. "Every time I see legislation like this, it makes me concerned that's the direction we're going."

Tax information, she said, deserves special privacy protection because filing taxes is not voluntary.

Ms. Grepps noted that another bill allowing interagency exchange of information has been proposed by the state Industrial Commission.

## Symms received \$140,000 in contributions

BOISE (AP) — Republican Sen. Steve Symms, who will not be up for re-election until 1992, reported receiving about \$140,000 in campaign contributions in the last six months of last year, all but a few hundred dollars from out of state sources.

Symms' federal campaign finance report has been filed with the secretary of state's office at Boise. Reports from former congressional candidate Dane Watkins of Idaho Falls and retiring Sen. James McClure also arrived in Boise Thursday.

State Rep. Mel Richardson, R-Idaho Falls, who made an unsuccessful bid for Congress against Democrat Richard Stallings in 1986, reported paying off the last bills from that campaign.

Richardson, who at the end of the campaign was \$42,000 in debt, paid off the last \$9,000 in debts during 1989.

But Watkins, a former state senator who ran against Stallings in 1988, reported a debt of \$27,042 from that campaign. Watkins reported contributions of \$17,743 during 1989 and paid off all but about \$2,000 of his bills.

But he still owes personal loans of \$14,695 and \$10,400.

The latest reports cover the last six months of 1989. Symms reported \$227,733 on hand at the start of the period, contributions of \$139,170; spending of \$20,106 and a cash balance of \$346,799 at the start of 1990. His last election was in 1986, when he defeated Gov. John Evans to win a second six-year term.

Except for a \$500 contribution from Jack Pring, Lewiston, and five \$100 donations from Salmon residents, all of Symms' money came from individuals, political action committees and organizations out of state.

Of the \$185,595 in contributions received by Symms in 1989, \$127,750 came from political action committees, the report said.

McClure, who announced Jan. 5 that he will retire at the end of this year after 18 years in the Senate, reported contribution of \$178,086 during 1989 and a cash balance of \$328,987 at the end of the year.

McClure has "grandfather" rights to convert some of the money to personal use, but said at his announcement news conference that he does not plan to do that.

## Reporter denied access as Utah governor steams

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A newspaper reporter was temporarily denied routine free access to executive offices on Capitol Hill Thursday after Gov. Norm Bangertor became outraged by an article she had written, aides said.

"It was not a heated exchange. They came up and explained their perspectives, and the governor and I explained ours," he said.

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A newspaper reporter was temporarily denied routine free access to executive offices on Capitol Hill Thursday after Gov. Norm Bangertor became outraged by an article she had written, aides said.

### Latah County to cover Potlatch area

MOSCOW (AP) — Latah County Sheriff Ken Buxton plans to increase patrols in the Potlatch area, although Potlatch officials have not yet acknowledged they no longer have a police force.

Buxton said he received a phone call late last week from Dave Rogers, Potlatch Police deputy, whose wife Dene was the Potlatch chief. Rogers told Buxton his wife had been fired by the city council and that he has resigned as a consequence.

But today, Buxton still had no communication from Potlatch Mayor Neil Casselhorst. Casselhorst, a Republican, or other city council members that the town is without a police force.

Since the sheriff is the county's top law enforcement official, responsibility for providing police protection to Potlatch falls to his department.

### Ex-head of home set for arraignment

MOSCOW (AP) — A former nursing home administrator, charged with embezzling \$41,000, waited his right to a preliminary hearing Thursday, but is scheduled to be arraigned in Latah County District Court on Feb. 12.

Larry D. Sieler, former administrator at the Good Samaritan nursing home in Moscow, Idaho, faces 26 charges of records-altering and three grand-theft charges.

Sieler is alleged to have embezzled \$41,000 between 1985 and 1988.

If convicted, Sieler faces a maximum of 302 years in jail and fines totaling \$28,000.

### ISU ready to expand health education

POCATELLO (AP) — Idaho State University is willing and able to cooperate with Pocatello's two hospitals in expanding the university's health care education mission, but has yet to be asked.

ISU President Richard Bowen has made it clear the university is not a party to preliminary discussions between Blannock and Pocatello regional medical centers exploring a possible merger.

"The university is not preparing a proposal. The two hospitals are," Bowen said Wednesday.

However, he acknowledged that the university is keenly interested in using the hospital facilities to expand and establish new health education programs; its lead mission as defined by the state Board of Education.

### Man may face reinstated DUI charge

BOISE (AP) — Owyhee County may refile drunken-driving charges against a man who won dismissal of his original charges when the case did not go to trial within six months, the Idaho Court of Appeals has ruled.

In a unanimous decision Thursday, the three-member appellate court vacated 1988 rulings by Owyhee County Magistrate Juneal Kerriek and 3rd District Judge Dennis Goff dismissing charges against Manuel Luis Abernasti.

The man was charged with misdemeanor drunken driving on July 5, 1987, and pleaded not guilty a month later.

A trial was scheduled for Feb. 17, 1988, but Abernasti's attorney filed a motion seeking to have the charges dismissed unless a trial started by Feb. 10, the date marking six months since Abernasti had entered a plea.

The magistrate granted the motion, and it was upheld by Goff.

The Court of Appeals ruled on the state's appeal that a 1978 Idaho Supreme Court decision recognized a requirement under Idaho law to dismiss charges not brought to trial within six months unless prosecutors prove "good cause."

But the appellate court said a 1985 Supreme Court ruling added the element of fair trial into the speedy trial issue to create "a more malleable and less rigorous standard" than the statute suggests.

### Bidding bill heads to toward House

BOISE (AP) — A bill changing Idaho's laws on competitive bidding by governmental agencies, the product of several meetings by an interim study committee, has been approved for introduction by the House State Affairs Committee.

But, "I don't think it will go very far," Rep. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello, said Thursday.

Current law allows purchases under \$5,000 to be awarded without competitive bidding and the 19-page bill raises that to \$15,000. It also says an "informal" process of awarding contracts between \$15,000 and \$40,000.

### 3 plans would raise minimum wage

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's minimum wage has remained \$2.30 per hour since 1977, but there are three bills circulating in the Idaho Legislature to boost it.

Rep. Gino White, D-Cataldo, on Thursday won printing and introduction of his proposal to boost the minimum wage to \$3.00 in April and \$4.25 per hour in April of 1991. That parallels increases in the federal minimum wage.

White said Idaho's economy is booming and it is time to start sharing "with the people on the bottom rung."

### Mobile home rights bill suffers damage

BOISE (AP) — A Senate committee has killed two pieces of the three-bill package providing a "bill of rights" for mobile home owners.

On the votes Thursday, the Commerce and Labor Committee refused to introduce legislation that would limit annual increases in the monthly rent for mobile home spaces to the Consumer Price Index and require mobile home park owners to give tenants at least a year's notice if the park is going to be abandoned and then pay for their relocation expenses.

The only bill to survive from the package sponsored by Democratic Rep. Michael Burkett and Sen. Dennis Duda, both of Boise, sets health and safety standards for mobile home parks and sets up an arbitration system to handle tenant disputes and requires landlords to pay interest on deposits for trailer space.

# 311 state salaries top governor's in 1989

BOISE (AP) — In terms of real-estate taxes, Gov. Cecil Andrus lost a lot of ground in 1989.

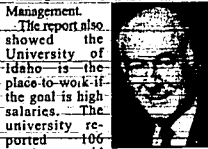
A survey of state salaries, prepared by legislative and administration agencies, shows that at the end of 1989, 311 state employees were paid more than the \$55,000 paid the governor.

Last year, there were only 194 over the governor's rate of pay.

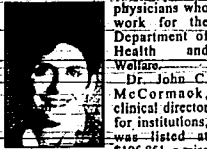
But the situation will change next year. Under a pay increase bill approved by the 1989 Legislature, the salary for governor goes to \$75,000.

If everybody on the pay list stayed the same, that would place Andrus 20th on the list.

The salary survey, an annual report prepared by the state auditor's office, state personnel director, legislative budget director and the Division of Financial

The report also showed the University of Idaho is the place to work if the goal is high salaries. The university reported 106 employees paid more than the governor's \$55,000 this year.

Topping the list is University of Idaho President Elisabeth Zinser, who receives a state salary in the odd amount of \$100,006.40. But she also receives \$15,000 per year from the private University of Idaho Foundation, and her combined salary of \$115,006 is the top in the state.

For the second straight year, the top-paid state employees are physicians who work for the Department of Health and Welfare.

Dr. John C. McCormack, clinical director for institutions, was listed at \$83,309, but that includes an \$8,400 annual housing allowance.

