150,000 more U.S. troops to Gulf

WASHINGTON — President Bush on Thursday ordered the Pentagon to send enough troops to Saudi Arabia to make it possible to go on the offensive and drive Iraq out of Kuwait.

The estimated 150,000 more troops would bring U.S. forces in the Persian Gulf region to about 380,000 soldiers, sailors and air personnel. The new forces include three aircraft carriers, a battleship and hundreds of battle tanks.

Bush's decision to threaten Iraqi President Saddam Hussein with a new, open-ended deployment will draw soldiers and equipment largely from armored divisions in Germany. But it also includes combat reserve forces in the United States, according to Defense Secretary Dick Cheney.

Within two months, virtually all Marine Corps combat units will be in the Arabian desert as part of Operation Desert Shield.

Bush said he wants to send "a very strong signal that the coalition is very serious about getting Saddam down" in his demands for an unconditional withdrawal.

Baker wins Soviet backing

MOSCOW — Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze said for the first time Thursday that his government could not rule out the use of force against Iraq if peaceful efforts to end the occupation of Kuwait failed.

But Shevardnadze also emphasized during a break in talks with U.S. Secretary of State James A. Baker III that any action against Iraq be sponsored by the United Nations, and he said it was "too early" to consider a U.N. resolution authorizing force to resolve the Persian Gulf crisis.

The Soviet minister's acknowledgment that force might be required to dislodge Iraq from Kuwait marked a diplomatic

in place until after Jan. 1.

During the Vietnam War, U.S. forces peaked at about 543,000 in April 1969 and began withdrawing three months later. Gen. Colin L. Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said of the new deployments: "Whether it will be adequate in the event of going to war with Saddam Hussein's army, I'm not going to speculate."

The new troops will include heavy armored divisions that increase U.S. ability to attack Iraqi ground forces.

Governor fires 2 top law officers

BOISE — Gov. Cecil Andrus effectively fired Law Enforcement Director Mack Richardson and State Police Superintendent Rich Humphreys on Thursday.

The action was taken to restore public confidence in an agency rocked by allegations that troopers were giving special treatment to politicians.

"I will not tolerate, nor will the people of Idaho tolerate, any policy of special treatment of anyone," Andrus said. "Confidence must be restored, and there must be no lingering doubt about whether every Idaho citizen is treated the same."

Andrus, who won an unprecedented fourth term in a landslide two days earlier, said he had asked for and received the Richardson's resignation and had asked Humphreys to resign. Both were expected to retire earlier than he had planned.

At a news conference later in the day, Richardson maintained that he had done nothing wrong. "Again, I repeat that I have never endorsed a policy of immunity from arrest as charged, and I support that statement by example," he said.

Richardson said in the last two years, a federal judge was arrested in the Coeur d'Alene area for drunken driving, a state judge was stopped for speeding in the Twin Falls area and the mayor of Coeur d'Alene was arrested for drunken driving at Lewis.

Split Senate Magic Valley Republicans vow they will keep clout in chamber

TWIN FALLS — In the now evenly divided Idaho Senate, the Magic Valley won't lose any clout, lawmakers say.

"It'll probably make for less party politics," said Sen. John Peavey, D-Carey, last year's minority caucus chairman and the second-most-senior Democrat in the Senate. Instead of gridlock in the Senate, Peavey foresees coalition-building and moderate Republicans joining Democrats to pass legislation.

The Democrats picked up two seats in the Senate in Tuesday's voting, leaving the body with 21 Democrats and 21 Republicans. Although Lt. Gov. Butch Otter, a Republican, will break any ties, it's not clear who will control organizing the Senate.

Who's in control? A hot issue remains murky

TWIN FALLS — Idaho Republicans aren't going to share control of the state Senate gracefully, in fact, some insist they aren't going to share it at all.

"It will be a dogfight like you've never seen," said state Sen. Denton Darrington, R-DeWyo, the morning after learning the state Legislature would include a split Senate with 21 Republicans and 21 Democrats.

Republicans held the upper hand during the last session of legislation that reaches the floor and the type of legislation that survives a floor vote.

"A lot of us won't be able to be off the floor with the loss of two seats," said Senate Majority Caucus Chairman Lynn Tominga, R-Rupert. "The Democrats have wanted to play games — now I suppose we will."

Although Minority Caucus Chairman John Peavey has been in the middle of a few-floor scraps himself, the Carey Democrat sees less friction and more coalition in a split Senate than do Republican leaders.

Senate changes dramatically. The changes could affect composition of committees, committee chairmanships, the type of legislation that reaches the floor and the type of legislation that survives a floor vote.

"A lot of us won't be able to be off the floor with the loss of two seats," said Senate Majority Caucus Chairman Lynn Tominga, R-Rupert. "The Democrats have wanted to play games — now I suppose we will."

Although Minority Caucus Chairman John Peavey has been in the middle of a few-floor scraps himself, the Carey Democrat sees less friction and more coalition in a split Senate than do Republican leaders.

"I think you'll see a lot more consensus, more coalitions than we have in the past," Peavey said.




Rain splatters various sections of the nation

Advisories and watches for winter-like weather in various parts of the nation expired Thursday and rain splattered areas from Oregon to New York state.
New Mexico got some relief after a storm dumped snow in every corner of the state. Up to 6 inches of snow powered various areas, including the northeast heights of Albuquerque.
Winds gusted to 50 and 60 mph across Wyoming's southeast mountains. An advisory for strong winds causing blowing and drifting snow was posted for the region.
A high wind warning was posted for Kodiak, Alaska, where 45-mph winds gusted to near 75 mph.
Strong winds and low wind chills were expected to linger through Friday around Valdez, Alaska. Winds gusted to near 60 mph and the morning wind chill was 25 to 35 degrees below zero.
Rain or occasional thundershowers reached much of Texas, Oklahoma, northwest Louisiana, southern Arkansas, eastern Kansas, northwest Missouri and southern Iowa.
Rain also extended across northwest Oregon and from southwest Idaho into northwest Idaho. Rain changed to snow over southwest Idaho. Snow was scattered in central Colorado, northwest Wisconsin, south-central New York state and northern Maine.

Rupert, last year's Senate majority caucus chairman. "I think you're going to see the House playing a pivotal part," Dempsey said.
Noh agreed that reapportionment could hurt the Magic Valley, and he said the valley's voice on natural resources could be at stake.
Should Sen. Ron Beiltschacher, D-Grangeville, the senior Democrat on his Resources and Environment Committee, become chairman, Noh said it wouldn't be good news for southern Idaho. "Beiltschacher is a friend of irrigators," Noh said.
Beiltschacher did not return a phone call from *The Times-News* Thursday, but Newcomb said regional differences in opinions on resources aren't new. Now, each party will be represented equally on committees, he said. He is more concerned about spending and education.

The state needs to set priorities and be careful with its financial obligations in light of an economic downturn, Newcomb said, and Democrats who received Idaho Education Association support during the elections will push for more money for schools.
"It's definitely going to have some impact," Newcomb said. Democrats elected in 1988 on 15-year terms will support the IEA, not their constituents, down the line, he said.
The IEA made \$273,787 in

campaign contributions from January to October 22, according to a financial disclosure report.
They gave more than \$28,000 to Democrat Sen. R. Gary Robbins, who was unsuccessful in his bid for the Magic Valley's District 25 Senate seat. The IEA had better luck with two Boise Democrats, Cynthia Scanlon, who was given \$19,619 this summer and fall and won in District 18, and Sally Snodgrass, who was given \$17,692 and won in District 15.
Those two seats threw the Senate into a tie.
"They definitely did everything they could to make sure the candidates they supported made it into office. You have to expect they're going to try and wield everything they can get," Crapo said.
Dick Chilcote, former Twin Falls teacher and chairman of the IEA, said his organization "did fairly well" with its investments, although he was disappointed with Robbins' loss.
"It's not a win for us. We are looking out for the benefit of education in the state and for the hundreds of thousands of students in the state. They're the ones who win," Chilcote said.
And the association will invest through to profit from its involvement in the state's political process, he said.

Usually, the majority party elects a president pro tem who then appoints committee chairmen and determines committee memberships. But with a 21-21 split, nobody knows exactly what's in store for Idaho senators.
"We think we ought to have half of the chairmanships or at least have a co-chair," Peavy said.
Walker, a GOP leader, they insist Republican Lt. Gov. Butch Otter, who serves as president of the Senate and who votes to break ties whenever the Senate deadlocks, will have the tie-breaking vote when it comes to electing a president pro tem.
"I think it's crystal clear," Darrington said. "We'll have a Republican pro tem, nobody can argue that."

Cheney said the Navy will send three additional aircraft carrier battle groups, plus *Crossing*, the 15th aircraft carrier ship — USS *Missouri* — also would be sent with escorts, as well as Amphibious Group Three from San Diego, Calif.
The Marine Corps will be sending the 2nd Marine Expeditionary Force from Camp Lejeune, N.C. The 3rd Marine Expeditionary Brigade from Camp Pendleton, Calif., and Marine Prepositioning Ship Squadron One from Norfolk, Va.
He also said additional Air Force units may be tapped.

No new income taxes, Bush tells reporters

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush, reviving the no-new-tax pledge he abandoned in a budget deal, said Thursday the only way Democrats will be able to raise income tax rates will be "over my dead body."

It ain't going to happen, I'll guarantee you," Bush told reporters at a news conference after saying he expects congressional Democrats to come up with new tax proposals.

But he hedged his pledge somewhat when asked flatly if he would reject new taxes.

"Can I make the promise I won't support them? Absolutely," Bush said. "But... sometimes you run into some realities. But I'm grinding up my loins to go into battle to beat back the tax attempts that I think are coming."

He said Democrats had an "insatiable desire" to raise taxes and accused them of trying to "stick me with being anti-civil rights for vetoing a landmark bill banning job discrimination."

Bush struck a sharply combative stance toward the Democrats who increased their power in both the House and Senate with Election Day victories.

"I didn't do as well as I'd like," the president said, reflecting on Thursday's GOP losses.

Bush said the clear message from Election Day was that "people feel they're taxed too much."

Six incumbent governors, of both parties, went down to defeat. The losses generally reflected tax or economic

woes.

Bush, in one of his gloomiest assessments, said he was extremely concerned that the economy was faltering. He said he would consult with economists in and out of the government on the blow and stimulate growth.

Even before the election, Republicans were heavily outnumbered in Congress, and their losses Tuesday will make it harder for Bush to win veto battles and push a legislative agenda.

But Bush said the results won't tie my hands at all in dealing with lawmakers, signaling that he would use last congressional history in the next two years.

"When you extend the hand (of cooperation), somebody else has to reach out and shake it," Bush said.

He said he would appeal for Democratic support for his policies, but warned:

"I'm going to use the veto so as to stop a lot of bad things from happening in this country. I am more determined than ever to use it."

Bush abandoned his politically popular no-new-tax pledge during negotiations with Congress to reduce the massive budget deficits.

To the dismay of many Republicans, the deal Bush approved for fiscal 1991 includes \$140 billion in

new taxes.

House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, a Democrat, said Wednesday there's support among Democrats for a surtax on millionaires, one of the provisions omitted from the budget deal.

Bush said that if Democrats want higher taxes, "we're in for a whole of a fight and the proffered hand (of conciliation) may miss the shake because we're not going to compromise on that."

Navy considers mothballing battleships

WASHINGTON — The Navy is weighing a plan to mothball its last two active battleships, an admiralty told Congress on Thursday.

