German unity issue dominates 1st summit day

'Wild scene' after limo pulls over

WASHINGTON — Maybe the bright sunshine inspired a quick stroll.

Maybe it was the sight of the U.S. Treasury building and all those dollars. Or maybe the crenelated red-brick walls of the Crestar Bank, reminiscent of the Kremlin, made Mikhail Gorbachev want to take a closer look.

Whatever the reason, Washington's most famous visitor stopped the motorcade back to the Soviet Embassy from the White House Thursday evening and took one of his patented jaunts among the common folk where 15th Street and Pennsylvania and New York Avenues meet downtown.

"When he first hopped out of his limousine, his KGB security agents looked really nervous and surrounded him, but Gorbachev spread his arms wide and they all stepped back to give him room to meet people," said Chris Goodwin, who shook hands with the Soviet president.

"He looked right in my eyes — he has these great eyes — and put his hand out to take mine," said Goodwin, a White House employee en route home. Gorbachev spoke to her in Russian, which she doesn't understand.

With rush-hour traffic piling up behind his motorcade, Gorbachev crossed 15th Street to greet another mob of pedestrians huddled behind yellow police tape.

"His driver must have the worst

WASHINGTON — President Bush and Mikhail S. Gorbachev grappled over terms of German unity after an opening round of summit talks Thursday that set the stage for major agreements on chemical and nuclear weapons.

Overall, Bush declared, "The mood is very positive."

The two leaders began their talks proclaiming a new era of cooperation in spite of their differences. "The trenches of the Cold War are disappearing," Gorbachev said.

Bush saluted Gorbachev's leadership in a

facit boost for his plunging popularity at home, and vowed to end "decades of division and discord."

After nearly five hours of discussions, Bush and Gorbachev readily acknowledged they could not settle nettlesome questions this week over the shape of conventional forces in Europe or the military bearing of a unified Germany.

"It is not here that the German question will be resolved," the Soviet president told reporters. Separately, Bush said, "Certainly, we're not going to solve the whole issue at this summit."

Secretary of State James A. Baker III and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze will take up the issue next week in Copenhagen during a meeting of the 35-nation European Security Conference.

There was confusion over whether the superpowers were making any progress on Germany, Gorbachev said at one point that both sides had advanced "certain ideas, certain suggestions," and White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said "new ideas" amounted

"to a way to meld the concerns of the United States and the Soviet Union."

But several hours later, a U.S. official told reporters, "There are no new ideas," and let it be known that Bush would call West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl and reassure him of Bush's fidelity to the new Germany's membership in the west's NATO alliance.

Gorbachev favors some formula that guarantees protection against a renewed German militarism.

The impasse didn't stay the leaders from providing an upbeat view of the summit, Bush said. "I'd just say at the end of a very interesting day that the talks have gone reasonably well."

Gorbachev — who told a State Dinner audience that "the enemy image is becoming a thing of the past" — sprinkled the day with a series of unexpected appearances that have

Soviet leader goes for power tie at less-glitzy White House dinner

WASHINGTON — Snubbing the dress code and looking a bit weary, Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev and his wife, Raisa, joined the Bushes at the White House Thursday for a state dinner that sometimes christened the year's hottest event.

Gorbachev showed up at the black-tie dinner wearing a business suit and a red power tie regarded more as a statement than a fashion faux pas. He did the same thing at the last state dinner he attended here, in 1987.

President Bush, who did the black-tie thing, showed his diplomatic skills by ignoring Gorbachev's attire and toasting the Soviet leader's courage.

"We meet at a time of great and historic change — in the Soviet Union, in Europe and around the world," Bush said in the ritual toast. "Such profound change is unsettling but

also exhilarating."

Bush later added, "Mr. President, you deserve great credit for the course you've chosen, for the political and economic reforms you've introduced, and for creating within the Soviet Union a commitment to change."

The state dinner for 125 of Bush's friends, supporters and assorted Soviet and American bigwigs featured regu music and ceremonial splendor, along with enough fine wine to keep everyone amused at the table talk. Lugged, the menu included Maine lobster, roasted beef, asparagus and raspberry dessert — a fare a world away from that offered by Moscow's hottest restaurant, McDonald's.

In his own toast, Gorbachev noted that the United States and Soviet Union had made historic progress together.

Millions of teenagers will find smoking lethal in future years

WASHINGTON — Five million of today's children will die of smoking-related illnesses in their later years if the current rate of tobacco use by young people continues, the U.S. surgeon general said Thursday.

Dr. Antonia Novello, in her first major address on smoking, said more than 3,000 teen-agers become regular smokers each day.

She accused cigarette companies of spending \$3.3 billion annually to advertise and promote their products in ways that appeal to children and adolescents.

A spokeswoman for the Tobacco Institute, interviewed later, said cigarette companies do not want children as their customers.

"For decades we have taken aggressive actions to

keep cigarettes out of the hands of kids," Brennan Dawson said. She said advertising is not aimed at creating new smokers, but selling tobacco products to people who already smoke.

Novello's remarks came at a conference to stop smoking among minors held by the Interagency Committee on Smoking and Health National Advisory Committee. The program also featured speakers from the Pan American Health Organization, the Stop Teenage Addiction to Tobacco organization, and educators and law enforcement officials.

The program coincided with World No-Tobacco Day. Novello said 44 states restrict the sale of tobacco products to minors.

Plowing at night brings arrest for farmer on edge of suburb

CHICAGO — A farmer in a once-rural area has been arrested for plowing his fields too late at night after a neighbor in an adjoining subdivision complained that the drone of the tractor was keeping him awake.

"The way I feel, he moved next to the field — the field didn't move next to him," said Ray Dettmering, who farms 600 acres about 30 miles south of Chicago.

"The only question I have is, 'What fall when I go to harvest it, what happens then?'"

Dettmering's neighbor, Leonard Reh, said he, too, must make a living. And he can't because of the noise.

"I don't want to stop him from making his living," said Reh, a Postal Service employee. "But farming land at midnight is just a little bit too outrageous."

Reh's home is in a new subdivision in between about 30 miles southwest of Chicago. The village has seen an influx of middle- and

upper-middle class commuters in recent years.

Reh and other neighbors say that since they must turn their lawn-mowers off at 7 p.m. because of village ordinances, why should a farm tractor be different?

And so, about 11 p.m. on April 26, police responded to Reh's complaint. They tramped through muddy fields to arrest Dettmering as he, his wife, Kathy, and a hired hand finished plowing the land he leases.

Dettmering faces a June 11 hearing on two counts of disturbing the peace. Each count carries a maximum fine of \$500 and six months in jail.

Dettmering, 28, of Peotone, has a day job and farms someone else's land on nights and weekends.

"Almost all producers depend to a certain extent on rented land," especially in rapidly urbanizing areas, said Ralph Heimlich, an agricultural economist for the U.S. Department of Agriculture in Washington, D.C.

Heimlich said suburban growth areas, while attractive to the middle class, often pose conflicts between suburbanites and their farm neighbors.

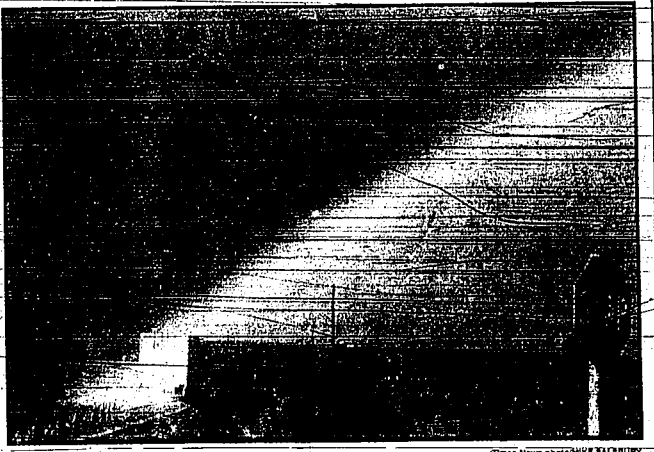
"People want to move out in the country and enjoy it in a telephone interview Thursday he'd like to be a full-time farmer but can't afford it. He said he depends on his second job as a farm equipment mechanic to make ends meet.

"I've got an eight-hour-a-day job," he said. "There's not enough money on the farm to be living off of."

This year, Dettmering said a wet spring has put him behind in preparing the land for corn. The days when it wasn't raining meant even longer days — and nights — in the field, he said.

Reh said, however, he just wants a good night's sleep.

"I have to get up at 4 o'clock in the morning to go to work," he said.

Late May rains ease drought anxiety across Magic Valley

TWIN FALLS — It's about a \$5,000 rain to one Salmon Tract farmer.

Wednesday's and Thursday's storm dumped the entire month's normal rainfall on the Magic Valley in about 24 hours.

The heavy spring rains mean Dick Parrott can plant an additional 25 to 50 acres of beans on land that would otherwise sit idle, he said.

Though a government program would pay something on the idle land, beans would pay a lot more, he said.

But the rain has delayed bean planting for some farmers, said Bob Vodraska, of the University of Idaho Twin Falls County Extension Service.

"The heavy rain also is hurting alfalfa crops he said.

"The tonnage will be there, but quality is lower," Vodraska said.

For crops already in, however, it will mean a better yield. It will help fill out the heads on wheat and barley crops, he said. And it is good for the beets and potatoes and grass on the rangelands.

On the Salmon Tract, the Magic Reservoir and Lincoln and Blaine counties the rain may make the difference between a crop of wheat and none, Vodraska said.

In town, however, the rain means wet feet and flooded basements. Carpet cleaning services have been busy the last couple of days cleaning up flooded basements. Servpro of Magic Valley reported four calls Thursday morning.

The Magic Valley was drenched in almost 2 inches of rain in May, about .85 above normal for the

Seattle girl, 13, nation's best speller

WASHINGTON (AP) — Amy Dimak, 13, of Seattle won the 63rd annual National Spelling Bee on Thursday, correctly spelling 17 words, including "quimeronius" and "fibriano."

Amy, who wore No. 218 on the page as last year's winner, spelled the word that means a type of cloth, after Enders missed "downier," a custodian's office.

Amy, who won \$5,000, a trophy and special prizes from Encyclopaedia Britannica, a monetary prize will receive \$4,000 for his second-place

Eric, who often asked for the definition and origin of the word, correctly spelled "quimeronius" and "fibriano" while Amy succeeded with "sansculotte" and "abrogation."

U.S. force ready to rescue Americans

WASHINGTON (AP) — Six U.S. warships and more than 600 Marines are on patrol in the international waters off the coast of Liberia in case they are needed to rescue American citizens if a rebellion there traps them.

The U.S. flotilla includes a destroyer, a minesweeper, a transport, a support vessel carrying ammunition and combat supplies, said Cmdr. David Thomas, a spokesman for the Defense Department.

Also aboard are 179 Marine officers and 2,102 enlisted men, Thomas said.

Some 10,000 Americans, mostly businessmen and missionaries, are in Liberia, where more than 1,000 people have been killed in a rebellion against the rule of Liberian President Samuel Doe during the last five months.

Rebel troops moved to within 25 miles of the Liberian capital, Monrovia, on Thursday and there was concern that fighting in the city could raise the death toll dramatically.

The U.S. ships are under orders to be prepared to evacuate American citizens in the event that they would no longer be able to leave the country by commercial means, Thomas said.

month. Some places reported a total snow along with the rain. But snow in May is not unusual, said Bill Galkin of the National Weather Service in Kimberly.

For the year, precipitation totals 5.73 inches, about 1.38 inches above normal.

"That's a whole month's precip," Galkin said. For the water, since October, precipitation has totaled 8.28 inches, or 1.15 inches above normal.

But while the valley has been wet, the winter snowpack is long gone and the rain will do little to help low reservoir levels.

Warm and dry weather earlier this spring used a lot of stored water in the upper Snake River system, said Mike Beus of the Bureau of Reclamation.

As a result of the rain, the bureau will cut back its reservoir releases, Beus said.

Magic Valley canal companies also have cut back on their deliveries.

Lee Peterson, assistant manager of Twin Falls Canal Co., said the company has cut about 10 percent of its normal delivery and may cut back more if the rain continues.

Thursday some canals and laterals overflowed causing minor localized flooding, but the biggest percentage of flooding was mother nature's contribution, Peterson said.

The North Side Canal Co. has cut back just over 10 percent of its normal delivery, assistant manager Vince Ahern said.

The rain is "one of the best things that could happen" on Bureau of Land Management range lands, said Dave Krosting of the Shoshone District office.

It will bring out vegetation in areas of low growth and help recharge springs and streams, he said.

But the increased growth on the range, will mean increased fire danger later in the summer, Krosting said.

"The wind and the sun could dry it out just as fast as it wetted up," he said.

The South Hills too have benefited from the recent wet weather. About 2.5 inches have fallen in the last 10 days, and .67 inches from 2 p.m. Wednesday to 2 p.m. Thursday.

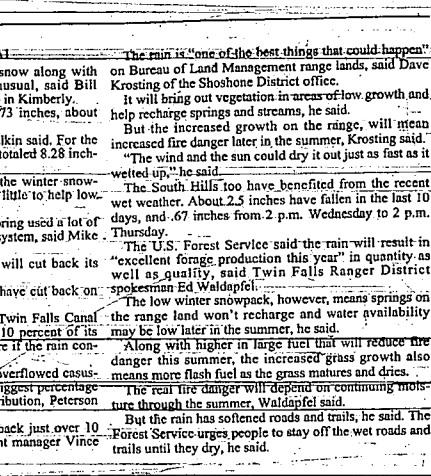
"The U.S. Forest Service said the rain will result in "excellent forage production this year" in quantity as well as quality, said Twin Falls Ranger District spokesman Ed Waldpfoel.

The low winter snowpack, however, means springs on the range land won't recharge and water availability may be low later in the summer, he said.

Along with higher in large fuel that will reduce the danger this summer, the increased grass growth also means more flash fuel as the grass matures and dries.

The real fire danger will depend on continuing moisture through the summer, Waldpfoel said.

But the rain has softened roads and trails, he said. The Forest Service urges people to stay off the wet roads and trails until they dry, he said.



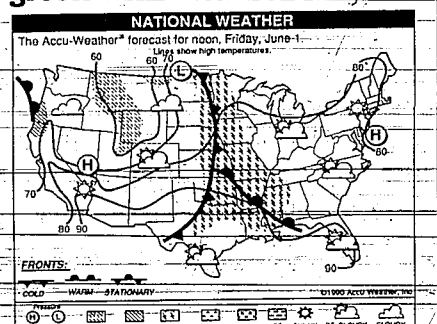

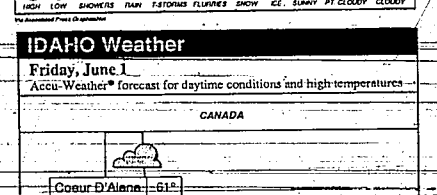

Summary: The National Weather Service in Boise reported stormy and cool weather Thursday, including variable clouds, rain and a little snow at the higher elevations.

