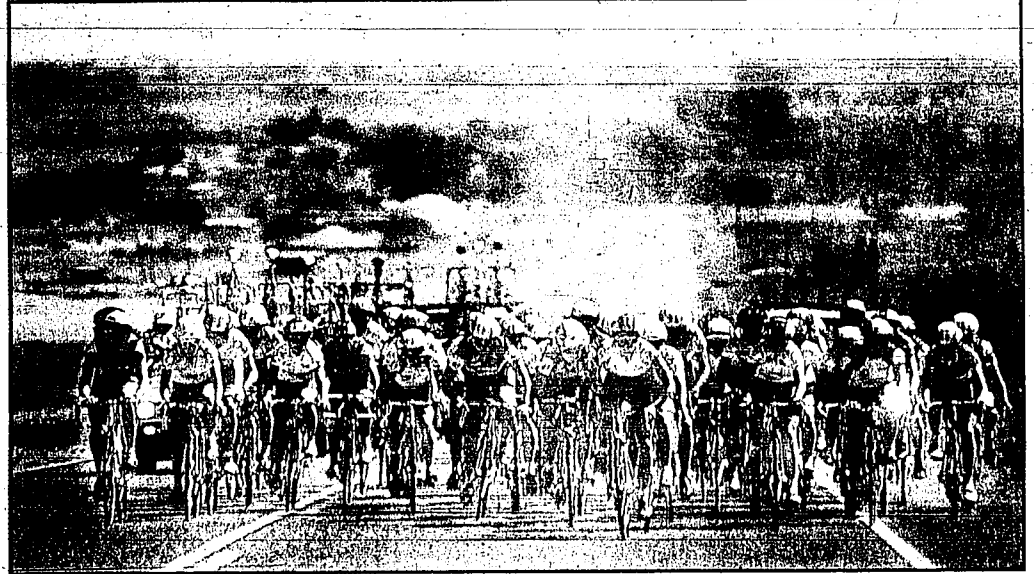

Cyclists cruise through potato country

MURTAUGH — If a bicyclist blinked, she might not know she had gone past Murtaugh, and if an Ore-Ida Women's Challenge spectator blinked, she might not know that a race had gone by.

"They went by us too fast to get a good look, so we had to dash for another look," said Karen Slack of Burley, after charging along country roads east of Murtaugh with a carload of kids to catch a second glimpse of the eastern Magic Valley's first world-class bicycle race.

Fifty-five miles of U.S. Highway 30 through prime potato land from Burley to Buhl played host Saturday to the Clear Springs Trout Co. Magic Valley Road Race, stage 15 of the Ore-Ida Women's Challenge Centennial Tour of Idaho.

A sparse spectator population, perched on pickups beside spud fields, dairies and pastures, awaited the arrival of about 50 bicyclists. Others, working nearby, didn't know a bicycle race was coming.

"I heard something about it on the news," said Ryan Watts, 12, as he reloaded eight straw bales onto a truck from where they had spilled shortly before the racers charged through.

Glenn and Cathy Humphries awaited the racers on a pickup tailgate with their two youngsters, Wendy and J.R., alongside a country lane about two miles east of Murtaugh.

Glenn Humphries, a farm manager for J.R. Simplot Co., juggled a healthy-looking new crop potato as he

waited for the racers.

Cathy Humphries and the kids are serious bicyclists, if not racers.

"We ride our bikes almost every day," Cathy Humphries said. She rides hers to work.

And they had a favorite in Saturday's race — Ruthie Matthes of Ketchum, who finished ninth and remained in second place overall behind Inga Thompson headed into the final stage of the race today.

When the racers finally flashed past — grunting and swearing and panting — they were led by Heidi Inatabal, who was alone at the front. Breaking from the pack was Lisa Goldsmith, apparently leading her Women's Sports and Fitness teammate Eve Stephenson out to join Inatabal in the lead. Stephenson finished seventh but neither Inatabal or Goldsmith were in the first 10.

Louisiana Senate sustains veto of abortion bill

BATON ROUGE, La. — Louisiana's Senate voted Saturday against overriding Gov. Buddy Roemer's veto of what would have been the nation's toughest state abortion law.

The vote was 23 in favor of the override — three short of the two-thirds majority needed — and 16 against. When the bill to make abortion a criminal offense passed the Senate last month, it got 24 votes.

The failure of the override attempt was not final, however. Under legislative rules, the bill's backers get a second chance today because they had a simple majority. For the override to pass, the Senate must act before the Legislature adjourns at midnight Monday.

"We'll pray that we can change some minds," said Rep. Woody Jenkins, author of the measure.

The House had approved the override measure late Friday.

Terri Bartlett, director of Planned Parenthood of Louisiana, told her jubilant supporters that the battle wasn't over. "Tomorrow's vote is as critical and as important as the one that happened today," she said.

After the vote, viewers quietly filed out of the gallery. In the rotunda, pro-choice backers waved purple flowers and ribbons and shouted: "We won!" Abortion foes countered by chanting "We will win. We will win."

If the Senate voted to follow the House's lead and override, it would be the first time this century that a legislature overrode a Louisiana governor's veto.

Since the legislative session began in April, Roemer had said he opposed abortion on demand but would veto a measure that made no exceptions for rape or incest. He did just that Friday.

Supporters argued that exceptions would allow women to get abortions by falsely claiming to have been raped.

The bill provides a maximum 10-year prison term and \$100,000 fine for people who perform abortions but no penalty for the woman obtaining the abortion.

Sen. Mike Cross, the Senate sponsor of the bill, warned that failing to override the veto would mean legislators would have to put up with continued intense, emotional lobbying going into next year's elections.

"You think it's tough this year?" said Cross. "It's not going to wait until next year at this time. It's going to be a long, long year if we don't vote to override the governor's veto."

Craig's House attendance one of worst this year

WASHINGTON — Just as Rep. Larry Craig's Senate campaign has taken off, his attendance at House votes has dramatically dropped off.

The Idaho Republican, who is vying to replace retiring Sen. James McGwire, has missed nearly a quarter of House votes so far this year, according to statistics compiled by Legi-Slate, a congressional database.

Craig's truancy rate at House votes during the 18-month term comes in sharp contrast to his attendance record

Iranian report says European hostage may be released soon

NICOSIA, Cyprus — A European hostage among the 16 Westerners held in Lebanon might be released soon, Iran's official news agency said Saturday. Sources indicated an Irish captive might be freed.

Most of the hostages are believed held by factions of Hezbollah, the Party of God, a fundamentalist Muslim group that receives financial support from Iran.

The 47-word report from the Islamic Republic News Agency in Beirut, the Lebanese capital, was attributed to unidentified sources. The headline read: "A European Hostage May Be Released Soon."

"A Western hostage held in Lebanon will probably be released soon," said the story, monitored in Nicosia.

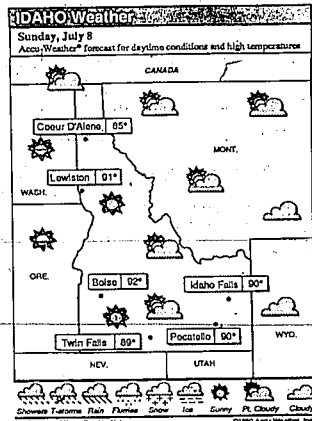
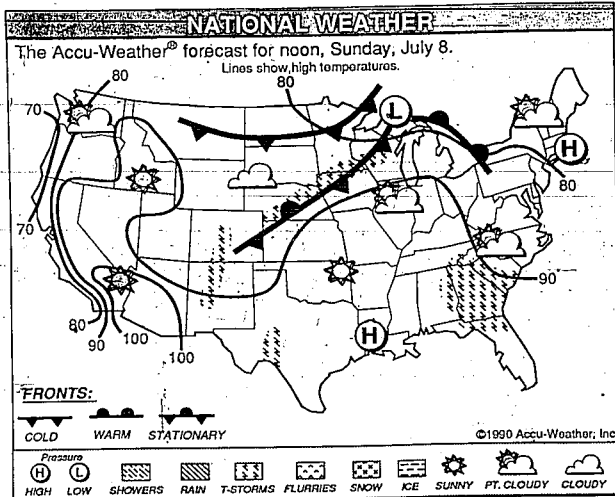
Sources did not disclose the identity of the hostage to be released, but "hinted that he is most probably a European national," the dispatch said. "It is not known when and where the hostage will be released."

The hostages are six Americans and 10 Europeans — four Britons, two West Germans, two Swiss, an Italian and an Irishman. Legation chief Eric Anderson, chief Middle East correspondent for The Associated Press. He was kidnapped March 16, 1985.

Diplomats in Tehran said in recent interviews that Iranian President Hashemi Rafsanjani has renewed a push to get the 10 European captives in Lebanon freed.

Weather summary
The National Weather Service in Boise predicts cooler temperatures.

A cold front moved through Idaho Saturday cooling off temperatures and bringing clouds and precipitation to the northern part of the Gem State. Skies elsewhere remained fair.

Thunderstorm activity gave Wallace the most precipitation with 29 of an inch of rain, while .14 fell at Bovill. A tenth of an inch was reported at both Coeur d'Alene and Millán.

Saturday's low temperatures in the higher elevations were in the upper 30s to upper 40s with Yellow Pine recording a low of 36 degrees. In the valleys, nighttime low temperatures were in the lower 50s to lower 60s with both Twin Falls and Pocatello registering the warmest overnight low temperature of 61 degrees.

The highest reported temperature in Idaho Sunday was 85 degrees at Burley, Pocatello, and Idaho Falls. The lowest was 35 degrees at Yellow Pine.

Elsewhere in the nation Sunday, the highest temperature was 111 degrees at Bullhead City and Lake Havasu City, Ariz., and Laughlin, Nev. Truckee, Calif. reported the lowest at 31 degrees.

Heavy rain in Midwest, cool in Northeast

Up to 10 inches of rain caused flooding Saturday in southeastern Minnesota, with rain also scattered elsewhere in the eastern half of the nation, and temperatures dipped to record lows in the Northeast.

The rain in Minnesota flooded numerous roads and forced evacuation of some low-lying camps.

Rainfall amounts ranged from 3 to 7 inches and there were unofficial reports of up to 10 inches in Rice County, the National Weather Service said.

The State Patrol closed a highway covered by 2-3 feet of water between Zumbrota and Pine Island, northwest of Rochester.

No injuries were reported.

Heavy rain also fell in the Minneapolis-St. Paul area and the weather service warned of possible flooding of highway approach ramps and underpasses.

Showers and thundershowers also extended over Wisconsin, western Upper Michigan, northern Illinois, northwestern Minnesota, eastern North Dakota and northeastern Iowa.

Scattered showers and thundershowers spread rain over west-central Florida, west-central Alabama, east-central Mississippi, southeastern North Carolina, northeastern South Carolina, and along the Texas Gulf Coast.

Elsewhere, showers and thundershowers were scattered over northern Maine, Arizona and south-central Utah.

Thundershowers produced about an inch of rain in the Green Valley area of south-central Arizona, south of Tucson, during less than an hour and a flash flood warning was issued for eastern Pima County.

The heat wave that rolled across the nation was definitely over in the Northeast. Binghamton, N.Y., had a record low of 49 and Youngstown, Ohio, had a record of 42. Records were tied at Buffalo, N.Y., at 50 degrees, and Toledo, Ohio, at 47.

But the heat lingered in the Southeast, where Augusta, Ga., tied its record of 104. Other Georgia cities also topped 100. The temperature also hit 100 at Jacksonville, Fla., and Montgomery, Ala.

American hostages, Robert Polhill and Frank Reed, then asked for a reciprocal gesture from the United States. President Bush has said he will not make this for hostages.

But an outpouring of Western assistance to Iran after its devastating June 21 earthquake raised hopes in some quarters that Iran might again use its influence with the pro-Iranian groups believed holding the hostages.

Iranian President Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini has said Iran should be grateful for the foreign quake aid. However, in comments earlier this month, he made no link between such aid and the release of any Western hostages.

In Washington, State Department spokesman Andre S. Harbo said Saturday she had no information to confirm the report that another hostage may soon be released.

She said the United States provided earthquake aid solely "as a humanitarian gesture."

While reiterating U.S. policy demanding the unconditional release of all hostages, she said the hostage issue "is also a humanitarian issue."

In Beirut, a source close to the Syrian army command said that if any hostage were released, it probably would be Brian Keenan, an Irishman who also holds a British passport. Syria is the main power broker in Lebanon's 14-year-old civil war but has little direct hold over the hostage-takers.

The source, who spoke on condition of anonymity, refused to say whether he thought Keenan might be freed.

A three-man delegation from Ireland's ruling party visited Tehran in mid-June. An Irish Red Cross aid plane was the first to reach Tehran after the quake.

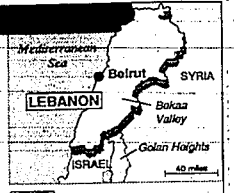
Keenan, 39, was kidnapped in Moslem West-Beirut April 11, 1986, as he walked from his home to the American University of Beirut, where he taught English.

No group has claimed to be holding Keenan, but Reed said after his release from captivity in April that he had seen Keenan.

As a celebrity panelist and master of ceremonies, Cullen was a household name for more than 40 years.

The 1989-90 term Congressmen with attendance rates below Craig include several who resigned; two who were put on trial, others who are running different office, and one who died.

Craig spokesman David Fish said the congressman's absences do not show he's been neglecting his job. He noted that the congressman's "typically good" attendance record - averaging 92 percent for his House career - and said the congressman "had to spend some extra time in Idaho" campaigning during the months before the GOP state primary on May 22.

Rep. Fish claimed Craig's attendance rate has rebounded since the primary, records show he "has missed more than a dozen votes since then."

Fish added that on issues Craig considered important, he "paired" his votes with another congressman, a process whereby two absent members offset each other's votes. These paired votes were counted as absences because Craig was not present during the roll call.

The campaign of Ron Twilgar, a Democratic nominee for Senate, said Craig's poor attendance record demonstrates that he's not concentrating on his work in Washington.

"It's obvious when someone's voting record drops that dramatically in an election year, that the race is foremost in his mind-and not his job-in D.C.," said Mike Wetherell, Twilgar's campaign chairman. "He has a job and should be tending to it."

Responding to Idaho and Washington, D.C., are a long distance apart and (Craig's) opponent is in Idaho full time."

Meanwhile, Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, chalked a 97 percent attendance rate in the House since 1989, a relatively average score for the House this term.

Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, had the 12th-worst attendance record among living senators, showing up for 96 percent of the 455 roll calls since last year, according to Legis-Slate.

Symms spokesman Dave Pearson said the senator only misses votes when "the absolutely has to be somewhere else." He missed several votes when his father died last year, when he went as a U.S. representative to the inauguration of Taiwan President Lee Teng-Hui in May and during the Idaho Republican convention, Pearson said.

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Western leaders talk economics in Houston

HOUSTON (AP) — Western leaders, gathering for back-to-back summits, shifted continents Saturday to take up a series of tough economic issues and mull the encouraging reaction from Moscow to changes in the NATO military alliance.

President Bush welcomed his guests in the sweltering heat of his adopted hometown and met over a pre-summit lunch with Toshiki Kaifu, the prime minister of Japan.

Their discussions touched on several of the most difficult issues that would arise Monday when the formal summit meetings begin: aid to Moscow, loans to China and trade among the allies themselves. Bush hinted that he wouldn't try to block Kaifu's intention to resume economic aid to China.

The prospering allies were trying to map a coordinated strategy, to deal with the breakup of the communist bloc. The 16th annual economic summit meeting is the first held in America since a gathering in Williamsburg, Va. in 1983.

A decision on sending aid to Moscow was not expected to emerge this week, but the climate was growing more hospitable. Bush's spokesman, Martin Fitzwater, said of the summit leaders: "There are a lot of things they can consider short of direct aid."

Bush told Kaifu, according to Fitzwater, "that he was very pleased with the reaction of the Soviet Union to the NATO summit. We have read the reports of comments by President Gorbachev as well as Foreign Minister (Eduard) Shevardnadze and we are very pleased that they believe that the NATO summit has been productive and helpful."

Fitzwater disclosed that Bush sent Mikhail Gorbachev a cable Friday from Air Force One giving Bush's "personal reflections" on the NATO summit and describing "the changing nature of the (military) alliance."

In addition to the United States and Japan, the other nations in the economic summit are West Germany, Britain, France, Italy and Canada.

The world leaders were not spending all of their time discussing serious subjects. Bush was treating the summit leaders to a country-style barbecue, rodeo and performance by

he planned to pressure the Japanese leader to drop his push to resume development loans to China.

This assistance was put on hold by agreement of the summit countries last year in Paris in response to the brutal crackdown on the pro-democracy movement in Tiananmen Square.

Bush indicated that the summit countries are likely to abandon their united front, providing Japan the opportunity to pursue its own lending policy.

Japan, Bush said, "is a sovereign nation. They can make up their own minds on a lot of questions."

Fitzwater, briefing reporters after the Bush-Kaifu meeting ended, said that the topic of loans to China came up and the two leaders "had useful talks on this matter and agreed to continue these discussions with the other summit leaders."

The go-it-separately approach was also likely to prevail on the con-

tentious question over whether to provide direct economic aid to the Soviet Union. West Germany has already announced it will provide \$3.1 billion in loans and economic assistance.

West Germany, France and Italy have been pushing the allies to endorse a \$15 billion economic aid package to bail out the floundering Soviet economy.

But the United States and Britain opposed providing direct economic aid until the Soviets made a bolder move toward a free-market economy and stopped siphoning large amounts of its resources into the military and support for Cuba.

Japan has its own special problem with Soviet aid, contending Japanese assistance would be impossible until Moscow has settled a 45-year-old territorial dispute over four islands north of Japan that have been occupied by the Soviet Union since World War II.

U.S., Angola dispute famine blame

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and Angola blame each other for a breakdown in efforts to mount a relief operation for hundreds of thousands of Angolans who may face starvation.

A representative of the Angolan government said he was worried that the Bush administration could use relief deliveries as

a cover for sending weapons to anti-communist rebels in Angola.

U.S. officials say the administration informed the Angolan government some time ago that the U.S. was willing to permit delivery of food shipments by the International Committee of the Red Cross or another relief organization.

