# Suit rekindles Hawkins legal battling

TWIN FALLS — A Twin Falls attorney has rekindled legal battles over the failed Hawkins Co. Ltd. warehouse in Filer with a class-action lawsuit.

Lloyd Walker, on behalf of three clients, has charged in a civil lawsuit that the bean warehouse's directors and the Idaho Department of Agriculture should have notified growers in May 1988 that the warehouse was short of beans. 5th District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt on Friday agreed to

allow the lawsuit to proceed as a class action.

If farmers had known of the May shortage, Walker argues, they wouldn't have deposited beans from 1988's crop in the warehouse — eventually losing about one-half of that crop, or \$5 million.

Hawkins Co. closed its doors in November 1988 when a year-end inventory found the warehouse short of beans. After the Department of Agriculture seized the warehouse and started liquidation procedures, Hawkins filed for bankruptcy.

But according to Walker's lawsuit, the

warehouse's directors either knew or should have known in May 1988 that the warehouse was short of beans. That's when a state audit found bean shortages.

And, the lawsuit alleges, the department had an obligation to either close the warehouse or notify the public that a shortage existed.

The year-long ordeal that was the Hawkins bankruptcy ended when the majority of its growers agreed last December to accept \$19.92 per hundredweight of 1988 beans and \$18.42 for prior years' beans.

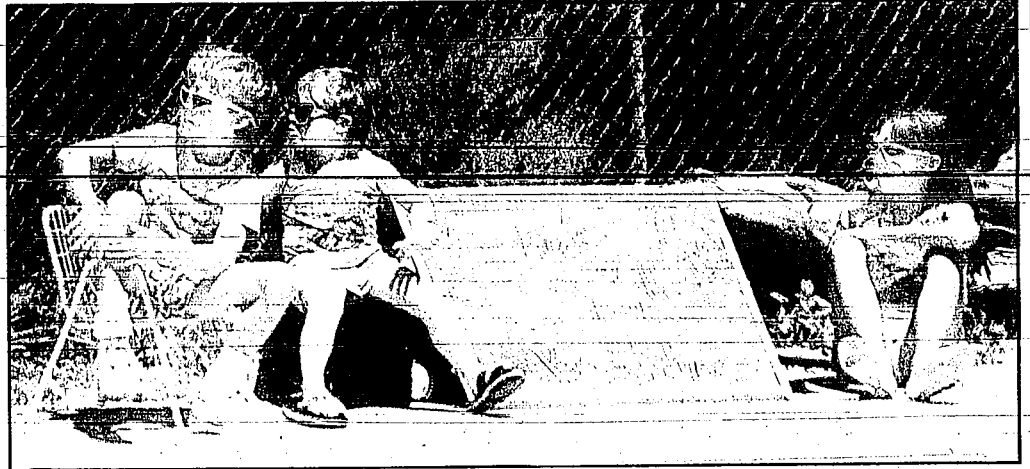
Walker also claims that Klein Bros. Ltd., a Stockton, Calif.-based bean warehouse, wasn't entitled to 110,000 hundredweight of beans it purchased during 1988.

Hawkins didn't own those beans, "but were in fact embezzled," Walker argues in court documents. Walker is asking for \$3.5 million in damages from Klein.

"My theory is you can't go to a pawn shop and buy a diamond that was stolen and get title to that diamond," Walker said in an interview Friday.

## Nation's jobless rate dips slightly

WASHINGTON — The nation's unemployment rate edged downward to 5.2 percent last month despite an ongoing slide in manufacturing and overall weakness in job growth, the government reported Friday.

Fewer Americans looking for work — not any rebound in sluggish economic activity — accounted for the improvement over May's jobless rate of 5.3 percent, analysts said.

"It's not that more people are getting jobs, fewer guys are looking," said Elliott Platt, an economist with Donaldson, Lufkin & Jenrette Securities Corp. of New York.

The economy added just 40,000 jobs to non-farm payrolls in June, the Labor Department said.

However, that figure would be closer to 97,000 if the temporary census workers the federal government laid off in June were not included in the count, the

Valley figures cover only three counties. Figures for other Magic Valley counties were unavailable Friday.

The statewide unemployment rate, after sitting at a two-year high of 6 percent for much of the spring, dropped two notches.

The Department of Employment on Friday estimated June's unemployment rate at

5.8 percent. The number of Idahoans without jobs fell to its lowest level since March.

"This decrease in unemployment reflects the increased employment in packing sheds, lumber and tourism industries," department analysts said. They also cited the

# Powerful hand cuts chase short

JEROME — Officer James Baker was chasing a youth into a field Thursday night when he said, an invisible hand grabbed him and held him like a magnet.

"I thought I was going to die," the 25-year-old Jerome police officer said.

Baker, trying to leap an electrified fence, somehow became entangled in it. Convulsed by the current, he was unable to free himself and remained trapped until fellow officers arrived several minutes later.

If the fence had held him any longer, he would have died, doctors told Baker.

"I feel very lucky. I feel God was with me," he said in a telephone interview from Magic Valley Regional Medical Center Friday, where muscle and nerve damage were being assessed.

"I've hopped a lot of fences chasing people, but I never expected one of them to reach out and grab me," he said.

The electricity caused no permanent damage, although Baker said he couldn't feel his legs for a few hours. His left hand bears marks of clutching uncontrollably at barbed wire.

# NATO extends hand of friendship to Gorbachev

LONDON — The NATO allies pledged Friday to sharply reduce both nuclear and conventional defenses in Europe, extending "the hand of friendship" to Mikhail S. Gorbachev and the rest of Eastern Europe.

Solemnly, President Bush and his 15 Western alliance partners assured the Soviet leader, who is under attack from left and right at the 28th Communist Party Congress in Moscow, that they hold "no

aggressive intentions" and "will never in any circumstance be the first to use force."

In Moscow, Gorbachev said he was ready to accept the leaders' invitation to address a meeting of the Western alliance, probably in December.

