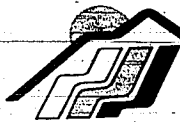

Clinic to build new hospital near Mall

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls Clinic and hospital owners will build a new hospital for as much as \$10 million near the Magic Valley Mall, the hospital's administrator says.

"We have an agreement to purchase the property," said Marley Jackman, hospital administrator.

Construction on the facility, which could be twice as large as the 44-bed structure the clinic currently occupies at 666 Shoshone St. E., should begin in the spring of 1991, he said.

The new hospital will be more competitive in the full-service hospital market, Jackman said. He said the new hospital site on 40 acres at the southeast corner of Pole Line Road and Madrona Street North is a more convenient location for patients coming from Gooding, Jerome and Burley.

"The location makes all the sense in the world when you consider all the growth that is happening in that area of town," City Economic Development Director Dave

McAlindin said.

Jackman declined to say how much the property will cost or who the seller is. However, the owner of a 39-acre parcel on that corner is listed on the county's tax rolls as Walter H. Carr, said County Assessor Dorothy Hamby.

The new hospital will help meet the needs of a patient load that has increased by more than 10 percent in the last few years, Jackman said.

"We're awfully tight on our scheduling," he said.

Twin Falls' growing economy also influenced the decision to build.

The hospital's owners — 14 of the 17 doctors who now use it — want to bring in as many as eight new physicians within four or five years, but that would not be feasible without an expansion or a larger new building, he said.

The doctors scrapped plans about a year ago for a \$2.8 million, two-phase expansion of its existing building because that would have only solved short-range growth needs, Jackman said.

The structure is "landlocked" and would

Blasses seek \$1.2 million in latest Hawkins Co. suit

FILER — Pleading "total financial ruin," Twin Falls County Commissioner Norma Blass has sued the state and a Buhl accounting firm in connection with the failure of the Hawkins Co. Ltd. bean warehouse.

The suit, which seeks \$1.2 million, claims that the Idaho Department of Agriculture and the firm of Schobot, Shriver & Co. neglected to inform Blass and her husband Robert of the warehouse's condition prior to its November 1988 closure by the state.

"There were in fact shortages and irregularities of Hawkins which were known or should have been known to the State of Idaho in May 1988 as a result of an audit," the complaint said.

Interim Agriculture Department Director Greg Nelson was unavailable for comment Thursday.

Robert Blass also claimed in testimony that the principals in the accounting firm had a conflict of interest and could not conduct an independent audit of Hawkins Co. Ltd. because they were involved in a partnership with other shareholders in the warehouse, according to Farm Times.

Thomas Schobot, whose firm is now known as Schobot, Deagle and Co. of Buhl, was unavailable for comment, as were Jerry Hawkins and William Nungester, the other

owners of the failed warehouse. The Agriculture Department shut down the Hawkins Co. Ltd. warehouse in November 1988 after its owners discovered far fewer beans in storage than were recorded in company records.

The Agriculture Department's Bureau of Warehouse Control periodically audits licensed warehouses in Idaho.

Because of the alleged breach by the firm and the state, the Blasses "were unable to sell their stock in Hawkins to Klein Brothers at a price of \$200,000," the complaint said.

"Plaintiffs' inability to consummate the sale caused total financial ruin of the plaintiffs, which resulted in the plaintiffs having to file a Chapter 11 bankruptcy because they could not pay corporate debts."

Klein Brothers is a California bean brokerage that owned some of the beans in the warehouse.

The Hawkins Co. Ltd. filed bankruptcy in January 1989. Farmers and brokers who owned beans stored at the time of the closure received a fraction of their value in March after a federal bankruptcy judge accepted a plan approved by a majority of the growers.

The suit, which was filed last month in 5th District Court in Twin Falls County, came more than six months after the state denied the Blasses' tort claim for damages.

The Blasses filed bankruptcy in October 1989.

High court upholds driver sobriety checks

WASHINGTON — Police seeking to curb drunken driving do not violate motorists' privacy rights by stopping them at sobriety checkpoints, the Supreme Court ruled Thursday.

The 6-3 decision upheld Michigan's checkpoint program and, by extension, similar operations in most states.

"The balance of the state's interest in preventing drunken driving ... and the degree of intrusion upon individual motorists who are briefly stopped weighs in favor of the state program," Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist wrote for the court.

The three dissenters said the decision sacrificed individual liberty in favor of a police tactic that might not make any difference in the fight against drunken driving.

In other decisions, the court:

• Ruled, 5-4, in a Virginia case that hospitals and nursing homes may sue in federal

court to challenge how a state-run Medicaid program reimburses their costs.

It ruled unanimously in a case from Massachusetts that the federal government may impose severe fines against air polluters even when regulators are slow to decide on clean-air proposals.

• Allowed the Bush administration by a 5-4 vote in a Virginia case, to limit how much welfare aid some needy families receive.

The sobriety-checkpoint ruling was hailed by various groups seeking greater crackdowns on "drunken drivers," but was denounced by the American Civil Liberties Union.

Micky Sadoff, national president of Mothers Against Drunk Driving, called the decision "a great victory for all of us who care about the safety of our loved ones on the highways."

The chairman of the National

ISP decides checkpoints aren't answer

TWIN FALLS — Despite the OK from the country's highest court, the Idaho State Police won't be using sobriety checkpoints to identify drunk drivers.

"Checkpoints are not the answer," said Bill Overton, spokesman for the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement, which oversees the state police.

State police abandoned sobriety checkpoints in the early 1980s for "saturation" enforcement, which Overton said has "proven to be a more visible and more effective way of policing."

In addition to routine patrol, state police assign a larger num-

Flag Day mixes rites, oratory WIPP receives Watkins' OK

WASHINGTON — President Bush marked Flag Day with a dawn visit to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Thursday while a Medal of Honor-winning senator said he was ashamed of Bush's recent actions concerning a constitutional amendment on flag burning.

"Today, in quiet glory, the Stars and Stripes continue to proclaim the shining promise of America," Bush said in a statement released after he visited the memorial. He proclaimed not only Flag Day but Flag Week.

Later, veterans in American Legion and Amvets caps, along with camera-carrying tourists, swarmed over Capitol Hill where rows of American flags hung limp in the heat while lawmakers pored over the Stars and Stripes from their homes and other suitable places.

On Main Streets across the nation, Americans decked front porches with American flags in honor of the day. Bush called on "all Americans to observe Flag Day and Flag Week by flying the Stars and Stripes from their homes and other suitable places."

flag protection law.

To become part of the Constitution, the amendment will need two-thirds support in both the House and the Senate and ratification by 38 state legislatures.

"On this joyous occasion, may we also renew our determination to uphold the ideals enshrined in our Constitution and Declaration of Independence," the president said in his statement.

Sen. Bob Kerrey, D-Nebr., who won the Medal of Honor in Vietnam, called the push for a flag amendment "an attempt to divide America, to divide fathers against sons." He said it would reopen "the generation gap" of the Vietnam era.

Kerrey held up a picture of Bush laughing at a White House meeting as Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., held a flag — a picture, the senator said, that showed the real point of the debate was to gain political advantage.

"I am ashamed of what he did," Kerrey declared in an impassioned speech on the Senate floor. "He has chosen to divide his country

on an issue that, frankly, in my opinion, should not be given this much attention," Kerrey later told a rally of congressional veterans against the amendment.

Sen. John C. Danforth, R-Mo., parting company with conservative colleagues, took the Senate floor to oppose the amendment.

"We, thank God, do not live in a brittle, fragile country, because in our country anybody is free to express himself," Danforth said.

The debate over the flag resounded in incidents across America. Townspeople of Birchfield, Minn., wanted to find 3,000 small plastic flags planted in their lawns by employees of a local estate company "as an important part of our heritage." But one local critic grumbled that it was "an intrusive political statement."

Elsewhere: • Retired Cincinnati librarian Paul Payne, 81, vowed to burn a flag to protest a U.S. policy of "bullying little nations, supporting murder and massacre." But he changed his mind and the scene in Fountain Square turned into a celebration as a radio station gave away small American flags.

• Vermont State Archivist Gregory Sanford in Montpelier declared him-

WIPP receives Watkins' OK

WASHINGTON — Energy Secretary James Watkins on Thursday ordered his department to go ahead with development of a radioactive waste repository in New Mexico, saying it meets all required environmental laws.

But he said the plant near Carlsbad, N.M., will not receive any radioactive wastes until January at the earliest because of continuing tests.

"I will not compromise health or safety concerns to meet any schedule," said Watkins.

The department's Waste Isolation Pilot Plant will accept highly radioactive waste over a five year test period beginning next year, he said.

Watkins signed a formal "record of decision" on a supplement to the environmental impact statement for the plant, certifying that the plant meets federal environmental laws.

The department said, however, further tests would be conducted on some environmental issues such as gas generated from metal drums and wastes created as a result of corrosion or bacterial action.

"The plant will be the country's first central repository for radioactive wastes from nearly a dozen nuclear weapons plants. The wastes will be placed in salt beds 2,150 feet under the

Administration gets tough with Japan on trade commitments

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration, worried about a lack of progress in trade talks with Japan, insisted Thursday that the Japanese honor commitments to open markets to American and other foreign goods.

U.S. negotiators have grown concerned over what they perceive as Japanese foot-dragging in the talks, aimed at reducing the United States' \$49 billion trade deficit with Japan.

Critics have said Japan's intransigence is directly linked to a

decision by the Bush administration to remove Japan from under a tough section of trade law known as Super 301, which carries the threat of economic sanctions.

Recent negotiations in Hawaii produced little progress toward the text of a final report on negotiations aimed at reforming the economies of both countries as a way of attacking the underlying reasons for the huge trade imbalance.

Japan and the United States signed an interim agreement on the talks, known as the Structural Imped-

iments Initiative, in April and face a deadline of early July for producing a final report.

However, in several key areas, the Japanese are refusing to make commitments sought by U.S. negotiators.

"As we go from the interim report to the final report, we want to keep the pressure on to make sure that all the commitments make it through into that final report," White House Press Secretary Marlin Fitzwater told reporters.

Fitzwater downplayed reports that

administration officials believed the Japanese side was stonewalling now that the threat of economic sanctions under Super 301 was no longer present.

However, two other senior administration officials, briefing reporters on a condition that their names not be used, expressed clear disappointment Thursday with the lack of progress.

"It would be highly regrettable that if at this stage, the process lost momentum and reversed itself," one official said. He said he believed

there had been a reduced level of involvement by senior Japanese officials in the process.

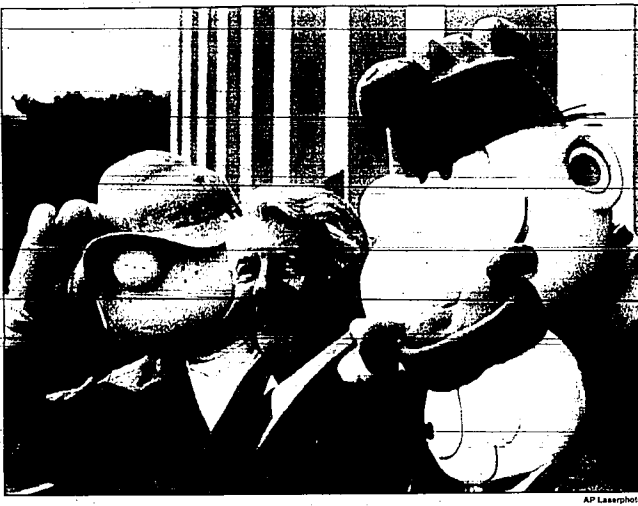
The U.S.-Japan trade talks were scheduled earlier this year before a hastily arranged summit meeting between Japanese Prime Minister Toshiki Kaifu and President Bush got the negotiations back on track.

Secretary of State James A. Baker III is scheduled to meet Japanese Foreign Minister Taro Nakayama in San Francisco on Friday and the administration is hoping those discussions will break the current

stalemate.

Japanese officials have insisted that they have gone as far as they can go with the commitments made in the April report. The "U.S.-Japan" characterizing the April report as only a "way station" with much more concrete language needed to carry out the vague promises.

The next round of talks on structural barriers is scheduled for June 25-26 in Tokyo with the final report due before the economic summit meeting in Houston on July 9.

After four decades, Beetle Bailey wins over the Army

WASHINGTON (AP) — Beetle Bailey, the lazy but lovable GI who has stumbled through comic pages for the past 40 years, finally won an admiring salute Thursday from the U.S. Army.

In a Flag Day ceremony at the Pentagon, cartoonist Mort Walker received a framed "certificate of appreciation for patriotic civilian service" from Brig. Gen. Bill McClain.

Walker declared an amnesty in the Army's decades-old hostility against the slovenly buck private.

"Through it all, you have entertained us, although sometimes we haven't always liked it," said McClain. "If you can't laugh at yourself, something is intrinsically wrong with you."

Tongue in cheek, Walker replied that it was always "the dream of Gen. Halftrack and mine to hear from the Pentagon," and it took 40 years to get the call.

"I can't believe I'm actually here," Walker said. "As hard as it is to find anything in the Pentagon, they finally found a sense of humor."

Since Walker created the popular comic strip in

1950, based on his experiences as an Army draftee in World War II, Beetle Bailey and his cartoon friends have annoyed some Pentagon brass who complained they presented an unflattering image of Army life.

In 1954, the Tokyo edition of The Stars and Stripes, a military newspaper, drummed Beetle off its pages because the strip poked "Beetle Bailey had a low interest value," but the move was denounced in newspaper editorials as silly.

Stars and Stripes banned the strip again in 1970, as did some Southern newspapers, when Walker introduced Lt. Flap, a feisty black character. Miss Buxley, the bosomy secretary to Gen. Halftrack, drew protests from feminists.

Putting the controversy behind, the Army heaped praise on Walker in its citation Thursday.

"His ingenuity in portraying Army members in a humorous manner has contributed significantly to the morale of our soldiers as they provide for our national security," it read.

B-2 bomber is Air Force top priority, general says

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush's nominee for Air Force chief of staff said publicly on Thursday what has been hinted at for weeks: The service's top priority is the B-2 bomber and land-based nuclear missiles can wait.

Gen. Michael J. Dugan, now Air Force commander in Europe, confirmed reports that the service has proposed to Defense Secretary Dick Cheney that modernization of land-based missiles be delayed.

Asked if the Air Force had recommended that option, Dugan told the Senate Armed Services Committee:

"I understand that, I accept that, approve that and I support that. One needs to look at affordability issues in every regard."

Cheney still has the final say on whether the Pentagon will slow down development of the single-warhead Midgutman missile and delay plans to move the multiple-warhead MX missile from silos to rail cars.

"This is a proposal. It hasn't been reviewed. It's subject to lots of further discussion," Dugan said.

In April, the defense secretary said the Bush administration supports the MX rail-basing program, which accounts for \$2.8 billion in the defense budget for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1. The budget calls for \$202 million for the Midgutman.

