## Andrus 'agonizing over' parts of abortion bill

BOISE — Gov. Cecil Andrus reiterated his pro-life beliefs Thursday, but said he is "agonizing over" certain portions of an anti-abortion bill awaiting his action.

Abortion rights activists are encouraged. Anti-abortion forces admit the news "doesn't bode well."

"Have you personally read HB625 as amended?" Andrus asked reporters Thursday morning. It was the first time the governor broke his silence on the specifics of the bill.

"If you had read it, you would understand my concern," the governor said. "There are definitions in there that narrow it up and I'm looking at that. I'm agonizing over it. My views, being pro-life, have not changed."

Drafted with the help of The National Right to Life Committee and endorsed by the Idaho Legislature, House Bill 625 would

ban an estimated 93 percent to 98 percent of the abortions currently performed in Idaho. Andrus has promised to act on the bill by Saturday.

If he allows it to become law, Idaho will have the toughest abortion statute of any state and will take the lead in challenging the U.S. Supreme Court's 1973 Roe vs. Wade decision legalizing abortion.

The bill prohibits abortion as a method of birth control, but it would allow for abortion in cases of rape, incest, fetal deformity or if

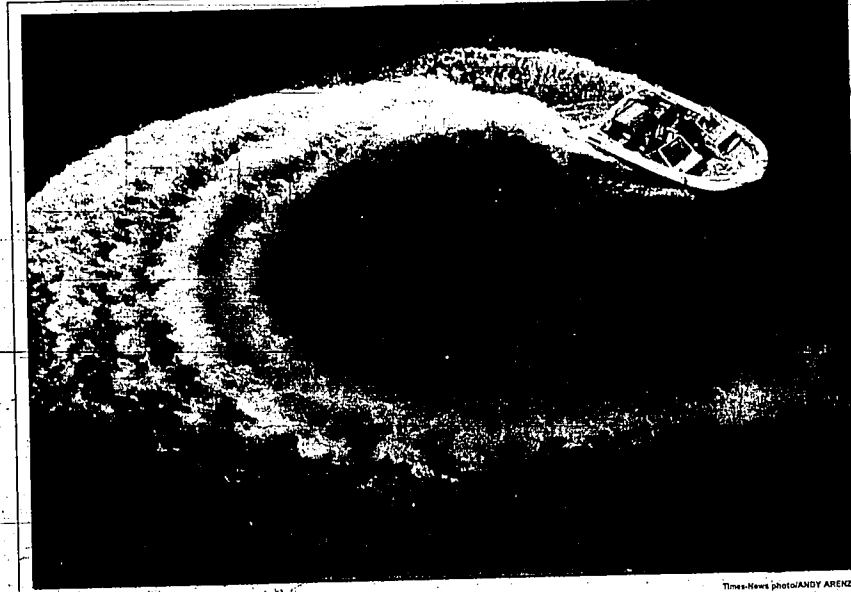
the life of the mother is threatened. When Andrus received HB625 earlier this week, he said he would consult with experts before deciding whether to sign the bill, veto it or let it become law without his signature.

On Wednesday, Andrus revealed that he had spoken more than once with Richard Wilkins, a Brigham Young University law professor who wrote the Missouri Legislature's legal brief in that state's successful battle last year to expand state control over abortions. Even though Wilkins is a pro-life advocate, he has denounced the Idaho bill, especially its rape, incest and health threat provisions.

Wilkins and attorneys for the American Civil Liberties Union insist that HB625 would require a woman to prove that her pregnancy is the result of the rape before she would be able to have a legal abortion.

On Thursday, Andrus indicated he was also troubled by those provisions. "I am concerned that this bill may narrow it to the point where a person, a woman who has suffered rape, incest, the mother's life is in danger, might not even be able to receive an abortion; and basically that's what I'm agonizing over right now," he said.

Jack Van Valkenburgh, legislative coordinator for the American Civil Liberties Union, said: "See ABORTION on Page A2"

## Fishing license, tag prices due to climb

BOISE — The first general increase in fishing license fees in nine years has won legislative approval, along with hikes in the cost of hunting tags to cover big-game depredation losses.

Lawmakers also approved a constitutional amendment to authorize the Fish and Game Commission to make payments in lieu of taxes on land it owns.

As legislators drove toward final adjournment on Thursday, the Senate endorsed the House measures supported by the commission.

The fee increase legislation now goes to Gov. Cecil Andrus while the constitutional amendment will be the only one submitted to voters this November by the 50th Idaho Legislature.

If approved, the commission would begin paying over \$100,000 to counties where it owns some 113,000 acres of land.

While six senators including Sen. Lynn Tominga, R-Rupert, opposed the fee increase bill, there was no

public opposition to the plan. It would raise resident fees for general fishing from \$10 to \$15, and combination fishing and hunting from \$15 to \$20 beginning next year.

"I agree with the fees for fishing," Tominga said.

"But I disagree with the hunting fees going for 'depredation'."

The rest of the Magic Valley senatorial delegation supported the measure.

Youth combination and fishing licenses and senior combination licenses would all be increased \$1 while nonresident fishing licenses will jump \$5 to \$40, all at the same time.

The increase is the first since 1982, and without the \$1.3 million it generates, the Fish and Game Department's campaign to improve Idaho fisheries would grind to a halt.

## Clear Lakes Grade work in limbo for another day

BOISE — Republican leaders in the Idaho House decided late Thursday to rework a bill withdrawing \$12.5 million from the budget surplus account in order to make it possible to give all 44 counties at least minimal help addressing local road and bridge needs.

The reworking means the Bull Clear Lakes Grade project will be in limbo for one more day, but Magic Valley lawmakers are hopeful the measure will pass the House with the \$3 million needed to repair the crumbling route frequented by farm, commercial and school bus traffic.

The momentum was there for the grade late Thursday afternoon when the House and Senate agreed to amendments targeting specific projects in 14 counties rather than allocating the money statewide through the regular highway distribution for-

mula as originally proposed. "It's a good bill and it should pass," said Sen. Joyce McRoberts, R-Twin Falls, who limited her end-of-the-session debate to as few words as possible.

But after hearing debate critical of changes labeled pork-barrel even by the bill's original House sponsor, GOP leaders decided to introduce new legislation Friday maintaining the specific projects but adding \$3 million from the Budget Reserve Account.

The additional money would be distributed through the regular formula to the other 30 counties, said House Speaker Tom Boyd, R-Genesee.

After lawmakers gave up a big to adjourn the session Thursday, it was unclear whether a new bill would be able to clear both chambers of the Legislature today. And even if legislators manage to push the measure

## Iraqi missile officials tried to buy nuclear triggers

WASHINGTON — A missile-development arm of the Iraqi government allegedly tried to buy nuclear-warhead triggers made by a California company, according to a federal indictment unsealed Thursday.

The alleged role of Al-Qaana State Establishment in the scheme to illegally export the electronic triggers was laid out in the indictment against five people and two companies.

Two of the five people named in the indictment, unsealed in San Diego, were arrested in London Wednesday. The three others were identified as Al-Qaana engineers and are believed to be in Iraq, authorities said.

The indictment says that, in discussion with an undercover agent, the Iraqis did not specifically say the triggers would be used to detonate nuclear warheads. But they insisted on design specifications "that left nothing to the imagination," said

triggers being sold to Iraq "is not only illegal, it is a very frightening situation we are dealing with," Customs Commissioner Carol Hallett said.

The indictment, returned last month by a federal grand jury, charges that Euratomic (London) Ltd., and Atlas Equipment (U.K.) Ltd. acted on behalf of the Iraqi government to illegally obtain

John C. Kelley, who directs the U.S. Customs Service's strategic exports unit.

Kelley said the Iraqis also expressed an interest in obtaining other components of timing devices for the warheads.

The prospect of nuclear-warhead

the devices. Mrs. Hallett said Euratomic was a purchasing agent for the Iraqi government and "had done millions of dollars worth of business" in buying arms for Iraq during that country's war with Iran.

The indictment followed an 18-month undercover investigation conducted by U.S. and British customs agents.

The indictment's description of Iraq's alleged role in the scheme contradicts denials by Iraqi officials that their government is seeking to develop a nuclear arsenal.

The indictment said that Ali Ashour Daghir, who was ordered held without bond in London, was managing director of the companies.

Jeanine Speckman, who was released on bail after her appearance in a British court, was accused of being an executive for the companies who participated in the negotiations to buy the triggers.

## Scientists say satellites give no hint of warming

WASHINGTON — Ten years of weather satellite data show no evidence of global-warming from the greenhouse effect, scientists said Thursday, but they added it will take at least another decade of measurements to draw a firm conclusion.

The data, collected from 1979 through 1988 by the TIROS-N series of weather satellites, showed that the Earth's temperature can be measured accurately by instruments probing the atmosphere from space, two scientists say in a paper to be published Friday in Science.

"We found that the Earth's atmosphere goes through fairly large year-to-year changes, in temperature

and over that 10-year period we saw no long term warming or cooling trend," said Roy W. Spencer, of the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala.

Spencer's co-investigator, John R. Christy of the University of Alabama, Huntsville, said that there were temperature swings "that can be quite dramatic" during the decade, but, on a global basis, the thermal changes tended to even out.

The northern hemisphere goes up slightly during those 10 years and the southern hemisphere goes down slightly, said Christy. "The net effect for the globe is basically zero."

Detecting a climate trend, the scientists said, will take at least another decade of satellite measurements.

## Vets assail Agent Orange-cancer study

ATLANTA — A long-awaited government study of cancer among Vietnam veterans found no evidence linking the disease with exposure to the herbicide Agent Orange, officials said Thursday.

The study by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control, which looked only indirectly at Agent Orange, did find veterans at increased risk of a relatively rare cancer called non-Hodgkin's lymphoma. But researchers noted the risk was greater among veterans who served on ships than those who served on land; where the herbicide was used.

In Washington, Veterans Secretary Edward J. Derwinski quickly said he would order the Department of Veterans Affairs to pay disability compensation to vets suffering from non-Hodgkin's lymphoma.

The study was immediately attacked by veterans groups, which complained it failed to suf-

ficiently examine the cancer risks among the thousands of soldiers who actually worked with the dangerous herbicide during the war.

"It is not an Agent Orange study," objected Mary R. Stout, president of the Vietnam Veterans of America.

"This is only a look at Vietnam veterans" who had cancer, added John Hansen, spokesman for the American Legion.

Land Sen. Tom Daschle, D-S.D., co-chairman of the Vietnam-Era Veterans in Congress Caucus, said: "This action has been a long time coming. However, it is not the final word. We can-

not forget the many other veterans who are also suffering and dying from Agent Orange-related diseases and who have just as much evidence supporting their claims."

# 'Spring forward' time arrives Sunday

WASHINGTON (AP) — America will shed some light on its evenings starting Sunday.

That's right, it's time once again to switch to Daylight Saving Time. That means moving the clock ahead one hour — remember, "spring forward."

The change means later sunsets, so people can enjoy working on gardens or outdoor projects, playing sports, having barbecues or just idly relaxing outside.

For the record, the official change occurs at 2 a.m. Sunday, local time. Most folks make the change before retiring or in the morning.

The law calls for the change to be the first Sunday in April. Since Sunday is April 1 this year, the switch is as early as can be, under current rules.

While it's known as daylight-saving time, the change doesn't really save any daylight. It just moves it from morning to evening.

It was the confusion of a crazy-quilt pattern of time differences that finally led to the adoption of the U.S. uniform time system in 1966. Before then local communities decided individually for or against daylight time.

Today, daylight time is in effect in all areas of the country except Arizona, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samoa and the part of Indiana in the Eastern time zone.

# Amnesty offer for Lithuania deserters

VILNIUS, U.S.S.R. (AP) — The Soviet army offered amnesty Thursday to Lithuanian deserters who return to their units in what appeared to be a first step toward compromise in the crisis over Lithuania's independence drive.

The decision announced by the Defense Ministry's General Staff came a day after Lithuania offered two campsites; it suspended a plan to institute its own border guard, and it told citizens not to resist Soviet attempts to seize their firearms.

Both sides seemed to be yielding

in the war of wills over Lithuania's March 11 declaration of independence, the strongest defiance of Mikhail S. Gorbachev in his five years as Soviet leader.

"I think Lithuania is seeking a way out, and I think Gorbachev is seeking a way out," said Algirdas Brazauskas, head of the Lithuanian Communist Party, which split with Moscow in December.

But the war of words did not die down entirely.

Lithuanian President Vytautas Landsbergis, asked about the Defense Ministry's offer, said: "I don't have much trust in this promise. There have been instances where very high military officials have lied."

Lithuanian leaders are angry that the military said nothing before arresting 23 deserters Tuesday. They said the military had agreed to discuss any such move in advance.

Defense Ministry officials told Tass that Lithuanians who left the Soviet armed forces when their republic declared independence would not be punished if they resumed their military service.

### Anti-depressant drug being recalled

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Food and Drug Administration said Thursday that two lots of an anti-depressant drug called desipramine are being recalled because some bottles may contain a blood-thinner that could cause serious bleeding.

The manufacturer, Pharmaceutical Basics Inc. of Denver, told the FDA it was recalling the products after distributor H.L. Moore of New Britain, Conn., found a mislabeled bottle of the drug earlier this week.

The bottle was labeled as containing 25 milligrams of desipramine, but it contained 5 milligram tablets of warfarin, a blood-thinner.

The FDA said people taking the anti-depressant should examine their tablets to see if any are marked with the name warfarin.

Warfarin is a non-coated pink tablet with "5" on one side and "832" and the word "warfarin" on the other side.

Desipramine is a coated, lavender tablet with the numbers "832" and "G254" imprinted on it.

### Rocket burns up in final plunge

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The rocket that launched a \$157 million communications satellite but failed to put it in the proper orbit burned up harmlessly in the atmosphere or fell into the ocean, authorities said Thursday.

The Titan 3 booster came down at 9:20 a.m. EST Wednesday, about the time the U.S. Space Command had predicted, said Army Maj. Thomas Niemann, a

### Colorado plutonium cleanup lagging

DENVER (AP) — Energy Department officials said they may not finish cleaning up 67 pounds of plutonium clogging air ducts at Rocky Flats before resuming plutonium processing at the troubled nuclear weapons plant.

"I don't know if all the activity will be completed prior to restart. But if there are any safety questions, the energy secretary won't order restart," Catherine Kalinaki, a Department of Energy spokeswoman, said Wednesday.

DOE officials had set a June target for restarting plutonium operations, which were shut down at the plant northwest of Denver late last year because of safety and management problems.

### Crew fought over survival suits

SEATTLE (AP) — Crew members fought over survival suits in the final minutes before a fishing boat sank in the Bering Sea a week ago, a survivor testified at a hearing Thursday.

Crew member Harvey Dale Philpot also told the Coast Guard and National Transportation Safety Board inquiry that he couldn't find the suit he had grabbed because the zipper was corroded.

Philpot, 20, testified he had received no safety training aboard the 162-foot trawler Alcutian Enterprise, which capsized and sank March 22. Nineteen crew members are missing and presumed dead. Twenty-two crew members survived.

