# Saudis ante up billions for help

JEDDAH, Saudi Arabia — Saudi Arabia, responding to a personal pitch from Secretary of State James A. Baker III, Thursday gave a "multi-billion dollar" pledge to underwrite the cost of keeping U.S. troops in the wealthy oil kingdom and supporting poorer nations for their losses in the war crisis.

U.S. and Saudi officials confirmed that an agreement was reached on the Saudi commitment following a meeting between Baker and Saudi King Fahd. Both groups said no exact dollar figure was set.

"We had a meeting of the minds," a senior Iraqi official said after Baker's two-hour meeting with the Saudi Arabian King at Salam Palace. "We're talking about billion dollar figures," a senior State Department official said, also demanding anonymity.

## Bush to make Iraq TV video

TOPEKA, Kan. — President Bush will accept Saddam Hussein's offer to broadcast a message to Iraq but only on MASHAT, said in Washington that "of his own terms, Bush's spokesman said Thursday.

But Magic Valley Right to Life President Marilyn Scott called the request "censorship."

## Proposed middle school would emphasize independent learning

TWIN FALLS — A new middle school would ease students out of their homes and into a more independent learning environment, architects say.

Design West Architects of Boise interviewed teachers throughout the Twin Falls School District this week to get ideas for designing a proposed \$6 million middle school and a \$3 million high school auditorium and gymnasium.

### How they do it - A6

The Twin Falls School Board will decide on Sept. 11 whether to pass a resolution to put the issue before the voters sometime this year.

Several teachers offered advice for the design of the middle school for 900 students, 300 each in grades 6 through 8.

Sixth graders would have a home room teacher for math, science, reading

and history subjects taught in the same classroom — but would use the same physical education, music and library facilities as older students.

This gives them exposure to the rest of the school," said Jay Christopherson, educational architect for Design West.

Each grade would be located in one of three separate areas of the school to promote class identity, Christopherson said.

WASHINGTON — A 116-year-old federal mining law being considered for an overhaul by Congress was criticized Thursday as a taxpayer giveaway to business.

Mining interests defended it, however, as necessary to the discovery of new mineral resources. "The law is obsolete," consumer advocate Ralph Nader told a House subcommittee. "It shows disrespect for taxpayer assets." He called it a "graveyard program."

Representing the miners' point of view, Donald Lipe, a geologist and chairman of the National Min-

ers Advisory Board, said "a way of life for hundreds of thousands of citizens and a national asset for America would be destroyed by imprudent changes."

## Rodeo arena leaks money

Fair board tries to find why more fans attend but fewer are paying

FILER — From the look of the grandstands, a good crowd turned out for the rodeo Wednesday night, but the event made less in general admission ticket sales than it did the same night last year.

That decline in ticket income had Twin Falls County Fair and Rodeo Board members and staff scratching their heads at their informal Thursday noon meeting.

"I could have sworn there was 2,000 people in there," Fair Manager Cindy Demoney said.

The fair's professional rodeo lost \$20,000 last year. Wednesday's general admission take was \$1,490, compared with last year's \$1,822.

Rodeo general admission Wednesday through Friday is \$1.





### Weather summary

The National Weather Service says Idaho was situated between a low-pressure center off the West Coast and high pressure over the central states Thursday.

Surges of moisture were moving northeast across the southern and central portions of the state, while a drier westerly flow remained over the north.

Widespread thunderstorms developed over the southern two-thirds of the state Thursday afternoon. Rainfall was light; mostly scattered showers covered the panhandle.

Temperatures remained on the warm side with most afternoon readings in the 80s to lower 90s. The coolest mid-afternoon "report" was 74 degrees at McCall, while Lewiston had reached 95.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 99 degrees at Lewiston. Yellow Pine reported the coldest at 73 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the hottest temperature was 106 degrees at Borrego Springs, Calif. The lowest was 36 at Wisdom, Mont.

### Storms drench Minnesota, Wisconsin; heat holds on

Minnesota and Wisconsin were drenched Thursday, leaving some spots under 18 inches of water, and areas in the Midwest and South baked in oppressive triple-digit heat and high humidity.

Thunderstorms were active during the morning, and thunderstorm winds caused damage near Constantine, Mich. Heavy rain from strong thunderstorms flooded roads and department stores across northern Minnesota and northwest Wisconsin.

In Minnesota, 18 inches of water covered roads in Morgan Park and several roads in southern St. Louis County were washed out. Water was waist deep on streets in Carlton County and some highways to Clouquet were closed.

Shows and thunderstorms continued into the afternoon in northern Ohio, southern Lower Michigan, northern Wisconsin and southern Upper Michigan, as well as along the Texas Gulf Coast, the Louisiana coast, and the Florida peninsula.

the booth. Scott said fair personnel had told volunteers manning the anti-abortion booth to either turn off the videotape or turn the screen.

Because it was too late to rearrange the booth, the organization elected to play fetal development videos and Right-to-Life commercials, Scott said.

"And she said she has heard no complaints about 'Silent Scream' or the booth's graphic posters of aborted fetuses. (One picture shows a 20-week-old fetus burned by a saline abortion.)

"No, we've had so many wonderful responses," she said. "We agree that it's not pretty, it's not fun. We're just showing real life. We're just trying to educate people."

Some people have brought children to watch the video, she said.

At the noon meeting, Fair Board member Dave Wood said he had heard several fairgoers complain about both abortion information booths at the fair, including the one operated by a group favoring legalized abortion.

Some people have suggested that a county fair is no place for such booths, Wood said.

Pam Lincoln, organizer of the abortion-rights group Magic Valley Citizens for Choice, disagreed.

"I think it's as appropriate as having Democrats and Republicans here," Lincoln said. "We're providing information on the issue."

She said several visitors to her booth had complained about the rival abortion booth with such comments as, "We're glad your booth is in such good taste. Between the movie and the pictures, it's a better choice."

The anti-abortion booth has copies of the controversial video "AIDS" on display and models showing fetal development.

Volunteers at the Citizens for Choice booth are dispensing calls and information line and selling bumper stickers and buttons.

Scott and her organization's board of directors will meet and might contest the Fair Board's decision.

## Wounded American faces detention by Iraq

WASHINGTON (AP) — An American trying to evade capture was shot and wounded by an Iraqi soldier in Kuwait, the State Department said Thursday.

Iraqi officials say the unidentified man, who will be discharged from the hospital within 24 hours, but will remain in their custody. They promise us consular access at that time, said agency spokesman Mark Dillon.

Dillon, attacking the Iraqis of "outrageous behavior," said the man was wounded in the forearm while trying to escape out of a window at his Kuwait apartment. The incident occurred as Iraq would be allowed to depart.

Naji al-Hadidi, director general of Iraq's Information Ministry, said in Baghdad that an Iraqi television crew was ready to go to Washington to interview Bush for a broadcast on state-run television.

Fitzwater said that wouldn't be necessary — "we'll produce it ourselves."

"Although we have not heard from Iraq directly, we accept their offer. The president will take a message to the Iraqi people in the next few days."

different classrooms for each subject, he said.

Other features of the middle school would include:

• Home economics room: While traditional home ec classes center around fixed and clothing, the new approach includes lessons on family life, child development, consumer buying, interior design, foods and clothing. Home economics classrooms would therefore be built with instructional alcoves for each subject.

• Gymnasium: The gym would be divided into two parts: a working gym for general sports with no bleachers and a much larger gym with moveable bleachers. A locker room would be built underneath the bleachers.

• Special education: This area is still under consideration because the Twin Falls district has initiated a pilot program in which special needs children are taught in their regular classrooms. Two central classrooms would probably be built for them.

• Music: The school would include two classrooms: a choral and general music room and a band and orchestra room. The school would also have practice rooms, an office and storage space.

Baker had estimated that it will cost \$1.2 billion for the troops to remain in the region through the rest of this year.

After the meeting, U.S. officials said the Saudis had agreed to pick up the tab for all in-country costs of the 100,000 U.S. troops now protecting the kingdom's borders. This would include fuel, water, transportation and other costs, they said.

Baker downplayed his pitch for money before arriving in Saudi Ara-

bia, emphasizing instead his diplomatic mission to strengthen and unify the international boycott of Iraq.