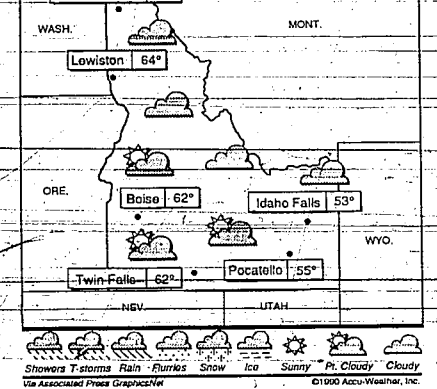
A afternoon showers prevailed in Idaho, accompanied by cool temperature. A morning high barely reached the mid-40s and mid-50s.

Twice, he made a beeline to reporters waiting in the white house driveway for impromptu news conferences.

After largely ignoring the limelight to Gorbachev during the day, Bush made an unscheduled appearance in the Rose Garden to respond to questions. "The Gorbachev certainly gone as well as I could have expected up to now," he said.

"In six weeks, it will be 45 percent of the population," said Dawson, the tobacco spokeswoman, adding that Kentucky recently passed such legislation. "We're not opposed to that."

Summit unlikely to produce quick-fixes for Gorbachev

WASHINGTON — However big the headlines, this week's summit seems unlikely to provide Mikhail S.

Gorbachev with any quick solutions to the burgeoning economic and political trouble at home.

The Soviet leader said as much Thursday, telling an attentive American audience that his reforms

will depend on time and ingenuity.

"One has to wait nine months before a child is born," he said. One translation quoted Gorbachev this way: Soviet thinkers, he said, will have to "twist their brains" to achieve

a successful, market-oriented economy.

In his animated luncheon remarks, Gorbachev appealed for Western patience as he grapples with the Lithuania independence movement.

His approach, he said, is to "be very cautious, to consider a matter seven times, or Soviet 100 times before one takes a decision."

His summit partner, President Bush, has questioned Gorbachev's action — not his caution — over Lithuania. The Kremlin leader slapped an economic blockade on the republic and has declined to lift it.

Even as Gorbachev asked for forbearance, Bush pointedly mentioned Lithuania as an area that divides the two nations. And there is little on the summit agenda that is likely to ease the Baltic rebellion or help the Soviet economy.

"Over the next four days we're not going to solve all of the world's problems," Bush said in his

welcoming remarks to Gorbachev. He might have added "nor the Soviet Union's."

Burning ethnic rivalries and growing nationalism in several Soviet republics continue to threaten the stability of the union. Gorbachev's plan to raise food prices touched off panic buying and emptied store shelves.

And political nemesis Boris Yeltsin won the presidency of Russia; the vast republic that stretches the length of the Soviet Union with more land and people than the other 14 republics combined. Yeltsin immediately announced he would seek sovereignty for Russia, giving its laws precedence over national law and effectively weakening the union over which Gorbachev presides.

The White House in recent months has expressed a desire to buttress Gorbachev at home after concluding that Soviet stability and Gorbachev's political survival are in the U.S. interest — overriding anxiety over issues such as Lithuania.

Agreement on a new trade pact,

which would provide some tangible benefits for the Soviets, is essentially at hand, but Bush has backed away from signing it. He initially cited the Soviet parliament's postponement of passage of a new law liberalizing

immigration policies. Now the administration is linking agreement on trade with the lifting of Moscow's economic blockade against the tiny Baltic republic.

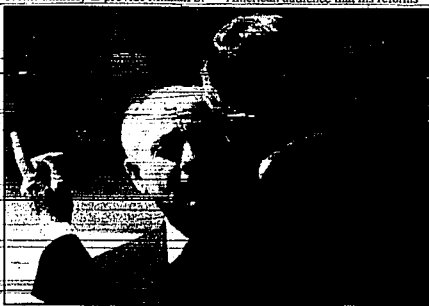
Even with a trade agreement, the Soviets would enjoy few immediate benefits because their industries do not now produce much that could compete on world markets. Improving production through better training, quality control and industrial design will take years in an economy that has effectively destroyed the work ethic and has yet to implement long-promised market incentives.

The Soviet president has argued passionately for trade concessions to help his country pull out of its

economic tailspin, but few suggest there is anything short of a massive airlift that could work fast enough to have an impact on the problems feeding present public anxieties.

Gorbachev's other summit goals — agreement on cutting nuclear weapons by 50 percent, eliminating chemical weapons and establishing a non-threatening military posture for a unified Germany — are unlikely to help him much at home, where he already has established his credentials as a peacemaker. But returning empty handed could further weaken his stature if he were viewed as losing his effectiveness in the international arena.

At their first summit meeting, in Malta last December, Gorbachev and Bush announced they would try to reach broad agreement on reducing troops and conventional weapons in Europe by their next meeting.

Wellesley crawling with Secret Service, reporters ahead of visit

WELLESLEY, Mass. (AP) — The normally placid, rolling lawns of exclusive Wellesley College were crawling Thursday with Secret Service agents, reporters and harried college administrators in preparing for Friday's arrival of Barbara Bush and Raisa Gorbachev.

But the earlier commotion over Mrs. Bush's selection as commencement speaker has all but disappeared.

Instead, many of the students, teachers and alumni trying to dodge television camera crews inside the enormous tent had a new gripe.

In the words of graduating senior Kelly Brown, 21: "Now we have this big circus and we just wanted a quiet graduation ceremony."

Graduation for the Class of 1990 at Wellesley, an oasis of brick towers and woody green meadows in this affluent suburb 10 miles west of Boston, will be anything but quiet.

That was guaranteed last month when about 150 of Wellesley's 2,200 students — signed — a petition complaining that Mrs. Bush had gained recognition through her husband's achievements. That, they complained contradicted the school's philosophy that women should stand on their own.

Mrs. Bush will now address the 600 graduating seniors with Mrs. Gorbachev at the Friday morning ceremony. The Gorbachevs arrived in the United States Wednesday night for the start of a four-day summit.

The two first ladies will speak for six minutes each. A phalanx of Secret Service agents has been on campus for five days. Wellesley security officials said the graduation tent, which will accommodate 5,500, was the biggest they have ever put up.

Gorbachev urges patience with Soviet reform efforts

WASHINGTON (AP) — Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev said Thursday his country cannot model its economic and political reforms on the American or West European systems but must continue a long and painful search for "our unique way."

In a luncheon address to about three dozen American academics, writers and entertainment figures, Gorbachev urged the West to be patient with Soviet reform efforts. He said his country was irreversibly committed to these changes.

"We'll have to travel down this road because we have no other choice, and the only thing to decide

is how quick we should, how rapid our progress should be," he said.

He urged the Western countries not to "apply pressure on the Soviet Union because it's enfeebled now."

He said "all the instability, all the changes are but an indication of the fundamental nature" — of his personality, or restructuring efforts.

Gorbachev, 45-minute address in the ornate main receiving room of the Soviet Embassy ranged across the spectrum of political and economic challenges facing his administration. But he spoke most pointedly of the difficulties of economic reform.

Baby Boomers' lament draws little sympathy

It appears that we are going to spend the 1990s listening to 76 million choruses of "Is That All There Is?" performed by the Baby Boomers. This is the latest bit from the long-running Boomer production, "The Never-Ending Saga of Us!"

The new song tells of the horrors suffered by a Boomer youth who just discovered that fate or Richard Nixon or somebody has committed an atrocity and caused him (or her) to get older than springtime.

Listening to this lament for the next 10 years is a thrill that I believe every one in the other generations, both older and younger, would be willing to skip. We have, after all, spent the past five or thereabouts listening to Boomers being full of themselves.

Now, the prospect of two or three more decades of hearing Boomers being sorry for themselves is an opportunity most would rank right alongside having bamboo splinters driven under their fingernails.

But the experience seems to be inevitable. Everything that has happened to this generation since its potty training has been blown up into a cataclysmic intergalactic event with a capital E. And then breathlessly, tirelessly reported, analyzed, researched, distillated and examined.

The monstrous cruelty of whatever has caused Boomers to turn 40 is now getting the same kind of big-screen treatment.

However, I fear Boomers are not likely to get very much sympathy for the current whining and carrying on from either the younger or older neighbors on the age scale.

The younger folks are as convinced as the Boomers were a few years ago that middle age will never, never happen to them, so they know none of them has any relevance to them personally. The members of the older generations remember that they passed 40 without much fuss, other than the usual whimpering and bravado.

telling themselves "life begins at 40," and sort of thing.

There is a big difference of it and, after a few months, most go on with the business of coping with middle-aged life.

Many older folks, I think, believe the Boomers have, over the years, overdosed on public attention and that this attitude may get them in right. This attitude may be too harsh.

There really is something unusual, other than the huge size, about this generation. I realize that is not an entirely original observation.

One observation, made early about this generation, is that television and convenience food made it so easy to eat that most could not distinguish the difference from adults at the toddler stage.

According to the expert, other human youngsters, clear back to cave-man days, had needed to get the help of parents or other adults to get mental and physical sustenance. Thus they

had to defer to grown-ups to survive.

But, he went on, as soon as Boomer babies could reach the refrigerator door and the TV dial, they could fill both belly and mind for themselves.

This is a scary thought even now. Particularly when you remember what was in those refrigerators and on those TVs back in those days. Those little rascals may have been the first humans to be sovereign states at 3, but early autonomy may have led many to graze through childhood on Twinkies and Pinkies.

Building on a Twinkie-Pinkie base would be enough to freeze anybody in permanent adolescence. Small wonder so many decided to dedicate their lives to rock 'n' roll and the worship of Elvis Presley. After Pinkie, Elvis must have seemed a reasonable alternative.

The labor makers tried to name my generation the "Silent Generation," but it never took. For one thing, most of the members of it know, as unsilent as anybody on earth. For another, we didn't think of adolescence as such hot stuff. Our main aim was to get married as fast as possible and get into adulthood where the big payoffs were. Hooy boy.

The people younger than Boomers have been called the Baby Busters and the Reagan generation, but neither of those tags is sticking, either. In some respects, they are going to be living in a world as old and not expecting too much.

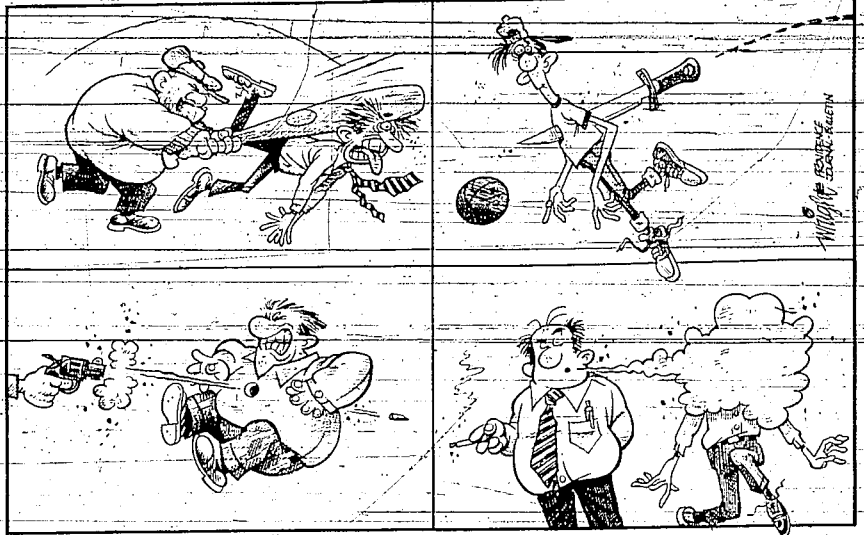
That may be for the best. The Boomers now wailing and moaning around the age of 40 are, if they've experienced with parenthood yet, the very fathers and mothers of the under-20 boom.

About quarter-way into the next century, the under-20 boom is going to have to wrestle with some unique experiences itself. For example, if the Boomers' chronic childhood proves to be truly incubable, one day their kids are going to be living in a world populated with large numbers of octogenarian Peter Pans. Another shudder-making thought.

However, there is a bright side to this grim sociology for non-Boomers on both sides. We older folks will be dead by then, thank you very much. And the younger folks will be comforted by recalling that in their childhood there was no Pinkie Lee.

True, there was Peewee Herman, but then into each generation some rain must fall.

U.S. to retain contact with PLO

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House on Thursday rebuffed Israel's plea to end all contacts with the Palestine Liberation Organization after an attempted beachfront attack on Israeli civilians. But the White House condemned the action as a "cowardly attempt to target innocent people."

"We are deeply concerned about the responsibility for this attack and we are looking into it," said White House press secretary Marlin Fitzwater said about Wednesday's foiled attack on beaches south of Tel Aviv by seaborne Palestinian guerrillas loyal to PLO official, PLO chief Yasser Arafat said in Baghdad — the PLO was not responsible for the attack and that he does not have the authority to take action against the PLO official whose guerrillas claimed responsibility, even if he wanted to.

He said only the PLO Council could test the official. Muhammad Abbas, also known as Abu Abbas, an Arafat loyalist and member of the PLO Executive Committee who planned the 1985 hijacking of the Italian cruise ship Achille Lauro.

Fitzwater told reporters: "We don't have any conclusions at this point. We are investigating this matter and reviewing all the information we can gather on it. We are very concerned about what the ramifications might be but at this point we do not want to express any conclusions."

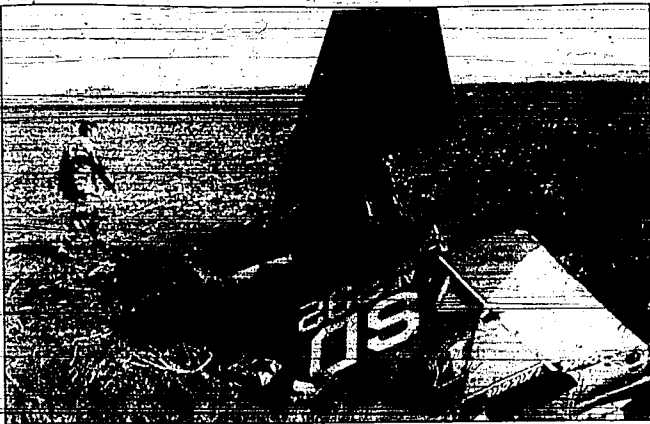
Asked if continued discussions with the PLO was under review in light of the fact that the administration has conditioned such

talks on PLO renunciation of terrorism, Fitzwater said, "No, not at this point."

He said the United States first wants to investigate the matter and see who is responsible.

"President Bush condemns the terrorist attack yesterday in Israel and is outraged by what appears to be a cowardly attempt to target innocent people," Fitzwater said in a prepared statement.

On Wednesday, State Department spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler said it was too early to say whether the attack would affect the 17-month dialogue with the PLO on ways to peace talks started between Israel and Palestinians, but added that "we would view this as a very serious matter."



Guard: Crash probably will not alter policy on flights for public

SPENCER, Iowa (AP) — The collision of two Air National Guard fighter jets while one was carrying a newspaper editor probably will not change Guard policy on public relations flights, a spokesman said Thursday.

