# Confusing map fuels rumors of South Hills trail closures

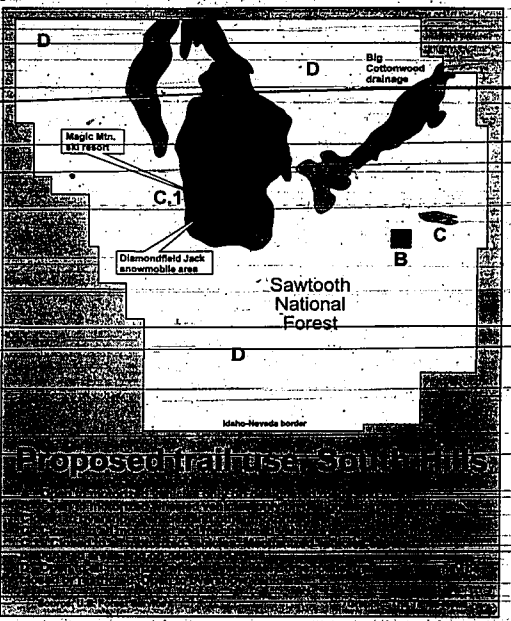

**TWIN FALLS** — Confusion over the impact on snowmobilers of the Forest Service's proposed travel plan for the South Hills may be a misunderstanding over a map.

The map is wrong. Some south-central Idaho snowmobile enthusiasts expressed concern over the original map supplied by the agency in connection with the Sawtooth National Forest travel plan, which the Forest Service is now considering. The map showed the Diamondfield Jack Winter Recreation Area, a prime snowmobile area, closed to snowmobilers.

In reality, with the exception of the Magic Mountain Ski Area and a separate small research area, most of the South Hills are open to motorcycles, snowmobiles and other off-road vehicles under the proposed travel plan.

The SNF travel plan, under which the

Forest Service will designate the use of trails throughout the forest, has been controversial, but primarily over the proposed closure of two trails in Blaine and Custer counties to use by motorized vehicles. Nearly 300 people, most of them off-road vehicle users or snowmobilers, showed up at a hearing in Hailey last week to object to the closures.

At the request of Congressman Richard Stollings and others, the Forest Service scheduled another hearing for the College of Southern Idaho's Shields Building next Monday at 7 p.m.

With a corrected map and information, the plan for the South Hills looks good, said Stan Mai of the Magic Valley Trail Machine Association Inc.

Under the Forest Service proposal, the Diamondfield Jack snowmobile area should have been designated "A" on the original map, meaning motorized use is allowed on designated roads and trails and winter use is permitted anywhere.

On that map essentially everything south of the Oakley-Rogers Road, Forest Service Road No. 500 — within a restricted area should have been designated for use by motorized vehicles on designated trails and snowmobilers. That designation reaches west to Deadline Ridge and south of the Magic Mountain Ski Area, with the trail reaching up to Snake-Pike Mountain.

The upper end of Big Cottonwood Canyon should have received the same designation.

All designated trails in areas "A" and "B" on the original map should have been labeled "motorized use allowed."

No. This change means 4-wheeled, all-terrain vehicles are allowed on these trails.



Unauthorized off-trail use by a few motorcycle riders has damaged some areas and given other riders a bad name.

Mai said the biggest problem with competing uses of SNF trails is attitude. Users should learn to be more tolerant of other users, but "you're going to have conflicts," he said.

The motorcycle clubs working on trying to educate riders that they have to be environmentally conscious when they ride in the backcountry, Mai said.

Riders who stray from established trails fuel the conflict between hikers and bikers and sometimes cause trail closures.

"If they don't stay on the trails, they're going to lose more, and more," said Ed Bloedel, recreation staff officer with the Forest Service's Twin Falls Ranger District.

The Forest Service sometimes closes trails to allow damaged areas to recover.

Few trails in the South Hills are set aside just for hikers, but that may be changing, said Blaine Blinnig, former president of the High Desert Nordic Association Inc., a Magic Valley cross-country ski club.

# Calls go to 7,100 reserves

**WASHINGTON** — The Pentagon ordered 7,106 more reserve soldiers and airmen to report for active duty Thursday to add combat support and airlift strength to the buildup of U.S. military forces in the Persian Gulf area.

The call-up represented a 50-percent increase in the number of reserves activated for Operation Desert Shield — to a total of about 21,000 — and it appeared that De-

In other gulf-related developments Thursday:

• The White House said it would not interfere with the airing of a tape that Iraqi officials say President Saddam Hussein has recorded for viewing in the United States.

• Roman Popaduk, a White House spokesman, said that if Iraq wanted to hand over the tape to U.S. officials, "we would be in a position to take it; but of diplomatic courtesy... and try to make it available to the American people."

• Popaduk also said Bush has invited the exiled emir of Kuwait, Sheikh Jaber al-Sabeh, to visit the United States.

# Buyout would save billions, regulator says

**WASHINGTON** — Congress and the Bush administration should spend \$20 billion next year to "buy out" scores of 2-year-old savings and loan bailouts and save taxpayers \$3 billion to \$4 billion, a top regulator said Thursday.

"What the government ought to save every penny it can," said L. William Seidman, chairman of the Resolution Trust Corp.

"In order to do that it will have to be given... the buyout funds," he told the Senate Banking Committee.

A \$3.5 billion report released by Seidman's agency earlier this week outlined a series of options available to reduce the \$69-billion cost of 96 S&L rescues put together by the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, which was dismantled last year when S&L legislation created Seidman's agency.

Those deals guaranteed acquirers of failed institutions a return on delinquent loans and other bad assets and gave them government-promissory notes to replace money squandered by previous owners.

Also, under a law that has since expired, acquirers in many of the deals reaped substantial tax benefits.

# Craig camp drops 'defense' commercial, takes new tack

**TWIN FALLS** — Starting today, the Larry Craig for Senate campaign will no longer air a controversial television commercial answering what Craig's campaign manager called a "distorted attack" by Democrat Ron Twilgar on the Republican congressman's attendance record.

"Our response was strong and pointed, but our only objective was to tell the whole story and set the record straight," Craig campaign manager A.J. Henderson said Thursday. "Now having accomplished that necessary objective, we are going right back on the positive issue schedule we had previously planned."

Henderson said he thought "twice and three times" before deciding it was necessary to respond to a commercial in which Twilgar asks voters: "If you were a congressman would you try to make every vote, every time. Or would you run for the Senate and miss every third vote, like Larry Craig."

Twilgar based his commercial on a Congressional Quarterly report which found Craig had a 71 percent attendance record since assuming his U.S. Senate campaign early this year.

But members of the Craig staff insist which found Craig had a 66 percent voting record for his entire five terms in Congress.

Last weekend the Craig campaign began airing a 30-second spot defending the congressman's record.

"He's not telling the truth," the Craig ad said. "In Larry Craig's 9 1/2 year career as a congressman, he's voted 91 percent of the time. One of the best records in the House. We don't know why Ron Twilgar's not

# Cheerleading impersonator amuses Colorado students

**COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo.** — A 26-year-old female impersonator posed as an 11th-grade student at Colorado High School and even became a cheerleader, at which students said he did a good job.

Student reaction ranged from amused to angry or scared.

Parents were just plain angry, school officials said Thursday.

"The students, they're all laughing," said a female student who asked not to be identified. "The cheerleaders, they're just mad."

Charles Janlojames Daugherty, a 5-foot-11, 160-pound man, was arrested at the school Tuesday on suspicion of third-degree forgery and criminal impersonation. He was released on \$750 bond and ordered to appear in court Oct. 1.

Daugherty was only in school eight days. School officials said they discov-

ered the masquerade within two or three days — but waited while police built a case.

Jay Englen, assistant principal at the school, said parents and students were "very hurt and embarrassed. They feel betrayed."

He said there was no evidence any student was taken advantage of sexually.

A teacher at the school who asked not to be identified said several girls befriended Daugherty and told him personal things — "you know how girls talk to one another," the teacher said.

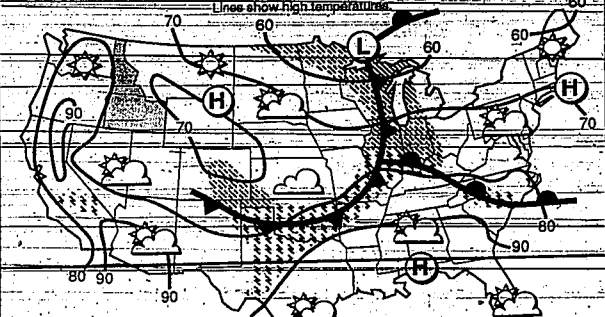
Tracy Cooper, a spokesman for School District 11, said there is little the school can do to prevent similar incidents.

Cooper said Daugherty was able to get away with the ruse because the school is new, has 1,100 students and has private dressing rooms in the girls' locker room, where Daugherty dressed.

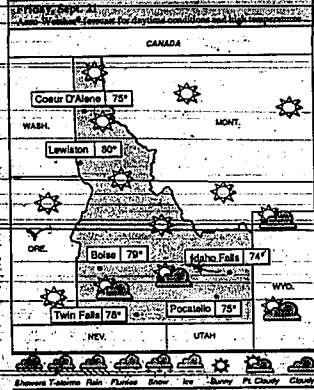

### Snow falls in Wyoming; rain dampens much of nation

Rain spread over most of the nation Thursday, bringing flood warnings to Texas and a slushy snow to higher elevations of western Wyoming.

In Wyoming, the snow melted as it hit the ground, already wet from rain.

In southern Texas, up to 4 inches of rain fell overnight and a flood warning was posted for the Devil's River, the National Weather Service said.

Minor flooding in south-central Texas caused widespread crop damage.

Kodiak, Alaska, got 1.5 inches of rain Thursday, breaking the record for the date by half an inch.

Rain covered much of the country, from Nebraska south to Texas, east to Florida and north through North Carolina.

In central Arkansas, strong winds accompanied the thunderstorms, blowing down trees and power lines in Conway and bringing marble-sized hail to Mayflower, police said.

In the West, rain was scattered over Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoming.

There were scattered showers near the Great Lakes and in New England.

Heavier rainfall through 2 p.m. EDT Thursday included nearly 2 inches at Abilene, Texas, and 1.72 inches at Ponca City, Okla.

Low temperature for the Lower 48 states Thursday was 25 degrees at Truckee, Calif.

in this together.

—U.S. officials said Iraq has asked neighboring Iran if the two countries can join their oil pipelines, a move that would allow Saddam Hussein to partly bypass the U.N.-sponsored embargo against his country. Iran has not yet responded to the Iraqi request, said the officials.

At the Pentagon, spokesman Peter Williams said Cheney was not aware of any attempt by Iran and Iraq to increase the flow of oil between their countries, which currently is reported to be limited to small amounts of Iraqi crude sent to Iran by truck.

The Pentagon also announced that it has set up a hotline number for members of the public seeking information about donating money or other items for Operation Desert Storm. The number is 703-274-3561. Donors were cautioned not to offer items prohibited by the Saudi government or things that the Pentagon says are not needed.

country ski group.

"It's been primarily a motorized area for years," Billman said. "They (motorcyclists) are no longer in the majority."

One problem with competing uses on trails in the South Hills is the effect of snowmobiles on cross-country ski trails and noise from snowmobiles and motorcycles.

"If you are a hiker you go back wanting peace and quiet," Billman said. But in areas where snowmobiles congregate "it's like being at a stock car race," he said.

The only non-motorized trails are short, such as Ross Falls and Upper Twin Falls Ranger District.

The Forest Service has proposed a non-motorized trail along the west side of Back Creek Canyon from the Third Fork up into Narrow Canyon and to connect with Upper Penstemon Trail.

The area is very scenic with "almost a wilderness feeling," Borton said.

Another area with potential for primitive, backcountry recreation proposed by some, including Idaho Department of Fish and Game, is the Big Cottonwood Canyon in the northeast part of the South Hills.

The Forest Service has considered changing the trail in the canyon, but "we felt that was a major change in the forest plan," Blöedé said. "I think we need more public support along that line."

Motorcyclists, however, were instrumental in building the 12- or 14-mile trail through the otherwise undeveloped, primitive canyon.

"If it weren't for motorcycles, there wouldn't be a trail in Big Cottonwood Canyon," Mei said. "We're very happy to see that it's going to stay open to motorcycles."

telling the truth about Larry Craig's voting record, but we do know this. In Idaho, a man is only as good as his word. And Ron Twilegar's word isn't worth a dime.

But instead of clearing the air, the Craig rebuttal fueled a fiery debate between the two campaigners over who is the liar and who is telling the truth.



Twilegar's campaign manager Richard Callow characterized the ad as "lies and misdirection" and pointed out that, by his calculations, Craig's 91 percent attendance record ranks 348th among the 435 members of the House.

Henderson countered that Twilegar's rebuttal was a Boise city councilman was 82.5 percent, but he added, the two candidates' attendance records are "much less important than what their plans are for Idaho's future."

While the Craig camp intends to return to the "positive" advertising schedule previously planned, Callow said the Twilegar organization has no intention of dropping its commercial on Craig's attendance record.

"For what?" Callow said. "Now that Mr. Craig has called attention to ours, I hope people watch them with interest."

The cells carried the abnormal gene that causes cystic fibrosis, and researchers fixed the defect by giving them a normal copy of the gene.