Idaho State University President Richard J. Bowen was listed at \$85,696 but Lewis-Clark State College President Lee Vickers receives \$67,925, below 27 University of Idaho staff and faculty members.

The two Idaho delegates to the Pacific Northwest Power Planning Council, James Goller and Robert Suvick, are paid \$67,496.

Highest-paid official in the state judicial system is Robert Bakus, chief justice of the Idaho Supreme Court. He gets \$67,374 and the administrative director of the courts, Carl Bianchi, is paid \$66,854 per year.

### Proposal would clear hospitals in blood drawings

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Kootenai County Prosecutor Bill Douglas is proposing new guidelines for legislation to resolve liability questions concerning blood draws at Idaho hospitals from suspects who don't consent.

Douglas forwarded a draft proposal to Sen. Dennis Davis, D-Coeur d'Alene. It would amend the current Idaho code to alleviate the concern of hospital administrators and lawyers.

A Kootenai Medical Center administrator has characterized the current law as "ambiguous" with regards to a law enforcement officer's request for drawing blood from a person who has not consented to the procedure.

Kootenai Medical Center and other Idaho hospitals require a search warrant before allowing blood to be drawn at their facilities.

Douglas' draft specifically states that no hospital or its employee will

be held liable for complying with a request by a police officer for administering a test for alcohol or controlled substance intoxication. The immunity will include cases where personnel will assist in forcible administration of a blood alcohol test at the request of a police officer.

A hospital will be covered from civil action whether or not the person drawing the blood has privilege to practice in the hospital.

Such blood draws apply only to instances of suspected aggravated driving under the influence, vehicular manslaughter, or aggravated boating under the influence where accidental death or injury has resulted from the driver's intoxication.

The police officer requesting the blood draw has to have probable cause to believe that a suspect person drove a vehicle while under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

### Jail hanging suit settled

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Months of legal negotiations in the case of a 21-year-old Kellogg man who hanged himself in the Shoshone County jail last summer have ended with an out-of-court settlement.

Coeur d'Alene attorney Mike Verbillis declined on Wednesday to reveal the amount of the settlement that will be awarded to the family of Danny Joe Shultz, as did Kellogg attorney Clutter Cox, who represented Shoshone County.

But an anonymous source said the county's Boise insurance company offered Shultz's family \$300,000 to settle out-of-court early in the proceedings. The offer was turned down.

Family members alleged that Shultz had made his suicidal tendencies clear to jail officials at least twice before his death last July 8, and that they should have done something to stop him.

"I think this was a very preventable death," Verbillis said. "With the slightest degree of sensitivity and common sense, Danny Joe Shultz would be alive today."

When he was a juvenile, Shultz threatened to cut his own throat with a shard of broken glass from a neon light fixture, former Shoshone County deputy Steve Berg said.

A February 1987 probation and parole report also indicated that Shultz attempted to hang himself on Jan. 20, 1987, by tying his bedsheet together.

The coroner's report showed that Shultz used the same method when he succeeded in killing himself last year. Shortly after the suicide, Verbillis was contacted by Shultz's grandfather, who had been a client in the aftermath of the Bunker shutdown.

A meeting was arranged between Verbillis, Shultz's mother, Della, and wife, Sharon Dennis Shultz. "What I heard in that meeting just didn't pass the 'smell test,'" Verbillis said.

The attorney subsequently hired two private investigators to look into the matter.

# Electronic battlefield funds not in budget

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush left the Pentagon's electronic-combat-test-range-out-of his 1990 budget, but the Air Force chief of staff says it will get another look when the 1992 budget is drafted next year.

new budget, it remains in Air Force plans. A total of \$10 million has been proposed in 1991 test range construction funds, along with \$500,000 for "operation" and maintenance. But the push to cut defense spending may have derailed the \$2.5 billion electronic battlefield, formally dubbed the Electronic Combat Test Capability.

While the Air Force had promised that its oft-delayed draft environmental-impact-study-on-the-range would be released by February, it now says it has no idea when it will be released. On Wednesday, Lt. Col. Portia McCracken, chief spokeswoman for Hill Air Force Base, said the draft EIS has been completed, but its release delayed indefinitely.

"In light of the current budget situation, a number of Air Force programs (including the range) are under review by the Air Staff at the Pentagon," McCracken said. The Air Staff is made up of the Pentagon's senior military and civilian personnel who make policies concerning the Air Force. McCracken said she did not know how long the review would take.

# Utah officials take care with mystery gas

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Believes the 56-foot by 12-inch-diameter cylinder was probably filled in 1954; give or take five years. Using a telescope from a safe distance, Salt Lake County hazardous-materials workers are keeping an eye on a cylinder. "We suspect it's one of the experimental gases of the '60s," he said.

Chemical manufacturers, the Compressed Gas Association and other companies that keep track of gases and gas containers have been busily digging through old microfilm records to determine what's inside the cylinder and what steps they should take to dispose of it. "There's no great immediate danger to anyone," said Salt Lake County Fire Lt. Cal Latsis. But his hazardous-materials crew is taking no chances. # Daughter pleads guilty to her father's murder

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Patricia Hylton has pleaded guilty to second degree murder in the Aug. 11 shooting of her father Bobby Bell.

Robert Dean Bell, Hylton's brother, and Penny Bell, her mother, entered guilty pleas to a charge of murder by concealing evidence of the killing. Sentencing has been set for Feb. 27 before First District Court Judge Gary Haman.

Hylton was accused of pulling the trigger of the .303 Enfield rifle that killed Bobby Bell. Robert Bell was said to have shown her how to load and fire the murder weapon. Penny Bell was charged with soliciting someone to kill her husband. Jennifer and Wanda "Stephanie" Bell, two other daughters, have described Bobby Bell as a violent

man as long as they could remember. Jennifer claimed her father put family members in front of a gun and shot at them on previous occasions. In obtaining the guilty plea from Hylton Wednesday for second degree murder, Douglas said a conviction was gained for "the person that pulled the trigger."

# Court decision sets precedent for disabilities

BOISE (AP) — A special state disability compensation fund will have to pay half the disability benefits awarded to a Bonners Ferry man, the Idaho Supreme Court says.

In the decision, the Supreme Court upset a precedent set a year and two years old in a case involving a worker who suffered a on-the-job injury when he had a pre-existing medical problem. From now on, the court said, a worker will qualify for payments from the Industrial Special Indemnity Fund only if the pre-existing condition actually was a hindrance or obstacle to employment for the particular worker.

In a decision released in 1988, the Supreme Court ruled that an amendment approved by the Legislature in 1981 focused on whether the worker considered the pre-existing condition to be an obstacle or hindrance to further employment. The case involves Robert Archer, who had a pre-existing knee problem when he went to work for Bonners Ferry Datsun. In 1983, he injured his other knee, and eventually was awarded a 50 percent disability. Wednesday's ruling by the Supreme Court means half of the benefits will be paid from the Industrial Special Indemnity Fund and the rest by the employer, Bonners Ferry Datsun. But the Supreme Court rejected the award of \$10,000 in attorney fees to Archer on the ground that the insurance company was late in paying \$115 in medical bills for Archer. The court decided they were paid within a reasonable period after the insurance company received them.

# North Idaho man still waits for liver donor

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A north Idaho man lies in critical condition at a Minnesota hospital, waiting for news of a donor for a liver transplant that could save his life.

Mike Mogen of Coeur d'Alene was in a semi-coma Wednesday at the University of Minnesota hospital in Minneapolis. His wife Kim said Mogen suffers from an unspecified form of hepatitis. Mogen suffered from the disease for at least five months. But last Thursday, he was taken to Kootenai Medical Center for treatment. On Sunday he was airlifted to the Minnesota hospital to await a liver donor.

Kim Mogen said her husband is number one on the list of donors from Minnesota, North Dakota and South Dakota. He also joined a nationwide list of patients who need liver transplants to keep alive.

Meanwhile, however, Mogen is beginning to have problems with his kidneys and is fighting to stay alive, she said. She had one message she wanted to get out to potential donors nationwide: "Please don't take your organs to heaven," she said.

# Woman dies in fire

PROVO, Utah (AP) — A 71-year-old Provo woman died early Thursday in a fire that engulfed her home, authorities said.

Provo Police Capt. Dave Bolha said the victim was identified as Lorraine McPolten. She was found dead in her living room after firefighters responded to the 3 a.m. blaze.

A state fire investigator is looking into the cause of the fire. Bolha said authorities had not determined a dollar estimate for damages.

# Eagles take No. 1 ranking on the road to St. George, Ephraim

ST. GEORGE, Utah — The No. 1-ranked College of Southern Idaho men's basketball team returns to the road for a pair of Region 18 games this weekend with Coach Fred Trinkle leading the team. "We haven't been in place this year where it's been easy."