But Saudi Arabia — which has profited from oil prices hiked by the crisis — is the top potential donor on the Bush administration's wish list.

A senior administration official acknowledged Thursday that Saudi Arabia has reaped a "windfall" of profits from the current crisis.

**Nation****Briefly****Imposed mail slowdown opposed**

WASHINGTON — A Postal Service decision to slow-delivery of some first-class mail in the face of a new rate increase "is going over like a lead balloon," Postmaster General Anthony M. Frank was told Thursday.

Telling Americans that longer delivery times for some mail results in improved service is "doublespeak" — it doesn't compute, it doesn't jive," Rep. Glen English, D-Okl., said at a hearing by the House Government Operations subcommittee on government information.

Frank said the payout will be more consistent delivery time. Delaying some overnight deliveries will affect less than 3 percent of first-class mail, he said. "The result will be a win-win situation — improved mail service for our customers, and improved efficiency for the Postal Service."

**U.S. tentative on new drug policy**

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration on Thursday cautiously endorsed the Colombian government's offer to spare cocaine traffickers extradition to the United States if they surrender and confess their crimes.

"If the government and people of Colombia are now able to enforce their own laws against drug trafficking — prosecuting, convicting, and incarcerating those that break the law, we'll knock the better," Attorney General Dick Thornburgh said in a statement.

But Thornburgh warned that "if the so-called extradition fails to take advantage of this opportunity to surrender, confess their crimes, and serve jail sentences, we will continue to support Colombia's effort to arrest and extradite them to the United States for trial."

**Oil industry backs spill cleanup system**

WASHINGTON — A new corporation, backed by the oil industry, will spend \$800 million over the next five years on a nationwide system designed to clean up the worst oil spills, its president announced Thursday.

The cost is three times the original estimate of a petroleum industry task force which set up the Marine Spill Response Corp. Corporation President John D. Costello said the increases were necessary to do the job. The company plans to construct five regional centers in areas where major oil spills are most likely to occur: the New York/New Jersey area; Port Everglades, Fla., north of Miami; Lake Charles, La., near the Texas border; Port Hueneme, Calif., north of Los Angeles, and Seattle.

**U.S. capital spending predicted low**

WASHINGTON — American businesses plan to increase spending for new plants and equipment just 3.1 percent over 1990, the annual growth in three years, the government said Thursday.

Analysts said the Commerce Department survey shows that businesses remain leery of a softening economy and worried about falling profits. The department said the survey found businesses planning to spend \$526.9 billion for expansion and modernization this year, the fourth consecutive year of increased business investment.

**Police want tough gun law enacted**

WASHINGTON — Cleveland's police chief and other supporters of firearms controls on Thursday urged federal action to ban guns from schoolyards and nearby, but a federal official said such a law could not be enforced.

You have the power to restore confidence in the ability of government to safeguard our children, our nation's most valuable resource, Chief Edward P. Kowacic told a House subcommittee hearing on the plan. The measure, similar to one in an omnibus crime package approved by the Senate, calls for maximum five-year prison sentences for those bringing firearms within 1,000 feet of a schoolyard.

**Mapplethorpe charge going to trial**

CINCINNATI — A jury must decide whether an art gallery and its director broke obscenity laws by exhibiting five sexually graphic Robert Mapplethorpe photographs, a judge ruled Thursday.

Hamilton County Municipal Judge David J. Albaneese ordered Dennis Barrie and the Contemporary Arts Center to stand trial Sept. 24 on one misdemeanor charge each of pandering obscenity.

Barrie and the gallery already were scheduled to go on trial that day on one charge each of using children in material involving nudity. Albaneese said the trial, which will address the obscenity and nudity charges, could last 10 days.

**Drug czar enjoys an easy day**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The cake was the topper that drug control chief William Bennett was not going to face many tough questions from a key Democratic senator on the first anniversary of the war on drugs.

"It's been a year and I think you've made some great progress," Senate Judiciary Chairman Joseph R. Biden told Bennett after giving him the chocolate-frosted cake outside the hearing room.

Bennett had no problem with that assessment. The two also agreed that much remains to be done and that Congress must be pushed to provide the money for that war even as it faces other problems such as the Persian Gulf, the deficit, and the savings and loan crisis.

In fact, the most severe critic of the Republican administration's drug war was Sen. Arlen Specter, a Republican from Pennsylvania.

Like some House Democrats, Specter argued for dividing federal drug war money equally between law enforcement and treatment and education. The breakdown is now almost 70 percent for law enforcement, the rest for treatment and education.

President Bush and Bennett marked the first anniversary of the national drug control strategy

Wednesday with a white paper showing improvements in the drug war.

The statistics cited declines in emergency room admissions for cocaine and heroin, surveys showing Americans' increasing hostility toward illegal drugs and increases in prices for cocaine and decreases in its purity, indicating a reduction in supply.

The wholesale price of a kilo of cocaine now ranges from \$17,500 to \$35,000, up from a range of \$17,000 to \$25,000 last year.

But in 1984, Biden noted, the wholesale price was \$40,000 to \$50,000.

The number of cocaine-related emergency room visits declined slightly last year to 42,145, persons checked by the federal government.

Biden maintained that there were some emergency rooms that had only 10,248 cocaine-related cases in 1982.

But Biden, D-Del., took pains not to blame Bennett.

"The fact that the problem is still extremely bad is not a comment on what I consider the extremely good job you have been doing," Biden told him.

Bennett assured Biden that the drug issues remain a top priority for Bush, who said Wednesday that the issue "remains No. 1" for him despite the other crises that seem to preoccupy the White House these days.

"We're not saying the (drug) war is over," Bennett said. "We're certainly not saying it will be over soon."

SHARPE, Fla. (AP) — A judge

cited bizarre behavior as a reason to uphold a \$1 million bond on an assault charge for a young man suspected in the slayings of five college students in Gainesville.

Homicide task force investigators

were searching the 18-year-old's Gainesville apartment and car for clues to the slayings. But police cautioned he is only one of eight leading suspects and his brother said he's being made a scapegoat.

## Hospitals ready for casualties

**SAUDI ARABIA (AP)** — The U.S.-military-has-built-a-sophisticated network of medical facilities in the Saudi desert, including 15 hospitals that officials say are equipped to treat virtually any type of combat wound.

The hospitals include two medical ships being deployed in the Persian Gulf, along with 13 facilities spread out across the eastern province of the desert kingdom. Hundreds of doctors and nurses, who can perform anything from reconstructive heart surgery to orthopedic surgery, have been flown in to care for the estimated 60,000 U.S. troops so far deployed in Operation Desert Shield.

Washington says the American troops are here to defend Saudi Arabia in case of an attack by Iraq. The scope of the medical system clearly shows that officials want to be prepared should war break out.

"Our hospitals are just as capable, if not more capable, of doing anything we do in the states," Col. Jerome Faust, commander of the 44th Medical Brigade, said Thursday. His brigade runs the Army's hospitals in Saudi Arabia.

The Navy is building a 500-bed hospital in the desert. The state-of-the-art facility is housed in 20 air-conditioned canvas tents, which include intensive care units, an operating ward, and a laboratory and X-ray unit.

"We have it all. We're a little city," said Capt. Richard Mayo, the hospital's commander. "This is larger than any ground facility we had in Vietnam."

When fully staffed, the hospital will have a staff of 900, 800 of them medical personnel.

At another location, the Army is building a "bubble" hospital, a 200-bed facility with a pharmacy attached.

It is housed in a series of enter-pieler-shaped inflatable rubber structures that resemble giant inner tubes. A tube encloses beds and coils the interior.

About 1.5 million tons of equipment from America to help the wounded were shipped from the United States for this hospital.

Soldiers have worked mostly at night to set up the facility because of the searing daytime temperatures. Twenty doctors will eventually be assigned to it.

Like the others, the hospital will be almost exclusively for Americans. Saudis may be treated occasionally at U.S. facilities, but the kingdom has its own modern system of medical care.

Besides the hospitals, each military unit, such as a Marine brigade in the desert, has doctors and paramedics assigned to it. In combat, their role is to keep wounded soldiers alive until they can be taken to a hospital.

## U.S. allies offer encouragement, little money for crisis

**SEOUL, South Korea** — While Saddam Hussein has given new urgency to an old debate over whether America's friends should bear more of the burden for defending democracy, their response in the current crisis has been far from overwhelming.

