Abortion hearing

Magic Valley speakers appear on both sides of issue in Boise

BOISE - Monday night's hearing on proposed abortion legislation started with a warning: No demonstrations, no vocal outbursts, no signs or clapping.

But the more than 620 people who crammed into a hot and stuffy ballroom at Boise State University didn't need warnings. They remained quiet while 150 Idaho residents presented their testimony to the House and Senate State Affairs committees.

Wearing white stickers signifying they were pro-life or bright orange stickers denoting that they were pro-choice, members of the audience were drawn from every part of the state. The Magic Valley was well represented on both sides of the issue. A large pro-life contingent made the trip from Blaine County.

Just because it was quiet didn't mean it was calm, however. Throughout the night there were subtle reminders of just how volatile the issue is. The audience muttered whenever a speaker exceeded his or her allotted three minutes of testimony.

The silence was louder than any "vocal outburst" when Cecilia Teschler of Castleford stepped forward to tell the story of how three men raped her at gunpoint when she was 14 years old. She told of how she pounded her stomach every night that she had to wait until her parents could arrange for her abortion.

"Women who chose abortion do so out of a strong need," Teschler said. "No one should be denied this freedom."

The other side came forward with emotional testimony too.

Nancy Thorpe, Idaho coordinator of a group called Women Exploited by Abortion, told of her own 1971 abortion and the physical and mental scarring afterward. She asked lawmakers to do what they can to ban abortion.

Pro-life speakers outnumbered the pro-choice advocates. Most pro-life speakers endorsed House Bill 625, which prohibits abortion for birth control. The bill does not ban abortion in cases of rape, incest or a threat to the mother's life. Some called it a good political compromise.

The pro-choice side asked for the repeal of Idaho's trigger law. Some endorsed a right-to-privacy measure. Others endorsed a bill allowing access to abortion based upon fetal viability.

Election consolidation measures advance

BOISE - A House committee will be asked to choose between two competing bills consolidating Idaho's election process.

Both were approved for printing and introduction by the House State Affairs Committee on Monday, with the major question whether state laws should allow four election dates per year or six.

The dates when the elections can be held has been the most controversial part of the legislation, said Chief Deputy Secretary of State Ben

Yoursa. He reviewed a proposal from an election task force, limiting elections to no more than four per year.

State Affairs Chairman Pam Bengson, R-Boise, also won committee approval to print and intro-

duce their competing version, allowing six election dates per year.

The goal of the bills is to bring uniformity to an Idaho election process called a "hit and miss affair" and a "hodge-podge" by Yoursa. "We need to standardize the way we run all of our elections in this state," said Ms. Bengson.

Idaho has more than 1,000 taxing districts. There's no limit on when, or how they run elections - or if they even hold elections if only one candidate files for a job.

Sage sayings, right attribution available

WASHINGTON - As Otto von Bismarck once said, "Politics is the art of the possible" - as possible as wrongly attributing the quote to a legendary Irish barkeeper.

For pundits and politicians wanting to punch up their pronouncements with snappy, pithy remarks, help is at hand. For \$29, The Library of Congress will provide 2,100 similarly sage sayings, and with the right attribution.

Over the years the library's Congressional Research Service has found itself continually bombarded by requests for appropriate quotes for use in papers and speeches.

Its researchers have discovered that many a quote popularly attributed to a famous person was actually uttered or scribbled by someone else. For example, the German chancellor's comment on politics often attributed to Finland Peter Durnne's Mr. Dooley.

The 520-page volume entitled, "Respectfully Quoted: A Dictionary of Quotations Requested from the Congressional Research Service" and for sale by the Government Printing Office, has several similar examples.

Lincoln's "You can fool all of the people some of the time and some of the people all of the time" has never been verified, the volume points out. Nor has "Let them eat cake," alleged to have been said by Marie Antoinette when informed the French people had no bread. "Winning isn't everything, it's the only thing," generally attributed to

former Green Bay Packer coach Vince Lombardi, was actually said by Red Sanders at Vanderbilt in 1948, the volume reports. In fact, it adds, Lombardi always denied having said it.

Other corrections in attribution include "It is better that one hundred guilty persons escape than one innocent person should suffer," often attributed to Supreme Court justices Oliver Wendell Holmes or Louis Brandeis, actually was first stated by Benjamin Franklin.

Currently the most requested quotation, the Research Service says, is from a 1977 speech of former Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey:

"It was once said that the moral test of government is how that government treats those who are in the dawn of life, the children; those who are in the twilight of life, the elderly; and those who are in the shadows of life - the sick, the needy and the handicapped."

A member of Congress contemplating action - or inaction - might consider British author G.K. Chesterton or French statesman Georges Clemenceau. "I do not believe in a fate that falls on men however they act, but I do believe in a fate that falls on them unless they act," Chesterton wrote.

"In order to act, you must be somewhat insane. A reasonably sensible man is satisfied with thinking," Clemenceau once said.

The collection is replete with patently quotable, always-popular with politicians, including large sections.

Waste awards to 'convenience' foods

WASHINGTON - A frozen soup and sandwich wrapped in five layers of plastic and paper.

A plastic shake-and-pour jug of pancake mix that makes one-sixth the bulk of an identical blend sold in a cardboard box.

Coffee in pre-measured packets instead of loose grounds in a reusable tin can.

Items by their makers as "convenience" items designed for hurried consumers, these new products Monday won another, less-flattering label. An environmental coalition named them winners of the first "Wastemaker" awards for excessive packaging that feeds America's nationwide garbage glut.

Without half the space in overloaded landfills already taken up by cans, boxes, bottles and wrapping, the awards were designed to spotlight products that help Americans generate

160 million tons of trash a year, the organizers said.

"As our solid waste crisis worsens, we need less - not more - wasteful packaging and products," said Rep. Frank Pallone Jr., D-N.J., who joined with the Environmental Action Foundation, U.S. Public Interest Research Group and the Clean Water Action Project to present the awards.

The self-styled "Waste Watch" group called on shoppers to join a "green consumer movement" by boycotting seven "wastefully packaged" food products and sent letters to the four manufacturers cited, demanding they withdraw the products.

Unlikely, responded officials for two "winners" - the Campbell Soup Co. and the Quaker Oats Co. - who said the products met consumer wishes.

Campbell was cited for two products - its Souper Combo frozen soup and sandwich and

Le Menu Yankee Pot Roast Dinner.

"We certainly don't intend to withdraw them just because these people looked at them," said Campbell executive Scott Rumbach.

The Souper-Combo box contains a plastic soup bowl and disposable cardboard heating tray. That's less packaging than in the original, Rumbach said, and the company hopes to cut back more.

The pot roast dinner contains a plastic plate and top and a foil wrapper inside a cardboard box. The critics compared it unfavorably to a cheaper, Budget Gourmet pot roast dinner which "is simply cooked in the cardboard box it is sold in."

"It's like being in the service and eating C-rations," the Campbell's spokesman responded. "Seven out of eight consumers prefer a plastic dish."

Ordinary foods pose cancer threat

NEW ORLEANS - Natural carcinogens in meat, grain and other foods are a far greater danger than pesticides and additives.

They account for more than 98 percent of the cancer risk in the diet, a government scientist said Monday.

Even a minor reduction in these naturally occurring hazards, he said, would surpass the benefits of eliminating all traces of dangerous man-made chemicals.

The culprits include not only such recognized health hazards as fats and beer but such seemingly innocent products as bread, yogurt, mushrooms and many spices, including cinnamon and nutmeg.

"The risk is from natural carcinogens in the diet, because they overwhelm all the others,"

said Dr. Robert J. Schepulein, director of the Office of Toxicological Sciences at the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

He contended that the public is worried about the wrong risks in their diet, in part because of exaggerated news accounts of such scares as Alar in apples, cyanide in grapes and dioxin in milk.

Schepulein based his conclusions on a statistical analysis of the quantity of cancer-causing agents in the diet.

He said that the risk of dying from cancer from dietary exposure to both natural and man-made carcinogens, or cancer-inducing substances, was 7.7 percent. The risk from naturally occurring carcinogens alone was 7.6 percent.

"Most of the risks are people's personal choices," Schepulein said. "They are not imposed on people by corporations. Apparently

that's a hard lesson. People want to blame somebody."

Schepulein presented his findings at a meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Dr. Frank Young, a former FDA commissioner who is now deputy assistant secretary of Health and Human Services, said he agreed with Schepulein's contention.

"The headline should not be, 'All Foods Cause Cancer or Drop Dead, Don't Eat,'" Young said. "The good news is, let us not as a nation focus just on the technological food additives. We ought to focus on the big issues as well."