"It's a milestone," said Paul Quinton, a cystic fibrosis researcher at the University of California, Riverside, who was familiar with the work.

While the notion of gene therapy for cystic fibrosis was science fiction only a few years ago, the new work has "pressed the fiction closer to reality," he said in an interview.

Combined with research into gene therapy for other diseases, the new results "give us tremendous hope

that gene therapy is going to become a reality in cystic fibrosis patients," said Robert Beall, executive vice president for medical affairs.

"We're not talking decades, we're talking years, or even years," said Beall, whose organization helped pay for the new work.

Two teams of scientists corrected the cell defect in the test tube by using a harmless virus to inject the

normal gene into the cells. One group describes its results in Friday's issue of the journal *Cell*. The other will publish its results in next week's issue of the British journal *Nature*.

Cystic fibrosis affects about 30,000 children and young adults in the United States. Their lungs produce a thick, sticky mucus that sets the stage for fatal lung infections. Mucus also where interferes with di-

gestion.

The abnormal mucus appears because cells cannot expel charged particles called chloride ions, while they absorb sodium ions too rapidly, Beall said. The effect is to dehydrate normal mucus, he said.

The researchers found that cells given a normal copy of the cystic fibrosis gene began expelling chloride ions normally. They did not check for any effect on sodium ions.

It is not known whether simply fixing the chloride problem would cure cystic fibrosis, said Dr. Michael Welsh of the University of Iowa College of Medicine in Iowa City and the Howard Hughes Medical Institute there. ## Channel 1 halfway to schools TV goal

NEW-YORK (AP) — Channel One is more than halfway toward its goal of signing 9,000 schools for its commercial-supported television news show, but hasn't shaken critics who condemn its delivering a captive audience to advertisers.

A competitor, the Cable News Network, claims more than 12,000 schools have signed for CNN Newsroom, an ad-free daily news program for schools. CNN says its surveys indicate about half the schools are active users.

Other cable networks such as ESPN and The Discovery Channel, are either producing hits or pro-

moting existing ad-free sources for the classroom.

The passionate debate about TV's proper role in the classroom was triggered, however, by Channel One with its 12-minute daily news show and two minutes of ads from sponsors like McDonald's Inc., Priority Mail, Inc. and Nike Inc.

Whittle Communications of Knoxville, Tenn., which launched Channel One nationwide in March, said about 4,200 schools have signed three-year contracts to take Channel One and 3,500 are on line.

Turner Broadcasting System Inc. launched CNN Newsroom in August

1989, and has been producing its 15-minute news show without ads five days a week ever since.

Whittle gives schools televisions, videocassette recorders and other equipment to view Channel One. CNN Newsroom does not.

Some Channel One advertisers tout their products, but Nike has run some anti-drug ads and Burger King uses its time to encourage kids to stay in school.

Channel One reaches more than 3.1 million students in every state except Maine, Rhode Island, Nevada, Alaska and Hawaii, said Farrell Reynolds, a former TBS executive.

## Tax group hits Congressional franking privilege

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Taxpayers Union Thursday renewed its call for changing Congress' free mail privileges and released a study showing the average House member spent 31 cents per household last year on newsletter postage.

The private group, which advocates cuts in taxes and spending, said its survey reflected only a small portion of total congressional postage costs.

The group said it has evidence that members of Congress are using the frank, or free mail privilege, for political self-promotion.

"The frank is used as a sort of stealth campaigning," said David Keating, executive vice president of the group.

Keating and other group leaders released the report while they stood in front of a tractor-trailer rig outside the Capitol. The mail sent by members in just one day would fill the

rig, they said.

A Congressional Research Service study released earlier this year estimated House postage costs will top \$136 million for 1989 and 1990. The group said it was able to find public records accounting for an estimated 215 million newsletter mailings in 1989, at an estimated cost of \$30 million. If said no records are available to account for many other types of congressional mail, including letters sent to specific addresses.

## Dole hints tax cut under axe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole suggested that deadlocked budget bargainers remove the proposal to cut the capital gains tax rate from the deficit-reduction package they are working on, an aide said Thursday.

Dole's suggestion is the first indication that Republicans are willing to accept a deficit-reduction plan without a cut in the capital gains tax rate. President Bush has repeatedly insisted that a reduction in that tax imposed on property sales "not be included in the deficit-cutting plan because it would annihilate the economy."

Democrats have said Republican insistence on lowering the capital gains tax rate is the key stumbling block to the two parties working out a five-year, \$500 billion deficit-cutting plan. They have opposed the proposal, arguing that it would be a tax break for the rich. They have said they would accept it only if other taxes on the wealthy are boosted.

Under Dole's idea, the capital gains cut, a Democratic proposal to improve federal child care programs, and a package of tax benefits supported by both parties would be broken out of the deficit-cutting package and combined into a separate piece of legislation.

That separate measure would have to maintain "taxes" or "spending cuts" to pay for itself.

"It's just a common sense approach," said Walt Riker, Dole's spokesman.

Dole, R-Kan., suggested the idea Wednesday evening at a meeting with Democratic leaders and top administration officials, Riker said.

It was not clear what reaction Dole's idea got from the other bargainers.

But on Wednesday, the House Budget Committee chairman, Rep. Les C. Olin (D-Calif.), visited the high-level budget talks briefly and told reporters that a similar tradeoff might be the way to end the year-long budget stalemate.

He said that a package removing GOP-sought tax breaks "in return for new spending initiatives" may hold the key.

The proposed capital gains tax reduction would lower the top rate on the profits from property sales from the current 33 percent to 15 percent. It would be expected to raise \$3.7 billion next year because the diminished rate would encourage people to sell their holdings. But over the next five years, officials project that it would cost the government \$21.5 billion. The biggest tax benefit now under consideration at the budget talks, supported by Bush and most members of Congress, would cut business taxes by more than \$9.2 billion over the next five years.

## Lyme bacteria predate disease

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lyme Disease was identified as an ailment only 15 years ago, but the bacteria that cause it have been around at least since the early 1940s, says a Yale University researcher who has examined remains of ticks for embedded remains of ticks that spread the disease.

Before 1975, when an outbreak in Old Lyme, Conn., gave the disease a name, residents of Long Island may have known it as "Montauk knee" or "Montauk spider bite," said Dr. David Persing, who left Yale Lyme Disease, a potentially crippling but rarely fatal condition, is spread to humans by the

biting of ticks infested by spiral-shaped bacteria called spirochetes.

The ailment afflicts 6,000 people each year and can progress from malaise and fatigue, chills, arthritis, neurological problems and heart damage.

"We suspected that the spirochetes had been around in the United States, sort of hiding away, long before Lyme Disease became identified as a clinical entity," said Persing, who left Yale a month ago to become a clinical pathologist at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn.

## Court OKs air schedule change

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal appeals court, intervening in a dispute between two major airlines, cleared the way Thursday for United Airlines to revamp its schedule at Chicago's O'Hare International Airport after Oct. 1.

The change, which was challenged by American Airlines, had been approved by the Federal Aviation Administration as a means of smoothing out evening arrivals and departures and easing congestion.

The FAA said that a decision by American to adjust its early evening schedule would increase congestion. It said United's proposed schedule changes, intended to separate the Chicago-based airline's flights from those of American, would ease delays after Oct. 1.

In a brief order, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia denied American's request for an emergency stay of the FAA's approval of United's schedule changes.

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon on Thursday disclosed the identities of four American servicemen killed in Laos during the Vietnam War whose remains were recovered last January.

They were identified as David L. Nelson of Kirkland, Wash., Ralph A. Moreira, Jr., of Beaver Falls, Pa., Joel C. Hatley of Albemarle, N.C. and Michael E. King of Calhoun, Ga. The remains are to depart Hickam Air Force Base, Hawaii, with full military honors on Friday and will be flown to Travis Air Force Base, Calif.

**Study says U.S. misses fluoridation goal**

ATLANTA — The nation easily surpassed its 1990 goal for preventing childhood tooth decay, but missed the mark on water fluoridation, federal health specialists reported Thursday.

A set of 1990 health objectives for the nation, established in 1980, called for 60 percent or less of American 9-year-olds to have experienced tooth decay. At that time, the latest survey showed tooth decay among 71 percent.

But subsequently released surveys showed that the goal had been surpassed even before it was set.

**OCAW says union merger year away**

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. — The merger of two existing unions to create a national energy workers union is at least a year away, an Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers official said Thursday at the United Mine Workers convention.

Efforts to merge the OCAW and UMW failed in 1987. Talks resumed this year but were not completed before the coal miners' convention began this week.

**Congregation pays \$1,250 for Torahs**

CHERRY HILL, N.J. — A Jewish congregation got its Torahs back from a bank foreclosure in time for Rosh Hashanah.

Congregation Beth Jacob-Beth Israel paid \$1,250 to First Peoples Bank of New Jersey to liberate the holy scrolls, which the bank seized last month, congregation officials said Wednesday just before the Jewish new year began.

**Inmate rampage results in detentions**

OAKDALE, La. — About one-quarter of the inmates of the Federal Detention Center are under tighter security while investigators determine which were responsible for a rampage, officials said Thursday.

**Eastern U.S. facing quakes, too**

WASHINGTON (AP) — California may get the publicity, but residents of the East are in just as much danger from earthquakes, according to a report published Thursday.

There are many more quakes in California than there are to the eastern states, but when tremors strike in the eastern states, they affect much larger areas.

"Hence, while California is more hazardous... on the basis of frequency of occurrence, both regions have comparable risk," say S. P. Nishenko and G. A. Bollinger in Friday's edition of Science, the journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

The two researchers calculated that there is a 29 percent chance of a serious quake in the east or central states by the turn of the century and such a tremor is nearly certain (97 percent) within 100 years.

"We're trying to do this responsibly and not cry wolf and cause people to be alarmed," Bollinger said in a telephone interview.

But, he went on, the aim is to be sure people are informed of the danger. "If you have no perception that you have any hazard you won't prepare for it," he observed.

The danger of earthquakes is well known in California because they occur frequently, often causing moderate to severe damage as happened in last year's World Series quake near San Francisco.

But the strongest tremors on record in this country occurred near New Madrid, Mo. in the winter of 1811-1812.

A powerful quake demolished much of Charleston, S.C., in 1886 and strong quakes have been widely felt in New England and other parts of the east.

The paper includes estimates of the likelihood of a quake with a body-wave magnitude of 6.0.

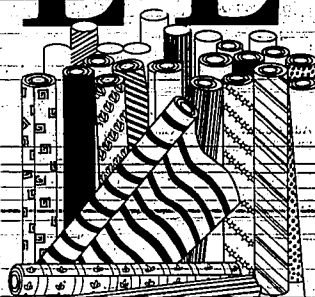

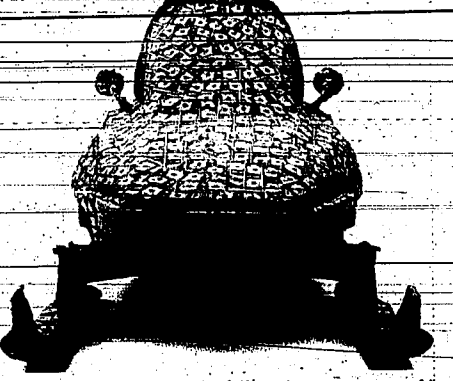
Plan for liquor at U of I golf course on hold

### Twilegar has slight edge in TV battles with Craig

In Larry Craig's congressional attendance record, Democrat Ron Twilegar has found an issue that could turn his underdog campaign into the chihuahua that roared.

It's a gut-level issue that plays well in 30-second TV spots. When Twilegar asks, "Could you keep your job if you missed every third day at work?" voters notice. And Craig's TV counterattacks have been ineffectual.

What's missing from the televised spat is perspective. After hearing the two candidates' views on the job, voters may wonder what all this really means to them.

Here are some observations that may help:

When Twilegar accuses Craig of missing every third vote since Craig started campaigning for the U.S. Senate, he's right. But voters have to decide whether Craig deserves a little slack on this issue.

After all, Craig had a tough Republican primary against a sharp opponent, Jim Jones. If he wanted to win, he needed to be in Idaho, campaigning.

But Twilegar's campaign also points out that Craig's record this year is the worst among eight congressmen running for the Senate.

Ironically, while Twilegar complains that Craig took too much time off work to campaign, Idaho's other congressman is being criticized by his own opponent for taking too much time off work to campaign.

McDevitt is whining because Democratic Rep. Richard Stallings wants to debate him on a Sunday, "the day of rest for Idahoans."

Apparently, if Twilegar and McDevitt had their way, congressional incumbents would only be allowed to campaign on Saturdays.

When Craig says his 91 percent car-voting record is better than Twilegar's 82.5 percent as a Boise councilman, he's comparing apples and watermelons.

A Boise City Council job is part-time. Twilegar made \$6,000 a year. Congressmen make \$39,500 a year and are treated to all kinds of perks. Voters have a right to expect them to work full-time.

So two questions ought to be answered independently: Is 91 percent good enough for a congressman? And is 82.5 percent good enough for a city councilman?

When Craig says his 91 percent is "one of the best records in the House," he doesn't say whether "one of the best" means the top 10 percent, the top 20 percent or the top 30 percent.

