

World condemns Iraq for takeover

KUWAIT — Iraq invaded Kuwait on Thursday after two weeks of threats and quickly consolidated its occupation of the small state.

The invading forces were in full control of the capital and Iraqi soldiers were reported surging through the southern oil fields.

Iraq warned foreign governments it would turn the rich sultanate into a "graveyard" if they came to Kuwait's aid.

The invaders, led by tanks and backed by warplanes, set up a provisional government. Diplomatic sources in the Persian Gulf estimated more than 200 Kuwaitis were killed or wounded, mainly from the government's Emiri Guard.

Kuwait's emir, Sheikh Jaber al-Ahmed al-Sabah, fled to neighboring Saudi Arabia. His government pledged in a radio broadcast early Friday to win back the country, but with the huge imbalance of armed forces that seemed impossible. Iraq has 1 million soldiers, Kuwait has 20,000.

Inaqs occupied all government buildings

in Kuwait City and strengthened their hold on the capital Friday as they moved south to the oil installations. At Mina al-Ahmedi, officials said, Iraqi soldiers swept through the oilfields early Friday, according to residents and Lloyds' insurance service in London.

Saudi Arabia issued a statement through the official Saudi Press Agency, saying it was following the situation with extreme concern.

Iraq said its troops entered at the request of revolutionaries it said had staged a coup. Kuwait and other diplomats called the coup report a charade.

The move by Iraqi President Saddam Hussein brought worldwide condemnation and sanctions.

The Soviet Union, Iraq's biggest arms supplier, said it was suspending weapons shipments to Iraq. President Bush called the invasion "unprovoked aggression." He froze control of Iraqi assets in the United States and blocked most Iraqi imports, including its most important revenue source — oil.

Other Arab states, though, failed to take action.

Invaders putting up at Sheraton

KUWAIT — Occupying Iraqi troops have adopted the Sheraton Hotel in a Kuwaiti suburb as their interim headquarters, eschewing the government buildings they seized earlier Thursday for the hotel's more comfortable lodgings.

Most people here seemed unaware that a reported revolutionary council had called for their government's ouster.

Instead, scenes from the occupied city Thursday bordered on the bizarre:

In one area of the city, about 30 Kuwaitis stood patiently in line, waiting to rent videocassette movies for the night. The

reason, in the words of one woman, is that most residents are staying at home "sitting tight."

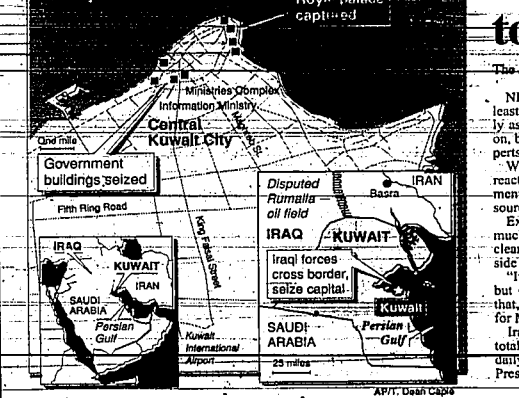
Many Kuwaiti autos have been left in the streets, some not even parked but merely abandoned as if the drivers saw the approaching troops and fled. Roads and sidewalks in parts of the city have been damaged and churned up by the hundreds of tanks that entered Kuwait.

Some of the Iraqi troops have been seen driving around the capital in newly confiscated Kuwaiti police cars.

In downtown Kuwait, the streets are largely deserted, with none of the usual bustle of taxis and buses.

Iraqi invasion will add nickel to gas prices

NEW YORK — Consumers are likely to see at least a nickel-a-gallon jump at the gas pumps as early as Labor Day, and higher heating oil prices later on, because of Iraq's invasion of Kuwait, energy experts said Thursday.

Wholesale energy prices already have soared in reaction to concern that oil production and shipments might be disrupted in the Middle East — the source of about a quarter of U.S. oil imports.

Experts say it's difficult to predict exactly how much consumer prices will rise. But they said it was clear that consistently higher costs on the wholesale side would trickle down to consumers.

"It looked like this was going to be a nice summer (Iraq President) Saddam Hussein has changed that," said Peter Beutel, a trader and vice-president for Merrill Lynch Energy Futures.

Iraq and Kuwait produce one-fifth of the OPEC total, but account for only an estimated 5 percent of daily U.S. consumption. In response to the invasion, President Bush embargoed Iraq's 588,000 barrels a

Bush declares events prove defense needs

ASPEN, Colo. — President Bush on Thursday proposed a 25 percent cut in U.S. armed forces within five years but said the invasion of Kuwait proves "the world remains a dangerous place" and that America's military must remain strong.

In a major address, President Bush said that even as armed forces grow smaller, the United States must be able to respond to global threats such as terrorism, hostage-taking, "renegade regimes and unpredictable rulers."

"Let no one, friend or foe, question this commitment," he said.

Before the speech, Bush said of possible U.S. action in response to the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait: "We're not ruling any options in but we're not ruling any options out."

On a trip cut short because of the invasion, Bush for the first time committed himself to a 25 percent reduction by 1995 in today's 2.1 million active duty personnel. He said the cutback would leave the armed forces at their lowest level since 1950.

"The threat of a Soviet invasion of Western Europe launched with little or no warning is today more remote than at any other point in this nation's history," said Bush, who has been under pressure from

Amalgamated workers reject contract offer

TWIN FALLS — Amalgamated Sugar workers in Idaho and Oregon have rejected the company's three-year contract offer and a federal mediator will intervene.

Employment contracts have been extended and workers will continue reporting as usual, a company spokesman said.

American Federation of Grain Millers Vice President Harry Guildner said Thursday that negotiations between the company and four local unions will resume Aug. 8 with the mediator in Boise.

About 2,300 workers at Amalgamated facilities in Twin Falls, Paul, Naampa and Nysaa, Ore., will be represented at the talks.

"The mediator will try to bring the partners back to the table to hammer out an agreement equitable to both sides," Guildner said. He gave no information on the margin of the vote, although local union representatives had said Wednesday evening that it appeared close.

Amalgamated Sugar spokesman Vice Jaro said the company was disappointed the contract was rejected.

"It was a very fair contract offer," Jaro said. "We're surprised they rejected it."

The company offered workers a 4 percent pay raise the first two years of the

Woman fills vacant seat on Gem appeals court

BOISE — Declaring it an historic moment for Idaho, Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday appointed Boise attorney Cathy Slitak to the state Court of Appeals, the first woman ever elevated to the Idaho appellate bench.

"We must provide more opportunities for women in the judicial branch of government," Andrus said. "I am fortunate to have been presented with the pleasant opportunity of not just appointing a woman in this case, but appointing a woman who possesses the necessary qualities of intelligence, independence and integrity."

The overriding consideration — must be, in my opinion, the quality and qualifications of the nominees," the governor said. "I have selected on that basis."

Ms. Slitak, 40, a former assistant U.S. attorney who is now an attorney for the Morrison-Knudsen Corp., is the first appointment to the three-member court since it was created in 1982. Judge Donald Burnett resigned the \$70,144-a-year post last month to become the dean of the law school at the University of Louisville.

"I've always viewed the courts as a place of great hope in our society," Ms. Slitak said. "I would hope that not just women but all people who feel they have been excluded from institutions would take courage. I hope it is a beacon of light to all people."

Andrus made his election-year selection from a slate of four nominees submitted to him less than 24 hours earlier by the seven-member Judicial Council. The others on the list winnowed from a field of 13 candidates were 4th District Judge Alan Schwartzman of Boise, Franklin County Magistrate Lowell Castleton and Idaho Falls attorney Richard S. Clair.

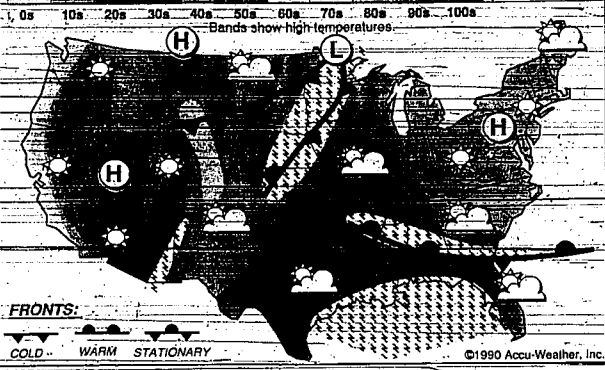

Coast-to-coast sunshine brings Florida record heat

Showers and thunderstorms were scattered from Texas to the south Atlantic coast on Thursday, but most of the nation basked under sunny and partly sunny skies.

Record heat continued across Florida, shattering records and straining electrical utilities' ability to serve residents who cranked up air conditioners.

Daytona Beach sweltered in 97-degree heat, beating its 42-year-old record for Aug. 2 by 1 degree.

Miami recorded its 13th consecutive 90-degree day Thursday, a stretch that included tying the city's all-time high of 98 degrees on Wednesday.

Scattered showers and thunderstorms fell from southern Texas through the lower Mississippi Valley to the

southern Atlantic Coast states, with showers most numerous in the valley and on the Gulf Coast.

A few showers and thunderstorms stretched from southwestern Nebraska to northern Iowa and southern Minnesota. Strong thunderstorms developed in Nebraska.

A few showers and thunderstorms also fell over northern Wyoming and southwest Texas.

Heavier rainfall during the six hours ending at 2 p.m. EDT included 1.12 inch at El Dorado, Ark.

Brisk southerly winds blew over southeastern of the southern and central Plains, and there were strong northwesterlies over New England.

Lows of 37 degrees at Roanoke, Va., and 55 degrees at Charleston, W. Va., were records for the day.

Judge holds abortion rules are sufficient

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — A federal judge rejected a state attempt to implement tougher rules for Florida's abortion clinics, saying current regulations sufficiently protect women's health.

The ruling by U.S. District Judge Jose

Gonzalez of Fort Lauderdale on Wednesday marks another setback on the abortion issue for Gov. Bob Martinez.

The Republican governor failed in October to persuade legislators to pass bills limiting access to abortions.

Senators retain B-2

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Thursday left intact President Bush's 1991 budget request for the B-2 bomber but imposed restrictions on the \$4.6-billion until critical tests on the stealth aircraft have been conducted.

By a vote of 97-2, the Senate adopted the amendment to the \$289 billion defense bill as Republicans fought to salvage the aircraft and GOP leader Bob Dole argued that Iraq's invasion of Kuwait was the "wake-up call" against deep cuts in defense spending.

Just moments later, proponents of the B-2 narrowly managed to fight off the most serious effort yet to gut the program. An amendment that would have stalled the program at 15 planes already authorized was defeated 53-45.

This just about defeats the program," Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the Armed Services Committee and a supporter of the B-2, warned shortly before the vote.

The measure's sponsor, Sen. William Cohen, R-Maine, argued against the bomber, citing the expensive cost of a single plane — \$865 million — and the Justice Department's recommendation that the manufacturer, Northrop Corp., be prohibited from future defense contracts due to fraud charges.

"Let's find what we have on line right now but no more B-2s until you prove them," Cohen said.

The Senate action comes on the heels of the House Armed Services Committee's adoption of a \$283 billion defense bill that limits production of the program at the 15 planes.

Congress to cut defense spending by reducing manpower and scrapping costly weapons systems.

With the emergence of democracy in Eastern Europe, Bush said, "the Warsaw Pact has lost its military meaning."

An official traveling with Bush said the civilian military workforce would be cut by 200,000 jobs by the mid-1990s, in addition to the 500,000-person reduction in active forces. The official also said that U.S. military bases at home and overseas "will be reduced and restructured dramatically" as part of the troop reduction.

The possibility of a 25 percent military cut has been raised previously by Defense Secretary Dick Cheney and Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, but some congressional critics say it is overly cautious.

