Last chance to register is today

The Times-News

TWIN FALLS — Today is the last day to register to vote in the Nov. 6 election.

Those carrying a full work schedule still have no excuse not to visit their county courthouse. County clerks will be on duty until 8 p.m. To be eligible to vote you must be 18 years or older on the day of the election and a resident of the state and in the county for 30 days prior to the day of election.

Idaho law requires each person to show some type of documentation as proof of residency within the county they are attempting to register in. A current driver's license, printed check or deposit slip, utility bill or motor vehicle registration are sufficient to document residency.

You must register if you failed to vote at least once during the four years following registration or have moved to another county.

Those who have questions about their eligibility to vote or would like to apply for an absentee ballot are encouraged to contact their local county clerk.

Farm bill receives OK from Senate

WASHINGTON — The Senate approved the 1990 farm bill Thursday, sending the president legislation that clears the way for crop subsidy cuts and gives farmers new rules for conserving their land.

The five-year, \$40.8-billion measure, setting policy for virtually every operation within the Agriculture Department, was passed 60-36. The House had approved, 318-102, on Tuesday.

The legislation is a compromise of the two bills approved during the summer by the House and Senate. It establishes environmental rules farmers must follow, sets out the government's nutrition programs, including food stamps, determines trade policy for food products and sets the government's support programs for commodities.

Besides melding House and Senate language in all these areas, the conference committee of the two houses also decided to reduce subsidized acreage by 15 percent if budget negotiators follow through on their plan to cut agriculture spending by more than \$13 billion over the next five years.

Dollar amounts in the bill are spending ceilings. The money must be provided in separate appropriations.

Both Senate and House members were careful to point out that the subsidy reduction hinges on the budget being approved. Without it, subsidized acreage would be maintained at current levels.

Environmentalists have hailed the bill as one of the most significant conservation measures passed by Congress this session.

The legislation gives farmers a way to drain wetlands for farming without net loss of important wildlife habitats by selling the federal government a conservation easement on their property that can be restored to wetland status.

Buhl teachers call strike

Negotiations run late Thursday; schools will open

BUHL — Buhl teachers planned to strike this morning, an action they claim was provoked by stingy Buhl School Board members.

Last-ditch negotiations between the School Board and the Buhl Education Association to avert the walkout were still in progress at press time.

Eighty-three percent of BEA members voted Thursday to strike this morning, association President Sue Melanson said. The strike would be the first teachers' walkout in Idaho since Mountain Home teachers took up picket signs for one day in 1988.

Teachers expected to begin picketing at 6:30 a.m. today at all three schools in the district, said Melanson. But school will be open today with substitute teachers in the classrooms, according to Superintendent Gene Pyles.

Negotiations with federal mediator Tom Curdie of Salt Lake City broke down at 11 p.m. Wednesday, Melanson said.

Although the BEA reduced its demand from a base salary for beginning teachers of \$17,066 to \$17,000 Wednesday, the

board refused to budge from its offer of \$16,800, said Helen Brown, chief negotiator for the BEA. The base salary was \$15,500 last year.

The difference between the two sides' positions is \$20,000, she said.

"The School Board was unwilling to increase the base by a meager \$200 and now

they're in a strike," said Allen Anderson, Idaho Education Association's Region 5 director.

Meanwhile, the district scrambled Thursday to line up substitute teachers and parents to take the places of those who strike.

Lawrence LaRue, principal of Popplewell Elementary School, said he filled 29 teaching positions with teachers aides, substitute teachers and parents.

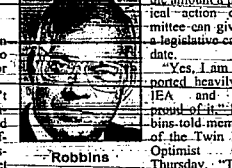
IEA backs Robbins with \$20,000

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho Education Association will spend at least \$20,000 to support Democrat Gary Robbins' bid for the Idaho state Senate.

Although the teachers union hasn't submitted a final bid, Robbins' campaign manager Sheri Kleinschmidt said Thursday that she thinks the IEA will offer about \$20,000 in campaign assistance. Kleinschmidt doesn't know yet whether that total includes in-kind contributions, such as clerical help, advertising support or printed materials.

Under Idaho law, there is no limit to

are the people in the front lines with our kids."

As a three-term member in the Idaho House of Representatives, Robbins said

he secured 100 percent on IEA's voting report card. During his one term in the House, Robbins' Republican opponent, Russell Newcomb, scored 77 percent, he said.

Robbins and Newcomb are locked in a battle for the District 25 state Senate seat. There has become one of the hottest legislative races in the state.

Earlier this month, Robbins estimated that his campaign could spend as much as \$100,000 to win the crucial eight-county seat for the Democrats. Newcomb said he expects to spend about \$30,000 on the race.

Even if the \$20,000 contributed by the IEA is used, Robbins said

U.S. considers another 100,000 troops for gulf duty

WASHINGTON — The United States may increase its Persian Gulf military presence by 100,000 troops, more than 40 percent, to pose an offensive threat to Iraqi forces occupying Kuwait, defense officials said Thursday.

"We are not at the point yet where we want to stop adding forces," said Defense Secretary Dick Cheney. It is "conceivable" that 100,000 more troops could be sent to

reinforce the 240,000 U.S. military personnel already in the region or on their way, he said.

Cheney, interviewed on CBS' "This Morning," offered no timetable and set no ceiling for the buildup. His remarks came amid heightened administration rhetoric about Iraq's threat to Middle East stability.

Cheney's Director William H. Webster said the Bush administration believes the Middle East will not be secure as long as Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein stays in power and

his arsenal remains intact.

Webster told a breakfast gathering that the administration had "no real confidence that the area will ever be secure again as long as he is still there" unless a strong anti-Iraq regional military alliance is created or "he is disassociated from his weapons of mass destruction."

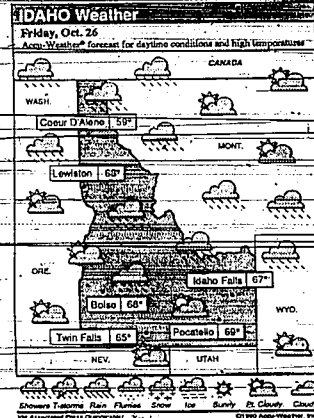
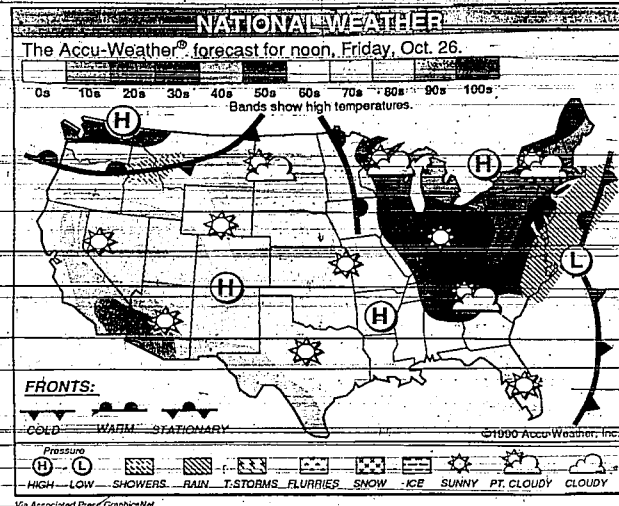
A 340,000-troop presence in the Middle East would be roughly the same size as the Pentagon's European force and about 60 percent of the peak U.S. presence in Viet-

nam, which crested at 543,000 in 1969.

"A 42 percent troop increase could give President Bush the military muscle he would need to drive Iraqi forces out of Kuwait, if they invaded, and have occupied since Aug. 2, some defense officials said.

But others said such an increase would still leave the United States and its allies with about the same number of troops in the region as Iraq, nowhere near the 3-to-1 margin military commanders like to have.

Weather summary

Mostly sunny skies and above normal temperatures covered Idaho Thursday as a ridge of high pressure moved into the Rockies.

A weak cold front was expected to bring a chance of showers to the north and central parts early today. This system also will produce breezy and somewhat cooler conditions across the rest of the state today.

Clouds were slowly increasing over the north Thursday afternoon as the front approached from the west. Meanwhile, the remainder of the state was mostly clear.

Temperatures climbed to record or near record levels in the south Thursday afternoon. Among the record maximum readings for the day which were reported were 79 at Twin Falls, 81 at Boise - also a seasonal high - 75 at Pocatello and 69 at Rexburg.

Snow covers Carolina's fall foliage; frost for Alabama

Brilliantly colored fall foliage was coated with snow and ice Thursday in the mountains of North Carolina and frost heeded as far south as Alabama.

Showers and thunderstorms extended during the afternoon over North Carolina, South Carolina, northeastern Georgia, eastern Tennessee and southwestern Virginia.

The rain was mixed with snow in the Appalachians and changed completely to snow at higher elevations.

"It was very pretty on these colored leaves," said Beulah Calhoun at Calhoun Farm Supply in Newland, N.C.

Elsewhere in North Carolina, 8 inches of snow accumulated at Mount Mitchell and Mount Pisgah got a little more than an inch, the National Weather Service reported.

The National Park Service closed two sections of the Blue Ridge Parkway in North Carolina because of snow.

In eastern Tennessee, snow closed the Clingman Dome road in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, the weather service said.

At lower elevations in North Carolina, thunderstorms produced locally heavy rain at Charlotte, including 1.50 inches in the six hours up to 2 p.m. EDT.

Cold air headed southward across the Ohio and Tennessee valleys with temperatures expected to dip into the 30s by Friday morning in northern Alabama, and the mid to upper 30s across central and southern Alabama.

Elsewhere, rain was scattered over western New York state and northeastern Ohio.

Rain extended from north-central and western Washington to the northwestern Oregon.

Strong, gusty wind blew across the northern Pacific Coast during the morning, with gusts reaching 44 mph at Astoria, Ore., 47 mph at Bellingham, Wash., and 56 mph at Seaside, Ore.

It also creates an incentive program for farm conservation, reclamation of ground and surface water on 10 million acres of land and requires the Agriculture Department to help farmers meet state and federal environmental standards.

The reduce off-farm environmental threats and mitigate soil loss on adjacent lands. 40 million acres will be enrolled by 1995 in a reserve program.

It requires farmers to keep records of hazardous pesticide use and authorizes the first effort to assess the threat of global climate change on agriculture.

The conference committee drafted a provision in the original Senate bill that would have prohibited export sales of pesticides banned or unregistered in the United States. Chemical companies said it would cause severe economic damage.

Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., chairman of the Agriculture Committee, said he would re-introduce the measure next year.

The bill also:

- Establishes a program for protecting \$25 million acres of private land.
- Creates national standards for organic farming.
- Creates a rural development administration within USDA to help communities recover economically from the loss of farms.
- Sets up a satellite program for rural hospitals and schools to receive information from urban areas.
- Establishes a matching fund program for rural businesses.
- Authorizes increased funds for existing water and sewer programs in rural communities to improve drinking water and waste disposal.
- Streamlines food aid policy by giving the president authority to donate food and spend up to \$30 million for agricultural necessities such as fertilizers and transportation.
- Requires USDA to develop a long-term trade strategy to expand overseas markets.
- Freezes target prices on wheat at \$4 a bushel, corn, \$2.75 a bushel, grain sorghum, \$2.61 a bushel; barley, \$2.76 a bushel; oats, \$1.45 a bushel; cotton, 73 cents a pound, rice, 0.71 per hundred pounds.
- Sets an 18 cent loan rate on sugar.
- Freezes government dairy prices at \$10.10 per hundred pounds, but requires the agriculture secretary to report to Congress on other options for the dairy program by August 1, 1991. An assessment will be levied on dairy producers if government surpluses exceed 7 billion pounds.
- Senators who voted against the bill criticized the conference committee's money-saving plan, saying it would hurt farmers.
- But Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., the ranking Republican on the Senate Agriculture Committee, said that even with the expected budget cuts, farmers need not lose income.
- He pointed out that target prices have been frozen and loan rates in some areas raised. He said farmers would be able to use the 15 percent of acreage being taken off government subsidized crops to plant according to consumer demand.

"We try to get people who are certified, but we are not required to in this school district," he said.

The order from the School Board was to fill every classroom, with parents if necessary. LaRue said he said some parents called and threatened their services as substitute teachers.

Dennis Osman, principal of Buhl Senior High School, said he was able to fill all teaching positions with substitute teachers and parents.

The middle school also was able to fill all its teaching positions.

The district has about 1,500 students and employs 80 teachers.

Parents should not interfere because they will only prolong the strike, LaRue said.

"We are concerned that they are just trying to get warm bodies," Brown said. "In the best interest of kids for safety and education reasons, the board should close the schools and sit down and negotiate."