Treasury Secretary Nicholas Brady is on an 18,500-mile odyssey that has taken him from Europe to Asia in search of economic assistance, while Secretary of State James A. Baker III launched his own Middle East fund-raising mission Thursday in the Saudi Arabian capital of Jidda.

The two cabinet members are seeking aid to defray the high cost of keeping a protective U.S. military shield on the Saudi-Kuwait border.

Following meetings in Paris and London, Brady insisted he was getting strong words of encouragement, especially from British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher.

But while the words have been effusive, the flow of money has not.

Neither the French nor the British committed to specific dollar amounts and officials of the 12-nation European Community were scheduled to take up the question of increased assistance at a meeting

Friday.

While one official traveling with Brady on the flight from London to Seoul said it would not be unreasonable for the allies to pick up the entire \$1 billion monthly cost of the U.S. troop buildup, that statement was viewed more as a negotiating ploy than a reasonable expectation of the outcome.

For one thing, the Brady delegation faced an even harder sell in meetings Friday with South Korean President Roh Tae-woo and Japanese Prime Minister Toshiki

Kaiju. The administration is turning to the two economic powerhouses in Asia for support since both nations depend heavily on Middle Eastern oil.

Japan has pledged \$1 billion to support the troop buildup, but did so only after Bush made a personal call to Kaiju.

The administration says privately what critics in Congress are saying openly — that Japan should do much more, given the size of its economy.

### Analysis

The current debate has echoes that reach back to the height of the Cold War, when critics contended that America's huge military burden was diverting resources from critical areas such as making the investments needed to boost productivity.

Japan and other countries without large military obligations were getting a free ride, the argument went, allowing them to make the enormous investments needed to compete effectively in the world marketplace.

In dispatching Brady and Bush on such money missions, President Bush declared that the "shape of the post-WWII world" was at stake in the Persian Gulf crisis.

What he left unsaid was that America, hobbled by a sluggish economy and a huge mountain of debt, can no longer afford to go it alone.

But officials traveling with Brady insist that the fund-raising effort would make sense even if the administration weren't bedeviled by the mammoth budget deficit.

They note that when the European Community dismantles its economic barriers in 1992, the combined economies of its dozen members will equal America's \$5 trillion annual gross national product.

And whatever might be dividing GNP could well surpass that of the United States by the end of this decade.

"We live in a changing world, whether there is a budget deficit or not," said one senior official traveling with Brady who spoke on condition that he not be named. "In that changed world, we Americans have a right to expect that the burdens will be shared more appropriately."

Despite the lukewarm public response from countries being targeted for aid, other forces could prod the allies to do more.

For one thing, Japan risks triggering an avalanche of resentment in its biggest foreign market unless it pays a bigger share.

In addition, there is a belief that the allies cannot afford to waiver in this effort, given the threat posed by Iraqi President Saddam Hussein.

Both the Brady and Baker missions were designed as highly visible campaigns to demonstrate that the allies are a united force, thus raising the stakes considerably if there is a perceived failure.

"One of the most important audiences for this whole thing is Saddam Hussein," said another official on Brady's plane who spoke on background. "We need to let him see that this is not one country or a couple of countries, but it really is the whole world."







### China typhoon death toll reaches 106

BEIJING — The death toll in two coastal provinces battered last week by Typhoon Abe has reached 106, an official report said Thursday.

Another 40 people were missing and 850 were injured in the typhoon, the sixth major storm to hit the southeast coast this summer, according to the report in China Daily.

Abe came ashore one week ago in south Zhejiang province. It hit Shanghai, China's most populous city, and the neighboring provinces of Jiangsu and Anhui.

About 70,000 people were stranded by floods. Strong winds and a heavy downpour halted the Zhejiang-Jiangxi railway for 10 hours.

### Gummen kill 5 at S. Africa train station

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — Two gunmen opened fire on a crowded train platform, killing five people and wounding nine, police said Thursday. Violence also continued in black townships.

Col. Frans Malherbe said the attackers had been shooting "for no rhyme or reason" at the Jetje station in Johannesburg. "They didn't say anything," Malherbe said. "They just walked up and opened fire."

Earlier, police in the township of Soweto fired tear gas and shot guns to disperse rival black factions in street clashes. Police said at least one person was stabbed to death and 16 were injured.

### Korean talks end on optimistic note

SEOUL, South Korea — The first round of historic talks between senior officials of North Korea and South Korea ended on a relatively upbeat note Thursday, with each side hinting at compromise in two areas where bitter disagreements have traditionally soured relations — U.N. membership and family exchanges.

No major agreement was announced after the close of the second day of deliberations between the prime ministers of each country and high-ranking political and military delegates.

### Aid to stranded Asians stalled by foulups

AZRAQ, Jordan (AP) — A nightmarish four-day aid conflict has stalled relief for 70,000 Asians from Save the Children.

Thousands of refugees, mostly from Bangladesh, India, Sri Lanka and others camped at Shalaan I, on a rocky, scorpion-infested plain, awaiting clearance to officially enter Jordan.

At the same time, UNHCR officials admitted privately that slow, inadequate "donor response" has turned what was hoped to be a rapid emergency airlift into a refugee crisis that could last at least six months.

In one instance, at this outpost east of Amman, Red Cross teams worked three days from dawn to dusk to erect a tent city for thousands of Asians awaiting a ride home. Now they have to move it.

Jordanian authorities said seaports would threaten an underground water source for Amman, 60 miles west, and ordered that the 300 tents be moved 11 miles away. That will take four days.

In another case, 83 tons of gift blankets, enough for 50,000 people, who left Shalaan I on Wednesday, sit in a New York warehouse described as despair and bedlam.

The Jordanian news agency reported that 605,000 refugees have crossed into Jordan since Iraq's Aug.

"These people are ready to march on Amman," Mrs. Salti said at a meeting of voluntary and church organizations trying to help. "They're that desperate."

### Attorney wants Youth Ranch to settle case

**JEROME** — An attorney says he will seek a financial settlement but will not file a law suit regarding an alleged rape this spring at the Southern Idaho Youth Center.

By not filing a public lawsuit, "I hope to keep the facts away from you and your readers," Bob Bartlett said. But, he added, "the family hasn't lied me."

Bartlett represents a teenage girl who filed a \$1 million tort claim in June alleging that she was raped while she was detained at the Southern Idaho Youth Center when an employee let a male detainee into her room unsupervised. She also charges that in an unrelated incident, she was put in a straitjacket and was denied access to education.

The claim, which was filed in Jerome and Twin Falls counties, has been ignored by the attorney general. Now Bartlett has filed a motion to have it dismissed.

The Weisell attorney said he will not file until he investigates and determines who can be held liable until negotiations become "hopeless."

The Southern Idaho Youth Center has since lost its license and is scheduled to close at midnight, Sept. 30.

### Charge against woman dropped in pipe-beating case

**TWIN FALLS** — A charge has been dropped against a woman who confessed to assaulting a man with a pipe last month.

The woman, Maryann Hayes, 27, had been extradited from Utah and appeared in court Thursday.

"Instead of being arraigned," however, Twin Falls County Deputy Prosecuting Attorney Julie L. Sturgill filed a motion to dismiss, which was signed by 5th District Magistrate Judge Melvin C. Edwards.

Despite her trial and witness confessions to this crime, further investigation has revealed she made "confessions to protect another person," Sturgill's motion says. "Investigation continues as to culpability of other party."

Two police detectives on the case could not be reached for comment.

The man who was assaulted, Robert Rytting, 23, was in poor but stable condition Thursday evening at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center, a nursing supervisor said.

Rytting was severely beaten in the head late at night Aug. 26 outside his Second Avenue West home. He was found about 12 hours later, unconscious and lying in weeds on Russet Street.

## Architects see high-tech school here

**TWIN FALLS** — A new, high-tech middle school in Twin Falls would make it easier to incorporate classroom instruction with practical learning, as architect designing the proposed structure says.

Not only would teachers have a professional planning center for inservice training and conferences, but classes in related subjects would be grouped together to encourage coordination of curriculum, said Jay Christoperson, educational architect, for Design West Architects of Boise.

