Amtrak collision with truck injures 6

MERIDIAN, Miss. — An Amtrak train collided with a tractor-trailer rig Thursday, injuring six people, authorities said.
 "The train's whistle was blowing the whole time and, Lord, it sounded like a bomb when they hit," said Nita Williams, who saw the crash from a window at the Torch Truckstop where she worked.
 Four of the injured were reported in good condition at Jeff Anderson Regional Hospital; the others were treated at Riley Memorial Hospital, hospital officials said.
 Debbie Hare, spokeswoman for Amtrak in Chicago, said the injured included the engineer and an assistant engineer. She said 10 passengers had requested medical attention.

Prisoner recaptured still wearing IV

NEW YORK — A prisoner who escaped while being treated at a hospital Thursday was recaptured on a subway train a short time later, in his hospital gown and with an IV still attached to his arm, authorities said.
 Elvin Sanchez, 29, bolted before dawn from Kings County Hospital in Brooklyn, where he was being treated for a swollen knee while awaiting trial on a grand larceny charge, said Ruby Ryles, a Correction Department spokeswoman.
 Sanchez came out of a bathroom, asked a guard about his medication, then dashed down four flights of stairs to the street, said Ryles.

Child losing sight given 'dream' piano

WESTON, W.Va. — A musically inclined 3-year-old boy who is losing his eyesight to cancer had his dream come true when the West Virginia Make-a-Wish Foundation gave him a piano.
 Jeremy Sirkough received the piano Tuesday at his home in a ceremony attended by 30 friends and family members. The foundation grants the wishes of seriously ill children.
 Since birth, the Weston boy has suffered from retinal blastoma, and the disease already has claimed one of his eyes, said his pediatrician, Dr. Jeanie West.

Teachers' union wants school day care

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Public schools should offer day care, meals and health screening for preschool, kindergarten and elementary school children, the nation's largest teachers' union said Thursday.
 The board of directors of the National Education Association approved a committee report that said public schools should be the primary provider of such early childhood services. It said they should be universal, with low or no cost to the child, and all children would have equal access.
 With the exception of Head Start, most day care or preschool programs are offered by private or non-profit organizations. Head Start provides education, meals and health screening for needy youngsters ages 3 to 5 but officials said only a small percentage of eligible children are served by the program.
 Public schools also are "an acknowledged socializing agent," with established systems that allow for easy handling of money, the report said.

Bush's son will face hearing on S&L work

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thrift regulators on Thursday ordered President Bush's son, Neil, to appear at a public hearing in September to explain why, as a savings and loan officer, he approved loans to a business partner.
 The hearing, before an administrative law judge of the Office of Thrift Supervision, is scheduled for Sept. 25 in Denver.
 The details of the Bush case and three other unrelated cases were released as part of a new policy issued Thursday by the agency, an arm of the Treasury Department.
 In order to avoid the danger of depositor runs, proceedings against open S&Ls generally will continue to be conducted in private, Ryan told a news conference.
 The charges, sent to Bush's attorneys on Feb. 6, allege conflicts of interest between Bush's role as a director of the Silverado Banking, Savings and Loan Association, Denver, and his other business interests.
 Bush served on the board of Silverado from August 1985 to August 1988.

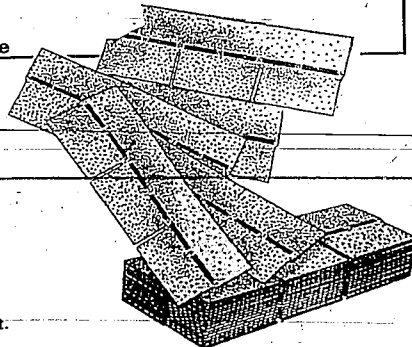

Sheriff divulges name of reporter's source

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The sheriff tracked down the identity of a reporter's confidential source last week and released her name Thursday, eight days after the journalist went to jail for refusing to identify her.

Bexar County Sheriff Harlan Copeland said the source was a cousin of a capital murder suspect that KMOL-TV reporter Brian Karen interviewed by telephone from the county jail last week.

The sheriff said he learned her identity through his own investigation.

Copeland said Hernandez called Ms. Ledesma, who then connected Karen with Hernandez.

Attorneys in the murder trial of Hernandez and his brother, Julian, have said they have to know who arranged the interview to see if it is admissible in court.

Karen has repeatedly refused to violate the source's confidentiality, which brought the contempt order and his jailing June 27.

A U.S. Supreme Court justice last week declined to continue that stay. Karen has appealed the contempt citations to the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

Copeland said Thursday that Karen should never have been jailed.

"I just believe he has the First Amendment right, but then again I'm not a judge, I'm just the sheriff," he told reporters at the rally.