And so to protect their No. 1 ranking in the National Junior College Athletic Association poll and undefeated status, the CSI men will have to beat the Dixie Rebels tonight in St. George and Snow Badgers Saturday in Ephraim. The

women's team will lead off action at 5:15 p.m. on both occasions. Coach Ben Stroud's crew now sitting firmly in second place in a bid for one of four regional tournament berths.

"If we sweep this week it's almost guaranteed to end any doubt about the No. 1 ranking," Trinkle said. "But we will be fortunate if we win one."

The other thing is the matter of where the regionals might be played. The Utah Valley at Dixie game moved up to midweek because of a power outage Saturday night, would have a major impact on whether it will be played in St. George or Orem.

"Dixie didn't have a home loss going into that game. If they won that one and then beat us, they'd have the best chance of hosting," Trinkle said.

"Dixie plays a lot of people and has a very solid basketball team. They have overall quickness and they seem to look to (6-foot, 4-inch) top scorer Cliff Reed a lot," Trinkle said.

Reed is averaging 18 points and at 6-4 is second only to 6-7 John Miller, 6.8 average, as the tallest starter. The Rebels go with six-footers Quincy Lewis, 7.6; Ben Peterson, 9.9; and Lester Turner, 14.6, at the other spots.

Blaine Bambrrough and Rene Gordon usually are their first two men off the bench.

"Dixie still probably is building the story line in it started when we opened the season by knocking off No. 1 Hutchinson (Community College of Kansas) ... along the line that a team rarely has the chance to do that twice in one season," Trinkle said.

On Saturday CSI faces a Snow team that "plays everyone close at home," Utah Valley, Dixie and "everybody else in the Northwest. Snow's major win is the one at Rebels but they have lost a couple at home," Trinkle said.

"We anticipate seeing a 2-3 zone which may be all right because we will be using our three perimeter shooters if they do. Our aim will be to keep the pressure on and push the ball up the floor when we get the chance," the coach continued.

Trinkle said the Eagles will be springing a new offense on this weekend's opponents.

"I liked the things North Idaho and Rioks were doing with their wings against us, running them out of that box formation and showing everything down. I'm not so bullish about that. I won't try something that works against us. It gives us a lot of movement for our

wings and I think that could free up David (Anderson) and Joe (Tubbs) and give the defense more to worry about. It's something I hope will give somebody some priches this weekend — hopefully not us."

The CSI women handled both of these teams rather handily before Christmas but Coach Ben Stroud is warning against complacency.

"The sweep last week gave us a very important game up on North Idaho and Rioks and it's important that we hold those because we still have to go to those places to play. From that standpoint I would say these are most road wins for us," Stroud said.

## Bruins travel to face Meridian tonight

TWIN FALLS — A Friday night visit to Meridian tonight will mark the only action of the week for the Twin Falls High School boys' basketball team, guiding Coach John Astorquia and his charges a little time to catch up with some of their late-season goals.

The Bruins, who handled the Warriors 69-53 the first time around, won't know what to expect because the Warriors have been as inconsistent as any Class A-1 team in the state.

"They scored 100 points against Mountain Home, lost a two-point decision to Borah and then lost by a bunch to Caldwell last Saturday," said Coach John Astorquia. "You never know what to expect from them."

"They are very dangerous because they have good athletes," he said.

But since this is a non-

conference game, Astorquia says other factors weigh into what he wants to see.

"We finally seem to be pretty healthy," Astorquia said, noting its been since before Christmas that a couple, three of the players are going into or coming out of a hospital setting, "and this is the year we've got to gear up. We have four games left with the big one in Burley next week which probably will decide the No. 3 seed in the regional tournament."

"I like what we're doing right now, although we did falter a little in the second half against (top-ranked) Boise last week," he said. "They turned it up a notch and we didn't get into our offense and missed some early shots that let them get their running game going."

Astorquia said Jason Astorquia "is playing well right now and Chris (Smith) has been our sickest but he's getting better and playing better. Eric (Smith) has improved impressively in the last three games, especially in rebounding at critical times."

"We still have a chance to have a pretty respectable win-loss record. We have beaten these last four teams we'll be playing so I think we can hope for a 13-7 or maybe 14-6 record," the coach continued.

Part of the late-season Bruins success is attributable to the improved scoring and play of local assistant guards Brandon Eller and John Horner. Eller is provided a lot more leadership for us and is hitting his shots that develop. Since he had the night he was shut out, Horner has been getting us seven or eight points a night and that makes a lot of difference," the coach said.

## Valley, Kimberly to settle title with 2nd rematch

HAZELTON — Now the three-quel.

The sequel to Kimberly's victory over Valley in the championship game of Holiday Tournament in early December was played Dec. 19 in Kimberly and won by the Vikings convincingly.

The rubber match, scheduled for tonight at 8 in the Valley High School gym, will decide the Canyon Conference boys' basketball championship.

"I look almost as identical game from what we had last time," said Valley coach Bill Mitchell, whose Vikings beat Kimberly 64-50 in their first conference encounter six weeks ago. "That game was pretty

intense, and this one will be too. Both teams will get after it."

The Vikings, 15-1 and ranked No. 4 among A-3 teams in Idaho by The Associated Press, are unbeaten in league competition with three games left to play: The Bulldogs, 14-2 and ranked fifth by the AP, are 7-1 with four conference games remaining. A Valley victory tonight would all but put the league title out of reach for the rest of the league; a Kimberly win would keep it wide open.

At stake in addition to the conference championship is the top seed and first-round bye in the District 4 A-3 tournament, which begins in Wendell on Feb. 12.

In a conference known for close matchups, Kimberly and Valley stack up remarkably evenly. The Bulldogs are led in scoring and

rebounding by 6-foot, 5-inch center Kelly Holcomb, but senior point guard Brad McDonald, senior forward Luke Kelsey and senior forward Randy Collins are all over double-figures in scoring. On the other side, Valley's David Black is averaging better than 20 points a game, with junior forward Blake Mitchell and senior forward Bernard Mussmann both averaging in double figures and Mitchell, Mussmann and junior center Travis Olson all close to a double-figure average in rebounding.

Both teams play man-to-man defense, both pressure the ball and both have to rebound well to win.

"We did a pretty good job of containing Kelly Holcomb last time (2 points in the Dec. 19 game) and we're here to do that this time to be

successful," said Coach Mitchell. "But I really think Brad McDonald is the backbone of that team. He's their parking lot. If we can stop him, we have a pretty good chance to win."

The Bulldogs will have to do a better job on Black than last time. The 6-foot senior guard scored 19 points Dec. 19 against Kimberly.

"We haven't had a let-down in intensity all year, and since the first Kimberly game we really have only had one bad game in Wendell a couple of weeks ago," said Coach Mitchell. "I hope we can keep it up."

The Vikings shouldn't lack for motivation. A sellout is expected.

"I've never seen a sellout in our gym since. I've been here," said Coach Mitchell. "This might be the night."

Today's South gave himself three trumps at making his odd-one-gam. But he got nothing for his efforts. Better he should have let the opponents do some of his work for him.

South won his diamond king and led a trump. East taking his ace and came a trump, which South won to try the spade finesse. East took his spade king and returned the suit, dummy's ace winning. South then cashed his diamond ace and led a low spade, hoping for a 3-3 split.

This didn't work either, and South was forced to ruff a spade. Finally another hand won — South lined up a club in the wrong direction, and East's club queen was the sitting trick.

South was not favored with any luck, but his efforts were all unprofitable. Aazier but more perceptive declarer would have made his own luck.

After South wins the second trump, he should cash the diamond ace and the spade ace, refusing to finesse. Next a low spade is led from dummy and the game is clinched. If East wins, he surrenders a ruff and discards with a diamond lead, giving a free finesse with a club lead, and sets up dummy's spade queen with a spade lead. If he faces the same problems in the minor suits, and if he has a third spade and leads it, dummy covers with the queen. If East wins the king, dummy has the 13th spade, if he doesn't win it, dummy's queen holds for South's 10th trick.

