Soviets drop major barrier to nuclear arms cut treaty

MOSCOW — As both sides offered new ideas to speed arms control talks, the Soviet Union appeared Thursday to remove one of the last major obstacles to a U.S.-Soviet strategic nuclear arms reduction treaty.

It did so by eliminating the final links between offensive weapons and anti-missile defense issues surrounding the U.S. "Star Wars" program.

Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze told visiting Secretary of State James A. Baker III that Moscow was willing to sign and implement a new Strategic Arms Reduction Talks, or START, agreement to cut offensive weapons by about half without any declared linkage to how each side must conduct research work on defensive systems, according to a senior U.S. official.

For years, Moscow insisted that the START treaty could not be signed until the United States gave up its plan to develop a space-based anti-missile defense system, commonly known as "Star Wars." Then, the

Soviets edged away from that position step-by-step, now they have provided what the U.S. official termed "the important clarification on this long-standing question."

However, Democrats in Congress may still insist on linking the offensive and defensive issues in their continuing effort to curtail the Star Wars program, another U.S. official said. But this official noted that, with or without such linkage, Congress would always have the power to enforce its policy on the program through the budgetary process.

"For its part in the joint attempt to complete new nuclear and conventional arms treaties by the end of the year, the U.S. side brought new proposals on how air-launched cruise missiles should be counted within the total of 6,000 nuclear weapons to which both nations would be limited under a new START agreement.

Essentially, the new U.S. proposal offers a compromise on such issues as missile range and bomber carrying capabilities, U.S. officials said.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Alexander Bessmertnykh said that the new

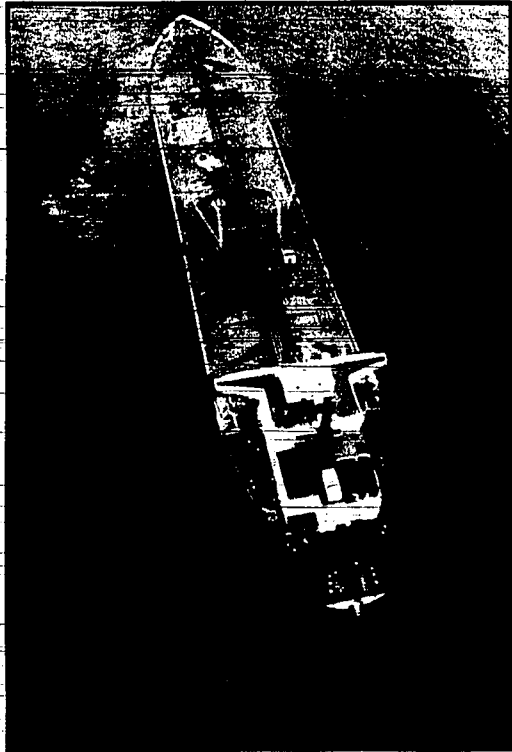
U.S. position on the cruise missiles "could promote the solution to this problem."

The U.S. negotiators also provided new ideas on how to monitor spare and stored missiles that are not deployed, and how to broadcast openly the in-flight data from a missile test so that the other side will be aware of the missile's various characteristics.

"We gave them an awful lot to chew on," another senior U.S. official said. The initial Soviet reaction was positive, he added, and detailed replies were expected before Baker's visit ends Saturday.

Soviet spokesman Gennadiy I. Gerasimov also said that the Soviet side would continue to call for new arms talks to limit naval forces, as well as for limits on sea-launched cruise missiles. The United States is opposed to both.

Baker's team also presented President Bush's new proposal to cut U.S. and Soviet troops on the ground in central Europe to 195,000 for each side, as well as new ideas on how to count aircraft and tanks for any agreement to reduce conventional forces in Europe.

Homeless youths may total 1,800

TWIN FALLS — Those kids in City Park may be doing more than just "hanging out" — they may be scouting for a place to bunk down for the night.

They may be part of a population Carol Clett calls the "hidden homeless."

"In these rural communities there are just so many places to be," Clett, the South Central Community Action Agency's services coordinator, said. "There is the hidden homeless factor in our area that we are trying to help the public understand."

Recently released results from a survey commissioned by Idaho's Education Department showed that an estimated 6,600 children are among Idaho's

homeless — 792 of those children are Magic Valley "residents."

Clett said the numbers don't surprise her.

"We see people without homes almost daily," she said. "And we do serve some very, very young people."

In fact, Clett said she thinks the number of homeless children in the Magic Valley is actually closer to 1,800 — the average of estimates given by local service providers.

"I think the estimates are closer to the truth," Clett said. "Partly because many more children run away from home that may not ever be seen for services."

The South Central agency helped 161 homeless households in 1989, Clett said. Multiply that

Homeless schooling bill before Senate

BOISE — The Idaho Senate will consider a bill today designed to make it easier for a homeless child to go to school. "The sad reality of homelessness has touched Idaho in a very serious way," said state Sen. Mary Lou Reed, Coeur d'Alene, during a Senate floor debate Thursday.

A recent study found there are 4,691 homeless school-aged children in Idaho, Reed said at least 1,600 of those children are not attending school.

"Their families are preoccupied with finding food, housing and jobs," she said.

The purpose of the bill, which was requested by the state Department of Education, is to smooth the way for the child who

has no home address. It eliminates the provision requiring a payment of tuition for homeless students.

The Twin Falls School District hasn't encountered problems with enrolling homeless students. Most are staying with a relative or friend and are able to offer an address, said Dennis Sonius, principal of Morningside Elementary School.

But Sonius, who is also president of the Idaho School Administrators Association, still considers the bill an important step.

The vote on the measure was held for a day in order to iron out a technicality on a second provision that allows school districts to turn down a request for transfer from a student who has been expelled from another school district.

Storage tank 'nightmare' may have an answer

BOISE — The "nightmare" of federal regulations on underground fuel storage tanks has come to Idaho. But the chairman of the House Transportation and Defense Committee says he has an answer for some of the problems.

Rep. John Sessions, R-Driggs, on Thursday unveiled a proposal to create a state insurance fund to cover underground storage tanks. It would allow Idaho companies to

meet tough new federal requirements at a tiny cost instead of spending thousands of dollars for liability insurance.

The measure was explained to committee members Thursday. But Sessions asked no immediate action so minor amendments could be made. The legislation will be presented to the committee again Monday.

Lawmakers, petroleum companies and other retailers have been working for months on the best way to meet new federal Environmental Protection Agency rules on underground fuel storage tanks. The regulations are designed to protect the environment from leaking fuel.

But Sessions and others say the rules could force many retailers out of business. Frank Sattler, spokesman for the Idaho Petroleum Marketing Association, reminded committee members that two years ago he warned the Legislature that the EPA regulations would be a "nightmare" for Idaho gaso-

line retailers. "The nightmare has begun," he said. Sessions' bill proposes a charge of 1 cent per gallon on the first purchaser of gasoline in Idaho, usually a wholesaler or distributor. That would produce \$10-million to \$12 million per year.

The money would go into a fund to provide insurance for qualifying underground fuel storage tanks for \$25 per year. Although not required, insurance coverage also would be extended to home heating fuel tanks at \$5 per year.

The charge would continue until there was \$20 million in the fund. Then it would be discontinued until the fund balance dropped below \$10 million.

The trust fund would cover fuel spill cleanups up to \$2 million. People with the insurance would be responsible for paying the first \$10,000 of the cost of any cleanup. * See TANKS on Page A2

Damaged tanker's oil slick threatens beach

HUNTINGTON BEACH, Calif. (AP) — A drifting oil slick threatened miles of beaches and estuaries Thursday after a tanker apparently was punctured by an anchor and spilled 295,000 gallons of Alaskan crude oil.

Favorable offshore wind held the slick out to sea off this popular Southern California recreational area until afternoon. But the wind then reversed direction and threatened to nudge the goo toward shore.

Oil was spotted as close as a quarter-mile offshore but the bulk was at least 3 miles out to sea.

Calm seas eased clean-up efforts.

"If the weather holds we have a good probability of getting most of the oil," Coast Guard Rear Adm. William Kime told a press conference after an inspection flight. "Every indication is the vessel is no longer leaking oil."

The 811-foot tanker American Trader, which had been fully loaded with 21 million gallons, lay off the coast surrounded by a floating oil containment boom and Coast Guard vessels.

Coast Guard Commandant Adm. Paul Vost said the ship's hull apparently was punctured when it hit something on the bottom as the crew prepared to hook up to an underwater pipeline that carries crude oil to shore. It was unclear if the tanker hit one of its own anchors or a buoy anchor, he said.

The purple slick covered an area measuring 2 1/2 miles by 4 miles, said Coast Guard Lt. Vincent Tompos. Five skimmer boats were at work and four more were en route to the area off the Orange County coastline about 35 miles southeast of Los Angeles.

Several hundred people watched from shore as the sun set behind Santa Catalina Island but there were still no signs of oil on the beach before dark.

Along the shore, booms were laid to protect the environmentally delicate estuaries at the Santa Ana River mouth, Anaheim Bay, Bolsa Chica Wetlands and upper Newport Bay — all teeming with wildlife.

Eighteen oil-soaked seabirds, mostly western grebes, were rescued from the beach and cleaned by volunteers at a life guard headquarters. The count of dead birds totaled eight, said state wildlife biologist Jon Fisher.

Curt Taucher, a Fish and Game spokesman, said there was some initial concern about migrating gray whales but that was not the biggest worry. "The concern is for the furbearing animals, harbor seals, animals like that," he said.

Transportation Secretary Samuel Skinner said in a press release that President Bush would be briefed and that "everything that can be done is being done."

The broad, sandy beach at this city of 180,000 in northern Orange County, plus Bolsa Chica State Beach to the northwest and Huntington State Beach to the south, draw millions of sunbathers and surfers during summer.

Federally mandated alcohol tests given to the ship's captain identified as Robert Laware, the pilot, first mate and second mate all came back negative, the Coast Guard said. Drug test results were in complete.

The American Trader was last boarded by the Coast Guard on Dec. 28 in San Francisco and was found free of violations. Its last certificate of inspection was issued in Honolulu on May 11, 1989.

Idaho wants to know what's been swept under the rug at INEL

TWIN FALLS — The state wants to know what the federal Energy Department may be sweeping under the rug at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

The Federal Energy Department was not lived up to its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act to involve the public in operations at INEL, according to Idaho's 1990 INEL Oversight Plan. The department's lack of compliance may

be hiding environmental consequences of some INEL activities from state and public scrutiny, the plan says. The policy act of 1969 requires federal agencies to complete environmental impact statements for major federal actions affecting the human environment.

Except for major projects, the department has consistently failed to follow federal regulations for activities conducted at INEL, the report alleged. In the past, department's own regulations and guidelines haven't required full compliance with the policy act, including activities at INEL.

"To provide a comprehensive state monitoring and oversight program at INEL, the state and the public must have meaningful opportunity to participate in the NEPA process at INEL," the oversight plan says.