Larry Macon, Karen's attorney, said he planned to go see State District Judge Pat Priest, who issued the initial contempt citation and sentenced Karen.

The "surprise" announcement came as scores of reporters and others gathered at the jail in a rally supporting Karen.

Copeland walked out, said he had something to say, then identified the informant as Deborah Ledesma, a cousin of Henry Hernandez, accused of killing a San Antonio police officer.

There is no Deborah Ledesma listed in San Antonio's telephone directory so she could not be immediately reached for comment.

Auto industry divided on gas tax increase

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Big Three domestic auto makers are divided over the idea of raising the federal gasoline tax to help reduce the budget deficit, unusual in an industry that often puts unity ahead of competition in lobbying Congress.

Ford Motor Co. and Chrysler Corp. favor boosting the 9-cents-per-gallon federal levy on gasoline by a nickel a year for three to five years. Every penny increase would raise about \$1 billion.

But General Motors Corp., the nation's largest automobile manufacturer, opposes any increase in gasoline taxes.

"We've constantly said and I think Congress has said that the gasoline tax is too regressive, that it hurts the poor people," GM Chairman Roger Smith said. He discussed the issue with lawmakers

during a visit to Washington last week.

Chrysler chairman Lee Iacocca is an outspoken supporter of higher gas taxes, which he says would encourage people to drive more fuel-efficient cars. In the 1980s, Chrysler's marketing strategy emphasized more fuel-efficient vehicles.

But Iacocca said the higher taxes would boost conservation, lower the nation's trade deficit and help counter global warming by curbing emissions.

"Consumers must demand more fuel-efficient vehicles, and today they have no reason to do that," Iacocca said.

The cost of driving has been cut in half since the 1960s when adjusted for inflation and improved fuel efficiency, he said.

Ford would accept a gradual increase in the gasoline tax as part of a package of consumption taxes, company spokesman Mark Miller said. "But we believe it should go toward reducing the deficit and not toward increasing government spending," he said.

The gasoline tax, frequently mentioned as a potential source of new revenue as the White House and congressional leaders negotiate a deficit-reduction plan.

Seniors prepare for battle over Social Security

WASHINGTON — Senior-citizen groups are gearing up to block any attempt to cut Social Security benefits as part of a deficit-cutting deal between the White House and Congress.

Benefit cuts were on the bargaining table last week when the talks recessed for the Fourth of July congressional recess. The question is whether the issue will be raised next week when negotiators return.

"There is a lot of aim-taking, but the question is whether anyone is going to pull the trigger," said John

Rother, lobbyist for the American Association of Retired Persons.

In hopes of turning the negotiators' sights elsewhere, senior-citizen groups are planning letter-writing campaigns and contemplating demonstrations.

The political risks in reducing Social Security benefits have made the program one of the budget's untouchables. The elderly are one of the biggest and best organized blocs in the nation — and, more important, one that regularly votes in large numbers.

In this election year that fact has

not eluded lawmakers of either party.

"Frankly, I don't think you have to touch cost-of-living increases (in Social Security benefits) to solve this budget deficit," said Sen. Pete V. Domenici (N.M.), the ranking Republican on the Senate Budget Committee.

"You can talk about it," said Senate Budget Committee Chairman Jim Sasser, D-Tenn., "but, in my judgment, that's not going to happen."

Some Democratic political professionals do not think their party's lawmakers should even talk about it.

"The two things the voters still give us credit for is standing up for the middle class and protecting Social Security," said Harrison Hickman, a Democratic poll taker. "This is the time we can really communicate that we will uphold our promises. Just because the president breaks his doesn't mean we have to break ours."

Jolley contacted a patrol officer and the man was arrested. He said he had been joking.

A 5th District Magistrate judge on Thursday set bail at \$2,000 for Garrick Charles Applegate, 23, 239 Third St. E., who was charged with impersonating a police officer in a felony, and driving under the influence, a misdemeanor.

Authorities still looking for man suspected of rape

SHOSHONE — The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department is still searching for Robert Amerson, the Howe man accused of raping a 62-year-old Richfield woman more than three years ago.

Amerson was released from custody after the prosecution failed to prove the statute of limitations had not run out.

According to Lincoln County Sheriff Darwin Mills, records show that Amerson was in the Mountain State Penitentiary on a charge of attempted rape from March of 1989 through January of 1990.

Proof that Amerson was indeed out of the state during those 10 months would toll the statute of limitations, Lincoln County Prosecutor Lavon Loynd said.

However, the prosecution failed to come up with concrete evidence of Amerson's stay in the Montana prison during a determination hearing in late May, and Amerson was set free.