Christoperson and a few other architects have been listening to Twin Falls School District administrators, parents and teachers this week as they plan what form a proposed \$6 million middle school and a \$3 million high school auditorium and gymnasium will take.

The School Board will decide Tuesday when it will hold a bond issue election for the two projects.

The architects want to learn what educational and curriculum goals teachers and administrators have before they begin designing the structure.

What Christoperson is hearing from teachers and administrators fits into line with recent trends in school construction, he said. School systems are placing more emphasis on professional development of teachers and using technology in the classroom.

A large "professional planning center" would include space for two teachers to sit together in privacy and discuss students or classes.

An industrial science teacher and a business teacher, for example, could coordinate lesson plans so that the design of a shop project could be based on a market study in which students identify promising new products. An English lesson incorporating industrial writing techniques could also be used to increase the learning experience.

## Symms renews push for SDI program

### Events in Soviet Union, Persian Gulf are proof space shield is needed, he says

**WASHINGTON** — Idaho Sen. Steve Symms has returned from a fact-finding trip to the Soviet Union and the Middle East convinced that America needs as strong a defense as ever.

"If there's ever proof that we should go ahead with SDI (the Strategic Defense Initiative), it's what's going on in the Soviet Union today and what's going on in the Persian Gulf," Symms said Thursday during a telephone press conference with

Gulf events a concern

Idaho reporters.

The Republican senator accompanied a delegation headed by Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole on a trip that covered eight countries in 12 days and included a 90-minute meeting with Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

Symms said he found the Soviet leader "very impressive" but a "force to be reckoned with."

He also found Soviet citizens to be "good people," but the

"They're sitting on a powder keg, the way I see it," Symms said.

With the Soviet economy in shambles and the Communist Party cracking, Symms said the Soviet military is the only structure that's been left in place.

Soviet troops may be young, war-weary and unable to win in a conventional combat situation, but Symms said the Soviets continue to build missiles capable of delivering nuclear warheads.

If Soviet unrest should lead to civil war, there's a good chance the hard-line military leadership could take over and abolish recent reforms, he said.

The Associated Press reported Thursday that President Bush may be willing to offer Gorbachev financial help for his ailing economy during their weekend meeting in Helsinki, Finland.

Symms could not vote that kind of aid. "Not to prop up this government," he said.

Instead of American dollars, Symms said the Soviets could benefit from American know-how.

"If we had 5 percent of who spoke Russian, we could go over there and turn the country around overnight," he said.

Symms said he doesn't think the United States could ever

spend itself into the kind of economic collapse the Soviets are

now experiencing — even with the current military commitment

in the Persian Gulf.

## Friedman Airport fire protection still not settled

**HAILEY** — Exactly who, if anyone, will provide quick-response fire fighting for commercial airlines using Friedman Memorial Airport is still up in the air.

Hailey's volunteer firefighting crews won't provide service after Sept. 15 and alternative arrangements have yet to be made.

The Blaine County Airport Commission must reach a decision within a week or the Federal Aviation Administration may pull a half-dozen airlines servicing Sun Valley.

The city of Hailey notified the Airport Board last month that its volunteer fire fighters can no longer provide immediate

response to the airport during off hours.

Since June, Hailey has been staffing the airport with two volunteer firefighters, one incoming and outgoing shift nights not covered by trained airport personnel.

At the August Airport Board meeting,

Hailey proposed that four full-time professional firefighters be hired at a cost of \$132,000 annually. These costs would be passed on to Horizon Airlines and Skywest Airlines — and any other commercial providers under the proposal.

The firemen would be stationed at the airport in order to comply with FAA regulations, which require a three minute or less response time for crash, fire and rescue emergencies for commercial airlines.

Hailey, meanwhile, has scaled down its request for four full-time firefighters to cover off hours — now city officials say two would be sufficient.

Hailey City Administrator Daryl James

said this is only a temporary fix, however, aimed at cutting the original \$132,000 price tag to \$78,000 for the airline.

He said Hailey still feels this would not provide adequate fire response, though the FAA does not require two people to staff the fire truck, James said. He said the public deserves two men ready and available for all incoming and outgoing flights.

The city is not going to turn over first fire suppression control to Horizon baggage handlers, James said after the meeting.

James said that if a contract with the city is not in place by Sept. 15, the city would be forced to due to liability concerns — to contact the FAA about Hailey's discontinuance of standby fire protection, a move which would cause declassification for the com-

# Castleford Council approves \$90,000 city budget for 1990-91

**CASTLEFORD** — The City Council approved an \$80,026 1990-1991 budget after holding a public hearing Wednesday and discussed the possibility of selling the town's community center.

The budget is down \$165 from last year's budget of \$80,291. City salaries remain unchanged, although the council did vote to increase the volunteer firemen's wages — they will receive between \$6 and \$8 for each hour spent fighting city fires.

The city's reserve and investment fund is still low because of extensive repairs that were made to the city water tank two years ago.

The council would like to sell the

community center and use the proceeds to build up the reserve and investment funds as protection against any major repairs that may occur in the future.

City Clerk Patsy Kinney explained that the city is required by the Farmers Home Administration to keep an additional \$20,000 payment for its water and sewer loans in the reserve and investment fund. The city has tried to keep it, but only

"if we have a major problem we'll do it," she said, and Mayor Michael Schlund said:

"The city is not looking to make money on this. All we want is to keep our heads above water and get back the money the city put into the building."

Schlund said the council would

consider the building as an alternative to raising water and sewer fees and taxes, something the council does not want to do, "because we have a lot of senior citizens in town living on fixed incomes."

The council discussed selling the building last year but didn't agree on a position from local residents — primarily members of the local garage who gave it to the city when the group disbanded in 1984.

The city, after spending more than \$17,000 remodeling the old building, is still trying to gather this year because the water system is rented and maintenance costs far outweighed any income the building brought in.

The council asked the board of directors of the Red Barrel — a private gathering place in town — to transfer its programs to the center and then

make use of the building, but the Red Barrel Board declined.

The city also wanted to use the city's free blood-pressure clinics, eye exams, and other medical checkups, but could find no one willing to move to Castleford to do so.

Because the community doesn't use the building, several former garage members present at the meeting agreed that the city has no alter-

native but to sell.

The city will pass an ordinance at its October meeting stating the city's intent to sell the building.

The city then must wait 60 days before selling the building at public auction to give city residents against the sale enough time to circulate petitions.

The council also made some decisions regarding water and sewer bills.

Any checks for water and sewer fees that are returned to the city for insufficient funds will cost the writer a \$10 service fee.

And the city will shut off water to residents who haven't paid their water and sewer bills for two consecutive months.

To have their water turned on again, those residents will have to pay a \$10 on-set fee in addition to paying the past unpaid bills.

the building as an alternative to raising water and sewer fees and taxes, something the council does not want to do, "because we have a lot of senior citizens in town living on fixed incomes."

And the city will shut off water to residents who haven't paid their water and sewer bills for two consecutive months.

To have their water turned on again, those residents will have to pay a \$10 on-set fee in addition to paying the past unpaid bills.

ASHTON — The Idaho Foundation of Parks and Lands Board is looking into the possibility of turning the abandoned railroad spur between Ashton and Tetonia in eastern Idaho into the third-longest excursion line in the nation.

"The board is doing its homework to determine the cost and risk factors involved," said Ashton businessman Darrell Reinke, who first raised the possibility of converting the 30.8-mile line into a tourist attraction.

The board has set up a six-member committee to investigate the feasibility of the plan over the next six weeks.

Union Pacific Railroad, which abandoned the line, has endorsed the proposal, spokesman John Bromley said.

**Critics want hydro project stopped**

ASHTON — More than a year after a hydroelectric project on Fall River received the green light from the federal government critics are trying to put the brakes on it.

Opponents of the Fall River Hydroelectric Project about 11 miles east of Ashton are asking Federal Energy Regulatory Commission officials to take another look at recreation use along the river.

"We believe the data they were given were very inaccurate," said John Ochi, an Idaho Falls kayaker. Ochi is a member of Friends of Fall River, a group formed recently to fight the project. MOSCOW — Demands on Idaho's natural resources and beauty, especially from the exploding tourism industry, are not only benefiting the state treasury but changing a way of life in many of the small towns scattered throughout the state.