Against this vagueness, Twilegar's campaign offers its own calculations that say Craig's 91 percent was 24th out of 435 congressmen. So far, Craig has been silent on this point.

Though Twilegar's attack on Craig's record has been damaging, it is missing a key point. By skipping all these votes, did Craig actually do a worse job of representing Idaho?

Remember, voting is only one part of a congressman's job. There is committee work to do. There are constituents' complaints to listen to. And there are lobbyists to schmooze with, and junkets to go on.

So Twilegar needs to demonstrate that some of the votes Craig missed were important ones.

A while back Twilegar's campaign provided reporters with a list of "key votes" that Craig had missed this year. They included votes on rural economic development, the Americans With Disabilities Act, a Head Start reauthorization and the Drug Abuse Resistance Education Act.

But each of these bills passed by a lopsided margin: 360-45, 404-0, 404-14 and 388-13. So did it really matter whether Larry Craig showed up or not?

Only one vote cited by Twilegar — one concerning the Eastern Airlines strike — was even vaguely close. There is committee work to do. There is committee work to do. There is committee work to do.

If Twilegar wants to make the case that Craig's absences hurt Idaho, he'll have to do better than this.

Well, voters, there's the blow-by-blow as we see it for this verbal sparring match. On our scorecard, Twilegar is ahead on points, but he hasn't landed a knockout punch.

The important question is, how do you score it?

The press release last week from the office of the U.S. trade representative about President Bush signing the proclamation authorizing a tariff rate quota on sugar imports should come as no surprise to anyone involved in the development of the sugar provision that was passed by both the Senate and the House in July.

That determination was made last January and was announced at the time the administration released their version of the farm bill.

Since that time the big question that concerned the domestic sugar industry has been at what level would the administration set the tariff and would it be high enough to protect the 18 cent loan level and to protect the integrity of the no cost provision.

Also how the quota holders in the Caribbean would be affected since they enjoy a reduced tariff provision under the Caribbean Basin Initiative — or in the case of Canada under the Canadian Free Trade Agreement.

The decision to set the tariff at 16 cents should be sufficient to protect the concerns of Idaho sugarbeet growers.

### George Grant Reader-Comment

World prices of sugar over the last 30 days have traded at around 11.5 cents.

Remember this is F.O.B. Caribbean. Add to that 2 plus cents to transport to U.S. refineries and you have a spot landing price of 29.5 cents, well in excess of our 18 cent loan guarantee, even if you use a historical low of 3 to 4 cents, it will protect the 18 cent loan level.

However, we need to be concerned about the amount of sugar that is imported under quotas. Rep. Stallings is correct in saying that this 1.725 million metric tons appears to be high.

Secretary Yetter could have set the initial quota lower since he has the authority to adjust the quotas during the year if it becomes apparent that more imports are needed to supply the U.S. needs.

Rep. Stallings is also correct when he says that setting quotas too high could create forfeiture to the C.C.F. Remember that quota sugar comes in tariff free.

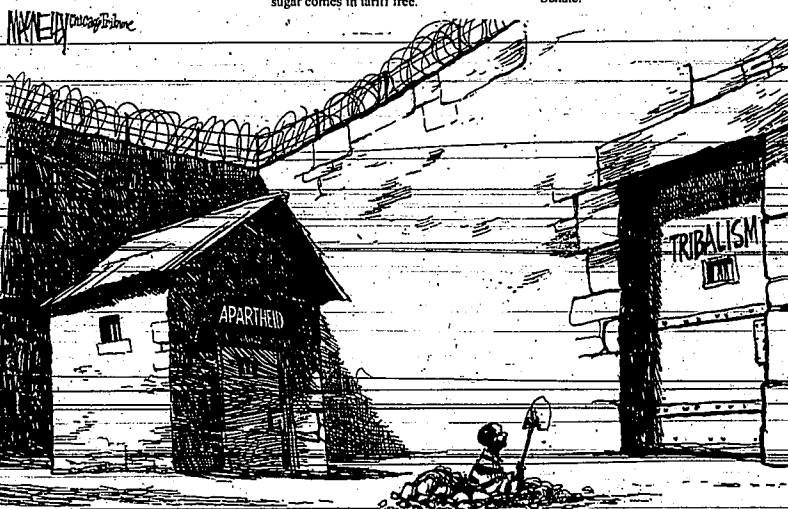
Our concern now should turn to statements made by our U.S. trade representatives that they intend to gradually ratchet down the tariff over a period of time and eventually eliminate a tariff completely.

All of this may be well and good providing all our trading partners and all GAT members make corresponding reductions in their tariffs and export subsidies and some consideration is given to a country's potential to manipulate their currency to give them a trade advantage.

Some articles published announcing the tariff rate quota, left an impression that the loan rate had also been reduced to 16 cents and this has caused concern among the sugar beet growers.

Had this been true, it would have been a unilateral concession and completely opposite to the promise that Vice President Bush made to me at Twin Falls when he was campaigning for the presidency.

**Philippines want talks to end by January**

**MANILA** (AP) — President Corason Aquino will order steps to dismantle American military bases in the Philippines unless the two countries reach an agreement on their future by January, an official said Thursday.

U.S. and Philippine officials began talks Tuesday on the future of Clark Air Base, Subic Bay naval base and four smaller installations, whose lease expires in September 1991.

"If there is no treaty or arrangement, let's say by January, then we will most likely request a committee that will oversee the dismantling of the bases," said Rafael Alunan, spokesman for the Philippine panel.

"It is important for us to have a treaty or an arrangement," he said in a radio interview.

"If there is no understanding, nothing will come of the bases such that by Sept. 16, 1991, they will have to leave."

The current round of talks is expected to last until Friday or Saturday, Alunan said. The panels will then adjourn until a later date; Alunan said the Aquino government

wanted to maintain a "home court advantage" by having all sessions take place in Manila rather than the United States.

Most surveys show a majority of Filipinos support the bases. But any treaty to keep the bases here after the lease runs out requires approval by two-thirds of the 23-member Senate, where opposition is strong.

The Philippine Congress could also require the extension to be approved in a national referendum.

Opponents, such as Communist

rebels, believe the bases infringe on national sovereignty.

Chief U.S. negotiator Richard Armitage said Tuesday the day of a large American military presence here were coming to an end.

The United States maintains 40,000 troops, Defense Department officials and military dependents at the six bases.

Mrs. Aquino said on the eve of the talks that the time had come for an orderly withdrawal of the bases, the oldest and largest American overseas installations.

**Unity returns legislative role to Reichstag**

**WEST BERLIN** (AP) — With German unity less than two weeks away, workers are racing to ready the Reichstag for the building's first session of parliament in almost six decades.

Lone symbol of Germany's turbulent past, the lower floors of the sandstone edifice just north of the Brandenburg Gate have come alive in recent weeks.

Carpenters, electricians and painters rush through the corridors to prepare the main hall for the founding session of the united parliament Oct. 4, the day after the historic

merger of East Germany and West Germany. "We will be ready despite the short notice," said Edmund Matig, deputy administrator of the Reichstag. "This is the fulfillment of a wish we've had for so long."

But it will be for one reason only: session only, and then parliament returns to Bonn.

Germany got its first parliament in 1871 after Kaiser Wilhelm I unified the country and Berlin became the capital. The building and the parliament were called Reichstag, meaning imperial legislature.

The present Reichstag building

was finished in 1894 after 10 years of construction. It was the scene of fierce debates after World War I as government after government sought a stable majority.

A mysterious fire on Feb. 27, 1933, just a month after Adolf Hitler became chancellor, gutted the building and ended its use as a legislature.

The blaze served as Hitler's pretext to force passage of an act allowing his government to make laws without Reichstag approval.

Hitler left the Reichstag in ruins. During the Nazis' 12-year rule, the so-called "Brown Reichstag" met in

the nearby Kroll Opera. That building did not survive the war.

The Reichstag's drama continued as the Nazi defeat drew near. The Allies bombed it toward the end of the war. The battered building was the Soviet army's first target as it moved across Berlin.

Soviet and Nazi troops engaged in hand-to-hand combat at the Reichstag in early May 1945, the Red army planted a Soviet flag atop the ruined building.

But the stone slab with the words "Dem Deutschen Volke," or "To the German people," survived.

**German unification occasion for song**

**BONN**, West Germany — Lawmakers ratified a historic treaty Thursday that will end four decades of division and unite their nations in 13 days. They followed the votes with singing, shouting and handshakes. The treaty was the last one needing approval before the Germans unite on Oct. 3.

In the Bundestag, West Germany's parliament, lawmakers loudly applauded their passage of the treaty and broke into a chorus of the national anthem. Members of the Volkskammer, East Germany's parliament, stood up, hooted with joy and shook hands after their vote in East Berlin.

**Pinochet told to butt out of politics**

**SANTIAGO, Chile** — President Patricio Aylwin on Thursday summoned his predecessor, Gen. Augusto Pinochet, to the presidential palace and told him to stay out of politics, the government reported.

About 300 people shouted "Assassin!" and "Go away!" as Pinochet arrived at the downtown palace. Police kept the demonstrators 120 feet from the palace entrance. Pinochet remains army commander.

**Publisher of farming magazine killed**

**EMMAUS, Pa.** — Robert Rodale, who built a publishing empire from his father's magazines Prevention and Organic Gardening, was killed Thursday in a car accident in Moscow, the company said. He was 60.

Rodale was in Russia to set up a Russian-language edition of "The New Farmer," one of numerous publications of the Rodale Press Inc. devoted to a natural approach to agriculture that reduces reliance on chemicals. Rodale and the Russian publisher of the new venture were killed on their way to the Moscow airport about 1 p.m., said Kat Tienstra, spokeswoman for the company.

**White supremacist gets 18 years**

**PERTH, Australia** — The leader of a white supremacy group was sentenced Thursday to 18 years in jail for orchestrating a terror campaign against Asian immigrants. District Court Judge Kevin Hammond ruled that Jack Van Tongeren, a 42-year-old Vietnam veteran, was not eligible for parole.

Van Tongeren was convicted last week of 53 crimes, including conspiracy to drive Asians out of Western Australia state and burning and bombing five Chinese restaurants in Perth.

### Ward's Cheese facing up to \$24,000 in fines

RICHFIELD — Improper wastewater discharges last spring could result in \$24,000 in fines for Ward's Cheese Inc. from the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare.

Company President Tom Kalange said the citations stem from several incidents in which snowmelt overwhelmed holding ponds and dikes at the company's Richfield plant.

A notice from the department's Bureau of Water Quality cites Ward's for discharging waste water into the Little Wood River without notifying the state. The administrative notice also claims that Ward's Cheese discharged water into an irrigation ditch and onto ranch land near the company's Richfield plant.

Kalange said the company has corrected its wastewater problems since last spring.

The company has until Sept. 28 to arrange a conference to resolve the violations and settle the penalties.

### Judge says burglary, other evidence enough to merit trial

FAIRFIELD — Camas County Prosecutor Lavon Loynd has enough evidence to try three Ketchum residents before a District Court on burglary and related felony charges, a judge has ruled.

After a preliminary hearing Thursday, 5th District Judge John E. Varn bound over Lou Schueffer, 42; Gary Dougherty, 45; and Kathy Joor, 35, on two counts robbery and one count second-degree burglary, each, Loynd said. Dougherty was also bound over on two counts battery with intent to commit a serious felony — robbery.

The three are charged in connection with a break-in into a Fairfield home in July and taking money and gems for a cocaine-related debt. Dougherty is charged with kicking, hitting and pulling the two renters' hair and using a steel pipe to "beat their house up," Loynd said.

A District Court arraignment is scheduled for Oct. 9 in Camas County before 5th District Judge James J. May, Loynd said. The threesome will be tried separately, he said.

### Search, rescue team fails to locate missing Filer man

BURLEY — The Mini-Cassia Sheriff's Search and Rescue team spent Wednesday night and Thursday morning looking for a missing Filer man in the Raft River area.

The man, 38-year-old Blaine Huddleston, was reported missing at 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, Cassia County Sheriff Billy Crystal said. He had phoned his father from the Raft River Store for a ride and after waiting for a while, told the store owner he would start walking down the frontage road toward Burley.

Huddleston's father arrived at the store from Jerome five minutes later, and couldn't find Huddleston along the road.

## 4 Magic Valley school districts join funding lawsuit

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls, Buhl, Jerome and Minidoka County school districts have joined a Shelley-family and 15 other school districts in lawsuit against the state over Idaho's system of funding public education.

The names of some of the six children of the Gil Putnam family of Shelley are on a civil lawsuit that alleges funding inequities,

prepared for filing Thursday in 4th District Court in Boise. Putnam announced the lawsuit in a news conference.

In addition to Twin Falls, Buhl, Jerome and Minidoka County, the plaintiffs include the Blackfoot, Bonneville County, Caldwell, Emmett, Jefferson County, Madison County, Meridian, Middleton, Nampa, Pocatello, Post Falls, Preston, Shelley, Sugar-Salem and Snake River school districts.

If the suit succeeds, it will eliminate basic funding inequities and give his children

better opportunities, Putnam said.

Two other lawsuits have been filed this year over state support for public schools, and the way the money is distributed.

The complaint seeks to end what many area school officials believe to be funding disparities between property-rich and property-poor school districts.

