## State board president criticizes Idaho schools

TWIN FALLS — The president of the Idaho State Board of Education criticized the College of Southern Idaho's 24th annual commencement ceremony Friday night at the College of Southern Idaho. "Right now in Idaho, there's a revolution coming in public education," said Gary Fay of Twin Falls. "The fact is that the school system did not provide you with the education that was demanded by our society when you went to school. We certainly can't expect that same school system to adequately prepare our children for a much more complex society." Fay, of Anderson, Blake, Fay Insurance, is a former Twin Falls School Board member. In his keynote speech, he offered a vision of a future in which Idaho elementary schools have no individual grade levels below 4th and high schools are run like colleges with students accumulating credits before receiving a diploma.

"Some students may complete the credit requirement in three years, some in five," he said. His comments on public education came near the end of an upbeat speech in which Fay told graduates they face a bright future. "The best years of your life are ahead of you," Fay told members of the 258-strong graduating class. "You're walking into a seller's market and you're the seller. Employers are going to be bidding for your skills and services." Revolutions in Eastern Europe and elsewhere "will change your world," Fay said. They "will shape the future of our society and lifestyle and will create additional jobs and opportunities for yourselves and your children." Two CSI instructors received the annual Teacher's Excellence Award during the commencement exercises. Janice Mittleider, associate professor of physical education, and Karen Atwood, computer instructor, were both honored.

## Bush projects Mars landing by year 2019

KINGSVILLE, Texas — President Bush, setting a distant deadline in space exploration, said Friday that Americans should walk on Mars by the year 2019. "It's time to open up the frontier," Bush said. "There can be no turning back." Bush, who next Tuesday will begin a budget-summit with Congress in an effort to cut the federal deficit, did not cite a cost estimate for a manned Mars landing or say how the government would pay for it. NASA has put a \$500 billion price tag on the mission, which would include establishment of a base on the moon. Asked how the United States could get to Mars, Bush supplied to reporters. "You have to go fairly fast. It's a long way out there." As for the money, Bush said, "Thirty years is a long time." By 2019, Bush would be 95 years old. Bush proclaimed the Mars deadline in a speech at Texas A&M University, opening a two-day trip of three commencement addresses. Later, at a Republican fund-raising event in Columbia, S.C., Bush

again called for a cut in the capital gains tax rate, saying, "I'm going to keep on like a broken record until I get that thing done up there." In his speech at the University of South Carolina on Saturday, Bush will announce formation of a volunteer "Citizenship-Democracy Corps," an administration source said. "The source, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the corps would try to help the new democracies of Eastern Europe establish democratic institutions and legal systems." Proclaiming his goal for a mission to Mars, Bush said NASA is in line for the largest budget increase of any major agency of the government. He declared that leadership in space exploration "takes more than just dollars. It also takes a decision, and so I'm announcing one today." He said he was returning to Texas, his adopted home state, to announce "a new age of exploration, with not only a goal but also a timetable. I believe that before Apollo celebrates the 50th anniversary of its landing on the Moon, the American flag should be planted on Mars."

## Psychiatrists, mothers in annual conflict over day

NEW YORK — They didn't eat their peas, they never call, and they almost always hold their annual meeting on Mother's Day. What's a mom to do with the members of the American Psychiatric Association? For the fifth straight year, APA members will spend that special day in meetings, courses and talks, prompting this headline in The Wall Street Journal: "Oedipus Wrecks Mother's Day." Instead of taking Mother to brunch, the psychiatrists will attend sessions such as "Psychological Management of Schizophrenia," "Object Relations Theory in General Psychiatry" and "New Developments in Geriatric Psychiatry."

Well, docs, here's an old development in geriatric psychiatry: your elderly mom would like some attention on the second Sunday in May. Seth Stein, executive director of the APA's New York state affiliate, said that over the years some members have complained about the convention's scheduling. But he said that finding a time that's good for 10,000 people — and a city that can accommodate them all — is not easy. "In the grand scheme of things, I can't see what relevance this has," he sniffed. He also pointed out that the official opening session was not until 5 p.m., which would allow members to telephone their mothers — if they're not visiting the Bronx Zoo, the World Trade Center or Times Square. John Hoffman, manager of convention services

for the city's tourism bureau, said Mother's Day weekend was not prime convention time. "It's kind of sacred," he said. "I can't even get a lot of my own people to work." The psychiatrists have met on Mother's Day 10 times in the past 22 years, a tradition that even the election of the group's first woman president in 1985 did not weaken. But change looms: Although the association will meet in New Orleans next year on Mother's Day in the following three years the session will be on other weekends in May. "I think it's very likely we'll not be scheduling any more meetings on Mother's Day," said Dr. Elissa Benedek, the organization's president.

## Governor orders review of addicted infant death

BOISE — Gov. Cecil Andrus directed his Children at Risk Task Force on Friday to review the circumstances of the cocaine-related death of a Canyon County baby and recommend ways to help prevent similar tragedies. Meanwhile, Maria Reyes, 22, pleaded innocent before 3rd-District Judge Dennis Goff in Caldwell to a charge of felony injury to a child in the April 17 death of her 2-month-old son. Goff ordered her to remain in the Canyon County Jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond, and scheduled a jury trial to begin Aug. 13 in what could be the state's first case of an infant dying of a cocaine overdose.

If convicted, Ms. Reyes could face up to 10 years in prison and a \$5,000 fine. "This is a tragic case," Andrus said in a news release. "All those concerned need to fully understand what happened and take whatever steps necessary to improve our system's response to babies born addicted to drugs." He said the Children at Risk Task Force would meet next Friday in Boise to begin studying the situation. Andrus directed the panel, led by Boise pediatrician Dr. Thomas Cornwall and Ken Patterson of the Department of Health and Welfare's Division of Children and Family Services, to "propose whatever meaningful action is possible."

## Squirrels

WASHINGTON — Conservationists reacted with anger Friday to Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan's suggestion that a \$200 million telescope should be built despite its potential effect on an endangered squirrel. "Do we have to save every subspecies?" Lujan had asked. Interviewed Thursday by the Denver Post, the interior secretary noted the controversy surrounding the Arizona project, which could be stopped under the Endangered Species Act. At issue is the Mount Graham red squirrel. All that are left — about 180 — are in a colony on the mountain where the University of Arizona, the Smithsonian Institution and others want to build a powerful telescope and observatory. Conservationists have sought to stop construction because the squirrel is on the

Endangered Species List. In the interview, Lujan suggested Congress should soften the act and commented: "Do we have to save every subspecies? The red squirrel is the best example. Nobody's told me the difference between a red squirrel, a black one or a brown one." He also said the law was "just too tough" and added, "We've got to change it." As the interview circulated Friday, conservationists vented their rage. Michael Francis of the Wilderness Society said the interview "shows Mr. Lujan's incredible lack of understanding of biology and public policy." "I'd have to say he's getting pretty close to another Jim Watt," Mr. Lujan certainly is trying to better his mark." Jay Hair, president of the National Wildlife Federation, said he was incensed "that the very Cabinet official whose job it is to be the coun-

try's front-line protector of endangered wildlife would make such outrageous statements." Hair said that the Mount Graham red squirrel "is in the 11th hour of existence on the planet." A spokesman for Lujan did not quarrel with the published interview, which the secretary gave while attending a National Park Foundation dinner at the Mesa Verde National Park, near Durango, Colo. Steve Goldstein, Lujan's press secretary, said his boss had sought only to point out some "frustrations" he has had with enforcing the Endangered Species Act. He said Lujan wants Congress to "determine whether the law is being implemented correctly." Later Friday, after conferring with Lujan, who was in Colorado, Goldstein said Lujan does not consider the changes he would like Congress to make as a weakening of the Endangered Species Act.

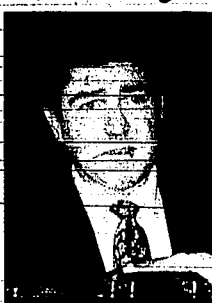


# Bush aide rejects Soviet arms offer; Navy disagrees

WASHINGTON (AP) — A senior U.S. arms control negotiator Friday rejected a Soviet plan for talks on cutting tactical nuclear weapons at sea, although the Navy's chief officer told Congress such negotiations "could be in our interests."

The top arms adviser to Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev told Congress on Tuesday that future talks on other nuclear and conventional weapons could be desirable but continued U.S. resistance to naval arms talks.

Ronald Lehman, director of the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, told a Senate panel that the Soviets had not formally insisted on linking naval weapons with other arms, even though Marshal Sergei Akhromeyev raised it before Congress, and so the United States isn't compelled to respond.

Rejects talks on Navy warheads would undermine America's position as the predominant maritime power.

Lehman said the Bush administration saw no way negotiated reductions in short-range naval nuclear arms — mainly torpedoes, depth bombs and anti-ship missiles — would strengthen U.S. security. He said it could instead harm the security of U.S. allies.

"We've spent a lot of time studying it and we just haven't found it to be in U.S. interests," Lehman told the Armed Services subcommittee on projection forces.

But Adm. Carlisle A. H. Trost, chief of Naval operations, took a different approach.

Although he expressed doubt about Soviet intentions in pursuing such negotiations, Trost said he could contemplate eliminating all tactical naval nuclear arms if related

weapons such as bombers assigned to naval fleets also were banned.

"If we could, with proper confidence in their willingness to abide by an agreement, be sure there were no nuclear weapons that threatened either side's ships at sea. I'm sure we'd both be more comfortable that way," Trost told the panel.

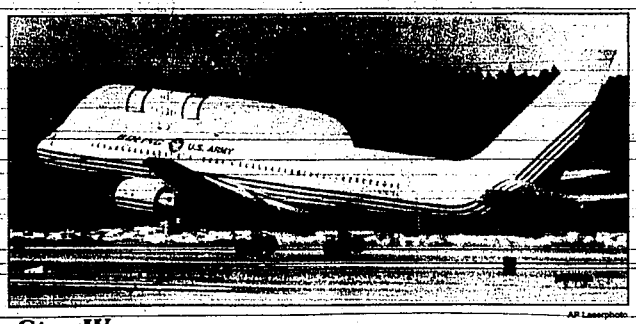
Later, under questioning by Sen. William Cohen, R-Maine, who said he opposed such negotiations, Trost said he was referring only to the tactical category of naval weapons, not to sea-based cruise or ballistic missiles of longer range.

"Yes, it could be in our interests if all the 'ifs' I previously stated are included," Trost said, quickly adding "And you could label me as a lifetime pessimist on the likelihood of ever concluding such an agreement."

