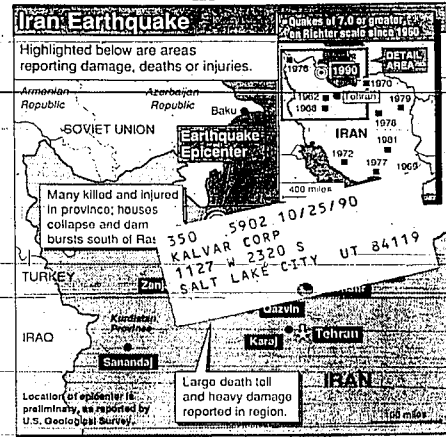

Iran quake kills 25,000

NICOSIA, Cyprus — An earthquake shattered northern Iran early Thursday, killing at least 25,000 people and injuring tens of thousands, Iranian officials announced.

The quake shortly after midnight demolished scores of villages and towns and buried thousands of people in their homes. The Iranian mission to the United Nations, which released the casualty toll, said it would likely rise further as rescuers reached more remote areas.

The earthquake was at least as bad as the quake registering 7.7 on the Richter scale that struck Iran on Sept. 16, 1978, killing 25,000 people. On Dec. 7, 1988, roughly the same number of people died in a quake in nearby Soviet Armenia that registered 6.9 on the Richter scale of ground motion.

Thursday's tremor measured 7.3 on the Richter scale, the Geophysics Center at Tehran University said. The U.S. Geological Survey, however, measured it at 7.7.

At least a dozen aftershocks shook the region within two hours after the quake. The earthquake struck at 12:30 a.m. and was centered 125 miles northwest of Tehran, near the Caspian Sea, the official news agency IRNA reported.

It shook buildings and shattered windows in Tehran, but apparently caused no deaths in the capital. In the neighboring Soviet republic of Azerbaijan, the tremor slightly damaged some older build-

House votes to leave flag unprotected

WASHINGTON — The House on Thursday rejected a constitutional amendment to protect the American flag from desecration, heeding opponents who said it would risk damage to the Bill of Rights.

The 254-177 tally left the amendment, which was supported by President Bush, 34 votes short of the two-thirds majority required to amend the Constitution. Republicans voted 159-17 for it; Democrats 109-95 against.

The vote followed a sometimes impassioned day of debate featuring more than 100 speeches, including a rare address by the speaker of the House, Rep. Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash.

"We should not amend the Constitution of the United States to reach the sparse and scattered and despicable conduct of a few who

High court kills spoils for politicians

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court ordered an end to political patronage Thursday, ruling that federal, state and local government jobs generally may not be awarded based on party affiliation.

The justices, by a 5-4 vote, said constitutionally protected rights are violated when people are denied government jobs, promotions or transfers because of politically partisan reasons.

The decision reinstates a lawsuit by three Illinois residents against Gov. James

Thompson and the state's other Republican leaders. The suit says Thompson has made party allegiance a requirement for 68,000 state jobs.

While the ruling applies to all levels of government, city and county governments may feel the biggest impact because most federal and state government jobs are covered by civil service merit systems that have made patronage obsolete.

Parachuting mishap claims Swiss climber

ALMO — A Swiss tourist was killed Wednesday night in a parachuting accident near the City of Rocks.

Andreas Kast, 29, of Herisau, Switzerland, died instantly of head and internal injuries when he fell 50 yards and tumbled onto the rocks below, Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal said.

The accident occurred at about 7:30 p.m., south of Oakley and just west of the City of Rocks, where Kast and three friends had been camping and rock climbing.

He had been using a "parapente" parachute, which involves jumping from a mountain, gliding on air currents before landing.

Kast jumped 50 yards up, but his parachute collapsed and he tumbled down and was killed, the sheriff said.

A helicopter from the Bannock Regional Medical Center flew into the site and carried the body to a waiting ambulance from Cassia Memorial Hospital. The Cassia County Sheriff's Office and Mini-Cassia Search and Rescue also responded to the scene.

Kast had been traveling with Rinaldo Borra, 24, of Stalencin, Switzerland; Rudiger Jooss, 20, of Stuttgart, West Germany; and Roger Fillebock, 20, of Pfronten, West Germany.

Kast's wife was contacted in Salem, Ore., Crystal said. He has no other family in the states.

Educators sue state for school money

MOSCOW — A group of Idaho school superintendents has filed a lawsuit to force the state to spend more money for education.

"Our goal is to have enough money infused into the system to provide the thorough education required by the (Idaho) constitution," said Boise attorney Robert Huntley.

Huntley filed the suit in 2nd District Court here Thursday on behalf of the Idaho Schools for Equal Educational Opportunity, which describes itself as an unincorporated association of school superintendents. Defendants are Idaho Superintendent of

Schools Jerry Evans, Gov. Cecil Andrus, the Idaho Legislature and the State Board of Education.

Unlike a lawsuit being considered by the Twin Falls School District and several other large Idaho districts that would change the state's funding formula, the action filed Thursday seeks to raise funding levels for all school districts.

"We are hopeful they will join us in increasing funding overall," Huntley said.

Among the 27 other plaintiffs is the District School District.

"I think everybody could use more money," said Dietrich Superintendent Wayne Perron.

Other plaintiffs in addition to Moscow are the Cambridge, Lapwai, Mullan, Pot-

latch, Whitepine, Kendrick, Kootenai, Cascade, St. Maries, Orofino, Grangeville, Caldesac, Genesee, Highland-Craigmont, Bruneau-Grandview, McCall-Donnelly, American Falls and Rockland school districts.

The rest of the plaintiffs are Dale and Patti Shilow, parents of students in the Kendrick School District, and Harry Davy, William Jones, Gainford Mix, Bob Slyde and Werner Brammer, described as taxpayers and property owners in Latah County.

Although the suit asserts that the current funding formula is inequitable, its focus is on the state's financial support for education.

State board mandates AIDS education

IDAHO FALLS — Armed with a report that Idaho students hold serious misconceptions about AIDS, and engage in high-risk behavior, the state Board of Education has voted to require instruction on prevention and control of the deadly disease from kindergarten through high school.

"We found everywhere Idaho's teachers felt the need for education and thought the schools were the appropriate location," consultant Joy Hummer told the board before its unanimous vote on Thursday.

The new regulation requires education on prevention and control of not only acquired immune deficiency syndrome but also on the AIDS-related HIV virus and other sexually transmitted diseases.

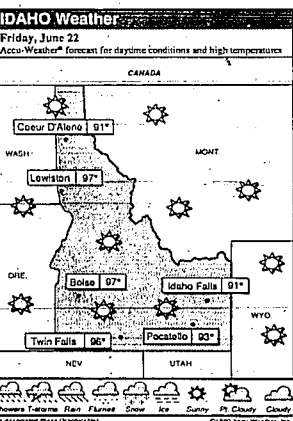
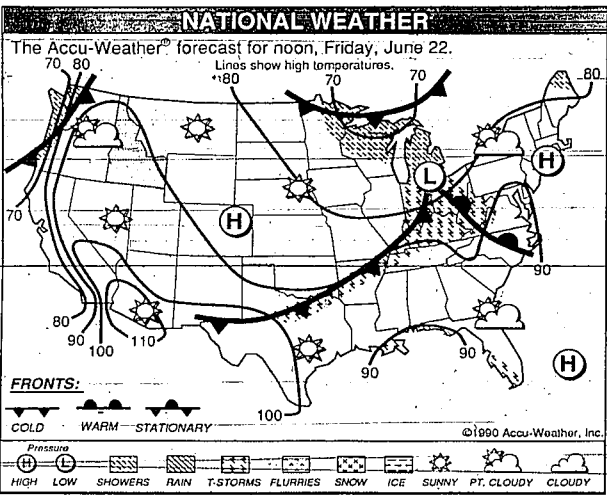
Based on results of the survey, conducted by Idaho State University researchers, Ms. Hummer estimated that about 2,000 Idaho children could be in danger of contracting AIDS as a result of their lack of knowledge and behavior.

Although there has been no statewide education program, she conceded the instance of AIDS-related infections in Idaho has been relatively small, but that makes positive action by the state even more imperative.

"We have been given the gift of time," Ms. Hummer said. "Hopefully, we will use it wisely."

According to a 1990 report from the General Accounting Office, the investigative arm of Congress, two-thirds of the nation's school districts have AIDS-oriented education programs. But in Idaho, just half, 58 of the 115 districts, have school-board-approved instructional plans.

Weather summary

The first day of summer was warm across the Gem State. This was the result of a strong ridge of high pressure moving into the Pacific Northwest. The temperatures are expected to be even warmer today.

Skies were sunny around the state Thursday afternoon and the winds were mostly less than 10 mph.

The afternoon temperatures were in the upper 70s to near 90. As of 3 p.m., the highest temperature reported around the state was 88 at Boise, while Grangeville and McCall showed readings of 75.

By today, a few afternoon thunderstorms may develop mainly over the mountains as moisture moves inland from the coast.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 97 degrees at Weiser. Dixie and Middle Fork Lodge reported the coldest at 36 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the hottest temperature was 118 degrees at Borrego Springs, Calif. The coldest was 32 at Wisdom, Mont.

Summer's arrival brings seasonal temperatures

Summary weather prevailed for much of the nation Thursday, the first day of summer, but thunderstorms and rain showers were scattered from the Southeast to the southern Plains and across upper Midwest.

Strong, slow-moving thunderstorms threatened local flooding in parts of south-central Tennessee, northern Alabama, northwest Arkansas and northeast Oklahoma.

In Alabama, lightning strikes knocked out electric power in Blountville and Brookville, and lightning destroyed a house and caused many other fires near Snead.

At noon, rain showers and thunderstorms were scattered from the northwest two thirds of New York, across northern Maine, southwest Pennsylvania, the southern and central Florida Peninsula, from southeast Tennessee across northwest Georgia and Alabama, along the Louisiana coast and the central Texas Gulf Coast.

Rain showers and thunderstorms also reached from west

central Mississippi across the northwest third of Arkansas into eastern Oklahoma, as well as southeast Colorado, northeast New Mexico and the Texas Panhandle, the Oklahoma Panhandle, and northwest Oklahoma, western Kansas, much of Nebraska, Iowa, southern South Dakota and eastern Wyoming.

Rain showers and thunderstorms reached from northern Minnesota across northwest Wisconsin and upper Michigan, as well as along the central coast of Oregon.

Heavy rainfall during the 6 hours ending at 2 p.m. EDT included more than 2 inches at Fayetteville, Ark., and two-thirds of an inch at Columbia, Miss.

High temperature records for the day were set in Augusta, Ga., where the 102-degree high broke the record of 102 set in 1924; and in Charleston, S.C., where the 100-degree reading beat the 1988 mark by three degrees.

The low temperature for the Lower 48 state Thursday morning was 32 degrees at Wisdom, Mont.

Senate sustains Bush's veto of Hatch Act revision measure

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate failed by two votes on Thursday to override President Bush's veto of a bill to broaden the political rights of millions of government workers.

The 65-35 vote on the Hatch Act — two short of the two-thirds majority needed to override — marked the 12th time in 12 tries that Bush has prevailed over Congress in veto confrontations.

Three Republicans who originally voted for the bill switched sides to support Bush on the veto vote. All 53 Senate Democrats voted to override the veto.

White House press secretary Martin Fitzwater said, "We are pleased that that vote was sustained. We felt that we correctly politicized the civil service."

The president vetoed the bill last Friday, saying it "would inevitably lead to politicizing the federal work force" and "destroy its essential political neutrality."

The House, with nearly half of its Republicans bolting the administration, voted 327-93 on Wednesday to override the veto.

The legislation would have allowed 3 million federal and postal workers to, on their own time, attend political conventions and caucuses as delegates and to speak at rallies on behalf of candidates.

It also would have removed a ban on federal workers holding offices in local, state or national political organizations or from soliciting donations from co-workers for federal employee and postal union political action committees.

The workers still have been prohibited from taking leaves of absence to seek elected public office or soliciting campaign contributions from the general public or on behalf of a specific candidate.

One sponsor, Sen. David Pryor, D-Ark., said after the vote he would try to extend the Hatch Act prohibitions on political activity for federal workers to presidential appointees.

Senate GOP leaders portrayed the bill during the debate on override as an election-year bonanza for Democrats.

Democrats "want to get this bill passed before this election," said Minority Leader Bob Dole of Kansas. He said federal employee and postal union-political action committees funneled 88 percent of their campaign contributions in the 1988 election to Democrats.

Vincent Sombrotto, president of the 315,000-member Letter Carriers union, said "get Republicans out of office" to get Republicans to switch their votes "places him in the same league as the world's most oppressive dictators."

