Perching principal rewards his pupils

KIMBERLY — Honoring a deal with his students — elementary school Principal Russell Mitchell climbed a ladder Thursday and spent his morning fielding questions from curious kids and doing paperwork from a perch on his school's roof.

"You get to see who's balding," he said jokingly about the view. Mitchell challenged his students to get at least 90 percent of their parents registered to vote so they could cast a ballot in the April 3 bond election for a new middle school.

As part of the bargain, Mitchell promised to spend the day on the roof if the kids reached the goal. The kids didn't make it, but since they got about halfway — raising the percentage of registered parents from 58 to 74 percent — Mitchell agreed to spend the morning on the roof.

Mitchell said he did not encourage kids to request their parents to vote one way or the other on the bond. He just wants more parents to turn out, no matter how they

Jury convicts skipper of tanker only on minor charge in oil spill

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — A jury on Thursday acquitted Exxon Valdez skipper Joseph Hazelwood of being drunk and reckless in connection with the nation's worst oil spill but convicted him of a minor charge of negligent discharge of oil.

After deliberating for 10 1/2 hours, the jurors absolved Hazelwood of one felony and two misdemeanors stemming from the disaster, in which his tanker ran aground and spilled nearly 11 million gallons of oil into Prince William Sound on March 24, 1989.

The misdemeanor charge on which he was convicted carries a maximum sentence of 90 days in jail and a \$1,000 fine, far less than the 7 1/2 years and \$61,000 fine he could have faced if found guilty on all four charges.

Superior Court Judge Karl Johnson set sentencing for Friday.

There were bursts of applause in the courtroom as the judge read the first three verdicts of "not guilty."

Michael Chalos, a former classmate of Hazelwood's at the Maritime Academy at Fort Schuyler, N.Y., clapped the skipper on the shoulder and hit the counsel table with his hand at the first "Not guilty" verdict.

The normally taciturn defendant smiled broadly for the first time in the two-month-long trial and commented briefly to reporters, saying, "I'm just relieved. I was nervous."

"I'm going to try to get along with my life..." Hazelwood told reporters at a news conference later. "That's what I do."

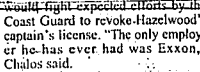
His lawyer said he would begin negotiations with Exxon to get the former skipper's job back, and would fight extradition by the Coast Guard to revoke Hazelwood's captain's license. "The only employer he has ever had was Exxon," Chalos said.

"We think it's a great victory for Captain Hazelwood," Chalos said. "We had great faith in the jury system. The only charge he's been convicted of is a low-level misdemeanor."

Jim Morakis, a spokesman for Exxon in New York, said the company, which has fired Hazelwood, was "pleased that the ordeal of the trial is over for Capt. Hazelwood and his family."

The verdict would seem to confirm the view that the grounding of the Exxon Valdez was an accident. Morakis said, "In light of pending litigation any other comment would be inappropriate."

One of the jurors said he found unbelievable the prosecution's complicated effort to prove Hazelwood was intoxicated through backward calculations. The skipper was not tested until long after the disaster, and juror Jeff Sage said he and the other panelists figured out that from the prosecution expert's calculations, the captain would have had to consume an enormous amount of liquor before his ship ran aground.

Gem Senate passes ban on abortions

BOISE — Now it's up to Gov. Cecil Andrus to decide whether Idaho will challenge the nation's 17-year-old abortion law.

Following a 4 1/2-hour debate Thursday, the Idaho Senate voted 25-17 to endorse HB25, a Right to Life-sponsored bill that would ban

between 93 and 98 percent of the abortions currently performed in Idaho and push the state to the vanguard of a U.S. Supreme Court battle.

"The majority of Idahoans think that life begins at conception and abortion is the taking of innocent life," co-sponsor Sen. Roger Madsen, R-Boise, said during opening remarks.

Hundreds of spectators watched the debate quietly from a gallery above the Senate floor. Dozens of television cameras and several reporters from national media were also on hand to record the moment when the Idaho Legislature launched its attack on the 1973 Roe vs. Wade decision legalizing abortion.

Idaho's bill bans abortion except

for cases of rape, incest, fetal deformity or pregnancy that threatens a woman's life. It also proposes civil penalties for anyone performing abortions.

Only Guam has set tougher standards, restricting abortion in all cases except when the mother's life is in danger.

But many believe the Supreme Court will prefer to revisit Roe vs. Wade with a

"We must set the example for the nation in this great debate," Madsen told his colleagues.

The bill is likely to arrive on Andrus' desk early next week. He'll have five days to act.

The governor has long held pro-life beliefs that abortion should be limited to cases of rape, incest or a threat to the mother's life. He has refused to say how he will act on the Right to Life legislation headed his way. And an Andrus aide said Thursday afternoon the governor would issue no statements.

Thirty-one senators stood to express their views on whether the state has a right to regulate abortion.

BOISE — Here's how Magic Valley senators voted on abortion legislation heard in the Idaho Senate Thursday:

HB625, which outlaws abortion as a means of birth control but does allow for abortion in some circumstances, passed 25-17.

Voting for the bill: Sen. Larry Anderson, R-Eden; Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo; and Sen. Lynn Tominga, R-Rupert.

Voting against the bill: Sen. Joyce McRoberts, R-Twin Falls; Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly; and Sen. John Peavey, D-Carey.

HB536, which repeals Idaho's "trigger" law that sets criminal penalties for doctors performing abortions and women who have them, passed 32-8.

Voting for the repeal: Anderson, McRoberts, Noh, Peavey, Tominga.

Voting against the repeal: Darrington.

House panel recommends approval of advisory vote on abortion issue

BOISE — Fears that the only alternative will be a binding pro-choice initiative have convinced the House State Affairs Committee to recommend full House approval of a proposed advisory vote on abortion.

The vote was 11-8 Thursday for the bill sponsored by State Affairs Chairman Pam Bengson, R-Boise. All three Magic Valley representatives on the committee, republicans Ralph Peters of Jerome, Tom Morrisson of Gooding and Bruce McComb of Burley, voted for the measure.

It came as the Idaho Senate prepared to take final legislative action on a bill giving Idaho the most restrictive abortion law of any state.

"I strongly believe that the Idaho electorate ought to be consulted," Bengson said, calling abortion the most divisive issue the nation has faced since slavery.

In arguing for the committee's endorsement, she handed out copies of an initiative petition being circulated by the National Organization for Women and other pro-choice groups.

If it wins a place on the Nov. 6 ballot and is approved by voters, it would legally bar the state from interfering in women's reproductive decisions through the first 26 weeks of pregnancy.

Bengson acknowledged there is little support for the wording of her alternative non-binding measure asking general election voters to pick one of four positions as most closely reflecting what they believe should be Idaho's abortion law.

Soviets display muscle in Lithuania

VILNIUS, U.S.S.R. — Soviet armor rolled through Vilnius in a show of strength Thursday and leaders of this rebellious Baltic republic appealed for world support to force Lithuania.

In his escalating war of nerves, Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev also demanded Thursday that Lithuania stop signing up its own volunteer force.

"It is clear that another republic is going to use force against Lithuania and its citizens," said a Lithuanian

government appeal to the world issued late Thursday.

"We are asking people to prevent this by protesting the possible use of violence against a member of the world community against Lithuania and its citizens."

The republic's president, Vytautas Landsbergis, in an emotional speech to the Supreme Council legislature, pledged that Lithuanians would keep their drive for full independence from Moscow peaceful.

If tanks are sent to take away shotguns and hunting rifles, we won't shoot at the tanks," said Landsbergis, a music professor. "Our resistance will be non-violent."

Defense officials in Sweden said the military there was put on higher alert after reports of Soviet troop movements in Lithuania. Defense spokeswoman Kari Hansson said that among other measures, more pilots than usual were on call.

Lithuania, incorporated into the Soviet Union in 1940, declared independence on March 11 in a decision Moscow refuses to accept.

U.S., Soviets set up grain deal

WASHINGTON — American farmers have guaranteed a major portion of the Soviet Union's grain import market for another five years, officials announced Thursday.

Agriculture Secretary Clayton Yeutter and U.S. Trade Representative Carla A. Hills said a tentative agreement in principle was reached during negotiations in Vienna.

The current pact, which has been in effect since 1983, expires Dec. 31. The new accord will increase the annual minimum shipments of U.S. grain to the Soviets to 10 million metric tons from 9 million tons — a guarantee of 50 million tons over the five years, compared with 45 million tons under the old terms.

Soviet purchases in most years have exceeded the required minimums. In 1988-89, for example, sales were more than double the

specified minimum.

The Kremlin will have some greater year-to-year flexibility under the new arrangement by being allowed to choose between wheat and feed grains, although over the life of the pact the minimums will be met, officials said.

Under the agreement, the Soviets will be committed to buying at least 4 million tons each of wheat and feed grains. However, in any one year Moscow may substitute up to 750,000 tons of one commodity for the other.

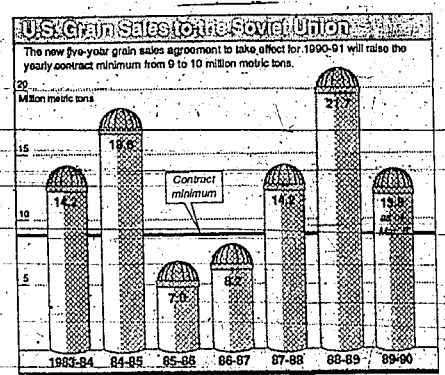
For the first time, the agreement includes barley and sorghum as well as corn under the definition of feed grains.

As of March 8, the Soviets had bought more than 13.8 million tons of U.S. wheat and corn under the current agreement for delivery this year. Last year's sales totaled a record 21.7 million tons.

Effectively, over five years, U.S. farmers will be assured a Soviet market for at least 20 million tons of wheat and 20 million tons of feed grains, with an additional 10 million tons that can be made up of wheat, feed grains, soybeans or soybean meal.

Although it makes up a hefty share, the Soviet Union's grain purchases by no means tell the whole story of U.S. grain exports.

Total wheat shipments in 1989-90 are forecast at 35.4 million tons, and so-called coarse grains, or feed grains, at 66.4 million tons. "We think this is a good deal, that it assures U.S. farmers of a stable market over the life of the agreement," Julius Katz, deputy U.S. trade representative, said in Vienna.

Avoid force, Bush tells Soviets

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush implored the Soviet Union Thursday not to use force to block Lithuania's secession, but also urged the breakaway republic to recognize "certain realities" of Moscow's control.

Commending the Kremlin for dealing peacefully with changes in Eastern Europe, Bush said, "Please continue to exercise that kind of restraint. And remember...no use of force." He said both sides should negotiate their differences.

Separately, Defense Secretary Dick Cheney said any resort to military might "would do great violence" to the reforms being championed by Soviet Premier Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

The president's comments came as Soviet armored personnel carriers and trucks drove through the Lithuanian capital in a show of force. Bush declined to criticize Gorbachev for demanding that Lithuanians surrender their guns.

"They should talk about that," Bush said.

Bush also refused to say how he would react if force were used. "What possible good would come from the president of the United States, standing halfway around the world, speculating on something that he doesn't want to see happen?"

He issued his plea for restraint during a 20-minute news conference on the White House lawn.

Bush stood beneath a towering oak tree and next to a flowering eastern redbud tree that he and his wife, Barbara, had just planted.

Commenting on two days of talks with visiting Polish Prime Minister, Tadeusz Mazowiecki, Bush said there was no need for Soviet troops to be stationed in Poland or anywhere else in Eastern Europe. "And the sooner they get out of there, the better," he said.

Bush acknowledged "a nuance of difference" with Mazowiecki over the prime minister's demands that the two Germans sign a treaty

guaranteeing Polish borders before they unite. "But he sees the Poles and Germans as very, very close now" to an understanding that the current borders must remain intact.