The commander of the Naval Sea Systems Command told a House subcommittee about the possible decision shortly after congressional investigators recommended that the Navy decommission the two World War II-era ships, the USS Missouri and the USS Wisconsin, unless they can demonstrate needed capability found nowhere else.

"I can tell you that it is under discussion," said Vice Adm. Peter M. Hekman Jr.

The USS Wisconsin is in the Persian Gulf as part of the U.S. military buildup to thwart Iraqi aggression. The USS Missouri has been conducting exercises off San Clemente Island in the Pacific Ocean.

Worker tears shuttle telescope blanket

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — A protective blanket over part of an astronomical observatory aboard the space shuttle Columbia was torn when a worker accidentally knocked a metal pan into it, NASA said Thursday.

The mishap was not expected to affect Columbia's astronomy mission, which is set to begin Dec. 15, NASA spokesman. The accident occurred Wednesday as the worker was moving a platform that provides access to Columbia's cargo bay, she said.

Brain activity offered as abortion guide

IOWA CITY, Iowa — A philosopher proposes applying the same legal standards to abortions as widely used in determining if a person is dead — is the surgeon's brain waves?

A model law proposed at an international conference in Iowa City, called the Uniform Determination of Life Protection Act, would permit abortion of a fetus until the 70th day, or 10th week, after conception.

Hans-Martin Sass of the Kennedy Institute of Ethics said that after the 70th day, the fetus should be protected human life because it then begins developing a brain capable of determining individual characteristics and thought processes.

"The absence of brain-specific cells in early embryonic development could be understood as the absence of brain-life," he said. In that case, "abortion of inanimate life must be legally protected."

Panel members have tobacco ties

NEW YORK — Six of the 16 members of a newly appointed Environmental Protection Agency panel considering the health risks of second-hand cigarette smoke have ties to a tobacco industry research organization, documents show.

A seventh member of the panel was appointed upon the recommendation of the Philip Morris tobacco company, EPA officials said.

"They've stacked the deck with people who have close ties to the tobacco industry," said Dr. Alan Blum, a founder of the anti-smoking group Doctors Ought to Care. "It's pathetic."

Export boom could soften recession

WASHINGTON — The U.S. economy, if it does topple into a recession, will be cushioned by an export boom in foreign demand for chemicals, aircraft and scientific equipment, a trade group said Thursday.

The National Association of Manufacturers said a survey of 120 of its member companies found their expected exports to double from 10 percent of their total sales to 20 percent by 1993.

An export boom has accounted for more than one-third of total economic growth in the country since 1985, American companies have benefited from a weaker dollar, which has boosted demand for U.S. products overseas.

Boy Scouts may face discrimination suit

LOS ANGELES — A judge's ruling has cleared the way for a homosexual man to proceed with a discrimination lawsuit against the Boy Scouts of America and its national policy banning homosexuals as poor role models.

Timothy Curran, 29, was asked to leave the Scouts in 1980 when he took a young man to his senior prom. He filed his lawsuit in 1981 when his bid to return as an adult leader was rejected.

Curran, a free-lance television editor and former Eagle Scout, said he wants to serve as a scout leader and is not seeking monetary damages.

WASHINGTON (AP) — New York Reps. Chuck Schumer and Stephen Solarz won re-election with 80 percent of the vote, but they might already be thinking about their next jobs.

Redistricting could put them out of work in 1992.

The once-a-decade debate now begins to heat up. House districts need to be erased in 13 states that lost population in the 1980s.

In the big-ego, ambition-filled world of politics, that won't be easy. The decisions will be made next year, in most cases by state legislatures.

If history is any guide, members of Congress who could be affected by the plans will have considerable input—in person and through contributions to state lawmakers who draft the plans.

"The thing we fear most is being thrown into a district with another colleague," Rep. Henry Hyde, R-Ill., said last year.

"We are all the tender mercy of those whose agendas are not necessarily our own."

In most states losing seats, including all losing more than one, power of redistricting is shared between Democrats and Republicans. That generally means the losses or at least the risk of losses, will be shared, too.

Because available census data — ostensibly the guide for redistricting — is preliminary and the process so complex, it's difficult to say with any certainty who will be squeezed out or forced into a race with another incumbent. And retirements or bids for other office would affect the outcome.

Here is a state-by-state look at early speculation among consultants for both parties.

New York (-3): A Republican district update likely will be eliminated, probably Rep. Bill Paxton. And two districts in New York City are vulnerable, leading to specu-

lation that Brooklyn districts represented by Schumer and Solarz could be merged.

But the possibilities are nearly endless in the 20-district city.

Queens Democrat James Scheuer will be 72 in 1992 and could retire or be squeezed out. Democrats Schumer or Solarz might challenge Republican Sen. Alfonse D'Amato.

Pennsylvania (-2): The Pittsburgh and Philadelphia areas each will lose a seat. Several members of the delegation are in their mid-60s; retirements are possible.

Otherwise, Democrat Joseph Kolter's district might be carved up in the west and a Republican incumbent, perhaps Curt Weldon, pitted against a Democratic incumbent, perhaps Thomas E. Scifetta, in the Philadelphia suburbs.

Ohio (-2): A Cleveland-area Democrat, maybe Edward Feighan, and a downstate Republican are vulnerable. Republicans — Clarence Miller and Chalmers Wylie could retire.

Illinois (-2): The Chicago-area seat to be lost is likely to be Dan Rostenkowski or Sidney Yates. If Rostenkowski retires in 1992, he's eligible to keep \$1 million in campaign money. And Yates, who will have been in Congress for 42 years, will be 83 and could call it quits.

The other seat will come from Republican country in the north.

Michigan (-2): Republican William Broomfield will be 70 in two years and might retire. If not, he could end up in a race against fellow Republican Carl Pursell.

The other seat likely will come from the Democratic Detroit area.

Massachusetts (-1): Unless Republican Silvio Conte or Democrat Joe Early retires, a Democrat will be squeezed, perhaps into a race against Rep. Joseph Kennedy.

The prime candidates are Chester Atkins and Ed Markey, both of whom have enemies in the state legislature. Controversial Barney Frank is another possibility.

New Jersey (-1): Democrats

control the pen, so newly elected Republican Rep. Richard Zimmer could be in trouble. But his won't be the easiest district to draw off.

Kentucky (-1): Democrats will draw the lines. Republican Rep. Larry Hopkins looks like the odd man out, forced either to run against a GOP colleague or for another office anyway.

West Virginia (-1): Democrats control the process, but all four House members are Democrats. One will be squeezed out, probably either Alan Mollohan and Barney Stiggers.

Louisiana (-1): Democrats control the process, which likely means bad news for one of the delegation's four Republicans.

Outgoing drug czar: U.S. breaking habit

WASHINGTON (AP) — William J. Bennett had far fewer as drug policy director with characteristic bluster Thursday, boasting Americans have turned against drugs and dismissing an congressional critic as a "bastard."

He allowed that his efforts to rid the nation's capital of drugs didn't work, but said it did help that Mayor Marion Barry, who has been convicted of cocaine possession, was "part of the problem."

Bennett, at a White House send-off with President Bush, denied reports that he had run out of gas or feared for his family's safety as the first director of drug policy.

"I'm not the stampee-out-of-town type," said Bennett, who will actually relinquish his post at the end of the month. Bush said he has not yet settled on a successor.

The president showed Bennett, with praise, saying he had done "an outstanding job for his country" and "his hard work has paid off."


"We're on the road to victory," said Bush, who promised to stay "on the front lines until this scourge is

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Alvin Cranston, D-Calif., said Thursday he has cancer of the prostate and won't seek re-election when his term expires in 1992.

"The physicians tell me that the cancer is apparently totally curable, but immediate treatment is necessary," Cranston said in a statement released by his office. "A positive factor is my otherwise robust health. Whether I face an operation or radi-

ation therapy will be determined shortly," Cranston, 76, also said he would not seek another two-year term as deputy majority leader for the Congress that convenes in January.

Cranston's popularity among voters has plunged since he was named as one of five senators who allegedly intervened with federal regulators on behalf of savings and loan executives Charles Keating, a campaign contributor. The Senate Ethics Committee has been investigating those allegations.

Cranston said the cancer was first detected by the Senate physician during a routine annual physical.

More than 10 million people received amnesty to mark the funeral of Akihito's father, Emperor Hirohito, in February last year.

Rescuers recover helicopter wreckage

ATHENS, Greece — Rescue teams have recovered wreckage from a U.S. Army helicopter that disappeared off the Greek coast on Wednesday.

The U.S. Embassy said Thursday the three crew members remain missing, but a police official in Isthmia, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said human remains were spotted near the crash site 35 miles southwest of Athens.

The UH-1H Huey helicopter crashed in the Saronic Gulf while en route to Hellinikon U.S. Air Force Base, adjacent to Athens International Airport.

The helicopter was on a training mission from the U.S. Army 6th Aviation Detachment based in Vicenza, Italy, said an embassy official, who spoke on condition of anonymity. The official declined to identify the crew.

Dissident is only Indian candidate

NEW DELHI, India — India's two largest political parties declined offers Thursday to name a new prime minister, leaving only the dissident politician who helped unseat the government in the running.

Chandra Shekhar said he has staked his claim to be India's next prime minister in a letter to President Ramaswamy Venkataraman. But Venkataraman, who consulted the nation's leaders throughout Thursday, failed to summon Chandra Shekhar for a meeting, leaving open the possibility he might exercise his option to call an early election.

Chandra Shekhar broke with Prime Minister V.P. Singh's centrist Janata Dal Party, a move which led to the historic no-confidence vote Wednesday that brought down Singh's 11-month-old government.

Poland, Germany plan border treaty

FRANKFURT AM DER ODER, Germany — The leaders of Poland and Germany said Thursday a treaty confirming their present border would be signed soon, settling decades of debate over the frontier and ethnic Germans in Poland.

Chancellor Helmut Kohl made the announcement at his summit with Polish Prime Minister Tadeusz Mazowiecki, their first meeting together since German unification on Oct. 3.

Kohl said the treaty would be signed this month in Warsaw, but did not give a specific date.

"We want this border to bring us closer and not to divide Europe between the developed rich and the poor," said Mazowiecki.

Novelist Lawrence Durrell dies

PARIS — Lawrence Durrell, the British novelist who conveyed his love for Mediterranean life in "The Alexandria Quartet" and other lyrical works, died at his home in southern France, his family said Thursday. He was 78.

The cause of death Wednesday was not disclosed. Durrell had been fatigued for about two weeks, a family member said, and the author said in a 1986 interview that he suffered from emphysema.

"The Alexandria Quartet" consists of four novels set in the Egyptian coastal city where Durrell served as press attaché at the British Embassy in World War II. The works, written from 1957 to 1960, are "Justine," "Balthazar," "Mountolive" and "Clea."

Ireland may elect 1st woman president

DUBLIN, Ireland — A lawyer who favors liberalizing strict laws on birth control and abortion appeared in a strong position Thursday to become Ireland's first woman president, according to partial and unofficial returns.

Mary Robinson trailed former deputy prime minister Brian Lenihan in the preliminary count, but pre-election polls indicated the second round vote likely would put her over the top.

Red Square gunman faces terrorism charge

MOSCOW (AP) — A man who opened fire on Red Square during the Revolution-Day parade has been charged with committing a terrorist act, a spokesman for the KGB secret police said Thursday.