Dugan made it clear that the No. 1 concern for the service is the B-

stealth bomber, the radar-evading plane that at more than \$815 million a copy has resulted in increasing congressional opposition.

"I rank the B-2 at the head of my list for all strategic modernization programs in the Air Force," Dugan said.

His second priority is the Midgutman missile and third is the MX missile on railroad cars, which the service should have as a hedge with research and development funds available.

"I find a logic to that set of priorities," said Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the Senate panel.

Sen. John Warner of Virginia, ranking Republican on the committee, also concurred.

In an interview with Defense News, the outgoing chief of staff, Gen. Larry Welch, said the United States is "going to pause intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) modernization until we have a clear view of where we're going to go in the next step of arms control."

During his confirmation hearing, Dugan also was questioned about the Air Force's June 4 decision to take away the approval it had previously granted to McDonnell Douglas Corp. on its purchasing system for the C-17 transport plane.

The decision means the company must get Air Force approval for purchases in excess of \$100,000. The service stressed that the action will not delay the program.

Collection of statistics released

WASHINGTON (AP) — The 114th edition of the book statistics fans consider "numero uno" is out, and it says California, Nevada, Utah, Florida and North Dakota are all number one.

It should surprise no one that the Statistical Abstract of the United States shows California with the largest population of any state with an estimated 29 million residents.

But Nevada has been growing fastest, increasing by nearly 39 percent during the 1980s, according to the Abstract.

Utah has the largest share of people under age 18, 37 percent, while Florida has the biggest representation in the over-65 category, 18 percent.

And North Dakota has the most hospital beds available at 878 per 100,000 residents.

Those represent just a minor sample of the massive collection of facts found in the 1990 edition of the Statistical Abstract.

Compiled by the Census Bureau from a variety of sources, this year's volume crams 1,532 tables into 991 pages.

Sources of the information are cited with each table and many tables contain information not available elsewhere.

The book is on sale from government bookstores or from the Superintendent of Documents, Washington, D.C., 20402. The price is \$28 for the paperback or \$34 for the hard-bound edition.

Cheney to ask for military building cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Dick Cheney will ask Congress next week to cancel "a substantial number" of military construction projects at home and abroad, his spokesman said Thursday.

Cheney also extended a worldwide freeze on military construction in order "to help ensure the department proceeds with the projects for which there is a genuine need," Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams told reporters.

The secretary is acting because of anticipated cuts in the Pentagon budget and expected reductions in the nation's military forces, Williams said.

Cheney will select his candidates for cancellation from a list of some 207 projects — including the controversial Navy "home ports" in Texas, Alabama, Mississippi and New York.

Last month, Cheney ordered the 207 projects to be reviewed for possible cancellation.

Because funds for the projects already have been approved, the secretary must ask Congress to withdraw the funding through a process known formally as "rescission."

Bush to campaign

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush will visit Huntsville, Ala., and Charlotte, N.C., Wednesday to help raise funds for Republican candidates, the White House said Thursday.

In Huntsville, he will attend a fundraising luncheon for Republican Gov. Guy Hunt, then visit the Marshall Space Flight Center and address employees, White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said.

Cuban art museum in Miami bombed

MIAMI — A powerful bomb ripped through the embattled Cuban Museum of Arts and Culture Thursday in an incident federal agents classified as a terrorist act.

No one was injured in the 1:10 a.m. blast, which blew out the front door and damaged several pieces of art inside. It was the second explosion in slightly more than two years at the small museum.

The FBI, working with Miami police, linked the bombing to 16 other explosive devices placed or have blown up in Dade County's Cuban community since May 1987.

Disappearing railroads a loss to rural America

The railroad had a special short line that ran past Grandpa's farm on the outskirts of town. Once the main line went through town, but that was years ago and it had been abandoned.

Grandpa and the railroad took to court when the railroad sued to run its branch line through his front yard. After a lot of expensive lawyering the railroad won. For a time there were three trains a day on the new track; then two and one. Finally there was one train a week — a two-car freight. That, too, vanished.

A few rails remain. There are ugly ground scars where the others were dug up and moved away.

The railroad no longer serves the town directly. It has ill-served Grandpa. The story has been repeated dozens of times, and more, all over rural America. The iron horse, which opened up the country a hundred years ago, is backing up. In the last decade more than 30,000 miles of track have been abandoned, leaving many towns without any rail service.

This is part of what is called "deregulation," a government policy which, it was hoped, would bring more competition at lower prices to the consumer.

One of these community consumers is the small and shrunken town of Tekoa, Wash. Its last plight was related recently in the New York Times.

The Tekoa area grows about 98 percent of the nation's lentils and exports them by rail, trucking being too expensive and hampered, anyway, by poor roads.

The lentil is a bean with an unusually high fiber content. In the Middle East or Asia Minor you will find the lentil in your soup. It meets every demand of the fiber craze (besides, I kind of like it) but it ain't hay, and thus figures in our export trade.

The Union Pacific Railroad, one of the nation's biggest and richest carriers, wants to abandon 71 miles of track serving Tekoa and other towns in the rich agricultural valley south of Spokane.

A top official of the Agriculture Department read them a sermon: "The railroads used to be viewed as a utility, but now that they can operate as any other free enterprise they are taking full advantage of deregulation. Somewhere along the line, they need to take more of a public service attitude."

Comforting words for Tekoa, but they

don't run railroads. For 10 years the Feds have looked the other way when deregulation is mentioned. The railroads claim they lose money on the short lines. (The Tekoans dispute this, pointing to Union Pacific's huge profits.)

I don't know who is right here, but your favorite newspaper probably will tell you that it publishes on Saturday and Monday, slim days for advertising, at a loss. You would howl if they cut out these days' editions.

What concerns me more than the case of Tekoa and its sisters is the slow but telling strangulation of rural America. Every day more farms go to seed or to concrete for shopping centers. We still produce more than enough food to feed ourselves and half of the world. But tomorrow?

I like the country life. (Country music, no. I left Tennessee to escape its discords and youth-corrupting bird grammar.) The air is fresh and free.

The vistas are uncluttered once you get off the highway. The people are inclined to be friendly and kind. When you were young you pitch in (literally) to help one another.

At midday dinner time the womenfolk piled the table high with warm food for the hungry field hands.

This era probably is gone. Giant machines do the work of dozens of men, and the wood-burning cook stove has given ground to the microwave. Town usually is handy along a well-paved road.

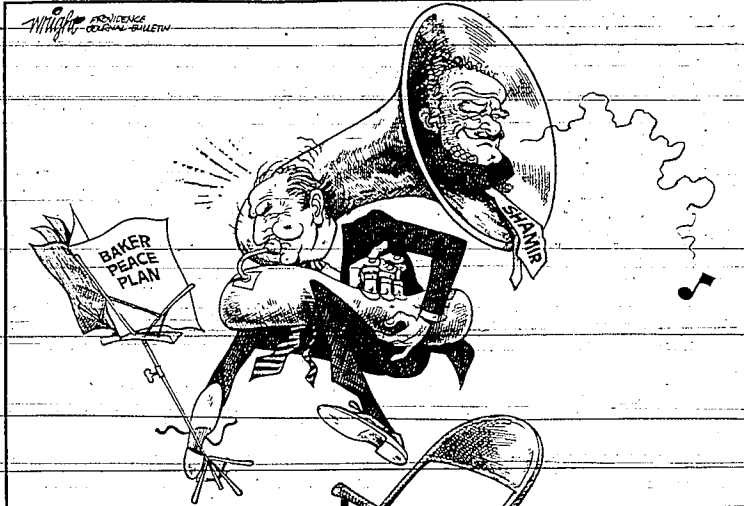
Only 2.2 percent of the U.S. population lives on farms today. That is less than the whole population of any one of the five largest metropolitan areas.

Thomas Jefferson would have deplored this decline as a death knell of democracy, as perhaps it is.

But comparisons of this sort are historically odious. Mr. Jefferson was not yet a college boy in 1758 when William Cowper wrote: "God made the country, and man made the town."

Good works, both. And both probably will survive, the Union Pacific and lentil soup notwithstanding.

Mideast heats up as Europe cools

Across the central plain of Europe, war has not seemed so unlikely since the turn of the century. There, as the armies of East and West met, and elections break out all over, talk has turned to creating bonds of commerce, communication and conciliation. The road may yet take many a twist and turn, but reasonable men have reason for hope.

Yet even as the terrible specter of nuclear holocaust fades in the embrace of Mikhail Gorbachev and George Bush, the thunder of a gathering storm rumbles from the south across the blue waters of the Mediterranean. The thunder is the voices of Palestinians in Israeli-occupied territories hurling stones at Israeli soldiers, and the answering gunfire.

It is the sound of Russian immigrants blessing the ground of a promised land few hoped to ever see.

It is the cheers of Likud supporters at the announcement of a new Israeli government of the right has been formed.

It is angry words hurled at Israel and the United States in Cairo, Damascus, Baghdad and scores of villages and cities throughout the Arab world. It is the tears and wails of mothers for lost children.

The thunder is the sound of Arabs, Arab and Jew, painting themselves into corners. But this time will not be like the last time. The Arab world is better prepared. The Israelis, most believe, have nuclear weapons.

And soon, so may the Arabs. It is not farfetched to see Arab armies pressing Israeli forces to the sea.

It is not farfetched to see nuclear-tipped Israeli missiles flying on their mission of death to the main Arab capitals. The sources of these new tensions in the Middle East are many.

There is the sheer hopelessness of the

Palestinians that has ignited a revolt Israel has had pressed to contain.

There is the daily arrival of thousands of Russian Jews, swelling a Jewish population the Arabs had believed could one day be overwhelmed by Palestinian population growth.

Then there was the end of the Iraq-Iran war. Divided among themselves in that bloody conflict, the Arabs could not focus on fighting Israel.

Now Iraq's President Saddam Hussein is free to pursue his megalomaniacal ambitions.

Probably only a triggering device away from atomic weapons, Saddam Hussein has a strong hand.

Moderate Arab governments in Egypt and Saudi Arabia, allied with the West, are under pressure to act like Arabs, not American lackeys.

To much of the Arab world, the United States and Israel are two sides of a single coin. In the eyes of Arabs, Israel could not exist without American billions.

Russian Jews would not be going to Israel except for American pressure on the Soviets, and an American refusal to take the refugees itself.

In Arab eyes, if Israel wins another war against them, it will be because the same Seventh Fleet that shelled Lebanese villages comes to Israel's aid.

If Israel will not give up the West Bank, it is because George Bush will not order it to do so. In Arab eyes, their enemy's friend is their enemy.

One wonders if wily Mikhail Gorbachev plays off this way. Let it be the Jews, blame the United States, and watch the oil-rich Arab world turn against the Americans.

Let the Americans in Europe become targets of Arab terrorists, let the Arabs turn off the oil spigot for even a few months, then watch the fearful Europeans send the Yankees packing.

Also watch the price of Russian oil soar. And not a Soviet fingerprint on a smoking gun.

But perhaps that gives even Machiavellian Mikhail too much credit. By design or happenstance, the Middle East is a powder keg with a thousand fuses in a land filled with pyromaniacs. The countdown to all-out war could be numbered in hours, or months. But without defusing, a conflagration is certainly, as the Bible would say, nigh at hand.

Realistically, there is only one solution: some form of self-determination for peoples living on the West Bank, either as an independent but reasonably demilitarized state or as a part of Jordan.

Realistically, this is unlikely to be achieved so long as the Likud is in power.

Who rules Israel is a matter for Israelis to decide. Yet, the United States is not bound to support a government whose policies put the United States at risk, or that risk a nuclear conflict.

In fact, Russian Jews would not now be immigrating to Israel were it not for American efforts. Indeed, it is American aid that keeps the basket case Israeli economy afloat.

Rarely has one nation had such leverage over another.

If Israel is to survive, if the world is to avoid a nuclear conflict, the United States must exercise that leverage. If it fails to do so, the United States will bear equal responsibility for whatever calamity befalls.

Whittle should get loud 'no'

Communications mogul Chris Whittle must be given a message loud and clear: while school districts invite the support of the private sector, our children's minds and the public schools are not for sale. Requiring children to watch commercials as a condition for receiving instruction is bad education, bad business and unethical.

The program of contention is Channel One, a marketing scheme which has as its centerpiece the offer of television sets and video playback equipment to schools. In turn, the schools receive a 12-minute news program each day, along with two minutes of commercials. The students are required to

watch the commercials or the school will lose the TV equipment.

While some school districts might find this proposition tempting, consider that the public schools are a public trust and not to be sold to the highest bidder, no matter how lucrative a scheme. The schools have no right — either morally or legally — to sell access to the curriculum. Requiring students to watch commercials under the threat that if they don't, the TV sets will be removed is exploitation of schools and children and betrayal of the trust.

The program also cedes control of the local school curriculum to an outside party more interested in selling advertising than in providing quality instruction. Many teachers that we have talked with said that they thought the quality of the ends was superior to the means of the program itself.

We are extremely interested in expanding the use of technology in our schools, but there are better ways than selling our principles for a few TV sets. Non-commercial programs such as CNN, Discovery Channel, Public Broadcasting and A&E and Entertainment all provide acceptable program options without the commercial baggage.

As Mr. Whittle wends his way West seeking buyers, we ask the citizens of Twin Falls to say no and turn off on Channel One. **ARLENE ZELKE**

Inflation at the wholesale level rises moderate 0.3% for May

WASHINGTON (AP) — A fourth consecutive drop in energy prices helped offset higher food costs in May and hold overall wholesale prices to a moderate 0.3 percent increase, the government said Thursday.

Analysts viewed the soft increase in the Labor Department's Producer Price Index for finished goods as encouraging news on the inflation front, especially given last winter's huge price gains caused by a severe cold snap. That freeze sent wholesale prices spiraling 1.9 percent in January for a 15-year record.

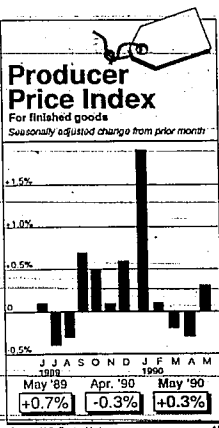
"We're back on trend after the wiggles of December and January," said Donald Ratajczak, director of economic forecasting at Georgia State University in Atlanta.

"The inflationary fears that picked up in the winter months clearly did not have a good foundation," Ratajczak said.

The report should help dampen worries for the Federal Reserve, which has been under pressure to ease its inflation-fighting campaign and lower interest rates, analysts said. Still, most analysts expected no immediate shift in the central bank's policy.

"The question is how long does the Fed feel it can keep the economy subdued? They may say, 'Let's keep our nose to the grindstone on inflation and really see a payoff,'" said Robert Dederick, chief economist at the Northern Trust Co. of Chicago.

On Wall Street, investors took the inflation report as a disappointing sign that the Fed would not move anytime soon to relax interest rates.

heavily influenced by the cost of services.

