## Gallaudet president says mission is changing perceptions of deaf

**TWIN FALLS** — When I. King Jordan wants to know what his university students are really talking about he dims the light in his office, looks out the window and eavesdrops on conversations football fields away.

Jordan is the first deaf president of Gallaudet University in its 124-year history. The school is the only liberal arts university for the deaf in the world.

He was greeted Thursday night in Twin Falls with a riotous reception — a riot of hands waving overhead.

The president said that while he considers his university position important, he feels he has a greater responsibility.

"My mission, which to me is more important than my job, is to help change the perception

that can't hear means can't think," he said.

Jordan said deaf people are the same as anyone else except they cannot hear, and because they can't hear they often have difficulty speaking.

He said it is not important how someone speaks but what they have to say. A person can speak perfectly well and not have much to say, he said.

Jordan himself spoke clearly and rapidly while his fingers signed effortlessly at the same time.

Jordan rose to the presidency of Gallaudet 15 months ago after students, faculty and outsiders furiously protested for a week the hiring of Elisabeth Zimer, who is now the president of University of Idaho.

"She has no hard feelings about what happened at Gallaudet," he said.

Jordan said the students had been continually

told by their hearing administrators that their time had almost arrived, but not quite. Deaf people were tired of hearing that, he said.

"Students were saying, 'We want this now and not some time in the future,'" he said.

Jordan said this position at the university and the prestigious jobs held more and more by other deaf people gives young deaf people something to aspire to.

"The biggest and most positive change I have seen is the attitude and confidence young people have," he said.

Many deaf students are no longer seeking modest career goals, he said.

"There are some amazing things happening in the world for the deaf," he said.

In an effort to improve opportunities for the deaf, the Chicago Medical School recently signed an agreement with Gallaudet allowing

## Crime measure sponsors fight to preserve bill

**WASHINGTON** — Senate supporters of a wide-ranging crime bill with curbs on semiautomatic assault weapons scrambled to save the measure Thursday after efforts to stop a filibuster fell short.

"I think we can work it out," Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., said after senators of both parties called for a compromise version shorn of a number of the troublesome provisions.

Republicans were weighing a plan to retain the bill's provisions to put curbs on nine semiautomatic assault weapons; overhaul the criminal appeals system, establish the death penalty for 30 federal offenses and fine-tune money laundering laws.

Under the plan, the bill would be stripped of provisions to allow courts to conduct evidence gathered with flawed warrants and to set up an organized crime and drug division in the Justice Department.

After caucusing on the scheme which also would allow 12 amendments on each side — Republican leaders walked away from the hour-long talks with their Democratic counterparts but emerged without any commitments. The two sides did agree to explore the proposal next week.

Democratic leaders blamed pressure from the National Rifle Association for Senate's failure to limit debate on the current version.

They first pronounced the bill dead after the Senate voted 57-37 in favor of limiting debate, three votes short of the number needed.

But then after an overture from Thurmond they called for talks aimed at reaching such a compromise.

"The only way we're really likely to get a bill is if we can enter into negotiations," said Sen. Joseph R. Biden Jr., D-Del.

Much of the discussion of the bill has focused on its ban on the manufacture or importation of nine kinds of semiautomatic assault rifles, but it contains other significant provisions as well.

The legislation contains remnants of President Bush's crime program, sent to Capitol Hill a year ago, but has been largely rewritten since then and few of its provisions now find favor with the administration.

Under various provisions: The death penalty would be established for 30 specific federal crimes.

Courts would be able to consider evidence gathered with flawed warrants in some cases.

An end would be sought to long delays — up to a decade in some cases — in carrying out executions. Democratic leaders said they needed to limit debate because of 300 pending amendments that could delay passage indefinitely.

## Agency rules decision won't be heard again

**BOISE** — The Idaho Supreme Court will not reconsider its decision backing "legislative vetoes" of state agency rules, a decision one attorney general candidate calls perhaps the most important constitutional decision by the court in several decades.

The Supreme Court in March ruled for the Legislature in a dispute with executive agencies whether the Legislature could reject agency rules and regulations by resolution, not subject to review by the governor, or if it had to be through a new law.

The Supreme Court of Health and Welfare, which originated the law suit, asked for a rehearing in April. In an order issued this week, the Supreme Court denied the petition.

"This decision is a major victory for the citizens of Idaho," said Patrick Koler, the Boise lawyer who represented the Legislature in the case. He is the Republican candidate for attorney general against Democrat Larry Echehart, the Bannock County prosecutor.

The Legislature has contended for years that agency rules and regula-

tions have the same effect as law and the lawmakers should be able to review them. Executive agencies have contended that branch of government is charged with running state agencies, not the Legislature.

Health and Welfare adopted regulations concerning sewer installations. Rep. Stan Hawkins, R-Idaho, led a drive to have the Legislature reject them. Health and Welfare took the matter to the Supreme Court.

In a 3-2 decision released March 13, the Supreme Court ruled that the so-called legislative veto did not violate the separation of powers doctrine, but left on the authority of the executive branch.

"This court has consistently found the executive rule-making authority to be rooted in the legislative delegation, not a power constitutionally granted to the executive," wrote Justice Charles McDevitt for the majority.

"While these rules and regulations may be given the force and effect of law, they do not rise to the level of

## Yeutter sees forests shifting to recreation uses

**WASHINGTON** — A shift from timber production will mean a higher priority over the next five years for recreation and wildlife habitats in national forest management, Agriculture Secretary Clayton Yeutter said Thursday.

Yeutter and U.S. Forest Service Chief F. Dale Robertson unveiled a long-term plan for forest and range land resources, calling for greater environmental sensitivity and a better balance among multiple uses of public lands.

The secretary said production levels will be reduced in areas where timber and mineral production and livestock grazing cannot be accomplished in an "environmentally acceptable manner."

"We are looking at multiple-use management from a new perspective," Yeutter said during a news conference at the Agriculture Department.

"This plan calls for some reductions in timber harvests and livestock range grazing in order to enhance and protect the ecological balances there," he said.

President Bush, in a formal statement to Congress, called the blueprint an "ambitious program" that "strongly renews my commitment to multiple-use management."

The plan, which the Agriculture Department is required to present to Congress every five years under the Resources Planning Act of 1974, was hailed by at least one environmental group for placing greater emphasis on fishing and wildlife habitats.

"In the past they had a telescope on trees period. Much of the emphasis has been on timber and forest products," Trout Unlimited Executive Director Robert L. Herbst said.

Leaders of the timber industry condemned the report during a Tuesday news conference, saying the projections are worthless because they ignore such critical factors as the anticipated listing of the rare northern spotted owl as a threatened species.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is to decide by June 23 whether to declare the owl as threatened, a move congressmen in the Pacific Northwest say would result logging bans across large sections of the region.

Yeutter acknowledged the industry concern.

## Ethnic warfare in Asia escalates across borders

**MOSCOW** — Ethnic warfare in Central Asia escalated Thursday as mobs roamed the capital of Kirghizia demanding the local government resign and armed militants massed on the Uzbek border to avenge the deaths of 48 people killed in the fighting.

Interior Minister Vadim Bakitin told lawmakers in Moscow the violence had spread to five regions of Kirghizia and spilled over into the neighboring republic of Uzbekistan.

Thousands of ethnic Kirghiz and Uzbeks, armed with spears, stones and guns, gathered along the border and were "standing at the ready, striving to avenge wrongdoings," Bakitin, the top Soviet law enforce-

ment official, told parliament.

The area is closed to Western correspondents, and official accounts of the unrest and the death toll have been sketchy.

The ethnic conflict seemed to be following a pattern that has become familiar under the more liberal rule of Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

Authorities declared a state of emergency Thursday in Frunze, the capital of Kirghizia. One person was beaten to death, cars were destroyed and thousands of people surrounded Communist Party and government buildings in the city, an official said.

The protesters demanded the resignation of the republic's leaders within three days and urged Kirghiz to unite and strike back at Uzbeks.

## Asbestos Studies link new, higher cancer risks, death rates to families of workers, some school custodians

**NEW YORK** — Alarming high levels of cancer and lung damage have been found in the wives and children of asbestos workers and in construction workers who don't work directly with asbestos, researchers reported Thursday.

The families of asbestos workers in one study are dying of cancer at 1 1/2 times the rate of the general population, and their only exposure to asbestos was the dust on the clothes of their husbands and fathers, a researcher said.

Many previous studies have found elevated disease and death rates among workers who produced asbestos or worked with it. The new studies find that asbestos is deadly even for construction workers who do not use it in their jobs.

High levels of asbestos-related cancer also have been found in school custodians in three separate studies, suggesting that the asbestos hazard in schools is greater than anticipated.

Dr. Philip J. Landrigan of the Mount Sinai School of Medicine in New York City. The studies are being presented at a conference that began Thursday. The conference deals with the hazards of asbestos already in place in schools and other buildings. Landrigan was one of the conference's organizers.

"The hazard of asbestos in place is more than we anticipated," Landrigan said.

Jacques Dunnigan of the Asbestos Institute, which represents the interests of Canadian asbestos mines, argued that "Canadian asbestos, called chrysotile asbestos, is less dangerous than other forms. Asked about the reports at the conference, he said, "It's very, very poor science that I'm listening to."

Asbestos-related diseases — lung cancer, a lung-scarring called asbestosis and a cancer of the lung called mesothelioma — occur 20 to 30 years after exposure to asbestos.

Asbestos was widely used as insulation in schools and other buildings during the construction boom of the 1950s and 1960s, and so asbestos-related diseases are just beginning to appear.

These diseases now cause about 10,000 deaths per year, said Dr. Stephen M. Levin, also of the Mount Sinai School of Medicine.

Lou Joubert of the American Cancer Society, who has studied 878 children and wives of men who worked at a now-closed asbestos plant in Paterson, N.J. Of the 15 that have died, three percent died of cancer, compared with an expected death rate of 20 percent to 25 percent in the general population.

Dr. Laura Welch of George Washington University in Washington found that 40 percent of sheet metal workers — who do not use asbestos in their work — had asbestos-related lung damage, a precursor of asbestosis or cancer. They were exposed to asbestos on construction sites, Welch said.

## House overrides Bush-Amtrak veto

Los Angeles Times — WASHINGTON — The House voted Thursday to override President Bush's veto of a bill that continues about \$1.6 billion in federal subsidies for Amtrak, the national passenger railway system.

Aided by the defection of 57 Republicans, House Democrats easily mustered the two-thirds majority required to overturn the veto, voting 294-123, to pass the bill. Idaho's congressmen split their votes, Democrat Richard Stollings voting to override the veto and Republican Larry Craig voting to sustain it.

However, Republicans temporarily derailed the Democratic-led effort to overturn the veto in the Senate, where Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., citing the absence of five Republicans, refused to bring the vote until Tuesday.

Bush vetoed the bill May 24 because of a provision that would subject certain types of railroad acquisitions to closer government scrutiny.

## Liberian troops, rebels in heavy fight

MONROVIA, Liberia (AP) — Rebels and government troops battled with rockets, mortars and automatic weapons in heavy fighting Thursday on the huge Firestone rubber plantation 25 miles outside Monrovia, refugees and diplomats reported.

Fighting was also reported at Robertsfield

International Airport, which adjoins the 120,000-acre, U.S.-managed plantation.

President Samuel Doe dug in at his oceanside executive mansion and was quoted as telling a U.S. diplomat on Thursday that the rebels would take this capital city of 400,000 people "over my dead body."

In Washington, the State Department said Thursday that "due to the potential threat to lives all Americans are strongly advised to depart Liberia immediately." It said U.S. officials had arranged special commercial flights.

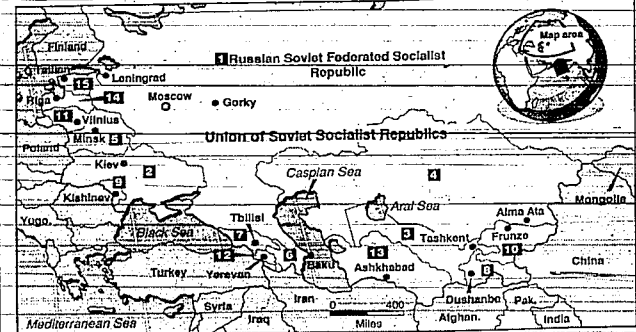
The department put the total number of Americans still in Liberia at nearly 2,000. U.S. and British naval ships are off Liberia to assist in any evacuation.

## Gays target of regional hate crimes

SEATTLE (AP) — Nearly 400 hate crimes against homosexuals were reported in three Northwest states in 1989, according to a report released Thursday by the National Gay and Lesbian Task Force.

The report, released in Washington, D.C., listed 33 hate crimes against homosexuals in Washington, 351 in Oregon, and 7 in Montana. It was the fifth annual survey of such crimes by the task force, documenting a total of 7,031 hate crimes against homosexuals in 40 states and the District of Columbia.

No incidents were reported in Idaho because that state lacks a reporting system.

The Tass news agency reported, "Kirghiz, unite!" and "Kirghiz to Osh!" they chanted. Tass said, Osh is a border city about 195 miles to the south, where fighting flared Monday over a land dispute.

The bloodletting was the latest chapter in Soviet ethnic unrest that has claimed hundreds of lives and forced hundreds of thousands of people to flee their homes over the last two years.

The Uzbeks and the Kirghiz are predominantly Sunni Muslim ethnic groups that speak different Turkic dialects.

An estimated 2,000 Uzbeks tried to cross the border from their republic to fight in Osh, but security forces stopped them and sealed all roads between Uzbekistan and Kirghizia, the unofficial Interfax news agency reported.

The sequence of events was similar to other outbreaks in past months in the heavily populated, poverty-stricken region of Central Asia. A local dispute — in this case, conflicting claims by Kirghiz and Uzbeks to private land plots — unleashed pent-up fury and exploded into widespread warfare between

On Wednesday night in Frunze, security forces fired warning shots to disperse groups of youth who vandalized a children's hospital, a cloth factory and a market. Tass reported. Mobs continued to riot in Frunze throughout Thursday, looting stores and destroying kiosks, Interfax said.

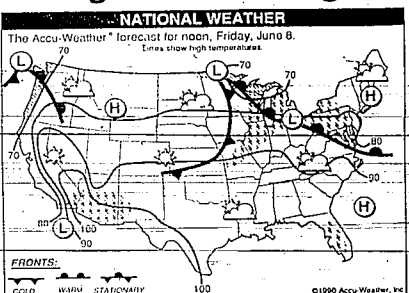

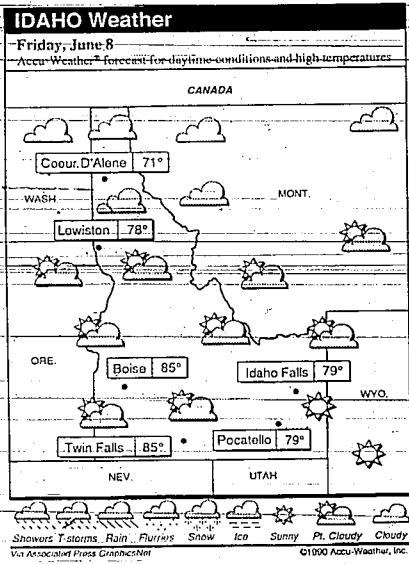

## Atlantis launch in mid-July

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A fuel leak will keep the shuttle Columbia and its \$150 million Astro observatory grounded at least until August, NASA said Thursday.

The next shuttle mission will be that of Atlantis, to carry a secret military payload into orbit in mid-July.

"It is our intent to make sure that these vehicles are ready and safe to fly," said shuttle director Robert L. Crippen.

"When we have a problem such as this, and this is the nature of the machines that we're dealing with, we just have to fall back and reengineer them in a condition that is safe to go fly."

Columbia's upcoming flights will be pushed back "in an orderly fashion," Crippen said. A scientific research mission scheduled for August is now set for December, pushing Columbia's December mission with a microgravity laboratory into next year.

Columbia will be moved from the launch pad back to the hangar next week so the hydrogen leak can be repaired, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said Wednesday. The leak was detected as more than a half-million gallons of super-cold liquid hydrogen and liquid oxygen were being pumped into the shuttle for last week's launch attempt.

The Astro mission, the first in five years dedicated entirely to scientific research, already was two weeks late because of cooling system repairs. The mission originally was scheduled for 1986, but was delayed by the Challenger explosion.

Discovery's flight in April with the Hubble Space Telescope was two weeks late because of a malfunctioning power unit that had to be replaced at the launch pad.

