**KENNEBUNKPORT, Maine** — The Bush administration pulled Marine guards and most diplomats out of the threatened U.S. Embassy in Kuwait on Thursday, but left the ambassador and a skeleton staff behind in defiance of Saddam Hussein's eviction order.

"A few Marine guards aren't going to fight off the entire Iraqi army," a senior White House official said. "We don't want to put American lives at unnecessary danger."

With Iraq's Friday deadline looming for foreign embassies to close their doors in Kuwait City, the White House said publicly

it had evacuated non-essential personnel from the embassy.

Administration officials said privately that all but about a dozen of the 120 Americans at the embassy had left for Baghdad, where U.S. officials expected to fly them out of Iraq.

The group reached Baghdad about 1 a.m. local time Friday (5 p.m. EDT Thursday) in a 33-car caravan after a trip that took more than 19 hours, said a senior U.S. official in

Washington who spoke on condition of anonymity.

However, another official said, one woman traveling with the group was injured when one of the cars collided at the start of the trip and had to be left at a Kuwait City hospital.

The deadline imposed by Iraq for closing the embassy initially was given to the United States in a diplomatic note as noon local time (4 a.m. EDT) on Friday, the senior official said. But subsequently Iraq has said the deadline is midnight (4 p.m. EDT) Friday, the official said.

The Iraqi state news agency, by contrast, set the deadline at 9 p.m. local time (1 p.m. EDT).

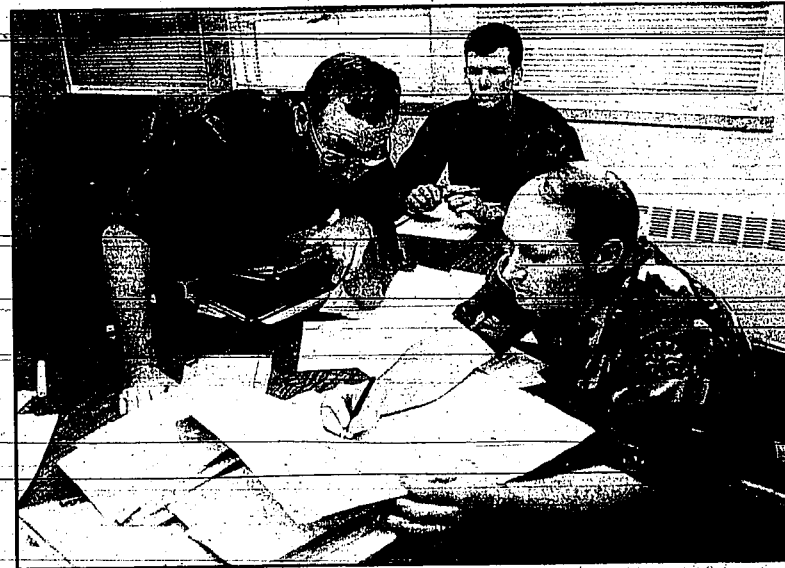
White House spokesman Martin Fitzwater initially indicated the embassy's Marine security guards would probably stay "as long as the ambassador's there."

But he later issued a written statement saying, "Contrary to earlier information, there are no U.S. Marines at the U.S. Embassy in Kuwait. The Marines departed with the convoy, which is en route to Baghdad."

Also on Thursday, President Bush looked to the United Nations to put military muscle behind its sanctions against Iraq. Spokesman Fitzwater said, "We are in this to the end."

## Guard, Army Reserve units waiting

**TWIN FALLS** — Chances of local Army National Guard units going to the Middle East are slim now, but if war breaks out, area troops could see combat.

"If they were called, they would be front-line units," said Maj. Jim Ball, Guard

spokesman in Boise.

Units in Twin Falls, Burley, Buhl, Gooding and Hiley belong to the 2nd Armored Battalion — a combat tank group. At last count 492 troops belonged to the battalion. The first Guard units identified nationally for possible action were those in combat support roles such as cargo handlers, military airlift, medical and intelligence groups.

They would go in the first wave, Ball said.

If combat units were alerted, word would come from the Department of Defense to the state adjutant general and the governor. The adjutant general would alert local unit commanders who would contact their troops.

## Oakley rancher quoted as threatening ranger

**TWIN FALLS** — An Oakley rancher has been quoted by the New York Times as publicly threatening the life of a Twin Falls-based U.S. Forest Service district ranger.

The statement, published in the Aug. 17 edition of the Times, is based on a dispute between Twin Falls District Ranger Don Oman and a group of Oakley ranchers known as the Wild Rose Grazing Association who feel their livelihood is threatened by Oman.

Oman says he's just doing his job of enforcing grazing regulations.

"Either Oman is gone or he's going to have an accident," Winslow Whiteley was quoted by the Times as saying. "Myself

and every other one of the permit-holders would cut his throat if we could get him alone."

"Asked by the Times if he was making a specific threat on Oman's life, Whiteley was quoted as replying, "Yes. It's intentional. If they don't move him out of this district, we will."

Whiteley, who grazes about 350 cattle on the Goose Creek allotment in the South This along with other Wild Rose ranchers, products not be reached for comment Wednesday or Thursday.

Idaho Cattle Association President Bert Brackett said, "We strongly condemn that statement." Whiteley's statement doesn't

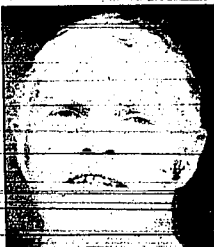
represent the association or the industry, and does both an injustice, he said.

Gary Glenn, executive vice president of the cattle association, said Whiteley's statement should be taken in context with Whiteley's 80 years old and hard of hearing and was not aware he was talking to a reporter when he made the statement, according to Glenn.

"I take it seriously because I think he was serious when he said it," Oman said Thursday. "He knew what he was saying."

Oman said over the last four years he and other Forest Service employees have been threatened seven or eight times by at least three individuals.

## Synthetic dairy cow hormone OK, FDA decides

**WASHINGTON** — Food and Drug Administration scientists on Thursday documented their belief that a synthetic hormone designed to increase milk production in cows poses no health risk to consumers.

In an unprecedented move, the FDA released its review of more than 120 studies to support its previous statements that milk and meat from dairy cows treated with the hormone, which is still not approved, are safe.

"We have concluded that the food products derived from treated animals are safe for human consumption," said Richard Teske, deputy director of the FDA's Center

for Veterinary Medicine.

Publication of the review in this week's edition of the journal Science was "a response to congressional and public interest over the safety of the hormone, bovine somatotropin or bST," said FDA spokesman Jeff Nesbit.

"Some consumer activists say long-term effects of the genetically-engineered hormone are still not known, and farmers worry that consumers might shy away from products from treated cows. Farmers also are concerned that increased milk production would lower prices.

Earlier this week, the Journal of the American Medical Association published the work of two researchers who concluded

that bST can boost milk production in dairy cows by 10 percent to 25 percent while causing no significant changes in composition of the milk. Also, JAMA published an editorial by an independent researcher backing the conclusions.

The FDA has not approved bST for commercial use, but the agency has allowed their products and to sell the milk from the test cows.

Also, the FDA is still reviewing studies on the health effects of bST on cows, which must be shown before it can be approved.

"We don't anticipate that we'll even complete the review process any earlier

than the spring of 1991," Teske said.

If approved, synthetic bST would become the first major biotechnology product on the agriculture market.

Two major milk-producing states — Minnesota and Wisconsin — have imposed temporary bans on use of bST and other states are considering similar action.

Jeremy Rifkin, president of the Foundation on Economic Trends, called the JAMA article "shameful" because the article's two authors are consultants to Monsanto, one of the four companies testing bST.

The FDA article was "irresponsible" because the agency hadn't related health on old studies that tested with natural bST rather than the synthetic hormone, he said.

### College costs outpacing student aid

NEW YORK (AP) — Student aid reached a record \$27.9 billion in the 1989-90 school year but has failed to keep up with the sharp, decade-long rise in the cost of attending college, the College Board reported Thursday.

Federal aid, adjusted for inflation, actually declined 3 percent during the decade, according to the board's annual report. "Trends in Student Aid: 1980-1990."

Rapid growth in aid from state and institutional sources has picked up some of the slack, but not nearly enough to keep pace with college costs that have more than doubled during the 1980s, the report concluded.

Institutional aid — grants and loans awarded by colleges out of their own resources — shot up by 90 percent, and state grants increased 52 percent even after adjusting for inflation.

Aid from all sources was 62 percent more in current dollars than the \$17,226 available in 1980-81. But adjusted for inflation, total student aid was up by just 10 percent since 1980-81, according to the report issued by the board's Washington, D.C., office.

During the period, the cost of attending public universities rose by 105.3 percent in current dollars, and 40 percent in inflation-adjusted dollars. Costs at private institutions were up 133.9 percent at private institutions — 59.5 percent after inflation is factored in.

A record 13.5 million students attended undergraduate and graduate programs last school year, compared with 12.1 million in 1980, according to federal statistics.

Preliminary figures for 1989-90 showed that the federal share included all grants and loan programs totaled \$20.36 billion, compared with \$19.95 billion a year earlier. The latest total was 42 percent higher in current dollars than the \$14.37 billion available a decade ago.

### Federal judge dismisses suit by S&L figure

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge Thursday upheld the government takeover of Lincoln Savings and Loan Association, saying the operation of the thrift by Charles H. Keating Jr. and his associates "amounted to looting."

District Judge Stanley Sporkin, dismissing Keating's suit to recover the collapsed-Irvine, Calif., said it was "abundantly clear" that Keating and other officials of Lincoln's holding company, American Continental Corp., of Phoenix, "abused their positions."


"Bluntly speaking, their actions amounted to a looting of Lincoln," Sporkin said in a 51-page ruling. "This was not done crudely. Indeed, it was done with a great deal of sophistication."

It was the second legal setback for Keating in two days. A federal judge in California said Wednesday that Keating must prove he's broke, may not send any money out of the country, and must give 48 hours notice before spending more than \$5,000.

The Federal Office of Thrift Supervision sought that action as part of an effort to recover \$40.9 million from Keating and five associates in connection with three soured business deals at Lincoln.

Regulators have estimated that Keating's use of Lincoln's federally insured deposits to finance various junk bond, stock and real estate ventures — and the institution's subsequent collapse — could cost taxpayers as much as \$2 billion.

### Federal attorneys meet with oil companies over gas price hikes

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's top antitrust prosecutor said Thursday he has summoned the major oil companies for talks to determine whether they used illegal tactics to drive up gasoline prices following Iraq's invasion of Kuwait.

"I have called the major oil companies and requested that they come in on a one-by-one basis to meet with the staff and on several occasions with me," said Assistant Attorney General James Rill, who heads the Justice Department's antitrust division.

Already, representatives of three major oil companies and two independent marketers have met with some of the 10 antitrust officials working on the inquiry, Rill told reporters at the Justice Department.

The purpose of the meetings is to have the company representatives explain the industry's price practices, "the circumstances of the sharp increases in detail and the reasons why," he said.

"We are getting cooperation from the major oil companies in this phase of our inquiry," he said, noting that antitrust officials also are meeting with independent refiners and marketers of petroleum products.

Rill declined to say which companies have been contacted and which have been in for meetings thus far. Each company has been promised confidentiality, Rill said.

However, he would not say whether any have been granted immunity from prosecution or other incentives to reveal information.

"They have been forthcoming," Rill said, adding that the companies are aware that prosecutions may occur once the inquiry is completed.

Thus far, no subpoenas have been issued to compel cooperation, but Rill said if any companies do refuse to cooperate, "We'll know how to deal with them."

Rill said he anticipates that the inquiry's general fact-finding phase should be completed within the next four weeks and that "will give us a good sense of the underlying events and the most promising lines of inquiry that it would seem appropriate to pursue after that."

The American Automobile Association says in its weekly survey that the average price of gasoline at the pump has jumped about 18 percent since Iraq overran Kuwait on Aug. 2.

The average pump price of unleaded regular gasoline jumped from \$1.050 on July 25 to \$1.237 on Monday, the AAA reported.

"Obviously, there was an event — the invasion — that had an economic impact on crude oil and petroleum product prices in the nation," he said.

"However, we are here to determine whether or not there were other factors that contributed in the nature of any collusive or any anti-competitive practices. And we are aggressively pursuing the possibility that that kind of conduct might have occurred."

Rill had announced Aug. 6 that he was launching such an inquiry.

In addition to the oil companies, Rill said he has sought the assistance of state attorneys general for information at the "pump price level."

### Manufacturing still listless, analysts say

WASHINGTON (AP) — Factory orders for "big-ticket" durable goods rebounded 2.9 percent in July, the government reported Thursday. But analysts said the zig-zag performance this year indicates a listless manufacturing economy that could worsen because of the "Middle East crisis."

"Orders have been bouncing up and down and the net effect is a very weak upward trend," said economist Cynthia Latta of DRJ/McGraw-Hill, a Lexington, Mass., economic research firm. "I don't actually see the industrial sector in decline, but there's not much stimulus for expansion there."

The Commerce Department reported that orders for durable goods those expected to last more than three years — totaled a seasonally-adjusted \$128.3 billion after slumping 3.2 percent in June.

In the first half of the year, orders rose during three months and fell in the others, including a record 10.5 percent drop in January.

During that time, orders totaled \$744.7 billion, a 1.5 percent decline from the same period of 1989.

The sluggishness in the manufacturing economy has cost 350,000 factory jobs since that sector peaked in March 1989, including another 7,000 in July, according to Labor Department figures.