But the South Dakota Air Guard will not be able to take any more civilians aloft for a while because one of the A-7s that crashed Wednesday over northwestern Iowa was the Guard's only two-seater, Capt. Reid Christopherson, Guard executive officer, said in Sioux Falls, S.D.

"At the national level, I don't anticipate and am not aware of any serious, why it should change the way that program's administered," Christopherson said.

The pilots of both planes and Ward-Bushee, executive editor of the Sioux Falls (S.D.) Argus Leader, ejected and parachuted to the ground.

The pilots were released from a

Spencer hospital after treatment of minor injuries.

Bushee, who was invited to join the flight as part of the Guard's public relations program, was listed in fair condition at McKennan Hospital in Sioux Falls. The hospital would not comment on the extent of Bushee's injuries or when he would be released.

Christopherson said taking civilians on a flight is a lengthy process that goes through the public affairs office at the Pentagon. An editorial by Bushee in August that criticized operational procedures did not affect that decision, he said.

Bushee gave his newspaper an account of his flight with Maj. Duncan Keirnes, of Sioux Falls, saying it started smoothly and that they later went into a dogfight exercise with another jet. Then the two planes collided.

"Duncan hit the ejector button as soon as we hit," he said, "sending me exploding through the canopy and him following a second later. Then everything came apart. It was just a ball-of-fire. Duncan later told me that if he had waited a couple of seconds longer to eject, we would have been crispy critters."

"It was just a surreal scene. I was floating up in the air and my flight suit was burning like a torch. My

first thought was, 'I'll never see my wife and kids again. This is it.'

"Pieces of the plane were going by. Flames were all over me. I couldn't remember where the cord was to open the parachute, but it went open automatically."

Christopherson said the unit's guest-ride program is part of the Guard's national public relations program.

"We probably do two to four of these a year," he said. "The program will probably continue," he said. "I don't see any reason why it shouldn't."

Christopherson said neither of the pilots faced disciplinary action and both could continue to fly military missions.

"Any restrictions would be strictly limited to medical decisions," he said. "I don't see any reason why they wouldn't be returned to flying status."

Keirnes and the other pilot, Maj. Gregory Gore of Collierville, Tenn., are pilots for civilian air lines, but Christopherson declined to say which ones.

The Guard would not release names of two other pilots flying in the same exercise and would not permit interviews with any pilots.

Christopherson said the accident was the first since the South Dakota Air National Guard unit began flying the A-7s in 1977 and that the Guard last lost a plane in 1974.

Marcos falls ill during hearing

NEW YORK (AP) — Former Philippines first lady Imelda Marcos collapsed and coughed up blood Thursday during her federal racketeering trial and was taken by ambulance to a hospital.

Mrs. Marcos, who twice in the last month had fainted ill with high blood pressure, was carried out on a stretcher, an oxygen mask on her face, and was taken to New York Hospital.

Doctors said she was being admitted to the hospital for an indefinite period and her condition was being evaluated. Mrs. Marcos, 60, was listed as stable and was in no immediate danger of dying, said Dr. David Case, an internist who has been treating Mrs. Marcos for high blood.

The possible causes were numerous, but it was not thought to be related to the blood pressure problem, said Case.

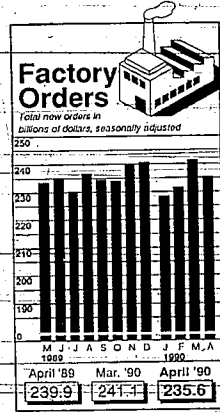

Manufacturing seen slumping in new report

WASHINGTON (AP) — Orders to U.S. factories slumped 2.3 percent in April, helping to push orders for the year so far down 2 percent, the government said Thursday in a report showing further evidence of a slow manufacturing economy.

"Basically, it shows the manufacturing sector is still dead in the water," said Evelina Tainer, senior domestic economist with the First National Bank of Chicago. "It's just not going anywhere."

The Commerce Department said orders to factories for both durable and nondurable manufactured goods totaled a seasonally adjusted \$235.6 billion. That followed gains of 4 percent in March and 1.8 percent in February.

Despite the gains, the April decline and a 5.5 percent drop in January means factory orders have fallen 2 percent in the year's first four months. And, the department said, orders have been relatively flat since the beginning of 1989.

The January decline was the steepest since a 7 percent plunge in December 1974.

Factory orders are a key economic barometer of manufacturing industry for production. A decrease in orders may forecast a slump in that sector and layoffs in the future.

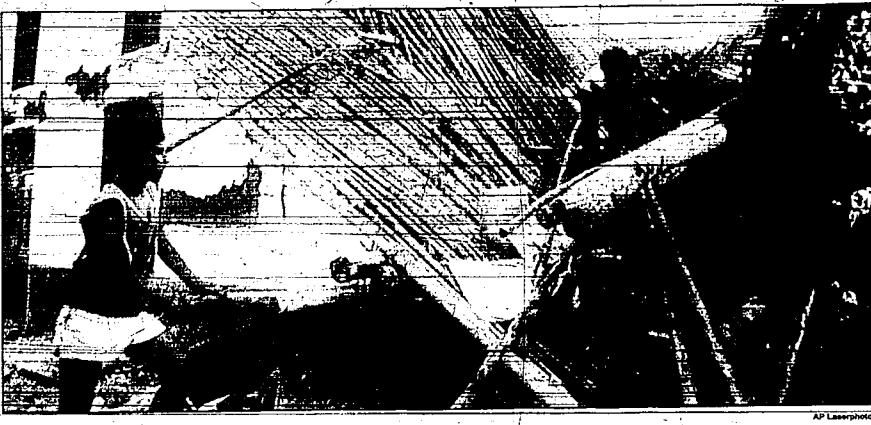

E. Germany given powers over elite

EAST-BERLIN (AP) — East German lawmakers Thursday gave the government broad powers to seize land, houses and businesses controlled by the privileged elite of the old Communist regime.

The action freezes the party's vast holdings — amassed after it came to power after World War II — just four weeks before the nation merges its economy with West Germany's and begins shifting state property to the private sector.

Lawmakers also voted to remove the old Communist insignia, a hammer and drafting compass, from state buildings.

The government of Prime Minister Lothar de Maiziere had asked Parliament to let him form a commission that would have the power to wrest away the holdings of the many organizations that existed under the former government.

De Maiziere is to form the commission in the coming days, after which all land, buildings and enterprises owned by the Communists would be held in trust pending an investigation of their value and legitimacy.

The new law also gives the commission power to interrogate witnesses, search houses and seize evidence during its investigation.

The law calls for a system to be set up under which the government could reclaim the property in the public interest, even if the property is in other countries.

The proposal came as the young democratic government grapples with the monumental task of converting state-owned property to private ownership, a prerequisite to unification with West Germany.

The German states are to merge their economies and social institutions on July 2, when West German currency will become the currency of East Germany.

The independent property commission is to report its findings to Parliament just two days before the economic union becomes official.

Lawmaker Gregor Gysi, leader of the reconstituted Communist Party that now supports a form of democratic socialism, sharply criticized the proposal during a bitter nine-hour Parliament session.

"They want all opposition eliminated," said Gysi, whose party is now called the Party of Democratic Socialism. "That is the goal and nothing else."

Richard Schroeder, leader of the Social Democratic lawmakers in Parliament, said the proposal is aimed at shedding light on who owns what in the country.

Aftershocks jolt Europe after deadly quake

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — A strong aftershock rocked Romania, Bulgaria and the Soviet republic of Moldavia before dawn Thursday, causing people to flee into the streets a day after a major earthquake killed at least 14 people.

The 3 a.m. aftershock was the strongest of about 100 recorded after Wednesday's quake, which was felt from Moscow to Istanbul and caused serious structural damage to buildings in Romania and Bulgaria, officials said.

Romania's Ministry of Health reported nine people were killed in Wednesday's quake and 994 people injured. A ministry spokesman said 202 required hospitalization. The tremor also killed one person in Bulgaria and four in southern Moldavia.

There were no reports of casualties Thursday.

The Bulgarian news agency BTA said that after Wednesday's quake, the aftershock was centered in the Carpathian Mountain region of Vrancea, in northern Romania.

The National Earthquake Information Center in Golden, Colo., measured Wednesday's quake at 6.3 on the Richter scale and Thursday's aftershock at 5.9.

In Moldavia, which borders Romania, the quake left four people dead and 30 injured but caused little structural damage, the chairman of the national legislature said.

Soviet Chairman Anatoly Lukyanov said in Moscow that one person died in Moldavia.

Severely damaged were the mayor's house, a theater, a medical center, the national bank and a building with 60 apartments in the county capital of Focsani, it said.

In northern Bulgaria, thousands of people frightened by the aftershock reportedly spent the night in the street, or fled their cities.

Cities and villages on the Danube River, including Ruse, Silistra and Vratsiya, were panic-stricken, BTA said.

It said thousands of people milled around city streets all night, or fled in their cars. The city of Silistra has appealed for aid, saying it urgently needed glass, cement, bricks and tiles to repair damaged homes, schools, kindergartens and the lone hospital, the agency said.

In Bucharest, people fled into the streets and stood in small groups under dim lights. In the Bucharest Hotel, about a dozen people remained in the lobby, frightened to go upstairs.

Dumitru Enescu, director of Romania's Earth Physics Institute, told Rompress 100 aftershocks were recorded in the first 26 hours after Wednesday's quake, some as high as 4 on the Richter scale.

Damage reports from Wednesday's quake continued to filter into the capital.

Soviets protest salmon poaching

MOSCOW (AP) — Moscow has protested illegal Japanese fishing in Soviet waters and wants compensation for millions of dollars in economic damage, a Foreign Ministry spokesman said Thursday.

The ministry delivered a protest note to the Japanese Embassy in Moscow complaining of systematic "crude violations" of fishing treaties to the point that "the agreements themselves are threatened."

Spokesman Vadim P. Perfilov said, "Illegal fishing exhausts stock reserves, costing the Soviet Union millions of dollars. Perfliv told reporters. He said the illegal fishing must be stopped and the damage compensated."

In Tokyo, Soviet diplomatic sources said a protest was addressed to North Korea as well concerning the illegal salmon fishing in Soviet-claimed waters of the north Pacific.

It referred to the seizure of six Japanese fishing boats May 9-13 off Soviet-held Sakhalin island, said the diplomats, who spoke on condition of anonymity. The boats and their crews were released soon after the seizures.

The protest did not mention the highly publicized seizures May 19-22 of 10 North Korean vessels, manned mostly by Japanese fishermen, that were also found operating illegally in Soviet waters.

Newsman recalls mid-air collision

EDITOR'S NOTE: Ward Bushee, executive editor of the *Siox Falls Argus Leader*, was in a *South Dakota Air National Guard A-7 fighter jet when it collided with another A-7 over northwest Iowa. He gave his newspaper this account of his flight with Maj. Duncan Keirnes, of Sioux Falls, and the crash.*

SIoux FALLS, S.D. (AP) — It was a great day for flying. My wife, my 5-year-old son and young daughter watched from the runway as we took off. I've always been scared to fly. But the plane takeoff was so smooth. I was feeling comfortable and was talking to Duncan much of the way. We flew in formation to the tanker and practiced fueling in air. Everything was going so smoothly. I handed the plane for a couple of minutes. Then Duncan took control for good. We took it for a roll. We went up and did some G-force testing to see how I would react. Then he brought the squadron back together and began setting up for combat exercises. We did the first exercise. It was pure Top Gun... We were moving so fast — I saw Duncan's head swinging around looking at the other planes. It was very aggressive.


We were engaged in a dogfight with another plane and we were the aggressor. Suddenly, it got turned around and another pilot was the aggressor. Duncan told me on his radio, "Now we're on defense." We began going around with Greg Gore, the other pilot, in pursuit of us. I noticed way down to the left of what I could see that Gore's plane was coming up in an arch towards us. Duncan suddenly pointed the nose higher and seemed to be backing off the fighter who was fixed on Gore coming at us. The pilots later said they were trying to exercise a scissor maneuver. Those planes go so fast, a mere second makes such a difference. I said to myself, "There isn't any danger. These guys are too good of pilots. We won't collide." Then it became obvious he was going to hit us. I saw the whites of the other pilot's eyes.

We went up but I think we took the hit low. He hit us from underneath towards the tail section. Gore said later he thought he was going to take it right in his canopy and he would have died instantly. Duncan hit the ejector button as soon as we hit, sending me expanding through the canopy and him following a second later. Then everything came apart. It was just a ball of flame. Duncan later told me that if he had waited a couple of seconds longer to eject, we would have been crispy critters. It was just a surreal scene. I was floating up in the air and my flight suit was burning like a torch. My

first thought was, "I'll never see my wife and kids again. This is it." Pieces of the plane were going by. Flames were all over me. I couldn't remember where the cord was to open the parachute, but it went open automatically. It was like one of those movies. The plane and debris were spiraling down below me in flames. Ringlings may finally be buried

SARASOTA, Fla. (AP) — More than 50 years after their deaths, circus magnate John Ringling and his wife, Mable, may be on their way to a final resting place. The 2nd District Court of Appeal in Lakeland on Wednesday upheld a judge's order last year allowing burial of the Ringlings at the Sarasota art museum that bears their name.

Sarasota was the winter home of the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus, and the Ringlings were benefactors of the museum. Ringling died in 1936, seven years after his wife. "It means we're prepared to move forward with the appropriate memorial," said lawyer Lamar Matthews. Matthews represents Ringling's

nephew Henry Ringling North in his quest to have the couple buried at the museum alongside North's mother, Ida North, who was Ringling's sister. But Henry, a grandnephew of Ringling, had opposed burying Mrs. North with the Ringlings because she had nothing to do with the circus.

Because of the dispute, Mrs. North's body has been in storage at Sarasota funeral home since her death in 1950. North had the Ringlings' bodies moved in 1987 from Fairview, N.J., to crypts at a cemetery in nearby Port Charlotte. Back and other relatives had taken the burial dispute into court. Family discord dates back over decades.

2 Twin Falls women jailed on drug charges

TWIN FALLS — Two women charged with conspiring to deliver a controlled substance — cocaine — were in the Twin Falls County jail on Thursday on \$100,000 bond each.

Christina Ann Salinas, 27, and Cindy Campbell, also known as Cindy Zahn, 32, of Twin Falls, both appeared Thursday before 5th District Magistrate Judge R. Michael Redman, who set their bond.

A Nevada state patrol officer stopped a man driving a car with a hanging-tail pipe this week, charging documents say. In searching the car, he found a suitcase carrying cocaine in the trunk.

The driver was arraigned and released to a federal drug enforcement agent, who brought him to Twin Falls, papers say.

The man was monitored and his phones were tapped, and he called a woman who put him in touch with another woman who was going to package the cocaine for other dealers, papers say.

Both women were arrested as they came to the man's residence on Wednesday, papers say.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter said the men does not face charges here, and that a kilo of cocaine was involved in the transaction.