And the University of Idaho's College of Forestry is modifying its focus to accommodate not only the traditional concerns of trees, water and range but also people, and lots of them.

The school's initial effort is focused on a \$140,000 proposal being reviewed by the state Board of Education to develop a program in natural resource-based tourism. The Department of Wildland Recreation Management has already been renamed the Department of Resource Recreation and Tourism.

**Craig named to environmental 'Dirty Dozen'**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republican Congressman Larry Craig on Thursday became the third member of the state's congressional delegation to be named to the biennial "Dirty Dozen" list of the Washington-based Environmental Action group.

The five-term congressman, facing Democrat Ron Twelker for the seat of retiring Republican U.S. Sen. James McClure, received a zero rating on 11 specific votes cited by the environmental group during the current Congress. He was absent for the 12th vote used by the group in its ratings.

"As a member of the Interior Committee, Craig has been a relentless crusader for the user interests that exploit taxpayers and public lands with their ranching, mining and lumbering," said Environmental Action Director Ruth Caplan.

But Craig spokesman David Fish suggested it was obvious that the positions taken by Environmental Action on some issues like water rights and predator control run counter to those held by the majority of Idahoans while Craig has voted to protect water rights, jobs and land.

"If they support giving away Idaho's water rights, I think Idahoans would have some pretty big questions about them," Fish said.

"We face a challenge in Idaho,

and that is striking a balance that protects jobs and our quality of life," he said.

Larry Craig has the experience to strike that balance,"

Twelker, however, said the designation is just the latest piece of evidence against Craig's environmental record, citing dismal ratings his opponent has received from the League of Conservation Voters and the League of Idaho Conservation voters.

"This is pretty consistent stuff," Twelker said. "They all think Larry Craig is anti-outdoors and anti-fish. ... He likes to talk about how open minded he is about balancing all interests." The only interests he really remembers when it comes to vote are his own and those of his big business buddies and high-octane gas company contributors.

"If they support giving away Idaho's water rights, I think Idahoans would have some pretty big questions about them," Fish said.

"We face a challenge in Idaho, and that is striking a balance that protects jobs and our quality of life," he said.

"Larry Craig has the experi-

ence to strike that balance."

Craig also criticized Craig for what she said was an attempt to weaken the Endangered Species Act.

Craig was placed on the list in the face of the spotted owl controversy, engineering a shift in responsibility of the predator control program that she claimed has resulted in increased official executions

of animals such as mountain lions and coyotes and backing major cuts in financial support for water pollution control programs.

Republican Sen. Steve Symms has been named to the list twice, in 1976 while in the House and again in 1986 while running for re-election to the Senate.

The other Idaho congressional delegation member named to the Dirty Dozen list was former GOP Rep. George Hansen in 1976.

The list is published just before each biennial general election and includes only members of Congress on the ballot that fall. The last three listed included only two Democrats.

Democratic Sen. Howell Heflin of Alabama was the only Democrat on the 1990 list. The other Republicans were Sens. Alan Simpson of Wyoming and Mitch McConnell of Kentucky and Reps. Bob Michel of Illinois, William Dannemeyer of California, Arlen Specter of Pennsylvania, Clyde Holloway of Louisiana, Stan

Parris of Virginia, Denny Smith of Oregon, James Inhofe of Oklahoma and Bill Frist of Missouri.

Craig was placed on the list for opposing legislation urging President Bush to negotiate a plutonium production cut treaty with the Soviet Union and for supporting legislation that would:

• Protect federal facilities from fines for pollution.

• Continue plutonium processing at Rocky Flats.

• Enforce federal law above state law in oil spill liability.

• Maintain a higher standard oil spillers must meet before being liable for the full cost of cleanup.

• Deny the Environmental Protection Agency cabinet status.

• Retain a mandated timber-cutting level and \$50 million in timber subsidies in Alaska's Tongass National Forest.

• Overturn a court requirement that federal wilderness land be given specific water rights.

• Increase acreage limits eligible for receiving federally subsidized irrigation water.

• Prohibit the federal government from condemning lands for wilderness areas without landowner consent.

• Cut support for the United Nations Population Fund by \$815 million.

**Agency will review salmon species' status**

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The National Marine Fisheries Service has decided to accept petitions requesting that four wild stocks of chinook salmon and one stock of coho salmon be added to the federal threatened or endangered species list.

The decision Wednesday begins a status review by the agency, which must be completed by June 7, 1991. Then it will decide whether to propose listing the species as endangered or threatened, with a final de-

cision due by June of 1992.

Gov. Cecil Andrus said Thursday Idaho has been pushing for measures to enhance wild salmon into Idaho. But the federal decision to study listing forces the state to shift focus elsewhere.

"I am hoping they would not, but I'm not surprised," Andrus said.

"Now we have to get together the scientific data to keep the salmon," off the Endangered Species List.

Petitions submitted by Oregon Trout and other environmental and

sportsmen's groups ask for federal protection for spring, summer and fall chinook salmon that run up the Snake River and its tributaries, including the Salmon River. They also request protection for coho salmon in the lower Columbia River.

Michael E. Tillman, deputy assistant administrator for fisheries, determined that the petitions present substantial scientific information indicating that listing may be warranted.

Agency officials said a submission outlining the decision.

The public and other agencies have 60 days following its publication in the Federal Register to submit comments.

During this time, scientists are asked to present information on several technical issues, including definition of the distinct salmon populations that qualify as a species.

### Editorial

#### Andrus, others should see drug funds distributed fairly

The Magic Valley is making do with less federal money to fight drugs than a lot of other areas in Idaho - a lot less. Kootenai County, population 67,300, received \$188,000 this year for its anti-drug efforts.

The entire Magic Valley, population 155,000, received \$80,000 for the same period.

The state Criminal Justice Council, which divides federal drug enforcement money among cities and counties in Idaho, makes its decisions based upon grant proposals written by local and regional law enforcement agencies and task forces. Bonneville County, population 72,000, asked for \$134,000 and got every penny of it.

The Magic Valley Drug Task force, by contrast, asked for \$224,000 and got 36 percent of it.

There were problems with the Magic Valley application requests for \$23,000 for furniture, and a 12-fold increase in funding would have been better. The fact that

the task force was reorganized in the fourth and final year of the grant cycle didn't help the Magic Valley's chances of getting more money.

But the fact remains that 15.5 percent of the state's population is getting 6.2 percent of the federal money available for fighting drugs.

And there's no question the Magic Valley needs the money.

Merrill Kelley, special agent for Region IV of the Idaho State Bureau of Narcotics, reports that his agency is making

more importantly, those dollars mean manpower, which is the real key to drug enforcement. The Magic Valley Drug Task Force has two full-time investigators, which is two more than it had four years ago, but that's not enough to cover 11,572 square miles.

Four agencies represented on the state Criminal Justice Council got 37 percent of the money available to local task forces this year. The Magic Valley doesn't have a representative on the council, but that shouldn't matter.

What matters is that we have a big and growing drug problem and less than our share of the federal dollars available to fight it. That's a matter for the governor and the Legislature to rectify in the future.

This will be accomplished through meetings with agricultural, business and civic groups, parent/teacher organizations, use of the media and open public meetings.

The proposal that will go on the ballot is a carefully considered one.

It is the result of nearly two years of study

with input from virtually every segment of our community. Specifically, the school district recognized that there was a need for new and expanded facilities in late 1988 and early 1989.

Based on this recognition of need, the board appointed a committee on Feb. 14, 1989, to study the facility problems and needs of our district (the facilities committee).

This committee was comprised of seven members from the community and seven members from the school district.

The committee met on a regular basis and submitted its recommendations and findings to the board on Dec. 6, 1989. One of the specific recommendations from this committee was that the board should develop a

comprehensive (strategic) plan to meet the educational needs of the students in this district for five to ten years into the future.

During this same period of time, the board was studying other alternatives to help alleviate the facilities' overcrowding that we were then experiencing.

We considered year-round schools, split sessions of school and the utilization of portable classrooms.

The district ultimately purchased six portable classrooms for this school year at a total cost of approximately \$250,000.

The board was also studying and developing curriculum changes to enhance every student's educational opportunities, including the presentation of that curriculum in a different forum such as middle schools.

All of this was done at regularly noticed open public meetings of the board.