Crippen said "mechanical problems are to be expected now and then."

"Flying the space shuttle is not like operating an airline and it never will be," he said. "It is a very complex vehicle... that is going to have problems show up periodically and yet it does offer us a way to get large payloads into space on a fairly frequent basis."

## Bush calls Gorbachev a 'remarkable man'

MILWAUKEE (AP) — President Bush, on a political tour of the Midwest Thursday, called Mikhail Gorbachev "a remarkable man" and said the Soviet president's forthcoming summit negotiations that will lead to a "new era" in U.S.-Soviet relations.

"Of course, we have differences," said Bush, specifying Lithuanian self-determination, the emigration rights of Soviet Jews, a unified Germany as a NATO member and the continued totalitarian regime in Cuba.

"These aren't questions that can be solved simply in a single summit," Bush told a fundraising luncheon for Wisconsin Gov. Tommy Thompson.

Bush summarized the outcome of a "very productive summit" he had a two-day speaking trip for behalf of GOP Senate and gubernatorial candidates. He also planned stops in Illinois, Iowa and Nebraska.

Meanwhile, the White House harried the decision by South African President F.W. de Klerk

to lift a four-year-old state of emergency, calling the move "another significant step toward creating a climate conducive to negotiations that will lead to a democratic, non-racial South Africa."

The statement, issued by deputy White House press secretary Mike Allen aboard Air Force One en route to Milwaukee, said the announcement "builds on earlier decisions by President de Klerk toward more open and free political debate."

Bush has invited both de Klerk and famed black nationalist leader Nelson Mandela to the White House. Mandela will visit on June 25, de Klerk at a later, yet to be announced date.

After Milwaukee, Bush was traveling to Chicago to attend a two-day summit on the gubernatorial candidacy of Republican Secretary of State Jim Edgar, who is battling Democratic state Attorney General Neil Hartigan to succeed outgoing Gov. James R. Thompson, a Republican.

## Tanker runs aground, spills oil in key New York ship channel

BAYONNE, N.J. (AP) — An oil tanker ran aground Thursday, rupturing its hull and spilling about 260,000 gallons of heating oil into a busy shipping channel between New Jersey and New York, officials said.

It was the fifth major oil spill in the area since January.

Football-size globs of oil washed ashore on both sides of the Kill Van Kull waterway, which was closed to ships after the tanker BT Nautilus hit bottom while docking Thursday morning.

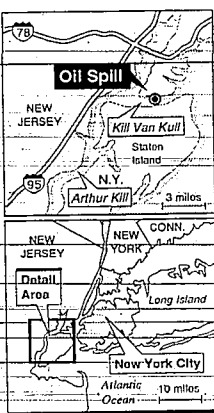
Oil leaked for almost five hours from the ship carrying 12 million gallons of heating fuel, said Coast Guard Rear Adm. Richard Rybacki in Boston.

Divers found a gash about 30 feet long and 12 to 16 inches wide in one of the ship's tanks, Rybacki said. The tank holds 1.2 million gallons.

New York Lt. Gov. Stan Lundine, after a helicopter tour of the area with New York Environmental Conservation Commissioner Thomas Jorling, called the spill serious.

"There are areas on beaches and in coves which are clearly contaminated with this very heavy oil," he said.

The recent rash of spills in Kill Van Kull and connecting Arthur Kill have brought harsh criticism of the oil industry from environmentalists



Robert Abrams said his office was conducting civil and criminal investigations into the spill.

Coast Guard Chief Petty Officer Gene Hoff said booms were strung around the ship to contain the floating oil. Vacuum and skimming equipment were being used to clean up the slick.

"It looks like mud, really disgusting," said Margaret Capuana of Jersey City, who went to a park at the southern tip of Bayonne to see the crippled tanker.

The cargo was owned by Bulk Tanker Management Ltd. of London and the vessel is owned by Nautilus Tanker Co., said Coast Guard Cmdr. Philip Chace.

Richard Bartha, a Rutgers University microbiology professor, said the waterways have suffered such environmental destruction in recent months that only birds were likely to suffer serious harm.

"There is little living in the water anymore, because the water quality is so bad," he said.

Thursday's spill prompted New York and New Jersey members of Congress to ask that House Speaker Thomas Foley add a proposal to require double hulls on oil tankers into an oil spill bill being considered by a House-Senate committee.

### Model found guilty of tax evasion

MILWAUKEE (AP) — A former Playboy model was convicted Thursday of failing to pay taxes on almost \$400,000 she got from an elderly millionaire, who allegedly paid her and her twin sister for companionship or sex.

The jury found Leigh Ann Conley, 35, guilty on four misdemeanor counts of failing to file federal income tax returns on about \$398,000.

## Medical miracle turns into a feminist cause

CHICAGO — It's surprising how fast a medical miracle can turn into a bioethical problem — and a feminist cause.

The network newscasts had no sooner finished their happily upbeat stories about the newest medical baby — whose life was saved by surgery when it was a 27-week-old fetus — than objections from bioethicists and feminists began.

It's unfair and unethical to subject a pregnant woman to the risks and pain of major surgery and of anesthesia solely to benefit someone else, the critics scolded. Sure, she volunteered. But what if someday the courts rule women must undergo such operations on behalf of their unborn child, like it or no?

The life saved in this case is that of Blake Schultz, diagnosed midway in his prenatal life as having an opening in his diaphragm which allowed his stomach, intestines, spleen and part of his liver to push into his chest, crowding his lungs so they couldn't grow.

Babies like Blake may survive long enough to be born. Then most of them die, even as soon as they try to take their first breaths of air.

But physicians at the University of California, San Francisco, were ready to try an unprecedented operation. It had succeeded in experiments on animals. But it was failed to save the lives of the first six unborn babies subjected to the surgery in utero.

Beth Schultz, 27, was willing to take the long-shot gamble: the misery of surgery outweighed against the life of her unborn son. This time, the gamble paid off.

Seven weeks after the operation, Blake was born weighing more than four pounds. He needed some help from a respirator for four weeks.

But now he's eight months old, normal, healthy and doing well. Since his birth, a baby girl also survived the same surgical intervention and thriving, too.

The lives of several hundred other babies with similar malformations might be saved by fetal surgery every year. Similar techniques may prove to be life-saving in a few other conditions, too.

So why the controversy? In a way, I think, it grows out of resentment for anything that handicaps women and not men in pursuit of what are supposed to be common goals of power, money, success, recognition, career, independence and personal fulfillment.

Since long before recorded history, the needs of children and family have been powerful forces that have kept women in familial bondage, however loving, without freedom or opportunity to pursue other goals.

To break out of that bondage has been a primary aim of many feminists, who therefore champion abortion, day care, equitarian parenting and other ways to minimize the impact of offspring.

The perceptions that society uses pregnancy and motherhood as chains to keep women from competing equally with men also help explain the outrage of some

feminists about lifestyle restrictions demanded of pregnant women. It is particularly resentment seems to be growing over warnings to women not to drink alcoholic beverages during pregnancy. A recent op-ed article in the New York Times, for example, lashed out at the press for not warning about possible ill effects of male drinking and said "assertions about women's biology in general and their role as childbearers no threaten our civil liberties and the gains we have made."

Feminists are also angry about attempts to bar women from jobs where they might be exposed to a substance linked to birth defects. The Supreme Court is now faced with a case involving a battery manufacturer that bans all women of child-bearing age from posts that might expose them to mercury.

But the biological facts are that most birth defects linked to environmental factors are caused when the substances enter the body of a pregnant woman, cross the placenta and act on the baby's immature, fast-growing tissues. There simply is no way to equalize the burden of protecting an unborn baby between his mother and his father — just as only Blake's mother could have saved his life.

Society does have a vested interest in helping all babies be born normal and healthy.

It is difficult to weigh a woman's right to drink or use crack or hold a job in a battery factory with a baby's right to a normal brain and body or a decision that the woman's rights predominate (even if she has the legal right to terminate the baby's life before he is born).

It is true that not every woman who drinks or uses crack or is exposed to teratogens (substances that cause birth defects) during pregnancy bears an abnormal child. Not every 27-year-old who plays in the street is crushed by a truck. But it is considered an unacceptable risk by most people.

Fortunately, most women don't see an inherent conflict between their rights and the welfare of their offspring. Knowing how to safeguard an unborn infant from hazards is usually seen as welcome knowledge, not coercion. Just as for a child's mom, doing the best possible for a child becomes an important source of fulfillment and personal reward.

Still, the conflicts of interest and clashes of rights don't wash away in bathos and blather about motherhood, any more than the chronic problems of combining career and family.

But most women don't need Barbara Bush to remind them, as she did the Washington Post, that their human connections with family and friends "are the most important investment you will ever make."

## Bush gives Gorbachev room to run

WASHINGTON — At his best, President Bush neither gloats nor blusters, two traits critical to his deal dealings with Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev.

At his best, Bush is also patient, which matters since the U.S.-Soviet negotiations today are a virtue of the impatient — the vision thing.

What makes the best of Bush of value now is the running room it has given Gorbachev to gradually end up where the president hopes he will want to park the economic boat off Ljuban's neck, being bold in junking communist policies, and, above all, accepting Gorbachev's reunification.

Wisely, Bush's behavior stems from a realization that these three happy events must be the result of Soviet policy decisions and that American bluster will only make them less likely.

Bush's classically behavior last week recognized that this post-Cold War summit was not a linear, two-dimensional event. It did not "end," as newspaper headlines falsely proclaimed; neither did it produce or fail to produce "results," another false press image.

Instead, befitting what is now a true relationship, the summit transferred its business in improved condition to different venues — to Copenhagen this week, Berlin later this month, and Geneva and Vienna for the summer and fall.

Contrary to the railings of increasingly isolated right-wingers, Bush did not give Gorbachev more than he got; he gave far

less than he appeared to, and he got much of lasting, as opposed to headline, value. For example:

• On Lithuania, Bush rejected his own headline option of not signing a commercial relations treaty as long as Gorbachev's economic blockade continues.

However, before signing the treaty on Friday, Bush did inform the Senate that it would not be ratified by the Senate as long as the sanctions continue and until serious talks with Lithuania begin. Gorbachev never contested Bush's point.

He also knows Bush won't even send the treaty to Capitol Hill, along with the most-favored-nation trading status Gorbachev wants even more badly, until the Soviet Union's liberalized emigration policy is written into law. Gorbachev, in short, got nothing, but on a leash.

• On economic perestroika, the summit's first session last Thursday opened with a stark appraisal by Gorbachev of current conditions. He frank acknowledgment that his recent quarter-measures have flopped, and a plea for the trade treaty's signing as a Gorbachev assist.

Gorbachev and his top advisers also swore publicly and privately that a Lausanne break with the Stalinist past, and move to a market future, is essential, with some even saying that the days of Prime Minister Nikolai Ryzhkov are numbered. For Bush and his advisers, the Bush bluff-

portrait underlined the centrality of economic and political democratization to every other aspect of Soviet relations.

The imperative of economic revolution — and thus the imperative of gaining admission to the West's international institutions and markets — makes limited running room on Lithuania and Germany prudent tactics, not major concessions.

• On Germany, Gorbachev took two important steps. First, he did not quarrel with the obvious — that a unified Germany will decide its own NATO future.

Second, he told Bush that he wants a U.S. military presence in Germany after reunification.

That makes the NATO issue a question of what security assurances the Soviets will eventually deem sufficient to stop foot-dragging on an inevitable conventional forces reduction treaty.

Bush has already moved to make NATO less military and more political, and to upgrade broader European institutions, and Germany is already dangle security and economic incentives of its own, and some Soviets hint that a nuclear-weapon-free zone might be a breakthrough move.

To say there are risks to Bush's patience is to be a little obtuse. The fact that he has made exactly the right moves thus far is much more important.

## Disney omission pleasing to China

It seemed a little odd when the young hostess at the China pavilion at Epcot Center in Disney World in Florida said that she was from Hong Kong.

After all, Hong Kong's immersion into the shadowy world of the People's Republic of China is still a few years off, and in the wake of the atrocities of Tiananmen Square last June, this seemed a trifle incongruous. We would be watching a circuitous movie about a man who had been in the big leagues to grasp the hand mills as we stood in the huge auditorium. The movie's sweeping photography might give a false sense of motion. Without support, we might lose our balance and fall. It turned out we would need mental hand rails to steady ourselves amid the film's wacky historical perspective.

It was spectacular, in true Disney fashion. In 360-degree splendor, we swept across mountains and down to lowland rice

paddies, around waterfalls and forests and into Beijing. Then we were in this huge auditorium with happy children playing with paper toys, grandmothers pushing squirming kids in strollers and lovers gliding by on bicycles. "Where are the blood stains?" someone whispered. There was the gigantic picture of Mao. Until this point the film had been detailed, but the plaza was not named. We were in Tiananmen Square.

The China footage was shot before the Tiananmen massacre by an American crew, with permission to travel freely in China. Disney is in the fun business, the business of creating illusions; it isn't in the business of interfering with the omission of "Tiananmen Square" from the China

pavilion script at Epcot was purely coincidental. It hadn't been blipped out last June.

Epcot was completed in 1982 at a cost of \$800 million. Eight to 10 million visitors travel to the Central Florida emporium every year, most of them doubtless yearning to be free of politics and problems for a day or two. Still, there's something awful about the denial of reality at the China pavilion. It delivers a message to the greschall merchants yearning to make a buck in China. No doubt it pleases an administration that would pander to their murderers by designating their nation "most favored."

Disney ought to shut the film down. Or at least, it ought to edit the film so that it doesn't make us American tourists, T,000 at a clip, feel like such chumps.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Manuel H. Johnson unexpectedly announced his resignation Thursday from the No. 2 job at the Federal Reserve, creating a key opening at an agency often criticized by the Bush administration for keeping interest rates too high.

Johnson, 41, said he planned to return to an academic career.

The Aug. 3 departure will give President Bush the chance to make another appointment to the seven-member board that directs the nation's monetary policy.

The administration at various times in past months has been openly critical of the Fed's efforts to restrain inflation by keeping interest rates high.

There was a published report in March quoting an unnamed Bush adviser as saying the president was "mad as hell" with Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan and would not reappoint him as chairman.

Bush later insisted there was "no bubbling war" with Greenspan, but left the clear impression he would like to see more aggressive action on

the part of the Fed to lower interest rates.

Analysts said it was likely that Bush would appoint someone to the Fed who would be more amenable to the administration's pleas for lower interest rates.

"This administration has been jawboning the Fed on and off for some time for a looser monetary policy," said Kenneth Goulet of the Independent Bankers Association of America. "They want lower interest rates because they don't want the economy moving into a recession."

Fed officials have been pursuing a "soft-landing" approach for the economy in which interest rates are used to slow growth enough to ease inflationary pressures but not enough to tip the country into a recession.

Many analysts believe that approach is working and that the Fed is unlikely to change course even with a new vice chairman appointed by Bush.

The Fed isn't closely divided now where one vote in either direction would make much of a difference," said Lyle Gramley, a former Fed governor and now chief economist of the Mortgage Bankers Association.

The administration had no immediate comment on Johnson's departure. The president will have

the opportunity to either name someone new to the board and designate that person as vice chairman or select someone from government as vice chairman while appointing someone else to fill Johnson's board term, which runs until Aug. 21, 2000.

There was speculation that David Mullins, appointed to the Fed earlier this year, might be considered for Johnson's job.

Mullins, one of the authors of the savings and loan bailout legislation, had been a top assistant to Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady.

Johnson was appointed to the Fed by President Reagan on Feb. 7, 1986, and was elevated to vice chairman six months later.

He said his resignation would be effective at the end of his four-year term as vice chairman.

"I am extremely proud to have played a part in the unprecedented period of sustained economic growth and low inflation that has characterized the decade of the 1980s and continues into the 1990s," Johnson said in his letter of resignation.

# Most Hispanics living in urban areas

WASHINGTON (AP) — Like other immigrant groups before them, America's Hispanics are clustering in cities in a few states and tend to marry one another, a Census Bureau report released Thursday shows.

More than 90 percent of the nation's 20 million Hispanics live in urban areas, and nearly nine of 10 reside in just nine states, the bureau said.

The study of the nation's Hispanics found that they seek each other out to form families. Some 85 percent of Hispanic husbands married Latino women and 82 percent of Hispanic wives wed Latin men.