Schepulein said the clearest cancer-causing agent in ordinary food is fat, which has been linked with several kinds of tumors. However,

# Budget writers continue overspending Andrus recommendations

BOISE (AP) — Legislative budget writers have trimmed Gov. Cecil Andrus' plan for economic grants to help development efforts in Idaho's rural communities.

But that savings and more has been funneled into consumer protection and drug task force grants in the attorney general's office.

The latest actions by the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee on Monday continued to push the total



of its evolving 1991 state spending plan above the governor's, tightening revenues still available to underwrite higher profile programs like education and medical and social services.

Those budgets, accounting for about 80 percent of all the general tax dollars the state spends each year, will be before the committee later in the week. Administration calculations indicate that without any further modifications to the governor's budget proposal, the legislative plan will run some \$1.8 million in the red.

In its opening session of the week, the committee agreed to cut the gov-

ernor's proposal for \$500,000 in special economic grants to cities designated as Gem Communities to \$300,000 as members determined there were not enough certified cities to use up the entire allotment under the \$10,000 matching grant scheme.

State Commerce Department Director James Hawkins said a dozen communities have been certified and a dozen more were on the verge of certification while another 19 were

taking part in the process that could lead to certification.

With just 43 cities likely to be eligible, some lawmakers believed there was no need to provide enough money to make at least 50 grants.

But the cash saved in that move — needed in the view of several panel members to get the legislative budget blueprint back under control — was quickly used up when the panel approved another \$181,000 sought by Attorney General Jim Jones for expansion of his consumer protection operations and water rights litigation. Andrus did not recommend either allocation.

In addition, the committee voted half of the \$1 million Jones sought in state money to be doled out in grants to local drug tasks forces to bolster

the state's effort in the war on drugs.

The state is already receiving some \$2.3 million in federal anti-drug money, and Andrus did not support any additional state diversion beyond money he proposed for anti-drug programs in other agencies.

Jones had sought the additional cash for consumer protection as part of a broader plan that includes a total revision of the state's 1971 consumer protection laws to give his office authority for the first time to seek civil fines of up to \$5,000 for each violation of the law.

In a related development, the budget committee endorsed Andrus' proposal for a consumer education program in the Insurance Department.

# Senate backs expansion of work study program

BOISE (AP) — A potentially dramatic expansion of eligibility for state financial support under a fledgling higher education work-study program has been approved by the Idaho Senate.

On a 27-13 vote Monday, supporters of the measure by the joint House-Senate Appropriations Committee on Monday continued to push the total

of its evolving 1991 state spending plan above the governor's, tightening revenues still available to underwrite higher profile programs like education and medical and social services.

The bill, which now goes to the House for final action, creates a new criteria of educational and financial need to qualify for assistance. Under the program, the state

will pay 80 percent of the cost for an on-campus job given an eligible student and 50 percent of the cost of an off-campus job.

To keep a financial check on the program initiated last year, lawmakers earmarked only \$1 million for its operations. Final figures were still being compiled, but officials said several hundred students at the four state colleges and the College of Idaho obtained financial help under the work-study plan this year. Applications for aid exceeded available resources.

The changes were proposed after officials discovered the original bill authorizing work-study assistance for students in financial need did not

cover students at Ricks College in Rexburg or Northwest Nazarene College in Nampa.

To get around the constitutional ban on such direct aid, Sen. Artwell Parry, R-Melba, a main sponsor of the original work-study program, came up with the classification of educational need, which would allow the state to directly help students at both private and public schools who need work experience in their chosen field of study.

Parry said there was an obvious need for the work-study help, although the indicated attempts would again be made to limit the financial resources for the program to \$1 million.

But Sen. Michael Burkett, D-Boise, warned that the new classification of educational need was nothing more than an attempt to indirectly help students at private religious schools that the state found it was barred from directly helping last year. He said the scheme was no more constitutional now than the original bill was as it applied to those schools.

Burkett and others also questioned extending eligibility for the work-study assistance to students without financial need, calling the creation of an educational need an unprecedented step that even the federal government has declined to allow under its work-study program.

### Jones appointed to building council

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Donna Jones, R-Payette, who was appointed to a House of Representatives seat vacated by Sen. Mary Hartung, R-Payette, when she stepped into the Senate, also will succeed Mrs. Hartung on the Permanent Building Fund Advisory Council.

Mrs. Hartung surrendered her seat on the council when she moved to the Senate. The Senate is represented on the board by Sen. Don Mackin, D-Moscow.

### Research may eliminate metal fatigue

BOISE (AP) — Research at the Idaho National Engineering could do away with the metal fatigue that caused the crash of a United Airlines plane near Sioux City, Iowa, INEL officials say.

Federal investigators determined that a flaw in the metal used in the DC-10's engine caused the crash. To eliminate the defect, INEL scientists are working with private industry to develop a technique to refine titanium and superalloy metals for the motors.

"What this process can do is improve the reliability of jet engine parts," said EG&G Idaho scientist Alan Donaldson, manager for the titanium heat-treating project at the INEL Research Center.

Small impurities in the metal can produce cracks in engine parts operating at high speeds and temperatures. To solve the problem, manufacturers have developed a new process called heat melting, which uses electron beams or plasma torches to melt the metal.

### Kellogg toxic waste removal complete

SEATTLE (AP) — Emergency work to remove toxic waste at the defunct Bunker Hill smelter complex near Kellogg has been completed, the Environmental Protection Agency has announced.

The Superfund work was conducted by contractors for Gulf Resources & Chemical, Mineral Corp. of Idaho, Bunker Hill Partnership, and Bunker Hill Mining Co. Inc.

The companies have been identified as "potentially responsible parties" for contamination at the site, the EPA in Seattle said.

### Tribes, company pursue electricity

LEWISTON (AP) — The Nez Perce Indian Tribe and a private company are pursuing their own hopes of tapping in the new Clearwater Fish Hatchery's water supply for electricity.

But the state Water Resources Board and the Bonneville Power Administration have been competing for the energy source for some time.

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission has announced it is considering a preliminary permit application from the tribe. A private company, Pacific Western, also numbers among those interested in a hydro project using the hatchery's water.

### ISU atom smasher gets new functions

POCATELLO (AP) — In these days of expensive university research programs, it wouldn't be unusual for Idaho State University to be asking the legislature for millions of dollars to fund an "atom-smasher" for research in high-energy physics.

But it might be surprising to learn the university already has such a machine, purchased in the mid-1970s for about \$900, the price of shipping and handling costs.

The Van de Graaff Accelerator hides in the basement of ISU's Physical Science Building in one room of the Particle Beam Laboratory. Although used in the '70s as an atom smasher to study the properties of atomic nuclei, the ISU Physics Department began upgrading the machine and looking for new uses.

Researchers found the accelerator could be used for materials analysis. "It is a fairly new idea to use the accelerator as an analytical tool rather than for basic nuclear physics," said Physics Department Chairman Dr. Frank Harmon.

### Residents fight against work camp

BOISE (AP) — St. Anthony residents are making one last plea against a minimum-security prison work camp in their town before a vote on a proposed appropriation comes before the state House of Representatives this week.

But the group did not receive encouraging words from the only legislator who lives in St. Anthony. Republican Rep. Cyril Burt favors a \$360,000 appropriation to fund initial hiring and training of staff for the camp at the old Fremont General Hospital.

## House panel tries scaled-down version of school funding bill

BOISE (AP) — The House Education Committee will try a scaled-down version of an earlier bill designed to change the formula used to allocate state support for public instruction.

The committee voted Monday for printing and introduction of a new bill that sponsors said makes fewer changes and takes longer to achieve them than a previous version which could not win committee approval.

"We're moving toward equity more slowly," said Education Chairman Rep. Janet Hay, R-Nampa.

## Some educators see little room for non-traditional teachers

POCATELLO (AP) — If there are plenty of non-certified persons to teach at the secondary level while they earn teaching credentials.

But most districts say they can find plenty of certified teachers, and are not inclined to hire someone with no training — regardless of what special skills or expertise may be possessed.

The alternate method of certification would let people with college degrees teach under the supervision of a mentor instructor while they worked to earn a teaching credential. They also would be required to take summer classes.

Proponents of the measure, such as Sen. Laird-NOR, R-Kimberly, and Rep. Janet Hay, R-Nampa, said it would be a means to use skilled people in secondary classrooms and a way to attract former teachers whose certifications have lapsed.

The committee earlier tackled a bill making substantial changes in the school funding formula, but it was opposed by districts which stood to lose by the changes.