Alexander A. Shimonov, 38, of Leningrad, will undergo psychiatric tests to determine whether he was sane at the time of the shooting Wednesday, said Alexei Kandaurov, deputy director of the KGB public relations office. He gave no other details on the case.

No one was hurt in the incident, in which the man pulled out the hunting rifle in the heavily guarded square about 80 yards from President Mikhail S. Gorbachev. The shooting came during a Communist Party march that followed the military parade.

A plainclothes officer knocked the weapon away as the man fired once into the air and again into the ground, newspapers said. He then was subdued by about 20 plainclothes officers and carried into the GUM department store across the square from Gorbachev.

Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze played down what may have been an assassination attempt, categorically denying that it indicated a loss of public support for Gorbachev's "perestroika" reform policies.

"I don't think this incident should be taken very seriously," Shevardnadze told reporters before meeting with visiting Secretary of State James A. Baker III. "This is a huge country where something is always happening somewhere."

Some of the nearly 5,000 anti-government protesters chant before Wednesday's march

Shimonov was interrogated and spoke in detail about his preparations for the act, the official Tass news agency quoted KGB investigator Pyotr Sokolov as saying.

Soviet Deputy Prosecutor Janis Danilits on Thursday sanctioned Shimonov's arrest, Tass reported. Shimonov is charged with committing "an attempted terrorist act," the news agency quoted Sokolov as saying.

part by one newspaper that the gunman was carrying a light explosive in addition to the rifle.

The conservative labor newspaper Trud said Shimonov was carrying a small explosive usually used for military reorganizations that could cause no serious damage.

Kandaurov said the man was carrying at least one device, but added that laboratory tests would have to confirm whether it was an explosive.

"It is hard to tell now whom he was aiming at," Trud said. "But one thing is clear: If it were not for the immediate reaction of a policeman, who succeeded in knocking the gun into the air, a disaster might have happened."

KGB chief Vladimir Kryuchkov indicated Wednesday night that officials believed the man was deranged.

Shimonov is being held in the KGB's isolation ward, Tass reported.

Analysts: Sacked Iraqi general opposed occupation of Kuwait

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Saddam Hussein has dismissed his military chief of staff for opposing the occupation of Kuwait and analysts said Thursday the move indicated growing dissension in his armed forces hierarchy.

The Iraqi army's al-Qadisiya daily reported Thursday that Lt. Gen. Nazif al-Khazraji, chief of staff since 1983, was replaced by Gen. Hussein Rashid, commander of the elite 120,000-strong Republican Guards force.

The newspaper did not say what happened to Khazraji or when he was dismissed.

But several Western military and intelligence sources said Khazraji opposed the Kuwait occupation. They also believe Saddam might be seeking to surround himself with relatives and loyalists as the standoff with the multinational gulf force enters its fourth month.

A Western intelligence source, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Rashid is a hard-liner in Iraq's Baath Socialist Party who would be expected to support Saddam's policies. Rashid had been Khazraji's deputy chief of staff for operations.

U.S. officials in Washington said Rashid is considered a "very competent" commander and led an armored brigade in the 1980-88 war against Iran.

"It's very ominous," said Hans Helms, Kopetzky, a former analyst with London's International Institute for Strategic Studies who is now with Control Risks, an international security firm in London.

Khazraji's dismissal now is indicative of some opposition to Saddam within the military, Kopetzky said in a telephone interview.

U.S. officials, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Khazraji was named a special military adviser to Saddam in what was seen as a de-

motion. Al-Qadisiya mentioned Rashid's new title in a report of a graduation ceremony he attended at Baghdad's military academy Wednesday.

The shakeup comes amid increasingly tough U.S. and British warnings they might use force to dislodge the Iraqis from Kuwait.

"Saddam's taking a big gamble," said analyst Shabtai Shavit of the Geneva-based Graduate Institute of International Affairs and author of several books on the Gulf War.

Some analysts said Rashid's appointment was in part designed to keep the Republican Guards on Saddam's side.

The guards, considered to be Iraq's best troops, led the Aug. 2 invasion of Kuwait.

"The rest of the army may be neutralized. But the Republican guards with the multinational gulf force are the country below the road, is national suicide," said Bernard Trainor, a former U.S. Marine general who has visited Iraq several times.

"As he lightens up, he's gathering around him all the hard-liners and sycophants who are afraid to challenge him," said Trainor, who heads the national security program at Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government.

Rashid is believed to hail from Tikrit, Saddam's birthplace north of Baghdad. Saddam has packed the hierarchy of the Baath Socialist Party with relatives, by blood or marriage, who come mainly from Tikrit clans.

Rashid's appointment is the second known top-level change in Baghdad in the past two weeks. Gen. Minister Issam Chalabi was fired Oct. 28 and replaced by Brig. Gen. Hussein Kamel, Saddam's cousin and son-in-law. Kamel is also Minister of Industry and Military Industrialization and is believed to

head Saddam's internal security apparatus. Kamel, a Tikriti, has been responsible for developing Iraq's arms industry and producing new surface-to-surface missiles.

Beefed-up Saudi forces still no match for Iraq

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (AP) — Despite spending billions of dollars on air defenses and anti-tank weapons and plans to double the size of its army, Saudi Arabia still will be unable to fend off a full-scale Iraqi attack alone.

Unless Saddam Hussein's formidable military machine is crippled in the gulf confrontation, that means a sizeable Western military presence will almost certainly have to remain in the region for some time to come.

The Saudis have spent an estimated \$1.5 billion on advanced weapons systems over the past decade. But they were unable to take on Saddam's million-strong military juggernaut when it crushed Kuwait in August and appeared to threaten the Saudis' own desert kingdom.

King Fahd had invited the U.S. and allied help to protect a country which contains Islam's holiest shrines, despite an outcry by some Moslem hard-liners.

The crisis has benefited the Saudis inasmuch as the threat to their oil fields overcame the pro-Israel lobby in the U.S. Congress, which for years blocked the sale of state-of-the-art weaponry to Riyadh on the grounds it was technically at war with Israel.

Now the Americans have pledged to sell the Saudis some \$20 billion worth of sophisticated hardware, including F-15 C/D Eagle fighters, Patriot missiles, 350 M1A2 Abrams tanks and 500 Bradley Fighting Vehicles.

But even after delivery of the new arsenal over the next two or three years, analysts say the Saudis will be unable to take on Saddam alone, if he's still around.

The Saudi defense plan relied on being able to hold the attackers off for long enough to get outside assistance," said Nadav Safran, a professor of Middle East studies at Harvard University.

"When Saddam's troops marched into Kuwait, the Saudis realized that even after five decades of beefing up their defenses, they still didn't have the capacity to hold him off, even for a few days," said Safran, who is the author of "Saudi Arabia: The Ceaseless Quest for Security."

King Fahd and his defense minister, Prince Sultan, are planning to more than double the size of the 65,000-man regular Saudi armed forces, which is supported by a 56,000-man National Guard.

It is unclear where the recruits will come from.

Twin Falls beats odds, wins grant for housing

TWIN FALLS — Despite misplacing a letter and getting its application in on the last day, the city of Twin Falls has won a \$4,000 low-income housing grant.

Besides Twin Falls, Nampa received \$112,000 and Pocatello won \$44,500, according to the office of Gov. Cecil Andrus. A total of \$220,500 was available to Idaho cities through the U.S. Department of Urban Renewal.

The grant money is to be used to improve rental housing for low- and moderate-income households while allowing property owners to hold down rent increases. The city will choose which property owners get money, Twin Falls City Manager Tom Courtney said.

When the city applied for a similar grant before, only two or three neighborhoods would have qualified for the money. The grant's standards defining low income are fairly restrictive, Courtney said.

Unless the 1990 census data come in, the city probably will use 1980 figures in choosing areas that most need the money.

The city applied for the grant in mid-September. A letter from the state describing the grant program and inviting the city to apply was misplaced in City Planner Lanny Orton's filing cabinet but he managed to get a duplicate application in on time.

Courtney said Thursday that the Idaho Migrant Council is interested in getting some of the money.

H&W director will face drunken driving charge

HELENA — Richard L. Rich, Donovan's director of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare, will be prosecuted for drunken driving charges, Blaine County officials say.

Donovan, 40, of Boise, was arrested Oct. 5, three miles south of Ketchum on Idaho Highway 75. Sheriff Walt Fleming said Monday that test results recently received show Donovan's blood-alcohol level was above the legal limit of 0.10 percent.

Donovan has pleaded innocent, and his attorney, John Ohman of Idaho Falls, said Monday he thinks the case "is defensible." But Ohman would not say how he would handle the case.

He said Donovan is hoping for a trial date within a couple of weeks. The Health and Welfare director has been on leave from his job since shortly after his arrest.

A motion from the defense to disqualify 3rd-District Magistrate Daniel Alban from the case was granted recently, and Magistrate John Varin was being appointed in his place, Ohman said.

Crossroads of Idaho wins variance for large sign

JEROME — At a special Planning and Zoning Commission meeting Thursday, crossroads of Idaho was granted a variance to the Jerome County ordinance to allow a 600-square-foot sign to be installed 80 feet above ground.

Located at the intersection of Interstate 84 and U.S. Highway 93, Crossroads of Idaho is a new truck stop scheduled to open Dec. 3.

County ordinance prohibits signs more than 30 feet tall.

Approval of the sign had been delayed because the commission had not had a quorum at the past two meetings. The delay had caused some doubt as to whether the sign could be constructed and put up on time for the opening day, according to Ron Stanley, part owner and contractor.

The sign needed to be 80 feet in the air so it is visible to east bound traffic, Rex Lytle, of Lytle Signs, Twin Falls, said at an October public hearing.

No objections to the sign were presented at the hearing.

Gooding may shun regional landfill

TWIN FALLS — Gooding County probably will not join other Magic Valley counties in a regional landfill.

The reason comes down to money, said Gooding County Commissioner Bob Tupper. The county can ship its garbage to the Mountain Home landfill for less money than joining a regional effort, he said.

Preliminary cost estimates for Gooding County to join a regional landfill plan range from \$24.85 a ton to \$47.15 a ton. Although Mountain Home has not quoted a

price, Tupper said the commissioners there assured him they could beat the one for joining a regional landfill plan.

"I'm sure it would be cheaper there than it would be over here," Tupper said Wednesday.

Mountain Home has about 900 acres for its landfill with 35 to 40 feet of soil, Tupper said. The landfill probably will last a long time.

The Gooding County landfill is about the same distance — 64 miles — from the one in Mountain Home as it is from the one in Twin Falls County, Tupper said. Gooding would not have its own trucks to transport

the garbage. They either would be leased or contracted out.

Gooding County now pays \$60,000 a year to have garbage buried at its landfill. If the county ships garbage to Mountain Home it probably would build a transfer station where garbage would be put into trucks for the journey to the landfill.

Tupper said Gooding County probably will not start shipping to Mountain Home until the federal Subtitle D regulations come on line. The regulations have been expected for a couple of years but have not come out yet.

Subtitle D probably will require landfills

to have plastic liners under them to prevent contaminants from leaching into groundwater. The regulations probably will make the cost of burying garbage much more expensive.

Tupper said the Gooding County landfill is directly over the Hoggeman water supply. That landfill almost certainly will have to be closed when Subtitle D comes on line.

Tupper said he would happily take suggestions from Gooding County residents who might have a better solution to the garbage problem. Tupper's home phone number is 837-4862.