For the first five months of the year, overall inflation at the wholesale level was running at a 4.0 percent annual rate, down from 4.8 percent for all of 1989, the government said.

Over the past 12 months, wholesale prices have risen a modest 3.1 percent.

"This report shows that we are neither veering into recession or are we in a situation where inflation is accelerating rapidly," said Ron Schreiber of the National Association of Wholesaler-Distributors.

In May, energy prices dropped 1.1 percent after having fallen by even larger amounts the previous three months.

Gasoline prices were down 2.1 percent and fuel oil fell 6.2 percent. Natural gas increased 0.9 percent.

Food costs overall were up 0.6 percent after having declined by that amount the previous two months.

The price of fruit dropped 8.4 percent, vegetables fell 3.9 percent and eggs were down 21.8 percent.

But that wasn't enough to offset increases in the price of other foods, such as the 7.7 percent hike in the cost of pasta, a 4.9 percent increase in pork and an 8.8 percent rise in the cost of fish.

Excluding the volatile food and energy sectors, prices rose a mild 0.2 percent, the identical increase of a month before.

Economists often consider this "core" number a better indicator of underlying inflationary pressures on the economy.

Court upholds burglar being forced to buy victims an alarm

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — A convicted burglar can be ordered to pay for a new burglar alarm for his victims as part of restitution, the Wisconsin Supreme Court ruled Wednesday.

The purchase and installation of a burglar alarm. Heyn had been ordered to pay \$4,082 in restitution for the items he stole. He argued that he could not be ordered to pay for the alarm because it was not covered by state restitution laws.

But the high court majority said such a payment "aids the offender's reformation by educating him or her that a burglary is not simply a taking or destruction of personal property, but also destroys the sense of security that each person has a right to expect in his or her home."

Postal Service eyes changes

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Postal Service is considering a policy of refusing to automatically forward the mail of nursing home residents who move, a spokesman said Thursday.

It is part of a broad review in which postal officials also will examine the handling of mail for the homeless, Postal Service spokesman Lou Eberhardt said in an interview.

The forwarding policy has come under fire from elderly-rights advocates who say it treats nursing home residents like inmates by placing the burden on the home to forward mail — as the Postal Service requires for prisons.

The review "is not a cursory glance," Eberhardt said. "They are

going to assemble various sections of the Postal Service — delivery, marketing, mail processing — and sit down beginning next week."

The purpose, Eberhardt said, "is to determine whether changes should be made not only from a standpoint of the nursing homes, but mail for homeless, mail being handled by agents. It's hard to say exactly where it's going, but it may require some procedural changes where nursing homes are concerned."

Since all residents of a nursing home are at the same address, the Postal Service says the home should be the "agent" for their mail. The mail is delivered in bulk, like at a prison, and then distributed.

While other people may submit

changes-of-address cards to local post offices, nursing home residents must rely on the institution to write their new address on individual letters. Once the mail is readdressed, the post office delivers it at no extra charge.

Allowing automatic forwarding is not "practical operationally," the Postal Service says.

Since mail for individual residents is not sorted at the post office, the agency says it could not easily distinguish mail that needs to be forwarded from the rest. "It's absurd," said John Heine, R-Pa., said-Thursday. "The Postal Service says, 'We can only deliver in bulk.' But people are paying for first-class postage on that mail."

Peace Corps enters Eastern Europe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Forty years after it divided the European continent, the Iron Curtain has parted for the Peace Corps, the idealistic creation of President Kennedy.

One of the first 122 U.S. volunteers leaving this weekend for Eastern Europe, 66-year-old Felix Lapinski, has a highly personal motive for traveling to Poland: to teach English.

"I learned Polish at my mother's knee," he said in an interview Thursday. "I had always heard the stories of the old country. Now I have a chance to teach Poles English, which is really the access

language of the modern world." Lapinski, who has been teaching English to foreign students at night for nine years, was one of those selected from thousands of volunteers.

At the invitation of the new Polish and Hungarian governments, the Peace Corps aims at creating a network of trained teachers to spread the use of English, which Peace Corps Director Paul D. Coverdell said has become the essential "language of commerce, science, mathematics and computer technology," as Eastern Europe turns its face to the West.

"It's almost as if the Peace Corps

had been in training for 30 years for this moment," said Coverdell.

The volunteers will first spend several months of language training in Polish and Hungarian university towns. They are expected to begin teaching this fall.

Coverdell expects a decade-long effort, with the Peace Corps expanding its reach to such countries as Czechoslovakia and broadening its scope to include instruction in environmental protection and business development.

But as the effort begins, the focus is on helping Poland and Hungary to set up a system for the wide-scale teaching of English.

Miners, answering government call, impose order in Bucharest

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — Tens of thousands of miners accosted people at random and ransacked opposition-party offices Thursday after being summoned by the president-elect to help put down anti-government protests.

Few police and soldiers were visible in the capital by late Thursday, and the miners, armed with cudgels and their faces and work clothes still smudged with coal dust, were apparently left to maintain order as they chose.

The miners arrived after two days of violence in which security forces clashed with demonstrators who claim the governing National Salvation Front is dominated by Communists associated with the ousted Ceausescu regime.

The government said at least five people were killed and 350 injured when police cleared a 2-month-old demonstration from a central square Wednesday, then fired on protesters who attacked government buildings later in the day.

It was the worst violence in

Romania since a pro-democratic revolution in December ousted Ceausescu, paving the way for free elections last month that were won by interim President Ion Iliescu and his National Salvation Front.

In Washington, President Bush's office condemned "in the strongest possible terms" what it called "government-inspired vigilante violence." White House press secretary Martin Fitzwater said the violence "departs from the commonly accepted norms of democracy and the rule of law."

Late Wednesday, Iliescu called in a televised speech for all "democratic forces" to come to the aid of his embattled government.

Early Thursday, soldiers fired at demonstrators, who threw firebombs at police headquarters and sporadic gunfire echoed across Bucharest. Then the miners arrived, streaming into the capital from as far as 240 miles away.

Dozens of people were assaulted, some clubbed, others batted repeatedly by the helmeted miners, who were estimated to number about 100,000.

As a Western radio reporter was pulled away from a group of grim-faced miners in central University Square, a heavy-set woman begged the miners on, urging them to kill the reporter's colleagues.

Less than a mile away, about 10 miners besieged the residence of Iliescu critic Dinitru Mazilu for several hours before dispersing, said Mazilu and a neighbor. The former vice president of the post-revolutionary government stepped down following charges that he collaborated with the Securitate, the secret police force that killed hundreds during the revolution.

The miners were apparently directed by several men who Mazilu said were "Securitate-or-former Securitate" agents. Mazilu told reporters who arrived at his apartment that the agents urged the miners to kill him.

Police kill brains behind recent Colombian terror

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Police delivered another blow to the powerful Medellin cocaine cartel by killing the man who masterminded a 10-month-old terror campaign that has killed hundreds of people, police said Thursday.

Hours after police killed the drug chieftain during a shootout Wednesday night in an exclusive Medellin suburb, a car bomb exploded near a police station in the same area Thursday.

The blast killed four people, including two suspected terrorists inside the car, and injured 43, a police spokeswoman said on condition of anonymity.

The bomb may have been in retaliation for the police killing of Juan Jairo Arias, who officials said

led the Medellin cocaine cartel's vast network of hired killers. Members of Colombia's Elite Police Corps, a group specially trained to fight drug traffickers, were tipped off on Arias' whereabouts and tried to arrest him at a Medellin apartment, the spokeswoman said.

Arias resisted arrest and police shot and killed him, said the spokeswoman, who commented on condition of anonymity.

A woman and a 6-month-old baby were also in the apartment but no one else was harmed in the shooting, the spokeswoman said.

A national police director, Gen. Octavio Vargas, told RCN that Arias' killing represented the government's second most important victory in its war on drugs.

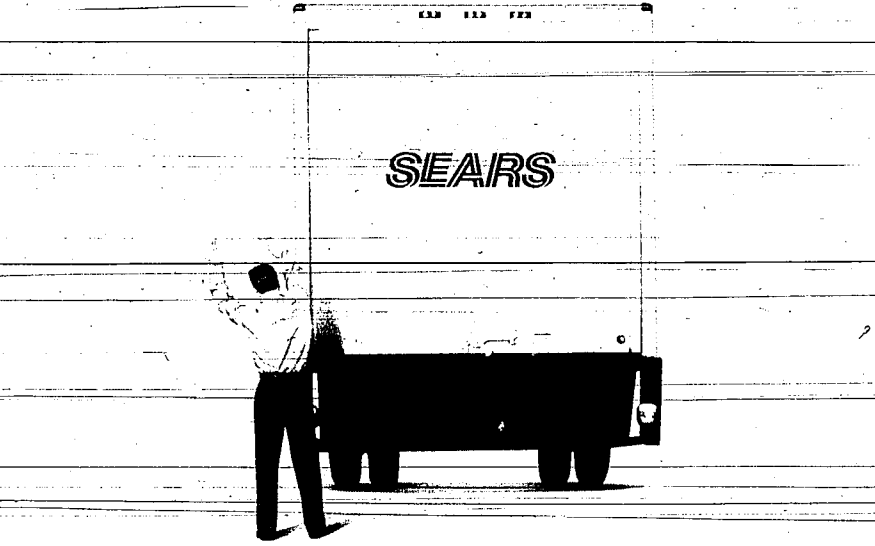

Islamic fundamentalist election win shakes N. Africa



ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) — The impact of the Islamic fundamentalist election victory in Algeria spread across North Africa on Thursday, worrying moderates and cheering fellow religious hard-liners whose movements are suppressed.

The Algerian government, seemingly stunned by the results of the country's first free elections, withheld official comment and postponed until next week the announcement of full results from Tuesday's balloting.

In France, once Algeria's colonial ruler and now-home to hundreds of thousands of Algerians, apprehensive politicians warned of a new wave of immigrants fleeing the growing power of the fundamentalists.

With the count complete in one-third of all electoral districts — including most major cities — the victory of the Sheikh Abassi Madani's Islamic Salvation Front seemed decisive. According to unofficial returns, the front won about 55

percent of the vote for municipal councils; compared to 35 percent for the ruling National Liberation Front, and triumphed in 45 of 48 regional contests.

Turnout was about 60 percent in the areas where the vote counting was complete.

Several parties against the ruling party and the fundamentalists had urged a boycott.

Moderate governments from Egypt to Morocco appeared reluctant to comment. But the

Moroccan newspaper Al Bayane, usually close to government thinking, said democratic reform in Algeria had benefited "a movement known for its authoritative and intolerant leanings."

"The entire union of the Arab Maghreb is shaken by the way in which its central pivot, Algeria, has been rendered fragile," the paper said.

The Maghreb consists of Algeria, Tunisia, Morocco, Libya and Mauritania.

Islamic fundamentalism is prohibited in Libya and suppressed in Egypt, although the Moslem Brotherhood holds seats in Egypt's parliament.

In Tunisia, the leader of the unauthorized Islamic Fundamentalist Party, Rachid Ghannouchi, said the election was "was a divine day, by the grace of God, which will have consequences for the entire Maghreb."

Fundamentalist opposition leaders in Morocco welcomed the results.

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Skeletons that Vietnamese refugees said were those of 30 Americans killed in the Vietnam War were handed over to the U.S. Embassy Thursday, officials said.

The bones were to be flown to Hawaii for tests, but embassy officials said they did not know when that would happen.

The bones, stuffed into seven barrels, were handed over to Malaysian police by nine Vietnamese boat people who landed Monday on the beach at Tanjung Sedili, 150 miles southeast of Kuala Lumpur.

Red Cross officials said they sent the bones by truck to the U.S. Embassy.

The embassy's charge d'affaires, Paul Blakburn, said earlier he doubted the bones could be those of missing American servicemen, but that only forensic tests in Hawaii could determine whether they were.

Other embassy officials said boat people previously claimed to have bones of Americans, but the claims had been proved false.

The Vietnamese brought along with the latest bones identification tags bearing names and other details. They said they were found on the skeletons.

Police said the refugees hoped to get preferential treatment for settlement in the United States for bringing the bones.

U.S. Embassy press officer, Mary Ellen T. Gilroy, said no preference would be given even if the bones turned out to be those of Americans.

Malaysian officials said the boat people would face the normal screening process, under which those deemed to be fleeing political persecution are approved for resettlement in Western countries, and those considered economic migrants face repatriation.

The nine Vietnamese have been placed in a temporary refugee camp in Mersing, near Tanjung Sedili. They were to be moved in the next few days to the Pulau Bidong refugee camp, 180 miles northeast of Kuala Lumpur, for screening.

Malaysia accepts boat people only for temporary asylum. There are about 20,000 Vietnamese refugees in Malaysian camps. Police said the refugees were on their way to Singapore to hand in the skeletons to the U.S. Embassy there when their boat sprang a leak. They were forced to land at Tanjung Sedili, about 60 miles from Singapore.

Terrorist says E. Germany gave her help

EAST BERLIN (AP) — A reputed terrorist wanted in West Germany for 13 years told police that East Germany gave her a phony identity and let her build a new life.

Her statement to authorities was reported Thursday by East Germany's interior minister, who has pledged to cooperate with West Germany in tracking down terrorists shielded by the old Communist government.