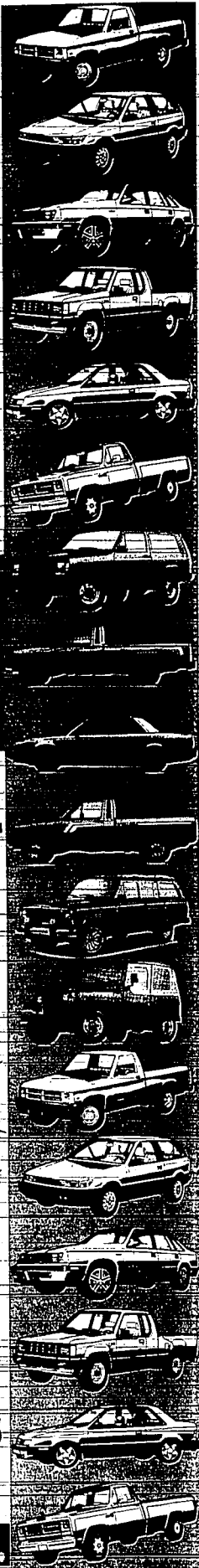

## Hagerman history

### Early days of town recorded in paperback by Faye Coates

**HAGERMAN.**—An account of Hagerman's namesake is part of a new history book written by Faye Coates, a third-generation Hagerman resident.

"Stanley Hagerman was a pharmacist from Ohio. He came here in the hope he could improve his health. ... Stanley was dispatched to Boise on horseback to apply for the permit of the name of the townsite. When he returned on that spring morning in 1892, everyone was delighted with the new name of Hagerman."

No one objected to the idea of his being remembered as the "father" of the town. He was one of the most loved citizens, gentle in manner, honest in business and kind to children. He lived and died before the turn of the century, and spent perhaps no more than 10 years here.

Coates said her 83-page paperback is the first of two volumes she plans to write.

"For years and years I always loved the history of Hagerman," she said. "I wrote it down for years."

In her first book, "Hagerman in the Valley of the Thousand Springs," Coates has included stories from "the early days" as told to her by some of the valley's first settlers. The book is a blend of historical facts and colorful day-to-day memories, filled in with old-time photographs.

"I wanted to compile the valley's history in one book," Coates said. "The museum has many family histories, but people don't go there and sit and take the time to read all that. I wanted to compile it so it would be in a book for everyone to read."

Coates' paperback is on sale at the museum on Main Street in Hagerman and at Judy's Book Store in Twin Falls for \$10. She also has copies at her home in Hagerman.

The author said she hopes libraries will stock her book. So far, she noted, it has been surprising how many "young kids" have bought and read this history.

Coates said it takes a lot of time to research a book. She had worked leisurely on Book 1 for about four or five years and probably would still be at it if her five children had not urged her to finish it for the

1990 centennial.

"My driving force was my kids," she said with laugh. "They said to hurry up and get it done."

Her son Bob Bonning of Hagerman said he asked his mother about the progress of the history book every time he saw her.

"I just never let her put it down," he said. "I don't know if it speeded her up or just kept her plugging."

Bonning added that his mother has always had "a hungry appetite" for history.

The author said her book is dedicated to Helen Palmer, who used to write articles about Hagerman for a newspaper published in Wendell.

"Helen gave me a lot of material," Coates said. "She talked with some older people like I did and had written it down."

This summer, the Hagerman City Park will be named in honor of Billy Coltharp.

In her book, Coates says this pioneer "believed in building a town," and she spent many years carrying out his ideas.

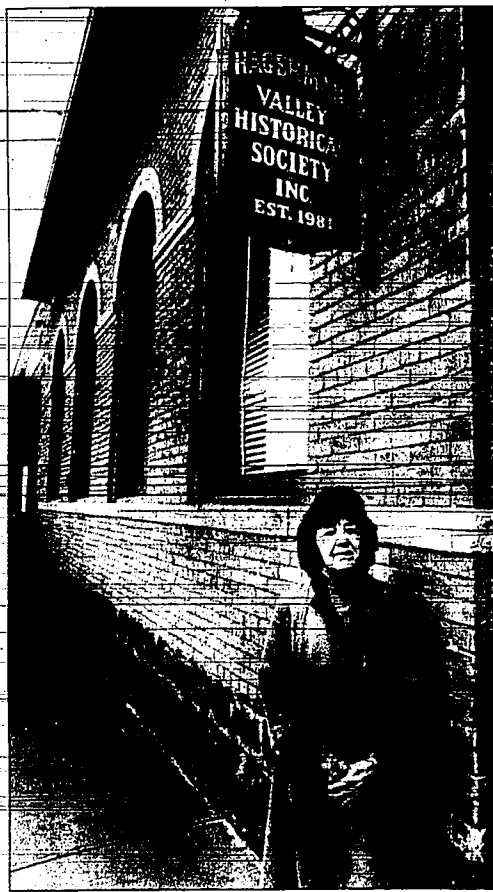
Coltharp brought the first telephone system to the valley and extended lines from Hagerman to Bliss. He introduced the first motion pictures and ran them in the city hall that he maintained. Coltharp also built the opera house, provided the city park, housed the first post office in his store and was the owner and operator of a saloon for the City Council.

"Coltharp was something of a storyteller," Coates wrote. "He would around the dudes with the one about the time he was fishing near the Owsley Terry route, when he hooked a huge sturgeon on his line, so he said, and couldn't do anything about landing it. Finally he managed to drag it out by hooking the line to a four-horse team on the bank. When he did so, the ferryboat went aground because the water was so low."

In relating many family histories, Coates documents who married who, and who their children and other relatives were. In addition, she often describes their appearances and personality traits.

The main road entering Hagerman Valley from Wendell is named Vader Grade in honor of Lee Vader and his family.

## Valley author Idaho writer Vardis Fisher was prolific, little known

Although he lived almost all of his life in Idaho and nearly a third of it in the Hagerman Valley, author Vardis Fisher is as little-known in the state as he is elsewhere.

In 1983, Tim Woodward set out to interview Fisher's widow, Opal Laurel Holmes, for his column in The Idaho Statesman. She gave Woodward one of Fisher's 36 books and suggested he read another, "Dark Bridle."

After reading the latter, says Woodward now, "I had to see the place

where he grew up. It kind of bewitched me, almost."

The following spring, Woodward drove to the Antelope hills of eastern Idaho, Fisher's boyhood home and setting of many of his books. Leaving, he wondered if a biography had been written about the author. "About 10 more miles down the road I told myself I hoped there hadn't, because I'd kind of like to write it myself," he recalls.

Woodward's book is now a reality, "Tiger on the Road: The Life of Vardis Fisher," has recently been published by The Caxton Printers of Caldwell. It is

## TV executives still fear complaints over content

**LOS ANGELES.**—When ABC executives saw the first draft of a recent "thirtysomething" episode, they were taken aback by one scene — of two gay men in bed, kissing.

The network objected, but the scene remained intact through two rewrites of the script. Finally, ABC convinced producers Marshall Fitts and Edward Zwick to eliminate the kiss.

When the toned-down episode aired in November, many advertisers still dropped out — and ABC lost more than \$1.5 million on the show.

The "thirtysomething" story is evidence and there's plenty more — that the television industry is still feeling the effects of last season's highly publicized objections to sex and violence in prime time.

"We are more concerned and more watchful about content than before," said

Ted Harbert, a vice president for programming at ABC Entertainment.

Yet network executives insist they are not bowing to pressure from either advertisers or viewer groups. They say they simply want to avoid excesses of the past.

Said Howard Stringer, president of the CBS/Broadcast Group, "We're walking that thin, narrow line down the center of a road between censorship, which understandably worries this community, and sheer bad taste, which for a while threatened to be pervasive."

It was nearly a year ago that Terry Rakolta, a housewife from Bloomfield Hills, created a stir by persuading several advertisers to pull their commercials from Fox's "Married ... with Children." Then came the Rev. Donald Wildmon, a minister from Tupelo, Miss., and longtime critic of the networks, who called upon advertisers to stay away from programs that

ing a bid for Best Picture, as is something called "Unlabeled," a film from Finland that "until recently, no longer the case." Of course, that's never been taken out of contention 100 "For Your Consideration" ads in the past month — clearly the biggest nomination campaign of the year.

There are serious campaigns, too. Among those likely to prove fruitful are campaigns for "Sex, Lies and Videotape," "Field of Dreams," "When Harry Met Sally," "Bauman" and "Steel Dawn."

Still, anything can happen; that's the joy of the campaign.

**THE BEST PICTURE RACE**

Oliver Stone ("Platoon," "Salvador") makes the wretchedly stirring, politically correct movies that Academy members love. A Stone movie is like pastrami: It goes down easily, but comes back to haunt you. "Born on the Fourth of July" leaves a bitter aftertaste, and will likely be rewarded for it. The second in Stone's projected Vietnam trilogy, the film is being commended for its emotional rendering of war, and is well on its way to being a phenomenon. It grossed more than \$10 million in only one weekend. "The Untouchables" (it will top \$100 million, industry analysts predict) and has a slew of glowing reviews to its credit.