LaRue said he called Jan Jerome high school football game will be played as scheduled at Buhl High's Bowers Field. Brown said although the coaches support the strike, it would not be fair to the students to cancel the game.

A dispute over how much the School Board has actually offered teachers is central to the conflict, both sides say.

The BEA contends the board's best offer would mean an average increase in benefits and salaries of 7.8 percent, even though the School Board has budgeted a 9.3 percent increase and the Legislature provided enough money for a 9.4 percent hike.

Buhl School Board members say they are actually offering an increase in salaries and benefits of 11.2 percent.

"They claim the board has the money and we claim we don't have the money," Pyles said.

The rift between board members and teachers goes deeper than a disagreement over money.

"There are a lot of emotions tied into this," Pyles said.

"Teachers consider the district's refusal to offer the full salary in-

crease a show of disrespect," said Gayle Moore, Idaho Education Association communications director, in a news release.

Brown said past layoffs and what he called unjustified treatment of teachers dating back as long as five years have been grating on teachers.

"It's the culmination of years of problems and this happened to be the catalyst that set it off," Anderson said.

Both sides agreed that however the current labor dispute is resolved, it will leave many wounds.

"Nobody wins and there's hard feelings that last for years," LaRue said.

The BEA has started a crisis center to coordinate activities during the strike.

The last teachers' strike in the Magic Valley was in Twin Falls in 1976.

Six other Idaho school districts are still bargaining their 1990-1991 contracts. They are Gooding, Clearwater of Kootenai, Filer, Lapwai, Leadore and Cottonwood.

IEA does include in-kind services, the Robbins-Newcomb race, could be the heaviest investment the teachers' union made in a legislative contest.

According to the secretary of state's office, IEA political expenditures totaled \$160,109.82 between Jan. 1, 1987, and Dec. 31, 1988 - the last legislative election period.

The two most expensive races for the union in 1988 included a contribution of \$9,000 in cash and in-kind assistance for Democrat Linda Clark, who lost in her attempt to unseat incumbent state Sen. Rachel Gilbert, R-Boise. The union contributed about \$10,000 in cash and in-kind help to Democrat Maryann Hosier, who tied unsuccessfully to topple state Sen. Norris "Doc" Hyde, R-Emmett.

Terry Gilbert, IEA director for the Magic Valley region, said he wasn't

prepared to discuss Robbins' contributions Thursday but would have a statement available early next week.

The IEA will also contribute to the Wayne Valley legislative races, Gilbert said. But he did not elaborate.

"What does the union expect in return?"

"What we expect, I guess, is a candidate who will exercise his independent judgment, but will listen to us as well," Gilbert said.

He added that his group has a stake in supporting candidates who will be "an advocate for teachers and kids."

The union's political agenda does extend beyond educational issues, however. For example, the IEA has led the fight against bringing public employees under the state's right-to-work law.

Newcomb said he isn't sure why the IEA is pouring money into his

opponent's campaign coffers.

He said he voted alongside Robbins for increased school funding during the time they both served in the Idaho House.

But in his first year, Newcomb said he drafted a bill proposing per review for teachers that would have involved parents, other teachers and administrators. "That bill was never introduced."

"They didn't like it," he said.

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House military spending bill cuts SDI, funds fancy fighter

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House approved a military spending bill Thursday that slashes President Bush's 1991 budget request for the Strategic Defense Initiative but adopts the Pentagon's plan for a high-tech fighter aircraft.

By voice vote, the House passed the legislation which provides \$268 billion for the nation's defense in the fiscal year that began Oct. 1, a cut of \$19 billion from Bush's initial proposal in January.

Debate and final passage of the largest bill before the Congress took a mere 11 minutes. House members pushed to adjourn before Sunday.

The legislation now goes to the Senate, which is expected to approve the measure.

Defense Secretary Dick Cheney supports the spending bill and Bush's signature is likely.

"Among the provisions in the bill, which members have set in a design blueprint adopted by the House late Wednesday, is a nearly \$2 billion cut in Bush's \$4.7 billion request for SDI and a reduction in funds for the B-2 stealth bomber that keeps the program alive for at least one more year.

"This bill shows restraint. It's a lean bill," said Rep. John Murtha, D-Pa., chairman of the House Appropriations subcommittee on defense.

The legislation largely tracks the military blueprint but breaks ranks with the authorization bill on several issues.

The spending plan calls for a troop cut of 78,500 from the 2.1 million men and women in uniform worldwide just over \$900 million for the MILSTAR communications satellite and full-scale development of the Advanced Tactical Fighter.

The administration requested \$283 million for full-scale development and \$763 million to complete the demonstration and validation phase of the prototype aircraft.

The defense blueprint provides \$964 million for the program but prohibits full-scale development in fiscal 1991.

The authorization bill emphasizes the need for the Air Force to finish demonstrating several technologies, including aerodynamic performance, low observability and engine capability, before beginning full-scale development.

The Pentagon plans to begin buying the aircraft, intended to replace the Air Force's F-15, in 1996.

The total number of fighters to be bought is 750.

The spending bill concurs with the administration's request on the fighter as well as its proposal for the SRAM-T, a stand-off tactical nuclear weapon.

The Pentagon sought \$148 million in fiscal 1991 to begin SRAM-T test units and F-15E adaptor hardware.

The authorization bill provides \$35 million while the spending bill meets the administration's total.

Key Issues

Here are some of them, according to a proposed compromise deficit-reduction bill. Incorporating elements from both parties' plans, exact figures could change in the final agreement.

CAPITAL GAINS

The maximum tax rate on capital gains, which are profits from the sale of assets such as investments, would be 28 percent even though wages and other income would be taxed as high as 31 percent. This would benefit those who pay a top 33 percent rate on income, including capital gains, under present law.

RATES

The 28 percent top income tax rate on the wealthiest 600,000 Americans likely would not be raised to 31 percent. Effective rates could even be higher, depending on exemptions and deductions. About 4 million couples and individuals who now pay a top rate of 28 percent would pay a maximum 31 percent and not get a tax cut.

EXEMPTIONS

Benefits from the \$5,000 personal exemption allowed each taxpayer and dependent would be reduced for taxable income exceeds \$100,000 for single people and \$150,000 for childless couples filing a joint return. The exemption would be fully lost once income rises to \$225,000 for single individuals or \$275,000 for a couple filing jointly.

GASOLINE

The 9-cent-a-gallon tax would be increased by 5 or 6 cents.

DEDUCTIONS

A couple or individual could write off only 97 percent of otherwise allowable itemized deductions on any portion of adjusted gross income exceeding \$100,000. Thus, a high-income taxpayer would lose \$300 in deductions for each \$1 to exceed the above \$100,000. This has the effect of raising the top marginal tax rate on those people to 32 percent.

ALCOHOL

Negative family have rolled on higher taxes on alcoholic beverages, tobacco, airplane tickets, furs and jewelry and expensive cars.

EXEMPTIONS

Each exemption lost would raise the effective marginal tax rate by one-half percentage point, the bigger the family the higher their marginal rate. Thus, a couple with two children would pay a top rate of 34 percent on part of their income; the regular 31 percent rate plus 1 percentage point because of the limit on deductions and 2 points by losing their exemption.

EXEMPTIONS

Those with incomes under \$20,000 would, on average, get a tax cut because of a higher earned-income credit, which helps poor, working families with children.

EXEMPTIONS

Those with incomes between \$20,000 and \$200,000 would face tax increases in the neighborhood of 2 percent although the bite on those between \$50,000 and \$75,000 would be slightly less — 1.5 percent.

EXEMPTIONS

The most striking difference between this bill and those of the last decade is the disproportionately large burden the new plan would impose on those with higher incomes. The Joint Committee on Taxation estimated the share of federal taxes paid by people with incomes over \$200,000 would rise from 15.4 percent to 16.1 percent.

EXEMPTIONS

The bill would raise the 9-cent-a-gallon gasoline tax and the 15-cent diesel tax by 5 cents each.

Budget has higher consumer taxes for all

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumers would pay more for gasoline, cigarettes and beer under the deficit-reduction plan nearing completion in Congress.

But the wealthiest Americans would face income tax increases averaging 0.3 percent as well.

As many as 4 million, slightly less, well-to-do couples and individuals — including most members of Congress — would get a tax cut because the top rate on their earnings, now 33 percent, would drop to 31 percent.

They also would get the bill's only tax break for capital gains. It is nothing like President Bush's proposed deep cut in taxes on capital gains, which also benefits from investments. But it would prevent anyone from paying a capital-gains rate higher than 28 percent.

Those with incomes under \$20,000 would, on average, get a tax cut because of a higher earned-income credit, which helps poor, working families with children.

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Government OKs plan to sell or close 192 S&I's

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal regulators approved on Thursday a plan to sell or close about 192 failed savings and loan institutions over the next six months.

The proposed action, which involves assets valued at \$119 billion, is part of an operating plan for the Resolution Trust Corporation, established to oversee the bailout of the financially devastated thrift industry.

Officials of the RTC oversight board approved the new plan. They said its implementation would bring to about 479 the total number of the 498 financial problems have been resolved by liquidation or other actions since Aug. 9, 1989.

But they noted that the plan is subject to the congressional appropriations process and cannot be completed unless it receives full financing.

Astronomers find huge galaxy

WASHINGTON (AP) — A concentration of stars that stretches for 6 million light years — more than 60 times the size of the Milky Way — is the largest galaxy ever discovered, astronomers say in the journal Science.

The study, to be published Friday, said the central galaxy in a distant cluster of galaxies called Abell 2029 has more than 100 trillion stars. The Milky Way, which includes the sun and its solar system, has about 3 billion stars.

Jeffrey R. Kuhn, a Michigan State University astronomer who co-authored the study, said the Abell 2029 central galaxy "is the largest single galaxy that has been resolved."

"If we talk about the galaxy and the halo (diffused light around the galaxy) as a single entity, then it is the largest object that we are aware of," he said.

Taxes rise as wealth grows in budget plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — Here is a preliminary congressional estimate of how the new taxes in the compromise deficit-reduction plan will affect the nation's taxpayers.

The projection, compiled by Congress' Joint Tax Committee, was based on the tax package congressional leaders and Bush administration officials agreed to on Wednesday. Lawmakers were still negotiating over the precise size of the tax increases on Thursday.

For people earning less than \$10,000 annually, the plan would cut their federal tax bill by 2.1 percent next year. Their effective tax rate — total earnings divided by all federal taxes — would go from 13.3 percent now to 13.1 percent.

The figures include all federal taxes: income, excise taxes, payroll deductions for Social Security and Medicare, and other taxes.

People earning \$10,000 to \$20,000: a 2.8 percent tax cut. Effective tax rate: 15.6 percent now, 15.1 percent next year.

\$20,000 to \$30,000: 1.8 percent tax increase. Effective tax rate: 18.4 percent now, 18.8 percent next year.

Typhoid cases on the rise in U.S.

ATLANTA — Federal health officials said Thursday there have been six U.S. outbreaks of typhoid fever so far this year, matching the number for the entire last decade.

Typhoid fever, once a dreaded disease, is most commonly linked to poor sanitation, spreading through contaminated food and water. The disease is now rare in the developed world, accounting for about 400 cases a year in the United States.

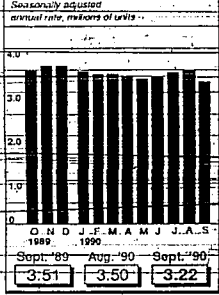
Centers for Disease Control researchers have received reports of six different U.S. outbreaks of typhoid this year. One outbreak is linked to food at a large family reunion, two in restaurants, one to home-cooked food, one to imported shellfish and one of unknown origin.

Preliminary CDC reports show 36 cases reported nationwide so far this year. If that rate continues through the end of the year, the 1990 total could reach 513, the most in one year since 1983.

"Consumers don't know what to expect," Flynn said. "When people don't know what's coming, they tend to delay big-ticket expenditures. Many of them put their home buying plans on hold."

The South led the sales decline, falling 10.0 percent to an annual rate of 1.26 million units. The Commerce Department next Tuesday will report on September new home sales.

"Prices go up more quickly than they come down," Kent said.

Also assumed in Kent's forecast was that crude oil remains at about \$30 per barrel. That assumption seemed open to question even as he testified; in New York's mercantile exchange oil jumped \$3.17 per barrel in early trading to \$34.25 by midday.

Members of the Senate panel focused on the volatility of the oil market. Committee Chairman John Glenn, D-Ohio, scoffed at how "some goofy thing," like a rumor about Saddam Hussein having a dream can affect oil prices.

