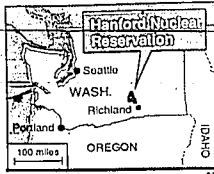

Hanford radiation poses cancer threat

RICHLAND, Wash. — People who live downwind from the Hanford nuclear reservation reacted with anger and relief Thursday about the government's disclosure that enough radiation spewed from the base to cause cancer.

"I feel like they used us for guinea pigs, and I don't feel like they cared one iota what happened to us either, or our families," said Betty Perkes, a farmer in Pasco, which is next to the 560-square-mile reservation.



showed some residents in the early years of atomic-bomb building in the 1940s could have been exposed to large doses of radioactive iodine. For a few infants, the doses were as high as 2,900 rad over three years. One rad is the amount of radiation a body organ would absorb from about a dozen chest X-rays.

Terry Frazee of the state Health Department said radiation standards allow a maximum of five rads a year for industrial workers, although individual organs can handle greater amounts.

Dr. George Laramore, professor of radiological oncology at the University of Wash-

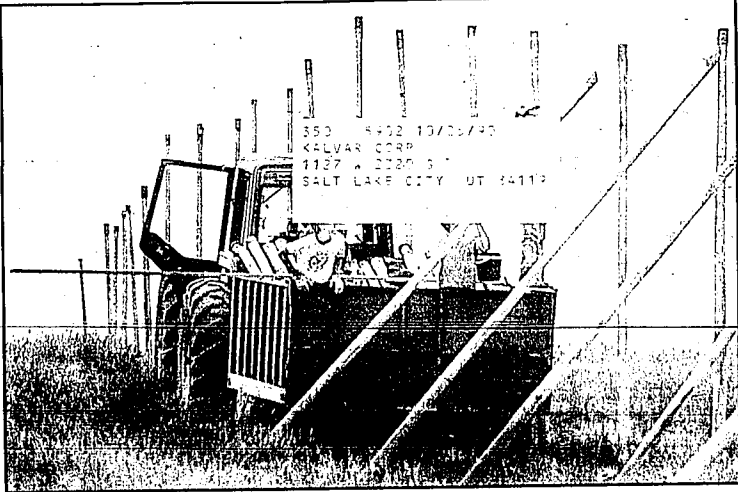
ington School of Medicine, recommended that people who were infants in the Hanford area during the period be checked for thyroid conditions. But he added that thyroid tumors would likely have appeared five to 15 years after exposure.

The preliminary study results came a day after Energy Secretary James Watkins admitted past Hanford emissions may have caused health problems.

John Till, a South Carolina consultant who chaired the 18-member panel of scientists and experts, cautioned that the figures were not meant as health risk estimates.

Age doesn't affect memory ability, researchers find

NEW YORK — Old age is no excuse if Grandpa forgets to take his pill at bedtime or buy bread on the way home from golf, according to a study that surprised researchers.

In two laboratory experiments, elderly participants did just as well as college students in remembering to do an assigned task.

That was unexpected because some other kinds of memory decline with age, and "some of the prominent theories in the area suggest that this kind of memory ought to be especially difficult for the elderly," said study co-author Gilles Einstein.

Einstein, a psychology professor at Furman University in Greenville, S.C., and Mark McDaniel of Purdue University report the federally funded research in the July issue of the Journal of Experimental Psychology: Learning, Memory and Cognition.

One expert on memory who had predicted elderly people would do worse in such experiments said the results surprised him.

"The study was well done, but I'm not convinced that it's the whole and final truth," said psychology professor Fergus Craik of the University of Toronto. Maybe age differences appear under some conditions but not others, he suggested.

Idaho spud crop sets acreage record

TWIN FALLS — Idaho farmers planted more fall potatoes this year than ever before — 395,000 acres, according to the Idaho Agricultural Statistics Service.

That's 40,000 acres and 11 percent more than last year, when farmers planted 355,000 acres. Last year, they produced their third-largest crop on record at over 10.2 billion pounds.

It is also 25,000 acres more than the old record acreage in 1978 when production also topped 10 billion pounds.

The government will not make a production estimate for potatoes until fall, but even if yields only match the lowest average of the past five years, the crop would total a record 11 billion pounds.

Nationwide, plantings increased by 65,000 acres, about 6 percent, to 1,166,000 acres. Unless weather problems recur in major producing areas, market prices will tumble.

"It's going to be different from last year unless something unforeseen happens to the crop before its harvested," said Wilson Gray, University of Idaho Extension economist.

Potatoes have become popular on Idaho's irrigated farms after two years of

drought in the Midwest pushed prices to record highs. June's final average price has not been computed yet, but the statistics service predicted it would be near \$10.30 per 100 pounds — another record.

Thursday's monthly harvest estimate added another 6.2 million bushels to Idaho's winter wheat forecast, pushing it to 71.7 million bushels. That is 15 million bushels higher than last year and nearly 12 million bushels above the old record set in 1987.

The increased harvest projection was based on the strength of improved yields and larger than previously estimated acreage.

Department experts put the average winter wheat yield statewide at a record 78 bushels, three bushels ahead of the old record set in 1987, and they said growers would harvest 50,000 acres more than earlier estimates expected.

The government also made its first forecast of the state's spring-planted wheat crop, putting its per-acre yields well above 1989. Although a nearly 20 percent reduction in harvested acreage

Gem reactor would share \$363 million

TWIN FALLS — Although the federal Energy Department hasn't completed the environmental impact statement or formally decided to go ahead with the project, the agency has asked Congress for \$363 million to build two nuclear reactors — one of which would be located in Idaho.

That money includes more than \$221 million in the department's 1991 budget request earmarked for two new production reactors to produce tritium and plutonium for nuclear weapons.

The \$221 million will go to preliminary design work, not actual construction, department spokeswoman Cathi Kalinink said.

"No decision has been made on what option the department will pursue," Kalinink said. "Everything is so very preliminary."

The department has proposed building a conventional water-cooled reactor at its Savannah River Site in South Carolina and a modular high-temperature gas-cooled reactor at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. The two NPRs together, if they are built, are expected to cost \$6.8 billion.

The decision of what to build, where to build it or whether to build anything at all would consider the findings of the environmental impact statement. It won't be made until after the final version of the EIS is completed sometime in 1992.

Critics say the DOE should complete the environmental impact statement on the project before asking for more money.

Money to complete the EIS and for continued research is understandable, said Kerry Cooke, executive director of the Snake River Alliance. "But that's it. We haven't even seen a draft EIS yet."

But the alliance, a statewide environmental group, thinks the budget request indicates the department already has made a

Candidates won't meet coin firm

TWIN FALLS — An invitation to meet with representatives of a controversial coin marketing firm has left one attorney general candidate crying foul and the other wondering whether he was set up.

Lawyers for Santa Rosa Sales and Marketing Inc. invited Republican Patrick Kole and Democrat Larry Echohawk to separate meetings in Boise on Thursday to discuss a dispute over consumer protection laws preventing the firm from doing business in Idaho.

"My client feels that they've been given a raw deal by (Idaho Attorney General) Jim Jones," said Brian McColla, a Boise lawyer who represents Santa Rosa and its Idaho interests.

Idaho's Securities Bureau accused Santa Rosa Sales of violating the Idaho Consumer Protection Act, securities laws and state laws prohibiting pyramid sales. In May, a 4th District Judge ordered the company to stop doing business in Idaho and refund more than \$200,000 to its investors. The case is currently pending before the state Supreme Court.

The California-based company recruited some of its sales force and customers in the Magic Valley and about 250 local residents purchased silver coins from the company, according to the Idaho Department of Finance.

Each Santa-Rosa investor was offered three silver coins for \$80. The securities bureau and Idaho's attorney general's

Food label nutrition listings sought

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration on Thursday proposed sweeping regulations that would require nutrition labeling for nearly all packaged foods and for fresh produce and seafood.

But Health and Human Services Secretary Louis Sullivan said the administration put off a decision on the "divisive" issue of whether the regulations should be uniform throughout the nation.

The massive set of regulations — 400 pages to be published in the Federal Register next week — would be the first major

reform of the nation's food-labeling system in nearly two decades.

The proposal would require nutrition labeling for most foods regulated by the Food and Drug Administration, which excludes meat and poultry. Labels would have to appear on packaging. In the case of seafood, vegetables and fruits, nutrition information could be provided at point of purchase, such as in brochures or on posters.

Labels on nutrition would be required to have four additional food components: the number of calories from fat, the amount of saturated fatty acids, cholesterol and total

dietary fiber.

Listing of the thiamin, riboflavin and niacin — now required — would become optional, and listing of protein would be required only for food intended for infants and very young children.

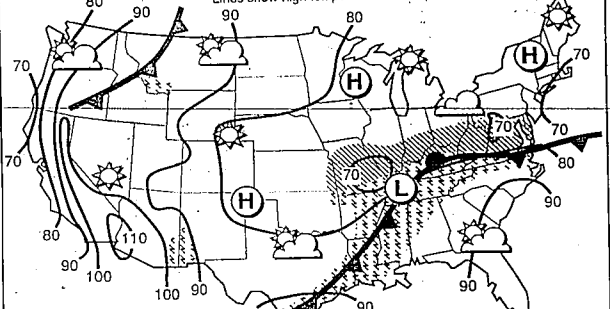
The regulations also would standardize serving sizes for 159 food categories to make comparisons easier for consumers.

Release of the proposal was held up because of a disagreement within the administration on whether the labeling rules should apply uniformly to the nation or states should be allowed to build tougher regulations on them.

Lines show high temperatures.



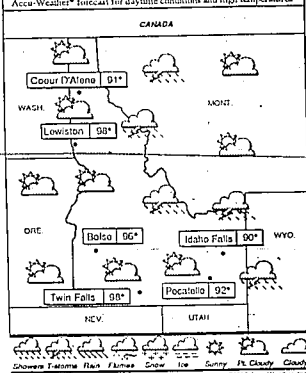

Weather summary

Under partly cloudy skies temperatures were again on the warm side all across Idaho Thursday. Moisture moving in from the southwest brought a threat of thunderstorms with the best chance in the mountain areas of the east and northern sections of the state. The only precipitation reported Thursday afternoon was at Salmon. Most stations were reporting partly cloudy skies. Some temperatures around the state at 3 p.m. included, Pocatello 96, Boise 100, Lewiston 102, Grangeville-90 and Coeur d'Alene-93. The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 106 degrees at Lewiston. Yellow Pine and Elk City reported the coldest at 44 degrees. Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 125 degrees at Death Valley, Calif. The lowest was 40 at Pinedale, Wyo.

Storms scattered across eastern half of nation again

Wet, stormy weather was scattered across the eastern half of the nation Thursday, with heavy rain causing street flooding in Iowa, and the West Coast sizzled in hot air. Showers and thunderstorms developing along and ahead of a slowly moving cold front were scattered from southern Texas to the southern and middle Atlantic Coast states. The storms were most numerous from southeastern Texas through the Gulf Coast states to the southern Ohio Valley. Showers poured heavy rain on much of Iowa, with up to 3 inches of rain in central Iowa and unofficial reports as high as 5 inches. Some rains were drenched in Des Moines and 35 miles to the northeast in Nevada, Iowa, where police said basements also were flooded. No injuries were reported. Showers prevailed from the upper Ohio Valley and the lower Great Lakes region across southern and central New England, and in southwestern Texas. Strong northerly winds ushered unseasonably cool air into the central Plains and the middle Mississippi Valley, and afternoon highs were only in the 60s in parts of the Northeast. But temperatures in the West soared into the upper 90s as far north as Washington state and Idaho at midday, when readings were already above 100 degrees at some locations in the desert Southwest and in the valleys of northern California. Because of the heat and lightning, federal and state fire

fighters were working on more than 100 new fires Thursday in Oregon, said Doug Decker, a spokesman for the Oregon Forestry Department. Lightning also started a fire in Georgia's Okefenokee Swamp which had burned 3,900 acres as of Thursday. Severe weather was widespread Wednesday, the National Weather Service said. Thunderstorms spawned two tornadoes in Florida and one in Georgia, and there were more than 40 reports of large hail and damaging wind from Ohio and Virginia southward to the Gulf Coast region. In Virginia, 5 to 10 inches of rain fell around Virginia Beach, the weather service said. Hail as big as golf balls was reported near Warrenton, Ga., while thunderstorm winds gusted to 65 mph at Columbia, S.C., and 66 mph at Newport News, Va. Thunderstorms also produced severe weather late Wednesday in eastern Colorado, including two tornadoes and hail as big as softballs in the Denver area, the weather service said. The hail caused millions of dollars in damage to windows, vehicles, lights and gardens, and one traffic death was blamed on slippery roads. Forty-seven visitors to the Elitch Gardens amusement park were treated for cuts and bruises after the storm cut power to the area, afflicting many on rides with little or no shelter from the hail, said Connie Schaffer, the park's marketing director. Tornadoes also were reported Wednesday in northern Iowa and southern Minnesota, the weather service said.

fice maintain investors were also paid bonuses for recruiting other coin buyers - which makes it an illegal pyramid investment scheme, according to the state.
McCull said his clients believe they were treated differently than other multi-level sales operations in Idaho and they wanted to hear from the men who are campaigning to replace Jones, the outgoing attorney general.
Kole, a former deputy attorney general under Jones who practices law in Boise, contends that Santa Rosa wanted to start "a bidding war" between the two candidates in a hotly contested race.
"They said they were looking to see which candidate they'd like to support," he said in an interview Wednesday.
"I want no part of this," Kole wrote in a letter declining the invitation. "I look to the Keating Five/Savings and Loan Affair" as indicative of what is wrong in our system of government. Politicians can pretend to ignore the obligations that

are incurred when financial support is offered, but citizens know better."
The meetings were "absolutely not" about campaign contributions, McColl said. In fact, McColl added, he never talked about potential contributions when he called to invite Kole.
"I have a fairly sophisticated client and they know they can't influence an attorney general," McColl said.
Meanwhile, EchoHawk was prepared to attend the meeting in McColl's office until late Wednesday when he found out who would be there.
"Litty wasn't aware of the pending litigation," McColl said. "As far as I can determine, he wasn't even aware of the name of my client."
It's also unclear who invited EchoHawk and what he told him about the meeting, McColl and EchoHawk said. Bill Specht of Buhl contacted EchoHawk, a Pocatello Democrat who is the Bannock County prosecuting attorney, about the meeting. But Specht, who is president of the Buhl Economic Development Council, said he had only

talked to EchoHawk once on a previous occasion and it wasn't about the Boise meeting.
"For all I know, this thing could have been a setup," EchoHawk said Thursday.
Following an initial overture from a Pocatello city councilman, EchoHawk said he was originally asked to discuss campaign issues with some businessmen.
"The business that they were in never came up. I do remember them discussing some kind of marketing plan," EchoHawk said.
He said a request to meet with business representatives isn't unusual in an election year and EchoHawk said it isn't his habit "to do a background check" on who he is scheduled to meet.
After learning a little but about Santa Rosa and its legal problems, EchoHawk said he decided to cancel his meeting Thursday.
"I just didn't feel good about it," he said. "I think I have to know more about what the situation is before I meet with them."

