Budget bargainers trying for deal

WASHINGTON — White House and congressional negotiators narrowed differences Thursday over their budget problems with reported agreements on energy and luxury taxes and cuts in benefit programs. But key disputes remained to block a deal that would avoid bone-deep cuts in federal programs on Monday.
The two sides, racing the calendar, swapped offers into the evening, trying to put together the final pieces of a \$500 billion, five-year deficit-cutting package.

Parts of the pact tentatively agreed to were an additional 8-cent-per-gallon gasoline tax; a small tax on the energy content of all fuels and 10 percent taxes on luxury items ranging from fancy cars to electronic equipment, said one official who asked to not be identified.
The federal gasoline tax is now 9 cents per gallon. States add additional taxes on top of that.
If successful before Monday, the bargainers would allow the government to sidestep \$85 billion in spending cuts that the law would otherwise require. The slash-

es would result in furloughs for many of the 2.1 million federal civilian workers, including FBI agents and air traffic controllers.
Republicans were willing to accept a toned-down version of the cut in capital-gaining tax rates that President Bush has sought since he was a presidential candidate in 1988. The battle between Democrats and the administration over the tax has been the key barrier to a budget deal.
Capital gains — the profits from the sale of assets such as corporate stock or houses

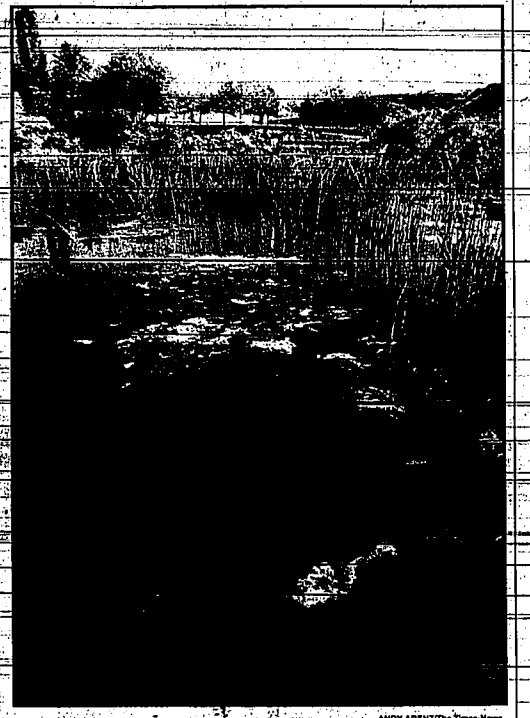
— are now taxed like ordinary income.
But Democrats seemed uncertain about whether in return, they would demand higher income tax rates on the wealthy of a limit on the tax deductions the well-to-do could take, said officials who asked to not be identified.
It doesn't mean to put it in a negative way, but there is still a possibility of failure, said House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash. "The odds are we will succeed."
Bush argued that cutting capital gains tax rates would boost the economy. Democrats say the tax cut would benefit the rich.

Federal grant will aid work at Crystal Springs Lake

TWIN FALLS — The federal government has promised to help clean up Crystal Springs Lake on the Snake River southeast of Wendell.
The Division of Environmental Quality of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare has received \$45,000 from a federal Clean Lakes Program grant from the Environmental Protection Agency.
Sludge accumulation from fish hatchery discharge over the last 25 years has all but filled in the little lake. In the 1950s the lake was used for scuba diving, and it has long been popular with local residents as a fishing and swimming hole.



Clean-up plans at Crystal Springs Lake include dredging 24,000 cubic yards of nutrient-laden sediments from the Gooding County attraction.

Bob Muffley of Wendell, a Gooding County commissioner, said he was saddened by the condition of the lake when he visited it recently.
"I hadn't been down there since I was a kid," he said.

The county got involved when it found out about opportunities for an EPA grant.
The three commissioners decided, "Yeah, we did want to get involved in this project," Muffley said.

The commissioners formed an ad hoc committee that included several private citizens, representatives of DEQ, the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation, the Idaho Department of Fish and Game and Clear Springs Trout Co.

The committee asked for money from Health and Welfare for a preliminary engineering study and that study recommended dredging the lake. With the exception of the Clear Springs representative, committee members voted to accept the study and pursue the dredging option.

"Anyone that has seen the lake 20 years ago couldn't help be a little bitter about it," Muffley said. "Especially when it didn't have to happen."
Tim Link of DEQ's Twin Falls office said his agency got involved with the lake in response to citizens' complaints.

Kids who went fishing there sometimes got stuck in the sediment near the shore as they waded out to get closer to the deep water where the fish were.

Exiled emir calls for Iraqi pullout in address to UN

Western governments reacted with outrage Thursday to Iraq's threat to execute diplomats who shelter foreigners, but Baghdad sought to portray it as a misunderstanding, saying the warning was aimed at its own citizens.
Eight weeks to the day after Iraq overran Kuwait, its exiled emir addressed the United Nations General Assembly, decrying the "rape, destruction and terror" inflicted by Saddam Hussein's armies and appealing for a withdrawal of Iraqi troops.
But Iraq tightened its grip on the conquered emirate, ordering Kuwaiti nationals to apply for Iraqi citizenship.
Oil prices rose again Thursday, briefly breaking the \$40-a-barrel mark, a day after

President Bush ordered the sale of a fraction of the oil from the U.S. Strategic Petroleum Reserve to try to dampen soaring prices. High oil prices helped drive down stocks again, with the Dow Jones Industrial average closing off 32.17 points at 2,427.48.

Neither side publicly linked the move to the current Gulf crisis, but Iran's relations with the West have been improving, and it has said it is cooperating with the U.N.'s economic boycott against Iraq. Iran has a 700-mile-long border with Iraq, and its cooperation with the U.N. sanctions is seen as crucial.

Enforcement of the U.N. economic embargo against Iraq led to a flareup of tensions Thursday in the Red Sea, where the

Rate boost will help keep bank insurance fund solvent

WASHINGTON — Regulators learned Thursday the government fund protecting bank accounts is dwindling faster than thought only two months ago, and they voted a 1991 increase of more than 60 percent on the deposit insurance premiums charged banks.
The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.'s bank fund dropped from \$13.2 billion at the end of last year to \$11.4 billion at the end of June — a 14 percent decline.
FDIC Chairman L. William Seidman said he now expects that by the end of the year the fund will have lost "closer to \$3 billion" rather than the \$2 billion

he earlier predicted.
"This ... is the result of an increased number of institutions being likely to fail and continued erosion in real estate markets," Seidman told members of a House panel in a meeting which followed the FDIC vote to boost premiums.
"If continuing bank failures were to exhaust the insurance fund, Congress and the Bush administration would have to consider a taxpayer bailout, as they have with the S&L insurance fund."
After receiving the new financial report, the five-member FDIC board raised the insurance premium charged banks by more than 60 percent.

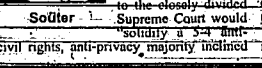
Kennedy casts lone committee vote against Souter

WASHINGTON — By a 13-1 vote Thursday, the Senate Judiciary Committee endorsed David H. Souter for a pivotal seat on the Supreme Court as nearly all the committee's liberal Democrats declined to join civil rights and women's groups in opposing the nomination.
The Senate is expected to confirm Souter, a federal appeals judge, by an overwhelming vote next week.
Sen. Arlen Specter, R-Pa., predicted that President Bush's 51-year-old nominee

would get about 90 votes in the 100-member Senate. So far, only six senators, all Democrats, have announced their opposition to Souter, who would replace the court's longtime liberal leader, Justice William J. Brennan Jr.
Souter said the Senate could not act quickly enough to permit Souter to take his seat when the Supreme Court opens its new term Monday.
That means Souter is unlikely to participate in some or all of the 12 cases to be argued next week, raising the possibility that the eight current justices may split 4-4. If

that happens, the court could order reargument to permit Souter to break the tie.
Of the committee members, only Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., rejected Souter. He protested that Souter's elevation to the closely divided Supreme Court would "solidify a 5-4 anti-civil rights, anti-privacy majority" if

But liberal Democrats Joseph R. Biden Jr. of Delaware, Howard Metzenbaum of Ohio, Patrick J. Police kill gunman after siege that left student dead, 7 injured

BERKELEY, Calif. — Police commandos killed a naked gunman shortly after dawn Thursday, ending a bloody, night-long takeover of a campus hangout that left one college student dead and seven other people wounded.

The chaotic siege, punctuated by the deranged gunman's wild shooting, ended about 7:20 a.m. PDT with bursts of police gunfire as 15 hostages were half-dressed and scurried into the street with their arms in the air.

The gunman, tentatively identified as Mehrdad Dashti of Berkeley, was shot by police when he "got close enough to a window that we were able to take him out," said Berkeley Police Capt. Phil Doran. Dashti, described as an Iranian in his 30s, apparently was distraught over the denial of a student loan.

"The SWAT team killed him," an ambulance technician said when the gunman's body arrived at Oakland's Highland Hospital at about 7:45 a.m. PDT.

Police later said they hoped to take the suspect alive, but when he fired at them, they returned the fire, killing him.

The young hostages endured 7 1/2 hours of terror as the babbling gunman fired sporadically and forced male hostages to molest women.

At about midnight Wednesday, Dashti had taken over Henry's Bar and Grill, at the Hotel Durant, about

Exemption asked for air controllers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The airline industry Thursday asked President Bush to exempt air traffic controllers from furloughs if a budget agreement isn't reached by Monday.

