Saddam says world not united against him

China's foreign minister arrived in Baghdad on Sunday carrying bad news for Saddam Hussein: China will not block the U.N. Security Council from authorizing the use of force to drive Iraq out of Kuwait, a Chinese diplomat said.
Such a measure has been drafted by the

United States, diplomats and U.S. officials said last week, but had not yet been circulated among the other permanent members of the Security Council.
Iraq had reportedly pinned its veto hopes on China.
Meanwhile, Iraq said Sunday it would attend a proposed Arab summit meeting if it was consulted on the agenda, timing and

location and if the agenda included the Arab-Israeli conflict.
"The proposed summit should not be part of efforts to prepare the political theater as a cover for American aggression against Iraq and the Arab nation," said an Iraqi statement read on state television.
The offer came in response to an appeal by Morocco's King Hassan II, who urged

an extraordinary Arab summit on the Gulf crisis. He said such a meeting would be a "new and last chance" for a peaceful solution.
In a separate interview broadcast Sunday in London, Saddam said he did not think the world was united against him.

Mothers say gulf troops get too little support

BUHL - Magic Valley residents aren't doing enough to support American troops in Operation Desert Shield, two local mothers with sons in Saudi Arabia say.
"Volunteers have been collecting items to be sent overseas, but donations are coming in slowly at best, and time is running out for the Christmas delivery."
"We just want to rally some support for the men and women overseas there," said Jane Bybee, whose son, Kevin Owen, is serving in the Army's 101st Airborne Division.
Collection boxes for "Gifts for the Gulf" have been placed in several locations in Buhl, with a central receiving station in Twin Falls' Blue Lakes Mall, for people to give items to be shipped out in time for Christmas. But so far the response has been minimal.
"It's gotten a lot better today, but it has been really slow," said PFC Mike Perkins from the Army recruiting station in Twin Falls. Perkins was mailing the Gifts for the Gulf Station Friday afternoon.
"It's sad," Perkins said. "Maybe they don't want to support us being over there, but the troops are there and they deserve our support."
The apparent lack of support concerns Bybee and Marian Butterworth, whose

Woman plans support group for families of soldiers in gulf

JEROME - A local woman with a son serving in Saudi Arabia is starting a support group for the families of American troops in the Persian Gulf.
Lois Downing said the group will have its first meeting at 7:30 p.m. Thursday in the basement of the Jerome Bible Baptist Church, 132 Second Ave. E.
"Maybe no one will show up, maybe 150 will show up," Downing said.
Downing's son, Marine Lance Cpl. Wes Poff, turned 21 in Saudi Arabia on Oct. 10.
"My husband and I really trust in the Lord to take care of him," she said.
"I'd never been interested in a support group," but after hearing from several

other mothers in Jerome who are worried about their sons, "we decided to go ahead and put something together."
The first gathering is for adults only, but future meetings may allow children if the participants so decide, she said.
"If parents want to break down and cry a little, maybe the kids don't need to see all that," Downing said.
The meeting will be a good opportunity for people to "talk out their feelings" and exchange names and addresses so they can keep in touch, she said.
The site and dates of future meetings will be decided by whoever shows up, she said. If someone is interested in the support group but cannot attend the first meeting, he or she can call Downing at 324-3288 after Thursday.

Kevin Owen receives only one hot meal each day - a breakfast of powdered eggs and some sausage. Canned rations heavily chlorinated water make up the rest of his diet, his mother said. He sleeps in an airplane hangar on a pillow he made of a handkerchief and plastic foam packing pellets.
He told his mother that he has only heard three gunshots while in Saudi Arabia - from the gun of a young GI who succumbed to the stress and had to be taken away, Bybee said.
Although it is cooler now than when Operation Desert Shield began three months ago, temperatures in the Saudi desert still climb to near 100 degrees in the afternoon, and dehydration is common.
Owen had to be given fluids intravenously after becoming dehydrated, Bybee said. Her son writes that he has lost 20 pounds since arriving at what he calls the "King Path International Detox Center and Fit Farm."
"A lot of things are kept secret" because the soldiers don't want to worry their families, she added.
Owen's wife and two young daughters moved in with Bybee from Kentucky when he was shipped out.
"He lives for the day when he can come

Threat of war makes Veterans Day ceremonies more solemn

WASHINGTON - Americans paid tribute to the dead of the Vietnam War at solemn Veterans Day ceremonies Sunday at the Tomb of the Unknowns and the Vietnam Veterans Memorial amid fears that the nation may be swept into a new war in the Persian Gulf.
At the Vietnam Memorial, Bob Horsch of Rahway, N.J., a veteran of Army service in Vietnam, said he believed it was "just a matter of time" until the United States was at war again.
Horsch said he believed the military buildup in the Persian Gulf was justified by the need to protect American interests and those of other countries.
Stephen Reuben of Lapwai, Idaho, a member of the Nez Perce tribe who also served in Vietnam, declined to say whether the buildup was a good idea, but also said he fears the country was headed for war.
"I am afraid so, but I pray and hope we don't," Reuben said.
Teresa Swain of Hagerstown, Md., when asked if she supported the buildup, said "We have to protect our inter-