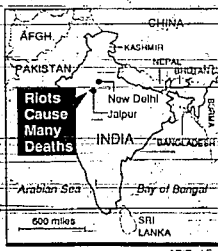

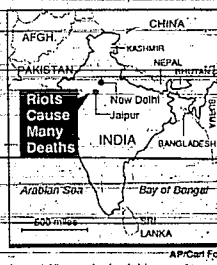

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Oil prices rise in oil price squelches brief market rally

NEW YORK — The stock market pulled back Thursday, faced with revived upward pressure on oil prices.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks fell 3.86 points to 2,494.16 by the close.

Declining issues outnumbered advances by about 3 to 1 in nationwide trading of New York Stock Exchange-listed stocks, with 524 up, 851 down and 437 unchanged.

came to 141.46 million shares, against \$149.29 million in the previous session. Nation-wide, consolidated volume in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 174.26 million shares.

The price of crude oil for December delivery climbed more than \$3 a barrel, to more than \$34 a barrel, on the New York Mercantile Exchange.

Analysts said that was enough to squelch a tentative early rally that was credited to

It's time to let Edwards get on with state business

Here's a quick civics quiz: Which Idahoan handles the most money each year: the controller at Boise Cascade, the chief financial officer at Albertson's, the comptroller at Morrison-Knudsen or none of the above?

If you answered none of the above, you know how much is at stake Nov. 6 in state treasurer's election.

The state's chief money manager handles an average daily balance of more than \$500 million.

How well the treasurer invests the state's so-called "idle" funds determines how much new, non-tax revenue comes into the state's coffers—and often whether an additional funds program, grants and raises or lower taxes.

The job is currently held by Lydia Justice Edwards, a Republican who was elected four years ago when Marjorie Ruth Moon stepped down to run unsuccessfully for lieutenant governor.

But Moon, a Democrat, wants her old job back. We don't think she should get it.

Edwards has a solid record of accomplishment in 3 1/2 years, earning \$87 million in interest income and bringing the office firmly into the computer age.

Moon also suffered a ruptured aorta in

late August and has not been able to resume campaigning, served as state treasurer for 24 years before 1987 and virtually defined the office in its present form. She should let that legacy speak for itself.

It's clear that Moon is not physically up to the demands of the office, just as Joe Williams was not able to complete his term when he was re-elected as state auditor four years ago. Idahoans, not the governor, should be able to choose the state treasurer.

Moreover, there's no evidence that Moon could do the job any better than Edwards has done. The changes Edwards has made—lowering the office's budget, improving its operation and the state is earning far more on its money than it did in 1986.

Idaho owes Moon a debt of thanks, both for the way she did her job for 24 years and for the fact that she demonstrated how a woman could handle a tough job with competence and dedication long before it was fashionable for women to run for public office.

But Edwards herself is a perhaps the highest beneficiary of that example, and she has done a terrific job.

It's time for Moon, and the voters of Idaho, to let Edwards get on with it.

Fish plan may drain Idaho of water

In 1987, the Pacific Northwest Power Planning Council began an interim goal to double the anadromous fish runs from 2.5 million to 5 million adult fish. To determine the best method of achieving this goal, the Planning Council asked federal and state fish and wildlife agencies and the Indian tribes to develop a systemwide plan. This plan was to identify possible strategies for increasing the salmon and steelhead in the Northwest.

The three-year planning process involved doing a basin-by-basin inventory of fisheries habitat and after 31 studies and \$3 million later, a system planning model was developed to protect benefits of strategies in terms of adult fish harvested and returning to the Columbia River.

The system planning model is projecting that if all the recommended strategies are successful, it is estimated that 1.8 million potential adult fish will be produced. This figure is 72 percent of the 2.5 million goal the Northwest Planning Council is wanting to recover. The system's model is projecting that 20 percent would come from the Snake River and 14 percent would come from the upper Columbia—42 percent of the system planning model projection for increased adult salmon and steelhead will be coming from Idaho. One of the major emphases will

be on the Middle Fork of the Salmon River where 900,000 additional yearling and smolts will be flushed to the ocean with additional enhanced flows of water.

Since there are no major water holding structures on the Salmon River and during the spring most dam storage water for the irrigation season, where are these enhanced flows going to come from? The four major sources of tributary water for fish flows would have to come from the Weiser River, the Boise River, the Payette River and the Owyhee River, which all empty into the main stem of the Snake River. All these rivers have established State Water Rights and are fully appropriated for other beneficial uses.

This year in Idaho, drought-like conditions occurred in the Treasure Valley, parts of the Magic Valley and even parts of the Upper Snake River. A heavy frost with about 20 percent of normal snow pack to fill most of our reservoirs and then any moisture above that could be released in the spring for flushing yearlings and smolts down the river.

The governor, Cecil Andrus, has made a commitment to do everything he can to help improve the anadromous fish runs in Idaho. His natural resource person, Andy Burnell, has assured the Idaho sports fishing groups and the environmentalists that the anadromous fish runs will be improved within the state of Idaho and every effort will be made to comply with the wishes of the Northwest Power Planning Council.

Just recently, a deal for 260,000 acre feet of storage water in the Copper Snake was made for this coming year to enhance fish flows. The water is coming from Water District 01 and being sold to Bonneville Power for fish flushes. Recent new reports have cited that additional water is being released from Dworshak Dam in Orofino to help the steelhead come up the river for fall spawning.

One of the major strategies to increase fish run sizes is to increase the amount of water which flows over Ice Harbor Dam. (Ice Harbor Dam is about 100 miles from Lewiston.) Currently about 93,000 cubic feet per second flows over Ice Harbor during a mean flow year. This estimate is high during a normal-to-low water year as it is in Idaho this year. The normal is closer to

The genuine need for experience is just one of the many good reasons to return Leo Barnes to the Idaho House of Representatives.

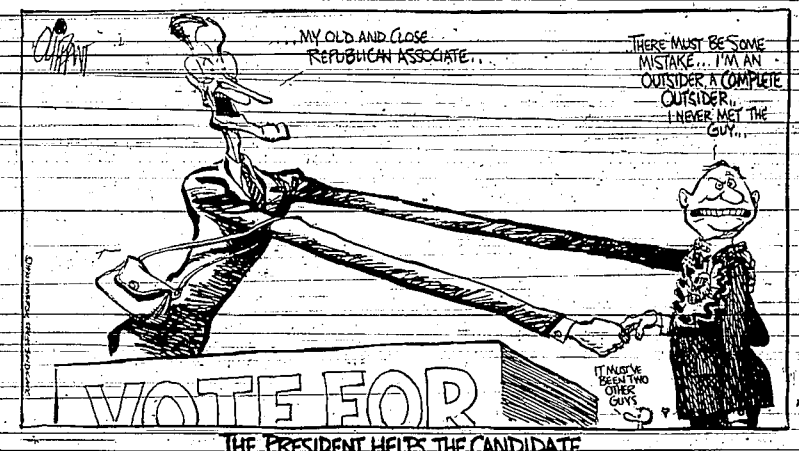

State high court voids conviction of Blaine resident

BOISE — A divided Idaho Supreme Court has voided the felony assault conviction of a Blaine County man because prosecution maneuvering subjected the defendant to double jeopardy.

The 3-2 ruling issued Thursday upheld the misdemeanor battery conviction of Clinton Huston, charged with kicking his estranged wife during a heated discussion over custody of their son.

In that plea, however, Huston refused to accept the circumstances the prosecution laid out in its charges of assault, where it claimed Mrs. Huston had been struck with the butt of a shotgun or rifle.

Following the plea, the prosecution used the information from Huston's misdemeanor plea to amend the charges to include a "bat" as a possible assault weapon and then won a jury conviction on the felony on that basis.

But Justice Stephen Bistline, writing for the majority, said that modification of the charge in an attempt to introduce new information that would justify proceeding with the more serious felony case violated Huston's protection against being tried twice for the same crime.

Buhl abuzz with strike speculation

BUHL — A threatened teachers strike had classrooms and coffee shops buzzing Thursday afternoon, with much of the town split on whether or not teachers should receive pay raises.

The Buhl Education Association, had promised to strike beginning this morning but another negotiation session had been scheduled for Thursday evening if the teachers are on the picket line this morning, substitute teachers will man the classrooms until 1 p.m.

High School Principal Dennis Osman told students after lunch "Friday that school will be in session today and anyone who stays home will be marked absent."

"They should cancel school until this is resolved," said Robin Kelley, a senior at Buhl High School. Kelley said she didn't want to "waste time" during today's abbreviated class schedule while substitute teachers hold down the fort.

Many students said they would bring "pillows and headphones" to class today, and others said they weren't coming at all.

Seniors aren't especially supportive of that last idea. Many said they were afraid that enough students would boycott classes to cancel school. If that happens, makeup days might be tacked on to the end of the school year, delaying graduation.

"The money is already there, and the teachers should get it," said senior Heather

2 party leaders seek short-term District 25 position

TWIN FALLS — The seat they seek will not exist after 1992, but two Magic Valley party chairmen want the job anyway.

Eugene Sullivan, for eight years the Camas County Democratic chairman, and Mark Stubbs, the former Twin Falls County Republican chairman, want to represent the sprawling eight-county District 25 in the

Idaho House of Representatives. The seat is open because Democratic Rep. Gary Robbins now wants to switch to the state Senate after earlier switching from the Republican Party.

"When Gary Robbins switched parties, that left the seat open for a Republican," Stubbs said.

Sullivan said he threw his hat into the ring because "I just kind of felt like" he wasn't going to give the Republicans any free rides.

Stubbs says he should go to Boise because he is a lawyer and he knows law. Sullivan says he should go because he's a retired teacher, and most of the state's money is spent on education.

Here are their stands on key issues:

Education

Stubbs: "I agree with the Idaho Education Association on almost everything."

He particularly favors the teachers union's proposal to give grants to schools that demonstrate improvement in their test scores.

And on an issue the union opposes, merit pay, Stubbs said, "The teachers are the ones you should listen to on merit pay. I don't think it's a silver bullet. (But) someone could convince me."

He favors statewide funding for community colleges to relieve the local property tax burden, but he opposes any net increase.

Sullivan: "I know that in lots of cases you can get a better education in the junior colleges than you can at the four-year universities."

Idaho could support two more two-year community colleges, he said, but the four-year Lewis-Clark State College should be absorbed by the University of Idaho.

He said too many students drop out of universities now because they're ill-prepared for college.

Smaller schools would have fewer dropouts, he said.

"Believe me, it would save the taxpayers one heck of a lot of money."

He favors merit pay for public school teachers, "determined by an independent panel of peers and community people."

"We can identify those super teachers and reward them so they stay in teaching and they stay in Idaho."

He also favors the idea of offering grants to elementary schools that demonstrate greatest improvement in test scores.

Abortion

Sullivan: "I believe the state ought to

stay out of that. Look what happens in China where they say you must have an abortion. Look what happens in Romania where

Andrus wants Twin Falls County in his vote column

TWIN FALLS — After everyone had a bite to eat, Gov. Cecil Andrus got down to business: Soliciting votes.

"What I would like to do is get an even break in Twin Falls County," he told about 20 Twin Falls city officials and residents over bacon and eggs Thursday morning at the Wok 'N Grill restaurant.

The Democratic incumbent, who has been elected governor three times, lost Twin Falls County by 2,350 votes in 1986. He carried the county only once, in 1974.

Andrus faces Republican challenger Roger Fairchild, a Fruitland businessman and former state senator, in his at-

tempt to be elected governor for an unprecedented fourth term on Nov. 6.

"We're not taking anything for granted. We're covering every city in the state no matter how large or how small. You can see our trucks in the dust," he said.

On Thursday, he stirred up the dust in Twin Falls County on a two-day swing through the largely Republican Magic Valley.

With Twin Falls city leaders, his discussion focused on economic development. "Eating as far ahead as fall—1991, signs are that Idaho will remain healthy," he said.

But if tensions in the Middle East keep the cost of crude oil at \$35 to \$40

ORW law sparks debate at Middle Fork hearing

KETCHUM — The Middle Fork of the Salmon River is believed by many to be the most pristine, untouched river in America.

Due to its remote, rugged terrain, the watershed has not felt the impact of civilization like most rivers. Yet the area's abundant timber and mineral resources are becoming more attractive to industry as society's demands grow.

Wednesday night, the Idaho Board of Health and Welfare held the second of six scheduled public hearings to get citizens' input on designating the river and its tributaries as Outstanding Resource Waters, or ORW, before the board makes its recommendations on the matter to the Idaho Legislature, according to Board Chairman David Mead of Twin Falls.