"Your action would ensure continuity in the day-to-day operation of our air traffic control system," Robert J. Aaronson, president of the Air Transport Association of America, said in a letter to the president.

Aaronson said traffic controllers, maintenance technicians, safety inspectors and weather personnel are vital to the safe and efficient operation of the nation's air-traffic-control system.

"This is essential to protect the overall public interest as well as the continuing viability of the nation's airline industry and the many other industries which depend on it," he said.

Sub locates plane parts

HONOLULU (AP) — A Navy submarine recovered part of the cargo door that broke away from a United jetliner over the Pacific last year, sweeping nine people to their death, authorities said Thursday.

The crew of a deep-sea submarine retrieved the lower half of the hatch from the ocean floor and located what is believed to be the door's upper half, a Navy spokeswoman said.

United Airlines Flight 811 had just taken off from Honolulu International Airport when the door and a large chunk of fuselage tore away at 22,000 feet.

NASA's 'cannibalization' of parts picking up speed

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The stalled shuttle program has prompted NASA from ending the practice of "cannibalizing" spaceship parts.

Discovery, due to liftoff Oct. 6 with a satellite to study the sun, received an auxiliary power unit and a metal grounding strap from Atlantis in August. Atlantis was grounded by leaking hydrogen fuel in June, a month after Columbia's hydrogen leaks were detected.

Atlantis, in turn, got an auxiliary power unit this week that was removed from Columbia. Atlantis is due to fly around Nov. 7, four months after the disaster.

"We're concerned because every time you remove a part from one orbiter and put it into another orbiter, you get two chances to introduce a

problem — when you took it out of the one and when you put it in the other," said William Lenoir, head of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's space flight program.

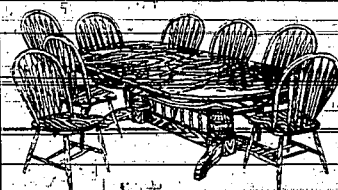
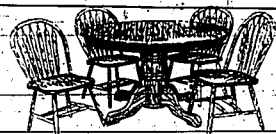
The problem is that NASA has eight serviceable auxiliary power units, but needs nine — three for each shuttle. The units pressurize the shuttle's hydraulic system.

"If I don't have one on my 'spares shelf' in stock, then I either don't fly or I have to go get one from another orbiter. Unfortunately, that's where we've found ourselves recently," Lenoir said.

The presidential commission that investigated the Challenger explosion recommended that NASA stop removing parts from one shuttle to supply another.

Gorbachev issues 1st order under his expanded economic powers

MOSCOW (AP) — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev began using his expanding new powers to reshape the economy on Thursday, ordering businesses to fulfill supply contracts and the government to ensure distribution.

But it was far from clear that people would comply with this order. In the market economy Gorbachev is trying to establish and they find it more profitable to trade goods on the black market, rather than distribute them in the established structure.

A Western specialist called the order "a waste of time."

In his first decree since the Supreme Soviet legislature on Monday granted him new powers to shore up the economy and maintain law and order, Gorbachev said, told government businesses, "regardless of their administrative subordination

and location," to preserve economic ties.

He said the businesses should meet all contract obligations for raw materials and other goods in the last quarter of this year and throughout 1991.

It is during that period that the country will be trying to switch from centrally-planned to a market economy under a plan the Supreme Soviet is to select after Oct. 15.

Gorbachev's decree, read on the nightly TV newscast "Vremya" and released by the Tass news agency, was an attempt to preserve the status quo at a time when many businesses are trying to bypass Moscow and trade directly with each other.

The restive republics, for instance, have been signing economic cooperation agreements in a preliminary step toward a common market. That leaves the Moscow ministries, which since the 1920s have issued

five-year plans that told thousands of factories, farms and businesses what to produce, where to sell it and how much to charge — out of the picture.

Gorbachev said it was "impermissible" that managers had disrupted economic ties and referred to "the extraordinary nature of the situation."

In a harkening back to Bolshevik appeals to the proletariat, Gorbachev urged workers to join their bosses in making sure contracts are kept. He also said the Council of Ministers, the Soviet Cabinet, should if necessary "introduce a special regime for the operation of railroads and other all-state life-sustaining systems of the country."

Bottlenecks in railroad deliveries, in part caused by a shortage of railroad cars, have reportedly disrupted the distribution of food and other goods nationwide.

Soviet potatoes rotting in fields

MOSCOW (AP) — A bumper vegetable crop is rotting in the fields as the first fall frost approaches, and Muscovites feign a hungry winter. They have joined school children in trying to rescue potatoes.

Some people have become so desperate they are stealing potatoes, carrots, pickles and preserves from individually owned vegetable cellars in the villages surrounding Moscow.

The Komsomolskaya Pravda newspaper quoted one elderly Russian peasant woman as saying: "If my memory doesn't fail me, that only happened before the famine of 1947." "Alas, this is a really bad sign."

Soviet Prime Minister Nikolai Ryzhkov admits that, at best, only one-third of the vegetable crop has been harvested so far, and Soviet

media said Thursday only a fraction of that has made its way to Moscow warehouses and markets.

"A hungry winter is coming," the official Tass news agency predicted. "It is unprecedented in the history of the Soviet Union in the last week of September that only 3.7 percent of the potatoes needed for Moscow this winter are in storage in the city."

Potatoes are a mainstay of the Soviet diet, known as "second bread" after the other staple, that also was in short supply this summer for the first time since the early 1960s.

"If potatoes disappear from the counter, this will be a catastrophe for the pensioners, students and poor people," the Komsomolskaya Pravda said.

The Soviet Union annually loses 20 percent to 30 percent of its food harvest on the way to market. This

year's problems have been compounded by bad weather and fuel shortages for farm machinery.

Moscow-area farmers have been delayed twice—the average rainfall in the first two weeks of September, and farmers complain their antiquated harvesting machines no longer work in the muddy fields.

Students and workers were drafted into the harvest weeks ago, and last week leaders of Moscow's regional government invited city dwellers to go to collect and state farms to dig potatoes for their own use.

In an indication how desperate the situation has become, Defense Minister Dmitri Yazov told the Soviet legislature on Wednesday that 23,000 soldiers based in the Moscow region are helping to dig potatoes.

Britain, Iran restore diplomatic ties; key issues still unresolved

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Britain and Iran announced Thursday that they had restored relations, the first of several diplomatic successes for Iran since neighboring Iraq threatened the Persian Gulf with invasion of Kuwait.

London and Tehran had severed diplomatic ties following Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's call in February 1979 to kill British author Salman Rushdie, whose novel "The Satanic Verses" infuriated Muslims worldwide.

The restoration raised modest hopes of freedom for British hostages held by pro-Iranian extremists in Lebanon, but left unresolved the dispute over Rushdie, who has been in hiding since Khomeini's death call.

The announcement at the United Nations — by British Foreign Secre-

tary Douglas Hurd and in a statement from Iran's U.N. Mission — said the countries would reopen London and Tehran within a month.

Hurd retreated into heavy diplomatic parlance when asked about Rushdie.

"It is our understanding from public statements made by Iranian officials that the Iranian government respects the law and would not interfere in the internal affairs of any other country — anymore than the United Kingdom would."

That was taken as an assurance that Iran would not try to send assassins after Rushdie, who is believed to still be in Britain. Hurd said the other outstanding issues between the two countries, including the British hostages held in Lebanon by Shiite fundamentalists loyal to Iran's Shiite revolution, "are better discussed at

the full diplomatic level."

Hurd also praised Iran for voting for U.N. embargoes against Iraq despite improving relations between Iran and its former enemy.

The Iranian statement gave no reason for the restoration of relations, saying only that it was based on "mutual respect."

In the past six weeks, Iran has gained land, peace, money, and some respect, benefiting at least in part from the changing alignment of the Middle East following Iraq's invasion of Kuwait on Aug. 2.

Iran, facing a U.S.-led multinational force in Saudi Arabia and the Gulf, caved into Iranian demands to seek a formal end to the 1980-88 Iran-Iraq war. The two sides exchanged prisoners of war, freed troops from their border and agreed to resume diplomatic relations.

King who left throne lied about income

LONDON (AP) — King Edward VIII, who abdicated in 1936 to marry an American divorcee, lied about the size of his fortune, pleading poverty to secure a royal income before going into exile, his first official biography said Thursday.

Author Philip Ziegler has written "King Edward VIII: The Official Biography" with the approval of Queen Elizabeth II, Edward's niece.

Working from the archives of Buckingham Palace and government papers, Ziegler reveals that Edward told a meeting of his family and their advisers that his income would hardly be \$22,500 a year and that his total fortune was \$405,000.

As a result, he was guaranteed a yearly income of \$94,500. He immediately left for France, taking the title Duke of Windsor.

Ulfex Alexander, Keeper of the Privy Purse, later calculated that Edward's fortune amounted to nearly \$5 million — excluding real estate in Canada.

King George VI, who had succeeded his brother, wrote to Edward three months after the abdication: "You were under great strain and I am not seeking to reproach you or anyone, but the fact remains that you were badly misled."

British transsexual loses her court bid to marry man

STRASBOURG, France (AP) — A transsexual lost her six-year battle for the right to marry a man when the European Court of Human Rights on Thursday endorsed a British law barring the marriage.

Caroline Cossey, 36, who works as a model and who has campaigned to be treated officially as a woman, sought the right to have her birth certificate changed to show she is now female.

She underwent a sex change operation in 1974, but is forbidden by law to marry in Britain

because her birth certificate says she was born a male.