Under state law, a person cannot be legally tried in such a case after three years have passed.

But if it can be proven that the suspect was not in the state during part of the three years, that time can be subtracted from the statute of limitations.

"This has been a real heartache for us, putting so much time and effort into this and seeing the suffering of the victim and the victim's family," Mills said.

Mills said he believes that Amerson is out of the state, but added, "I've got a good feeling that we're going to get a positive lead somewhere in the near future."

If it can be proven that Amerson fled the state to avoid prosecution, Mills said, the FBI can then become involved in the search.

If Amerson is still in Idaho, however, the police have less than four months to track him down.

The charges against Amerson — rape, robbery and two counts of forcible sexual entry with a foreign object — have been refiled in Lincoln County.

Banks report upbeat economic conditions

TWIN FALLS — Two banks have released hot economic news during July's sweltering weather.

First Security Bank and West One Bancorp recently released economic reports that indicate persistent strong growth in Idaho's economy.

West One's "Business Activity Index" for the first quarter is 4.3 percent higher than last year, mostly due to growth in employment and new residential building permits.

"By nearly all measures, the state's economy continues to perform very well after an excellent 1989," the Boise-based bank reported.

Although the bank's crop index declined slightly because of lower prices for small grains and milk, potato prices set new records during the quarter.

Those first-quarter records follow two record-setting years for gross farm receipts. In 1989, the state's gross receipts climbed 20 percent over 1988, to \$2.7 billion. And 1988 was already a record-setting year.

According to First Security's index of leading indicators, the economy won't alter its upward course.

"Continued upbeat business conditions," pushed the index up 7 percent during May," the bank reported. That brought the index, designed to predict future economic performance, to a new peak.

It was also the third straight monthly gain after the index declined from January to February. First Security, however, pointed at commercial construction as being largely responsible for May's increase.

Idaho's economy is growing at about 8.5 percent so far this year, First Security said.

Air Guard says it's not responsible for injuries to unidentified girl

BUHL — The Idaho Air National Guard disclaimed responsibility and the mayor of Buhl said he couldn't place blame Thursday for an accident during a 4th of July jet fighter flyover that injured two children.

A young girl injured when a horse was spooked by the jets during Buhl's Sagebrush Days parade Wednesday was in stable condition at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center Thursday evening, a nursing supervisor said. But attempts to learn the girl's identity were unsuccessful.

Buhl Police Chief Les Cochran said Thursday that the police report on the incident did not list the girl's name, and an emergency medical technician who treated the youngster said he could not talk about the accident.

Buhl Mayor Theodore Pence said the girl's family had not contacted the city. A young boy also was injured in the accident.

"We assume they weren't hurt too bad, or we would have heard from them," Pence said.

The boy reportedly was taken to Magic Valley Medical Center after the accident, but a nursing supervisor said Wednesday that he was not admitted.

The accident occurred at 11:37 a.m. Wednesday after four F-4 Phantom jets based in Boise flew over the parade and frightened a horse. The teen-ager riding the horse reined it in, but less than a minute later the horse apparently became spooked again and backed into the crowd, injuring the two children and two adults. The adults left the scene on their own, Cochran said.

Jerome buys expensive water meters for comparison

JEROME — The city has purchased 100 new Rockwell water meters at a cost of \$8,700 to compare them against the type currently in use in a move a competitor calls "lucky."

The purchase could also lead to increases in local water bills.

"The Rockwell meters not only have a higher price tag than Neptune meters — 300 Rockwell meters cost \$15,000 more than 300 Neptune meters — but the city may also have to spend up to \$200,000 more to make Rockwell meters compatible with current city equipment," a Neptune representative has previously said.

In addition, if eventually purchased by the city to replace Neptune meters, Rockwell meters could also boost bills if they live up to claims they can better detect water flowing into homes during low-flow periods, said Mayor Gerald Ostler.

"The meters are no bones about the fact that he and the City Council consider Rockwell meters to be the superior product, and the one most likely to be used."

"We want Rockwell meters," he said. "The only thing we want to do is improve things."

Council wants watering policy followed, delays decision on pool

JEROME — The City Council has asked citizens to honor the odd-even watering days system.

Owners whose address ends in an even number should water only on even-numbered calendar days. Those with house addresses ending in odd numbers should water only on odd-numbered days.

And still on the subject of water, the council Tuesday heard a report from the Northside Canal Company that the current water shortage is due to evaporation, but that the company is "sending all they've got."

The council tabled discussion Tuesday regarding funding \$43,000 to \$83,000 worth of repairs needed at the city pool.

The council note, however, that an override levy or voter approval of general obligation bonds could provide funding for the repairs.