Trost's description of an acceptable formula for talks to eliminate short-range nuclear arms said was similar to that offered Tuesday by Akhromeyev, who said his government was willing to include related weaponry such as that carried on aircraft carriers, submarines and land-based naval aircraft.

Joshua Handler, an arms analyst with Greenpeace U.S.A., which advocates the elimination of all nuclear weapons, said Trost's comments departed from the Navy's past unconditional opposition to talks on naval nuclear arms.

Trost and Lehman both stressed the administration has been willing to negotiate certain measures short of cutting tactical naval arms. Lehman cited a 1988 agreement to provide advance notice of all launches of strategic ballistic missiles, whether from land or sea.

# Bolt maker guilty of falsifying reports

SEATTLE (AP) — The biggest maker of aerospace fasteners pleaded guilty on Friday to conspiracy and agreed to pay \$18 million in fines and costs to settle federal charges that it schemed for 15 years to falsify test reports on parts.

VSI Corp. pleaded guilty to one count of conspiracy and three counts of mail fraud before U.S. District Judge Barbara Rothstein.

The pleas were entered by company vice president Donald S. Parker.

Two former managers also pleaded guilty to one count each of conspiracy.

Rothstein set sentencing for Aug. 17.

In a statement before a the court hearing, VSI said that as part of the

plea agreement it agreed to pay a \$2.5 million fine and pay the government an estimated \$1 million for the costs of the investigation.

To resolve a separate civil case, VSI will make an additional payment of \$14.3 million, part of which the government will distribute among three former VSI employees who initiated the investigation.

On Wednesday, the federal government filed its complaint naming VSI and the two managers of the test-falsifying scheme, which featured a phantom "inspector 11."

VSI, a Fairchild Industries Inc.

subsidiary, was accused of skipping on tests and inspections, sometimes even delivering substandard parts to boost profits.

"We deplore violations of testing requirements that may have occurred in the past and have taken steps to prevent such conduct from ever taking place again," Ben W. Fresscott, president of Fairchild Fastener Group, said in a statement. "At the same time we can assure the public that air safety was not jeopardized at any time as a result of testing discrepancies."

# Retirement groups: SSA services worse

WASHINGTON (AP) — Six straight years of budget cuts have sharply reduced the ability of the Social Security Administration to serve older Americans, retiree organizations told Congress on Friday.

A 21-percent slash in the Social Security trust funds, accompanied by a marked decline in service and renewed complaints about inaccurate information, constantly busy telephones (and) arbitrary rulings on eligibility, said Lawrence Smedley, executive director of the National Council of Senior Citizens.

"In some offices, clerical positions

have been reduced to the point that managers are often covering reception desks and spending time on data entry," Margaret Dixon, a director of the American Association of Retired Persons, told a hearing by the Senate Finance Social Security subcommittee.

Lewis D. Enoff, deputy commissioner of Social Security, acknowledged the agency is being stretched to near its limit.

Nevertheless, Enoff said, "satisfaction with SSA service has also remained high, with over 83 percent of respondents in a national survey last year rating SSA's service as either good or very good."

One reason, Enoff said, is that the agency has been able to retain technical employees and those who work directly with retirees and the disabled.

The testimony was presented at a hearing on a bill by Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., chairman of the subcommittee.

The legislation, whose chief goal is removing the agency from the Department of Health and Human Services, would boost Social Security staff by 7,000, to 70,000 full-time workers.

Enoff said agency officials were confident an increase of that size was not needed, although a former SSA official said in a memo to an associate earlier this year.

Enoff said approval of President Bush's budget would assure that Social Security staff would be held at 63,000 "and give SSA the period of stability it so sorely needs."

John F. Dellicio, a director of the General Accounting Office, an arm of Congress, said that although there may be a need for more workers in some areas, "a thorough study needs to be undertaken before wholesale increases in staffing are made."

Another part of Moynihan's bill would require Social Security to list local office numbers in telephone directories.

"Because the mental, physical and educational handicaps of some older and disabled Americans makes the telephone an uncomfortable and unfamiliar instrument, local offices must remain accessible and adequately staffed," said Mrs. Dixon of AARP.

# Missing Chinese were sightseeing

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (AP) — Seven Chinese farmers who mysteriously disappeared on arrival in this country may have been on an extended sightseeing trip, their lawyer said Friday.

"This is kind of a sad story in a way that the mistake of one group can do so much harm," said sponsor Molly Aitken, who reported receiving a letter this week from the farmers.

The letter said the farmers merely slipped away to see more of New York City and were embarrassed by the national kidnapping investigation their departure touched off.

"I think everyone wants to forgive them, but they're going to have to come back and we had now to make up for what they've done," Mrs. Aitken said in a telephone

interview from her farm in Athol, The Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, whose police continue to investigate the case as a reported abduction, is checking out the letter. "It's just loony enough to possibly be true, but we're not making anything out of it at this point," said spokesman Allen Morrison.

The letter, postmarked in New York City and received Wednesday in Athol said the men were embarrassed, felt they had "lost face" and were afraid to return in case they risk deportation, Mrs. Aitken said.

The seven Chinese arrived April 25 at New York's Kennedy International Airport with nine other peasants. They came to participate in a project to build a model Third World village during an 11-month stay at Mrs. Aitken's estate on the

outskirts of Athol, a small town about 50 miles north of Springfield.

Mrs. Aitken, president of the World Energy Foundation organizing the project, met the farmers at the airport and told police she was afraid they had been kidnapped when she saw some of them being hustled into a car.

The letter, signed by three of the missing farmers on behalf of all seven, explained that they were met by friends at the airport and decided to slip away to tour New York's Chinatown, Mrs. Aitken said.

"According to the letter, they didn't realize they had caused so much trouble," she said. The letter also said the peasants did not see Mrs. Aitken at the airport and planned to contact her after a few days in New York.

# Printer's error makes flights real bargains

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Dozens of central Florida newspaper readers knew they spotted a bargain when they saw the Pan Am ad offering a one-way flight to Nuremberg, West Germany, for \$109.

Oops. The advertisement should have said \$409.

But Pan Am went ahead and honored the erroneously advertised price for about 75 people who wanted tickets Wednesday and Thursday.


After all, the ad promised "A lot of Europe for not a lot of money."

Pan Am ticket agents discovered the error Wednesday morning when the first bargain hunters appeared.

"It was very embarrassing," said Fergus Kelly, Pan Am's general manager in Orlando. "We said, 'That'll be \$409,' and the customer said, 'Uh-huh.'"

The deal on the fare, made possible by the mistake of a New York printing company, ended at noon Thursday.

## Abducted Massachusetts girl heads home

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Clutching a new stuffed animal, a 5-year-old girl boarded a private jet with her parents for home Friday, 39 days after her abduction by a man authorities described as an obsessed baby-sitter.

Kenneth Cole, accused of abducting Nicole Ravasi on April 3, awaited transfer to Massachusetts to face charges.

The girl was reunited late Thursday with her parents, Frank and Debra Ravasi of Milford, Mass. Nicole was found earlier in the Gulf with Cole in a trailer in a small Gulf Coast fishing village about 70 miles southwest of Tallahassee.

The Ravasis had at one time taken out a restraining order against Cole after social workers alerted them that the sometime baby-sitter's attachment toward Nicole appeared obsessive. However, the family allowed Cole to see the girl at least twice after the order expired.

After leaving a hotel Friday, the Ravasis stopped at a shopping mall, where a store owner gave Nicole a blue-and-white striped dress, pink shoes and the stuffed dog.

The girl was examined by a private pediatrician before the family departed. Mrs. Ravasi said later the girl was in good shape and had not been hurt during the ordeal.

When asked how she felt while leaving the hotel, Nicole said, "good." She didn't respond to other questions.

"We're thankful to get our daughter back," said Ravasi, who described his daughter as "kind of scared of the cameras."

Mrs. Ravasi said she was "very happy, very happy." She said they

hadn't talked with Nicole about her experiences during her ordeal.

Cole, 24, remained at the medium-security Federal Correctional Institution in Tallahassee while the U.S. Marshal's Service worked out details — on returning him to Massachusetts, FCI spokesman Dan Rouse said.

The youngster was reported

missing after she was taken from a car where she and a sister waited for her mother to finish her work as a bus driver.

Cole had been a former co-worker of Mrs. Ravasi's. He lost his job as a bus driver and began baby-sitting occasionally for the family.

When Nicole was hospitalized last year for a hip infection, Cole visited

her frequently. The hospital staff reported him to the Department of Social Services because they saw him kissing her on the lips and showing affection they thought excessive.

Social workers investigated and told the family in February that Cole's attachment to Nicole seemed to be obsessive. The Ravasis obtained a restraining order against Cole to prevent him from seeing or speaking to Nicole.

However, the couple say they allowed Cole to see the child in two parking-lot rendezvous after the five-day restraining order expired, because they thought he was harmless.

Cole was arrested Thursday by the FBI and Franklin County Sheriff Warren Roddenberry. Authorities were tipped late Wednesday on the whereabouts of the fugitive after television stations in Panama City, Fla., broadcast material on the two, said James Cagnassola Jr., FBI agent in charge for north Florida.

The case was featured on the "America's Most Wanted" Fox Network program April 8, April 15 and April 29, Cagnassola said. Fox paid for the family's transportation home.

The girl and her accused abductor apparently had been living in a travel trailer since late last month after spending some time at the Pine Ridge Lodge in Panama City Beach.

The two apparently left Panama City Beach on April 28 and traveled 85 miles to East Point by bicycle, Cagnassola said.

Cagnassola said the two may have reached Florida by train. Cole's car was found in an Amtrak parking lot in Providence, R.I.

## Oklahoma camps, marinas awash

### Flood damage may hit tourism

KINGSTON, Okla. (AP) —

With Memorial Day on the horizon, an "invasion" of floods in the foreground. "Lake Texoma businesses that spend millions to lure fishermen and boaters are worrying about swamped marinas and closed campsites.

Intermittent rains fell over the region Friday and showers are forecast for the next few days, but some businesspeople hope they can recover in time for Memorial Day, the first big holiday of the season.

"You always think things won't get this bad," said Arnold Perkins, president of the Lake Texoma Association. "We've had floods 10 to 15 feet above normal — that's a bad flood. We're talking 24 feet above level now."

Normal elevation at Lake Texoma is 617 feet above sea level. It crested Monday at 644.76 feet, dipped to 641.4 Friday, but still slashes window-high on mobile homes once 100 feet from its shore.

A restaurant, disco and marina complex used by 5,000 to 6,000 people a day during the summer,

was submerged and has been flooded for three weeks. David Hull, who leases the property, estimates damage at \$2 million. About 700 concession workers have been laid off because heavy rains in the region pushed the lake to its highest levels since it was built in 1944.