"The first one was more statesmanlike; we're down now to the art of pragmatic politics," said Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans, referring to the opposition to the original bill.

The measure will return to the committee for action later.

### King holiday idea misses the point

At the risk of being applauded by our local racists, we think the state of Idaho should resist the clamor of politicians and special interest groups to establish a state holiday honoring Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

In a world where image and impression often count more than substance, it is probably asking too much for politicians to look at the issue from the other side, but it seems to us that the "holiday" idea as a way of honoring King misses the point.

At the outset, we reject the vicious and racist drivel about King which is routinely spread by hate groups and assorted right-wingers: "By the standards they set, we wouldn't honor George Washington or Thomas Jefferson either."

King should be honored, in our view, as a symbol of the human rights movement, and we would be more comfortable with a holiday in honor of that cause.

But instead of giving state employees a day off with pay, let's reverse it and establish a day in which all of us donate a day's pay to advancement of civil rights work. Or, how about establishing an unpaid Sunday to honor King, say the third Sunday in January?

Now already, we can see the crowd of King Day supporters rushing for the exits. The objections to these plans will be many, not the least of which will be that it reverses the flow of the economic benefit.

Can you imagine the state workers' groups, or the teachers' union supporting a holiday on which they worked for another person's economic gain? Don't hold your breath.

Should a mid-January holiday for King be designated, it would quickly turn into what the "Presidents Day" holiday already is, just another three-day weekend and day off from work which so many government employees have come to think of as their due.

How many do you think will spend so much as a moment honoring King in any way among the various trips of taking the kids to the mall, getting the car washed or going on a skiing weekend?

That is not to say we Idahoans are hypocritical when it comes to civil rights, but considerable national evidence suggests that white Americans are, at best, ambivalent about civil rights issues.

We are all for civil rights in the abstract, but many white Americans would not move into a black neighborhood for any amount of money.

Nor would many white Americans voluntarily give up their ranking on a civil service hiring list so that someone who is less-qualified, but a member of a minority group, can get the position.

A holiday honoring King will not change these facts, no more so in Idaho than in Detroit.

Honor is one of those qualities which cannot be compelled. The thundering herd of state King holidays which we are now being asked to join has, we would guess, the reverse effect.

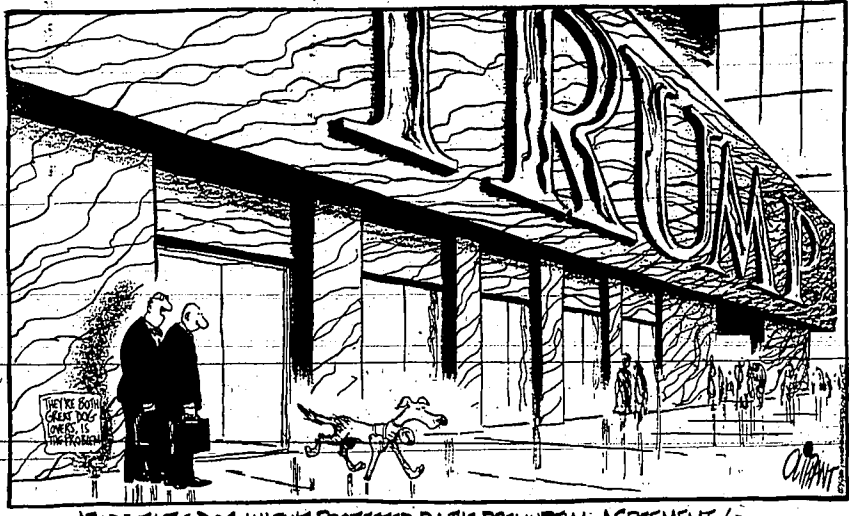
Many people respect King, but to be forced to honor him by the clamoring of special interest groups does not set well with many.

King was a great American whose concept of non-violent change and racial harmony inspires, years after his death.

The way to honor him, in our view, is not to establish yet another holiday for government workers. Instead, King would be honored most by Idahoans and Americans rededicating themselves to securing the civil rights of all peoples.

We could, for example, support open housing to all, regardless of color, by ending red-lining in real estate sales and loans. We could all speak out against the racists and bigots when they push their Aryan Nations hatred and pretend to speak for us. We could stand up for the freedom to read when the moralists among us try to dictate what our libraries should and should not contain.

But these acts require both courage and conviction. It's a lot easier to pass another paid holiday.

#### Council's action nets sad result

After the unfair (and probably illegal) refusal of Jerome's mayor to reappoint Police Chief Greg Will, I chided Jerome voters for repeatedly electing those folks who seek office for ego gratification and who make decisions based on friendships and personalities.

The sad result of all this is that the city of Jerome now has a police chief who only a few days ago was about to be canned by the Jerome County Sheriff. Only a fool would believe that this chief and this sheriff will now suddenly be able to work together in a spirit of cooperation for law and order in Jerome; something they weren't able to do a week ago.

I agree with Glen Capps, who suggests contracting city law enforcement to the county. Better yet, let's consolidate city and county law enforcement under the county sheriff's department.

Not only would the taxpayers save a great deal of money, but law enforcement in Jerome would be directed by someone elected by the people instead of someone appointed by their cronies on the city council.

# Federal Reserve policy must cope with confusing economic outlook

WASHINGTON (AP) — The weather isn't the only thing behaving strangely this winter. The economy has been topsy-turvy as well.

In just two months, December and January, many economists went from predicting an impending economic downturn to believing that the longest peacetime expansion in history has found another of its nine lives.

The new general consensus of moderate economic growth this year is likely to be an important element in Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan's testimony before Congress today when he reveals the Fed's policy targets for 1990. These targets will have a major influence on interest rates and economic growth.

Greenspan could be excused for expressing a certain amount of perplexity about recent events.

In December, the economic outlook was as bleak as the unusually cold weather. Housing construction plunged; Christmas sales were lackluster, and the overall economy, as measured by the gross national product, turned in its worst showing in 34 years.

All that gloom prompted recession worries as economists feared the impending demise of the seven-year-old economic recovery, an expansion that has already lasted almost five times longer than usual.

But in January, the weather warmed and so did the economy. Housing construction soared 29.6 percent, the biggest monthly increase on record. Retail sales rebounded, largely on the strength of a pickup in auto demand, and the economy produced 275,000 new jobs, almost triple the December increase.

The good news chased away the recession forecasts. Some analysts now look for 3 percent annual growth in the January-March quarter, six times the pace from October through December.

"The economy is doing a lot better than a lot of people thought it would," said Michael K. Evans, head of a Washington forecasting firm. "Everything we have seen so far this year has been strong."

Part of the rebound is almost certainly weather-related. The warmest January on record spurred business activity, which had been depressed in December. But Evans and many of his colleagues believe that, even taking account of January's weather, the economy is staging a modest revival from the depressed fourth quarter.

Greenspan, in an unusually candid comment, said that the chance of a recession had diminished markedly since last spring and that the fourth quarter's sluggish growth was likely to prove only a "temporary hesitation."

Economists believe Greenspan will restate those views Tuesday and are not looking for any immediate credit easing on the part of the

central bank, especially in light of current inflationary pressures.

In January, wholesale prices surged upward at an annual rate of more than 24 percent, the fastest clip since the oil shock of the early 1970s. Analysts are expecting a similarly worrisome increase in January's consumer prices, which will be released Wednesday.

While the inflation spike can be explained by temporary factors such as the December freeze, which drove food prices higher, economists said the Fed would still find the pace too troublesome to ignore.

"The Fed does not want to be perceived as easing at a time when inflation is accelerating, even if those inflationary pressures were considered to be temporary," said David Jones, chief economist at

Aubrey G. Lanston & Co., a government securities dealer.

That could set up a potential clash with the Bush administration, which has been complaining over the last year that the Greenspan-led Fed has not been aggressive enough in pushing interest rates down to spur economic growth.

In addition to releasing the Fed's 1990 targets for growth of the money supply, which influences interest rates, Greenspan will also reveal the Fed's economic forecast for the year.

Many economists believe the central bank will stick to a preliminary forecast made last July in which the bank estimated that growth for 1990 would be in a weak range of between 1.5 percent to 2 percent.

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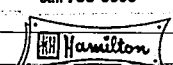
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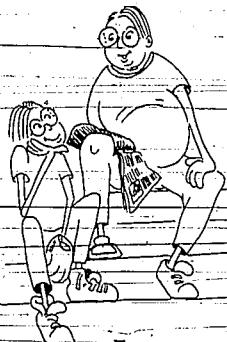

## At least 6 deaths blamed on floods

Flooding continued Monday across the South, with at least six deaths blamed on high water, while more deep snow bedeviled the West, closing 200 miles of a major east-west highway.

