

State plans to revoke license of juvenile center at Jerome

JEROME — The Southern Idaho Youth Center will lose its license on Sept. 13 unless it challenges an Idaho Department of Health and Welfare decision to revoke it.

David Davis, Health and Welfare's regional director, said many factors over recent months contributed to the decision. He cited recent high turnover in staff, the discovery of padlocks on bedroom doors, lack of a qualified administrator and a recent fight at the center that left one youth with a dislocated shoulder.

"The bottom line is they've just never been able to get it together and comply with all the rules and regulations," Davis

said. The department granted the center a joint administrative board.

"I think it's the thing that has to happen and I think the end result will be that Health and Welfare's intent and we have better detention services in the community," Davis said.

John Devine, a partner of the center, declined to comment Thursday.

The potential closure could become a catalyst for six Magic Valley counties already exploring the possibility of building a new regional center.

County officials will meet next week and discuss a task force recommendation that several counties, excluding Minidoka and Cassia which are building their own juvenile facility, join in construction of a new center with available state grant money and run it collectively through a

juvenile detention center.

Until that project gets off the ground, however, "We're in limbo," Munn said.

"If we're going to detain kids, we're pretty much going to have to take them out of the area," Jerome County Prosecutor John Horgan said. "We'll take care of business no matter what happens, even if it costs money."

Kalange said the expansion program was planned long before Avonmore courted Ward's Cheese, but the purchase will make more money available for the expansion.

Meeting with Hussein encouraging to Bush

KENNEBUNKPORT, Maine — President Bush said Thursday that King Hussein assured him Jordan would close its vital port to most Iraqi commerce.

The president said he had "no feeling of hope" that Iraq would roll back its army, and dispatched thousands more Marines to the Persian Gulf.

At a news conference at his vacation home in Maine, the president also expressed concern about reports that Americans were being rounded up in Kuwait by the occupying Iraqi military.

After meeting for two hours with Hussein, Bush was asked whether the situation in the gulf region were stabilizing or drawing closer to war. "I don't know that I can choose between the two options," he said.

Bush also said he has only decided whether to sign an order calling up reserve units.

Later, the Pentagon announced that the president had ordered U.S. ship commanders in the Middle East to intercept all ships carrying goods to or from Iraq or Kuwait, and a Pentagon official said the order also applied to Iraqi-bound shipments at the Jordanian port of Aqaba.

The order authorized ship commanders

to use the "minimum force necessary" to stop any ship suspected of carrying goods to or from Kuwait or Iraq, if the ship refused to stop or to be diverted from its course.

"To the maximum extent possible we

will conduct operations without the use of force," the presidential order said. A Pentagon source said earlier that those steps could include attempting to block the ship's passage or firing a warning shot across the vessel.

The president met with the Jordanian leader and later with Saudi Arabia's foreign minister, as military forces in the Persian Gulf continued to grow.

The Defense Department, meantime, estimated that the deployment of U.S. air, ground and naval forces in defense of Saudi Arabia will cost \$1.18 billion through September.

The announcement said the expense beyond what could not be estimated because the size and composition of the armed forces in the operation and their level of activity "are still evolving."

For the second time in three days, Bush said United Nations-backed economic sanctions were beginning to take their toll on Iraq. But when pressed for details, he said.

Americans face roundup orders

WASHINGTON — Iraq on Thursday ordered the 2,500 Americans in occupied Kuwait to assemble within two hours in a hotel in the capital for protection against "unspecified threats," the State Department said.

Hours after the deadline "very few" had complied, a senior U.S. official told The Associated Press.

President Bush called the order "a little vague right now."

He told reporters at his vacation retreat in Maine that "anything that causes individuals to do something against their will, of course, concern me."

But the president added, "I don't want to overstate it."

The senior U.S. official said in Washington that Iraqi military authorities had "implied" to Ambassador Nathaniel Howell that they "would go out and find" any Americans who did not comply with the order.

Idaho free of smog, bad air plaguing many major cities

WASHINGTON — More than half the U.S. population still lives in cities plagued by too much smog, and one third in areas with dangerously high carbon monoxide, the Environmental Protection Agency said Thursday.

But it didn't include any Idaho cities on either of its lists, for ozone or carbon monoxide standard violations.

Most major cities — 119 in all — flunked air quality checks for at least several days during the past three years, and some such as Los Angeles and New York failed much more frequently, the EPA said.

Eighteen cities violated standards for both smog and carbon monoxide, meaning in most cases they have major pollution problems in both summer and winter months.

"These lists demonstrate the magnitude of the air-pollution problem still remaining in this country," said EPA Deputy Administrator F. Henry Habicht.

The total number of cities was down five from last year, taking into account cities added to or dropped from the lists. But Habicht said 123 million people still live in areas exceeding the smog standard and almost 78 million are in areas that are over the carbon monoxide

limit.

The EPA listed 26 areas where monitoring of the air showed that smog or ozone levels were too high more than three times since 1987. Anything over 0.12 parts per million is considered a violation of "federal" standards. The lists didn't say how far, over that level the cities went.

The worst area, at least from the stand-





Weather summary

Moisture circulating into the Gem State from the south along with cool marine air spreading inland from the southwest, brought variable clouds into Idaho Thursday.

The southeast corner of the state had enough cloud moisture for scattered showers. By 1 p.m. Thursday isolated thunderstorms also popped up near Idaho Falls and from Malad City to east of Pocatello. These storms were likely to continue in southeast Idaho through the evening hours.

Besides the clouds and showers, smoke from numerous fires in Idaho and adjacent western states continued to drift through the state, reducing visibility to between five miles in some locations, and partially obscuring distant horizons elsewhere around the state. At 3 p.m., temperatures across Idaho were in the 70s to low 80s. The hot spot was Mountain Home with 86 degrees.

The hottest temperature in the state Thursday was 98 degrees at Hagerman. Stanley reported the coldest at 38 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperatures were 104 degrees at Lake Havasu City, Ariz., and Borrego Springs, Calif. The lowest was 39 at Gunnison, Colo.

Bush said in advance of Thursday's meeting that he would press King Hussein to deny Iraq access to the port at Aqaba, the last remaining waterway left open for the Baghdad regime.

He was asked whether Hussein had offered new assurances, and replied "Yes."

Secretary of State James A. Baker said Jordan "is seeking some guidance" about a provision in the U.N.-backed trade embargo that allows food for humanitarian purposes.

Aqaba is Iraq's main outlet now in the face of an international boycott if Hussein fails to act. Bush has indicated the U.S. Navy will set up a barricade to block Iraqi trade from Aqaba. The president also has offered to help offset Jordan's costs of cutting off business with Iraq.

Saudi Foreign Minister Prince Saud al-Faisal after meeting with Bush, said he thanked the president for protecting the kingdom. "We still hope that conflict can be avoided but ... if and only if Iraq withdraws from Kuwait and legalizes return to Kuwait," he said.

Bush made his comments as Saudi dampened any hopes of a diplomatic settlement. The Iraqi president issued a bellicose statement threatening the United States and calling Bush a liar.

The statement by a spokesman, broadcast in Baghdad and carried live on American television, would have thousands of Americans "wrapped in sand coffins" if a military showdown occurs.

Hussein said he hoped the crisis will begin to de-escalate. However, he also said, "I am not talking on behalf of anyone in the area — but myself."

point of number of days of violation, was the Los Angeles-Anheim-Riverside area of California, with 137 days, followed by Bakerville, Calif., with 44 days and New York City with 17.

Another list, included 41 areas where carbon monoxide levels exceeded the limit of 9 parts per million on two or more days in either 1988 or 1989.

Los Angeles led again, with 71 days, followed by Spokane, Wash., with 37 days; Oshkosh, Wis., with 32, the area of Steubenville, Ohio and Weirton, W.Va., with 31, and then New York and Las Vegas, Nev., with 26.

Smog is primarily a summertime problem, caused by the interaction of the more intense sunlight, with

chemicals in the air. Carbon monoxide becomes more difficult to control in the winter when temperature inversions keep more pollutants in the lower atmosphere.

Both can cause health problems, ranging from eye irritation to heart ailments.

The lists, which include complex data on the degree to which each area is violating the standards, are used by the EPA to determine whether clean air plans can be approved or if new actions must be taken. These can include requirements for increased auto inspections or less-polluting gasoline mixtures.

The EPA said it would use the lists to determine any new requirements that cities must meet under the Clean Air Act being worked out by a House-Senate conference committee.

The 18 areas on both lists include the nation's largest urban areas. More than a third are in California: Los Angeles, San Francisco-Oakland, Fresno, Modesto, Sacramento, San Diego and Stockton.

The others are Hartford, Conn.; Baltimore; Philadelphia; Washington; Greensboro-Raleigh; Salem, N.C.; Memphis, Tenn.; Raleigh-Durham, N.C.; Cleveland and El Paso, Texas.

Eight areas were dropped from the smog list from last year: Columbia, S.C.; Jacksonville, Fla.; Lafayette, Ind.; Phoenix; Huntsville, Ala.; Anderson, S.C.; Tulsa, Okla., and Portland, Ore. Three were added: Smyrna, Ky.; Cincinnati; and Kingsport-Bristol areas in Tennessee and Virginia, and Evansville, Ind.

managing director of Avonmore Foods, in a press release.

Already under way is a \$2 million renovation and expansion at the company's Richfield plant, where federal and county regulators have occasionally found fault with wastewater disposal practices.

Kalange expects the Gooding and Richfield plants to avoid such criticism in the future.

After the Gooding plant starts producing cheese, the Richfield plant will exclusively process whey — a byproduct of cheese production.

The new plant will produce cheddar and mozzarella cheeses.

Ward's now manufactures cheddar cheese with protein concentrates and refined edible lactose at plants in Richfield and Carey. The Carey plant's operations will not change in its expansion, Kalange said.

The main purchasers of Ward's cheeses in the United States are food companies. Lactose goes to U.S. Japan and whey protein goes to U.S. animal feed manufacturers and food processing companies.

Kalange did not disclose sales fig-

ures for Ward's Cheese or for Avonmore, but Idaho sales tax records show that sales of manufactured dairy products in Lincoln County totaled about \$11.8 million during the second quarter of 1990. Ward's Cheese is the only significant dairy processor in the county.

Avonmore Foods already owns plants in the Upper Midwest, but the Ward's Cheese purchase is the company's first venture into the western United States, Kalange said.

Ward's Cheese Inc.'s name will not change immediately, Kalange said.



Inflation up before oil shock

WASHINGTON (AP) — The cost of living rose 0.4 percent in July, the government said Thursday in a report showing persistent inflation even before the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait sent oil prices soaring.

