## U.S., Japan finish trade

WASHINGTON — U.S. and Japanese negotiators on Thursday announced completion of an unprecedented agreement pledging to reduce trade frictions by making broad-based reforms in the economies of both countries.

The agreement, reached after four days of marathon discussions, set forth a complex set of proposals aimed at lowering America's huge \$49 billion deficit with Japan by attacking structural barriers to trade.

Under Secretary of State Richard McCormack, the leader of the U.S. negotiating team, said the talks had produced "substantive progress" in resolving trade differences between the two economic superpowers.

A White House statement praised the agreement as "an important way station along the road leading to a strengthened U.S.-Japan relationship."

In Tokyo, Japanese Prime Minister Toshiki Kaifu said "carrying out some of the deep economic reforms promised in the talks could be painful, but in the end would improve the lives of the Japanese."

The talks were unprecedented in their scope because they aimed not at boosting sales for specific foreign products but at correcting broad barriers to trade in both countries.

For the first time, representatives of sovereign states drew up detailed lists of the economic shortcomings, in the other nation and demanded changes.

The administration chose not to accept the most politically sensitive Japanese recommendations to limit Americans' use of credit cards, boost gasoline taxes and scrap tax deductions for home mortgages.

Instead, the administration pledged to increase efforts to improve America's education system and pointed to proposals the White House already is pushing to cut the federal budget deficit and to provide tax credits for increased personal savings.

Among the pledges made by the Japanese: To deregulate Japan's distribution system, including a gradual relaxation of restrictions on the establishment of large retail stores. Such a move would allow U.S. and other foreign retailers to open outlets in Japan.

To increase enforcement of antitrust laws with tougher penalties to discourage bid-rigging and other collusive practices by Japanese corporations.

To boost government spending on public works projects, thus expanding the volume of work on which American firms could bid.

Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., and chairman of a Senate trade subcommittee, said he was impressed with the newfound willingness by the Japanese to make concessions but he and other members of Congress said it was "critical" for the Japanese words to be followed by action.

Sen. John Danforth, R-Mo., said he was concerned because there was no enforcement mechanism to make sure Japan lives up to its commitments. "In any commercial agreement with Japan, seeing is believing," he said.

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## Many issues, little time before summit

WASHINGTON — The United States and the Soviet Union have seven short weeks to put together a summit package of nuclear weapons cutbacks and to find common ground on German unification and ways to awaken the sluggish Soviet economy.

Buras Secretary of State James A. Baker III and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze plodded past the midpoint of this week's heavy pre-summit agenda, the outlook for meeting the May 30 deadline with solid accomplishments was uncertain.

In fact, the summit may turn out to be less of a ceremonial signing event than a working session for President Bush and Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

"It's going to be a working visit, no time for sightseeing," is the way Genadi Gerasimov, the spokesman for the Soviet foreign ministry, described Gorbachev's trip here.

Whatever reasons Gorbachev had for advancing the summit — it was initially planned for the second half of June — the effect is to put additional pressure on negotia-

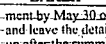
tors grappling with three of the most complicated arms control treaties in history.

And officials on both sides suggested on Thursday chances of finishing the accord to cut long-range nuclear missiles by the time Gorbachev comes here to see

Buras virtually nil. The most optimistic projection is that Baker and Shevardnadze, and negotiators meeting in Geneva, will be able to reach agreement by May 30 on the key issues and leave the details to be mopped up after the summit.

Taking into account it's in seven weeks, Yuri Nazarkin, the chief Soviet START negotiator, said, "it's impractical, I think, to expect it to be signed at the summit. But definitely, all the major issues should be resolved, making the treaty ready for signing."

## Clear Lake Grade

### \$3 million for new road included in state package given governor's approval

BUHL — Things are looking up for the Clear Lake Grade and the people who depend on it.

Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday signed a \$15.5 million state aid package for local road and bridge repairs.

"This legislation directs financial resources toward some of the most critical road and bridge projects in Idaho," Andrus stated in a press release. "This is admittedly an unusual way to finance these repairs, but I understand and support the fact that the legislature was responding to a pressing need."

House Bill 905 allocates money to finance 29 construction projects, including a new road to replace the crumbling Clear Lake Grade north of Buhl.

"We're very excited," said Bill Specht, president of the Buhl Economic Council. "It's something the community has worked very hard on."

Gooding's West Point Highway District will receive the \$3 million

needed to replace the crucial farm-to-market road.

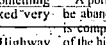
Specht said the Clear Lake Grade accommodates more than \$100 million in commerce every year — everything that's hauled over the road in an agricultural community," Specht said.

The road has deteriorated to the point where the economic growth the city worried the highway district would have to impose load limits, or even close the grade.

The money means the West Point Highway District will be able to construct a new road up the north canyon wall. The new road would turn east at the canyon bottom, where the existing road turns west.

A portion of the existing road will be abandoned when the new grade is completed, said Mike Madala of the highway district.

## Midwest stronger, Rockies stagnating

WASHINGTON — States in the Industrial Midwest, seemingly on their last legs as the 1980s began, are now flexing their economic muscles.

As they gain strength, Plains and Rocky Mountain states show little sign of recovering from the last recession, a private research group reported Thursday.

The study by the Corporation for Enterprise Development, a research and consulting organization, also said states on both coasts generally are in good economic health, and those in the South are improving but still have a long way to go.

Those states whose economies are healthy or improving have invented their own development policies in a "quiet revolution," rather than wait for federal solutions to evolve, according to the study.

The story is that while Washington contin-

ues to be stalemated over what we ought to do over foreign competition, the states have gone ahead and invented their own strategies," corporation president Doug Ross said.

The findings are included in the fourth annual "Development Report Card for the States," funded by corporations, labor unions and private foundations. In it, the states are graded according to economic performance, business vitality, economic capacity and government policy.

The study said that for more than 40 years, states relied on "smokestack chasing," or luring out-of-state businesses with incentives and subsidies, to build their economies.

By the late 1970s that approach no longer worked as "dramatic changes in communication, transportation and technology" often made it impossible for U.S. businesses to meet over-

seas competition, the study said. States thus began creating "home-grown" strategies that focused mostly on new and existing businesses and "now encourage and support indigenous development — modernizing infrastructure, promoting their expansion and product development, educating their workers and facilitating start-ups," Ross explained.

Here is how the corporation views the various regional economies: — INDUSTRIAL MIDWEST: Recovering from long-decline. Condition: Still improving satisfactorily.

Less than 10 years after the early 1980s recession nearly did them in, the "Rust Belt" states are resurgent. It may never again be the world's industrial center, but it is showing signs of its old muscle. Pennsylvania, with two As and two Bs this year, leads the region. Other Great Lakes states earn mostly good or average grades. Overall, the region's economic perfor-

## Expert says Americans wrecking environment

PITTSBURGH — One American does 20 to 100 times more damage to the planet than one person in the Third World, and one rich American causes 1,000 times more destruction, a population expert said Thursday.

"The most serious population problem in the world is right here in the United States," said Paul Ehrlich, Stanford University professor of population studies.

"The most common misperception of the population problem is that it's a problem of poor Indians who don't know how to use condoms," he said. "Actually, the problem in the world

is that there are too many rich people." Ehrlich and other environmentalists spoke to about 1,200 students, teachers, garden-club members and corporate executives at a conference on solving global environmental problems.

He said the current world population of 5.3 billion is 1.8 billion more than in 1968 when he first proposed the problems of overpopulation in his book, "The Population Bomb."

He and his wife, Anne Hurland Ehrlich, who co-wrote the current book, "The Population Explosion," say this decade will be the turning point for global environmental problems.

## Study claims post-abortion mental health problems are rare

WASHINGTON — Legal, voluntary abortion in the first trimester of pregnancy does not threaten most women's mental health or cause them great emotional distress, according to a new study.

Though some women may feel regret, sadness or guilt, "the weight of the evidence from scientific studies indicates that legal abortion of an unwanted pregnancy in the first trimester does not pose a psychological hazard for most women," said the study, to be published Friday in the journal Science.

Olivia Gans, director of American

Victims of Abortion, called the study "a manipulation" of data from earlier studies. "When you look at these studies, you can twist them any way you need to, to get whatever conclusion you want," she said.

The new study was commissioned by the American Psychological Association, which asked six experts to examine all current research and determine if a valid conclusion could be drawn about post-abortion psychological effects.

Nancy S. Adler, a University of California-San Francisco professor of psychiatry and lead author of the report, said a panel surveyed more than 200 studies and

found only "about 19 or 20" that met solid scientific standards. "Once those studies were examined, she said, the conclusion was really quite clear."

The APA convened the panel in 1988 after then-Sydney General C. Everett Koop reported that studies were inadequate to draw final conclusions about the effects of abortion on women's mental health.

In the Science report, the authors said case studies have shown that some women do experience "severe distress," after abortion and require psychiatric care. But for the vast majority of women who have voluntary abortions, "severe negative

reactions are infrequent in the immediate and short-term aftermath," the study said. The greatest distress, the study found, "is likely to be before the abortion."

"Severe negative reactions after abortions are rare and can best be understood in the framework of coping with a traumatic event," the study said.

"I feel comfortable about the conclusion that there is little psychological hazard for women," Adler said in a telephone interview. But she noted that there is a need for scientific studies that would compare the effects of abortion with that of other stressful events in life, such as divorce or death

of a family member. Adler said studies of the psychological effects of a death have shown that if there is no negative mental health response within a few months, there is little likelihood that one will develop later.

She said, "There is reason to believe that there will be very little long-term effect" from abortion.

"As a scientist, I really can't say anything beyond two years," she said. "Two years is not enough," said Gans, who said she had an abortion in 1981. "I know many years later you still have to deal with emotional debris of that experience."

# Soviet troops take over Vilnius office

MOSCOW (AP) — Armed Soviet soldiers dressed as police invaded the Lithuanian prosecutor's offices Thursday, forced employees outside and occupied the building, witnesses and spokesmen for the republic's parliament said.

Despite the military move, Lithuanian lawmakers drafted a mild message Thursday to Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev calling for a prompt start to negotiations. They wrote that they "value highly your efforts aimed at the peaceful solution of problems," but

think political talks "should not be accompanied by the willful actions of your armed forces."

Lithuania's secessionist government had accused Moscow on Wednesday of backing forces seeking its overthrow.

Lithuania, forcibly incorporated into the Soviet Union with sister Baltic states Estonia and Latvia in 1940, declared independence on March 11 and has been in a confrontation with the Kremlin since then.

Estonia is cautiously following

Lithuania's lead. On March 30, its new Parliament, declared Estonia to be under Soviet occupation and set an indefinite transition period for independence.

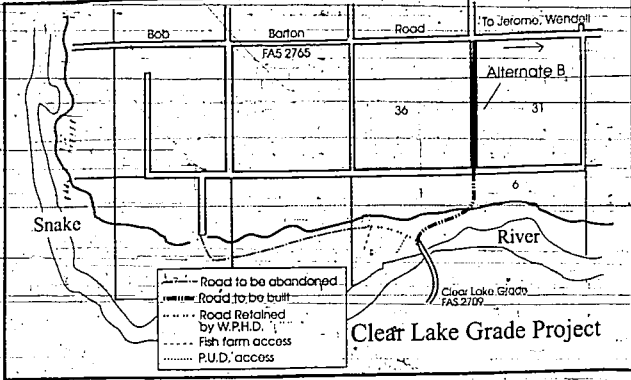
On Thursday, Estonian leaders decided to stand firm on their face of Gorbachev's wrath.

Latvia also appeared headed toward independence. Its Communist Party congress, due to open Friday, was expected to split into pro-Moscow and pro-independence factions.

# Talks make gains on Germany, Mideast

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush and Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev will meet for a superpower summit in the United States beginning May 30. U.S. and Soviet officials said Thursday as the two sides broke new ground on Germany and on the Middle East.

Accepting the principle of unifying East and West Germany, the Soviets edged away from their demand that the initiative be nonaligned, U.S. and Soviet officials reported at the end of a long day of

bargaining on tough regional issues.

And, in another potential breakthrough, the Soviets said they would consider restoring diplomatic relations with Israel and permitting the direct flight of Jews to Tel Aviv if they had assurances the refugees would not be settled on the West Bank and in East Jerusalem.

Earlier, White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater said several major agreements could emerge at the summit, including a long-sought

# Idaho receives Grade

## 3 Cs, D on its report card

WASHINGTON (AP) — Idaho received three Cs and a D on the economic report card issued Thursday by the Corporation for Enterprise Development, a private non-profit research group.

Idaho received C grades for economic performance, economic capacity and policy, and a D for business vitality.

The road could be completed by next summer, Madalena said, but he made no promises.

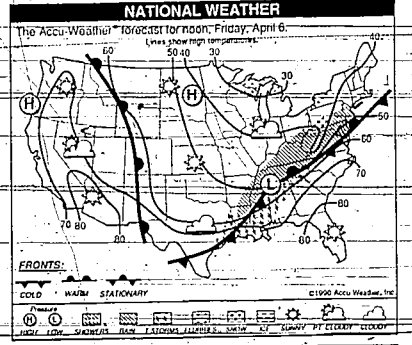
Mid-afternoon readings ranged from 53 degrees at McCall to 70 at Livingston.

The pollen count in Twin Falls Thursday, was 400 particles per cubic meter of air.

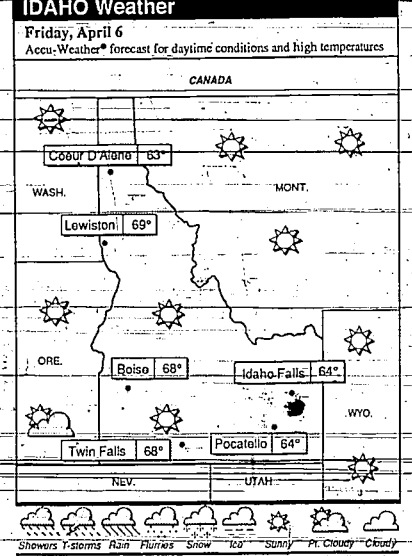
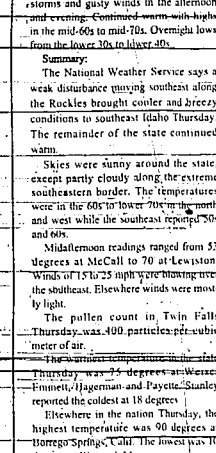
The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 75 degrees at Stanley. Emmet, Hagerman and Payette. Weather reported the coldest was 18 degrees.

"If we don't see some real action in this decade, it will probably be too late to avert some very serious problems," including inadequate food production, global warming, species extinction and deforestation, said Mrs. Ehrlich, associate director for the Center for Conservation Biology at Stanford.

Ehrlich railed against highly developed nations like the United States that he claims consume too much of the world's resources.

"The birth of a baby in the United States is something on the order of 20 to 100 times more disastrous for the life support systems of the planet as the birth of a baby in poor countries like Bangladesh or Venezuela," he said.

Most developing countries fall within the range, with Bangladesh among the poorest and Venezuela among the richest. Third World countries, Mrs. Ehrlich said.

She said she and her husband based the figures on 1987 statistics compiled by the United Nations per capita commercial energy consumption, an index used by environmentalists to measure damage to the Earth.

"If it's a (rich) baby, it could be a thousand times more," Ehrlich said.

manance is getting stronger and it shines in state policy, with all-As and Bs.

"Recent investments in technology, infrastructure and skill improvements as well as policy innovations in development finance and industry modernization have paid off in new economic strength for these states," Ross said.

PLAINS AND ROCKY MOUNTAIN STATES: Weak, state condition: Critical.

States in the Great Plains and Intermountain West, with the exception of Utah, are still lingering from the early 1980s recession. Of the 13 states that received no Report Card grade above a C, eight are in these two regions — Arizona, Idaho, Montana, Nebraska, New Mexico, North Dakota, South Dakota and Wyoming.

Few are working aggressively to revive their economies, indeed, four of the five Fs in state policy are in these two regions, along with many Ds — with the notable exceptions of Iowa and Oklahoma, which merit AS.

"These states are essentially the couch potatoes of economic innovation," Ross said. "It seems they are

simply waiting for the next economic boom to blot out the current bust. It is a wait that will be vain, given the enormous structural changes affecting our country."

NORTHEAST AND WEST COAST: Continuing in good economic health. Condition: Stable, with some troubling symptoms.

The Northeast and Pacific states continue to be the nation's strongest economically.

But Ross cautions that "despite their recent prosperity, these states show some troubling signs. The Northeast is struggling with labor shortages; the Pacific wrestling with the decline of the timber industry. We already see economic slow-downs here — and significant defense cutbacks on the horizon could further shock their systems."

SOUTH: Surprisingly healthy, guarding healthier. Condition: Good.