Some campsites, lodges and golf courses are open, but word is out that Lake Texoma has suffered its worst flooding since 1957, and that could be as big a blow to the tourism industry as the flooding itself, Perkins said.

The rains in Oklahoma and Texas filled lakes to their brims, area. "Weir said without confirming whether the actress was in a suite,

and Arkansas as water was released downstream on the Arkansas and Red rivers.

The Army Corps of Engineers said it expects a greater volume of water to move safely through the Red River flood control system than did in the disastrous months of 1937 and 1927. Texas had a dozen flood-related deaths, Oklahoma, one.

Corps spokesman Ed Engelke said the 20 camping areas around Lake Eufaula in eastern Oklahoma all have limited access because of high water levels. He said rangers must check for damage before the sites are fully accessible.

Downstream in Arkansas, where the Arkansas River is receding from its crests at Little Rock and Pine Bluff, the Red River crested 8 feet above flood stage Thursday at Fulton and closed westbound lanes of Interstate 30.

"We're looking at 80 square miles of flooding," said Jim Barnes, head of the U.S. Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Little River County. "It stretches for six miles."

In Texas, where severe flooding extended along the Trinity River from north Texas to the Gulf Coast, the Red has flooded 40 homes near Texarkana, where National Guard troops were in their fourth day of reinforcing levees.

At Lake Grapevine near Dallas, some say it could take months for boat ramps to be reopened because of recent high waters.

"Summertime is like our Christmas. We only make it three months out of the year," said Terri Bertheisen, manager of the Landing Snack Shop at the marina.

## Liz Taylor setback adds 6 weeks to hospital stay

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP) — Elizabeth Taylor suffered complications including new infections in her fifth week of hospitalization for pneumonia, and will remain hospitalized for about six more weeks, doctors said Friday.

The recovery of Miss Taylor, near death two weeks ago with viral pneumonia, was dealt a setback by bacterial pneumonia and a yeast infection, her doctors said.

During the next 1 1/2 months, she will require intravenous therapy in the hospital, they said in a statement

released by St. John's Hospital and Health Center.

Bacterial pneumonia is generally considered less serious than the viral pneumonia Miss Taylor initially contracted. That's because antibiotics are effective against bacteria but not viruses.

"She is tolerating this therapy extremely well and her doctors are pleased with her progress," Miss Taylor's publicist, Chen Sam, said after talking to doctors.

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# Market exults as wholesale prices, retail sales both decline

WASHINGTON (AP) — A record drop in vegetable costs contributed to a sharp, straight decline in wholesale prices last month, the government said Friday, sparking rallies in the stock and bond markets.

The Labor Department's Producer Price Index for finished goods, one-stop short of retail, fell a seasonally adjusted 0.3 percent last month.

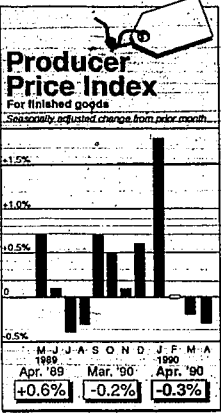
It was the sharpest decline since August and the third consecutive moderate report after a severe cold snap sent prices spiraling 1.8 percent in January. The index fell 0.2 percent in March and was unchanged in February.

"The inflation scare is over," declared economist Lawrence A. Hunter of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce.

For the first four months of the year, inflation at the wholesale level was running at a 4.2 percent annual rate, down from 4.8 percent for all of 1989.

Separately, the Commerce Department said retail sales unexpectedly slumped 0.6 percent in April, the third month without an increase.

Financial markets rallied and interest rates fell in response to the reports. Traders said the figures

The reports, along with one last week showing the April unemployment rate rising to 5.4 percent, likely will convince Federal Reserve monetary policy makers to leave interest rates unchanged when they meet Tuesday, economists said.

Prior to the April figures, many economists believed the Fed would raise interest rates higher but concede that growth was rebounding so strongly and inflation was relenting.

"We started the year worrying about a recession, then we worried about inflation and now there's worry about a recession again. People are zigzagging on it," said economist Donald Ratajczak of Georgia State University.

A panel of 49 economists employed by the nation's largest corporations on Friday predicted only but sustained economic growth through 1991. The gross national product, will grow 2 percent in 1990 and 2.6 percent in 1991, down from 3 percent in 1989, they said.

"The forecast was released in Hot Springs, Va., where the nation's top corporate executives are gathering for a meeting of the Business Council.

The Labor Department said food

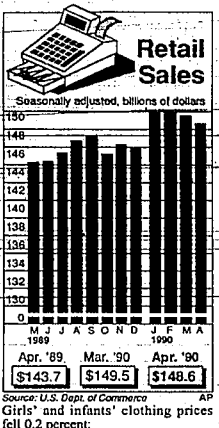
prices fell 0.6 percent in April after an identical decline a month earlier. Prices rose for eggs, rice, pasta and pork. They fell for fruit, chicken, cooking oils and candy.

Vegetable prices, which fell 25.5 percent in March after record increases in the preceding two months, fell an additional 3.1 percent last month. It was the biggest drop since the government began tracking those costs in 1967. Tomato prices fell 73.3 percent.

Energy prices dropped 1.7 percent after declining in the two previous months. Gasoline prices, with the start of the warm weather, driving season, climbed 2.2 percent. Fuel oil prices, however, fell 1.9 percent while natural gas costs dropped 5.5 percent.

Excluding the volatile food and energy sectors, prices rose a modest 0.2 percent after rising 0.2 percent in March. Economists said this "core" number is often a better indicator of underlying inflationary pressures in the economy than the calculation that includes food and energy expenses.

Automobile prices fell 0.9 percent in April. Clothing price inflation recovered from increases a month earlier. Women's, men's and boys' clothing costs were unchanged.

The various changes put the index for all finished goods at 117.0 in April. That means a hypothetical selection of goods that cost \$100 in 1982 would have cost \$117 last month, up from \$113 a year earlier.

Price pressures in earlier stages of the production process were moderate in April. Prices for intermediate goods rose a slight 0.1 percent. Crude good prices fell 3.1 percent, pulled down by a 12 percent drop for crude oil, the largest in four years.

An example of the three processing stages — finished, intermediate and crude — would be clothing, cloth and cotton.

Despite the moderate report for wholesale prices last month, some economists remain concerned that inflation may accelerate this year.

Consumer prices, up at an annual rate of 8.5 percent in the first quarter, are rising at a steeper pace than wholesale costs.

Why the divergence between the two sets of prices?

Wholesale prices reflect only the cost of goods, while consumer prices are heavily influenced by the cost of services, which have been less affected by the economic slowdown of recent months.

## Bush pledges 'good faith' budget talks

KINGSVILLE, Texas (AP) — President Bush brushed off a political firestorm over possible tax increases on Friday, saying "I can't be ruffled" but refusing to reveal what he will put on the table at next week's budget summit with Congress.

"I'm not going to show you my hand. I haven't seen a lot of hands being laid down," Bush said as he embarked on a two-day trip of college commencement speeches.

Democrats have been reluctant to be the first to mention taxes, urging Bush instead to take the lead in offering a formula to cut the growing budget deficit.

The administration has warned there would be mandatory spending cuts of upwards of \$100 billion this fall unless Congress and the White House agree on major reductions in the deficit.

Bush, talking with reporters on Air Force One, refused to provide any clues about his strategy but promised to bargain in good faith with Democrats.

"There's no conditions, and that's the way it is," Bush said. "That's the way it's going to be and that's the way it must be."

Bush's invitation to budget negotiations has raised suspicions among Democrats of an election-year tax trap and sparked fears of election setbacks for Republicans who have made anti-tax pledges a key part of their campaigns.

Bush has not said he would endorse tax increases, but he has muted his no-new-taxes pledge for the budget talks, which begin Tuesday.

The administration is telling Republicans privately that the preconditions "since offered by the

White House does not necessarily mean Bush will accept increased taxes.

The atmosphere for the talks was clouded when White House chief of staff John Sununu suggested this week that the president would not accept a tax increase regardless of what the Democrats propose.

Bush, asked if Sununu's remarks reflected his position, said, "I would ask you to reflect my posture, to talk about what I say ... So I'd respectfully suggest you take your guidance from me on this one, because that's the way it is."

And Bush said Sununu was not in trouble for his remarks. "That's silly, so stupid. None of these congressmen are in trouble, either," he said.

"I'm approaching it very openly, and I really size the controversy swirling around from one statement

or another," he said.

"But look, stay on track, steady as she goes, and be open, deal frankly with people and deal in the way I've said."

Bush said that, "Tomorrow there'll be another tidal wave so keep your snorkel above the water level and do what you think is best."

"(I) goes back to what my mom taught me when I was about six: 'Do your best, do your best.' Well, I'm trying hard. Stay calm."

## Galileo fires rocket thrusters

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — The Galileo spacecraft, looping through the solar system on the way to its 1995 exploration of Jupiter, fired its thrusters Friday in a major maneuver meant to steady it near Earth late this year.

"We're trying to reshape the trajectory slightly so we move closer and closer to our aim point near Earth on Dec. 8," said Neal Aumann, mission director at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

Galileo's tiny rocket thrusters,

which are small enough to fit in the palm of a hand, started firing at 11:10 a.m. PDT and will fire roughly 3,000 times by the time the maneuver ends Saturday afternoon, laboratory spokesman Jim Wilson said.

The two-day maneuver will slow the spacecraft, which was traveling about 66,000 mph earlier today, by about 25 mph. It also will gradually alter its direction, Aumann said.

It is the second of three or four maneuvers needed.

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# Jewish cemetery vandalism stuns France

PARIS (AP) — The desecration of a Jewish cemetery and mutilation of a corpse horrified the nation Friday, reawakening memories of the Holocaust and fueling fears of a resurgence of racism.

The French Senate and National Assembly suspended their sessions for 15 minutes, and leaders of all major religious faiths condemned the desecration. Special radio and TV shows were planned, and some television devoted to anti-racism evening newscasts to the subject.

Interior Minister Pierre Joxe said extreme right-wing leader Jean-Marie Le Pen must take some responsibility for the crime.

But Le Pen denounced the "desecration as 'barbaric' and said it was likely a sham staged to disgrace him and his National Front, a party that has won 15 percent support in recent opinion polls.

Politicians across the political spectrum made pilgrimages to the "town of Calvario" and said where Jews first settled in the first century. Mourners on Thursday found 34 graves desecrated and the body of an 81-year-old man dug up and impaled on an umbrella.