The advance in the Labor Department's Consumer Price Index was slightly higher than most economists had expected. It came despite a 0.7 percent decline in energy costs, which is sure to be more than reversed when August prices are reported next month.

Excluding the volatile food and energy sectors, prices jumped a worrisome 0.6 percent. Analysts view this so-called "core" rate as a better gauge of underlying inflationary pressures.

Gasoline prices reacted almost immediately to the Aug. 2 invasion of Kuwait. Georgia State University economist Donald Ratner predicted consumer costs will shoot up 0.9 percent in August for the biggest rise since January; when a severe cold snap sent vegetable and fuel oil prices skyrocketing.

Meanwhile, in a separate report, the Commerce Department said housing starts dropped 2.6 percent in July for the sixth consecutive month to the lowest level since the last recession.

Financial markets took Thursday's inflation report as a sign the central bank would have little leeway to lower interest rates soon. Both stock and bond prices tumbled.

The combination of worrisome inflation and deteriorating economic growth presents a dilemma to the Federal Reserve, whose policy makers are scheduled to meet behind closed doors next Tuesday to shape monetary policy for the following six weeks.

Consumer prices had climbed a brisk 0.5 percent in June after a modest 0.2 percent rise in May.

For the first seven months of the year, consumer prices advanced at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 5.8 percent, compared with 4.6 percent for all of 1989. Services comprise 55 percent of the index.

The various changes put the index for all consumer prices at 130.4 in July. That means that a hypothetical selection of goods that cost \$10 in the 1982-84 base period cost \$13.04 last month, up from \$12.44 a year earlier.

By contrast, inflation at the wholesale level was improving before the oil shock. The Labor Department said last week that its Producer Price Index, which excludes services and imports, had risen at an annual rate of 3 percent from January through July, down from 4.8 percent for all of last year.

At the consumer level, the cost of shelter—the 0.9 percent accounting for half of the overall increase in July—had included a 5.1 percent jump in the cost of out-of-town lodging and a 1.1 percent increase in cable television rates.

Food and beverage prices were up 0.4 percent—the third consecutive increase, but smaller than June's 0.7 percent gain.

The price of fruit and vegetables rose 1.6 percent, reflecting a 32.2 percent jump in the price of bananas and a 17.1 percent gain in the cost of lettuce. Pork prices were down a slight 0.2 percent, the first decline since September, a period in which they rose 1.9 percent.

Transportation costs rose 0.3 percent last month. Gasoline prices, which had risen 2.5 percent in June, fell 0.3 percent. New-car prices, reacting to lackluster sales, fell 0.3 percent, the sixth consecutive decline. But used car prices rose 0.7 percent, the largest gain since January 1989.

Clothing prices fell 0.2 percent, the third drop in a row.

Medical care prices, continuing a long string of surprisingly high advances, rose 0.9 percent in July.

Greenhouse gas increasing fast

WASHINGTON (AP) — The gas most often implicated in the threat of global warming seems to be increasing faster than in past years, says a report issued Thursday by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

The concentration of carbon dioxide in the air increased at an average rate of 1.71 parts per million over the last four years, said NOAA's Dr. Pieter Tans.

That is somewhat higher than the 1.5 parts per million rise reported in

much of the 1980s. And in the 1960s the increase was reported at only 0.7 parts per million annually.

The "carbon dioxide" increase varies a lot from year to year. One year it goes very little, and the next year it makes up for the slow increase," Tans said in a telephone interview. "At the moment it seems to be increasing fairly fast."

Concentrations of carbon dioxide, methane, nitrous oxide, CFC-11 and CFC-12 are monitored by NOAA's Climate Monitoring and Diagnostics Laboratory in Boulder, Colo.

The increasing amounts of these gases in the air has caused concern in recent years.

Many scientists worry that the gases will act somewhat like a greenhouse, causing Earth to overheat.

Global concentrations of carbon dioxide, the most common of the so-called greenhouse gases, have increased by about 25 percent since the mid-1800s, to just over 350 parts per million.

Federal workers face layoffs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal workers are being told that they could face unpaid layoffs in the coming months because of the stalled budget talks between Congress and the Bush administration, officials said Thursday.

Under memo that began going out this week, the nation's 2.4 million federal workers were told that they could face up to 22 days without pay in the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1 if no deficit-reduction package is agreed upon and mandatory budget cuts follow.

Workers subject to the furloughs might be forced to take a week pay period, said the Office of Personnel Management.

Because President Bush and Congress have failed to agree on a deficit-reduction package, the administration has ordered federal agencies to draw up plans to begin Oct. 1 if no deficit-reduc-

tion spending by 31.9 percent.



FEC seeks foreign PACs ban reaction

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Election Commission on Thursday asked for input on a proposal to ban political action committees of companies at least half owned by foreigners.

The 50-commission vote came several weeks after the Senate voted 73-27 to include a similar proposal in a campaign finance reform bill.

The FEC plan, by Commissioner John Warner, McGaughy, establishes a 60-day public comment period, ending Oct. 12. The commission set an Oct. 31 public hearing.

Under the proposed rule, any corporation with 50 percent or more foreign ownership would be defined as a foreign national unable to participate in federal elections. Subsidiaries in the United States failing to qualify would not be allowed to contribute to campaigns or spend money on any federal election.

The commission also sought comments on how it should enforce the rule and on any other issues involving participation by foreign nationals in federal elections.

Currently, the FEC allows U.S. subsidiaries of foreign firms to have PACs, provided the foreign owners do not control or direct operation of the committees.

Supporting the proposal were Commission Chairman Lee Ann Elliott and commissioners Thomas J. Joschinski, Scott Thomas, and Danny Lee McDonald.

The Senate language, sponsored by Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, was approved as part of a bill that would impose spending ceilings on candidates and also try to eliminate PACs.

Bentsen said his amendment was intended to give "legislative underpinning" to the FEC in case the Senate drops the proposed ban on PACs in conference — or if the prohibition is ruled unconstitutional.

Bentsen cited Congressional Research Service statistics showing that PACs of foreign-owned companies contributed \$2.8 million to candidates in the 1988 elections, a 19 percent increase over 1986.

Marines heading for Middle East in biggest deployment since 'Nam

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Marine Corps is building to a force of 45,000 in the Mideast in its largest deployment since the Vietnam war, Pentagon sources said Thursday.

The forces include ground troops and amphibious units from around the globe, said the sources, who spoke only on condition of anonymity.

Separately, Gen. John Dailey, the assistant commandant of the Marine Corps, said the service had sent a "substantial" armada of assault troops by air and sea to Saudi Arabia, though he declined to estimate a number.

He said the Marines would provide "significant combat capability" in defense of Saudi Arabia and would be ready for a prolonged stay.

"We don't just arrive," the four-star general said in an interview. "We're there to stay for a fairly lengthy period."

The Marine buildup is just one part of what has become an enormous movement of U.S. ground forces to the Mideast. President Bush and the nation's military leaders have kept secret the exact number of U.S. troops responding to the two-week-old Persian Gulf crisis, but officials have prepared contingency plans to put 250,000 soldiers on the ground if necessary.

Pentagon spokesman Pete Williams said Thursday that Iraq has continued to increase its armed forces in Kuwait. He said intelligence estimates now put the number at 160,000.

He said there has been no major change in the character of the Iraqi forces, which the Pentagon earlier described as having a defensive appearance.

There's a continuing flow in and out of Kuwait, he said.

Meanwhile, the Pentagon announced that elements of the Army's 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment from Fort Bliss, Texas, had begun deploy-

ing Thursday for the Middle East.

As well, U.S. Air Force A-10 "Thunderbolt II" tank-killer attack jets from Myrtle Beach Air Force Base, S.C., have left for Saudi Ara-

bia, the announcement said.

For the Marine buildup, Pen-

tagon sources speaking on condition of anonymity said units are being pulled together from around the globe, including bases on both U.S. coasts, Hawaii and Okinawa.

In the main "components," the sources said:

Marine combat forces from

bases Camp Pendleton, El Toro

and Twentynine Palms, Calif., are

being flown to Saudi Arabia.

Elements of Marine units from

Norfolk, Va., as well as Camp Lejeune, Cherry Point and New River in North Carolina will become part of a

13-ship amphibious-assault task force that will be leaving within days.

A third brigade is on alert and

preparing to join the other two for a total force that is expected to number around 45,000 men if all units are deployed.

The third unit, also composed of amphibious forces, will remain floating off the coastal waters of Saudi Arabia "ready to land and project power anywhere on the peninsula," the sources said.

The forces will be bolstered by some 100 M60-A1 heavy tanks, more than 150 ground attack jets armed with AIM-7 Sparrow and AIM-9 Sidewinder missiles, and an array of troop transports, attack helicopters and light armored vehicles armed with 25 mm cannons.

All units come with the fuel, ammu-

nition and water-purifying capabili-

ties that will allow them to fight and sustain combat for 30 days.

Gen. Dailey, in an interview Thursday, said the Marine Corps is particularly suited to dealing with the Saudi crisis since its men can move with speed to an area with a "formidable combat capability," and yet remain off shore if necessary. "It gives us the opportunity to do nothing, to use non-provocative means" if a crisis subsides, Dailey said.

BUHL — Efforts to locate housing for seasonal workers at the Green Giant corn-packing plant have been successful, Plant Manager Darrel McRoberts said Thursday.

"It's really worked out great," McRoberts said. "We've been able to help 175 workers find housing."

He said much of the housing came from property owners who fixed up vacant homes for migrant workers.

Earlier this summer, McRoberts launched a campaign to find housing for workers. He said the Magic Valley's housing crunch threatened the Buhl plant's profitability because homeless workers might leave the area before the sweet corn crop was harvested and packed. To encourage landlords to rent to migrants, the company advanced wages to some workers for housing deposits and made payroll deductions of rent to assure landlords of payment, McRoberts said. The company's annual corn harvest and freezing campaign is nearly 10 percent complete, he said.

State to advertise for owners of unclaimed property, cash

Buttrey's sold to employees; no changes seen locally

GREAT FALLS, Mont. — The parent company of Buttrey Food and Drug announced Wednesday that an agreement had been reached to sell the 44 Buttrey stores in the Northwest to an investment group including current employees.

The sale should not affect the Twin Falls Buttrey store in the Blue Lakes Shopping Center, Buttrey Vice President of Human Resources John Sullivan said, especially since the buyout was organized by Buttrey's management.

"I don't anticipate any great changes," Sullivan said.