The Jan. 20 Golden Globe best drama win enhanced its Oscar chances greatly: For the past eight years, the winner has gone on to win the Best Picture Oscar.

The film has a troubled history — it took 12 years to make — helps, too. The Academy loves

a three-way horse race. Votes will be split, possibly leaving the spoils to the dark horse.

Tom Cruise ("Born on the Fourth of July"), Daniel-Day-Lewis ("My Left Foot") and Morgan Freeman ("Driving Miss Daisy") are definite nominees. Cruise, whose chances for a win were helped greatly by his "best actor in a drama" Golden Globe win, will be helped by a strong Hollywood pedigree and friend-in-high places ("Color of Money" co-star and friend Paul Newman is reportedly campaigning for him).

Cruise's stunning performance shatters his pretty-boy image. Cruise is also proving to be a deft campaigner; he has granted more than a dozen interviews, snappd up a prestigious Time magazine cover and has been quick to share his success with disabled Vietnam vet Ron Kovic, whom he plays in the film.

Day-Lewis, by comparison, has kept a low profile. He is the critical favorite and has already swept the New York and Los Angeles critics awards: Drama, Best Actor, Best Director (the recently performed "Hamil" in England) and his penchant for art films like "My Beautiful Laundrette," which, while well-received, haven't made anyone in Hollywood rich.

Then there's Freeman, the New York stage actor who rose to prominence as Dostoevsky in his Broadway "Street Smart" (which won him a best supporting actor nomination), called him a national treasure.

Freeman's turn in "Driving Miss Daisy" was earnest, low-key and

sweet, and he has had the longest haul of any of this year's probable nominees — he's an overnight success at the age of 55. Warner Bros. has launched a huge campaign on his behalf, to beef up his name recognition, and two other strong 1989 performances, in "Glory" and "Labyrinth" help his chances.

The remaining slots will likely fall to Jodie Foster ("The Accused") for the Academy to acknowledge the "Batman" phenomenon and Robin Williams ("Dead Poets Society"), James Spader ("Sex, lies and videotape"), Jack Lemmon ("Dad") — who is so beloved he could sneeze and be nominated — Al Pacino ("Sea of Love") and Kevin Cost-

ner ("Field of Dreams") all threaten to bump Williams from the final field.

**BEST ACTRESS**

Until a couple of weeks ago, Michelle Pfeiffer had a lock on the best actress Oscar. Her breathless Sade-like turn in "Fables" Baker Boyer captured the best actress prize from every major critics prize.

Meanwhile, slowly, stealthily, she creeps the elegant dynamo that is Jessica Tandy. The worshipful ovation that met Tandy's "best actress" in a comedy "Golden Globe win" shows that Pfeiffer has cause for concern. Tandy has two factors in her favor: first, she's older — more than half the academy is over

he deemed offensive.

Several sponsors subsequently withdrew ads from such programs as "Saturday Night Live," "Nightlines" and "Roe vs. Wade," all on NBC and "Heartbeat" and "Crimes of Passion" on ABC. NBC responded by beefing up its Standards and Practices office, which had been trimmed for budgetary reasons, and ABC pledged to rethink its position on the based shows.

Since then, some insiders say that network programming has been toned down. But getting a fix on the programming climate is close to impossible.

Rakoff, for example, said she is not sure whether her efforts have had any impact on programming. "It's too soon to tell," she said last week.

David Kelley, executive producer of NBC's "LA Law," said that the

network told him before this season began to be as responsible as possible when dealing with sensitive material. "I was nervous about it," Kelley said. "They clearly sent a message to us that it would be tougher."

And yet, he said, "LA Law" has not run into any problems this season. "There's no story we could have told last year that we can't tell now," he said.

One change is clear. The networks have all sought to adjust production schedules so that producers are able to provide them with rough versions of any episodes or TV movies that could ruffle advertisers. The idea is to accommodate sponsors who want to see shows before their ads appear in them.

Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC Entertainment, said advertisers "look at everything in greater numbers" — and that the screening process involves "more people at the agency than ever before."

The other networks also said they try to avoid some surprises by working more closely with sponsors. ABC screened the TV movie about child abuse, "Unspeakable Acts," for sponsors, more than six weeks ago.

Even so, problems arise. A torrid love scene in this season's premiere

of CBS' "Wiseguy" brought heated objections from sponsors, including General Motors. GM subsequently stepped up its own efforts to screen shows in advance.

Stranger still, the "Wiseguy" episode "Sort of slipped" through CBS Standards and Practices people, who regulate content. "We did think that one went a little bit over the top," he said. CBS tightened its controls and told the "Wiseguy" producers to clear up their act.

ABC had trouble finding advertisers for its TV movie about Rock Hudson that aired two weeks ago. It finally sold spots at discounted rates. "The subject of homosexuality may be a greater taboo at this time," said Allen Sabinson, vice president for movies and ministries at ABC. NBC, meanwhile, lost advertisers from last year's "The Tracy Thurman Story," a fact-based movie about a woman who fought back after being abused by her husband.

The advertising community is skittish," Sabinson said. Inevitably, some network executives have turned cautious.

But Sabinson also said that even highly controversial movies can be sold, so long as they are done responsibly.

available in many Idaho bookstores and retailers for \$14.95 paperback, \$19.95 cloth cover.

In his introduction, Woodward says he set out neither to write a definitive biography. Rather, he saw a need "for a book that would introduce this extraordinary writer to readers who never knew him."

The book meets that goal admirably, and it is of particular interest to Magic Valley readers.

The book begins with a lengthy description of the Fisher property, a mild-and-bright-east-of-Hagerman site that can be seen from the top of Tupper Grade and although it's still owned by Holmes, who now lives in Boise, the Fisher homestead stands overgrown. Woodward describes the vandal-damaged interior contents of the five buildings Fisher erected, his physical labors a respite from the mental rigors of writing.

But he also tells of the years the house was full of life. From the time Fisher and Holmes settled in the property in 1940 to his death in 1968, Hagerman was their home. They hobnobbed with other colorful characters from the Thousand Springs area, including Dr. and Drich Bowler and artist Archie Teater.

Woodward writes of an evening at the Bowlers' home when Fisher was conversing with another dinner guest, "a young surgeon, whom he liked immediately."

"On one subject after another, the two found themselves in complete agreement," until Fisher asked his new friend his opinion of a former president of the University of Chicago, where both had done their graduate work. "On this point, they disagreed."

"Before the astonished physician could say another word, Vardis had grabbed Opal, stormed out of the house, started his car in reverse and backed through his hosts' garage door."

Woodward provides ample evidence of Fisher's literary genius and of the volatile personality that, in part, surely prevented him from becoming better known in the literary world.

One chapter, "In Papa's Shadow,"

describes how Fisher's legacy has been "sundered" by that of Ernest Hemingway, who spent a total of only two years in Idaho.

In fact, Fisher's output was staggering, and often more highly praised than Hemingway's. In addition to novels, he authored a sprawling, 12-volume "Testament of Man" series that offered his interpretation of the "whole history of humanity." And he wrote short stories, newspaper columns, essays and a guidebook to Idaho.

Woodward also writes of Fisher's arduous childhood, mostly spent in the Idaho backwoods. It was a life of isolation — he was 12 before he attended school with other children — and poverty and moral confusion.

"Tiger on the Road" takes its title from a remark made by poet Robinson Jeffers: that most people would rather meet a tiger on the road than face unpleasant truths about themselves.

The search for truth was a lifelong quest for Fisher, who emerges in this portrait as an inwardly driven genius determined to read and write and learn as much as possible. It was a drive that ended up destroying many people around him. It drove his first wife to suicide — and probably prompted Fisher's own suicidal death.

Fisher died at age 73 on July 9, 1968. Gooding County Sheriff Vern

Royle issued a brief statement: "He died from an overdose of sleeping pills and alcohol," but no official ruling was ever made on whether the death was a suicide or accident.

Woodward interviewed friends and family, many of whom said they didn't believe Fisher intended to kill himself — that he mixed the booze and pills impulsively. "I am sure he been that because of the drinking he didn't realize what he was doing," speculates Fisher's son, Grant.

"There are excellent reasons for the neglect of Vardis Fisher the literary figure, the most compelling being Vardis Fisher's man," Woodward writes. "He was temperamental, obstinate, rude, ill-tempered, tactless, and had a genius for infuriating readers and insulting the very people who could have made the difference between fame and obscurity."

In the decades since Fisher's death, obscurity has won out. But Woodward's book extends an irresistible invitation to the curious to find out more about Fisher by reading the man's own words.