Since a 1977 environmental impact statement on waste management, the department has written statements only for major projects, such as the Special Isotope Separator and the New Production Reactor projects.

An environmental impact statement is the instrument by which the public is informed of and involved in the environmental consequences of planning and decisions on federal

actions.

Breaking projects into smaller segments to avoid compiling an impact statement would violate the spirit and letter of law, the state plan says. A smaller project may not have enough impact to require a detailed assessment.

Steve Hill, state oversight project manager, said he is not aware of any specific cases of this kind of segmentation at INEL. But he would like to see INEL's records of environmental assessments to be sure.

For example, cleanup of individual sites might not require an impact statement by

themselves, but a sitewide cleanup program would require public involvement, he said.

In an attempt to bring INEL into compliance with environmental laws, the Energy Department organized a "NEPA Task Force" at INEL in 1989.

But the task force's report was completed without any state involvement, review or comment. Nor does the report discuss existing deficiencies.

The task force report states that past or completed actions at INEL don't require

Woman loses right to abandoned girl
POCATELLO (AP) — Sixth District Magistrate Dan McDougall has signed an agreement officially terminating Susan McFarland's parental rights to the baby she abandoned in a Pocatello alley last June.

Ms. McFarland, 23, pleaded guilty last year to charges of felony child abandonment involving the baby girl. She is serving an indeterminate 14-year prison term, but was in Pocatello for Wednesday's hearing. Ms. McFarland is pregnant again, with a baby due in June.

Officials angry over unreported spill

LEWISTON (AP) — Water quality officials at Lewiston are concerned that Potlatch Corp. representatives failed to report a spill of up to 10,000 gallons of fuel-like fuel.

Workers were still trying Wednesday to clean the substance from the ground and the internal water system following Tuesday's spill at the Potlatch plant along the Clearwater River.

None of the fuel reached the Clearwater River. Water quality compliance officer George M. Dekan said the environmental division of Potlatch was not aware of the Tuesday afternoon spill until Wednesday morning, and the Department of Health and Welfare Division of Environmental Quality heard of the spill from sources outside Potlatch.

Michael D. Sullivan, a spokesman for Potlatch, said because the oil was contained on Potlatch property, the corporation did not have to report it.

Theater refuses controversial musical

BOISE (AP) — "If 'Oh! Calcutta'" plays in Boise this month, it would be the downtown Egyptian Theatre.

Cineplex Odeon Corp., the Toronto-based chain that owns the Egyptian decided Wednesday not to allow Singer Entertainment Consultants Ltd. to stage the controversial musical comedy in the historic theater.

"A day earlier, Barry Singer, the show's promoter, said a deal had been reached. At the same time, Jan Fasselin, Cineplex Odeon's director of publicity and promotion for Utah and Idaho, said there was no agreement and no contract was set or signed.

"The corporation rejected their proposal, looked at it in the aggregate, weighed all the issues and decided against renting the theater for this production," Fasselin said Wednesday.

Path to appeal cleared in abuse case

BOISE (AP) — A judge has set aside an agreement between the Ada County prosecutor's office and a Boise woman in a sex abuse case, lifting its threat of sentencing the state's appeal of her overturned conviction to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Fourth District Judge Gerald Schroeder ruled Thursday that a charge of lewd and lascivious conduct should be reinstated against Laurie Lee Wright. She earlier agreed with prosecutors to drop a claim of parental rights to the younger of her two daughters in exchange for dismissal of the charges.

Attorney General Jim Jones said Schroeder's decision "means we're back on track with the appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court."

If the dismissal had been allowed to stand, the Supreme Court could have rejected the case as lacking any basis for review.

Single ticket takes millions in lottery

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — A single winner has hit pay dirt in Lotto America, winning Wednesday night's estimated \$5.5 million jackpot, according to lottery officials.

A Lotto America spokesman said a check of lottery computers showed one ticket matched all six numbers drawn Wednesday.

That ticket was purchased somewhere in the District of Columbia, which allows Lotto America sales along with nine states. Officials have given no further details about the winner or which outlet sold the ticket but said that name and location will be released soon.

They said another 36 people matched five numbers to win \$1,022 each and 3,557 tickets matched four numbers to win \$38.

The winning numbers drawn Wednesday were 6, 7, 17, 29, 40 and 44.

St. Anthony mill announces layoffs

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — Employees at the St. Anthony steel mill have been told to expect layoffs, possibly within 60 days, following an announcement reducing the availability of timber sales in the Targhee National Forest.

Officers of Idaho Forest Industries, which owns the St. Anthony mill, met with employees Wednesday to discuss production cutbacks and layoffs. About 160 employees currently operate the mill 80 hours per week.

"The announcement came as a surprise to us," said Tom Worden, Idaho Forest Industries division forester. "We have to evaluate the situation and decide what our options are."

Worden said he was uncertain how many jobs will be lost, but up to 35 positions eventually could be eliminated.

Judge rules for cable firm in tax dispute

LEWISTON (AP) — In a decision with potential impact on the state Tax Commission and a number of other counties, a judge has ruled for TCI Cablevision of Lewiston in a lawsuit against Nez Perce County over an enormous hike in its 1988 property tax bill.

Second District Judge George Reinhardt issued a summary judgment for TCI on Wednesday, ruling that the county was wrong to follow a September 1988 Tax Commission directive to tax the cable TV company's "intangible" property.

That resulted in the assessed taxable value of TCI's Nez Perce County property increasing from less than \$1.1 million in 1987 to more than \$19.5 million in 1988.

Idaho law "clearly and unambiguously provides that intangible personal property is exempt from taxation," Reinhardt said.

He also agreed with TCI's contention that the taxable value of its property should not be assessed based on the company's worth as a "business concern, since that includes such intangibles as management skills, good will, a company's position in the local market or its franchise rights.

"We're delighted, but we're going to be watchful," said Sharon Becker of Boise, Idaho manager for TCI Cablevision. "We don't know yet what this is going to mean for us long-term."

Miners approve contract, raise

WALLACE (AP) — Union miners from four states, including those at the Galena silver mine here, have ratified a three-year contract with Asarco Inc., which includes a \$1.75 hourly pay increase over the next three years.

"This makes the Galena miners the top paid miners in the Silver Valley," said Steve Brown of the United Steelworkers of America in Kalgary.

"We hope the Asarco settlement will set the tone for negotiations at other Silver Valley mines."

The Asarco contract, which affects 171 workers in Wallace, recoups \$1.65-an-hour in wages that the United Steelworkers gave up over the last three years, Brown said.

The Tax Commission has said in the past that the Nez Perce County case, which promised the fullest review, would be critical in deciding legal questions involved in the method of taxing cable TV companies it has ordered county assessors to use.

The commission contends cable operations have been undervalued by more than 90 percent in some cases, and last spring ordered a number of counties to begin using the valuation method it adopted in a directive several months earlier.

Judges earlier ruled in favor of cable companies, but largely on procedural grounds, in lawsuits involving Ada, Canyon and Gooding counties.

TCI Cablevision serves 11 Idaho counties, and Ms. Becker said six have refunded portions of the company's 1988 property tax assessment. She said TCI is crediting the refunds back to its customers.

The refunds so far have totaled almost \$500,000.

Bonneville, Cassia, Minidoka, Fremont, Bingham and Jefferson county have refunded money to TCI, and Bingham and Jefferson have rolled back the company's 1989 tax assessment to 1987 levels, Ms. Becker said.

Judge: Noriega can be tried in U.S.

MIAMI (AP) — Deposed Panamanian dictator Manuel Noriega can be tried in a U.S. criminal court on drug charges in spite of his prisoner of war status, a federal judge ruled Thursday.

U.S. District Judge William Hoelveler brushed aside defense arguments that Noriega must be transferred to his homeland or a third country until an international tribunal determines his status under the Geneva Convention.

"I don't find that under the Geneva Convention I must divest myself of jurisdiction," said Hoelveler. "This court does have jurisdiction to proceed ... and we will."

William Bryson, U.S. deputy solicitor-general, argued the judge has jurisdiction even though the government agreed to Noriega's POW status. He also questioned how Hoelveler could relinquish the case to some institution, such as the Swiss courts.

Rate of AIDS increased slowed in '89

ATLANTA (AP) — The number of new AIDS cases in the United States rose just 9 percent in 1989 — the slowest increase ever — but the disease is spreading faster among heterosexuals, newborns, women and Southerners, federal AIDS specialists reported Thursday.

A total of 35,238 AIDS cases was reported in 1989 by the national Centers for Disease Control, compared with 32,196 reported during 1988. That 9 percent increase is easily the slowest since the spread of AIDS began in the early 1980s. For example, AIDS was up 34 percent in 1988 and 60 percent in 1987.

"This is somewhat of a continuing trend," said Dr. Ruth Berkman, chief of AIDS surveillance for the Atlanta-based CDC. "There has been a leveling in reported cases."

Researchers seeking FBI protection

WASHINGTON (AP) — Scientists who use monkeys, cats, dogs and other animals for research told a House panel Thursday they need FBI protection from vandalism and threats by radical animal rights groups.

Six scientists told the House Energy and Commerce subcommittee on health and the environment that vandalism, theft and harassment have cost millions of dollars and driven young people away from biomedical research. University of Oregon psychology professor Richard Marrocco told of a November 1986 break-in at the university's breeding and holding facility. Burglars took 150 cats, rats, mice, pigeons and rabbits, sprayed painted walls and smashed equipment, and later released videotapes of the animals.

Terrorism threat raised in Europe

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is concerned about the possibility of a terrorist attack against Americans or U.S. facilities somewhere in Europe this weekend by pro-Iranian militants, the State Department said Thursday.

But deputy spokesman Richard Boucher had no specific information about the alleged threat and said the U.S. government was not urging Americans to cancel travel plans to Europe. Instead, travelers are encouraged to be alert to any danger, he said.

Other officials said threat advisory messages have been sent in recent days to U.S. diplomatic posts in Europe and the Middle East.

Bush warned on arms control tactic

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the House Armed Services Committee accused the Bush administration Thursday of using the U.S.-Soviet strategic arms talks as leverage against a Congress skeptical of costly weapons systems.

Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., urged the administration to change its position on including two land-based nuclear missiles and a penetrating bomber such as the B-2 stealth aircraft in the negotiations to limit strategic weapons. The chairman said if the administration fails to change its position, a strategic arms reduction treaty between the United States and the Soviet Union several months from now may allow for far more weapons systems than Congress is willing to fund.

Experts see tax increase, debate how

Knight-Ridder News Service

WASHINGTON — Despite President Bush's "no new taxes" pledge, taxes are all but certain to be raised this year, probably by about \$21.7 billion.

This is the first of what might be called "revelations" regarding the four great certainties regarding federal tax-law changes in 1990. The other three are: That Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan's surprise bid to cut Social Security taxes introduced a

wild card into the tax-code shuffle, one that still complicates this year's bidding. That the second biggest tax debate will be a replay of 1989's partisan wrangle over cutting taxes on capital gains.