The report, "The Hispanic Population in the United States," found:

- There were 20,076,000 Hispanics in the United States as of March 1989. That's up 38.9 percent since 1980. In the same period, the nation's population increased 9.5 percent.
- About 92 percent of Hispanic households were in urban areas, compared with 73 percent of non-

Hispanics.

- The poverty rate among Hispanics was 23.7 percent, it was 9.4 percent for others.
- Only 42 percent of Hispanic households live in homes they own or are buying, compared with 66 percent for non-Hispanics.
- Some 82 percent of Hispanics had a phone in their home, compared with 94 percent of non-Hispanics.
- Mexicans were the largest and fastest growing group of Hispanics. They totaled 12.6 million in 1989, up 45 percent from 1980. There were also 2.3 million Puerto Ricans, up 17.5 percent; 1.1 million Cubans, up 33.8 percent; and 4.1 million other Hispanics, up 36 percent.
- California has by far the most Hispanics: 6.8 million, or 34 percent of the national total.
- Second in rank with 4.3 million. Other states with large Hispanic populations are New York, 1.9 million; Florida, 1.6 million; Illinois, 855,000; Arizona, 725,000; New Jersey, 638,000; New Mexico, 549,000 and Colorado, 421,000.

# Rate of business investment expected to be slower

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. businesses plan to boost plant and equipment investment in 1990 at the slowest rate in three years, the government said Thursday in a report reflecting a sluggish economy and weak product demand.

The Commerce Department said a survey completed in May found businesses planning to boost spending on expansion and modernization by 5.5 percent to \$500.4 billion. It would be the fourth consecutive yearly increase.

But while the spending projection would top the record \$474.3 billion set last year, the rate of increase would be the slowest since a 4.2 percent gain in 1987. Investments rose 8.9 percent last year and 9.4 percent in 1988.

"It shows the manufacturing sector is responding negatively to the sluggishness in that area," said Robert G. Dederick, chief economist for the Northern Trust Co. in Chicago.

"All one is looking for here is that it not be a drag on the

economy," he added. "If it were a drag, it would be a heavy burden on the economy given the other negatives such as defense spending and housing."

Manufacturing and housing have been the sectors of the economy hardest hit by the Federal Reserve's tight-money policy. Also, the federal government has cut back on military spending because of budget constraints.

The new estimate is down from the 7.9 percent spending increase in a previous survey completed in

March. A survey completed in November indicated a 4.9 percent investment gain this year.

All of the figures have been adjusted for inflation.

Lawrence Chermisne, senior economic adviser for the WEFA Group in Bala Cynwyd, Pa., said three factors were dampening investment plans — a soft economy and subsequent sluggish demand, weak profits and cash flows, and high interest rates, and tighter restrictions on credit.

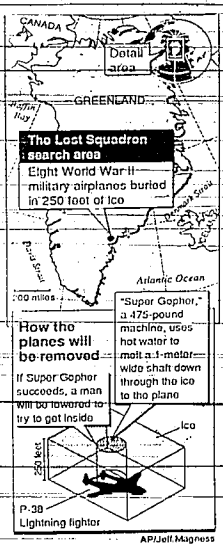

## Former U.S. soldier leaked NATO, other documents

BONN, West Germany (AP) — A former U.S. soldier convicted of spying for the East bloc leaked documents on NATO and American troops in Europe, the chief federal prosecutor's office said Thursday.

Former Army Sgt. 1st Class Clyde Lee Conrad was found guilty of high treason and sentenced to life in prison in West Germany on Wednesday after a court in Koblenz found he had passed classified secrets to Hungary and Czechoslovakia over a period of 10 years.

It was the first time a foreign resident living in West Germany had been tried for espionage.

A court in the West German state of Rhineland-Palatinate, in which

the spying occurred, found the 43-year-old Conrad guilty of providing material to the Hungarian and Czechoslovak secret services from 1975 through 1985.

It is estimated he received \$1.2 million for his efforts.

The native of Sebring, Ohio, had been in charge of the classified document center at the army's 8th Infantry Division in Bad Kreuznach, 50 miles west of Frankfurt, during the majority of his time with the

Czechoslovakia and Hungary had not cooperated in the investigation.

"But that's quite normal. Those countries who are involved in the case they are not asked to cooperate," he said.

ABC News reported Wednesday that authorities were investigating another former U.S. Army sergeant. The network added he had been recruited into the espionage ring by Conrad when both were stationed in Bad Kreuznach.

The report, which quoted unidentified U.S. sources, said the second man had been talking with the FBI. It said the espionage ring had, among other things, smuggled computer parts from the United States to the East bloc via Canada.

Prechtel denied that Conrad was involved in smuggling computer parts.

He said West Germans had no other investigation pending in connection with the Conrad case but pointed out that the United States had given West Germany the information for Conrad's prosecution. Because Conrad had retired in West Germany with his German wife and son, he had to be prosecuted by German authorities.

U.S. authorities in West Germany referred all questions regarding Conrad and possible other investigations to Washington.

Conrad's Bonn-based lawyer, Klaus Huemmerich, said he would appeal the judgment.

## Borer hits plane deep under ice

CHAMBLEE, Ga. (AP) — After a decade of trying to reach planes buried in Arctic ice since World War II, a thermal-borer Wednesday banged against the skin of a B-17.

The bomber is one of eight planes — two B-17s and six twin-engine P-38 Lightning fighters — that crash-landed on the Greenland icecap. They ran out of fuel en route to Europe after being decoyed by false radio transmissions from German submarines in 1942.

Pat Epps, who with Richard Taylor co-founded the Greenland Expedition Society, heard by radio from Greenland on Wednesday morning that the group had succeeded in reaching the plane.

"They're going to try to enlarge the hole to get into a hatch," said Epps, owner of an air service in suburban Atlanta.

Taylor planned to descend 250 feet to the plane through a 42-inch shaft, Epps said.

"We plan to get the fighters out this year. We will work until Sept. 1," said Epps, who returned from the icecap last week.

The team left Atlanta on May 3 for Greenland. A second unit, led by Angelo Pizzagalli of Burlington, Vt., left a week later.

While Taylor and the first group got to the first bomber, Pizzagalli, president of Pizzagalli Construction Co., and his men used a huge auger to bore a hole 16 feet in diameter to one of the P-38s, a plane the Germans called a "fortified device."

They fell behind schedule because of bad weather, including two blizzards after they landed on the ice in southeastern Greenland.

The eight planes crash-landed July 15, 1942. Their crews were juped in one of the B-17s for nine days until a sled dog team, which mushed into a spot fixed by radio triangulation, arrived to lead them to the coast.

A month later, officials learned the Norden bombsight on one of the bombers had not been destroyed, so Army Air Force Col. Norman Vaughan went in alone by toboggan to get it before it could fall into the hands of the Germans, who had weather stations in the area.

Vaughan, a vice president of the Greenland Expedition Society, is among the crew of a dozen men working on the icecap.

The planes were forgotten until the early 1970s, when Col. Carl Rudder, one of the P-38 pilots, mentioned them to Roy Degan, a commercial fishing pilot, who brought the idea of an Arctic expedition to Epps.

Epps and Taylor founded the Greenland Expedition Society in 1981. Vaughan, of Trappet Creek, Alaska, learned about the group from a newspaper story and joined it.

The society eventually obtained search and salvage rights from the government of Denmark, which owns Greenland.

In 1988, the society found the aircraft using a low-frequency subsurface radar. Last year, expedition members drilled down to the B-17 and brought back poker chip-size pieces of its skin.

Epps declined to say how much money the society has raised or spent on its efforts, but he estimated it will have spent \$800,000 to \$1 million by Sept. 1. It is financed by its own fund-raising efforts and the work of Rolls Ltd., Pizzagalli's non-profit corporation in Vermont.

## Stalin aide tried poisons on prisoners

MOSCOW (AP) — Josef Stalin's henchman used people already condemned to death to test cloak-and-dagger methods of execution, including poisoned food or poison-tipped walking sticks, a newspaper revealed.

This week's Moscow News also detailed the arrest of Stalin's secret police chief Lavrenti Beria in 1953, saying the late Soviet leader Leonid I. Brezhnev used a pistol and helped nab Beria in the Kremlin.

The portrait of Brezhnev, who came to power 11 years later, is surprisingly positive given current criticism that he led the country to decay until his death in 1982.

Beria was executed in December 1953, nine months after Stalin died, by a handful of Soviet officials who feared he would use his brutal methods to seize power.

Moscow News produced excerpts from the indictment against Beria, which alleged he and two underlings were responsible for "carrying out experiments on live people."

"Seeking methods to use various poisons to carry out secret murders," Beria organized a secret laboratory to carry out experiments on Soviets who were sentenced to death," the newspaper said.

Scientists at the secret laboratory poisoned their victims "through food; a prick from a walking stick, or injections," the indictment said.

At least 150 people died that way, the indictment said.

A few dozen more were poisoned in hideouts in Moscow.

## E. Germans sorry they OK'ed China crackdown

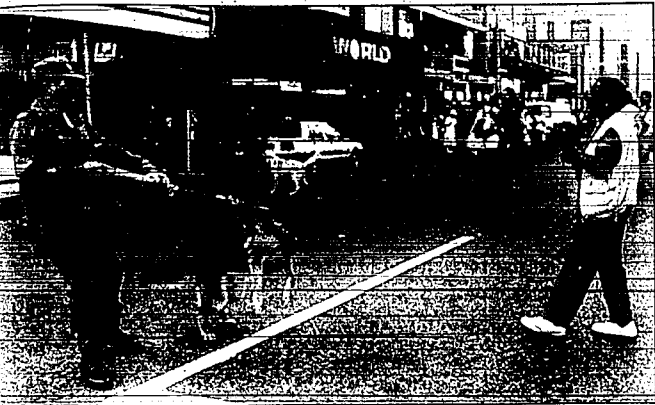
EAST BERLIN (AP) — Lawmakers on Thursday praised Chinese demonstrators for inspiring East Germany's own peaceful revolution and apologized for a resolution supporting last year's violent crackdown in Beijing.

East Germany's Parliament, which was elected March 18 in the nation's first free elections, passed by a voice vote a declaration meant to erase the former Communist government's support of the Chinese crackdown.

"The first freely elected Parliament ... regrets the former members remember the victims with profound sorrow," the declaration said. The former Communist-controlled Parliament passed a declaration June 8, 1989, that expressed support for the Chinese military attack on protesters.

The old resolution was passed four days after troops rolled through Beijing and into the capital's Tiananmen Square, killing hundreds and perhaps thousands of people.

The declaration — approved Thursday drew parallels to China's thwarted democracy movement and East Germany's own revolt.

## S. Africa lifts emergency state, paving way for apartheid talks

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — President F.W. de Klerk on Thursday ended the 4-year-old national state of emergency that had included some of the harshest political restrictions ever imposed by the country's white rulers.

The end of the national emergency helps pave the way for black-white negotiations on dismantling apartheid. But de Klerk said violence-torn Natal Province will remain under emergency rule.

"The net result of the lifting of the state of emergency is that one of the main stumbling blocks (to constitutional negotiations) has been removed," de Klerk told Parliament in Cape Town.

In Paris, African National Congress leader Nelson Mandela said de Klerk's action was "a victory for the people ... both black and white."

But he said he would continue to urge Western governments to maintain economic sanctions against South Africa, and he criticized the retention of the state of emergency in Natal.

The White House welcomed de Klerk's move, calling it a sign of "the remarkable progress" in recent months in South Africa.

Right-wing whites, who have opposed recent reforms, criticized the action.

During the state of emergency, more than 30,000 activists, most of them black, were detained without charge for varying lengths of time. Thousands more went into hiding after former President P.W. Botha imposed the restrictions on June 12, 1986.

About 300 activists were being held under the emergency regulations as of Thursday, most of them in Natal.

In announcing the end of the state of emergency, de Klerk also held out the prospect for other reforms.

He said the government was considering changes to security laws that "could possibly inhibit the free conduct of peaceful politics" and said he was taking unspecified actions that would allow thousands of exiles to return home.

The ANC says it has more than 15,000 exiled members.

De Klerk also said that as a "good will gesture" he would release 48 prisoners convicted of politically motivated crimes. The ANC has said there are more than 2,000 inmates it considers political prisoners.

The ANC has said the lifting of the emergency, the release of political prisoners and the return of exiles are the main obstacles to full negotiations.

De Klerk defended the decision to keep Natal under emergency rule, saying the violence there "cannot be countered with the ordinary laws of the land."

More than 4,000 blacks have been killed in factional fighting in Natal since 1986, including some 500 who died in the first three months of this year.

The main combatants in Natal are supporters of the ANC, the country's most powerful black organization, and members of Inkatha, a relatively conservative Zulu group.

Mandela said the retention of the emergency in Natal was "not likely to reduce the violence."

"It has been enforced since 1986 and ... the level of violence has not abated," he said. "It has served no purpose whatsoever."


The pro-apartheid Conservative Party said the end of the emergency would further alienate right-wing whites disgruntled with de Klerk's reforms.

"He no longer speaks for the (white) people," he claims to represent," said Clive Derby-Lewis, a spokesman for the Conservatives.


De Klerk wants to work out a new constitution with opposition groups that will lead to power-sharing between the whites and blacks.

# Official sees U.S.-Soviet pact coming on space defense work

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union and United States may agree this year on an experimental program for increasing each side's observation of the other's anti-missile defense work, a senior U.S. negotiator said Thursday.

David Smith, chief U.S. delegate to the Geneva negotiations on defense and space, told reporters such an accord was possible as early as this year. But he saw little likelihood of completing a formal treaty on the use of space-based defenses against strategic ballistic missiles within the next two years.

He said there was no official target date for completing the Defense and Space Treaty, which, in the U.S. view, would govern a gradual transition to both countries from offensive to defensive means of deterring nuclear war. But the Soviets don't accept that concept, saying it would lead to a new, more expensive, more dangerous and unpredictable arms race in space.

Smith said the experimental program, as proposed by the United States, would be an important sign of progress in the Geneva talks, which have been bogged down lately.

The United States has proposed an executive agreement on "predictability measures" designed to build confidence in both Washington and Moscow that neither side is trying to conceal its intentions in researching space-based defenses. These measures would include exchanges of data, meetings of experts and reciprocal briefings, visits to weapons laboratories and observations of tests.

The proposed experimental program would require each side to apply the predictability measures to one of its own strategic defense projects for one year. Each side could decide which of its projects would be used for this purpose.

"It's an early, wide window into each other's programs," Smith said. "That kind of openness promotes stability."

The Soviets have agreed to the idea of predictability measures, but they disagree with some aspects of the U.S. proposal. For example, they want the measures to be used as a way of verifying compliance with the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty that outlawed space-based defenses. The U.S. wants no connection between these measures and the ABM Treaty.

In a separate meeting with reporters, Linton Brooks, deputy chief of the U.S. delegation to the Geneva talks, said the superpowers may complete a treaty on 30 percent reductions in long-range offensive nuclear weapons by November.

Brooks said he was confident the treaty would be finished by the end of the year.

# Sullivan: Animal activists 'terrorists'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's top health official portrayed animal rights activists Thursday as "terrorists" and said their tactics jeopardize the future of disease-curing experiments.

"Animal research has saved millions of human lives," said Health and Human Services Secretary Louis Sullivan. "It is an integral part of mankind's striving for the betterment of humanity."

"I am saddened and a bit angry that we have to put up with major disruptions to science by so-called animal activists who are, in fact, nothing more than animal rights terrorists," he said.

Animal rights activists, who plan to march Sunday in the nation's capital, responded that Sullivan's remarks were "appalling." They said he was ignoring the continuing exploitation of laboratory animals that suffer needlessly while alternative, non-animal testing methods are available.

Sullivan was joined at a news conference by officials from the Association of American Medical Colleges, actor David Birney, who is a national spokesman for the American Diabetes Association; Rep. Vin Weber, R-Minn.; and parents of children who have benefited from medical procedures that evolved from animal experiments. Also participating were representatives of the beef, dairy, poultry and other industries dependent on animals.

Sullivan said that "virtually everyone agrees that unnecessary animal research or the cruel use of animals is wrong."

He added, however, that the federal government has "place regulations that ensure that research animals are treated humanely" and that we do everything possible to "reduce any discomfort" that results from experiments. He said cruel treatment of animals by research scientists was "very rare."

# Quayle hopes China policy aids change

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Dan Quayle told Chinese student leader Thursday that he hopes the Bush administration's trade policy with China will help improve that country's internal situation, a Quayle spokesman said.

