Jerome County 'up in air' over disposing of 6 barrels

JEROME — Cleanup of contaminated soil at the Jerome County Weed Control District is complete, but the county's troubles aren't over.

Six barrels left over from past activities, though not part of the cleanup, contain residue of activated carbon bisulfide — used as a soil fumigant — a highly volatile chemical and possibly explosive, according to the 1987 farm

Chemical Handbook.

"We've been trying not to let the public know they're out there," County Commissioner Chair-

man Carl Montgomery said.

The county has been trying to keep a low profile on the barrels for fear that someone would create problems with them, he said.

"We don't want people out there lighting a cigarette or something," County Prosecuting At-

torney John Horgan said.

The county has contacted a demolition expert

who recommended blowing them up, Mont-

gomery said. But he is not sure that is the best

way to get rid of them.

"Things are really up in the air about them,"

Montgomery said.

The county doesn't know how long the barrels have been there. But they are closed and it

Dump wins OK

WASHINGTON — The Environmental Protection Agency gave clearance Thursday for the limited disposal of radioactive wastes from government weapons plants to the New Mexico plant next January. The wastes in question are not only radioactive but are also chemically hazardous.

The EPA, which must approve the disposal of hazardous wastes, whether radioactive or not, said the permit for the test program was being given under the conditions that the waste be limited to 6,500 drums and that they be retrievable.

Wendell man faces murder charge in shooting

GOODING — A 19-year-old Wendell man was charged with second-degree murder and the use of a firearm to commit a felony Thursday in connection with the Hallowell shooting of 40-year-old William Davis.

Will Beaver appeared in 8th District Court before Judge Thomas Cushman, where he was charged with shooting Davis in the face and chest with a 12-

gauge shotgun. Davis died at the scene.

The shooting occurred Wednesday night at 168 Ave. C East in a home owned by Beaver's mother and grandmother.

Beaver called police after the shooting at about 8:42 p.m., and surrendered without incident, said Gooding County Prosecutor Lynn Nelson. More than one shot was fired, but Nelson said he didn't know how many.

Beaver faces a prison sentence of 10 years

to life. The firearm charge could add 15 years to the prison term.

A preliminary hearing has been scheduled for 9:30 a.m. Nov. 9 at the Gooding County Courthouse. The court will determine then if the state has enough evidence to take the case to trial.

Beaver is being held in the Gooding County Jail in lieu of \$100,000 bond.

Public defender Steven Stevenson was appointed to represent Beaver and can request a bond reduction hearing at any time.

The bond amount is typical of murder cases and reflects the fact that Beaver has few connections with the area, Nelson said.

According to neighbors and employees at Simmerly's Market, where Beaver's mother worked, the family recently moved here from California.

Beaver, about 5 feet 11 inches tall with wavy, shoulder-length, dark-brown hair and a full set of mustache, showed no emotion when he was led unchained

into the courtroom.

Idaho Democrats file FEC complaint about McDevitt campaign financing

Chairman Conley Ward, Democrats called for penalties against McDevitt for his election law violations and an agreement that they would not happen again.

The complaint alleged:

— That on Oct. 10, Thomas and Bruna McDevitt, the candidate's parents, loaned \$30,000 to the campaign. Ward said under federal laws, a loan is considered a contribution limit repair and thus the loan must be considered a contribution. The loan is far over the contribution limit of \$1,000 for each individual.

— That a family corporation, Little Red Hen Inc. of Pocatello, had provided office space, a pickup truck and other help for the campaign without being listed under

McDevitt's contributions. The complaint said McDevitt's father is president of the corporation and Sean McDevitt is vice president.

The complaint alleges the help provided to the McDevitt campaign either is a corporate donation, forbidden by federal law, or is in excess of the allowable amounts.

Sean McDevitt has apparently avoided paying for any of these necessities of running a campaign by appropriating the facilities of Little Red Hen Inc. As evidenced

85 may be tops for life expectancy

WASHINGTON — Humans may soon expect an average lifetime of 85 years, probably not much longer, even if medical science defeats all of the major killer diseases, researchers say.

An average life expectancy of four years and five may be the upper limit because the human body is becoming increasingly fragile from a cascade of aging effects, University of Chicago researcher S. Jay Olshansky said Thursday.

And science, he said, has yet to find a way to overcome this apparent decline in nature.

"Even if we found a cure for most fatal diseases, such as heart disease and cancer, the natural degeneration of the body puts a cap of about 85 years on the average age-of-death," Olshansky and two co-authors report in the current issue of the journal Science.

Other experts on human aging, however, strongly disagree.

"If we keep making progress as we have made in the past, then a baby born today can expect to live 100 years," said James Vaupel of the University of Minnesota. "There may well be some biological barriers, but research and the sciences are poised to make some really significant breakthroughs."

Bush was asked about his wife's comments that he would be willing to meet with Saddam to resolve the crisis. He didn't exactly embrace the idea but said his position, no negotiation, just leave Kuwait.





Weather summary

Partial clearing from the panhandle down into southwest Idaho Thursday provided a few brief sun breaks, but there were also a few lingering snow flurries in the central mountains, over the southeast highlands and the mountains toward the higher Montana border.

Although the storm system that moved into the Gem State Wednesday has passed to the east/southeast, the colder air mass left behind was evident in some of the afternoon highs reported Thursday.

Rainfall amounts over Idaho were generally light, ranging from traces at many points up to .18 inch at Malad, 21st at Mallard and .30 at Stanley.

Warm winds bring record temperatures to plains

High pressure Thursday over the mid-Atlantic states produced warm winds from Texas to the plains and the Mississippi Valley in the Great Lakes region.

Afternoon temperatures in the Midwest and East were in the 60s and 70s.

A low pressure system that could grow into a winter storm developed in the Southwest and the West's central mountain ranges.

A cold front moved southeast across Utah. About six inches of snow was expected in the state's northern and southern mountains by Friday. Alta, Utah, reported two inches of snow by Thursday morning.

Lighter snow fell across parts of western and southern

Wyoming, with 1 to 3 inches reported at Yellowtail Park. Windy conditions were reported in the Arizona and Southern California deserts and scattered showers fell across sections of Arizona.

Record high temperatures reported Thursday include 75 degrees in Aberdeen, S.D., and Alpena, Mich.; 85 in Dodge City, Kan.; 83 in Concordia, Kan.; and 79 in Kansas City, Mo.

Heavier rainfall during the six hours ending at 1 p.m. EST included nearly a quarter inch at Glasgow, Mont., and more than a tenth of an inch at Malad, Idaho.

The nation's low Thursday was 20 degrees in Samar.

Temperatures around the nation at 3 p.m. EST ranged from 32 degrees in Ely, Nev., to 89 degrees at Gage, Okla.

WASHINGTON — Former Housing Secretary Samuel Pierce misled Congress about his involvement in abuses at HUD, including steering money to political friends, congressional investigators concluded Thursday.

The report by a House committee left unanswered whether Pierce broke any federal laws or committed perjury in his testimony under oath last year, saying a special prosecutor would pursue those questions.

But it said there was evidence that Pierce and other HUD officials concealed the full nature and extent of abuses at the Department of Housing and Urban Development, where Pierce was secretary through the eight years of the Reagan administration.

Haitians fight on flee from island

MIAMI — Haitian refugees jammed into an overloaded sailboat rescued that 10 passengers were thrown overboard before a patrol found the survivors, Thursday, a U.S. Coast Guard spokesman said.

"The Haitians were fighting each other when the cutter Northland pulled alongside about 10 miles just 20 miles north of Haiti," said Lt. Cmdr. Jeff Kanaris. "They were fighting amongst us, but fighting themselves," said Kanaris, who added it was not immediately known who started the fighting or the attacked the sailors.

Cholesterol research holds promise

WASHINGTON — A disorder that causes high cholesterol levels and early heart attacks was corrected in rabbits using a gene transfer technique that researchers believe may eventually cure the rare genetic flaw in humans.