Bush said the cuts could not be made across the board but would have to be tailored to a complete restructuring of the military.

Declaring that U.S. forces must remain strong, Bush said, "The brutal aggression launched last night against Kuwait illustrates my central thesis: Without standing the alteration in the Soviet threat, the world remains a dangerous place with serious threats to important U.S. interests."

"These threats can, as we've seen just in the last 24 hours, can arise suddenly, unpredictably and from unexpected quarters," the president said.

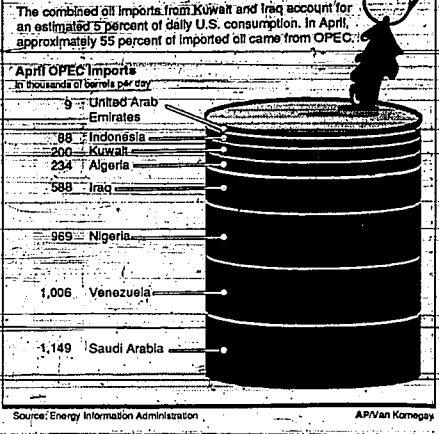

tract for West Texas Intermediate, the benchmark grade of U.S. crude, jumped \$1.57 to settle at \$23.11 a 42-gallon barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange. The contract for the crude had traded in the low \$15 range prior to this summer.

Among refined petroleum products, unleaded gasoline for September delivery settled up 3.8 cents to 68.0 cents a gallon. Heating oil settled up 3.5 cents to 64.69 cents a gallon.

The seasonal rule of thumb according to industry experts, is every dollar rise in the barrel of crude oil means a rise of two cents to a nickel per gallon at the pumps.

About 3,000 Americans are in Kuwait. A White House spokesman said no reports surfaced of American casualties.

Kuwait, through its U.S. ambassador, appealed for U.S. military intervention.

In other developments:

- The U.N. Security Council voted 14-0 to condemn the invasion and demanded immediate withdrawal of Iraqi troops. The vote carries no enforcement powers.
- The invasion created turmoil in world financial markets, with the price of oil, gold and the dollar rising steeply.

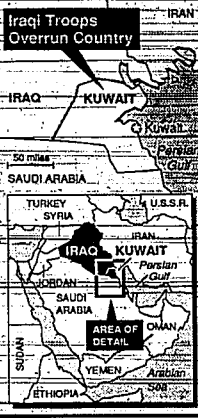

Iraqi oil influence a risk for importers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Iraqi conquest of Kuwait has worlded pulled Iraq to the top ranks of world oil powers and poses new economic risks for the United States and other countries dependent on imported oil, private analysts said Thursday.

"It was unclear whether the Iraqis would be as tiny neighbor at the northern tip of the Persian Gulf would slow or halt Kuwait's oil production, but the conflict seemed to signal an important shift in the balance of world oil power."

"Iraq being the dominant military power in the area could end up controlling a major portion of world oil supplies," said Christopher Pivth, a vice president of the Worldwatch Institute. "Just overnight it doubled its share."

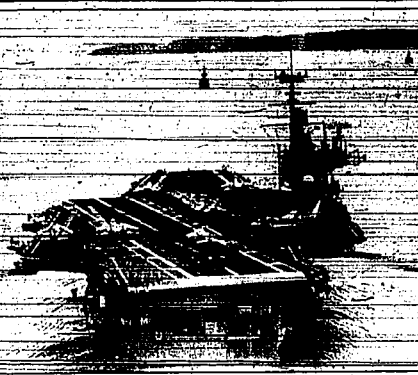
"U.S. oil production has declined rapidly over the past four years while consumption has gone up. As a result, 50 percent of oil used in the United States is imported, and many experts say that makes the country America vulnerable to manipulation of the oil market. About one-quarter of U.S. oil imports come from the Persian Gulf."

Like Kuwait, the United Arab Emirates at the southern end of the Gulf are vulnerable to Iraqi military might. The Emirates control about 100 billion barrels of oil reserves and were the recent target of Iraqi verbal assaults against excessive oil production by members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries.

The Saudis, the world's largest oil exporters and the No. 1 supplier to the United States, "are sitting there quaking in their boots" out of fear that Saddam might invade their kingdom or seek a voice in running their oil affairs, said Dillard Spriggs, president of New York-based Petroleum Analysis Ltd.

Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, said the Iraqi army might not stop at Kuwait's borders.

"If Iraq succeeds, I believe that Saudi Arabia might be next — and then Saddam Hussein would have a stranglehold on the West's oil supply," Bentsen said.

"By grabbing control of Kuwait, Iraqi President Saddam Hussein added about 84 billion barrels of oil reserves to his country's own 100 billion barrels."

That makes Iraq second only to Saudi Arabia in world ranking for oil reserves, according to the American Petroleum Institute, an industry trade group.

The Saudis, traditional close allies of Kuwait, have 255 billion barrels of oil reserves.

The United States, which relies on Iraq and Kuwait for about 5 percent

of its total oil needs, holds about 26 billion barrels of oil reserves.

President Bush signed an order Thursday banning U.S. imports of Iraqi products, including oil, and freezing control of Iraqi financial assets in the United States.

Oil prices on the world market jumped sharply in reaction to the Iraqi invasion, but Flavin and other analysts said the move was a simplification of Saddam's action and his expanded clout in the Gulf and his influence over future supplies.

Bush's chief economic adviser, Michael Boskin, told the Congressional Joint Economic Committee that the U.S. economy was not threatened by the impact of Iraq's takeover of Kuwait, even if it led to a 25 percent jump in oil prices.

Boskin conceded that such a large rise in prices would cause some economic damage in the United States, but said it would be more harmful to Japan because of its greater dependence on oil imports. Japan gets virtually all its oil from foreign sources.

Congress backs Bush stand on Iraqi move

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress moved rapidly Thursday to endorse President Bush's economic sanctions against Iraq, and some lawmakers said they would support U.S. military action if it is coordinated with allies in the Middle East.

Lawmakers said they believed the American public would support a total cutoff of U.S. economic ties with Iraq even if it meant a short-term increase in fuel prices, because of fears that an unstable ruler could gain a long-term stranglehold on Persian Gulf oil supplies.

"I'm not talking about something that could totally unravel the whole Middle East," said Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt. "Talk about the analogy of the Iraqis being like Hitler in Kuwait."

Some Democrats welcomed Bush's tough on-bargo but questioned why he had not acted sooner. They said a policy of "appeasement" by Bush and President Reagan in his predecessor's administration had allowed Iraq ruler Saddam Hussein to invade Kuwait.

"The administration, finally, this morning, as a

result of the invasion, has a good policy," said Rep. Howard Berman, D-Calif.

Berman's proposed legislation, to impose economic sanctions on Iraq, strengthened by Bush's executive order, was sent on a fast track to the House floor where it was approved 416-0.

The bill also would cut off Iraq's \$200 million in annual Export-Import Bank credits and tighten restrictions on U.S. exports that could have military and military uses.

"We want to indicate through legislation that we are in full support of the president's action," said Rep. Danie Fessell, D-Fla., chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee which was called into session to act on Berman's bill.

Berman said Americans will be willing to make economic sacrifices to show their opposition to Iraq's invasion.

"In the end, I don't think the people of the United States want to appease a bully" to ensure the uninterrupted flow of Mideast oil, Berman said. If unchoked, he said, Saddam could take "total control" of the region's oil reserves.

Poloy said it was too early to say what military steps the United States might take. But Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, held open the option of a military response.

"Together with our friends in the region, we should consider defensive military measures that might be needed to guard against any further Iraqi aggression," Bentsen said. He cautioned that "I don't foresee the need for U.S. combat involvement." Instead, Bentsen urged a worldwide embargo on purchases of Iraqi oil.

Sen. Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., and some other legislators said military action in coordination with Gulf allies eventually might be necessary.

"You're dealing with a madman here," said Dodd, likening Saddam to Adolf Hitler. "I'm not sure he's going to respond to sanctions."

Rep. Stephen Solarz, D-N.Y., said Bush had acted "boldly and comprehensively" in severing U.S. trade with Iraq and freezing the U.S. assets of Iraq and Kuwait.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Echoes of U.S. military impotence from a decade ago, when Iran held American diplomatic hostages in Teheran, rolled along Pentagon corridors Thursday as defense experts pondered the slim list of U.S. military options available following Iraq's invasion of Kuwait.

"There's thousands of Iraqi soldiers in Kuwait, now, and 100 million more just over the border," one Army officer said glumly. "There's nothing small-scale we can do to change that."

There are fewer than 6,500 U.S. troops in the region, half of whom are aboard naval vessels, according to Pentagon officials.

"U.S. intervention at this stage is of paramount importance," Kuwaiti Ambassador Sheikh Saïd Nasser al-Sabah said Thursday at his nation's embassy here.

But senior American officials endorsed the Pentagon's bleak assessment — even as the United States ordered the aircraft carrier USS Independence and the battleship USS Missouri to sail through the Indian Ocean toward the Gulf of Oman, separated

from the Persian Gulf by the Strait of Hormuz.

The carrier and her escorts arrived in the Indian Ocean earlier this week as part of a planned deployment.

"I do not think that we have a real military option at this time," Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., the chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, told NBC. "We would not want to get into a ground war in that area."

Only by missing U.S. forces on the territory of a nearby friendly nation — such as Saudi Arabia — could the United States prepare for a military assault that would have any hope of prevailing in a war with Iraq, defense officials said. "Don't hold your breath," one military officer said.

The use of U.S. military force in the region only would be likely if Iraq threatened additional nations and those nations sought U.S. help, defense officials indicated.

"In the Middle East, political and religious differences flare quickly," the Joint Chiefs of Staff said in a recent published global military assessment.

Advocacy group blasts proposed Medicare cut

WASHINGTON (AP) — An advocacy group for the elderly on Thursday said Medicare cuts under consideration by federal budget negotiators would hit the nation's sickest and poorest senior citizens the hardest.

Families USA, a non-profit advocacy group, called the proposal to raise Medicare premiums and deductibles "a wolf in sheep's clothing" that was being advanced because it was politically more acceptable than cutting Social Security cost-of-living adjustments.

The group analyzed three proposals to reduce spending on senior citizens that are under consideration by budget negotiators for the Bush administration and Congress.

The 12-week-old budget talks are aimed at producing a deficit-reduction package. One plan under consideration would increase the Medicare deductible on payments to physicians from \$75 to \$150, and raise monthly premium rates.

Phyllis Torda, health policy director for Families USA, said the Medicare cutbacks would cost elderly beneficiaries 20 percent more in 1995 than a one-year freeze in Social Security COLAs, but would be less risky politically.

"Raising the cost of Medicare is nothing more than a Social Security COLA cut in disguise," she said.

A third option under consideration would increase taxes on Social Security income for senior citizens with annual incomes of \$40,000 or more. Families USA said this plan was the fairest of the three proposals.

Torda said the release of the budget package is expected to coincide with the August congressional recess.

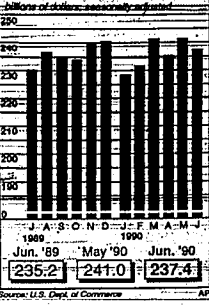

U.N. Security Council demands Iraq withdraw

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The U.N. Security Council on Thursday swiftly condemned Iraq's invasion of Kuwait and demanded an immediate troop withdrawal, but a similar swift move for U.N. sanctions was unlikely, diplomats said.

In an emergency meeting early Thursday, the Iraqi envoy told the council it had no business intervening.

He said Iraqi forces were invited to Kuwait by a new revolutionary government and would withdraw once steps to ensure restoration of peace and security.

Others dismissed the Iraqi explanation.