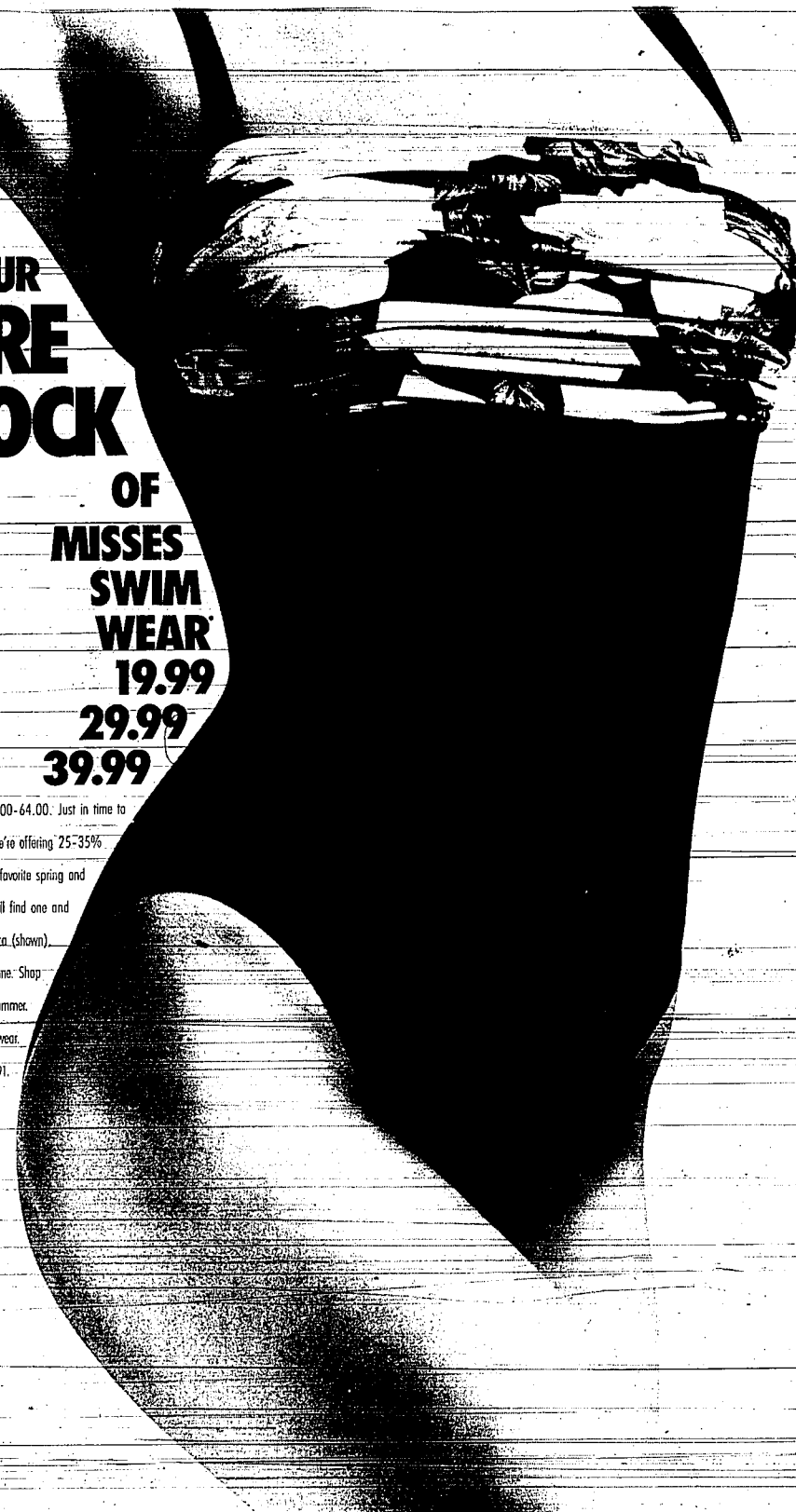
Susanne Albrecht, one of West Germany's most sought-after terrorist suspects, is wanted in the 1977 shooting death of a top West German banker. She was arrested June 6 outside her East Berlin apartment.

Officials on Wednesday arrested another reputed West German terrorist, Inge Viett, who had been living in the East German city of Magdeburg.

Ms. Viett, wanted in several terrorist attacks dating back to 1972, told East German authorities she was willing to cooperate and had renounced terrorism, said the East German interior minister, Peter-Michael Diestel. Both women are believed to be members of the left-wing Red Army Faction.

Violence bubbling under the surface in Romania, ready to erupt

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — The violence that marked Romania's overthrow of Nicolae Ceausescu always seems ready to explode — a product of the bloodiest Communist rule in Eastern Europe and centuries of ethnic and political strife.

The overwhelming victory of President-elect Ion Iliescu and his National Salvation Front in May, five months after Ceausescu's ouster, only heightened the traditional divisions in society.

Iliescu's triumph led to the opposition with little power to exert political pressure on him, and debate moved into the streets.

The press, with several exceptions, offers little constructive criticism, enflaming rather than calming passions.

"We destroyed the political power of Communism. But the social, economic and administrative structures are in their place, and that is the second phase of the revolution," Stelian Tanase, editor of the weekly "22," said in an interview.

Predicting chaos in the next six months as the economy deteriorates and workers start to strike, Tanase said the Salvation Front will gradually lose power.

For now, however, Iliescu can rely on the Communist structures he inherited virtually intact to enforce his will.

He summoned tens of thousands of supporters into the streets Thursday. The tactic only added to Wednesday's violent clashes between anti-government demonstrators and security forces.

Iliescu's backers clubbed opponents to the ground, ransacked opposition party offices and demanded a ban on the independent newspaper Romania Libera.

Their actions feed on fear of a changing future and ignorance of

democratic institutions bred by five decades of Communist or fascist rule.

By casting himself as the guardian of those workers and their interests, Iliescu has limited his ability to maneuver for change.

Iliescu is "prisoner of the apparatus of the engine on which he jumped," said Thomas Kleininger, vice chairman of a leading intellectual group, the Group for Social Democracy in a May interview.

"He could have the best intentions, but he can't do what he wants," Kleininger said of Iliescu.

"The almost unique chance to take now the road of genuine democracy and join in the flow of European values has been missed, at least for a while, with amazing carelessness," the daily Romania Libera wrote after Iliescu's May 20 election.

The failure to dismantle Communist structures in Romania leaves in place the terror bred by one of the most brutal instruments of repression in eastern Europe.

After World War II, Romania's Communist Party was merely a few hundred dedicated Marxist-Leninists mostly trained in Moscow, but those Communists used a mixture of

political intrigue and bloody repression to seize power.

Tens of thousands of peasants and intellectuals were either killed or died working on public projects.

Communist leader George Gheorgiu-Dej died in 1965, paving the way for the initially more liberal rule of Ceausescu. Cultivated by the West as a communist martyr, he built up a regime that was more and more harsh.

By last December, when he was ousted in a revolt backed by the army, his 23 million citizens lived in terror.

Chisholm decides against seeking Senate seat

BUHL — Bill Chisholm won't throw his name into the state Senate race after all. Chisholm, who has run for the Legislature in the past as a Democrat and as an independent, prompted the Idaho Democratic Party to sit up and take notice earlier this month when he announced that he was considering a run at Magic Valley's District 25 florial seat.

The political activist said he wanted to file as an independent candidate because

he feared Democratic Rep. Gary Robbins and former Republican Rep. Russell Newcomb wouldn't focus on the issues in what is sure to be a heated campaign. But on Thursday, Chisholm said he's decided not to run.

"It was a long, thoughtful process," he said. "I am not removing myself from the campaign, just that part of the race."

In the weeks since Chisholm named himself a potential candidate, he has received several telephone calls from Democrats, including Robbins.

He said he also received one call from a

Republican who urged him to run. Chisholm insisted that he wasn't intimidated about making the race. But after meeting with Robbins, he decided to bow out.

"Robbins still has to prove himself," he said of the Twin Falls Democrat, who switched parties before the last legislative session. "He doesn't know the issues yet, but at least he's willing to listen."

With the Republicans enjoying a 23-19 advantage in the state Senate, Idaho's Democratic Party has made no secret of its intent to pour its resources into Magic

Valley's District 25 Senate race. Democrats feared Chisholm, who has campaigned for the florial twice before, would split their party's vote and hand the win to Newcomb.

"That one man can do more to set back the Democrats' chances in the Magic Valley than 25 influential Republicans," said Douglas Jones, Democratic chairman of Legislative District 25.

Chisholm said no deals were struck between himself and the nervous Democrats. And he wasn't promised an appointment.

Locals question flag amendment's effectiveness

TWIN FALLS — To some, the freedom it stands for includes the right to burn it. Others say harm the flag and you harm the country.

Proponents of both views question whether a constitutional amendment can stop flag burning.

"Nothing what some yo-yo does to the flag desecrates what more patriotic men have done to honor it," said former Twin Falls County Prosecutor Harry DeHaan, a Twin Falls attorney.

DeHaan, a Vietnam combat veteran, opposes a proposed constitutional amendment to outlaw flag burning. Burning the flag is a symbolic act, and "the Constitution allows them to do that," he said.

"This is a free country to be as dumb as you want to be... I'd rather err on the side of freedom; freedom of expression," DeHaan said.

Poum Pin, a Cambodian refugee and U.S. citizen living in Twin Falls, said flag burning should be illegal. "The flag represents the people. When people burn the flag, they burn themselves," he said.

Pin, his wife and two children escaped the killing fields of Cambodia. Khammy Rathame, a Laotian refugee and U.S. citizen, agrees with Pin and says people who burn the flag should be put in jail. "You have to respect the flag to respect the country," he said.

Rathame escaped from Laos when the communists took over in 1975. He floated down the Mekong River to Thailand, eventually landing in a refugee camp and coming to America.

The district commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Merle Francis of Twin Falls, said he doesn't favor amending the constitution, but that might be the only course to stop the desecration of the flag.

He said an amendment would stop flag burning. "Certainly it would stop people from it. Then it's illegal," he said.

Bill Chisholm of Buhl, who is considering running for the Idaho State Senate seat from Buhl, called the idea of amending the constitution totally wrong.

"The only way to defend the flag is to keep (the country's) actions sacred with the principles for which the flag is supposed to stand," Chisholm said. "People burn the flag because it is not standing for moral reasons."

Twin Falls Mayor Tom Condie favors the proposed amendment but says it probably stop flag burning.

"People died for the flag. That speaks to the rights we are fortunate to have... But I can't see prisons full of people for burning the flag as a realistic solution to the problem."

Twin Falls County Commissioner Norma Bliss favors the amendment because the "flag stands for our government." But she doubts the amendment would stop people from burning the flag.

Jerome officials say decision on water meters not urgent

JEROME — In a surprise move Thursday, the City Council voted unanimously to cancel the bidding and purchase of approximately 2,100 new water meters for \$225,059.

"We're not in a do or die situation or in a world of hurt, so we'll just wait," Mayor Gerald Ostler said.

The council did not even open bids. It is unknown how many bids were submitted. In his motion to abort the new water meter project, Ostler said that "the issues concerning the water meters have not been resolved to the satisfaction of the council."

He said possible conflicts of interchangability and other problems with the computer system that aids city workers in billing customers also added complications to the project.

The City Council began discussing the purchase of new water after claims some of

the 900 Neptune water meters already in use are faulty.

The City Council previously rejected two bids for new water meters and rewrote the bid specifications.

In the first round of bidding, Consolidated Supply Co. of Boise offered the low bid of \$211,762 for Neptune meters. But the council rejected the bid after claims Neptune meters already in use do not measure water usage accurately during low flow times.

Water & Waste Water Equipment Co. of Boise, offered Rockwell meters for \$225,059.

Under the new bid specifications, the Rockwell meters were the only meters that could meet the requirements, city officials have previously said.

City Council members rushed to another meeting and did not say whether the 300 Neptune meters already paid for, but not yet in use, will be installed.

Rape charge filed again in Shoshone incident

SHOSHONE — A warrant has been issued for the arrest of the 24-year-old Howe man accused of rape but released from custody two weeks ago after a preliminary hearing in Lincoln County Magistrate Court.

Robert A. Amerson, charged with raping a 62-year-old Lincoln County woman more three years ago, has not been located, Lincoln County Sheriff's Deputy Steve Southwick said.

Amerson was charged with rape, robbery and two counts of forcible sexual entry with a foreign object in connection with a December 1986 incident.

During the preliminary hearing,

however, 5th District Magistrate Judge Barry Wood ruled that the case should be dismissed — even though Amerson's fingerprints were found in and outside the woman's car — because the prosecution failed to prove Amerson was out of the state during part of the three years since the alleged rape.

Though Wood said he felt the fingerprints found on the woman's car constituted enough evidence to try Amerson, the statute of limitations had run out.

Under Idaho law, a person cannot be legally tried in such a case after three years have passed. But if it can be proven that the suspect was not in the state during part of the three years, that

Businesses receive bills for bogus yellow pages

TWIN FALLS — Several out-of-state "yellow pages" telephone directories are mailing solicitations that look like invoices to Magic Valley businesses and churches, seeking payment for advertising services that the Better Business Bureau slays have little value.

"We're just being bombarded at this moment," said Executive Director Ken Thornberg of BBB's Boise office.

Some of the mailings are "blatantly illegal," he said.

Typically, the companies send invoices with prominent pictures of walking fingers and the words "yellow pages." But the bills usually do not come from a local directory publisher — U.S. West Direct bills for "yellow pages" advertising on monthly phone bills, a company spokesman said.

"I almost paid that thing, thinking it was my regular U.S. West yellow pages bill," said Bill Spain of Satewide Collections in Twin Falls. He received an invoice for \$137 from Yellow Pages of America Inc. in Niagara Falls, N.Y.

The invoice is called a "renewal" and Thornberg said Satewide Collections was

listed in the 1989 Yellow Pages of America directory.

"I must have fell for it last year," said Spain after hearing of the listing. "That burns me up. I have never intended to advertise with anyone but U.S. West Direct."

"Yellow pages" and the walking fingers symbol are traditionally associated with AT&T and its now defunct companies.

In a telephone interview Thursday, a customer service representative at Yellow Pages of America Inc. in Niagara Falls who identified himself only as "Dirk" said the company publishes a directory that is sent

to "advertisers, government purchasers, importers, exporters, libraries, chambers of commerce, and civic institutions" nationwide.

For \$137, an advertiser receives a two-line ad in the directory. New advertisers are recruited through a mailed "solicitation," he said. But Thornberg said the solicitations used by the company look like invoices and often do not comply with U.S. Postal Service regulations against invoice-style solicitations.

All such solicitations must display a proclamation, in 30-point type, that

Railroad crossing arms coming to Heyburn, restrooms leaving

HEYBURN — The city should be getting railroad crossing arms soon for at least three locations — on O, 21st and J streets.

But it will also lose a set of permanent set of restrooms at the local baseball park.

The City Council decided to take out the restroom facilities in the concession building after a report from Councilman Nile Bohon that the rooms had been vandalized.

The building will be used just for storage and the city will rent portable toilets for park patrons to use.

Bob Despain, city electric superintendent, said the city also may have to discontinue providing electricity at the city parks in the future because people continue to break into the meter boxes. He said they have also been unable to get the lights at the park because bulbs have been smashed.

The city will pay only \$3,000 each for the new railroad crossing arms.

The council voted Wednesday to pay for the engineering costs for each arm.

But the \$160,000 purchase cost will be covered with federal money and a state floating fund. The federal money will pay 90 percent of the cost; the state money will cover the other 10 percent, Mayor Harold Hurst said.

The railroad will maintain the crossings, but the city will be required to supply the power to run them.

The council also accepted a bid from Forsgren Engineers of Rexburg to revamp the city's waste water treatment plant.

City Superintendent Al Hodge said that six proposals had been submitted, and that he and a committee had reviewed all the proposals.

The city has applied for a grant to cover the first phase of the work on the treatment plant, but money will not be available until the Environmental Protection Agency approves the plans.

Hodge said he is working with

EPA inspectors to make sure the plant will be up to EPA specifications.

In another matter, resident Loren Adams questioned the council about plans to install curb and gutter and sidewalks on 17th Street.

Adams said he owns an older home on 17th and if a sidewalk is put in, it would come within two feet of his front door. Hurst told him that the city is working on a five-year plan to install the curb and gutter and sidewalks, and he told Adams that his side of 17th is not on the city's schedule.

Hurst said there are several older homes in the city that are situated so that placement of sidewalks may be a problem in the future.

