# Civil rights bill for disabled law under Bush's signature

WASHINGTON — In a ceremony attended by the deaf and blind, paraplegics and a woman dependent on a ventilator for every breath, President Bush signed into law a landmark civil rights bill for the disabled Thursday.

"Let the shameful wall of exclusion finally come tumbling down," he said. "The Americans with Disabilities Act prohibits discrimination against handicapped persons in employment or by limiting access to public accommodations, such as restaurants, stores, museums and theaters. Employment provisions of the law will be phased in between 1992 and 1994, while the equal access measures take effect in 18 months.

Advocates of the law called it the most significant civil rights legislation since the 1964 act prohibiting discrimination based upon race, but some of those who will benefit from the measure said they have waited too long for equality under the law.

"It's a long time coming and overdue," said Leah Welch, 66, of Minneapolis, Minn., one of about 2,000 people invited to attend the signing ceremony under sunny skies on the White House's south lawn. Disabled since she contracted polio in 1949, Welch breathes with the aid of a respirator hitched behind her electric wheelchair and spoke in brief, breathy phrases about a life diminished by society's response to her disability.

"I could not get out and do things. There were many architectural barriers. I couldn't mingle. No employment opportunities," Welch said. Now she is executive director of Independence and Crossroads PCA, which provides daily living assistance to the disabled in the Twin Cities.

Welch called the new law "a beginning step" for the estimated 43 million Americans with some form of disability.

At the signing ceremony, Bush appealed to "my friends in the business community" to accept the handicapped. "You have in

# Sugar firm, union working on contract

BOISE — Company and union negotiators remained at the table Thursday night as contract talks dragged on for 2,300 workers at a four Amalgamated Sugar plants in Idaho and Oregon. A company demand that employees contribute \$57 a month toward their health-insurance premiums was the major obstacle in reaching agreement, said representatives from both sides. The contract of the American Federation of Grain Millers expires July 31 and affects plants in Twin Falls,

Burley, Nampa and Nyssa, Ore. Amalgamated Sugar had offered a 2 percent wage increase this year and next, to be followed by a 3.5 percent increase the following year. Union representatives said the \$57 a month health-care premium would erase the 2 percent raise and leave employees worse off than last year. "They want pay increases based not so much on area wages but on the company's earnings," said Tom Martin, Amalgamated's chief negotiator. "We have excellent benefits and wages." But costs for the company's health benefits have risen 29 percent the past year, he

said. "We cannot absorb that increase." Health care is the most important bargaining issue the company faces "and it's not unique to our company or our industry," Martin said. Ken Weismore of Twin Falls Local Union 283 said employees already have lost benefits from prior contracts. A 2 percent raise amounts to \$46 a month for the highest paid worker at the Twin Falls plant, he said. With \$57 a month coming out for insurance, that would put the highest paid worker \$11 a month behind. "The average man will lose between \$15

# Gem tax revenue soars

BOISE — State income tax collections were even stronger during the past budget year than analysts projected earlier this month, reinforcing expectations that Idaho's economy will remain strong.

The Andrus administration's final assessment of revenue collections during the year that ended June 30, released on Thursday, showed taxes on individual personal income rising 16.5 percent, a point and a half more than estimated two weeks ago when preliminary revenue figures were released.

The growth in that key indicator of economic health pushed total income tax collections to \$398.3 million, \$18.3 million more than lawmakers expected in January when they set the revenue targets that guided their spending decisions during the last session.

That excess revenue was also responsible for the state's third straight multimillion-dollar cash surplus. After adjustments for spending commitments in the current budget year, that uncommitted cash windfall

totalled \$13.5 million. But that surplus could grow by another \$55 million if Gov. Cecil Andrus' forecast for 10 percent revenue growth in the current year proves true.

Total revenue collections hit \$385.9 million, a 10.8 percent increase over the previous year and the second straight year of double-digit percentage growth. The slightly lower total than announced by Andrus and Auditor J.D. Williams on July 13 was due to more precise analysis of the revenue picture and an adjustment for the \$1 million loan repaid the state 11 months ago, analysts said.

The jump in income tax collections was expected in view of the persistent dramatic growth in Idaho personal income. The government reported last week that personal income in the state grew by 9.2 percent during the first three months of this year. That was fourth largest increase in the continental United States.

The other contributor to the surplus was the sales tax, which rose 10.6 percent to \$319.3 million and also exceeded expectations slightly.

# Easing of nuclear waste rules stirs hot criticism

WASHINGTON — The easing of federal controls on low-level atomic wastes poses public health concerns, the Environmental Protection Agency said Thursday, while lawmakers said the new policy could make some states into dumping grounds for radioactive garbage.

The decision last month by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to deregulate some low-level atomic wastes from laboratories, hospitals and nuclear plants came under attack at a hearing by the House Interior energy and environment subcommittee.

Rep. George Miller, D-Calif., the subcommittee chairman, accused the NRC of "coziness" with the nuclear industry and said if the commission does not re-

verse its policy Congress should protect states from being forced to accept such wastes in landfills. At least two states — including Pennsylvania and Maine — already have enacted laws specifically prohibiting radioactive wastes in conventional landfills.

Under the policy announced June 27, low-level wastes including gloves, clothing, lab equipment, dirt and even buildings and equipment at nuclear power plants can be disposed of as if they were normal garbage. If radioactive wastes are buried at a certain level, NRC Chairman Kenneth Carr told the subcommittee that the issue is one of "how safe is safe enough" and promised that "the public" will remain properly protected.

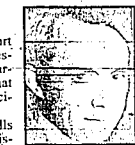
# Souter dismisses queries about old abortion letter

WASHINGTON — Supreme Court nominee David Souter brushed aside questions Thursday about a letter he wrote nearly a decade ago opposing legislation that would have forced judges to make decisions on abortions for teenagers.

Souter, making a round of courtesy calls in the Senate, told reporters he would disclose what is "constitutionally appropriate" at his confirmation hearings.

Meanwhile, one of the justices he will join if confirmed, Thurgood Marshall, said

he'd never heard of Souter before he was selected and suggested the nomination was a political move. Marshall, in a dwindling liberal minority on the court with the retirement of Justice William J. Brennan, said he didn't think President Bush had "ever stopped" running for president and "this last appointment is the epit-

ome of what he's been doing." Marshall commented in an interview Thursday night on ABC-TV's "Primetime Live."

Abortion-rights advocates said they found no encouragement in Souter's letter, although it supported their position against a restrictive abortion bill that was before the New Hampshire Legislature in 1981.

Still, the letter provided a rare glimpse at Souter's judicial actions on abortion and triggered new attempts to analyze how he would change the Supreme Court's precarious balance on the emotional issue that has

taken center stage in the debate over his confirmation.

The National Right to Life Committee, the leading anti-abortion group, said it concluded the letter "reveals nothing" about Souter's views on abortion or his legality.

President Bush's press secretary, Martin Fitzwater, said of the letter, "We have no reaction to it one way or the other." After meeting with Souter, Sen. Strom Thurmond, R-S.C., went to the White House to give Bush a progress report on how the nomination was going over on Capitol Hill.

# Partner in plant drops out

SALT LAKE CITY — Bonneville Pacific Corp. has withdrawn as one of eight corporate sponsors of the controversial Thousand Springs power project planned for northeastern Nevada.

"We will no longer be a participant in the project," said Bonneville Pacific President Robert N. Pratt, who declined to explain or provide details of the decision until Thursday afternoon.

Pratt disclosed the surprise decision when asked Wednesday about reports that the sponsors of the proposed 2,000-megawatt coal-fired plant have refused to provide additional funding for the project.

Pratt could not be reached for comment Thursday.

William Holhut, president of Great Basin Energy, said he has seen no written confirmation of Bonneville Pacific's action and was unaware of any other sponsors seeking to withdraw from the project.

The eight corporations propose building a 2,000-megawatt coal-fired power plant on Bureau of Land Management land about 25 miles north of Wells, Nev.

Great Basin Energy is a subsidiary of Sierra Pacific Resources, the manager of the Thousand Springs project.

Sierra Pacific Chairman Austin W. Stedman released a written statement last week stating that the sponsors had decided "to withhold further funding for the project, prompting a re-evaluation of the proposal."

"The company is reviewing whether to suspend funding and delay development or whether to discontinue the Thousand Springs project," the statement said. The review is expected to take about 30 days.

But the review is not unlike other reviews by sponsors of the project, said Mike Reed, spokesman for Sierra Pacific Resources.

He called the project unique because it involves a private enterprise developing power project normally pursued by utility companies.

"We don't have a ready market for the energy, which just means you proceed more cautiously," Reed said.

Besides Bonneville Pacific and Sierra Pacific, the eight sponsors include Coastal States Energy Co.

# New budget package readied; lawmakers talk of canceling recess

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House on Thursday readied a \$50 billion deficit-reduction package, including new excise taxes, increases on the deductibility of state and local income taxes and new cuts in social programs, Republican negotiators said.

Budget negotiators said they were encouraged that specific proposals were finally being discussed after 11 weeks of talks. However, they said

chances seemed to be fading for reaching accord on major differences before Congress. August recess scheduled to begin next week.

"We're at the hard stage now, trying to decide whether to stay here in August and get it done," said Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan.

House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., said there are "large and tough and difficult disagreements to bridge."

The third consecutive day of high-level budget talks at the White House got down to specific tax suggestions as administration officials circulated a new proposal among key congressional Republicans.

Although details of the package were sketchy, Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., said it included higher excise taxes on alcohol but otherwise resembled the taxes Bush proposed in his January budget.

Packwood and others said the proposal, which may be formally presented to budget negotiators Friday, consists of slightly more than \$50 billion in savings, split about evenly between new taxes and spending cuts. It also reserves Bush's call for a cut in the capital gains tax rate and proposes several minor new taxes.

The deficit in fiscal 1991, which begins Oct. 1, is expected to reach at least \$169 billion unless action is

taken. That size shortfall would trigger \$100 billion or more in spending cuts under the Gramm-Rudman deficit-reduction law, slashing most domestic programs by 40 percent and defense programs by 25 percent.

The new administration proposal would raise about \$3 billion by limiting the deductibility of state and local income taxes on federal tax returns, a GOP bargainer said. Such deductions would be limited to no more than \$10,000, said the negotiator, who asked not to be identified.

However, Gov. Mario Cuomo said the administration could balance the budget "if it raised the taxes of

wealthy Americans.

"If you want to find wealth, don't come to us and take it out of the pockets of children," Cuomo said at a news conference here with state and local officials who oppose limiting the deductibility of state and local income taxes.

The latest administration package does not include taxes on tobacco or luxury items such as jewelry, which negotiators have been considering, said the negotiator who asked not to be identified.

The official also said the package would cut benefit programs by \$16 billion.

# House reprimands Frank for using influence

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House voted Thursday to reprimand Rep. Barney Frank for using his influence on behalf of a male prostitute.

"I should have known better," the Massachusetts Democrat apologized.

The 408-18 vote, after debate that was both solemn and emotional, imposed the "lightest" punishment the full House could have given. Conservative Republicans pushed unsuccessfully for more serious penalties, either expulsion or censure.

Frank told a hushed chamber the actions he was being punished for had been taken in part to "conceal my homosexuality" at a time when he had not yet made his gay lifestyle public. He apologized, saying he knows better now "but it's a little late."

The House first voted 390-38 to reject a move by Rep. William Dannemeyer to expel Frank.

More than an hour later, it voted 287-141 against a move by GOP Whip Newt Gingrich to censure the Massachusetts congressman, a move that would have stripped him of his subcommittee chairmanship.

Rep. John T. Myers, ranking Republican on the ethics committee,

to fight to uphold the panel's recommendation for a reprimand. He said the case had nothing to do with Frank's homosexuality. "We are neither condemning today nor condoning that lifestyle," he said.

The 50-year-old Frank listened from a seat on the House floor as his fate was debated, surrounded by his Democratic colleagues from Massachusetts.

sachusetts. Other members stopped by to pat the five-term lawmaker on the back.

He said in advance he would not contest the ethics committee recommendation.

Frank has admitted using his office for fixing parking tickets for prostitute Stephen L. Gobie, and for writing a misleading memo helpful

to Gobie's probation.

"We have set aside all of the color, all of the filth, and examined the facts," Dixon said in arguing for the reprimand. "It is not Barney Frank's lifestyle that should be judged here today, but rather what he did or did not do" in his official capacity.

Another committee member, Republican Rep. Fred Grandy of Iowa, said, "We do not enhance or enshrine family values by damning individuals whose lifestyles differ from our own. We are here to prosecute, not persecute."

The House has censured 22 members in its two-century history and expelled only four. Six had been reprimanded before that action was recommended for Frank.

Dannemeyer, who needed a two-thirds vote and had not been expected to succeed in his expulsion move, asked the House, "Are there standards in our society that we will affirm for ourselves and our children? That's the issue."

Rep. Bob Dornan, R-Calif., said he had not intended to support expulsion for Frank but changed his mind. "I am going to vote for expulsion because he didn't have the honor and decency to resign," he said.

Dannemeyer accused the ethics committee of failing to see Frank as a law breaker. He said Frank knew that Gobie was operating a prostitution ring in the lawmaker's apartment, a conclusion that was contradicted by the committee's finding.

# Rate Commission against postal cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) — The independent Postal Rate Commission said Thursday that it opposes a Postal Service plan, scheduled to take effect next week, reducing some service standards.

Postal Service spokesman Michael West said his agency is studying the commission's advisory opinion. The agency is not required by law to follow the opinion, however.