Thirteen Republicans had joined all of the Senate's Democrats in passing the bill by a potentially veto-overriding 67-30 majority in May. Sen. Alfonse D'Amato of New York, Pete V. Domenici of New Mexico and Trent Lott of Mississippi switched Thursday to support Bush's veto.

The White House also gained the support of Republican Sens. Pete Wilson of California and Kit Bond of Missouri. Both had missed the vote in May.

would dishonor the flag and defile it," said Foley, who also cast a rare speaker's vote to register his opposition to the amendment. By tradition, the speaker does not normally engage in debate or vote.

Countered Rep. Henry Hyde, R-Ill., that he would take the flag out of the gutter where the counterculture has dragged it and is smearing it. We have 10 amendments that guarantee us all sorts of rights. How about one amendment that gives us a duty?"

Foley told reporters that Thursday's vote would be the last one on the amendment this year in the House, but Republicans promised to keep the issue alive.

"I am confident this debate is going to go on for a long time," Rep. Newt Gingrich, R-Ga., told the chamber. Asked about the Bush's efforts on behalf of the amendment, Gingrich said "it was very hard for the president in two days to override the speaker."

Supporters of the amendment, backed by veterans' groups seeking more time to lobby, had tried to delay Thursday's vote until next week but were defeated 231-192.

Rep. Rep. G.V. Montgomery, D-Miss., the chairman of the House Veterans' Committee and the amendment's main Democratic sponsor, said of the proposal, "I think we owe it to the brave Americans who have died for this country."

But Rep. David Obey, D-Wis., derided the attempt to modify the First Amendment.

"When I look around the politicians today, I see more people who remind me of Daffy Duck than Thomas Jefferson," he said.

The strength of the opposition was larger than expected.

Stallings for amendment

WASHINGTON — Rep. Richard Stallings cast his vote Thursday night in favor of a constitutional amendment to ban flag burning but, he said, not before months of anguishing over the decision.

"This has been a very difficult issue because it has put two of our most important values on such a collision course — our respect for our flag and all it symbolizes and our right to say whatever we want, even if our neighbors consider it outrageous," he said following the defeat of the amendment.

After a day-long debate, the amendment failed to win the two-thirds majority in the House required before it could have been considered by the nation's state legislatures.

"I probably anguished over the vote more than any other I had taken in the six years I have been here," Stallings said following the vote.

He said constituents who contacted his office after the Supreme Court's decision last year to legalize flag burning were overwhelming in favor of an amendment. But, in the months since then, the response from constituents evened out, he said.

"It appears that in the country at large not enough Americans believe the Constitution should be amended at this point," Stallings said.

ings in Baku but caused no casualties, the Soviet news agency Tass said.

The Iranian Ambassador to the United Nations, Kamal Kharrazi, told Cable News Network that Iran badly needs medical equipment, blood, blankets and medicine. "I understand that international organizations are trying their best to bring some of this equipment and medicine."

Communications were difficult between Iran and the outside world, and Iranian authorities did not immediately allow foreign-based reporters to enter Iran to cover the disaster.

Scenes shown on state television

and monitored in Cyprus showed young men frantically clawing at debris from flattened concrete buildings in Rasht, 175 miles northwest of Tehran with a population of 189,000 people.

Occasionally, they carried away someone on a stretcher. Bulldozers and cranes lifted away larger pieces of debris.

The announcement carried by the Islamic Republic News Agency placed all government organizations "on full alert" and ordered an air-bridge set up between Tehran and the stricken areas to evacuate survivors.

Landslides blocked rescuers on the ground, and bad weather hindered helicopters trying to airlift supplies and victims, IRNA said.

"To the victor belongs the spoils that may be constitutionally obtained," Justice William J. Brennan wrote for the court.

"The First Amendment prevents the government, except in the most compelling circumstances, from wielding its power to interfere with its employees' freedom to believe and associate, or to not believe and not associate," he said.

The Constitution's First Amendment protects freedom of speech and association.

Brennan was joined by Justices Byron R. White, Thurgood Marshall, Harry A. Blackmun and John Paul Stevens.

Chief Justice William H. Rehnquist and Justices Antonin Scalia, Anthony M. Kennedy and Sandra Day O'Connor dissented.

court" brief to defend use of a patronage system.

In other decisions, the court:

- Ruled 5-4 in a case from Kansas and Missouri that states and consumers may not sue over alleged price-fixing by a utility.
- Ruled 6-3 in a Chicago case that evidence obtained by police in a warrantless search of a home may be used in court if the officers were admitted by someone they reasonably, but mistakenly, believed had the authority to consent to the search.
- Reinstated a former high school wrestling coach's 15-year-old libel lawsuit against an Ohio newspaper.
- The court said the allegedly libelous statements could not be treated as assertions of fact, not opinion. But the 7-2 ruling did not appear to reduce significantly the free-speech protections courts traditionally have

given to statements of opinion.

The high court said partisanship may play a role in deciding who gets a government job only when political affiliation is an appropriate requirement, such as for high-level policy advisers.

In a landmark 1976 ruling and a 1980 case, the high court significantly weakened political patronage, sometimes called the "spoils system."

Those rulings prohibited government employers from firing anyone even some policy-making and confidential government workers solely because of their political affiliation unless party loyalty is a requirement for effective performance.

But those decisions dealt only with firings. Before Thursday, the court never had said that partisanship could not play a role in hiring, transfers and promotions as well.

The lawsuit says that the state's education system fails to provide a "thorough" education for the following reasons:

- Many school districts are unable to construct and maintain the buildings needed.

- Many schools lack enough computer equipment, do not have enough textbooks or the textbooks are outdated.
- Variations in salary levels for different districts make it difficult for some districts to compete for qualified school teachers.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Environmentalists expressed concern Thursday that the Bush administration would fail to give enough protection to the rare spotted owl when it announces its plans Friday under the Endangered Species Act.

"I think the Forest Service is under incredible pressure to do less than the right thing," said Frances Hunt of the National Wildlife Federation.

in general, which despite recent increases in funding is woefully inadequate, Huntley said.

Idaho ranks 48th in the country in student spending and 44th in average teacher salary, although the state's per-pupil income ranks higher than those figures, Huntley said.

The lawsuit says that in the last year, 54 Idaho school districts out of 115 have had to operate on override levies simply to meet basic maintenance and operation expenses.

Charles Sutton, superintendent of the Moscow School District, said his school system is near the maximum level of property tax levies. Inadequate state funding has forced superintendents to devote much of their time to planning for new levies, he said.

"That's ridiculous," Sutton said. "It's not our job to run levies."

Rep. Doug Jones, R-Filer, a member of the House Education Committee, said Thursday his bill was disappointed that the superintendents would try to increase educational funding through the courts after two strong funding years in the Legislature.

"We made a good-faith effort to try and catch up to the rest of the country in the past two years," Jones said.

He said if the state's economy continues to be strong this year it is likely that the increases will be comparable to the last two years.

"We'd rather work through ourselves than be under the gun of a lawsuit," Jones said.

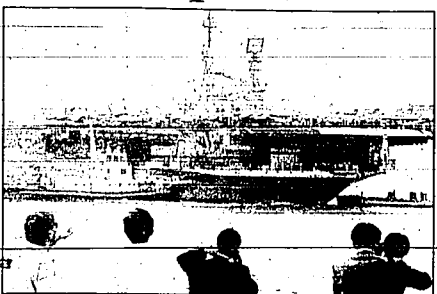

U.S. Navy tells Japan Midway is safe

YOKOSUKA, Japan (AP) — The U.S. Navy sought Thursday to assure the public that the aircraft carrier Midway was safe after two explosions on board killed two crew members and seriously injured nine.

The safety of the ship was never in jeopardy, Rear Adm. Lyle Bull, commander of the Battle Force 7th Fleet, told reporters escorted aboard the ship a day after the fire.

Japan, the only country to experience nuclear attack, asked the U.S. military to improve its safety practices. Yokosuka officials had demanded assurances of the 45-year-old carrier's safety before its return.

Demonstrators charged the ship was carrying nuclear weapons into its home port at Yokosuka despite a Japanese ban.

The United States refuses to comment on the location of its nuclear weapons.

About 50 protesters chanting "Don't let the Midway land here" and "Nuclear Ship Get Out" assembled outside the Navy base gate about an hour before the 67,000-ton ship moored at Yokosuka, 28 miles southwest of Tokyo.



Eight of the demonstrators wore sashes identifying them as victims of the U.S. atomic bombings of the Japanese cities of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in 1945.

Navy officials allowed relatives of the crew onto the ship before reporters were taken aboard.

"Midway is safe and seaworthy in all respects," Bull said, stressing that there was no danger to the ship's weapons systems from the explosions.

Bull said the first explosion occurred shortly after noon Wednesday when a fire-fighting crew investigating smoke opened the hatch to a 12-by-12-foot emergency equipment storeroom six decks below the flight deck.

"Death most probably was instantaneous" for the two sailors killed in the blast, he said. In addition to the nine seriously injured, who were flown to hospitals ashore, seven other injured crewmen were treated on the ship.

poisons, burn injuries, smoke and intense heat, but not necessarily a fire.

The room was near a pipe for the ship's catapult system containing, pressurized steam at 850 degrees and "water sprayed on the bulkhead turned to steam, that's how hot it was," he said.

One unidentified crew member interviewed on Japanese television said a fuel pipe near the steam line cracked and leaked fuel, which then ignited. Navy officials said they could not comment until an investigation is complete.

Capt. Arthur K. Cebrowski said about 1,000 sailors worked through the night to secure the area and flood it with water and foam and provide support.

The bodies were found early Thursday, he said.

In Washington, the Pentagon identified the two dead sailors as Ulrich Patrick Johnson of Martinez, Calif., and Jeffrey Allan Vierra of Nevada City, Calif.

The Midway carries a crew of 4,500 and 62 aircraft. The 1,000-ton carrier was commissioned in 1945 and is the Navy's oldest in active service, although it has been extensively modernized.

The explosions occurred as the ship participated in a joint exercise 125 miles northeast of Yokosuka with the Japanese Maritime Self Defense Force.

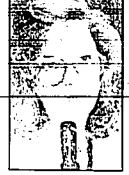
Navy officials said the exercise would continue without the Midway.

In Japan many people have misgivings about the presence of 50,000 U.S. troops and U.S. armaments here.

The Midway fire was the second serious Navy accident since a series of incidents last fall killed 14 people.

Study: Early treatment best bet to fight AIDS

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Quick treatment with the drug AZT in the earliest stages of AIDS infection can significantly slow the lethal disease, according to research presented Thursday at the Sixth International Conference on AIDS.

The study appears to provide the strongest evidence yet that early intervention can stall the emergence of full-blown AIDS in people infected with HIV, the AIDS virus.

"We have to come to the conclusion that the greatest advantage has to accrue with early intervention," said Dr. Margaret Fischl. "It has to occur as early as possible in HIV infection."

Fischl, a researcher at the University of Miami, pioneered the use of AZT in people who already

have AIDS. However, most infected people are still outwardly healthy. So Fischl and other teams around the country have been exploring the risks and advantages of giving the medicine before AIDS infection reaches its final stages.

The conference opened Wednesday amid angry protests by thousands of demonstrators frustrated over the slow pace of progress in controlling the disease.

Fischl's recommendation is likely to be controversial. During the past year, some researchers have begun to question whether AZT, the only approved AIDS drug, should be reserved for use during the later stages of the disease.

The medicine interferes with the reproduction of HIV. When given to people with AIDS, the drug loses its punch within two or three years as the virus becomes resistant to it.

Some doctors believe that if given early in the disease, AZT will be powerless to slow the disease once AIDS develops.

Economic growth in 1st quarter ranks 2nd slowest in 3 1/2 years

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. economy advanced at its slowest pace in 3 1/2 years from January through March, the government reported Thursday.

Analysts said they expect only modest improvement for the rest of the year.

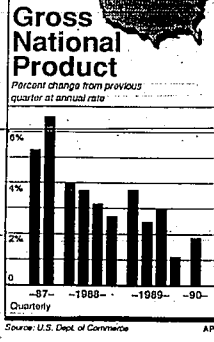
But the economists said any future growth would be fueled in large part by exports after a fall off in consumer spending, which had been a driving force for the economy through much of the economic expansion.

The Commerce Department said the gross national product — the nation's total output of goods and services — grew at a revised 1.9 percent annual rate in the first quarter.

At the same time, the department revised a price index tied to the GNP to show an annualized inflation rate of 6.4 percent for the quarter. The department said half of that increase was due to rising food and energy prices caused by unusual winter weather and analysts predicted prices would decline during the remainder of the year.

If the GNP and inflation reports are combined with other, more recent economic indicators, "the economy is in pretty good shape, although nobody's talking about a boom," said Michael K. Evans of Evans Economics, Inc., a Washington forecasting firm.