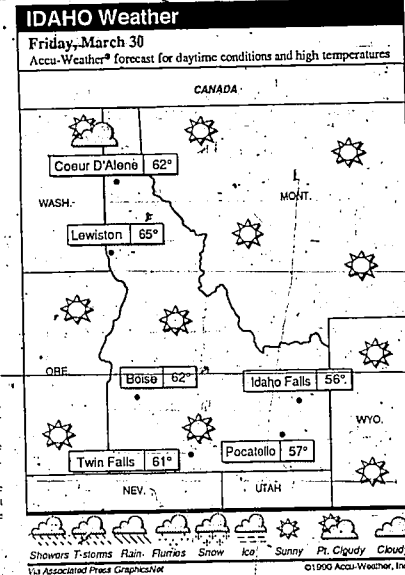
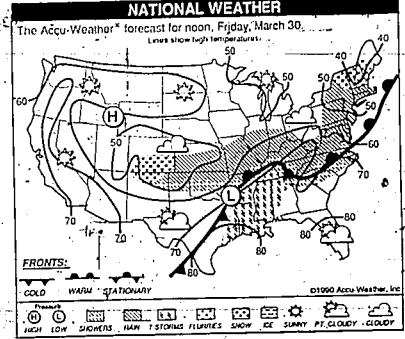
Although scattered clouds may brush the extreme north late today and Saturday, plenty of sunshine and more warm, dry weather is in store through the coming weekend.

# Belgian Parliament ends abortion ban

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — Parliament moved to end a 123-year ban on abortions Thursday by voting to allow abortion during the first 12 weeks of pregnancy if the woman is deemed to be in distress.

The Senate approved the bill last November and it now must be signed into law by King Baudouin.

That would leave Ireland as the only European Community nation with a total ban on abortions.

The House of Representatives voted 126 to 69, with 12 abstentions, to scrap an 1867 law.

ator for the Idaho Chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union, said he is encouraged by Andrus' statements.

"I don't say that seals it," Van Valkenburg said. "I won't believe it until we actually hear the veto decision."

If the governor signs the bill into law, the ACLU is prepared to seek an injunction barring HB625 from taking effect July 1, on the grounds that the measure is unconstitutional.

During a lengthy legislative hearing process, the Right to Life organization supplied lawyers to contradict the constitutionality charge and to counter the arguments on the rape, incest and health threat provisions.

Brian Johnston, the National Right to Life Committee's Western regional director, said Thursday he is disappointed that Andrus has not consulted any of those legal experts during his deliberations.

"This point the governor has not talked with any pro-life scholars," Johnston said. "That does not bode well."

Wilkins calls himself pro-life, Johnston said. But he doesn't belong to any pro-life organization.

Johnston added, however, that he means that in one point of view before rendering his decision.

Andrus had lots of input Thursday.

The governor met in the morning with Beverly Laylay, president of Concerned Women for America. Laylay arranged a hasty trip from Washington, D.C., to reassure Andrus that her 60,000-member organization will stand behind the governor and the Legislature's tough stand on abortion.

"With the recent boycott of Idaho potatoes imposed by those who promote abortion at any cost but their own, the feminists are attempting to cost Idaho's farmers, their very livelihood," Laylay said during a press conference following her meeting with Andrus.

Two hours later, college and high school students dumped 10,000 potatoes on the Statehouse steps during a noisy lunchtime rally protesting the bill.

"If Idaho becomes a pro-life state I'm moving out," said Enid Beall, a 17-year-old Boise High School student.

# Threatened Idaho potato boycott could harm Washington growers

PASCO, Wash. (AP) — A boycott of Idaho potatoes, threatened if that state's government signs a bill severely restricting abortion, may put the skins on spud sales in Washington, some growers fear.

"What they call the Idaho potato is a russet burbank, which is the same thing we grow here," said Marilyn Hanes, a Pasco potato farmer. "I'm sure it's going to hurt everybody's potatoes if there is a boycott."

If the restrictive Idaho legislation becomes law, the National Organization for Women has threatened a boycott of Idaho potatoes.

Gov. Cecil Andrus has said he will act by Saturday on the bill, passed last week by the Legislature, and that the boycott by abortion rights supporters will not be the deciding factor in his decision.

While it may be difficult for consumers to distinguish between an Idaho spud and one from Washington in the field, farmers say packaging makes it easy to identify origin in the stores.

"When you're buying fresh packed potatoes, it's right on the end of the box or the sack," said Bill Shaffer of the Washington Potato Growers in Pasco.

Processed, frozen potato products are a different story.

"As far as processed potatoes, you're not going to go in McDonalds and look at a pile of french fries and have each one of them tell you where they came from," Shaffer said.

With about \$290 million in annual sales, Washington's potato crop is about half the size of Idaho's. Between 75 percent and 87 percent of Washington's crop goes into processed products.

Should boycotters choose to stop eating a restaurant chain's french fries because the chain gets many of its potatoes from Idaho, such a move would also hurt Washington and Oregon, both big suppliers.

But the boycott could work in Washington's favor, Shaffer said.

"My assumption is that if Idaho knew the boycott was working, they'd grow less potatoes in 1991 and the processors would look to us for their potatoes," Shaffer said. "It would put the squeeze on Idaho and would be very beneficial to the state of Washington."

# Craig seeks probe into silver price slump plaguing Idaho mining

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — As silver prices plunged below \$5 an ounce this week, Rep. Larry Craig has asked for a full-blown probe into silver trading practices that may be crippling northern Idaho's mining industry.

Congressmen Craig, R-Idaho, and Nick Rahall II, D-W.Va., held hearings on the subject in Coeur d'Alene last fall, at which northern Idaho mining representatives charged the silver prices are being manipulated downward because of large paper trades on the New York Commodity Exchange, or Comex.

Craig has served a formal request upon House Energy and Commerce Committee Chairman John Dingell, D-Mich., to initiate the probe.

The miners alleged the large paper trades created an illusion there was plenty of silver for sale, when

in fact, there may be a shortage.

Silver for sale on paper in the futures markets such as Comex is almost double the industrialized world's production of newly minted silver.

"Both the Comex and the Commodities Futures Trading Commission, the federal agency that regulates trading in all commodities, claim that the large open interest has no effect on the price of silver," Craig and Rahall wrote.

"It appears to be arguing to the investor that there's nearly twice the amount of silver in the market that there is, and I have to believe that that in itself is depressing the market," Craig said.

"Silver is unique among precious metals in not having soared in price over the past 15 years, despite annual increases in consumption. Gold, for example, rose from \$160 to \$385 an ounce in that time."

### INEL plans to resume vitrification tests

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Idaho National Engineering Laboratory researchers hope to resume testing in June of a process to solidify buried nuclear waste by melting it.

A second in situ vitrification test has been scheduled for June 11 at the INEL, said Linda Milam of EG&G Idaho, the site's largest contractor.

Vitrification is a process where electrodes are inserted into the ground and melt the soil into a glassy solid around the radioactive waste.

It is one of several approaches the INEL is looking at to treat the 2 million cubic feet of transuranic waste buried at its Radioactive Waste Management Complex.

EG&G's first test in October on simulated waste was cancelled, after a fire dented a hood that covered the test area. Scientists will use an all-metal hood this time, Milam said.

Waste plant misses slated opening

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The Idaho Chemical Processing Plant's waste calcining facility at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory will not reopen this spring as officials had hoped.

Finding a design to replace underground pipes there, and filing an environmental assessment with the Department of Energy, have delayed the reopening.

"We're now looking at the middle of July," said Bob Campbell, vice president for Westinghouse Idaho Nuclear Co., the Chem Plant's contractor.

The plant's New Waste Calcining Facility, which solidifies liquid high-level nuclear waste, has been shut down since late 1988 so WVICO could build secondary piping around the Chem Plant's underground pipes and meet Environmental Protection Agency's requirements.

The pipes are used to carry hazardous and radioactive wastes.

### State allowed to run waste program

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare has been authorized to run the hazardous waste program under the federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency says.

The act allows states to handle toxic waste management if they prove they can do as well as the federal government.

"Idaho has worked hard to gain this authorization and I look forward to a partnership with the state to ensure that hazardous wastes are properly handled and disposed," said Warren McFall, acting EPA director in Idaho.

The federal RCRA law regulates waste generators, transporters and companies that treat, store or dispose of toxic waste. EnviroSAFE Services of Idaho operates the only licensed toxic waste dump in Idaho.

### Residents not happy with tree shield

OROFINO (AP) — A screen of trees placed around a state prison in an Orofino residential district doesn't go far enough to please disgruntled residents.

Some 250 trees intended to provide a vegetative screen around the state prison here should be planted by early June, Norm Noonan, project architect for the Idaho Division of Public Works said.

But at least two disgruntled Dunbar Road neighborhood residents who live adjacent to the Idaho Correctional Institution at Orofino said they're not satisfied their homes and the nearby high school will be shielded.

"The prison and the neighborhood have not been compatible in the past, it's not compatible today and it won't be compatible in the future," said Jerry Musselman.

### Fee hike to help minority recruitment

MOSCOW (AP) — The University of Idaho needs to boost its minority recruitment efforts to increase the cultural diversity of student life, UI President Elisabeth Zinsner has told student leaders.

And to do so, she plans to channel part of a proposed \$1.6 million student fee hike to hire a minority recruiter and to provide scholarships and support programs to attract minority students and keep them at Idaho.

Zinsner on Wednesday unveiled plans for spending the \$77-a-year, or 7 percent, increase in fees charged to full-time resident students. Nonresident, graduate and other students also will pay more.

# Government forces under right-to-work

BOISE (AP) — Legislation extending coverage of Idaho's 1985 right-to-work law to government employees narrowly cleared the legislature amid controversy over its impact.

"Passage of this is leading us into a lot of confusion and litigation," Sen. Mary Lou Reed, D-Coeur d'Alene, said.

In a partisan 21-19 vote, the Senate sent the legislation to Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus as it headed toward final adjournment on Thursday. Only Republican Herb Carlson of Eagle joined the Democrats in opposing the bill.

Democrat Don Mackin of Moscow and Republican Roger Madsen of Boise did not vote.

The bill was prompted by an incident last year in Shoshone County when four current and former sheriff's deputies were threatened with disciplinary action because they met with Teamsters officials about the possibility of organizing a union.

Floor sponsor Rod Beck, R-Boise, said the right-to-work law, ratified by voters in 1986, was always intended to cover public employees.

Only an attorney general's opinion in the wake of the Shoshone County incident suggested government workers are not covered by state labor laws unless specifically included, he said.

The law bans mandatory union membership as a condition of employment and protects employees from any reprisals for union activity.

"These government workers deserve the same protection as other employees in the state of Idaho out to have to join a union as a condition of employment," Beck said.

He acknowledged, however, that no one in Shoshone County supported the bill.

Critics were split on the impact of the legislation. One camp maintained the bill would extend new rights to government workers currently denied the right to strike or bargain collectively. The only exceptions are firefighters, teachers and employees in some municipalities, who have bargaining rights.



## Exxon still ignores bottom line, environmental costs

Even though the cost of cleaning up the Exxon Valdez spill exceeds \$2.3 billion — and counting — there are disturbing signs that Exxon has yet to grasp fully the importance of improving its environmental record.

Sadly for Exxon investors, the company's stock price is lagging about 25 percent behind its competitors.

This has important consequences for California. The State Teachers Retirement System, with about 453,000 beneficiaries, owns 7 million common shares of Exxon. The Public Employees Retirement System, with 827,000 beneficiaries, owns 8.2 million shares. As a trustee of the pension systems, I believe it is time for Exxon to recognize that environmental responsibility benefits its shareholders as well as consumers.

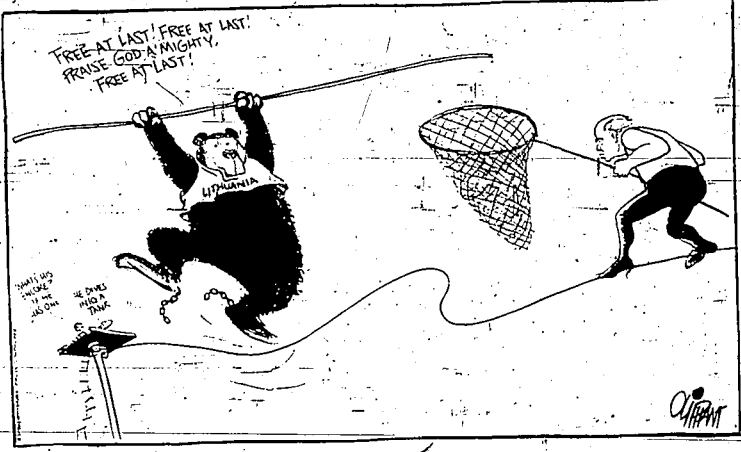
Since the 11 million-gallon spill in Prince William Sound on March 24, 1989, company facilities have been involved in other accidents that raise safety questions. Last December, an open valve at Exxon's

Baton Rouge, La., refinery released 30,000 gallons of oil, resulting in an explosion that killed two workers and the burning of millions of gallons of fuel.

All told, the bill for these accidents, including the Valdez spill, is likely to far exceed \$4 billion. That's \$4 billion-plus of non-performing assets — money that could have been spent on developing new cleanup technologies and reducing the chances of future accidents. Exxon's competitors are taking such strides. Either Exxon Chairman Lawrence G. Rawl is not speaking the right language, or his message is falling on deaf ears. Neither is acceptable. Exxon should immediately develop and put in action a comprehensive environmental and worker safety plan. Its shareholders deserve nothing less.

## Tumor victim's dream of saving earth spreads

**MINNEAPOLIS (AP)** — A brain tumor cut short the life of 11-year-old Clinton Hill, who dreamed of establishing a worldwide club called Kids for Saving Earth.



of posters and educational materials listing ways for children to help protect the environment.

But a \$1 million contribution is making Clinton's dream a reality. The suburban Plymouth boy laid the groundwork for the club before he died in November.

"He was worried about the air we breathe and the water we drink," said Tessa Hill, Clinton's mother. "He knew that kids can make a difference."

Mrs. Hill enlisted Target Stores in her son's crusade after noticing a flyer that described the company's environmental protection efforts. She asked Target executive George Hite to speak to Clinton's class, and Hite was so moved that he lobbied for the company to take on the project.

"It reminded me of how powerful kids can be," said Hite, vice president of public and consumer affairs. "They have a sense of honesty, simplicity and a very strong commitment."

Target, a discount chain with 407 stores in 32 states, plans to insert brochures, explaining Clinton's idea in 35 million Sunday newspaper advertising supplements on Earth Day, April 22. It also will provide kits for schools telling children how to start chapters of the club.

The company will broadcast 30-second commercials nationally during Earth Week promoting the club, and will give away millions

of Earth Week banners featuring the club's pledge will be displayed at Target stores for children and adults to sign. The banners then will be submitted to the United Nations General Assembly.

The pledge reads: "The Earth is my home. I promise to keep it healthy and beautiful. I will love the land, the air, the water and all living creatures. I will be a defender of my planet. United with friends, I will save the Earth."

"We think it's very important to have a good society for our own children," said 11-year-old Katrina Lusty, one of Clinton's classmates from Sunny Hollow Elementary School in New Hope. "We think it's going to make a difference."

Classmate Tim Svenson, 11, said the members of Kids for Saving Earth are taking steps in their own homes and communities to protect the environment, such as urging their families to recycle.

"Kids can influence their parents," Tim said. "The politicians haven't done much so far as I can see."

## House pushes past veto threat on child-care bill

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The House ignored a White House veto threat Thursday and tentatively approved an ambitious Democratic plan aimed at helping families find and afford day care for their children.

The House approved the plan on a largely party line vote, 263-158, after voting more narrowly to reject a conservative alternative that President Bush had endorsed.

The House also turned back amendments aimed at limiting federal aid for church-run day care centers.

The bill, which still must go to a conference to resolve differences with the Senate, would expand tax credits for working-poor families to offset day-care expenses.

It would create a system of state-issued subsidy vouchers for parents who want to use religious day-care centers, and would expand the Head Start program for poor children.