The Strasbourg court, following its decision in a similar transsexual case two years ago, ruled on a 14-4 vote that British policy is fair and that Cossey's human rights had not been violated.

The court also rejected her claim that she was being denied the fundamental right to marry contained in the European Convention on Human Rights.

The court affirmed its support for "the traditional concept of marriage."

Canadian Senate may grow

OTTAWA (AP) — Prime Minister Brian Mulroney received permission Thursday from Queen Elizabeth II to expand the Canadian Senate.

Mulroney wants the eight additional senators to push through a controversial new tax.

The eight have been notified of their appointments and they will likely be named today, government sources in Ottawa said. An opposition leader called Mulroney's unprecedented move "unbelievable."

Mulroney made the request based on an obscure section of the 1867

Constitution as a last resort to save the unpopular goods and services tax. The section of the Constitution allows the British monarch to add four or eight members to the Senate on a request by the governor-general, the Canadian representative to the Commonwealth.

John Haslam, a spokesman for the queen, said in London that Elizabeth, as the constitutional monarch of the former British colony, was following the provisions of the Canadian Constitution in making the decision.

Lumberman's gift signals new thinking Idaho needs

Something extraordinary happened last weekend. An Idaho lumberman gave a \$10,000 contribution to the Idaho Conservation League, an organization that, among other things, wants to curtail the cutting of timber on public lands.

But Walter Minnick, president and chief executive officer of TJ International, isn't your average lumber boss. He is a member of the ICL and the Wilderness Society and a firm believer that the days of taxpayer-subsidized timber harvests on public land are numbered.

Minnick, who was largely responsible for the decision to place a plant operated by TJ subsidiary Norco Industries, in Twin Falls three years ago, is of the opinion that unless environmentalists and industry find common ground, we will lose both the forests and the jobs.

Forests to large-scale logging, it postponed the day when foresters would have to look for alternative timber sources on private lands. Now that the lumber crunch is cutting those sources won't be ready for at least 20 years.

Minnick's idea is that to survive, Idaho's timber industry, like that in the rest of the Pacific Northwest, will have to work smarter, with the environment — and with environmentalists.

That's a breath of fresh air in Idaho, a state where extractive industries in general and the timber business in particular, spend an inordinate amount of time fighting yesterday's battles. It's no longer a question of whether timber harvest on public lands needs to be limited, but when and by how much.

The greening of this forest represents a growing realization of the old way of doing business in our national forest is coming to an end. The Forest Service is hemorrhaging red-ink on its timber sales, subsidizing them 10 to 1 or even 20 to 1 with the costs of road building. Timber yields, which reached a historical high in 1987, are on the way down.

If Idaho foresters had spent as much time and money in the last decade on making transportation, marketing, reforestation and processing more efficient as they have been in battling wilderness legislation, both their industry and Idaho's prospects would be healthier.

Minnick is no tree-hugger in a \$1,500 suit. He's a capitalist, and an avowed free-trader who is opposed to restrictions on exports of logs taken from public lands.

But he's seen the future, and it works if — and only if — the forest products industry is willing to change.

Limiting Congressional terms hindrance, not help

Proposals to limit the terms of members of Congress and of state legislators are popular and getting more so, according to the pundits and the polls. Students of government like me find it hard to understand why. Contrary to most of the propaganda on the subject, these constitutional changes want to accomplish.

For example, term limitations will not decrease the influence of interest groups and their money on elections.

Quite the contrary. Forcing senior members of a legislature to retire means that the new candidates who try to take their place will have to invest heavily in achieving the name recognition that the veterans already have.

This will require large new infusions of money and electoral alliances with interest groups whose cash supply is plentiful.

Veteran members, proven vote-getters, are much more powerful in relation to special interests than candidates who have to prove themselves in an uncertain and expensive campaign environment.

Term limitations won't improve the functioning of the legislature, either. People need time to learn their jobs.

Term limitations throw away the benefits of learning from experience.

Inexperienced legislators are less powerful in relation to legislative staff, executive branch bureaucrats and interest-group lobbyists from whom they must learn the customs and routines of legislative operations and the stories behind policy proposals.

New people in any complex institution are highly dependent on the people around them.

Term limitations just shift power from elected officials to the relatively inaccessible officials, bureaucrats and influence peddlers who surround them.

Why do we assume that new blood is automatically better than old? Of course we should pay attention to the quality of our legislators and vote against those whose performance we find wanting.

Term limits merely guarantee that the good will disappear along with the bad.

Finally, term limitations won't enhance representative democracy.

Just the opposite, since they create an artificial barrier preventing voters from returning to office legislators they might otherwise favor.

Why are we so certain that voters have such terrible judgment that they need a constitutional restriction keeping them from voting for incumbents they know and like?

It's hard to see how restricting voters' alternatives in this arbitrary way can be proposed in the name of representative government or of democracy.

One must conclude that other forces are at work.

More likely, groups and interests that now have a hard-time winning against incumbents are seeking term limitations to improve their chances of winning office.

They are undoubtedly calculating that not incumbents are easier to beat, or buy. They're probably right about that.

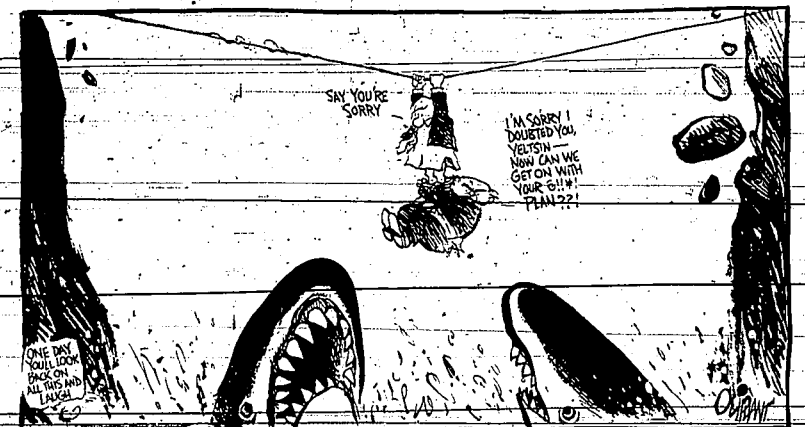

Former Driggs resident shot to death

Panhandle traffic fatalities soaring

COEUR D'ALENE — The dangers posed by heavier traffic volume and reduced police patrols in the Idaho Panhandle appear to be catching up with drivers this month. Ten fatal auto accidents have been recorded in the area since Sept. 1 after a comparatively bloodless summer. It's been demoralizing to our officers to see this much death and injury in Idaho State Police Capt. E.D. Strickfaden said. "The deaths and injuries have piled up so much that it's difficult for officers to complete their accident reports."

Toxic solvent found in groundwater

BOISE — A third case of groundwater contamination has been discovered in the Boise Valley, involving the toxic solvent "Per." Residents are calling on the state to determine the sources and officials are concerned about the Boise aquifer. "I think they need to find the source. Who's doing this to our water?" said Donna Holderness, secretary of the Boise-area Sryngia Mobile Park Water Association. Recent tests at the Sryngia subdivision's 220-foot-deep well showed that the cancer-causing solvent tetrachloroethylene, or Per, had contaminated the well at a level of 134 parts per billion. Compiled from wire service reports

Jones blasts legal aid clinic's Death Row work

BOISE (AP) — Attorney General Jim Jones contends the University of Idaho Legal Aid Clinic's help with two Death Row inmates' attempts to marry their fiancées is inappropriate and will wind up costing taxpayers money. "Just on a philosophical level, it seems to be rather a strange thing to have the Legal Aid Clinic involved in," Jones said Thursday. "Quite frankly, I would feel better if someone other than people who work for

the state were behind the effort to help Death Row inmates' love lives. But the supervising attorney for the clinic, operated as part of the Moscow university's College of Law, said legal work for condemned murderers Thomas Eugene Creech and Thomas Henry Gibson helps ensure their rights are protected and provides valuable experience for the student involved. Joan Fisher said arguments like

Jones' have been rejected repeatedly in the courts. "If law schools could not get involved on an lot of important educational experiences," she said. "We do not consider it a link; it's a very serious issue. We're dealing with fundamental human rights." Either third-year law student Dennis Clamey is representing Creech and Gibson in their bids to overturn Idaho Department of Corrections decisions barring their marriages. Creech's case is before 4th District Magistrate R. Michael Denard and Gibson's before Magistrate John Dutcher, both in Boise.

The litigation also could be more complex, less costly than it might appear, Jones said. "However, we are prepared to go the distance," Creech, 40, was sentenced to death after pleading guilty to the May 1981 killing of fellow prison inmate David Jenson after beating him to death with a sock full of batteries, Gibson, 39, was convicted and condemned in his June 1980 strangulation of 19-year-old Kimberly Ann Palmer, whose body was later found in a stream wrapped in a sleeping bag.

Congressional hopefuls spar over child-care votes

BOISE (AP) — The two candidates for Idaho's 1st District congressional seat are sparring over whether Republican Sen. Skip Smyster's votes against child-care legislation came because the bills were bad or because of "petty politics" on the part of Smyster. Democrat candidate Larry LaRocco held a Boise news conference Thursday to charge Smyster with casting Idaho's Senate votes against basic safeguards for children.