But, Till added, "These numbers are significant because that ... dose level is significant enough to strongly justify a thyroid dose study."
A parallel study by the federal Centers for Disease Control will use the exposure estimates to try to document cases of thyroid disease among Hanford-area residents.
The Hanford Environmental Dose Reconstruction Project concluded that most people living near the Hanford site from 1944 to 1947 were exposed to low doses of radiation. The study covered 270,000 people living in 10 Washington and Oregon counties.
But up to 13,500 people may have received doses of more than 33 rad from radioactive iodine from the milk they drank.
About 1,400 infants and children living in the area received 15 to 650 rad, Till said, including a small number of infants who may have received doses of 2,900 rad or more.
The radioactive iodine was produced when spent reactor fuel rods were chemically dissolved to produce weapons-grade plutonium and uranium. When it concentrates in the thyroid gland, iodine-131 can cause cancer and other diseases.
Till said doses downward from the Nevada nuclear weapons testing site ranged from a few rad to 500.

decision and the impact statement is little more than a formality, Cooke said.
"The Department of Energy has decided they definitely must have new production reactors," Cooke said. And the department is set on the water-cooled reactor at Savannah River and the new technology reactor in Idaho, she said.
The Energy Department is not questioning what is needed, it is crusading for a project it wants to build instead of listening to Congress or the public, Cooke said.
Meanwhile, the department is planning a "programmatic" impact statement that would look at the department's plans to modernize the entire nuclear weapons complex.
"That impact-statement should be completed before the department goes ahead with the new reactors," Cooke contends. Going ahead with a new project before the modernization statement is completed "kind of makes a farce of the whole thing," she said.
But the new production reactors

are not technically part of the weapons complex because they are only a proposal, Kalinik said. They may still be included in a final report on modernization plans, expected in early fall, she said.
The impact statement on the NPRs, however, will go forward independent of the modernization impact statement, she said.
A two-day hearing was held in Twin Falls on the proposal to build an NPR in Idaho in November 1988. Comments from that hearing along with others across the state will be included in the draft EIS, which the department expects to complete in January 1991.
Proponents of the Idaho reactor promote it as a prototype for a new generation of commercial power reactors. The Energy Department, however, already has an operating gas-cooled reactor in its civilian technology program.
Studies of spent fuel, stored at INEL from the Fort St. Vrain, Colo., reactor may, in fact, contribute to the design of the new Idaho reactor.

will mean about a 19 percent decline in production.
While spring wheat land was scaled back 110,000 acres from last year to 450,000, the department said fields around the state are expected to average 69 bushels an acre, seven more than a year ago, and that should produce a total crop of just over 31 billion bushels.
Combined with the projected winter wheat harvest, that would give Idaho producers their first season ever of more than 100 million bushels.
Nationally, wheat growers expected to harvest 2.7 billion acres, up 33 percent from last year's weather-riddled crop. That would be the third-largest crop the nation has ever produced.

Yeltsin leads reformers' exodus

MOSCOW (AP) — Populist Boris N. Yeltsin quit the Communist Party on Thursday in a move that could start the exodus of liberals that warned could destroy his reform movement.
Yeltsin's dramatic announcement to the 28th Communist Party congress capped a day in which his orthodox Marxist foe, Yegor K. Ligachev, was vanquished in a bid for

the party's No. 2 job.
"For more than two years, Gorbatchev has balanced the party between liberals, led by Yeltsin, and hard-liners led by Ligachev. The departure of Gorbatchev's two antagonists marked a triumph for Gorbatchev's centrist policies."
But it could prove a hollow victory, Yeltsin too, with him some of the most reform-minded party members.

USDA says bumper wheat crop largest farm output in 6 years

WASHINGTON (AP) — Wheat farmers are harvesting a bumper crop estimated at 2.7 billion bushels, up 33 percent from last year and the biggest output in six years, the Agriculture Department said Thursday.

"This would be the largest crop since 1983 and the third largest on record," the department said in a report.

And it will be a near-record production at that.

Records show the biggest U.S. wheat crops were back-to-back in 1981 with 2.79 billion bushels and 1982 with 2.77 billion.

New production estimates for the first time this season included durum and other spring-planted wheat, in addition to winter wheat planted last fall.

The department's Agricultural Statistics Board said the average yield, based on indications as of July 1, was estimated at 38.6 bushels per

Consumers focusing on price

NEW YORK (AP) — Supermarket prices this year have increased faster than expected, but should moderate during the rest of 1990, a government economist said Thursday.

"At the same time, price is increasingly becoming a factor in consumer decisions about where to shop, according to a survey by the Food Marketing Institute, a non-profit grocery store trade group.

Supermarket prices rose more here, compared with 32.8 bushels last year.

Farmers are expected to harvest about 70 million acres of wheat this year, also the most since 1982. The 1989 crop was from 62.1 million

production.

Winter wheat production was estimated at 2.04 billion bushels, down 3 percent from the June forecast but up 40 percent from the 1989 harvest. Winter wheat makes up about three-fourths of the U.S. total.

Yields in many of the winter wheat states are down from the June forecast, especially in Illinois and Missouri, the report said.

The huge Kansas crop, at 460.2 million bushels, was unchanged from last month.

Durum wheat production was estimated at 114 million bushels, up 24 percent from last year, and other spring wheat was indicated at 549 million bushels, up 12 percent from 1989.

North Dakota, the biggest durum producer, was estimated at 97.6 million bushels, compared with 66 million bushels last year.

The state's production of "other"

spring wheat, also the largest, was estimated at 254.4 million bushels, up from 174 million in 1989.

Government crop watchers said earlier this week that the nation's wheat harvest was 71 percent completed by July 8, slightly ahead of the five-year average for this time.

The July report also estimated barley production at 414 million bushels, up 3 percent from last year. Yields were indicated at 53.4 bushels per acre, up 4.9 bushels from 1989.

Bush briefs congressional leaders on Houston meet

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush gave congressional leaders his personal review Thursday of the NATO and economic summits, winning praise for going slowly on Soviet aid and quickly on fighting farm subsidies.

However, one congressman said the history of farm supports in this country suggests they "will live forever."

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater indicated the president had not yet called Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev to fill him in on the summit.

Bush said Wednesday he had sent Gorbachev a cable indicating the results "were positive as far as the Soviet desires went" and planned to call him in a few days.

Bush, back in the White House from a week of summitry on two continents, met first with his Cabinet, which greeted him "with applause."

Then, joined by his secretaries of state, defense and treasury, Bush gave more than a dozen top Democrat and Republican lawmakers a rundown on the London and Hous-

ton summits.

"It was basically upbeat," Rep. Dante Fascell, D-Fla., chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, said of the briefing.

Fascell said the United States had "accomplished what it set out to do" in London in revising the Western alliance's military strategy and showing "that the Soviets need not

fear NATO."

House Speaker Thomas S. Foley said the economic summit, which concluded Wednesday in Houston, "made some progress. There are still obviously some unresolved issues with respect to trade. ... But in general, I think it was a successful outcome."

On the question of Soviet aid, Foley said the president reiterated his belief "that additional economic reforms are necessary. I can only say that I don't dispute the president's statement at this time."

Bush kept a low profile Thursday, ignoring reporters' questions.

On Wednesday night, however, flying home from Houston, he said, "We're very satisfied with both events. We've got a lot of work to do now, but they went well."

The United States won a commitment from its six economic summit partners and the European Community to revive the General Agreement on Tariff and Trade talks by trying to find ways to cut farm subsidies. Bush also withstood pressure from West Germany and France for coordinated Western aid in response to Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's appeal for help.

CNN gives viewers choice of news items

ATLANTA (AP) — Viewers who grumble that the only news on TV is bad news, soon will be able to choose some of the stories they want to see on Cable News Network.

CNN announced Thursday the first experiment in "interactive news" by a national network — a program similar to ones by smaller stations where viewers vote on whether to see "Godzilla" or "Planet of the Apes" as the late-night movie.

The experiment begins July 23 on CNN's "Newsnight," an hour-long newscast at midnight. The choices will involve secondary news or features.

Viewers will see a summary of headlines at the beginning of the show and, as anchors read the day's

top news, dial a 900 telephone number to vote on which of the stories they'd like to see.

The stories that get the most votes, which cost 95 cents per call, will be shown.

CNN officials emphasize that viewers won't be dictating news value but will tell the network what areas, outside of breaking news, most interest them.

"We're not going to let viewers decide the editorial policy of CNN," said spokesman John Bianchi.

"A lot of stuff does not make it on the air that we do in fact cover. This is a way to get more of the stuff on the air that we might not have made the decision on initially," Bianchi said CNN, which had

trouble filling all its newscasts when it was started by media mogul Ted Turner in 1980, just doesn't have enough time now to air all the stories it would like to.

So viewers — in 51 million U.S. households and 90 countries — are being asked to let producers know their preferences.

At least one of CNN's network competitors reacted with surprise to the announcement. Asked if the concept would spread to the Big Three networks, CBS spokesman Tom Goodman said, "It doesn't sound like something we'd get involved in."

The public relations departments at NBC and ABC offered no immediate response.

Greenspan hints interest rates headed down

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the Federal Reserve, Alan Greenspan, suggested Thursday the central bank will push interest rates lower to offset an emerging credit crunch.

His comments, to the Senate Banking Committee, launched rallies on the stock and bond markets and represented good news for President Bush, who has been pounding on the Federal Reserve for months to cut interest rates.

The administration needs lower rates to counteract the dampening effect on the economy if Congress

and the White House lower spending and raise taxes as part of a budget deficit reduction pact.

Business owners have been saying since the winter that banks have tightened lending standards, in response to the savings and loan crisis, a softer economy and weakening real estate markets.

Until Thursday, however, Greenspan had said the central bank saw little evidence of a broad-based credit crunch affecting the economy nationally.

In a sharp change from his assessment only three weeks ago, he told the committee that slow growth in the money supply and an increase in average interest rates on commercial loans indicate credit conditions may be tightening independent of central bank action.

"If that is in fact the case, it could have undesirable effects on the economy that the Federal Reserve

would have to consider offsetting using monetary policy," he said.

Such a shift would produce "a very modest change in the level of the federal funds rate," the key rate banks charge one another for overnight loans, he said.

Financial markets rallied within minutes of Greenspan's comments shortly after noon EDT. The Dow Jones average of industrial stocks jumped 14 points within five minutes and held the gains through the afternoon. The Federal Reserve raises interest rates to combat inflation by slowing the economy.

FDA considers ban on immigrant blood donations

WASHINGTON — The U.S. Food and Drug Administration, under fierce pressure to lift its prohibition on blood donations by people born in Haiti, is considering expanding the ban to bar all recent immigrants from giving blood.

Dr. Paul Parkman, the FDA official charged with setting national blood policy, said in an interview that the agency has not yet decided whether to accept the recommendation of its scientific advisory panel to end the ban on Haitian blood do-

nations.

Rather, FDA officials are contemplating a wider ban that would bar immigrants from all foreign countries from giving blood for an unspecified period of time — perhaps two years — to combat transmission of the AIDS-causing human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) through the blood supply, Parkman said.

"That would discriminate, I suppose, by immigration status, but not by ethnic group," said Parkman, director of the FDA's center for biologicals, evaluation and research.

"...At least it would be uniform and

non-geographic."

The policy, which would be coupled with improved screening of donors to detect high-risk behavior, would ensure that, before they give blood, immigrants are beyond the "window" period during which HIV infection does not appear in tests, he said.

The FDA has faced a dual assault on its decision this February to bar donations by anyone born in Haiti or sub-Saharan Africa. FDA officials argued that both groups have a high risk of hard-to-detect heterosexual HIV transmission.

Haitian physicians have presented the agency with an array of scientific evidence disputing the claim that such donations present an unusual threat to the blood supply. And Haitian demonstrators have marched angrily through Miami, New York City and Boston to protest the ban.

In April, the FDA's Blood Products Advisory Committee recommended the agency lift its ban on Haitian donations and improve donor screening techniques to identify high-risk behavior, such as intravenous drug use, male homosexual activity, and promiscuity.

Messenger faces charges for 3 'Dartman' attacks

NEW YORK (AP) — A messenger with a criminal record and psychiatric problems was charged Thursday with three of 55 dart-blowing attacks that have unnerved women in midtown Manhattan, police said.

Jerome Wright, 33, of the Bronx was arrested after being identified in a "lineup" by three women on Wednesday night, police said. He was charged with three counts each of reckless endangerment, criminal possession of a weapon and harassment.

Chief Joseph DiMartino said Wright was suspected in the other attacks, but was charged only in the cases in which women identified him.

Two plainclothes officers stopped Wright on a street corner Tuesday because he fit the description of the man who has been blowing homemade needle darts at the backsides of well-dressed women.

DiMartino, head of Manhattan de-

partments, said the officers took Wright's name and address and passed it on to detectives who persuaded Wright to come in for questioning Wednesday.

DiMartino said Wright admitted to the three attacks he was charged with, but didn't have a clear motive.

"Mr. Wright has made numerous statements to us, none of which has given us real insight into why he is doing this," DiMartino said at a news conference.

The chief said Wright "indicated to us he has been under observation for psychiatric problems." He did not elaborate.

Wright, who is on probation until 1992 for a drug conviction, "works in the area as a messenger and mail room clerk, which puts him on the streets during the day," DiMartino said.

At least 55 women have reported feeling "the sting" of the so-called Dartman's needle darts since June 26.

5 bombs explode in Philippine capital

MANILA, Philippines — Five bombs exploded simultaneously before dawn Friday in the city's major tourist and financial districts, damaging several cars and buildings but causing no casualties, police said.

Bombs were also found in cars at the Silahis Hotel and the Plaza Hotel and on two parked trucks in the Paco district of this capital but did not explode, police said.

The Silahis and Plaza hotels are favored by foreign visitors and businessmen. Three of the blasts occurred in the nightclub district, which is also popular with tourists.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility. Mayor Gemiliano Lopez, who placed police on "triple alert" and warned pedestrians to avoid parked cars, said, "This is to destabilize our government and to scare away foreign investors."

Armenian militants attack convoy

MOSCOW — Armenian militants attacked a convoy of vehicles in a disputed region of Azerbaijan, and three people were killed in a gunfight between the militants and the soldiers, the Tass news agency reported Thursday.

President Mikhail S. Gorbachev, informed of the attack while presiding over the 28th Communist Party Congress in Moscow, told delegates that ethnic bloodshed in the region must come to an end.

Tass said the convoy of 16 trucks and a bus carrying Azerbaijani passengers was attacked near the village of Charikar in Nagorno-Karabakh, the mostly Christian Armenian enclave that is located in and administered by Azerbaijan.

Worker fired for Communist T-shirt

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — A factory worker was fired for wearing a Communist Party T-shirt to work, a news agency reported Thursday.

Henry Beerwinkel, 19, said he had been fired from a Cape Town plastics factory for wearing a T-shirt bearing the slogan "Freedom, Socialism, Peace" and a picture of South African Communist Party leader Joe Slovo.

Spreading Yugoslavian fire kills 1

DUBROVNIK, Yugoslavia — A forest fire whipped by overnight wind Thursday killed one person and forced hundreds of people to flee their homes and tourist camps in a region near this Adriatic summer resort.

The fire broke out Wednesday near a campsite for vacationers in Kupari, about six miles south of Dubrovnik. It quickly spread toward this exclusive tourist resort, eyewitnesses said.

Mandela some better, receives visitors

NAIROBI, Kenya — African National Congress leader Nelson Mandela, who arrived with a slight case of pneumonia, was reported in better condition and even received visitors Thursday, ANC and government officials said.