About 7,000 residents of east-central Illinois at Champaign remained without power after snow and ice storms knocked out lines last week.

The National Weather Service said a new round of storms, possibly producing heavy rainfall, could reach the South by Wednesday with a threat of more flooding.

Hundreds of people had been evacuated from their homes in Mississippi, Alabama, Georgia and North Carolina.

Heavy snow fell early Monday across the high country of northern Arizona and state officials closed a 200-mile stretch of east-west Interstate 40, a major east-west route from North Carolina to California. The stretch between Kingman and Winslow was closed for seven hours before reopening before noon.

Along I-40, Flagstaff, at an elevation of almost 7,000 feet, got 13 inches of snow. Northwest of the city, the south rim of the Grand Canyon got 17 inches.

"This is a pretty good storm. We usually don't get as much" in one steady snowfall, said Becky Castillo, spokeswoman for the Arizona Department of Public Safety.

"Roads are snowpacked and icy," said Larry Mowbray, manager of the

Little America Service Station at Flagstaff.

Elsewhere in the West, a skier caught by an avalanche Sunday near Crested Butte, Colo., was rescued Monday, authorities said. The body of his companion was found under seven feet of snow.

In the South, floods since late last week have been blamed for six deaths in Georgia, Mississippi, Alabama and North Carolina. One man was reported missing Monday in Oregon.

Only light rain fell early Monday on soggy northwestern Georgia, where 12 inches of rain Friday caused extensive flooding that forced more than 1,000 to leave their homes.

However, the worst flooding since 1951 was still expected along the Oostanaula River and the Conasauga River.

State and federal authorities were still working to estimate the dollar loss. In hard-hit McCaysville, Ga., emergency officials estimated the damage to municipal buildings alone at \$1.6 million.

In the area of Trion, Ga., water as high as the rooftops of some houses brooded more than 1,000 to flee their homes Friday. But water there and at McCaysville had begun to recede.

Mississippi Gov. Ray Mabus took advantage of a break in the rainy weather Monday to make a helicopter tour of flooded areas. Even before his tour, Mabus declared a state of emergency for all 82 counties.

"We do not have an exact figure

but a ballpark estimate would be about 400 homes affected by flooding," Mississippi Emergency Management Agency spokesman Dusty Perkins said Monday. "There could be more when we complete a door-to-door survey."

Roads were impassable in many areas.

"We've got 65 people housed down at the fire station and we're expecting another 50 more," said volunteer fireman Robert Ray in Shubuta, Miss. "We were out off and on all night helping get people out."

The Chickasawhatchee River in the Clarke County town was at 42.6 feet Monday after climbing eight feet in 24 hours. Flood stage is 30 feet and the river was forecast to crest near 45.0 feet early Tuesday.

In northern Alabama, extensive flooding was reported all along the Coosa, Black Warrior and Tallapoosa rivers, where dozens of families were forced to evacuate. President Bush declared a federal disaster area Saturday in six central Alabama counties.

Northern California got sunny weather Monday to clean up after more than 6 feet of powdery snow fell in 50 mph wind in the Sierra Nevada and northern mountains in one of the most severe single storms on record.

An 800-foot-long mudslide 30 miles east of Auburn closed the westbound lanes of Interstate 80 on Sunday, but it was close to being cleared Monday. The state Department of Transportation said.

## Organization urges increase in federal Hispanic appointees

WASHINGTON — A Hispanic organization has requested a meeting with White House Chief of Staff John H. Sununu and Republican National Committee Chairman Lee Atwater to ask for an increase in the number of Hispanic appointees at the federal level.

"We're trying to come up with solutions to bring in more Latinos into the administration," said Michael Zambar, a spokesman for the National Association of Latino Elected and Appointed Officials (NALEO), which requested the meeting in a letter this month.

A study recently released by NALEO found that the number of His-

panics working in the federal government, particularly in Cabinet-level agencies, lags behind Hispanics in the national work force. Those who work for the federal government earn less money, the study showed.

"The NALEO study found that the Justice Department had the best record among Cabinet-level agencies for hiring Hispanics. The Executive Office of the President rated alongside Cabinet agencies in the study, had the worst record.

"I think it's time to set some mandates. Not affirmative action goals, but mandates," said Rep. Bill Richardson, D-N.M., who is a NALEO board member. "The whole idea of giving these agencies the flexibility to recruit and set their own guidelines doesn't work."

## Shuttle countdown advances smoothly

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)

A clandestine countdown advanced smoothly Monday toward a fiery pre-down liftoff Thursday of space shuttle Atlantis with five military astronauts and a spy satellite.

"You wouldn't believe how smooth it is," said NASA spokeswoman Lisa Malone. "The count picked up right on time without a hitch Sunday night and we've had no problems."

Shuttle forecasters said the weather outlook was 60 percent favorable for a launch Thursday. They said the main concern was an advancing cold front that could bring low clouds and rain into the area.

Malone could not reveal the exact status of the countdown because of the classified nature of the mission, the sixth dedicated to the Defense Department in 34 shuttle flights.

# Superconductor commercial use seen within 5 years, experts say

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The United States is holding its own in the race against Japan to develop the new superconductors, which could be in commercial use within five years, a panel of experts said Monday.

Next year, the United States will for the first time launch simple superconducting devices into space to determine how well the devices survive.

Communications equipment using superconductors would be much lighter than conventional equipment and thus ideal for use in outer space, where the costs of launching climb enormously as weight increases, said Edward Mead of E.I. du Pont de Nemours & Co. in Wilmington, Del.

"The weight and size savings would be dramatic up there," he said. Mead said the United States and Japan are neck-and-neck in the race to develop the new superconductors, which were discovered in January 1987.

He spoke at the annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Conventional superconductors conduct electricity without resistance at temperatures a few degrees above absolute zero, which is equal to about 450 degrees below zero Fahrenheit. The new superconductors operate at the comparatively warmer temperatures of liquid nitrogen, about 321 degrees below zero Fahrenheit.

That increases the potential applications of superconductors, because liquid nitrogen is inexpensive and widely available in industry.

"In space it may be possible to

achieve that temperature without refrigeration," Mead said.

Japan is focusing its efforts on superconductors containing bismuth, one of several classes of the so-called high-temperature superconductors, Mead said. The Japanese believe the bismuth compounds are the most promising, he said.

"If they're right, that would put them in a position far ahead of us," he said. If they are wrong, however, "they could all go off the edge of a cliff."

Most of the support for the Japanese effort comes from industry. In the United States, two-thirds of the support for superconductivity research comes from the government, Mead said.

That includes the support of the national weapons laboratories. "For 40 years, they've been the most secret places in the world, and now they're cooperating and sharing information," Mead said.

Japan and the United States are each spending about \$250 million per year on superconductivity research, Mead said, far more than any other nations.

Paul Chu of the University of Houston said that superconducting devices could be in use within five years in oil and mineral exploration. Devices called superconducting quantum interference devices, or SQUIDS, can detect very weak electromagnetic fields, Chu said.

The new superconductors will make it possible to use these devices to search for the telltale underground variations in electromagnetic fields that indicate the presence of oil or

minerals, Chu said. Large applications, such as transmission lines and magnetically levitated trains, are 10 to 15 years away, Chu said, and the Japanese are ahead on those.

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## U.S. officials raise possibility of renewed famine in Ethiopia

WASHINGTON (AP) — The lives of up to 5 million Ethiopians are at risk because anti-government forces have shut down a port that has been the key entry point for outside food assistance, U.S. officials say.

Further aggravating the situation has been the prospect of severely diminished harvests throughout northern Ethiopia as a result of poor rainfall.

To the west, U.S. officials say a crisis situation is rapidly developing in the Sudan, where a bitter civil war has prevented the transport of relief supplies to rebel-held territory in the southern part of the country.

President Bush sent a letter to the Sudanese president last week asking for his cooperation in restarting the international relief effort, to which the United States contributes \$15.7 million.

Renewed fighting has led to the suspension of food flights to southern Sudan and the government also is preventing the departure of a relief train along a route where food shortages are severe. The rebels also have been blocking relief efforts.

Estimates of the number of Sudanese potentially affected by famine range between 1 million and 3 million.

## Bush returns home from holiday break

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush and his wife, Barbara, returned on Monday from three days of relaxation at their oceanic home in Kennebunkport, Maine.