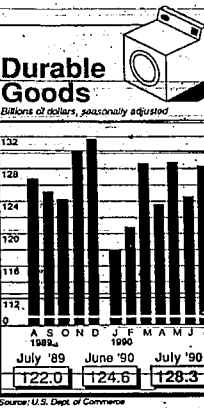
Drops in orders normally result in production cutbacks and job layoffs.

Ms. Latta noted that the July increase included a 5.0 percent boost in transportation orders, to \$34.9 billion, which she said will not result in any immediate stimulus to the economy.

"A lot of that is aircraft and that's production three, four, five years down the road given the big backlogs that aircraft manufacturers have," she said.

Excluding transportation, orders would have risen 2.2 percent.

Defense orders slipped 3.1 percent to \$7.6 billion after a 21.9 percent decline a month earlier, but

Orders for non-defense capital goods jumped 10.7 percent to \$40.1 billion.

This category often is a barometer of business investment plans, but analysts were hesitant to read anything into the July number because of the Mideast uncertainty.

Orders in all major durable categories rose in July: non-electrical machinery, up 2.7 percent to \$22.4 billion; electrical machinery, 1.9 percent to \$20.4 billion, and primary metals, 1.5 percent to \$11.6 billion.

Shipments of durable goods slipped 2.0 percent to \$124.7 billion following a 0.6 percent increase in June.

Unfilled orders rose 0.7 percent to \$501.6 billion, more than offsetting a 0.5 percent decline a month earlier.

### Guam's abortion law ruled illegal

AGANA, Guam (AP) — A federal judge Thursday struck down Guam's virtual ban on abortion as unconstitutional. The measure was the nation's most restrictive abortion law.

U.S. District Judge Alex Munson declared that Roe vs. Wade, the 1973 Supreme Court decision establishing the right to an abortion, "applied with equal force and effect to Guam."

The law, signed by Gov. Joseph Ada on March 12, banned abortions, except when the mother's life is in danger. But Munson on March 23 blocked its enforcement while he weighed a challenge to the law from abortion-rights forces.

The law carried a penalty of up to a year in jail and a \$1,000 fine for obtaining an illegal abortion or soliciting a woman to have an abortion. Performing an illegal abortion was punishable by up to five years.

Two days after the law went into effect, an American Civil Liberties Union lawyer was charged with violating the measure by publicly encouraging women to seek abortions in Hawaii.



"Obviously, there was an event — the invasion — that had an economic impact on crude oil and petroleum product prices in the nation," he said.

"However, we are here to determine whether or not there were other factors that contributed in the nature of any collusive or any anti-competitive practices. And we are aggressively pursuing the possibility that that kind of conduct might have occurred."

Rill had announced Aug. 6 that he was launching such an inquiry.

In addition to the oil companies, Rill said he has sought the assistance of state attorneys general for information at the "pump price level."

## Manufacturing still listless, analysts say

WASHINGTON (AP) — Factory orders for "big-ticket" durable goods rebounded 2.9 percent in July, the government reported Thursday. But analysts said the zig-zag performance this year indicates a listless manufacturing economy that could worsen because of the Middle East crisis.

"Orders have been bouncing up and down and the net effect is a very weak upward trend," said economist Cynthia Latta of DR/ McGraw-Hill, a Lexington, Mass., economic research firm. "I don't actually see the industrial sector in decline, but there's not much stimulus for expansion there."

The Commerce Department reported that orders for durable goods, those expected to last more than three years — totaled a seasonally adjusted \$128.3 billion after slumping 3.2 percent in June.

In the first half of the year, orders rose during three months and fell in the others, including a record 10.5 percent drop in January.

During that time, orders totaled \$744.7 billion, a 1.5 percent decline from the same period of 1989.

The sluggishness in the manufacturing economy has cost 350,000 factory jobs since that sector peaked in March 1989, including another 7,000 in July, according to Labor Department figures.

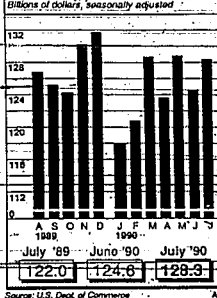
Drops in orders normally result in production cutbacks and job layoffs.

Ms. Latta noted that the July increase included a 5.0 percent boost in transportation orders, to \$34.9 billion, which she said will not result in any immediate stimulus to the economy.

"A lot of that is aircraft and that's production three, four, five years down the road given the big backlog...that aircraft manufacturers have," she said.

Excluding transportation, orders would have risen 2.2 percent. Defense orders slipped 3.1 percent to \$7.6 billion after a 21.9 percent decline a month earlier, but

Orders for non-defense capital goods jumped 10.7 percent to \$40.1 billion.

This category often is a barometer of business investment plans, but analysts were hesitant to read anything into the July number because of the Midwest uncertainty.

Orders in all major durable categories rose in July: non-electrical machinery, up 2.7 percent to \$22.4 billion; electrical machinery, 1.9 percent to \$20.4 billion, and primary metals, 1.5 percent to \$11.6 billion.

Shipments of durable goods slipped 2.0 percent to \$124.7 billion following a 0.6 percent increase in June.

Unfilled orders rose 0.7 percent to \$501.6 billion, more than offsetting a 0.5 percent decline a month earlier.

## Guam's abortion law ruled illegal

AGANA, Guam (AP) — A federal judge Thursday struck down Guam's virtual ban on abortion as unconstitutional. The measure was the nation's most restrictive abortion law.

U.S. District Judge Alex Munson declared that Roe vs. Wade, the 1973 Supreme Court decision establishing the right to an abortion, "applied with equal force and effect to Guam."

The law, signed by Gov. Joseph Ada on March 19, banned abortions except when the mother's life is in danger. But Munson on March 23 blocked its enforcement, while he weighed a challenge to the law from abortion-rights forces.

The law carried a penalty of up to a year in jail and a \$1,000 fine for obtaining an illegal abortion or soliciting a woman to have an abortion. Performing an illegal abortion was punishable by up to five years.

Two days after the law went into effect, an American Civil Liberties Union lawyer was charged with violating the measure by publicly encouraging women to seek abortions in Hawaii.

# Pentagon: Navy has boarded ships in interdiction efforts

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Navy has boarded a handful of ships in its week-old effort to halt Iraqi shipping, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Spokesman Pete Williams, asked to be more specific, said "a handful would have to be less than 10." He said he could not give a definitive number nor say when or where the boardings occurred.

In recent days, the United States has been urging swift approval of a U.N. resolution allowing military force to support the international body's sanctions against Iraq over its invasion of Kuwait, but the Soviet Union has been countering that caution be used before military force is applied.

At a Pentagon briefing, Williams said he was not aware of any more ships having been fired, but said "dozens" of ships were involved in

the interdiction operations.

"We continue to monitor ships," Williams said.

Ships belonging to the two aircraft carrier battle groups in the Red Sea, one carrier battle group in the Gulf of Oman and the ships of the Middle East Task Force in the Persian Gulf are involved in the operation.

Boarding parties have been issued shotguns, pistols and specialized instructions on how to board and search vessels suspected of carrying cargo bound to or from Iraq.

The sailors carry plastic cards in French, Arabic and English telling the ship's crews to remain calm and that no harm will come to them if they cooperate with the U.S. boarding parties.

Williams said there was a "high degree of voluntary compliance" with the effort, and that "many

ships have turned back." Again, he said he had no specific number.

Williams said the two Iraqi tankers involved in Saturday's shooting incident — the first of the operation — were "still being shadowed" by U.S. Navy ships.

The fast frigate USS Reid fired six warning shots across the bow of the Iraqi-flagged vessel Khanaqin in the Gulf of Oman after it refused repeated requests to halt. In a separate incident, the USS Bradley fired three warning shots across the bow of another Iraqi tanker.

The Khanaqin unloaded "a portion of its cargo" in Aden, Yemen, on Tuesday, and has left port, Williams said.

The Yemenis have assured the United States that the off-loading stopped before it was completed, the spokesman said.

# U.S. troops, cut off from media, hungry for news from home

SAUDI ARABIA (AP) — An American Marine from New York had one question when he arrived in this desert kingdom: "Are the Mets in first?"

Most of the thousands of U.S. troops here have no access to American publications or any television, so they incessantly ask visiting reporters about the situation back home.

"Do the American people want us here?" an Army private on a desert exercise this week wanted to know.

"Is President Bush saying we'll go to war?" asked an Air Force supply officer.

A mimeographed newsletter attempts to fill the void with a story headlined "Secretary of Defense Explains Why We Are Here." But it does little to satisfy the appetite of the news-hungry Americans.

"The situation is very uncertain,"

Defense Secretary Dick Cheney says in the newsletter. "We don't know how long it will last."

However, there are signs the troops will be getting more access to the news. A daily shipment of newspapers has been sent to some camps this week.

"They get passed around and read again and again," said a spokesman for the 82nd Airborne.

The guys are hungry for news.

A few issues of the military newspaper Stars & Stripes have turned up in the past few days, and the small newsletter that carried Cheney's remarks is being published at one Saudi airbase where U.S. forces are positioned.

Iraq is trying to fill the news void with radio broadcasts suggesting that while Americans are protecting Saudi oil fields the "petrol emirs" are in the United States and have

"enjoyed" the company of American women.

"I thought it was pretty funny, actually," said a member of the 82nd Airborne Division who listened to the broadcast earlier this week. "If that's their idea of psychological warfare I don't think we have much to worry about."

The Saudi media also has had its fair share of recent propaganda.

Local television, which can't be seen by some U.S. forces staying in hotels or Saudi barracks, frequently includes lengthy segments showing the arrival and exercises of troops in the kingdom. There is no narration, but patriotic music booms.

Saudi papers carry daily dispatches from a state press agency designed to assure the public that the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait will not affect Saudi Arabia's food supplies, economy or security.

# Question arises over Jewish soldiers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith on Thursday asked the Pentagon to look into reports that Jewish soldiers headed for Saudi Arabia have been told to consider concealing their religion and getting non-denominational dog tags.

While offering soldiers the option not to display their religious affiliation may be well-intentioned, "it is unclear exactly what procedure is being followed and upon whose order," ADL National Director Abraham Foxman said in a letter to Defense Secretary Dick Cheney.

"It is imperative that this issue be presented in a manner which is not only consistent with military security but is also sensitive to the concerns of all service personnel while not being perceived as coercive," Foxman wrote.

He suggested that, if such protections are needed, the Defense Department should issue a directive to all American service personnel outlining the options on religious affiliation.

Foxman's letter came one day after Sen. Daniel P. Moynihan, D-N.Y., said he had received com-

plaints from the parents of a Jewish soldier who was advised to get a "non-Jewish identity" before going to Saudi Arabia.

In his letter to Cheney, Moynihan called the reported incident "an apparent extension of our sorry policy of many years' standing of turning a blind eye to Saudi policy of refusing visas to Americans of the Jewish religion."

Cheney, on ABC's "Good Morning America," said Thursday that the Saudis "have accepted all forces as-is, regardless of religion."

# Kuwait resistance reportedly strong

SAUDI ARABIA (AP) — Kuwait's government in exile is "alive and well" and forming a liberation army to help in any military action to free the country from Iraqi occupation, the Kuwaiti crown prince said Thursday.

"We will fight and fight and fight until we drive out the aggressors from our country," Prince Saad Abdullah al Sabah said.

"The Kuwaitis will never submit or surrender to threats or to aggression or to occupation."

Such talk is taken lightly here. One Saudi official, for example, said "Kuwait has a death army — no body is ever seen it."

But Abdullah said some Kuwaitis

who fled their homeland after Iraq's Aug. 2 invasion already are going back to help with a resistance movement. Others, he said, are planning to arm themselves and join the multinational force defending Saudi Arabia.

"We will be reorganizing, rearming, reequipping with necessary arms to take part as an advance team in liberating our country," he said.

Abdullah, the No. 2 official of the Kuwaiti government, met with reporters at a hotel in a Saudi mountain resort.

The hotel, heavily guarded by Saudi military police, is serving as the headquarters for the Kuwaiti royal family.

Another family member said the

government-owned Kuwait petroleum company would be operated from London during the Iraqi occupation.

A third member of the al Sabah family, speaking privately, said the Kuwaiti government would prefer that the United States attack Iraq and cut off its supply lines to Kuwait, ultimately forcing a withdrawal from Kuwait.

"We hope we do not have to destroy our country with war to get it back," he said.

Abdullah said two or three members of the al Sabah royal family had been arrested in Kuwait. Aides said the Emir of Kuwait was in the hotel but would not meet with reporters.

# Soviet advisers remain in Iraq

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Bush administration scouted the Soviet Union on Thursday for keeping military advisers in Iraq and suggested Moscow may be in violation of United Nations sanctions against President Saddam Hussein.

"It is inappropriate to provide any form of military assistance to Iraq," State Department spokesman Richard Boucher said. "We believe U.N. sanctions extend to the provision of services to Iraq."

The statement jarred an otherwise smooth approach taken by Washington and Moscow in the Persian Gulf crisis. Together the two superpowers are trying to force Saddam to relinquish control of Kuwait by denying Iraq all economic necessities.

# British add to military presence Jordan keeps border open for foreigners

LONDON (AP) — Britain will send a second squadron of Tomado fighter-bombers to the Persian Gulf, Defense Secretary Tom King said Thursday.

He said the warplanes will likely be based in Bahrain.

"We are going entirely for defensive purposes, to safeguard the territorial integrity of Saudi Arabia," King told a news conference.

He stressed that Britain will continue to seek the restoration of the Kuwaiti government, which was overthrown by an Iraqi invasion on Aug. 2.