But Gorbachev could take little comfort

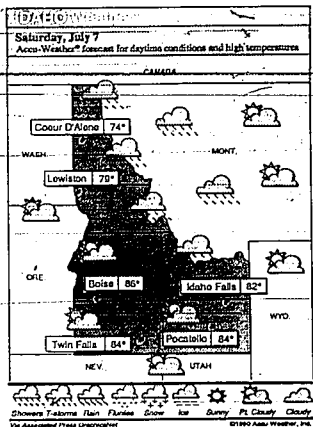
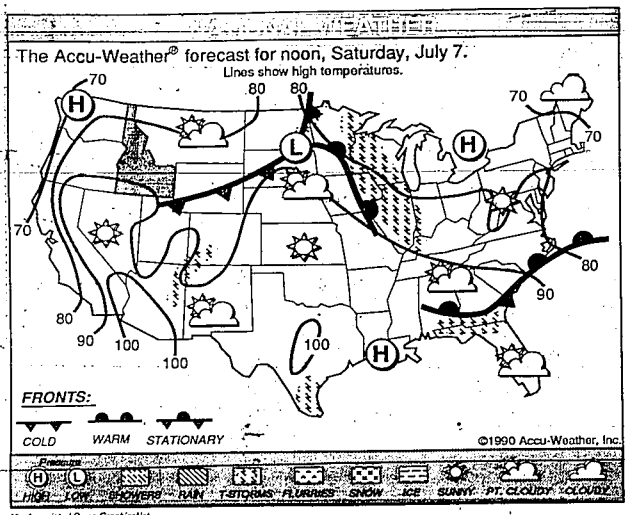
from Bush's comment that he had "big problems" with the idea of direct Western economic aid to the Soviet Union — a subject likely to dominate the Houston economic summit where Bush and many of the other Western leaders were flying after the NATO meeting.

In London, the allies agreed to shrink their arsenal of battlefield nuclear weapons in tandem with Soviet action — and relegate them to highly unlikely last-resort use.

They also said, in their windup communiqué, that "once negotiations begin on short-range nuclear forces, the alliance will propose, in return for reciprocal action by the Soviet Union, the elimination of all its nuclear artillery shells from Europe."

They also decided to field smaller and restructured ground forces, in the newest sign that NATO's 40-year job of containing potential Soviet-bloc aggression was nearing a successful end.

### Mother Nature takes her turn with fire works

Rain fell over the central part of the nation Friday, and hot weather snapped temperature records up to 88 years old in the Southeast.

### Yeltsin warns party traditionalists intransigence will not pay

MOSCOW (AP) — Boris N. Yeltsin warned Communist Party traditionalists Friday that the price of their intransigence will be nationalization of party property and demands that they stand trial for ruining Soviet society.

Yeltsin brought the wave of public indignation that propelled him to the presidency of the huge Russian republic to the fifth day of the 28th Communist Party congress at the Kremlin's Palace of Congresses.

Reformers got their chance to fight back against the Communist traditionalists who dominated the first week of the congress and blamed Mikhail S. Gorbachev for the party's loss of popularity and ideological drift.

"It is an illusion to think that after all dissenters, all who do not wish to be driven by us and eggs of the party, quit the party, it will retain all the property of the Soviet Communist Party and the associated authority," he said.

"It will not be so. If this is the case... the people will start struggling for the full nationalization of the property of the party," Yeltsin said.

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# Alaska wildfires menace small town

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Wildfires charred about 400 square miles of Alaska forests and tundra by Friday. They still threatened the town of Tok, where firefighters kept up a house-to-house battle against wind-driven flames.

"We're afraid the fire will blow back down in a different direction," said Rob McWhorter of the Bureau of Land Management in Tok, a crossroads town on the Alaska Highway 80 miles from the Canadian border.

The gusty winds that fanned flames around Tok in recent days eased and the fire's growth slowed, but officials told residents to remain prepared to evacuate.

The fire, which grew to more than 53 square miles, leaped trees and fire lines Thursday to come within a quarter-mile of some homes before sweeping northwest Friday. When the flames got that close, some 300 of the town's 1,200 residents evacuated; most returned to their homes Friday, McWhorter said.

Firefighters widened fire lines Friday but the blaze remained close.

"In some cases there are some spot fires on the edge of town left over from yesterday," McWhorter said.

"It's not under control but the fire quieted down overnight," said Steve Mitchell, a spokeswoman for an interagency fire center in Fairbanks. "The fire created its own lightning storm" which dropped a little rain on the area. It wasn't much, but it helped a little bit."

It was report Thursday that Tok's Coast Guard navigational station burned was incorrect. It only lost power. The station was back on line early Friday after the seven crewman stationed there returned to the unit.

"Our priority for today is to continue to defend the community, to rebuild and expand lines on the west side of the town," McWhorter said.

Statewide, an estimated 1,200 firefighters were deployed as 37 new fires Friday brought to 184 the number burning out of control across Alaska's interior, said Pat Flowers, an interagency spokesman.

The blazes consumed at least 253,500 acres, or 396 square miles, Flowers said.

Gov. Steve Cooper declared a statewide emergency, and called on the Alaska National Guard to help fight the fires.

"Most of the fires were blamed on near-record heat, low humidity and lightning strikes.

Hot, dry conditions were forecast to continue across Alaska's midsection, stirring up afternoon thundershowers with unpredictable wind."

"The winds are highly variable, swinging like 90 degrees on the compass within a 60-second period," McWhorter said. "That's one of the most dangerous combinations for firefighters you can possibly dream up."

The fire burned mainly black spruce, birch, aspen and brush on the flat terrain around Tok, where some residents wore masks to filter out smoke.

"The weathering the most is breathing. The burnt spruce needles falling out of the air, said one resident, Mellie Terwilliger. "You can see but you go around with your lights on."

Authorities closed two main roads Tuesday, but traffic resumed early Friday. Tok is about 260 miles northeast of Anchorage at the junction of the Glenn and Alaska highways.

The Cassiar Creek fire, 52 miles north of Fairbanks, charred about 2,000 acres by early Friday.