The board is considering which bodies of water in Idaho possess significant ecological or recreational value and thus qualify for strict rules prohibiting degradation of water quality as spelled out by Idaho's ORW law.

Three bodies of water have been officially nominated: the Middle Fork and 27 of its tributaries; French Creek and its tributaries, located in central Idaho; and Priest Lake near the Canadian border.

The issue has been followed closely by mining, grazing and timber interests concerned about curtailment of commercial activity, and by wilderness, whitewater, and environmental groups who are pushing for the ORW designations.

At Wednesday's hearing, supporters of the ORW classification outnumbered opponents 10 to 1.

Steve Lentz, who operates a guide service for some of the 9,000 or more people who enjoy the Middle Fork annually, expressed concern about sediment from mining, forestry and grazing.

"It is the height of arrogance to suggest that someone has the right to pollute," he said. "No one has the right to run their businesses in such a way as to infringe on the rights of others."

"In comparing river floating with other commercial activities, many who spoke cited self-imposed low impact measures such as catch and release fishing, limiting campsites, and using portable toilets."

"Why should ecologically sound practices (necessitated by ORW standards) be opposed by industry?" he asked.

Luke Russell of Meridian Gold Co., one of only two people to speak against ORW classification, questioned whether the law could be interpreted fairly.

"The language is a little nebulous and it would be very difficult for me to be sure my company is in compliance," he said.

Without numerical standards and without knowing the current present water quality, Russell concluded that "this is too large of an area to be nominated for an untested program."

"If we were not able to establish water quality by numbers, should you be allowed to pollute?" he asked. Dr. Fred Marneau asked Russell, "Doesn't how could you know if I did? Russell said, alluding to the lack of specified, measurable standards.

Will Whelan, from the Idaho Conservation League, agreed with the need for quantitative standards. He asked the board to "move quickly to adopt quantitative ways to determine degradation."

"We have the tools to do this," he said. Speaking on her own behalf, Liz Paul, a former Snake River Alliance leader, supported ORW designation and tried to clarify just what ORW legislation would do.

"It will force regulators to carefully consider all the activities impacting the river," she said.

Report says Minidoka County elementary enrollment to decline

RUPERT — The Minidoka County School District will probably see a decrease in elementary enrollment over the next five years, according to a report presented to school officials earlier this week.

School Board members had asked that statistics on enrollment be compiled to help project the future classroom space needs.

Files obtained by the district's fiscal director, said the expected decrease in elementary enrollment can be directly related to Minidoka County's continued decreasing birthrate.

"The numbers of (existing) classrooms should be sufficient for the next few years," said Merrill, who helped compile the report.

But other factors such as economics can play a role in enrollment

and may be harder to gauge as families move in and out of the area, Merrill said.

During the 1985-1986 school year, for instance, 200 students moved out of the district with their families because of an "economic downturn," he said.

Superintendent Gene Snappy said the rate concerns about state legislators changing the allowed class sizes.

"Assistant Superintendent Darwin Anderson said if the current mandated ratio of one certified teacher per 23 students was decreased to 20 students or less, Minidoka County would require an additional 12 to 15 classrooms.

Because of the many variables in enrollment projection, the trustees voted to appoint a committee to study the facts and possibilities and return to the board with recommendations.

Overcrowding in the district has taken its toll this school year — Pressing Elementary's kindergarten classes have been relocated to the armory building on the outskirts of town.

Superintendent Snappy said the kindergarten will finish out the school year in the armory building and the board will consider looking into a mobile classroom unit for Pershing next year after it hears recommendations from the appointed committee.

In other matters, board members discussed the problem of school bus drivers changing the pre-authorized bus routes without board approval.

Board Chairman Harold Short suggested adding "teeth" to the district's existing bus policy and said if a driver changes a route on his own, he should be fired.

Short said if a driver has an idea for an alternate route, the idea should be brought before the transportation director and properly approved. To do otherwise may be "leaving the district open to liability," he added.

On that note, board members approved a change in one bus route in order to shorten its afternoon travel time. Rupert parent Alice Schenk made the request, noting that her daughter arrives home 15 to 20 minutes earlier on the revised route. The driver apparently had already made the change without board authorization and Schenk was requesting the change be made official.

The board voted to begin using a gas card fueling system for the district's Rupert buses on a trial basis as an alternative to using the district's underground tanks to avoid the cost of annual testing of the

tanks for leaks and their eventual replacement.

Ray Eskelsen, Minico High School's senior class counselor, reported that of a possible 36 points available on the ACT test, Minico's 1990 graduates — last year's seniors — averaged a 20.8. The state average is 20.9 and the national 20.6.

Eskelsen said the students who took the extra college preparation courses averaged 23.3 points in contrast to the average 21.4 earned by students who took only the required amount of credits to graduate.

In other business, the board approved a request that all three grades at the high school attend a career and college fair planned for Oct. 21 at the College of Southern Idaho.

Compromise near on wolf reintroduction

WASHINGTON — Lawmakers are hoping to reach a compromise today on the reintroduction of the gray wolf to the Yellowstone National Park and Central Idaho, a move that could lead to greater state input.

A proposal that seemed to be gaining ground Thursday was to establish a "wolf team" that would develop guidelines for reintroducing the wolf. The team could include federal representatives and state fish and wildlife officials from Idaho, Montana and Wyoming, according to congressional staff and environmentalists.

State officials have complained that they would not have enough control over the reintroduced wolves because they are protected as endangered animals under federal law. While the wolves are the only predators missing from the Yellowstone

ecosystem, stockmen are wary of their return because they fear the animals will ravage livestock.

Debate over the gray wolf is expected when House and Senate lawmakers sit down to iron out differences between separate versions of the multi-billion dollar Interior spending bill.

While the House bill includes \$300,000 for a study examining the environmental impact of plans to reintroduce the wolf, Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, inserted language in the Senate bill stating that no funds should be used for environmental study or for recovery of the wolf.

McClure, who is the ranking Republican on the Interior Department appropriations subcommittee, intends to bring up the wolf reintroduction bill, which removing it from the endangered species list, but wanted to allow himself leeway during the conference talks, according to his spokesman.

House members are hoping that in return for giving states more control, Senate legislators will agree to start an environmental impact study before the end of the current fiscal year.

"What we would like to see is an environmental impact study starting in 1991 with recommendations from this team," said a spokesman for Rep. Wayne Owens, a Utah Democrat who has led the effort in the House to reintroduce the wolf.

Debate over the wolf has pitted environmentalists against stockmen for more than a decade but has become even more urgent now that the wolf is migrating down from Canada on its own. Without legislation, the wolves would be protected without concern for their effect on livestock.

Last year, McClure managed to block House efforts to get money for an environmental impact study and

redirected the money towards a broader report on the wolf's impact on other animals within Yellowstone National Park. But this year, both sides say they are looking for a compromise.

"My view is that McClure is not going to walk away with this thing as he has in the past," said Evan Hirsch, legislative director for Defenders of Wildlife. "He's intent on moving this forward, one way or another."

James Ridenour, National Park Service director, and James Turner, director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, praised McClure's plan last month but said the wolf should not be removed from the endangered species list.

They also said an environmental study is needed before the wolves can be set free.

Researchers detect quakes beneath Mount St. Helens

SEATTLE (AP) — Scientists who monitor Mount St. Helens say there has been a gradual increase of small earthquakes at the volcano over the past three years.

In the past, swarms of larger earthquakes have occurred in the days before eruptions of Mount St. Helens. But researchers say they don't know what to make of these tiny tremors.

"It could be this is leading up to an eruption in a year or two, but it could be something different," said Seth Moran, a University of Wash-

ington graduate student conducting the study with research professor of geophysics Steve Malone.

Moran and Malone are trying to read the Earth's signals to determine whether the quakes are caused by new molten rock moving into the volcano's system or a cooling of the rock as the volcano enters a period of dormancy.

"It's kind of difficult to tell you anything definite, I would like to say yes, this means an eruption in the future, or nothing. We can't tell that," Moran said.

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Rural eastern Idaho counties, hoping for the cheapest solution to their solid waste disposal problem, want Bonneville County to save them some space when it chooses a new landfill site.

But they are not yet committing to the idea of a regional landfill. District 7 Health Department officials urged six eastern Idaho counties Wednesday night to work together on development of a single

landfill in Bonneville County as the cheapest way to meet costly Environmental Protection Agency regulations, being developed to be in place by the end of the year.

Bob Henry, an environmental health specialist for the district, said a unified approach could save each county at least \$1 million to \$2 million over 20 years on such expenses as methane gas and groundwater monitoring.

Candidates on the stump get taste of anti-incumbent fever

LEWISTON (AP) — The tarnish on the political image is worsening as Congress stumbles toward a grudging resolution of the federal budget crisis, and that public disdain hit close to home Thursday on the Idaho campaign trail.

"They're singing the same song that has been sung at every election before," Ted Bryant of Grangeville said at a senior citizens' forum after listening to Democratic Senate candidate Ron Twilgar and representatives for his opponent, Republican Congressman Larry Craig, and the two candidates seeking Craig's congressional seat.

"If they can't hack it, throw them out," Bryant declared.

Elsewhere, the possibility increased that the "revival" debate could be called off for the second time between 2nd Congressional District incumbent Democrat Richard Stallings and Republican challenger Sean McBevin.

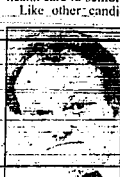
The four-way face-off is set for Saturday at the University of Idaho, with the "revival" debate leaders pushing to adjourn the 101st Congress have indicated there may be votes as late as midnight on Saturday. An earlier debate was also cancelled because of noise on the budget.

Twilgar, the underdog in the race to succeed retiring GOP Sen. James McClure, and the other surrogates triggered the negative reaction from the senior citizens in Lewiston as they agreed that government has to provide some kind of incentive to ensure adequate medical insurance coverage for everyone in America.

"The tough part is coming up with the money to pay for it," Twilgar

added, but "if we can find 50 billion dollars to bail out the savings and loans, we can find the 40 to 50 billion dollars it will take to expand health care to seniors."

Like other candidates for federal offices, he tried to separate himself from the incumbent Congress that has spent the month of October handling a drastic deficit problem most voters believe should have been dealt with months ago.

Twilgar promised to set himself apart and make the kinds of tough decisions other politicians seem to avoid even if it means only one term.

But Leonard Evans seemed unconvinced. "I hear the same promises," he

said. "I get into office, these things will change." Twilgar's spokesman, Evans said, "What are you going to do to make these guys accountable. Nobody is watching the store, and that's why we have so many problems."

The "throw-the-burn-out" mood fostered by the congressional budget fiasco and Oklahoma's passage of stringent term limitations, has become an issue in any number of races.

"The question was put to both candidates in the race to succeed Craig in the 1st Congressional District during their debate. Both Democrat Larry LaRocco and Republican Skip Snyser, who had representatives at the Lewiston forum, agreed on the need for campaign finance reform. In fact, LaRocco-olamed-Snyser-got that concept from him. But the two were at odds on the validity of a limit on terms. "I don't think what we should do is turn the Congress over to the staff," LaRocco said, proposing a limit on special interest political contributions of around \$150,000 for a congressional race like his.

On Oct. 17, Snyser's campaign treasury was still \$7,000 under that cap. LaRocco's was \$17,000 over it.

Idahoan has high bid for confiscated plane

FILLMORE, Utah (AP) — An Idaho man has submitted the high bid for an airplane seized by Millard County sheriff's deputies in a drug case last year.

Bids were opened at the County Commission meeting last week in Fillmore. The 13 bids on the 1966

Cessna 206 single-engine airplane came from Wyoming, Idaho and Utah. Lowest was \$22,137.70. Highest was \$35,000, submitted by Jerry Booth of Meridian. Sheriff Ed Phillips said the plane would retail for \$42,000 and sell wholesale for \$33,000 to \$37,000.

Christian students pray at Sandpoint high school

SANDPOINT (AP) — A U.S. Supreme Court ruling that gave students permission to pray on campus hasn't forced the Sandpoint High School student council to open its arms to a Christian group.

"Some students say they'll start an atheist group if the religious group loses the fight from the school," School district officials said. The law prohibited them from opening the campus to a religious group.

Last year, the Breakfast Club held its morning prayers in a parking lot across the street from the school. School district officials said the law prohibited them from opening the campus to a religious group.

But the Equal Access Act ruling from the Supreme Court in June changed all that. The decision granted the Breakfast Club prayer group the same access to school property as other non-curriculum clubs, said Elaine Eberhart-Maki, deputy attorney general with the Idaho Department of Education.