Bush met with National Security Adviser Brent Scowcroft in the morning and then worked for about three hours in the cottage on the 11-acre compound that he uses for an office, aides said.

He made no public appearances.

The Bushes returned to Washington in late afternoon.

Later Monday, Bush was to watch the new film version of one of his favorite books, Tom Clancy's "The Hunt for Red October."

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# Cheney: Costs, reception key to keeping bases

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Defense Secretary Dick Cheney, shunned by Philippine President Corason Aquino, told Filipino officials Monday that the United States will abandon its bases here if it finds that keeping them is too expensive or that Americans are unwelcome.

As violence was reported in several clashes between leftist protesters and police near U.S. installations, Cheney met for nearly three hours with Defense Minister Fidel Ramos in discussions that were described as "very cordial, very forthright."

Meeting reporters afterward with Ramos, Cheney said the United States "will stay only as long as the Philippine people wish it to stay — and only if the terms negotiated are acceptable to both parties."

At issue in Monday's discussions was a \$96 million cut Congress made in the Bush administration's request of \$360 million — to compensate the Philippines for the six bases, which include two of the United States' largest overseas installations, Clark Air Base and Subic Bay Naval Base.

"We recognize there is a shortfall of \$96 million over what we had anticipated," Cheney said. "I also pointed out that in East Asia, in this part of the world, the United States provided a little over \$600 million, and about \$500 million of that comes specifically to the Philippines."

After the talks with Ramos, Cheney flew to the Subic Bay base, 50 miles west of Manila, to inspect a helicopter carrier and to chat with a group of Marines and sailors.

While there were no reports of violence at Subic Bay, about 300 militants hurled rocks at police

trying to stop them from dismantling barbed wire barricades at the entrance to Clark.

Demonstrators said about 30 students had been injured. The protesters regrouped later and staged an "indignation rally," accusing "Filipino police of being 'puppets of U.S. imperialism.'"

In Manila, about 200 members of the militant League of Filipino Students, chanting "Yankies go home," marched to the U.S. Embassy and hurled bottles and rotten tomatoes at police, who charged with clubs and tear gas.

One student was arrested and at least four policemen were injured in

the protest, which occurred near Cheney's heavily guarded hotel.

Earlier, about 50 students burned an effigy of Cheney and picketed the military headquarters garrison with banners reading "Cheney wamonger, go home" and "White monkey, go home with your bases."

Cheney, who is to leave the Philippines on Tuesday for Okinawa and Tokyo, is due to head back to Washington on Saturday.

Cheney has said his discussions with Filipino officials did not amount to the beginning of negotiations to extend the base agreement, which expires next year.

An influential Filipino minority is

pressing Mrs. Aquino not to renew the agreement. In addition, leading Filipino congressmen have urged her to postpone those discussions until this year's cuts are restored.

There are some 18,000 U.S. military personnel in the Philippines, plus 20,000 dependents.

For his part, Ramos acknowledged that the Bush administration needs congressional approval for aid commitments but said he had told Cheney that "time is of the essence" in meeting current U.S. obligations. The secretary said Ramos had been "very direct and very forthright" in presenting his

government's position.

Mrs. Aquino was so upset over the congressional cut that she announced before Cheney began his two-week tour of Asian nations hosting U.S. bases that she would not see him, leaving that task to her defense minister.

The secretary pledged his "best efforts" to restoring the \$96 million cut but U.S. diplomats have said that an austerity-minded Congress is unlikely to change its mind.

Despite the current differences, Cheney said that ties between the two nations are strong.

"I think that is a misreading of events to suggest that somehow, the United States is trying to send signals other than the one I have already given publicly, which is our strong commitment to our alliance with the Philippines," the secretary said.

When asked whether he could say that his government wanted the base to remain, Ramos declined to answer the question, saying the issue was under discussion in the Philippine Congress.

## Israeli official's nod to unity causes uproar

JERUSALEM (AP) — Foreign Minister Meche Arens has caused a storm with his cautious embrace of German reunification.

Cabinet ministers demanded he be rebuked and newspaper editorials accuse him of fostering "a Fourth Reich."

Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir remained silent Monday in a continuing debate that illustrates the dilemma posed for Israel by the prospect of a reunited Germany.

Israeli leaders cannot afford to alienate West Germany, the staunchest supporter of the Jewish state in the European Community, but they also must consider the opinions of the many Israelis whose relatives were among the 6 million Jews killed by the Nazis.

"We are still pondering the consequences" of reunification, senior Shamir aide Avi Pazner told The Associated Press on Monday. "The prime minister has concerns about such a possibility, but has not taken a stand

opposing it."

Arens, a Shamir protégé in the right-wing Likud bloc, started the trouble last week by saying on a visit to Bonn that he had confidence in the "democratic traditions" of West Germany and viewed extending democracy to East Germany as a "positive step."

After the criticism began, Arens pointed out that most of his family perished in the Holocaust. Sunday's edition of the newspaper Maariv quoted Arens, who was born in Lithuania, as saying: "If I wasn't foreign tonight, my feet wouldn't touch German soil."

Arens suggested, however, that Israeli could not afford to disrupt ties with West Germany and noted that Bonn had promised help in blocking further European Community sanctions against Israel. The sanctions were imposed to protest the treatment of Palestinians in the occupied West Bank and Gaza Strip.

## Leaders plan to restrain demonstrations

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — The interim president said Monday the army and police should have more power to curb protests, warning that more violent anti-government demonstrations could lead to anarchy and a new dictatorship.

On Monday evening, more than 300 people staged another rally, but this one was well away from government headquarters Sunday's target — after 12 armored personnel carriers and hundreds of

soldiers blocked access.

One soldier, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said that unlike Sunday, when the army was "caught unprepared by the angry demonstrators," soldiers now had very specific orders to let no one near the building.

About 500 people sacked government headquarters Sunday, smashing the windows and glass-and-metal doors with rocks and iron carpet rods, and destroying some rooms and furniture.

Interim President Ion Iliescu said the 21-member Executive Bureau of the ruling Provisional Council of National Unity decided to propose a law "increasing the power of those organizations that must maintain law and order — and defend institutions and citizens against violent acts."

He warned that violence unleashed by political passions could throw the country into the kind of anarchy that has torn Lebanon asunder.

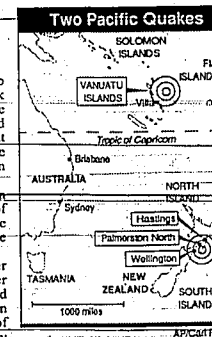
## Soviets return with American science project

MOSCOW (AP) — Two cosmonauts ended a 22-week mission Monday that included the first American experiment aboard the space station Mir, floating off the clear blue sky onto the glistening snow of the Kazakhstan tundra.

State-run television broadcast a recording of the descent module of a Soyuz TM-8 capsule, its white parachute casting a shadow in the vast snowy expanse.

Mission commander Alexander S. Vitorenko and flight engineer Alexander A. Serebrov touched down near Arkalyk in Kazakhstan republic, 1,080 miles southeast of Moscow, the Tass news agency said.

## Pair of quakes shake South Pacific

WELLINGTON, New Zealand (AP) — Two strong earthquakes struck the southwest Pacific Monday, causing minor damage to buildings on the North Island of New Zealand and rattling the Vanuatu Islands, officials said.

The first quake, measuring 6.4 on the Richter scale, struck at 6:35 p.m. (10:35 p.m. Sunday MST) about 110 miles northeast of the capital of Wellington, according to the U.S. Geological Survey in Golden, Colo.

Police said the tremor knocked out telephone service, caused power blackouts and threw store merchandise off shelves. Some trains were halted as railway staff checked the line and bridges, a Railways Corporation spokesman said. There were no reports of injuries.

USGS spokesman Don Finley said

earthquake monitors indicated that although the quake was centered on North Island, minor damage was reported in the Palmerston North, Dannevirke and Hastings areas.

The second quake, measured at a preliminary magnitude of 6.8, shook the Vanuatu Islands, formerly the Old New Hebrides, a little more than an hour later, at 5:48 p.m. local time, according to the USGS. The Vanuatu islands are located in a different time zone.

The tremor was centered nearly 2,000 miles north of the first quake and about 300 miles northeast of Brisbane, Australia. There were no immediate reports of damage or injuries, Finley said.

## Police fire on crowds protesting party ban

KATMANDU, Nepal (AP) — Police opened fire Monday on demonstrators demanding an end to Nepal's 29-year-old ban on political parties, killing three and wounding five, a government minister said.