Though Baker said he feels like he was "hit by a Mack truck," he'll be able to walk in a few days.

At 11:30 p.m. Thursday, Baker was pursuing a car whose driver he suspected of being drunk, Officer Pat Ward said. The driver pulled over in the 900 block of South Lincoln Street and ran toward a field, she said.

Baker was gaining on the fugitive as they approached the waist-high fence.

The youth jumped the fence, but Baker, weighted down with gear, was seized at his left side and captured by the current.

"It just grabbed me. I never saw the hot wire or anything," Baker said.

He has no idea how long the electricity ran through his body, or how strong its voltage was. He felt like a tomato being squeezed, he said.

Confused and shaking, he managed to clasp his radio with his right hand to summon help.

Fellow officers found him lying among the weeds, with his left foot still tangled in the fence and electricity still flowing through his body. The youth he had been pursuing got away, but police seized the car.

"I just feel lucky I got a second chance and I thank all the people that were there," Baker said.

He'll return to work after he convalesces, he said, but he'll be less inclined to jump fences.

"Every time I come up to a fence, I think I'll walk around," he said.

agency said.

The last six months of 1990, private sector businesses have been adding about 110,000 jobs a month, or about half the 220,000 average jobs gain for the same period last year, the government said.

"There's no real zip in this economy, but you don't have the combination of recessionary forces to drag it into negative territory, either," Platt said.

The report's evidence of continued softness, at a time when unemployment is still relatively low, provides a puzzling picture for the Federal Reserve, which has been under pressure to lower interest rates, analysts said.

Revised figures for May showed that about 155,000 new jobs were added that month, excluding census workers, up from the original report of 140,000 jobs, the Labor Department said.

Unemployment has been fluctuating within a tenth of a percentage point of 5.3 percent for more than a year after hitting a 15-year low of 5 percent in March 1989.

The rate has managed to stay relatively low, despite weak job growth, because smaller numbers of Americans are entering the labor force, said Janet Norwood, commissioner of the Bureau of Economic Analysis.

So far this year, only about 290,000 Americans have entered the work force, compared with the 1.5 million Americans who joined the labor force during the first half of 1989, Mrs. Norwood said.

The nation's manufacturing sector, which has been on a downward spiral for months, continued its slide in June as factory payrolls fell by 31,000 jobs. It was the 14th time in 15 months that manufacturing jobs declined.

The number of construction jobs fell in June for the 11th month in a row, reflecting continued weakness in the housing market, the government said. Construction payrolls, after seasonal adjustment, dropped 14,000.

Meanwhile, the service sector, which has been providing most of the economy's steam over the past several months, added 83,000 jobs, including 40,000 in the health services industry.

Retail trade businesses lost 7,000 jobs in June, bringing the monthly job loss to the first half of this year. That total adds up to 15,000, half the average for 1989.

General merchandise stores have been particularly hard hit in that sector, losing 50,000 jobs over the past year, Mrs. Norwood said.

The number of discouraged workers — people who want a job but have given up looking — averaged about 900,000 for the April to May period, an increase of nearly 150,000 over the first quarter of 1990, the agency said.

That increase brought the number of discouraged workers to its highest level since the end of 1988.

Labor costs, which have been pushing up and are being blamed for fueling the nation's inflation problems, continued to increase. Average hourly earnings posted a 0.3 percent rise in June to \$10.01, up from the \$9.98 the average worker earned per hour in May.

The average manufacturing work week was unchanged from May at 41.0 hours. Manufacturing overtime held at 3.8 hours in June.

In a separate calculation of unemployment that counts members of the armed services stationed in the United States, the June jobless rate was 5.1 percent, down from 5.3 percent in May and the same as June's civilian rate.

# Rocky Flats' lax security stops work

WASHINGTON — The Energy Department has suspended handling of all plutonium at its Rocky Flats, Colo., nuclear weapons plant because of security breakdowns.

Rocky Flats, perhaps the most troubled of the 17 Energy Department plants that manufacture the components of nuclear weapons, produces the plutonium triggers that ignite nuclear chain reactions.

Its manufacturing operations have been suspended since December because of safety and environmental problems. The latest order applies to all handling and movement of nuclear materials, the department's announcement said.

The announcement gave no details of the security breaches. But Beth Brainard, the DOE spokeswoman at Rocky Flats, partially confirmed reports by enlisting the plant that sensitivity levels on metal detectors were set so low that investigators were able to carry plutonium out of the plant in their steel-toed work boots.

Investigators from the department's Albuquerque regional office found "several deficiencies" in an inspection of the plant's "safeguards and security," a phrase that "refers to physically protecting weapon components, special nuclear material and classified documents," the department said.

"There was a situation where they were able to get something going in, not going out," Brainard said. "The detectors were set to accommodate the shoes" of workers going in and out all day, she said. Henceforth, the detectors will be wear different types of footwear, she said.

She said Robert M. Nelson, manager of the department's Rocky Flats office, had ordered that "two guards be present and a separate security plan be devised for any material that would be moved under the overall security regime is revised."

Energy Secretary James D. Watkins, aiming to restart plutonium processing at Rocky Flats this summer, has ordered a six-week "operational readiness review" that began this week.

end of the spring semester, at the state's colleges, removing students returning home from the labor force.

But last month's rate was six-tenths of a point higher than either the national rate or Idaho's rate a year ago, the fifth straight month current jobless rates have exceeded both those benchmarks.

State analysts said claims for unemployment insurance benefits were down in all industries except food processing, which was going

through its seasonal layoffs for plant maintenance before the 1990 harvest begins.

That situation was reflected in the regional jobless rates. Only Canyon County, where a large proportion of the work force is involved in food processing, posted an increase in its unemployment rate over May.

## Explosion at Texas chemical plant kills 17, levels huge area

CHANNELVIEW, Texas (AP) — An explosion that could be heard 20 miles away leveled an area the size of a city block at a chemical plant, killing 17 people and injuring five others, authorities said Friday.

"It looks like a bomb went off in there," said Richard Bailey, chief investigator for the Harris County Sheriff's Department Arson Division.