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NASA overpaid bonuses on Hubble telescope work

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government overpaid as much as \$1 million in bonuses to two Hubble Space Telescope contractors for their cost control efforts on the device, which has been a major headache for NASA, a magazine reported Saturday.

Congressional Quarterly reported in its July 7 edition that the overpayments occurred at the same time being rising dramatically. The original cost estimate for the Hubble was \$678 million, but its final price tag was more than \$1.5 billion.

The magazine said information about the bonus was contained in a July 1989 audit report by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's office of inspector general. The material was obtained through a Freedom of Information Act request.

The Hubble was launched April 24 and NASA announced June 27 that its two main mirrors would not focus properly. A manufacturing error was suspected.

Congressional Quarterly said the inspector general's report accused NASA management of "not properly considering all cost overruns" in figuring cost control bonuses paid to Hubble's two principal contractors, Lockheed Corp. and Perkin-Elmer Corp., now Hughes-Danbury Optical Systems Inc., which built the telescope's mirrors.

Lockheed received \$14.4 million in bonuses and Hughes-Danbury was paid \$6 million in bonuses through April 30, 1987, the report

said, if NASA had fully considered the cost overruns, the bonuses may have been reduced by as much as \$1 million, it said.

Attempts Saturday to reach either of the contractors and NASA were unsuccessful. But Congressional Quarterly quoted project managers at Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala., as disagreeing with the audit conclusions while promising to implement many of the report's recommendations.

A Lockheed official also took issue with the report.

"If this thing followed its normal course they probably didn't pay us enough," H. Hollister Cantus, vice president of Lockheed's space group, told the magazine.

"If you're going to do business with NASA, don't expect to make a large profit. NASA is a damned tough taskmaster," he added.

The magazine said Hughes-Danbury declined to comment.

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Producer Lear urges renewed focus on values

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Television producer Norman Lear, a leading advocate of the separation of church and state, urged 8,100 teachers Saturday to focus more on morals during classroom instructions.

"As educators, you probably have more to do with the character of the next generation than anyone else," Lear told delegates to the annual convention of the 2 million-member National Education Association.

"In a sense, you are the architects of that generation," he said.

Lear said teachers cannot successfully instill knowledge in young people's minds unless they also "feed the heart and soul."

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Gorbachev sways congress to reverse vote

MOSCOW (AP) — Mikhail S. Gorbachev turned defeat into victory Saturday by persuading the Communist Party congress to drop plans to evaluate each member of the ruling Politburo, warning that such action would "bury the party."

Delegates to the 28th Communist Party congress have criticized many of the 12 Politburo members and wanted to give the thumbs-up-or-thumbs-down on each of them.

The delegates voted 2,557 to 1,393 for such a chance before their afternoon break. But Gorbachev later warned: "If you want to bury the party, to split the party, then continue on this way. ... Think, think hard, think hard."

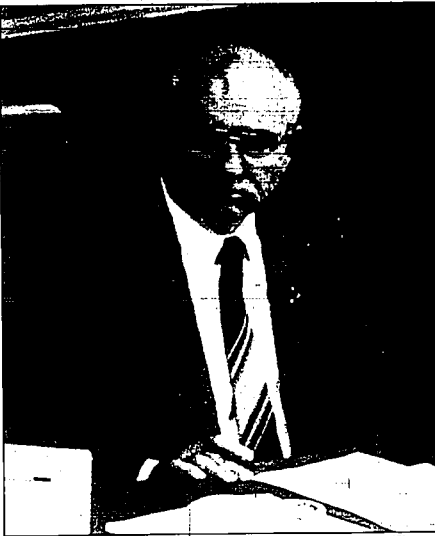
The ire of the 59-year-old Soviet leader, who has skillfully consolidated his position at the congress, prompted the delegates to vote 2,495 to 1,515 to reverse themselves.

In his argument, Gorbachev read a note from the northern Russian city of Arkhangelsk that said: "There is no need to evaluate each Politburo member. The Politburo, according to the rules, is an organ of the leadership, and the leadership is collective."

Instead, the congress agreed to evaluate the policy-making Central Committee, and within it the Politburo, as a whole.

Politburo member Vladimir Ivashko later read a draft of a resolution on the Central Committee that is to be voted on this week.

The draft praises the committee for major changes enacted since the 'last congress in 1986, the move toward democracy and free elections. But it blames the party for failing to carry out party policy, leading to social and economic difficulties. The congress broke a decades-old tradition last week by requiring each

Politburo member to account for his work and answer written questions from the nearly 4,700 delegates.

Inna Dementyeva, a Moscow delegate, said the vote on personal evaluations would have gone too far. "Our Russian thirst for blood is

showing," she said. "It's stupid and ugly and inhuman."

Delegates interviewed in the lobby of the Kremlin Palace of Congresses said that allowing the mostly conservative congress to vote on individual leaders also might have embarrassed

Gorbachev and his allies and benefited such conservative critics as Yegor K. Ligachev.

Some also said they had expected at least half the Politburo to get the thumbs down, particularly ideology chief Vadim A. Medvedev and international policy head Alexander N. Yakovlev. "Collective responsibility is no responsibility," said a Byelorussian delegate who identified himself only as Alexander. "And there should be a full renewal of the leadership."

Several Politburo members responded to the written questions they received from delegates, and Medvedev said he had been accused of letting party ideology crumble and discipline among Soviet journalists break down.

He responded that the party had shed "fossilized thinking and dogmatism" and that journalists should be governed by law and their "party and civic conscience."

Yakovlev, one of Gorbachev's closest advisers, said he had been accused of "connivance to separatism in the Baltic republics" and the "loss of Eastern Europe."

He responded that he had spoken out against separatism and nationalism and that the people of Eastern Europe were the ones who rejected the Communist Party.

Ligachev also took the floor and said he opposed reunification of the German states because the West was "absorbing" the East.

He criticized the concept of private property and plans to convert the Soviet Union to a market-oriented economy, saying proponents of "free market relations" should become the first Soviet unemployed.

Ligachev also opposed political reforms that would diminish the party's role in society and government.

Albania says asylum seekers free to leave

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Thousands of Albanians crowding into foreign embassies in hopes of fleeing their Communist homeland will be allowed to emigrate under foreign supervision, diplomats said Saturday.

About 5,000 people are sheltered in missions in the Albanian capital, Tirana, said Hungarian Ambassador Mihaly Kornidesz. Many had climbed walls and crashed through embassy gates, some under fire, to gain entry.

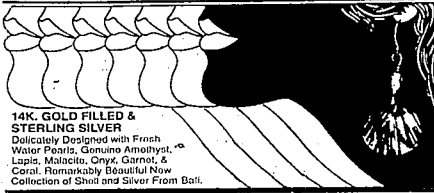
Kornidesz said the logistics of the emigration had not been worked out. But, he said

ambassadors were told by Albanian Foreign Ministry officials their personnel could supervise the issuing of travel documents and accompany emigres out of the country.

"A solution has been found," Kornidesz told state radio in Budapest. "Passports will be issued, and embassy personnel will be allowed to oversee safe passage out of the country."

Speaking from Tirana, a Hungarian diplomat said on condition of anonymity that police sealed off the diplomatic quarter Saturday afternoon, apparently to prevent new asylum-seekers from gaining access to the missions.

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Cease-fire not uniform in Liberia

MONROVIA, LIBERIA (AP) — President Samuel Doe's shattered government announced a cease-fire on a makeshift radio station but sporadic fighting between soldiers and rebels continued Saturday on the fringe of the besieged capital.

A radio broadcast Friday night said a cease-fire had been reached and it appealed to shops to open and government workers to return to their offices.

Nearly everything remained closed, however.

Monrovia has been beset by looting government troops, rebels bent on tribal reprisals and severe food shortages, and deprived of running water and electricity for more than a week. Many said they wanted to believe the cease-fire announcement but did not.

There was no comment from the rebels, but they have said previously that Doe must leave the country before they will accept a truce.

Led by former aide Charles Taylor, the rebels invaded from Ivory Coast on Dec. 24 to overthrow Doe's government, which they accuse of corruption, tribalism and brutal suppression of opposition.

Liberian and diplomatic sources said the cease-fire was announced from a makeshift radio station at Doe's fortified beachside executive mansion. The radio went off the air after the announcement.

Few people heard the broadcast because the main state radio station stopped broadcasting Tuesday.

Indonesia quake kills 1 in W. Java

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — A strong earthquake jolted West Java, destroying or damaging more than 150 homes and buildings and killing one villager, officials said Saturday. Eleven people were injured.

The quake Friday measured 5.2 on the Richter scale of ground motion and was centered in a mountainous area of Mujalengka about 185 miles southeast of the capital, said Sutanto, a government meteorology official in Jakarta.

The Richter scale is a measure of ground motion as recorded on seismographs.

Every increase of one number means a tenfold increase in magnitude. Thus a reading of 5.5 reflects an earthquake 10 times stronger than one of 4.5.

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Paratroopers mark 50th year of Airborne

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former paratrooper Chuck Beckman watched and remembered Saturday as a group of modern Army Airborne troops marched past him in combat dress, their backs straight, jaws out and berets cocked just so.

"We were tough," he said, "but I don't know if we were that tough."

Beckman, from Southern Pines, N.C., was one of several thousand former paratroopers who gathered in Washington over the weekend and held a parade Saturday to mark the 50th anniversary of America's Airborne military.

Former paratroopers from World War II like Beckman, as well as those from the Korean and Vietnam wars, and the periods in between and since, also took part.

Some marched, and others chose to watch. Alex Madsen, 69, of Solvang, Calif., watched from a park with a friend from the past days, H.G. Bennett, 73, of Sun City, Ariz.

"You know, we've spent a lot of money just to come to a bull session," Madsen joked.

Both were members of the Army's 507th Airborne Regiment, headquarters company, and both parachuted into Normandy on D-Day, 1944. They also parachuted at the Rhine crossing in 1945, and Madsen wore his paratrooper's wings bearing a pair of stars, one for each combat drop.

There were veterans from all periods, but the World War II crowd,

the original paratroopers, were most in evidence. They marched together with what was left of their old regiments.

The brass also was there. Retired Gen. William C. Westmoreland, who was U.S. military commander in Vietnam from 1964 to 1968, received the marching men's salutes at a reviewing stand.

Only 13 gray-haired men

marched with the original 501st parachute battalion, which was formed in 1940. In other groups, some rode in wheelchairs or walked on crutches, and some wore what they could of their old uniforms.

"It's air conditioned," one marching veteran said to the crowd, tugging at the jacket that no longer met in the middle.

The all-black 555th Battalion also marched.

Charles McCloed, 63, of Philadelphia, became a member of the 555th in 1946, volunteering after a year in Germany with Army intelligence. He served until 1950, and recalled when the order to integrate came in 1948. The battalion was made a part of another unit.

"It was just on paper," he said. "We stayed in the same place, at Fort Bragg. We just changed the patches on our shoulders."

Paratroopers have always been a close-knit group, in a way that transcended boundaries of race or rank, he said. "I don't care whether it's a general or a private, today we all just say, 'How you doing, trooper,'" McCloed said.

There were old Jeeps, trucks, even a restored staff car — all privately owned.

Tony Lambros, a Vietnam veteran from Fallston, Md., drove a Jeep nearly as storied as the old veterans he carried in it. The Jeep landed in the invasion in 1944 and carries documentation of its stops through Belgium and France, where it stayed until it was sold as salvage more than 15 years after the war, he said.

The world they fought in has been changing rapidly, these veterans of the war in Europe acknowledged. But there were few regrets or sounds of alarm about the unification of Germany or the easing of East-West tensions.

L.A. Medfly spraying resumes

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The state plans to resume aerial spraying of the pesticide malathion to eradicate Mediterranean fruit flies this week despite a study that says the material contains toxic heavy metals.

State officials say their tests show there's no threat to public health.

Helicopters will spray a 14-square-mile area of Los Angeles on Thursday, state officials said Friday.

The spraying was scheduled for last week but was delayed after city attorneys presented the findings of their analysis.

The Mediterranean fruit fly, also called the Medfly, can destroy hundreds of varieties of fruits and vegetables and is considered a serious threat to the state's multibillion-dollar agriculture economy.

A study released by City Councilman Joel Wachs found that samples of malathion contained excessive levels of lead, nickel and chromium.

Wachs said the presence of the metals violated strict state limits on toxic substances and said he would seek a temporary restraining order against the spraying Monday.

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Justice Department targets top 100 S&L fraud cases

WASHINGTON — Justice Department officials, accused by Democratic congressmen of moving too slowly on prosecuting savings and loan cases, say they have identified what they believe to be the top 100 cases of financial fraud and given them priority.

U.S. Attorney General Dick Thornburgh said in an interview this week that about 20 of those cases account for 80 percent of the suspected fraud at thrift institutions.

He said most of the cases are concentrated in Texas, Southern California, New York and Florida, with other cases scattered throughout the country.

Though the local FBI offices and

many U.S. attorneys have been clamoring for more resources to handle an avalanche of criminal referrals, FBI officials said recently that they have enough agents now to tackle the biggest cases.

"We could apply more resources, if they were available, but we have the manpower now assigned to cover the significant cases," said Bill Baker, assistant FBI director in charge of criminal investigations. "We have earmarked the top 100."

Two weeks ago, faced with growing Democratic criticism over the pace of prosecutions, the Bush administration announced it no longer opposed congressional efforts to double the funds for investigations to \$100 million for next fiscal year.

The Justice Department is already

hiring 118 prosecutors and 210 agents with \$50 million made available late last year.

A Justice Department survey conducted in March 1989 showed that because of lack of resources, the FBI had opened but was not actively pursuing more than 1,300 cases of suspected financial fraud involving more than \$100,000.

The FBI reported 4,100 active investigations of fraud involving more than \$100,000.

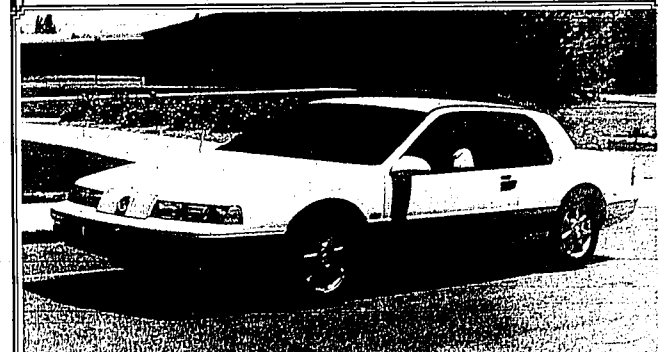
FBI and Justice Department officials said this week that the number of "pending but inactive" cases had changed, but they could not give a new figure.

Officials from the Office of Thrift Supervision, which regulates thrifts and had helped develop the list of

100 top cases in recent weeks, said before then that the Justice Department did not know which cases regulators believed to be most important.

The list should help focus investigative efforts, OTS officials said.

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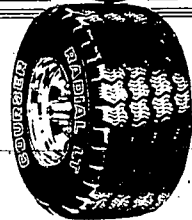
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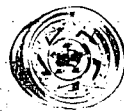


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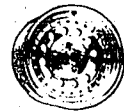

Bargainers slog away over taxes; colleagues make political hay

WASHINGTON (AP) — The rhetoric swirled through the marble corridors of the Capitol. Republicans and Democrats alike hailed out their most colorful, cataclysmic language and vowed a battle royal should anyone dare to raise taxes.

While, in a room across the hall from the Senate chamber, the men who actually might decide if taxes would be raised hunkered down and got to work.

"It was kind of like being in the eye of a storm," said Senate Budget Committee Chairman James Sasser, D-Tenn., one of those in the quiet bargaining room.

The issue that day last month was taxes af-

ter President Bush abandoned his staunch anti-tax stance. But the scene is the same every day that negotiators for the White House and Congress try to shrink the federal deficit while their colleagues play the issues for all their political worth.

The negotiators' ability to seek compromise while the rest of the Capitol rings with partisan clamor reflects two overriding factors: their perspective about the task they've been assigned and the personalities of the people involved.

The bargainers must look at the federal budget from exactly the opposite perspective that most members of Congress usually have.

The negotiators are looking for \$50 billion in new taxes and spending cuts for next year and about \$500 billion over the next five years, a search that entails nothing but thorny choices.

They know that if they fail, the Gramm-Rudman balanced-budget law will automatically cut tens of billions of dollars from most programs this fall.

Most lawmakers, on the other hand, see their jobs as a constant battle to bring federal dollars back home and to protect their districts from pain.

"These people sitting around the table are staring the deficit problem in the face," said

Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., a member of the House Budget Committee who is not one of the negotiators. "Members of Congress are staring their constituents in the face."

Participants in the talks are aware of this dichotomy, and say that reacting to it is a crucial part of their job.

"If we don't keep our lines of communication open to those members and make sure they have input, we may come down from the mountaintop with an agreement that nobody is prepared to vote for," said one of the bargainers, House Budget Committee Chairman Leon Panetta, D-Calif.

The talks have been moving slowly for two

months. But participants say the negotiating has gotten more serious since Bush's reversal on his tax position.

Bargainers would like to complete a deal on a package before the beginning of the August congressional recess. Negotiations resume Tuesday.

Another reason for the negotiators' single-mindedness is the personality and political instincts of many of the people in the bargaining room — and their bosses.

By historical accident, many of the key figures are moderate, consensus-building politicians who believe that compromise is what effective governing is all about.

EPA links pulp mill and cancer

Dioxin and other chemicals released by pulp mills into the Columbia River system may be causing 10 cancer cases each year among people who eat contaminated fish, according to a report by the federal Environmental Protection Agency.

The risk-assessment based on freshwater-fish consumption by Native Americans, Asian-Americans and low-income families who live near the river concluded that pollution from eight mills may result in high levels of risk to humans.

For each of the 655,000 individuals in those populations, the estimated lifetime risk of contracting dioxin-related cancer is more than 1 in 1,000 — or 1,000 times the cancer rate generally considered acceptable by the EPA.

The authors' findings suggest the need for tougher regulations that could require a substantial reduction in chlorine use and new technology for removing lignin from wood pulp.

Dioxin and other chlorinated compounds are byproducts produced when chlorine is used to bleach pulp.