The 15-member council, the most powerful U.N. body, voted 14-0 — with one abstention from Yemen — to adopt a resolution calling the Iraqi action "a breach of international peace and security."

The terse, strongly worded resolution also urged Iraq and Kuwait to begin talks immediately to resolve their dispute.

It said the council would meet again "as necessary to consider further steps to ensure compliance with this resolution."

S. Korea to proceed with border opening

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korea said Thursday it would proceed with a five-day border opening in mid-August and that all citizens will be allowed to visit Communist North Korea if the North guarantees their safe return.

Unification Minister Hong Sung-chul announced details of the Aug. 13-17 border opening, and urged North Korea to support the historic project designed to promote unification of the divided peninsula.

Iraqi forces dwarf Kuwait's

Here is a comparison of the military forces of Iraq and Kuwait:

Iraq has 1.2 million men and weapons dwarf those of Kuwait. Iraq has engaged in a major defense buildup since President Saddam Hussein came to power in 1979.

Its combined military forces are estimated at 1 million, with roughly 1.2 million men and weapons.

The army encompasses five armored, two mechanized and 42 infantry divisions with 20 special forces brigades.

Equipment includes 3,500 Soviet tanks, 1,500 Chinese tanks, and 100 PT-76 light tanks according to figures from the 1989-90 Military Balance.

The air force has about 500 combat aircraft.

The planes are in large part Soviet-designed, including 30 Su-7s, 50 Su-20s, and 30 Su-25s. There are 25 MiG-25s, 18 MiG-29s and 90 MiG-23s interceptors and fighter-bombers.

Additionally, there are 40 Chinese made J-6's, 80 J-7s, as well as 64 Mirage F-1EQs with Exocet.

Military service of up to two years is compulsory for all men at 18 years of age.

On Tuesday, as Iraqi and Kuwaiti envoys met to discuss their border and oil dispute, diplomats said Iraq had massed 100,000 troops on Kuwait's border. That was more than triple the number estimated earlier.

The reported Iraqi troop buildup included hundreds of tanks and armored personnel carriers.

Kuwait has a total of about 20,300 troops in its military.

It maintains a small but well-equipped army with two armored brigades, a mechanized infantry brigade, one artillery brigade and a surface-to-surface missile battalion.

Its air force, initially a small combat force, has grown to include two squadrons with 20 Mirage F-1CK fighters, 4 F-104s and 24 A-4KU Skyhawk attack aircraft.

For most Kuwaitis, military service is compulsory for 24 months.

Japan calls for Iraqi pullout

TOKYO (AP) — Japan, heavily dependent on Persian Gulf oil, said Thursday it was greatly concerned by Iraq's invasion of Kuwait and urged Iraq to withdraw its troops.

Japan imports 99 percent of its oil and its economy has proved vulnerable to "oil shocks" sparked by Middle East conflicts.

Iraq's pre-dawn invasion of Kuwait drove down the Japanese yen and sent shares plunging on the Tokyo Stock Exchange.

Kuwait and Iraq, between them, supply 11.2 percent of Japan's oil needs.

Japan "deeply regrets" the invasion and "is watching the worsening situation with great concern," chief government spokesman Misoji Sakamoto said.

He said Japan "requests the immediate retreat of the Iraqi forces" and expressed hope the issues between the two Persian Gulf neighbors

Iran chides neighbors

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iran on Thursday chided its Persian Gulf neighbors for ignoring its warnings about dealing with Iraq, its opponent in a bitter and bloody eight-year war.

Iran's foreign ministry condemned Iraq's invasion of Kuwait and urged an immediate withdrawal of Iraqi forces.

The ministry's statement, carried by Tehran Radio and monitored in Nicosia, also warned that Iran considers the invasion a threat to regional "stability and security."

The Arab states of the Persian Gulf backed Iraq with billions of dollars in the 1980-88 war with Iran. Kuwait has been insisting on repayment of war debts.

B-2 bomber not the only winged wonder facing subsidy cuts

WASHINGTON — It normally would be hard to find a common denominator of the B-2 bomber, which a House panel this week voted to abolish, and the plight of the honeybee. But the politics of 1990 have provided one.

The debate over the 1990 farm bill has turned up a little-known fact: The government once deemed the survival of the bee not unlike the B-2, vital to U.S. national security. The same was true, improbably, of the sheep.

These farm creatures had a field day in World War II, when honey was a substitute for sugar, which was rationed, and beeswax was used to waterproof war equipment. Sheep's wool, meanwhile, was used in military uniforms.

The two won subsidies so generous that a distant cousin of the sheep — the Angora goat, whose mohair never became a strategic material — got to partake of them.

It is worth pausing to put the honey bee to the side and to remember the impression it leaves on our country, not just on the military, but on things as far-flung as goat, sheep and bee subsidies tax loopholes in

terstate highways and more — all authorized by the government in the name of stopping communism.

Needless to say, creatures that bleat, baa and buzz no longer are mainstays of the struggle for freedom.

"Honey ceased to be 'war-essential' after World War II. Wool was dropped in 1960. A 1989 Congressional Research Service paper observed: "The U.S. military is now more important to the domestic wool industry than is the domestic industry to the military."

Still, all have held fast to their federal support programs, coming up with peaceful rationales when warthoging ones failed.

Agriculture Department records show that in 1989, one Texas rancher received \$570,000 in wool and mohair payments. This tale dates to World War II. Angora goats and bees were in overdrive then, producing honey and beeswax for the troops and the masses.

The end of the war brought a honey glut

Beekkeepers buzzed plaintively around the House Agriculture Committee, which responded in 1949 with subsidies to maintain a bee population in the United States capable of doing the pollinating job.

The program was supposed to be temporary; it was predicted that farmers would one day pay beekkeepers for the use of bees to pollinate their food and fiber crops.

But 31 years later, the program survives, costing \$184 million this year, according to the Agriculture Department.

"This program serves little public purpose but to raise the income of a relatively few producers," the General Accounting Office reported recently.

Wool had a similar history. By 1953, with the Cold War raging, domestic wool production was sagging.

War planners worried that the country produced only half the wool the Army would need in a repeat of World War II. Then came the National Wool Act of 1954: "It is hereby declared to be the policy of Congress as a measure of national security and in promotion of the general economic

welfare" that wool needs federal subsidies.

The declaration did not mention mohair, but it got into the support program anyway, over the personal opposition of President Eisenhower, because the Texas-based industry was nurturing and had powerful supporters.

The program dropped wool from its strategic materials list in 1960 without explanation.

But the wool and mohair lobby has proved expert at changing rationales with the times.

During the energy crisis, in 1977, wool was designated an "energy-efficient commodity."

A congressional farm expert also observed that, like many farm subsidies, the wool program is viewed as essential to a way of life. All of this politicking might have been in stride to those hoping to save the B-2, but not the politics of rampant deficits — dragged even the honey, wool and mohair crowds to the 1990 chopping block.

The Senate voted to phase out the honey program — which is to some beekkeepers what the B-2 is to Northrop — and both

houses have voted small curbs on the wool and mohair program.

"The honey-moon is over," declared Rep. Silvio O. Conte, R-Mass., in an uproarious attack on the honey program.

Interestingly, one of honey's defenders, House Agriculture Committee Chairman B. "Kika" de la Garza, D-Texas, tried to play it off against none other than the B-2: "Good gosh, the honey program! It had ... toilet seats in the B-2s that cost more than the honey program."

And some have said that doing in honey, wool and mohair without reforming overall farm policy would be comparable to dismantling cheaper toilets in the B-2 and leaving the rest of the bomber intact.

Still, critics have suggested that bees have an option the B-2 obviously doesn't.

Said Rep. Richard K. Armey, R-Texas: "We are only saying to this wonderful creature of God's world of nature, we believe you can fly on your own."

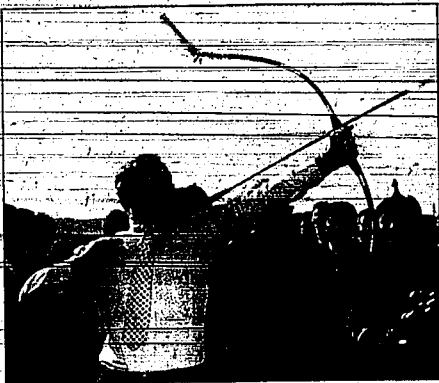

Baker toasts Mongolian reforms but Kuwait invasion cuts his visit

ULAN BATOR, Mongolia (AP) — Secretary of State James A. Baker III on Thursday toasts the recent democratic reforms in this long-time Soviet client state in the first visit of a top American official since 1949. Baker announced he would return to Washington two days early, on Friday, because of Iraq's invasion of Kuwait. Baker had planned to take a private hunting and fishing trip in the Gobi Desert.

"Although it really breaks my heart to say this I think I should return home but maybe this will give me an excuse to return (to Mongolia)," he said of a Mongolian government banquet he made his decision after conferring with President Bush. The banquet began an hour late, apparently because of the lengthy phone call.

During a short speech at the banquet, Baker praised Mongolian recent democratic reforms, which include free-market reforms and multiparty elections.

"Your government and your people are moving forward together toward a common goal of greater democracy, greater protection of human rights and economic reform," he said. "You have joined many countries around the world on the road to reform."

After arriving Thursday, Baker signed an agreement to send Peace Corps volunteers to teach English, along with accords on trade and consular services.

He also attended a festival of Mongolian culture, and watched Mongolian wrestling, horse races and an archery competition. He shot three arrows himself; two came close to the target and one fell far

short. Baker, on a four-nation Asian tour, arrived from Irkutsk in the Soviet Union, where he and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze discussed a third U.S.-Soviet summit, arms control and the civil war in Afghanistan.

At a joint news conference, Shevardnadze said the Soviet Union would cease production of its rail-based mobile intercontinental ballistic missile, the SS-24.

The United States does not deploy such missiles and their presence in the Soviet arsenal has been an im-

pediment to U.S.-Soviet strategic arms talks.

In Ulan Bator, Baker held successive meetings with President Punsalmaagiin Ochirbat, Prime Minister Sharavyn Gulandorg and Communist Party Chairman Gombojavyn Ochirbat. The two Ochirbats are unrelated.

"We are very heartened by the peaceful emergence of democracy in Mongolia," he said before talks with the president. "We have expressed our desire to continue to support political and economic reforms in Mongolia."

Indian prime minister wins backing

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Prime Minister V.P. Singh on Thursday won crucial support for firing his powerful deputy, staving off a vote that would have ended an often-tumultuous political arena could bring down the government.

Devi Lal, a popular rural politician who was the No. 2 man in the government until his dismissal from the Cabinet Wednesday, said he would return to power, but the vote did not try to divide the governing Janata Dal party.

"It has been my luck that whenever I have been cornered, I have returned stronger," said the 76-year-old farmer. "I will continue to be in my party ... as I am convinced that only my party can fulfill the material

and democratic aspirations of the rural people."

Singh ordered Devi Lal's dismissal from the post of deputy prime minister for circulating an allegedly forged letter that accused a Cabinet rival of accepting kickbacks from multinational firms.

He also criticized Devi Lal's interview with a weekly news magazine, in which the former deputy prime minister called Singh "spineless" and described other Cabinet ministers as "wimps and cheerleaders."

There was wide support from party leaders for Singh's move and little opposition, even from supporters of Devi Lal. Biju Ranaik, a senior Janata Dal leader considered close to Devi Lal, said he "fully endorsed"

the deputy premier's removal.

"The prime minister had no other option than to sack him," said Patnaik, the chief minister of the eastern state of Orissa.

Janata Dal President Somappa Rayappa Bommai said Singh consulted him before firing Devi Lal and that he had agreed to the decision.

