Baker will confer with Lithuanian as arms talks lag

MOSCOW — Secretary of State James A. Baker III, venturing into sensitive pre-summit diplomacy, said Thursday he would meet in Moscow Friday with the prime minister of the rebellious Soviet republic of Lithuania.

Baker informed Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze of the decision as they tried to break a deadlock on arms control issues less than two weeks before the Washington summit.

"There are gaps between us still... I can't tell you we are going to get there," a senior U.S. official said of Baker's attempt to forge an agreement on nuclear weapons cuts before President Bush and Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev hold their May 31-June 3 talks.

Bush said Wednesday that the Soviets' action against Lithuania "certainly puts some tension" on summit prospects, but he also said it would not stand in the way of any arms agreement.

Gorbachev met Thursday with Lithuanian Prime Minister Kazimieras Pranskis in his first such meeting with a top Lithuanian official since the Baltic republic declared independence.

Even so, the senior U.S. official insisted the Soviets had not fulfilled the Bush administration's call for them to take part in a dialogue with the Baltic leaders.

"It is not enough simply to talk about a

need for dialogue," the official said. "You have to do something that makes it happen. And they are continuing to stick to a position that accepts dialogue but only under certain conditions."

Mrs. Pranskis said they are willing to negotiate everything except their independence declaration.

The senior U.S. official said Baker, who was planning to fly home at midday Saturday, would stay on for further talks with the Soviets. "There is a chance of an accord on nuclear arms control. He is due to see Gorbachev Friday."

"The work is intense right now," said the official, who briefed reporters under rules guaranteeing him anonymity.

Baker told Shevardnadze that he would see Mrs. Pranskis and "his reaction was a big reaction," the official said.

Gorbachev has demanded that Lithuania revoke its March 11 declaration of independence, but on Thursday asked merely for a suspension, Mrs. Pranskis told reporters.

Tensions in the Baltics and the stalemate on arms control issues were hindering Baker's effort to set a summit agenda with Shevardnadze.

But symbolically, at least, they showed a spirit of cooperation.

Shevardnadze took Baker on a tour of a Russian Orthodox church complex at Zussorsk, 45 miles northeast of the capital, and to the nearby village of Rudozh.



A man to look up to Flagpoles take a brighter hue under his brush

TWIN FALLS — Warren Hinrichs' job is always up in the air.

But that's part of the reason the steeplejack has stuck with it for so long. Usually found atop flagpoles, bridges, water towers, church steeples, radio towers and smokestacks, paintbrush in hand, Hinrichs says he'll keep climbing tall structures until his body can't do it anymore.

That could be years from now. He's 49.

Hinrichs' father, Bill, painted his last flag pole in 1986, at the age of 73.

"Why go into the steeplejack business when there's plenty of work on the ground?"

"Because there's more competition in house painting," Hinrichs said. "Because this is definitely more challenging. Because I get to meet a lot of people. I never have to punch the same old time card. And people tend to look up to me."

Hinrichs was full of steeplejack jokes and stories — like the time a janitor threw him a toilet bowl ball to paint gold and top a school's pole — as he prepared to scale the City Hall flagpole Thursday.

He had already topped the Twin Falls School District's administration building pole, and planned to tackle three more standards in the Eden-Hazellon area before the sun had set.

Though he owns a Spokane-based contracting business called Evergreen State Painters Inc.,

Bush balks at signing civil rights 'quota bill'

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush said Thursday he won't tolerate bias in hiring but also won't accept a civil rights bill that imposes quotas on employers.

Sen. Edward W. Kennedy, D-Mass., and John Danforth, R-Mo., quickly unveiled a compromise amendment intended to deal with his objections to the bill that is at the top of many civil rights organizations' legislative lists for this year.

But the White House and Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, both said it failed to remove their concerns about quotas.

"I want to sign a civil rights bill, but I will not sign a quota bill," Bush declared at a Rose Garden ceremony honoring the recently revived U.S. Commission on Civil Rights.

The president, who met three times earlier this week with civil rights groups and other lobbyists to search for a compromise on the legislation, said before Kennedy and Danforth announced their new proposal, "I think we can work it out."

After unvailing the amended version, Danforth said, "After weeks of negotiating

over this change, we are now convinced that quotas will not be the unintended result of this bill." Danforth signed with five other senators as the newest sponsors of the bill, which now has 47 sponsors in the 100-member Senate.

But Hatch said later, "The Kennedy-Danforth amendment in no way solves the severe quota problem in the bill." Hatch, the top Republican on Kennedy's Labor and Human Resources Committee, said Bush and his advisers were "too smart to be taken in by this new language."

At the White House, deputy press secretary Alix Glen said, "It's a step in the right direction but it still does not eliminate our concern that employers would adopt quotas."

There is no mention of quotas — the hiring of a certain number or percentage of minority or other workers — in the bill. But Attorney General Dick Thornburgh and other critics have said the earlier version's standard of proof for justifying exclusionary hiring practices was so tough that employers would use quotas as a way of avoiding lawsuits.

The legislation would undo a series of 1989 Supreme Court decisions that made it harder for workers to prove they were victims of job discrimination.

Senate adopts limits on chemical weapons

WASHINGTON — The Senate approved legislation without dissent Thursday night requiring the president to impose sanctions against countries that violate international agreements against use of chemical and biological weapons.

By a vote of 92-0, the Senate adopted the bill despite the threat of a possible veto by President Bush.

The United States and Soviet Union negotiate cuts in the superpower stockpiles of chemical weapons and reductions in strate-

gic and conventional forces.

But lawmakers said they are concerned about the proliferation of the weapons among Third World countries.

"We have learned anew in recent years of the ghastly and indisputable horror of the use of chemical weapons in violation of international law," said Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.I., chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee.

"We must not apply a lesser standard against chemical weapons use than the use of nuclear weapons."

an amendment calling on the administration to strengthen diplomatic efforts to control chemical agents.

Senators who did not vote on final passage were William Armstrong, R-Colo.; Phil Gramm, R-Texas; Gordon Humphrey, R-Vt.; James Jeffords, R-Vt.; Joseph Lieberman, D-Conn.; Don Nickles, R-Okla.; Steve Symms, R-Idaho; and Malcolm Wallop, R-Wyo.

The legislation, which had bipartisan support, was prompted by the use of chemical weapons in the Iran-Iraq war and Iraq's use

12-legged robot can amble over Mars

PITTSBURGH — It doesn't think like C-3PO or R2D2, but this robot can amble along the rocky surfaces of Mars or the moon as well as any "Star Wars" machine did in a galaxy far, far away.

Scientists at Carnegie Mellon University unveiled the prototype Thursday. Nicknamed the "Ambler" by the team that has been working on it since October 1987, the aluminum robot stands 12 feet tall and has two pairs of three legs each that enable it to traverse uneven terrain.

"A walking robot was needed as an alternative to the traditional line of wheeled rovers," said David B. Lavery, manager of the Planetary Rovers program at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

"What we want to do is demonstrate that legged vehicles have an acceptable place," he said. "I think the Ambler has successfully done

that."

William L. Whittaker, one of three Carnegie Mellon robotics experts heading the project, said the robot moves like a cross-country skier. "A single leg reaches out in front of the others, places itself firmly on the ground like a ski pole and then pulls the machine forward," he said.

Robots using Ambler technology are slated for use in a series of mechanized missions to Mars, Lavery said. He estimated walking robots could be on the Martian surface by the end of the decade.

President Bush last week set a deadline of 2019 for Americans to walk on Mars. The date is 50 years after Neil Armstrong, Michael Collins and Buzz Aldrin first landed on the moon.

The Ambler, which recently took its first steps, is one project being evaluated by the NASA rovers program, Lavery said. The other projects under consideration are all wheeled

rovers, he said.

"The intent for the vehicles... is for them to be capable of operating on their own with just a very general set of directions," he said.

That objective has been met in the Ambler, according to Takeo Kanade, Whittaker's associate.

"Our goal is basically to demonstrate that actual exploration of planets is possible," Kanade said.

The Ambler has the ability to assess its environment, make decisions, move and interact with or manipulate objects, he said.

The Ambler is one of very few systems that embody all four capabilities, he said.

Kanade, who serves as co-director of Carnegie Mellon's Robotics Institute, said the Ambler prototype will never go into space. But the robot's technology should be ready for space flight within a decade.

Meantime, Kanade envisions other uses for the technology.

Fund for nuclear arms plant cleanup sought

WASHINGTON — Congress should set up a special trust fund to guarantee availability of more than \$100 billion for cleaning up radioactive wastes at nuclear weapons plants, a Senate panel was told Thursday.

The Energy Department opposes the fund, proposed by Sen. Brock Adams and Rep. Norm Dicks, both Washington State Democrats. The department claims it would duplicate clean-up plans initiated by Energy Secretary James D. Watkins.

But on Thursday, Sens. Tim Wirth, D-Colo., and Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, joined an aide to Washington Gov. Booth

Gardner in pleading for the fund before the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee.

"They said a permanent financing plan is necessary to guard against future administrations that may lack a commitment to health and environmental safety."

"We can't continue to push this problem off to future generations as it has been pushed off on us," said Dan Silver, a special assistant to Gardner.

"We're fooling ourselves if we think we can continue in a nickel-and-dime fashion to try to clean up these places without a long-term commitment," Wirth added. "We are going to have to find a way of missing the ante significantly."

No more money pressure for NATO

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is no longer asking NATO allies to increase defense budgets by the long-standing but rarely achieved goal of 1 percent a year, the Pentagon said Thursday in a major reversal of policy.

The decision — described by officials as a decision of the entire alliance — bows to the reality of the

lessened threat of attack on the NATO alliance from the Soviet Union and the Warsaw Pact.

"Given the changes in European security requirements, we are no longer asking our allies to increase their defense budgets by 3 percent," the statement said.

Instead of meeting the long-standing spending target, the statement

waives the United States is asking the allies to "contribute to the military force structure required by the NATO military command."

The spending target, stated in terms of "real" or inflation-adjusted spending, was set under President Carter in 1977, primarily in response to congressional demands that Europe take up more of the burden.

of the weapons last year against its Kurdish minority.

In addition, Iraqi President Saddam Hussein has vowed to use chemical weapons against Israel if the Mideast nation launches a nuclear attack.

"Many months ago, I said that the evil genie of chemical weapons is already out of the bottle," said Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole of Kansas. "It's even more critical today that we do everything we can to see that the genie does not spread its poison more widely."

The bill says that as many as 20 nations are capable of producing chemical weapons and that by the year 2000, at least 15 developing countries will have the ability to produce ballistic missiles capable of delivering the weapons.

Bush administration officials, however, said they would recommend a veto because the legislation would limit the president's authority to conduct foreign policy and doesn't provide the necessary presidential authority.

The legislation allows the president to delay imposition of the sanc-

tions for up to one year while trying to get the nation to change its policy. The original bill called for a nine-month period.

Dole, who introduced the time amendment, was "forced down a provision permitting the president to waive the sanctions annually."

The sanctions in the bill would call for a cutoff of arms sales, an embargo on imports from violating countries, an end to credit guarantees from the Export-Import Bank, a halt to financial assistance from U.S. banks and an end to military and economic assistance.

Deep budget cuts could hit economy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Negotiators for the White House and Congress were urged Thursday to seek deficit savings of \$50 billion to \$60 billion but avoid more drastic steps that might send the economy into slow growth.

Officials from the administration and the Congressional Budget Office gave the negotiators widely differing projections about the size of the growing federal deficit.

But both sides agreed that cuts of \$50 billion to \$60 billion would not be enough to head off automatic spending cuts under the Gramm-Rudman budget-balancing law. Some negotiators have said loosening the deficit targets in the law could be one way of dealing with that problem.

"We're still trying to find out what the facts are," House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., said after Thursday's 90 minutes of closed-door talks.

"We'll set the goals we're trying to achieve, then we'll talk about ways to reach the goals."

Congressional aides said it was likely to be several days before a detailed proposal for spending cuts or tax increases surfaced in the talks. The meeting began Tuesday after President Bush set aside his campaign pledge of no new taxes and said there would be no preconditions to the negotiations.

Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady, White House Chief of Staff John Sununu and Budget Director Richard Darman led the president's team into the negotiations.

Participants at the talks heard differing projections about the likely size of the 1991 deficit without tax hikes or spending cuts.

According to the non-partisan Congressional Budget Office, it will take \$85 billion to \$95 billion in savings to reach the \$64 billion target in the Gramm-Rudman law.

The White House's Office of Management and Budget presented figures showing that \$39 billion to \$74 billion would be needed.

Grand jury indicts plotters

BOISE (AP) — A federal grand jury on Thursday indicted three Idaho men linked to a white supremacist group, alleging they conspired to blow up a gay night club and other Seattle-area businesses owned or patronized by minorities.

The six-page indictment against Robert John Winslow of LaCrosse, Steven E. Nelson of Hayden Lake and Procter J. Baker of Coeur d'Alene effectively continues the plait against the men pending in Idaho and Seattle.

men's detention in Seattle-area jail pending a detention hearing in Idaho.

Fred Leatherman, attorney for Nelson, said the men could be transferred to Idaho over the weekend for a hearing as early as Monday.

The indictment charged Winslow, 29, and Nelson, 24, each with one count of knowingly making, receiving or possessing pipe bombs and one count of carrying firearms in relation to a violent crime.

If convicted on all three counts, they each face as much as 20 years in prison under \$75,000 in fines.

Baker was charged with one count of conspiracy to bomb and one count of knowingly making, receiving or possessing pipe bombs. He could receive 10 years in prison and a \$500,000 fine if convicted on both counts.

In a brief hearing Thursday in federal court in Seattle, U.S. Magistrate John Weinberg, in view of the Idaho indictment, dismissed a criminal complaint against Winslow and Nelson that alleged illegal possession of two explosive devices in violation of federal firearms laws.

Weinberg also continued the two





He heched his way up the pole, scraping paint to the music of his bucket clanging along underneath.

Once to the top, he began painting. The City Hall pole got a special tri-prim paint job — red, white and blue for the Centennial celebration. It cost the city \$400, a little more than the usual \$4 per foot charge because of the complicated painting.

Hinrichs said he doesn't know when he'll be back in town just knows he'll be back. Someone's got to keep Old Glory's standard shining.



National group to bolster Craig's campaign

A national organization came into Idaho Thursday to defend Congressman Larry Craig's balanced budget constitutional amendment from the barbs of his under-financed opponent for the Republican U.S. Senate nomination while Democrats vying for Craig's House seat crossed swords over campaign ads.

As Craig and Attorney General Jim Jones made final preparations for their statewide televised debate Thursday night, Lew. Uhler of the National Tax Limitation Committee said Attorney General Jim Jones is

just wrong in calling the amendment an empty sham.

"That's inaccurate and shows a lack of understanding on his part and a lack of respect for constitutional requirements," Uhler said.

Jones and other critics cite the amendment's loophole that allows deficit spending if 60 percent of the Congress approves, but Uhler maintained the fact that the guidelines for a balanced budget are

in the constitution gives them significantly weight.

"If they want to spend more than the Constitution allows, they better be prepared to explain why," he said.

Uhler's unabashed endorsement of Craig-over Jones for the seat of retiring GOP Sen. James McClure came with just five days left in a campaign that has seen Jones reportedly gaining solid support in southern and eastern Idaho despite being outspent by Craig 10-to-1.