"We didn't want to create a conflict. We just wanted to be able to pray in the morning without having to freeze," Kevin McArthur, president of the Breakfast Club, said Wednesday.

Friday, school officials gave the group permission to use the gym for the first time. "We could no longer legally keep them out," Assistant Superintendent Leonard Parenteau said. Thirty people showed up for the first session, which included Bible reading and a prayer. More than 20 students have attended daily meetings this week.

"Our intent is to give them every opportunity to meet and keep within the legal restrictions," Principal Bill Miller said.

Idaho lottery has new game

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The Idaho Lottery has unveiled an instant-winner scratch game that includes a new twist: gold and silver coins added to the top cash prizes.

Lottery Director Wally Hedrick said "Idaho Silver & Gold" game tickets went on sale Thursday at 1,294 retailers statewide.

The Coeur d'Alene news conference was at the Sunshine Mining Co. joint in Coeur d'Alene. Sunshine Mining will be the Idaho Lottery's source for the gold and silver coins awarded as prizes.

Hedrick said players can scratch, match and win an ounce of gold plus \$4,000 for the top prize, as well as an ounce of silver and \$400 and other cash prizes.

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Locals like plan to make rain

BOCATELLO (AP) — After watching it increase winter moisture by 15 percent two years ago, Bannock County officials would like to participate in another regional cloud-seeding effort aimed at recharging dry wells and covering dusty hillsides with snow this winter.

Ron Davidson of the Portneuf National Conservation District said last winter brought only 77 percent to 80 percent of normal moisture to the area, leaving some local irrigators without enough water for their crops.

"If the drought continues, we're going to be in serious trouble," Davidson said.

Cloud seeding with silver nitrate has been used by other southeastern Idaho counties and the three northern counties of Utah for a number of years, said Kent Hoffman, coordinator of the Bear River Resource Conservation and Development Area.

Bannock and Power counties have submitted applications to join the organization, which is seeking a funding source to finance this year's cloud-seeding operation.

Participation in the 1988 project cost Bannock County almost \$12,900.

Theatre brings Yukon poetry to life

Little Theatre features Robert Service

TWIN FALLS — Almost 100 years ago, gold was discovered in the far reaches of North America.

Men, bewitched with the desire for fabulous wealth, poured into the frigid Yukon. Their brawling, bawdy ways became the stuff of legend and the basis for dozens of poems by Robert Service.

Many of these works by "the Bard of the Yukon" will be showcased in "Another Evening with Robert Service and Friends ...," a supper theater presentation slated next week at The Turf Club.

The Magic Valley Little Theatre production was compiled and will be directed by Nick Nicholson, a longtime fan of Service's work. Some of the material has been set to music by Stuart Hamblin.

Nicholson, who teaches speech and drama at Twin Falls High School, spent many summers as an outfitter on the Salmon River.

There's darkness fall around the river-side campfires, he'd recite Service verses

such as "The Cremation of Sam McGee" and "The Shooting of Dan McGrew" to his trip companions.

"He waxes from almost lyrical poetry to blood and guts, man against nature and sometimes man against man," says Nicholson, who also has made numerous trips to Alaska, where his son lives. "I've felt the solitude and seen some of the things Service saw," he says.

Service was born in Scotland in 1874 and, early on, proved himself a free spirit, according to Nicholson. Attending a university in England, he challenged a professor about a grade he'd received on an essay.

"He told the professor he wouldn't know a good essay if he saw one hanging off his nose," Nicholson says. "That ended his college career."

After that, Service led the vagabond's life, traveling to Canada, California, Turkey and Mexico, holding a variety of odd jobs.

But neither did he seek gold himself, he felt most at home in the wild, woolly gold rush towns. He went to Whitehorse, what is now the Yukon Territory in man-

Network audience slips lower despite all-out effort

The networks pulled out all the stops this fall.

They gave us movie spinoffs, rock 'n' roll cops and a rap singer. They gave us married couples, bachelor fathers, single mothers and a quartet of brothers. They introduced new faces and trotted out aging stars.

They even gave away millions of dollars to viewers with lucky numbers.

No matter. The numbers for the networks have been anything but lucky. They continue to lose viewers, each of them — NBC, ABC, CBS, even the upstart Fox.

Through the first four weeks of the season, NBC's audience is down by 13 percent over last year, ABC's by 9 percent. Fox has lost 6 percent, and CBS is practically rejecting because it has lost only 2 percent.

The season is off to a slow start, to say the least," says CBS' David Poltrack, the network's research guru.

More than that, the networks introduced more than 30 new shows this fall and failed to compete with the ratings hit — "The Kind of Show that Brings New Viewers to the Set, People Excited and Lands Its Stars on Magazine Covers."

In a sense, the fall's biggest hit has been "The Civil War," which set ratings records for CBS and NBC.

"I don't think any of the new programs on any of the networks have really come out with a bang," says Peg Coury, a media buyer with the Campbell-Mithun-Esty advertising agency in Southfield, Mich.

The "disappointments" include "ABC's 'Cop Rock,' Steven Bochco's musical drama, which is headed for ratings oblivion; CBS' 'Lenny,' which did not become a male version of 'Roseanne'; and NBC's 'Fameli Boys,' which was praised by some critics but rejected by most viewers."

That isn't to say that the season has been an utter flop. Some new shows are off to promising starts. ABC's "American Fun-

niest People" is the top-rated new show; CBS' "The Trials of Rosie O'Neill," "Evening Shade" and "The Flash" and NBC's "Fresh Prince of Bel-Air" all have performed well enough to have network programmers excited about their potential.

Shows like "Evening Shade" and "Rosie O'Neill," which are aimed at sophisticated

audiences, can take years to build.

"It seems to take longer for some shows to develop," says CBS' Poltrack. One exception: CBS' "Murphy, Brown," which is only now, in its third season, coming into its own as a bona fide hit.

CBS also expects a lot from "The Flash," which was moved to 8:30 p.m. 14 Thursdays in an effort to capture the young viewers who have been recruited to the set by "Cosby" and "The Simpsons." In effect, CBS will try to use the NBC and Fox programs as its lead-ins.

While admitting that their overall audiences are smaller, CBS and ABC say — predictably — that they are improving their audience composition by attracting younger

viewers. NBC remains the No. 1 network in terms of households, but ABC is now the most-watched network among men and women aged 18-39.

On Saturdays, for example, ABC isn't doing big ratings with "China Beach" and "Twin Peaks," but the network has replaced the older viewers who watched its mystery

novels with viewers aged 18 to 49.

Some ABC shows have grown into huge hits among teenagers and kids: Among teen-agers, "Doogie Howser, M.D." is the No. 1 show, while the astonishing popularity of the nerdy, loud-mouthed, bespectacled pre-teen Steve Urkel has made "Family

Matters" the top-rated show among kids this season.

For the younger demographics, ABC is now far more attractive than the other networks, says Larry Hyams, an ABC researcher.

NBC, meanwhile, is sagging, even though the network narrowly won three of the first four weeks in the Nielsen-Its Sat-

Publishers of 'Great Books' add modern, female writers

CHICAGO — Henry Fielding's "Tom Jones" and Laurence Sterne's "Tristram Shandy" just aren't as great as they used to be.

At least, not according to the editors of the newly revised "Great Books of the Western World." They've bumped four books — including the two 18th-century English novels — to make room for the works of 60 new authors, company officials said.

When Encyclopaedia Britannica Inc. published the original multi-volume set 38 years ago, it featured 74 authors and 443 works including books, essays and plays. Many of the works are abridged.

In preparing the latest version of the collection, the editors decided to add some more recent writers to the collection, company officials said. But because they had also decided to limit the set to 60 volumes and 130 authors, some works had to go.

In addition to "Tristram Shandy" and "Tom Jones," the works that failed to make the cut were Baron Jean Baptiste Joseph Fourier's "Analytical Theory of Heat" and Apollonius of Perga's "On Conic Sections" also failed to make the final cut. "We had to set an arbitrary cut-off, and it's no

reflection on the four that were dropped," said Robert P. Gwinn, Encyclopaedia Britannica chairman. "They're good books, but they're not as great as the others ones."

The new set will bring 20th century American writers, such as Ernest Hemingway, F. Scott Fitzgerald and Eugene O'Neill into the fold with Plato, Aristotle and Homer.

It also includes four female writers: Jane Austen, Willa Cather, Virginia Woolf and George Eliot, a pseudonym used by Mary Ann Evans. The original set excluded female and 20th century authors.

Author and philosopher Mortimer J. Adler had the idea for the original 54-volume set. Adler has been a member Britannica's board of editors since its 1947 formation.

As the new project's editor in chief, Adler and a team of editors and consultants — ranging from ABC newsmen Hugh Downs to science-fiction writer Isaac Asimov — had final say over what was included in the new 37,000-page, 60-volume set.

The volumes include the writings of historians, philosophers, scientists, theologians and others from ancient Greece and Rome, medieval and

Station dumps cartoons, goes with Saturday morning news

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Move over, Wender, Woman, and make room for the anchorwoman. A Pittsburgh television station has scrapped the familiar Saturday morning lineup of cartoons and children's shows to attract viewers who would rather hear "That's the way it is" than "Th-th-that's all folks!"

WPXI bills "Channel 11 News: Saturday Morning" as a weekend alternative for adults.

Audience response, measured in letters and telephone calls since the four-hour show debuted this summer, has been encouraging, said news director Al Blinke.

"What they've said is they're happy that a local television station has finally decided that somebody besides kids watch TV on Saturday mornings," Blinke said.

The show is attracting about twice the market share cartoons drew a year ago, and ratings have been about even with the competition. Other Pittsburgh stations continue to air the standard Saturday morning shows such as "Muppet Babies," "Pee-wee's Playhouse" and "Bugs Bunny."

Some portions of "Saturday Morning" have fared better than others. Ratings fluctuate almost by the half-hour, the smallest period in which the network tracks its audience.

"It's kind of depressing being beat by Pee-wee," said producer Marty Moran as he looked over a ratings sheet. "But that'll change, that'll change."

One reason for the show's varied ratings is the program, which is not designed to be watched from

beginning to end.

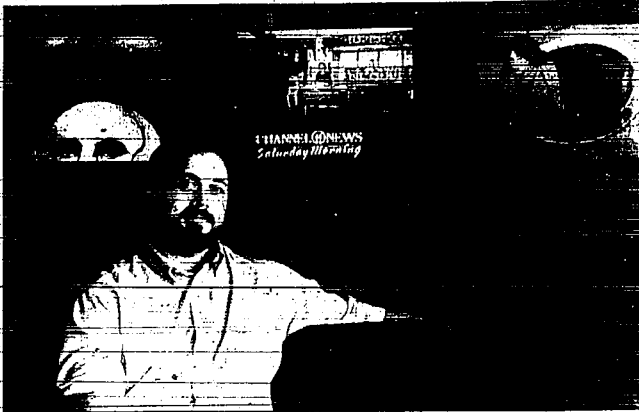
"We don't expect anyone to sit down and watch four hours," said anchor Lon Savitch, sister of the late NBC News reporter Jessica Savitch. "They're getting breakfast ready, getting ready to go somewhere. They have it on to see what the forecast is, to check out the top stories."

On a recent Saturday, as Savitch prepared to deliver a newscast, a group of Smurfs cavorted on a nearby monitor. The screen showed the NBC network feed for that hour, which WPXI pre-empted to air "Saturday Morning."

The show consists of four one-hour segments, anchored by newscasts at the top and bottom of each hour. In between are sports scores, weather forecasts and pre-taped reports by free-lancers and WPXI staffers on finances, health, home repairs and other topics.

The show, which first aired June 1, also has included a variety of "casts": from a regatta, an air show and a college football game.

In addition to gaining four hours of local programming, WPXI also retains the right to sell all the advertising time during the show. Stations that stay with the network schedule are allotted just one spot

per half-hour. The station's decision to jettison NBC's Saturday morning schedule did not go over well with network officials, said WPXI General Manager John Howell.

"They registered their displeasure... but at the same time they find it an interesting experiment that bears watching," he said.

Cox Broadcasting, WPXI's parent company, was excited about the

change, Howell said. Cox executives thought the program was innovative, and gave financial backing.

At least one other station, KCRA in Sacramento, Calif., airs a similar Saturday show. News director Bill Bauman said the program, which runs from 2 a.m. until 1 p.m., has been very successful since first airing in January.

KCRA, another NBC affiliate,

also dumped the network's Saturday lineup to make room for locally produced news.