The Columbia River's headwaters are in British Columbia. It flows south through the east and western portion of Washington state and then west along the Washington-Oregon border to the Pacific Ocean. Its biggest tributary, the Snake River, drains much of Idaho and parts of Wyoming.

Furor over court case continues

HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — It's usually the pre-trial publicity that lawyers worry about, but little could rival the circuslike aftermath of a trial that cleared a 19-year-old woman of being an accomplice to her mother's murder.

The Hartford prosecutor's office has been besieged by angry phone calls after the June 28 verdict, mostly from people who want to see Karin Aparo behind bars along with her former lover, her alleged accomplice.

"I've never, ever, ever seen anything like it," said an employee in the office of the Hartford State's Attorney. "We've never had people call this office and be so outraged."

Ms. Aparo's aunt — her dead mother's sister — has launched a publicity campaign to counter what she calls the lust for blood among those who believe Ms. Aparo was responsible for the 1987 death of her 47-year-old mother, Joyce Aparo. Though cleared of being an accomplice to murder, Ms. Aparo could still face a retrial on a less serious charge of conspiracy, in which the jury could not reach a verdict.

Dennis Coleman, the former boyfriend, added to the trial's bizarre conclusion when he gave a jailhouse interview to reporters last week denouncing the verdict.

Ms. Aparo, who shared a condominium with her mother in the well-to-do Hartford suburb of Glastonbury, was accused of hatching a plan when she was 15 to do away with her overbearing mother. Prosecutors charged she recruited her love-struck boyfriend to "do the deed," as Coleman, now 22, referred to the alleged plot.

Coleman, who confessed and is serving a 34-year sentence, testified that his passion for Ms. Aparo went "beyond obsession."

The defense successfully portrayed Ms. Aparo as an abused child who fantasized about her mother's death but didn't enlist Coleman to act on her fantasies. Instead, the defense said, Coleman broke in while Karin was away and strangled Mrs. Aparo as she slept, because he believed she was encouraging her daughter to sleep with another man, the 24-year-old son of Karin's violin teacher.

Kostmayer will defer to Idaho wilderness bill, claims LaRocco

LEWISTON (AP) — When Democrat Larry LaRocco says he has won a commitment from Rep. Peter Kostmayer, D-Pa., not to introduce a new version of his Idaho wilderness bill next year if LaRocco is elected to Congress.

Kostmayer is the author of a conservationist-backed proposal to designate 3.9 million acres of Idaho's nearly 9 million acres of roadless national forest land as wilderness.

LaRocco, a Boise stockbroker, faces Republican state Sen. Skip Smyser of Parma for Idaho's 1st Congressional District seat in November. The seat is being vacated by Republican Rep. Larry Craig, who is attempting to succeed GOP Sen. James McClure in the U.S. Senate.

LaRocco spoke to Kostmayer during a trip to Washington, D.C., late last month.

"I told him we're going to solve this issue and I said, 'I'm going to get into Congress,' I said, 'We will resolve it. And we don't need your help,'" LaRocco said Friday. "He said, 'That's fine. You can tell your people out there we will wait.'"

Decades of deadlock on the wilderness issue appeared to be near an end in early 1989 when McClure introduced legislation developed with Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus designating about 1.4 million acres of additional wilderness and about 600,000 acres with special management status short of wilderness.

But the plan was assailed from the start by both environmentalists and the timber industry. It was dropped

after two failed attempts to win Senate passage and a split between McClure and Andrus over specific language.

On a related matter, LaRocco said the federal designation of the spotted owl as a threatened species mandates a solution to the wilderness question. Until the status of Idaho's roadless forests is resolved, the state's timber supply is in jeopardy, he said.

Federal efforts to save the spotted owl will shut off access to old-growth forests in Washington and Oregon, driving up demand for already scarce Idaho logs. That could hurt Idaho sawmill communities, LaRocco said, because more Idaho logs will go to out-of-state mills.

the nomination although I will admit I have had the thought for the past several years and I would like to serve.

I see a lot of challenges in this position but I'm looking forward to them. I consider them challenges more than problems. I think most of them can be solved. And I feel that in the eight-county area, it will be helpful to have a commissioner here.

Q: Given all the problems, opportunities, detractors and supporters, is the challenge facing Idaho's outdoor resources more physical or philosophical?

A: At this point I think we have a great many physical problems that must be addressed. Resolving the physical problem in this area is an example. But we must also keep our eye on the philosophical problems that are developing. For instance, this anti-hunting faction that just recently cost California its right to manage mountain lions.

What we in Idaho don't face that problem this minute, it is very frightening and everyone connected with hunting, fishing and outdoor recreation must be kept aware be-

cause it (attacks on hunting) is coming.

Q: Mentioning Magic Valley's current debate of pheasants, do you see habitat rehabilitation and enhancement, reopening the Jerome Bird Farm or purchase for planting from private enterprise as the answer?

A: Habitat is the thing we need. All the studies carried out over the years in various states indicate pen-raised planted birds have not reproduced significantly. I believe that if planting is necessary it should be done with live-trapped wild birds. But even transplanted wild birds can't rebuild our populations without habitat.

Q: The Fish and Game Commission's official position on wolf restoration is to extend the protection of the Endangered Species Act only if the population rebuilds itself naturally and under no circumstances to endorse translocations

into the state. Do you support that?

A: I really need to be better informed on the wolf situation. I understand they could cause problems for ranchers. In situations like Yellowstone Park, I don't believe the problem would be as great.

But I would have to put in more study before I would support total protection. I think it is very essential that states keep at least some control on situations concerning wildlife. I would want Idaho to maintain some control somewhere along the way.

Q: How do you view the recent public battle concerning fishing management on Big Wood River and Silver Creek?

A: I think this primarily was a misunderstanding that created a lot of adverse publicity. Making complicated regulations works against a management plan. I think all regulations should be made understandable and the reasons should be explained very carefully to the public, to achieve the ends we want.

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Race is a factor in shootings

PHOENIX (AP) — A man who befriended a California man accused of gunning down three people in a church parking lot says the Californian claimed to have visions and believed that churches, their members and clergy oppress black people.

Sam Sanchez Jr., 19, said Friday the conversation took place the night before Clifton Phillip Jeter allegedly fired a handgun at scores of people in a Mormon Church parking lot on Thursday.

"He said that the pope was the Antichrist, that the church was the thing that held black people down," said Sanchez, who had befriended Jeter on Tuesday and let the Los Angeles man stay at his family's home.

Sanchez said that Jeter, who is black, added during the conversation, "If I have the chance, I'd shoot a priest."

Three people, including an off-duty Phoenix police officer, were wounded during the shooting about 7 a.m. Thursday at the Glendale Stake of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

Cliff Lockett, 43, remained hospitalized in serious condition with a wound to his arm and chest. The other two victims, Rachel Elaine Beech, 47, and Amy Garrard, 17, were treated but did not require hospitalization.

Sgt. Kevin Robinson, a Phoenix police spokesman, characterized the shooting as random and unprovoked.

"We believe that had he been at Metrocenter instead, the same thing would have happened," Robinson said. Metrocenter is a Phoenix shopping center.

Sanchez said when Jeter returned from the church he said, "I just shot some white people."

Jeter went into the bathroom and tried to alter his appearance by cutting his hair, shaving off his mustache and an goatee, and changing clothes, Sanchez said.

Jeter hid in the house until negotiators persuaded him to surrender after a one-hour standoff, police said.

Jeter was being held at a Maricopa County jail in lieu of \$1 million bond on eight counts of aggravated assault.

Indians gather to protest plan for development in burial area

FORT HALL (AP) — Members of eastern Idaho's Shoshone-Bannock Tribes have joined Indians from Nevada and Oregon this weekend in ceremonies honoring their ancestors buried in an area of Boise where developers have proposed a multimillion-dollar housing subdivision.

Some 150 people — half Indian and half non-Indian — took part in a Saturday sunrise service honoring Native American dead reportedly buried at the proposed development on Castle Rock, project opponent Karen DesAulniers said.

"I think the Indians made a statement that this area is sacred to them," she said. "They believe no one has a right to build houses in a cemetery."

"There's a lot of history there in Boise. It wasn't our choice to move," said Mary Washakie of the Fort Hall Business Council. "What we want to do is pay respect to the people who are buried there."

The Boise City and Planning Zoning Commission on June 13 granted the Morningside Heights Partnership a conditional use permit to build a 177-unit subdivision on the land.

The week before that, the Fort Hall Business Council passed a resolution opposing the development.

"It is prime property for development. You can see why they want it," she said. "That's always been a motivator in taking land away from Indians — money."

But Boise's Planning and Zoning Department said there is not enough evidence to prove the area, located near the old state penitentiary and zoned for private development, was a unique burial ground.

"Theoretically the whole Boise Valley was heavily used by the Indians," said Chief Planner Sheldon D. Gerber. "Nobody is disputing that Indians used the Boise Valley, but whether this property had any greater

significance than other property remains to be seen."

State Archeologist Tom Green is convinced the area contains Indian graves but more work needs to be done in order to locate the exact sites.

"It is the kind of area where Indians bury their dead. I'm convinced that graves came off that property," he said. "There are definitely some graves on that hillside. The question is where they are and if we can find them. But that's what needs to be done."

Gerber said the situation puts city planners between a rock and a hard place. The land is private property, zoned for development," he said. "If the city were to deny the development on the basis of it being a burial ground then basically the city could be sued for hundreds of thousands of dollars. Thousands and thousands of properties would be in the same situation."

Fairchild says he's broke

SANDPOINT (AP) — Republican gubernatorial candidate Roger Fairchild says he is broke, but confident.

The former state legislator from Fruitland, who barely won a three-way primary election contest, has a campaign debt of \$9,000, while incumbent Democrat Cecil Andrus reports more than \$283,000 in hand for his war chest.

But at a Thursday campaign

breakfast here, Fairchild reminded Republicans the current governor narrowly won the 1986 election, despite the fact he was far better known than his GOP opponent, then-Lt. Gov. David Le-roy.

This time around, Fairchild said, Andrus has earned some enemies. Having run as an anti-abortion Democrat, he alienated some supporters by vetoing a stringent anti-abortion bill this spring, he said.

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Teachers learn at INEL program

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Experts are predicting a shortage of science and math graduates from American universities soon and local teachers are traveling to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory to help stem the tide.

Starting Monday, 15 Idaho teachers will spend six weeks at the federal atomic site, working with INEL scientists and engineers to learn how to improve their teaching skills.

The goal is to come up with new lesson plans for math and science that will excite students about studying these fields.

This is the first year for the INEL Skill Enhancement Program. No other Department of Energy lab is doing this kind of work, but if it pans out here, others may pick up the idea, said Debu Majumdar, DOE-Idaho's university programs manager.

Instructors will spend one week in a Waste Management Technology Symposium and will tour other facilities. But for much of the teachers' time, they will be

paired off with INEL "mentors" for one-on-one training. The teachers learn "real-world applications" of math and science theories, said Lois Eide, precollege program manager for EG&G Idaho, the largest contractor on the site.

Ms. Eide gives the mentors — six EG&G, six Westinghouse Idaho Nuclear Co., and three Argonne National Laboratory workers — a lot of the credit for the fledgling program. They are volunteering their time to teach the teachers.

The project is similar to another mentor framework at INEL, the Teachers Research Associates Program.

Now in its third year, that approach is geared for top math and science teachers, who spend eight weeks working with INEL personnel. The teachers play a hands-on role in actual research, in exchange for graduate credits at Idaho State University.

"They are really going to participate, even in a small way, in research," Majumdar said.

Boise firm wins large contract for disk drives

BOISE (AP) — A Boise-based division of Hewlett-Packard Co. has landed a \$300 million contract to supply high-capacity computer disk drives to a Colorado company.

The contract with Storage Technology Corp. covers a three- to five-year period, and could exceed \$300 million in value, said Don Swatik, vice president for the Louisville, Colo.-based company.

The 5.25-inch disk drives will be manufactured in Boise, where Hewlett-Packard has 4,000 employees.

"It's the kind of activity that is just good for our business," said Mark Falconer, a Hewlett-Packard spokesman. "We've had a lot of growth in the last year and these kind of contracts help solidify that growth."

The disk drives will be used in Storage Technology's latest information storage project, called Iceberg. Its disk drive system — called a Redundant Array of Inexpensive Disk, or RAID — is designed to be a giant storage system for information that never loses any data.

Iceberg's technology is targeted for main frame computers used in business. "It's really a marrying of their strengths in the disk drive business and our strength in the overall system design," Swatik said. "We're very enthused that we have a great partnership with Hewlett-Packard."

Kostmayer will defer to Idaho wilderness bill, claims LaRocco

LEWISTON (AP) — Democrat Larry LaRocco says he has won a commitment from Rep. Peter Kostmayer, D-Pa., not to introduce a new version of his Idaho wilderness bill next year if LaRocco is elected to Congress.

LaRocco is the author of a conservation-backed proposal to designate 3.9 million acres of Idaho's nearly 9 million acres of roadless national forest land as wilderness.

LaRocco, a Boise stockbroker, faces Republican state Sen. Skip Smyser of Parma for Idaho's 1st Congressional District seat in November. The seat is being vacated by Republican Rep. Larry Craig, who is attempting to succeed GOP Sen. James McClure in the U.S. Senate.

LaRocco spoke to Kostmayer during a trip to Washington, D.C., late last month.

"I told him we're going to solve this issue and I said, 'I'm going to get into Congress,' I said, 'We will resolve it. And we don't need your help,'" LaRocco said Friday. "He said, 'That's fine. You can tell your people out there we will wait.'"

Decades of deadlock on the wilderness issue appeared to be near an end in early 1989 when McClure introduced legislation developed with Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus designating about 1.4 million acres of additional wilderness and about 600,000 acres with special management status short of wilderness.

But the plan was assailed from the start by both environmentalists and the timber industry. It was dropped after two failed attempts to win Senate passage and a split between McClure and Andrus over specific language.

On a related matter, LaRocco said the federal designation of the spotted owl as a threatened species mandates a solution to the wilderness question. Until the status of Idaho's roadless forests is resolved, the state's timber supply is in jeopardy, he said.

Federal efforts to save the spotted owl will shut off access to old-growth forests in Washington and Oregon, driving up demand for already-scarce Idaho logs. That could hurt Idaho sawmill communities, LaRocco said, because more Idaho logs will go to out-of-state mills.

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Race is a factor in shootings

PHOENIX (AP) — A man who befriended a California man accused of wounding three people in a church parking lot says the Californian claimed to have visions and believed that churches, their members and clergy oppress black people.

Sam Sanchez Jr., 19, said Friday the conversation took place the night before Clifton Phillip Jeter allegedly fired a handgun at scores of people in a Mormon Church parking lot on Thursday.

"He said that the pope was the Antichrist, that the church was the thing that held black people down," said Sanchez, who had befriended Jeter on Tuesday and let the Los Angeles man stay at his family's home.

Sanchez said that Jeter, who is black, added during the conversation, "If I have the chance, I'd shoot a priest."

Three people, including an off-duty Phoenix police officer, were wounded during the shooting about 7 a.m. Thursday at the Glendale Stake of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

Officer Steve Chackets, 43, remained hospitalized in serious condition with a wound in his arm and chest. The other two victims, Rachel Elaine Beech, 47, and Amy Garrard, 17, were treated but did not require hospitalization.

Sgt. Kevin Robinson, a Phoenix police spokesman, characterized the shooting as random and unprovoked.

"We believe that had he been at Metrocenter instead, the same thing would have happened," Robinson said. Metrocenter is a Phoenix shopping center.

Sanchez said when Jeter returned from the church he said, "I just shot some white people."

Jeter went into the bathroom and tried to alter his appearance by cutting his hair, shaving off his mustache and goatee, and changing clothes, Sanchez said.

Jeter hid in the house until negotiators persuaded him to surrender after a one-hour standoff, police said.

Jeter was being held at a Maricopa County jail in lieu of \$1 million bond on eight counts of aggravated assault.

Indians gather to protest plan for development in burial area

FORT HALL (AP) — Members of eastern Idaho's Shoshone-Bannock Tribes have joined Indians from Nevada and Oregon this weekend in ceremonies honoring their ancestors buried in an area of Boise where developers have proposed a multimillion-dollar housing subdivision.

Some 150 people — half Indian and half non-Indian — took part in a Saturday sunrise service honoring Native American dead reportedly buried at the proposed development on Castle Rock, project opponent Karen DesAulniers said.

"I think the Indians made a statement that this area is sacred to them," she said. "They believe no one has a right to build houses in a cemetery."

"There's a lot of history there in Boise. It wasn't our choice to move," said Mary Washakie of the Fort Hall Business Council. "What we want to do is pay respect to the people who are buried there."

The Boise City and Planning Zoning Commission on June 13 granted the Morningside Heights Partnership a conditional use permit to build a 177-unit subdivision on the land.

The week before that, the Fort Hall Business Council passed a resolution opposing the development.

"It is prime property for development. You can see why they want it," she said. "That's always been a motivator in taking land away from Indians — money."

But Boise's Planning and Zoning Department said there is not enough evidence to prove the area, located near the old state penitentiary and zoned for private development, was a unique burial ground.

"Theoretically the whole Boise Valley was heavily used by the Indians," said Chief Planner Sheldon D. Gerber. "Nobody is disputing that Indians used the Boise Valley, but whether this property had any greater

significance than other property remains to be seen."

State Archeologist Tom Green is convinced the area contains Indian graves but more work needs to be done in order to locate the exact sites.

"It is the kind of area where Indians bury their dead. I'm convinced that graves came off that property," he said. "There are definitely some graves on that hillside. The question is where they are and if we can find them. But that's what needs to be done."

Gerber said the situation puts city planners between a rock and a hard place. The land is private property, zoned for development," he said. "If the city were to deny the development on the basis of it being a burial ground then basically the city could be sued for hundreds of thousands of dollars. Thousands and thousands of properties would be in the same situation."

Fairchild says he's broke

SANDPOINT (AP) — Republican gubernatorial candidate Roger Fairchild says he is broke, but confident.