Of the 13 states with no As or Bs on any index this year, only five are in the South. Real progress is obvious in state policy — although limited resources slow the speed of change. Though most southern states earn Cs in policy, several still earn Ds but Virginia rates a B.

ing" later on.

Similarly, a senior U.S. official said: "It depends in some part on what we're able to do here. The desire was to resolve all the major issues by the summit meeting, and looking realistically toward completing and signing a treaty later in the year."

That would mean a second Bush-Gorbachev summit by the end of 1990, but no Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty before then.

There are knotty problems confronting the ministers and the negotiators: Among them: how to limit

crisis missiles aboard planes, submarines and surface vessels, and how to verify the cutbacks are being implemented.

The outlook is somewhat better for Bush and Gorbachev to be able to approve protocols for monitoring underground nuclear test explosions.

On the third arms control front, the two sides are in tentative agreement to slash their chemical weapons stockpiles to 20 percent of the current U.S. level. But Sergei B. Batanov, a Soviet negotiator, said there was no agreement yet on how to dispose of weapons and when to end production.

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President Bush meets with Michael Jackson at the White House

## Jackson overshadows disclosure of summit

WASHINGTON (AP) — The upcoming U.S.-Soviet summit may have been the big story of the day, but President Bush didn't let that get in the way of his opportunity to be photographed Thursday with rock star Michael Jackson.

In fact he let Jackson become part of the summit story. The black-and-silver clad singer, sporting shiny, silver ornaments on his black boots, stood at the president's side outside the Oval Office as Bush made the first comments about his newly announced May 30-June 3 summit meeting with Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

White House aides said Bush invited Jackson to the White House to congratulate him on being named entertainer of the decade by the Children's Museum in Washington.

The flamboyantly dressed Jackson, face-framed by shoulder-length curls and dark sunglasses, stood out in the palanquin of dark-suited White House aides who accompanied the president and first lady Barbara Bush to the Rose Garden for the occasion.

"I just wanted to welcome Michael Jackson here. And, named entertainer of the decade, and he has a tremendous following," Bush said before expressing his pleasure about the upcoming summit.

"He does good work — what we call the 'points of light' concept. I just wanted to bring him out here and officially welcome him to the White House, once again."

"Glad you're here, sir," Bush said, turning to the recording artist, and shaking one of his black-gloved hands.

Jackson smiled and laughed as Bush made brief remarks to reporters about the upcoming summit, but said nothing to reporters.

Meeting the president did not end the rock star's day at the White House. He also had his photo taken with Vice President Dan Quayle in Quayle's office, got a tour of the White House from Mrs. Bush, visited the Secret Service offices, and autographed some Easter-eggs for the White House annual Easter egg roll.

In a 10-minute Oval Office meeting with Bush, the singer presented the president with a collection of his recordings on compact discs.

"They had a very amiable chat," said White House liaison officer Joe Watkins. "Mrs. Bush complimented him on his boots. He said 'I like your dress.'"

The first lady wore a black-and-white checked spring suit.

Dozens of staff members gathered in the Rose Garden and on the steps of the Old Executive Office Building to catch a glimpse of Jackson.

Offices in the Old Executive, which houses Quayle's main office, were virtually emptied as workers, many of them with their children in tow, crowded the halls to see and cheer the singer.

## Launch on schedule, tests done

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — NASA finished testing the \$1.5-billion Hubble Space Telescope aboard Discovery and started final pre-countdown work Thursday, raising the space agency's hopes for a timely launch next week.

It is the most comfortable NASA officials have felt about Tuesday's launch date since a power outage interrupted the testing Monday, said George Diller, a spokesman for the space agency.

"Basically, the work's done. We're just down to the things you can't do before now anyway," Diller said.

"We're essentially on or near schedule on all of that work. I'm really not aware of anything that's unusually shaky," he said.

The countdown is scheduled to begin Saturday afternoon. Early forecasts show an 80 percent chance of weather favorable for launch Tuesday, with the weather worsening slightly during the next two days.

Functional testing of the telescope and shuttle was completed early Thursday, and the launch pad was cleared of all non-essential personnel for final preparation of the payload and orbit.

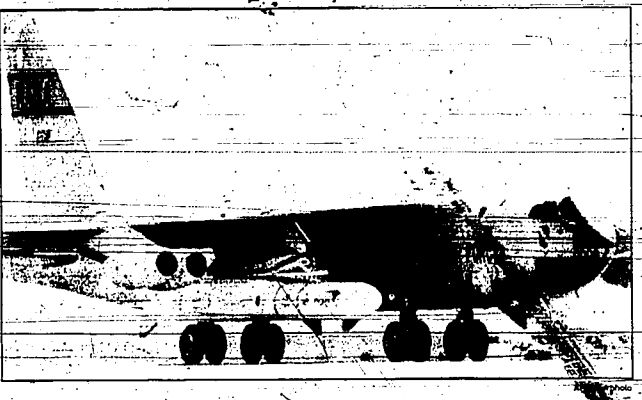
Technicians were in the middle of the 52-hour test when a power outage at Kennedy Space Center knocked out air conditioning and forced the shutdown of heat-sensitive computers.

## 4 infected with monkey virus

ATLANTA (AP) — Four animal handlers have become infected with an Ebola virus carried by laboratory monkeys, but none has become sick from the usually devastating disease, federal health officials said Thursday.

The virus, related to the deadly Ebola virus of Africa, has turned up in monkeys from three Philippines importers since last fall. The licenses of three of the nation's largest monkey importers have been revoked amid concerns over the spread of the virus.

Four workers at Hazleton Research Products of Reston, Va. — the first lab where the virus appeared — have been infected, the Centers for Disease Control reported. But unlike African Ebola virus, which attacks suddenly and produces serious and often fatal illness, the virus from the Philippines isn't making humans sick.

## Rocket delivers satellite to orbit

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — An experimental Pegasus rocket was blasted into space Thursday from a B-52 and successfully delivered its first satellite payload into a polar orbit, officials said.

"Pegasus is on its way," bomber pilot Gordon Fullerton radioed to controllers at 12:11 p.m. as the 30-foot rocket was dropped from its perch beneath the jet's right wing.

Twelve minutes later, tracking crews at the Ames-Dryden Flight Research Facility at Edwards determined the 440-pound satellite had successfully reached about 28 miles above Earth.

"Everything went according to the mission profile," said C.J. Fenrick,

spokesman for Ames-Dryden. "This is a big step for the Air Force, NASA and private corporations interested in space."

Strapped beneath the right wing of the gleaming white and silver bomber, Pegasus was flown to 40,000 feet over the military's Western Test Range in the ocean off Southern California.

The 41,000-pound rocket was released and appeared to fall free for five seconds, then streaked into space trailing a fiery ribbon of smoke.

The delta-winged first-stage booster flew to 200,000 feet, then second- and third-stage rocket engines ignited to carry Pegasus into low orbit to eject it and its Navy

satellite.

Developed by Virginia-based Orbital Sciences Corp. and Delaware-based Hercules Aerospace Corp., Pegasus was designed to put small satellites into orbit at low cost. It has been called the poor man's satellite booster.

"You are watching history, guys," Orbital Sciences spokeswoman Barbara Zedina told reporters. "I can't believe it. You go over this so many times in your mind. It's wonderful."

The estimated cost of a Pegasus launch was between \$6 million and \$8 million, a fraction of the cost of an Atlas or Titan rocket firing, officials said.

## U.S. middle of road for death rates

ATLANTA (AP) — The United States ranks 17th in average life expectancy on a list of 33 developed nations, while Japan holds the lead, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday.

The average U.S. life expectancy of 75 years trails Japan's life expectancy by 4.1 years, but beats the lowest of the 33, Hungary, by more than five. The average Hungarian lives 69.7 years, the CDC said.

The United States also ranked near the middle of the 33 nations in death rates from all causes: 828.4 deaths are reported in the U.S. for each 100,000 people each year. Japan was best at 628.8, and Romania was worst at 1,242.

The leading cause of death in the United States, heart disease, hits harder here than in other countries. The U.S. mortality rate from heart disease was 382 per 100,000 per year for men and 214 for women, compared with 339 and 206 in the other 32 developed countries.

Throughout the 33 countries, heart disease accounted for 30 percent of all deaths, with cancer causing 21 percent and stroke causing 4 percent.

The CDC study included countries defined as developed according to a 1963 United Nations standard pegged to reproductive rates: countries where the average woman has fewer than two daughters who, themselves, survive their childbearing years. Such areas include the United States and Canada, the Soviet Union, most of Europe, some Latin American nations, Japan and Australia.

Fourteen percent of all deaths in the 33 countries — about 1.5 million a year — are attributed to smoking, the CDC said. And fewer Americans smoke, compared with other countries; 31 percent of U.S. males and 26 percent of American females smoke.

## Jury rejects claims against Newman

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP) — A jury Thursday rejected a delinquent owner's claims that he was promised a slice of Paul Newman's food companies, ending a closely watched trial where profits were the issue but Newman was the star.

The Academy Award-winning actor was applauded as he left the courthouse by a crowd of about 200 reporters and spectators waiting on the steps.

"Alright, Cool Hand Luke," yelled one well-wisher. "Congratulations Paul," shouted another, as a couple of motorists tooted their horns.

The Superior Court jury deliberated just five hours over two days before deciding that Newman never promised Julius Gold-8 percent stock in the companies, Newman's Own Inc. and Salad King Inc.

The Westport deli owner claimed he was owed the stock for helping Newman start the businesses in 1982 and 1983.

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### What a difference a year can make

The change has been so stunning that it's easy to forget that the transformation of Eastern Europe began just one year ago this week.

That's when Poland's ruling Communist Party reached an accord that legalized the Solidarity labor union and provided for the elections that would give it a share of governmental power.

Hardly anyone realized that the Polish Communist Party was not only signing its own death certificate but was also in motion for a largely peaceful revolution that would abruptly end the 40-year Communist domination of the countries between West Germany and the Soviet Union.

Change has been so swift that countries have gone within months from hard-line Communist states to virtual democracies. Even reform-minded Communists are finding that they get little thanks from their constituents, people for their role in triggering the changes.

That was evident in the recent East German and Hungarian elections. In both instances, conservative parties came out ahead of both the democratic socialists and, even more decidedly, the remnants of the Communist parties that had ruled the countries for four decades.

Each Eastern European country has its own example of rapid change. In Poland, where Solidarity was outlawed for the better part of a decade, one of its leaders, Jacek Mazowiecki, is now prime minister. In Czechoslovakia, Vaclav Havel went within a period of weeks from being a playwright and leading dissident to president.

East Germany, for 30 years a hard-line state shut off from the West by its infamous Berlin Wall, is now on the brink of reunification with its prosperous, democratic western neighbor.

And in the Soviet Union itself, seven decades of one-party rule came to a sudden halt with the rapid emergence of a political opposition that appears to threaten President Mikhail Gorbachev more than hard-liners wanting to roll back his reforms.

Furthermore, the democratic virus appears to be catching. Two of its best examples are the most notorious remaining dictatorships have been displaced by democracies in Panama and Nicaragua. And President Bush is undoubtedly right when he says Fidel Castro's days are numbered in Cuba. Similarly in Asia, reform Commu-

nist-style has reached the remote nation of Outer Mongolia. And in Afghanistan, President Najibullah has called on the Communist Party to cede its monopoly on power.

Only in China are the forces of democracy still on the defensive, after Peh's bloody and brutal takeover by a regime still dominated by aging associates of the late Mao Tse-tung, who took control four decades ago.

Faced with all of these stunning changes, the Bush administration has been understandably and predictably cautious. Though it lends its voice to the drive for democracy, it has been more reluctant to lend its hand, citing financial constraints.

It has also shown signs of wanting to cling to the status quo wherever possible, especially by trying to ensure the continuation of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization by making full NATO participation an essential requirement for a reunited Germany.

While this may make sense in the short run, many analysts believe it's important to realize the hardest time in which to recognize the requirements of change is while it is going on.

That was certainly true, Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., pointed out to reporters recently, in the changes that followed World War II. As the world settled down into the pattern of Cold War that was to dominate the 40-odd decades, several aspects were not initially evident.

Few understood that the United Nations would not prove to be a major player in global activities. Or that the status of Great Britain as a world power was as much a victim of World War II as were the conflict's ostensible losers, Germany and Japan.

Similarly, it remains unclear now whether a reunited Germany will help or hinder the drive for European unity. And it's certainly unclear whether the Soviet Union will continue, by virtue of its size and possession of nuclear weapons, to be a world power or whether it will become consumed by its massive internal problems.

The events of the last year show how hard it has become to foresee the future, except in the unexpected.

WASHINGTON — Of all the scandals to hit this town, the savings-and-loan mess is the strangest. Most Americans are mystified, bored and angry.

In other capers — Watergate, Koreagate, Iran-Contra — you could identify the guys in the black hats. But to those of us who can't balance a checkbook, the S&L blunder was a mysterious, rollole down which bankers and politicians lost \$300 billion.

It wasn't reassuring that George Bush picked a nice-blond-guy-whose-ignorance-seems-just-as-dismal to take over the S&Ls.

While the Senate bickered over Tim Ryan's nomination Wednesday, Sen. Tim Wirth, D-Colo., put the savings-and-loan jackpot in a sort of perspective.

"This is the greatest financial catastrophe in American history," said Wirth. "Lil'ol' Costezy American at least one thousand dollars."

Well, I know what I'll be doing when the federal ask for my \$1,000 to bail out failed savings and loans. I'll be thinking about S&L executive David Paul's \$7 million yacht.

I'll also remember Paul's \$30 million collection of Old Master paintings. Not to mention his \$200,000 Persian rugs, \$84,000 Baccarat crystal, \$1.4 million jet plane. Or the \$16 million he grabbed as chairman of Miami's Centrus Bank.

"It should have been called S-I-N Trust," said Rep. Frank Annuzio, D-Ill., of Paul's looted bank that will cost taxpayers a cool \$2 million.

They had a color picture on the wall of the House banking committee of Paul's yacht, the Grand Cru, moored to the teak dock at his La Gorce Island estate. Nice boat. Before the S&L bailout is over, I figure I'll pay for the steering wheel and deck chairs.

"These people found a money machine in the

basement and thought the money was free," said William Seidman, chairman of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. "They had a credit card on America."

I was musing about David Paul's credit card and yacht — hell, my boat — during the Senate's latest S&L debate. Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., was showing his sharp elbows.

"I've got a sneaking suspicion this debate is an exercise in self-protection," said Dole. "Maybe it's the opening chapter in 'who-to-blame' for the saving-and-loan mess."

If Dole wanted to dish out blame, he could look around the chamber. And in a mirror. In 1982 when the thrifits — now there's a misnomer — yined about losing money on non-mortgage loans, Congress deregulated them. It was like giving 3,000 Jesse Jameses their own railroads to stick up. (Insider greed caused 75 percent of S&L crashes.)

Then the steezefest between politicians, bankers and campaign dodger stalled the S&L cleanup. Congress drove the getaway car in this heist. Everybody knows about the "Keating Five"

senators whose meddling for the Lincoln Savings & Loan caused delays costing \$2.5 billion.

But David Paul, along with his gold-plated toilets, chauffeured Mercedes and yacht, invested a whopping \$328,000 in political campaigns. Among favorites were Sen. Joe Biden, D-Del., \$10,000; Sen. Jim Sasser, D-Tenn., \$5,000; Rep. Larry Smith, D-Fla., \$12,000; ex-Rep. Buddy McKay, D-Fla., \$15,000; Rep. Dick Gephardt, D-Mo., \$5,000; the held yacht parties for Louisiana Sens. Bennett Johnston and John Breaux, and gave rides on his bank jet to Sens. Bob Graham, D-Fla., John Kerry, D-Mass., and Wirth.

No wonder Paul bragged of his "connections," although there's no evidence these friendly Hon-orables intervened on his behalf.

No wonder there's a queasy defensiveness about the \$300 billion S&L rescue in the Senate and House. Too many unclean hands.

So when the feds whack me for \$1,000 for the S&L bailout, I want a color photo of David Paul's loveboat.

It's my yacht. Maybe I'll tack it on a wall between the "Titanic" and the "Lusitania."

# Cheney asks Congress for powers to reduce officer corps

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department asked Congress Thursday for new powers to reduce the officer corps, including authority to demote some officers to enlisted status if they refuse a transfer from active duty to the reserves.

The department also proposed reducing its oversight of defense contractors as a cost-saving measure and called on Congress to give the Pentagon more leeway in managing its budget.

The proposals were contained in a

pair of reports to Congress that Defense Secretary Dick Cheney said were aimed at improving Pentagon management, limiting wasteful spending and improving relations between the department and Congress.

Donald Atwood, the deputy defense secretary, said the department needs wider authority to reduce the officer ranks in order to maintain a balanced force as troops are demobilized. The force will shrink by at least 90,000 people over

the next two years, he said, and more cuts are likely in the years beyond.

He did not say how many officers might be cut.