Howell predicted 50 stations will have comparable broadcasts within two years.

Robert Bianco, television critic for The Pittsburgh Press, called WPXI's show "fairly well done," but questioned its underlying purpose. "I think the broadcast exists to

create an image for the station and as a way to encourage viewers to watch the regular news show, which they're not doing," he said.

The station's efforts — which also include a 24-hour headline service and expanded morning and evening news shows — have not paid off so far, he said.

"They keep adding shows and losing viewers," he said. Howell conceded the show is being used "in a roundabout sense" to draw attention to WPXI's other news programs. The Saturday show is peppered with plugs for the daily newscasts and personalities.

"Our goal in doing things like 'Saturday Morning' is to put our news out there without having to compete with the other guys," Howell said.

"It's part of an effort at digging our way out of being 'No. 3,' Blinke conceded.

Will the new show help? Or is it a big mistake?

Paul Schulman, president of a New York company that buys television time for advertisers, said it's too early to tell.

The show's success is dependent on convincing enough adults to turn on their sets in a traditionally low viewing period and holding off "little people that might be disappointed" by the lack of cartoons, he said.

But the top concern has to be making the show pay, Schulman said. "The big question is, are the bucks out there for it?"

TV and kids

Experts believe that television may be derivative and dull, but isn't really harmful

Ten o'clock on a Saturday morning. Parents all over America are sitting in their kitchens, nursing cups of coffee and starting the weekend in low gear.

Meanwhile, kids all over America are sprawled in front of the TV, watching cartoon turtles who live in their sewer, engage in a weirdly familiar Valley-turtle speak: "Pizza, dudes!" And watching the Pizza Hut commercials that hawk the turtles' rock 'n' roll album.

Is this good?

What do you think? It's certainly the way of our world. The new Saturday morning cartoons that debuted on television last month do little to help the image of network children's programming as goopy filler between the commercials.

Many grownups who sit down to watch a few hours of TV on a Saturday morning would be stunned to think that a kid would willingly sit through this stuff. But kids do, in great numbers. CBS' Saturday morning hit "Change Muttant Ninja Turtle" is watched in more than 6 million households.

The good news is, while media and child-psychology experts concur that most kids' programming is overly commercial, derivative, and dull, they also are coming around to the opinion that it doesn't make much difference.

"We don't believe that television makes your hair fall out," said Peggy Charren, president of the Boston-based Action for Children's Television. In recent years, ACT has been the leading critic of bad children's educational programming, but it now appears to be "preaching" a course of moderation.

"The problem is probably that children watch too much," Charren said. "They tend to sit there all morning, every Saturday morning."

"The shows that I'm hearing about tend to be more of the same, nothing seems to be really different or challenging," agreed Richard Luker, assistant professor of communications at Temple University. "I have heard nothing that's generating any real excitement."

"I'm not as convinced... that Saturday morning TV will necessarily be harmful. It's not as stimulating. And the things that are stimulating, like Bart Simpson, are tremendously overdone. It gets worn out quickly."

The new shows on ABC, CBS, NBC and Fox include four movie spinoffs and four cartoon versions of marginal pop-culture figures (actor Rick Moranis is now a cartoon, for instance). NBC devotes an hour to cartoons based on video games. ABC has a cartoon version of the pop group New Kids on the Block.

Just a few new Saturday-morning shows, designed to appeal to cartoon-snubbing older children and adolescents, are done in live action. In TV's early days, most of chil-

dren's programming was done; that

"Pee-wee's Playhouse," which premiered on CBS five years ago, was hailed as a return to that trend: shows starring actual humans that kids could (for better or worse) identify with. Recent additions to the excellent "Pee-wee's Playhouse" include "Saved by the Bell" and the Monkiesh "Guys Next Door" on NBC, and the "Fox Fun House" on Fox.

Naturally, the factor that deter-

mines what's on network TV is whether a show can make any money for the network. It may be that in television, like government, people get what they deserve.

"We elected to create a television system that was free enterprise, not government controlled," said Joseph Seligman, broadcasting chair at the University of Southern California. "When you have commercial television, what do you expect? Commercial sponsors want to sell their product."

The way to do that is to create programming that appeals to kids, not their parents. Think of "Nickelodeon's Double Dare," in which kids run an obstacle course dotted with giant vats of chocolate pudding and slides covered with slippery goop.

"Nickelodeon gets the kids to watch," said Luker. "They really have done the research, and they found out what kids like. They like green slime."

Sounds repulsive, but green slime

isn't a bad thing, in moderation.

When a child is watching that much TV, it's not the fault of the networks, and it's not the fault of the commercial sponsors.

Gordon Berry, professor of counseling and education at the University of California at Los Angeles, and a consultant to CBS, has placed the blame squarely on parents.

"Frequently I am asked by parents, 'I have a 6-year-old son or daughter and all he or she does is watch television all the time. What should I do?' I don't want to sound too smug, but my reply is always,

"Why don't you turn it off?"

When Charren is approached by unhappy parents who can't bring themselves to shut off the TV, she recommends an alternative.

"We suggest not using Saturday morning programs as they air. Check out the schedule once... and see what you think is really nauseating," she said.

If you have a VCR, you can tape the good shows, and tape programs during the week that you'd rather have your kids watching — educational programs from PBS, or cable

or network after-school specials. "You can train your child to fast forward through the commercials," Charren said. "And there's always books. There's always radio and the movies."

Which really seems like the soundest advice: If you're not happy about your kids watching TV all morning, propose your own alternatives, things you can do together. Whip up some eggs. Hold the other end of the jump rope. Go to the library. Give them a chance to develop on their own imaginations.

Said Charren: "Kicking stones and looking at clouds is important, too."

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


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
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
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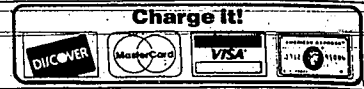


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Interactive video gives new twist to experience of playing jukebox

It's truly the first effort at letting viewers program their own changes, in this case, with music.

Back in the 1960s, when Teresa Brewer was warbling, "Put another nickel in— in the nickelodeon! All I want is loving you and music, music, music," nobody dreamed that the "nickelodeon" eventually would become a TV market, and that you would be able to see the music as well as hear it.

Andrew H. Orgel and Les Garland, who first met as part of the programming team that created MTV, have made it happen with an interactive TV technology called the Jukebox Network.

It allows a viewer to select a music video from an on-screen menu of 150 to 200 selections drawn from a rotating data base of 3,000, and find it on the TV screen in 10 to 20 minutes. The menu is rotated weekly, with unordered videos dropped and new ones added until the most popular list for the community is established.

"It's truly the first effort at letting viewers program their own channels," in this case, with music," Orgel says in a telephone interview from his Miami headquarters. "Unlike CNN or ESPN or MTV, we're not programming for 50 million households at a time."

Each interactive community has its own channel. The real excitement here is the combination of interactivity with the localization of the channel.

The Jukebox Network launched a year ago after three years of market testing. It is coming (25,000 calls in September). It is rated by Paul Kagan Associates' Cable TV Programming service, which keeps track of growth rates

in all television media, as the fastest-growing entity, with an audience increase since April 30, 1989, of 330 percent.

Orgel says that among 116 affiliates nationwide, more than 500,000 videos a month now are being ordered, each at \$2.50, billed to customers by the telephone company.

The only mystery remaining is why the most avid videophile is willing to pay \$2 for a jukebox selection.

Dan Dobrowsky, who is known to Chicago television viewers as "Dan the Weatherman" on WFLD-Ch. 32, had an answer that went beyond mere musical mania.

"You can control what 300,000 people see," he says. "There's a lot of power in making those phone calls."

Dobrowsky owns two low-power stations, one in Madison, Wis., and one in Tampa, and he has taken both of them to 24 hours of the Jukebox Network, which he calls "the wave of the future."

Company officials estimate that the antenna-based service reaches about 800,000 households in the Chicago area.

Jukebox viewers average in age from 18 to 35 and the system maintains a 24-hour hot line so viewers can request videos not on their local lists.

Orgel, who is president and CEO of his new company, launched his enterprise with a \$5 million equity stake from TCI, the nation's largest cable multiple-system owner, and he says he has no intention of confining the technology to music videos in what he calls "the age of personal television." He says he soon will expand to other interactive services that might include video games, viewer-participation sports events and even localized home shopping.

Dog training expert will pay visit

TWIN FALLS—John Rogerson, an internationally recognized dog behaviorist and trainer, will be in Twin Falls this weekend for a two-day seminar sponsored by the Snake River Canyon Kennel Club of Idaho.

The seminar is set from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday and 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Sunday at the Canyon Springs Golf Course Clubhouse. Rogerson, from England, is the author of "Your Dog: Its Development, Behavior and Training," and he specializes in problems of canine aggression.

Seminar organizer Anita Fahrenwald of the kennel club says Rogerson has trained and qualified more breeds of dogs in working trials than any other trainer in England. This is his first trip to the United States.

The aim of this weekend's seminar is to provide a better understanding of the canine mind and ways to

prevent or correct dog behavior problems, Fahrenwald says. The sessions should be especially helpful to dog owners and people who handle dogs on a routine basis, including humane officers, grocers, veterinarians and their assistants.

Topics covered will include the effects of environment on a dog's personality; the dominant dog; canine aggression toward other dogs and humans; predicting the apparently unpredictable; and putting the owner back in control.

Other topics will include multi-dog ownership, introducing a new puppy to a household; re-homing a dog; how to tell which dogs can be successfully re-homed; and selection of new owners. Training theory and methods of reward and correction will also be addressed.

Cost is \$40 for both days or \$20 for one day, and the price includes lunch. Anyone who plans to attend must reserve a spot today by calling

'Fantasia' is richer, sharper than ever

It's been stretched, Cinemascope, polished frame by frame and at one point, even adopted by the dope heads as their signature film. That was 1970 when users looking for added visual thrill watched big-screen showings of "Fantasia" and were further transported by it.

In 1982, it was re-released with a new score conducted by Irwin Kostal and, in all, has been re-released eight times. Not bad for a film that didn't make any profit when it was first released. Fifty years later, it is one of the bigger money makers for Disney Studios.

Time has taken nothing from it. Of course, on this particular occasion, the film has been re-processed. It now has a richer, sharper, more colorful hue, and that's very nice. It always is when Hollywood technicians re-process an old print, but the remarkable thing about "Fantasia" is that we never cease to marvel at it, its bright, vivid texture, its amazing imagery, its remarkable beauty.

"Fantasia" includes eight classical compositions that are illustrated by Disney images including fairies, dancing hipopotamus and even Mickey Mouse, who, in this instance, is Dukas, "The Sorcerer's Apprentice."

Other selections are Bach's Toccata and Fugue in D Minor, "The Nutcracker Suite" by Tchaikovsky, Beethoven's "Pastoral" Symphony, Mussorgsky's "Night on Bald Mountain," Stravinsky's "Rite of Spring," Ronchielli's "Dance of the Hours" and Schubert's "Ave Maria."

They may not be your favorite compositions, but they serve; it is obvious that Disney and his colleagues chose some of the compositions because they would lend themselves so well to illustration.

"Fantasia," which cost \$2,280,000 to produce, a heady sum in 1940, is always worth another look, another, always.

Video is coming in twos this week. There's a pair of Cold War thrillers that are quite good and a pair of mysteries that are less good.

THE HUNT FOR RED-OCTOBER (1990) (Paramount) 135 minutes, 3 stars. Sean Connery, Alec Baldwin, Fred Dalton Thompson, Scott Glenn, John McTiernan took arms against a sea of troubles in bringing down a Cold War bomber to the west coast. He finds himself up with answers, but not necessarily solutions, to the vexing questions posed by a high-tech novel. But he has Connery, as a renegade Soviet submarine commander pursued by his own fleet, and Glenn, as the American captain who joins the hunt, to lend some substance to the film. The other characters prove that not all the clichés are in the code room: "Red October" is as much a celebration of Hollywood's technical prowess as an arresting thriller, but there's no harm in enjoying it on those terms. stars. On the Czech border today, that wily veteran of Cold War movies ("The Manchurian Candidate," "Seven Days in May") John Frankenheimer takes up the story of two officers not ready for peace. Prochnow and Scheider are the antagonists in an incident that escalates into a private war. Frankenheimer has always excelled at the thoughtful action movie, and this essay on two adversaries who are anachronisms is no exception, and is a lot more timely than "The Hunt for Red October."