Potato crop sets record; yields down

TWIN FALLS — Yes, Idaho did end up with a record potato production this year, despite a cold spring and a hot summer that together reduced yields by about four 100-pound sacks per acre.

According to the Idaho Agricultural Statistics Service, the state's potato production is expected to total 112.3 million sacks, surpassing the previous record of 102.6 million sacks set in 1988.

The increase in production was due to a record 393,000 acres harvested in 1990. Statewide yield was 286 sacks per acre, the lowest since 1984. Yield in the 10 southwestern counties, at 395 sacks, is unchanged from 1989.

But in Idaho's other counties, yield is estimated at 280 sacks, down five sacks from 1989.

Nationally, fall potato production is forecast at 342 million sacks, up 5 percent from last year and 9 percent above two years ago.

Sugar beet production for Idaho is projected at 4.68 million tons, compared with 4.04 million tons in 1989. Yield, at 25 tons per acre, is up 2.2 tons from last year. Harvested acres are forecast at 187,000, up from last year's 177,000.

Nationally, sugar beet production is forecast at 27 million tons, 8 percent above last year's production. The increase resulted from higher yields and a 6 percent increase.

Economic growth slow, report finds

BOISE — An index gauging Idaho's economic growth tumbled 0.7 percent in September, but it is unclear whether the decline means the lagging U.S. economy is affecting the state, First Security Corp. said.

"It's possible that some of the national weakness may be beginning to rub off," Kelly Matthews, chief economist for the Salt Lake City-based bank-holding company, said Wednesday.

But at the same time, it might be a one-month drop like we had in February and June," Matthews said. "Probably a little of both makes sense."

Five of the index's 11 indicators fell in September, below the previous month's figures. The index is adjusted for inflation and seasonal factors.

Auto loans and sales, non-residential construction values and new non-cultural job openings all declined, Matthews said, while consumer loan delinquencies rose.

First Security said the Idaho drop was nearly as large as September's 0.8 percent decline in the U.S. economy's vigor and was the state's lowest monthly gain in the past year.

On Wednesday, the Idaho Division of Financial Management said it had lowered its estimates for the state's economy through 1992. It cited a Massachusetts forecasting

Hagerman official sees training need

HAGERMAN — City office workers need to have more adequate accounting training, says City Auditor Robert Poulsen.

Over the past five years, the city has had problems in identifying funds, he told the City Council on Wednesday. The treasurers know how much total cash there is, but they are unable to figure the cash balances of individual funds, Poulsen explained, and computer records for the auditor are inadequate.

"We spent five days trying to find out what the cash balance is," he said, noting

that discrepancies in the records covered a \$30,000 spread.

He added that the auditing fee of \$3,240 does not include the extra work that has to be done.

Other accounting problems are caused by confusing, improper money transfers, Poulsen said.

City Clerk Coletta Lloyd has not been trained well enough to handle the city's automated accounting system, he said. "Prior personnel was not trained well enough either," he said.

At Poulsen's suggestion, council members agreed to hire a secretary from the auditor's office in Gooding to train Lloyd for

10 days, in the afternoons after City Hall is closed.

Poulsen said the city's computer and software system is adequate, but the clerk needs to learn how city budgets are operated and how those records must be kept on the computer.

Lloyd, who was hired in September, said she is willing to take the training. Poulsen said the ultimate responsibility for the city audit falls on the council.

"Training has got to be provided," he said. "Figures on cost of the training or when it will be scheduled was not decided."

Residents join forces to ask for larger calling area

Bliss will use grant from family to build covered picnic structure

BLISS — A \$500 grant the city received from the family of a former councilmember will be used to build a covered picnic area, in accordance with the family's wishes.

The family of Fern Cernusca donated \$500 to the city in her honor after her death in 1988, and asked

that it be spent on a covered picnic area or on playground equipment for the city park.

The family came before the council during its last meeting to ask why nothing had been done with the money yet.

Councilwoman Charlene Thompson told the council that she has arranged to have a metal-roofed picnic structure built east of the tennis

court. The materials and construction will cost \$500.

Thompson and Mayor Roland Zollerger discussed the possibility of having a city building project in the spring of 1991 to pour a concrete slab around the structure. No decision was made on that proposal.

The city has granted an easement permit to Nevada Cement, a manufacturer and wholesale com-

pany in Bliss, for a cement storage tower.

Mayor Zollerger asked the City Council for its approval for a 2-foot easement for the tower, which will be used to hold blocks. Zollerger said the tower will allow Nevada Cement to load trucks faster and attract new business. He added that the cement company brings in "an awful lot of trade" to the city.

The council discussed Union Pa-

cific Railroad's proposed rent-increase for the city's water system.

The new contract would raise the rent the city pays for the water tower, the pipelines east of town and the water pump used to pump city water, all of which belong to Union Pacific. The new contract calls for a \$500 annual fee, up from \$300, or a one-time fee of \$2,300.

The council agreed to the one-time charge of \$2,300, providing that the

new rental contract specifies that there will be no further cost to the city.

In other business, Teri Ferry of Bliss was approved by the City Council as the new City Council member. She will replace Keith Benschoter, who has left the area.

An American flag was donated to the city by John Moline of Bliss. The flag was given to Moline by Congressman Richard Santorum.

Anti-abortion losers say position hurt them

Idaho

BOISE (AP) — The state Senate architect of Idaho's controversial but vetoed anti-abortion bill and a Republican Senate leader who strongly backed that bill conceded on Thursday that their positions were the catalyst for their narrow defeat in the polls this week.

"I do think I need to apologize," said freshman Republican Roger Madsen of Boise. "It mobilized \$30,000 and a hundred foot soldiers."

Republican Floor Leader Rod Beck of Boise agreed his strong support for the bill "fueled the opposition. It was the catalyst for an army of volunteers."

Madsen, the chief Senate sponsor of the National Right to Life bill that

Princetone Gov. Cecil Andrus vetoed in March after a divisive legislative battle, lost by 68 votes to pro-choice Boise minister Cynthia Scanlin, who announced her candidacy at a pro-choice rally last winter.

And Beck lost to Sally Snodgrass by 238 votes. Both women said the incumbent's position on abortion was the factor that made them enter the race last spring.

But the two ousted incumbents maintained that abortion was not the major issue in their losses, contending to write in candidates protesting former Right-To-Work coordinator Gary Glenn for an

County Commission seat brought out organized labor that then voted for Democrats.

They also pointed to the massive financial support both Scanlin and Snodgrass received from the Idaho Education Association. The IEA put over \$30,000 into the two races, allowing the challengers to dramatically outpace the Republicans.

But Madsen acknowledged that despite a 93 percent rating on education issues by the teachers' union, he was denied its endorsement because of his leadership on the abortion bill.

And while Beck maintained the media was misinterpreting his and Madsen's losses as referendum on the abortion issue, Republican House

Speaker Tom Boyd of Genesee said the outcome of Tuesday's election statewide suggested differently.

Boyd, who opposed what would have been the nation's most restrictive abortion law in last winter's debate, said if the issue was submitted to voters in a neutral fashion "Idaho would be pro-choice."

"People said Republicans were probably going to suffer because of their position on abortion, and I think some took their lumps," Boyd said.

As a result of the 1990 campaign, the state Senate, where the abortion bill passed on a 25-17 vote in March, now has 24 members opposed to that kind of legislation.

Court rules on fraud

BOISE (AP) — Someone seeking to claim damages on the basis of fraud must show damage as a direct result of the fraud, the Idaho Court of Appeals says.

The court upheld lower court rulings in favor of American States Insurance Co. against Bryant Motors, Inc., over the sale of a bus to the school district at St. Maries.

"In order to secure relief on a basis of fraud, the party seeking redress must have been damaged, injured or harmed as a result of the asserted fraud," the court said Thursday. "A false representation which causes no loss is not actionable."

Bryant sued the bonding agent for North American Diesel, Inc. over a joint venture in which the diesel company built a bus chassis and Bryant supplied the body for a bus sold to the school district.

Education groups find no quick fix

LEWISTON (AP) — Two statewide education reform groups agree there is no "quick fix" for problems facing Idaho's public schools, but each is developing a list of proposed long-term actions to give lawmakers next year.

The Governor's Task Force on the Future of Education in Idaho was formed last spring by Gov. Cecil Andrus and Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans.

A group of teachers, parents and other citizens from throughout the state was chosen to evaluate the state's public school program, decide what improvements are needed and develop a strategy for making the changes.

Later last spring, a group of corporations formed the Idaho Education Project and hired education consultants to gather similar information and draft an action plan and recommendations to give to legislators.

Surprisingly, an Idaho Education Project researcher said, business people, teachers and parents have virtually identical ideas about what schools should be like in the future.

A "higher order" of basic skills will be needed to keep up with an ever-increasing demand for knowledge, said Dr. Eric Zarnitsky, who is on leave from the Boise State University English Department to work on the project.

"Students need to be competent in these areas more than ever before," Ms. Zarnitsky said.

She said 500 people surveyed from 10 Idaho communities identified five different areas included in the "higher order" basic skills.

Rape perjury draws jail time

MOSCOW (AP) — A 19-year-old Troy woman has been sentenced to 72 days in the Latah County Jail for falsely testifying that two men raped her.

The two migrant workers Angela Jean Stephens accused of the crime spent 78 days behind bars before Latah County Prosecutor Craig Mossman dropped the charges against them.

A deputy prosecutor argued Wednesday that Ms. Stephens should serve 156 days in jail — as many as the total served by the men she falsely accused.

Robin Eckman said the stories of true rape victims would be viewed with skepticism because of Ms. Stephens' false testimony.

"She deserves to be punished," Ms. Eckman said. "The message needs to go out that this type of conduct is criminal."

Federal official approves Indian bingo on reservations in Idaho

BOISE (AP) — The Department of the Interior's top lawyer says as far as the federal agency is concerned, Indian bingo is legal in Idaho.

Interior Solicitor Thomas L. Sansonetti argued state legal officials that a review of the issue has produced the same result as the first time around, although on different grounds.

Some of Idaho's five Indian tribes have launched on-reservation bingo operations, but they are not authorized under the federal Indian

Gaming Regulatory Act. State officials, headed by Attorney General Jim Jones and Gov. Cecil Andrus, contend the games are not legal, because of the state constitutional prohibition on gambling.

In April, the Portland regional solicitor for Interior concluded that since Idaho amended its Constitution to authorize the state lottery, Idaho Indian tribes can "engage in, or license and regulate" bingo games.

Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan met with Andrus and other officials

in May, and Andrus requested a review of the issue.

"Based on our latest review, we have concluded that Idaho tribes can lawfully engage in bingo games pursuant to the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act," said a letter from Sansonetti to Clive Strong, chief of the Natural Resources Division of the attorney general's office.

"What it says is that Indian bingo is legal," Strong said.

A spokesman for Gov. Cecil Andrus said Wednesday the governor was aware of the opinion, and dis-

puted with it.

"You could say that at the very least, he was disappointed in the decision," said Press Secretary Marco Johnson. (Manuel Lujan personally wrote to him (the governor) about it a couple of different occasions. Certainly he left the impression that the opinion would not come down as it did," he said.

"The governor thought it was a clear-cut case and he was led to believe that Interior would think the same way," Johnson said.

He said it would be up to the st-

torney general to decide whether to pursue legal action over the issue.

The basic question, Sansonetti said, is whether Idaho, as a matter of public policy, "permits" bingo for any purpose. He noted that state laws now allow a state-run lottery.