Smyster said that once again, LaRocco's "complete lack of understanding of the legislative process." Smyster has been contrasting his

10 years in the Idaho Senate with the fact LaRocco has not held public office. "At any time my opponent would have represented the people of Idaho, as I have, he would understand that the same basic bill often is presented in several different forms. The bills he points out all had fundamental flaws that did not meet the best interests of Idahoans," Smyster said. "The people of Idaho are waiting for Larry LaRocco to say what he is going to do, and stop shielding his own inexperience by misrepresenting my record," he said.

General appeals for both men rejected by Idaho courts, are pending before the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco. Besides the marriage requests from Creech and Gibson, the University of Idaho Legal Aid Clinic also is assisting with the general appeal in state courts of Randall Lynn McKinney, 28, who was convicted in the shocking death of Robert Bishop Jr.

Boise census count said to miss 2,000

BOISE (AP) — Census workers are canvassing homes in Boise to investigate the claim 2,000 persons were missed in the 1990 preliminary count because annexations to the city were overlooked. If the allegations of an undercount are correct, Boise could gain substantially more in federal aid and state funds distributed by population formulas, said Clair Bowman, executive director of the Ada-Planning Association, which makes population estimates for Boise and Ada County.

Preliminary U.S. Census Bureau figures released in August estimated Boise's population at 123,059 and Ada County's at 205,220. But an APA analysis for Boise indicated that formerly unincorporated areas of the county were not counted as being within city limits even though they had been annexed, Bowman said Wednesday. "We think Boise City's count will go up a couple of thousand," he said. In that case, the city would have about 125,000 people, or about 22,500 more than in 1980. The city passed on APA's findings to the Census Bureau, which will release detailed counts next April 1, a year after the 1990 census was taken. "We're out doing our field work now" on the recounts, said Census Bureau spokesman Bob Clingman in Seattle. They should be completed by Oct. 6 for Idaho and Montana, he said.

New phosphate extraction plan up for comment

SODA SPRINGS (AP) — FMC Corp. has altered plans for mining phosphate reserves in southeastern Idaho's Dry Valley, and the Bureau of Land Management is soliciting public comment on the company's new plans. FMC initially submitted a mine and reclamation plan for the project in 1988, but that document has been changed to fit company plans for mining near the town of the valley. One from the site will replace supplies from FMC's Gay Mine on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation, which is expected to be depleted in 1993. The Dry Valley operation should fill the company's phosphate needs for 10 years. FMC wants to begin construction of a railroad siding and mine facilities on its private land next summer. Stripping of overburden would begin in early 1992 and the first ore would be shipped in 1993 to the company's phosphate fertilizer plant west of Pocatello. The BLM and FMC's mine plan includes analyses of the project's impact on big game.

Students take financial aid gripes to Andrus

MOSCOW (AP) — The state Board of Education's request for financial aid to Idaho college students failed to recognize today's needs, the student body presidents at Idaho's four-year schools have told Gov. Cecil Andrus.

But the board's executive director, Rayburn Barton, contends the nearly \$1.6 million request for financial aid programs is realistic, considering the crunch in educational funding.

The state regents seek \$1.59 million in state aid for financial aid programs, up 4 percent over current state funding.

About \$1 million of the current allocation is one-time money for the work study program and the state board wants that made part of the on-going budget.

In a letter delivered this week to Andrus, the student body presidents at the University of Idaho, Lewis-Clark State College, Idaho State University and Boise State University said they are disappointed with the board's financial aid request.

"While inflation gallops ahead at double digit rates and the board increases its own office budget request

(by 13.6 percent), it asks for a mere (4 percent) increase for student financial aid," they wrote. "This, in real terms, represents a substantial cut in this appropriation."

"We find this proposal unacceptable and out of step with the needs and desires of the students on Idaho's campuses," the presidents said.

"We therefore request that you reject the recommendation, and instead, appropriate an amount that more accurately reflects the realities of the current economic situation and

the needs of today's students."

UI's student body president is David Pena; Mark Moeckler is president at Lewis-Clark; Eric Love is Boise State's president; and Paul Anir is Idaho State's.

But Barton said the board's financial aid request is realistic in terms of the board's total recommendation for the fiscal year starting July 1, 1991.

"It doesn't meet all financial aid needs, just like the board's requests for the schools don't meet all their needs," he said. "There are always unmet needs."

Man accused of inserting obscene phone recordings

LEWISTON (AP) — A former security guard is charged with gaining access to a Lewiston Morning Tribune computer and inserting obscene phone recordings for the public.

DOT approves reflective devices for private entrances

BOISE — Property owners may install reflective delineators at the entrances to private approaches, according to a new policy established by the Idaho Department of Transportation.

The new policy will provide a consistent standard throughout the state, according to Max Jensen, traffic supervisor for the department.

"Single bi-directional delineators can be placed on the highway right of way by adjacent property owners to delineate their approaches," he said.

"If delineators are used, they must be yellow in color. No other colored reflectors will be permitted."

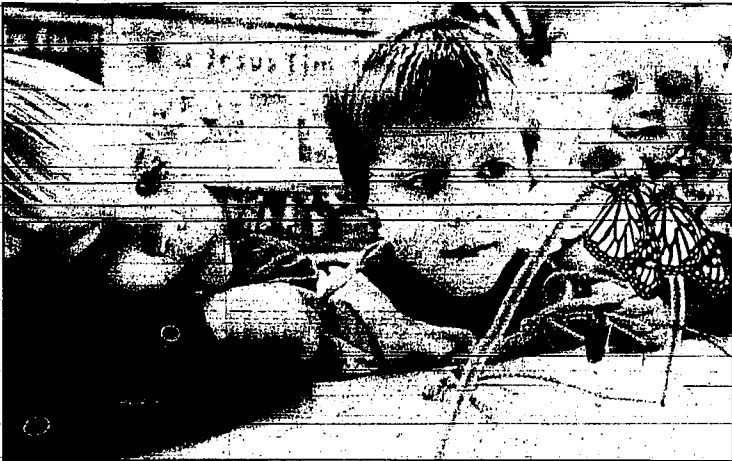
The reflectors must be maintained, or the department will remove them.

INEL officials: Solvents in aquifer pose no threat

BOISE — Groundwater at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory still is contaminated with high levels of two toxic solvents, according to newly released test results.

The most contaminated well is below Test Area North and contained 29,000 micrograms per liter of trichloroethylene, or TCE, about 5,800 times the safe drinking water standard of 5 mpl.

Other contaminants, however, have not migrated appreciably off the

INEL site toward the Magic Valley, said Larry Mann, hydrologist for the U.S. Geological Survey in Idaho Falls.

INEL officials say contaminants move up to 10 feet per day in the Snake River Plain aquifer, or about nine miles in 30 years, Magic Valley residents and the Snake River Alliance fear they eventually will foul drinking water supplies off-site.

Mann said that may take hundreds of years.

"The hydraulic gradient is so flat that it's still centered pretty much below the INEL complex," he said. "Right now, it's moving very slowly."

The aquifer covers 10,000 square miles, from Island Park to Thousand Springs at Hagerman, where it pours from basalt cliffs into the Snake River.

Contamination levels at INEL are consistent with tests over the last four years, Mann said. A water-treatment system has been installed at Test Area North, but the water so employees here can drink it.

Prior to September 1972, the solvents were dumped into the aquifer via a wastewater injection well. After nearly 20 years, the aquifer below Test Area North contains "a few parts per billion levels of TCE throughout" the 825-square-mile nuclear

SNF plans controlled burns soon

TWIN FALLS — When the conditions are right, officials of the Sawtooth National Forest plan to set fire to more than 1,700 acres.

The fires are designed to get rid of residue from timber and firewood harvests to prepare areas for reforestation and improve rangelands.

"This will not only help to reduce the fire hazard in these areas but also propagate seeds for new trees to grow," said Fire Management Officer Denny Schwartz. About 300 acres of timber and firewood slash would be burned, he said.

Forest Service fire and range crews also plan to burn 1,450 acres of rangelands. Fire removes old, woody vegetation not palatable to livestock or wildlife, making room for new, vigorous forbs and grasses.

Rangeland burns are designed to leave unburned islands of vegetation to provide wildlife cover.

Burns for reforestation are planned for the Albion and Sublett division of the Burley District, including the Bosteter, Wahlstrom-Hell and Engle Springs areas of the Twin Falls District.

Rangeland projects are scheduled in the Lynn Creek area of the Raft River Division and Fisher Canyon in the Black Pine Division of the Burley District.

Forest Service officials said before fires are ignited, strict conditions for weather and fuel must be met.

Farm Bureau finishes tests on area wells

BURLEY — The Idaho Farm Bureau Federation completed its three-county well-testing program this week, drawing a little more than 1,000 water samples.

"We couldn't have handled much more," said project coordinator Jim Yost. "We just handled an awful lot of samples."

Although the federation hoped that 2,000 farmers in Cassia, Minidoka and Jerome counties would take up the offer of \$10 nitrate tests, Yost called the project a success.

"In such a concentrated area we know that this is the single most substantial testing project yet tackled by any organization or agency," Yost said.

The water samples will be tested at the University of Idaho. Wells with dangerous nitrate levels will be immediately retested to ensure that the results are correct and the well's owners will be warned if the second test also shows problems, Yost said.

Also, wells with high nitrate levels will be tested for other contaminants and agricultural chemicals.

"Overall results from the nitrate testing will be released after Oct. 8.

Several state and federal agencies participated in the collection of samples.

Recent area well-testing programs included 18 wells in Jerome and Minidoka counties in 1989 and 18 wells in Minidoka County earlier this year.