A tank exploded at about 11:30 p.m. Thursday at the plant about 15 miles east of Houston. The resulting fire was out by dawn.

Company firefighters sprayed the area as other workers pulled bodies from tons of twisted pipe and debris.

"In my 32 years with Arco Chemical Company, I can't remember any single accident of this dimension where we've had multiple loss of

life to the extent we had here," said Jack Johnson, president of Arco Chemical of North America. "It certainly is a time that all of the employees and myself grieve the loss of fellow employees. One loss of life is not acceptable."

Assistant U.S. Secretary of Labor Gerard F. Seannell was en route to Houston to lead a federal investigation of the accident, the Labor Department said.

"People as far as 20 miles away reported hearing the blast at the plant, which has more than 350 employees."

"I seen a big flash cross in front of my eyes. I looked over to my left and I saw a big ball of fire. ... It looked to me like a tank run off, you know, like a rocket just took off," said Mike Zugel, a truck driver.

"I was in a trailer and I was sitting down about to get up, and it sounded like a car ran into the side of the trailer," said Tommy McBridge, who was working at a janitorial service not far from the plant. "When we went out of there, it was like a nuclear explosion — just orange flames."

"It sounded like somebody was breaking the house in," said Deborah Baumbach, who lives six miles from the blast site.

Plant Manager Earl McCaleb said two tanks that collected waste water and chemicals exploded for an unknown reason. The larger tank held 900,000 gallons, he said. The company had no capacity figure for the smaller tank.

"They were not cleaning out the tank," McCaleb said.

### Snyder was committed to homeless

## Snyder was committed to homeless

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mitch Snyder, whose personal demons apparently overwhelmed his fierce commitment to the nation's homeless, was remembered Friday as "a man of justice" who worked tirelessly to assist the downtrodden.

Jesse Jackson told a memorial service at Bible Way Church that Snyder was a man who heard and answered a "moral call" to help the homeless.

"The fact that birds have a home, foxes have a home, and yet men and women, veterans of foreign wars, mothers and fathers, working poor people, have no place to lay their heads," he found that to be a moral disgrace," Jackson told about 600 mourners.

Snyder's body was discovered Thursday hanging from an electrical cord in his private room at the Washington shelter he founded. A police statement called the death "an apparent suicide."

Dr. Georges Benjamin, the city's public health commissioner, said Snyder's death was the result of "asphyxiation by hanging."

Benjamin said investigators cannot pinpoint when Snyder died. The death has not yet been ruled a suicide, but Benjamin said there is no evidence of foul play.

Police said a note containing "suicidal references" was found near Snyder's body, and law enforcement sources said the note outlined personal problems Snyder was having in his 15-year relationship with fellow homeless advocate Carol Fenelly.

The two had said last month that they would be married in September.

At the memorial service, Jackson described Snyder's dramatic efforts to draw attention to homelessness, which included hunger strikes and sit-ins.

"Mitch was a little eccentric, Mitch was a little off," Jackson said to appreciative laughs from the mourners, many of whom live at Snyder's shelter. "But he was a man of justice. There's something to be said about being a little off."

A close friend of Snyder's who spoke with him Tuesday described him as "very down, very despondent."

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — The Louisiana House voted 86-3 Friday to change the state's method of executing killers from electrocution to injection.

Louisiana has executed 19 inmates by electrocution since the

1976 U.S. Supreme Court ruling allowed states to resume use of the death penalty.

The state Senate had already passed the bill but will vote on it again to concur in minor House amendments. The measure then goes to Gov. Buddy Roemer.

## Louisiana House votes to override abortion veto

BATON ROUGE, La. (AP) — The Louisiana House on Friday night voted to override Gov. Buddy Roemer's veto of the nation's strongest state abortion bill, which contains no exceptions for rape or incest.

The vote was 72-30, two more votes than needed for a House veto override.

The state Senate was expected to vote later Friday on overriding the veto Roemer issued earlier in the day.

If the Senate also voted to override, it would be the first time a Louisiana governor has had a veto overridden this century.

The measure would send doctors who perform abortions to jail for up to 10 years and fined them up to \$100,000. It was written for the purpose of challenging the 1973 Supreme Court decision that legalized abortion.

Also Friday, anti-abortion activists in Michigan filed petitions with more than 330,000 signatures to initiate a bill that would require girls to have a parent's consent before obtaining an abortion.

Roemer signed the veto Friday morning, according to his staff attorney, John Kennedy.

In his veto message, Roemer called the issue "one of the most wrenching and divisive issues to be faced by this Legislature."

"He also responded to charges by backers of the bill that he has changed his position on abortion since he was a congressman, running for governor, in 1987.

"As a member of Congress, I consistently voted to curb abortion on demand and to protect the life of a fetus," Roemer wrote in the veto message.

"I initially voted for the exception to save the life of a mother, but over the years of struggling with this issue I became acutely aware of the need to except those instances where conception occurred because of rape or incest.

"Women cannot and should not be forced to bear the consequences of these traumatic, illegal acts."

Roemer has repeatedly said he sides with anti-abortion forces but cannot allow a bill without rape and incest exceptions to become law.

## Demos say Soviet decline irreversible

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Democrats, trying to bolster their plea for cuts in defense spending, said Friday that Soviet military strength is declining irreversibly and "becoming an empty threat."

But the 15 Republicans on a special panel of the House Armed Services Committee immediately rejected the Defense Policy Panel report as overly optimistic.

"Endorsing this report is tantamount to believing that the Soviet Union is already militarily impotent and not a global power to be reckoned with. Such a view is more wishful thinking than a reflection of reality," said Rep. William Dickinson of Alabama, ranking Republican on the committee.

"The GOP members," in a dissenting opinion included in the 310-page report, cited the absence of a U.S.-Soviet treaty to scale back conventional forces in Europe, the unclear future of a unified Germany and the economic and political instability in Eastern Europe.

The Republicans also said the House-approved budget that calls for a \$296 billion in defense spending for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1 would vary too much out of the U.S. military.