There also are numerous games of bingo played regularly across the state, although the legal validity of those games is disputed," he said.

The state attorney general's office maintains that the so-called "don't touch bingo" where the participant is requested but not required to pay a requisite to participation is legal but strict "pay for play" bingo games are illegal," he said.

authorizing bingo games.

"The state attorney general's office maintains that these games are illegal. However, there is no evidence that the state has taken any enforcement action against any bingo game operated in violation of state law," Sansonetti said.

Idaho's new gambling statute allows "charitable games of chance by qualified charitable organizations." The federal official said under the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, that also authorizes Indians to operate bingo games.

The federal official said his research found no distinction between "charitable" and "pay for play" bingo games.

Suspect spits on attorney during trial

SPOKANE (AP) — A man convicted of one Spokane murder and arrested in another was ordered removed from court after he spat for his court-appointed defense attorney and threw a cup of water at him.

Later, when defendant Damon Chapple was given a choice between behaving in court or watching the proceedings on a television monitor in an adjoining room, he chose at Spokane County Superior Court Judge Kathleen O'Connor.

Chapple was herded from the courtroom by six deputies.

Every day you come to get his (Chapple) spitting in the blood," he said while leaving the courtroom.

The outburst occurred Wednesday, the third day of jury selection in Chapple's first-degree murder trial.

He is charged in the death of 27-year-old Isabel Jones, who was sexually assaulted and beaten to death in August 1978 at an apartment complex she managed on Spokane's South Hill.

During jury selection Wednesday,

Chapple said he wanted to fire the attorney, Richard Kayne, for insubordinately representing him and other reasons.

Then, Chapple suddenly spat on Kayne and threw a cup of drinking water on the attorney before the judge intervened and ordered the defendant removed.

After a noon recess, O'Connor said the trial would continue despite the outburst.

California adopts tests for pollution

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — California will begin testing random roadside testing next spring of diesel smoke from heavy trucks and buses under a program adopted Thursday by the state Air Resources Board.

The program, approved 7-1, will apply to all such vehicles in the state regardless of where they are registered.

It asks "truck and bus operators to do more than just change of gas-line-powered cars have done since 1984 through the Smog Check program," said the board's executive officer, Jim Boyd.

The program requires the testing and repairing — if necessary — of gasoline-powered passenger cars every two years. The state already has two programs to control diesel emissions.

Officials declare victory in Medfly war

EL MONTE, Calif. (AP) — Agriculture officials Thursday declared victory over the Mediterranean fruit fly, a crop-destroying insect that has taken California 15 months and \$52 million to eradicate.

"We're here to eradicate that we have eradicated the Medfly in California. Unless there is another introduction, it will remain eradicated," said Dick Parnell, deputy secretary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Parnell joined state agriculture chief Henry Voss at a news conference in pronouncing victory and lifting of a quarantine.

"Traps will continue to be placed throughout the area to detect any new arrivals."

The arrival of illegal fruit and vegetables, usually carried in travelers' luggage, virtually ensures future infestations, one official said in an interview last weekend.

"There is some perverse streak in

human nature. They seem to believe it's fun to outsmart authorities and bring in just one mango or just one pineapple from Hawaii," said Gary Curry, spokesman for the state Department of Food and Agriculture. "All it takes is one person."

Quarantines were imposed on movement of fruit from infested areas. The big worry was that the flies could spread to a agricultural area and wreck California's \$18 billion-a-year farm industry.

Fusion researcher responds to 'furor'

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A University of Utah scientist who claims to have discovered a cold fusion energy process said Thursday his "sterile form" was unfortunate.

Dr. Fritz Pons checked reports in Wednesday's his first appearance in Utah in weeks. He issued a statement to reporters the next day, when he met with an advisory council evaluating his work and related research.

Pons and colleague Martin Fleischmann caused a stir when they missed a council meeting two weeks ago and left Utah, apparently not making their destinations known to officials of the university or the university's National Cold Fusion Institute.

Fleischmann returned to his home in Tisbury, England, for medical treatment and did not return for the review, said Fritz Will, director of the state-funded institute.

"Obviously, the fact that we did

not publish our itinerary seems to have caused considerable distress to some people, which is regrettable," Pons said in a news release.

Pons called the commotion over his disappearance a "sterile furor" and said he spent the time "traveling."

He met with the Fusion Energy Advisory Council, Council chairman Raymond Hixson said. Pons has made research advances that are the basis of a ninth patent application on cold fusion.





Marcy Bros. looking for major boost from new record company

JACKPOT — Not long ago, the Marcy Bros. carved themselves a corner of country music history when the group made the pages of "Tiger Beat" magazine. It usually the domain of pop and TV, as such as New Kids on the Block and Fred "Weezer" Weave. But a recent contest in the magazine offered fans the chance to meet the Marcy's.

In addition to teen adulation, the Marcy's won good reviews for their first major label album, "Mending Your Mind." The video for the single's first single, "Cotton Pickin' Time," still ranks among country music's top-requested clips more than a year after its release.

In a recent interview, Kendal Marcy, the trio's youngest at 22, spoke with enthusiasm about the Marcy's recent decision to move from Warner Bros., which released its first album, "Mending Your Mind," to a new record company, a conglomerate, but Marcy said there are striking differences between the two labels.

Warner Bros. has many of country's biggest names on its roster, Hank Williams Jr., Highway 101, Nashville, Travis and Dwight Yoakam, among others. "There's only so many hours in the day," Marcy said. "And the more artists there are on the roster, the harder it is to spend the individual time, especially breaking the artists into the market. At Warner, we're relatively new labels to Nashville, but we have the cover of 'Tiger Beat' magazine, and the best-known artist in its

line-up is 1960s rocker Billy Joe Royal, who is now turning up for a concert at the Cactus Pete's Gala Show on Dec. 26.

"They've only six or seven people actively on the roster, whereas Warner has 42," Marcy said. "You can just see that the ability to market an act is much simpler because you don't have so many."

The Marcy Bros. also feel fortunate that they have captured the vital agent market, Marcy said, and broke through in that initial push. "Marcy said, 'Obviously we feel very fortunate to be involved in that initial push.' Marcy said, 'I don't know how to react to this. It's just really funny. American picture book for children) New York, a town much like that depicted in the book. "The first time I went to this post office, I had to step over a huge dog as I went through the entrance," Shulevitz recalled.

Like many small-town post-offices, Toddlercreek's is a place where few packages are mailed, but many friendships are made and many tales are told until one day when the several of which "post" inspector arrives and announces the "end" of the post office due to lack of business.

Shulevitz said the book represents a variety of "things" the kind of America with "soul" and "The story has a sad quality, but Shulevitz defends it. "I had certain wishes. Shulevitz said he does not usually read his stories to children before he submits them to

In addition to writing and illustrating children's books, he teaches other people to do so in a two-week workshop he conducts each year at Harvard College in Orono, N.Y., and has written a book on the subject.

For celebrities there's no such thing as being too bad

"The Donald" was just an ordinary millionaire until his "friendship" with Maria Magdalene set off a reporter feeding frenzy. Wrecked, he became a star.

On the surface, it seems to work this way. The Dickeyman has rocketed Andrew

D. Clay above his fellow rude-and-crude comedians into celestial stardom, while innocent Andrew keeps insisting, he's not at all like that bad guy.

There is such a thing as being too bad, but don't think that means the public has grown tired of these real-life soap operas.

For some in Hollywood, even a cool "he-murder rap" isn't bad enough to boost up their status for a bad rap. "You know women who get me on TV at the Christian Brando murder trial, come up to me at nightclubs and say, 'Can you give me a Christian's phone number?'

Yeah, babe, sure," said Phil Ramey, one of

Los Angeles' most infamous celebrity paparazzi.

During the heyday of the studio system, publicists manufactured private lives for the stars, with studio chiefs going so far as arranging marriages for their stable of actors and actresses. Federal official approves Indian bingo on reservations in Idaho

BOISE (AP) — The Department of the Interior's top lawyer says in a new federal agency decision that Indian bingo is legal in Idaho.

Interior Solicitor Thomas L. Sansonetti informed state legal officials that a review of the issue has produced the same result as the first time around, although on different grounds.

Some of Idaho's five Indian tribes have launched on-reservation bingo games, contending they are authorized under the federal Indian

Gaming Regulatory Act. State officials, headed by Attorney General Jim Jones and Gov. Cecil Andrus, contend the games are not legal, because of the state constitutional prohibition on gambling.

In April, the Portland regional solicitor for Interior concluded that since Idaho amended its Constitution to authorize the state lottery, Idaho Indian tribes can "engage in, or license and regulate" bingo games.

Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan met with Andrus and other officials

in May, and Andrus requested a review on the issue.

"Based on our latest review, we have concluded that Idaho tribes can lawfully engage in bingo games pursuant to the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act," said a letter from Sansonetti to Clive Strong, chief of the Natural Resources Division of the attorney general's office.

"What it says is that Indian bingo is legal," Strong said.

A spokesman for Gov. Cecil Andrus said Wednesday the governor was aware of the opinion, and disap-

pointed with it.

"You could say that at the very least, he was disappointed in the decision," said Press Secretary Marc Johnson. "(Manual) Lujan personally spoke to him (the governor) about it on a couple of different occasions. Certainly he left the impression that the opinion would not come down as it did," he said.

"The governor thought it was a clearcut case and he was led to believe that Interior would think the same way," Johnson said.

He said it would be up to the at-

torney general to decide whether to pursue legal action over the issue.

"The basic question, Sansonetti said, is whether Idaho, as a matter of public policy, 'permits' bingo for any purpose." He noted that state laws now allow a state-run lottery.

"There also are numerous games of bingo played regularly across the state, although the legal validity of those games is disputed," he said.

"The state attorney general's office maintains that the so-called 'donation' bingo, where the participant is requested but not required to pay as a prerequisite to participation, is legal but strict 'pay for play' bingo games are illegal," he said.

authorizing bingo games.

"The state attorney general's office maintains that these games are illegal. However, there is no evidence that the state has taken any enforcement action against any bingo game operated in violation of state law," Sansonetti said.

Idaho's new gambling statute allows "charitable games of chance" by qualified charitable organizations. The federal officials said under the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, that also authorizes Indians to operate bingo games.

The federal official said his research found no distinction between "donation" and "pay for play" bingo games.

Suspect spits on attorney during trial

SPOKANE (AP) — A man convicted of one Spokane murder and on trial in another was ordered removed from court after he spat on his court-appointed defense attorney and threw a cup of water at him.

Later, when defendant Damon Chapple was given a choice between behaving in court or watching the proceedings on a television monitor in an adjoining room, he cursed at Spokane County Superior Court Judge Kathleen O'Connor.

Chapple was herded from the courtroom by six deputies.

"Every day you come to get me (in jail) there's got to be blood," he said while leaving the courtroom.

The outburst occurred Wednesday, the third day of jury selection in Chapple's first-degree murder trial.

He is charged in the death of 57-year-old Isabel Jones, who was sexually assaulted and beaten to death in August 1988 at an apartment complex she managed on Spokane's South Hill.

During jury selection Wednesday,

Chapple said he wanted to fire his attorney, Richard Kayne, for inadequately representing him and other reasons.

Then, Chapple suddenly spat on Kayne and threw a cup of drinking water on the attorney before the judge intervened and ordered the defendant removed.

After a noon recess, O'Connor said the trial would continue despite the outburst.