In a study published Thursday in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, researchers reported they were able to transfer into rabbit liver cells a gene that temporarily corrected an inherited defect called familial hypercholesterolemia.

Consumer debt could worsen recession

WASHINGTON — American consumers' debt binge during the 1980s increases the likelihood the next recession will be long and deep, a federal policy research group said Thursday.

"If we do experience a recession, its impact will be much more severe than if consumer debt were at a lower level," said University of California-Riverside economics professor Robert Pollin.

McDonald's to stop using plastic foam

CHICAGO (AP) — The plastic foam boxes that enclose millions of Big Macs and other sandwiches boxes are environmentalists called "a huge symbol of the throwaway society" are being eliminated, McDonald's said Thursday.

Under pressure from environmental groups which say the clamshell boxes add to the nation's overflowing garbage crisis, McDonald Corp. President Edward Renzi said the company had decided "to do what's right."

"Although some scientific studies indicate that foam packaging is environmentally sound, our customers just don't feel good about it," Renzi said in a telephone interview from the company's suburban Oak Brook headquarters. "So we're changing."

Renzi said McDonald's will begin eliminating the sandwich containers — which account for nearly 75 percent of its total foam use — in the United States within 60 days. He said no timetable had been set for phasing it out at its restaurants abroad.

First to go will be the plastic-foam sandwich boxes, which will be replaced by paper products manufactured in a new process that will preserve the food's temperature and freshness, Renzi said. He did not elaborate.

The company is still trying to determine suitable replacements for plastic cutlery and the plastic cups in which coffee is served, he said.

McDonald's will begin eliminating the sandwich containers — which account for nearly 75 percent of its total foam use — in the United States within 60 days. He said no timetable had been set for phasing it out at its restaurants abroad.

First to go will be the plastic-foam sandwich boxes, which will be replaced by paper products manufactured in a new process that will pro-

cess. Renzi said the move would mean a significant reduction in the volume of packaging used by McDonald's.

A number of U.S. towns and cities have banned the use of polystyrene, saying it not only contributes to the growing shortage of landfill space, but also is made with chemicals that harm the atmosphere's protective ozone layer.

Audit: Agency bungled care of forest lands

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal mismanagement of some of the world's most productive timber lands has cost the government at least \$90 million since 1986, an Interior Department audit disclosed Thursday.

In addition, the BLM has failed to acquire easements to 192,000 acres with 800 million board feet of mature timber valued at \$302 million.

Losses could total as much as \$1.7 billion over the forests' 60-to-80-year life cycles, the report said.

The report said the BLM lost \$91 million by failing to perform thinning, fertilization and other maintenance that resulted in few trees that could be cut. The BLM estimated it lost 94 million board feet of timber growth in the

fiscal years 1986-89 due to inadequate management. A board foot is one foot by one foot by one inch.

Mishandling of Bureau of Land Management forests in western Oregon is the result of financial shortages prompted by budget cutbacks, the department's Office of Inspector General said.

Injured on flight

SEATTLE (AP) — Seven passengers on a United Airlines flight from Hong Kong were injured Thursday when turbulence rocked the Boeing 747, a union spokeswoman said.

The plane landed safely in Seattle shortly after noon. Paramedics met the plane, and several passengers were transported to hospitals.

The injuries were minor, United spokeswoman Sarah Domacker said.

AYODHYA, India — Religious riots sparked by Hindu fundamentalists' attempt to seize a Muslim mosque intensified Thursday, and the death toll in nine days of clashes rose to more than 200.

News agencies and officials reported at least 31 people died across the country on Thursday. They were killed in battles between Hindus and Moslems or when police fired on mobs or when victims died in hospitals of injuries suffered in earlier riots.

Currency decree flusters Moscow shops

MOSCOW — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's decree creating a new commercial exchange rate for the ruble created confusion and chaos Thursday in Moscow's hard-currency shops.

"Closed for inventory," read a sign at the Swiss-Soviet joint venture shop Sadko.

Gorbachev introduced the new rate, which took effect Thursday, with the publication on Oct. 26 of a presidential decree setting the value of the currency at 1.8 rubles to the dollar in commercial transactions, nearly 70 percent lower than the official rate.

Romanians take to streets over prices

BUCHAREST, Romania — Thousands of Romanians took to the streets Thursday to protest price increases that doubled or tripled prices on a wide range of goods.

About 2,000 demonstrators occupied the main downtown square in Bucharest and about 10,000 people demonstrated in the central city of Brasov, demanding that a partial deregulation of prices be rescinded.

The Commerce Ministry and the new price policy, which officially took effect Thursday morning, would double prices for clothes, public transport and furniture, among other items. The prices of footwear and leather goods were to triple, and the cost of some foodstuffs was to increase as well.

FBI head says bomb probe far from over

GLASGOW, Scotland — The director of the FBI indicated Thursday that the investigation into the bombing of Pan Am Flight 103 continues for now.

FBI Director William Sessions refused to comment on recent reports that the bombers may have penetrated a U.S. undercover operation, but said he was confident that the bombers would be brought before a court.

Iraq promises to free 4 American hostages

The Associated Press

Iraq on Thursday promised to release four more American hostages soon and insisted it was treating foreign captives well.

President Bush denounced the hostage-holding and vowed to drive Saddam Hussein from Kuwait.

"They have committed outrageous acts of terrorism," declared President Saddam's "Times." "Probably, I don't believe that Adolf Hitler ever participated in anything of that nature."

Aboard the USS *Invincible*, sailors and Marines paid sorrowful tribute to 10 comrades killed in a boiler-room accident. The deaths Tuesday were the biggest Navy casualties to date in Operation Desert Shield, the military deployment launched after Iraq overran Kuwait three months ago.

Despite Iraq's assurances about the captives' welfare, letters smuggled from two American hostages and released by a U.S. official in Baghdad painted a picture of fear and desperation. In one, the author urged Americans not to forget their captive countrymen.

"I have been in the Iraqi justice system for almost two months. We are virtually prisoners in Iraq," wrote one of the unidentified Americans. The other wrote that he had been moved five times and was receiving no mail or messages. He said he had lost 35 pounds.

"Please do not forget the guest hostages," the first letter-writer pleaded. Iraq calls the detained foreigners guests.

Bush, on a campaign swing in Burlington, Mass., made it clear that the plight of the hostages was much on his mind. He said the world community was "united in anger and

sorrow" at the treatment of the captives.

Thousands of foreigners were trapped in Iraq and Kuwait by the invasion, and since then, Iraq has selectively freed hundreds of them. The latest mass release was that of hundreds of French nationals this week.

Western governments have demanded that they say is Saddam's intent for the hostages to try to split the alliance opposing him.

The issue is whether proving divisive Britain's Foreign Office on Thursday claimed Germany, over former West German Chancellor

Willy Brandt's plan to visit Baghdad to press for foreign hostages' freedom.

Brandt is going as a private citizen, but with the German government's support.

The Bush administration responded angrily Thursday to an offer by Iraq a day earlier to allow holiday visits by relatives of hostages. State Department spokeswoman Margaret Tutwiler called it "shameless, cruel and insensitive."

Saddam, she said, "should not be discussing visits. He should be discussing the immediate release today of all those held against their will."

Bush, in his speech in Burlington, said he still hoped for a peaceful resolution, but insisted "there will be no compromise" in the demand that Iraq relinquish Kuwait.

The comments likening Saddam to Hitler were made at a subsequent stop. Presidential spokesman Martin Fitzwater said by using such strong rhetoric, the president was trying to prepare the American people for any eventualities.

"If we do have to take dramatic action, we want them to know why," Fitzwater said without elaborating.

In a memorial ceremony aboard the amphibious assault ship USS *Two Jims*, more than 1,000 American servicemen stood at attention on deck, honoring the victims of Tuesdays accident. Sixty-one sailors were killed instantly when the scorching steam burst out of a ruptured pipe in the boiler room. Four others died of severe burns later.