Analysis here previously said his split in the Janata Dal, which holds only 142 of the 542 seats in Parliament, could bring down the government. But there were no indications of an impending split. The party is the largest constituent of the National Front coalition and is supported by a right-wing Hindu fundamentalist group and leftist parties.

Bus driver gets 190 years

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (AP) — A bus driver has been sentenced to a record 190 years in prison for causing the deaths of 28 schoolchildren and 10 others in a 1989 accident, court officials said Thursday.

The High Court on Wednesday found driver Sriyan Ananda guilty of homicide on at least 38 counts of rash and negligent driving, said the officials who cannot be identified under standing regulations.

The accident happened Jan. 17, 1989, when a bus failed to stop at a rail crossing and drove into the path of a speeding train at Anugala, 45 miles south of Colombo.

Philippine rebels release Peace Corps volunteer

BACOLOD, Philippines (AP) — An American Peace Corps worker freed Thursday after being held 50 days by Communist rebels said he was tired, happy and eager to get home.

Timothy Swanson, 26, of Cheyenne, Wyo., was handed over to a Red Cross team in a rural area on the central Philippine island of Negros, not far from where he was abducted on June 13.

"It's just great. It's just wonderful news," Swanson's father, Leonard Swanson, told radio station KRAE in Cheyenne after learning of his son's release.

"You feel like a whole big weight has been taken off," said his mother, Lynn Swanson.

President Bush, who met briefly with Swanson's parents when he

visited Cheyenne on July 20, called Thursday morning with his best wishes, they said.

"I'm tired, I'm very happy," Swanson told reporters after his release. "They treated me well. I'm OK and I want to go home."

U.S. Ambassador Nicholas Platt welcomed Swanson's release, saying the embassy is "relieved that he is safe, unharmed, and apparently in good health."

The United States ordered the evacuation of Peace Corps workers in the Philippines on June 27 because intelligence information indicated the Communist rebels might try to kill or kidnap them.

Swanson was already in rebel hands, but his Filipino wife said she had been ordered by the rebels not to tell anyone.

Ukrainian city removes statues

MOSCOW (AP) — The Ukrainian city of Chevronegrad dismantled its monument to Vladimir Lenin and has ordered the Soviet Union to remove within three days, Tass reported Thursday.

The orders were made during an emergency session of the city council on Wednesday, the official Soviet news agency said. It did not elaborate.

Tass quoted the regional prosecutor in nearby Lvov as saying the council's orders were illegal and should be repealed.

"The council's decision violates the Ukrainian law on the protection and use of historical and cultural monuments," Leonid Izoimov told Tass.

The western Ukrainian city of Ternopol has also outraged local Communists by ordering the dismantling or sale of monuments to Lenin, the father of modern Communism.

Moscow City Council voted earlier this year to remove a bust of Lenin from its chambers.

High court rejects commission's view of income of nonresidents

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court has unanimously upheld the use of a loophole in state tax laws that allowed two commission members to avoid paying taxes on the income they earned in Idaho during 1985.

The ruling, issued Thursday, said it was not absurd for Edward Moses and Frank Clark to claim that Idaho income tax laws for nonresidents in 1985 set up a system that allowed them "double-dip," or further reduce their calculated tax liability.

The two men, both employed at the Portlatch Corp. plant in Lewiston, pleaded guilty on section of state law levied state income tax on nonresidents in the same proportion as their Idaho-earned income bore to their total income and a second section said the state tax on that income would be reduced to the percentage Idaho-earned income was of total income.

Other words, Moses and Clark maintained that if they earned two-thirds of their total income in Idaho, they would calculate Idaho taxes on only two-thirds of their income and they pay only two-thirds of that amount.

The state Tax Commission claimed the first section of law merely imposed the tax, while the second stated how it was to be calculated.

But the high court said absent evidence that the result would be absurd, the law had to be interpreted literally, and a literal interpretation would uphold the actions of the Portlatch workers.

"There are numerous reasons why the Legislature might determine to deal differently with the nonresident taxpayers than it does with resident taxpayers," the court said.

The Legislature immediately rewrote the law to remove the possibility of any further "double dipping."

In a second decision, the high court voted 4-1 to uphold the sexual

abuse conviction of James Francis O'Neill of Boise, who claimed the charges of sexual abuse were "in violation of the expiration of the statute of limitations in effect when the crimes were allegedly committed."

O'Neill was charged in December 1987 of committing the sexual abuse between January and June 1983. In 1983, the statute of limitations on that crime was three years, meaning police would have had to charge him by mid-1986.

But in 1985, the state Legislature extended the statute of limitations to five years. Police cited that extension in charging O'Neill in late 1987, 4½ years after any of the crimes occurred. O'Neill claimed that amounted to unconstitutional retroactive application of a law.

But the Supreme Court majority said that as long as the extension-of-statute-of-limitations was enacted prior to the original three-year time period expiring there was no retroactive application of the law.

Mysterious illness still a mystery to investigators

BOISE (AP) — A mysterious illness that forced the evacuation of 53 campers from Grayback Gulch near Idaho City remained under investigation by baffled health officials.

Twenty-seven campers, mostly teen-age Civil Air Patrol cadets, were evacuated from the camp early Wednesday at St. Alphonsus and St. Luke's regional medical centers in Boise and at Mercy Medical Center in Nampa.

Based on the symptoms apparent in many of the campers, including nausea, stomach cramps and headaches, they may have been suffering heat exhaustion and dehydration, officials said.

"Heavy metal poisoning may be another factor," said Tom Turco, director of environmental health for the Central District Health Department.

"We're interviewing all the kids to see if we can identify groups of kids that were exposed to the same things," Turco said.

The investigation has ruled out bacterial poisoning and ingestion of poisonous plants.

"We have some people up there at the camp pulling water samples from the wells," Turco said. "But the symptoms are not indicative of a bacterial situation. There was no vomiting."

He said lemons mixed in a metal pot may have leached heavy metals from the container and could have been responsible for some of the symptoms. Tests were being conducted on the mixed liquid.

Turco said water at the camp has a high magnesium and iron content, giving it a "funky" taste.

Former champion faces sexual charge

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A former national collegiate wrestling champion from North Idaho College has been ordered to stand trial on a charge that he sexually molested a 13-year-old girl.

Samuel Parker Jr., 21, who won the title for his weight class in 1987 was bond over to 1st District Court.

Prosecutors charged that Parker raped an 18-year-old Coeur d'Alene woman — a charge that carries a maximum life sentence on conviction.

But the magistrate said there was enough evidence to justify a bond for sexual assault on a minor, which carries a maximum 15-year prison term.

Police said the girl told them that at a party on July 18, Parker led her into a bedroom and tried to have sex with her, exposing himself to her.

3-alarm blaze rips through rail yard

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A fire in stacks of wooden railroad and landscaping ties sent up clouds of thick black smoke and burned ferociously early Thursday, and police booked a suspect in the three-alarm blaze.

Fire crews worked for seven hours to control the blaze, which erupted at about midnight in a railroad supply yard on the city's west side.

Salt Lake Fire Capt. Gene Warr said he had been told a suspect had been booked into jail for investigation but no other details were immediately available.

"All I know is there were railroad ties set on fire and there was an individual there claiming to have set them on fire," Detective George Clegg had said earlier.

The blaze charred stacks of wooden railroad and landscaping ties in the yard of A&K Railroad Materials Inc.

At midnight, two fire companies and the business owner were working together, using backhoes and loaders to overturn smoldering ties and drenching them with water.

"It's just a matter of exposing the ones that are on fire," Warr said.

The fire was contained to the supply yard after crews stopped its advance to the firm's main building, and no other structures were threatened.

About three dozen firefighters with six engines, two aerial ladders, support vehicles and a hazardous materials unit responded to the scene and Redwood Road between 1300 and 1700 South was blocked off to traffic for several hours.

No injuries were reported, and the investigation into its cause was continuing.

The burning ties were soaked in creosote, a heavy oil product, which made suppression efforts more difficult and contributed to the heavy smoke cover.

Marvin Maxwell of the Utah Health Department said morning winds had dispersed potentially carcinogenic creosote fumes.

TWIN FALLS — Magic Valley's booming construction should continue to be strong — but not just for the usual reasons.

First Security Bank's latest construction report pointed out the "stark contrast" between Idaho's vibrant residential construction and the nation's stagnant house building environment. But the bank's building permit report for June also pointed out that alterations and repairs — such as residential remodeling and business additions — were

an important factor in the state's overall construction picture. That was the case in Twin Falls, also.

The city recorded a 115 percent increase in the alteration category during the first six months of 1990 — when compared to the same period in 1989.

More than \$2 million of the city's \$4.8 million in alterations was recorded in June. The city's total construction also bolstered by a six-month, house-building boomlet, jumped from \$8.5 million to \$11 million.

Statewide, permits for alterations and additions increased 61 percent, First Security said. Residential construction increased 44.5 percent during the first six months of

1990, and total construction went up 28.6 percent.

The stark contrast between Idaho's residential construction activity and the national average was extraordinary, First Security said. The nation's housing starts declined for the fifth straight month to the lowest level since 1982.

Fay: Pay policy change unlikely for state's deans

TWIN FALLS — The president of the state Board of Education has indicated to Gov. Cecil Andrus that no major change is likely on the current policy for setting salaries of deans at the four state-run colleges.

Gary Fay of Twin Falls, in a letter to the governor this week, agreed with Andrus and board member Karl Shurtliff of Boise that salary improvements were needed at the faculty level long before they should be provided to college and university administrators like deans.

The comments came in response to University of Idaho President Elisabeth Zinsner's proposal to launch a three-year campaign that would bring the salaries of at least some deans on the Moscow campus up to and above her salary of \$119,500 a year. She maintained that higher salaries would attract more qualified deans who can help attract more private money to the university.

But Fay told Andrus that when any of the college presidents come up "with exceptional reasons for a change or departure from the existing policy, the board will examine each request on an individual basis and will then determine its merit and benefit to our educational institution."

Andrus had written Fay a week ago after Shurtliff expressed concern over the proposed pay hikes of University of Idaho deans and asked that the issue be placed on the board's agenda for its September meeting in Lewiston.

Since then, Zinsner has said that raising faculty salaries is the university's No. 1 goal.

"Faculty salaries are our first priority, and they will be again," Zinsner said earlier this week. "That is exactly the approach I am taking. I am delighted that Shurtliff and the governor are reinforcing it."

Fay has conceded that qualified candidates for dean positions are limited, suggesting that incentives could well be necessary to attract good candidates for the five openings on the Moscow campus over the next three years.

And college presidents have repeatedly tried to impress on state lawmakers that salaries at both the faculty and administrative levels are making it increasingly difficult to find and retain qualified staff.

Mink farm hiring practices draw fine

HEYBURN — Joe Moyle, owner of Moyle Mink Farm, must pay \$4,625 in penalties for hiring 17 people without verifying their U.S. residency, a federal judge has ruled.

Moyle's attorney, Gus Rosenheim of Boise, said he is considering appealing the decision.

"I don't think, in the totality of the case, the government's witnesses were as credible as the judge said they are," Rosenheim said.

In the analysis of his ruling, Administrative Law Judge E. Milton Frosberg of San

Diego noted that Moyle admitted the "essential elements" of the allegations in this case, and he found that the Border Patrol acted properly in investigating and inspecting Moyle's 1-9 immigration hiring forms.

Rosenheim had argued that Border Patrol agents did not have enough facts to support their suspicion that Moyle was improperly completing the forms, that taking the forms from the business office constituted an illegal search and seizure and that the subpoena to inspect the forms was improperly served.

The Immigration and Naturalization Service had argued that omitting dates on the forms left a "window of opportunity" for Moyle to hire illegal aliens.