"We request that the wealth of the state be behind each student in the state of Idaho, regardless of where the parents choose to live," said Richard Goodworth, Bonneville

School District superintendent.

The state Board of Education, the state superintendent of public instruction and the state of Idaho are named as defendants.

Plaintiffs began organizing in March after the Idaho Legislature failed to adopt a new school-funding formula.

In a prepared statement, school district officials said that Idaho has created "tax lands" of privilege where school patrons pay below-average school taxes but have

## Ketchum hot springs to stay open

KETCHUM — The hot springs at Frenchman's Bend will not be closed down, but bathers must remain in their bathing suits and leave their beer and soap at home.

A task force of U.S. Forest Service officials and concerned citizens agreed upon the rules after a 10-hour meeting Wednesday.

"I think the decision we've come up with is pretty palatable because it doesn't totally close up the hot springs," said Jenny Taylor, a Forest Service wildlife biologist and part of the task force.

The natural hot springs on Warm Springs Creek became a point of controversy this summer after nearby neighbors and bathers complained about nudity, violence, littering and noise.

People reported they were afraid to use the hot springs, also known as Warfield hot springs — because they were uncertain whether they would find drinks, nudity or crazed people there, Taylor said.

Earlier this summer, an unidentified nude bather shot at others after his clothes allegedly were stolen.

After much debate, discussion and 40 phone calls and letters, the Forest Service decided to leave the hot springs open — but with restrictions.

Those restrictions, which will be itemized on signs at the pools, will help to fulfill the Forest Service's goal of leaving the pools open to everyone, Taylor said.

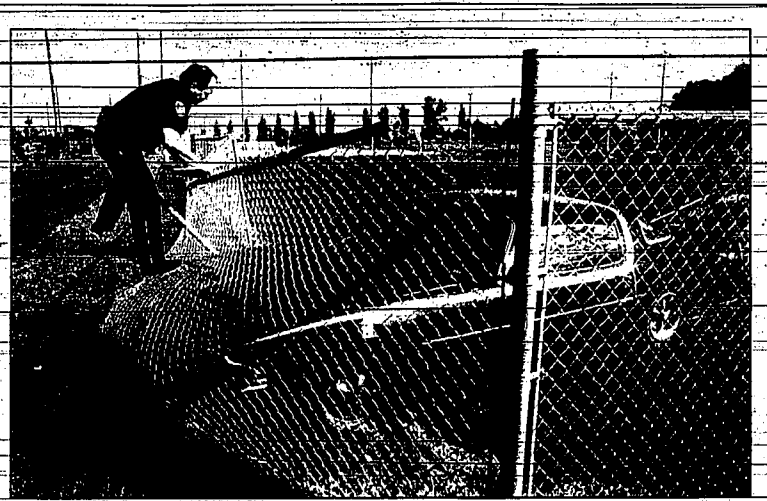
There will be no alcohol allowed at the hot springs, and the pools will be closed from 10 p.m. to 4 a.m.

Taylor said many of the problems at the hot springs happened late at night when bathers became rowdy and noisy, bothering neighbors in the 15 houses just downstream from the pools. Other homeowners on Warm Springs Road were affected by the traffic generated by the hot springs.

No nudity will be allowed at the hot pools; no soap and no glass containers will be allowed in the river and bathers can no longer park on the road along the pools.

A parking area will be built upstream from the pools to alleviate the traffic congestion. Also, steps will be built down to the river and vegetation will be planted along the banks where bathers have de-

## Police catch Boise escapee after chase

TWIN FALLS — Police apprehended an escaped prisoner from Boise Thursday morning near the College of Southern Idaho after a high-speed chase through Jerome and Twin Falls.

"His mistake was turning into town," said Twin Falls police Patrol Officer Bob Peace.

In town, the driver was forced to slow down, and when he turned into a residential area and finally into a dead end, "it was like a piranha watching a gold fish," Peace said.

Brian Scott Pacheco, 26, was taken to the Jerome County Jail and on to the Ada County Jail. He is charged in Jerome County with where the pursuit originated, with reckless driving, eluding an officer and possession of stolen property, said Jerome Police Chief George Silver III.

Pacheco will be charged in Ada County in connection with escaping from the South Idaho Correctional Institution on Thursday morning, said Karol Phillips, a spokeswoman for the Department of Corrections.

He was serving time for two counts of forgery out of Gooding County and one count of grand theft out of Canyon County, Phillips said.

Pacheco left the minimum security prison at 6:30 a.m. for his job at the city's meat plant, Phillips said, but never arrived at work.

Instead, he drove a prison truck to Twin Falls, where he left the truck and talked a car dealer into letting him test-drive a black 1979 Pontiac Trans Am, Phillips said.

It was also spotted by law enforcement officers in Gooding County. Silver spotted the car at about 10:15 a.m. as it sped 60 mph into Jerome in a 35 mph zone and he began the chase.

The driver circled through side streets, then headed south on Lincoln Street to Interstate 84 and raced toward Twin Falls at speeds of 90 to 110 mph, Silver said.

The Trans Am traveled 93 on 99 as he headed across the Perrine Bridge into Twin Falls, Silver said.

But city and state officers blew at the south side of the bridge and took up pursuit down White Lakes Boulevard.

The driver turned west on Falls Avenue, striking a car in the intersection, and then north on Lincoln Street, Peace said.

He turned a few more times until trapped on a dead end street at the edge of Frontier Field. Then he drove through two fences before coming to a third fence, Peace said.

He ran off on foot, but was tackled by Twin Falls police Patrol Officer Curtis Gambrel and was taken into custody, Peace said.

## Jailed woman wants guns returned

TWIN FALLS — A Twin Falls woman being held in the Ada County Jail in Boise is asking that five guns be returned in court that were seized during her arrest to be returned to her.

"There's been no indication to me that they were going to be used as criminal evidence," said the woman's attorney, William R. Hollifield. "I get real frustrated, and when I get like that I file lawsuits."

In the "complaint for claim and delivery" filed this week in 5th District Court in Twin Falls, Christina Ann Salinas says she "has a right to possession of these guns as she is the owner."

Salinas, 28, was arrested on a federal grand jury indictment on June 18 in Twin Falls. She is currently in the Ada County Jail awaiting a trial next week in U.S. District Court on charges of conspiracy to distribute cocaine and possession of cocaine with intent to deliver.

During her arrest by the U.S. Marshals Service, six guns were seized, Hollifield

said. One is being held in Boise as evidence, he said, but the other five have not been returned.

The guns in question are a 20-gauge modified-barrel shotgun, a 9mm semiautomatic handgun, a .22-caliber semiautomatic rifle, a lever-action .30-30-caliber rifle and a .308-caliber bolt-action rifle.

Chief Deputy U.S. Marshal Ron Evans said all the guns are being held in one in Boise and the others by the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office "as criminal evidence."

But Hollifield said the Bureau of Narcotics, part of the Idaho Department of Law Enforcement, told him that it has control of the guns and nobody has indicated the weapons were to be used as evidence. "No" has anyone explained why

## Filer School board plans goals for '91

FILER — The district may start a newsletter, teachers will try to communicate more often with parents, principals will develop consistent discipline policies and the district will try to stick to its budget under a set of goals for the year accepted by the School Board.

## Rupert Council ponders utility rate boost

RUPERT — Residents may have to raise their budgets soon if the City Council decides to raise city electric and water rates — rates some claim are already too high.

The council is considering an emergency ordinance that would raise the rates.

City Attorney Donald Chisholm said funds from the ordinance would pay for construction projects to upgrade and update the city's equipment.

He said the projects would allow the city to better provide power to Rupert residents.

A few Rupert citizens questioned the council members Tuesday night about Rupert's power rates. They asked why Ru-

per's rates are higher than other nearby city's rates.

"Russell Holland of Roper's Department Stores said the council that of all the Roper's stores in the Magic Valley area, the electric bill in Rupert runs 30 percent to 36 percent higher than the other Roper's stores."

Another visitor asked the council to consider budget cuts elsewhere in order to fund the projects instead of increasing rates.

Chisholm said an employee of the firm that has compiled the information and made the recommendation to upgrade the equipment will give a formal presentation to the council Oct. 2.

Cost of the proposed rate increases will be discussed at that time and the public is invited to attend and comment.

"I assure you we like a good hard look at your suggestions," Mayor Bill Whitton told the visitors at Tuesday's meeting.

The council does not intend to pass this measure in haste, he said.

In other business, the council decided to hold a public hearing Dec. 3 to sell a parcel of land located on south 3rd Street, bordered by Scott Avenue and G Street.

It also announced the Rupert Lions as winners of a summer Centennial flower contest: Showkase Furniture of Rupert took second place, and Cub Scout Pack #49 came third.

Public Works Director Les Hutchinson said all the participants "showed pride in the community" and he said he already has received letters indicating interest in another contest next year.

# Panel calls for 10.5% fund hike for university system

BOISE (AP) — The state Board of Education has decided to ask for a 10.5-percent increase in operating funds for Idaho's college- and university system, paring more than \$3.4 million from the schools' requests but sweetening the pot with a \$1.5 million increase in one-time money.

"The general public perceives that these requests represent the needs of higher education," Lewis-Clark State President Lee Vickers told the board Thursday in Lewiston. "I would submit they do not represent the needs of higher education."

...totaling \$150.7 million from the four state-supported four-year schools. "I've had no opportunity to understand what the rationale is for any of these cuts," Cox said, adding that university presidents have told the board their requests are for actual maintenance of their schools' actual needs. Before the Finance Committee vote, those requests represented a 13.1-percent increase from the nearly \$133.2 million allocated last fiscal year to higher education for the current spending year, which began

July 1. That was a 15.4-percent hike from the \$115.5 million allocated a year earlier, but included \$6 million in one-time money. Legislators did not commit to carrying over to next year's budget. And the Legislature's largesse was primarily a factor of the state's \$126.5 million revenue surplus. The surplus lawmakers will have to work with next time is expected to be about \$45 million, but Gov. Cecil Andrus said this week that he wants to commit a substantial share of that to property tax reduction.

# Corporate tax lag hits state

BOISE (AP) — Continued weakness in state corporate tax collections last month left total Idaho tax revenues below expectations early in the new spending year, but Andrus administration analysts discounted the development as a sign of any severe slowdown of the state's economy. Projections released Thursday by the Division of Financial Management showed corporate tax receipts through August \$1.8 million below the expected level two months into the new fiscal year. But the more critical personal income and sales taxes were running at or above expectations, maintaining confidence in estimates for a

new cash surplus in the neighborhood of \$45 million. The lower-than-expected corporate tax revenues were partially offset by \$800,000 more than anticipated in sales taxes and \$100,000 more from cigarettes. That put total receipts at \$132 million, just \$900,000 short of the Aug. 31 benchmark. Analysts blamed the low corporate tax collections, in part, on the state's policy of allowing businesses amassing refunds on payments in the prior tax year to apply that money to current tax liability.

ground existing vegetation, creating an erosion problem. In addition, the three pools which make up the hot springs at Frenchman's Bend will be recaptured to lower the rock walls so they will not interfere with the function of the stream, Taylor said. Sanitation is a continuing problem, and the Forest Service plans to build a temporary outhouse nearby the pools next summer. A major concern, however, is how to enforce the new restrictions. Taylor said the Forest Service will patrol the area more often, as will the Blaine County Sheriff's Department. The Forest Service plans to hire an additional law enforcement officer for the Ketchum Ranger District, but that won't happen for at least a year or two, Taylor said. For now, the Forest Service has \$9,000 to pay the sheriff's office for patrolling the county's national forest grounds. In the meantime, the Forest Service will have to depend on education and community involvement to make the new restrictions stick. Taylor said signs to be posted at the hot springs hopefully will serve that purpose.

## Mountain Home merchants hope base stays alive after moratorium

BOISE (AP) — Civilian supporters of Mountain Home Air Force Base remain confident the installation has a bright future despite a moratorium on the proposed expansion of nearby Saylor Creek bombing range.

Meanwhile, Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus and his challenger pledge their support to keep the extensive facility open.

Regional officials announced Tuesday all proposed substantial land acquisitions for bombing and training ranges have been placed on indefinite hold, including the 26-fold expansion of Saylor Creek to 2.6

million acres.

There has been concern among backers that should the expansion of Saylor Creek fall through, Mountain Home Air Force Base may end up on the list of bases facing closure due to cuts in the defense budget.

However, the Persian Gulf crisis has renewed Mountain Home boosters' hopes the nation will realize how crucial a well-trained military is to its welfare, said Bill Sanders, owner of Farmers Insurance in Mountain Home.

"With the world situation the way it is, this is the wrong time to discuss closures," Sanders said. "I don't

think there is anything in the make-up of things to attack the base right now."

Mountain Home Chamber of Commerce director John Greene concurs.

"All the rest of the country has to do is look at the world situation. Who are we going to call on when our country is threatened? We need a viable place for the military to train and in this case it's the Saylor Creek area," Greene said.

He disputes claims by the Snake River Alliance against the expansion that the Air Force does not need another inch of public land in the

West.

"People need jobs. If they want to look at something real closely, the military has been a better custodian of lands than the BLM has ever thought about being," Greene said.

Mountain Home Mayor Don Etter does not think the expansion is a "dead issue" just yet.