He said Britain is relying on strict enforcement of the U.N. economic sanctions to compel Iraqi President Saddam Hussein to withdraw from Kuwait. "We must be sure it is effective, and it is effective quickly."

RUWEISHID, Jordan (AP) — Thousands of foreigners poured through this desert post Thursday after Jordanian authorities delayed closing the border to cope with an exodus of refugees from Iraq and Kuwait.

A senior security official said 5,000 people, mostly Egyptians, crossed into Jordan and 15,000 Arabs and Asians were expected to pass through before the end of the day.

"I'm happy that I got out of Iraq and I'm safe in Jordan," said Mohammed Hismail, an Egyptian laborer who has lived in Iraq for seven years.

"Despite all the pain that we went through during this long journey, I feel fine and happy that I'm finally going home to see my family."

# Powell: U.S. will maintain strength in Gulf

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States will not bow to Iraq threats or abandon hostages caught in the Middle East Crisis, Gen. Colin L. Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said Thursday.

"We know that it is better to obtain peace by standing up to aggression early so you don't have to fight a war," Powell said in a speech to the Veterans of Foreign Wars in

Baltimore.

"We will defend our interests," he contended in a text of the speech released at the Pentagon. "Don't try to scare or threaten us. It won't work, never has — and especially not threats from Saddam Hussein."

Powell added that the United States "has always come to the aid of our friends and fellow citizens."

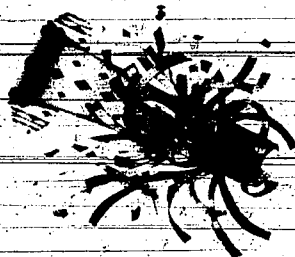

**Mandela wants troops to quell tribal violence**

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Nelson Mandela said Thursday the government would play troops in black townships, where Zulu and Xhosa war bands clashed for the 12th day with spears, axes and knives.

Police said four people died.

President F.W. de Klerk said the government would announce new moves Friday to stop the tribal fighting, which has claimed more than 500 lives. He said the move would include additional restrictions on the ownership of weapons. He did not elaborate.

**Whites watch from sidelines**

Mandela, the leader of the African National Congress, said the government should place soldiers and police around migrant workers hostels in the townships where much of the violence has occurred.

Asked if he thought the violence was easing, Mandela said, "I don't think so. I think it's too early to say that."

Edler, a spokesman for the ANC said the group could soon begin peace talks with the conservative Zulu-based Inkatha movement.

Supporters of the two groups are the main combatants in the fighting. In the Kagiso township west of Johannesburg, hundreds of heavily armed Xhosas said they wanted to destroy a migrant workers hostel occupied by Zulus.

"I don't care if I die! We just want to fight with the Zulus!" screamed an enraged Xhosa armed with a butcher knife.

The two sides fought with spears, axes and clubs, and police-fired tear gas to drive them apart. Roaming gangs of Zulus with red headbands looted and burned several deserted homes, while Xhosas burned houses belonging to Zulu residents.

Police spokeswoman Lt. Henriette Bester said four people died, including a woman shot by police who were trying to stop a crowd from

damaging and looting houses.

"There was shooting all night," said a local businessman in Kagiso, who spoke on condition of anonymity. "We have had no sleep. It is an awful situation."

A crowd of township residents pulled police with firebombs, injuring one officer, Ms. Bester said. Police shot tear gas and birdshot at the group, wounding several people, and arrested four.

Zulus and Xhosas have continued their war despite a strong police and army presence in the townships and pleas from government and black leaders for peace.

**Hostage may be released**

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — The official Iranian news agency said Thursday that a European hostage held in Lebanon would be released soon.

The Islamic Republic News Agency said the hostage to be freed was likely to be Brian Keenan, an Irish national held since April 1986. Keenan, 39, was kidnapped April 11, 1986, in Beirut while walking to his job as an English teacher at the American University in Beirut.

The morning report from the agency's Beirut office quoted an

unidentified source as saying the release could come within hours.

"IRNA did not name the source," The news agency carried a similar report on an imminent release in July that proved false.

In Dublin, Ireland, the Department of Foreign Affairs said: "We are aware of the report and would point to its speculative nature."

In Beirut, a source close to the Syrian command, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the Syrian government was notified two days ago of the decision to free a European hostage, probably Keenan.

**Typhoon kills at least 98 in China**

BEIJING (AP) — Typhoon Yanyo left 98 people dead in the coastal provinces of Fujian and Zhejiang as it battered the area this week, official reports said Thursday.

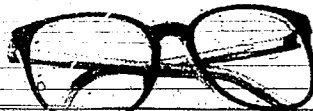
The typhoon, which killed 13 people in Taiwan before arriving in China, hit the Fujian coast three times in 24 hours Tuesday and Wednesday, the People's Daily said.

More than 4 million people in Fujian were directly affected by the ty-

phoon, which left 44 people dead in the province, it said. The report did not say how many people were injured but said 5,938 homes collapsed and economic losses totalled more than \$105 million.

The storm dumped more than 24 inches of rain in some areas of Fujian and the severe flooding of crop land will severely reduce the province's grain output this year, the paper said.

**Soviet republics still splitting from Moscow**

MOSCOW (AP) — The republic of Armenia passed a declaration of independence on Thursday.

At the same time, Estonia began formal negotiations with the Kremlin on separation, bringing the Soviet Union closer to fragmentation.

The "central" Asian republics of Turkmenia, meanwhile, declared itself sovereign with the right to overturn Soviet laws.

Armenia, a republic of 3.3 million people on the border with Turkey and Iran, is the fifth of the Soviet Union's 15 republics to move toward complete independence from the Soviet Union.

However, its path may be complicated by the bloody two-year conflict with neighboring Azerbaijan over the disputed territory of Nagorno-Karabakh.

The declaration calls for creation of Armenia's own armed forces to safeguard the border, which this week was again the scene of violent conflict with Azerbaijanis.

The declaration also calls for Nagorno-Karabakh, a largely Armenian area of Azerbaijan, to become part of Armenia.

The Armenian resolution "declares the beginning of the process of establishing independent statehood," according to an English translation sent to The Associated Press.

Armenian legislator Samvel Shakhmuroyan said he expects the republic to remain part of the Soviet Union only during an undefined transition period to complete separation.

Armenia's decision increases pressure on President Mikhail S. Gorbachev, who is struggling to develop a new union treaty attractive enough to keep his nation whole.

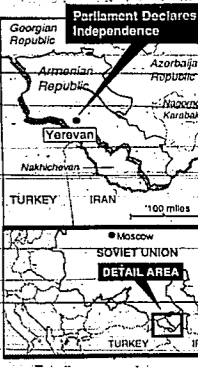

**KGB keeps demonstrators from border with Poland**

LAZDJAJ, U.S.S.R. (AP) — Heavily armed KGB border troops rolled tanks up to the Polish-Lithuanian border to prevent unauthorized crossings Thursday, the 51st anniversary of the pact that allowed Stalin to seize the Baltic republics.

Independence activists from Lithuania had hoped to take control of the border crossing from Soviet authorities in a one-day demonstration of their desire to open Lithuania to the rest of Europe.

On a field about a mile inside the border, an estimated 30,000 rain-drenched Lithuanians took part in a

Roman Catholic Mass as part of the event, dubbed "One European Road."

"They're closing before us the doors to Europe," said Petros-Rolofas, one of the organizers. "Our defense is not tanks, it is the truth. We want our struggle to be peaceful and not bloody," he said.

Lithuania and the two other Baltic republics, Latvia and Estonia, were independent between the two World Wars but lost that independence as a result of the Molotov-Ribbentrop non-aggression pact the Soviets signed with Nazi Germany in 1939.

### Panel to probe Hispanic pupils' needs

BOISE — The Idaho Board of Education has appointed a task force to take a comprehensive look at the special needs of Hispanic students in the state.

The panel's first meeting is scheduled for Thursday, Aug. 30, on the campus of Boise State University.

"Our charge is to identify educational needs of Hispanic students and recommend strategies for meeting those needs," said panel chairman Sam Byrd. He recently served on a similar committee that examined Hispanic participation in vocational education. The ultimate goal, he said, is to make sure that all Hispanic students are educated properly.

### Gem high court affirms support order

BOISE — The Idaho Supreme Court has sidestepped a ruling whether it is proper for a judge to order a non-parent to pay child support, when the person is neither the natural nor adoptive parent and is not the legal guardian.

Instead, the Supreme Court on Thursday unanimously affirmed a magistrate's child support order on a procedural basis.

The court reversed a ruling by 2nd District Judge F.B. Pinnack that child support may be ordered only from a person owing a duty to support the child as natural or adoptive parent or legal guardian.

Leroy Gordon appealed a magistrate's divorce ruling that he should pay \$100 per month child support for a child that lived with his family, but which had not been legally adopted or placed under a formal guardianship order.

### Legislators oppose second administrator

IDAHO FALLS — Higher education in Idaho Falls already has enough administration and another coordinator would be a waste of money, two legislators say.

The state Board of Education is scheduled to hire an "associate academic officer" for Idaho Falls when it meets Sept. 20-21.

The person would be responsible for assessing academic and vocational needs in the community and for the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory. He or she also would initiate program development.

### Executive retraining center announced

WEISER — A California company plans to transform a 1,240-acre Idaho ranch into a retreat and retraining center for corporate executives.

John and Cynthia Prosnik Jr., doing business as Arbut Group, Orinda, Calif., recently purchased the Tallent Ranch, about 15 miles east of Weiser in the Snake River District and said they plan to make it their corporate headquarters.

Jeanette Anderson, Washington County Economic Development Commission secretary, said the property will become Blackhorn Ranch, a place for displaced corporate executives to "get it all back together."

### Tribal fire crews will work, but may sue

FORT HALL — Although Shoshone-Bannock fire crew leaders have agreed to work for reduced wages through the end of the fire season, they may sue the Forest Service for back pay.

The Shos-Bans met earlier this month with the Bureau of Indian Affairs and Forest Service in Ogden, Utah, to settle a wage dispute.

Sho-Ban officials claimed eight crew leaders were entitled to \$15.50 per hour under a May agreement with Indian Affairs. But the Forest Service, which dispatches the Fort Hall crews, said it would only pay \$11 an hour, or would not send them out.

### Payette group disputes claims for dam

BOISE — A group opposed to a hydroelectric dam proposed for the North Fork of the Payette River disputes a developer's claims that the dam will meet power needs.

Friends of the Payette, a river conservation group, told the Payette River Advisory Group on Wednesday that developers are pushing for a \$500 million hydroelectric project that is not needed.

### 1 bound over for false rape reporting

MOSCOW — A magistrate has bound over a 19-year-old Troy woman to 2nd District Court on two felony counts of falsely reporting a rape that kept two migrant workers in jail for more than two months.

Magistrate Stephen Calhoun scheduled arraignment Sept. 10 for Angela Stephens, who is charged with perjury for allegedly lying under oath during two court hearings in May. Her testimony sent Feliciano Pena Rodriguez and Miguel Beltran Munguia to jail for 78 days on rape charges until Latah County Prosecutor Craig Mosman dropped complaints against them.

### Thomas wants AIDS case evidence tossed

BOISE (AP) — Kerry Stephen Thomas, accused of deliberately exposing five Ada County women to the deadly AIDS virus, is asking a Boise judge to throw out incriminating evidence against him.

Thomas, a court-appointed attorney, has filed a motion to suppress statements made by Thomas to Boise Police Detective Dave Smith, results of an April blood test and military enlistment records.

Gov. Cahill, an Ada County deputy public defender, said Wednesday that Thomas' consent to the release of the confidential information "was the product of coercion" by authorities, and therefore unconstitutional.

In a separate pending motion, Cahill requests that two statutory rape counts also lodged against his client be tried separately. He said those counts are "completely different and distinct" from the AIDS exposure charges.

Ada County Deputy Prosecutor Jay Rosenthal said he would not oppose severing the statutory rape charges. But any further defenses at camp at creating multiple trials will be vigorously opposed as causing unnecessary expense, he said.

Fourth District Judge George Carey was scheduled to consider the motions at a hearing Friday. Thomas, a 29-year-old Boise shelter-home training coordinator, is scheduled to stand trial Sept. 10.

# Andrus praises Taiwan for its trade balance

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus says it's obvious that the government of Taiwan is making much more of an effort to correct a trade imbalance than other foreign nations.

"They have done that," Andrus said Thursday. "That is not the case with all of our trading partners overseas."

Andrus and members of a trade delegation from Taiwan held a news conference at the Statehouse as the Chinese opened bids to buy Idaho wheat. Officials said 18 tender of-

fers were made, and the Taiwan delegation bought 87,900 metric tons of Idaho wheat for about \$1.3 billion.

Taiwan spokesmen said the country's "Buy American" program was expected to spend about \$100 million purchasing 660,000 metric tons of wheat in seven U.S. wheat states. Idaho was the first stop on what officials said is that country's 16th purchasing mission to this country.

The 75 previous trips have produced \$10 billion in orders for U.S. goods. Officials said Taiwan imports 85 percent of its wheat from the

United States, which this year would be about 33 million bushels.

Teng-Ti Chiang, director of the commercial division of the Coordinating Council for North American Affairs, Houston, said Taiwan is working hard to erase its trade imbalance with the United States.

He said last year, imports from the United States showed 1.7 percent growth, and Taiwan exported 9 percent less to this country.

A news release from the delegation said Taiwan now consumes an average of \$650 per capita in U.S. goods, more than twice as much as Japan, which the statement said was \$308 per capita.