On other issues, Bush:

- Said he wants a treaty to cut Soviet and American troops in Europe to be ready by the time of his summit this summer with Gorbachev in Washington. Another official said Bush had meant to say he wanted to have a strategic-arms treaty ready by the summit.
- Said he will not attend the April 25 inauguration of U.S.-backed president-elect Violeta Chamorro in Nicaragua but wants to visit the country sometime.
- Responding to another question, Bush said "I'm dying to go" to Australia and wants to make the trip before the end of the year. He declined to say he would go to New Zealand during such a trip, noting U.S. unhappiness over its refusal to permit American warships carrying nuclear weapons in its waters.

Meese denies cover-up knowledge

WASHINGTON — Former Attorney General Edwin Meese III, testifying for the defense in the trial of former national security adviser John M. Poindexter, said Thursday he has no knowledge that Poindexter participated in a cover-up of the Iran-Contra affair.

But under cross-examination, Meese said he never became suspicious even when his own inquiry into the burgeoning scandal in November 1986 uncovered clues pointing toward a Poindexter-directed cover-up.

Mystery illness tells Albanian youths
PRISTINA, Yugoslavia (AP) — More than 400 ethnic Albanian teen-agers were hospitalized Thursday in Podujevo, a town in restive Kosovo province, after being felled by a mysterious illness that officials said may be poison.

Official Radio Belgrade said about 4,000 ethnic Albanians gathered in the streets of Podujevo upon hearing the news. Some of them beat up 15 Serbs and Montenegrins, accusing them of poisoning classroom rooms of Albanian pupils.

Nunn demands blanks be filled in
WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee said Thursday that President Bush's \$307 billion defense budget contains several large holes that Congress will fill if the administration doesn't.

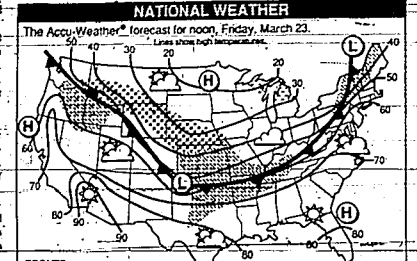
"If the Department of Defense wants to remain relevant to the process, the Pentagon must begin filling in these big blanks in the defense budget," Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., said in his first major speech this year on the military blueprint for fiscal 1991.

Nunn cited at least five "big blanks" in Bush's budget, an assessment of the threat to U.S. national security, a military strategy in response to the threat, the future size of the armed forces, how to meet required budget cuts and the need for major weapons.

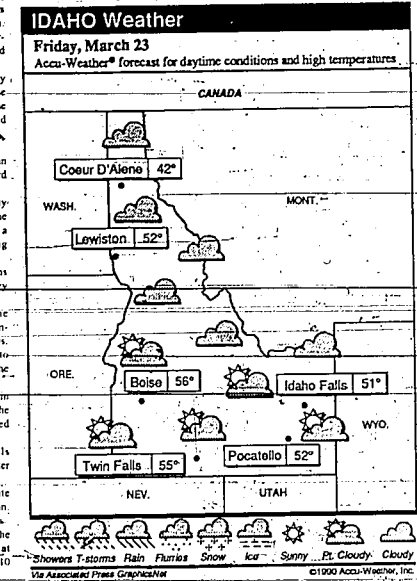

Their arguments lacked the emotional intensity of the earlier House debate.

Cal State Sen. Joyce McRoberts, R-Twin Falls, visibly fought tears during her brief remarks.

"The people of Idaho have overwhelmingly told us that they do not want us to interfere with their life," she said. "It is not a political issue. It should not be a political issue. This is an emotional and a very personal issue for each and every one of us."

and 12 legislators should not make the decision for the people of the state of Idaho."

"A woman's right to control her own body vs. the state's right to protect the unborn was a theme repeated often during the debate and during the many hours of public hearings held in the past two months."

But Thursday's arguments also touched on a new and sensitive topic: religion.

"I believe H625 is being rammed down our throats by a vocal minority," said Sen. Marti Calabretta, D-Obum. "They do not believe in other religions, but they have strong beliefs."

"This is not a religious issue, Madden insisted. "It is a civil rights issue of the first order."

In the end, the vote tally indicated politics and religion each may have played a role. All 17 Mormons in the Senate voted in favor of H625. Twenty-one Republicans supported the bill, with only three opposed. Fourteen Democrats cast their votes against the bill, with five for it.

"Last spring only 40 percent of the parents turned out to vote when the bond failed," Mitchell said. "And I don't think the election was indicative of how parents felt."

Mitchell acquired a list of Kimberly's registered voters from the county and then made a second list of parents of elementary school students who had not yet registered. Of the stressed kids not singled out in the push-for-parental registration, parents could call the school or kids could call their teachers to see if mom and dad were registered, he said.

Many parents, Mitchell said, were registered to vote in city elections, but not for bond elections. He said that today is the last day for residents to register.

Two moms laughingly stole Mitchell's ladder, stranding the trench coat-clad administrator and forcing him to deliver teachers' paychecks via "airmail."

Students gathered below Mitchell's perch during lunchtime recess as offered to catch him or call the fire department if he wanted to come down to eat.

Sporting a red-and-white Kimberly baseball cap, Mitchell took advantage of his rooftop exile to get all the balls off the roof. He said he got more paperwork done than usual because the phone cord wouldn't reach his air-conditioned second-story office.

Confession: "I don't think it's a foregone conclusion that the governor will sign this bill," Brooks said following the vote. "I believe it would be damaging to him politically. Not only would he be out of touch with his party, but with a majority in the state."

Andrus will have fewer headaches over another abortion measure that also passed the Senate Thursday. In his State-of-the-State address in January, he called for the Legislature to repeal Idaho's dormant "trigger" statute, which provides for criminal penalties for women who have abortions and anyone who performs them.

The Senate took less than a half hour to approve the trigger repeal by a 32-8 vote.

As the state and the nation await the governor's action on H625, the Freedom Means Choice coalition has pledged to hold nightly vigils outside the Statehouse.

"The war is not over," said Sally Trotter, a Freedom Means Choice leader. "We're reaching out to the citizens of Idaho to write or call the governor."

Karen Heffner, a Twin Falls resident and lobbyist for Right to Life of Idaho, said her organization is elated by the outcome of the vote. If Andrus should veto H625, Heffner would fund their efforts to change one Supreme Court Justice's mind.

The options include an absolute ban on abortion, outlawing abortion as a method of birth control, the current state law allowing abortion on demand through the first 24 weeks of pregnancy and a ban on any state interference in "a woman's decision to terminate a pregnancy made in consultation with her physician."

But despite opposition from both anti-abortion and pro-choice forces, Bengson said Idaho residents have been inundating her with requests for a chance to vote on the issue, and other committee members agreed that their choice should be broader than allowed under the "NOW" initiative.

"I hope that the NOW initiative doesn't end up on the ballot and be passed," said Rep. Dept. Hagenstock, R-Coeur d'Alene. "Perhaps knowing this non-binding advisory is on the ballot would discourage that."

By endorsing the bill, State Affairs put inside argument from a Right to Life of Idaho spokeswoman that an advisory vote would only confuse the electorate and prompt a media blitz of advertising on both sides of the issue.

"This won't be over; we'll just be back here again no matter what the vote is," said Barbara Dell of Soda Springs. "It's going to be an advisory media buyout."

Action stalled on adopting King holiday

BOISE (AP) — Constitutional questions in the Idaho House have stalled the process of amending a Senate-passed bill adopting the federal holiday honoring slain civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. After voting 43-40 to hold the legislation for changes on Wednesday, the House hit a snag Thursday while debating a proposed amendment creating the holiday on the third Monday in January subject to voter approval in this year's general election.

Opponents of the amendment proposed by Rep. Joan Wood, R-Navy, argued the Idaho Constitution allows the Legislature to place constitutional changes on the ballot, but not binding statutory issues.

That is left to the people through the initiative process, they said.

"It would seem to me to be highly unusual, if not unconstitutional," said Rep. L. Ed Brown, R-Pocatello, one of the bill's floor sponsors.

"This is an effort by the Legislature to usurp power specifically given to the people by the constitution," said Democratic Rep. Patricia, a Pocatello attorney and another floor sponsor. "What are we going to do? build a little wall around our state?"

The issue was tabled until Friday while lawmakers on both sides sought legal advice.

Mrs. Wood said she would change her amendment to stipulate the Nov. 6 vote would be only advisory if need be, but both she and

House Speaker Tom Boyd, R-Geneseo, said they did not believe it would be necessary.

"If we pass a Martin Luther King Day with a referendum attached, that's a heck of a lot better than anything else we've seen," Boyd said.

However, he said another proposed amendment from Brown also would be acceptable simply changing the name of the holiday to Martin Luther King Jr.-Idaho Human Rights Day. It was expected to be considered Friday as well.

After Wednesday's vote sidestepping final action to make Idaho the 47th state recognizing the federal holiday honoring King, Boyd said the state would be "hung out to

dry" if it goes home without this. Besides Idaho, only Arizona, Montana and New Hampshire have not yet adopted state holidays corresponding with the federal designation.

The Idaho Legislature made the third Monday in January a state commemorative day in 1987, and a bill designating a state holiday died in a House committee last year.

On Thursday, Ms. McDermott said opponents have made it clear by focusing their objections to a King holiday on the expense, which they estimate at \$2.6 million a year to state government alone, that they are not bothered by Idaho's reputation as a haven for racists.

"If they want Idaho to be known for nothing more than potatoes and bigots, so be it," she said.

Legislative pay will nearly double Dec. 1

BOISE (AP) — A citizens' panel on legislative pay has recommended salaries nearly doubling the compensation lawmakers now make for their Stathouse service each year. The increase is effective automatically Dec. 1.

But House Speaker Tom Boyd, a potential recipient of the higher salary, plus a \$3,000 bonus for the legislative leaders, says the pay hike is excessive.

While the spotlight focused on a Senate abortion vote Thursday, the Citizens' Committee on Legislative Compensation arrived at a fixed annual salary of \$12,000, a substantial jump from the current \$6,600, said Tim Hopkins, the committee chairman and an Idaho Falls attorney.

"We hope it more fairly, if not entirely adequately, compensates those who spend their time in service to the state," he said.

The higher reimbursement will continue after Dec. 1 unless one member of the Legislature rejects it by Jan. 31, 1991.

Last week, Senate President Pro Tem Mike Crapo, R-Idaho Falls, and Democratic Sen. Ron Beitelspacher of Grangeville suggested pegging the legislative pay to a percentage of the salaries of the state's elected officers. Hopkins called the argument "persuasive," but his commission turned down the idea.

Station seeks new tower site

MOSCOW (AP) — The University of Idaho public television station has withdrawn its application with the Federal Communications Commission to build a 283-foot tower and transmitter on East Moscow Mountain.

Instead, KUID-TV has asked for approval to build a more powerful transmitter at its current site on Paradise Ridge south of Moscow.

The station turned down an offer from KWSU-TV, a Pullman public broadcasting station, to share a common transmitter on Kamiak Butte north of Pullman.

Symms 2nd among senators in PAC funds

MOSCOW (AP) — Idaho Sen. Steve Symms received the second highest total of Political Action Committee contributions among the 28 U.S. senators seeking reelection in 1986. Common Cause reports Symms accepted nearly \$1.4 million from PACs toward his 1986 campaign, second only to California Sen. Alan Cranston, the government watchdog group said in a campaign analysis released this week.

The total is three times that raised by fellow Idaho senator James McClure in the period between 1983 and 1988.

The average total PAC contribution to incumbent senators

that year was less than \$900,000.

• Symms raised more than \$1.45 million from 705 PACs during the six-year period, compared to McClure's \$572,946 from 452 PACs, according to Common Cause.

Symms' higher total is due in part to his close 1986 race against former Gov. John Evans. McClure handily won his 1984 re-election bid against Democratic challenger Pete Busch,

who died in a 1986 airplane crash while running for the House.

Most of the PAC contributions came from organizations based outside Idaho, according to information compiled by the Federal Election Commission.

Common Cause wants Congress to end campaign dependence on PAC contributions. Legislation is being considered this spring to limit the growing role PACs play in congressional elections.