Reporters and photographers were not permitted to attend the memorial service, but the Navy released a videotape of the event. Servicemen sang the Navy hymn, a 21-gun salute was fired, and bugles played taps.

Naval quarantine reduces ship traffic reaching Aqaba by 80%

ABOARD THE USS BIDDLE

(AP) — On an average of three times a day, a hand-picked team of armed U.S. sailors boards merchant ships in the Red Sea that might be trying to break naval embargo to get supplies to Iraq.

"We're the Red Sea Highway Patrol," said gunner's mate William "Bo" Kitchens, 27, of Lakeland, Fla., a member of boarding team Alpha aboard the guided-missile cruiser USS Biddle.

"We should put a red-and-blue light atop the ship with a siren. It's more police work than anything else. We're stopping contraband from reaching its goal," Kitchens said after an interdiction this week.

The United Nations authorized the naval quarantine to punish Iraq for its Aug. 2 conquest of Kuwait. Nothing but medical supplies are allowed in, and no ships, including Iranian cargo ships, are allowed to enter the Jordanian port of Aqaba.

The port is a potential opening in the international effort because land routes from there lead across Jordan into Iraq.

What was one of the world's busiest shipping lanes just three months ago now has more warships than

merchant vessels.

The shipping volume has been substantially throttled down. There's been an 80 percent reduction in the volume of shipping," said Rear Adm. Nick Gee, commander of Red Sea operations by the Maritime Interdiction Force.

One of the warships plying the Suez Canal in the blue waters is the Biddle, part of the task force accompanying the aircraft carrier USS Saratoga. "It's a total retooling," said a

very effective blockade," said Capt. Louis Harlow, the Biddle's skipper. "Nobody can leak through. Anything that moves, we've got the thing to be hurling."

A ring of warships is on patrol around the Arabian peninsula, which is bounded by the Red Sea, Arabi-

the Red Sea.

Navy officials said 23 cargo ships have been diverted to other ports, including 10 ships bound for Aqaba or other ports because something was suspicious.

For example, the Biddle refused passage to one ship carrying potassium nitrate, an ingredient for gunpowder.

Others have been turned away because their manifests did not jibe with their cargo.

"A lot of these ships are at anchor in port. They're not even making the attempt," said Cmdr. Mark Merchant, public affairs officer for Navy Central Command.

He said that in the gulf itself, traffic to and from Iraq is virtually at a standstill.

In a typical operation, a U.S. warship or other units of the multinational armada enforcing the same rules will nail a merchant ship and search it without delay.

Anything bound for Aqaba is immediately under suspicion.

Other things that draw attention are ship's names that are painted on cargo ships that are sailing courses that differ from their announced destination.

Earlier this week, the Biddle stopped the Greek container ship Zim Venetia, which was headed for Eilat, Israel, right next door to Aqaba.

"With drug interdictions, you never know where you're going to run across. There are more unknowns," Clark said. "Out here, we're on guard but we're not overly aggressive. We're firm but polite."

The Red Sea has its share of surprises. One time, a Soviet ship was told to divert, and its captain radioed back, "I have your boarding party hostage."

When the boarding team gave him a started glances, the captain quickly replied: "That's a joke. Just kidding."

The Navy has nicknamed the Red Sea operation Tolo Station, after the line in "The Wizard of Oz" when Judy Garland tells her dog "Toto, I don't think we're in Kansas anymore."

Tolo's last job was working interdictions against drug smugglers in the Yellow Brick Road. Warships refer to sectors with codenames like Emerald City, Wizard of Oz, Wicked Witch and Tin Man.

HJR 14 should be defeated until further study is done

Next Tuesday, Idaho voters will be asked to approve a constitutional amendment most of them know very little about, the so-called "payment-in-lieu-of-taxes proposal," or HJR 14.

The amendment would allow the Idaho Department of Fish and Game to pay an amount equal to property taxes to local governments for unimproved property the department owns or leases.

Fish and Game likes the idea because it would make it easier for the department to buy land for wildlife habitat. Under the current law, individual property owners are sometimes required to杖improve property to Fish and Game because the sale would take the land off the tax rolls.

Counties and school districts like the idea because it would stop erosion of their tax bases whenever Fish & Game buys land for habitat.

The PILT idea has some merit. But not in the HJR 14 format and not without a lot more public discussion.

Idaho's voters will be asked to amend the state's basic document to accomplish what a statute would do. Even though in-lieu taxes would be paid only by Fish and Game, if PILT becomes a reality it will set the constitutional standard for every subsequent transaction between state

agencies and county government.

If there is going to be a constitutionally mandated fee-in-lieu-of-tax system anywhere in state government, it should be done uniformly—not by just one agency.

PILT is a big step—fundamentally changing the philosophy that Fish and Game for money should go directly into protecting and improving the resources before we use those funds to compensate counties for lost tax base, we ought to think long and hard about the implications of that step.

Moreover, there's no escaping the fact that the PILT would be paid for by the one-third of Idahoans who buy hunting and fishing licenses. Having sponsored the purchase of PILT lands, sportsmen will now be asked to pay the taxes on it as well.

PILT amounts to a hidden user-fee on the 116,000 acres of Fish and Game-owned land in Idaho. We think that's a bad idea.

There are too many unanswered questions about payment in lieu of taxes, and those payments shouldn't be a part of our state constitution until those questions are answered.

We urge a no vote on HJR 14.

Recreation District tax small, not burdensome

We believe our young people should have the same opportunities as the surrounding areas. We have the facilities available to us without large cash expenditures.

We need the Recreation District to keep these facilities and other recreation projects going. This is not an expensive tax district and we will take many more tax dollars by not taking advantage of the facilities available.

The first year cost is \$10,000 of taxable valuation. The levy after the first year is 3 mills divided by 20 equals .0005 times \$10,000 valuation equals \$6 per year. Example: \$50,000 (total property value) minus \$8,000 (land value) equals \$42,000 times 50 percent (homeowner exemption) equals \$21,000 (taxable value on home) plus \$8,000 (land) equals \$29,000 taxable value times .0006 equals \$17.40.

Agriculture land has an exemption built into the appraised value. This year the land value is \$400 per acre. Example: \$64,000 (farm of 160 acres at \$400 per acre) plus \$22,500 (home of \$35,000 at 50 percent exemption plus \$10,000 (other improvements, i.e., outbuildings)) equals \$95,500. First year cost equals \$3,850 additional tax; then after 10 years equals \$57.50 additional tax.

State law does not allow the .000 to raise above this figure.

2 die in separate car accidents Thursday

No one wore seat belts and the children were not in car seats, the dispatcher said. Everyone except Guadalupe Huizar was ejected.

Twin Falls woman arrested as police seize marijuana

TWIN FALLS — A Twin Falls woman was arrested Wednesday in connection with the seizure of more than a half-pound of marijuana.

Michael Elaine Kimberlin, 30, 350 Gravelley Drive No. 15, was charged with possession of a controlled substance without intent to deliver and failure to affix the state drug tax stamp both felonies. A 5th District Magistrate judge set her bond at \$1,500 in court Thursday.

According to an affidavit by a Bureau of Narcotics agent, a woman sold 4 grams of methamphetamine for \$200 to a confidential informant in September. She also sold the informant just over an ounce of marijuana for \$200 last week.

On Wednesday, Bureau of Narcotics agents, Magic Valley Drug Task Force officers and Twin Falls County sheriff's deputies executed a search warrant of the woman's residence and seized more than 9 ounces of marijuana and paraphernalia, the affidavit said.

Hector Armando Terrazas, 38, was arrested Tuesday, said Ted Bader, U.S.

Terrazas was arrested and charged with possession of a firearm. The U.S. Attorney's Office in Boise declined to prosecute the firearms charge, so Terrazas faces a deportation hearing in Denver.

