# Bush asks for help paying Mideast bill

WASHINGTON — President Bush called on wealthy allies Thursday to share the huge expense of America's military buildup in the Persian Gulf, declaring that a "new world order" could emerge from the Middle East crisis.

"Anyone with a stake in international order has an interest in ensuring that all of us succeed," the president said. Bush, at a news conference dominated by questions on the Gulf situation, was asked if he might hold back on possible military action for fear of harming some of the thousands of hostages held by Iraq's Saddam Hussein. He said he was concerned about them but that their fate could not be allowed "to shape the foreign policy of this country." The president said, "I'm not optimistic" about chances for a diplomatic settlement with Iraq. However, he said the situation in the Persian Gulf now appeared "relatively stable." Bush met with reporters at the White House before returning to Maine for the last five days of a 3½-week vacation clouded — and several times interrupted — by tensions over Iraq's invasion of Kuwait and its threat to the

## Safety overlooked, says military paper

FRANKFURT, West Germany — The military's Stars and Stripes newspaper said Thursday that some U.S. Air Force crews flying troops and supplies to Saudi Arabia suffer from fatigue and are pushing safety to the limit. Also Thursday, Wolfgang Hofmann, a spokesman for U.S. Air Force Europe at Ramstein Air Base, said it may take weeks to determine the cause of the crash of a U.S. Air Force C-5A transport plane Wednesday that killed 13 people and injured four. Officials at the U.S. Army hospital in Landstuhl said Thursday the four injured were not in life-threatening condition. The most seriously injured was Capt. Cynthia Borecky, who suffered broken ankles and burns to her hands and face, said hospital spokesman Staff

# Potato market sets high

TWIN FALLS — Idaho potato growers closed out their marketing year with a 12th straight month of record average prices, and experts believe the new crop market can maintain most of that past strength.

In a report obtained by the Associated Press, the Idaho Agricultural Statistics Service said the average price of potatoes in July at \$12.10 per 100 pounds, \$1.90 higher than the previous record set in July 1981. It also maintained the \$10-plus average hit for the first time in June.

The average, however, was a reflection of the virtually nonexistent supply of potatoes as the marketing period for the 1989 crop closed after a season that saw weather-reduced harvests in other major-producing regions of the nation.

Idaho growers, who had their third-largest harvest ever last year, boosted acreage to a record level this spring, triggering expectations that market prices will take a dive once the 1990 crop is in.

But yet another round of adverse weather conditions, this time plaguing Idaho growers as well, has reduced prospects for the new crop, and industry experts think the market could resist significant price deterioration.

Harvest of early varieties began about two weeks ago in Idaho, but Twin Falls crop consultant Dale Stukenholtz said yields have been poor.

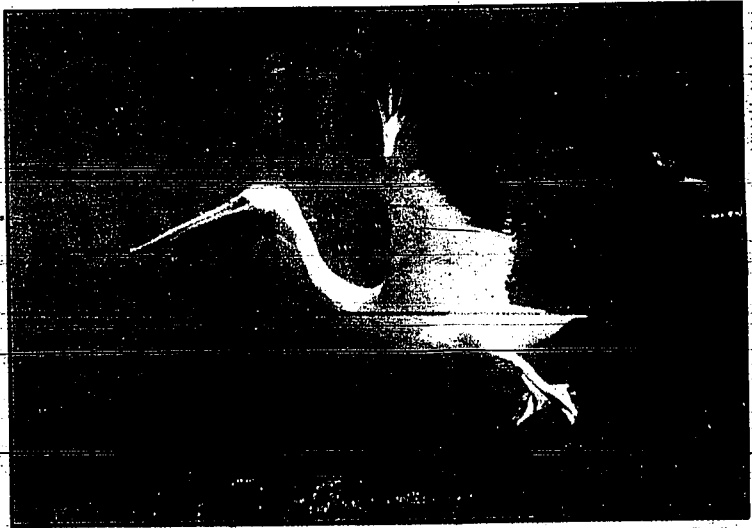
The government's first estimate for the 1990 harvest, both Idaho's and the nation's, is scheduled to be released in November.

Dry bean prices also continued at record levels as the marketing year headed for its close at the end of this month. The July price estimate was put at \$35.20 a hundred pounds, unchanged from the June average and the seventh straight month the market has averaged over \$30.

But that market was expected to reverse

## Studies throw doubt on carcinogen tests

WASHINGTON — Animal cancer tests in which rodents are fed massive doses of chemicals may be useless for calculating the cancer risks in humans because the dose itself may be causing the disease, researchers say.

In articles to be published Friday in the journal Science, two research groups questioned the value of government-supported cancer tests on rats. One suggested the United States should drop its concern about "trivial" traces of synthetic chemicals in the environment.

Bruce N. Ames, a professor of cell biology at the University of California, Berkeley, said cancer develops in rats fed high doses of chemicals because cells in the test animal

## Investigators uncover few PCBs at city site

TWIN FALLS — There's little cause for concern about toxic waste contamination at a former salvage yard owned by the city of Twin Falls, say federal investigators.

"It indicates that there's nothing glaring there," said Carl Kitz, a chemical engineer with the Environmental Protection Agency's regional office in Seattle.

Test results from soil samples taken at the former site of Western Salvage at the corner of 4th Avenue West and Blake Street, on the rim of the Rock Creek Canyon, showed poly-chlorinated biphenyls — a suspected carcinogen — at levels slightly above 1 part per million.

EPA regulations restrict the use of sites where soil or other material contain PCBs in concentrations from 2 to 50 parts per million.

# Report: Workplaces more deadly than highways

WASHINGTON — More Americans die each year from illnesses they get at work than in motor vehicle accidents, according to a report Thursday by a private research organization.

"Occupational disease is one of the great 'unders' of American health care — under-recognized, under-reported, under-compensated, under-studied and under-prevented," said the report by the Chicago-based National Safe Workplace Institute.

The said much of the blame for the tens of thousands of annual deaths from occupa-

tional disease should be attributed to the federal government's failure to fund enforcement agencies and inadequate standards.

The institute estimated that occupational diseases — including cancer and pulmonary, neurological and cardiovascular diseases — killed between 47,377 and 95,479 Americans in 1987. The estimate was based on a study of data collected by the National Center for Health Statistics, a government agency.

The study did not consider on-the-job injuries, which in 1987 killed about 11,100 people and disabled another 1.8 million, ac-

ording to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The report noted that a 1985 study by the congressional Office of Technology Assessments estimated that American workers get 390,000 job-related illnesses every year, and 100,000 die.

The institute used the midpoint of its range, 71,428 deaths, to compare occupational disease deaths to other causes of death. It noted that in 1987, 48,290 Americans died in motor vehicle accidents.

Overall deaths that year totalled 2.1 million.

"Even though it is not recognized as such, occupational disease is clearly one of

the most significant causes of premature death in the U.S. today," said the report.

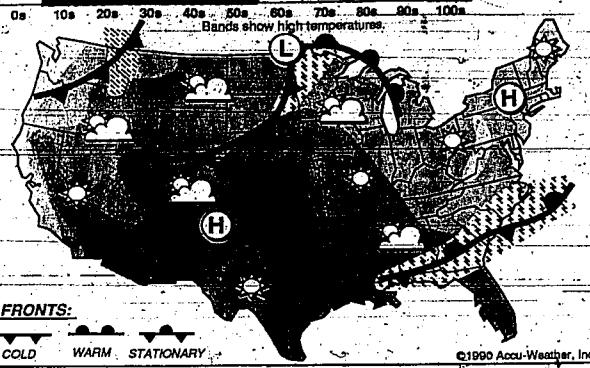
Diseases caught at work are "essentially invisible to the public," the report said. "Because occupational disease has long latency periods and mimics other illnesses, most who suffer from it do not even know they contracted their disease in the workplace."

Dr. Stephen Hessel of the University of Illinois School of Medicine and Dr. Howard Frumkin of Emory University directed the study for the institute, a nonprofit research and education organization financed by foundations and donations.

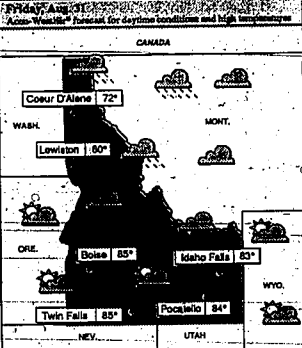

mut testing for carcinogens is pretty much useless for protecting us against low levels of chemicals," said Ames. "When you test chemicals on rats at very high doses, the maximum tolerated doses, half of them will come out positive (develop cancer) but the reason is that it is killing cells."

In another paper in Science, Samuel M. Cohen of the University of Nebraska College of Medicine

said he and his collaborators demonstrated through studies on mice that there can be both a dose and a chemical effect in developing cancer.

### Legislators return S&L contributions

WASHINGTON — Fearful of a public backlash over the savings and loan crisis, some members of Congress are unloading all or part of their campaign contributions from the thrift industry.

The trend, however, has not spread to most of the delegation from Texas, one of the 3 states hardest hit by S&L failures. In an effort to distance themselves from savings and loans, lawmakers from California to Michigan to North Carolina have resumed money or given it to agencies cleaning up the mess.

### L-tryptophan contaminant isolated

ATLANTA — Federal health investigators said Thursday they've isolated a chemical compound containing certain batches of L-tryptophan, the nutritional supplement that sickened perhaps 5,000 Americans and killed 27.

Investigators still don't know how the contaminant got in the product. And scientists have yet to determine whether the compound is itself the cause of the illness or just a "marker" of another substance.

But data "indicate that implicated L-tryptophan-containing products were contaminated."

### Lawyer seeks action in Cruzan case

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. — A lawyer for a comatose woman asked a state court Thursday to allow removal of her life support system, citing new evidence that she wouldn't want to continue living in her condition.

The petition filed with Jasper County Probate Judge Charles Teel said three witnesses have come forth "who had specific discussions with Nancy Cruzan regarding her wishes about life-sustaining medical treatment."

Ms. Cruzan has been in a persistent vegetative state since a January 1983 car crash, and is kept alive at the Missouri Rehabilitation Center.

### Nations agree on Earth warming

SUNDSVALL, Sweden — The United States joined 73 other nations Thursday in agreeing that man's activities are causing the Earth's atmosphere to heat up.

After four days of meetings to consider the most extensive scientific investigation of the Earth's climate, the delegations, unanimously adopted a report which will be a basis for negotiations for future climate treaties.

Many crews get only a 10-to-12-hour layover after arriving in Germany from the United States.

oil fields of Saudi Arabia. The president said he was not bothered by criticism that he was golfing and fishing while American troops went overseas toward a possible war.

Roughly 60,000 U.S. combat troops have moved to battle stations in the gulf in the past three weeks and their number is expected to reach 100,000 soon. The Pentagon estimates the deployment is costing \$1 billion a month.

"It is important that the considerable burden of the effort be shared by those being defended and those who benefit from the free flow of oil," Bush said.

He singled out Japan, West Germany, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates and South Korea as "nations that would be asked for contributions."

Bush said money was needed to help defray military costs and to assist nations suffering from the United

Nations embargo against Iraq. He cited Turkey and Egypt, as well as Jordan which has absorbed tens of thousands of refugees from Iraq, and nations of Eastern Europe.

The president declined to say how much money he wanted to raise. Administration officials, speaking privately, said Bush wanted about \$12 billion in the first year to cover military costs.

"Clearly it will have some budget implications," Bush said.

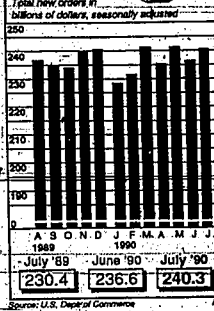

# Factory orders rise 1.6%, but analysts expect drop in future



WASHINGTON (AP) — Orders to factories for manufactured goods grew 1.6 percent in July, the government reported Thursday, but analysts said the zigzag performance so far this year suggested an anemic industrial economy, even before the Persian Gulf crisis.

"It confirms that before the situation in the Middle East, things were sluggish but growing," said economist Thomas Runiewicz of the WEEA Group in Ball's Bluff, Pa.

"Now, with the Middle East problem and energy prices higher... I would expect to see factory orders down in August and especially this fall," he added.

The Commerce Department said orders for both durable and non-durable goods rose \$3.8 billion to a seasonally adjusted \$240.3 billion after declining 1.9 percent in June.

So far this year, orders have been up in three months and down in four, including a 5.5 percent drop in January, the sharpest decline since a 7.0 percent plunge in the recession month of December 1974.

"Basically, orders have been flat because of the month-to-month volatility," contended Sung Won Sohn, chief economist at the Northwest Corp. in Minneapolis. "It's consistent with a slowing, weakening economy which could get into a recession shortly."