Police detained one man for questioning but provided no details. "We are making verifications. Don't

draw any conclusions," an officer said.

Families of the dead held an impromptu religious service at the cemetery, and Jewish demonstrators gathered at the gate under the banner: "We Will Not Let History Repeat Itself."

"They impaled... Felix, my husband," wept Magdeleine

Germon. "They merit being impaled themselves," she said. "Since he was the last buried, they took their revenge on the freshest grave. To impale a dead person. Can you imagine what hate one must have!"

Her husband, buried less than a month ago, was found sprawled across a neighboring tomb stone, impaled on an umbrella stick. A star

of David pulled from another grave lay nearby. Grave markers had been knocked over and flower pots trampled.

"It is an aggression against all humanity, a barbarous and bestial act," said Israeli Ambassador Obadiah Soffer, who visited the cemetery. "It is also a warning to all civilization for humanity. This is a racist act of the first order."

Police said fingerprints and footprints indicated at least four vandals took part in the desecration, discovered when several mourners visited the cemetery to lay flowers.

A previously unknown group calling itself the "Mohamed El Boukima Group" claimed responsibility for the crime in an anonymous phone call to a newspaper. Police said they were trying to authenticate the call.

Racism has for years been a major issue in France, which is home to more than 4 million immigrants, many from former African colonies.

Racism recently returned to the forefront with a series of attacks on Moslems, and it presents the biggest political hurdle for the Socialist government of Premier Michel Rocard.

Le Pen's party wants to deport immigrants.

# Bus crash in Peru kills 47; injures 4

AREQUIPA, Peru (AP) — A bus slid into a gorge near this southern city Friday, killing at least 47 people and seriously injuring four, police said.

The bus was headed to Lima from Arequipa, 345 miles southeast of capital. The accident occurred on Friday between the towns Tumbillo and Vitor.

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# KGB tantalizes Britain with boasts of new mole

LONDON (AP) — The KGB is in town, tormenting the British with boasts about yet another top traitor in the Kim Philby mold, possibly the long-sought "Fifth Man."

This latest caper includes a Soviet TV movie on the affair and a KGB public relations man who was in London on Friday to help answer reporters' questions.

Some scholars of espionage have long suspected that Soviet penetration of the British secret service did not end with the unmasking of Guy Burgess, Donald Maclean, Anthony Blunt and Harold "Kim" Philby, and that there was probably a fifth man.

Others maintain the KGB has deliberately fostered the theory to keep Western intelligence in doubt.

Until now, the hunt for the Fifth Man has leaned heavily on the conjecture, dragging several illustrious British names through the mud. Now comes the KGB, almost gleefully claiming the speculation is true.

Yuri Modin, one of Philby's handlers, says in a Soviet film about the spy's exploits that "the fifth one is not known to our ex-enemy, ex-opponent, so I am not in a position

to tell you anything about that."

So a Fifth Man really existed? "Yes, that's a fact." Has he met him? "Yes, I know him personally." Is he an interesting man? "Well, now I'll try to avoid your question. He is an interesting man with his own peculiarities, etc., with his own ideas."

At a preview of the film at a London television studio, KGB press officer Col. Igor Prelin gave more details, claiming the Fifth Man is "of Philby's generation" and retired from espionage work.

Philby died in Moscow in 1988. Prelin said he implied that the KGB had asked the Fifth Man if he would like to be identified, and the answer was "no."

"This person has done a great deal for us. Why should we do him harm?" Prelin said. Was he in the Soviet Union? No, Britain? Prelin wouldn't say. Had he ever received a title or other honor in Britain? No comment.

But then Prelin offered "another little secret: these five people had information covering all the different departments and institutions of the British government."

# Tokyo palace duck flees photographers, returns

TOKYO (AP) — Japan's most famous waterbird, a traffic-stopping duck, returned to her Tokyo pond Friday after being scared away by a horde of photographers and a wildlife worker hoping to mend the bird's bad leg.

For at least a decade, the spotted duck has returned each May to a decorative pond in front of the headquarters of trading giant Mitsu and Co. and hatched a brood of ducklings.

A few weeks later, after the young birds are strong, sometimes the mother has herded them across an eight-lane road to spend the summer in the Imperial Palace moat.

The operation requires a squad of police to stop traffic, and usually there are five times as many photographers as ducks. The duck passage has become a rite of summer that is reported as avidly as

the cherry blossoms in April.

This year the rite seemed in danger.

The duck had a bad leg, and city authorities tried to capture it for medical treatment Thursday night. But the bird flew away, apparently scared by a photographer's camera flash. Photographers had promised not to use flashes.

Mitsu reported the bird returned early Friday, still with a bad leg, and press reports said another attempt might be made to capture it.

But the Japan Wild Birds Society disagreed with the plan. "That duck was strong enough to escape," said Takio Nakamura, head of the society's protection department. "She's probably strong enough not to need protection."

But Nakamura agreed that it is "quite a special case... because that duck is famous."

## Blast in Philippines jet kills 7, injures 82

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — An explosion and fire tore through a Philippine Airlines jet Friday as it prepared to leave Manila, killing seven people and injuring 82.

Officials said a bomb may have caused the explosion. Panic-stricken passengers trampled one another rushing for the exits, survivors said. Survivors and witnesses gave conflicting accounts of how many explosions there were before the fire, with some saying as many as three.

"They were still demonstrating the safety equipment when it occurred," said Irido Retaso, 33, of Iloilo, the flight's destination. "There were three explosions, loud explosions, and the ceiling shuddered. On the second explosion, I immediately opened the emergency exits."

Another survivor, Sony Villareal, 30, also of Iloilo, said she heard one loud explosion.

"After the explosion there was fire and thick smoke billowed. Everybody panicked after that. People were stumbling over each other trying to get out of the plane," she said.

Flight PR143, a Boeing 737-300, was bound for Iloilo, 290 miles



south of Manila. It carried 119 passengers and crew members and was being towed onto the runway at about 3:20 p.m. when the explosion occurred.

Oscar Alejandro, director of the government's Air Transport Office,

said the planes engines had not even been turned on yet. Police were examining the aircraft to determine the cause of the explosion.

"We're looking into the possibility that a bomb was placed there," he said without elaboration.

Eduardo Carrasosa, the airport manager, said no bomb threat was received.

None of the Philippines' insurgent groups has a history of random terrorism, such as bombing airliners.

The last time any such incident occurred was in 1976, when a bomb carried by a would-be hijacker exploded in the toilet of a Philippine Airlines aircraft flying from Manila to Cebu. The hijacker was sucked out of the aircraft, and it was not determined if his motive was political.

In 1986, a bomb exploded aboard a Thai Airways jet flying from Manila to Japan, killing one man. Police concluded the man had bought explosives in the Philippines and was returning to Japan when he accidentally detonated a grenade in the aircraft's toilet.

Enrique Santos, vice president of Philippine Airlines, said the plane in Friday's incident was being towed to

the runway when it was rocked by a single explosion.

Dante Santos, the airline president, said flames swept through the plane in only four minutes. One blast apparently occurred near the center of the passenger cabin, near where the bodies were found, he said.

The cabin filled with smoke. Most of the people escaped by sliding down emergency chutes before flames spread, survivors said.

Airline employee Alvin Rieta said he was a few yards from the plane and heard only one explosion. "Immediately the door opened and people scampered out," he said. "We suspect it's a bomb, but we can't confirm it."

The bodies of six adults and one child were found inside the burned-out cabin.

The child, a girl, was found clutched to the chest of an adult woman, presumably her mother, rescuers said.

## South Korean police seek student leaders

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Police have launched a dragnet for 20 fugitive student and dissident leaders believed to have instigated or led violent anti-government protests this week, prosecutors said Friday.

Police said homes, schools and other places frequented by those in hiding will be searched in one of the largest crackdowns on the opposition in recent months.

Dissidents are being sought in connection with nationwide protests on Wednesday by about 100,000 radicals. During the violence, protesters burned a U.S. diplomatic building in the capital.

"I think it just happened to be a target of opportunity," said U.S. Assistant Secretary of State Richard Solomon. But he added: "Mindless violence is the enemy of democracy."

Prosecutors said 55 protesters were formally arrested Friday for violating a law banning firebombs and for participating in illegal rallies in connection with the violence.

Another 129 people were given summary court trials and sentenced to jail terms of up to 30 days, prosecutors said.

Despite government warnings against violence, dissidents said Friday they would step up anti-government protests to topple the

government of President Roh Tae-woo, and radical students staged scattered protests.

In the southern city of Kwangju, about 1,500 students hurled firebombs and rocks when riot police used tear gas to block anti-government protesters from marching off Chosun University, the South Korean news agency Yonhap reported.

In Seoul, six radical students armed with firebombs and iron bars seized a third-floor office in South Korea's tax administration headquarters. They demanded Roh resign, saying his economic policies favored big companies.

Police immediately charged into the building, knocked down barricaded doors with hammers and arrested the six. One protester was injured.

In leaflets scattered through the building, the protesters accused Roh's government of implementing a tax system that favored the rich.

With inflation climbing, criticism of Roh's government has mounted among South Koreans. Housing and other prices have nearly doubled since Roh took office in February 1988.

Police took 1,084 protesters into custody in Seoul on Thursday, when more than 6,000 students and dissidents staged street protests.

# Blast in Philippines jet kills 7, injures 82

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — An explosion and fire tore through a Philippine Airlines jet-Friday as it prepared to leave Manila, killing seven people and injuring 82.

Officials said a bomb may have caused the explosion. Panic-stricken passengers trampled one another rushing for the exits, survivors said. Survivors and witnesses gave conflicting accounts of how many explosions there were before the fire, with some saying as many as three.

"They were still demonstrating the safety equipment when it occurred," said Isidro Retaso, 33, of Iloilo, the flight's destination. "There were three explosions, loud explosions, and the ceiling shuddered. On the second explosion, I immediately opened the emergency exits."

Another survivor, Sony Villareal, 30, also of Iloilo, said she heard one loud explosion.

"After the explosion there was fire and thick smoke billowed. Everybody panicked after that. People were stumbling over each other trying to get out of the plane," she said.

Flight PR143, a Boeing 737-300, was bound for Iloilo, 290 miles



south of Manila. It carried 119 passengers-and-crow members and was being towed onto the runway at about 3:20 p.m. when the explosion occurred.

Oscar Alejandro, director of the government's Air Transport Office,

said the planes engines had not even been turned on yet. Police were examining the aircraft to determine the cause of the explosion.

