# Kidnappers' demand delays hostage release

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Pro-Iranian kidnappers said Thursday they postponed indefinitely the release of an American hostage because the United States refused to send a senior State Department official to Syria.

College professor Jesse Turner of Boise is among 3 captives being held by the group.

The Islamic Jihad for the Liberation of Palestine in a lengthy statement repeated its demand that John

Kelly, U.S. assistant secretary of state for Near Eastern affairs, fly to Damascus.

It also renewed threats to attack jetliners and airports used to transport thousands of Soviet Jewish emigrants to Israel. Much of the 500-word communique was devoted to the rise in Jewish emigrants, who Arab leaders say could strengthen Israel and displace Palestinians from

the occupied territories.

In Damascus, Syrian Foreign Minister Farouk al-Sharaa said his government has "been exerting a great deal of influence" to secure the hostage release by Sunday. He would not elaborate.

President Bush said the United States has "been disappointed before" by dashed hopes for the release of American hostages and repeated that he will not meet the demands of kidnappers.

# Idaho personal income records 2nd-highest increase for 1989

BOISE — Idaho's per capita personal income last year rolled up the second highest annual gain in the nation, indicating the state's economy may be one of the fastest growing in the United States, but it still lags about 22 percent below the national average.

The Commerce Department reported that personal income attributed to every man, woman and child in the state rose 9.3 percent in 1989, the largest one-

year percentage gain since the 1980s began. Only the state of Alaska recorded a larger increase from 1988 levels at 11.2 percent.

And revised figures on total personal income — a key indicator of economic health — also support an optimistic outlook. They showed total income in Idaho last year grew by 10.5 percent, a rate beaten by only Nevada, Alaska and Hawaii.

The discrepancy between per capita and total personal income is due to the generally larger families in Idaho. The government estimated

Idaho's population last year at 1,014 million.

At the same time, the Small Business Administration released a set of figures that gave mixed signals on the strength of Idaho's economy when compared to the nation and its neighbors.

The administration said business failures in Idaho declined for the second straight year in 1989, falling 38 percent. The comparable national figure was 12.9 percent.

# Compromise on Blaine fishing rules wins approval from F&G

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho Fish and Game Commission adopted compromise fishing regulations for Silver Creek and the Big Wood River Thursday, ending a year-long controversy over fishing restrictions on the two Blaine County streams.

The commission went straight down the line in unanimously approving compromise rules hammered out in a meeting of at least three interested parties in a Haultey grocery store basement a couple of months ago.

"If nothing else, the big fight has brought habitat into the forefront of public consciousness," said Region 4 Commissioner Norm Guth of Salmon. "In the long run, the resource comes out ahead."

Under Thursday's decision, fishing regulations on the Big Wood River change three times as the stream flows south through the Wood River Valley.

According to the rules approved by the commission at its quarterly meeting here, there will be no

changes in the current fishing regulations on the Big Wood from Magic Reservoir upstream to the Glendale Diversion.

From Glendale Diversion upstream to the Idaho Highway 75 bridge near Milepost 122.2, a two-fish slot limit goes into effect. Under that rule, no fish between 12 to 16 inches in length may be kept. Only two fish under or over that length limit may be kept.

From Milepost 122.2 upstream to the main stream's confluence with the North Fork, catch-and-release rules will be in effect.

# Reports of fishing draw group's ire

TWIN FALLS — Reports of Indian fishing for spawning steelhead on the east fork of the Salmon River brought protests from an outdoorsmen's group Thursday.

Mitch Sanhotena, executive coordinator of Idaho Steelhead and Salmon Unlimited, told the Idaho Fish and Game Commission that the commission wasn't giving the East Fork steelhead restoration management plan the protection it deserved.

The complaint touched off a debate that highlighted the first day of the commission's quarterly meeting here. Earlier in the day, the commission approved the long-discussed compromise in management regulations for fishing on the Big Wood River and Silver Creek.

The commission undertakes the major burden of the two-day session this morning: firming up the 1990 big game hunting regulations and seasons. Sanhotena said he had been informed Shoshone-Bannock fishermen had been harvesting the East Fork salmon for about 10 days. "These fish have caused a lot of emotion between you and us," he said. "The sport fishermen have been forced to release a lot of fish for eight months for the past two years to protect this resource. We have waited 10 days from the com-

# Kremlin shuts off Lithuania's gas

VILNIUS — U.S.S.R. — The Kremlin tightened its economic squeeze Thursday on Lithuania by shutting off more than 80 percent of the Baltic republic's gas supply following a complete cutoff of oil the previous night.

The independence-minded republic promptly ordered that the first to lose their energy supplies will be Soviet military bases and factories run by Moscow, according to the parliament's press office.

Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev started his most drastic attempt to force Lithuania to retreat from its March 11 declaration of independence late Wednesday when a pipeline to Lithuania's only oil

refinery was shut off.

Lithuanian Energy Minister Leonas Asmantus ordered immediate gasoline rationing of 30 liters per month for private cars, according to Daina Kalendra of the parliamentary press office. A liter is slightly more than one quart.

"Where we can give up the use of gas, gasoline, any heating or lighting, let us do this, and then we will be able to survive longer and, maybe, we will not be intimidated by these sanctions," government spokesman Ceslovas Luksas said.

# Nicaragua sets plan for Contra dispersal

MANAGUA, Nicaragua — Nine years of civil war that took 30,000 lives appeared near an end Thursday when Contra guerrillas, leftist Sandinistas and the incoming government agreed to a truce and a deadline for the rebels to disarm.

"With this accord we conclude the peace process that started with the elections," said Antonio Lacayo, senior negotiator for President-elect Violeta Barrios de Chamorro, after by Saturday, and the immediate

news conference.

However, President Daniel Ortega cautioned late Thursday that the war is not over "as long as those accords are not fulfilled." He spoke after meeting with Bernard Aronson, assistant U.S. secretary of state of inter-American affairs.

The accord sets a cease-fire that began at noon Thursday; the withdrawal of Sandinista military forces at least 12 miles from the borders of five security zones, to be completed by Saturday; and the immediate

# Paying less than we owe: Tax gap jumps

WASHINGTON — The gap between the federal taxes Americans owe and what they pay will swell to \$127 billion a year by 1992, with the Internal Revenue Service able to collect only about one-fourth of it with existing enforcement efforts, the IRS said Thursday.

"There are no quick fixes" for reducing the tax gap, IRS Commissioner Fred T. Goldberg Jr. told the House Ways and Means oversight subcommittee. "Our long-term ability to deal effectively with the tax gap requires a long-term investment in the health of our tax system."

"There is a growing perception among honest taxpayers that everyone else is out to beat the tax collector," said Rep. J.J. Pickle, D-Texas and the subcommittee chairman. "American taxpayers who voluntarily pay their fair share of the country's revenue needs will not support a tax system that tolerates widespread cheating."

The gap is the difference between the income taxes that individuals and businesses owe on legal earnings and what they pay. It includes cheating through understating income, overstating deductions and failing to file returns.

## Automobile 'convicted' of pollution

OAKLAND, Calif. — As part of an "alternative transportation day" at the Oakland offices of the Bay Area Rapid Transit subway system, an automobile was put on trial Thursday for contributing to the world's environmental ills.

More than 200 cheering onlookers attended the mock trial. After the car was found "guilty" of polluting and clogging up freeways, bystanders took turns carrying on the sentence by smashing the vehicle with water balloons.

"We urge you to strike a symbolic blow for cleaner air," said "Judge" Gregory Proops, who, like many of the other trial participants, is a professional comedian. "But don't try this at home."

## Marla Maples still loves Trump

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Model Marla Maples, who was rumored to be the other woman in the split-up of Donald and Ivana Trump, admitted that she loves Trump during a televised interview aired Thursday.

"I love him," Maples answered when asked whether she had a romance with the billionaire real estate developer in an interview with Diane Sawyer, on ABC's "Prime Time Live."

"I can't lie about it. Oh, I do," she added.

The segment was taped Wednesday in a house in Atlantic City, N.J., where Trump recently opened the glitzy Taj Mahal casino.

Asked if she talked with Trump about marriage,

Maples replied, "No. He's a friend. ... He has a family and that's No. 1 to him, I know."

Was she the reason for the Trump split? "Only the two of them know what really went wrong with their marriage. But I'm not the reason for that marriage having problems," she said, adding, "As Donald has said himself, 'People just grow apart.'"

She called Mr. Trump "an absolutely beautiful woman."

## Mexico warns against abductions

**IXTAPA, Mexico (AP)** — President Carlos Salinas de Gortari on Thursday warned the United States against actions such as the alleged abduction of a Mexican doctor for trial in the murder of a U.S. drug agent Enrique Camarena.

Salinas said his nation has joined the battle against drug trafficking in good faith, "but we will not permit anybody, not drug traffickers nor their pursuers, to violate Mexican rights."

## Medfly war leads to aphid invasion

**LOS ANGELES (AP)** — Ladybugs, honey bees and crickets are dropping like flies in Medfly-infested regions of Southern California soaked in pesticide, leaving gardeners to battle aphids thriving with their natural enemies gone.

"It's gross. It's sickening," said San Gabriel Valley homeowner Peggy Watson, whose orange trees are covered with aphids.

largest percentage decline in the country, more Idaho businesses failed in 1989 than in 1984. Nationwide, the reverse is true — fewer U.S. businesses failed in 1989 than in 1984.

After peaking at 444 in 1987, the number of business failures dropped to 363 in 1988 and to 225 last year. In 1984, 175 businesses failed.

During the same three-year period, the number of entrepreneurs incorporating businesses rose from 1,665 to over 1,900, suggesting an

escalating expansion of a key component in the state's economy.

The dramatic growth in personal income last year outpaced even the optimistic projections of Andrus administration analysts, fueling prospects that the state will generate yet another surplus at the end of the current budget year this summer.

The per capita income growth of nearly three percentage points more than the national average finally helped close the widening gap between Idaho and national income.

"The United States does not kneel under to demands," said Bush when asked why he did not dispatch Kelly to Damascus.

Bush's stand was criticized by an Arab-American leader and a relative of American hostage Terry Anderson. Anderson's sister, Peggy Say, told CBS News she was "totally puzzled by the attitude of reluctance to move forward and get on with this." If they want John Kelly, send

them John Kelly."

M.T. Mehdi, president of the American-Arab Relations Committee in New York, said in a statement that the United States "fumbled" the opportunity.

The kidnappers' statement was accompanied by an instant photograph of Robert Polhill, one of three U.S. educators held by the group since Jan. 24, 1987. It was delivered to the Beirut newspaper al-Nahar and to a Western news agency.

In a communique Wednesday, the group said Kelly should go to Damascus "to coordinate some final steps to guarantee success within 48 hours." They said a hostage would be freed within that time frame but did not say which one.