American Stores Co., based in Salt Lake City, said it had agreed to sell its Buttrey

Wyoming, Idaho and North Dakota, was put up for sale in May after months of rumors that the Great Falls-based company would be sold.

At that time, a group led by Buttrey management people expressed interest in buying the company, as did a spokesman for Albertson's Supermarkets.

Freeman Spogli & Co. has been exclusively devoted to organizing and investing proceeds from management buyouts since 1983 and has arranged 14 management-led acquisitions with total transaction values of more than \$2.4 billion.

The Los Angeles company expects no changes in the name or the way the Buttrey chain operates, except that Buttrey will be a free-standing, independent operation in-

stead of a subsidiary to a larger corporation, a spokesman for Freeman said.

"We don't see any need for changes in the way the company is performing," said the spokesman, who asked not to be identified.

"They have a strong management team, and it's a strong company. Typically, that's the type of investment we look for. We think it's a very good company."

Still under negotiation is the number of members of Buttrey's management team that will buy into the business.

Following the sale of the Buttrey Division, American Stores will operate 1,857 food and drug stores in 37 states. Miller said the company was pleased with the sale agreement.

Law officers dispute state's murder rate

TWIN FALLS — The Senate Judiciary Committee recently reported Idaho's murder rate is expected to climb 50 percent over last year, but law enforcement officials closer to home say the committee's numbers are wrong.

Idaho reported 26 instances of murder and non-negligent manslaughter in 1989, and the committee report predicted the number would climb to 39 this year, giving Idaho the highest rate of increase in the nation.

State and local law enforcement officials say the figures unfairly give Idaho a black eye, because the state's per capita murder rate is less than half the national average.

"I would look at the per capita rate," said James Whitehead, Chief of the Idaho Bureau of Investigations. "That would seem to me to be a more accurate picture."

Given an estimated population of just under 1 million, Idaho's projected 1990 murder rate would be slightly more than four murders per 100,000 people. The national average is 10.3 murders per 100,000 people, according to the judiciary committee report.

The committee based its prediction on a report of 20 killings in Idaho during the first half of 1990.

Only 12 of those were actual murders or "criminal homicides," said Karen Wallace, records clerk, for the Idaho Bureau of Criminal Identification, which provided the numbers.

The committee's prediction is based on 1989 figures compared to the first six months of 1990.


From January-June, 1989, there were 14 murders and non-negligent manslaughters reported in Idaho and the total for the year was 26. Committee figures show 20 such crimes for the first half of 1990. The committee extrapolated that figure into a prediction of 39 for the entire year, said a Judiciary Committee aide who worked on the report.

The real number for January-June of 1990 should be 12 murders — a decrease from 1989, Wallace said.

"The fact remains that in Idaho, murder is a very extraordinary event," said the committee aide.

BOISE — A review of how the Columbia River system is operated ought to include the whole system — including tributaries such as the Snake River — and the plight of salmon that swim in its waters.

Those remarks came here Wednesday at one of 14 public meetings being held throughout the Northwest to take comments on how uses of the Columbia system should be balanced.

"Disneyland enjoys the benefits of the Columbia River, while Idaho salmon struggle for survival," said Andy Brunelle, representing Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus. "Water flows that would help salmon survive should be included in the power planning process," he said.

Coordinated operation of the Columbia system as a single unit has enabled dam operators to produce more power. But if the federal government lists five "different" types of salmon as threatened or endangered species, as recently proposed by environmental groups and Indian tribes, it could radically alter how the river is managed, several speakers argued.

Future of Columbia River vital to Idaho

BOISE — The Columbia River system is the lifeblood of the public utility districts of Chelan, Douglas and Grant counties.

The river generates enough power to light 25 cities the size of Seattle. And locks at the dams make Lewiston a seaport 475 miles from the ocean.

Water from the river irrigates 6.5 million acres to produce \$4.5 billion in crops.

The river system also once produced 12 to 15 million salmon. That number now is about 2.5 million fish.

The Bureau of Reclamation, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Bonneville Power Administration are conducting a review and environmental impact statement of river operations in preparation for negotiations with Canada over the cooperative management of the Columbia River.

Cassia schools adopt alternate diploma policy, drug rules too

BURLEY — The Cassia County School Board adopted an alternate diploma policy and a drug enforcement policy at a meeting earlier this week.

The board also voted to deny the Murtough School District's request to send buses across district lines to pick up Cassia County students to attend Murtough schools.

The new diploma policy will allow special education students to earn credits toward obtaining a high school diploma in special courses.

Three possible certificates are available to students now: a standard diploma for students with a combination of regular and resource classes; a developmental diploma for students with classes designed to improve independent living and vocational skills, which would not provide for college entrance; and a certificate of completion for handicapped students who are unable to benefit from a structured training program.

Indian tribes unite against Castle Rock development

BOISE (AP) — Kesley Edmo, chairman of the Fort Hall Tribal Business Council, will carry a united protest from Idaho Indian tribes over the proposed Castle Rock development on the outskirts of Boise.

The proposed 177-unit subdivision has received planning and zoning Commission approval, but Indian leaders contend it's the site of a traditional Indian burial ground and should not be disturbed.

They have appealed, along with

Director of Special Education Art Walnum said he has received both positive and negative comments from the public concerning the new policy.

best for each student."

The board set a date on their agenda in June to review the policy, look at its "success rate," and invite comment from parents and teachers, said Doggett.

In addition to the new graduation program for special education students, Superintendent Norman Hurst said an advisory committee will try to improve coordination between resource room teachers and regular mainstream teachers.

Art Walnum said a study will be conducted at Dworshak Elementary this school year allowing a resource teacher to work with special education students in the regular classroom alongside the mainstream teacher.

A separate resource teacher and class will remain segregated.

This study will conclude by determining which group benefits most.

The board also approved a new drug policy that determines disciplinary actions to be taken for students and district employees using drugs or alcohol.

Superintendent Hurst said state and federal law are suggesting school districts adopt such a policy.

"We are in the midst of a growing epidemic of homicide," said Senate Judiciary Chairman Joseph R. Biden Jr., D-Del., when he released the forecast two weeks ago.

The report predicted 23,220 people will be murdered across the nation this year, about 2,000 more than the figure for 1989 and ahead of the previous record of 23,040, set in 1980.

America's murder rate of 10.5 per

100,000 people makes it "the most murderous industrialized nation" in the world, the panel said. In Great Britain, the rate is 0.8 per 100,000; in Japan, 1.0; in West Germany, 1.2.

The report said the upscale surge

in murders is due to dwindling supplies of cocaine in major cities that have escalated the drug wars, thus

leaving them to just

strictly claim that one of the causes is increasing.

Idaho**GOP leader attacks Democrat worker**

BOISE (AP) — A leader of Idaho Republicans says he wants to hear what he expects will be "mudslinging and dirty tricks" from the campaign staff of Democratic Senate candidate Ron Twilegar.

Idaho Falls attorney Blake Hall, former state party chairman, told a Boise news conference on Thursday that when Twilegar hired Richard Callow as his campaign manager, he was getting a "professional mud-slinger."

He called upon Twilegar to promise to run a clean campaign.

Hall's appearance was on behalf of the GOP Senate nominee, Rep. Larry Craig, but Hall said the Craig campaign had nothing to do with it.

In response, Callow said complaining about mudslinging is something Republicans do for every major campaign, a ritual sort of like preparing for deer season.

"It's not even worth the denial," said Callow. "Voters are very smart. They can see through Republican-style attack spots."

The voters really are interested in seeing a fair comparison between the records of the two candidates,

that's the kind of campaigning I like and it will work very well in Idaho," he said.

"If Democrat nominee Ron Twilegar's recent choice of Richard Callow to manage his campaign is any indication, healthy Idaho competition will probably be replaced by mudslinging with dirty tricks," said a written statement distributed by Hall at the news conference.

"I am bringing this up today so when the mudslinging comes you know where it's coming from," said Hall.

He played for reporters a videotape from the 1988 Pennsylvania attorney general campaign. He said Callow "managed" the unsuccessful race of Democratic nominee Ed Mezvinsky. Mezvinsky lost to Republican Eric Prete.

The brief commercial attacked Prete for "plea-bargaining" with a major drug dealer, allowing him to back on the street again.

Hall said the commercial, aired at the last minute in an attempt to smear Prete, contained a lie and jeopardized a major drug investigation.

Boisean given prison time

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A Boise man convicted of robbing a bank in Salt Lake City last December has been sentenced to three years in a federal prison.

Marion Howard Stevenson, 70, was convicted in May of robbing West One Bank at 1575 South Main Street.

U.S. District Judge Thomas Greene said Thursday he would recommend that Stevenson serve the time at the federal prison in Boron, Calif. He also was sentenced to three years probation.

"This was a particularly peculiar incident," Greene said. "As serious

as it was, it was a feeble attempt at a robbery. He bumped his head, shot a pistol in the air and walked away.

"You will be 76 years old when you are finished. I hope the rest of your days can be spent in solitude and retirement," Greene said.

But Assistant U.S. Attorney Mark Vincent said he thought Stevenson should have received a stiffer sentence.

"I think he's a dangerous man," he said. "One shot was fired and a person doesn't take a gun unless they intend to use it."

Stevenson lived in Boise for several years.

potential water shortages at the federal dams that line the Columbia, with agencies looking everywhere for water, Twin Falls Canal Co. manager Jack Eakin said. Some feel irrigation is wasteful and a good place to come looking for water.

"There's a lot of other places they can look for water other than here," he said. Salmon are worth saving, he said, but other uses need to be considered as well.

The Bureau of Reclamation, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Bonneville Power Administration are conducting a review and environmental impact statement of river operations in preparation for negotiations with Canada over the cooperative management of the Columbia River.

Those three federal agencies operate dams and water projects on the Columbia system or market the power generated by them. The inter-agency team conducting the review will accept written comments on the process until Sept. 20.

One person at the hearing Wednesday asked why the corps has apparently delayed installing fish screens — devices that keep young fish from passing through turbines — the dams — though Congress has appropriated the funds for the screens.

"The hang-up was being able as an agency to show the effectiveness of the screens," said Ray Jaren, representing the corps.

Ed Robertson of the Idaho Conservation League asked how the mandate in the 1980 Northwest Power Act to treat fish and power equitably fits into the review process.

Equitable treatment doesn't mean allocating 50 percent of the water to power and 50 percent to fish, but a "reasonable balance," said Roy Fox of the BPA.

"I don't believe we'd be facing an endangered species petition if there was equitable treatment," Robertson said.

Fish runs in the Columbia River system generally are improving, Fox said. But "some stocks have not benefited from improvements," he said.

"We have been following the mandate of the act," he said. "Overall, you cannot say there hasn't been a equitable consideration."