"Considering some of the recession forecasts that are out there, that's not at all bad," he added.



A recession generally is defined as two consecutive declines in the GNP and has not occurred since 1981-82. Nevertheless, the economy is growing slower than the 3.0 percent gain of 1989 and the 4.4 percent advance of 1988.

"Sluggishness today, and tomorrow, and probably for several months to come."

The first-quarter GNP was up from the 1.1 percent annualized rate in the final quarter of 1989, that was the slowest advance since a 0.8 percent gain in the summer of 1986.

The department said a larger export total than had been reported was the largest factor in revising the first-quarter GNP from the meager 1.1 percent gain it had calculated last month. It originally had projected in April that growth during the period had been 2.1 percent.

Exports increased 12.8 percent during the period, while imports grew only 3.0 percent.

"Exports are keeping the recovery alive," Evans said.

Consumer spending, meanwhile, was revised from a 2.4 percent increase reported last month to just 1.6 percent in Thursday's report.

"The lower consumption is consistent with the other news about consumers," said Ms. Latta, noting earlier government reports that retail sales have declined for three straight months through May, the first time that has happened since the fall of 1981 during the last recession.

Retail sales represent about half of the overall consumer spending, which itself accounts for about two-thirds of the nation's economic activity.

The various changes left the GNP, after adjusting for inflation, totaling \$4.193 trillion after the first three months of the year.

Drug czar defends U.S. effort

WASHINGTON (AP) — Drug policy director William Bennett launched a pre-emptive strike Thursday on critics who say more U.S. military aid for battling South American cocaine traffickers could entangle this country in a Vietnam-like war.

Increased law enforcement and military assistance for Colombia, Peru and Bolivia "is not an American invasion," Bennett said in a speech to the Center for Strategic and International Studies.

"It is not an escalating military intervention," Bennett said. "But military assistance in all three of the Andean nations is necessary to achieve a level of security that law enforcement personnel alone cannot provide."

Bennett stressed that U.S. personnel will not participate in anti-drug operations. "We will not do it for them. They must do it for themselves," Bennett said in response to growing expressions of concern by some lawmakers and others that stepped-up U.S. military assistance could involve American forces in guerrilla fighting.

"But he conceded there was a danger that more American lives could be lost. 'This is a dangerous enemy and we cannot expect to fight this battle unscathed and come out of it unblemished.'"

"When we sent military trainers or (Drug Enforcement Administration) agents of State Department personnel to the Andean region, we expose them to certain risks," Bennett said. "But we need them there to give the governments a fighting chance and encourage them to take tough actions of their own."

"If we want to help keep drugs out of America, then we need to support those countries that are working on the front line against drugs," Bennett said.

Colombia, Peru and Bolivia are receiving \$230 million worth of aid for anti-drug efforts. The Bush administration has proposed increasing that to \$430 million next year. Editorial writers and columnists have questioned whether plans to send U.S. military advisers to train Latin American forces will lead to American involvement in a Vietnam-style war.

Drug bombings boost U.S. rate 25%

WASHINGTON (AP) — The number of bombings nationwide increased 25 percent last year as drug-related bombings almost doubled, a government report says.

"There are largely bombings related to turf wars or disagreements within certain factions involved in narcotics trafficking," said Jack Killorin, a spokesman for the Treasury Department's Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. He was referring to the leap in drug-related bombings.

Firearms still are responsible for most drug-related violence, Killorin acknowledged Wednesday. But he added: "Nobody at ATF likes the

trend of almost exponential growth in the use of explosive devices as a weapon in the drug wars."

Meanwhile, the total number of criminal bomb attacks, for all reasons, increased by 25 percent, from 1,108 in 1988 to 1,384 last year. The 1989 total was 59 percent higher than the 871 in 1985.

Adding in attempted bombings last year there were 1,699, a 28 percent increase over the 1,332 in 1988. Last year's total was 54 percent higher than the 1,103 in 1985.

Thirty-three people were killed and 305 injured last year in bomb attacks. Since 1985, the number of people killed has ranged between 29 and 43.

East Germans OK monetary unification with West Germany

BONN, West Germany (AP) — East German lawmakers Thursday overwhelmingly approved economic merger with West Germany, ending four decades of failed socialism and taking their biggest and most difficult step toward unification.

"After over 40 years of painful separation, the hopes of the people of Germany for the unity and freedom of all Germans are about to be fulfilled," West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl told lawmakers in his country.

Kohl asked West Germany's Parliament to also pass the historic economic treaty and promise that Poland's western borders would be secure. Earlier in the day, East Germany declared a united Germany would not seek to reclaim former lands lost to Poland after World War II.

After the 302-82 vote on the economic treaty was announced in East Berlin, East German lawmakers rose in a standing ovation. There was one abstention.

The Greens and the PDS, the successor party of the old East German Communists, Bundnis 90, which led the fall revolution, rejected the treaty that outlines the monetary and economic merger of the two Germans by July 2.

The two German parliaments met simultaneously in their respective capitals to take final action on the treaty.

Members of the West German Bundestag, the powerful lower

West German parliament planned to take up the treaty Friday and passage was also expected there.

Kohl urged unanimous approval of the economic merger. "The treaty shows the way to German unity, and whoever doesn't follow this road sign doesn't want unity," he said.

"For the people in Germany, this will make unity come true in vital areas of their daily existence," he said. "Whoever rejects the treaty also rejects our compatriots in the German Democratic Republic."

Under the treaty, the powerful West German mark becomes the currency of both countries on July 2, and East Germany moves from socialism to capitalism.

East German wages, salaries and pensions will be converted to West German marks at a 1:1 exchange rate. The exchange rate for savings deposits varies with age, with a maximum of \$3,500 at the 1:1 rate for those over 60.

West Germany's main opposition party, the left-leaning Social Democrats, criticized the treaty, saying it fails to adequately protect East Germans who face economic hardship in the transition from socialism to a free market.

But their chairman, Hans-Jochen Vogel, told the Bundestag a majority would approve the treaty. Failure to do so would be too much of a shock to East German expectations and could lead to "uncontrollable developments," he said.

Angry Gorbachev accuses hard-line critics of slander

MOSCOW (AP) — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev accused his hard-line critics of slander Thursday and faced the prospect that one of them would be elected head of the Russian republic's Communist Party.

Gorbachev was put on the defensive for a third day when a Leningrad economist claimed he did not obtain party approval to switch the Soviet Union to a market economy.

"To consider that this idea and program dropped from the sky, or that somebody is undertaking an overnight coup to change our course, that is slander," Gorbachev told the Congress of Russian Communists. A nationwide broadcast showed him angrily waving his hand in the air as he spoke.

Numerous conservatives at the meeting, which began Tuesday, have attacked the 59-year-old Kremlin chief's political and economic reforms. The hard-liners have indicated they will try to replace Gorbachev as party leader at a national party congress starting July 2.

Gorbachev also might have to deal with a conservative party leader in Russia, the largest of the 15 Soviet republics.

Nearly all the seven candidates announced Thursday for first secretary of the Russian party are conservatives. Four of them gave



Mikhail Gorbachev Economic program attacked. election speeches, and the front-runner appeared to be Ivan Polozkov, one of Gorbachev's critics and one of Boris Yeltsin's unsuccessful opponents in the race for the presidency of the Russian republic. Polozkov, the 55-year-old party chief of the southern Russian region of Krasnodar, received the most applause. At the urging of delegates, he was allowed to speak at least three times longer than the other three candidates who addressed the delegates.

Polozkov has called for strict party discipline, condemned informal political groups, complained that older party members are not respected and cracked down on co-operatives — private businesses introduced by Gorbachev.

In a speech Wednesday, he blamed the party's falling credibility in part on Gorbachev's reform program and said, "The crisis is not just in the Communist Party, but above all in its leading bodies."

"On Thursday, Polozkov portrayed himself as a moderate intent on saving the party 'from reprisals on the inside from the left and right.'"

He denied he opposed democratic forces or co-operatives. Gorbachev did not comment on the candidates for Russian party chief but did shoot back at hard-liners who accuse him of taking the party out of the decision-making process. He cited numerous meetings of the party leadership where officials decided on the need for radical economic reform, including a market economy.

"Don't think that something is being done secretly to turn the rails and move the country in the direction of capitalism," Gorbachev said. "These attempts are rotten, improper, made by people who seek a completely different goal from ours," he said.

Experts say German unity hurts economy

WASHINGTON (AP) — German unification will drive up U.S. interest rates and slow economic growth here but the adverse effects will be offset somewhat by greater demand for American exports, economic experts told Congress on Thursday.

"The United States will see 'higher interest rates for quite some time' because of greater global competition for capital triggered by efforts to rebuild East Germany and the other Eastern European nations, said C. Michael Aha, director of economic studies at the Council on Foreign Relations.

In the near future, the investment-starved economies of Eastern Europe are likely to begin soaking up funds like a dry sponge," Aha told the Joint Economic Committee. "In a world of higher real interest rates, the United States, as the world's largest debtor nation, borrowing \$300 million a day internationally, would be in a vulnerable position."

With the U.S. economy already sluggish, the need to boost U.S. interest rates to attract foreign capital will mean "America's economic woes may be aggravated by having to pay more to balance its books."

Aha cited studies showing a 1 percent rise in world interest rates would slow U.S. economic growth by 0.4 percent in the first year and 0.6 percent in the second year — a significant drop given the sluggish 1.9 percent U.S. growth rate so far this year.

But Stephen Cooney, director of international development for the National Association of Manufacturers, said higher interest rates would be partially offset by stronger demand for American exports.

NASA holds launch test for space shuttle

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Atlantis' five astronauts on Thursday successfully completed a test that simulated an engine start and cut off moments before liftoff, NASA said.

The shuttle is scheduled for a secret military mission in mid-July.

NASA spokeswoman Lisa Malone said the two-day drill went smoothly. The countdown clock was stopped at four seconds before the mock liftoff. On Monday, Atlantis was moved from the hangar to the launch pad previously occupied by Columbia. Columbia was returned to the hangar a week for repair of a hydrogen leak.

Bomb explodes on British base

LONDON (AP) — A bomb exploded on a military base northwest of London early Thursday, but security officials had spotted a suspicious rucksack and cleared the base and a nearby senior citizens' home shortly before the blast.

On Wednesday night, postal workers intercepted letter bombs addressed to the government minister in charge of Welsh affairs and to a Conservative parliamentarian who represents a Welsh constituency.

The incidents at the base and in London appeared to be unrelated.

No injuries were reported from the blast at the Royal Air Force's 250-acre administrative base, Stanmore Park, police said.

Two men driving in the area after the explosion were picked up and were being questioned about the blast, a Scotland Yard spokesman said.

Anti-terrorist officers were called to the scene to investigate possible links with other recent terrorist attacks on military bases in Britain.

Floods take 30 lives in Turkey provinces

ANKARA, Turkey (AP) — A flood triggered by a violent rain storm claimed at least 30 lives and left 14 people missing in Turkey's northern provinces, authorities said Thursday.

The seven-hour storm Wednesday swept through the Black Sea coastal provinces of Trabzon and Giresun and hit the province of Gumushane.

Trabzon Governor Enver Hizlan said 27 people died in his province and 14 were missing. The semi-official Anatolia news agency reported.

The floods claimed two lives in Giresun and one in Gumushane. The deaths occurred when people drowned in floodwaters or were buried by landslides.

Rescue teams on Thursday ferried 60 injured people from Akeabat township to Trabzon on the Black Sea, Anatolia said.

Student sets himself afire, hospitalized

SOFIA, Bulgaria (AP) — A student set himself on fire in a city east of Sofia on Thursday to show solidarity with students in the capital who are demanding an investigation into the president's past.

The student was rushed to a hospital in Stara Zagora, about 150 miles east of Sofia, said Bulgarian state radio. It had no other details.

In Sofia, meanwhile, four students at the newly opened University were in their 10th day of a hunger strike, and about 100 students were staging a sit-in protest.

Mandela requests dollars to educate black scholars

If the trains ran on time and Nelson Mandela could risk spending the summer away from historic business in South Africa, he could please everyone by making a whistlestop tour of the 48 mainland states and maybe even fit in overnight flights to Alaska and Hawaii.

But let's be real. The vast majority of American cities won't get to see the deputy chief of the African National Congress this time around. And at 71, given the volatility of the situation in his native land, Mandela may not have the time or the opportunity to visit this country again.

This is no reason to sulk. Instead — to paraphrase the words of another popular leader who wasn't given enough time — we might ask not what Nelson Mandela can do for us, but what we can do for Nelson Mandela.

In Toronto, Mandela asked Canadian students earlier this week for contributions to help black youth in his country to overcome the handicap of an educational system that is now stacked against them.

You'd be correct to say that it is the responsibility of the white minority government in Pretoria.