It also would establish minimum standards for day care centers and provide money for a new program of day care based in public schools.

The vote followed eight hours of sometimes emotional debate that masked the fact that there was actually bipartisan agreement on major portions of the competing versions.

"What we're talking about here may be the most important issue we're going to deal with this year," said Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo. "The world has changed. Families need and want child care."

Just hours before the vote,

presidential spokesman Martin Fitzwater said Bush would veto the Democratic version if enacted. The White House's budget office issued a statement calling the Democratic version "an exercise in fiscal irresponsibility."

Fourteen Democratic governors and one Republican, Gov. John R. McKernan Jr. of Maine, signed a letter to House Speaker Thomas Foley endorsing the leadership's version of the child-care bill and opposing a proposed conservative alternative.

## Navy deploys newest sub missile system

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Navy's newest and deadliest missile — the Trident 2 — has passed all its tests and has been deployed aboard the submarine USS Tennessee, the Navy said Thursday.

The Trident 2 is considered by experts to be the nation's most accurate ballistic missile. "This marks the start of an era," said Navy spokesman Lt. Cmdr. Craig Quigley. "This missile will serve as one-third of the nation's strategic triad for many years to come."

The program encountered problems last year after two of the first three submarine-launched missiles self-destructed. The program was declared on track in January after a \$125 million fix of the missile's nozzle system.

The program, which has cost \$35 billion to date, "was delivered two years early and was 12 percent below the budget originally provided," the Navy boasted.

On Thursday, the program formally achieved what is called the Initial Operational Capability. "That marks the end of its land-based and submarine-based flight tests, as well as all readiness checks for missiles, crew and equipment aboard the Tennessee, the statement said.

That means, said Navy spokesman Cmdr. Craig Quigley, "that it is declared ready for use."

Quigley declined to confirm whether the Tennessee had put to sea for its first operational patrol from its base at King's Bay, Ga. A military source, however, confirmed that the submarine had done so early Thursday.

### Singer Arnold stable after surgery

**NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP)** — Singer Eddy Arnold was reported in critical but stable condition Thursday following double-bypass heart surgery.

Arnold, 71, underwent the surgery Wednesday at Saint Thomas Hospital in the operation, said the performer might be ready for release from the hospital next week.

"Barring unforeseen complications, Mr. Arnold should be able to resume normal activities," Cotharp said in a statement released by the hospital.

### Libya tests in-flight refueling ability

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Libya has conducted in-flight refueling tests for jet fighter-bombers, a key step for increasing the range of Moammar Gadhafi's military aircraft throughout the Middle East, Pentagon sources said Thursday.

Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams, declined to confirm the report of such tests publicly but said such a development would be "troubling" to U.S. officials.

"Obviously, it would be a matter of very serious and deep concern to the United States," Williams said when queried about the report.

The administration's concern about Libya obtaining such capabilities have been compounded in light of recent reports that the Middle Eastern nation has been producing chemical weapons.

### Artists defend national endorsement

**WASHINGTON** — For two hours Thursday, art, music and theater directors repeatedly used a baseball analogy to defend the National Endowment for the Arts before a Senate subcommittee that will decide its future.

They compared federal funding of the 20- or so projects later labeled as "obscene" or "inappropriate" to fielding errors committed by an all-star player who hit \$5,000 home runs, the approximate number of projects funded by the National Endowment for the Arts. But Garrison Keillor, the best-selling author and radio star, quickly reversed the analogy in his five-minute testimony in support of the 25-year-old program, which awarded \$147 million in grants last year.

"The endorsement has made the mistake of embarrassing itself on 20 occasions, and I wish it would do so more often," Keillor said. "I don't regard those 20 'controversial' pieces as errors. I wish there were more — 30 or 50 at least," he said. "The lesser number is testimony to how timid and repressed the arts are."

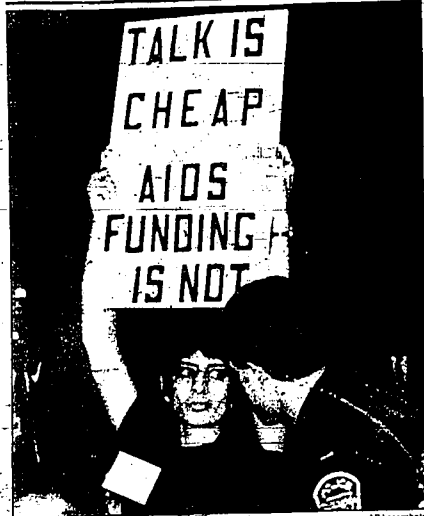

## Bush calls for a halt to AIDS fears, bias

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush declared his administration "on a wartime footing" against AIDS Thursday. He also called for compassion, not discrimination, toward people infected with the virus.

"Our goal is to turn irrational fear into rational acts," he said in his first major presidential address on AIDS. For Bush, it was an unusually personal speech.

Addressing the National Leadership Coalition on AIDS, he said that education is the key to curbing the spread of the deadly disease.

"Every American must learn what AIDS is and what AIDS is not," he said.

Bush presented no new policy initiatives, instead spotlighting as unprecedented his proposed \$3.5 billion in federal spending on AIDS research, treatment and education.

AIDS activists dismiss the proposal — although it would drastically escalate the federal commitment to the fight against AIDS — as a small fraction of what is needed to find a cure and to treat victims.

Bush vowed to press further research at the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Md., and the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta.

"We're on a wartime footing at NIH and CDC. Tonight, like every night, the lights will burn late in Bethesda and Atlanta, as a group of American pioneers work to solve this problem."

Bush urged business executives in his audience not to fire employees infected with HIV, the human immunodeficiency virus that causes AIDS. These people, he said, deserve the same compassion as others who are sick.

"There is only one way to deal with an individual who is sick — with dignity, compassion, care, confidentiality and without discrimination," he said.

"Once disease strikes, we don't blame those who are suffering. We don't punish the accident victim who didn't wear a seat belt. We don't reject the cancer patient who didn't quit smoking. We try to love them and care for them and comfort them. We do not fire them or evict them or cancel their insurance."

Bush urged Congress "to get on with the job of passing a law" to prohibit discrimination against people infected with AIDS or HIV. The president said he and his wife, Barbara, have lost friends to the disease.

"Our love for them when they were sick and when they died, was just as great and just as intense as for anyone lost to heart disease or cancer or accidents," the president said.

He expressed empathy with families of AIDS-infected babies, recalling the death of his own 4-year-old daughter from leukemia. "We asked the doctor the same question every HIV family must ask — why, why this was happening to our beautiful little girl," he said.

Two AIDS activists in the audience tried repeatedly to interrupt Bush.

When Bush said federal support for the AIDS fight had risen from \$8 million to almost \$3.5 billion, the heckler snapped, "Too little, too late."

Urvasi Vaid, executive director of the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force, waved a sign reading, "Talk is cheap. AIDS funding is not."

Bush departed from his text to tell the hecklers, "I can understand the concern that these people feel, and I hope that if we do nothing else by coming here, I can help them understand that not only do you care, but we care too."

## Weak car sales tagged as spending slows

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumer spending narrowed to a 0.4 percent increase in February, the government said Thursday.

Analysts blamed weak car sales for the slowdown, and some said buying momentum was building in other areas of the economy.

The Commerce Department said personal consumption totaled a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$3.63 trillion, the smallest increase since a 0.3 percent gain in October.

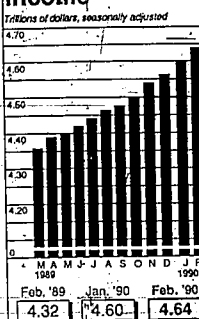
Consumer spending, which accounts for about two-thirds of the nation's economic activity, jumped 1 percent in December and January. The January increase was even stronger than the 0.6 percent originally reported.

Personal income rose 0.9 percent, to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$4.64 trillion, after a 0.7 percent increase in January, which was revised down slightly from 0.8 percent first reported. The February income gain matched a 0.9 percent advance in November.

"The spread between income and consumption growth in the near term is a negative (for the economy), because consumers have buying power but are not unleashing it," said Michael P. Niemira, an economist with the Mitsubishi Bank in New York.

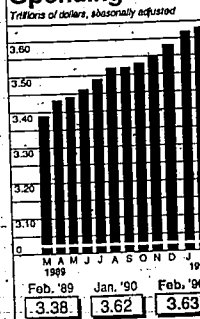
"But over the longer term, building up savings is a positive for future consumption growth."

The spread contributed to a savings rate of 5.7 percent — savings as a percent of disposable income — compared with a 5.3 percent rate in January. The increase in personal

automobile sales. "Autos were still a depressing going into March," Niemira said. "But, on the other hand, department store sales were doing quite well in March."

"There seems to be a momentum that is building in the non-automotive area. Consumer confidence is up" in recent surveys. Purchases of non-durable goods gained \$10.9 billion, while spending on services rose \$19.6 billion.

"The February and January increases in personal income were affected by several special factors," the department said, including farm subsidies that both raised the February change and lowered the January change.

"A pay raise for federal government employees raised the changes in both months," it said. "The January change was also boosted by cost-of-living adjustments to several transfer payment programs and was lowered by an increase in personal contributions to social insurance."

Payroll increases were spread through all industry categories, it said. Government payrolls also were up, reflecting the federal pay raise.

The report said Americans' incomes after taxes rose 0.9 percent in February, up from 0.8 percent the previous month.

**Ukraine communists expel 3 members**  
 MOSCOW (AP) — The Ukrainian Communist Party expelled three members Thursday for trying to turn the Rukh political movement into a competing party, the official news agency Tass said.  
 In a separate report, Tass said prosecutors in the Soviet Union's second-largest republic had declared unconstitutional a decision by officials in the western Ukrainian city of Stuyry to raise the Ukrainian national flag above city offices, in addition to the Soviet flag.  
 Tass said Vitaly Donchik, Sergei Golovaty and Alexander Burakovsky were expelled by the Ukrainian party's Control Commission, its disciplinary body, for "separatist aspirations, leading against the Soviet Communist Party and actions directed at establishing a new political party."  
 The three, all senior scientists, published a letter in an authoritative Ukraine literary journal on March 8 setting out their views for greater autonomy.

**Colombians free kidnapped American**  
 BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Police on Thursday freed a U.S. citizen who had been abducted hours earlier in the southern city of Cali and captured two men allegedly involved in the kidnapping, a police spokesman said.  
 Gerald Robinson, hometown-unknown, was freed unharmed in Cali, said a spokesman for the national police.  
 The spokesman, reached by the Associated Press by telephone, refused to give his name. He said police captured two suspects, William Garcia and Luis Mazo, but had yet to establish why they wanted to kidnap Robinson.  
 Lauren Hale, a spokeswoman for the U.S. Embassy in Bogota, said she was looking into the matter but could not yet confirm or deny the kidnapping.

**Syrian soldiers fire on Shiite cleric**  
 BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Syrian troops Thursday fired on the motorcade of a hard-line Shiite Muslim cleric who is the leader of the Iranian militants holding Western hostages, witnesses said.  
 The witness spoke on condition of anonymity for reasons of personal safety. They said Sheikh Tofaili, Secretary-General of Hezbollah, was not hurt in the attack in south Beirut. His car was riddled with bullets, the witnesses said.  
 The motive of the attack was not immediately clear. It was not known if it was related to the 18 Western hostages held in Lebanon. Most of them are believed held by factions linked to Hezbollah and imprisoned in hideouts in the southern slums, Hezbollah's main stronghold.

**Chazov loses post as health minister**  
 MOSCOW (AP) — Yevgeny Chazov, personal doctor to Kremlin leaders and co-winner of the 1985 Nobel Peace Prize for his work with an anti-nuclear organization, was dropped Thursday as Soviet health minister.  
 The official news agency Tass said President Mikhail S. Gorbachev had relieved Chazov, 60, of his duties in connection with his transfer to other work.  
 His new job was not specified, and no replacement was named. Such wording can signify official displeasure.

**Hawke claims 4th victory in Australian election**

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Prime Minister Bob Hawke claimed victory Thursday in the March 24 general election, becoming the first Labor leader to win four consecutive terms.  
 His opponent, Liberal Party leader Andrew Peacock, conceded defeat.  
 Final results still are not in, but preliminary results gave Labor 77 seats in the 148-seat House of Representatives. Peacock's conservative party won 70, and one seat was held by an independent.  
 Hawke, 60, has been in power since 1983 and is the longest-serving prime minister in Australia's history. He campaigned on promises of stability. In his acceptance speech, he promised to work for "all Australians."  
 "It is the commitment of myself and my colleagues that we will, from the first day of new government, set about undertaking the hard work needed to secure an Australian future of greater prosperity, social justice, fairness and security," Hawke said.

**Czechoslovakia chooses new official name**

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — After weeks of stormy discussion and mounting tension between Czechs and Slovaks, the country on Thursday chose a new name for the country and eliminated the outmoded "Socialist" label.  
 Since the winter revolution, everybody — even the ousted Communists — had agreed that "Socialist" no longer had a place in their country's name.  
 But should the Socialist Republic of Czechoslovakia be changed to the Czech-Slovak Republic? The Federation of Czechoslovakia? Or, for those in the anti-hyphen camp, Czechoslovak Federative Republic?  
 The anti-hyphen group finally prevailed after hours of debate, when the "Czechoslovak Federative Republic" won the required three-fifths majority in Parliament.  
 The debate over the hyphen, characteristic both of Czechoslovak love of detail and absurdity, split the Czechs and Slovaks.  
 Slovaks make up about one-third of Czechoslovakia's 15.5 million people. Taking their cue from winter president Václav Havel, who proposed changing the country's name and coat of arms in January, they waged a solid campaign for the hyphen.  
 They argued the hyphen would show the world that Czechoslovakia contains two distinct peoples — Czechs and Slovaks.  
 The Slovaks will hyphenate the country's title in writing to make it the Czechoslovak Federative Republic.  
 The name and hyphen debate raged for weeks in newspapers and over glasses of Czech beer and Slovak wine. It finally moved to Parliament after the government withdrew an attempt to get the issue put off until after the June election.

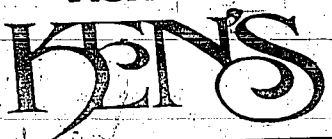
**Slain missionary buried in Lebanon**

## New violence stalks peace in S. Africa

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — A growing wave of violence is threatening South Africa's fragile stability, and there are fears it will undermine efforts to build a multi-racial democracy.

NICOSIA, Cyprus — Iraq's drive to eclipse Israel as the Middle East's paramount military power is gathering momentum.

Its attempt to acquire trigger devices for nuclear weapons underlines that the regional arms race has reached a new stage.

Most analysts believe Iraq is still years away from producing a nuclear weapon. But, coupled with development of long-range missiles and chemical weapons, Iraq efforts to acquire the trigger devices have raised concern that its nuclear program may be more advanced than anyone thought.

The sophisticated devices are believed to be available only to a few major powers.

The arrest of three people in London on Wednesday on accusations they were trying to smuggle the triggers to Iraq was the latest in a chain of indicators that Iraq is capable of developing high-technology weapons.

In December, Iraq surprised other nations by launching a rocket it said could be used to put a satellite into space. It also claims to have developed missiles with a range of 750 miles.

Both incidents demonstrated the advances the Iraqis have made.

But Western intelligence sources said the rocket launch was less successful than at first believed. They said the rocket flew for just over two minutes, reaching an altitude of 12 1/2 miles before plunging back to earth.

Nonetheless, some analysts believed it put Iraq on the threshold of ballistic missile capability.

Richard Murphy, former U.S. assistant secretary of state and a Middle East expert, told a conference on Iraq in London this month that Iraq's missile program has made "extraordinary progress."