"He is up and about and has received several guests today," said a Ministry of Foreign Affairs official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Sandinistas elated as new pact ends strike

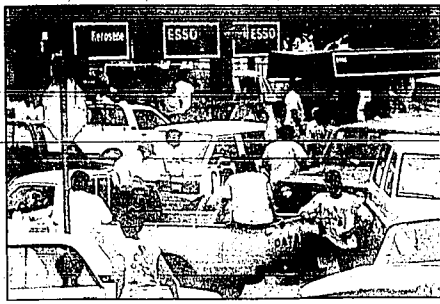
MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — Pro-Sandinista workers jumped for joy and began returning to their jobs Thursday after the U.S.-backed government gave in to strike demands in order to settle a destructive work stoppage.

Workers began to replace street paving stones that were used to build barricades and businesses opened Thursday in Managua.

Six people were killed in clashes during the 10-day strike that tested the stability of President Violeta Barrios de Chamorro and her government, in office since April 25.

To end the strike, the government met many of the Sandinista demands: salary increases, compensation for fired government workers, suspension of a decree to return Sandinista-confiscated land to its original owners and the restoration of free public transportation for students.

Unions also appeared to have made headway in their demand for a role in running the economy in this

country of 3.7 million residents. In Washington, State Department deputy spokesman Richard Doucher said the administration was pleased the strikes had ended. But he assailed the Sandinista au-

thorities, saying they have been unwilling to grant the government the breathing spell it needs to go about reconstruction so desperately needed under way.

Employees at the Industry and Commerce Ministry jumped up and down and hugged each other in celebration when the end of the strike was announced.

The strike began July 2 and grew into the biggest challenge to Mrs. Chamorro since the Sandinistas, in power nine years, were voted out of office 10 weeks ago.

The Sandinistas had said since losing elections to her United National Opposition coalition that they would "rule from below."

Unions claimed 90,000 government and state industry employees joined the walkout.

It was the second time the Sandinistas brought public services to a halt in an attempt to force pay raises and modifications in Mrs. Chamorro's plans to cut public spending.

French aim to keep nuclear arsenal, strong army

PARIS (AP) — Unswayed by visions of a "peace dividend," France has declared its intent to field Western Europe's strongest army and retain an independent nuclear arsenal based on the deterrence strategy of the Cold War.

Defense Minister Jean-Pierre Chevènement, a Socialist admired

by conservatives, has rejected demands for spending cuts and says France should never again retreat into the defensive, passive strategies that led to its defeat in World War II.

On Saturday, the pride of the French army — 7,000 soldiers from elite units, 340 armored vehicles and

scores of warplanes and combat helicopters — are scheduled to march, roll and fly over the Champs-Élysées in celebration of Bastille Day.

There are no plans for counter-demonstrations — France never experienced the anti-nuclear protests that mushroomed throughout Western Europe in the mid-1980s — but

there are signs of some cracks in the longstanding consensus on military policy. The Finance Ministry and the governing Socialists' left wing are asking for substantial military spending cuts to reflect the collapse of Soviet-backed regimes in Eastern Europe and the reduced threat from Moscow.

Nuclear plant back on line after closure

TARRAGONA, Spain (AP) — A nuclear plant went back on line Thursday, four days after it was ordered closed due to a valve leak that filled the containment building with radioactive steam.

Vandellós II, one of the newest of Spain's nine operating nuclear plants, was connected to the national electrical grid at 4:13 a.m. after an eight-hour warm start, according to a spokesman for the plant's owner.

The Nuclear Security Commission authorized the start-up Wednesday evening after completing a technical study of the accident, which did not release any radiation into the air.

When you reach a certain age, some things become inevitable: A twinge in the ankle when the barometer is working against you; a diminishing tolerance for fussy babies in concert halls; and, perhaps the greatest gentilefication to age in this century: the sanctified Senior Citizen Discount.

I mention the latter at some risk to the stability of my marriage. Several years ago, when it became clear to us that the upward curve of our accumulated birthdays would soon clash with the downward curve of eligibility for Senior Citizenship, my wife Nancy vowed that she would never — the word was, in fact, NEVER — allow herself to dip into the rewards of post-middle age (which is now calculated at between post-27-to-32 for a generation without breathlessly ambitious investment plans).

Her rationale, I recall, was somewhat pious: "We could make it through life on our own without being catered to by salesmen. As an institution, we insisted on reminding us how lucky we were to have lived beyond our adolescence."

"If they want to give these discounts," she said, "just give them to people who really need them."

At the time, I said nothing, figuring that eventually, with a \$3.23 discount on the line for the one-week special on dry cleaning, we would gladly pocket the dough without acknowledging the earlier words spoken in a fit of thoughtless indignation.

Boy, did I miss that one! Our first test came a few weeks ago while we were returning from a trip to my sister's. As I checked out the motel, the clerk said she was allowing me a \$6 senior citizen discount. "Everybody over 50 gets one," she said cheerfully, surveying my grey beard while telling herself how glad she was to be only 23, discount or not.

"Oh?" I said, without offering a hint of resistance. In fact, we had driven 20 or 30 miles before I mentioned it to Nancy. It did not go over very well.

She lectured me on the same grounds that she had years ago.

"Well," I said lamely, "I'm not going to turn around and give it back. After all, it

was legal. We didn't defraud an innkeeper." Nothing more was said. I pretended to be preoccupied with the 18-wheelers that were blitzing us on a down-grade.

Back home the next day, I was approached at a filling station by a young woman who was carrying an infant and had a sobbing girl, maybe 3 years old, in tow. She persuaded me that she was down on her luck and needed a lift to a bus stop at a fast-food restaurant.

In the car, the youngster cried that she was hungry; the mother tried to hush her with the word that she was broke. That did it: I gave the woman \$5 and told her to get a sandwich for the child.

Nancy was delighted to hear the story. "You should have given her six," she said.

"Why six?" I said, my tender feelings bruised for having been criticized for what I considered a very good deed.

"Six dollars was your senior citizen discount," she said. "It would have made more sense if you had given the poor girl six."

I thought about it for a while as I tried to argue that you can't expect life always to come out that even.

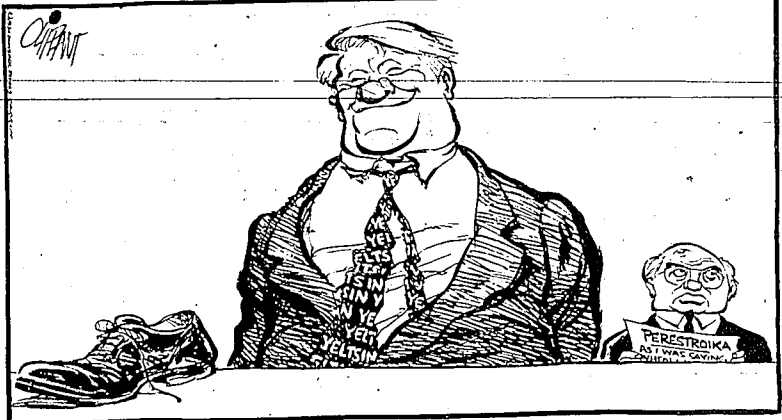
Five for six, I still maintained, wasn't bad. Besides, like it or not, we were doubtless going to get more discounts without having to produce our driver's license.

"OK," she said. "If that's the way it's going to be, we'll start a fund today. From now on, we'll put the discounts into a fund and when there's enough money in it, we'll give it to charity."

Done deal! I owe the fund one buck. But our marriage remains stable. And — I really can't explain it — but, with the system working for us, I feel like I'm 25 again.

Even on those days when the barometer is working against my ankle.

Take Bush's summit claims in context

HOUSTON — For George Bush, the economic summit has been an interesting test of the limits of his highly personal presidential style.

Over the past few days, Bush has been both the informal host and the official conciliator, seeking to keep a group of strong-willed leaders from drifting apart over basic divisions stemming from their national interests and personal goals.

It's a role that many analysts have noted he's well suited for, because he's knowledgeable about the often complicated issues and both personally and politically compatible with his fellow summit leaders.

Unlike Ronald Reagan, Bush actually negotiated with his colleagues. It's a role that many analysts have noted he's well suited for, because he's knowledgeable about the often complicated issues and both personally and politically compatible with his fellow summit leaders.

On agricultural trade, the United States sent conflicting signals during the summit.

On one hand, the administration pressed its case in a strong, almost strident voice about how vital the issue is in ensuring a successful conclusion to the Uruguay Round of multilateral trade negotiations that is supposed to wind up in December.

On Monday, it trotted out White House Chief of Staff John Sununu, Agriculture

Secretary Clayton Yeutter and U.S. Trade Representative Carla Hills to demand that European nations back off from their refusal to cut farm subsidies or risk collapse of the entire global trading system.

At the same time, however, it made clear that it had already started its retreat from the demand that all farm subsidies be eliminated by the year 2000.

Yeutter said the United States now sought to start "a phase-out of trade-distortive agricultural subsidies."

But even with the summit's call for reductions in subsidies, that far more modest goal may be difficult to achieve by December. Without an unexpected break in a decade-long deadlock, the administration may face the choice posed by the president's oft-stated view that "a bad deal is better than no deal."

On the environment, the United States may be even more isolated than on farm trade, as it has the backing of the Canadians and the Japanese.

Even the ever-loyal British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher favors faster action to deal with the global warming problem than does Bush.

As for helping the Soviet Union, the agreement that was stitched together failed

to hide the broad differences. The French, West Germans and Italians clearly want to step up aid to help President Mikhail Gorbachev in power long enough to carry out his reforms.

Prime Minister Brian Mulroney made clear that the Canadians lean toward that approach, though they favor credits rather than direct aid.

But the British and Japanese back the U.S. policy of going slowly, fearing that massive aid might keep the Soviets from making necessary reforms.

They argue that any aid sent now would simply be billions poured down a Soviet rat hole and play down the notion that a symbolic show of support might help the embattled Soviet president.

In a sense, the summit outcome reflects the wisdom of the decision taken by Bush before the summit that it would be counterproductive to try to impose his will on his colleagues but better to put the best face on issues where their positions differ.

But it also reflects the fact that Bush is not operating from an especially strong position in a world in which power has been diffused in a way that West Germany's Helmut Schmidt and France's Valéry Giscard d'Estaing hoped would happen when they launched the summit concept a decade and a half ago.

Reform CIA to prevent new immorality

NEW YORK — In June 1988, a former Honduran military man named Florencio Caballero told The New York Times Magazine that his CIA training had included "psychological techniques" such as feeding dead rats and rotten food to prisoners, depriving them of sleep, forcing them to stand for hours at a time and throwing cold water on them.

In March 1989, a U.S. private named James Griffin III was training in Honduras with his unit, the 37th Engineer Battalion, when his rifle was stolen.

He reported it to his superiors. Eight days later, he was roughly awakened by American officers and turned over to armed Honduran soldiers.

He was handcuffed and a laundry bag was pulled over his head. Then he was driven to a Honduran military compound where he was subjected to 18 hours of terror and abuse.

Americans acting as translators and Honduran officers interrogated him. He was moved from room to room; cold water was poured over his head; he was not allowed to sleep for more than 30 minutes at a time.

Why is it that shocking cases such as these — certainly not the first — have not resulted in reform of U.S. national-security agencies?

Why is it that in the wake of the Iran-Contra scandal, controls on the CIA have been loosened rather than tightened?

Why is it that in this era of budget deficits, when school teachers are being laid off, massive amounts of tax dollars are still funneled into the national-security apparatus?

It is an open secret, widely reported by major U.S. media, that since World War II the CIA and other U.S. intelligence bodies have consorted with drug traffickers, organized crime, torturers and assassins for "national security" reasons. Iran-Contra provides the most recent evidence.

Yet somehow the CIA continues unscathed. Indeed, the White House recently managed to extract from Congress an agreement to relax Watergate-inspired restrictions on the CIA.

The specter of communism or reasons of "national security" have long been used to justify the most terrible abuses, acts of inhumanity and violence.

Next to no one is talking about the profound threat to our democratic and constitu-

tional rights from such covert operations and CIA training, nor the callous disregard for human life they often reflect.

In 1975, the Church Committee uncovered explosive evidence of a CIA "executive action" unit: a top-secret assassination capability.

The Church Committee found that U.S. government officials had specifically ordered the assassinations of two foreign leaders, Fidel Castro and Patrice Lumumba, and had implicitly or explicitly encouraged three more (President Rafael Trujillo of the Dominican Republic, President Ngo Dinh Diem of South Vietnam, and the Chilean army chief Gen. Rene Schneider).

Such acts are an appalling perversion of American morality.

Four of the five were assassinated, but the report concluded that none died as the direct result of the U.S. plans.

It found, however, that the U.S. government was implicated because it had supplied arms to the conspirators and encouraged coups in those countries.

A major reform that came out of these revelations was the executive order adopted by President Ford in 1976 prohibiting U.S. involvement in assassinations.

President Carter strengthened the ban, and President Reagan adopted it with no change.

Yet last October, in the midst of anti-Manning-Norcross hysteria, the CIA began lobbying for looser rules on killings during coups, and the White House responded with an official statement of support for greater CIA "latitude."

That view was formally adopted in a classified memorandum agreed to by the White House and the House and Senate Intelligence Committees.

As the Cold War winds down, the CIA is busily working to justify its bloated budget and its covert operations.

The agency oversees a massive covert-action project on drug-trafficking involving all the major national-security bodies of the U.S.

The Counter-Narcotics Center, based at CIA Headquarters in Langley, Va., includes agents from the Drug Enforcement Agency, the FBI, the State Department, the Coast Guard, the Department of Defense and the National Security Agency.

The potential for abuse of civil rights and political freedoms by such a powerful, centralized, non-accountable apparatus is troubling, especially given past experience.

Also troubling is the Department of Justice decision, also issued last fall, that the United States has the right to seize suspects across borders without consulting foreign governments.

This decision violates customary international law and several treaties, and reverses a longstanding policy.

It continues the trend toward unilateral — some might say imperialist — action practiced by the Reagan administration.

The only reform that came out of Iran-Contra was Congress' call — strongly resisted by the CIA and the Bush administration — for an independent monitor of the CIA. But a monitor is not a sufficient solution.

"National security" rationales and practices have often resulted in the violation of basic principles of democracy and the rule of law, both here and in other countries. Whether "black operations" like drug-running and assassination, or "white propaganda" like CIA-planted news stories, covert operations and counterinsurgency spell danger for constitutional government and political freedoms.

As the Cold War recedes, it is time to redefine national security, and reform the CIA.

Andrus wants phosphate data

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus wants the federal Environmental Protection Agency to provide state officials with information about possible health risks from the use of phosphate slag.

An EPA study released in May concluded there was a "definite health problem" associated with long-term use of phosphate slag. The study was based on phosphate production, and for many years has been used for roadbuilding in south-eastern Idaho.

Both Monsanto and FMC, which produce the slag, have discontinued slag sales, and the communities of Pocatello and Soda Springs have

temporarily stopped using the material. The Fort Hall Tribal Council has issued a permanent ban on phosphate slag.

The EPA study concluded there was a slight risk of increased cases of cancer over a long period from exposure to phosphate slag. The study covered Pocatello and Soda Springs.

In a letter Thursday to EPA Administrator William Reilly, Andrus asked EPA to provide the state with the data it used for the study. The governor also asked for information EPA collected some time ago from a survey of homes in Pocatello and Soda Springs.