That it's too early to know how any major tax proposal will fare, not least because congressional Democrats are split six ways to Sunday, as usual. To be sure, Bush doesn't call his proposals "tax hikes," even though many raise revenues. Instead his

new budget employs such euphemisms as "receipts proposals" and "user fees."

Add them together, however, and Treasury comes out \$21.7 billion richer. And because "no-new-taxes" Bush proposed in that \$21.7-billion figure became a politically safe tax-like goal Democratic budget barons adopted immediately. Only they hope to raise the money by different means.

The same revenue number, but a different revenue mix, is how Jim Sasser, D-Tenn., chairman of the

Senate Budget Committee, put it. House Speaker Tom Foley, D-Wash., saw the Bush budget's bottom line this way: "Revenues are now on the table."

Bush proposes to raise \$15.7 billion from revenues while giving away \$1.8 billion worth of special tax breaks — four of them to the oil and gas industry, ostensibly to encourage drilling — for a net tax hike of \$13.9 billion. He also seeks \$1.6 billion in higher user fees, plus \$1.6 billion from sale of certain government assets.

Moynihan SSI plan criticized

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress' chief economist said Thursday that a proposed reduction in Social Security taxes could worsen inflation while doing nothing to ease the long-range problems of the pension system.

"Because the economy is operating close to its full capacity now, a significant reduction in payroll tax rates without offsetting deficit reductions elsewhere could harm the economy's performance over the next several years," Robert D. Reischauer, director of the Congressional Budget Office, told the Senate Finance Committee.

"No matter what happens to the tax cut proposed by Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., Reischauer said, retirement benefits for future generations will have to be financed out of the goods and services being produced at that time.

"A permanent increase in taxes or reductions in other federal programs appears to be a certainty, since the retirement of the (post-World War II) baby boom will mark the beginning of a permanent increase in the ratio of retirees to workers," he said.

Richard G. Darman, director of the White House Office of Management and Budget, also argued against a Social Security tax reduction—Darman said Moynihan's bill, if it became law, would either worsen next year's deficit by \$55 billion or result in an offsetting tax increase.

Raising other taxes "would hurt the very workers" Senator Moynihan's proposal is ostensibly intended to help," Darman said. "Instead, it would hurt them doubly: first, by jeopardizing their future retirement benefits and second, by taking back in new taxes what it pretended to give in the way of a tax cut."

Darman said the Bush administration agrees with Moynihan that the government should stop using surplus Social Security taxes to make the regular federal deficit appear smaller than it is. But the answer, he said, is the administration's proposal, which would require that surplus Social

Telephone companies get huge penalties

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Communications Commission on Thursday ordered fines totaling \$144 million against New York Telephone Co. and New England Telephone and Telegraph Co. for allegedly improper dealings with an affiliated company and ordered them to refund about \$35 million to customers.

The fine against the two subsidiaries of NYNEX Corp. was the largest federal penalty ever imposed on a telephone company and involved an alleged \$118.5 million in overcharges made to New York Telephone and New England Telephone by Material Enterprises Co., an unregulated NYNEX affiliate established in 1983 to provide equipment and services to the two phone companies.

The action — the maximum allowed under law — was seen as a tough warning to the nation's large regional Bell companies that the FCC is committed to regulating the multibillion-dollar telephone industry.

New York Telephone and New England Telephone each were fined \$709,500. NYNEX has revenues of about \$12 billion annually.

Status of eagle may be changed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Interior Department is considering a proposal to remove the American bald eagle from the endangered list because of "the dramatic growth in the eagle population," officials said Thursday.

The eagle, the nation's symbol that was threatened with extinction in the 1960s partly because of contamination from the pesticide DDT, would remain under protection of federal law, but its status would be lowered, officials said.

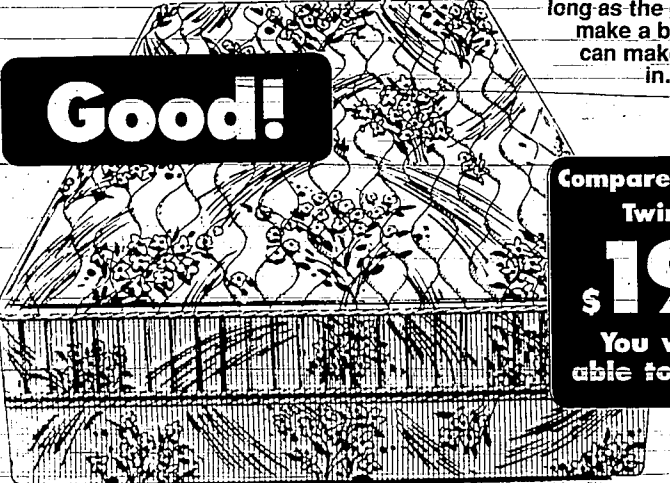
The move would reflect the bald eagle's improved biological status. "We are not considering removing the bald eagle from the protection of the Endangered Species Act," said John Turner, director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Turner said, the agency was gathering additional data on eagle populations before making a formal move.

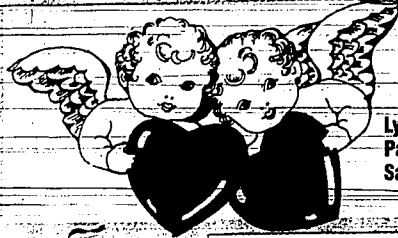

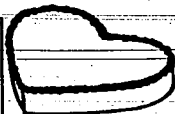

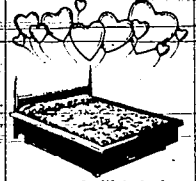

Farm Credit Services seeks \$90 million bailout

TWIN FALLS — The Farm Credit Bank of Spokane will seek \$90 million to \$130 million from a federal government bailout fund soon, the bank's president said Thursday.

The bank also plans to renegotiate or foreclose some \$400 million worth of "non-performing loans," said President Doyle Cook in an interview after the Twin Falls Farm Credit Service's annual meeting.

The federal money would supplement a bank reorganization as it seeks solid

financial ground, Cook said.

The Spokane bank lost \$20 million in the first six months of 1989, Cook said, but the last six months were "much better." The Spokane office supervises lending activities in Idaho, Washington, Oregon, Montana and Alaska.

A key feature of the proposed reorganization is the merger of two organizations under the bank's supervision. When combined, the Interstate Federal Land Bank and the Interstate Production Credit Association would become an Agricultural Credit Association.

The Farm Credit System is the nation's largest agricultural lender. Initially funded

by the Federal government, it is now entirely owned by its borrowers.

In 1987, Congress adopted the Farm Credit Act, restructuring the entire Federal Farm Credit System. Most troubled Farm Credit Banks around the country have already received funds under the act, Cook said.

"We are the last district that needs the assistance that has not received it," he said, adding that no application has been submitted.

Some of the bank's troubles result from \$435 million in "non-performing loans," Cook said. Reorganization will require foreclosing on some of those loans, he said, although he didn't know how many farmers

would be affected.

Foreclosure would result only if delinquent farmers don't start making payments or if they are unable to reach some compromise with the bank, Cook said.

"That (foreclosure) is the last thing we want to do," he said.

Merging the Interstate Production Credit Association and the Federal Land Bank would help the Farm Credit Bank out of its financial squeeze by allowing it to consolidate staff. Loan officers would do double duty providing both short- and long-term lending, Cook said.

Burley infant critical after bone operation

MINNEAPOLIS — Seven-month-old Julie Arthurs of Burley was listed in critical but stable condition Thursday at the University of Minnesota Medical Center after undergoing a bone marrow transplant late Wednesday afternoon.

"The next three weeks will be the most crucial," said Vicki Stewart, a spokeswoman for the Arthurs.

She said the procedure did not involve surgery for Julie and she said the baby is "relatively stable" at the hospital, where she probably will remain for four to six months.

The bone marrow donor was a Maryland resident, but Stewart said he or she will remain anonymous.

Julie suffers from a rare blood disease that has already taken the life of her twin sister. Although the newborn qualified for Medicare, friends and family have been collecting donations to help pay for ancillary expenses. The fund totals about \$30,000 now, according to Stewart.

Eric Joseph Kilborn, 18, who was driving the car, was treated and released. The accident occurred at 11:10 a.m. Wednesday, on 3600 E. just north of 3600 N., according to a Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office accident report. The accident caused \$3,000 damage to the car, the report said, and neither the driver nor the passenger was wearing a seat belt.

The alleged rapes took place on four consecutive days in February 1986.

The woman now lives in Washington. Smith was convicted in 1987 on a separate charge of lewd and lascivious conduct, but he appealed and never served time.

Boise lawyer announces for state attorney general

BOISE — Although the only elected office he has held was on the high school student council, Patrick Kole believes his experience as a deputy attorney general qualifies him to become the state's top lawyer.

Kole announced he would seek the Republican nomination for Idaho attorney general Thursday during a series of press conferences held around the state, including an appearance in Twin Falls.

Kole spent six years as a deputy in the state attorney general's office and three years as an Ada County deputy prosecutor. He currently practices law with a private Boise firm.

He cited his role as a negotiator in the Swan-Falls water rights dispute and Idaho's Crime Victim Bill of Rights as proof of his commitment to the people of this state.

"I have fought for you in the halls of Congress as an advocate," Kole said. "I believe I bring that experience to this job."

A snow storm delayed Kole's arrival in Twin Falls, where a small group of party faithfuls greeted him at the county courthouse. An even larger group waited for Kole at the Ada County Courthouse, where he insisted on going ahead with an outside campaign announcement despite bad weather.

As he stood without a topcoat in a wet

snow storm, Kole promised to continue working to protect Idaho's natural resources.

Idaho's lifeblood is her water, he said. Without water our gardens turn back to desert. Your lawyer must be one who can lead the charge to protect Idaho's water from out-of-state interests.

As attorney general, Kole said he would also lead the fight against drug abuse by strengthening the state's criminal justice system.

Idaho's sheriffs and police must have the best training possible and Idaho's prosecutors must have a friend upon whom they can rely to see their hard-earned convictions upheld on appeal, he said.

On the abortion issue, Kole said he is a Catholic and his views are consistent with his faith. Yet, as attorney general, Kole said his private view would not influence his public view.

Kole has an extensive campaign committee in place in the Magic Valley, including state Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, former Speaker of the House William Lanting and Twin Falls attorney Ed Benoit.

But he could still face a tough Republican primary as Senate President Pro Tem Michael Crapo, R-Idaho Falls, is also looking at the race.

Bannock County Prosecutor Larry Echowalk announced Tuesday he would run for attorney general as a Democrat.

Glenns Ferry backs Old West makeover project

GLENN'S FERRY — The City Council will support an ambitious project by local business men and women to transform Glenns Ferry for part of the year, and maybe year-around, into a Western-style town.