The White House refused to displace Kelly. Doing so would either have engaged the United States in negotiations over the hostages or given that appearance, a senior U.S. official explained Wednesday night.

gathering of all Contra fighters within the zones. About 9,000 Contra fighters are in Nicaragua.

An addendum said the Contras will start turning in their weapons on Wednesday afternoon, April 25, after Mrs. Chamorro takes office from President Daniel Ortega, with the Contra fighting force to be disbanded completely by June 10.

Missions from the United Nations and the Organization of American States — as well as Roman Catholic Cardinal Miguel Obando y Bravo — were charged with supervising the cease-fire and demobilization.

The accord, completed after 14 hours of negotiations, does not meet the Sandinista Front's demand that the Contras be disbanded by April 25.

But it also makes no mention of

what had been a key Contra demand — that the Sandinista People's Army be neutralized as a condition for the rebels to surrender their weapons.

Mrs. Chamorro's United National Opposition alliance cleared the most from the agreement — the opportunity to start its government in peace, instead of in the middle of civil war.

The commission emphasized that under Idaho law, catch-and-release fishing means anglers can use flies or artificial lures and single, barbless hooks. Anglers are not restricted to fly fishing only.

That means only the Nature Conservancy land in the Magic Valley is under the fly fishing-only regulations.

The new rules for Silver Creek stipulate catch-and-release fishing from Milepost 187.2 to the confluence of Grove and Stalker creeks, again indicating lines of artificial lures with single, barbless hooks.

From U.S. Highway 20 to the Blaine County road bridge north of Paine, Silver Creek will be under a two-fly slot limit, with no fish being in possession.

Fly fishing will be permitted in that stretch.

In what is described as "portion 3" of the creek, that stretch that lies below the department-owned Point of Rocks acreage, will be covered by general regulations.

Fisheries manager Sieve Huffaker of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game said the agency will assemble a study fact sheet after the next three

or four years to see if the regulations are providing the increased size trout they are designed to accomplish.

He said these regulations should be considered "experimental" and subject to change after assessment.

A commission's decision to implement more restrictive fishing regulations on the Big Wood and Silver Creek last year led to a lawsuit by sportsmen, a court injunction staying enforcement of the new rules and to block legislative reconfirmation of two of the commissioners, Guth and Lou Ferrin. (Pocatello) who supported the changes.

Racine added that Fish & Game officials had decided the spawner loss was not fatal to the project.

But Sanchothena replied that the Indians "have been harvesting natural fish (as well as hatchery returns)."

"You have said we need 700 spawners there to fill hatchery needs and maintain the run," he said. "We have only 346 back so far this year. That means the Sho-Bans may have taken as much as 25 percent of the total run."

He said until the Sho-Ban treaty rights have been defined by federal court, the non-Indian fishing public and the East Fork spawning run deserves the protection of the commission.

In other action, the commission: Approved a \$216,000 purchase price of the Frank Bachman prop-

erty, which is dissected by the Bruneau River near the C.J. Strike Management Area. The purchase means that the 160 acres can be managed to the existing staff.

The area is considered excellent upland bird year-round habitat, includes river frontage and at times shelters white-tail deer and turkeys among other upland game. A portion could be shaped into waterfowl nesting habitat.

Tom Hemker, upland game bird manager for Fish & Game, reported that more than 1,000 upland habitat improvement projects have been installed on more than 25,000 acres across the state this year. He said this will require all the funds currently in the upland bird stamp dedicated fund.

Fish and Game received approval to buy a 10-acre site in Coeur d'Alene for a new Region 1 head-quarters.

Steve Huffaker, a fisheries biologist with the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, said his agency first got word of the fishing about two weeks ago and immediately sent conservation officers to investigate. He said in three weekend trips, the officers had counted 16, 14 and 11 fish, respectively, in the Indians' creels. He said the fishing amounted to two sets of two Sho-Ban fishermen.

He added he had called the tribal headquarters in Fort Hall to protest that the fishing had occurred without prior notification and had been told the tribe would exercise its treaty rights after fish.

Sanchothena said his group's information indicated one camp of 10-15 Indians on Herk Creek and another of unknown size elsewhere.

Commission Chairman Louis Racine, a Pocatello attorney, said the Idaho Supreme Court had "many years ago" identified the Sho-Ban right to off-reservation fishing. But he said a federal test case or guidance might take precedent.

Enough moisture remained over southern Idaho late Thursday for a few showers and thunderstorms, the National Weather Service said.

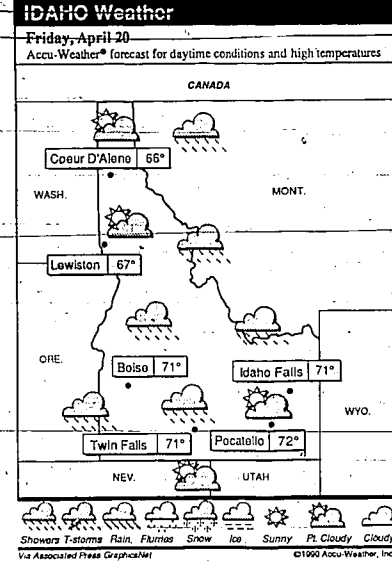
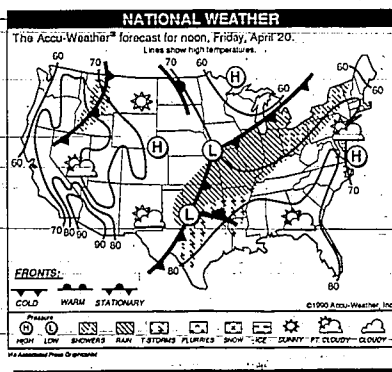
Partly sunny skies were mostly sunny around the state, but clouds were increasing over the north.

## Budget committee slashes defense spending

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Democratic-controlled House Budget Committee on Thursday approved a plan to slash President Bush's defense spending proposal and shift billions of dollars to domestic programs.

The \$124 billion budget for fiscal 1991 was approved on a 21-14 party-line vote. Debate in the full House was scheduled for next week.

House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., said there was "good common sense" behind the Democratic version of the fiscal 1991 budget. He described it as "a sharp

departure from the status quo."

Republicans portrayed the plan as an embodiment of the same old liberal Democratic priorities, with irresponsible defense cuts and loose reins on domestic spending. But they expressed little concern, calling the committee action just an early step in the long-budget process.

"We believe the sooner we get this exercise over the sooner... we can actually begin writing the bill" in bipartisan talks involving the president, said Rep. Bill Frenzel of Minnesota,

senior Republican on the committee.

At the White House, spokesman Martin Fitzwater said the president had "no plans for a summit at this time" on the budget.

The Democratic budget envisions \$295 billion in military spending next year, about \$1 billion less than in the current year and \$8 billion less than requested by Bush.

Three-fourths of the defense savings would be shifted immediately into domestic accounts that include Medicaid, food, stamps, education, AIDS and anti-drug abuse programs.

## Judge appoints trustee to run Eastern Airlines

NEW YORK (AP) — Eastern Airlines said today it would not appeal a federal bankruptcy judge's appointment of a trustee to take control of the airline, a move that ousts boss Frank Lorenzo from that role.

"Although we did not feel a trustee is warranted, we are gratified Judge Burton Lifland has indicated the airline will be reorganized and not broken into pieces," said spokesman Bob Hunter in Miami.

Lifland late Wednesday granted the request of Eastern's unsecured creditors, who sought a trustee because of frustration over the carrier's mounting losses and its plans to cut payments to creditors sharply.

"The flying public's interest must all at once be taken into account," Lifland told a packed courtroom, adding later, "It's time to change the captain of Eastern's crew."

The head of Eastern's Machinists, while welcoming the move, said today the action would not mean a quick end to his union's year-old strike.

"It will not happen immediately," Eastern Machinists president Charles Bryan told a news conference in Miami. "Obviously we have no interest in going back and sacrificing, working very hard and bringing it out of bankruptcy, only to still have Frank Lorenzo own all the common stock."

The judge appointed as trustee Martin Shugrue, a pilot and airline executive who formerly worked for Lorenzo, chairman of Eastern parent Texas Air Corp.

Shugrue, a former president of Continental Airlines, resigned last year under pressure from Lorenzo. Texas Air also is the parent of Continental.

## Bush says U.S. has 'limits' on Lithuania

KEY LARGO, Fla. (AP) — President Bush said Thursday "there are limits" to U.S. patience on Lithuania, but he refused to say when or how the administration might respond to Soviet pressure against the Lithuanian independence movement.

"Yes, there are limits and, having said that, I am convinced that Mr. Gorbachev knows there are limits," Bush told a news conference following a meeting with French President Francois Mitterrand.

On other subjects:

— Mitterrand said that he had

proposed a summit of the 16 NATO allies before the end of the year to discuss the changing face of Europe and that Bush had concurred in the idea.

— Bush, when asked about a report that Mideast extremists had postponed a plan to release one American being held in Lebanon, said, "We've been disappointed before—hope raised only to have them dashed by excessive speculation."

— The Islamic Jihad for the Liberation of Palestine said the release of a hostage was postponed

because of U.S. refusal to send John Kelly, assistant secretary of state for Middle Eastern affairs, to Syria to take part.

— "The United States does not knuckle under to demands," said Bush when asked why he did not dispatch Kelly as demanded by the group.

— On Lithuania, Bush and Mitterrand joined in calling for dialogue to end the confrontation between Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev and the leaders of the breakaway Baltic republic.

Bush said he was "deeply

disturbed" by Soviet threats to cut off natural resources from the Baltic republic — threats the Lithuanians said Thursday had been put into action — but he added that the United States had "not been able to confirm, oddly, the exact extent of a Soviet crackdown."

"There is a real need for a dialogue," said Mitterrand who noted that France, like the United States has never accepted the incorporation of Lithuania into the Soviet Union. Bush and Mitterrand responded to questions while standing side by side in the bright seaside sunshine.

## House subcommittee votes to condemn Iraq

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House panel brushed aside Bush administration objections on Thursday and voted to condemn Iraq for "gross violations" of human rights, including the use of chemical weapons to kill 5,000 Kurds.

The House Foreign Affairs subcommittee on human rights also

voiced to criticize Cuba for harassing human rights activists and denying proper treatment to its citizens.

The non-binding resolutions were approved unanimously and sent to the full committee.

Subcommittee Chairman Gus Yatron, D-Pa., said the State

Department told Congress that officials opposed the measure because it referred to Iraq's "consistent pattern of gross violations" of human rights.

"I think there is no question that Iraq's human rights record is abysmal," said Rep. Doug Bereuter, R-Neb.

## Factories release half their pollutants into the air

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's factories released 4.6 billion pounds of toxic chemicals, including scores of carcinogens, in 1988, the Environmental Protection Agency reported Thursday. More than half of the pollutants went into the air.