Atwood said the personnel proposals, which include incentives for officers to voluntarily

leave the service, seek to avoid harming morale in the all-volunteer force.

"These are people who have decided to make the military their career, and we need to have the flexibility to let them leave with honor, with dignity and with some kind of a financial benefit," Atwood told a news conference.

The department recently proposed to Congress that enlist personnel who are forced out of the service by given severance pay. Currently only

officers qualify for severance benefits.

Atwood also said the Pentagon was seeking legislative authority to reduce its monitoring of contractors' work. He said this would make the defense acquisition process more like a commercial business and thus more cost effective.

He said current law forces the Pentagon to use more inspectors and auditors of suppliers' work than is necessary to ensure the work is performed properly.

"We almost have to assume there's a dishonest atmosphere out there" among contractors, he said. "We believe that by reducing the degree of inspections and audits that we put on these contractors, we can save money and we feel we'll get better products."

Cheney, speaking at the same news conference, said that while the Pentagon could improve its own management system, Congress was partly to blame for inefficiencies in the department.

## Senators call for more cuts in U.S. arsenal

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two Republican senators accused President Bush and congressional leaders Thursday of reacting too slowly to changes in Eastern Europe and urged cuts in the U.S. nuclear arsenal.

Frustrated with the administration's fiscal 1991 defense budget and with proposed adjustments circulating at Capitol Hill, Sens. William Cohen of Maine and John McCain of Arizona recommended a leaner framework, including cutbacks for the B-2 Stealth bomber and land-based nuclear missiles.

Although no elections have been held since the 1986 election, the administration's recommendation of modest increases of 2 percent or less each year — less than the probable rate of inflation.

Following the senators' plan would mean cutting about \$50 billion from proposed military spending during the five years, said McCain and McCain, both members of the Senate Armed Services Committee.

The GOP senators call for a comprehensive defense strategy and further reductions in spending came on the heels of a series of congressional attacks on Bush's military budget and increasing opposition to the administration's favored strategic weapons.

## Panama nearer to normal ties

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush on Thursday lifted the state of emergency against Panama, a formal step toward returning to normal trade and economic relations.

The state of emergency was imposed April 8, 1988, during the regime of Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega. He was deposed during the U.S. invasion in December and a new government was installed.

Although no elections have been held since then, the Bush administration considers the U.S.-installed government to be democratically elected.

That is because President Guillermo Endara was seen by independent observers as the obvious winner in last May's election, which was invalidated by Noriega.

Friday's move came as Bush continued to press for \$500 million in emergency aid for Panama to help get its economy back on track and aid the Endara government's recovery from the invasion damage.

The House this week approved a \$420 million package. The Senate seems unlikely to act on the measure before leaving Thursday for the Easter recess, as Bush had hoped.

## Kodak fined for violations

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — Eastman Kodak Co. was fined \$15 million in criminal and civil penalties on Thursday for violating New York's environmental laws.

The photographic giant pleaded guilty in Rochester City Court to two misdemeanor violations for illegally disposing of hazardous waste and failing to report the spill of a toxic solvent until five days after it was discovered.

The \$15 million criminal fine is the largest ever assessed by New York in an environmental case and among the largest in the nation, said state Attorney General Robert Abrams.

The incidents occurred in 1986 and 1987 at the 2,200-acre Kodak Park manufacturing center for film and photographic products. The illegal hazardous waste disposal was one of a series of violations, said Assistant state Attorney General Paul McCarthy.

Under a plea agreement, Kodak was fined \$1 million in criminal penalties for the two violations, plus \$150,000 to be paid to local emergency planning committees.

# Belgium restores King Baudouin after abortion bill controversy

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — Parliament returned King Baudouin to the throne Thursday, two days after he agreed to be suspended to avoid signing a bill legalizing abortion.

Lawmakers urged changes in the

law to reduce royal privileges. There were no votes against putting the king back on the throne, but 93 of the 338 deputies present abstained.

King Baudouin, a devout Catholic, refused to sign the

abortion bill after it was passed by Parliament last Friday. As the constitutional head of state, he must sign all bills to make them law.

On Tuesday, Baudouin agreed to a temporary suspension. He was removed from the throne

Wednesday, after which the government enacted the law itself.

Prime Minister Wilfried Martens said his center-left government will seek changes in the constitution to prevent future refusals by the king, on moral grounds, to endorse legislation. He did not elaborate.

But it is expected the government wants the royal powers, already largely ceremonial, reduced further.

Experts said the king cannot cast aside his constitutional role only

because he morally opposes legislation. They said he can only lose his constitutional powers if he is physically or mentally unable to rule.

The bill the king opposes ended a 123-year ban on abortions in this overwhelmingly Catholic nation. It allows abortions if a woman's doctor deems a patient is in a state of distress. Opponents say this in fact makes abortion available on demand.

"In short, the bill represents a

serious diminution of respect for the life of the weakest. You will therefore understand I do not wish to be involved with that law," the monarch said in a letter to Martens last week.

"To those who are surprised at my attitude, I put the following question: Is it normal that I am the only Belgian citizen who must act against his conscience in such important matters? Do all have the freedom of conscience except the king?"

# Peres promises to pursue peace despite his coalition's composition

JERUSALEM (AP) — Labor Party leader Shimon Peres, criticized for forming a coalition dependent on defectors from the right-wing Likud bloc, reaffirmed Thursday that he will be able to pursue the peace process if he is prime minister.

Peres said that once installed, his government would "without question" approve U.S. Secretary of State James A. Baker's plan for convening Palestinian-Israeli talks in Cairo.

Amnon Rubinstain, leader of the Shinui (Change) faction which has demanded sweeping election reform, said the notion of switching back and forth between political blocs was "a problem that goes to the very core of Israeli democracy."

Peres told President Chaim Herzog on Wednesday he had succeeded in piecing together a ruling coalition. But labor leaders have refused to divulge the names of the prospective defectors who have promised support.

Peres said secrecy was necessary to woo other supporters. He is believed

to have only 61 or 62 members of the 120-seat Knesset pledged to support to form a new government. The announcement came two weeks after he was assigned to replace Likud Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir.

Shamir lost a no-confidence vote March 15 in a crisis triggered by dispute over Baker's conditions for holding Palestinian-Israeli talks. Peres forced the showdown with Shamir, who was reluctant to accept Baker's proposals on forming a Palestinian delegation.

Parliament officials were expected to set a voting date on the proposed new government for either Sunday or Wednesday.

If Peres succeeds, it would be the first time since 1977 that the left-center Labor ruled without sharing power with Likud.

According to Israeli media, the key defector is Likud legislator Avraham Sharir, whom Shamir dumped as tourism minister after criticism.

"We say the government will be based on the peace policy of the outgoing cabinet," Peres said on Tuesday. "But we will permit the continuation of the process ... to renew the peace process."

Leftists feared Peres could have trouble making bold moves since his majority in parliament would be thin and dependent on conservative religious factions and hawks who had crossed party lines.

Peres met in Tel Aviv with leaders of three left-wing parties who were

critical of his tactics in trying to form a new government. They control 10 seats in the parliament or Knesset, and some threatened to withhold support vital to Peres.

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## Soldier asking for flight flees

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — A soldier who held an empty commercial jet for three days, threatening to blow it up unless he was flown to the United States, jumped out of the plane early Thursday and escaped, a radio station reported.

Twenty-one-year-old Radio Haiti Inter said the 20-year-old soldier, Pvt. Gerald Pierre, fled the American Airlines Airbus A300 around 1:10 a.m.

Officials gave no immediate explanation of how the soldier got away. There was speculation the army allowed him to escape as a way to resolve peacefully the three-day siege, which had closed the international airport.

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# Official rallies on day of mourning closes Tainanmen square

BEIJING (AP) — Authorities staged all-day rallies in Tiananmen Square on Thursday, China's annual day of mourning the dead, preventing unofficial visits to the symbolic center of last year's crushed democracy movement.

It was the second time in a week city officials held official activities in the square as an excuse for closing it to the public.

The method appeared successful. There were no reports of attempts to lay wreaths near the square or otherwise honor the hundreds and possibly thousands of people killed June 3-4, when the army opened fire

on pro-democracy protesters and rebok the square where they had camped.

In Hong Kong, however, an estimated 20,000 people marched in honor of the Beijing dead, many carrying banners or bouquets of flowers.

A wreath was left from Chai Ling, a leading activist in the Beijing uprising who escaped to the West last week after 10 months on the run in China. "Patriotic heroes will live forever," read a banner on the wreath.

Thursday was China's annual Qingming, or Clear and Bright Festival, when families

traditionally visit graves to mourn their dead. Chinese dissidents abroad, through faxes and mailed leaflets, urged Beijing residents to stroll through Tiananmen Square on Qingming in memory of the slain protesters.

Early in the week, however, Beijing authorities issued orders curbing even normal mourning activities, such as group visits to crematoriums.

The Beijing Daily newspaper published a letter Sunday from a city official warning residents to pass Qingming in a "civilized and healthy" way and not "take advantage of the opportunity to create disturbances."

Schools and factories told people to not wear traditional signs of mourning, such as black armbands or white flowers. Some colleges suddenly announced special, mandatory political lectures, apparently in an effort to keep students occupied.

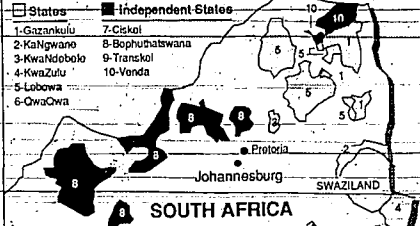
Authorities bused thousands of high school-age Communist Youth League members into Tiananmen Square in the morning. They paid homage to China's revolutionary martyrs and listened to a lecture on China's past struggles against foreign imperialists.

In the afternoon, primary school members of the Young Pioneers, wearing their insignia red handkerchiefs around their necks, marched onto the square in formation to hear more patriotic speeches. Both the Youth League and the Young Pioneers to foster Marxism among young people.

Members of the People's Armed Police, a paramilitary unit, stood guard on the square's perimeter. Dozens of ordinary police patrolled adjoining streets, making sure members of the public did not try to enter. They yelled at foreigners who tried to photograph the ceremonies.

## De Klerk criticizes Mandela over meeting

CAPE TOWN, South Africa (AP) — President F. W. de Klerk and Nelson Mandela agreed Thursday on a new date for formal talks between the government and the African National Congress on giving blacks a share of political power in South Africa.

The president and ANC leader met for three hours. The date of the talks was not announced, and the two did not appear together after the meeting.

Before the talks began, de Klerk accused Mandela of dissuading black homeland leaders from meeting with the government as scheduled Thursday.

De Klerk told reporters that during his meeting with Mandela, "I made the point that no one should inhibit discussions which need to take place on the widest possible scale."

He said they also discussed the widespread political violence in the country "frankly and clearly. I had the impression that there is a general agreement that violence had to come to an end and that there was a need for creating an atmosphere in which normal political processes could take place."

In addition to Mandela, de Klerk had been scheduled to meet with six homeland leaders, but four did not show up.

De Klerk said before his talks with Mandela, "I don't have a problem finding anyone to sit down with me," de Klerk told an impromptu news conference. "I just have a problem with those who want to sit down and who don't want to allow others to sit down with them."

## Soviet says \$320 billion needed for Chernobyl

GENEVA (AP) — A member of the Soviet Parliament said Thursday that about \$320 billion will be needed to cope with the consequences of the Chernobyl nuclear disaster during the next 10 years.

Yuri Shishberak, vice chairman of the Supreme Soviet's Commission on Environment and Nuclear Energy, told reporters an international fund should be set up to assist the Soviet Union.

Shishberak said almost 4 million people are still living in regions with higher than normal levels of radiation. The accident occurred April 26, 1986 at the power plant in the Soviet Ukraine.

Shishberak's commission came up with proposals at the request of Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev. They include a call for the immediate evacuation of more than 100,000 people in the most contaminated areas of Byelorussia, the Ukraine and the Russian republic, according to Shishberak.

He said the thyroid glands of more than 1.5 million people, including 160,000 children, were exposed to "important levels of radiation" after the Chernobyl disaster.

In the Ukraine, the incidence of thyroid cancer was expected to increase as much as 10-fold, Shishberak said.

There are also considerably more cases of leukemia and immunity deficiencies. "We call that Chernobyl AIDS," he added. "We believe this is only the beginning."

People in the affected region are living under great nervous stress socially, politically and psychologically," he said.

Shishberak said his commission proposed that the government issue a worldwide appeal for contributions to an international Chernobyl relief fund. The estimate of needed funds over the next decade was based on surveys made by the three republics affected.

According to official figures, 31 people were killed in the Chernobyl accident, caused by an explosion at the No. 4 reactor of the four-unit plant.

By 1989, officials said more than 250 people who had worked at the plant or who were involved in the post-accident cleanup had died of various causes, not all of them necessarily traceable to radiation exposure.

## Police defuse druggies' bomb in Colombia

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Police defused a truck bomb containing more than a half-ton of dynamite on Thursday that had been planted by drug traffickers hoping to destroy several blocks of a wealthy Bogota neighborhood during the morning rush hour.

Military armor and patrols poured out of army bases and into the streets minutes after the attempt.

Interior Minister Horacio Serpa, who police said escaped being a

victim by minutes, called an emergency meeting of the National Security Council. He is acting president while President Virgilio Barco is in Europe on a state visit.

Federal Sen. Federico Estrada, 63, who was kidnapped by drug traffickers last Tuesday in Medellin, was released unharmed Thursday in that northwestern Colombia-city home of Medellin's cocaine cartel.

In a communique, traffickers had threatened to murder him if police did not release four of their associates.

Police have denied detaining the four, and the reason for Estrada's being freed was not clear.

Gunmen working for the Medellin cartel killed another policeman Thursday in Medellin, bringing to 15 the number of officers killed there since Monday.

Police Chief Col. Carlos Alberto Otalora of Medellin says the cartel is paying \$4,300 for each officer killed.

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## Nepal's prime minister quits

KATMANDU, Nepal (AP) — The prime minister resigned Thursday following six weeks of pro-democracy demonstrations across the nation, highly placed sources said.

The sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said a formal announcement would be made soon by King Birendra. They said Prime Minister Marich Man Singh Shrestha submitted his resignation Thursday night.

At least 16 people have been killed in confrontations between demonstrators and police since Feb. 18, when the Nepali Congress Party and a coalition of left-wing parties began agitating for a return to a multi-party democracy.

Political parties have been banned in Nepal for 29 years.

The foreign minister of Nepal stepped down last month because he disagreed with the government crackdown on the pro-democracy movement.

**Faction working to release hostages**

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — The guerrilla faction led by Palestinian terrorist mastermind Abu Nidal said Thursday it was making contacts aimed at winning freedom for at least one of eight Europeans it holds hostage.

Walid Khalid, Beirut spokesman for Fatah-Revolutionary Council, said the group was acting at the request of Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi.

In a typewritten statement, Khalid said the group was making "immediate contacts with the concerned parties." He did not specify which parties had been contacted.

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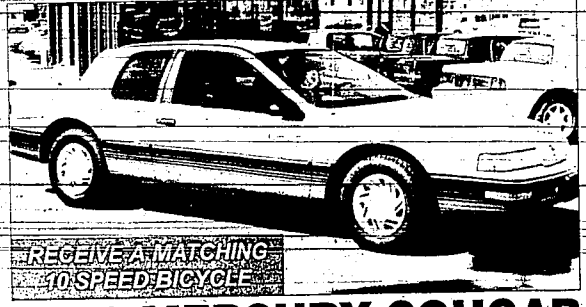
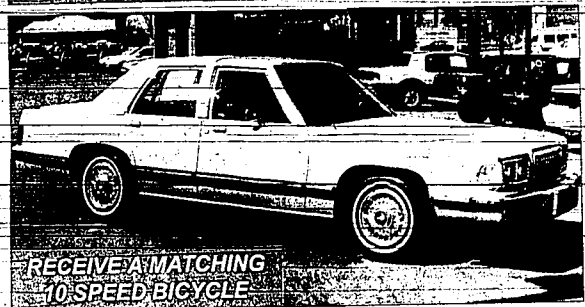

### 6 Burley firefighters join national group

**BURLEY** - Concerned about their working environment, six members of the Burley Fire Department have joined the International Association of Fire Fighters.

Jerry Schroeder, named acting president of the Burley Fire Fighters Association, said the majority of the city's career firemen have voted to join the union, which will represent them in collective bargaining.

Schroeder said eight members of the fire department are eligible to join, and so far four firefighters and two captains have accepted the union.

"I hope that eventually all would come and join us," he said Tuesday. "We aren't just interested in making more money. We are concerned about working conditions and we felt we needed some voice in certain safety issues, because this is quite frankly a very hazardous occupation."

A number of other Idaho cities have unionized fire departments, including Boise, Twin Falls, Pocatello and Idaho Falls.