As evidence of progress, Fox cited money spent on fish hatcheries, bypass facilities at dams and habitat improvement projects. But the fundamental question raised by the environmental groups and Indian tribes that petitioned to put salmon on the endangered species list centers on the overall management of the fish in the river system, he said.

The answers depend on how the fish are managed, and whether management is centered on wild

fish, hatchery fish or a mix, Fox said.

The states focus on harvestable salmon, and if that is the focus the fish management is in good shape, Fox said.

A number of people attending the meeting expressed skepticism about agencies that generate and sell electricity competing the operation review and negotiating a power agreement with Canada.

Idaho Steelhead and Salmon Unlimited noted that private power interests have a role in the negotiations, but private fishery interests do not.

"We believe it is unjust for power interests to be allowed in while fishery interests are kept out," said ISSU's written statement.

Agency representatives said the hearings on the operating review are a way for those interests to be expressed and included in the review process. They also said they would work with federal fisheries representatives throughout the negotiation process.

Only those who will sign the power coordination agreement, however, will be in the negotiations.

The federal agencies are facing a big battle to get fishery representatives in the negotiating table, said Ed Chaney of the Northwest Resource Information Center Inc. in Boise. Shoring power will be as big an issue as energy review, he said.

"It remains to be seen if we really take a fresh look at how the system is operated," Chaney said. The agencies are likely to make strategy decisions driven by marketing factors, he said.

The aluminum industry, for instance, is extremely interested in the power agreements and the effects on the industry's electricity supplies, Fox said. That industry accounts for about 30 percent of BPA's revenue.

Others at the meeting said the review ought to include how possible changes in the system operation will affect the need for new power resources, and the environmental impacts of those other resources.

Though the effects on southern Idaho still are unknown, Idaho Power Co. is concerned about how the process will affect its operations at Brownlee Reservoir and upstream.

"We're just interested in following the process," Jan Packwood, Idaho Power vice president for power supply,

"I quite frankly am curious about


how they're going to balance uses of the river," Packwood said.

U.S. pilots say 'mice' won't play

SAUDI ARABIA (AP) — In what one called "a little cat and mouse," U.S. airmen said Thursday that American pilots have locked in their weapons radar on Iraqi planes, which have quickly turned and fled.

"They don't want to play with us," one crew chief said. "If I were in a Mirage and at F-15

locked onto me, I'd get out of there fast, too.

When an American jet's weapons systems radar locks onto another plane, it means the U.S. jet has found its target and communicated that to its missile.

The Iraqi pilot knows it, too, because his plane carries a "warning system" something like the "fuzzbuster" radar used by some automobile drivers in America to warn them that they're under the scrutiny of police radar.

Although the U.S. airmen declined to go into detail, there was no indication that any of the encounters involved Iraqi planes attempting to

fly into Saudi Arabian space. The airmen suggested that the encounters occurred during missions near the border with Kuwait.

Col. John McBroom, commander of the 1st Tactical Fighter Wing from Langley Air Force Base in Virginia, refused to confirm the pilots'

reports and said he had instructed his airmen not to discuss any contact with Iraqi jets.

"I'm not going to get into our encounters," he said.

But McBroom did say he considered U.S. air power best for superior to Iraq's.

"We're not over here to go to war," McBroom said, "but we will finish one quickly in the air."

Another officer in the unit and several crew chiefs said there have been several instances in

which weapons systems aboard U.S. F-15s

locked onto the Iraqi French-made Mirage jets.

"One of my pilots told me they turn and run as soon as the radar locks on," one crew chief said.

"There's been a little cat and mouse but when the weapons lock on, they're gone," said another.

Asked again about the encounters, McBroom said: "All I'd do is remind you our radar can

lock on at a pretty good range. Beyond that you'll have to ask the Iraqi."

He seemed to be suggesting that the episodes involved Iraqi planes flying well within Kuwaiti airspace.

In Washington, Pete Williams, the chief Pentagon spokesman, said he had asked military officials whether the report had received no information that would enable him to confirm or deny the accuracy of the crew chief's remarks.

McBroom said the fighter unit felt somewhat vulnerable on the ground when it arrived last week. But now, it has received powerful ground protection from other U.S. forces, including Patriot ground-to-air missile systems.

The unit has set up camp at a Saudi air base, it uses spare Saudi hangars, maintenance garages, and other facilities.

Ground rules for the a pool of U.S. reporters flown here by the Pentagon prohibit disclosure of the base's location, the number of planes and other weapons systems or the names of non-command officers.

The men are living in Saudi barracks and schools. But a tent city is under construction on the base, as is a portable hospital.

'MASH' hospital treating cases of heat stress

SAUDI ARABIA (AP) — The U.S. military is treating about 15 cases of minor heat stress a day as it rushes to finish a tent hospital reminiscent of the television series "MASH."

Already up and running at the air-conditioned, 50-bed facility in a small ward for outpatient care and an overnight ward. A two-bed operating room was expected to be ready by day's end.

So similar is the "air-transportable hospital" to the TV series that the facility's commander, Maj. Rich Williams, said that doctors, nurses and other personnel have begun joking about their resemblance to the show's cast.

Williams told a pool reporter that he had become the group's Col. Sherman Potter, the character who commanded the MASH unit.

Others were starting to pick up nicknames as well, the major said.

So far, most people coming to the hospital for treatment have been suffering from minor heat stress. The usual treatment is rehydration by drinking water. In more severe cases, patients are given intravenous injections of nutrient-laden fluids.

Williams said there have been no reported

cases of heat stroke, a more serious ailment. He

said the overnight ward had not been needed but added, "I'm sure it will be by tonight."

In the outpatient ward, several patients were being treated for heat stress. One was receiving intravenous fluids.

"This is your fault, colonel!" the man joked to his commanding officer, Col. John McBroom, who laughed.

A 28-year-old sergeant from Sarasota, Fla., who had fainted after several hours of swinging a sledgehammer while setting up tents in near 100-degree weather.

"I didn't take enough breaks at all," he said.

U.S. troops are being told to drink at least six gallons of water a day but even with that seven aircrew interviewed this week have said they are finding it impossible to adjust to the desert heat.

"We'll never get used to it. All we can do is drink and drink and complain a bit," an Air Force captain said Thursday.

"If you liked everybody, they'd all say we'd rather go home but we've got a job to do," said an Air Force sergeant.

McBroom visited the tent site and told the

men and women to knock off work until nightfall, when temperatures generally drop into the 80s.

"Ninety-five percent of them will go so hard at it even in this heat, that you have to pull them back," the colonel said.

Also receiving treatment at the hospital was a tank gunner from the Army's 82nd Airborne

who had aggravated a finger fracture and an Air Force colonel who had popped a dental cyst and was having it treated by a dentist.

The hospital's chief nurse, Lt. Col. Susan Hiles of Goodrich, Mich., said the hospital staff expected that they would eventually have to treat patients with diseases related to food, water and improper sanitation.

Williams said that Hepatitis A and some parasitic infections are common to Saudi Arabia, and that malaria was a concern in some parts of the kingdom.

The hospital is near an air-conditioned tent city being built to accommodate at least 1,100 men and women of the 1st Tactical Fighter Wing from Langley Air Force Base, Va. Already operating is a field kitchen, which served 500 for breakfast Thursday.

Gorbachev restores citizenship of Solzhenitsyn, 22 others

MOSCOW (AP) — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev, apologizing through mediation, she told The Associated Press on Thursday in an interview from their home.

She has restored the citizenship of exiled writer Alexander Solzhenitsyn and 22 other literary, scientific and cultural figures, officials said Thursday.

In addition to Solzhenitsyn, the Nobel laureate charged with treason in 1974, Gorbachev's presidential decree returns citizenship to chess champion Victor Korchnoi, writers Vasily Aksyonov, Vladimir Voinovich, Lev Karpov and Georgi Vlasov, scientists Yuri Orlov and Valerii Chalizade, and artist Oskar Rubin, Soviet media reported.

Gennady Chernomyrdin, chairman of the department of the Supreme Soviet's secretariat, and Solzhenitsyn had agreed to accept Soviet citizenship but the writer's wife, Natalia, denied it.

BURLEY — Bareback and bullriders jumped to the fore at the opening night of the Cassia County Rodeo Thursday night.

In fact, things went so well in bareback that when two-time Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association all-around champ Lewis Field of Elk Ridge, Utah, was awarded a 75 as the final rider of the event, the judges were roundly boozed by a large crowd.

In the bullriding, seven of the 11 riders went to the time limit and two others were disqualified for slapping the animal with their off hands after apparently winning the whistle successfully.

The rodeo continues the next two nights at the Cassia County Fairgrounds with tonight's highlight being the return of Albion-grown Kent Cooper to his home rodeo. A highlight of Saturday's closing session will be crowning of the queen.

Steve Smith of Hollywood, Calif., opened the rodeo with a 73-point ride and later was joined at that level by Dave Sherod, of Pleasant Grove, Utah, and Field. But the lead went to Canada's Cam Morris who was awarded a 75 for his effort on Wicked Wenda.

Again, the best came first in the bullriding when Scot Wheatley, Kremmling, Colo., opened with a 79. He later was tied by Choctaw, Oklahoma's Don Owens and Scott Kesi of Lemhi finished a point behind.

Charlotte Schmidt, ranked No. 2 nationally in barrel racing, showed why when she turned in a 17.10-second time, becoming the fourth consecutive rider to drive the lead down.

Steer wrestling also upheld the world rankings as Canada's Mark Roy, ranked third coming into the Cassia event, took the lead at 4.9. Lance Robinson of Farmington, Utah, was second at 5.4.

After the big riding display in bareback, a surprise arose in saddle bronc riding when only one more was covered. That was again by the first-man-out-Bill Felker of Carmen, Idaho, who was given a 67. The four others trying it were thrown.

Only two teams were successful in team roping: Darrell Norcutt, Lovelock, Nev., and Russ Funk, Las Vegas, turned in an 8.5. Calf roping lead went to Jerry Jetton, Stephenville, Texas, who had a 9.4. He currently is 11th in the world rankings.

In the queen's competition, Jennifer Edwards led the candidates with a 27.3 in pole bending.

Twin Falls man headed for Transplant Games

TWIN FALLS — Jim Bohrn, a resident of Twin Falls, will represent the Northwest in the upcoming U.S. Transplant Games in Indianapolis, sponsored by the National Kidney Foundation.

The transplant games give people who have had heart, liver or kidney transplants an opportunity to compete in athletic events at a national level.