Funding pool repairs will be further discussed at the next meeting.

Defendant must know his rights

HOISE — It must be positively shown that a criminal defendant understands the rights he waives by pleading guilty, the Idaho Court of Appeals says.

The court on Thursday overturned a lower court ruling that denied Mardiano Garcia Ayala's request to withdraw his guilty plea to a Gooding County rape charge.

"Under our state and federal constitutions, a guilty plea must be made voluntarily, which means knowingly and intelligently as well as free from coercion," the court said.

In the Ayala case, the court said the defendant spoke little English, even with the help of an interpreter and "clearly had difficulty understanding the judge."

The Court of Appeals concluded 5th District Judge Phillip Becker did not inquire sufficiently into whether Ayala knew what was happening, and in fact, did not ask the man directly if he was guilty of the crime charged.

There must be an affirmative showing that the man understood the proceedings, the court said.

The Court of Appeals decision upheld Department of Transportation termination proceedings against a former custodian, Gary Starr.

Starr's appeal from the Idaho Personnel Commission contended his job was eliminated in 1987 weeks after he testified for another employee in a grievance proceeding against the department.

The Court of Appeals agreed with the hearing examiner's finding that the layoff was caused by reorganization to increase the number of authorized masters' positions there was no connection with his testimony in the grievance case.

The Supreme Court upheld lower court rulings in a property dispute between Sun Valley Shamrock Resources, Inc., and Travelers Leasing Corp., concluding that a duplex was located on Travelers' property after Travelers demolished the duplex, contending it was located on Sun Valley-Shamrock property.

Authorities still looking for man suspected of rape

SHOSHONE — The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department is still searching for Robert Amerson, the Howe man accused of raping a 62-year-old Richfield woman more than three years ago.

Amerson was released from custody after the prosecution failed to prove the statute of limitations had not run out.

According to Lincoln County Sheriff Darwin Mills, records show that Amerson was in the Mountain State Penitentiary on a charge of attempted rape from March of 1989 through January of 1990.

Proof that Amerson was indeed out of the state during those 10 months would toll the statute of limitations, Lincoln County Prosecutor Lavon Loynd said.

However, the prosecution failed to come up with concrete evidence of Amerson's stay in the Montana prison during a determination hearing in late May, and Amerson was set free.

Under state law, a person cannot be

legally tried in such a case after three years have passed.

But if it can be proven that the suspect was not in the state during part of the three years, that time can be subtracted from the statute of limitations.

"This has been a real heartache for us, putting so much time and effort into this and seeing the suffering of the victim and the victim's family," Mills said.

Mills said he believes that Amerson is out of the state, but added, "I've got a good feeling that we're going to get a positive lead somewhere in the near future."

Big lotto drawing in Boise

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Lottery will celebrate its first anniversary this month with the July 18 drawing for the Iowa-based Lotto America conducted in Boise.

Director Wally Hedrick announced on Thursday that for the first time since the beginning of the multi-state, multimillion-dollar Lotto America game one of its semi-weekly drawings will be held outside the Des Moines studio.

The drawing will be part of the anniversary celebration in downtown Boise that will feature Idaho entertainers like jazz pianist Gene Harris, Gary Puckett and the Union Gap and the Timberline bluegrass band with 1990 Miss Idaho Kendra Lee Rube.

"We don't expect this to be bigger than the Centennial Celebration, but almost," Hedrick quipped.

In its first year, the Idaho Lottery has generated sales in excess of \$60 million, more than twice the initial sales. Nearly half that amount has been returned to players in prize money, and over \$15 million will be used to finance public and school building construction and maintenance.

Hedrick said Idaho ranks second among all the lottery states in per capita sales of instant-winner scratch-off tickets, and he pledged continued variations in the games to keep sales strong.

Sales projections for the state Lottery's second year have been put at \$55 million, but Hedrick said the lottery will redouble its efforts to exceed that as well.

Hedrick also confirmed the winning tickets in last Tuesday's Centennial Celebration lottery drawing and pointed out that while drawing for the \$100,000 jackpot and other major prizes is over there remains nearly \$2 million in prizes in unsold tickets, including some 170 \$1,000 winning tickets.

Marla Payne of Blackfoot won the \$100,000 top prize in the drawing on Stachhood Day, and Hedrick said she contacted the Lottery office by telephone almost immediately after the official winners were announced on Tuesday.

Ruth Julian of Fernwood won the \$50,000 prize, Catherine Elledge of Lava Hot Springs and James Kile of Meridian each claimed the \$25,000 prizes and Dale Slagel of Meridian and Darlene Hamilton of Mountain Home won the two \$10,000 prizes.