The Commerce report said orders for durable goods — items expected to last more than three years — increased 2.8 percent to \$128.2 billion after falling 3.0 percent a month earlier. The increase was a slight revision from the 2.9 percent advance reported last week.

Among the durable categories, transportation orders were up 4.9 percent to \$34.9 billion after a 6.3 percent decline the previous month. Much of the increase was in aircraft orders. Excluding the transportation category, orders would have risen 1.1 percent. In the key category of non-defense capital goods, a barometer of business investment plans, orders gained 10.0 percent to \$39.8 billion. However, most of the increase also went into aircraft which are expected to slow.

Among the durable categories, transportation orders were up 4.9 percent to \$34.9 billion after a 6.3 percent decline the previous month. Much of the increase was in aircraft orders. Excluding the transportation category, orders would have risen 1.1 percent. ## Family, friends mourn Florida coed

POMPANO BEACH, Fla. — Sonja Larson's family and more than 800 of her friends came together Thursday to mourn the irrational savagery of her murder and seek comfort in their faith.

They sang traditional hymns, recited psalms and wept unashamedly in Pompano Beach's First Baptist Church, trying to blunt the emotional impact of Sonja's death at the hands of a still-unknown murderer in Gainesville last week.

Larson, an 18-year-old Deerfield Beach resident and freshman at the University of Florida, was found stabbed to death in her Gainesville apartment Sunday, one of five people murdered in that college town last week, apparently by the same killer.

"Was it just last week that we sat and talked about the future?" her pastor, Ken Smith, asked at the girl's memorial service. "Was it just the other night that a mother and daughter talked of visits-and-holidays? And now it's gone — all gone."

In the church's lobby was a large color photograph of a smiling, 17-year-old Ely High School graduate who enjoyed sports, was active in the church, and hoped to become a teacher.

"She didn't want to die. A killer who will surely face a higher judge than I decided that. But she was ready. She was a follower of Jesus," Smith preached, his voice breaking at times.

"I have a sneaking suspicion she's probably in glory already, taking care of children. It was her plan," he said. "She wanted to be a teacher. She has taught us in her death about the importance of family, about the importance of community, about the importance of comforting one another."

Larson's friends listened as the church's music minister, Al Fennell, sang the familiar Protestant hymn "What a Friend We Have in Jesus": "Have we trials and temptations? Is there trouble anywhere? We should never be discouraged. Take it to the Lord in prayer."

## White House will review owl plans in public

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government's spotted owl task force likely will recommend to President Bush next week that laws be passed so logging can continue in the Northwest without violating the Endangered Species Act, Senate aides say.

A spokesman for Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan Jr. also said Wednesday that the task force recommendations are unlikely to be immediately made public. Rather, he said, they will be submitted to the White House as a "pre-decisional document."

"Many different scenarios could occur based on whether the task force decides to present options or decides to make a final recommendation, and depending on the level of White House involvement. Those are all unanswered questions at this point," spokesman Steve Goldstein said.

"I can just tell you what the secretary told me, that he did not see the task force releasing a document," Goldstein said.

The administration's task force was formed in June after U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Director John Turner declared the northern spotted owl to be an endangered species.

The task force was directed to recommend to President Bush by this Saturday how the owl can be protected while minimizing the impact on the Northwest's timber industry.

Lujan, Agriculture Secretary Clayton Yetterland other members of the task force were scheduled to discuss the matter Thursday, but officials said it was unclear whether they would meet the Saturday deadline.

"I'm hoping we'll see something from the administration next week. They've been very secretive about it," said Loren Ford, a Forest Service spokesman.

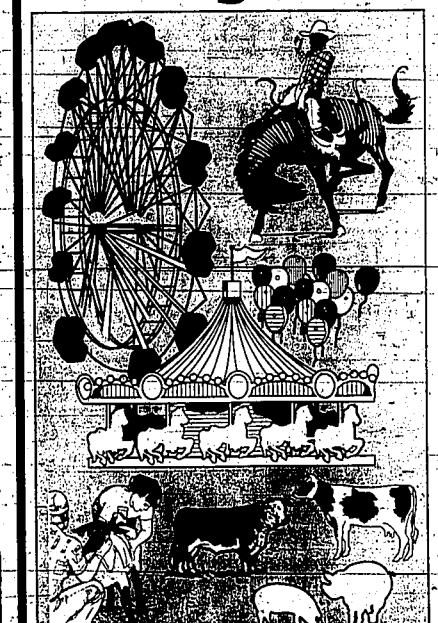

**Residents still waiting for answers at Hanford**

SPOKANE (AP) — Trudy Bishop was raised in Richland and wants to know whether radioactive iodine released during nuclear weapons production at the federal Hanford reservation caused her cancer.

"I just want to know if I'm sick because of this. I think I am, but nobody will tell me if they agree with me," the 46-year-old Bishop told a public hearing here Wednesday.

"How long is it going to take before they say, 'Yes, your cancer was caused by Hanford? How long? I could be dead by the time they figure this out,'" she said.

About 50 people attended the meeting, one of seven being held by the technical steering panel of the Hanford Environmental Dose Reconstruction Project. Hearings were held in Seattle and Yakima earlier this week.

The panel is trying to determine

how much radiation people who lived near Hanford in the 1940s were exposed to.

In July, the panel said about 270,000 people in a 10-county area surrounding the south-central Washington reservation could have been affected by large radiation doses. Estimates of who received how much radiation will be available some time in the future, John Till, chairman of the project, told the meeting.

"I know my answers have been the same: We haven't done that. We haven't done that. We haven't done that," Till said. "But, don't be discouraged."

Till said the panel's data indicates that proximity to the reservation, not as important as where the person's milk came from. Milk produced by cows grazing on grass where the radiation settled was the most common source of Iodine-131, he said.

**Judge orders separate proceedings in AIDS case**

BOISE (AP) — Kerry Stephen Thomas should stand trial five times — once for each count of deliberately exposing a different Ada County woman to the deadly AIDS virus, a judge has ruled.

Fourth District Judge George

Carey, agreement with the defense that Thomas' right to a fair trial is at stake, ordered a seven-count indictment split into five separate prosecutions Wednesday.

In one, involving the only juvenile, Carey allowed an AIDS

exposure count to be tried with two related statutory rape charges.

The judge, offering no explanation, said he wants that case to go to trial first. Jury selection is set to begin Sept. 10.

Gus Cahill, the court-appointed attorney representing Thomas, was pleased with the preliminary legal victory.

"If he had one trial with all of those counts together, his chance of acquittal was considerably less," Cahill said after the hearing. "But there's a down side to this. There may be five times as much media coverage."

Thomas, a 25-year-old Boise shelter-home training coordinator, is accused of exposing the women to the

virus that causes acquired immune deficiency syndrome through sexual intercourse between July 1989 and February 1990.

Authorities contend Thomas knew in each instance that he previously had tested positive for human immunodeficiency virus, or HIV, a precursor to AIDS.

The statutory rape allegedly occurred in July and November 1988, when the victim was 16 and 17.

During Wednesday's hearing, Ada County Deputy Prosecutor Jay Rosenthal said the defense failed to show how the potential for prejudice outweighed "judicial economy," meaning the higher price of multiple trials.

**Judge says man should be horsewhipped**

EVANSTON, Wyo. (AP) — Only today's "enlightened society" stopped a judge from ordering a man horsewhipped for cashing the checks of a rehabilitation center clients and keeping the money.

Third District Judge John Troughton suggested the whipping after accepting Jim Rae's guilty plea to a larceny charge.

"You ought to be horsewhipped,"

that would be a better punishment," the judge told Rae, 33, who faces a probationary term under a plea agreement he reached with the prosecutor. "But we're an enlightened society."

Rae, of Evanston, was charged with keeping \$55,626 that he obtained by cashing checks from Uinta County Rehabilitation Center clients.

**Boyd apologizes to opponent over incident**

MOSCOW (AP) — Idaho House Speaker Tom Boyd has apologized to Democratic challenger Betty Benson for what he says were his rude and inappropriate comments at a recent public meeting in Lewiston.

According to a copyrighted story in Wednesday's editions of The Idahoan in Moscow, the Genesee Republican also has apologized to Troy Mayor Marie Vogel for an alleged verbal altercation last week at a regional meeting of the Idaho Association of Cities in Lewiston.

According to various accounts, Boyd was angry that Benson is challenging him for one of Latah County's two seats in the Idaho

House and became loud and belligerent in a conversation with her while drinking.

He allegedly made suggestive remarks to Benson and told her, "I'm going to beat your ass, sweetheart." He also insisted she and Vogel join him at a local bar after the meeting. They declined.

When Vogel approached, she said Boyd lashed out at her.

"When I walked up, he said, 'Marie, I'm going to beat your ass.' That's how he greeted me," said Vogel, who is a Democrat supporting Benson's candidacy. "That's not the way a public official should deal with people in a public meeting."

**Craig discounts poll report**

LEWISTON (AP) — U.S. Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, contends his Democratic opponent for the U.S. Senate, Ron Twilegar of Boise, has spruced up discouraging poll results to manipulate political action committees.

"They divided out only the segment that served them best and then defined that and refined it to get as much of a positive reaction as they could," Craig said Wednesday during a campaign swing through Lewiston.

The poll, released by Twilegar Tuesday, showed him running virtually even with the five-term congressman among people familiar

with both candidates. The survey found about 45 percent of a sample of 600 knew of both men. Within that group, Twilegar was ahead 47 to 44 percent. The margin of error was 5 percent, according to the Democrat's campaign.

Twilegar campaign officials contend that shows their candidate can pull ahead if he can increase his visibility with voters.

However, the poll put Craig ahead 53 to 41 percent for the entire group, said Twilegar campaign manager Richard Callow. Among the group familiar with Craig only, the margin was much more lopsided, he said.

**Project could generate \$3 million in taxes**

BOISE (AP) — A report prepared for sponsors of the Banks Pumped Storage Project on the North Fork of the Payette River says the \$325 million hydroelectric generating plant would contribute more than \$3 million per year in property taxes for 20 years.

Consultants for Gem Irrigation District presented the proposed project to Valley and Boise county commissioners this week.

Sponsors are proposing a 500-megawatt project on the North Fork of

the Payette between Smiths Ferry and Banks, with a small reservoir located in High Valley.

A pumped storage project pumps water up into a reservoir during periods of low electrical demand, then uses water running out of the reservoir to generate electricity during demand.

Sponsors said the project was designed to produce clean, low-cost energy to meet future needs without damaging the existing kayaking opportunities on the river.

**Conservancy needs more money to buy land**

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The Nature Conservancy needs \$410,000 by October to complete acquisition of 325 acres along the scenic South Fork of the Snake River, officials for the non-profit conservation group say.

The property lies within the 25-mile undeveloped stretch of the South Fork Canyon about 50 miles east of Idaho Falls. It includes an area rated as the most important cottonwood ecosystem in Idaho by state and federal environmental authorities.

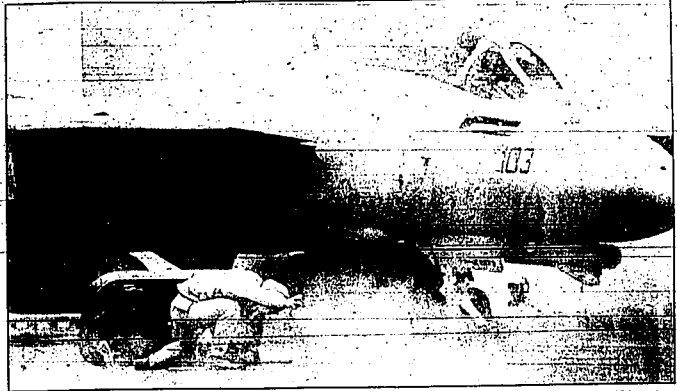

# Iraq still holds women, children; U.N. leader arrives in Mideast

 Freedom proved elusive Thursday for thousands of foreign women and children promised safe passage out of Iraq, and diplomacy took center stage as the U.N. secretary-general arrived in Jordan to try to mediate the Persian Gulf crisis.  
 The crisis was entering its fifth week Friday, and the world seemed wary of false hopes for a peaceful settlement. The U.N. chief, Javier Perez de Cuellar, expressed optimism — but also warned that the situation in the region was "explosive."  
 The United States, meanwhile, was looking for help in bearing the financial burden of its 31 billion-a-month military buildup in the Persian Gulf. President Bush said he was soliciting funds from several

countries to help defray the cost of the deployment.  
 In Baghdad, more than 200 foreign women and children gathered at a hotel Thursday, hoping to leave the country. Some had been held by Iraqis at military and other installations, serving as "human shields" against attack.  
 One British woman, Karen Taylor, said she was held with other Britons at a site 300 miles from Baghdad. "We were treated well but some children were sick," she said.  
 Iraq had said foreign women and children would be allowed to leave beginning Wednesday. But State Department spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler said no exit permits had been issued to Americans as of Thursday.  
 Ms. Tutwiler said Iraqi authorities were insisting on a variety of arcane

paperwork, including a letter requesting permission to go, translated into Arabic and affixed with a stamp from authorities certifying that "all local taxes had been paid."  
 "This emotional roller coaster is inhumane and disgraceful," the spokeswoman said.  
 The State Department has said about one-third of the 3,000 Americans who have been barred from leaving Iraq and Kuwait are women or children age 18 and under. The Americans are among about 21,000 Westerners trapped since Iraq took over Kuwait on Aug. 2.  
 Iraq's ambassador to the United States denied reports from diplomats in Baghdad that Iraq had demanded that any planes arriving to pick up hostages bring in food and medicine. Iraq's supplies have been all but cut off by the global embargo.