"Some things could still happen in Saylor Creek. I don't think it's dead, but I don't think I will get a lot of attention right away. I still think there will be some work done on Saylor Creek in the future," Etter said.

As far as Etter knows, Mountain Home is not on any base closure list.

Donna Herron of Catalano Insurance Agency said she still has concerns about the base.

"There is a group of people working here to save the base," she said. "We are sending people back to Washington, D.C., to lobby. Mountain Home Air Force Base is really important for our town and the state."

Andrus said meetings next week with Defense officials should show what an appropriate role the base should play. Earlier, he said Idaho must secure future missions for the base, the state's second largest employer.

"There will always be a need for superiority in the skies," he said. Next week, he plans to reiterate the need for flying millions of acres of space close proximity to bases in Nevada and Utah, and strong community support.

Republican opponent Roger Fairchild said he and Andrus "shouldn't let partisan politics destroy our support for the base here in Idaho, but I think the biggest risk we have is that partisan politics in Washington, D.C. may hurt us."

## DOE explodes nuclear device in Nevada

YUCCA FLAT, Nev. (AP) — The Energy Department conducted its fifth nuclear weapons test of the week Thursday in a shaft drilled into Yucca Flat, 7 1/2 miles northwest of Las Vegas.

DOE spokesman Jim Boyer said the test, code-named Sundown, was a success "from a safety standpoint and from the data received."

"There were no problems," Boyer said. "It was an extremely small test."

He said there was little chance the

blast could have been felt in Las Vegas as in the case with some large tests.

The device was buried 900 feet beneath the desert surface and carried an explosive force of less than 20 kilotons.

All tests are listed as having an explosive force of less than 20 kilotons, or 20 to 150 kilotons.

The device was detonated at 9:15 a.m. PDT.

Sundown was the 704th announced test at the Nevada Test Site since testing began there in January of 1951.

The DOE conducted 12 underground nuclear tests in Nevada last year.

The most recent previous test was Mineral Quarry on July 25.

The weapon tested Thursday was devised at the Los Alamos National Laboratories in New Mexico.

DOE spokesman Chris West said there were no protesters at the gate to the sprawling desert site, as there have been for some previous tests.

## Castleford School Board sets goals

CASTLEFORD — The district will be reviewing graduation requirements and high school scheduling, a building and maintenance schedule will be prepared and elementary school heating and energy conservation repairs will be completed under a new set of goals adopted by the school board.

Extra help will be given to all students who fall below the prescribed standard in reading and mathematics and a comprehensive vocational program and career-exploration program will be outlined if the district achieves all its goals.

The career program will teach students skills such as keyboarding,

help them gain work experience and offer vocational applied mathematics courses.

Curriculum and testing in all grades will be aligned to insure that curriculum and concepts covered by the tests and assessments are taught.

Graduation requirements and high school scheduling will be reviewed and textbooks will be approved to provide a curriculum base for all grades. The district will also implement a new textbook replacement policy.

A building maintenance and repair schedule should be adopted, according to the goals. And board policies and job descriptions will be reviewed and updated.

The 10-year accreditation review will be completed and accreditation

standards will be met and exceeded whenever possible, under the goals.

And elementary school heating and energy conservation repairs will be completed.

The school district also will promote activities that provide for proper funding of education in Castleford and will provide the best possible programs with available resources.

The board decided it will develop plans and policies to implement these goals as the year progresses.

In other business, the board:

- Adopted a drug-free workplace policy for staff members.
- Voted to put emergency lights in the gymnasium in case power failures occur when the gym is in use.

## Yearbook photos may cause battle at U of I

MOSCOW (AP) — Two revealing photographs of strikers on the University of Idaho campus may cause a showdown between the editor of last year's Gem yearbook and members of the student communications board, including the current editor.

And, except for a few not-so-subtle hints, the university administration is keeping out.

The issue is who has control over the student yearbook. The communications board wants to discuss the issue at a Thursday night meeting.

Student government leaders and UI officials have been mulling for several weeks about the photographs of UI students who were naked last spring near Gault Hall.

One photograph shows a group of nude men pummeling a clothed bystander who sprayed them with a bottle of water.

Former Gem editor Jill Beck,

now editor of the student newspaper, The Argonaut, said the final decision whether the photos will be used rests with her, and she has told the printers to leave them in the yearbook.

However, one of the photos, a picture of a lone striker, might need to be touched up, she said.

The yearbook printer, a North Carolina company, expressed concern over the pictures and said it needed written authorization to run them.

Hal Goodwin, vice president for student affairs, said Beck should discuss the issue with the communications board.

"I don't plan to intervene," said Wednesday. "But the fact that photos of this guy (the printer) is concerned is a significant signal that students should be alarmed."

If Beck acts without consulting the student board, "there's a risk this will create pressures for more administrative control, Goodwin warned.

## Benson stable but 'serious' after surgery

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Mormon Church President Ezra Taft Benson was "conscious and responsive" Thursday and remained in serious-but-stable condition following surgery to remove blood clots on his brain.

Church spokesman Don LeFevre said the 91-year-old Mormon spent a "good night" after surgeons performed a craniotomy to remove two blood clots between his skull and brain lining Wednesday.

LeFevre said Benson would remain in LDS Hospital's Intensive Care Unit for at least one more day and would probably remain in the hospital for another week before returning home.

Benson suffered severe headaches and difficulty swallowing before being hospitalized Tuesday.

LeFevre said he did not know whether those symptoms had been alleviated by the surgery.

Hospital spokesman Tim Madden said Benson was "conscious and responsive" Thursday morning. He remained sedated and on pain-killing medication, Madden said.

Neurosurgeon Dr. Bruce F. Sorensen was cautious in his estimation of Benson's prognosis following the surgery, but described the former agriculture secretary under President Dwight Eisenhower as a "tough guy for 91."

What's going on?

A combination of extended-hot weather, potential bumper potato and sugar beet crops and the Bureau of Reclamation's policy of keeping water storage as high up as possible in the Snake River system reservoirs has led to the current situation.

"We're currently supplying all of our storage needs from Palisades and Lake Walcott," said Mike Beus, hydraulic engineer for the BuRec's Burley office.

By the middle of next week, he's going to be depleted and after that it will be impossible to supply it all from Jackson Lake.

With American Falls Reservoir at zero pool level and Jackson Lake at 74 percent, the decision was made several weeks ago to release flows into and out of Palisades Reservoir.

As of Wednesday, 12,500 cubic feet per second, a flow normally seen only in the spring and early summer, is coursing through the South Fork below the dam. Anglers have reported the high water has seriously impacted fishing.

Upper Snake River Valley irrigators are still drawing much of the water off. At Tilden Bridge below Blackfoot, the flow was 6,700 second-feet Wednesday morning, one of the highest readings this season.

"During the middle of August, BuRec water planners began cutting Palisades back to 8,000 cfs, Beus said.

"We couldn't anticipate the hot weather continuing more than a couple of weeks," he said. "But we ended up using more water than anticipated in American Falls, so we had to open Palisades back up."

But that reservoir, straddling the Idaho-Wyoming border will be drained by the middle of next week, and storage in Jackson Lake will not be an option for more than a few days.

"We're just sitting here trying to be optimistic that the weather and conditions are going to change," Beus said.

Meanwhile, flows from Island Park Dam have cut the Henry's Fork to a relative trickle — only 210 second-feet.

## Florida draws probation from NCAA

GAINESVILLE, Fla. — The University of Florida was placed on NCAA probation for the second time in six years on Thursday, and school officials were upset that the punishment included a postseason ban for this year's football team.

The NCAA chose to impose less than the minimum proscribed penalties in a case of major violations. The bowl ban for this season was the only punishment of the football program, and there was no ban on televi-

sion appearances for either sport. The Gators also will not be eligible for the Southeastern Conference football championship because an SEC rule prohibits teams that are ineligible for a bowl game to win the conference title.

The basketball program's scholarships will be restricted and it must repay at least \$287,000 in revenue from the 1988 NCAA tournament because guard Vernon Maxwell played while he was ineligible. The Gators will be permitted 13 scholarships in 1991, two fewer than the maximum, and 14

scholarships in 1992-93.

First-year football coach Steve Spurrier said the bowl ban was a more severe penalty than Florida deserved.

"This has been a clean-run program in the last four or five years," Spurrier said. "There's been no cash payments, no buying tickets of players, no falsifying transcripts."

As part of the ruling, the NCAA cited former basketball coach Norm Sloan and former football coach Galen Hall, both fired last October, for unethical conduct. If

either takes a new coaching job in the next two years, his hiring must be approved by the NCAA Committee on Infractions.

Hall is now an unpaid graduate assistant at Penn State, while Sloan is coaching a professional team in Greece.

Chuck Smart, director of enforcement for the NCAA, said the case was unique because the school took significant corrective steps after the investigation was disclosed. For that reason, Smart said, the five-member Committee on Infractions did not impose the minimum proscribed penalties.

## Detroit player out of football due to drugs

DETROIT — Comeback Terry Taylor of the Detroit Lions on Thursday became the seventh NFL player banned for life under the league's drug policy.

The Lions, who acquired Taylor from the Seattle Seahawks last season for running back James Jones, said they won't appeal the league's action, based on Taylor's third positive test for substance abuse.

Taylor can reapply for admission to the league in a year. "It's always a shock to find out something like that, and my heart is heavy and saddened. But we have to go on and hope things work out for Terry," Coach Wayne Fontes said.

Taylor has been dogged by trouble for most of his seven-year career, which began when he chosen by Seattle as the 22nd player in the 1984 draft.

Neither Taylor nor his agent, Jack Mills of Boulder, Colo., could be reached by telephone on Thursday.

"The system for an alleged appeal really speaks for itself," said Richard Berthelsen, general counsel to the National Football League Players Association in Washington, D.C. "For him to appeal to the person who decided he should be out of the game in the first place is an exercise in futility."

Berthelsen declined to say whether Taylor had contacted the association for help.

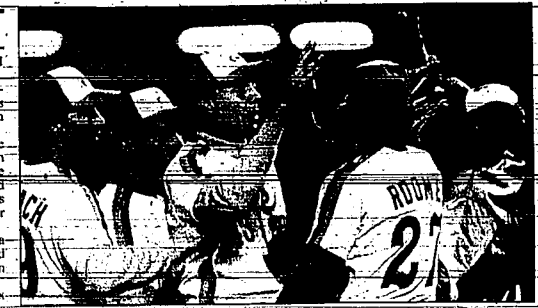

Barry has joined his father, Bobby Bonds, and 10 others as the only major leaguers to hit 30 homers and steal 30 bases in one season.

"My dad talked to me about what is my biggest goal," Bonds said. "I said obviously it's to get to the Hall of Fame. But the father-son combination 30-30 mark that will never be reached again and is something very special."

But in 1988, membership in the 30-30 club increased as Davis, Joe Carter, Howard Johnson and Darryl Strawberry all joined. Johnson did it again last season with 36 homers and 41 steals for the New York Mets.

"It's an individual achievement and I'm more interested in what we do as a team right now with the playoffs coming up," said Strawberry, who has 35 homers and 13 steals this season.

"I think I have the ability to do 40-40, but it's just a numbers thing."

Strawberry's mates are chasing Bonds and the Pirates in the NL East, and both are MVP candidates.

"I can't just worry about individual goals," Bonds said. "That's nice, but we want to finish first and if I have to give myself up for a big run, that's more important."

Bobby Bonds, who accom-

plished—30-30—a major league record five times, says there's a good chance the 30-30 club will add some new members soon, too.

"When I think of possible 40-40 candidates, I think two people: Joe Carter and Eric Davis," Bonds said. "If they put together the kind of years they're capable of, there's no doubt they can do it."

Before Carter did it in 1987, for Cleveland, Bobby Bonds was the last American League player to reach 30-30—in 1978 with the Chicago White Sox and Texas Rangers.

"There's more emphasis on stealing bases now, so there will be more and more players reaching those numbers," said Bobby Bonds, who finished his career with 332 homers and 461 stolen bases.

The first member of the 30-30 club was Ken Williams of the St. Louis Browns in 1922 when he led the AL with 39 homers and stole 37 bases.

Others to do it include Hank Aaron, Tommy Harper and Dale Murphy.

## Iraq seeks pipeline hook-up with Iran

The Associated Press

WASHINGTON — Iraq has asked Iran if the two countries can join their oil pipelines — a move that would allow Saddam Hussein to partly bypass the international embargo against his country, U.S. officials said Thursday.

Iran has not yet responded to the request, but U.S. officials also note that intelligence experts estimate a link between the two pipeline systems could be completed within a month, if they decide to go ahead. One of Iraq's major pipelines, which runs along the Shatt al-Arab waterway, one point is just five miles from a major Iranian pipeline that goes into Iran's refinery at Abadan.

Such a link would let Iraq export 500,000 barrels of oil a day in return for readily used cash, food and medicine, said the officials, who commented only on condition of not being named.

The Iraqi request is the latest overture by President Saddam Hussein toward Iran, with which he fought a destructive eight-year war. He has turned to his former foe in an effort to breach the international blockade imposed by the United Nations after his Aug. 2 invasion of Kuwait.

In return for promises of food and medicine, Iran has gotten back thousands of war prisoners and an agreement to share sovereignty over a bitterly contested border waterway. In addition, Iraq has withdrawn troops from Iranian territory occupied during the 1980-88 war.