There are two shelves full of Fisher in the Twin Falls Public Library's open stacks, more in the Idaho Room. Maybe Hagerman's finest will eventually become as well-known as Hemingway after all.

"It is told of Le Vadeur that he never found a job he thought was too big for him to handle," Coates wrote. "When he was a youngster he ran 10-mile freight trains from Coeur d'Alene to Salmon for three years. Once he brought a 20-mile pack train loaded with flour and whiskey from Boise to Stanley and Loan Creek. He told how each mule carried 200 pounds of flour and a 10-gallon keg of whiskey. To return to his haunts in Salmon took 15 days."

Her second book, Coates plans to bring the Logans Valley history up to date, including stories about recent residents as well as some earlier events or biographies that may have been passed over in the first book.

"I've got a lot of it started," she said, declining to predict when the second book might be ready. "It's a lengthy thing. Just pure near future."

**KETCHUM**—Artists of local and national acclaim will be present for the receptions during the Sun Valley Gallery Association's winter gallery openings tonight.

The openings are scheduled at 15 galleries throughout town from 6 to 9 p.m., with many of the featured artists present.

Complimentary beverages and hors d'oeuvres will be served, and most of the galleries are within easy walking distance of one another.

The Brochofsky Gallery at Sixth and Leigh avenues presents a repertoire of whimsical ceramic figures, paintings and drawings by Susan Nagoda-Berquist.

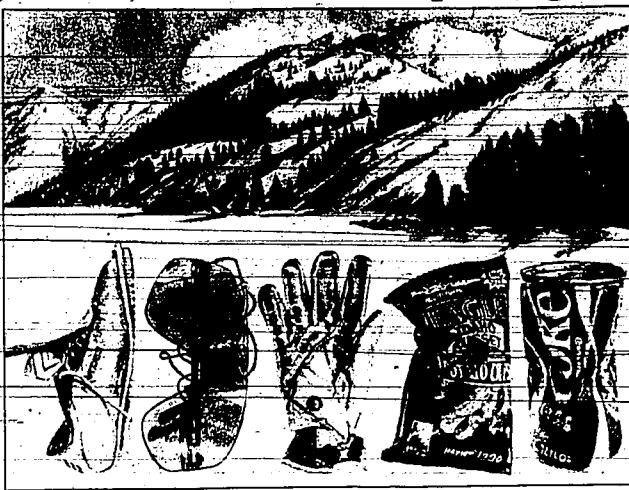
Nagoda-Berquist has based some of her drawings and paintings on the style of Indian ledger drawings which were used by Native American plains warriors to record feats of war, love and daring. She has also taken inspiration from her upbringing by a Papago Indian nanny.

At the Sun Valley Center Gallery in the Walnut Avenue Mall on Sun Valley Road, Don Nice returns for a winter visit.

It has been well over 10 years since Nice has produced a series of winter landscapes and images familiar to all who live in the Western mountains.

No stranger to winter landscapes, Nice was commissioned by the National Fine Arts Committee to paint two 70-foot by 30-foot wall murals for the 1980 Winter Olympic Games in Lake Placid, N.Y.

Nice's paintings are filled with objects that the artist enjoys, has taken a fancy to and sees in his every-

day life as the American culture: a bag of Hershey kisses, a bottle of Perrier, a running shoe, and a pair of Scott sunglasses. Surreal, larger-than-life images of animals, vegetables, and singular objects from the environment are often isolated in a neutral background.

The Andria Friesen Gallery of Fine Art with locations at 391 First Ave. N. and at the Greyhawk Center in Warm Springs Village, features a depiction of Indians and their mythology by well-known artist, Frank Howell.

Howell's work has been widely

exhibited in galleries and museums across the country as well as the Museum of Modern Art in Guatemala, Mexico. Working mainly in acrylics, but also in oils, egg tempera and watercolor, Howell creates his lyrical interpretations of "Earth."

In another vein, The Anne Reed Gallery in the Walnut Avenue Mall at 620 Sun Valley Road, hosts California artist Theodore B. Villa, a master of detail who breathes life into his recreations of Indian art.

Villa primarily works in large watercolor images of Indian masks,

headresses, shirts, dresses and moccasins, many of which are found in museums and major collections. His work is also filled with subtle humor. Upon close inspection, intricate beadwork often reveals jets, cars, little men or telephones placed end-to-end in a row.

The Kneeland Gallery at 271 First Ave. N. features the work of artists Susan Hertel, Donna Howell-Sickles and Leavon Feinman.

Hertel's large-format canvases depict her solitary, but whimsical lifestyle on a ranch outside of Santa Fe, N.M. in many of her newest

works, she focuses strictly on animals, their shapes and the juxtapositions of a world devoid of other humans and the trappings of a technological society.

Texas' Howell-Sickles returns to the gallery with a display of paper and canvas works on Western-attired cowgirls actively running or impishly posing with a myriad of animals and birds. Many of the cowgirl and animal themes have been inspired by ancient Greek mythology.

Ketchum's own Feinman rounds out the show. Her ceramic sculptures are creative depictions of cowboy boots, each with their own story, title and unique personality.

The Gail Severn Gallery, also in the Walnut Avenue Mall at 620 Sun Valley Road, displays the super-real watercolors of Oregon painter Robert DeVoe.

His still life paintings transform natural vegetation into either nourishment or decoration, while his depictions of precious and humble objects give lush color and texture to otherwise banal subject matter.

The gallery will also be exhibiting a number of DeVoe's new pastels that derive their basic imagery from composites of video clips.

In these paintings, the viewer looks at images of men and women in the context of their clothes and the places where they live, work and play. The defused images and soft tones lend to the feeling of another place and time.

The River Run Gallery at 291 First Ave. S. across from the Ketchum post office features an exhibition of landscape artist, Cic Goulet's latest monotypes and acrylics.

Goulet creates paintings that are powerful explorations of how active the land, light and change of season can be. They are emotional pieces. Intense colors describe the trees, water hillsides and skies.

The Stonington Gallery at Trail Creek Village on the south entrance to town and at their new Warm Springs Village gallery in the Baldy Base Camp building, presents new original watercolor by Nancy Taylor-Stonington as well as originals that were part of her one-person show last fall at the Anchorage Museum of Art.

Stonington has been painting Idaho landscapes and presenting her works in the Sun Valley area since 1972.

And, if you haven't taken in the Valley Artists' Gallery, be sure to include it on this gallery tour.

The gallery is a lively showcase for local talent, featuring an exciting variety of works by co-op members. Styles range from the abstract to the highly realistic.

# 'Sulking' may result from depression

**DEAR ABBY:** Thank you for your answer to the wife of the man who "sulked" on and off for 25 years. As you pointed out, the man could be suffering from a major depression of biochemical origin. Perhaps my own experience could shed some light on this disorder:

For years, I went through times of terrible, seemingly unexplainable depressions. I, too, was additionally burdened by the cheap-shot accusations that I was "sulking" or "feeling sorry for myself" for no apparent reason. Such accusations succeeded only in antagonizing me and alienating me from those who thought they were helping—including some mental health counselors and non-physicians who couldn't prescribe medications.

What was so mysterious and unexplainable about these episodes was that they seemed to happen for no reason. The truth is that 1 to 5 percent of the population suffers from inherited conditions in which major depressions—sometimes even resulting in suicide—occur, and these depressions may have no apparent cause. Certain chemicals in the brain go out of whack, and the person falls into moods of despair and gloom. Some people have these depressive mood swings exclusively. Others (like myself) have them as part of manic-depressive illness in which our depressions switch over to periods of great energy, high spirits and enormous creativity. We are frequently called "geniuses" during these "high times," but we are also accused of being "on something" (drugs) because no "normal" person switches moods so quickly, right?

Well, we're not entirely normal. We're usually taking medications such as non-addictive lithium (not to be confused with the potentially addictive Librium, please) and anti-depressants. And most of all, we can be helped by loved ones who realize—as you pointed out—that "sulking" can be caused by a chemical imbalance.

Abby, I hope this isn't too long for your column.

# 'Talking' shows insight, comic balance

**LOOK WHO'S TALKING (PG-13).** Movies in which animals or babies speak their thoughts in-voiceover rarely work, but part of the strength here is that Bruce Willis, as the sperm-fetus-baby, isn't always talking. There's enough fairly witty interplay between him, Kestie Alley and savior John Travolta so that the movie could conceivably work even without the baby chat. Another unexpected strength of this uneven comedy is that it's as much from the woman's point of view as the infant's, thanks to writer-director Amy Heckerling, whose own mothering experiences account for much of the script's casual insight.