Since the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986, employers must complete I-9 forms verifying that all employees are U.S. residents. The INS can audit the forms, and employers who fail to verify residency are subject to civil penalties. The INS was seeking \$4,750 in penalties.

Moyle declined to comment Thursday because he said he did not know the ruling.

At a two-day hearing in Twin Falls in February, Border Patrol staff testified the agency received an anonymous tip about an illegal alien working at a Moyle mink farm in Declo. An INS agent who visited Moyle's Heyburn farm in 1987 testified

Constant pain dulled her spirits. Peeling paint dulled her home.

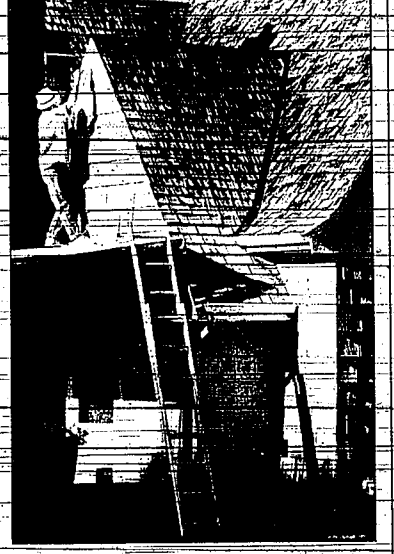
Then something magic happened — Paint Magic. The 68-year-old Twin Falls woman was selected as a recipient in the first Paint Magic project held in Twin Falls.

The project has held up because of environmental standards held up progress, and the sponsors lost an 11 percent tax credit because of the delay.

Racial bias charged at Quayle's club

PARADISE VALLEY, Ariz. — A wealthy black businessman said Thursday he had been barred from a country club that included Vice President Dan Quayle's name.

Quayle's name was on the membership list of the Paradise Valley Country Club, which has been unable to become a member.

In addition to Quayle and Mrs. O'Connor, the Paradise Valley club's regulars are business, mostly public figures, including the members of Arizona's congressional delegation and developer Fife Symington, a Republican candidate for governor.

Officials at the club insisted that any Associated Press questions be submitted in writing. They did not respond by the close of the business day.

Ragsdale's dissatisfaction, the club's makeup and its lack of black members were brought to public attention by Arizona Republican columnist Kevin Willey. "Political controversies involving all-white golf clubs apparently aren't limited to Birmingham, Ala., and the PGA," he said in "Clubs in Paradise," published in Thursday editions of the Birmingham Post-Herald.

Willey, a six-time professional golfer, said the club's exclusion of black members was "a disgrace." He said he would sue the club if it did not accept him as a member.

Quayle spokesman David Beckwith said Quayle, who grew up in a home adjoining the Arizona club's golf course, was no longer an active, dues-paying member and did not wish to comment. He had been a dues-paying member sometime before 1986.

Less than an hour later, however, Symington told The Phoenix Gazette that he would nominate Ragsdale if Ragsdale asked him to do so.

"The people you put up for membership in the club are your close personal friends," Symington said. "You would only be part of a membership proposal if you know the person very well."

Sho-Bans consider prison at Fort Hall

FORT HALL (AP) — Shoshone-Bannock tribal leaders are considering construction of a 2,000-inmate medium security prison on their Fort Hall Reservation.

The tribes have scheduled an Aug. 8 hearing on a proposal to rezone reservation land to accommodate the facility.

Spokesman Bill Langley said more information on the proposed general men's detention facility will be released at the hearing at the council chamber at the Fort Hall Tribal Business Center.

The facility, proposed for a tract named the Power County Support Power County, will probably not be a government development, according to Duane Thompson, Bureau of Indian Affairs superintendent at Fort Hall.

It seems like it will be a private facility," Thompson said.

Larry Long, a prison site official for the U.S. Department of Justice, said there were no new federal Bureau of Prison projects scheduled to be built in the area.

The Fort Hall Business Council recently filed an application to rezone the 173-acre site from agricultural to industrial.

"This is the first we've heard," Power County Commissioner Ralph Wheeler said. "It's a complete surprise."

He said county officials would probably not be involved in land use decision for the project.

"I would be willing to concede that on Indian-owned ground the county would not have any say on planning and zoning," he said. "But it's going to affect some residents who aren't 100% far away."

Idaho Correction officials recently outlined preliminary plans to build a 160-unit women's prison and a 500-bed medium- and close-custody men's facility and to expand several other state facilities by 1995.

A privately operated prison was proposed several years ago for the old state tuberculosis hospital in Gooding, but that project never got off the drawing board.

Inmate reveals possible crimes

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A jailhouse chat with a fellow inmate has prompted officials to broaden their investigation of a murder suspect, the Pend Oreille County Sheriff said.

John Barnes, accused of shooting Vincent Lopez to death in 1986, implicated himself in two other killings during a conversation with a Kootenai County Jail inmate, Sheriff Tony Bannette said Wednesday.

Bannette said inmate Michael DeLoe Smith provided information in a telephone interview that may link Barnes to two 1987 killings.

Those cases are the beating deaths of Gary Brigham in Pend Oreille County and David Ritchey in Spokane, Wash.

Spokane police say they doubt there is an link between Barnes and the Ritchey killing, but will pursue any new information.

"As far as we're concerned, it's a closed case," Spokane Police Deputy Chief Dick Jorgenson said.

Another man, Gregory Rowley, was convicted in 1989 of killing Ritchey.

Smith told the sheriff that Barnes laughed at a television news report showing convicted killer Rowley.

"He thought it was really, really funny that somebody else got put away for (Ritchey's) killing because he said he had been put away," Smith told Bannette.

Smith was called as a prosecution witness at a hearing for Barnes in Saldpoint Monday.

Continued from B1 — teens and paints more houses. Yet the project has retained its tight focus on the elderly. Although disappointed by their clients could benefit from such help, Paint Magic hasn't chosen that route.

"If they need their house painted they can plug into another program that will help," Conroy said.

Paint Magic organizers and other community leaders note the lack of minorities who benefit from the program.

"Too few Hispanic senior citizens own their own homes," said Francisco Castillo, Twin Falls manager for the Idaho Migrant Council.

Castillo and other representatives from the migrant council are trying to increase Hispanic involvement by working with Paint Magic organizers. This was the first year, for example, that radio advertisements soliciting applicants were broadcast in Spanish.

Modeled after Boise's Paint the Town project, Paint Magic was created to help senior citizens on a limited income.

To qualify, applicants must be at least 60 years old, have a limited in-

come and own a home that is in need of a fresh coat of paint. This year, "houses were randomly selected from an applicant pool of 96."

One organizer said the applicant's age and the condition of his or her home are more important qualifications than income. But Paint Magic is not putting any professional painter out work.

"We're looking at people without the income or family to help them get the job done," said Marty McLellan, a Twin Falls banker and Paint Magic president.

The Paint Magic board decided to accept applications from disabled homeowners in 1988 on a trial basis. It voted the next year to limit the program to senior citizens again.

Patricia Howard, a lobbyist for the disabled, suggested that the organization might be more helpful if it did not set a wider net.

"There's a lot of people who have limitations — whether they are elder-

ly or not," Howard said.

But Cyd Dillon, who serves the community's poor population through the South Central Community Action Agency, said she's a real advocate of the Paint Magic program — just as it is.

"I see the people after it's done and the impact it's had on their lives," Dillon said.

What's more, she said, once Paint Magic volunteers experience the good feelings that come with helping people they are more likely to volunteer for more and those good feelings spill over to other community-help projects.

Beer includes her Paint Magic volunteers on her Christmas card list. And she's happy to set any of the program's critics straight. "I had no money to have my house painted. I think that it's the greatest thing they could do for a senior citizen."

Bliss Council arrives at tentative budget; will wait for hearing

BLISS — The City Council Wednesday approved a tentative budget for next year, but will have to wait until after a public hearing scheduled for Aug. 20, to officially adopt it.

The council voted unanimously to approve the budget, which includes a \$3,000 allocation in the miscellaneous fund to repair the old Grange building in Bliss if the city takes possession of it.

A town meeting spot — all at one change. It has also been proposed that the building be used as a museum.

The city can have the building, which sits on five city lots, as soon as Idaho's state-grange officials give permission, Dana Butler of the Bliss-Tule Grange said. The Bliss-Tule Grange is merging with the Hagerman Grange and no longer needs the building.

The \$3,000 will be used to repair the roof, construct a porch and paint the structure. Councilman Keith Benschoter will procure cost estimates on the repairs.

A suggestion that the \$260 cash surplus leftover from the Centennial be used to print a pamphlet about Bliss and its attractions was also discussed. No decision was made, however, and the money was put into the miscellaneous fund to be allocated at a later date.

In accordance with state law, a public meeting will be held at 8 p.m. on Aug. 20 for Bliss citizens to comment on the proposed budget, which would cover the fiscal year beginning in October.

In other business, Mayor Roland Zollinger warned the council that any reprimand given to city employ-

ees must be approved by the council first.

Zollinger said the city's attorney advised him that in order to avoid any possible legal action against the council or individual council members, reprimands must be discussed and voted upon in council meetings. He also said council members should not present themselves as representatives of the City Council unless they have official council approval.

Benschoter cited as an example the time he contacted the local health department concerning the illegal

dumping of sewage west of town. He said he called as a citizen of Bliss, not as a council member, to avoid any legal action involving the council without its knowledge.

Zollinger said the policy helps avoid lawsuits from people who might be disgruntled with council members' actions.

The council heard a report from Councilman Sam Bishop that the Union Pacific track crossing through Bliss is in need of repair. Clerk Linda Huffman agreed to write a letter to the railroad asking it to either te-

pair the track themselves or accept the repair bill if the city fixes it for the company.

Bishop also reported that the roads in the North Tower development, accepted by the council last month as city roads, have not yet met city standards and will not be maintained until the standards are met.

Bishop agreed to study the possibility of purchasing the school district's mower attachment. The mower would attach to the city's tractor and could be used for weed control on city streets and alleys.

Jerome pool closed; Spears pool will open

JEROME — The pool at the Spears Manufacturing plant south of Jerome will open to the public beginning Monday, officials announced after a major breakdown closed the city pool for the season.

After a series of weekend mishaps, water pipes broke Monday at the city pool, flooding the basement and covering the pool's boiler circulation pump, according to Michael Pepper, Recreation District Director.

Beginning Monday, a shuttle bus will transport swimmers from the defunct city pool to the pool at Spears. The shuttle bus will leave on the hour each hour, beginning at 1 p.m. The bus will make round trips, taking its last load of swimmers back to the city pool at 5 p.m., when the pool closes.

The wading pool at the Jerome City Pool will remain open to the public from 1 to 8 p.m. each day.

"We don't know what the city will do yet," Pepper said. "But I've been talking to Mayor Gerald Goffler about the additional costs the Recreation District will have to fire up the electric boiler at the district (Spears) pool," Pepper said.

The electric boiler will be replaced with a more cost-effective gas boiler, but not until funds are available, Pepper stated.

During the past several months, city officials have debated the city pool's fate and have put on a \$83,000 price tag on the list of repairs and renovations needed.

The swimming season is tentatively scheduled to close August 19. But that date may be extended several days, Pepper said, to complete swimming lessons missed this week.

Family backgrounds blamed for suicides

RENO, Nev. (AP) — Two men who shot themselves in a deserted playground nearly five years ago had "pathological family backgrounds" which made them likely candidates for self destruction, according to an expert in adolescent suicide.

James Mikawa, professor and clinical psychologist at the University of Nevada, Reno, testified Thursday that one of the youths had resolved to take his own life before the Dec. 23, 1985 incident.

The testimony came at the conclusion of the third week of trial against the British rock band Judas Priest and CBS Records, in which the families of Raymond Belknep and James Vance claim criminal negligence on the band's 1978 "Stained Class" album drove them to suicide.