President Bush has proposed spending \$303 billion on defense in fiscal 1991.

The 17 Democrats on the panel, largely summing up testimony before the Armed Services Committee during the past year, con-

cluded that the Soviet conventional threat to the United States and NATO is "greatly diminished and cannot be revived."

Based on that assessment, reductions in defense spending are in order, the Democrats said.

"Old assumptions about the Soviet threat don't jibe with reality anymore," said Rep. Les Aspin, D-Wis., chairman of the House Armed Services Committee. "Many of the changes are irreversible, and that means we can cut selectively without jeopardizing our security."

The report cited the testimony of CIA Director William Webster, who told the Armed Services Committee on March 1 that the lessening Soviet conventional threat would "be increasingly difficult to reverse."

Planned withdrawal of Soviet troops from Europe, as announced by President Mikhail S. Gorbachev in December 1988, will continue as long as the Kremlin leader remains in power, the report said.

Even if Gorbachev is replaced, another regime would be forced to follow the same policies, according to the U.S. intelligence community.

"In short, there has been too much change in the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe for the reduction in the threat to be reversed," the report said.

In addition, the Soviet Union's global conventional threat has decreased, but not as dramatically as its decline in Europe.

### Hazelton youth killed in rollover near Eden

EDEN - A Hazelton youth was killed and three other Hazelton teen-agers were injured early Friday morning when their car rolled over on the frontage road along Interstate 84, according to the Idaho State Police.

Patrick Bentley, 17, died at the scene of the accident, two miles east of the Traveler's Oasis Truck Stop on 1010 South Road.

The driver of the eastbound car, Kode Craner, 17, was changing a tape when the car went off the south side of the road at 1:30 a.m. Craner overcorrected and the car rolled onto its top on the north side of the road, police said.

Bentley, who was in the back seat, was partially ejected and struck a post along the freeway.

Craner, Alethea Jolley, 16, and Tricia Huddleston, also 16, were treated and released from Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, the state police reported.

Nobody wore seat belts. The accident is under investigation, a dispatcher said.

### Examiners won't report on suspect's 'criminal intent'

HAILEY - The psychiatrists or licensed psychologists who will examine Mitchell John Odiaga in the next month will not report on whether he had "mens rea" - a Latin term for the criminal intent element of first-degree murder.

Fifth District Magistrate Judge Barry Wood decided to let the District Court decide on the issue, Blaine County Public Defender Brian Elkins said Friday. Earlier this week, Wood OK'd two psychiatric evaluations for the murder suspect, one by a psychiatrist or licensed psychologist affiliated with the state and another by an independent doctor of Odiaga's choice.

Elkins had requested an evaluation to determine whether Odiaga, a 25-year-old Boise man, understands the proceedings against him and can assist in his defense.

Blaine County Prosecutor Ned Williamson, who must prove Odiaga premeditated the killings, asked that Odiaga be examined for criminal intent.

Odiaga is charged with two counts of first-degree murder and one count each of attempted first-degree murder, aggravated assault and reckless driving in connection with the shooting deaths of two people on Ketchum streets on June 22.

### State food quality committee will meet Monday at CSI

TWIN FALLS - The committee that recently selected Twin Falls as the location for a new food quality assurance laboratory will meet Monday at the College of Southern Idaho.

The laboratory was funded last spring by the Idaho Legislature to provide a method for food producers to insure that hazardous agricultural chemicals and drugs do not enter the state's food.

The committee, made up of farmers, food manufacturers, and agricultural organizations will tour the CSI campus in the morning and eat lunch in the Taylor cafeteria at noon. The committee will discuss construction of the laboratory.

### Suspicious fire in Gooding destroys electronics center

GOODING - A suspicious fire destroyed the Strout TV & Audio Center on Main Street Thursday night, Gooding Fire Chief Pat Bishop said.

The fire was reported at 11:50 p.m., Bishop said, and flames were jumping out of the rear of the store when firefighters arrived.

Next to the store, the Frontier Bar was evacuated, and the bar as well as the building next to it were damaged by smoke, Bishop said.

There were no injuries.

The cause of the fire is under investigation, the fire chief said, and is considered suspicious. Twenty-one firefighters and three engines responded to the scene. The fire was doused by 3 a.m.

### Twin Falls police arrest pair on parole violations Friday

TWIN FALLS - Police here arrested two people on parole violations Friday after watching a home on Jackson Street.

"It could have been sticky," said Lt. Jim Kistler, a Twin Falls police detective, "but there were no narcotics."

Richard Jack Mills, 31, and Loretta Lynn Reis, also known as Lorie Reis, 24, were arrested at about 1:15 p.m. after they left the house in separate cars.

Police received information that the two were in town and that they may be armed, Kistler said.

Mills was wanted for a parole violation in Ada County, having been convicted twice on charges of armed robbery, Kistler said. Reis was wanted in Gooding County for parole violation, stemming from a conviction on drug-related and forgery charges.

The girl received two broken and one cracked rib, head injuries and internal bruising to the chest cavity area in the Fourth of July incident, Cochran said. Nita Ott said she was sitting on a sidewalk Wednesday with Carl on her lap, watching the Kellz Sagebrush Days Parade. At 11:37 a.m., four F-4 Phantom jets flew overhead, startling some horses in the parade.

One horse wouldn't settle down, Ott said, and "the more the lady pulled on the reins, the more it backed into us."

With people all around, the Otts couldn't back away from the animal, and its hind legs stepped on them.

Ott said she was scared, but it all happened very fast.

"I couldn't say what my thoughts were," she said. "I honestly don't know."

Carl couldn't stand up for a while, but Thursday night he began to walk and "show off," Ott said.

He'll return to day care Monday, she said.

## Appeals court sustains drug conviction

BOISE - The Idaho Court of Appeals will not overturn the conviction and prison term of up to 15 years ordered in a Twin Falls drug case.

Kirk Christiansen contended his arrest was illegal because officers entered his residence before they obtained a search warrant.