Quayle spent nearly an hour talking to Chai Ling, who said she urged that the United States link any trade concessions to improvements in China's human rights records. The meeting had been scheduled to last 20 minutes.

Ms. Ling, who recently fled her country after 10 months in hiding, spoke with the vice president about the democracy movement, her escape and the mood of the Chinese people. She went into hiding after Chinese troops opened fire on democracy demonstrators last year near Tiananmen Square in Beijing.

Ms. Ling said she applauded the role of Voice of America in keeping the Chinese people informed and urged that the radio service's broadcast signal be strengthened.

After her session with the vice president, Ms. Ling told reporters she hopes the United States "can find some way" to make its influence felt on China.

# Pizza man avoids snapping turtle, but robbers steal \$50

BALCH-SPRINGS, Texas (AP) — Where was the crime-fighting, pepperoni pizza-munching Mutant Ninja Turtles when pizza delivery man Troy Brewer really needed them?

After all, they may have known his alleged hard-shelled attacker. Brewer said he was at a pay phone when he was robbed by a pair of thieves armed with a snapping turtle. "That sucker was going to bite me," he said. "They put him right up to my face."

The terrifying turtle didn't nip the flustered pizza delivery man, but those wielding it got away with his money pouch containing about \$50, he said.

"Don't move or you're gonna get bit," Brewer said robbers told him.

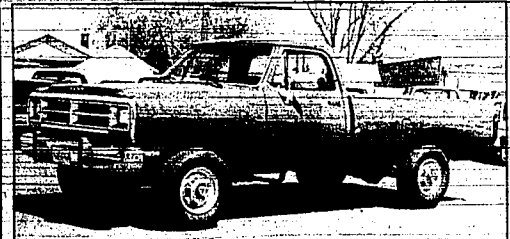

### Man pleads innocent in stabbing of woman

**RUPERT (AP)** — A Heyburn man has pleaded innocent to the stabbing death of a woman in her sun room. Bill Eugene Brady, 21, entered his plea Tuesday on charges of first-degree murder and second-degree burglary. Forty-one-year-old Nancy Kidd of Heyburn was found dead in her home on May 9. She had been stabbed to death and was believed to have fought her assailant. Brady was arrested several days later. A trial on the charges has been set for Sept. 4 in 5th District Court with Judge James May presiding.

### State confiscates records of health-care company

**TWIN FALLS** — Idaho Department of Health and Welfare investigators, accompanied by Twin Falls Sheriff's deputies, confiscated billing records and other documents from Quality Home Care Services earlier this week.

Health and Welfare is looking into "questionable billing practices" at the business, which provides home-based care to Medicaid patients, said Mary Keltz, public information officer for the department.

Investigators armed with a search warrant took the documents Monday, but no charges have been filed in the case and no action has been taken against Quality Home Care Services, Keltz said.

The business, located south of town, is owned by Jolene and Charles Tuma of Twin Falls. Jolene Tuma refused to comment on the case Thursday.

### Officers probing gunshot wound suffered by youth

**TWIN FALLS** — A 17-year-old Twin Falls youth suffered a gunshot wound around midnight on Wednesday, according to police records.

A nurse at the Twin Falls Clinic and Hospital called the police at 12:11 a.m. Thursday, reporting that the boy received the wound at a friend's house about 5 miles west of the Circle K store at 890 Washington Street South.

A hospital spokesman said Thursday that the boy had not been admitted.

At 1:18 a.m., police received two calls reporting what sounded like three gunshots coming from the area of the Circle K on Washington Street South.

Officers who responded to the call heard nothing and found no evidence of gunshots. Police do not know if the two incidents are related.

The driver of the backhoe, 15-year-old Justin Johnson of Jerome, was uninjured, he said. The 16-year-old Jerome girl was cited for passing without sufficient clearance, and the Sheriff's Department is continuing the investigation, Brant said.

## Hailey paces boom in Magic Valley homebuilding

**TWIN FALLS** — Builders planned on constructing 93 percent more residential units in the Magic Valley in April than they did in the same month one year ago, according to First Security Bank's Idaho Construction Report.

Hailey paced the region with permits to construct 33 "dwelling units" — 32 more than one year earlier. The value of those permits was \$1.7 million — \$1.6 million higher than 1989.

But the total value of Magic Valley's new residential units in Twin Falls city —

new residential permits dropped to \$9.3 million from \$9.7 million due in part to a \$2 million drop in the values of residential construction permits in unincorporated Blaine County.

Likewise, total value of all construction permits, including commercial property and renovation work, dropped 8 percent to about \$11.6 million.

Contributing to that drop was a \$1 million decrease in the value of building renovation permits.

Builders held permits to construct 12 new residential units in Twin Falls city —

10 more than in April 1989. The value of new-residence permits was about \$659,000 in April 1990 — roughly \$400,000 higher a year earlier.

Ketchum saw an overall slump in the total value of construction from last year, but new-home construction value rose there by about \$400,000.

Burley saw an increase in the total number of construction permits over the year and a 104 percent increase in the total value of construction permits.

Rupert saw a slight decrease in permit values.

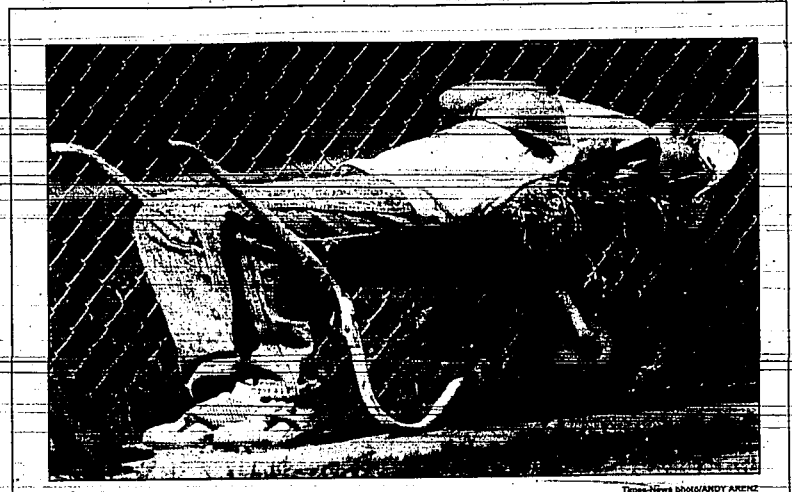
Gooding, Jerome and Shoshone all had no new residential permits in April 1990.

Total permits in Magic Valley were up 12 percent, according to the First Security Bank's figures.

Statistics for new residential construction recorded strong growth.

Compared with April 1989, new dwelling permits were up 41.3 percent to 585, while related construction value was up 29.2 percent to \$38.8 million.

Over 85 percent of the state's total residential construction was for single-family homes.

## Rupert faces maintenance, other park problems

**RUPERT** — After a little bargaining with the owner, the City Council has agreed to take over most of the maintenance of Johnson Park, a privately owned park that has been used by many residents at no charge.

Owner Chuck Dalry asked the city to apply to take over the maintenance of the park, which includes mowing and watering the lawn, paying for insurance and covering the electric bill for running a small pump used for irrigation.

Public Works Director Les Hutchison reported that after a survey of 90 people in the park area, the Parks and Recreation committee recommends the city maintain the landscaping and pay for liability insurance, but that Dalry continue to pay for watering and electricity.

Hutchison said that of the 45 people that answered the questionnaire, 29 said they do not use the park.

Dalry told the council Tuesday night that the neighborhood survey doesn't show the whole picture because other people from outside the city also use the park.

"The park has been in use for 40 years," he said.

And he added that Johnson Park supplements the city's parks by providing a

practice field, mainly for baseball.

Dalry said he would have no alternative but post "No Trespassing" and "Private Property" signs and close the park to the public if the city does not agree to take over all aspects of its maintenance.

He said the park has become too much of a financial burden for him.

Councilman Joel Rogers said the city should look more at how much money Dalry has saved the city during the last 40 years and not so much on what it will cost to keep it open.

The council unanimously agreed to enter into a 10-year lease agreement with Dalry to provide lawn care, liability insurance, electricity and water for the park.

Dalry agreed to maintain the sprinklers.

The agreement will also give the city first option to buy the park if Dalry should decide to sell the property.

On the subject of parks, Mayor Bill Whitton said he has been contacted by several citizens complaining of loud music and unacceptable language at Rupert's Neptune Park.

The mayor visited the park and said he was "appalled at what I saw and heard."

Gypsy Houston, who lives across from the park, told the council she has been sexually harassed at the park and is now "afraid to use the park."

Resident Richard Baird said the noise

gets so loud "it rattles the windows in my house."

Whitton said he contacted Police Chief Paul Fries and that some extra foot patrolmen and extra manpower from the police reserves began patrolling the park as of Monday.

"The council does not intend to (just) stand by and will do whatever is legal to get control," Whitton said.

If the situation has not drastically improved in two weeks, Whitton said, he will recommend at least a temporary restraint on alcohol at the park. Neptune Park is one of only two parks in Rupert that allows open containers of alcohol, Councilman Rogers said.

In other business, the council:

- Heard a report from Wally Studer that the Rupert Chamber of Commerce has

raised \$1,500 by way of a benefit bowling tournament to be held this weekend. The Organization of Rupert Businesses and the Rupert Bowl are sponsoring the fund-raiser to help with the purchase of a drug-sniffing dog to aid the Rupert Police Department.

Studer asked the council and the police department for help in obtaining further sponsors for teams. The tournament begins Friday at the Rupert Bowl and will conclude Sunday. Cost is \$50 per five-man team.

- Decided it will use \$7,250 in funds from the Public Works Department budget to purchase a used car for the department. The car will come with a 23,000-mile or 3-year warranty.

- Approved spending \$4,700 for a personal computer system and software for the Public Works Department.

Tabled the matter of removing old underground gas tanks at the city yard. Councilman Ronald Klebe said the city has been granted an extension and has until the fall of 1991 to complete the project.

- Decided it will look into installing railroad crossing arms at the Sixth Street and F Street railroad crossings after reviewing pedestrian accessibility to the sides of the arms.

- Consented to allow the Senior Citizens Center to park its new passenger van in the city yard at night to avoid vandalism.

## Bliss probing chlorine risk with EPA help

**BLISS** — The City Council will check with the Environmental Protection Agency to determine whether chlorine stored on land the city leases is a hazard.

The council also voted Wednesday to send two council members on the Centennial Train that will trek from Bliss to Pocatello for the Fourth of July celebration there next month.

The chlorine discussion was sparked by a request from Union Pacific that the city sign a disclosure statement stating that no hazardous wastes are stored, generated or dumped on railroad property.

The city leases all its water equipment and the land on which the water tower for the town is located from Union Pacific.

Councilman Sam Bishop said he was concerned that the chlorine stored on the property for use in treating city water could be considered a hazardous waste.

## Census Bureau mounts effort to find the people it missed the first time around

**TWIN FALLS** — "Were you counted?" That's what the Census Bureau wants to know, and its latest follow-up effort is designed to find those people who did not receive and return a census questionnaire.

People who did not fill out a census questionnaire or who may not have included someone living in their residence can fill out a simple form available from the Census Bureau and community organizations.

"If you believe a census questionnaire was not completed for your household, or that someone living in your residence was not counted, there is a simple form you can fill out," said Barbara Everett Bryant, Director of the Census Bureau.

Although figures for individual counties are not yet available, census officials say in Magic Valley households have returned their questionnaires.

### A phone call does it

From June 11-July 11, Idaho residents who were missed by the census can provide information by calling the following toll-free telephone numbers, seven days a week between 9 a.m. - 9 p.m.:

- Spanish: 1-800-283-6286
- Laotian: 1-800-888-3208

The Boise district, which includes Jerome, Twin Falls and Elmore counties, reported 72 percent of the forms returned by the end of April.

The Idaho Falls district, which includes Blaine, Cassia, Cassia, Lincoln and Minidoka counties, reported a 67 percent return rate.

The national return rate is 65 percent. "Idaho did... better than the nation in the mail-out/mail back return rate," said Val Thomas, media specialist for the

Census Bureau.

The follow-up forms contain seven questions and can be mailed to a census office.

In July, census workers will re-check housing units previously designated as vacant.

A final review of housing units by local governments will follow in August, and census workers will recheck areas where the census and local government figures differ.

These final review steps are the last chance for individuals to be counted, Thomas said. The district offices will close at the end of summer.

The final count will be submitted to President Bush on Dec. 31 and to Congress on April 1, 1991.

The census numbers will be used to reapportion the House of Representatives and to re-draw congressional districts.

# Prosecutors ask judge to deny killer's latest appeal

**SALT LAKE CITY, (AP)** — Prosecutors have asked a federal judge to adopt a magistrate's recommendations and deny the latest appeal of condemned killer William Andrews.

In a response to Andrews' formal objections to the recommendation of U.S. Magistrate Ronald Boyce, state attorneys further rebutted defense claims of racial discrimination and trial errors that were rejected by Boyce in his May 10 decision.

Andrews and defendant Pierre Dallas Selby, both black, were convicted of first-degree murder and sentenced to death for the torture killings of three people during a robbery of Ogden's Hi-Fi Shop in 1974. Selby was executed in 1987.

Andrews was scheduled for execution by lethal injection on Aug. 22, 1989, but the 10th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals stayed the sentence pending resolution of his appeals.

In his report, Boyce rejected arguments presented in a supplemental writ of habeas corpus that the exclusion of the only black juror in the jury improperly left an all-white jury to judge Andrews and Selby.

He also denied Andrews' claim that his case was harmed by a former prison psychologist's

testimony that three convicted Utah killers had murdered again after being released from prison.

The defense maintained that only one of those was a repeat offender.

The recommendations are under review by U.S. District Judge David Sam, who may accept, modify or reject them.

Defense attorneys earlier asked Sam to reject the bulk of Boyce's findings.

They also requested that the judge review all relevant transcripts of the guilt and sentencing phase of the trial, hold hearings where necessary and re-examine an August 1989

report from Boyce involving Andrews' original petition for a writ of habeas corpus.

The prosecution response contended the testimony about recidivist killers was "absolutely and unequivocally true," although prosecutor "Allen" Roe misidentified two of the individuals.

It also challenges Andrews' contention that Gillespie "was left off the jury because he is black and that jury selection in Davis County, where the trial was moved, systematically provided for exclusions based on race.

Gillespie was removed by the prosecutor, with the concurrence of

Andrews' trial attorney, because of "prosecution bias" stemming from his work in law enforcement associations with 26 of the officers involved in the Hi-Fi case, the response said.

If Gillespie had been allowed to sit on the jury, petitioner would be screaming far more loudly than he now is that Gillespie was biased toward the prosecution, presumed the defendants guilty and infected the entire proceedings," prosecutors said.

The 10th Circuit has had several Andrews appeals on hold pending Sam's ruling on the supplemental

writ. Two of those — the original writ and a civil rights complaint — already have been denied by the district judge.

The appellate court plans to consolidate all the appeals to avoid a piecemeal presentation of arguments.

In the other appeals, Andrews has contended his rights were violated because his court-appointed trial attorney lacked the experience to adequately represent him and failed to request the option of a second-degree murder conviction, forcing the jury to convict him of capital homicide.

## Fire destroys \$35,000 of art

**LIVINGSTONE, Mont. (AP)** — An insurance agent says the fire that swept through the warehouse studio of Western artist Russell Chatham destroyed an estimated \$35,000 in lithographs and posters but missed a fortune in other original works recently moved.

Tom Berry of the Dime Insurance Agency estimated the damage to Chatham's artworks would have been dramatically worse had Wednesday's fire occurred two days earlier, when millions of dollars in original art works were stored in the building.

"We opened the door and there was nothing but flames in there," Berry said Wednesday evening while surveying the damage.

"We lost a huge inventory of original prints and the posters for the show. I think they're history," he said. "But we got the originals out."

Chatham and his friends and employees have been preparing for an exhibit of his life's work at the Museum of the Rockies in Bozeman. It opens to the public Saturday.

"It's not pretty but it could have been a lot worse," Chatham said.

"We came back from the museum and the place was in flames," he said. "If this had happened an hour earlier (part of the show) would have gone up. If it had happened a week earlier, we would have lost 100 paintings."

Most of the irreplaceable paintings moved from the warehouse were borrowed from collectors around the country for the show, the artist said.

As it was, some of the large frames built for his new landscape works were destroyed, Chatham said.

Tim Parks, city building inspector, said Thursday that the fire resulted from spontaneous combustion in a plastic garbage can containing paint rags.