The council voted Wednesday to support the application for a federal grant of up to \$50,000 to give towns "face-lifts." Promoters of the project, headed by the chamber of commerce, envision old-style boardwalks and awnings and merchants dressed in turn-of-the-century garb.

"It's an opportunity to really put the town on the map as a Western-style town," Larry

Heath said Thursday. He said he'd like Glenns Ferry to have the success of Leavenworth, Wash., a town on the eastern edge of the Cascade Mountains that is made over in Bavarian style.

"I watched a dying town become quite a thriving community," Heath said.

Heath and chamber President Rich Willis told the council about the plans. Willis showed a video of what a visitor to Glenns Ferry would see driving into town from Interstate 84 to Three Island Crossing State Park.

The video, which showed some less-than-scenic vistas, was not intended to criticize businesses or homeowners but simply show what visitors see and provide a way for the town to look for

improvements, Willis said.

Heath presented artists' renditions of board sidewalks and Western awnings on downtown businesses.

He said he still needs to determine who would apply for the grant, but said he is optimistic about receiving at least some of the funds, considering Glenns Ferry's grant success in recent years. Also, the council's vote of support will help, he said.

He said he also feels confident the application can be completed by the Feb. 16 deadline, a week from today.

"We think we can get it done," he said. "The grant funds would pay for as much sidewalk and awning materials as they can buy. Local residents will contribute volunteer labor, he said.

The cost of sidewalks and awnings would run \$10-\$15 per foot, Willis said.

Merchants could also dress up on old-style costumes, first during local festivals, such as the re-enactment of the Snake River crossing, and possibly year-around, Heath said.

In other matters, Glenns Ferry Pilot Publisher Don Baak organized Mayor Doyle Messery and other city officials as still supporting locating an aluminum recycling plant on city property.

The location — near Three Island Crossing State Park and a planned waterway — has drawn concern from some local residents over environmental effects.

Messery has not stated he opposes the

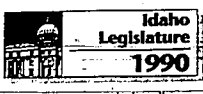
Senate panel approves bills for certifying organic foods

BOISE—The Senate Agricultural Affairs Committee agreed today to introduce a series of bills that would establish state certification for organically grown foods and livestock.

State organic certification will bring credibility and a financial boon to Idaho organic growers and livestock operators, said Rick Ihler, who uses organic methods on his 130-acre farm north of Filer.

"It will make me money and it will make me stronger in my marketplace," Ihler said following the committee hearing. "The



consumer awareness is there." Because Idaho doesn't have a state organic certification program, Ihler and other growers who want to market their product under an organically grown label outside of Idaho must rely on independent evaluators to certify their crops.

The bills, sponsored by state Sen. John Peavey, D-Carey, establish state organic production standards, a state organic certification seal and a five-member state organic advisory

council. The legislation defines organically grown foods as "products grown in Idaho which are produced without the use of synthetically compounded fertilizers, pesticides, or growth regulators for a period of 36 months prior to harvest."

The bills are also designed to protect consumers by establishing civil penalties for anyone who violates rules written for the new program.

The bills will be returned to the Senate committee for a public hearing within the next two weeks before members vote on whether to recommend state organic certification for a full Senate vote.

Hagerman not anxious to give up main water source

HAGERMAN—The City Council is not anxious to change to a new water source, although the matter is not settled.

The city will ask for advice from an engineer and City Attorney Craig Hobday, council members decided Tuesday after a workshop to discuss proposed selling or trading of Potter Springs, the city's main water supply.

Last month, rancher Donnie McFadden offered to buy the city's claim to Potter Springs or trade for it with comparable shares he has in other springs. He said he wants to get rid of the city's pipeline across his land.

Hagerman's options to replace this water supply are to drill a well, pump water from Big Springs—the city's supplemental water source—or use water from another, smaller spring.

But it's unlikely the city will give up its gravity-flow water from Potter Springs, Mayor-Owlesley said.

"We've had too many people say, 'Don't sell water,'" he said.

Owlesley said he is not interested in a well and Councilman Rolly Zollinger agreed, saying the project would cost \$100,000.

Don Martindale, who attended the workshop and council meeting with her husband, Stanley, said she disagrees with McFadden's contention that the proposed purchase or trade will benefit the city.

"I'm always wary of someone trying to do us a favor," she said.

In other matters, Martin-Werth of Filer told the council about bicycle tours he's trying to organize in the Hagerman area.

Groups from Boise-State University and various outdoor clubs would be enjoying riding in this area, he said, and all they need is an excuse to come to Hagerman Valley.

Owlesley said the city would appreciate having local bike tours.

Council members agreed, promising city support and saying the riders could gather at the city park.

Werth told the council he is asking for public support from the city rather than for money.

Cycling is a popular sport, he said, and a tour would draw in plenty of riders.

There would be no charge to participate and sponsors or private donors could cover the cost of maps and signs along the route.

A 40-mile loop ride could take in scenic springs, parks, bridges, horsehires and viewpoints, Werth said.

Doctor: Uranium mine risks were known

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government knew of the lung-cancer risk to Southwestern uranium miners long before steps were taken to lessen exposure, a former Public Health Service epidemiologist said Thursday.

In testimony before the Senate Committee on Labor and Human Resources, Dr. Victor E. Archer said the Atomic Energy Commission, mining interests and state officials blocked measures to protect miners.

Archer testified at the behest of Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, author of legislation that would compensate

victims of radiation exposure through uranium mining from 1947-1971 or above-grade nuclear tests at the Nevada test site in the 1950s and '60s.

"The level of their exposure was, in large part, due to the government's unconscionable failure to properly care for or warn these victims," Hatch said.

Duncan Holaday, an industrial hygiene engineer with the health service, proposed in 1952 and 1953 that a maximum radon exposure limit be set and that it be enforced through mine ventilation, Archer

said.

The safety measures would have cost a nickel per pound of uranium, he said.

The proposal was rejected by the Atomic Energy Commission, mine operators and the uranium mining states, Archer said. The AEC later became the Energy Department.

"The AEC disclaimed responsibility — they were not responsible for radiation protection until after the ore reached the mills," he said. "The Mine operators rejected it because it would cost them too much to ventilate."

Panel earmarks \$4.8 million of surplus to pay fire bill

BOISE (AP) — A major chunk of the record cash surplus has been diverted to pay for last year's huge forest-fire bill as legislative budget writers took their first step toward formulating a new state spending blueprint.

On a 16-7 vote Thursday, the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee earmarked nearly \$4.8 million of the state surplus to pay the bill run up during last year's devastating fire season.

The amount was a compromise



that likely will still fall at least \$500,000 short of the current estimate of the actual costs the state incurred in battling the fire storm that swept over 200,000 acres of forest and range, causing more than \$100 million in losses.

The state's share of the bill was estimated at between \$5.5 million and \$6.3 million, one of the largest single-year outlays for firefighting ever.

But it was small, compared to the \$40 million the federal government spent to battle the blazes that destroyed much of the town of Lowman.

The allocation approved by the committee was offered as a compromise between one bloc that wanted to pay only the bills the state

has already received and verified, and another ready to provide money to pay the entire amount once it was finally calculated.

It was the third allocation from the \$126 million surplus by the committee.

A day earlier the panel approved nearly \$2 million for the Corrections Department to open a work camp in St. Anthony and pay counties for their costs in housing state prison inmates in their jails pending room for them in the prison system.

The debate over just how much of the surplus should be devoted to fire-suppression costs revealed an apparent concern among budget writers that they take a conservative approach to spending, despite the extremely bright financial outlook for the state.

Senate Finance Chairman Atwell Barry, R-Metco, says the disposition of the remaining surplus, estimated now at about \$113 million, will be decided next week.

He and other legislative leaders want that one-time money completely committed before they begin writing the new spending plan for the year that begins in July.

The House-Senate panel, however, did make its first decision on the shape of the 1991 budget, agreeing to a 3.5 percent inflation factor for state agency operations.

That will mean the cost of simply maintaining current state programs at their present level for another year will be just under \$2.6 million.

Privacy abortion resolution clears hurdle

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Legislature has six abortion bills to consider, but the number could nearly double by the weekend, as the House State Affairs Committee works on more abortion measures.

A resolution proposing an amendment to the Idaho Constitution to insert a "right to privacy," and presumably the right to have an abortion if one so chooses, was approved for introduction by the panel on Thursday.

"One of the fundamental building blocks of a free society is the right of privacy.

"Modern society increasingly encroaches upon that basic human right," said sponsor Sen. Mari Calabretta, D-Osburn.

"Idahoans don't want government unnecessarily judging their lives," she said.

"This amendment makes explicit, secure and meaningful the fundamental constitutional right of privacy," she said.

If approved by the committee and two-thirds of the members of the House and Senate, the proposed constitutional amendment would be put before the voters in the November general election.

Rep. Pam Bengson, R-Boise, said at least eight hours of public hearings would be held on all the abortion bills.

Under an agreement between anti-abortionists and pro-choice supporters all bills on abortion will be printed and introduced.

Public hearings are scheduled at Boise State University Feb. 19-20 in a room which will hold 600 people.

Two bills have been introduced in the Senate but will be held pending action in the House.

Four other abortion bills have been introduced in State Affairs,

ranging from a proposal from Myron Jones, R-Mald, that would outlaw all abortions unless the mother's life was directly threatened, to a bill from Rep. Gary Robbins, D-Dietrich, that would wipe out Idaho criminal laws against abortion.

The Calabretta amendment suggests amending the Idaho Constitution to say, "every person has the right to be left alone and free from governmental intrusion into his or her private life except as otherwise provided in the Constitution of the state of Idaho."

Panel passes bill sending lottery profits to schools

BOISE (AP) — Legislation guaranteeing all Idaho school districts a share of the profits from the Idaho Lottery has won its way out of a House committee and will come before the full House for a final vote.

Profits from the new lottery now are earmarked for two state funds. The Permanent Building Fund finances state construction projects. The School Construction Account is designed to give school districts grants up to 25 percent of the cost of new buildings.

Rep. James Storch, D-Sandpoint, wants to divert the estimated \$7.7 million now headed for the construction account on July 1 directly to all school districts.

"That way, every district will get something, every year. It's a steady source of funding," he said.

According to a report prepared by the Department of Education for Storch, districts would divide \$7.7 million this way:

- Boise, \$682,119; Meridian, \$495,598; Pocatello, \$471,035; Snake River, \$89,282; Blackfoot, \$174,677; Idaho Falls, \$347,835; Bonneville, \$271,676; Nampa, \$277,024; Caldwell, \$150,526; Cassia, \$181,223; Mountain Home, \$111,114; Fremont County, \$110,867; Jefferson County, \$140,687; Coeur d'Alene, \$203,474; Post Falls, \$108,236; Moscow, \$88,683; Minidoka County, \$179,194; Lewiston, \$135,835 and Twin Falls \$275,038.