The information never has been made public or shared with homeowners, the governor said.

"Under the circumstances such a review seems not only appropriate, but necessary in order to ensure that the study is technically and scientifically sound," Andrus said.

"There is a general agreement that if slag presents a public health concern, it should not be used and appropriate steps should be taken to remove any danger. However, EPA's procedures and analysis have raised many questions," Andrus said.

The governor said health officials want the information in order to conduct their own analysis.

Idaho Power names new president

BOISE (AP) — Larry R. Gunnoc is the new president and chief operating officer of Idaho Power Co.

The state's largest utility said Thursday the Board of Directors, at its monthly meeting, elected Gunnoc, who has been vice president of distribution, to replace Wayne W. Anderson.

The change will be effective Sept. 1, when Anderson retires after a 42-year career.

The directors also named Gunnoc to replace Anderson on the board of

directors.

Gunnoc became vice president for distribution when that post was created in 1987. Before that he was vice president for divisional operations.

Joe Marshall, chief executive officer and board chairman, also announced that John B. Carley, Boise, president of Albertson's, Inc., was elected to the Idaho Power board. He fills one of two vacancies created in June with the retirement from the board of Robert V. Hansberger and

James E. Bruce.

Douglas Jackson, senior manager of corporate services, replaced Gunnoc as vice president for distribution.

Gunnoc, 54, is a graduate of Washington State University with a degree in electrical engineering.

He joined Idaho Power in 1968 as an engineer.

He has held various management posts including manager of the company's Eastern Division headquartered in Pocatello from 1982-85.

State warns of investment scams, fraud

BOISE (AP) — Pocatello resident Henry West has a message for investors who think they can get rich quick with international, "no risk" investments offering unusually high rates of return.

"You're going to throw your money away," said West. "If it looks too good to be true, it probably is."

He's among a growing number of investors in Idaho and other states who have gotten sucked into fraudulent international investment scams.

Belton J. Patty, director of the Idaho Department of Finance, said the rash of overseas investment swindles is the fastest-growing risk fraud facing Idaho residents. He urged extreme caution in making such investments. The agency is seeing more evidence that increasing numbers of residents "are falling prey to these schemes that combine the high drama of playing the international markets with the enticing bait of sky-high, no-risk returns in exotic instruments," Patty said.

"Global investing can mean a world of hurt" for unwary consumers who place their trust in a stranger thousands of miles away on the other end of a long-distance line," he said.

Small investors in the United States lost more than \$1 billion to international investment swindles in 1988 and 1989, according to a study released to Congress Thursday by the North American Securities Administrators Association. The report identified 87 major cases, including six that were headquartered in Idaho or involved a substantial number of victims in the state.

Zinser says well-paid deans bring in money

MOSCOW (AP) — Some University of Idaho faculty are questioning their president's strategy of using larger salaries to attract stronger candidates for dean openings.

Said UI President Elisabeth Zinser said the higher-paid deans would more than earn their keep by attracting more money for professors.

Last Friday, Zinser appointed two acting deans in the Engineering and Letters and Science colleges to allow the university to stagger national searches for five dean openings over the next three years.

That will allow the UI to address dean salary levels, she said. Zinser also indicated she does not consider her salary of \$119,500 a year as a cap on the deans' pay. College of Engineering Dean Richard Jacobsen is the UI's highest-paid dean at \$95,000 a year.

Amos Yoder, a professor of political science, said his department has been trying to fill an assistant professor position at a salary of about \$30,000 for the past two years. He preferred Zinser place the same emphasis on faculty salaries as she does with deans' wages.

Minerals bill may boost U of I

MOSCOW (AP) — A strategic-minerals bill passed by the U.S. House of Representatives could mean a \$1.5 million lift for the University of Idaho.

The House on Wednesday passed a measure to foster American independence from foreign sources of strategically important minerals.

If it clears the Senate, the federal Bureau of Mines would select one western college for a center to study alternatives to importing those materials essential for defense.

Idaho College of Mines Dean Robert Bartlett testified before a House committee and said the UI would be an ideal spot for such a research center.

Many of the countries relied upon for metals such as platinum and vanadium are not dependable sources during international crisis, or because of trade embargos, he said. South Africa, China and the Soviet Union are suppliers of such elements, he said.

Anti-Defamation League voices concern over Kole's campaign

LEWISTON (AP) — The Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith is concerned about racial overtones in the Idaho attorney general race revolving around a controversial letter. But the league's regional director, Marvin Stern of Seattle, held back from criticizing Republican Patrick Kole of Boise, whose campaign at one point considered using a letter that recited a tribal fund-raising for Democratic candidate Larry Echohawk of Pocatello.

Echohawk is a member of the Pawnee Tribe and a former tribal lawyer for the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes of Fort Hall.

"We're concerned that the line may have been crossed and hope from here on out that the campaign will be waged without any questions being raised about fairness," Stern said.

Reached at an Idaho State Bar As-



sociation meeting in Sun Valley, Kole said he would decline comment until he reviewed Stern's letter.

In part, the letter states: "The Anti-Defamation League views with concern news reports regarding references being made to the racial background of one of the candidates for the office of attorney general in Idaho. America's founding vision of

a society that repudiates bigotry and aspires to fairness remains our political ideal."

The league acted after learning that members of Kole's campaign staff had considered including the following letter in a campaign packet:

"Thanks for sending us some of Pat's publicity. We were introduced to Idaho's campaign for Attorney General at an Indian (sic) pow-wow we attended in Denver last month. A native American is also running for that post. They passed a blanket (really one brave on each corner) to collect wampum to support his candidacy. They did not get any of ours."

The author of that letter wrote to Kole's parents, who in turn sent it to the Republican candidate. Kole then placed it with his campaign office files.

1 killed as light plane crashes in Ogden River

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — A light plane crash in the Ogden River at the mouth of Ogden Canyon Thursday killed one man and injured another, authorities said.

The Cessna 210, owned by Ogden Air Service, left the Ogden Airport at 7 a.m. MDT but apparently experienced engine trouble and was returning when it crashed near a waterfall at 7:15 a.m., said Weber

County Sheriff George Fisher. Killed was Floyd Leonard "Buddy" Hatley, 60, of Sunset, Fisher said.

Floyd Henry Duncan Jr., 52, of Bountiful, was in critical condition at McKay-Dee Hospital, where he was being treated for multiple chest and abdominal injuries, said spokesman Jim Alvey.

Both were pilots employed by Og-

den Air Service and it wasn't known who was flying the single-engine, six-passenger plane, Fisher said.

The plane was en route to Dutch John, Utah, near Flaming Gorge to pick up some fishermen, the sheriff said. The plane hit a 46,000-volt power feeder line, severing some wires. About 1,400 customers were without power from the mouth of the canyon eastward to Huntsville.

State trying to avoid collapse of Atlanta dam

BOISE (AP) — The owners of an 85-year-old dam near the Elmore County community of Atlanta have been ordered to bypass water around the structure to keep it from collapsing.

More logs and rocks fell out of the Kirby Dam on Wednesday, spurring fears the structure may be in more danger of falling than previously thought. The water supplies hydroelectric power for up to 45 customers.

The state Department of Water Resources ordered the owners to bypass water around the dam on the Middle Fork of the Boise River, in an effort to relieve stress on the structure, said Wayne Haas of the agency.

"We want to get the water out from behind there as soon as we can," he said.

Co-owner Israel Ray of Caldwell said earlier this week the dam probably would hold until next spring, but the most could cause its failure.

The dam's owners could not be reached for comment Wednesday night.

"It's one of those things where it's better to be safe than sorry," said Don Peterson, district ranger for the Boise National Forest.

The dam only holds about five acre-feet of water — the amount needed to cover five acres one foot deep. The main damage would be to spawning grounds downstream, said Scott Grunder, Idaho Fish and Game biologist. The dam holds back about 20,000 cubic feet of sediment, enough to damage fisheries for several miles downstream from Atlanta, he said.

Loss of the dam also would bring an end to 24-hour electric power for Atlanta's residents, a luxury they have enjoyed for less than five years.

Abortion bill backer's home target for eggs

BOISE (AP) — The wife of a chief backer of Idaho's restrictive and unsuccessful abortion legislation says the couple's Boise-area home was plastered with eggs.

And she says she suspects it was by a pro-choice advocate.

The incident was condemned and disavowed by a National Organization for Women official.

Beverly Thornburg, president of NOW's Treasure Valley chapter, called the incident "terrible."

"I cannot condone it," she said. "I would never, ever encourage destruction of private property over any political issue."

Republican state Sen. Roger Madsen was a co-sponsor of the legislation that would have banned nearly all abortions in Idaho. Gov. Cecil Andrus vetoed the bill this spring.

Leslie Madsen said that after eggs were thrown at the home Monday night, she thought it was by a prankster.

Rexburg gets grant for potato facility

BOISE (AP) — The city of Rexburg will get an economic development grant of \$240,000 to help open a new potato processing plant, which will provide 24 new jobs.

The Department of Commerce grant will allow the city to extend sewer and water lines to the new High Country Potato fresh pack processing plant located on the outskirts of Rexburg. Officials said it will add \$250,000 annual payroll to the local economy. Gov. Cecil Andrus announced the grant Thursday and said it continues a state policy of trying to create jobs in rural Idaho.

Evelyn Schlöthauer, 67, of Gerings, Neb., was taken to Minidoka Memorial Hospital and on to Magic Valley Regional Medical Center Thursday afternoon. She was in critical condition there Thursday evening, a spokeswoman said.

Schlöthauer's brother, Floyd Sinclair, 64, was driving east on Interstate 84 at 2:30 p.m. when the accident happened, state police said. At the Burley-Rupert exit, he fell asleep, struck the right guardrails, then the left guardrails, and then the right guardrails again, ejecting Schlöthauer.

She received facial injuries, two broken arms and a broken pelvis, state police said. Sinclair was not injured. The accident is under investigation, a dispatcher said.

Idaho Supreme Court puts Hart on Charboneau case

JEROME — 5th District Judge J. William Hart will stay on the Jaime Charboneau murder case at the appointment of the state Supreme Court.

The high court made an appointment at the request of 5th District Judge Philip M. Becker. Becker stepped down from the 6-year-old case last month at Charboneau's request, and in his capacity as administrative judge for the district, appointed Hart.

M. Lynn Dunlap, Charboneau's attorney, objected to Becker's appointment because Becker was disqualified from the case.

Thirty-year-old Charboneau is due to be resentenced for the first-degree murder of his former wife, Marilyn Arbaugh, in 1984. Becker sentenced Charboneau to death in 1986, but that decision was overturned by higher courts.

A hearing for the resentencing is scheduled for Aug. 8.

Car-motorcycle collision kills former Twin Falls resident

BOISE — A former Twin Falls resident was killed Wednesday in Boise when he was hit by a car while riding a motorcycle.

Stuart Ernest Hiebert, 35, who was living in Boise, died at the scene from massive chest injuries, Ada County Deputy Coroner John Bryant said.

The accident occurred at 7:07 a.m., at the intersection of 13th and River streets. Hiebert was eastbound on River Street and Edward Golden Barbach, 63, of Boise, was westbound, Boise police said. Barbach was stopped at a light to turn left onto 13th Street. When he proceeded through the intersection, his car collided with Hiebert's cycle, police said.

The Boise city attorney is evaluating possible charges, police said.

Twin Falls might vote on new school

TWIN FALLS — It's one thing to want a second high school, it's yet another to pay for it.

Twin Falls residents could be voting on whether to build a new school or schools as early as September or October, said Superintendent Terrell Donicht Thursday.

Donicht made his prediction following the release of the results of a survey done by the Twin Falls District that showed 71 percent of respondents favored having a second high school in Twin Falls. A majority also responded favorably to several questions relating to building new facilities.

Survey results will not go unheeded, Donicht said.

A long-range planning committee, which will likely include up to 15 school and community leaders, will meet for three days in early August to formulate a district mission statement which will include future building plans, he said.

The committee will review the survey results and examine a large volume of information that has been collected on district building needs and possible solutions for over a year, Donicht said.

"We're going to take a look at what we need for the next five to 10 years," he said.

Ultimately, it will make a recommendation whether a bond election for a new

school is needed.

The group will consider many different options to remedy district overcrowding, Donicht said. The board may ask the voters for enough new classrooms and facilities to handle all the district's needs at once or spread construction and payment over several years, he said.

It may also decide to hold the election six months from now or later, he said. Nothing has been decided, he added.

Before their conclusions could become the district's mission statement, they would have to be ratified by the School Board, which could give approval at its regular meeting on Aug. 14, Donicht said.

The committee will include many of the

members of the plant facilities committee which recommended last December that the district buy temporary mobile classrooms, to handle overcrowding immediately and form another committee to draw up a plan to handle long range needs, Donicht said.

"I think what they're doing needs to happen," said Dan Brizec, who was a business representative on the earlier committee. "I think everyone in the community is aware that there needs to be a new structure."

The building committee found overcrowding at the elementary, junior high and high school levels, he said.

"It's really scary," Brizec said.

Fugitives turn themselves in

HAILEY — Two teenage boys who eluded eastern and central Idaho law enforcement officers for nearly a week have turned themselves in to the Blaine County Sheriff's Department.

"The kids were tired and beat up from the accidents and the running," Sheriff Walt Felling said. "They were relieved to get this over with, also."

Sgt. Ed Fuller said the juveniles came to the department shortly before midnight Wednesday with the father of one of them, Thomas Sheperd, who has already been charged with grand theft and forgery. They were brought in by the caretakers of the Fawn Creek Ranch, where the two used to work, Felling said.

The juveniles, a 16-year-old and a 17-year-old, were being held at the Southern Idaho Youth Detention Center in Jerome.

Felling said they were unarmed when they surrendered and disclosed where their weapons caches are.

The pair will likely be charged with grand theft, forgery, possession of stolen property and burglary in connection with a string of incidents in the Sun Valley area; he said.

The 17-year-old is also wanted in Florida and Georgia on burglary charges and in Georgia on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon, Felling said.

"They said they were done running," Fuller said.

The search began last Thursday in the Hyndman Creek area of Blaine County, where the teen-age suspects were residing. Police said the youths fled into the mountains, wearing only jeans.

Sometime Saturday night or Sunday morning, the two allegedly stole a Jeep from a Ketchum dealership. On Sunday, the search turned to Madison County, following a high-speed chase that ended about 20 miles east of Rexburg when the suspects rolled the Jeep.

Law enforcement officers searched the area until late Monday. The search returned to Blaine County when a truck stolen from a Madison County farm was wrecked near Gannett. Police then unsuccessfully searched the Deer Creek area.

Fear kept the juveniles on the run, Fuller said.

"They stayed running because they were afraid," Fuller said. "They were pretty tired and decided to quit and that's when they came in."

Felling said the two suffered bruises and scrapes in the accidents and were "so stiff they could hardly walk."

New Canyon View administrator says facility may surprise people

TWIN FALLS — New Canyon View Hospital Administrator Jeff Hauser says the facility can serve the community in ways that may surprise people who believe hospitals that treat mental illness and substance abuse are cold and tightly controlled.

That may have been true decades ago, but now such facilities are open and friendly, offer several outpatient employee support programs and leave many of the treatment decisions up to patients and their families, he said.