But in an opinion written by Judge Deborah Bail, a 4th District judge sitting with the Court of Appeals, the argument was rejected.

Court records said a search of his residence produced drug paraphernalia, \$11,900 in cash, nine ounces of cocaine and 16 ounces of marijuana.

The Court of Appeals upheld Christiansen's conditional plea of guilty. Fifth District Judge Donal Mehall sentenced him to a fixed term of five years and up to 10 years following for selling cocaine. He was sentenced to one day fixed and up to 364 days on a second charge of possessing more than three ounces of marijuana.

Christiansen also argued his sentence was excessive, because he had no prior felonies on his record.

But the Court of Appeals noted that Christiansen had a significant misdemeanor record, "which would give some cause for concern about his willingness and ability to be law-abiding."

The district judge noted Christiansen was a drug user, describing him as a man with a \$100,000 per year habit, the court said.

## Idaho beef producers seeing red over country singer's taste for vegetables

TWIN FALLS - Idaho's biggest industry hopes to put Canadian country-western singer k.d. lang in her place for saying, "Meat stinks" in television commercials that have not yet appeared on the air.

The Idaho Farm Bureau and the Idaho Cattle Association jumped on a boycott bandwagon this week after radio commentator Paul Harvey told his national audience about lang's anti-beef activism.

"I think the boycott is a just reward for someone who is crazy enough to bite the hand that feeds her," Thomas Geary, Idaho Farm Bureau-Federation President, said in a press release.

KZQB Program Director Paul Anderson said Tuesday his Pocetello station won't play lang's music. He announced the station's participation in a national lang boycott while lunching on steak with Dan Hammond, president-elect of the Idaho Cattle Association.

But lang's manager said in a telephone interview from Vancouver, British Columbia, that the beef industry does not feed lang, a vegetarian who boycotts beef.

"I don't know that the cattle industry is something that feeds her physically or professionally," Larry Wanagus said.

Country radio stations have rarely given her much air time because she's "left of center," he said. "Radio" has never supported k.d. in America.

Anderson agrees. His station rarely got requests for lang's music and rarely played her songs, he said.

"I think her music probably sells very well with people who don't like other types of country," he said.

lang, who doesn't capitalize her name, sports a short haircut and eschews the ul-

tra-feminine image cultivated by country stars such as Dolly Parton and the Mandrell sisters. She grew up in Consort, Alberta, a tiny farm town on the Canada prairie with fewer than 500 residents.

She won her second Grammy Award this year. Fans learn about her through live performances and television appearances, not by radio play, Wanagus said. Anderson said he decided to participate in the boycott after listeners called to complain about her animal-rights activities.

But Sherry Kessler, program manager for country station KJZZ in Twin Falls said her station will not boycott lang.

"I think she's entitled to her own opinion," Kessler said.

Anderson said most callers supporting the lang boycott are men, but those opposed to the boycott are almost exclusively women, a phenomenon he could not explain.

The controversial television commercials were taped for People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals in Washington, D.C.-based animal-rights group.

In a press release Friday, PETA quoted ex-Beate Paul McCartney in support of lang.

"When they banned the Beatles in the '60s, it only helped to make us more popular," McCartney said. "I think the same will happen with k.d. lang. We support her 100 percent."

## Hagerman Council considers shorter alcohol sales times

HAGERMAN - A new ordinance to stop liquor sales an hour earlier on Friday and Saturday nights is being considered by the City Council.

But the change is being projected by bar owners and a number of other local residents.

Police Chief Todd Peterson said he was studying city codes and found that Hagerman has never adopted the Gooding County code of ending alcohol sales at 2 a.m. nor the Idaho State code of ending at 1 a.m.

"I just needed clarification from the council one way or

the other as to which law they wanted enforced," he said. "That was my only intention ... I can't enforce a law until the law is in writing."

Mayor Merle Owsley said Friday that the time change "was just brought up as a conversation" during the Tuesday council meeting and the matter has not been discussed or decided.

"On the 17th (at the next council meeting) we'll have an open hearing on it," he said.

Peterson said he suggested to the council Tuesday that he felt the state code was probably in the best interest of public safety and he gave copies of the code to the council members to review.

"In general, they asked me to take the codes to the city attorney and have them printed up in an ordinance," Peterson said.

He noted that the proposed new ordinance also would change the time liquor by the drink sales could start, cutting two hours from business, with sales beginning at noon instead of 10 a.m.

Gary Grissom, owner of the Quik Stop in Hagerman, said he and other local business owners are "dead against" the state's 1 a.m. time limit.

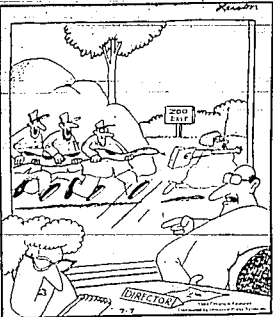

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Police on Friday attacked some of the thousands of pro-democracy demonstrators in Albania's capital near the embassy district, where thousands of freedom-seeking compatriots jammed diplomatic missions.

About 10,000 demonstrators gathered in a central square to demand that the leadership of the last hard-line Communist nation in Eastern Europe adopt major reforms, according to a sketchy report from Tirana by the Austria Press Agency.

The rush on the embassies continued Friday, even after the government of Ramiz Alia repeated a pledge to issue travel documents to all seeking to leave the country. Many people already had Albanian passports and exit visas and were seeking entry visas from the embassies. Some came and left during the day; others, mistrustful of the government's pledges, joined those already holed up for days, said diplomats who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The diplomats said conditions were worsening inside the embassies harboring Albanians. West German officials in Bonn said more than 1,000 asylum-seekers were in their Tirana embassy. An employee of the Italian Embassy in Tirana said the number there had grown to 700 by evening, while officials said the French Embassy held 200, the Italian Embassy 300, and the Polish and Czechoslovak embassies about 50 each.

One Western diplomat contacted in Tirana said as many as 4,000 Albanians were now pressed into embassies and their compounds, resulting in grave problems in food and water supplies.