He noted: "This progress generally carries an ominous overtone and not just in the United States, its genuine scientific achievements are clouded by associated reports of Iraqi progress in chemical weapons and biological warfare research."

Iraq has achieved this despite the efforts of the United States and the six industrialized nations to halt the flow of sensitive technology to stem the proliferation of missiles.

There is some evidence the Missile Technology Control Regime is having some effect. But Murphy noted: "The problem is getting out of the control, if it hasn't already, of the superpowers. It's difficult to attract Middle Eastern countries into the regime."

The superpowers' influence in restricting access to missile technology has been undercut by the emergence of sophisticated arms industries in Latin America, Asia and the Middle East.

China has supplied weapons to Iran and Iraq, but says it has stopped doing so. However, Western intelligence officials said North Korea has offered to sell missiles to at least five Middle Eastern states, including Syria and Iran, or help them develop such weapons themselves.

Iran is also developing long-range missiles. Syria and Saudi Arabia have missiles capable of hitting targets in Israel. Libya is believed to be seeking Chinese M-9 missiles.

Israel, faced with the erosion of its technological superiority, now has the nuclear-capable Jericho-1 weapon, with an estimated range of up to 370 miles.

It recently tested an advanced version, Jericho-II, with a reputed range of more than

1,000 miles, enough to hit targets anywhere in the region and even reach the Soviet Union.

Iraq officials deny Baghdad is seeking to build nuclear weapons. But the rapid strides it has made in military technology, along with President Saddam Hussein's regional ambitions and the lack of a formal peace treaty with Iran, have caused widespread concern.

"Iraq is being unnecessarily grandiose in its military preparations," Simon Henderson, editor of the London-based Mideast Markets newsletter, told the London conference.

"Western officials foresee that by the end of the decade, Iraq will have the largest arsenal in the region of unconventional weapons — principally medium-range missiles with sophisticated warheads, including chemical and nuclear weapons."

In December, Mideast Markets reported that Iraq was trying to build a nuclear bomb with Chinese help. The newsletter said the Chinese had provided Baghdad with components for highly enriched centrifuges needed for nuclear weapons.

It said it could be 10 years before Iraq would be capable of testing such a weapon. But Israeli officials have said Iraq is probably much closer than that.

### Legislature to study benefits of community college system

BOISE - In the waning hours of the 1990 session Thursday, the Legislature agreed to establish an interim study committee to consider the benefits of a statewide community college system.

"This is an idea that has not received a lot of attention, but has merit," said Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, in explaining a proposal to establish six community college regions to the Senate.

Idaho currently has two free-standing community colleges that are supported by only three counties in the state, Noh said. A statewide system would spread the financial burden throughout the entire state while at the same time establishing four additional free-standing community colleges at Boise State University, Lewis-Clark State College, Idaho State University and at Idaho Falls' Vocational-Technical campus.

Noh said the six-college system would improve the delivery of vocational education to Idaho's rural high schools at a crucial time when federal support for vocational education is shifting from rural to urban areas.

The study committee will submit its findings for action by next year's Legislature.

### Bill allowing counties to tax for preservation clears Senate

BOISE - After years of pushing for legislation only to watch it fail twice, the Jerome County Historical Society may finally receive the money it needs to preserve historical sites and buildings.

A bill is on its way to Gov. Cecil Andrus that would allow Idaho's counties to form five-member museum boards empowered to tax property owners up to \$1 for every \$10,000 of assessed property value.

The measure received some extra muscle this time from sponsor Steve Andrus, R-Rupert, chairman of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee. That House committee is the only legislative committee empowered to raise taxes.

### Civic leaders assemble to evaluate impact of low-level, high-speed flight

MOUNTAIN HOME - Though it was expected, the sudden crack of the supersonic jet was startling, a little louder than a shotgun going off nearby.

"I came for the boom," said Ted Hoffman of Mountain Home.

He also was disappointed that the Air Force had waited so long to demonstrate a sonic boom and that it was not done for the general public, he said.

Earlier in the day, the group had toured the

air base and heard a presentation on the Air Force's proposal to build a huge tactical and live ammunition bombing range in Owyhee County.

But the demonstration was "no comparison with what they're proposing," said Bert Brackett, president of the Idaho Cattle Association.

Sonic booms would be a regular thing over the range - an average of more than 40 a day of varying intensity - if Congress approves Air Force plans.

The Air Force has proposed expanding Saylor Creek into a 1.5 million-acre tactical bombing range that would accommodate live bombs and supersonic flight.

Air Force officials say the expanded range is needed to accommodate future increased training needs and 94 F-4 jets being moved

## What makes a sonic boom

MOUNTAIN HOME - As an aircraft moves through the air it produces air-pressure waves similar to a ship's wake through water. When the aircraft goes faster than the speed of sound - about 750 miles per hour at sea level - the air-pressure waves are concentrated into shock waves.

The shock waves trail the aircraft in the shape of a cone. It is the sudden change in pressure as the shock wave passes that creates the sonic boom.

The intensity of sonic booms is expressed as overpressure in pounds per square foot. Overpressure is simply the increase above normal atmospheric pressure of the shock wave.

Typical sonic booms directly beneath F-4 jets range from 2 pounds per square foot to 6.8 pounds, depending on the jet's altitude. F-111

"We want to show that it is a people's benefit and not ours," he said. An enhanced 911 system would lock onto a caller's phone and stay connected

even when the caller hangs up, Du Fresno said.

"That isn't the case with the current 911 system," he said. "They hang up the phone and we don't know where they are."

Another possible feature of an enhanced 911 system would allow a dispatcher to connect with the hospital with the touch of a button.

## Trucking firm closes Magic Valley facilities

TWIN FALLS - ANR Freight System Inc. stopped taking on freight in Twin Falls and Burley Thursday as the firm's parent company began closing 113 terminals nationwide.

Terminals in Boise, Caldwell, Idaho Falls, Lewiston and Pocatello were also closed. The Houston-based Coastal Corp. said it was restructuring ANR to preserve its core trucking operation in the Great Lakes region.

Five employees worked at the Twin Falls terminal and two at Burley. The shutdown will affect 50 workers.

"We're downsizing the company after several years of extensive losses to concentrate on areas where we have most of our terminals," spokesman Jim Bailey said.

The company will cut its operations in half, leaving 104 terminals around the country employing about 2,500 people.

Bailey said the trucking industry has become highly competitive since deregulation by the federal government in the early '80s.

"With deregulation, you've had hundreds of motor carriers go broke," he said. Formerly, trucking firms were allowed to divide up markets

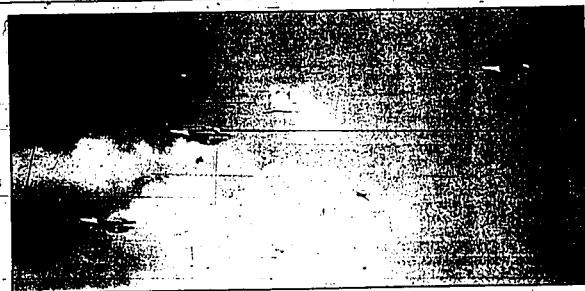
"One reason Robbins said he wants to switch to the other side of the Statehouse roundtable because the Senate is more closely balanced between Democrats and Republicans than the House.

He noted: "This progress generally carries an ominous overtone and not just in the United States. Its genuine scientific achievements are clouded by associated reports of Iraqi progress in chemical weapons and biological warfare research."

Iraq has achieved this despite the efforts of the United States and the six industrialized nations to halt the flow of sensitive technology to stem the proliferation of missiles.

There is some evidence the Missile Technology Control Regime is having some effect. But Murphy noted: "The problem is getting out of the control, if it hasn't already, of the superpowers. It's difficult to attract Middle Eastern countries into the regime."

The superpowers' influence in restricting access to missile technology has been undercut by the emergence of sophisticated arms industries in Latin America, Asia and the Middle East.

China has supplied weapons to Iran and Iraq, but says it has stopped doing so. However, Western intelligence officials said North Korea has offered to sell missiles to at least five Middle Eastern states, including Syria and Iran, or help them develop such weapons themselves.

Iran is also developing long-range missiles. Syria and Saudi Arabia have missiles capable of hitting targets in Israel. Libya is believed to be seeking Chinese M-9 missiles.

Israel, faced with the erosion of its technological superiority, now has the nuclear-capable Jericho-1 weapon, with an estimated range of up to 370 miles.

It recently tested an advanced version, Jericho-II, with a reputed range of more than

1,000 miles, enough to hit targets anywhere in the region and even reach the Soviet Union.

Iraqi officials deny Baghdad is seeking to build nuclear weapons. But the rapid strides it has made in military technology, along with President Saddam Hussein's regional ambitions and the lack of a formal peace treaty with Iran, have caused widespread concern.

"Iraq is being unnecessarily grandiose in its military preparations," Simon Henderson, editor of the London-based Mideast Markets newsletter, told the London conference.

"Western officials foresee that by the end of the decade, Iraq will have the largest arsenal in the region of unconventional weapons — principally medium-range missiles with sophisticated warheads, including chemical and nuclear weapons."

In December, Mideast Markets reported that Iraq was trying to build a nuclear bomb with Chinese help. The newsletter said the Chinese had provided Baghdad with components for high-speed centrifuges that produce the highly enriched uranium needed for nuclear weapons.

It said it could be 10 years before Iraq would be capable of testing such a weapon. But Israeli officials have said Iraq is probably much closer than that.

### Kimberly youth killed in collision with semi

**ROGERSON** — A Kimberly youth was killed Wednesday night in an auto accident 9 miles north of the Nevada line on U.S. Route 93, according to the Idaho State Police.

Jason D. Makings, 17, was killed at the scene when his car crossed the center lane and hit a tractor-trailer head-on, a dispatcher said.

The state police learned of the accident at 8:28 p.m., the dispatcher said. The driver of the semi, Robert V. Barnes, 43, of Dillon, Mont., was not injured and there were no passengers in either vehicle, she said.

The accident was still under investigation on Thursday, she said.

### Legislature to study benefits of community college system

**BOISE** — In the waning hours of the 1990 session Thursday, the Legislature agreed to establish an interim study committee to consider the benefits of a statewide community college system.

"This is an idea that has not received a lot of attention, but has merit," said Sen. Laird Oehl, R-Kimberly, in explaining a proposal to establish six community college regions to the Senate.

Idaho currently has two free-standing community colleges that are supported by only three counties in the state, Noh said. A statewide system would spread the financial burden throughout the entire state while at the same time establishing four additional free-standing community colleges at Boise State University, Lewis-Clark State College, Idaho State University and at Idaho Falls' Vocational-Technical campus.

Noh said the six-college system would improve the delivery of vocational education to Idaho's rural high schools at a crucial time when federal support for vocational education is shifting from rural to urban areas.

The study committee will submit its findings for action by next year's Legislature.

### Bill allowing counties to tax for preservation clears Senate

**BOISE** — After years of pushing for legislation only to watch it fail twice, the Jerome County Historical Society may finally receive the money it needs to preserve historical sites and buildings.

A bill is on its way to Gov. Cecil Andrus that would allow Idaho's counties to form five-member museum boards empowered to tax property owners up to \$1 for every \$10,000 of assessed property value.

The measure received "some extra muscle this time from sponsor Steve Antonio, R-Rupert, chairman of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee. That House committee is the only legislative committee empowered to raise taxes. The bill, which passed the House earlier, cleared the Senate late Wednesday night in a 27-10 vote.

### Cassia Treasurer candidate promises continuity in office

**BURLEY** — Cassia County Deputy Treasurer Sharon Smith said there will be continuity in the office if voters cast their ballots for her.

"I feel I can make an easy transition from Shirley who has been the treasurer for many years," Smith said.

Smith is running for the top spot being vacated by retiring Treasurer Shirley Povlsen. Also filed for the seat are Betty Barrett, Bruce Young and Gayle Erickson. All treasurer candidates are Republicans.

Smith, 52, deputy treasurer the past four years, said her additional experience with accounting, computers, personnel management, correspondence, bookkeeping and budgeting of public revenues while she worked in the public school system is a benefit.

"I feel that my experience has given me the experience and insight into the operation of the office," Smith said.

"If I would continue the courteous and efficient service that is now offered in the treasurer's office," she said.

### \$2,000 worth of equipment stolen from The Sound Co.

**TWIN FALLS** — More than \$2,000 worth of stereo equipment has been stolen from The Sound Co. on Blue Lakes Boulevard North, according to a police report.

## Jacklin looks to Burley for possible plant site

**JEROME** — Jacklin Seed Co., which announced last week it would search outside of the Jerome area for a place to build a processing plant, has been looking around the Burley area, an official said.

Paul Matthews, director of the Burley Development Commission, said Thursday that Jacklin General Manager Duane Jacklin and an engineer had visited four sites in Burley that day for its lawn seed processing plant.

Matthews said he expects to hear from

Jacklin today on whether the company would locate at one of the four sites.

In Jerome, meanwhile, businesses and individuals say they've "flooded" the company's Post Falls headquarters with pleas for Jacklin to reconsider its decision last week to withdraw its request for a special-use permit to build the \$3.5 million plant south of the city.

The company withdrew its request, company Vice President Don Jacklin stated in a press release earlier this week, due to opposition to the plan by some local residents who expressed written opposition to the facility being located at the "Con-

Paula site, we will begin a search for a new site immediately," Jacklin stated.

Petitions have been placed in most Jerome businesses for residents asking Jacklin to return.

A large number of people want the plant in the county, Bob Richards, president of the Jerome Chamber of Commerce, said. "We just want to express as clearly as we can that we want to be good neighbors and know Jacklin would be a good neighbor," he said.

The Jerome Task Force and Chamber of Commerce are spearheading the effort and

many businesses and individuals have already contacted the company by letter and phone, he said. The petitions will be sent to Jacklin the first of next week, Richards said.

Jacklin company officials were unavailable for comment Thursday.

Jerry James, who planned to protest the commissioners' approval of the plant when Jacklin withdrew its request, said he would like the plant in the county but disagreed with the particular site chosen. "I would like to see Jacklin locate in the Jerome area, but there are other suitable areas that could serve their purposes that aren't so near our residences," he said.

## Jets offer supersonic sound sample

Civic leaders assemble to evaluate impact of low-level, high-speed flight

**MOUNTAIN HOME** — Though it was expected, the sudden crack of the supersonic jet was startling, a little louder than a shotgun going off nearby.

The RF-4C flew over about 75 southern Idaho civic leaders at about 750 mph, just over ground to demonstrate a sonic boom. It was the highlight of the civic leaders' tour Thursday of the Saylor Creek Bombing Range.

"I came for the boom," said Ted Hoffman of Mountain Home.

But the demonstration was misleading, he said. The plane was flying straight and level. If it had been turning or diving, the boom on the ground would have been much louder, he said. He also was disappointed that the Air Force had waited so long to demonstrate a sonic boom and that it was not done for the general public, he said.

Earlier in the day, the group had toured the

air base and heard a presentation on the Air Force's proposal to build a huge tactical and live ammunition bombing range in Owyhee County.

But the demonstration was "no comparison with what they're proposing," said Bert Brackett, president of the Idaho Cattle Association.

Sonic booms would be a regular thing over the range — an average of more than 40 a day of varying intensity — if Congress approves Air Force plans.

The Air Force has proposed expanding Saylor Creek into a 1.5 million-acre tactical bombing range that would accommodate live bombs and supersonic flight.