"I hope to develop a whole continuum of care: in-house, wellness and outpatient," said Hauser, who noted that the average patient spends just 15 days at the hospital.

The 32-year-old Hauser, who replaced Ken Deibert, is spending his first few weeks in town introducing himself and some of Canyon View's programs to local company executives and working to dispel some of the myths about mental health care.

Deibert resigned from Canyon View in May to become the administrator of Mountainview Hospital in Boise, but at about

the same time Magic Valley Regional Medical Center offered him a job as the director of occupational health services. He said his commitment to Twin Falls, family ties to the area and his wife's job made it easy for him to stay in Twin Falls.

"It was an opportunity to be in a different setting than Canyon View," he said. He declined to elaborate.

Hauser brings experience from working at four hospitals, most recently heading an outdoor health program in Colorado Springs, Colo.

He hopes interaction between workers and managers will lessen their misgivings and problems and translate into increased use of Canyon View.

Hauser said he'll stress a "team-building" getaway program designed to help office, management and worker groups learn their strengths and weaknesses. Workers break away from everyday hassles to spend time in the mountains or on cross-country ski trips learning more about themselves and each other.

"We customize this for different groups to help them formalize goals," he said. "We help a group flush out its values. Sometimes we help them create a vision for where they want to

Starch maker promises effort to deodorize plant

MURTAUGH — After complaints from residents about foul odors and loud noises, a potato starch manufacturer is working to remedy the situation.

The City Council wrote a letter to the A.E. Staley Manufacturing Company after hearing complaints about the smell and noises from the plant, which is located on the north side of the town.

"Their (Staley's) biggest problem is that drain field" where they drain their waste water, Councilman Terry Hanson said.

Staley Manufacturing makes potato starch. The Murtaugh plant employs only six people, however.

In a written response to the City Council, the company said it will put a chemical deodorant into its waste water process to try to reduce the odor.

Staley officials also expressed concern about the noise problem and said they are trying to discover where the noise comes from so they can then work to correct the problem.

"We want to be a good community citizen... We want to have a good relationship with the people in town," John Thompson, a Staley spokesman, told the council. Thompson also said that the company has put quite a bit of money this year into improving the processing system. And he said one of the company's goals is continual improvement.

"I know they (Staley officials) are working on solving these problems, and it's a costly project," Mayor Bob Wright said.

Other council members also said they were pleased with Staley's efforts to clear the air.

Mother of injured boy asks that cyclists wear helmets

BOISE — The 7-year-old cyclist who was hit by a car last weekend is recovering at St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center.

"He's continuing to make progress, slowly," his mother, Donna Kruger, said. "It will be a long, hard road, but he's going to make it. I really feel in my heart he's going to make it."

Brandon Nicholas Kruger was hit by a car as he cycled across Falls Avenue East into traffic on Sunday, Brandon, who was not wearing a helmet, received head injuries but no broken bones, Donna Kruger said.

To prevent others from being hurt, Kruger recommends all cyclists wear helmets.

"This has been a pain that I can't possibly tell you that other parents don't have to experience if they buy their children a helmet," she said. "Everybody should make that effort of a purchase of a helmet."

Brandon is in a barbiturate-induced coma to allow his body to concentrate all energy on healing.

"He hangs on to his life. All the doctors are positive," Kruger said.

Fresh flowers are not permitted in the critical care unit of the hospital, but words of encouragement are welcome, she said.

Sun Valley Council fails to halt new subdivisions

SUN VALLEY — In a move described by Mayor Ruth Lieder as a "drastic mistake," the City Council failed Tuesday to approve a building moratorium.

The moratorium would have temporarily halted applications for new subdivisions and allowed the city to devise new regula-

tions requiring developers to include a certain percentage of affordable units in each subdivision.

According to City Attorney Bruce Collier, the council "does not currently have the tools to compel developers to address the shortage of affordable housing."

"If the City Council wants to compel developers to include affordable housing in

their subdivision plans, then Ordinance No. 226 is necessary," he said.

But by a vote of 3-1, the council declined to pass the ordinance.

In recent rulings, the Idaho Supreme Court has held that cities must be empowered by ordinance before such restrictions can be leveled on developers, according to Collier.

The moratorium would have given the council time to form the proper amendments to the zoning ordinances.

In arguing for an affordable housing, Councilman Steve Luber stated that "locating workers in Hailey is not an effective solution."

Earth First! members gear up for disruption of hunts

CAMERON, Mont. (AP) — A prairie dog shoot in Colorado this weekend and big game hunts in other states later were targeted for disruption by Earth First! Thursday.

A hunting-sabotage workshop at the group's week-long Round River Rendezvous in southwestern Montana also focused on the Tule elk hunt in California, the desert bighorn sheep hunt opening in August in California's Mojave Desert, the spring black bear hunt in Montana and mountain lion hunts in

Montana and other, unspecified states.

The 60 or so Earth First! members attending the workshop agreed in somewhat-nebulous fashion that any members who could would try to stop the Colorado prairie dog hunt, although no one was quite sure how. The "hunt" is scheduled Saturday morning at Nucla in the southwestern portion of the state.

Only a couple of participants said they had been involved in disrupting a hunt, but how-to tips flowed

freely. The basic strategy, they said, is to arise before dawn, drive to the hunt site — a four-wheel-drive vehicle is a necessity — find hunters or the animals being hunted and simply make a lot of noise. Airhorns, available at marine supply stores, make plenty of noise to frighten animals, one discussion leader said.

"Dress in camouflage, because we're essentially hunting the hunter," said another. "What if we

get shot at?"

"I've been shot at," replied one veteran anti-hunting activist, but he didn't elaborate.

Someone pointed out that not all Earth Firsters oppose hunting. "One of the most powerful reasons for a hunt-sab," said Todd Schulke of San Diego, "is that it gets a whole lot of issues on the front page on the papers, like over-grazing."

Also, sabotaging a hunt is good training for other forms of civil dis-

obedience that Earth First! advocates.

Schulke reassured those worried about confronting an angry armed people in remote places.

"It's not that intense," Schulke said. "There's a chance you could get plugged by some idiot hunter, but it's not like you're risking your life every time you go out. Some of the group said they knew little or nothing about hunting or how hunts are organized and conducted."

"There are a lot of hunting magazines in the supermarket you can peruse without even buying them," Phil Knight of Bozeman said, drawing cheers and applause.

"Or take'em home with you," Schulke added, drawing more cheers.

Some hunts, such as Montana's killing of bison that wander out of Yellowstone National Park, are easy to target, but most are not, said Lee Knight said.

Rendezvous observes 'anything goes' spirit

CAMERON (AP) — This is no summer camp.

There are no bunkbeds, no wienie roasts and no camp counselor with a clip board and whistle.

But somehow the atmosphere at the 14th annual Earth First! Round River Rendezvous south of here is reminiscent of those youthful weeks spent in the woods.

The roughly 200 people who have set up camp are spending their days on sweaty hikes to distant peaks or lounging in the abundant shade discussing environmental concerns.

Nights, according to one member named Darren, are spent around a large campfire — with plenty of beer and conversation.

Tank tops, long hair and an over-loaded backpack are the prevalent mode of dress, though the woman opted to go topless Wednesday as

she wandered down the trail to the parking lot.

That "anything goes" attitude defines the group's philosophy. Earth First! boasts of its lack of official leaders, organizers or agenda.

Fun and funning seemed to play a part in many of the group's activities, even the more serious ones.

For example, about 50 people who had gathered in a shady grove to discuss urban sprawl began howling and screeching as soon as they were out of sight of the main camp.

As one member cut open a box full of Earth First! literature, another member kiddingly joked that the box really contained kamikaze turtles.

Earth First! members tie bombs to the reptiles' underbellies and set them loose near bulldozers, he said, poking fun at media hype over the group's alleged attacks of sabotage

against developers of the nation's wildlands.

A Massachusetts man pointed out a lack of woolly mammoths on Montana's prairies and described his plans to reintroduce elephants to the state.

If that man wants a forum for his idea, all he has to do is sign up.

According to Bill Haskins of Missoula, anyone who wants to speak at Saturday's rally is welcome to.

Names will be drawn from a hat to determine the order of the speeches, he said.

Also, a notebook in one campsite clearing lists each day's workshops, from "NASA Owns Your Ozone" to "Pumice, the 1872 Mining Law and Stone Washed Jeans."

The topics for discussion are selected by individual members who simply write their concern on and a

time for meeting on the board.

"If people are willing to talk about it, there'll be a workshop," Phil Knight of Missoula said.

Firefighters go after another lightning fire

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) — Firefighters in Yellowstone National Park were sent to another lightning-caused fire Thursday; just a few days after the 220-acre Mount Washburn fire was declared contained.

Park spokeswoman Joan Anzelmo said the 15-acre Stonetop fire about 8 miles north of Yellowstone Lake was reported at about 3:20 p.m. and four park firefighters were sent to fight the flames.

Four smokejumpers were also ordered from West Yellowstone, Mont., Anzelmo said, as were two air tankers from a Missoula and Billings, Mont., make fire retardant drops on the flames.

In addition, two 20-member fire crews were expected to arrive at the park Thursday evening and would be sent to the fire Friday morning, Anzelmo said, and another 20-member crew was being organized with the park for deployment to the fire if necessary.

The fire is the 12th this year in Yellowstone, but only the second to exceed 2 acres in size.

The first, the Mount Washburn fire near Dunraven Pass, was declared contained Monday and only a handful of firefighters remained.

Power plant draws criticism

BONNERS FERRY (AP) — The Smith Falls Hydropower plant is not living up to promises to clean a northern Idaho creek, outdoor enthusiasts and an environmental expert said.

The plant began operating last December and has been generating electricity for sale to Eugene, Ore. for eight months.

But its efforts to clean Smith Creek and restore the mountainside where six miles of pipe are buried seem to have short-circuited. Mike Faber of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service said Wednesday.

An owner of the hydropower company said cleanup efforts are under way and complaints about debris are exaggerated.

"The plant grosses \$6 million a year — there's got to be some spent on erosion protection," Faber said. "I see no sense of stewardship or any good faith effort to clean this up."

Faber said the area along the pipeline is eroding.

Doug Amos, an kayaker from Missoula, Mont., agreed that the once untouched stream is now full of mud, plywood and trash.

Crews were unable to clean up during the winter, and it has only been in the last couple of weeks that the water level has gone down.

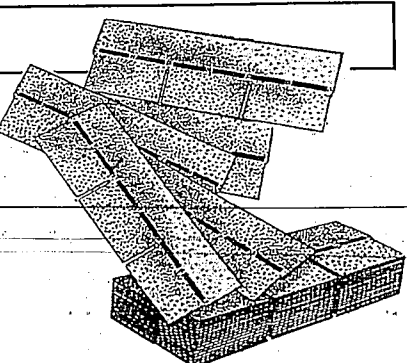

Boise's Smith keeps state women's amateur title by 10-stroke margin

BOISE — After winning the Idaho State Women's Amateur Golf Championship four times in the last seven years and twice in a row, Boise's Jean Smith allowed Thursday afternoon "it's kind of nice being up with those girls" who have had stretches of state domination.

Actually, what Smith did Thursday was take a womanlike stroll around broiling-hot Quail Hollow Golf Course with an even-par round of 71. That was enough to ice a 10-stroke victory over runnerup Karen Darrington of Boise.

"It was perhaps the most lopsided decision in many years, but Smith was having no part of words like 'blowaway and dynasty.'"

"Each year it seems — I realize I won by a fair amount this time — but each year it seems the competition is a little stronger," she protested. "It's kind of nice being up with those girls (who have had multiple championships previously) because I never thought I could get that high. So it is nice to tie some of them if not beat them."

But immediately the four-time champion had new hills to climb, noting "what I'm excited about now is playing the senior amateur major tournaments next year. My goal is to win one of those and I'm going to be trying to play in as many national major senior amateur tournaments as I can next season."

But not to worry, she'll defend her title next year in Idaho Falls where the women's state will be spread day-by-day over the Idaho Falls Country Club and the municipal courses of Pinecrest and Sandereck.

Darrington said she had to be happy with her runnerup showing. "I wasn't worried about Jean at all this morning," she said. "She was eight back when the round began. Jean had things well under control by this morning," she

said. "I just wanted to have a good final-day score and being second here means I've had a pretty good season — winning the Treasure Valley (Amateur) and playing pretty well in the National Publix — and never finishing less than fourth in this tournament since I started playing it in 1979."

For the second day a matter of putts missing by an inch or two, stopping short of the cups or curling off at the last second kept Darrington from getting subpar and into a fight for the lead.

"I just forgot the greens were growing later in the day and my putts just were not getting there," she said. "But she emphasized controlling Smith would have a major chore at any pace."

"At times Jean plays a notch above everybody and she definitely did at times in this tournament," Darrington said. "Darrington's closing two-over 73 let her slip past Kris Fenwick who started Thursday at one-under par but ended up with a 77."

"The first two days I was knocking the stick down (with second shots)," she said. "Today it was like it was all gone. I was not trying to catch up (with Smith) but just trying to get the greens down."

Perhaps the major moment of the meet came Thursday morning when 80-year-old Orta Jacobs knocked a "soft eight-iron" into the 17th cup for the first hole-in-one of her career — but that career only started 20 years ago.

"Golf has been my salvation," she beamed. "I almost quit yesterday because of the heat. But perseverance paid off."

Jays' rookie takes leave after spider nightmare

ANAHEIM, Calif. — "Arachne-phobia" opens in Thursday as the Toronto Blue Jays outfielder Glenallen Hill plans to go see the movie, which is about killer spiders.

"I have to go see it," said Hill, who said he sustained the cuts and scrapes on his feet, knees and right arm last week during a violent nightmare about spiders.

"I'm afraid of spiders, but there's a sense of reality. I can sit there and watch other people get scared and know it's just a movie."

The rookie was placed on the 15-day disabled list on Thursday.

The nightmare occurred in Hill's Toronto apartment early Friday morning. He said he dreamed that two large spiders were falling on him. He jumped out of bed and ran into a hallway wall, which bruised his arm but didn't wake him. He screamed for a flight of carpeted stairs, suffering friction burns on his knees and feet.

Hill said he had never before walked in his sleep, although he said his mother did.

But, he said, "I've had a spider phobia since I was a kid. I've always been terrified of spiders. My sister used to get me bad."

"I know it's kid stuff, but when my sister did that (tensed him about spiders), it freaked me out. I'm not afraid of snakes or lizards or anything like that. There wasn't any one incident as a child, and I never had dreams about them."

He said he dislikes spiders because, "they're creepy and sneaky."

Hill, who was hitting .239, said he had a second dream a few nights later in which a spider was coming at him. He was sleeping on a couch, jumped up and banged a knee against a coffee table. Otherwise, he was unharmed.

Treasure Valley expected to dominate men's tourney

TWIN FALLS — When the Idaho State Men's Amateur Golf champion is crowned at Twin Falls Municipal Golf Course Sunday, it seems difficult to see the title going to someone outside Treasure Valley.

The way things have been going this summer, the Boise area has been coming up with hot hands right along and as recently as a week ago Twin Falls got first-hand knowledge of that when Jim Crisman won the Canyon Springs Amateur handily.

But because Twin Falls Muni is not your typical championship course — par is 68 — one does not expect the bombers from long courses to necessarily have the advan-

tage. It's isn't an easy course to master with only two five-pars, and both of them considered likely birdie if not eagle holes, and a host of four pars that some long hitters can't use a drive on.