McMurrian changes course, wants tougher sentences for drunk drivers

TWIN FALLS — Stop people from driving drunk or under the influence of drugs and you'll stop insurance rates from skyrocketing, said Donald McMurrian, chairman of the Idaho Insurance Reform Committee.

The Twin Falls man said Thursday he'll push for legislation next year calling for mandatory suspension of a driver's license whenever a person is convicted of driving under the influence — even on the first offense.

McMurrian said he has already spoken with a number of Magic Valley legislators interested in supporting such a measure. He did not name names, however.

Earlier this year McMurrian led a petition drive to put an initiative on the November ballot that would have forced insurance companies to freeze rates from January 1991 to 1992 and base all future increases solely on individual driving records. The initiative was similar to a California insurance proposition passed by voters last year.

But McMurrian said the California proposition produced "chaos" in that state. The Idaho Insurance Reform Committee dropped its initiative drive this spring. And now McMurrian is changing tactics.

"It dawned on me that the major cause of a lot of our problems is drugs and alcohol on the highway," he said.

Legislative candidates seek rural vote at Spanbauer Barn

JEROME — People usually turn up at the Spanbauer Barn looking for some Saturday night dancing. Those who drove out the gravel road Thursday, saw dancing of another kind — the dance of politicians.

Seventeen candidates, all wishing to represent the Magic Valley in the state Legislature, accepted an invitation from the Idaho Rural Council to discuss farm and rural issues. The forum was also sponsored by the National Farmers Union and the American Agriculture Movement.

During brief introductions, every candidate emphasized his or her connection with agriculture — even if it was only to stress

that they eat agricultural products.

The hottest debate during the forum's first hour, however, centered on education, not agriculture.

Democrat Mike Conroy, a candidate for House Seat 2A, cited a number of lawsuits filed against the state by school districts who claim Idaho's educational funding formula allows an inequitable distribution of money between rich and poor districts.

"Why do we have to go to court to solve a problem that the Legislature was supposed to solve?" he asked. "I think people need to go up there and solve the problem instead of dance around it."

His comments prompted applause from the audience and brought Republican and Democratic incumbents to their feet.

"I take issue with that," said Rep. Lee Barnes, R-Buhl. "Education gets 75 percent of the state budget and in the last two years has been treated better."

That prompted state Sen. John Peavey D-Carey, to rise and say that a funding equity bill that was killed in the Idaho House last year may have had a chance if the Democrats were in control.

"Turn the Idaho state Senate over to the Democrats for a couple of years and I bet we get something done," he said.

Next it was Sen. Jim Deaton D-Triumph R-Declo, who jumped to his feet.

He opposed a back-door plan to force school consolidation, he said, adding that last year's attempt at school funding equity

would have hurt the small, rural districts. Republicans and Democrats also disagreed, though less bitterly, about legislation forcing mediation between a bank and a borrower.

Mandatory mediation should become law, said Democrat Gene Sullivan, who is running for a House at-large seat representing the eight Magic Valley counties.

Sullivan's Republican opponent, Mark Stubbs, urged caution about mandatory mediation. "Sometimes it just postpones the inevitable," he said.

"Protecting Idaho's water was one issue that all could agree upon.

"I don't think the most serious threat is from California," said state Sen. Lynn

Sun Valley surgeon thinks bears may hold key to calcium loss

BOISE — A bear muzzing through winter might hold in its bones the secret to relief for millions of people with osteoporosis, says a Sun Valley surgeon who has earned an award for his research. Timothy Floyd, an orthopedic surgeon who moved to Idaho in January, is among researchers receiving international recognition for their work.

Among the winners in the 1990 competition that involved thousands of entries from dozens of nations, were an orthobiologist trying to save a decimated Brazilian rain forest through tree-planting campaigns and educational projects and a physicist using pulsed lasers to resist the faded luster of Chinese Qin Dynasty artwork.

In simple terms, Floyd, who moved to Idaho in January, has been trying since 1987 to answer this question: How can black bears remain basically immobile for three to four months a year without developing osteoporosis, a potentially debilitating bone disease?

"In humans and other mammals that kind of extended inactivity causes the bone to lose mass, the primary characteristic of the disease."

Within three years, Floyd hopes to isolate the substance, probably a hormone, that keeps bear bones from losing mass.

He hopes to use that information to prevent, treat and even cure osteoporosis.

"The disease afflicts about 20 million Americans with little in the way of treatment. Osteoporosis is especially troublesome to women after menopause.

In some cases, bones become so fragile that people can suffer fractures just walking over in bed."

are literally wheelchair-bound or bedridden because they are so osteoporotic," Floyd said.

A colleague in San Francisco, where Floyd trained as a physician, agreed the research was unique.

"I don't know of anyone else who has looked at bears with this in mind," said Dr. Charles Owen, clinical associate professor at the University of California at San Francisco.

Floyd got the idea for his research while he was reading a book about bears. He found that bears in their winter dens do not urinate. In contrast, humans lose bone calcium through urine.

The four black bears Floyd uses in his research are named Amazo, Caruso, U.P. and Christmas. "All were problem bears invading campgrounds in Michigan that the state was going to destroy," Floyd said.

The bears live in a research facility in Illinois, and Floyd said the surgery he performs — removing small pieces of bone — is done on people every day in hospitals.

"Their welfare is my No. 1 concern," Floyd said. "I almost didn't do it because I didn't want to hurt any bears."

Congress OKs bill compensating miners, neighbors of nuclear tests

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress approved a bill Thursday offering money and an apology to the so-called "victims of the Cold War" in some western states who may have developed cancer from nuclear bomb testing or uranium mining.

The bill, approved on voice vote by the House and sent to the president, is an admission that the government was wrong to test nuclear weapons above ground in Nevada while people were living in fallout areas, Downing said. Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., who led debate for the bill, said:

"It also recognizes the government's liability in allowing people to mine uranium for nuclear weapons without protective gear, he said.

The bill provides compensation for people who got cancer in certain time periods and:

- Spent two years — one year for some cancers — in downwind areas of Nevada, Arizona or Utah from nuclear tests between 1951 and 1958, or between June and July, 1962.
- Or mined uranium in Colorado, New Mexico, Arizona, Wyoming or Utah from 1947 to 1971.

The Justice Department would process claims and determine the amount due.

A driving force behind the legislation was Stewart Udall, former member of Congress and interior secretary, whose brother Rep. Morris Udall, D-Ariz., is chairman of the House Interior Committee.

Stewart Udall represented the uranium miners in a lawsuit against the federal government.

The courts ruled the government was innumerate from prosecution because national security dictated a need for the uranium, but judges involved in the case urged the miners to seek redress from Congress.

Rep. Wayne Owens, D-Utah, who once was a lawyer for the downwinders, sponsored the legislation.

Educators wary of linking school funds, 'report cards'

LEWISTON (AP) — North-central Idaho school officials have urged legislators to back up state requirements for "report cards" on local education with dollars.

Last winter, the Legislature passed a law requiring each school to complete an "accountability report card" as a measure of improvement in each community.

The main objective of the report card is to inform the local school community about progress made at each school site, said Darrell Loosle, associate state superintendent of public instruction. He addressed about 40 educators from the region in a meeting Wednesday in Lewiston.

The Idaho Department of Education was charged with creating a model "report card" to submit to the state Board of Education at its Oct. 30 meeting. Each school must develop its own report card by June 30, 1991, and have them in place by Oct. 15, 1991.

The law also requires the report be publicized, with parents or guardians in each district notified that they are entitled to a copy.

The proposed model includes 16 areas of educational assessment, from school facilities to class sizes and dropout rates.

The meeting was one of seven scheduled this month across Idaho before the model document is submitted to the Idaho regents, Loosle said.

Many educators at the meeting worried about having the time and staff to complete the report. The law requires them from each district, but provides no money.

"Well, one thing you'd better do is not take teachers out of the classroom," said Virgel Larson, assistant Lewiston superintendent. "The Legislature is going to have to address this; it's going to take time."

Others said they resented state government imposing itself in the local level this way.

Federal officials approve pay study results

MOSCOW (AP) — The University of Idaho has increased its minority student adviser's salary by 38 percent, said the director of state employees' annual appointments by two months as a result of federally mandated pay studies.

NFL denies using tickets to influence vote against treaty

WASHINGTON — NFL officials denied Thursday that team owners had threatened to pull complimentary Super Bowl tickets from congressmen who oppose the league's effort to outlaw sports lotteries.

Rep. Peter DeFazio, D-Ore., said Wednesday that representatives of professional sports teams are using Super Bowl tickets and expansion teams as bargaining chips to garner votes in support of the measure that would bar lotteries.

"It's nonsense. It's absolutely not true," said Guy Aiello, the NFL's director of communications.

"Yes, we have been lobbying on behalf of the bill, but we have not linked Super Bowl tickets to votes," he said in a telephone interview from New York.

The teams' most outspoken lobbyist, Texas, a sponsor of the bill, also said the charges were "nonsense."

NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue and Deputy Baseball Commissioner Steve Greenberg were among those who have testified before Congress in favor of outlawing the gambling games, which offer payouts to wagerers who pick a series of NFL or NBA winners.

But DeFazio says the state runs the only such game currently in operation, said the more effective lobbying effort is taking place behind the scenes as team owners and others "overtly and implicitly" threaten to take away lawmakers' free tickets to the Super Bowl.

"That's as offensive as a major industry calling me up and saying, 'Well, we were going to give you a campaign contribution, but we are going to withhold it if you don't how you vote on this bill,'" he said in an interview Wednesday.