### County commissioners vote to erect iron security fence

**TWIN FALLS** - Janitors have found kids and others roaming the upper halls of the county courthouse after offices have closed and a large Centennial rug was recently stolen, the county commissioners say.

"But no more. Unwanted visitors will now have to climb a noisy iron fence to get into all but a small area of the courthouse after hours."

The Twin Falls County commissioners decided Wednesday to invest in an iron security fence that will close off the courthouse past the Sheriff Department's offices at the north end on the first floor.

"There's no need to have the public beyond the sheriff's office after hours," Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said.

Before the county closed the fourth-floor jail, Hempleman said, it was quite a bit of traffic to and from the jail. In addition to prisoners, the public was allowed upstairs during visiting hours.

The new fence will also protect a special Centennial display scheduled to begin at the courthouse June 1.

As he walked to his pickup, the other man fled, he told the deputy. A wallet containing about 12 business cards and a driver's license was missing, he said.

## Council, Woodbury reach agreement on mall

**TWIN FALLS** - Construction on the Woodbury Corp. planned development of the northern gateway Breckenridge farm property could begin as early as the end of this month.

After about three hours of discussion, motions, votes, compromises and amendments Thursday, the City Council and the corporation agreed on a list of conditions for developing the property, including extensive landscaping and an extra lane along a portion of Blue Lakes Boulevard North to accommodate the expected increase in traffic.

The council then granted Woodbury conditional final plat approval, conditional on the submission of several legal and technical documents, such as the deed to the farm land, and both groups' review of the much amended Planned Unit Development (PUD) agreement - the list of

developer requirements.

The City Council is expected to give final approval of the PUD changes Monday and Guy Woodbury, the corporation's general manager, said he expects all other documents to be in the city's hands within two weeks.

"It's encouraging to be at this point," Woodbury said. "The corporation has several battles, Thursday in the council's chambers, but Woodbury said he didn't think it would hurt the business' ability to sell lots."

Among the issues argued and decided Thursday were:

- Woodbury will pay for all but 25 percent of the cost to widen Blue Lakes Boulevard North from Pole Line Road to Breckenridge Drive - a road that will cut through the middle of the 78-acre development.

- Woodbury will have to landscape 30 feet back from Pole Line and Blue Lakes roads. But the 30 feet will be measured from the back of the sidewalk, not the public's right of way, which is another 25 feet behind the sidewalk.

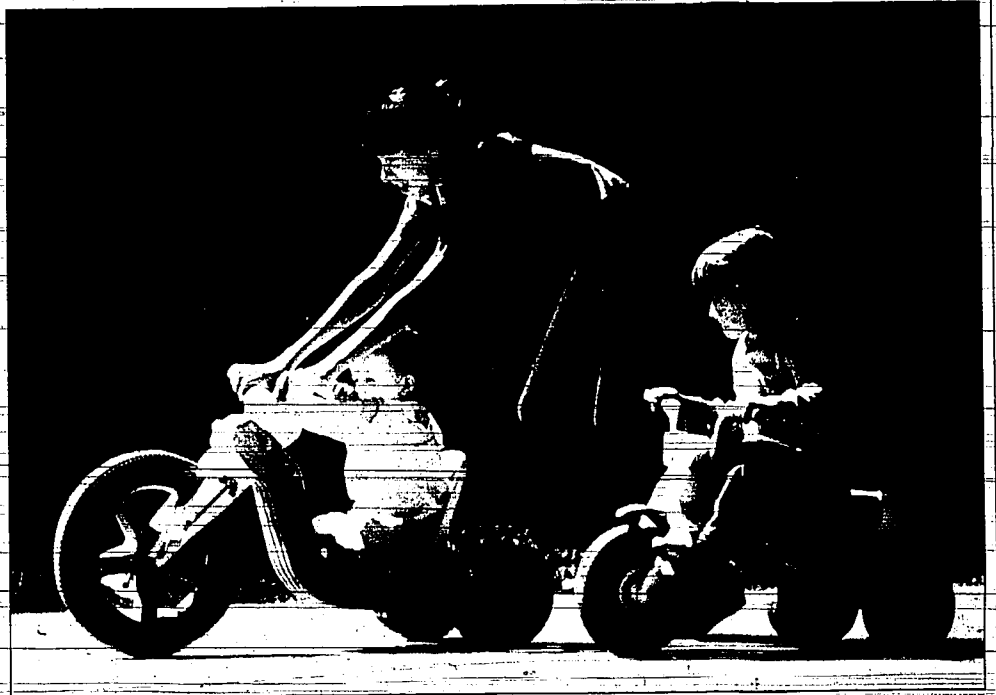
And the city did hold onto extra footage along Pole Line for future widening of the thoroughfare. Property along the interior roads and North College Road must have 15 feet of landscaping.

Each time Woodbury sells a lot or parcel of land, the PUD agreement will be part of the deed, thus ensuring the PUD will remain in effect through a change-of-ownership.

Woodbury will go through a public hearing process to change its master plan. The current plan lists certain uses for parts of the 78-acre property.

The development will have six access drives along Blue Lakes, but one of them will be an exit-only drive, possibly for a drive-through fast-food business.

The corporation will not be allowed any curb cuts for access drives to interior roads closer than 160 feet from an intersection with Blue Lakes or Pole Line. Woodbury had requested a driveway only 30 feet from the intersection of Breckenridge Drive and Blue Lakes.

## Appeals court upholds Jagers' life sentence

**BOISE** - The Idaho Court of Appeals has upheld the life prison sentence, with a 25-year fixed term, ordered for Jesse Ray Jagers in the May 1988 murder of an elderly Twin Falls woman.

Jagers, who was 18 at the time of the slaying, was convicted of first-degree murder for the stabbing death of 79-year-old Virginia Westergren, wife of former Times-News publisher Al Westergren.

Jagers also was found guilty of robbery and received a concurrent 10-year sentence from 5th District Judge Daniel

Meehl. Meehl could have ordered a life term on the robbery charge and death for the murder conviction.

On appeal, Jagers contended the fixed 25-year portion of his life sentence was excessive and arbitrary since only a 10-year fixed term is required on life sentences.

But in a unanimous decision issued Thursday, the three-member Court of Appeals rejected that argument.

Acting appellate Judge Henry McQuade wrote for the court that Meehl's decision, specifically cited the primary sentencing goal of protecting society from a man who he concluded had an "utter disregard for human life."

"The reasonableness of a sentence must be considered in light of the nature of the offense and the character of the offender," McQuade said.

Jagers' conviction was based on the allegation that Virginia Westergren was killed "in a violent attack without provocation" and that she was one of the few people who had tried to befriend Jagers.

Based on those factors and what the sentencing judge found to be Jagers' "lack of remorse and potential to commit future offenses," McQuade said, the 25-year fixed term was justified.

## Andrus allows cash diversion to detention building projects

**BOISE** - While the Magic Valley won't see any of \$325,000 just awarded to Idaho by the U.S. Justice Department to remove all juveniles from adult jails, state funds may trickle down to Jerome to build a \$1 million, 14-bed juvenile facility.

Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday approved diverting \$6 million from the public building account for construction of region-

al juvenile detention facilities.

The funds will be disbursed by state officials to accommodate varying needs throughout the state.

A special task force has recommended that \$1.2 million 16-bed detention centers be built in the Coeur d'Alene, Lewiston and Caldwell areas, a 14-bed facility costing just over \$1 million in the Jerome area and

a \$900,000 12-bed center in Bannock County, with \$225,000 earmarked for three.

## Lawmaker says range expansion possible if all sides meet

**MOUNTAIN HOME** - The Saylor Creek bombing range hearings move closer to home today as the Air Force prepares to take public testimony in Mountain Home.

Earlier, a state representative told a hearing a compromise to enable the Saylor Creek bombing range to expand is possible.

Rep. Leanna Lasuen, D-Mountain Home, told area residents, the Air Force and others at a hearing Wednesday in Glens Ferry the issue has polarized her constituents in Blaine and Owyhee counties.

Lasuen did not say whether she supports the range expansion but did say she believes a plan could be found to expand the range if all sides on the issue get together to work things out.

Her testimony gave way to the fears of people living in the Glens Ferry area, which would be near the expanded range.

mitigating an elephant in our living room," Glens Ferry resident Thelma Black said.

Dr. Irons, a long-time farmer near Glens Ferry, said a load of bombs was dumped in his garden one night during World War II and wondered if similar incidents would occur if the range is expanded.

Mountain Home residents also testified, most calling for expansion of the range and its multiple uses.

The Air Force was in town to gather testimony on a draft environmental impact statement on the Transfer of 94-F-4 fighter jets to the Mountain Home air base and the need for an expanded training range.

Rancher Bob Hall agreed. "The land you're asking for is one of the last great open spaces left in the nation," Hall said. "Share our assets don't destroy them."

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# Council mulls plans to spruce up Bliss

BLISS - City officials, saying that parts of Bliss are a mess and some even a "fire trap," want to spruce up the area before the heavy summer travel season begins.

One piece of property, formerly operated as the Circle Bar Cafe and Motel, is covered with weeds and even has a discarded cigarette machine on the lot. Councilwoman Charlene Thompson said at Wednesday's meeting.

"Somebody someone will throw a match out there and it'll be gone," Councilman Keith B. Foster said. "The property, managed by Bushoff Realty, is on the main highway through town and the first prop-

erty visitors see when taking the western-most exit off Interstate 84.

The council will consider hiring someone to spruce up the streets and burn the weeds that have overgrown the vacant lots within the city limits, as suggested by Mayor Roland Zollinger.

Councilman Sam Bishop suggested the ground sterilant Aranzene be applied to the weeded areas, provided care is taken around city water sources.

Zollinger said it is especially important to spruce up the town this year because of expected additional visitors coming through for the Idaho Centennial celebration. "It's already April," Zollinger said. "We only have one shot for 1990."

Bliss traditionally is a prime spot along Interstate 84 for travelers turn-

ing off to drive the scenic U.S. Highway 30.

In a related matter, the council approved the Chamber of Commerce's application to the Bureau of Land Management to put a sign next to the Interstate announcing Bliss and its attractions.

Steve Gophsby said the chamber still hopes to have the sign up by May 15.

The council also gave permission to U.S. West to install fiber optic lines through the city limits. Councilman Eddie Butler

# Critics say restricting air traffic over INEL could cause hazardous alternative routes

**IDAHO FALLS (AP)** — The Energy Department is being blasted for its proposal to restrict air flights over the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, critics claiming the move is unjustified and could force pilots onto hazardous alternative routes.  
 They disputed the department's contention that the airspace restriction is another way to bolster security around its defense sites — an attempt to keep an air attacker from sabotaging a weapons site or stealing sensitive nuclear materials.  
 The Energy Department restriction would require flights over the INEL to maintain an altitude of at least 10,000 feet, about 5,000 feet over the ground surface, and about 3,500 feet higher than the current flight guideline. The final decision will be made by the Federal Aviation Administration.  
 "The FAA is about to pluck another feather from the wings of general aviation," said Bill Penney of Idaho Falls, a pilot and retired INEL employee. "Pretty soon they won't have any left at all."  
 Penney was one of several former or current INEL employees who criticized the airspace proposal at a Wednesday-night hearing. They claimed it would be the largest restricted zone in the nation.  
 The INEL's buildings were constructed to prevent release of radioactive materials, even if a plane crashes into them, some workers said. While restrictions may be in order near some sensitive facilities, they said, the bulk of the site does not need them since it "is comprised of sagebrush and rattlesnakes."  
 Crop dusters and other small craft pilots said their plans will not climb to 10,000 feet, and if they are forced to de-couple around the INEL, they will waste fuel and have to fly over mountains on the site's western border.

"I think it's an inconvenience, and possibly a safety factor," said Robert Hoff of Aeromark Inc., of Idaho Falls, and other questioned the government's claim that it tried to limit the area covered by the restriction.  
 "It seems to me it follows the boundaries of the INEL," pilot Chuck Jopson said. "I cannot imagine how they could make it any larger."  
 The Energy Department plan included a two-mile strip of unrestricted airspace cutting across the north end of the site, and officials said they were considering an unrestricted corridor along U.S. 20 and 26 that cut across the southern end of the INEL.  
 If the restriction is approved, planes breaking into the airspace could be subjected to deadly force, but department security spokesman Louis Ritchie said. "Clearly we won't shoot someone out of the sky just for penetrating our restricted airspace."

# Jury to begin deliberations in bank fraud case

**BOISE (AP)** — The defense has rested its case in U.S. District Court after cross examinations of government witnesses in the case of two former Idaho State Bank officers accused of defrauding the Glenn Ferry-based bank.  
 Harry Knox, 37, of Kuna Hill, and Mrs. Neavill, 34, of Kuna, are charged in a 37-count indictment with using their positions to defraud the bank between 1984 and 1988.  
 After hearing 24 weeks of testimony, the Boise jury is expected to begin deliberations Thursday.  
 Attorneys are scheduled to present several hours of closing arguments before visiting Judge Allicemarc Stotler of Santa Ana, Calif.  
 The defense, which rested its case Wednesday, chose not to call either defendant as a witness, relying instead on extensive cross-examination of government witnesses.  
 Knox was the bank's former chairman and corporate secretary, and Mrs. Neavill was its former corporate vice president.  
 Federal authorities contend the fraud included \$120,000 in unauthorized Christmas bonuses between 1985 and 1987.  
 The brother and sister deny the charges, saying the bank's board of directors knew of the spending and raised no objections.

Defense attorneys Karl Shurtliff and Larry Westberg of Boise sought to convince jurors that Knox and Mrs. Neavill merely continued historical bank practices.  
 Testifying for the defense Wednesday, Rebecca Longoria said she was hired as a house cleaner by the defendants' mother, Mary Knox, between the 1960s and early 1980s. She said her services were paid for by the bank as recently as May 1982.  
 After their mother died, Knox and Mrs. Neavill inherited control of the bank in October 1983.  
 When it came to a jury verdict, Gladys Gridley of Mountain Home, testified that Knox frequently hosted parties at the bank and that Knox and Mrs. Neavill merely continued historical bank practices.  
 Knox and Mrs. Neavill are charged with the count-charges of conspiracy to misappropriate bank funds, Knox faces 18 additional counts of misappropriation of funds, and Mrs. Neavill is accused of 26 misappropriation counts and 26 counts of making false entries in bank records.  
 If convicted, they face up to five years in prison and \$250,000 in fines for each count.

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# Agents protest drug officer using house sale access for searches

**COEUR D'ALENE (AP)** — Local real estate agents are protesting the search of a home on their multiple listing service by a narcotics agent masquerading as a prospective buyer.  
 In a letter to Coeur d'Alene City Attorney Jeff Jones, Michael Newell, representing the real estate agents, expressed concern about potential civil liability and the personal safety of real estate agents used by drug enforcement officers to gain access to properties to find evidence of drugs or drug paraphernalia.  
 The incident was disclosed in a copyrighted story published in Thursday's editions of the Coeur d'Alene Press.  
 Newell's letter said a drug enforcement agent posing as a prospective buyer arranged for a showing of a house listed through the Multiple Listing Service.  
 Agents' protest. Newell said, was to search the house for drugs or drug paraphernalia.  
 An arrest apparently followed, although no details were provided by either law enforcement officers or the real estate agents on what house was involved on the person targeted by the investigation.  
 Kootenai County Prosecutor Bill Douglas maintained the search or arrest may not have been improper, but "The preferred method is to present an agent's information to a magistrate to see if there is a probable cause for a search warrant."  
 If an agent had enough information to pinpoint a given house, he might be able to obtain a search warrant without examining the residence in the guise of a buyer, Douglas said.  
 But he declined to assess the incident without specific details.  
 "Apparently," Newell said in his letter, "certain items were observed during the inspection of the property by the drug enforcement officer which led either to the arrest or search of the property."  
 He said the renter of the property found out about the scheme and contacted the real estate agent to find out "what right the agent had to bring a narc to her home."  
 Newell, who admitted he was still trying to determine all the details of the incident, said the officer told the real estate agent he was "well within his rights and he could do any procedure which he deemed necessary to get the information he was requesting."  
 Board of Realtors spokesman John Beutler said that while the industry supported the anti-drug efforts, it remained concerned about the possible legal and personal threat posed to unknowing real estate agents.  
 "It's upsetting that an agent used the board to get into a house without telling us his reasons," he said.  
 Douglas said that in some instances an occupant abandons an expectation of privacy, such as when a residence is put on public view. Without examining the specifics of the case, he declined to say whether that would apply in the case cited by Newell.  
 But the prosecutor also said it would be "fishy" for a person to be "controlled substance" or drug paraphernalia to leave it out in plain view in a residence that was available for viewing by prospective home buyers.