After receipt of the facilities committee's report in December 1989, the board appoint-

ed another community/school committee to undertake the task of refining the recommendations presented by the facilities committee.

This committee was to recommend solutions to rectify the problems existing in the district on a short-term basis and also incorporate a long-range plan that would be effective to assist this district through the year 2000.

This is exactly what was accomplished by this committee and is the basis of the bond issue which will be presented to the district voters.

The people who served on the planning committee again represented every segment of this community.

There were representatives from the school/parent organizations, teachers, administrators, business people, farmers and board representatives at this meeting.

It was only a closed-door meeting to the

media.

There never has been anything secretive or hidden about this process.

We have attempted, as a board, to openly discuss the problems we are facing, the approaches we anticipated taking to resolve these problems and the committees which we established to help us through this process. The input of the public has always been encouraged and even solicited.

The board has been very deliberate in developing this proposal over the past year and a half, and we believe there is ample time in which to fully inform all of the district voters of the needs of this district and the rationale behind the proposed solution for resolving those needs.

The board is not asking the district voters to rubber stamp a "hurry up" job.







"I see no way to have made the slam," announced South. "If I start the trumps, I go down quickly, and I can take the spade finesse. I go two down. Do you see anything I missed?"

Dummy's diamond queen was covered by the king and ace, and South saw the futility in starting trumps. Instead he overtook his club jack in dummy to try the spade finesse. Since one diamond discard from dummy would suffice, the slam would have made had the spade finesse worked. It lost, so the defenders got two more tricks — two down on a slam that should have been made.

It was true that dummy needed only one diamond discard while South needed two. Nevertheless, it was right for South to plan for cards from his own hand.

At trick two, he overtook his club jack, dummy and cashes a second high club, discarding a diamond. A third high club follows. East interrupts things by ruffing No trump. South overruffs, cashes the spade ruff, has a spade in dummy and leads ♦A from his high club. This time East has no lead trump to interrupt South's plan. The defender gets only one trump, ace, and South has his 12 tricks.

## Arts on Tour has wide offerings

**TWIN FALLS** — Taking a cue from its 1990-1991 slogan, "It's off to a great season," Arts on Tour is wearing a few new hats this year in an attempt to draw more subscribers.

From folk music to mask theater to a family's presentation, Arts on Tour's five choices for its third season make up the most varied slate it has offered.

Arts on Tour also plans to tip its cap to families and other arts lovers on tight entertainment budgets. In part due to a grant from the Idaho Commission on the Arts, season ticket prices have been cut from \$38 to \$25 for general admission patrons. Students pay \$18 for the season.

Each subscriber buys dinner at a participating restaurant the night of the show, the other person's dinner will be half price.

Finally, curtain times have been shifted from 6 to 7:30 p.m. Several of the shows run on weekends, and Arts on Tour officials believe the earlier starting time will better suit people who go to work or school the next day.

Arts on Tour begins its season Sept. 28

with an appearance by Walt Michael and Company, an upstate New York-based quartet that specializes in traditional music spanning folk, Celtic, gospel and bluegrass styles. Like all Arts on Tour shows, it will be in Fine Arts Auditorium on the CSI campus.

Elwood believes Michael's appearance may help broaden Arts on Tour's reach.

"With Walt Michael, we're trying to sell to the country-Western audience," she says. "He's totally different than anything we've

## Fox Children's Network enters Saturday cartoons

There's a new player in the Saturday morning network television ballgame this fall, a rookie with all the tools. And while this might not be a can't-miss prospect, an immediate impact wouldn't surprise anyone.

The name is Fox. And it means business. Hardly looking the part of the gun-shy neophyte, the Fox-Children's-Network isn't merely sneaking on the air with a show or two, but is instead unveiling three hours and six shows' worth of programming in its freshman season that begins Saturday, Sept. 22.

Yes, this appears to be a network in for the long haul, committing better than \$100 million to producing original kids' programming for both Saturday mornings and weekday afternoons during the next four years.

It's hardly what NBC, ABC and CBS need at a time when Saturday morning viewership and advertising revenue are already on the decline. Fox is demanding room for our own at a loaded breakfast table — going from nothing to a massive effort in one fell swoop.

Of course, Fox doesn't necessarily see it quite that way.

"If we can provide good programming, we'll be a major player from day one," says

FOX (premiering Saturday): "Zaxoo U," an education-minded animated series of vignettes centered in a school staffed by dancing crayons, zany animals and rap singers.

"Tom and Jerry Kids," an animated sequel of sorts that finds the offspring of Tom and Jerry continuing to play the cat-and-mouse game of hot pursuit.

"Bobby's World," a live-action/animation entry about a 4-year-old boy (the voice of Howie Mandel) whose active imagination runs wild.

"Attack of the Killer Tomatoes," an animated takeoff on the 1977 cult horror film spoof, featuring tomatoes striking

back against a world that has outlawed tomato products.

"Piggies-Pigs," about the goings-on in a town populated entirely by pigs (the radio station's call letters are OINK).

"Fox Run House," a live-action game show of physical and mental challenges taking place inside a high-tech fun house.

NBC (premiering Saturday):

"Camp Candy," about an animated character created in the image of comic actor John Candy who owns a camp.

"Captain N and the Adventures of Super Mario 3," an adventure hour based on characters from the popular Nintendo games.

Fox Children's Network President Margaret Loesch said: "I think we have good programming."

What I say and Fox hope to add to the Saturday morning mix are "alternatives," riskier things that are original and extremely offbeat. It obviously wouldn't pay us to do another 'Beetlejuice.'

The Fox debut lineup includes

"Tom and Jerry Kids," the zany "Attack of the Killer Tomatoes," the slapstick "Piggies-Pigs," the off-center "Bobby's World" and the outrageous game show "Fox Fun House."

Fox also hopes to build excitement for its Saturday morning schedule (and weekday afternoon cartoon series "Peter Pan and the Pirates") by enrolling viewers in a free-of-

charge Fox Kids Club that sends members

a package of goodies and newsletters as well as the quarterly magazine, Today Kids.

Already, more than 2 million kids have reportedly signed up.

"We plan to listen to the kids who watch us and respond to their likes and dislikes in what we program," Loesch says. "The kids in this club will be a real voice."

Of course, Fox isn't the only network unveiling a new Saturday morning season this fall — merely the latest. NBC and top-rated ABC trod out their new and returning shows — like Fox — Saturday, while CBS goes on Sept. 15.

If there's any sort of trend afoot on the Saturday children's landscape, it would be the animated adventures of real-life stars.

Three such shows make their debuts this season with NBC's "Camp Candy" (featuring the cartoon likenesses of John Candy) and "Rick Moranis in Gravedale High" and ABC's "Little Rosey" (starring a 10-year-old animated Roseanne Barr).

NBC would also like to see another trend emerge — that of the successful live-action comedy aimed at teens.

Of the networks, only NBC appears serious about trying new forms apart from the typical animated and semi-animated kiddie fare. If its five hours of original Saturday morning programming this fall, two hours

## Badly chosen movie details sometimes bomb

LOS ANGELES — Details, details: Take a film that cost a reported \$30 million to make, get one tiny thing wrong and what do you have?

Call it the great phone faux pas. It's a serious scene in "Die Hard 2" where Bruce Willis, the earnest terrorist-punter, puts a coin in an airport pay phone clearly marked as the property of Pacific Bell, the California telecommunications company.

Except that the film is set at Dulles International Airport, which is located on the outskirts of Washington, D.C. The blunder draws an audience groan every time.

"Movies are (generally) so well-done, so expertly crafted," says entertainment journalist Bill Givens, author of the upcoming book "Film Flubs," "that when something stands out and is glaringly wrong, you can't help but notice. And usually laugh."

From 1950s Westerns undone by the slow crawl of an airplane across the corner of the frame to the two-Jake-1940s ambience imposed by the sight of a 1980s "bulk cash" machine, containing gofies, as they're called in the film industry, there are nothing new in "Die Hard 2." Delinquency is only, one of many in this summer's crop of movies.

It's the most overt movie mistake of the summer, Givens says. Premium

cinema, he notes, is about subtlety. The Geffen Squad, a regular feature dedicated to spotlighting movie foul-ups, bleeds and blunders. People really seem to be aware of it.