But in fact, it is a responsibility that has been scandalously shirked.

Despite all the deceptively upbeat talk about the sweeping reforms of President F.W. de Klerk, the apartheid regime continues to allocate five times more money to educate an average white student than it spends on the education of the most gifted black student.

In a nation where only 11 percent of the school-age population is white, a disproportionate 41 percent of the annual budget for education is spent exclusively on that privileged minority.

The ruling Afrikaners may be dismally backward, but they obviously grasp the universal truth of the maxim that knowledge is power.

But even the lopsided budget does not tell the full story of a system that is calculated to deny the power of knowledge to the overwhelming majority.

If South Africa seems to be inching for-

ward in some respects, its schools are actually in decline.

Even in areas where partial integration has been tentatively introduced, segregation of public schools along racial lines remains the law of the land. And there's been no indication that de Klerk plans to change that status quo.

Apologists for Pretoria might point out that some die-hard opponents of mandatory desegregation in the United States have managed to outflank the law by establishing segregated private schools.

In South Africa, however, the opposite is true. There, ironic as it might seem, progressive white parents — and there are some — can give their children the experience of an integrated education if they can afford to send them to private schools.

But if a white student is taught in public school, that learning experience must be strictly segregated. Consequently, as the white population continues to recede, some all-white public schools actually have been forced to close.

To understand how short-sighted the segregation laws are in practice, consider that in Johannesburg, as many as 42 all-white schools may be closed due to falling enrollment, while in Soweto, only 15 miles away, 3,000 black students have been denied access to schools this year because of overcrowding.

Demographic shifts count for nothing as witness the case of Homestead Park. All-white until two years ago, the community is now 70 percent black. Since the only school is restricted to whites only, black students must be bused to an already overcrowded school in another community. So even though the constraints of time prevent him from visiting here, local students and parents may still show what they can do for Nelson Mandela. Your dollars will help Soweto's black scholars!

Idahoans should stand up for the future

It is time for Idahoans to reaffirm the value of our land and our people — what we want in the future for this state, this nation and this earth.

Certainly, as Idahoans, our natural tendency is to focus on our land — the forests to the

north, the mountain ridges, the high desert plain to the south, our incredibly rich farmland. And it is our natural tendency to focus on our people — our neighbors, friends, families and our folks.

But it's just as important to think about other people's places; other people's folks. We need to look at Idaho — and through Idaho, see the world; to look at the world — and through the world, see Idaho.

One billion people in the world live in poverty. One billion people are inadequately housed.

The undernourished of the world number nearly 800 million. Is our planet so barren that we cannot feed and house its people?

Just look around the Magic Valley. Our land is not a barren land.

Each year, while 14 million children die of hunger, the nations of the world spend \$900 billion on their militaries. That is more — each year — than the total income of the poorer half of humankind.

It's not that our world cannot support its people but that governments choose not to. There are 560 soldiers for every 100,000 people on the earth, but only 85 doctors. The world spends \$34,000 preparing a soldier for war — but only \$430 preparing a child for life.

Since 1984, this nation's military budget has been half again as large as all the money we've spent on transportation, energy, law enforcement, agriculture, job training, environment and natural resources, health care and education.

The United States is No. 1 in military expenditures. We have the most nuclear warheads, the biggest and best-equipped Navy, the most combat aircraft.

But while we're No. 1 in the military,

we're No. 5 in literacy, partly — no doubt — because we're No. 20 in the ratio of school-age children to teachers.

While we're No. 1 in the military, we're No. 18 in mortality, partly because we're No. 8 in health care expenditures per capita. Meanwhile, though we are pre-eminent in the highest end of technology, other societies have moved in beneath us and have taken over. Our cars, televisions, machine tools, textiles, shoes, even our watches and our socks are now made elsewhere.

While we're spending \$300 billion a year on our military, we've fallen \$38 billion behind in basic road repair. One in five bridges in America is unsafe.

In the past 10 years, the United States — the richest nation on earth — has gone from the largest creditor nation to the largest debtor nation. And 32.5 million people here in the richest nation on earth live in poverty.

That's the cost we're paying.

But was does this mean in Idaho? To our folks? On our land?

The repaired roads are here, the unsafe bridges are here, the impoverished education system is here.

Our taxes, like the taxes of every American west of the Mississippi, go to pay the interest on our national debt — rather than to provide for people's real needs.

The Air Force wants to take hundreds of thousands of acres of our public land and make it into a bombing range. The Air Force says this will be "cost effective."

We are host to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, and we're told we should welcome the Special Isotope Separation plant because it will create jobs. It will but it will also create weapons-grade plutonium. And it will cost us \$3 billion.

What about the jobs repairing roads and

bridges and school systems? Don't we need those jobs done too? More?

We know that there will be spin-off technology; but if we want to develop laser repair for dental cavities, couldn't we do it directly for less than \$3 billion and skip the plutonium?

We are told we should welcome the New Production Reactor.

It is touted as the first of a new generation of power reactors. But in the present environment, where the military is so vastly more important than energy, the New Production Reactor must produce tritium for bombs to justify its cost. And its cost, because of its military missions, will be vastly higher than it need be.

The Idaho National Engineering Laboratory is called the gem in the crown of the Department of Energy, the cleanest site in the DOE complex. And it is a beautiful site, too.

It lies amidst broad sweeps of sage, dramatic buttes and the flanks of the Lemhi, Blaine and Lost River ranges. The sweet, sweet fragrance of the soil rises when it first begins to rain.

And beneath it all flows the drinking water for over a quarter of all Idahoans, for over a quarter of our folks.

But the bill to reverse the environmental damage to this beautiful place is over \$2 billion. Couldn't our money and resources have been better spent? Shouldn't they have been?

Of course they should. And that's where the good news comes in because that's where the future comes in — the future of our land, our country and our world. We can change the way we treat them.

Americans have incredible access to our government, and the people of our sparsely-populated state have even more access than most.

We can tell our government, starting now in our Centennial year, that we value our people and our land more than we do more bombs. — We can tell our government that we are no longer willing to pay the cost.

Don't play politics with flag

The flag amendment, which attacks the heart of our Bill of Rights, is far more obscene than any puny protestor with a lighter. As our Supreme Court says, "punishing desecration of the flag dilutes the very freedom that makes this emblem so revered."

One can only hope that the Republican Party is above playing politics with our flag. But don't hold your breath. It takes less effort to follow the winds of misguided patriotism than to stand tall and support our Bill of Rights, which — if you think about it — is what has allowed our flag to wave so proudly these so many years.

Pro-life group pickets governor

POCATELLO (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus, appearing before the Association of Idaho Cities' annual conference in Pocatello, was again dogged by picketers protesting his March 30 veto of an anti-abortion bill.

About a dozen members of Portneuf Right to Life marched outside Thursday's meeting, where Andrus continued his Democratic campaign for re-election with a speech to local leaders.

"Pro-life people crafted the bill, a pro-life Legislature passed it and a self-proclaimed pro-life governor vetoed it," said Debbie Robertson, president of Portneuf Right to Life. "We are here to show our displeasure of the veto and we will picket him every time he comes to Pocatello."

Man sought in case of missing couple

IDAHO CITY (AP) — The manager of a lodge near Idaho City is being sought for questioning in the disappearance of a Boise couple.

Witnesses said Ed Palmer left Clear Creek Lodge the afternoon of May 22, two days after the disappearance of David Middlemist and Cathy Enoch. "He (Palmer) left about a day after the people were reported missing, and we'd like to ask him if he knows anything about it. (Enoch) was a little curious as to why he left," Boise County Sheriff Craig Landers said Wednesday night.

Police said they are baffled by the disappearance of Middlemist, 24, and Enoch, 21. Their families fear they were kidnapped.

Nez Perce considering big-time bingo

LEWISTON (AP) — High-stakes bingo may be offered in August on the Nez Perce Indian Reservation as part of a tribal experiment with gaming. But tribal leaders are concerned about a federal review of their gaming rights.

Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan "made a mistake" in instructing his chief attorney to review a controversial legal opinion saying Idaho's Indian tribes can operate gaming, Charles H. (Pete) Hayes, Nez Perce Tribal Executive Committee chairman, said Wednesday.

Still, Hayes said, "I don't think it affects our plans to continue the process."

Pocatello man to head state bureau

BOISE (AP) — Duane R. Higer, Pocatello, has been appointed to head the Idaho Bureau of Occupational Licensing.

Gov. Cecil Andrus announced the appointment. Higer until May of this year was director of geriatric services at Blinnock Regional Medical Center, Pocatello. Higer replaces Marvin Gregerson, Boise, who has resigned effective July 1.

Salmonella reported in Panhandle

COEUR-D'ALENE (AP) — Eight cases of salmonella have been confirmed by the Panhandle Health District in the last week, including five among restaurant workers; a health official says.

Two employees at the Flying J Travel Plaza in Post Falls and one worker each from the Coeur d'Alene Resort, Cedars Floating Restaurant and Log Cabin restaurant, all in Coeur d'Alene, have been diagnosed with the disease, said Steve McMillan, a health district spokesman. The other three cases don't involve restaurant workers, he said Wednesday.

California teen charged with murder

LEWISTON (AP) — A California teen-ager will face first-degree murder charges for the stabbing death of a Lewiston man last week.

Richard Brewer, 17, of San Bernardino, was charged in Magistrate Court in Lewiston on Wednesday in connection with the death of 30-year-old Logan Hollingsworth.

Strong Gem economy fuels another surplus

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's economic strength, greater than state officials anticipated even five months ago, has guaranteed a third straight multi-million-dollar cash surplus in the state treasury.

The latest financial update from the Andrus administration, the last to be issued before the current budget year ends June 30, showed tax receipts through May running \$27.6 million ahead of expectations for the first 11 months of the revenue year. The most solid growth was in the critical areas of personal-income and sales taxes.

Weaker-than-projected performances in the corporate income tax and interest earnings on invested state funds will probably trim that surplus somewhat by month's end, analysts said.

But, they added, "The outlook for June collections suggests that a year-end revenue surplus of approximately \$25 million remains very likely."

Should that forecast hold, tax revenues would hit \$859 million, \$90.5 million more than collected the previous year. That would translate into an 11.8 percent revenue increase over the previous

year, which saw a 13.9 percent hike over the year before that.

"Idaho's strong economy is evidenced by impressive job creation, rising income levels, strong construction, manufacturing and trade sectors and solid demand for Idaho natural resource products, especially agricultural products," Key Bank economist Jeff Thredgold said.

The cash windfall comes despite the decision of legislators and the Andrus administration in January to dramatically increase their projections for tax receipts to cash in on the economy's strength.

It is the third straight year that those revenue projections, on which the state spending is based, have fallen short of actual receipts. A year ago, the tax structure produced an unexpected \$46.5 million windfall and the year before that the unanticipated surplus totaled \$11.9 million.

"The Idaho economy has performed extremely well over the past few months, a continuation of the stronger growth pace of the past few years," Thredgold said. "Continuing growth is likely as a

result of strong demand for Idaho products."

The economic vibrance, though not spread evenly throughout the state, was underscored by the latest construction report, which showed commercial building permits in May at their second-highest monthly total in more than a year and total residential and commercial construction permits up over 57 percent from a year earlier.

Commercial construction activity last month hit \$28.1 million statewide, pushing the total for the first five months of the year to about \$65 million. Residential construction permits for the month hit nearly \$48 million, reflecting the shift away from commercial development that fueled record construction last year.

The administration's latest economic outlook showed the strongest revenue growth in the individual income tax, a key indicator of the state's underlying economic strength. Through May, collections, primarily from payroll withholding, were running \$19.2 million ahead of the forecast, and analysts predicted further strength in that area.

Convicted slayer decides to continue his appeals

BOISE (AP) — Condemned killer Federico Paz, who earlier asked that his appeals be dropped and officials proceed with his execution, now says he has changed his mind and wants to fight his murder conviction.

"I got very discouraged waiting for a decision on my appeal and got mentally upset," Paz said a statement filed with the Idaho Supreme Court on Wednesday. "This is why I wrote to this court saying I wanted to dismiss my appeal and just be executed."

The Idaho Supreme Court last week upheld his conviction and death sentence nearly three years after Paz shot a man to death in a Canyon

County cafe and more than two years after 3rd District Judge Dennis Goff sentenced him to death.

Through his attorney, Van Bishop of Nampa, Paz asked the high court to withdraw his request to stop appeals.

Paz, 31, earlier sent Canyon County authorities a handwritten note saying he wanted to drop his appeals, and earlier this year filed the same request with the Supreme Court.

However, his latest message from Death Row to the Supreme Court says he did that without consulting his attorney, and after talking to Bishop and his brother decided to let his appeal take its normal course.