The pollution, emitted from 19,762 industrial plants nationwide,

was 9 percent less than a year earlier, but the EPA said the decline may be a result of better record keeping.

EPA officials cautioned that they are unable from the raw figures, the latest available, to assess the health risks to individuals. The data do not take into account levels of toxicity, release concentrations and actual

exposure.

Nevertheless, federal officials have been surprised at the high volume of releases of toxic chemicals in both 1987, when 5 billion pounds of pollution was reported, and 1988. The reporting equipment covers 332 toxic chemicals.

## Makers recall infant pillow

WASHINGTON (AP) — Manufacturers on Thursday recalled more than 600,000 infant pillows and cushions linked to the suffocation deaths of 19 children. The government said parents should stop using any similar pillows.

One firm whose pillows were involved with "more than several deaths" was resisting the recall and could face legal action, said an official with the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

"Today we are announcing that nine of the 10 firms that made these cushions have agreed to recall their products from the public," said Jacqueline Jones-Smith,

chairwoman of the Consumer Product Safety Commission.

"Regardless of who made the product... we urge consumers to please, please, stop using it immediately," added David Schmetzler, head of the CPSC's compliance division. He said the recall could eventually include nearly a million pillows.

Nineteen children 3 months or younger have been "found dead, lying stomach-down" on the cushions since September 1987, said Jones-Smith. Three of the deaths occurred in January and February of this year. Ten deaths occurred last year.

## Peaceful efforts crucial to saving the environment

The celebration of Earth Day 1990 will begin one of the most important chapters in the history of our species. It will be written by a generation that came of age amid the confrontational, often radical politics of the 1960s and '70s.

In light of the lessons of those times, it is worth a moment to assess the radical offspring of the environmental movement of the 1990s. There are citizen groups who believe that violence in the name of environmental or animal protection is justified. Their tactics are "monkey wrenching." Earth First! is a West Coast environmental group whose leaders have advocated violence against the lumber and oil industries and developers.

Members call themselves eco-guerillas. Their training manual instructs followers in the methods of "monkey wrenching." They have sabotaged logging equipment, ski lifts and power lines, "spiked" old growth timber to render trees mortally dangerous to loggers, strung garroting wire at neck level to prevent a cross-country motocross race and advertised in San Francisco for terminally ill volunteers to run high-explosive kamikaze attacks on dams in Rocky Mountain states.

When the cause is just, many of us sympathize with or even participate in direct-action tactics that stretch the limits of the democratic process. Civil disobedience is a time-honored, legitimate response to political and economic exploitation. It requires non-violent tactics, including the willingness to endure the blows of the opposition, to resist violence and the willingness to endure imprisonment for the "crime." It requires extraordinary courage.

By contrast, the Earth First! activists attack at night, destroy property and machinery, endanger human life and then flee.

Like Southern blacks during the 1960s, the environment is vulnerable and subject to exploitation. But the Freedom Riders proved that by daring to challenge the constraints of our democratic institutions the reins of power could be wrested from even the Ku Klux Klan and Jim Crow. They adhered to the democratic process even while testing its limits.

By its approach, Earth First! takes sharper aim at the rule of law than it does at the despoilers of the environment. Their tactics must be condemned as much as the tactics of anyone who favors force over democratic principles: Brazilian generals whose legacy is the burning forests of the Amazon, Soviet leaders who presided

over the barren seas and irradiated landscapes of Russia and the totalitarian regimes of Eastern Europe who traded the health and beauty of their nations for contaminated soil and air, dead forests and genetically mutated animals and deformed children.

We can take hope from some examples that, with courage and persistence, our system can work to preserve our resources, even against the most powerful adversaries. Employing non-violent militancy, a tiny flotilla of Greenpeace volunteers stopped the most powerful nations on Earth from their multimillion-dollar annual whale slaughter.

In democratic India, illiterate farmers of the Chipko movement hugged trees and thwarted bulldozers with their bodies and saved the Himalayan foothills from commercial logging.

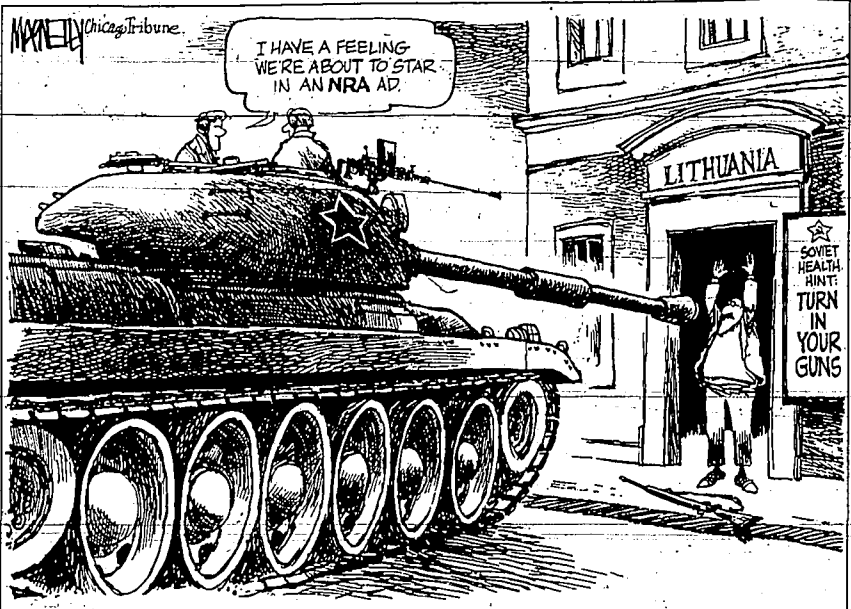
On the Hudson River, a small group of fishermen and other activists fought successfully to protect striped bass habitat against a proposed highway project in Manhattan that was funded by both houses of Congress, supported by both New York senators, the Army, the governor, the mayor of New York, the president, the city's most powerful developers and unions and its daily newspapers.

Justice William O. Douglas envisioned a day when even trees would have standing to bring lawsuits in court to protect themselves. It sounds peculiar, but in 1985 the endangered Palila bird and some human friends successfully sued the state of Hawaii to stop destroying its habitat, and the spotted owl has sued the federal Fish and Wildlife Service to better protect Pacific old-growth timber.

Decades of political action by environmentalists and their friends have brought about the enactment of state and federal statutes that give far-reaching rights to protect the environment. Democracy is ever evolving, but violence, the tyranny of the few, can mutate, even arrest its development.

The democratic process offers the best hope for protecting our natural resources. Should we ever reach the advanced state envisioned by Justice Douglas, it will be due to a courageous citizenry in whose hands democracy has evolved from a system that merely governs human affairs, to one that recognizes and protects the sanctity of all creatures and all life.

## Bill endangers prime hunting land

I approve, in most instances, of Congressman Stallings' actions as my representative in the United States House of Representatives. This letter addresses only Congressman Stallings' sponsorship of a bill to create a national park in southeast Idaho to include the Craters of the Moon, the Great Rift, the Crystal Ice Caves, the King's Bowl and the Arco Volcanic Rift, which includes the Big Southern Butte.

I do not address the issue of grazing because I am not directly affected by it. I believe the Idaho Cattlemen's Association and sheepmen organizations are very capable of protecting their rights or potential loss thereof.

My initial dissatisfaction with the bill lies in the fact that, to the best of my knowledge, there are no national parks in the United States wherein hunting is allowed.

In my opinion, the above-mentioned area contains some of the best sage grouse hunting in southeast Idaho. Some of the best antelope trophies in the state also hide out in this area. We have already provided a sanctuary for these beautiful animals at the INEL. Setting aside an additional 200,000 acres for a national park would effectively eliminate antelope hunting within a reasonable distance of the majority of the population of southeast Idaho.

Anyone who has hunted antelope anywhere near the boundaries of the INEL knows that after the first few shots, every antelope in the vicinity is on the INEL. I am certain the same would apply to any antelope within running distance of a new national park. Believe me, those antelope can run a very long distance in a very short time.

Although not as often seen, and rarely hunted, many magnificent buck deer make this area their home. Also, a small elk herd is currently using the area but can now only be hunted under traditional Indian treaty rights.

These rights will probably be abrogated since the land in question will become "occupied" (if I am using the term correctly). Also, what will happen to the spring hunting by muntjacs anxious to try their eye and skill on rock chucks or coyotes? Or to those hardy individuals who en-

joy snowmobiling in the area? The question stands, will the National Park Service, regardless of what is included in this bill, allow rifles and shotguns to be discharged in an area occupied by tourists?

Only took a whim happened recently in the City of Rocks. Prohibition of hunting would be an absolute necessity and the park service would be derelict in its duties if it failed to enforce such a required regulation. Imagine the lawsuits should a tourist be accidentally shot.

Another area of concern is that most of the access roads into this area (of which there are many) would be closed. The only roads which could be used would be paved. Not every tourist has a motorcycle, ATV or a four-wheel drive vehicle. If this proposed national park becomes reality, development of the area would surely follow, including park administration facilities, rest areas, paved roads, service stations, restaurants and gift shops. This all takes big money nowadays, and where would the National Park Service get the money? From our pockets, of course!

I believe there is an organization (I confess I do not recall the name), which has for several years tried to get someone to build an all-weather road from the Burley/Twin Falls area to the INEL. The stated purpose of the road was to allow persons from that area access to potential jobs at the INEL.

If this is one of Congressman Stallings' reasons for initiating the bill, I suggest it will cost him many more votes than he gains due to both the cost and the loss of free access to the area.

I am quite familiar with much of the area proposed for the park. I cross-country hike throughout it on very frequent occasions for the peace and quiet it affords - no traffic signals, no one telling me to stop or do that (although the BLM does pose some restrictions), along with my thoughts or - if I desire - no thoughts at all. I believe that if the area becomes a national park, rangers will be stationed on high

points to whistle or herd you back onto the paved roads or approved trails should you stray from them.

Perhaps rattlesnake patrols will have to be established to shoo the snakes known as "gentlemen of the desert" away from the trails in order to protect the unknowledgeable or foolish tourist who, upon encountering one, would probably attempt to take a close-up picture of the noisy little fellow.

Seriously, I must admit I occasionally kill a rattlesnake. These are, however, only the bush-whackers - those snakes that insist on exploding with noisy buzzing right under my feet in the middle of a thick bunch of sagebrush, which, in turn, causes me to walk briefly on top of said sagebrush. I leave alone the "gentleman" snake who announces his presence 10 to 15 feet away from me and politely requests that I not disturb him further.

In closing, I must say I do not desire a private walking preserve. At the present time, I believe the Idaho Fish and Game Department, with its water gazzers, and the Bureau of Land Management are doing a very creditable job of managing the area and its wildlife.

I would also like to give credit to those ranchers who provide water to the animals in this area. In late summer, the water becomes very scarce. Yes, this may be incidental to supplying water for their flocks and herds, but who would replace them? I do not want to be regulated out of one of the last large uninhabited and easily accessible areas in southeast Idaho by the National Park Service.