But Kohl, while insisting on NATO membership for a unified Germany, will point to the changes adopted at the two-day summit aimed at making the alliance less threatening to the Kremlin. The democratically elected governments in Czechoslovakia, Poland and Hungary, in fact, would prefer keeping the mammoth new German state with nearly 80 million people embedded in the Western Alliance, Kohl said.

# Bulgarian president resigns under pressure

SOFIA, Bulgaria (AP) — Bulgaria's Socialist President Petar Mladenov submitted his resignation Friday, bowing to mounting pressure from striking students and the political opposition.

Mladenov's letter of resignation was read on television news at 8 p.m., meeting a deadline set by the students in an ultimatum issued earlier in the day.

The students chanted "Victory! Victory!" when they heard the news, the state BTA news agency reported.

They have been conducting a sit-in strike for nearly a month to push their demands for democratic change after the former Communists won last month's parliamentary elections, the first free balloting in Bulgaria in 58 years.

They demanded Mladenov's resignation after he used to suggest that tanks be used to stop anti-government demonstrators last December.

# Rebels attack Monrovia's port

MONROVIA, Liberia (AP) — Rebels firing heavy artillery attacked the capital's port Friday near the fortified mansion where President Samuel Doe tried to cling to power with a crumbling army.

Flumes of smoke from explosions rose from the city outskirts, and automatic rifle and artillery fire echoed across the besieged capital from dawn until noon.

A cannon from Doe's Israeli-built mansion fired two shells into the ocean to deter rebel boats. Doe, who seized power in a bloody coup in 1980, was in the executive mansion with troops of his minority tribe.

The 31-year-old fisherman discovered the ship in water about 40 yards deep and about 125 miles southeast

of Ho Chi Minh City, it said. It did not say when that happened.

The report said the 1,719 articles aboard included table sets, flower vases, plates and pans worth millions of dollars.

Archaeologists have not yet identified the ship, it said.

## Becker, Edberg face off Sunday at Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England — Boris Becker barely escaped the clutches of a teenage monster server, and Stefan Edberg left Ivan Lendl still prisoner to his Wimbledon obsession.

Becker, desperately swatting balls while lying on his back and leaping through the air, had to play one of his finest matches to get by 18-year-old Goran Ivanisevic 4-6, 7-6 (7-4), 6-0, 7-6 (7-5) and reach the finals against Edberg.

Becker and Ivanisevic electrified the Centre Court crowd, including royal-sisters-in-law Princess Diana and the Duchess of York, with 2½ hours of power tennis and diving volleys that will rank among the most glorious in Wimbledon's history.

Edberg played almost as brilliantly in a 6-1, 7-6 (7-2), 6-3 triumph but wasn't challenged. He beat a stunningly flat Lendl, who crept away glumly from the scene of his annual summer torment.

Lendl had used a Czech word, "zazrany," to describe his yearning to win Wimbledon. No one asked him the Czech word for choke.

Yet that is exactly what the top-seeded Lendl seemed to do. He looked tight, wooden, mechanical, while Edberg appeared fluid, relaxed and light on his feet.

"I didn't move well today...I felt a half-step slower," Lendl conceded after his worst loss in games since his first Wimbledon match in 1979.

Lendl, who has tilted at Wimbledon's windmills for 11 years, said he will pursue

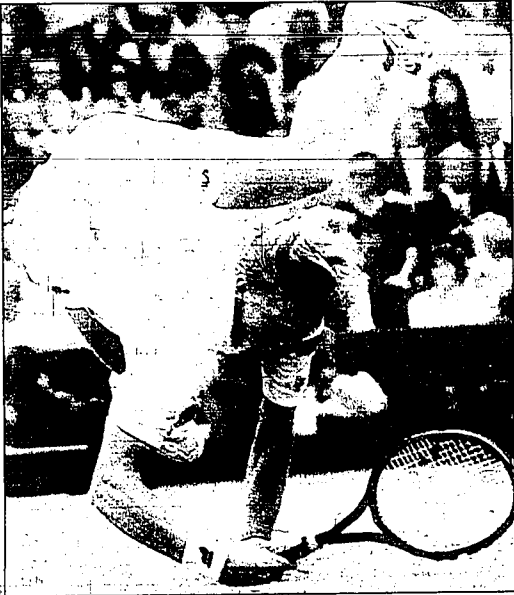

his quixotic dream again next year. He rejected any notion that his months of training on grass and his avoidance of the clay courts of the French Open had been for naught.

Edberg scorched Lendl in 23 minutes in the first set, winning the last five games while allowing Lendl only 10 points. Both players held service throughout the second set, but that merely set up a one-sided tiebreaker that Edberg published off with two blazing returns past a startled Lendl.

Lendl, broken in the sixth game of the third set and obviously headed toward defeat, couldn't help but smile at his cruel fate two games later.

## 6 crashes mar longest Ore-Ida stage

"It was crazy out there," Ketchum's Ruthie-Matthes said after Hines' win in 3 hours, 22 minutes and 20 seconds. A crash in the first mile bloodied and numbed Matthes' right hand. Another wreck in the last mile sent her to the medical van with a 4th-place finish, but still within 1:16 of overall race leader Inga Thompson of Reno, Nev., who was 12th.

Susan Sutton of Weight Watchers was second Friday, 15 seconds back, and Louisa Jenkins of Women's Sports & Fitness was third at 3:22:46. Weight Watchers held the team lead by 2:10 over Women's Sports & Fitness and 7:43 over Thompson's and Hines' Cal-Neva-Reno Wheelmen.

On the other end of the spectrum, Jin Sun Kim of South Korea had to be airlifted to an Idaho Falls hospital after suffering an apparent concussion and other injuries during a crash about 30 miles southeast of Arco.

Racers tried to form "cichelons" to counter crosswinds gusting to 30 mph from the southwest over the sagebrush and grass of eastern Idaho's high desert. But the winds were so fierce that untested riders were unable to react to the "single-file manuevers."

## Soccer official praises fair play at World Cup

ROME — Joseph Blatter, the FIFA executive who criticized dirty play and officiating in the first round of the World Cup, has changed his tune.