It will give up 61s and 62s fairly regularly.

The record for both amateurs and professionals is 58.

But what Twin Falls Muni demands is accurate iron play because it has six three-pars and three of those can be stretched to about 200 yards.

Additionally, there isn't a big green in the 18 holes. No 16 may be the smallest this side of an executive layout. And the greens are fast — real fast.

killers. Green No. 18 is a dread, steeply pitched, closely cropped and almost impossible to stop a ball on.

So, the man crowned the best Sunday might not be the guy who would have beaten him in field, in say, Pebble Beach. But he will have been the best pitcher-putter of the three-day affair.

Typical of the players who will be seeing Muni on a rare occasion is Boise's Brett Rupert, who is making this his third tournament since regaining his amateur status through a two-year layoff. Rupert hasn't played Muni in 12 years but having grown up here and played with his parents and brothers, he has some recollection.

"I have been working on my irons because I remember the course is relatively short. I remember a couple of the four pars

on the back nine you have to hit a three-wood or a low iron because the driver would be to much," Rupert said.

The word among local entries is that if Crisman can putt Muni the way he did the undulating greens at Canyon Springs, the rest of the field is playing for second.

"I've had members down there tell me they've never seen a stranger — or anyone for that matter — putt those Canyon Springs greens better," says Twin Falls amateur Bob Skredrestus.

Former champion Joe Malay of Weiser anticipates some sizzling rounds if up here and played with his parents and brothers, he has some recollection.

Chisox's Perez tosses season's 7th no-hitter

NEW YORK — Melido Perez matched a record and his brother.

Perez pitched the record-tying seventh no-hitter of the season Thursday night as the Chicago White Sox beat the New York Yankees 8-0 in a game shortened by rain to six innings.

Perez's no-hitter, which matched the record set in 1908 and tied in 1917, was the record sixth in the American League this season and the first shortened by rain since Sept. 24, 1988. That's when his brother Pascual, who was watching Thursday night from the Yankees dugout, threw one over five innings for Montreal against Philadelphia on Sept. 24, 1988.

"I didn't think about it at first, but then I remembered when my brother threw a no-hitter in the rain," Perez said. "I started to think, 'That might happen to me, too.'"

It was only the second time brothers have pitched no-hitters in the majors. Ken and Bob Forsch also accomplished the feat.

Ken pitched one on April 7, 1979, for Houston against Atlanta and Bob threw two for St. Louis — April 16, 1978, and Sept. 26, 1983. "I'm happy because I got my first no-hitter and because my brother was here," Melido said.

Pascual, who hasn't pitched since April 25 because of arm problems, was usually elated even though his team was losing. "Who would care? I'm happy," he said. "I know we lost but he was my brother. He would have been rooting for me if I was throwing it."

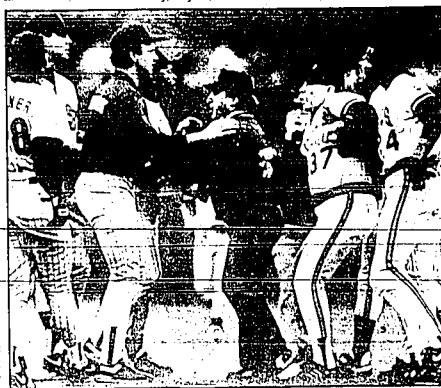

Right-hander Boyd is Cowboys' man in middle

TWIN FALLS — Probably the best way to describe Riley Boyd's current role on the baseball diamond is to call him the "middle man".

Tri's roster lists no such position. But to the Twin Falls American Legion-A baseball Cowboys, Boyd is one of those who first-year coach Dave Slotten refers to as "position players who have to contribute on the mound in order for us to be successful."

Normally a fixture at second base, Boyd has pitched often enough and well enough, to have compiled a team-leading 7-3 record. And, when starting shortstop Matt Rasmussen takes his turn in the pitching rotation, you'll see the strong-armed Boyd move to the other side of the bag to fill that considerable vacancy.

"Sometimes it's tough to play shortstop right after pitching," Boyd admits. "After seven innings sometimes your arm doesn't feel much like throwing."

"I think Riley's a great asset to our team," Rasmussen offered. "He's probably our leading pitcher now and he plays consistent defense. He'll play wherever you put him and he never seems to play hard every day."

With his curveball at its best, Boyd tossed a three-hitter in downing Hillcrest of Salt Lake City 2-1 in the Cowboy Classic semifinals here last month, then topped that performance with a no-hitter against Barlow of Portland, Ore., in the Pepsi Challenger tournament at Eugene, Ore., on July 3.

"I've never experienced anything like it before," said Boyd. "I wasn't even aware of it until (catcher) Timmy Soran asked after the fourth inning how it felt to be

throwing a no-hitter. I didn't really think about it after that — not even in the late innings — I just went out and threw."

"That's about it, but I was afraid I kind of jinxed him because you're not supposed to tell the pitcher he has a no-no going until it's all over," Soran said. "The whole dugout just went, 'Oh, no.' After that I just had him throw the ball when they couldn't hit it. On the outside, then move back inside. It was exciting for me too. It's not every day you get to catch a game like that."

Versatility became the Cowboys' byword when four pitchers, representing 19 of 28 victories for state Class A-1 champion Twin Falls High School (28-2), opted not to play Legion ball this summer.

Of those who stayed on, only Jason Pearsall (5-1 for the Bruins), Matt Horner (2-0) and Boyd pitched more than 10 innings during the high school season.

"A lot of the seniors talked about it," said Boyd. "We thought we could field one of the best teams in the Northwest if all the kids came out. A lot of the guys were kind of disappointed with them."

"That's the thing with Legion. Everybody together but not together," Soran said. "Burlley and Minico play together, Pocatello and Highland make up the Rebels, the Boise Gems have Capital and Boise and the Meridian school are together. Only we just stay the same. Actually, we lose players."

As a Bruin pitcher, Boyd notched a 2-1 record, 113 three saves and his ratio of strikeouts to walks — 19-10-6 — were staff bests and he finished third in earned run average at 2.50.

"Riley did a little pitching in high school, but he wasn't one of their big guns," added Soran. "Now he's pretty much the ace of our team."

Heading into the state high school tourney in Boise in May, Boyd was hitting only .217 with two triples for the Bruins.

But had drawn enough walks to carry an on-base percentage of .417, on the average, coming around to score on half those opportunities.

Flawless in the field as the Bruins made Centennial, Meridian and Capital their 17th, 18th and 19th straight victims en route to the crown, Boyd — hitting .347 for the American Legion season — came into his own at the plate as well.

"I think I hit better up here than I had all year," he agreed.

"He's good this year. One of the few juniors who played a lot," added Cowboy third baseman Shane Quesnell.

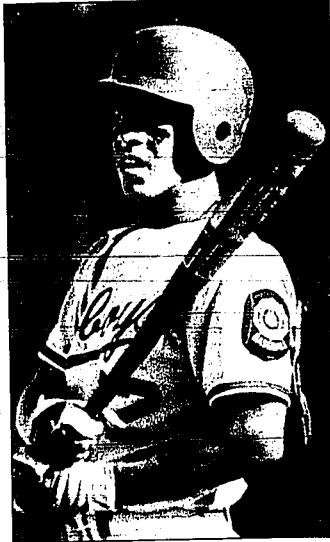
"His hitting is improving every game. He's going to be a team leader next year."

Boyd, who also lettered for the Bruins in basketball, is looking forward to it, but cautions against selling the 1990 Cowboys short.

"Well, I guess I enjoy both (sports) a lot, but I'm leaning more toward baseball because I'd have more chances to do something after high school," said the 5-foot, 8-inch, 160-pound senior-to-be. "It's been fun and I'm looking forward to next year."

"I thought we should have even gone undefeated (during the high school season)," he emphasized. "I was ready for it. I really wanted to win. That's how we all felt every time out."

"Like we were unbeatable in our state. Now we just need to get some good performances from our pitchers — Jason (Pearson) is pitching well right now and Danny Molyneux is coming on — and we could win it all again."

Credit news helps stock market gain 37 points to set record high

NEW YORK — The stock market jumped Thursday, carrying the Dow Jones industrial average to a record high in buying inspired by visions of easier-credit-and-lower-interest rates.

Dow Jones' average of 30 blue chips jumped 37.13 to 2,969.80, extending its gain over the past two sessions to 78.96 points.

That pushed the average decisively past its previous peak of 2,935.99, reached on June 15.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by 19 to 9 in a nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 987 up, 545 down and 479 unchanged.

Much of the gain came after Chairman Alan Greenspan of the Federal Reserve Board indicated that the Fed was ready to relax its monetary policy if it proved necessary to counter a squeeze in availability of bank credit.

Though analysts differed as to how much the Fed's views might have changed, the news was enthusiastically received in the credit markets, sending interest rates lower.

Brokers also said buyers appeared to be encouraged by the market's steady showing of late in the face of a succession of disappointments in midyear corporate earnings reports.

Whatever the current profit picture, brokers say, traders seem convinced that the current slow pace of economic recovery will bring to mind the outlook for earnings in future quarters.

But some individual stocks still came under severe pressure in reaction to earnings news.

Computer Associates International, the most active NYSE issue, tumbled 6 1/2 to 40.

It was likely to post lower sales and earnings results for the fiscal quarter ended June 30.

Intel jumped 7 1/2 to 35 1/2 and GTE dropped 1 1/2 to 29 1/2 after GTE agreed to acquire Contel through an exchange of stock.

Energy stocks gained ground for the second straight day, powered in part by new efforts within the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries to foster higher oil prices.

Atlantic Richfield rose 4 1/2 to 121 1/2; Unocal to 29 1/2; Chevron 2 1/2 to 73; Texaco 2 1/2 to 60 1/2, and Mobil 1 1/2 to 63 1/2.

Other gainers among the blue chips included DuPont, up 1 1/2 to 39 1/2; McDonald's, up 1 3/4 to 37; International Business Machines, up 1 1/2 to 120; and Procter & Gamble, up 1 1/4 to 90.

Volume on the floor of the Big Board came to 211.51 million shares, against 162.22 million in the previous session.

There are 10 tricks off the top; a lucky lie in today's diamond suit will produce the slam-going tricks. Does that mean that South's best chance lies with diamonds?
— South with his spade king, cashed four club winners and started the diamonds. Going after all four diamond tricks, he led a diamond to dummy's ace and a diamond to his jack and West's queen. West exited with a spade, and South was all tied up. In dummy for the last time, he threw a heart on dummy's spade queen, took a winning heart finesse and then tried to split the diamonds. No luck there; the slam fell one short.

Before committing himself in diamonds, South should first determine how many tricks he needs in that suit. He does this by first taking the heart finesse. If that wins, he can play for three diamond tricks. If it loses, he must play for all four.

After winning his spade king, clubs to try the heart finesse. When it wins, he can afford a safety play in diamonds. First he cashes the king and then the ace, and if nothing good happens, he leads low toward his jack. In today's case, West drops a doubleton queen, and the touchy slam becomes a claimer. (Those who spot the double squeeze will make an overtrick.)

Young thespians step on stage next week

TWIN FALLS — Two plays for the price of one are in store for JUMP Co. audiences as the youthful theater troupe plans a double feature of "How to Eat Like a Child" and "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat."

The plays, each about an hour long, will be presented together starting Tuesday on the Fine Arts Auditorium stage at the College of Southern Idaho.

This week, 80 rambunctious kids took turns rehearsing their lines at First Christian Church. In fact, they've been rehearsing six days a week since the end of school.

Yvra Redman, JUMP Co. board president, says the decision to do two plays was made in order to give more young people an opportunity to perform.

"It's hard to find a show that includes 70 kids," she says. In addition, last year's main production of "Grease" was geared almost exclusively to junior and senior high school players, and JUMP Co. wanted to find a good vehicle for its younger members, too.

"How to Eat Like a Child" has provided that outlet, says CSI drama professor Laine Steel, who will direct the play.

Subtitled "Other Lessons in Not Being a Grown-Up," "How to Eat Like a Child" will also explain how to beg your parents for a dog, how to torture your sister and just basically how to drive your parents crazy," says Steel.

The play — adapted by Delia Ephron's

book of the same name — is fun for the kids. "I think one of the things that's good about this show is it allows the kids to be themselves," says Steel, a specialist in children's theater who also is leading a CSI theater workshop for kids this month.

But, he adds, adults will also enjoy the production because it allows us to remember what childhood was like.

Robin McCracken returns to JUMP Co. as director of "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat."

She says it's a production she's wanted to do since seeing it performed by a summer repertory theater in Montana in 1984.

"It was one of the most incredibly moving messages I've ever seen," she recalls.

Based on the Biblical story of Joseph and his coat of many colors, the musical retains the story's message without being overtly religious, says McCracken.

Although just over an hour long, "Joseph" has been as demanding as a full-length show because it includes almost non-stop music, McCracken notes. She serves as choreographer as well as director, and says it has been creatively challenging to develop dance moves for the fast-moving show.

She praises the work of Valerie Williams, who created the show's costumes, including — of course — Joseph's resplendent, elaborate coat. "She did it in three days, but she didn't eat or sleep," McCracken says.

Chess players sharpen their skills for competition

TWIN FALLS — Ted Hartwell's love affair with chess started at the movies.

Perhaps it was the winner-plays-against-loser film, Hartwell recalls reading a Bogybo book that told how much the actor loved to play chess, and how he insisted a game be in progress in some scene during every picture he filmed.

Hartwell — then 14 and living in Salt Lake City — was a chess nut, but he thought the chess pieces were prettier. So he went to Woolworth, bought a chess set and taught himself to play.

A few years later, he won his high school's chess championship. Today, several decades and hundreds of tournaments later — he is one of about 20 people active in the Magic Valley Chess Club.

The club, just formed in January, will hold its first tournament — the 1990 Southern Idaho Open — this weekend at the College of Southern Idaho.

Area players are invited to take part in the tournament, which will be staged in the

cafeteria on the second floor of Taylor Administration Building. Registration is set from 8:05 to 8:45 a.m. Saturday.

Three rounds of play are slated Saturday, at 9 a.m., 2 p.m. and 7 p.m. Two rounds are scheduled Sunday for 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. Each player will be required to make 45 moves — in 90 minutes, with each player playing by his or her own clock.

The entry fee is \$18, and participants must be a member of the Idaho Chess Federation. Anyone who isn't in the state organization can pay their \$6 annual dues at the door.

In addition, players who aren't members of the United States Chess Federation are

eligible, but — on top of the \$18 entry fee — they must pay an extra \$1 per round (or \$5 total) as a rating fee.

Christie Nolan, state chess champion from Meridian, will be on hand to serve as tournament director. She'll be assisted by Gregory Ray of Twin Falls, a member of the local chess club.

Club president Barry Eacker says he expects about 30 players to take part. Most will be from the Magic Valley, but some players are coming from Boise and there may be others from Utah and Washington.

It's been several years since the area had a chess club. The new organization boasts a wide range of members, from junior high to retirement age, and representing a wide variety of occupations — including teachers, farmers, machinists, ministers and salesmen.

One area man who welcomes the club's revival is Glen Buckendorf of Buhl, a nine-time Idaho state chess champion and avid student of the game.

For years, Buckendorf played chess by mail and he now has 11 games underway via his personal computer through a modem chess network run by USA Today.