Erkins files lawsuit against lawyer over mushroom farm

BOISE — Another lawsuit over a gourmet mushroom farm north of Bliss was recently filed, this time against a tax lawyer who represented the farm.

Robert Erkins, the president of Bliss Valley Foods Inc., says former Twin Falls lawyer Thomas G. Walker Jr.'s actions in combination with the conduct of the bank financing the farm, "nearly caused the destruction of Bliss Valley's business."

Erkins, Walker and the farm's other investors last year won a \$5.6 million verdict against the farm's bank, West One Bank. Erkins is now asking for \$3 million in actual damages, plus punitive damages, from Walker.

Walker declined comment on the lawsuit, and his attorney, Stan Welsh of Boise, did not return a phone call Tuesday. The lawsuit was filed in Ada County.

Walker recently lost a \$411,000 judgment over a failed tax shelter he organized in the early 1980s. That lawsuit was filed by local surgeon and state Senate candidate Russell Newcomb.

Newcomb claimed Walker improperly organized and operated the tax shelter, which purportedly hired professionals and leased them back to their own practices.

Hansen resident charged for verbal, armed threats

HANSEN — A rural Hansen resident has been charged with threatening a man both verbally and with a handgun, according to court documents.

Ricky Allen Couter, 41, appeared before 5th District Magistrate Judge R. Michael Redman Thursday on a charge of felony aggravated assault. Redman set Couter's bail at \$2,500, which Couter posted.

According to the charging documents, a man reported to the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office that at 10:45 p.m. Tuesday he was driving south on Rock Creek Road behind a pickup that was "driving very erratically and at various speeds."

The pickup pulled over and he passed it, but the pickup followed him and rammed in to the back of his vehicle, documents say. He pulled over, and the driver of the pickup approached him, shouting and holding a handgun. "Quit following me, and get back in your car or I will blow your head off," documents say.

Man killed in auto crash after apparent blowout

SEATTLE — John H. Uno, pictured in last Sunday's Times-News coverage of the Minidoka relocation camp memorial dedication, was killed in an auto accident while returning to his home in Seattle.

Uno, 65, was driving a red and yellow Chevrolet van on I-5 near Blaine, Ore., Sunday when a tire blowout apparently sent the van into the median, where it flipped, killing Uno, his brother, Toshiichi "Jack," and Jack's wife, Mieko Uno, all of Seattle.

John Uno's wife, Pat, was treated for injuries and his home name, said Uno's nephew, Steve Tamura.

Both John and Jack Uno were imprisoned at the Hunt camp during World War II and served in the color guard for Saturday's ceremony.

Minidoka County men convicted of drug charges

BOISE — After a trial of nearly two weeks, a federal court jury has convicted three Minidoka County men on federal drug charges.

A jury of 10 women and two men deliberated about three hours Thursday before returning guilty verdicts against all three: U.S. District Court Judge Edward Lodge ordered pre-sentence investigations and set sentencing for Aug. 13 at 9:30 a.m.

This week's convictions bring to seven the total number of men found guilty of federal

drug trafficking charges in a lengthy multi-agency investigation.

Salvador Rios, 19, and Gerald Rex Draper Jr., 30, both of Paul, and Rene Perales, 33, Rupert, all were convicted of conspiracy and selling cocaine. In addition, Perales was convicted on charges that he used telephone facilities to communicate.

A fourth man arrested with others in January, Ruben Zamora, 26, of Burley, was charged separately and pleaded guilty in April to conspiracy to sell cocaine. He will be sentenced in July.

And a fifth man originally charged in the case, Thomas A. Rudy, 50, a Burley

businessman, pleaded guilty earlier and testified against the others at trial. Federal officials said Rudy is to be sentenced later.

Testimony opened May 21. Much of the Justice Department's case consisted of videotapes and recordings made by undercover investigators. In his closing argument to the jury Wednesday afternoon, Assistant U.S. Attorney Monte Stiles urged jurors to remember what the recordings showed.

The trial concludes the second chapter of a cooperative investigation among 15 federal, state and local law enforcement agencies that led to two other convictions.

The first phase of the investigation led to the confiscation of more than 3 kilograms — about 7 pounds — of nearly pure cocaine at the Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional Airport in what authorities at the time called the largest cocaine seizure in Idaho history.

Following that seizure, Jose Ramon Zamora, a Rupert potato seed dealer and Ruben Zamora's uncle, and Juan Flores Ramirez of Burley were indicted and pleaded guilty to cocaine trafficking charges.

Previous court testimony and statements by federal authorities pointed to Rudy and the elder Zamora as heads of the ring.

Group forms to fight Channel One program in Twin Falls schools

TWIN FALLS — A local group says it is opposed to a Tennessee company's offer to trade television equipment and a news program for the right to show commercials to Twin Falls school kids.

"We want our children to be educated, not advertised to," said Kara Kral, spokeswoman for the newly formed Parents Against Selling our Schoolchildren to Corporations. The organization has about a dozen members.

The Twin Falls School District is considering an offer by Whittle Communications of Nashville, Tenn., to give the district \$150,000 in satellite dishes, television sets and VCRs, and a daily 12-minute broadcast called Channel One geared towards teen-agers.

In exchange, it wants to show two minutes of sneakier and candy commercials to children.

Kral said there is a relationship of trust that exists between parents and the school

system when parents send their children to school.

"Were the district to accept Whittle's offer, it would be a breach of trust," she said.

Two minutes of commercials every day adds up to about a full day of school over the course of the year, she said.

"Our children as a demographic group would be turned over to Whittle Communications," she said.

Kral recommends that the district buy the equipment if it is necessary so the district can control its curriculum.

Under the proposed contract, Whittle would determine the curriculum," she said.

Kral said the group will meet at 7 p.m. on Thursday at 138 Second Ave. E. People who want to join the group can call Kral at 734-9726.

"Because this is a district decision, it is imperative that parents and other interested parties make their wishes known to the school board by telephone and letter before the next board meeting June 19," she said.

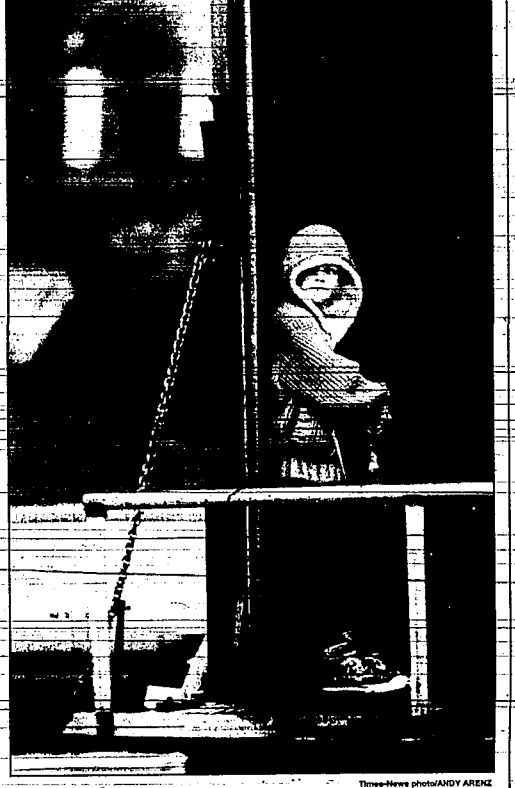
Television won't replace active, hands-on practice, Hodge said, but is convenient

County canvass changes Noh-Toolson race totals

TWIN FALLS — County officials have discovered mistakes in vote tallies released after last week's primary election, but the recount doesn't change the outcome of any race.

The errors were found during routine canvassing of the votes, Twin Falls County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman, said Thursday.

"That's what a canvass is for," he said. "It doesn't change anything — people were in a hurry."

County officials say it's not unusual for the canvass to detect mathematical errors that might change vote tallies by a

few numbers. But last week, the second count showed five-term state Sen. Laird Noh beat challenger William Toolson by a much narrower margin in the Republican Senate District 23 primary than election night totals indicated.

Instead of receiving 62 percent of the vote as previously reported, Noh won 56 percent, or 3,770 of the 6,673 ballots cast. Toolson received 2,903 votes.

Unofficial totals released on election night by the county clerk's office showed Noh received 4,718 votes and Toolson 2,903.

"Those were given to you as completely unofficial," Hempleman said.

The mistake was probably a transposition of numbers during a hectic election night tally, he said.

Such mathematical errors won't be possible after the county switches to new voting machines, Hempleman said. The new machines, which will be on line in time for the November general elections, will depend upon a computer to do the counting.

The vote canvass also uncovered a miscout in the state auditor's race.

Hempleman said Eldon C. Golightly actually received 921 votes in Twin Falls County, not 1,211 votes as originally reported.

Again, the inaccurate tally did not affect the outcome of the race. Golightly placed third in a three-way Republican primary. Richard V. Williams remains the winner in Twin Falls County and statewide.

Magic Valley water users to see little impact from Sho-Ban pact

TWIN FALLS — Any negative impact on the Magic Valley of a water rights agreement among Idaho, the federal government, the Shoshone-Bannock Indian Tribes and other Snake River water users would likely be too small to measure, state officials said Thursday.

The Fort Hall Indian Water Rights Agreement reached last month would establish the oldest water right in the state and would increase the amount of water available to the eastern Idaho reservation by about 250,000 acre feet per year.

An acre foot is the amount of water needed to cover one acre with one foot of water — 325,851 gallons.

committee of upper-Snake River water users and the federal government. It established the reservation's water right at 581,031 acre feet of water per year upstream for Hells Canyon.

The Fort Hall water right priority date would be 1867, the same date the reservation was established, and is supported by the Winters Doctrine.

"That doctrine relies on a 1908 Supreme Court ruling that all federal reservations include an implied water right sufficient for the present and future needs to fulfill the purpose for which the reservation was established."

"The actual amount of water needed on the reservation is based on a calculation known as 'practical irrigable acreage,'" Strong said.

The agreement also grants about 47,000 acre feet of storage in the American Falls Reservoir and about 84,000 acre feet of storage in the Palisades Reservoir.

The water in the Palisades Reservoir may be rented out anywhere within Idaho above Milner Dam. The water in American Falls Reservoir

Fusion donation given by U of U foundation

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A \$500,000 contribution to the National Cold Fusion Institute, which earlier was credited to an anonymous donor, was given by the University of Utah Research Foundation, a television station has reported.

Institute officials had said that a donor who requested anonymity had given the money to the research center, established to pursue cold fusion research pioneered in the school's chemistry department.

The Utah Legislature appropriated \$5 million to fund the institute and legal fees related to patent applications on the fusion experiments that chemist B. Stanley Pons and Martin Fleischmann unveiled in March 1989.

Since then, however, institute officials have solicited private companies for money to continue research into the process, which has been a subject of widespread scientific skepticism in the scientific community.

The nonprofit foundation collects money from fund leases, royalties and rental income and donates it to the university president, who routinely returns it to the research projects, KSL-TV reported Thursday.

Idaho car insurance inexpensive, but firms' profits among highest

BOISE (AP) — Although Idaho automobile insurance rates are among the lowest in the nation, insurance companies report operating profits in the state are among the highest.

In 1988, the average premium for auto insurance in Idaho was \$357, the Department of Insurance reported in a quarterly publication. The 1987 premium averaged \$346.

That placed Idaho 46th in 1988, with only the states of North Dakota, Tennessee, South Dakota, Iowa and Alabama reporting lower rates, the agency said.

But operating profits for insurance companies in Idaho averaged 6.4 percent in 1987 and 7.5 percent in 1988, ranking the state fifth in 1987 and fourth in 1988.

The national average premium for car insurance in 1988 was almost \$518, the agency said.

Among the nine Western states, Idaho ranked ninth in premium cost in 1987 and 10th in 1988, the Insurance agency said. On the basis of profits, Idaho ranked third, behind Wyoming and Montana.

Test-tube tigers buoy hope for species

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Zoo officials here have announced the birth of the world's first test-tube tigers and said in-vitro fertilization could help preserve the endangered tiger population as well as other species.

Dr. Lee Simmons said two yellow tiger cubs and one white male were delivered by Caesarian section on April 27 at Omaha's Henry Dooley Zoo to the surrogate mother, a 9½-year-old Siberian tiger named Nicole.

The parents of the three cubs were a white Bengal tiger and two Bengal-tiger mothers, Simmons said.

The white male cub died shortly after birth because of respiratory complications unrelated to the in-vitro fertilization. But the other two yellow-and-brown striped cubs, a male and a female, are strong and healthy and being hand-reared at the Omaha zoo, Simmons said.

The births mean preserving an endangered species is possible and helps the cause of researchers and zoos, Simmons said.

"For some of the conservationists, research has been a four-letter word," Simmons said.

Seeing the two "cuddly little cubs can help show that maybe research isn't such a bad thing," he said.

Three zoos — Dooley's National Zoological Park in Washington, D.C., and the Minnesota Zoological Gardens in Minneapolis — have collaborated on the project for more than 10 years.

The in-vitro techniques have been used successfully in humans and in farm animals. Research has been slow in adapting the techniques to wild animals, Simmons said.

Research has focused on tigers because at least three of the eight remaining tiger subspecies have become extinct in the past 20 years and only 50 tigers remain in the critically endangered South China subspecies, Simmons said.

The program began with a National Zoo research program using the techniques on domestic cats. It is aimed at ultimately taking the technology and techniques into the wild, Simmons said.

He outlined a scenario that begins with frozen embryos of tigers in captivity in Omaha or other zoos.

"We go into the wild in India and Nepal and capture a female for a short time," he said.

During that time, scientists would induce ovulation and collect the tiger's eggs, he said. They also would transfer the frozen embryos to the wild tiger and turn her loose.

"About 110 days later, she would deliver cubs that she would raise in the wild," Simmons said. "They (the cubs) would expand and enhance the gene pool."

Expanding the gene pool is important as the populations of endangered animals decrease, Simmons said.

"As the habitats shrink and become more isolated, the wild populations 'fall prey to inbreeding,'" Simmons said.

The dwindling habitat means that the tigers "may still be running free in a forest, but they have unfortunately become just as captive as animals in the zoo," he said.

The techniques can help enhance the survival of the zoo captives and the wild captives, Simmons said.

The program in the wild still is years away as technology develops to make the mobile in-

Judge refuses to dismiss murder charge

BLACKFOOT (AP) — A 7th District judge has refused to dismiss a first-degree murder charge against a man accused of slaying the death of a teen-age girl more than a quarter-century ago.

Judge James Herndon has denied the request of John Hevevah Jr. to move his trial for the slaying of Susan Hansen to another county, despite defense claims that publicity surrounding the Bingham County case would make it difficult to empanel an impartial jury.

But Herndon took under advisement a second defense motion to dismiss the case on grounds that the location of the murder was not known.

Hevevah, 44, was arrested last fall after a new computerized fingerprinting analysis identified him as the man in a photograph of the rearview mirror of the car the 16-year-old murder victim was driving when she disappeared in October 1964.