The former state legislator from Fruitland, who barely won a three-way primary election contest, has a campaign debt of \$9,000, while incumbent Democrat Cecil Andrus reports more than \$283,000 in hand for his warchest.

But at a Thursday campaign breakfast here, Fairchild reminded Republicans the current governor narrowly won the 1986 election, despite the fact he was far better known than his GOP opponent, then-Lt. Gov. David LeRoy.

This time around, Fairchild said, Andrus has earned some enemies. Having run as an anti-abortion Democrat, he alienated some supporters by vetoing a stringent anti-abortion bill this spring, he said.

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Teachers learn at INEL program

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Experts are predicting a shortage of science and math graduates from American universities soon and local teachers are traveling to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory to help stem the tide.

Starting Monday, 15 Idaho teachers will spend six weeks at the federal atomic site, working with INEL scientists and engineers to learn how to improve their teaching skills.

The goal is to come up with new lesson plans for math and science that will excite students about studying these fields.

This is the first year for the INEL Skill Enhancement Program. No other Department of Energy lab is doing this kind of work, but if it pans out here, others may pick up the idea, said Debu Majumdar, DOE-Idaho's university programs manager.

Instructors will spend one week in a Waste Management Technology Symposium and will tour other facilities. But for much of the teachers' time, they will be

paired off with INEL "mentors" for one-on-one training.

The teachers learn "real-world applications" of math and science theories, said Lois Eide, precollege program manager for EG&G Idaho, the largest contractor on the site.

Ms. Eide gives the mentors — six EG&G, six Westinghouse Idaho Nuclear Co., and three Argonne National Laboratory workers — a lot of the credit for the fledgling program. They are volunteering their time to teach the teachers.

The project is similar to another mentor framework at INEL, the Teacher's Research Associates Program.

Now in its third year, that approach is geared for top math and science teachers, who spend eight weeks working with INEL personnel. The teachers play a hands-on role in actual research, in exchange for graduate credits at Idaho State University.

"They are really going to participate, even in a small way, in research," Majumdar said.

Boise firm wins large contract for disk drives

BOISE (AP) — A Boise-based division of Hewlett-Packard Co. has landed a \$300 million contract to supply high-capacity computer-disk drives to a Colorado company.

The contract with Storage Technology Corp. covers a three- to five-year period, and could exceed \$300 million in value, said Don Swatik, vice president for the Louisville, Colo.-based company.

The 5 1/4-inch disk drives will be manufactured in Boise, where Hewlett-Packard has 4,000 employees.

"It's the kind of activity that is just good for our business," said Mark Falconer, a Hewlett-Packard spokesman. "We've had a lot of growth in the last year and these kind of contracts help solidify that growth."

The disk drives will be used in Storage Technology's latest information storage project, called Iceberg. Its disk drive system — called a Redundant Array of Inexpensive Disk, or RAID — is designed to be a giant storage system for information that never loses any data.

Iceberg's technology is targeted for main frame computers used in business. "It's really a marrying of their strengths in the disk drive business and our strength in the overall system design," Swatik said. "We're very enthused that we have a great partnership with Hewlett-Packard."

Early turbulence suggests a rough ride for Idahoan

Poor David Leroy. First, President Bush appointed him to a job most people wouldn't want: finding someone willing to store the nation's non-military nuclear waste.

Now, even before he can begin his wearisome task, parochial politics are dogging him. His early difficulty portends an arduous and unpopular tour of duty.

The former Idaho attorney general and lieutenant governor is to be the nation's first nuclear waste negotiator. He is empowered to bargain with states and Indian tribes to find a temporary storage site for commercial nuclear waste.

The role contains a certain irony: Leroy lost the 1986 Idaho governor's race to Cecil Andrus, whose much-publicized ban on shipping defense waste into Idaho has brought national attention to the radioactive waste problem in general.

Andrus' unabashed display of NIMBY (not in my backyard) politics was immensely popular in Idaho. But it won't make Leroy's path any smoother.

Before he can begin his work, he first must survive the Senate confirmation process. Early on, he is running into senators whose own nimbysism is well-developed.

According to a States News Service report last week, Leroy must appease

toughly senators from Nevada and Tennessee, among others.

The Tennessee senators, whose state is a prime candidate for storage, reportedly will oppose any nominee who leans their way.

Nevada senators are interested because their Yucca Mountain site is slated to be the waste's final destination. They don't want it. They have been interrogating Leroy about his intentions, according to States News Service.

Would Leroy consider Idaho? Yes, he reportedly told them.

That answer won't boost his popularity back home, but it was quite appropriate. Leroy must be scrupulously impartial if he is to have any chance of success.

Impartiality may not satisfy senators whose chief interest is protecting their own turf. Leroy, however, can't afford to make promises in advance.

If he survives the confirmation process, Leroy's new job will tax all of his ingenuity and persuasive talents. No locale will be eager to accept delivery of some of the nation's most radioactive wastes.

The Herculean nature of Leroy's mission doesn't inspire optimism. But the job needs doing, and he deserves admiration for having the courage to try.

What's dirtier — obscene art or Helms' pet leaf?

What follows is a sort of modest proposal for seeing our way clear of the current National Endowment for the Arts debacle.

To begin with, though, a bit of analysis. Apparently we've come to the point in our national political life where it is seriously being argued that if the grant for a particular artist or artwork or exhibition could conceivably be deemed objectionable to a single citizen — or a small minority of citizens, or even a sizeable plurality — well, then, that grant must not be awarded, because a fraction (admittedly a minuscule fraction) of his or her or their tax dollars could then be seen to be propping such work.

This is a novel theory. I notice, for example, that such logic was never applied to funding for the Stealth bomber or aid to the regimes in El Salvador and Guatemala or any number of other such initiatives that I and many of my fellow citizens find obscene. By the logic applied to the National Endowment for the Arts, none of those programs should have been allowed to proceed.

But OK. Let's assume that (astonishingly) that logic is now going to be allowed to hold sway in the coming debate on NEA funding.

There's a simple solution: Currently the very first item on everyone's standard 1040 tax form reads: "Presidential Election Campaign: Do you want \$1 to go to this fund? Yes? No?" And you want \$1 to go to this fund? Yes? No? And there's a little note over to the side: "Checking 'yes' will not change

your tax or reduce your refund."

So, fine, let's simply divide the upcoming NEA appropriation. The vast majority of the authorization, the non-controversial portion that everyone pretty much agrees on, let's just pass outright.

As for the rest, let's add two new boxes to the end of everybody's next 1040 form. The first would read: "National Art Fund: Do you want \$1 of these taxes to go to a fund for art and artists, which would be awarded on the basis of traditional peer review criteria without regard to specific content?" (followed by the proviso as to how checking "yes" would in no way affect one's tax liability).

That way, nobody would be seeing his or her moral qualms abused; such people's money wouldn't come into it and their opinions would have no standing.

The second new box would read: "North Carolina Tobacco Farm Subsidy." Some of Jesse Helms' most influential backers could expect to garner precisely as many dollars (and not a penny more) as there are citizens who don't consider that particular boondoggle to be a continuing national scandal.

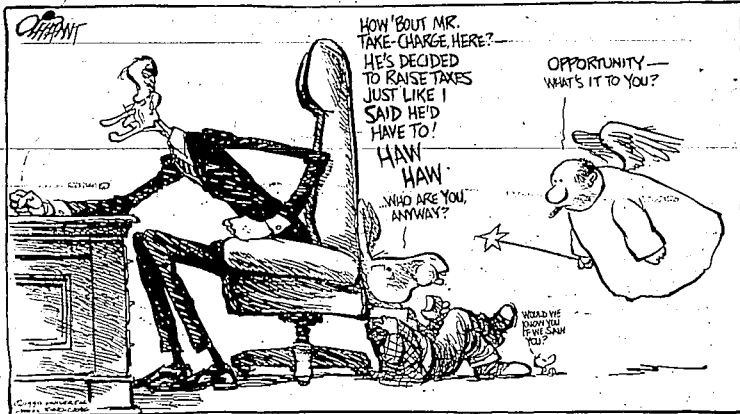

Bush among promise-breaker giants

That's the trouble with catchy phrases — they're catchy.

So when George Bush said yes, or at least maybe, to new taxes, everybody in America already knew that he had said no 1,000 times and said it in a catchy way: "Read my lips — no new taxes."

Bush is not the first president to break a campaign promise, but he was so downright unequivocal that his about-face will go down as part of the history of the Bush presidency.

He put himself among the giants of promise-breakers:

- Woodrow Wilson, who ran for re-election in 1916 on the slogan, "He kept us out of war" and five months later asked Congress for a declaration of war.
- Franklin D. Roosevelt, who, running against Herbert Hoover in 1932, accused Hoover of running up "a deficit so great that it makes us catch our breath." FDR, of course, became a deficit king in office.
- FDR, again, who in the 1940 campaign said, pretty unequivocally: "I have said this before but I'll say it again and again and again — your boys are not going to be sent into any foreign wars." A year later, American boys were being sent into foreign wars.
- John F. Kennedy, who said in campaigning that it would take a mere "stroke of the presidential pen" to end racial discrimination in federally assisted housing. Once in office, he took 18 months to issue a timid executive order covering very little of the country's housing.
- Lyndon B. Johnson, who, even as his administration was making plans to escalate in Vietnam, told voters: "We don't want our American boys to do the fighting for Asian boys." And, "We don't want to get tied down to a land war in Asia." Shortly there-

advanced when the candidates became president.

He puts the presidents' proposals in seven categories, the first two of which are "fully comparable" (to campaign promises) and "partially comparable."

If one adds the percentages, it turns out that Kennedy tried to make good on more of his promises than any of the five; Reagan scored lowest.

But all batted over .500.

Sixty-seven percent of Kennedy's proposals were made in fulfillment of his campaign promises. For Johnson, it is 63 percent; Nixon 60 percent; Carter 65 percent; Reagan 53 percent.

Fishek tracked 133 promises by Kennedy, 63 by Johnson, 153 by Nixon, 186 by Carter, and 108 by Reagan.

He calls his methods "crude, very broad indicators... that do not and cannot fully address the complexities of candidate pledge or presidential fulfillment" — but conclusive enough to find the results commendable.

He concludes it is "remarkable that, once elected, every president, from Kennedy through Reagan, has demonstrated considerable good faith, seeking through legislation or executive order to follow through on a majority of his campaign pledges."

Evidently he harbors low expectations. For that matter, so does the public. In a Gallup Poll published at the end of May, 74 percent of the participants said Bush would not be able to keep his no-new-taxes pledge. They read his lips, but maybe they'd read history, too.

Heat exhaustion doesn't warrant Purple Heart

WASHINGTON — The Army has given a Purple Heart to a soldier who passed out from heat exhaustion in the invasion of Panama last December.

Veterans who bled or, worse, lost limbs for the right to wear the Purple Heart are rightfully upset at the de facto cheapening of an award intended to recognize death and injury from enemy fire in battle.

Meanwhile, another Purple Heart awarded for Panama action fits precisely the criteria for the Purple Heart, which are based on two unambiguous and engraved-in-stone standards: The soldier has to be wounded as a direct result of enemy fire, and the wounds must be severe enough to warrant medical treatment.

Staff Sgt. Lewis Olivera, 25, is a member of the 2d Ranger Battalion, one of the Army's premier light infantry units, based at Fort Lewis, Wash.

For Olivera, the night of Dec. 20 was a monumental bad dream. Shortly after midnight, Olivera leaped out of a C-130 transport 600 feet over the Rio Hato airstrip. Seconds after his chute snapped open, Olivera

crashed through the jungle treetops and into an elevated power line.

Hanging from the line, Olivera was worried that Panamanian soldiers in the nearby barracks, troops of the Macho de Mantes battalion, a Panamanian ranger outfit, would see the sparks and flushes from the power line. He released the "D" rings holding the parachute to his body and, weighted down with a 180-pound pack, Olivera crumpled to the jungle floor.

A U.S. Air Force gunship flying overhead began strafing the barracks, barely 100 yards from where Olivera was crouched. To avoid being hit, he began the trek to a pre-planned rendezvous point.

On the way, Olivera was ambushed by two Panamanian soldiers from the barracks. He suspects they were alerted by the sparks from his impact with the power line.

From a range of 50 feet, Olivera was hit square in the chest by two bullets from their AK-47 assault rifles. One bullet tore through

two ribs and punctured his right lung. The other bullet severed the muscle above his right collar bone.

Olivera was knocked onto his back. The Panamanians approached, began rifling through his pockets for maps and documents, and discovered that he was dazed but still alive.

At point-blank range, one Panamanian soldier fired at Olivera's head. The bullet hit the lip of his kevlar helmet, tore through the 19 layers of fibers and resin, and was deflected just enough that it didn't kill him outright.

Instead, the bullet struck Olivera above the left eye, fractured his skull, tore off a major chunk of the skin on his skull, and glanced off, knocking him unconscious.

The two Panamanian troops left him for dead, tagging him with a black bandanna that was the signature of a "kill" by the Macho de Mantes battalion.

The bullet to the head just happened to be a tracer round, and the heat of the burning chemical cauterized the ruptured blood vessels.

A horror story about life and death: A victim, but no villains

This is a horror story, but there are no villains, only victims.

It's a cautionary tale about the reverse side of the mind-boggling progress of modern medicine, the tale of an elderly man who experienced a protracted and dreadful death because he made what seemed the only possible intelligent decision regarding his future — the decision to undergo bypass surgery.

In making that choice, to strive for an extended life despite advanced age and a history of diabetes, he was advised by doctors of impeccable reputation who based their recommendations on the most sophisticated and reliable examination techniques.

The patient, my father-in-law, Raja E. Watson, had suffered from angina pain for decades. Despite that condition, though, he celebrated his 80th birthday last October, surrounded by Irene, his wife of 54 years, children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren, friends from church and lodge.

Generally, nitroglycerin tablets

subdued his pain. On Easter morning of this year, though, it didn't. The family physician insisted that he go to a hospital, and the next several days were filled with tests and consultations by specialists.

Result: transfer via ambulance to a sophisticated treatment center for cardiac patients in one of America's foremost hospitals. There he underwent more tests and heard the stunning verdict: He needed a surgical procedure of four bypasses.

Otherwise, he could expect to die at any moment, the doctors said.

His daughter, a nurse, dreaded the prospect of her father going through such a drastic operation and said so. However, the deadly alternative eventually convinced her and all the family that there really wasn't another option.

So, the deed was done. As it turned out, it was not a quadruple bypass at all. Over many hours, sev-

en bypasses were performed. Miraculously, Raja got through it — age, frailty and diabetes notwithstanding. The next week was keenly painful, but everyone was elated by his progress. He walked the hospital corridors, complained about the food, made plans to go home.

Just before his discharge, though, something went wrong. On May 5, 10 days after the original surgery, he was rushed back into the operating room for emergency treatment of a blood clot in his leg.

That was the beginning of an end that was to take another two weeks. Two more operations were performed on the leg before the surgeons gave up and called in an amputation expert. We never learned for certain if my father-in-law fell on prey to blood-clotting problems because of his diabetes or whether the clotting occurred in reaction to a medication he was receiving.

In any event, there was a nothing to do but cut off the offending member before it killed him.

The family recited, Irene felt

strongly that her husband would never consent to amputation were he able to speak for himself; as it was, he was only able to nod. The communication except for occasional opening his eyes at the mention of his name. But again, in a theme that recurred throughout my father-in-law's hospitalization, there was no real choice.

Irene's partner of those 55 summers still have the amputation or die a prolonged death of gangrene, an unthinkable prospect.

When the amputating surgeon had finished his task, he told the assembled family that the toes on the other foot didn't look too promising, either.

They're just going to cut him up by inches," Irene told her children in sheer horror.

But no more amputations were needed. The same kind of clotting problem that had claimed my father-in-law's leg attacked major organs: The newly empowered heart beat steadily strongly and ironically, but his kidneys and liver were show-

ing damage.

On May 20, 36 days after his ordeal had begun on Easter morning, Raja Watson died. Had he lived, he might have had to pass his last days in a nursing home as a multiple amputee, ever in danger of more amputations. Whether his mind would have functioned normally again was problematical.

Now my mother-in-law spends her days alone, sifting through insurance forms. She still hasn't received all the bills, but it appears that the final total for Raja's ordeal will be about \$170,000.

Now that he's gone, what can we learn from my father-in-law's experience? Just last week, the Supreme Court handed us another decision regarding a patient's right to life, but the court didn't speak to cases like that of my husband's father.

Once this good old man embarked upon his original course and elected the original surgeon, the situation rapidly spun out of control. Still, given the circumstances, wouldn't many of us — most of us, probably — have

opted for the improved life held out by the surgeons?

Were the doctors wrong, then, in recommending a procedure that has restored tens of thousands of people to normal life? Should they have advised that his age and medical problems made the operation too risky? Had they done so, though, they would have been saying in effect, "O.K., you're too old and decrepit. Just forget it and go die at home."

The question presents a tragic conundrum. I have a hunch that my father-in-law provided the only possible answer: Several days after his death, I dreamed of him, whole and strong and wearing an Irish cap he loved.

In my dream, he was dancing a jig. And laughing. And saying in a sing-song voice that matched the rhythm of the jig:

"Hey, look. I got away.
"Hey, I got away."

Supreme Court ruling on right to die won't help poor, illiterate, young

Finally, the Supreme Court has issued its long-awaited ruling in the Nancy Cruzan case. The court recognized that competent adults have the right to control their medical care — including the right to have life-sustaining treatments stopped.

But, in a 5-4 decision, the court said that those who did not make their wishes known prior to becoming incompetent or mentally impaired — as was true for Nancy Cruzan — must depend upon the policies set by state legislatures concerning matters of stopping or foregoing life-sustaining care.

The decision is being hailed in many quarters as a victory for those who advocate the "right to die," certainly one of the most bizarre rights to come down the pike in a long time. All the justices, except one, recognized a constitutional foundation for the right of competent persons to control their

medical care. But if this is a victory, it is a hollow one.

It is nice to have the Supreme Court finally assert what every court in the country has presumed to be true — that competent adults can control their medical care according to their own wishes. But this right was never in dispute in the Cruzan case. The issue was what to do when a person is incompetent to decide. The court said that those who want to control their care if they become incompetent should write down their directives — in a living wills, for example — and that these would be honored.