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — California smog squads will begin random roadside testing next spring of diesel smoke from heavy trucks and buses, under a program adopted Thursday by the state Air Resources Board.

The program, approved 7-1, will apply to all such vehicles in the state regardless of where they are registered.

It asks "truck and bus operators to do more than what owners of gasoline-powered cars have done since 1984 through the Smog Check program," said the board's executive officer, Jim Boyd.

The program requires the testing and repairing, if necessary, of gasoline-powered passenger cars every two years. The state already has two programs to control diesel emissions.

Officials declare victory in Medfly war

EL MONTE, Calif. (AP) — Agriculture officials Thursday declared victory over the Mediterranean fruit fly, the crop-destroying insect that has taken California 15 months and \$52 million to eradicate.

"We're here to celebrate that we have eradicated the Medfly in California. Unless there is another introduction, it will remain eradicated," said Jack Parnell, deputy secretary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Parnell joined state agriculture chief Henry Voss at a news conference in pronouncing victory and lifting of a quarantine.

Traps will continue to be placed throughout the area to detect any new arrivals.

The arrival of illegal fruit and vegetables, usually carried in travelers' luggage, virtually ensures future infestations, one official said in an interview last weekend.

"There is some perverse streak in

human nature. They seem to believe it's fun to outsmart authorities and bring in just one mango, or just one pineapple from Hawaii," said Gera Curry, spokeswoman for the state Department of Food and Agriculture. "All it takes is one person."

Quarantines were imposed on movement of fruit from infested areas. The big worry was that the flies could spread to agricultural areas and wreck California's \$18 billion-a-year farm industry.

Fusion researcher responds to 'furor'

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A University of Utah scientist who claims to have discovered a cold fusion energy process said Thursday the "sterile furor" over his whereabouts last month was unfortunate and unnecessary.

Stanley Pons ducked reporters Wednesday, his first appearance in Utah in weeks. He issued a statement to reporters the next day when he met with an advisory council evaluating his work and related research.

Pons and colleague Martin Fleischmann caused a stir when they missed a council meeting two weeks ago and left Utah, apparently without making their destinations known to officials of the university or the university's National Cold Fusion Institute.

Fleischmann returned to his home in Tibury, England, for medical treatment and did not return for the review, said Fritz Will, director of the state-funded institute.

"Obviously, the fact that we did

not publish our itinerary seems to have caused considerable distress to some people, which is regrettable," Pons said in a news release.

Pons called the commotion over his disappearance a "sterile furor" and said he spent the time "traveling."

He met with the Fusion Energy Advisory Council, Council chairman Raymond Hanson said. Pons has made research advances that are the basis of a ninth patent application on cold fusion.

JACKPOT — Not long ago, The Marcy Bros. carved themselves a corner of country music history when the magazine made the pages of Tiger Beat magazine.

Tiger Beat is usually the domain of pop and TV stars such as New Kids on the Block and Fred "Woody" Young's Savage. But a recent contest in the magazine offered fans the chance to meet the Marcy Bros.

Despite good fortune, good looks and talent, the three brothers from Oroville, Calif., have yet to break into the top rank of country stars. But the

In a recent phone interview, Kendal Marcy — the trio's youngest at 22 — spoke with enthusiasm about the Marcy Bros.' recent decision to move from Warner Bros., which released its first disc, to Atlantic.

Both Warner Bros. and Atlantic are part of the same recording conglomerate, but Marcy said there are striking differences between the two labels.

Warner Bros. has many of country's biggest names on its roster: Hank Williams Jr., Highway 101, Randy Travis and Dwight Yoakam, among others. "There's only so many hours in the day," Marcy said. "And the more artists there are on the roster, the tougher it is to spend the individual time, especially breaking the artists."

Atlantic, on the other hand, is a relatively new label to Nashville, he said, and the best-known artist in its

line-up is 1960s rocker Billy Joe Royal, who is now revving up for a comeback in the country arena.

"They've only six or seven people actively on the roster, whereas Warner has 22," Marcy said. "You can just see that the ability to market an act is much simpler because you don't have so many."

"They intend to keep it a small label, more of an exclusive-type thing. Obviously we feel very fortunate to be involved in that initial push," Marcy said.

The Marcy Bros. also feel fortunate that they have captured the vital teen market. Marcy said he and brothers Travis and Dwight Yoakam, among others, "from 8 to 80," but acknowledged the brothers' particular appeal among teen-age girls.

"I didn't know how to react to that at first. It was really funny, I mean, here we are country and we're the cover of Tiger Beat," Marcy said. "We kind of look at it and go 'that's

In a telephone interview this week from his home in New York City's Greenwich Village, Shulevitz said, "Toddlecreek Post Office" was based on his own experiences living summers in a tiny town in upstate

New York. I grew up in a tiny town in upstate New York. The first time I went to this post office, I had to step over a huge dog as I went through the entrance." Shulevitz recalled.

Like many small-town post offices, Toddlecreek's is a place where few packages are mailed, but many friendships are made and many tales traded . . . until one day when the postal inspector arrives and announces the post office will be closed due to lack of business.

Shulevitz said the book represents a vanishing America, "the kind of America with a soul that means so much to me." The story has a sad quality, but Shulevitz defends it. "I had certain wishes it would be a happy story but, as it happens sometimes, the material itself guides you what to do and where it wants to go," he said. "This is the way it wanted to be."

Shulevitz said he does not usually read his stories to children before he submits them to publishers. He said he does not believe in a market-research approach to books, and beyond that, he said he thinks it is unnecessary. "I have a certain sense," he added, "I'm still in touch with the child within me."

Shulevitz was born in Warsaw, Poland, in 1935, began drawing at age 3 and never stopped. World War II forced his family from its home when Shulevitz was 4, and the family spent the next eight years wandering before eventually settling in Paris in 1947.

He later moved to Israel with his parents, then arrived in New York City at the age of 24. In addition to writing and illustrating children's books, he teaches other people to do so in a two-week workshop he conducts each year at Hartwick College in Oneonta, N.Y., and has written a book on the subject.

Religious, secular groups battle film industry's NC-17 rating

To a number of religious and secular groups across the country, Hollywood's cinematic glitter has acquired a peep-show tarnish.

Already discredited by an industry that they say peddles films laden with sexually oriented themes and sadistic violence, these groups now are angry about the movie industry's new adult rating category, NC-17.

The rating restricts children under 17 from viewing movies with adult themes, and replaces the infamous "X" category.

The category also provides a wider creative berth for serious film makers hemmed in between the R and X ratings.

The religious and secular groups aren't buying it. The new designation, they argue, will enable movies featuring pornography and excessive violence to be advertised more exten-

sively and shown in the multiscreen theaters that many families prize.

"Hollywood will now be able to pump celluloid sewage into the country's neighborhood theaters at will," wrote John Evans of Richardson, Texas, editor-in-chief of "Preview Movie Morality Guide." In a letter to the pamphlet's subscribers, Evans said, "It's basically the same thing as X rating, and this now opens the door for the mainstream theaters to show what formerly were X-rated movies."

Said Debbie Dena, president of the Tarrant County (Texas) Chapter of the American Family Association, "The organization said it would ask its 2,600 members to mail their complaints to Jack Valenti, president of the Motion Picture Association of America. It also will ask members to telephone theaters and urge them not to show NC-17 movies."

The Motion Picture Association announced the new rating Sept. 26 and clarified the R rating. Explana-

tions will be mailed to exhibitors and film critics about what qualifies a movie for the R rating.

The National Council of Churches and the U.S. Catholic Conference

According to industry observers, the new rating helps correct a classification system that allowed excessively violent films to carry the R rating, while erasable and stamped with an X rating.

Moreover, "X" had become synonymous with movies of the kind advertised in the runchy, neon splendor of porn strips.

In contrast to the X rating, the MPAA has copyrighted NC-17 so

that it won't become a free-for-all category. The association must view a movie before the NC-17 rating is used.

"Our belief is that the NC-17 rating is very helpful insofar as it distinguishes high-quality, sophisticated films that have adult content and adult appeal from the pornographic segment of the market," said Ted Black, King, vice president of operations of American Multi-Cinema Inc.'s Southwest division in Dallas.

"It allows those films to play without that kind of stigma," he said.

But how-16-at-least-100 representatives from religious and secular groups are expected to gather in Washington, D.C., to discuss the film industry's rating system and the new NC-17 category.

The one-day conference is being organized by the National Coalition on Television Violence, a television and film monitoring group based in Champaign, Ill., and Good News

Communications, a Christian organization based in Atlanta.

The groups will consider forming municipal or statewide film and video ratings boards. Rating boards would allow the community to use community standards to protect their children against movies that can be detrimental, physiologically, physically and spiritually, said Ted Black, chairman of Good News Communications. He is the publisher of "Movieguide," a film rating service.

Brian Sullivan, director of television research for the National Coalition on Television Violence, said the efforts of religious and secular groups are not censorship.

"We feel that this is not a First Amendment issue. We're trying to provide accurate information on these movies," he said. "We are trying to unveil the cloak of misinformation, the charade that Jack Valenti and the Motion Picture Association of America has created for 22 years."

Some changes on the way as Big Bird and the gang turn 22

NEW YORK - Next Monday Big Bird, Ernie, Oscar the Grouch and others will start their 22nd season wandering along that public television path that kids of all ages know as "Sesame Street."

There'll be a few changes. Two teen-agers are joining the cast. So is a Claymation creature, Cecilie Ball. Oscar's mother will come to visit. Whoopi Goldberg and Robin Williams each will be in two "Sesame" shows.

Next Monday also will be a special occasion for Joan Ganz Cooney. It'll be her first season as the ex-chairman of the show's producer, Children's Television Workshop. She turned the reins over last month to David Britt, a veteran CTW executive who has been with the production company for 18 years. But she's staying with CTW, and especially with "Street," she says, because "I want to work entirely on the creative side and the strategic planning side."



Sesame Street no longer concentrates on four or five educational goals, as in its early years.

Her renewed involvement with "Sesame Street" is due "in some degree" to the death last May of Muppet-master Jim Henson, who created a number of characters for the show,

including Kermit. Although the series has an extensive tape library of Henson's characters, "I want to make sure that the relationship with the Muppeteers con-

tinues very strong, and that we create, maybe, new characters," she says. "I'm interested in seeing that the show stays very contemporary. It is that, having gone from four to

five basic educational goals its first year to a teach-while-entertaining "curriculum" for pre-schoolers that Cooney estimates has covered 200 topics.

They include sibling rivalry, pre-science, death, adoption, and, of course, love.

Last season, the series, which is seen in 80 countries and still is aimed at children 2 to 5 years old, began segments set in a home day-care center for tykes.

"That was done and remains in the 'series' because it's something our audience can identify with," says "Street" executive-producer, Dudley Singer.

Increasing numbers of kids wind up in day-care centers or after-school programs, whether divorced or still married, must work to make ends meet.

"Children are much more in day care and after-school programs now," says Cooney, who because of that has two projects, also neither intended for TV.

One is to develop after-school "packages" using CTW's other educational shows, "Square One" and "3-2-1 Contact." "To tutor kids in math and science, kids staying after school because their parents work," she says. The other is a planned pilot program in which "Sesame Street

materials and books would be used for children's activities in Dallas day-care centers.

Also afoot for next season, but on PBS, is an as-yet-untilted literacy series to teach reading and writing skills to children 7 to 12 years old, she says.