He pleaded innocent to the charges. This winter, he is scheduled to stand trial on Aug. 21.

Miss Hansen disappeared after she left her Blackfoot home to go grocery shopping. Her body was discovered four weeks later, floating in Spring Creek on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation.

Bingham County Public Defender David Parmenter sought dismissal of the case on grounds that evidence from the crime had not been preserved and there was an unacceptable delay in issuing the indictment against Hevevah.

But Prosecutor Thomas Moss said data on the case had been retained despite a move to a new courthouse and several changes of administration in the Police Department.

In addition, the judge said that even though the crime occurred more than 25 years ago, there was no "pre-indictment delay" because the charge was filed as soon as there was enough evidence to support it.

Herndon discounted the issue of pretrial publicity, saying other cases had received more notoriety

No new precautions in use after stabbing

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The Mormon Church does not plan to order additional precautions to protect its missionaries in Ireland in the wake of Sunday's stabbing death of a missionary from Payson, Utah.

Missionaries routinely are required to stay with a companion and in their assigned proselyting areas. But church officials said no extraordinary measures will be taken in Ireland.

"The missionaries develop a great love for the Irish people," said Maxwell, a member of the church's Council of the Twelve. "I don't see this affecting the work."

Elder Maxwell spoke Thursday morning at Salt Lake City International airport where a Delta

irlines flight returned the body of Gale Stanley Critchfield.

The 20-year-old missionary died in Dublin, Ireland, Sunday night after being stabbed in the heart.

Maxwell said the 18-year-old Irishman has been charged with the slaying.

Church officials said they have no reason to believe the killing was anything more than a random, unprovoked attack.

Maxwell said he appreciated the pioneer spirit of the Critchfield family in their "partaking of the bitter cup without becoming bitter. Tragedy is often opportunity..."

may be rented out anywhere in Idaho. The rest of the Indian water right must be used on the reservation.

The American Falls water could be used in a variety of ways below Miler Dam, though it could only be rented to a single party or purpose.

If, for example, it is rented to irrigators it could not also be used to generate power or for minimum stream flows. "But by the nature of water transport it could in fact fulfill all those functions."

Potential customers for that water include Idaho Power Co. If it were to rent all of the 47,000 acre feet, that water could have a potential worth of \$26 per acre foot by the time it ran through all of the utility's power dams at the most critical time in the summer, or a total of \$1,175,000.

An acre foot of water normally sells for about \$2.75. If the 47,000 acre feet were released at a constant rate it would flow at less than 100 cubic feet per second.

Other possible candidates for the rented water include the Bonneville

Power Administration, which in conjunction with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service might be interested in the water as flushing flow in the water to flush silt and steelhead to the ocean.

But before the agreement becomes a reality it first must be ratified by the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes, the Idaho Legislature and Congress.

The agreement also will be heard in 5th District Court in Twin Falls, giving water users who feel their rights may be affected an opportunity to comment.

If the agreement is adopted by all parties, it will mean the end of water rights disputes between the state, water users and the reservation, Strong said.

The Water Resources Board will accept comments on the agreement until June 15. They should be mailed to the Idaho Water Resources Board, St. Louis, Mo. 83720.

Firm charged with illegal disposal of hazardous waste, napalm

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A neighborhood hazardous waste site that melted the shoe soles of a passerby and housed surplus napalm bombs represents one of the worst known cases of environmental abuse, Attorney General Richard Thornburgh said Thursday.

A 12-count indictment alleges Steven F. Self of Fallbrook, Calif., and his defunct Ekotek Inc., knowingly ignored federal environmental laws by illegally burning, dumping and storing millions of gallons of hazardous and toxic chemicals.

"An environmental crime is like a robbery, or assault against all of us," said Thornburgh, here to announce the first federal felony prosecution of environmental crime in Utah and to warn that

"environmental profiteers" will not go unpunished.

The indictment alleges Ekotek "duped environmentally conscious businesses into believing that waste materials were being properly disposed of."

Before Ekotek was shut down by state regulators in October 1987, residents of nearby homes complained of malodorous "plumes of black smoke" coming from the plant.

Prosecutors said a 17-year-old boy reported his shoe began to "bubble and disintegrate" after accidentally stepping in a puddle while running by the site.

Utah health officials trying to regulate the company were "deceived" numerous times by company officers, who sidestepped

numerous efforts to enforce cleanup orders.

"This case has a disturbing mixture of fraud and abuse," said U.S. Attorney DeBenson. "It's bad enough that these facts show a flagrant disregard for the environment and public safety, but it's even worse because of the fraud—allegations which show an active scheme to falsify documents and misrepresent the facts."

The indictment alleges conspirators to violate the clean air, water and resources conservation and recovery acts and involves charges that Self and others illegally burned and discharged solvents, oils, grease and contaminated runoff. They concealed the violations by falsifying manifests and logs.

"This case presents perhaps the most serious type of environmental misconduct,"

said Thornburgh, who added the Justice Department was committed to coming after those who ignore environmental safeguards.

"The signal is clear, especially to environmental profiteers seeking to improperly cash in on the growing waste-handling business," he said. "That signal is: 'If you risk going to jail if you intentionally cut corners.'"

While in operation, Ekotek discharged into the public sewer system approximately 10,000 gallons of industrial-process wastewater per day from its oil-recycling operations, the indictment said.

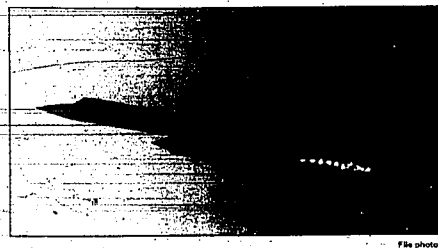
Company vice president Steven F. Miller pleaded guilty Wednesday to three felony charges of conspiracy and violations of federal environmental laws.

Miller, who agreed to testify against Self and cooperate with cleanup officials in exchange for his plea, faces up to 13 years in prison and a fine of up to \$750,000. He remains free on his own recognizance.

If convicted on all charges, Self and the company may be fined up to \$24 million and Self would face a prison term of up to 45 years.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Peter McGrath of the Justice Department's Environmental Crimes Section said the "potential penalties are among the largest ever" for environmental misdeeds.

Miller's California attorney, Barbara Cauffman, said her client would not comment before his sentencing July 31.

Utah base may receive retired SR-71 spy jet

HILL AIR FORCE BASE, Utah (AP) — The Hill Air Force Base Museum may be getting an out-of-commission SR-71 Blackbird spy plane to add to its display of historic aircraft.

Bob Lockwood, an aide for Sen. Orrin Hatch, said his boss was told by the Air Force in April that the museum could have one of the sleek, retired reconnaissance planes.

Now it's up to the museum to move the plane from California's Beale Air Force Base, he said. The issue is the cost and means of transportation, Lockwood added.

However, Hill spokesman Len Barry said it's up to the main Air Force museum at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base, Ohio, to decide if the Hill gets a Blackbird.

"We have no confirmation," he said.

Wright-Patterson museum's director, Dick Upstrom, said the decision is to be made at some high level at Air Force headquarters.

Upstrom said the main museum, which normally makes such decisions, recommended that Hill

receive one of 14 remaining unflyable SR-71s. He said 29 museums applied.

The Air Force can't appropriate money to move the Blackbirds, Upstrom said.

If Hill were to get a Blackbird, Barry said Wednesday, it would study means of moving it. One way would be to take it apart for shipment in a C-5 transport airplane.

The SR-71 was retired by the Air Force early this year. It remains the world's fastest jet aircraft, capable of flying three times the speed of sound.

Staff Sgt. Kelly Godbey, a spokesman at the Beale air base, wasn't aware of the Air Force making an SR-71 available to the Hill.

"He said Beale has two left, and at least one is staying at the Beale museum.

Neither airplane will fly again, Godbey said. They were used for spare parts for Beale's operational SR-71s.

"Both of them are being put back together," Godbey said.

Soldier's widow may finally put his remains to rest

ONTARIO, Calif. (AP) — Forty years after Army 1st Lt. Jack J. Saunders shipped out for Korea, his remains may finally be headed home.

On Memorial Day, North Korea turned over remains they identified as five captured GIs who died in prison camps during the Korean War. One of the Americans was identified by the Koreans as Saunders, an Ogden, Utah, man.

"What a relief," said Earl Belle Basoco, Saunders' 65-year-old widow, who left Ogden after

remarrying in 1955 and settled in Ontario.

"I knew he would have preferred to be buried here," she said. "It is good to lay him to rest."

The Pentagon would not confirm if Saunders' remains were among those released. They have claimed the five remains are those of Americans, said Pentagon spokesman Edward Lundquist.

"As far as we are concerned, we cannot confirm this," he said.

Saunders' "dog tags" were included with the remains.

The remains were taken to a military laboratory in Hawaii for possible identification through dental and medical records, Lundquist said.

Saunders, who aspired to be a surgeon, was sent to Korea in June 1950 to direct cannon fire from a spotter plane. In March 1951 the Army notified Saunders' wife that he was missing.

After American prisoners of war were released by North Korea in 1954, a fellow POW told Basoco that Saunders, 27, had starved to death shortly after being captured in

February 1951.

Saunders' older brother, Delroy, 78, of Ogden, said Saunders was wounded and captured when his two-seat spotter plane was shot down.

In 1954 the Army told Basoco that Saunders was dead and presented an air medal to Saundser's daughter Kim, who was 3 when he left for Korea.

Kim Saunders Padelsky, 43, said she hopes to have her father buried with military honors in Utah at a cemetery near Camp Williams

Contract talks under way for Idaho mine workers

MULLAN (AP) — Contract negotiations for United Steelworkers and managers of the Lucky Friday silver-zinc-lead mine met again Thursday in an effort to block a possible strike.

The three-year labor agreement between miners and Hecla Mining Co. of Coeur d'Alene expires Saturday.

"I'm quite sure we'll have some sort of proposal to bring back to the membership by then," said Steve Brown, a Steelworkers International representative. "But I don't think they'll be too happy with it at all. Whether they take some sort of strike activity ... that's up to them to decide."

Hecla spokeswoman Vicki Kok said talks that began April 30 were continuing Thursday, but that she could not say what, if any, progress had been made.

Federal mediator Jim Parman said he would join the talks Friday if an impasse were reached.

Hecla has proposed a 1.4 percent per-year wage increase for 145 hourly workers during the next three years, Brown said.

"That's ridiculous," he said. "We'd at least like to see employees recoup what they've given in the past in terms of

concessions.

A 1984 contract froze wages at \$13.31 an hour for miners with seniority. When that contract expired in 1987, the mine had been closed for a year because of low silver prices.

When miners returned to work, they accepted a wage cut to \$11.42 an hour the first year of a three-year contract and a cut to \$9.71 in the second year.

The company said a year ago that it would consider closing the mine if the price of silver dipped below \$5 an ounce. But at the annual shareholders' meeting earlier this month, CEO Arthur Brown said Hecla would likely continue operations at the Luck Friday as long as it had cash.

Silver traded below the \$5 mark during much of April, but has since rebounded. Silver closed at \$5.06 an ounce in the New York Commodities Exchange.

Hecla acquired the Lucky Friday in the 1960s, Kok said. The mine employs 179 workers and produced 1.9 million ounces of silver in 1989 along with lead and zinc, she said.

Union workers last struck the Lucky Friday in 1981 for nine weeks, Kok said.

Stallings not giving up on research project

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Congressman Richard Stallings believes Energy Department officials, made skeptical by a recent report questioning the value of the Boron Neutron Capture program, will be sold on the research program for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

After meeting with INEL officials for two days this week, Stallings conceded the cancer treatment scheme that would use the site's idled Power Burst Facility reactor has been through some hard times.

"In the meantime, we've got to continue making the case for it," said the congressman who is pressing for a \$10.5 million increase in the federal commitment to the brain cancer treatment project.

But while Stallings remained convinced the project's problems have resulted from

congressional "bleking" over its budget three years ago, the new Energy Department report completed in April indicated the opposition may run deeper.

The Energy Department's Health and Environmental Research Advisory Committee found "no evidence" to support converting the idled INEL reactor for clinical use. It cited the expense of treating cancer patients at the site 50 miles from Idaho Falls while questioning the biological background of the project team.

Stallings said that indicated opposition from the medical community on grounds the project has not gone through a full scientific peer review, a contention Stallings disputed, and from critics unsure the reactor is a viable site for cancer research.

No nuclear reactor physicists worked on the report, and Stallings suggested the reactor science question may be better addressed by a National Academy of Sciences review.

The project has received only marginal support from the Energy Department, and even INEL Manager Augustine Pitrolo has said it faces "a tough road ahead."

But Stallings said Pitrolo thought the skeptics could be swayed to back the project, and if that fails a congressional mandate to finance it might still be possible.

The extra cash Stallings has been seeking would finance initial conversion of the reactor for treatment. Currently, the Energy Department is only seeking enough money to keep the reactor on standby status.

Racist material found in newspaper tubes

LEWISTON (AP) — Circulation by fighting Indians and Mexicans officials for the Lewiston Morning Tribune have disavowed a white supremacist publication that was dropped into some of their delivery tubes over the weekend.

"I'm hoping that the people there realize this is not anything we had to do with," said Michael McBride, the paper's subscriber services manager.

The publication called "Racial Loyalty" was neither printed or delivered by the newspaper, McBride emphasized. Copies of various editions dating from last year were found in home delivery tubes in the Cavendish Ridge area between Orofino and Kendrick. The motor route carrier, Steven Scoles, said he retrieved as many of the copies as he could find on Sunday morning.

The publisher of the material was listed as The Church of the Creator in Otto, N.C. Included was a feature touting the early Texas Rangers for their advancement of the white race.

Donnalynn Gibbs, district manager for the Tribune, said strange things often show up in home delivery tubes, but she had never seen anything like the racist publication.

It was only the most recent incident of continuing white supremacist activity in the state, where the paper's headquarters is located. Three Idaho men are awaiting trial in U.S. District Court on charges involving a plot to bomb a Seattle discotheque frequented by homosexuals and minorities.

Hours to buy lottery tickets extended

BOISE (AP) — Starting Friday, the people who take part in the Idaho Super Lottery game will have more time to purchase their tickets.

Lottery officials said sales hours will be extended, and players will have an opportunity to use the same ticket for two Lotto America drawings.

Director Bob Cooper said on-line sales will start at 7 a.m. MDT on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. Closing hours will be extended to 9 p.m. MDT. On-line sales in the past have started at 8 a.m. MDT and ended at 8 p.m. MDT.

Sunday hours will remain the same, noon to 5 p.m. MDT or 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. PDT.

On Wednesday and Saturday, drawings are held; terminals will open one hour earlier, 7 a.m. MDT but the closing time will remain the same, 7 p.m. MDT.

High court denies appeal of educator

BOISE (AP) — The former principal of Coeur d'Alene High School has lost his bid to have the Coeur d'Alene School District reinstate him, at least for now.