"In our view, PAC money is interested money. Most often it is given by groups to gain influence on a given issue," Randy Hwa, vice president for the 275,000-member

group said today. "With each passing election we see more and more PAC money going into congressional elections, and their influence now is greater than ever before."

Spokesmen for McClure and Symms Thursday rejected the idea that congressmen are influenced by campaign contributions. While neither senator has taken a position yet on pending campaign reform legislation, they disagree on the role PACs should play in an election.

McClure supports restricting PAC contributions from outside the state, said Tod Neuenhewander, McClure's chief of staff.

Life experience shaped her pro-choice abortion stance

After weeks, months, years of passively listening to other people debate the issue of abortion, I feel it is finally time for me to speak up. I believe that people on both sides of this extremely emotional issue come to their personal beliefs through their own life experiences. The following story is my experience.

Ten years ago, between the time I had my first baby and three years later when I finally conceived my second, I suffered two miscarriages. It was devastating.

I know first hand what it feels like to desperately want a baby and to grieve the loss of a baby that would never be. At that time in my life, I felt completely safe from the abortion issue. I knew I loved kids and I wanted lots of them, so I never worried that I personally might someday be faced with the agonizing decision of abortion.

All that changed 3 1/2 years ago after the birth of my third child when I experienced severe post-partum psychosis, the result of an extreme hormonal imbalance in my system. When my baby was only two weeks old I found myself in a psychiatric hospital. Over the course of the next year, I was

hospitalized three more times. Although the original problem was hormonal, the experience was so traumatic that I developed an anxiety disorder, and long after my hormones had balanced out, I still suffered from severe panic attacks. It took two full years to recover, and many people besides myself, namely my children, were forever changed by the experience.

In the course of my recovery, specialist after specialist told me my chances of re-experiencing post-partum psychosis were 99 in 100 and that I should never have another baby. It would be "life threatening to my mental health."

These same doctors then proceeded to tell me I should not have any kind of permanent procedure done to insure that I have no more children, since it could cause further hormonal problems. Fine, my husband had a vasectomy, but the fact remains that my body can still get pregnant.

That is why I can't straddle the fence any longer. If I were ever to become pregnant again, I would have to consider having an abortion. But, according to HB253, only a woman whose physical health is threatened is entitled to a safe, legal abortion — not one whose mental health is at risk. I wonder how one can separate physical risk from mental risk. A hormonal imbalance is a physical problem, but it's symptoms often manifest as so-called mental disorders in the form of anxiety or depression.

My next concern is who gets to decide what is life threatening? I, who know my own psyche and body more intimately than anyone else? My former doctors? Our law enforcement agencies? An attorney? A judge? Our legislators?

"Yikes!" By the time someone finally gets to decide, is it too late to have an abortion? And is my physical and mental health permanently threatened?

Recently, I was discussing this issue with a man who is very active in Magic Valley's Right to Life organization. After I shared my personal story with him and thus my concerns about women being able to choose for themselves, he looked at me and said,

"But if you were to become pregnant again, don't you think it would be better to just have the baby and give it up for adoption? Then another loving couple could have the joy of raising a baby that was wanted."

Needless to say, I was completely stunned by his obvious insensitivity and total lack of understanding to what I had just told him. The issue for me is not being able to wait or care for another baby. The issue is that the risk of giving birth again could possibly leave me spending the rest of my life in Blackfoot.

I used to look at my tiny baby, thinking he was so precious that I would be willing to go through it all over again in an instant. Today, I look at my precious, sturdy 3-year-old and realize that he was almost lost to me.

I am not about to risk losing him or his older brother and sister ever again. Even for the life of an unborn child. If that makes me despicable in the eyes of some people, then so be it. I can handle that.

What I can't handle is those same people trying to force their personal and religious values on me by trying to pass laws that

support only their belief system.

My point is that my story is only one woman's story; and while it may sound extreme, it is certainly not unique in that everyone has struggles and hardships to bear. I believe that most women facing an abortion come to their decision not without first experiencing deep confusion, pain and soul searching and not without considering what is truly best for themselves and the people closest to them, including their unborn child.

And that is why I feel the decision of abortion must be left to each individual woman, as her personal story is like no one else's.

So I guess I now find myself sitting in the pro-choice camp. It doesn't feel particularly great. But then, neither did sitting in a psychiatric hospital. And for those of you who worry that I'll someday be sitting in hell — don't bother. I've already been there and back.

Visit to America sparks fear and encouragement

LONDON — Rebecca plans to visit America this summer — New York, New Jersey, New Orleans, St. Louis and Chicago — before coming back for her first term at Oxford in the fall.

Rebecca is lovely. She is just 18. She is half American, but knows little of her mother's land. All on her own she has constructed an American montage: Open spaces, kindly folk and all-night discos. She plans, she says, to "hitchhike and stay in youth hostels."

Her mother worries but nods. Her mother, however, has not lived in America for 30 years.

I look at Rebecca, and I think of the places I traveled at her age with nothing in my knapsack but implicit trust. Paris worked with the Left Bank, art, and fleeting love, and it was. London would be manners, discourse, and lifelong friendship, and it was.

Even Manhattan — two rooms in a basement in Greenwich Village — was wacky and wild then, without magic, like a musical comedy set to tin drums.

It would be wicked to take the wonder out of Rebecca's American odyssey. I must move carefully here. But — I feel the clutch in my fiftysomething heart — I want her to come home safe.

The newspapers give the body count of the news: stark, studied and discarded. What may be more shocking than the content to your British sensibilities will be the prominence given these reports: Not a headline as in the British press, but a paragraph in the Metro briefs.

Sadly, Americans have learned to shrug.

Don't go into a public toilet in London. Rebecca, even if you can find one. I know them in London they are clean and safe and easy to find. In America they are not.

Grown men flee in terror from the scenes inside the public "conveniences" in Grand Central and Penn Station.

Getting around America's cities is no cinch. Luckily, you like to walk. But watch the alleyways. Keep your purse close to

your side and take care to step over the bodies sprawled on the curb and in the doorways.

You will notice that many young men your age in American cities carry radios the size of Volkswagens, and they are turned up loud. Yes, unlike London, nobody stops them from doing this. Don't ask them to turn down the volume or you may get "hit upside the head." It's an American expression.

Your mother has bought you, at great expense, health insurance for your trip. In England an American visitor is covered by the national health system in an emergency. In America there is no national health system, even for Americans. Don't get sick.

You will, of course, adore: Fast food (some places give you a free meal if they don't please the plate in front of you in 10 minutes); shopping centers; sales (all year long, honest); ice cream (sorry, but the English just haven't got it right); television (30 channels everywhere you go — plus Mrs. Thatcher on C-span if you get homesick).

If you catch C-span, note the difference between debate in the U.S. Congress and debate in the English Parliament. Note the prudishness exercised by the "brash" Americans and the passion shown by the "reticent" British. When you tell your American friends that you're studying "The Greats" at Oxford, they won't think Plato, they'll think Beatles. But they'll love you in America, Rebecca, why wouldn't they? And the American part of you will respond to wide-open, all-there friendliness which — despite the dank of the cities — is the best part of my countrymen.

Travel safely then, dream a little, cut your own path, then come home.

What I didn't tell her is that I will favor a discount when senior citizens lobby to wipe out the property tax ceiling; when they stop calling their state reps from their subsidized housing to yell, "No more taxes"; when they appear in hordes at town meetings to demand more money for the next generation.

Among the elderly are the poor, and we should do whatever we can for them.

Above the poor are those with limited fixed incomes, but most of them can't afford a buck or two a week for the tunnel.

They get lots of medical care for nothing; they're paying little or no income taxes. Too many seniors don't invest in the future.

They figure they are owed something for having survived.

We certainly owe them peace, security, a life of reasonable comfort and a good deal of attention to learn what they have learned over the decades.

But they owe the rest of us, too.

They owe the kids in school who need help; they owe opportunities to the men and women who, unlike the seniors when they were young, cannot find many jobs with only a 10th- or 12th-grade education.

Too often, too many seniors get either scared or selfish and forget that there is supposed to be a generational compact in this country.

Each generation is supposed to help build a future for the next.

Well, that's the theory anyway. Instead, adults whose kids have grown up and no longer seem to care seem to say "We got ours. Too bad for you."

The woman who called me said nothing of this, nor did I ask.

For all I know, she may be one of the most generous, pro-school, pro-tax persons on this earth.

But too many of her counterparts are not.

By whining about the fiscal sacrifices we all must make to clean up the environment, improve schools, strengthen families, jail criminals, police and fix the streets, deliver home care to the elderly, care for the ill and retarded, they are triggering anger among younger folks.

Some young parents have said recently in frustration:

"If you don't want to pay for my kid's education, then I don't want to pay for your Medicaid."

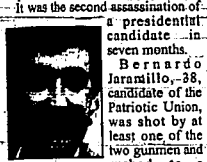

Nation Shots fell Colombia candidate

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Two men armed with machine guns killed a leftist presidential candidate Thursday at Bogota's international airport.

rushed to a nearby clinic where he died from complications caused by wounds to the throat, said Dr. Juan Manuel Uribe. Last year, Jaramillo fled the country for several months after saying he had been threatened with assassination. No group immediately claimed responsibility for the shooting. However, the Patriotic Union has been targeted by Colombian right-wing death squads. Since the party's founding in 1984, 1,044 of its members have been killed.

One of the assailants opened fire on Jaramillo as he walked into the airport to board a domestic flight, one of his bodyguards said. The candidate was reportedly leaving for a three-day vacation on Colombia's northern coast. Jaramillo was shot twice in the throat and twice in the abdomen, a statement read by Uribe said.

Party agrees to discuss bid for coalition

EAST BERLIN (AP) — In a move that could speed formation of East Germany's first non-Communist government, the Social Democrats agreed Thursday to discuss joining a coalition government with an alliance that won national elections.

The left-leaning party, which finished second in Sunday's balloting to the Alliance for Germany, refused to work with a right-wing party in the three-party Alliance. Alliance leaders left the door open to such an arrangement. A two-thirds majority in the new Parliament is needed to approve unification with West Germany, and the Alliance needs the votes of the Social Democrats to achieve that majority.

The Social Democrats favor a more gradual path toward unification with West Germany than the Alliance, and earlier in the week it rejected an invitation to discuss forming a broad coalition.

But on Thursday, the party said it decided to hold exploratory talks "in view of the serious problems of our country."

German faces charges in deal for Libya plant

BONN, West Germany (AP) — A West German businessman on Thursday was indicted on charges he helped build a Libyan plant, which the United States says produced chemical weapons before it was damaged by fire last week.

Juergen Hippenstiel-Imhausen, former head of the Imhausen-Chemie chemical company, was charged with violating West Germany's export laws and with tax evasion.

Also Thursday, a government official said Libya had stopped payments to West German firms and interrupted trade, claiming West German intelligence was involved in the fire. West Germany denied the accusation and issued a formal protest over the suspension of payments.

Mannheim prosecutor Peter Wechsung charged that Hippenstiel-Imhausen had a "decisive role" in the planning and construction of the Rabta complex, about 60 miles outside Tripoli.

Bush: Limit new bank's Soviet loans

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush is counting on the Soviet Union to limit its borrowing from a development bank being proposed to finance a Marshall Plan-type rebuilding of Eastern Europe, administration officials said Thursday.

The administration has said the United States will participate in the \$12 billion European Bank for Reconstruction and Development only if Soviet borrowing is limited to what Moscow contributes in capital and then only for loans to develop private enterprises.

Under Secretary of the Treasury David Mulford said the Soviets are aware of U.S. concerns after meetings between the top finance and banking officials of the two countries here last week.

He said the administration was eagerly awaiting counterproposals from Moscow before an April 8-9 meeting in Paris to put the final touches on chartering the \$12 billion multinational development bank.