LOVE AT FIRST SIGHT (1990) (Orion) \$89.98, 97 minutes, 2 stars. Tom Berenger, Elizabeth Perkins, Anne Archer, Kate Capshaw. In Alan Rudolph movies, the kisses are wet, martinis dry, lighting indirect and plots even more so. No one makes films like Rudolph ("Choose Me"); not since 1952 anyway. This one stars Berenger as a private detective who follows the wrong guy and is, in turn, followed by a private eye (Elizabeth Perkins) hired by his jealous girlfriend. Like most Rudolph films, this one boasts enough decor to choke a horse but not enough plot to feed a chicken.

MIAMI BLUES (1990) (Orion) \$89.98, 97 minutes, 2 stars. Alec Baldwin, Jennifer Jason Leigh, Fred Ward. Adapted from what doubtless is an amusing-top novel by Charles Willeford, "Miami Blues" has 30 heavy mood shifts that almost any description of it applies. Though the actors bring an abundance of ruthlessness and humor to their roles, nothing — except Tak Fujimoto's sensational cinematography — distinguishes this cops-and-robbers thriller from any other.

Television game shows moving toward knowledge as key factor

All those recent books admonishing Americans about how much we don't know has been taken to heart. American style: Knowledge is now the hot trend in TV game shows.

Like most hot trends, this is not a new idea. "The G.E. College Bowl" was a viewing staple of college kids and those at home who were sure they were just as smart as any dumb college kid for 11 years beginning in 1959. And "Jeopardy!" has endured for over 25 years with its relatively glitz-free formula of pitting three fact-filled, buzzer-slapping contestants against one another, each eager to bank an answer in the form of a question.

But never before has television been so responsive to the basic human urge to show off the odd facts stashed in the average American's head. Although, come to think of it, the latest TV brain storm may have more to do with the ratings than with the state of our nation's educational system. TV executives don't need to be geniuses to see that "Jeopardy!" has ranked right behind "Wheel of Fortune" in game-show popularity

for years.

So bring on the tough-ish questions. And, says "The Challengers," keep up with the news. The new, heavily promoted "Jeopardy!" knockoff from Buena Vista Television is hosted by nutty professor Dick Clark, and claims timely topicality as its signature innovation: The show's creators suggest that contestants and viewers read newspapers and watch TV, the better to answer questions such as "What is the name of Hurl Reynolds' new CBS sitcom?"

"Challengers" has fewer categories to choose from — three, as opposed to the half-dozen of "Jeopardy!" And there are more computer-generated visual effects, the better to suggest timely topicality (knowing that East and West Germany were recently reunified is a plus).

"The Challengers" tries to mix quiz-show level fact-retention and flashy graphics with a speed-for-you attitude of civic duty. In contrast, "Trump Card," distributed by Warner Bros., taped at Trump Castle and Casino in Atlantic City, and bearing the oversized, exorbitant gold imprimatur of that nutty professor and television producer Donald Trump, tries to

make a little bit of knowledge look like not such an egghead thing by likening it to a bingo game.

Kids have remained the one segment of the American population allowed to appear brainy, while still appearing cute, rather than dweeby. "Quiz-Kids Challenge," a new game show from Guber-Peters Entertainment, brings cuteness up to date by pitting an endearing trio of kids against a desperate trio of grownups gallantly attempting to be equally endearing while competing for answers to such head-scratcherers as "to what part of the face does the word 'ocular' refer?"

Of course, if all this brainpower tucks you out, you can always turn to old spin-the-wheel or dress-up-goofy or fire-with-your-family-in-public game shows like "Wheel of Fortune" or "Let's Make a Deal" or "Family Feud."

Or you can sink back happily into the late 1950s and the resurrection of such all-American game shows as "The Price Is Right," "To Tell the Truth" and "Classic Concentration," where nobody uses words like "ocular" and everybody wins big cars with sweet tail fins.

Holyfield KOs Douglas in 3rd round for championship

LAS VEGAS — James "Buster" Douglas' reign as heavyweight champion, which opened with a shocking upset, closed with shocking suddenness Thursday night.

A crashing right hand to the nose by Evander Holyfield dropped the conqueror of Mike Tyson on his back, where he was counted out at 1:10 of the third round before a roaring crowd of about 16,100 at the Mirage.

"I was hoping he wouldn't get up," Holyfield said. "I hit him with a good punch."

Nevertheless, the glory of Tokyo was somewhat diminished by what some fight veterans called a curtain of disgrace, and boxing has its third undisputed heavyweight champion in eight months.

"He could have gotten up," said Eddie Futch, who trains Riddick Bowe, a second-round knockout winner on the undercard, and who also trained Jose Frazier and Larry Holmes. "He chose not to. Maybe he has his own reasons."

"I came to fight and I fought to the best of my ability. It didn't work out," the 30-year-old Douglas said. "I have no regrets. I'll just try to get over this. Whatever happens, there's no doubt Douglas is on the brink of a boxing sunset."

In his stunning upset over Tyson, Douglas had gotten up from a one-punch knockdown in the eighth round to knock out Tyson in the 10th, and

there was controversy over whether Douglas had benefited from a long count. A long count wouldn't have helped him Thursday night.

He barely moved after crashing down on his back, although he did rub his nose.

The one-punch KO may have surprised many in the crowd, but it didn't surprise the new champion.

"I knew I had the power to knock out anyone," said the 28-year-old Holyfield, who entered the fight as the favorite but was "labeled by critics as a manufactured heavyweight at just 208 pounds."

Has he been knocking out guys before I knocked out him.

I trained very hard with both weight and flexibility training," said Holyfield, who used two strength coaches, a con-

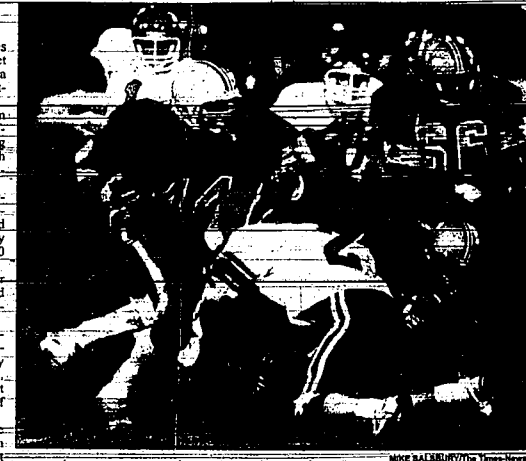
Applying the pressure apparently didn't touch the ball and was charged with roughing the kicker, a violation that carries an automatic first down.

NBA owners to get tough

NEW YORK — NBA owners unanimously voted Thursday to impose harsher penalties this season against players who commit flagrant fouls.

Flagrant fouls are defined as "unnecessary and/or excessive physical contact by a player against an opponent." If officials determine contact was excessive but not excessive enough for ejection, the team against whom the foul was committed would be awarded two free throws and possession of the ball.

A foul determined to be excessively rough as well as potentially injurious would cost the offending player an ejection and suspension.

The league said in the latter case there would be "the possibility of a suspension, and/or a substantially higher fine."

Owners also adopted a method for determining homecourt advantage for the NBA finals.

Iowa State has no breather; readies for Nebraska

You have to wonder what Iowa State did to get the Big Eight Conference schedule-maker so upset.

Perhaps the Cyclones would have earned a break after spending the last two weeks against defending conference champion Colorado and perennial contender Oklahoma.

"Instead of breather, though, Iowa State plunges right into a Saturday date with No. 4 Nebraska, 7-0 and owners of some of the finest statistics in the country."

The Cyclones lead the nation in total

defense and scoring defense, and are No. 2 in rushing offense and scoring. What's more, they're likely to be in an unpleasant mood after seeing two teams — Auburn and Notre Dame — slip past them in the poll. A 31-3 posting of Oklahoma State last week made little impact on the voters, who left Nebraska fourth.

Watching their game films, left Iowa State coach Jim Walden a little shaken.

"They're big and strong and they like killing people," he said.

That would seem to sum it up pretty well. Iowa State lost the first game of this three-week schedule siege, beaten 28-12 by

Colorado. Then the Cyclones stung Oklahoma 33-31 last week, dropping the Sooners one game behind Nebraska and Colorado. It also made Saturday's Oklahoma-Colombus game — the only one this week that matches two ranked teams — that much more vital for the Sooners.

Colorado comes into that conference showdown ranked No. 10 with a 6-1-1 record that includes the controversial fifth-down victory over Missouri. Oklahoma is No. 22.

No. 1 Virginia, No. 11 Tennessee and No. 14 Florida take the week off but the other ranked teams are all in action.

Gretzky poised to add to remarkable career

2,000th point will be 'pretty nice' but 'The Great One' won't compare himself to other greats

WINNIPEG, Manitoba — One more point will have the point that Wayne Gretzky's career has been one for the books.

The next goal or assist will be the 2,000th point of Gretzky's unmatched 12-year career. He's already the league's career scoring leader, so the next point won't in itself be a record. But it will mark a round-number plateau never before within reach in hockey.

"Consider that Gordie Howe, the NHL's career goal-scoring leader, with 801, played 26 seasons in scoring 1,850 points. Gretzky is in his 12th. He passed Howe's point total last season and, if form holds, he'll wipe out the goal record in half as many years as it took Howe to set it.

"It's something to talk about," Gretzky shrugged when asked about 2,000 following Thursday. "I'm not going to think about that. I'm just going to enjoy being here." "I'm something that when I'm done I'll look back and say, 'Yeah, I got 2,000, that's pretty nice.' But it's not going to end at 2,111 keep going from there."

Thursday, Gretzky added, "I'm building an even bigger gap between himself and the game's greats.

Consider: Bobby Hull played 16 seasons, scoring 1,170 points. Jean Beliveau had 1,219 in 20 seasons.

Mike Bossy, Peter Stastny, Jari Kurri and Mark Messier all have comparable years of service but Gretzky has nearly doubled their output. "You can't compare the way Messier plays and the way I play," the former Edmonton Oiler said.

"I'm the first one to stand here and say I'm proud of what I've done, but I'm also the first to say my 2,000th points were different than Gordie Howe's 1,800 points.

He's a different style of game, defensemen and five-man offensive attack of today's game for the inflated points totals. By the same token, he says such rule changes as the one which eliminated the wide-open, four-on-four situation created by offset-

ting minor penalties have made it difficult for him to log a fifth 200-point season.

Howe still holds the career goals record at 801. Gretzky, currently fourth with 684, will likely pass No. 3 Phil Esposito's 717 this season.

Gretzky has seven goals and 13 assists in nine games this year.

"I'm not standing here to say I want to break every record," Gretzky said. "If I accomplish it, great. If I don't, Gordie meant it, lot to this game and maybe he should keep it."

Gretzky, 29, says he'd like to play another six seasons, which would have him nearing 3,000 career points at his current rate of 2.33 a game.

"I feel good and strong," Gretzky said, "and contrary to what some people think, I feel I've got a little bit left in me."

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









Imminent decisions could signal Bush gulf moves

WASHINGTON — President Bush faces key decisions in the coming weeks that could signal whether he anticipates a lengthy standoff with Iraq's Saddam Hussein or wants American forces prepared to attack.

Among the questions facing Bush:

• Whether to add more troops and firepower to the U.S. deployment in the Mideast, now at 226,000 and scheduled to peak at 240,000 in three weeks.

• Whether to withdraw some units that are nonessential to enforcing Saudi Arabia, a decision which could serve to assuage growing public concern about the prospects of war without diminishing the force's defensive capabilities.

• Approving a Pentagon rotation plan now in the final stages. The Pentagon said should be ready for White House review in a week or so.

• Whether to use his authority to extend 90-day Reserve call-ups for another 90 days.

The U.S. deployment reached a symbolic juncture Wednesday with the arrival in Saudi Arabia of the 1st U.S. Defense Brigade from Fort Bliss, Texas. It was the last combat unit scheduled for deployment in the region, Pentagon sources said.

The only remaining troops scheduled to be sent to the area are in support units. They should arrive in the next three weeks, bringing the total deployment to 240,000, said the sources, speaking on the condition of anonymity.

"As of now we're not planning for any additional buildup. We're planning to sustain the force that is present," one of the Pentagon sources said.

But Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, has discussed with the commanders the possibility of "the possibility of changing the force size. He is due back in Saudi Arabia (Thursday), and Bush announced he will be back home

proved, adding to the force, Pentagon sources said the likely additions would be heavy armor units from the United States or Europe or both. Such orders also would necessitate sending several additional support units into the region as well, the sources said.

That would ratchet up the pressure on Saddam and give the president the option of surprise if he decided to go on the offensive," one of the sources said. "If a decision has been made to kick him out, then adding the force first would make it more efficient in terms of loss of life."