The park service must place many restrictions on the area in order to protect and police the tourists. I believe the negative aspects of such a park heavily outweigh any economic benefits which may (and I emphasize may) accrue to southeast Idaho.

If you agree with me, please make your views known to Congressman Stallings.

## Secretary to consider INEL plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Energy Secretary James Watkins is noncommittal about a cancer research project at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

But the retired naval admiral told Democratic Congressman Richard Stallings on Thursday that he strongly supports a new power reactor design, being developed at the site.

After meeting with Watkins to discuss the future of the eastern Idaho facility, Stallings said he was encouraged even about the cancer research project downplayed in President Bush's spending plans.

"Even though I am very disappointed with the administration's failure to include money for the research program at Idaho in its budget, I was pleased that the Admiral has an open mind," Stallings said.

He said Watkins promised to look more closely at the so-called Boron Neutron Capture Therapy project to treat a special kind of brain cancer.

Stallings is pressing his colleagues in Congress to an extra \$13.5 million to convert an idle reactor at INEL for the research.

"I suspect he has a hundred requests from people daily," Stallings said. "I think he gave us a fair hearing on it."

But Watkins was enthusiastic about the Integral Fast Reactor, a new liquid metal breeder reactor design under study at INEL.

In the past, Stallings has been critical of the Energy Department's approach to new reactor designs, claiming it has not actively supported reactor research. But he said Watkins recognizes that the INEL project will be a "significant component" in developing new power sources.

LEWISTON (AP) — The president of Lewis-Clark State College has rejected student requests for installation of condom vending machines in campus residence halls and the student union.

"I see no justification or reason to have a condom machine on campus," Lee Vickers said. "If students are too bashful to go to Student Health Services or go a block and a half to a drug store, they ought to rethink what they are doing."

Students on the Lewiston campus voted overwhelmingly last week in favor of making condoms available in vending machines, billed as "health" machines that would also offer items like toothpaste, aspirin, shaving cream and other toiletries.

But in addition to condoms already being provided free through Student Health Services, Vickers disregarded the student poll because more than 95 percent of Lewis-Clark students live off campus and there are two drug stores within two blocks of the campus for those who do not want to go to health services.

Student leaders hope to present another proposal to Vickers before the school year ends in one last bid to convince him to change his mind. Health Services Coordinator Cathie Schnabel conceded there was a "great amount of bashfulness" among students when it comes to picking up condoms, and she offered to work with student leaders to provide better service.

# Final shipment from Three Mile Island disaster reaches INEL

ARCO (AP) — The Idaho National Engineering Laboratory's active involvement in the research on the remnants of the Three Mile Island nuclear power plant is winding down with arrival of the final shipment of waste from the nation's worst nuclear accident.

The 22nd train load of material from the Pennsylvania reactor was being processed at the eastern Idaho facility on Thursday after arriving just before midnight.

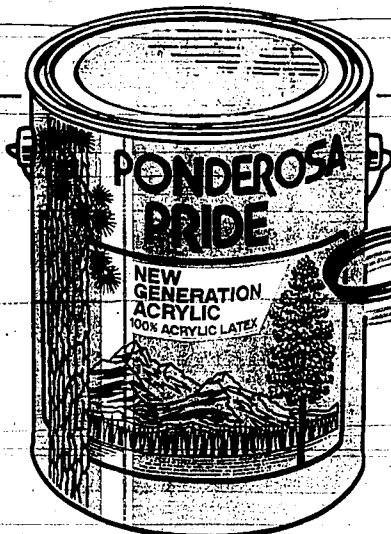
The final shipment of waste in specially designed casks wrapped up nearly four years of cross-country transport of material that were marked by intermittent confrontations with nuclear power critics and

conservationists worried about potential radiation problems should an accident have occurred.

Since July 1986, 165 tons of material from the damaged reactor core have been shipped to INEL for study and then storage pending the opening of a permanent repository for commercial nuclear waste, now slated for

Yucca Mountain in Nevada.

Spokesman Brad Bugger said scientists at the Energy Department facility west of Idaho Falls have already found that most highly volatile fission products remained in the reactor core, containment building and cooling system.

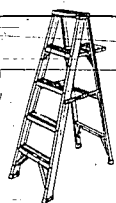

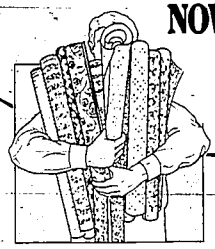

### Company head: Recycling glut threatens industry

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A glut of recycling — especially of paper and cardboard — has depressed prices to the point where recyclers are losing money, said Roger Gillespie, general manager of Utah Recycling.

"From the practical side of it, it's got to work or we close our doors," Gillespie told an Earth Day-related forum at the University of Utah. "There's nothing magical about recycling. If it works, it works

because it's economically viable."

In a marketplace governed by supply and demand, the current recycling effort has overloaded the supply side, Gillespie said. Without a rise in demand, recycling will be abandoned by businessmen who won't make the same mistake twice.

"Once it begins and it fails, it's much more difficult to start it up again," Gillespie said.

In 1980, recycled newsprint was

selling for \$62 per ton. It's present market value is \$18 per ton, he said.

Gillespie can sell mixed grade letter paper for \$17 per ton. But it costs \$55 per ton to buy and ship the paper.

One solution is for consumers to demand and purchase goods made from recycled material is a start, he said. That means asking businesses to stock such goods or ordering them from companies that make them, even if it's more expensive.

### Park visitors will be asked to recycle garbage

WASHINGTON (AP) — Visitors to four of the country's most popular national parks will be asked to recycle glass, plastic and aluminum trash in a program sponsored by two chemical companies and the Interior Department.

Recycling will start next month at Great Smoky Mountains National Park in North Carolina and Tennessee, the first site of the recycling education program launched by Dow Chemical Co., Huntsman Chemical Corp. and the department.

Acadia in Maine and Grand Canyon in Arizona will

be added by June, with plans to expand the program to California's Yosemite by fall. Officials said they hoped eventually to add paper to the list of recycled materials.

"It is time to recognize that recycling is a standard of good citizenship," Frank Popoff, chief executive officer of Dow, said at an open-air news conference near the Lincoln Memorial.

Bill Snodgrass, recycling project manager with Dow, said the first four parks were chosen for their volume of visitors — a combined total of 18 million to 20 million a year.

## De Klerk vows major changes

JOHANNESBURG — South African President F.W. de Klerk on Thursday pledged major changes in apartheid laws as part of his plan for a new constitution that would include blacks for the first time.

De Klerk's speech at Parliament in Cape Town was seen as one of his strongest statements yet on dismantling the country's policies of racial segregation.

Also Thursday, police said officers using shotguns and rubber bullets killed four youths and wounded one while dispersing stone-throwing demonstrators who marched in the Ramulotshi township near the central city of Johannesburg.

The independent 702 radio station said local residents put the number of injured at 19. The residents said the march, which involved about 200 people, was to protest grievances against the township council.

Police ordered an urgent investigation into the shooting, which occurred hours after de Klerk appointed a judicial commission to probe police actions in another shooting March 26. Eleven blacks were killed that day at a demonstration in Sebokeng, a township south of Johannesburg.

## Norway won't block oil sales to Lithuania

OSLO, Norway (AP) — Norway said Thursday that Lithuania is free to buy its oil, but it urged Moscow to lift an energy embargo against the Baltic republic before outside suppliers are needed.

"A Lithuanian delegation led by Prime Minister Kazimiera Prunskiene sought support from Norwegian leaders, but there were no immediate contracts or offers of government aid," said Foreign Minister Kjell Magne Bondevik.

"Norway has not used, and will not use, oil as a foreign policy tool," Bondevik said, adding that it was up to the oil companies to decide whether to sell to Lithuania.

The Oslo trip, planned weeks ago, coincided with the decision by Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev to close the tap of crude oil and restrict natural gas supplies to Lithuania for refusing to scrap pro-independence laws.

"We were expecting this," Mrs. Prunskiene said when told by reporters of the cutback on natural gas. "We believe Lithuania will survive without natural gas, but life will be reduced, cut off from normal possibilities."

Norway pumps 1.5 million barrels a day from North Sea fields, making it the second-largest exporter outside the OPEC oil cartel. It also exports natural gas, but it has no way to deliver it to Lithuania.

Bondevik said he summoned Soviet-Ambassador Alexandre Teterine to express Norway's opposition to the use of economic pressure to thwart Lithuania's independence drive.

He said Norway favored flexibility by both Moscow and Lithuania and urged negotiations without pressure or preconditions, before the conflict threatened East-West relations.

In the talks with Mrs. Prunskiene, "we made it clear that the Lithuanians are free to contact the suppliers of petroleum," he said. "We will not step in, much less hinder this."

The state oil company Statoil has said it was willing to sell oil to Lithuania at market prices for hard currency, but Lithuania has little hard currency. A second potential supplier is Norsk Hydro company, which is 51 percent state-owned.

### Nepalese leader was political prisoner

KATMANDU, Nepal (AP) — Krishna Prasad Bhattarai, a leader of the pro-democracy movement who spent 14 years in jail, on Thursday became prime minister of Nepal's first independent government in almost three decades.

King Birendra administered Bhattarai's oath of office at the royal palace, embarking on a new political course for the Himalayan monarchy where Birendra once wielded absolute power.

After the ceremony at Narayan-heti palace, Bhattarai drove to the government secretariat where he swore in nine ministers. His 10th minister missed the ceremony because of a flight delay, the prime minister said.

### Swiss say 3 Soviet diplomats are spies

GENEVA (AP) — Three Soviet diplomats accredited with the United Nations have been uncovered as spies attempting to obtain restricted technology, Swiss authorities said today.

The three were trying to collect confidential "scientific-technological information," according to the office of the Federal Prosecutor at Bern. They were accredited with the U.N. office in Geneva.

One was stopped last month on a parking lot in Geneva before he was to receive documents from an informant, the office said.

### Vatican, Czechoslovakia restore ties

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican and Czechoslovakia restored diplomatic relations today in a move that expands the church's influence in the former Communist-dominated countries of Eastern Europe.

The announcement of the resumption of ties after 40 years came two days before Pope John Paul II begins a historic visit to Czechoslovakia.

## East German leader sees economic merger in 8 weeks

EAST BERLIN (AP) — East Germany's prime minister on Thursday said the Germans may merge their economies within eight weeks, but he demanded that West Germany pay a bigger price for unification.

Lothar de Maiziere also said East Germany would defend the military interests of the Soviet Union but still would pursue the quick path to unification that Moscow opposes.

De Maiziere, in his first speech to the newly elected Parliament, said a final plan for a single German currency could be in place before Parliament meets for the summer.

"In the next eight to 10 weeks we will lay the foundations for the economic, monetary and social union so that this union can enter into force before the summer break," he said.