The Idaho State Police said Lynch was eastbound on the interstate when he apparently lost control of the car, veering across the median and slammed head-on into the car driven by Olson. There were no passengers in the Lynch vehicle.

The crash prompted authorities to shut down both lanes of westbound traffic between the Vista-Avenue and Orchard Street exits of Interstate 84 for 3½ hours. The freeway was reopened by 2:30 a.m. Thursday, police said.

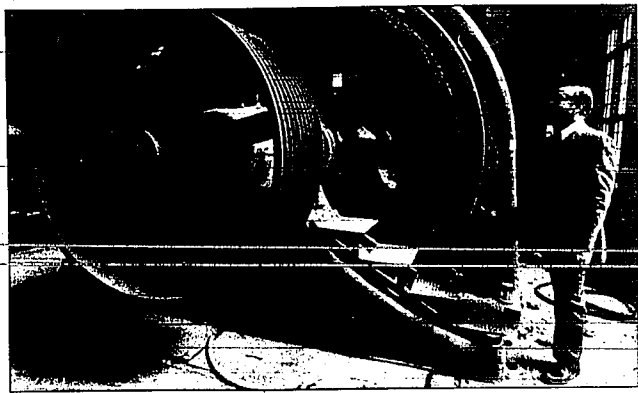
Rydalah said Jose, son of Adolfo and Alicia Fuentes Espinosa, died of multiple head injuries.

Comment on park fire policy sought

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) — How fires should be battled in the world's oldest national park is being pondered by the country's top firefighters, but they want the general public's advice on the matter, too.

So, through Sept. 4 those working on Yellowstone National Park's fire management plan will listen to suggestions offered from throughout the country.

A hard look at the park's 18-year-old fire plans was ordered in 1988 after wildfires swept through roughly half of the 2.2 million-acre park that sprawls across the corner of northwestern Wyoming and laps over into Montana and Idaho.

While the Interagency Fire Management Team concluded from its review that the park's existing policy of allowing naturally-caused fires to burn themselves out unless they threatened man or structures was sound, the team did suggest ways to refine Yellowstone's fire management program.

One of the recommendations was that management plans involving natural fires be suspended until they could be evaluated under the requirements of the National Environmental Policy Act.

Preliminary alternatives being studied through the NEPA process are:

- Full suppression of all fires in Yellowstone, regardless of their source;
- Prescribed burning only, where use of fire is limited to reduction of fuel accumulations and hazards;
- No action, where all fires are allowed to burn unattended;
- A prescribed natural fire program where all naturally-caused fires are allowed to burn under certain specific conditions;
- And a program that combines aspects of all other alternatives.

Historically, from the time Yellowstone was established as a national park in 1872 through 1972 all fires — both man-caused and those set by lightning strikes — were battled.

Doctors say Hackman averted heart attack

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Actor Gene Hackman, who soon will be appearing in a film called "Narrow Margin," may have averted a heart attack by a similar measure when he checked into a hospital.

An artery leading to his heart had narrowed dangerously and doctors had to reflate it with a balloon catheter, the cardiologist who treated him said at a news conference Thursday.

"We think we got him just in the nick of time," said Dr. Herbert Semler.

Hackman, 60, had just finished filming a movie in Europe called "Dinosaur Coast" and was vacationing on the Oregon Coast when he began suffering chest-pain.

He came to Portland and the pain expanded to include his arm.

He was admitted Tuesday to St. Vincent Hospital & Medical Center.

"We did a coronary angiogram and found narrowing in one of his arteries," Semler said.

"It was in a very excellent area that we could easily reach with a balloon catheter and dilate it."

Semler said that if Hackman hadn't entered the hospital when he did, "the artery would have completely shut down and he would have possibly had a heart attack."

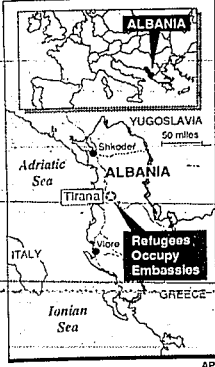

Albania will issue passports

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — The Albanian foreign ministry on Thursday promised to grant passports to the hundreds of Albanians who have sought refuge in foreign embassies in a desperate attempt to flee their Communist homeland.

Hundreds of other would-be refugees gathered outside embassies in the Albanian capital, Tirana. Dozens gained entry into embassy compounds, raising the number of asylum-seekers to close to 400, diplomats said.

In a statement carried by the official Albanian news agency, the foreign ministry also appeared to report that Albanians would no longer be able to apply for visas at embassies of the countries they wished to visit.

"The Albanian authorities ... are ready to grant passports, even to those citizens who are still in the foreign embassies and who shall ask for such a thing," the ministry statement said.