"Common sense will dictate," Hurst said. "When we get to that point we will have to deal with that."

Resident Norma Morrison reported on plans for a light boat parade to be held on the Snake River by Heyburn on Labor Day. She said the Minidoka Sheriff's Department is willing to lead the parade and get permits for the boats.

Valley to join funding counter suit

HAZELTON — The Valley School Board will join a group of school districts fighting against a new group of districts that wants to change the state's school funding formula.

The Valley School Board voted Monday evening to join the Idaho Schools Equal Education Opportunity group, or ISEEO, which has hired former Idaho Supreme Court Justice Robert

Huntley as its legal counsel.

Last year, the Legislature lacked only a few votes to pass a bill that would have changed the school funding formula.

But a group of school districts are still contemplating filing a lawsuit against the state over the funding formula. They claim the current formula is unfair.

Neither group, however, has filed a formal lawsuit.

Valley will have to pay \$1,000 to become a part of the ISEEO lawsuit,

but any unused money will be returned to the district and other member districts.

In other business, the School Board accepted the 1990-1991 budget. It's estimated that revenues from state, local and federal sources will total a little more than \$1.7 million. Investment earnings will add another \$60,000 to the total.

Also, the School Board expressed interest in meeting with Marzough and possibly Hansen, school officials to discuss sharing certain programs with each other.

On the inaugural day of a program called "Trooper on a Train," state police Thursday issued motorists 13 citations in Twin Falls County for failing to stop at railroad crossings, one citation for inattentive driving and numerous citations and warnings for seat belt violations, according to Chris Arvas, a Union Pacific Railroad engineer.

As part of the program, already implemented in Boise, Idaho Falls and Pocatello, state troopers ride trains at various times watching for cars crossing dangerously close to approaching trains, Arvas said. When they see a violation; they'll radio a trooper in a nearby patrol car to stop the driver.

The program began Wednesday in the Burley-Rupert area.

Officials hope Trooper on a Train will reduce statewide car-train accidents that in 1989 totaled 59, resulting in 19 injuries and nine deaths.

Companies reach agreement with striking truckers, others haven't
VANCOUVER, British Columbia (AP) — About 45 trucking companies have reached agreement with independent drivers to end a two-week strike over hauling fees, but some of the biggest companies still have not signed off on the deal.

Most of the nearly 200 trucking companies were meeting separately with the Western Owner-Operators Association, which represents the approximately 3,000 independent truckers in British Columbia.

And drivers will not be asked to return to work until all the companies that employ them have agreed to rates that establish minimum pay at \$36.50 an hour, spokesman Gord Rix of the Langley-based association said Wednesday.

The association and members of the Teamsters union have been negotiating with individual companies since Tuesday, after attempts to reach a collective agreement failed last week.

The agreement reached Wednesday covers about 800 drivers and was worked-out with mediator Brian Williams, appointed by the provincial government.

But the holdout companies include major employers like Arrow Transportation—Systems and Winnipeg, Manitoba-based Federal Industries Ltd., which owns four carriers that haul most of the freight across western Canada.

Under Wednesday's pact, independent truckers will get \$36.50 (Canadian) an hour, with increases to \$38.50 in January and \$40 in April.

The independents, who own and maintain their own trucks, walked off their jobs May 28, saying they could not get by under the old rates, which ranged from \$26 to \$35 an hour Canadian, about \$22 to \$29 in U.S. dollars.

In the early stages of the British Columbia truckers' walkout, striking truckers blocked border crossings and caused some shortages of produce and gasoline.

Truckers have cooperated with a court order barring further blockades while talks are under way.

State moves to restore water rights

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Department of Water Resources has proposed legislation to restore states' water rights after the U.S. Supreme Court sided with a federal agency on the issue.

On May 21, the high court ruled against the state of California in its effort to protect the fisheries on Rock Creek. The decision gave the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission control over the water passing through the dam licenses. Nearly every state backed California in its case against FERC.

"We were all disappointed by the recent Supreme Court decision in the Rock Creek case," said Water Resources Director R. Keith Higginson in a letter to Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho.

"It brought to our attention again the importance of water resources in this state and the necessity that decisions on its allocation and use be made under provisions of state law and not by the federal bureaucracy," the agency said.

"When you recognize that Idaho's amicus brief in Rock Creek was endorsed by the attorneys

general of all 48 other states, I think you can see that a goal of widespread support is achievable," Higginson said.

The draft legislation sent to Idaho's congressional delegation states that all hydroelectric licenses under the Federal Power Act must comply with state water laws.

"We are hopeful Congress will pick up our draft and run with it," Higginson told the Water Resources Board on Thursday in Boise. He said original congressional intent was to create a "dual system" where FERC is responsible for permitting projects on navigable streams and the states make the decision on water use from those facilities.

"My interpretation was the court viewed it as a political decision that should be and would be resolved by Congress," said Clive Strong, deputy attorney general and chief of the office's natural resources division.

Following the court ruling, Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, introduced his own measure to restore state control over both water.

Strong said both Craig and Democratic

Congressman Richard Stallings thanked Water Resources for the new draft and indicated they would meet with state officials in the matter.

In an unrelated water development, Craig said he is battling an amendment to the 1902 Water Reclamation Act, passed by the House on Thursday that could require many cooperative farmers in Idaho to break up or face potentially crippling increases in the price of water.

The amendment, from Rep. George Miller, D-Calif., requires farmers who cooperate through partnerships or farm management arrangements to total their acres for the purpose of figuring water prices.

Craig said the proposal has the potential to affect at least 460,000 acres in Idaho and potentially hundreds of Idaho farmers.

"Water costs to Idaho farmers could jump substantially, making irrigation unaffordable for many," said Craig.

"This is an important signal to Idaho that our water is continually under threat, that we have to keep fighting against this sort of assault."

Protecting rivers draws interest

BOISE (AP) — A multitude of questions from the public about a protected status for parts of the Payette River has prompted the Idaho Water Resource Board to extend the comment period on the river plan.

"I think we have a problem on the Payette River," board Chairman Gene Gray of Payette told the other members on Thursday. "We need to expand the scope of the Payette River advisory group."

The comment period on the present river-draft plan was scheduled to end June 25, with a board decision in early July. The board, instead, voted to extend that date to July 16, and backed a regrouping of the Payette advisory group to add logging, mining and livestock interests, as well as representatives from towns along the river.

"Our plan doesn't explain well enough what the law is," board member William Williams said. "Because it wasn't included in the plan, a lot of red flags went up, particularly with logging, irrigators and stock watering."

Gray said downriver towns such as Payette and Fruitland should be included. Payette, for example, has water rights in Cascade Reservoir, it may use someday, he said.

"I recommend we use the present draft plan as a coat rack, adding and taking away from it to do whatever is needed," Gray said.

A 25-mile section of the Middle Snake River near Bliss also could receive more protection than earlier anticipated.

The draft for that river suggests a such a status from below Milner Dam to Shoshone Falls, and below the falls to the backwaters of Salmon Falls Reservoir. Below that is a 25-mile

stretch with various suggested designations including development.

Frank Sherman of the Water Resources Department said public comments regarding the lower section lean heavily to saving it from hydroelectric projects.

"There is some water there the normal citizen doesn't even know about," said Water Board member Don Kramer of Castleford. "It's extraordinary, recreation-wise."

"As I change the dressings on my back from the Payette River, you better ask the folks what they think" about the Snake River, Gray suggested.

The distribution of the second part of the draft plan for the Payette would start Aug. 29, with the comment period also beginning. Public hearings would occur in early October and the board could adopt the final plan on Nov. 16.

Some 107 people testified at river hearings the weeks ago in Boise and Payette, said Keith Higginson, Idaho Water Resources director and hearing officer.

They were concerned about a gamut of things, including the effect of a protected status on livestock watering, riparian areas and stream alteration for logging above the protected corridors, Higginson said.

The two-year interim protection of the Payette granted by the Legislature ends June 30. Williams asked Higginson if that would open up the river to development as the Water Board continues its deliberations. But Higginson said other state laws remain in effect, such as the need for developers to apply for an Idaho stream alteration permit.

Suggested for recreational protection include the North Fork from Cabarton Bridge to its confluence with the South Fork.

State says feds stalling on pact

BOISE (AP) — A landmark water rights agreement with the Shoshone-Bannock Indian Tribes has won approval with the Idaho Water Resource Board, but the panel says the federal government is stalling in its role.

The 1990 Fort Hall Indian Water Rights Agreement tentatively approved by the Sho-Bans last month sets the level of the tribes' reserved water rights for the Fort Hall Indian Reservation as part of the Snake River Basin Adjudication process.

The Water Board on Thursday approved its part in the pact. But board Chairman Gene Gray of Payette said the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation was "waxing" the state by calling for continued fining-up language in the agreement to raise the "comfort level" of the bureau.

"The concerns of the (Bureau of Reclamation) should have been raised in the negotiations; not the approval process," said Clive Strong, chief of the natural resources division for the Idaho attorney general's office.

"Even so, the state has attempted to accommodate the United States' request for changes. However, such accommodations would further result in requests for changes," Strong said in a letter sent from the Water Board to Reclamation.

"The state can no longer tolerate such action. Either we have an agreement or we do not," Strong said. "If the comfort level is so important that you desire to kill the agreement, so be it."

The state still expects a final signing ceremony on June 20.

Panhandle hydro project may be wave of future

BONNERS FERRY (AP) — What has been called the largest privately owned hydro project in the country is being viewed as the wave of the future for the Bonneville Power Administration.

Smith Falls Hydropower, a 38-megawatt cogeneration project on a tributary to the Kootenai River in the Idaho Panhandle just south of the Canadian border, is the first non-utility owned power being handled by BPA through its own transmission lines.

The so-called "run of the river" or damless generating facility has been producing power for Eugene Water and Electric since April, and BPA's Paul Etchin, the Upper Columbia Area engineer, sees it as "the forerunner of things to come for BPA as more small, non-polluting resources are integrated into the BPA system."

The \$45 million project, a subsidiary of Dominion Hydroelectric Associates of Salt Lake City, has three generators that take advantage of a 1,600-foot drop

in elevation on Smith Creek and a natural fall, which blocks fish passage.

It has a 40-year contract to supply power to the city of Eugene with BPA transmitting the power from its Bonners Ferry substation.

The station is 28 miles south of the facility.

Officials said BPA worked closely with Smith Falls to assure good service to its customer, the city, and to its unique transmission customer even though the charges it will collect for that service will total only about \$130,000 a year.

BPA handled the integration of the Smith Falls transmission line to its power station along with circuit breakers needed to protect that remote part of its system in time for the developers to begin test operations before the end of last year.

That qualified the project for a federal tax write-off and assured it would be able to take advantage of high stream flows during this spring's runoff.

Power council fears reliance on hatchery fish may be excessive

SPOKANE (AP) — Pressure to restock dwindling mid-Columbia River Basin salmon and steelhead trout populations may force planners to rely too much on hatchery fish, the Northwest Power Planning Council said Thursday.

The council's fish and wildlife division is developing plans to increase the salmon and steelhead trout runs in the system, mainly by using fish from a half-dozen fisheries in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Sockeye salmon once spawned in 22 lake systems in the Columbia River Basin. Now, they only reproduce in three.

The primary cause of their decline is the construction of hydroelectric dams along their spawning routes, fisheries specialists say, requiring them to pass through as many as nine dams to reach spawning grounds.

"The tendency is to head toward hatchery fish to supplement" natural populations, said Rick Applegate,

director of the fish and wildlife division.

But the effectiveness of such programs has yet to be fully proven, Applegate said.

"It's becoming clear that we have to be careful about supplementing; it's a risky business. It's very hard to find examples of success in the past," he said.

Yet it may turn out to be the method that works, he said. Using hatchery fish appears to be the only way to significantly increase populations in rivers where the fish have to pass a number of dams, he said.

It's a way to proceed in the face of uncertainty, Applegate said, adding that he expected fishermen will be approaching the division to increase runs.

"We seem to have put all our eggs in the hatchery basket," warned Chairman Tom Trulove, a Washington representative on the council.

Trulove said he favors a more

experimental approach, with varied release times on a smaller scale to determine what works.

The plans are being developed as part of an overall effort by the council to increase salmon and steelhead trout runs in the basin.

Sockeye salmon now rear in only three systems: Lake Wenatchee, Osoyoos Lake and Redfish Lake, said John Marsh, the council's system planning coordinator.

The run this year will probably near 70,000. Because of this low run, there probably won't be a harvest this year, he said.

A 75,000 count is the minimum needed to allow a season.

Spring chinook populations are down from 200,000 in the early 1900s to about 13,000 now, Marsh said.

Landfill site in Kootenai County threat to groundwater — geologist

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Kootenai County officials did inadequate research before selecting a 440-acre site near Fighting Creek for a new landfill, an Eastern Washington University geologist says.

"There have to be better sites in the county than that one," associate professor John Buchanan said Wednesday.

The proposed landfill would pose a threat to surface and underground water, Buchanan said, and the report used in making the selection is "inaccurate and oversimplified."

The Fighting Creek Landfill Opposition Committee hired Buchanan for \$600 to review data compiled for the county by several engineering firms over the last five years.

He also visited the site in April. Last fall, county commissioners chose the site, a county-owned farm just south of Coeur d'Alene, for the landfill.

And Kootenai County Commissioner Bob Haakenson dismissed Buchanan's findings.

"It's kind of like an attorney," Haakenson said Wednesday. "You hire one that's going to support you."

He said he's satisfied that the site is acceptable. "If it wasn't the right site, we wouldn't have been opening bids the other day," Haakenson said.

Six bids to build the first of six

dump sites were opened last week and ranged from \$1.6 million to \$3.4 million.

The state has yet to issue a permit to build the new landfill. The 400-member opposition committee sent Buchanan's report to the Idaho Division of Environmental Quality, which is studying the county's permit application.

Buchanan said past studies have wrongly identified complex subsurface rock formations that are very porous. Contaminants would flow easily through the rock into one of four local aquifers, he said.

Murderer says stop appeals

BOISE (AP) — Death Row inmate Federico Paz, who on Wednesday lost his appeal from a 1987 murder conviction and death sentence, says he wants to drop all his appeals.

Paz sent a letter to court officials saying he wanted no more appeals, which presumably would clear the way for the state to carry out the execution ordered nearly two years ago by 3rd District Judge Dennis Goff.

"The state has responded with a request for a hearing to determine if Paz is mentally competent, based on a sworn statement from Arvon Arave, warden of the maximum security prison, that Paz sometimes displays bizarre behavior."

Van Bishop, who has acted as Paz' attorney, supports the request for a competency hearing, but says Paz should not be allowed to waive his right to appeals.

"The request has been on file with the Supreme Court since March 25, but the court has not acted on it."

"He has a right to determine the outcome of his own case, with respect to the question of further proceedings," said Idaho Solicitor General Lynn Thomas.