Belknep, 18, died instantly from a shotgun blast in his mouth. Vance, then 20, shot off the lower portion of his face but lived for three years. He died on Thanksgiving Day 1988 of a reaction of prescription drugs.

Band members and defense attorneys deny any subliminal content on the record. They say the youths' fates were predestined by their troubled lives, alcohol and drug abuse, violent and unstable family backgrounds and antisocial behavior.

Another witness Thursday debunked the plaintiffs' claim the youths were influenced by邪惡 anti-suicide, pro-suicide, messages recorded backward on the "Stained Class" album.

J. Don Read, a university psychologist from Lethbridge, Alberta, Canada, conducted a study in the mid-1980s to try to determine if the brain could comprehend backward speech.

"There's simply no evidence that backward messages have an effect on either the conscious or the unconscious of the listener," he said.

Rob Halford, the band's lead singer, testified earlier that the album contains no backward lyrics or subliminal messages.

Mikawa, who has conducted extensive research on adolescent suicide, said he is convinced Belknep had made the decision to take his own life days before the incident, which occurred after both youths reportedly listened to "Stained Class."

After reviewing court documents, depositions, and police reports, Mikawa said he believes Belknep gave subtle clues of his intentions.

"Ray Belknep had a serious problem in terms of coping with normal existence," he said.

Mikawa said Vance stated in a deposition that Belknep was depressed the day before the shooting because of the losses of his job and his girlfriend and friction at home.

Iraq's Hussein grabs Kuwait to fulfill financial ambitions

NICOSIA, Cyprus — Iraqi President Saddam Hussein seemed determined to fulfill his financial problems and solve territorial ambitions by degrading the government of neighboring Kuwait on Thursday.

The invasion, unprecedented in modern Arab history, reflected the brutality Saddam has used to crush all opposition at home since coming to power in 1979.

The sentence for criticizing Saddam is death, and the president considered Kuwait an overpopulation and the subsequent fall in the price of oil a personal affront to Iraq.

Iraqis will not forget the saying that cutting necks is better than cutting means of living. Oh, God Almighty, do not let them prosper when they prosper, he said last month after prices tumbled below \$14 per barrel.

He also accused Kuwait of stealing \$2.4 billion by pumping oil from a disputed field that straddled the border, and demanded that Kuwait waive oil from an estimated \$15 billion loan Iraq drew during the Persian Gulf war.

Analysis

Despite that Kuwait was demanding payment for the war, Saddam said he fought the war to protect the Arabs from the fundamentalist revolution fomented by the late Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini in Persian, mainly Shiite Moslem, Iran.

Never mind that Iraq started the war in 1980 by invading Iran after a series of border skirmishes along the Shatt-al-Arab waterway, Iraq's only outlet to the Gulf.

Despite claims that the war was an unprecedented victory, the long conflict stilled Iraq's development, dragging on for eight years. It has still not formally ended. The war bills kept the government from delivering material benefits promised to the Iraqi people directly after the war. The 1990 budget showed funds for imports and exports were told to brace for another year of austerity. Private investment has fallen to take hold.

oil-infrastructure-damaged. Tens of thousands of Iraqi prisoners of war languish in Iranian prisons and an estimated 500,000 Iraqis were killed or wounded.

Despite its puny size, Kuwait's oil reserves—almost 100 billion barrels—match Iraq's—100 billion barrels.

By controlling Kuwait, Saddam could help solve the financial hangover from the Persian Gulf war and fulfill Iraq's longstanding wish for more Gulf coastline.

But Kuwait's pledge two weeks ago to obey new OPEC quotas and Saddam's promise to Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak that he would not invade lured the Arab world into the sense the crisis was over.

Homage to the cause of Arab unity has been paramount in Middle East politics since postwar independence from colonial powers. Although a civil-war-in-Yemen in the 1960s brought Egyptian and Saudi Arabian intervention on opposing sides, no Arab state has ever

directly deposed the government of a fellow Arab League member. Despite Iraq claims that it is helping to recognize its independence, internal opposition liberalized Kuwait, it has long coveted the tiny

country. The Iraqi government sought to overthrow the banned ruler President Fahd in 1961 and threatened to attack then, but backed down when Britain landed troops in Kuwait.

The invasion shook Kuwait's neighbors along the Gulf. It proved the decade-old Gulf Cooperation Council that groups Saudi Arabia, Bahrain, Qatar, the United Arab Emirates, Oman and Kuwait was not inviolable. The GCC did not issue a statement, much less implement its mutual defense treaty.

While Iraq was unlikely to invade Saudi Arabia, it could use the precedent of Kuwait to browbeat its neighbors. Bombing an oil field would be a sufficient reminder of what happened to Kuwait when it balked at Iraqi demands.

Asked the reason for the invasion, Kuwait's ambassador to Washington Sheikh Saad Nasir Al-Sabah said at a news conference in Baghdad, "We mean to control the whole area. There is no other reason for it."

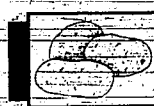

West stroked his chin pensively after he saw East's deuce at trick one. And since the deuce suggested a shift, West based his entire defense on this faulty assumption. West next cashed his diamond ace and led a third diamond, ruffed and overruffed. That ended the "defense," and South claimed 11 quick winners in the black suits.

West explained that he picked East for the club-king when East played the diamond deuce. Where else would a shift by West do any good? Surely, the bidding marked South with the heart king.

West's reasoning was full of holes. While it is true that East's play of a deuce would sometimes suggest a shift, it could not apply in all situations.

In today's case, if East's deuce were played from these small cards, South would have had to play his singleton queen at trick one. East couldn't have Q-8-2 or 8-2 either. With those holdings, he would have encouraged with his eight. That leaves East with either a singleton deuce or the Q-2. In either case, West should lead a low diamond at trick two. The marked heart shift beats the game.

SUN VALLEY - Ballet students come here for the experience and exposure. Ballet masters come here for a chance to teach. And principal dancers from top ballet companies across the country come here to get away from the big cities, if only for a while.

It's summerdance '90, a ballet festival with daily workshops and four performances scheduled during the three-week program.

The beneficiary of local organizer Paula Caputo of The Ballet School Foundation, summerdance has been so successful it has caught the attention of the CBS television network.

In just its third year, summerdance '90 will be a featured segment on CBS News' Sunday Morning hosted by Charles Kuralt. Production crews will be in Sun Valley the week of Aug. 13 to film the segment, but it is not known when the piece will air on national television.

The excitement is all about the prestigious cast of characters Caputo has drawn together to teach and perform for summerdance.

Edward Villella, Christopher d'Amboise and Mimi Paul are teaching the workshops and Jacques d'Amboise, Ulf, acclaimed principal dancer of The New York City Ballet and protégé of George Balanchine, is but one of the guest artists.

Others include Alison Brown and Brian Reeder of The New York City Ballet, Leslie Carothers, principal dancer of The Joffrey Ballet, Patricia Miller and James Canfield, directors of Oregon Ballet Theater and former principals of The Joffrey Ballet, Mia Babalis and Lane Sayles of the Lar Lubovitch Dance Company, and soloists from the Pennsylvania Ballet.

"I grew as a dancer and I became stronger because I was dancing more," Anderson says. "It (the training) really helps your mind because you have to pickup (the moves) so fast."

Fast is an appropriate term for the quick pace that is set by Villella and d'Amboise.

"The choreography right then and we have to pick it out of their minds and put it into ours," Anderson says. "It's hard, but it's fun."

Indeed, pursuing a career in ballet is not an easy job.

The program will again include a special children's workshop which features local elementary school children. They will perform two pieces, one set by world-renowned Jacques d'Amboise.

It's very demanding. Like Anderson, many of the students here began ballet when they were very young, three or four years old. What began as their parents' idea turned into a love of dance for many.

Anderson began ballet in Boise when she was three. She says she began her "serious training" when she moved to Yakima, Wash. She was seven at the time.

For Marie Chong of Tacoma, Wash., now 17, she became enthralled with Olga Korbut's gold medal performance in gymnastics during the 1976 Olympics and urged her parents to let her learn ballet though only three at the time.

Chong is still possessed by the art and sports a T-shirt which reads "I live to dance."

Most of the students who are attending the workshops have their sights set on turning their talents into a professional payoff.

Villella is conducting a search for the Miami City Ballet apprentice program, and other faculty members are on the look-out for bright, young talent. For these hopefuls, it is a chance to impress and be impressed.

"All these people are like top-flight people," says 23-year-old Evelyn Wang of Grand Blanc, Mich. "You could be on the street and for them to come up and say 'hi' to you is just like, 'Whoa... that's Christopher d'Amboise!'"

This is the first year at summerdance for 17-year-old Sarah Schaub of Toledo, Ohio. While the bright lights of the ballet world revolve around New York City (just 12 hours from Toledo), Schaub says she liked the idea of the individual attention gained by working with a small group, rather than as many as 75 students in some of the New York classes.

And for Nieves Esteban, who is originally from Spain and now calls Knoxville, Tenn., her home, summerdance provides an opportunity to learn the Balanchine style of ballet - a style of dance that is not taught in Tennessee.

For all these dancers, summerdance is a chance to learn, to grow, and hopefully catch the eye of somebody to earn a spot in a professional ballet company.

Acclaimed 'Twin Peaks' tops Emmy nominations

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. - ABC's quirky drama "Twin Peaks," which astounded critics and confounded television viewers, captured a leading 14 nominations for the 42nd Annual Primetime Emmy Awards.

NBC's legal drama "L.A. Law" earned 13 nominations, and NBC's "Cheers" and CBS' "Murphy Brown" each received 12 nominations.

"The Simpsons," the irreverent animated program from cartoonist Matt Groening, had five nominations. The series got three nominations, including best animated pro-

gram, and "The Simpsons' Christmas Special" received two.

ABC, which finished last among the three networks in nominations last year, tied for first with NBC with 95 nominations. CBS drew 73 selections and the Fox Broadcasting Co. earned 23, up from 12 a year ago.

The selections were announced in a pre-dawn ceremony at the Beverly Hilton Hotel by Dan T. Snierson of ABC's "China Beach" and Louis Gossett Jr., both Emmy winners themselves.

Director David Lynch's "Twin Peaks" was nominated for outstanding drama series, and its star, Kyle MacLachlan, was nominated for best actor in a drama series.

For his performance as enigmatic, pie-loving FBI agent Dale Gribble, the series also collected a nomination for lead actor Piper Laurie, two nominations for writing, and one to Lynch for directing the acclaimed pilot episode.

Other nominees for best drama series were ABC's "China Beach," NBC's "L.A. Law" and "Quantum Leap," and ABC's "Lies and Deceit."

"Cheers," the Boston bar comedy, was nominated again for best comedy series, which it won last year. Also nominated were CBS' "Designing Women" and "Murphy Brown," NBC's "The Golden Girls" and ABC's "The Wonder Years."

ABC's "The Kennedys of Massachusetts," with eight nominations, headed the list of nominees for best miniseries. Other nominees were NBC's "Blind Faith," NBC's "Drug Wars: The Camarena Story," CBS' "Family of Spies" and ABC's "Small Sacrifices."

The CBS movie "Caroline!" drew six nominations, including best drama-comedy special. It will face ABC's "The Final Cut" and CBS' "The Incident" and "A Killing in a Small Town," and NBC's "Murder in Mississippi."

Despite actress Tracey Ullman's decision to end her inventive Fox variety series, it won a total of 13 nominations. The Tracey Ullman Show received nine nominations.

Supporters of Mapplethorpe overwhelm protesters in Boston

BOSTON (AP) — A controversial exhibit including explicit photographs by Robert Mapplethorpe opened Wednesday as scores of placard-toting supporters and a handful of vastly outnumbered opponents staged competing demonstrations.

