Accord aims to cripple cocaine cartel

CARTAGENA, Colombia — President Bush and three Latin American presidents concluded a historic summit meeting Thursday by signing an agreement designed to cripple the cocaine cartels.

The summit came six months after the Colombian government launched its toughest crackdown against the Medellín cartels. Tens of millions of dollars of property has been seized and the cartel leaders are characterized as desperate to make a deal.

The "Declaration of Cartagena" signed at a heavily guarded military base promises to end the drug plague by reducing consumption in the United States, developing economic alternatives for drug-dependent economies and coordinating an all-out attack on the traffickers' organizations.

The agreement signed by Bush commits the United States to helping the Latin countries rebuild. He promised to seek new funding from Congress for this aid.

Bush officially recognized the economic reality that a successful war on the cocaine trade will have harmful effects on the economies and employment levels of Bolivia, Peru and Colombia.

"The United States is prepared to cooperate with the Andean Parties in a wide range of initiatives for development, trade and investment," the declaration stated. No dollar figure was named.

The presidents emphasized crop substitution as a way to make the cultivation of coca leaves less popular in the Andean countries, Bush promised to help with development of legitimate crops and to provide economic seed money and credits in rural areas.

The four countries also agreed to increase trade and private investment so drug-free economies can grow.

Strengthens controls against the chemicals used to process cocaine and beef up the interdiction of the chemicals.

Toughen money laundering laws and enact legislation making it easier to seize traffickers' money, planes and real estate.

The leaders were protected by a contingent of more than 5,000 Colombian troops guarding against

attacks by either the cartels or the leftist guerrillas who seek to topple the government. Airspace and waterways were shut down.

Security concerns were so high that the first question asked of Bush in Colombia was "Are you scared?"

The president said no.

The leaders played down prior disagreements over drug policies. They hailed the summit as beginning a new era of mutual respect between Latin America and the United States.

Bush had angered Latin Americans with the invasion of Panama and was further hurt by news leaks suggesting a possible U.S. naval blockade of Colombia, but he seemed to win friends with his willingness to travel to Colombia and sit down with his Latin colleagues.

International cooperation was the

theme stressed most often. Host Virgilio Barco, the president of Colombia, said the narco-traffickers could not be beaten if each country worked on its own.

"They are intent on destroying our democracies and enslaving our people," he said of the cocaine billionaires. "This is a global problem and all measures pale compared to cutting demand. The only law the traffickers can't break is the law of supply and demand."

Peruvian President Alan Garcia had said he would stay away from the summit to protest the U.S. invasion of Panama. But he changed his mind several weeks ago and pointed out upon his arrival that Bush had removed the invasion force.

"I did come because two days ago the last illegal troops placed in

"It's just a good way to vent frustration: blame foreigners and deploy troops and move helicopters around," said Hewson A. Ryan, Edward R. Murrow professor of public diplomacy at Tufts University, former ambassador to Honduras and a former deputy assistant secretary for Latin affairs.

Addressing the demand side of the problem with education and treatment programs is a long-term solution, and politicians are sensitive to that, Ryan said.

Ryan said that while Bush's talks with the Andean presidents offered a useful opportunity to exchange views, an emphasis on crushing drug production in those countries did not answer the other half of the question: what cash crop or manufacturing base can possibly replace cocaine.

War on drugs should take aim at demand

President Bush's drug summit in Colombia was good politics and an even better photo opportunity.

But specialists said Thursday remarks even more pointed than the president's that firepower in the war on drugs should be directed on the demand side, not against the countries that supply drugs.

Bush said at his summit session with three Latin leaders that the United States was dedicated to curbing its demand for cocaine and other illegal drugs. Analysts agreed Thursday with that need, but they said domestic changes and concrete programs were required as well.

"America has got to solve its drug problem at home," said Mark A.R. Kleiman, lecturer in public policy at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government and former Justice Department specialist on interdiction, who has talked extensively with Bush administration drug policy officials.

As long as there is a cocaine market here, Kleiman said, it will be supplied. He and other specialists on the drug trade said that even if drug production in one country was stamped out it would simply spring

up somewhere else to accommodate high demand.

"The reason we spend so much money offshore is it's very comfortable for Americans to think that if things would just change overseas we wouldn't have a drug problem anymore," Kleiman said.

Greg Montgomery hasn't let deafness slow him on his way to becoming a top automotive troubleshooter

Mechanic has solution to noisy work

TWIN FALLS — When the roaring engines and machinery get too loud, Greg Montgomery, born deaf, just turns his hearing aids down a few more notches.

"The other mechanics can't do that," he said with a grin.

Montgomery, a 31-year-old Jerome resident, will be the first deaf person in the nation to graduate from a General Motors Automotive Service Education Program.

Two local auto dealers — Con Paulos

Chevrolet of Jerome and Gary's Westland Motors of Twin Falls — honored Montgomery Thursday afternoon with a \$300 scholarship for the spring term. He'll graduate from the General Motors program at the College of Southern Idaho this summer.

Impaired since birth, Montgomery said he can hear pretty well with hearing aids. But he has to read lips and needed an interpreter Thursday for a reporter's questions.

He said he would encourage any hearing-impaired person to enroll in college, but warned that earning a certificate in auto mechanics can be tough.

"I'm not sure I would recommend it," he said, "because 30 to 40 percent of the job depends on hearing."

Montgomery said he's had to work harder than hearing mechanics because he has to do much more diagnostic testing than a hearing mechanic to find an auto's problem — a problem that might take him an hour to figure out can take a hearing mechanic only 15 minutes.

— He can't catch some of the softer engine noises, such as engine "pings," he said.

But he said he thinks he has an advantage over other mechanics because like many other

Protests target party chiefs

MOSCOW — Thousands of people defied a ban on protests in Dushanbe, the violence-torn capital of Tajikistan, to demand the resignation of the entire local Communist Party leadership, Soviet media said Thursday.

A crowd estimated at 8,000 also demanded jobs for tens of thousands of unemployed, better housing and an end to the sale of pork, which the largely Moslem population is forbidden to eat, the official news agency Tass reported.

Another demonstration outside the

min government buildings attracted 2,000 to 5,000 people who chose a committee that recommended settling problems peacefully, Tass and other sources said.

Mansur Sultanov, deputy chairman of the Tadzhik branch of Gosstatmeditsina, said by telephone there were no shootings or riots Thursday, but Tass said bands of armed militants roamed the streets.

The news agency said 18 people had been killed and 200 injured since the violence began Saturday night in Dushanbe, 1,600 miles southeast of Moscow near the borders of China and Afghanistan.

Solid waste money for counties stalls in Senate Finance panel

BOISE — Seeking to maintain some budget flexibility, the Senate Finance Committee has sidetracked a measure aimed at providing \$10 million for counties to meet strict new federal solid waste regulations.

On a 9.3 vote Thursday, the committee agreed to a motion from Lynn Tominga, R-Rupert, to have the bill hold on the Senate floor for amendment until legislative budget writers complete a spending plan for the fiscal year that begins July 1.

Then lawmakers can decide whether to meet the entire one-time request for \$10 million, some reduced amount or provide no state

funding, Tominga said.

Committee members balked at recommending approval of the measure introduced by Sen. Rex Furness, R-Rigby, since the federal Environmental Protection Agency has yet to issue its new standards for landfills and solid waste disposal sites.

Furness said the regulations originally were to be issued in December 1989, and now are scheduled for release in May. Until the requirements counties will have to meet are spelled out precisely, Fremont County Commissioner James Siddoway acknowledged officials are "shooting in the dark."

But Siddoway said since the state has a record cash surplus of \$126.3 million in its current budget year and prospects for continued strong tax receipts, now would be the best time to help counties ensure they are able to meet another in a growing list of federal mandates.

"With this excess money that you

Events confirm '80s are over

NEW YORK — Put down that Perrier and lime the '80s are over.

Years ago, you were bored to tears by a gooeyplex of decade-ending stories just two months ago. Yeah, we know that decades are arbitrary guideposts, that by one count the decade doesn't begin until next January.

But bear with us. It's official. The '80s are history.

An inkling that we have entered the 1990s came when the parting of Donald and Ivana Trump edged Nelson Mandela off the front page.

Many readers asked the news media: "Why are you so obsessed with these people whose main interest in life, it seems, is flaunting the gold-plated accents on their yacht? Is this some sort of Trump fetish?"

No. No less than William Norwich, society columnist for the Daily News, explains that the Trumps deserve daily-to-wall coverage because they were "the couple of the '80s," a title they appear to have won

by the couple. The claim of the '80s is no more. Ergo, the '80s are over.

Cecilia Briones, a New York banker, sees parallels between the rise and fall of the Trumps and the course of Wall Street in the '80s: "Everything went up and everything has to come down."

Still not convinced? Go down to your local boite and try to order a Perrier. The fizzy drink of the 1980s — a beverage that supplanted the lousy club soda as the pious "refreshed" the ostentatious, nearly 30 million gallons were guzzled in the United States in 1988 alone — has been recalled in every one of the 20 counties where it was distributed.

The culprit was benzene contamination. No matter. No Perrier '80s.

"I'll just replace it. I'll suffer with Evian," said Astrid Sanja, a paralegal at a Manhattan law firm.

She and other health-conscious citizens of the 1980s have other reasons to be bummed to the max, a

Oil cleanup crews may be cut

HUNTINGTON BEACH, Calif. (AP) — The last traces of oil from an eight-day-old tanker spill washed ashore Thursday, but the blackened coastline was still off limits to beachgoers and boaters.

"We don't want to paint too pretty a picture," said Coast Guard Petty Officer Dennis Hall. "We don't want to give the impression we will open up all these areas. I can't really say it's done and over."

The 400,000-gallon spill, which occurred Feb. 7 when the tanker

American Trader apparently punctured itself on its own anchor, has soiled a 12- to 14-mile stretch of beach. Cleanup crews were focusing on the Huntington Beach and Newport Beach areas, where concentrations were thickest.

Warning signs remained posted along the sand, and boom placed to guard against drifting oil continued to block entrances to the Long Beach Marina, Newport Harbor and Santa Ana River, Hall said.

With only a light sheen of oil remaining offshore Thursday,

experts considered reducing resources, said James L. O'Brien, clean-up coordinator for British Petroleum America Inc., which had leased the tanker.

Equipment such as skimmers, which are useful only when oil is thickly concentrated offshore, might be released, O'Brien said. He said such decisions would be made in consultation with local, state and federal agencies.

O'Brien, owner of an oil spill cleanup firm, declined to estimate when work would be finished.

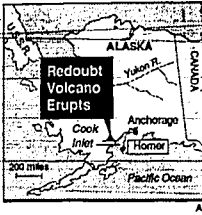
Alaskan volcano erupts again

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Redoubt Volcano erupted again Thursday, sending a plume of ash and steam nearly seven miles high and scattering grit that led authorities to cancel classes for 2,000 students.

The "moderate to strong" eruption, the first significant eruption since Jan. 15, began around 4 a.m. and was over in minutes.

The ash cloud headed for the Gulf of Alaska, away from the more populated Cook Inlet area, said Tom Miller, a spokesman for the U.S. Geological Survey.

The Federal Aviation Administration warned aircraft to stay at least 20 miles from the mountain, which is about 115 miles southeast of Anchorage.

Grand jury indicts D.C. mayor

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mayor Marion Barry was indicted Thursday on eight charges of possessing crack cocaine and lying repeatedly to a federal grand jury questioning him about drug use.

"I know that when a trial is held I will be exonerated," Barry declared.

Barry was undergoing treatment at a Florida substance abuse clinic when the grand jury returned the indictment to a federal magistrate. He enrolled in the clinic after his arrest last month in what authorities say was a videotaped hotel drug sting.

Barry said he had no plans to resign. His lawyer, R. Kenneth Hundy, said Barry would return from Florida for arraignment within 10 days and plea innocent.

Oil imports hit peak during January

WASHINGTON (AP) — Imports accounted for an all-time high of 54 percent of the nation's petroleum consumption last month, the American Petroleum Institute said Thursday.

Although the record-high level was spurred in part by a bitter cold snap across much of the nation in December that increased demand for heating fuel, officials said they feared it could signal a trend toward monthly imports of at least 50 percent.

Imports last accounted for more than half of the country's petroleum consumption in July.

Jurors hear tape of skipper's voice

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Jurors in Joseph Hazelwood's trial heard a tape recording Thursday of the skipper's barred voice, reporting the tanker Exxon Valdez had run aground and that he was "trying to steer off the reef."

The recording was of conversations between Hazelwood and the Coast Guard in the minutes after the nation's worst oil spill early last March 24.

"Exxon Valdez over," began the first transmission

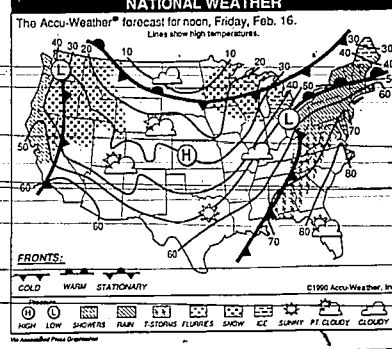

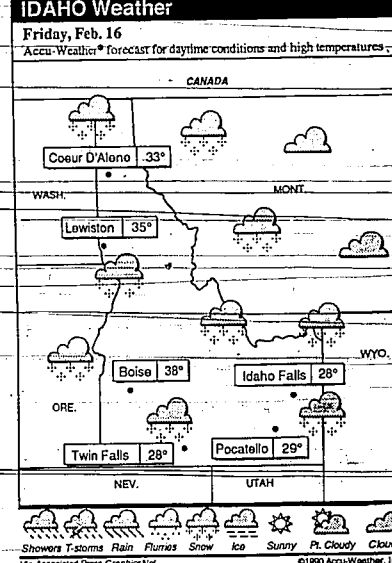

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Evans will revise education formula

BOISE (AP)—The quest to dramatically revamp the formula for doling out over \$400 million in state education aid is still alive in the Idaho Legislature but the prognosis remains uncertain.

State Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans has been asked to revise the proposal after the House Education Committee failed to muster enough votes on Wednesday to either endorse it or kill it. After a lengthy debate, the panel split 11-9 to defeat motions that would have moved the measure forward and sidetracked it permanently. Evans is expected to submit a revised bill for review on Monday.

What emerged from the debate was a consensus that the current formula, a complex mathematical expression of state policy, is unfair to students in districts with low property values. Their schools are not as well funded, which means they enjoy far fewer educational challenges than students from richer districts—a point a number of school districts have been making for some time in demanding revision under threat of court action to force it.

Bill gives locals authority to refuse road maintenance

BOISE (AP)—The Idaho Senate has overwhelmingly approved legislation aimed at giving cities and counties the option of refusing to assume the maintenance responsibility for highways abandoned by the state.

The bill sponsored by Sen. Mike Blackbird, D-Kellogg, was approved 40-1 and sent to the House. Only Sen. Lee Staker, R-Idaho Falls, voted no.

The measure gives local highway districts authority to negotiate with the state Department of Transportation over accepting or rejecting control over part or all of any highway the agency plans to

abandon. But Staker said the Department of Transportation already makes an effort to cooperate with cities and counties in reaching "just settlements" on its abandonment plans when maintenance costs would be too great for local property taxpayers.

Some senators used the opportunity of debate on the measure to prod their colleagues on the need for a bigger state commitment to what a recent report said was a \$7 billion backlog in maintenance, repair and replacement of the state's deteriorating highway system.

Sen. Ann Rydalen, R-Idaho Falls, said legislators are not prepared to agree to a measure easing the burden of state mandates on local governments when state officials themselves so often oppose what they consider onerous federal requirements.

Senate panel recommends approval of state premium pay bill

BOISE (AP)—The Senate Human Resources Committee has recommended full Senate approval of a bill phasing in premium pay for state employees who work night shifts.

The measure sent to the Senate on Thursday calls for a "shift differential" raise for night workers of 1.5 percent beginning July 1, 1991, 3 percent starting a year later and 5 percent on July 1, 1993.

The plan has evolved over the past several years. It won approval in the Senate last year before voting in the House without a final vote.

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McClure endorses budget convention

BOISE (AP)—In a rare move, retiring Republican Sen. James McClure went before the Idaho Legislature, and advised lawmakers how to vote on a pending issue.

The Legislature is working on a resolution resuming Idaho's 1973 action calling for a constitutional convention to force Congress to adopt balanced budgets.

In speeches to the House and Senate on Thursday, McClure cautioned against the action, saying the only way Congress ever will be forced to quit deficit spending is through a constitutional convention.

Calling for a constitutional convention is a very serious matter as well. A movement is under way in several states to rescind the call for a constitutional convention, one of the two ways in which amendments can be proposed to the federal Constitution. The other way, which has been used the most, is through action by Congress.

Constitutional scholars argue that once a convention is called, there would be no way to limit its agenda, and the Constitution and Bill of Rights could be amended in such a way to take away the rights of small states such as Idaho.

Other constitutional scholars argue the other way, saying there is no reason to think a constitutional convention would "run wild," and McClure was on their side. "It can't tell you any more than you already know," he said, adding his views were his own perspective. "There is no doubt in my mind that a majority of the members of Congress are in favor of a constitutional amendment, but for a variety of reasons, they will not vote that way. They will not submit it to the people for a vote," he said. McClure said Congress has an appetite for spending that it cannot resist.