As with the major networks, cable, independent stations and videocassette players have bitten into PBS audience, and "Sesame Street" has been among the shows affected. But not so much in the morning, Cooney says.

The real ratings drop of "Street" is due, mainly, to cable's Nickelodeon channel aimed at viewers 2 to 15, she says.

It occurs in the afternoon when older children come home from school and commandeer the TV set. At such times, she says, "the little kid that might want to watch 'Sesame Street' is overpowered by his or her older sibling."

Pondering ways to deal with this and other problems will be part of her work now with the company she co-founded.

"It's like having a 22-year-old child," she said of her new role at CTW. "The child may not need you any more. But when the child needs you, you're there for it."

Ads are gone, but smoking still fills television screens

NEW YORK - Not a Marlboro Man has galloped through the intellectual landscape since television banned cigarette commercials in 1971, but California public health researchers say there's still too much smoking on TV.

Cigarette ads are banned, but people still smoke: The grizzled old cop fires up a grizzled old stogie; the troubled teen lights a filter tip; the sneering gangster takes a puff on a coffin nail.

Television, with its power to inform and entertain, also has a tremendous power to persuade, cajole and educate. What does it say about smoking? Glad you asked.

"We wanted to assess the prevalence of smoking on television and we wanted to look at it in a way that was not just about the message that is being given," said Patricia Madden, co-author of the study of smoking on prime-time television.

She and Georgette L. Overby are researchers at the Prevention Research Bureau in Berkeley, Calif. Overby, a former nurse, has worked in funded centers for social and biomedical research on alcohol and other abused substances.

The foundation of their experiment is the "cognitive social learning theory" developed by the sociologist Albert Bandura and others. It is, in essence, the kid with a Stone theory of social behavior.

"If the kid sees somebody toss a stone through a window, the kid is likely to do the same thing if the behavior is rewarded, and somewhat less likely to do it if nothing is being given," said Patricia Madden.

"If the tosser is a 'high-status' role model, someone who is powerful, attractive, competent — a hero, for example — the kid is more likely to imitate the throwing than if the tosser is an unattractive 'low-status' model. One of them, it all seems so clear, when 'Andy of Mayberry' was on."

Madden said the researchers collected 139 1/2 hours of "routine, fiction-network prime-time programming" in the fall of 1989, and ended with a sample of 10 prime-time shows, hours and half-hours, comedies and dramas.

University of California-Berkeley students then scanned the programs, using a kitchen timer and the VCR's pause button to check for smoking at minute-by-minute intervals.

Once "smoking" was seen, the viewers noted the context of the

smoking — the status of the characters involved in the smoking and how they reacted to it. The observers also checked for embedded anti-smoking messages.

The results were more surprising than you might expect. "The scales are still tipped toward the pro-smoking message," Madden said. The study found an average 25 minutes of smoking per hour, with anti-smoking messages in little more than three-quarters of a minute per hour. You'd have to watch two hours to see an anti-smoking message.

Madden said.

Smoking occurred in 53 percent of all programs and 41 percent of all episodes in the sample, while anti-smoking messages occurred in 39 percent of all programs and 20 percent of all episodes.

Crime shows had more smoking on them, and the smokers tended more often to be bad guys.

"We were encouraged by the fact that smoking does not tend to be glamorized any more on television," Madden said, "and we would like to see scriptwriters weave more anti-smoking messages into their plots."

When anti-smoking messages were involved, the majority of smokers and the people who reacted negatively to smoking were adult, white male, plot-related characters, the study found.

In finishing series, Udpdike frees himself

NEW YORK - When John Udpdike finished "Rabbit at Rest," he took a large pile of newspapers used for research and threw them away.

Enough was enough. The author wanted to finish his book and forget about Harry "Rabbit" Angstrom. This "ordinary" man from Brewer, Pa., a speedy basketball star in high school who tags pathetically behind the "adult world" had haunted Udpdike for 30 years.

The books were increasingly difficult to write, burdened with telling new readers about old events and providing new events for old readers. After four novels it was time to leave Rabbit behind, at last.

"As I was writing it, I was fully aware not only of trying to make some sense to readers who hadn't read the others, but of trying to round out the series," Udpdike, 58, explained in an interview at the Manhattan offices of Alfred A. Knopf publishers.

"There comes a time when you've used up your life, if your life is leached to run its natural course. He's reached a little earlier than I hope to myself. He's had enough of the world."

The Rabbit books began in 1960 with "Rabbit, Run." Harry, increasingly named "Rabbit" but increasingly known as just Harry — is in his late 20s and going downhill.

He's stuck in a dead-end town, out of shape, bored with his job, bored with his marriage. While his wife is pregnant, Rabbit runs — away.

The last quarter of a basketball game used to carry him into this world," Udpdike writes in "Rabbit, Run," as Harry takes to the road and

droves south. "You ran not so the crowd thought for the sake of the score but for yourself, in a kind of idleness."

The 1960s confuse Harry, the '70s depress him and the '80s finish him off. He returns for three more books, published 10 years apart, his marriage to Janice Springer surviving while his relationship with his son, Nelson, deteriorates.

"In 'Rabbit Redux' (1971), the astronaut is walking on the moon and Harry is crawling on Earth. When Janice leaves for another man, Harry shakes up with his son, a teen-age runaway called Jill and a radical named Skeeter.

Popularity of 'Ghost' a surprise

It was supposed to be the summer of movie men and their fast, dangerous and high-tech machines. Instead, when "Ghost" surpassed "Pretty Woman" last weekend as the highest-grossing film of the season, it became clear this was the summer of lovers and their deus ex machina.

Released by Paramount Pictures on July 13, the picture starring Moore, Whoopi Goldberg co-starrer has taken in, as of Sunday, \$180,635,227 after 115 days in the U.S. and Canadian marketplaces. It reached the No. 1 spot last Friday with a gross of \$12,335,459.

"It's a fun summer," understates "Ghost" director, Jerry Zucker.

And, obviously, a profitable one. "Ghost" is currently the 12th highest-grossing film of all time in North America. It has been in release for just under 1 month in 17 foreign countries and has already earned \$57,489,260. In addition, while there are still no concrete plans for a video release, Paramount executives are confident that "Ghost" will reinforce quite nicely on video.

The film, shot on a rather modest budget and best described as a cute comic-romantic-thriller, deals with a murdered investment banker (Swayze), his grieving lover (Moore) and the charlatan medium who speaks through as a ghost (Goldberg). In short, it did not have HIT written all over it.

"I was just looking for a good movie and an executive at Paramount gave me a copy of this script and I loved it," says Zucker, who helped write, direct and/or produce the likes of "Airplane," "Top Secret," "Ruthless People" and "Naked Gun."

"I loved the themes in this movie," he continues. "I didn't think about it as something different from what I'd done before. I just thought it was a nice movie — but I never imagined this."

Prince Charles, John Cleese in video touting business environmentalism

LONDON (AP) — Prince Charles plays an environmentally friendly heir to the British throne in his comic video debut with John Cleese.

The royal thespian has a sit-down role in "Grime Goes Green: Your Business and the Environment."

The 30-minute video premiered Thursday at a meeting sponsored by Business in the Environment, which has just published an environmental guidebook for industry.

Cleese plays James Grim, a decidedly un-green industrialist who says: "Of course I've heard of the greenhouse effect, but you are not telling me that every time I spray my car paint, a tomato ripens in Minnesota."

The video shows him frantically cleaning his plant ahead of a royal visit. He mistakes two environmental inspectors as Buckingham Palace advance men and when he realizes his error he ejects them in a Basil Fawlty-like rage.

Grim, blinded by fury, fails to recognize the prince, who is hidden behind a newspaper he is reading in the plant's lobby.

The industrialist launches into the 41-year-old son of Queen Elizabeth

II saying: "So, from the palace, are you? Only I expect you'll be wanting to inspect the drains as well, won't you..."

When Grim sees Charles he stops in mid-sentence, his face contorted in horror and embarrassment. But the prince calmly explains that "if everybody's going to wait for a royal visit before they clean up their act, we'll

never get anywhere... "Having a thought and a care for the environment must become an integrated part of good business practice," said Charles, who came up with the idea for the video. It sells for \$675.

Ex-Mets star signs \$20.25 million, 5-year baseball contract

LOS ANGELES — Darryl Strawberry signed a five-year, \$20.25 million contract with the Los Angeles Dodgers on Thursday, saying the New York Mets "just let me walk away."

The Mets said they will be better without him.

At 28, the seven-time All-Star joins the Dodgers at the prime of his career, following a season in which he hit 37 homers and 108 RBIs, a Mets record. But that and his popularity with New York fans weren't enough to keep him here.

"They never made any offer like they were interested in me. It was a choice the Mets had to make and it shows me it wasn't in their interest. I can't understand it. They just let me walk away," Strawberry told WFAN radio in New York.

"It's tough to make a change, but they left me no choice but to make the change," Mets general manager Frank Cashen dismissed Strawberry's loss, vowing the team would rebuild their outfield and be even stronger in a few years.

Missouri makes 2 in row for NCAA bent on bans

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Missouri became the second school in as many days to be banned from this season's NCAA basketball tournament when it was placed on two years' probation Thursday for recruiting violations.

On Wednesday, Illinois was prohibited from postseason play and placed on three years' probation. Like Missouri, the school's scholarship allotment was also reduced as part of the penalty.

Shortly after the decision was announced, two Missouri assistant coaches resigned, effective at the end of the season.

The NCAA Committee on Infractions said coach Norm Stewart's program "operated over time with our direct accountable control by the university."

It also said Stewart, the Tigers' coach the past 23 years and dean of Coach Eight coaches, "delegated many of his responsibilities to his assistants, and neither the assistants nor the head coach maintained records, checks and balances or identifiable processes for institutional control, which could have been used to reconstruct their actions."

The NCAA said the laxity led to violations that included use of an improper recruiting agent in Detroit, scholarship payments to an ineligible player and small cash payments to other players. The 55-year-old Stewart was red-eyed and emotional in defending his program.

NCAA wants tests OK'ed

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The NCAA has asked the state Supreme Court to allow drug testing of California college athletes, saying a ruling against the testing program ignored athletes' drug use and interfered with university regulation.

Papers filed last week by the National Collegiate Athletic Association asked the court to review and overturn a ruling Sept. 25 by the 6th District Court of Appeal in San Jose declaring that the drug testing program violated the right to privacy in the California Constitution.

The ruling, the first by any appellate court in the nation against the program, came in a suit by Stanford University athletes and applies only to competitions involving Stanford, inside or outside California.

Big Sky weekend slate pairs 4 conference teams in the top 20

It won't be hard to sort out the Division I-AA rankings of Big Sky Conference football teams after this weekend. The four Big Sky teams in the top 20 are paired in the top games.

The featured contest is at Boise, where undefeated Nevada takes its 12-game winning streak to Bronco Stadium and what could be the largest crowd to watch a Big Sky game this season. The Wolf Pack is ranked second in I-AA and host Boise State is No. 6.

The game could decide whether Nevada is No. 4 or No. 5 in the Big Sky football title with Boise State, 5-1. A Boise victory keeps alive the Broncos' chances of a co-championship, but BSU also would have to beat Idaho the next weekend.

At Mississippi, No. 17 Idaho plays Montana, No. 19, and the loser prob-

ably will have to forget about making the Division I-AA playoffs. Both teams are 6-3 going into the game.