## Montana company changes gold exploration plans

**IDAHO FALLS (AP)** — A Montana mining company is giving up its plans to do experimental drilling "to test gold" at Caribou Mountain in Bonneville County.

Instead, the company will take soil samples on the mountain this summer, U.S. Forest Service officials say.

In May 1989, Freepore-McMoran Gold Corp., Montana, submitted a plan to drill 12 exploratory holes on Caribou Mountain. In April, the Caribou National Forest approved a modified drilling plan.

But the company — now known as Independence Mining Co. — has withdrawn its plan. The Forest Service has withdrawn its approval. Before Independence

"Nobody seems to be salivating over Caribou Mountain," he said Wednesday. "I think there may be some uncertainty on the part of the company."

Critics of gold exploration are opposed to building new roads on Forest Service land on Caribou Mountain. Portions of the mountain were sealed under an Idaho wilderness bill introduced by Rep. Robert Kostmayer, D-Fr., but not under a bill drafted by Gov. Cecil Andrus and Sen. Jim McClure.

Last year, Freepore-McMoran said it wanted to upgrade and build its 12 drill sites. In April, the Forest Service said the company could upgrade and build just over three

## Warning given after toxic spill kills fish in river

**OGDEN, Utah (AP)** — A toxic spill on the lower Weber River has killed scores of fish and health and wildlife officials suspect they were polluted by some sort of pesticide or insecticide.

The Utah Division of Wildlife Resources has not banned fishing but warns the public not to consume fish found along the polluted stretch.

Wildlife officials said they were alerted about 8:30 p.m. Tuesday that fish were dying and dropping to the bottom of the river near the Golden Spike Coliseum, north of the 24th Street viaduct.

A spot investigation that lasted through the night determined that fish were dying along the mainstem river from near the coliseum and the 21st Street pond southeast to above 31st Street in Riverdale.

Samples of a white, foamy substance found floating downstream were being analyzed at the Weber-Morgan Health District and the Weber Basin Conservancy District.

Dead fish were taken to a laboratory at Utah State University, and the Utah Department of Health was notified.

Officials are attempting to determine if the toxic spill has been naturally flushed from the river or how far northwest the danger might exist.

If pollution still is in the water, Olson said the only way to flush it would be to open the spillgates at Echo and East Canyon reservoirs.

"If it hasn't been flushed through, we've got a serious problem," Olson said.

He said the spill could be as simple as someone dumping a

# \$3.4 million veterans nursing home approved for Pocatello

BOISE (AP) — State officials have picked an appropriate goal for the opening of a new Veterans Home at Pocatello: Veterans Day, 1991.

A state board on Thursday approved the preliminary design for a new 66-bed, \$3.4 million veterans nursing home.

State veterans director Gary Bermecoso said that authorizes the architect to prepare full working drawings. Construction could start in late September or early October on a hillside site east of Pocatello.

"We're quite excited about the building. It will be very functional, the way it is laid out," said Bermecoso.

The Permanent Building Fund Council reviewed the preliminary plans Thursday and gave the project the go-ahead.

Project architect Robert Wayley of Garry Ratzlaff Architects-Walker Engineers, said the 9.2-acre site is just a few minutes from a hospital and less than 10 minutes travel from downtown Pocatello. The single-story, flat-roofed, all-metal building will have a brick veneer.

It's one of two veterans homes funded in part by the Idaho Legislature and part by the Veterans' Administration. They will be identical, if it is possible to fit the Pocatello plans to the site available in Lewiston, Bermecoso said.

The Legislature approved \$1.6 million for each of the two facilities. Bermecoso said it won't be known until October or November if Idaho will get a federal grant that will allow construction of the Lewiston building.

Because of inflation, it will cost about 10 percent more for the Lewiston structure, he said.

Bermecoso acknowledged that the final result was different than original plans.

Officials once envisioned an 82-bed nursing home, including 60 beds for nursing patients and a 22-bed domiciliary facility for long-term care. It was to include a Veterans Administration outpatient clinic.

"Our aspirations were higher than our bank account," said Bermecoso. The VA outpatient facilities are located in the incubator building at the Pocatello Research Park, and will remain there for the time being, said administrator Ron Miltick.

Bermecoso said there appears to be some feeling that the number of beds was cut down to provide room for Idaho State University teaching quarters, but that isn't the case.

ISU's College of Pharmacy agreed to provide a full-time faculty pharmacist for the center in return for a space where up to three pharmacy students can work, which will be a big cost-saving for the facility, Bermecoso said.

The final product better meets the need, which is for nursing beds, he said. "In Boise, we have a waiting list of 67 people for nursing care. We have no waiting list for domiciliary care," Bermecoso said.

The Pocatello structure will include a 22-bed wing for Alzheimer's patients, and two other 22-bed wings. It was designed with future expansion in mind.

# Warning sirens saved the lives of many as twister struck town

LIMON, Colo. (AP) — Block after devastated block of this farming town told Thursday of the damage.

But siren blasts gave the 1,800 residents here precious minutes to take shelter, and none was killed.

Three guests at the Lariat Hotel piled into a bathtub and pulled a mattress over them when the tornado siren sounded at dusk Wednesday.

"We were doing a lot of prying in that bathtub," said David Thomas, who shared the cramped quarters with Arley Boston and Carl Riley.

The tornado tore their room apart.

"It felt like somebody just reached down and squeezed your whole body. My eardrums were coming out," Thomas said.

Town Clerk Teresa O'Dwyer said she ran to Town Hall when the siren sounded and put the town records in the vault.

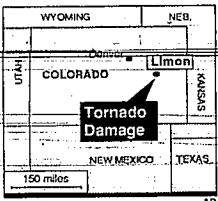
Minutes later, the tornado ripped the front off the building.

As residents began picking up the pieces Thursday, officials toured this town about 80 miles southeast of Denver.

Streets were cluttered with metal, wood and other debris left by the tornado that hoppedscotched down Main Street shortly after 8 p.m., yanking down walls and roofs, overturning rail cars and smashing a grain silo as if it were a soda can.

Business owners stood guard against looters, and dozens of police patrolled.

Among the devastation, people marveled that no one died.



"It was huge," he said. "We drove to the east edge of town and hid behind a building until it passed."

Some said they hadn't even needed it.

"You could hear it coming and when the glass started tinkling, we all ran for the basement. I don't know why somebody didn't get killed," said Russ Covington, a Lincoln County commissioner.

The tornado halted water, electricity and telephones, but crews restored at least limited supplies of all three services Thursday.

Relief efforts were launched by state and federal agencies. A makeshift grocery store was set up in the high school.

Len Boulas, an operations officer with the state Division of Emergency Services, said a final damage assessment would take two to three days.

The American Red Cross fed about 2,000 storm victims, volunteers and cleanup workers Thursday, and helped concerned relatives find loved ones.

"We're lucky to be alive," said Arnie Spence, crawling her cat in her arms as she surveyed what was left of her house.

"We went underneath the house and under a crawlspace and it sounded like an earthquake. We just heard everything rumbiling and ripping and when we got out, everything was gone."

Gov. Roy Romer estimated damage between \$20 million and \$40 million. He said about 90 percent of the businesses and government offices were damaged or destroyed, and about half the town's 750 homes.

Romer said he would seek federal disaster aid for the town.

At least 12 people were injured, but just two remained hospitalized Thursday, one in fair condition and one in critical condition.

Lincoln County Sheriff Leroy Yowell was driving down Main Street when he saw the tornado looming behind him.

# Cropduster survives 2nd crash landing of his airplane

COTTONWOOD (AP) — Jerome Fox has things going his way.

For the second time in a little more than a year, Fox crash landed his crop dusting plane and lived to tell about it.

Wednesday evening, Idaho County Deputy Herbert Lindsey called to investigate an airplane crash near Cottonwood.

Fox's fixed wing single-engine crop dusting plane had crashed in a muddy field and caught fire. Lindsey said it looked like the plane may have hit a fence sometime during the crash.

A witness said he heard the plane engine sputter right before the crash, leading Lindsey to speculate it had mechanical problems. The wreckage was destroyed by fire.

Fox was injured, but managed to

walk about a mile from the wreckage to where emergency medical technicians were coming on all-terrain vehicles to meet him. He was then taken by ambulance to St. Mary's Hospital at Cottonwood.

Lindsey said Fox appeared to be in a state of shock and could not remember what happened. Several people from the surrounding area assisted officers at the scene.

# US West ordered to keep 2 Idaho pay centers open

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has ordered US West Communications to keep its Boise and Pocatello telephone pay centers open and to help find the reason for low telephone subscribership among Idaho's poor.

Meeting Thursday in Boise, the PUC ordered the utility to maintain the Pocatello and Boise centers and the Rexburg payment agency until the current level of staff and services.

US West asked to close the facilities and established payment agencies with local businesses as a test. The PUC said the study US West conducted to see if payment agencies would work was internally done and did not address the effect it would have on the communities.

"We want to ensure that the proposal is not a disguised effort to achieve a phased-out elimination of payment agencies instead of the immediate elimination originally contemplated," the commission said.

US West closed its Pocatello service office on Wednesday, idling 16 employees. In doing so, it transferred the Pocatello calls to its new Boise customer service center.

The PUC said Thursday it would not order the service office be reopened and approved the consolidation of the Boise collection management office with one in Helena, Mont.

"Notwithstanding this finding, we take this opportunity to express our

view that the restructure program, involving, as it does the concentration of service functions in locations that are remote to the company's customers, is ill advised and will be harmful to the company itself in the long run," the PUC said.

"An inevitable consequence is that so many customers, community spokesmen and even company employees feel estranged from a company that is an important factor in the economies of southern Idaho communities."

The PUC also called for a panel to create a monitoring plan within 60 days to gauge public satisfaction with payment centers as opposed to payment agencies. The group should comprise US West and PUC staff, intervenors and other interested parties, and set the guidelines for the centers' success.

"I don't know where I'm going until I hear back from people who know more than we do," PUC Commissioner Terry Swisher said.

During testimony on the customer payment centers, Janis Rhoads of the Southeastern Idaho Community Action Agency and others complained the disadvantaged depended on face-to-face contact with telephone employees for service.

She estimated that only 60 percent of her urban-client population had telephones and the rural number could be half of that percentage. As a result, the PUC recommended another committee to find a reason and a solution to the situation.

# Grand View man dies in car-train crash

ORCHARD (AP) — An Owyhee County man has been killed in a car-train accident in southwestern Idaho.

Elmore County authorities said Thursday that Harold Collett, 60, Grand View, was killed when he drove his car into the path of a

Union Pacific Railroad freight train. The accident occurred just east of the Ada-Elmore county line, about 20 miles southeast of Boise.

Collett was driving on Simco Road when he pulled into the path of the train.

Administrator at U of I steps down to teach

MOSCOW (AP) — The top financial administrator at the University of Idaho is stepping down to take a teaching position.

Joseph J. Geiger is resigning as the university's financial vice president late next month in what he calls a "friendly separation" with U President Elisabeth A. Zinsler. He was hired by Mrs. Zinsler's predecessor, Richard D. Gibb, and has been in his current post for two years.

Geiger's resignation is effective July 22. U officials announced late Wednesday afternoon.

In August, Geiger will assume his tenured faculty appointment as a professor of finance based on his initial contract with U.

His annual salary will drop from \$79,533 to \$50,000. His faculty appointment is for nine months.

Geiger said Wednesday night he has tendered his resignation because his relationship with Mrs. Zinsler didn't seem to evolve the way either of them wanted it to go.

Mrs. Zinsler took over U's reins from Gibb nearly 11 months ago.

"It's a friendly separation," Geiger said. "There is no anger and no animosity."

In a news-release, Mrs. Zinsler expressed her gratitude for Geiger's service in finance and physical facilities management the past two years.

In that time, the University of Idaho has made considerable progress in many areas," she said.

Mrs. Zinsler said Terry N. Wallace, U's assistant vice president in charge of budget and planning, will serve as the acting financial vice president as a nationwide search is launched for Geiger's successor. Wallace has been in U's

administration since 1974.

She said the permanent financial vice president probably won't start work until July of next year.

Geiger's resignation will allow Mrs. Zinsler to make her third vice presidential appointment.

In her first year of office, she has promoted W. (Hal) Gowdin to vice president for student affairs and hired Harry Peterson, executive assistant to the chancellor at the University of Wisconsin at Madison, as vice president for university relations and development.

May's record rainfall helping reduce Idaho Power's costs

BOISE (AP) — May's record rainfall in the south-central portion of the state has reduced Idaho Power Co. operating costs by allowing it to generate more hydroelectricity.

During the first part of last month, the Boise-based utility continued to see a steady increase in its reliance on more expensive coal-fired generating plants, a trend caused by last winter's low snowpack.

But the onset of wet weather in the middle of May increased streamflows and allowed the company to supply most of its customers' needs with hydro power or purchases from other Northwest utilities. The inflow of water has boosted storage at Brownlee Reservoir in Hells Canyon.

"Before those storms, we had studies showing we may not refill Brownlee this year," said resource operations chief Roger Fuhrman. Storage there is critical as Idaho Power needs into its peak energy demand months of June and July.

In a normal year, the three dams in the Hells Canyon complex provide nearly half the utility's power.

"The wet weather mostly affected the Boise, Payette and Weiser River drainages," company hydrologist Tim Brewer said. "So reservoir levels upstream of C.J. Strike Dam didn't really increase very much. Yet, last week, inflows to Brownlee doubled over the week before, Cascade Reservoir filled and Deadwood Reservoir is filling fast."

Andrus pushes for revival of pheasant population

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus is pressing Idaho's congressional delegation to support funding to revive the state's pheasant population disappearing from its fields and ditchbanks.

Andrus told Idaho lawmakers he understood Rep. Norm Dicks, D-Wash., is presenting a mark-up to the Department of Interior's budget to include a 10-year, \$25 million pheasant recovery effort.

"I strongly support Idaho's becoming a part of this program," Andrus said. "Our state would certainly benefit from the federal government's adding the financial assistance to acquire more habitat."

In the last 20 years, Idaho's pheasant population has plunged, the governor said. Sportsmen have suffered an 80 percent decrease in their harvest since 1981, when 500,000 birds were taken. The 1989 harvest showed 102,000 pheasants.

Idaho estimates for land acquisition and development to increase habitat include 500 acres over a decade at a cost of \$1 million per year. The state already has Fish and Game staff to administer the program and matching dollars could arrive from existing state and private sources.

Utility wants to cap monthly demands

BOISE (AP) — Washington Water Power Co. wants to put a 25-percent cap on the average monthly demand from major commercial customers.

Customers whose need exceeds that monthly amount would require a special contract, which would be approved by the Idaho Public Utilities Commission.

Pollatch Corp. in Lewiston currently is the only Idaho customer that could be affected by the request. Its contract is in effect until 1994.

"Capacity requirements of this magnitude have a direct, measurable impact on the company's short- and long-term resource planning," the utility said in its application.

The PUC has initially determined the proposed tariff is reasonable and in the public interest.

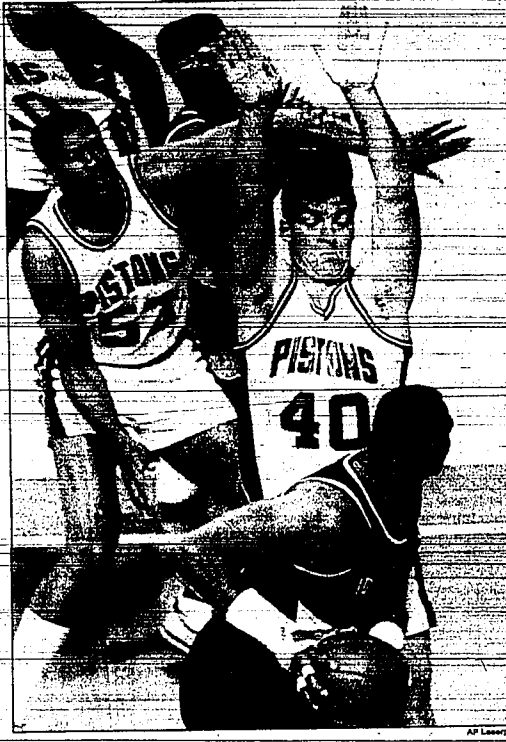

# Blazers beat Pistons in OT, 106-105

AUBURN — Hills — Mich. — Clyde Drexler's two free throws with 2.1 seconds left Tuesday night climaxed a dramatic series of turnarounds in overtime and gave the Portland Trail Blazers a 106-105 victory over the Detroit Pistons and tied the NBA Finals at 1-1.