"We're looking into the possibility that a bomb was placed there," he said without elaboration. Eduardo Carrascosa, the airport manager, said no bomb threat was received.

None of the Philippines' insurgent groups has a history of random terrorism, such as bombing airliners. The last time any such incident occurred was in 1976, when a bomb carried by a would-be hijacker exploded in the toilet of a Philippine Airlines aircraft flying from Manila to Cebu. The hijacker was sucked out of the aircraft, and it was not determined if his motive was political.

In 1986, a bomb exploded aboard a Thai Airways jet flying from Manila to Japan, killing one man. Police concluded the man had bought explosives in the Philippines and was returning to Japan when he accidentally detonated a grenade in the aircraft's toilet.

Enrique Santos, vice president of Philippine Airlines, said the plane in Friday's incident was being towed to

the runway when it was rocked by a single explosion.

Dante Santos, the airline president, said flames swept through the plane in only four minutes. One blast apparently occurred near the center of the passenger cabin, near where the bodies were found, he said.

The cabin filled with smoke. Most of the people escaped by sliding down emergency chutes before flames spread, survivors said.

Airline employee Alvin Rieta said he was a few yards from the plane and heard only one explosion. "Immediately the door opened and people scampered out," he said. "We suspect it's a bomb, but we can't confirm it."

The bodies of six adults and one child were found inside the burned-out cabin.

The child, a girl, was found clutched to the chest of an adult woman, presumably her mother, rescuers said.

# South Korean police seek student leaders

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Police have launched a dragnet for 20 fugitive student and dissident leaders believed to have instigated or led violent anti-government protests this week, prosecutors said Friday.

Police said homes, schools and other places frequented by those in hiding will be searched in one of the largest crackdowns on the opposition in recent months.

"I think it just happened to be a target of opportunity," said U.S. Assistant Secretary of State Richard Solomon. But he added: "Mindless violence is the enemy of democracy."

Prosecutors said 55 protesters were formally arrested Friday for violating a ban on public demonstrations and for participating in illegal rallies in connection with the violence.

Another 129 people were given summary court trials and sentenced to jail terms of up to 30 days, prosecutors said.

Despite government warnings against violence, dissidents said Friday they would step up anti-government protests to topple the

government of President Roh Tae-woo, and radical students staged scattered protests.

In the southern city of Kwangju, about 1,500 students hurled firebombs and rocks when riot police used tear gas to block anti-government protesters from marching off Chosun University, the South Korean news agency Yonhap reported.

In Seoul, six radical students armed with firebombs and iron bars seized a third-floor office in South Korea's tax administration headquarters. They demanded Roh resign, saying his economic policies favored big companies.

Police immediately charged into the building, knocked down barricaded doors with hammers and arrested the six. One protester was injured.

In leaflets scattered through the building, the protesters accused Roh's government of implementing a system that favors the rich.

With inflation climbing, criticism of Roh's government has mounted among South Koreans. Housing and other prices have nearly doubled since Roh took office in February 1988.

Police took 1,084 protesters into custody in Seoul on Thursday, when more than 6,000 students and dissidents staged street protests.

## US West service center plan under fire from 2 PUC members

**IDAHO FALLS (AP)** — US West Communications' decision to close its Idaho customer service centers in Pocatello and Boise, as well as other offices in Rexburg and Idaho Falls, was made without consultation with state regulators, two members of the Idaho Utilities Commission contend.

Commission President Joe Miller and Commissioner Terry Swisher Thursday in eastern Idaho residents at hearings on the US West plan that they were not told of the closure plan until it had been

released to the media. "No one took into account the regulatory policies of the state when they made this decision," Miller said Thursday at a hearing in Pocatello. "Since when does a plan take precedence and become more important than to question whether the company will now load its bills back and ride off into the sunset?"

Another hearing was conducted Friday in Idaho Falls, and a third was scheduled next Thursday in Boise. No decision was expected until early to mid-June.

The PUC began an investigation in January of customer services provided by all Idaho telephone companies. But commissioners said they learned only a couple of weeks in advance of US West's plans to close its existing payment centers in Pocatello and Boise last month and consolidate all Idaho operations at a new Boise facility.

The commission's staff also learned the company's offices in Rexburg and Idaho Falls were being

closed, but the PUC wanted US West in late March to maintain its Boise and Pocatello offices until the case is resolved.

Under state law, utilities are required to maintain adequate and efficient service to promote the comfort and convenience of their customers.

In 1987, the PUC specifically directed Idaho's regulated phone companies to maintain "physically accessible offices within their service areas to handle customer transactions."

US West says the Idaho closures are part of a multistate company reorganization. In all, some 13 offices and nearly 600 employees throughout its system are affected by the plan, and telephone executives estimate savings would amount to \$1 million a year in Idaho and Montana.

US West officials contend reorganization is the only way to ensure the phone company maintains a presence in Idaho.

Employees in both Pocatello and Boise offices have been offered transfers to a new market center in Boise. Those who opt to remain in Pocatello would be given severance pay.

The company says its strategy is to have the Boise market center handle all sales and service calls for Idaho and Montana.

Customers would bring monthly payments to alternative sites, such as department or grocery stores and would be given toll-free telephone numbers to contact a representative in Boise if they have problems, according to US West.

### Briefly

#### Court protects used product sellers

**BOISE (AP)** — The seller of a used product is not liable for defects or hazards that may surface, if the product is sold in essentially the same condition as it was purchased, the 4-1 Supreme Court says.

In its first ruling on the subject, the Supreme Court ruled 4-1 Thursday in favor of a lower court judgment against a lawsuit filed by an Ada County man who claimed the used mobile home he purchased from a bank was unusable.

Kenneth M. Peterson sued Idaho First National Bank, now West One Bank, alleging that the mobile home he purchased in 1984 was uninhabitable because of the level of formaldehyde emissions.

With only Justice Stephen Breyer dissenting, the Supreme Court said it is clear that the seller of a used product does not face the same product liability as the manufacturer or distributor.

#### Boise man convicted of robbery try

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** — A 69-year-old Boise man has been convicted of attempted bank robbery after a 1½-day jury trial before U.S. District Judge Thomas Greene.

Marion Howard Stevenson was found guilty Thursday of trying to rob a West One Bank branch in Salt Lake City last Dec. 22. He was arrested by FBI agents outside his Boise home on March 6.

Greene scheduled sentencing for July 10. Stevenson could receive up to 20 years in federal prison and a \$250,000 fine. He remained in custody Friday at the Salt Lake County Jail.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Mark Vincent said Stevenson's case has been referred to federal probation and parole agents for development of a pre-sentence report.

#### Computer glitch disrupts phones

**COEUR D'ALENE (AP)** — An apparent computer malfunction left thousands of northern Idaho residents and businesses without telephone service this morning, a General Telephone Co. spokesman said.

Crews were working to restore service to this town of 30,000 after the malfunction occurred sometime before 4 a.m., spokesman Kevin Lavery said.

"Those trying to call numbers in the affected area heard a recorded message that said their calls could not be completed and asked them to try again later.

#### Teen auto crash victim identified

**COEUR D'ALENE (AP)** — A DeSmet teen-ager who died following a one-car accident on a steep mountain road has been identified as Casey Siskinn, the Idaho State Police says.

The 18-year-old died Wednesday evening after the brakes failed on a vehicle driven by Ortiz L. Barbosa, 34, Plummer. The car ran off the road south of Highway 5, recrossed it and hit trees on the other side.

Barbosa and two other passengers were released after being treated at the hospital. The accident remains under investigation.

#### Party host: Teen was warned of gun

**BOISE (AP)** — The host of a Boise party where 17-year-old Erick Carr was fatally shot has testified the teen-ager handling the gun disregarded his advice to be cautious.

Merrill J. Olson was bound over Thursday to the 4th District Court and faces an involuntary manslaughter charge. A May 14 trial date was set.

Olson held the semiautomatic handgun "like it was a baby" shortly before it fired, said Brad DeLamere. When he let it drop down, it discharged and hit Carr in the chest.

A group of about 10 youths had gathered at DeLamere's house on April 28 while his parents were away. DeLamere said he cautioned Olson to be careful after the starting the pistol. DeLamere said Olson replied: "I know what I'm doing."

#### Boisean sentenced in lottery crime

**BOISE (AP)** — A Boise woman convicted of passing altered Idaho Lottery tickets has been sentenced to 30 days in jail, five years probation and 100 hours of community service.

Fourth District Judge Robert Rowett also issued a withheld judgment Friday for Barbara L. Cooper, 25, who was found guilty of two counts of fraudulent presentation of altered instant-scratch lottery tickets at a Boise grocery. Under the withheld judgment, the conviction will be removed from Ms. Cooper's record if she successfully completes the terms of her sentence.

### Panel asks Indians to help save sockeye

**IDAHO FALLS (AP)** — The Northwest Power Planning Council wants two Indian tribes and the Idaho Fish and Game Department to help stave off extinction of the sockeye salmon in the Salmon River basin.

The council, which wrapped up its meeting in Idaho Falls on Friday, called on the state and the Nez Perce and Shoshone-Bannock tribes to come up with proposals for replenishing sockeye in the basin that can be reviewed by it and the Bonneville Power Administration.

John Marsh, of the council's fish and wildlife division said the sockeye cannot wait for completion of the council's plan to double the 2.5 million salmon and steelhead runs in the Columbia River basin, which will not be ready until 1992 at the earliest.

"It's so urgent because the stocks are so low," Marsh said. "If we don't do something right now, we'll lose our opportunity to rebuild them. They'll go extinct."

In 1989, he said, only two sockeye were counted at the Lower Granite Dam in Washington state; the last dam standing between the sockeye and the Salmon River. While counting only takes place 16 hours daily, Marsh said, there was no question the fish was in trouble. In the entire basin, the only place left where ocean-bound sockeye spawn is Redfish Lake.

The Shoshone-Bannocks also recently petitioned the National Marine Fisheries Service to list Snake River sockeye as a threatened or endangered species.

Marsh said the Nez Perce, Shoshone-Bannocks "have already" come up with a preliminary plan.

### Rush rallying campaign despite dark-horse tag

Congressional candidate Dick Rush admits he is the dark horse in a three-way race, but says he is rallying and remains optimistic he will win the Democratic nomination in Idaho's 1st Congressional District.

"That's a fine place to be," Rush said Friday of his underdog status to better-known and election-tested Democrats Jeanne Givens of Coeur d'Alene and Larry LaRocco of Boise.

State Sen. Skip Smyser of Parma is the only Republican seeking the nomination for the seat GOP Rep. Larry Craig is giving up to run for the U.S. Senate.