Temporarily by the prospect of extra money for their local school districts, members of the House State Affairs Committee on Thursday voted down an attempt to sidetrack the bill into the House Education Committee, then voted a "do pass"

recommendation to the full House.

"I like this bill. I want to vote on it," said Rep. Joan Wood, R-Rigby. "If it goes to the Education Committee, I may never get a chance."

That prompted Chairman Rep. Pam Bengson, R-Boise, to note, "It's rather amusing that all the counties that voted against the lottery now are fighting hardest to get the money."

New rules pending before the State Board of Education will allocate money in the school construction fund according to a formula weighted with a district's past effort to raise money, tax load, classroom size. Any district found to have a "serious and substantial need" for state funding could qualify for more in the fund.

Storch said that could help only a few school districts a year. He argued it would be better to give all districts help with school facilities, which in essence would be a \$7.7 million tax cut because districts could lower their plant facilities levies.

"This could be a tax relief bill. It could allow significant capital expansion in districts and help cut the size of school classes. If you are going to lower class size, you've got to have more room available," said Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Deer, supporting the Storch bill.

Rep. Freeman Duncan, R-Coeur d'Alene, failed in an effort to get the bill sent to the Education Committee.

"It is not a lottery bill. It is an education bill," he said.

He said the concept of channeling lottery proceeds into the school construction fund, which is new, should be given a chance to work.

House nods 8 percent pay raise for judges

BOISE (AP) — With limited opposition, the Idaho House has granted Idaho's judges an 8 percent pay raise starting July 1.

The measure was approved by a 53-29 vote and sent to the Senate. Some members objected to a two-year pay bill, since if the measure becomes law, judges also will get a 5 percent raise on July 1, 1991.

The bill boosts the top judicial salaries in Idaho, for the five Supreme Court justices, to nearly \$75,000 by July of 1991.

"We can afford to have a lot of

good judges in this state, but we cannot afford to have bad ones," said Rep. Jim Hansen, D-Boise. Hansen, a lawyer, was one of several legislator-lawyers backing the bill.

Chief sponsor Rep. Gary Montgomery, R-Boise, told House members part of the reason such large increases were granted was that prior to 1985, for three years judges received no raises.

"We have to play catch up a little bit," said Montgomery. "It is a reasonable salary range in relation to others in our state and the

surrounding region."

A non-lawyer, Rep. Don Loveland, R-Boise, chairman of the Judiciary, Rules and Administration Committee, also favored the legislation.

"I think there has been more improvement made in the judicial system in the last 10 years," said Loveland.

"I am pleased with the quality of the men and women we are putting on the bench."

"I'm just sorry that they have to

come over here (to the Legislature) with that in hand asking for a pay increase. They're worth it," Loveland said.

Rep. Maek-Neibaur, R-Paul, objected to legislation committing the Legislature to two years of pay increases.

"We don't know what we might be faced with next year. Maybe we won't have a big surplus."

"They knew what they were getting into when they took the jobs. We should fund one year only," said Neibaur.

Bill lets counties bill inmates
BOISE (AP) — Legislation allowing counties to bill inmates for the cost of their incarceration has cleared the Idaho Senate.

Without opposition on Thursday, the Senate sent the House the bill to permit a charge of up to \$30 a day for inmates capable of paying for their imprisonment.

Sponsor Marguerite McLaughlin, D-Orofino, said the plan has been used by other states and provides a method of easing the burden on local property owners.

With the costs of jails rising, Mrs. McLaughlin said some financing alternatives need to be found, and other members said the inmate assessment offered an innovative option.

measures in the package provide for direct payments to the state when the health and Welfare Department has provided emergency assistance, and allow the state to seek modifications of support orders.

Still pending in the package are bills allowing immediate withholding of delinquent payment from paychecks and from lottery winnings over \$600.

Senate passes day-care measure
BOISE (AP) — Licensed day-care centers will have to have at least one adult on duty who is certified in first aid and cardio-pulmonary resuscitation under legislation approved by the Idaho Senate.

The bill was overwhelmingly approved on Thursday and sent to the House for final action.

Backers maintained that CPR training is easily attainable, and a person certified in first aid and CPR would only further protect the health of the thousands of Idaho children in day-care centers around the state.

Senate backing child support
BOISE (AP) — Four pieces of a legislative package intended to beef up collection of delinquent support payments has won approval from the Idaho Senate.

With little debate on Thursday, the chamber forwarded to the House bills making it easier for the state to collect payments, ordered for spousal support and public assistance reimbursement as well as child support. Other

Union dues effort hits a snag
BOISE (AP) — Legislation aimed at barring school districts from paying labor organization dues for teachers as part of labor contracts has run into serious problems in the Senate Education Committee.

After a two-hour hearing on the measure sponsored by Chairman Jerry Thorne, R-Nampa, a majority of the panel appeared to oppose the bill as presented.

Currently, only the Boise School District pays the labor organization dues of teachers, but Thorne said the ban after it became an issue in teacher negotiations last fall in Nampa. Although the school board won that round, Thorne said it was important to remove the issue as a potential contract stumbling block in the future.

Equal school salaries considered
BOISE (AP) — Rep. Richard Adams, D-Grandville, wants the Idaho Legislature to adopt a law stipulating that all Idaho school teachers will be paid the same salaries, starting at a base of \$17,500 per year.

The House Education Committee on Thursday voted printing and introduction of the measure. It will return to the panel for later consideration.

The Legislature has been thinking about changing the formula used to distribute state funds to local school districts.

Pro-democracy politicians urge deeper Soviet reforms

Reforms in the Soviet Union

- July 1986:** Communist Party Central Committee says local parliaments will take more responsibility.
- June 1987:** First experimental multicandidate elections held in some local districts.
- June 1988:** Special party conference approves sweeping political reform, promising shift of power from party to government and a new legal system. Totalitarianism is rejected. Gorbachev suggests each local party leader should seek and win election to the corresponding government post.
- Oct. 1988:** Constitutional amendments proposed to change the rubber stamp parliament to a real, nearly full-time legislature and provide for multicandidate elections.
- March 1989:** First multicandidate election for parliament results in humiliating defeats for dozens of Communist leaders across the country.
- May 1989:** First Congress of People's Deputies opens, and new parliamentarians overwhelm the nation with their critical speeches.

- July 1989:** Soviet Union's first parliamentary opposition, the Inter-Regional Group, takes form.
- Dec. 1989:** Lithuania approves multiparty system on its territory; later in the month, Lithuanian Communists create first split in the party by voting to break off and form independent Communist Party.
- Jan. 13, 1990:** Gorbachev, on a visit to Lithuania, drops his opposition to a multiparty system.
- Jan. 21, 1990:** Reform Communists meet in Moscow to write alternative party platform and threaten to split off into a new party unless reforms are made.
- Feb. 4, 1990:** Hundreds of thousands march through Moscow to demand democratic reform.
- Feb. 7, 1990:** Communist Party officials, at a three-day Central Committee meeting, agree to a platform presented by President Mikhail S. Gorbachev calling for abolition of the Party's constitutional guarantee of power.

MOSCOW (AP)—Communist maverick Boris N. Yeltsin and progressive activists said Thursday the party's decision to renounce its legal claim on power is not enough to end Soviet political repression and centralized control.

"It is necessary to eliminate (Communist) party organizations in the army, the police, the KGB, the courts, in all the state institutions," said Yuri Mityunov, a spokesman for one would-be opposition party, the Democratic Union.

Yeltsin was the sole member of the party's policy-making Central Committee to oppose the political reforms Wednesday. He said they failed to go far enough.

"I had grounds to vote against. But I think," however, that the platform represents if not a step then a half-step forward, and that Ligachev, a leading conservative, lessens the tension before the (party) Congress," he said in an interview in his office near the Kremlin.

He recommended the formation of a second party if the Communist Party fails to excise conservatives at the Congress to be held in early summer.

Yeltsin was a keynote speaker at the largest pro-democracy rally in decades at the foot of Red Square last Sunday. Several hundred thousand people rallied and demanded the party abandon its guaranteed leading role in Soviet society.

The Central Committee meeting that ended Wednesday, the party did just that, approving President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's party platform that calls for revoking the party's constitutional guarantee in favor of a multiparty system where Communists would have to compete for power.

"The discussion was very hot. The proposals were diametrically opposed. It was not easy," Yeltsin said, gesturing expansively before departing to take the midday political temperature among activists in Leningrad.

Mityunov said pressure for reform is now moving to the streets and pointed to the growing number of incidents of angry crowds across the Soviet Union demanding the ouster of hard-line local Communist leaders.

Party secretaries in Volgograd, Tyumen, Chernigov and Sverdlovsk were removed in recent weeks, and activists said 6,000 people gathered in front of the party headquarters in Donetsk on Wednesday with a similar demand.

Reformers in Saratov plan to rally Sunday to demand removal of their party leaders.

The main television news program Vremya showed another rally in Donetsk on Thursday with people demanding the resignation of Politburo member Yegor K. Ligachev, a leading conservative. The TV commentator said the majority of people at the rally supported Gorbachev.

Yeltsin said the party must reform itself, but the current strength of conservatives in the Central Committee, to which he belongs, complicates the task.

He declined to say what percent of the vote he thought the Communist Party would win if there were free elections now.

"The transition to a multiparty system is just a question of time," he said. "It is inevitable and necessary. We should use all chances still to renew the party so that it will have a democratic basis. We should try this chance."

The party Congress will vote on the party platform and has the power to change the Central Committee.

Yeltsin said the platform, which has yet to be made available to the public, contained outdated language and failed to endorse radical measures he said are needed to undo the economic chaos created by seven decades of central planning.

S. African police battle blacks protesting English cricket tour

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP)—Police used tear gas and clubs Thursday to disperse hundreds of blacks protesting a tour by an English cricket team that defied an anti-apartheid boycott.

A cabinet minister said continuing unrest is proleaving South Africa's state of emergency and said threats against Nelson Mandela from left- and right-wing extremists are among the factors delaying the ANC leader's release from prison.

"We want to ensure he walks out of that prison a free man and lives safely in this country as a free citizen," Law and Order

Minister Adriaan Vlok told a news conference in Cape Town.

In the township of Alexandra, police arrested at least six blacks, saying they had commandeered minibuses to transport protesters to the nearby cricket grounds despite a magistrate's ban on demonstrations.

Police stopped all minibuses and most cars leaving the township, removing any youths they found on their way to the five-day test match between the English visitors and South Africa's national team.

A crowd of 2,000 people, mostly students, then assembled at an intersection and were "dispersed peacefully" after tear gas was used, police said.

A local anti-apartheid group, the Alexandra Civic Organization, claimed some would-be protesters were beaten and that 30 were injured.

The English team is defying a ban on sports contacts with South Africa, designed to protest South Africa's system of racial segregation.

Police said eight journalists covering the confrontation were briefly detained when they refused to obey an order to leave the area.