Now, a flurry of editorials and opinion pieces urge Americans to fill out living wills.

This is sound advice. But the tragedy of the Supreme Court's decision in the Cruzan case is that relatively few people will heed it, and many more cannot.

There is little reason to suspect that the court's call for "clear and convincing" evidence will be met by most of those who wind up in permanent comas, suffering from Alzheimer's disease, AIDS or terminal cancer. Most Americans do not have wills of any sort. Most have not made arrangements for their own funerals. Most do not have organ-donor cards. And fewer than 10 percent have living wills.

Those most likely to have living wills are the rich, the educated and the privileged. The poor, the ignorant, the illiterate will code control of their medical care to strangers because they are far less likely to have the kind of written directives the court demands.

Moreover, the court's decision in the Cruzan case means that children and the mentally retarded must depend upon state legislators, not their parents or guardians, to determine their fate. The court rejected the argument made by Nancy Cruzan's parents that they were in the best position to decide to remove their daughter's feeding tube after she spent seven years in a permanent coma.

The Supreme Court says that state legislatures know best what is in the interests of those who have left no written record of their wishes. Baloney! Parents know what is best for their children. And children cannot possibly meet the kind of evidentiary standard set out by a court.

No 10-year-old will have a living will. The other likely consequence of the Cruzan decision is that it will fuel calls to legalize active euthanasia of the sort that Dr.

Jack Keovorkian performed with Janet Adkins a few weeks ago in a Detroit trailer park. Many Americans will feel that they cannot trust their state legislatures to keep them from winding up like Nancy Cruzan. So, they will insist on the right to die now, while they are still competent to choose.

Those who are powerful and educated will celebrate the court's decision in the Cruzan case as an affirmation of their right to control their medical care. But those who do not know what the Supreme Court is — whether due to illiteracy, indifference, mental incapacity or age — have nothing to celebrate.

Cuomo staking out ideas on S&L crisis, taxes

WASHINGTON — For 1990, and possibly for more than a little of 1991, the important point is not that Gov. Mario Cuomo is a nearly probable candidate for president.

The important point is that he does not support federal deposit insurance of \$100,000 for every bank deposit.

The important point is that he is inclined to support wholesale changes in President Bush's savings and loan bailout, focusing on how long the bailout should last, taxpayers and who should finance it.

The important point is that he has come out swinging for a high income tax rate on six-figure earnings.

The important point, in other words, is that Cuomo is building an agenda for changed national policies around the Reagan-Bush era's most disillusioned coalition partners — the excessively taxed, shamefully squeezed and cynically manipulated middle class.

In so doing, Cuomo has the horse of politics today sensibly in front of the cart of politics in 1992.

What really counts now, above all in the atmosphere of a looming re-election election, is ideas — the oft-forgotten coin of this realm.

The last time a sitting president was beaten, his challenger, Ronald Reagan, had them. You can argue whether Reagan's crusade for a stronger defense and a weaker government could have beaten Jimmy Carter's status quo without a hostage crisis and virulent inflation; what you can't argue is that Reagan could have won with only an indictment of Carter's policies and no carefully honed alternative.

There are, of course, jobs to be thrown, points to be scored, as well as darts to be ducked in the politics of today, but scoring points and ducking darts for the handful of people who follow presidential politics at this early stage has nothing to do with whether Cuomo or anybody else can be nominated and elected to the White House.

sum back over more than a generation, more than doubling the eventual cost.

Instead, it is drawn to the idea of paying the bill over just a few years, and thus avoiding a 30-year bleeding of taxpayers. Unlike some advocates of this thinking, the idea he is interested in is paying for this whopper of a short-term expense, not with a surcharge on taxpayers but with a surcharge on corporate profits.

And above all, he is staking out idea turf in advance of a budget summit deal, focusing on its possible shortcomings — too many hits on consumption, not enough on high incomes — a focus on past red ink instead of on average Americans' needs for the future; and too puny a peace dividend.

In 18 months, if he runs, we can all argue whether Cuomo is too acerbic, whether his record withstands the test of time, and whether his ideas can attract 270 electoral votes.

For now, it matters more that between his ears the wheels are spinning rapidly.

INHERITED DISORDERS

QUESTION: We have been doing some research before acquiring a dog for a family pet. We would like to know which breeds have the fewest health problems.

ANSWER: If your heart is set on a certain type of dog, you won't necessarily have to switch breeds to avoid potential problems. Though a certain breed might have a "tendency" to develop a particular condition, the chances of it happening might only be one in many thousands. Besides, many of these inherited disorders appear

at birth or soon after and an examination of the animal may be able to detect these. It is not unreasonable, therefore, for you to request 48 hours in which to have the animal examined by a veterinarian before the sale is final.

sels as the bullet passed through muscle and flesh. Doctors who later treated Olivera said the burning action of the tracer bullet probably kept him from bleeding to death as he lay knocked out on the jungle floor through the rest of the night.

Olivera regained consciousness the following morning and used his radio to call for help. According to a unit officer, Olivera's voice was noticeably faint. "We went teams out to find him," the officer said.

Olivera was told by radio to fire three shots in the air to help the patrol locate him. In his weakened

condition, Olivera was having difficulty working his right arm; he fired two shots from his M-16 into the air.

As his army doctor and third shot glanced off his head, tearing more skin off his skull.

The shots, though, were enough to alert a nearby Ranger patrol, although the troops who found the bleeding, battered Olivera did not think he would survive long enough to get medical treatment.

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Vuono also pinned the Purple Heart that day on the soldier felled by heat.

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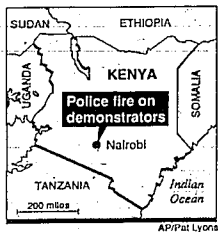

Kenyan police fire on crowds

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — Police fired bullets and tear gas Saturday at thousands of demonstrators who defied a government ban and held a rally demanding a multiparty democracy.

The disturbances quickly spread throughout the city and police pursued demonstrators into Nairobi's commercial center.

Riot police moved through the streets firing into the air and telling crowds to disperse and by nightfall only small groups of demonstrators remained, clashing sporadically with troops.

It was not immediately known if there were any casualties. Witnesses said they saw security forces beat people.

The violence broke out after about 500 protesters gathered at a field several blocks from Nairobi's busy commercial center for a rally to demand democracy in this one-party state.

Kenneth Matiba and Charles Rubia, leading opponents of the government, had called for the rally and were detained last week.

Authorities denied permission for the rally and President Daniel arap Moi said force would be used against anyone attending.

"We want two parties!" many protesters shouted, waving two fingers in the local multiparty salute. They were joined by thousands of others who had watched the rally from the ground's fringes.

The demonstrators, many carrying rocks, then broke into crowds numbering in the hundreds and faced off with security forces who tried to block roads around the field. Trucks bearing dozens of armed soldiers headed toward the field.

When protesters stoned a plain-clothes police officer and his car and commandeered a bus, security forces charged the crowd, firing bullets and tear gas.

Walesa and Mazowiecki reach truce

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Solidarity leader Lech Walesa and Prime Minister Tadeusz Mazowiecki declared a political truce after a private, five-hour meeting Saturday, pledging to cooperate "for the good of our country."

A brief statement issued by the PAP news agency after the meeting indicated that the leaders, at odds over the pace of political and economic changes, decided that their disagreements must not lead to social unrest.

Roman Catholic Archbishop Bronislaw Dabrowski was host of the unannounced meeting, which was held at an undisclosed location near Warsaw.

It took place as thousands of farmers who feel their business is being hurt by Poland's economic policies demonstrated outside the main government building in the capital, Warsaw.

"Differences in political views that appear in our country, as well as different interests of various social groups, should not destabilize the situation in Poland," the leaders' communique said.

"The condition of deep reconstruction in our country is the preservation of social peace and law-abidness."

According to the communique, Walesa and Mazowiecki promised "cooperation" for the good of our country and further progress in democratization.

The statement didn't say what subjects Mazowiecki and Walesa discussed, or whether they made any deals for the other's cooperation.

Mazowiecki has recently drawn sharp criticism from farmers and the faction of Solidarity loyal to Walesa.

In a bid to deflect the attacks, the prime minister ousted three of the four Communists in his Cabinet on Friday and caved in to Walesa's demands for elections earlier than next year.

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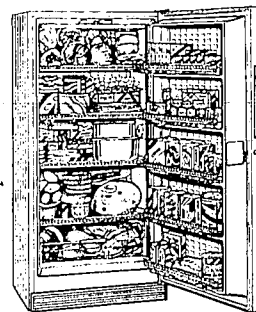

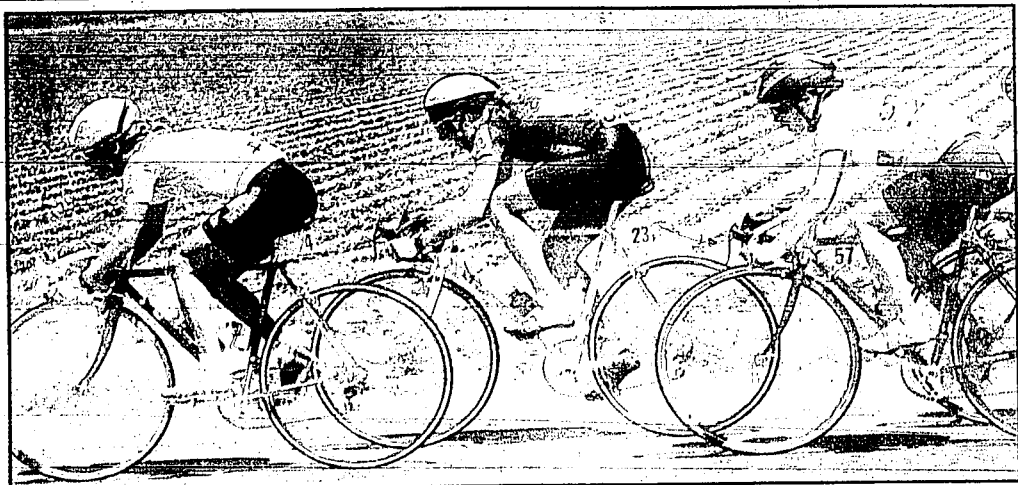

— WIMBLEDON, England — The match was routine, a prologue, really. It had all been done too many times before. Everyone knew from the start Saturday that Zina Garrison, whatever she had accomplished here, wasn't going to beat Martina Navratilova in a Wimbledon final.

The excitement came later, when the weight of history and the splendor of Navratilova met head on. It was then that she exchanged kisses with the Duchess of Kent, when she raised high the winner's silver pliate, when she climbed through the stands to embrace everyone in her considerable entourage, when the tears streamed down her cheeks as she made her victory lap to cheering fans at Centre Court.

"This tops it all," Navratilova would say later, after winning a record ninth Wimbledon singles championship. Of course it did. Helen Wills

Moody had won eight times in the '20s and '30s, but now she bows to Navratilova, who, though 33, had been saying she thought she had one more Wimbledon title in her.

Navratilova won, 6-4, 6-1, in 1 hour, 15 minutes, lifting her career record to 28-1 against Garrison. In all three years, Garrison had captured four sets against Navratilova. The day figured to produce a mismatch, and it did, with Navratilova serving well and volleying even better and playing, in her view, as well as she ever had in her matchless career. In seven matches over two weeks, Navratilova lost only 29 games.

"I knew this was my best chance," said Navratilova, who had lost to Steffi Graf in the finals the previous two years, "and maybe I'd never have as good a chance again. So I really wanted to grab it. I didn't want it to get away."

Garrison had beaten Graf in the semifinals, after knocking off Monica Seles in the quarterfinals.

West Germans heavily favored in today's World Cup final game

ROME - When they played in the championship game four years ago in Mexico City, West Germany was the surprise finalist and Argentina was the team that had marched impressively through the tournament. Their roles will be reversed Sunday when they meet at Olympic Stadium to decide the winner of the 14th World Cup.

Many experts picked West Germany as a finalist this time long before the tournament began, and the Germans have not disappointed. Coached by Franz Beckenbauer and led by midfielder Lothar Matthaus, they played brilliantly through the first round and well enough to beat Czechoslovakia in the quarterfinals, then survived a penalty-kick shootout with England in the semifinals.

The Argentinians, on the other hand, were not expected to last this long. Even though they were the defending champions and had Diego Maradona, the best player in the world, their nucleus of players was thought to be a year or two past its prime. That belief was validated when Argentina lost its first game to Cameroon and finished third in its first-round group.

The title match is scheduled for 11:55 a.m. MDT, TNT, channel 15 in the Magic Valley, will broadcast it live.

The Argentinians did not even play well in their second-round game, against Brazil, or in the quarterfinals against Yugoslavia. But they won both games. A late goal set up by

Maradona was the difference against Brazil, and the Yugoslavia game came down to a shootout.

The team finally showed signs of coming together against favored Italy

in the semifinals Tuesday night. After allowing an early goal, the Argentinians assumed control of the game, tied the score in the 68th minute and advanced on penalty kicks after the

game ended tied. Disappointed Italian fans threw rocks at Maradona's house in Naples, where he plays during the season.

"The Brazil game was a miracle, but the Italy game was no miracle," said Maradona, who has not scored a goal in the team's six games while playing on an injured ankle, but has passed brilliantly. "We have suffered a lot in this Cup. This is a tale to tell our children."

The tale needs a happy ending, of course, and it will not be easy for Maradona and his teammates. Three starters will be out of the lineup Sunday night, unable to play either because they were ejected from the Italy game or collected their second yellow-card warnings for rough play in the Cup. In both cases, the offending player must sit out his team's next game.

The three missing players are critical, in particular Claudio Caniggia, who scored the winning goal against Brazil and the tying goal against Italy. The other two are Julio Olarticoechea, the heart of the team's midfield, and defender Ricardo Giusti.

"It will not be easy to play without them, but we will do our best," said Argentina Coach Carlos Bilardo, whose team is attempting to become the third in Cup history to win back-to-back titles, after Italy in 1934 and 1938 and Brazil in 1958 and 1962.

The finalists are trying to join Italy and Brazil as three-time Cup champions.

Italy beats England for 3rd position

BARI, Italy (AP) — Salvatore Schillaci took the goal-scoring lead for the World Cup and lifted Italy to third place in the soccer championship Saturday night, putting in a penalty kick with six minutes left for a 2-1 victory over England.

Schillaci got his sixth goal of the tournament and fifth game-winner, but he was helped by a charitable call from referee Joel Quiniou of France. The star striker fell as he approached the net after getting tangled up with defender Paul Parker. Still, the referee awarded the penalty and Schillaci, who rarely takes them, beat Peter Shilton.

Earlier, Shilton's embarrassing error cost England dearly as Italy scored its first goal. Shilton, who has played 20 years for England and probably never made such a bad mistake, released the ball near

the corner of the penalty area, but the nearest player was Italy's Robert Baggio.

Baggio stole the ball from behind and passed to Schillaci, who dribbled around Shilton and passed back. Baggio then put in a left-footed kick from directly in front of the unguarded net.

After the game, Shilton announced he was retiring from international soccer. The 40-year-old goalkeeper, who has a world record 125 international appearances, will continue to play for Derby County in the English League.

England tied it with 10 minutes to go on a superb pass from Tony Dorigo, making his World Cup debut, to David Platt, who put a header past goalie Walter Zenga. It was Platt's third goal of the tournament.

The West Germans last won in 1974, but they are in the final for the third straight Cup and fifth of the past seven. Four years ago, they slogged through the first round with a 1-1-1 record and needed penalty kicks to

make the semifinals, but then they played brilliantly against Argentina in the final, rallying from a 2-0 deficit with two late goals. But Maradona set up the winning goal five minutes from the final whistle.

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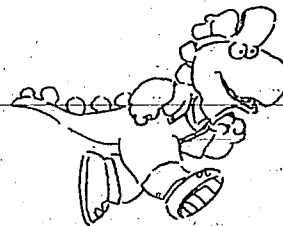

Steals & deals

Nothing is too funky or clunky to attract a buyer at garage sales, a favorite Idaho summer activity

Norman and Dottie Moffitt have the art of garage sale shopping perfected to a science.

Each Friday during garage sale season, Norman makes a list of 15 to 20 sales from among those advertised in the newspaper. Those are the sales they'll hit that morning.

Friday night, he sits down and revises the list, selecting another 15 or so for Saturday morning's rounds.

Garage sales are big business in the Magic Valley. On this summer's first Friday, 77 different sales were advertised in *The Times-News'* classified section; countless other families advertise their events with signs tacked to utility poles.

The sales can be lucrative, too. Linda Roberts — who recently held her second sale of the year at her home north of Kimberly — estimates she made \$1,300 at the earlier event.

At a four-family sale on Sunrise Boulevard in Twin Falls, Julie Mahler and Susan Barnard were among those greeting customers even before they'd finished placing merchandise out for sale.

The event was advertised for 9 a.m., but people started arriving at 7:30, the women reported.

At a sale Mahler held last year, she made about \$700 and sold out her inventory in the first day. Both she and Roberts noted they had bigger items — furniture and appliances — at their sales, accounting for the high revenues.

Neither Mahler nor Barnard attends many garage sales. "We don't go to them, we just have them," said Barnard.

"We have too much junk," Mahler explained. "That's what I don't need, to go get more."

But, as the old saying goes, one family's trash is another's treasure. And garage sale shoppers know many bargains await discovery in area back yards.

Where else can a shopper find a bookcase, a golf bag or Raquel Welch exercise videotape for \$5? Or a framed Renoir print for a buck?

It sometimes seems garage sale browsers will buy anything that's not nailed down. Kamie Hobbs, who supervised the sale her family held last weekend at their Stadium Drive home in Twin Falls, pointed to a set of lockers in the garage.

The family uses the lockers and didn't intend to sell them, she said. But after many people asked whether they were for sale, Hobbs hung a "sold" sign on the lockers' side to deter further offers.

Jo and Cotton Thompson of Twin Falls browsed a sale on Princeton Drive, coming up with several small glass kitchen canisters for 10 cents each, a deal Jo couldn't pass up.

"We just go for the fun of it," Jo said. The Thompsons attend two to five sales a week, concentrating on ones that start before 9 a.m., because that's when Jo has to go to work.