Rush, former executive director of the Idaho Wheat Commission and state Agriculture Department director until he resigned two months ago to run for Congress, was interviewed Friday for KTVB's "Viewpoint" public affairs program.

He acknowledged falling behind Mrs. Givens and LaRocco in the early going by waiting until March 5 to announce for the May 22 primary election, but said he has been gaining.

Rush, who has never sought elective office, earlier pondered a bid for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by Republican Sen. James McClure, but decided against it because he would have had to raise about \$3 million.

"I just didn't think that's an activity I wanted to get involved in," he said. "I started when I wanted to start."

Having raised and spent about \$26,000 in his congressional bid through May 2 — about half that of each of his opponents — Rush said he would be appealing to independents as well as Democrats in the primary.

## Yanks trade Winfield for Witt, but Winfield won't go

**SEATTLE** — The New York Yankees tried to trade Dave Winfield to the California Angels on Friday, but the controversial slugger refused to go and the deal was sent to arbitration.

"I was traded but I ain't going nowhere," Winfield said. "I'm not packing for California, but I can't put on a Yankee uniform, either. I'm in limbo. Get me a club for limbo."

Winfield, who missed all of last season after back surgery, said he has the right to turn the deal down because he has been in the major leagues for 10 years, the last five with the same team.

"The Yankees claim Winfield's contract contains seven teams he was willing to be traded to and the Angels are one of them."

The Yankees said the deal — for pitcher Mike Witt — will be decided by an arbitrator, but no timetable has been set. Until the dispute is settled, Winfield won't play for the Yankees or the Angels. Witt has 72 hours to join New York.

Winfield said the Yankees will use 24 players on this matter's resolved.

The attempted trade was the latest confrontation in Winfield's long-running feud with Yankees owner George Steinbrenner. Steinbrenner's criticisms of Winfield have ranged from the outfielder's clutch hitting abilities to the operation of the David M. Winfield Foundation, a charitable organization for poor children.

Winfield, who is batting .213 with two homers and six RBIs, was taking batting practice before Friday night's game.

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Sammy Davis Jr.'s health has deteriorated steadily since the cancer-stricken entertainer left a hospital eight weeks ago to recuperate at home, according to his friends.

Publicist Susan Reynolds would only say Davis was "resting" and "has been no change." But friends said the song-and-dance man was emaciated and obviously losing his battle with throat cancer.

Davis' weight has dropped to about 60 pounds and he was in a fetal position, a source close to the entertainer told The Associated Press on condition of anonymity. The source said he'd be surprised if the entertainer lived another week.

Reynolds would not comment on the report.

# Contest honors best of bad writing

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The best of the worst writing, prose that went beyond purple into the darker blues of the literary spectrum, speared tastefully forth from the annual Bulwer-Lytton Fiction Contest on Thursday.

Linda Vernon of Newark, Calif., came up with a leaden lead to an imaginary novel that topped some 10,000 other entries worldwide in the contest that honors intentionally bad writing.

The competition takes its name from the infamous insect 19th century novelist Edward Bulwer-Lytton.

Her winning sentence, 80 words of mixed metaphors and overdone images, is "an example of a writer getting carried away with figures of speech," said San Jose State University English professor Scott Rice, who originated the contest nine years ago.

"If you're reading aloud, take a breath and give it try," Rice said. "Dolores breezed along the surface of her life like a flat stone forever skipping along smooth water, rippling reality sporadically but oblivious to it consistently, until she finally lost momentum, sank and, due to an overdose of fluoride, a child which caused her to suffer from chronic apathy, doomed herself to lie forever on the floor of her life as useless as an appendix and as lonely as a five-hundred pound barrel—in a steroid-free fitness center."

Vernon, a 38-year-old homemaker and mother of three, is taking writing courses at Ohlone College but has yet to be paid for any of her freelance work. She won a word processor for capturing the grand prize.

"It takes a lot of talent to be a bad writer," she said. "This is a good start,

but I hope this is not the peak of my career."

The runner-up, Richard G. Carter, of Hampton, Va., took a more gruesome tone in his story.

"Since both parties demanded sole custody in the Frankenstein divorce case, the judge called for his sword-of-Solomon bolt-cutters and ruled an equitable split: Victor was to raise the creature's grotesque bride in Palo Alto while his ex-wife reared his ugly head in San Jose."

Rice, who has published several books from the entries over the years, sees the contest as a way to encourage people to have fun with language and make a statement, in a way, about the importance of literacy.

Bulwer-Lytton earned the honor of a contest in his name by beginning his 1830 novel "Paul Clifford" with that pot-boiling opener: popular with Snoopy of Peanuts fame, "It was a spark and stormy night."

In a more in-depth novel, Bulwer-Lytton, also originated the line "the pen is mightier than the sword."

### Gooding deputies halt search of canal

**GOODING**—Sheriff's deputies halted a search of the Gooding canal after about two hours Friday afternoon after questioning children who reported seeing a child fall into the swiftly moving waters.

Sheriff's deputies and firefighters were called to the banks of the Gooding canal after four children reported seeing another child fall into the water.

The children, who were not identified by police, said they saw a young boy fall from the lava rock wall at about 3:15 p.m. The kids were on their way home from school.

An officer at the scene said the kids reported not seeing the boy surface again after the fall, and they ran home to tell their parents, who alerted the sheriff's department.

After a two-hour search, which included placing a wire fence panel across the canal, and extensive questioning of the young witnesses, Sheriff's deputies called off the search temporarily, saying it would resume immediately if anyone filed a missing person's report.

### Blaine County sheriff gets more reports of UFOs

**HAILEY**—The Blaine County sheriff's office continues to receive reports of strange objects and lights in the sky west of Hailey in recent weeks, but an amateur UFO tracker thinks he can explain them away.

Most of the sightings May 2 and May 4 were reported in the same part of the sky where strange lights were first seen by residents on the night of April 19.

Mike Fidler of Burley, a member of the Mutual UFO Network, a private organization of volunteers who track unidentified flying object reports, said he believes the sightings may have been due to news reports drawing attention to the night sky.

Fidler said many of the descriptions sound as if people were looking at Sirius, the brightest star in the sky.

The sheriff's office received five calls May 2 about a bright red and blue light in the sky southwest of Hailey. Fidler said Sirius has been visible to the southwest recently, and it sometimes twinkles different colors when it appears near the horizon.

Steve Child at Mountain Home Air Force Base said the Air Force has not investigated any of the reports. The Idaho Air National Guard controls the flight path west of Hailey, Child said, and had no flights scheduled in that area April 19.

The book was to be entitled, "The Magic Valley: A Pictorial History."

"It's just a project that wouldn't go," explained Library Director Arlan Call.

# Highway employee may contest firing

**WENDELL**—A former employee of the Wendell Highway District is considering legal action against the district, charging that he has been unfairly treated by the newly elected board.

Lenny Myers, an employee of the district since July 1989, claims he was dismissed without cause or warning, and says that the board wanted him out for personal reasons rather than as a result of his job performance.

The commissioners say Myers was fired because of job performance.

The commission voted at its meeting Thursday to replace him with Dave Adams, whom a different set of district commis-

sioners fired from the district early last year.

Myers says he was first notified that his job was being re-evaluated May 5. He was not warned, either verbally or on paper, prior to then, he says, and believed the board and the community were happy with his work.

The board is not required to notify Myers of complaints because of his particular employee status, which exempts him from certain state or city regulations, district attorney Jeff Stokely said.

District Commissioner Neil DeWitt said there had been complaints about Myers' work, and pointed out two recent incidences of broken windshields caused by flying debris from the district trucks.

Myers says that's not uncommon for

highway companies.

Myers, who did not attend Thursday's meeting on the advice of his attorney, said he contacted district Commissioner Mitch Bunn after he received the notice May 5 and asked him to explain his dismissal. "I asked him what I had done wrong," Myers said. "He told me I was just a victim of circumstances."

Bunn denied making the comment, saying, "I like Lenny, and I'm sorry he lost his job, but I couldn't do anything about it. I was just expressing those feelings."

Dale Gilbert, a former district commissioner for eight years, said the circumstances are suspicious.

"I think it's a vendetta-type thing," Gilbert said. "This (highway district) is a quarter-million dollar a year business and it

should be run as a business. It shouldn't be a playhouse for guys with a personal vendetta."

As a commissioner, Gilbert hired Myers last July and voted to fire Adams five months earlier in February.

Adams was fired because he did not obtain medical cards, the commissioners said at the time. Adams said at the time he felt the district should have to pay for the cards but said personality conflicts were the real reason he was fired.

Myers is "a good quality man" and is experienced with the large equipment the district has, Gilbert said.

Bunn denied that Myers was fired over personality conflicts.

## District ready to move ahead with new grade

**WENDELL**—With \$3 million from the state Legislature in the bank, the West Point Highway District is ready to proceed with building a new Clear Lake Grade between Wendell and Buhl.

When the grade is completed, the next step will be to add its connecting highways to the state system, Rep. Tom Morrison said at a public meeting in Wendell Thursday.

"Once we get the grade built, then the state highway department will look favorably on putting that road in the system," he predicted.

This 12-mile stretch of road runs from Highway 30 in Buhl to Interstate 84 at Wendell, not including the grade project from the Snake River north to the Bob Barton Highway. Estimated cost to bring the road up to state standards is about \$1 million per mile, Morrison said.

The Wendell-Hagerman road also needs to be taken into the state highway system because traffic will increase in the next few years because of the new Hagerman Fossil Beds monument, Morrison said, and the

road's high accident rate already shows its need for improvement.

The new Clear Lakes Grade itself will be a vast improvement, Morrison said, and adding the two road systems to the state system will complete a grid that will have a very positive impact on the economic development of the entire area.

"The whole thing is linked together," he said. "It will bring the small rural communities and everybody involved."

"Work on the final design for the grade will begin, said Winn Henslee of the West Point Highway District, but until the design is complete "it's all speculation" on when construction work will begin.

"If everything goes perfect, the first phases of construction could start this winter," Winn said. "If things go well, in a couple of years, we could have a completed project."

Morrison said the new grade will be a three-lane highway out of the canyon, with two lanes going up and one going down. It will meet all state regulations, safety factors and environmental concerns, he said, and will handle traffic at 60 miles per hour.

## Schools ask for levy

**BLISS**—School officials are asking local patrons to approve a levy that will provide \$35,000 a year for 10 years for building, repair and upkeep on school property.

The levy will cost the taxpayer about \$20 a year for every \$1,000 of assessed property value. The owner—a \$30,000 Bliss home using the homeowners exemption, for example, would pay about \$300 to fund the levy.