Children who lack immunizations sent home

TWIN FALLS — School principals sent children without immunizations home with a new enforcement law and a district deadline meant to avoid dangerous illnesses.

"It protected a large number of children in this community who would not have been protected if this law was not in effect," said Charlynn Becker, a nurse epidemiologist with Public Health District V.

The new state law bars children who have not received their shots before the district's deadline Wednesday went to school.

Leading school

Twin Falls School District students had to have their shots by school time Thursday. Other districts may have other deadlines.

However, some parents signed waivers for personal, medical or religious reasons so their children could still attend.

"It wasn't a mean thing," Becker said. "It was a way to protect children from potentially life-threatening illnesses."

Only 33 of 76 Twin Falls children who had not received their shots before the district's deadline Wednesday went to school.

Thursday, Superintendent Terrell Donicht said some of the missing children came to school late after receiving their shots.

The Health District gave immunizations to children in a special morning clinic.

Becker said 130 school children received shots Wednesday to beat the deadline. Parents called throughout the week wondering how they could verify whether their children had shots, she said.

Unless children have had immunization repeatedly, taking another shot should not be risky, he said.

Donicht said the Legislature should con-

sider returning the immunization enforcement responsibility to the Health and Welfare Department.

We do resent the fact that this responsibility has been placed on schools," he said.

Those schools which children had received the shots in the last few weeks.

Although some angry parents called schools after learning that they must have their children immunized, the schools had nothing to do with the regulation, he said.

Every year, kindergarten children and new children moving into the district will be subject to the law, Donicht said.

Fairchild enjoys playing catch-up politics

TWIN FALLS — Cynicism about the political system drew Roger Fairchild into the governor's race.

"I'm cynical about politics and I'm skeptical about politics, but that doesn't mean I'm negative. It actually means I'm positive. My skepticism and cynicism doesn't mean I'm negative," Fairchild said recently.

Fairchild is particularly cynical about his opponent, Democratic incumbent Gov. Cecil B. Andrus.

"Twenty years ago, Cecil Andrus was a good governor. In fact, in 1974 I voted for him. He was dynamic, he was

leader. Even when the public didn't agree with him, he led. But over time and along the road he's become a jaded politician.

He's gotten old, negatively cynical, he functions more on style than on substance.

His time has come and gone and he should not be allowed to retire in office.

The 37-year-old businessman resigned from the state Senate last fall to challenge Andrus' hold on the state's highest executive office. The underdog has put 50,000 miles on his car traveling around the state in a lop-sided campaign characterized by sharp words from a committed candidate.

"He's a very quiet, thoughtful, businesslike person," said state Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo, who has known Fairchild since 1982. "He has a concern for the little people of Idaho."

Republican state Sen. Laird Nob of Kimberly described Fairchild as energetic and bright and "willing to take a lot of political heat for what he believes is correct."

Republicans are first to admit that Fairchild's greatest disadvantage is trying to campaign on a shoestring budget.

"You're at a terrible disadvantage when you have no money. You can't get your message across," Darrington said.

The party has tried to make other issues a priority, he said.

Zone change request for new hospital withdrawn

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls Clinic and Hospital administration has withdrawn a request for a zoning change to allow clinic owners to build a \$10-million hospital northeast of town.

Sherman Hansen, assistant administrator for the clinic, said he called City Hall Thursday and asked it to have the request removed from the Moody agenda.

Hansen, who was acting on an order from Administrator Marley Jackman, said

he did not know whether the decision to cancel the project was canceled or if it was being postponed.

Jackman was out of town Thursday.

Jackman has sold the hospital site on 40 acres at the southeast corner of Pole Line Road and Madras Street North, a more convenient location for patients coming from Gooding, Jerome and Burley.

Construction of the facility, which would be twice as large as the current 44-bed structure on 665 Shoshone St. E., was planned to begin in the Spring of 1991, he said.

City Engineer Gary Young said clinic officials postponed an October meeting to update them on detailed plans for their proposed new hospital.

Walker Carr, who owns the property, has not heard anything from clinic representatives.

The clinic has already paid money to Carr and final sale of the property is contingent on zoning approval, Hansen said.

The hospital's owners — 14 of the 17 doctors who work there — have said they want to bring in as many as eight new physicians within four or five years, but that would not

be feasible without an expansion or a larger new building, Jackman said last spring.

The doctors scrapped plans about a year ago for a \$2.8-million, two-story expansion at its existing building because that would have only solved short-range growth needs, Jackman had said.

The current structure is "landlocked" and would not support future growth needs, he said.

He said the hospital has evolved as four additions were made since this clinic began in 1947.

Bliss church leader speaks out against books at PTO book fair

BLISS. A local church leader has spoken out against books sold at the Parent-Teacher Organization's recent book fair.

The Rev. Paul Wager of the Bliss Community Church said parents who attend his church and have children in Bliss schools "expressed enough concern to warrant his visit to the PTO meeting Tuesday night."

He said, however, that only about 1 percent of the books involved in the book fair were objectionable in his own mind.

The book fair was a PTO fundraiser held earlier in October.

One of the books, Wager and the parents objected to is called "Becky Becomes a Witch," a story of a 16-year-old girl who wants to be a

witch.

He also said many of the books at the fair were "TV figure culture overers."

His presentation to the PTO meeting sparked discussion among the parents.

Several parents commented about the prevalence of eastern religious philosophies and mind control in the popular cartoon "Teen-age Mutant Ninja Turtles."

Wager nodded and told parents that those were the kind of things he was referring to.

"There's a pretty pervasive movement nationwide to bring into education different ideas," Wager said. "They feel schools are the best place to bring in new ideas. There's a real increase in mysticism, occult, new-age, one-world rule."

"Our kids have enough to face

without this negative influence," he said. "We're aware of what's out there and how much it's a part of our book fair and things like that."

He also mentioned a reported increase in occult practices and animal sacrifices in the Twin Falls area.

"We think we tend to get isolated," Wager said. "But when this many parents are able to spot books with bad influences, it sends up red flags."

Wager asked the PTO members to look more closely at the books they choose for the book fair, and to try to weed out the books with "negative influences."

One PTO member, Tillie Slane, said she didn't see anything wrong with the book fair selection.

"You might see things in a book that other people may not," she said. "You are taking your belief and saying

"it's got to be my belief."

"Just because you can't see it, countered Wager, "doesn't mean it's not there."

"If there's even one kid that it does make a difference to, that's one—it's incredulous how much of it there is."

PTO vice-president Carol Wood told Wager that what it boils down to is that parents are responsible for their own children.

"As the PTO could probably not censor the books, but as we parents can make people aware that it's there," she said.

She added that undesirable messages are sent to kids in subtle ways.

"These cartoon are feeding your children subtle messages," Wood said. "If you really start to watch for it, it's incredible how much of it there is."

Wood said Karate and Ninja are "fine" until one looks "deeper into them" and discover they teach eastern religion.

Another PTO member, Nancy Couch, said she feels that her children benefit from all aspects of knowledge.

"As a parent, I don't mind my kids reading something because then we can talk about it," she said. "I feel that we need to have knowledge of everything."

Wager and his congregation held a meeting several months ago about their education program introduced in Bliss schools. They objected to the "new-age humanism" the program promoted, including the children believe have control over their lives.

"I think it's great that they should choose role models, or 'wizards,' to help guide them."

Possible Bliss cattle mutilation reported

BLISS. — Trespassers killed a bull calf and severed its penile corpus

last week in a farm south of Bliss, a local woman said Thursday. But the woman isn't so sure that predators didn't do it.

"We did have a bull calf mutilated out here," said Mary Carlisle, who owned the cow.

Goding County Sheriff Robert Ayre questions whether predators or humans were responsible for the incident.

We have no evidence to point in

any direction," he said.

Ayre said the calf was found Saturday afternoon in an area of the farm that is hidden from public view.