There are eight total events available in which transplant patients can compete, including two team events — swimming and track. Bohrn will be competing only in individual events, including bowling, table tennis and tennis.

The 1990 U.S. Transplant Games will be set up like the Olympics with gold, silver and bronze medals awarded. The games will begin Oct. 5 in the same stadium that served as the site of the 1987 Pan American Games and the 1988 Summer Olympic Trials.

Bohrn, 36, has had two kidney transplants, the most recent a year ago, and he believes the transplant has affected his mobility intensity.

"The drugs they give you hinder you quite a bit," he said. "You aren't one-third the player you used to be. Your muscle and

He was selected from his history in athletics. Bohrn won state in the bowling event and third in table tennis and he began tennis for 15 years.

There are also a few others that will be representing the Northwest from areas outside of the Magic Valley.

Pete Rose's earnings hit 11 cents an hour in prison

MARION, Ill. — Pete Rose is earning 11 cents an hour working in a prison machine shop and isn't playing for the inmates' softball team yet, the assistant warden said Thursday.

Rose, serving a five-month sentence at the Federal Work Camp in Marion, spends eight hours a day in a machine shop welding and fabricating metal with 70 other prisoners.

"His work supervisor says he has been getting good reports. He gets in there and works just as hard as the rest of them," Assistant Warden Randy Davis said.

Baseball's all-time hits leader also has been watching the inmate softball teams, but hasn't been able to play because his knee is healing from surgery on July 20, Davis said.

Despite rumors about preferential treatment, Davis said Rose is treated like any other inmate — doing basic chores eight hours a day and sharing a dormitory cubicle with another prisoner. The former Cincinnati Reds manager turned himself in at the prison Aug. 8.

The Marion Daily Republican on Wednesday said confidential sources were reporting Rose had meals delivered to him in his cubicle and had his bed made for him. He was allowed a TV and had cut a deal with federal officials to get out of prison early.

Court and prison officials have said the five-month sentence is not negotiable. Rose is scheduled to be released Jan. 7, then spend three months at a halfway house in Cincinnati.

Davis denied the rest of the report. "He's housed just like any other inmate in camp, dorm-style housing, two men to a 12-by-12 cubicle," Davis said.

"There's no TV in cells or rooms or anything else."

Davis attributed the report to inmates irritated by having a famous man in their midst.

"It sounds like a sour grapes type of thing," he said, adding that there have been no reports of animosity on the part of other prisoners toward Rose.

"So far, I don't think he had any problems," Davis said. "I think he's pretty well acclimated to the camp."

The 49-year-old Rose was convicted of two counts of filing false income tax returns to hide his gambling income and was fined \$350,000 in income from gambling, autograph signing and baseball memorabilia sales. He also was fined \$50,000.

Giants watch pennant hopes slowly disappear

PHILADELPHIA — Von Hayes is in trouble with the fans, not so much for his play as for his mouth.

But he temporarily turned the boos to cheers in the ninth inning Thursday.

Hayes was booed lustily by many in a crowd of 37,340 Thursday until he hit a game-winning two-run homer that lifted Philadelphia to a 6-4 victory in the ninth inning over the San Francisco Giants.

"We're not going to win a pennant that way," said Giants' fifth-year manager Roger Craig. "This is the toughest road trip since I've been here."

The victory was the third straight of a series sweep for Philadelphia, and left the Giants with a five-game losing streak. San Francisco headed home after a 2-8 road trip.

"We came in here with a chance to win the pennant. Now it's going to be tough. We dug ourselves a big hole. I thought we'd be in better shape going home."

The Giants had gotten within 4½ games of the NL West-leading Cincinnati Reds after trailing by more than a dozen. Now they're nine back again.

Hayes started ripping the fans after they cheered for Pittsburgh's Doug Drabek last month when the Pirates' pitcher got to within one out of a no-hitter against the

Giants.

Phillies manager Nick Leyva isn't exactly happy with the Hayes-fans relation.

"The biggest reason is that Von likes to express his feelings. He gets on those radio talk shows and says he doesn't like fan reactions," Leyva said.

"You can't do that. They pay us a lot of money to perform. There is nothing you can do about whether they cheer or boo. We bring it on ourselves. We have to take it in."

Steinbrenner's partners sue Vincent to stop ban

NEW YORK — One day after it appeared the limited partners of the Yankees were looking into the future in an orderly fashion, chaos returned Thursday.

As George Steinbrenner prepared to set a new regime in motion once his exile is to begin Monday, two limited partners filed a lawsuit against Commissioner Fay Vincent and his chief investigator, John Dowd, seeking to oust Vincent's July 30 ruling that the principal owner relinquished

control of the franchise as penalty for his \$40,000 payment to known gambler Howard Spiegel.

Daniel McCarthy and Harold Bowman and Vincent's investigation of Steinbrenner was "an inquisition."

The plaintiffs seek a temporary restraining order, a preliminary injunction and a permanent injunction against Steinbrenner having to resign as general partner Monday. In

his suit, McCarthy, Steinbrenner's tax attorney, and his wife, Diane, claimed Steinbrenner was "blatantly" terminated from baseball.

The suit further alleged, "Apparently, Vincent has been waiting for the opportunity and excuse to rid himself and the game of this blight" and seized upon the conduct of Steinbrenner in this matter as his vehicle for doing so. Vincent has drawn upon vague and ill-defined powers vested in the commissioner under rules in the Major League

Agreement and has applied those powers against Steinbrenner in an unprecedented manner."

Historians doubt Kuwait will turn into another U.S. quagmire

WASHINGTON — Saddam

Hussein's takeover of Kuwait wasn't 24 hours old when the Senate interrupted its business to deplore it and denounce him! But what was that echo in the chamber?

Why did a senator or two refer — in a looking-over-his-shoulder way — to the "Gulf of Tonkin Resolution"?

Why did minds turn back to an August debate 26 years ago? In that debate, the Senate, over the misgivings of only two senators, reacted to reports that U.S. Navy vessels had been attacked off North Vietnam's coast by authorizing President Lyndon Johnson to "prevent further aggression."

LBJ used that resolution as the equivalent of a declaration of war, the basis on which he sent 250,000 American soldiers to fight an Asian war, America's longest war, the first it lost.

Almost by stealth, America was sucked into a guerrilla war on the side of an unpopular government. Johnson hoped each escalation would be enough — only to find that each, instead, made withdrawal more difficult.

And Vietnam deteriorated into a quagmire, an inextricable situation. The United States couldn't win and couldn't quit.

Is the Gulf crisis another quagmire in the making, another place where U.S. forces can't win and can't get out, stuck in 100 degree heat, unable to do more than wait to react to Saddam Hussein? Does history offer some guidance here?

For the most part, historians familiar with the region and with the ways war develop are more optimistic than that. They find some

similarities to Vietnam. But they draw encouragement from some big differences:

"Not the least of which," said John Gaddis, diplomatic historian at Ohio University in Athens, Ohio, "is that this thing really is a multinational effort that grows out of a rather shocking provocation — and neither was true in Vietnam."

Bernard Lewis, a retired Princeton University historian and author of 20 books on the Islamic world; said Saddam Hussein made a crucial miscalculation last weekend: He sought to turn his invasion of Iraq into a religious crusade; instead, said Lewis, he only "succeeded in isolating himself even in the Arab world."

If his maneuver had worked: Saddam might have made his battle into an Arab-against-the-West struggle. Instead, he made it the world-against-Iraq, Lewis said.

Saddam called for a jihad, a religious war, for the Arab masses to rise up against their leaders. And he did it just as the leaders were assembled in a summit at Cairo.

In response, the leaders of Egypt, Syria, Saudi Arabia and the other oil states of the Persian Gulf, in an extraordinary rebuff to a fellow Arab, decided to send a military force to protect Saudi Arabia from Saddam.

In Vietnam, by contrast, America's allies, even in Asia, largely limited their support to the sidelines. Only Australia, New Zealand, Thailand and Korea sent sizeable combat contingents.

Political scientist Nathan Brown, a Mideast specialist at George Washington University, said quagmire in the Persian Gulf "may be" the best we can hope for, "considering the alternatives — a humiliating U.S. withdrawal or a military offensive against the Iraqis in Kuwait, requiring a scale of warfare that is politi-

cally impossible."

But Lewis views the threat of Saddam controlling the oilfields of Iraq, Kuwait and Saudi Arabia as grave than that.

"You simply can't allow this man to obtain a stranglehold on the world's supplies," he said.

George Herring, a University of Kentucky historian of the Vietnam war, said he sees in the Persian Gulf one big similarity to Vietnam and one big difference.

The difference, he said, is that the American commitment to Vietnam was slow and concealed as Lyndon Johnson could manage. It grew from a few hundred U.S. troops sent to advise the French in the 1950s to more than 200,000 troops, engaged in full-fledged combat in July 1965.

In contrast, the Persian Gulf operations has been "sudden and dramatically large," Herring said. Where Johnson sought to underplay the

buildup, President Bush broadcasts his determination to commit whatever force it takes to pry Iraq out of Kuwait.

What's interesting this time is that this is the first crisis where the great powers have all been in agreement. Saddam Hussein doesn't have that ability to play the superpowers against each other. It's been a more remarkable thing, the unanimity that Bush has been able to rally behind him.

If Saddam Hussein makes no big moves, doesn't use poison gas, doesn't go into Kuwait, doesn't stage air raids on the Turkish border, if he just sits tight, I expect that international support for sanctions will lose ground," Oye says. "And if they are not universally supported they lose their effectiveness."



F&G meddling with hunting seasons

The Fish and Game Commissioners are at it again. Last year, they placed unnecessary restrictions on the Big Wood River, a major source of recreation for many Magic Valley residents. They claimed such restrictions were necessary and desired by most Magic Valley residents.

The reality was that the restrictions were implemented at the request of a few Sun Valley fishing guides who hoped to boost their business by managing the river for trophy fly fishermen. The people of the Magic Valley were so outraged that a sportsmen's coalition was organized and they filed suit against the commissioners. They won an injunction against the commissioners and the new regulations were not implemented.

Undaunted, the Fish and Game Commissioners are now attacking big game hunting in Idaho. Again, they claim their changes are for the good of Idaho's big game hunters, but the reality is once again, the changes are to the detriment of the average sportsman.

To begin with, the regulations propose shortening the archery season by 10 days. They will then issue 2,000 rifle permits to be used during this 10-day period. The rationale is that rifle hunters should have an opportunity to hunt for trophy bull elk during the height of the rut.