On the Democratic ticket, Boise businessman and former state legislator Ron Twilegar was favored to claim the nomination over political newcomer David Steed of Idaho Falls. Twilegar on Thursday said the long-running wilderness debate needed to be approached on an area-by-area basis instead of with a statewide plan, proposing as his first area for preservation 119,000 acres that includes Mount Borah, Idaho's highest peak.

In the three-way Democratic

primary for the right to reclaim Craig's House seat from nearly a quarter century of GOP control, Larry LaRocco of Boise and former state Rep. Jeanne Givens of Coeur d'Alene clashed at a candidate forum in Boise over Mrs. Givens' television advertisement portraying LaRocco as an rich, out-of-touch stockbroker with no confidence in America.

LaRocco, calling himself the front runner in Tuesday's primary, has countered the ad being aired in northern Idaho with one accusing Mrs. Givens of desperation tactics that are "harming Democratic chances for victory in November against" Republican Sen. Skip Smyser of Parma, who has no primary opponent.

"I'm defending myself vigorously," LaRocco said. "It could be construed that my stuff is negative too. I'll take it off when she takes her's off."

But Mrs. Givens rejected that demand.

'Butch' Otter outspends primary opponent Forrey

BOISE (AP) — Republican Lt. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter has pumped more than \$25,000 into his campaign for another four years in a part-time job paying just \$20,000 a year.

The final pre-primary campaign finance disclosures, on file with the Secretary of State Thursday, showed Otter spending nearly 80 percent on that money on advertising in his campaign to overcome only token opposition.

With no Democratic candidate on the ballot, only former GOP state Rep. Robert Forrey of Caldwell stood in Otter's path to a second term that he hopes to use as the foundation for a 1994 gubernatorial bid. Forrey reported spending just \$167, through May 6.

The only other primary contest on Tuesday's ballot was for the Republican nomination to take on incumbent Democratic Auditor J.D. Williams, who is unopposed in the primary. Williams has generated an \$18,500 campaign bankroll, spending just \$7,300 of it so far.

GOP contenders Eldon Golightly of Preston and Ron Pollock of Caldwell have each spent less than

half the amount Williams has while the third Republican Richard Williams of Shelley, who came within four percentage points of winning the office in 1986, reported spending no money so far.

There were no primary races for the other statewide offices. But the most expensive campaign outside the contest for governor was shaping up for the attorney general's office being vacated by two-term Republican Jim Jones, who was running for the U.S. Senate.

Bannock County Prosecutor Larry EchoHawk, a former state legislator, reported amassing more than \$61,000 in financial support for his fall battle with former Deputy Attorney General Pat Kole.

Kole, now in private law practice in Boise, generated just \$28,400 in cash, \$7,000 from his own pocket and \$10,000 more from relatives.

EchoHawk has pumped just \$1,500 of his own money into his campaign. EchoHawk's contributors included the Shoshone-Bannock Indian Tribes at Fort Hall, which donated \$5,000, along with other Indians and Indian organizations.

Heroin threatens Canyon County

NAMPA (AP) — A dramatic increase in heroin trafficking in Canyon County threatens to overwhelm local efforts to stop it, drug enforcement officers say.

"In the last six months we have seen an explosion of heroin. We see it every day, whereas we hardly ever used to see it," Nampa Police Sgt. Alan Creech last week told the Nampa City Council. He is head of the multi-jurisdictional City-County Narcotics Unit.

Officers have identified more than 130 heroin addicts in the Treasure Valley, many of whom travel from Boise to neighboring Nampa and Caldwell to buy the drug, Creech said.

He regards Canyon County as a hub for heroin trafficking. Most heroin and cocaine in Canyon County comes from Mexico.

Stallings not likely to see defeat this time

Four years ago, at the end of Rep. Richard Stallings' first term in office, the freshman Democrat faced a herd of would-be challengers in the Republican primary.

Out of a five-way race, which included George Hansen's wife, emerged Mel Richardson, who ran away from the field but was nonetheless soundly trounced by Stallings in the fall election.

In 1990, that again is the likely outcome. Indeed, one could make a strong case that the Republican Party in the 2nd Congressional District has wholly failed to field even one credible candidate as a potential challenger to Stallings.

The reasons for this state of affairs are many, but among them clearly are the long odds that Stallings can be defeated.

Despite being a Democrat in what has to be one of the most Republican congressional districts in America, the former Ricks College history professor has widened his margin of victory in successive elections. Two years ago, against a weak Dane Watkins, he ran ahead of George Bush in Twin Falls County.

Another reason for the weak field of challengers is Stallings' generally acceptable record to many 2nd District voters. He has been a strong supporter of farm programs and is gaining enough seniority to make a difference on issues such as the future of the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, wilderness and water.

In short, he is not particularly vulnerable to attack, except on the vague charge that he is a member of the House of Democrats, with all that implies.

Thus, it is perhaps understandable that no serious Republican challenger has come forward. Instead, what we have is an unlikely collection of people who, by virtually any measure, are barely qualified to serve in the Congress of the United States. Nonetheless, here they are:

• **Sean McDevitt.** This young man, 27 years old, is a candidate in search of an office, but wholly lacking in experience. A graduate of West Point, McDevitt is a veteran of the recent Panama invasion by the U.S. Army, where, to hear him tell it, he nearly single-handedly kicked the stuffing out of Manuel Noriega.

He was discharged after the invasion and has come home to Idaho, to well, we're not really sure. He describes himself as the manager of his family's ranch, but he seems otherwise not to have held a job in the real world.

Except for his family ties (his uncle is a Supreme Court justice and his cousin is married to state Sen. Larry Anderson), he seems to have no reason to be in the race. He appears to be using it as a "warmup" to build name identification.

With some money and his family connections, McDevitt could emerge as the GOP nominee in the May 22 primary. But that does not, in our view, make him any more qualified to hold the office. What he really needs to go out, get a job and work for a while, earn a paycheck away from the government payroll and then offer himself for public office.

• **Ann Rydalch.** Rydalch is probably McDevitt's strongest opponent in the primary. She has served in the Idaho Senate for eight years and is chairwoman of the Senate Commerce Committee, but her record, according to many, is at best undistinguished in that body.

Rydalch is more conservative on the issues than McDevitt and offers primary voters more familiarity with the ins and outs of government.

But she is also a more regional candidate, reflecting a decidedly eastern Idaho perspective on federal issues.

Also, as an employee of a main-INEL contractor, she could be less than independent on issues such as nuclear-waste disposal and the heavy military influence of the site at a time when such independence is needed.

Drawing on her legislative history and as a reasonably well-known candidate in the eastern end of the state, Rydalch could be the winner on Tuesday. If she does, she could give voters a sharper ideological choice in November to the more progressive and moderate Stallings.

• **Janet Reid and Dan Hawkey.** These other two candidates bring little but their names to the contest. Neither, in our view, has any chance to win the nomination. Reid is an Idaho Falls homemaker who, in a race for Congress, is in well over her head on the issues.

Hawkey is a former deputy U.S. attorney who does not even live in the 2nd District. He is running a low-budget (about \$300) campaign and his positions are close to pure Libertarian.

The GOP primary election offers spirited contests in the U.S. Senate race and in the governorship nomination. But in the congressional Republican primary, the temptation may be for many to simply not pick any one of the four contenders.

Put another way, in a trout stream in which one might expect to find a big fish or two, instead there are only minnows.

Plenty of reasons to say nay to Noh

The Times-News needs to get their facts straight regarding Sen. Laird Noh and Idaho sportsmen.

Sen. Noh was the only Magic Valley senator who voted for confirmation of Guth and Racine. There were 17,000 signatures against the confirmation and about 20 letters for confirmation. The letters for confirmation were almost all from Sun Valley outfitters and guides. Who did Sen. Noh represent?

Sen. Noh's only reason to reconfirm Guth and Racine was when he contended the single change of Wood River and Silver Creek regulation. He knew from the first time we wrote to Boise that this was a many-issue protest of those two commissioners. The issues were:

- Wood River and Silver Creek regulations to benefit the outfitters and guides, rich out-of-staters and special interests.

• Weights for all new regulations were held in areas far away from impact areas. The vote to change regulations on the Wood River were held in Coeur d'Alene and Montpelier. Therefore, there would be little or no opposition. The only ones with input were outfitters and guides.

• Last year, we sent over 2,000 signatures to Guth about regulations. He threw them away.

• Pheasant hunting has been totally ignored. Foxes and other predators are out of control and the Fish and Game were doing nothing.

• A lot of lakes and streams have regulations not allowing anything less than 20 inches to be kept. Again, a trend for non-consumptive use.

• The commission allowed 500 more permits to hunters from out of state and granted 300 of them specifically to outfitters and guides.

• The commission raised Idahoans' rates to hunt and fish. Yet the increase in permits proportionately benefited out-of-state people.

• The commission has allowed the outfitters and guides to totally dominate the rafting areas, even to the exclusion of some college programs.

Guth and Racine told us in front of Sen. Noh's committee that they didn't have to listen to the people and any decisions on regulations will be theirs and not ours. Guth said, "I wasn't aware I was supposed to represent the people in my district."

So much for the single-issue theory! A compromise was made on Wood River and Silver Creek, but it had nothing to do with Sen.

Noh. He was not even involved in the compromise. Even though we sent all the signatures to Gov. Cecil Andrus, the commission and our senators, the compromise was made because we filed a lawsuit to question the legality of what the commission did. Sen. Noh knew of all of this but refused to respond to the people of Magic Valley. He told us we didn't know what we signed and told us hunting and fishing rights should not be brand us as radicals!

Sen. Noh appears to have lost touch with the voters. He seems to cater to special-interest groups such as the Idaho Conservation League and Nature Conservancy who want to lock all of us off federal lands. We don't have the dollars to fight the wealthy preservationists, but we do have the power of the vote.

We feel that it's time for a change. Bill Toolson will represent the people of Twin Falls County, not the special-interest groups from Sun Valley and out of state. Let's get the representation back where it belongs. Please vote Bill Toolson in the primary election.



Record water volume released from Texas dam; floods continue

CAMILLA COVE, Texas (AP) — Floodwaters from a rain-swollen lake gushed into the Trinity River at a record rate Thursday, but many residents downstream stayed home to guard against looters despite evacuation warnings.

"At this point, we're still hanging in there," said Eugene Hanson, who owns a small store near the base of Lake Livingston Dam and has been watching rising waters get closer and closer.

Missouri, Mississippi, Louisiana and Oklahoma also coped with continued flooding or braced for more.

Oklahoma's governor dispatched National Guard soldiers to help get food to stranded cattle. A Louisiana farmer began evacuating his 4,000 alligators to higher ground. And St. Louis prepared for floods from the Mississippi River expected to hit Saturday.

Rivers in Arkansas continued receding following record floods last week, and southern Illinois residents

cleaned up from floods Wednesday night.

Flooding has caused at least 13 deaths in Texas and one in Oklahoma in the past three weeks, and millions of dollars in damage. In Texas, 33 counties have been declared eligible for disaster aid due to storms and flooding.

Floodwaters from Lake Livingston, about 75 miles northeast of Houston, are expected to inundate more than 200 square miles along the Trinity River.

An aerial inspection Thursday determined that, except for scattered subdivisions, most of the damage was confined to pasture. Further downstream, the Trinity remained within its banks.

At the dam, operators increased the flow through a dozen floodgates to a record 100,800 cubic feet per second by midday Thursday.

The amount of water released from the dam over the past three weeks would fill the Houston Astrodome 1,200 times, officials

calculated.

The most seriously damaged subdivision was Camilla Cove just below the dam, where more than 75 homes were damaged. Roads looked like canals, and the water was at window level in some areas.

In Missouri, Gov. John Ashcroft declared Jackson County, which includes Kansas City, a disaster area, and promised to seek federal assistance.

Ashcroft flew over a section of Kansas City flooded by the Big Blue River after two days of heavy rain. The area included a trailer park and several small businesses.

"I've been wearing sunglasses for the past two days so no one can see that I'm crying," said business owner David Hall, estimating his losses at \$2 million.

In St. Louis, city workers began piling up sandbags and setting up floodgates near the city's trademark arch along the Mississippi as the river continued rising.

Floodwaters threaten alligator farm

POWHATAN, La. (AP) — Walter "Skeet" Rogers put on metal gloves, grabbed a 3-foot-long alligator and slung it into a cotton wagon, moving it to high ground before flood waters got it.

"The last time we got to fooling with them, one man got 47 stitches," Rogers said, explaining the gloves.

Rogers' 4,000 alligators were hatched from eggs gathered from wild nests and raised in double-decker ponds in four climate-controlled city-block buildings. Two more buildings are under construction at his Bayou Electric Gator Farm, located on low land near the bayou for which it is named.

"About 200 square miles of

Louisiana is flooded by water from the Red River and backwaters such as Bayou Pierre. Most of the land is a sparsely settled section of the state used for farming cotton, wheat, soybeans.

Rogers' crop is different, though not less threatened.

"It's awful. The water keeps coming up," said Alice Hart, Rogers' mother. "I've been right here for 12 years, and nothing like this has ever happened before."

"They'll drown. Skeet sold off some of the big ones, but the rest will just drown, if it keeps coming up."

With hides bringing \$35 a linear foot and demand for alligator meat high, alligator farming is a

burgeoning industry in an economically depressed state. Louisiana has 92 licensed gator farms. Two dozen license applications are pending. Three years ago, there were 13 alligator farms in Louisiana.

Buddy Goatcher, an alligator biologist with the state Department of Wildlife and Fisheries, said it is possible gators could be drowned if trapped in deep water for a long time with no firm resting place.

"The farmer can't predict how long the waters will be up," Goatcher said. "And you can't predict the force of the water. It could knock down the building and send gators spewing all over the place."

Ex-commander says more Agent Orange sprayed than reports show

WASHINGTON (AP) — More Agent Orange was sprayed in Vietnam than official records show, a former commander said in a report Thursday that also suggests a discernible pattern of collaboration to deny veterans compensation.

Also, a Veterans Affairs Department panel issued a ruling that brings compensation closer to veterans exposed to the herbicide who suffer from soft-tissue sarcoma, a rare cancer.

Admiral Elmo R. Zumwalt Jr., in his report to Veterans Secretary Edward J. Derwinski, said he was certain from his experience that more Agent Orange was spread than recorded.

"Combat units ... frequently conducted 'unofficial' sprayings" of Agent Orange obtained from out of channels, and thus unrecorded sources," said Zumwalt.

"Additionally, as a commander, U.S. Naval Forces, Vietnam, I was aware that Agent Orange issued to Allied forces was frequently used on unrecorded missions," Zumwalt said in the report.

The report, issued May 6, was released Thursday, a day after

Zumwalt told an advisory panel to the VA he believes that 28 diseases are linked to Agent Orange exposure. Zumwalt, a special adviser to Derwinski, was recently named to the department's Advisory Committee on Environmental Hazards.

The panel on Thursday determined it is as likely as not that a significant association exists between soft-tissue sarcoma and Agent Orange exposure.

Derwinski is to decide by June whether to award disability payments to veterans with that disease. Derwinski decided in March that all Vietnam veterans with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma should be compensated.