Panel reduces list of mediators for talks on Idaho wilderness

BOISE (AP) — A special panel of industry sportsmen and environmental interests has trimmed the list of potential mediators for the proposed Idaho wilderness negotiations to three.

The eight-member panel will interview the finalists on July 9 before making its recommendation to the loosely formed group of interests that have agreed to take a chance on the state Legislature's plan to resolve the long-running controversy over additional wilderness through mediation negotiations.

The mediation finalists are the Pepperdine School of Law and the

Mediation Institute, both in California, and the Conflict Management Project at Harvard University in Massachusetts.

The panel, which reviewed mediation proposals from eight organizations, will recommend its top selection to the others involved in the wilderness debate, but the final selection was expected to be a consensus of all the parties, officials said.

The Legislative Council has the responsibility for legally hiring the mediator, but House Speaker Tom Boyd, R-Genesee, has said the Council will simply rubber-stamp the group's recommendation.

Wolves killed after escaping from park zoo

POCATELLO (AP) — Two timber wolves were shot and killed after escaping from their pen at Pocatello's Ross Park zoo, officials say.

Zoo director Ray England said the animals "were destroyed Tuesday morning" after attacking a coyote through the screen of its cage. The coyote later died of its injuries.

Pocatello police determined Thursday that the escape was the result of an "internal problem at the zoo," a department spokesman said.

England said he got a call at his home from an employee about 7 a.m. Tuesday that the wolves, a male and a female, were at large in the zoo compound. He decided to kill the animals with high-powered rifles, rather than tranquilizing them, because their "flight distance" was too great.

"Flight distance is a term we use to indicate the distance between an animal and another animal or human, which would cause it to take some action," England said.

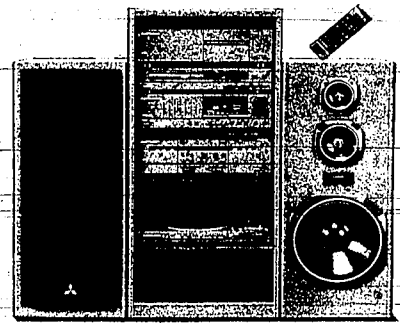

Judge Hart to handle the Charboneau case

TWIN FALLS — 5th District Judge Phillip M. Becker has appointed Judge J. William Hart of Rupert to the Jaimi Charboneau murder case, Charboneau's attorney said Thursday.

Becker removed himself from the case Wednesday in response to a motion from Charboneau's attorney, M. Lynn Dunlap. Although Dunlap had requested the Idaho Supreme Court appoint the new judge, Becker made the decision in his capacity as the 5th District's administrative judge. Hart was one of the three available district judges.

Dunlap said Thursday that he has "a wealth of respect" for Hart and has not decided yet whether to contest the appointment.

Charboneau, 30, faces resentencing for the 1984 first-degree murder of his former wife. Becker sentenced him to death in 1986, but Idaho Supreme Court overturned it, and that decision was upheld by the U.S. Supreme Court. A resentencing hearing is scheduled for Aug. 8.

The publication uses photographs, poetry and transcripts of oral history tapes to present a collective portrait of a rural Idaho Community and is at the Shoshone Public Library.

Lujan OKs Fort Hall water rights proposal

WASHINGTON — Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan has given the federal government's approval to proposed settlement of Indian water rights on the Fort Hall Reservation of eastern Idaho.

"This agreement is significant in that it is the first Indian water rights settlement for the state and the Bush administration," Lujan said.

"It also can serve as a model for other Indian water rights negotiations in progress across the country."

The state, federal government and the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes have been negotiating for five years on Snake River water rights. It's part of a massive attempt to sort out water rights in the Snake River Basin and plan for the future.

Lujan noted that the Fort Hall agreement still has several hurdles to clear. The state is working on court adjudication of all Snake River water rights, a process that is expected to take several more years.

The agreement also must be approved by Congress, the tribes and the Idaho Legislature. Lujan called it a victory for the Shoshone-Bannocks, local non-Indian water users and the state.

"I am especially pleased that the settle-

ment was achieved without committing the federal government to any economically or environmentally unjustifiable water development projects," the Interior secretary said.

Under the agreement, the tribes will be decreed a firm water supply from surface and groundwater of 581,031 acre-feet per year. The tribes have the option to market about 130,000 acre-feet annually of storage space in Palisades and American Falls reservoirs, both in eastern Idaho.

Of this storage water, about 84,000 acre feet stored in the Palisades Reservoir may be rented out anywhere within Idaho above Milner Dam. About 47,000 acre feet stored in American Falls Reservoir may be rented out anywhere in Idaho.

The American Falls water could be rented to irrigators, to generate power at low minimum stream flows. Though it could only be rented for one use, it could, by the nature of water transport, in fact fulfill all those functions.

Potential customers for that water include Idaho Power Co. If it were to rent all

Andrus tells lawmen he'll be tough on crime

TWIN FALLS — Although he has been rebuffed twice by the Idaho Legislature, Gov. Cecil Andrus kicked off the summer campaign season with a pledge to continue to push for mandatory sentences for child sex abusers.

During a luncheon speech to the Idaho Peace Officers Association Thursday, Andrus turned child sex abuse into a campaign issue by suggesting his Republican opponent is soft on sentencing abusers and calling the Idaho House Judiciary and Rules Committee "that great black hole" from where mandatory sentencing proposals for drug, alcohol and child abuse never return.

"You know that I have supported mandatory minimum sentences for child abusers," Andrus told the officers. "My opponent disagrees with me on this and I'll just leave it for him to explain why."

Andrus said his opponent, former state Sen. Roger Fairchild, should also explain why he voted against a bill that would make it a felony in Idaho to solici-

it sex from a minor.

The governor said the annual meeting of the state's law enforcement professionals as a chance to repeat his call for tougher penalties for drunken drivers. He said he'll urge the Legislature to pass a law requiring drunken drivers to lose driving privileges for at least 30 days upon the first conviction. A bill proposing mandatory jail sentence suspension was killed by the House Judiciary and Rules Committee last year.

"We must get the drunk driver from behind the wheel and keep them off the highway," Andrus said. "The tragic toll in death and injury is too high a price to pay."

The governor said he'll also fight to retain the Crime Victim's Compensation Fund, which has distributed \$900,000 since 1986 to victims of crimes.

On the war against drugs, Andrus distributed for state and local law enforcement agencies this year. But he did not talk about the fact that members of

Hansen board approves 7 percent teachers' raise

HANSEN — The Hansen School District Board has approved a 7% percent pay raise for teachers as part of a \$1.2 million budget for the 1990-91 school year.

The \$195,581 general fund portion of the budget includes pay raises for other personnel, said Superintendent Richard Smith.

The general fund will cost taxpayers almost \$40 for every \$10,000 of property value — \$1.91 more than last year. Total tax assessments for the district will be \$51.62 per \$10,000 property value for 1990-91 — a 6-cent increase over last year.

This will be the final year of a three-year tax levy intended to raise funds for improvements to district buildings.

The budget allows about \$35,500 for building maintenance and improvements. Partitions for the elementary school library, wall coverings in the computer room, roof repairs and stripping and waxing the gym floor are included. The budget hearing was held Monday night prior to the board's regular monthly meeting.

The school expects approximately \$15,000 income from lottery ticket sales for next year's budget, Smith said.

In other business, the board tabled its proposed "drug policy" until "next month" when two new members will be seated. "I feel it does meet minimum standards required by the federal government," Trustee Jeanne Smith said of the policy. But the new trustees should be included in the development and approval of the new policy, she said.

The policy contains requirements for both staff and students. It states that the schools will be drug free and it outlines consequences of violations.

The policy will be explained to teachers at a meeting in the fall—if it is adopted, Smith said.

Federal law requires all schools to adopt drug-free policies by this fall. The board intends to again offer the hot lunch program again. School officials said they expect no increase in lunch costs. High school students pay 90 cents per meal; an elementary student lunch costs 80 cents.

Old No. 8444 ready to roll into Shoshone

SHOSHONE — When the Union Pacific Railroad's Centennial Special steam engine No. 844 puffs and hisses into Shoshone June 29, it will be just like old times.

Shoshone, the oldest town in the Magic Valley south of the Wood River Valley, sprang to life in 1882 as a railroad construction camp and has been host to the "railroad main" line ever since.

Crop duster unhurt in crash; chemical danger minimal

JEROME — A crop duster walked away from potential disaster Thursday afternoon when his plane crashed in a field southwest of Jerome.

The acrid, chemical odor of spilled pesticide drifted in the afternoon air after Mark Walters' bright yellow Grumman Ag-Cat crashed in the field he had been spraying.

The plane came in low over the trees, then dropped down over the field south of a line of trees, witnesses said.

"That damn plane wasn't running right either," said Charlie Hillman, who heard the plane go over his house just before it crashed.

Apparently the pilot got too low or misjudged his height in the afternoon heat and failed to clear the canal bank, Sgt. Gerald Brant of the Jerome County Sheriff's Office said.

When the plane hit the ground the motor and chemical tank sheared off and the wings broke off

jumped in the canal and washed himself off."

Walters then walked to a nearby house where he took a shower and waited for the ambulance.

Brant did not know where the ambulance took Walters.

Walters had been spraying Barrett McClure's barley field for Russian aphids with Cygon — an American Cyanamid Co. concoction of the pesticide dimethoate.

McClure said he had no idea how much of the field had been sprayed.

Brant said his only worry was keeping people away from the wreck to avoid possible contamination by the spilled pesticide. But there appeared no danger of the chemical reaching the canal.

"I think there's no threat at all," said state pesticide inspector Jim Jurgens. The wreckage was well away from the nearby irrigation canal, maybe 300 feet.

The pesticide tank appeared to be empty, he said after a cursory inspection of the wreck.

"We license these guys, make sure its all used the right way," Jurgens said.

Walters could not be reached Thursday evening.

Candidate Echohawk says he'll bring people together

TWIN FALLS — When Larry Echohawk decided to run for the Legislature in an affluent, Republican Bannock County district, people thought an American Indian Democrat couldn't win.

And now that Echohawk is a candidate for the Idaho Attorney General's office, people are warning him the state may not be ready to put an American Indian Democrat into that important office.

He thinks they're wrong. "I don't know how this Indian issue is going to play out," Echohawk said during an interview Thursday. "But I think if I'm elected, people are going to be pleased."

Echohawk, 41, was born in Cody, Wyo., educated at Stanford and Brigham

Young universities, and came to Idaho in 1978 to become general counsel for the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes.

Given the present controversy involving tribal gaming as well as past disputes over water, hunting and fishing rights, Echohawk said his experience representing the Sho-Ban tribe will help him to be an attorney general who can bring warring groups together.

"It's not going to be the fox guarding the chicken coop," Echohawk said. "I want to resolve these issues so that it is right for all the people in the state."

He is against allowing high-stakes gambling on Indian reservations. But the question is one of federal, not state authority, Echohawk said. As attorney general, Echohawk said he could only sit down with federal authorities and attempt to

Rupert considering limiting U-turns

RUPERT — City officials discussed several traffic changes with the City Council this week, including a proposed prohibition on U-turns on F Street and G Street.

Council members heard the first reading of a new ordinance that will prohibit drivers from making a left-hand turn to angle park on the opposite side of the street.

Signs will be posted in areas specified in the ordinance, which are F Street, from the corner of Roper's Department Store to the post office, and G Street in front of the courthouse.

On another traffic matter, Councilman Ronald Klebe said he will continue studying a possible installation of railroad crossing arms at the 6th Street and F Street intersection.

Councilman Joel Rogers expressed concern about the distance from the crossing — 1,500 feet — at which a train would trigger the arms to lower.

of the 47,000 acre feet, that water could have a potential worth of \$26 per acre foot by the time it ran through all of the utility's power plants at the most critical time in late summer, or a total of \$1,175,000.

An acre foot of water normally sells for about \$2.75. If the 47,000 acre feet were released at a constant rate, it would flow at less than 100 cubic feet per second.

Other possible candidates for the

rented water include the Bonneville Power Administration, which in conjunction with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, might be interested in the water to release flow to move young salmon and steelhead to the ocean.

The federal government will put up \$7 million over the next 20 years to encourage the tribes to develop a water code and modernize its water management system.

Mechanisms are provided to resolve conflicts between Indian and

non-Indian users, provide a way for non-Indians to purchase tribal water during dry periods, and allow lease agreements to contract for nearly 100,000 acre-feet annually of storage space in Bureau of Reclamation projects without assuming construction costs for those projects.

The Fort Hall Reclamation was created 123 years ago by presidential order and covers more than 540,000 acres in Power, Bannock, Bingham and Caribou counties.

Jerome pool repair might cost less

JEROME — The Jerome City Council learned this week that repairs to the municipal swimming pool could cost a lot less than originally budgeted.