There are about 20,000 licensed bow hunters in Idaho. This move by the Fish and Game eliminates 10 days of hunting for 18,000 Idaho sportsmen (20,000 bow hunters minus the 2,000 rifle hunters). This equates to 180,000 days of lost hunting opportunity for Idaho's sportsmen. However, the Fish and Game Commission indicates a major goal of theirs is to provide more opportunity for Idaho sportsmen. Clearly, this move reduces outdoor opportunity for Idaho

hunters. Idaho bow hunters, according to Fish and Game studies, have about a 6 percent success rate. Last year, Idaho bow hunters harvested a total of 1,300 elk. This includes not

only bulls but cows as well. By Fish and Game estimates, the new regulations will equate to an increased harvest of about 1,000 mature bull elk.

At the same time, Fish and Game is publicly concerned that the bull-to-cow ratio in many parts of Idaho has dropped to a crisis level. In a logic reserved only for Fish and Game Commissioners, they address the problem of the low bull-to-cow ratio by increasing the bull harvest.

It is not just the bow hunters who are "getting the shaft" from the Fish and Game Commissioners.

The commission has decided to limit the number of back-country elk permits. Most sportsmen realize the back-country units are dominated by guided hunts.

However, it is public land and anyone with the right equipment could compete with the outfitters and guides for those same back-country elk.

Thanks to the Fish and Game Commission, however, the outfitters and guides will have less back-country competition since the number of hunters there will be limited. This restriction is blatant favoritism by the commissioners to their favored special interest group. In a similar vein, the back country season for elk and deer lasts 65 days. Imagine the selling power the guides will have by offering limited competition and a 24-

month-long season for their customers. By limiting the access to some units, the result will be more hunter competition in the remaining game units. The people of Idaho are being sold out in favor of a special interest group and out-of-state interests.

The Fish and Game Commission claims a study shows Idaho hunters want the chance to hunt trophy bull elk.

However, in reality, the study statistics indicate taking a trophy bull is one of the least important reasons Idahoans hunt elk. In fact, of 33 reasons why we hunt elk, harvesting a six-point bull was fifth from the bottom (least important) of the list.

For non-resident hunters, taking a trophy elk was far more important, with 50 percent of those out-of-state hunters responding listing it either "quite important" or "extremely important." Could it be the commissioners are tailoring the regulations for out-of-state interests?

Unless we, as Idahoans, want to simply succumb to the special interest groups and their commissioners, we had better do something.

Sportsmen of this state need to organize and do so quickly. Talk with the people at your local sporting goods stores or archery shops or the Idaho Bow-Hunters Association to see what can be done.

Also, write to the Fish and Game Department, P.O. Box 23, Boise, ID 83707, attention John Beecham, and voice your disapproval: The sportsmen of this state can no longer afford to sit back and assume the commissioners will protect your best interests; they do not and will not.

ISLAND PARK — Idaho conservation and sportsmen's groups are making a last-ditch charge at the Island Park hydroelectric project, saying it has survived so far only through backdoor politics.

"It's the ninth inning, and of course we're concerned," said Mick Mickelson of Pocatello, head of the Henry's Fork Foundation.

The controversial hydro-generator has a federal license, and the Senate approved \$1 million for earlier this month.

Now, conservation and sportsmen's groups are starting a lobbying campaign to get the \$1 million taken out of a \$20.8 billion appropriations bill. A House-Senate conference committee is scheduled to look at that bill in September.

Boise redevelopment suffers fund cut

BOISE — Boise's downtown redevelopment agency has almost \$500,000 less in federal subsidies than its officials previously thought.

As a result, the Capital City Development Corp. is weighing substantial cuts in improving the downtown renewal area next year, possibly deferring some projects.

Those could mainly be for "streetscape," or improvements such as sidewalk and benches, in the city's eight-block renewal area west of the Boise City Hall.

"It's frustrating for us in that we had prepared a financial plan to finish off the downtown project," Capital City Executive Director Rick Greenfield said Wednesday. Now with the lesser amount of money, we have to go back to the drawing board."

Condemned man wants to marry, sues

BOISE — Lovelorn Thomas Eugene Creech, Idaho's most notorious Death Row inmate, is asking state authorities to court over their refusal to allow him to marry.

The condemned murderer and his fiancee, Sherry Lynn Miller, contending their constitutional rights are being trampled, said they planned to file documents in 4th District Court in Boise to force the issue.

Man drowns in fight with Boise police

BOISE — A Pocatello man released from prison last month drowned in a dredge pond near the Boise River after a struggle with a Boise policeman, whom department officials would not identify.

Ronald Earl Walker, 23, died early Wednesday morning after a battle that started on shore and ended in the middle of the approximately two-acre pond, which is about 15 feet deep and filled with weeds.

Police were breaking up a loud party involving about a dozen people, some of whom were underage drinkers, at about 1:30 a.m., when the incident occurred at the pond in the ParkCenter area on Boise's east side.

Pilot of boat which exploded sees charge

GRANGEVILLE — The pilot of a jet boat that exploded Sunday in Hells Canyon, injuring 13 of the 16 people aboard, has been charged with battery against one of the victims of the blast — the boat's own cracker.

Timothy L. Jewett, 51, was charged with battery in a criminal complaint signed by Diane Cobb, after he allegedly grabbed her by the throat Tuesday, Idaho County Sheriff's Deputy John Petrie said Wednesday.

Petrie said Jewett was scheduled to appear in Idaho County Magistrate Court in Grangeville at 9 a.m. Aug. 31. Both he and Cobb are from Whitebird.

Andrus sees strong growth for Idaho

IDAHO FALLS — Gov. Cecil Andrus says that "although other states face financial difficulties, he sees Idaho continuing economic growth through 1992 and beyond."

But his Republican opponent in this fall's gubernatorial race, Roger Fairchild, says he sees the state's economy in a cooling trend. He predicted that unless changes are made in spending, the governor will be asking for more tax increases from the Legislature.

"The economy is cooling off, not heating up," Fairchild said, in a telephone interview.

But Andrus, crediting Idaho's economic strength to diversification of jobs and conservative management of state spending, said the state has the ability to withstand economic peaks and valleys.

State probe finds no evidence of wiretaps

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A week-long state investigation turned up no evidence that Senate President Pro Tem Michael Crapo's Capitol office telephones had ever been tapped, according to the investigator's report released on Thursday.

The investigator disclosed no evidence to indicate that the telephone cables had been altered or the illegal monitoring occurred. Special Agent Don Christian of the Department of Law Enforcement wrote in his report.

But following release of the reports in Idaho Falls by Crapo and Gov. Cecil Andrus, Department Director Mark Richardson said the investigation's findings did not invalidate Crapo's original suspicion or the evidence a private investigator he hired after getting a confidential tip.

"That does not preclude the fact that something couldn't have been done," Richardson said.

It was only after receiving that verbal assurance from both Richardson and Andrus, who ordered the in-

vestigation upon Crapo's public disclosure of his concern, that the Senate's Republican leader decided the state investigative report was acceptable.

"I have to make it clear what they are stating is that they were not able to independently verify the investigator's findings," Crapo said. "I don't want this thing blown out of proportion. But I don't want it covered up either. I don't see any evidence that it is being covered up at this point."

He also said that since his disclosure on Aug. 3 that he believed his phones had been bugged, "I've had a couple of state officials express to me that they have the same concerns. ... The ones who have talked with me are not legislative officials."

He declined to identify the officials who have talked with him.

The state Bureau of Investigation's communication specialist J.D. Botteger said his inspection of the telephone system in the Capitol could find no basis to conclude "that a wiretap may have been installed on

Pocatello, Bonneville schools may have strikes

Contract negotiations at school districts around the state were continuing this week, but while most appear close to settlement, strikes are looming in two eastern Idaho districts.

Salary and benefit increases were at the heart of the disputes threatening the start of school in the Bonneville and Pocatello school districts in less than three weeks.

A last ditch attempt to independently negotiate a settlement collapsed Thursday in Pocatello, and both sides agreed to call in a federal mediator and resume talks next Thursday.

Teachers have been seeking an 11 percent pay-increase package while the district, supported by last week's report from a fact-finder, has offered about 8 percent.

The teachers overwhelmingly rejected the fact-finders report, citing bias and their refusal to consider the

document in bits and pieces. But Education Association President Cathy Littemeyer said teachers are willing to negotiate a settlement before school starts Sept. 5.

To the north in the Bonneville School District, Education Association President Lee Walker said teachers are standing by their decision last spring not to return to the classroom without a contract.

The teachers have already rejected a 9.3 percent salary and benefit offer from the district, sticking with their original demand for a 13 percent increase.

"The offer we have made is very close to what the district could offer," School Board Chairman Larry Clayton said. "We might be able to wiggle up to 9.5 percent."

Walker said teacher negotiators are ready to meet with the board again, but in the interim he said representatives will meet next Wednesday to chart a course of action.



The Stargazers learn a lot about dance, but they learn other lessons, too. They learn persistence. The troupes practice at least six hours each week, or up to 10 hours a week when a competition nears.

They learn versatility. "These kids are very good at being able to adapt to their environment wherever they perform. That's the true sign of a professional."

They also learn how to take instructions, communicate and get along with their peers. "All of these things will be useful in their later lives," Kim says.

The economic cost to the networks of covering the Middle East crisis may soon make last year's expensive stories — China's democracy protests, the collapse of communism in Eastern Europe and the U.S. invasion of Panama — seem cheap.

"There's no inexpensive way to do it right" in the Mideast, said Ted Turner, executive vice president-news-gathering, CNN. "It's an expensive place to live, to travel, for hotels, phones, just the normal costs of doing business."

On top of that, there's the time needed on a satellite transponder to send stories back to the U.S.

Each nation charges an "export fee" of "tens and tens and tens" of thousands of dollars for satellite time, Turner said, bringing the total transponder bill to about \$100,000 per week, per country.

"We're saving the Egyptian economy and the Jordanian economy and Dubai's economy," he joked.

ABC News has spent about \$2 million so far, ABC News President Roone Arledge said Wednesday.

He said ABC has been "trying to cut costs where possible" to compensate

SUN VALLEY — The Modern Jazz Quartet captures the grand finale of the Sun Valley Music Festival with a performance at 7 p.m. Aug. 29 on the Sun Valley Lodge Terrace.

Reserve tickets are sold out, but general admission is \$15 per person, and \$12 for Sun Valley Center members. The music festival is sponsored by the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities.

During this year's performance this legendary group will debut a composition commissioned by the Sun Valley Center, a first for the organization.

"The Majesty of the Sun," written

by John Lewis, musical director and pianist for the Modern Jazz Quartet, is reminiscent of the group's previous visit to Sun Valley in 1988. Lewis has the ability to capture powerful visual images with his music as evidenced by his many musical scores for movies.