The advisory committee in August will examine studies relating dioxin and herbicide exposure to a skin disease known as chloracne, and a metabolic disorder known as porphyria cutanea tarda.

The two reports make it likely that veterans will be compensated for soft-tissue sarcoma. VA spokesman Bonner Day said the department had no figure on how many Agent Orange claimants said they have soft-tissue sarcoma.

Zumwalt's report said the herbi-

cide was used in strengths far in excess of that suggested by the manufacturers. The makers have settled a class-action lawsuit brought by afflicted veterans.

He also criticizes government actions and studies on Agent Orange, including the activities of the advisory panel.

His broadsides backed up claims by veterans who have been trying to get compensation for more than a decade and who claim the government has had to be pushed to move and has ignored evidence supporting links between Agent Orange and cancers.

"Were the faulty conclusions, faulty methodology and noticeable bias of the advisory committee an isolated problem; correcting the misdirection would be more manageable," Zumwalt wrote.

"But, experience with other governmental agencies responsible for analyzing and studying the effects of exposure to Agent Orange strongly hints at a discernible pattern, if not outright governmental collaboration, to deny compensation to Vietnam veterans for disabilities associated with exposure to dioxin."

Freed hostage has surgery for cancer

WASHINGTON (AP) — Freed American hostage Robert Polhill had his voice box removed in four hours of surgery Thursday because of a cancerous growth on his vocal cords.

"He is resting in intensive care," said Ben Smith, spokesman for Walter Reed Medical Center. "His condition is good. The surgeons characterized the operation as successful."

Smith said Polhill probably will remain in the hospital's intensive

care unit for a time because of his diabetes and weakened condition from his hostage ordeal, although the spokesman provided no specific duration.

Polhill will then go through radiation therapy, said Col. Russ Zajchuk, deputy commander of clinical services at the Army hospital.

The former hostage's wife, Ferial, and mother, Ruth, were with him in the hospital, said Smith.

Smith declined to provide any

more details about Polhill's condition, saying an update on would be provided Friday.

Polhill, 55, who was freed by Shiite Muslims last month after 39 months in captivity in Lebanon, greeted freedom with a raspy voice that provided the first hint to his cancer. When he arrived in the United States on April 27, he could barely speak above a whisper, which officials initially attributed to his ordeal.

Wildfire burns 10,000 acres of Everglades

MIAMI (AP) — A wildfire apparently sparked by a burning barn, has scorched 10,000 acres of tinder-dry sawgrass in the Everglades, officials said Thursday.

"It's dry out there. It's like a tin-derbox," said Peter Burke, spokesman for the state Division of

Forestry, blaming Florida's 20-month-long drought for the rapid spread of the flames near the Dade-Broward county line.

He said the fire broke out Wednesday and grew to 10,000 acres by Thursday morning. Gusts up to 20 mph complicated firefighting.

Zajchuk said Wednesday the tumor was probably at least a year old when it was diagnosed.

"If it had been discovered earlier, he probably wouldn't have to lose his voice box, provided he had the right radiation therapy," Zajchuk said.

Bush: Germany must decide its own future

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush, completing a series of pre-summit meetings with allied leaders, said Thursday a united Germany must exercise full control over its territory and not be "singled out" by the Soviet Union for special status.

Bush, commenting after a meeting with West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl, voiced strong opposition to a Soviet proposal that a reunified Germany be neutral, or a member of both NATO and the Warsaw Pact.

Kohl, too, said firmly that such matters were up to Germany alone, and he said the nation's choice "is and will always be" NATO.

It was Bush's final meeting with Western leaders in advance of his May 31-June 3 summit with Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

In recent weeks, Bush also met with British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher, French President Francois Mitterrand and Canadian President Brian Mulroney.

The issue of German reunification is expected to be high on the agenda at the Bush-Gorbachev talks.

"Forty-five years after the end of the war, there is no reason that a unified Democratic Germany should be in any special status," Bush said outside the White House as he bade farewell to Kohl.

For his part, Kohl thanked Bush for the "magnificent support" he had given "Germans on our path to German unity."

In their formal remarks, neither Bush nor Kohl mentioned the delicate question of the pace of German reunification.

At picture-taking sessions in the Oval Office, Kohl would not predict whether German unity would come before the end of the year — even though earlier he suggested all-German elections could come as early as Dec. 2.

"Nobody knows that. We know that the people are shouting, we are the people. This is why nobody can be an exact date. But everything is going very well. We can say that," he said through a

translator.

Losses by Kohl's Christian Democratic Party in two West German state elections on Sunday have seen as a reflection of voter uneasiness over his plans for speedy reunification.

Bush administration officials say a question of how quickly reunification proceeds is a matter to be left strictly up to the Germans.

Bush said that he and Kohl both agreed that the rights of the four World War II victors — the United States, the Soviet Union, France and Britain — should be terminated at the time of German reunification.

"A united Germany should have full control over all of its territory without any new, discriminatory constraints on German sovereignty," Bush said.

Britain, France and the United States support West Germany's call for a reunified Germany to be part of NATO. But the Soviet Union argues that the new Germany should be neutral, or a member of both NATO and the

Warsaw Pact.

Both the United States and West Germany "want a united Germany which enjoys full sovereignty, a united Germany which is a full member of the Western community and of the NATO alliance, including participation in its integrated military structures," Bush said.

A senior administration official, insisting upon anonymity, said of the West Germans at a White House briefing after the Kohl visit, "It's absolutely critical... that we keep in the closest possible touch with them and that was what this meeting was about — especially immediately in advance of a U.S.-Soviet summit in which the future of Germany will figure prominently."

In his remarks on the South Lawn of the White House, Bush said he and Kohl agreed that U.S. forces should "remain stationed in the United Germany and elsewhere in Europe to continue to promote stability and security."

Kohl said a reunified Germany must remain a member of NATO.

Trade deficit surges, but good news seen in boost of exports

WASHINGTON (AP) — Record exports helped keep the U.S. trade deficit in March below its 1989 monthly average, the government reported Thursday, and analysts said the gap could narrow to less than \$100 billion this year for the first time since 1983.

The Commerce Department said the March deficit totaled \$8.45 billion, down from the \$9 billion monthly gap last year but a sharp 38.5 percent increase over February.


The jump resulted in part from a 10 percent increase in imports to \$41.72 billion, their highest level in five months. But economists said the advance was a rebound from an 8.1 percent decline in imports in February, which they called an aberration.

The department said exports totaled \$33.28 billion in March, up 4.6 percent from February and the advance was the previous record of \$31.9 billion set last January. The deficit is the difference between imports and exports.

The economists called the increase in exports a bright sign for the overall economy.

"If they stay up, there's just almost no way we can have a recession," said Bruce Steinberg, senior economist with Merrill Lynch Capital Markets in New York, who forecasts a deficit of \$95 billion or less this year. "It's absolutely what we need for our economy to prosper."

Rising exports mean a stronger economy because more jobs and profits are created as American

Manufacturers, said exports are growing twice as fast as imports and represent 30 to 40 percent of our economic growth over the past three years.

Commerce Secretary Robert A. Mosbacher noted the \$2.9 billion first-quarter imbalance was the smallest in more than six years and continued the downward trend in the deficit.

"Strong export growth was the key to these favorable results," he said. "I expect that we will see the trade deficit break \$100 billion this year."

The deficit peaked at \$152.12 billion in 1987 and then dropped to \$118.53 billion the following year and to \$109 billion last year. It has been above the \$100 billion level since 1983 when it totaled \$52.4 billion.

The March exports represented "nice increases in computers, electrical machinery, industrial machinery and scientific equipment," Steinberg said.

Holding down the export number was a decline in aircraft shipments, which Robert Brusca, chief financial economist with Nikko Securities Co. in New York, said resulted from the recent Boeing Co. strike.

"When the Boeing strike ended at the end of last year," he said, "aircraft shipments were running at abnormal levels. Now they are back down to normal levels."

Samuel D. Kahan, chief financial economist with Fuji Securities Inc., in Chicago, noted much of the increase was in automobiles.

House opens debate on bill to give civil rights protection to the disabled

WASHINGTON (AP) — A proposal to extend to the disabled the civil rights protections given racial minorities and women was called as a bill "whose time has come" as the House opened debate on the measure Thursday.

The Americans With Disabilities Act would grant to people with AIDS, blindness, cerebral palsy and a number of other mental and physical impairments the protections accorded racial minorities and women.

Supporters, including the White House, say the bill is an important addition to the body of civil rights legislation that began in the 1960s.

"It is a bill whose time is too late but whose time has certainly come," said the lead House sponsor, Rep. Steny Hoyer, D-Md.

President Bush, urging speedy passage, said earlier this month, "Disabled citizens have waited long enough for equality."

But the administration also has also tried to soften the impact of the bill on employers who violate the anti-discrimination provisions.

Among key provisions:

- Discrimination in hiring and on the job will be prohibited. The requirement would be phased in over two to four years, depending on the size of the company. Companies with fewer than 15 employers would be exempt.

- Hotels, restaurants, shopping malls, drug stores, and business and professional offices, along with any other "public accommodation," would have to make themselves accessible to disabled people. Accessibility includes structural adjustments, such as wheelchair ramps and widened doors, and services.

- Transportation, public and private, would have to be made accessible. Fixed route bus systems would have to be accessible for people with wheelchairs. Special "paratransit" would be available for people with other disabilities who cannot use regular transit.

- Amtrak, Greyhound, and commuter rail systems are covered. Timetables for implementation vary according to system.

- Speech- and hearing-impaired people would have access to telephone service by means of relay services. These services would have to be provided by phone companies within three years. The Federal Communications Commission would have jurisdiction.

- Backers say the legislation is necessary to push the estimated 43 million disabled Americans into the economic and social mainstream. The cost to the government is small, topping out at \$31 million in 1994. The cost to business has not been calculated.

- But the White House and congressional negotiators who worked on the nearly identical Senate version say the bill's timetables and exemptions meet business concerns. Supporters say also that the cost will be offset by the work force and the consumer economy.

- The Senate passed the bill last September by a 76-8 vote. But the proposal moved much more slowly through the House.

PLO complains Israel 'refusing to talk peace'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Tunisia's president said Thursday that he had brought a message to President Bush from PLO chairman Yasser Arafat: Israel is refusing to talk peace.

El Abidine Ben Ali said he told Bush also that the Palestine Liberation Organization believes it has made too many concessions "without any response from Israel."

The Tunisian leader, who met with Bush at the White House on Monday, said he would convey Bush's response to Arafat but declined to elaborate. Ben Ali spoke to a group of reporters at Blair House, the official U.S. guest quarters.

Also included in Arafat's message were several options for resolving the deadlock in attempts to bring Israelis and Palestinians to the negotiating table, he said. Those will be reviewed by the administration, Ben Ali said.

Cameras back in Oval Office

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House press office dropped an experimental limit on cameras Thursday and the networks were back in the Oval Office covering President Bush.

They gathered in full force to cover the outset of Bush's meeting with West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl.

"Look who's back. Welcome back, gang," Bush said as the cameras rolled and a dozen boom microphones stretched for his every word.

The four networks boycotted coverage of two White House events Wednesday in protest of the experimental restrictions; first tried Monday.

"You-win-I-leave," White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater told reporters at another event. Fitzwater complained Wednesday that the networks were operating by "horse-and-buggy rules" in an era with space-age camera technology.

Brando's son arrested in shooting death of sister's boyfriend

LOS ANGELES — The son of actor Marlon Brando was arrested on suspicion of murder Thursday morning after the boyfriend of the actor's daughter was found shot to death at the elegant Brando estate overlooking Hollywood.

Police said Christian Brando, 32, told them that he fired a single pistol shot into the head of Dag Dorliet, 26, about 10:40 p.m. Wednesday after accusing Dorliet of beating 20-year-old Cheyenne Brando, who is pregnant.

According to the family, the abuse took place shortly before the slaying and apparently was not part of a sustained pattern of mistreatment, police said.

Detectives said that the young woman was not believed to be seriously hurt and bore no signs of injury. They did not say how soon the baby was expected or who the father was.

"We're not sure Christian was totally sober, but it doesn't appear to be some sort of drink fest," said Lt. Ron Hall, commander of the Los Angeles Police Department's West Los Angeles Division. "There were definitely no drugs."

The exclusive, 66-year-old actor, his wife, Tarita Teriipia and Cheyenne Brando were all in the home at the time of the slaying and all heard the fatal shot, but none actually witnessed the shooting, according to Hall.

He said that no other people were

in the home at the time. Marlon Brando used the 911 emergency number to phone police about five minutes after the shooting, Hall said.

Hall said that police recovered the weapon, a .45-caliber semi-automatic pistol, along with a shotgun, a .44-caliber carbine and two unregistered fully automatic firearms — an Uzi sub-machinegun and an M-14 rifle.

"Christian has indicated that he was a gun enthusiast," Hall said, "but he has not given any other reason for why he had the weapons." Hall said Christian Brando and the other members of the family all waited in the home until police arrived, "and everyone, including Christian, was cooperative."

Brando's 12-room house is part of a sprawling, three-home complex on a 2-acre site atop the Santa Monica Mountains.

The other two houses on the property belong to actor Jack Nicholson, according to property tax records.

A tall, wrought-iron fence surrounds the secluded, heavily wooded complex. None of the houses is visible from the street, the gate giving access to the single driveway leading to the three homes is topped with a concertina spiral of barbed razor wire.

The complex earned notoriety in 1977 when director Roman Polanski was arrested and charged with having unlawful sexual intercourse at one of the Nicholson homes with

13-year-old girl. Nicholson was away on vacation at the time.

Polanski pleaded guilty to the charge, but fled the country to avoid sentencing in 1978. He has never returned.

Hall said his detectives learned

during interviews with the Brando family at their home early Thursday that Dorliet had maintained "a romantic relationship" with Cheyenne Brando "for some time" and had been staying in the Brando home since arriving here from Tahiti about 10 days ago.

Senator seeks Pentagon probe of Naval Academy incident

WASHINGTON (AP) — An Alabama senator called Thursday for a Pentagon investigation into the resignation of a female U.S. Naval Academy midshipman who was handcuffed to a men's room urinal and taunted by male classmates.

Sen. Richard Shelby, D-Ala., a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee, wrote Defense Secretary Dick Cheney and Navy Secretary Lawrence Garrett III asking them to personally investigate the circumstances surrounding Gwen Marie Dreyer's resignation.

"Those responsible for the sexual harassment were only given demerits and a loss of leave time, while the victim has felt it necessary to resign from the Navy," Shelby wrote.

"I have also been led to believe that the victim was intimidated by classmates who warned her not to testify at a disciplinary hearing," he said.

Shelby said he found the incident "reprehensible" and he urged the Pentagon officials to "make all efforts to determine whether there is an institutional bias against women in our military academies."

"I hope that this is just an isolated incident, that it is not reflective of a deep seated bias against women in our military," he said.

Dreyer, of Encinitas, Calif., resigned from the Naval Academy last month after she became dissatisfied with the investigation of the Dec. 8 incident at the once all-male academy in Annapolis, Md.

Midshipmen 2nd Class John Hindinger and Tom Rosson were punished with demerits and loss of leave time as a result of the incident.

Six other midshipmen received written warnings for lesser roles in the incident.

Noriega co-defendant given 30 months

MIAMI (AP) — The first of Manuel Noriega's co-defendants to be punished in the drug smuggling case was sentenced Thursday to 30 months in prison, but may only have to serve 15 months.