Postmaster General Anthony Frank announced last January that the post office planned to tighten up

the areas scheduled for regular overnight delivery in order to provide what it hopes will be more consistent service.

The program called for switching some areas from one-day to two-day service in order to concentrate resources in the busy regions.

Frank estimated that between 5 percent and 8 percent of mail would be changed from overnight to second day or third day delivery. Local mail would not be affected.

The plan drew prompt opposition,

however, particularly since it occurred at the same time the postal service announced plans to seek higher rates, expected to take effect next spring.

Implementation of the changes was pushed back from February to June and then to the end of July.

Under the law, when the postal services makes such changes it must seek the opinion of the rate commission. The commission's opinion counseled against implementing the service cuts nationwide.

# Judge dismisses juror who called drug lords

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — A juror who reportedly phoned members of the Medellín drug cartel was kicked off a panel deciding a \$32 million money-laundering case Thursday, but the remaining 11 jurors continued deliberating.

U.S. District Judge William Hodges and attorneys discussed the matter during a closed hearing, averting a mistrial for five international bankers and a Colombian associate with the Bank of Credit and

Commerce International. One of the defendants, Arnjad Awan, has claimed to be deposed Panamanian leader Manuel Noriega's personal banker.

Attorneys learned Wednesday that one of the jurors had launched his own investigation of the case, including making telephone calls to purported members of the Colombian cartel. The Tampa Tribune reported Thursday. The numbers he dialed came from an address book

taken from the briefcase of one of the defendants, Colombian Rudolf Ambrecht, when he was arrested in a Miami motel in October 1988, the newspaper reported. Prosecutors introduced the book as evidence and testimony indicated the numbers belonged to members of the drug cartel.

The juror told at least one colleague about the telephone calls, and another member of the panel became angry, the newspaper reported.

# Asthma fatality rate increasing

ATLANTA (AP) — The nation's death rate from asthma has increased by more than 30 percent in seven years, and nearly 10 million Americans are now affected by the disease, federal health officials said Thursday.

A number of factors may contribute to the increase, the national Centers for Disease Control reported. They include exposure to infections and other "triggers" for bronchial constriction, health-care factors and air quality.

Between 1980 and 1987, the death rate from asthma in the United States rose from 1.3 per 100,000 population to 1.7, according to the CDC. The number of actual asthma deaths rose from 2,891 in 1980 to 4,360 in 1987, the latest year for which statistical analysis is available.

More Americans suffer from the chronic disease, characterized by difficulty in breathing. An estimated 9.6 million people in the United States were affected by asthma in 1987, compared with 6.8 million in 1980, the Atlanta-based CDC said in its weekly report.

The nation's asthma rate increased by 29 percent, from 31.2 cases per 1,000 people to 40.1.

The death rate for asthma was "consistently higher" for blacks than for whites, the CDC said.

For blacks, the asthma fatality rate increased 44 percent from 1980 to 1987, from 2.5 per 100,000 to 3.6 — while the white fatality rate increased 36 percent, from 1.1 to 1.5. Death rates were higher for older people, with the highest rate of asthma death — 7.9 per 100,000 in 1987 — among people 65 and older.

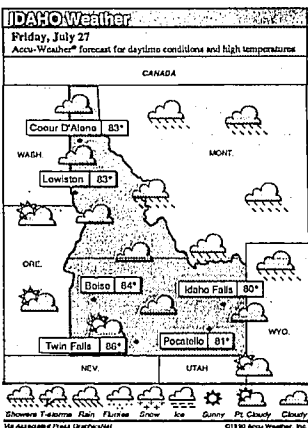
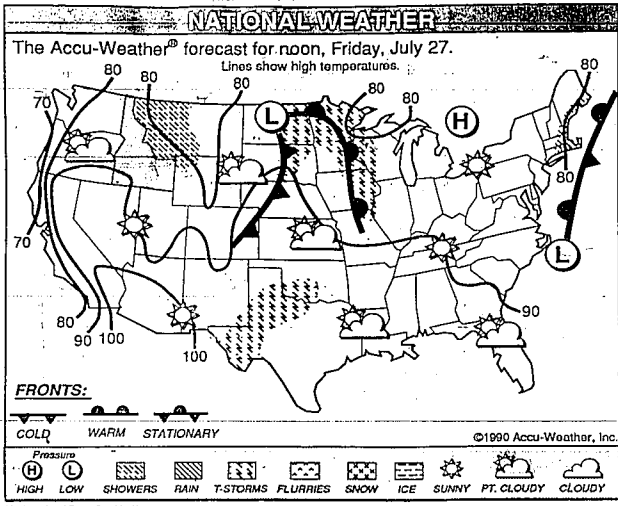

## Heavy rains bring flooding to sections of Kansas, Iowa

Heavy rain swamped parts of Kansas, Iowa, Nebraska and Minnesota on Thursday, causing flooding that closed roads and pushed rivers to their flood stage and beyond. Parts of the old highway west of Salina, Kan., were closed by flooding, and the Smoky Hill River at Ellsworth was expected to crest about 6 feet higher than flood stage. There was also flooding at Tescott, Kan., along a tributary to the Saline River. Overnight rainfall up to 7 inches, was reported across southwest Iowa. The heavy rain caused widespread flooding of rivers and streams. Up to 9 inches of rain since Wednesday morning brought the Nishnabota River out of its banks. your hands the key to the success of business," he said. Acknowledging concerns in the business community that the law may be vague, costly or lead to endless litigation, Bush said the law would be implemented cautiously.

"We have all been determined to ensure that it gives flexibility, particularly in terms of the timetable of implementation, and we've been committed to containing the costs that may be incurred," Bush said.

For example, the law provides that while new buildings must be accessible by the handicapped, barriers in existing public buildings must be removed only if it can be accomplished without much difficulty or expense.

But advocates of the disabled who attended the ceremony expressed impatience with the pace of change, saying they would press for their rights at the earliest opportunity.

"Now the work begins, and it's going to be a monumental effort," said Debra Kendrick, 42, of Atlanta, who lost the use of her legs after contracting polio.

"Just because the president signed a piece of paper doesn't mean there is going to be a mean automatic change," she said. "We're going to have to do the same hard work we've always done to ensure the implementation of that act."

Robert J. Smithdas, who has been deaf and blind since he contracted spinal meningitis at the age of 4 in 1929, took a more philosophical approach, saying there might always be discrimination against the handicapped, but the law would alleviate it.

"People seem to have a prejudice against people unlike themselves," said Smithdas, assistant director of the Helen Keller National Center for Deaf-Blind Youth and Adults in Sands Point, N.Y. "Now perhaps we have a chance to see... a beginning of (judging people) by their abilities, not disabilities."

Foster Wheeler Corp., Kidder Peabody and Co., Pittsburgh and Midway Coal, Robert L. Helms Construction and National Center and Westinghouse Electric Corp.

Bonneville's withdrawal will temporarily disrupt the sponsor arrangement, which required a large number of corporate members in order to comply with federal regulations limiting the amount of control a single company could hold.

Hollist said those regulations apply only to an operating plant. If a decision is made to proceed with the project, he said a replacement for Bonneville Pacific will be sought.

Sierra Pacific's statement provided no explanation for the sponsors' decision to withhold funding. However, the project faces strong environmental opposition and an uncertain market for its electricity.

Elected officials in Utah and Idaho have complained that approximately 60,000 tons of air pollution will be emitted from the plant each year. Much of the pollution would be blown toward Utah's Wasatch Front and southern Idaho, complicating existing air quality problems, they said.

"Thousand Springs is the wrong power plant at the wrong place for the wrong reasons," said Rep. Wayne Owens, D-Utah, in a letter sent this week to House colleagues.

## Americans With Disabilities Act: Who is Covered

The new law expanding Federal protection of the rights of disabled citizens covers most but not all disabilities:

Who counts as disabled? The law covers anyone with any physical or mental impairment that substantially limits a "major life activity" such as caring for oneself, walking, seeing, hearing, speaking, breathing, learning and working. People with a history of disability such as former cancer patients and former drug addicts would be covered.
Who is excluded? The law specifically excludes the following from its definition of disabilities: current use of illegal drugs and any mental disorder resulting from current use; homosexuality; bisexuality; transsexuals; transsexuals; sexual behavior disorders such as pedophilia, voyeurism, etc.; compulsive gamblers, pyromaniacs and kleptomaniacs.
What about AIDS? People perceived as having a disability, such as people infected with the AIDS virus, are protected under the law. A provision allowing food industry employers to reassign workers with certain diseases that can be spread by handling food does not cover people with AIDS because the government has ruled AIDS is not spread that way.

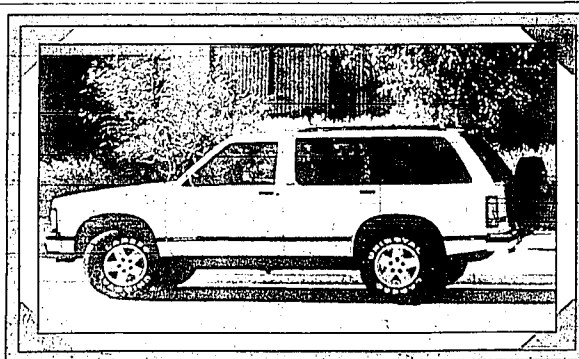

# New budget package readied; lawmakers talk of canceling recess

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House on Thursday readied a \$50 billion deficit-reduction package calling for higher alcohol taxes, limits on the deductibility of state and local income taxes and new cuts in social programs, Republican negotiators said.

Budget negotiators said they were encouraged that specific proposals were finally being discussed after 11 weeks of talks. However, they said

chances seemed to be fading for reaching accord on major differences before Congress' August recess scheduled to begin next week.

"We're at the hard stage now, trying to decide whether to stay here in August and get it done," said Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan.

House Majority Leader Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., said there are "large and tough and difficult disagreements to bridge."

The third consecutive day of high-level budget talks at the White House got down to specific tax suggestions as administration officials circulated a new proposal among key congressional Republicans.

Although details of the package were sketchy, Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., said it included higher excise taxes on alcohol but otherwise resembled the taxes Bush proposed in his January budget.

Packwood and others said the proposal, which may be formally presented to budget negotiators Friday, consists of slightly more than \$50 billion in savings, split about evenly between new taxes and spending cuts. It also renews Bush's call for a cut in the capital gains tax rate and proposes several minor new taxes.

The deficit in fiscal 1991, which begins Oct. 1, is expected to reach at least \$169 billion unless action is

taken. That size shortfall would trigger \$100 billion or more in spending cuts under the Gramm-Rudman deficit-reduction law, slashing most domestic programs by 30 percent and defense programs by 25 percent.

The new administration proposal would raise about \$3 billion by limiting the deductibility of state and local income taxes on federal tax returns, a GOP negotiator said. Such deductions would be limited to no more than \$10,000, said the negotiator, who asked not to be identified.

The latest administration package does not include taxes on tobacco or luxury items such as jewelry, which negotiators have been considering, said the negotiator who asked not to be identified.

The official also said the package would cut benefit programs by \$10 billion.

# House reprimands Frank for using influence

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House voted Thursday to reprimand Rep. Barney Frank for using his influence on behalf of a male prostitute.

"I should have known better," the Massachusetts Democrat apologized.

The 408-18 vote, after debate that was both solemn and emotional, imposed the "lightest punishment" the full House could have given. Conservative Republicans pushed unsuccessfully for more serious penalties, either expulsion or censure.

Frank told a hushed chamber the actions he was being punished for had been taken in part to "conceal my homosexuality" at a time when he had not yet made his gay lifestyle public. He apologized, saying he knows better now "but it's a little late."

The House first voted 390-38 to reject a move by Rep. William Dannemeyer to expel Frank.

More than an hour later, it voted 287-141 against a move by GOP Whip Newt Gingrich to censure the Massachusetts Democrat, a move that would have stripped him of his subcommittee chairmanship.

Rep. John F. Myers, ranking Republican on the ethics committee,

fought to uphold the panel's recommendation for a reprimand. He said the case had nothing to do with Frank's homosexuality. "We are neither condemning today nor condoning that lifestyle," he said.

The 50-year-old Frank listened from a seat on the House floor as his fate was debated, surrounded by his Democratic colleagues from Massachusetts. Other members stopped by to pat the five-term lawmaker on the back.

He said in advance he would not contest the ethics committee recommendation.

Frank has admitted using his office for fixing parking tickets for prostitute Stephen L. Goble, and for writing a misleading memo helpful

to Goble's probation.

"We have set aside all of the color, all of the filth, and examined the facts," Dixon said in arguing for the reprimand. "It is not Barney Frank's lifestyle that should be judged here today, but rather what he did or did not do" in his official capacity.

Another committee member, Republican Rep. Fred Grandy of Iowa, said, "We do not enhance or encourage family values by damning individuals whose lifestyles differ from our own. We are here to prosecute, not persecute."

The House has censured 22 members in its two-century history and expelled only four. Six had been reprimanded before that action was recommended for Frank.

Dannemeyer, who needed a two-thirds vote and had not been expected to succeed in his expulsion move, asked the House, "Are there standards in our society that we will afford for ourselves and our children? That's the issue."

Rep. Bob Dornan, R-Calif., said he had not intended to support expulsion for Frank but changed his mind. "I am going to vote for expulsion because he didn't have the honor and decency to resign," he said.

Dannemeyer accused the ethics committee of failing to see Frank as a law breaker. He said Frank knew that Goble was operating a prostitution ring in the lawmaker's apartment, a conclusion that was contradicted by the committee's finding.