Who's to blame? The film's producer (the airport scene was shot in Los Angeles, thus the Pacific Bell phone); maybe. Or the film's continuity director, who's responsible for matching the action and detail of a movie from scene to scene. 20th Century Fox, distributor of the film, has refused to comment on the boo-boo. Ditto the film's director, Renny Har-

lin: "Comedie" at a press junket a few weeks ago, he smiled, shook his head and threw up his hands as if to say, "Mistakes happen."

Indeed they do. "We had a lot to pick and choose from recently," says columnist Medich. "For some reason, there seem to be a lot of noticeable mistakes in this year's summer movies."

Take, for instance, "The Case of the Clay-Free Hands." It's a romantic scene from "Ghost." Kristin Scott Thomas is sculpting a clay figure, her hands filthy. Her absent friend, a boxer, rounds the hub of Patrick Swayze, who then trots over. She's Moaning Myrtle, and her hands are filthy, too. A pained expression creases her face as she begins to kiss him. The camera pans back to the lovers, their hands and arms now miraculously cleaned up.

According to Givens, whose chronicle of continuity calamity is being released this month (Citadel, \$6.95), one of the first screen foul-ups occurred in the 1940s Griffith classic "Intolerance,"

film set in ancient times. "Look very closely at the scene where the masses storm Babylon in period attire," says Givens. "In the corner frame you can very clearly see the assistant director wearing a suit and tie."

According to Givens, screen mistakes are easier to spot in thrillers than they are in "video" (the detail is often too small); he says, or the frame has been shrunk and the mistake lost). # Polish-born pop star Basia finds sudden success a little traumatic

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Nothing she did the past 10 years, Basia says now, prepared her to become an overnight sensation.

There was the obligatory dues paying: the years of belting out jingles for commercials, back-up other vocalists, slugging for "Top 40" groups in the United States and England. There was even her first album, "Time and Tide," that seemed to grow slowly but surely on a worldwide audience.

But then came a second hit album, "London-Warsaw-New York," and a frenetic world tour that has turned every night upside down.

"It's been traumatic so far," the Polish-born pop singer, whose full name is Basia Trzetrzelewska, said with a giggle. But it's been a good kind of trauma, the bucolic young woman confided.

And even a recent bout with a virus that forced her to cancel two shows on her U.S. tour and left her normally languard voice slightly raspy couldn't dampen her spirits during a recent phone interview from Chicago.

## Hollywood hopes fall will put end to slump that has decreased box-office take by 12%

These construction crews parked outside the major Hollywood studios have their work cut out for them. They're trying to shore up and salvage what's left of 1990. So far, the first year of the new decade has proved unbelievably shaky.

After eight months of empty hype (most of it surrounding Tom Cruise's "Days of Thunder") and box-office fizzes ("Another '48" chose them), the industry has decided to tuck in its chin, plant its feet and get serious. But it's too late to come battling back from a 12 percent slump at the box office? In June, according to Variety, 40 million fewer people went to the movies than in the equivalent period in '89.

Not to make anyone nervous, but a lot is riding on the next four months. All of the top Oscar contenders, for starters, with the possible exception of long-shot "After Dark," "My Sweet" leaps to mind.

If this performance-drought continues, Oscar will have to hang out to sign reading: "Cancelled. Due to lack of interest." Thank goodness,

then, for the old reliables, such as "A Star Is Born" (Robert De Niro, Shirley MacLaine and Meryl Streep). Like

the 7th Cavalry, they're about to come charging back to save us from the next wave of "Batman" super-heroes.

In the months ahead, there will be 60-some movies from which to choose. They will carry such up-to-the-minute titles as "Postcards From the Edge," "Desperate Hours" and "Misery." They will not need us to be impressed with hope, reassurance and soft-focus sentiment. The opposite. They will give us pure suspense, the attempt to undermine your ready, shaky sense of security. No less than six entries, including "The Thin Tightrope," "Night of the Living Dead," another "Dempsey and Make-Believe," "John Hughes' factual "Home Alone," "The Tall Guy" will show heart-coaster's worth of dips and hairpin turns under siege from escaped curvies as Hollywood again considers its bigots, graft, familial betrayals, war guilt and the like. You choose.

The fall and winter months are traditionally a time of reflection. It is "White Palace," "Hot Spots," "The Crossing," "GoodFellas" and "Last Emperor" and "Driving-Miss Daisy," two prestige productions that we were introduced to in "The Krays" and "The Kray's," comedic battles of wills ("Sibling Rivalry

# Music is still king for Cab Calloway

At 82, legendary singer keeps classic jazz alive

**LOS ANGELES (AP) —** Don't bring up all that legend stuff with Cab Calloway.

He's not in the mood. Yeah. He's been around. How many years now? Well, just say 60 if you need a number. But that's not important.

"What's important is the music. It's what keeps the 82-year-old 'Hi-de-ho' king on the road and away from his home in White Plains, N.Y., much of the year."

It doesn't matter what town he's in anymore. Just find a spot and a band and he'll be there. He was in Europe in the spring. He's been all over the United States this summer.

"It doesn't mean anything to me; it's just part of the routine," Calloway said when asked if he was looking forward to two recent performances at the Hollywood Bowl. "I just wasn't here. I just be out of place else this weekend."

Sound harsh? Perhaps, but after all the guys in legend stuff will bug him to admit it. One could tell by the awe-struck looks on the faces of the musicians whom he glided out on stage during rehearsal, just like one of those old black-and-white film clips from the 1930s.

One could see it again when he sang "Minnie the Moocher" when he held that last note on "St. James Infirmary," longer than a human being ought to be allowed to, when he swayed and strayed around stage like some nimble tightrope walker.

Those moves have slowed a bit since the '30s, a time when Calloway, quote, "had danced Michael Jackson or Mick Jagger into the ground." And maybe the hair is white and thinner now, the mid-section hunker and that classically handsome face lined and puffy after eight decades of full-throttle living. But every bit of his voice is still there and every bit of the style and grace that made the legend.

So ask him who some of his own musical legends are.

"Nobody," he answers tartly.

No, really. "I don't know — it's been too long," he finally offers. As he does, he peers off into space as if to recall those wonderful days when jazz was king, these days of Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, Dizzy Gillespie, Lena Horne and others. He worked with them all.

"No, I'll tell you who my heroes are," he finally says, wheeling around to face his interviewer. "My heroes are the notes, man. The music itself. You understand what I'm saying? I love the music. The music is my hero."

Indeed, Calloway, who was born

Cabell Calloway on Christmas Day

in Rochester, N.Y., gave up a law career for music. His old Lincoln University classmate, Thurgood

Marshall, stayed in school and made quite a name for himself on the U.S. Supreme Court.

"Yeah," Calloway says, smiling at the memory. "I went to high school with him, too. He's a good guy."

"I was studying law and I got involved in music, so I put the law career down for music."

Any regrets?

"Nah, but it wouldn't matter much now, would it?"

The music started in earnest sometime in the '20s, when he became a part-time singer in Baltimore and joined an all-male quartet in the revue "Plantation Days."

"Really, I do," remembers Cal

laway laughs when pressed for more specifics. "I don't want to remember. It's been too many years to want to remember."

But it was in 1930, he concedes,

that he hooked up with another legend, Harlem's Cotton Club.

"They would band up there to follow Duke Ellington and they picked me, he says.

He took the fabled old night club by storm. So there were not only concerts but hit movies such as "Stormy Weather" and "Internation House" and a string of Broadway shows. He also found time to get married and have children. His daughter, Chris, is a singer who has performed with her father in recent years.

And always there was the music, one big-band aggregation of brilliant musicians after another, each led by the dressed-to-kill, dandy, the wild, leaping, gyrating band leader with the unbelievable voice. They cranked out such hits as "The Jumplin' Jive," "Rever Man," "It Ain't Necessarily So." They created musical styles that everybody else copied.

They first did "Minnie the Moocher" in 1931. More than a half-century later, people sing it all over the place. Even those who don't know they know it sing the chorus: "Hi-de-hi-de-ho-ho."

"I needed a theme song and I knew 'Minnie' would be a good one," Calloway says of the tune he wrote about the "lowdown hoochie koocher" with the heart as big as a whale. "It really doesn't mean anything."