Panamanian pilot Eduardo Pardo has cooperated with the U.S. attorney's office in its investigation of the deposed Panamanian leader, and will continue to do so, his attorney told U.S. District Judge William Hoeweiler.

Pardo, 44, pleaded guilty in February to one count of illegal travel for flying \$800,000 in cocaine

profits from Florida to Panama in 1983.

Pardo had faced a maximum five-year federal prison sentence and a \$10,000 fine.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Michael Sullivan recommended leniency for Pardo. He said the defendant had turned over evidence that helped investigators track the movements of other co-defendants, including his flight log.

"We intend to talk to him more," Sullivan said.

Tears ran down Pardo's face as his attorney, William Meadows,

pleaded for probation. Pardo declined an opportunity to speak on his own behalf.

He pleaded guilty "because he knew that he did something wrong," Meadows said. "He was deeply remorseful for it, and he said he has not done anything similar before or since."

Meadows noted that Pardo had no previous criminal record and surrendered voluntarily to U.S. authorities in Panama City following the Dec. 20 invasion of Panama.

Under sentencing guidelines, Pardo would be freed in 20 months.

Burned Apollo capsule may go to Smithsonian

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The charred Apollo capsule in which three astronauts died 23 years ago will be given to the Smithsonian Institution if museum officials want the spacecraft and agree not to display it, NASA said Thursday.

"We're concerned it not turn into a sideshow of any kind," said John Lawrence, chief of congressional affairs for NASA's Office of Space Flight. "Of course, the Smithsonian doesn't operate like that."

Remnants of the 1967 Apollo fire — America's first space tragedy — were to have been buried without fanfare this month in an abandoned missile silo at Cape Canaveral Air Force Station. The more than 17,600 pounds of material would have been placed on top of debris from the nation's only other space disaster,

the 1986 Challenger explosion.

The Apollo capsule and investigative material had been stored at NASA's Langley Research Center in Hampton, Va., for 23 years; the space agency wanted to find a final resting place for it. Some of the items were moved late this

month to Kennedy Space Center awaiting burial.

Smithsonian officials indicated this month they were interested in some of the pieces after turning down offers from NASA late last year and in 1985. Lawrence said,



No pact; base talks near end

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — U.S. and Philippine negotiators on Thursday ended a fourth day of talks on the future of American bases in the Philippines without reporting any breakthroughs.

The two sides disagree on whether the United States failed to make full aid payments, and on when the facilities would actually have to close if the two sides cannot reach a lease agreement.

After this round of talks, which is to end Friday, the two sides could either begin formal negotiations on a new pact or start working on a schedule for closing the bases. Their lease expires in September 1991.

The installations include Clark Air Base, the Subic Bay naval base and four smaller facilities.

The two sides met into the evening Thursday to try to resolve a Philippine claim that the United States owes \$22 million in back payments for use of the bases.

"We are trying to hammer out differences," said Philippine spokesman Rafael Alunan. "I believe that they are inching toward some sort of agreement" on the payment issue.

In 1988, the Reagan administration agreed to provide \$962 million over two years in return for use of the bases through 1991. Congress subsequently cut the Bush administration's aid request by \$96 million.

U.S. officials insist they promised only "best efforts" to meet the target and that the aid cut was not a breach of faith.

"We have not conceded that there is a shortfall," said the spokesman for the U.S. delegation, Stanley Schmeiger. "We have lived up to our commitment, and we have made our best effort."

President Corason Aquino suggested Thursday the United States could pay off the "debt" by providing medical equipment and other supplies to the Philippines.

U.S. sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the United States was willing to provide additional equipment to the Philippines, but that it would not be designated as payment of any debt.

A classified memorandum prepared in February by the Philippines' Department of Foreign Affairs suggested the government publicly demand full U.S. funding for the bases as well as other aid programs, while quietly agreeing to accept a lower aid figure.

The memo, a copy of which was obtained by The Associated Press, also said the United States was reluctant to increase aid to the Philippines because of perceived weak leadership and mismanagement by the Aquino government.


Mrs. Aquino said Thursday it was too early to say whether the two sides had reached an impasse.

However, Philippine senators, who must ratify any new bases agreement, expressed renewed doubts any pact could win approval.

Sen. John Osmeña, the leading bases advocate in the Senate, told reporters Thursday "The ball is in the U.S. court. If they want to stay, they have to pay."

Senate President Jovito Salonga said rather than trying to come to terms with the United States, the Philippines "should now prepare for the next phase and try to effectuate a smooth turnover of the military bases."

The Philippine government says the lease on the installations expires in September 1991.

More French Jews heading to Israel

PARIS (AP) — The number of French Jews seeking to emigrate to Israel jumped dramatically after vandals desecrated a Jewish cemetery last week and mutilated a recently buried corpse, the Jewish Agency said Thursday.

Two thousand requests have been received since the desecration was discovered in the southern town of Carpentras on May 10, agency official Claude Laloam said. Between Jan. 1 and May 9, there were 1,800 requests.

The agency, which has offices in many countries, helps make arrangements for Jews seeking to settle in Israel.

Vandals broke 34 tombstones at Carpentras and dug up the body of an 81-year-old man buried two weeks earlier and impaled his body on an umbrella pole.

Since the desecration, there have been daily incidents of racial and political vandalism.

In the latest incident, about 100 graves at a Roman Catholic cemetery outside the Atlantic Coast city of Nantes were damaged or painted with graffiti. One stegan

said "Carpentras will be avenged" and another said "Death to Le Pen," referring to far-right leader Jean-Marie Le Pen, who has been widely accused of promoting racial and religious animosities.

In the Paris suburb of Clichy-sous-Bois, police said 12 people — most with far-right connections — had been detained in connection with the painting of swastikas on 32 graves at a Jewish cemetery late Sunday or early Monday.

In Canada, meanwhile, desecration of a Jewish cemetery in Ste-Foy, outside Quebec City, was discovered Thursday.

Vandals painted swastikas and white power slogans at the cemetery, police said.

"It's like somebody ... cuts you wide open and takes out your guts," said Regina Rosenhek, of the local Jewish Community. She said her husband discovered the vandalism.

Laloam said the possibility of moving to Israel "exists in the minds of all Jews, at all times. It crystallizes when there is an emotional shock as in the case with Carpentras."

Israel holds up release of prisoners

JERUSALEM (AP) — An Israeli official said Thursday that a Shiite militia must prove that it is holding the bodies of two Israeli soldiers before Jerusalem considers trading the bodies for Shiite-Moslem prisoners.

The defense official was reacting to a report that the mainstream Shiite Amal militia sought such an exchange.

The official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the report was published in the Beirut daily Al Anwar on May 12.

He said the paper reported Amal would return the bodies of two soldiers in return for Shiite prisoners held by an Israeli proxy militia in south Lebanon.

Such an exchange could encourage more releases of 16 Western hostages, including six Americans held in Lebanon by pro-Iranian radicals.

After two U.S. hostages were freed last month, Iran and allied groups in Lebanon demanded a goodwill gesture, such as the release of prisoners held by the Israeli-backed South Lebanon Army, which has more than 300 prisoners.

But the Israeli official, who was authorized to speak about the newspaper report, questioned whether Amal actually held bodies of Israelis. Three Israeli servicemen, two of whom may have been wounded, were captured in 1986 in Lebanon and are believed held by a faction tied to the pro-Iranian Hezbollah militia, which also has been linked to groups holding Western hostages. Four other soldiers were reported missing in Lebanon. They were believed captured by Palestinian guerrillas.

Uncertainty precedes Romanian elections

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — The main question in Romania's first free elections in 53 years is not who will win but what the victors will do to unite their land.

Will they embrace democracy and capitalism? Or will they, as opponents allege, find ways to block progress by maintaining the corrupt and often sinister "nomenklatura" that ruled for decades?

The National Salvation Front and its leader, Ion Iliescu, are expected to emerge victorious from Sunday's elections. Polls of uncertain accuracy show Iliescu winning up to 70 percent of the vote for president and the Front an absolute majority in parliament.

The Front, a loose coalition of intellectuals and former Communists, assumed power in the heady December revolution on that toppled dictator Nicolae Ceausescu. It has dominated the interim government and makeshift parliament.

Iliescu is a charismatic, 60-year-old former minister who was demoted in the Communist hierarchy after falling out with Ceausescu in 1971.

He quickly won popularity and was named interim president after the revolution.

His standing and the Front's popular identity as the Communist revolution that at least nominally ousted the Communists lend them a certain legitimacy, lacked by reformed Communist parties losing elections elsewhere in Eastern Europe.

Unlike Poland, Hungary or Czechoslovakia, Romania had no organized dissent under communism.

The main challenge to the Front has come from two reconstituted pre-World War II parties: the National Peasants Party and the National Liberal Party. They claim a total of 1.4 million members.

Eighty-two parties are vying for the votes of 16.8 million registered voters. But only six — the Front, the Peasants Party, the Liberals, the Ecological Party, the Democratic Agrarian Party and the Social Democrats — are actually expected to win any of the 306 seats up for grabs in the bicameral Parliament.

Because all parties back democracy and a free market to rescue Romania's backward economy, the election campaign centered around one issue: pro- or anti-Front.

Gorbachev, Lithuanian premier meet

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev met with the Lithuanian prime minister on Thursday in a major breakthrough in the Baltic secession struggle, but he demanded the breakaway republic make further concessions.

Lithuanian Prime Minister Kazimieras Prunskiene said they met for one hour and 40 minutes in the Kremlin, and that Gorbachev told her "the fact that we are meeting means we have moved from our initial positions. And this is a big step forward."

She told reporters the discussion was "difficult" at first, but improved as it went along, though complete agreement was not reached.

Gorbachev had refused to meet with the secessionist leaders of the three Baltic republics and earlier in the day accused them of adventurism.

The Kremlin meeting, set by Gorbachev in a telephone call to Mrs. Prunskiene shortly after she arrived at Lithuania's mission in Moscow, broke the deadlock between Moscow and Lithuania over Lithuania's declaration of independence on March 11.

Soviet authorities forcibly annexed Lithuania and its sister republics of Estonia and Latvia in 1940, and all three have declared moves toward independence this year.

U.S. Secretary of State James A. Baker III, who had said that the Baltic impasse was casting a shadow over the May 30-June 3 superpower summit in Washington, told reporters he would meet with Mrs. Prunskiene on Friday. President Bush received her at the White House earlier this month.

Gorbachev first demanded that Lithuania rescind its declaration, but on Thursday merely called for a suspension.

The Lithuanian parliament has balked at revoking the declaration based on Wednesday's offer to suspend post-independence laws if the Kremlin will open talks on independence.

A compromise appeared to be emerging along the lines of a formula proposed last month by President Francois Mitterrand of France and Chancellor Helmut Kohl of West Germany.

In addition to suspending certain laws, Lithuanian concessions add a transition period before full independence and make concrete proposals on military cooperation, economic plans and other topics.

Mrs. Prunskiene said Lithuanian President Vytautas Landsbergis would call the Supreme Council parliament into session on Saturday to formalize the offer. She said if Moscow finds parliament's action acceptable, the two sides could select negotiating teams.

"This does not mean we are returning to the situation of March 10," she told reporters, underlining Lithuania's determination to strive for independence.

At the meeting, Gorbachev and Prime Minister Nikolai Ryzhkov told Mrs. Prunskiene the Lithuanian concessions did not meet their demand to suspend the Lithuanian declaration of independence, the official Tass news agency reported.

"K. Prunskiene's attention was drawn to the indispensable necessity that the Lithuanian Supreme Soviet cancel — or at a minimum, suspend — this act and all the legislative measures following it that contradict the Soviet constitution," Tass reported.

The leaders told Mrs. Prunskiene that concession was the only way to launch negotiations, the report said.

But Tass said the leaders noted that the Lithuanian offer showed "certain steps had been made."

E. German rail strikers want higher pay

EAST BERLIN (AP) — Rail workers nationwide stopped selling tickets and shutting passengers Thursday to demand better wages and job protection in a united Germany, where socialist guarantees of jobs for all will not exist.

The 30-minute strikes were the latest in a series of worker demonstrations in recent weeks fueled by frustration over the possible effects on jobs and prices of unification with West Germany.

They came on the eve of the signing of a treaty by German leaders that will merge the countries' economies July 2, a major step to full unification.

In Washington, President Bush met Thursday with West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl and voiced strong support for a united Germany with "full control over all its territory."

The East German government news service, ADN, said workers paralyzed main rail routes nationwide, stopping work at switching yards, ticket counters and on trains.

The so-called "warning strikes" were staged to protest what workers said was the failure of the government railroad company to meet demands for higher wages and job protection.

Train traffic, a principal form of daily transportation for many East Germans, was interrupted in the cities of Magdeburg, Rostock, Gera, Schwerin and others, ADN said.

Last week, farmers, teachers and textile workers held nationwide strikes to protest unemployment expected as East Germany moves to a free market.

Workers are seeking protection from joblessness and from the

better-made Western imports already flooding the country.

Many outmoded East German businesses are expected to fail in the first two years of economic unification.

East Germans also are demanding higher wages to cope with the price increases expected when costs are set by the free market.

The strikes were held during the weekly session of Parliament, which debated the draft of a new constitution that will take old Socialist laws off the books, and establish East Germany legally as a democracy.

It also would eliminate the old Communist guarantee of full unemployment.

Liberal lawmakers pressed for some employment guarantees in the new democratic charter.

Wolfgang Ullmann, a lawmaker from a left-leaning opposition coalition, called it a "scandalous copy" for "would-be West German citizens."

He called for a new constitution that guarantees workers' rights and warned of "mass unemployment" and a "meritless economic war."

Conservatives say the invention of a free market and an increase in Western investment will eventually raise living standards and provide jobs.

The economic treaty is to be signed Friday by Prime Minister Lothar de Maiziere and Kohl.

The parliaments of the two nations likely will consider it in June.

A full political merger is not expected until next year.

The centerpiece of the economic treaty is the circulation of West German marks as the official currency of East Germany.

Nothing left to chance when Japan's emperor travels

NAGASAKI, Japan (AP) — When the emperor of Japan leaves his palace in Tokyo, nothing is left to chance.

Determined to eliminate the element of surprise, officials in this scenic coastal city on the southern island of Kyushu have slaved for months over preparations for the arrival Friday of Emperor Akihito and Empress Michiko.

Officials are particularly nervous because the emperor is to meet Mayor Hiroshi Motoshima, who was shot in the back by a rightist in

January. The attacker was angry at Motoshima for saying the late Emperor Hirohito, Akihito's father, bore some responsibility for World War II.

About 4,000 police officers were being mobilized to ensure the monarch's safety.

Highlighting the emperor's four-day stay will be a visit to an atomic bomb memorial at Peace Park and the 41st annual Arbor-Day Festival on Sunday.

The emperor, who is to plant a tree and give a short address, is scheduled to spend less than an hour at the festival, but officials reportedly are spending \$50,000 to decorate a nearby pig farm.

They also are planning to hang a curtain to keep the farm out of the royal couple's sight, and have told militia hoping to cover the event by helicopter not to create any ruckus that might disturb the animals.