The new liner is not required, Councilmen Don Jacobson and Rocky Jackson told the other councilmen. That knocked about \$40,000 off the expected \$83,000 repair bill, they said.

Mayor Gerald Ostler asked the council to find a way of financing the remaining \$43,000. He said he had contacted West One Bank to discuss the possibility of a bond election.

New Idaho Department of Health and Welfare said the city will require the city to improve showers at the pool, Jackson said.

The council approved payment of one bill for \$7,378 for pool equipment and supplies.

The council also discussed leasing parking space from the Union Pacific Railroad Co. to ease some of the town's resident truck drivers who have traditionally parked on city streets.

Police Chief George Silver III said any agreement with the company would require the city to pay applicable taxes and monitor contents of parked trucks for hazardous waste, chemicals and explosives — none of which could be allowed in the area.

Andrus files his financial report

BOISE (AP) — With additional contributions of more than \$56,000 in less than a month, Democrat Gov. Cecil Andrus saw the bankroll in his bid for an unprecedented fourth term swell to almost \$537,000 by June 1.

And despite spending \$98,300 during the same period — including \$80,000 paid to a Washington, D.C.-based media consultant — a campaign finance report filed with the secretary of state's office late Thursday showed Andrus still had more than \$283,400 cash on hand.

The governor, who had almost \$337,000 in his war chest at the start of the year, reported receiving more than \$200,000 in contributions and spending more than \$253,500 through the first five months of 1990.

Former state Senate majority leader Roger Fairchild of Fruitland, the Republican who won the right to challenge Andrus in last month's three-way GOP primary, had not yet submitted his 30-day post-primary finance report.

But in the last filing before the May 22 primary, Fairchild reported using \$90,000 of his and his wife's money to finance his campaign. He had received only \$6,400 in contributions through May 6 and reported \$88,000 in expenses.

According to Andrus' new report, his contributions from May 7 to June 1 came from 170 individuals, organizations and businesses, some of which already were among 1,200 the earlier contributors to the governor's campaign.

Echohawk, who was listed by Esquire Magazine in 1984 as among the "Best of the New Generation," has been required to defend his Pawnee heritage throughout his position.

He said he's tired of talking about it — the focus of his campaign against Republican Patrick Kole is Echohawk's ability to be an effective lawyer for the state of Idaho.

"He's concerned about preserving Idaho's water, bringing salmon and steelhead back to Idaho and winning the drug war."

"I'm not going to give away our water," Echohawk said. "I would fight as hard as Pat Kole would fight."

Echohawk wants to be judged for his record. He said he was judged "Best Freshman Legislator" in 1983, not because he pushed Indian issues, but because he fought for increased funding for education.

During his four-year stint as Bannock County prosecutor, Echohawk said he has fought to put violent criminals in jail.

He supports the death penalty and tougher penalties — for drunk drivers and child sex abusers.

"Yet, during a speech to members of the Idaho Peace Officers Association Thursday, Echohawk introduced himself by focusing on his American Indian heritage."

He spoke of his great-grandfather, a Pawnee who was the first Echohawk. "Hawk" is a symbol of a quiet warrior, Echohawk explained.

"Grandfather didn't talk about his accomplishments... but others did," he said.

And Echohawk ended his law-and-order address by returning to his proud ancestors.

"I hope that my great-grandfather would not be disappointed that I've talked about these things," he said. "I just want to let you know where I stand."

Tarkanian, NCAA still not friendly

LOS ANGELES — John Wooden called to congratulate him.

"John said it was one of the better performances he'd ever seen by a college basketball team."

Bobby Knight also called recently. "Knight said he didn't call right after the tournament because he knew everybody else would be phoning me. He said we were the best college team he'd ever seen."

Considering the plaudits he is receiving from coaching peers and the universal acclaim he has been getting for UNLV's 30-point victory over Duke in the NCAA championship basketball game, these should be days of wine and roses for Jerry Tarkanian.

But they aren't.
"I've never seen him more down than he is now," says son Danny, a former UNLV point guard and currently a Las Vegas lawyer. "He'll be '60' in August and he should be enjoying himself for what he's accomplished. But this thing just keeps hanging over him."

"This thing" is the National Collegiate Athletic Association's 13-year pursuit of Tarkanian, a case that may finally be resolved when the UNLV coach appears before the NCAA's infractions committee Saturday in Overland Park, Kan.

In 1979, the NCAA ordered UNLV to suspend Tarkanian for two years. The school complied, but Nevada coaches blocked the move with a permanent injunction, citing the failure of the NCAA to afford the coach constitutional due process.

In 1988, the U.S. Supreme Court held that the NCAA was a private organization and wasn't covered by the constitutional due-process requirement.

But the Supreme Court protected Tarkanian by letting the Nevada injunction stand.

The hearing this week deals only with the 1979 court case, "Tarkanian says."

1990 Ore-Ida turns into 633-mile ordeal

SANDPOINT — The Ore-Ida Women's Challenge gone mad begins its 17-day odyssey across Idaho today.

The seven-year-old event, which started as a six-stage mountain road race between Boise and Sun Valley, has expanded into a 663-mile Tour de Idaho this summer.

The 1990 Ore-Ida Women's Challenge Centennial Tour of Idaho starts here today and ends in Boise July 8.

It will visit every corner of Idaho and 29 of the state's 44 counties in the process.

The Magic Valley's run comes on Saturday, July 7, in the second-to-last leg of the race, the 63-mile Clear Springs Trout-Magic Valley Road Race from Burley to Buhl via U.S. Highway 30.

The Ore-Ida will also make its traditional stop in the Wood River Valley —

the Elkhorn Circuit Race.

Ketchum serves as the terminus for the most arduous leg of the challenge, the climb up 8,701-foot Galena Summit in the 55-mile stage race from Stanley.

This mega-tour is probably a one-shot deal, longer by eight days than any previous Ore-Ida race.

Although Ore-Ida pays most of the expenses and sponsors like Clear Springs Trout Co. and Intermountain Gas undertake individual stages, corporate sponsorship of big-time women's cycling is waning.

Gone is the impressive roster of big-name backers of the 17 teams that will participate.

Most of sponsors this time are local companies, sporting goods vendors and bicycle shops.

But if corporate funding has diminished, the quality of cyclists willing to undertake this ordeal — 23,318 feet of vertical relief — has not declined.

Three former champions return, including 1987 winner Inga Thompson, a two-time, third-place finisher in the women's Tour de France, and 1988 Ore-Ida champ Katrin Tobin, a former Ketchum resident who raced with the U.S. national team that won the women's Tour de France two years ago.

Tobin, who now lives in Palo Alto, Calif., will ride with long-time teammate Runtel "Matties" of Ketchum on the Oh, Idaho-Janet Knell-McCloud Realty team.

Defending Ore-Ida champion Lisa Brambani, a Briton who now lives in Boise, will race with the Weight Watchers team, while Thompson, a Reno, Nev., resident, will compete with the Cal-Neva-Reno Wheelmen.

Also in the field is reigning world junior champion Duke Domet, riding with the Richardson Bike Mart-Sugoi foursome.

Flutie travels to Vancouver for meeting

BOSTON — Doug Flutie headed to Vancouver Thursday to meet with Joe Kapp about the possibility of playing for the British Columbia Lions of the CFL.

Flutie, released by the NFL's New England Patriots after going unclaimed as a Plan B free agent, hopes to continue his career in Canada. But his agent, Randy Vataha, has been unable to reach agreement on a contract or convince Kapp, the Lions' general manager, to trade Flutie's rights to another CFL team.

Kapp, who signed former West Virginia quarterback Major Harris, claimed he had been unable to meet with Flutie, face-to-face, prompting a trip West by the 1984 Heisman Trophy winner from Boston Col-

lege and his wife, Laurie.

"The two sides will meet on Friday, with a news conference planned in the morning, a team spokesman said.

"We have no problem with that, so we made plans for Doug and his wife to fly out there and spend time," said Bob Woolf, Flutie's attorney. "If he decides he wants to play with British Columbia, fine. But they also had to agree that if Doug didn't want to play there, the team would have to trade his rights."

Woolf insisted that Lions coach Larry Kuharich had agreed to the stipulation, which Kapp was able to get Kuharich, a Boston College graduate, had previously coached the Calgary Stampers, and had expressed an interest in Flutie as recently as last year.

"I've told Doug to go out there with an open mind," Woolf said. "I think his only apprehension is that it's so far away, and he's so family oriented. And this is a little disturbing to him."

Flutie, 27, has insisted that Harris' presence on the Lions has little bearing on what he decides.

"I do think it doesn't make sense for me to be on the same team with Major Harris. I think both of us can bring more exposure to the league, so why put us on the same team?" he said.

Even after winning the Heisman Trophy, the 5-foot-9 Flutie was constantly questioned about his size being a factor in making it as a pro.

Shortly after winning the Heisman Trophy, Flutie signed with the New Jersey Generals of the United States Football League.

PGA host club has no black members

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP) — The country club playing host to the 1990 PGA Championship will not be forced into accepting blacks as members, its founder said.

Hall Thompson said Shoal Creek Country Club's members include Jews, women, Lebanese and Italians — but no blacks.

The country club is our home and we pick and choose who we want," he said.

Thompson said blacks played at Shoal Creek during the 1984 PGA Championship, and black caddies are allowed to play on Mondays, when the course is closed to members.

Officials with the Professional Golfers Association of America said it is a club found to discriminate racially it could affect a decision to hold a future PGA events there.

But the 1990 tournament will go ahead as planned.

"This was not a point in 1984," PGA president Pat Rielly said in a phone interview from Pasadena, Calif. "This has become a point, or issue, in the last two years."

HUMPHREY, N.Y. (AP) — The New York Jets hired Ron Wolf as Director of Player Personnel on Thursday.

Wolf joins New York after 12 years in charge of player personnel operations with the Oakland-Los Angeles Raiders.

He replaces Mike Hickey, who held the job for 13 years and was let go following the Jets 4-12 mark in 1989.

"IAC said it had been extremely solid credentials having been in pro football since 1963, not only as a personnel director, but as a general manager and league administrator," New York general manager Dick Steinberg said.

Cold medicine threat to ex-Olympian

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Taking an over-the-counter cold medicine for flu last winter may cost him his long jumping career; four-time Olympian Larry Myricks says.

Myricks, currently serving a three-month suspension for using a banned substance during the 1990 Mobil Outdoor Track and Field Championships, has tested positive at two other meets. The Athletics Congress said Thursday in Indianapolis.

"IAC said it had been notified by the International Amateur Athletic Federation, the world governing body for the sport, that Myricks tested positive for the stimulant phenylpropranolamine at a meet in Hamilton, Ontario, on Jan. 12 and at a meet in Seville, Spain, on Feb. 17.

Phenylpropranolamine, a decongestant, is found in cold relief products and is available without a prescription.

Borg's home may be sold for tax debt

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — Former tennis superstar Bjorn Borg's elegant seaside home will be seized and sold to the highest bidder if he doesn't pay more than \$1 million within a month, court officials said Thursday.

Hafth visited Borg's home in a Stockholm suburb Wednesday to assess its value. "They were not let in because nobody was home," said Bjorn Edgren, a senior court official.

Borg reportedly was in Italy to watch World Cup soccer action with his Italian wife, Loredana.

He was given an extension until July 20 to pay the debt.

"If that we can use a locksmith," Edgren said. The house would then be sold at auction.

The \$1.1 million debt owed by Borg's former business partner Lars Skarke was personally guaranteed by the 1970s-era tennis star. Skarke was managing director of Borg's clothing company that collapsed last year.

Irwin continues to ride high with 66 in Buick Classic

HARRISON, N.Y. (AP) — After a successful tryout in Medinah, Ill., Hale Irwin brought his high-five act to the Big Apple.

It was another smash hit. Just as he did last week after a 72nd-hole birdie in the U.S. Open, Irwin romped over to the ropes restraining the gallery and slapped high-fives with spectators around the sixth tee at the Westchester Country Club on Thursday.

"This is the Big Apple. You have to play to the gallery," the usually restrained, conservative Irwin said of his sudden flair of showmanship.

This time his gallop was in celebra-

tion of a hole-in-one — a wedge that flew a few feet beyond the flag and spun back into the cup.

"Why not?" Irwin shrugged in feigned nonchalance. "A routine, 112-yard pitching wedge shot into the hole."

The ace was the centerpiece of a 5-under-par 66 in the first round of the Buick Classic that left the new U.S. Open champion one stroke behind rookie leader Kirk Triplett.

Irwin was tied for second with Brian McCallister, Buddy Gardner and Bill Britton.

Andy North, a two-time U.S. Open winner, led a group at 67 that

also included Paul Azinger, Craig Stadler, Jay Haas, Larry Rinker, Pat McGowan and Fred Funk.