Air Force officials say the expanded range is needed to accommodate future increased training needs and 94 F-4 jets being moved

## What makes a sonic boom

**MOUNTAIN HOME** — As an aircraft moves through the air it produces air-pressure waves similar to a ship's wake through water. When the aircraft goes faster than the speed of sound — about 750 miles per hour at sea level — the air-pressure waves are concentrated into shock waves.

The shock waves trail the aircraft in the shape of a cone. It is the sudden change in pressure as the shock wave passes that creates the sonic boom.

The intensity of sonic booms is expressed as overpressure in pounds per square foot. Overpressure is simply the increase above normal atmospheric pressure of the shock wave.

Typical sonic booms directly beneath F-4 jets range from 2 pounds per square foot to 6.8 pounds, depending on the jet's altitude. F-111

## Officers say enhanced 911 system could save lives

**TWIN FALLS** — For up to \$1 a month per telephone customer, law enforcement officers say they can help a child save a dying parent through a Magic Valley enhanced 911 system.

Unlike the current 911 system in Twin Falls, which only speeds emergency dialing, an enhanced system would display a caller's address within seconds, allowing a child who doesn't know his address to help a choking parent, said Paul Du Fresnoe,

Twin Falls police and fire chief.

Du Fresnoe was one of 50 law enforcement officers, county officials and citizens who attended the first Magic Valley enhanced 911 committee meeting Thursday night.

The group discussed the cost savings of a regional system and set a format for future planning meetings.

"There is economics of scale but we don't know how much," Co-chairman Roy Raymond said.

The next meeting will be at 7 p.m. April 11 at the county's zoning building, 236

Third Ave. E.

The citizens' committee will determine whether to recommend to commissioners in Twin Falls County and other Magic Valley counties to place a 911 system proposal on the November ballot.

Twin Falls County Sheriff Jim Munn said having the citizen's committee make decisions will eliminate the perception that the county is empire building.

"We want to show that it is a people's benefit and not ours," he said.

An enhanced 911 system would lock onto a caller's phone and stay connected

even when the caller hangs up, Du Fresnoe said.

"That isn't the case with the current 911 system," he said. "They hang up the phone and we don't know where they are."

Another possible feature of an enhanced 911 system would allow a dispatcher to connect with the hospital with the touch of a button.

Du Fresnoe said that could be useful in allowing a doctor to instruct a person to administer life-saving functions during an

## Trucking firm closes Magic Valley facilities

**TWIN FALLS** — ANR Freight System Inc. stopped taking on freight in Twin Falls and Burley Thursday as the firm's parent company began closing 113 terminals nationwide.

Terminals in Boise, Caldwell, Idaho Falls, Lewiston and Poetello were also closed. The Houston-based Coastal Corp. said it was restructuring ANR to preserve its core trucking operation in the Great Lakes region.

Five employees worked at the Twin Falls terminal and two at Burley. Statewide, the shutdown will affect 50 workers.

"We're re-down-sizing the company after several years of extensive losses to concentrate on areas where we have most of our terminals," spokesman Jim Bailey said.

The company will cut its operations in half, leaving 104 terminals around the country employing about 2,500 people.

Bailey said the trucking industry has become highly competitive since deregulation by the federal government in the early '80s.

"With deregulation, you've had hundreds of motor carriers go broke," he said.

Formerly, trucking firms were allowed to divide up markets

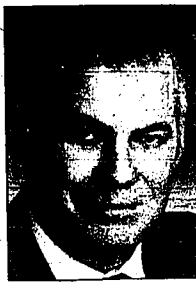
**BOISE** — Rep. Gary Robbins is switching again.

The Twin Falls lawmaker announced in December he was switching from the Republican to the Democratic Party. On Thursday, Robbins announced he'll switch from the House to the Senate.

Robbins said he'll file today for the District 25 federal seat currently held by Sen. Larry Anderson, R-Eden.

Anderson announced Wednesday that he would not seek re-election. But Robbins will battle former Rep. Russell Newcomb in a general election.

and a pledge of help from Gov. Cecil Andrus.

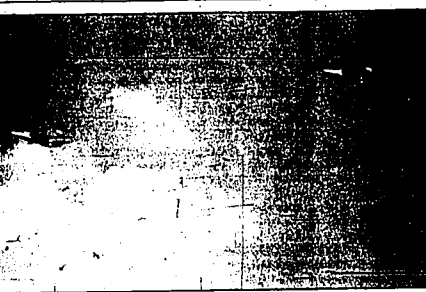
One reason Robbins said he wants to switch to the other side of the Statehouse rounds because the Senate is more closely balanced between Democrats and Republicans than the House.

The Senate currently has 23 Republicans and 19 Democrats while the House has 63 Republicans and only 21 Democrats.

"There's an opportunity to become immediately effective," Robbins said.

Should the Senate tip into the Democrats' hands, Robbins said he'll have a shot at a committee chairmanship. Or, Robbins said he'd like to be appointed to the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee. As a certified public accountant, he believes he could be an

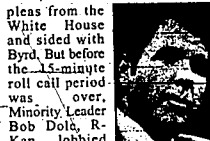
## Symms casts key vote on clean air bill

WASHINGTON — Thanks to a last-minute switch by Idaho Republican Sen. Steve Symms, the U.S. Senate Thursday rejected an amendment by a single vote that threatened to derail the entire clean air package now before Congress.

The amendment, which would have paid hundreds of millions of dollars to miners who are thrown out of work by the legislation, was defeated by a 50-49 vote after heavy lobbying and intense debate. The Senate amendment was sponsored by Sen. Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., and attracted support from senators who come from coal states or who did not want to offend Byrd, the powerful Appropriations Committee chairman who wields considerable control over where the Senate spends its money.

But it was opposed by both the Democratic and Republican Senate leaders and by the Bush administration, all of whom argued it would wreck a compromise worked out after lengthy negotiations earlier this year. Symms, whose switch changed the vote's outcome, initially ignored

pleas from the White House and sided with Byrd. But before the 15-minute roll call period was over, Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., lobbied him on the floor and convinced him to change his vote.

"The pressure was very intense right down to the wire," said Symms' spokesman Dave Pearson. "When Bob Dole is sitting there asking you to come on board with the president, it becomes, at some point, a hard decision."

The threat of a presidential veto appeared to weigh heavily on many Democrats who want the bill to become law. Sen. Joseph Biden, D-Del., said after the vote that he would have voted with Byrd had White House Chief of Staff John Sununu not "guaranteed" moments before the vote that President Bush would veto the clear air bill if the Byrd amendment were included.

have voted for Byrd's amendment only if he had been convinced that Bush would have vetoed the bill if the amendment was included. Bush called to thank Symms for his switch.

"Basically, it's a fairness issue," Symms said on "Cross Fire," noting that Byrd's amendment—only address miners. "No one's going to protect the pulp and paper workers in Lewiston, Idaho. They're going to lose their jobs just like the people who lose them from the coal mines."

Sen. Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine, a key sponsor of the bill and frequent critic of Symms' position on clean air, found himself agreeing with the Idaho senator on that count. "I oppose this particular amendment because I think it discriminates against workers outside the coal industry," Mitchell said.

Mitchell said miners would get an average of \$41,000 during the first year of unemployment, while chemical and other workers would only be entitled to \$8,500.

During coal miners' first year of unemployment, Byrd's amendment would have paid them the cash equivalent of 70 percent of their

salary and all benefits they received while employed. That figure would drop to 60 percent during the second year and 50 percent during the third.

The miners would have gotten an additional 20 percent if they agreed to participate in job retraining programs, allowing them to receive as much as 90 percent of their salary and benefits in cash. Since many of their benefits were not originally doled out in cash, they could have actually made more money during their first year of unemployment than they did while they worked.

The Byrd amendment was the last and most serious attempt to alter a compromise package worked out behind closed doors by five Democratic senators, five Republican senators, and five members of the Bush administration. The entire bill is scheduled for a vote on Tuesday.

The bill would place tough restrictions on automobiles and factories; both to reduce general air pollution and the amount of carcinogens released into the atmosphere. It would also require dirty coal-burning plants to either install scrubbers or switch to natural gas.

## Group asks women to 'just say no'

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Members of the Shoshone County Pro-Choice Network in northern Idaho have given a new meaning to the words "Just Say No!" to convince Gov. Cecil Andrus to veto the state's abortion bill.

Spokesman Janice Puente of Wallace said her pro-choice group with some 25 members is urging all Idaho women to "say no" to their husbands or boyfriends until Andrus vetoes the most restrictive abortion legislation in the nation, the Coeur d'Alene Press reported Thursday.

The National Organization For Women has called for a boycott on Idaho's famous potatoes if Andrus signs the measure. In a letter to Andrus' wife, Carol, the group wrote: "In the wake of recent legislation banning 90 percent of abortions in Idaho as of July 1, the Shoshone County Pro-Choice Network is asking you to lead

women in an abstinence movement."

"Taking the risk of becoming pregnant in Idaho is entirely too dangerous since our predominantly male Legislature has voted to limit our personal reproductive choices."

"Since all forms of birth control have some rate of failure, we are urging all Idaho women to JUST SAY NO! until Gov. Andrus vetoes HB 625: 'Chastely Yours, Members of the Shoshone County Pro-Choice Network.'"

"We needed to involve men," Ms. Puente said. "This has always been a women's issue." She said she hopes Idaho's first lady will abide by the group's wishes. "Asked what her boyfriend thought of the new campaign, Ms. Puente said: 'He doesn't know yet, but he'll soon find out. This is a stronger boycott than the boycott against Idaho potatoes,'" she said.

## New noise rules tell truckers to lay off their 'jake brakes'

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — "New signs in the lower, westbound portion of Interstate 80 and along I-215 are admonishing truck drivers not to use their "jake brakes."  
The signs are intended to help reduce noise in residential areas, particularly along the I-215 corridor, said UDOT spokesman Kim Morris.  
Jake brake are devices that help large trucks slow down on severe downgrades, such as the 12 miles from Parleys Summit to the mouth of Parleys Canyon.  
The special brakes back up a truck's air brakes by using engine compression to slow the vehicle.  
They are engaged by the driver pushing a dashboard button or using a special gear shift, said

Reed L. Reeve, vice president of the Utah Motor Transport Association.  
Morris said the signs were ordered after UDOT commissioners received numerous complaints from people living along the I-215 corridor.  
He said the signs serve as a reminder to truckers that a noise ordinance is in effect in Utah's residential areas and that engaged jake brakes exceed noise-level standards.  
"We know that laying off jake brakes does not solve the noise problem along I-215 by itself," Morris said. "But we do believe this will take away those sharp, abrupt noise spikes that residents are complaining about."

## Early refuge fires point to another dry year with serious fire season

BOJSE (AP) — As firefighters at the Deer Flat National Wildlife Refuge mopped up the last of eight range fires that had ignited since Sunday, fire officials across Idaho were remembering last year's record fires and worrying about this summer.  
"We're concerned about the potential for another serious fire season," said Arnold Hartigan of the Boise Intergency Fire Center.  
To alert the public about the dangers of wildfires, several agencies that fight fires will sponsor the first Idaho Wildlife Prevention Week May 20-26, Hartigan said.  
The week's activities may include door-to-door canvassing of people living in areas susceptible to wildfires to tell them how to prevent brush fires, said Milt Williams of the Idaho Department of Lands.  
A combination of several factors that cannot be predicted, including wind and dry lightning, could affect the risk for fire, Hartigan said.  
But precipitation levels throughout Idaho are low, said Frank Carroll of the Boise National Forest, leaving dry vegetation ripe for burning.  
Boise is behind by one-tenth of an inch of precipitation for March. Of more concern is that the city is more than one inch of precipitation behind for the year, said Steve Brown, BIFC staff meteorologist.  
The reportedly arson-caused fires at Deer Flat near Caldwell probably would not have burned for three days under normal conditions, Williams said. "The heavier fuels (trees and logs) haven't been getting the

moisture they normally do during the winter months," he said.  
The refuge normally has one or two wild fires every spring but the refuge staff has been able to contain them in the past, said Todd Fenzl, assistant manager of the refuge.  
High winds also made the blazes difficult to fight, Fenzl said. The refuge called BIFC Tuesday afternoon after 30 mph winds blew the largest fire past a fire line.  
In all, about 25 percent of the land on the refuge burned. The largest fire burned about 200 acres of the refuge, Fenzl said.  
No people or buildings were hurt in the fire, and Fenzl said that none of the firefighters found dead animals. However, it could take as long as 15 years for the grasslands to grow back completely, Fenzl said.  
The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is investigating the fires, Fenzl said.  
Across the state, fire danger this summer will increase because of more than just the weather, Williams said.  
The increasing numbers of homes and weekend getaways in the forests could result in more fire damage to property this year, he said. People living in these areas have a false sense of security, he said.

## Budget hike needed for range work

BOISE (AP) — Continuing the dramatic improvement reported on Idaho's public lands is going to take a lot more money than Congress is currently spending, officials say.  
Congress must double the Bureau of Land Management's \$3.2 million budget in Idaho and its field staff for improving 12 million acres of rangeland, BLM officials said Wednesday.  
"To make significant strides without a budget increase, is nearly impossible," given the agency's chronic budget and staffing woes, said Bob Mitchell, Idaho BLM rangeland specialist.  
In a national report called "State of the Public Rangelands 1990, The Range of Our Vision," BLM

National Director Cy Jamison declared the nation's rangelands "are in better shape than ever before in this century."  
Jamison also set three ambitious goals for the agency:  
"To radically improve streamside and wetland habitat to the point where 75 percent are in the good-excellent category by 1997. Mitchell estimates that about 35 percent of Idaho's 4,681,549 acres of streamside habitat and 46,549 acres of wetlands are in good to excellent condition.  
To improve rangelands to the point where 40 percent are in good to excellent condition by 2009. That will require a 7 percent improvement of the 22,208 acres classed as excellent in Idaho and 1.2

million acres classed as good.  
To reduce the areas listed in "poor" condition from 16 percent to 10 percent by 2009.  
Mike Medberry, public lands coordinator for the Idaho Conservation League, applauded the BLM for setting such ambitious goals.  
"I think it's terrific," Medberry said. "This is one of the best programs I've seen. They're really trying to do something good for the land. As conservationists, we'll support them in any way we can."  
Vowing to improve streamside and wetland habitat is a key goal, Medberry said, as about 80 percent of the birds and mammals in the desert reside in those niches.

## Utility appeals fines for safety violations

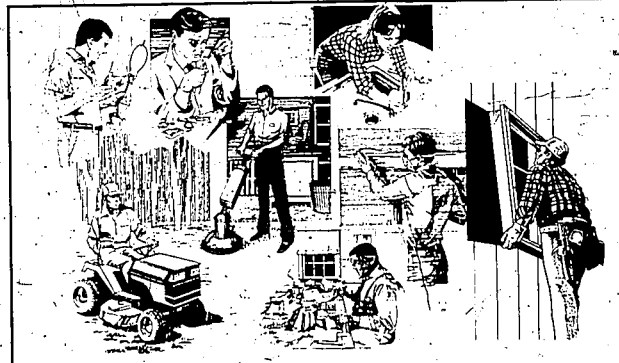

The panel ruled last month that the utility violated regulations by removing a log boom behind the dam without approval, leaving the channel unprotected.  
Two men and a boy were killed April 24 when their small boat went down the channel and was struck through a floodgate.