Now approaching their 40th anniversary, the group's music has a remarkable quality developed over time.

"It is the extraordinary sensitivity of each artist to respond and anticipate each other with nuances that are a thrill to witness in a live performance," said Sun Valley Center Performing Arts Director Kate Wright in a prepared statement.

The group is one of the oldest mod-

Schumacher's 'Flatliners' long on flash, short on depth

HOLLYWOOD — Few recent movie trailers pack as much swank as the one for "Flatliners." The oscillating green line on the heart monitor that signals when a life stops. Shadows, streets, music-pulsing — then suddenly ... the screaming!!! The line goes flat! Yaaaaahh!!! And on comes the Voice of Doom, or at least Burbank, announcing: "Some lines shouldn't be crossed."

"Flatliners" is about life and death, atonement, remorse and conscience. It's other-worldly — it tries to replace clichés and gags with philosophical Good-subsidized, laudable intentions. The quiet experience — life after death, you may be disconcerted to discover that the Great Beyond consists, respectively, of a breakfast food company set in a huge field with romping dogs and boys, soft-core black-and-white porno with lots of mulples images, soaring helicopters, mountain shots and what appears to be part of a slow-motion horror movie by Brian de Palma. Why risk

some movies shouldn't be watched? No, wait: that's too cheap a shot. If "Flatliners" is anything at all, it's watchable, attuned with Jan de Bont's cinematography, deep-focus decor, an attractive cast. The movie's problem, like many others recently, is that it isn't any deeper, dramatically or psychologically, than its own trailer. It is the trailer, the long version.

"Flatliners" is set in a medical school that seems to have taken up emergency headquarters in a Renaissance man's study. Within its crazily photogenic

confines, five students try to experience life after death scientifically. Tension is jacked to the max: There's barely a scene of near-death and real vital where somebody doesn't run in at the last minute, or start screaming hysterically, or the equipment doesn't blow a fuse. Afterwards, cryogenic tools out and gets into bidet-wars about who goes under next.

"It's a good day to die!" Sutherland announces, with a mean-crazy look, in the first scene; obviously he's just been watching "Little Big Man." After this, you'd be willing to bet the movie wouldn't have the chutzpah to follow up later with Sutherland saying: "It's not a good day to die." You're wrong.

death when all you need is cable TV? The High Concept here: Death involves confronting past sins, which are rooted to life and attack the sinners — like Sutherland, pursued by a demon little boy (Joshua Rudoy) whom he apparently killed in life.

The other sins range from nasty playground behavior to gluttony to William Baldwin's compulsive seductions. Baldwin's punishment, if they want impersonal, manipulative sex — doesn't seem much of a deterrent. It's nice that a modern movie tries to encourage moral behavior, but screenwriter Peter Filaris' notions of spiritual atonement are too trivial: dark nights of the soul don't die.

Joel Schumacher is often good at

movies about young people in groups. His best, "St. Elmo's Fire," conveys yuppie angst with interestingly chilly sentimentality. But the fact that he uses such drop-dead decor and hyper-vigorous camerawork may be a clue that he knows he and the actors have to sweat bullets here.

Everybody does. Sutherland, almost always gaudy. Best of them: Bacon, putting real body English into his role of principled jock-athlet Lebowski, who thinks the afterlife is bull. (You'd be willing to bet the filmmakers wouldn't have the chutzpah to make Lebowski undergo a religious conversion. You'd be wrong.) Bacon is supposed to be an ace with the resuscitators; when his about to jump-start somebody back to life, he rubs them together like an air hockey king warming up.

— but he's trapped, like the others, in this great cavernous museum of a movie, with a dry little pea of an idea rattling down echoing hallways. It all most seems a cheat that the filmmakers don't say: any inkling the emptiness and flashy camp may hinge their "philosophy." You'd be willing to bet they wouldn't have the chutzpah to end their movie with heavenly choirs, clouds dissolving into clouds, and a huge title card proclaiming "Redemption." It's a wonderful feeling! This time, you'd be right.

'Chinatown' sequel opens softly

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Jack Nicholson's private eye Jake Gittes failed to get his man at the box office, as the long-awaited "Chinatown" sequel, "The Two-Jakes," opened to a modest weekend return of \$3.7 million.

"Flatliners," a new drama about young medical students who flirt with death, was the top-grossing movie its debut weekend, pulling \$10 million. The film stars Kiefer Sutherland, Kevin Bacon and Julia Roberts. According to figures released by Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc., "The Two-Jakes" finished in seventh place on the box-office charts, with an average per-screen average of \$3,092, lower than "Flatliners," the comedy "Ghost," "Air America" and "Presumed Innocent."

"Two Jakes" is obviously a flop, said John Krieger, president of Exhibitor Relations, which tracks box-office trends. A follow-up to 1974's acclaimed "Chinatown," "The Two-Jakes" was directed by Nicholson.

In second, and now clearly the biggest surprise summer hit, was "Ghost," making \$9.5 million. It was followed in third by Mel Gibson's "Air America," which grossed \$8.1 million in its first three days.

"Presumed Innocent," the adaptation of Scott Turow's best-selling murder mystery, finished fourth with ticket sales of \$7.9 million. Fifth, continuing strongly despite withering reviews, was "Problem Child," collecting \$4.8 million.

"Young Guns II," the brat-pack-in-chaps Western, fell more than 40 percent from third to sixth place.

Eighth was the spider drama "Arachnophobia," netting \$3.6 million. In ninth was "Die Hard 2," grossing \$3.1 million to pass the \$100 million mark.

An attempt to link the faltering Middle East drama "Naval SEALS" to the Iraq-Kuwait crisis with a new advertising campaign misfired. The film grossed \$1.3 million, down from \$2.3 million the previous weekend.

Schumacher's 'Flatliners' long on flash, short on depth

HOLLYWOOD — Few recent movie thrillers pack as much punch as does the new "Flatliners." Five med students huddled around a table,

Rapid-fire close-ups, wary Julia Roberts, sneering Kiefer Sutherland, skeptical Kevin Bacon. The oscillating green line on the heart monitor that signals when a life stops; shadows; streets; music pulsing; then suddenly ... the screaming!!! The line goes flat! Yaaaaah!!! And then comes the Voice of Doom, or at least Burbank, barking: "Some lines shouldn't be crossed."

Some movies shouldn't be grossed out, some movies shouldn't be watched, some wait. That's too cheap a shot. If "Flatliners" is anything at all, it's watchable; alaitem with Jan de Bont's cinematography, deep-focus decor, an attractive cast. The movie's problem, like many others recently, is that it isn't any deeper, dramatically or psychologically, than its own trailer. It is the trailer: the long version.

"Flatliners" is set in a medical school that seems to have taken up emergency headquarters in a Renaissance museum. Within its crazily photographic

confines, five students try to experience life-after-death scientifically. Tension is jacked to the max: There's always a scene of near-death and revival—where somebody doesn't arrive at the last minute, or start screaming hysterically, or the equipment doesn't blow a fuse. Afterwards, everyone cools out and gets into bidding wars about who goes under next.

"It's a good day-to-die!" Sutherland announces, with a mean-crazy look in the first scene, obviously he's just been watching "Little Big Man." After this, you'd be willing to bet the movie wouldn't have the chutzpah to follow up later with Sutherland saying: "It's not a good day to die." You'd be wrong.

"Flatliners" is about life and death, atonement, remorse and conscience; in other words, it tries to replace blood and guts with philosophy. Good subjects, laudable intentions, dubious execution. Here, as "Four of the Quinter Experience," life after death, you may be disconcerted to discover that the Great Beyond consists, respectively, of a breakfast food commercial set in a huge field with romping dog and boys, soft-core black-and-white porno with lots of

multiple images, souring helicopter mountain shots and what appears to be part of a slow-motion horror movie by Brian de Palma. Why risk

death when all you need is cable TV? The other sins range from nasty play-

The High Concept here: Death involves confronting past sins, which are roused to life and attack the sinners — like Sutherland, pursued by a demonic little boy (Joshua Rudoy) whom he apparently killed in life.

deterrent. It's nice that a modern movie tries to encourage moral behavior, but "writer Peter Fonda's notions of spiritual strength are too trivial: dark nights of the soul on death row."

Joel Schumacher is often good at

movies about young people in groups. His best, "St. Elmo's Fire," conveys yuppie angst with interestingly chilly sentimentality. But the fact that he uses such dead-dead decor and hyper-vigorous camera movement may be a clue that he knows he and the actors have to sweat bullets here.

Everybody does. Sutherland also most sweats grenades. Best of them is here, playing real body language into his no-principled jock-theif Labmacio, who thinks the afterlife is bull. (You'd be willing to bet the film makers wouldn't have the chutzpah to make Labmacio undergo a religious conversion. You'd be wrong.) Bacon is supposed to be an acme of the resuscitators; when he's about to jump-start somebody back into life, he rubs them together like an air-hockey king warming up.

But he's imagined, like the others, in this great cavernous museum of a movie, with nary little pea of an idea rattling down-echoing hallways. It also seems a cheat that the film makers don't show any inkling that emptiness and flashy camp may tinge their "philosophy." You'd be willing to bet they wouldn't have the chutzpah to end their movie with heavenly choirs clouds dissolving into clouds and a huge title-crawl proclaiming: "Redemption: It's a wonderful feeling!" This time, you'd be right.

'Chinatown' sequel opens softly

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Jack Nicholson's private eye Jake Gittes failed to get his man at the box office, so the long-awaited "Chinatown" sequel, "The Two Jakes," opened to mid-weekend returns of \$3.7 million.

"Flatliners," a new drama about

young medical students who flirt with death, was the top-grossing movie its debut weekend, pulling \$10.5 million. The film stars: Kiefer Sutherland, Kevin Bacon and Julia Roberts.

According to figures released by Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc., "The Two Jakes" finished in seventh place on the box-office charts, with an average per-screen average of \$3,092, lower than "Flatliners," the comedy "Ghost," "Air America" and "Presumed Innocent."

"Two Jakes" is obviously a flop, said John Krier, president of Exhibitor Relations, which tracks box-office trends. A follow-up to 1974's acclaimed "Chinatown," "The Two Jakes" was directed by Nicholson.

In second, and now clearly the biggest surprise summer hit, was "Ghost," making \$9.5 million. It was followed in third by Mel Gibson's "Air America," which grossed \$8.1 million in its first three days.

"Presumed Innocent," the adaptation of Scott Turow's best-selling murder mystery, finished fourth with ticket sales of \$7.9 million. Fifth, continuing strong despite withering reviews, was "Problem Child," collecting \$4.8 million.