"Many of our trade partners overseas have not been willing to reduce the trade deficit," said Andrus. "They have tried legitimately to reduce the trade deficit."

The Department of Commerce said Taiwan buys 3-4 percent of its exports, which last year was \$152 million outside of commodities.

Taiwan bought about \$6.1 million in processed food from Idaho companies and more than \$8 million worth of electronic machinery, officials said.

The Taiwan delegation's schedule calls for a visit to Douglas, Wyo., next, with intentions of buying 93,500 metric tons of wheat.

Other stops: Topeka, Kan., Sunday through Tuesday; 90,800 metric tons; Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 28-30; 97,800 metric tons; Pierre, S.D., Aug. 30-Sept. 2, 90,300 metric tons; Bismarck, N.D., Sept. 2-4, 106,300 metric tons and Minneapolis, Sept. 4-6, 93,400 metric tons.

## Females barred from rush as U of I fraternities recruit

MOSCOW (AP) — A year ago, Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity used calendar girls to lure young men to its house at the University of Idaho for a few hours during rush.

But this year, the girls of the Women of Idaho calendar are staying home.

For the first time, women are barred from the Moscow school's 17 fraternities during rush, Thursday through early Saturday evening.

The women distracted the guys from looking at the houses and the guys were going to the houses with the best-looking women," said Mark Jones of Twin Falls, assistant rush chairman for the university's Interfraternity Council and a member of the Pi Kappa Alpha. "I know I did."

In previous years, young women

— most of whom were "little sisters" at the fraternities — have chatted with the rush participants, handed out prizes at card games and even put on bikini contests.

But the demise of many little sister programs on the University of Idaho's Greek Row helped move the fraternities to ban women during the part of rush when new members pledge to a house, said David Burns, rush chairman for the Interfraternity Council.

"The chapters have had to be more creative," he said. "It is going to be interesting to see how they handle it because they are going to be with the rushees 16 hours a day now."

Matt Yost of Twin Falls, president of Phi Delta Theta fraternity, said his house is enticing potential pledges with large rooms, scholarships and a new weight room as well as its plans for a sauna and deck during rush.

"It was kind of fake before and now we're trying to give a more realistic view of the people in the house and what everybody is like," he said.

Delta Chi fraternity is holding a Greek Olympics one night rather than relying on young women to lure rush participants, said Chad Hasbarger of Seattle, the fraternity's rush chairman.

"Now, we have to do something different because no girls can be around," he said. "The majority of the guys don't mind it."

But Chris Zenner of Genesee, vice president of Sigma Alpha Epsilon, said he wishes the young women could still hang around for rush.

"Girls play a big part in the fraternity system," he said. "You have exchanges with sororities."

## Boise 'Heaven on Earth' still 2 years away

BOISE (AP) — A proposed stress- and pollution-free planned community near Boise is at least two years away from reality, a promoter of the concept says.

Henry Ogden Clark, an architect and vice president of Malibu, Calif.-based Maharishi Heaven on Earth Development Corp., spoke Wednesday in Boise about his for-profit company's plans to assist in establishment of 50 villages, each of about 100 homes, across North America in the next few years.

None of the utopian communities has yet been developed, he said, but one, near Montreal, "is in the road-building stage."

"Whether such a community will be built near Boise depends upon local developers," he said. It will be up to them to buy the land, develop the site and build and sell the homes.

Clark said his company, in turn, would be paid for design and consulting services and for the right to use the name. Clark said he has talked with Boise-area developer Larry Louser and hopes to talk with others. However, no deals are pending.

If the Maharishi City of Immortals is built, it would serve as a demonstration to inspire a new trend in housing, Clark said.

It would be designed "so when a person walks outside his home, he says to himself, 'This must be heaven on Earth,'" Clark said.

The "Maharishi" in the title refers to the Indian guru Maharishi Mahesh Yogi, who founded transcendental meditation 30 years ago.

### Accidental fish killing shows need for prevention

The accidental poisoning earlier this month of 18,000 fish in the Salmon River near Stanley points out how vulnerable Idaho's lakes and rivers are to such accidents.

In this case, the fish died when rotenone insecticide that was being used to clean trash fish out of Yellow Belly Lake in the Slantney Basin accidentally spilled into Yellow Belly Creek, Alturas Lake Creek and a four-mile stretch of the Salmon River.

The spill should never have happened, and might not have if the emphasis of the state's environmental law enforcement had been on prevention.

The fall of a 6.5 adult chinook salmon, the prized migratory game fish whose numbers have been steadily declining in Idaho waters. Also killed were 5,157 chinook fry.

"If isn't the first time that chemical poisons have taken their toll in prime salmon and steelhead spawning waters. Two years ago a tanker truck overturned on Idaho Highway 55 south of Riggins and spilled toxins into the Little Salmon River, a prime salmon and steelhead spawning stream."

"In both instances, the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare's Division of Environmental Quality assessed fines and penalties, but it acted after the damage was done. Idaho lacks a mechanism to respond to such emergencies and the effective means to prevent them."

"Although state law requires that DEQ be consulted in advance on operations that will involve the use of toxic substances near waterways, that's rarely what happens in the real world."

Toxic chemicals in large amounts are used on farms and factories near rivers and streams and transported on our highways, yet a careless mistake away from an environmental disaster.

Fish & Game has been using rotenone for years to kill unwanted fish in lakes and reservoirs, sometimes in coves or other secluded, protected areas where the chances of the toxin spreading is limited. Spot rotenone use is often to get a census of the species and numbers of fish within a lake.

Other times, it is used to clean out whole bodies of water, as in the case of Yellow Belly Lake, so that the lake can be restocked with game fish.

Rotenone is ideal for that purpose. It's lethal and fast-acting, but it doesn't remain in the lake to poison subsequent generations of fish.

Up until the Yellow Belly Lake incident, Fish & Game had a good safety record of using the stuff, but this experience should make the agency rethink its use. The spill occurred even though Fish & Game had a detoxification station in operation at site.

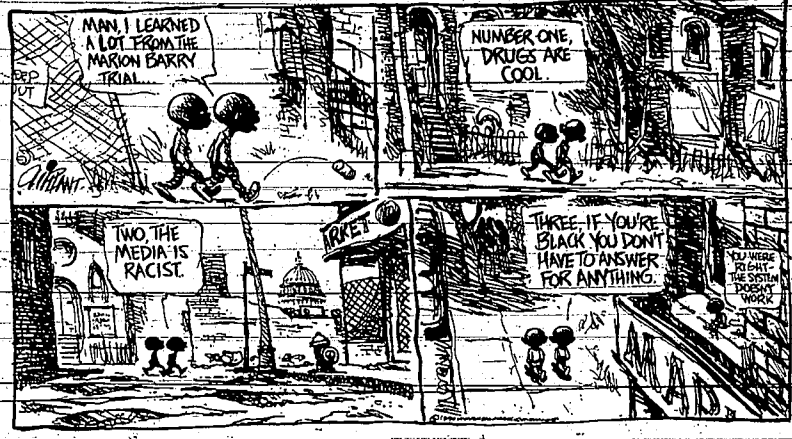
But even if the department's safeguards had worked at Yellow Belly Lake, the agency was policing itself; and that's not good.

Anywhere there is a concentrated use of toxic substances on or near a body of water, DEQ should be there, checking and inspecting the operation beforehand.

Wherever there is a record of safety hazards involving toxic spills, as on Highway 55, DEQ should be pounding on the door of the Idaho Transportation Department until changes are made.

That will take more money and more manpower for environmental enforcement, but prevention is almost always cheaper than cure.

In the case of the Yellow Belly Lake spill, at least chinook salmon can't easily be replaced.



## Saddam should be taken seriously

Unless there is a rapid change in thinking about the Middle East in Washington, the buildup of American troops in the Persian Gulf and Saudi Arabia may prove to be the most regrettable misadventure since Vietnam. On the other hand, the crisis in the Gulf can be turned into an opportunity to work out a security pact for the entire Middle East—Diplomacy must be given a chance.

The dispatch of American troops was a hasty act based on misunderstanding of the people and politics of the region; ill-conceived analogies fit for poetry not policy, and an autistic tendency for intervention that has not yet adjusted to the spirit of globalism, which many people around the world are hoping for.

Comparisons of Iraqi President Saddam Hussein to Hitler have been too easily made. To be sure, Saddam is a ruthless autocrat who has committed unspeakable atrocities. He cannot, however, do what Hitler did for the simple fact that Iraq, unlike Germany on the eve of war, is in dire economic straits, its military power notwithstanding.

The obsession with Saddam's personality and the reading of his mind, which in the hands of some "experts" has bordered on astrology, blinded policy-makers to the fact that Saddam did not invent the Iraqi claims on Kuwait. These were made even during British rule, and were repeated in 1961, when Kuwait gained independence from Britain. Iraq had no such ambitions in Saudi Arabia, and no serious Arab analyst believed that Saddam was about to invade the kingdom. Indeed, if the Iraqis had designs on Saudi Arabia, especially since they hardly met any resistance in Kuwait? Yet analysts and officials in Washington made an Iraqi invasion of Saudi Arabia seem imminent.

The analogy did not stop here; it seems to have dictated the type of response. Bush, in his address announcing the sending of troops to Saudi Arabia, spoke of no appeasement, implicitly equating the sending of American troops to the Middle East to U.S. entry into World War II. As it turned out, this analogy proved to be even more erroneous, if not more cynical. No sooner was the declaration of American intervention, which has been summarily dismissed by Washington as a diversion. It should, I

apparent enthusiasm with which Western ships set sail toward the gulf evoked for many Arabs and Moslems images of the Crusaders (but this time for oil rather than Christendom) and European colonial navies and armies in the 19th and 20th centuries parading out the area among themselves. The Arabs did not need Saddam Hussein to remind them.

The larger U.S. forces stay in the region the more its position in the streets of the Arab world will deteriorate. A protracted stay in the gulf would be politically unsustainable at home and would lead to the demoralization of the GIs. And Iraq is not just going to sit and suffer the results of an economic embargo, especially if it is effective. The deployment of troops in the gulf renders a disastrous war between the United States and Iraq almost inevitable. Moreover, the long-term U.S. interests in the region could be put in serious jeopardy. Today, the Arab world is mobilized by two potent forces, nationalism and religion. In Jordan, Moslem Brothers, Arab nationalists and Communists have been marching together against the American and European presence in the gulf and in solidarity with Iraq. An American-led war against Iraq would only intensify and broaden these feelings.

War is not unavoidable, and the crisis in the gulf can be turned into an opportunity for the conclusion of a Middle East pact that would resolve the festering problems in the Middle East as a whole. In this pact would be all the countries of the Arab East (including the Palestinians), Iraq, Turkey and Israel. The pact would involve withdrawal of all occupying forces from the countries or territories they hold and the guarantee of borders through bilateral and international arrangements. Iraq would withdraw from Kuwait, Israel from the occupied Arab territories and Syria from Lebanon (with an agreement for ending the civil war there) and all would work toward the solution of whatever border disputes that may be present.

Saddam Hussein, albeit defiantly and vaguely, has just made a parallel proposal, which has been summarily dismissed by Washington as a diversion. It should, I

think, be taken with utmost seriousness. The linkage of these questions to each other only reflects the reality on the ground.

Tako, for example, the normally unnaughty alliance of King Hussein and the Palestinians with Saddam. Both the Jordanians and the Palestinians have become extremely anxious about the change in the balance of power in the region that would ensue as a result of the influx of Soviet Jews to Israel and the possibility of expelling large numbers of Palestinians from the West Bank and Gaza. For this they needed the resources to counteract Israel's increasing power, which they have concluded the gulf states were unwilling to provide.

Problems in the Middle East cannot be viewed in isolation from each other and the opportunity to knuddle them all at once should not be wasted. Iraq cannot reject the solution without losing its inestimable support among Jordanians, Palestinians and Lebanese and elsewhere. The Kuwaitis themselves would be willing to make certain concessions to Iraq in order to restore their sovereignty over their country.

Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir has been demanding a peace pact with the Arabs; this pact would avail him the opportunity to get just that. Syria would certainly not hesitate to trade its unpopular stay in Lebanon for its Golan Heights. Troop withdrawals would be coupled with bilateral and international guarantees of security and borders for all the countries. The specter of war looming over the area and the uncertainty of all parties as to where they will stand at the end of it ought to be compelling enough reasons for them to want to negotiate such a treaty.

Not should this be interpreted in a reflexive fashion as rewarding aggression. On the contrary, the message would be that the occupation of a neighbor's land, irrespective of the perpetrator, is viewed by the world community as equally unacceptable. Otherwise, the attempt by the West to dislodge Iraq from Kuwait would continue to be viewed by many Arabs as no more than a greedy scrambling for cheap oil, devoid of principle.

### Accidental fish killing shows need for prevention

The accidental poisoning earlier this month of 18,000 fish in the Salmon River near Stanley points out how vulnerable Idaho's lakes and rivers are to such accidents.

In this case, the fish died when rotenone insecticide that was being used to clean trout fish out of Yellow Belly Lake in the Stanley Basin accidentally spilled into Yellow Belly Creek, Alturas Lake Creek and a four-mile stretch of the Salmon River.

The spill should never have happened, and might not have if the emphasis of the state's environmental law enforcement had been on prevention.

The toll included 65 adult chinook salmon, the prized migratory game fish whose numbers have been steadily declining in Idaho waters. Also killed were 5,157 chinook fry.

It isn't the first time that chemical poisons have taken their toll in prime salmon and steelhead spawning waters.