West Virginia, No. 18, and Arizona, with both teams at 4-5, and the winner still has a chance at a winning season. Eastern Washington, 5-4, is at Montana State, 3-6, with the Bobcats battling a serious quarterback problem with the job of Coach Karl Solomonson assured through next season.

In the only nonleague game, Idaho State, 2-7, and in desperate need of a victory, hosts NAIA Mesa State. But it won't be easy, because the visitors are 6-2, ranked No. 6 in the division and last week scored 79 points against Fort Lewis.

The Nevada-Boise game matches the Big Sky's two best defensive teams, which might be a clue why they are on top of the standings in an offense-minded conference.

The Boise crowd has given up 128 points in nine games to 148 for

Boise State. No other Big Sky team has surrendered less than 217. The team also ranks 1-2 in total defense and passing defense.

Coach Chris Ault said Nevada is playing very well heading into the showdown. "Right now, we're playing very well in all facets of the game. The offense moves the ball and keeps the defense rested," he said.

Boise's Skip Hall could say the same thing, although BSU has been far less consistent than Nevada this season. Boise State leads the Big Sky in time-of-possession, with the Wolf Pack alone second, with the Grizzlies.

"They've got excellent athletes. There's no question about that," Hall said.

"I think the defensive lines are comparable, and the secondary is comparable. Our linebackers might be a little stronger. This is a classic matchup of two very strong defenses."

History appears to be on the side of Boise State. Nevada has been able to win in Bronco Stadium only once, in 1996. "The circumstances were very similar to this year," said Ault. "We were unbeaten going into the 10th game up there just like this season. It's a hard place to win, but we know we've done it before."

Idaho has been running up big scores in recent weeks, averaging more than 50 points in four straight victories.

PHOENIX (AP) — Officials of Arizona's two bowl games remain optimistic that voter rejection of a Martin Luther King holiday will not hurt the Dec. 31 bowl games.

The issue already has caused NFL commissioner Paul Tagliabue to recommend that the 1993 Super Bowl be taken out of Phoenix.

But John Jaster, executive director of the Big Bowl, said he didn't expect the vote on a proposed state holiday in Tuesday's election would seriously affect the bowl selection process.

"It is a concern, but it has not been expressed by any team we've dealt with recently or historically," Jaster said.

"Our organization and our treatment of people have been good through the years."

Phoenix's Copper Bowl officials said they have no indication that it will affect this year. The Super Bowl, however, is a different matter.

Phoenix's Copper Bowl executive director, Jaster, said he didn't think the impact would be too serious.

"Personally, I think it's unfortunate for the state of Arizona," he said, adding that the bowl's board members "are disappointed."

Copper Bowl officials said they were among those who considered to play in the Dec. 31 game in Tucson.

Rutledge made magic Sunday for the Redskins

HERNDON, Va. — Jeff Rutledge has been a backup quarterback for so long that even his own family takes his role for granted.

Last Sunday, for example, when the Washington Redskins played the Detroit Lions in Pontiac, Mich., the three Rutledge children (ages 7 to 11) played soccer rather than watch their dad's team on TV.

Laura, Jeff's wife, spent the afternoon ironing. She didn't even bother to set the VCR. Laura stopped tap-

ing the games several years ago because Jeff hardly ever got on the field. That didn't seem much point.

But last Sunday, something truly magical happened.

With the Redskins trailing Detroit, 35-14, with 10:23 left in the third quarter, coach Joe Gibbs sent in Rutledge — to relieve young Stan Humphries. What figured to be a routine mop-up job turned into an NFL production of "The Natural," with the 33-year-old Rutledge playing the part of Roy Hobbs.

While his wife did the laundry and

his kids played soccer back home, Jeff Rutledge mounted the greatest second-half comeback in Redskins history.

The journeyman quarterback, who considered retirement during the past off-season, completed 50 of 62 passes for 263 yards and one touchdown. He also scored on a daring 12-yard run with 18 seconds left in regulation time to tie the score, 38-38, and force overtime.

In sudden-death, Rutledge coolly stood in his end zone and completed a 40-yard pass to wide receiver Art Monk on a critical third-and-15 situation. Washington drove from there to win the game, 41-38, on Chip Lohmiller's 34-yard field goal.

Now comes the tricky part: Can Jeff Rutledge do it again? We won't have to wait long to find out.

Gibbs has named Rutledge his starting quarterback for next Monday's prime-time showdown with the Philadelphia Eagles at Veterans Stadium.

The strucky Humphries, who has thrown six interceptions in the last two games, will take a seat.

Marinovich still a puzzle

LOS ANGELES — Is he really a Robo QB, programmed for success and an early departure from Southern Cal? Or is Todd Marinovich just a kid having fun?

Maybe it's a little of both.

After all, father Marv — a Southern Cal and NFL player himself in the '60s — pretty much programmed him to be a passer from childhood with a regimen of special training and special diets.

His first game as a sophomore, a 25-of-35, 337-yard outing in a nationally televised 34-16 victory over Syracuse, added to his growing reputation.

Although he has since had another 300-yard, three-touchdown passing day, in a 37-22 win over Stanford,

all his Saturdays haven't been so spectacular.

There was an 80-yard passing day, with two interceptions, in a 31-0 loss at Washington.

There was a 174-yard outing, with three interceptions, in a 35-26 defeat by Arizona.

Suspended from Southern Cal's Oct. 27 game against Arizona State for cutting classes, Marinovich was told by coach Larry Smith that he must compete weekly with senior Shane Foley for the starting job.

Foley filled in against Arizona State in a 12-6 victory. Then, when against Cal before Marinovich took over on the second, Southern Cal series and went the rest of the way in a 31-31 tie last Saturday.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE

BOBBY WOLFF

If you listen closely to the bidding, you can sometimes get a good picture of a player's distribution. In today's case, the bidding screamed for a trump lead to cut down dummy's ruff. West solved that problem easily by stubbing his ace in choosing which trump to lead.

North's bidding made it obvious that he was very short in clubs — he had bid two suits and strongly supported a third. Accordingly, West had no trouble deciding on a trump lead. Unfortunately he chose to lead the ace and another trump.

South unlocked his trump 10 at trick one and won the second trump lead in dummy to lead a club. East's ace won, but with no third trump to lead, East shifted weakly to a diamond. This gave South an easy ride. He was able to ruff a club in dummy, and together with two spades, two diamonds and the club king, his four trump winners brought his total to 10.

West would have done much better had he led a low trump instead of the ace and another. Since he had no quick entry to lead a third trump, he had to hope that East could win an early trick. Against this defense, South loses any chance for a club ruff. When East wins the first club, he leads his trump to West's ace, and a third trump lead holds declarer to only nine winners.

Patty Duke's confession autobiography hits the TV screen as 'Call Me Anna'

Celebrity autobiography is a strange hybrid. Part confession, part revelation, part plea for attention, the autobiographer seeks to attract a new crowd of followers who admire the celebrity for baring his or her faults. The latest celebrity to join the fray of confessors who have had their works brought to the screen is Patty Duke, author of "Call Me Anna."

The troubled memoir depicts an unhappy childhood and an adulthood plagued by drug and alcohol addiction and mental illness. Produced and directed by Gilbert Cates, who produced last year's Academy Awards, the production airs Sunday, Nov. 11, on ABC. It stars Howard Hesseman ("Head of the Class"), Ari-Meyers ("Kate & Allie") and Jenny Robertson ("Bull Durham"), as well as Duke, who portrays herself in recent years.

Cates had worked with Duke (whom he refers to as "Anna," her real name) before. "I directed her in the TV movie 'Fatal Judgment,'" he explains. "As preparation for working with her, I had read her book. When we finished the movie, I asked her if she had ever considered filming the book. She said that it had been optioned twice, but nothing had ever happened with it. I asked her if she wanted to work with me on it, and she said yes. We took it to ABC, and they loved it, and here we are."

Cates had originally wanted to air the movie as a four-hour presentation but was talked into filming it in a two-hour version by the network.

"It was incredibly hard to decide which parts of her life to show," he explains. "When you see the finished movie, it looks obvious, but those are the kinds of decisions that kept me up nights."

"We decided to concentrate on a few different periods of her life," he continues. "There's the time when she was a little girl, and she appeared on 'The \$64,000 Question.' That's a favorite scene of mine. In fact, because right after I got out of the Army, I had a job flashing the 'Applause' sign on that show. We had to make sure it was authentic, and it is, down to the cooling units that kept the contestants cool in their booths. People who knew the show say it looks really authentic."

"It was a hard decision for Duke to appear in the movie, according to Cates. 'I guess I was the one who

convinced her," he says frankly.

"Sophia Loren had played herself at many ages in a movie many years before, but that hasn't been done very often. I think Duke was right not to play herself at 20. But why shouldn't she play herself recently? I thought it would be interesting."

The results, in Cates' view, were more than interesting. "I'm very moved by it," he says simply. "Her life has been unbelievable. It takes a lot of guts to put your life on screen, and not more so attractive, one has children who are living, ex-husbands who are living, and she shows herself in a very unflattering way. It makes you really feel for her."

Nice guys finally end up at the altar

This week, after six long years on "The Young and the Restless," Cricket and Danny Romalotti tie the knot in Maui, Hawaii. So the boss daughter, Lauralee Bell (Cricket), and the rock 'n' roll musician (or Michael Damian (Danny) finally march down the aisle on the soap. Danny always felt he wasn't good enough for Cricket, and Cricket wasn't sure of her own emotions. Maybe Danny was right?

'Cheers' big number 200 pushes NBC to big number one in Nielsen ratings

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC's "Cheers" was the most-watched show on television for the fifth time this season, but CBS is moving close to NBC in ratings for the season to date, according to Nielsen ratings released Tuesday.

NBC's saloon comedy, which celebrates its 200th episode on Thursday, averaged a 22.4 rating, helping the Peacock Network win the week with an average prime-time rating of 13.5.

CBS, whose "60 Minutes" and "Murder, She Wrote" each had their highest ratings since the season began, was second last week with a 12.6. ABC was third with an 11.9.

However, CBS' season-to-date margin is much closer to NBC and is making the ratings race tighter than had been anticipated, said NBC research vice president Preston Beckman.

Although NBC still leads with a 13.3 average, CBS, trying to rebound from three consecutive seasons as third in prime time ratings, now has a 13.0 average for the season so far. ABC is third with a 12.5.

It's a much tighter race — CBS is making it even tighter that we thought," it would be, Beckman said. He credited part of CBS' surge with the Nielsen performances of CBS' "Murphy Brown," "Designing Women" and "60 Minutes."

In last week's battle of "The Cosby Show" vs. Bart, NBC's "The Cosby Show" easily bested Fox Broadcasting's half-hour "The Simpsons." The former averaged an 18.6 to the 15.8 for

the Fox show when the two directly competed with each other, and NBC's show averaged a 20.2 rating for the full hour.

A special Monday showing of Burt Reynolds' "Evening Shade" CBS comedy also fared well. It was 24th in the rankings with a 15.1 average, far better than the 9.5 rating and No. 57 ranking of its regular Friday broadcast.

In the news wars, ABC's "World

News Tonight" won the Nielsen battle for the 43rd consecutive week. It averaged an 11.4, well ahead of the 10.0 for the "CBS Evening News" and the 9.5 of the "NBC Nightly News." The week's top 10 list was dominated by old reliables, save for NBC's showing of the movie hit, "Three Men and a Cradle," and ABC's new "America's Funniest People." They were, respectively, fourth and 10th in the rankings.