Now, Blatter says a "flood" of yellow and red, in the form of cards warning or ejecting players, has helped promote fair play.

"Play has been very sportsmanlike," said Blatter, FIFA's secretary-general. "The flood of yellow and red cards made players less aggressive. That's very welcome."

He specifically mentioned the semifinal game between England and West Germany.

"The fair play in this game, by everyone including the spectators, gave me goose pimples," he said. "Each respected the other. That was beautiful."

Low points were the pregame stabbing of a German fan in Turin and the overall scarcity of goals in the tournament, he said.

Blatter was especially critical of "the old, European-style safety soccer" that he saw.

"This obviously is not the purpose" of the knockout system used after the first round, "FIFA certainly must think about this again. If someone has a better solution, I'll be thankful," he said.

The biggest controversy in the last few days has been about the use of penalty kick shootouts to settle tie games after the first round.

But Blatter defended shootouts as "at least part of the game" and rejected proposals that indefinite sudden-death play replace them.

"Then games could last eight hours," he said.

has been Argentina's most dangerous attacker.

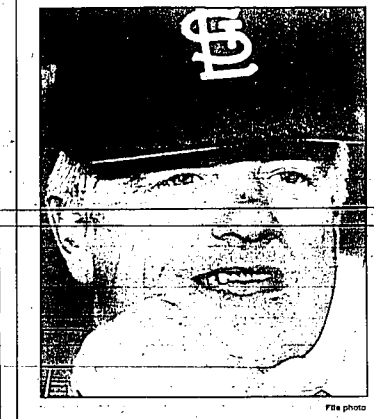

## Herzog resigns from Cardinals

SAN DIEGO — Whitey Herzog resigned as manager of the St. Louis Cardinals on Friday, taking the blame while admitting he was embarrassed by a team he had made into one of the best of the 1980s.

Herzog, who took the Cards to the World Series three times in the 1980s and won it once, confirmed in a news conference what radio station KMOX already had reported in St. Louis.

"I made up my mind in San Francisco," he said. "I was totally embarrassed by the way our team played. I just feel very badly for the ballclub, the organization and the fans."

The Cardinals were in San Francisco last weekend and lost a three-game series by scores of 3-2, 4-0 and 9-2. Herzog will be replaced on an interim basis by coach Red Schoendienst, the only man who has won more games as a Cards manager than Herzog.

Herzog, in his 11th year as manager, has 822 victories. Schoendienst won 1,028 games in 12 years in the 1960s, '70s and briefly in 1980.

The Cardinals now are in San Diego for a series against the Padres, but news of the resignation first broke in St. Louis, where it was reported by KMOX, flagship station of the Cardinals, and television station KSDK.

"When Whitey brought up the subject of resigning several weeks ago, we said 'no,'" Cardinals president Fred Kuhlmann said at the news conference. "But everybody feels it's in the best interests of the team to make a change now."

The Cardinals, who won the World Series under Herzog in 1982 and were National League champions in 1985 and 1987, are 33-47 this season and in last place in the NL East, 14½ games behind the Pittsburgh Pirates.

"I am the manager, and I take full responsibility," Herzog said.

Only Tommy Lasorda, who has managed the Los Angeles Dodgers since 1977, has been with the same team longer than Herzog among active managers.

The team's top officials, Kuhlmann, general manager Dol Maxvill and executive vice president Mark Sauer, flew to California for the announcement.

They gave no indication when they would name a permanent replacement.

Kuhlmann said Herzog would remain with the club as vice president, although the exact nature of his position was not yet outlined.

Schoendienst last managed the Cardinals in 1980, taking over briefly for Herzog when he moved from the field to the front office as general manager.

Schoendienst was a Cardinals player for 14 years.

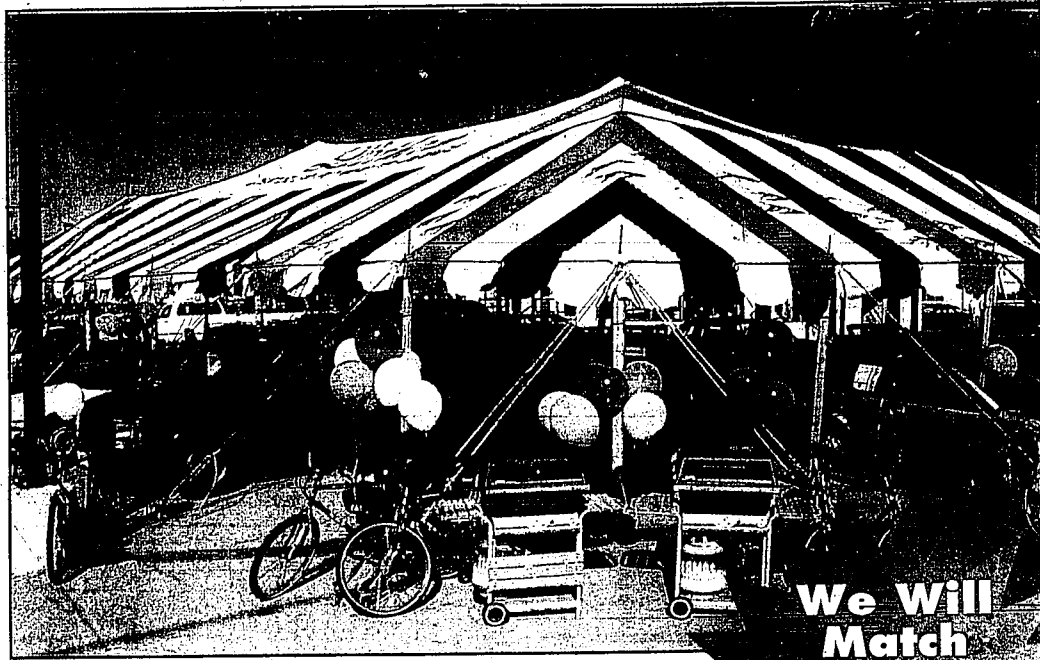