Two years ago a tanker truck overturned on Idaho Highway 55 south of Riggins and spilled toxins into the Little Salmon River, a prime salmon and steelhead spawning stream.

In both instances, the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare's Division of Environmental Quality assessed the fish and wildlife, but it acted after the damage was done. Idaho lacks a mechanism to respond to such emergencies and the effective means to prevent them.

Although state law requires that DEQ be consulted in advance on operations that will involve the use of toxic substances near waterways, that's rarely what happens in the real world.

Toxic chemicals in large amounts are used on farms and factories near rivers and streams and transported on our highways, just a careless mistake away from an environmental disaster.

Fish & Game has been using rotenone for years to kill unwanted fish in lakes and reservoirs, sometimes in coves or other secluded, protected areas where the chances of the toxin spreading is limited. Spot rotenone use is often to get a census of the species and numbers of fish within a lake.

Other times, it is used to clean out whole bodies of water, as in the case of Yellow Belly Lake, so that the lake can be restocked with game fish.

Rotenone is ideal for that purpose. It's lethal and fast-acting, but it doesn't remain in the lake to poison subsequent generations of fish.

Up until the Yellow Belly Lake incident, Fish & Game had a good safety record of using the stuff, but this experience should make the agency rethink its use. The spill occurred even though Fish & Game had a detoxification station in operation at site.

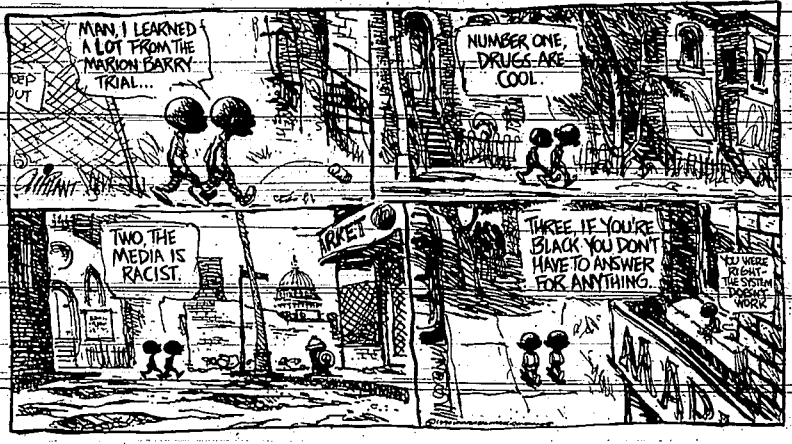
But even if the department's safeguards had worked at Yellow Belly Lake, the agency was policing itself, and that's not good.

Anytime there is a concentrated use of toxic substances on or near a body of water, DEQ should be there, checking and inspecting the operation beforehand.

Wherever there is a record of safety hazards involving toxic spills, as on Highway 55-DEQ should be pounding on the door of the Idaho Transportation Department until changes are made.

That will take more money and more manpower—for environmental enforcement, but prevention is almost always cheaper than cure.

In the case of the Yellow Belly Lake spill, the lost chinook salmon can't easily be replaced.



## Saddam should be taken seriously

Unless there is a rapid change in thinking about the Middle East in Washington, the buildup of American troops in the Persian Gulf-Saudi Arabia may prove to be the most regrettable misadventure since Vietnam. On the other hand, the crisis in the Gulf can be turned into an opportunity to work out a security pact for the entire Middle East. Diplomacy must be given a chance.

The dispatch of American troops was a hasty act based on misunderstanding of the people and politics of the region, ill-conceived analogies fit for poetry not policy, and an atavistic tendency to intervention that has not yet adjusted to the spirit of globalism, which many people around the world are hoping for.

Comparisons of Iraqi President Saddam Hussein to Hitler have been too easily made. To be sure, Saddam is a ruthless autocrat who has committed unspeakable atrocities. He cannot, however, do what Hitler did for the simpler reason that the war in Germany on the eve of the war, is in dire economic straits, its military power notwithstanding.

The obsession with Saddam's personality and the reading of his mind, which in the hands of some "experts" has bordered on astrology, blinded policy-makers to the fact that Saddam did not invent the Iraqi claims on Kuwait. These were made even during the monarchy, when Iraq was still under British tutelage, and were repeated in 1961, when Kuwait gained independence from Britain. Iraq had no such ambitions in Saudi Arabia, and no serious Arab analyst believed that Saddam was about to invade the kingdom. Indeed, if the Iraqis had designs on Saudi Arabian territory, why didn't their tanks keep rolling, especially since they hardly met any resistance in Kuwait? Yet analysts and officials in Washington made an Iraqi invasion of Saudi Arabia seem imminent.

The analogy did not stop here; it seems to have dictated the type of response. Bush, in his address announcing the sending of troops to Saudi Arabia, spoke of no appeasement, implicitly equating the sending of American troops to the Middle East to U.S. entry into World War II. As it turned out, this analogy proved to be even more erroneous, if not more cynical. No sooner was the declaration of American intervention made public than public opinion in the Arab world began to turn in favor of Saddam. The

think, be taken with utmost seriousness. The linkage of these questions to each other only reflects the reality on the ground.

Take, for example, the normally unattractive alliance of King Hussein and the Palestinians with Saddam. Both the Jordanians and the Palestinians have become extremely anxious about the change in the balance of power in the region that would ensue as a result of the influx of Soviet Jews to Israel and the possibility of expelling large numbers of Palestinians from the West Bank and Gaza. For this they needed the resources to counteract Israel's increasing power, which they have concluded the Gulf states were unwilling to provide.

Problems in the Middle East cannot be viewed in isolation from each other, and the opportunity to handle them all at once should not be wasted. Iraq cannot reject the solution without losing its inestimable support among Jordanians, Palestinians and Lebanese elsewhere. The Kuwaitis themselves would be willing to make certain concessions to Iraq in order to restore their sovereignty over their country.

Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir has been demanding a peace accord with the Arab states; this forum would avail him the opportunity to get just that. Syria would certainly not hesitate to trade its unpopular stay in Lebanon for its Golan Heights. Troop withdrawals would be coupled with bilateral and international guarantees of security and borders for all the countries. The specter of war looming over the area and the uncertainty of all parties as to where they will stand at the end of it ought to be compelling enough reasons for them to want to negotiate such a treaty.

Herring said the study did not consider Southern California markets for Idaho flour and he said the Magic Valley might be a better location for the mill if markets develop on the southern West Coast.

### 5 Soviets visiting Idaho to learn about fur business

**HEYBURN** — Five Soviet businessmen are spending 10 days in Idaho, learning about the fur trade. Their visit follows an earlier trip by Heyburn fur farmer Lee Moyle to the Soviet Union.

Because the Soviet government now allows private enterprise, the fur industry there wants to know how to market its product. Moyle said the Soviet fur industry is larger but less efficient than the United States. Moyle said the delegates have a shopping list of agricultural goods and equipment that they might purchase during their trip.

### Former Jerome employee pleads guilty to drug charge

**JEROME** — A former city employee pleaded guilty Thursday to possession of a controlled substance.

Bobby Gene Arbaugh, the city's former water meter reader, entered the plea before District Judge Phillip M. Becker. He had requested dismissal of the original charge against him, delivery of cocaine. Arbaugh was arrested March 26 after a confidential informant for the Jerome County Sheriff's Office purchased one gram of cocaine from him. He will be sentenced following a routine presentence investigation, Jerome County Prosecutor John Horgan said. Arbaugh declined to comment before the hearing Thursday.

## Billionaire buys ranch near Hailey

**HAILEY** — The man referred to as "Donald Trump of the West Coast" has acquired a private retreat near Hailey and is accommodating state game agents' concerns about deer migration routes there.

Billionaire California developer Donald L. Bren has bought the 6,800-acre Deer Creek Ranch from Bill Burt. Bren said he plans to build a home and maintain the property as a working cattle ranch, Burt said.

"There were several people who offered me more money who wanted to subdivide," Burt said. "I picked him because he said he was not going to subdivide."

Bren, 57, the son of the late Hollywood film producer, is estimated to have a net worth of \$1.85 billion, making him the 16th wealthiest person in the country, according to Forbes magazine.

He is the largest landowner in southern California, with nearly 10,000 apartments, 11.4 million square feet of commercial space and the prevailing interest in a company that owns nearly one-sixth of the land in Orange County.

Bren said he has the ranch has drawn fire from sportsmen and the Idaho Department of Fish and Game. He is building a five-foot-high wood-rail fence along both sides of Deer Creek Road, which critics say could interfere with deer migration.

The fence is for livestock control, said Jay Sevy, president of the New Deer Creek Ranch Corp. The top rail will be removed along most of the fence, allowing deer to jump it, he said.

Fish and Game concerns may not be valid, Sevy said.

"They alluded to me that they really don't know where the game migration goes," he said. "They couldn't really say where to put what."

Fish and Game biologist Ed Bettum said his department has no jurisdiction on the property, but will ask Sevy to leave the top rail off until next June to aid the migrations.

## McDevitt ready to go to Mideast

### Congressional candidate is Army reservist who may be called

**TWIN FALLS** — In an unexpected twist to his campaign slogan, Republican Sean McDevitt may have to say goodbye — not hi — to Idaho.

The 27-year-old congressional candidate said Thursday he could be called back into Army service by the current Middle East crisis.

McDevitt, an Army Reserve captain and a West Point graduate who served in the Panama invasion but left active duty in December, is the GOP nominee challenging 2nd District Rep. Richard

Stallings.

During a campaign stop in Twin Falls, McDevitt said he's not different than the thousands of other Idaho reserves who may be pressed into service if called by President Bush.

"I'm prepared," McDevitt said.

The candidate said four other members of the McDevitt family are also waiting word on whether they'll be sent to the Persian Gulf — including his wife, Becky, who is on active duty as a nurse at Mullan Army Hospital at Fort Lewis, Wash.

"And none of us would be hesitant to go," he said.

The timing may not help McDevitt's

campaign, but the fifth ranking Republican leader in the U.S. House of Representatives said—the candidate's military experience will be an asset in Congress.

"There are few people in Congress today who understand the realities of U.S. foreign policy and the need to keep this country strong," said Rep. Duncan Hunter, R-California, a member of the House Armed Services Committee.

Hunter served in Vietnam and was an ardent supporter of President Reagan's military build-up in the early 80s. The California congressman flew to Idaho

## Current ranger-rancher dispute stems from 1989 incident

**TWIN FALLS** — The report of a recent threat to a U.S. Forest Service district ranger is rooted in an October 1989 incident.

The New York Times in its Aug. 17 edition quoted Oakley rancher Winslow Whiteley as threatening to cut the throat of Twin Falls District Ranger Don Oman if Oman is not transferred out of the Twin Falls district.

Efforts to reach Whiteley for comment on the story Wednesday and Thursday were unsuccessful.

On the morning of Oct. 13 last year, members of the Wild Rose Cattle Association and some of their families were rounding up their cattle to separate calves from their mothers.

Wild Rose is an Oakley-based group of five ranches with a public land grazing permit on the Goose Creek Allotment in the South Hills.

Oman, accompanied by two other forest officials, two state brand inspectors and two Forest Service law enforcement officers showed up unannounced for a herd count in the South Hills.

"It should also be noted that the count showed every permittee to be within his permitted number," said Wild Rose President Ray Bedke in a letter to Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho.

But not all the cows on the allotment were counted, according to Oman. Cows with unbranded calves are not ordinarily counted in such a procedure.

Oman, according to the brand inspector's report, Mike and Kelly Poulton, who are allowed 167 head on the allotment, had 158 cows, seven bulls and 165 calves. Calves less than six months old are not included in the number of head allowed on the allot-

ment.

Bruce Bedke had 115 cows, no bulls and 127 calves, according to the brand inspector's report. His allotment is for 122 head, the report said.

The average reproduction rate of range cattle is about 20 to 23 percent, Idaho Cattle Association President Bert Brackett said. But range cattle will very rarely raise both calves if twins are born.

"It looked like we were running with a lot of twins on that allotment," said Wally Shiverdecker, a spokesman for the Forest

## Fairchild confident he can beat Andrus

**TWIN FALLS** — He's behind in the polls and he's dog-tired from too many nights on the campaign trail, but Roger Fairchild is confident he can become the next governor of Idaho.

"I might not have the money, but I know I have the issues," Fairchild told the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club Thursday.

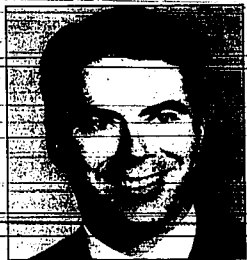
Although he faces a well-financed incumbent and he's been labeled "a sacrificial lamb" even by some members of his own party, Fairchild said it's a great honor to be the republican nominee.

"I'm participating in this system not as a cynic, but as an optimist," he said.

Without mentioning Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus by name, Fairchild called for an end to corruption in government. He proposed limiting an Idaho governor to just two terms and limiting campaign contributions from special interest groups.

Fairchild also called for candidates to make a full disclosure of their personal finances.

"I've released my tax returns for the

"I'm participating ... as an optimist" last 10 years, every year I've been in public. I've asked my opponent to do the same. He's refused and I ask why," Fairchild said.

Turning to budget matters, Fairchild repeated his proposal to fund the state's

budget surplus back to local governments where the money can be spent on roads, bridges, sewage systems and solid waste disposal.

He said this revenue sharing plan would not only help reduce property taxes, it would also let the air out of an inflated state bureaucracy.

"We're cringing for more tax increases because our state government is growing faster than the economy," Fairchild said.