But, barring some development in the crisis that would prompt United Nations support for an offensive, Pentagon sources said military analysts think it far more likely that Bush will link the force — but not dramatically, signaling continued resolve to allow economic sanctions against Iraq to take hold.

"We would have to double the force there to make an offensive palatable from a military standpoint," said Lawrence J. Korb, a former assistant defense secretary for manpower in the Reagan administration. "I don't think that is very likely at all."

By bringing some additional units home, Bush could "show that we are prepared to stay there for the long haul" as long

as he articulated the reasons for the moves, Korb said. "Saddam is waiting to see how long we can hold both the support of the American Congress and our U.N. coalition together. I'd set up a rotation plan but basically keep my troop level about where it is."

Powell recommends withdrawing forces, the sources said. The 82nd Airborne Division, the first ground unit to reach Saudi Arabia, likely would be the first unit brought home.

Such a move would not affect the defensive capability of the U.S.-led multinational forces, the sources said. But withdrawing the paratroopers "would signal that we are going to hunker down and wait right along with Saddam," the source said.

The withdrawal of even a few thousand troops from the Mideast could also help Bush, whom Korb said "is obviously not as popular as he was when he started this."

Said one of the Pentagon sources: "We'd look good bringing some people home for Christmas, even if in the big scheme of things it didn't amount to much."

At the same time, "we have to be very careful about what kind of signal we send because perception is as important as reality here. The world is watching the way things to get confused in translation," said Pentagon official said. "Whether the deci-

sion is status quo, reduce or add, the White House is going to have to explain that and ensure that the diplomatic signals that are connected with the decisions are properly read by Saddam Hussein."

The Pentagon sources said draft rotation plans call for six-month rotations for most units, which would mean the first large-scale substitutions beginning in February. Some units that are harder to replace "may have to spend more time in country than we or they would like," one of the sources said.

The sequence of the rotations is still under discussion, this source said. "We know the soldiers and families are waiting with bated breath but there are some very complicated questions to be resolved."

When heavy armor units are rotated, the Pentagon would have to decide whether to leave tanks and other equipment in Saudi Arabia or bring them home with the troops. "Current thinking is to bring the equipment home, a huge logistical headache, because otherwise the troops would be unable to train at their bases for possible return to Saudi Arabia."

Overall cutbacks in the military further complicate rotation planning. For example, the Army alone has to plan for 17 million moves in the next 12 months in a force numbering just over 700,000.

Gregory Harrison's first TV sitcom is all about today's family matters

Most critics' initial reaction to "The Family Man" (airing Saturdays on CBS) was to write it off. But when they looked a little closer, few felt comfortable doing so.

That's because "The Family Man" comes from the producing team of Thomas L. Miller and Robert L. Boyett ("Perfect Strangers," "Full House," "Family Matters," "The Hogan Family"), and they are becoming legendary for producing series that start slow but eventually emerge as hits.

"The Family Man" stars Gregory Harrison (who played Gonzo on "Trapper John, M.D.") as Jack Taylor, a recently widowed fireman with four children, ages 5 to 16 (played by John Buchanan, Scott Weinger, Matthew Brooks and Ashleigh Blair Sterling). Al Molinaro plays Jack's father-in-law, Joe Alberghetti, who has moved in to help out.

Like most people in Hollywood, Harrison is a bit in awe of Miller and Boyett's success rate. But he thinks he may have an explanation for it.

"The kind of show they want to be involved in is the kind of show that feels good," Harrison says. "It may not get the critics, it may not make a big splash, but it feels good and you can count on it. I think that's why their shows tend to become hits in the second or third season. You give them that long a chance, and the audience eventually goes, ' Gee, I've never been disappointed with this show.'"

Harrison considers "The Family Man" a work in progress. "At this point, it's not necessarily a show that reflects my taste as much as I'd like," he says.

"And I'm sure if you asked the producers, the writers or the other actors, they'd say the same thing. We're all sort of looking for a common vision right now. And with each new episode, I think we get closer to it."

The series is Harrison's first sitcom, and one of the things that attracted him to it are the shorter hours. "I have my own family now," he says, "so I was hoping this would enable me to see my kids in the morning before I went off to work and see them in the evening before they went off to bed. Feel like a real family man and not just an actor in a series who has no other life."

Harrison and his wife, actress Randi Oakes, have two daughters and are expecting a third child.

"My oldest daughter is about a year younger than my youngest child on the series," Harrison says. "My scenes with the young girl feel

very true to me, because I lived those with my own kids. The scenes with the boys I'm sort of just pretending I know what I'm doing."

Somchow, though, when we think of Gregory Harrison, "family man" isn't the first description that jumps into our head. After all, this is the guy who played a male stripper in "For Ladies Only" (1981) and just last season played the slimy but extremely virile Michael Sharpe on "Falcon Crest." We couldn't help wondering how playing a father is affecting Harrison's ability to market himself as a sex symbol.

Harrison laughs. "Gosh, I have no idea," he says. "One, I don't market myself as a sex symbol anymore. And two, it's just a thought that never occurred to me. I'm so busy being a father and playing a father that sex is pretty much out of the question."

A: I'd say both, but Carrie is both wise and funny and she says, "I figure I can age and also gain weight as an author but definitely not as an actress."

Q: What do Roseanne Barr's Hollywood peers think of her and some of her more outrageous acts like that tasteless rendering of the national anthem some time back? Entertainers do seem more tolerant than the rest of us. — C.D.

A: Not in Roseanne's case. She has never been one of the film community's better-liked personalities. She is felt to be a necessary evil whose popularity with the viewing public has given her tremendous clout, which many feel she has abused.

Q: Will there ever be a "Peter Pan" movie starring Michael Jackson? I remember he talked a lot about playing the role. — J.J.

A: There was talk for a number of years that Jackson would re-create the Mary Martin stage role, but it was all talk and no action. Now a new version of "Peter Pan" is in the works with Robin Williams playing the great grandson of the little boy who wouldn't grow up and Dustin Hoffman as the menacing Captain Hook.

Q: Is it true that Gene Hackman is planning to retire from acting following his recent heart attack?
—G.V.

A: First let me clarify that Hackman didn't suffer a heart attack as was initially reported. The Oscar-winning actor did undergo a balloon angioplasty to open a blocked artery. Hackman is planning to take six months off from acting and will devote the time to painting, a long-time interest going back to his early days when he studied art and illustration.

Q: I really enjoyed Jay Leno's book about wacky newspaper headlines. Will he write another one?
—R.C.

A: You're in luck. Leno's second book will be available by month's end. (His first, "Headlines," sold more than 250,000 copies.) Royalties from "More Headlines" will benefit the pediatric AIDS program. The young son of Leno's personal manager died from AIDS contracted from a blood transfusion in infancy.

Q: Considering the ongoing fascination with James Dean in the 35

years following his death, why has there never been a motion picture about the legendary actor?
—M.W.

A: Many filmmakers have flirted with the idea of bringing Dean's story to the big screen. However, until Los Angeles producer-director Alan Hauge obtained the rights to Dean's story from the Dean family and the James Dean Trust, no authorized film biography had been possible. Hauge is presently meeting with potential investors in hopes of raising production money so he can begin filming in the spring.

Q: Even though he won a celebrated lawsuit filed against him by a Las Vegas hotel that accused him of being a deadbeat, isn't Rodney Dangerfield's career just about over?
—C.W.

A: Not likely. Dangerfield was recently awarded \$735,000 by a federal court jury in his lawsuit against the hotel. He is obviously relieved and happy at the judgment since a number of declarations were made that put Rodney's character in serious question. "When I think what I've gone through in the last 2 1/2 years," he tells me, "I'm glad that (the hotel) got stabbed." In any event, Dangerfield has at least a half-year to go on his contract to perform for another Las Vegas hotel. And, he confides, he's preparing for his next movie role—in what Rodney describes as a "true-fairy tale."

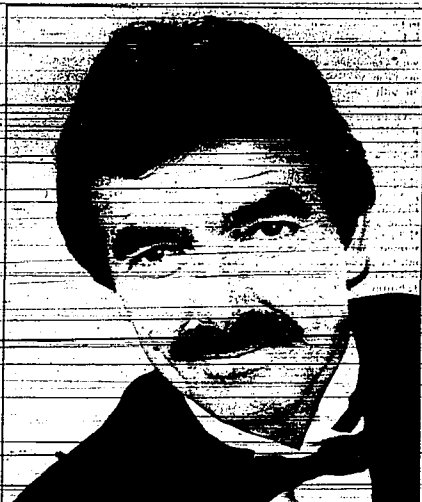

Fresh from his nighttime soap role in "Jackie Collins' Lucky/Chances," where he portrayed a Greek playboy married to a woman half his age, Eric Braeden merely smiles over the surprise Newman-Abbott coupling. "That's why we're number one," Eric says. "Bill Bell knows how to tell a story and keep you hooked. Even I was fooled."

Eric Braeden is the number one man in daytime drama. After nine years on the job that takes some doing. But it's clear to the analytical Eric how that came about. CBS, Reds both make clean sweeps but glory is fleeting for the network

LOS ANGELES (AP) — In terms of ratings, CBS swept the World Series just like the Cincinnati Reds did. But when it came to rewards, the network ended up in the dustbin with the Oakland A's.

The four-game World Series captured four spots in television's top 10 list, including first place. But the failure of Oakland to prolong the series to five, six or seven games cost CBS millions in lost advertising revenues.

The latest figures, released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co., showed CBS captured first, second, fifth and sixth place in television's top-10 with its broadcasts of the series.

The short showdown between Cincinnati and Oakland also made CBS the No. 1 network for the second time in the 5-week-old fall season. CBS led with a 15.9 average rating. NBC was second with 13.9 and ABC was last with 12.6.

NBC continued to fare well by putting some female-oriented programming against baseball coverage.

"Danielle Steel's 'Fine Things'" missed tying with Tuesday's opening game of the World Series by a

Cosby yanks mural from his TV show

NEW YORK (AP)—A mural inspired by the artwork of homeless children will no longer be shown during the opening credits of "The Cosby Show" because the children's teacher "was trying to hold us up," Bill Cosby.

The dispute involves a colorful mural painted by children at the Creative Arts Workshop for Homeless Children. The mural, which shows children playing and

laughing, is painted on the side of a Harlem building. The workshop's director, Brookie Maxwell, was quoted by the Daily News as saying the children who painted the original mural should get credit on the television show and be paid if the idea was marketed.

NBC spokeswoman Rosemary O'Brien said that Carsey-Werner Co., producer of the show, decided to stop using the mural after three

weeks of negotiations, including a financial offer to the workshop, failed. "I've ordered it taken off the show, it has nothing to do with the kids. Has to do with this woman, who is trying to hold us up," Cosby said last week on New York television station WNBC. Vivian Pollack, a volunteer lawyer for the workshop, said the negotiations concerned protection against possible copyright infringement.

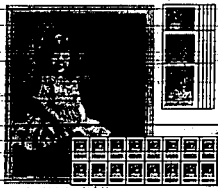

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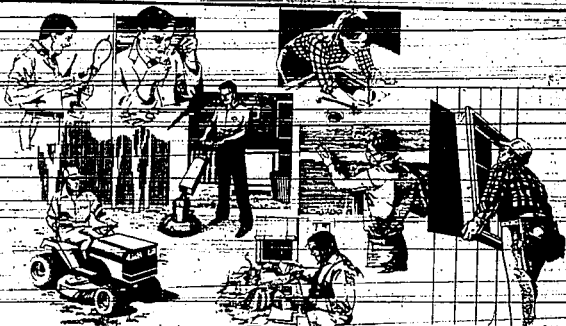

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

Host heads to Saudi Arabia

NEW YORK (AP) — "Good Morning America" co-host Charles Gibson is going to Saudi Arabia for live Thanksgiving week broadcasts from U.S. military bases there and a Navy ship in the Persian Gulf, ABC has announced.

The five-day trip starts Nov. 19. Bryant Gumbel co-anchored NBC's "Today" show there for a week of broadcasts beginning Aug. 17.

ABC's expedition is more ambitious, partly because its show will be free to travel to U.S. military bases due to a loosening of

restrictions that were in force when Gumbel went there in the early days of the U.S. buildup.

Gibson, accompanied by a 16-member crew to include reporter Steve Fox, will broadcast from two Army camps, an Air Force base, and a Marine encampment, in addition to the as-yet unidentified Navy ship. No specific locations can be announced yet because of security regulations, ABC said.

Co-host of the show, Joan Lunden, will remain in New York, doing other segments of each day's show.