FDA expands recall of L-tryptophan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government expanded its recall of L-tryptophan Thursday because of fears that a sometimes fatal blood disorder can be caused even by small doses of the dietary supplement used for insomnia, depression and weight control.

—We are confronted with a major public health problem," Health and Human Services Secretary Louis Sullivan warned in the announcement by the Food and Drug Administration.

L-tryptophan is an amino acid that occurs naturally in some foods that are high in protein, such as milk, beef, turkey and beans. But it is also sold over the counter as a manufactured dietary supplement. It has been linked to a blood disorder called eosinophilia-myalgia syndrome, or EMS.

So far, 1,411 cases of EMS — including 19 deaths — have been reported, the FDA said. Cases have been reported in every state.

U.S. infrastructure problem ahead

WASHINGTON (AP) — America is postponing the day of reckoning with its deteriorating road, bridge and water network, driving the eventual repair price tag even higher, Congress was told Thursday.

While there's little argument it will cost billions of dollars to fix the system, no consensus has been reached on how to raise the money, said the Office of Technology Assessment.

—As a country, we must face the fact that there is no free lunch," said Edith P. Page, the study's project director. "The bad news is, we found no silver bullet."

"The choices are clear," the report said. "All levels of government will have to raise taxes and a variety of fees to pay for public works improvements or they will have to eliminate or reduce services."

U.S. checks Soviet missile transfers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is investigating the possibility that Soviet SS-23 medium-range missiles, banned by a 1987 treaty, may have been illegally transferred to Czechoslovakia, the State Department said Thursday.

The department earlier had disclosed it is looking into the possibility that SS-23 missiles may also have been transferred to the East German armed forces.

Spokesman Richard Boucher said the key question is whether the missiles, if any, were transferred before or after the signing of the Intermediate Nuclear Forces or INF treaty in December 1987.

U.S. alcohol deaths 100,000 yearly

ATLANTA (AP) — Alcohol is responsible for more than 100,000 deaths annually in the United States, stealing 2.7 million years from drinkers' lives, federal health officials reported Thursday.

But while alcohol is a major health concern, more research is needed to determine which drinkers are at how much risk, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control said.

In 1987, the latest year for which projections are available, 105,095 Americans died from alcohol-related causes — either drunken injury or diseases linked to drinking, the CDC said. And when the victims' life expectancy was figured in, alcohol robbed them of more than 2.7 million years of life — or about 26 years each.

Drug can cut risk of 2nd heart attack

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A drug that eases the heart's workload can cut the risk of new cardiac attacks and death by 20 percent in people recovering from heart attacks, according to a major study released Thursday.

The study, conducted in Denmark, found that the drug verapamil, known as a calcium channel blocker, was effective for the 1½ years after a heart attack. Calcium blockers are among several classes of medicines commonly prescribed to relieve high blood pressure.

Whites live longer than blacks, report says

WASHINGTON (AP) — High homicide rates, AIDS, and lack of medical care are continuing to cut short the lives of black Americans, while the health of whites is improving, a government report said Thursday.

White whites can expect to live to the age of 75.5, life expectancy for blacks is 69.5, and for black males it is 65.1, according to the study.

—This concerns us greatly," said Health and Human Services Secretary Louis Sullivan.

"We need to move toward equal health opportunity for our citizens — including the good health information and the family and community support that will help every American make the right choices for health and productive lives," he said.

Healthier living — quitting smoking, using seat belts, reducing violence and eating more nutritious — is the key to improving health, since more than half the causes of premature death are related to

lifestyle, he said. The study, Health United States 1989, is the 17th annual report of the health status of the nation.

Overall, the country improved its infant mortality rate slightly to 9.9 deaths per 1,000 live births in 1988, although this rate still ranks the United States behind 21 other nations and the gap between whites and blacks is widening.

White infants died at the rate of 8.6 per 1,000 live births in 1987, down 0.3 points from 1986. During the same period, the rate for black babies dropped only slightly and at 17.9 per 1,000 births is more than twice as high as for whites.

Dramatic declines in deaths from heart disease, down 33 percent between 1970 and 1987, and stroke, which was cut in half during the period, contributed to the increased longevity of Americans.

But the gains weren't shared equally. The decline was greatest among white men, 35 percent, fol-

lowed by 31 percent for white women, 28 percent for black women and 24 percent for black men. And in 1987, the death rate for stroke was twice, as high among blacks as whites.

Indeed, studies show that regardless of the age, education or marital status of the mother and whether she had early pre-natal care, black women are generally twice as likely to have a low birth-weight baby, a key factor in infant mortality, Sullivan

said. The decline in cigarette smoking is accelerating, Sullivan said. From 1985 to 1988, cigarette sales dropped about 2 percent a year, but decreased 6 percent from 1988 to 1989. However, from 1970 to 1988, lung cancer increased by 31 percent for white women and 25 percent for black women.

In 1987, homicide took the lives of seven times more black males than white males.

Fifth District Judge Daniel C. Hurlbut Jr. ruled in August that a 3-year-old could not testify against Gregory Oliveira, 28, a trial. Hurlbut also barred statements the girl made in two interviews, one because it wasn't videotaped. Hurlbut based this part of his decision on a June state Supreme Court ruling in another case.

In that case, State vs. Wright, the court ruled that a doctor's testimony about statements a girl made to him in an interview was inadmissible. The fact that the interview was not preserved on videotape contributed to the untrustworthy nature of the doctor's statements. The U.S. Supreme Court in January agreed to consider the Wright case, and Hurlbut will wait for that decision before proceeding in the Oliveira case.

Hawkins bean checks distributed to area farmers

FILER - Checks from the Hawkins Co. Ltd. bankruptcy settlement began appearing in mailboxes this week, buoying the spirits of farmers who had at times given up hope of ever seeing their money.

"They're all elated," Carol Nickel said of the farmers who visited her Curry Cafe Wednesday and Thursday. "They were at kind of excited yesterday about going to the bank with their checks."

Over 400 farmers were left holding the empty bag when the Hawkins Co. Ltd. bean warehouse was closed in November 1988

after state inspectors discovered shortages of beans.

The company later filed for bankruptcy and the final details in the case were ironed out Tuesday.

Criminal prosecution is still possible, however, pending an investigation by the Idaho attorney general's office.

Also, civil action against the Idaho Department of Agriculture is possible because some feel that the department was too slow in shutting down the warehouse.

But for now, joy—or at least relief—reigns in Filer.

"They were kind of surprised," Nickel said. "They weren't sure whether they

would get it or not.

Over \$6.5 million was disbursed to growers and other bean owners this week. Much of that money went into the local farm community.

Farmer Steve Bean was eating lunch in the Curry Cafe Thursday. He received payment for 1,644 bags of pinto beans.

He's "happy that it finally got settled," he said.

The \$19 per sack he received was satisfactory, he said, considering that "we felt at one point we may never get paid."

But, he said, the bean market at times has topped \$30 since the warehouse closed.

The long delay put a serious cramp in

farmers' finances, Bean said. Because crops often are used as security on loans, many farmers saw tough times while waiting for their money.

"It's kind of hard to make ends meet when you lose \$60,000," Bean said.

Jim Hurley was at work in his shop Thursday.

He, too, was glad to see the money, even though most of it will go to repay debt.

"For me, it was just to cover what I was short when it happened," he said.

He said many young farmers are in situations similar to his, but older farmers may be able to actually spend a little bit of the money.

House divided at hydropower meeting here

TWIN FALLS - Developers say they can protect and even enhance fish and wildlife habitat around new hydroelectric projects, but Kirk Charlson is not convinced.

"There isn't one of them that has enough money to fix up the fish and wildlife habitat after they've destroyed it," the Buhl resident told two members of the Northwest Power Council Thursday night.

About 60 activists and developers listened as some in the crowd bombarded council members James Goller and Robert Saxvik with sharply divided opinions on the effect of hydropower on fish and wildlife habitat. The testimony came at a special hearing on developers' requests to remove hydroelectric project prohibitions from 10 Idaho sites.

The developers, such as Gene Ralston, a biologist with LDB engineers, insist that hydroelectric development could actually enhance fish and wildlife habitat, though.

Ralston's testimony before the council members was intended to convince them to remove restrictions on Auger Falls so Cogeneration Inc. could build a 43.6 megawatt power plant there.

He outlined a plan in which fish would have improved opportunity to pass through because the annual fluctuations in the plant's bypass channel water level would be less dramatic than in the river presently.

Cassia sheriff announces jail population limit

BURLEY - The Cassia County sheriff has put a population cap on his filled-up jail, and a backlog of people waiting to be admitted is expected to grow.

"We are up against the wall," Sheriff Billy Crystal said. "We have 34 beds and no more room."

The crowding highlights the need for the proposed new joint jail between Cassia and Minidoka counties, Crystal said. He hopes it will encourage people to vote for a bond issue for the jail in May.

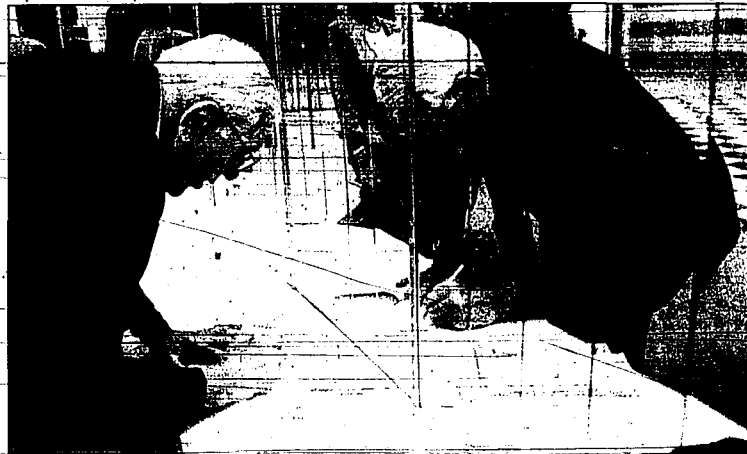
"I would hope it would make people more aware of how acute the problem is," he said.

Crystal said 33 beds were full Wednesday. In the past, Crystal has put makeshift beds on the floor to accommodate prisoners.

Now, offenders sentenced to spending weekends in jail will be waiting two to four months for space.

About five people are waiting now, Crystal said, but that number will increase "dramatically," largely due to a lawsuit against the jail by the American Civil

TWIN FALLS - She won't be offering pink credit cards or shopping bags, but Chris Bonar hopes her new clothing shop will fill more than just The Paris' empty storefront.

Bonar said she does plan to keep Liz Claiborne clothing on hand, for instance. But she also would like to offer Guess, Jeans and a line called Liz Sport that no other store in the area carries, she said.

Bonar said she plans to cater to women ranging from their mid-20s to their mid-50s.

Faulkner introduced Bonar to her new downtown neighbors during the morning gathering and told her he'd be glad to help her out as a consultant.

\$2.35 million bond issue on ballot in Kimberly

KIMBERLY - Voters here will be asked again this spring to approve a \$2.35 million bond issue to build a new middle school.

The school is needed, officials say, to ease overcrowding in the district and plan for future growth.

The school district is asking voters to approve on April 3 a bond issue to build the new school on part of 18 acres northwest of the football field. The cost of the middle school is up from the \$2.2 million the district asked for in a proposal that failed last spring.

Trustee Kent Taylor attributes the increase to higher building costs. Plans for the school have not changed since last year when voters failed to pass a bond issue by just under the required 3-2 margin.

The bond issue would cost a property owner about \$2.04 for every \$1,000 of assessed property value.

"I think this is a really good design and will meet the needs of our school children,"

Barry Watson, a member of a committee backing the project, said Monday at a town meeting. Officials believe the new facility would meet the district's needs for another 10 years.

The proposal spawned much discussion in town. Some of the concerns by those against the proposal don't apply this year, school officials say.

The city has annexed the property into the city limits, eliminating concern over fire protection if it had remained in the county.

The district bought 18.5 shares of Twin Falls Canal Co. water to water the property. Some residents said last year they were concerned about the draw on city water if the school had to use it.