# Iraq threatens to strike Israel if war comes

 JERUSALEM — An Iraqi military leader vowed Thursday to strike Israel with "crushing blows" of bombs and missiles if war erupts in the Middle East. Israel responded by saying that it was prepared, although it needs more U.S. military aid.  
 The Iraqi News Agency quoted an unidentified Iraqi air force commander as saying that both Israel and Saudi Arabia would be punished by air strikes if the Persian Gulf conflict

flares into battle between the Iraq and the United States.  
 "We don't say that our air or missile force can reach the White House," the commander reportedly said. "If war breaks out ... we will direct crushing blows to the dens of the Israelis who have, and are still playing, a malicious role in pushing matters to war."  
 The statement was the latest in a series of Iraqi threats against Israel. American and Israeli officials have said that Iraq wants to draw Israel

into the conflict in an attempt to reunite the Arab world against the Jewish state.  
 Israeli leaders have tried to maintain a low profile during the crisis so they do not upset the delicate, anti-Iraqi military alliance between the United States and other Arab nations — still in a technical state of war with Israel.  
 Israeli officials also have been warning that if the crisis is resolved with Iraq, President Saddam Hussein still in power he will grow more dangerous to world peace.  
 On Thursday, a spokesman for Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir repeated in the usual way to the Iraqi threats.  
 "Israel has repeatedly proven in the past that it knows how to defend itself, and if attacked, we will know how to defend ourselves again," said spokesman Avi Pazner. "Any ag-

gressor will live to regret his action."  
 Meanwhile, Israel has been watching as Washington not only develops closer relationships with moderate Arab nations but also approves massive new arms sales to them.  
 President Bush this week endorsed the immediate sale to Saudi Arabia of \$2.2 billion worth of high-technology, F-15 warplanes, missiles, tanks and anti-tank shells.  
 The Pentagon said that 24 F-15s will be sold to Saudi Arabia immediately. The Saudis also will receive 150 M-60A3 tanks and 50 Stinger anti-aircraft missile launchers with 200 missiles.  
 Saudi Arabia has 58 F-15s now. Even as the sale was announced, Israeli officials were pressing Washington for an increase in military aid, now at an annual rate of \$1.8 billion.

# Saudis relax dress code for U.S. women

 HAMPTON, Va. — Restrictive dress rules for military women have been relaxed on at least one of the U.S. military compounds in Saudi Arabia, according to the husband of an Air Force sergeant sent to the region from Langley Air Force Base.

That means the women can now wear shorts in their off-duty hours within their living area and may wear bathing suits when swimming in a portable pool at the compound.

# Jordanian ambassador criticizes U.S. presence

WASHINGTON (AP) — Jordan's ambassador to the United States said Thursday that the U.S. military presence in the Middle East will radicalize the region and "endanger the existing Arab political order."  
 "Do not delude yourselves that most Arabs welcome the presence of American troops in the area," Ambassador Hussein Hammami said at the National Press Club.  
 Hammami also said a settlement to the crisis caused by Iraq's invasion of Kuwait must be linked to the Palestinian problem and the Arab conflict with Israel.  
 Hammami said Jordan was not siding with Iraq.

### Private sector needs to gear up to meet housing demand

In five years, the central Magic Valley has gone from flat-out bust to roaring boom, and one of the consequences is the current housing crunch.

There's no room at inns from Murtaugh to Bliss, and the situation is getting worse, according to a study just released by the Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce and the Region IV Development Association Inc.

Except for upscale, single-family housing, which has been expanding steadily, we're living in essentially the same housing stock that existed in 1980.

The last large-scale expansion of local housing market was in the 1970s, and local builders and developers were badly burned when the market went slack in the mid-1980s.

Once burned, they're twice as shy about making another investment now. And rents in Twin Falls, which averaged only \$265 in a January survey, are not much of an incentive.

So the housing bind gets tighter.

The College of Southern Idaho says the lack of affordable rental units is already putting a crimp on growth in the number of students at the school, and Green Giant in Buhl had to scramble to find places to put its workers for this year's corn pack.

If current trends continue, it's only a matter of time before the housing crunch puts the brakes on economic growth in

the Magic Valley.

The stated purpose of the chamber and Region IV study was to create more awareness of the problem; but we need more concrete steps.

Direct government intervention, such as rezoning to force developers to build low-cost housing, isn't going to solve the problem.

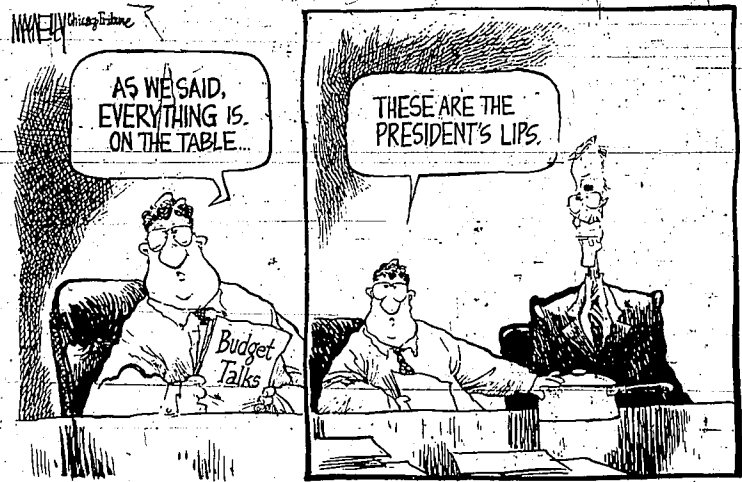
But the chamber and the development agency need to take the next step and develop a comprehensive strategy for encouraging private-sector investment in housing.

Such a strategy should focus on getting the bankers, the real estate sellers, the contractors and the developers working in the same direction, whether it's construction of more new single-family housing, more rental housing or renovating the existing stock of housing.

It should reinforce the conclusions of most economic forecasts: Growth, at a greater or lesser rate, is here to stay in the central Magic Valley.

The kind of contraction in the housing market that accompanied the farm recession of the mid-1980s isn't likely to happen here again anytime soon.

Such a strategy would be a concrete step toward solving a problem that can't wait. The Magic Valley's housing crunch is rapidly evolving from an inconvenience into a crisis.



## Misguided ideologies hurt America

Wars make strange bedfellows. The better-red-than-dead crowd, unsure of how to react to an Iraqi Nazi, and bedazzled by the speed with which commander-in-chief Bush drew his sword, has decided a war fought for Exxon, Texaco and Chevron is immoral. The better-dead-than-red crowd, too, has its problems with troops on Mideast quicksand. Still smarting from defeat in Vietnam, it doubts the ability of Americans — much less the Russians, French and Chinese — to stay the course. More, after a half century fixated on the Soviet menace, the likes of Pat Buchanan seem unable to recognize that evil comes in other flavors.

The old-school State Department alumni quote Winston Churchill that it is "better to jaw, jaw than war, war." Not coincidentally, jaw, jaw is how Messrs. Henry Kissinger and Zbigniew Brzezinski earn their keep.

Each for his own reasons, misses the point: Saddam Hussein has the desire and the means to use nuclear weapons capable of striking Harvard, client weapons that can be carried in broad daylight across virtually open U.S. borders, and biological weapons with which to turn the world into a Stephen King nightmare. His resume says he will use all these things. Kill him first.

But let us assume the demagoguing over oil is heartfelt.

The oil problem has nothing to do with the crude sisters. Big oil is only the conduit through which oil flows to homes, cars, farms and factories. If private big oil did not exist, public big oil, as it does elsewhere, would.

The public biggie ripped off by instant rises in pump prices, but a nationalized oil company performing to post office standards would have no oil at all price.

The high price of gasoline, and of heating oil this winter, has nothing to do with big oil. It has to do with the refusal of American people to face reality and demand their

politicians to do what has to be done to cut reliance on imported energy.

Again, strange bedfellows. The environmental left is scarcely silly the oil war will be used to attack its increasingly successful efforts to shut down industrial civilization.

What if Americans decide the sight of oil derricks off American coasts is less unseemly than American blood soaking the sands of Arabia?

What if they decide scrubbing oil off beaches is cheaper than maintaining an American fleet in the Persian Gulf?

What if Americans decide the loss of life from U.S. nuclear accidents — now zero — is more acceptable than the toll of storming Baghdad? It could be the end of the green movement, and the reaffirmation of the modern world.

What if Americans decide telling Detroit to build cars that get 40 miles per gallon or go out of business beats building tanks suitable for fighting in 130-degree deserts?

What if Americans decide mass transit beats mass graves?

What if Americans decide oil markets are military markets, and government has a role? Americans might decide how government spends money is as important as how much it spends.

A sensible American energy policy would bring back nuclear, allow offshore drilling, open new areas in the Alaskan wilderness to exploration, provide incentives for drilling in the continental U.S., order Detroit to build fuel-efficient cars, invest in renewable energy sources, and impose an oil import fee and gasoline tax. The latter would have



Saddam Hussein: the heavy effect of cutting the federal budget deficit and an oil-swollen trade deficit. (Does anyone really think the Saudis, and their oil-exporting allies, are turning the oil spigots open wide just to stay thanks for keeping the world safe from Herr Saddam?)

Some oil exporters understand that high prices, in the short run, cut consumption by forcing the world into recession, and, in the long run, by forcing the world to do those very things that will make it less dependent on their imported oil. Both are bad for business.)

Never have world events gone so sharply illustrated how misguided ideologies championed by activist fringe subvert that common sense which has sustained the republic since its inception.

If the gathering storm in the Saudi desert cannot rout mainstream America to take back its country, nothing will.

**Meat plants will test new government guidelines**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Plants that process red meat will be the first to test government guidelines aimed at reducing repetitive motion trauma in the workplace, Labor Secretary Elizabeth Dole said Thursday.

Repetitive motion trauma, a sometimes crippling disorder of the musculoskeletal and nervous system, accounts for nearly half of all occupational disorders in the United States.

"The message in the guidelines is simple: Repetitive motion illnesses can be minimized through proper workplace engineering and job design and by effective employee training and education," Mrs. Dole said.

The initial program includes voluntary guidelines and a special inspection program.

The guidelines were drawn up with the cooperation of the United Food and Commercial Workers, AFL-CIO, the American Meat Institute and the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health.

The institute's membership accounts for about 95 percent of the red meat industry, which has a rate of repetitive motion disorder 10 times the general U.S. rate.

Repetitive motion trauma results from repeated motion or awkward positioning of the hand, arm, back or leg for extended periods. Disorders include lower back injuries, tendon disorders and carpal tunnel syndrome, a nerve disorder of the hand and wrist.

WASHINGTON — The U.S. National Tick Collection — enough pickled critters to fill a couple of pint jars — pulled out of Washington this month for a new home at Georgia Southern University in Statesboro, Ga.

"It is by far the largest tick collection in the world," said the collection's curator, James E. Keirans.

Keirans admits that "when most people find out what I do, their first reaction is 'Yuk.'" But the outbreak of Lyme disease cases — 7,402 reported in 1989 — is creating new appreciation for tick research.

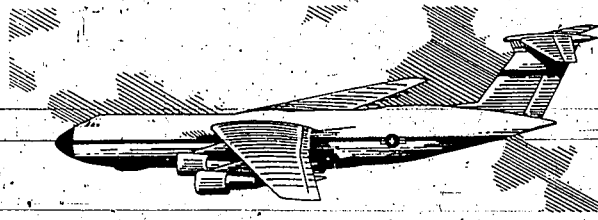

Also at the police department booth, stickers, pamphlets and other literature about seat belt safety and drug abuse prevention will be handed out.

### BLM opens new automated weather station in Kimberly

**KIMBERLY** - The U.S. Bureau of Reclamation has teamed with private industry and other government agencies to install and operate a new automated AgriMet weather station at the U.S. Agriculture Department's Soil and Water research center.

The bureau funded the installation while the University of Idaho, the National Weather Service, and Idaho Power Co. have signed a pilot three-year agreement to jointly pay for operating expenses with the research center.