## Capsule reviews

**ALWAYS (PG).** A better title for Steven Spielberg's remake of the soppy 1943 Spencer Tracy movie "A Guy Named Joe" might be "Forever," which is roughly its running time. All of us who fell under Holly Hunter's spell in "Broadway Nights" and then through "Miss Firecracker" are in for a rough time of it. Cuteness turning overripe. Not a pleasant sight. Richard Dreyfuss fans do no better than his dialogue or his situation — or his direction, and all of that is, as they say, tooth-rotting.

**INTERNAL AFFAIRS (R).** Two cops on opposite sides of the law — a corrupt opportunist, one his investigator — get tangled up in a tangle of those doppleganger melodramas where pursued and pursuer become one. Richard Gere as the sexy bad cop, and Andy Garcia as his glowering nemesis are magnetic actors, but the story, weirdly chopped up, simply floats away from them, and even Mike Figgis ("Honey, I Shrunk the Kids") doesn't do enough swanky style to disguise the emptiness.

**THE LITTLE MERMAID (G).** Directed and written by John Musker and Ron Clements, with a yeoman team of animators, design-

ers and craftspeople, this impudent, grandiose, multilevel crowd-pleaser shares with the classic Disney animated features of the '30s and '40s a sense of over-reaching; of grabbing every snazzy effect possible within old-line narrative forms. Ariel, the saucy heroine, is a sexy honey, but much more like the sad noble sea-maid in Hans Christian Andersen's original story. But there is a primal power that most recent Disney cartoons lack. It flows through Sam Wright, who is the voice of a hypersensitive crab named Sebastian, leads a gypsy number called "Under the Sea" — an infectious show-stopper by songwriters Howard Ashman and Alan Menken — and afterwards should have any audience in his pocket.

**STEEL MAGNOLIAS (PG).** In Robert Hurling's movie adaptation of this play, his yammering sextet — Sally Field, Shirley MaLaine, Olympia Dukakis, Daryl Hannah, Dolly Parton and Julia Roberts — do so much prancing and sashaying and elbowing that the film, set in small-

town Louisiana, turns into Southern-fried vaudeville. These belles should take their act on the road as tag-team wrestlers.

**TANGO AND CASH (R).** The sumptuous meeting of Russian director Andrei Konchalovsky and Sylvester Stallone produces not cinematic glanz, but the same old dopey, recycled car-chase thriller. Mismatched cops, surrounded by cliches, explosions and wild jailbreaks, duel omnipotent drug czars, while comically and witlessly wise-cracking. Konchalovsky shares direction with Peter MacDonald and Albert Magnoli: Siallone, playing a nasty dude, shares star-time with scruffy Kurt Russell. The movie pulverizes them all.

**TREMORS (PG-13).** A real surprise: a monster movie about huge earthworms attacking an isolated desert town, that manages to stuff some humor and charm — and lots of thrills — into its old-time formula. Gusty, written by Brent Maddock and S.S. Wilson ("Short Cir-

cuit"), it's one shocker where the special effects, including the ingeniously loathsome thirty-foot worms, don't overpower the story. Set in a picturesque, sunny wasteland, modeled on '50s B-movies and filled with rustic homes and expensive thrills, "Tremors" still manages to keep the audience guessing and its caricatures hopping.

**THE WAR OF THE ROSES (R).** In the hands of director Danny DeVito and writer Michael Leeson, this story of Oliver and Barbara Rose is biting and vicious, a styptic pencil on the battered face of "civilized divorce." It's also thoughtful, laceratingly funny and bravely true to its own black-and-blue comic vision. Although Michael Douglas' performance has been calibrated to give some idea of Oliver's charm, you could call Oliver an insensitive, workaholic, self-centered, countless fox. Kathleen Turner's Barbara may be sexually triumphant, but she is socially unsure and after all these years with Oliver, her self-esteem has vanished. If you're tired of cloying Christmas eggos, "War" is Christmas spirit's ammonia.

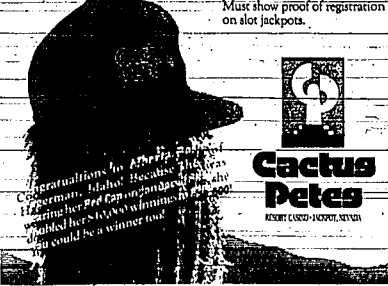

# 'Driving Miss Daisy' now No. 1

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)** — "Driving Miss Daisy" accelerated to 895 theaters over the weekend and emerged as the nation's favorite film according to recently released figures. Pushing "Born on the Fourth of July" out of the top spot, "Driving Miss Daisy" collected \$5.7 million for a per-screen average of \$6,275, Exhibitor Relations Co. said.

The film stars Jessica Tandy as a Southern widow and Morgan Freeman as her chauffeur in a story of manners, race relations and friendship. Overall weekend business at U.S. and Canadian movie theaters was slow because of the Super Bowl, Exhibitor Relations said.

"Born on the Fourth of July," the story of disabled Vietnam veteran Ron Kovic, slipped to second place with ticket sales of \$4.6 million. It was followed in third by the police drama "Tango & Cash" on a gross of \$3.6 million.

In fourth was the divorce black comedy "The War of the Roses," with a gate of \$3.23 million. Right behind it in fifth place was the stylish-police thriller "Internal Affairs" with receipts of \$3.18 million. The fight film "Tremors" landed

in sixth by grossing \$3.15 million. "Always," the latest from director Steven Spielberg, was seventh on a gate of \$2.4 million. In eighth was the ensemble drama "Steel Magnolias," with a tally of \$2.38 million.

"The Little Mermaid" came in ninth, with box-office revenues of \$2.2 million and "Back to the Future Part II" finished 10th by collecting \$1.8 million.

## Take 6 creates Christian music in gospel, a cappella, jazz style

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Some groups start as garage bands, bar bands or studio bands, but Grammy-winning Take 6 began as a bathroom band.

The original group of six young students began harmonizing in a bathroom at Oakwood College, a Seventh-day Adventist school in Huntsville, Ala., nine years ago. "You always have good acoustics in a bathroom," said Claude V. McKnight III, the group's leader. "It was a large bathroom and you have sounds reverberating off the walls. The sound is better as long as there isn't anyone doing anything that might upset you."

From those bathroom rehearsals and several personnel changes came a jazz-styled, a cappella gospel group that scored a hit with its first single, "Spread Love."

The single and self-titled debut album earned the group three Grammy nominations and two Grammys for best soul gospel performance by a group and best jazz-vocal performance by a duo or group.

McKnight, Mark Kibble, Mervyn Warren, Cedric Dent, David Thomas and Alvin "Vinnie" Chea have just finished a national tour and are working on their second album in Nashville.

The first LP, which was declared gold for selling 500,000 copies, consists of traditional gospel and contemporary Christian songs such as "Gold Mine," "Mary" and "A Quiet Place." But the sound is a mixture of Manhattan Transfer, the B-52's and Earth, Wind and Fire, McKnight regards the group's sound as a means of conveying a message as much as music.

"In the Christian world there is room for entertainment," he said. "You have to wrap the message up in a package that is appealing to people. Most people won't come out and listen to somebody who is going to thump a bible over their head."

But I will come out and listen to some nice jazz sounds. "Our message simply is that the love of Jesus Christ will apply to everybody."

McKnight acknowledges that some listeners might be turned off by the message, but he points out the album has reached gold status and is still selling well after its March 1988 release. "The group tries not only to present its message during performances but is also noted for adhering to a Seventh-day Adventist lifestyle—off stage, McKnight says none of the members drinks alcoholic beverages or smokes and several are vegetarians."

"Being Seventh-day Adventist first off means we observe the Sabbath from sundown Friday to sundown Saturday. It has been a little difficult ... to allow us to have that time. In the record industry, a lot of times it happens that we have to turn things down or say can we do it on Sunday morning or Saturday evening."

"People are slowly but surely coming around to realize that we are different."

Just as Take 6's lifestyle is different, so will be the next album—McKnight said. While the group's a cappella sound was praised by industry figures such as producer Quincy Jones and Stevie Wonder, whose answering machine played one of the group's tunes, McKnight said the new album probably won't be entirely a cappella.

"Everybody plays an instrument and we will probably do some things with instruments. We may do some things with just keyboards or we may do a full-blown big band arrangement with horns and everything," he said.

"Of course there will be gospel music, but we may do some bossa nova types of things—some funkier types of things and, of course, jazz."

We want to show that we are versatile and can do other types of music."

McKnight says the change might upset some fans. "I think there will be some purists who will say, 'Aw, they've defiled it. They've added instruments.' But at the same time when you do something and you do it well, then you will gain new fans and you will preserve the old ones."