"Sure, if the wind is right it could smell pretty bad at the festival," said Yoichi Tanaka, head of general affairs for the Nagasaki Prefectural Trade Union. "But it's a pig farm,



Regional airport idea sputtering

TWIN FALLS - Efforts to resurrect a regional airport concept may be taking a nose dive, say some local town leaders, though others say it could still pull clear. "The early analysis is that a new regional airport may never be a reality," said Kent Just, executive vice president of the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce. "Never is a long time," countered City Councilman Doug Vollmer. The idea's future could hinge on the Blaine County Airport Board's final decision on what to do about the county's growing airport needs. Although the board has not discussed a regional airport, it is studying Blaine County's growing air traffic, including regular jet service, and the limited expansion capacity of the current facility - Friedman Memorial. One of three suggested new Blaine County sites is a mere 50 miles north of Twin Falls, which resurrected talk of a regional airport - an idea that has suffered humiliating demises some 10 and 20 years ago. But a consultant ranked that site dead last of the three possibilities studied, according to a report released Thursday.

Vollmer said he hopes that if Blaine County decides to build a new airport and the site is the one closest to Twin Falls that consolidation will be discussed. "I just don't want to see two jet ports so close together," Vollmer said. "I would like to hear them say they are definitely not going to do it." Blaine County's airport officials could make a decision mid-summer, but could take until mid-fall to decide. Just said a citizen task force has been studying the idea. "But a quick and dirty look at it says we should probably be concentrating our efforts on how to improve the airport we

have now," he said. First on the list of improvements for the airport south of Twin Falls would be remodeling the terminal. Just said. Next would be improving the road to the airport. Just said talk is that Blaine County officials will probably discover that expanding Friedman is much more feasible than building one from scratch. "But they've surprised us in the past," Vollmer warned. Money is not the only problem that Blaine and Twin Falls counties would face in joining forces to build a new regional airport. Study: Best Blaine site near Timmerman Hill

HAILEY - If the Wood River Valley builds a new airport, it should be about 12 miles south of Hailey at the base of Timmerman Hill, according to a study commissioned by the Blaine County airport board. The northeast corner of the junction of U.S. Highway 20 and state Highway 75 is the best location, if airport officials decide to build a new airport for Blaine County. The cost was roughly estimated at nearly \$100 million.

Craig Campbell, airport consultant with Coffman Associates' Anchorage, Alaska, office, presented a 20-page report to the public Thursday giving detailed evaluations of three potential sites for a new airport. From a field of seven possible sites, a local planning advisory committee narrowed the field down to three this past February. Campbell's report evaluated each of the three sites based on 20 aviation and environmental factors, and came up with the most preferable location at the Timmerman junction, 24 miles south of Ketchum. A second location is west on the Moonstone Ranch on U.S. Highway 20 near the boundaries of Blaine and Camas counties, about 37 miles from Ketchum. The third site is 34 miles south of Ketchum along Idaho Highway 75 on lava beds owned by the Bureau of Land Management.

The Federal Aviation Administration is funding the relocation study. The Blaine County Airport Board is considering a long-term goal of building a second airport in Blaine County to handle large commercial air traffic and jets, keeping Friedman Memorial Airport in Hailey open for light aircraft only. The Timmerman Hill site will draw some concern over its effect on the "quality of life" but this is the "best of all potential sites" and will accomplish the goal of many community members, according to the report. A number of local residents have told the airport board flights over Hailey and Bellevue create noise and safety hazards. The report said it "would not be professionally objective" to select either of the

two other sites just because they would not affect anyone. The Timmerman junction location ranked high in location and access, compliance with federal standards and airport criteria, site development costs and solid waste and sewage impacts. It ranked low in land costs, impact on agricultural lands, disruption with overflights of the Silver Creek Preserve and noise to surrounding landowners; impact on water resources in the area and the potential for additional development near the site. Lieutenant governor race matches Forrey, Otter

TWIN FALLS - Neither C.L. "Butch" Otter nor Bob Forrey wants to be governor right now, but both seek to be a provincial heartbeat away from the office.

Otter, the one-term incumbent lieutenant governor, said he chose not to run for the governor's office because his responsibilities as corporate vice president of Simplot International are still too encumbering. Traditionally, Idaho lieutenant governors have held outside jobs. But he didn't rule out a future bid for the top office.

And Forrey said he opted out of the governor's race because the office would require too much time. "I just wasn't ready to devote my whole life to just that," he said. Forrey, a former two-term state representative from Nampa, said he was drafted into the race by a group of Moscow residents who originally wanted him to run for governor. The group is affiliated with a private church school, but he has no formal name, Forrey said. They wanted to elect someone to promote private schools. "They felt it would be good to have a statewide voice," he said. As lieutenant governor, Forrey would


promote a school voucher system, he said. His favorite plan would remove \$1,000 per student from local school districts to be given to parents as a voucher. Parents could use the voucher at either public or private schools. "The result would be smaller teacher-to-student ratios in public school class rooms, Forrey said, perhaps as low as 1-to-12. "A teacher then can really begin to do some things." Otter said he would continue to promote Idaho industries if re-elected. In the last four years, he has been "pretty much the state's official host" for trade delegations visiting Idaho, he said. He also said he led a

delegation of legislators to Taiwan increase trade between Idaho and the Far East. Lieutenant governors fill in whenever the governor is out of town. The office holder also serves as president of the Senate and breaks tie votes for that body. If House Bill 625, the anti-abortion measure passed by the Legislature and vetoed by Gov. Cecil Andrus, had faced a tie in the Senate, Otter said he would have voted against it. Forrey said he would have voted for it, if called on the break a tie.

7 Republicans run for 3 offices in Jerome County campaigns

JEROME - Voters have a variety of candidates to choose from in the county assessor, clerk and treasurer races, but are out of luck if anyone is looking to vote for a Democrat.

All seven candidates running for the three spots are Republicans, except for Margaret Steinmetz, who is running as an Independent for the assessor's spot.

In the county clerk race, incumbent Cheryl Watts and Lynn Wiser are seeking the seat. The position currently is responsible for supervising 10 county employees, and is the 5th District Court clerk, ex officio auditor and recorder, County Commission clerk, chief election officer and budget officer.

Watts said she intends to maintain professionalism and run the office as economically and efficiently as possible.

Watts, a life-long Jerome resident, has been the county clerk for the past eight years and was a county employee, including deputy clerk, the previous 10. She is on a team for computerizing court functions throughout the state.

She said county residents should audit budget requests of various departments, such as roads and schools, to learn more about the budget needs.

She has received the Distinguished Service Award from the Judges of the 5th District.

His opponent, Wiser, said he feels the experience he has gained as a businessman will enable him to increase the efficiency of the clerk's office.

"Naturally I'm opposed to higher taxes, and I intend to be as frugal and accountable as possible," Wiser said.

Wiser, the manager of Transmission City in Twin Falls, has a bachelor of arts degree in business and administration from Utah State University and 10 years experience with Agri-Line Irrigation in Twin Falls.

Wiser said his business experience will enable him to help align county business with the needs of the people of the area.

In the assessor's race, Marlin Block, Greg Heinrich, Margaret Steinmetz and incumbent John Wurst are securing off.

Block, chief deputy county assessor, said as assessor would use computers for some office business to increase efficiency and would begin some type of educational program for the public on property taxes and appraisals.

Block, who started working in the assessor's office after 23 years as a farmer, said he would try to increase employee wages as an incentive to keeping good employees in the office. "All the training and retraining we have to do costs a lot of money," he said.

Block is a member of the Jerome Optimist Club and Jerome Elks. He has been a rural fire board commissioner for 19 years and was a member of the Farm Bureau Board for several years.

He is a life-time county resident. Heinrich, a contract appraiser for the Twin Falls County Assessor's office and former employee of the Jerome County office, said his honesty, personal experience and his prime qualifications, he said.

Heinrich said he would fairly and honestly appraise property.

He said he would strive to improve communications among the different Jerome County departments, which he said is important. He also said he intends to provide "good advice" to property owners

Heinrich was a staff appraiser for the Jerome assessor's office from January to August in 1985.

She is a native of the east end of the county, graduating from Eden High School and Albion Normal School. She has received real state certification and is certified in appraisals, financing and real estate law. She worked as a real estate broker in Washington.

Wurst is seeking his third term. He said he expects to continue reappraising county property to update the records. The work will require a more accurate tax base, which has grown in recent years with the boom in dairy industries, he said.

The reappraisals are important because they result in a fairer tax base among all property owners, he said.

Wurst became Jerome County assessor in 1987 after working in the assessor offices of Blaine and Ada counties. He chairman of the Idaho Assessors Motor Vehicle Committee.

County Treasurer Mary Childers is running unopposed for a second term.

Aspiring commissioners talk about taxation, their own qualifications

JEROME - County commissioner candidates in Tuesday's election are taking a look at taxes and their own qualifications as important considerations for voters.

The races pit Jack Bowen against incumbent Veronica Lierman for the District 1 seat and incumbent George Andrus against Jeanne Vandiver for other ways to pay the clean-up bill.

All are Republicans.

Bowen said he wants to be a watchdog. "I'm going to watch and be sure we save money by tightening our belts and being more conservative," Bowen said. "I'm opposed to more taxes, and I don't think it's going to be necessary to increase taxes."

Bowen, a Filer native, was a Union Pacific Railroad employee for 41 years in Pocatello, Nampa, Portland and Omaha, Neb. The Bowen's have lived in Jerome for the last three years. He is a member of the Elks, Shriners, Masons and the Twin Falls Golf Club.

Lierman, a three-year veteran commissioner, said she wants another term to continue with on-going county projects.

She said she expects property taxes to remain stable. The unexpected high costs to clean up chemical wastes at the Weed Department lot, however, could mean higher taxes, but Lierman said she would first look for other ways to pay the clean-up bill.

As commissioner, she said, she introduced the industrial revenue bond concept that has helped bring businesses such as Spears Manufacturing Co. to Jerome. She has also worked to upgrade the courthouse, computer system, the ambulance service, the landfill, pollution control and juvenile detention.

In the District 2 race, three-year commissioner Andrus said he wants to continue bringing new industry to the Jerome area. He said he opposes tax increases but added the county doesn't know yet how the Weed Department clean-up costs will affect the local tax bills.

Andrus, a farmer most of his life and owner of a Trucking business, said, "I have dealt with business people and families for many years and I know what they need and expect of the county commissioners."

Vandiver, whose experience includes six years on the City Council, said increased employment opportunities and growth are her top concerns.

Vandiver didn't say that taxes are going up, but they're definitely not going down, she said, with the county facing landfill problems, the Weed Department clean-up and court costs. The state, however, will help with some costs, she said.

Vandiver has been on the Chamber of Commerce board of directors and the legislative council for the Association of Idaho cities. She is a two-term term as president of the Jerome Civic Club and has been president of the Northside Board of Realtors.

Gary A. Inson, of improper organizing and operating Professional Leasing.

The lawyers for Walker and Atkinson argued that Newcomb knew the plan was aggressive and risky, in part because he had a sophisticated understanding of taxes. Newcomb did his own tax planning meticulously on a home computer.

"I don't know how any plan that could let him make hundreds of thousands of dollars a year and not pay taxes could be viewed as anything other than aggressive," Atkinson's attorney Mark Geston said.

In 1983, Newcomb earned \$217,000. But through the Professional Leasing financial scheme, he claimed a \$51,000 income and paid no taxes.

During the approximately three years Newcomb earned more than \$500,000 but paid only \$40,000 in taxes, Geston said.

The IRS declared the plan illegal in 1986, a decision the U.S. Tax Court and the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals upheld.

Newcomb eventually settled with the IRS for \$297,000. Koonitz asked the jury for at least \$207,000 in actual damages, and an extra, unspecified amount for "punitive damages" - designed to punish as well as serve as a deterrent to other lawyers.

Walker should be assessed punitive damages in part because of his questionable handling of a trust account containing money belonging to Koonitz, said the IRS.

Koonitz said. In 1988, when Walker moved his practice to Boise, he destroyed records pertaining to the account.

Bank records during that period of time show a zero balance in that account. Then, in March, he returned money from that account to clients.

But Walker's attorney, Scott Wigle of Boise, said Newcomb would have given all his money that was in Professional Leasing. By the time the conflict over the accounts occurred, Atkinson had set up his own law practice.

Both argue that Newcomb was too sophisticated not to know the plan was risky.

"Dr. Newcomb knows money," Geston said.

Geston and the surgeon at Twin Falls Clinic and Hospital isn't poor, he said.

"What we have is a very comfortable man making a business judgment and it didn't come through," Geston said.

In the early 1980s, physicians at the clinic were dissatisfied with their retirement plans, testimony at the trial showed. They decided to terminate their current plans, and asked Walker and Inson for advice.

But they discovered that changes in the law would require them to pump money into retirement plans for the clinic's staff. They terminated the old plans and, for 2½ years, the staff at the clinic didn't have a retirement plan.

Newcomb received about \$60,000 from the termination.

And during that period, the clinic avoided about \$145,000 annually that would have been paid into retirement plans for the staff, Geston said.

Meanwhile, the physicians were signed up with Professional Leasing and Newcomb put about \$200,000 into a tax-deferred retirement plan.

"These were very good years," for the clinic's physicians, Geston said.

The clinic returned in 1985 to what its administrator, Marlin Jackson, said was its long-standing policy: providing a retirement plan for its employees.

Newcomb's lawsuit was the first of several against Walker and Atkinson to go to trial.

Water quality not criterion for Snake

TWIN FALLS - Though water quality may be one of the most important issues in the Snake River, it is not a criterion for protecting the river from further development.

"If there is any single issue in this reach of the river it's water quality," said Frank Sherman of the state Department of Water Resources.

Sherman presented the department's proposal Thursday for granting permanent protection to portions of an 82-mile stretch of the Snake River from a point about 6½ miles below Milner Dam to King Hill.

But the plan did consider impacts on the river from developments.

More than 120 commercial trout hatcheries along that section of the river may legally dump up to 117,500 pounds of suspended solids and 37,600 cubic feet of settled solids. Though discharges are within legal limits, "more attention needs to

be paid to cumulative impacts and the assimilation capacity of the river," the plan says.

A 1988 water quality report called the "overall water quality" in the Snake River "fair" at measuring points at Burley and King Hill.

"Fair isn't good enough," Sherman said. But there is little the department or the Water Resources Board can do about it.

The July 1, 1988 legislation mandating a state water planning effort was specific about what the board could do in granting permanent protection to any portion of the middle Snake River.

In order to qualify as an Idaho Protected River, any particular stretch must possess outstanding fish and wildlife, recreation, geologic or aesthetic qualities.

"Water quality is not a criterion," Sherman said.

The draft plan grants protected status to all but a 2.4-mile stretch from Shoshone Falls to the backwa-

ters of the Upper Salmon Falls Dam. The river would remain open to development in that segment.

The protected status, however, would not affect existing water rights or uses in the river. Five near-term hydroelectric projects operated by Idaho Power Co., for instance, are within the protected segments.

The segment of the river from above Twin Falls downstream to Shoshone Falls is considered a recreation stream because of its recreational opportunities as well as a rare cutthroat trout fishery.

From Upper Salmon Falls Dam to King Hill, segments of the river also are considered recreational. Those stretches include fishing and whitewater boating.

The river below the Bliss Dam contains one of Idaho's major self-sustaining populations of white sturgeon.