# Rate Commission against postal cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) — The independent Postal Rate Commission said Thursday that it opposes a Postal Service plan, scheduled to take effect next week, reducing some service standards.

Postal Service spokesman Michael West said his agency is studying the commission's advisory opinion. The agency is not required by law to follow the opinion, however.

Postmaster General Anthony Frank announced last January that the post office planned to tighten up

the areas scheduled for regular overnight delivery in order to provide what it hopes will be more consistent service.

The program called for switching some areas from one-day to two-day service in order to concentrate resources in the busy regions.

Frank estimated that between 5 percent and 8 percent of mail would be changed from overnight to second-day or third-day delivery. Local mail would not be affected.

The plan drew prompt opposition,

however, particularly since it occurred at the same time the postal service announced plans to seek higher rates, expected to take effect next spring.

Implementation of the changes was pushed back from February to June and then to the end of July.

Under the law, when the postal services makes such changes it must seek the opinion of the rate commission. The commission's opinion counseled against implementing the service cuts nationwide.

# Judge dismisses juror who called drug lords

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — A juror who reportedly phoned members of the Medellín drug cartel was kicked off a panel deciding a \$32 million money-laundering case Thursday, but the remaining 11 jurors continued deliberating.

U.S. District Judge William Hodges and attorneys discussed the matter during a closed hearing, averting a mistrial for five international bankers and a Colombian associated with the Bank of Credit and

Commerce International. One of the defendants, Amjad Awan, has claimed to be deposed Panamanian leader Manuel Noriega's personal banker.

Attorneys learned Wednesday that one of the jurors had launched his own investigation of the case, including making telephone calls to purported members of the Colombian cartel. The Tampa Tribune reported Thursday. The numbers he dialed came from an address book

taken from the briefcase of one of the defendants, Colombian Rudolf Armbricht, when he was arrested in a Miami motel in October 1988, the newspaper reported. Prosecutors introduced the book as evidence and, testimony indicated the numbers belonged to members of the drug cartel.

The juror told at least one colleague about the telephone calls, and another member of the panel became angry, the newspaper reported.

# Asthma fatality rate increasing

ATLANTA (AP) — The nation's death rate from asthma has increased by more than 30 percent in seven years, and nearly 10 million Americans are now affected by the disease, federal health officials said Thursday.

A number of factors may contribute to the increase, the national Centers for Disease Control reported. They include exposure to infections and other "triggers" for bronchial constriction, health-care factors and air quality.

Between 1980 and 1987, the death rate from asthma in the United States rose from 1.3 per 100,000 population to 1.7, according to the CDC. The number of actual asthma deaths rose from 2,891 in 1980 to 4,360 in 1987, the latest year for which statistical analysis is available.

More Americans suffer from the chronic disease, characterized by difficulty in breathing. An estimated 9.6 million people in the United States were affected by asthma in 1987, compared with 6.8 million in 1980, the Atlanta-based CDC said in its weekly report.

The nation's asthma rate increased by 29 percent, from 31.2 cases per 1,000 people to 40.1.

"The death rate for asthma was 'consistently higher' for blacks than for whites, the CDC said.

For blacks, the asthma fatality rate increased 44 percent from 1980 to 1987 — from 2.5 per 100,000 to 3.6 — while the white fatality rate increased 36 percent, from 1.1 to 1.5.

Death rates were higher for older people, with the highest rate for asthma death — 7.9 per 100,000 in 1987 — among people 65 and older.

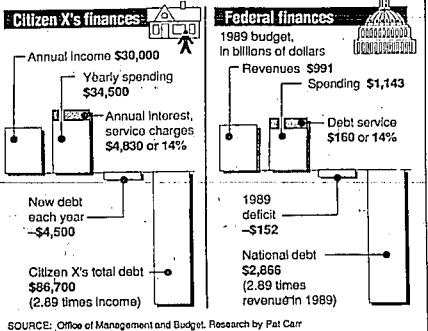

## Centrism's trap poses threat to Bush

Cuddling up to Ted Kennedy on the civil rights bill, betraying his basic Republican support on taxes, dithering on the Middle East, wavering on gun control, President Bush remains astonishingly popular.

So was Jerry Ford, for a while. Two Republican Establishment WASPs with Yale connections, straightforward, athletic, decent, patriotic, hard-working and initially plausible, they both are susceptible to ridicule. Like Lyndon Johnson, both pursued consensus through policy courses perceived as "centrist" or "moderate."

The political trap involved is not always timely detected. The trap is the waffle or wimp factor, the threat of not being taken seriously or of being ridiculed as impotent.

Now the relatively unfledged chief executive, beneficiary of Soviet collapse, rising oil prices and a wonderful wife and dog, is being tested, really for the first time, on his presidential mettle. He has responded with the nomination to the Supreme Court of David H. Souter, a man of modest reputation.

The most insidious bad counsel Bush had been getting from both ends of the partisan spectrum on his choice contained such words as "balanced" and "moderate" and even "equipoise." Freely translated, this meant pro-abortion, pro-defendant and pro-pornography.

Further, the advocates of "balance" apparently believe that it is the function of the judicial system to be indecisive, creative and unpredictable. Courts are supposed to decide, to maintain order, to make distinctions, to clarify, to define, punish and reward, and provide remedies. Courts should rarely decide from statute and precedent lest citizens

lack guides. The judicial temperament emphatically ought not to consist of procrastination and originality.

At least since the 1972 convention, the Republican platform has opposed abortion. Four Republican presidents have run on that platform and explicitly opposed abortion in their public statements.

Had one of them, Ronald Reagan, employed his peculiarly effective political talents in the 1986 senatorial election, Robert H. Bork would almost certainly be what he manifestly ought to be, a justice of the Supreme Court of the United States. No chapter in the dreary saga of the later years of the Reagan presidency is less inspiring than Reagan's failure to get Bork approved by the Senate.

But Reagan deserves credit for naming Bork, whose qualifications and abilities have survived the defamatory campaign of falsehood and deceit waged against him.

Protégé of Alexander Bickel, one-time member of the Chicago and Yale law faculties, ex-Marine, distinguished and able appellate court judge, antitrust specialist, former solicitor general of the United States, family man, authentic intellectual, strict constructionist and scholar of the intentions of the Founders, Bork was almost certainly the most distinguished and qualified appointment to the high court in recent history.

In "The Tempting of America," his book about his aborted confirmation ordeal, Bork sums up his insight on why he was rejected: "The battle was ultimately about whether

intellectual class values, which are far more egalitarian and socially permissive, which is to say left-liberal, than those of the public at large and so cannot carry elections, were to continue to be enacted into law by the Supreme Court."

The notion that Bush can ingratiate himself with the American public by waltzing to tunes played by Kennedy, Norman Lear, Molly Yard and Sens. Joseph Biden, Arlen Specter, Alan Cranston and Howard Metzenbaum simply will not compute. If Bush can with this appointment accommodate their views and those of Jesse Helms, Dr. Joe Stanton and Cardinals Law and O'Connor, he can also walk across the Potomac dry-shod.

What the president had to do to defend his and his party's integrity, not only from the Republican Right but also from his fair-weather friends in the center and in the opposition, was to appoint, in the words of his press secretary, "the most qualified candidate, a person of experience and temperament, who preferred 'a faithful interpretation of the Constitution as opposed to seeing the court as a legislative tool.'" Perhaps Souter is that man.

But if the Senate rejects Souter, the president might reconsider Bork, whose second nomination would require his adversaries to revive the scandalous drama of character assassination they produced in 1987-'88. Bork, who has been doing handsomely as a best-selling author and successful counsel for Citicorp, just might be persuaded to resume the struggle.

## To balance federal budget, let's try credit counseling

A local credit counselor has some advice for the federal government: Cut up your credit cards, hold a garage sale, and get a second job in your spare time.

Well, not literally. But Pat Richards, executive director of the Consumer Credit Counseling Service of Magic Valley, gives that kind of advice regularly to private citizens whose debt problems are comparable to Uncle Sam's.

Richards' non-profit agency currently is helping about 315 southern Idaho families sidestep bankruptcy. For a nominal fee, Richards puts them on a budget, gets their creditors off their backs and shows them hope.

Ah, if only she could do the same for Uncle Sam. With debt approaching \$2.9 trillion and no end in sight, a little hope wouldn't hurt.

We took the government's problem to Richards this week, using the figures that appear in the graphic above. "Citizen X" earns \$30,000 a year, spends \$34,500 a year, and is \$86,700 in debt.

This family is in deep trouble. But not irreversible trouble, Richards said. Believe it or not, Richards' agency actually helps people dig out of holes that deep.

So we asked her to help the X family. She agreed to play along.

To make the analogy plausible, Richards worked on the assumption that \$50,000 of the X family's debt is a home mortgage. That leaves \$36,700 in other debt — or about 122 percent of annual income.

Richards figures this family needs to pay back \$1,200 to \$1,500 a month, not counting the mortgage payment.

How to do it? First, cut spending. Chop up those credit cards, Richards said. Sell the second car if there is one. (That gets rid of one payment, and you

can use the proceeds to pay off another loan.) Buy bulk foods and cook from scratch.

And do you really need that cable TV? Next, let's look for extra income. A part-time job on the side for Mr. X-4f Mrs. X doesn't have a job already, she'd better get one. Maybe two.

Hold a garage sale to convert all expendable possessions to cash. Sell the boat.

If there are teen-agers in the X household, they'll have to get jobs to pay their own expenses. Younger kids can help by recycling cans in the neighborhood or digging worms for sale at bait.

Phew. By the time Richards is through with them, the X family has made some big life-style changes.

But Richards figures she can have the household on its feet in 31 months. It all comes down, she said, to how badly Mr. and Mrs. X want out of hock.

If we apply the Citizen X analogy to the federal government, we can foresee a nation subjected to substantial rigors. Cutbacks in services and agencies. Doing without some things we're accustomed to. Forgoing some costly military hardware.

And what's this about extra income? Why, Pat Richards! Are you suggesting tax increases?

Richards laughed at that question. "Read my lips," she said.

Richards isn't running for Congress or angling for a job with the Office of Management and Budget.

But she knows how to help families do what our federal government must learn to do soon.

It's simple, she said. Not easy, but simple.

## Empathy belly lets men be 'pregnant'

I have long thought that pregnancy is like carrying a bowling ball. At eight months, the uterus pokes out perfectly round. A bowling ball is perfectly round. A baby and its amniotic fluids are dense. A bowling ball is dead weight.

Pregnant women say carrying a baby can get to be a drag. Carrying a bowling ball can be downright painful.

As a boy, I carried a bowling ball 2 miles each way to my junior bowling league. I switched hands on the bowling bag every 90 seconds before my arm cramped and 14 pounds dropped onto my toes. I waddled through snowdrifts like a duck. My neck lurched forward like an oxen.

Some pregnant women hear this analogy and chuckle in affirmation. Others respond with a look that says, "Oh, just like a man to compare this precious being to a piece of plastic you fling with a thump down an alley to knock down other objects."

I have the courage to say this because I now have experienced a taste of motherhood. For one hour, I became pregnant. I

have worn the Empathy Belly.

The Empathy Belly is a new device found in some birthing classes and teen-age pregnancy workshops. First, you wrap a belt around your ribs until you suffocate. Then you put on a vest, with the breasts and belly of a woman who is eight months pregnant. Six pounds of lead press on your bladder. Eleven pounds of water and 14 pounds of cannon balls slosh in the belly. A 2-pound ball swings in the water to simulate a kicking baby.

This adds up to 33 pounds of pure misery. I tried on the Empathy Belly at Newton-Wellesley Hospital in Boston. Lee Gosciminski, the hospital's education coordinator, asked me what I thought.

I said, "Bowling ball."

Gosciminski became my boot-camp instructor. She asked me to tie my shoes. I almost fell forward into a somersault. I had to squat and come up by using my legs, unless

I wanted to throw out my back, just as my wife did a month ago.

Common moments became tragedies. I sneezed. The recoil of the lead weights crashing into my ribs made me feel I had just been run over by the Green Bay Packers. I lay down on a couch on my back. The vest caved in my real stomach.

As I took off the Empathy Belly and became a man again, several things occurred to me.

• One, I will try very hard to be nice to my wife.

• Two, give me a marathon any day.

• Three, some judges could use a few Empathy Bellies, too. No macho man would cheat on child support if he knew the sentence was walking around for a year with a lead vest with big belly and breasts.

"You look like you survived today in pretty good shape," Gosciminski said, "but you just wait. We have yet to deliver anything that will simulate labor and delivery."

## New dispute nearly overshadows Korean talks on ending hostility

PANMUNJOM, Korea (AP) — North and South Korea agreed Thursday to have their prime ministers meet in an unprecedented attempt to end hostility, but within an hour of signing the accord a new dispute had the nations trading insults again.

Controversy erupted after a plan by five North Koreans to cross into South Korea was scrapped because of a feud involving their accommodations while in South Korea. The name-calling, protest and rhetoric threatened to cloud the premiers' talks.

The North Korean civilians were to help plan a joint unification rally with South Korean dissidents, which is planned Aug. 15. They would have been the first civilians to cross the heavily fortified border with approval of both governments since 1985.

The Seoul government insisted the North Koreans stay in a luxury hotel, saying it was for security reasons. The North Koreans wanted to stay with South Korean dissidents at a church house, and travel in the dissidents' cars.

Eight hours after the crossing was to take place, it was effectively canceled.

North and South Korea were divided in 1945 at the end of World War II. Despite years of hostility and a three-year civil war in the early 1950s, unification of their homeland remains a cherished dream by Koreans on both sides of the border.