The Idaho Supreme Court on Thursday ruled against an appeal filed by Warren Toney after a district judge declined to order the district to re-hire him.

Toney was principal of the high school for the 1988-89 school year but was not re-hired. In July of 1989, he filed legal action to regain his job and asked for an order restoring him to his previous job.

First District Judge Richard Magnuson refused to issue the order. In deciding Toney's appeal, the Supreme Court said the judge's ruling was not appealable, because it was not a final decision in the case.

The issue of whether Toney should regain the job was sent back to district for consideration along

with other claims he raised in his lawsuit.

In a Blaine County case, the Idaho Court of Appeals upheld most of a district court decision, but reversed an order allowing prejudgment interest on the damage awards involved.

The case involved lawsuits between the board of directors of the now-defunct Deer Creek, Inc., and Clarendon Hot Springs Ranch, Inc., and other parties over a series of real estate transactions starting in 1969.

The Court of Appeals also ruled 2-1 to uphold the damage award to a Canyon County farming operation which claimed a California seed company provided improper lima bean seed.

With Justice Roger Swanstrom dissenting, the court ruled that Clements Farms, Inc., was entitled to damages but not to attorney fees.

Pact gives Sho-Bans water program funds

POCATELLO (AP) — An agreement between the state, federal government and the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes requires the state to put up \$500,000 to develop a tribal water management system, officials say.

The agreement also requires the federal government to provide \$22-million for tribal water development.

At one of a series of meetings to explain the water rights agreement, Wednesday night at Pocatello, the state's chief negotiators said the agreement protects the water rights of non-Indians as well as Indian interests.

"We believe this is the best agreement we could put together," said Elve Strong, deputy attorney general.

The 1990 Fort Hall Indian Water Rights Agreement was announced this month after five years of talks between the state's Water Resource Board, the Shoshone-Bannocks, the federal government and a committee representing Upper Snake River private water users.

The agreement sets aside 581,031 acre-feet of water, about one-third of the capacity of American Falls Reservoir, for present and future needs of the tribes.

Water Resources spokesman David Shaw said the state will administer the distribution of water from the Snake River. The tribes will control tribal water rights within the Fort Hall Reservation.

"That was basically the state's bottom line," Shaw said. "We felt we had to maintain jurisdiction over distribution of water from the Snake River. That's where the impact is felt so far as non-Indian water users."

The agreement allows the Tribes to establish a water bank to rent storage water held in the American Falls and Palisades reservoirs, and stipulates the water is not required to be used for irrigation. Storage water may be used to maintain instream flows on or adjacent to the Fort Hall Reservation.

None of the tribes' water rights, except the American Falls and Palisades storage water, may be used off the reservation.

Responding to a question, Shaw said ceding lands off the reservation served by the Fort Hall Water Project will receive at least as much water under the agreement as they are currently receiving.

"I don't anticipate anything in the agreement changing the way you folks get your water supply. In fact, we've gone to great lengths to make sure that doesn't happen," Shaw said.

Strong said the state and tribes both compromised to reach the agreement. He said the state of Wyoming spent about \$11 million to litigate the types of claims settled in the Fort Hall agreement. "We've been able to spell out areas of compromise, areas where we can put this agreement into existing patterns without upsetting existing users," he said.

Symms promotes plan for bridges and roads

BOISE (AP) — The nation's system of roads and bridges need more money, and Sen. Steve Symms says he has a plan to provide extra cash.

Symms, in Boise Thursday for a speech to the Boise Chamber of Commerce, unveiled legislation he's working on to spend some of the nearly \$20 billion which has built up in highway trust accounts.

"We currently have a cash balance of \$10.5 billion in the Highway

Account and about \$2.5 billion in the Mass Transit Account," Symms said. "The Airport and Highway Trust Fund has \$7.6 billion in uncommitted funds."

"Meanwhile, our pavements are wearing thin, bridges are too small to accommodate new trucks and our airport facilities are insufficient to accommodate the boom in air travel since deregulation," Symms said.

He said no new taxes should be levied on highway users or other transportation users until the trust funds are restored.

His proposal will increase spending on the highway program by almost \$3 billion to almost \$16 million per year. He said that would mean an increase of \$17.6 million to Idaho.

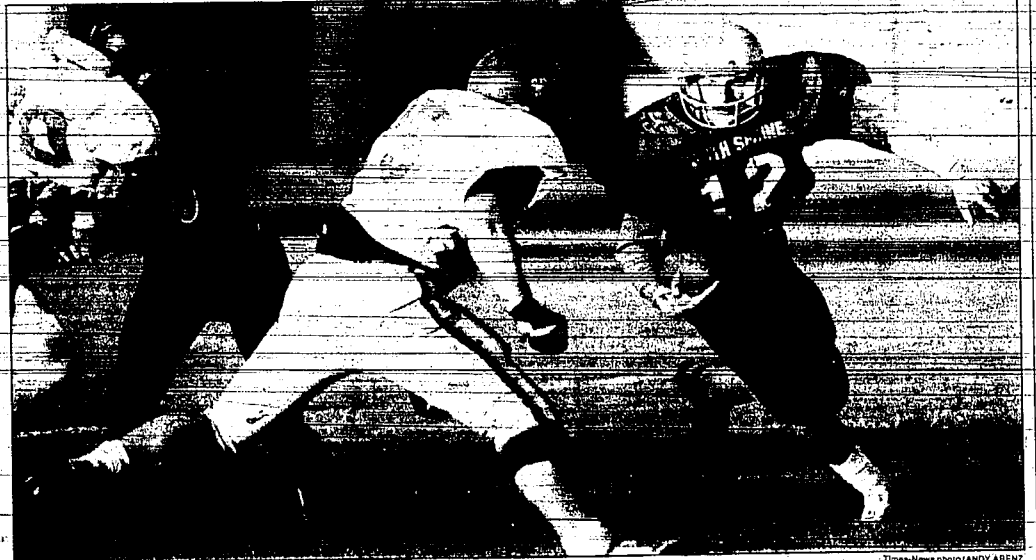

Blazers finally win on the road to earn spot in finals

PHOENIX — Portland advanced to the NBA Finals for the first time since it won its only championship in 1977, taking advantage of a hamstring injury to Kevin Johnson to beat the Phoenix Suns 112-109 Thursday night.

The Trail Blazers, who had lost five straight playoff games on the road, including a 34-point blowout in Game 3 at Phoenix, scored the last six points of the game in the final 55 seconds to overcome a brilliant performance by Jeff Hornacek. The Suns' guard scored 25 of his career-high 36 points after Johnson was injured late in the second period.

It was the first win by a road team in either of the NBA's conference finals, and gave the Trail Blazers a 4-2 victory in the Western Conference championship series.

"Everyone talked about how we can't win on the road, but we kept it close until the end," Portland coach Rick Adelman said. "People should realize we can win the

close games.

"We're thinking about The Finals, we're just going to take some time off. We've played every other day and need the rest."

Johnson, who had 13 of his 16 points in the first quarter, pulled his left hamstring with 2:54 remaining in the half, and went to the locker room for treatment. But the Suns' point guard did not play again.

Hornacek gave the Suns a 109-106 lead with two free throws with 1:09 left, but Phoenix did not score again.

Terry Porter, who scored 23 points, hit two free throws to draw Portland within one with 55 seconds to go.

After a exchange of possessions, Jerome Kersey blocked a layup attempt by Hornacek, then completed a fast break with a layup of his own to put the Trail Blazers ahead to stay with 27 seconds remaining.

Tom Chambers then turned the ball over to Clyde Drexler, who was fouled and made two free throws with 6.8 seconds left and finished with 23 points.

A desperation 3-point attempt by Hor-

neck missed badly just before the buzzer.

Dan Majerle added 22 points for the Suns, while Chambers scored all of his 17 in the second half. But he was 5-for-16 from the field and was only 11-for-37 in the final two games.

Portland, trailing 63-59 at halftime and 82-84 after the third period, tied the score at 89-89 on rookie Drazen Petrovic's 3-point goal and jumper 39 seconds into the fourth quarter.

The score was tied three more times until Chambers' free throw with 7:29 left put Phoenix ahead 96-95.

Hornacek, whose previous career best was 32 points, hit consecutive driving layups for a 100-95 lead with 5:59 to go and another with 4:41 showing. His foul shot with four minutes showing made it

105-99.

The Trail Blazers closed to 107-106 on Porter's fourth 3-point shot of the game, with 3:15 left, and Drexler's two free throws with 1:48 remaining.

The Suns, who built big leads in Phoenix to beat the Trail Blazers 123-89 in Game 3 and 119-107 in Game 4, struggled to a 63-59 halftime lead in Game 5.

Portland, trailing 47-35 with 7:46 remaining in the second quarter after a 13-7 Suns run, got three 3-point goals from Porter during a 22-0 run that gave the Trail Blazers a 77-56 lead with 2:31 left.

Square, round dancing festival heading for CSI

TWIN FALLS - They'll be coming round the mountains, sweeping along the river and sashaying across the Snake River Plain for the 1990 State Square and Round Dance Festival next week at the College of Southern Idaho.

Up to 1,000 people are expected for the festival, including an estimated 300 people who regularly participate in the Magic Valley's six square and round dancing clubs.

Those six groups are hosting the event, last held in Twin Falls in 1971. Ralph and Edna Harper and George and Edna Mae Jukich, all of Twin Falls, are co-chairing the festival, and they've been aided in their preparations by 13 committees including more than 50 people.

"We're trying to get the local people involved," says Ralph Harper. "I come on out and watch us dance."

J. Kent Just, executive vice president of the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce, says the festival will bring more visitors into Twin Falls than any other event slated this season. It should be a boon to area motels, restaurants and other retailers. Just notes, adding that each couple will probably spend about \$100 per day while at the festival.

Square dances are performed by eight people, while the more complicated round dances are performed by couples. Most people start with square dances, progressing to rounds after a few years. The people who lead square dances are known as callers, while those who call the round dances are cues.

The festival will get under way June 7 with a "trail-in" dance from 8 to 10 p.m. in the CSI gym. The dance's name, according to festival publicity chairwoman Lucille Deagle, comes from dancers trailing in all evening.

Participants are expected from Oregon, Washington, Montana, Wyoming, Utah, Arizona, Nevada, California, Canada and all across Idaho. The dance will be called by Dave Rensberger of Brea, Calif., who started his calling career in 1978 while living for a year in the Magic Valley.

Dances are also slated all day June 8 and June 9, with a full schedule of round and square dancing for all levels of ability in the gym and the Taylor Administration Building. On June 9, round dance instructors Jack and Dorothy Wright from Olympia, Wash., will teach and cue dances.

The festival's featured caller will be Jon Jones of Arlington, Texas, who has been active in square dancing since 1954. After attending the Idaho festival, he'll be traveling to New Zealand and Australia to call dances Down Under. Here, he'll lead an afternoon

Fabulous Chancellors bring back old times

TWIN FALLS - Back in the 1960s, The Fabulous Chancellors were one of the Northwest's most popular bands.

Those were the days of dances on the dock at Dierkes Lake. Kids also gathered to rock and roll at the Armory in Jerome and the Hungry Eye in Buhl.

Those days will return this weekend as the latest edition of the Chancellors comes back to Twin Falls for two performances at the Best Western Canyon Springs Inn, 1357 Blue Lakes Blvd. N.

Paul Revere and the Raiders were the Gem State's best-known rock group, but the Chancellors were at least as well loved in Idaho, according to Ross Miller, a longtime fan and Twin Falls High graduate who now lives in Boise and is in the band's current lineup.

The original band was formed in Boise in 1959, and the group enjoyed its greatest popularity from 1961 through 1964. In the fall of '64, the band relocated to Twin Falls so its members could attend Idaho State University.

During those years, the Chancellors made numerous appearances in the Magic Valley. "Twin Falls was always in the center," says Miller, who was at many of those dances.

The group split up in 1967, but not before it had toured widely in the West and scored several regional hits. The Chancellors' first single, "Diamond in the Sky,"

appeared on the Dot label.

"Hey Girl" still pops up on oldies radio shows and appears on the current Chancellors' playlist. Another early Chancellor, Larry Roberts, now lives in Buhl and works for Sears in Twin Falls as an appliance repairman.

"The Chancellors didn't get the recognition they deserved," says Miller, who

reformed the band last fall with bassist Lou Matthews, who had been in an earlier incarnation of the group.

Paul Revere and the Raiders might have packed 1,000 kids in at a show, "but the Chancellors would get 600 kids in a room, a third the size," Miller notes. Holding his thumb and index finger an inch or so

Parentage poses dilemma

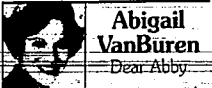

Warren Beatty's 'Dick Tracy' aims for 'Batman'-like success

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Dick Tracy" the movie opens in nearly 2,000 theaters June 15 amid a media megabiz that rivals last summer's "Batman."

Big will Warren Beatty's film about the square-jawed flatfoot with the yellow fedora match the \$252 million domestic gross amassed by the caped crusader?

Fingers crossed. Walt Disney Co. is tossing a huge premiere at Disney World in Florida with 3,000 journalists expected to attend. Following trailers that have appeared in 2,000 theaters since Christmas, TV commercials will be unleashed on the nation's networks. Merchandise, including Tracy's wrist-watch radio, will flood the market.

But skeptics point to some negative

The comic strip Dick Tracy, once featured in 500 newspapers, now appears in 150 and is little known by today's young, moviegoing audience. And what's worse: the young crowd hardly knows Beatty, 53, who has made a name for himself in 2,000 years, the last being the quintessential bomb "Ishtar." His other was the critically acclaimed "Reds," in 1981. He co-starred with Diane Keaton and received an Academy Award for best director.

Another problem is that although "Dick Tracy" co-star Madonna may be a megastar in pop music, her last few movies were megadisasters: "Shanghai Surprise" and "Who's That Girl."

However, Barrie Osborne, executive producer of "Dick Tracy," takes

"The picture should attract a wide audience, because it can be appreciated on different levels," he said in an interview. "The younger audience can enjoy the prosthetic characters (Pneumonia, Flatfoot, etc.) lots of fun."

The older audience can appreciate the wit and the appearance of the film; much of it was derived from post-expressionist paintings — a "Three-Piece Opera" — Bertolt Brecht had a beautiful color. And they certainly know Madonna.

Disney plans to issue graphic novels, comic books — of "Dick Tracy" to bring

some sort of awareness to the movie and character.

"Dick Tracy" was the creation of Chester Gould, who drew cartoons for Chicago papers. He began submitting comic strip ideas to Joseph Patterson, publisher of the New York Daily News. Gould finally clicked with "Plainclothes Tracy," a hawk-nosed, straight-arrow detective who Patterson renamed Dick. The strip made its debut in the Detroit Mirror on Oct. 3, 1931, and the Daily News eight days later.

The comic strip featured blood, bullets and a menacing manager of villains with memorable names: Flynn, Flyface, Measles, Mumbles and more-hav-to-threatened-the-intrepid two-fisted Tracy for nearly 60 years.