## Officials capture runaways after chase

ROOSEVELT, Utah (AP) — Five runaways from Green River, Wyo., were captured after leading police on a high-speed chase that reached speeds of 115 mph.  
Authorities also said Thursday that a Duchesne County sheriff's deputy fired a shot during the chase, but they are releasing no additional details. They did say that incident was under investigation.  
Utah Highway Patrol Lt. George Chino said the series of events started

about 2:15 p.m. Wednesday when a Bureau of Indian Affairs ambulance driver notified central dispatch that a pickup with five occupants was driving erratically.  
UHP Trooper Merv Gustin stopped the truck, confiscated a rifle and handgun and as he ran checks on the truck and weapons, the youngsters switched drivers from a 14-year-old girl to a 17-year-old boy and fled the scene.  
At one point, Gustin said he was

able to pull in front of the truck, but his patrol car was rammed and sustained minor damage.  
Meantime, a roadblock was set up just east of Duchesne. The driver broke through the roadblock, traveled through Duchesne and continued west on Highway 40. The chase ended about one hour later when the pickup quit in the Strawberry area, authorities said.  
The juveniles fled on foot, and troopers were able to apprehend them.

#### Umpires will go back to work under pact

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Major league umpires now say they will return to work Sunday under a new agreement that reimburses them for games canceled during the 32-day lockout and gives them three more vacation days during the regular season.

Lawyers for the umpires' union and the leagues reached the out-of-court settlement Thursday, after U.S. District Judge Norma L. Shapiro reopened a hearing on baseball's request for an order forcing the umpires back to work.

The agreement also calls for umpires to receive regular-season per diem payments beginning Saturday and for the leagues to repay them for travel deposits made before January 31, but forfeited because of the lockout.

The American and National Leagues will divide a \$48,500 payment among all umpires.

#### Tarkanian settles 13-year court dispute with NCAA

LAS VEGAS (AP) — UNLV coach Jerry Tarkanian has settled a bitter 13-year court battle with the NCAA. The agreement prevents the NCAA from pursuing a two-year suspension of Tarkanian if first sought in 1977.

It calls for Tarkanian to pay \$21,004 in court costs and legal fees incurred by the NCAA, plus nearly \$350,000 in his own legal fees.

Tarkanian said he let his son, Danny, a Las Vegas attorney, handle the legal aspects and asked to remain out of the final details so he could focus on his club's trip to the Final Four.

#### Nicklaus' first senior golf delayed 1 day by storms

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP) — Jack Nicklaus' debut on the PGA Senior Tour was pushed back a day when a series of storms washed out first-round play in the Tradition at Desert Mountain tournament on Thursday.

Senior Tour rules prohibit the playing of more than 27 holes in a day, so the tournament, originally scheduled for 72 holes, was reduced to a three-day, 54-hole format, with the final round on Sunday.

outfielder Lonnie Reiber.

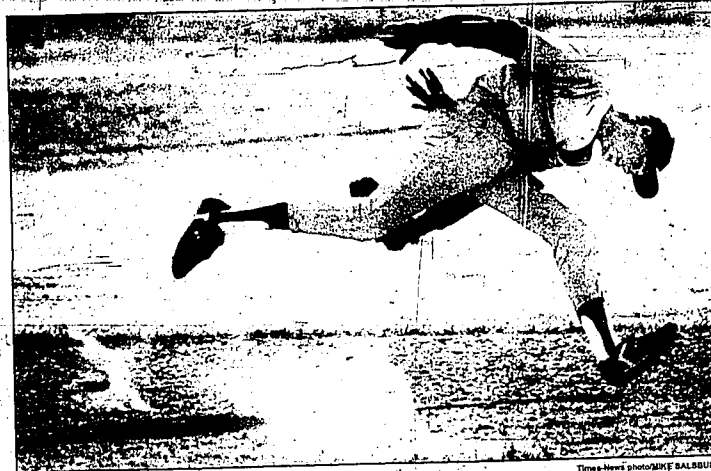

To this point CSI Coach Shawn Davis has seen his Eagles win four straight Rocky Mountain section title "by considerable margins."

TWIN FALLS — On a four-win streak and headed by the pace-setting national collegiate all-around cowboy, College of Southern Idaho's rodeo team is hoping the home arena will shove them out of reach in the Rocky Mountain collegiate race.

The Golden Eagles, sharing the spotlight for the first night with a "match" battle between former world bulldozing champion Jim Sharp, Kermit, Texas, and twice bucking bull of the year (1988 and 89) Skool Pacific Bell, will host the nine other college and university teams in the section at 8 p.m. tonight. A second session is slated for 2 p.m. Saturday and the windup is scheduled for 8 p.m. Saturday, all at the college exhibition center.

"And for the first time we have a strong girls team," Davis said.

Leading the Eagles — and the section and nation — to this point is Filer product Zane Davis, son of the coach, who has won the last three rodeo all-around titles and was runner-up in the first one. The national title is based on the best of 10 rodeos and Davis, in four to this point, already is leading the nation.

Coach Davis says the reason CSI men and women are strong is because "at the first time we have good depth on each side."

He noted that Davis is leading the section in all-around, bareback, saddle bronc

"A lot of our girls should do well. This maybe the toughest girls team we've had in years. We have six girls that are close enough in ability to make it tough to pick from among them," the coach said.

Davis said the other starting part of the three-session rodeo will be the "stock from the Western Rodeo of Folsom, Calif. This gives us a chance to test how we can do in the national college finals because most of this stock will be there. Western's bulls coming in here are second to none."

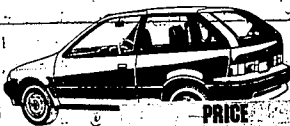

## BYU troupe will perform folk dances in Twin Falls

**TWIN FALLS** - Everyone can picture a dream job, one they'd give anything to hold, but one that seems out of reach.

Maybe the job already belongs to someone who would never give it up. Or maybe there just aren't many positions of that kind available.

At Brigham Young University, Ed Austin was a member of the International Folk Dance Ensemble when he is now traveling North America and the world as the dance troupe's artistic director.

"I can remember sitting back and saying, 'Wouldn't that be a great job?'" he says.

Aware that Jensen was not ready to retire and that only one other U.S. university has a similar folk dance program, Austin says he put the thought out of his mind.

Armed with a master's degree in recreation management, he prepared instead to pursue a career in continuing education. That decision brought him to Twin Falls 10 years ago, where he served from 1980 through 1984 as director of continuing education at the College of Southern Idaho.

But the BYU job eventually did come open, and Austin was asked to interview for the post. He won it, and he is now traveling North America and the world as the dance troupe's artistic director.

The dancers are coming to CSI's Fine Arts Auditorium for an "Arts on Tour" performance Saturday. Their show will feature dances from around the globe - Samoa, Poland, Bulgaria, England, Ireland, the Ukraine, Spain, Korea, the Philippines and the United States.

Many dances performed by the troupe are choreographed by people from the nations represented. The group's colorful costumes, too, reflect the origins of the dances.

The troupe has an international flavor for another reason. Students from other nations regularly join its ranks, and it has boasted dancers from Canada, China, the Philippines, Mexico and Denmark.

"I love it," says Austin. "I really have a lot of fun with the program. Saying dance is popular at BYU is akin to saying spring is a bit breezy in the Magic Valley. About 10,000 of the Utah school's 28,000 students annually take at least one dance class at the university.

Austin says they do so for various reasons: to fulfill physical education credit requirements, to meet people and develop social skills, to have fun.

Fewer the students are dance majors, but they're serious about dance, and competition is keen for a place in one of BYU's touring ensembles. About 110 students - including Candace Wyatt of Burley, who is in the folk dance ensemble - currently take part in one of the performing groups.

Austin theorizes that students at the predominantly Mormon school are also interested in dance because the Church of Jesus

Austin has fond memories of his days in Twin Falls. He enjoyed the continuing education post, he says, because of the variety and breadth of programs offered. He even taught an international folk dance class while here.

"I kind of slipped that in to see if there would be any interest," he says. "And it ended up running two or three times."

In addition to founding the Sawtooth Country Cloggers - a group still performing widely around the West - the Austins were active in local LDS Church activities, often making dance a part of their involvement. The couple still has many friends in the Magic Valley, Austin notes.

Delynn Peay, who with Peggy Wright is co-assistant director of the troupe, is supervising the BYU company on its current swing through the Northwest, which will end Saturday in Twin Falls. But Austin plans on joining the troupe for its show here.

"There is no way this group is performing at CSI and I'm not going to be there," says Austin, laughing.

## Festival films diverse; each conveys a moral

**SUN VALLEY** - While she didn't set out to have a theme for the 5th Sun Valley Film Festival, which starts today, Kate Wright of the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities says one nonetheless quickly developed.

"Each has some kind of moral," Wright says of the festival's offerings. The films will give Idahoans a glimpse of life in locales with which we aren't familiar - New York City, a South African township and Flint, Mich., for examples.

Many of the films portray people facing hardship or injustice. But despite some grim-sounding themes, Wright says the pictures are entertaining, thought-provoking and inspiring.

Wright has seen all the films slated for this year's festival and says "Yaaba" stands out as her favorite. "It's a universal story, an archetypal legend," she says.

What makes "Yaaba" memorable is the approach taken by its director, Idrissa Ouedraogo, who worked without sets, professional actors or a screenplay. Set in Burkina Faso, a nation in West Africa, "Yaaba" tells the story of a young girl and boy who befriend an old woman who has been scorned by their village.

Ouedraogo has explained that, since there are more than 40 different dialects in Burkina Faso, films must rely primarily on visual - not spoken - language to be understood. Wright says the director succeeded in transcending these barriers. "It's just beautiful," she adds.

Several other movies are unusually timely. "Romero" traces the story of Father Oscar Romero, archbishop of El Salvador. The screening comes just after the 10th anniversary of Romero's March 24, 1980, slaying. And "Mampansula," a remarkable anti-apartheid film, follows the recent release of Nelson Mandela.

The following movies will be shown during the festival:

- "Roger & Me," a film by Michael Moore, who offers a highly personal and funny look at Flint, Mich., a town decimated by General Motors' decision to close plants and eliminate 35,000 jobs. Moore also chronicles his frustrated efforts to meet GM chairman Roger Smith, hence the film's title. Sunday at 9 p.m. and Wednesday at 8 p.m.
- "Sidewalk Stories," a film written, produced and directed by Jim Jarmusch.

## 48 Soviet musicians to teach summer workshops in U.S.

This summer, 48 of the best-known musicians who teach at the Moscow Conservatory will be in residence at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, N.J., for a month of master classes, individual lessons, recitals and concerts that will be open to the public.

This is the first time since Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev began the policy of perestroika that so many Soviet musicians have been permitted to come to the United States at one time to teach in one place.

It is not unusual in the United States for distinguished teachers to spend several weeks each summer in residence at such facilities as those in Aspen, Colo., Marlboro, Vt., and Ravinia, Ill. But in the United States great musical stars usually do not teach, unless physical infirmities prevent them from pursuing a concert career. In the Soviet Union, all musicians — not matter how famous — are required to teach.

And the list of this summer's roster of Soviet artists at Rutgers reads like a who's who of Russia's greatest artists: pianists Lazar Berman and Evgeny Mogilevsky, violinists Igor Oistrakh and Vladimir Spivakov, cellists Daniel Shafran and Natalia Gutman, violist Yuri Bashmet, singers Irina Arkhipova and Elena Obraztsova and the composers Alfred Schnittke and Rodion Schedrin.

"My friends in Moscow are saying that musically the month of August will be a desert," said Mark Zeltser, the pianist who conceived and organized the summer festival, which will take place July 25-Aug. 25. Zeltser, who is a graduate of the Moscow Conservatory and was one of the Soviet Union's most highly regarded young pianists when he immigrated to the United States in 1977, says that he began arrangements last summer for the festival, which he hopes will become an annual event, after he returned to his native country for the first time since his emigration.

# Smokey Robinson: The tracks of his tears are easy to trace

NEW YORK (AP) — Mid-afternoon: A Manhattan hotel room. In walks Smokey Robinson: the sweater wool, the jeans dépin, the voice a mixture of silk and grain.

Rock 'n' roll's green-eyed handsome man is now 50, and his songs — his babies — have grown up, too. "Shop Around" was 30 hits' year. "My Girl" is 25. "The Tears of a Clown" is 20. But the singer, looking trim and upbeat, has aged well. And so have his songs. It's in the blood, Robinson figures, that's one reason. His father lived to 89 and Robinson swears he didn't look past 60 until a heart attack two years before his death.

Musically, Robinson has never forgotten the advice of Motown founder Berry Gordy Jr. Make the song a story, a complete thought. Be sure anyone can relate to it. And if you leave something out, give people enough so they can fill in their own ending.

Take his 1965 classic with the Miracles, "The Tracks of My Tears":

Marv Tarplin came up with the opening riff and if a guitar could cry, it would sound like this one. "With just a few notes, Marv could whip up an emotional hurricane," the singer recalled. Smokey knew the song would be about a "calf who'd been cut deep, hurt by heartache."

Add drums, bass, some harmonies, and he's ready to begin.

"People say I'm in the life of the party, 'cause I tell a joke or two. Although I might be laughing loud and hearty, deep inside I'm blue."

The riff had haunted Smokey for months. He sings carefully, his voice quivering slightly on "laughing," playing so closely off the guitar that the words seem to slide from the strings.

"Take a good look at my face, you'll see my smile seems out of place."

Smokey's singing to an old girlfriend. Since she left him, he's been trying to show that he's better off without her. But that's a lie.

He thought of the song's title after spotting a man who had cried so much that tears were streaked all over his face. Smokey turns those words into a dare, a threat; only a fool wouldn't believe him.

It's not working; she doesn't want him. Midway, there's a pause, as if everyone's waiting for his next move. A drum fill breaks the silence, and Smokey pours it on, driving his point home, the singer and band hammering down on every word.

"My smile is my make-up-I wear since my break-up with you!"

"Bring up if in the end, man," Gordy had told him. "Repeat that ... it's easy to trace the tracks of my tears; refrain until you wear it out."

His voice cracking, Smokey pleads one more time: "Take a gullible look at my face." By the end he's down on his knees, calling "baby, baby, baby."

"He (Gordy) instilled me that idea of telling a story to the degree that I was probably one of the most critical of songwriters in the history of songwriters," insisted Robinson, whose new album is called "Love, Smokey." The single "Everything You Touch" is already a hit.

"When I write a song, I don't want to just write a hit record, I want a song that in 2291 people can see that and say, 'Hey, I want to record this because it's still relevant.' I want to be Beethoven. I want to be Bach and I approach it with the same attitude."

Go call his songs symphonies for moonlight drives and candlelight suppers, concertos for what love is made of. It all starts with a phrase, Robinson says, or a riff from Tarplin. A few of the results: "Going to a Go Go," "You Really Got a Hold on Me," "I Second That Emotion," "Ooh Baby Baby."

The past decade has been uneven for this smoothest of soul singers. The highlights: the hit singles "Being With You" and "Just to See Her," which earned him a Grammy in 1988 for best R&B vocal performance; a male, induction into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 1986.

But there have been tears, real tears, easy to trace. His marriage of 27 years to Claudette Robinson, his childhood sweetheart and a former Miracles, broke up. His close friend, Marvin Gaye, was killed by his father in 1984. Robinson's own father had died before that.

And Robinson began using cocaine — heavily. "When Dad died — I called Marvin Gaye 'Dad' — when he died I was not involved in drugs to that degree, which made it even more stupid to get into them after he had gone and died. Just to see how drugs beat his life down, and what it did to him, should have been enough."

Robinson kicked drugs three years ago, but that hasn't changed him, he says, or his music. "Love, Smokey" consists of ballads, light dance songs and an experiment with rap on "Don't Wanna Be Just Physical."

"Worldwide travelers you ain't been nowhere, till you've traveled down love's road," Robinson wrote that as a teen-ager and he's never stopped revising it.