City water will be needed only for drinking fountains, showers and restrooms, school maintenance director Dave Vawser said.

But resident Evelyn Jones, a vocal opponent of last year's proposal, has another reason for opposing the proposal.

"If all of the out-of-district students were

returned to their home district, it would not be necessary to build a new school," Jones said. Out-of-district students do not contribute to the tax base, she added.

The impact of the out-of-district students—about 45 compared with total enrollment of about 730—is minimal, said Jim Wright, member of committee of community residents backing the new school.

Plus, the students still figure into the district's count for purposes of state funds, Wright said.

Resident Maxine McCracken said at the town meeting that Kimberly should build a high school instead. "I say we need a new high school, not a middle school," she said.

The district would need \$5.5 million to build a high school, Wright said, adding that a new middle school would open up seven classrooms in the existing middle school for high school classes.

In 1980, the average number of students in grades K-8 was 65. Now it's 87, Wright said, and total student population has grown by 200 students in the last 10 years.

The middle school expansion will also

allow teachers to maintain less than 25 students per classroom, officials say.

While the number of students in each class may not exceed state standards, Superintendent Richard Bauscher said the district wants to keep a relatively low teacher/student ratio.

Town resident Brenda Grue agreed. "If we want to maintain the quality of our education, we need to look ahead," she said. "I'm very impressed with Kimberly's one-on-one quality of education."

The proposed 39,583-square-foot facility would have a capacity of 325 students. It would have 12 regular classrooms, four special classrooms for science, arts and crafts, music and special education. The building would also have a multi-purpose room.

The school would eliminate all deficiencies a regional accreditation association recently found, Wright said.

Committee member Walt Hess said the library and multi-purpose room, which has

Andrus raps Legislature for 'wild spending spree' this term

BOISE (AP) — Contending the Republican-dominated Idaho Legislature "on the verge of dramatically spending out available revenue," Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus says he is ready to veto funding measures that would leave the state's budget dripping red ink.



"I could well be that there is a strategy developing to force me into a position where I have to play the bad guy and call a halt to a wild spending spree," Andrus said Thursday in remarks prepared for a speech in Nampa.

Republican legislative leaders dismissed the governor's comments as political rhetoric and continued the job of sending him pieces of the \$907 million spending plan for the budget year beginning July 1.

speech Thursday, the House Revenue and Taxation Committee shut down an attempt to triple the state's grocery tax credit to \$45 a person.

"That would have sucked \$24.7 million from the state's coffers."

The Senate-passed plan sponsored by Sen. Rachel Gilbert, R-Boise, a candidate for the GOP nomination to challenge Andrus this year, was defeated 13-5 by the House panel.

Revenue and Taxation Chairman Steve Antone, R-Rupert, said the bill violated the constitutional requirement that all measures raising or lowering state tax revenue begin in the House.

But more importantly, Antone said, the draw on receipts needed to finance continuing state operations eventually would have forced lawmakers to take drastic action.

we'd have to raise some taxes to replace it," he said.

Without mentioning any particular programs he might reject as too costly, the governor said he would not allow the Legislature to leave behind a deficit.

"We will do what has to be done to keep our fiscal house in order," Andrus said. "Don't get me wrong, there are many worthwhile ideas that I would love to be able to afford, but we have to pay the bills."

Also still alive in the Senate is a House-passed plan to draw \$12.5 million from the

Budget Reserve Account, which stands to gain \$38 million from surplus cash on July 1.

That proposal would allocate the money to counties and highway districts to begin addressing some of the state's estimated \$7.3 billion in highway and bridge debt.

It has been languishing on the calendar for final action there all week, and prospects for its approval once on the floor are uncertain as lawmakers look toward adjournment in a few days.

Senate panel chairman claims 'God's law' supersedes man's

BOISE (AP) — A Boise woman says the wall between church and state is crumbling like the one in Berlin after receiving a letter from Idaho Senate State Affairs Committee Chairman Mark G. Ricks.

Betty Foster based her claim on a letter she received last week from the Rexburg Republican. Ricks is a Mormon who has served as a bishop, stake president and regional representative in his church.

The LDS church opposes abortion except to spare a mother's life or in the case of rape or incest.

Ricks said when it comes to questions of morality, he intends to follow "God's law" as much as his constitution.

"I would say that everybody in that chamber votes their religious

convictions on issues and I don't care what religion they belong to," Ricks said. "I feel like God's law takes precedence over man-made law when it comes to talking about divine or eternal salvation."

Foster, who is a member of the pro-choice coalition Freedom Means Choice, wrote Ricks when his committee was considering the proposed abortion ban. Ricks supported the committee's decision last week by a 7-0 vote to send the bill to the Senate for a full vote.

"I was surprised—and I felt a bit offended," Foster said. "I think I felt offended by the tone of the letter itself and the religious overtones."

A copy of Ricks' letter obtained by the Lewiston Morning Tribune included the following statements:

"If you are familiar with Biblical

history, you know what happened to me and my previous generation. You know the penalty for murder.

"Legalized abortion is telling society that it is perfectly alright to promote promiscuity and permissive sex."

"Well, I have a different view. I believe in a higher law given to mankind long ago which if not obeyed will bring about the judgements of God."

"I also invite you to think about the future economy of this nation. Who will support the aged, buy their homes, autos, refrigerators and pay the high social security premiums?"

"I dread to think about the future solvency of this nation if we keep restricting the birth of new generations."

Federal judge dismisses claims of polygamist group

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A federal judge has dismissed claims by the leaders of a polygamist community that a dissident group had engaged in malicious prosecution and other legal abuses.

U.S. District Chief Judge Bruce S. Jenkins on Thursday told attorneys for United Effort Plan of Hildale, Utah, and Colorado City, Ariz., that their motions were premature.

About three dozen residents of the twin towns filed suit two years ago in an attempt to dissolve the United Effort Plan, which owns most of the property in the communities founded by polygamists in the 1920s.

The dissidents contend that community leaders violated the principle of separation of church and state. They want the United Effort Plan dissolved and its assets distributed to residents.

Raymond Scott Berry, an attorney representing the plan, argued that the counterclaims were valid and remarked: "What we've got here is a religious quarrel being carried on in this courtroom."

But Jenkins agreed with lawyers Jeffrey Swinton and Nicholas Hales that the counterclaims were inappropriate. The judge said some of Berry's concerns could be addressed later through different procedures.

4 Republican state officeholders jointly declare 1990 campaigns

BOISE (AP) — Citing their achievements for the citizens of Idaho, four elected state officers on Thursday officially declared their Republican re-election campaigns.

Incumbent state Treasurer Lydia Justice Edwards, Lt. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter and Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans addressed a Statehouse audience including their staffs and families.

Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa was in eastern Idaho and could not attend the Boise press conference.

"We're going to campaign together, we're going to work together and we'll be re-elected together," Evans said.

The last question mark in the state contests was expected to be erased Monday when Democratic Auditor J.D. Williams announces his intentions in Boise and Teton.

Eldon Goughly of Preston and Richard Williams of Shelley are competing for the GOP nomination to battle Williams.

One Republican leader, meanwhile, has dropped out of the chase for governor. Former White House aide Larry Eastland of Boise announced Wednesday he would not seek the nomination to face Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus this fall, citing business and personal reasons.

Last week, Boise Sen. Rachel Gilbert declared her contention for the governor's seat, joining fellow Republicans Roger Fairchild from Fruitland and Boise businessman Milton Erhart. Andrus announced his candidacy this week.

A Boise businessman, Eastland said that, as state Republican treasurer, he would be backing the GOP in its 1990 campaigns.

Eastland worked on the staff of former Idaho Sen. Len B. Jordan, and also was a consultant for Richard Nixon and staff assistant for Gerald Ford.

Mrs. Edwards said her office has made \$1 million in extra earnings

for the state in her first term, despite having to petition U.S. Treasurer James Baker to change laws to allow all state treasurers more leeway in garnering income.

"For this year alone, we contributed a record of over \$22 million in interest earnings to the general account with earnings of over \$12 million on the investments for local units of government," she said. She served 4½ years in the Idaho House from Valley County and as a delegate to three Republican national conventions.

After serving as a principal in Cascade and deputy state superintendent, Evans gained his current post in 1978, then won two re-election bids.

When I first took office, we struggled with having to implement the 1 percent property tax initiative that eventually stifled school support from the local property taxes onto the state's general account," he said.

Utah cheese plant recovering from fire

AMALGA, Utah (AP) — Two weeks after a devastating fire by the Cache Valley Cheese Plant, most of the 300 employees are back to work and up to 500,000 pounds of cheese are being produced daily.

Plant Manager Rex Gleason said the building has been completely cleaned up of the toxic chemicals released in a March 8 fire that destroyed the plant's packing materials warehouse, general offices and a small retail outlet.

Fire officials said a torch being used by employees to dismantle an old tank started the fire which caused more than \$2 million in damage.

Gleason said packaging of cheese began over the weekend and cheese production started Sunday night.

He said the plant began receiving milk from local dairy producers on Monday.

Carpenters still are making repairs on the areas not lost to flames, and Gleason said construction work will probably be started soon.

The Amalga plant is headquarters for the cheese division for Western Dairyman Cooperative Inc. Vice-President Doug Larson said about 865,000 pounds of cheese were lost in the blaze.

However, he said the loss is not

expected to have any effect on the price or availability of cheese on the market place.

"Local consumers should not feel any financial pinch from the cheese loss and neither should co-op members because the plant has very adequate insurance which covers business interruptions, property and product," Larson said.

Joel Hoyt, director of Environmental Health for the Bear River District Health Department,

said hazardous chemicals at the plant had been cleaned up by Saturday.

The fire burned chemicals used regularly as cleaning supplies or for cheese-making, and as a precaution about 100 residents were evacuated the day of the fire.

Hoyt said one nearby dairy dumped a tank of milk just to be safe, but water contaminated during the fire was contained before any flowed into the Bear River.

Top money team costs record \$21 million

NEW YORK — The most expensive lineup in baseball costs a record \$21 million this year, up almost \$2 million from last year and \$6 million more than the best team in the game.

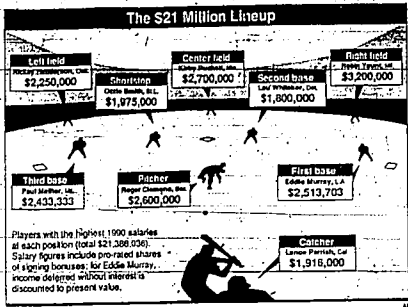
Eight of the nine starters have changed on the top-money team in the last year, a reflection of the big salary push in the offseason.

Gone are Orel Hershiser, Cal Ripken and Andre Dawson. In are Roger Clemens, Kirby Puckett and Rickey Henderson.

The increase on the best team in baseball was even sharper. The nine players on the 1988 Associated-Press All-Star team made \$11,916,667. The AP All-Stars will cost \$15,913,333 this year, a 29 percent rise.

In all, a record 153 players will make \$1 million or more this season, according to contract details obtained from player and management sources. A record 27 players will make \$2 million, topped by Milwaukee's Robin Yount at \$3.2 million.

millionaires with 11, followed by the Kansas City Royals with 10. The Baltimore Orioles, Cleveland Indians, Minnesota Twins and Seattle Mariners have the fewest with two each.

Kirby Puckett of Minnesota, who gets \$2.7 million this season, is the only player to make both the AP All-Star team and the all-money team.

Clemens of Boston (\$2.6 million) will be the top-paid pitcher in baseball this year while Bret Saberhagen of Kansas City (\$1.4 million) is the 1989 AP All-Star. Lance Parrish of California is the highest-paid catcher

(\$1,916,000) while Baltimore catcher Mickey Tetleton is the lowest-paid player on the AP All-Stars at \$750,000.

Eddie Murray of Los Angeles (\$2,513,703) is the highest-paid first baseman, just ahead of AP All-Star Will Clark, who will get \$2.25 million from the San Francisco Giants.