Jesse Jackson visits black S. African township

SOWETO, South Africa (AP)—The Rev. Jesse Jackson told hundreds of people in this impoverished black township Thursday that the struggle to win civil rights from the white-led government has inspired hope around the world.

Touring Soweto on the second day of his visit to South Africa, the black U.S. civil rights leader walked down streets of ramshackle squatters' huts, stopped at a day-care center, visited the home of African National Congress leader Walter Sisulu and spoke at a meeting of township teachers.

At the Orlando Home and Creech, a day-care center for Soweto children, Jackson took preschool children on his knee and posed for pictures under a banner reading, "Welcome Baba Jesse Jackson... We love you very, very much."

"Baba," or father, is a term of respect.

Earlier, echoing speeches he made on the campaign trail during the 1988 presidential election, Jackson roared to youths gathered outside Sisulu's home: "Keep your head high! Keep hope alive!"

Sisulu had Jackson for tea at the white-washed "stucco house" he returned to in October after 25 years in prison.

An ANC flag fluttered on a swaying staff over the house.

Outside, a crowd of 100 people sang and chanted.

Jackson, emerging arm in arm with Sisulu, cheerfully joined in the dancing, then stood quietly as Sisulu led the singing of "God Bless Africa," the hymn black nationalists hope will one day become South Africa's national anthem.

Experts fear German money union

BONN, West Germany (AP)—Rather than calming fears of economic collapse in East Germany, Chancellor Helmut Kohl's advocacy of one currency for East and West Germany has created worries about continued prosperity at home.

Economists and investors have reacted negatively to Kohl's proposal for swift introduction of the West German mark in East Germany, whose own mark is not convertible.

Some accuse him of trying to boost his chances in the December elections.

Fear that taking over the East's nearly bankrupt system would endanger the West German economy drove bond prices down Thursday for the third straight day. The mark has dropped 10 points against the weak U.S. dollar in two days.

Kohl said Wednesday a Cabinet committee was drafting plans for union with East Germany, including a common currency.

By making the strong Deutschmark the official currency of East Germany in return for free-market reforms, the worries go, Bonn would in effect be taking on the economic weight of its eastern hybrid and destabilizing it among prosperous West Germans through higher taxes.

More marks would have to be printed, adding to the money supply and forcing interest rates up.

Higher rates would slow the West German investment boom that is supposed to bankroll the eastern bailout.

Experts see monetary union as a necessary step toward East Germany's economic recovery and eventual integration with West Germany in a single state.

Central bank president Karl Otto Poehl and others, however, feel transition to a convertible currency for East Germany must be gradual, a companion of economic reform rather than its catalyst.

Providing East Germans with a

currency of value before they have anything at home to buy might even make the economic imbalance between the two countries worse, economists contend.

"Without that economy being given a chance to acquire a more efficient status, currency union would just mean having had money drag down good money," Liane Lauthardt, a senior economist with Commerzbank in Frankfurt, told The Associated Press.

She accused Kohl of "irresponsible" blatant engineering in proposing swift conversion of "saying what he thinks the people want to hear."

East Germany's economic disaster has become a West German problem even without monetary union because huge numbers of East German emigres strain social services, job markets and the public's patience.

Finance Minister Theo Waigel acknowledged that speedier efforts toward monetary union were intended to give East Germans confidence in their future.

Radicals blamed for attack

CAIRO, Egypt — Egyptian authorities believe that a radical Palestinian offshoot group not connected to any known terrorist organization was responsible for the bloody attack on an Israeli tour bus this week, security sources said Thursday.

Intelligence analysts believe that radical dissidents, probably

from the Israeli-occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip, perhaps former members of the well-known Abu Nidal group or the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command, were the most likely perpetrators of the attack that left at least nine Israeli tourists dead.

It would also signal growing resentment among Palestinian radicals.

Kohl seeks to allay Soviet uncertainty

WEST BERLIN (AP)—Chancellor Helmut Kohl will tell Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev this weekend that he need not worry about Soviet security interests as the Germans move closer to reunification, officials said Thursday.

Kohl plans to fly to Moscow on Saturday to discuss German reunification with Gorbachev. On Feb. 24, Kohl heads for Camp David for similar discussions with President Bush.

The United States has voiced support for German reunification as long as it occurs in an orderly way and does not threaten European stability.

But the Soviets, recalling the bitter experiences of World War II, continue to express reservations about the possibility of a unified German nation.

Kohl's visit to Moscow is designed to allay those fears. He will be accompanied by Foreign Minister Hans-Dietrich Genscher.

Kohl and Genscher plan to

assure the Soviet leadership in personal conversations that they are serious about their repeated assurances that Moscow's security interests will be taken into account during the process of uniting both German states, a government source in Bonn said.

Kohl and Genscher also plan to assure Gorbachev and other Soviet officials that the one-in-two West wants to use the reform process in the former East bloc to gain political power or to extend the reach of NATO eastward, another government source said.

The sources spoke to The Associated Press on condition of anonymity.

East Germany has long been the Soviet Union's most important ally, as it is the Warsaw Pact's front-line country facing West Germany. If a united Germany became a NATO member, that would move the Western alliance much closer to the Soviet Union's frontiers.

NATO has about 255,000 troops in West Germany, most of them Americans.

Militants kill 2 Indian soldiers

SRINAGAR, India (AP)—Moslem militants armed with automatic rifles shot and killed two unarmed paramilitary soldiers on Thursday in Srinagar, the flashpoint of a violent separatist campaign, officials said.

Witnesses said a cigarette vendor also was killed in the attack, which occurred outside the vendor's kiosk in the Chanchpora suburb of the city. A bystander was injured, said the

witnesses, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The deaths brought to 81 the number of people killed since Jan. 20 in clashes between security forces and Moslem militant fighting for secession of the Moslem-dominated Kashmir region from Hindu-majority India.

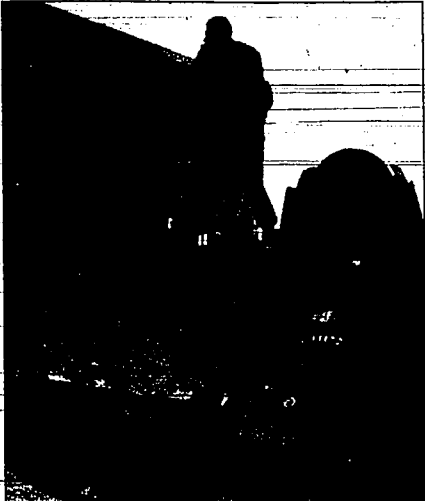
Most victims have been protesters shot while defying a curfew imposed Jan. 20.

Lebanese Christians flee from battle zone

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Hundreds of Christians fled to the relative safety of Moslem west Beirut during a full Thursday in the deadly war for supremacy between Christian Gen. Michel Aoun and militia chieftain Samir Geagea. Snipers continued firing on both sides, but their bullets seemed a small danger to people who had spent a week or more in underground shelters while shells and rockets smashed homes, hospitals, schools and power stations.

"I don't want to be there when all hell breaks loose again," said Hayat Labaki, 35, a secretary who left Christian east Beirut on Thursday, the 10th day of the battle, to stay with friends in the Moslem sector.

"The combatants didn't have any mercy on civilians," she said. "I spent nine days in the basement trembling and wondering whether I'd be alive when the battle ended. I don't want to die."

She said her parents would not leave Ashrafyah, a stronghold of Geagea's Lebanese Forces militia, which has 6,000 regulars and an estimated 30,000 reservists.

Ms. Labaki's eyes brimmed with tears as she said: "The apartment is all my parents have. It was hit by bullets, but it's still standing. They want to stay with it."

Then she entered west Beirut at the Museum crossing, the only open gateway to the no man's land that draws a sectarian line through the city.

Many other Christians crossed to buy food and water, and hospital officials went in search of blood supplies and medicine. Civilians have mingled peacefully on both sides of the line throughout the 15-year-old sectarian civil war.

Both Aoun's and Geagea's forces left their big guns silent Thursday in a battle that has killed at least 373 people and wounded 1,680, many of them civilians, since Jan. 30. The battle is for control of the 310-square-mile enclave north and east of Beirut where 1 million Christians live, but the casualties include Moslems killed or wounded by shells that strayed into west Beirut.

Police said Geagea and Aoun, who has been dismissed as army commander but still commands the left of nearly 20,000 Christian troops, were reinforcing their positions and resupplying their men with ammunition, weapons and food.

They said a first lieutenant in Aoun's army was killed by a sniper in the Dora district of east Beirut, and St. Joseph hospital said seven civilians wounded earlier in the week died Thursday. Five people were reported wounded by snipers in east Beirut.

Aoun, with a bulletproof vest under his camouflaged jacket, made a morale-boosting tour of strategic hills, his troops seized from the militia this week at Dbye, north of Beirut.

His Tele Liban television station showed Aoun in a dark blue beret, flanked by a dozen heavily armed bodyguards, talking to officers beside a demolished Lebanese Forces structure in Dbye.

The 54-year-old general rarely leaves his bunker beneath the shattered residential palace in Baabda, a Christian suburb east of Beirut.

'Women on the Verge' a good-humored farce

TWIN FALLS — Its title suggests despair, but "Women on the Verge of a Nervous Breakdown" — the fourth feature of the 1990 Foreign Film Festival — should have its share of lighter moments.

Describing the 1988 comedy by Spanish director Pedro Almodovar, festival committee member Mark Grefenson says it is "a farce about women driven to madness, suicide and murder by men."

Pepa (Carmen Maura) and Ivan (Pepi Quintero) are actors who make their living dubbing films. After a long-term relationship living together in Pepa's apartment, Ivan calls up out of the blue and leaves a message on Pepa's answering machine telling her he's leaving.

Pregnant and miserable at being jilted in such a crass manner, Pepa reacts violently — but theatrically — and starts to hunt Ivan down. Along the way, she becomes involved with a variety of zany characters and discovers secrets about loneliness, madness ... and Ivan.

The film won the Best Screenplay award at the 1988 Venice Film Festival and has helped secure Almodovar's reputation as a leading Spanish filmmaker.

Knight's appointment was announced this week by Marilyn Sabella, Idaho Commission on the Arts chairwoman.