AgriMet is operated by satellite telemetry and "piggy-backed" onto the bureau's regional Hydromet system, the network of data stations that report on the Columbia-River and Snake River reservoir and hydropower system.

The Magic Valley Mall will be open Monday 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., the Blue Lakes Monday residents pick-up until Tuesday.

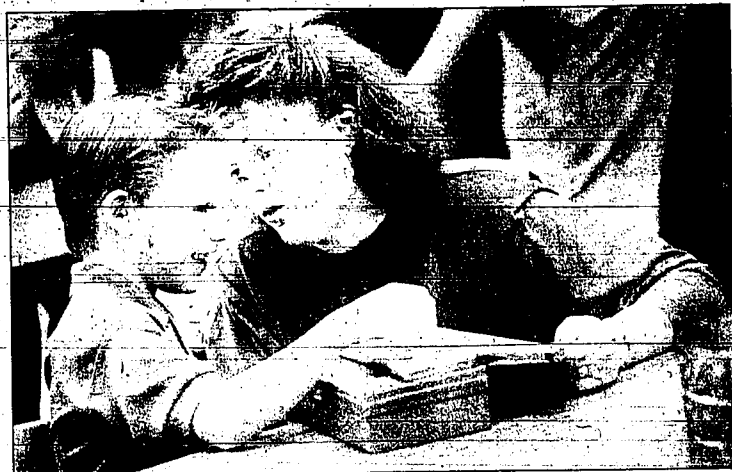

## Magic Valley school enrollments up

**TWIN FALLS** - As students and teachers headed back to class this week, several Magic Valley school administrators expressed concern about overcrowding as enrollments increased.

"It's quite a juggling act to do what's best for the kids," said Kelly Murphy, principal of Castleford Elementary School. "It's put a strain on our special needs kids."

Castleford was one of several area school districts that reported unexpected enrollment gains. Most district officials said they anticipated increases in student populations, but not as much as they received.

Most Magic Valley school districts began classes this week. The Twin Falls school year started Thursday.

Murphy was one of several school administrators who expressed concern about providing adequate space to teach all his school's new students. The kindergarten through grade 12 enrollment grew by 37 students to 320, a 13 percent increase, he said.

Tiny Three Creek Joint School District, where 11 students attended school from kindergarten through grade 12 last year, saw an increase of three students to 14 this year.

Twin Falls, Gooding and Bliss were the only three districts contacted by *The Times-News* Thursday that so far have seen decreases in student numbers. En-

rollment dropped in Twin Falls by about 137 students to 6,680, in Gooding by nine students to 1,055 and in Bliss by three students to 180.

But the figures were preliminary. Late registration could mean that enrollments in the three districts will rise above last year's figures. And the Twin Falls total included last year's O'Leary Junior High School enrollment figures because that school had not yet reported its first-day head count Thursday.

Terrell Donich, Twin Falls superintendent, has previously said enrollment should increase throughout the district. Enrollments at some other school districts were as follows:

## Foresters plan burn in Sawtooth Forest

**TWIN FALLS** - The U.S. Forest Service, which has spent the greater part of the summer fighting forest and range fires, wants to start one next month.

The agency wants to burn 375 acres of rangeland in the Sawtooth National Recreation Area in mid to late September.

Officials of the SNRA, which is administered by the Forest Service, are conducting an environmental assessment of the proposed burn in the area of Little Boulder and Wikipup creeks, tributaries of the east fork of the Salmon River.

The burn would be in the Lower East Fork Grazing Allotment and would be designed to improve rangeland in the

area by reducing sagebrush, increasing productivity of grasses and other small plants and rejuvenating old, decadent aspen stands, said Seth Phalen, range superintendent for the SNRA.

The burn would be ignited by helicopter in patches of 15 to 80 acres in open stands of sagebrush with pockets of aspen.

If needed, the burned area would be reseeded with native species of plants to retain the native character of the land, which is within an area proposed as wilderness.

But Phalen expects the area to reseed naturally and said it should be green by next spring.

The rejuvenated area is expected to help lure cattle away from the heavily grazed Frog Lake area by improving the benches and slopes where cows seldom graze near other water sources, Phalen said.

But Twin Falls County Fair Secretary-Manager Cindy Denney said Osmond still plans to visit. Filer next Tuesday for the Twin Falls County Fair.

"She had a severe stomach flu today, the kind that just dehydrates you and saps your strength," Karl Engemann, Osmond's manager, said Wednesday night from his office in Provo, Utah. "She didn't want to disappoint the people at the fair who came to see her and she went on to do her show. It got the better of her and she collapsed."

The 30-year-old country musician was taken from the Stark County Fair's main grandstand to a hospital emergency room Wednesday night. She was treated with intravenous fluids and released early Thursday, Engemann said.

Osmond arrived on stage about 45 minutes late and had been performing for about 45 minutes when she collapsed during a rendition of her new single, "Hurricane."

## Gulf crisis unlike Vietnam, former Army official says

**TWIN FALLS** - The United States' current military involvement in the Middle East is nothing like Vietnam, a former Secretary of the Army said Thursday.

Howard "Bo" Callaway, who served as Secretary of the Army in the early 1970s, said it would be difficult to draw comparisons between the Vietnam War and President Bush's recent decision to send troops to the Persian Gulf.

"First of all, you don't need Agent Orange. Over there you can see forever," Callaway told a group of Republicans gathered for a fund-raising breakfast.

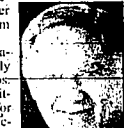
Second, Callaway said Americans troops are better trained. "And nobody is there who doesn't want to be there - even the re-

Callaway, a former man, served as Secretary of the Army under President Ford from 1973 to 1975.

But he wasn't in Dallas Thursday to rally support for the troops. He was instead soliciting support for GOPAC, a political action committee with Callaway formed with U.S. House of Representatives Minority Leader Newt Gingrich in 1986 for the purpose of grooming future GOP leaders.

"Idaho, of course, is a state we Republicans like to feel is our state," Callaway said. "We want to make sure we keep control of the state Senate."

A small group of Republican leaders paid \$25 each to attend the breakfast event. So far, Callaway said, GOPAC hasn't committed a penny - or any Magic Valley state Sen.

But during his speech, Callaway singled out former Rep. Russell Newcomb as a candidate worthy of support.

Newcomb, a Twin Falls surgeon, is battling Rep. Gary Robbins for Magic Valley's state Senate floor seat.

"I'd like to say Russ, you're special to us," Callaway said. "How can someone leave this grand party to join what Margaret Thatcher calls the looney left?" he added, referring to Robbins' switch to the Democratic Party.

Callaway also had encouraging words for Sen. McDevitt, who is challenging incumbent Democrat Richard Stallings for his

2nd Congressional District seat.

Although he has never met McDevitt, Callaway said he has talked with the 27-year-old candidate several times on the telephone.

"He's young, he's made a few mistakes and he'll make some more," Callaway said.

Even so, Callaway reminded Republican leaders that "Stallings is the typical person we fight all the time."

At a Rotary meeting, Stallings can sound like he shares our values, Callaway said. "But he'll vote against every one of them."

Callaway also objected to Stallings' suggestions last week that McDevitt is "immature" and jobless.

"I don't think the people of Idaho think he hasn't held a real job," Callaway said, citing McDevitt's military record and his involvement with the Panama invasion.

# Idaho Falls man escapes Iraq with false Indian documents

**IDAHO FALLS (AP)** — A naturalized American from India fooled Iraqi officials with false documents to make a daring escape from that country to end weeks of hiding, his family in Idaho Falls says.

Jagan Sharma, 57, flew to Amman, Jordan, early Thursday, ending his entrapment in the Middle East that began Aug. 1 when Iraqi tanks stormed into Kuwait.

"He said as soon as he was across the Iraqi border, he was very happy," Sharma's wife Itema said after receiving a phone call from her husband. "He said it was extremely dangerous. It doesn't matter whether you are green, black or yellow. If you have a U.S. passport, Saddam Hussein wants you."

Sharma began his escape when a British doctor of Indian descent warned him to leave his seaside apartment and go into hiding, Mrs. Sharma said. He hid in the Kuwait City suburb of Salmiya with Indian

friends, who took him to the Indian Embassy where special documents were prepared.

Sharma, who came to the United States in 1967 and renounced his Indian citizenship to be a U.S. citizen in 1980, was able to use his complex and Asian accent to blend into the Indian community in both Kuwait and Iraq, his wife said.

Traveling with other Asians to Baghdad, she said her husband hid his U.S. passport and other documents that identified him as a citizen, telling Iraqi customs officials that he had been nervous in the crisis and lost them. He then produced the Indian travel document, which satisfied the guards, and he was allowed to leave.

Sharma, an agricultural scientist, was in Kuwait researching methods of growing crops in the salty, dry soil. He worked at the Kuwait Institute of Scientific Research.

His wife left Kuwait in May to

avoid the summer heat and sandstorms.

The situation in Kuwait has gone from bad to worse, Sharma told his wife. Soldiers wait at banks and other places to snare Americans and other foreign nationals.

"He said they have stolen everything from Kuwait," she said. "It's a ghost town. They even stole his cigars from the institute. They behaved like they have never seen things so nice."

Once in Jordan, Sharma was loaned \$400 by the U.S. Embassy staff, which helped him find a place to stay, she said.

"Amman is already crowded and confused," she said. "The only place that is organized is the U.S. Embassy."

Mrs. Sharma was arranging for her husband's transportation to Idaho Falls, where the couple's son Vivok is an engineer with EG&G Idaho.

"This is home now," she said.

## Greenpeace video project presses fight against driftnets

**SEATTLE (AP)** — At least 30 species of dolphins, birds and fish were found dead and dying in driftnets during a Greenpeace Foundation protest voyage, leaders of the mission said Thursday.

In a news conference following the return of the Rainbow Warrior, expedition leader Ben Deeble said incidental catches exceeding 30 percent were recorded in driftnets deployed to catch tuna and squid.

Shark albat accounted for 30 percent of the catch in one net, Deeble said.

"Generally, they cut the fins off the sharks and throw the rest away," said Roger Grace of Auckland, New Zealand, an underwater photographer on the mission.

Pomfret, a small but tasty fish, "is thrown away by the thousands," Grace said.

Video tapes and photographs of marine life caught in the plastic monofilament mesh and a three-mile section of net that was seized in the northern Pacific Ocean will be used in the campaign for tougher U.S. and United Nations sanctions against driftnet fishing.

"I think the video is the most complete ever shot of the (driftnet) fleet," he said.

Deeble, a San Diego native who now lives in Seattle, said plans were being made to unfurl the seized net in the downtown area of a U.S. city, a process he said would require about 200 people.

"I think that's one reason we've had so much trouble getting these driftnets banned," he said. "People can't comprehend the size of these things."

The net eventually will be returned to Japan, he said.

The Rainbow Warrior, a 181-foot converted trawler, departed July 19 from Hawaii with 32 people on a six-week mission covering more than 6,000 miles to monitor and protest driftnet fishing for tuna and squid in the North Pacific.

The nets hang like a curtain more than 30 feet below the surface and stretch as far as 35 miles. Critics say they indiscriminately trap and kill fish, thousands of marine mammals and 800,000 birds a year.

"If there's not an end to the driftnets, there will be an end to the fisheries," said Rainbow Warrior skipper Peter Wilcox of Norwalk, Conn.

**MOSCOW (AP)** — Student leaders at the University of Idaho are questioning a private company's plan to produce and market a video yearbook on the Moscow campus.

According to a story in Wednesday's editions of The Idahoian in Moscow, University of Idaho officials have consulted their attorneys about the legal rights of the California-based company to proceed with

the project.

Lawson attorney John Stegner, who represents the school, has indicated in a legal brief that Envision Co. of Woodland Hills, Calif., needs to secure university permission.

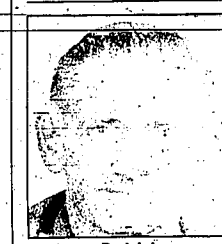
Envision, which also is producing a video year-in-review for sale to students at Washington State University, has contracted with New Review Publishing, which publishes

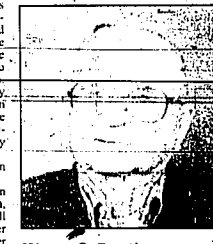

with about 100 students to 2,800. To handle a steady stream of new students, the district placed six temporary classrooms at Halley Elementary School and built eight new classrooms on a Wood River High School site.

Cassia County Joint District: Up 123 students to 5,233. The increase was slightly more than anticipated, said Superintendent Norman Hurst. He said there were more migrant students this year than in the past.

Castleford Joint School District: Up 37 students to 320. Murphey said the area has seen an increase in migrant families with school-age children.

Filer School District: Up 27 students to 1,129.