"A political show," said Lee Haehak, one of three South Korean dissident leaders who had gone to the village of Panmunjom to welcome the North Koreans.

"Down with (President) Roh Tae-woo who blocks unification!" the dissidents shouted after being told the border crossing was canceled. "Our desire is unification," the three sang.

Officials on both sides of the border hurried forth with explanations. "All indications compel us to doubt if North Korea really had any intentions to make (the crossing and) the rally come off as scheduled," said South Korean Unification Minister Hong Sung-chul.

He said, however: "Our door remains open."

Paik Nam Jun, North Korea's chief delegate at the prime ministers' talks, warned that disputes over the unification rally could spill over into the talks. North Korea's recent radio blasted South Korea for "poking their nose into the rally ... and laying artificial hurdles to foil."

The 19-point agreement for prime ministers' talks calls for the two sides to meet in Seoul Sept. 4-7, and again in the North's capital of Pyongyang Oct. 16-19.

By signing the accord, North Korea's Communist government granted tacit recognition to the legitimacy of the Seoul government for the first time since separate governments were formed in 1948.

"This precious fruit will open a decisive chapter in a road to ending national division and achieving peaceful unification," said South Korean chief delegate Song Han-ho.

The two prime ministers — Kang Young-hoon of South Korea and Yon Hyung-mok of North Korea — are ceremonial figureheads with little policy-making roles. But their meeting would be symbolically significant.

## OPEC preparing price hike

GENEVA (AP) — OPEC oil ministers said Thursday they had agreed to raise the cartel's price for crude oil, and OPEC's president criticized members who have driven down the price by exceeding their production quotas.

The comments were apparently directed in part at Kuwait and the United Arab Emirates, who are blamed for keeping oil prices low by cheating on their quotas.

A belligerent dispute between Kuwait and Iraq over the issue appeared to have been defused as the ministers of the 13-nation group began their regular mid-year conference.

Iraqi oil minister Issam Abdul Raheem al-Chalabi sat next to his Kuwaiti counterpart, Rashid Saleem al-Ameri, at the conference table. The two chatted and laughed before the start of the meeting.

Iraq on Thursday scaled back a weeklong intimidation campaign against Kuwait, which reportedly included a military buildup along the Iraq-Kuwait border.

Leaders of Kuwait and Iraq were scheduled to meet in Saudi Arabia this weekend to try to resolve their differences.

A ministerial source said formal agreement was near on raising OPEC's target price several dollars a barrel and setting a new production ceiling of 22.5 million barrels a day for the entire cartel.

This would be an increase over the current ceiling of 22.09 million, but far short of the 23.5 million barrels that experts say the cartel has actually been producing.

The new benchmark price is expected to be \$21 to \$22 per barrel, the source said. Iraq had hoped for \$25 a barrel.

The current \$18 target price was set in December 1986, but an oil glut sent prices down to as little as \$13.64 a barrel earlier this year.

The price rose to \$16.25 a barrel last week.

Every dollar decline or rise in the price of a barrel of oil amounts to about a five-cent change in gas prices for consumers at the pump.

The source predicted the ministers of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries would ratify the accord Friday, when formal talks resumed.

Algerian oil minister Sadek Boussena, OPEC's new president, told reporters after a two-hour midday session: "We will have a new minimum reference price."

"There are several positions but all of them are accepting higher prices," he said.

## Mongolian leader faces angry voters

ULAN BATOR, Mongolia (AP) — The nation's Communist Party chairman defended himself and his party Thursday before irate voters who demanded to know the truth behind purges and cover-ups over seven decades of authoritarian rule.

"I didn't repress anybody," the white-haired, dignified Gombosjavyn Ochirbat told about 200 people from Ulan Bator's 12th election district, where he is running for a seat in the national legislature.

The contest has become the most dramatic one in the first multiparty elections ever held in this long-isolated, Soviet-bloc nation.

It pits the 61-year-old Ochirbat, a long-time party official who stresses moderation, against a 29-year-old lawyer with no political experience who favors bold moves toward democracy and economic privatization.

On Sunday, the district's approximately 5,000 voters will decide whether Ochirbat, arguably the most powerful man in Mongolia by virtue of his party post, and also its member in the 430-seat legislature, the Great People's Hural.

"The Communist Party in Mongolia is already going down, not just the organization but the theory of communism," said

Ochirbat's opponent, Ganbold of the recently formed Party of National Progress. He decided he would be appropriate not to allow the head of the Communist Party to be a deputy.

Ochirbat became party chief in March when street protests inspired by Eastern Europe's anti-Communist "revolution" forced Mongolia's top Communists to resign. He has overseen the country's first tentative steps toward democracy, but insists it should remain socialist.

On Thursday, he shared a podium with Ganbold as District 12 held a free-wheeling meet-the-candidates night that would have been unheard of not long ago.

Residents of the impoverished, shabby district on Ulan Bator's western fringe eagerly called out questions about past purges, a recent scandal involving a public prosecutor, rumored price increases and restrictions on emigration.

"In the past (the Communist Party) made many mistakes," Ochirbat said, speaking candidly but firmly. "But we shouldn't just accuse party of mistakes. It also has done good things."

"My father also was repressed," he added. "In 1932 he was arrested with a couple of friends. I know history quite well. But we should understand the situation of that time."

## Nuclear ship suffers setback

TOKYO (AP) — In its first voyage since being grounded 16 years ago for a radiation leak, Japan's sole nuclear-powered ship suffered yet another mishap because of a faulty emergency signal, officials said Thursday.

The Mutsu's 8,242-ton nuclear reactor shut off automatically Wednesday when an emergency light indicated the temperature of the ship's primary coolant water had risen too high, said a spokesman from the Japan Atomic Energy Research Institute.

Upon investigation, however, ship officials discovered that the temperature was at the required 523 degrees and concluded that the alarm system was at fault, he said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

The official said there was no leak of radioactivity from the ship, which had been cruising in the Pacific Ocean 217 miles east of Inubozaki Point, about 60 miles east of Tokyo. The ship will continue on its course, he said. The \$673 million vessel has been plagued by a series of accidents since its maiden voyage.

## Bangladesh inundated

DHAKA, Bangladesh (AP) — Most major rivers in Bangladesh have burst their banks because of heavy rain, leaving more than 1 million people homeless, officials and news reports said Thursday.

At least 38 people drowned or died in houses which collapsed from the flooding, they said. Major roads were impassible. The Brahmaputra and Ganges rivers hit flood stage.

### Chernobyl teen victims see Denmark

COPENHAGEN, Denmark — About 100 Soviet teen-agers who were victims of the Chernobyl nuclear reactor disaster have arrived for a monthlong vacation in Denmark, newspapers said Thursday.

The children, ages 13 to 15, will spend time in outdoor scout camps and will stay a week with Danish families. Under a project of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, about 1,200 Chernobyl-area children will have holidays in western European countries this summer. The group for Denmark arrived Wednesday.

### Israeli unmanned helicopter crashes

JERUSALEM — A small, unmanned reconnaissance helicopter being developed by Israel for its navy crash-landed during a test flight, a spokeswoman said Thursday.

The crash came two days after the prototype-run Israel Aircraft Industries unveiled the government and said it had undergone a series of successful tests.

### Remains from Cambodia now in U.S.

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia — Six sets of remains that may be those of missing American servicemen were flown to the United States on Thursday after a U.S. honor guard saluted and Buddhist monks prayed to console the dead.

It was the first time since the Vietnam War ended

in April 1975 that Communist authorities in Cambodia have delivered suspected remains of those missing in action, or MIA, in Hawaii. The remains will be analyzed by the Joint Casualty Center and the Army Central Identification Laboratory, agencies that account for America's wartime missing.

### De Klerk, Mandela talk about ANC

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — President F.W. de Klerk met with Nelson Mandela Thursday in an apparent bid to convince the black leader there is a Communist conspiracy within the ranks of the African National Congress.

De Klerk summoned Mandela to Pretoria for urgent talks one day after the arrest of a senior ANC official. The official, Mac Maharaj, is also a senior member of the Communist Party.

### Waldheim meets with 2 presidents

SALZBURG, Austria — The presidents of Czechoslovakia and West Germany met Thursday with Kurt Waldheim in a break with the international diplomatic isolation imposed on the Austrian leader because of his wartime past.

Czechoslovak President Vaclav Havel indirectly criticized Waldheim, warning of the dangers of lying about the past. But a defiant Waldheim said afterward: "I didn't lie about anything."

# Andrus leery of building a new mansion

BOISE (AP) — A 23-year-old proposal to build a \$2 million governor's mansion has been revived, but it is questionable if the two prospective tenants support it.

"Almost any governor would have to say there are other things that are more needed," said former Gov. Robert Smylie. "It's a political no-no. It's the kind of thing that could be built into a non-issue of great consequence."

Republican gubernatorial candidate Roger Fairchild did not return calls on the subject, and incumbent Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus kept

the issue at arm's length.

But the chief proponent, former state Sen. Vern Brassey of Boise, is optimistic about raising \$1 million in private funds to match \$1 million in state money to build a 12,900-square-foot house.

"I've been promoting this since 1967," said the eight-term Republican lawmaker. "And I think we're very close — if we don't mess it up ourselves."

Andrus, who has his own home in Boise, said, "I'm perfectly content to live in my own house and not be embroiled in this controversy or any

other controversy about building houses."

Andrus said he discussed the matter with Brassey fairly two years ago. "I've said, 'You better go talk to the people who will most likely be living in it.' I'll be gone before it's built."

Brassey said he hopes the house, which would go on a state-owned 15-acre site in the Boise Foothills, will be built by 1992.

"We'd like to raise a million dol-

lars from the public — that'd be a dollar for every person in Idaho," said Brassey.

"Beyond just a place to live, the governor needs a place to entertain dignitaries," he said.

Rep. Kitty Gurnsey, R-Boise, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, which voted unanimously to appropriate state money for the project this year, said she supports the effort, but only if private sources pay half the bill.

#### Reserve notes not legal, court decides

BOISE — A "fractional reserve note" has no legal standing, and is not legal tender to satisfy a foreclosure proceeding, the Idaho Court of Appeals says.

The court on Thursday rejected an appeal filed by a Blackfoot couple after their farm was foreclosed to meet a judgment of \$64,530 in favor of Farm Credit Bank of Spokane.

Robert and Bethen Parsons and Robert Parsons Jr., appealed the instance of a writ of assistance, allowing the county sheriff to evict the elder Parsons after their farm was foreclosed.

#### Building's owner charged with arson

NEZPERCE — The owner of a Craigmont bowling alley that burned to the ground has been charged with first-degree arson.

David Chester Prall is scheduled to appear July 31 in Magistrate Court in Nezperce. Lewis County Sheriff Donald Fortney served a summons on Prall Tuesday, charging him with the felony crime.

Prall and his wife, Kathy, are the owners of Prairie Lanes and Deli. The building caught fire early on the morning of May 23 and was engulfed in flames by the time volunteer fire departments arrived.

#### Insects prompt plan for timber harvest

BOISE — The Payette National Forest plans to harvest 22.3 million board feet of engelmann spruce in the next two years because of an epidemic of spruce bark beetles near McCall and New Meadows.

Forest officials said the beetles have killed thousands of trees in the past several years. The plans outline four timber sales. At least two more will be planned for salvaging insect-killed trees, officials said. The sales are subject to appeal.

#### North Fork hydro developers optimistic

EMMETT — Developers of a new, improved hydroelectric project proposed for the North Fork of the Payette River say they can meet both power and recreational needs.

A couple years ago, project sponsor Gem Irrigation District of Home-Idaho and J.R. Simplot-backed Western Power Inc. announced plans for a power plant near Banks. He showed off his proposal Wednesday in Emmett. Gem Irrigation severed its ties with Western Power and has thrown in with Consolidated Pump Storage Inc. of Greenwich, Conn., and minority partner, Tacoma City Light from Washington.

#### Parties in Gem oil drilling case settle

DENVER — Denver billionaire Philip Anschutz and a wealthy Kansas businessman settled a dispute over a failed Idaho oil drilling project out of court Wednesday, attorneys for the two men said.

The dispute had turned into a legal battle that began its day in court Tuesday. Rick Jones, Anschutz's attorney, and Jay Horowitz, attorney for Kansas businessman George Ablah, said the terms of the out-of-court settlement would not be disclosed.

### Developer only voice in support of hydro project on Bear River

POCATELLO (AP) — The developer of a proposed hydroelectric plant on the Bear River in the Oneida Narrows area is defending the project from criticism that it will damage wildlife habitat.

But developer Robert Fackrell of the Sorenson-Fackrell Power Co. was the only one supporting the project Thursday during a hearing before the Bureau of Land Management's district advisory council.

Bill Davidson of the Region 5 Wildlife Council told the advisory group the hydro development could damage the habitat of rock squirrels, eliminate a wintering area for mule deer, interfere with the migratory paths for deer and elk and possible harm wintering range for bald eagles.

But Fackrell said the project had the approval of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

### Hearing set to discuss plan to help truckers

**TWIN FALLS**—A public hearing on a proposal to give the trucking industry more flexibility in meeting Idaho's regulations will be held here Monday.

The Idaho Transportation Department will conduct the hearing at 1:30 p.m. at the Canyon Spring Inn.

The proposed state legislation would allow truckers operating on the state highway system to meet one of several length restrictions.