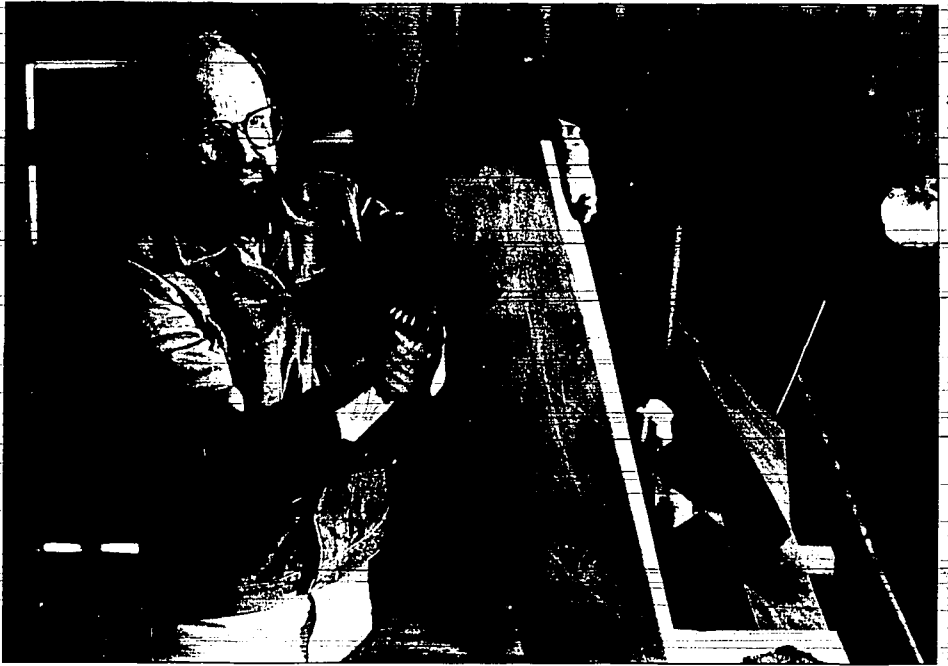

Sculptor Rod Kagan finds Idaho gives him the quiet and peace he needs to create

Gala, glitter award recipients

BOISE — Idaho has given Governor's Awards in the Arts since 1970, but this year's class of recipients is basking in a brighter spotlight than usual because of the state's Centennial.

The 17 awards — medallions made of Idaho silver — will be presented by Gov. Cecil Andrus tonight in a glittering gala at the Morrison Center for the Performing Arts. Four of the medals are going to people from southern Idaho, the most from any area outside Boise.

Among those winning awards: Aldrich Bowler of Bliss and Roger and Margaret Vincent of Filer, all honored for their work in support of the arts, and Kjetilum sculptor Rod Kagan, who is one of five recipients of awards for excellence in the arts.

Another winner has ties to the area: Donald H. Swinney, who grew up in Richfield, will receive one of three Centennial Homecoming awards. He is now a professor at Hofstra University in New York and a consultant for theaters across the nation.

Sun Valley actress Ann Sothern will be host of the awards ceremony. A variety of performers will be featured, too, including the Boise Philharmonic, which will be premiering a Centennial Overture written by McCall composer Jim Gockley.

The public is welcome to attend the 7:30 p.m. event. Tickets are \$10. Portions of the show will be televised live throughout the state over Idaho's Public Broadcasting System starting at 8 p.m. In addition, a poster commemorating the awards is available at Larson Arts in Twin Falls.

Following are profiles — area winners of the 1990 Governor's Awards:

ALDRICH BOWLER

Much of what he has done during his long and productive career could qualify Drich Bowler for his Governor's Award for support of the arts.

But it was the Antique Festival Theater that Bowler believes is his most lasting legacy. The troupe — begun in 1964 by Bowler, his wife, Di, and Paul Kliss — started as a summer theater, performing on the weekends at the Ramona in Buhl.

The semiprofessional company, which employed student

children's workshops, Bowler, a former high school teacher in Bliss and Buhl, also has a high profile this Centennial year as host and narrator of a 13-part series on Idaho history that will air on the state's public television stations.

Nevertheless, Bowler says he was surprised to learn of his award. "I was humbled," he notes.

Bowler, 74, says he's seen great growth in Idaho's support of the arts. He was appointed in 1965 by former Gov. Robert Smylie to the first Idaho Commission on the Arts, and he helped begin the Idaho Arts Association in the 1950s.

"The endowments and commission do well with the money they have" and the state's business community has come out strongly in support of the arts, especially the performing arts, says Bowler.

Nevertheless, artists constantly face financial dilemmas. Bowler says he well recalls trying to fund scholarships for his student actors and beating the streets in search of advertisers for the Antique Festival Theater's playbills.

Bowler's plans for the future include re-marrying: He and Trudi Perrine plan a spring wedding. And once he's finished the "television" tapings, he's hoping to spend some time with his craft. "I'm still a potter," he says.

scholarship actors from all over the United States, went on the road in 1969. In the spirit of the times, the troupe traveled in an old school bus. Shakespeare and Moliere were mainstays of the repertoire, although the company did contemporary plays, too.

It was the promise of great living and proximity to a brother in Montana that first drew Rod Kagan from his family's butcher shop in New Jersey to life in Idaho.

"I didn't have anything to do," recalls Kagan, now 49, of his early days in Idaho. But he knew how to weld, and he taught himself to sculpt. A commercial welding business helped pay the bills while Kagan built his reputation as a sculptor; today, he is a full-time artist, working in a studio he built north of Ketchum.

Kagan has won a wide variety of commissions in the past decade. He has designed bronze memorials for the Wilshire Boulevard Temple in Los Angeles. Three of his sculptures were featured in Architectural Digest magazine. His works are in private collections from New York to California.

He has been featured in one-man shows from the Herrett Museum in Twin Falls to galleries in Seattle and Los Angeles. He is particularly noted for totems and columns, and his work was selected for inclusion in a 1983 Smithsonian Institute exhibition of Idaho art.

Kagan was in Arizona delivering a sculpture when the letter came informing him of his Governor's Award. In fact, he says one drawback of being an Idaho artist — particularly one working in a large medium — is the state's remoteness.

But Kagan takes it in stride. "On the side, I'm a truck driver," he says, laughing. He usually completes his work in Idaho before transporting it to the buyer, although one commis-

sion — two 50-foot steel columns for Owen Industries in Omaha, Neb. — was built on site due to its size.

Kagan is happy with the supportive atmosphere for artists in Idaho. "The state is doing more and more each year," he says. "The arts commission is doing a terrific job."

Idaho's population growth will help the state's artists, he notes. Sun Valley's popularity as a tourist destination means more people will be visiting and going to galleries in the area. And Kagan himself remains pleased with his adopted home state.

"The life is wonderful," he says. "I have the peace and quiet to create. It's a great place."

ROGER AND MARGARET VINCENT

Forty years ago, there was very little arts activity in the Magic Valley. "People were hungry for anything cultural," says Roger Vincent who, with his wife, Margaret, has won a Governor's Award for support of the arts.

The Vincents believe people need to take responsibility for their

cultural life. So they got busy.

Today, they are being honored for their efforts in helping start many Magic Valley arts institutions: the Dilettantes, Magic Valley Chorale, Northwest Opera Association, and the Summer Music Camp at the College of Southern Idaho. The couple also were instrumental in raising funds to build CSI's Fine Arts Auditorium.

Although the Vincents are farmers by trade, working 1,000 acres in the Filer area, music has been the spice of their lives and their 40-year marriage.

Roger, now 65, spent eight seasons, from 1969 through 1977, touring with The Sorcerers, a classical male quartet that traveled under the auspices of the Community Concert Association.

Margaret, 59, taught piano for 35 years and is now close to earning her bachelor's degree from Boise State University, where she is studying piano and pedagogy with Madeline Hsu and David Parkinson.

All six of their children are accomplished musicians. At one time, the Vincents collectively were taking 36 dance and music lessons a week, Margaret recalls.

The Vincents remain active as ever in championing the arts. They are helping plan a Centennial jazz festival slated for October in Sun Valley. Roger has entertained thoughts of starting a boys' choir. Margaret looks forward to finishing

her degree and helping young musicians explore new teaching methods.

Although both say there are many others who are more qualified to receive the Governor's Award, the Vincents commended Idaho for encouraging artists and arts patrons.

They think the state is generally strong in its support of the arts, although Margaret says she'd "like to see the arts commission funnel a bit more money down here to the Magic Valley."

"They applaud CSI for starting its Arts on Tour program. Because, as they say, visiting professional groups help build appreciation for the arts. The more educated your audience is, the more demand there will be for those kinds of performances," explains Margaret. "I really think the more things, the better."

"As the community grows, so will audiences," says Roger. "The arts are a good indicator of overall quality of life in an area. Businesses look at the arts when deciding where to locate operations, so it pays to promote culture, he adds.

"I think people all over are beginning to look at quality of life," says Margaret. "In Idaho, we have a quality of life that is enviable. And people coming here are demanding more culture."

Tom Cruise shines in 'Born'

Visceral is the word that is being frequently used to describe "Born on the Fourth of July," and that is what it is: visceral, gut-wrenching, shattering.

The film was directed by Oliver Stone, whose "Platoon" may be the definitive motion picture about the Vietnam War. Like a man who can't get something out of his system, Stone returns to the same war in his new film, which is based on the book written by Ron Kovic, the young man who went to Vietnam an idealist and came home a paraplegic. In time he did an about face and began to denounce the war.

"Born on the Fourth of July" doesn't have much climax, but then it doesn't really need one. The film, you might say, is all climax, a movie that begins high and never really comes down.

The first few scenes may be a bit suspect. They play a little like "The Wonder Years," which is no particular compliment, but the film sur-

vives this footage and survives later footage in which Kovic attends the 1972 Republican convention. This sequence is brilliantly staged, but, in this case, Stone lingers longer than he needs to.

Again, no real damage is done. "Born on the Fourth of July" is otherwise so strong, so moving, so pertinent, it hardly matters that Stone, with Kovic's help (he co-authored the script with Stone), has occasionally digressed.

Kovic was born in Massapequa, Long Island, where he was apparently raised in intellectual isolation. His parents, strong Catholics, drilled love of God and love of country into the boy's head. One was closely entwined with the other; if you loved God, you also loved your country, right or wrong.

Kovic was so much persuaded by this that he could not wait to join the Marines, go to Vietnam and "slap a Communist," as his mother hoped he would.

He was so gung-ho, he did a second tour, won a Bronze Star and was wounded, twice. The second wound left him a paraplegic, and he was sent home, where he began to listen to his friends, who were all more disillusioned than he. In time, he began to see the idiocy of what was happening in Vietnam and gradually began to speak out against the war.

He also spoke out against the treatment the veterans received when they returned home. The indifference was one thing. The treatment of the casualties received in one of the Veterans Administration hospitals was quite another. Stone's new film has as much to say about this as it does about the war itself, and he lets the facts speak for themselves: the incredible conditions, the rans; the lack of sanitation and the indifference on the part of the orderlies, all of whom seem to resent the fact that they are doing jobs for which they are being paid.

Kovic is played with astonishing awareness by Tom Cruise, who may have wrapped up the Academy Award with this one.

'Daisy' shows human gravity

DRIVING MISS DAISY (PG). Morgan Freeman gives an immensely gracious and subtle performance as an Atlanta chauffeur in this rather musty adaptation of Alfred Uhry's 1987 Pulitzer-Prize-winning play. Jessica Tandy is the cranky widow. Their performances give the film a human gravity that helps counteract the too-measured pacing, its tone of civic uplift. Directed by Bruce Beresford from Uhry's script of his play.