## Europe ties sought

PARIS — The leaders of France and West Germany, in a quest for new European security structures, urged Thursday that the 12-nation European Community forge a political union with common foreign and security policies by 1993.

The initiative was proposed as a bold European response to the undefined new situation created by imminent German reunification and disintegration of the Soviet-led Warsaw Pact in Eastern Europe.





# Hailey housing project draws some positive response

HAILEY — A 95-unit housing project that could dramatically change the face of northwest Hailey appears a step closer to approval.

The project that had generated serious objections from Hailey residents at a March hearing received some favorable response at the City Council meeting this week.

The project hasn't been approved yet, however. The council tabled the matter to study whether the proposed zoning change would comply with the city's comprehensive plan. The council may vote at its April 30 meeting.

When the project appeared headed for defeat in March, the developer, North Star, based in Palm Desert, Calif., agreed to make alterations in accordance with resident wishes.

"I've never seen anyone work harder," Mayor Keith Roark said. North Star representative Richard Emik met with neighboring property owners to develop a less dense project on the

25 acres of property. A high-density 140-unit townhome project was changed to 28 townhouse units, 34 cluster homes and 31 single-family units, or a total of 93 residential units. A road that emptied into Empty Saddle Trail was relocated to discourage traffic from using Emik Saddle as a main road into the project.

Trina McNeal, who lives in the bordering Trails End Subdivision, said the new proposal, "was a good one, better than anything else we've seen."

Still, many residents objected to the increased density, saying the property should remain under its present zoning status of LR 1, which would allow only single family residences. North Star has requested that 8.5 acres of the 25 acres be zoned general residential which allows townhomes (condominiums) and "cluster homes."

Emik predicted the project would be built out in just more than four years. Some homeowners felt that if the property remained LR 1, the build out would be slower, creating less of an impact on city services.

# Architects: School sound, but needs work

WENDELL — The high school building in Wendell is structurally sound, architects say, but it does not meet the district's need for more space, it lacks a number of standard safety requirements and it is not energy efficient.

After an extensive examination of all the school buildings in Wendell, James Coles and David Davies of Design West Architects in Boise presented and explained a 15-page analysis to school trustees this week.

The architects were hired as part of the district's new long-term plan for facilities.

In summary, Davies said the high school building, although it is old, is well-built and is worth the cost of renovation.

He discussed a list of safety code violations and how they can be handled.

"Sprinklers, separation walls, draft stops and windows that allow egress could improve fire protection," he said.

The high school needs ramps, toilet area alterations, designated parking and curb cuts to improve handicapped access. "This building is not friendly at all to people with disabilities," Davies said.

To reduce the school's energy bill, Davies suggested such improvements as thermal pane windows, air-tight vestibule entrances, attic insulation and fluorescent lights.

Davies presented a "wish list" of optional improvements, such as patched walls, new paint, replacement of broken plumbing fixtures and carpet in classrooms.

Coles said the most serious problems should be handled as soon as possible. "If that fire had broken into the attic area, it could have taken the entire building," he said.

Both architects agreed the district needs more classroom space.

Trustee Chairman Don Fowler said he is glad to hear the district has a good, solid high school building. Even if the district decides to build a new high school in the near future, he said, the existing building will still be needed because of the growing school population.

Trustee Fred Prins said the district has no choice but to build another building. "There's no way we can go around it because our school population is increasing," Prins said.

The architects will return in May with their final recommendations for the Wendell district.

In other matters, Nate Kelsey, a student representing the principals' advisory council, presented a revised

incentive program for junior high students. The program, he said, has been changed to require more than one teacher to exclude a student from a social event and to involve parents in the program.

A small group of parents told the board last month certain of the policies are unfair.

Students with excessive tardies, incomplete work or inexcusable behavior will be excluded only on events—put-on-for-the-incentive program, Kelsey explained, and all other activities will be open to everyone.

Kelsey said he likes the incentive program.

"I think it motivates students to get their work done on time and get good grades," he said. "A lot of kids have shaped up."

# Diesel plume found near tank leaks

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — A large portion of the 31,000 gallons of fuel that leaked from tanks buried by a religious sect north of Yellowstone National Park may have been found, state health officials said Thursday.

Steve Pilcher, chief of the state Water Quality Bureau, said wells drilled by the area discovered a four-foot layer of fuel floating on groundwater near the site where 17,000 gallons of diesel leaked from one tank.

He said traces of fuel were found Wednesday 21 feet below the surface, but additional wells will have to be drilled to determine the amount of fuel in that area.

The discovery was made while the Church Universal and Triumphant continued to pump fuel from a network of 35 underground storage tanks installed last winter in conjunction with a fallout shelter complex near Corwin Springs.

The tanks and shelters are located

near Mol Heron Creek and officials are concerned that the lost fuel could reach the important trout spawning stream.

"It will have to be accounted for," Pilcher said of the 30,000 gallons that have yet to be recovered.

His comments came during a briefing by Health Department officials here.

Don Pizzini, agency director, said the church has emptied and excavated the three tanks that leaked the fuel. The fuel was buried as a cost prepared for a possible nuclear catalyst, that its leaders have prophesied may be imminent.

The tanks held a total of 634,500 gallons and about 240,000 gallons had been removed by Wednesday night, including all the gasoline.

However, he said the church may not be able to meet the Tuesday deadline for pumping out the re-

maining 350,000 gallons of diesel fuel, heating oil and antifreeze from the remaining tanks.

The department set the deadline in an order issued Wednesday, but Pizzini said the church is able to remove only 40,000 gallons a day with the available tanker trucks.

That means the church needs at least eight days to finish the work, he said, adding that the Tuesday deadline may have to be changed.

Pilcher said the church has decided not to empty the remaining tanks one at a time, but to pump half of the fuel out of each to reduce the pressure and the chance of additional ruptures.

He showed a series of slides taken at the site Tuesday. The pictures show a meadow with large holes and trenches, earth-moving equipment and large piles of dirt that includes contaminated soil taken from around some of the tanks.

# State board approves student fee increases

LEWISTON (AP) — Student fee increases that will add more than \$2 million to operating budgets of the state's four-year college and universities were approved Thursday by the Board of Education.

The board also distributed lump sum payments of \$157.3 million to the four-year schools and \$8.1 million to community colleges. The appropriation included \$20 million more than the current year's higher education budget.

The controversial fee increases were the subject of a series of meetings and hearings on campuses and

represent compromises between school administrators and students.

"I think the students understand the reasons, but they certainly did not want the fee increases," said finance committee chairwoman Diane Bileycan, who appointed committees to study fees' charges part-time and vocational education students.

Board member Roberta Fields argued they should be tied to a cost-of-living index and made part of long-term planning efforts.

Biologist Steve Yundt had said that the May 1 count at Bonneville (the first one we can put any predictable confidence in) would trigger Idaho's reaction to a possible season. He said May 2-3 should be set aside for discussion with the Nez Perce Tribe to determine its fishing plans. By May 4, the commission would be asked to make a final decision one way or the other and set harvest limits, he said.

Yundt said there were indications the Nez Perce would fish Rapid River from noon Friday to midnight Sunday. He said there was no definitive report from the tribe on its plans for the Clearwater.

Sanchothena said his group was concerned about non-Indian fishermen getting an equitable share of the chinook compared to the Indians' harvest. Sanchothena said Indians have harvested in limited numbers for years against total closure for non-Indians.

So far, upper chinook movement has been good for the 39,000 that had crossed Bonneville Dam as of Thursday morning. Idaho hatchery requirements are 5,625.

The lowest predictor Idaho will consider for possible salmon season would be 4,400 at Lower Granite by May 1. The figure stood at 1,180 Thursday.

BOISE (AP) — Estelle Ronneburg had been through more false alarms on the possible release of her son than she cares to think about since he was taken hostage by Lebanese terrorists 1,183 days ago. But she thought this would finally be it — until things fell apart Thursday afternoon.

"This seemed to be the time he was going to be released," she said. "No, nobody knows."  
Only moments earlier in her Boise home, Mrs. Ronneburg found out that the pro-Iranian Islamic Jihad terrorists holding her son Jesse Turner, 42, and two other American college professors had indefinitely postponed their humanitarian gesture to release one of their captives.

Her hopes had run high a day

## Report says Hanford leads problem list

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Hanford nuclear reservation leads the nation's federal nuclear waste dumps in the number of health and safety problems since March 1986, a government report shows.

The study by the General Accounting Office said that nearly two-thirds of the 294 health and safety problems cited at Hanford since 1986 remain unresolved.

The 560-square-mile reservation at Richland, Wash., was followed by Rocky Flats, Colo., with 262 and Fernald, Ohio, with 186, as the Department of Energy sites with the most health and safety problems between March 1986 and January 1990, the GAO said.

DOE and its contractors have resolved only 34 percent of the 1,731 problems cited nationally over the past four years, said the report requested by Congress.

At Hanford, contractors have reported correcting 108 of the 294 problems and DOE has visually verified all but 10 of those.

"Although DOE launched a major effort in 1985 to better define the extent of its environmental, health and safety problems and systematically address them, our work raises questions about DOE's commitment to resolving its problems in a timely manner," the GAO said.

A spokesman for the Energy Department said the department had not seen the final results of the GAO report and would have no immediate comment.

The report said the Energy Department has conducted numerous technical safety appraisals and environmental surveys at its sites and the department, along with its contractors, is taking corrective action.

The DOE's data show that the most of the identified problems remain unresolved and that DOE and its contractors have been slow to develop plans and take actions to correct them, the study said.

Mrs. Ronneburg refused to criticize the administration's decision, saying only, "I don't know the reasons for them not sending him. The reasons may be very good reasons, but they haven't told me the reasons."

Turner was taken hostage from the campus of Beirut University on Jan. 24, 1987. He had been teaching there since 1983. His Lebanese wife Badr and their daughter Joanna, who was born five months after he was captured, were in the United Arab Emirates.

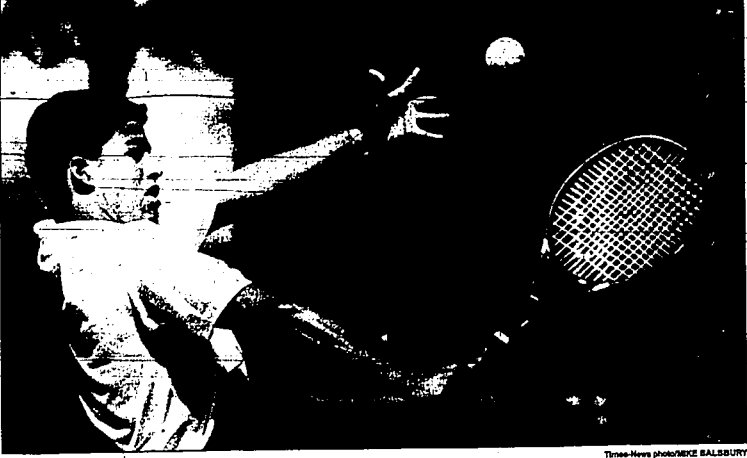

# Rose pleads guilty to false tax return

Baseball great Pete Rose's fall from grace figured its completion Thursday when documents unsealed in U.S. District Court in Cincinnati revealed he has agreed to plead guilty to two counts of filing a false income tax return, a felony.