Idaho historian dies at age 82

BOISE (AP)—Boise historian and longtime Idaho Statesman reporter Dick D'Easum has died in his sleep. He was 82.

D'Easum, who also worked as a Statesman editor and columnist, wrote five books documenting colorful Idaho history. He was doing research for a history of Idaho sports at the time of his death on Tuesday night, his wife, Mary, said.

Idaho historian dies at age 82

D'Easum during the 1940s while D'Easum was public relations director for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, remembered his quick wit and humor. When Edson started on a raft trip down the Salmon River, D'Easum organized a parade through the town of Salmon to send him off.

The parade included cowboys on horses and a girl dressed as Lewis and Clark's guide, Sacajawea, Edson said.

LaRocco opens his campaign

BOISE (AP)—LaRocco, who on Tuesday opened his campaign for the Democratic nomination for Idaho's 1st District congressional seat, wants people to remember that he was a leader in the effort to bring a state lottery to Idaho.

LaRocco, Boise stock broker, launched his campaign with a news conference at his West Boise home. He then took to the road for meetings at Lewiston, Moscow and Coeur d'Alene through Friday afternoon.

"In 1988, I led the fight to win Idahoans the freedom to choose a state lottery," LaRocco said. "I traveled up and down the state, telling people that no special interests and no high-priced campaign could take away their right to choose a lottery."

"We won that battle against all odds. Already the lottery has succeeded beyond anyone's dreams — returning badly needed dollars to Idaho's schools and our children's future," he said.

Already in the race is Jeanne Givens of Coeur d'Alene, the 1988 Democratic congressional nominee. State Agriculture Director Dick Rush said Wednesday he's all but in, planning a formal decision March 5. Republicans Ward Parkinson of Boise and state Sen. Skip Smyser of Parma are running for the GOP nomination.

Both LaRocco and Mrs. Givens have run for the seat, both losing to Republican Rep. Larry Craig. But Craig is surrendering the seat this year in a bid for the Republican U.S. Senate nomination.

LaRocco promised to resolve Idaho's long-running wilderness dispute, he was willing to do. State Sen. Marti Calabretta, D-Osborn, announced Thursday that she will not run for the Democratic congressional nomination.

She said the press of duties in the Legislature would prevent her from making a campaign until the 1990 session adjourns.

Fine proposed for unsafe Idaho dam

COEUR D'ALENE — The deaths of three people at the Post Falls Dam last year has led a federal commission to propose a \$500,000 fine against Washington Water Power Co. for operating an unsafe dam.

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission notified the utility of its ruling Wednesday afternoon. Water Power spokesman Rob Strenge said the finding is only preliminary, and the utility has 30 days to appeal the amount of the fine.

The proposed fine comes out of an April 24, 1989, boating accident at the dam. Strenge said FERC decided that a log boom normally in front of the dam constituted a boat-restraining device.

Give the Air Force an ear, but read the fine print, too

A strafing F-16 comes in low and fast, though not as low as you'd expect. When you're firing dozens of 20mm rounds at a pop, you don't have to be very close to inflict significant mayhem.

The sound of that cannon burst is likely to surprise the uninitiated, too. The gun doesn't go, "tat-tat-tat, pah-tweEEEE" like in the movies. It goes, "BRAAAACK!" — a deafening cross between a Bronx cheer and a fat man splitting the seam in his pants.

I went to Gila Bend, Ariz., to learn that. Gila Bend is the gateway to the Goldwater Air Force Range — 2.7 million acres of prime rangeland pasture where some of America's finest young men learn the brutal ballet of aerial warfare.

A group of Idahoans visited the Goldwater Range last week, along with central Florida's Avon Park Range.

We saw through hours of slide shows and briefings, and we perched on portable bleachers to watch jet fighters bomb and straf.

The trip's purpose, bottom line, was to persuade us that an expanded Saylor Creek

Bombing Range would be a good neighbor to southern Idaho.

Toward that end, we were taken to High Explosive Hill, a barren rockpile in the heart of the Goldwater Range.

Our Air Force guides explained that it's one of only a few small areas at Goldwater where live bombs are dropped.

Most of Goldwater's sprawling territory is left pretty much as nature made it — a situation the Air Force promises to repeat at Saylor Creek.

Comparing the shrapped-strewn hill's small area with the surrounding miles of open desert was reassuring.

Less reassuring was a demonstration run

in which a quartet of 500-pound bombs missed the hill altogether.

A forest of shrapnel-riddled saguaro cacti surrounding the hill gave further testimony that student pilots sometimes miss.

In fairness though, even that area was minute in comparison with Goldwater's vastness.

Another helpful feature of the trip was meeting our "counterparts" in Arizona and Florida: local officials, conservationists, recreationists and cattlemen.

They were not unanimously euphoric about their uniformed neighbors, but they were generally positive.

A man who labors for the survival of Arizona Desert Bighorn Sheep praised the Air Force for helping to build watering basins.

Recreationists assured us that access to the two ranges has been excellent.

A Florida Audubon Society leader said that from his viewpoint, most of the Avon Park range functions as a huge wildlife preserve.

A Florida rancher, being about as

generous toward the government as any cowboy is likely to be, commented, "If it wasn't for this range here, I wouldn't be in business."

Such comments are encouraging. Still, as several of the Idaho visitors noted, neither Arizona nor Florida is comparable to Saylor Creek.

The Goldwater range has no cattle leases. At Avon Park, supersonic combat training takes place over the nearby ocean; the neighbors never hear sonic booms.

And neither range has ever sought a 10-fold expansion onto real estate its neighbors are accustomed to enjoying. That makes a difference.

Those sonic booms remain a sore point for some of the Idaho cattlemen on our trip.

As a hurrying F-15 treated us to sample booms at 20,000 feet and then 10,000 feet over the Arizona desert, one rancher asked for a demonstration at 5,000 feet — the minimum allowable supersonic altitude proposed for Saylor Creek.

No dice, Lt. Col. Jim Cooper replied. Cooper, the Saylor Creek expansion's

point man, explained that Air Force safety rules forbid supersonic flight below 10,000 feet.

The Saylor Creek proposal only sets the minimum at 5,000 feet to provide a margin for the occasional error, he said.

That answer isn't likely to satisfy neighboring ranchers.

They, and other critics of the expansion, will be looking closely at the Air Force proposal's details when a draft environmental impact statement comes out in a couple of weeks.

Those folks will be wise to adopt an attitude the Pentagon's budget salesmen have promoted lately in reaction to Soviet good-will gestures: Don't base your defenses on your opponent's intentions, but on his capabilities.

In other words, believe what your government says, but read the fine print anyway.

Ad Hoc Committee had small say in Gooding feed ordinance

The county of Gooding is now engaged in the final fizzle process of writing a new ordinance dealing with confinement feeding operations that Twin Falls and Jerome Counties have struggled with for the last year.

I was asked to be on an Ad Hoc Committee which would be kind to believe in going to have some kind of material involvement in developing guidelines for the ordinance.

When we arrived for the meeting, we discovered the basic guidelines for the proposed ordinance had already been formulated and we were only being asked to fill in the blanks, e.g., to determine what might be a proper distance for the location of a corral to an existing residence.

During the course of the meeting, it became apparent that the guidelines for the proposed ordinance were simply redrafted from the Jerome County effort less only some of its more onerous provisions.

Thus, it became quite obvious that we were never intended to have any meaningful input in the drafting of the ordinance; rather,

which unlike the rural residences, was not incompatible with the agricultural zoning.

No matter how well managed a dairy is, there is going to be a certain amount of objectionable odors, dust, noise, flies, etc., which are associated with livestock.

Presently, the focus of the complaints up on the livestock industry, but it is only a matter of time until those same people that are today complaining about livestock operations will be complaining about other agricultural uses.

Conversely, there is nothing in the proposed ordinance which would protect the owners of existing rural residences as leaving operations located in close proximity to existing rural residences would

be "grandfathered."

For us to continue to allow our best agricultural soils to be built on, paved over or otherwise removed from production for the purpose of rural residences is not only myopic but — worse yet — a commentary on a political system that refuses to exercise leadership when faced with what they perceive as unpopular — creating instead of correcting — problems which another generation will be forced to deal with.

I have no quarrel with those who would like to "live in the country" and believe that good government would face this issue squarely by zoning our best agricultural land exclusively for production agriculture, setting aside areas which have little or no agricultural value for those folks who want to live in the country.

Some of the provisions of the proposed ordinance are desirable, such as the siting permit and the proposed buffer zone around existing communities and platted subdivisions.

However, it's interesting to note that this very proposal would allow livestock

operations within the buffer zone — size being the primary limitation.

Within limits, of course, the things people find most objectionable about livestock operations are less of a function of its size than the manner in which it is managed.

If one of your objectives is to protect the agricultural economy, the proposed ordinance would have a companion ordinance limiting the subdividing of parcels in agriculture zones for the construction of rural residences to a minimum of 80 acres.

A good number of years ago, certain localities in California recognized the value of their agricultural industry and enacted similar ordinances to protect it from the ravages of rural residential development.

Surely, we ought to be intelligent enough to learn from the mistakes of others and make a good faith effort to avoid those problems which today plague Jerome County and many areas of California.

Inspections led to weight limit

To Phil Butt, member of the Idaho Transportation Board:

The following is the information you requested on the Singing Bridge or Rock Creek Bridge south of Twin Falls.

The existing steel truss bridge across Rock Creek was inspected on the following dates: March 5, 1987; March 17, 1988; April 19, 1989; April 19, 1989; Sept. 27, 1989. The next inspection is scheduled for March 1990.

An in-depth bridge inspection was conducted March 29, 1989. The entire structure exhibited extensive rust and corrosion deterioration. The corrosion activity on all the major steel support members is due to the design of the deck which allows moisture, salt and other scattering materials to fall through the grating and accumulate on the major support members and connecting plates.

Based on a computer evaluation of the structure, completed in January 1990, the posting was reduced from a 9-ton axle load limit to a 7-ton limit. The deteriorated condition of the deck stringers, main support beams, was the controlling factor in reducing the load limit.

The present condition of the bridge is very poor and would cost approximately \$340,000 and require a six-week closure to restore the 9-ton load posting. At its present load capacity condition, the bridge has an estimated life expectancy of two to three years.

The city of Twin Falls is requesting our participation, in the amount of \$250,000, towards construction of another bridge which could be used as a detour during the construction of a State Highway 74 replacement structure. The department's bridge maintenance section will continue to perform periodic maintenance on the deck system to maintain the present load limit until the bridge is taken out of service.

We committed money to a study of the site. That study was favorable. Our agency will eagerly go forward with the project as soon as money is available.

The fact that we have received pressure from the local community is not new. The Times-News has reported that numerous times in the past. The local community should be commended for that pressure.

That is how the political process works. It is also how virtually every state park Idaho operates was created.

Highlights of drug summit communique

CARTAGENA, Colombia (AP) — Following are highlights of the 13-page communique signed Thursday by the presidents of the United States, Colombia, Peru and Bolivia to fight illicit drugs.

The three nations pledged to work together toward "dynamic programs" to fight the flow of drugs from the Andean nations to the United States.

The statement broke no new ground, but sounded a strong theme of cooperation.

"The parties recognize that trafficking in illicit drugs has a negative, long-term impact on their economies," it asserted.

Specifically, the presidents agreed:

- They would cooperate in exchanging information and intelligence. But, in an apparent foreboding of the use of U.S. military forces in the region, the communique asserted "each country may involve its armed forces in this fight within its own national territory."
- The United States agreed "to provide increased equipment and training to the law enforcement agencies and the militaries of the Andean parties."
- They will call for a "world conference against illicit drug trafficking in 1991" and hold a high-level followup to Thursday's four-nation session "within six months."
- The United States will help train Andean farmers on how to switch to other crops to substitute for the lucrative coca harvest.
- Bush will request an economic aid package of an unspecified amount from Congress for fiscal 1991 to 1994 to help offset "significant, immediate and long-term costs," caused by the loss of the coca crop in the three Andean countries. The president has earlier pledged a total of \$2.2 billion in economic and military anti-drug assistance for the Andean nations over five years.
- The United States will try to open its markets more to South American goods and to provide balance-of-payments assistance to help stabilize the economies of the drug-production countries, which have rampant inflation.
- The Bush administration will work for more private investment in the Andean nations.
- The four countries will sponsor programs to strengthen public awareness of drug problems.
- The parties reaffirm their will to fight drug trafficking in a comprehensive manner attacking all facets of the trade: production, transportation and consumption," the statement said.
- On the sensitive issue of military involvement, the communique said "the control of illegal trafficking is essentially a law enforcement

matter" rather than a military one. However, it says that because of the "magnitude" of the problem, "the armed forces in each of these countries, within their own territory and national jurisdictions, may also participate."

The statement also calls for better intelligence-gathering cooperation, stepped up enforcement, more control of chemicals used to manufacture drugs, tighter restrictions on "weapons, planes, ships, explosives and communications equipment" used in drug trafficking.

All the parties agreed to "strengthen controls over the movement of illegal weapons."

The Andean nations have complained that semi-automatic weapons made in the United States are finding their way into the hands of drug traffickers. However, Bush thus far has resisted proposals to change U.S. laws to further restrict the manufacture and export of such firearms.

In addition to the multilateral communique, the United States reached six bilateral agreements with the other countries. Those include:

- An agreement with Bolivia in which the State Department will help diminish that flow of U.S. light arms and other arms to drug traffickers in the Andean countries by requiring weapons exporters to obtain an export certificate from the importing government before the United States will issue an export license. The administration also committed to further discussions to determine what weapons are covered by the directive, and to "pursuing discussion" with other governments concerned about limiting the flow of U.S. weapons to illegitimate end users in the Andean countries.

• An extradition agreement with Peru, asserting that narcotics traffickers are extraditable under Peru's 1889 extradition treaty with the United States.

• An agreement with Peru to exchange tax records, bank statements and other information to uncover drug profiteering and money laundering. It also calls for prosecution of tax evasion to catch drug dealer, and exchanges of technical information to improve tax compliance.

• An agreement with Bolivia pledging cooperation and information-sharing to crack down on U.S. illegal exports of chemicals used to manufacture cocaine. The countries vowed to promptly investigate the destination of such chemicals and seize those destined for illicit points. The agreement requires domestic legislation if needed to provide for such seizure.

Bush plans 'new approach' to media

BARRANQUILLA, Colombia (AP) — President Bush complained testily Thursday about news accounts which he said portrayed him as deceptive, declaring he would hold fewer news conferences and initiate a "new approach" toward reporters.

"From now on, it's going to be a little different. ... So we've got a new relationship," Bush told reporters traveling with him aboard Air Force One to the four-nation Colombia drug summit.

"It will be pleasant. It will be fun. But it's different," said the president, who has averaged one question and answer session with reporters each week since taking office 13 months ago.

Later, Bush's press secretary, Martin Fitzwater, said the president was "just kidding" in asserting that he would have fewer news conferences and in declining comment on a series of questions.

"He was having fun," Fitzwater said. The president, who apparently read a wire service account of his testy mood on the plane, protested to reporters later: "I'm not fuming."

Bush's pique apparently was triggered by an ABC-TV report Wednesday night recapping instances in which Bush's words were belied by subsequent events. The president was criticized on the same score in a Feb. 26 article in "The New Republic" entitled, "The Deceiving Line."

Most recently Bush told a news conference on Monday that it wasn't time yet for a conference among the United States, the Soviet Union, Britain and France on the future status of Germany. "Not at this juncture," he told the news conference.

Yet, the next day, a major agreement was announced in Ottawa by Secretary of State James A. Baker III on a German reunification push that would include a summit among the four powers that vanquished Germany in World War II.

"When I told you ... that I didn't think there'd be a deal and there shortly was a deal, then I'm hit for deceiving you," Bush grouched Thursday.

Bush, a onetime CIA director, has conducted much of his foreign policy in secrecy.

Two missions to China by national security adviser Brent Scowcroft came despite a Bush announcement in the aftermath of the

Tiananmen Square, crackdown that he was barring high-level exchanges between the two countries. The president later insisted that Scowcroft's trips to Beijing were "visits" and not "exchanges," and thus not covered by the Bush edict.

Bush, who usually maintains a bantering relationship with reporters, said, "I think we've had too many press conferences. It overdoes it. It's overexposure."

By answering few questions directly, he said, "I'm not going to be burned for holding out or doing something deceptive."

The president, who slept the night before on Air Force One so he would be well-rested for Thursday's pre-dawn flight here, even gave a prickly response when asked if he had gotten a good night's sleep.

"I had a very good night's sleep. I can't get into the details of that because some will say it's too much sleep, some will say it's too little. ..."

Bush parried a series of questions from reporters, most of them dealing with the drug

summit. "I'm not going to discuss what I'm going to bring up," Bush said when asked about his agenda for the day's conference in Cartagena with the presidents of Colombia, Peru and Bolivia.

"I'm not going to discuss whether there's any surprises or not. This is a new thing. This is a new approach."

He then said his non-answers were "a trial run" for later dealings with the media.

In fact, Bush, who answers reporters questions about once a week, planned to finish his day in Colombia with yet another news conference.

Bush's comments with reporters came shortly before his jet touched down here, where a U.S. press center was set up at the airport. Bush flew by helicopter the 60 miles to Cartagena and was returning here before flying home to Washington.