Lou Whitaker of Detroit is the highest-paid second baseman (\$1.8 million), while Ryne Sandberg of the Chicago Cubs (\$1.55 million) is the AP All-Star. Ozzie Smith of St. Louis (\$1,975 million) replaced AP All-Star Ripken of Baltimore (\$1,366,667) as the highest-paid shortstop.

Paul Molitor of Milwaukee (\$2,433,333) was the highest-paid third baseman while Howard Johnson of the Mets (\$1,666,667) was the All-Star.

Joining Puckett in the outfield on the most expensive team were Yount (\$3.2 million) and Oakland's Henderson (\$2.25 million). On the AP All-Stars, Puckett was joined by Kevin Mitchell of San Francisco (\$2,083,000) and Ruben Sierra of Texas (\$1,625,000).

NFL clears 22 juniors to enter April draft

NEW YORK (AP) — The NFL officially got its largest-ever infusion of underclass talent Thursday when 22 juniors were cleared to enter the April 22 draft, turning into one of the deepest in a decade.

The list is made up primarily of skill players — seven are running backs and four are quarterbacks — and contains perhaps ten who could be first-round choices.

But it includes only one offensive lineman and one defensive lineman — defensive tackle Matt Spindler of Pitt, a likely first-round pick, and Alabama tackle Danny Cash. Players at those positions normally mature later.

The list got larger, NFL spokesman Jim Jefferson said, after additional applications were being processed beyond the 5 p.m. EST deadline.

"I don't like the idea of admitting underclassmen, but I have to admit that it makes the draft a lot deeper," said George Young, general manager of the New York Giants.

"A lot of these guys sit first and second round picks, so it means that when you get to the fourth round, you're liable to get a pretty good player because of the seniors who will be pushed back."

The influx results from the Feb. 16 decision by Commissioner Paul Tagliabue to allow into the draft any player who entered college in the fall of 1987. Thursday was the date by which they had to notify the league and renounce their college eligibility.

Ruined environment legacy of Stalin in E. Europe

COPSA MICA, Romania (AP) — Every building, street, leaf or scrap of earth in this town of 10,000 is black, shrouded in the soot of some of Eastern Europe's worst pollution.

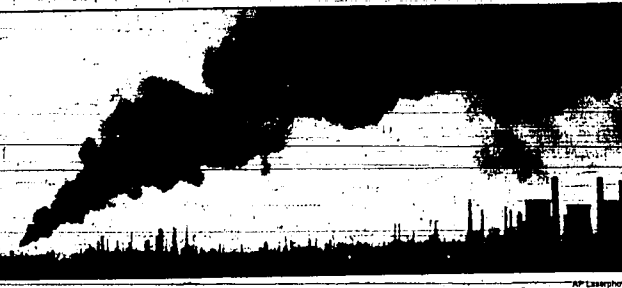
Each year, Copșa Mică's two factories spew out about 30,000 tons of pollutants. Some of it is soot from a factory that puts dye in rubber. Some is dust from a plant for nonferrous metals.

Everybody has known for years it was bad to live here, but under the dictatorship of Nicolae Ceausescu, nobody dared say so.

Residents say the pollution problem was acknowledged only when Ceausescu's son, Nicolae, visited the town for two days in 1987 and the factories were shut down.

The situation in Copșa Mică is in some ways typical of industrial areas in other Eastern European countries, where Communist governments eager for industrial development ignored environmental damage.

"Now, millions of people in East Germany, Poland, Czechoslovakia and Hungary now have freedoms to expose one of the legacies of Stalinism: destruction of the environment in economies run by decree rather than logic."

about last fall's revolt in East Germany, home of some of central Europe's dirtiest industrial towns.

In Bulgaria, in 1988, it was environmental dissent and a government crackdown on it that sowed the seeds of today's broader opposition to the Communists.

In Hungary, Poland and the Soviet Union, environmental awareness helped stir political reforms that in turn have heightened public consciousness of pollution. It is a touchstone issue in traditionally peasant countries whose folklore values the peasant customs, forests, lakes and clean air, that vanished under communism.

Despite the East's growing environmental awareness, the cost of cleaning up the mess, lack of international cooperation and a threat of unemployment mean that any improvement will take decades.

On the international scale, costs are far higher. A recent study by the International Institute for Applied Systems Analysis near Vienna estimated that \$18 billion a year would be needed to "cut by 50 percent the sulfurous emissions eating at Europe's forests."

Even that huge investment won't arrest the acidification of Europe's soils unless the money is used to curb the air pollution from its chief sources in Eastern Europe, the institute's experts say.

Yet cross-border cooperation is hard to achieve. Czechoslovakia and Hungary, for instance, still cannot decide the fate of a giant, half-completed plan to dam and re-channel the Danube river for hydroelectric plants. But both countries now agree potential energy gains should be weighed against possible lasting damage to land and wildlife.

While governments seem to fear losing the huge sums already spent on projects such as the Danube dam, workers worry about losing their livelihood if industries are closed. While new wealth may help curb some existing pollution, it could create new environmental damage.

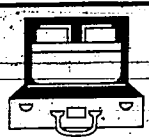

After a string of seven successive Bermuda Bowl World Championship titles, the U.S. team led by an inspired Brazilian team. Acclaimed as worthy champions, the Brazilians were described as giving a mind-blowing exhibition of exceptional bidding, declarer play and defense. Even so, as in today's slam, it never hurts to get a little lucky.

When the hand was first played, the U.S. was in six clubs, going down when South lost a club and a diamond. When the Brazilians declared, South could't open a club because of their system. Given what he thought was a choice at the six-level, North preferred diamonds over clubs, and Brazil played the slam in the lustering diamond suit.

Not to worry. West led a most helpful club 10 to remove the guess in that suit. A spade was led to dummy's ace, and the diamond queen was pushed through for a winner. When the lead of the diamond 10 brought another duck by East, South had a problem. Should he play East for K-J-x-x and duck, or should he take his chance and shoot the queen. The latter for a huge swing, the ace dropped West's jack. East got this diamond king-10 declarer-and held the rest. An exciting hand, worth 16 IMPs to Brazil.

Brazil's well-earned victory was a popular one, especially since playing team mainly used standard bidding methods as opposed to those highly artificial ones of recent vintage.

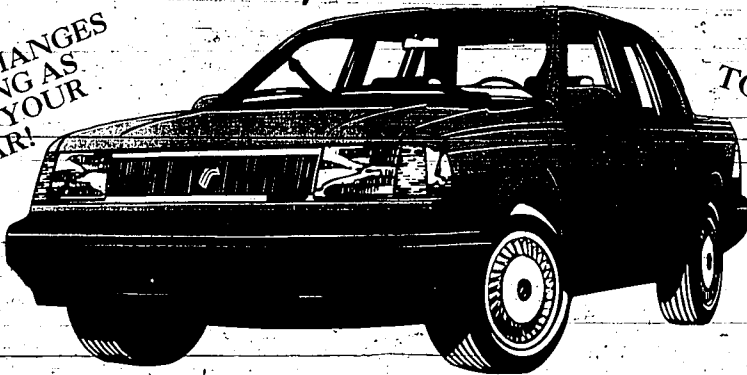

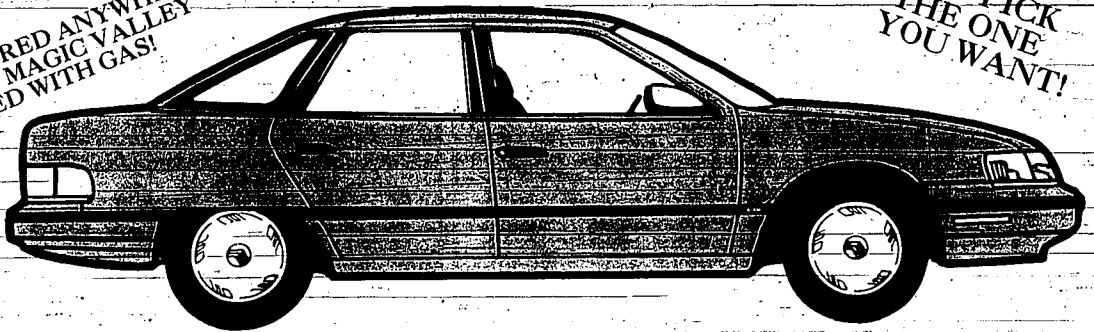

Baxter Black will appear in Gooding

GOODING - Cowboy humorist Baxter Black left his veterinary practice in Grandview 10 years ago to travel around the United States and Canada, reciting his poetry and embellished true stories.

"I wasn't very good yet in the first place," he said in a recent telephone call from his Colorado home. "Probably the luckiest people are the animals I don't treat anymore."

Black was already making a name for himself by the time he went to the first Cowboy Poetry Gathering in Elko in 1985. Since then, he has become one of the country's most celebrated stars of Western humor.

"I like to think I'd have been just as suc-

Successful if there hadn't been a cowboy poetry craze, but maybe I wouldn't have," Black said. "So whatever it's done, it's been good for me, too, and I hope it continues. But if it doesn't, it was a wonderful interlude."

Black is the author of eight books, includ-

ing "Croulons on a Cowboy" that have together sold more than 100,000 copies. He also has recorded four cassettes of his poetry and humor that together have sold more than 30,000 copies.

Black is the author of "On the edge of Common Sense," which appears weekly in more than 90 publications in the United States and Canada making him the most widely syndicated agricultural columnist in America. As a banquet speaker, he has appeared in 43 states and five Canadian Provinces in the last nine years, averaging 100 speaking engagements per year.

Black's appearances on television include "The Tonight Show," "The Will Shriner Show," "The Nashville Network," "PBS Specials" and a variety of local programs around the country. He also has been on numerous radio.

BSU's cold-drill includes Idaho computer game

BOISE - Idaho can finally claim its very own home computer game, and it has something to offer just about everybody.

"MacSpud!" is the creation of 29-year-old Boisean Robert Carr. It's included in the latest edition of Boise State University's cold-drill literary magazine or may be ordered separately.

From a Take-Pride-in-Idaho perspective, "MacSpud!" is a MacDud. It revels in dwelling on Idaho's poor self-image, poking bad-natured fun at everything from the Aryan Nations to mutilated animals to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

But Carr and Tom Trusky, a BSU professor and cold-drill adviser, say "MacSpud!" offers an alternative to the zealousness of Idaho's Centennial celebration.

"People are so caught up in the Centennial," says Carr. "I just kind of wanted to toss a wet blanket in their direction." Trusky says "MacSpud!" is counterbalanced by a lot of "sweet and nostalgic" elements in the Centennial edition of cold-drill. "But there's more to Idaho than just that kind of sentimentality," he says.

"I wanted a computer game in the magazine real bad," says Trusky, who asked Carr to design the game. Trusky suggested that the game be an adventure, "but everything else is out of Robert's weird head," he adds.

"I'm not that much of a cyberpunk myself," says Trusky. "But Bob definitely is." "MacSpud!" is set in the not-too-distant future, after a major portion of the world's oil reserves have been destroyed during the "Silly War," a limited nuclear exchange between South Yemen and Liechtenstein.

Idaho stands to boom when it's discovered that ethanol made cheaply from potatoes could be the fuel of the future. But Idaho, "MacSpud!" style, is portrayed as a bleak wasteland. Food shortages and high unemployment have led to lawlessness.

No one is in more danger than the "spud-girls" and "spud-girls," who pilot tons of tubers to the processing plant in Armored Potato Transport Vehicles. "On a daily basis, they must convey their precious cargo across a blasted landscape filled with a multitude of dangers," players - who take the part of drivers - are warned.

The perils include marauding Aryan Yuppies, mutant jackalopes (the result of

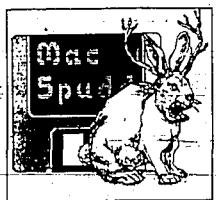

But Baxter remains a humble country boy, unpretentious and unimpressed with the bright lights of stardom.

"I'd rather do a night in Bliss than the Johnny Carson show," he said frankly. "The Johnny Carson show is nice, but it's not real. It's Hollywood and it's a business there."