# Gem Court reinstates complaint against pamphleteer

**BOISE (AP)** — The Idaho Supreme Court has reinstated a defamation complaint against northern Idaho pamphleteer Ronald Rankin, finding enough evidence to indicate a 1986 article he wrote might have been false.  
 In a 4-1 opinion made public Thursday, the high court partially overturned 1st District Judge Richard Magnuson's ruling of summary judgment for Rankin in a lawsuit filed by Irvin Wiemer of Post Falls.  
 The case was returned to Magnuson's court for a trial.  
 Wiemer sued Rankin over statements in the free tabloid Vox Pop about the 1980 death of his wife, Debbie Wiemer. The death was reported to the public as a suicide.  
 But the Supreme Court agreed — Wiemer lied and actually had killed his wife.  
 In the majority opinion, Justice Byron Johnson said Magnuson was wrong to accept Rankin's argument that statements about "overwhelming" evidence Mrs. Wiemer's death was not a suicide were presented as a matter of opinion, not as fact.  
 The article actually was aimed at the performance of Glen Walker, who was Kootenai County prosecutor at the time. Rankin used the case to illustrate what he contended was Walker's incompetence and to call for a coroner's inquest into Mrs. Wiemer's death.  
 Rankin argued, and Magnuson agreed, that he had a qualified privilege to write the article as a report of the proceedings of public officials. But the high court rejected that claim, ruling that he had relied on private conversations with investigating officers as well as official police records.  
 "Regardless of whether police reports are a public official proceeding, private statements of police officers made to members of the news media are not," Johnson wrote.  
 However, the court upheld Magnuson's decision that statements about "overwhelming" evidence Mrs. Wiemer's death was not a suicide were presented as a matter of opinion, not as fact.

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** — A federal judge has deferred ruling on a motion for summary judgment to allow attorneys for Gary Sheets to attempt to question Robert Lindsey, author of a book about Utah's 1985 murder-forgery case.  
 Sheets' \$1 million civil lawsuit against Lindsey and Simon & Schuster, publisher of "Gathering of Saints," contends the writer wrongly obtained his late wife's diary and included excerpts in the book.  
 Kathy Sheets was killed on Oct. 15, 1985, by a pipe-bomb made by Mark Hofmann, who later confessed to forging and selling early Mormon documents and other Americana.  
 Another Hofmann bomb killed collector Steven Christensen.  
 Sheets' attorney, Kent Linebaugh, said a footnote in a defense memorandum said Simon & Schuster would assume, for the purpose of the motion for summary judgment, that Lindsey's obtaining the diary related to an intrusion on Sheets' privacy.  
 Linebaugh said that admission was reason enough to seek to depose Lindsey in order to pursue the lawsuit, despite the defense's motions for summary judgment and a companion motion for dismissal.  
 "They admit what they did was highly offensive, but they don't want us to prove it was highly offensive," he said.  
 Linebaugh said Salt Lake City and county authorities had denied that Lindsey obtained the diary from their employees during the investigation, and that only the author could say how he obtained the material.  
 Defense attorney David Isom countered that Sheets could subpoena city and county officials to question them on how the diary came into Lindsey's possession.  
 He also said the issue of whether Lindsey wrongly obtained the diary was unimportant to the motion for summary judgment, but U.S. District Judge Bruce Jenkins disagreed.  
 The judge gave Linebaugh until May 14 to depose Lindsey, and set a June 15 court date for further arguments.  
 After the hearing, however, Isom said that as a journalist, Lindsey could claim that he was not required under the law to reveal his confidential sources in a deposition.  
 "He has a privilege not to answer," Isom said.

## Experts brace for expectedly bad fire season

BOISE (AP) — Firefighting experts across the country are bracing for what may become the worst fire season in the nation's history this summer, the result of drought, hurricane debris and a lack of manpower.

Representatives from the Army, Air Force, National Guard and other federal agencies met at the Boise Interagency Fire Center this week to assess the threat of range and forest fires nationwide and design a plan to coordinate their suppression efforts.

The Boise center, the only one of its kind in the country, is charged with coordinating the firefighting efforts nationwide.

Center director Jack Wilson said the western states are suffering their sixth year of drought, creating conditions which favor widespread fire. "The moisture is real low in most areas in the West. If we get the lightning, we're in trouble," he said.

In the southeast, Hurricane Hugo cut a wide

swath through South Carolina last year. The powerful winds knocked down trees and brush over a 6-million-acre area.

"It's dead and down and that makes it doubly dangerous," he said.

He said the region generally has about 100 tons of dead trees and brush per acre, but in the wake of Hugo, the potential fire fuel has more than doubled.

"If it gets going, it's going to be a disaster. I'm looking for a rough, tough year," Wilson said. Adding to the problem is a lack of manpower. Nearly 2,000 fewer civilian firefighters will be available to suppress the fires this summer, officials said.

Timber programs and other competing programs have taken up the manpower. They're just not available this summer and may not be for the next five years," Wilson said.

Sixty-three "shotgun" crews, well-trained first-attack firefighting teams of about 20 people each,

will lead the nation's firefighting efforts along with 395 smoke jumpers.

Including support crews, nearly 20,000 firefighters will be on line for this season's blazes, but Wilson expects the need for more help.

"Most of the time, civilian firefighting forces are more than adequate, but in the event it becomes necessary to call for military help, we want to be ready to do that."

Military representatives and management personnel from the Bureau of Land Management, Forest Service, Bureau of Indian Affairs and National Weather Bureau spent Tuesday and Wednesday at the Interagency Fire Center reviewing procedures, terminology and firefighting strategies in preparation for the season.

"What we and the 6th Army have learned by working together will be passed on to other branches of the military. They are learning how to respond when we call for help," Wilson said.

## Repackaged Coke II debuts in Spokane

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — Coca-Cola U.S.A. rang in the new year with a soft drink as part of a summer-kick-off promotion. The jazzy Pepsi "Cool Cans" are showing up, coincidentally, in stores in Spokane and other Northwest cities. They will be available nationally by early May, the company said.

New Coke, introduced to the dismay of most Coke aficionados in 1985, debuted here Wednesday under the name Coke II. Coke II keeps the same taste as its predecessor, but Coca Cola officials hope the new packaging and marketing plan will boost sales of the languishing product.

They also hope to take market share from arch-rival Pepsi. "It's the Coke for Pepsi drinkers," said Donald Lenehan, Coke's group brand director for cola brands marketing.

Spokane-area soft drink buyers will have a say in deciding whether Coke II's name, packaging and ad campaign goes national. Coca-Cola will test the product here and in other cities in northeastern Washington and northern Idaho for several months before deciding whether to expand to other markets or go national.

Not to be outdone, Pepsi-Cola Co., the nation's second-largest soft drink company, is introducing four new labels for cans of its flagship soft drink as part of a summer-kick-off promotion. The jazzy Pepsi "Cool Cans" are showing up, coincidentally, in stores in Spokane and other Northwest cities. They will be available nationally by early May, the company said.

Coke chose Spokane as a test market because factors such as the area's racial makeup, income and population distribution are similar to those of the nation as a whole. Surveys show area residents already drink 50 percent more Coke than the national average.

A spokesman for Pepsi-Cola Co., the nation's second-largest soft drink company, is introducing four new marketing effort.

## Idaho governor signs open records bill

BOISE (AP) — Compromise legislation ending a controversy over public access to government records was signed into law Thursday by Gov. Cecil Andrus.

The open records bill was the product of an extended review by a special legislative committee last summer and further refinement by the House State Affairs Committee this winter. Attempts to standardize confidentiality provisions have been under way since a 1984 state Supreme Court ruling that made all government records open to the public unless specifically closed by law.

"This is compromise legislation that is palatable to the individual, to the business community, to the media and to the agencies," House State Affairs Chairman Pam Bengson, R-Boise, said after Andrus signed the measure.

The bill makes 36 specific exemptions from the public access, including records on trade secrets, sensitive personnel information and criminal investigations.

More than 100 other exemptions will be repealed in mid-1993 unless the Legislature after reviewing each decides to extend them.

The only vocal opposition to the compromise was from the Idaho Newspaper Association, representing weekly papers across the state. It claimed the bill was a sellout to government agencies, creating new confidentiality sections without justification.

Alvin Ricken, publisher of the Idaho State Journal in Pocatello and spokesman of the Idaho Allied Daily Newspapers, said the legislation may not be perfect "but it's the best bill in the country."

"We will be better informed as a result of this," he said.

### Tribes, Army Engineers settle lawsuit

LEWISTON (AP) The Nez Perce Tribe and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers have settled a U.S. District Court lawsuit that will allow construction of a \$16 million Clearwater River hatchery to continue. In return for tribal cooperation, the corps will set aside 1.5 acres of the 18-acre Ahshakka site for archaeological work, expand a current site study and pay the tribe \$16,000 for attorney fees and other costs. The settlement was reached late Tuesday and announced Wednesday. The tribe-based tribe filed suit March 2 against the federal agency, contending not enough was being done to search for artifacts or protect those already found by archaeologists. A federal judge later denied the tribe's request to stop work on the project.

### 5 students earn C of I scholarships

BOISE (AP) — Three northern Idaho high school seniors and one each from Boise and Pocatello have been awarded this year's Governor's Scholarships to finance an education at a college in Idaho. "These young people represent the very best and brightest our Idaho high schools produce," Gov. Cecil Andrus said Thursday in announcing the award. Receiving the four-year scholarships worth about \$12,000 were: Eric Hewitt of Pocatello, who will study computer or electrical engineering at the University of Idaho; Susan Lineh of Kellogg, who will study engineering at the University of Idaho; Chad Goins of Lewiston, who plans to study physics in a pre-medical program at the University of Idaho; and Tony Johnson of Post Falls, who plans to study English and history at the University of Idaho. Mark Aechampach of Boise, who plans to study business and education at Boise State University.

### Kuna man fined for stealing timber

BOISE (AP) — Convicted timber thief Richard Moulton has been sentenced to six months' house arrest and ordered to pay \$25,000 in restitution. U.S. District Judge Marion Callister also ordered the 54-year-old retiree from Kuna to serve 150 hours of community service. The sentence imposed on Wednesday places Moulton under electronic monitoring in his home for the six-month arrest period. Moulton, who had no prior criminal record, was convicted of illegally harvesting Ponderosa pine valued at \$136,000 from the Boise National Forest near Idaho City in late 1987 and early 1988.

## U of I educators leery of proposed programs at other 4-year schools

MOSCOW (AP) — The University of Idaho Faculty Council says it fears increased programs sought by the three other four-year schools in the state because of the possible impact on the quality of existing programs already short-funded. But Lewis-Clark State College, Boise State University and Idaho State University officials say these fears are overblown and misguided.

UI's Faculty Council Tuesday passed a resolution expressing its concern about the number of new programs being proposed by LCSC, BSU and ISU and the possible adverse affect on the quality of education.

The issue is scheduled to be raised at the Idaho Board of Education's April 19-20 meeting at Lewiston. Since September, LCSC, BSU and ISU have proposed about 40 new or expanded programs. In the same period, UI has only withdrawn a proposed doctoral program in animal physiology and won approval of a master's degree program in waste management offered jointly with ISU.

Michael J. Dinoto, chairman of UI's Faculty Council, said the institutions "are robbing Peter to pay Paul" to get new programs off the ground. He said new program proposals shouldn't be generated unless the institutions send the proposals through the "budget cycle" for appropriate funding.

George M. Simmons, UI's assistant academic vice president, said UI will give the Idaho Board of Education notice of its intent to propose a program only if it intends to put the program in the budget cycle in the near future.

"I'm not sure all institutions look at it the same way," he said. But LCSC President Lee A. Vickers said Wednesday he doesn't think new programs "are an option or a luxury."

Everything is changing so rapidly today that colleges must phase out and add new programs to make sure their programs are current and relevant, he said. "Postponing" implementation of new programs until ongoing programs are adequately funded is kind of "like ignoring reality," Vickers said.

Michael Gallagher, ISU's academic vice president, said the views of UI officials are "very understandable." As a mature institution, UI isn't in the same position as BSU, ISU and LCSC, which are proposing new programs to meet their role and mission statements adopted in 1983, he said.

Gallagher said ISU is only funding three new programs in the coming fiscal year, honors and international studies programs for \$35,000, and the waste management program with UI for \$50,000.

Reid also wrote that he feels the project is not the threat to the environment Owens and Stallings fear it is. "The owners are committed to having Thousand Springs operate in an environmentally sound manner... using the best available pollution control technology," he said. "Hundreds of new jobs and mil-

lions of dollars in new tax revenues will be produced by the construction and operation of the project, and it will produce electricity for states throughout the western United States," Reid added. Reid asked Owens to re-evaluate his position, and to meet with him and owners of the project to discuss the issue.

## Nevada senator blasts Owens for stand against project

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nevada Sen. Harry Reid has blasted fellow Democrat Rep. Wayne Owens of Utah for attacking the proposed Thousand Springs coal-burning power plant. Reid has written Owens complaining that his actions could threaten millions of dollars of investment in the northeastern Nevada plant and the hundreds of jobs and plentiful electricity the project would produce. Owens and Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, jointly criticized the plant Tuesday, saying while it would create power for the West Coast and jobs for Nevada, Utah and Idaho would receive only downwind pollution.

Owens and Stallings said they would ask the federal Bureau of Land Management to stop the transfer of land needed for the plant. The two also want a draft environmental impact statement rewritten to consider pollution in Utah and Idaho.

"Work has been under way on the project since 1983 and more than \$64 million has already been invested by the project's owners," Reid wrote. "Binding commitments have been made for an additional \$11 million in expenditures by the end of this year."

## New coach Eustachy steps aboard Vandal whirlwind

TWIN FALLS — Although he's still learning the ropes, there's one thing newly installed University of Idaho head basketball coach Larry Eustachy already knows: It takes a big combination of many things plus a little smoke and mirrors to put together a juggernaut on the Vandal campus. CBS announced Sunday that it would not retain Musburger after 22 years with the network and its affiliates. Shaker said he picked Buck on Wednesday but decided to wait a day before finalizing his choice.

## Musburger accuses CBS of 'vendetta'

"In my opinion, it was not a network firing," Musburger said in an interview with Sam Donaldson. "It was a personal vendetta on the part of two people."

"These two men had decided I was too big for my britches and they were going to take me down a peg or two."

Shaker and Pilson each issued one-sentence responses to Musburger through CBS spokeswoman Susan Kerr.

## Newcomers Donald, Huston lead the pack at the Masters tourney

AUGUSTA, Ga. — Mike Donald came to his first Masters tournament with low expectations.

"I hoped I wouldn't have a bad round and shoot myself out of contention," Donald said. "Realistically, I just wanted to finish in the top 24 so I could come back next year."

Donald, with only one PGA Tour victory in his 10-year career, far exceeded his expectations.

He shot an eight-under-par 64 Thursday to lead another first-time Masters player, John Huston, by two strokes.

"It was the round-of-my-life," Donald, 34, said as tears welled in his eyes. "I played a lot of rounds as a kid thinking about the Masters and I never shot that good then."

Donald tied the first-round record, set by Lloyd Mangrum in 1940 and almost equaled the course record of 63 set by Nick Price in 1986.

Donald had no indication that he was prepared for such a superb round. "I hadn't been playing well in practice rounds and I hadn't been putting good for six or seven weeks," he said.

So much for the theory that a player should be out of training into this prestigious tournament, the first of the four majors.

Moreover, it has been said that course knowledge is a key here, with the veteran players seemingly aware of every nuance, especially the fast, undulating greens.

"I just played one shot at a time, and when I made a 40-foot-down hill putt on the fourth hole, I thought I had won the tournament," Donald quipped. He had eight birdies, sinking four putts that ranged from 15 to 40 feet.

On a warm, clear day in Georgia, some of the favored players faltered.

Greg Norman, who has been over par in his three previous first

rounds at the Masters — 73, 77 and 74 — stumbled again with a 78. And Seve Ballesteros and Mark Calcavecchia each shot a 74.



# New York Islanders lose playoff opener, LaFontaine to Rangers

**NEW YORK (AP)** — In a hard-hitting hockey game, a rookie goaltender who didn't throw a punch was the toughest guy on the ice.

"We had our chances, but (Mike Richter) made some big saves for them," New York Islanders coach Al Arbour said after a 2-1 loss to the New York Rangers in the opener of their Patrick Division playoff series Thursday night.

Richter, making only his second playoff start, made 28 saves, including one on a second-period penalty shot by Randy Wood, as the Islanders' lead in the game was eroded by the jump on their suburban rivals.

The Islanders may have lost more than a game. Their top scorer, Pat LaFontaine, was taken off the ice on a stretcher with 1:17 remaining. LaFontaine was elbowed off his feet by James Patrick and into Chris Nilan. He landed on his back and was unconscious for about a minute.

The Islanders' star was wheeled off the ice wearing a neck brace and taken to Lenox Hill Hospital for tests and overnight observation.

"He was out for about 45 seconds," trainer Mark Aldridge said.