ALWAYS (PG). A better title for Steven Spielberg's remake of the soppy 1943 Spencer Tracy movie "A Guy Named Joe" might be "Forever," which is roughly its running time. All of us who fell under Holly Hunter's spell in "Broadcast News" and stuck to her through "Miss Firecracker" are in for a rough time of it. Cuteness turning overripe is not a pleasant sight. Richard Dreyfuss can do no better than to deliver his situation — or his direction, and all of that, as they say, toothrotting.

LEATHERFACE: THE TEXAS CHAIN SAW MASSACRE III (R). One more blood-soaked round at the back-country highway of the

THE LITTLE MERMAID (G). Directed and written by John Musker and Ron Clements, with a yeoman team of animators, designers and craftspeople, this impudent, grandiose, multilevel crowd-pleaser shares with the classic Disney animated features of the '30s and '40s a sense of over-reaching, of grabbing every zany effect possible within old-line narrative forms. Ariel, the saucy heroine, is a sexy-lonely bunch not much like the sad noble sea-maid in Hans Christian Andersen's original story. But there is a

primal power that most recent Disney cartoons lack. Midway through, Sam Wright, who is the voice of a hyperactive crab named Sebastian, leads a calypso number called "Under the Sea" — an infectious show-stopper by songwriters Howard Ashman and Alan Menken — and afterwards should have any audience in his pocket.

LOOK WHO'S TALKING (PG-13). Movies in which animals or babies speak their thoughts in voiceover rarely work, but part of the strength here is that Bruce Willis, as the sperm-fetus-baby, isn't always talking. There's enough fairly witty interplay between moon Kirtley Alley and author John Travolta that the movie could conceivably work even without the baby chat. Another unexpected strength of this uneven comedy is that it's as much from the woman's point of view as the infant's, thanks to writer-director Amy Heckerling, whose own mothering experiences account for much of the script's casual insight.

But underneath the veneer of respectability was a troubled marriage. Marshall had gambling debts and was having an affair. Maria suspected him, but the couple maintained a facade of happiness. The boys were aware of nothing.

Returning home one night from Atlantic City, Robert Marshall pulled off the interstate because his car, he told police, was handling poorly. Marshall stopped at a picnic area. A second car, he said, pulled in behind them.

While he was checking his tires, Marshall said, somebody hit him over the head. When he came to, he was lying in a pool of blood. Maria was slumped over in the front seat, dead of gunshot wounds.

Marshall claimed robbers who saw them leave a casino probably hit him and killed his wife, but police investigating Maria's murder quickly uncovered motives that pointed to her husband. Besides the affair, Marshall had insurance policies on his wife totalling \$1.2 million, the latest taken out on the morning of her death. The circumstantial evidence was so heavily against him that one investigator said he had to be innocent. Nobody could be that stupid.

A jury found Marshall guilty of conspiring to murder his wife. But his conviction — on circumstantial

evidence and the testimony of an unsavory thug — left doubts. Marshall maintains his innocence to this day.

On Sunday and Tuesday, Feb. 11 and 13, the story is re-enacted in "Blind Faith," an NBC miniseries based on Joe McGinniss' book of the same title.

It's not the first time a McGinniss book has received the TV treatment. The author's "Fatal Vision," about convicted murderer Jeffrey MacDonald, was a critically acclaimed miniseries, also on NBC. "Blind Faith" is no "Fatal Vision," but the case has a lurid fascination that is sure to hook viewers.

Portraying Marshall is Robert Urlich. The knock on Urlich is that he is often stiff and aloof, but those are exactly the characteristics required for the materialistic and self-centered Marshall as depicted in "Blind Faith."

Urlich, who read the script while bird-hunting in Minnesota, said he originally had qualms about playing such an unlikeable character.

"My first reaction was no way," Urlich admits. "Why would anybody

want to do this part? (But) I began thinking about it more and more, and it occurred to me that, if there is a lesson to be learned (from) this story, it is that the difference between what seems to be a normal, functioning human being and family, and one that's not, is sometimes very fine."

Much of the focus, however, is not on Marshall but on his three sons, Roby, Chris and John. Roby, who co-operated with the production as a consultant, believes his father is guilty. His youngest brother, John, still clings to the hope that their father is innocent. The family is what appealed to McGinniss.

"The audience needs someone to identify with, to care about," says the author.

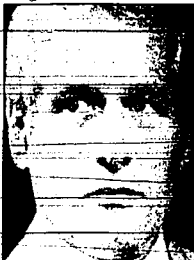

Henry Darrow went wrong years ago, after training in the Pasadena Playhouse with Ruth Buzzi, Jed Allen and others. The young Puerto Rican actor was doing "Othello" on the stage when he was approached with a civilian job offer.

After 35 years toiling in Hollywood, Henry Darrow doesn't complain about the inequities. Whining doesn't pay. Henry could always become respectable by running a restaurant.

But Darrow is tainted by performing. There he was in Ray Bradbury's play "The Wonderful Ice Cream Suit," emoting in grand style. "Bonanza's" producer David Dortort was in the audience one night and he knew he had to have Henry for his new TV western, "The High Chaparral," a series about feuding landowners, the Cannons and the Montoyas, set in Arizona before it became a state.

The Montoya family included Frank Silvera as the ranch owner, Gilbert Roland as his brother, Henry Darrow as his son and three Mexican ranch hands played by Roberto Conteras, Rudy Ramos and

Rodolfo Acosta. Never had so many Latins earned weekly paychecks on an Anglo series.

'Roseanne,' 'Cheers' lead in ratings; 'Home Videos' takes slot in top 10

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Roseanne" topped the charts, "Lethal Weapon" staked out a good spot and a new show's rise suggested Americans like to watch themselves, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings released Tuesday.

NBC had five of the Top 10 shows, followed by ABC with four and CBS with one for the week ended Feb. 4, which also saw the beginning of a sweeps month, periods during which ratings are used to compute advertising value.

ABC's share of the top spots included "Roseanne" with a 24.1 rating; NBC dealt viewers "Cheers" with 22.7, "The Cosby Show" with 22.4 and "Golden Girls" with 21.5; CBS news show "60 Minutes" had 21.3; and NBC was sixth with "Empty Nest" at 20.0.

In seventh place with 19.8 was "America's Funniest Home Videos" on ABC, a Sunday night show that uses home video clips sent in by viewers. ABC claims the show has increased its audience 10 percent since it premiered Jan. 14.

Rounding out the Top 10 were ABC's "The Wonder Years" with 19.2, ABC's "Coach" with 18.8 and NBC's "Unsolved Mysteries" with

Q: Isn't the late late-night tv pioneer Ernie Kovacs about to be assassinated in print by his disgruntled ex-wife? — I.P.

A: Not a chance. You're probably referring to singer Edie Adams, Kovacs' widow, who is currently writing her autobiography. She had a happy marriage with the gifted but loony TV performer, and I'm certain he'll be fondly remembered in her book, due out in late summer.

Q: Isn't rocker Phil Collins a phony for singing about the plight of the homeless while he leads the life of a supermillionaire? — L.N.

A: Critics have suggested just that and Collins isn't pleased. The 38-year-old singer-drummer-actor and Genesis band member sang about the condition of the homeless in his bleak and moody "Another Day in Paradise" single. It made him a lot of money — and became his seventh No. 1 single record of the 1980s. I asked Phil about the criticism. He says bluntly, "If you're rich, people assume you're an insensitive jerk who's out of touch. But there are some decent rich people too. Having money doesn't turn you into a jerk."

Q: What is Dina Merrill, the beautiful socialite-actress who was once married to actor Cliff Robertson, up to these days? — R.F.

A: Dina's still very much part of the high-toned social swim. She's been keeping a low profile professionally, however. The news is on the personal front. After her split from Robertson, Dina was romanced and finally married Hollywood movie executive Ted Hartley. Will she turn up in one of his movies? "Only if she gets cast," Hartley told me somewhat mysteriously.

'Roseanne,' 'Cheers' lead in ratings; 'Home Videos' takes slot in top 10

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Roseanne" topped the charts, "Lethal Weapon" staked out a good spot and a new show's rise suggested Americans like to watch themselves, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings released Tuesday.

NBC had five of the Top 10 shows, followed by ABC with four and CBS with one for the week ended Feb. 4, which also saw the beginning of a sweeps month, periods during which ratings are used to compute advertising value.

ABC's share of the top spots included "Roseanne" with a 24.1 rating; NBC dealt viewers "Cheers" with 22.7, "The Cosby Show" with 22.4 and "Golden Girls" with 21.5; CBS news show "60 Minutes" had 21.3; and NBC was sixth with "Empty Nest" at 20.0.

In seventh place with 19.8 was "America's Funniest Home Videos" on ABC, a Sunday night show that uses home video clips sent in by viewers. ABC claims the show has increased its audience 10 percent since it premiered Jan. 14.

Rounding out the Top 10 were ABC's "The Wonder Years" with 19.2, ABC's "Coach" with 18.8 and NBC's "Unsolved Mysteries" with

Poland gets private TV station

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Poland's first privately owned television station began regular broadcasts Tuesday, offering viewers in the southwestern city of Wroclaw an alternative to state-run TV, the state news agency reported.

Called "The Echo," the channel relays excerpts of programs from the European Astra satellite, mixed with locally produced news geared to Wroclaw and the Lower Silesia region, the PAP agency said.

Broadcasts are to be limited to four hours a day for the next few months, PAP said. The station is located on the 10th floor of a student hostel in Wroclaw.

A law passed last year by the new Solidarity-led government permitted private companies to set up broadcast stations for the first time in Poland's postwar history.

Wroclaw residents previously could receive only Polish Television's Channels One and Two and the two Czechoslovak channels from Prague.

Networks to cover Cartagena drug summit with expanded press pool

NEW YORK (AP) — Despite its early worries about reporters' safety during President Bush's drug summit next week in Colombia, the White House will let an expanded press pool cover the meeting, a senior NBC News official said Tuesday.

"This is an extremely difficult, sensitive trip because of the security, but the White House accommodated us in everything we — certainly television broadcasting — asked for," said Tim Russert, NBC's Washington bureau chief.

Russert is chairman of the network TV pool covering Bush's one-day trip Feb. 15 to the four-nation drug summit at Cartagena, a coastal town on Colombia's Caribbean side about

400 miles north of the capital city of Bogota.

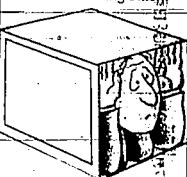
The usual White House press contingent — 11 reporters traditionally fly with Bush on Air Force One, followed by others on a chartered plane — will go with him to Cartagena, Russert said.

In addition, an expanded press pool will be allowed to accompany the president to the actual meeting site at Barranquilla 65 miles to the northeast.

The expanded pool could have as many as 35 members, said Sig Rogich, a White House spokesman. He estimated that at least several hundred foreign and American news staffers will be on hand in Cartagena.