Bliss Superintendent Wendell Anderson said the school building, built in the early 1920s, needs "minor repairs." The money will be spent to blktop the parking lot and either partition off an existing classroom or buy a mobile unit to provide additional space.

The funds would allow the school to buy a new bus this year, and perhaps another bus each of the following two

years, Anderson said. Money has also been earmarked for a new layer of stucco on the main building, lowering the ceilings to conserve energy, and paying off a 10-year bond for the bus garage on school property.

The building was recently inspected by a state-licensed firm, and Anderson said the old building came through well. Aside from recommending additional light fixtures and repairs to some of the internal doors, Anderson said the inspection showed the building to be "quite sound."

Anderson disputed figures released this week by the Idaho Education Association stating Bliss has a surplus of about \$80,000. The district does not have a surplus of that amount, he said, calling the figure "outrageous."

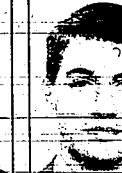

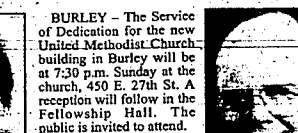

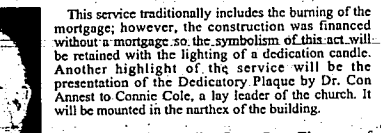

# Pope John Paul II blesses Juan Diego, Mary's messenger, in ceremony in Mexico

 The religious highlight of the opening day of Pope John Paul II's current visit to Mexico was a ceremony confirming centuries of reverence for Juan Diego, a 16th-century Indian peasant, as Mary's messenger.  
 Juan Diego and four other Mexican Catholics were beatified Sunday at the National Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe on the outskirts of Mexico City.  
 When Juan Diego, said to be one of the first converts to Catholicism in the New World, brought roses to a disobedient Spanish bishop at the Madonna's instruction, as the story goes, her image appeared to be stamped on the scribe, or blanket, in which Juan Diego wrapped them.  
 She became known as Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe, the patron of Latin America, and Dec. 12 was established as the feast day for

major Marian celebrations among Catholics of Mexican descent.  
 Some Mexican historians doubt that Juan Diego ever lived. But he was clearly the star of Sunday's beatification ceremonies at Guadalupe, where each day thousands of the faithful from around the world visit the shrine. Many crawl on their hands and knees to the front of the church where the image-bearing cloak is encesed inside the altar.  
 The current basilica, built in 1976, can accommodate 10,000 people and is regarded as the most revered Catholic shrine of devotion and pilgrimage in the Western Hemisphere.  
 In early April, top Mexican bishops said at a press conference that it was virtually certain that John Paul would canonize Diego, bypassing the usual intermediate step of beatification that precedes Roman Catholic sainthood.  
 Mary is said to have appeared four

times to Juan Diego on Tepeyac Hill, instructing him to build a church in her honor on the site.  
 The first church was built two years later, and church authorities claimed that more than 8 million natives were baptized into the new faith between 1531 and 1538.  
 The golden brooch worn by Mary in the image has a black cross similar to the one that was on the banner of Hernando Cortes, which was understood to mean that the Indians were to embrace their conquerors' religion.  
 To date, Mexico's only saint is St. Philip of Jesus, a 16th-century Mexican Franciscan who was martyred while serving as a missionary in Japan.  
 This is John Paul's 47th trip abroad since he was elected pope in 1978, and his second to Mexico: He is scheduled to travel to 11 cities during his eight-day visit.

# Oral Roberts University cuts deal to buy PTL network for \$6 million

**COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP)** — Oral Roberts University has agreed to pay \$6 million in cash for the PTL satellite network once headed by Jim and Tammy Faye Bakker, but the ministry's court-appointed trustee said Thursday the deal is not final.  
 The trustee, Columbia attorney Dennis Shedd, said he is still hoping to sell the network and other PTL assets as a package before the contract with Oral Roberts is approved by a U.S. bankruptcy judge.  
 Shedd said he signed the pact with the Tulsa, Okla.-based university founded by evangelist Oral Roberts because he wants to force action by buyers interested in acquiring the entire PTL complex.  
 "I understand, however, that he did not yet have such an offer although

"there are four or five groups that are seriously looking at" the whole package. Shedd declined to identify them.  
 "I do have a firm deal with Oral Roberts University. However, in the contract, I expressly reserved the right to sell all the assets until the point of approval of the sale of just the network," Shedd said in a telephone interview.  
 The complex includes the satellite network, the 60-acre Heritage USA Christian retreat in Fort Mill and 1,700 acres of undeveloped land in upstate South Carolina.  
 Shedd said "he made the deal" because I have a cash offer and I think it makes good business sense to sell this asset. This asset is essentially deteriorating. Plus, it also works into the broader scheme

to sell the whole property.  
 Shedd filed legal papers in Columbia Thursday asking U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Thurmond Bishop to approve the sale to Roberts on May 31 — in effect the deadline for prospective bidders to submit offers for the entire package.  
 The actual contract signing, which was done by fax machine and air express service between Tulsa and Columbia, was completed Wednesday and included a \$1 million down payment.  
 "I plan to sell it one way or the other and this is the only firm offer I have for any substantial part of the estate," Shedd said.  
 Richard Roberts, son of the 72-year-old faith-healer, said university regents approved the offer this week.

"We believe it is important to provide 24-hour Christian broadcasting to a global audience assuring that God's word will be taken to every man's world," Roberts said in a statement.  
 Roberts told the Tulsa World the agreement was reached about two weeks ago but that ministry officials needed seven days to raise the money for the down payment.  
 "We were able to raise the \$1 million from our regents and from several of our very dear prayer partners," Roberts told the newspaper.  
 The assets of the Bakkers' former religious broadcasting empire have been on the block since April 1988, a year after Jim Bakker resigned in a sex-and-money scandal.  
 Bakker was convicted last fall of

fraudulently raising \$158 million from PTL contributors and is serving a 45-year prison sentence in a federal prison in Minnesota.  
 The Heritage USA retreat has been shut since September, when Canadian businessman Stephen Mornick failed to close on his contract to buy the assets for \$65 million.  
 The broadcast network, however, continues to operate with a skeleton staff of about 10 employees. It broadcasts shows produced by other evangelists such as Jerry Falwell, James Robison and Roberts' son, Richard.  
 As for the network's future, Shedd told The Charlotte (N.C.) Observer, "My understanding is they want to operate it as a religious network."  
 The contract gives Roberts all the network's satellite and cable leases, and all of PTL's television production equipment, which will be moved to Tulsa.  
 Shedd said Roberts has already given him a \$1-million deposit, which will be refunded if all PTL's assets are sold as a package to

another buyer.  
 The remaining \$5 million is due in cash at the closing, which is to come 10 days after Federal Communications Commission approval of transferring the broadcasting license, The Observer reported.  
 "I think it's a good price," Shedd said.  
 At the time PTL declared bankruptcy in June 1987, the satellite network was carried on 1,300 cable systems that had 12 million subscribers.  
 According to court papers filed Thursday, that has slipped to 800 systems with 6.4 million subscribers. The Observer reported.  
 Besides PTL, there are only four other religious satellite networks in the United States: Pat Robertson's Christian Broadcasting Network (CBN), the Southern Baptist Convention's ACTS network, Paul Crouch's Trinity Network and Jimmy Allen's LIFE TV.  
 Other evangelists such as Roberts buy time on those four networks.

# Methodist Church to bless lesbian couple's union

**WASHINGTON** — Their names are in love. They will be wed one evening this month at Dumbarton United Methodist Church. They will exchange gold rings. They will march down the aisle in linen pantsuits and matching jackets.  
 The 218-year-old Methodist church and the women will be stepping into a new world when the couple joins hands in holy union. The church may be setting itself up for discipline by its denomination, but the women may face the everlasting wrath of their families.  
 The church and the couple find themselves at this threshold because of an unusual policy recently approved by the Dumbarton United Methodist congregation to openly bless same-sex unions.  
 Like most mainline denominations, the United Methodist Church does not officially recognize holy unions for homosexuals, which are the equivalent of a heterosexual wedding without the state marriage license.

The United Methodist Church officially opposes homosexuality though it "makes no explicit reference to holy unions of homosexuals in the laws that govern the church, The Book of Discipline."  
 The Methodist Church, like many other denominations, is grappling with homosexuality in a comprehensive national study that is expected to have an impact on the subjects of holy unions and the ordination of openly gay ministers.  
 Dumbarton United Methodist, the oldest United Methodist church in the city, disagrees with the national church position. The 230-member church decided this month to go public and make its view known.  
 A congregational policy was unanimously approved affirming the need for the church "to celebrate with a blessing of covenant or holy union," commitments that refer to holy unions of gay men and to celebrate them with the same serious and pastoral support that are afforded heterosexual couples in the service of marriage.  
 The denomination's highest-ranking church official in this region, Bishop Joseph H. Yeakel, is evaluating Dumbarton United

Methodist's new policy.  
 "It would have been a lot more helpful if it was written in pencil," said Lyle Harper, who serves under Bishop Yeakel as district superintendent of the Washington Methodist District of the United Methodist Church. "We have to take a look at it and see whether it goes beyond the limits of the United Methodist Church and whether they have the authority to do that."  
 "We're struggling with both the law and the discipline of the United Methodist Church," Harper said.  
 "The issue (of homosexuality) is 'force' — what society and certain, before the church. It's extremely explosive."  
 For years, pastors of almost every denomination have performed weddings for same-sex couples. But these services mostly are conducted surreptitiously with the officiating minister facing the threat of a reprimand from church hierarchy, according to religion experts.  
 "We want to say the Christian

thing to do is nurture and support all loving relationships," said Ann Thompson Coe, a member of Dumbarton United Methodist, which in 1987 joined a nationwide movement within the United Methodist Church to have membership policies that include homosexuals.  
 "We don't think the church should be discriminating on the basis of the same sex."  
 "For Dumbarton to do this could have ramifications across the country," said Judy Cayot, a spokeswoman for Affirmation: United Methodists for Lesbian-Gay Causes based in Albany, Calif. "It's quite unusual because most local congregations don't get involved on this issue at all. That's going out on the limb."  
 Dumbarton's congregation is overwhelmingly more heterosexual than homosexual. It is primarily white, mostly middle- to upper-middle class and draws worshippers from throughout the District of Columbia, church officials said.