Witnesses to the clash in Bhaktapur, near Katmandu, said five people were killed and 12 seriously wounded.

Police were trying to control "extremists" and were forced to open fire after their water hoses and clubs failed to disperse the demonstrators, said Kamal Thapa, minister of state for communications.

The situation was brought under control after two hours, he said.

Viktorenko, 42, and his 45-year-old crewmate were reported in good health, Tass said.

The TV report showed the cosmonauts smiling as they sat covered with blankets in the minus 26-degree Fahrenheit temperatures at the remote landing site. They sipped hot drinks as well as champagne on a plane flight later Monday to Star City, the cosmonaut training center near Moscow.

**BOISE** — Even as lawmakers wrangle over budgets and debate education reform, the abortion issue steals the legislative spotlight this week — and no doubt for weeks to come.

Magic Valley lawmakers are divided on the abortion issue and on the various bills before the House State Affairs Committee. In the past few days, Times-News political writer Michelle Cole interviewed each member of the valley's delegation.

### SWAT team to begin training with new guns

**TWIN FALLS** — The Twin Falls police SWAT team soon will begin training with recently purchased automatic submachine guns, Cpl. Brick Wells said.

The owners of the Rupert Trading Post, John and Dorothy Cox, sold 10,000 rounds of ammunition to the police department on credit, John Cox said.

"I thought, heck, it's dumb to let them sit there with these guns and not let them do anything," Cox said.

The police department purchased two Heckler and Koch submachine guns this fall, but budget restrictions meant the SWAT team couldn't purchase ammunition until October.

"Cox said the department can pay for the ammunition then."

"I think it's wonderful," Wells said. "He gave us a pretty good deal."

### Stallings will request delay in deficiency repayments

**WASHINGTON** — U.S. Congressman Richard Stallings will meet with Agriculture Secretary Clayton Yeutter Feb. 27 to request a delay in 1988-barley crop-deficiency repayments until Congress takes up the matter in the 1990 Farm Bill.

Stallings requested the meeting to emphasize to Yeutter that the formula used to calculate the barley deficiency payment is seriously flawed.

"The Agriculture Department calculates the target price based on the relative feed value of barley to corn," Stallings said. "However, the USDA then calculates the market price based on all varieties of barley, including the higher-valued malt barley."

Stallings said he is frustrated that Yeutter, who has the authority to delay further repayments, has refused to take action.

### Federal grazing fee funds turned over to counties

**BOISE** — Checks representing part of the grazing fees charged on federal land have been sent to area counties, state Treasurer Lydia Justice Edwards said.

The total \$243,900 for the state is 12.5 percent of the fees charged by the Bureau of Land Management. The money is turned over to grazing districts and must be used for range improvements.

Local counties receiving funds are: Twin Falls, \$12,105; Gooding, \$4,052; Camas, \$1,982; Cassia, \$12,635; Minidoka, \$3,417; Elmore, \$10,815; Blaine, \$13,307; Jerome, \$1,463; and Lincoln, \$9,513.

### Glenns Ferry will consider city service extension plan

**GLENN'S FERRY** — The City Council will seek public comment at a hearing Wednesday on a proposed grant request to extend city services to airport property.

An aluminum-recycling company is considering the property as a possible plant location. The extension also would provide water, electricity and gas to a proposed winery and Three Island Crossing State Park.

The hearing is set for 7 p.m. at City Hall.

If the city applies for the grant, and it makes the state's final application list, it should know by mid-March, City Clerk Eddie Bastie said.

### Attorney to speak in Rupert on law issues for the elderly

**RUPERT** — A legal aid attorney will discuss issues regarding the elderly at noon Wednesday at the Rupert Senior Citizens Center.

The attorney will be available for appointments after that.


Topics will include Medicaid, Medicare, spousal impoverishment, living-wills-and-payment-for-nursing-home care.

People over age 60 can schedule appointments by calling the Rupert center at 436-9107 or the Idaho Legal Aid office at Twin Falls at 734-7024.

### Teen-agers crash in vehicle stolen in runaway attempt


**SHOSHONE** — Two girls who ran away from Twin Falls were stopped Monday evening in Shoshone after their vehicle crashed, according to the Idaho State Police and the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office.

Details of the 5 p.m. accident were unavailable from the state police Monday evening. The two girls, both under age 18, are from Gooding but were living in Twin Falls with foster parents, an Idaho State Police dispatcher said. They allegedly stole a neighbor's pickup at 3 p.m., the dispatcher said, and drove away.




**Sen. Joyce McRoberts, R-Twin Falls**

"It isn't a political issue and it shouldn't be a political issue," Sen. Joyce McRoberts said. "I suppose if you would label me it would be pro-choice with some restrictions." McRoberts said she does not believe in multiple abortions or gender abortions. She also "feels strongly" that abortion should be done only within the first




**Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls**

"I'm basically pro-life with my feelings," Rep. Ron Black said. But Black said he's also hearing from many who don't want the government involved in those types of personal decisions. If the Legislature does anything this year, Black said he'd like to see restrictions on how late in the pregnancy a woman can have an abortion.




**Rep. Lee Barnes, R-Buhl**

"I'm pro-life, without any hesitation," Rep. Lee Barnes said. Barnes said he would support a law prohibiting abortion except in cases where a woman's life is in danger, in cases of rape, incest or if the fetus has a major deformity. He said abortion as a birth-control option is "not acceptable."




**Sen. Larry Anderson, R-Eden**

Sen. Larry Anderson favors the Right to Life-backed bill that would prohibit abortion except in a few exceptional cases. But he would also like the portion of Idaho's trigger law that calls for criminal penalties for the woman repealed. "I don't think it makes any sense having a law on the books that makes a woman a felon for having an abortion."




**Rep. Doug Jones, R-Filer**

"My feeling is basically pro-choice," Rep. Doug Jones said. Because abortion is such an emotional issue, Jones said he would favor placing an advisory vote on the ballot to allow Idahoans to share their views.




**Rep. Celia Gould, R-Buhl**

Rep. Celia Gould favors HB625, endorsed by Right to Life, which would prohibit abortion except in cases of rape, incest, fetal abnormality or danger to a woman's life. Gould does not think abortion should be used as birth control. "It's the feeling I've held home with. I probably was raised that way and I'll probably stay that way," she said.




**Sen. Lynn Tominaga, R-Rupert**

"I'm pro-life," Sen. Lynn Tominaga said. Tominaga favors the Right to Life-backed bill that would outlaw abortion as a birth-control method. He would favor a referendum that would allow voters to advise the Legislature on what kind of abortion measures they would like to see passed.




**Rep. Maxine Bell, R-Jerome**

Rep. Maxine Bell favors HB625, the bill endorsed by Right to Life. That bill would prohibit abortion except in cases of rape, incest, fetal abnormality or danger to a woman's life. "It's well-crafted," Bell said. "The definitions are so clear that I don't think anybody would have a problem."




**Rep. Tom Morrison, R-Gooding**

"I'm pro-life," Rep. Tom Morrison said. But Morrison, who is a member of the House State Affairs Committee, said he'll wait until after today's hearings are over before deciding which bill he would favor.




**Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo**

"I'm pro-life," Sen. Denton Darrington said. He doesn't know which particular piece of proposed legislation best fits his view, however. "I don't know what is going to pass and what isn't," he said.




**Rep. Mack Neibaur, R-Paul**

Like many of his colleagues, Rep. Mack Neibaur eschews pro-life or pro-choice labeling. His feelings on the issue are strong, however. "I think the government should stay out of it," he said.




**Rep. Ernest Hale, R-Burley**

"I'd like to see one bill come out (after committee hearings) that would ban abortions except to save the life of the mother," Rep. Ernest Hale said. He said he'll vote for the toughest abortion measure that makes it through the State Affairs Committee. "I'm plumb anti-abortion," he said. "To me it's murder."




**Sen. John Peavey, D-Carey**

"I put my name on a bill to repeal that trigger law," said Sen. John Peavey, who has always labeled himself as pro-choice. "I'm not going to prejudice the others—that's the only one I know I'm going to support."




**Rep. Ralph Peters, R-Jerome**

"I still think this is a personal thing and should be settled between a woman and her God," Rep. Ralph Peters said. Despite those feelings, Peters, who is also a member of the State Affairs Committee, said he will take this week's testimony and constituent letters under consideration. Most of his mail is coming from pro-life forces.




**Rep. Steve Antone, R-Rupert**

"I guess I'm pro-life, except in cases where a woman's life is in danger, or in cases of rape and incest," Rep. Steve Antone said.




**Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly**

"My views on the degree of choice have to do with the length of term," Sen. Laird Noh said. He said he would tend to be more in favor of choice earlier rather than later. He also favors the repeal of the state's trigger law. "That's not really the nub of the issue," he added. As the debate goes on, Noh said he is beginning to favor a referendum. "I guess I'm coming down on the side of the educational benefits to the citizenry to have more discussion on this."



**Rep. Gary Robbins, D-Twin Falls**

Rep. Gary Robbins is sponsoring a bill calling for the repeal of the state's trigger law, a law already on the books that establishes criminal penalties for the woman who undergoes an abortion and for the person who performs the procedure. The trigger law would be enforceable should the Supreme Court overturn its 1973 Roe vs. Wade decision allowing abortion access. Other than eliminating the trigger statute, Robbins prefers no legislation at all. "We do not need the government in this thing," he said.



**Rep. Bruce Newcomb, R-Burley**

Rep. Bruce Newcomb, who serves on the House State Affairs Committee, favors the bill endorsed by Right to Life, which would prohibit abortion except in cases of rape, incest, fetal abnormality or danger to a woman's life. "I wouldn't be surprised to see that one come out," he said. "It eliminates abortion as a birth-control measure but allows for some choice in extreme circumstances."


## Robbins proposes commissioner for Magic Valley

**BOISE** — The recent flap over reappointment of the Fish and Game Commissioners prompted Rep. Gary Robbins, D-Twin Falls, to introduce a bill Monday that would increase the commission to six members.

The extra commissioner would represent the eight counties making up the Magic Valley, Robbins explained when he presented his bill before the House Resources and Conservation Committee.

The state is currently divided into six



regions, which are represented by the five-member commission.

—North-Guth, of Salmon, now represents the region that includes the Magic Valley.

But Robbins said Magic Valley residents would like to have a commissioner who is closer to home and more familiar with the area.

After brief debate, the committee agreed to introduce the bill for printing and to form a subcommittee to look into the matter.

"I think this is a good idea — at least from our point of view," said Rep. Bruce Newcomb, R-Burley.

"I'm just wondering if this is a knee jerk reaction to a temporary situation we have," said Rep. Stan Hawkins, R-Ucon.

The reappointment of Guth and the region that includes the Magic Valley, commissioner Louis Roe was held off until the Senate floor last week. The two men drew fire for their votes to restrict fishing on the Silver Creek and the Big Wood River in Blaine County.

"Everyone is going to assume it's a shot at Guth and those guys. It's not at all," Robbins said. "This bill has far-reaching consequences."

Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, chairman of the Senate Resources and Environment Committee, said he thinks increasing the number of commissioners is a good idea.

Members of the House committee even considered the idea of adding a seventh member to the commission in order to break the votes. Robbins said he hoped his bill would serve as a place to start discussion.

"There are a lot of other things that also need to be done," he said.

# Trial to begin Wednesday for man facing 10 cocaine-related charges

TWIN FALLS — A Kimberly man charged with 10 cocaine-related offenses goes on trial Wednesday.  
David Homolka, 29, of rural Kimberly, faces three counts of delivery of a controlled substance and two counts of possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver.  
Homolka also is charged with five counts of failure to use state drug stamps, Idaho's tax on all illegal drug exchanges.

The case will be tried before 5th District Judge Daniel B. Mechl.  
The state Bureau of Narcotics began watching a Kimberly residence in June after a neighbor reported suspicious activity, according to court papers. A confidential informant purchased 61 grams of cocaine from the resident on three occasions in August and September, papers said.  
A man matching Homolka's description sold four ounces of cocaine to an informant in September in a parking lot on Addison Avenue East, police allege in court records.

When a police officer approached his car, the man sped away, and officers chasing him saw him drop a small plastic bag of cocaine out the car window, court papers say. Homolka was arrested on 3200 East Antonio Avelar, was arrested in November on charges of supplying the four ounces of cocaine. Avelar, 35, of Buhl, was charged with conspiracy to deliver a controlled substance, delivery of a controlled substance, and failure to use the drug stamp.

# Candidate unhurt in car accident

BOISE (AP) — State Sen. Skip Smyser, a candidate for the Republican congressional nomination in Idaho's 1st District, escaped from an automobile accident Monday without serious injury.

Campaign aide Annette Glenn said Smyser, a five-term state lawmaker from Parma, was crumpled from St. Maries to Lewiston in northern Idaho when the car was hit in a patch of black ice.  
But Mrs. Glenn said neither Smyser nor his nephew, Michael Blower, were seriously injured. Blower, a student at the University of Idaho, was driving the car, she said.  
"About an hour outside Moscow the car slid on the ice, rolled three or four times and they ended up landing on the roof," Smyser campaign manager Mike Thiessen said. "The doors jammed shut and they had to crawl out the windows to get out."  
Both Smyser and Blower were wearing seat belts. Thiessen said Smyser will be "a little sore, but should be back in town (Boise) tomorrow."

Thiessen said an investigating officer told Smyser excessive speed was not involved. "It's just one of those things," Thiessen said.

# Panel backs exemption catalogue

BOISE (AP) — A compromise measure aimed at finally compiling a catalogue of all the property in the state that is exempt from taxation has cleared a Senate committee.

The Local Government and Taxation Committee sent the measure to the full Senate Monday on a voice vote.

"It's definitely a taxpayer's bill," sponsor Jerry Thorne, R-Nampa, told the panel.

Under the legislation, property of fraternal, benevolent and charitable organizations that has been exempted from taxation would be evaluated and the exemption justified every two years. The county assessor would make available for public inspection the list of exemptions and their value.

Committee Chairman Rachel Gilbert, R-Boise, called the bill an attempt to find out just how much property is currently off the tax rolls.

The system is already being used in Ada County, the state's most developed, and Mrs. Gilbert said those reports show over half the property is tax exempt.

"This list grows every year, and as it does it diminishes our tax base," she said. "When that happens, you and I have a tougher time paying our property taxes."

Assume bill cleared the Senate by only five votes last year before it was easily defeated in the House. That bill called for annual reapportionment of the exempt properties. It also required that the list be published rather than just made available to the public.

Democrat Ralph Lacy of Pocatello, a former assessor, again argued that the requirements, even on a biennial basis, would place an undue burden on local officials. But Thorne maintained the changes in this year's version should ease those kinds of potential problems.

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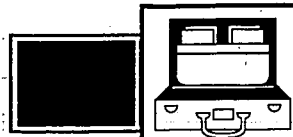

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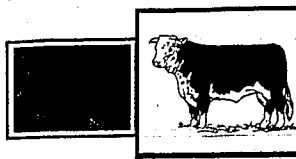

If you're given the opportunity to score a trump trick that you might not otherwise win, do you say yes to the offer? If you're not sure, study the results of this hand played at a recent tournament.

A typical defense was for East-West to play three rounds of diamonds with South ruffing the third round. The spade ace and a spade ruff followed, and South led a trump back to his queen for another spade ruff. Many Easts overruffed with the jack and returned a trump, but it was South who ended up with the favors. He ruffed another spade to establish his suit and used his last trump as an entry to cash it. The defenders got only two diamonds and the overruff, paying off to the vulnerable game.

When Larry Polima of Portland, Ore., held the East cards, he wisely refused to overruff the third spade. And instead of losing a trump trick, he earned a plus score for his side.

After Larry refused to overruff, South returned to his hand via another trump to ruff another spade. Once again Larry refused to overruff, and the hand collapsed. South had no safe way to draw Larry's last trump, and the game suffered one down.

Would South have succeeded had he tried for a crossruff after Larry's refusal to overruff? No, that line would fail also. East overruffs the fourth spade and forces South to ruff a club, and the defense gets two diamonds and two trump tricks.

Coleman said at a court

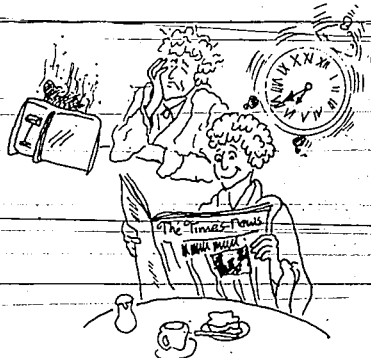
hearing recently that his mother's effort for conservatorship was an "attempt to control my life."

## Mickey Mouse will not be joining this anti-porn group

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — The Walt Disney Co., which fought Mickey Mouse's appearance on a day-care wall and Snow White's performance at the Academy Awards, wants an anti-pornography group to quit quoting its founder.