Black said he is much more at home with country people who live in the world of livestock and land.

"They're just my kind of folks," he said. "The feeling I have with those kind of people is the reason I do what I do. It's not like Hollywood and it's not like Nashville."

A native of New Mexico, Black confesses "Are you a cowboy?" to be a very philosophical question, one that has no easy answer.

"Cowboy" is really more of a verb," he explained. "When a man says, 'I cowboy,' we know what he's talking about. He's got a job where he's doing a little horse work and chasing the cows around."

Black said he has been asked this question so many times by so many different kinds of people that he finally put his answer into this poem:

"Let me ask: Are you a cowboy?
I kind of consider the source."
Is it someone who thinks I am
flush and is trying to sell me a horse?
Or a downtown type in tennis shoes who is skeptical but courte-

has beaten out Harvard University and Sarah Lawrence College in past years.

"One reason we do so well is our format sets us apart from 99 percent of the other magazines," says advisor Tom Trusky, who founded cold-drill in 1970. The box format allows cold-drill's staff to include just about anything the imagination can muster.

The magazine takes its name from a mining tool used to reveal major veins of precious stones inaccessible by conventional modes of excavation. In the past, cold-drill has presented such unusual literary items as scratch-and-sniff poems, cassettes, jigsaw puzzles, 3-D comics and postcards.

Trusky says he and his staff of 20 students were all out for the 1990 edition. "The magazine is a birthday party," he explains. "It's very festive and fun." Its wrapper folds into a party hat, and confetti falls into the reader's lap when the magazine is opened.

The 1990 regular edition sells for \$6.95 and includes six poems, essays, short stories, a 3-D Boise Pop-

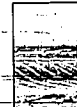

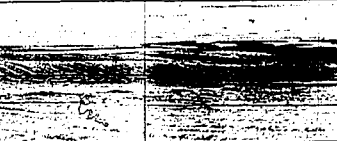

"I moved to Idaho to be closer to wilderness," notes the photographer. "But more and more, those opportunities have become distant. I started out making panoramic photographs of

Wilderness and man's works mingle in Boles' photographs natural beauty in the Ansel Adams tradition, but the work evolved into trying to make a contribution to environmental protection."

"The last 10 years have been a disaster for the environment. How we treat the land reflects how we treat each other. I feel we have only one earth, and we'd better start taking care of it."

This commitment has even affected the materials Boles uses for his work. Recognizing that photography uses a lot of water, he switched to photography papers that required less water to wash.

Boles is a lecturer in photography at the College of Idaho, where he has taught since 1983. He is also a self-employed photographer and, in early career, worked as a photojournalist and photo department head at the Idaho Press-Tribune in Nampa-Caldwell.

Boles makes his panoramic images by photographing scenes in

relationship to photography as "something good to do while I was trying to decide what I was going to be when I grew up."

"The medium is the most responsible to what I want to express. There are so many avenues in photography. I never can do anything I'd like to do."

His experimental work has included astro-photography, pin-hole cameras and camera-less imagery. Recently, he was awarded a National Endowment for the Humanities grant to study photographic history. In 1987, he illustrated the literary work "Marking the Magic Circle," by fellow College of Idaho alumnus George Vonn of La Grande, Ore. This book in 1988 received a special award from the Oregon Institute of Literary Arts.

Boles' works have been published nationally and exhibited internationally. He is one of the artists selected for the upcoming Idaho Centennial Biennial at the Boise Gallery of Art.

He lives in Caldwell with his wife Anni Marie, formerly of Hansen, who is Arts Education Coordinator at the Idaho Commission on the Arts.

Idaho Power reminds farm workers:



Watch where you're going!

Watch out for power lines.

They're deadly. The deadliest you're likely to work around carry about 69,000 volts of electricity. That's enough to light up a city of 5,000. Or kill a careless farm worker.

True, you can't be looking up for them all the time, so here are some simple safety rules to remember whether or not you're near a line.

Don't climb power poles.

Two things can happen to you up there. One, you can fall off. Two,

you can touch a wire. Neither is good, but you're more likely to survive the fall.

Don't raise pipe on end.

Carry all irrigation and other pipe parallel to the ground. Raising it on end could cause it to hit a power line which could lead to electrocution.

Look up before elevating equipment.

Check overhead before elevating augers and other equipment to make

sure no power lines are around. Like pipe, they're good conductors.

Don't move a conveyor or stucker when it's elevated.

You might pull it into a power line, and the consequences could be fatal.

In general, be as careful around power lines as you would be around any farm equipment. If not, you could be in for the shock of your life.

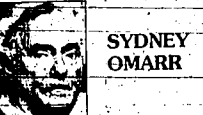

'Left Foot': Difficult material made riveting

Once in a thousand screenplays, a reviewer encounters an actor so attuned to the character he is playing that it becomes a transcending experience.

Such is the case with Daniel Day-Lewis in "My Left Foot." He enacts the late writer-artist Christy Brown, under constraints that would send most journeyman actors dithering back to drama school.

Christy Brown was the victim of the cruel disease cerebral palsy, his gifted mind captive in a body jolting as if subjected to electric shocks.

His speech was almost unintelligible, his limbs useless except for his left foot.

If Brown's saga seems forbidding material for a movie, dismiss the notion. Under the inspired direction of Jim Sheridan and with Day-Lewis' devastating portrayal, "My Left Foot" becomes riveting drama. And it's not all grim. Brown possessed a wicked, surprising sense of humor.

The story is told in retrospect.

with the adult Christy in a mansion drawing room, waiting to appear at a charity affair. He is watched over by a nurse (Ruth McCabe). As she probes through his autobiographical book, he taunts her. The tension between them is palpable (she later became his wife).

Christy's anguished life is told in flashbacks. As a boy (young Hugh O'Connor in a brilliant portrayal), he spends most of his time crouching under the staircase, loved but ignored by his large, impoverished family.

Then one magical day, Christy grasps a piece of chalk between his left toes and painfully writes "Mother" on the stone floor.

His brothers and sisters realize he is no half-wit, and they defend him from the taunts of neighborhood kids; His bricklayer father (the late Ray McAnally) despairs, but never his mother (Brenda Fricker).

She seeks ways to liberate his mind and finds help from a therapist (Fiona Shaw) with whom he becomes enamored.

Day-Lewis' Christy is a rumbling volcano, always on the brink of eruption. There is a frightening scene at a restaurant celebration after his first art exhibit. When he learns that his therapist is engaged to marry, he explodes in a drunken, abusive rage, pulling the cloth and everything on it off the table with his teeth.

Sheridan wrote the screenplay with Shane Connaughton, and it is a

model of concision, maximizing the drama without excessive sentimentality. McAnally and Fricker are towers of strength as Christy's parents. But it is Daniel Day-Lewis who makes "My Left Foot" a triumphal expression of the human spirit.

Produced by Noel Pearson and released by Miramax Films, "My Left Foot" is rated R for language. Running time: 98 minutes.

Day-Lewis' career brief but brilliant

MONTREAL — On the matter of awards for actors, Daniel Day-Lewis admits he likes to watch them, "but only as a fly on the wall."

That may change Monday when the Academy Awards are handed out at the Los Angeles Music Center. Day-Lewis was acclaimed best actor in September at the Montreal World Film Festival and received raves from critics at the New York Film Festival for his absolutely stunning performance in the Dublin-made "My Left Foot."

Strange title, right? Of course you can't learn from the ads ("a story about life, laughter, and the occasional miracle") what the film is about. What it's about is Christy Brown, the Irish cerebral palsy victim who managed to become an acclaimed writer and artist although he was, virtually, mute and could express himself only with his left foot. Day-Lewis' performance is no more downbeat than Marlee Matlin's in "Children of a Lesser God," which also dealt with a handicap. The actor captures all the rage, frustration, yearning and devilish humor of Christy Brown despite the physical limitations. But then, filmmakers have learned to expect the unexpected from Day-Lewis in his brief film career.

Consider these roles: the blond gay punk of "My Beautiful Laundrette," the griggish slick-haired suitor in "Room With a View," the lascivious Czelet surgeon in "The Unbearable Lightness of Being."

He manages to submerge his own persona in each role, and it was a surprise to find him at the Montreal festival a darkly handsome, soft-spoken Englishman with a headband holding back his long hair. His outfit was highlighted by a pair of pajama-like pants with polka dots.

Interviewing Day-Lewis is a challenge. His replies are punctuated with thoughtful pauses, the struggles to say exactly what he means. He admitted his early ambivalence about undertaking the portrayal of Brown.

"I didn't think that I could do it, but I had a strong impulse to take it on. Beyond that, I didn't really mind if I didn't do it. I was very happy that it had given me the desire to work again, which I had lost some

time before. So it seemed like a gift that had come from nowhere," he said.

After finishing "The Unbearable Lightness of Being," he had been afflicted not by actor's block but with "an unshakable fatigue, which left me without any desire to perform whatsoever." It lasted a year, but he had expected it to last longer.

Writer-director Jim Sheridan's script for "My Left Foot" intrigued Day-Lewis, and the pair spent three months researching in Dublin. The actor devoted much of the time at the Sandymount Clinic observing how children learn to deal with the physical limitations of cerebral palsy. He also was accepted into the Brown family. Christy died in 1981. Meanwhile, producer Noel Pearson sought backing for the \$1.5 million project. Not an easy task, the actor admitted.

"You have to deal with a really immense reluctance and, at worst, a kind of cynical attitude that 'well, this is a kind of cripple picture, which makes me furious,'" he said.

"But, of course, that's what you come up against. Films tend to be financed by people who don't understand the process of filmmaking and have no passion for it. It's very difficult to offer your passion as a justification for making a film."



Oscars ceremony toned down for 1990

HOLLYWOOD — Aside from his home video work, it was surely Rob-Lowe's most inept performance.

Opening the Oscar telecast a year ago, an atonal Lowe and a phony Snow White labored through their own rendition of "Proud Mary." In the background, a dancer bobbed under the weight of a huge head-dress resembling Hollywood's landmark Chinese Theater.

The rest of the show — produced by campmeister Allan Carr — was so rude that when the curtain finally fell, 17 industry figures pounded out an angry note to the Academy of

Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.

Signed by such luminaries as Paul Newman and Gregory Peck, the letter attacked the broadcast as "an embarrassment to both the Academy and the entire motion picture industry," even though it was a ratings hit. Lowe's worst moment came when his sex video was made public. While attending the Democratic National Convention in 1984, he made a videotape of sex involving himself and two young women in his Atlanta hotel room. Claims and counter-claims rebounded, and Lowe agreed to do 20 hours of community service to avoid prosecution for allegedly seducing one of the women, then a 16-year-old. Her mother's suit against Lowe is pending.

Meanwhile, Walt Disney Co. brought a federal trademark infringement suit against the Academy, claiming the Snow White impostor (actress Eileen Bowman) also diluted the character's value. The suit was filed after the Academy refused to apologize for the unusual use of Snow White, and was dropped a week later when the Academy apologized.

Will this year's 62nd annual Academy Awards program on Monday night draw similar catcalls and problems?

Gilbert Cates, the producer of the show, has been hired to make sure the only groans heard in the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion will be made by chair hinges as Oscar guests jump up for standing ovations.

Unlike Carr, who celebrated Hollywood glitz by showcasing young Hollywood "stars" like Matt Lattanzi and Savion Glover in an endless song-and-dance routine, Cates plans to focus this year's program on the global film community.

The broadcast will include satellite feeds from companion Oscar parties in Moscow, Sydney, Aus-

tralia, Tokyo, London and Buenos Aires. Argentinean awards announced in all except Tokyo.

"Each show is a kind of historical document," Cates said after viewing 25 Oscar telecasts to prepare for this year's event. The 1990 show, he decided, should reflect the exploding international market for movies as well as changes sweeping the world. "I hope that we get a sense of the fact that the world is smaller, and by showing the international nature of the film industry that we're all really interdependent on one another," he said.