The best deal Jo ever found was a sewing machine in a cabinet. It had never been used, but the Thompsons stepped up a sweet deal for it, paying only \$32 for a machine they were told was worth \$275.

The Moffitts found an antique Victrola for \$300 one year, and they say it was worth twice that. But usually, they go to help augment Dottie's large doll collection. At a sale on Third Avenue in Twin Falls, she found a

Sales mostly unregulated

Garage sales are an American institution. They're also largely unregulated.

Most people hold garage sales once every year or two to pare down their unused belongings and maybe make a little money in the process. State and local authorities usually don't mind this kind of sale.

In Twin Falls, there are few regulations regarding garage sales. LaMar Orton, community development director, says the city only gets involved when it hears complaints of ongoing garage sales that verge on becoming permanent commercial enterprises.

Orton says the city receives one or two complaints of such sales each year. Overall, however, he says the city has had "very minimal problems with garage sales."

Boise, on the other hand, has a garage sale regulation on its books. Adopted in June 1989 as part of a major zoning code revision, the ordinance specifies that garage sales last no longer than 72 hours. In addition, the ordinance limits

Program: Anxiety causes interruptions by children

Little Joey Jackson is the picture of sweetness in his blue sailor hat — which he has, at age 3, developed a borderline obsession for wearing.

Sitting on the kitchen floor, little Joey is a cutie. A sweet boy. A honey, even.

A honey, that is, until Mommy — Debbie, to you — gets a telephone call. And then, if Joey becomes a hellion, all arms and whines, grasping for attention, interrupting even the shortest conversations.

"At first," said the boy's mother, who may be tripping only a little on her vow to stay home with Joey until the boy enters kindergarten, "I thought I was raising a really mean little kid, a kid who demands much too much attention."

But then she talked to her friends and found that something about a telephone's ringing triggers feelings deep in a child's psyche.

Perhaps it is genetics.

Perhaps it is some vestige left over from the evolutionary process. "Mother's not paying attention. If she doesn't pay attention soon, a large carnivore will come by and eat me. I must make sure she pays attention."

So the mother is on the telephone, and the child starts to talk to her.

"Mom, guess what I did in gym today."

"Mom, can I have some yogurt?"

"Mom, only moments before, the child was oblivious to his mother's presence. Nothing could have turned his attention to her. Not questions about dinner. Not questions about his day.

But get on the telephone — or pick up a book, or try to take a warm bath or have a conversation with another adult in the grocery checkout line — and a child suddenly is riveted to his mother's side.

"It's very annoying, because 15 minutes on the telephone doesn't seem like a lot to ask, but to that child, it's like someone Jane Richards-Jones, their mother," said coming in and stealing their mother's attention. Richards-Jones, a program director for Creative Parenting, a 4-year-old state-funded program that is part of the Parent Training Consortium of New Britain, Conn.

What a child wants more than anything is to feel significant and to belong, she said. Children are not significant when a parent's attention is directed to some other activity, and they are painfully aware of that. And so they make you painfully aware, too.

"When you're not busy, you're right where the children need you," said Nancy Robinson, who cares for six children in her family day-care business in addition to raising her own two children. "It's almost like a craving someone has for chocolate. It could be around the house for months and then all of a sudden, because it's not there anymore, you want some."

And what does an expert do when she wants private time away from the children? Evoked Robinson: "I go into the closet."

Even the best-managed child may slip when Mom or Dad is otherwise occupied, Robinson said. But it's an important part of developing into happy and well-adjusted adults.

"It's just like learning what you're going to have to deal with later in life," she said.

Homeless girls gain stability from scouting

PHILADELPHIA — Belinda Morrow, slender and bright and 8 years old, was grinning hard enough to hurt herself. This was, after all, her big day, and big days are pretty scarce for children in a homeless shelter.

Belinda and nine other girls between the ages of 8 and 13 were getting their Girl Scout pins and their first merit badges in a ceremony in the dining hall at the Perkins Morris Shelter in North Philadelphia.

It was a fairly solemn ceremony. Lots of grinning, but not one giggle.

If it was a big day for the 10 new Girl Scouts, it was also a big day for the women who have worked for the past year to bring scouting to homeless girls.

"It was a big decision for us," said Katrina Looby.

By "us" she means the Girl Scouts of Greater Philadelphia (GSGP). Looby heads the Our Extended Family project for GSGP, and it was her job to organize and oversee the scouting efforts at Perkins Morris, which houses 268 homeless people, and at two other shelters.

She calls the project Our Time, and all of the girls who participate get Our Time T-shirts.

"We chose the name because we wanted them to feel this was something special just for them," she said. "They have so little that is just theirs, including

privacy."

The girls came into the dining room, chattering and laughing past hand-lettered signs warning that all bags and purses would be searched and that anyone not inside before the doors are locked at 11 p.m. would be evicted.

On hand to conduct the recent ceremony was Mary Wade, a veteran of 35 years in scouting, a short, erect woman who somehow manages to combine a rather stern bearing with a rather sweet smile.

"There are girls in this troop who have special problems," she said, "but there are girls in every troop who have special problems. There are girls who are shy or aggressive or frightened. Whatever they are, it is scouting's job to find out about them and help them."

The troop at Perkins Morris was formed in September, and has had as many as 28 members. Another two dozen children are members of troops formed at the same time in two other shelters.

"Families come and go," Looby said. "Life is very unsettled for these girls, and scouting is something to give structure to their lives."

In addition to the investiture ceremony, excitement was being generated by the return of Roxanne Hall, who worked with the troop until last month, when she completed work on her master's degree at Temple University and took a full-time job helping children in foster

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"Although," said Richards-Jones, the mother of two children, ages 7 and 10, "I have a feeling this continues until they leave the house."

"We can use our wits instead of responding to everything from an emotional base, and we can solve virtually every parenting issue," she said. "The idea of backing off and thinking about it and involving the kids really helps. It also helps to understand that it's developmentally appropriate, and it helps you to deal with the annoyance."

She was squeaked at, hugged liberally and questioned closely about her job, and about whether she would be coming to visit again, how often and when. Hall and Susan Messina, a master's-degree candidate at Bryn Mawr College, have worked with Looby, Wade and a handful of volunteers on the project.

In addition to attending troop meetings in the homes, the girls have been taken on picnics and hikes, to baseball games and other outings. Looby and the other women have been signing up girls for day camp this summer at the Girl Scout Center in Miquon, Montgomery County.

The other troops composed of homeless girls are at People's Emergency Center in West Philadelphia and the Sojourner House, a shelter for abused women.

"Usually, when a troop is formed, it is led by a volunteer scout leader," Looby said. "But the board (of

SGSP) decided that paid staff people should be assigned to these troops, because continuity and stability are so important to these children."

Wade, Hall and Messina all received stipends, she said.

"We are committed to continuing this program for some years to come," Looby said. "Now we are looking for some financial help from foundations and corporations."

All 40 of the girls being "pinned" at Perkins Morris also earned a World-of-Well-Being merit badge, signifying that they've had instruction in grooming, elementary first aid and nutrition.

"Eating about proper nutrition doesn't do them much good here, because they have no control over their diet," Looby said. "But we hope it will help them when they move on."

And they do move on, she said.

"The turnover rate is high, but we like to think that girls who are with us even for a short time will become

interested in scouting and will join a troop after they leave here."

The girls in the troop are faithful members as long as they remain in the shelter, she said. "They respond very positively. We make sure they know we care about them. We encourage them to talk about themselves. We ask them how they are doing. We really listen to them. That means a lot to them."

While Looby was speaking, Wade was organizing the girls into a small procession to the front of the room. There, they lined up and raised their right hands.

"On my honor, I will try to serve God and my country, to help people at all times and to live by the Girl Scout Law," they pledged.

One by one, they were called forward to receive their Girl Scout pins and merit badges.

And one by one, they walked proudly to their seats. Grinning.

Everyone has their own theories on how to ensure a successful garage sale.

Here are some hints from a garage sale kit given to anyone who advertises their garage sale in *The Times-News*.

During shopping trips before the sale, make notes about the prices of new items similar to ones you'll be offering. You may want to price your wares one-third to one-half off retail prices.

Have enough change on hand, at least \$20 to \$30 in one-dollar bills, plus one roll each of quarters, dimes

and nickels.

Make sure your sale site is clean, bright and free of odors. Mow the lawn a few days before the sale.

If running a sale with several families or friends, make sure all items are coded to denote ownership and proper credit for sales.

Don Giesler - who held a sale with neighbors Jean Hite and Doris Cameron last weekend on Polk Street in Twin Falls - said advertising and accessibility are important.

"We've been to sales where you can hardly find a place to park," she said.

Have a good variety of items, too, and never decide against putting an item out for sale because you doubt

anyone would want it. "You can't count on what they're going to take," Giesler said of people's shopping habits.

Garage sale veterans also suggest keeping prices reasonable, although maybe asking just a bit more for an item that you expect since many buyers love to dicker on prices.

Keep in mind, too, that people can't resist bargains. So go ahead and put out that half-used bag of bird seed, the 2x4 that has been sitting in the garage or those knickknacks still packed away in the attic.

"A friend told me anybody will buy anything for 25 cents," noted Sandy Hobbs, "and it's true."

Old-style human-powered lawn mowers are making a comeback

CUTTING EDGE LAWN CARE: There has been a slow return to the old-style torized push lawn mower in the last few years. "We've had a large increase of push mower sales — selling five to 10 times more in the last 10 years," McGuckins Hardware salesman Tim Fremgen says. McGuckins in Boulder is one of the country's largest hardware stores. "A lot of it is because lawns are getting smaller with people buying townhomes and duplexes. But, I think a lot of people are approaching it from an environmental point of view or want to get more exercise. It's cheaper than membership in a health club." Fremgen says it's generally the baby boom group buying the push mowers. "Five to eight years ago we considered not carrying them (push mowers), but in the last two to three years, they're hard to keep in stock."

LET IT LIE: For a change, it turns out the easy way is better. Grass clippings left to lie on a lawn improve its health according to a cooperative study conducted by Colorado State University and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Nitrogen and other nutrients in the clippings are recycled into the lawn, reducing fertilizer bills and the potential for nitrogen surface water contamination. Clippings break down quickly and encourage beneficial

earthworms and microorganisms that maintain healthy grass and healthy soil. Best of all, clippings left on the lawn mean no hauling and bagging and 18 percent less trash volume in landfills.

HELOISE TURNS GREEN: The well-known author of handy household hints is now offering "Hints For a Healthy Planet," in a new book of the same name (Perigee Books, New York, \$7.95). Her eccentric but clever tips provide comic relief to the serious and often-depressing business of saving the earth:

- Save the heavy waxed-paper lining from dry-cereal boxes and use it to line baking pans, cover casseroles and other foods in the microwave.
- Use plastic bread bags as emergency rain boots.
- Burn a match to kill household odors instead of spraying air deodorizer with its fluorocarbons.
- Cut pantyhose into small pieces and use them to remove nail polish; they work better and cost less than cotton balls.
- Slide used computer paper under the baby's bottom to keep the

counter clean when you change a diaper.

- Use plastic tabs from bread bags as free guitar picks.
- Keep frequently used things in a handy spot in the refrigerator to save energy in open-door search time.
- While there are still plastic-foam trays in the world, she suggests, recycle them yourself:
- Cut them in the size and shape of your feet and use them to cushion and insulate the soles of your shoes.
- Put a piece in the bottom of your lunch bag so the bag will stand up and cold foods won't make a "sweat hole" in the bottom.
- Cut out circles and place them between china plates to prevent chipping.

ANOTHER WILD PATCH BITES THE DUST: It is with sadness that I observe the daily progress of a big new house going up in my Boulder, Colo., neighborhood. Where the house is being built used to be a little patch of nature along Bear Creek.

I used to walk there with my cats, who sniffed out the wild catnip and crept like miniature tigers through the dense foliage. My son and his

friends played in the tunnels of wild shrubbery.

The house is so close to the creek, that people will probably no longer be able to walk along the little trails through wild roses and cottonwoods.

A hulking, gray concrete wall surrounding the property makes it look as if a high-security prison has been dropped into the end of our neighborhood park.

I first saw the land for sale last year; now I'm sorry I didn't do something to try to prevent this unreasoning property make. I guess we can't take those small green spots in our neighborhoods for granted.

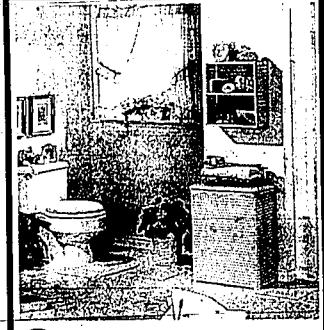

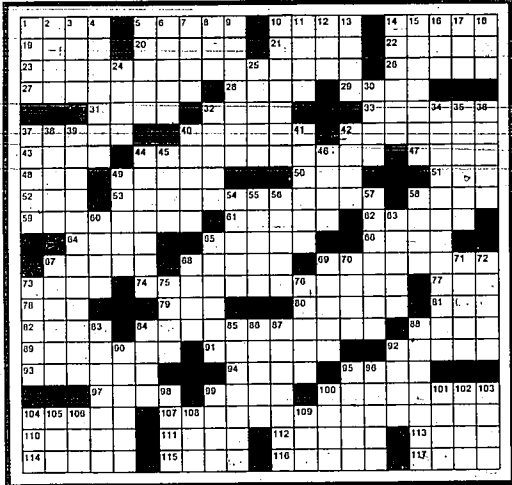

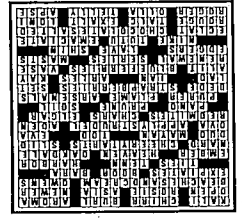

Princess wins Japanese hearts

KASHIHARA, Japan (AP) — Move over Princess Di, meet Princess Kiko.

The 23-year-old Kiko, who eight days ago was a graduate student living in an apartment with her middle-class family, is now a national celebrity after her marriage to Prince Akihiko and is greeted by large, adoring crowds.

Even her choice of hats is subject to the close scrutiny of television's gossipy morning variety shows.

But as she and Prince Akihiko, 24, Emperor Akihiko's youngest son, concluded their three-day "honeymoon" with a visit to an imperial tomb in this western Japan city Saturday, the newest addition to Japan's royal family couldn't have looked more composed.

Walking slowly a few steps behind her new husband, Princess Kiko nodded to a crowd of several hundred guests at the tomb of the legendary Emperor Jimmu, a semigod who according to myth was Japan's first monarch.

"She's so much more beautiful in person," gushed one middle-aged woman in the crowd. "I like the way she smiles."

"Kiko-sama," as she is respectfully known, is only the second commoner to marry into Japan's imperial family.

Akihiko's mother, Empress Michiko, was the first when she wed

His cardiologist, Dr. Herbert Semler, said Thursday that doctors who examined Hackman detected a narrowing of an artery leading to his heart.

Filmmaker wins \$3,000 from Rivera and others

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A federal judge has awarded \$3,000 to a filmmaker who sued talk show host Geraldo Rivera for broadcasting part of his documentary on mass murderer Charles Manson without permission.

Robert Hendrickson claimed victory even though U.S. District Judge Ronald S.W. Lew awarded him far less than the \$310,000 he was seeking from Rivera.

"It's all exclusive film. That's what the court has ruled," said Hendrickson, 45. "I won the copyright

Poll reveals people too busy to vote

LOS ANGELES — The most common reason Californians give for not voting in the June election is not lack of interest, nor disdain of the candidates. They were simply too busy to be bothered, a Los Angeles Times poll found.

And while most registered voters who skipped the June primary say they very likely will vote in November, the evidence is that many probably won't.

For an assortment of reasons, they can be expected again to join the political majority that outnumbers Democrats and Republicans combined: the Anti-Electorate — citizens at least 18 years old who could vote if they wished, but who refrain by choice.

The Anti-Electorate was of unprecedented size in California's June 5 election, numbering about 14 million people. About 4.9 million people voted — fewer than in any California primary since 1960. The share of people who were eligible to vote but didn't was the highest since 1928, Secretary of State March Fong Eu said.

As a social class, the Anti-Electorate is as disparate as any group of California citizens, the poll found. Nearly eight in 10 graduated from high school or went to college, but 22 percent were dropouts. More than half live in the suburbs, and 76 percent are white. Almost a quarter makes less than \$20,000 a year, about the same who earn more than \$50,000.

Victim's fliers help nab rape suspect

HOUSTON (AP) — Kim McSherry says that after she was raped at knifepoint in her apartment last month, she reacted like many victims and shook with fear at the prospect of leaving her home.

But when the "snaggletoothed" attacker returned, Ms. McSherry struck back with a public appeal — even revealing her identity as a rape victim — for help.

It paid off.

Eight hours after she and neighbors posted 3,500 fliers, including a drawing and a description of her attacker, a suspect was in custody.

A neighbor who saw the poster recognized the man and called police, authorities said.

"I had to do something," said Ms. McSherry. "My mental health absolutely depended upon it. I just don't

wear 'victim' well. It ain't a fun place to be."

Ms. McSherry said she was motivated to act not only for herself, but also to give other sexual assault victims the courage to come forward and "not be huddled in a corner forever."

Ms. McSherry, 39, was attacked at her apartment June 7. The man walked through an unlocked door about 2 a.m. and assaulted her for more than two hours, she said.

Although she reported the attack to the police, Ms. McSherry said she was afraid to leave her home and worried the man would come back.

On June 28, he did, leaving notes saying, "You snitched but I still love you."

"I had done nothing and my greatest fear happened — he came back,"

Ms. McSherry said. "So, what the hell did I have to lose?"

On Sunday, she and about 40 friends and neighbors posted green and yellow fliers on apartments, cars, stores and utility poles throughout her neighborhood in Spring Branch, a suburb of Houston.

Damon Lee Wood, 22, was arrested at his apartment, about a block from Ms. McSherry's apartment, police said. Wood, paroled from the Texas prison system in November, was charged with robbery and aggravated sexual assault.

Family fights to take care of quint, 6 others

DAVISBURG, Mich. (AP) — Welcome to the L'Esperance home, where kids will be kids will be kids will be kids will be kids. And that's just the quintuplets, the nation's first test-tube set.