Kimberly District: Up 35 students to 100. The district is considering holding a \$2.45 million bond election in October or November for a new middle school because of overcrowding. Superintendent Richard Bauscher said the district had to turn away 27 children from other school districts who had requested to attend classes in Kimberly.

**State education board approves 5-year plan for higher education**

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Board of Education has approved a revised plan for higher education in the state, even though one board member says a new section on research is unnecessary.

The board in June approved a plan to guide higher education through 1995, but helped final approval for a revision on the section on research.

The new version adopted Thursday recommends strategies to promote research at the four schools of higher education.

The strategies "are designed to support institution-based advances in research as well as to further develop and expand the board's statewide research enhancement program," the section said.

Board member J. Ray Cox, Coeur d'Alene, said the statements of the new section are covered in the role and mission statements adopted by the board for each school.

In response to a question from Cox, Elizabeth Zinser, University of Idaho president, has suggested bringing up possible revisions in the role and mission statements as a topic to be discussed Sept. 11 at a meeting of the Presidents' Council.

Cox said he viewed the role and mission statements as "our constitution. I see our five-year plan as legislation we deal with every five years. I don't see our roles and missions as something we should change every five years."

"I think that would constitute major changes in what our educational system is all about," Cox said.

Barton said he considered it un-

likely the Presidents' Council would approve discussion of possible revisions of the role and mission statements.

"Research is heavily addressed in the role and mission statements," Cox said.

He voted against adopting the revised five-year plan, but there was no other opposition.

The research strategy includes seeking additional funding from the Legislature and boosting statewide research by establishing several research centers.

The policy also suggests providing information to the Legislature and to the public about the accomplishments of Idaho researchers and the benefits of such research and setting up a system to identify the financial benefits to the state from research investment.

**Court order causes inmates' release**

CALDWELL (AP) — A federal court order capping the inmate population at the Canyon County Jail has forced Sheriff Gary Putman to authorize the release of seven inmates before their misdemeanor sentences were completed.

That action, coupled with the return of 13 other inmates to the state prison system, has reduced the inmate population to the 101 maximum this week.

But Putman has been directed by 4th District Judge Jim Doolittle to set up a policy for release of other jail inmates if the cap is again breached or room is needed for more dangerous inmates.

Earlier this month, U.S. District Judge Marion Callister slapped the cap on the jail population and ordered increased staffing and other improvements in response to an 1984 inmate lawsuit protesting overcrowded conditions.

Jail commander Bob Bigelow said Wednesday that the seven inmates released this week had served a majority of their misdemeanor sentences and behaved well while in jail.

Putman was working with the county's pretrial release officer on a policy for releasing inmates charged with misdemeanors including driving without privileges, petty theft, first-time drunken driving and non-violent felonies like grand theft.

All releases must be approved by a judge, and accused felons and persons charged with drunken driving must check in with the pretrial release officer Dick Comstock daily.

Comstock said inmates charged with violent or drug crimes or who have a long criminal history will not be released.

Putman said other options being

considered to control the inmate count included:

— Allowing inmates charged with felonies to post bond before their first court appearance.

— Making inmates wear electronic bracelets so authorities can keep tabs on them while they serve time in their own homes.

— Renting space in armories and other facilities to house persons sentenced to serve only a few days in jail.

But the sheriff was confident the county will meet Callister's population and building maintenance orders within the 90-day deadline.

"We will do everything the judge orders us to do because I'm not going to serve time for contempt," Putman said.

**Senator wants facts on border agent cuts**

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — Sen. Dennis DeConcini asked Attorney General Richard Thornburgh on Thursday to confirm how many of 679 Border Patrol agents' jobs slated for elimination will be along the Southwest border.

In a letter to Thornburgh, the Arizona Democrat said he was troubled by plans of the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, parent agency of the Border Patrol, to slash positions above any additional personnel cuts which may be required as a result of the Gramm-Rudman deficit reduction law.

Earlier this week, Thornburgh's staff notified Budget Director Richard G. Darman that if the Justice Department were to put into effect a sequester or with a mandate as mandated by Gramm-Rudman, the INS would lose \$401 million of nearly \$3.17 billion that would be "lopped" from Justice's available resources. That would include furloughs of 48 days for Border Patrol employees, as well as a dramatic impact on drug seizures, air operations and other anti-smuggling activities. DeConcini asked to be told how planned cuts will be distributed among each sector of the Border Patrol "and how it will affect current staffing levels."

**Legislation hits at private log exports**

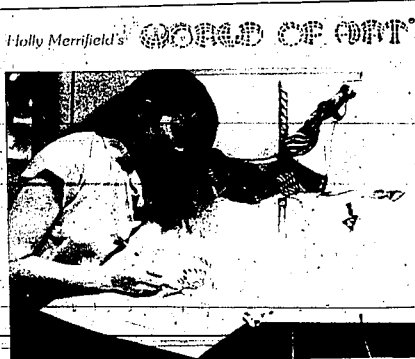
EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — U.S. Rep. Peter DeFazio announced plans Thursday to introduce legislation limiting log exports from privately owned lands.

"The people of Oregon don't want to see any of our logs go overseas," DeFazio said at a news conference. "There aren't enough to go around."

The announcement came 10 days after President Bush approved a ban on raw log exports from most public lands in the West.

"We've barely scratched the surface of the problem with our ban on public log exports," DeFazio said. "Now it's time to go after the huge log exporting companies who have grown fat on the easy profits from log exports, instead of investing in their work force or upgrading their domestic mills."

DeFazio's bill would exempt owners of private woodlots smaller than 320 acres.

Those who religiously play "second hand low" will have little chance to beat today's game. A Dutch pair, Kaiser/Kokkes, found the killing defense at Holland's 1989 Hoehst International Tournament.

Against a routine defense, South wins dummy's diamond king and leads a low club, nine from East, and South's king goes to West's ace. A diamond return is refused and a third diamond clears the suit. South then leads a club and his partner answers when East wins. East gets his heart ace, but that is all. South limiting his losses to two clubs, one diamond and one heart.

At the tournament, East put up his club queen on the first club lead from dummy. This alert play created two club entries to the West hand when South covered with the club king. As a result, the defense captured two diamond tricks instead of one, and the game was defeated one trick.

Today's example, East can gain little by holding on to his club queen. Accordingly East put it up at his first opportunity in an attempt to build something for West.

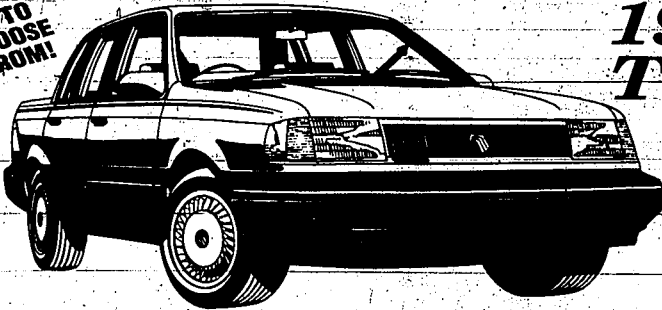

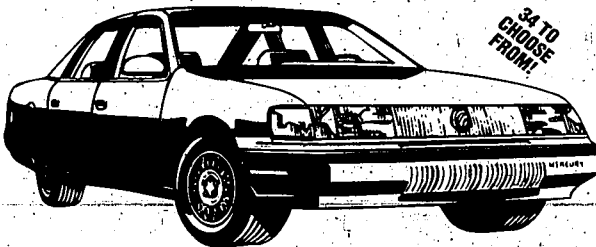

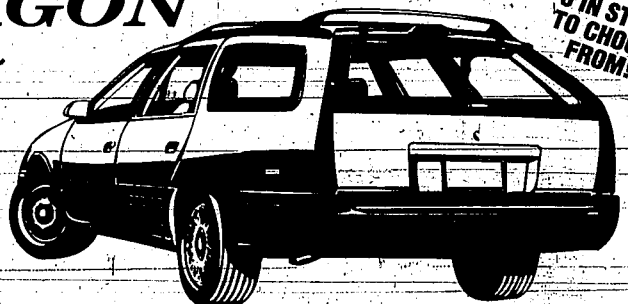

## Bruins force back anguish to beat Tigers

**JEROME** — In a rivalry marked with unusual happenings, Thursday night's opening football victory for the Twin Falls Bruins over Jerome was no exception.

The Bruins, thumped and embarrassed and trailing 13-0 at halftime, roared from behind with touchdowns on three consecutive possessions in the third quarter, and pulled out a 28-13 decision.

Perhaps, as telling as anything was a comparison of statistics between halves of the two Twin Falls runningbacks. At intermission, senior Terry Thueson had 12 yards — winding up with 78. Junior Jai Gordon had two at halftime and added 132 in the second half.

"We just showed we were too young and played tentatively in the first half," said Twin Falls Coach Jon Jund. "And we probably tried to get a little too fancy with a sophomore quarterback making his first start. Incidentally, we think he's going to be a good one," he added of Randy Stover.

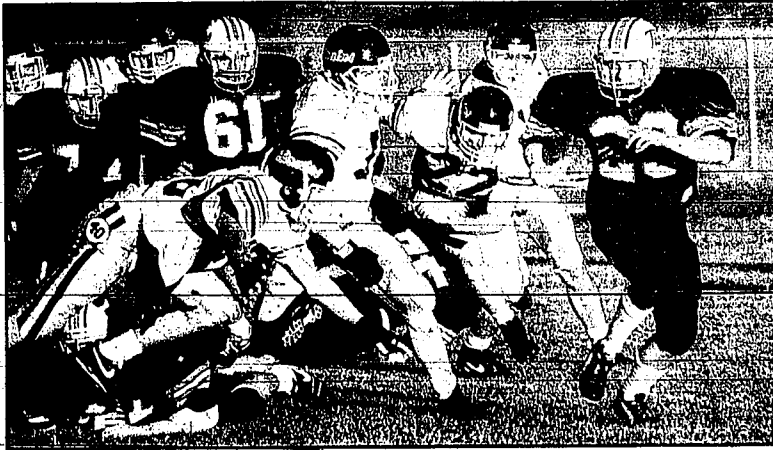
Jund said he wasn't ready to put a lot of onus on the offensive line for the Bruins' puncheon first half.

"Our backs weren't running in the first half they wouldn't turn it. They were looking for the big gain and Jerome's defense did a great job of preventing that," he continued.

In the second half, the Bruins started running some counters to dull Jerome's defensive charge and the second-half offense started paying off.

Twin Falls moved 74 yards in 10 plays to score with the second half kickoff and then started getting some of the turnover points back that the Bruins had given Jerome in the first half.

Immediately after the kickoff, Bruin sophomore Greg Stanley picked off a deflected Brett Walter pass at midfield. Again the Gordon-Thueson punch, clicked with Gordon getting his second TD from four yards away. He also took a two-point conversion pass from Stover.

Again Jerome ran into first-play disaster when Bruin tackle Brent Swensen caused a fumble in the backfield and Jon Traveller recovered at the Jerome 38. A 27-yard counter scamper by Gordon set up a one-yard plunge for Thueson and Stover, after absorbing a 15-yard penalty, hit Aaron Lyda with a 20-yard two-point conversion.

The Bruins got the last score midway through the fourth quarter when another interception by Ryan Malay set up a 30-yard drive. Originally it appeared Malay had run it in but a clipping penalty was assessed.

Gordon plunged in from the two to make it 28-13.

Jerome had used a little Bruin largesse to score both touchdowns in the closing 3:21 of the second quarter. First, Paul Egbert intercepted a deflected pass at the Bruin 22 and Jerome capitalized on a 13-yard slant in from Walter to Jason Wilson.

After one first down, Twin Falls fumbled at its 47 and on fourth and 9 at the Twin Falls 30, the Walter-Wilson combination carried to a first down at the 15 and three plays later the slant pass put the second Jerome score on the board. Layne Whitney booted one conversion.

"I think they wore us down," said Jerome Coach Bob Williamson, making his debut. "I thought the big thing was when they scored that first one, we gave them the ball back right away — twice. It all had a snowball effect."

"But I thought we played a great first half."

"We should at least come out better than last year (when Richfield finished 2-7)," Appell said. "I've got more experience and so does the team."

Not all of last year's experiences were good, however. Appell had several interceptions in a nightmarish 28-8 loss to conference champion North Gem.

"Appell just sighs and shakes his head when remembering that game, but Richfield won't be a pushover for anyone this year," he said. "The Tigers will finish no worse than third in the Sawtooth Conference, Appell predicted. "Hopefully we'll be number one."

Those high-hopes hinge on how well Appell adapts to the quarterback role.

Stratman plans to balance the offense and take some pressure off the passing game. He said Appell will play some defensive back, but his defensive role will be limited so he can concentrate on his quarterbacking duties.