This year, besides the five nominees for best foreign film, overseas contenders include: "My Left Foot" from Ireland, five nominations, including best picture; Camille Claudel" from France, two nominations including best foreign film; and "Henry V" from England, three nominations including best director.

Video releases could affect award selections

"The first shall be last and the last shall, very likely, be first."

That's the message, as usual, from video suppliers about when the winners and losers of Monday night's Academy Awards will arrive in video stores.

It's common knowledge in Hollywood that movies released in late fall and winter have a better shot at winning an Oscar. They're still fresh in the academy members' minds, while last year's spring and summer releases tend to be dark horses. If you follow this time-honored theory, its semi-logical conclusion, movies that are already in video stores are doomed to failure Monday night, and the further away a video's release date is, the more likely it is to win.

Working from that premise, four titles (those already available on video) haven't got a chance. That means Danny Aiello isn't likely to be rewarded for his supporting performance in Spike Lee's "Do the Right Thing," nor is Lee, who was nominated for best original screenplay. The theory also spells bad news for supporting-actress nominee Dianne Wiest for Ron Howard's "Parenthood," Nora Ephron, nominated for best original screenplay for "When Harry Met Sally ...," and Phil Alden Robinson, nominated for best adapted screenplay for "Field of Dreams," also a best picture nominee.

Because of its Oscar nominations, Touchstone Home Video, perhaps smelling an upset, recently moved up the video release of "Dead Poets Society" to next Wednesday, two days after the ceremonies.

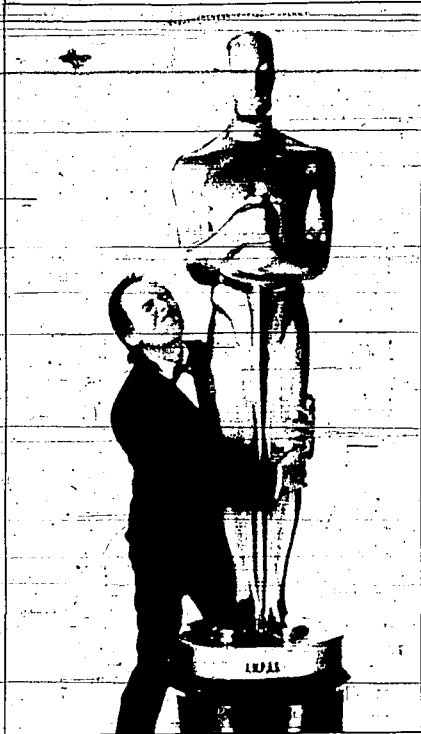

Controversy follows awards — as usual

HOLLYWOOD — Academy Award season wouldn't be complete without a town full of busted egos. This year, is no exception, with acclaimed filmmakers from Spike Lee to Michael Moore grumbling about their Oscar snubs.

Lee, the respective writer-director of "Do the Right Thing," and Moore, who won acclaim for "Roger & Me," have cause for complaint. Lee's film landed on 81 film critics' Top 10 lists, but earned just two nominations, and is not up for best picture. "Roger & Me," the documentary embraced by critics and audiences with equal zeal, was blanketed

completely. "We was robbed," said Lee. "We got jerked out of best director, best film. I think my cinematographer did a great job. . . . I know in my heart that my father, Bill Lee, deserved a nomination for best score."

A bitter Moore said when nominations were revealed that his film "violated two of the principal rules of documentary filmmaking — it was entertaining and people were going to see it."

Director Bruce Beresford's "Driving Miss Daisy" led all films with nine nominations. But Beresford was not named in the best director competition. "Enemies: A Love Story," which opened to rave reviews, earned just

three nominations — and the elaborately produced "Batman" drew just one nomination for art direction. Ed Zwick, the director of "Glory," was bypassed, too. "Glory" also was not named for best picture.

One of the most successful independent movies of the 1980s, "sex, lies and videotape" collected only one nomination for original screenplay.

"My Left Foot" was one of the few films that impressed both the toughest critics and voters in the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences. Among its five nominations was a best supporting actress selection to Brenda Fricker.

It had won the Los Angeles Film

Critics awards, and thought, well, in the film-center of the world, the critics said, you've done something right," Fricker said. "I never crossed my mind for one second I would be nominated." Why the surprises? The Oscars tend to prefer "safe" but "socially relevant" films such as "Born on the Fourth of July" (eight nominations), "Dead Poets Society" (four nominations) and "Glory" (five nominations).

"Drugstore Cowboy," a gritty work about self-indulgent drug addicts on a crime spree, was selected as film of the year by the National Society of Film Critics. Unsafe and scarcely socially conscious, it earned no Oscar nominations.

Stone may grab 2nd Vietnam impact Oscar for 'Born on the Fourth of July'

It's that special time of year again, when the magical spell the movies weave degrades into a sweaty, jostling steeplechase for a little gold statuette. Yes, it's time for "The 62nd Annual Academy Awards Presentation," airing Monday, March 26, on ABC.

Ever ready to do our part in the cause of Oscar prognostication, we dropped by the social club of Lights-Out Louie, the noted gamesman, physical culturist and cineaste. We rapped on the door, and the highly secretive entrepreneur demanded the password. Never unprepared, we sang out confidently, "Sam Peckinpah ate quiche!" and were promptly admitted.

We explained our purpose, and Louie agreed to lend his expertise.

What does the Best Picture situation look like to you? we began. A lot of people think "Born on the Fourth of July" was a powerful, moving film. ...

What a fascinating system! But what about Best Actor? Surely Tom Cruise's performance in "Born on the Fourth of July" ...

Louie shook his head. "I don't think so. There was so much carping about Cruise not being nominated for 'Rain Man' last year that by now half the Academy thinks he won it. Kenneth Branagh won't take it for 'Henry V,' because every extra in a radiator commercial thinks he'd win an Oscar if Shakespeare were his scriptwriter. Robin Williams' part in 'Dead Poets Society' was secondary to that of the students. That leaves

Morgan Freeman in 'Driving Miss Daisy' and Daniel Day Lewis in 'My Left Foot.' I pick Freeman in a squeaker."

We see. And for Best Actress? Louie ticked them off on his fingers. "Scratch Isabelle Adjani for 'Camille Claudel,' Pauline Collins for 'Shirley Valentine' and Jessica Lange for 'Music Box.' That's the word from Lights-Out Louie, oddsmaker to the stars. But before you run out to place that friendly wager, we should warn you that Louie is totally reliable: He has yet to make a single correct Oscar prediction.

New technique splits personalities

There's something funny going on with "The Young and the Restless." Since last August, Jeanne Cooper has been doubling-as Rex's loving wife Kay and as Marge, a lusty dame who is passing herself off as Kay in a kidnapping scam and getting away with it in bed with Rex.

Now audiences don't believe for a second that husband Rex can be that dumb, unable to tell the two women apart. But no one cares because Marge is such a likable character, so creator Bill Bell strings out-the story.

Lately there's a new gimmick. There was Kay meeting Marge, touching Marge. Fans were puzzled because this wasn't a split-screen scene. How did Jeanne Cooper do it, playing two women?

What was the trick?

The answer is a technique called Ultra-Mat. Jeanne Cooper plays Kay on an empty stage saying her lines. Then the actress turns around and becomes Marge answering Kay. Backgrounds are inserted later as in animation, taking pains to make sure furniture is not more than an inch off. When put together it looks like one scene. Magic! Jeanne Cooper in two places at once without any telltale lines in between.

Trouper Jeanne laughs. "I'm out on this empty stage talking to myself. Then, slash, I play somebody else. It's a bit confusing, making the quick change. I forget who the hell I am. But I won't play one character one day and a different one the next. We don't have the time. Besides, it keeps me on my toes. It's something new, darling. I'm like a child with a new toy. And since it's experimental, everybody is caught up with the work. "Now this is a team, how wonderful, I tell the gang."

Cooper is also working her tail off as Kay/Marge. On one Ultra-Mat day she was in the studio at 6 a.m. and home by midnight. "Listen," Jeanne says. "I admire the Roger Rabbit guy (Bob Hoskins) talking to that animation. It's long, tiring work. He should get 10 awards."

Better yet, audience reaction — viewer letters and people on the street — is very high on the

impulsive, hearty Marge. According to the actress, fans hope Marge won't do anything really stupid so she ends up behind bars.

Cooper has been told boss Bell is so pleased by the response to Marge he is mulling over long-range plans. You don't kill off a red-hot character.

That's fine by Jeanne Cooper. If Kay has a heart attack, she can fall back on Marge. As for husband Rex, fans just shake their heads. Is he that dumb or just another errant husband who will hop in the sack the moment the missus' back is turned?

Veteran actress Betulah Quo, who TV miniseries fans may remember as the empress of China in "Marco Polo," has been honored by the

Association of Asian-Pacific American Artists. Currently Ms. Quo is seen on "General Hospital" as Olin, Ana Devane's housekeeper. Ms. Quo has been very active in theater companies in the Los Angeles area which work with new Asia-American playwrights.

Miniseries forces recall of nightmare

BOSTON (AP) — Ted Landsmark can't forget the bloody anti-busing riots of the 1970s any more than people can forget the Pulitzer Prize-winning photograph taken of him under attack outside City Hall by angry whites wielding an American flag.

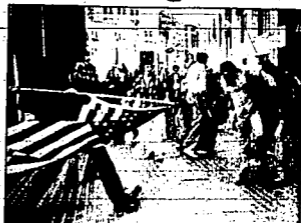
But after previewing a television re-creation of the nightmare, the young, black attorney and others are asking: How well have we remembered?

A brief silence spread over the audience after a private screening Monday of "Common Ground," based on the best-selling book by Anthony Lukas. The docudrama will be broadcast Sunday and Tuesday on CBS-TV.

The group of about 60 people sat quietly, perhaps fatigued by the 192-minute Hollywood re-creation of the racial drama that tore this city apart 15 years ago.

Then the talk started. The voices — many still bitter — belonged to the people who inhabit "Common Ground," the story of three families caught up in the riots that broke out when black students were bused into the white neighborhood of Charlestown.

"I don't think anyone views this as pure entertainment ... but it could be an opportunity for the community to

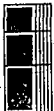
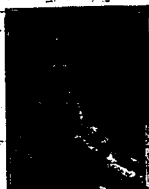

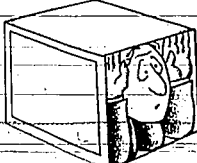

22nd consecutive week of winning the ratings. CBS was in second place with 11.7, edging out ABC, which finished with 11.5. Each ratings point represents 921,000 homes.

It was the second time in three weeks that CBS finished No. 2, the network pointed out.

"The Simpsons," Fox Network's cartoon family, finished 11th in the ratings with a 17.5 and won against the first half-hour of a new episode of CBS' "Murder, She Wrote." It was the highest ranking ever for a regularly scheduled Fox show.

Here are the Top 10 shows, their networks and ratings: "Cheers," NBC, 22.1; "America's Funniest Home Videos," ABC, 22.0; "Roseanne," ABC, 21.9; "The Cosby Show," NBC, 21.8; "60 Minutes," CBS, 20.4; "A Different World," NBC, 20.3; "CBS Sunday Movie —

Gunsmoke: The Last Apache," CBS, 19.7; tied with "The Wonder Years," ABC, 19.7; "Who's the Boss," ABC, 18.1; "In-the-Heat-of-the-Night," CBS, 17.9.

ABC's "World News Tonight" was first in the news show average ratings for the 10th week in a row, with 10.6, followed by "NBC Nightly News" with 9.2 and the "CBS Evening News" with 9.1.

Jane Pauley's NBC News special, "Changes," was ranked a respectable 32nd, tied with "Hunter" for a 13.2 rating. A repeat of "The Karen Carpenter Story," CBS' much-advertised effort to counter the Pauley show, was in 50th place with "Anything But Love" and a 10.8 rating.

While Marshal Dillon did well, "Kojak" on ABC came in 75th for the Saturday night "ABC Mystery Movie."