Tracy, his sweetheart Tess True-

heart and his grotesque enemies became American icons in the 1930s and '40s. Low-budget movies and serials and a short-run TV series helped fill the country's fascination with Gould's denizens of the underworld.

"Dick Tracy," according to Beatty, had its beginnings in 1977 when producers Art Linson and Floyd Mutrux bought film rights from the Tribune Syndicate. They made a deal with Paramount Pictures, which enlisted Universal Pictures to coproduce. Various packages were proposed, including projects with directors Steven Spielberg, John Landis, Richard Benjamin and Walter Hill, and stars Harrison Ford, Clint Eastwood, Richard Gere, Tom Selleck and Mel Gibson.

Film follows a familiar pattern

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Warren Beatty-Madonna movie may be attracting a lot of hoopla, but Dick Tracy is no newcomer to the screen.

Tracy purists may prefer "Dick Tracy Meets Gussie," circa 1947, in which the cubed flatfoot does battle with the great Boris Karloff. Or maybe "Dick Tracy vs. Cueball," a low-budget 1946 flick in which the detective takes on a bald smuggler.

There are two other RKO features of the mid-1940s that starred Ralph Byrd or Morgan Conway as the steel-jawed, hawk-nosed sleuth. Or, see Dick Tracy as an FBI

agent in "Dick Tracy's G-Men," a 1939 yarn with Byrd chasing the evil Zarnoff.

If you have the patience, you could watch four serials, dating from 1937 to 1941, with Byrd as Chester Gould's comic-strip hero.

Beatty's rediscovery of Dick Tracy follows the pattern of recent Hollywood times. Filmmakers have been exploiting long-established characters of comic strips and books, giving them a modern look for today's audiences. "Batman" is the biggest success story thus far.

Created by Bob Kane in 1939, "Batman" flew onto the big screen

with serials in 1943 and 1949. The sensation of the 1965-67 television series led to a 1966 feature, also starring Adam West and Burt Ward. Last year a hyped-up "Batman," starring Jack Nicholson and Michael Keaton, proved a huge moneymaker.

"Superman" dates back to 1940s serials, "1951 quickie" "Superman" and the "Mole Men" and the subsequent TV series starring George Reeves. Christopher Reeve took over the cape in the 1978 epic "Superman." It was a huge hit, followed by three sequels with diminishing results.

'Tracy' merchandise sales fail to match expectations

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Would any hip teen be caught dead wearing a T-shirt plastered with the profile of a forgotten comic-strip cop?

Warren Beatty may still cause some female fans to swoon, but the star and director of "Dick Tracy" faces a far more difficult seduction in the youth-driven movie merchandise business.

Young shoppers are starting to inspect goods decorated with the likeness of Madonna, who co-stars as Breathless Mahoney in "Dick Tracy." But Beatty's title character has remained an elusive sale, some retailers and manufacturers say.

And while the film itself continues to generate much anticipation, "Dick Tracy" wares are lagging behind retail products linked to "The Simpsons," "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles" and other TV shows and movies.

"Dick Tracy" will in no way come close to "Batman," said Nancy Overfield-Delmar, manager of special event and merchandise publicity for J.C. Penney. "The movie may do very well in theaters. But there is no awareness in stores right now."

John Green, president of "Dick Tracy" T-shirt licensee Village Mews, said Walt Disney Co. has been slow to promote the film, with little expenditure for billboards, television spots and posters.

"From a retailers point of view, that's not very good," Green said. "The 'Batman' hype was going a year before the movie came out. A lot of kids still don't know who Dick Tracy is."

Marketing Evaluations, a research firm that studies the appeal of celebrities and fictional characters, found in a study last year that Dick Tracy ranked below average. His popularity was below Wonder Woman, Howdy Doodie and Archie.

Larry Carlat, the editor of Toy & Hobby World, believes young shoppers will be more interested in Barbie and Nintendo video games than Beatty and Madonna. But Playmates, a leading toy manufacturer, thinks "Dick Tracy" will outsell "Batman."

As movies, "Batman" and "Dick Tracy" share several common elements. Both are based on long-

standing comic strips, both have been adapted into live-action films and both feature recognizable central characters.

Yet the merchandising of the two films is wholly different.

Jack Morrow, vice president of licensing for Applause Inc., makers of "Dick Tracy" dolls, figurines, mugs and key chains, said Warner Bros. positioned its "Batman" as a fad, not just a movie. The logo thus became a statement unto itself.

"Tracy" didn't have the same warm-up that "Batman" had, and I attribute that directly to fashion. That yellow and black design was cool. And "Tracy" doesn't have that," Morrow said.

"Dick Tracy" merchandise, retailers and licensees say, will live or die on the film's performance. If the movie soars, so, too, will the products. If it bombs, then you can look for "Dick Tracy" products on the discount shelf.

"Willow" could have sold a lot of merchandise if the movie was good," said Gary Caplan, a licensing consultant. "Howard the Duck" could have sold a lot of products, too, if the movie had played well."

According to trade estimates, "Batman" merchandise so far has claimed retail sales of \$650 million. A studio, typically enjoys 10 percent of the wholesale revenues generated by the merchandise to which it holds the copyrights.

In 1980, licensed products had retail sales of \$9.9 billion. By 1989, that figure had surged to \$64.4 billion. About \$3 billion worth of merchandise inspired by movies and television programs was sold last year.

Even if "Dick Tracy" produces wholesale receipts of \$100 million, Disney will collect \$10 million — for doing essentially nothing but negotiating deals and approving artwork. And if kids wear T-shirts bearing the film's logo, Disney has walking billboards touting the movie.

Rudy Gonzalez of the Idaho Cowboy Poetry Association will be master of ceremonies. Poets scheduled to perform include Curley Surles of Mountain Home; Howard Wright and Jim Davis of Caldwell; Rose Cimmeron and Sherry Reynolds of Helena; Monte Bear, Alvin Weippe, Angelo McLaughlin of Nampa; Mike Lee of Colorado Springs, Colo.; Vee Taylor of Meridian; Duane Dickerson of Ryegeite, Mont.; and others.
Admission prices will be \$3 per person per open session and \$6 for the evening session. Passes to all three open sessions are also available for \$5 per person, or a \$10 pass will give the entrant admission to all four sessions.
Anyone wearing a 1990 Western Days badge is eligible for a dollar discount. Festival proceeds will benefit the Miss Rodeo Idaho program, and plans call for the gathering to be an annual event.

Idaho history author to visit

He arrived from Scotland in 1895 with only \$2 in his pocket and worked on an Idaho sheep ranch. He would eventually buy that ranch and go on to become the biggest Idaho sheepman of his generation, at one point owning about 200,000 sheep.
His life is the subject of Louise Shadduck's book, "Andy Little: Idaho Sheep King."
Shadduck, a Coeur d'Alene native, will discuss and sign her book from 2 to 4 p.m. Saturday at Judi's Bookstore, 120 Main Ave. N., Twin Falls.
Selected as an Idaho Centennial edition, the book details Little's life from his arrival in 1895 until his death in 1941.
"This book is for anyone who's interested in the sheep industry or that period in Idaho history. It's about the people who made it happen," said Shadduck.
Little, when she was a young reporter in Boise and heard other reporters speak of him.
"They'd say, 'Boy, if someone could get Andy Little to talk, what a feature that would be.' He was a retired Scotsman and after he died, they would say, 'If someone could talk to one who knew him and eventually she had enough stories compiled to write the book.'
"I call it an anecdotal biography. It is a history of southern Idaho, based upon stories that people told me," said Shadduck.
Shadduck has written for the Coeur d'Alene Press and the Spokesman Review; has twice been named Idaho's Secretary of Commerce and Development, has served as the executive director of Idaho's Forestry Industry Council and has assisted an Idaho governor, congressman and U.S. senators. She has also been president of the National Federation of Press Women and served many commissions and directorates.
"Andy Little: Idaho Sheep King" is available in hardback for \$22.95 and is published by Caxton Printers of Caldwell.

'Back to the Future' gets back to fun

If at first you don't succeed, you try again, which is what the producers of the "Back to the Future" trilogy have done. This time, they got it right.

The first in the series was good enough, but the second was a masterpiece of confusion. "Back to the Future III," however, is great fun. Christopher Lloyd, who plays the ditsy Doc Brown, encapsulates all that has happened in the first two films, which leaves us no less puzzled than we were.

The briefing is a good try, and we thank the producers for it. We also thank them for making their third film much more approachable, much more comprehensible than the first two, particularly the second.

The new film has Marty (Michael J. Fox) and Doc Brown returning to 1885 because the good Doc is supposed to die that year. "Let's go back and change all that," says Marty, and in no time at all, they are in their DeLorean, flying back in time.

Review

When they arrive at their destination, Marty is still in his car, which he drives into a cave as Indians pursue him. He runs, leaving the car behind, and one of his first stops is the typical western town, typical, that is, of the Hollywood western.

Marty goes into a bar and asks for water. When the other patrons make fun of him, we expect him to add, "In a dirty glass," but we are spared that one.

Others, we are not spared, but they are good gags, all of them. One has Fox doing Travis Bickle of "Taxi Driver" (everybody seems to be doing Bickle these days), another has him using an early version of the Frisbee, and there is one super sight gag in which Doc Brown reacts to a potion that has been forced down his throat. You won't see a visual gag done any better than this, not on today's screen.

Thomas F. Wilson, who as Biff Tannen bullied Marty McFly in the first and second "BTTF" episodes, repeats as Biff and also plays Buford "Mad Dog" Tannen, a typical western baddie. Well, he's not all that typical. He has trouble with words and numbers, things like that, and though he makes things tough for McFly, he is fun to have around, even when he is being nasty.

The producers apparently consulted with Clint Eastwood when they did their film. When McFly returns to the past and that frontier town, he introduces himself as Clint Eastwood, and in the end, during the climactic shootout, he wears a cape similar to the one Eastwood wore in the Italian westerns he did for Sergio Leone.

"This is fun for everyone. The shootout is for all, too, but movie buffs will derive added enjoyment from this sequence. When McFly stands in front of a full-length mirror, film buffs know what is coming next, and when he appears in the middle of the street, they know what he will be wearing. Yes, he says the Eastwood line, but it has never been put to better imitative advantage. Fox also plays his own great-

great-great-grandfather, and Len Thompson, who did the other two "BTTF" films, is McFly's great-great-grandmother. Mary Steenburgen is new to the cast. She is Clara Clayton, the schoolteacher who falls in love with Doc Brown when he returns to 1885. She fits. Elisabeth Shue, who was McFly's wife in the second film, repeats. Look closely and you will also see Pat Buttrick, Harry Carey Jr., Dub Taylor and Richard Dysart as patrons of that saloon. They're funny, but then everyone in the film is good. This time the trip is a joy. "Back to the Future III" (rated PG) has a nice cadence. It doesn't just travel, it tops along.

'Cry-Baby' makes fun of the '50s

CRY-BABY (PG-13). John Waters' camp musical spoof of the '50s is occasionally breezy and fun, but the material Waters is making fun of — "unsunderstood" juvenile delinquents, jukebox jamborees, '50s sitcoms, etc. — were partly spoofy to begin with. It wasn't awfully thin after a while. Johnny Depp stars, with a cast that includes Ricki Lake, Susan Tyrrell, Tracy Lords, Mink Stole and Patty Hearst.

FIRE BIRDS (PG-13). The crack,

rebellious, student pilot; the salty 'old pro; the tough sexpot; vicious foes, blasting you out of the sky. A movie that aspires to be "Top Gun" in Army helicopters, like this one, is trying for so much logically and so little dramatically that it seems a sure bet to crash and burn. So, it does — endlessly, wantonly, like a video-game-interspersed-with-wisecracks and a flying manual. Only the off-the-edge actors cast by director David Green in the leading roles — Nicolas Cage, Tommy Lee Jones — give it any charge.

PRETTY WOMAN (R). Updating "Pygmalion" and sprinkling it

with Cinderella stuff may seem like a perfectly workable idea until you get into the nuts and bolts of "Pretty Woman." Here, Richard Gere's bored cipher of a corporate raider transforms Julia Roberts' happy Hollywood Boulevard hooker into a lady he can pass off at a polo match in less than a week. This is a movie that barely has a moment to call its own and the ones it has are gamy, materialistic and possibly life-threatening. Some fairy tale for the '90s.

Q&A (R). Nick Nolte tops even his own past performances with this electrifying portrayal of a Veteran New York cop-bigot-in-Sidney Lumet's enormously satisfying look at today's N.Y.P.D., a blisteringly obscene unmelting melting pot.

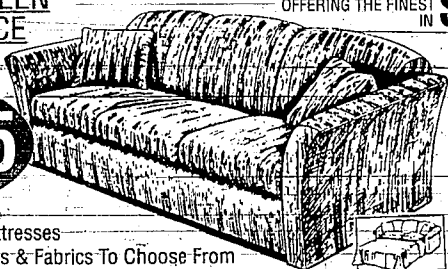

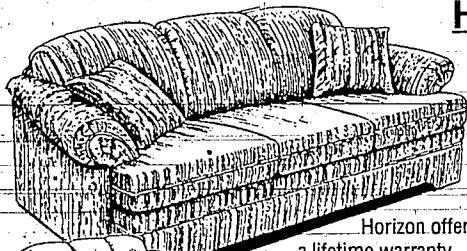



'The 44th Annual Tony Awards' show brings live theater close to your home

By ROBERTA BERNSTEIN

Television is a far cry from the intimacy of the live theater. Yet every year, the Tony Awards rises to the daunting task of translating stage to small screen.

This year, "The 44th Annual Tony Awards" (airing live from Broadway's Lunt-Fontanne Theater, Sunday, June 3, on CBS) is no exception. And it's the job of executive producer Joe Cates to make viewers feel as though they have a front-row seat.

That's the reason, he says, that Kathleen Turner — herself a Tony nominee for her performance as Maggie in a revival of Tennessee Williams' "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof" — will be hosting the event. "I knew I had to take a 'television' approach," explains Cates. "I wanted authentic theater stars, but also the ones who have done well (in other media). With Kathleen Turner, you have a lady who is starring on Broadway, and who is also a major, hot motion-picture star."

In keeping with this philosophy, Cates — a veteran TV and Broadway producer — has lined up a contemporary field of big-name presenters, including Academy Award-winner Jessica Tandy, Morgan Freeman, Matthew Broderick, Kevin Kline, Michelle Pfeiffer and Alec Baldwin.

Cates says not to expect opening, middle- and closing production numbers. "I'm not taking that TV-variety approach," he says. "That doesn't work. It's old-fashioned."

One thing he will be doing is letting the Tony winners really talk.

"At awards shows," says Cates, "everyone's always told not to speak for more than 30 seconds. I'm telling them: 'I don't care if you speak for three minutes, if you're interesting. You're actors; you're performers. Entertain us with your responses. Reflect. And don't just stand there and say, 'Thank you.' That's what thank-you notes are for."