About 200 supporters, chanting and carrying signs with such messages as "No Censorship," began gathering at the Institute for Contemporary Art around 8:30 a.m.

As dozens of patrons lined up to buy tickets, an angry crowd of protesters surrounded one of the exhibit time-helped spark a nationwide debate on freedom of expression.

"These people are trying to force their morality on the rest of us," Jim Edgerley of the conservative American Freedom Coalition said as he stood among demonstrators, patrons, police and reporters on the museum steps.

A man who identified himself as Albe Rybeck of the United Fruit Co., theater group, dressed in a black leather wig, leopard striped tights, red top shoes, garter and short black tunic dress.

Brandishing a fake microphone of tinzel and silver, Rybeck told the crowd, "Robert Mapplethorpe is exhibiting what is really going on in his community. It is illustrating his life, his friends, his sex."

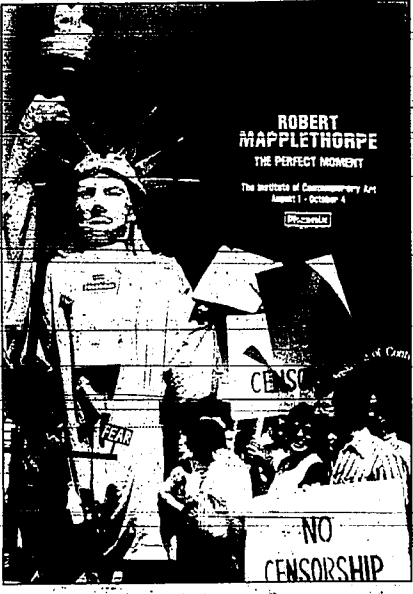
Later, the crowd drove Edgerley away by surrounding him and chanting so loud reporters couldn't hear him.

Less than an hour after the museum doors opened, an estimated 200 visitors were lined up outside, said museum marketing assistant Denise Spitzer.

Some held tickets purchased in advance. The small museum allowed just 75 people every half hour to view the photographs taken by Mapplethorpe from 1969 until shortly before he died of AIDS last year in Boston at age 42.

Eleanor Blankie, 70, of Cohasset and her friend, Margaret Mooney, 41, of Chicago were among the first to get a look at the show.

"I'd read a lot about it and I was

"curious," said Blankie. "I went to see what was objectionable, but I thought it [the exhibition] was interesting."

"I knew he was a good photographer but I didn't know he was that good," said Mooney. "I wanted to see how his talent measured up against all the hype."

She said she didn't mind the sexually explicit, homoerotic pictures included in the exhibition.

"They were off to the side so if you didn't want to look at them, you didn't have to," she said. "They're part of life."

Public television station WGBH, which telecast the most explicit photographs on its newcast Tuesday night, said Wednesday morning it had received 100 calls about the broadcast; most of them supportive. However, several people said they were swearing off public television forever.

A coalition of 13 pro-Mapplethorpe groups promised not to demonstrate at the museum on Tuesday, but gay rights groups and individual activists were out in force Wednesday.

Galleries in Ketchum announce night of citywide art openings

KETCHUM — A new lineup of artists will be featured at the gallery openings throughout town tonight — hot on the heels of the Fourth of July show.

The openings take on a festive air from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. with complimentary beverages and hors d'oeuvres served at many of the participating galleries.

Most of the galleries are within easy walking distance, providing an excellent opportunity for a summer sidewalk stroll. The art shows will remain hanging throughout August.

The next gallery opening is scheduled for Aug. 31.

At the south entrance to Ketchum, The Stinging Galleries in the Trail Creek Village features the mixed media trout paintings of Jennifer Bollinger. She will be present at the opening to discuss her latest work.

A longtime Ketchum artist, Bollinger is well known for her batik paintings of birds. Now she has taken a new direction in both subject matter and medium by expanding her traditional batik techniques to include overlays of painted-on colors in metallics and iridescences. The results are stunning impressions of trout in their watery habitat.

The Friesen Gallery of Fine Art, 391 First Ave. N., features contemporary folk artist Van Dyke Jones who will be present for the opening.

Jones' main character is a living faith who embodies the divine innocent, the natural fool, Jones says. The body of Jones' work is contemporary folk art with a sophisticated sense of humor. A blend of prismacolor pencils and acrylics are used in a "layering" method to create the bright and vivid colors reflected on his canvases.

Also featured at the gallery's Sculpture Garden are the life-sized "Cnet" wood-carvings of local artist Robert Craig Hink.

Master sculptor George Carlson and painter Will Caldwell highlight the opening at the Kneeland Gallery, 271 First Ave. N.

After living on American Indian reservations for 12 years, Carlson's work "compiles a stunning documentary of their culture, as well as the Tanhummah tribe in Mexico. His

range of subject matter is diverse, ranging from his Indian bronzes and pastels to his acclaimed series on working draft horses. He has done private commissions for Bill Harrah and Bill Cosby. His latest work focuses on ball dancers.

In the early 1980s Carlson taught at the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities. Caldwell, a talented painter, took Carlson's workshop and was deeply influenced.

Caldwell, a former graphic artist and architect, is best known for his large format pastels that depict brilliantly hued vintage automobiles and larger than life western personalities. His most recent works focus on the roadside attractions and landscapes of Route 66 from the perspective of traveling the western highway.

The River Run Gallery, 291 First Ave. N., features noted Southwest artist Jean Richardson's distinctive abstract paintings and original prints of horses and riders.

Richardson's paintings show the movement, joy and mystery of the human figure, depicting dancing figures which carry themes of exuberance, grace, motion and joy.

Working within a variety of color formats, Richardson uses a great deal of texture in the surface of her acrylic paintings. Each piece evokes a distinctive feeling of the figure as human expression. The artist captures the energy and grace of the dancing, leaping form through suggestive rather than literal imagery.

The monprints, drawings, watercolors and oils of California artist

Joseph Goldyne will be exhibited at Anne-Reed Gallery, 620 Sun Valley Road, through Aug. 31. The opening reception will be from 5 to 9 p.m. today.

Joseph Goldyne often chooses to paint on a small scale and sometimes refers to his work as "chamber pieces." Goldyne's subject matter ranges from landscapes and flowers to architectural fragments. Often using simple, common objects such as a pair of cherries, shirts hanging in an open closet, books arranged on shelves or tulips in a terracotta pot, Goldyne says, "I think setting common objects in a rarefied atmosphere is a worthwhile task."

His paintings offer warmth, familiarity and a sense of optimism. In recent years, this artist has focused his energy on large monprints of flowers which are further enhanced with pastel and watercolor. These images, though considerably upscaled from his smaller oils on panels, do not lose Goldyne's deliberately meticulous attention to detail.

The new oils and watercolors of Sheila Gardner will be displayed today through Aug. 30 at the Gail Severn Gallery, 620 Sun Valley Road. An opening reception will be held from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. today.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The courtroom drama "Presumed Innocent" drew a split decision at the nation's movie theaters, opening in first place for the weekend but just narrowly surpassing the thriller "Ghost." Starring Harrison Ford as an attorney accused of killing a former lover, "Presumed Innocent" grossed \$11.7 million, according to figures released by Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc. "Presumed Innocent" — based on the best-selling Scott Turow novel — finished just ahead of second-place "Ghost," which scored up \$11.4 million in its third weekend of release.

'Presumed Innocent' retains essence of Turow's 'bullet-train' book

HOLLYWOOD — Intelligent, complex and enthralling, "Presumed Innocent" is one of those rare films where all the players seem to be in a state of grace, where the workings of the machinery never shows and after it's over, one runs and ruminates its intricacies with a profound sense of satisfaction.

In his original novel, Scott Turow, a prosecuting attorney himself,

worked from a fascinating hypothesis. Rusty Sabich (Harrison Ford), a respected Midwestern prosecuting attorney, a man solidly wedded to the law and its principles, suddenly gets a reverse view of his workings when he becomes a suspect in the brutal sex murder of a colleague with whom he had a torrid affair.

Turow's fans will be pleased to know that Frank Pierson and the film's director, Alan J. Pakula, have made an uncommonly sensitive adaptation of what's been called a bullet train of a book.

Their changes in Turow's vividly detailed novel are smart; if in the process, interesting but non-essential characters have been eased in, a certain depth has been stripped from a

central character and an endangered marriage has been set on its feet again, this is, after all, the idealized world of movies.

Streamlining notwithstanding, the book's essence remains intact.

Surely, no reader is going to quibble that the novel's coolly ambitious prosecutor, Carolyn Polhemus, has dropped a dozen or so years and a teen-age son to become Greta Scacchi — not when that actress' mea-

sured glance and apricot-colored skin could spark lust from granite.

Scacchi's time onscreen is relatively brief but Gordon Willis, the film's great cinematographer, has summed up her impact in one ravishingly

beautiful shot. As Carolyn gazes steadily at the camera, the look Willis catches is unguarded, unambiguous and a tool she wields with intensity and ambition — enough to cause shock waves in even a marriage as seemingly secure as the Sabichs'.

"Presumed Innocent" looks properly rich and Midwestern; one wouldn't be wrong to take its hypothetical

Kindle County for Illinois — once famously corrupt Cook County, where author Turow has practiced law. Its extremes are summed up for us succinctly: the light-wallpapered suites of the high-end lawyers and the crowded prosecutors' digs with all the charm of a welfare office; the

suave intelligence of Raul Julia's defense attorney, Alexander Sandoz; the sharp talking and cutting and ferrety air of Joe Grifasi's Tommy Moby, out to nail Sabich.

The film's best actors are a formidable lot. Raul Julia, whose complex judge, Loran Lytle, is invested with a rumbustious humor as well as power. John Spencer's quintessential detective, Lipanzer, that "scholar of the underlife"; and Bonnie Bedelia's, deeply sensitive work as Barbara Sabich, the wife painfully damaged by her husband's infidelity.

Cornerstone "Painless" Kumagai becomes unforgettable as the hands of Sab Shimomoto, and Brian Dennehy as Sabich's longtime boss, whose every maneuver has a far-reaching political meaning.

In what is almost his signature feat ("All the President's Men," "Sophie's Choice"), director Pakula has kept his cast of bravura actors in miraculously balance; none is allowed to pull the fabric of the whole out of shape. There is one performance so self-effacing, however, that it may get overlooked among all the high-wire acts: Ford's Rusty Sabich.

Hindlers would recognize Ford's role for what it is, a bearing beam of a part that is of every other character in the film holds on. Yet — after his roller-coaster affair with Scacchi is lunched — most of Ford's time is spent reacting.

He must react in the courtroom to the story's shocks and surprises and in the film's crucial scenes — his unexpected reaction tells us more clearly than dialogue what Sabich lives by: his guilts, his doubts and his loyalties.

Ford conveys this with the sort of deceptive economy that was part of Henry Fonda's slight of hand. In fact, one that any other honest actor, Ford seems the logical choice to take over Fonda's niche as the decent American, which makes the dimensions of his moral anguish here all the more fascinating.

If there are moviegoers who still think that Ford is most himself in action roles, "Presumed Innocent" (rated R) for its nudity, sexuality and language) should go a long way toward clearing up that misconception.

'The Jungle Book' still a delight for all ages

THE JUNGLE BOOK (G). The Disney artists took little more than the names of Rudyard Kipling's characters, but the film's slapstick comedy, upbeat songs and polished animation have none of their appeal 23 years after its original release. This high-spirited romp will delight children and parents weary of action films with boy-counts that exceed their box-office grosses.

BACK TO THE FUTURE PART III (PG). An appealing if ultimately disappointing sequel to the Marty McFly saga. In this one, set mostly in the Old West, Doc falls in love.