Besides the 2½-year-old quint, Michele and Raymond L'Esperance have three sons from previous marriages and now are caring for three more at their home about 30 miles north of Detroit. That's 11 kids, if you're counting.

It hasn't been easy. Food costs \$350 weekly, the telephone was briefly cut off last month for non-payment, the couple worried their electricity was next and handed their limousine, the only vehicle that could carry all the kids, back to the finance company. Raymond, 29, is a Macomb County Jail guard, bringing in \$26,000 yearly; his wife, 36, works at a shelter for battered women.

Recent publicity over the couple's tight finances upset the family. Mrs. L'Esperance said. She says they can care for their children, but needed a foster-home license — and the increased state aid it would bring — to care for her sister's brood.

"Why take them from family?" she said in a terse interview outside the family's two-story colonial home, as she held one of the two horses they keep on their 10-acre spread.

Oakland County Probate Judge Barry Grant was angered at a hearing last week on the license requested five weeks ago. He ordered the state Department of Social Services to explain why it hasn't acted on the cou-

"This is government bureaucracy at its worst," Grant said.

Chuck Peller, a spokesman for the department, said the foster-home license decision was delayed because the family only recently filled out the needed paperwork.

As foster parents, the L'Esper-

ances would receive about \$1,000 monthly for their niece rather than \$295 in welfare they now get.

The L'Esperances told Grant that private donations will let them keep their niece regardless of the government's decision. Outside court, they won't talk about money. "I'd rather let sleeping dogs lie," Mrs. L'Esperance said.

The couple apparently once expected that commercial endorsements

would offset the sudden costs of Erica, Veronica, Danielle, Alexandria and Raymond Jr., born 10 weeks premature in January 1988.

"No endorsements occurred. Multiple births had become a lot more common," said attorney Thomas Plunkert, who was hired to negotiate contracts. Even being the country's first quint conceived through in-vitro fertilization didn't land offers, he said.

Workers write to support ailing city of Bridgeport

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP) — A "60 Minutes" show on Bridgeport painted such a bleak picture of the city that hundreds of people wrote to offer the new mayor some free, if not always sound, advice on how to turn things around.

Some even sent cash after the piece on Bridgeport aired this spring, including a man who wrote a check for \$2.50 in appreciation of a General Electric toaster manufactured in Bridgeport many years ago.

"It's still working fine," the man wrote.

Two people from California, both impressed with Mayor Mary Moran's portrayal as the anti-

politician, sent \$100 each. Total donations topped \$300. "We were appalled and heart-sick at the monumental task you face," one family wrote. CBS depicted Bridgeport, a city of 142,000 about 55 miles northeast of New York City, as a once-major industrial center on the "verge of economic collapse." Viewers were shown shot after shot of blighted housing and abandoned factories.

The letter-writers ranged from a Wall Street investment firm to inventors with sometimes dubious claims about the moneymaking potential of their products and consultants seeking to be added to the city's payroll.

Officers may use stun guns, only after getting stunned 1st

POMPANO BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Police here have been authorized to use stun guns as an alternative to nightsticks, but there's a catch — any officer who wants to use the device has to get zapped first to know what it's like.

Forty Pompano Beach officers have signed up for a six-hour course on the use of the electric weapon. The officers are responsible for buying their own stun guns, which cost an average of about \$150.

Getting zapped is the last part of the course, and on Friday officers of all sizes yelled and crumpled helplessly to the ground when they were touched with the stun gun and the electricity hit their muscles.

"It's really a convincer," officer Bill Butler said after he experienced it. "It's like something really biting into you."

"It hurt. A lot," said officer Kathy Kontozka. After being zapped, officers said they would not hesitate to use the guns as a last resort in place of physical restraint.

"A nightstick will injure one," Butters said.

Officer Ken Holland, who is in charge of the training program, said the stun guns are completely safe. But there are precautions — an officer must stop the current as soon as the subject falls and they are forbidden to place the device on a person's head, face or groin.

Cycle ride puts bride in hospital

NORTH MYRTLE BEACH, S.C. (AP) — A bride who got onto her husband's Harley Davidson while still wearing her wedding gown spent the night in a hospital after it got caught in the motorcycle's back wheel.

Denise Hudson and her husband, Lee, planned to ride to Raleigh, N.C., for a Grateful Dead concert after getting married July Fourth at a park.

But the train of Mrs. Hudson's full-length gown got caught and

dragged her under the bike. Mrs. Hudson, 28, suffered a broken pelvis and a concussion.

"She's skinned and sore. It could have been worse," said Hudson, 30, who received minor cuts and bruises.

Paramedics had to cut the cream-colored gown to pieces to free her.

Mrs. Hudson will have to spend the next few days in Grand Strand General Hospital, and the next few weeks recovering from her injuries.

Poor economy ends honeymoon for dynamic president of Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — On inauguration day, President Fernando Collor de Mello promised a better life in 100 days, but recession looms, strikes abound and grumbling has begun about his anti-inflation shock therapy.

Their flamboyant new president stunned the 150 million Brazilians in March by freezing bank accounts as part of his drastic program of bringing down annual inflation of nearly 5,000 percent.

He was immensely popular at first, but that is changing.

"The shock was cruel, monstrous and unnecessary," Paul Singer, an economics professor and planning secretary for the city of Sao Paulo, said in an interview.

Collor, 40, is Brazil's first freely elected president since 1961. He took office March 15, promising a "new

Brazil" and reform of the bloated, corrupt bureaucracy.

He said the first task was to reduce inflation drastically and eliminate a \$31 billion budget deficit.

On March 16, he announced an 18-month freeze on 80 percent of the money in savings accounts and financial markets; price controls; a new currency, and an end to numbered bank accounts.

Police made showcase arrests of bank and supermarket managers accused of not complying with the plan. Cheering crowds gathered as the executives were taken away. They were released later.

To set an example of austerity, Collor abolished half the 24 government ministries and ordered the sale of 42 government-owned mansions and 10,177 apartments formerly used by top officials rent-free.

Thousands of official cars were auctioned in lots with signs proclaiming, "The End of Perks."

Dozens of the 188 state-owned companies were put up for sale. Import taxes and trade barriers for thousands of imports were lowered or dropped.

Automatic cost-of-living pay raises were eliminated. Collor said 360,000 of the government's 1.4 million employees would be fired by June 18.

Official inflation fell from 84 percent in March to 3.3 percent in April, and the government said it soon would be zero. Brazilians were elated.

"The Collor government can be accused of almost anything in these first 100 days except indolence, sluggishness or monotony," the newspaper O Estado de Sao Paulo said in an editorial.

Many march over concern for violence in S. Africa

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Tens of thousands of African National Congress supporters marched in cities across the country Saturday to protest black factional fighting in Natal Province that has claimed thousands of lives.

Official permission was granted for about 20 peace marches planned by the ANC and its allies, the Congress of South African Trade Unions and the United Democratic Front, to mark the end of a week of national protest against the violence. Petitions protesting the violence were presented to authorities at various police stations throughout the country.

About 80,000 protesters staged a peaceful march through the streets in the Eastern Cape province city of Port Elizabeth. The high turnout was attributed to the region being a traditional ANC stronghold.

There were no incidents despite a heavy police and army presence and the sealing off of some roads with barbed wire.

The march was led by recently returned ANC exile Thobile Mhlalho and former police lieutenant Gregory Rockman, who last year exposed incidents of police brutality.

A memorandum delivered to police read: "This is not black-on-black violence, it's also neither faction fighting, but apartheid war." President F.W. de Klerk was urged to stop the violence.

About 12,000 people marched through the Natal capital, Durban. Protesters carried huge cloth banners that read: "Stop the apartheid war, defend Natal."

Fires in France force evacuation

TOULON, France (AP) — Firefighters on Saturday battled two major forest fires that forced the evacuation of 2,000 vacationers from campgrounds and cottages in southern France.

More than 1,000 firefighters battled the blazes through the night and declared them under control after they had burned about 2,220 acres of forest and brush. The cause of the fires was not known.

Seventeen people, including 15 firefighters, suffered light burns or smoke inhalation, officials said. The fires destroyed one villa and about 20 camping caravans.

Prices soar in E. Germany

WEST BERLIN (AP) — Katrin Matthes got out of bed before dawn Saturday, left her home in southern East Germany and drove three hours to West Berlin to find food she can afford.

She was among hundreds of East Germans crowding into a West Berlin store to buy meat, butter and milk that, paradoxically, are suddenly cheaper in the wealthy West than the struggling East.

The 17-year-old factory worker from Dresden paid 102 German marks (\$60) for groceries she said will feed her and three Dresden families in the next few days. "It would have cost 300 marks (\$180) in East Germany," she said.

The stunning rise in prices just days after the German states merged their economies has created a scandal in both countries and sent droves of East Germans into Western grocery stores.

After the two nations unified their economies on July 1, East German stores began filling their shelves with Western products.

But because East German stores face substantially less competition, their prices are not only three or four times higher than before economic unification, but also often higher than the same goods sold in West Germany.

Lumber production down, orders up at end of June

PORTLAND — Lumber production fell, but orders and shipments increased in 12 Western states in the week ending June 30.

The Western Wood Products Association said lumber production was 358 million board feet, 15 million feet less than the previous week. Orders were 442 million board feet, 9 million feet over the previous week's total. Shipments were at 436 million feet, up 13 million feet.

During the same week last year, production was at 447 million board feet, orders 459 million feet and shipments 487 million feet.

Year-to-date figures through 26 weeks of 1990 show production at 10,547 billion board feet, orders at 10,733 billion feet and shipments at 10,594 billion feet. Totals for a year ago at this time show production at 10,309 billion board feet, orders at 10,445 billion feet and shipments at 10,454 billion feet.

Rain doesn't dampen sales in May of irrigation gear

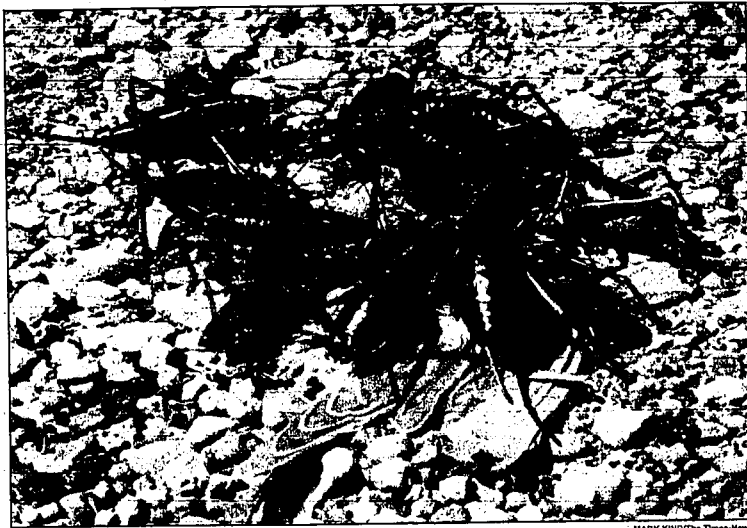
BOISE — Rainfall in southern Idaho was nearly twice normal, yet Idaho Power Co. said monthly electricity sales to irrigators were up more than 33 percent over one year earlier.

Adjusted for weather differences, sales for the period were up nearly 51 percent. Idaho Power economist analyst Cherie Woodworth said that appears odd, but most of the rain in May of 1990 came late in the month and the weather leading into May was different each year.

Since both March and April of 1989 were very wet, soil moisture was very high and farmers didn't need to irrigate as much. In 1990, the same two months were dry, so irrigators had to pump more water onto fields.

Those nasty crickets come of age Idaho tries to control them this year, wonders about next

ST. ANTHONY — All the nasty things experts said about Mormon crickets this spring are true, although some were perhaps slightly exaggerated.

"The cows don't like to be around them, and I sure as hell don't like to be around them," said rancher Bill Enget as he watched a half-mile long swarm of the chirping crop destroyers hop across the Red Road just north of St. Anthony. "They've come of age and they're disgusting — horrifying even. The females are about 3 inches long. They're brownish red and they swarm on everything in their paths — grass, clover, dead birds and each other."

In Franklin and Oneida Counties, the U.S. Agriculture Department's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service has hired a Nezerpe firm to spray 33,000 acres of cricket-infested national forest land.

That task is complete, APHIS Officer in Charge Roger Pollard said Friday. Also complete is grasshopper spraying in the Bell Rapids area west of Buhl.

"All of our commitments for crop protection treatments have been completed," Pollard said.

But APHIS doesn't treat private land unless landowners pay for one-third of the cost, and the five ranchers affected in Fremont County near St. Anthony had not signed up to pay for a spray program, he said.

Neither has the Bureau of Land Management or the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, which owns wildlife range in the area, Pollard said.

"Land ownership maps resemble a checkerboard in Fremont County — government land alternates with private land. That means any landholder who wishes to spray needs the cooperation of neighbors — a cricket plague, might visit federal land one day, only to move on to private land the next day, before sprayers can get their planes in the air."

In two meetings this year, the various affected landholders have not reached agreement on spraying the estimated 50,000 infested acres, Pollard said.

Enget lost 400 acres of dryland alfalfa to the crickets — normally he gets one cutting of about 400 tons of hay, he said.

"They just ate it as it came up," he said.

He is more worried about the effect on private and public range land — if each of the millions of female crickets here lays its 300 eggs, and if mild weather visits eastern Idaho again next winter, crickets could terrorize his 5,000-acre ranch even worse than this year, he said.

"If we get the right kind of winter and the right kind of spring, that might be all right," he said. "But I sure hate to depend on that."

The Idaho Agriculture Department is offering grains laced with insecticide to farmers for free.

"We've probably put out 5,000 or 6,000 pounds," Enget said. Please see CRICKETS/C2

Tillage method to fight erosion touted

PULLMAN, Wash. — A government scientist says a new tillage method he has developed could save tons of soil from eroding off fields in the Palouse region.

R. James Cook, a U.S. Department of Agriculture plant pathologist, said Thursday his method encourages wider use of minimum-till farming methods to reduce erosion in a region where an estimated 14 tons of topsoil are lost from each acre every spring.

The system uses a modified commercial one-pass drill to incorporate seedbed preparation, fertilizer placement and planting into a single operation.

This one-pass system is going to outperform conventional systems by 20 percent and standard minimum-till probably by 25 percent or 30 percent," Cook said.

Washington Wheat Commission administrator Thomas Mick said Cook is very

highly regarded by wheat growers, so the tillage method he developed will get a good reception.

"They'll put a lot of credence in it, just because Dr. Cook is proposing it," Mick said. "Of course, they'll want to see some results first."

Cook said he is encouraging farmers to experiment with his system on a smaller scale so that refinements can be made.

"Soil erosion is a big concern, but farmers are doing everything in their power and using every available technology to control it," Mick said.

Intensive tillage practices, traditionally used by farmers to prepare fields for planting, leave the soil vulnerable to erosion and threaten long-term productivity.

In recent years, farmers have adopted minimum-till practices that disturb the soil less by leaving some crop residue in place.

Cook said his system overcomes root diseases that thrive in the moist soil by planting seed in paired spaced rows and placing fertilizer in the seed row, rather than between rows.

Shanks attached to the modified commercial seed drill break up the soil to a depth of 5½ inches.

Fertilizer is dropped into the row and seed is planted two inches above it. The seedbed is then covered by a trailing wheel on the drill, Cook said.

The method disturbs the soil enough to knock down fungus that cause some root diseases, Cook said.

It would be even more effective if used in three-year crop rotation, which helps break up disease cycles, he said.

Cook said his estimates are based on four years of experiments at three sites in Eastern Washington and one in northeastern Oregon.

Visa, MasterCard sue nationwide telemarketers

LOS ANGELES — A vast telemarketing scheme with nationwide tentacles recruited small companies to launder credit card charges. Visa International and MasterCard International contend in a multimillion-dollar lawsuit.

The suit, unsealed Thursday, says consumers were lured into calling sales "boiler rooms" by mailings promising free cars, watches and \$5,000 cash prizes. Pressure tactics were then used to sell water purifiers, security systems, travel packages and vitamins, and to obtain credit card numbers, it says.

The defendants claimed to check winners' identities through their credit card numbers and implied Visa and MasterCard sponsored the giveaways, the lawsuit says.

They also misrepresented goods, failed to deliver them and sent multiple bills for the same product, according to the suit.

It alleges racketeering, fraud, trademark infringement and interfering with contractual relationships.

"It's the largest single telemarketing operation that Visa and MasterCard ever came across," Visa spokesman David R. Brancoli said.

The lawsuit attempts to stop telemarketers

from using third parties to process credit card sales drafts.

Telemarketers use small businesses to process sales drafts for a fee of typically 6 percent, according to the suit. The front businesses, which were not charged, included a men's clothing store in Virginia, an exercise business in Arizona and a car stereo store in California, the lawsuit alleges.

Banks won't set up Visa and MasterCard accounts for telemarketers because too many customers refuse to pay, leaving the banks holding the bag, the suit says.

The lawsuit, filed in U.S. District Court in Los Angeles, opens a new front in the companies' joint war on phone scams, which are estimated to cost Visa and MasterCard \$150 million to \$200 million a year. Federal Trade Commission officials estimate the yearly loss to consumers is \$1 billion.

"People should be incredibly suspicious about giving their (credit card) numbers over the phone," Brancoli said.

Also under way are criminal fraud investigations by the Postal Service and the Secret Service, according to the suit and one of the defendants, Lorraine G. Doty.

"This thing is much bigger than what is laid

Report says farmers are fewer but doing better

WASHINGTON — The nation's farmers are moving toward the 21st century in a financial condition much improved from a few years ago, an Agriculture Department report says.

"The proportion of farms that are financially vulnerable today is half that of 1985," the report issued on Thursday said. "Farmland prices have stabilized and are beginning to rise."

"But the number of farms in the United States continued to decline throughout the 1980s as they have, almost unabated, since 1935," the report said. According to the 1987 census of agriculture, there were just more than 2 million farms, down 7 percent from 1982, when the previous census was taken.

Small farms, although fewer in number, increased as a proportion of total farms. Mid-sized farms declined both in number and their share of the total.

"The number of large farms continued to increase," the report said. "This trend shows little prospect of reversing in the near future."