The Austria Press Agency reported earlier that authorities had revoked new regulations allowing passport-holding Albanians to apply directly at foreign embassies for visas to travel abroad.

But the foreign ministry statement said that to ease the issuing of visas, "all foreign diplomatic representations in Tirana as well as our citizens have been told that the latter will receive the visas directly at the respective diplomatic representations."

It said there were "a great number of passports of Albanian citizens" waiting for visas in some embassies. The statement said 1,400 passports had been issued over the past 10 days.

"At a time when ... Albanian citizens are being granted passports to travel abroad, it is completely unjustifiable for our citizens to stay in the foreign embassies and continue to be kept there," the statement said.

It said an unspecified number of people had already left embassies. It said some had applied for passports, been granted them and left the country.

The foreign ministry criticized speculation "that allegedly the Albanian competent authorities do not provide passports to those wishing to travel abroad. Such a thing does not respond to reality."

A package of new regulations, entitling all Albanians over the age of 16 to own a passport for foreign travel, came into effect Tuesday.

Earlier Thursday, Western leaders had urged the Communist government in Albania to allow the refugees to travel abroad.

Diplomats reported that hundreds of Albanians had gathered in front of several embassies, hoping to join their compatriots inside the compounds. About 200 Albanians were inside the West German embassy alone, the Bonn foreign ministry said.

Villagers flee when elephants stampede

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — A herd of elephants went on a rampage in a northern village, trampling a man to death, smashing crops and forcing 200 people to flee their homes, a newspaper reported Thursday.

Panggung village chief M. Nafi said the herd was believed to have come in the village for revenge after seeing four elephant carcasses at the rim of the forest, the daily Jakarta Post reported.

The carcasses were of elephants killed by poachers for their ivory, it said.

The newspaper said a 25-year-old villager was killed during the rampage over the weekend at the village in the regency of Krueang Aceh, about 1,000 miles northwest of Jakarta.

Serbia dissolves legislature

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Authorities in Yugoslavia's largest republic Thursday dissolved the local legislature and government in Kosovo, the troubled southern province it administers, sources and the media said.

Authorities from the republic of Serbia also took measures apparently designed to give the republic full control over Kosovo's media.

Several leading ethnic Albanian officials and journalists were removed from their jobs at Kosovo's radio, television and the Albanian-language Rilindja publishing house which publishes a daily newspaper.

Witnesses said Serbia's police entered downtown television, radio and Rilindja premises in the provincial capital of Pristina; arresting an unspecified number of ethnic Albanian employees.

The state Tanjug news agency reported that TV and radio later went off their air.

The Serbian moves could trigger fresh unrest by the ethnic Albanian majority in Kosovo, the nation's least developed region and the scene of sporadic violence over the past two years.

The decision to dissolve Kosovo's legislature and government was approved unanimously by all three chambers of Serbia's policy. It came

in the wake of a declaration Monday by 114 ethnic Albanian deputies in Kosovo's provincial assembly to secede from Serbia, Belgrade television said.

In the document, Kosovo proclaimed the province of 1.9 million equal to Yugoslavia's six republics and stated that ethnic Albanians, the third-largest ethnic group in the country, would no longer be considered a national minority.

Yugoslavia is a loose federation of six republics and two nominally autonomous provinces. Kosovo, which is 90 percent ethnic Albanian, has progressively lost control of its affairs to Serbia.

Soviet workers disappointed in congress

MOSCOW (AP) — Workers at a major car factory don't like what they have seen so far of the Soviet Communist Party congress, and other city residents said Thursday they doubted the party could improve their lives.

"I am not satisfied. Things are happening the same old way. The way we elected delegates was new, but the same old people were elected," said Viktor Gushchin, a worker in the eastern Moscow machine shop of the ZIL car factory, famous for the hulking black limousines favored by the party elite.

The 28th congress of the Soviet

Communist Party convened Monday amid growing friction among members over the party's course, and increasing despair among citizens that perestroika will make a difference in their lives.

Party leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev has come under heavy fire from orthodox Communists during debates, but they have displayed no new ideas of their own on how to alleviate the chronic economic and political crisis.

"After the first few days, I am not sure this party has a future. These leaders must get advice. If these old people stay then I don't know what

is going to happen," said Sergei Tkachenko. "The party leaders must change radically because if it doesn't then the people won't support them."

Of the factory's 60,000 workers, 11,000 belong to the Communist Party, but their numbers are starting to drop as confidence in the party dwindles.

"We have got to be able to live better. We don't get paid enough, so people are leaving the party because they are not satisfied," said Sergei Gngoryevich, an 18-year veteran at the factory.