Sherman said he expects most of the Upper Salmon Falls Dam. **See RIVER on Page B4**

59 cents for every \$1,000 of property value in Cassia County and 81 cents in Minidoka County. The difference is made up in the county's tax base, said Larry Duff, head of a local committee promoting the joint idea.

"If you have a \$50,000 home, it comes to \$22.22 in Minidoka and \$16.28 in Cassia," he said.

The bond issue would be paid off in 15 years—about five years under current life of the proposal buildings.

The counties need the jails due to the inadequacy of the current ones, officials say.

The American Civil Liberties Union has sued Cassia County, contending jail doesn't meet standards. And the Minidoka County jail can't legally hold juveniles so they're sent to the facility near

Jerome.

The adult jail would be built on county property about a block away on the site of the old Burley junior high. It would be similar to Twin Falls' new jail and be able to house 100 prisoners immediately, with the capability of adding another 60 prisoners without additional building costs.

The new jail would save in staffing costs, Duff said. "The facility we are looking at could handle 160 prisoners with only 17 people on staff," he said. "Over the life of the jail, 70 percent of the cost of the operation is in the labor to run the facility."

If the bond doesn't pass, officials say they'll have to build separate facilities because of the current jails' conditions.

The polls was by no means scientific, but most of the more than 15 people asked on the streets of Burley, Rupert and Paul said they plan to vote to approve the bond issue.

Over 100 residents, who declined to give his name, said the counties shouldn't spend money on the project, although he said he would be out of town Tuesday and didn't plan to vote.

Rupert resident Carolyn Williams said she'll vote yes and likes the idea that the two counties will share the jail.

But Stromire predicts the bond issue will be defeated because of a long-standing competition between the two counties. "I think it is ridiculous for two counties that are so close together to be so far apart," she said.

The Federal Aviation Administration could present a sturdy roadblock as well.

Federal team looking into HIV-virus related bias issues

BOISE (AP) — A team from the U.S. Office for Civil Rights is in Idaho this week to look into separate discrimination issues involving HIV-infected people and Hispanics who do not speak English.

"We're trying to raise some consciousness just by being here," Carmen Palomera Rockwell, regional manager for the U.S. Office For Civil Rights, said Wednesday.

"I don't think the complaints are any different than they are anywhere else," said Julia Hale, AIDS project coordinator for the office. "It's just a matter of people finding out they have a right to be treated different than they are being treated."

With recent publicity surrounding the case of Boisean Kerry Stephen Thomas, facing charges of willfully exposing other people to the HIV virus, confidentiality has been a big topic during the week-long visit, the federal officials said.

"We started hearing about it on this trip," Rockwell said. "We want to do a lot of education with respect to confidentiality."

While Rockwell said a discrimination issue might be involved in the Thomas case, the civil-rights office cannot investigate unless a complaint is filed.

The regional office, based in Seattle, serves Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Alaska. It investigates complaints of discrimination involving any agency or

individual receiving federal funds, including the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare, hospitals and private physicians.

A report on the Idaho visit is expected in one month.

The office, a division of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, receives few complaints from Idaho, but investigators believe that is due in part to the office's low profile in Idaho.

When the office began an AIDS-rights blitz about four years ago, Idaho mostly received mailings, not in-person visits.

John Hummel, board president of the Idaho-AIDS Foundation, knew little about the agency until this week. He said the number of complaints from Idaho may increase.

"I think the problem is that people who have been discriminated against don't know there is anything that can be done about it," he said.

Idahoans who carry the human immunodeficiency virus, which causes AIDS, complain about job and housing discrimination, Hummel said. In addition, some have complained that private physicians, who fall under federal jurisdiction if they accept Medicaid or Medicare funds, have refused to treat them, in violation of federal law.

Ex-BSU athlete to face charges of AIDS exposure

BOISE (AP) — An Ada County grand jury has handed down a seven-count indictment charging a Boise man of deliberately exposing sex partners to the deadly AIDS virus.

Kerry Stephen Thomas, a former college basketball player who denies any wrongdoing, was also indicted Wednesday on two counts of statutory rape involving one of the alleged AIDS-exposure victims, now 18.

Thomas is scheduled to be arraigned on the indictment Friday in 4th District Court. He is being held in an Ada County Jail isolation cell in lieu of \$1 million bond.

Authorities said additional felony exposure charges are being considered.

"The list of victims is still growing," said Ada County Deputy Prosecutor Jay Rosenthal. "There are other cases still under investigation."

Deputy Public Defender Gus Cahill, who represents Thomas, could not be reached for comment Wednesday.



ICA toughens position on Saylor Creek Range

THREE CREEK - The Idaho Cattle Association has stiffened its stance on a proposed expansion of the Saylor Creek Bombing Range.

The association said Thursday it would oppose outright any expansion of the Saylor Creek range if air space changes and supersonic flight down to 5,000 feet are adopted as proposed in an environmental impact statement.

"Lowering the air space floor and allowing supersonic flight as low as 5,000 feet are unacceptable," association president Bert Brackett wrote in a letter to Air Force Deputy Assistant Secretary Gary Vest.

Brackett, a Three Creek-rancher, said the association has been willing to support an expansion plan that would accommodate ranchers concerns about supersonic flight and other issues.

But if the Air Force adopts the proposed air space and supersonic flight level, "it will be apparent the Air Force is not going to listen to our concerns," Brackett wrote.

The Air Force is engaged in a two-part environmental impact process - Tier One looks at the impact

of moving 94 F-4 fighter jets to Mountain Home Air Force Base in a congressionally mandated consolidation of military facilities.

It also proposes to increase special-use air space over southwestern Idaho and lower the air space floor to 100 feet and to allow supersonic flight as low as 5,000 feet.

It also proposes expanding the Saylor Creek Range, but the size and scope of any expansion would be covered in the second part or Tier Two.

A public comment period on Tier One closed May 15, and the Air Force expect to have a final version of the document completed by June. It will be followed shortly by a Record of Decision, which is the Secretary of the Air Force's decision based on information gathered in the impact statement.

If (the proposed) actions are included in the Tier One record of decision, then the Idaho Cattle Association will thereafter be in total opposition to any expansion, and we will direct all of our efforts toward no expansion," Brackett wrote.

Brackett's winter grazing range would become a live ordnance impact area, in the Air Force's original expansion plan.

Court upholds benefits for Carpal Tunnel

BOISE (AP) - The Idaho Supreme Court has upheld a state Industrial Commission ruling that a Jerome woman is entitled to medical and disability benefits from her former employer for a wrist ailment known as Carpal Tunnel Syndrome.

In a unanimous decision issued Thursday, the high court rejected arguments from the Tupperware Co. that the Industrial Commission erred in its January 1989 decision for Marilyn Kinney.

Kinney operated a molding machine at the Tupperware plant near Jerome from July 29, 1985, to April 10, 1986, then again from July 27, 1987, until beginning treatment for wrist pain that fall.

She was diagnosed with Carpal Tunnel Syndrome, or tenosynovitis, according to court records. When splinting did not ease the pain, an orthopedic surgeon recommended surgery.

When Kinney applied to the Industrial Commission for worker's compensation, the surgeon submitted a letter on her behalf that the injury appeared to be the result of constant repetitive hand movement encountered in her job at Tupperware.

An occupational therapist testified for Tupperware that Kinney's work as a molding machine operator did not involve the degree of repetitive hand movement that would cause development of Carpal Tunnel Syndrome. But the Industrial Commission disagreed, ruling that she had met the burden of proof that her injury was work-related.

On appeal, Tupperware and its insurance carrier, Standard Fire Insurance Co., argued that Carpal Tunnel Syndrome was not an occupational disease and questioned Kinney's claim that the injury was caused by her working conditions.

Serial slayings suspected

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — A prostitute found dead near the Spokane River may have been the victim of a killer who shot two other women earlier this year and dumped their bodies on the riverbank, police said.

The Spokane Police and Spokane County Sheriff's departments have formed a task force to investigate a possible serial crime, Police Chief Terry Mangan said this morning.

The task force held its first meeting and will soon ask for assistance from other agencies with resources and expertise in investigating serial crimes, including the FBI and King County's Green River Task Force, Mangan said.

The body of Kathleen A. Brisbois, 38, was found Tuesday by two high school students walking near the river. She had been shot three times and her nude body thrown down an embankment in the Spokane valley, police said.

Just weeks earlier, Brisbois had told police she was frightened by the two previous slayings, Mangan said.

"There's good reason to think these three women were all victims of the same killer," Mangan said Wednesday.

"That's the way we're conducting our investigation. In fact, we'd been investigating the first two under that theory."

Like the other two victims, Brisbois was shot more than once with a small-caliber handgun and her body dumped near the river, police said.

None of the women was killed where their bodies were found, police said.

The nude body of Yolanda Sapp, 26, was discovered near the river Feb. 22. On March 25, the partially clothed body of Nickie Lowe, 34, was found on the riverbank, police said.

Mangan said there was no indication the case is connected to the 49 Green River slayings or killings anywhere else.

But police will work with the FBI's Violent Criminal Apprehension Program to see if the local slayings might match a pattern of killings elsewhere, he said.

In other cases, "they've found that what were thought to be separate crimes have turned out to be related," Mangan said.

Raids seize phony bolts in 2 states

DENVER (AP) — Federal agents raided seven distributors and importers of allegedly counterfeit bolts and fasteners in Colorado and Missouri on Wednesday, and about 130,000 pounds of bolts were seized, authorities said.

The raids were a continuation of Operation Breakdown, which began in June 1989 with a sweep in which 174,000 pounds of the fasteners were seized at 11 locations in Colorado, Utah, Wyoming and Missouri, the U.S. Customs Service said.

"The substandard fasteners have been responsible for equipment failures, structural failures, structural engineering defects and numerous accidents nationwide," said Leslie G. Kinney, special agent in charge of the U.S. Customs Service in Denver.


"I find it amazing that companies in the Rocky Mountain states, given the publicity generated by the raids in the past, would attempt to sell fasteners that are substandard and counterfeit," Kinney said.

The raids were carried out by agents of the Customs Service, Department of Transportation and the Defense Criminal Investigative Service.

The raids occurred at Fasteners Inc. in Denver, Englewood and Grand Junction; Jay-Max Sales, Palisades; Western Slope Bolt Co., Grand Junction; Mechanics Choice, Kansas City, Mo.; and Iscco, Lee Summit, Mo., agents said.

Kinney said firms and individuals involved are "absolutely under investigation" for possible violation of several laws. He said the information may be presented to a grand jury.

The bolts look like certified bolts, but are made of cheaper materials and break under stress. The counterfeit bolts have been found in motor vehicles, Army tanks, aircraft and other applications where the failure of the bolts could result in fatalities.

Bliss' 1-man track team could come home with 4 gold medals

BLISS — The Bliss High School track team — Shawn Jensen and his coach Bob Sant — packed up and left for the Idaho Class A-3 High School Track and Field Championships Thursday. It has a chance to come home Saturday with more points and medals than schools twice Bliss' size.

The senior is the only boy from Bliss — enrollment 178 from kindergarten through Grade 12 — attending this weekend's state finals and has a chance to walk away with some medals.

Actually, he came home with four medals. "He's competitive — in all four events in which he has entered. "This is my best year. I've worked harder this year and I've cut down on sugars," said Jensen.

His long jump of 20 feet, 9 1/2 inches was the best A-3 mark in the state headed into the finals and his time in the 400-meter dash ranked him as one of the two runners in A-3 to break the 52-second mark in qualifying for state. He ran 51.7.

His work ethic has earned him one of the best shots at winning at least two of the four events in which he qualified at the District 4 meet, where he garnered 40 points and four first-place efforts.

Don't count Jensen out in his other two events. Like the 400, he'll start in the second lane for the 200 after posting a 23.8

time in district. His leap of 42-4 in the triple jump maked him third best in A-3 of the district qualifying marks.

For a team that won no points in the 1989 state track meet because nobody qualified, the possibility of earning some respect lies on Jensen's performances Friday and Saturday.

"Well, he's basically our one-man team," said Sant. "He had his vision and went out and got it."

Jensen, who averaged almost 15 points a game for the Bliss basketball team last winter, owns records in the triple jump along with the 200- and 400-meter runs.

And that's at a school that has no asphalt track facilities and a grass infield for soccer.

"We do our form running on the grass and run out in the country on roads for the asphalt," said Jensen.

All of his marks at district were personal bests.

"I was really hyper," he said. "I had my personal bests on my last attempts (in the jumping events). I felt like this is going to be the one."

His best time in the 200 heading into the district meet was 53.5 seconds, a time that he beat by more than two seconds at district, pushed by Sy Farris of Glenns Ferry and Robbie Morris of Valley.

Jensen was expected to qualify for state in at least one event as a junior, but failed

Idaho fine crafts exhibit includes area artists' work

TWIN FALLS - Magic Valley artists - some working until now in relative anonymity - are well represented in "Facets of the Gem State: Fine Crafts of Idaho," a traveling exhibit opening Tuesday at the Herrett Museum Art Gallery.

Although some of the 31 artists chosen for the show are well known, many are not, even within their own regions: Mike Green of the College of Southern Idaho art department says the exhibit indicates there is a larger arts community in Idaho than most people think.

"There are a lot of artists working in the state," says Green. "I'm continually surprised by the number of new people."

A Centennial project, "Facets" was produced by the Pend Oreille Arts Council with support from the Idaho Commission on the Arts. The show opened in Coeur d'Alene, Moscow and Boise.

Work on the show started in 1988, and the show was juried by Tommy Griffin and Michael Whitenack of Presentation Design Group in Eugene, Ore. Both have extensive experience in presenting touring fine crafts shows.

"When we first accepted the challenge of jurving the work of Idaho craft-artists, we were somewhat apprehensive," the jurors said in a statement.

"We were concerned that a small arts group in northern Idaho might not have the resources and dedication to locate and organize a statewide exhibition of Idaho's fine crafts," they added. "It was our pleasant surprise to review the artists' slides and to marvel at the quality and diversity of the work submitted."

The seven area artists included in the show are:

• Barbara Alderman, Sun Valley, a potter for more than 10 years who specializes in whimsical porcelain pieces.

• Glen Carter, Ketchum, who creates original, solid wood, hand-carved carousel animals using techniques

New tape shows fame hasn't harmed Brauns

CLAYTON - Idaho's best-known musical family has released a new tape, "Muzzle Braun & The Boys: Ballads, Yodels & New Western Music."

The tape was recorded during 10 days in March at Horizon Audio Recording in Meridian. It was the family's first trip into the studio since last year's appearances on NBC's "Tonight Show," but big-city glamor hasn't spoiled the Brauns: Their songs still bear the imprint of their Idaho mountain home.

Several tunes sing the praises of life in the saddle. A rousing "Whoopie-ti-yi-yo" opens "The Cowboy Song," with its lyrics about "starry skies and coyote cries."

Muzzle takes the lead vocals on "Cowboys

& Kids" (which also includes a great guitar solo) and "Wild Buckaroo."

Other songs evoke the joys of family life. Lefty Frizzell's "Mom and Dad's Waltz" is a tribute to grandparents. (The tape's liner notes also mention that the album is dedicated to the boys' grandparents: Mary and Chappy Chapman and Muzie and Marion Braun, the latter longtime Magic Valley entertainer who died in a 1981 auto accident.)