But she also mentioned that the 8-month-old bull hadn't been seen for two or three days before it was found dead.

Little blood was found at the scene, although the scrotum, testes and penis were all removed along with about one square foot of surrounding hide, Carlisle said.

"I'm not sure but that they might have drained the blood out," she said.

She said the carcass looked very different from those killed by predators. The four cuts were in straight lines, she said.

"I've never seen a dog that can go in and make such a sharp cut," she said.

But Ayre pointed out that the calf may have died in the desert as long as two or three days in rather warm temperatures. He said the wounds investigated by his deputies didn't necessarily indicate humans had inflicted them.

"We sure don't have the facts to rule it one way or the other right now," he said.

In 1982 he bought a Los Angeles cannery that was in financial trouble, made it a profitable subsidiary to the business, which he renamed Golden Valley Foods, and sold the California factory in 1986.

Business experience—combined with legislative tenure give Fairchild the maturity he needs as a relatively young government, Republicans say.

The few times Fairchild made verbal faux-pas—he once told Gooding

time, state-employed elected officials, ban political fund-raising before and during the legislative session; end the practice of campaign fund carryovers; and ban corporate union political action committee and other out-of-state fund-raising, making the only legal contribution from Idaho citizens.

"Our political system is failing us and it's because politicians are concerned first with their own reelection and secondly (with) serving the interest of those can best aid their reelection," Fairchild said.

"He criticizes Andrus for increasing the size of the government. While in most cases he added staff at the Idaho Department of Corrections and the Department of Health and Welfare were needed, services haven't improved," Fairchild said.

While not certain of victory, Fairchild and his camp refuse to give up.

"Don't count Roger out," Ayre said.

"He plays until the last whistle is blown. He may not have the heavy hitters in his corner, but he's gone around the state with tremendous enthusiasm."

"Someone with less toughness and a weak set of values would have just bowed out," Noh said.

And although Fairchild is cynical about the system, he has faith in voters.

"When they're in that booth and pull the curtain, they're in there by themselves. They're not answering the phone, their job isn't on the line."

"We're going to do a lot better than expected and there's still a chance we may win."

he said:

Fairchild opposes borrowing in the form of a bond issue or raising taxes to create revenue for roads and bridges.

"It seems like we can maintain the highway we've got for a quarter billion."

The state should maintain and improve existing roads before building new ones, he said.

Fairchild: Although the education budget has increased tremendously, there's no measurable evidence of improvement, Fairchild said.

The main problem with education is "the fact that we as a society have dumbed down our society's education problems at the school house steps and demanded that they take care of it," he said. Teachers are expected to be nutritionists, counselors, nurses, police, baby-sitters and parental role-models.

"We can't expect to throw that load on the schools and not expect it's going to cost a lot of money."

To change that, the state needs to increase funding to education over and above population growth and inflation, Fairchild says.

TWIN FALLS — The constant chorus from downtown merchants sounds like Mark Twain's 1897 call to The Associated Press: "It was not a very comfortable place to shop," Ashenbrenner said.

Reports of their death are greatly exaggerated." Twain wasn't and downtown Twin Falls isn't Main Avenue merchants will surely be saying the same thing today as they celebrate the 20th anniversary of the completion of a revitalization project.

"Have you heard the tales of woe in recent years about major department stores moving out to the Magic Valley Mall and the struggles to fill vacant downtown buildings? I used to say that same thing today as they celebrate the 20th anniversary of the completion of a revitalization project."

Rudy Ashenbrenner, long-time owner of Rudy's Furniture on Main Avenue, thinks like the period shortly after World War II.

"Downtown Twin Falls was doable."

"An influx of servicemen returning

popularity of cars led to a parking shortage. The parking lots that existed were full of weeds. Some lots had businesses such as car-repair shops in place."

"It was not a very comfortable place to shop," Ashenbrenner said.

In the mid-1960s, one large and 13 smaller storefronts were vacant.

In 1968, two years after the Magic Valley Mall opened its regional shopping center north of Twin Falls, about 20 storefronts were vacant, including three large ones.

Now, a few are empty. The obituaries haven't been written, retailing is strong and evolving, and the city built itself as the furniture-store capital of Idaho.

Starting at noon today, merchants have invited the public to celebrate the 20th anniversary of downtown's redevelopment project. In 1970, the downtown area completed a construction project on the area's streets, planted trees and expanded parking lots.

The final piece to the downtown project's funding puzzle was put



into place in 1966 when federal urban renewal funds became available in Idaho. The funds were aimed at "blighted" urban areas. Twin Falls' core area fit that definition.

"Most towns this size after the

one-half of the \$2.5-million project, the city of Twin Falls kicked in \$300,000, city merchants in a special tax contributed \$20,000 and a parking association donated land worth \$300,000.

The parking association, a group of downtown merchants, actually started the revitalization in the mid-1950s. They bought vacant land behind buildings and installed parking meters.

"Parking was the key to the whole thing," Ashenbrenner said.

When the 1970 construction was completed, the straight-as-an-arrow Main Avenue, which at one time had been U.S. Highway 30, was a meandering street lined with trees and designed with the pedestrian in mind. By 1972, all the buildings were filled with waiting lists.

The Department of Housing and Urban Development was confused. Twin Falls was the first city in the region to complete a urban-renewal project and the city wanted to close the project's office.

HUD didn't know how to, and even suggested finding something else to do so the office could stay open.

That didn't happen, and in the early 1980s downtown merchants were looking at yet another way to promote the area.

The city drew boundaries for a business improvement district, and businesses outside the district were assessed a tax.

"Parking was the key to the whole thing," Ashenbrenner said.

But when the 1970 construction was completed, the straight-as-an-arrow Main Avenue, which at one time had been U.S. Highway 30, was a meandering street lined with trees and designed with the pedestrian in mind. By 1972, all the buildings were filled with waiting lists. The merchant's pride borders on defiance, decline brought on by a love of Main Avenue.

"Every person has a heart," Ashenbrenner said. "And Twin Falls has a heart, and the heart of Twin Falls is still downtown."

PILT: Just compensation or double taxation?

TWIN FALLS — A proposed constitutional amendment on the general election ballot next Tuesday looks to some like a way to make it easier for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game to buy land for use as wildlife habitat and hunting and fishing areas.

But to others, it looks like double taxation.

House Joint Resolution 14 would amend the Idaho Constitution to provide that unimproved lands owned by Fish and Game would be subject to a payment in lieu of taxes, or PILOT.

The annual fee, which would go from Fish and Game to counties, fines levied against fish and game law violators. In 1989, fines amounted to \$170,000.

A constitutional amendment by the department. Other state and municipal agencies, schools and libraries would still be exempt from property tax.

Fish and Game supports the proposed amendment, which it feels would ease the financial relationship between the agency and counties, said Region 4 Supervisor Carl Neils.

It would remove the main argument against the agency acquiring property removed from the county tax rolls.

But one opponent says PILOT would treat those Idahoans who buy fish and game licenses and pay conservation law fines and be paying twice for the privilege of using the land — once as taxpayers and once as sportsmen.

"It looks like double taxation," said Les Hazen, president of the Idaho Wildlife Federation.

Some opponents may call it dou-

blic taxation, Nells said, but the department does not operate with any tax money. All its funds come from the sale of hunting and fishing

permits and stamps and tags. Some argue that the money would be better spent on fish and wildlife or on other land acquisitions. But increased land purchases would generally benefit Idaho's wildlife, Nells said.

"In the proposition we'll be submitting to the governor [if the measure passes], the Fish and Game Department will pay taxes on unimproved land greater than 10 acres that we own," Nells said.

The money would come from fines levied against fish and game law violators. In 1989, fines amounted to \$170,000.

The proceeds from fines now are split, with 5 percent going to the general fund, 22½ percent to the district court system, 5 percent to research and rescue units and 67½ percent going to the public school in- come fund.