"Obviously there's a very positive carry-over from last week," said Irwin, who acquired his third U.S. Open title Monday in a 19-hole playoff over Mike Donald, who had a 70 on Thursday.

"I'm kind of riding a hot streak," Irwin understated.

But there's also a fatigue factor involved in the wake of his emotionally draining Open triumph, he said.

"I haven't been sleeping much since the Open. I'm still keyed up from the thrill of a lifetime. When I

went to the tee today, I wasn't ready to play golf," Irwin, 45, said.

"And right after the turn, I kind of lost my concentration for a while. I'm just not able to concentrate like I did last week."

Those mental lapses led to a pair of bogeys.

"Sixteen of the day's play from the 10th tee, he found a bunker and was unable to get up and down. The same thing happened nine holes later.

In between, however, he hit irons inside of six feet on four holes and birdied them all.

Mandela dances, thanks religious community for support

NEW YORK (AP) — Nelson Mandela broke into spontaneous dance Thursday during a church service that brought religious leaders of all faiths together, and then headed to rallies in Harlem and at the House that Ruth built.

The invitation-only service at Riverside Church was anything but solemn as participants danced in the aisles to the beat of African drumming.

Caught up in the fervor, the 71-year-old freedom fighter merrily waved his clenched and raised fist and bopped to the crowd's rhythmic clapping after the African National Congress choir finished singing its anthem.

Addressing the congregation, the ANC leader invited longtime supporters to "Come home to claim their rightful role in the re-creation of a new South Africa," and thanked the religious community for its continuous aid.

"When our cause was not a popular cause in the corridors of power in Western nations, it was

religious communities, college and university campuses and anti-apartheid organizations that stood firm on economic sanctions," Mandela said.

"I am here today to say 'Thank you,'" Mandela, accompanied by his wife, Winnie, was scheduled to take his anti-apartheid message to the people later Thursday with outdoor rallies in Harlem and the 55,000-seat Yankee Stadium, which organizers said was sold out.

At the church, Mandela, who was released Feb. 11 from a South African prison after serving 27 years for anti-apartheid activities, told the crowd of about 2,000 that they were entering the final phase of their struggle for black equality.

But he also cautioned that "the age of freedom has not yet dawned" and that to lift economic sanctions against the white-minority South African government now would "plunge us back into the darkness from which our country is painfully struggling to emerge."

Before the rallies, Mandela appeared on a local radio show, met with the editorial board of The New York Times and taped a "town meeting" with Ted Koppel, which was to be aired Thursday night on ABC-TV.

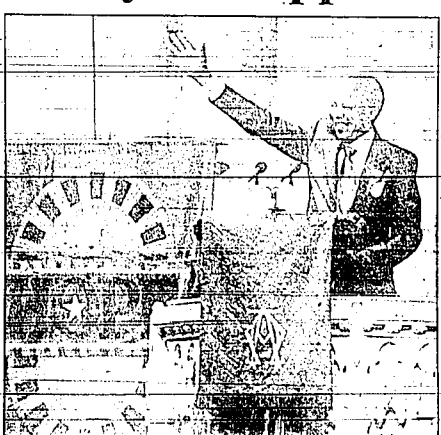
During the Koppel show, former Reagan administration official Kenneth Adelman asked Mandela why he supported Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat, Cuban President Fidel Castro and Libyan strongman Moammar Gadhafi.

"One of the mistakes the Western world makes is to think that their enemies should be our enemies," Mandela replied, to the audience's loud approval. "We have our own struggle."

He added that Arafat, Gadhafi and Castro "support our struggle to the hilt. There is no reason whatsoever we should have any hesitation about their commitment to human rights in South Africa. They are placing resources at our disposal to win the struggle."

Mandela told the gathering sponsored by the National Council of Churches, "the nation's largest ecumenical organization."

Mandela asked church leaders to keep up pressure on the South African government.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

BOBBY WOLFF

Ask 10 of your friends to play today's slam, and be prepared for some shocking results. While the correct line of play ensures 12 tricks, a bookmaker will quote odds of 3-1 against any five of the 10 making the slam.

Those who go down see two shots at their slam. First, try the hearts since any 2-2 break will work. If that fails, there's still the chance that the diamond finesse will work.

The play goes quickly. Win the spade ace and lead a low heart to dummy's jack and East's king. East exits in diamonds, and when that finesse loses, the slam goes down one.

Absymal luck to be sure, but a prudent safety play in the heart suit brings its own luck.

At trick two, instead of leading a heart to dummy's jack, South wins dummy's ace and leads a low heart back to his queen. If East wins, the rest is easy, so East ducks. West's discard reveals the bad heart break, but South has a safe diamond finesse into the West hand. It loses, but that doesn't matter. East's heart king remains stranded, and South scores a safe 12 tricks.

Duo's music echoes around the world

USO tour takes local couple on tour of military bases in Pacific

TWIN FALLS — Eleven years ago, Rick Kuhn's VW camper broke down in Twin Falls during a six-month cross-country trip. The Connecticut native figured he'd stick around long enough to earn the \$1,000 or so he'd need for a new engine; then he'd be on his way.

But he found Idaho to his liking, and he's still here. In 1982, he married Mary Rice of Buhl, and a few years later, they started performing together.

Today they make a full-time living with their music, playing locally and elsewhere in the West as the Echols.

But the Kuhns have also been heard halfway around the world. Last winter and spring, they were part of a USO tour of the Orient, where they plan to return for three more months of performances beginning this October.

Until the tour, "we'd never gone out of the country," says Rick. "Alaska was the most exotic place we'd gone," adds Mary.

The Kuhns traveled to Okinawa, Japan, Korea, the Philippines and Guam for five months as part of the Seattle-based Bobby McGee Show. They left the United States the first week of December and returned the last week of April.

Mary and Rick met McGee and his band when the latter played The Alley (now Honker's Place) several years ago.

The groups kept in touch, and last summer McGee — whose band has played USO tours of duty for years — invited the Kuhns to join him on his group's next overseas

The ensemble played at Air Force bases, meeting and performing for American military personnel as well as the many local civilians who work at the bases. The Kuhns said they hadn't realized how many Americans were serving overseas, and how lonely many of them are.

On the bases, there are few radio and television stations, and live music is really a treat for the service personnel. "They were a little bit more appreciative than peo-

ple-in-the-civilian world," and a bit more well-behaved, too, said Rick.

The Kuhns had a few nervous moments overseas. When they arrived in the Philippines, communist rebels had bombed the presidential palace just a few weeks before, and American soldiers had been targets of violence, too.

While in Guam, they lived through a typhoon, but they also enjoyed 80-degree temperatures in January. "Basically, it was a very peaceful and nice trip," says Mary.

U.S. film industry likes to dream about sleepers

After the experts espouse, the analysts anticipate and the handicappers huddle, there occurs a Hollywood phenomenon that no one can predict — the sleeper.

While in every movie season there are the predictable hits and misses, there also arises the unexpectedly successful film.

Often ignored, unnoticed or overlooked prior to release, it's the film that reaps major box-office bucks without possessing all-important word of mouth.

Last summer it was Disney's "Honey, I Shrunk the Kids" that copied sleeper status by slipping into theaters amid "Batman" mania and earning more than \$100 million at the box office.

And even this season — with the hype and hoopla for films ranging from "Dick Tracy" to "Die Hard 2" — there appear to be a number of prime sleeper candidates.

Highest on the list is "Anarchophobia," set for release July 20. Many say it's got all the right ingredients for a sleeper: It's from a first-time director (Frank Marshall); it's got a moderate budget; its name recognition is low and it doesn't have major stars.

So what will make it capture the box office? Well, this horror-thriller — the first film from Disney's Hollywood Pictures arm — brings to the screen a mega-sized creepy-crawler spider with an appetite that won't quit. When that appetite turns to the residents of a small California town it brings co-stars Jeff Daniels and John

Goodman — a web of trouble. Hey, and it doesn't hurt that Steven Spielberg is the executive producer.

It has the potential to be another "Jaws," says Bill Thompson, head film buyer for the City Cinemas theater chain. "After all, everyone can identify with a fear of huge spiders. And we hear it's a scary film, but not a horror film, which will bring in kids and adults. So, there are great hopes for it."

Many are also banking on Warner Bros.' "Presumed Innocent," set for release in July. Here you have Scott Turow's best-selling novel of a prosecutor accused of murdering an ex-lover and colleague adapted for the screen with Alan J. Pakula directing and Harrison Ford starring as attorney Rusty Sabich.

—Sure, Pakula hasn't had a hit lately, but Ford is box-office magic and Turow may bring a built-in audience.

But those are not the only qualities that could make it a major hit, reports Howard Karren, a senior editor at Premiere magazine.

"It will be one of the small number of films appealing to adults," says Karren. "While most of the other releases are teen-oriented action films like 'Die Hard 2' and 'Days of Thunder,' it is likely to attract the adults interested in a film with a story and characters."

Another film many experts say is a dark horse is Warner's "My Blue Heaven," which has no scheduled release date.

'Affable' Jerry Seinfeld scores hit on television

For the last month or so, critics having tried to come up with a word to describe Jerry Seinfeld.

The word they seem to have settled on is "affable," not exactly the description a comedian like Seinfeld longs to receive.

"I don't even know what affable is," he jokes in a telephone interview from Los Angeles. "But apparently, it's something I can do. It is better than being called hateful, though."

That is probably why he has been called affable — there are so many successful, foul-mouthed comedians today that when a nice guy like Seinfeld makes it big, they haul out adjectives that are as far away from hateful as possible.

He's also called affable because that's what he seems on stage and on his NBC show called "Seinfeld," which just finished a four-week, post-sweeps run that was so successful the network has already ordered 13 more for airing sometime next season.

Seinfeld, an ordinary-looking fellow from New York whose suburban upbringing may be why he lacks the traditional on-stage Big Apple attitude, doesn't really tell jokes. He sort of comments on life and you laugh at his ob-

servations.

Like his saying that his parents live in Florida.

"Things don't want to," he says. "But they're over 65, and it's the law."

Seinfeld has been coming up with lines like that for 14 years and his ability to do so accounts for much of his TV show's success.

That's only logical since the show is loosely based on his life and built around his stand-up routines.

Only they aren't the same routines you'll see if you catch his live act. These were designed to fit the sitcom portion of the program, which was written first.

Then that was done, Seinfeld (who wrote three of the first four episodes with Larry David, once a member of ABC's late, unlamented "Fridays" cast) sat down and wrote the stand-up stuff, which appeared at the beginning, middle and end of the show.

Things like his contention that ex-lovers staying friends, as his show characters attempt to do, is like "two magicians trying to entertain each other." They know each other's tricks too well for it to work.

Or his belief that putting your money to work for you is not necessarily a good idea.

"I like to work and let my money rest. Please see SEINFELD/D2

He says the TV show came about because NBC asked him if he was doing a show for box office.

He says he was flattered, but he didn't have any ideas.

Some months after that, he was talking to a friend about NBC's of-

fer and the pair began to kick around ideas. Two minutes later, the basic premise of "Seinfeld" was born. Only five minutes less than it took Matt Groening to create "The Simpsons."

So far, Seinfeld says the show's biggest effect has been that more first-time audience members are catching his act.

Then there are those who say the show's pilot a year ago and haven't seen it since.

"Every night they introduce me as the star of a new NBC show, but I just listen to that and I say, 'I joke questions from the audience and the first one they always ask is, 'We saw your pilot last year, what ever happened to that?' I say,

"Weren't you listening?' It's incredible. It happens every show."

No matter what happens with the series, Seinfeld, who says he knew from childhood he wanted to be a comedian, is going to continue doing stand-up comedy in clubs.

"Being a comedian is just what I am," he says. "Everything else is just a sideline."

Studio executives have realized this predicament and have devised a strategy for their more quirky pictures: They've postponed the films' releases until fall.

"That looks to be the case with a number of films, including 20th Century-Fox' "Miller's Crossing," a thriller from the Coen brothers. Even so, Thompson points out

there is a larger danger to predicting the come-from-behind films. He says that if word spreads on such films as "Arachnophobia," then they quickly lose dark-horse status and gain enough audience recognition to become mainstream hits or misses.

Whatever the case, the mere notion of a sleeper is appealing because it bucks the proverbial wisdom of know-it-all studio heads and industry experts.

And it proves what they often like to forget: It is audiences who make hits.

'Gremlins 2: The New Batch' is a better movie than the original

HOLLYWOOD — Cute on top, horrific underneath, the "Gremlins" of Joe Dante's 1984 chuckle-scream hit in some ways symbolized their own decade. In the fabulous sequel "Gremlins 2: The New Batch," Dante brings them back, flings them into the belly of the mass consumer beast — mid-town Manhattan — and lets them seethe, roar and run.