On most of Idaho's mountainous state highways, semi-trailers are restricted to 48 feet in overall length and a 39-foot kingpin setting dimension. A kingpin setting dimension is the distance measured from the connection of the tractor and the trailer to the rear axles.

The proposed legislation will allow three different lengths depending on the curvature of the highway.

### Mountain Home listed as good place to buy property

**MOUNTAIN HOME**—Despite state worries over the future of its Air Force base, a real-estate company says the Mountain Home area is one of the 26 military markets that should be a good property investment.

## Housing shortage to continue, survey suggests

**TWIN FALLS**—The number of responses wasn't startling, but the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce concluded from early results of a recent survey that area housing shortages probably will continue through 1992.

And that residents want their own houses.

"If they do rent, they still want it in a single-family home," chamber Executive Vice President Kent Just said. "They're not as interested in multi-family housing as they may be in other communities."

About 50 percent of those looking for

rentals said they were willing to pay up to \$400 per month for rental—which is lower than most builders say they can build new temporary housing.

"New construction costs here are as high as they will be in Boise or east Idaho," Just said.

Nineteen surveys that represented 28 full-time employees were returned in response to a survey sent out with the chamber's newsletter.

The questionnaires were sent to employees, who were asked to answer the questions for their employers.

The chamber formed its housing task force after recent economic and population growth caught the Magic Valley without

enough shelter for incoming workers.

The survey, part of the task force, garnered 100 responses, few employees who need temporary housing.

The chamber didn't release the results of the respondents who need temporary housing.

"If you can't fill full-time housing needs, it's going to be virtually impossible to fill short-term needs," Just said.

Here are selected results of the questionnaire:

• Fifty-eight percent of employees who need housing want to rent a single-family house and 10 percent are looking for multi-family rentals. Thirty-two percent want to buy a single-family house.

• Of the employees who already live in rentals, 62 percent want to buy a house and 11 percent are waiting for a house to be built.

• Forty percent of the respondents were willing to pay up to \$300 per month in rent, 11 percent would pay up to \$400 per month; 5 percent were willing to pay as much as \$500; and another 5 percent were willing to pay more than \$500.

Members of the chamber's housing task force met Thursday, and Just said they expect to have a full report by the end of August.

"It's safe to say that there aren't any magic solutions," Just said. "It's going to be a tough, tough deal."

## Filer still alive in bid for rodeo

**FILER**—Twin Falls County hasn't lost the National Finals High School Rodeo yet, but the county is still in the saddle.

A committee traveled to Shawnee, Okla. this week where this year's finals are under way and corralled the rodeo's board of directors long enough to promote the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds. Now the national rodeo board's site selection committee plans a visit to Filer.

"We encouraged them to come and inspect the site during the fair this year," said Cindy Demony, manager of the Twin Falls County Fair.

Demony is optimistic about Filer's chances of hosting the event for three years, beginning in 1993.

Shawnee, Rapid City, S.D., Pueblo, Colo., and Gillette, Wyo. also are vying for the event, which organizers estimate generates \$6 million to \$8 million for the host community each year over a 10-day period.

The rodeo would bring 1,200 contestants, 1,400 horses and 6,000 support people to the area, filling 800 motel rooms and 500 RV spaces.

The site selection committee requires certain amounts of motel space, camper spaces and activities for contestants.

The Twin Falls committee bid \$278,000 for the event to be raised from ticket sales, program advertisement sales, corporate sponsorships and stall rentals.

Demony said the board was apparently impressed with the presentation, but she said members may prefer previous venues such as Pueblo and Shawnee.

Demony, Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce Director Kent Just, and Twin Falls County Commissioner Jim Fraley all made the trip, along with John and Karen Etheridge and Harold and Jeanette Peterson.

The final decision on the site won't be made until January.

## Commission clears Bellevue principal

**BELLEVUE**—Elementary school Principal Claude Ballard will retain his educator's certificate as well as his administrative position with the Blaine County School District.

But some of the Bellevue parents who began the drive to have Ballard removed from their district have vowed to continue the fight against him.

Pam Ploewman, spokeswoman for Citizen Advocate for Responsible Education, or CARE, said some parents are seeking a recall of all Blaine County School Board members.

But others are tired of the battle that has drawn lines through the middle of this town, she said. The group will choose its next step at their upcoming meeting.

Ploewman said that according to the Idaho Department of Education's director of certification, Michael Friend, the commission weighed evidence gathered during its own investigation last month, and found insufficient reasons to seek revocation of Ballard's license.

Friend and the Education Department's Roger Hanshaw, who performed the investigation, said they could not comment on the case.

A letter to the commission from CARE protesting the resignation of third-grade

teacher John Ailsen sparked the commission's investigation.

CARE charged that Ballard forced Ailsen's resignation after Ailsen began a union organization at the school.

Ballard, however, has maintained that Ailsen was encouraged not to seek renewal of his contract because he missed two sick days in May of 1989.

Ballard said he could not comment on the case, and said he had not yet received official notice from the commission.

But he did say the commission's findings were what he expected.

## State official few know campaigns on first-name basis

**TWIN FALLS**—Quick. Who is Idaho's state auditor?

Don't worry if you don't know. Even Democrat J.D. Williams concedes he probably holds the lowest profile office in all of Idaho politics.

With a job description that includes supervising payroll for 16,000 state employees, reporting to the Legislature on the financial transactions of the state and doing a year-end balance of the state's books, the state auditor is more of a paper-shuffler than a political power broker.

But the auditor's adjunct duty as a member of the State Land Board can get a mem-

ber's blood boiling.

The five member board is responsible for the direction, control and disposition of the public lands in the state.

The board sets grazing fees, which torched off a battle this spring that has yet to be resolved.

"The board has a very strong regulatory function when it comes to water, grazing,

mining and timber," Williams said Thursday during a stop on a campaign swing through southern Idaho.

Williams and Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus are in the minority on the board, which tips in the direction of the Republicans with Idaho Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans, Idaho Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa and Attorney General Jim Jones.

But that 2-3 balance may be upset this fall as Republicans and Democrats battle for the attorney general's office and state auditor.

With control of the land board within reach, Williams said he expects the Idaho Democratic Party will spend some money up what might otherwise be a low profile auditor's race.

Name recognition will be 90 percent of the battle, Williams said.

But the fight won't be as easy as slapping Williams bumper sticker on the most Idaho cars. Voters will have to get to know the Democratic candidate on a first name basis.

The reason why dates back to 1958, when Joe Williams, J.D.'s cousin, was first elected state auditor. He served for more than 30 years and had a reputation for being honest and nonpartisan. J.D. Williams said.

It seems Idahoans grew used to having a Williams in the auditor's office and Andrus saw no reason to change that custom when he appointed J.D. Williams in March 1989 to succeed his retiring cousin.

# Lab tries to explain Hazelwood blood mix-up

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A laboratory accused of mishandling blood samples taken from Exxon Valdez skipper Joseph Hazelwood issued a statement Thursday attempting to explain what happened.

Lawyers for Hazelwood said the statement left too many questions unanswered. They continued to assert that the blood testing for alcohol was botched and followed by a cover-up which denied Hazelwood his right to a fair trial earlier this year in Alaska in the nation's worst oil spill.

Cumhemen, the North Carolina parent company of ChemWest, a Sacramento laboratory that received Hazelwood's blood, acknowledged that three glass tubes containing his blood were mislabeled by a lab technician.

That took place when the tubes were received four days after the Exxon Valdez struck a reef in Alaska's Prince William Sound in March 1989, spilling 11 million gallons of crude in the nation's worst oil spill.

The lab's finding that Hazelwood's blood had a .06 alcohol content was the cornerstone of his prosecution on criminal charges.

Though a jury acquitted him of being intoxicated, the image of the drunken skipper hung over the proceedings.

Hazelwood's lawyers contend discrepancies in descriptions of the tubes in which the blood for Hazelwood's blood was shipped to California for the alcohol test suggest the lab results could be for the wrong person.

Coast Guard technician Scott M. Combs with a sample of Hazelwood's blood 10 1/2 hours after the Exxon Valdez grounding, testified in the Alaska trial and before the National Transportation Safety Board that he placed Hazelwood's blood in three 15-milliliter tubes. Two had gray stoppers and one had a red stopper, he said.

# Honduran guilty in drug agent's kidnapping

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A Honduran drug trafficker was found guilty Thursday of racketeering, kidnapping and conspiracy in the 1985 abduction of U.S. drug agent Enrique Camarena and his pilot, who were killed in Mexico.

The jury that convicted Juan Ramon Matta Ballesteros acquitted him of Camarena's murder, a crime that has strained relations between the United States and Mexico.

Matta's lawyer, Martin Stolar, said outside court the verdict was inconsistent and showed "jury confusion."

Stolar told reporters he believed testimony about drug trafficking and corruption in the Mexican government had distracted jurors from the main issue — Camarena's killing — and had created the confusion.

He said he would appeal the conviction, and asked U.S. District Judge Edward Rafeedice to overrule the jury's findings.

Matta was one of four defendants charged in the Camarena case, but the jurors did not return verdicts against the others. They didn't give a progress report on deliberations on the other three defendants, and Rafeedice told they could return Friday to resume their deliberations.

# U of U signs accord on fusion audit, review

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A financial audit and a scientific review of the University of Utah's National Cold-Fusion Institute sought by critical faculty members should begin soon, officials say.

State auditor Tom L. Allen said his office has signed an agreement with the school to determine exactly how a \$55 million fusion research appropriation by the Legislature has been spent.

The audit should be conducted within the next two weeks, and when completed will be made available to the public, Allen said.

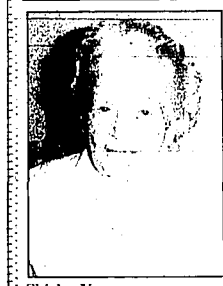
The Fusion-Energy Advisory Council, which oversees the state's investment in the controversial research, was asked to oversee both reviews.

# Utah study fails to link testing to cancer

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A study of cancer victims who lived downwind from nuclear blasts in Nevada during the 1950s fails to prove links to radioactive fallout, but does show higher death rates for leukemia in southwestern Utah stemming from the testing period.

In a copyrighted story Thursday, the Deseret News reported that the \$6.8 million study, conducted by the University of Utah, found a rate of both childhood and adult leukemia deaths that was two-to-three times the norm.

The report is to be officially released in Salt Lake City next Tuesday, the newspaper said, but quoted unidentified sources in Washington regarding elements of the study.

The U.S. House last month approved a bill creating a \$100 million trust fund to compensate downwinders for alleged radiation injuries from the atomic tests. Up to 1,300 alleged fallout victims could collect up to \$50,000 each under the legislation, now being considered by the Senate.

The bill also would pay up to \$100,000 to each of 250-350 eligible miners who worked in government uranium mines 1947-71.

The compensation legislation was

introduced in the wake of an unsuccessful class-action lawsuit alleging fallout from the tests caused sickness and death to people living downwind of the Nevada Test Site.

Utah officials, declined to comment on specifics of the study, although school spokesman John Dwan confirmed a news conference on the report had been set for 2 p.m. MDT Tuesday.

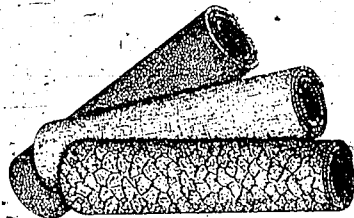
Researchers then are expected to discuss the findings of the first of their two studies, both funded by the National Cancer Institute. The first concentrates on leukemia. A second, on thyroid cancer, is to be released in a year.

The project's principal investigator is Dr. Walter Stevens, interim dean of the U of U School of Medicine. His Utah team collaborated with groups from the universities of Southern California and North Carolina.

The newspaper's sources said the findings are expected to be similar to those of a 1987 NCI study, which was based on death certificates.

The U of U's study was based on Mormon Church members who lived in southern Utah's Washington County, and the rest of the state.

# Justice Department sees no problem with Idaho gas prices

**BOISE (AP)** — The Bush administration has declined Republican Attorney General Jim Jones' request for a federal investigation into uniformly high gasoline prices in Idaho, saying most reviews have yielded no evidence of wrongdoing by major fuel refiners.

"The department shares your concern regarding the price increases of gasoline and home heating oil," James Rill, an assistant attorney general in the Justice Department's Antitrust Division, told Jones in a letter released Thursday.

"Other factors have been advanced that would explain the price increases as a result of the operation of market forces," Rill told the state's top law enforcement officer.

It was similar to the responses Jones received from five major refiners earlier this spring when he asked for an explanation of why gasoline prices around the state were rising when crude oil prices were plunging, Jones suggested an "anti-competitive atmosphere" and collusion existed within the oil industry.

"The fact is that this kind of proof doesn't just sit there on the surface for anyone to stumble over," Jones said Thursday. "It appears that the price being charged for gasoline and diesel around the country is more than it ought to be. Whether that is a result of collusion or mere greed is unknown."

But, he contended, "The federal government has a responsibility to look into the matter."

Jones, who has repeatedly questioned gasoline pricing practices during his eight years in office, first demanded the federal probe last year with two other Northwest attorneys general because of increased pump prices following the Alaskan oil spill.

He renewed the request this spring, including Republican and Democratic congressional leaders, when pump rises were on the rise again while crude oil prices were falling dramatically. At the same time he asked for an explanation from the oil companies.

"Underlying your request," L.A. Amidei of Texaco replied, "is the apparent assumption that gasoline prices should be established by reference to cost. Of course, in a free market system, prices are established by the interaction of both supply and demand, not cost."