Rose, who received a lifetime ban from baseball last August following an investigation into whether he gambled on major league games as a player and manager, could be sentenced to a total of six years in prison and be fined a total of \$500,000.  
The charges are related to Rose's alleged failure to report income from memorabilia sales, autograph signings and other personal appearances. Rose admitted in the documents that he under-reported his income by \$355,000 from 1984 to 1987, and owes \$162,703 in additional taxes. During those years his tax returns showed taxable income of \$4.6 million. He paid \$2 million in taxes over that period, according to court documents.

In exchange for the guilty pleas, the government has agreed not to pursue more serious tax charges against Rose, a Cincinnati Reds manager's all-time career hit leader.  
The plea bargain does not include an agreement on sentencing for Rose, who is to appear before U.S. District Judge S. Arthur Spiegel Friday in Cincinnati. Spiegel could sentence Rose to as many as three years in jail and fine him as much as \$250,000 on each count.  
Prosecutors declined to comment on the plea-bargain arrangement, pending Rose's appearance before Spiegel. Spiegel can accept or reject the agreement. In any case, several attorneys said, it would be unusual for the judge to immedi-

ately render a sentencing decision.  
A number of attorneys familiar with federal tax law noted that current sentencing guidelines do not apply to offenses committed before November 1987. Thus, they said, Spiegel could have some flexibility with regard to Rose's sentence.  
Spiegel also presided over the drug and tax-evasion trial of Rose's former associate, Tommy Gioiosa. Gioiosa was convicted last summer of transporting cocaine and of claiming Rose's race-track winnings as part of a conspiracy to defraud the Internal Revenue Service. Rose's race-track winnings are not mentioned in his plea agreement.

Rose's guilty plea came as no shock to Washington attorney John M. Dowd, who led baseball's investigation of Rose's gambling activities.  
“It is not a surprise,” said Dowd, whose 225-page report concluded Rose bet on Cincinnati Reds from 1985 to 1987 even though he was managing the club during those years. “But I get no joy out of another man's miseries. This is a

# Falcons trade draft pick rights

ATLANTA — The Atlanta Falcons agreed on Thursday to trade the first pick in Sunday's NFL draft to the Indianapolis Colts, who will use it to bring Illinois quarterback Jeff George back home.

In exchange, the Falcons, who also will give Indianapolis a fourth-round draft pick this year, will get Atlanta's Pro Bowl tackle Chris Hinton, wide receiver Andre Rison, the Colts' first round draft choice in 1991 and a fifth round pick this year.

The deal is contingent upon the Colts signing George by Friday.

Agent Leigh Steinberg, who flew to Indianapolis earlier Wednesday to begin negotiations with the Colts, confirmed the conditional deal, and said he was confident he could reach a contract agreement with the Colts.

“I'm very optimistic,” he said. “We'll break out the caffeine and camp down until it's done.”

Steinberg represented quarterback Troy Aikman last season when the former UCLA star signed an \$11 million 6-year deal with the Dallas Cowboys after being designated as the No. 1 pick in the draft. He did not say how much he will seek, but said it would be well over what Aikman received.

“It's a new year with a new television contract with enormous growth in it,” said Steinberg. “I would think that once we get started, no matter who we're dealing with, we could get this thing done in five or six hours.”

The television contract increases each team's take from \$17 million a year in 1989 to an average of \$32 million per year over the next four years. The contract total is \$3.64 billion over four years.

The deal brings George back to Indianapolis, where he played high school football. He played one year at Purdue, then transferred to Illinois and elected to pass up his senior year to enter the draft.  
Some sports question whether he's tough enough, but few question his arm.

# Philadelphia 76ers clinch 1st division championship since 1983

AUBURN HILLS, Mich. (AP) — The Philadelphia 76ers clinched their first Atlantic Division championship since 1983 Thursday night as they blanketed the Detroit Pistons in a game marred by a melee in the closing seconds.

When the 76ers won the division in 1983, they went on to win the NBA championship.

The triumph, Philadelphia's 13th in its last 15 games, gave the 76ers a 53-28 record and made Sunday's finale against the Boston Celtics meaningless. The 76ers, who won three of four from the Pistons this season, snapped a five-game losing streak on Detroit's home court, where they last won on Nov. 11, 1987.

The altercation erupted with 14.8 seconds left and involved Philadelphia's Bill Laimbeer and ex-Piston Rick Mahorn. At one point, Barkley, bleeding from a cut on his left temple, went to the bench and grabbed a metal chair before he was restrained by an assistant coach.

Mike Gminski added 16 points for Philadelphia. James Edwards led Detroit with 24 points and Mark Aguirre had 15.

The 76ers took the lead for good on Gminski's jumper with 5:18 left in the first quarter. With Barkley scoring 17 points, the 76ers had a 53-43 lead at the half.

Thomas scored Detroit's first third-quarter points and Laimbeer added five-inning to saw the Pistons narrow the margin to 59-58 with 6:42 remaining in the third period.

# Boston ekes out 1-0 series opener victory over Montreal

## NHL playoffs

BOSTON (AP) — Dave Poulin's power-play goal and Andy Moog's first career playoff shutout gave the Boston Bruins a 1-0 win over the Montreal Canadiens in the opener of the Adams Division finals Thursday night.

The NHL's two best defensive teams resumes Saturday night in Boston.

The Bruins, who had the NHL's second-best power play during the regular season, were scoreless on their first six man-advantages until Poulin scored on the seventh at 17:37 of the second period.

Moog, who has four shutouts in the regular season with a 2.89 goals-against average, made 20 saves for his first shutout in 57 playoff games.

His biggest save came with 1:33 left, when he reached out to pluck Shayne Corson's 20-foot blast from the left side that was headed for the far corner.

The Bruins pulled goalie Patrick Roy for an extra skater with 1:02 left and Boston's John Carter was penalized for high-sticking with 48

seconds to go.

Roy went back in the net for the faceoff but fell again with 36 seconds to play. Montreal, with a two-man advantage, swarmed around Moog but couldn't get a shot on net.

The Bruins had the NHL's best record and gave up the fewest goals, 232. Montreal had the fourth-best record and allowed 234 goals.

The teams are meeting in the playoffs for the seventh straight year. Montreal has won 19 of its last 20 playoff series against the Bruins since losing in 1943. Boston's only series win since then came in the 1988 division final.

Poulin's goal came after Garry Galley passed the puck from the left side of the Montreal zone back to Ray Bourque near the center of the blue line. Roy, the NHL's top-ranked goalie, made a pad save on Bourque's 40-foot slap shot and the puck dropped in the slot.

Boston's Randy Burridge swiped

at it and missed, but Poulin lifted a short backhand over Roy's fifth playoff goal.

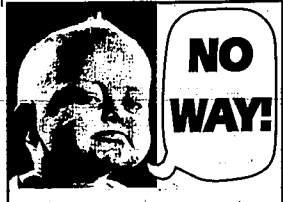

"Man, proud man, Drest in a little brief authority, Most ignorant of what he's most assured."

— Shakespeare.

"Can you come to my help?" asks a housewife. "My husband likes to think he's boss and gave me much unjustified 'what for' after my defense of this hand. He reads your column religiously and will accept you as the final authority."

"I tied my singleton, and Boss Man won his diamond ace and returned the eight for me to ruff."

"I knew this was a suit-preference-signal showing-a desire for a spade return," explains West. "However, I decided to first cash my club ace to cater to the possibility that South had only two diamonds and one club, thus relieving partner of the problem of what to return."

"Well, you can see what happened. South ruffed the club ace, drew trumps and had enough discards to shut out partner's ace of spades. Was my play well-reasoned enough to get your support?"

Her attempt to eliminate any problem for partner displays solid thinking, and she was punished severely on this deal. However, there was a way for her to eat her cake and have it too. Had she returned her spade seven to deny the king, partner should have been able to produce the right defense whether he held four diamonds or five. If four, he gives her an easy ruff; if five, he looks for the club ace because he knows there is no second spade trick.

Had she defended in this manner, she would have scored a winner. If he too then defended accurately, they would beat the game. If he didn't, he would be the one to answer to the "what for's."

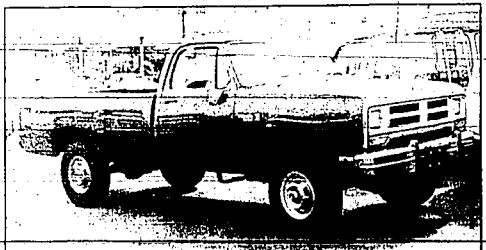

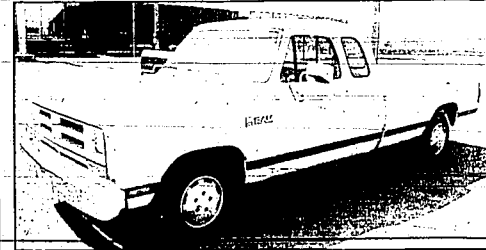

### Sorensen takes 1st place in auto sound competition

**TWIN FALLS**—Tremors were felt in St. George, Utah, last weekend as Joe Sorensen of Audio One took first place in the pro division at the "Spring Quake" auto sound competition. Sorensen took the top prize matching his sound system against 80 other entrants in the 1,000-watts-plus category. He characterized the event as "pretty tough competition," noting that contestants came from all over the West to the central location in the heart of Utah's Dixie.

The winning Audio One system includes a Hi-Fi, amplifier, and MB Quart speakers. Sorensen said the systems were rated for a total of 615 possible points, but noted that "Spring Quake" is a misnomer since loudness accounts for only 140 of those points.

Sorensen estimated his sound system's worth at \$35,000, including \$4,000 in RCA connecting cables alone, and said it's taken about 820 hours of work to bring the system to its championship form. The St. George event is sanctioned by the International Auto Sound Challenge Association. Sorensen said he'll be competing in many more events this spring and summer, probably culminating with "Septembers," world championships in Tempe, Ariz.

## Twin Falls 'stars' spotlight the value of reading

**TWIN FALLS**—In a comfortable easy chair with a lamp to light his favorite children's books, scout leader Lynn Hansen will read to families who gather around to listen.

Jacqueline Wakefield, a Twin Falls attorney, and Duke Wiseman, Principal of O'Leary Junior High School, also will take turns reading their personal favorites in youth literature.

This cozy evening of reading called "Night of a Thousand Stars," will be presented from 7 to 9 p.m. Wednesday in the children's department of the Twin Falls Public Library.