A senior Iranian official is in Baghdad negotiating terms of the pact.

And Iran's ambassador to Pakistan said Thursday that Saddam may soon visit Tehran.

Administration officials have played down the importance of the new, saying Iraq has everything to gain and little to lose. They also note that Iran has promised to abide by the embargo, and say they see no signs it has flouted.

Nonetheless, U.S. intelligence is keeping an eye on three tankers anchored in an Iraqi pipeline terminal in the Shatt al-Arab. U.S. officials say they are worried the oil-laden vessels might head for nearby Iranian waters and unload the oil to be sold through Iran.

"So far we have no indications of Iraq tankers in Iranian waters," said CIA Department of State spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler.

"We would expect Iran would take appropriate measures to prevent circumvention of the embargo in their territorial waters," Tutwiler said.

Before it invaded Kuwait on Aug. 2, Iraq gained control of oil fields, Iraq exported about 2.7 million barrels of crude a day. But since the international embargo was imposed Aug. 6, Iraq and Kuwait oil exports have all but stopped.

The CIA estimates that the naval blockade by the United States and its allies has stopped most of Iraq's oil shipments.

## Camels still visible at market

HIOFUF, Saudi Arabia — In a dusty marketplace, an elderly man points to a stranger and says, "American?"

The stranger nods yes.

"Others will be looking for the same," he says. The price is 10 riyals.

The place is Hofuf, a small city in eastern Saudi Arabia. It's early morning and the sun is a sliver of orange on the horizon. The country people gather here on the edge of town to begin the weekly ritual of the sheep and camel auction.

"The scene is not unlike a farmers' market in the American heartland. Sheep bleat as their owners pull them about, looking for the best price," he says. Sellers make counter offers.

Everywhere there is dust, stirred by human and animal feet.

No designer sunglasses or jewel-encrusted watches adorn these simple desert people, who adhere to a way of life that has changed little in a country rich with petrodollars.

In earlier days, the camels were herded to market on hoof. Today, they are in the backs of Japanese-made pickup trucks.

Some of the animals protest with high-pitched cries as they are lifted from the trucks with slings and cranes.

Others are unloaded more unceremoniously, by a quick back-and-forward movement of the truck that sends them sprawling in the dust.

Young boys, dressed in the traditional red-checked head-dress and white robes tend the beasts.

"A good male camel goes at auction for about \$405. Racing camels can fetch as much as \$13,500."

Camels are also used as beasts of burden and meat. Their milk is believed by some to be an aphrodisiac.

## Recreation stops for prayer as troops adjust to Saudi custom

DHAHRAN, Saudi Arabia — When the Muslim call to prayer echoes over the U.S. air base, ignites in the gymnasium dim and basketball players stop underneath their beliefs," said Lt. Edward Barlow, 73 of Richmond, Va.

Saudis and Americans are trying to figure out where conservative Muslims and freewheeling soldiers can find common ground.

At the vanguard of the effort are Capt. Glen Costales and Staff Sgt. Todd Makinson of the 1st Tactical Fighter Wing. They're in charge of programs for the base that fall under the category of Morale, Welfare and Recreation — MWR in military jargon.

For the 3,000 troops stationed here, Costales and Makinson are known as Fun 1 and Fun 2, their radio monikers.

Saudi Arabia has no public movie theaters, bans alcohol and sharply limits the mixing of the sexes in pub-

lic. Under the strict practice of Wahab Islam prevalent here, even music and dancing are frowned upon.

"MWR is just as important as air conditioning over here," said Senior Airman Daniel Henry, 25, of Los Angeles. Without it, "I'd be sweating out," he said.

There has been friction between the two cultures since the beginning of the U.S.-military buildup. Among the Saudi objections: soldiers carrying weapons in public, women driving on supply runs-off the base, and a private variety-show-that-featured women dancing. The show was canceled.

Costales of Porterville, Calif., and Makinson of Avon, Miss., said they have avoided problems on the air base by accepting Saudi ground rules, then quietly negotiating changes.

Sports was a prime example. The Saudis took the major step of allowing women to use the gym during special hours. The windows around the Olympic-size pool were taped.

Separate shuttle buses take men and women to the gym. Public buildings in Saudi Arabia have separate entrances for women, so they were asked to use the back door.

"When I first came over here the rules were very strict, the customs

very strict. I felt like I was in prison," said Staff Sgt. Rosie Yee, 33, of Leeland, Miss., who works in sheet metal construction. "I can see their viewpoint... We're guests in this country and have to go by the rules," said Ms. Yee.

The rules for the men include wearing at least a T-shirt and shorts. Jogging outside is banned.

Costales makes sure all activity ceases during the five, 30-minute prayer times each day. The mosque is right in front of the gym. "You don't see the mosque, it's just right and upset them," he said.

Funs 1 and 2 also oversee popcorn machines, hundreds of packs of cards and dozens of board games like Monopoly and the highly popular war game, Risk.

They expect to have four tents one for reading or hanging out, one for games, one a concession stand selling Eschins designed by the troops, and one for movies.

The book and film library is also dictated by Saudi mores: "Anything pornographic is out. Anything that exposes too much flesh — Playboy and all that stuff — is out," said Costales.

Airman Henry, sitting in the movie tent, counts off a list of movies full of sex and violence he wanted to see.

## Resistance men say hiding Westerners getting harder

MANAMA, Bahrain — Resistance fighters in Kuwait are doing their best to hide Westerners but they don't know how long they can continue because of brutal Iraqi reprisals, three Kuwaiti brothers who fled to Bahrain said Thursday.

"The problem is they're now picking up all men between the ages of 17 and 45," one brother said. "Anyone harboring Westerners is executed."

They fled Kuwait to Saudi Arabia Wednesday night and were intercepted by the Saudis on the way to Bahrain by the Associated Press.

"One Kuwaiti was hiding an American. The Iraqis found out and hung the Kuwaiti. The American was taken away," he said.

They spoke on condition of anonymity because they said they had all been in the resistance movement fighting the Iraqis who invaded Kuwait on Aug. 2.

They fled Kuwait to Saudi Arabia Wednesday night and were intercepted by the Saudis on the way to Bahrain by the Associated Press.

## U. S. soldier treated for bite from poisonous snake

DHAHRAN, Saudi Arabia — A U.S. Army infantryman was flown to a military hospital for treatment last week after being bitten by a poisonous snake, doctors said Wednesday.

Maj. Leonardo Thompson, a surgeon at an Army hospital, said the soldier was admitted five days ago,

suffering from vomiting and convulsions blamed on the snakebite.

Thompson said doctors believed a species of the pit viper snake bit the soldier. The snake was being warned not to walk in the desert with out boots because of the high risk of snakebites as the weather cools here.

The soldier, from the Mechanized 24th Infantry Division, was given intravenous anti-venom medication.

Thompson said: "The name of the soldier was not released."

Thompson said the soldier was flown to the Army hospital because the anti-venom medication is derived from horse blood and often causes adverse reactions in humans that require hospitalization for treatment.

Thompson said a second soldier also has been treated for a less severe snake bite.

### Laughter boots Ed O'Neill out of new Paramount movie

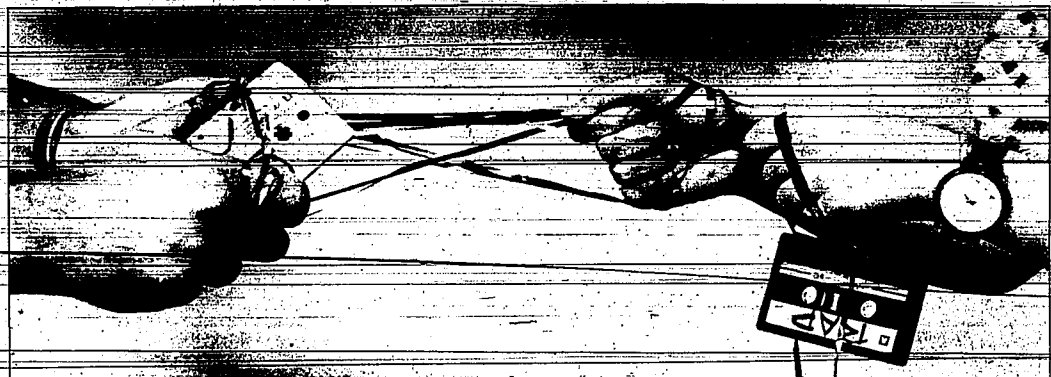
HOLLYWOOD - Is Ed O'Neill married... with an image problem?

# Rapping rap Parents struggle with teens' 'nasty' musical habits

2 Live Crew can be as nasty as they wanna be, but not where Judy Friedemann can hear them.

Friedemann's 18-year-old son listens to 2 Live Crew, a rap group that sparked a nationwide controversy with lyrics straight out of a high school locker room, but she insists he do it out of earshot.

The group's album, "As Nasty as They Wanna Be," was pulled from many record store shelves after a Florida judge ruled the crew's lyrics were obscene.

"It dismays me that he likes it so much," Friedemann said of her son, Kurt. "It reflects a darker side." But she hasn't forbidden her son or 15-year-old daughter Kathy from listening to the band.

Kurt dismisses his mother's concern about the nasty lyrics, insisting that the music isn't harmful.

"Just to let it when I'm in that kind of mood like if you're out with your friends... and feeling really pumped," Kurt said.

He apparently is not alone. Last month, album sales approached 2 million, and "Nasty" was No. 40 on the Billboard chart.

The album is hard to buy legally, but bootleg cassettes circulate widely and the curiosity factor draws many listeners who don't ordinarily listen to rap music, said Twin Falls High School junior Travis Miles.

Whatever the attraction, rappers such as 2 Live Crew, Easy E and N.W.A. are stretching the boundaries of acceptability long tested by heavy metal and pop groups.

In so doing, they are forcing a new generation of parents to make tough choices about their children's music.

Listening to the music and talking to the children about it aren't good enough, said the Rev. Wayne Nabors of the Twin Falls Christian Center.

"If I know something is harmful to my child and I still allow them to listen to it, I've abdicated my responsibility as a parent," said Nabors. "Parenting is not for cowards."

Turning off the stereo can be a strong expression of a parent's value system, Nabors said.

"As parents, we not only have to teach them, we have to show them," he said.

"If one of his children brought a questionable album into the house, Nabors said he would listen to it and explain it. "And if it is wrong, it's off limits," he said.

Parents should be concerned about the music their children listen to, but censorship doesn't work, some parents say.

"I do not think any responsible parent would do I listen to the stuff," said Collette of Southern Idaho drama teacher Tony Mannen, whose two sons are 13 years old.

"But I don't put blanket censorship on anything my kids do."

Sexual imagery and violence are present far beyond the local record store, said Mannen, who plays guitar for The Phabulous Phakers, a local rock and roll band.

"Even if I were to say 'No you can't listen to that,' they would still hear it," Mannen said.

Better that parents discuss their children's music with them and set some moral standards than have the kids listen on the sly, argue some teens and parents.

People clamoring for record stores to pull albums from their shelves are just "ignorant authority figures," said 16-year-old Ryan Peck of Twin Falls. "Parents should care about the music being played in their house," he said. "But they shouldn't say 'You can't listen to that,' Peck said.

If parents do their job, "kids aren't going to learn about sex from an album," he said.

"Kids base their values on what they learn from their parents," said Grant Olsen.

"If they go out and do all these bad things, it's not the music — not the music — that are to blame, he said.

Popular music is merely a reflection of society, and blaming music for the world's problems "is like blaming you as a journalist for the problems in the Middle East," Olsen said.

Last year, when the song "Wild Thing" by rapper Ton Loe received a lot of airplay, Mannen said he changed stations when the song came on the radio.

"It was full of sexual innuendo," Mannen said. "Records have done that for years, but not in such a crude form."

Young people should be allowed to make all their own choices about the music they listen to "when they need to start thinking for themselves," Judy Friedemann said.

Would Judy Friedemann have let her son listen to 2 Live Crew?

## Most local stores avoid controversy

The Sound-Socket in Hailey won't sell "As Nasty as They Wanna Be" by the 2 Live Crew to anyone younger than 18.

The other Sound Socket store, just 12 miles up the road in Keetchum, will sell it unless the clerk thinks the buyers' parents may object.

The difference in policy regarding the rap album, which is replete with four-letter words and graphic depictions of sexual acts, results from differing community standards, said Kathy Hurst, manager of the Keetchum store.

Hailey is a more family-oriented town, and parents there are more likely to be concerned about their children's music than those in upscale Keetchum, Hurst said.

In Twin Falls, virtually all music outlets are national chain stores, and potentially "offensive" music is censored at the corporate level.

You won't find 2 Live Crew — or dozens of other bands that might offend — on the shelves at K mart, Payless, ShopKo or Musiciansland.

"We're the family shopping place. We wouldn't want to have anything that might offend any section of the public," said "Band Adams," manager of the Twin Falls K mart store. "K mart is a very conservative company that usually steers clear of controversy."

Likewise at Payless, "what we get is determined by the corporate office in Wilsonville, Ore.," said store manager Roy Dixon.

"If someone complained about something we had in the store, we would take it off the shelf," Dixon said.

At Musiciansland, Easy E and other controversial rappers are on the shelf, but not 2 Live Crew. "Our managers are allowed to talk about company policy."