The 6-foot, 150-pound Appell has a strong arm but needs to work on his technique, Stratman said. Appell pitched for Shoshone's American Legion baseball team over the summer, where he displayed a

# New teams, old champs ready to battle in Sawtooth Conference

With three new teams, the Sawtooth Conference has never looked this year, but look for the perennial favorites to remain on top.

Shoshone will join the conference's eight-man format this year after going 0-9 in the Magic Valley Conference last year. Dietrich is out for the season. North Gem, neither of which had a football program last year, will both field teams this year.

None of the new kids on the block is likely to challenge perennial bullies North Gem and Rockland. Those teams will likely battle it out for the two available playoff spots with Camas County, Carey and Richfield providing possible challenges.

"They just have more kids than anybody else," Rockland coach Steven May said. "Dietrich is gone. They usually have 30-35 on the team and we have 20. It's really ugly."

Aside from North Gem, the conference is a wash, May said. "Any of last year's teams could surprise the front-runners and the three newcomers are essentially wild cards, he said.

"I think we could sneak on someone," said first-year Richfield coach Clint Stratman. "Shoshone certainly has the numbers," May said. "And Shoshone, they've got some kids out there. Unfortunately for the chiefs, according to eligibility rules have left them with only nine players."

Two teams from the Sawtooth Conference will make the A-4 eighth-man playoffs. Last year's champion North Gem lost to Council in the second round and runner-up Camas County lost in the opening game to Garden Valley.



**North Gem Cowboys**

The team from Bancroft will likely field a formidable team again this year, with a strong lineup returning from last year's conference championship.

"If we stay healthy, we'll be right in there for the conference championship," said second-year coach Mel Hall.

The Cowboys won the eight-man A-4 state championship two years ago and lost to Council in the second round of last year's playoffs.

Hall lost only three starters from 1989 and has about 20 letters on his 30-man team.

"On offense, the Cowboys can strike quickly with second team tight state quarterback, Brent Rogers, and tight end Travis Stoor, who holds the school record for touchdown recep-

tion and averaged 30 yards per carry last year.

Offensive guard Brad Banks, a sophomore, will anchor a big offensive line. Banks, 255 pounds, will be joined by sophomore Billy Bybee at 201 and Jason Wakley at 233.

On defense, an experienced crew of down linemen will lead up to offensive linemen and linebackers. Trailback Wayne Greenwood will start at linebacker after coming off the bench for 21 tackles in a single game last year.

**Rockland Bulldogs**

The Bulldogs may return a strong offensive nucleus from last year's 5-3 team with running backs Reuben McLean and Jon Howell joining senior signal-caller Shane Steidley in the backfield.

"We've got some real good skill people coming back," said 14-year coach Steven May. "I have a couple of good running backs. That's going to be our strength."

There is no shortage of experienced linemen in Rockland, leaving May with at least one on both sides of the ball. May also has variety of experience in the linebacker and defensive back positions.

That experience, coupled with a strong group of underclassmen, should have the Bulldogs in contention for a playoff spot this year.

One possible weakness is the lack of size. Rockland's biggest lineman is Lalo Hidalgo at five-foot, 210 pounds. The remaining lineup, however, come in somewhere short of 150 pounds, May said.

Even as the favorite, North Gem will have to look over its shoulder at Rockland and several others in a "dead heat" for the conference title, May said.

"If we do real well, we could do it in North Gem. Somebody could beat us, too," he said.

**Camas County Mustangs**

Last year's conference runner-up at 6-3, Camas suffers from a lack of depth at several positions, but most of last season's key offensive players are back.

Four-year coach Glen Colter said the Mustangs will display a balanced attack behind senior Tyler Ballard (QB), Rob Tupper (RB), and Eddie Harness (WR).

Linebackers and defensive ends are the question marks. Lineman Marty Knoffon, Thad Lee and Doug Maxwell return to provide a good starting line. Harness at left guard and Tupper at linebacker are the only other returning starters on defense.

Harness, a senior, has good speed and is Camas' best safety play. Backup quarterback Jason Colter and tight end Ryan Smith will provide help in the defensive secondary.

Backup running back Mark Freeman played some linebacker last year and will probably start at that

position this season, Colter said.

"We're a little smaller than average on defense," he said. "The biggest Musher lineman, 195-pound Mark Hansler, is out with an ankle injury but could return in a week."

Colter said.

Colter picks his team to finish in the top half of the conference, but that will depend on how quickly his defensive unit can come together.

"I don't see anybody weak in the conference," he said. North Gem is the team to beat, "but we've got a real good shot at 'em," he said.

**Richfield Tigers**

The Tigers finished 2-6 last year, but new coach Clint Stratman thinks his team can break into the top two this year with some hard work and a little luck.

"The key will be their wins early," he said. North Gem and Rockland are heavy favorites for the top spot in the conference, but Richfield, which plays North Gem in the season's final game, could challenge them.

Colter key will be senior fullback Dale Anderson. At 5-10, Anderson presses 280 pounds and runs the 40-yard dash in 4.9 seconds.

Another key will be the development of second-year quarterback Rob Appell, who will be spending more time in the passer's role than his first defensive back position, Stratman said.

"We can put the ball pretty deep if we have to," he said. "Appell has a good arm." Together with a powerful fullback and strong tailback Ben Riley, the Tigers will have a potent offense, Stratman said.

Richfield has an experienced line, with all-state candidate Jake Riley at center, and seniors Ryan Fox and Gene Lee at the guard positions. Junior Sean West will start at split end, with six-foot, 175-pound freshman Bobby Anderson working at tight end.

Dale Anderson will be a force at linebacker, and Ben Riley will join Appell at the other safety position, Stratman said.

Shoshone Indians

After going 0-9 in the 11-man Magic Valley Conference last year, Shoshone's seniors are hungry for a win and could lead the team to a respectable season.

The Indians have returning starters at quarterback, wide receiver and on the offensive line, but last year's leading rusher, Terry Conklin, is gone.

Senior Monty Arrossa hasn't played in the backfield since his freshman year, but he will likely be

the leading runner for Shoshone last year's first coach Tim Chapman. Shoshone has already been hit hard by injuries. Casey Kelley, a six-foot, 200-pound powerhouse who would have started at fullback, was lost to a broken jaw. Mike Sullivan will miss his senior season with a broken jaw sustained in a car accident.

The only returning running back, Rob Connell, will be sidelined for the next couple of weeks after a rodeo accident left him with a broken ankle.

The key to defense in eight-man football is quickness rather than size, Chapman said, and he is having trouble replacing Kelley at linebacker.

Several players tried out for the job, but none proved quick enough to tick up numbers out of the backfield, Chapman said. Junior Wade Sturgeon and tight end Travis Tevis will probably get the nod, he said.

Shoshone has a good front three with plenty of experience, with Frank Naylor at center, fullback Jay Atwood and Kevin Swainston at tackle. Newcomer RICK Beck rounds out the line, which will play both ways.

With a year of varsity experience, quarterback Robble Owens should be much improved, Chapman said.

Several players on last year's team will be returning for Dietrich, including 190-pound guard Jed Astle.

**Dietrich Blue Devils**

Don't look for any returning starters or varsity lettermen on this team. This is Dietrich's first year with a football team and coach Steve Crest said "it's tough to tell" how his team will do.

Crest has a few players who played for Shoshone last year, but his team still lacks in experience.

The attitude is good, and several players are coming along quite well, including a team in a division with several strong programs is difficult, he said.

### Redneck Review to explore violence, hazards of writing

Like many basements in Twin Falls, Penelope Reedy's houses a washer and dryer. Unlike most, however, Reedy's cellar also boasts a printing press. From this basement — and from two rooms upstairs filled with books, correspondence and mementos — Reedy edits and publishes the Redneck Review of Literature, now in its 15th year.

Leading a visitor on a tour of her home-based publishing, balliwick and pointing to the Multilith offset press she recently acquired, Reedy paraphrases A. J. Liebling, who said freedom of the press is guaranteed only to the person who owns one.

And in the coming months, Reedy will be using the power of the press to explore two intriguing themes: "Violence and the American West" and "Writers Being Run Outta Town."

The issue focusing on violence should be ready by Oct. 1, Reedy says. That, while violence is a common contemporary theme, Redneck will explore more than people beating and shooting each other.

Readers may be surprised, she says, at the concept of violence as redemption. For example, a slap in the face can be taken two ways. It can be demeaning. Or it can be a wake-up call, an act of salvation.

Writers will also examine violence in terms of violation, romance and destruction. Contributors include Clay Reynolds, a novelist and teacher at the University of North Texas; Michael Corrigan, who formerly taught at Idaho State University; and Missoula, Mont., writer Judy Matovich.

Others contributing are Ron McFarland, a teacher at the University of Idaho who was the state's first writer-in-residence; Bret Fowler, who taught in Gooding until moving to Nampa; and Charles Potts, a poet and writer from Walla Walla, Wash., who plans to stop in Twin Falls for a reading of his works this fall.

In Redneck, Reedy and her writers often take myth to task. She notes that, while the Old West had a reputation for wildness, the New West is just as violent. The destruction of myth also will play a key role in next spring's edition of Redneck, titled "Writers Being Run Outta Town."

Reedy says America has a long tradition of writers being shunned by their hometowns. "Small rural American communities are forever being hailed romantically as ideal places in which to live peacefully and the healthy children," she wrote in a recent Redneck brochure.

"Yes, what writers raise basic issues of freedom and truth in such communities, they have often been literally 'run outta town,' or at the very least ostracized," Reedy continues.

"When your lawn gets shaggy, you mow it off," says Reedy, explaining that small communities have their own structures that perpetuate the status quo. "If a person doesn't fit in, they get weeded out."

### Journal receives 1st area art grant

TWIN FALLS — The Redneck Review of Literature has received the first grant ever given by the Magic Valley Arts Council.

Elwood adds that the council has set up a committee to write up criteria on future grant requests. The council hopes to have a pool of \$250 to \$300 available each year for future grants.

"We'll go more than that if we can find foundation money," adds Elwood, who plans to write grant applications seeking additional funds.

She notes that officials trying to hammer out new guidelines for the National Endowment for the Arts have been talking about giving more of the NEA's money to state and local arts agencies.

If that happens, Elwood says the Magic Valley Arts Council and the local arts organizations are sure to benefit.

### Redneck gathering gave writers a chance to share and celebrate

BELLEVUE — Plastic pink flamingos littered the lawn, doing double duty as croquet hoops and as beacons of bad taste, guiding visitors to the First Redneck Review Rat Trap Fow Wow.

The recent gathering of Idaho's literary tribes was held at the home of Tom and Florence Blanchard. Florence is a writer and the Redneck's "philosopher-in-residence." Tom, sporting a "Why be normal?" sticker on his forehead at the gathering, is a Blaine County Commissioner.

"Guests" who included many of the state's best-known and most-active writers — dined on roast Idaho lamb, spuds, salads, brownies and beer. As dusk fell, everyone sat near a fire and listened as many of the participants read poetry and — novels-in-progress. Later, celebrants crawled off to tents scattered around the Blanchards' spread along the Wood River.

Penelope Reedy, party co-host and editor/publisher of The Redneck Review, says she wanted to throw the bash to thank the many people who

have helped her over the past 15 years. The Redneck Review — which made its first profit over \$200, in 1989 — relies on volunteer labor. Reedy says she's in particular debt to Judy Widener, who helps type and illustrate each issue.

But Reedy says she also wanted to provide an opportunity for the region's writers to meet and hear each other's works.

"I love to listen to people read," she says. When she and College of Southern Idaho English instructor Juy Sloan wed recently, the guests gathered in couple's kitchen, drank Jack Daniels and read poetry and prose.

Reedy says there is no such thing as an "Idaho style" of writing. Rather, each writer within the state develops his or her own voice.

The state's varied geography helps keep writers' work distinct, too. Some Idaho writers are working in the mountains, others along rivers, others on the high desert and canyon country.

"Very few of the Idaho writers live close to each other," she says. "They are off doing diverse things and writing about it."

### Summer movies: Much too much of not enough

That sound you hear from Hollywood is the gnashing of teeth all along the bottom line as the summer draws to a close and the studio money men raise one cry in unison: What went wrong?

Now it may not seem to you and me that ANTHONY Hopkins was wrong when he hunched millions in box-office revenue and the steady drumbeat of promotional claps for movie after movie, each opening to throngs of happy customers. But that is not enough, not for the industry's financiers. Their problem is simple. This summer there was no "Batman."

Never mind that there hadn't been a "Batman" until last summer, either. "Batman" was a huge blockbuster (it wound up making more than \$250 million in gross revenue), and not far behind it last summer came "Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade" (nearly \$200 million).

This year, the closest any movie has come is "Pretty Woman," at \$170 million or so. Only one problem: "Pretty Woman" isn't a summer picture, but a holdover from early spring.