Fish and Game's proposal would give 5 percent to schools and 22½ percent to the courts and 22½ percent — about \$123,000 at 1989 levels — to payments in lieu of tax.

It would essentially change the distribution of money to counties, which oppose sale of land that the department has its eye on.

"I feel like they're shortsighted," Hazen said. Once the amendment is passed the department will be stuck with it, he said.

Fish and Game currently owns 116,000 acres, which is less than one-fourth of 1 percent of the land

area of the state, and it leases about 91,000 acres, Nells said.

The maximum bill for taxes would be about \$300,000, or less than 1 percent of the department's annual budget. The department now spends about \$600,000 a year on land ac-

quisitions.

We are not opposed to, because we think it will greatly simplify our land purchases," Nells said.

Most of the land the department is interested in is marginal agricultural property known as "wasteland," much of which makes good wildlife habitat, winter range, productive areas for upland birds and waterfowl and fishing and hunting access.

A constitutional amendment would be the only way to change the law without creating a dangerous precedent for other government entities to do the same, Sen. Earl Noh, R-Kimberly, said.

"It's a little bit of an additional user fee which goes toward supporting local government activity," said Noh, the chairman of the Senate Resources and Conservation Committee.

It would remove the main argument against the agency acquiring property removed from the county tax rolls.

But Hazen said he feared it may be a measure to appease counties which oppose sale of land that the department has its eye on.

"I feel like they're shortsighted," Hazen said. Once the amendment is passed the department will be stuck with it, he said.

The change shouldn't be done with a constitutional amendment,

Hazen said:

Rather the state could revert to a former plan under which fine money was paid to counties as a form of payment in lieu of taxes, Hazen said.

He also said that counties should realize that Fish and Game acquisitions would mean better hunter and fisherman access, which in turn would attract more tourists to the area.

"If people know the big story, I think they'll oppose it," Hazen said.

Indians crush Bruins, 35-0, in playoffs

POCATELLO — Lane Staples four-yard run with 2:36 left in the third quarter invoked the rout rule Thursday night and lifted the Pocatello Indians to a 35-0 romp over the Twin Falls Bruins in the opening round of the state Class A-1 football playoffs.

Staples run thus provided the points that guaranteed the 9-1 Indians the advancing into the second round of the playoffs against either Highland or Borah, who were reportedly tied late in their first-round meet-

The game was only three plays and 18 seconds old when the Indians seized the ad-

vantage, Casey Burke breaking a 78-yard sprint down the left sideline. Bill Parkin booted the first of two conversions.

On its next possession, the Indians needed 11 plays to cover the 20-yardage, getting the last yard on a 10-yard catch-and-charge by Wade Bell.

Locals bring home national triathlon titles

TWIN FALLS — A pair of local athletes joined a Nevada swimmer to bring home three-place finishes last month's National Triathlon Championships in Las Vegas, Nev.

Bicyclist Jerry Boston and runner Dave White have been teaming up for triathlons over the past year, winning six of eight events and finishing second twice.

Problem is, they can't find a steady swimmer to complete the tri.

After going through several teammates, Boston and White recruited Mark McGee from the University of Nevada-Las Vegas for the national championships.

McGee completed his swim through a choppy Lake Mead in fifth place for the team competition, although he didn't know it at the time because some 2,000 athletes were in the race, many of them individual racers.

He found Boston in the crowded parking lot, flagged him and the 18-year-old member of the Blue Lakes Cycle Club wound his way past 500+ riders and moved his team into first place.

The first eight miles of the 24.8-mile ride were "like climbing Shoshone Falls," Boston said.

Fortunately, he spends a lot of his time training at that very spot and was well prepared for the hilly terrain.

Once finished, he tapped White, who had just to move surprisingly out of the crowd so as to avoid being chased.

White increased the team's lead by another 500 yards or more and the Clear Springs Trout Co. team finished with a combined time of 2:03:31, more than three minutes

ahead of the second-place finishers.

The first half of the 6.2-mile run was easy, going downhill on asphalt with a tailwind, White said. The second half was uphill into the 10-15 mph wind in four inches of sand.

"The whole course was tough," he said.

White, 25, moved to Twin Falls from the San Francisco area two and a half years ago and works for Clear Springs.

He is a member of Magic Valley Tri Runners and said he hopes to keep the current lineup together for future races.

Boston plans to pursue his bicycling at the collegiate level next year, but he said he will return in the summer to join White on the Idaho triathlon circuit and hopefully to defend their national title next year.

Finding a swimmer remains a problem, White said. Although McGee said he was interested in future competitions, living in Las Vegas could make it difficult for him to attend many Idaho events.

For now, White and Boston say they will continue training for next summer while basking in the glory of their victory.

Glory, it seems, is about the extent of the rewards for their efforts.

Each team member received a certificate and a small brass "pewterweight" for their win.

The biggest thrill, White said, was "standing on the stage at Aladdin's Casino in Las Vegas while a woman in a feathered headdress and a g-string gave me an award."

Boston agreed, adding that the amount of support he has received since his triumph was announced at school last week has been tremendous.

Some question fairness of NCAA drug program

BOSTON — The suspension of Boston College football coach Jim Frager over a recent admissions scandal has been extended by three weeks among area athletic directors, football coaches and players across the NCAA's 64-member Division I football team.

Frager, Boston College's leading rusher, was suspended for the remainder of the season, effectively ending his career, after the NCAA ruled yesterday that he had tested positive for banned substances during a recent screening at the campus. In a prepared release, the school stated that Frager had not tested positive for steroids, cocaine or marijuana.

According to NCAAs director of sports sciences Frank Uryasz, the drug test, which encompasses 193 Division I-A and 1-AA schools, checked for steroids, cocaine and amphetamine and diuretics.

Efforts to reach Frager on Thursday were unsuccessful.

The situation seemed to raise some issues about the fairness of the NCAA's new, random drug-testing program during the regular season. While opinions varied about the policy's discriminatory nature, it received广泛ly support and was effective as a deterrent, there was a consensus that the process was denunciatory to the athletes.

School's religious activity won't halt funding

GRANGEVILLE (AP) — The state schools superintendent says he will not withhold funds from Grangeville-area Joint School District 241 for allowing prayer and Gideon Bibles in the classroom.

The procedure for doing so is not clear, says Evans, said Wednesday, and the legislature of the Idaho Constitution allows some room for interpretation on the subjects.

Evans made the statement in response to a Lewiston Morning Tribune editorial calling for the money to be withheld.

One Grangeville woman objected to the practice. The American Civil Liberties Union's Jack Van Valkenburg said it had not received any complaints from parents earlier. In the weeks to come, mounting challenge to a possible intervening church and state.

Evans said he is unsure about the process of withholding state money from schools that violate the state boards, and the trustees are sworn to follow the law, Evans said.

Supreme Court stays execution pending hearing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Supreme Court on Thursday stayed the execution of Canyon County murderer Federico Paz pending a hearing on his petition for federal review of his conviction and sentence.

The order came less than 24 hours before Paz was scheduled to die by lethal injection.

No date was set for the hearing, and public defender Van Bishop said he would file a petition outlining challenges to the government's case within the next two months.

The high court order came two days after the Idaho Supreme Court refused to stay the execution pending a ruling from the federal bench on whether the case would be reviewed.

Paz, 31, of Nampa, was sentenced to die by 3rd District Judge Dennis Goff for the first-degree murder of Gerry Bright, 39, in a Caldwell cafe in August 1987.

State warns against 'living will' sales

BOISE (AP) — Attorney General Jim Jones is urging all Idahoans — especially senior citizens — to be wary of businesses selling "living will" kits.

The legal documents recognized by Idaho's Natural Death Act give adults a way of ensuring their wishes are known "relating to the rendering of their medical care, including the decision to have life-sustaining procedures withheld or withdrawn."

Living wills, which have become increasingly popular since last summer's U.S. Supreme Court decision on individuals' right to die, pertain only to medical care and are not used for the disposition of property after a person's death.