"We assume, at some point, the court is going to have to act on his request. We are not aware of a solid basis for denying his demand," Thomas said.

The Supreme Court on Wednesday rejected Paz' appeal and sustained his conviction and death sentence on a 3-2 vote. Under normal procedures, Bishop has 21 days to ask for a rehearing. If that is not done, the Supreme Court will send formal notice of its decision to Goff, who then will set a new execution date.

If Bishop asks for a rehearing, he will have 14 days to submit written arguments to justify the request. He could not be reached for comment Thursday.

But Thomas said if Paz wants to drop all his appeals, that could clear the way for immediate re-sentencing.

The Supreme Court's decision covers only state appeals.

Paz still is free to pursue federal court appeals, which in other death penalty cases have been going on for years with no prospect of resolution.

Paz, 31, was convicted of a Canyon County slaying that occurred nearly three years ago. Court records said Paz was in an argument with other men at the Holiday Cafe on Aug. 29, 1987, went to a friend's home to get a gun, and returned to the cafe.

Paz was convicted of killing Gerry Bright, 39, Caldwell, and shooting two other men, Randall Gould and Larry Page.

Pocatello officials offer building for juvenile jail

POCATELLO (AP) — The local library board has offered to sell its building to southeastern Idaho counties for conversion to a regional juvenile detention facility. The Pocatello Library District trustees told commissioners from the counties on Thursday that they had not settled on a price yet but it would probably cost \$1.1 million to remodel the building for detention purposes. An appraisal of the building was placed on the market for a regional facility aimed at bringing them into compliance with laws covering treatment of juvenile offenders.

Library Board Chairman Larry Farrell emphasized to the commissioners that the building was centrally located to the county courthouse and jail, hospitals and the city police department. It has been certified as meeting all fire codes, and Farrell maintained remodeling it for detention purposes could be accomplished much faster than trying to convert the Bannock County Jail, which is scheduled to be replaced.

That prospect appealed to Power County Commissioners Ralph Wheeler since the counties must spend the state money in the next two years or they will lose it.

But Bannock County Commissioner Carolyn Meine expressed reservations about a scheme that would have taxpayers buy a building they have already paid for once.

In addition, Commissioner Tom Katsilometes said he wanted assurances that the building could be brought into compliance with state and federal jail requirements.

Grangeville school levy fails again

GRANGEVILLE (AP) — Grangeville School District voters have rejected an operating levy for the second time in less than a month, setting the stage for severe employee and program cuts in Idaho County schools.

Only 44 percent of patrons going to the polls Wednesday supported the \$380,000 proposal. The vote was 1,095 to 1,776.

The measure was pared down from a \$544,000 proposal defeated in May. Trustees said a second defeat of the levy would mean deep district-wide cuts, including elimination of most sports.

Officials will let Selway fires burn

LEWISTON (AP) — Some lightning fires will be allowed to burn in northern Idaho's Selway Bitterroot-Wilderness this summer, the U.S. Forest Service has decided.

New procedures for fighting backcountry fires in the Panhandle have been developed since 1988, when lightning-caused blazes devastated Yellowstone National Park and other areas of the West.

The plan announced Wednesday for the Selway Bitterroot Wilderness will continue to allow fires to play a natural role in the forest, but changes some Forest Service procedures, said Byron Boney of the Clearwater National Forest in Orofino.

"All of the changes we've done are of an administrative nature," Boney said.

Idaho shopping center sales slow

BOISE (AP) — The rate of increase in shopping center retail sales slowed slightly in Idaho last year, but still outstripped the national rate, a trade group says.

The International Council of Shopping Centers said Wednesday that retail sales at Idaho's 115 shopping centers totaled \$2.3 billion in 1989, up \$200 million from the total at 108 shopping centers in 1988.

The 9.5-percent increase compares with a 7.8-percent rise nationally.

Decision on gasoline discounts helps consumers, Jones says

BOISE (AP) — The U.S. Supreme Court's decision in the gasoline-pricing lawsuit from the Spokane area is a good one for consumers, says Idaho Attorney General Jim Jones.

"I think this is a good decision for consumers and small businessmen," Jones said Thursday, after the Supreme Court ruling was announced.

"We were supporting the independent Texaco dealers run out of business by the dealers favored by Texaco," said Jones.

The Supreme Court barred wholesalers from giving discounts to wholesalers and not to retailers when the discounts are unrelated to any savings for the supplier or to the

wholesaler's costs.

The court unanimously upheld a \$1.35 million antitrust award Texaco Inc. was ordered to pay for 12 service stations in the Spokane area.

Idaho supported the 12 service stations. Jones said Idaho and about 35 other states joined in a "friend of the court" brief submitted by Connecticut.

"If large companies can discriminate in prices between various customers, it obviously will

allow small people to be run out of business while the favored buyers can grow and increase their business like the two dealers did in Spokane," Jones said.

"Ultimately, we will run out of small companies and that means less competition and higher prices in the long run," he said.

The attorney general said legal officials were concerned the decision might go the other way, which would have been a major defeat to efforts to regulate improper gasoline pricing.

Jones long has worked on the fuel price issue. His office won a lawsuit against Pocatello-area dealers for price-fixing.

Court rules discounts discriminatory

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court on Thursday barred manufacturers from giving discounts to wholesalers and not to retailers when the discounts are unrelated to any savings for the supplier or to the wholesaler's costs.

The court unanimously upheld a \$1.35 million antitrust award Texaco Inc. was ordered to pay to 12 service stations in the Spokane, Wash., area.

Justice John Paul Stevens, writing for the court, said there was no evidence that Texaco's discounts "included a reasonable reimbursement for the value to Texaco of (the wholesalers') marketing functions."

Texaco's appeal had been supported by leading business groups, including the National Association of Manufacturers and the American Petroleum Institute.

They had said a defeat for Texaco could undermine "the most common distributional arrangement in American business: the dual channel system in which a manufacturer or supplier sells to wholesalers at discounted prices lower than those it charges direct purchasing retailers."

But the court said Thursday that Texaco's discounts amounted to illegal price discrimination barred by a federal antitrust law, the Robinson-Patman Act.

A federal jury ordered Texaco to pay \$449,906, a sum that was tripled by the judge to \$1.35 million in accord with the act.

The 12 service station dealers that sued Texaco from 1972 to 1981 were placed in an unfair competitive disadvantage because Texaco supplied gasoline to two Spokane-area wholesalers, John Dompier Oil Co. and Gull Oil Co., at discounts ranging from 2.5 cents to 3.75 cents per gallon less than Texaco charged the retailers.

Dompier sold the gasoline to other retailers under the Texaco trademark. Gull marketed it under private brand names.

NL expects many applications for 2 new franchises

CLEVELAND — The National League expects groups in at least a dozen cities to apply for the two franchises that will be added to the league in 1993. "We have no way of knowing for sure until we have responses from our questionnaires," expansion committee chairman Douglas Danforth said Thursday after baseball owners announced their expansion timetable. "There are far more six or seven cities. We're guesstimating there may be 12 or 14." The committee will begin ferreting out the leading contenders next month. Questionnaires will be sent to interested groups, and any serious applicants that emerge will be invited for presentations in New York by the end of September.

A short list of three to five finalists will be selected by the end of the year, and committee members will visit those cities in the first quarter of 1991. The committee will present recommendations to owners next June, and the winners will be chosen by Sept. 30, 1991. The new franchises can begin fielding minor-league teams as early as 1992, and they will participate in the June 1992 amateur draft. In November 1992, an expansion draft will be held, with each of the new franchises choosing 36 players off the rosters of existing NL teams. Each existing team will lose six players.

"We're going to play ball in 1993," Danforth said. "What we'll leave open is the structure of the minor league system prospective owners might have in place at that time." The entry fee to be paid by each franchise will be set by next month. They also will not share in revenues from the current TV contract, which runs through 1993. They will participate in the next one. Suggestions that St. Petersburg-Tampa, Denver, Buffalo or any other city has a lock on a franchise were premature, Danforth said. "Everybody is starting from the gate at the same time," he said. "No one has a leg up at this time." NL president Bill White said owners of expansion teams must have the money to be able to support a major league baseball franchise through a few years of possible losses. Geographic concerns are not as important as the stability of prospective owners, he said. It would be possible, for instance, for both new teams to be located in the eastern half of the country; the two NL divisions could be realigned to accommodate the newcomers.

NCAA asks its members for help in dividing the cash

WASHINGTON — The NCAA tried an experiment in democracy Thursday, asking members at three national sites to comment on a plan aimed at dividing television revenues more equitably than they are now. What the association got, at least at its East Coast meeting, was praise for the broad goal of distributing NCAA basketball tournament money based on more than simply which schools qualify and advance. Predictably, there was quibbling among schools and conferences over exactly how to spread the money. "Similar meetings were held in Chicago and San Francisco. There was enough disagreement here that South-eastern Conference commissioner Roy Kramer said after the meeting that the NCAA will have a hard time assembling all of the opinions."

At issue is how to divide up \$1 billion from a seven-year contract with CBS to broadcast college basketball and other championships. Past payments to schools have been based on how far they advanced in the NCAA tournament, a system that led to complaints that the traditional basketball powers got richer at the expense of others. This time, the NCAA has some new ideas. An advisory committee has proposed distributing the money based on several criteria, including number of sports sponsored by each school, number of teams and the number of participants in NCAA championships, and conferences' performances in the tournament over several years. Tee-ball: It's a game of sublime confusion

TWIN FALLS — Tee-ball: (te-'bol) A game created to cause mass confusion for parents, coaches and umpires—but only—fun—and excitement for children.

The phrases accompanying tee-ball might be considered more entertaining than the game to a bystander. In a recent game, Nicholas Olsen, a player on Glendale Seed & Feed, not only used his baseball skills but also his fingers and his second grade arithmetic to figure out that they needed eight runs and had gotten five.

"So that makes three more."

Applying these skills, his team went on to win by scoring nine runs. Another display of fun-filled chatter occurred in the first inning of a game between Wilbourn Garage Doors and Reeder's Flying Service. The coach excitedly announced, "That's 10 runs, go out onto the field and play hard."

"Team are not permitted to score more than 10 runs an inning. An energetic boy tugged on her coach's shirt and asked, "How many do we have?"

At this young age, the tee-ballers are not aware of the score throughout the game. A spectator after the game might see players rushing toward their coach yelling, "Did we win? Did we win?" Readers Digest tells of a little boy who hit the ball, ran and tackled the pitcher and then ran to first base. The boy's father doing the only thing he could, clapped.

Not only is it possible for the players to get confused as to what game they are playing, they can also get so caught up in the fun that they forget the game is a competition. The players are not supposed to help the other team.

A recently played game showed an example of this naïveté: Reeder's



Flying Service team was up to bat. A runner was on third base. The ball was hit and an outfielder mis threw the ball toward Reeder's bench. One of Reeder's players grabbed the ball and quickly carried it over to the catcher. The runner was safe and no harm was done. His parents had probably just taught him early to always "be nice to your neighbor."

Tee-ball also helps 7- and 8-year-olds develop their hand-eye coordination, although sometimes other body parts get used to stop the ball. The first baseman on Mer-N Eds team used his nose to stop a ball and get an out. "A happy coach yelled, "Great Job! Your nose will work for that too."

Tee-ball lasts only through first and second grades. The Twin Falls leagues are given the name Pee-wees in the first grade and Punks in the second grade. This year's Pee-wee League has 18 teams. The Punk League has 17 teams.

In the third grade, the girls have the opportunity to play slowpitch softball although they also have the option of playing with the boys through sixth grade.

The boys move up to pitching machines.

When playing baseball or softball, we should heed the words of Jerry Laake, a member of Me 'N Eds, "Whack this baby and remember, don't throw the bat."

The routine lead against today's game will yield a poor result. A more imaginative lead gets the brass ring.

Many would choose to lead the diamond queen. This will knock out South's king, and with luck West will be able to cash his remaining diamond winners when in with his king of hearts.

It doesn't work that way in today's layout. South wins his diamond king, and with two finesses in the hearts, he lands at least nine tricks. If the defenders split, South might even score an overtrick.

A more effective lead by West would be the diamond ace. Since he feels he has a sure entry in hearts, he can afford to start the diamonds with his ace. This gives him a look at dummy before his play to trick two, and the rest is easy. (Had dummy shown 10-7-3 of diamonds, West would have led the diamond queen, at trick two.)

When East and South both play low diamonds, West knows that South has only the singleton king left. West then clears the suit by leading a low diamond, and South is held to only eight tricks.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

"We easily enough confess in others an advantage of courage, strength, experience, activity and beauty; but an advantage in judgment we yield to none."

Looking at all four hands, we can easily see that the club finesse should be taken against West. Study the play and critique South's judgment. Were there enough clues to lead South to the winning finesse?

Dummy's spade queen was covered by East's king, and spades were continued, South winning the third round. West's diamond ace was knocked out, and West cashed his spade-jack before exiting with a heart. Dummy's queen was covered by East's king, and South had to win. He had already lost three spades and a diamond. With all resting on the play of the clubs, South went wrong. He tempted West with the club jack but went up with dummy's king when West casually played low. A low club back brought a discard from East, and the hand collapsed. South had to take his diamonds to hold his losses to down two.

What were the clues to the winning play? After winning his heart ace, South should have ousted the diamonds to get a picture of the distribution. When West discards on the third diamond, South should have enough information to go right in clubs. West has led a fourth-best spade, so it's safe to assume that he doesn't have five hearts. With only two cards in diamonds, he must have at least three cards in clubs. To clinch the game, South cashes his club ace (in case East has a singleton club) and then fineses against West to collect the rest of the tricks.

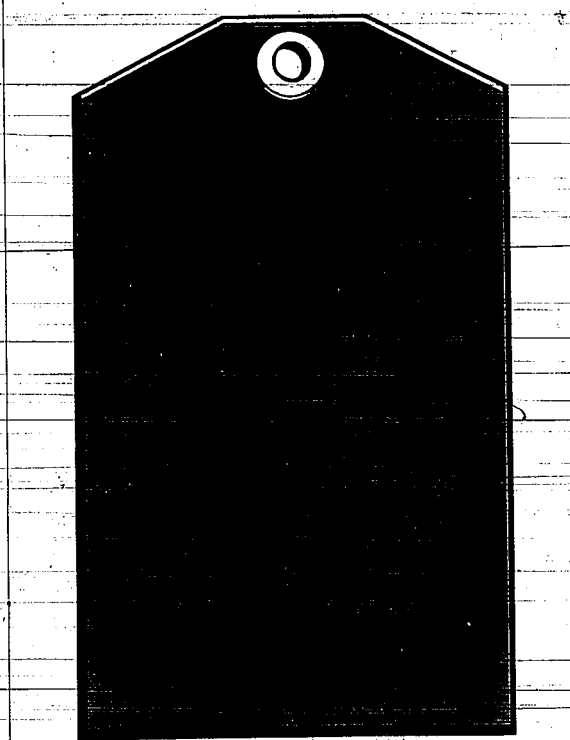

Kreskin risks paycheck to entertain crowds



The Amazing Kreskin accents his 'thought reading' act with music and comedy

JACKPOT - Looking for a good game of hide-and-seek? That's what will be in store this weekend at Cactus Pete's as The Amazing Kreskin pays his first visit to the Nevada casino.