The one respect in which this summer's movies seemed to have set records was not in what they earned, but in what they COST. It used to be that a movie that cost more than \$50 million to make was big, scary news — you'd get one every few years, and there would be much twitzy attention paid.

But this summer saw no less than three films budgeted at least that high ("Total Recall," "Days of Thunder" and "Die Hard 2") in theaters at the same time.

So in Hollywood, where the home-run ball (latest euphemism for blockbuster) is the only hit that gets you any respect, there

is discomfort. There is even talk, yet again, of bringing the costs of movies back "under control." The summer of '90 has the feel of flop about it.

Yet very few of us have any stake at all in the biz beyond our \$6 and a couple of hours. For us, the summer was no flop at all. It was, I'd say, a bunch of fun.

Consider: This was the summer so jammed with stuff that "Back to the Future III," which in the most other seasons would have been the film to beat, opened in May and was essentially forgotten by July.

Earlier, two big star vehicles — "Bird on a Wire" with Goldie Hawn and Mel Gibson and "Cadillac Man" with Robin Williams — drew even less attention. In the parlance of Hollywood, nothing had any legs this year; nothing seemed to last, to stay popular.

So the summer went: "Dick Tracy" opened well and seemed to be the hot new thing, until along came "Days of Thunder," and THAT seemed big until "Die Hard 2,"

and off into the dog days.

What happened, of course, was not that Hollywood blundered by spending too much, but that too many different people spent too much on the same KIND of movie. The endless procession of heavy-metal, backfate-and-thunder movies seemed to strike the same chord over and over, the visual equivalent of a particularly loud one-note samba.

How to choose, really, among "Die Hard 2," "Total Recall," "Robocop 2," "Another 48 HRS.," even "Anchorman" and "Days of Thunder," try as the studios did to separate those films from the pack?

Surely, "Dick Tracy" was not a pack movie; it was meant to be the new "Batman," but it had a weird, surrealistic edge to it. "Dick Tracy" took movie cosmetics to new levels, and featured the wholly unexpected spectacle of Al Pacino and Dustin Hoffman playing second fiddle to their own

# Gallery openings feature Western artists

**KETCHUM**—Saddle-up your station wagon and pull your hat down tight, it's time to take a ride with the western lineup of artists featured during the art gallery openings throughout town tonight.

The final openings for the summer will get under way from 6 to 9 p.m. at more than a dozen galleries in town, most of which are within easy walking distance.

The Friesen Gallery of Fine Art, 391 First Ave. N., features a show of top Native American and Southwestern artists from the Santa Fe Indian market.

The show displays a selection of work from critically acclaimed artists such as Frank Howell, Larry Ford, B.C. Nowlin, Don Carstens and Van Dyke Jones. Native American artist Darren Vigil's original oil pastels are also displayed.

Bronze sculptures—inspired from Indian photographs—are created by artist Bill Worell, and Ketchum artist Rob Craig Hink's wooden cactus character sculptures are featured in the outdoor sculpture garden.

The Charles "d'Lo" Wildlife Gallery at 200 Sun Valley Road next to the Toy Store features colorful painter Vivie Crandall and the ceramic works of local wildlife environ-

mental artist Michael Golden. Crandall was voted the third hottest artist in 1989 by U.S. ART magazine's poll of galleries. This showing is a rare opportunity with more original works assembled than at any time in the past three years.

Crandall's newest print, "Hot-crossed Buns," will be unveiled. It depicts a grizzly mom and cubs fleeing the Yellowstone fire.

In addition, Bellevue artist Michael Golden will show his intricate ceramic wall jewelry, glass works and bronzes.

At the Broschovsky Galleries at Sixth and Leadville, contemporary Wyoming artists Bill Schenck and Ron McIntosh are the featured artists.

Schenck's "pop western" art has been influenced by famed pop artist Andy Warhol. Schenck portrays the West in images that are photographic in effect, but eliminates the detail which would have forced him into photo-realism. A new direction in Schenck's painting is the addition of dialogue which adds a cartoon-like element.

McIntosh, on the other hand, works in Rauschenberg-like collage oil paintings. His "Western History" shows cowboys, Indians, sheep herders, cattle, boots and guns superimposed on a modern skyline. In "My Dad's Rainsticks" the effect

adds so much mystique to the painting that its two-dimensional shape looks too convincing.

The River Run Gallery, 291 First Ave. N., opens with a show of sculpture by Lewistown artist Steven Kline. This is Kline's first western exhibit of his sculpture which reflects his interest in the ocean and jugglers.

The sculptures utilize cast and fabricated aluminum and are colored by hand. Each sculpture is made of natural, crinkled foil and styrofoam. Geometric forms such as triangles, arcs, cubes and spheres are balanced upon one another in an arrangement that seems to defy gravity.

The Ketchum Gallery, 271 First Ave. N., features "When the Old West Meets the New" with the colorful, three-dimensional cut-out paintings of Montana artist Larry Pirnie. The paintings are juxtaposed against a collection of antique Native American artifacts curated by Pavel Raczka, a respected expert on American Plains Indian art.

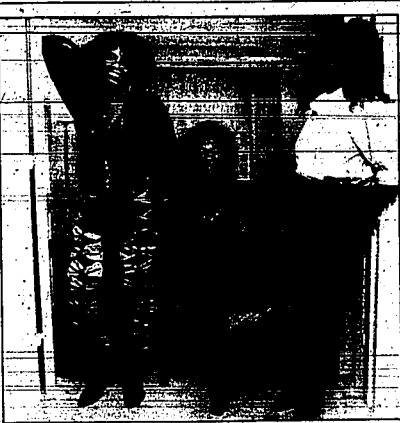
Pirnie's work captures the spirit

and romance of the classical old West in a uniquely contemporary blend of vivid colors and unusual mixed media effects. Pirnie's humor shows through his work with early inspirations from Red Ryder comics, Charlie Russell calendar prints and Western movies.

The Native American artifacts, in contrast to Pirnie's contemporary work, reflect a culture using natural, found or traded materials with which to create an artifact. Of special interest are the Blackfoot and Nez Perce parfleches—decorated folding hides that served as traveling bags for nomadic tribes. Other highlights are a Blackfoot hat shirt with visually striking beadwork, intricately beaded Ojibwa bandolier bags and a fully beaded Sioux girl's dress.

Both Pirnie and Raczka will be in attendance for the opening reception.

NEW YORK (AP) — The Pointer Sisters have always had this little problem: They just can't stop talking. At home. On stage. In interviews.

"They're wonderful," says one of the streams of consciousness rushing like Niagara Falls. Just try getting through an entire sentence before being blown away by hurricanes Ruth, June and Anita.

"We just take over," laughed June, the others jabbering away. "Sometimes we say the same things at the same time."

"I know I can be doing something with my sisters on stage, just doing a song, and I almost want to stop sometimes and just be entertained," says Ruth.

"When we were kids our father would scream. My father would whine about it," adds Anita, never coming up for air. "WILL YOU PLEASE JUST LET ME

SAY SOMETHING.' And we'd just laugh. He'd say, 'You are the craziest people (Ruth and June join her here) I'VE EVER SEEN IN ALL MY LIFE.'"

You'd never know it, but these are hard times for the Pointer Sisters, squeezed around a small table in a Manhattan hotel, a setting more suitable for a nice, quiet game of bridge.

Sales have slowed considerably since "Automatic," "Neutron Dance" and their other hits from the first half of the 1980s. The last two albums have flopped, and in 1988 they left their longtime label, RCA Records, and signed with Motown.

So now they're working extra hard, blaming the slump on bad promotion and counting on a big push from Motown for their new record, "Right Rhythm."

# 'Darkman' dwells in the ultimate comic book universe

**HOLLYWOOD** — His face is a decayed-flesh ruin of scars and burns, his body a wreath of torment. He makes his pain in handbags, fedora and a great swirling trench coat.

He is the hero of "Darkman," a horribly disfigured scientist, changing personas at will, while tracking down the criminal vermin who destroyed his life ... and, though he didn't originate in one, as dreamed up by director and co-writer Sam Raimi and acted by Liam Neeson, he is comic book to the core: a smidgen of "The Spirit," a bit of Batman, and gobs of the non-comic "Phantom of the Opera."

In the recent flurry of comics-derived movies, "Darkman" may not be the most popular. But, in some ways, it's the best: the only one that successfully captures the graphic look, rhythm and style of the superhero books. More than "Batman" or "Dick Tracy," it's a real fusion: a movie-comic.

Basically "Darkman" is an origin tale, '60s Marvel Comics style, in its Neeson's Peyton Westlake is a scientist experimenting with artificial flesh. When his girlfriend, Julie (Frances McDormand) uncovers a payoff scandal that may ruin her boss, developer Strack (Colin Friels), Peyton is caught in the crossfire. He's lured, stabbed, burned in a vat and blown sky high by the sordid-thugs-who-work-for-

perfidious mobster, Durant (Larry Drake, a stunning villain). Working with this formula stuff, Raimi and his technicians get the wacky style, the parodied bliff-bop! action. Their frames look like comic-book panels: tilted, skewed, using color with the same garish, tongue-in-cheek intensity.

Westlake's lab is a shadow-drenched, twisted-wreck grotto, filled with electric current snappers and burning gases. Villains are hurled through windows and crumple through car roofs. One heavy chops off his victim's fingers-with-a-cigar-cutter; another dances on steel girders at the top of an unfinished skyscraper. In the movie's show-piece scene — a frantic helicopter chase with Darkman swinging in a mid-air on a grappling hook under a hail of automatic gunfire — the technicians have a blistering field day.

Despite its torrid pace, the movie never really loses its sense of fun. Perhaps that's why different from the brutal Stallone-Schwarzenegger revenge rumps of the '80s. Even though it's shot on real city streets, "Darkman" somehow stays in a comic-book universe: a world of satire and swoony self-enclosure. Raimi, who started in low-budget horror, collaborating with writers Joel and Ethan Coen on the 1983

gore classic "The Evil Dead," loves to dramatize the mechanics of movie making. He loves wild angles, grotesque caricature, super-trick shots and allusions to other movies.

His actors give amusingly overdone performances: playing traumatized determination (Neeson), stalwart faith (McDormand), unctuous opportunism (Friels) and cold-blood-

ed sadism (Drake) with the shallowly hypnotic fullness of a De Chirico landscape. Some of the imagery suggests surrealism. The moment when identical Durants, with faces like hypertrophic flesh-balloons, stare at each other in separate revolving door compartments, is as haunting as Salvador Dali's melting watches.

It won't do to overpraise "Dark-

man," (rated R for violence, language and sex). Beyond its gaudy visuals, it's not rich. It stalls after the massive helicopter chase paroxysm; there's not much enough emotional oomph at the climax. But what many American movies do well these days — action, violence, hell-for-leather street spectacle — "Darkman" does better. That may be praise enough.

# Gibson, DeWney film 'Air America' finds focus too late

**AIR AMERICA (R)**, Roger Spottiswoode's high-style black comedy about the covert CIA airlift operation in S.E. Asia during the Vietnam War. Los Angeles Times: "The combination of surreal janglepunks and "MASI" style pranks, but the script finds its focus too late. Mel Gibson and Robert Downey star.

For a movie that plans to scare the kapok out of us, Frank Marshall's funny-scary primal scream of a comedy is a friendly and nicely witty affair (technically, it's a wonder. It is the classic form, done on a higher register than "Beverly Hills Cop" — from far, far away that way — nearly wipes out the perfect American small town. On the other hand, we have a very contemporary hero (a dryly humorous Jeff Daniels), un-macho enough to yell to his kids, "We need Wm in here to kill a spider."

**DICK TRACY (PG)**, Warren Beatty's vision of a comic-strip cop. Film comes in paint box-rip col-

ors with nicely irreverent dialogue, a gaggle of crisp performances and one with million-dollar movie. It's a film of enormous style, with a sense of humor. You may not exactly brood about the inner lives of these characters for days after you leave the theater — then again, for better or worse, that may be one of the definitions of a summer movie. To take the words out of the mouth of another or Tracy, "There ain't much meat, but what there is, is cheese."

**THE EXORCIST III (R)**, Far more a philosophical debate over whether or not God exists than a jolting thriller of the supernatural, the film's appeal is intellectual rather than visceral, and reveals a droll sense of humor on the part of writer-director William Peter Blatty. This time Georgetown's Lt. Kinderman (George C. Scott, taking over for the late Lee J. Cobb) must cope with the diabolical Gemini Killer (Brad Dourif) — even if he is locked up in a mental institution. With a large, distinguished cast.