Like Take 6, McKnight urges other artists, especially aspiring ones, to put their best work forward. Much of the music produced these days is poorly crafted fluff that has no lasting value, he said.

"There's a lot of things that just aren't done well. Strive for excellence," McKnight said. "There is a market out there for quality. That is why a lot of people have longevity."

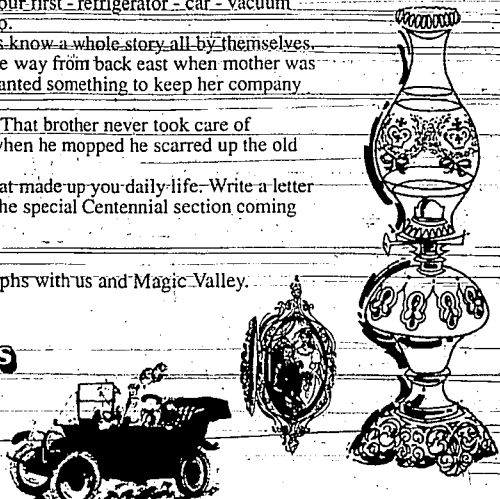

# CBS miniseries dramatizes true story of bizarre family-based espionage ring

By LYNN HOOGENBOOM

Watching the CBS miniseries "Family of Spies" (airing Sunday and Tuesday, Feb. 4 and 6), based on the real-life case of U.S. Navy officer John Walker Jr., who recruited his best friend, his brother and ultimately his own son into one of the most damaging spy rings in American history, viewers will find themselves haunted by one question: Why?

Why would a man who claimed to love his country and who harbored no known bitterness toward the military deliberately sell his country out to the Soviet Union — not just once, but hundreds of times over a period that lasted nearly 20 years.

"I believe that his primary motivation was power," says Lesley Ann Warren, who plays Walker's wife in the miniseries. "I think this was a deeply insecure man who needed to manifest control, or the illusion of control, over his environment and everything else. And in a funny way this gave him the lifestyle and sense of macho power that he had craved his whole life."

Those who knew Walker claim that he had no political affinity for the Soviet Union. If anything, they say, his politics were well to the right of the American mainstream. "I don't think it was so much hypocrisy as it was a kind of misappropriation of loyalty," says Warren. "On the one hand, he was involved in serving his country in a very predictable way. The other was more about personal gain and personal power. I

don't think he ever really took in the ramifications of his choices."

Warren, 43, has had an unusually varied career, but she is probably best remembered for her delightful comic turn as a blond bimbo in the 1982 movie "Victor/Victoria." The role of Barbara, Walker's alcoholic wife who eventually turned him in to the FBI, is a much more serious one. It was also a difficult one, since Barbara's conduct raises almost as many questions as Walker's. Why did she wait 17 years to tell the FBI what she knew about her husband? How did she justify her long silence?

"I don't think she ever did justify it," says Warren. "This is a woman who begins by being verbally abused, is ultimately physically abused and turns into a raging alcoholic in the process of her life with Johnny Walker. She was obsessed with him, she was terrified of him, she didn't want to lose him, and she was drinking excessively."

Apparently it was fear for her son, Michael (Andrew Lowery), as well as bitterness toward Walker, that finally led Barbara Walker to turn Walker in.

"She had lost everything," says Warren. "They had been divorced, and she really got nothing from the marriage. She was working in a factory; he was living very high on the hog. And I think she had finally had enough of the fear. She went to see Johnny, and when he was very abusive to her one more time she wanted to end it so Michael could start fresh. She had a very serious discussion with him, where she begged him to tell her if he had ever been involved. He swore to her that he had never done anything like that. She believed him, and it gave her the courage to turn Johnny in. Then she saw on the news, a couple of days later, Michael getting arrested. It was like a death. It was not only her worst dream coming true, but she was responsible."

# Super Bowl's domination of ratings not enough to lift CBS out of cellar

LOS ANGELES (AP) — CBS' broadcast of the Super Bowl game and post-game show were at the top of the Nielsen ratings but failed to lift the network out of third place.

The game's rating of 39.0 was the lowest ever for a Super Bowl in prime time and the lowest overall since 1969.

CBS was third last week. It was the first time since 1981 that the Super Bowl network failed to win the week.

Still, the game, in which the San Francisco 49ers routed the Denver Broncos 55-10, was first by a wide margin over the second-place post game show and regular programming. It was seen in nearly 40 million homes.

The post game show, with a rating of 25.3, edged ahead of NBC's "The Cosby Show" and "Cheers," which tied for third place with a rating of 25.0.

NBC was first in the A.C. Nielsen Co. survey with an average of 15.0 for the week. ABC's average was 13.2 and CBS' 12.8. Each point represents the percentage of the nation's 92.1 million television homes tuned to a show.

For the season, NBC leads with 14.8 to ABC's 13.0 and CBS' 12.3.

CBS' "Super Bowl Wrapup" tied for 34th place with ABC's "Doogie

# Executives criticize Simon violence bill

WASHINGTON — Broadcast and advertising executives, saying they feared government intrusion into their free-speech rights, on Tuesday criticized Sen. Paul Simon's legislation to allow the television industry to establish guidelines aimed at reducing broadcast violence.

The measure won overwhelming support in the House and Senate last year, though in different forms. Simon, D-Ill., and the bill's House sponsors said they expect the House and Senate to appoint members to a conference committee to resolve the differences this year.

As proposed by Simon, the bill would exempt the networks, producers, affiliates and industry associations from antitrust laws so they can get together to develop voluntary guidelines concerning violence on TV shows; perhaps

coming up with a set of ratings similar to those used for movies.

Before passing it 91-0, the Senate added two amendments expanding the exemption to include the depiction of drug use and sex among the topics that the industry could discuss. The House version,

approved 399-18, was limited to the violence provision.

Simon has been pushing the bill since 1986, when he turned on a motel TV set and saw "The Texas Chainsaw Massacre" and wondered about the impact on children who could have seen the same movie.

## Vietnam's hill people get color TV

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Color television has come to the ethnic minorities of Vietnam's remote northern highlands bordering China, Radio Hanoi reported.

Since Jan. 15, Lang Son province has been receiving color programs broadcast by the central TV station, "to the delight of the peoples of ethnic minorities," the official radio broadcaster said. A text of the broadcast Monday was seen in Bangkok on Wednesday.

Lang Son was devastated when China attacked it and the five other border provinces in early 1979 to punish Vietnam for invading Cambodia. Fighting has subsided recently and frontier trade has been booming.

The Tay and other minorities of Lang Son have retained their ancient, distinctive dress and culture. Vietnam's Communist government in recent years has expressed a desire to develop the highlands, but resources are limited.

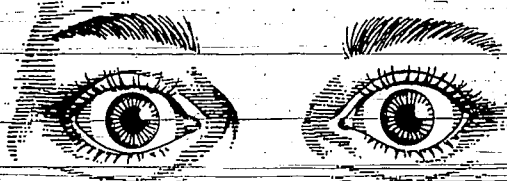

## Former child star Coleman fights soap opera battle with mother

LOS ANGELES — Former child star Gary Coleman's life these days is reading like a script.

It is a complicated and emotional story line in which the principal players on both sides are making allegations that would keep any soap opera in material for months: sidelined careers, failing mental health, parental greed, questionable friendships, stolen money.

Coleman, now 21, who played the precocious Arnold on the TV series "Diff'rent Strokes," was scheduled to appear Wednesday in Los Angeles County Superior Court to fight his mother's efforts to have him and his assets placed under

court conservatorship.

Edmonia Sue Coleman, who lives in Illinois, has alleged in court papers that her famous son is being "brainwashed" by his former chauffeur, and that kidney problems have left him disoriented and made him incapable of managing \$7 million in assets he accumulated during years as one of Hollywood's highest-paid child stars.

At Wednesday's scheduled hearing, an attorney appointed by Superior Court Judge Martha Goldin was expected to submit a report detailing Coleman's condition and whether there is enough evidence to warrant a conservatorship hearing.

Coleman, who declined to be interviewed, said in a court hearing

earlier this month that his mother's effort to place him under a court conservatorship is an "attempt to control my life." He also said called it a "vicious response" to a lawsuit he filed early last year against his parents and his former business manager for allegedly mishandling his money and diverting funds to themselves.

Under a conservatorship, a judge appoints a third party to make decisions for an individual who has been declared unable to care for himself.

Coleman's mother said she filed for the conservatorship out of her concern for his well-being. She insisted that her son's allegations against her are untrue.

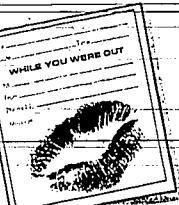