Headaches and all, Robinson insists he's always been happy, the kind of guy who could sing about "sugar and spice and everything nice" and make it sound like folk wisdom:

# Masters of the jingle make music work in 15 or 30 seconds

The next time you dismiss as inconsequential those silly jingles that periodically interrupt your prime-time TV viewing, stop and consider: How often do you catch yourself humming "Heartbeat of America" or "All Aboard Amtrak" and wondering where your brain picked up such flotsam?

Whether you like it or not — and it does smack of the Orwellian — your brain has been manipulated with meticulous care to whet your appetite for everything from auto mobiles to junk food, even as you headed for the refrigerator during commercial breaks. If you watch TV, at all, you can run, but you cannot hide; from the jingles.

Mozart may have never crafted a symphony with the care employed by jinglemasters Susan Hamilton, David Buskin and Robin Batteau. But then Mozart had to write more than 15 to 30 seconds to get his musical message across.

The jingle, born of radio and grown to vigorous adulthood in the TV era, is an art form and a masterpiece of compression. Batteau said he actually created a complete audio history of rock 'n' roll when he wrote "Heartbeat of America" for Chevrolet.

"What I thought Chevrolet meant to Americans like me was a kind of legend: the '57 Chevy," he said. "Chevrolet and rock 'n' roll, in my mind, seem to have been born together. They were twins, separated at birth, so what I set out to do in creating 'Heartbeat of America' was to re-create the birth of rock 'n' roll."

"It starts out with kind of a country-folk opening, then it goes into more of an urban black style, and it merges the two at the end, which is what rock did in the '50s. To me, that's what Chevrolet was about, and it worked."

All that in 30 seconds, and more. "In order for anything to work all of the elements have to line up in a row," said Hamilton, who has picked the jingle trade in New York for 23 years. "The style of music and the style of advertising has to fit the product category and the demographic, and the execution has to follow through. Then the advertiser has to put it in the right places, on the right shows, in the right time slot to reach the right group of people: If you get one of those elements out of line, the whole thing is defused and the thrust is lost."

All that precision emerges not from a tightly controlled high-tech lab as might be expected, but from a joyful chaos of clutter and creativity. IBB&B, Hamilton, Buskin and Batteau's company, occupies the Oscar Madison of New York offices: plastic foam containers with half-eaten lunches litter the place; Clio awards (the Emmys of advertising) are stacked at random among

scattered videotapes; and a couch, facing a dusty fireplace, bears the unmistakable signature of a cat, not present for the interview but obviously in training for the Olympics of Scratch.

Buskin and Batteau still do concerts when they aren't creating jingles. They are folk singers of the late hippie era who made several record albums for Epic and Columbia before forming the short-lived Pierce Arrow rock band. When it folded they decided that despite their counterculture roots, a bit of materialism might not be so evil after all.

In the early '80s, David decided the record business was getting tougher, and he noticed that friends of his who were doing jingles instead of records all had houses in Connecticut, so he decided to give it a try," Batteau said.

Buskin's first time out as a writer-composer for Hamilton was a Clio for the NBC prime-time theme song, and Batteau joined the firm a few months later, adding another Clio for "Heartbeat." Now they can both afford houses in Connecticut.

"I've got more generals than the Joint Chiefs of Staff," Batteau said. "General Motors, General Electric, General Foods, General Mills and, of course, the Colonel — Kentucky Fried Chicken."

They also have an advertising bonanza called diet Coke, for which Hamilton, who is successful enough to attract some of the biggest names in show business to sing her lyrics, paired the unlikely duo of Elton

John and Paula Abdul. They made their commercial debut with TV spots on the American Music Awards show and the Super Bowl. Hamilton called it a gamble that paid off.

"Even though their musical styles are different, their energy and personalities mesh," she said. "They're both energetic, spontaneous and full

of humor and style. It's the best use of celebrity talent I've ever seen."

But it takes more than talent. Buskin said it also takes the malleability to change as the times change, to assimilate more and more information in less and less time.

"If you look at old TV ads from the '50s and '60s, they did live ads,

usually with a spokesperson standing in front of the product, and they went on forever," he said. "I used to think the Smothers Brothers were very fast-paced, but then I saw 'Laugh-In' a few years later and that made the Smothers Brothers seem slow. We change as a culture. Fast and slow are relative to the perceiver. To kids, 15 seconds seems just fine."

# Drew Barrymore turns chaotic life into teen-age memoir

LOS ANGELES (AP) — How could anyone write an autobiography at the age of 15? It's possible when you consider the young life of Drew Barrymore.

At the age of 6, she was starring in Steven Spielberg's "E.T. The Extraterrestrial," the most successful film of all time. She was a drinker at 9; marijuana smoker at 10; cocaine user at 12; recovering addict at 14.

"Little Girl Lost" (Pocket Books, \$17.95) is the apt title of the teen-age's memoir. Written with Todd Gold, the book describes in harrowing detail her descent into a juvenile abyss of deception, excess and degradation. The road back has been rocky.

After a wild drunken spree, Drew underwent 87 days of rehabilitation in a hospital. Released, she embarked on another bender, flying from New York to Los Angeles on a credit card stolen from her mother. The second treatment, she hopes, will be her last.

"It was never the work that was the problem with Drew. It was the time in-between," remarks her mother, Ildiko Barry-

more. "That is the problem for many actors: How to fill that time between the jobs. The jobs give you a sense of self-worth and accomplishment."

Drew, now 15, and her mother live on a quiet street in the San Fernando Valley. One day after school, Drew sat down for an interview. Always an attractive girl, she has turned into a teen-age beauty, and she talks thoughtfully about the tumultuous

events of her young life.

Q. How can you write a life story at your age?  
A. People were saying, "You should tell your story, you should tell your story." I was really too scared to. I got a few different offers to write a book, and I chose one.

Q. It was really scary to lay your life on the line. You don't know what the feedback is going to be. Will it be positive or negative? I took the risk.

Q. Did you realize you would have to live through the bad periods again?

A. It was scary in the fact that you would have to bring up these issues you had already dealt with, or are scared to deal with again. But I just focused on positive energy and went with the flow.

Q. How do you answer those who might say you're writing the book for exploitation or publicity?

A. I certainly wasn't looking for publicity, because I'd gotten enough before I wrote the book. I know exactly why I wrote it. There's a lot of parents with kids who may not be addicts or alcoholics but who can relate to what I've gone through.

they could know that they're not alone. That was real comforting to me, to know that I'm not alone in this situation that I'm going through.

Q. Was one of your problems that you have spent most of your life in an adult world?

A. I don't think it really helped. But it was more me, in wanting to fit in so badly and to be at their level so badly. I thought that was what I was paddling to do.

Q. Did Steven Spielberg have an important influence on you?

A. He's probably the most important male ever in my life. He means everything to me. He's given me a lot of experience, a lot of good advice, the nurturing I never got from my dad. He filled a lot of empty spaces just by being there.

Q. What was your relationship to your father?

A. The little bit of relationship that there was was very abusive and just chaotic. Even though it was like that, I just wasn't going to accept that he wasn't going to come back. I had this fantasy in my mind, that I was going to have "Father Knows

Best" walk through the door. I wanted that so bad, and I wasn't going to face reality that it wasn't going to happen.

Q. What was your lowest point?  
A. Probably when I went back into rehab the last time. I had hit many emotional bottoms, but there was always 1 percent of me out of 100 that thought I would make it out. This time, I honestly did not think I would make it out. Through sheer love of people I cared about and my own wanting it for nobody but myself, I worked through it. But it was really scary.

Q. What is your life like today?  
A. It's very calm and mellow. There are times when it's in the fast lane, and there are times when it's in the slow-o-way lane. I'm usually somewhere in-between, which is where I always wanted to be. I'm living life one day at a time. I go to meetings, I go to movies, I act stupid. I'm not afraid to be my age anymore. Then there are times when I act like 20.

Q. I was always so scared to ever, ever, ever going to act my age, scared what people would think. Now I really don't care, because I have fun.

# Marx mania inspires 'research facility'

NEW HOPE, Pa. (AP) — This must be Fredonia. That's Fredonia, with two e's, not to be confused with Fredonia, N.Y., probably to be confused with the mythical land of the Marx movie "Duck Soup," and the home of current "Marxist" thought, The Fredonia Gazette magazine.

A bedroom, a bathroom, a living room and dining area is all there is, but seemingly every square inch of Paul Wesolowski's poster-plastered condo is a memorial to the work of the Marx Brothers.

Movie posters in the entry staircase make clear his commitment to Groucho, Harpo and Chico. And Zeppo. And don't forget Gummo. Oh, yes, there's also Manfred, who died at age 3. You come to learn such "things" during a visit with Wesolowski.

Drop by and half expect Groucho to come shuffling through as Hugo Z. Hackenbush or Otis B. Driftwood, cigar in hand. Of course he won't, but there are enough Groucho glasses — frame, nose, eyebrows and mustache — in Wesolowski's bedroom ceiling to satisfy a crowd of Groucho wannabes.

"I was flabbergasted," said Maxine Marx, Chico's daughter.

Oh sure, she keeps albums, but her trip to Wesolowski's Marx Brothers shrine in 1988 was another matter.

"I said, 'This is my family, and this would drive me bonkers,'" she recalls.

Wesolowski's interest in the Marx Brothers so impressed Groucho biographer Hester Arco that it led to a 10-day visit with the comedian — who picked up the tab — eight months before he died in 1977 at age 89.

"He walked very slowly. His speech was slurred," Wesolowski said. "But mentally, he was still sharp."

When Arco told Marx he would show Wesolowski and a friend around the Beverly Hills house, Groucho quipped: "Good, show 'em the servants' entrance. Better yet, show 'em the servants' exit."

What had caught Arco's eye was Wesolowski's research. So drawn was Wesolowski to the Marx Brothers after seeing "Duck Soup" on television in 1974 that he left his tracks in libraries across the country.

"I stayed up and I watched it and thought it was the funniest movie I'd ever seen," Wesolowski said.

When he could find free time from his accounting studies at St. Joseph's University, he looked up Marx Brothers information. He and a friend celebrated graduation in 1978 by spending a month visiting libraries in cities where the brothers performed. He kept filing material away, not really sure what he'd do

with it.

The result is research and a collection. Wesolowski bills as "the most complete Marx Brothers research facility on this planet." He did at least wait several years to see if he'd run across something closer.

"In the past couple of years I've decided that there is nobody else," he said.

"He's received calls from magazines and quiz shows to verify Marx facts or quotes. He's not afraid to correct even Maxine Marx, who remembers his admiration after she gave a lecture. "He said, 'You gave a wrong date.'"

Even if Wesolowski can find evidence of his admitted obsession behind the couch (where more old movie posters await a chance for display), a fellow Marx fan sealed it with a chance meeting in London of all places.

There, after searching through book stores for Marx Brothers books, he came upon a cinema book store that had not only the books he wanted, but also another customer asking the shopkeeper if a Marx Brothers expert from Pennsylvania named Paul Wesolowski had ever come in the store. The customer turned out to be a Fredonia Gazette subscriber in Great

Britain.

"I said, 'He's in your store right now,'" Wesolowski said.

"That was the most bizarre coincidence of my life. That's what I'm talking about when I talk about the fun of collecting."

Marx Brothers movie posters and lobby cards line Wesolowski's apartment, wall to wall, floor to ceiling. In varying sizes and colors and languages, they bill "Animal Crackers," "A Night in Casablanca," "Love Happy," "A Day at the Races" and other films.

"It makes it real easy when I want to rearrange the furniture," Wesolowski said.

These items don't include Groucho's personal brass cufflinks (a gift to Wesolowski from Groucho's sister-in-law), the Groucho clock with eyes swinging back and forth like a pendulum, the Groucho hat rack, puppets and wooden and ceramic figurines or the red Marx Brothers "At the Circus" sleeping bag from France.

He also had street signs made, with names of the brothers and characters from their movies. Now, Hackenbush Expressway running through the living room, which shows off his time and effort.

"Spending 10 days with Groucho made it all worthwhile," he said.

# Disney no-ad policy for movie theaters stirs up controversy

HOLLYWOOD — The Walt Disney Co. may have instituted a new no-on-screen advertising policy with its release of "Pretty Woman," but it doesn't mean ads are going to disappear from the theaters.

Disney's policy has ignited a debate in the film industry — one that has set Disney apart from the seven other major studios, divided ranks of movie theater operators between those who show ads and those who don't and set up a gray area for the theaters that will continue to show ads, but only in front of non-Disney movies.

Then there are the exceptions to the Disney rule, like slides that are placed on screens before the lights go down or for theaters which have pre-existing advertising contracts that must run their course.

Beyond those, there is the question of what constitutes an on-screen ad? Are they the slides shown on screens before the lights go down? The spots for Coca-Cola that precede a feature film? The previews of coming attractions? The casually placed Sony TV or Chevrolet Camaro or trip to Walt Disney World that may find their way into the story of a movie?

One theater chain representative, speaking on the condition that he not be named, asked: "Where do you draw the line? If you restrict ads from the screen, do you also restrict ads in the lobbies? And what about those subtle plugs you see for products in the movies themselves?"

Richard Cook, president of Disney's Buena Vista Pictures Distribution, makes a distinction between ads for products and ads for other movies — usually known as trailers or previews. "Audiences want to see trailers. It's a welcome addition to the experience," he said. "(The difference is) you're talking about motion pictures to movie-goers."

Cook said his office received "hundreds and hundreds" of calls and letters of support from the ticket-buying public in the days after Disney announced the new policy to exhibitors gathered last month in Las Vegas, Nev., for the ShoWest convention. "We had five boxloads of letters," said Cook, adding that all you have to do to gauge an audience's feelings about ads is sit in a theater with them and listen to their hiss.

Disney is in a strong position right now to enforce its policy, exhibitors and others in the business agree. The studio has an apparently strong slate of upcoming films, and commercials

were only being shown in about half of the nation's estimated 23,000 first-run theaters anyway.

But despite the huge public support for Disney's position, the studio isn't exactly leading a charge. None of the other seven major studios has spoken out against in-theater advertising, and when contacted by the Los Angeles Times for this story, none was anxious to throw in with Disney.

"I applaud (the policy) as a consumer," 20th Century Fox marketing and distribution chief Tom Sherak said. "But it's not up to me to tell them (theater owners) that they should or shouldn't do it. It has to come from the patronage. Exhibitors should sit in their theaters and see what the public sees. They might see that they might be hurting themselves in the long run."

Cook says the realities of the market will ultimately determine the fate of screen advertising. With theater admissions relatively static for the last 10 years, it cannot afford to risk

erosion by giving them something they clearly don't want. In some parts of the country, he says, audiences are having to sit through eight to 10 minutes of commercials before the feature begins.

Privately, some of Disney's distribution rivals call the no-ads policy a blatant public relations ploy. The move was also seen by some industry observers as a well-aimed volley in Disney's increasingly public feud with MCA-Universal.

MCA owns a 50 percent non-controlling interest in Toronto-based Cineplex Odeon, the second-largest theater chain in North America. In most of its 1,930 theaters, the chain shows commercials.

Jo Mira Clodman, Cineplex vice president of corporate communications, confirmed that among the ads shown on Cineplex screens — even those for the relatively new Universal Studios Florida theme park, a direct rival to the nearby Walt Disney World complex.

Cook, in response to a question about the timing of the Disney policy, said, "The impetus was not any one ad in particular." He said it is the concept of screen advertising that is the issue.

The lone exception to Disney's policy is the use of slide ads shown during intermissions. In addition to plugs for the local car wash and video store, the "pre-screening" slides include public service announcements, trivia games and promotions. Cook says Disney's policy

doesn't kick in until the lights go down and the movie-going experience begins, so slides are fine.