DeFazio said a number of sources have reported the activity to his office and that several members of Congress have told him directly that they have been contacted by a local team owner or prominent sports figure.

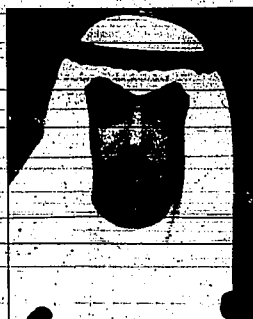

Kuwaiti emir an autocrat who tolerated some dissent

 WASHINGTON — Four months ago, 70 professors staged a sit-in at Kuwait University to protest a decree limiting the powers of parliament.
 It was an act of defiance hardly imaginable in most of the Persian Gulf, ruled by a collection of dictators, hereditary monarchs and fundamentalist leaders.
 But Kuwait's 64-year-old emir, Sheikh Jaber al-Ahmed al-Sabah, was different. "A contradictory jumble" of benevolent father, autocrat and liberal, the emir has tolerated such voices.

Shrewdly, the al-Sabah family has shared Kuwait's vast wealth with their countrymen, even as a measure of loyalty.
 Even at the height of pro-democracy demonstrations last winter, no one was asking for more power sharing. President Bush has invited al-Sabah here Friday to show Iraq that the United States still views the emir as the legitimate ruler of Kuwait. It is his insistence that al-Sabah be restored to power is second only to its demand that Iraq withdraw from Kuwait.
 Some lawmakers criticize the U.S. stance toward the autocratic government.
 Rep. Leo Hamilton, D-Ind., chairman of the House Middle East affairs subcommittee,

foreign policy, stability is the main U.S. goal in the oil-rich Persian Gulf.
 Secretary of State James A. Baker III said this is not the time to insist on reforms.
 "The one thing you have to be careful about is getting into the position of saying that because a particular former government was not a form of government that we prefer, therefore, we somehow change that or participate in changing that form of government," he said. "That would be nothing more than rewarding Saddam Hussein's aggression."
 Since assuming leadership in 1977, al-Sabah walked a precarious line between progressive forces at home who wanted democracy and repressive forces next door in Saudi Arabia who feared democracy might spread and endanger their conservative, theocratic rule.
 But unlike the Saudi king, al-Sabah allowed a lively media albeit one periodically reined in with censorship. Unlike Saudi laws, Kuwait's allowed women to drive and vote.
 "There was nothing clandestine about the Kuwaiti opposition, which enjoyed wide support among the country's merchants and leading families."
 "They discussed, argued, talked back to the emir," said Judith Kipper, a Mideast expert at the Brookings Institution.
 The al-Sabah clan, which has ruled

Kuwait for more than 200 years, experimented with parliamentary elections several times since gaining independence from Britain in 1961. But each time the legislature was decreed shut when lawmakers became too critical of the government or its other regional leaders.
 Last June, the emir tried again. This time, he named one third of the 75 deputies and the rest were elected. The professors were among several groups to voice outrage at the emir's decree, which they said violated the constitution.
 Kuwaitis have one of the highest per capita incomes in the world, about \$20,000 a year, and the al-Sabah clan is greatly admired for its shrewd investment of the oil money which it hoards.

The family business — some 1,000 al-Sabah princes, ill key government and financial posts — brought in more from investments last year than from oil revenue.
 The clan's legitimacy derives in large measure from its longevity. It ruled uninterrupted from 1751, through British control from 1899 to 1914 and until it was forced to flee ahead of invading Iraqi troops Aug. 2. Most got away to Saudi Arabia.
 The emir's young brother was killed defending the family palace.
 It was a measure of al-Sabah's acceptance that when Iraq tried to install a provisional government of Kuwaiti dissidents, not one

series participant was found.
 But the al-Sabah benevolence did not extend to the expatriates who accounted for more than 50 percent of Kuwait's 1.9 million people. Foreigners were excluded from the perks of citizenship such as land ownership.
 Two serious violations of traffic laws, for example, could result in summary deportation. For thousands of impoverished Asians and Arabs, mental woe in Kuwait was a livelihood they could ill afford to lose.
 "Kuwaitis looked down on other Arabs," said Hooshang Anirumdad, head of the Middle East Studies Department at Rutgers University. Kuwaitis had a special name for the Palestinians: Egyptians and other Arabs who worked there.
 "Khadana" meaning servants, he said.
 "That attitude accounts in part for the bitter resentment of Kuwait that led some Arab governments to gleefully support the Iraqi invasion.
 Kuwaitis, too, were growing dissatisfied with al-Sabah, especially after seeing the Arab and Muslim governments, the communist rulers of Eastern Europe last winter.
 If al-Sabah is reinstated, Kuwaitis are certain to demand change.
 Kipper predicts upheavals throughout the region.
 "The invasion," she said, "will be their fall of the Berlin Wall."



Traditional music highlights tour opener

TWIN FALLS - He played for 900 million television viewers worldwide at the closing ceremonies of the 1980 Winter Olympics, and he played at folk festivals in locales as far-flung as Switzerland and Bermuda.

But he has never before played in Idaho. Walt Michael will make his Gem State debut tonight, when he and his band kick off the 1990-1991 Arts on Tour season at the College of Southern Idaho.

"It'll be a festive night," Michael said on the telephone from his home in Cold Spring, N.Y. He promised a wide musical menu and a family-oriented show.

Early today, Michael and his band will play for students at O'Leary Junior High School in Twin Falls and Central Elementary School in Jerome. "We find that it's a way of educating a future audience," he said.

Michael plays guitar and mandolin, but he's made his name on the hammered dulcimer, an instrument whose clear, ringing tones he has introduced at festivals worldwide and in appearances on programs including "A Prairie Home Companion" and "The Tonight Show."

The hammered dulcimer has 81 strings, and Michael tunes each one before every performance - a process that takes 20 minutes to a half hour. Onstage, Michael is joined by fiddlers Frank Orsini and Evan Stover and

acoustic bassist Tom Wetmore.

Traditional music is the bedrock of Michael's repertoire. On his most recent album - "Step Stone," recorded for the Flying Fish label - Michael and his band start with Bill Monroe's bluegrass-flavored "Ashland Breakdown" and wind up with an a cappella gospel number, "Sing the Angels Way."

Reviews are mixed on new NC-17 movie rating

LOS ANGELES - Theater owners and film-makers are giving the new movie rating NC-17 mixed reviews, saying it offers improvements over the ruinous X rating but still may prove troublesome.

The Motion Picture Association of America announced the X rating on Wednesday, replacing it with NC-17, for no children under 17 admitted. It said the new label does not immediately carry the commercial stigma of X, which is so strong that many theater chains - including the nation's two largest - won't show X-rated films and many newspapers won't carry ads for them.

The MPAA also said it will give film companies and theater owners more details on films that rates R, nothing violence, sex and language. The PG-13, PG and G ratings will remain the same.

"It's a great step," said Philip Kaufman, director of "Henry & June." "I'm just really delighted that we can show this film uncensored in America and show the film the way I made it. It is not intended as a prudish film."

Critics of the MPAA had been trying for months to change the system. They said the X rating, never copyrighted, had become synonymous with pornography because makers of hard-core adult films used it freely.

The new rating will be copyrighted. That means it cannot be used by porno producers unless they submit their films for MPAA review, something they never do because it costs up to \$2,000 per film.

Film critics Gene Siskel and Roger Ebert, hosts of a syndicated movie-preview show, applauded the new category.

"It represents a victory for everyone who cares about truly adult films. I'm using adult here in the sense of mature, thoughtful, serious and intelligent - not in the sense of dirty movies," Ebert said. "It's good news," said Dan Harkins, president of the 23-theater Harkins Theaters chain in Phoenix. "It takes some of the poisons out of the rating system and our advertising will be strengthened."

It was unclear whether newspapers and TV and radio stations would be more inclined to carry ads for movies bearing the NC-17 mark.

Laura Morganti, spokeswoman for the Los Angeles Times, predicted advertisements would be judged on a combination of their artwork and critics' opinions on the movies' artistic worth. Bert Manzan, president of the 28-screen Seven

'Twin Peaks' makes return for fall season

NEW YORK - It has not been a quiet week in Twin Peaks, the enigmatic little lumber town in the Pacific Northwest where the women are strange, the men are out-looking, and the children are all above suspicion.

Lake Wobegon ain't it. "Twin Peaks" is not a place, it's a state of mind to which millions of Americans will return Sunday night for the season premiere of television's oddest nighttime drama.

A tins eight episodes - just seven days in Twin Peaks time - we still don't know who killed Laura Palmer, the homecoming queen whose plastic-wrapped corpse fuels the series' central mystery. She's still dead. Maybe.

Then there's wacky, cherry pie-gobbling FBI agent Dale Cooper (Kyle MacLachlan). He has declared he knows the killer's identity but, in the season finale, was laid low by an unknown assailant and three gunshots to the chest.

There's more. One suspect in Laura's killing has been smothered by her father, another has been shot, there's been a heart attack, a bus overturned, a life-threatening fire, and a brothel-keeper has unknowingly hired his own daughter.

As actor Michael Ontkean ("Twin Peaks' doughy Sheriff Harry S. Truman) observed, the series is "a Kabuki-style Peyton Place on peyote buttons."

ABC says little about the two-hour special "ABC Sunday Night Movie," directed by David Lynch and written by Mark Frost, co-creators of the series.