Muzzle's "I Didn't Do It" offers a cute look at a father who wonders why his kids are so ornery when he, after all, was perfect as a boy. Muzzle also wrote "Mike," which compares the virtues of horse versus bicycle as a kid's favored mode of transporta-

tion.

The third composition, "Little Braun Brothers Yodel," ought to be a highlight for fans who have watched the Brauns' career progress. In this funny song, each of the four Braun boys - Cody, Willy, Gary and Micky - explains how he turned yodeler. While the Braun kids retain their youthful charm and exuberance, their vocals are growing up, showing the sheer professionalism. The instrumentals, too, are crisply performed and recorded. The tape features the work of 11 musicians and vocalists in all, including Muzzle's brother, Billy. Well known for his own band, Billy has joined Muzzle and the boys on a permanent basis.

"Ballads, Yodels & New Western Music" also includes "Idaho Moon," another yodeling tune by Ranger Doug Green of

Riders in the Sky. "Roy Rogers" "The Man in the Moon is a Cowhand."

The tape is available at most Magic Valley record and music stores, or it can be ordered by mail for \$10 (including postage) from Idaho Records, P.O. Box 474, Clayton, ID 83227.

In a recent visit to Twin Falls, Muzzle said the Brauns will be busy this Centennial summer with numerous appearances around Idaho. The family will be in Twin Falls July 6 for a show in the College of Southern Idaho's Fine Arts Auditorium.

Muzzle also mentioned that the family was recently invited to appear on the Riders in the Sky Radio Show from Cincinnati, Ohio, but that scheduling conflicts and distance prohibited them from accepting. They hope to do the show in the fall, however, he added.



ways be delisted, always be surprised by something." Windham, who called this week from Spokane public radio station KPXB, where he announces classical music selections.

At its concert next week, the band will feature music by the likes of John Philip Sousa, Irving Berlin, Stephen Foster and Scott Joplin.

The Spokane Falls Brass Band is a descendant of the original Spokane (without the e) Falls Brass Band, a group founded in the Washington Territory in 1878.

The ensemble went dominant around the beginning of the 20th century, and it was revived in 1978 by principal brass players from the Spokane Symphony... Orchestra.

Since then, it has toured regularly throughout the Northwest. Its members not only play the part of turn-of-the-century musicians; they look it, too, in their Victorian-era band costumes.

During the 1970s, regtime enjoyed almost fad-like popularity. Brass players were discovering Civil War-era band music, and the success of the film soundtrack for "The Sting" introduced non-musicians to the jaunty tunes.

Although regtime isn't quite as prominent now, people are still really happy to hear something like Windham, who plays French horn in the band. He is joined in the ensemble by trumpet players Christopher Cook and Larry Jess, fellow French horn player Roger Logan and trombonist David Matern.

The group also includes vocalist Ann Fennessy, whose wide musical

background includes study with German conductor Akzel Schotz and performances of genres ranging from musical theater to rock 'n' roll.

Fennessy's presence lends a theatrical dimension to the Spokane Falls Brass Band, said Windham, adding that her "right-out-and-relates to the audience."

And, he noted, there are "lots and lots of brass groups" around, but the Washington group is the only one regularly featuring a singer.

In fact, part during brass groups the Canadian Quintet and the Empire Brass of Boston have recently started incorporating a singer into their concerts. "We think it's partially from our lead," Windham said.

Other achievements attained by the Spokane ensemble include two appearances on "A Prairie Home Companion." The group landed its first engagement on Garrison Kellor's show under the recommendation of pianist Max Morath.

The appearances also led to another steady job for Fennessy. The Chicago-based organization heard her sing on the show, and she has since been invited each year to sing "The Star-Spangled Banner" before a football game.

Morath has served as a mentor for the Spokane players in more ways than one, Windham noted. He helped the group discover many of the turn-of-the-century tunes it features in its show.

He also is one of 10 American composers for whom the group has commissioned regtime music. Others include Gunther Schuller and Peter Schickele.

Eventually, the group hopes to record these new reg. So far, the ensemble has produced three recordings: a Rounder Records release called "The Spokane Falls Brass Band with Ann B. Fennessy," a tape titled "Christmas in Old Spokane" and its latest effort, "At the Mississippi Cabaret."

From Harlem to Hollywood: Davis was vaudeville's Renaissance man

NEW YORK — Energy had a face. It was slack-jawed with a broken nose and crooked smile. And versatility had a name. It was Sammy Davis Jr.

He was a spunky little treasure of raw talent whose battle with cancer had been as fierce as the battles he fought throughout his 60-year career.

Davis, who measured a mere 5-foot-6 and weighed not much more than a jockey, died Wednesday at age 64. He was the last working vestige of old-time vaudeville as well as entertainment's Renaissance man. Davis did it all — and then some: singer, dancer, impressionist, actor, comedian.

"I love working," he once said. "I know I'll have a lot of time to rest and read my scribbles. You never know when the public gets tired of you — they're fickle. You never know when it can happen. The average life of a performer is four, five years. For me it's been unusual."

But despite the money, the glamour, the accolades, the fame, the celebrity, it was also rough — real rough for a one-eyed, black Jewish guy.

From the time he put on his first pair of tap shoes as a baby in Harlem to his death, Sammy Davis Jr. always seemed to be proving something, always seemed to be looking for acceptance and trying to win over his detractors.

He entered show business at a time when black people were called colored, and danced bug-eyed with white paint on his face because white producers wanted it that way. And though he was everyone's little darling, he lived in segregated hotels and ate in segregated restaurants.

He danced his way into the Army during World War II, and responded to prejudice with his fists. His nose was broken in a fight with a white soldier. Others painted him white, to remind him that he wasn't.

He performed at army bases around the country while in Special Services, giving an extra surge of

energy the minute he sensed anyone in the audience who hated blacks. He said in his autobiography, "Yes, I Can," that he had to "neutralize" and "force them to acknowledge him."

Years later, associates said that one reason Davis continued to per-

form with such gusto and go that extra mile was an attempt to make the world love him.

After the war, his high-energy flash-dancing and impressions of Bing Crosby, Frank Sinatra and Humphrey Bogart made his popularity soar. It was a time when blacks

were called Negroes, and Negroes weren't supposed to mimic whites. But Davis did.

Negroes also weren't supposed to date whites. But Davis did, despite death threats during his friendship with actress Kim Novak and stares and taunts during his marriage to

Swedish actress Mai Britt.

After a racial demonstration outside a London theater where he was performing in 1960, he spoke to reporters with tears in his eyes. "This is little London, England, not the nigger-hating South," he said. "I cannot get over it. I really cannot."

Davis leaves extensive legacy of films available on videotape

If you go to a video store in search of movies featuring Sammy Davis Jr., who died Wednesday morning, you'll likely find a nice selection.

Davis appeared in more than 20 movies. Some of the better ones are now available on videocassette.

Here's a list of Davis' films you can rent or buy:

"Robin and the 7 Hoods" (Warner Video, \$59.95) is a musical comedy spoof set in the heyday of Chicago's gangster era, featuring "Rat Pack" members Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin and Davis' co-starring Bing Crosby and Jill St. John. When Sinatra, Martin and Davis are sharing together, it's like they're having a joke. You'd like to see a little bit of Muff — about a hood who becomes a heroic Robin Hood — is loaded with lovable gangsters. Though never a knockout, it's always entertaining. Near the end, Sinatra belts "My King's Town" as part of a show production number. It's the highlight of the movie.

"A Man Called Adam" (Charter Entertainment, \$59.95). Davis plays a tortured trumpeter in this 1966 film featuring a cast that's nearly all black. Haunted by a past tragedy and

angered by the racist society, the surly musician soaks his misery in booze. The question is whether music and the love of a good woman (Cicely Tyson) can save him. The ending is surprisingly doubtful. It's one of the best black movies ever made. Not great but features some absorbing scenes. Davis is outstanding.

"That's Black Entertainment" (VCI, \$29.95). This 60-minute documentary compiles scenes from the Black Cinema Collection, 22 films discovered in a Texas warehouse in 1983. These were made for black audiences during the '30s and '40s by black producers and directors and featured such figures as Paul Robeson, Cab Calloway, Lena Horne and a very young Jr.

"Tap" (RCA/Columbia Pictures Home Video, \$89.95). Gregory Hines is a whirling dervish with lightning at heel and toe. He doesn't tap lightly, deftly; he taps powerfully, as if he were trying to communicate his whole being through his routines. Hines' artistry isn't the effortless, breezy sort that one associates with the older masters, many of whom play parts in the film. And at times his dancing can seem dogged or degenerate into mere acrobatics — you miss the cool lean of his models. The heaviness of his style is perfectly suited to the movie's story.

Hines' Max is a gifted dancer who sees dancing as a dead end, and because he has no other skills, turns to crime. In every image you can feel the force of the film's mission to carry tap dancing to a larger audience. It attempts not only to show us some great dancing, but also to tell us why it's important and put it in context. Unfortunately, there's not nearly enough dancing, and the context it creates is almost entirely that of show-business clichés. Davis and a whole list of tap greats play a part, but oddly enough—the filmmakers don't seem to have known what to do with the older generation of dancers. The movie, though, does capture Davis' last dance performance on film, a brief tap routine made poignant because he had undergone painful hip surgery in 1985 and received an artificial hip in 1988.

"Frank, Liza & Sammy — The Ultimate Event!" (Kodak, \$29.95). The tape features a more familiar Liza, belting Broadway standards with Frank Sinatra and Davis. The performance, filmed last year at the Detroit stop of the "Rat Pack" re-

union tour, in which Minnelli subbed for an ailing Dean Martin, features solo turns by all three performers, capped by what Kodak calls "the ultimate climax" when the three are united—for a medley-of-show-stoppers. The 104-minute tape is priced at \$29.95 — less than a Las Vegas' showroom spectacle, although viewers are obliged to supply their own watered-down cocktails.

"Bloopers from 'Star Trek' and 'Laugh-In'" (Video Yesterday, \$19.95). Davis stars with a cast of thousands in this pastiche of mistakes and misspoken words from two great TV shows.

"The Cannonball Run" (Vestron Video, \$89.98). Davis stars in this Burt Reynolds vehicle on the ultimate car race.

"Cannonball Run 2" (Warner Home Video, \$79.95). Davis, Dean Martin, Frank Sinatra and Shirley MacLaine are featured in the Reynolds sequel, in which 30 stars pilot cars in a cross-country race.

"Gone With the West" (Unicom

Video, \$49.95). A little-known western starring James Caan, Stefanie Powers and Davis. This is the tale of how the anger of a gunfighter and Indian girl made a southwestern town a ghost town.

"Ocean's 11" (Warner Home Video, \$69.95). "The Rat Pack" (Sinatra, Martin and Davis) star in this Lewis Milestone-directed movie in which 11 ex-Army buddies plan the heist of a lifetime—simultaneously robbing five Las Vegas casinos on New Year's Eve.

"Sweet Charity" (MCA Home Video, \$44.98). Shirley MacLaine stars as Charity, a dance-hall hostess who dreams of a simple-old-fashioned marriage. Somehow, she ends up giving her heart to one undeserving man after another.

"Moon Over Parador" (Warner Home Video, \$79.95). Davis makes a brief appearance in this comedy about a dictator of a Latin American country who suddenly dies and a down-and-out New York actor who is persuaded to impersonate the ruler.

But he kept on dancing, and he kept on singing and acting and entertaining. With verve and strength. With conviction.

When he was 30, he told The Associated Press: "Talent is something you either have or don't have. But the next most important thing is honesty. You have to play fair with your audience. ... You have to give them everything they're in you every time you go out there, or they'll spot you for a phony. And once audiences think you're a phony, you can't last long."

Davis dived into his work with a vengeance. In 1966, while he performed nightly at the Majestic Theater on Broadway in "Golden Boy," he spent his days filming the movie "A Man Called Adam," and his weekends shooting his TV series, "The Sammy Davis Jr. Show."

The pace eventually led to exhaustion and he had to take a rest. But not for long. "Sammy can never quite relax," a friend once said. "He has to be doing something all the time."

When black became beautiful, Davis became one of the gang. The Rat Pack, that band of vaudeville and high-flying celebrities. He was chastised by other blacks for being a token.

No matter. These were his buddies, and he had known Sinatra since meeting him in the early '40s while touring with his father and uncle as "The Will Mastin Trio." For Davis, being a Rat-Packer was a heady experience.

During the past decade, Davis' popularity diminished, a victim of his problems with alcohol and hard living and of an apathetic audience that had moved on to other things: Still, little flickers of his energy remained. He tapped his heart out, and taught the very talented Gregory Hines a thing or two in the 1989 movie "Tap" — this despite an artificial hip Davis had received in 1988.

"After a while, you can't keep playing Don Quixote," Davis said in a 1986 interview. "You can't keep fighting windmills."



'Mutant Ninja Turtles' a revenge saga without personality

The following are capsule reviews of movies now showing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

TRENAGE MUTANT NINJA TURTLES (PG). Try the comic book instead. Or even the cereal. This adaptation of Kevin Eastman and Peter Laird's chop-socky comic spoof, in which mutated, masked-turtle and their rat mentor wreak havoc on New York's villains, is a triumph of marketing, name recognition and product tie-ins. Also, Jim Henson's Creature Shop has come up with some terrific puppets. But director Steve Barron's movie, essentially derived from Eastman and Laird's original story, lacks real personality. It's written like a celebrity roast, filmed like a horror pastiche, and it turns into the usual slicked-up revenge saga laced with lame wisecracks, thin topical gags and sub-Hong Kong action.

THE GUARDIAN (R). William Friedkin's smarmy shocker about a murderous, tree-worshipping nanny represents his unsuccessful bid to re-enter the horror film big time. It's no "Exorcist," though. It's more like "Fatal Attraction" with birch bark.

THE HUNT FOR RED OCTOBER (PG). There's an amiable smartness to this underwater thriller. Its film-makers know that a little technology goes a very long way, and if they hope to keep an audience's attention they'll have to do it with story, not hardware. Director John McTiernan, whose signature is sleek action ("Die Hard"), his first-rate cast (including Sean Connery, Alec Baldwin, Scott Glenn and Sam Neill) and writers Larry Ferguson and Donald Stewart have managed it nicely. You may not be limp from accumulated tension in this hunt is over, but its cautiously upbeat global message leaves a satisfying glow and the premise is a crackerjack one.

NUNS ON THE RUN (PG-13). As Sister

Euphemia and Sister Inviolata, two gangsters who fleece the mob and take it on the lam to a nunnery, Eric Idle and Robbie Coltrane give director Jonathan Lynn's drag comedy — "Some Like It Hot" in Catholic School — a little bawdy class. But it's mostly half-funny, mechanical, crude, filled with jokes you have to take on faith. Like a kid who's gotten license to be naughty, it comes on, smirks, does it number and then tries to get off fast.

PRETTY WOMAN (R). Updating "Pygmalion" and sprinkling it with Cinderella dust may seem like a perfectly workable idea until you get into the nuts and bolts of "Pretty Woman." Here, Richard Gere's bored cipher of a corporate raider transforms Julia Roberts' happy Hollywood Boulevard hooker into a lydie he can pass off at a polo match in less than a week. This is a movie that barely has a moment to call its own and the ones it has are gamy, materialistic and possibly life-threatening. Some fairy tale for the '90s.