Asked about an NBC-TV report that Colombian President Virgilio Barco had made a deal with some drug lords in his country not to extradite them to the United States if they turned over drug labs, Bush snapped: "I'm not going to comment on whether I know about it or not. I can't comment on whether it's true or not."

Bush did not mention which particular news reports had lured him the most.

However, Thursday's editions of the Washington Post had a story on what it called "the debate between President Bush and the press over secrecy and deception."

And ABC-TV had a news report on Wednesday night — by White House correspondent Brit Hume on the same subject.

Hume was one of several reporters invited to a recent off the record lunch at the White House with Bush, at which the subject reportedly came up.

News accounts said that Bush told the reporters at the lunch that he had undertaken no further secret diplomatic missions — like Scowcroft's clandestine visits to China.

Then, the next day, it was disclosed that Deputy Secretary of State Lawrence Eagleburger had gone on a secret mission to London to notify U.S. allies of Bush's latest plan to reduce troops in Europe.

Heavy security in place for drug summit

CARTAGENA, Colombia (AP) — Soldiers wore camouflage uniforms and had automatic rifles at their sides.

Helicopter gunships made passes over the city and its beaches while frigates patrolled the bay — all part of an extraordinary security blanket thrown over the drug summit.

Typifying the protective measures was a swarm of helicopters that accompanied President Bush from Barranquilla, 60 miles northeast of here, to the summit site at a heavily fortified naval base.

The helicopters rode fast and hugged the terrain in what was described as an evasive tactical against any attack. The presidential chopper landed first. It blew hats and helmets off security guards spaced around the parade grounds as a U.S. counter-assault team looked on — its members wearing casual slacks, polo shirts and huge backpacks.

"First class. We've got the best, the best," Bush said at one point in boasting about the security detail.

The U.S. security forces had taken extraordinary measures to guard Bush following a report in December that Colombian drug lords had taken a \$30 million contract on the president's life and reports that surface-to-air missiles had been

acquired to shoot down his plane.

Two U.S. warships, the Nassau and the Sampson, were cruising off the Colombian coast. The Nassau carries a marine amphibious assault company that can be used in the case of an emergency.

Colombian navy frogmen checked the bay, apparently looking for explosives near the Spanish fortification where the presidents were meeting.

The air corridor between the Caribbean coastal cities of Barranquilla and Cartagena was closed to civilian aircraft. Two American Blackhawk helicopters belonging to Colombia's army of Antioquia, the Colombian radio joined in the security cover, network Caracol said.

There was no apparent sign of danger to Bush or to his summit partners — Presidents Virgilio Barco of Colombia, Alan Garcia of Peru and Jaime Paz of Bolivia.

And yet, apparently protesting the

Colombian, young people burned a sea-Cola truck and a computer microbus in the northwestern city of Medellin, in front of the University of Antioquia, the Colombian radio joined in the security cover, network Caracol said.

In the central Colombian town of Barancabermeja, a toll booth on the highway was "blown up" with dynamite and a wall near the booth was painted with the message in Spanish, "Gringos Get Out Of Colombia!"

Drug case gets first guilty plea

MIAMI (AP) — A pilot admitted Thursday to flying \$800,000 in cocaine profits from Florida to Panama in 1983, becoming the first of Manuel Noriega's co-defendants to plead guilty in the drug trafficking case.

Noriega lawyers said their client had nothing to fear from information the pilot, Eduardo Pardo, might give prosecutors.

"If he tells the truth, he can't hurt us," said Noriega attorney Frank Rubino.

Pardo, 44, was arrested by Drug Enforcement Administration agents in Panama City after the U.S. invasion. His attorney, William Meadows, said there was no plea bargain in the case.

Noriega and Pardo were among 16 people indicted in Miami in February 1988 on charges of taking part in a conspiracy that made Panama a way station and processing center for Colombia's Medellin drug cartel.

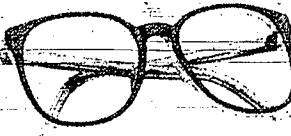
Shaken and occasionally close to tears, Pardo, who faces up to five years in prison and a \$100,000 fine at sentencing April 25 on a single count of illegal travel, admitted to prosecutors' account of the 1983 drug-money flight.

Pardo and co-defendant Daniel Miranda flew a Lear jet fitted with secret compartments so that money could be hidden. "Somebody told me that," he said. "They were worried that the secret compartment made the plane unsafe to fly, but they were assured it was OK."

Pardo received \$40,000 for the flight and knew it was drug money, the prosecutor said.

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Bush also wants diary use limits

WASHINGTON — For the first time, the Bush administration has claimed executive privilege in an effort to prevent public disclosure of confidential White House information.

The claim was filed in federal court Thursday by the Justice Department, which joined former President Reagan in asserting that Iran-Contra defendant John Poindexter should not be permitted to see more than 30 entries from Reagan's personal diary of his White House days.

The Justice Department's action followed Greene's statement last week that a former president's assertion of executive privilege would be stronger if the current president joined him.

Poindexter, a former national security adviser to Reagan, wants to use the Reagan diary to help him convince a jury that the former president authorized many of the actions that led to his indictment. Poindexter is scheduled to go on trial March 5 on charges of conspiracy, deceiving Congress and obstructing its effort to get to the bottom of the clandestine Iran-

Justice Department lawyers declared on behalf of President Bush that Poindexter's reasons for seeking access to the diary are outweighed by the need to protect candid and confidential consultations between presidents and their advisers.

"We believe that this (executive) privilege applies especially to a president's own personal writings for himself, which directly concern his conduct of his important, official duties," the government lawyers wrote to Greene.

They also argued that Poindexter may get the information by questioning Reagan directly and that "all or almost all information in the diary entries is already in the public domain."

Reagan himself made some diary excerpts available to the Tower Commission, which reported on its investigation of the Iran-Contra affair in 1987, and to senior members of the congressional Iran-Contra Committee that took testimony later that year. However, the excerpts were not made public.

Twelve news organizations urged Greene to open Friday's pretrial interrogation of Reagan, citing constitutional press freedoms and the right of public access to court records.

But Greene said he denied the motion because of the "strong likelihood" that sensitive national security information will be revealed.

Snow and ice damage crops, block travel

Snow and ice cut a swath from Southern California to New England on Thursday, closing a major highway, chilling "snowbird" tourists in the Arizona desert and shutting down the world's busiest airport, at Chicago.

Hundreds of schools were closed and thousands of customers lost power. At least six traffic deaths occurred on slippery roads. Fruit and vegetable growers in the Southwest were able to do little to protect their crops.

Along the southern edge of the stormy weather a tornado flipped two mobile homes and injured three people in Louisiana.

In Michigan, the state House canceled Thursday's session, but the Senate went ahead with its work.

"We are not part-time here," said Sen. Phil Arthurhult. Hundreds of flights were canceled at Chicago's O'Hare Airport after it was shut down by snow late Wednesday. By Thursday morning only three runways were open.

Snowfall totaled 8 to 10 inches in northern Illinois.

Southern Wisconsin got 4 to 6 inches, and up to 8 inches fell in Michigan. Up to 6 inches fell across New York state, and snow, sleet and freezing rain threatened power lines in New Hampshire.

Drifts up to a foot high closed Mitchell International Airport in Milwaukee overnight. American Airlines canceled all flights Wednesday at Oklahoma City's Will Rogers World Airport because planes that were de-iced at the passenger gate were refreezing before they could clear the runway on takeoff.

Schools were closed across parts of Wisconsin, Michigan, Indiana, Iowa, northern Ohio, Pennsylvania, New Hampshire, Kansas and Missouri.

An ice storm knocked out electricity to more than 146,000 customers in northern Ohio, although most service was restored Thursday.

At least 4,000 customers lost power in Illinois. Outages also were reported in Indiana and Pennsylvania.

An ice storm hit Erie, Pa., at mid-morning, pulling down power lines and tree limbs, causing fires and

closing schools. All five TV stations in the city were knocked off the air and two of them, WQLN and WJET, were evacuated for fear their transmission towers would collapse under the weight of the ice.

Snow and ice forced the closure of Interstate 10 across hilly southeastern Arizona, from the New Mexico border to 20 miles east of Tucson. It was reopened 10 hours later at midday.

The Arizona closure blocked hundreds of vehicles along I-10 in New Mexico, where roads also were icy. There were a lot of people stuck here, at least 200 people were here, all night long," said Tommy Esquivel, manager of a truck stop near Deming, N.M.

"Our whole parking lot was full of trucks and out in the street all the way through town," said Cory Sucedo, manager of a truck stop in Lordsburg, N.M. "More than 300 people stayed inside the building, from last night until a few minutes ago."

"Snowbirds," people who flee colder climates for places like Southern California and Arizona, were stranded in Phoenix, in what local promoters call the Valley of the Sun. Thursday's low was 32 degrees.

"People can't believe they came out here for this," said Loretta Taylor in Apache Junction, Ariz., outside Phoenix.

Snow fell Wednesday and Thursday in Phoenix suburbs and in Tucson and other places in southern Arizona, but that didn't faze Midwest golfers spending their vacations at The Boulders resort in Carefree, north of Phoenix.

"We've sold about four-and-a-half dozen stocking caps," assistant golf pro Stu Stubbs said. "They all come here from the cold anyway, so it doesn't bother them too much."

Record cold along the West Coast — 30 at Sacramento, Calif. — drove hundreds of homeless people into shelters in Los Angeles. In Seattle, King County opened its administration building as a refuge for the homeless.

In Southern California, San Diego County's avocado and citrus crops sustained major damage as temperatures plunged into the mid-20s.

NRC removes 3 nuclear plants from 'watch list'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Nuclear Regulatory Commission on Thursday took three nuclear power plants off its list of plants that require special oversight, citing safety and operational improvements by the operating utilities.

The three plants that were taken off the NRC's "watch list" were: • Both the No. 2 and No. 3 reactor units of the Peach Bottom nuclear plant operated in Pennsylvania by the Philadelphia Electric Co.

• The Pilgrim nuclear plant operated in Massachusetts by the Boston Edison Co.

• Both the No. 3 and No. 4 reactor units of the Turkey Point nuclear plant operated in Florida by the Florida Power & Light Co.

The federal agency continued to single out six reactor units at three nuclear plants for special

surveillance in its semiannual review of nuclear plant operations.

These plants were the Nine Mile Point Units 1 and 2 operated in New York by Niagara Mohawk Power; the Surry Units 1 and 2 operated in Virginia by the Virginia Power Co.; and the Calvert Cliffs Units 1 and 2 operated in Maryland by Baltimore Gas & Electric.

The facilities are authorized by the NRC to continue operation and are running safely, but are being monitored closely because of past problems, agency officials said.

In addition, the NRC continued to categorize the three reactor units of the Browns Ferry nuclear plant operated in Alabama by the Tennessee Valley Authority as not having authority to operate.

The Browns Ferry facilities have been shut down since the mid 1980s.

Judge asked to rule against flag burn ban

A federal judge in Seattle says she will rule within days on whether Congress violated the Constitution last year by passing a law prohibiting desecration of the American flag.

But U.S. District Judge Barbara Rothstein said she knew that no matter which way she ruled the issue was certain to be appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court.

In the country's first test of the Flag Protection Act of 1989, Rothstein heard arguments Wednesday from government lawyers and attorneys for four people charged with burning a flag in a Seattle protest last October.

"People must be as free to burn the flag to express protest as they are free to wave the flag," argued David Cole of the New York-based Center for Constitutional Rights.

The government has no right to compel people to be patriotic, Cole said. To prohibit free expression, including burning the flag, "is to deny the very freedom that our country stands for," he said.

14 L-tryptophan deaths noted

ATLANTA (AP) — At least 14 deaths and more than 1,200 cases of a rare, painful blood disorder have been attributed to the health food supplement L-tryptophan, the Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday.

The CDC said it has received reports of 1,269 cases of

eosinophilia-myalgia syndrome, the disorder first linked in November to L-tryptophan.

A total of 210 cases, including four deaths, have been reported in California. The CDC studied files on 118 of those cases and found that 89 percent were female and 9 percent non-Hispanic whites.

First lady has cancer taken from upper lip

WASHINGTON (AP) — Barbara Bush had surgery to remove a small skin cancer from her upper lip, her press office said Thursday.

The operation was done Wednesday at Bethesda Naval Hospital, and her office released first word of the surgery Thursday in a statement that described the procedure as "a routine outpatient medical procedure."

"No side effects or subsequent difficulties are expected," said the statement, which was issued as most of the White House press corps was with President Bush at the drug summit in Colombia.

Mrs. Bush had several stitches from her lip toward her nose, sources told The Associated Press. She wore a small bandage when she accompanied the president to dinner Wednesday night.

The first lady was reported to be perky and relaxed Thursday morning before she left for New York to visit All Children's House, a day-care center for severely ill children and Washington later in the day. Mrs. Bush, 64, has suffered for a year from Graves disease, an immune system disorder that affected her thyroid and irritated her eyes.

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Quayle says he's changed his views about Soviet Union

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Dan Quayle, often the voice of skepticism within the White House toward the Soviet Union, said Thursday he has changed his opinion about the communist state.

"I would say anybody that has not changed their mind over the last six

or seven months is not thinking correctly," he said of the fast-changing reforms that Mikhail Gorbachev has ushered in in Moscow.

"Of course you change your opinion," Quayle said after a reporter asked if he remained

suspicious of Gorbachev's intentions.

"A lot of things have happened, and I have a different assessment of where the Soviet Union is heading and where it may or may not go than I did six months ago or a year ago."

Mandela stresses guerrilla acts; whites want government ousted

SOWETO, South Africa (AP) — Nelson Mandela said Thursday his guerrilla movement considers government facilities legitimate targets and will continue attacking them until South Africa's white leaders negotiate an agreement on racial equality.

"Mandela, the African National Congress leader released Feb. 11 after 27 years in prison, also said civilian casualties are inevitable in a bombing and sabotage campaign."

"In the capital of Pretoria, thousands of conservative whites protested President F.W. de Klerk's decision to free Mandela and legalize the ANC and other black groups."

"The government announced that 1,000 army troops will be deployed in Natal Province to quell violence between black organizations that disagree over the best way to fight for the rights of the black majority."

Earlier, Thursday, Mandela met former U.S. presidential candidate Jesse Jackson on his final day of an eight-day visit to South Africa.

Jackson said South African blacks still were not free and that the United States and Western Europe must sustain pressure, including economic sanctions, to force the de Klerk government to dismantle apartheid.

"The mission around the world is that Mandela is free. That is not true. Mandela is out of jail, he is not free," Jackson said. "We must not lower the standards of democracy or expectations for democracy in South Africa."

Jackson said he gave an invitation to Mandela from New York Mayor David Dinkins asking the ANC leader to visit New York. President

Bush has invited de Klerk and Mandela to visit the United States. "Our objective is that the targets are government installations," Mandela said in an interview from his home in Soweto, the township outside Johannesburg.

But he added, "In a conflict, civilians must be caught up in cross fire."

Mandela helped launch the ANC's guerrilla campaign in 1961, a year after the organization was outlawed, and was jailed the following year.

The ANC's official policy always has been to limit attacks to government facilities and personnel, although some hard-line ANC leaders have expressed a desire to hit civilian targets.

There have been numerous attacks

on civilians in recent years, but the ANC has said those were the result of guerrillas who had not undergone proper training.

Mandela said that prior to a Dec. 13 meeting with de Klerk, "I made it clear that the armed struggle will never be suspended, to say nothing of it being stopped, until a settlement is reached, and we stick to that decision."

De Klerk legalized the ANC on Feb. 2.

"We would like to move away from the situation of conflict and confrontation," Mandela said. But "as long as apartheid exists, and as long as the government has not created the conditions conducive to negotiations, we will maintain our strategies."

After 32 years of marriage, Winnie Mandela becomes a wife

SOWETO, South Africa (AP) — After more than 30 years of marriage, Winnie Mandela is finally learning to live with her husband.

"I've been giving orders, and now I have to take them," Mrs. Mandela said with a laugh during an interview Thursday in the couple's home in Soweto.

Winnie Mandela, a former social worker, married Nelson Mandela in 1958, when she was 24 and he was a 40-year-old African National Congress leader on trial for treason.

He was acquitted in 1960, went underground a year later, was arrested in 1962 and remained in prison until Sunday. During his more than 27 years in jail, Mrs. Mandela raised their two daughters alone and became a forceful and controversial anti-apartheid activist in her own right.

Now, at 55, she said she is becoming a wife. "We never really lived together," said Mrs. Mandela. "So it's like I've just got married. And I'm learning the tricks of married life."

"It is fun, and very strange indeed at my age to wake up in the morning and I am told, 'Fetch my shirt, what shirt have you prepared? Where are my shoes? Where's my tie? What should I wear?'" she

said, reflecting traditional African society where the male in the family is the central figure.

It has been a marriage fraught with pain and frustration.

White Mandela was doing hard labor on Robben Island Prison, his wife was allowed to visit once every six months, and he could only receive one letter every six months. After several years the International Red Cross succeeded in having privileges increased for Mandela and his colleagues.

Prison authorities refused to allow the Mandelas contact visits until a few years ago. Regulations also forbade their daughters, Zindzi and Zenani, from seeing their father until they reached the age of 16.

"All they did was just read about their father," Mrs. Mandela said. "I had to take them and introduce them to him when they turned 16."