Portland survived an onslaught of six 3-pointers by Detroit's Bill Laimbeer, including three in the first overtime in the championship series since 1984.

There were three lead changes in the final 9.6 seconds.

Bill Williams gave the Trail Blazers a 104-102 lead with two free throws before Laimbeer, who scored 26 points, came back with his sixth 3-point field goal with 4.1 seconds remaining for a 105-104 Pistons lead.

Dennis Rodman then fouled Drexler with 2.1 seconds left and he swished both to give him 33 points for the game.

The Trail Blazers had a foul to give and they used it with 1.2 seconds remaining, forcing another inbound play by the Pistons.

Detroit's James Edwards, who scored 26 points, missed a hurried baseline shot as time expired.

The best-of-7 series moves to Portland for the next three games, giving the Trail Blazers a chance to win their second NBA title without returning to the Palace.

The Trail Blazer who won their only title in 1977 with Bill Walton at center, left 9:0 at home in the playoffs.

The loss was Detroit's first in 11 home playoff games and the Trail Blazers have beaten the Pistons 20 consecutive times in Portland since Oct. 19, 1974. The sixth and seventh games, if necessary, would be back at the Palace.

Detroit, which rallied from a 10-point deficit with seven minutes left to win Game 1, trailed by six points after three quarters Thursday night, but came back strong again in the fourth period.

Drexler made one of two free throws with 4.6 seconds left and Portland got a chance to tie when Isiah Thomas, the hero of the Game 1 comeback, missed a layup and Jerome Kersey rebounded for the Trail Blazers with 24 seconds to go. Terry Porter, who finished with 21 points, made

two free throws with 10 seconds left, but then missed a jumper as regulation ended for the first overtime game in the finals since 1984, when Boston beat the Los Angeles Lakers in both the second and fourth games on the way to winning the series 4-3.

Laimbeer gave the Pistons a 102-98 lead with 1:10 left in overtime, with his second 3-pointer of the extra period. Portland came back with six straight points for a 104-102 lead, including Williams' two free throws with 1.6 seconds left. Williams was fouled by Joe Dumars on the rebound after Porter missed an off-balance shot.

Portland has now won two of its last three road games in the playoffs after losing five straight, including a 34-point defeat at Phoenix in the Western Conference finals. But the Trail Blazers won't the sixth game of that series at Phoenix, giving them an extra three days to rest and prepare for the NBA Finals.

Detroit, which lost for only the second time in 20 playoff home games since the Palace opened in 1988, is trying to become the first franchise — after Boston and the Minneapolis-Los Angeles Lakers — to represent the NBA in the Finals.

Thomas, who had 33 points in the opener, finished with 23 points, while Porter had 21 for Portland, including a final record 15-for-15 from the free throw line.

Portland, which outscored the Pistons 30-9 from the 11:28 mark of the second quarter until there was a minute left in the first half, led 53-45 at halftime.

The Trail Blazers' bench, outscored 26-7 by Detroit's reserves in Game 1, had 13 points in the first half to two for the Pistons' bench players.

Detroit's 13 first-half turnovers led to 20 Portland points, while the Trail Blazers' two turnovers didn't cost them any points.

Portland made only four of 16 shots from the field in the third quarter, but hit 14 of 18 free throws in the period and lost only two points off its eight-point halftime lead.

Detroit, which led by as many as 11 points in the first quarter behind Edwards' 12 points, had a 32-23 lead in the opening minute of the second period.

Portland then scored 11 consecutive points and 22 of the next 27, including three baskets-by-reserve guard Dazner Petrovic and a three-point play by backup forward Cliff Robinson.

## State cycling coming to Magic Valley this weekend

TWIN FALLS — Three weeks before the prestigious Ore-Ida Women's Challenge cycling race rolls into the Magic Valley, the area will host the state cycling championships Saturday and Sunday.

The Idaho State Cycling Championships will include an individual time trial Saturday on the north side and a road race Sunday north of Buhl.

"These events will showcase the top bicycle racers from Idaho who will be competing for a chance to go to the national championships which will be held in Albany, N.Y., and San Diego this summer," said Rich Nystrom, the Idaho district representative for the U.S. Cycling Federation and race organizer. "The top racers from the nationals are then groomed to represent the United States in international and Olympic competition."

The race will precede the Ore-Ida Women's Challenge, the annual stage race that has become one of the most prestigious women's cycling events in the world. The Ore-Ida Challenge will have two Magic Valley legs this year, both of which will be run the last week in June.

Several dozen cyclists from throughout the state are expected to compete in the state championships.

The individual time trial, an event in which the rider races a graded distance over a fixed course, will cover a backcountry course that starts and ends north of the Hansen Bridge and with the turnaround near Flat Top Butte east of Jerome. Racers will ride between 12K and 25 miles, the exact distance depending upon the age and category of the individual. In some of the categories the rider must complete the course in a specific period. In order to qualify to compete in the national championships, Sunday's road race will be held on county roads north of Buhl, starting at Buhl High School at 9:30 a.m., proceeding west on U.S. Highway 30, turning right on Danbury Road along the Snake River and then right again on Clear Springs Road and back to the high school. Each lap is 23 miles and the riders will be racing from four to four laps — 20 to 90 miles — depending upon their ages and categories.

## Seles beats Capriati to move to finals

PARIS — Wake up, Jenny. This fairy-tale is over.

Jennifer Capriati's history-making journey through the French Open ended Thursday, cut short in the semifinals by the two-fisted barrage of Monica Seles.

The 14-year-old Capriati, the youngest semifinalist in Grand Slam history, fought off five match points in the final game before losing 6-2, 6-2 in 62 minutes.

The victory sent the 16-year-old Seles to the second seed, into Saturday's final against top-seeded Steffi Graf. The West German, seeking her third French Open championship and fourth straight Grand Slam title, overwhelmed No. 11 Jana Novotna 6-1, 6-2.

Despite the lopsided score, Capriati left no doubt she is a champion in the making.

"No one at the age of 14 has played as well as she does," said Seles, who won her 31st straight match. "You could see her experience wasn't there but her game was there. In a couple of years she will be doing the same thing I did today."

Capriati, who turned pro three months ago at the age of 13, said she wanted to put on a better show.

"I'm disappointed because I thought I could have made it closer," said the eighth-grader from Wesley Chapel, Fla. "People expected a longer match. But I'm happy I could get to the semifinals. That was still great for me."

In the men's semifinals Friday, third-seeded Andre Agassi, plays unseeded Jonas Svensson of Sweden and No. 4 Andres Gomez of Ecuador faces No. 7 Thomas Muster of Austria.

Capriati had not lost a set in four matches and seemed to have the grooved, powerful strokes and the fearless, carefree attitude to beat almost anybody.

But in Seles she ran up against the hottest player in tennis, winner of five consecutive tournaments and the hardest hitter on the women's tour.

The Florida-based Yugoslav proved to have too much firepower, blasting two hand-foam and backhands around the court like bullets from a machinegun.

## Krzyzewski picks Duke over Boston Celtics job

DURHAM, N.C. — Mike Krzyzewski has decided to remain at Duke as basketball coach, declining overtures to become coach of the Boston Celtics, a newspaper reported Thursday night.

The Charlotte Observer quoted sources in its Friday editions as saying Krzyzewski, the Duke coach for the past 10 years, withdrew his name from consideration.

Krzyzewski was unavailable for comment, but sources told the newspaper that he is not ready to give up coaching on the college level or to break the relationships he has developed at Duke. The sources said he would make his decision public Friday morning in a prepared statement.

Earlier Thursday, Krzyzewski said he would decide by the weekend.

"I'm not gone to drag a decision out," Krzyzewski said after meeting with Duke athletic director Tom Butler. "It's not going to go through the weekend, no way. I don't do that."

Krzyzewski refused to say what was discussed at the meeting with Butler.

"My best friend at Duke has been Tom. I've been associated with at Duke, 1 value

his opinion the most. Everything he has ever said to me has led me in the appropriate direction."

Asked Thursday if he was favoring one position over another, Krzyzewski said, "It's stupid when you're going through the decision-making process, until you get all the stuff to lean," he said. "What you do is collect."

Krzyzewski, Boston's top choice to replace the recently fired Jerry Rodgers, had been called a "very good" meeting Wednesday with Celtics president Red Auerbach and director of basketball operations Dave Gavitt in Washington. Krzyzewski declined to discuss details of the meeting.

Auerbach told The Charlotte Observer via telephone that he and Krzyzewski "talked about basketball; we went over the NBA and the differences in the pros and colleges, and we didn't get into any details."

Auerbach refused to say whether Krzyzewski had been offered the job, and said he expected a quick resolution.

The Celtics reportedly offered a package worth about \$2.5 million over five years.

Krzyzewski has a 231-101 record at Duke and has led the Blue Devils to the NCAA tournament's Final Four in four of the past five years.

## Committee hopes S. Africa will enter Olympics multiracially

BARCELONA, SPAIN — The head of the International Olympic Committee expressed hope on Thursday that a multiracial South Africa would be represented in the 1992 Summer Olympics and moved to end a dispute with Third World nations over free lodging for all participants in the Barcelona games.

"We have to receive a recommendation from African National Olympic Committees," IOC president Juan Antonio Samaranch told a news conference at the end of a meeting of the executive board. "It is the African committees that know about these things... not people in London or Paris."

The Association of African National Olympic Committees has invited representatives of South African sports federations of all races to a meeting in Harare, Zimbabwe, in August to discuss returning South Africa to the Olympic movement.

Samaranch said he hoped the meeting would result "in something that would permit this."

South Africa has been excluded from Olympic participation since 1960 because of its policy of apartheid, or racial segregation.

The IOC head said he planned to meet soon with South African anti-apartheid leader Nelson Mandela, who is in Europe trying to convince European leaders not to lift economic sanctions against South Africa until apartheid is abandoned.

In the lodging controversy, Samaranch stood behind the original offer made by Barcelona organizers five years ago. "There is no question the offer was for athletes only," Samaranch said during a news conference. "By 1996, we will try to have free lodging for all participants, including coaches and trainers."

The housing controversy arose Wednesday at the end of a two-day meeting of the Association of National Olympic Committees, when representatives of several African committees claimed they understood Barcelona had promised free lodging for all participants.

Samaranch pointed out that before 1980 no subsidies of any kind were provided to Olympic athletes and coaches.

The Barcelona offer represents the first time a host city will pick up even part of the tab for lodging Olympic participants — an amount estimated roughly at \$30 million for the 16 days of summer games that begin July 25, 1992.

The occasion of the 1984 Los Angeles games marked the first time the IOC gave subsidies to National Olympic Committees and athletes.

In 1992, he said, the IOC would pay round trip air fare for six athletes and two coaches, plus \$800 per athlete and by each NOC, as well as direct grants of \$8,000 to each of the 168 or 169 NOCs he predicted would be represented at the Barcelona games.

# Success of Seniors tour has hurt women's golf

In the early 1980s, the Ladies Professional Golf Association was on the brink of a major breakthrough.

The men's tour, in the midst of an awkward transition from a generation of aging superstars to a new population of talented but bland younger players, was vulnerable.

Women's golf was buoyed by the tremendous impact of a new comer, Nancy Lopez, and the glamour and skills of Australia's Jan Stephenson. The LPGA's television appearances had increased in number from two to 14 and purses had grown from \$435,000 in 1970 to \$6.4 million in 1982.

But that promising time was short-lived. In 1982, the Professional Golf Association found a legitimate and lucrative use for all those over-50 players — the Senior tour.

Eight years later, the phenomenally successful Seniors tour relegated the LPGA to third place in the golf world, surpassing the women's titles, corporate sponsorship and network television appearances.

All that has not endeared the Senior tour to LPGA players, many of whom will compete in the McDonald's Classic, which will begin Thursday at DuPont Country Club in Wilmington, Del.

"The draw because of their star quality, not because of their ability to play," Betsy King, the LPGA's reigning star, said of the Seniors last month.

That quotation found its way onto the bulletin board in the clubhouse of the Chester Valley Country Club at Malvern, Pa., during a recent Seniors tournament, agitating the impatient feed.

"You can't compare men's and women's golf. Women's golf is a separate entity unto itself."

However, if disgruntled women's players are looking for sympathy from their new commissioner, they won't find any.

"I don't begrudge the Seniors their success at all," said Bill Blue, a former marketing official for a liquor company who is now in his second year as the LPGA commissioner. "They are not denying the LPGA any opportunities. We simply had not been equipped to take advantage of the tremendous growth in the game of golf the way they were."

"Now we have skilled marketing people in place. We are the premier women's sports association in the world. We're playing for more money than ever, and the players are better than ever. That's not to say, however, that there aren't problems."

In addition to competition from the Seniors, the LPGA's problems include a diminishing number of tournaments and televised events, a schedule that contains a three-week gap in April and a one-month stretch in July during which three of the four major tournaments will be bunched together, and the lack of a comfortable image for itself.

# Astros trade catcher Rich Gedman to Red Sox

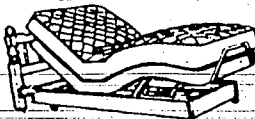

# NBA hopefuls strut their stuff at camp

CHICAGO — The neighborhood surrounding the physical education building at the University of Illinois-Chicago campus is hardly the place where dreams are made.

The 7th District South Side police station down the corner from the campus presides amid squalor, ruin and urban decay.

But, inside the PE building, where the ceiling fans hardly do their duty, the squeaks of sneakers are the sounds of 59 prospective NBA players taking their first steps toward their dreams.

This group has gathered here to be poked, prodded and challenged through Saturday in hopes that someone will remember them come draft day June 27.

"We have all the names," said the former Boston Celtics and Washington Bullets coach who recently was named Seattle head coach.

"We just want to see them go up against each other to see what's the best part of their game."

Almost from the moment they stepped off the team buses, the camp invitees — all here at the expense of the NBA — moved with the intensity of the seventh game of the league championship series.

Even the fun had an intensity. Tony Harris, a 6-foot-3 shooting guard from New Orleans, with all-red shoes, saw to that.

During warmups, Harris, who pumped in NBA three-pointers with ease, took the ball from the right baseline, drove in, leaped high, ran the ball through his legs and jammed it through with his left, or off-hand.

You probably haven't heard of Tony Harris, but then, you probably haven't heard of most of the guys here.

That's because most of the big

names and likely first-rounders took a pass on the workout part of camp. They came into town Tuesday for a battery of medical tests and then left.

Players like Dennis Scott, Lionel Simmons, Derrick Coleman and Chris Jackson missed up Chicago, declining to either rest on their laurels from April's Orlando camp, or just rely on their reputations.

"If they don't play, that's their privilege and we have to evaluate them," said Marty Blake, director of NBA scouting. He mentioned the example of Sherman Douglas, the guard out of Syracuse who was expected to be drafted in the first round until he didn't appear at any of the camps.

He lasted until the second round. "Sherman didn't play anywhere last year and his drafting was a mistake on the part of the NBA," Blake said.

It may not matter whether the big names are here, for the Chicago draft camp has done all right by its participants.

Blake said 98 of the current 324 NBA players took part in camp here, including such current stars as Utah's John Stockton, Detroit's Dennis Rodman, Chicago's Scottie Pippen, who says he's a lottery pick, and Portland's Kevin Duckworth, Terry Porter and Jerome Kersey.

"There's been players coming out of here like a Scottie Pippen who improved himself into a lottery pick," said Billy Cunningham, a part-owner of the Miami Heat. "If the talent's here, they'll be found."

And what the camp lacks in on-court talent, it more than makes up for in coaching celebrities.

# Turcotte unsure of future

NEW YORK (AP) — Ron Turcotte's past is filled with memories of Secretariat. He has no idea what his future holds.

Now in a wheelchair, partially paralyzed from a racing accident at Belmont in 1978, Turcotte will forever be remembered as the jockey of who rode Secretariat to the 1973 Triple Crown.

"I hate to make plans now," said Turcotte, who just recently received his high school diploma. "Yesterday, I woke up with 102 fever, and I've been on antibiotics. When I left home, I was OK, but that's why I had to make plans."

Turcotte was at Belmont Park on Thursday for the first time since 1979. Along with Secretariat's former owner, Penny Chenery, and trainer, Lucien Laurin, Turcotte will take part in a Secretariat memorial on Belmont Stakes day Saturday. Secretariat died last fall at age 19.