"It's a program that focuses on literacy," librarian Annie-Laurie Burton said. "One way to promote literacy is through family read-alouds. I think it will make parents more aware of the importance of reading aloud," she said.

For additional entertainment, the Pixie Players, a troupe of preschool and elementary children, will act out "If You Give a Mouse a Cookie" by Laura Numeroff and a Canadian folktale, "Parley Garfield and His Frogs."

In conjunction with National Library Week April 22-28, handout fliers on what to read to children and on the importance of reading will be given out along with book markers. Refreshments will be served. Although the presentation is aimed at children from kindergarten through the third grade, all children and their families are invited to attend, Burton said.

In selecting local "stars" to illuminate the "Night of a Thousand Stars," Burton said she and her staff looked for people who are influential in the community, enjoy reading, and are associated with children.

The American Library Association is sponsoring this event and has recruited such stars as first lady Barbara Bush and several famous authors to read aloud in some of the nation's larger cities.

The ASA has asked all libraries in the country to invite their own local celebrities to read this week so the joy of reading aloud can be shared by everyone.

"We'll make it as homey as we can to kind of set the stage," Burton said. "I've been an active reader my whole life," said Lynn Hansen, executive director for the Snake River Council of the Boy Scouts of America. "I won an award in first grade for reading the most books and I've been a patron of the Twin Falls Public Library since I was old enough to look at pictures."

After graduating from high school in 1980, Hansen received a college degree in Youth Agency Administration. He and his wife, Pamela, have two children, ages two and four, and his hobbies are camping, riding mountain bikes, hunting, fishing and, of course, reading.

"Reading has helped me develop an awareness of what goes on around me and opportunities that are available," Hansen said.

When he reads for pleasure, Hansen enjoys suspense novels and the writing of Alister MacLean, Robert Ludlum and Louis

L'Amour. Some of his favorite children's books are "The Three Investigators" by Alfred Hitchcock and "The ever popular Encyclopedia Brown series by Donald Sobel.

Jacqueline Wakefield and her husband, Fritz Wonderlich, read to their three children, ages six, five and three, on a regular basis.

"We generally check out 40 to 50 books every two to three weeks," said Wakefield, an attorney in Twin Falls. "Every night we have a reading time before bedtime. Both my husband and myself are the readers. We take turns."

A native of North Dakota, Wakefield attended law school in Idaho and has practiced in this state for nine years. She said her own reading is limited to newspapers and periodicals because of the demands on

her time. But after a day of legal reading and writing, Wakefield enjoys sharing books with her children.

"We read an assortment," she said. "I can't say we like westerns as opposed to animal stories. The type of books we read covers the whole spectrum of books available."

Duke Wiseman, Principal of O'Leary Junior High School, should feel right at home as he reads aloud to the library audience.

"Since our children have grown and now have their own homes and families," he said, "my wife and I have found much enjoyment in reading to each other alone. We do this in the evening and when traveling."

Through the joint experience, we have found we discuss the work of authors and

have a shared experience that has enriched our relationship.

The couple is now sharing "Alaska" by James Michener, one of their favorite authors.

They also enjoy the classics — Charles Dickens is a favorite — and various historical works.

Wiseman and his wife, Ora Lee, used to read books to their four children.

Later, when the children started to read for themselves, these youngsters would sit in the kitchen and read to their mother as she prepared the evening meal.

"Many hours of reading time were spent in the kitchen over the years," Wiseman recalled.

In a real sense, the kitchen was the Wiseman home-reading library room. "We now enjoy listening to our grandchildren read in that same room," he said.

As an educator for 32 years, Wiseman has been a teacher, dean, athletic director, vice principal and principal, earning a master's degree in education and working with all ages of elementary and secondary students.

With nine grandchildren, Wiseman is aware of the Ninja Turtle craze and so has chosen to take his audience to the far away island of Sala-Ma-Sond for the story of Yertle the Turtle by Dr. Seuss.

"This old-fashioned turtle is sure to be a hit," he said.

## Pollution, environment suddenly hot topics

Like flowers blooming suddenly in a vast wasteland, concerns about pollution are popping up all over the pop-culture landscape.

On TV: "Ali," the furry extraterrestrial, is writing letters to polluters. And Joey, one of "My Two Dads," is arrested.

At the movies: In "The Forbidden Dance," one of those lambda flicks making the rounds, a Brazilian princess does her dirty dancing thing to save the rain forests.

In fiction: Edward Abbey's cult classic "The Monkey Wrench Gang" inspires real-life eco-saboteurs. Even in detective novels, the bad guys increasingly are pol-

lutionists. And there's plenty more — while that came from. Environmental groups report receiving regular requests for relevant story lines from producers.

"Two years ago, in the forest movement, we were wondering how we could get these stories to be looked at by people in Hollywood," says Suzanne Head, a spokeswoman for the San Francisco-based Rainforest Action Network. "It's been a rather dramatic change in the past year."

But does it really make much difference?

Some critics argue that the environment is just the entertainment industry's commercialized concern of the week. Some, they say, it is another case of sim-

ulation. "We Are the World" is a feel-good fantasy that doesn't address the real political and economic underpinnings of the crisis.

Others say that the medium itself — with its trendy anti-pollution plots pinched to passive viewers and regularly interrupted by commercials for fast food and luxury cars — is part of a deeper social problem.

"The culture of television is a culture of instant gratification and consumption," says Scott Green, a conservation assistant with the Oregon Natural Resources Council and a self-declared "eco-freak."

"To really talk about a sustainable society, we've got to break away from the

dominant pattern of our culture, which is glitz and garbage, and the garbage is invariably tied to glitz," Green says.

But many ecologists are glad to have the moguls of La La land in their corner. The new themes in everyday entertainment are important tools in reprogramming the attitudes of average Joes and Josephines, they say.

Michael Oppenheimer, an atmospheric physicist and co-author of a new book about global warming, "Dead Heat" (Basic Books, \$19.95), says that when Hollywood stars arrive at environmental benefits in gas-guzzling automobiles, that sends a mixed message.

But Oppenheimer says, "There's no such thing as an environmentally benign lifestyle."

He is less interested in picking out sympathetic stars and more excited about spotlighting threats to the Earth.

## Personal visions fill CSI's annual Student Show

**TWIN FALLS** — A wide range of personal visions will be on view next week as the College of Southern Idaho's annual Student Show opens at the Herrett Museum Art Gallery.

Mary Witte, chairwoman of Boise State University's art department, juried the show Wednesday, selecting 49 out of 172 works submitted for judging.

Her selections included painting, pottery, photography, sculpture and paper.

Witte chose a sculpture, "Sanctis Affida Transit" by sophomore David Babb as "Best of Show," calling the work rich in substance and treatment.

In a gallery talk attended by about 40 students and faculty members, Witte said she was "delighted" by the students' work.

In some instances, she added, she was impressed that two pieces by the same student exhibited a diversi-

ty of styles:

"If I could urge you to do anything while you're a student, it would be to keep pushing and exploring," Witte suggested. "Don't stop with whatever works."

Although she said the overall quality of the work was strong, Witte pointed out a few concerns she had.

Many students, she noted, tend to outline their objects too heavily.

Looking around a room of shorts-clad legs, Witte used the students' bare limbs as an example.

"There surely is an edge, a contour, but there's not a sharp line," she said.

Witte joined the BSU art faculty this year.

A photography specialist who has exhibited in more than 30 shows,

she was formerly a professor and head of the design program at the University of Minnesota.

The Student Show will open Tuesday with a reception for the artists from 7 to 9 p.m.

The public is invited, and refreshments will be served.

The students' works will remain on display through May 10.

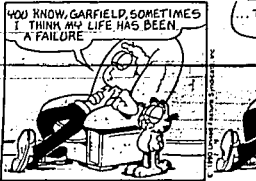

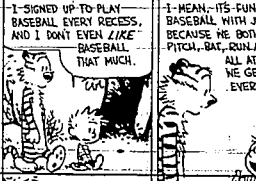

**BORN ON THE FOURTH OF JULY (R)** No one can doubt director Oliver Stone's sincerity, any more than they can his talent for bravura emotionalism. Possibly because Stone empathizes so enormously with his main character — co-writer Ron Kovic, who came back from Vietnam at age 21 paralyzed from the chest down — the director has lost the specificity that made "Platoon" so electrifying. His scenes, and their ironic juxtapositions, explode like land mines. Tom Cruise delivers fierce physicality, empathy, the ability to work full

# Award-winning children's author to visit Burley, Twin Falls

What do a loose tooth, an old Asian legend, a world record for eating bananas and a brother and sister's relationship all have in common? They are each the subject of books written by award-winning Idaho children's author Tom Birdseye.

Birdseye, who is from Sagle, Idaho, will be in the Magic Valley April 26 and 27 to meet with young readers and their parents.

He will be in Burley during the day-Thursday to speak with students and their parents as part of the Mini-Cassia Young Authors program.

From 7 to 8:30 p.m. Thursday evening, he will be at Jodi's Bookstore, 120 Main Ave. N., in Twin Falls; and at 10:15 a.m. April 27, he will be at the Twin Falls Public Library.

"Airmail to the Moon," Birdseye's

first picture book, won a 1989 Children's Choice Award from the International Reading Association and the Children's Book Council.

"It's a crazy story about a girl losing her first tooth. When the tooth fairy fails to leave any money, the little girl assumes it has been stolen and she goes on a rampage to find out who's taken it," said Birdseye.

Birdseye's second picture book, "A Song of Stars," is an adaptation of an ancient Asian legend about two stars. "It's a myth about a princess weaver and a herdsman, and I tell it in my own words. They fall in love but then neglect their duties, so the emperor of the heavens separates them," said Birdseye.

The author has also written two intermediate-level books for fourth-, fifth- and sixth-graders: "I'm Going to be Famous," and "Tucker." The first is about fifth-grader Arlo

Moore and his attempt to become famous by getting into the "Guinness Book of World Records" by eating the most bananas. Soon his sister and his friends also become involved in the record setting.

"The results are funny. For some reason, kids at this age become really interested in world records. The theme of this story is whether the end justifies the means," said Birdseye.

The second one is a more serious book, set in Idaho, about a brother and sister who are reconciled seven years after their family splits up. "Tucker's lived alone with his father for so long that he's resistant when his sister moves back in and starts lobbying to get the family together again. Tucker resents the changes she brings, but eventually things work out. This story is about reconciliation," said Birdseye.

Birdseye taught fifth grade and kindergarten for 10 years and has

concentrated solely on writing for the past two years. His teaching background has not only influenced his subject matter, but his ideas about reading and writing as well.

"All aspects of language are important. It's the responsibility of the parents to give the kids a good start by reading to them and by seeing the parents read. Writing also needs to be modeled. There's no magic to writing. It's a matter of persistence and hard work," said Birdseye.