Pump prices always rise in the spring and remain high during the summer because de-

mand is up, Amidei and others said, and the fact that all brands of gasoline tend to follow similar pricing patterns is a reflection of their reaction to the free market.

"The fact that competitive prices trend around each other is further evidence of the impact of the law of supply and demand, not evidence of collusion as you infer," Amidei said.

The lack of Justice Department interest in the issue and no response at all from congressional leaders, Jones said, leaves the matter in the hands of the states, which do not have the resources to conduct the kind of investigation needed.

## Cool, damp weather eases fire concerns — for now

Scores of firefighters mopped up the last of dozens of lightning-sparked spot fires in western and central Idaho Thursday as heavy rains and cool, foggy weather dampened dried out backcountry.

"We've received a lot of water so nothing's poked its head up yet," said Payette National Forest spokesman Duke Norfolk. "It's simplified our lives for the interim period."

But land managers remained concerned about new starts as more normal summer weather conditions returned. Some 100 firefighters were still scattered

throughout the Payette and Boise National Forests, mopping up and patrolling the remnants of dozens of fires spawned by waves of thunderstorms since Monday.

The National Weather Service, which recorded tens of thousands of lightning strikes throughout the West in recent days, said rainfall since Wednesday totaled as much as an inch or more in many areas of the backcountry. High temperatures were held in the 70s and in some areas the 60s.

But more than 200 smokejumpers and other firefighters along with helicopters and other equipment remained on standby.

## Senate backs legislation moving ahead with CRP land spraying

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Senate version of the 1990 farm bill will include legislation aimed at removing any roadblocks to spraying for grasshoppers and crickets on land idled under the long-term Conservation Reserve Program.

The provision, offered by Idaho Sen. Steve Symms who introduced independent legislation on the issue earlier this month, gives the Agriculture Department authority to initiate pest control on reserve land adjacent to commercial farm land or renege on the terms of the reserve contract with the landowner to cover spraying costs.

The measure was prompted by mounting problems in Idaho and other states with grasshoppers and Mormon crickets hatching in reserve land and then infesting adjacent crop land, damaging grain and other commodities.

Under current government programs, the cost of spraying those reserve lands is split equally among the state, the federal government and the landowner. But landowners have complained that the relatively low payments they have received for enrolling land in the long-term reserve make it uneconomical for them to spend money spraying it for pests.

"This amendment," Symms said, "gives the government and the landowner all the flexibility they need to avoid another stalemate about whose job it is to control the problem. We've provided a way for the secretary to control the pests, and we've provided a way for the landowner to control the problem and include the costs in the contract."

## Boise man new board chairman of Idaho firm

**BOISE (AP)** — Boise business executive Lawrence H. Kissler is the new board chairman for The Idaho Co.

It's the state's only business and industrial development company, and in its first year of operation made loans of \$6.2 million, creating 120 permanent and 116 temporary jobs.

Robert J. O'Connor, outgoing chairman, announced his resignation at the board's July meeting. O'Connor retired as board chairman of Idaho Power Co. last year and will remain a director of The Idaho Company.

"I feel I have contributed all that is possible as one individual in this position," O'Connor said. "A new chairman will solicit fresh ideas which are crucial to this stage of The Idaho Company's development."

Kissler is president and owner of Norco, Inc., a northwest welding, safety and medical gases supplier. He helped with the initial fund-raising for The Idaho Company in 1986 and served on the board for the last year.

Sumner Johnson, board chairman of J.-U-B Engineers, Inc., Boise and Thomas Paine, governmental relations manager for Washington Water Power Co., Spokane, were elected to the board.

## Funds for energy projects available

**BOISE (AP)** — The state of Idaho has \$68,243 to dole out in nine programs to assist energy conservation.

It's part of a \$5.6 million federal appropriation to Idaho, covering a 10-year period. "Conservation is a vital part of our efforts to reduce energy consumption," said Gov. Cecil Andrus. "This 1991 allocation will assist local governments in their energy conservation programs."

The nine programs include residential, state and local government, new commercial, existing commercial, agriculture, government and consumer information. Two new programs are development of a statewide association of institutional builders and operators and industrial audits.

## Subliminal messages work, minister testifies

**RENO, Nev. (AP)** — A subliminal tape led a Utah football team to a 1987 conference championship, a self-proclaimed champion testified Thursday in the trial against a British heavy metal rock band and CBS Records.

Eldon Taylor, a minister and maker of subliminal self-help tapes in Las Vegas, attributed Weber State's Big Sky Conference championship season to a tape produced at the request of then coach Mike Price.

"The coach indicated it would help his athletes be prepared to play football," Taylor said.

Taylor, who never finished high school and holds several doctoral degrees from correspondence schools, said the team did not have any outstanding athletes at the time; and that their championship title was proof of the power of subliminal messages.

His testimony came on the ninth day of trial in the suit filed against the rock band Judas Priest and CBS Records by two families who claim secret messages on the band's 1978 "Stained Class" album compelled their sons to shoot themselves in a deserted church playground in 1985.

Raymond Belknap, 18, died instantly from a shotgun blast to his chin. James Vance, then 20, sought the same fate, but managed only to shoot away much of his face. He lived three more years and fathered a child before dying on Thanksgiving Day 1988 of complications from his injuries and a reaction to medications.

Defense attorneys deny subliminal messages exist on the album, and counter it was the youths' disastrous lives, including histories of drug and alcohol abuse and family violence, which sealed their destinies.

"I believe subliminal content (on the album) was a causal factor in the double shooting," the witness testified.

Taylor, president of Progressive Awareness Research, Inc., in Las Vegas, also took the stand for the success of the National Judo Team, claiming to have produced a special subliminal

tape for its training purposes. "The coach and players have indicated a significant difference in competition since employing the tape," he said.

Under cross examination by defense attorney Bill Peterson, Taylor said he has marketed subliminal tapes for such things as hair loss, breast enlargement and wart removal.

## Idaho sampler cross-stitch kit turns into a hit

**TWIN FALLS** - Combining talent and timing, Deana Hoepker-Steel of Twin Falls has come up with a hot-selling original cross-stitch kit celebrating Idaho's 100th birthday.

Hoepker-Steel's Idaho sampler was featured on display during Centennial week in Boise. This weekend, it will be among the works featured at the Art Guild of Magic Valley presents its 31st Annual Art in the Park show at Twin Falls City Park.

As she did in Boise, Hoepker-Steel will dress in a costume she designed from the "Gay Nineties," the 1890s, at Art in the Park. She'll be offering kits and posters of the Idaho sampler. The intricate, 15" by 18", 47-color design sports richly detailed renditions of notable Idaho flora, fauna and lore.

Hoepker-Steel, 28, explains that she became interested in needlework at age 5 and picked up cross-stitch at 19.

Two years ago, she was shopping at the Stitching Cottage, a now-defunct shop downtown when she noticed samplers for states surrounding Idaho. The store's owner, Clara Van Holland, told Hoepker-Steel that no such kit existed for Idaho and suggested she design one.

So Hoepker-Steel went to work and came back a week later with a sketch. Her original design incorporated the state's Centennial license plate motif, but when she wrote for permission to use it, the state told her to pay \$25,000 for licensing as an official Centennial product or take it out.

Hoepker-Steel had to rip apart her design. "It discouraged me so much I threw it in the closet for a year," she recalls. But a year ago, a friend urged her to retrieve the project and finish it up, and she did.

The completed sampler included the state flower, springer, the state bird, the mountain bluebird; the state horse, the Appaloosa; the state tree, the white pine; and the state seal, which Hoepker-Steel says is the hardest part to stitch.

The design also shows the Statehouse, a rainbow trout, a skier and symbols of the state's agricultural richness. A silhouette of the state is imposed on the scene of "Here We Have Idaho," the state song.

And at the top, where the Centennial license plate motif once appeared, is a scene representing Idaho's abundant mountains and wildlife. Ironically, the design is now under consideration by the Idaho Department of Transportation for a future license plate.

The original cross-stitch project won a blue ribbon at last year's Twin Falls County Fair, and Hoepker-Steel decided she'd try and get it published. She took the proposal to the Small Business Administration. "They thought the projection sheets looked great," she says. "My only problem was money. That's about the time the Chamber of Commerce came through for me."

Hoepker-Steel was in the chamber office one day, showing the design to her friend Betty Zuck, when chamber executive director Kent Just and a representative of the Made in Idaho stores happened to spot the work.

They asked Hoepker-Steel what her plans were for the project, and she explained she wanted to market a needlework kit and - eventually - posters from the design.

But when Hoepker-Steel said she didn't yet have the money to publish, the chamber fronted her the cash and purchased the first 100 posters off the press. The budding artist also got some financial backing from her father, Jim Hoepker of Twin Falls.

Since then, the Idaho sampler has blossomed. Hoepker-Steel has sold 650 posters, 400 cross-stitch kits with all materials included and 800 leaflets describing how to stitch the design. It is being sold all over the state, and Hoepker-Steel has even received invitations to design similar sampler kits for Colorado and Utah.

Hoepker-Steel manufactures the kits in her home, with some help from her stepister, Shant Smith of Twin Falls. Leisure Arts - an international company which supplied some materials for the Idaho cross-stitch kit - recently expressed interest in buying another of Hoepker-Steel's designs, a country kitchen sampler.

Eventually, she'd like open a warehouse and design studio for her needlework, as well as a retail stitchery store downtown. For now, Hoepker-Steel runs Steel Needle Stitchery from her home and plans to teach two cross-stitch classes this fall, one for girls 9 to 15 and another for adults. ## Idaho commission chief defends NEA practices

**TWIN FALLS** - Just a few months into her new job as executive director of the Idaho Commission on the Arts, Margot Knight is on a trip around the state to explain just what it is she does.

Risky business, it might be noted, in a time of unprecedented turmoil for the arts. But Knight said she welcomes the chance to talk about the controversy over the National Endowment for the Arts.

Some legislators and conservative activists have called for the NEA's abolition, upset that it made a handful of controversial grants such as those that funded exhibitions by photographers Robert Mapplethorpe and Andres Serrano.

Indeed, Congress was to vote this week on whether to reauthorize the NEA, but Knight said she'd learned that a flurry of 26 last-minute amendments to the bill has pushed consideration of the legislation back into September.

At a luncheon meeting Wednesday with the Twin Falls Rotary Club, Knight reminded her audience that only about 20 of the 85,000 grants awarded by the NEA in its 25-year history have proven controversial.

"We should all do so well in our businesses," she told the Rotarians.

"Obscene" art "makes good" copy," she said, adding that "there's been more ink on the arts in the last six months than in the



last six years."

"I think we're adults and we can decide for ourselves what we can see," she said. She said she's been heartened to hear, for example, that conservative Sen. Orrin Hatch of Utah now says he doesn't think legislation is needed to place more limits on arts funding.

NEA grant recipients are now required to sign letters promising not to depict "sadomasochism, homoeroticism, the sexual exploitation of children or individuals engaged in sex acts and which, when taken as a whole, do not have serious literary, artistic, political or scientific merit."

"Some high-profile arts groups such as the Oregon Shakespeare Festival have rejected their grants rather than signing," Knight said she hasn't yet had to sign the disclaimer, but added that she will.

"I have no difficulty signing that statement," she told Rotary, although she noted later she will do so under protest and that she'd like to see the language removed.

Knight told the Rotarians the Twin Falls area has received \$65,000 from the state arts commission in the past two years. Recipients have included the College of Southern Idaho and its Arts on Tour program.

## Oh say can you shriek: Roseanne draws boos

**SAN DIEGO** - It was crude, even lewd. But this time fans were spared seeing where she's tattooed.

Still, many people said Thursday that Roseanne Barr was a disgrace for her shrill ranting on the national run-down at a National League baseball doubleheader and a crude on-field gesture afterward.

Chris Roberts, a sports reporter for KFI radio in Los Angeles, said: "She couldn't carry a note if she was on her way to the post office."

But others said simply: Lighten up. "She maintained the composure, caustic comedian who stars on the popular ABC-TV sitcom "Roseanne" did the best she could or may have become confused by the sound system's delay and resorted to stich."

KFI's entertainment reporter Tracy Miller said Barr was doing a parody of baseball players when she grabbed her crotch and spit after singing "The Star-Spangled Banner" at Wednesday night's games between the San Diego Padres and Cincinnati Reds.

In the stands during a World Series game in Oakland last fall, Barr bared her bottom, revealing a tattoo declaring "Tom" - her husband, Tom Arnold.

"They knew what kind of singer she

is. She's just an average singer. She's not an opera singer," Arnold told The Associated Press Thursday from the couple's Malibu home. "She did the best she could."

Barr, who wouldn't come to the telephone, was troubled by the criticism, he said.

"She's very sorry. She's very upset that people think she meant disrespect. We weren't trying to disrespect that song at all," Arnold said.

Noting the Padres won both games, Arnold added: "I think they should have her back every night. But we know that won't happen with all this grief."

In a television interview, Arnold complained that publicity about Barr has become "vicious, it's just out of control. ... It's only negative: 'Is she self-destructive?'"

"You can't call it self-destructive when it happens before you," Barr told the interviewer from NBC News. "That's like the final icing on the cake, that they do it to me and then call it self-destructive. But they do that to all women."

for 45 minutes Wednesday night and then refused to talk to reporters directly. Repeated messages left at his Los Angeles office went unanswered Thursday.

Padres officials said they fielded about 1,200 calls Thursday, most of them complaints about Barr's performance.