Musiciansland's Minneapolis head quarters is also keeping quiet, trying to avoid controversy while seeking

## Idaho keeps clear of battle in courts

The 2 Live Crew's album "As Nasty as They Wanna Be" was pulled from many south-Florida record stores in March after a Broward County judge ruled the band's lyrics were obscene.

On June 6, a U.S. District Court judge upheld the earlier ruling and found the album obscene in Florida's Broward, Dade and Palm Beach counties. Just a few weeks later, police arrested the crew's lead singer, Luther Campbell, for performing songs from the album at an adults-only show in Hollywood, Fla.

The controversy has prompted legislation in Twin Falls, probably because most local stores never carried the explicit-laced album or stopped selling it after the story made national headlines.

Twin Falls City Attorney Fritz Wondrich said he was not aware of any recent obscenity cases in the state relating to music.

With the exception of a general complaint from a Wendell woman, Wondrich said his office has not received any pressure to prosecute local music vendors for selling offensive albums.

The House chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union has filed a lawsuit to compel Idaho to ban records in the state, said ACLU spokesperson Jack Van Valkenburgh. Sponsorship, whether aimed at individuals, the press or rap bands, is not the way to solve problems, Van Valkenburgh said.

"Free expression is the guiding principle of a society willing to look at itself from many different perspectives," he said.

State laws do not specifically regulate the content of recorded material, but offensive records could fall under Idaho's anti-ob-

scenity laws, the attorneys said.

Section 18-101 of the Idaho Code defines "obscene" material as "any matter which the average person, applying contemporary community standards, would find, when considered as a whole, appeals to the prurient interest; and... describes patently offensive... descriptions of ultimate sexual acts... masturbation, excretory functions, or lewd exhibition of the genitals or genital area."

The Idaho law closely mirrors standards established by the U.S. Supreme Court, Van Valkenburgh said.

Historically, it has been left up to judges and juries to clarify vague points such as "contemporary community standards" and "patently offensive."

Prosecutors also must find the material to have "no serious literary, artistic, political or scientific value" according to the law.

## Changing times, marketing make stars less like royalty

LOS ANGELES - Greta Garbo hadn't made a movie in a half century and shunned all publicity for 60 years. Yet when she died April 14 in New York, the news appeared on front pages around the world.

Why such international attention to an actress who had made only 24 films, half of them silent? The answer lies in the mystique that pervaded Hollywood from the 1920s through the '30s, the period when movie stars were akin to royalty.

Such a mystique is missing in today's movie world. Time in any television talk show and you can find stars expounding on their latest movies or anything else that pops into their minds. Read the headlines at the market check-out stand and you can learn about the stars' peccadillos, real or

imagined.

"Everything is common now," comments publicist Jerry Papp, who began as a Hollywood correspondent 30 years ago. "Back then, stars were gods and goddesses. You saw them only in exotic movie roles or in glamorous poses; playing croquet or tennis."

Communication, has become almost instantaneous, largely because of television. Back in the 1930s, news took a long time to reach the public. There was no television, just print media and radio.

Some observers attribute the decline in the fine art of publicity to the loss of glamour.

"The public is far more sophisticated today as is the press," observes John Struss, a 45-year veteran of movie publicity.

In the old studio years, carefully constructed mystiques were carefully leaked to the public. There was only so much about a star's private life that would be revealed to

fans.

Garbo was such a legend because the public saw so little of her and knew so much about her. Today, some of the biggest and most relevant actors are busy giving interviews to sell movies and themselves: Robert De Niro, Meryl Streep, Jack Nicholson, Warren Beatty.

Streep, whose TV appearances have been few, surprised everyone by appearing in August at a Las Vegas press junket for "Postcards From The Edge." Such junkets are a relatively new device by which television, radio and print reporters are flown in from all parts of the country for an intensive day or two of interviews with stars of a new film. De Niro appeared at a New York junket for his new film, "Goodfellas."

Nicholson may have lost some of his mystique with a rash of interviews for "The Untouchables." Though he still wears televi-

sion Beatty, Tong a shadowy figure, turned

up on dozens of TV shows to promote "Dick Tracy."

Stars of an earlier era were not subjected to the mass marketing of today's film companies, yet they were embraced by an adoring public. The heyday of the star system came during the Depression in the 1930s, when movies were the only mass entertainment medium, and Americans flocked to theaters to forget their own woes.

The era continued until after World War II, when television began to assert itself as the primary source of entertainment.

The wizard of star-making was Howard Strickling, head of publicity at MGM from its beginnings in 1924 until the 1970s. A self-effacing man with a pronounced stutter, he commanded a department of 30 publicists. Strickling capitalized on Garbo's natural shyness by making her a woman of

mystery.

# Crosby, Stills and Nash remain loyal to their own songs, ideals

**NEW YORK (AP)** — David Crosby and Graham Nash were performing at the United Nations last fall when they learned the Berlin Wall was coming down.

They got on the telephone — one call to fetch Stephen Stills, another to hook a flight and CSN were on their way.

"It epitomizes everything good about our music, tearing down walls between people," Crosby explained under calmer circumstances, the three sitting around a coffee table in their hotel in New York. Crosby and Nash lean forward; Stills, again the last to arrive, slouches sideways, his legs bent over the armrest of his chair.

"The Wall has been a thing for us. When I saw them, take the sledgehammer to the Wall got tears in my eyes. We just heard this song, 'Graham's called' 'Chipping Away'—I guess we're crazy. Somehow it was significant to sing that song at that place at that time."

Everyone seems to have changed the past 20 years except CSN, who look as if they just walked off the stage at Woodstock: jeans, hair and outfit intact.

Formed in late 1968 as one of rock 'n' roll's first supergroups, CSN is now more in the tradition of folk performers such as Peter, Paul and Mary or Pete Seeger, traveling the world and their voices to liberal causes, entertaining crowds with well-worn favorites.

Whether it's a concert at the Wall or an environmental benefit back home, CSN'll be there, guitars in their hands, passports in their pockets, pausing in the middle of "Teach Your Children" to let audiences sing the chorus.

"That song is like an anthem," Crosby said. "Everybody relates to it. My daughter related to that when she was 3-6 years old. My father related to it when he was 80—Nash—I hate him but he writes these great songs."

"Our House" they always sing. They sing along with Stills' "Suite: Early Blue Eyes." They love to sing that. But they never sing any of my stuff. Nobody has even sung a single word from it in its full group exhibit.

"Yeah, they sing along with the 'Suite.'" Stills notes in his laid-back, husky voice. "And they sing along to 'Love the One You're With.' But 'Guinnevere,' David's song, is a little acreage."

"The things we talk about are important to us and to other people," Nash said. "We see 14- to 55-year-old kids singing to 'Teach Your Children' and the rest of the things we do. It means two things: 'We

Finding enough material for live shows is no problem. "I've written out the causes arguments. They've been touring this summer to promote their new album, 'Live It Up,' and that means some favorites have to go."

Crosby ticks off the other favorites: "Wooden Ships," "Chicago," "Almost Cut My Hair." More recently, there's "Southern Cross" and "Just a Song Before I Go."

All of this, he says, has something to do with the Wall. It's about communication. Instant feedback. He remembers being with Yung in 1970 when they picked up a copy of Life Magazine and read about the four through it. A tank didn't knock that wall down, an army didn't knock that wall down, people did, an idea did.

"I call up Los Angeles, 'Nash, we have to go to the studio—now!' He sets it up, finds Stills and we made the record and put 'Find the Cost of Freedom' on the back."

"Nash speaks of 'After the Dolphin,' a song off the 'Live It Up' LP, about a British bar called 'The Dolphin' that had been bombed by the Germans during World War I. That was a turning point, he explains: it was the first time innocent civilians were subjected to bombing, and now warfare was no longer personal. At least before, you had to face your enemies."

"Most of the ills of the human condition we would attribute to communications breakdown," says Stills. "The Wall was a physical separation. Communication went right over it and through it. A tank didn't knock that wall down, an army didn't knock that wall down, people did, an idea did."

If a star got in a fight, drank too much, engaged in a love scandal, or even got arrested, Strickling would have given him or her a "serious" lecture and assigned a publicist from his staff to babysit and keep the star out of trouble.

Ann Miller has warm memories of her 12 years at MGM.

"It was like being in the 'Ziegfeld Follies.' Those were the golden years, and I got in on the tail end of them," she said. "I never fought with my bosses; I just took what they gave me and shut up about it, and enjoyed it."

"Mind a hall. It was like constantly being at a big party — beautiful costumes, wonderful directors. The stars were glorious: Lana Turner, Ava Gardner, Esther Williams, Cyd Charisse, Fred Astaire, Gene Kelly, Eddie Reynolds, and even Rowan, 'likes of these people that you'll never see again.'"

And stars, Gardner, a teenager from North Carolina, would be under contract for seven years, appearing mostly in bit parts and publicity photos in bath suits. When she was considered ready, she would co-

star with Gable and Spencer Tracy.

During the big-studio times, a star might appear in three or four movies a year, establishing a steady relationship with filmgoers. Consider today's stars, Barbra Streisand, Robert Redford, Dustin Hoffman, Beatty and others have been absent from the screen for as long as five years at a time.

Are the stars of the Golden-Brodwinding to a precious-foe? Not necessarily. Despite previous losses — Carolee, Bette Davis, Barbara Stanwyck, Irene Dunne — an amazing number remain. 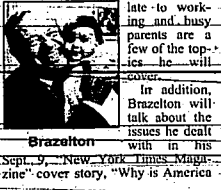

## Yes, television critics do watch shows first

One of the most popular questions I get from readers when I speak at a school or service-club luncheon is this: Do you get to watch the shows before you review them?

"I'm always stunned by this question. Beads of sweat form on my brow, my heart begins to race, the room starts to spin and I have to grip the lectern hard to keep from slipping out or becoming sick right there on the spot.

"Ohmygod," I think. "Do these people really think that I would review a show that I would formulate a strong opinion and assign one to five stars, without seeing the show first? Do they think I'm GUESSING?"

Evidently, yes. Which can mean one of two things: both of them bad.

One, that people have been reading my reviews, then watching the shows... and find it hard to believe that I could have watched THAT show and written THAT review.

Or two, that I have been dismissive in explaining to people just how TV critics do — at least this TV critic goes about his job. What seems like self-evident routine to me remains a mystery to many readers.

For obvious reasons of self-respect (delusion?), I prefer theory No. 2.

So with the bulk of new fall shows descending on us, this would seem to be an ideal time for a primer in TV reviewing. Let's start at the beginning.

Do I watch the shows before I review them?

Yes every time. Here's how it works: Anywhere from a month to a week before a new show is scheduled to air, the network (ABC, NBC, CBS or Fox) sends me a videocassette of it. Sometimes I'll watch it at the office, but more often I'll watch it at home — usually by myself — but sometimes with my wife or children.

Generally, a show has a better chance of getting a positive review if I watch it with them. They're all nicer than I am.

An important thing you should know about these review tapes supplied by the networks: They contain no commercials. This means the good shows seem even better than they are, and even the execrable ones seem less execrable without stupid commercials adding insult to injury.

Of course, as a critic you learn to take this into account, and I don't believe it's necessary to watch a show when it comes to a 30-minute sitcom (reduced to 22 minutes after commercials). The danger of misjudgment is greater with one-hour dramas and most acute with miniseries.

The miniseries that a critic may watch over the course of a couple of days without commercials simply doesn't look the same to the viewer watching it over many days, interrupted not just by ads but other TV shows, to say nothing of the viewers' real lives.

The worst error I ever made in this regard — was the miniseries "Space," a 15-hour epic that had a powerful impact on me as I screened it over two days in isolated, commercial-less splendor. The same series, screened "today" and drained of emotional impact when spread over two weeks on CBS.

Sometimes it works the other way — critics must use their imaginations to enhance what they see in the preview tapes, which often miss the "rough cuts" without the final sound effects. There aren't many stranger sights than actors shuffling around a dance floor pretending to dance with no music playing. Now that's acting.

Finally, a note about my criteria in judging shows. Though some of you may not believe it, I know from reading other critics that I tend, in general, to be an easy grader. (But don't ask the producers of "The Golden Girls." I was the only critic in America who skunked it when it premiered in 1986.)

My high tolerance is due to the realization that critics often are wrong, and I don't like the idea of steering you away from a show you may actually enjoy, no matter how little I think of it. That's why I'll say lots of insulting things about a show, but never "don't watch."

I would rather err in the other direction with undue praise that seduces you into watching something you might otherwise have skipped. The worst that can happen is that you waste an hour and never watch the show again.

Here's another theory, popular in my house, that this lofty statement of purpose is a lot of baloney, an elaborate rationalization of the fact that I am too easily — far too easily — amused.

Hey, I can imagine worse epithets.

## Bill Cosby beats Michael Jackson for 2-year earnings

**NEW YORK (AP)** — TV's top-rated that is also its highest-paid one, Bill Cosby, knocked Michael Jackson out of first place on Forbes' list of the world's 40 richest entertainers with two-year earnings projected at \$115 million.

Jackson, who had been No. 1 for two years straight, hasn't put out an album or gone on tour this year but still made more money than any other singer or musical group, with a two-year estimate of \$100 million.