Because of pre-existing contracts, some people seeing "Pretty Woman" over the weekend may have seen commercial. Disney could not say how many of the 1,325 theaters where "Pretty Woman" is booked had such contracts. But when those contracts expire, it's a new, commercial-free game in Disney's world.

Last week, the nation's largest

theater chain, the 2,700-screen Denver-based United Artists Theater Circuit, announced that it will go along with the Disney advertising ban, but only on the screens where Disney films are shown.

As for the bulk of the United Artists theaters where Disney films are not shown, John Neal, vice president of communications for parent company United Artists Entertainment, said the theaters will continue to show ads for Coca-Cola, which it has been running since January.

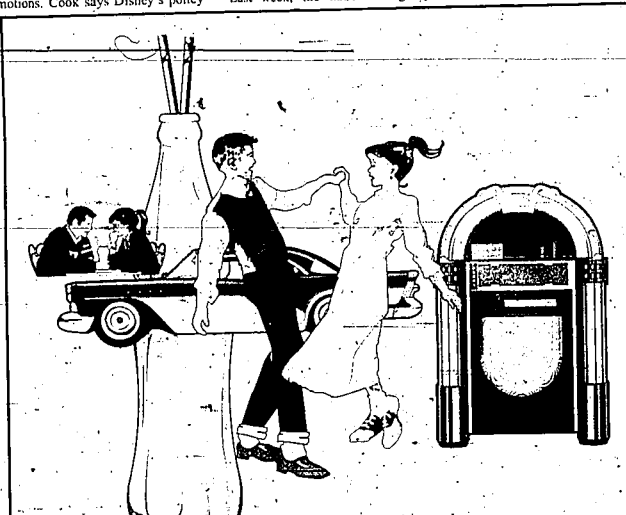

# Plot triumphs over special effects in 'Hunt for Red October'

The following are reviews of movies now showing the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**THE HUNT FOR RED OCTOBER (PG).** There's an admirable smartness to this underwater thriller. Its film makers know that a little technology goes a very long way, and if they hope to keep an audi-

ence's attention they'll have to do it with story, not hardware. Director John McTiernan, whose signature is sleek action ("Die Hard"), has first-rate cast (including Sean Connery, Alec Baldwin, Scott Glenn and Sam Neill) and writers Larry Ferguson, and Donald Stewart have managed this nicely. You may not be limp from accumulated tension when this hunt is over, but its cautiously up-

beat global message leaves a satisfying glow, and the premise is a crack-  
crack one.

**BORN ON THE FOURTH OF JULY (R).** No one can doubt director Oliver Stone's sincerity, any more than he can his talent for bravura emotionalism. Possibly because Stone emphasizes so enormously with his main character—co-writer Ron Kovic, who came back from Vietnam at age 21 paralyzed from the chest down—the di-

rector has lost the specificity that made "Platoon" so electrifying. His scenes, and their ironic juxtaposing, explode like land mines. Tom Cruise delivers fierce physicality, empathy, the ability to work full throttle and a quality of defenselessness that is terribly touching.

**DRIVING MISS DAISY (PG).** Morgan Freeman gives an immense, gracious and subtle performance as an Atlanta chauffeur in this rather musty adaptation of Alfred Uhry's

1987 Pulitzer Prize-winning play. Jessica Tandy is the cranky widow. Their performances give the film a human gravity that helps counteract the too-measured pacing, its tone of civic uplift. Directed by Bruce Beresford from Uhry's adaptation of his play.

**JOB VS. THE VOLCANO (PG).** This stily stylized production opens with Hanks' Joe Banks marching off to his wretched job at a medical supply conglom and sends him off on a journey worthy of Robert Louis Stevenson and Maurice Sendak, with just a hint of David Byrne thrown in for the sheer surreal unexpectedness of it. The effortless pair-

ing of Tom Hanks and Meg Ryan makes this contemporary fable a thoroughly engaging delight and marks screenwriter John Patrick Shanley as a director with a nicely preposterous sense of storytelling and a gorgeous eye.

**LORD OF THE FLIES (R).** Trying to update, Americanize and "universalize" William Golding's classic moral-fable about castaway boys reverting to savagery, the film makes its director's point—make it as overtly explicit, trivialize it. The movie has a glassy, dazed, "high culture" sheen but no primordial depths or passion.

## 'Blue Steel' vacuous, visually astute

**HOLLYWOOD**—Director Kathryn Bigelow is a nifty visual stylist; she proved that with "Near Dark," her fearless vampire biker movie. Unfortunately, style needs a little substance to keep it from creeping around looking empty, and the story of "Blue Steel" is lofty, implausible twaddle that sinks whatever ideas Bigelow hoped to investigate.

To follow where she would lead us—to a world of high gloss and low smarts, of naked, wounded villains who can evade entire squadrons of police, and lines like "Death is the greatest kick of all; that's why they save it for last"—we first have to surrender every shred of common sense.

Bigelow and co-screenwriter Eric Red ("The Hitler") seem to harbor disdain for the weak made story. Or even the half-cooked one. Consider the incident that sparks everything: On her first night of duty, rookie cop Megan Turner (Jamie Lee Curtis) spots trouble in a Manhattan market. Creeping around through the back, she finds a gunman at the forehead of a young cashier and several more shoppers on their stomachs on the floor. After giving him proper warning and as he draws on her, the rookie blasts this menace straight back through a plate-glass window.

His gun makes a nice triple arc and lands in front of another prone shopper, Eugene Hunt (Ron Silver), who steals it. For overreacting and because no gun can be found, Curtis is suspended. Police investigators say the cashier was so dazed he didn't know whether it was a knife or a gun between his eyes that entire time.

Whoa now. This is our premise!

There were at least two other witnesses not counting Eugene, quiveringly busy with his own agenda. You suspend a shiny new police woman without questioning other handgans about the size of Red October.

Bigelow is working over a couple of obvious but not-uninteresting ideas here: She's reversing the usual cop movie so that the sometimes corrupt police become the guardians of order and the privileged people they protect are the animals. Secondly, there's Henry Higgins' exasperated question: "Why can't a woman be more like a man?" Megan Turner can be. She's got the hat, the badge, the trendy black brogans and in the movie's most smirking analogy, she's got the gun. Then as the movie progresses, Curtis' angular face is photographed to look more and more tomboy-androgynous.

But serving up these ideas is about as much investigation as Bigelow gives them; they don't become clarified or deeper or even terribly meaningful. And in the time since "Near Dark," her style has inflated preposterously. Lushly photographed though it is by Amir Mokri, "Blue Steel" clangs and reverberates, its Brian Friedel score raining cues, like boulders. And its dialogue is elephantine pretentious.

Curtis somehow survives all this with a strong, honest and winning performance while Silver, so com-

plex and believable in "Enemies, a Love Story," was encouraged to take a chain saw to the scenery here.

Sadly, "Blue Steel" (rated R) only gets more and more foolish. Taking the dead man's .44 magnum, Eugene scratches Megan's name onto its shell casings and begins blowing away the population of New York at random, more or less in homage to her.

At the same time, Eugene deliberately meets and begins to court Megan, who's been allowed back on the force to try to lure out the killer. At first she's intrigued; she's straight blue-collar, he's a davening successful commodities broker. Then, in his Upper East Side apartment, as Eugene begins kissing her, he asks to see her gun, begging her to take it out, to hold it in two hands and to understand that he and she are two halves of a whole, that Megan would do what I'd do if you knew yourself better."

The appalled Megan realizes what she's got here, but virtually no other law-enforcement official in greater New York will listen to her, except


one homicide detective (Clancy Brown) whose badge should read Love Interest. And now the movie plunges into urban chase overdrive, with wet, patent-leather nighttime streets, arcs of shattered glass and handgans about the size of Red October.

Bigelow is working over a couple of obvious but not-uninteresting ideas here: She's reversing the usual cop movie so that the sometimes corrupt police become the guardians of order and the privileged people they protect are the animals. Secondly, there's Henry Higgins' exasperated question: "Why can't a woman be more like a man?" Megan Turner can be. ## THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

A good catchword can obscure analysts for 50 years... Wendell L. Wilkie.

"Third hand high" is a precept learned early by all bridge players. Unfortunately there is always an exception to even the best of "rules," and today's game offers the "challenge."

Playing in a Swiss-team match in a South Texas tournament, one East player had 10-10 after dummy played low. South took his ace and led a diamond to West's king, and another heart lead knocked out dummy's king. Another diamond was led with apprehension, and South's prayers were answered. West won, but the heart suit was his stinky game.

When Jan Wendell of Rockport, Texas, held the East cards, he saw the possibility of a block in hearts. And instead of playing an automatic "third hand high," Jan gave a heart encouragement to the club suit. The East-West knew where the jack was when West first trick and South's maximum was only eight tricks.

Why didn't North-South play in the ace five diamonds instead of the three no-trump? Usually, with your partner's strong suit, you use your own suit as the trumps. The ace five diamonds is easier than an 11-trick one.

# 'Home Videos' takes country by storm with the follies of ordinary Americans

By CONNIE PASSALACQUA

"Batman." "Laugh-In." "Miami Vice." Only in America can sudden, overwhelming success turn a TV series into a cultural icon.

Add to the list ABC's overwhelmingly popular Sunday-night series "America's Funniest Home Videos." The show was barely a concept in producer Vin Di Bona's mind last spring, while the networks were buffing and polishing the pilots for their new fall sitcoms and dramas. This spring, while many of these shows are already pushing up daisies, "America's Funniest Home Videos" reigns supreme as a Top Ten ratings hit, which recently shot all the way up to No. 1.

It is such a hit that a February rebroadcast of the series debut took down even CBS's formerly unsinkable "60 Minutes."

In telling the show's overnight-success story, Di Bona, formerly a producer of "Entertainment Tonight" and "Animal Crack-Ups," hardly exhibits a giant-sized ego. He admits right away that the idea for the show wasn't originally his, but came from Japan's Tokyo Broadcasting System, which had also originated "Animal Crack-Ups."

"Last April, my wife, Gina, and I went to (an international TV convention) in the South of France," Di Bona says. "I had been alerted by Toyko (Broadcasting) to look out for this home-video thing, which had been on the air as part of a variety show in Japan for three or four years. Independently, Gina was wandering among the booths, and

she came upon one where hundreds of people were gathered around a screen, laughing. That was it. She came back to me and said, 'I think you have a new show.'" (Di Bona has granted his wife the title of creative consultant on "America's Funniest Home Videos.")

From there, Di Bona pulled together a 10-minute presentation and went to ABC. "In August, Hank Cohen, who was then the executive in charge, looked at it, and four minutes in he said, 'We're going to sell this show,'" Di Bona recalls. His Japanese contacts told him that the new show would probably take at least nine months to pull together. But since ABC wanted to air it during the November sweeps, Di Bona pulled it together in barely three months. Hosted by Bob Saget (Danny Tanner on ABC's "Full House"), the show became an instant hit at its Thanksgiving-week debut.

Di Bona credits his staff of 60 for the swiftness with which he pulled together the first show. "Everyone thinks this is an easy and cheap

show to produce, because all our tapes are submitted by the viewers," he says. "But it's not that way at all. This isn't a show with low overhead."

Di Bona's description of the making of just one episode sounds like something out of Charlie Chaplin's "Modern Times": "We get anywhere from 500 to 1,500 tapes a day. We have 16 screeners. We usually work from 8 a.m. to 4 a.m. — 17-hour days. When a screener finds something good, it's like discovering a new chemical. Screeners have bells on their desks, and when they've come on something hot, they ring the bell, and we all come running. We go through 4,000 tapes on average to make one episode. So far, I think we've screened a total of 35,000 tapes."

# Stringfield skips dues to star in soap

When Sherry Stringfield, the new and improved Blake Lindsey on "Guiding Light," graduated from SUNY-Purchase's Acting Conservatory, she was cautioned that it was a long, hard road she was about to travel. Prepared to pay her dues and work endless hours as a waitress or salesgirl, Sherry embarked on her quest for fame and fortune in the fickle world of show business. "I was so happy that it was a part in a soap opera because everyone could just tune in and see me. Getting the role was

# Programs targeted at young viewers falter; 'Cosby Show' leads ratings

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A CBS pitch for younger viewers was, like, totally shredded, and ABC's teenage doctor, "Doogie Howser, M.D.," failed to cure rating ills in a special episode after "America's Funniest Home Videos," according to Nielsen numbers released Tuesday.

"The Cosby Show," on NBC was first in the ratings for the week ended March 25, followed by a repeat of "America's Funniest Home Videos" and "Rosanne," both on ABC, according to the figures from A.C. Nielsen Co.

For the week, NBC was first in the ratings with a 14.2 average, followed by ABC with 12.2 and CBS with 8.9. Each ratings point represents 921,000 homes.

The week included late-season new show premieres on CBS and NBC and a television movie on Fox to introduce a new series, "The Outsiders."

On CBS, Wednesday viewers got their first look at the new half-hour situation comedy "Normal Life," starring Moon Zett and Dweczi Zappa, the daughter and son of musician Frank Zappa. The two play the son and daughter of a playwright.

"Normal Life" was paired with the debut of "Sydney," a 30-minute

## Once again, Academy Awards telecast proves unconquerable

LOS ANGELES — It's probably the nature of the beast: The annual Academy Awards telecast simply cannot be housebroken.

The good intentions, the resolve that the mistakes of last year's tacky, overstuffed show wouldn't be repeated, seem to have gone for naught.

Monday night's 62nd Annual Academy Awards on ABC, stretched to a mind-boggling three hours and 34 minutes, was as bloated and boring as ever.

Are the Academy Awards unconquerable? Perhaps it's best to sit back, accept that they will never improve and enjoy it? Still ...

Even Billy Crystal, a wonderful choice for host, seemed overwired at times. He started out very funny. His best line came after 330 movies were represented in an opening montage celebrating 100 years of filmmaking. "And according to Paramount, not a one of them has

gone into profit," he said.

The reference to a lawsuit against Paramount over film profits was much appreciated by the Los Angeles Music Center audience.

Crystal's lampoon of the Oscar's usual overheated opening production number was shorter than most thank-you speeches. And much more enjoyable. That dancing, singing dinosaur was eliminated from the telecast; thank goodness for small favors.

Unfortunately, Crystal ran out of material as quickly as the telecast ran out of steam.

At least Snow-White showed up only briefly as a cartoon in the opening montage. Her appearance last year in the opening production number was protested by the Disney Studio.

The Motion Picture Academy, obviously embarrassed by last year's show, began the show with a speech by Academy President Karl Malden. This attempt to introduce some dignity to the show nearly put a deadly pall over the whole

proceeding.

The Oscar telecast for the first time went international, with remote appearances from London, Tokyo, Australia, Buenos Aires and Moscow. Its purpose was to show that the film industry is truly international.

What it actually accomplished was to add another excruciating hour to the show. The only remote that was remotely interesting was the touching birthday tribute from Tokyo to Japanese director Akira Kurosawa.

On the other hand, it was feared for a time that Howard Koch, in accepting the Jean Hersholt Humanitarian Award, was going to break out his home movies.

Most other winners, thankfully, were limited to 45 seconds.

Oddly enough, some of the best things about the telecast were the commercials by Prudential Bache paying homage to movie classics. A suggestion: Let the maker of those commercials produce next year's Oscar telecast.

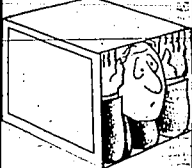

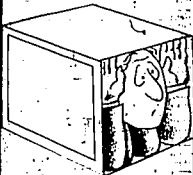