Unlike many candidates worried about winning in November, Fairchild was not afraid to spend a good portion of his time discussing his views on abortion.

He said he expects the U.S. Supreme Court will "wimp out" and leave the issue to be decided by the states.

A governor of Idaho, Fairchild pledged to sign anti-abortion legislation. And, alluding to Andrus' veto this spring of a Right to Life-sponsored bill, the Fruitland Republican said he wouldn't stand on the sidelines and watch the Legislature draft an abortion bill he couldn't sign.

"If I propose as a society, we have to stop killing the babies," he said.

## New emphasis on public lands heats up range

**TWIN FALLS** — Recent friction between ranchers in the South Hills and the U.S. Forest Service may be a reflection of a new emphasis by the agency on public land management.

Called "Change on the Range" by the Forest Service, the new program focuses on increased recreational use and other land values in addition to grazing, Twin Falls District Ranger Don Oman said.

"Commodity uses, such as timber harvest and grazing, will not be done at the expense of other resources," he said.

The new direction is not intended to eliminate grazing from public land, "but just to do it in a more responsible manner," he said.

And it's not really so new. The requirement for more careful range management already is in the ranchers' grazing permits, but they haven't been enforced very well, Oman said.

That enforcement is the cause of friction, he said.

A group of ranchers, known as the Wild Rose Grazing Association based in Oakley, objects to the way Oman and the Forest Service administer public lands in the South Hills.

Oakley rancher Winslow Whiteley, in a letter to Sawtooth National Forest Supervisor Roland Stolosen, called Oman "blatantly biased" and showing "rampant hatred" toward livestock grazing.

Idaho Cattle Association Executive Vice President Gary Glenn said the problem was a personality conflict, not a policy problem.

"If he's ineffective in working with the permittees, he's going to be ineffective in protecting the resource," Glenn said of

## Athletic fees will remain at Filer High School

**FILER** — After a great deal of discussion and one motion that died, the board tabled a request to discontinue athletic fees at Tuesday evening's School Board meeting.

The Filer School District is one of the few districts that has this type of fee. Each student participating in a sport activity must pay \$20, and must pay an additional \$5 for each additional sport, not to exceed a maximum of \$30.

Bob McGrew, high school principal and Wade Quessnell, high school athletic director brought the proposal before the board.

Quessnell has a number of fund-raising projects planned. He is confident these projects will be a success, due to the staff currently in place and the support from the local community.

He said revenue raised from the projects, combined with gate receipts and contributions from other student fees, should be enough money to cover expenses without this additional fee.

The athletic department has a balance that was carried forward from last year. Quessnell and McGrew would like to see that balance passed on to the community by eliminating the athletic fees.

Quessnell said the students "pay to play"

and are being charged twice. Once for an activity card and then again for each sport activity.

For the parents it gets even more expensive, especially if the student participates in several sport activities, Quessnell explained. Shoes, for example, will run a minimum of \$40 to \$50 a pair. Some parents have more than one student involved in sports.

"We're always ding the parents for more money," Quessnell said. He said he would like to see this fee dropped.

"This is probably the hottest one-item-a-school board can talk about and the small-estimating the athletic fees."

## Hagerman liquor sales debate continues

**HAGERMAN** — Debate over whether to allow liquor sales an extra hour — until 2 a.m. — on Friday and Saturday nights is continuing.

At a public hearing on the matter Tuesday, local residents who spoke said they are in favor of keeping the extended hour.

Council members said Hagerman needs an ordinance to adopt either the state closure time of 1 a.m. or the county's time of 2 a.m.

Since 1986, the city has followed the county's 2 a.m. time rule, even though city officials never have taken any action to adopt the time change.

At the hearing, local residents said Hagerman should have the same closure times as the other cities in Gooding County.

"I don't feel we should be differ-

ent from the rest of the county," Kay Stover said. "I shouldn't be a uniform."

Angler's bar owner Jim Stoval agreed, saying, "We need to be in compliance with the rest of the county."

Also, Stoval estimated his business would lose a net income of about \$400 per month if he had to close at 1 a.m. on Friday and Saturday nights.

The residents expressed concern that the earlier closure will send bar patrons to Bliss, Gooding or Wendell to drink, and that those people will create a serious road hazard leaving and returning to Hagerman.

Councilwoman Gloria Jazwick said it appears the city residents are about equally divided on the issue.

She said that at a previous debate and also in individual conversations with council members, some resi-

dent Mer librarian Debbie Harris resigned in June.

"Most of them have been objecting to the noise and traffic in town and they would prefer to see it closed earlier," she said.

Jazwick noted that, although no official survey has been taken, people frequently comment that it doesn't make any difference to them when the bars close.

Gary Grissom, owner of the Quik Stop, asked that the issue be settled "right now tonight" to end the controversy.

Mayor Merle Owsley said it could not be settled because it was not on the agenda. The hearing, he said, was only to listen to public comment for consideration for a decision later.

In other business, Hagerman City Clerk and Treasurer Karma Musheritz turned in her resignation, stating that she has decided to move Hawaii to take care of her mother, who is ill.

The council named Carol Zutwick as temporary clerk and treasurer until a new clerk is hired. The city is advertising and taking applications for the position.

Councilwoman Jazwick said the city is also looking for a librarian to work from 2 to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.

The job pays minimum wage. For-

mer librarian Debbie Harris resigned in June.

The council approved the city's new 1990-1991 budget of \$270,970. Budgeted expenditures include \$10,000 for liability insurance, \$45,017 for streets, \$9,550 for the library and \$8,823 for the park.

Mayor Owsley noted that insurance for the city's 20-minute fireworks display on Sept. 3 will cost \$500.

Krista Merrill of the Hagerman Quick Response Unit thanked the city officials for their \$700 for the QRU fund for their additional support during the year.

The council considered a proposal to require a \$250 cleaning deposit for softball tournaments.

After games, they said, the park and school grounds have not been cleaned up.

A decision was postponed until next spring.

Jazwick said the city, at that time, may also want to set up some additional guidelines or agreements for use of the park.

Police Chief Todd Peterson reported that Capt. Chad Watson and Alton Illis have been sworn in as city reserve officers.

He said he is still taking applications for additional officers.

## Telescope gets go-ahead

**TUCSON, Ariz. (AP)** — The U.S. Forest Service said Thursday it has authorized the University of Arizona to build three telescopes on Mount Graham, after clearance by the U.S. Justice and Agriculture departments.

Justice and Agriculture lawyers gave the go-ahead for the project, determining that under the Arizona Game Conservation Act of 1938, requirements for biological study by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service

of the endangered Mount Graham red squirrel have been satisfied concerning construction of the first three telescopes planned for the Mount Graham International Observatory.

Justice and the USDA had concluded that the 1988 act "does not provide for additional consultation with the Fish and Wildlife Service at this time regarding the impact of the three telescopes."

## Agencies line up against untreated shake roofs

**SPOKANE, Wash. (AP)** — Firefighters compare untreated shake roofs to a stack of kindling sitting on a house.

Consequently, several agencies, including the Washington State Association of Fire Chiefs, are lining up in favor of restricted use of wood roofs in subdivisions at risk from wildfire.

"The roof is beautiful and utilitarian and highly desirable. There are subdivisions that require them as a condition of construction all over the state," Public Lands Commissioner Brian Boyle said.

"The problem is that if you have a condition where you are close to a forest fire, and there is a likelihood that burning trees can throw flaming branches across the roof, that shake roof is just a pile of kindling on top of the house."

Boyle and several other natural resources and fire officials have been attending town meetings around the

state, including one in Spokane on Thursday, to talk about protecting homes from wildfire.

In Eastern Washington, the most frequently cited case for amending the building code on roofs is the 1987 Hangman Hills fire, which destroyed 24 shake-roofed homes and blackened some 1,000 acres just south of Spokane.

Michael Westfall, president of the Cedar Shake and Shingle Bureau in Bellevue, said Spokane County's fire history does not warrant restrictions on wood roofs.

"Less than one-half of 1 percent of all residential fires start on the roof. That's nationwide for all kinds of roofing on all kinds of structures," Westfall said.

"The biggest problem that exists in Spokane County are the pine trees and the accumulation of pine needles on roofs."

Firefighters recommend cutting branches away from roofs, establish-

ing greenbelts clear of fire fuel around homes and subdivisions and keeping roofs clean.

Westfall also advocates common-sense precautions rather than regulation, although several governmental bodies are studying building code amendments.

"When you build in Mother Nature's realm, you're subject to Mother Nature's whims," Westfall said.

In June, Washington's fire chiefs adopted a resolution recommending that local fire districts consider regulations requiring fire-retardant roofing.

"It's a countrywide issue," Boyle said.

A fire task force in Spokane came up with a wildfire-hazard rating plan on which to base restrictions for wood roofing on new construction.

But the plan has been put on hold until a new committee can review it, said task force member Jim Graue, deputy fire chief.

"Wood roofs should be prohibited in those areas that are susceptible to wildfire," Graue said.

Ross Hesselstine, a fire protection forester for the Department of Natural Resources' northeast region, said shake roofs should not be banned.

"There's a place for them. But that place is not in the middle of a forested development," he said.

There is an alternative roofing available — fire-resistant composition material, tile and pressure-treated wood. The treated wood costs 25 percent more than the traditional cedar shingle, Westfall said.

Developer Jim Frank believes the marketplace will solve the problem.

"We have not built a house with a shake roof in three years," Frank said.

"People don't want shake roofs because they're aware of the fire danger. You don't need to pass a law against shake roofs."

# Stock market takes nose dive, reaches lowest mark in over a year

NEW YORK — Heavy selling sent stock prices tumbling to their lowest levels in more than a year Thursday as runaway oil prices and fears of war in the Middle East kept the world's financial markets in turmoil.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial plunged 76.73 points to 2,883.94, its lowest close since it stood at 2,462.44 on July 6, 1989. Since July 14 the average has fallen 616.33 points, or 20.5 percent. Declaring issues overwhelmed advances by about 11 to 1 on the New York Stock Exchange, with 148 up,

1,645 down and 244 unchanged. Volume on the floor of the Big Board reached 250.44 million shares, up from 175.55 million the previous session. Analysts said there was little question about where U.S. stock prices were headed as Wall Street came to work Thursday morning.

The Dow Jones industrial average had fallen more than 96 points in the last two sessions. Overnight, the Tokyo stock market suffered a 5.8 percent loss, its fourth-largest single-day drop on record. The slide in U.S. stocks picked up momentum late Wednesday as the price of oil surged past \$30 a barrel

to levels nearly double where it stood at the beginning of the summer. The show-down in the Middle East that began with Iraq's invasion of Kuwait on Aug. 2 has raised the specter of a wide range of economic problems, including recession and a simultaneous surge in inflationary pressures.

Rapid rises in interest rates threaten to compound economic woes. Brokers say stock market investors have been dismayed to find themselves trying to calculate the economic damage from the situation in the Persian Gulf even as the crisis continues to unfold.

## Connors happy with match victory

NEW YORK — Jimmy Connors satisfied himself Thursday which if all he wanted to do.

He tested his left wrist but not his game as he defeated mistake-prone Roberto Seguso 6-2, 4-6, 6-0 to move into the quarterfinals of the "WCT" Tournament of Champions.

"If I can't come out here and have fun grinding it out and yelling and screaming and graping and moaning and talking to the people in the stands and hitting balls for winners and missing shots and doing what I've done for the last 22 years, then I'd do something else," Connors said.

Another match during Thursday's rain-shortened second round, Frenchman Henri Leconte defeated Spain's Javier Sanchez 6-2, 6-2. Andrei Chesnokov of the Soviet Union led South Africa's Christo van Rensburg 6-2, 2-1 when rain halted play for the night. Also washed out was Aaron Krickstein's match with Czechoslovakia's Petr Korda.

The tournament lost Jay Berger with a badly blistered foot. That put Todd Martin, a Northwestern University student from Lansing, Mich., into the quarterfinals against Leconte.

Connors, who will turn 38 a week from Sunday, said he would decide on Sunday whether to seek his sixth U.S. Open title. He is scheduled to meet hard-serving Kevin Curren in the first round.

"If I go in there and don't play up to standard, that would upset me more than not playing at all and not being able to give the people the kind of game and excitement I've given them in the past," he said. "I do enjoy it and it keeps me in shape."

"I don't think it's my desire to win as much as it's my desire to go out and try to reach a level that I expect out of myself."

Because of the layout to rest his wrist, Connors had no snap to his forehand and serve, instead pushing the ball with no spin. But, overflowing with mistakes, Seguso could not take advantage, except in the second set when his serve-and-volley

game was clicking.

Connors, however, produced the same marvelous backhand that has carried him to 109 tournament titles. And his return of serve, for years the best in the game, was more than enough to keep Seguso from mounting any semblance of a counter-attack.

## Raiders deny recent reports of move to Oakland

PALO ALTO, Calif. — Al Davis was quoted in a published report Thursday as saying the Raiders are "100 percent certain" to return to their old home in Oakland to play the 1990 season.

"The Raiders, however, vehemently denied it and a member of the Los Angeles Coliseum Commission said there have been no negotiations with the Raiders about leaving Los Angeles for Oakland this season."

"We fully expect to play our 1990 home games in Los Angeles," said Al LoCasale, the Raiders' executive assistant. "This sort of reporting makes it extremely difficult for us to sell tickets in Los Angeles."

"Al LoCasale denies that the Raiders are leaving Los Angeles," said Richard Riordan, a former president of the Los Angeles Coliseum Commission who is now a member of the group. "Secondly, we have had zero negotiations with the Raiders about leaving Los Angeles this year."