Jackson's singing sister Janet was a newcomer to Forbes' list. She ranked 26th with estimated two-year earnings of \$30 million, the magazine said in its Oct. 1 issue.

Cosby made \$60 million last year, and Forbes projected he would earn \$55 million this year.

The Rolling Stones, with \$48 million — rose to third place from eighth last year thanks largely to a big concert tour. Movie producer-director Steven Spielberg, whose "Archonophobia" was a box office success this summer, made \$87 million. He slipped to fourth place from second.

New entrants on the list were teeny-bopper sensation New Kids on the Block in fifth place. Forbes said the group would make \$78 million in the two years, \$61 million of it in 1990.

Forbes said the estimated gross incomes were based on talks with in-

dustry executives, lawyers, agents and managers.

It said earnings figures for recording artists are based on royalty payments from record and video sales and estimated gross for tours.

Rounding out the top 10 were Oprah Winfrey, \$68 million; Sylvester Stallone, \$63 million; Madonna, \$62 million; Arnold Schwarzenegger, \$55 million; and "Peanuts" cartoonist Charles M. Schulz, \$54 million.

# Estevez produces breezy, good-natured comedy in 'Men at Work'

**HOLLYWOOD** — With "Men at Work" actor-writer-director Emilio Estevez has turned out a pleasant, knockabout comedy for himself and brother Charlie Sheen. While it may not be the funniest picture you'll see all year, it is fresh, inventive and has very few moments when it is not generating laughs.

With this second feature, his first was the 1986 "Wisdom," an uneven but promising love-on-the-run thriller with political overtones. Estevez warrants continued encouragement. Not all his jokes are inspired, but he has a light touch with comedy, a nice flair for breezy, throwaway humor.

Estevez and Sheen play a couple of garbage collectors in a Southern California beach town, where they dream of opening up a surf shop someday. In the meantime, they stave off boredom with compulsive prankishness. Alas, they are already on probation with the cops when they come upon a corpse of a young man (Darrell Larson), a preppy type who was running for city council and who was killed by a blow to the chest on a greedy tycoon (John Getz), who has been dumping hundreds of leaky barrels of toxic waste into the ocean.

It is not for nothing that Estevez is the son of activist actor Martin

Sheen, but he is too savvy to be heavy-handed about sending an environmental message. Instead he comes up with a string of absurd adventures for his garbage collectors of the kind that bedeviled Laurel and Hardy.

The on-screen camaraderie between Estevez and Sheen is infectious, and Estevez allows everyone in the cast to contribute to the fun and mayhem, including lovely leading lady Leslie Hope and witty sidekick Keith David. Stewart Copeland's jaunty score underlines the film's bouncy pace most effectively, a nice flair for breezy, lively.

"Men at Work" (rated PG-13, for some adult innuendo) is a modest treat.

# 'Arachnophobia' offers humor, technical wizardry

## Capsule reviews

### ARACHNOPHOBIA (PG-13)

For a movie that plans to scare the snot out of us, "Arachnophobia" is a funny-seary primal scream of a comedy. It is a friendly and nicely witty affair, technically, it's a wonder. It is the classic form, done on a grander scale: the blob-Martin-spider nearly wipes out the perfect American small town. On the other hand, we have a very contemporary hero (a dryly humorous Jeff Daniels), un-macho enough to yell to his kids.

### DIE HARD 2 (R)

This is the most cheerfully preposterous film of a jaw-dropping summer, which is not to say it's not fun, it's simply over-estrated Looney Tunes. Even Bruce Willis' redoubtable detective, John McClane, keeps shaking his head over his part in all the action. But all in all, this sequel is a lively three-ring circus, just don't be fussy about logic or timing, and for heaven's sake, watch out for falling glass.

### FLATLINERS (R)

Some lines shouldn't be crossed; some movies shouldn't be watched. No, that's too easy. This Joel Schumacher film, in which five photogenic med students decide to experience death and afterlife scientifically, is ominously

watchable, gloriously aflame with swanky deep-focus decor. But it's built around the kind of spirituality hucksters sell. Maseratis with. The theme is like a little dry pea rattling through the vast, echoing museum of the high-tech images: Why should anyone risk death to see the other lives depicted here, when they can get the same stuff by subscribing to cable TV?

### GHOST (PG-13)

The movie's slogan is "Believe," not an unreasonable request. But even those who'd be happy to comply must get past a certain woolly-mindedness to its script and a production prettified to the point of stickiness. With some cracked-voice, desolate lover; Whoopi Goldberg as an extremely reluctant spirit go-between and Vincent Schiavelli as an imitable subway-dwelling ghost — things are in the best hands possible. But Patrick Swayze as a corporate New York banker? Never in 7 million corporate years.

### POSTCARDS FROM THE EDGE (R)

Carrie Fisher's adaptation of her own book may seem more like fortune cookie zingers than a fleshed-out screenplay, but under Mike Nichols' direction it is massively enjoyable, thanks to the spirited comic grumbling of Meryl Streep and the star turn of Shirley MacLaine. They play a pair of movie pros — an egotistic ex-star of '50s musicals and her actress-daughter, struggling back from her love habit, the summer is the disco-

ery that Streep can sing too.

**PRESUMED INNOCENT (R)**. A solid joy, an enthralling drama, part who-dunit, part moral dilemma, perfectly cast and performed brilliantly by all, but especially by Harrison Ford, Bonnie Bedelia and Paul Winfield. Scott Turow's fans will be pleased to know that screenwriter Frank Pierson and the film's director, Alan J. Pakula, have made an uncommonly sensitive adaptation of what's been called a bullet train of a book.

### TAKING CARE OF BUSINESS (R)

It's High Concept time again — brilliant New Zealand action director Geoff Murphy ("Utu"), assigned

the sequel to 1988's "Bad Patrol" retelling of the "Billy the Kid" legend, makes a tale full of sound, gunfire, fury and scorchingly beautiful landscapes. Emilio Estevez is closer than any previous Billy to the look of the sawed-off impish-killer, and the cast is deep — though overall, this version pales next to Peckinpah's in 1973. It's Murphy and cinematographer Dean ("Mad Max") Semler, who make it special.

### YOUNG GUNS II (PG-13)

There haven't been many movie Westerns with this much sheer visual energy and excitement since Peckinpah and Leone were in their '70s prime. The (R)-It's High Concept time again — brilliant New Zealand action director Geoff Murphy ("Utu"), assigned



# Violence against women is an issue in 'Good Night, Sweet Wife' TV murder

This story shocked the nation: A man driving through inner-city Boston, Charles Stuart and his pregnant wife, Carol, were brutally attacked by a young black man. But months later, it transpired that Charles Stuart had fabricated the entire story. It was he, not an unidentified assailant, who had shot and killed his wife.

**'Good Night, Sweet Wife: A Murder in Boston,'** a drama based on this shocking and complex event, airs Tuesday, Sept. 25, on CBS. Ken Olin and Annabella Price star as the Stuarts, and Margaret Colin plays Michelle Caruso, the Boston Herald reporter who first pointed out inconsistencies in Charles Stuart's account of the incident and ultimately helped to lay bare the truth.

When Charles Stuart's emergency 911 call came to the police from his car phone on the night of Oct. 23, 1983, the production team from the CBS "Rescue 911" series happened to be on the scene. "We were profiling the Boston EMS (Emergency Medical Services) that week, and on the third night out, the call came in," recalls "Good Night, Sweet Wife" executive producer Arnold Shapiro, who is also the producer of "Rescue 911." "The crew we were riding with was the first on the scene."

Nearly everyone — including Shapiro — accepted Charles Stuart's story, which fit in with preconceived notions of violent, hostile inner cities. In an atmosphere of heightened racial tension, the Boston police searched for a young, black

attacker. But Stuart's story began to crumble, and when it became clear that suspicion was centering on him, he drowned himself in Boston harbor.

It seemed inconceivable at first that Stuart could have been the culprit. He himself had been seriously wounded in the attack. Only reporter Caruso questioned the inconsistencies in Stuart's original 911 call. Inconsistencies that the police and prosecutors initially dismissed.

Caruso visited the deserted corner where Stuart claimed he and his wife were attacked on a Monday evening at 8:30, and she discovered that on that day and time the corner was anything but deserted. She traced the route that Stuart drove while he claimed to be lost. Why, she wondered, did he turn off a main road onto a tiny side street?

Caruso does not see herself as a

hero. "A good reporter," she says, "gets it in the paper." Since she was unable to get any officials to verify her suspicions, she and her editors did not print them. Indeed, it is frightening to contemplate how close Charles Stuart came to getting away with murder.

My genuine hope is that people will take a lesson away from viewing this movie," says producer Shapiro. "Let's not forget how pervasive and ugly violence against women and children is. Men, like Charles Stuart, exist in every city. And let us not be so quick to give in to racial prejudices."

Nearly everyone — including Shapiro — accepted Charles Stuart's story, which fit in with preconceived notions of violent, hostile inner cities. In an atmosphere of heightened racial tension, the Boston police searched for a young black

attacker. But Stuart's story began to crumble, and when it became clear that suspicion was centering on him, he drowned himself in Boston harbor.

It seemed inconceivable at first that Stuart could have been the culprit. He himself had been seriously wounded in the attack. Only reporter Caruso questioned the inconsistencies in Stuart's original 911 call.

Investigators that the police and prosecutors initially dismissed.

Caruso visited the "deserted corner" where Stuart claimed he and his wife were attacked on a Monday evening at 8:30, and she discovered that on that day and time the corner was anything but deserted. She traced the route that Stuart drove while he claimed to be lost. Why, she wondered, did he turn off a main road onto a tiny side street?

Caruso does not see herself as a

hero. "A good reporter," she says, "gets it in the paper." Since she was unable to get any officials to verify her suspicions, she and her editors did not print them. Indeed, it is frightening to contemplate how close Charles Stuart came to getting away with murder.

"My genuine hope is that people will take a lesson away from viewing this movie," says producer Shapiro. "Let's not forget how pervasive and ugly violence against women and children is. Men like Charles Stuart exist in every city. And let us not be so quick to give in to racial prejudices."

Replacing an actor on a soap is never an easy thing to do. The actor doing the replacing has to deal with many externalists when he steps into the role played by another actor for some time. # '60 Minutes' Iraq coverage back on top, but those funny videos were close behind

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The season opener of CBS' "60 Minutes" was the top-rated TV show in a week dominated by home video programs.

The Sunday news magazine show has been in and out of the No. 1 ratings, spot in recent weeks with special stories on the Persian Gulf crisis inserted among rerun fare.

Its season opener featured a segment on the death of former Pentagon scientist Gerald Bull, who developed a so-called "Supergun" cannon for Iraq. The cannon, which could have lobbed shells into Israel and other Middle East targets, was never built.

"60 Minutes" got an 18.4 average rating, according to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co. Each ratings point represents 934,000 homes.

ABC's "America's Funniest Home Videos" came in second with its season premiere, showing that viewers remain fascinated by last season's highly rated show that exploits embarrassing moments caught by amateur video photographers.

That fascination also propelled an ABC special on the making of its

NEW YORK (AP) — Somebody asked Chris Rock, one of two new members of the "Saturday Night Live" cast introduced at a news conference Tuesday, if he felt "haunted by the ghost of Eddie Murphy."

Rock looked nonplussed. "Eddie's still alive, ain't he?" he said. Rock, 23, a standup comedian since age 18, then allowed that he was bringing his own perspective to the 16th season of the late-night NBC variety show. "I always wanted to be like a black guy on 'Saturday Night Live,'" said Rock, an 8-year-old when "SNL" premiered in 1975. Murphy, who joined the show in

1980, went to become one of the nation's biggest box office draws. "I always wanted to be on it, top," said stocky, blond, blue-eyed Chris Farley, 26, a former Second City trouper, and the other new member of the cast.

Rock makes his home in Brooklyn's Fort Greene neighborhood "a block over from Spike," he said, referring to moviemaker Spike Lee. Rock and Farley are replacing Jon Lovitz and Nora Dunn, who have left the show to pursue other ventures in the entertainment business.

The returning cast members are Dana Carvey, Dennis Miller, Jan Hooks, Phil Hartman, Victoria

Jackson, Kevin Nealon and Mike Myers.

"I think this will be a great season and I think you'll see lots of new characters," said the show's producer, Lorne Michaels. The season premiere will feature host Kyle MacLachlan, who plays demented FBI agent Dale Gribble on ABC's "Twin Peaks," and musical guest Sinéad O'Connor. Other "SNL" guest hosts slated for the new season include soap opera star Susan Lucci, former New York Yankees president George Steinbrenner, musician Paul Simon, and actors Patrick Swayze, Christian Slater and Tom Hanks. LOS ANGELES (AP) — Ed Sullivan's big shows will be back on television for the first time since 1971, when the legendary Sunday night variety series was canceled after 23 years on CBS.

Producer-director Andrew Solt said he has purchased every episode of "The Ed-Sullivan Show" and is negotiating with syndicators and CBS, NBC and ABC for a series and a two-hour network special.

Sullivan brought some of television's most memorable moments into American living rooms. There was Elvis Presley's 1956 appearance, in which the gyrating idol was visible only from the waist up; the U.S. television debut just seven years later of four long-haired Brits called The Beatles; and the infamous 1965 censoring of The Rolling Stones.