"The trauma of that type of meeting was so hurtful. It was such a piercing reminder of who we are, of who we are in the struggle for the liberation of our people," she said. "You just felt a piercing dagger being struck right through your heart."

Since his release, Mandela has often said his wife and family suffered more than him.

Study links leukemia, nuclear plants

LONDON (AP) — A new study published Thursday said high rates of leukemia in young people living near nuclear plants may be caused by radiation doses their fathers received before they were born.

"The government said it was concerned and would refer the findings to its committee of experts on radiation for urgent consideration."

Men who work at nuclear plants, particularly those who received high radiation doses in the six months before their offspring's conception, had more children with leukemia than men in other jobs, said the study published in the British Medical Journal.

One researcher, radiotherapist

Michael Snee, said the radiation probably caused a mutation in the fathers' sperm.

The researchers' study, headed by Martin Gardner, professor of medical studies at the University of Southampton, examined 52 victims of leukemia and lymphoma under 25 years old, born in the West Cumbria health district and diagnosed between 1950-85. They were compared with 1,001 control children.

The Sellafield nuclear reprocessing plant, which has been plagued by radioactive leaks, is in the district on England's northwest coast. Government studies have found a 10-fold increase in childhood leukemia a mile from the

plant.

One study, by the Medical Research Council and the Imperial Research Fund, reported in November that an increased risk of leukemia is not associated with exposure to radiation, with the possible exception of the Sellafield plant.

"The main finding was of a raised risk for those children whose fathers worked at Sellafield, in particular fathers with the highest recorded exposure to external ionizing radiation before their child's conception," Gardner told a news conference. "The risk was raised by sixfold to eightfold for fathers who had received total doses of over 100 millisieverts (msv)."

Beirut shellfire intensifies war

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Gen. Michel Aoun's gunners poured 50 shells a minute into the main east Beirut stronghold of his Christian militia rivals Thursday, destroying apartment houses, schools and churches.

Dense smoke hung over a chain of burning buildings on the fringes of the Ein Rummaneh district. Police said firemen could not fight the flames because water pumping stations north of the city were knocked out by artillery fire.

Ein Rummaneh is the main battlefield in Aoun's 17-day-old campaign to crush the Lebanese Forces militia of Samir Geagea and gain control of the 310-square-mile enclave north and east of Beirut where 1 million Christians live.

Militiamen darted from house to house Wednesday, firing rocket-propelled grenades and armor-piercing shells from 106mm cannons to clear assaults.

South Koreans agree to adopt larger role in their own defense

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Defense Secretary Dick Cheney and South Korean officials agreed Thursday to the withdrawal of several thousand U.S. troops over the next three years as Korea "takes the lead" in its own defense.

Cheney, on the first leg of an Asian-Pacific tour that is also taking him to the Philippines and Japan, said the troop reductions would not be done "precipitously" and pledged to keep U.S. soldiers based here as long as the Korean people want them.

"We aren't going to move precipitously... our commitment remains strong," Cheney said at a news conference. "The threat remains undiminished."

U.S. officials said Cheney told the South Koreans he wants to cut U.S. forces in Asia and the Pacific by 10 percent to 17 percent, with 5,000 of the troops being pulled out of South Korea and 7,000 to 9,400 leaving the Philippines and Japan. There are

120,000 troops based in the three countries, including 43,000 in South Korea.

Cheney and his South Korean counterpart Lee Sang Hoon also pledged to move toward handing over the command of the joint U.S.-Korean military structure — now held by a U.S. four-star general — to a Korean general, the two officials announced.

The developments mark a major change in the two allies' relationship and may result in the most dramatic contraction of the U.S. forces here since the end of the 1950-53 Korean War.

The Republic of Korea "can now do more to provide for its own security," Cheney told reporters.

Referring to the shift towards a smaller U.S. military presence on the strategic peninsula, coupled with South Korea adopting more responsibility for its own defense, Cheney said, "We talked about the United States playing more of a

supportive role as the Republic of Korea takes the lead."

The defense secretary said such steps were made possible by South Korea's "spectacular record" of economic growth. He said it also was due in part to congressional pressure to slash U.S. defense expenditures, particularly overseas at a time of lessened superpower tensions.

"I accepted in principle the gradual cutback in troop strength" of non-combatant U.S. forces, Lee said, adding that the details of a cutback of some 5,000 to 6,000 soldiers would be left to the two nation's senior military commanders.

The Korean official said his government would also give "positive consideration" to increasing its support for the U.S. troops stationed here under a 1954 mutual defense pact.

A U.S. official, who spoke on condition he not be identified by name, said Cheney wants Seoul to

double its \$300 million annual contribution to the support of the U.S. troops.

The South Koreans at first "reacted with horror" at the suggested troop pullout, because they believed it would be the first step in a total withdrawal and would mean "the American security blanket is gone," he said.

But the official said that after a series of discussions, "reasonableness has set in," and he believed the Korean officials would accept the proposals.

The official stressed that Cheney had not pressed the Koreans to respond with specific numbers or plans immediately, and that much of the details won't be worked out until the fall. Part of the difficulties involved in getting South Korea to pay more for such things as libraries, theaters and other facilities is that the Seoul government doesn't even provide such things for its own 680,000 troops, the official said.

Argentina, Britain restore full ties

MADRID, Spain (AP) — Argentina and Britain announced an agreement Thursday to restore full diplomatic ties nearly eight years after they fought a bloody war over the windswept Falkland Islands.

The announcement followed two days of talks in Madrid between Argentine and British officials. It was read in Spanish by Argentine ambassador-at-large Lucia del Solar and in English by British-U.N. representative Sir Crispin Tickell.

During the talks, Britain agreed to lift by the end of March a 150-mile military protection zone enforced around the islands since Argentina invaded them in June 1982.

The agreement said new arrangements to assure security of the sparsely populated islands would involve advance notice by both sides of military maneuvers in the area.

Romanian officers stage protests

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — Military officers demanding the dismissal of Nicolae Ceausescu's top military brass protested outside government headquarters Thursday and said they will not leave until their demands are met.

Hundreds of civilians flocked to Victory Square to back the officers, whose support helped win the December revolution that ended Ceausescu's 24-year Communist dictatorship. The 58 officers spent three nights inside government headquarters on Victory Square and left early Thursday after Prime Minister Petre Roman agreed to set up a commission to investigate the activities of Defense Minister Nicolae Militaru and Interior Minister Mihai Chiriac.

Soviets pull out of Czechoslovakia

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — The Red Army will start leaving Czechoslovakia next week and an agreement on complete Soviet withdrawal from Hungary may come within a month, officials said Thursday.

Gen. Anton Sliimak, Czechoslovak chief of staff, said the Soviet withdrawal would begin next week in Bruntal, 160 miles east of Prague, the official news agency CTK reported. Czechoslovakia had sought total withdrawal by the end of this year, but Sliimak said that would not happen. Moscow wants until the end of 1991, and sources in Prague said earlier this week June 1991 was a likely compromise.

Swedish government leaders resign

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — Prime Minister Ingvar Carlsson submitted the resignation of his Social Democratic government Thursday after losing a vote in Parliament over an economic rescue bill.

Five opposition parties, from communists to conservatives, united to kill the plan calling for a two-year freeze on wages and prices and restrictions on strikes. The government proposed the bill to quell escalating wage demands and labor strife. The resignation set off what could be an extended period of haggling to create a new government. If unsuccessful, an early election will be required.

Hostage sibling acts help in Europe

STRASBOURG, France (AP) — The sister of American hostage Terry Anderson urged the European Parliament Thursday to help seek the release of all 18 Westerners held in Lebanon.

Peggy Say is touring Europe, North Africa and the Middle East to spur efforts to free the hostages. Anderson, the chief Middle East correspondent of The Associated Press, was abducted in Beirut on March 16, 1985. Seventeen others — seven Americans, four Britons, two West Germans, two Swiss, and Italian and an Irishman — also are being held in Lebanon.

Syria seeking peace pact with Israel

JERUSALEM — Syria has sounded out Israel about the possibility of a peace accord between the two countries, official Israeli sources said Thursday.

Contacts between the two countries have involved Israeli and Syrian representatives as well as American, Argentine and Egyptian mediators, the sources said.

In the aftermath of sweeping changes in the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe, Syria appears to be moderating its foreign policy.

Bad wells fuel move toward city water

TWIN FALLS — A neighborhood with more than a dozen contaminated wells is considering whether it needs to connect into the city's water and sewer system.

About 60 residents in the area about a quarter-mile east of Eastland Drive and on both side of Falls Avenue attended an informational meeting Thursday night at the College of Southern Idaho.

Several state environmental quality officials talked about what might have

contaminated 17 of 20 wells in the Plainview Subdivision.

"There was a gross amount of contamination on Plainview Drive," said Pat O'Rourke, of the state Division of Environmental Quality.

"The neighborhood may have to pay for the improvements that Twin Falls engineer Gerald Martens has estimated could be as high as \$600,000.

The area needs to form either a home owners association or a local improvement district to administer the project, said Alan Stanford of the state Division of

Environmental Quality. Twin Falls County also administer the project, he said.

Before home owners decide what to do, a feasibility study is required, he said. The study could be funded by the state, but the organization needs to send him a letter within a few months to confirm its interest in having a study done, he said.

The County Commission, which is helping to administrate the feasibility portion of the project, has already selected EHM Engineers Inc. to do the study for

Gooding pushes to find use for old TB hospital

GOODING — The city of Gooding is doing all it can to find a use for the vacant state tuberculosis hospital on the edge of town before the state tears it down in August.

The city is working with a New Mexico management firm to possibly make the old building a private prison; it is checking the possibility of making it a veteran's hospital; and it is asking local firms if they'd be interested in purchasing the building, said Gary Phelps, chairman of the Gooding Chamber of Commerce committee heading up the project.

Recently described by Gooding Mayor

Gene Heller as "albatross around the state's neck," and by Gov. Cecil Andrus as a "white elephant," the state and city have now agreed on a deadline for putting the building to use.

The state agreed to sell the site to the city at a meeting earlier this week, but the state will demolish the building if the city can't find a use for it by August, Phelps said. The building has been vacant since 1965, despite numerous plans to convert it to something useful.

The city is currently negotiating with Western Corrections Group of Santa Fe to turn the building into a 400-bed private, minimum-security prison, Phelps said. Neighboring states, but not Idaho, have

Peavey won't seek Senate seat this year

BOISE — Congress may be in his blood, but state Sen. John Peavey won't reach for the U.S. Senate this year.

"There's a lot of people who think somebody from the Magic Valley with an agricultural background and a good, solid progressive voting record could win," Peavey said.

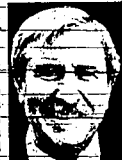
As Senate minority caucus chairman, Peavey would have been a loss to the Democrats who have set their sights on overturning the Republicans' 23-19 majority.

Barrett enters county contest for treasurer

BURLEY — Betty Barrett, county treasurer candidate, said fiscal budgets are part of a responsible elected official's duties.

State board pledges to help Twin Falls truckers

BOISE — Twin Falls truckers and Highway District representatives asked the state Transportation Board Thursday to help sort out the chaos created by the recent weight restrictions on the Singing Bridge.

"We have seen many trucks, not familiar with the area, wandering around on city and county roads trying to figure out how to get to the other side of the bridge without using the bridge," said Clyde Burney, Twin Falls County Highway District director.

"The truckers are losing time and money wandering about—and our roads are deteriorating more quickly as a result," he said.

The Highway District wants signs along a detour route that would proceed west along Pole Line Road to Washington Street North, and then proceed south on Washington Street North. Trucks could then be routed onto State Highway 30 or remain on the truck route on Washington Street North to Sixth Avenue West to Minidoka Avenue, and onto State Highway 30.

After hearing testimony last month about how many Twin Falls businesses have been crippled by weight restrictions on the Singing Bridge, the board was sympathetic to the request for the designated truck route and for improvements needed on two intersections along the way.

"I think you ought to get everything you

need to get it done fast," board member Phil Batt said.

The only reservations the board had was on whether the truck route proposed Thursday would win the city's approval.

"I don't have a problem with that plan," Gary Young, Twin Falls city engineer, said during a later telephone interview.

In fact, Young said the western truck route is similar to the route that would be used after the bridge is built connecting Sixth Avenue West and Victory Avenue. That project is tentatively slated for completion in the summer of 1991.

The mood of Thursday's meeting was conciliatory on both sides. The board pledged to work with local truckers and the highway district and truckers pledged to

make the best of a bad situation.

"We don't have a problem working with the state to get where we want to go," said Gary Blich, owner of the Blich Trucking Co.

The Singing Bridge is currently scheduled for replacement in 1993. Batt told the group he had hoped to arrange for temporary repair to ease the load restrictions.

But repair cost estimates topped \$300,000 and the bridge would have to be closed for six months.

Even then, Batt said there is some doubt about the irreparable damage to the metal structure.

"I guess it really isn't feasible to patch it," he said.

Kiebert, who is also a former Idaho Senate minority leader, is accused of fondling the girl in the bedroom and the shower of his East Hope home between April 1985 and June 1986. The girl was 11 and 12 at the time. She is now 16, and is expected to testify against Kiebert at trial.

The maximum sentence is life in prison for the lewd conduct charge and five years and a \$5,000 fine for the sex abuse charge.

\$13,500 on condition that the neighborhood receives the state grant.

Stanford said the grant would pay for between 75 to 90 percent of the feasibility study.

The study will determine which homes should be included in the project, the best system to take care of the problem and the cost.

The next phase will be to design a water and sewer system and then build it, he said.

The state can give 4 percent, 20-year loans for design and construction phases to a handful of cities on a first-come-first-serve basis, he said.

City Manager Tom Courtney said 4 percent is a good deal considering rates for city bonds range between

6 1/2 percent and 7 percent.

He said the city cannot help administer the project because the neighborhood is in the city's impact area, but once the sewer and water lines are connected, the city would maintain them.

Although the neighborhood could be annexed if the lines are connected, it is not likely that would happen considering that city services would be part of such a deal.

The neighborhood is seeking volunteers to form a committee to study the issue.

O'Rourke said many homes in the area were built on quarter-acre lots, which typically are not large enough to allow wells and septic tanks to be placed far enough away.

"There probably was a lack of foresight at that time that a drain field doesn't last forever," he said.

He said drain fields are 60 percent larger than that time.

Mike Mcasters of Environmental Quality said home owners in that area should have wells tested for coliform and if it is detected they should not use the water or boil it five minutes before using.

The test costs about \$10.50, he said.

Coliform is an indicator that other viruses and bacteria including typhoid and hepatitis could be present.

The subdivisions that may be affected are College Terraces, Lakewood and Lakewood No. 2 Subdivisions, Ken Lee Subdivision, Donna Leigh Subdivision, Sahara Subdivision, Bowlin Addition and adjoining properties.

Barley repayments under fire

BOISE — Agriculture Secretary Clayton Yetter is getting a lot of pressure from Idahoans to delay the federal government's demand that farmers repay barley deficiency payments.

The Idaho Legislature on Thursday completed action on a resolution to Yetter and the president, urging a delay so other solutions can be worked out.

The resolution, written by Rep. Steve Antone, R-Rupert, passed the

Senate on a unanimous voice vote. Also on Thursday, Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, said he plans to meet later this month with Yetter on the same issue.

The legislative message and a statement from Stallings both said Yetter should delay the barley issue until after Congress deals with the 1990 farm bill.

Stallings said the formula used to calculate the payments is flawed because it bases market prices on all varieties of barley, including higher-priced malt barley.

"This inequitable calculation

places feed barley producers (which most Idaho producers are) at a unique disadvantage," Stallings said.

"They are required to repay the entire advance deficiency even though they have not received at near the target price for their feed grain," he said.

Producers in Idaho recently received notice from the U.S. Department of Agriculture that they have to repay their 1988 deficiency payments and soon will be required to repay part or all of their 1989 and 1990 advances if current policy continues.

Officers rescue deer from icy lake

SPOKANE (AP) — A firefighter and an animal control officer maneuvered a rowboat over ice and tugged a yearling buck to safety after the animal was stranded on a frozen lake.

Liberty Lake residents alerted authorities of the deer in distress after they spotted it about 130 yards from shore at MacKenzie Bay on

Wednesday.

"It exhausted itself trying to get off the ice. It became impossible for it to stand up," said Jack Hatch, who donated his aluminum boat for the rescue. "The feet would just collapse under it."

The deer never broke through the ice.

Animal control officer Bob

Smoldt—who assisted in the rescue, shot the deer with a tranquilizer gun, before a rope was slipped around its neck. The deer, sliding along the ice, was towed ashore as rescuers used metal fence posts to propel themselves. The animal was taken to a veterinary clinic where its fur was dried and a week-old neck wound was stitched.

Aspen seeks return to normalcy following defeat of fur ban

ASPEN, Colo. (AP) — The satellite-feeding television trucks were gone Wednesday and so were the political consultants and seemingly endless advertising that turned Aspen's special city election into an international media circus centered on a ban-the-furs ordinance.

The city-wide sense of relief turned to hopeful enthusiasm Wednesday afternoon when it began to snow hard, coming in on a storm a number of western Colorado ski resorts desperately need.

A record 70 percent turnout of the glitzy ski town's voters defeated the nation's first fur-ban ordinance by a 2-1 margin Tuesday night and gave

resounding approval to a \$70 million luxury hotel decried by critics as too big for Aspen.