"The people loved Secretariat," Turcotte said. "He was definitely a show, and he had the disposition of a cow pony. He would do anything you

asked him.

"He was the people's horse. It wasn't a matter of money anymore, of whether you cashed a bet on him. People just wanted to see him win."

Secretariat won the 1973 Derby by 26 lengths over Sham, coming from fifth place with three-quarters of a mile to go. In the Preakness, he broke slowly, then made one of the most devastating moves of his career, going from last to first on the outside. On the first turn, beating Sham by 24 lengths again.

"It was a judgment call," Turcotte recalled. "He was going easy. There was no sense-ohoking him down behind all those horses on the first turn. I just cased him out there, and that was it."

Then, 17 years ago in the Belmont, Secretariat turned out perhaps the most impressive performance ever in horse racing. He led the 1 1/2 miles from start to finish. With a mile to go, he was a head in front of Sham. He was seven lengths in front with a half mile left, and Sham, decimated by the pace, began to fade.

## Magic Valley attracts grants from art commission

Area arts organizations and presenters will be awarded \$67,031 in 1991 grants from the Idaho Commission on the Arts.

"I think we did very well in the Magic Valley," said Mary Jane Kinney of Twin Falls, a member of the state arts commission.

The awards were announced Thursday and are the result of the commission's annual grant allocations meeting held last weekend in Nampa.

Statewide, \$447,219 was granted for 179 projects in 59 cities and towns. All funds are matched by local communities.

Noting that 38 percent of the funding pool was provided by the National Endowment for the Arts, arts commission executive director Marge Knight said that agency's support has proven critical to the arts in Idaho.

"National attention has focused on a few controversial grants for too long," Knight said, referring to concerns recently expressed over the NEA.

"Good things are happening in Idaho as a direct result of federal and state support for the arts," she said in prepared comments made with the release of the grants. "We want to share the credit with the communities who put that money to work."

Area communities received the following grants: Albion - \$8,000 to the Albion Normal School/Southern Idaho College of Education alumni for Phase 2 of interior renovations of the 1893 stone building for a folk life center planned on the campus.

Buhl - \$2,750 to the Idaho Dance Arts Alliance for planning, organizing and implementing five dance workshops for grades K-6. The group also received \$1,500 for support of the 13th summer dance workshop at the College of Southern Idaho.

Also, \$2,000 to the Buhl Arts Council for general sup-

port, and \$1,612 to Popplewell Elementary for a five-week residency in theater.

Gooding - \$825 to the Idaho School for the Deaf and the Blind for a two-week theater and literature residency.

Hailey - \$2,500 to Blaine County School District for an eight-week ceramics residency in Hailey, Bellevue, Ketchum and Carey.

Ketchum - \$2,200 to Ballet School Foundation for artists' fees for Summerdance '90.

Mountain Home - \$1,700 to the Mountain Home Performing Arts Series for general support.

Oakley - \$6,150 to the Oakley Valley Arts Council for interior work on the Howell Opera House. The group also received \$1,900 for operating expenses of the opera house, a newsletter and a promotional piece for the building.

Shoshone - \$1,300 to Junction City Arts Council for a

# Administration asks Congress for interim National Endowment for the Arts extension

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Bush administration moved to defuse controversy over government financing of potentially objectional art by proposing a one-year extension of the National Endowment for the Arts.

Endowment Director John E. Frohnmayer told a Senate panel he hoped time would allow "the temperature to go down" on the dispute over federal aid of allegedly obscene art.

He urged that a 12-member advisory commission, half of it appointed by Congress and half by the White House, be given time to reach some recommendations about the future of the endowment and its grant-making procedures.

"The problem must be solved and I pledge to you my full attention to it," Frohnmayer said. "This controversy has been debilitating to my agency."

Frohnmayer appeared before a Senate appropriations subcommittee considering the budget for the NEA. The agency's legislative authorization is scheduled to expire at the end of fiscal year 1991.

President Bush has recommended another five-year renewal, or reauthorization, of the NEA with no restrictions on its grant-making authority. But the NEA has drawn opposition among conservatives because of federal grants for controversial works by the late photographer Robert Mapplethorpe and photographer Andrews Serrano; and congressional supporters have acknowledged it would be difficult to win full renewal with no restrictions.

Frohnmayer told the panel that the Bush administration continues to prefer a five-year reauthorization of the NEA without restrictions but would accept "a three-year or even a one-year" extension while awaiting the commission's recommendation.

At the White House, deputy press secretary Alice Glen called a one-year extension "the prudent thing to do."

"Given the political climate, this isn't something we want to do hastily," she said.

The advisory commission met separately Wednesday for the first time to review the agency's grant-making procedures. Its first meeting came more than a month after it had been directed by Congress to make a report on the NEA. Frohnmayer cited administrative delays and urged that the commission's life also be extended beyond its October expiration.

Frohnmayer received a lecture from the subcommittee chairman, Sen. Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., and Sen. James A. McClure, R-Idaho, about the peril posed to the endowment by the controversial grants.

Byrd said some of the subsidized works of art were "so repulsive" that if viewed by the general public there would be "a far greater outcry that could force an end to the NEA altogether."

"It's too bad that a few little rotten apples will spoil the barrel, but they surely will," Byrd said.

McClure said he wanted to continue supporting the arts but complained of an "attitude out there" among the arts community that Congress has no business exercising control on grants.

Frohnmayer acknowledged the controversy has damaged the NEA and said the endowment has taken steps to ensure grants go through careful review.

"I would hope we could put Mapplethorpe and Serrano behind us, because we have really blinded ourselves," he said.

Mapplethorpe's works included homoerotic photographs and Serrano's works included a depiction of a crucifix in urine.

In addition to these grants, an additional \$50,000 in funds will be located in November for folk arts, artist fellowships and grants to presenters.

Glenda Lattin of Jerome appeared in Northside's first show, "The Sound of Music." She hasn't missed a production since then, and she's in the chorus of this year's show. Her daughter, Tracy, baby-sits cast members.

Lattin's husband, Rodney, supports her theatrical endeavors, too. "I let him go fishing and he lets me do this," she says, laughing.

Two highlights of Lattin's theatrical career came during last year's run of "The Best of Wagon" with Mike Winterholler wrote a part for Lattin. Then, on closing night, she was presented with a dozen long-stemmed roses in appreciation of her years of service to the Playhouse.

"My family knew, but nobody ever slipped up and told me," Lattin recalls. "I just did what I do good, I cried."

Marty Strohmaier of Murtaugh is another longtime Northside player. He enjoys the respect he says the show gives.

"They remember you at the end of the show," he says. At the close of each production, each participant is given a small remembrance of the musical.

Strohmaier got involved in local theater the first time he Dillettans, shortly after moving to Idaho from California in 1979. He has continued his theater work despite a heart attack and a battle with cancer. He's been in the hospital three times this year. "I'm just not gonna quit," he says.

Nor is the Northside Playhouse. Greg Fuller says his dream is to fill the 914-seat Jerome High School Auditorium. Performances have drawn up to 700 or so people, but none has ever sold out.

Fuller says he'd also like to do "West Side Story" one of these days. Mike Winterholler dreams of doing "Phantom of the Opera" or "Sweeney Todd."

Of the shows that have been done, Winterholler lists "Oklahoma," "My Fair Lady" and "Guys and Dolls" as his favorites. "I had tremendous talk shows these years. Was that funny he recalls.

As for this year's show, Winterholler applauds the work of John Pietz, Danny Boyd and Mary Liz Jones, who created the sets, and of Greg Fuller, who wrote the script. "I love the humor in this show," he adds.

"If there's anything I'd like to say, I'd say 'Thank you, Greg,'" Winterholler adds. "Greg gives me the opportunity to do this thing we complain. 'Mike can envision things we can't see,'" he says. "Every year, he stands up there and I think 'Is this going to be any good?' And it always is."

# Ketchum-area galleries launch summer art season this evening

KETCHUM — Local art galleries are gearing up for the summer season with a round of gallery openings set for tonight.

The art openings, complete with complimentary beverages and hors d'oeuvres, will be held from 6 to 9 p.m. at nearly all of the galleries throughout town. Most are within easy walking distance of one another, providing a great evening tour for seasoned art buffs and initiates.

"Architecture as Art: Space and Illusion" is the theme at the Kneeland Gallery at 271 First Ave. N. The show will feature works by various architects including Jerry Berkus of Santa Barbara, Calif., Robert Buchanan of Seattle, Jerry Exline of Los Angeles, Bart Prince of Albuquerque, N.M., and Dale Bates, Janet Janis and Neil Wright of Ketchum. In addition, Marilyn Hagberg, an artist with no architectural training, will participate with her prima color and oil pastel drawings of building structures.

Berkus will exhibit working drawings and models of proposed home museum slated for RUI Doso, N.M., and other projects from a traveling museum exhibition entitled "The Real and the Ideal."

Buchanan, a professor of landscape architecture at the University of Washington, will participate with a series of lithographs, monoprints, watercolors and oil-paintings. Exline, a practicing architect and artist, will display a series of his exuberantly rendered line drawings which impart a sense of great force, movement and contrast.

Prince will exhibit working drawings from his unique Greenhorn Gulch house, being erected south of Ketchum, through the cooperation of

homeowner Henry Whiting. Also, Wood River Valley architects Bates, Neil Wright will display their favorite working drawings, models and concepts.

Along different lines, the Friesen Gallery of Fine Art at 391 First Ave. N. features the work of Kuku artist Joann Gerhart. The Ketchum artist has been profoundly influenced by Idaho and her work has progressed toward the three-dimensional lines achieved with slab cut and hand-assembled clay pieces for her vessels and wall hangings.

At the River Run Gallery, 291 First Ave. S., Ketchum wildlife artist Lori McNeer Watson will be the focus of a one-woman show throughout the month of June. Watson's work reflects the extensive research into her subject's habitat, behavior patterns and physical traits, all of which is done prior to putting a brush to the canvas.

"While growing up in the Southwest, Watson was fascinated with the extreme conditions of the desert environment and how both man and animal survived there. Since moving to Idaho, her interests in wildlife indigenous to the state have increased, and many of her paintings depict Idaho animals in their natural habitat."

In honor of Idaho's Centennial, the Gail Severn Gallery at 620 Sun Valley Road in the Walnut Avenue Mall, will present a show entitled "Photography Then and Now." Four photographers who have lived and worked in the state will be featured: Edward Sheriff Curtis, Robert Glenn Ketchum, Mary Rolland and Karen Hirsman. In addition, a jewelry show, "By Design," will feature a new selection of jewelry artists.

Curtis (1868-1952) is well-known for his documentation of 80 Indian tribes of the Northwest. Curtis

developed his exposed plates in a tent at night on the plains, and in the evolution of the United States, British Columbia and Alaska. Photographs from one of Curtis' 20 volumes in the series "The North American Indian" will be shown.

Ketchum will display a selection of cyanochrome prints which have evolved from the artist's interest in environmental activist statements. Last year the Sierra Club honored Ketchum with the Ansel Adams Award for Conservation Photography, a "once-in-a-lifetime" accolade. This year LIFE Magazine featured one of Ketchum's images in the collector's edition issue, "The World's Greatest Photographs 1980-1990."

Both Rolland and Hirsman take their work beyond the photograph, combining painting techniques with photographic images. Rolland, who is the director of the Sun-Valley Center Gallery, creates landscapes and close-ups of nature which are boldly rendered with strong color and gestural strokes beginning with a photograph as a focal point. Hirsman adds detail and shadowing to her fine art photographs and uses natural objects, such as flowers.

At the CODA Gallery at 380 Leadville N., the most recent floral canvases of artist Joseph Kinnebrew will be featured. The floral works are unlike any others he has created and are cast against a deep magenta background that evokes a strong sense of silence and an almost magical serenity.

The Broschovsky Galleries, at Sixth and Leadville, feature a selection of works by jewelry favorites Eddie Samuels, Paul Shapiro, Susan Njord, Berquist and William Matthews.

Samuels and Shapiro are two of the Santa Fe "Fauvists," showing boldly

colored and distorted forms which are both lifelike and abstract. Berquist's whimsical drawings and paintings are taken from Native American mythology, usually involving the "trickster" coyote in lessons teaching how not to live.

Matthew's watercolors have a quality of depth and light that makes the observer feel a sensation of experiencing the painting. Also featured, in celebration of the Centennial, is Boise watercolor artist Kathryn Wren. Her wax-resistant technique on large format florals makes a uniquely impressive statement.

The Steve Snyder Gallery at 131 W. Fourth St. in the Clubhouse Plaza below Perry's, features photographs of the Western mystique with fine art images in black and white and in sepia. Snyder's photographs transcend the realm of ordinary and attempt to bridge the gulf between camera and drawing.

The Sun Valley Center Gallery in the Walnut Avenue Mall at 620 Sun Valley Road features ceramic artist John Takekura and sculptures by Diana Bartz.

Takekura, born in Sowon, Korea of Japanese parents, has taught ceramics at Boise State University since 1968. He has exhibited his decorative and functional ceramics both nationally and internationally.

Providing the perfect counterpoint to Takekura's eager-fired stoneware, porcelain and raku vessels is the mixed media sculpture of Bartz. Her sculptures incorporate wood, paper, 24k gold leaf, silk, fiberglass, canvas, cast bronze, clay and paint as well as found objects such as old soldering irons, old spoons and loom parts.

Most of the art shows will remain through the month of June. The next gallery opening is scheduled for the evening of July 6.

## 'Paint Idaho' reflects state's heritage

TWIN FALLS — On display at Larson Arts, 132 Main Ave. N., is a traveling art exhibit with the theme "Paint Idaho." The exhibit, a Centennial project of the Nampa Art Guild, includes 12 paintings and has received endorsement by the Idaho State Centennial Commission.

The paintings were selected from nearly 60 submitted by guild members and represent the state's past and present, from drilling for water, railing sagbrush for fuel, stacks of long hay, the timber industry, nature scenes, the native American and the farm fields of today. Some of the entries were done with the help of old family photographs, others reflect a location or event that has special meaning to the artist.

Jurors for the exhibit were Nampa Mayor Winston Goering, a supporter of the arts, and Arthur A. Hart of Boise, a state historian and artist.

"Paint Idaho" will be on exhibit at 12 locations during 1990. After opening in Nampa, it traveled to Boise State University, Idaho State University and the Corner Gallery in Idaho Falls. From Twin Falls, it will go the historical Halley Hotel in Halley and to Boise's State Historical Museum in August. Leaving Boise, it goes to Lewis-Clark College in Lewiston, the Grangeville Museum and to the Caldwell Public Library. The exhibit will close at the Nampa Civic Center in December.

The exhibit has been funded by the Nampa Art Guild, entry fees paid by the artists and donations from local individuals and businesses. The guild is a non-profit organization sponsored by the Nampa City Parks and Recreation Department.

# Popular MTV executive leaves to head new E! network

LOS ANGELES (AP) — MTV's most popular executive caused a bit of a stir when he abruptly quit last fall. Lee Masters, adored by music industry and critical alike, making the cable network solvent, walked out because, he said, "The new structure didn't give me much room for growth or authority."

Translation: MTV's new owners wouldn't let Masters run the show.

Now he does. For a different brand-new cable network that he predicts will become MTV for adults.

On Friday, the E! entertainment network will become the first 24-hour cable channel on television. Bankrolled for the most part by Home Box Office, E! will transmit celebrity news, interviews, movie-picks, television features, fashion tips and just about anything-and-everything related to Hollywood.

"People watch this kind of stuff," Masters said. "They're certainly not going to watch it every day, but the idea is to have something for adults to watch the way youngsters and kids watch MTV."

Isn't that what "Entertainment Tonight" is for? Or "Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous"? Or, better yet, the Movietime channel, which E! replaces?

Yep, said Masters, but there's plenty of go around because Americans have insatiable appetites

for inside glimpses of beautiful people and their seemingly beautiful lives.

And Movietime, with its own version of 24-hour entertainment programming, obviously never had Lee Masters at the helm or a huge infusion of capital.

E! already has interviews with Mel Gibson, Michelle Pfeiffer and Dazyl-Hannah in the can. The round-the-clock programming will be divided into two-hour segments hosted by a male and female "anchor."

Complementing the gift of

Hollywood is a media blitz of E!'s own. At the recent National Cable Television Association convention in Atlanta, E!'s lavish display (long on "bells and whistles" according to one attendee) wowed many.

No expense has been spared on extravagant press kits or on the network itself. According to Masters, E! has a \$43 million "war chest," most of it from HBO.

