Opposition redoubles efforts against nation's toughest bill

Even though they were obviously well-past their reproductive years, the women had eblowed their way to the front in order to wave their homenade signs. One sign read: "Idaho...The hew Romania? Vote No on 625." The other sign had a drawing of a coat hanger with the words: "625 No, No No."

On Friday, a majority of the members of the Senate State Affairs Committee apparently didn't agree. The senature voted 7-4-to-send-1625 to the floor with a "do pass recommendation" clearing the way for a full Senate vote by the middle of this week and prolonging Idaho's emotion-filled debate.

If 1625 becomes law, Idaho will have the most restrictive abortion statute in the nation. The Right to Life-spensored measure would ban more than 93 persent of the abortions currently performed in Idaho. It does allow for abortion in eases of rape, incest, proclound fetal deformity or if the lift of the mother is in danger.

Idaho doesn't need anti-choice notoriety

Last week, an interesting article moved on our Associated Press wire here at *The Times-News*, pinpointing Idaho as the only place in the nation where the Right to Life movement has any chance of passing its agenda of a tougher anti-abortion law.

Of some 150 bills advanced this winter in numerous states, only Idaho's is still being considered. Anti-choice bills-have-been-rejected in every other state in which they have been proposed, including Minnesota, Alabama and recently, Utah, which rejected a measure similar to the recognition of the proposed of the Idaho Señate.

The measures are failing for several reasons.

One is that they are probably unconstitutional and would not pass a court review. A long list of scholars, including some who support the Right to Life position, say the measure will not pass muster and that a court-test on the issue would set the anti-abortion movement back for years.

Another reason is that they do not reflect where the majority of Americans want the issue to go. As the anti-abortion lobby has pressed its agenda, it has discovered that in

The issue cuts across party-lines. Many conservatives are opposed to government intusion in private, medical affairs. Many liberals oppose the anti-choice position because it effectively takes away a personal and private right.

The anti-choice lobby probably has sensed that the wind is blowing. It is rightly nervous that, if much more time passes, many more citizens and legislators will realize that the state has much to lose by being used as a Right to Life guinea pig to test legislation for an organization with its own agenda.

That is why the anti-choice forces are trying to stampede the Legislature now. They have turned up the phone calls on legislators, many of whom report privately that the messages-have-taken-an-uglier,-more spiteful and more

threatening tone.

There is little doubt that, should the Right to Late bill be come law in Idaho, the negative effect nationwide would be enormous. The state would quickly become known nabe enormous. The state would quickly become known nationally as the "point state" on this issue, and that national notoriety would be devastating for the state's image, economic development and future.

I Idahoans who travel much already know how the state's reputation as a haven for Aryan Nations extremists has but be:

My guese is that at this moment people feel a lot of enthusiasm for Gotbachev and want to encourage him, but they want him to show more-staying power and irreversibility at the same time. There is a consensus that the Cold War is over, but there is no clear view of what replaces it. 

Dynamite added kick to youngster's July 4

Don Kirkman offers this book back at an Independence Day that was anything but "safe and sane":

an Independence Day that was anything but "safe and sane"

"My dad, June Kirkman, was the foreman of the Twin Falls Highway District for a good many years. We lived on the highway grounds, in fact, our home was where Volco is standing now. It was a great place, for kids to grow up, especially boys.

"Some years before we moved there, a huge rock crusher was operating. Rock was blasted off the Rock Creek ledges with dynamite, taken to the crusher and crushed into small prices. "When we moved there the rock crusher was just a shell. It had been pairty dismantled - the steel gitders, electric motors, and gear boxes were stripped and anything of value had been removed, leaving only the cement base and sides plus a little storage room with a metal locked door between the walls of the crusher. Ladders and extuding steel-bolts were taken from the sides to keep anyone, from climbing to the tops."

Williams' versatility makes him one of CSI's indispensable men

TWIN FALLS — The one constant in Anthony Williams' two-year stay at College of Southern Idaho has; more perhaps than anyone in CS1 basketball history, been the changing of his "job description."

From the freshman point guard who was to spell all-American David Henderson for 15 minutes a game last year, Williams has seen his responsibilities to the team grow from ballhandler to playfither to scorer and now to-creator. Despite scattered erliteism from farmers, the powers-that-be in Washington and Ottawa are pressing ahead with the U.S.-Canadian Free Trade Agreement.

So love it or hate it, the FTA is here to stay. The FTA, which went into effect Jan. 1, 1989, will phase out all tariff and some non-tariff Americas to trade by 1999. That phase-out is already under way. The U.S. and Canadian powernments recently climinated tariffs on nearly 400 products; including chemicals and certain foods.

And in a related move, the governments agreed to a one-year experiment allowing beef, pork and poultry to move freely between the two countries, without border inspections.

In short, the trade, walls are tumblin' down.

That's especially important to the Canadians.
The FTA allows Canadian ag producers easier access to the U.S. market — about 10 times bigger than their own. The agreement also gives Canadian consumers easier (and cheaper) access to U.S. hot-weather ag products not easily grown in Canada.







Dear Mr. Wolff:
A player inadvertently sees the bottom card of the deck (an ace) while the cards are being dealt. Is it within the rules for him-to call for a redeal if he was the only one who saw

ANSWER: Law No. 8 of the Laws of Contract Bridge states, "The dealer must not allow the face of any card to be seen while he is dealing." It appears that this is enough to require a redeal.

ANSWER: A double of four hearts invites partner to bid something if he thinks he can make it (doubler promises "cards" and good spade supportly or to pass in doublful situations. A double of four spades is primarily for penalties. Four nor-trump is used as a three-suit takeout.