The various campaigns spent \$250,000, or \$67 per registered voter, and hotel-clerks, waiters, sales people and retired Aspenites were trying to get back to business as usual.

"I'm glad it's over," said Barbara Roe, an Aspen resident for 20 years. "We all need a good rest."

"There's nothing wrong with anybody that a couple of days of sleep wouldn't fix," said Joel Davenport, manager of an Aspen lodge. "Let's get back to normal."

"Normal in Aspen defies easy definition, anyway, particularly with

a recall election coming up March 13.

Mayor Bill Stirling, who with his wife, Katharine Thalberg led the anti-fur forces, is a recall target, along with three of the other four councilmen.

Stirling and Thalberg, both residents of Aspen for 17 years, claimed victory despite the 2-1 pounding at the polls, saying the issue of animal cruelty won't go away.

"We did lose here, but in terms of public opinion and world opinion we won," Thalberg said.

She promised continuing efforts to stop furs, but said she couldn't be specific at this time.

Meanwhile, furrers rejoiced at the voters' affirmation of freedom of choice.

"The decision to purchase and wear fur is a personal one and should not be dictated by politicians' legislative bodies or vocal minorities like the animal rights groups," said a statement issued by the National Fur Retailers Association Wednesday.

The statement was read to reporters from the group's office near Washington, D.C., by the office manager, who said no spokesman from the organization was available to answer questions.

The eight ballot measures on Tuesday's ballot were led by the anti-fur proposal and the debate over

the size of the new Ritz-Carlton hotel, but all reflected the continuing debate over growth in Aspen.

"I feel saddened to have lost so much of our town to an alien culture," said Nick DeWolf, a retired engineer active in Aspenites for a smaller hotel. "I am sure we can coexist and do so hope that not too much of Aspen is consumed."

Mohamed Hadid, developer of the new hotel, promised his group would stay out of the recall election and pledged not to increase the divisiveness in town.

"That only thing we hope is to put this behind us," he said. "We did not come to this town to divide it."

Voters also approved two measures relating to building a four-

lane highway from the current "Killer 82," Colorado 82 that winds up the Roaring Fork Valley from Glenwood Springs to Aspen.

They also approved a \$6-million bond issue and a sales tax increase to fund employee housing.

The 70 percent turnout of Aspen's voters was confirmed by city clerk Wednesday afternoon.

"We do have high turnouts here, usually 55 percent, because we have a very involved citizenry here," said deputy city clerk Jan Carney.

During Tuesday's voting, Carney said, a woman who has lived in Aspen for 20 years remarked, "I've voted on this highway three times before. Couldn't they just look up our old ballots?"

Utah bill aims at complete ban on adoptions by polygamists

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Adoptions by bigamists would be banned under a bill opponents contend is aimed squarely at a southern Utah polygamist family trying to adopt six motherless children.

The legislation would amend Utah law to prohibit adoptions by anyone convicted of incest or bigamy or found by a civil court, using the standard of a preponderance of evidence, to be in violation of those statutes.

If passed, the measure could have bearing on an appeal before the Utah Supreme Court, which is deciding whether a polygamist couple was unconstitutionally disqualified as adoptive parents because of their lifestyle.

Vaughn and Shirane Pletcher have been seeking for nearly two years to adopt six children, ages 6 to 20, of Brenda Thurman, who died of cancer in 1987, three months after marrying Fischer.

A grandfather and two aunts of the children opposed the adoption,

which was denied by 5th Circuit Judge Dean Conder in December 1988.

However, the children remain in the Fischer household in the polygamist enclave of Hilldale pending the Supreme Court's decision.

Commissioner 'pessimistic' about ending lockout

NEW YORK — Baseball commissioner Fay Vincent said he was "extremely pessimistic" about reaching a quick end to the 1990 lockout that began Thursday and shut down spring training across Florida and Arizona.

Negotiators spent the day in Vincent's office and debated the commissioner's proposal, which calls for a 7.5 percent cap on salary increases for players in arbitration.

Union chief Donald Fehr and management negotiator Chuck O'Connor said separate briefings that the talks were "intense," but that progress was slight, if any.

O'Connor said management's revenue-sharing proposal was essentially tabled for this year's negotiations, and Fehr said the arbitration question had now become "a major stumbling block" in the talks.

Vincent, who last week began participating on management's side, said he believed there was little hope for a speedy settlement.

"I am extremely pessimistic. It was not a very productive day," the commissioner said. "I am pessimistic about resolving this in the near-term. I am pessimistic because we're talking, but we don't seem to be making much progress."

Told of Vincent's pessimism, Fehr said: "I don't know what causes him to say that, although I have said before before there is nothing that makes me believe an agreement is within sight."

There was sunshine in Florida and Arizona as baseball began its seventh shut-down in nearly 20 years; players struck in 1972, 1980, 1981 and 1985 and were locked out in 1973 and 1976.

Fehr said both sides spent most of the day discussing arbitration and the benefit plan. While management is proposing to restrict arbitration rights, the union proposes to expand them by allowing players with between two and three years in the major leagues to file. The union agreed to increase eligibility from two to three years in the settlement of 1985's two-day strike.

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The Utah Jazz will fill its roster this week by signing 6-foot-8 forward Ray Brown, who was cut during the pre-season, the club announced.

Brown, a former University of Idaho star now with Rapid City of the CBA, is expected in Salt Lake City Thursday for a physical and will suit up for Saturday's game against visiting Sacramento, team spokesman Kim Turner said Tuesday.

Brown averaged 15.1 points and 9.1 rebounds in 36 CBA games last year.

Auto earnings fall sharply in last quarter

DETROIT (AP) — General Motors Corp. earnings fell by 50 percent and Ford-Motor-Co.'s profit tumbled by 72.9 percent in the fourth quarter...

Year-earlier quarter. Ford earnings declined largely because of a \$424-million loss-linked to the sale of its Rouge Steel Co. subsidiary...

Automakers have closed plants and laid off thousands of workers as they cut production to bring it more in line with slow sales.

The industry began a rebound in January, but that mainly came about because of incentives, which cut directly into profits.

For all of last year, GM's profit fell 13.1 percent to \$4.22 billion from \$4.86 billion in 1988. Annual per-share earnings dropped to \$6.33 from \$7.17.

Ford's 1989 earnings fell 27.6 percent to \$3.84 billion, or \$8.22 a share, from \$5.3 billion, or \$10.96 a share, during 1988.

On Tuesday, No. 3 Chrysler Corp. reported a fourth-quarter loss of \$664 million, largely because of a one-time, \$577 million charge for two-plant closings and the costs of trimming its salaried work force by 2,300 jobs, or 8 percent.

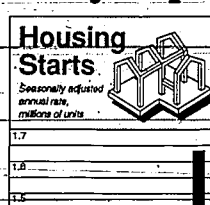
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January housing starts take record jump

WASHINGTON (AP) — Housing starts jumped a record 29.6 percent last month as builders took advantage of the warmest January on record, the government reported Thursday.

The increase broke the previous record gain of 29.3 percent set in July 1982. The department said "unusually warm weather contributed to the increase."

John A. Tuccillo, chief economist for the National Association of Realtors, said the January figures "must be looked at in terms of the big picture, which shows housing starts heading steady."



Housing starts tumbled to 1.37 million last year, the lowest level since the 1982 recession, and many analysts do not expect much improvement in 1990 because of a weak economy and high interest rates.

December was the fourth coldest on record. David Berson, chief economist for the Federal National Mortgage Association, said the weather, particularly affected single-family starts, which jumped 24.8 percent to 1.14 million units, the biggest gain since a 26 percent advance in March 1979.

Apartment construction jumped 42.3 percent to an annual rate of 488,000 units after a revised 1.8 percent gain in December. January's gain was the sharpest since a 56 percent advance in January 1985.

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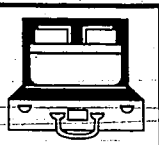

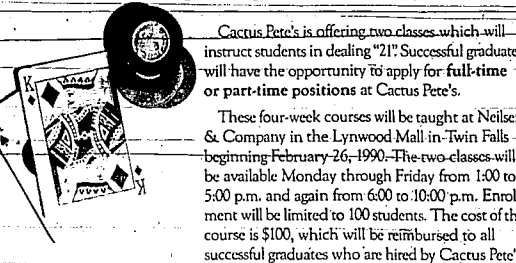

THE ACES ON BRIDGE[®] BOBBY WOLFF

"The greatest mistake you can make in life is to be continually fearing you will make one."

"How can I cut down on my careless errors and blunders?" asks a dejected reader. "The harder I try, the more likely I am to overlook something."

I wrote the gentleman, enclosing a copy of today's column. Bridge is a game of errors; those who can concentrate on making fewer errors than their opponents are the winners. Even champions are sometimes guilty of simple mistakes.

This hand was played in the 1983 World Championship, U.S. vs. Italy. West led the diamond king against the pushy game and continued with a diamond to East's queen. East then led his low diamond, and West ruffed with the spade nine. Declarer

overruled with dummy's queen, promoting East's trump jack to a winner and sending the game to defeat. East later got a trump and a heart for one down. Where did South go wrong?

Instead of overruffing the third diamond, he should have discarded dummy's low heart. Assume West returns a trump (best); dummy's ace wins and a low club is ruffed. A heart is led to the king for another club ruff, and another heart to dummy allows a third club ruff. With no losers in dummy, South ruffs a heart with dummy's low trump and claims the last three tricks with the K-Q of trumps and the ace.

Oscars: 'Fourth' is favored

But 'My Left Foot,' 'Dead Poets Society' draw late surge of interest

HOLLYWOOD—Until they were answered Wednesday, the two big questions about the Academy Awards nominations were which four films would join Universal's "Born on the Fourth of July" on the prestigious ballot, and which four directors would join Oliver Stone on the list of best directors. The question now is, can Stone and "Born on the Fourth" hold on to win?

Given the growing sentiment for Miramax's independently made Irish film "My Left Foot," Disney-Touchstone's "Dead Poets Society" and Warner Bros.' "Driving Miss Daisy"—three of "Born on the Fourth's" competitors on the best-picture ballot—the outcome seems

very much in doubt. "Born on the Fourth," based on the life of a man whose values were reshaped by his disillusionment with his and America's involvement in Vietnam, got the nominations predicted for it—eight in all—and still bears the strongest Oscar credentials. It is a major studio movie with social effects (much more popular this time of year than special effects) and is doing respectable business at the box office. But at a time when the Red Menace is in full retreat and America's political tempers are down, you

have to wonder if the voters will consider the year's angriest movie its best. All four of "Born on the Fourth's" rivals are smaller, calmer pictures with inspirational messages that are downright sanguine by comparison. "Dead Poets Society" is the tale of a free-thinking English teacher's effect on intellectually constricted youths in a New England prep school. "Field of Dreams" revives traditional American ideals in a fantasy about a farmer who works out unsolved problems with his father by calling the ghosts of baseball past to workouts in his corn field. "Driving Miss Daisy" takes a leisurely look at black-white ci-

Nominees mostly gleeful

LOS ANGELES— "My Left Foot" star Daniel Day-Lewis ran jubilant through the streets of London and "Born on the Fourth of July" screenwriter Ron Kovic beamed triumphant after hearing Wednesday's list of Oscar nominees.

Telephones worldwide rang in the good, and sometimes disappointing, news of Academy Awards nominations announced here at a pre-dawn news conference.

"Unbelievable! We'll have to celebrate," a groggy Dan Aykroyd told his publicist when she called him at 5:35 a.m. with word of his "Driving Miss Daisy" supporting actor nod. "Now, I'm going back to sleep."

Most nominees expressed elation. But filmmaker Spike Lee complained that his "Do the

Right Thing" deserved more than two nominations.

"I'm in a little way I'm happy, in a little way I'm disappointed," said screenplay nominee Lee, whose movie also got a supporting actor nod for Danny Aiello. "We got jerked out of best director, best film, I think my cinematographer did a great job, I think my editor did a great job... I know in my heart that my father, Bill Lee, deserved a nomination for best score."

He ended the telephone interview from New York with, "We wuz robbed," spelling out "W-U-Z."

Tom Cruise was working on a movie in Florida and Robin Williams was on location in New York when they learned of their best actor nominations. Oliver Stone was in Los Angeles casting his next movie, "The Doors."

Morgan Freeman was on his boat and

NEA chief: Creativity outlives resources

BOISE—Creativity will be the currency of the 21st century just as natural resources have fueled the 20th century, according to John Frohnmayer, new chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts.

Frohnmayer, an Oregonian who once chaired that state's arts commission, was keynote speaker at last weekend's Centennial Arts Conference. The event, sponsored by the Idaho Commission on the Arts, drew more than 450 people.

America will still cut trees, drill for oil and till farmland. But as natural resources dwindle, people will increasingly turn inward to mine their creative and intellectual assets, said Frohnmayer. "I think we will be judged on how successfully we are able to express ourselves through our art," Frohnmayer said. Throughout history, he added, civilizations have been remembered more often for their culture than for the wars they fought.

The endowment chief—a handsome man in his mid-40s who looks a bit like NBC News anchor Tom Brokaw—was an active participant in

the conference. In addition to addressing an opening luncheon, he talked with the media and attended some of the weekend's many workshops, panels and discussions.

He didn't dodge the issue that greeted him last fall when he arrived in Washington, that of the controversy surrounding the endowment's funding of two controversial exhibits.

The shows prompting the nicks were of works by photographers Robert Mapplethorpe and Andres Serrano. Congress-ended up stripping \$45,000—the amount that funded the two

Idaho arts director 'compelled' to come

BOISE—Margot Knight, newly appointed executive director of the Idaho Commission on the Arts, was an "Army brat" as a kid, never living more than two years in any one place.

Still, she jokes, she's spent enough time in the West—eight years—to know how Westerners feel about Easterners.

So when a friend in Washington, D.C., actually asked her whether there are regularly scheduled airline flights into Idaho, she knew what to

say. She said no. Knight, who will officially take her post in April, was one of more than 90 applicants who responded to the arts commission's nationwide search. Since 1985, she's been assistant director of the National Assembly of State Arts Agencies in the nation's capital.

Prior to that, she worked for the Washington State Commission for the Humanities and was director of Washington State University's Center for the Northwest, and was on hand last weekend for Idaho's first-ever statewide arts conference.

Knight says she felt "propelled and com-

elled" to take the Idaho job, citing a "uniqueness of vision" within arts organizations in the state.

It's an exciting time for the arts in Idaho, she says. While the enthusiasm generated by one-time events like the Centennial and the arts conference may fade in time, a strong economy and support from the governor and legislature should keep the boom going, Knight adds.

Knight also believes the Idaho post, while still administrative, will give her the time and opportunity to meet more artists and personally partake

Centennial conference on arts focuses on film, Shoshone effort

BOISE - A few random notes from the Centennial Arts Conference:
JaNene Buckway of Shoshone and Bob McCull of the Idaho Commission on the Arts led a discussion on the recent Idaho Perspectives project that helped Shoshone discover and preserve its culture and history.
In order for a community to move ahead, it must believe it has something to offer, Buckway said, adding "Part of what was happening in Shoshone was we didn't believe that."
Turning that attitude around was the greatest value of the Idaho Perspectives project, noted Buckway.
Monte Lath, business is up and people are proud of Shoshone, she added.
Muzzie and JoAnn Braun and the Little Braun Brothers - Cody, Willy, Gary and Mickey - were in high spirits at the conference, having just received word Muzzie and the boys have won the American Heritage Award, given by the National Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City.
The Brauns will travel to Oklahoma next month to receive the honor. In the meantime, they were in Boise to drum up some more busi-

ness for the family act. They have performed since 1968 in Texas and Saskatchewan, and they'll soon begin making a new album at Horizon Audio Recording in Meridian. The record should be out around May 1, according to Muzzie.
Film was a major focus at the arts conference. Actor Craig Wasson was on hand to describe what it is like to work in Hollywood and live in Idaho. (He actually resides in Los Angeles but returns to McCall whenever possible.)
And Peg Crist, film specialist for the Idaho Department of Commerce, had good news about the movie industry's growing interest in using Idaho locations and resources.
"They enjoy working here," said Crist. Recent Idaho productions have included segments for "Rescue 911" and "Unsolved Mysteries" and commercials for Clorox and NutraSweet.
It wasn't surprising that Gov. Cecil Andrus could have used a little dramatic coaching in his role as host of last Saturday's Governor's Awards.
But in the Morrison Center expected mistress of ceremonies Ann Sothorn - a veteran actress - stammered and fawned her way through the show. Admittedly, Sothorn has been out of the limelight a while, but her performance was embarrassingly amateurish.