Although HBO is only one of 10 equity partners in E!, it is the largest partner and chief financial backer. Other equity partners include Comcast Corp., one of the

country's biggest cable operators. Warner Cable, Cox Cable and Continental Cablevision. Many of these same backers were behind Movietime before it was replaced with E!.

Masters, whose programming ideas helped bring game shows to MTV, is quick to point out that managing partner or no, HBO doesn't run E! Masters does.

"They don't really run the show," he said. "There are a lot of players and a lot of conflicting interests" meaning the number of equity partners.

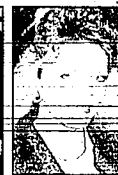

## Fox challenge sparks original programs for summer season

LOS ANGELES (AP) — It's mid-August. You're too hot to go out. Grab a glass of something cold, park in front of the tube and consider the choices.

A third repeat of "I Married Dum...". The second showing of that fabulous "Manimal" episode in which the lead character turns into a tiger. Or, wait, hold onto your sun visor, what about the fourth special encore presentation of that "Moonlighting" episode where Maddie sleeps with Mark Hamon?

There's been a cure for the summertime rerun blues. It's called flipping the dial to a network where there are myriad first-run programs to choose from. And that means not flipping to ABC, CBS or NBC. It took the Big Three a couple of years to swallow this little pill. It went down only after Fox Broadcasting Co. stole significant numbers of viewers last year while the big boys over at the mondo-networks took their usual summer naps.

The alternative Fox network, not asleep at the wheel, has taken to calling last year's coup "The Summer of Opportunity."

This year, they plan to maintain year-round original programming.

Two new shows have been announced for the summer, as well as more fresh episodes and specials of shows such as "Cops," "America's Most Wanted" and the critically acclaimed "In Living Color."

Cable networks such as Home Box Office like to take credit, too, for increasing their viewership by running original programming during the summer.

"The networks are definitely reacting to cable television," said HBO-spokesman Richard Licata. "Cable is definitely eroding their (ratings) shares."

The sleeping giants have stirred, and this summer ABC, CBS and NBC are plugging more money into summer programming than ever before.

But it's not a whole lot. And even though the Big Three are making a big deal out of their summer programming, with few exceptions, it's still a mere pittance.

ABC will show unseen episodes of the recently canceled "Brewster Place," starring Oprah Winfrey, and "Capital News," starring Lloyd Bridges. Its few new summer shows include "New Attitude," about a beauty salon, and the game show "Super Jeopardy!" and "Monopoly."

Rather than produce a large slate of fresh shows, ABC instead has spent "between \$10 and \$20 million increasing the number of existing shows," said network spokesman Jim Brochu.

Over at the No. 1 peacock network, which barely held on to its top-rated status during May sweeps, NBC programming gurus have some interesting ideas for summer.

Entertainment President Brandon Tartikoff announced this week that repeats of "Quantum Leap," one of his favorite shows, would be shown at 10 p.m. EDT for five consecutive nights beginning June 23. New programs include "Shogun and Son" starring Esther Rolle and "The Seinfeld Chronicles" starring comedian Jerry Seinfeld.

"Because there are so many choices, no longer can you just simply go away and not come back until the fall," said NBC spokeswoman Sue Binford. "Putting that into practice is very, very tough. We're not going to get there completely this summer."

At bottom-rated CBS, executives have little to say about the summer season. "They're too busy trying to figure out their fall schedule and how to get out of last place."

# Wit, brains and violence mix in technothriller 'Total Recall'

## Review

What if you woke up one day and remembered that you were somebody else. And as soon as you started to remember, people tried to kill you. That's what happens to Arnold Schwarzenegger in "Total Recall" (rated R).

But "Total Recall" is no standard-issue Schwarzenegger epic, though its co-stars might be said to be guns and death. Instead, it issues from the same distinctly ungente imagination of the Paul Verhoeven who was last represented on screen with the astonishing "RoboCop" after a distinguished if equally ungente European career. Thus Verhoeven's "Total Recall" is of the same powerful brew of violence and intellectuality, violence and originality, violence and mordant humor, and violence and perversity that marked "RoboCop." Also, the movie is very violent.

discover the source of his malady, and the large angry men with guns attempt to kill him, Schwarzenegger makes a further discovery: not only does he seem to be somebody else, but he has somebody else's nasty skills, and with terrifying swiftness, he manages to kill four men in close-quarters combat.

It turns out — or so he thinks — that he's the Martian Rebel Quaid, a lieutenant in the underground struggle against Mars' dictatorial boss Cohagen (Ronnie Cox). He's been captured, and his mind has been (inefficiently) erased, and he has been given the new wife and the new identity. On the run, he meets a new confederate: himself. Or rather, the self he was before the mind erasure, in the form of a videotape where Old Quaid briefs New Quaid on what to do and where to go. This is an interesting science fiction theme, used by Kurt Vonnegut Jr. as well as Philip K. Dick, whose original story suggests against "Total Recall," a former self, much more learned, addressing a new self, with instructions. In this film, Schwarzenegger really does learn how to be his own best friend.

Everywhere Quaid goes, Verhoeven shows us miracles, and why this movie cost over \$50 million, and why it might have been worth it. Earth, for example, looks like a large junior college in California; Mars is a chessy, rude underground frontier town, where

strippers and whores and dope dealers do what they can to detract from the misery, but overhead, a "cheap dome" doesn't quite keep out the intense sunlight and genetic mutations — common.

Verhoeven's sense of humor is subversive. He nourishes us to the moment, for example, when a beautiful woman gets shot point-blank in the head and we cheer. He invites us to laugh over the humorously grotesque mutations. And he gets great mileage out of Sharon Stone, heretofore merely a noble presence in a few undistinguished movies.

But there's a curious irony to "Total Recall" involving Schwarzenegger. The film wouldn't exist without Schwarzenegger, who found the script and battled for it, who encouraged his producers to hire Verhoeven on the strength of "RoboCop," and who quite decently allowed the director his vision of the

film and clearly did not insist on being at the center of every scene.

The movie would not exist without Arnold Schwarzenegger, and yet Schwarzenegger's limits are exactly what limit the film.

"RoboCop," with a gifted actor like Peter Weller, Schwarzenegger is never quite able to bring Quaid to the kind of quality of mind the film seems to require of him. Basically this is a \$50 million "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" remake, and its deepest moments represent the age-old fight in a man's soul between his good and bad selves — the movie's best surprise is the other self in Quaid. But Schwarzenegger, so physical a presence (he looks great running, jumping and shooting), just hasn't the skill to bring out the richer dimension of theme.

Arnold's presence guarantees that it could be made, but also guarantees that it remains a great thriller but not a great movie.

## 'Fire Birds' offers video game looks, little drama

**FIRE BIRDS (PG-13).** The crack, rebellious, student pilot; the salty old pro; the tough sexpot; vicious foe, blasting you out of the sky. A movie that aspires to be "Top Gun" in Army helicopters, like this one, is trying for so much logistically and so little dramatically that it seems a sure bet to crash and burn. So, it does — endlessly, wantonly, like a video game interspersed with wisecracks and a flying manual. Only the off-the-edge costar cast by director David Green in the leading roles — Nicolas Cage, Tommy Lee Jones — give it any charge.

**BACK TO THE FUTURE PART II (PG).** An appealing if ultimately disposable conclusion to the McFly saga. In this one, set mostly in the Old West, Doc falls in love.

**CADILLAC MAN (R).** Noisy, overbright and empty, "Cadillac Man" wastes the considerable talents of all aboard but most especially Robin Williams, trying wildly to fast-talk cuckolded husband Tim Robbins out of shooting all his hostages at a Queens car dealership.

**THE GODS MUST BE CRAZY II (PG).** In his vastly successful "The Gods Must Be Crazy" director Jamie Uys treated his leading characters, the tribal Bushmen of the Kalahari desert, in a paternalistic

and patronizing manner. This time, everyone in it — except the animals, and one of them looks stuffed — has something to cringe about from the sheer exhausting dumbness of the action.

# 'A Different World' actor Hardison even made flip-up sunglasses cool

It's not hard to assess the popularity of Kadeem Hardison, who plays Dwayne Wayne on NBC's Thursday-night hit series "A Different World." Just consult your local optician, or better, keep your eyes open. Only Bart Simpson T-shirts seem to rival Dwayne's super-cool flip-up sunglasses in today's popular culture. And at least the guys who wear Dwayne's glasses have a more positive — and more real — role model.

Like Dwayne, Hardison makes a show of super-coolness, but at heart he seems to be tender. Of his popularity with fans, he deadpans, "It's crazy! I get people crying, and I get people laughing. I just can't imagine what gets them going." He makes a show of being naive about this kind of fame, but he has been around show business for most of his life. His mother, Bethann Hardison, was a leading model and is now a New York-based talent agent.

Hardison plays down this background, too. "My mother said, 'What do you want to do? Do you want to be an actor?' And I said, 'OK.' And I was a natural." Instead of coaching him, Hardison says, "She gave me a (subway) token and sent me on my way." (In his bio, Hardison is quoted, "My mother is my manager and best friend. Pleasing her is what is important to me.")

Hardison actually started acting in his early teens, training at New York City's Eubie Blake Theatre. He studied under Earle Hyman, who now plays Grandpa Huxtable on

"The Cosby Show," from which "A Different World" was spun off. "Oh, yeah!" Hardison says of the connection. "It's a very small community. We're always running into each other. There's a whole crowd of black actors who know each other real well." Hardison has appeared in his friend Spike Lee's film "School Daze," and he has a role in the just-released horror film "Temptation," directed by and starring another old pal, James Bond III.

Hardison made his television debut on an "ABC AfterSchool Special," "The Color of Friendship." A small guest role on "The Cosby Show" eventually led to his role in "A Different World."

Hardison arrived on the Los Angeles-based set midway through the first season of "A Different

World." It was then produced by "Square Pegs" creator Anne Beatts, and Hardison says it wasn't a happy place.

"The first year we had no control, and we were doing only what we were told. We didn't have any input," he explains.

Things changed with a much-publicized switch in producers. "As soon as Debbie (Allen of "Fame") took over, it got to be stable and happy," Hardison says.

Since Allen's arrival, Hardison says, "The story ideas have gotten much better. And she's let us all live a little bit."

## Soap opera scene

# 'Generations' fans can now cheer up

Do Emmys mean anything? In the case of "Generations," NBC's half-hour black-white soap trying to find its identity and an audience, the nomination of Kristoff St. John for Best Supporting Actor as Adam Marshall is a ray of hope this June. Something's working.

After an affair with a married woman (Janelle Allen's Doreen Jackson), St. John's Adam has the ladies intrigued by concentrating on Maya. At this stage, handsome St. John is the show's best bet for a breakthrough. If Adam turns out to be a bore, NBC bigwigs had better forget the project and blame themselves for excessive timidity.

Right now, Kristoff St. John is trying to pick out crisis moments for this character, scenes strong enough to compete with the hour entries on the June 28th Emmys. St. John faces tough competition from "General Hospital's" Kin Shriner as Scott Baldwin, "Santa Barbara's" Roscoe Born as Robert Barr and Quinn Redeker as Rex Sterling on "The Young and the Restless."

"Adam has changed a lot since we began," says Kristoff. "He's gone from a college kid, who would go to bed with anyone, to concentrating on Maya, a very insecure and sensitive lady. He's focused more on work after having no idea where he was going. I hope his love affair with Maya doesn't end up in marriage. It would be a mistake to tie him down for good at this point."

Now front and center for the soap, Kristoff treads a thin line. He's honest enough to admit he was disappointed by the soap's direction that first year. Ballyhoned as a breakthrough concept — life with a white family and a black family, "Generations" played it cozy. Instead of being daring, NBC played it safe. Yes, there was a story on sickle cell anemia, a disease mainly afflicting blacks, and one on the Marshall family facing racist threats for moving into a white neighborhood. But nothing really strong and perceptive.

Next, new actors were hired and that was grating. "Our good actors were being ignored," Kristoff notes. "Then I was in St. Louis promoting

the show when a reporter asked about black writers on the show. I told him we had only one. I felt bad about that. We still have only one. And zero black directors. I understand the thinking, it's the system. You go with people you know."

Watching the show closely, Kristoff's father, actor Jacques St. John, knows there's not enough black input. It's an old Hollywood story. Only Fox Television's "In Living Color" with Keenan Ivory Wayans offers black control from top to bottom and could be a trend setter.

But there's Kristoff St. John, up for an Emmy, speaking out, quietly pushing for more black influence on the soap. "It's more than two decades since Martin Luther King's assassination and things have

changed," St. John continues. "In those days my father, married to a white woman, couldn't walk down the street holding hands with his wife. We've made strides, but some places never change."

Let's hope NBC gets the message. With "Cosby" on top in the evening, "Generations" could be a leader in the afternoon if it dared.

# During week of numerous repeats, Fox shines with Sunday night trio

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Fox Network's Sunday-night trio, "The Simpsons," "Married...With Children," and "In Living Color" were in the top 20 in a week replete with repeats, according to Nielsen figures released Tuesday.

A rerun of "The Simpsons" was in a fourth place tie, beating NBC's "The Cosby Show," which was tied for eighth place in the ratings for last week, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co.

"Cosby" and "The Simpsons" will face each other next season on Thursday nights.

It was the highest ever for a Fox show and the first time the show about the cartoon nuclear family broke into the top 10.

"Married...With Children" was No. 11 and "In Living Color" was 19th, the first time Fox Network had three shows in the top 20.

Reruns of "Cheers" and "Roseanne" took the top two spots.

The premiere of comedian Jerry Seinfeld's half-hour series on NBC was ranked No. 3. It was one of the few fresh shows-broadcast last week. Doing less well in its premiere was CBS' "Dave Thomas Comedy Show," tied for 59th place.

## NBC admits error in changing 'Today'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The head of NBC News conceded to affiliates Monday "we screwed up" the "Today Show" with changes that led to Jane Pauley's leaving in December.

However, Michael Gartner told the annual NBC affiliates' convention that key changes have been made, including a new executive producer for the show, Tom Capra. "Now, with the dust settled, he'll make it, we'll make it, another winner," he said.

The show has been second in ratings to ABC's "Good Morning America" for 21 weeks.

The affection of affiliate executives for Pauley — succeeded on "Today" by Deborah Norville — was amply illustrated when they gave her a standing ovation as she appeared on stage at the National Theater where Gartner spoke. "I have never been happier in my work," said Pauley, who is preparing a series of prime-time specials for NBC and is substitute evening news anchor when Tom Brokaw is away.

Gartner didn't specify the mistakes that caused the slump. But seeking to make amends to executives of NBC's 208 affiliated

stations, Gartner also tried to show progress on two other news fronts. He said a new 24-hour news service, the NBC-News-Channel, will start serving affiliates in January, providing international, national and regional news for use in their own newscasts.

The service won't transmit stories on a non-stop basis as does Cable News Network. Nor will it have news anchors, as some industry observers thought it would.

It is intended to help NBC stations compete with CNN's newscasts, and to ward off further encroachments by CNN on NBC stations. CNN says it has 216 broadcast affiliates, of which 52 are NBC affiliates.

Gartner also introduced the new executive producer of the third-ratings "NBC Nightly News," Steve Friedman, calling him a "show doctor" who will "make 'Nightly' sparkle."

Friedman is a former executive producer of "Today" credited with making that show first in ratings before leaving it in 1987 to create what turned out to be a costly, syndicated flop, "USA Today on TV."

"Welcome to NBC News' version

of 'Back to the Future,'" Friedman joked, alluding to his return and the re-hiring of former Joe Garagiola as a new co-host on "Today" with Norville and Bryant Gumbel. Garagiola, who is not scheduled to start on "Today" until June 11, appeared on stage with Gumbel, Norville, weatherman Willard Scott, and other new additions — anchor Faith Daniels and correspondent Katherine Couric.

Capra, appearing separately, said Garagiola "will be the glue that holds the show together."

In speaking of Capra's hiring last year, Gartner said: "We know we screwed up the 'Today Show.' ... He knows what the show needs and he knows how to provide it."

The usually-brash Friedman was cautious and didn't promise a fast ratings rise for "Nightly News." However, he said there would be changes to make the newscast more of a ratings contender.

He didn't outline the changes, citing competitive reasons. Newscasts "no longer just index the day's events," he told an audience of 1,100. The opening of NBC's three-day session began the same day as Fox Broadcasting's convention in Los Angeles.