Acting either amateurish or smug in 'Wild Orchid'

No doubt about it, "Wild Orchid" would be the hottest movie of the year — if the year were 1958.

This glitzy, brainless soft-porn has an anarchistic quality that at least her scores had never noticed that it is real easy to go up Mom'n' Pop video joint in America and for two bucks take home images of sexual practices that in the last century were restricted entirely to the more labyrinthian chambers of the most debauched Ottoman pasha's harem. It actually thinks a flash of thigh and black lace is ... spice-of-meat.

The most interesting thing about it may be its ingenious star's first name, which is "Carre," complete to an accent over the E.

Actually, she is a world-class model named Carre Otis in her first professional acting performance, though you could have fooled me. I would have guessed it was at least her scores had never noticed that it is real easy to go up Mom'n' Pop video joint in America and for two bucks take home images of sexual practices that in the last century were restricted entirely to the more labyrinthian chambers of the most debauched Ottoman pasha's harem. It actually thinks a flash of thigh and black lace is ... spice-of-meat.

She is supposedly a completely naive Midwestern law school grad who just happens to speak six lan-

guages and gets herself hired in two seconds to assist jet-setting businesswoman Jacqueline Bisset in some weird Brazilian deal, which the movie never makes clear, and upon which it squanders lakes of time. Actually, the plot is merely a vehicle by which Otis can be deposited before the camera by choreographer Mickie Rourke, who looks as if he has just swallowed an entire endangered sub-species of canaries. Such radiant smugness and self-absorption has not been on display on a movie screen since "Rocky II."

Rourke is a mysterious businessman whose patronage is obscurely necessary to Bisset's already obscure deal, what that means by that, like a morsel on a fork. Otis is served up for him. But mainly he poses melodramatically, with a look of ineffable weariness upon his flaccid mug.

The joke is that for his bedroom eyes and sleek, slippery lounge-lizard ways, he turns out to be an impatient voyeur. He talks the talk but he can't walk the walk. Thus, in surely one of the most perverse decisions ever reached in an American movie, this isn't about a roue's seduction of a naïf but a naïf's seduction of a roue!

Most of the R-rated film is simply smoke and mirrors, and glimpses of eroticism circa 1958 — snips of body parts, bits of groans and droops of sweat. And though there has been quite a bit of hype about the scene being set in an American movie, what is the screen seems quite discreet — if you have hung around that long!

Henson's puppets are vain, shy, crusty, grumpy and wise

HOLLYWOOD — Captivated to fame by "Sesame Street," Muppet creator Jim Henson, who died Wednesday at age 53 in New York of a massive bacterial infection, left behind a dynasty of remarkable foam-and-wig creations — Kermit the Frog, Fozzie Bear, Miss Piggy and Big Bird among them — that live on with a beguiling independent reality of their own.

The flamboyant vanity of Miss Piggy ("Moi?"), the endearing greed of Cookie Monster, the competitiveness of Big Bird and Kermit's bearded voice of reason are familiar to audiences worldwide through television, films, records, books, toys, computer software, clothing and other Muppet merchandise.

More significant than its marketing bonanza was the fact that the special world of the Muppets offered a haven to children growing up in an increasingly troubled era, a haven where reading and numbers were fun, a haven without peer pressure or violence or deal-making. Parents encouraged their children to walk down "Sesame Street" or soar with "Pigs in Space," secure in the knowledge that no harm would befall them.

Although the characters will survive, the sorrow is that their future will lack the guiding hand of their gentle creator.

Henson's genius flowered in his original exploitation of television as a visual medium. Earlier television shows with human and puppet characters, such as "Huckleberry Hound" and "The Flintstones," were set up like little theater performances, with a human host and puppets behind a curtain.

Henson created interaction between humans and Muppets — his term for a cross between puppets and characters — with complex, three-dimensional settings and crew

members concealed in trenches or behind walls.

Instead of seeing a human simply talking to a puppet, viewers were offered a new dimension, one where Muppets were firmly in control and human visitors had to cope with the cocoonic surroundings as best they could.

Muppets could appear above, below, behind or in front of their human guests. The effects wouldn't have worked for a live audience — the scaffolding would have been visible and the cameras would have gotten in the way — but the results were spectacular to home viewers.

Without their endearing, humorous, all-too-human characteristics, however, the Muppets would have been just another technological surprise, to be exclaimed over and then dismissed.

Henson gave them more than technical life; he gave them soul. Sweet, petty, crusty, jealous, greedy, grumpy, wise and funny, each possessed an individuality with which their human counterparts could identify.

And identify they did. Henson's Muppets became a merchandising and media phenomena; second only to Disney characters in their instant visual identity. Last year, Kermit and Mickey Mouse became a mega-team, when Henson's production company and the rights to his Muppet characters were purchased by the Walt Disney Co.

Henson's stunning artistic and commercial successes were light years away from his high school puppet club days and a career that began in the '50s with "Sam and Friends," a local puppet show on a television station in Washington.

That show, the first major outing for Kermit the Frog, won an Emmy in 1958. Quirky guest appearances on "The Ed Sullivan Show," "The Tonight Show" and "The Jimmy Dean Show" followed.

Then, in 1969, came "Sesame Street," and Henson's Muppet dynasty proliferated with instantly appealing blue and green monsters, shaggy dogs and round-headed, goggle-eyed creations, helping millions of children learn letters, numbers and social skills.

The first generation of "Sesame Street" viewers are now watching Oscar the Grouch and Bert and Ernie with their own toddlers.

But Henson wanted to reach a wider audience, and "The Muppet Show," a star-studded variety program, premiered in London in 1976, before moving to the United States. Feature-length movies came later, and still more television series — "Fraggle Rock"; "The Jim Henson Hour," an innovative mix of live action, computer graphics and puppetry; the Saturday morning cartoon "Muppet Babies"; and the HBO music appreciation series, "The Ghost of Faffner Hall."

Not all brought commercial success — the movies "Labyrinth" and "The Dark Crystal" didn't do well — but Henson's 15 feature creations continued to earn wide-eyed raves.

Kermit the Frog, the reasonable mediator, frequently perplexed by an unreasonable world, was often referred to as the soft-spoken.

Henson's alter-ego was one of Henson's earliest creations and Henson supplied his voice. Henson, who preferred staying out of the limelight, denied that his award-winning creations spoke for him. In a 1984 Los Angeles Times interview, he said, "They don't do or say things I wouldn't otherwise do or say. I don't see myself as a repressed person hiding behind the characters."

Yet during that interview, Henson only became visible when he spoke as Kermit. To a little green frog, the spotlight was a warm and wonderful place to be.

Fast-acting pneumonia caused death

Muppet creator Jim Henson was killed by an unusually quick-spreading form of bacterial pneumonia, a doctor who treated him said.

Henson, 53, died Wednesday at New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center in New York, said the 53-year-old puppeteer apparently was healthy until coming down with flu-like symptoms Friday.

People who are in otherwise good health, as well as viruses. Among those at especially high risk of pneumonia's complications are people whose immune systems have been weakened by diseases such as AIDS or who are taking immune-suppressing medicines. As for Henson, Gelmont said, "Categorically, he did not have AIDS."

Dr. David M. Gelmont, director of intensive care at New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center in New York, said the 53-year-old puppeteer apparently was healthy until coming down with flu-like symptoms Friday.

Henson was examined by a doctor in North Carolina who did not find pneumonia, Gelmont said. Henson's condition worsened and he returned on Monday to New York, where he died Wednesday.

When he arrived at the hospital early Tuesday, the bacterial infection that caused his pneumonia had spread from his lungs through his body, attacking other organs, doctors said. At that point, it could not be controlled with antibiotics, the usual therapy.

Pneumonia is an inflammation of the lungs that is most often caused by streptococcus, the bacteria that







A wise dealer sets his sights only on the trucks needed to fulfill his contract. Concern for an insignificant overtake comes only after his contract is ensured. Today's dealer paid a huge price to learn that bitter lesson.

Duminy's ace won with South doing some duplicate over bidding. Given a decent break of the trump suit, 13 tricks were there for the taking. And foolishly South embarked on a course for all the tricks.

The eighth Duminy's trump card led to a second round to his ace. West's discard momentarily halting play. South ruffed a club with Duminy's last trump, drew, and nyc, trump and then tried to run a few diamonds. No luck there. East ruffed in and led a club, and the slam went eye down.

Had South not been so concerned about playing for all 13 tricks, he could have bought some cheap insurance to guarantee his small slam. After he cashes Duminy's trump, nyc, it's not unreasonable to duck a second trump play, thus cutting to a 4-1 break (about 48 percent).

East wins his trump trick early, but South retains control. Duminy's last trump guards against a club break, and South can claim the rest in top tricks.



AT&T presentation takes viewers back to those final days of the Vietnam War

By CHRISTOPHER HULL

When thinking of the final days of the American presence in Vietnam, one conjures up images of complete chaos as the South Vietnamese government crumbled. Newsreel footage of the events of late April 1975 recorded scenes of unrestrained brutality as troops from the disintegrated South Vietnamese army fled before the advance of victorious North Vietnamese and Viet Cong units.

With the fall of Da Nang, retreating troops fought desperately to get aboard the last flight out of the city, ignoring civilian refugees who were supposed to be on the flight. Male flight attendants brandished pistols as they tried to ready the overloaded plane for takeoff. As the plane taxied down the runway in Da Nang, soldiers clung to the landing gear or sprayed the plane with automatic-weapon fire in frustration at being left.

It was a scene that officials of Pan Am were determined to avoid as they prepared for their airline's last flight out of Saigon, the last city to fall, on April 24, 1975. The events that led up to that flight are recounted in "Last Flight Out," airing Tuesday, May 22, on NBC. The AT&T presentation stars James Earl Jones as Richard Topping, the Pan-Am station chief in Saigon; Richard Crenna as Dan Hood, a Pan-Am pilot who volunteered to organize the evacuation of a group of orphans; Eric Bogosian as a fictionalized U.S. State Department employee; and Dr. Haing S. Ngor as Topping's friend and assistant.

Traditionally the last American commercial carrier to cease operations in any world trouble-spot, Pan Am's final flight out of Vietnam was coordinated by Topping, faced with a number of prickly problems.

"Al Topping had just closed down an office in Cambodia and had witnessed the beginning of the Khmer Rouge onslaught," says Jones of his character's situation. "He felt that the same thing would happen to those who were left behind in South Vietnam. He was also determined that the events of Da Nang would not be repeated in Saigon."

"The exact time of departure was left up to him," Jones continues. "The Pan Am chiefs back in New York said, 'You're there. You can tell better than we. It's your decision.' So he was determined not to go too soon, which might cause a panic, and not to go too late, which would mean not being able to take out the people he was trying to save. "The movie is not about the war," Jones emphasizes. "It doesn't take political sides. It simply deals with

... well ... the wound healers — the civilians. They're heroes — inadvertent heroes. They were as powerless as anybody, but they were trying to do something for the people they knew. Al's mission was to get the Pan Am employees out — the Vietnamese nationals who wanted to go.

"I have vivid memories of that situation at Da Nang," he says about his decision to take the role of Al Topping. "The footage of people hanging on to the undercarriages of planes and dropping to their deaths. That evoked such a wash of guilt — whether you were against the war or not — and abandonment. It's important for us to look at that trauma without that wash of guilt, and this is the first story I've seen that really tries to do that."

McMahon will stay as long as Carson does

NEW YORK (AP) — Johnny Carson still hasn't signed for his 29th season as the star of NBC's "Tonight Show." But sidekick Ed McMahon says it's likely Carson will stay on for two more seasons.

The big-voiced announcer with the booming laugh made his prediction during an interview taped for NBC's "Later With Bob Costas."

McMahon said he'll leave "Tonight" when Carson does, and "the night he says goodbye, I say goodbye. That's gonna be a sad night...."

Asked if he thought he personally will make it 30 years on the show, McMahon replied, "I think so. Yeah, I think so."

NBC Entertainment President Brandon Tartikoff has said he expects that Carson will return next fall. But McMahon noted that Carson is ambivalent each year about continuing on "Tonight," which has consistently beaten its late-night rivals in ratings.

"If it were me, I would say 30 (years)," he said. "But Johnny has his own mind about that. ... He's supposed to tell them (NBC) pretty soon whether he's going to stay or not. I think right now he's probably still vacillating."

Carson is "the master of timing," McMahon said, "and he'll know when it's the right time to go. But I think 30 years would be wonderful."

Look-alikes, long sleeps fill screen

Looking at "The Young and the Restless" this spring, you shake your head and laugh. Life in the soap world is truly crazy, and yet kind of wonderful with solutions coming out of left field.

All winter long Kay Chancellor Sterling and maid Esther wait for Kay's husband Rex to wake up and see that bedmate Marge is not Kay. But Rex doesn't have a clue. So no rescue. Instead, Rex divorces Kay, or Marge, and smooches with chameleon Jill. All hope for Kay plummets.

Kay's Jeanne Cooper doesn't mind because she's playing look-alike Marge too, changing performances just a touch. But viewers are restless. Isn't there anyone smart enough to figure out

Marge and the kidnapping scheme? Are they all out to lunch?

From out of the blue, boss Bill Bell gives us Kay's knight in shining armor. He's Kay's son Brock Reynolds (Beau Kazer), last seen four years ago — a chip off the old block, a kid adept at making the wrong choice.

Nowadays, Beau doesn't worry so much. "I don't take it so seriously. I didn't know who I was in my 20s. And I was never satisfied as an actor. I'm still not, but my change in attitude shows. I'm looser and there's more humor. I'm here to

save my mother Kay, and then who knows?"

With a two-year contract, Beau Kazer will be around for a spell. Beau, a kid who got his start at CBS, is now back home and enjoying himself. "I have so many friends here at CBS. It's family. Everything works so smoothly. It's like Bill Bell's Ferrari out in the parking lot — a well-oiled machine."

Andy Rooney says his suspension was related to timidity, not rights

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Andy Rooney's suspension from "60 Minutes" caused him to be more careful, but he says the entire episode "was a better example of timidity than it was a violation of my First Amendment rights."

"Broadcasters are hardly the only people to blame, of course. The timidity with which the broadcast industry approaches seriously controversial ideas is reflected by society ... or perhaps the broadcast industry's timidity is a reflection of our society," the CBS commentator said.

In February, CBS News president David Burke suspended Rooney for three months after an article

published by the Los Angeles-based gay lifestyle magazine Advocate attributed racist and homophobic quotes to Rooney.

Burke eventually shortened Rooney's suspension to three weeks.

Burke decided "between my right to say something and his obligation to keep the peace between CBS and several minorities, he'd better get rid of me," Rooney said in a speech to 1,000 people gathered at a Constitutional Rights Foundation dinner.

"It's my personal opinion that my suspension was a better example of timidity than it was a violation of my First Amendment rights," he said.

Rooney said we have become a nation "that doesn't say what it thinks about so many things" and he faulted special interest groups for squelching debate on television and in politics.

"There are organized minorities for almost every cause, and politicians, along with network executives, are scared to death of them," he said. "Self-interest is what draws people to the voting booth."

"Most people have the feeling that what happens in an election won't matter much to them, so they don't vote. It's the people with some personal cause, not those with a general belief in democracy, who do the electing."