But it made him the king of "hi-de-ho" and brought him success that didn't slow until the '50s. Even after there were more movies and plays, but rock and other musical forms crowded aside the big bands.

Then the Blues Brothers came along. Comedians Dan Aykroyd and John Belushi took to the stage as cheap-suited, sunken-looking, craggy rhythm and blues singers, mimicking the music they loved. When they put their act on the big screen, as "The Blues Brothers" movie, in 1980, Calloway went with them. He sang "Minnie the Moocher" and stole the show.

"I think a lot of the young people knew me," he says now. "They just didn't recognize me until 'The Blues Brothers' movie."

Now that they recognize him once again, he's in no mood to slow down. He'll perform for the public, he says. "Whenever they want me."

# 'The Jungle Book' offers a taste of what animation once was like

Glassy-eyed parents who've just barely managed to survive the blithering inanities and visual banalities of "Lessons: The Movie" are hereby given the following advice: Go see "The Jungle Book." It's remembered that animation used to be.

Live it up. You deserved it. The 1967 Disney film is nowhere near the shape of the Disney form either classic old school or sleek new (it's actually transitional); but it is lively, witty, tuneful and completely involving.

Like many another Disney project, this one has its roots in literature. It is derived loosely from Rudyard Kipling's great stories of Mowgli, the boy raised by wolves in the wilderness of the Indian subcontinent, and if I were writing in 1967 I'd probably be making a big pro-

duction of how once again the huckster Disney had trivialized a great writer by taking his quintessentially British sensibility and "fixing" it so that it can play in the American suburbs without a second thought.

Of course, that's all changed. "Ausing," isn't it, how in the '40s and '50s, critics used to dismiss Disney as a merchant of banalities who regularly looted and vandalized great art for commercial purposes; yet now, in our debauched era, that same "commercial" work seems like high class accomplishment, particularly in comparison to our feeble epoch's feeble efforts.

In any event, "Jungle Book," rated G, follows the Beavertlike Mowgli (he looks like Jerry Mathers on a bad color TV) on his way out of the jungle when it is learned by his fa-

thers the wolves that Shere Khan, the tiger, is back in the neighborhood. The dramatic tension is primitive: Innocent Mowgli can't imagine his death and wants to stay the wise wolves insist that he leave, for his racial enlightenment — ugliness — own good. (Actually, the Disney artists could have done much more with the majesty and nobility of the wolves, who remain undeveloped.)

Mowgli's companions are a panther — read by Sebastian Cabot — and a hipster bear — read by Phil Harris. In a wonderful bit of casting, the great-ironic dad-and-world-class rooster George Sanders reads Shere Khan, and the Disney artists have enormous fun getting nuances from

Sanders' great-sleazy bag of a face onto the tiger's ironic mug.

The songs are great, are neverthe less amusing as when orangutans played as Negroes, in a bit of pre-civil rights racial enlightenment — ugliness — own good. (Actually, the Disney artists could have done much more with the majesty and nobility of the wolves, who remain undeveloped.)

"The Bare Necessities," where his barey-rubbed, smoke-choked hipster's growl is far more resonant than the pristine imagery.

This universe, of course, is dead and basically unsavage: It is the jungle-as-60s-suburb.

## 'Total recall': Big on violence, special effects

The following are capsule reviews of movies now showing in the Magic Cinema, Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**TOTAL RECALL (R)** Extraordinary violent, top-heavy with its huge budget and special effects, this large-scale adaptation of Philip K. Dick's "I Can Remember It for You Wholesale" — about a dull earthling who flees out after memory-transplant and becomes immune to fear — is a weird science-fiction movie. Part of it is a standard-issue Arnold Schwarzenegger vehicle; part, a ribald comedy of psychosis, like director Paul Verhoeven's previous "The Fourth Man." Which part you enjoy, or dislike, is a matter of temperament.

**AMERICAN (R)** Roger Spottiswoode's high-style black comedy about the covert CIA's secret operations in S.E. Asia during the Vietnam War. It's often intoxicating in its combination of surreal junglescapes and "MASH"-style pranks, but the suspense is too late. The film is scaled too big for the tinker-toy ironies you're left with. Mel Gibson and Robert Downey star.

**ARACHNOPIHY (PG-13)** For a movie that plans to scare the kapok out of us, Frank Marshall's funny-scary prime-time screen of a comedy is a friendly and nicely witty affair technically, it's a wonder. It is the classic form, done on a grander scale: the blob-Man-in-spider from us, far away, that very nearly wiped out the perfect American culture. On the other hand, we have a very contemporary hero (a dryly humorous Jeff Daniels), unashamed enough to yell to his kids, "We need Mom in here to kill a spider."

**DARKMAN (R)** It's thinly plotted, predictable, garishly over-violent. But it's the best of all the recent comic book movies — indeed, the only one that really captures the look, feel and skewed-angle style of comics. Director Sam Raimi ("The Evil Dead") and his crew lavish prodigious visual gifts on this movie: a simple "origin" tale, with "Count of Monte-Cristo" overtones, in which a horribly disfigured scientist (Liam Neeson), who can change his face at will, seeks revenge on the criminal vermin (including surreally vicious Larry Drake) who destroyed his life.

**FLATLINERS (R)** Some lines shouldn't be crossed; some movies shouldn't be watched. No, that's too

feely cast and performed brilliantly by all, but especially by Harrison Ford, Bonnie Bedelia and Paul Williams. Scott Turow's fine will be pleased to know that screenwriter Frank Pierson and the film's director, Alan J. Pakula, have made an uncommonly sensitive adaptation of what's been called a bullet train of a book.

**PUMP UP THE VOLUME (R)** By day a mild-mannered Arizona student, by night a pirate radio Super Shock Jock broadcasting from his own bedroom, Christian Slater, doing another of his Jack Nicholson turns — gives Allan Moyle's teen-drama some insinuating pizzazz. But the movie isn't up to its own brave premise.



# 'Daring' is the word at CBS this season as network tries to get out of basement

By Christopher Hull

As the upcoming 1990-91 television season begins, CBS, firmly entrenched in the ratings basement, seems to be approaching it with daring, if not hubris. With NBC and ABC locked in a dogfight for No. 1, CBS has nothing to lose by trying out some new wings.

One of the new shows on the CBS schedule is "Uncle Buck" (Mondays). Based on the hit 1989 feature film, the half-hour comedy is about an uncouth, somewhat sloppy uncle who becomes the guardian of his brother's three children. The series is up against another promising new series: NBC's "Fresh Prince of Bel-Air," and ABC's "MacGyver," but as the lead-in for "Major Dad," "Murphy Brown" and "Designing Women," all-solid performers, "Uncle Buck" just might stick around.

An interesting CBS offering, which may be doomed by its time slot opposite NBC's "The Cosby Show" and Fox's "The Simpsons," is "The Flash." The one-hour comic-strip-based drama is about a scientist who comes out of a lab accident with superhuman speed, which he uses to battle crime.

CBS is also premiering "Lenny" (Wednesdays), a sitcom about a blue-collar family; WICU (Wednesdays), about the fiscally challenged news team at a big-city television station; and "E.A.R.T.H. Force" (Saturdays), about a team of environmentalists.

ABC is approaching the season like a general laying siege. The network is only presenting six new

series, but with the momentum that its already strong lineup has created, radical change isn't called for.

# NBC came out on the top of the heap as 'Heat of the Night' was the hot one

**LOS ANGELES (AP)** — NBC was the big winner in the latest network ratings battle, capturing seven of the top 10 shows on television.

The victory also marked NBC's 16th consecutive week as the top-rated network, according to figures released Wednesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

Overall ratings showed NBC finished ahead with a 10.6 average, CBS placed second with 8.8, and ABC was last with 8.7.

Each ratings point represents 931,000 households.

The latest rankings show a marked difference from the two preceding weeks when interest in the Persian Gulf crisis helped CBS newsmagazine "60 Minutes" with unprecedented, back-to-back No. 1 victories.

Sunday's show contained no updates on the Persian Gulf. "60 Minutes" spokesman Roy Brunett said the drop-off in viewers was caused by Labor Day travelers.

"I think the biggest reason was that it was a holiday weekend," Brunett said. "People just weren't watching television."

In the latest standings, "60 Minutes" plummeted to a two-way