The show has a theme: "The Year of the Actor." Six times during the show, Cates says, the theater will go dark. Then a single spotlight will appear on the stage, and an actor will step out and read a passage. "Perhaps it will be Shakespeare or Kafka or Kaufman and Hart," he says. "That's the essence of the theater: the artist working alone on a stage."

There will also be scenes from

each of the nominees for Best Play ("Lettice & Lovage," "Prelude to a Kiss," "The Grapes of Wrath," "The Piano Lesson") and Best Musical ("Aspects of Love," "City of Angels," "Grand Hotel," "Meet Me in St. Louis"). But in a live telecast, there's room for trouble.

"I worry about everything, about what I can't protect against," admits Cates. He says one of the toughest problems is the theater's small size. Props and scenery, such as the trolley used in "Meet Me in St. Louis," will have to be broken down to get through the theater's doors and then reassembled.

Q: I heard that Ernie Kovacs, the late great TV comedian, was privately a compulsive gambler who died broke. Is this true? — I.N.

A: According to his widow, Edjo Adams, now 63, Kovacs gambled heavily and spent profusely in the late 1950s, leaving his family financially hardpressed. In her upcoming autobiography, "Sing a Pretty Tune," Adams recounts that in 1967, the family was in such desperate straits financially that it couldn't afford Christmas presents for the kids. Kovacs died a year later, victim of an auto accident.

Q: Is it true that Joseph Cotton, that fine actor who was so great with Orson Welles in "Citizen Kane," has lost his voice forever? — T.T.

A: Cotton recently was forced to have his voice box surgically removed. Obviously, the 85-year-old actor will never sound his same sonorous self. But before he left the hospital, Cotton astonished his wife, actress Patricia Medina, with a hearty: "Good morning." An artificial voice box, surgically implanted, did the trick. It's a newer device not like earlier ones that gave the voice a mechanical, robotlike sound.

"It'll be better again soon," Cotton assured me. "I won't have to write out everything anymore."

Q: Do you think Robin Givens ruined her chances for a big movie career as a result of all of that publicity during her marriage to boxer Mike Tyson? — K.C.

A: Doubtful. Givens, thanks to that ill-fated marriage, has what's called in Hollywood "name recognition," meaning we all know who she is. As a matter of fact, she's got the lead in a new movie, "In a Rage in Harlem," with "Lethal Weapon" star Danny Glover, Gregory Hines, and Forest Whitaker, who played Charlie Parker in "Bird."

Q: Someone said the other Beatles are still paranoid as a result of the shooting of John Lennon. This doesn't make sense since the remaining three are certainly out in public. — F.C.

A: There's no question it has affected them. Although they refuse to live like recluses, both Paul McCartney and George Harrison are security fanatics and have made their English homes impregnable. Ringo Starr dealt with his fears for a while by drinking but sought help when his alcoholism got out of hand. Their fears are not unjustified since only recently Harrison began getting threatening letters. Fortunately, the couple sending the notes — who claimed they were told by spirits to write — were caught by Scotland Yard.

Q: Hasn't Eddie Murphy fathered a child out of wedlock? — P.H.

A: Yes, he has. Eddie's quite open about it. He has a 5-month-old daughter named Bria. He's also skittish about identifying the mother. Murphy is playing the good daddy these days.

He tells me that following the shooting of his latest flick, "Another 48 Hours," he plans to relax at his New Jersey mansion and spend time with the baby.

No, Murphy does not plan to get married soon. Give him time, though. He's just 29.

Q: We hear that Telly Savalas is planning to make a big movie comeback as, what else, the Kojak character he played so well on TV. Is that true? — P.D.

A: Can't say for sure since Telly has had other things on his mind lately. The 66-year-old actor

underwent bypass surgery in mid-April, and is still recovering. Until he gets back on his feet, Savalas won't decide about an offer to make a series of half-hour TV shows — not detective yarns but situation comedies. With his health problems, and the largely indifferent reception to his recent reincarnation as Kojak on TV, Telly is in no mood for laughs right now — though he could probably do several.

Q: Isn't it true that Joan Rivers' husband left behind an audio tape explaining to her why he committed suicide? What's become of that tape? — L.D.

A: Joan's late husband, Edgar Rosenberg, was her business partner and best friend. They'd been married for 22 years, when on August 14, 1987, he took an overdose of sleeping pills in a Philadelphia hotel room. Rosenberg was in ill health and blamed himself for Joan's then career misfortunes. He did make an audio tape explaining his suicide. Joan tells me that it was only recently that she brought herself to listen to it: It was a devastating experience for her and so far she has refused to say what was on it.

Q: I've been told there's a new movie in the works that makes the controversial case that Lena Turner may have had a lesbian relationship with her own daughter. — N.T.

A: No. Producer Allan Carr is

Soap opera scene

Thorne is one strange soap character

On "The Bold and the Beautiful," Thorne, who shot his brother Ridge and can't remember it, is certainly a strange one.

Thorne works from emotions, not the old brain, so he's always leaping into things, propelling the plot along in Bill Bell's saga of the idealized Forrester clan where family ties come first, where the group is more important than the individual.

Like characters in a romantic novel, the Forresters are appealingly unreal. Grownup sons live at home, even bringing their wives with them. No one cares to split, or even spar with parents. Sons obediently follow Dad in the fashion business, apparently with no ideas of ever striking out to try something different.

When father Eric decides to leave wife Stephanie after years of being bullied, son Thorne is so upset he tells Mom. No sympathy for Thorne here unless you can also understand Mom — a cobra lady attacking any intrusion upon her precious family. Here's a mom who knows what's best for everybody and means to have her way or else.

Bill Bell has struck a nerve at a time when the American family unit is in tatters. Viewers want to see a story where the family comes first because the soap, only a few years old, is up to number four in the ratings, very close to tying the veteran, "All My Children."

Young Jeff Trachta, who has been portraying Thorne for almost a year, can tell by the mail that boss Bell is right on target. Girls want to marry Thorne, others want to break his stupid neck.

"I can see both sides of the coin," says Jeff. "Thorne is like his mother Stephanie. If you take Stephanie at face value, she's a villainess. But if you look at where Stephanie is coming from, her actions make sense. The same applies to Thorne. He's the raw nerve so necessary in a good story."

Armed with a degree in psychology from St. John's in New York, Jeff worked for a while with the old and the retarded before going astray in the theater. During the

rough times, after regional theater work and a spot on "Loving," Jeff thought of going back to school for a master's degree in philosophy and a life of being useful.

But acting is more satisfying at the moment. "It's using all of you," Jeff explains. "I love people. I can sit with my dog and watch the world go by — listening and watching. And then I get a show like this with top flight people running it. I'm very lucky, an actor with a steady job, playing a great character."

NBC has the coveted Nielsen crown but CBS is charging straight ahead

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC retained its Nielsen crown but suffered an 18 percent ratings drop as it narrowly beat hard-charging CBS in what all three networks called the tightest May "sweeps" race in seven years.

NBC, which has won the prime time ratings race for five straight seasons, won the April 26-May 23 sweeps battle with an 11.9 ratings average. CBS had an 11.8 and ABC an 11.4. Each ratings point represents 921,000 homes. The ratings sweeps, conducted four times a year, are month-long periods of intensive local audience tallies that help stations in the nation's 211 television markets set advertising rates.

CBS has been third in prime time for three consecutive seasons. Its return as strong competitor in the May sweeps battle was aided by entertainment specials, including the pilot of "I Love Lucy"; TV movies and theatrical films; and two Connie Chung news specials. All got high

ratings.

Although ABC was third in the May sweeps, it also got good news. Its programs, including "China Beach" and "thirtysomething," helped make it first in ratings among viewers, particularly women, considered the most desirable by advertisers — age 18 to 54.

ABC's "America's Funniest Home Videos" was easily the highest-rated series during the sweeps race, with an average 38 percent share.

The top 20 shows included Fox Broadcasting's "Married ... With Children" and "The Simpsons," which were tied in 17th place with identical 23 percent audience-share averages. It was the first time Fox shows have cracked the top 20 list during a sweeps race.

NBC research vice president Robert Niles, acknowledging the narrow margin of victory in NBC's ninth consecutive sweeps triumph, nonetheless said he'd take it.

"A win is a win," he told reporters

at the first of two news conferences

CBS research chief David Poltrack held the second, at which the two officials generally accentuated the positive and played down the negative.

The last time the three networks were as close in May sweeps ratings was in 1983, when CBS was first with a 15.1 ratings average, followed by NBC with a 14.9 and ABC with a 14.7, according to NBC research officials.

Niles said NBC's 18 percent ratings fall-off in May compared with the previous May was partly due to all-out efforts the network made last year to win a record five consecutive May sweeps, and partly because some tryouts of new series didn't work this time.

However, he emphasized, one shouldn't look at the May results as an indicator of what NBC's just-released 1990-1991 program lineup will do next fall. "We think we can turn this around as we go into the

Males are still reporting news

CARBONDALE, Ill. (AP) — Female correspondents increased their visibility last year on the major network evening news programs, but male reporters still dominated the airwaves, according to a study.

"There is an assumption in American society that women are upwardly mobile in the work place, but that's not the case in network television news," said Joe S. Foote, chairman of the radio-television department at Southern Illinois University. Just three women were in the top 10 out of 186 reporters ranked on ABC, CBS or NBC, according to the Network Correspondent Visibility Study. The study does not include news anchors. The reporters were ranked by the number of stories they had on the air during 1989.

CBS pins hopes on comic book hero

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS, trying to battle back from three seasons as third in evening TV ratings, said Tuesday it will have nine new series in the fall, including a comic-book hero and an action series whose heroes fight polluters. "This is a strong first step in the process of rebuilding our prime time lineup," said CBS Entertainment President Jeff Sagansky.

Sagansky's new lineup, his first full one since CBS hired him as its chief programming last year to lead it out of the ratings wilderness, revamps all nights but Tuesday and Sunday. It also gives CBS four nights of comedies. This season it had only one night.

The goal, he told CBS affiliates in a closed-circuit hookup, is to attract younger viewers and more family viewing in the 8 p.m. EDT time period. His roster includes five new hour-long series; four new sitcoms and a comedy formerly on NBC, "The Hogan Family." It also has a first-run, pro-cable movie package of such hits as "Born on the Fourth of July" and "Do The Right Thing."

The low-rated "Saturday Night With Connie Chung" will move to Mondays with a different format and name — "Face to Face With

Connie Chung." Two test runs of the new version got high ratings during the May sweeps. But the Vietnam War ended for "Tour of Duty." CBS axed that series, along with the venerable "Falcon Crest," whose demise was announced last week; and such far newer ones as "The Amazing Teddy Z," "City" and "Sydney."

However, Sagansky said "Paradise" may be renewed. "Wiseguy" now is in backup status, he added, with Ken Wahl to return in the first few episodes, then be succeeded by Stephen Bauer, who would play a new undercover agent.

CBS' new sitcoms are the movie spinoff "Uncle Buck," the blue-collar "Lenny," "Four Alarm Fire," about a widowed firefighter with four kids, and "Evening Shade," starring Burt Reynolds as an ex-football star who moves his family back to the small Arkansas town of his boyhood.

Reynolds, whose "B.L. Stryker" series was dropped by ABC last week, won't be the only familiar face on CBS next fall. Edward Woodward of CBS' late "The Equalizer" will return in the hour-long "Over My Dead Boy" as a burnt-out novelist paired with a

young obituary writer played by Jessica Lundy.

CBS' other new hour entries are "The Flash," based on the comic book about a crime-fighter who's a real swifly; "WIOU," about the cutthroat world of local TV, and "The Hammersmiths," a family drama with Lucie Arnaz. There also will be "The Green Machine," the first network drama in which the good-guys-battle-those-who-would-harm-planet-Earth.

Speaking with reporters here and in Los Angeles after unveiling his schedule, Sagansky discounted the suggestions of some that his new schedule isn't as unconventional as those of NBC and ABC. Those networks each have music-drama series. ABC, in addition to "Cop Rock," a mix of police drama and musical production numbers, also renewed for fall the surreal cult favorite, "Twin Peaks."

But it's the way a show is done, not the idea for it, that makes it succeed, he said: "What makes a show unconventional is the way it's executed, not cops singing or whatever is being 'Twin Peaks.'" However, he added, as next season progresses, "I think you're going to see us taking more chances."

NBC vows to remain number one

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC's entertainment chief recently boasted the network will keep its No. 1 rating on the strength of established hits, fresh new comedies, and a life-and-death medical drama from the patient's point of view.

"We're in second place, I would be confident enough to think that this (new show) development will push NBC into a new era of prime time supremacy," said Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC Entertainment.

Tartikoff, speaking to reporters on a closed-circuit hook-up with 200 network affiliates nationwide, was asked why six of his top-rated network's nine new shows are situation comedies. "I think we put the best shows on. They just happened to be comedies," he said, acknowledging that NBC will have a total of 17 sitcoms on the air, the

most ever.

Unchanged is the network's Thursday night lineup, a perennial ratings winner with "The Cosby Show," "A Different World," "Cheers," "Grand" and "L.A. Law," Tartikoff said.

Utterly changed is Friday night, the new home for four established shows: "Quantum Leap," "Night Court," "Wings," and "Midnight Caller."

Saturday night, where No. 2 ABC has gambled on "The Young Riders," "China Beach" and "Twin Peaks" changing younger adults' viewing habits, NBC will offer six half-hour comedies.

NBC's "night of 1,000 laughs," opens with the movie-based "Parenthood," Jane Curtin's divorcee for the '90s series "Working It Out," "Golden Girls," "Empty Nest," "Carol & Co." and "American Dreamer," with Robert

Urich as a small-town newspaper columnist.

The network dares to be different on Sunday night, where the potential TV audience is largest and NBC is being bludgeoned in the ratings by ABC's hit "America's Funniest Home Videos" and Fox's phenomenal "Simpsons."

"I think we've got to get a fire going on Sunday night," Tartikoff said.

The fire opens with the hourlong musical comedy-drama "Hull Street High," where the network's publicity wars, "music turks around every corner and there's no telling what pandemonium can break loose." That leads into an abrupt gearshift with "Signs of Life," the patient's-eye-view medical drama aimed at pulling away some of CBS's older "60 Minutes" audience.

fall," he said.

Pottruck said there will "a lot more CBS firepower" this fall because the network will have a heavy load of TV and theatrical films. The latter include "Born on the Fourth of July" and "Field of Dreams," part of a 10-picture

package CBS bought this year from Universal Studios.

Pottruck called NBC's May results an omen of bad things to come for that network. Comparing ABC's results with those of May last year, he also said the success of "America's Funniest Home Videos" tended to mask declining ratings for four other ABC shows, including the still-successful "Roseanne."

There may be such a decline on a

May-to-May basis, said ABC research chief Alan Wurtzel, but the real test is how a show performs over the course of a season.

"Sweeps are important to the affiliate stations," he said in an interview.

"But I'm not so sure that a sweeps (period), particularly if it's atypical, is a very good indicator of how you're going to perform as a network."