"Neurologically, everything's OK as far as I can see. But right now, we want to take every precaution," head coach Al Arbour said after the game.

When the final buzzer sounded, the game disintegrated into a series of fights. Referee Don Koharski called five game misconducts, including two to the Islanders' Ken Baumgartner and six fighting penalties.

The Islanders refused to comment on whether the fight had anything to do with LaFontaine's injury.

The Rangers, who didn't announce their goaltending choice until the last minute, got a great performance from Richter, whose only previous playoff start was a loss in the final game of last season's four-game blowout by Pittsburgh Penguins.

"He played a game that everybody dreams about playing," center Bernie Nicholls said. "Mike had a tremendous game in goal."

Richter's biggest moment came at 9:35 of the middle period when he stopped Wood on the penalty shot after a defenseman — Normand Rochefort — was called for throwing his stick as the Islanders' winger cut in on goal.

"I tried to shoot around him," Wood said. "But he backed up pretty quick, so I had to go up instead. I just couldn't lift it."

Richter said he had a definite plan against Wood.

"Randy Wood's a fast skater," Richter said. "I came out-of-the-crease to take the angle away from him. Then I backed up and tried to let the shot hit me."

The Islanders' only goal came on a soft 40-footer by Bryan Trotter late in the second period.

The win gave the Rangers a 1-0 lead in the best-of-7 series, which resumes with Game 2 Saturday night at Madison Square Garden. Games 3 and 4 are scheduled next Monday and Wednesday at Nassau Coliseum.

Mark Fitzpatrick played almost as well for the Islanders in his first-ever playoff start. He made 24 saves, giving up goals to Nicholls in the first period and Mark Janssens in the second.

Penalty-killing units dominated for both teams. The Islanders, the NHL's top power-play team on the road, went 0-for-4. The Rangers, who had the league's most productive power play with 103 goals, were 0-for-7.

with the game's only power-play goal as the Buffalo Sabres beat the Montreal Canadiens 4-1 Thursday night in the first game of their Adams Division semifinal series.

Vaive tipped in Doug Skrudland's shot from the point midway at 9:55 while Montreal's Brian Skrudland was in the penalty box for hooking.

Daren Puppa made 34 saves, several of them outstanding, and Dean Kennedy had a goal and an assist for the Sabres. Dave Andreychuk and Bob Corkum also scored for Buffalo.

Skrudland scored Montreal's only goal at 7:45 of the second period. The Canadiens, who were down 3-1 going into the third period, were hampered in a comeback attempt when they had to kill off a major penalty to Mathieu Schneider for boarding at 7:51.

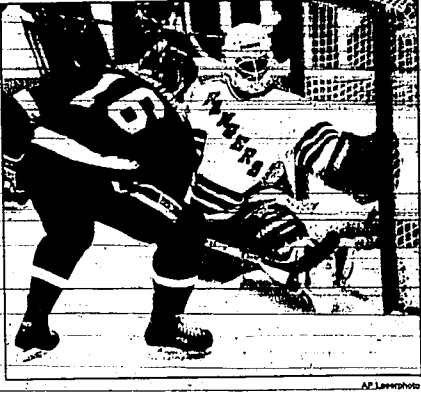
## Hartford 4 Boston 3

The decision to restore women's basketball was announced two days after the Oklahoma Senate approved a resolution deploring the action and one day after a Washington, D.C., public interest lawyer said he might challenge the move in federal court.

### Extortion suspect released on bail

**TAMPA, Fla. (AP)** — A self-described New York gambler who prosecutors say has a history of threatening people, was allowed to remain free on bond Thursday pending trial on extortion charges involving New York-Yankees owner George Steinbrenner.

Howie Spira, 30, pleaded innocent and was scheduled for trial in May on an eight-count indictment. The indictment charged that Spira threatened to damage Steinbrenner's reputation and physically harm him and outfielder David Winfield.

During arraignment before U.S. Magistrate Paul Game, defense attorney David S. Greenfield of New York said he planned to ask the court to transfer the case to the Southern District of New York.

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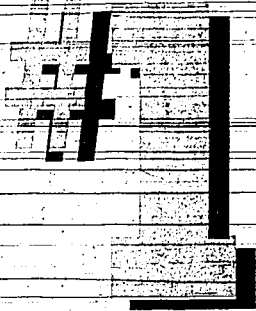
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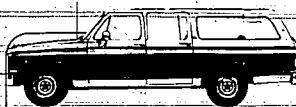


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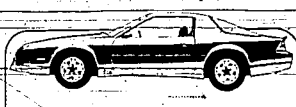

TWIN FALLS - Mention patriotic music, and most people are apt to think of "The Star Spangled Banner," "America the Beautiful" and "My Country, 'Tis of Thee."

But there are other, lesser-known examples of music designed to stir the heart and soul of every proud American. And in this Idaho Centennial year, the Magic Valley Chorale has unearthed some of these gems for its spring concerts.

The shows are set for Saturday night and Sunday afternoon in the College of Southern Idaho's Fine Arts Auditorium. The chorale, under the direction of Carson Wong, will be accompanied by the Magic Valley Chamber Orchestra.

One highlight of the performance will be "Lincoln Speaks," featuring selections from the speeches of the 16th president set to music by W. Lawrence Curry.

U.S. Rep. Richard Stallings, Idaho's Democratic representative to Congress, will narrate this piece. He follows in the footsteps of Gov. Cecil Andrus, who accompanied the Magic Valley Symphony in its recent rendering of "Lincoln Portrait" by Aaron Copland.

Curry, a product of Pennsylvania, is best known for liturgical works including "Psalm of Gratitude," "God is our Refuge," "Sing Ye! The Savior's Birth." Chorale member Leslie Kerr will join Stallings in narrating "Lincoln Speaks."

Taking pages from the writings of another great president, Thomas Jefferson, the chorale plans a presentation of "The Testament of Freedom." Randall Thompson composed the piece in honor of the 200th anniversary of Jefferson's birth.

The composition's first performance was at the University of Virginia on April 13, 1943. The concert was broadcast nationwide and relayed over the airwaves to American soldiers then fighting overseas.

Another work slated for this weekend's concert is "An American Tribute," a medley of much-loved American folk tunes arranged by Robert Cundick.

His selection includes Woody Guthrie's "This Land is your Land," "Shenandoah," "Down in the Valley," "This is my Country" and "Dixie."

Of "Dixie," Lincoln said, "I have always thought 'Dixie' one of the best tunes I have ever heard." Surprisingly, he made that remark during the Civil War, when Dan D. Emmett's song was practically a call-to-arms for the South.

Continuing the patriotic theme, the chorale will perform "Freedom Song, 1776," an arrangement by Theron Kirk that includes excerpts from "On Far Away Hill," "The Liberty Song," "Yankee Doodle" and "Hail, Columbia." This work will feature narration by Sandy Foster and a solo by Camille Cox.

More than 130 Magic Valley musicians have been rehearsing weekly since January for the spring concerts. Proceeds from the performances will go toward music scholarships for area students and to Music Fest, the College of Southern Idaho's summer music camp.

## Some musicians lip-sync way to concert perfection

Is it possible for pop concerts to be too perfect? Janet Jackson, whose "Rhythm Nation, 1814" videos exhibit Swiss-watch precision, would say no. Her recent live performance in Pittsburgh was more a stage show than a concert. There were no mistakes, no missed steps, no impromptu jams and few off-key notes. With its smooth sound and heavy choreography, the whole affair screamed "control."

The members of Milli Vanilli, whose singing ability is the subject of much entertainment-industry derision, obviously agree with Jackson -

and then some.

Jackson at least mixes live music and tape. The West German breakthrough duo lip-synced entire performances during a recent AIDS benefit at Radio City Music Hall and at February's Grammy Awards (where, in rich irony, they received the award for best new artist and, backstage, claimed to be as musically significant as Bob Dylan).

Reports from last summer's Club MTV tour, which also featured Paula Abdul and others, tell of a tape malfunction that caused Milli Vanilli to storm offstage when its vocals stopped. A few minutes later, fans heard the vocals come back to life, but the band was in the dressing room.

# One of a kind: Sarah Vaughan

LOS ANGELES — The call came late in the evening, bearing news many of us had long feared we would soon hear: Sarah Vaughan was gone, dead of lung cancer at 66.

There was a strange, sad irony to the timing, for on the previous day she had been scheduled to make a recording session: Quincy Jones, who had planned the date, knew how ill she was but hoped she would have enough strength left to come to the studio, but over the weekend she collapsed, was hospitalized and finally, when the doctors knew there was nothing more that could be done, she was brought to her home Tuesday.

Sarah Vaughan's voice was exceptional from the beginning, but in the early years nobody could have predicted the evolution that would come. The expansion of her range, the fullness and beauty of her tone quality, the unique control over an audience. She could hold a crowd of 18,000 at the Hollywood Bowl spellbound with a version of "Send In the Clowns" that invalidated every other rendition.

A few admirers who are still around may recall the very first night of her professional career. As the young girl rose at the Apollo Theater in New York, we saw the Earl Hines Orchestra, and adjoining Hines' piano was a second piano, played by this slim girl who had just turned 19. Vaughan was a trained musician whose studies of piano and organ equipped her with a knowledge of harmony that enabled her to alter a melody in subtle, unprecedented ways. Halfway through the show she stepped away from the piano to center stage and sang "Body and Soul." It was the start of a career that would scale new heights with every decade.

Because of her sensitive ear for the new jazz of the day, she became part of a group of friends who were launching the bebop movement. One was Billy Eckstine, whom she knew when both of them were singing in the Hines band. When he left to form his own orchestra she too quit and joined Eckstine, whose popularity at that time was such that she was only a secondary figure. Another close friend was

Dizzy Gillespie, who worked with her in both the Hines and Eckstine bands.

One day Gillespie gave me a demonstration record Sarah had made. Clearly the time had come for a Vaughan recording session. On New Year's Eve of 1944, with Gillespie and a few others on hand, we produced a date for a small company, Continental Records. One of the tunes was a vocal version of Gillespie's already well-known composition "A Night in Tunisia."

The records, issued on two 78s, did modestly well; a few months later we did a second session, in which both Gillespie and Charlie Parker took part.

There was a lull of a year or so, then Albert Marx began recording Vaughan for his Musieraft label. She rose swiftly to hit stature with "Body and Soul," "It's Magic," and others that showed the extent to which she had already transcended the jazz category. There was an unforgettable version of "The Lord's Prayer" and a moving spiritual reading of "Sometimes I Feel Like a Motherless Child."

She was an awkward, skinny girl with a gap between her two front teeth, but after her 1947 marriage to a trumpeter, George Trethewey, he became her Pygmalion; by 1950, as a couple of film shorts remind us, she was an attractive young woman with limitless potential. It wasn't always onward and upward—After many popular recordings, first for Columbia and Mercury, later for Mainstream and Pablo, she became a victim of the rock onslaught. Sales-obsessed record companies ignored her, there were two five-year periods when she was not recording at all. But the international concert and festival tours left no doubt that with or without gold discs she retained that magical grip on audiences wherever a human voice could penetrate.

She was our Jessye Norman, our Renata Tebaldi. The operatic beauty of her sound was like nothing that had preceded it, and it is unlikely that anything comparable will ever succeed. "Sassy," as she was called, would not want us to mourn her death, but rather to celebrate her life. She would probably want us to send in the clowns, but somehow we just can't do it.

# Selecting videos for children doesn't have to be confusing

For many parents, walking into the children's section of a home-video store, facing shelves full of mostly unfamiliar titles, can be an unnerving experience.

"Which ones will the kids like? Is this one too sophisticated? Is that one too violent? Who's Barney and the Backyard Gang? Who's Lamb Chop?"

Even for veteran parents, it's hard to keep up with all the new titles. For new parents, it's tough to know where to start.

Here are some guidelines from two experts on children's video: Loretta MacAlpine, children's video writer for the trade journal Video Insider, and Nancy Steingard, vice-president of acquisitions for HITops Video, one of the industry's foremost kidvid companies.

Reviews. Regularly reading reviews of new children's videos in women's and family magazines and in newspapers is one of the best ways to keep up with the flow of new product and to help form judgments. MacAlpine recommended Family Circle, Redbook, Woman's Day, Parent's Choice Magazine and, particularly, a New York-based publication called Children's Video Report.

Word-of-mouth. "Parents should talk to other parents and find out what they've seen and watched," Steingard suggested. "Find out what they recommend. They can often tell you about content and that will help you make judgments."

video-store people and find ones that know the market — whose judgment you can trust.

Libraries. MacAlpine says that some libraries have children's cassettes — often for free. Library personnel will probably have screened the titles and most likely can offer guidance in making selections.

Video companies. The market is flooded with companies, putting out kidvid titles. But there are a handful of companies that critics suggest that you can be fairly certain of getting quality. Disney, MacAlpine said, is the company best known for first-rate kidvid. Others that usually put out high-quality product, she said, are HITops, Celebrity, Hanna Barbara, Family Home Entertainment and Random House.

Awards. Some cassette packages bear stickers showing that the title has won an award. "If it's an award given by a recognizable organization — one that you've heard of and respect — you might be more inclined to give that one a try," Steingard said.

Synopses. The descriptions on the back of the video box can be helpful. "Don't just trust the pictures on the box," Steingard warned. "They can be flashy and misleading. Take time to read the copy on the back. Sometimes it can be a decent guide. But read it with some skepticism because some of what you'll read is just hype. But some of it is fine. Sometimes that's all you have."

Her rule No. 1 is to avoid renting or buying what kids see on Saturday morning TV.

"I can say that every week," she said. "Look for original programming, for what they can't see on TV. ... The real advantage to being familiar with what's on the market is that you find out about that interesting and different new video — one that you might overlook if you didn't know to look for it."

Most kidvid titles, Steingard said, are in the \$10-\$15 range. But often you'll find some that are well under \$10. Beware of the cheapies, she warned.

"When you see something that costs \$3.99, who can resist it?" she said. "But unless you know about the title, you may get burned. There are a lot of fly-by-night companies out there exploiting the market. You may get it home and find that it's horrible quality. Ask yourself, 'Why is it that cheap?' Generally because there's something wrong with it somehow."

MacAlpine suggests screening whatever you buy before showing it to your kids. "Particularly with small children, take the time to check it out first to make sure it's not too sophisticated and violent for them," she said. "You know your child. Maybe there's something in the video that's OK for other children but not yours. Maybe there's something that's perfectly fine for an 8-year-old but not for your 3-year-old."

"You may say you don't have time, but aren't your kids worth that extra time?"

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# When a movie isn't working, even the stars can't save it

**HOLLYWOOD** — Up to its last reel, "Stanley and Iris" was a very promising film. It centered on an important issue (adult illiteracy); it carried an authentic sense of blue-collar urban America; it featured two of the biggest stars in the business, Jane Fonda and Robert De Niro, in a tank with hardly a ripple.

Despite the charismatic presence of Paul Newman in a fine performance, "Blaze" flickered out disappointingly.

At the other end of the issue "Mountains of the Moon," an impressively scaled historical epic with two exciting but unknown actors in the two major roles, has not found the audiences you would have thought it deserved and might get.

As the late king of Siam might have observed, it's a puzzle. What the evidence says, and it is part of the risk in a high-risk picture, is that stars cannot save a picture that audiences don't want to see. In certain instances, however, a movie that better have a very strong and appealing script.

The plus of casting stars is their bankability. The money people are willing to lend money on the strength of the stars' visibility and track records. The real risk is that the stars carry with them all the baggage of their previous performance.

There is evidence that some adult illiterates develop considerable speaking skills to help hide their illiteracy, but it's a fool's paradise.

It's the miracle of star acting that

audiences willingly suspend their disbelief to accept Dustin Hoffman as an autistic savant, for example, or Meryl Streep as an Australian housewife or Tom Cruise as a rage-filled paraplegic. But when that suspension of disbelief doesn't happen — and it may well be nothing do with the acting — there's a hell to pay in the accounting department.

It may well be that the customers didn't give two hoots about Gov. Earl Long and the fetching stripper who came into his life, and it didn't make any difference who enacted him. It may be, to some degree, that Paul Newman has been fortunate to have so often that a corsete accent only reveal the actor acting.

That, finally, is the real challenge, to conceal all the artifices of which the movies are built. When a movie works, the acting as acting is invisible; music, photography and all the rest become, as it were, merely inevitable and the surrender to the dream — not why it doesn't work, you're watching a movie and you know it.

In certain instances, like John Waters' current "Cry-Baby," knowing it's an outrageous camp on the movies is the whole idea, and the frenetic joke is its own pleasure. But when you're meant to be there in Waterbury or Louisiana, and you aren't, quite, it's a problem.

There is an irony in speculating that "Mountains of the Moon" might have been a more substantial box-office success with star actors in its two key roles. Patrick Bergin and Ian Glen were splendid as the explorers Richard Burton and John Speke, and they almost certainly have conspicuous careers ahead of them. (There is a further irony in that their admirers will then want to look back and see "Mountains of the Moon" again.)