"Young Guns II," the brat-pack-in-chaps Western, fell more than 40 percent from third to sixth-place.

Eighth was the spider drama "Arachnophobia," netting \$3.6 million. In ninth was "Die Hard 2," grossing \$3.4 million to pass the \$100-million mark.

An attempt to link the faltering Middle-East drama "Navy SEALS" to the Iraq-Kuwait crisis with a new advertising campaign misfired. The film grossed \$1.3 million, down from \$2.3 million the previous weekend.

The spade suit offers the best
chance for tricks in today's heart-
game. Given East's opening bid,
how should South have played the
suit?

The North-South bidding was ex-
cellent, and the heart game was a
favorite in spite of East's bidding.
Unfortunately, this declarer opted to
go for the "normal" play in spades
rather than follow his best judg-
ment.

East won two high diamonds and
switched to a club back to his ace and
a spade to dummy's queen lost to
East's king. Back came a heart, and
there was no reprieve. Neither
black suit was 3-3, and one short.

Although South would have made
an overtrick had the spade finesse
worked and had the suit split 3-3, it
was wrong not to place the spade
king with East as part of his opening
bid. And instead of inserting the
spade queen at trick five, South
should have played dummy's seven,
losing to East's jack. East's trump
exit is won in dummy, and a heart to
South's ace draws trumps. Next, a
spade to the ace tells East's king,
and South ruff's a low spade to set up
dummy's suit. The defenders get
only one spade-and-two diamonds,
and South has his 10 tricks.

Different storytelling approach on tap for this season's 'Night Court' series

By Evan Levine

"Nowhere is the need of a television audience to suspend disbelief more evident than with 'Night Court'" (airing Wednesdays on NBC).

Attending a session presided over by Judge Harry Stone (Harry Anderson) is akin to visiting a bizarre children's birthday party: You're just as likely to meet clowns run amuck, tricksters whose lapels shoot water, and assorted rascals all of whom insist on saying everything at the top of their lungs. ("WHAT'S THAT, DAN? YOU WANT TO WHAT?") Giggle, giggle.) But Chris Chueas and Sue Kreisman are out to change that. The new executive producers of "Night Court" say NO MORE stupid pet, nun, plumber or mother-in-law tricks.

Chueas and Kreisman are not exactly new to the series: "We were there for the first and second seasons, then we went away; and now we're back," they explain. (They act and talk almost as one entity, so for convenience's sake, we'll think of them as such: the executive producer Chueasman.)

During their time "away," as they refer to it, the two worked on "Newhart" and "Cheers" and developed some TV pilots. But now they're back with a vengeance. "The show has relied too much on elephants walking through walls," they admit. "But now, we're getting back to character. There will still be great jokes, but they'll come out of the characters themselves."

"We're going to be using a lot of different approaches to story-

telling," they continue. "And all the characters will be going through major changes and emotional crises, right up through the end of the season."

Such as?

"We'll be doing a lot of stories in bites—stories that run through four or five episodes," they explain. "On a more personal level, Harry will get a girlfriend; she'll be a lady who works for a paper like the New York Daily News. They'll meet when she covers a murder trial. She'll be very hard-nosed, a real opposite of him."

"We'll meet the sister of Dan (John Larroquette). She is 20 years younger than he, and he almost never speaks about her. But after a few minutes, it'll be obvious that she's Dan in a dress. We'll deal with Christine (Markie Post) being a mother. And we'll do a prequel."

We'll see how they all got to where they are. We'll see Mac (Charlie Robinson) in Vietnam; that will be the most dramatic of the stories. But they'll all have some bizarre twists. We'll also do a black-and-white episode. And we'll have the characters attend a session of 'Day Court.'"

Fans of the show should take heed, because it sounds like the series could be heading into its final season. "We hope it will be picked up for a ninth season, but if it's not, we want to go out with a bang," they explain. Chueas and Kreisman have certainly entered the fray. They hired and guided writers,

Today's schools examined on public TV

"Learning in America: Schools that Work," a two-hour education special, will air September 5 at 9 p.m. MT (8 p.m. Pacific) on Idaho Public Television.

This special program is a spin-off of the five-part series, "Learning in America," which was a comprehensive television report on the state of American education, and which aired to wide critical acclaim last spring on public television.

It was later rebroadcast in September.

"LIA: Schools that Work" will explore the problems plaguing America's elementary schools through an unusual approach. Much of the program will profile schools that have a record of outstanding accomplishment, despite the many daunting problems that public schools face today.

Through careful examination of these schools, with little in common other than superior achievement, the program will try to cast some light on the necessary ingredients in

developing an excellent elementary school environment.

The program format includes some 90 minutes of documentary reporting on the schools, with 30 minutes of debate by leading educators about the nature of reform needed in many of our nation's elementary schools.

The debate will address such issues as cooperative learning, the role of parenting, alternative programs of grading, and increased school autonomy.

'60 Minutes' nearly topped Nielsens with report on the Middle East crisis

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Boosted by viewer interest in the Middle East crisis, a "60 Minutes" broadcast that began with reports on the crisis was the nation's second-most-watched show last week, Nielsen estimates showed Tuesday.

The CBS News broadcast averaged a 14.7 rating, just one-tenth of a rating point below the week's ratings winner, a repeat of NBC's "Cheers."

In a week of reruns, CBS' "Top Cops," getting a summer tryout, again scored well in the Nielsens. Its 12.0 ratings average earned it 16th place in the ratings and made it the highest rated new series of last week.

Front-running NBC won the week with a 9.6 average rating for its prime time programs, but ABC and CBS weren't far behind. ABC averaged a 9.3 and CBS a 9.2. Each ratings point represents 921,000 homes.

The ratings showed that more viewers watched network coverage of the Middle East crisis than prime-time entertainment shows.

News ratings for the week ending Sunday showed ABC in first place with a 10.6 average. CBS, the only

'Cutting Edge' may not make a nick

It's time to draw a line in the sand of television journalism.

If it is one thing to go along with Geraldine Rivera when he declares himself an "investigative reporter," it is one thing to go along with Deborah Norville when she talks about "pounding the pavement" as a reporter on her climb to "Today," when in fact what she did was sit at an anchor desk and read the news.

But accepting the idea of Maria Shriver as being on the "cutting edge" of broadcast journalism, as NBC asks viewers to do, is too much. Describing her this way is like saying Zsa Zsa Gabor is on the cutting edge of feminism.

The debut of "Cutting Edge With Maria Shriver," which airs Tuesday nights on NBC, is a hodge-podge of lightweight celebrity interviews with no discernable focus or purpose. It opens with Shriver standing on a street in Los Angeles. "We open on the streets," she says, "because the streets often give rise to the people and ideas that are cutting edge." The edge is the attitude of a young rock 'n' roller. It's the ferocious tenacity of an aging athlete who refuses to call it quits. It's an entrepreneur whose goal is to give capitalism a good name. It's an actress who wants to give bimbos a bad one. Whatever the cutting edge is, we think it makes for good television.

Whatever the cutting edge is? If

Shriver doesn't know, why is it the concept for this show? It appears that the "cutting edge" is anyone Shriver & Company decide it is and who they can get access to.

"Cutting Edge" has a gimmick. It has an under-produced, raw look intended to give viewers the sense that they are on the inside of the process, closer to the interviewer and interviewee. For example, the viewer is shown Shriver doing an interview while a cameraman points another camera. The idea is that by seeing the other cameraman, the viewer will feel the show has less gloss and is somehow more real.

More real than what? The suggestion that Maria Shriver is on the cutting edge of broadcast journalism?

'Fess up' if you remember Durango Kid

Awww-right! Saddle up, buckskins.

The Durango Kid has been rediscovered.

That mysterious masked rider, who roamed the celluloid West bringing an assortment of outlaws to justice during the hey-day of the cowboy movie, will be featured in a dozen films, all in glorious black-and-white, on The Movie Channel Monday and Tuesday.

If you've never heard of The Durango Kid, that's understandable. The films have been out of circulation for decades. This will mark the first legal showing of Durango Kid movies since he officially galloped off into the sunset in 1952. Once the series ended, Columbia Pictures, which produced the Durango films, locked them away in a vault where they've remained until now.

Michael Duda, vice president of program planning and film acquisitions at The Movie Channel, is the man responsible for rescuing Durango from cinematic Boot Hill: The Durango Kid pictures were a part of the genre known as the B western, which were turned out in incredible rate during the 1930s, 1940s and early 1950s. Durango, along with the likes of Roy Rogers,

Hopalong Cassidy, Gene Autry and Lash LaRue, entertained millions of kids at the local movie theatre each Saturday.

Durango was played by Charles Starrett, a former Dartmouth football player who appeared in his first film in 1926. The square-jawed Starrett played a variety of movie roles before finding his Hollywood niche in 1935. That's the year, Columbia, looking for a cowboy star, cast him in a western called "Gallant Defender."

Obviously the studio was pleased with the results. Starrett went on to star in 132 cowboy sagas during the next 17 years. Although Starrett had portrayed The Durango Kid in one film in 1940, it wasn't until 1945 that he began playing the character in every movie for the rest of his career.

The Durango Kid pictures were about as formulized as they come. In practically every film Starrett played a character named Steve who, along with his sidekick (usually Smiley Burnette), would ride into a town where trouble brewed. And when violence eventually erupted, Starrett would disappear behind some rock or some tree to change into his Durango garb. It was always the highlight of any Durango Kid movie. Accompanied by exciting thunderous background music, Starrett would suddenly appear in

all-black atop his beautiful white horse Raider. Moments later, with guns blazing, he would swoop into town and begin the clean-up.

It all happened at a break-neck pace since most Durango Kid movies ran less than an hour. Most of them probably were made in five to seven days at the rate of nine or 10 a year. Were they great movies? Hardly, but boy, they were fun.

And when kids weren't watching him on the screen, they could read about his other adventures in the "Charles Starrett as The Durango Kid" comic book which began in 1949 and lasted for 41 issues.

By 1952, the B westerns were heading toward their last roundup, victims of rising costs and, more importantly, the coming of television. Starrett made his final Durango Kid movie, "The Kid from Broken Gun," that year and then retired. One of the founders of the Screen Actors Guild, Starrett died at age 82 in 1986.

"We've been told that some people have signed up for TMC when they heard about the Durango Kid movies," Duda said.

TMC has only three scheduled Monday and they begin at (gasp!) 3:30 a.m. Hey, you have to get up pretty early in the morning to catch The Durango Kid. Tuesday, beginning at 7:30 a.m., TMC will run nine Durango films in a row.