"We're still talking to them. I don't know how it's going to come out. He's still talking to Oakland and I know he's still talking to us."

The Peninsula Times-Tribune quoted an unidentified Raiders player as saying that Davis, the Raiders' managing general part-

ner, told him he is "100 percent sure we will play in Oakland this year."

The Raiders played in Oakland until 1981 when they moved to the Los Angeles Coliseum. The NFL tried to block the move, but Davis sued and won after long court battle.

Last spring, however, after negotiations for improvement at the Coliseum proved fruitless, Davis announced he would move back to Oakland.

That move, however, was not in doubt when voters there rejected part of the city's deal with the team that would have paid for any unsold tickets.

According to the Times-Tribune, Davis

made the statement about the return to Oakland at a team meeting.

But LoCasale said: "The last time Al Davis met with the squad was when we gave out Super Bowl rings after the 1984 season." He added that he had been asked the same question two days ago by a San Francisco reporter, who told LoCasale the story's source was an unidentified San Francisco 49er who said the information came to him from a Raider.

According to Thursday's report, Davis told the player that the team would continue to practice in Los Angeles but commute the 400 miles north for its home games in order to give players and staff time to relocate.

## Skater decides to try for Gold

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — Jill Trenary, three-time U.S. national champion and defending world champion, will remain in competitive figure skating through the 1992 Winter Olympics, she announced Thursday.

There was speculation that Trenary, 22, might retire to join a professional ice show, but she said at a news conference that she wants a chance to win an Olympic medal. She was fourth in the 1988 Winter Games in Calgary, Canada.

She also said she will remain for most of the year in Colorado Springs, where she has trained for the "last seven years," although her coaches, Carlo and Christa Fassis, are moving to Milan, Italy.

Trenary, of Minnetonka, Minn., said she will visit the Fassis at least twice a year for instruction and train the remainder of the time under the Broadmoor World Arena's new coach, Kathy Casey.

Trenary's announcement came as a relief to U.S. Figure Skating Association officials, who already have lost their defending pairs and dance champions. Pairs champions Kristi Yamaguchi and Rudi Galindo split to concentrate on singles careers, while dance champions Susan Wynne and Joseph Dwyer retired.

## Olazabal burns Firestone course

AKRON, Ohio — Jose Maria Olazabal had a shot at 59 — the record low score on the American pro golf tour — and didn't even know it.

Olazabal parred the last four holes Thursday for a 9-under-par 61 that set a course and tournament record for the Firestone Country Club and the World Series of Golf and gave him a four-stroke first-round lead.

He lipped out birdie putts of three and six feet on the 15th and 17th holes that could have given him a tie for the best score in PGA Tour history.

The 26-year-old Spanish star insisted, however, that thoughts of a 59 or records of any kind did not enter his mind until it was too late.

"No, no," he said. "I didn't realize I had a chance until my caddy told me."

That information was passed along, he said, after he'd lipped out a 6-foot birdie putt on the 17th hole, his last realistic chance to keep alive the chance of matching Al Geiberger's 13-year-old record set in the Memphis Classic.

Olazabal, making his first start in this winners-only tournament and on the course that has a long-standing reputation for length and difficulty, said he was concerned only with his relationship to par and did not realize Firestone plays up to a par of 70 instead of the more common 72.

He went five under par on the first four holes — birdie, eagle, birdie, birdie — was five under at the turn despite a bogey and then went to nine under with a burst of four consecutive birdies ending with a 22-footer on the 14th.

### Spielberg said to be ready to make smaller-scale movies

**HOLLYWOOD** — Is Steven Spielberg king of the special-effects crazes getting ready to make small, intimate movies? An announcement is upcoming, sources say, that Spielberg will be teaming with a New York film maker in a new production company that will specialize in smaller ventures. Spielberg was contacted by the Los Angeles Times. Spielberg spokesman Marvin Levy confirmed that the director of such monster hits as "E.T." and "Raiders of the Lost Ark" does have plans to launch a company apart from his own Amblin Entertainment, to develop smaller movies that don't have the usual opportunities (to get made). In other words: less mainstream films.

Levy said that the company will be based in lower Manhattan. He said he couldn't name Spielberg's partner in the new company until negotiations are complete. But he did disclose that the partner would be someone with whom Spielberg has worked.

Remember that Spielberg — who got his theatrical start with the modest "Sugarland Express" (1974) — teamed with New York-based Martin Scorsese to encourage Columbia Pictures to restore that other small, intimate picture, "Lawrence of Arabia."

### New Kids on the Block may be part of new feature film

**HOLLYWOOD** — They sell millions of records, pack stadiums and adorn the covers of a slew of teen magazines and paperback bios. But are New Kids on the Block movie material?

Columbia Pictures thinks so. A studio insider reports that a feature film is in "very active development" for the five singing-dancing heartthrobs who record for Columbia's CBS Records.

Dick Scott, who has managed the group since they formed in 1985, says that studio chief Jon Peters was inspired by the band's "everything-in-motion" after catching the Kids' act last summer in Los Angeles, and that the film "won't be an exploitation film — a teeny-bopper movie. We want it to have some depth and feeling."

After spending time with the Kids on the road during their '89 tour, Michael Schiffer ("Lean on Me") is writing what Scott calls "a fictionalized version — this is not their story, exactly," of the Kids' story. Scott will executive produce; this director is yet to be named.

### Summer's big-budget films started fast, lost momentum

**HOLLYWOOD** — Yeah, but will they make their money back?

It's hard not to ask that question after all the hoopla surrounding the summer's high-profile movies, most of which opened big but quickly lost momentum and are pretty much played out.

In order of release, here's a score card of the grosses, compared to the much talked-about monster budgets:

- "Back to the Future Part III" (Universal), filmed for \$40 million; \$82.1 million gross.
- "Total Recall" (Tri-Star), filmed for \$70 million; \$114 million.
- "Another 48 HRS." (Paramount), filmed for \$45 million; \$78 million.
- "Dick Tracy" (Touchstone), filmed for \$35-40 million; \$102.3 million.
- "Gremlins 2: The New Batch" (Warner Bros.), filmed for \$32 million; \$39.7 million.
- "Raiders of the Lost Ark" (Orion), filmed for \$25 million; \$43.1 million.
- "Days of Thunder" (Paramount), filmed for \$50-55 million; \$76.9 million.
- "Die Hard 2" (Fox), filmed for \$60 million; \$101.1 million.

These, of course, are the North American office grosses, which will make up from 20 percent to 30 percent of the overall gross.

The pizzas were so heavy that she fell down! The blue plastic bag fell out of her hands. "Oh no!" she screamed.

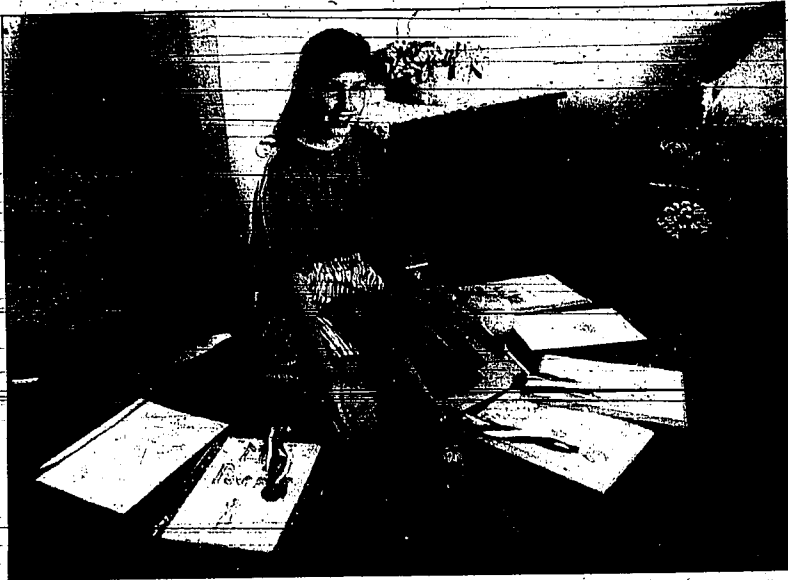

## A budding author

### Stories by Miranda Beames, 11, garner awards

**HAZELTON** — Although she's just entering the sixth grade at Hazelton Grade School, 11-year-old Miranda Beames may soon be a best-selling author.

Miranda's story "The Computer and the Mouse" was chosen this summer as one of seven runners-up from among more than 7,500 entries in the Young Authors of America Contest.

The competition is sponsored by The Trumpet Club, a school book club run by publishing giant Bantam Doubleday Dell. The Trumpet Club plans to issue a book including the winning stories in January. At that time, first-, second- and third-place winners also will be chosen from among the runners-up.

All this came as a big surprise to the Beames family, who live just about a mile east of Hazelton. Miranda's, fifth-grade teacher, Mary Ann Dalrymple, explains that — toward the end of last school year, as they wanted to write a story for the contest.

"I hate to admit this, but I didn't even proofread them," says Dalrymple. She just put the stories in an envelope and sent them off to The Trumpet Club.

In mid-July, a Federal Express package arrived at Miranda's house, addressed to her. She tore it open and found a letter of congratulations from Judy Newman, director of The Trumpet Club.

"For the next two days, we were peeling her off the ceiling," says Tammi Beames, Miranda's mother.

Miranda doesn't have a copy of her prize-winning story, but — in a nutshell — she says "The Computer and the Mouse" is about a girl who works for her school newspaper, takes pictures of classmates, then uses the computer's "mouse" controller to change the photos.

For example, she uses the computer to make a football player's pants fall down around his ankles. The girl then puts the pictures in the paper to embarrass her classmates. Finally, Miranda — serving as the

narrator — comes to the rescue by giving the school paper photographer a taste of her own shenanigans.

Miranda has been writing stories for years, regularly winning awards at the Magic Valley Young Authors conferences. Her favorite is "The Witch and the Plastic Bag," which Miranda wrote when she was in the third grade.

Another recent tale, "The House with a Secret," won a blue ribbon at the 1990 Jerome County Fair. At this year's fair, Miranda also won Best of Show for the Valley Schools division with a huge scrapbook she put together on Alaska.

She apparently gets some of her creativity from her father, Doug, an accountant in Twin Falls. Miranda often asks her dad to tell her stories, and she says she generates some of her ideas from the tales her father makes up.

Miranda is also an avid reader. Her mom says the Beames have read to their five kids for many years. Miranda is a big fan of the Nancy Drew books by Carolyn Keene, the Sweet Valley Twins series by Francine Pascal and The Baby-sitters Club books by Ann M. Martin.

In fact, Dalrymple gives most of the credit for Miranda's success to her love of reading. "She's always reading, always going to the library," the teacher notes. "When her work's done, she always pulls a book out."

## Malad Gorge State Park boasts Indian sites, geological wonders

**BLISS** — If you are planning a trip to Malad Gorge State Park south of Bliss, wear sturdy hiking shoes and be ready for some rewarding exploration.

"It's a place of hidden beauty," Park Manager Kevin Lynott said during a recent tour of the 652-acre area. "It's very unique. There's no place like it."

The park's main attraction is a spectacular gorge with steep black-lava rock walls and clear-blue springwater of the Malad River swirling 250 feet below the rugged cliffs.

In the mid-afternoon heat, two young golden eagles soared in continuous circles just above the rim of the gorge.

"They're just riding the thermals," Lynott explained. "You can see they're kind of immature because they have a lot of white in them."

A pedestrian bridge crosses the gorge above a waterfall where the end of the Big Wood River cascades into a deep pool called the Devil's Washbowl.

Across the footbridge, a path follows the canyon rim for a half-mile, and then circles north through sagebrush and cheat grass for a short walk to the cliffs above Cove Springs Lake. Far below in a dead-end gorge, clear water springs into this sand-bottom pool and flows away in a tumbling stream to join the Malad River.

Lynott pointed out a worn cliff ledge where a river of water on one time dropped from the canyon rim into the lake.

"At some time, for some reason, the water was diverted to that other canyon," he said.

### Astronomical talk planned Saturday

**BLISS** — Take a guided tour of the starry sky beginning at 9:30 p.m. Saturday at the Malad Gorge State Park.

"We'll have some telescopes this time, so it's going to be bigger and better than ever," park interpreter Dave Middleton said.

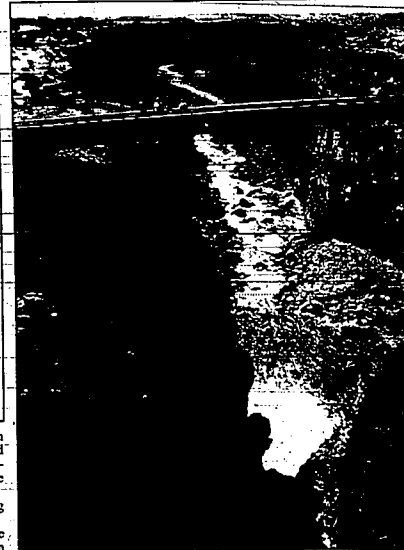
Constellations will be identified, planets will be located and viewed through telescopes and park manager Kevin Lynott will talk about different star types.

The program is free to the public, sponsored by the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation, and will be presented at the picnic area of Malad Gorge State Park, located south of Bliss off Interstate 84.

Off the path, hiking back to the footbridge through brush and outcroppings of ancient lava, Lynott found a wall of rocks he said was built centuries ago by Indians who used walls like this as blinds for game hunting.