Despite the spectacular African scenery, the robust drama, the high emotions and the evident passion of director Rob Rafelson, the project is widely known and without the

"holler" of star names, an exceptional film has had hard going.

It's a further complication, but true to say, that the presence of Tom Cruise and his pre-existing image as one of the sexiest young stars around was an impracticable help — born on the Fourth of July — his performance, one of the best of any year, was an almost total departure from his image, although the glimpses of the handsome young Cruise as the pro-Vietnam "Rou Kove" heightened the tragedy of the later Kovic in his wheelchair.

The relentless intensity of the film made it a grueling experience; it would, I'm sure, have been an even harder sell without the lure of Cruise as being not just young and appealing but self-effacingly brilliant.

Daniel Day-Lewis had had the beginnings of a fine career before "My Left Foot," with memorable roles in "Room With a View," "The Beautiful Game" and "A Super-Leading Part In 'The Unbearable Lightness of Being.' But in "My Left Foot" he was unrecognizable, as unknown as a known actor has been since John Hurt was the Elephant Man. The fiery and uncompromised nature of his portrayal of Christy Brown generated the word of mouth that made it a star-creating role and led to that thunderous, spontaneous standing ovation at the Academy Awards.

What seems finally true is that there are virtually no stars who the customers will go to in anything these days. Eddie Murphy perhaps. Which actress? Who else? Stars will generally enhance the success of a successful script (Kevin Costner in "Field of Dreams") and relative unknowns can enhance the charm of a successful script (the players in "sex, lies, and videotape," "Mystic Pizza") and may become stars in the process.

But if there are puzzle pieces about acting, and there surely are, the iron law of the industry is that the announced early in the 17th century is still that the play's the thing.

# McCartney adds more concerts

BERKELEY, Calif. — A Paul McCartney tour spokesman said this week that McCartney will return to North America in July for a fourth leg of his world tour. New dates include RFK Stadium in Washington, D.C. (July 4); Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, N.J. (July 11); Veterans Stadium in Philadelphia (July 14); Olympic Stadium in Montreal (July 18); Municipal Stadium in Cleveland (July 20); and Sullivan Stadium in Foxboro, Mass. (July 24). A date is being negotiated for New Haven, Conn., where city officials are objecting to the potential

traffic and noise problems.

Tour announcement out of the way, McCartney entered to applause from the hardly objective press.

Asked about a Beatles reunion, he said, "We've been trying to do a film, 'The Long and Winding Road,' for several years that would be the definitive Beatles story, done by us, adding that 'extra music' might be written by the former Beatles himself, George Harrison and Ringo Starr. He also said that the group might play at a 50th birthday tribute to "my mate John Lennon" in Liverpool later this year.

McCartney said that he is working on a "classical project" with Carl Davis that is set to debut at Liverpool Cathedral in 1991.

He decided to embark on this tour because "I'm 47 and still feeling good" and "as long as the people come, I'll show up."

And about performing the old Beatles songs, he noted, "There's enough water under the bridge (the disputes he has had with the other Beatles) and I realized that if I didn't do these songs now, that I might not do them again. I also realized that I'd never done some of them live."

# 'Falcon Crest,' 'Newhart' among likely casualties of TV season

The official TV season — that is the Nielsen ratings season — ends a week from Sunday. However, the game has been set for weeks for many of the ratings underachievers.

It has been evident for some time, for instance, that "Falcon Crest" has lost its sparkle and verve. "Newhart," too, will be leaving the air under circumstances that, at best, are not as favorable as voluntary.

NBC's treatment of "AFL" over the past month or so indicates that the furry alien is on the verge of being catapulted out of the prime-time universe. And despite what Oliver Stone said at the Academy Awards, the Vietnam War is over for "Tour of Duty" — and might be winding down for "China Beach."

ABC, CBS, NBC and Fox won't announce what will be on their fall lineups for another month, but it's fairly obvious what won't be on those schedules. Here's a night-by-night list of the likely casualties and survivors.

**SUNDAY**  
The stunning midseason emergence of "America's Funniest Home Videos" and "The Simpsons" as top 20 attractions has changed the dynamics of the night.

Most significantly, those hot new series on ABC and Fox might have short-circuited a CBS scheme to return to an all-series configuration, as it had in the mid-'80s. Then, shows such as "The Jeffersons," "Alice" and "Trapper John, M.D." filled the 9-to-11 block where movies now play.

The key to a revival of this strategy was a dominant "Murder, She Wrote" to provide a potent lead-in. However, with "AFlH" having overtaken "Murder," and "The Simpsons" also crowding "Angela Lansbury's" series, CBS cannot count on a huge audience being in place at 9 p.m. So another year of movies on all three networks is likely.

NBC will have at least one revamped hour and could be new from 7 to 9 p.m. The series that have filled these hours are "Disney," "Sister Kate" and "Ani Jolson" — the three lowest-rated shows on NBC.

The two sitcoms are gone. NBC lured "Disney" from ABC three years ago because it wanted to be in business with the Mickey Mouse company. However, with "Disney" continuing to erode the "Disney" lead-in, NBC might decide that there is no future for this relationship and end it.

"Life Goes On" has generated more critical praise than ratings, but that should be enough for ABC to grant it a second season.

ABC's Gary Shorrock's "Show 11" is definitely leaving Fox, and "Tracy Ullman," "Open House" and "Booker" are strong candidates to go, too.

**MONDAY**  
The newly appears to have won off "ALF" for NBC. The first ominous sign was the senseless shift to Saturday. Even more foreboding, in its final challenge show on Saturday, "ALF" achieved one of its highest ratings in weeks, and outscored "A Family for Joe," which followed it. But the NBC ratings highlight story, distributed by the network publicity mill, praised "A Family for Joe's" performance and made no mention of "ALF."

"The Hogan Family," which owes its life to "ALF," for having provided a strong lead-in when it was trying to become established, is a certainty to return.

"Newhart," for years an underappreciated gem, will reach the end of the line in a few weeks. The network and the producers could get together for another season, but the two sides could not reach a financial agreement. CBS wouldn't bend very far given "Newhart's" mediocre ratings and older-skewing demographics.

"The Doctor," "Doctor" look like throwouts, and Valerie Harper's "City" is in dire straits, too.

One out for the network could be back, although the network might use one or two in an attempt to establish a beachhead on some other night.

"MacGyver" quietly keeps rolling along on ABC in front of football, and Fox seems certain to retain "21 Jump Street" and "Alien Nation."

**TUESDAY**  
ABC and NBC are both solid, so far as the late fall weeks. There will be no change. It will be the movement of one of the established shows to another night.

Other than "Major Dad," "Rescue 911" is the only member of CBS' freshmen class from this past fall that will make it to sophomore year. If past patterns hold, CBS will begin the fall with a number of new shows from 9 to 11 p.m., then quickly revert to movies when the series flop.

**WEDNESDAY**  
ABC could be faced with its own "Beauty and the Beast" here. "China Beach" often finishes third in the time period against underwhelming opposition, but it has a vocal cult following that is sure to scream "Philistines," "barbarians," "censorship" and any other pejorative that can think of if ABC cancels the series.

One out for the network could be shifted to a dead zone, say Saturday or opposite Team-Cosby on Thursday. The odds in favor of such a move would become lower if "Equal Justice" outperforms "China Beach's" numbers during its spring run.

Anything But Love" is a dead issue. It has been getting clobbered by everything it has been up against.

All-NBC's shows will be back, though not necessarily in place. The

surprise has been the late season surge of "Quantum Leap," which has become a time period leader.

CBS' strategy is probably dependent on its new series development. It's being optimistic about "The Young Riders" and "Normal Life," but the Valerie Bertinelli series appears to have a stronger shot to survive.

"Jake & the Fatman" looks safe, but "Wiseguy" could be fingered for extinction if CBS feels it has some promising new dramas. The "Wahl series has always been a cult show, and the cult keeps getting smaller. Many weeks "Wiseguy" runs third against what is considered very moderate competition.

**THURSDAY**  
The only question at NBC is what will be replaced in between "Cheers" and "L.A. Law." "Grand" does about as well as "Dear John" in the cushy hammock, but the highly regarded "Wings," which premieres in two weeks, could jump ahead of both "Dear John" and "Grand" some place, but "Grand" is in the bubble. However, NBC made a number of concessions to Cosby producer Carney-Werner, who also produces "Grand," and retention of the frothy serial could be one of them.

ABC and CBS both must decide if the time is right to seriously shelve "Cosby." The guess is ABC will and CBS won't. If this is the case, "The Father Dowling Mysteries" are in trouble and "48 Hours" is safe.

One possibility for the latter would be the naming of Connie Chung as its permanent host. This would solve the problem of what to do with the precy Chung, while eradicating the lowest-rated hour of the week. Her Saturday news magazine.

ABC also faces a dilemma with its high-priced, low-rated team of Sam Donaldson and Diane Sawyer. Supposedly, "Prime Time Live" has a long-term commitment, but so did "Dolly Parton."

**FRIDAY**  
NBC could cancel its entire night or bring all its series back without raising eyebrows. The guess is "BC" and "CBS" will be swept out, while "Nasty Boys" and "Manacus" survive.

CBS is committed to one more year of "Dallas," but its companion soap, "Falcon Crest," is going down the drain. The opening hour of the time line will have to be dealt with unless "Bagdad Cafe" and "Sugar and Spice" have impressive springs.

ABC could stand pat with its comedies and "20/20," but if a change is made, the most likely to

go is "The Ten of Us"

son, Burt Reynolds' "B.L. Stryker" looks dead, and "Kojak" and "Christine Cromwell" have never shown any signs of life.

Then again, the mysteries haven't gotten any "H.E.L.P." from their lead-in, which has been challenging Connie Chung for the bottom rung on the ratings ladder. "Mission: Impossible" was never more than filler until something better came along.

"Tour of Duty," "Paradise" and "Chung's" magazine have the distinction of comprising the lowest-rated night in the history of television. If CBS doesn't take them off the air, it's NBC's handling of "Perry Mason" affiliates will.

NBC seems intent on tinkering with the 8 to 9 p.m. hour. "ALF" has an audition there, "A Family for Joe" is trying out now, and a couple of other shows will have spring trials. These aren't promising developments for "Amen" and "227," particularly the latter. Otherwise NBC will stick with its winning hand.

ABC and CBS will have to start from scratch. If the "ABC Mystery Movie" survives in any form, it will be as occasional "Columbo" movies. ABC's handling of "Perry Mason" affiliates will.

CBS will need a new 9 p.m. series to fill the gap where "Top of the Hill" and "Island Son" flopped.

"Knots Landing" remains television's most popular soap. It's not inconceivable that CBS would move it to go back-to-back with "Dallas" or move "Dallas" to achieve the same result.

# 'Mutant Ninja Turtles' a commercial commodity

**HOLLYWOOD** — Movies adapted from comic books or strips have one great advantage: Their title characters are already stars, and they aren't tied up in package deals with fancy talent agents.

But they have a disadvantage too: What's alive on the page can't always be made to live and breathe on the screen. Witness "Foghorn Leghorn," "Witness," "Swamp Thing," "Witness" (Batman) — who was alive but seemed to have trouble breathing under that big stiff suit.

Now comes "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles," based on a hot-selling comic that started as a simple spoof on "serious" martial arts comics and quickly grew into cult status and spawned a cottage industry. There are Ninja Turtle T-shirts, figurines, a cereal, a Nintendo game and now — inevitably — a Ninja Turtle movie.

It's a big, loud, frazzled movie, crammed with special effects and charging, nimble, chuck-waving Turtles: the Renaissance reptiles Michelangelo, Leonardo, Donatello and Raphael. This ferocious four — "Turtles" gets its plot partially from the original story by comic book creator Kevin Eastman and Peter Laird, but it's been slicked up and banalized into the usual revenge saga. Wicked Oruku Sakai (James Saito), alias The Shredder, killed Splinter's master years ago. Now he terrorizes the city, with his underground army, The Foot and a mob of juvenile thugs.

"Turtles" abound; the feisty TV anchorwoman, April (Judith Hoag), at-

The movie lacks real personality. It is written by veteran TV sitcom specialists Bobby Herbeck and Todd W. Langen) like a celebrity roast and filmed like a horror pastiche. There's not much differentiation in the Turtles, though some have mysteriously picked up California. "dude" argot and one — fix-it man Donatello — is recognizably voiced by Corey Feldman.

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tacked by Foot soldiers and saved by "Turtles" is employed by a shifty TV executive (Jay Patterson) whose son, Danny (Michael Toney) is one of the gang.

Because any hint of a liaison between April and the Turtles might seem out of bounds, another even more curious romantic interest has been supplied: Elias Koteles as Casey Jones, a weirdo long-haired free-lance crime-fighter who runs around in a hockey uniform, bashing people with his stick.

You might think a character like this should be locked up. Here he's projected as a cross between Matt Dillon, Wayne Grutzy and a hipster Lone Ranger. Every once in a while, when the screenwriters want to demonstrate urbane wit, they have April and Casey exchange insults.

Director Steve Barron's rock video and fantasy specialist, he

made the excellent "Money for Nothing" Dire Straits video. Yet there's not much visual style here; the electronic acrobatics can't overpower the movie's weak, starchy dialogue. And even though "Ninja Turtles" was produced by the Hong Kong company Golden Harvest, Barron doesn't get the style that might have worked: the wild, tongue-in-cheek zip and kinetic fury of the Hong Kong action movies.

"Ninja Turtles" is probably a monster success because of that great title, and because of the visual gag of furious snarling turtles — muscles rippling — hurling through all Bruce Lee's moves.

What might seem the most insurmountable task of all — making four plausible chop-sooty turtles and a shaman out of the only one that's been executed well in the film. Jim Henson's animatronic puppet Turtles have a delightful range of expression and movement, screwing up their faces with the pliable whimsy of Kermit the Frog.

The movie itself is loud and frail, screaming in a vacuum. Children will certainly like the puppets and perhaps even the humor. Fans of the

comic may be pleased that scraps of it remain. But "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles" (MPAA rated PG, despite hubba-hubba sexual patter) never rises above its marketing-hook origins. It's a product, a commodity, a toy tie-in, a trailer for the comics, an advertisement for the cereal. It's a naked sell.

# 'Born' is intense, emotional

**BORN ON THE FOURTH OF JULY (R)**. No one can doubt director Oliver Stone's sincerity, any more than he can his talent for bravura emotionalism. Possibly because Stone empathizes so enormously with his main character co-writer Ron Kovic, who came back from Vietnam at age 21 paralyzed from the chest down, he directed the movie with the specificity that made "Platoon" so electrifying. His scenes, and their ironic juxtaposition, explode like land mines. Tom Cruise delivers fierce physicality, empathy, the ability to work full throttle and a quality of defenselessness that is terribly touching.

**DRIVING MISS DAISY (PG)**. Morgan Freeman gives an immensely gracious and subtle performance as an Atlanta chauffeur in this rather musy adaptation of Alfred Hill's 1987 Pulitzer Prize-winning play. Jessica Tandy is the cranky widow. Their performances give the film a human gravity that helps counteract the too-measured pacing, its tone of civic uplift. Directed by Bruce Beresford from Uhry's adaptation of his play.

**THE HUNT FOR RED OCTOBER (PG)**. There's an amiable smartness to this underwater thriller. Its film makers know that a little technology goes a very long way, and if they hope to keep an audience entertained they'll have to do it with story, not hardware. Director John McTiernan, whose signature is sleek action ("Die Hard"), his first-rate cast (including Sean Connery, Alec Baldwin, Scott Glenn and Sam Neill) and writers Larry Ferguson and Donald Stewart have managed this nicely. You may not be limp from accumulated tension when this hunt is over, but its cautiously up-

beat global message leaves a satisfying glow and the premise is a crack-jack one.

JOE VS. THE VOLCANO (PG)

the cassette?!) Cassingles are also seen as far more disposable than 45s were. Said Tower's Koenig: "Kids don't collect them like records. They just dump them." Will they stop buying cassingles altogether as technology provides alternatives?

The latest wrinkle on the singles scene is Personics, a system that allows personal compilations of up to 25 singles on one cassette — sort of your own greatest-hits collection. It takes five minutes to replicate 40 minutes of music, complete with a personalized label that sings over from 50 cents to \$1.50, depending on its length and popularity.

Customers choose selections from a catalogue of more than 4,000

songs. (The system has the capacity to eventually hold 15,000 titles.) The catalogue spans all genres from the 50s to recent releases, from classical to contemporary. But the list is less than extensive — while songs from the Smithereens, Alanis Myles and Chuck Berry are available, tunes from the Beatles, Rolling Stones and Bob Dylan are not.

Personics officials say it's unlikely that their system will put an end to cassingles. "This is just another methodology to market singles to self-recorder music," said one company official.