Jones said his office's consumer protection unit has

found some businesses taking advantage of that situation.

He said the latest problem involves people selling and advertising consumers with the filling out of living wills at inflated prices.

"Unfortunately, most of these unscrupulous individuals are playing upon people's emotions, especially the elderly, to get them to purchase a document which they could obtain for only the cost of an envelope and postage from the Idaho Office on Aging."

Arlene Davidson, state ombudsman for the elderly, has prepared a do-it-yourself living will packet including a copy of a living will and a durable power of attorney for health care, which Jones called essential.



Low voter turnout would hurt GOP most

WASHINGTON — The latest prediction about the 1990 election is this: Most Americans won't vote Tuesday and that spells potential trouble for Republican candidates.

"Low turnout generally hurts us," said Norman Cummings, political director of the Republican National Committee. "Those marginal voters are Republican-leaning voters in many key states."

Carl Gars, director of the Committee for the Study of the American Electorate, predicted turnout of the same as 1986, the last non-presidential election year. That year, 36.4 percent of eligible voters cast ballots, the lowest turnout since 1942.

"It's a more iffy situation this year than at any time I can remember," said Gars, who forecasts turnout with some success every election year.

There is a widespread belief, fortified by polls that the electorate is fed up with politics and politicians. That could prompt an outpouring of votes against officeholders, but it also could prompt Americans to stay home. Election Day.

Voter anger was fed by the debate over how to deal with the budget deficit. When President Bush dropped his total opposition to taxes, many Republicans were particularly angered.

Charles Black, spokesman for the Republican Party, conceded Thursday that the budget debate turned off GOP voters.

"But I think that's over with," he said, adding that Bush's approval rating appears to be rebounding and Republican candidates are gaining support.

If the president can help put some fire back into the core voters of the Republican Party and thereby increase Republican turnout, then he will have performed a signal service" with his new post-election campaigning, said David Keeler, a Republican consultant.

"Normally when you get a lot of disgruntled voters you get low turnout," said Robert Teeter, a Republican pollster and Bush adviser.

Might that be particularly damaging to Republicans? "It's possible, sure," Teeter said. "It did in 1986."

That was the year Democrats regained control of the Senate.

Turnout often is more of a problem for Democrats than Republicans.

For example, a recent poll in Michigan showed Democratic Gov. James Blanchard leading his Republican challenger John Engler by 15

percent. In 1986, when Engler defeated Blanchard, turnout was 57.5 percent.

Gars said there was a slight increase in Republican registration, but it might not translate into a larger Republican vote.

"My own guess is that overall, because of taxes and an incipient recession, there'll be a decline in high proportions despite the increase in registration in the Republican vote nationally," he said.

Today's pedantic North had mixed feelings about losing the vulnerable spade. On the one hand he was out a few nickels; on the other, he got an opportunity to give his partner a long lecture.

South ruffed the second heart, drew trumps and cashed dummy's top club. He ruffed a club in hopes of a 3-3 break, but when he saw that he couldn't establish and run the club, he fell back on the spade suit. There was no 3-3 break there either, and South was forced to lose two clubs and a heart for one down.

North was ready with his lecture. "Your choice of play gave you a reasonable shot at success, however. You missed a much better chance. Since game and rubber were worth 600 points (not counting honors), you could have easily afforded a possible waste of 20 points to improve your chances appreciably."

"After drawing trumps, instead of cashing two high clubs and ruff-

ing a third, you should have ducked ANSWER: Two no-trump. Choose accordingly. You then win the 'the-*invitational*' bid; partner should cash his club and you should not have a four-card spade suit, and cash the top clubs, discarding a ter for his rebid.

spade. A club ruff establishes dummy's fifth club for a second discard, and the defenders get only a third club.



TV series derived from movies don't usually excel

It's more than a month into the new season, and Kevin Meany, television's "Uncle Buck," has yet to see John Candy as the big screen's "Uncle Buck."

Until he's certain that his show will live to see another season on CBS, Meany will stay away from the film. He says he wants audiences to keep the roles separate, and if he saw the film he might adopt some of Candy's characterizations.

Still, Meany has his work cut out: converting a popular movie character into a popular television presence. And he has

plenty of company this season.

Six shows based on feature films premiered on the networks this fall; three announced Saturday morning series ("The Wizard of Oz," "Bill and Ted's Excellent Adventure" and those severer rats on the half shell promoted from syndication, "Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles") and three prime-time comedies ("Uncle Buck," "Ferris Bueller" and "Parenthood").

And still more are set for mid-season, including "Big," "Baby Talk" (from "Look Who's Talking"), "True Believer" and "I'm Gonna Get You, Sucka."

How many of the new shows will be around for a second season is anybody's

guess. The latest Nielsen ratings don't look promising for the prime-time bunch.

Truth is, television series spawned from movies have a pretty dismal track record. A show such as "M.A.S.H." which aired for 11 successful seasons, is the exception.

More than half of the 50 movie-to-TV conversions since the late '40s failed to make it beyond the first season. Only six have lasted five years or more.

Most television series fail, regardless of their origin, said Ted Frank, vice president of current comedy programs for NBC. "In the film hit theaters, Frank said. "It helped that Ron Howard — a product of television since he was a tyke — was in."

Fox stays feisty despite continued case of bad press

LOS ANGELES — To paraphrase Mark Twain as Bart Simpson might do it, the reporter for Fox Broadcasting Co.'s death are greatly exaggerated man.

Especially, from Fox's perspective. Little more than a few weeks into the fall season, the 4-year-old network is suffering the bitter taste of prolonged bad press. Its executives are feeling persecuted.

Welcome to the big leagues, boys. For those who just landed from another planet, Fox took "The Simpsons," its overnight runaway sensation, and slammed it right in the face of NBC's top-rated, long-beloved "The Cosby Show."

In short, David walked right up to Gorilla and unleashed his alingahot. Then he numbed his nose.

Gorilla has not fallen. Since turning to Thursdays at 8 p.m., the run of Fox's animated, bug-eyed "Simpsons" had been trounced by original "Cosby" episodes. But in its fall premiere, "The Simpsons" lost by only one-tenth of a rating point.

Fox was gleeful about the showing against the top-rated network, saying its fall

season hadn't really begun until "The Simpsons" started new installments.

But Fox has been rolling out brand-new series since late summer, and most of them have landed with a thud at the bottom of the Nielsen rankings.

Fox may seem oblivious to this, but television critics are not.

So far, the highlight for Fox has been that none of its stars sang the national anthem at a Padres game over the summer, the trade publication Daily Variety said, re-

calling to comedian Roseanne Barr's infamous screching of "The Star-Spangled Banner."

The Los Angeles Times reported that Fox's poor ratings had forced the network to give advertisers millions of dollars in free commercial time.

All of this hurt Fox's feelings. After all, the network had been a fresh face in an otherwise familiar field of veteran players.

With a fraction of the other network's money, stars and shows, Fox jumped into the top 10 last season with two "mystery" sitcoms about dysfunctional families — "The Simpsons" and "Married...With Children."

"Everybody in the press blew us up big for the last four or five months," said Fox president Leslie Kellner. "Now it's time for them to take the air out of their own balloons."

HOLLYWOOD — Cole Porter couldn't have been further from the teaching-class stereotype of your average rock 'n' roll star.

Born into privilege, the man who wrote such pop classics as "Night and Day" and "I've Never Been to Me" was a graduate of prep school, attended Yale, where he led the Glee Club, and was a member of the Whiffenpoofs.

The Indiana native studied composition in Europe and spent much of his life hobnobbing with what's now called the jet set.

So why does the music of Cole Porter, who died in 1964 at age 73, serve as the foundation of an AIDS campaign that is shaping up as the most ambitious pop charity effort since the 1988 Amnesty International world tour?