DAYS OF THUNDER (PG-13). Whoosh!! "Days of Thunder" just isn't what it used to be — or what it is and about as that. Has the Simpson-Brockheimer signature come to mean the flimsiest story buried under glittering production values? What relationships the movie has aren't between Tom Cruise and Nicole Kidman but between Cruise and Robert Davall, "putting" Tull, omy life into another of 'Southern peckerwood.

DICK TRACY (PG). Warren Beatty's vision of a comic strip on film comes in paint box-bright colors with nicely irrelevant dialogue, a gaggle of crisp performances and one with million-dollar movie. It's a film of enormous style, with a sure sense of itself. You may not eagerly brood about the inner lives of these characters for days after you leave the theater — then again, for better or worse, that may be one of the definitions of a summer movie.

DIE HARD 2 (R). This is the most cheerily entertaining film of a jaw-dropping summer, which is not to say it's not fun, it's simply orchestrated London Times. Even Bruce Willis' redoubtable detective, John McClane, keeps shaking his head over his part in all the action. But all in all, this sequel is a lively three-ring circus; just don't be fussy about logic or timing.

THE FRESHMAN (PG). Marlon Brando is wonderful doing a sly parody of his Vito Corleone from "The Godfather." Matthew Broderick is an NYU film student who gets

mixed up with the mob. Uneven, but some major laughs.

GHOST (PG-13). The movie's slogan is "Believe," not an unreasonable request — but even those who'd be happy to comply must get past a certain woolly-mindedness to its script and a production prettified to the point of sweetness. With some of its actors — Demi Moore as the cracked-voice, desolate lover; Whoopi Goldberg as an extremely reluctant spirit go-between and Vincent Schiavelli as an irascible, sub-way-duelling ghost — things are in the best hands possible. But Patrick Swayze as a corporate New York banker? Never in 7 million corporate years.

NAVY SEALS (R). Routine me-

chanical job about covert Middle East search-and-destroy mission. Now, that the Russians are good guys, the new international thriller movie meanings would appear to be fanatical Arabs.

PRETTY WOMAN (R). Updating "Pygmalion" and sprinkling it with Cinderella dust may seem like a perfectly workable idea — until you get into the uncomfortable details. Here, Richard Gere's bored spherule of a corporate ruler transforms Julia Roberts' happy Hollywood Boulevard hooker into a lady she can pass off at a polo match in less than a week. This is a movie that banality has a moment to call its own and the ones it has are rummy, banal and possibly life-threatening. Some fairly take for the '90s.

PROBLEM CHILD (PG). The kid from Hell. The parents from Yuppie Dumbville. The jokes from

nowhere. Dennis Dugan directs: the actors howl and mug. Another loud, loud shriek of a movie — about a modern "Dennis the Menace."

YOUNG GUNS II (PG-13). There haven't been many movie Westerns with this much sheer visual energy and excitement since Peckinpah and Leone were in their '70s prime. The brilliant New Zealand action director Geoff Murphy's sequel to the 1988's "Brat Pack" retelling of the "Billy the Kid" legend, makes a tale full of sound, gunfire, fury and scorchingly beautiful landscapes.

Emilio Estevez is closer than any previous Billy to the look of the sawed-off innish killer and the cast is deep — though overall, this version pales next to Peckinpah's in 1973. It's Murphy and cinematographer Dean (Mad Max') Semler, who make it special.

Destruction of Hiroshima is re-created in NBC's 'Hiroshima: Out of the Ashes'

In a rare summer premiere, NBC will broadcast "Hiroshima: Out of the Ashes" on Monday, Aug. 6, the 45th anniversary of the first dropping of an atomic bomb. The TV movie depicts the destruction of Hiroshima through the eyes of various survivors of the blast: a German Jesuit (Max Von Sydow), American prisoners of war (Judd Nelson and Bea Wright), a postman (Pat Morita) with a Japanese-American daughter-in-law (Tamlyn Tomita), two mothers who have sent sons off to school (Kim Miyori and Natsuko Ohama) and a dedicated doctor (Starr Egit).

These people are going about their normal business in wartime Hiroshima when the bomb drops. The harrowing scenes of the devastated city were filmed at an abandoned steel complex in Southern California. "We didn't do this for fame and fortune; we did it to be involved," says Kim Miyori.

The historical accuracy of these scenes was confirmed by Kaz Suyeishi, a hibakusha (survivor) of the bombing of Hiroshima who served as technical adviser on the set of "Hiroshima: Out of the Ashes." "If Kaz is not crying, I know the scene doesn't work," said director Peter Werner during the filming. Suyeishi was born in Pasadena, Calif., in 1927, but she and her family moved to Hiroshima when she was just 8 months old. Because debris from a nearby house fell on her, Suyeishi was not burned by the thermic rays, but she has suffered recurring periods of radiation sickness. "For years," Suyeishi says, "I

tried to forget about my past." But since 1971, Suyeishi has been an active member of the Committee of Atomic Bomb Survivors in the United States. Her goal is simple: no more war. "The future worries me," she says. "Any type of war is miserable. Both sides suffer." She also hopes that Congress will pass a Medical Aid Bill for the hibakusha in America, many of whom, like her, are citizens of the United States.

Serving as technical adviser and reliving the trauma she suffered was emotionally draining. Yet, Suyeishi says, "It is my duty to be involved. I'm proud that this movie is made in the U.S.A. I love this country." All the actors found Suyeishi an extraordinary inspiration. "We could feel through her emotion what it must have been like," says Miyori, who may be best known as Dr. Wendy

Armstrong in "St. Elsewhere." "We felt that we had a connection through her." Miyori's father, like Suyeishi, was born in America and brought up in Japan. But he returned to America before World War II, during which he was interned in Arizona.

"Hiroshima: Out of the Ashes" takes pains — perhaps too many — to express current attitudes. Characters voice sentiments of universal brotherhood and understanding that are difficult to comprehend coming from people whose city has just been obliterated.

Return stars brighten 'Santa Barbara'

Just because take-a-chance "Santa Barbara" auditions talent from Atlanta to Denver this summer doesn't mean the old guard is slipping. Ratings are up a tad because Lionel and Augustus Lockridge brighten the scenery after a two-and-a-half year absence.

You remember the debonaire, slightly-off-in-the-upstairs Lockridges, eccentrics with style and some humor, the epitome of money and leisure? To this day, versions of the Lockridges can be found in Montecito cocktail parties. Actors Louise Sorel and Nicolas Coster would fit right in with the snobby Montecito crowd and that's more than you can say about the other performers.

This time around Nic Coster's Lionel is a prankster, intent on destroying C.C. Capwell, giving the rich charlatan the hiding he deserves. Will Lionel pull it off, horsing around with C.C.'s paintings? Of course not, but Coster will fail with a flair.

The Lockridges give the prize-winning soap a bit of craziness, a welcome contrast to all the weird chases, the wild-plottings and romantic mixups of the younger crowd.

Coster and Sorel were dumped by an interim management who decided the couple didn't fit in. When the Lockridges left, ratings went down. With pair hired back by John Conboy late this spring, ratings went up as if on cue. The styles of Nic and Louise are "Santa Barbara" essentials. John Conboy knew this.

Unlike most daytime actors, a pink slip didn't retard Nic Coster. There he was as Susan Lucci's terrorist lover on "All My Children." Alan Alda put Nic to work in his feature "Betsy's Wedding," and Nic's wife just presented him with a baby son, Ian.

With two daughters in their early 20s, Nic faces fatherhood with more assurance this time around. "There have been some changes," reports Coster. "The safety pin has vanished. Diapers now come with suck-um. And everybody breast feeds. I used to be in charge of bottles with my two girls, seeing that they were

Surrounded by friends on the soap like John Conboy the new producer, and head writer James Lipton, who taught a daughter to ride, Coster has a full cup: friends, good job, new son and weekends on the ocean.

In his 52-foot boat, "Bagarre," Coster, a scuba expert, takes the handicapped and disabled scuba diving off Santa Barbara's Channel Islands. The students can fall in the water, but the trick is strong arms to haul them out after exploring the depths.

People may not like Roseanne's singing but she's right at top of Nielsen ratings

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC's "Roseanne" was the most popular program on television last week.

The show aired the day before its star, Roseanne Barr, was roundly criticized for her screeching rendition of the national anthem at San Diego's Jack Murphy Stadium.

"Roseanne" led with a 14.6 rating, according to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co. A rating point represents 921,600 households.

It also was No. 1 in every target demographic group, said David Marans, a vice president for media research at the J. Walter Thompson advertising agency. In overall ratings, ABC pulled even with NBC, the perennial winner. Both averaged an 8.9 rating for the week. CBS was third at 8.4, but each averaged only a 17 share or 17 percent of the television in use in prime time.

That meant hardly anyone was watching, Marans said.

"The three networks' share was a 51 for the week. That's among the lowest, if not the lowest ever recorded," he said. "They received about half the available viewers. That has to be a cause for heartache for them."

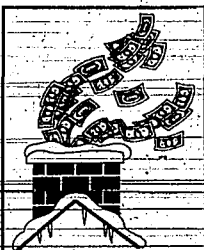

Chung steps aside to try for a baby

NEW YORK (AP) — Connie Chung said Monday that she's putting her new television series on hold while she tries to become pregnant.

The move, which surprised CBS executives when the 43-year-old anchorwoman asked for it last week, marked the second time this year that a female anchor of a network news series has opted for a family over a show. However, in Chung's case, it would be temporary, CBS said it would welcome "Face to Face With Connie Chung" back as a series when she is ready to return.

"We want very much to have a child," said Chung, who is married to "A Current Affair" anchorman Maury Povich, 51. "Unfortunately, time is running out for me when it comes to childbearing." Chung noted that she will be 44 next month. After consulting with her

doctors last week, she said in a statement, she became convinced she needs to "take a very aggressive approach — to having a baby." Because of that, she said, she has to lighten her workload, and thus now will only do "Face to Face" as periodic specials instead of the series that CBS had put on its Monday night lineup for this fall.

CBS will replace Chung's show with "The Trials of Rosie O'Neill," a one-hour dramatic series starring former "Cagney & Lacey" star Sharon Gless as recently-divorced lawyer who becomes a public defender. Earlier this year, NBC's Maria Shriver left the "Sunday Today" show she had co-anchored since 1987. She said she wanted to spend more time with her baby daughter and her husband, actor Arnold Schwarzenegger, in Los Angeles. Shriver was succeeded by former CNN anchor Mary Alice

Williams, who joined NBC last year and gave birth to a daughter in January.

Chung, who will continue anchoring the Sunday editions of the "CBS Evening News," reportedly is paid \$1.3 million annually.

"This was a very important decision for Connie," CBS Broadcast Group president Howard Stringer said in a statement. "She has my support, respect and loyalty. When Connie is ready we will happily welcome 'Face to Face' back to the schedule as a weekly series."

Chung's husband, who has anchored the syndicated "A Current Affair" ever since Fox Broadcasting began it in 1986, has signed with the rival Paramount Domestic Television to co-produce and anchor a new talk show that starts in the fall of 1991.

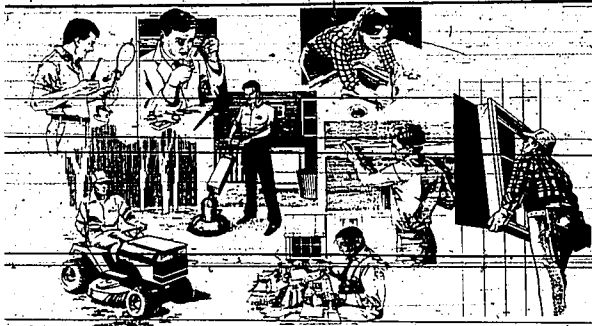