Project targets Hispanic culture

WOODSIE - From wall hangings to bookworking - from paper flowers to pinatas - Idaho's Hispanic people boast their own cultural heritage.
A new project funded through the Idaho Commission on the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts is taking the first steps toward collecting and cataloging Hispanic arts traditions.
And although the Hispanic Heritage Project is not now focusing on southern Idaho, its leader says he invites input from Hispanics in the Magic Valley.
Salvador O. Villegas, project researcher-coordinator, presented a program on the effort at the Centennial Arts Conference. He spoke and showed slides about the wide variety

of culture he has encountered since the project got under way Dec. 1.
"Here in the Magic Valley, we have a lot of Hispanic people who are doing to be art. Villegas noted. For example, pinatas are broken in five minutes, but someone may have put 20 hours into making it.
Handcraft traditions have been passed from generation to generation, with no other purpose than simply decorating a home or livening a party. "It takes them about a little when I say it's art," said Villegas.
The project, now funded through May 31, is concentrating on 10 southwestern Idaho counties (including Elmore and Owyhee) and two

counties in southeastern Oregon.
But in the future, spending more funding, Villegas hopes to expand the project to the Magic Valley, to northern Idaho and to the Baker, Ore., area, all of which have substantial Hispanic populations. He said he plans to make a trip to the Twin Falls area late this spring.
Eventually, he'd also like to see a permanent regional Hispanic cultural center featuring a museum and auditorium for performers.
In the meantime, Villegas invited anyone who wants to contact him about the project to do so by writing the Hispanic Heritage Project, 116 14th Ave. S., Nampa, ID 83651, or by calling 467-5434.
The project also plans a Cinco de Mayo festival May 5-6 at various locations around Nampa.

Arts for Idaho helps raise funds

BOISE - The arts in Idaho are on a roll, and Arts for Idaho hopes to maintain the momentum.
Arts for Idaho is a lobbying organization that boosts the efforts of the Idaho Commission on the Arts to secure funding. The commission has requested \$813,000 for fiscal year 1991.
That would represent a \$388,700 boost over fiscal 1990, when funding totaled \$423,300. Gov. Cecil Andrus, meanwhile, has recommended a \$601,000 budget for the coming fiscal year.
Even Andrus' plan would give the arts a tidy \$176,700 increase. But Jill advocates point to the fact Idaho still ranks near the bottom in per-capita state funding of the arts as much growth as possible.
The members of Arts for Idaho met last weekend during the Centennial Arts Conference to map out strategy for the coming weeks, when the Idaho legislature's Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee will be deciding funding matters.
John S. Chapman, president of the group, said now is the time to write and call legislators and convey a "groundswell of support for the arts."
Arts for Idaho members hope they can translate Andrus' pledge to boosting education - funding - into more money for the arts, too. They'll also be pushing the arts role in the state's increasingly tourist-oriented economy.
Arts for Idaho planned to send Valentines to each member of the funding committee on Wednesday.
Throughout the state, local arts organizations are conducting their own campaigns. Alice Elwood, executive director of the Magic Valley Arts Council, said that group spent part of its most recent meeting addressing postcard funding pleas to legislators.
The Idaho Commission on the Arts' budget request breaks down as follows: \$170,040 for administration; \$47,960 for services to artists; \$315,000 for grants to organizations; \$150,000 for cultural facilities grants; \$25,000 for educational programs; \$50,000 for the rural touring program; and \$45,000 for folk arts programs.

who has access to public television.
In the arts, federal money tends to follow local money, said Frohnmayer. So grassroots support often translates into more aid from Washington.
"The arts are an economic commodity. That's a fact that's not unknown to Sandpoint or Coeur d'Alene or Ashland, Oregon," said Frohnmayer, ticking off three small Northwestern cities that have drawn tourists and boosted their fortunes through strong support for the arts.
Frohnmayer said Idaho is in a strong position to capitalize on its arts assets. He pointed to the conference itself - and its opportunities for networking and sharing - as a good start.
"I have seldom seen a place where there is more energy and electricity about the arts than this state," Frohnmayer told the audience at last Friday's Governor's Awards in the Arts ceremony.
"I feel that Idaho is on the verge of a virtual explosion of the arts," he added. "I commend you for it, and I cheer you on."

more in the arts than has largely managerial job in the nation's capital.

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Martial arts sleeper 'Hard to Kill' takes top spot at box office

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Steven Seagal, the budding action-adventure star and martial-arts expert, claimed the No. 1 spot at the nation's theaters as his "Hard to Kill" opened to robust business of \$9.2 million, according to recently released figures.

"Hard to Kill" collected \$7,082 per screen, according to the figures from Exhibitor Relations Co. The film stars Seagal and his wife, Kelly Le Brock, in a story about a Los Angeles detective who's been in a coma for seven years, then wakes up in a bad mood.

The film was so lightly regarded that Warner Bros. failed to screen it for critics, and even Seagal has bemoaned it repeatedly.

In second place was "Driving Miss Daisy," the comedy about a Southern widow and her chauffeur featuring Jessica Tandy and Morgan Freeman. The film grossed \$6.5 million. It was followed in third by the tear-jerker remake "Stella," starring Bette Midler, on ticket sales of \$3.7 million.

"Born on the Fourth of July," the saga of Vietnam veteran Ron Kovic, slipped 25 percent to fourth place with a gate of \$3 million. In fifth was "Loose Cannons," a new police comedy starring Gene Hackman and Dan Aykroyd, with a take of \$2.2 million.

"Stanley & Iris," the new account of adult illiteracy with Jane Fonda and Robert De Niro, opened weakly in sixth with a gross of \$2.1 million on 907 screens. In seventh was the action-adventure movie "Tango & Cash," with receipts of \$1.8 million.

The divorce-black comedy "The War of the Roses" landed in eighth place on a box-office collection of \$1.73 million.

Oscar omissions indicate squeamishness about realism

HOLLYWOOD — Spike, you want robbed. Again. Or snubbed, although a nomination from one's screenwriter-peers is far from a snub, and Danny Aiello's nomination is clearly a right thing.

There is a fresh feeling to many of the other nominations: in the presence of Daniel Day-Lewis and Brenda Fricker and, astonishingly enough, their director Jim Sheridan for their anxious burr of a movie, "My Left Foot," for Pauline Collins' personal charisma in the gaudy "Shirley Valentine," and to Kenneth Branagh's strong double-showing as actor and director of "Henry V."

son's impeccable, mood-setting camera work was also overlooked. Next time.

Perhaps abrasiveness doesn't pay. The all-out gleeful, virtuosic "War of the Roses" certainly shocked the Academy into silence on every front. C'mon, guys, not even its art direction?

Was "Drugsstore Cowboy" a shut-out another tiny road marker that says that the Academy has come part-way into the world as it is, but that too much verisimilitude makes them, well, nervous? One might think so. This movie, like Spike Lee's, is on the curl of the wave of the future and it would be nice to see its presence recognized.

That said, could we look to the pluses? To the pair of nominations for the indefatigable ladies of "Enemies, A Love Story," Anjelica Huston and Lena Olin (sorry about that, Margaret Scola Stein), and the film's screenplay nod, which may not make up for Paul Mazursky's snub in the Oscars or for the Director's Guild of America, but at least gives us "Enemies" fans a private glow.

Could we take heart from the fact

that the marvels of "The Adventures of Baron Munchausen" did not go unnoticed by the technical savants? Art direction, costume design, makeup and visual effects — the Baron rides again. Could we be at the same time wonder how the anti-heart from "Honey, I Shrunk the Kids" or his back yards felt excepted as a single nomination? Very peculiar.

"Driving Miss Daisy's" nominations for Jessica Tandy and Morgan Freeman are a sort of felicitous double-bind. Yes, they are exactly the kinds of roles that Academy voters like to recognize, but at the same time they bear the imprint of a lifetime of observation and of craft and if it's not their nomination, what is? But did they create these performances entirely on their own, blocking, camera movement and all, or was not Bruce Beresford around somewhere?

Certainly not among the directing nominees.

Now to a private critics or misdeemings section: trade you one garden-variety Jessica Lange performance in "Mussie Box" for one radiantly unfolding one by Andie MacDowell in "sex, lies and videotape." If the voters want to establish an annual Jessica Lange nomination, they should wait for their chance with

"Men Don't Leave."

The old prejudice against comedy seems to have struck again, in the case of Rob Reiner, Meg Ryan and "When Harry Met Sally..." Comedy is harder than dying, and airy, insouciant comedy is at least as hard as the earnest righteousness of "Dead Poets Society."

The art direction of "Glory" and

"Batman" were stunning, but for inventiveness on a less-than-shoestring, "Some Girls'" art nouveau mansion still remains one of the sterling memories of the year. If only the movie had been around for nominators to see. Ah, well.

And in terms of deftness vs. overkill, could we substitute Alan Alda's triumph of smugness in

"Crimes and Misdemeanors" for Marlon Brando's bombast in "A Dry White Season"? Please.

Exit cavilers, kvetchers and pickers of nits, humming "The Little Mermaid's" irresistible nominated "Under the Sea," and feeling better already.

divinity in the South through the 25-year relationship between a Jewish matron and her sage chauffeur. "My Left Foot" manages to make both uplifting and entertaining the life of the severely disabled Irish author and painter Christy Brown.

In a more home, any one of these films might beat "Born on the Fourth." But traditional voting patterns with academy members give "Dead Poets Society" and "My Left Foot" the best chances. Like "Born on the Fourth," they were also nominated for best director and best screenplay, a trifecta that's almost imperative for a best-picture winner. In analyzing the nominations, it is important to remember that except for the best-picture category, the nominations are made by the individual branches of the academy.

That explains how Woody Allen received nominations for both best director and for best original screenplay, while his opinion-splitting "Crimes and Misdemeanors" was overlooked for best picture.

There were notable omissions Wednesday, as usual, "Roger & Me" didn't make the documentary-feature slate and the two Jacks — perennial Oscar nominees Jack Lemmon and Jack Nicholson — did not make the final five among best actors. Rob Reiner's highly popular "When Harry Met Sally" received just one nomination, for Nora Ephron's screenplay. Gus Van Sant's "Drugsstore Cowboy," a small but very accessible film that won the Los Angeles, New York and National Society of Film Critics' awards for best screenplay/was shut out altogether.

The failure of the directors' branch to nominate any one of the three directors of black-themed films — "Do the Right Thing," Spike Lee, "Glory's" Edward Zwick and "Driving Miss Daisy's" Bruce Beresford — is a troubling footnote to the list of the year's best achievements.

Lee's omission is the one surest to rile most film critics. Lee did get a nomination Wednesday for his screenplay, but it was his boldness as a director taking an uncompromising look at race relations in inner-city Brooklyn that most influenced critics.

"Glory," whose combination of history lesson, spectacle and critical success made it a perfect Oscar candidate, was omitted from the best picture, director and screenplay ballots, though the film received five other nominations. The fact that two black actors were nominated — Morgan Freeman for "Driving Miss Daisy" and Denzel Washington for "Glory" — hardly reflects a year that produced the most first-rate, mainstream black-themed films in history.

The most glaring of all the omissions was Bruce Beresford for the best director list. "Driving Miss Daisy" led all films with nine nomi-

Razzies salute worst of year

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Saluting the very worst in motion pictures, the Golden Raspberry Foundation announced the nominees for the 10th Razzie Awards, with Sylvester Stallone, John Travolta, Jane Fonda and "Derek" heading the list of film flops.

Nominated for the most inept film of 1989 were "Karate Kid III," "Lock-Up," "Road House," "Speed Zone" and "Star Trek V."

The latter film received a top six Razzie nomination, followed by "Karate Kid III" with five selections, "Road House" with four, and "Lock-Up," "The Lonely Lady" and "Mommie Dearest" receiving three nominations apiece.

In addition to recognizing the low lights of 1989, the Raspberry Foundation also will dishonor the decade's most dreadful films and performers.

Nominated for worst actor of the year were Tony Danza (for "She's Out of Control"), Ralph Macchio ("Karate Kid III"), William Shatner

("Star Trek V"), Stallone ("Lock-Up") and "Tango & Cash" and Patrick Swayze ("Next of Kin" and "Road House").

Fonda (the star of "Old Gringo") was nominated as worst actress of the year, joining Heather Locklear ("The Return of Swamp Thing"), Brigitte Nielsen ("Bye Bye, Baby") and Paulina Porizkova ("Her Alibi") and Ally Sheedy ("Heart of Dixie").

The nominees for worst supporting actor of 1989 were Christopher Atkins ("Listen to Me"), Ben Gazzara ("Road House"), DeForest Kelley ("Star Trek V"), Noriyuki "Pat" Morita ("Karate Kid III") and Donald Sutherland ("Lock-Up").

The nominees for worst supporting actress of 1989 were Angelique "Earth Girls Are Easy"), Anne Bancroft ("Bert Rigby, You're a Fool"), Madonna ("Bloodhounds of Broadway"), Kurt Russell (dressed in drag in "Tango & Cash") and Brooke Shields ("Speed Zone").

Nominated as the worst films of the 1980s were "Bolero," "Howard

the Duck," "The Lonely Lady," "Mommie Dearest" and "Star Trek V."

Atkins, Ryan O'Neal, Prince, Stallone and Travolta were nominated as worst actor of the decade. The worst actress of the decade nominees were Derek, Faye Dunaway, Madonna, Shields and Pia Zadora, the organization said.

Worst new star of the decade nominees were Atkins, Madonna, Prince, Zadora and Diane Sawyer.

The nominations are determined by ballots from more than 275 Raspberry Foundation members throughout California and 21 other states, with additional members in Canada and Switzerland, said a news release from the foundation made up of film fans who enjoy celebrating the worst in cinema.

The awards will be presented at the Hollywood Roosevelt Hotel, where the Oscars were first held, on March 25, the night before the Academy Awards.

"He's so thrilled. He's just run out of the building. At the moment, it's madness in here," Pearson said. Day-Lewis couldn't be corralled for an interview.

"I'm ecstatic," said Phil Alden Robinson, nominee for his "Field of Dreams" screenplay. "My 40th birthday is in a couple weeks and this will make turning 40 a little easier."

He said the film about reconciliation and renewal on a baseball field has already delivered its rewards to him.

"We got letters from people saying the film had changed their lives, that it had brought families back together. We couldn't have asked for more than that," he said.

'Daisy' full of quiet miracles

"Driving Miss Daisy" shows us that friendship is forged through small kindnesses, a slice of pie, a laugh shared, a sigh of consolation. It is an eloquence of medium-size miracles, changed minds and steady at the wheel, the everyday of Southern life articulated in accents as rich as Georgia's red mud. Set in the waning years of segregation, this lovingly comedy salutes mutual understanding in a time of willful ignorance.

Something of an odd couple's bicycle built for two, "Driving Miss Daisy" features Morgan Freeman and Jessica Tandy, extraordinary in tandem. It is a duet marked with unaffected grace and generosity of spirit, and each and every gesture contributes to the whole. There is an actors' pas de deux, a cotillion in which even the lifting of a spoon reveals something of character. Freeman, arguably America's foremost actor, reprises the chauffeur's role he pioneered in Alfred Uthry's Pulitzer Prize-winning play. As the well-nigh unflappable Hoke Colburn, he is the embodiment of

courtliness in an era of gentility and emotionalism. Tandy is new to the title role of Miss Daisy Werthan, but it fits her like a white summer glove.

Miss Daisy is the wealthy 72-year-old widow of a Jewish textile manufacturer, who still thinks of herself as a poor schoolteacher and doesn't want to put on airs by acquiring a chauffeur. But when she crashes her brand-new 1948 Packard into the neighbor's azaleas and the insurance company cancels her policy, her son Boolee (Dan Aykroyd) insists. Boolee hires Hoke, a steadfast widower in his early sixties, to carry the reluctant Miss Daisy to temple, the library and weekly mah-jongg games.

Subborn as a small-eyed needle and independent as the Statue of Liberty, Miss Daisy must be cajoled, shamed and finally tricked into back-seat driving. When the amiable, barn-broad Boolee warns Hoke about his mother's contrary nature, the chauffeur assures him he's up to the job: "I used to rattle hogs down to the ground... Ain't nary a hog got away from me yet," he says.

And so begins a friendship with Daisy that flourishes, like the backyard garden they one day work together, during the next 25 turbulent years.

Successfully adapting his own work, the playwright combines real events—the 1958 bombing of Atlanta's Temple, a 1965 salute to Martin Luther King Jr.—with vignettes from Daisy and Hoke's fiction—a trip to the cemetery, a heartbreaking run-in with the Alabama highway patrol. The automobile serves as a rolling metaphor for the segregation of the races, an imposing vehicle whose passengers nevertheless overcome their differences to find a destination in common.

Bruce Beresford, an Australian with an appreciation of the American South, is directing another eccentric slice of Dixie life. The director of "Tender Mercies" and "Crimes of the Heart," he seems attuned to the rhythms of the region and the irony of its people. The story holds a potential for sap that is mostly unfulfilled thanks to Beresford's stately approach; the stars' better judgment and the protagonists' sharp wits.

'Mermaid' surpasses Disney

THE LITTLE MERMAID (G)

Directed and written by John Musker and Ron Clements, with a yeoman team of animators, designers and craftspeople, this impudent, grandiose, multilevel crowd-pleaser shares with the classic Disney animated features of the '30s and '40s a sense of over-reaching, of grabbing every snazzy effect possible within old-line narrative forms. Ariel, the saucy heroine, is a sexy honey-bunch not much like the sad noble sea-maid in Hans Christian Andersen's original story. But there is a primal power that most recent Disney cartoons lack.

ALWAYS (PG). A better title for Steven Spielberg's remake of the sappy 1943 Spencer Tracy movie "A Guy Named Joe" might be "Forever," which is roughly its running time. All of us who fell under Holly Hunter's spell in "Broadcast News" and stuck to her through "Miss Firecracker" are in for a rough time of it. Cuteness turning overripe is not a

pleasant sight. Richard Dreyfuss can do no better than his dialogue or his situation—or his direction; and all of that is, as they say, footlooting.