Kreskin, a self-described mentalist who has toured widely and appeared on hundreds of television shows, is known for risking his earnings each night by asking a committee chosen by chance from the audience to hide his paycheck somewhere in the auditorium.

In thousands of performances spanning more than 30 years, he's failed to find the check only nine times. He says it's been years since the last time he was unable to locate his hidden pay. If a tenth time comes, he swears he'll retire.

"But I don't want to retire or suggest that kind of dilemma in the next two weeks. God forbid!" said Kreskin in a recent telephone interview.

He called from Harrah's in Atlantic City, where he planned to wrap up a sold-out five-week engagement before heading west.

Kreskin said the people who hide the check must be total strangers to him, and they're usually strangers to each other. He said he usually is able to find the check in 8 to 10 minutes.

"If it takes much longer, exhaustion sets in. I cannot maintain this kind of concentration for long periods of time," he said. "It is a most nerve-wracking experience."

Kreskin's audiences have gone to great lengths in their attempts to foil the mentalist. Once, he discovered his check hidden inside a stuffed turkey at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City. Another time, it was sewn into a spectator's jacket.

A few weeks ago, an audience took a screw out of a window gash and inserted the crumpled check into the hole where the screw had been. Kreskin found it, but it came out in pieces and the theater had to issue a new check.

Another time, he found his pay hidden in the leg of a metal walker used by a lady in the front row of the gymnasium where he was performing. In two other instances, he has found checks hidden inside the brace of broken legs.

"People will do things knowing that they're psychologically... I don't want to tamper or tamper or interfere with a situation like that. So I've had some very, very bizarre situations," he said.

In addition to his astounding feats of "thought-reading" and concentration, Kreskin spices up his act with a bit of music and comedy. And although he's primarily known as an entertainer, Kreskin's work and talents have transcended many boundaries.

He is known for his work, for example, debunking the field of hypnosis, a profession he used to practice. Kreskin has a degree in psychology from Seton Hall University in New Jersey; while

Dick Tracy remains king of cartoon lawmen

Dick Tracy — the grim-faced, square-jawed and badly drawn comic strip detective — brings his straight-shooting sense of justice and rogue's gallery of hideous villains to a zillion movie screens today.

Whether or not Warren Beatty's version of the hard-boiled sleuth with lemon-yellow fedora and two-way wrist radio takes the country by storm, the comic-strip Tracy will remain the most memorable lawman ever to shoot bloody holes through reprobates on the pages of the nation's funny papers.

Flash Gordon traveled through star-studded space, saving the galaxy from Ming the Merciless. Prince Valiant traipsed across King Arthur's England, battling the Saxons and the Huns. Their comic panels were beautiful, but their exploits were not of our time or place.

Sixty years ago the comics were mostly comic — filled with the joke-a-day slapstick of "Maggie and Jiggs" and "The Gumps."

Then, in 1931, while "Al Scarface" Capone was making front-page headlines, Dick Tracy started blasting away at racketeers on the comics page. The early Tracy was grim, graphic, unfunny — and unforgettable. He was also an instant success.

"I decided that if the police couldn't catch the gangsters, I'd create a fellow who would," cartoonist Chester Gould was quoted as saying in "The Celebrated Cases of Dick Tracy," published in 1980 by Chelsea House.

"He just hit a public nerve," says comics expert Bill

Comic strip crowded with goofy good guys and vile villains

Just a cursory case file of the bizarre gallery of wacky heroes and grotesque villains who came to cartoon life in Chester Gould's twisted mind.

BAD GUYS:

- Stogie Villor, one of the few rogues who made multiple appearances, the weasel even stole the affections of Tracy's sweetheart, Tess Truheart. Punched out by Tracy and jailed.
- 88 Keys, famed orchestra leader, turned remorseless killer. Shot to death hiding out in a railroad shack.
- B-B Eyes, squinty-faced World War II bootlegger. Trapped in a discarded tire, he was dumped in the ocean and drowned.

• Shakey, visibly anxious extortionist. Was hatched from Tracy in a coffin of ice and froze to death.

• Breathless Mahoney, sexy seductress and killer. Poisoned her own mother so she wouldn't have to share step-dad Shakey's ill-gotten gains. Killed by B.O. (as in body odor) Plenty.

• Flattop, horizontal-headed killer for hire. Tried to kill Tracy. Drowned.

• Mumbles, society singer — or number? — turned blackmailer, turned killer. Drowned after puncturing his own life raft.

• The Mole, rodent-faced counterfeiter. Lived in the sewer and, yes, died in the sewer.

• The Blank, no-faced gang leader.

Grouch Jr., who researched and edited "Dick Tracy: America's Most Famous Detective" (Citadel Press, \$14.95). "The times weren't good. Public violence existed. Innocent people were getting shot on the street."

And there was Gould, in Chicago and trying to put to

gether a detective strip. Tracy's first villain? Big Boy, a hoodlum based directly on Capone.

Crouch calls "Dick Tracy" a "pivotal" comic strip in terms of adventure, continuity and a serious attempt at cartoon reality, although its style — with the steely-eyed gunshooter's profile visible throughout — was far more idiosyncratic. "It predated 'Terry and the Pirates' and 'Li'l Abner,'" he notes, and "set the visual style for the detective: the fedora and the trench coat."

Gould drew and plotted the strip with conviction.

When Tracy chased down and cornered some repulsive thug — be it Mumbles, Puckerpus, Flyface or Half-and-Half — he'd simply and neatly shoot the creep through the head and be done with it. Or, even better, he'd stand back and watch as fate stepped in and his quarry was scalped to death in a Turkish bath or torn to bits by a mad dog.

After 10 years of rejection, and with nothing but correspondence-course art training, Gould offered a detective strip inspired by Sherlock Holmes called "Plainsholmes Tracy" to the Chicago Tribune-New York News Syndicate. It was accepted, but the name was changed to include two vague puns: "Dick" (slang for detective) and "Tracy" (as in tracing a trail of clues).

In "America's Great Comic Strip Artists" (Abbeville Press, \$55) author and art professor Richard Marschall points out that Gould "had chronic problems with anatomy and perspective — arms jutting from elsewhere than shoulders, foreground fig-

Raucy rappers speak out with Geraldo and Phil

NEW YORK - He's been arrested in Florida and attacked in Texas, but the leader of the raunchy 2 Live Crew band found two friends in the Big Apple: Geraldo and Phil.

Lead singer Luther Campbell on Wednesday unleashed a fiery, foul-mouthed defense of the group's album "As Nasty As They Wanna Be." Campbell appeared live on "Donahue" and did a taping for a Friday "Geraldo."

With Geraldo Rivera, Campbell spouted a torrent of obscenities at the sheriff who arrested him, denounced a black Florida judge as an "Inole Tom," and questioned the credentials of the sheriff's legal adviser.

"He hasn't given more to the black community than I have," Campbell said of the adviser, then attacked Broward County Sheriff Nick Navarro over the police shooting of a black in Fort Lauderdale earlier this year.

"It will definitely be our most bleasted show ever. No question," said Jeff Erdel,

the publicist for the show.

But Campbell wasn't finished. He went live on the syndicated "Donahue" show, where he was joined by previously censored performers Jello Biafra and Wendy O. Williams.

Campbell kept it clean for Phil Donahue's show. But Bob DeMoss, director of the conservative Focus on Family, stunned viewers with an explosive broadcast live into millions of homes.

"I'd like to keep this job," Donahue said in asking his guests to calm down. DeMoss later apologized, and NBC received dozens of phone calls about the explosive.

Biafra and Williams vigorously defended Campbell.

"I'm a little sick of the system," said Williams, who once wore only electrical tape above her waist at a show. "What are we going to do next?"

Not that the obsessed detective didn't catch a little grief of his own. When "Grouchy" died in 1985, the Washington Post reported in its obituary that during Tracy's first 24 years on the job he was shot 27 times. Over the years he was

plugged, pistol-whipped, tortured, burned, steamed, beaten, frozen, chloroformed, pressurized, depressurized, dynamited and dragged by a speeding car. (What a guy.)

Indeed, the mayhem in the strip was so extreme the late Al Capp was moved to create a Tracy parody in his own comic strip, "L.I. Abner."

The star of Capp's strip within a strip was "Grouchy" — a bumbling plainclothes detective even more hawknosed and chisel-chinned than Tracy. Foesdick was so overzealous he'd shoot first — usually hitting innocent bystanders with bullet holes — and never even bother to ask questions. Abner regularly declared Foesdick "muh. dead."

In 1946, Daffy Duck appeared as Duck Tracy in "The Great Piggy Bank Robbery." Outlandish villains in this cartoon parody included Pickle Puss and Neon Noodle. Tracy was an icon — a cartoon satirized in other cartoons.

At its peak in the '40s and '50s, "Dick Tracy" appeared in 750 newspapers and had 65 million readers. Could retire in 1977 — after 46 years of cartoon crime-busting. Since then the strip, drawn by Locher and scripted by mystery writer Max Allan Collins, has been in serious decline, although 29 new clients have recently picked it up in anticipation of the movie.

"We began to suspect the obvious," he said, adding that the obvious is not often noticed in science. "Hypnosis had nothing to do with things associated with hypnosis without hypnotizing anybody by suggesting things, arousing the imagination... without putting anyone in any special state."

"Whether hypnotists or behaviorists or psychologists want to admit it or not, the truth of the matter is there's no way on earth of proving a person is under hypnosis," he said. "That's what makes it such a terrible, terrible dilemma in the courtroom."

In recent years, Kreskin has testified in courts and lectured to law enforcement in support of bans on using testimony obtained by hypnosis. He's also made an offer of \$50,000 to anyone who could prove there is a hypnotic state and who shows anything that can be done by someone in a hypnotic trance that can't be done without it.

They gave me a microphone to ride up the side of the Snake River Canyon," he said. "It was an unbelievable experience."

Kreskin often performs at casinos, and he enjoys a bit of gambling himself, mostly blackjack. "But I have no advantage really as a mentalist or a thought reader," he said, noting that his only skill is an ability to quickly memorize a deck, something he added any good gambler can do.

The mentalist said he will not gamble at the casino where he is working. "But I may sneak off by another one," he added.

Not surprisingly, people frequently ask Kreskin for tips at the casinos where he performs. For example, at Harrah's, there are four gigantic tubes stuffed full of one-dollar and five-dollar bills, and guests are invited to take as much money as they want.

"Needless to say, people are asking me if I have any idea what the total is," he said. "But I talked to the staff here and they said 'Kreskin, not even the people who filed it know what the four containers add up to.'"

"So I couldn't do it because unless someone had the information in their mind, there's nothing I can do," said Kreskin. "I'm not a fortune teller. I have to work with people's concentration. If they concentrate, I can do some very dramatic things, but if they don't have any information, I am absolutely lost."

Vinyl records becoming thing of the past

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Anyone who's tried to forage for vinyl in a music store knows the frustrating truth. Records are dying.

But the speed with which they are disappearing have led some music fans — not just vinyl romantics — to wonder whether it's a matter of death or if records are being killed off prematurely.

The bad news has been piling up this year.

Warner-Elektra-Atlantic announces it will cut out more than 40 percent of its vinyl catalog. That means 200 titles, many of which are owned by the conglomerate will no longer be available on records.

The Tower Records chain says it won't sell 7-inch singles anymore — that's after several major labels, including CBS and A&M, say they won't accept returns on unsold records.

Two major labels, PolyGram and Chrysalis, announce that, with a few rare exceptions, all their new releases will only be on cassette tape and compact disc.

"It's a real kick in the teeth with a vengeance for the last six months," said Robert Cohen, manager of the Vinyl-Vinyl record store in New York City. "Things that people took for granted — things that they used to see in record bins for the last 20 years — are now gone."

The day will come, sooner than most people expect, when it will be rare to find a new album released on vinyl, predicted Michael Stotter, Chrysalis' vice president for marketing.

By Christmas 1990, when the next burst of CD hardware buying takes place, vinyl will be virtually nonexistent," he said.

The facts show record buyers are part of a minority group growing smaller every day. Manufacturers shipped out 34 million records in 1989, according to the Recording Industry Association of America. That's less than half what they shipped the year before, and a fraction of the 341 million during the pre-CD era year of 1978.

By contrast, manufacturers shipped out 207 million CDs and 446 million cassettes during 1989.

The reasons are simple. "Boom boxes" and small, portable cassette players are the favorites of kids these days, and wealthier music lovers have been seduced by the sound of CDs.

"We've seen this happen in the industry before," said Trish Heimers, RIAA spokeswoman. "From the '78s to the compact disc, the industry has always been changing. As the technology changed, people moved on."

The music business has powerful reasons for helping people move on as fast as possible. Trish says pay to keep pressing plants humming when they're turning out a trickle of records.

Merchants, in turn, would like to ditch records so they'll have more room to store cassettes and the more expensive compact discs. Only 2 percent of sales in the 82-store Record World chain are in records, so vinyl is being phased out, said Mitch Imber, purchasing director.

"Something had to give," he said.

That's all ammunition for conspiracy theorists who think records are being killed off too

fast.

"The industry itself has tried to make records obsolete, instead of the marketplace making them obsolete," said Johnny Konrad, who owns Johnny's record store in Darien, Conn. "It's the tail wagging the dog. The industry wants to make it harder to get records, to establish the CDs."

Merchants still interested in stocking records say return policies and ordering difficulties are putting pressure on them to relent.

Many record companies charge a penalty for return of an unsold record. For instance, Konrad said, he'll get only \$4.50 to return a record for which he paid \$6, even if it's defective. But there's no penalty for cassette and CD returns.

Konrad said he's continually frustrated in ordering new copies of records. He's ordered copies of Keith Richards' "Talk Is Cheap" album every week since September

and, in late March, still hadn't gotten any. He's had only one shipment of the B-52s' "Cosmic Thing" album on vinyl — and it's a Top 10 hit.

Rocky Roy, owner of the Music Shack in Albany, tries to keep new records in stock because many of his music-hungry customers aren't willing to risk \$15 for a CD of an artist they barely know.

A recent experience by Chrysalis shows the volatility of this changeover. The second album by Irish singer Sinéad O'Connor, released in late March, was initially one of the albums the record company planned to release only on CD and cassette.

O'Connor, coming from a country where vinyl still reigns, cried foul. Chrysalis relented and printed records. And, Stotter said, the company received almost 40,000 orders for LPs before the album was even released — far above every week since September

Stotter admitted he underestimated the appeal of vinyl for O'Connor's new album. But it doesn't change his opinion that the days of vinyl are numbered, and he pleads the industry's innocence of forcing the trend.