All of the workers interviewed in

the machine shop during their break said they were disappointed that so few workers were delegates to the congress, although the factory itself has three delegates to the congress. Workers make up just 12 percent of the delegates and farmers 5 percent.

Throughout the city, residents appeared doubtful and depressed by the party's failure to improve their lives.

"I don't care about this congress. I'm sick of hearing about it. They talk, talk and there are no changes. They should take decisions to make things better so people can see it," said Igor Smimov.

World Kenya tightens 1-party control

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — The one-party government on Thursday broadened its crackdown on proponents of multiparty democracy, arresting four more prominent Kenyans, including the son of a former vice president.

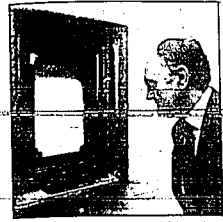
The wives of two detained opposition leaders pleaded with President Daniel arap Moi's government to refrain from torture in what appeared to be the harshest crackdown since 1982.

Thursday's arrests, of three

lawyers and of the son of a former vice president, brought to at least 11 the number of people detained since Wednesday by the single-party government, according to detainees' families and other sources close to opposition figures.

Several other prominent Kenyans went into hiding Thursday night.

The arrests follow months of official criticism of those calling for reform, and come in advance of a rumored rally for multiparty democracy that the government has vowed to prevent.

Paris closes 5 museums after thefts

nently closed five Paris museums to individual visitors Thursday, an unprecedented step prompted by three thefts in one day, including a Renoir sliced from its frame at the Louvre.

The city's major museums will remain open, but security will be tightened, said Jacques Sallois, director of national museums. Authorities plan to examine existing security systems and develop new ones similar to those used in banks.

Police said it was possible that the same person or group hit all three museums during a span of several hours Wednesday, moving from one museum to another in the middle of the day.

In addition to the Renoir, an 1816 painting by Paul Huet was stolen from the Carnavalet Museum, and an 1870 work by Ernest Hebert was stolen from a museum named after the artist.

The Hebert was one of the five museums closed as of Thursday to individual visitors. The others — also relatively small institutions focusing on the works or the collections of a particular individual — are the Eugene Delacroix, Gustave Moreau, Jean-Jacques Henner and Etienne museums.

From now on, group visits to these museums must be arranged in advance, Sallois said.

Police have complained previously that museum officials were not as aggressive enough or candid enough in dealing with thefts, Sallois, who took up his post only five weeks ago, vowed this would change, and said art theft would no longer be a "taboo subject" for public discussion.

The Louvre's director, Michael Laclotte, said the theft of Renoir's "Portrait of a Seated Woman" (1890-95) appeared to be the work of an "especially clever" professional.

"The canvas was very thin, the cutting instrument was probably extremely sharp and caustic enough to cut through the electronic sensor did not tick them up," he said.

Laclotte led reporters to the spot where the portrait had been hanging — an isolated stairwell leading to the Denon Gallery, on the top floor of the Pavillon de Flore overlooking the Seine. Head painting curator Pierre Rosenberg said the Renoir had been on display in the stairwell for several years, due to renovations in other sections of the museum, once a royal palace.

Salvadoran suspect still free

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — A high-ranking military officer accused of covering up the murder of six Jesuit priests remained in command of an elite infantry battalion Thursday, nine days after a judge ordered his arrest.

Lt. Col. Canillo Hernandez said last week he would turn himself in when ordered to do so by Defense Minister Humberto Larrazola or by Col. Rene Emilio Ponce, head of the joint chiefs of staff.

Ponce said the Defense Ministry did not receive a copy of the arrest warrant until Thursday, more than a week after it was issued.

"We will proceed with the detention of Lt. Col. Hernandez," Ponce said in a telephone interview. "But by midday Hernandez was still on duty at the infantry headquarters."

By uncanceling a show, the network chiefs are either a) saving the producer money; b) admitting they made a mistake in not scheduling a show for fall; c) doing it because they simply like the show; or d) all of the above.

Thus, more producers than ever are going to bat for their shows, and their pleas for survival are being heeded more often than ever before.

Bob Myman, executive producer for "Anything But Love," couldn't officially confirm that ABC had ordered nine segments of the series for next season — as has been widely reported. There remain some 'I's to dot and 't's to cross before the deal is done.

David Jacobs, executive producer of "Paradise," said, "I'd like to think CBS gave a pick-up to 'Paradise' (for eight episodes next season) because I flew to New York and gave my pitch. But I can't say that's what they did. All I know is that I made it as difficult as possible for CBS to kill my show."

Jacobs said he fully believed "Paradise" was a gonner after CBS announced its fall schedule in May and

his show wasn't on it. "I called everyone and said we were dead."