BORN ON THE FOURTH OF JULY (R). No one can doubt director Oliver Stone's sincerity, any more than they can his talent for bravura emotionalism. Possibly because Stone empathizes so enormously with his main character—co-writer Ron Kovic, who came back from Vietnam at age 21 paralyzed from the chest down—the director has lost the specificity that made "Platoon" so electrifying. His scenes, and their ironic juxtaposition, explode like land mines. Tom Cruise delivers fierce physicality, empathy, the ability to work full throttle and a quality of defenseless-

ness that is terribly touching.

FLASHBACK (R). Dennis Hopper parodying Dennis Hopper. He plays a renegade hippie on the run from the FBI since the '60s: Kiefer Sutherland is the G-Man with a past who collars him. The movie is too strenuously "inventive," and its nostalgia for the '60s is vapid. Still, the first half hour is mostly terrific, Hopper is in fine, weird form (comedy suits him), and David Loughery's dialogue is often sharp.

STANLEY & IRIS (PG-13). What feels wrong about the tepid, well-intentioned "Stanley and Iris"? Almost everything, unfortunately. The grand, leonine director Martin Ritt and his writers, Harriet Frank Jr. and Irving Ravetch, tell a blue-collar love story about two people thawing-out emotionally, with illiteracy as a subplot.

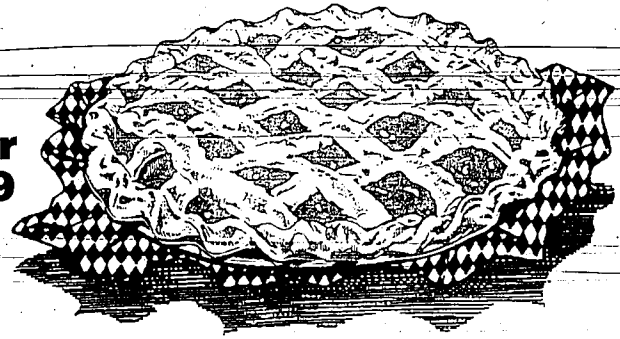
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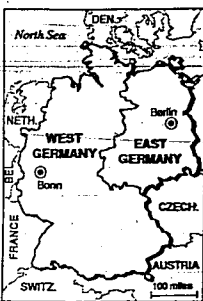
World War II victors still oversee division of Germany

WASHINGTON (AP) — The four Allied powers that defeated Nazi Germany in World War II have maintained their rights as victors, and 45 years later still have a final say on the reunification of the divided nation.

The disclosure in Ottawa that the United States, Soviet Union, Britain and France had agreed to a two-stage plan for reunification provides the international framework to close the long final chapter of the war.

A peace treaty has never been signed between the four powers and Germany, even though all four ended their state of war with the country during the 1950s.

Differences between the Western powers and the Soviet Union over Germany led to some of the tensest episodes of the post-war era, such as the Western airlift in 1948-49 that broke the Soviet attempt to isolate



West Berlin. In 1961, East Germany built the Berlin Wall, which only began to be dismantled last year, around West Berlin to stop the flow of East Germans to the West. That exodus was threatening to deprive the Communist state of some of its most skilled workers.

At the end of World War II, Britain, the Soviet Union and the United States agreed pending a peace settlement that some former German territories in the east would be taken over by Poland and the Soviet Union. Many Germans living there fled to the West.

East and West Germany joined in the 35-nation Helsinki accords of 1975 that specified European borders could be changed only peacefully, and West Germany has signed separate treaties with the Soviet Union and

Poland that addressed the border issues. But not all German political parties have renounced claims to the eastern territories, and any peace agreement would be expected to put the issue to rest.

The zones occupied by the victors after the war became the modern states of East and West Germany — the German Democratic Republic in the eastern, Soviet zone and the Federal Republic of Germany in the western zones.

Over the years the four powers have forsaken most of their occupying rights in East and West Germany, but a number of anomalies remain, and the victors continue to oversee Berlin.

Berlin, deep inside East Germany, is divided into four sectors, each controlled by one of the powers: The British, French and U.S. sectors make

up West Berlin and the Soviet sector is East Berlin, which East Germany claims as its capital. Armed forces of the four powers retain and exercise their rights to patrol in the other sectors. The Western powers refuse to recognize East German authority in East Berlin and officially insist on resolving any disputes with Soviet officers.

The four powers' military units also have rights to patrol in East and West Germany.

The Western powers require East and West Germany to run "troop trains" on ferry any of their military between West Germany and Berlin. East Germany must allow access through three corridors across its territory to Berlin.

The military forces of Britain, France and the United States remain concentrated in the zones once

occupied by the victors, now allied with West Germany through the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. The Western powers also have maintained exclusive rights to fly commercial planes into Berlin from the West, although West Germany has recently obtained some rights for joint flights.

Reluctance of the Western powers to recognize the East German state created under the auspices of the Soviets was one of the obstacles to German membership in the United Nations. East and West Germany didn't join the United Nations until 1973.

One of the last joint enterprises of the four powers was imprisoning Rudolf Hess, a deputy to Hitler, whom they took, minus guarding in Spanish prison in Berlin until he died in 1987 at age 93.

Soldiers in Germany glad Cold War is ending, look toward future

FRANKFURT, West Germany (AP) — Some are happy about going home, some are worried about future jobs, but American soldiers who guarded the West's frontline say they are glad the Cold War is over.

About 250,000 American forces are based in West Germany, where most of the cutbacks would take place under an agreement between the United States and the Soviet Union to reduce troops levels to 195,000 on both sides in Central Europe.

U.S. Army Spec. 4 James Abel of Tiskilwa, Ill., said he heard of the troop cutback agreement in radio news reports early Wednesday.

"It's going to affect some people's careers, the 21-year-old communications specialist said. "I think the Army is going to lose some good people."

He said he was thinking of getting out of the military because of the cuts.

"I was thinking about this as a career, but now I'm not so sure," Abel said.

Despite the uncertainty about his job, Abel said he was happy for the changes that could soon lead to German unification.

"I'm really glad for the Germans and the thought of them being united. I'm married to a German woman, and she has relatives in the

East. Now at least they can travel across the border," Abel said.

Among the soldiers interviewed by The Associated Press at the military's shopping center in Frankfurt was Staff Sgt. David Nelson, 30, of Valdosta, Ga.

Nelson said he was wary of all the changes and feared that a cutback of troops would affect joblessness in the United States as well as West Germany.

"I think it's going to affect a lot of people, including the Germans, because we have a lot of local national workers for us over here. They'll have to find new jobs," he said.

"This will also affect the job market back home. They'll have to find jobs for those thousands of people they're thinking about cutting," Nelson said.

Standing in line to buy a bouquet of flowers as a Valentine's Day gift, Nelson said he personally did not feel threatened by the proposed cutbacks but said the military should take a cautious approach.

"I've been in 13 years, so I'm not really worried that it will affect me—that much," he said. "But I don't think that would suit everything that is going on in the East, and take our time about the cuts."

Another Army sergeant said he

was glad the cutbacks were coming because many soldiers would be happy to go back home.

"I think what's happening is good. This means that a lot of guys will be able to go back home to their families," Sgt. Kenneth Duncan, 30, of Savannah, Ga., told the AP.

Tyler McGlasson, a U.S. Army 1st lieutenant from Danville, Ill., told the AP he wasn't worried about the cuts, but he was glad he had been in Europe.

"I've been here three years now. I'm getting ready to go back to the states in a little over 20 days. But I'm glad I was here during all the historic changes," said McGlasson.

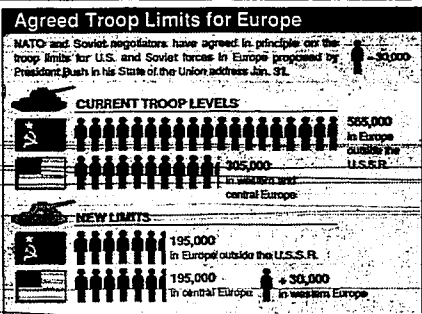
of the Army's 3rd Armored Division in Frankfurt.

McGlasson, 25, said he foresaw changes in NATO as a result of reforms in the East.

"What it means for the military is I think we'll have a decreased emphasis here, although I think it's important that some type of force remains," he said.

He added he would probably continue his military career.

"The people who have had problems in the past may be looking for other lines of work, which is good anyway, because we can become a more efficient force," McGlasson said.



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Weather service turns 120

Friday, February 9, was an appropriate day to get misty-eyed, for it was the 120th anniversary of the National Weather Service.

Actually, the history of the service packs all the emotion of one of its routine weather advisories:

Formed on Capitol Hill by joint resolution of Feb. 9, 1870, the first weather agency was the Signal Corps, assigned the task of obtaining weather information for military posts. A storm of congressional protest and high pressure from citizens in 1894 (mostly over the issue of military vs. civilian control) led to the transfer of responsibility to the Department of Agriculture. In 1940, an executive order sent the service to the Department of Commerce, where it is stationary.

The Weather Service moved on many fronts in its formative years. By 1873, daily forecasts were made available to farmers at rural post offices. Then came the flood warning service, frost advisories to Southern farmers and kite observations. By 1898, the "service" was given responsibility for providing hurricane warnings, in particular as the United States became involved in a war with Cuba during the summer months.

The early 20th century saw no abatement in the continuing sophistication of the service's meteorological tools and accomplishments, including cable exchanges of data with Europe, five weather forecasts, airplane observations and, by 1939, the first automatic telephone weather service in New York City.

The low-water mark of the service must have been reached in 1940 when it was transferred to Commerce, essentially a department dealing with business matters. There is an emerging school of thought that the nation's bad weather and recurring hard economic times may be attributable to this bureaucratic mismatch.

The evidence: When meteorologists talk about R&D, other people in Commerce think they mean research and development. In fact, they are discussing rain and drought. Then there was the time Commerce officials thought "lid" involved analysis of competition from British companies. To weather personnel, it stood for lightning, thunder and downpours.

A flurry for Wall Streeters can be serious, for the brief fluctuation in stock prices can be downward. But to meteorologists it is just a little snow. Conversely, a windfall for the Weather Service is usually bad news (something blown down by the wind), while it is a welcome delight for investors. And seed money for the weather people deals with the purchase of silver iodide crystals for clouds, whereas its meaning is quite different for entrepreneurs — and for that matter, for farmers.

The same school of historical thought contends that it has figured out how the bureaucratic confusion began. In the 1930s, the researchers point out, the nation witnessed the Depression, which probably led some of President Franklin D. Roosevelt's advisers to believe that weather forecasters knew more about this subject than anyone. And so when government reorganization became the focus of the Roosevelt administration in the mid-'30s, the transfer of the Weather Service to Commerce, although at first occluded by other political fronts, became a reality.

Not surprisingly, there's still talk of moving the Weather Service to another department.

The most frequently mentioned is the State Department, now that storms of political protest seem to be the present and future environment of diplomacy. And that merger with State would bring the service full circle — from the initial Signal Corps forecasting for military purposes to State's keeping track of foreign policy clouds.

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Drug traffickers use Pacific territories to seek mainland access

WASHINGTON — Drug traffickers have turned U.S.-controlled Pacific islands into thriving gateways to America for heroin from Asia's Golden Triangle. "This is a serious federal interdiction is virtually non-existent, according to an unpublished government document and interviews with officials. Heroin, marijuana and other drugs from Asia and southwest Pacific nations are even sent from the islands into the United States "via the U.S. Postal Service," says an internal report to Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan. In American Samoa, for example, commercial fishing boats bring in marijuana and heroin from Australia and other Pacific nations for mailing to U.S. residents, the report says.

Michael Sala, deputy public safety commissioner in American Samoa and executive director of a regional law enforcement organization, said marijuana was the greatest problem and that while officials long have suspected heroin smuggling there never has been a seizure of the drug there. "We hear about (heroin) from intelligence sources, but we have nothing concrete," Sala said. Shortages of enforcement money and personnel get much of the blame for the situation. There is just one Drug Enforcement Administration agent responsible for the four Pacific jurisdictions — American Samoa, the Northern Mariana Islands, Palau

and Guam. "There is a need for additional agents," the report says simply. The Interior report, obtained this week under the Freedom of Information Act, identified island jurisdictions as "major concerns with regard to drug trafficking." The U.S. Virgin Islands in the Caribbean were cited along with the Pacific area. American Samoa, Guam and the Virgin Islands are U.S. territories; the Northern Marianas and Palau have compacts of free association with the United States that include Interior Department assistance. "Nobody knows how much but from our perspective it's a serious problem," said Larry L. Morgan, director of legislative and public affairs for Interior's territorial and international affairs branch, when asked if the department had an estimate on the amount of drugs

smuggled through the islands. "DEA officials concurred the area was ripe for smuggling although one said he believed a significant dent was made late last year in heroin traffic through Palau and Guam. The one agent is based on Guam. A spokesman for the drug-enforcement agency, Ralph Lochridge, said the area was unlikely to get additional DEA personnel soon because other areas, particularly South America and Mexico, have been deemed higher priorities. "If you only have so many bodies, it's a matter of priorities — you've got to get the most bang for your buck," said Lochridge, who is based in Los Angeles, the office that supervises Guam. "Obviously if we had more agents we'd increase our staffing everywhere." Money for drug enforcement in the four Pacific jurisdictions was cut by nearly \$1 million in the drug-law passed by Congress in 1988. The cuts, according to the Interior report, have hampered efforts by local governments to carry out anti-drug activities called for by Congress just two years earlier. President Bush included the Interior Department's request to restore the \$1 million in his proposed fiscal 1991 budget. The report praised local governments for developing anti-drug plans but said those efforts have been hurt by shortages in money, equipment and people. It suggested that Interior funding would not be enough to provide lasting help and also recommended that the territorial and international affairs branch seek to place a coordinator in the office of administration drug policy coordinator William Bennett. Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan, to whom the report was addressed, has yet to act on that recommendation, a department spokesman said. Enforcement in the Virgin Islands is not as big a problem because of DEA help from Puerto Rico and Miami, according to law enforcement officials. The Bush administration's revised drug-war strategy, issued last month, made no direct reference to the use of the four island nations for smuggling. But it said more broadly that the Pacific Ocean "is virtually unrestricted for maritime smuggling, and relying on random patrols in such a vast body of water is inefficient and ineffective." Because of that, the report said, interdiction depends heavily on intelligence and inspections of ships when they reach U.S. ports. The source of the U.S.-bound drugs entering Guam usually is Asia, with Palau often serving as a stop before Guam, the report said. "This heroin has been found in some cases to be 60 percent pure," it said.

Colombians wary of U.S. intervention

BOGOTA, Colombia — Help us, but do more yourselves and do not intervene, Colombians are saying to the United States at the time of Thursday's heavily guarded drug summit in Cartagena. "Deeply held fears of 'Yanqui' meddling have been aroused by the U.S. invasion of Panama and more recently by the bungled plans to station a U.S. naval flotilla near Colombia. And while the summit is intended to present a united front against cocaine, many Colombians cannot help but voice simmering resentment at U.S. criticism and expectations.

Colombia's attorney general, Alfonso Gomez Mendez, said in an interview that the United States should look more at what it can do. "Drugs leave Colombia, he said, but they also enter the United States. "How does the leading military in the world permit this?" Gomez Mendez also criticized the United States for failing to adequately control drug consumption and rebuffed criticism of Colombia's inability to capture all of the drug lords. "Twenty thousand troops couldn't find Noriega for lack of intelligence," he said, referring to the invasion of Panama and the US failure to quickly apprehend Manuel Antonio Noriega.

Invasion-inspired fears of U.S. intervention helped precipitate negative reaction to the naval force plan. The United States wants to use ship-based radar to monitor drug air traffic, but news leaks in late December led Colombians to suspect a blockade and protest. U.S. officials are still trying to allay Colombian concerns. President Bush said in a statement reported Tuesday by the Colombian press that the idea of a blockade was "absolutely absurd."

Colombian officials have flatly rejected the placement of ships within national waters but apparently have not ruled out the possibility of locating them near Colombia in international waters. "There will not be navies of another country" within Colombian waters, declares Army Gen. Jesus Armando Ariza Cabrera. Despite lingering debate over the naval radar issue, the United States is helping itself on the public relations front. The Colombian press reported that the State Department will no longer warn tourists away from Cartagena, a beautiful Caribbean resort. A bomb exploded at the Hilton Hotel last year but Cartagena has otherwise been left unmolested by drug traffickers.

U.S. drug policy coordinator William J. Bennett generated more favorable publicity by likening Colombian president Virgilio Barco to Abraham Lincoln, a comment made in an interview with U.S. News & World Report magazine and reported here.

Insurance companies blacklist professions

WASHINGTON — Small businesses struggling to keep health insurance coverage for their employees are being battered by many insurers' blacklisting of certain kinds of work.

Most insurance companies have a restricted list of professions they seek to avoid, said Steve Gorman, president of Alternative Health Insurance Services, a broker in Los Angeles.

"Beauty supply places, salons, interior-design firms and places where the insurance companies presume there is a high percentage of gay people will all be on the restricted lists," Gorman said. Restaurants, hotels, motels and other trades with high employee turnover rates also have a hard time getting coverage, he noted.