The investigation into the mysterious killing continues, sorrow settles over the community as several lives hang in the balance. "ABC said," Audrey Horne finds herself a terrified prisoner, and Donna Hayward receives a strange message.

This is a strange time for a strange series. It was conceived by Lynch, the high priest of cinematic anxiety ("Eraserhead," "The Elephant Man," "Dune," "Blue Velvet" and "Wild at Heart") and Frost, an established TV producer from "Hill Street Blues."

A midseason replacement, "Twin Peaks" was the year's most talked-about show even before its April 8 debut won an 11 percent share of the TV audience. It quickly became the most talked-about show on television.

"We're just trying to give the genre of the nighttime soap, in the way that 'Hill Street Blues' did the cop show a decade ago," Frost said. "But it was much more than that. Viewers got a sense of place in Twin Peaks, its geography and exterior provided by the lovely town of Snoqualmie, Wash. The town was as placid as a forest pond where every droplet teems with violent, microscopic life."

The critics loved the show's dreamlike, allusive imagery, the dazzling cinematography of Ron Garcia and the ethereal score of composer Angelo Badalamenti.

Most of all they loved the townspeople, mordantly eccentric characters whose plots and subplots were cryptic to the point of inscrutability.

Every conversation had meaning, every gesture was freighted with hidden significance. Every scene charged with a sense that something dreadful was about to happen. The tension wasn't relieved, only punctuated by black comedy.

There had never been anything like it on television. Even film critic Pauline Kael of The New Yorker magazine was hooked: "It has both the insidious weirdness of Lynch's best movie work and the weird indistinctness of top-of-the-line TV trash. Lynch sets us drifting through a vivid dream of American life."

The New York Times advised "Twin Peaks." "Don't miss it," said one review... its editorial page ventured that the series "has been hailed as revolutionary TV. It has become, in any case, a phenomenon." Heady stuff, that.

"I killed Laura Palmer" T-shirts appeared. Food writers devoted columns to churning pie. The show's ardent fans would gather to analyze every clue and argue over meanings.

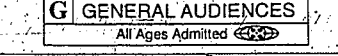
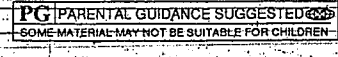
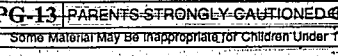
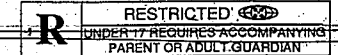
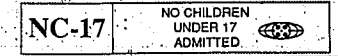
Computer enthusiasts would bicker about the show on electronic bulletin boards. Ordinarily-sensible people who wouldn't admit to watching "thirty-something" became instant, babbling fans.

Hailed as the television show of the '90s, "Twin Peaks" was everything except a hit. Its opening audience share of 33 percent quickly slumped.

'Simpsons' go for blues

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Enough about Michael Jackson. Pay no attention to those premature reports. Yes, the Gloved One has been approached about singing with the Animated One. But no, it is not a done deal. Which is why the recent stories about Jackson doing a duet with Bart Simpson have infuriated the folks over at Fox Broadcasting Co.'s hit cartoon show.

"Especially perturbed is 'Simpsons' creator Matt Groening, who pops down at a West Hollywood recording studio and grants a speedy interview about the latest project to come from America's favorite dysfunctional family."

"Oh, it's so frustrating," says the cartoonist. "I said to a reporter a while ago that I would like to have this happen and it was printed as if it were true."

What Groening wished for was Jackson's participation in "The Simpsons Sing the Blues," an incongruous title for the debut album of an overnight success story. What Groening is afraid of is that all the publicity will send the obsessively peeking Jackson scurrying from negotiations.

"This may kill it," Groening says. "We have a whole wish list of people we'd like to use on the album. Steve Ray Vaughan was lined up, then he was killed."

After a long day at the recording studio, this day are the actors who provide the voices for "The Simpsons."

There is Julie Kavner, whose scratchy vocals come out of Marge's animated mouth, and Dan Castellaneta, who talks for the long-suffering

dad, Homer. Sitting nearby is Yeardeley Smith, the voice of the high-minded daughter, "Lisa." Nancy Cartwright, nursing a cold and chugging Evian water, drops in and out of Bart's unmistakable whining monotone.

The four performers have been working on "The Simpsons Sing the Blues" for about a month. So far, they have completed only two rough cuts in between taping shows for "The Simpsons" fall season, which begins Oct. 13.

Due out in November, the disc contains an eclectic mix of old blues classics and Billie Holiday's "Good Blues for the Child" and original songs such as "Deep, Deep Trouble," produced by rapper D.J. Jazzy Jeff and written by Groening.

Fox has been trying to keep the record under wraps until negotiations are nailed down. But word has leaked out, to the great consternation of those involved.

Jackson's duet was to come on "Do the Bartman," and published reports have said it was penned by Jackson. It wasn't, which prompted producer and filmmaker James L. Brooks to issue a press release last week apologizing for any misunderstanding about who actually wrote the tune. The composer is Jackson pal Bryan Loren.

The album's marketing blitz highlighted by Simpson T-shirts, T. Heuresse watches, and — coming soon to a video arcade near you — a Simpsons pinball machine, why are "The Simpsons" singing?

"James L. Brooks walked into the office one day and said 'The Simpsons Sing the Blues,'" explains Groening. "Then we all spent a lot of time deciding what the blues was."

The final decisions for the album include Chuck Berry's "School Day," sung by Bart, Booker T. Jones' "Bart Under a Bad Sign" sung by Homer, and the "Moanin' Lisa Blues," sung by — well, you know.

Back at the studio, Fox has organized a media event, putting in crew in a half-dozen camera crews to interview and tape the would-be recording stars in action.

Problem is, there is no action. The four actors are not laying down tracks for the album. Instead, much time is spent standing around while they pretend they're singing for the benefit of the cameras.

The phenomenal success of "The Simpsons" begets such hype. The animated family with all-too-common frailties has gone beyond being a hit television show. It has become a part of pop culture.

"This point is not lost on the young Fox network, which made a brush decision this season to put "The Simpsons" up against NBC's top-rated but aging "The Cosby Show."

Some of "The Simpsons" cast think Fox's decision was foolish. Since moving to Thursdays at 8 p.m., the cartoon show that once peaked at No. 4 in the Nielsen ratings has plummeted to 45th place.

"I think it is a mistake," says Kavner. "It's a sweet little show. It belongs on Sunday nights."

Gables chain in Seattle, said such an evaluation system could become unworkable. "It's really going to cause a dilemma for the papers," Manzari said.

William Kartozian, president of the National Organization of Theater Owners, agreed that advertising NC-17 titles could be difficult.

"I hope the media will perceive that there's a difference between these films and 'Fleek,'" said Kartozian, whose organization represents the owners of 13,000 theater screens.

Kartozian said the initial response to the new rating had been positive, and he expected most theaters to show NC-17 films. He also said some states may amend the NC-17 rating to NC-18, barring children under 18.

The last time the ratings were changed was in 1984, when the PG-13 rating was added between the PG and R ratings. That change was prompted by "Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom."

"NC-17 films have included 'Midnight Cowboy' in 1969; 'Last Tango in Paris' in 1973 and 'A Clockwork Orange' in 1971.

the rating system had been unjustifiably criticized. "It's no question, but the X rating has a patina, a complexion which frankly we never intended it to have," he said.

NC-17 was especially welcome at Miramax Films, which had several recent releases rated X.

Miramax used the MPAA over its X ratings for "My Life as a Dog" and "The Company Man," but a New York Supreme Court judge warned that the rating system bordered on censorship.

"This just goes to show that being cautious without waving the flag can get the job done," said Harvey Weinstein, Miramax co-chairman.

"It's doing great. Tarneck said, estimating he sold 80 on Tuesday. "You've got to remember this record is probably one of the most awaited releases, especially in this neck of the woods."

"Antone's Records is affiliated with Antone's night club, where Vaughan got his start after moving to Austin in 1972.

"This is where he basically made a big part of his name," Tarneck said. Joe Benito, owner of The Record

Box in San Antonio, said the 25 records he ordered were quickly snapped up.

"The interest is pretty high," Benito said. "I've been getting a lot of calls on it."

Fans want to keep the album as a memento, he said.

Longtime Vaughan friend Ray Hennig of Austin said that although he had not listened to the album, "The world I get from people that have heard it is it's great."

"I don't think it would be much of a question about its success," Hennig said.

Vaughan and his band, Double Trouble, made their national debut in 1983 with the album "Texas Flood."

Vaughan and the band had a platinum album in "Couldn't Stand the Weather," released in 1984. That same year he won a Grammy for best traditional blues recording for the song "Texas Flood," which appeared on a compilation album titled "Blues Exposition."

This year he won a Grammy in the contemporary blues category for the album "In Step."

Guitar Player magazine cited Vaughan as the best electric blues player in 1983, 1984, 1985, 1986 and 1988, finally naming him to its "Gallery of the Greats" in 1989.

Frixou said Brando isn't writing his memoirs to raise money to pay legal fees for his son, Christian Brando, who goes on trial on murder

charges next month.

The actor put up his Los Angeles estate last month to secure his son's bail.

The younger Brando is charged with the shooting death last May of his half sister, Chynna's lover, Dag Drolet. He told police the shooting was an accident.

The elder Brando is writing his memoirs without the help of a ghostwriter, Frixou said.

"He's doing it totally himself, he's a very good writer and has done scripts before."

'GoodFellas' shows director in full control of his craft

HOLLYWOOD—To see an artist working at the peak of his power, everything extraneous stripped away, every element there for a purpose, is an extraordinary exhilaration.