The author also thinks kids often just see reading and writing as part of school and not as part of the world.

"Developing writing skills not only unlocks the door for the appreciation of books but also gives kids the message that their life is of value; that they have important things to do," said Birdseye.

His visit is the last one funded by the library's Authors Alive grant.

Plans are being made to continue library's purchase of videotapes of authors reading and discussing their books and writings.

# ABC jumps on the environmental bandwagon with Earth Day special

Look at any list of what's in for the '90s, and right up there with the lamada, wire-rim glasses, and low-impact aerobics is the environment.

A passing fad? Let's hope not. With the ozone slipping away and groups like the Sierra Club and Greenpeace hammering away all these years, it looks as though things have finally started to sink in. Drink coffee from a styrofoam cup at the office, and you're likely to get nasty comments from colleagues. Still using disposable diapers? Shame, shame. Not separating your home garbage for recycling? Very bad.

Although everybody is running to catch up to it now, the environmental bandwagon actually got rolling 20 years ago with Earth Day, a love-in for Mother Earth that sprang from the holistic consciousness of the '60s. As a result, the Environmental Protection Agency was the modern environmental movement was born. Of course, conservationists have been around since before John Muir and Henry David Thoreau, but Earth Day 1970 is as good a starting point as any.

To mark its 20th anniversary (and maybe grab a few ratings points in the process), ABC is calling up all the Hollywood troops it can muster on Sunday night, April 22, for "The Earth Day Special," a two-hour extravaganza of music, comedy and skits to raise the environmental consciousness of the nation. Everybody, naturally, is an environmentalist these days, and the list of headliners includes such noted

environmental crusaders as Doogie Howser (Neal Patrick Harris) and Bugs Bunny.

Also turning out will be Kevin Costner, Meryl Streep, Barbra Streisand, Michael Keaton, Bruce Willis, Chevy Chase, Dustin Hoffman, Michael Douglas, Geena Davis, Robin Williams, Jane Fonda, Ted Danson and Bette Midler as none other than Mother Earth herself.

Danson, who helped found a cleaner water organization called American Oceans Campaign, is the first to admit that he doesn't have all the answers.

"I don't want to hold myself up as an example, because every time I turn around I discover another mess that I'm making and how complicated the subject is," Danson says. "The only thing I will hold myself up as is a participant. Once you start to participate, you stop feeling like a victim and start feeling like part of the solution."

Participation and solutions will be a key element of the show with advice on little things the average

viewer can do to help clean up the environment.

"When you talk about the destruction of the rain forests, acid rain and global warming, the effect can be so paralyzing, so devastating on an individual, that they become apathetic," says executive producer Richard Baskin. "They become fearful. They do nothing. Our feeling is that we can present information in a way that empowers people rather than paralyzes them."

The show will feature tips such as seemingly insignificant water-conservation practices that can have a tremendous positive impact when used by millions.

There will also be skits (such as Midler as Mother Earth) and music. In short, "The Earth Day Special" is one big environmental variety show.

But fans must wait before new clues are forthcoming, tying the movie story in with the highly successful, yet troubled, orphans. John O'Hurley, who plays director Stephen, keeps clues close to his vest. The play within the play is just beginning.

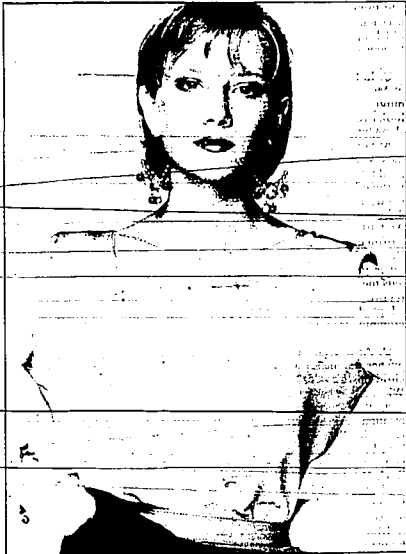

O'Hurley should know. He created Greg Shaffer on "The Edge of Night," and played twins Jonathan Matalaine and Keith Lane on "Loving." Other fans know John as Douglas Prescott of "All My Children."

Gifted with a strong, lyric baritone, O'Hurley switched to soaps when the Broadway musical business went kaput. Now he's in California, leading the good life, playing golf when not on camera.

With a six handicap, which means playing a good deal, O'Hurley spends most weekends at Long Ball tournaments, flying to Miami, Hawaii and Pebble Beach. He averages over a 300 drive and can control the ball, a dream to most hackers.

# Overall prime-time network ratings took a giant nose dive this season

NEW YORK (AP) — Newcomers like ABC's "America's Funniest Home Videos" drew many viewers but overall network prime-time ratings this season were the lowest in history, with NBC the hardest hit, network analysts said Tuesday.

Although NBC won its fifth consecutive season, with a 14.6 average, that was the lowest in its history and represented a 9 percent drop from the previous season.

However, NBC officials noted that its ratings last season had the added boost of telecasts of the Summer Olympics, the World Series and the Super Bowl.

CBS, third in prime time for the third consecutive season, was down 4 percent, with an average rating of 12.2, also the lowest in its history, according to estimates for the 30-week season that ended Sunday.

ABC suffered no drop from last year, when it recorded its lowest-ever ratings, at 12.9. The network was able to hold its ground, aided by high ratings for "Videos" and respectable figures for its new "Twin Peaks."

ABC actually increased its audience, since the A.C. Nielsen Co. each year reports a larger number of homes with TV. Last year, a ratings

## Bugs and Winnie are anti-drug

The 5-year-old stared at the TV screen as the figures of Daffy Duck, Bugs Bunny, Garfield, the Smurfs, Slimer, Winnie the Pooh, even a Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtle flashed by in the brief promotional commercial.

Are all those guys going to be in one show?" he asked with a combination of video-savvy incredulity and hopeful glee. Assured that they were, he quickly made his plans for next Saturday morning. "Then I've got to watch that," he said. It was precisely with that reaction in mind that the Television Academy's drug abuse committee sat down last year and began planning "Cartoon All-Stars to the Rescue," an anti-drug animated half-hour that features more than 20 of the most popular cartoon figures.

What the 5-year-old did not know is that, if he turns the TV on mid-morning Saturday, he probably won't have any choice other than watching this show. That's because all three networks — NBC, CBS and ABC — are airing it at the same time, the first time in history such a programming feat has been accomplished. The show can be viewed at 8:30 a.m. on both KKVJ and KMVT.

In addition, the cable channels Nickelodeon, USA, The Disney Channel and the Black Entertainment Network will air it at that time along with numerous Fox affiliates and some 200 independent stations.

"Cartoon All-Stars to the Rescue" came out of the Television Academy committee whose chairman, John Aglolia, promised the cooperation of NBC, where he is president of business affairs. Other studios were solicited for cooperation, several more

characters joined the lineup, and then, as the word got out, studios began calling up to be sure their figures were included.

It was then that things began to get a bit hectic for writers Duane Poole and Tom Swale. The creative forces behind each of the characters were as temperamental as actors with emotional attachments to their parts.

Not only did they want to make sure that their figures were drawn properly, up to standards, but they also wanted to pass on the lines that the characters would speak. (Can't you just see the meeting now? "Papa Smurf would never say that!") And then there were questions of the relative size of the drawings. These figures have never appeared on the same stage together. Who would upstage whom?

For the record, in addition to those mentioned above, the characters involved are Alf, the Muppet Babies, Kermit, Miss Piggy and Gonzo, Donald Duck's nephews Huey, Ducey and Louie and the Chipmunks. Tigger will join Winnie the Pooh and it's Michaelangelo representing those ever-popular Teenage Mutant Ninja guys.

The story, which is aimed at the ages of 5 to 11, focuses on three characters created for this cartoon. A 14-year-old boy named Michael has begun using drugs, lured by an evil drug-pushing apparition called Smoke, whose voice is by George C. Scott. Michael's 9-year-old sister Corey is concerned about her brother and leads him on a trip through the ages, much like in Dickens' "A Christmas Carol," in which he meets all the characters and gets their anti-drug message.

The basic theme will be not to start using drugs in any form. (Research shows that drug experimentation now reaches down into the fourth-grade level.)

## 'Wings' just might fly

NEW YORK (AP) — Most new sitcoms of late are so lame that one suspects film school graduates are writing them. But there is the occasional exception. Its name is "Wings," and it's landing Thursday at NBC.

The show, about two brothers who run their late father's one-plane commuter airline on Nantucket Island, Mass., is well-written, funny and has the well-drawn characters and warmth of a "Cheers."

Tim Daly, as Joe Hackett, an uptight, button-down type, runs an airline. Brian (Steven Weber), his free-spirit sibling, has been away for years, having stolen Joe's girlfriend and even married her. That tends to make a guy fester.

In Joe's case, the fester would be forever had not the brothers' late father left them a letter that has to be opened by both.

This causes the return of the sloppily dressed Brian from what he claims is a good job hauling the well-off and famous on charter flights to the Bahamas. He says his father muttered something about "you're rich" before he died.

It must be said that "Wings" initially seems just another routine sitcom. But it quickly becomes a superior one.

"I gave it a shot," laments the owner of a rival commuter line (David Schramm) during his morning coffee. "But I'm here to tell you something: Deborah Norville doesn't have the humanity that Jane Pauley had."

Minutes later, Brian arrives, having flown in on the rival's small airline. The wayward brother loudly expresses amazement at the rival's creative cost-cutting, which includes a pilot "fresh from flight school."

"Nice kid, too," he says. "Had a couple of drinks with him before the flight. Too bad about that eye operation, though. But like he said, how often do you have to look to the left?" Funny bits like this keep popping up in the show, well-played by a fine cast that includes Crystal Bernard as a waitress at the airport cafe. Like the show, the waitress is anything but stock.

On paper, it may seem a bit of a strain that she's a transplanted Texan, a childhood pal of the brothers and an aspiring cellist. But the writing is such that even all that is believable. The show, featuring lovely aerial shots and a musical theme adapted from a piece by Franz Schubert, is quality comedy. Like "Cheers," its humor rings true, likewise its sad moments.

Fueled by its midseason hit, "The Simpsons," it averaged a 6.5 rating, up from last season's 5.3 average for two nights of shows, according to Fox estimates.

The major networks' audience shares, which totaled 90 percent of the nation's viewers 10 years ago when cable TV began its explosive growth, were off 4 percent from last season, dropping to 65 percent. But

network officials differed Tuesday on whether cable and Fox, or Nielsen's methods caused the drop.

"The primary cause of that is probably basic cable, with a little bit of Fox on the three nights that they're on the air," NBC research vice president Robert Niles told reporters. But David Poltrack and Larry Hyams, research experts at CBS and ABC, respectively, said that TV viewing generally is down, not just at the major networks, and that the drop may be due to methodology, not competition.