"A lot of Indians migrated through here for hunting and fishing purposes," he said.

Nearby, huge rocks from the old river channel are worn smooth and carved into bowls by more than a million years of a churning flow.

# 'Young Guns 2' is lyrical, visually exciting

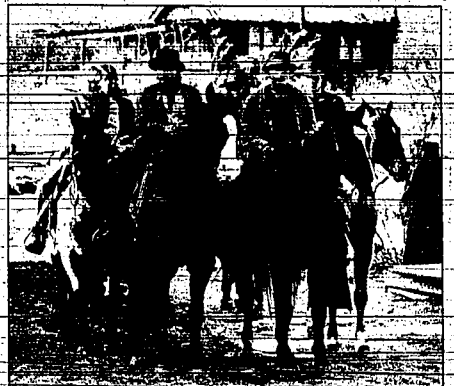

HOLLYWOOD — Lyricism and violence are the contradictory poles of the Western — the serene land, the wildness of the gun-life — and in "Young Guns 2" a brilliant action director has a fine, deep cast keep us swinging in crazy exhilaration between them. It is a sequel that easily surpasses its original, "Young Guns." Full of sound, gunfire, fire and exciting beautiful landscapes — arroyos that explode in dusty death, seedy-sunspattered towns, gnomishy strange outcroppings of rocks and lakes swimming dangerously under wildly steep cliffs — "Young Guns 2" generates more sheer visual excitement than any since Peckinpah and Leone were in their last '70s prime. Dramatically and historically, it's not very deep or rich. There are too

many easy modern parallels. But director Geoff Murphy, the actors and cinematographer Dean ("Mad Max") Semler keep churning it into life. As much as Robert Zemeckis' "Back to the Future III" — a big, sunny, billowy comedy pastiche — "Young Guns 2" is by a man who loves Westerns, but won't entomb them in sentiment or celebration. The mood he is going for, and gets, is the fierce Kurosawa-soaked West of the '70s: the baroque blood-spattered visions of the Vietnam era. But it is also tinged with a John Ford elegiac feel. It is about the revolt of the dispossessed against the rich and smug — another theme embraced by Ford. The movie is another in an endless line of retellings of the complex legend of Billy the Kid — a teen-age killer and cattle rustler. For producer-writer John Fusco and star Emilio Estevez, acting at the top of his form, Billy is a high-spirited kid, a half-psychic rebel with two virtues — a defiance of authority and loyalty to his pals — two of whom (Kiefer Sutherland as Doc, Lou Diamond Phillips as Chavez) survive from the original. Chums Christian Slater and Balthazar Getty provide rhytms for Billy's craziness and youth. Estevez again plays Billy as a giggle-prankster with a hair-trigger temper, full of impish bravado, and it is part of the movie's theme that he is entangled in his own legend. Like a young rock star, high on fame, he keeps going over the edge, dragging his buddies with him. The men arrayed against Billy include William Petersen as ex-friend Pat Garrett, Scott Wilson as Gen. Lew Wallace and James Coburn — who played Garrett in Peckinpah's great 1973 "Pat Garrett and Billy the Kid" — as rancher Chisum. They're steadier, soberer, more cunning, but they keep getting stabbed by Billy's hidden edge: unpredictability. "I sentence you to death; death; death," a judge dolefully informs the teen-age outlaw, who jubilantly fires back,

"You can go to hell, hell, hell!" "Young Guns 2" looks off with Billy in a savage triumph, busting out of Lincoln County flames after murdering the sheriff. The sequel follows his downward spiral into death, his zoom into legend. And Fusco probably cheats the material by leaving an escape hatch for Billy: framing the story, in flashback, from the viewpoint of Ollie "Brush-Back" Roberts (also Estevez), a man who made a dubious 1950 claim that he was the Kid. It's a bit like ending "Oedipus Rex" with an "eye, transplant, or 'Hamlet' with a family reunion. "Young Guns 2" sets up an opposition between frontier and civilization. It comes down hard for the frontier free spirit, Billy and his bunch, and condemns the corrupt, two-faced civilization of the Wallace and Chisums. Murphy demonstrates in "Young Guns 2" the qualities that make Westerns work best: moral fury, explosive energy, grungy lyricism, a sense of space and swoop and ranchy humor. Murphy shows that a fresh, outsiders' eye may be all that's needed to bring a "dead" genre back to life.

I knew she wasn't addressing me as HER mother. Suddenly I realized that she addressed all of us with children as "Mother."

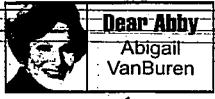

TWIN FALLS—The early days of Idaho art are featured in "One Hundred Years of Idaho Art—1850-1950," a new exhibition opening Wednesday at the Herrett Museum and Art Gallery.

The show is an edited version of one organized by the Boise Art Museum in honor of the Centennial included in the traveling exhibition are about 50 works that represent art in the state from pioneer days, the gold rush period, the Victorian era and settling of the state's towns through World War II and the post-war period.

Many works have never been published and are being viewed for the first time in the exhibition. But Magic Valley residents may recognize the work of Don Benico Bennett, Alf Dunn, Joseph P. McMeekin, Colman Mathews, Olaf Moller, Oliver Parson and Archie Boyd Teeter.

As in contemporary art, Idaho's magnificent natural features are prominent. Several works express the grandeur of Shoshone Falls as it was first viewed by early travelers in the state. Growing communities and historical figures also are represented.

A reception to open the show is set from 7 to 9 p.m. Wednesday at the Herrett, and the public is invited. The exhibition will run through Oct. 4. Museum hours are 9:30 a.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesday, 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Wednesday through Friday and 1 to 4:30 p.m. Saturday.

# New videocassette allows a close look at 8 contemporary artists from Idaho

TWIN FALLS—"What we like about Idaho is it's such a wonderful environment for reflection and thinking about things ... The character of the land and the space and the people make it a place that's conducive to development."

So says Marie-Peter, professor emerita of art at the College of Idaho, in a quote that portrays "The Shape of Idaho Art: A Portrait of Eight Contemporary Artists."

The new videocassette is a Twin Falls production, the brainchild of Mike Green of the Herrett Museum and Art Gallery at the College of Southern Idaho and Charles Lemmon of KMYT.

The pair did a video project on Ketchum sculptor Rod Kagan five years ago. Originally, they hoped to film a video catalogue of the 24 artists featured in the Herrett's four Centennial shows. But limited by available funds, they decided to concentrate on the eight creators profiled on the new tape.

Included are Lavar Steel of Twin Falls, an professor at the College of Southern Idaho, and Ketchum artist Julie Scott.

Steel describes how, in frustration, he nearly dropped his first class in ceramics before discovering he had "mud in his blood." He is also portrayed as a versatile artist, fueled by his varied assignments at CSI, where he has taught art history, sculpture, painting and pottery.

In his interview, Steel says he has been working on a "Threshold" series and will symbolize significant times in life like marriage, job promotions and death.

The viewer also sees past pieces by Steel that reflect the Oakley basin native's encounters with pieces such as the City of Rocks, where Steel played as a boy, and the White Cloud Mountains. These works resemble core samples drilled from Idaho's sky and land.

Other artists portrayed on the video are Howard Huff of Boise, known for his photographic collage landscapes of Idaho's canyons and deserts; John Killmaster of Boise, whose paintings range from abstract to realistic; and Gail Larson, a Pocatello metalsmith and ex-Midwesterner who predicts that Idaho's grandeur will lure many other artists here.

In one of the tape's most interesting segments, ceramicist John Takehara of Boise is shown at work on several pieces of raku pottery. Although he grew-up in Japan, Takehara did not begin experimenting with the Oriental art form until he moved to Idaho.

Also shown are David Airhart, a Boise artist whose works are often forbidding commentary on current events, and George Wray of Moscow, whose medium is neon. One-of-Wray's pieces is the green

"crack" that snakes down the wall at the Herrett Museum.

One minor problem with the 43-minute tape is its soundtrack. Masaki Sasaki did a good job writing an original musical score that captures characteristics of the visual artists' work, but the soundtrack's speed occasionally lags.

Women and northern Idaho artists might also complain they are somewhat underrepresented by the videotape. Overall, however, "The Shape of Idaho Art" is a valuable document of the state's current arts scene, depicting a good variety of creative talent and offering generous samples of each person's work.

Support for the project came from the Idaho Commission on the Arts, the National Endowment for the Arts and the Associated Students of the College of Southern Idaho.

# Progressions of family relationships take center stage in 'Working it Out'

There are three clichés that producers and cast members almost invariably use when talking about their shows: "We're like family,"

"It's like making a little movie every week," and "It's a show about relationships."

In fact, the last description was used so much on the annual fall press tour for television critics that it got to be something of a joke. During one network's press conference for a new show, the room broke into a such a collective guffaw at the mention of the "R" word that one scribe had to explain what was happening to a bewildered cast member: "If it were a show about a guy and his helicopter, they'd tell us it was about relationships."

But nobody groaned when Jane Curtin, Stephen Collins and producer Bill Persky took the stage and said that their new show, NBC's

"Working It Out," which had a special preview last week and will premiere in its regular Saturday-night time slot next week, Sept. 8, was about you know what.

The new series stars Curtin as Sarah Marshall, a divorcee and mother of a 9-year-old daughter, who has no intention of getting involved with someone until she meets David (Collins) in a cooking class. Instead of music, they make beautiful ravioli together. But David, a divorced photographer who has an older daughter he has just sent off to college, pulls back when he discovers that Sarah has a young daughter. He has already raised one family and isn't eager to go through

it again. The result is what Persky calls the progression of a relationship — "the coming close, pulling back, wanting it, being afraid" between two mature people "who have been there and failed."

The characters in this show seem more real than most, and they speak dialogue that is believable. When David meets Sarah's daughter the first time, little Molly (Kyndra Joy Casper) doesn't rattle off some wittier-than-Cosby line obviously concocted by a clever TV scriptwriter. Instead, Molly is shy and somewhat scared to find a strange man standing in her living room and wants to know where Mommy is. Well, she's gone next door to borrow some milk, David explains. Is there something wrong? he asks the pale little girl. "Yeah," says Molly in everyday child's language. "I think I'm going to throw up."

"Working It Out" also uses some invention in telling the story by having David and Sarah describe each other to their best friends. David's bosom buddy is Stan, played by David Garrison (formerly of "Married ... With Children"), while Sarah's confidante and neighbor will be played by Mary Beth Hurt.

If it succeeds, the biggest problem facing "Working It Out" will be how to keep the program fresh. Having two people in a will-they-or-won't-they relationship might work for a few episodes, but what if the show lasts five years? It's a challenge that probably couldn't be in more capable hands than those of Persky.

## Soap opera scene

# He crashed onto soap crashing a party

James Noah is having a good year — he finally made his Broadway debut after a lifetime in the theater as well as playing his first role in a soap opera, "All My Children." His first scene in the soap opera found him (Kurt) disrupting a Fourth of July garden party, threatening to make a mess of the lives of many of the guests.

On the stage every night, James plays a much gentler character, Uncle John, one of the many members of the Joad family making their trek from the Oklahoma dust bowl to the green valleys of California in the Tony Award-winning Best Play "The Grapes of Wrath." At one point in the expert adaptation of the famous John Steinbeck novel, Uncle John has to take the stillborn child of his niece and dispose of it. There's been a torrential rainstorm and he lets the body of the infant float down in the rushing waters so that those who see it can bear witness to the plight of the displaced families. It's a powerful moment in a play that is filled with memorable scenes.

James Noah was in on the development of the play, which started out as a work in progress at the Steppenwolf Theater in Chicago, Ill. The cast worked on scenes with the director-adaptor Frank Galati (winner of two Tonys himself). It was a labor of love, James admits, and a period of creativity which actors seldom have a chance to experience.

James didn't set out to be an actor. It was sort of an accidental thing that happened in high school back in Perry, Iowa. A teacher named Dale Jeffries asked James to be in a one act play. This led to an acting contest held in Iowa City and, with Mr. Jeffries' encouragement, James embarked on what has turned out to be a lifetime love affair with acting. He attended the University of Denver as a theater major and worked as an actor at the Elitch Theater in Denver. While at the theater, CBS-TV scouts saw him and James ended up being screen tested for a series titled "Dr. Hudson's Secret Journal" in 1955. Although he didn't get the part, he worked in other TV shows; but he always came back to the theater.

When he opened on Broadway in "The Grapes of Wrath," a producer from "All My Children" saw him and asked him to play Kurt in the soap. James says he doesn't think his role will be a big one on the daytime serial but he's willing to play the part for as long as "The Grapes of Wrath," holds out on Broadway.

# CBS '60 Minutes' show most watched due to the Middle East crisis coverage

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Middle East crisis helped turn CBS' "60 Minutes" into the most watched show on television — the first time in two years the news magazine has dominated the weekly rankings.

A week earlier, network news broadcasts lured more viewers than primetime-entertainment programs because of concern over the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait.

The latest figures showed primetime shows back on top with an average rating of 27.8, compared with 27 for evening news shows, according to ratings released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co. In the overall network race, NBC was No. 1 for the 14th consecutive week, with an average of 9.7. CBS busted out of its usual last-place standing to become the No. 2 network with a 9.2 average. ABC had 8.9.

In entertainment programs, Fox Broadcasting Co.'s "The Simpsons" and "Married ... With Children" were back in the top 10, landing in the No. 4 and No. 8 spots, respectively. The wisecracking bar crowd on NBC's "Cheers" and the smart-aleck family on ABC's "Roseanne" tied for second place. CBS' "Designing Women" apparently suf-