"I don't think the record companies are trying to kill it off at all," he said. "It's the people who frequent records stores who are showing less and less interest in records."

As a collector with thousands of records herself, Heimer sympathizes with record fanatics. But "the one or two or 12 or 100 LP buyers who are shouting that they're killing it off prematurely just aren't buying millions of LPs to make it worthwhile for the companies," she said.

The fast disappearance of LPs has given rise to a new type of specialty store trying to fill the vacuum created by big chains abandoning LPs. One such store, Last Chance Records in Chicago, shuns CDs.

F Vinyl Vinyl had no irony in mind when it took its name five years ago, Cohen said. Now it specifically caters to a vinyl-starved public, particularly with hard-to-find used records from the 1960s.

"You can go into any chain store today, in any mall, looking for a copy of any of the famous Bob Dylan albums from the 1960s and you won't find it anymore on album," he said.

"That's amazing to me. That's scandalous."

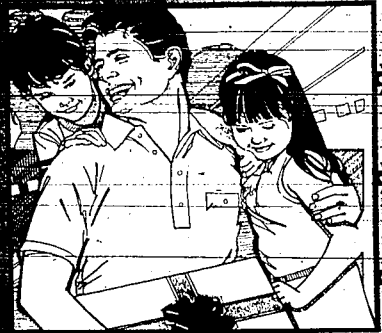

Beatty is 'Dick Tracy' but bad guy Pacino steals the show

HOLLYWOOD You gotta give it to the gumshoe: "Dick Tracy" is brash, irreverent fun. Warren Beatty's vision of a comic strip on film comes in paintbox-bright colors with nicely irreverent dialogue, a gaggle of crisp performances and one with million-dollar movie.

It is a film of enormous style, with a sure sense of itself. You may not exactly brood about the inner lives of these characters for days after you leave the theater — then again, for better or worse, that may be one of the definitions of a summer movie. To take the words out of the mouth of another Tracy, "There ain't much meat, but what there is is there."

Two-thirds of "Tracy" takes place in a sort of ultrastylized Chicago after dark, but for all its nighttime gorgeousness, it is still a brighter film than "Batman"; it is sunny in spirit, not feverish, and it leaves less of a copper-penny taste of nastiness in the mouth. What violence it has is of an old-fashioned, '30s movie cops-and-robbers variety, a man with a Thompson submachine-gun against a sleazy, bad-guy mob.

"Dick Tracy" has its own glorious villain, his tone is entirely different from the leering excesses of the Joker; Al Pacino's Big-Boy-Caprice has to be one of the screen's most extravagantly funny creations.

In a struggle for control of the city

between mobsters, "Dick Tracy's" character villains look eerily like cartoonist Chester Gould's own: Flattop, Pruneface, Mumbles, The Brow, even the amazing Little Face are perfect down to the last freckle and groove. In contrast, the romantic characters and good guys; Beatty as ol' tomahawk nose himself, Glennie Heady's Tess Trueheart, Madonna's Breathless Mahoney, young Charlie Korsmo's Junior (known for most of the movie as The Kid); Seymour Cassel's loyal Sam Catchem and James Keane's Pat Patton, are, more or less, undisguised.

Yet by some magic, none of the villains are immobilized by their elaborate make-up; it seems to have liberated them. It certainly electrified Al Pacino, because clearly, "Dick Tracy" is Pacino's movie, not Beatty's and not Madonna's, individually or together. Madonna's performance, which in retrospect seems to be songs, salty patter and a collection of artfully struck poses, won't disappoint her fans, but it may not win her next ones — her acting hasn't caught up with her charisma. Pacino, on the other hand, is likely to wow the world by pure, inspired, comic invention.

(The screenplay, thick with quotable wit, is credited to Jim Cash and Jack Epps, Jr., the team responsible for the utterly

immemorable dialogue of "Legal Eagles" and "Top Gun." Attention is called to the "special consultant" credit given writer Bo Goldman, of "Melvin and Howard," and "Shoot the Moon."

Who could have suspected that a performance of this hilarity lurked behind Al Pacino's forbidding

intensity all these years? "Dog Day Afternoon" may have given more than a hint of it; in "Sea of Love" as Pacino fell all over himself to get out of the way of a possibly murderous Ellen Barkin, there was a shutter-quick glimpse of the funniness in the man. Beatty's direction — or even the sense of working behind Big

Boy's disguise — may have been the liberating force. Whatever it was, something popped the cork and out spilled this goggle-eyed mobster with pencil-thin mustache, plastered-down hair and a silhouette roughly like Quasimodo's.

Watching Big Boy coach Breathless and her klutzy chorines in

how to sell a numb, dancing it for them himself, touching, tweaking, all the while running a non-stop line of malaprop quotes: "If you ain't for the people, you can't buy the people ... Lincoln! There is the sense of an actor having the time of his life. (Some of the same sense of fun emanates from Dustin Hoffman's glowing cameo as Mumbles.)

For his part, Beatty's Dick Tracy surges through his raucous world like a young man in a suit. He is a pillar of command in his work and a Hamlet of indecision in what passes for his personal life and Beatty plays him with ovish rectitude. As he had in the comic strip, Tracy has major problems with the love world. Absolutely sticks crosswise in the man's throat — making him the perfect hero now as well as in the 1930s. The original Dick Tracy's engagement to Tess Trueheart lasted from 1931 to 1949; this one seems headed in the same direction, in spite of the twinkle to Glennie Heady's sturdy Tess.

If Tracy can't quite say yes to Tess, he can at least say no to the indefatigable come-on of Breathless Mahoney. "No girl for Lips?" he asks her sardonically, referring to her raucous, unabashed love boss. "I'm wearin' black underwear," she points out. She certainly is, and in the face of such provocation, Tracy's morality is to be admired, unless you've come for great chemistry. Facing Breathless, Tracy is stunned but inert.

Real Dick Tracy loved the show, but couldn't solve the mystery

WOODSTOCK, III. (AP) — Capt. Dick Tracy of the Chicago Police Department loved the movie. But he couldn't solve the crime.

"I suspected somebody else," said Tracy after watching the movie "Dick Tracy." Judging from the gasps from the audience, very few people suspected the culprit.

Tracy — yes, that's really his name — was among 500 guests at a preview of the movie here Wednesday night. Woodstock was the home of Chester Gould, who created the Dick Tracy comic strip. The movie opens nationally today.

"It was great," said Tracy, who at 56 is just two years younger than the comic strip. "It had an interesting plot, lots of action, the scenes were uniquely done."

Others agreed.

"It was fabulous," said Woodstock resident Betty Hamilton. "I was never a Dick Tracy fan, but now I am. I'm going to go back and read all the comic books."

The cinematography is phenomenal and Madonna is great," said Bob Billmuck, a real estate broker from Woodstock.

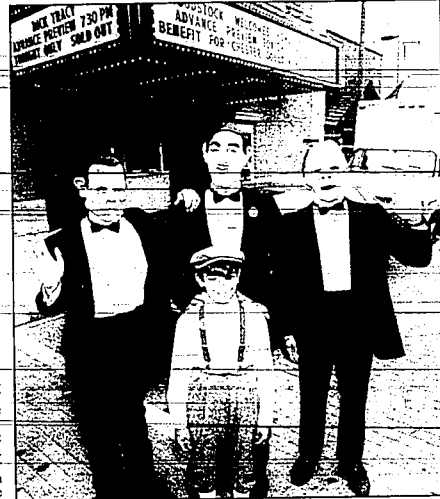
Guests paid \$100 each for seats at the Woodstock Opera House. Proceeds will benefit the Chester Gould Memorial Library, a museum planned to commemorate the late cartoonist and his famous characters like 88 Keys, Mumbles, Breathless Trueheart.

"The fact that Dick Tracy didn't

succumb to that is part of the movie. Warren Beatty played the role way we would like to imagine police work in that time. At least Dick Tracy wasn't wearing an earring," Tracy said, alluding to two Peotone, Ill., police officers disciplined recently.

'The Boondogglers' tells history of 2 Idaho families

ALMO - "The Boondogglers," a tale of the lives of two southern Idaho families by area writer Ellis Boden, will soon be available in area bookstores.

The historical fiction volume covers most of the century Idaho is now celebrating, starting with the time of Milner Dam's construction in 1905 to the present. Boden writes of two families: the Wodens and Ransons, and how their histories interrelated that of the Magic Valley.

Three autograph parties are slated next month to mark publication of "The Boondogglers," which will bear the imprint of Valley Books, a local publisher.

The sessions are set for 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. July 7 at the Albion Library; 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. July 14 at the Burley Book Plaza and 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. July 21 at the Jerome County Historical Museum.

Boden says the Wodens' story in many ways tells that of his own family. His father, Morgan, settled in Idaho in 1906. Many readers will recognize prominent Magic Valley names and places in "The Boondogglers."

"I feel it will have particular local appeal," says Boden.

He adds that, although descriptions in the book may tempt readers to think they've recognized themselves, "the overall characterizations are developed as pure fiction."

But some people named in the book are real - those mentioned in

the chapter-concluding passages "from the archives of the Futsala County Historical Society," for example.

"The Boondogglers" is Boden's second book. His first, "The Palouse Story" was set in northern Idaho. That volume sold 2,000 copies, according to Boden.

Boden was born in Hazelton and now lives in Almo with his wife, Ethel. She is working on a book about Elba and Boden plans to help her proofread and type it.

Boden spent more than 30 years as a teacher and principal in California and Idaho. He now drives a mail route in the morning and devotes his afternoons to writing.

'Wonder Years' may help ABC knock NBC off the top of ratings mountain

The upcoming fall season looks to be more interesting than most: For the first time in nearly a decade, ABC has a real shot at knocking longtime king NBC off the top of the ratings mountain.

There are several schools of opinion on how this came to pass. Some point to the "slingshot effect" of last season's double-barraged breakout of ABC's "America's Funniest Home Videos" (which almost immediately shot to the top of the ratings) and "Twin Peaks" (which gained the network prestige). They argue that the momentum generated by these shows may well propel ABC into the No. 1 slot this season. Others take the more historical view that the ABC turnaround began with the October 1988 debut of "Roseanne," the first show to seriously challenge the stranglehold NBC's "Cosby Show" had on first place in the Nielsens. And there are those who look all the way back to Jan. 31, 1988, when, after the Super Bowl, ABC aired a "special preview" of an unassuming series about a suburban junior-high-school kid growing up in the late '60s.

"The Wonder Years" turned out to be one of those rare "buttonhole" shows: Its fans felt so strongly about it that they buttonholed family and friends and practically demanded they tune it in. Still, "The Wonder Years" had no more than respectable ratings until it became "Roseanne"'s Tuesday-night lead-in. It may have been a backdoor-way of becoming a hit, but "The Wonder

Years" proved that you could do something out of the ordinary and do well with it.

"The Wonder Years" seems an unlikely candidate to lead a network resurgence.

Its idea of high drama is the purchase of a new family car or having young Kevin Arnold (Fred Savage) and dad Jack (Dan Lauria) build a tree house together — not exactly the stuff of "Macbeth."

But what its fans love about "The Wonder Years" is the insight with which it views the little things that, taken together, accumulate into a life.

When you're 13, it is a huge ethical dilemma whether you ask to the dance your nice lab partner or the beautiful stranger you've had a crush on forever. "The Wonder Years" understands these small crises as questions of values, our

first choices that help determine the kind of adults we become.

"The Wonder Years" takes these little events and finds in them the big issues: friendship, family, love; loss. Kevin is as bewildered as any early adolescent when he meets up with them. In Savage's portrayal, he is lovable because he unflinchingly tries to be decent and is miserable when he falls short.

This is what makes the voice-overs of the unseen, older-and-wiser adult Kevin (Daniel Stern) so important. Stern's warm voice both includes and distances: Young Kevin's dilemmas are never patronized, but the adult Kevin's wry comments put them into perspective.

The mood is brighter this June on the Gower-Sunset stages of "Days of Our Lives." Bo, Brady's back with Hope, so the ratings are up.

You remember Bo, the bearded, anti-hero of the mid-'80s with a ring in his ear. Actor Peter Reckell sported a "Hell's Angels" look and countered with a soft voice — the old Yin and Yang combination. It worked so well for "Days" Peter was voted daytime's No. 1 male four years in a row.

Coming home to L.A. after a Broadway run, Dale and Crawford were getting all the ink while Peter hammered nails.

This winter Peter heard from Dale's parents that Reckell was coming back to "Days" as Bo Brady. It was news to him, but not to the public. Next, his agent called, and said the rumor was true.

Back in harness again, Reckell says he doesn't know what the brass wants from Bo and Hope a second time around.

"I'm there to act not plot and change things," said Reckell. "That's not my job. I'm getting 30 pages a day and that keeps me busy. But the burden is lighter this time. Bo and Hope carried the load before. Now other couples are important."

Peter feels good about returning. "I'm flattered and ready," he said. "My tank is filled up again. The writers and I are getting to know each other. One writer is left from the old days, so I see lines that sound like the old Bo. In the daytime business writers watch the actors. If they see something they

like it goes in the next script. That's happening to me this spring. We're coming along."

"I work days, Dale works night," Reckell said. "We only have moments together. They become very precious. Right now the only break comes at Christmas when I get a week off. I hope I can wait that long."

series of prime-time specials she will anchor. Pauley, who left NBC's troubled "Today" show in December after controversial charges there, "is really hot for the prime-time show," he said.

Pauley, who got a standing ovation from the station executives, also will do special reports for "Nightly" and fill in for Brokaw when he is on assignment or vacation.

The question about Pauley's future on "Nightly" was raised by an affiliate executive after published speculation she may co-anchor the newscast. At the briefing, former affiliate board chairman James Seferl and his

successor, Eric Bremner, also disputed a report that the three-day convention had been NBC's gloomiest since 1985.

It was upbeat, said Seferl, president of Cosmos Broadcasting in Greenville, S.C.

Will Joe bring a revival to 'Today'?

NEW YORK (AP) — With little hoopla, lots of smiles and Willard Scott joking about the bald pate of Joe Garagiola, NBC's "Today" show Monday began what it hopes will prove a fresh start after nearly a year of woe.

Although heavily promoted by NBC during the weekend, the new look "Today" was oddly low-key as Bryant Gumbel and co-anchor Deborah Norville welcomed Garagiola, the show's co-host from 1969 to 1973 and now its second co-anchor.

There were no speeches, no recap by anchor Gumbel of the problems that led to Jane Pauley's departure in December, no assertions that the bad times are history and the good times are about to roll.

There wasn't even any on-air hugging. Last year, Norville embraced Pauley after Pauley wished her well.

Since Pauley's exit after 13 years, once-dominant "Today" has been second in ratings to ABC's "Good Morning America" for 22 consecutive weeks. Its year-to-date ratings are 17 percent below those of 1989.