But the chance to play players sitting right across the board from him is one Buckendorf relishes. He likes the challenge of playing a "live" opponent and adds that he can also help the younger players develop their skills.

Asked why they continue to play chess year after year, club members have ready answers.

Eacker, who has been playing 11 years, says he enjoys the "strategic mystery" of chess. "You get involved in the game and it's not like you're playing against anybody," he adds. "It's like trying to solve a puzzle."

"The game takes place in the minds of two people, not on the board," says Buckendorf.

"There's no luck involved," says Hartwell. He calls chess his mental exercise yet says it can be physically exhausting, too.

The chess club meets each Saturday from 4 to 10 p.m. at the Salvation Army, 348 Fourth Ave. N., although this weekend's meeting is canceled due to the tournament at CSI. For more information, stop by a meeting or call Eacker at 733-6186.

This Snow White is no shrinking violet

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Later this month, movie audiences will be able to see one of the few G-rated films of the violence-prone summer season, featuring a fresh, spunkier Snow White.

The animated feature is called "Happily Ever After" (the Disney people objected to anything similar to "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs"). The fledgling 1st National Film Corp. is releasing the film on video, with the voices of Phyllis Diller, Ed Asner, Dom DeLuise, Sally Kellerman, Carol Channing, Tracey Ullman, Malcolm McDowell and Zsa Zsa Gabor. The role of Snow White is voiced by Irene Cara.

"I don't think I've ever done a cartoon feature before," said Cara on a visit to town from her home in seaside Altadena. "But I think I did some kind of work for Hanna-Barbara when I was young."

She can be forgiven a lapse of memory. Cara has been working in all forms of show business since the age of 5. She's done it all: Broadway, radio, television, movies, recording, songwriting. Along the

way she has won an Academy Award (for the song "What a Feeling" in "Flashdance"), two Grammys and a Golden Globe.

Her Snow White, she emphasized, will differ from the 1937 Disney version: "I don't see any point in doing a sequel otherwise. If you were going to do the same old story, why bother? It makes sense to have a new approach to Snow White in the '90s, especially, I think they've done a terrific job of updating it and yet keeping it in the classic fairy-tale look."

"This Snow White is not the passive heroine who has to be rescued. Actually, she's quite the heroine, and she does the rescuing. She rescues the Prince and battles the evil villain wizard with the help of the 'Dwar-felves' instead of the Dwarfs. (The film) does show women as mature, aggressive and strong when things happen in their lives. I think that's very apropos for the '90s."

Such roles for women, she lamented, are rarely found in mainstream films. And when they appear, the movies often have been developed by their stars — Jessica Lange, Jane

Fonda, Goldie Hawn, etc. Cara, herself, has nurtured a project she hopes to start filming in October. She has been performing 26 of her 31 years, beginning in her native New York.

"There was a stage mother," she said, "and there always is with child actors. Mom was great. She was really committed to me and always encouraged me about my own talent. I'm a mulatto person — my mother's white and my father's black. Many times as a child going out on auditions, I would hear her say, 'You're just as beautiful as all those blond little girls.'"

"She would make me feel confident, and I would get the part. Mom was very sensitive in that area and very helpful to me. My father's a musician, and I have a slew of cousins who all play instruments and vary from jazz to Latin to classical."

"I started in the Spanish field at age 5. I worked as a regular on a television show similar to what I'm doing now in the American market. At 7 I made my debut off-Broadway. At 8 I made my debut on Broadway in a play called 'Maggie Flynn' with Shirley Jones and Jack Cassidy. I went on to do more theater and television and landed my first film role at 15."

CNN produces shortened version of newsreels

NEW YORK — It's the 6 o'clock showing of "Betsy's Wedding" at a 57th Street movie theater; people are settling in with their popcorn and — wait, what's that up on the screen before the previews and the no-smoking announcement?

A newsreel, sort of. The newsreel is back, maybe.

Last month, those dauntless pioneers at Cable News Network began producing updated versions of the cinema newsreels that used to appear along with double features, plus maybe a cartoon or two, down at the local Bijou. They're being shown on just a dozen Manhattan movie screens in a three-month experiment that's costing CNN about \$100,000.

Richard E. Donnelly, executive vice president of the City Cinemas chain, agreed to let his audiences serve as guinea pigs; he was "interested in repeating what was a very nice part of the movie experience when we were growing up." His theater managers report that audience comments have

generally been neutral to favorable, except for some complaints in Greenwich Village, where folks tend toward the cantankerous anyway.

Newsreels were significant and beloved cinematic staples for decades. Introduced in the 1910s and reaching their heyday in the '30s and '40s, they were "the principal source of visual news," says Bill Murphy, chief of the National Archives' motion picture, sound and video branch, which has an important collection. Five major companies each produced two newsreels a week — eight to 10 minutes of stories about war and political campaigns, natural disasters and movie-star weddings, all filmed in black-and-white and narrated by stentorian baritones.

Television killed them off, of course. Movie newsreels helped Americans see the faces and places of World War II, but by the '50s they were doomed.

"CNN Real News" is different. With visual news now available around the clock (thanks largely to CNN itself), the experimental newsreel is actually a repackaging of fea-

tures that were shot for CNN's various shows. Times being what they are, it's just a quarter of the length of the old newsreels and features half as many stories. Its purpose is less to inform than to entertain and, of course, to promote CNN, which reaches more than 55 million homes but is watched, in an average week,

in only about a third of them. "Get your name out there, refresh their memories, that's what this whole business is about," says Rick Salcedo, CNN's vice president for news promotion.

Times being even more what they are, CNN wants to dig up corporate sponsors for its new project.

BSU radio adds classical, cuts news

For fans of the classics, the BSU Radio Network's revised schedule is music to their ears. News junkies, on the other hand, may be suffering some pangs of withdrawal.

The Boise State University-based network — heard on KBSW (91.7 FM) in Twin Falls and via OLI and Stanley (106.3) — has made extensive changes to its schedule for the first time since 1987.

The most notable changes affected the two popular National Public Radio news shows, "Morning Edition" and "All Things Considered."

BSU Radio trimmed the last hour of "Morning Edition," which previously aired from 4 to 9 a.m., when ratings determined the show lost most of its listenership between 8 and 9 a.m.

Meanwhile, "All Things Considered" has been trimmed from two hours to 90 minutes. It now airs from 5:30 to 7 p.m.

Other changes now in effect:

- "Adventures in Good Music with Karl Haas" runs from 8 to 9 a.m.
- "Performance Today," a new show described below, airs from 9 to 11 a.m.
- "Morning Passages," a classical program, is now heard from 1 to 4 p.m. and has changed its name to "Afternoon Passages."
- "Fresh Air," an arts and interview program once heard at 2 p.m., is now on at 4 p.m.
- "Radio Reader" was shifted

Moths put the station off the air

Not only did those darn Miller moths bug the heck out of everyone in the Magic Valley in recent weeks — they also were responsible for knocking KBSW off the air several times.

Jim Paluzzi, general manager for the BSU Radio Network, says the moths were apparently sucked into the antenna of the station's transmitter on Jerome

Butte, fouling up the signal. Dust and dirt in the area have also proven the transmitter's susceptibility at times since it went on the air in May 1989, but moths have been the main villains this summer.

"The Twin Falls audience has been very understanding," says Paluzzi, adding that the public radio network hopes to have a backup transmitter in operation in three to four months.

from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m.

- "Market Place," a business new program, moved from 5:30 p.m. to 5 p.m.
- "Thistle and Shamrock," a new show featuring Celtic music, is heard Sundays at 7 p.m.

Jim Paluzzi, BSU Radio general manager, says the listener-supported network received dozens of complaints when the changes first went into effect a couple weeks ago. But the criticisms have slowed to a trickle, he adds.

Paluzzi notes that many segments of the news shows are repeated several times during each day's broadcast, so — while listeners may need to readjust their habits — there really hasn't been any decrease in actual news.

He says he wasn't surprised by the drop-off in "Morning Edition" audience from 8 to 9 a.m., and speculates an "Idaho work ethic" means many in the station's predominant audience group — professionals age 35 to 44 — are already

at work by 8 a.m.

The new schedule eliminated "Cameo Concert," which was among the station's lowest rated shows. But classical fans gained "Performance Today," which Paluzzi describes as a kind of "Morning Edition" for the arts.

"Performance Today" offers new compact disc recordings and features on music. But it also broadcasts live recordings from around the nation, and Paluzzi says Idaho ensembles could very well be heard on NPR via the show in the future.

BSU Radio has been on the air in the Magic Valley since last May, and Paluzzi says response has been great. "We've been pleased — overwhelmed, really — by the quality and consistency of support," he notes.

Paluzzi says he likes to take phone calls during the network's membership drives, adding that members in the Magic Valley are "serious listeners."

CBS film on desegregation, 2 ABC series recognized for enriching TV viewing

HOLLYWOOD — A CBS television movie about school desegregation in Boston and episodes of two popular ABC series, "thirtysomething" and "The Wonder Years," took cash awards as the 16th annual Humanitas Prizes were bestowed for "humanizing achievement" in television writing.

"Common Ground," Part II, which aired last March on CBS, won Edward Hume \$25,000 for his teleplay depicting the tension surrounding the mandated desegregation of Boston's public schools in the 1970s.

The Humanitas judges, who last year for the first time found no TV movie worth honoring, selected Hume in the 90-minute-or-more category, citing his "Common Ground" for its "celebration of the courage it takes to ... abandon stereotypes and respond to hatred and violence with non-violent love."

The awards were presented during a luncheon in Los Angeles. In all, \$70,000 was handed out by the Los Angeles-based Humanitas Family Educational and Cultural Institute, which each year recognizes writers who communicate values that enrich the TV-viewing public.

In the 60-minute category, which carried a \$15,000 prize, the Humanitas went to Joseph Dougherty for his "thirtysomething" script entitled "The Other Shoe."

His story — about how the time the character Nancy spends with another cancer survivor threatens the distance between her and her family — was termed "a chilling dramatization of the specter of death and the moral stamina needed to face it down ... a ringing declaration that even those afflicted with cancer can and must sensitize themselves to the needs of other people."

"The Wonder Years," which produced last year's 30-minute category

winner, turned up another winning script. Todd W. Langen received \$10,000 for his "Square Dance" story, which found young Kevin learning too late that in bowing to peer pressure, he passed up a friend who could have enriched his life. The program was cited for its "poignant depiction of the ravages of peer pressure and its portrayal of the pain inflicted by our insensitivity to one another."

An "ABC Afterschool Special" that dealt with "the courage it takes to be ecologically sensitive ... and faithful to oneself at the price of alienation" won in the non-prime-time children's live action category. Bruce Harmon received \$10,000 for that script, "A Town's Revenge."

The \$10,000 Humanitas Prize for non-prime-time children's animated program went to Cliff Ruby and Elana Lesser for their "Babe Courage" episode of CBS' "Dink the Little Dinosaur." It highlighted the sense of fulfillment "that follows an unselfish response to the needs of others."

A non-cash documentary award was given to Carol L. Fleischer for

"See Dick & Jane Lie, Cheat & Steal: Teaching Morality to Kids," part of the syndicated series "Raising Good Kids in Bad Times."

At the luncheon, Father Ellwood Kieser, president of the Human Family Institute, announced that a new \$25,000 prize will be awarded next year for the prime-time cable — PBS program that best communicates human values.

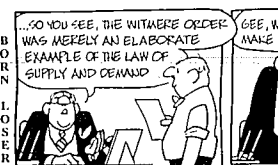

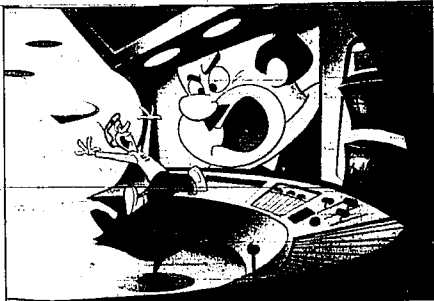

'Jetsons' fails with stone-age animation

When it was launched back in space-crazy 1962, "The Jetsons" crashed after 24 episodes on prime time TV. Yet through the horrors of eternal syndication, those 24 examples of inferior animation lived on, until they began to spawn again — 41 new episodes in 1985, 10 more for the 25th anniversary in 1987, and now "Jetsons: The Movie."

While this new, ambitious enterprise by William Hanna and Joseph

Barbera is far from the worst of the new generation of animated features making their bids for big bucks in the hugely lucrative kid-vid market, the latest run of the Jetson saga is not easy to endure. And compared with the wonderful work being done by the Walt Disney and Don Bluth people, it is a pathetic display of what animators can do.

Hanna-Barbera, who once filled the screen with kinetic craziness in their "Tom and Jerry" days, were largely responsible for cheapening so-called cartoons for television — with Huckleberry Hound, Yogi Bear, the Flintstones and finally, the Jetsons. So they are stuck with the

flat, bland look of the 1962 series. Perhaps aware that the Jetsons would stand up poorly against "The Little Mermaid" and "An American Tail," the veteran animators tossed in some three-dimensional computer animation effects and even resorted to a music video sequence for Tiffany (voice of Judy Jetson) that resembles "The Yellow Submarine."

Mostly, though, this is blown-up TV, with no details in the faces, bodies or backgrounds. The story is

not exactly spellbinding, either. It seems that George Jetson, never a ball of fire, has always dreamed of a vice presidency at Spacely Sprockets. Thus George, wife Jane, daughter Judy and son Elroy journey (courtesy of computer animation) to a distant planetoid where Mr. Spacely has established a cost-cutting factory.

The problem encountered by previous vice presidents and now by George is that someone, or some-

thing, is sabotaging the sprocket operation.

"Jetsons" takes on an ecological, anti-colonial message as the mystery is solved. There also is a subplot involving Judy, who discovers a new love in space, while cruising in a tangle-act mall. Elroy makes friends, too, with a robot.

The screenplay by Dennis Marks and the characters introduced by producer-directors Hanna and Barbera borrow shamelessly from the "Star Wars" cycle, with characters resembling the Wookiee, R2-D2 and the Ewoks. The Jetsons themselves seem like paper-thin clones of Blondie, Dagwood, et al., complete with dog — just as the Flintstones were sketchy, if amusing, cartoons of the Honeymooners.

Incredibly, after all these years, Penny Singleton, whose identity as Blondie goes back to 1938, still sounds young and cute as the voice of Jane. Mel Blanc, who died after voicing this film, also is entertaining as the blustering Spacely, a sort of latter-day Mr. Sinters. But even his work lacks the manic inspiration of some of his great characters — Bugs, Daffy, Porky, Tweety Bird — just as those Toon characters so far outclass any of the Jetson family.

Rated G, this film is squeaky clean and dull enough for the most careful parents. It's not even remotely scary.

Murphy sizzles, Nolte fizzles in latest '48 Hours'

The following are capsule reviews of movies now showing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

Capsule reviews

ANOTHER 48 HRS. (R). Eddie Murphy and Nick Nolte re-team eight years later for this crunch-and-thud sequel. Murphy is better than he's been awhile, but Nolte, who has become a great actor in the intervening years, looks woefully uncomfortable. Walter Hill handles the action sequences with mechanical verve.