"Our greatest natural resource is the minds of our children," Walt Disney once said. The Greater Orlando — Coalition Against Pornography used that quotation in a pamphlet outlining the group's purpose. The group received a letter from Anne Nielsen, a Disney attorney, asking them to delete any reference to Disney from the brochure.

She said the quotation "conveys to the public the impression that there is an association or

connection with the Walt Disney Co." But the coalition's executive director, Don Pinkston, says it's all a misunderstanding and he hopes to settle the issue with Disney.

The group's lawyer, Darryl Bloodworth, defended the use of the quote. "Mr. Disney was a public figure, and that simply was a quote of a public figure, much as the newspaper quotes public figures all the time," he said. But Disney spokesman Charles Ridgway disagreed, saying the group was not a newspaper and the company owns the rights to the name of Walt Disney.

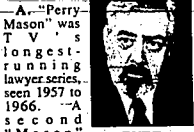

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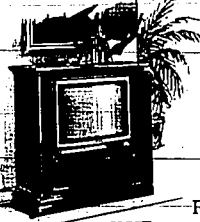

## Keep those kitty cusps shiny

Neglect of teeth and gums can lead to life-threatening diseases such as endocarditis in dogs and kidney failure in cats.

In dogs, the infection from gingivitis and cavities spreads to the heart valves, explained Kathleen T. Neuhoff, a Mishawaka, Ind., veterinarian.

She said the infection can bring on endocarditis, which is a frequent cause of congestive heart failure. In cats, Neuhoff said, the infection from neglected teeth and gums tends to spread to the kidneys. Current research suggests that this type of infection may be the most likely frequent cause of feline kidney disease.

Neuhoff said that, in spite of the evidence, some veterinarians still fail to emphasize the importance of pet oral and dental care.

"She recommends that owners brush their pets' teeth, preferably once a day, but at least once a week."

Use a Q-tip or a gauze sponge. Some pet dentists also

recommend a soft brush. Stick to toothpaste formulated specifically for cats and dogs.

The fluoride in toothpastes for people can be toxic to animals, and, Neuhoff reported.

Though your animal is more likely to accept toothbrushing if you start when it's very young, it is never too late to try.

As in all training, keep repeating the exercise for very short periods of time during a week or more.

At first simply rub the pet's gums with your finger while it rests on your lap or next to you. Work up to inserting the sponge or brush for a few seconds. Then add toothpaste and work in the mouth for longer periods.

## It had to happen - a warm, cozy boarding house awaits your orchids

CHICAGO — Without its blossom, an orchid has little of life. "They're very plain," says Mark Hippler, general manager of Oak Hill Gardens nursery in West Dundee, Ill. "They're not a pretty plant when they're not in bloom." To escape the unsightliness and also the trickier parts of orchid-tending, some aficionados board their plants — sometimes by the hundreds — in nurseries for about 10 months a year. When a flower emerges, the nursery rushes the plant to its owner.

Indeed, with a stable of orchids that blossom in different seasons, an owner may have a plant or two blooming away at all times while

the rest sit out their dormancy out of view.

Is this a luxury? It depends partly on the type of orchid. The undemanding Phalaenopsis can bloom on a north-facing windowsill, says Eugene Hausmann, manager of Orchids by Hausmann in Villa Park, Ill., which sells orchids but no longer boards them. "I have six blooming now," Hausmann says. "I just water and feed them and report them once a year."

But if you favor the finicky Cymbidium, wear a sweater. This genus won't bloom without chilly nights — say, 50 degrees Fahrenheit during the fall and winter, as the bud develops.

"If a person doesn't have a deck on his 38th-floor apartment, he

will not be able to get it to bloom," says Hippler at Oak Hill Gardens, which boards more than 2,000 plants for about 50 clients and is taking no new business.

"We take it outside, bring it in just before frost, and it blooms profusely for us."

Size of an orchid collection is a factor, too. "My clients really love the flower, but they don't have the facilities to care for a large number of plants," says James Vojtek, owner of Golden Harvest Growers in Aurora, Ill. "An apartment on Lake Shore Drive (in Chicago) can't house 300 plants."

Vojtek has one client with just one plant; others with hundreds. "For these people," he says, "boarding is a necessity."

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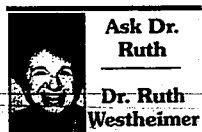

A few years before the First World War, more than a hundred obscure makes of small, ultralight cars appeared on our city streets.

transmission bolted to the rear axle assembly.

The Saxon roadster may have been a full-sized car in some ways, but it weighed only a thousand pounds; and it looked very fragile.

The price was right—only \$395, including a top, windshield, acetylene gas headlights and wire wheels. In 1917, the price was raised to \$495 to cover the cost of

an electric starting and lighting system.

Like everybody else, Saxon tried endurance stunts to get publicity for the car.

A Saxon roadster traveled from New York to San Francisco on the newly designated Lincoln Highway in 1914. In spite of its grand name, the Lincoln Highway was not a modern paved road from coast to coast.

It was just a marked route on existing roads to keep tourists from getting lost on unmarked side roads.

The last Saxon was built in 1922. About 100,000 Saxon cars

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — CID. PIP. SMECK. These are not some new cartoons characters. They are just a small part of the complicated language of today's cars. And they are the reason about 150 of the nation's auto repair instructors converged here.

The 10th annual National Conference for Automotive Technology — which gives the teachers of the nation's future mechanics a chance to learn the latest technological innovations — kicked off recently with some in attendance shaking their heads in frustration.

"A conference like this is the only way I can keep up. I go to a lot of conferences like this to rub elbows with my fellow instructors, take all the publications I can, and go to school.

During the three-day conference, representatives from Ford, Chrysler, Nissan, several auto parts suppliers and Valvoline taught the teachers about everything from new packaging for motor oil to how to diagnose and fix the

complicated computer-controlled engine management systems and electronics under the hood of autos.

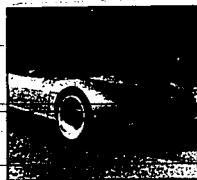
And the technology in today's cars is nothing an old shade tree mechanic would even recognize, much less repair. But the concept of a car mechanic as something less than a respectable job has contributed to a nationwide shortage of auto repair technicians.

"The old concept of an auto mechanic as a grease ball is gone. Today, he's a technician, a highly skilled individual capable of fixing some of the most complicated electronics there are. If someone spends \$30,000 on a car, they don't want unskilled labor working on it," Hope said.

So is PIP, which stands for profile ignition pulse, or the electronic signal picked up by tachometers to measure engine speed. SMECK is what Chrysler calls its signal module engine control device.

## How do you pass for Burt Reynolds? The houses are cozy, mobile - and cardboard

— INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — A federal "prison escapee" was captured in Florida after living on the lam for more than a year by allegedly cashing stolen checks, including some from actor Burt Reynolds.

Richard N. Barefoot, 36, was recently arrested at a motel in Fort Lauderdale. "This time he's staying in federal custody until we're done with him," said Deputy U.S. Marshal Jennie S. Gower, the Indianapolis case agent. Barefoot, a convicted forger and mail thief, was serving a 10-year sentence at the Federal Prison Camp at Terre Haute when he escaped in September 1988.

Investigators believe Barefoot, whose criminal record dates from 1971, collected more than \$165,000 in the 16 months after his escape by forging checks in the Carolinas, Georgia and Florida. In seven Florida cities alone, Barefoot allegedly stole \$125,000, including an unspecified sum he obtained with checks belonging to Reynolds, who lives in Jupiter, Fla.

Jennie Gower, Deputy U.S. Marshal, said Barefoot acquired the checks by driving through affluent residential areas and pulling checks sent by banks from mailboxes. To cash the checks, he obtained several Florida driver's licenses, Gower said.

PHOENIX (AP) — Some homeless people are testing portable cardboard shelters manufactured by an Illinois company for use by those who live on the streets.

Three of the prototype Porta-Sleeper Shelters were given to homeless people by the Rev. Gerald Roseberry, who operates a ministry for the homeless.

The 14-pound tent-like cardboard shelters are about 3 feet high and 3 feet wide and are coated to be water-resistant. The one-person shelters fold up and can be carried with a built-in handle.

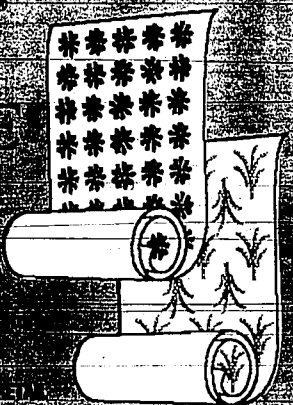