Battle brewing over 'Marked'

HOLLYWOOD — The writers' producers of "Marked for Death" are tickled that their low-budget, wall-to-wall action movie grossed about \$1 million at the box office during its first week in theaters. But they're not so tickled by the fact that Steven Seagal, the star of the film, has sued them for 50 percent of the box office gross.

Seagal, 36, is the author of the book "Marked for Death," which he wrote before being introduced to the movie by its director, Michael Grimes. "I figured it out," he wrote 93 percent of their script," said Seagal in an interview with the Los Angeles Times by telephone from the British Columbia location of his current film, "The Price of Our Blood." "It hurt me when I read times [in reviews] like, 'They tailored made the action scenes for Steven Seagal.' That's a total joke."

We're not really looking to get into a confrontation with Steven Seagal or anyone else about who wrote what," said Grimes during a joint interview with Victor in a West Hollywood hotel. "The record is in the Writers Guild paper for us."

'Memphis Belle' has poignant view of war

At a time when helicopter crews are going down in the Middle East, the stirring account of the last flight of a B-17 " Flying Fortress" in "Memphis Belle" has come home with unusual force and poignancy.

World War II was the last popular conflict for Americans, but sending boys in their teens or barely out of them on what seem like suicide missions still seems terribly wrong. The agonies of watching the last flight over Germany of the Memphis Belle is diminished by knowing the historical fact that the legendary bomber successfully completed its 25th mission. Yet this new film — made in England by British film makers and starring young American actors — carries some dread along with its cargo of excitement.

In many ways, this new film by the English director Michael Caton-Jones ("Scandal") comes across as familiar territory. It's anyone steeped in World War II and World War I pictures. You almost wait for the line, "You can't send kids up in a crate like that." But because of the current climate of heat war, the strength and appeal of the cast and the gripping realism of the long final flight sequence, Caton-Jones' film proves a triumph of the war-in-the-air genre that took off in 1927 with the first Academy Award Best Picture winner, "Wings."

The screenplay by Milt Greenfield is freighted with its share of cliches, both in its dialogue and in its characters. But the device of introducing an Army Air Corps commando officer, rather absurdly embodied by John Lithgow, gives the film an ironic framework. The crew, playing football in an English field as the film opens, are seen through the somewhat cynical and explosive

eyes of Col. Bruce Derninger. The colored verbality sketches the publicity potential of each youth as David Walkin's camera moves in for close-ups of the faces in the fading English sunlight. One of the kids, Richard ("Rascal") Moore, tentatively played by Sean Astin, led the life of an urban juvenile delinquent before entering the service, and that is unlikely fodder for the press. But Dan

Moore's family — his mother, stepmother, brother, sister and the dog — are separate lives from the officers' photo, copilot, navigator and bombardier. They're all bound by the plans for a big publicity tour of the United States after completion of their last mission. But the pilot and commander, Capt. There are also good comic characters from Reed Edward Diamond, Courtney Gains and Neil Gunther as gunners on the crew. And the always potent David Strathairn lends gravity and a sense of the horrors of war to the home-squadron commander, and provides an intense lesson to the foolishly ebullient publicity colonel.

The cast always assures that "Memphis Belle" (rated PG-13) is about people, not about war machinery. But the special effects are modest. Unit direction by Richard Conway makes the Memphis Belle itself ungainly, primitive, dangerously flimsy and vulnerable, a vital character in this sobering, yet uplifting vision of young men at war in the skies over Europe.



Scottish comic needs TV to become known

He has toured the world. Packed concert houses from Sydney, Australia, to New York City, where he has twice sold-out Carnegie Hall. He's a big star in England, and pals with members of the Royal Family. He's made albums, seven of them gold. And here in the United States, he has been making audiences laugh for the last 17 years.

Is it any wonder Billy Connolly, the Scottish comedian who plays the Oxford-educated teacher Billy MacGregor on ABC's "Head of the Class," looked shocked when his agent urged him to go to television to look about me. I've since just become known. Nobody knows you've been born," he prodded him.

"I was in London," Connolly said. "I did all those things for 24 years. I'm considered very successful and I have to go on the telly to become known. I never asked anybody for a job in television. It was the last thing I ever wanted to do."

It was Michael Elmes, an executive producer on the series, who met him at a dinner in London and told him he was familiar with my work. They wanted more energy on the series, to change its direction. Howard Hesseman, whom I replaced, is a more technical actor than I am. I'm a comedian. He's an actor. When in doubt, I fall back on energy. Fortunately, it has worked so far.

The comedian has a theory about why it's necessary to do TV in the U.S.: "It's the sheer size of the country. In England, you play a club and word gets around you're good and everyone comes to see you. Suddenly you're known all over the country. It's true in Ireland and Scotland. Play a club in New York and the word doesn't reach Philadelphia and you've entertained more people than you did in Australia. It's the shape of America that makes it important."

When you're hot, you're hot but Susan Lucci, the irrepressible Erica of "All My Children," is sizzling at the moment. She not only continues to tantalize her legion of fans daily on the popular daytime ABC soap, but has recently branched out into prime-time with a vengeance.

Just a couple of weeks ago, Susan starred in an ABC made-for-TV movie titled "The Bride in Black." The story eventually descended into a predictable-albeit entertaining thriller, but what probably surprised most viewers was Ms. Lucci's performance.

The actress has never had a better TV feature showcase. Susan played a rather shy woman who works in a Brooklyn deli making cheese. '60 Minutes' Salman Rushdie interview was most watched show on TV last week

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A rare interview with author Salman Rushdie made CBS' "60 Minutes" the most watched show on television last week, but NBC won the network ratings race with another photo finish.

Separated by only one-tenth of a ratings point, the three networks were led by NBC with a 12.5 rating, followed by ABC, with 12.4 and CBS with 12.3, according to A.C. Nielsen Co. figures released Tuesday.

An interview by "60 Minutes" correspondent Mike Wallace with Rushdie, who has lived in hiding since his novel "The Satanic Verses" caused some Moslem leaders to issue a death sentence against him, helped the Sunday newsmagazine capture the No. 1 spot for the first time in the 6-week-old fall season.

NBC's "Cheers," which had occupied the top ranking for most of the new season, fell to second place. The top 10 was again dominated by longstanding hits. In a season with the most new shows in television history, the highest-rated original fall program was "America's Funniest People" — a spinoff of ABC's — hugely successful "America's Funniest Home Videos."

Laura's killer will be revealed - really

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Peaks freaks, rejoice. On Nov. 10, the identity of "Bob" will be revealed, thereby finally unveiling the killer of teen queen Laura Palmer.

Or so said ABC Entertainment President Bob Iger last Thursday.

ABC has promised before to identify the murderer in its downright confusing "Twin Peaks" series.

So far, the network hasn't made good on that promise.

The network's programming chief talked about his troubled series during an informal news conference at the network's West Coast headquarters.

Asked if "Twin Peaks" was ever going to resolve the 6-month-old

Palmer murder, Iger replied that episodes this season made it very clear to viewers that "Bob" is the killer.

Problem is, it's entirely unclear just who or what "Bob" is. A demon? A person? A distant cousin of Freddy Krueger?

"On November 10th, you will know who Bob is," Iger said.

He also discussed another much-hyped but little-watched show on his network: "Cop Rock." The poorly rated new series about police officers who burst into song is rumored to be inches away from the programmer's ax. Iger would not say whether the show would be canceled.

"We reserve the right to move it,

change it, pull it or leave it on," Iger said.

He admitted viewers found the musical segments "jarring" and that the network had discussed reducing the number of songs. Steven Bochco, the show's creator, also developed the hit "L.A. Law" and "Hill Street Blues."

Iger said he has adopted a "patient, wait-and-see" attitude about the 13-week-old fall series and probably would not announce any cancellations until next year.

This fall's introduction of a record 35 series on the big three networks and Fox Broadcasting has created "mass chaos" among viewers and overwhelmed them with a volume of choices, Iger said.