One "ineligible" list, issued by an administrator's firm offering health plans on behalf of several insurance companies, includes: actors and musicians, attorneys, barber shops, bars and cocktail lounges, beauty salons, doctors, farms and ranches, government agencies, junkyards, laundries, movie production companies, clergy and religious groups, talent scouts, trucking firms and used car lots.

Another blacklist covers carnivals, circuses, chiropractors, maids, chauffeurs, hotels, massage parlors, morticians, trash collectors, bars, guards and detectives, schools and colleges.

"Some companies will bend a little bit, but for the most part it's pretty definite," Gorman said. "I had one insurance firm refuse a policy on a wholesale produce company because one of the owners was an attorney, and he wasn't even asking coverage for himself."

Many insurance companies assign attorneys will sue them, doctors and nurses will not tell the truth about their own health problems, and non-profit organizations, such as charities and counseling groups, can easily lose their funding.

The Hartford Insurance Group confirmed a report in the New York Times that it will not offer coverage to a long list of businesses such as hotels, motels, restaurants, laundries and ski resorts. For any employer with fewer than 50 workers, the company will provide coverage only if there is a local network of doctors under contract with Hartford to provide medical services.

The increasing difficulty of getting insurance coverage is providing some of the powerful impetus for a plan by the administration of California Gov. George Deukmejian calling for all of the state's businesses to provide health insurance for their workers. The Deukmejian administration is developing a proposal to cover 4 million of the 5 million state residents currently lacking health insurance.

The state of Washington now has a pilot program covering 25,000 persons, the working poor (with incomes up to 200 percent of the poverty level), and Gov. Both Gardner wants to develop a universal health insurance program. "You shouldn't have to be rich or employed to have basic health coverage," said Sheryl Hutchison, deputy press secretary for Gardner. He will take the health care insurance and cost control his major issue as chairman of the National Governors Association, starting in July.

Restaurant owners have long suspected their industry was singled out as a "bad insurance prospect," but did not have formal proof, said Elaine Graham, senior legislative representative for the National Restaurant Association.

"The smaller you are, the more difficulty you have getting health insurance," she said, noting that 70 percent of the nation's restaurants have sales of less than \$500,000 a year. "Statewide restaurant industry health insurance plans in Oklahoma and Missouri were abruptly canceled last year, leaving hundreds of eating places without protection for their workers," Graham said.

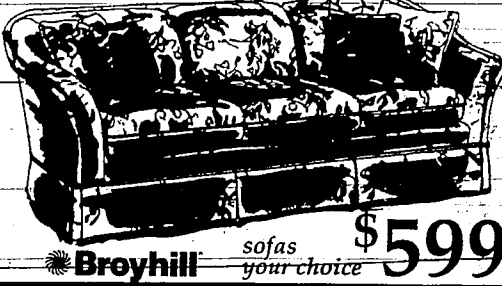
Carl J. Schramm, president of the Health Insurance Association of America, said that there have "always been groups no one was anxious to underwrite." However, "there is no occupation that absolutely cannot find insurance," he said. "It may not be easy, but the (insurance) carriers are there."

The use of restricted lists varies widely within the industry.

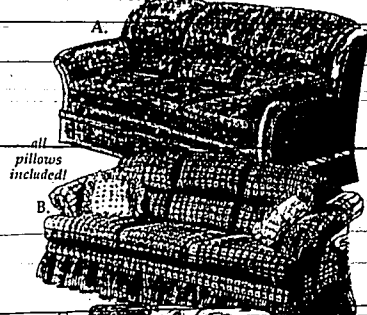
Prudential "is far more liberal than most companies" in offering coverage, spokesman Tom Joyce said. "There are some groups we do exclude, mainly in hazardous occupations such as mining and work on oil rigs, and circus work," Joyce said.

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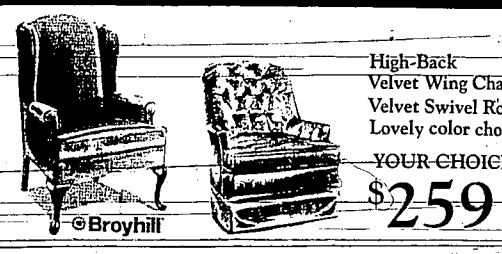
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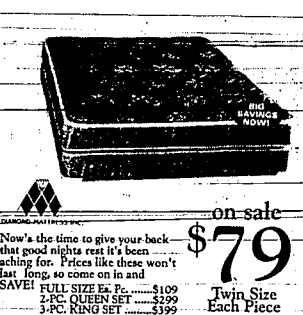
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Pesky, pushy sea lions invade pricy San Francisco Pier 39

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Hundreds of pushy, barking sea lions, some weighing more than 800 pounds, are occupying at least 20 slips at the pricy Pier 39 yacht basin. They are delighting tourists but making life miserable for the marina and boat owners.

"They're cute as buttons, but they're very aggressive," complained management spokeswoman Lucy Hobgood-Brown. "They're not hurting business, but they're damaging the docks, and they have bad breath."

The problem is that the herring-gobbling sea lions are under the federal Marine Mammals Protection Act and may not be harassed, hunted, captured or killed.

"I don't think you can even glare at them," said marina manager Sheila Chandor.

National Marine Fisheries Service

biologist Brad Hanson said experts are mystified as to why the mammals have descended on such a public spot. He said they usually prefer relatively isolated areas.

For more than a month, the members of the herd — with up to 300 animals — have been fishing, frolicking and fighting at the boat berths, which can sell for up to \$50,000.

Pier 39 is a shopping, restaurant and amusement complex just east of Fisherman's Wharf.

The management is worried that the bulky animals, adding unexpected tons of weight to floating docks, will do serious damage to them and the attached water pipes and electric conduits.

When the whole gang is out of the water, the docks are awash. Many electric meters at dock boxes have already been slapped

locks when the sea lions haul out of the water. The frisky creatures also scrape loose metal flashing and bash in relatively fragile dock boxes.

"Our guests' won't leave," Chandor moaned. "But the tourists love it."

The pier's main walkway runs directly in front of the sea lions' adopted neighborhood. During afternoons, the place is a cacophony of barking, blubber, chattering tourists and clicking cameras.

The sea lions are all bulls, most of them 3- to 5-year-old juveniles, Hanson said. Some, however, are full-grown and highly aggressive characters that have changed people venturing onto the docks. No one has been hurt.

Hanson thought the sea lions invaded the marina because the berths happened to be empty at the time.

Spacy ideas are landing on Earth

BOSTON (AP) — The space program has given the world much more than moon rocks and glimpses of Saturn's rings.

The earthbound have NASA to thank for lighter tennis rackets, more absorbent diapers and cordless power tools.

These and other spinoffs from space technology, part of a touring exhibit now at Boston's Museum of Science, are proof of how inventors and scientists, their eyes trained on the heavens, have approved day-to-day living for the average person.

The ingenuity that allows astronauts to work in space's extreme temperatures and weightlessness is also responsible for the digital personality-Max Headroom, the cordless vacuum and computer software for makeup application.

"It's the 'Oh, gee whiz' effect, when you look at the Dustbuster and you think it was first used to collect moon dust and now we're having it to clean our dust," says Robert Gongwer, project coordinator at the museum.

The display helps students understand "that space research helps our everyday lives," she said Wednesday.

The eight-city exhibit, put together by the Fort Worth Museum of Science and History, still has stops in Philadelphia, St. Paul, Minn., and Los Angeles before it winds up in April 1991.

The shiny, metallic material known as Mylar that covers most satellites and other space vehicles was invented to shield against radiation. On Earth, sunbathers use it to promote tanning and marathoners wrap themselves in it for warmth after a run.

The composite materials developed for stronger, less cumbersome spacecraft gave the American consumer a lighter, more powerful tennis racket. Boots that Neil Armstrong wore to take the first steps on the moon two decades ago were "rigged by a set of interlocking plastic coils that can be found today in millions of running shoes to cushion impact to the joints."

Freeze-dried foods that saved astronauts space and weight now perform the same function for hikers.

"The tiny envelopes of freeze-dried cheese, crackers, sliced peaches and other foods did not suppress second-graders from Masson Rice School in Newton on a recent tour."

"E-c-c-e-u-u-w-w. They eat that?" the students said, noses pressed against the display cases.

Computer-enhanced photo maps helped NASA choose a landing site for the first manned lunar mission.

The software that assigns numbers to the contours of the surface of the moon now allows companies such as Estee Lauder to track the topography of a customer's face for facials and make-up application.

Scientists created a joystick to help astronauts in clumsy spacesuits drive the Apollo lunar rover over the moon's surface. Today paraplegics use the single-handed mechanism in cars for steering, accelerating and braking.


Super-absorbent diapers, scratch-resistant sunglasses, cordless power tools and the household lubricant known as WD-40 are some of the more lucrative spinoffs of space technology, according to the exhibit.

One of the display's goals is to show children that they, too, could become inventors, Gongwer said.

The message seemed to ring true for Isaac Doty, 11, who stood transfixed in front of a screen showing an image of Saturn.

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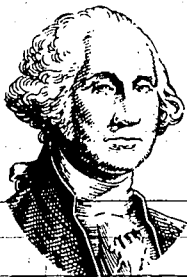
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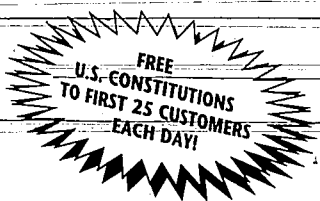

Miniseries 6 years in the making profiles one of America's most famous families

Along with baseball, hot dogs and apple pie, Americans have been fascinated with something else particularly "American": the Kennedy family. We've followed their political successes and personal tragedies; read about them in books, magazines and newspapers; gossiped about them; and watched generations of the family grow up. Now we have "The Kennedys of Massachusetts" (airing Sunday, Monday and Wednesday, Feb. 18, 19 and 21, on ABC), a miniseries starring Charles Durning, William Petersen and Annette O'Toole. Based on the book "The Fitzgeralds and the Kennedys" by Doris Kearns Goodwin, the miniseries spans 55 years in the life of the Kennedy family. It starts in 1906 with the courtship of Rose Fitzgerald and Joe Kennedy and culminates with John Kennedy's presidential inauguration.

"When I bought it, it was still in outline form," says Edgar J. Scherick, the executive producer of the miniseries. "(But) I knew (Goodwin's) credentials as a historian and that all the source material was there."

Scherick, who describes his job as "putting the package together, like creating a product," says that the miniseries sticks very closely to the book: "It's the most carefully annotated project I've ever worked on."

Scherick himself has a special stake in the project, for his life and the lives of the Kennedys have intersected at many points. "When I was a kid, I worked in an ad agency," he explains. "They had a liquor account,

and one day my boss said to me, 'Do you know who your boss is? Joseph Kennedy!' He was in the liquor business, you see." And, remembers Scherick, "I lived in Rep. Jack Kennedy's building, and I would talk to him."

Scherick says it was an achievement just to finish the miniseries, which was six years in the making. "To shoot six hours of TV is an amazing job," he points out. "But it didn't feel like it took that long. I mean, you didn't stop in the middle and say, 'We've been doing this for four years.'"

"I think what made me feel really good," he adds, "was something concerning William Petersen (who plays Joe Kennedy). He had told me he couldn't quite catch up to the material, and then, when we sent an advance tape to his parents, he called me and told me that he couldn't believe that from all the time and work, this finished product had actually emerged. You know, this is a project that will survive me. It's something."

Scherick admits a particular fondness for certain scenes. "I've seen it maybe 35 times," he says with a

laugh, "and what I really see is a strong sense of family. I think that the scenes that deal with family — between Rose and Joe, between father and sons — are very special."

Still, Scherick feels that the production comes across as objective. "The book is objective, and we tried to do the same thing," he says. "Joe Kennedy is probably the dominant character, but that's because he was at his height."

"A story like this is just not what people want to see at the movies. But I find the long form of TV very gratifying." Scherick's other TV projects include an upcoming miniseries of "The Fatal Shore," based on the Robert Hughes best seller about Australia, and a version of "Phantom of the Opera" starring Charles Dance and Burt Lancaster that will air next month on NBC.

Soap opera scene

Star finds acting, travel go together

John Loprieno, who plays Cord Roberts in "One Life to Live," said a new slogan may soon be coined for actors in soap operas — "do a soap and see the world." A few years ago, "One Life to Live" traveled to Vienna for some location shooting — not just exteriors, but actual plot developments. More recently, John and a group of 10 other cast members, a New York crew of 35 (supplemented by 45 local technicians), close to 200 extras and stunt doubles plus exec producer Paul Rauch spent six intensive nights and days of location shooting in Salzburg, Vienna, which doubles in the plot as the country of Mendorra.

John was very impressed with the way the work got done. It was a difficult shoot, in that it included some skiing sequences and chases in bitter cold weather. However, John says the footage is well worth it and definitely enhances the soap. The story line involving the Mendorra locations will be spread over a few weeks, in addition to the other plots currently enticing viewers to tune in every weekday to one of ABC's red-hot soaps.

John's character of Cord falls into the category of "hunk" leading man, but John has come to terms with the term. "If that's how I'm perceived by the people who cast, then I accept it. I don't think of myself that way and I sometimes have to laugh when fans refer to it in letters. Soap opera is where I work at this time; it is where I found my niche. Most of my previous work was on the stage. I trained for the stage and I love theater, but you go where you can make a living."

Actually, John was a jock in high school until his sister convinced him to try out for a play, and that was it. John discovered a world that excited him and he went on to earn degrees in theater from Lewis University in Illinois and the University of Minnesota. Chicago was where he did most of his theater work upon graduation. The soap discovered the handsome actor and he was cast in "Search for Tomorrow," switching to "One Life to Live" when "Search" went off

the air.

These days, John is still involved with theater, but with a slight difference. He has formed the Theatrical Education Workshop, a non-profit theater project in Ridgewood, N.J., close to where the actor resides. The spring season of classes for young actors (8 years old and up) begins in mid-March. John will teach an acting technique class himself for the older students. John wants to nurture the Theatrical Education Workshop until it is a functioning semi-professional theater group but he's in no hurry. He's taking it one step at a time.

This diligence — and his talent — won Sal the role.

Q: We just watched the movie "Scandal" on our VCR and would love some marital details and dish about that wonderful actor John Hurt. — J.E.

A: The details are: He divorced his first wife Annette Robertson in 1964 and then lived for 17 years with Marie Volpeltierre-Perot, a model who was killed in a riding accident. Five years ago he married Donna Peacock. The dish is Hurt, 30, just got a fast divorce from his second wife to marry Jo Dalton, a 30-year-old production assistant he met during the filming of "Scandal." She is pregnant with Hurt's first child.

Q: Wasn't the late Yul Brynner a really terrible father who abandoned his family? Why haven't we read of this in accounts about his "The King and I" musical triumph? — C.W.

A: It was certainly in his biography. Yul's son, Rock, spelled out much of the dirty stuff in his book, "Yul: The Man Who Would Be King." It's not a happy story. Rock maintains he was "constantly" being abandoned by his old man. He writes that Brynner smoked opium in his early days in Paris with poet Jean Cocteau. He also befriended a group of gypsies who believed "no human relationship is too strong to be broken" and that leaving your family in the lurch is "often the thing to do."

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "The Cosby Show" topped the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings Tuesday and the real-life murder drama "Blind Faith" found a Top 10 spot, but "Elvis" might have to check into Heartbreak Hotel along with "The Bradys."

In the second week of a sweeps period, ABC's "America's Funniest Home Videos" took fifth place at the expense of the long-running "Murder, She Wrote" on CBS, also under attack by Fox's best-rated "The Simpsons."

"Murder, She Wrote" was 15th-rated. In most markets it faces the ABC video show for its first half and the cartoon family from Fox in its second. "The Simpsons" was rated No. 32 — the highest "fourth network" numbers for the week.

A ratings-point represents the percentage of the nation's 92.1 million television shows tuned into a show. Networks try to clean up during sweeps weeks because advertising rates are based on ratings during those periods.

"America's Funniest Home Videos," hosted by Bob Saget and first broadcast Jan. 14, relies on home videos contributed by viewers.

The show "is attracting very sizeable numbers of all the key demographic groups of 18 to 49, as well as kids and teens," said ABC director of prime time audience analysis Larry Hayns.

"It's the type of show that people can tune into at any time. ... You don't really have to get involved in characters and plotline, there'll be another video any second," Hayns said.

There were two "Elvis" sightings on ABC last week, but neither a spe-

cial showing Tuesday night following "Roseanne" nor a broadcast in its regular 8:30 p.m. Sunday slot yielded impressive figures.

"Elvis" on Tuesday had a 16.0 rating for 20th place, but "Roseanne" had a 22.5 rating in the earlier time slot.

For Sunday, the series about the early life of "The King" had a 12.6 rating and 47th place even though it

followed "America's Funniest Home Videos," which garnered a 21.4 rating. The network wants to build a ratings block with the video show and "Elvis," a musical drama.

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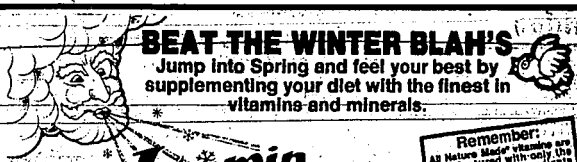

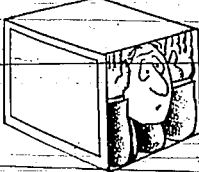