It's an infernally funny mass entertainment: the Dream Machine snapping at its own tail. In the first "Gremlins," the grinning green monsters were like amoral greed personified, waging war on the Norman Rockwell-Franco Capra town that harbored them. They were a tentacle crawling out of an angel food cake — a geyser of blood erupting from a Campbell's Soup can.

Their unwilling progenitor — the cutting-edge fluff-baby Gizmo, who looks like a cross between a Puffin and a teddy bear — is a prefab adorableness. His reptilian and ravenous id-children, though, were teddy bears from hell, icky-sticky dung-on-rats out to tear up the place and shove themselves sick. They were as good a symbol of a decade of media sadism, aka, as any. Their appetites and self-celebration are another.

Bringing those small-town marauders to New York seems an inevitable notion — teen-age lovers Billy Peltzer and Kate Berenger

(Zach Galligan and Phoebe Cates) have emigrated as well — and Dante and his collaborators milk their premise almost dry. They've set most of the action in a monolithic wedge of a building, Billy and Kate's workplace, the Clamp Tower — whose owner, Daniel Clamp (John Glover) is a double parody of Donald Trump and Ted Turner. His video group puts out a colorized version of "Casablanca" with "a happier ending."

The Clamp Tower encapsulates consumer-culture America. It's dotted with drippy-slick little boutiques and yogurt bars, monitored by a crypto-fascist security system. Updates, there's the Slice-of-Life vide-

signer genes' company run by the mad scientist, Dr. Catheter (Christopher Lee). Outside, there's the world of Clamp Industries, the world being squeezed in a vice as if it were a deflating volleyball. There's even a "Marta," nastily Machiavellian Haviland Morris.

Dante and screenwriter Charlie Haas pump so much satire into their setup that when the Gremlins finally show up, the audience may be rooting for them. Rick Baker, this movie's Gremlin-maker, has dreamed up a revolting new horde: a voluptuous, vamp, gremlin, a cocky-crazy-Gizmo, a bat-gargoyler and the gang's new leader, the Brain Gremlin, voiced by Tony Randall in

what has to be a quasi-parody of William F. Buckley Jr. Randall steals the show from every other actor, human or non.

Dante is a director who revels in the movie past. Like Spielberg or Zemeckis, he often seems to be dragging us into a world composed mostly of movie allusions. In the first "Gremlins" this was almost a subtext: the old idyllic realm of "It's a Wonderful Life" was invaded by the hot-wire hordes of slasher movies and ultra-violence. "Gremlins 2" is allusion-packed, too. The title and credits are a new Looney Tune, written and directed by the master, Chuck Jones; Leonard Maltin plays for his bad review of "Gremlins" by getting strangled on camera — and, midway through, there's a classic reflexive movie gag. (I won't give it away — but when you see Paul Bartel and Hulk Hogan, you'll know you're in the middle of it.)

Chris Columbus, the original writer, made his gremlins fairy-tale metaphors for the glitches in the system. But, for Dante, they are probably more. They are symbols of innocence gone amok, the depravity and degeneration of our youthful dreams. They're us — at our flummery, greed-crazed worst. That's why they dress up as hipsters or man the stock market phones and the TV stations. As the Brain Gremlin explains, they just want "the good

things in life.

and that's why they're ideal emblems of the dark side of the '80s. Like corporate raiders or Daniel Clamp, they have no inhibitions about acquisition. Little Mogwai mostly wants to be loved and petted; that's what makes him an anachronism. (Unfortunately, one of this movie's jokes has Mogwai turn into Rambo, good for a sight gag, but not a full-blown character development.) "Gremlins 2" is better than the original, though it lacks the same archetypal horror-movie drive. We lose some characters too long. The last paroxysm is too forced. Perhaps because of budgets or logistics,

Dante refrains from having his besties run wild on location. The entrapment inside Clamp Tower where the gremlins go berserk, eventually staging frenzied Busby Berkeley routines to a rousing chorus of "New York, New York" — begins to seem constricting.

That's one of the movie's two major flaws. The other is the peculiar transformation of John Glover's Clamp from tyrant to born-again nice guy, even though Glover has it in him to scorch the screen with go-as-fur Villainy. What caused this? Wishful thinking?

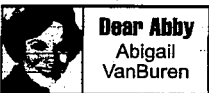

'17th Annual Daytime Emmy Awards' features love in the afternoon favorites

Seduction, love, adventure, betrayal and revenge. These are just some of the reasons why we tune in daytime soaps — and why we anxiously await The Daytime Emmy Awards each year.

What soap fan, after all, can resist finding out which actors best have weathered the twist and turns — not to mention who's wearing the sexiest dress?

"There's a real star element to this show," says Bill Carruthers, executive producer and director of "The 17th Annual Daytime Emmy Awards," airing live Thursday, June 28, on ABC.

"It's really the only time of the year that you can see these people outside of the roles they play every day."

Many are watching to see if Susan Lucci ("All My Children") will finally win the Outstanding Lead Actress in a Drama Series Award after 10 fruitless nominations. She's up against Jeanne Cooper ("The Young and the Restless"), Elizabeth Hubbard ("As the World Turns"), Finola Hughes ("General Hospital") and Kim Zimmer ("Guiding Light"). Others foot for their favorite soap to win Outstanding Drama Series. ("All My Children," "Guiding Light," "One Life to Live," "Santa Barbara" and "The Young and the Restless" have been nominated.)

But soaps are not the sole Emmy-watcher's event. There are equal measures of suspense in such categories as Outstanding

Game/Audience Participation Show, Outstanding Children's Series and Outstanding Animated Programs.

"In recent years, talk shows have taken a decidedly competitive turn. Sally Jessy Raphael was the surprise winner last year as Outstanding Talk/Service Show Host, and she's nominated again, along with Phil Donahue, Oprah Winfrey and Joan Rivers, plus Jeff Smith of "The Frugal Gourmet."

Proof of just how important the talk/service circuit is lies in the naming of Oprah Winfrey as this year's Daytime Emmy Awards host. "We don't always have a host," explains Carruthers. "But if you've got an Oprah or a Phil or a Bob Barker, you get an incredibly experienced professional, as well as an additional audience."

This year, there are other enticements for non-daytime viewers. Foremost is a face-lift calculated to

make the usually simple event a high-tech extravaganza.

"It was just time we took advantage of the state of the art," says Carruthers. One new addition, he explains, will be a two-tiered set featuring a video wall of 20 screens.

They will play an instrumental role in the actual presenting of the awards, as well as in the show's opening production number, a tribute to — funnily enough — daytime TV.

The biggest challenge in mounting the Daytime Emmys, Carruthers adds, is that, unlike other award shows, it can't run over its allotted time span.

Q: Doesn't Don Johnson have a real problem in that he often acts in private like the slick and occasionally violent detective he played in the "Miami Vice" series? — LF.

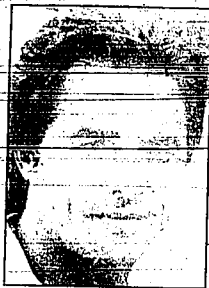

CBS still lord and master of daytime

Daytime TV may pay the bills for nighttime programming, but it's still the poor relation. Except once a year in June when retrospectives fill the evening hours, and the big event is next Thursday's (June 28) ABC afternoon broadcast of the 17th Annual Daytime Emmy Awards with Oprah Winfrey presiding.

Number three in prime time, CBS continues its reign as the lord and master of daytime. On Emmy Award day, CBS holds the cards with 74 nominations, almost twice that of number two ABC and more than ABC and NBC combined. The old guard dominates so don't expect surprises.

A perennial favorite, "All My Children's" Susan Lucci goes to bat for the umpteenth time in the Outstanding Lead Actress soap division. Although she's a standout, Lucci gains more attention by losing, making up for defeats with prime time movies. This year has to be the Lucci year. "General Hospital's" Finola Hughes, up against Susan as Anna Devane Lavery, is sure of that.

Finola, young Kimberly McCullough, Kin Shriner and Lynn Herring all get two days off from L.A.'s "General Hospital" set and a free trip to New York for the Emmys because they're presenters as well as nominees. And all will take the red-eye home next Thursday night to be on the set Friday morning for the Ned-Dawn wedding festivities.

Lynn Herring is just happy to be included. When selecting footage of Lucy Coe for West Coast judges to view in the supporting actress division, Lynn was torn between comedy and drama, for Lucy Coe goes both ways. "Lucy has changed so much in four years," Lynn says. "She was mousy at first, then deviant and now she's a comedienne."

Although Lucy is married to Alan Quartermaine now, fans recall her "lust in the dust" moments with Kin Shriner's Scott Baldwin.

So the image continues and it appears that Herring means trouble on "General Hospital."

Bart Simpson is making TV history, and he can't even grant an interview

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Bart Simpson isn't even a real person, but he made television history this week.

"The Simpsons," Bart's grumpy animated family was the No. 3 show on television, according to ratings released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co. The equally grumpy but unanimated family of "Married...With Children" was No. 4. The proud parents of both shows at Fox Broadcasting Co. were jubilant. "We're extremely excited about this," said Fox spokesman Michael Peikoff.

They should be. The results of the latest bout in the network ratings fight marks the first time that 3-year-old Fox has broken into Nielsen's top five.

It helps that the Big Three networks are knee-deep in reruns. It also helps that 10-year-old Bart Simpson's spiky head is on the cover of Rolling Stone magazine, thousands of T-shirts and the pages of national news magazines. But Fox's victory was not sweeping. In the overall ratings, NBC was still the No. 1 network. CBS was second with 9.7 and ABC was last with 9.3.

Get ready for a sports awards show

HOLLYWOOD — TV is where media events really hit the fan.

So much of what we take for granted is manufactured for TV — from political campaigns to trash sports to talk-show buzz — that illusion and reality nearly become indistinguishable. No matter how thin or counterfeit, camera-tailored events become legitimized merely through existing.

The camera attaches validity to these events, which assume lives of their own and, through repetition, become woven into the national culture.

Fresh out of the fantasy factory, for instance, is Monday's first annual "All-Star Pro Sports Awards," a two-hour, black-tie gala — the formal-wear symbolizing respectability — that ABC says will honor "the best in professional sports." To say nothing of the best in sports baloney.

Yes, I know, you just can't get enough of those exhilarating TV awards shows. ABC, too, apparently. Sensing that a mere two dozen a year weren't enough, it gave thumbs up to this one, a creation of a newly formed outfit called Pro Sports Productions, with assistance from Inside Sports magazine, whose participation was crucial.

It was the magazine that ran the ballots on which its readers could designate their "all-star pro sports" choices. Voting also was available through a publicized 900 number. Other components were necessary, too.

So comedian Richard Lewis was hired to emcee

the show, and ABC Sports' new acquisition, Brent Musburger, was assigned to host it. Clint Eastwood, Arnold Schwarzenegger and ABC's very own Tony Danza ("Who's the Boss?") were added for stargazing, sports bloopers were tossed in for laughs and production numbers were thrown in for glitz. Finally, the "All-Star Pro Sports Awards" was ready.

It will air live in the East and on tape in the West, naming winners from four "finalists" in 11 categories during a telecast from the Universal Amphitheatre in front of a paying, in-house audience that ABC says will number 6,000.

Revenue from the in-house gate and the 900 number calls will go to the Special Olympics, whose own top athlete will also be honored on the telecast in what may be the only legitimate award of the evening.

The show's categories are pretty standard, but some of the "best-in-professional-sports" finalists you have to seriously question. In baseball, Will Clark, Jose Canseco and Nolan Ryan are joined by Bo Jackson, who had a good but not great season for the Kansas City Royals last year, and this season is getting booed by hometown fans while having a terrible time even making contact with the ball.

In football, Jerry Rice, Joe Montana and Lawrence Taylor are also joined by the two-sport Jackson, who last season performed unspectacularly with the Los Angeles Raiders.

In men's tennis, John McEnroe, who doesn't play a lot any more, and Andre Agassi, who has never won a Grand Slam tournament, are finalists with Ivan Lendl and Boris Becker.

Three powers will join in on TV history

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC News will work with Soviet and Japanese TV companies to create a televised history of the 20th century, the network has announced.

ABC said the international agreement is the first of its kind. It links ABC News with Gostelradio, the Soviet Union's state-run broadcast company and NHK-Japan Broadcast Corp., ABC News president Ronne Arledge said.

A New York-based company, tentatively called

The Twentieth Century, will be formed by the three organizations to oversee the history project, ABC said. The three broadcast giants will share their film and tape libraries, along with production facilities to compile the history series.

Beside the series for broadcast, the agreement also provides for separate programs to develop a cable television series, interactive video discs, videocassettes and books, ABC said. No completion date or possible broadcast times were given.