The team issued an apology, saying:

"The Padres recognize their obligation to ensure that the national anthem is sung with respect and dignity. It is our regret that we did not support because many fans were offended both by the rendition and Roseanne's gestures. To those fans, we apologize and make the commitment that in the future we will strive to see the anthem is presented with

the dignity it is due."

National League President Bill White said: "We have discussed it with the Padres and are in agreement with their apology. We are satisfied that they will take all necessary steps to assure it will not happen again."

Opera star Robert Merrill, who has sung the national anthem in New York's Yankee Stadium for 18 years, was among those appalled by Barr's performance.

"This woman, who obviously has no taste at all, went out to sing the national anthem and distorted the song," he said.

"It was to me like burning of the flag. It was like, 'Here I am and to hell with you.' This was a complete mockery and outlandish."

Merrill, who also has sung the anthem for nine U.S. presidents,

added: "She's a disgrace. Did you see what she did when she walked off? I almost upchucked my dinner. I was ill to my stomach. I don't know if I've ever felt that angry."

"It isn't good for baseball. Baseball is like apple pie, Cracker Jacks and peanuts. It's the national pastime. This is a national disgrace."

About 30,000 people attended the doubleheader at Jack Murphy Stadium. The club promoted the twin bill as "Working Women's Night."

"I was embarrassed for the women who showed up," said spectator Jennette Davis of San Diego. "This was supposed to be a night of saluting those who worked hard and she made us all feel like crap."

Barr, who had said last week that she wouldn't be trying for laughs when she sang the national anthem,

plugged her ears with her hands at the start of the song, then gave a wailing rendition.

When the boos rose, Barr grabbed herself and spit on the ground.

Said Padres pitcher Eric Show: "I can't believe it happened. It's an insult. There are people who died for that song. Our national anthem exemplifies a lot of things."

Barr's husband later made a ceremonial pitch, but the crowd didn't react.

gram, the Magic Valley Arts Council and many area elementary schools.

She told her audience that, without the NEA, state arts agencies couldn't afford to provide that level of support. The Idaho Commission on the Arts derives nearly half its \$1.2 million annual budget from the NEA.

"We don't decide out of the blue who we're going to give these grants to," she added. "The community has to ask for them by raising private funds to match."

Knight cited some other ways communities can support arts in their neighborhoods. She suggested that towns investigate potential performance spaces that might be going unused.

Likewise, businesses and offices with some empty wall areas might want to consider showing art. And she urged that businesses support their local arts councils, which act as clearinghouses for all local arts groups.

Knight came to Idaho this spring after five years as assistant director of the National Assembly of State Arts Agencies in Washington, D.C. Prior to that, she worked for the Washington state Commission on the Humanities and was director of Washington State University's oral history office.

She is spending two weeks traveling around the state familiarizing herself with local arts organizations and Idaho's communities. Tuesday, she was in the Sun Valley-Ketchum area, and Thursday she was slated to meet with Mindkoda Schools Superintendent Gene Snapp.

While in Twin Falls, she visited the Magic Valley Arts Council office and took a tour of the College of Southern Idaho, including stops at the Herrett Museum and summer dance camp now in progress on campus.

Mary Jane Kinney of Twin Falls, a member of the Idaho Commission on the Arts, served as Knight's guide during her stop here. Knight

also was honored Wednesday evening at a reception at the home of Alice Elwood of the Magic Valley Arts Council and her husband, Fred.

He is presently in custody in the Dallas County Jail, where he has been held for two days for "importation of controlled substances" — a felony!

counter medicines in a foreign country may be considered controlled substances in the United States.

# Swayze sees 'Ghost' as way out of 'teen idol,' 'action dude' roles

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Now you see him, now you don't. Patrick Swayze, that "Dirty Dancing" man, takes a breather from his hunk image by playing a ghost in a new romantic fantasy.

Well, you do catch a look at the Swayze physique in the early scenes of Paramount Picture's "Ghost." But then he is murdered and for the rest of the movie he struggles to communicate to his fiancée, Demi Moore,

that she is also in danger. He finds a go-between in a wacky medium, Whoopi Goldberg.

"I had to fight for the role," Swayze says. "The director, Jerry Zucker, wanted Kevin Kline. When he heard about me wanting it, he said, 'Over my dead body will Patrick Swayze play this role.'"

"They said, 'We're not going to offer you the film; you'll have to come in and read.' I said, 'OK, fine.' I went in and did six scenes. By the

time I was finished, I had the role.

"Have I auditioned before? Forever. When you get to this point (in a career) you don't often have to audition. But I sort of feel what is the point of all these years of study if you're afraid to audition?"

Swayze, who at 37 has the build of a college athlete, explained that he fought for the role because of Bruce Joel Rubin's script. "It made me cry four or five times." But after he won the role, he realized the haz-

ard of playing a ghost.

"Sam was not a real easy character to do. He read beautifully on the page, but when you start playing it, you realize he's left out in the cold a little bit. In a five- or eight-page scene, it would only deal with the characters who are living. The ghost would be standing in a corner, and the stage directions would be 'Sam watches.' 'Sam horrified.' 'Sam devastated.' 'Sam growling in anger.'"

"How do you grow in that kind of stuff? What I wanted to do was establish a progression while he has a hard time remembering he's a ghost. The process (of portraying a ghost) was interesting. It was like being Roger Rabbit and working without actors against a blue screen," he said.

Why was he so eager for "Ghost?"

"Because I had done two action movies ('Road House,' 'Next of Kin') and I didn't want to be the 'action dude,' then I had to go a different direction."

More than most of today's film stars, Swayze seems concerned about how fame affects his own stability and well being. That was part of his motivation to campaign for "Ghost."

"At that time the celebrity stuff was like blowing my mind a little bit," he said. "No matter how much you prepare yourself, for this 'stardom stuff,' I don't think you really can until it happens."

"I had been dealing with it for

quite a while, after 'The Outsiders,' then 'Red Dawn,' and especially (the miniseries) 'North and South' — that sort of blew the lid off my life, worldwide."

"Dirty Dancing? I don't even know how to categorize that. 'I felt I needed something for my insides. I needed a movie I could feel proud of promoting in the press. One that I didn't have to make excuses for because of violence or something like that. Or showing that no, I'm not really the dance guy; I really can act.' 'Ghosts' just filled the bill."

## 'Ghost' successfully combines comedy, mystery, supernatural

"Ghost" is miles removed from "Ghost Dad." In the nicest way, there are a few uneasy moments at start, but after a short spell, the lead character dies, and the movie is firmly on track. From here on, "Ghost" becomes an adroit mixture of comedy, mystery and the supernatural.

Patrick Swayze stars. He plays a bank executive who is murdered accounts at the bank are overloaded. His friend, his good buddy, tells him not to worry, that he will take care of things, and he does.

He's the bad guy, but there is never any doubt about that. The scriptwriters want you to know that, almost from the start.

After the murder, Sam Wheat (Swayze) returns as a ghost. Trouble is, no one can see or hear him, not until he meets a psychic, played by Whoopi Goldberg.

Goldberg is ideally cast. Her seer is a phony, so no one is more surprised than she when she begins to hear Wheat's voice. She has to help him, he says. She says she won't, and she goes to the dead man's girlfriend, Molly (Demi Moore) is skeptical at start, then begins to believe what she is being told.

At the same time, the bad guy, knowing he has been found out, begins to go a little crazy. Panicked, he hopes to cover his tracks. In his way

is Molly and the psychic who, as played by Goldberg, is a very funny lady.

Goldberg, though, doesn't have all the laughs. She really isn't in that much of the film, one that neatly juggles all its disparate elements and makes them into one very solid whole.

Shortly after Wheat returns in ghostly form, he discovers that he can make things move through ghostly kinetic concentration. That gives him an advantage he didn't have, and once more, it all fits, it all works. "Ghost" is not the kind of film that will have you groaning because it refuses to stay on course.

Well, there are those initial scenes when the film threatens to boggle, or at least, derail. This happens when we first meet the principals, boy and girl, who go at it in their new apartment. Much of this plays like the same old thing, in spite of the accompanying music ("Unchained Melody"). Shortly thereafter, however, Wheat is dead, and the film is very much alive.

Swayze is nicely cast as the victim who gets his revenge. The movie comes along at a good time for him.

He is badly in need of a hit. Moore is lovely and cries a lot. Goldberg is, well, Goldberg, which is good for us and the movie. The bad guy is played by Tony Goldwyn, grandson of Samuel Goldwyn, and you'll want to keep your eye on this guy. His anguish, his panic, when he learns that others have discovered that he is laundering money for his "clients" is very real.

"Ghost" may borrow a page or two from "Here Comes Mr. Jordan" (and what ghost film does not?), but it all other areas, it is original and engaging.

# Americans, Soviets perform together

SUN VALLEY — It all began when Mikhail Gorbachev ascended to power in the Soviet Union, introducing words like glasnost and perestroika — openness and restructuring — to the world's vocabulary.

One result has been a new freedom for artists behind the Iron Curtain. Idahoans will have a chance to see Soviet and American musicians perform together this Sunday at a "Glasnost Celebration," the sixth concert in the Sun Valley Music Festival series.

A total of 16 musicians — 11 Americans and five Soviets — will be on hand to play Bach's Brandenburg Concerto No. 3 and Double Violin Concerto in D minor, Mozart's Flute Quartet and Prokofiev's Piano Sonata.

Pianist Yuri Reichart, winner of the Moscow Conservatory Grand Prix, will be featured. Reichart defected from the Soviet Union 10 years ago and has now invited the Riga String Quartet from Latvia to travel to the United States for chamber music performances.

Formed in 1983, the quartet has toured Czechoslovakia, Poland and East Germany, as well as many cities in the Soviet Union. In 1988, they were prize-winners at an international quartet competition in Prague.

The Soviet performers — making their first tour of the United States in collaboration with American performers — will be joined by the Northwest Bach Ensemble, a group from Eugene, Ore.

The concert will be held on the Community School lawn. Grounds will open at 5 p.m., with the concert set to start at 6 p.m. Concertgoers are invited to bring a picnic to enjoy before the show.

# Cable company will go converter-free

their house without paying an extra fee.

TWIN FALLS — Premium cable subscribers can eliminate a few of the wires snaking around the back of their television sets as of next Wednesday.

As of Aug. 1, King Videocable will switch to a converter-free system for HBO, Cinemax, Showtime and the Disney Channel.

General Manager Vince Thompson says that, in addition to eliminating the premium converter box, the new technology used in making the switch will improve premium service picture quality and reduce trouble calls.

Beginning Wednesday, premium subscribers should disconnect the cable from their converter and plug it into their TV or VCR. Customers should return the converter to King's office during August.

Customers wishing to continue use of their remote control should bring the box into King's office so it can be reprogrammed so all channels will be received. Some customers without cable-ready sets or without VCRs that can act as converters may need to keep a converter to access all channels.

The changes have necessitated adjustments to the channel line-up. Thompson says the new line-up also reflects the re-grouping of some channels under King's decision to offer a discounted basic service package to customers wishing to pay

\$1.70-a month less for nine fewer basic channels. That package was made available June 30.

Stations that have changed positions include KAID, from Channel 4 to 11; the Family Channel, from 11 to 4; TNT, from 15 to 22; Nickelodeon, from 16 to 19; KBCI, from 17 to 29, where it shares the slot with the Travel Channel; MTV, from 18 to 26; The Weather Channel, from 19 to 25; Cinemax, from 20 to 16; HBO, from 21 to 18; Showtime, from 22 to 15; A&E, from 25 to 20; and the Discovery Channel, from 26 to 21.

Thompson says King workers will be climbing every cabled pole in the area to attach new equipment implementing the changes. "If you see someone climbing in your area that you suspect is not authorized, please feel free to call us at 733-6230 or 536-6565 to determine if we're working in your area," he adds.

Thompson, 26, of Reno, Nev., won the women's individual time trial Tuesday and also anchored the women's victorious 50-kilometer time trial Thursday.

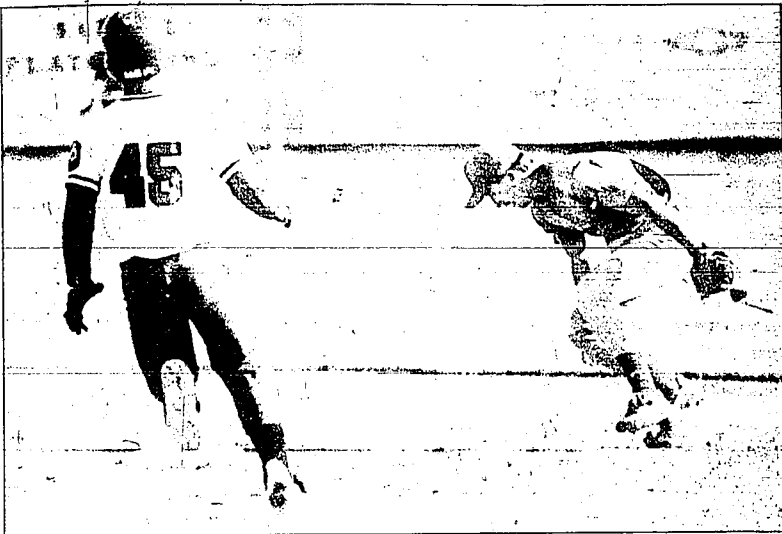

Nobody thought it would be pre-

ty, least of all the Soviets.

"The Goodwill Games tournament opener makes the USSR play against the Americans, and let them have enough time to come to their senses after the game," reads the Soviet baseball brochure.