**FLATLINERS (R)**, Some lines shouldn't be crossed; some movies shouldn't be watched. No, that's too easy. This Joel Schumacher film, in which five photogenic med students

decide to experience death and afterlife scientifically, is eminently watchable, gloriously funny, and wacky deep-focus decor. But it's built around the kind of spirituality hucksters sell Maseratis with. The theme is like a little dry pea rattling through the vast, echoing museum of the high-tech images: Why should anyone risk death to see the afterlives depicted here, when they can get the same stuff by subscribing to cable TV?

**GHOST (PG-13)**, The movie's slogan is "Believe," not an unreasonable request. But even those who'd be happy to comply must get past a certain woolly-mindedness in its script and a production prettified to the point of stickiness. With some of its actors — Demi Moore as the cracked-voice, desolate lover; Whoopi Goldberg as an extremely reluctant spirit go-between; and Vincent Schiavelli as an irascible, subway-dwelling ghost — things are in the best hands possible. But Patrick Swayze as a corporate New York banker? Never in 7 million corporate years.

**THE JUNGLE BOOK (G)**, The Disney artists took little more than the names of Rudyard Kipling's characters, but the film's slapstick comedy, upbeat songs and polished animation have lost none of their appeal. 23 years after its original release — this high-spirited, campy, will delight children — and parents weary of action films with body counts that exceed their box-office grosses.

**WILD AT HEART**, David Lynch's new movie is unlike anything he (or anyone else) has ever done — a commingling of road movie, musical, sci-fi, ghoul and juvenile delinquent genres. Nicolas Cage and Laura Dern play the mis-

understood white-trash lovers on the run from Dem's enraged mother and a host of hellions. At times the film veers dangerously close to David Lynch Schtick — there are a few too many crazies for comfort. Still, at its most white-hot, it blows just about anything else this year, off the screen.

**YOUNG GUNS II (PG-13)**, There haven't been many movie Westerns with this much sheer visual energy and excitement since Peckinpah and Leone were in their '70s prime. The

brilliant New Zealand action director Geoff Murphy ("Utu"), assigned the sequel to 1988's "Bret Pack" retelling of the "Billy the Kid" legend, makes a tale full of sound, gunfire, fury and scorchingly beautiful landscapes. Emilio Estevez is closer than any previous Billy to the look of the sawed-off impish killer and the cast is deep — though overall, this version pales next to Peckinpah's in 1973. It's Murphy and cinematographer Dean ("Mad Max") Senter, who make it special.

## 'Exorcist,' 'Wild at Heart' fade

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)** — The thriller "Darkman" opened in first place at the nation's theaters as the satirical sequel "Exorcist III" and David Lynch's "Wild at Heart" faded at the box office.

According to figures released by Entertainment Data Inc., "Darkman" opened with receipts of \$8.1 million. Featuring Liam Neeson as a handsome scientist turned disfigured superhero, "Darkman" has been described by critics as a hybrid of "Batman" and "Phantom of the Opera."

In second was the dead-boyfriend drama "Ghost," which made \$7.5 million, down just 1 percent from the previous weekend. Starring Demi Moore and Patrick Swayze, "Ghost" so far has made \$111.5 million. As no one ever would have

predicted, "Ghost" this week should pass "Total Recall" as the summer's No. 1 hit.

Third, with \$5 million, was the medical-students-on-a-slab flick "Flatliners." "Presumed Innocent," generating steady but unspectacular business, landed in fourth with a gate of \$4.6 million.

## Photographer's passion for jazz plays out in collection of pictures

CHICAGO (AP) — Herman Leonard's admiration for jazz and his fascination with the people who play it led him to spend many late nights photographing the musicians in dark and smoky clubs.

"I love to photograph interesting people, musicians, artists, writers," Leonard said. "I get to know them and photograph them as I see them. This is my passion."

The results of that passion are the 45 photos capturing jazz greats such as Duke Ellington, Dizzy Gillespie, Billie Holiday and Charlie Parker now touring the country in Leonard's "Images of Jazz" exhibit. Leonard's photos capture the 1940s and '50s jazz scene. His back-lighting technique plays light off the skin of many of the musicians, highlighting the sweat on their foreheads, an occasional smile of joy and frequent frowns of concentration.

"I wanted to get images that for me personally were representative of the atmosphere," Leonard said in an interview.

Leonard took the pictures in clubs around the world from New York to Paris to Los Angeles. But it wasn't until the 1980s when he was living in Paris and a French publisher approached him about putting together a book of his jazz photos that he pulled them out after almost 20 years of neglect.

"I'd put them in a cardboard box and stuck them under the bed," said Leonard, whose photos were compiled into the 1985 book, "The Eye of Jazz."

The 67-year-old photographer said he plays a big part in the reaction people have to his photo exhibit.

"For the gray-haired guys, it kind of revives a memory," Leonard said. "It's different for the teen-agers. They've heard and loved the music,

and it gives them a chance to feel what it was like to be there."

The exhibit has attracted everyone from jazz buffs to parents who try to explain who the musicians are to their small children, said Catherine Edelman, owner of a Chicago gallery which showed the exhibit. She added that Leonard's photos have such a mass appeal they are bringing a new audience into her gallery.

"Jazz crosses barriers. It's a concept they respect," Edelman said. "But nothing really prepared me for the amount of love coming out of

people," she said. "It's not just dealing with fine art. People go up to each other and ask: 'Hey, have you ever seen Dizzy play?'"

Edelman said she also sees Leonard's photos as a kind of visual history.

"I think they capture a special time, a period we'll never be able to return to," Edelman said. "It's nostalgia. A record of time gone by."

"It's very classic. The smoke, the atmosphere — you can almost taste these things. All of a sudden, you want to put on some jazz."

George Orwell was right: Big Brother is watching. So is everyone else in the family. Worse yet, they're taping the whole thing.

With the proliferation of video camcorders — 12 to 13 percent of American households have at least one camcorder — it seems that no place is safe. Every time you turn around, somebody's sticking a lens in your face.

And not unlike Greta Garbo, some folks just want to be left alone.

"It's funny when you see some of the family things because people are cringing and hiding," says Gary Reichel, co-owner of Thomas Video in Royal Oak, Mich. "There's a lot of reluctant stars out there."

These stars are thrust into the limelight when an all-too-eager video-camera owner can't seem to find the STOP button on the video camera.

Although plenty of folks enjoy

appearing in family videos, some aren't convinced that every person's every moment should be captured for posterity.

"They were fun at first and then everything was being recorded," says Corey Doyle, 18, who says he has tolerated a blitz of videotaping by his friends' parents within the past year.

Doyle, who lives in Taylor, Mich., estimates that a dozen of his friends have parents who tape their kids at parties, dances, graduation and a host of other events.

"When I make a fool of myself I don't like to see it over again," Doyle says. He prefers snapshots to video.

"It's easier to deal with because you don't have to listen to yourself and you don't see the different emotions that you do."

He considers himself lucky that his parents don't have a camcorder yet.

"At first I could handle it, but if they kept going on and on then I'd say something to them."

# 'Twin Peaks' creators offer new look at America in 'American Chronicles'

Imagine, Mark Frost said at a recent press conference, "somebody from another galaxy who's never seen America before. He's somebody who's done a lot of research and is smart about what goes on here, but he's seeing these things for the first time and showing them to us through his perspective."

That's the point of view of "American Chronicles," a new documentary series from "Twin Peaks" creators Frost and David Lynch, premiering Saturday, Sept. 8, on Fox.

But calling "American Chronicles" a documentary is like calling "Twin Peaks" a murder mystery. Technically speaking, you'd be correct, but you'd also be leaving out most of the flavor of the experience. Take the premiere episode, which examines the phenomenon of New Orleans' Mardi Gras. The images — of bizarre costumes, balcony bacchanals, beads hanging from the bare branches of a tree in a morning-after mist — barrage the viewer from all directions, conveying an impressionistic, even precognitive, reality. In this, it resembles "Koyaanisqatsi," the 1983 cult movie that set a staggering series of images of both natural and man-made America against a haunting soundtrack by Philip Glass to mesmerizing effect.

Unfortunately, there's more to "American Chronicles" than the photography.

Unlike "Koyaanisqatsi," the Mardi Gras show includes narration, which is delivered by Richard Dreyfuss. Its observations are commonplace, and

Dreyfuss intones such lines as: "The word 'carnival' comes from the Latin 'carne vale': 'Farewell to the flesh'" and "Then, like a fairy tale it ends ... at midnight" as though he were reading from the Tibetan Book of the Dead. The music, by Billy Barber, distracts from rather than enhances what's happening on screen.

But don't write off "American Chronicles" yet. For one thing, said Frost, the format is flexible: "Richard (Dreyfuss) will narrate those episodes where we feel a narrator is needed and useful. There may be a couple where we go without a narrator." The overall aim, Frost pointed out, is to move the documentary form "away from journalism and more towards a fantastic succession of images and music and sound."

Certainly the topics in the coming weeks of "American Chronicles" lend themselves to such interesting treatment. "We've just finished shooting The Miss Texas Beauty Pageant, which will be our second show," Frost said. "We're going to do a profile of Manhattan after dark. We just finished shooting a 25th high-school reunion in Elmhurst, Ill.; the show becomes a sort of thematic way of exploring the passage of time and what it does to people's lives. We're also going to do a show about America's obsession with the automobile."

## '60 Minutes' crisis TV tops the Nielsens: That's two weeks in a row in first place

LOS ANGELES (AP) — America's thirst for information on the Middle East crisis made "60 Minutes" the most watched show on prime-time television for the second consecutive week.

The Sunday CBS news magazine — which featured a Dan Rather interview with Egyptian president Hosni Mubarak, a segment on chemical warfare and a report from the Soviet Union by Morley Safer — had not won back-to-back No. 1 victories since 1983, when it was the top-rated show for the year.

The weekly ratings released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co. also showed high marks for NBC and its early fall preview week. The premieres of "Ferris Bueller" and "Parenthood" — both spun from feature films — landed in sixth and seventh place, respectively.

Fox Broadcasting Co., however, fell flat with its impertinent move to put "The Simpsons" up against NBC's "The Cosby Show." The sugary Cosby family and "Unsolved Mysteries" were tied for the No. 3. The squabbling Simpsons were No. 54. Fox has 75 fewer affiliates than NBC. NBC's "Cheers" was second last week; "Golden Girls" were eighth. "Matlock," on NBC, finished

## It's a high-level shakeup at CBS News

NEW YORK (AP) — David Burke, CBS News' fifth president in five years, was out last week and Eric W. Ober in as his successor as the once-troubled division was back in the headlines after two years of relative calm.

One CBS source characterized the reason for Burke's departure as a "leadership issue" and not arguments over budget with the cost-cutting president of CBS Inc., Laurence A. Tisch.

Burke, 54, a former ABC News executive vice president who CBS hired in August 1988, did not return phone calls. But he strongly hinted in a statement that he'd been forced out. "It is clear to me, following amicable discussions of with the management of CBS, that they would be more comfortable about the future of the news division under new leadership. They have the right to make that decision," he said, pledging to help his

48-year-old successor, Ober. The latter has spent 24 years at CBS. He currently heads CBS' television stations division.

"I'm not walking in there with any mandate or any plans for a

change," Ober said in a brief interview. "I've had no discussions about cost-cutting or anything else. The priority over there (at CBS headquarters) is to let them do their jobs."

Burke's hiring was preceded by six years of turmoil that included Gen. William C. Westmoreland's \$120 million libel suit over a Vietnam documentary, and low morale caused by staff cuts, the largest of them occurring in March 1987, when more than 200 employees were fired. Westmoreland dropped the lawsuit after weeks of a costly trial for both sides. When Burke arrived, he clamped down on what had been a plethora of leaks by staffers about the woes of CBS News. He also generally refused to grant interviews to reporters, even about such controversies as his three-month suspension of "60 Minutes" humorist Andy Rooney.

## Lawsuit filed as ABC says no 'Baby Talk'

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC last Friday yanked its new "Baby Talk" series from its fall schedule and said it would bring back "Head of the Class" on Tuesday nights.

However, Howard Hesseman won't be returning as the show's "Head," a high school sitcom that ran for four seasons, then was put on hold as a back-up series for the 1990-91 season.

The show's new version, to pre-

miere on Sept. 11, will star Scottish comedian Billy Connolly as an Oxford-educated high school history teacher. "Baby Talk" ran into problems when Connie Sellecca, who was to star in the show, was replaced by its producer, Ed Weinberger.

On Tuesday, the former co-star of ABC's "Hotel" and CBS' short-lived "Frying High" series, filed a lawsuit in Los Angeles against

Weinberger and Columbia Pictures Television for more than \$1.5 million.

The suit alleged that Weinberger "beat up on Sellecca emotionally" and demanded she submit unconditionally to his authority.

He and the studio have declined to comment.

ABC Entertainment president Robert A. Iger said in a statement that the re-casting of "Baby Talk" is