Review

Martin Scorsese gave us that pure, hot, unquestioned power last in "Raging Bull" and, in virtuosity alone, "GoodFellas" is "Raging Bull" squared.

The non-nonsense street tone of "GoodFellas" comes straight from journalist Nicholas Pileggi's book "Wise Guy," a sharp distillation of 30 years in the Mafia through the eyes of one of its sidewalk mechanics. Half-Sicilian, half-Irish Henry Hill (Liotta) began by running nightclubs for the wiseguy at the corner, but when he was 12, but 30 years later, when it became clear that it was either them or him, he turned on them with exactly the same agility.

Pileggi's book provided Scorsese with a great, dense, sociological canvas, and the men's close collaboration on the screenplay has given the dialogue a falling-rapier poetry. It's a rare, cheerfully obscene, but real article. Scorsese seems to have

absorbed all the book's details and made them visual. When Pileggi describes the stand's gangsters, "so large that when they flanked themselves out of their cars, the vehicles rose by inches," we see the car wheeze and rise as 280 pounds of camel's-hair coat steps onto a Brownsville car. When new wiseguy wife Karen Hill is introduced to her Mafia sisters at a "hostess party," it's with a funny-sounding collage of teased hair, facial masks, ricki sturs and motherly tips about keeping the kids in line with belts and broomsticks.

Jimmy Conway, sending him on a lethal spiral which signaled to Henry that now was the time to get out or join the ranks of the missing.

Those ranks, Freddy "No Nose, Johnny" Rosalino, Jimmy "Two Times" and the finally nudgy (oupe king Morrie Kessler (Chuck Low) are part of the creepy fun of the movie. Scorsese lets us smile at their preening excesses; their kidding-on-the-square (the half-laughing that Henry by Joe Pesci's Tommy DeVito that freezes all laughter at the wiseguy's table. Then in a moment that confirms our darkest fears about DeVito, he abruptly shuts down the laughs forever. Only the tension is left and this flawless cast plays that perfectly.

In the same way that his narrator changes from Henry to Karen and back again, Scorsese's camera moves and changes with his character's rhythms. The director and his great cinematographer Michael Ballhaus have a rigorous time with Henry's bid to impress Karen. The scene begins outside the Copia. As Henry forces \$20 bills on unpreparing headwaiters, the camera dives with them down its side entrance, into its industrial interior, its cheek up to its bar and on its nightclub stage, where a whitey triumphantly sets down a busby-covered table for two just as Henry Youngman begins his routine — all in one sinuous shot.

"GoodFellas" (rated R for extreme violence and profanity), which begins in literal blackness and ends in sunshine and the blackness of Henry Hill's soul, is like a guided tour through a particular hell, with Scorsese as our family-smiling guide standing a little aloof from the goings-on. He does not need to moralize; he's a realist for a close-up look at the life do it for him.

Film's star began acting to escape taking a math class

NEW YORK (AP) — At one time Ray Liotta would have been perfectly happy to just stay home. His mother was the senior fan of the family. Liotta preferred sports. He went out for the movie part in high school only after quitting the basketball team because of a fight with his coach.

All his characters are motivated by passion, the actor says. For "GoodFellas," it was the drive for money and power. There was his wife (Griffith) in "Something Wild," his brother in "Dominic and Eugene" and baseball in "Field of Dreams."

The following are capsule reviews of movies now showing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

ARACHNOPHOBIA (PG-13). For a movie that plays to scare the kapok out of us, Frank Marshall's funny-scary primal scream comedy is a funny and nicely witty affair, technically, it's a wonder. It is the classic form, done on a grander scale: the blob-Marian-spider from far, far away that very nearly wipes out the perfect American small town. On the other hand, comedy is a funny and nicely witty affair, technically, it's a wonder.

FLATLINERS (R) Some lines shouldn't be crossed, some movies shouldn't be watched. No, that's too easy. This Joel Schumacher film, in which five photogenic med students decide to experience death at the scientifically, is eminently watchable, gloriously aflame with swanky deep-focus decor. But it's built around the kind of spiritually hucksters sell Maseratis with. The theme is like a little dry pea rattling through the vast, echoing, museum of the high-tech images. Why should anyone risk death to see the afterlives depicted here, when they can get the same stuff by subscribing to cable TV?

GHOST (PG-13). The movie's slogan is "Believe." But even those who'd be happy to comply must get past a certain woolly-mindedness to its script and a production prettified to the point of stickiness. With some of its actors — Demi Moore as the checked-voice "desolate" lover, Whoopi Goldberg as an extremely reluctant spirit go-between and Vincent Schiavelli as an irascible, sub-way-dwelling ghost — things are in the best hands possible. But Patrick Swayze as a corporate New York banker? Never in 7 million corporate years.

PRESUMED INNOCENT (R). A solid joy, an enthralling drama, perfectly cast and performed brilliantly by all, but especially by Harrison Ford, Boaz Dedeles and Paul Winfield.

TWIN FALLS—The Episcopal Church of the Ascension plans a free public concert to dedicate its new organ at 7:30 p.m. Sunday at the church, 210 Blue Lakes Blvd. N.

Dace Tweedy, organist for St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Boise, will present the program. The Episcopal church acquired its Allen Digital Computer Organ earlier this year.

"We're going to have a prayer or two over it," says the Rev. Fred Elwood. The concert will also honor Howard Howell, who served as the church's organist for more than 40 years. She has been designated organist emerita.

Elwood says that, in recent weeks, new organist Dennis McCracken has

received applause for his playing by parishioners impressed with the new instrument's capabilities.

The organ is one of the most technologically advanced in the state, according to Doug Lemmon of Dankley Music in Boise.

"It's into new things and new ideas," Lemmon says of Elwood. "It's exciting."

The organ includes a Kurzweil synthesizer and Musical Instrument Digital Interface, a capability that enables the organist to "sample" a live musician playing, say, a trumpet, then replay the trumpeter's solo at the push of a button.

Elwood says the church plans more organ concerts in the future, including one featuring McCracken.

Burt Reynolds, ensemble cast provide sleeper town action in 'Evening Shade'

AS David Lynch and other filmmakers have shown us in recent years, there's a lot more lurking beneath the surface of supposedly sleepy small towns than we might otherwise imagine.

One such fictional town might well prove to be Evening Shade, Ark., the setting for the new CBS series "Evening Shade," which airs Fridays. It stars Burt Reynolds, Marilu Henner, Elizabeth Ashley, Ossie Davis, Hal Holbrook and Charles Durning. Linda Bloodworth-Thomson, the guiding force behind "Designing Women," is co-executive producer.

What's up in this particular Southern hamlet? Well, for starters, an unwanted pregnancy, a suggestive photo of a football coach and a stripper, women trying to break out of stereotypical roles, a perpetually losing high-school football team, and an election. Oh, did I mention that it's a comedy?

"I had worked with Burt (Reynolds) before," explains Henner, who calls from California. She plays the much-younger wife of his character in the series. "We had really good chemistry in the (1983) movie 'The Man Who Loved Women.' I also really wanted to work with the rest of the cast."

Henner's attraction to a large ensemble cast stems in part from the great experience she had starring on the 1978-83 series "Taxi," in which she played aspiring gallery-owner Elaine Nardo.

"It was sort of like a golden period in all our lives," she says enthusiastically.

"The actors were all so good at what they did, and the writers were extraordinary. It was those same qualities that attracted me to this show."

"Both shows have that guiding voice," Henner continues. "On 'Taxi,' it was Jim Brooks, and here, it's Linda Thomson. Before this show came along, I got involved with a lot of TV projects, and none of them worked out. None of them had that strong voice to lead things."

Another similarity to "Taxi" is that "Evening Shade" seems to depict a group of quirky, offbeat characters.

"I love working with these people, because of all the vibrant colors each person brings to the show," Henner says. "You feel proud to expose your own particular color because it's unique."

"I feel a real affinity with my character," she continues. "Ava, my character, is also in a very romantic marriage, and I liked that."

"She was one of these women who had a crush on the football star and was plucked to be his wife right after high school."

"Now she's a wife and mother and a lawyer, and she's getting a chance to do things that she really wants. Of course it's difficult — on TV, characters always seem to do a lot of things — but she's really coming into her own. I think a lot of women feel that way."

Nose to nose in opening of fall season top networks bow to underdog CBS

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The perennially last-place CBS network is finally No. 1 in the closest opener of the fall television season in more than two decades.

CBS emerged from last week's fall preview week in first place, nosing ahead of usually top-rated NBC by just two-tenths of a ratings point.

The networks haven't finished this tightly in a premiere race since 1966, network executives said Tuesday in response to the latest ratings released by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

CBS had a 13.6 average rating, NBC had 13.4 and ABC had 13.2.

Each ratings point represents 931,000 homes.

NBC responded to the ratings with a press release that began "Premiere week almost by definition is an atypical week."

In a top 10 list where every show but one marked a season premiere, NBC's "Cheers" was the top-rated program, CBS' "60 Minutes," which began its new season the previous week, tied for third with the network's "Designing Women."

ABC's lone top 10 entry was the fall premiere of its popular blue-collar comedy "Roseanne," which fin-

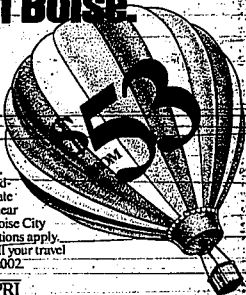