While the United States was laying it on the Soviets at Cheney Stadium in Tacoma, the Americans at Husky Stadium were superb. Hollis Conaway, Doug Nordquist and Tony Barton scored the high jump, Sandra Farmer-Patrick had no trouble in the

400 hurdles as Americans were 1-2-3 again. Kenny Harrison took the triple jump, and the men's and women's 400 relay teams were winners.

Jackie Joyner-Kersey, who won the heptathlon here with a subpar score, has an injured right leg and might miss the rest of the season. Her husband and coach, Bob Kersee, said Thursday his wife had "a second degree strain in the right quad."

"Me being very cautious, I would assume her season is over," he said. "It might be a tear."

The Soviets did not begin to play baseball until three years ago, and there is only one baseball stadium in the entire country, in Moscow. There are no equipment manufacturers in the Soviet Union, and most of the players are converted handball players.

The Soviet baseball brochure doesn't even list positions by the players' names.

The game was stopped after the Soviets had batted seven times and still trailed by at least 10 runs.












# Worries over corporate profits push stock prices lower

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Persistent worries about corporate profits helped push stock prices lower Thursday as activity continued to slow from its recent active pace.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials dropped 10.15 to 2,920.79.

Declining issues held a slight edge as advances in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 701 up, 778 down and 524 unchanged.

Volume on the floor of the Big Board totaled 155.04 million shares, down from 163.53 million in the previous session. Nationwide, consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the

over-the-counter market, totaled 195.70 million shares.

Analysts said traders remained fearful of sudden selloffs in individual stocks in case their earnings reports fall short of expectations.

That phenomenon has occurred over the past few weeks in such big-name issues as American Telephone & Telegraph, Dow Chemical and McDonald's Corp.

On Thursday, much attention was focused on automobile stocks as major American manufacturers posted their results for the second quarter of the year.

General Motors, which posted profits of \$1.32 a share against \$2.23 in the corre-

sponding quarter of 1989, slipped 3% to 47%. Ford Motor lost 3% to 41% after the company reported second-quarter earnings of \$1.67 a share, down from \$3 a share in the like period last year.

Elsewhere, Philip Morris fell, 1% to 47% and American Brands was down 3% at 66% in a weak tobacco group.

The New Jersey Supreme Court, differing from past rulings in other courts, ruled that health warnings on cigarette packs don't shield manufacturers from product-liability suits.

Compaq Computer dropped 1% to 57% after reporting an earnings gain for the second quarter that analysts described as

slightly disappointing.

Data General slipped 1% to 7%. The company reported a \$4 million loss for the fiscal quarter ended June 30, and said it believed its hopes for a profit in the current quarter were unlikely to be fulfilled.

Energy stocks fell for the second straight session. Exxon was down 1/4 at 48%; Chevron X at 77; Mobil B at 65; Texaco X at 61% and Atlantic Richfield X at 124%.

Windmere Corp., which reported a small second-quarter profit against a loss in the comparable period last year, climbed 1/2 to 5%. Black & Decker gained 1/2 to 15%, also on a swing back to profitability for its second

quarter.

As measured by Wilshire Associates' index of more than 5,000 actively traded stocks, the market lost \$8.77 billion, or 0.26 percent, in value.

The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks, dropped .55 to 194.55.

Standard & Poor's industrial index fell 1.81 to 421.30, and S&P's 500-stock composite index was down 1.16 to 355.01. The NASDAQ composite index for the over-the-counter market slipped .02 to 445.43. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index closed at 356.33, down .62.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE BOBBY WOLFF

"Weapons are an important factor in war, but not the decisive one; it is man and not materials that count."

Today's South used the pre-emptive weapon to full advantage. His shutout tactics prevented the opponents from reaching their best spot, but he still had to play well to score the game.

Had South been dealer, most players would consider his hand too strong for a pre-empt. Opposite a passing partner, however, there was little chance of missing slam, and the pre-empt proved to be most effective. Neither opponent had any safe action; nevertheless, East-West could make a minor-suit game.

At four spades, success depends on South's play at trick two. If he fails the second diamond, East eventually scores a heart trick, and a club shift then beats the game.

To succeed, South must discard a heart on West's second high diamond. The heart shift goes to dummy's ace, and a heart is ruffed high. The trump nine is led to dummy's jack, and another heart is ruffed high, leaving two good hearts in dummy. A trump to dummy completes the job. South discards two clubs on dummy's hearts, and the defense is held to only three tricks.

Should East-West have competed over four spades? On this hand a four-no-trump takeout for minors would have worked, but that bid has little to recommend it over the long haul. The risks of a large penalty are too great for precipitous action by either West or East.

# Danson has climbed the show-business ladder to be king of barroom comedy

In 1982, Ted Danson walked into Cheers. And now everybody knows his name.

The likable leading man of the barroom comedy "Cheers" (airing Thursdays on NBC) has quietly become a film and TV actor of unexpected stature. In real life, Ted Danson is nothing at all like the show's romancing rake, Sam Malone, though he has played a surrogate Sam in "Three Men and a Baby" (and will again in the upcoming "Three Men and a Little Lady").

Now "Cheers" is entering its ninth season, and for Danson the question is: Which to concentrate on, movies or TV? It's an especially tough call because all concerned realize that, although "Cheers" still flourished after Kirstie Alley succeeded Shelley Long, it just wouldn't be "Cheers" without Sammy.

Danson himself is circumspect. "The (actors') contracts ran out the season before last (1988-89)," he says in his extremely soft voice. The new contracts were for one or two years each. "So everyone's here 'cause they've decided to be here again," Danson says. "No one's just running out a long contract." Danson, 42, signed on for the past season and the upcoming one.

This pivotal popularity pleases Danson, but it also surprises him. He'd won the part of Sam in a dead heat with Fred Dryer, now the star of "Hunter," and the well-known and respected William Devane, now on "Knots Landing." And he had actually been blacklisted by NBC president Fred Silverman after a pilot in

which he'd co-starred fared poorly in audience surveys — as did Danson himself.

Other problems at that point of his life took more of a toll. In 1979, Danson's wife, Casey, suffered a near-fatal stroke while giving birth to their daughter Kate. Danson suddenly had the awesome responsibility of caring for a newborn infant and a crippled spouse, while trying to make a living. (Casey recovered, and the Dansons adopted a second daughter, Alexis.)

His career took an upswing after the 1981 film "Body Heat," in which he played a district attorney forced to prosecute friend William Hurt for murder. The big breakthrough came early the next year, when Danson played a flamboyantly gay hairdresser in "Taxi."

Now, years later, Danson muses

that "until I'm through with 'Cheers,' I don't see myself being able to change too much. To turn around and play something drastically different takes a pretty major shift in gears."

So does that mean this year is his last? "Well," he waffles, "Georgio (Wendt, who plays Norm) talks about how it's like having won the lottery, and they pay you X amount of money per year for life. So towards the end of your life," he wonders, smiling, "are you gonna say, 'Ah, that's OK — never mind!'"

**Q:** Is there any truth to those persistent rumors that Frank Sinatra has



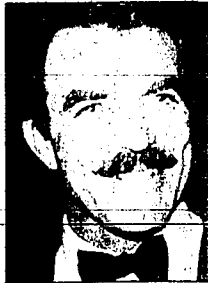

# Conboy rules over 'Santa Barbara' set

John Conboy was all smiles on the recent Daytime Emmy Awards when his "Santa Barbara" won the Emmy Award for Best Soap Opera. It was a particularly sweet victory for Mr. Conboy because he was hired not all that long ago to work his magic on the soap which has been getting low numbers for some time now.

The powers that be "came to me and asked if I would take over as exec producer on the series," said Conboy. "I told them I would, providing I could do things more or less my way and they agreed. One of the first things I did was return to the basic families of the show. I wanted them reintroduced to the canvas of the show and thereby develop an ongoing interest in whatever developments in and around the Capwell family. I also wanted to stress romance. Viewers are always open to a good love story and I feel there should always be plenty of romance, not just sexy scenes, in soaps."

Conboy has a great track record with the soaps he produced in the past. Before joining "Santa Barbara," Conboy's "Capitol" had a successful five-year run on CBS and Conboy served as exec producer for "The Young and the Restless" for nine years before that. Actually, the elegant and well spoken Mr. Conboy first became associated with daytime drama when he produced "Love Is a Many Splendored Thing" for CBS. During that time, Conboy's unerring eye cast such unknowns (at the time) as David Hasselhoff, Paul Michael Glaser, Donna Mills, David Birney, and Andrea Marcovici. Another unknown actor who got a career boost by appearing in a Conboy soap was a guy named Tom Selleck.

"David Hasselhoff was waiting for his girlfriend in a parking lot near CBS when I approached him and asked him if he was an actor," said Conboy. "When he said yes, I told him to call my office and make an appointment and we cast him within a couple of weeks. I like discovering new talent and soaps are the perfect showcase for new faces."

Getting back to "Santa Barbara," Conboy said he will be introducing an art heist storyline before long and

# Canadian mini-series, 'Love & Hate' hands a top ratings position to NBC

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Canadian Broadcasting Company's "Love & Hate: A Marriage Made in Hell," proved a happy union for America's NBC network.

The second installment of Canada's top-rated mini-series was the No. 1 show on U.S. television in ratings released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

The four-hour docudrama about one of Canada's most sensational murder cases stars Kenneth Welsh and Kate Nelligan. It was pitched to NBC programming guru Brandon Tartikoff by producer Ivan Fecan, a former NBC employee who now is Tartikoff's counterpart at CBC.

Part one of "Love & Hate" was shown on NBC a week ago and ranked sixth in the Nielsens for that period.

The peacock network also scored with the debut of "Real Life with Jane Pauley," on Tuesday at 10 p.m. The magazine-style show starring the former "Today" co-host tied for fifth place with a repeat of NBC's "Empty Nest."

The No. 2 show was a rerun of NBC's venerable "Cheers," followed by a redux of ABC's "Roseanne." ABC's prime-time

## 'Skittish' advertisers cost ABC \$14 million in revenue

LOS ANGELES (AP) — ABC lost \$14 million in advertising revenue last season to advertisers that boycotted programs they deemed offensive, network entertainment President Bob Iger said Sunday.

"It's a sorry state of affairs when advertisers are acting as skittish as they are," Iger told a news conference attended by television critics. "The networks get the heat, but I really think it should be the advertisers."

The lost revenue was slightly more than 1 percent of ABC's total advertising revenues of \$1 billion for this year, Iger said.

Iger declined to name the advertisers who withdrew their commercials, and said the \$14 million figure represented the first time ABC had counted such lost revenue since he took over as programming chief 16 months ago.

His remarks were in response to continued questioning about ABC's refusal to rerun an episode of "thirtysomething" that showed two gay men in bed talking about friends who had died from AIDS.

Iger's "economic" decision to shelve the installment was labeled as "cowardice" by gay

and lesbian groups that have launched a letter-writing protest.

Iger said Saturday he pulled the episode because half of "thirtysomething" advertisers boycotted its first showing last season, costing the network more than \$1 million.

Other shows that suffered a similar fate last season included an episode of "Roseanne" that focused on teen-age drinking, Iger said.

One sponsor pulled out of that program, Iger said. Thirty-second commercial spots on "Roseanne" usually range from \$300,000 to \$400,000, according to trade publications.

Iger's question-and-answer period with television critics also covered ABC's upcoming fall and spring schedules.

With six new shows, ABC has a smaller number of fall programs to launch than CBS or NBC. "It makes the task at hand easier," Iger said.

Of those, "Cop Rock" is probably ABC's best hope, Iger said. The new show about singing police officers has drawn a decidedly mixed response from ABC's affiliated stations.

## 'Skittish' advertisers cost ABC \$14 million in revenue

LOS ANGELES (AP) — ABC lost \$14 million in advertising revenue last season to advertisers that boycotted programs they deemed offensive, network entertainment President Bob Iger said Sunday.

"It's a sorry state of affairs when advertisers are acting as skittish as they are," Iger told a news conference attended by television critics. "The networks get the heat, but I really think it should be the advertisers."

The lost revenue was slightly more than 1 percent of ABC's total advertising revenues of \$1 billion for this year, Iger said.

Iger declined to name the advertisers who withdrew their commercials, and said the \$14 million figure represented the first time ABC had counted such lost revenue since he took over as programming chief 16 months ago.

His remarks were in response to continued questioning about ABC's refusal to rerun an episode of "thirtysomething" that showed two gay men in bed talking about friends who had died from AIDS.

Iger's "economic" decision to shelve the installment was labeled as "cowardice" by gay

and lesbian groups that have launched a letter-writing protest.

Iger said Saturday he pulled the episode because half of "thirtysomething" advertisers boycotted its first showing last season, costing the network more than \$1 million.

Other shows that suffered a similar fate last season included an episode of "Roseanne" that focused on teen-age drinking, Iger said.

One sponsor pulled out of that program, Iger said. Thirty-second commercial spots on "Roseanne" usually range from \$300,000 to \$400,000, according to trade publications.

Iger's question-and-answer period with television critics also covered ABC's upcoming fall and spring schedules.

With six new shows, ABC has a smaller number of fall programs to launch than CBS or NBC. "It makes the task at hand easier," Iger said.

Of those, "Cop Rock" is probably ABC's best hope, Iger said. The new show about singing police officers has drawn a decidedly mixed response from ABC's affiliated stations.

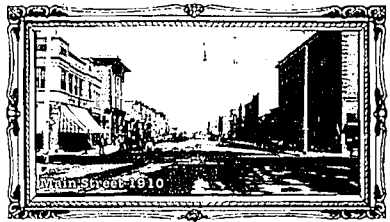