Still another outlet is the jukebox, where the 45 still reigns — providing there are 45s to put in the juke. That's something of a concern among the more than 225,000 juke-

box operators in the United States.

This concern may be addressed by Record Source International, a subscription service that serves secondary and tertiary radio markets with 45s. RSI's latest effort is to purchase 45s from record companies specifically for jukeboxes. With a no-return policy and sufficient quantities, labels can justify pressing 45s, said Sam Atchley, RSI product acquisition manager.

Still, even the future of jukeboxes is not in 45s, said Fred Newton of the Amusement and Music Operators Association. One day, all the jukeboxes in all the juke joints in America will come of age and play CD singles, he said. With CDs, jukeboxes can hold up to 1,000 selections, instead of the 200 available with 45s.

Market up slightly after rumors fade away

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock prices drifted through a mixed session Thursday after a rumored financial storm in Tokyo failed to materialize.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks, which had been down 17.34 points Wednesday, rose 1.80 to 2,721.17.

Declining issues slightly outnumbered advances in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 703 up, 744 down and 540 unchanged.

Volume on the floor of the Big Board rose to 144.7 million shares, against 159.54 million in the previous session. Nationwide, consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those securities, amounted to 1.1 billion in the over-the-counter market, totaled 175.9 million shares.

Prices of U.S. stocks pulled back on Wednesday amid talk that the battered Japanese market might be hit with a fresh wave of selling overnight.

As it turned out, Tokyo stock prices did decline sharply in early trading, but then recovered most of their losses.

Analysts said that calmed some fears that pressure on stocks in Japan might soon start to exert an increasing influence in other markets around the world.

But at the same time, brokers said, traders in this country were proceeding carefully in advance of Friday's monthly report on the employment situation.

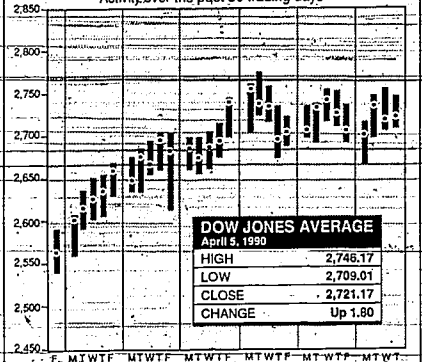

Estimates in the financial world call for an increase of perhaps 150,000 to 180,000 in non-farm payroll employment for March, which would be considerably smaller than the gains reported for January and February.

Among Japanese issues traded on U.S. exchanges, Matsushita Electrical climbed 7 1/2 to 144 1/2; Kyocera 3K to 100; Hitachi 7K to 104 1/2; and Honda Motor 1 1/2 to 23 1/2.

Tandem Computers led the active list, down 4 1/2 to 22 1/2. The company said revenues for the fiscal quarter that ended last weekend fell short of its target.

Bank stocks were also notably weak, faced with what analysts described as the prospect of a long and arduous review government regulators of lending practices in the industry.

The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks slipped .16 to 187.15.

Standard & Poor's industrial index rose .07 to 396.06, and S&P's 500-stock composite index was down .36 to 340.73.

The NASDAQ composite index of over-the-counter market listed 2,000 to 433.42. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index closed at 361.23, up .11.

Petroleum firms have been slowing their domestic capital spending, for exploration and development and they have been shifting these activities overseas, partly in response to environmental concerns in the United States.

In addition, petroleum spending "reflects rising world-oil prices resulting from increasing worldwide demand and declining production in the United States and the Soviet Union."

Alliances in developed countries plan to invest a total of \$42.3 billion in developing countries plan a 15 percent boost to \$11.7 billion following a 15 percent advance year earlier.

"Manufacturers have been attracted by favorable conditions abroad, including increasing European economic integration and rapid economic growth in East Asia," it continued.

The largest manufacturing increases were in primary and fabricated metals, non-electrical machinery and transportation equipment.

The boost in primary and fabricated metals is mainly for construction and expansion of aluminum smelters in Canada, the department said.

"In transportation equipment, European manufacturers of automobiles are expanding capacity in anticipation of market growth related to the 1992 single-market initiative of the European Communities," it said.

"That initiative is also increasing spending in non-electrical machinery, particularly by European computer-manufacturing affiliates."

The department said petroleum affiliates plan an 8 percent increase to \$15.6 billion after boosting spending 9 percent in 1989. Those affiliates had said they planned a 6 percent boost in spending in the initial survey.

U.S. firms plan boost in foreign spending

WASHINGTON (AP) — American companies plan to boost their overseas capital spending by 13 percent this year, up substantially from a 2 percent increase projected six months ago, the government said Thursday.

The Commerce Department said a survey conducted in December showed that majority-owned foreign affiliates of U.S. companies plan to spend \$54.9 billion after increases of 14 percent in 1989 and 24 percent in 1988.

The increases over the three years are widespread by area and industry, the department said, reflecting parent companies' growing emphasis on overseas operations.

Manufacturing affiliates said they plan a 17 percent boost to \$27.4 billion in 1990, up from 2 percent in 1989 and 15 percent in 1988.

The department said all manufacturing industries plan increases.

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Shopkeepers fear Japanese stores more

TOKYO — Japan's reluctant concession to help introduce American supermarkets and department stores in the country will deliver precious little benefit to the United States, in the view of merchants here.

The issue, which evolved into the most contentious sticking point during four days of trade talks in Washington this week, is regarded by many neighborhood businessmen as more symbol than substance.

They say the real beneficiaries are likely to be big Japanese retailers already poised to take advantage of the headway won by the Americans.

"Even if the Americans come in, I don't believe they will have any impact on me or other small shopkeepers," said Yukio Hosaka, as he dusted a display of Italian handbags in the small women's accessories shop kept for his wife's use.

"I can't think of any products the Americans make that the Japanese want to buy. So, it's our big stores, not yours, that will fill the gap."

The compromise agreement, wrung by U.S. trade negotiators from the Japanese counterparts in Washington, will gradually roll back the law restricting the proliferation of large retail shops. The law is intended to protect neighborhood mer-

chants, a conservative voting bloc which backs the ruling Liberal Democratic Party.

The U.S. argument against the law was that it kept American products out of Japan because only large-scale retailers, American or Japanese, have the shelf-space and marketing abilities to stock and sell American goods.

But the millions of mom and pop merchants operating traditional hole-in-the-wall shops, the presumed victim of the law is altered, or removed, don't seem to believe that the change will have much effect on reducing the \$49 billion U.S. trade deficit with Japan. Nor do they seem worried their own businesses will suffer at the hands of Americans.

Indeed, small shopkeepers interviewed in several Tokyo neighborhoods said they were far more concerned about coming under increased competition from large Japanese retailers.

The merchants claim that Americans lack the necessary know-how to establish adequate distribution networks in Japan. The country's arcane distribution system, heavily burdened with multiple layers of middlemen, is commonly credited with keeping prices of all goods, Japanese as well as imported, roughly 50 percent higher than they are in the United States.

"This problem is between the Japanese supermarkets and us," Yamamoto said. "As business people, we'd like to sell American products, or any products, if they'd sell well here. But the United States is big and its tastes are rough. We Japanese prefer finer, European-style goods."

The perception is widespread that increasingly wealthy Japanese are turning to Europe, not the United States, to fulfill their finicky tastes.

U.S. negotiators argue that less exclusive American products would speak for themselves and that Japanese consumers, sick of notoriously high prices, would welcome less expensive alternatives.

But an officer of the country's largest consumer group noted that Japanese commonly equate low prices with inferior merchandise.

"This is the result of large marketing firms, with the government's complicity, controlling the flow of adequate information to consumers," claimed Shigeo Ohshima, secretary general of Shodanren, the national consumers organization.

Furthermore, pricing surveys indicate supermarkets and other large-scale merchandisers do not lower prices. A recent study conducted by the Tokyo metropolitan government found that in a market basket of 47 household items, 22 were cheaper in supermarkets while 22 were cheaper in small stores. The remaining three articles were exactly the same.

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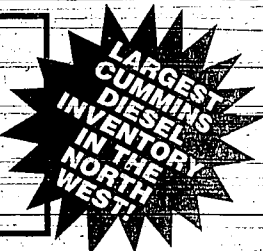


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

# ABC's new drama brings sophistication, mystery of the big screen to television

With the two-hour debut of the seven-episode ABC series "Twin Peaks" on Sunday, April 8, you'll hear a lot of fancy words bandied about. "Autour," "evocative" and "aficionado" are just a few of the terms that no doubt will find themselves in use on the television page.

Like Mickey Mouse's ever-multiplying broomsticks in "The Sorcerer's Apprentice" portion of "Fantasia" (1940), film-speak will threaten to take over all things television, for this week at least.

The drama "Twin Peaks," which moves into its regular time slot on Thursday, April 12, is certainly derivative of the seminal "Blue Velvet" (1988), a film made by that auteur you've no doubt heard about, David Lynch. (Lynch's other films include "Eraserhead," "The Elephant Man" and "Dune.") Co-created and co-written with Mark Frost ("Hill Street Blues"), Lynch's "Twin Peaks" is just as powerful as "Blue Velvet" — and as puzzling.

Both begin with the bizarre. In "Blue Velvet," Kyle MacLachlan (who also plays FBI agent Dale Cooper in "Twin Peaks") finds a severed ear. In "Twin Peaks," the body of Laura, a high school homecoming queen, is found neatly wrapped in plastic by the side of a lake.

The mystery deepens as "Twin Peaks" progresses. Laura, we learn, was not just dating her boyfriend Bobby Briggs (Dana

Ashbrook). Her loony psychiatrist, Dr. Lawrence Jacoby ('50s movie icon Russ Tamblyn), hints he knows something more. So do many of Laura's friends, especially Donna Hayward (Lara Flynn Boyle) and James Hurley (James Marshall).

It's a murder investigation that will consume the whole series. The investigation is conducted jointly by the intense Cooper and town sheriff Harry S. Truman, played by Michael Ontkean.

It's quickly apparent that both films are not evocative of anything from Spelling-Goldberg. No "Charlie's Angels" or "Fantasy Island" here.

But the longtime television viewer who remembers "Peyton Place," the seminal nighttime soap opera that aired from 1964-69, may find something oddly familiar in "Twin Peaks."

The dark "Peyton Place" was based on Grace Metalious' racy (for that time) 1955 best seller. (There was also an excellent 1957 film version starring Lana Turner.)

Metalious' book blew the lid off a small New England town, maintaining that very little in it was the way it seemed. That's also the case with Twin Peaks, a small town in the Pacific Northwest.

There's lots of symbolism in "Twin Peaks," and decoding it is fun for everyone, not just film aficionados. Now if we could only figure out the significance of the town mill-owner, played by sexy Joan Chen ("The Last Emperor"). On "Peyton Place," it was staid old Marlin Peyton (George Macready) who ruled the roost.

That's yet another question for whoever eventually teaches the inevitable David Lynch course in Cinema 101.

**A: Newton won the 9-year-old lawsuit and a jury awarded him \$19.3 million. However a federal judge later cut down the award to just over \$5 million, although the jury's libel finding was upheld. NBC is appealing the verdict and the case goes back to court this month.**

**Q: We've sent a letter of protest to CBS, but do you have any idea why the network is dropping our favorite show, "Newhart"? How long has it been on? — F.F.**

**A: The show has been on for eight years, and Bob Newhart blamed MTM, which produced the series, for making unreasonable demands causing CBS to dump it. However, MTM counterclaims that Newhart's salary demands caused the surprise cancellation.**

**Q: Hasn't former TV comic Carl Reiner become so estranged from his successful son that the two**

# Healy has broken out of skid row

When you need color on a show, look to the Irish. It's paying off on "Santa Barbara" as James Healy turns on the charm as multimillionaire playboy Derek Griffin, back in town for puzzling reasons.

"Derek has a very dark secret," says Healy. The Irish in the man knows how to play that. Better yet, the workload increases because Derek has caught on with fans.

On "Dynasty," Healy portrayed Sean Rowan, Joan Collins' psychotic husband for a while, and life was a picnic. One camera setup and a three-day workweek.

"Santa Barbara" is non-stop. "It feels like 100 years," Healy declares. But he's not grumbling. None of that. There's life on the set and the producers are willing to take chances. Healy will work around the clock if need be.

For he remembers, not long ago, when he was Healy, the Irish-American actor with a Dublin Abbey Theatre background and training at London's Royal Academy of Dramatic Arts, that he arrived in L.A. with a return ticket and a few bucks. He would end up on Skid Row.

Three weeks later Don Bellasario of "Magnum, P.I." signed Healy. Bellasario took one look, read Healy's credits and made him the lead in a pilot called "The Ultimate Adventure." When it blew up, Universal Studios put the actor under contract. Aaron Spelling got wind of the fellow and bought out his contract for the "Dynasty" role after Joan Collins gave her approval. "I owe everything to Bellasario," says Healy. "I don't know what would have happened without that man."

When Joan Collins, John Forsythe and company folded camp, Healy went home for more work — three miniseries and two features, including a remake of the Alfred Hitchcock thriller "Strangers on a Train."

Back in the states, the green card was pulled out for "Santa Barbara." Healy now is home gardening in the Hollywood Hills. He shows up at work, puts on riding boots for a polo

scene and swaggers about pretending he's rich. "It's all play."

"I had decent dramatic training, but it's my life in the streets that pays off," says Healy. "I come from a family of 14. We emigrated to Australia for a better life. I took up acting because there was nothing else. One day I'm on Skid Row, now I'm a playboy. I just follow my instincts. What else can you do?"

# Oscar night and Walters' special leads ABC to 1st; Burnett gets strong start

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Oscar and Barbara teamed to lead ABC to first place for the week in the Nielsen TV ratings, while Carol Burnett returned triumphant to prime time on NBC, according to figures released Tuesday.

The 62nd Annual Academy Awards, a 3½-hour foot-dragger on Monday night, was No. 1 in the ratings for the week ended April 1. The follow-up "Barbara Walters Special," featuring interviews with Chevy Chase, Arnold Schwarzenegger and Warren Beatty, ranked sixth.

Season-ranked No. 1 NBC had occupied the top spot for 23 weeks. Its last drop to No. 2 was during ABC's World Series coverage the week of Oct. 9-15.

"The Academy Awards clearly lifted us up there," said ABC spokesman Jim Brochu.

For the week, ABC was first with an average rating of 14.8; NBC was second with 13.3 and CBS was third with 11.7. Each rating point represents 921,000 homes.

"Carol & Co.," a half-hour, comedy variety show featuring Miss Burnett and an ensemble company, was in ninth place for the week after a Saturday night debut on NBC.

## 'Cosby Show' returns for 7th season with record renewal deal

BURBANK, Calif. (AP) — "The Cosby Show" will return for a seventh season after NBC executives and producers of the hit series reached a deal described as the costliest renewal in TV history.

NBC and producers Marcy Carsey and Tom Werner signed a one-year contract calling for 26 new episodes in the 1990-91 season, the network said Thursday.

NBC refused to provide financial details of the contract, but the Los Angeles Times today cited unidentified sources as saying the deal was worth about \$50 million, or roughly \$2 million an episode.

The producers initially sought a license fee of \$3 million per episode, the Times said.

The deal was signed amid widespread reports Carsey and Werner wanted an unprecedented signing bonus of up to \$100 million.

"There is no bonus," said NBC spokesman Curt Block. "This is a standard agreement. We're not discussing what went on in the negotiations."

Since contract talks began in December, the

producers reportedly came under pressure from peers to drop the bonus demands because of fears it would further strain relations with the networks, the Times said.

"Everybody's happy," said Cosby's agent, Norman Brokaw, who is chief executive of the William Morris Agency. "The deal has been finalized. Bill Cosby was not prepared to go somewhere else."

Carsey-Werner Co., which also produces ABC's popular "Roseanne," packs considerable clout with the networks. In last week's Nielsen ratings, three of the top five shows were Carsey-Werner productions.

It also produces the highly rated "Cosby" spinoff "A Different World" on NBC, and the network's new series "Grand," which made its debut to mixed reviews in the winter.

The single-year contract left in doubt whether the enormously popular program would extend its run beyond the 90-91 season. The show was No. 1 in last week's Nielsens.

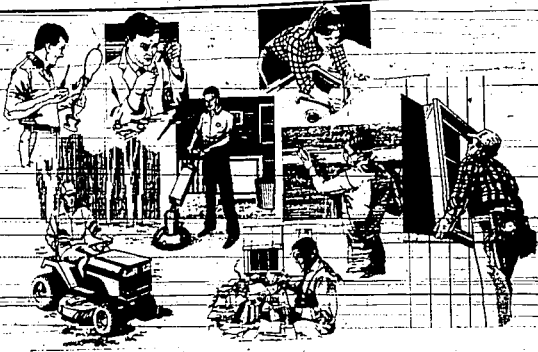
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