# Private dedication set for Toronto Mormon Temple

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)** — The public will be permitted to tour the Mormon Church's new Toronto Temple for more than two weeks in August before private dedicatory services are held, church officials say.  
 The temple, located northeast of the city in Brampton, is the fifth second-in-Canada and the 44th worldwide. It will be open to the public Aug. 2-18, then prepared for 11 dedication sessions Aug. 25-27.  
 Attendance at the dedication and future use is reserved for church members living in the temple district, which includes Ontario, Quebec, the Maritime provinces and parts of Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York and Vermont.  
 About 65,000 Mormons live in the district. Worldwide, the church-based faith counts 7.3 million members.  
 Thomas S. Monson, second counselor to church President Ezra Taft Benson in the three-member governing First Presidency, presided over groundbreaking services on Oct. 10, 1987.  
 The Alberta Temple in Cardston, Alberta, was dedicated in 1923.

# Drought in Utah official

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — It's official: Utah is stricken with drought.

But local water czars are making sure that supplies are protected.

"Our message is at this point that we have an adequate water supply, but we encourage people to use it wisely and don't waste it," said LeRoy Hooton Jr., director of public works for Salt Lake City.

Hooton's assessment is pretty cool considering above-normal heat has resulted in streamflows of just 39 percent of average.

"There's no question we're in a drought year," said Jon Werner, data collection office supervisor at the Soil Conservation Service, which has the last word on water conditions.

Following an unseasonably warm April, mountain snowpack melted away at record rates, causing streamflow projections for the 1990 irrigation season to be reduced by as much as half of last month's totals.

Streamflow forecasts now range from 11 percent to 65 percent of normal across the state, or an average reduction of 17 percent since last month, Werner said.

"Streams are peaking about a month ahead of normal this year, due to the early melt and poor snowpack conditions," he said. "Many reservoirs will not fill this season and streams will reach extremely low flow rates very early in the season."

That means users who lack reserves may be faced with rationing early in the season to stretch supplies, Werner said.

But Hooton said there is plenty of water in streams along the Wasatch Front now, and Salt Lake City won't ration water unless conditions become extraordinarily dry.

"Such plans are effective and easy to implement," Hooton said the supply can flip-flop after major water users in the valley are asked to cut back and rotate watering schedules.

Even in the southeast area of the state, where the drought has hit hardest because communities rely on streamflows and don't have a lot of storage capacity, strict water conservation measures haven't been implemented, state water officials said.

# Foundation plans meeting permit appeal

WEST YELLOWSTONE, Mont. (AP) — A Denver-based legal group known for championing conservative causes will appeal a "Forest Service" decision allowing an Earth First! gathering this summer near Ennis, a staff attorney says.

"When a group like Earth First! has a track record of violating other people's rights and property, they forfeit their right to meet on public land," said Todd Welch, senior attorney for the Mountain States Legal Foundation.

Beverhead National Forest officials decided May 2 to grant a permit to Earth First! for its July 7-15 gathering in the southwest Montana forest. Earth First! members have said as many as 500 people will attend the gathering to discuss strategies for protecting the environment.

Mark Petroni, Madison district ranger for the forest, said the decision to grant the permit was based on First Amendment rights of free speech.

Welch said Thursday that the Mountain States Legal Foundation believes "in the Constitution of the United States and in the right people have to meet and assemble." But, those rights are forfeited by those who destroy the property of others, he said.

Welch called Earth First! "an ecoterrorist group with a track record of destroying public and private property."

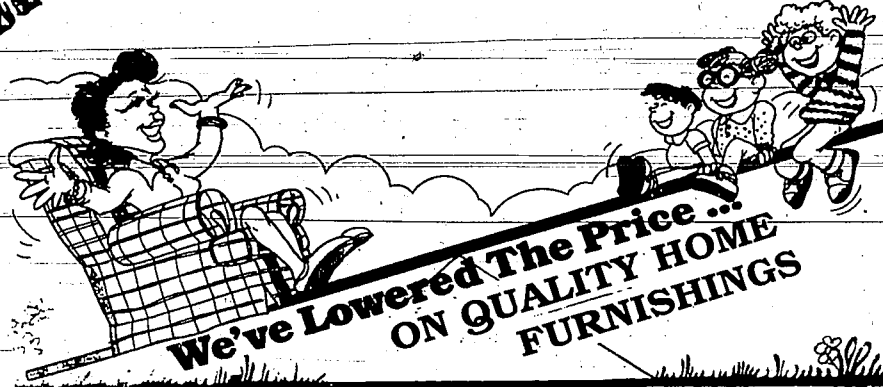
"Earth First! is a radical environmental group whose members have been accused of sabotaging logging equipment and 'spiking' trees, a practice meant to disrupt logging."

Forest officials have required Earth First! to post a \$1,000 bond to ensure that the forest meeting site is cleaned up afterwards. Welch said the bond is not high enough.


Earth First! members testifying at a public hearing last month on the Forest Service permit said they would not engage in destructive activity, but that they could not speak for the group as a whole.

Despite reports, housing has a future

NEW YORK — Bonds are not the only junk peddled in the securities markets.

There are junk companies too, financed by junk bonds. There is plenty of junk analyst too.

Ask the folks who make up the housing and real estate markets, these people who have had to read one brokerage house analysis after another about how it no longer pays to own a home. Junky analysis, they say.

As an investment, the Wall Street analysts contend, housing has had it. Prices have run up so far that buyers have been priced out of the market. The demographics are turning; there'll be a slowdown in buying-age population.

Many of the analyses, including some from academic, have been the basis of stories about the great housing bust, the coming collapse of housing prices, the ominous recession in real estate, crumbling cities and the like.

Such notions so irritated the National Association of Home Builders

that it countered with a special report, pointing out that housing is not a security, is not wildly traded, is more than an investment, and has basic, innate value.

It has not stopped Wall Street. A brokerage house analysis just issued goes enthusiastic about the demise of the single-family home as the American family's primary investment. Now, it suggests, people will turn to securities.

The analyst contends that "adjusted for quantity and price change, the average American homeowner is worse off today than he or she was in 1980."

"Really?" housing people ask.

In 1980, the median price of single-family homes was \$64,000. By late last year, just before the decade closed, the median was more than \$125,000, or close to double, an in-

crease greater than inflation in general. This, after putting up just 10 percent of the price, living in the house for a decade, watching children grow up, enjoying unique income tax deductions, having the use of first-mortgage equity loans, paying down the mortgage.

"The reality of home price under-performance in the 1980s has been very slow to sink in. Many people cling (and in some instances still cling) to the expectations of renewed appreciation," the analysis continues.

Perhaps they do; but meanwhile they have a roof over their heads and a foundation under their feet, which is more than can be said for some of the junk companies that Wall Street recommended in the 1980s.

But why, housing industry people ask, should home prices collapse or barely keep pace with inflation? Because, say Wall Street's analysts, housing has been priced below the means of buyers. Prices must fall to

Maybe so, but isn't the market there? Those same analysts have

been saying for years that millions of Americans couldn't afford houses; and it is unlikely that they will have disappeared at the very time opportunity arises.

But the analysts say, the young-fatherly bulge that supported homebuying in the 1980s will flatten in the 1990s. Yes, say the housing people, and that means builders probably won't build as many houses as in the 1990s.

Aside from these considerations, the home builders point out other salient considerations that tend to support prices.

Buildable land, the biggest single factor in housing costs, is not growing in supply. If anything, building cost and environmental codes may become even more strict. Labor costs aren't likely to plunge.

While people don't necessarily need stocks and bonds, and from time to time foresee the markets in them, they do need homes. Most people wouldn't be caught without one.

Nordstrom reports big drop in 1st quarter earnings

SEATTLE (AP) — Nordstrom Inc., the upscale clothing retailer, reported a 43-percent drop in first quarter profits and said it was due mostly to lower merchandise prices and high operating expenses.

The company said Thursday that other factors, including "distractions" of an ongoing labor-management dispute, made it difficult to reduce expenses.

Profits for the first quarter ended April 30 rose \$13.17 million, or 16 cents per share, compared with \$22.97 million, or 28 cents per share, for the same quarter in 1989.

Net sales were \$555 million, an 8 percent increase over the \$512 million reported for the same

quarter last year. Sales did increase as much as anticipated because of difficulty in maintaining appropriate levels of merchandise inventory, a lower than expected increase in consumer spending, the company said.

As for profits, merchandise margins were lower primarily because the company reduced its markup on merchandise to be competitive with other retailers, said spokesman Dave Marton.

The company also cited a number of other factors, some related to the labor-management conflict, also played a role, the company said.

Earlier this year, Nordstrom was slapped with a state Department of Labor and Industries finding that it doesn't compensate its sales force properly.

The department said Nordstrom systematically misclassifies employees performing work-related duties without pay, and ordered it to pay them more than two years' worth of overtime.

The company, which has built a reputation in its personal customer service, took a \$15 million hit in earnings in the last quarter of 1989 to build a reserve for compensation claims. The United Food and Commercial Workers Union, which represents certain Nordstrom employees in Washington, says that's not nearly enough.

Nordstrom has 60 stores in Washington, Oregon, California, Alaska, Virginia and Utah. Its annual meeting of shareholders will be Tuesday in Newport Beach, Calif.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

A wise reserve seasons the aims and matures the means. - Baltasar Gracian.

Today's interesting slam was played in a team-of-four contest. One South played impulsively and lost the slam. Fran Beard of Dallas played more calmly, choosing a much better line that brought success.

The diamond 10 was led at both tables, and both declarers won the ace. The unsuccessful declarer played two top spades immediately to discard the losing diamond. He tried to establish the club suit. The club king was cashed, but East ruffed dummy's low club lead and led a heart. South won, but regardless of how he played, the result was down two.

Fran felt no immediate pressure regarding her losing diamond, that could wait. And instead of cashing hearts, Fran tried three rounds of hearts. Had they split 4-2, Fran would have discarded her diamond on a high spade and placed all remaining hope on a magic club position. When the trumps behaved nicely, the rest was easy: Fran discarded dummy's two top spades, discarding her diamond, and then led the spade jack, discarding a club. West won but had no effective reply. Fran won four spades, five hearts, a diamond and two clubs to bring her total to 12 tricks.

"That's why I can feel free to open light hands," said her partner, Dr. John W. Fisher of Dallas. "She always gets the most out of what I offer as dummy."

As the cards lie, 13 tricks are available via a finesse against West's spade queen. However, that would be a poor play indeed.

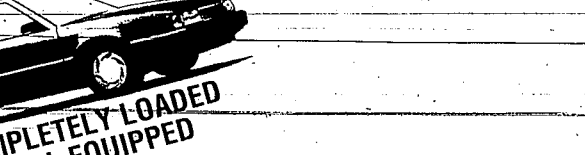