It wasn't until the next day that Jacobs got the word that "Paradise" would be coming back after all.

"The last time I'd gone to New York for a meeting like this was during the third season of 'Knots Landing,' and it helped that time, I believe," Jacobs said.

"I didn't get down on one knee or anything this time. I simply pointed out how the show didn't lose money, how it finished second in its time period, how the critics have taken to it and the viewers are fanatics. Maybe a passionate producer means more to the networks than it used to."

Ken Johnson certainly hopes that's the case. The executive producer of Fox's popular "Alien Nation," Johnson was "shocked" when the network opted not to renew the show for a third season despite the critical kudos and fanatical following.

"There were people at Fox Broadcasting who were shocked, too," said Johnson, who also produced "The Bionic Woman," "The Incredible Hulk" and "V."

"I think it was (Fox chairman) Barry Diller's decision, solely,

mean, they had already purchased six scripts for next season, they seemed very pleased with what we'd done. It didn't make sense. This show hasn't come close to hitting its peak yet."

Johnson has met with Fox programming chief Peter Chernin and reports there's still hope for an uncancelation. It doesn't hurt that the grass-roots, Virginia-based Viewers for Quality Television group has launched a campaign to bring the show back.

Producers who once were forced to live and die by the network sword now find new production avenues available to them in cable and syndication.

Before CBS renewed "Paradise," there had been talk that Jacobs had been approached by cable's Family Channel to air the show there in original episodes. Dead on the network doesn't necessarily mean gone for good, which is exemplified by the original run of "The Days and Nights of Molly Dodd" on Lifetime.

But even the presence of cable isn't likely to rescue the CBS Vietnam drama "Four of a Day," which has been sent packing. The pleas of executive producer Zev Braun have

fallen on deaf CBS ears.

"At least we've tried," said Steve Smith, co-executive producer of "Four of a Day." "We tried like mad to convince Sagansky that our ratings were a result of our horrible timeslot, and that we'd pulled 30 percent better numbers than 'TV 101' had in that same time period the year before. There isn't much left to talk about. I'd say we're a dead issue."

Smith said it's too bad the show couldn't have had even another partial season to tell its war story. "We were planning to deal with life back in the United States for several of the GIs who'd returned home from the war. We could have talked about domestic events and how they impacted on the vets."

"But I can understand where Sagansky is coming from. The man is under a lot of pressure from CBS stockholders to deliver audience. He needs to hit some home runs, and he knows our show is probably never going to be better than a base hit as far as the ratings are concerned."

KETCHUM - Summer is in full swing and to help celebrate, art galleries throughout Ketchum are opening their doors tonight for their new July shows.

The art openings, complete with complimentary beverages and hors d'oeuvres, will be held from 6 to 9 p.m. Most galleries are within easy walking distance, making for an enjoyable summer evening stroll and entertainment. The shows will hang through the month of July, with the next opening scheduled for Aug. 3.

The Broschovsky Gallery, located at 616 and 1st, is showing a new Mexican artist, Carlos Gubbs' "Blanket Series" of paintings. The bold, graphic designs of Gubbs' paintings have a contemporary appeal, but have been influenced by the beauty of the design and color of Navajo weavings.

A new artist, Alan J. Mott, is showing the oil paintings of B.C. Nowlin. Rich in symbolism, Nowlin's paintings depict the Indian people and their southwestern landscape.

A one-man exhibit of Russel Chatham's prints and drawings at the Kneeland Gallery, 271 First Ave. N., coincides with the artist's 30-year retrospective "One Hundred Paintings" which is on display at the Museum of the Rockies in Boise.

"Die Hard 2" is a thoroughly suspenseful movie in which Bruce Willis repeats his role as John McClane, the New York cop who is relocating in California.

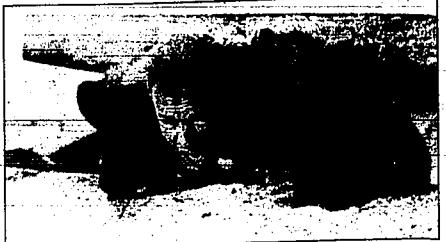

The film has its share of corpses, but there is very little spatter. The casualties in this film suffer "clean" deaths, though the destruction of a passenger plane, with all the passengers on board dying, will be repellent to some.

That, however, is about the worst this action film offers, and if you can get past that, you're almost home. You also have to get past the very first cliché of the captain of the airport police who will not let our hero do what he does best, save the day.

This time, Willis' character finds himself in Washington at Dulles Airport where terrorists take over the facility. They don't do it by force. They do it electronically, but the result is the same. They have the entire airport under their control, and it is up to McClane to take them out.