DAYS OF THUNDER (PG-13). Whoosh! "Days of Thunder" just streaked in, fast as a race car paint job and about as flat. Has the Simpson-Bruckheimer signature come to mean the flimsiest story buried under glittering production values? What relationships but movie-making between Tom Cruise and Nicole Kidman, but between Cruise and Robert Duvall, putting full, ornery life into another of Southern peckewood. The movie's excitement comes from its racing footage; its massive ease of attitude comes from the producers' assurance that they can retool the formula of "Top Gun."

DICK TRACY (PG). Warren Beatty's vision of a comic strip on film comes in paint box-bright col-

ors with nicely irreverent dialogue, a gaggle of crisp performances and one with million-dollar moxie. It's a film of enormous style, with a sure sense of itself. You may not exactly brood about the inner lives of these characters for days after you leave the theater — then again, for better or worse, that may be one of the definitions of a summer movie. To take the words out of the mouth of another Tracy, "There ain't much meat, but what there is is cheese."

DIE HARD 2 (R). This is the most cheerfully preposterous film of a jaw-dropping summer, which is not to say it's not fun, it's simply orchestrated Looney Tunes. Even Bruce Willis' redoubtable detective, John McClane, keeps shaking his head over his part in all the action. But all in all, this sequel is a lively three-ring circus; just don't be fussy about logic or timing, and for heaven's sake, watch out for falling glass.

GREMLINS 2 (PG-13). After waging war on Norman Rockwell-Frank Capra small-town America in the first "Gremlins," the grinning, green little beasties take on New York City here, running riot through Manhattan's Clump Center and all the ferocious cartoon satire director

Joe Dante and writer Charlie Haas can pump up. The movie seems constricted, but the scale invasion of the streets — and, the conversion of John Glover's Daniel Clapp from bad to good seems a little trumped up. But the sequel is funnier and fiercer than the first — and Tony Randall talks a great Brain Grin.

QUICK CHANGE (R). A trio of disillusioned New Yorkers — Grimm (Bill Murray), a city planner; his sweetheart Phyllis (Geena Davis), and Grimm's goofy, long-time friend and liability, Loomis (Randy Quaid) — execute a brilliantly clever bank heist. Now, to be home free, they have to get out of New York, an urban obstacle course of unmarked streets, wayward freeway entrances and unfriendly natives. Screenwriter Howard Franklin and co-producer/star Murray, making their joint debut as directors — debuts as directors, except at deadpan vignettes of the city and nearly excruciating suspense.

ROBOCOP 2 (R). Despite some nude wit and some elegant special effects, this Irvin Kershner sequel is another entry in the techno-blow-out sweepstakes. Peter Weller once again gives his sturdy robo-performance as the cyborg.

TEENAGE MUTANT NINJA

'Die Hard 2' alive and well at the box office

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The box office performance of "Die Hard 2: Die Harder" shows that movie fans are a Willis there's a way to big audiences. The film grossed \$21.7 million in its debut weekend, despite fierce competition.

Figures released by Entertainment Data Inc., show the Bruce Willis film collected \$6 million more than Tom Cruise's "Days of Thunder" did in its premiere engagement two weekends ago.

The performance of the sequel to "Die Hard," which reportedly cost more than \$62 million, is especially impressive because the sequences are cluttered now with highly promoted blockbusters: "Days of Thunder," "Dick Tracy," "Total Recall," "Another 48 HRS." and "RoboCop 2."

"We're going to tell people that the summer just started," said Tom Sherak, president of domestic distribution and marketing for "Die Harder" maker 20th Century Fox.

In second place, down a modest 31 percent, was "Days of Thunder," with returns of \$10.7 million. It was followed by "Dick Tracy," which collected \$6.6 million for a 34 percent slowdown.

"Jetsons: The Movie," an animated family film based on the television cartoon, opened in fourth place with ticket sales of \$5 million. Fifth was Arnold Szwarczenegger's "Total Recall," with receipts of \$4.2 million.

"Another 48 HRS." placed sixth with a gate of \$4.1 million, and "RoboCop 2" followed with returns of \$3.6 million, down sharply from the previous weekend of \$6.4 million.

In eighth was "Ghost Dad," grossing \$3.2 million, and "Gremlins 2: The New Batch" was ninth with \$2.6 million.

Rounding out the Top 10 was "Pretty Woman," making \$2.5 million. "Pretty Woman" has now made more than \$153.6 million and is the year's biggest hit so far.

Meriwether pleased with 'Munsters'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Twice a week, clad in a filmy purple gown, wearing deathly white makeup and a heavy black wig, Lee Meriwether stands outside a sound stage and waves at the passing trams of the Universal Studios Tour.

This is not a common occurrence on the tour — few well-known actors deign to make an appearance. But Meriwether, star of the syndicated program "The Munsters Today," enjoys the attention.

"It started when I was standing outside the stage one day when a tram came by. . . The tour guide told them who I was. I waved at them and they got a kick out of it," she said.

"One day, a tram load of Japanese tourists came by and nearly fainted over as everyone rushed to the side to take pictures," said Meriwether. "I wish I had a camera to take a picture of that."

Meriwether is now at work on the third season of "The Munsters Today," a revival of the 1960s comedy series. The original was something of a copy itself, coming as it did on the heels of the popular show "The Addams Family." It was then, and still is, a spoof of domestic family sitcoms.

The Munsters live at 1313 Mockingbird Lane in a musty Gothic mansion. Each member of the family looks like a refugee from a horror flick.

Herman, the father, is a gravedigger and dead ringer for Frankenstein's monster. Grandpa, who looks like Dracula, tinkers with inventions in the basement.

The children are Eddie, a teen-ager who seems to be on his way to turning into a werewolf, and Marilyn, a pretty young woman. In the original show, the rest of the Munsters thought Marilyn was abnormal, and pitied her.

Meriwether's Lily is a vampire. "Lily is basically your everyday mother in a sitcom," said Meriwether, who was Miss America in 1955. "She adores her children. She just looks different."

The actress reveals in the show's monstrosities. When she found a Transylvania cookbook, she bought dozens and gave them to friends.

"The show has been brought up to date," Meriwether said. "The children have changed the most.

The series features John Schuck as Herman, Howard Martin as Grandpa, Jason Marsden as Eddie and Hillary Van Dyke as Marilyn. The original show, broadcast on CBS from 1964-66, starred Fred Gwynne as Herman, Yvonne DeCarlo as Lily, Al Lewis as Grandpa, Butch Patrick as Eddie and Beverly Owen and later Pat Priest as Marilyn.

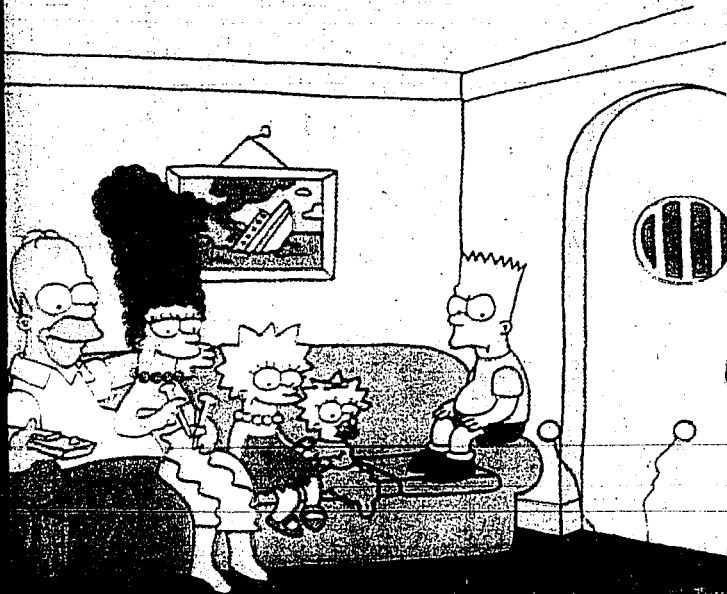

Some child development experts say 'Simpsons' are not good role models

Throughout history, self-professed guardians of the public good have tried to ban everything from booze to books. But ban Bart? Come on. Or, as the unruly star of "The Simpsons" would say: "Don't have a cow, man."

The ruckus started a couple of months back when Ohio elementary school principal Bill Krumnow asked students not to wear Bart Simpson T-shirts to school.

He said the bad boy of the Fox Sunday-night animated series sets a poor example for children, and Krumnow didn't want to see Bart the Brat celebrated in his school. Of particular concern was a T-shirt with Bart's mug on it that said "Underachiever and proud of it, man." Being an underachiever, said Krumnow, was a contradiction to good education.

The controversy would have been nothing new to Bart. As dad Homer Simpson remarked when Bart was sent to the school psychiatrist, "What do we need a psychiatrist for? We know our kid is nuts."

Krumnow, of course, isn't alone in his concern about "The Simpsons." Some parents and child development experts are bothered by a show that subverts many of the accepted norms of proper parenting and accepted child behavior. The simpleton Simpsons just aren't good role models.

Phoey on them. "The Simpsons" is wonderful satire that holds the usual TV pieties on domestic life up to much-deserved

ridicule. What the anti-Simpson crusaders ignore is that maybe Bart makes kids feel good about themselves and that his message — that it's okay to fail once in a while — isn't such a bad one. After years of perfect TV families serving up unrealistic expectations, Bart Simpson is a welcome change. In a brilliant piece of counter-programming, Fox is putting the lunch-bucket Simpson family directly opposite "Cosby" on Thursday nights.

The Simpsons were dreamed up by "Life in Hell" comic strip creator Matt Groening and began as filler between sketches on "The Tracey Ullman Show." Fox then decided to make the lunkhead family a regular series, and it premiered in January. The bug-eyed family immediately became the darling of TV critics and audiences, hitting as

high as No. 3 in the weekly Nielsen ratings. Why? The members of the cartoon family are, quite simply, the most real people on TV.

Those who look closely also know that the Simpsons — dad Homer, mom Marge, son Bart, daughter Lisa and baby Maggie — are not without redeeming values. For all of their bickering, deep down they love each other, in a two-dimensional way, of course.

And Lisa, Simpson-bashers should note, is the overachieving antithesis of Bart. T-shirt designers have even counterattacked with a Lisa T-shirt. It reads: "Overachiever and proud of it, man."

NBC steals Nielsen holiday crown, but most of the shows were reruns

NEW YORK (AP) — Four shows in NBC's Thursday night lineup — three of them reruns — were the highest-rated prime time shows for the Fourth of July holiday week, according to A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings released Tuesday.

It was the first time NBC had the top four shows since the week of Feb. 12, the network said.

It also was the week the networks began airing their summer replacement shows — usually series that weren't picked up for the fall schedules. The shows did not do well, one analyst noted.

"They put the dogs on," said David Marans, a senior researcher for the J. Walter Thompson advertising agency. "Almost without exception the public has not liked these shows."

In the overall ratings, NBC was the No. 1 network for the eighth consecutive week with a 9.0 average, but was only fractionally ahead of ABC, with an 8.9 average. CBS was third with a 7.6 average and a 16 share. The Fox Broadcasting Co. had a 6.0 average.

A rating point represents 921,000 households. A share is the percentage of all TV sets tuned to a show in

Contract killing reenactment coming soon

CLARKSTON, Wash. (AP) — An alleged contract killing in Clarkston 13 years ago will be featured on the national television program "America's Most Wanted," probably in late August.

A film crew was in Clarkston recently recreating scenes in the July 4, 1977, murder of Myrtle Boston. Five people were convicted of the crime, but the son who allegedly contracted for his mother's death, Jeffrey L. Boston, jumped bail in February 1978 and has been missing ever since.

Boston allegedly contracted with five casual acquaintances to kill his mother for \$5,000 to try to increase his share of his late father's estate.

"Generally, what we have is people who research cases. The ones that look like we can be most effective helping out, we pursue," Phillip Gonzales, program publicist for Fox Broadcasting Network in Los Angeles, said in a telephone interview.

Gonzales said the program on the Boston case probably will be shown in late August, but the schedule is not yet confirmed.

Of the 250 fugitives profiled on the show since it started in February 1988, 169 have been arrested. Of those, 112 were as a direct result of a viewer tip, Gonzales said.

Asotin County Sheriff Donald

Steele said he would be included in one scene of the program on the Boston case. The sheriff said he and other local people helped the "America's Most Wanted" crew film a Fourth of July fireworks display in Lewiston, Idaho.

The Independence Day celebration was significant in the murder case because the killers allegedly chose that time to shoot Mrs. Boston so the fireworks would mask the sound of gunshots.

Steele said filming of the case has been in the works for a year or more. The sheriff said he believes it was an FBI agent in Spokane who first contacted "America's Most Wanted" about the case.

Summer doesn't always equal reruns

Well, it's not all rerun news this morning, TV Column fans.

CBS Entertainment, for instance, announced it will finally air those three episodes of "Beauty and the Beast" that never made the schedule when the network suddenly canceled *Surface* last winter.

The episodes, which will wrap up the story of how Vincent coped following the death of Catherine when little *Surface* was born, will air Saturdays at 9 starting July 21 and conclude on Aug. 4.

We won't give away all the secrets of the Final Three Episodes. Suffice it to say that Vincent's new pal in the DA's office, Diana Bennett, gets along so well with him she's invited to the "naming ceremony" under the streets for little *Surface* and is even shown the secrets of the Tunnel World. Unfortunately, a serial killer is stalking former Tunnel dwellers now living above ground just when Fawtha — whose life hasn't been any bowl of cherries since the medical society booted him for being an anti-nuclear activist — is reunited with an old girlfriend

named Jessica (Fionnula Flanagan) and moves topside to be with her.

In sum: Vincent will have plenty to growl about in those last three episodes.

If CBS is leaving B&TB fans bereft on Saturday nights after Aug. 4, ABC Entertainment will be picking up the slack with reruns of "Twin Peaks" on Saturday nights thereafter. The weird David Lynch series returns on Sunday, Aug. 5, with a repeat of the two-hour premiere and then settles into Saturday nights starting Aug. 11 for seven more episodes.

Unlike *Beast*, new episodes of "Twin Peaks" will be back on the schedule this fall (on Saturday nights this time around) but ABC hasn't revealed just when it will premiere.

Fox Broadcasting is making some changes, too. It is expanding to Wednesday nights starting July 25 and running through Sept. 12, offering original primetime programs between 8 and 10 p.m.

The Wednesday lineup kicks off at 8 p.m. with a one-hour drama called "Glory Days," starring Brad Pitt, Spike Alexander, Evan Mirand and Nicholas Kallsen as former high school students who chose

separate ways. Fox calls it a "hard-edged, rite-of-passage program."

At 9, a half-hour program called "Molloy" will star Mahim Bialik as an idealistic, outspoken teenager who suffers the usual culture shock of a family move from New York to Beverly Hills. (This is obviously an antidote to the series in which a teenager suffers culture shock when the family moves to New York from Beverly Hills.)

Six different sitcoms will vie for attention in the last half hour of each Wednesday. They are "Hollywood Dog," starring Hank Azaria; "The World According to Straw," with Kevin Pollak; "I'm Home," with Andrea Martin; "Ghost Writer," starring Anthony Perkins; "The Bobby and Larry Show" with Biran McNamara and William Ragsdale; and "Oh, No, Not Them," with Nigel Palmer, Jackie Earle Haley and Robert Bundy.

Fox currently shows programs on Saturday, Sunday and Monday nights. This fall, it will air a Thursday-through-Monday schedule.

The Wednesday lineups this summer are getting tryouts as possible midseason replacements.