The analysis by the department's Economic Research Service was based on an annual report to Congress on the status of family farms.

"Virtually all farms in the United States are 'family-owned businesses,'" the report said. "Fewer than 3 percent of all farms are organized as corporations, most of which are family held."

Only 0.3 percent are corporations owned and operated by people other than a family. Single families own 87 percent of all farms, and multifamily partnerships operate the remainder.

"Because almost all farms are owned and operated by one or more families, we did not define family farm for this report," the agency said.

Farmers spent more last year, report states

WASHINGTON — Farmers spent an estimated \$124.1 billion on production expenses last year, up 4.9 percent from \$118.4 billion in 1988, according to a preliminary report by the Agriculture Department released Tuesday.

But that was still far below the record level of \$131.8 billion spent in 1981, just before a general financial crunch that stalled expansion in the nation's agricultural sector. In 1986, annual spending by farmers dropped to less than \$106 billion, reflecting massive cutbacks in capital investments as land values plummeted and debts weighed heavily on so many.

The last report by the department's National Agricultural Statistics Service showed 1989 expenditures rose for all major categories farm and land improvements, which dropped 6.3 percent, and fuel, which declined slightly.

Farm services, which include rent, comprised the largest expenditure by farmers at \$26.7 billion, up 0.7 percent from 1988. These services accounted for 22 percent of overall production expenses.

Feed expenses were estimated at \$18.2 billion, up 1.7 percent, accounting for 15 percent of the total 1989 expenditures.

Overall, last year's production expenditures averaged \$37,478 per farm, an increase of \$2,322 from 1988.

Economist claims there's a better way to conserve the nation's soil and water

WASHINGTON (AP) — The soil and water conservation programs operated by the Agriculture Department could be made more efficient and less costly, says a Cornell University economist.

The programs are part of the farm bill being written by Congress this summer. One of the most controversial is the Conservation Reserve Program, a holdover from the 1985 law.

Under the CRP, farmers can take 40 million to 45 million acres of fragile land from crop production in return for federal help. Supporters say it will reduce soil erosion on cropland by about 20 percent once all the work is done.

But Jim Sinner, an agricultural economist at Cornell, says the government is spending far more than necessary to control soil erosion on much of the land enrolled in the program.

It is Sinner's contention that soil conservation programs should be revised before more land is enrolled in the CRP.

"The programs should place less emphasis on land retirement and more emphasis on encouraging cropping practices that will reduce erosion," he said. "Compared to the CRP, this approach could provide substantial savings in annual expenditures while conserving as much or more soil."

The agriculture committees on Capitol Hill have finished work on their versions of the 1990 farm bill, but floor debate and final votes by both the House and Senate are still ahead.

About 34 million acres of highly erodible land have been enrolled in CRP under 10-year contracts. Farmers get an average of about \$50

an acre rental payments from the government over the contract period.

Additionally, farmers get one-time federal cost assistance for planting the CRP land to protect against soil erosion that may occur and still permit a high level of crop productivity.

Those T values generally range from one to five tons per acre per year. Continuously cropped land that is eroding at 28 tons per acre per year, for example, would be a prime target for conservation treatment.

"Adopting these changes would be far less expensive than retiring the cropland from production," Sinner said. "Nevertheless, USDA expects to spend almost \$2 billion for the CRP in 1990, compared to only \$200 million for programs which provide little cost-sharing to farmers adopting conservation practices."

Citing field manuals of the Soil Conservation Service, Sinner said "significant reductions" in erosion can be realized for less than \$1 per ton per acre in any situation. In contrast, the national average cost for reducing erosion under CRP was nearly \$3 per ton in 1988 and was more than \$5 in some regions.

One of the concerns is that CRP contracts eventually will expire, with millions of acres available once again for crop production.

"Studies in North Dakota and New York, for instance, found that 40 percent and 59 percent of CRP participants in those states, respectively, plan to return CRP land to production when the contracts expire," Sinner said.

Some CRP land should remain permanently in grass and trees, he said. And government policies should encourage this where appropriate. But to continue buying land out of crop production will be costly unless the land is truly of marginal economic value.

The program has a high degree of acceptance among conservationists and many members of Congress.

Sinner explained his views in the current issue of *Conservation*, a quarterly magazine published by the American Economic Association.

About 101 million acres are eligible for the CRP, more than double the amount that currently can be allowed in the program. Sinner said that all but about 25 million of this CRP base "could be farmed with erosion at or below soil loss tolerance levels if farmers adopted less erosive cropping practices."

The soil loss tolerance level is expressed as a "T" value, which is the maximum rate of annual

out in this lawsuit," Ms. Doty said in a telephone interview from Florida.

Ms. Doty said she and another defendant, Lillian Whitman, had signed down their boiler room operation in Clearwater, Fla., after learning that using third parties to process sales drafts violated credit card agreements with banks. She declined further comment, saying she hadn't talked to a lawyer.

A key defendant is Donald Gaines of Clearwater, Fla., whom the complaint accuses of running boiler rooms and, through a Phoenix business, acting as a broker for small businesses willing to launder charges.

Reached at another business in Overland, Kan., today, Gaines declined comment, saying he has not seen the lawsuit.

Altogether, the lawsuit names 10

individuals and 11 companies as defendants. "We have documented \$4 million in losses, but we're sure the total is far larger," said Daniel H. Bookin, a San Francisco lawyer for the credit card companies.

MasterCard and Visa are seeking \$10 million in punitive damages, recovery of actual damages, and a ban on the telemarketers having anything to do with credit-card accounts.

Research seeks better cattle growth method

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Cattle Association is looking with optimism at research being conducted by the University of Idaho scientists that could revolutionize growth stimulation in cattle — for both producers and consumers.

The research, which could lead to meat fatter in protein but lower in fat and calories while cheaper to

produce, is aimed at replacing controversial growth hormones with a vaccine that blocks growth-inhibiting hormones naturally produced by cattle.

"We believe anything that can meet consumer demands and concerns and at the same time increase profitability to the cattle man is good news," Cattle Association Executive Vice President Gary Glenn said.

Using technological advances over the past five years, researchers have been able to develop a vaccine that blocks growth inhibiting hormones, thereby allowing cattle to grow more without the outside stimulus of substances that have created consumer concern over chemical residues and excessive fat, according to Gerald Schelling, head of the university's department of animal science.

The use of hormones has led to a European ban on American beef and created some consumer resistance to beef products in the United States.

Beef carcasses now go to market with an average of up to 35 percent fat, an amount that could be reduced by half and still be acceptable to consumers, Schelling said.

The method researched by Schelling and his colleagues, assistant professor Rick Koeder, depends on a natural, short-lived, growth-regulating vaccination.

"The procedure results from providing a single dose of the vaccine which stimulates antibodies and since no hormone is administered," Schelling said, and there is no change of any residual hormones.

Schelling said the vaccinated cattle studied on the university's Moscow campus and Caldwell re-

search laboratory have grown 10 percent to 14 percent over four months.

"More work needs to be done to fine-tune the nature of the dosage level before it can be fully developed into a product," Schelling said.

Once researchers determine the optimum dosage and timing, which could take up to three years, a private pharmaceutical company will buy the vaccine and apply for approval for general use from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

Typically, it takes a minimum of five years to gain approval from the FDA, he said.

"The result will be that we can produce beef more efficiently with less feed," Schelling said. "It will lower the cost of beef production in this country and other beef-producing countries."

More wheat acres now anticipated

BOISE (AP) — The federal government has dramatically revised its estimate of Idaho acreage to be planted in winter wheat, pushing the total to its highest level in eight years.

In its latest update, the Agriculture Department said Idaho producers planted 960,000 acres of winter wheat, 60,000 more than included in the harvest estimate issued just three weeks ago.

Analysts said it appeared farmers would harvest 920,000 acres. That would be 50,000 acres higher than the harvest projection in 1989 and 110,000 acres above the highest harvested acreage since 9,000 acres in 1982.

The June harvest forecast, based on the lower acreage levels, put total production of winter wheat in Idaho this year at a record 65.25 million bushels, more than 5 million bushels over the old record.

The yield, critical to bolstering profits since it maximizes the return on production expenses, was estimated at a record-tying 75 bushels an acre.

Should those projections stand up in the updated harvest estimate this summer, they would push total production to 69 million because of the huge acreage increase.

After flirting with open market prices average more than a bushel a year ago amid severe weather-caused production losses in other major winter wheat states, Idaho farmers have seen the price settle to below \$3.50 this spring.

But a continuing decline in wheat stocks should keep prices in a range even if good weather conditions persist through the wheat belt, analysts said. While Idaho's wheat stocks increases slightly on June 1 from year-earlier levels, they remained at just over half the levels of late 1989, and nationally wheat stocks on June 1 hit their lowest level in 15 years as just 535 million bushels.

In addition, the Idaho Wheat Commission has bolstered its budget for new market development, critical to disposing of increased production, by 7 percent this year.

Thomas A. Carlin, one of the authors, said "a snapshot of the farm sector" shows that most U.S. farms are small, non-commercial, and usually family owned and operated.

Non-commercial units were defined as those having gross farm sales of less than \$40,000 a year.

"Small, non-commercial" farms produce a minor share of total U.S. food and fiber, he said. "They are typically located near more densely settled urban areas where non-farm employment opportunities abound."

The small farms often operate at a loss, with farm expenditures exceeding commodity sales, government payments and other farm-related income.

"Family well-being for these

small farms depends primarily on off-farm income, and their average total income in most years is commensurate with that of all U.S. families," he said.

Most of the nation's food and fiber is produced by "very large commercial farms" that are highly capitalized, Carlin said. Owners of such large farms typically control several million dollars of land, machinery and other assets.

"Many of the largest farms produce fruits, vegetables and horticultural specialty crops, crops not covered by federal price and income support programs," he said.

Farming is the dominant occupation for families operating large holdings, and annual income in most years is above that of the U.S. average.

Families with large operations do report off-farm income, but that is typically interest, rent or dividend income from a job paycheck. With some exceptions, most large farms are located away from major urban centers, in areas conducive to large-scale operations.

"The number of mid-sized commercial farms, those in between the extremes, continues to shrink," Carlin said. "Most of these farms produce food and feed grains that are included in federal commodity programs."

Thus, he said, mid-sized farms get more than half of all direct government payments.

Operators are usually employed full-time on the farm, but often someone else in the household works off the farm.

"They eat everything," Olsen said. "They eat everything."

It's memory lane time at Wrigley Field as all-stars once again take center stage

Traditionalists will have mixed feelings about this year's "61st All-Star Game," which will be played at venerable Wrigley Field in Chicago. Night baseball at Wrigley Field — the last major-league stadium to hold out against lights — still strikes some folks as inappropriate.

Yet what better place for an All-Star game than that grand old park with its ivy and memories? And memories have been the All-Star Game's stock in trade since the first one in 1933. The American League won that game at Chicago's Comiskey Park on a Babe Ruth home run. The next year, at New York's Polo Grounds, Carl Hubbell consecutively struck out five future Hall of Famers.

CBS will broadcast the game on Tuesday evening, July 10, with Jack Buck handling the play-by-play and Tim McCarver commenting on the action.

"I'm uncomfortable with the word analyst," McCarver says. "I react. I reacted physically as a player, and now I react verbally."

McCarver, a catcher in the big leagues for 21 years (1959-80); cherishes his own All-Star memories: "I was only in two All-Star games — 1966 and 1967," he says.

"Both were 2-1 games. Nineteen sixty-seven was a 15-inning game, and Tom Seaver pitched the last inning. What I remember is how hard he threw. He turned it up a few notches. Inside my mitt, I had a sponge and a T-shaped sponge and a golf glove. It still felt like I was

catching him barehanded.

"Nineteen sixty-six was in Busch Stadium (in St. Louis), and it was very hot. Casey Stengel made his famous remark when asked how he liked the new stadium: 'It holds the heat very well,' he said. I scored the winning run in the bottom of the tenth on a single by Maury Wills, and I still have a picture of myself — 24 years old — being congratulated by Willie Mays, Willie McCovey, Gaylord Perry and others."

As usual, fans will have a chance to see the young players who are tearing up their leagues, as well as old favorites who have maintained a level of excellence over the years. The top American League players include Ken Griffey Jr. (Seattle), Cecil Fielder (Detroit), Kirby Puckett (Minnesota), and Mark

McGwire (Oakland).

In the National League, Lenny Dykstra, with a new team (Philadelphia) and a new nickname (instead of "Nails," he is now called "Bart," as in Bart Simpson) has been flirting with the 400 mark. "It is just marvelous to see a player as hot as Lenny Dykstra," says McCarver. "He has been remarkable." Perennial National League All-Stars include Ryne Sandberg (Chicago), Ozzie Smith (St. Louis) and Tony Gwynn (San Diego).

ON THE COVER: Oakland first baseman Mark McGwire is one of the American League's top players. "The 61st All-Star Game," in which the best players in the American and National Leagues square off against each other, airs Tuesday, July 10, on CBS.

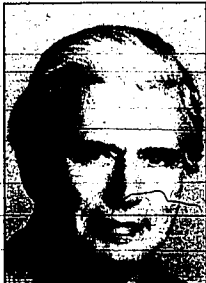
Q: Can you tell us something about that much younger man Elizabeth Taylor has fallen for? — R.W.

ABC News senior producer leaves to work with 'Jesse Jackson Show'

Ray Nunn, a senior producer at ABC News and executive producer of last year's award-winning documentary "Black in White America," has left the network to join the senior production staff of the syndicated "The Jesse Jackson Show" (formerly known as "Voices of America").

Nunn, one of the highest-ranking black producers at a major network, will reportedly have a major role in other projects, including entertainment programming, planned by Quincy Jones Productions, which will be producing the Jackson show out of the WRC-Channel 4 studios in Washington starting this fall.

Nunn had been with ABC News for 12 years, during which he had been a correspondent and bureau chief in Atlanta and Beirut as well as a producer. A spokesman for Quincy Jones Productions would not confirm Nunn's new job but an ABC News source said the producer had asked out of the remaining months of his contract to accept the position.

Study reveals real channel 'zappers'

NEW YORK — The newly formed Network Television Association has unveiled results of a study purporting to show that audiences watching ABC, CBS and NBC "zip" and "zap" through the channels less than half as often as those viewing the fare offered by six major cable channels.

The figures, not surprisingly reported just as the \$6 billion "upfront" advertising buying season gets into gear, indicate that network audiences are more stable than cable audiences — important for sponsors seeking maximum viewership for their commercials.

Peter Chrisanthopoulos, president of the association — formed in April and equally funded by the three major networks — said the study, by Norman Hecht Research Inc., was the first of its kind. "Zipping" involves viewers who use remote controls to "graze" at random through available channels; "zapping" means using controls to avoid commercial breaks.

Tom Delaney, Hecht Research director of market research, said the rate of such activity among network audiences could be rounded off at 3 percent for ABC, CBS and NBC, less than half that of the six cable channels included in the measurement. Volatility for the Fox network was just above

that of the networks, at 4 percent.

ESPN was the least volatile of the cable channels, at 6.3 percent; the Family Channel topped the list at 16.1 percent. The others studied included CNN, 7.4; WTBS, 7.6; USA, 8.7; and MTV, 14.6.

Even at 3 percent, Delaney said, 30 percent of the three-network audience is tuning in or tuning out every 30 seconds. Bob Alter, president of the National Cable Television Advertising Bureau in New York, was unimpressed.

"It's sort of a conclusion in search of a study," he said. "It treats all television viewing as if it were the same. It talks about households, not people, and it doesn't talk about demographics."

Here's an inside look at game-shows

HOLLYWOOD: For 21 points, can you name the television game shows that are hidden in this article?

Being an out-of-towner unsteeped in Hollywood trivia, North Dakota tourist Rob Volden probably can't. But then he didn't count on becoming a game show contestant, either, when he stopped to look at stars' footprints embedded in those Hollywood squares at Mann's Chinese Theatre.

That was before Mike Wood approached him and said, "Let's make a deal."

"Free tickets to a Hollywood show!" Wood promised Volden and other visitors milling about the courtyard. Take a chance, climb on the free bus and get in on "a live television taping," he urged.

Game shows are as old as television. But of the 450 or so shows that have hit the airwaves since 1945, only a few have been blockbusters.

Many have trouble attracting a viewing audience, much less a studio audience. That's where Wood comes in. He helps recruit studio audiences for more than a dozen television shows being produced in Hollywood.

To give the shows an all-American look, producers like to fill their studios with out-of-towners. And the catch phrase for most budget-conscious tourists is "free

tickets." Wood's gambit worked the other day with Volden and 40 other tourists.

Volden, 22, a recent college graduate who is looking for a job, is not one of those high rollers. So instead of buying a tour bus ticket to see the stars' homes in Beverly Hills as he had planned, he took one of Wood's.

"The price is right," he joked after climbing aboard the studio bus for a short ride to CBS Television City.

At the studio, the visitors were met by veteran television producer-director Marty Pasetta. He explained that they would have the chance of a lifetime to help test a new quiz show called "Everybody's Equal" that CBS has imported from England and plans to broadcast this fall.

The game uses computerized answer buttons that are wired to every seat in the studio.

Soon, the computer began measuring audience members' response times to the split second as they answered such questions as, "What day of the week are American presidential elections held?"

Veronica Lau, a tourist from Melbourne, Australia, immediately tumbled into that trivia trap. Saturdays, when voters are off work, make more sense than

Tuesdays for elections, she decided. "This is fun," she said. But to tell the truth, "I wouldn't watch this show at home. I mostly watch documentaries."

The producers of "Everybody's Equal" hope that network executives get the message. Nearly two-dozen stony faced officials in business suits filed into the studio during the show's test run and sat down in front of Volden to watch. But they never cheered or applauded.

And they stood up as a group and marched silently out of the studio before the show ended.

There was no give-and-take between them and the rest of the audience.

It's anybody's guess what they thought about the show.

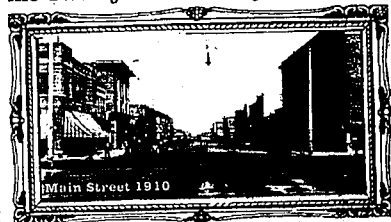