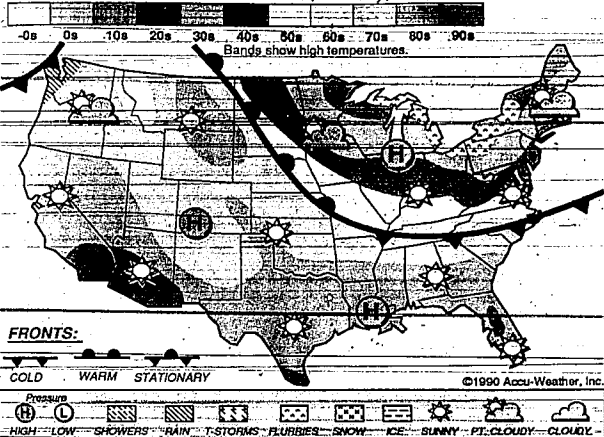
ests." As to whether it would mean war, she said "I certainly hope not." Mrs. Swain said she has a son-in-law in the Air Force.
Speakers at the ceremonies, including Defense Secretary Dick Cheney, paid tribute to the American troops now serving in the gulf region.
At Arlington National Cemetery, Cheney laid a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknowns and addressed a capacity crowd in the adjoining Vermont-marble amphitheater, which seats 5,500.
"Those who have been deployed to the Persian Gulf and Saudi Arabia are probably the best trained soldiers we have ever had," he said. "The nation and the world will be better for their service."
"People who are concerned about peace must stay prepared for war," Cheney said.
The ceremonies, held on traditional Veterans Day in ad-vance of Monday's official national holiday, took place under bright, sunny skies, with a crisp wind whipping through the flag-draped amphitheater at Arlington.
At the Vietnam memorial, an armed service color guard and a bagpiper playing "Abide With Me" accompanied military and patriotic groups who placed wreaths in front

of the 58,000 names inscribed on the ebony-colored granite wall. They are the names of American servicemen killed in Vietnam.
Col. Robert F. Foley, an Army Medal of Honor winner from Vietnam, told the crowd "The situation in Saudi Arabia is a grim reminder that war is not a thing of the past."
The National Park Service estimated the crowd at 5,000. Jan C. Scruggs, president of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund, his voice breaking, spoke of the troops in the Middle East, saying, "We are very, very proud of them and we do hope that in the event there is combat they will not get the treatment that the Vietnam veterans got."
Meanwhile, the Vietnam Women's Memorial Project announced the selection of two finalists in its competition for a design of the memorial, to be built alongside the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. The target date for its dedication is 1992.
One of the winning designs, by sculptor Eileen Rose Barry of East Islip, Long Island, is a statue of a woman standing by herself with a helmet in her hand. The other by landscape architect Robert Desmond of Arlington, Mass., consists of a white marble block, in contrast to the black marble of the wall, surrounded by 240 jets of water.

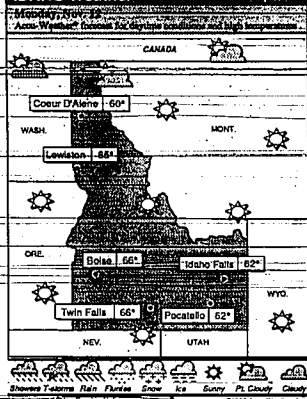

An unseasonably warm high-pressure system remains entrenched over Idaho.

Sunny weather is forecast through Monday except for the north, when there will be increasing cloudiness associated with an eastern Pacific storm which will be nearing the northwest coast.

Record or near record high temperatures can be expected. Highs in the valleys will be mostly in the 60s with maximums in the mountains in the mid to upper 50s.

The warmest temperature in the state Sunday was 75 degrees at Haagerman. Dible reported the coldest at 15 degrees.

Elsewhere in the nation Sunday, the highest temperature was 93 degrees at San Gabriel and Monrovia, Calif. The lowest was 10 degrees Gunnison, Colo. and Truckee, Calif.

Snow, rain in Northeast, warmer in West

Rain and snow were scattered from the Great Lakes into the Northeast on Sunday, while parts of the West warmed to record highs.

Snow fell over northern Maine during the early afternoon, and from south-central New York state across central New York State. Snow showers extended over southern and eastern Michigan.

A winter weather advisory was posted into early Monday over New York state's western Mohawk Valley and the western Adirondacks. Wind was expected to gust to more than 30 mph into Monday and produce wind chill factors below zero.

Heavy rain fell during the six-hour trip to Ft. St. Est. was 1 inch at Limestone, Maine, and Sault Ste. Marie, Mich.

At the same time atop New Hampshire's Mount Washington, the highest mountain in the Northeast at over 6,200 feet, the temperature was above zero and wind gusts to nearly 115 mph, producing rain on Tuesday. Mild with high clouds and a wind chill of 46 below zero.

Rain was scattered over northern Illinois and southeastern Wisconsin.

Rain also fell along the northern coast of Washington state, where three days of steady rain had caused extensive flooding.

Mayors say more federal funds needed to cure urban ills

NEW YORK (AP) — Cities deserve more federal aid because they supply the labor and the tax revenue that keeps the nation going, some of the nation's urban mayors said Sunday.

"Cities are our nation's marketplaces, not only for business but also for ideas," Mayor David Dinkins said. "If we choke off our cities by denying them the resources they need to function efficiently, the marketplace will disappear."

Dinkins and a dozen other mayors spoke at a news conference to kick off a two-day conference on urban issues, such as combating drug abuse, improving education and paying for costly infrastructure such as bridges and roads.

Atlanta Mayor Maynard Jackson said property taxes alone won't pay the bills for solving such problems.

Rain puts damper on solar car race
DARWIN, Australia — Rain put a damper on the first day of the World Solar Challenge race Sunday, wiping out any chance at the record pace organizers had predicted.

Darwin's first consistently rainy day since May delayed the start by an hour. A crowd of several thousand cheered as the event got under way with the announcement: "Gentlemen, start your solar panels."

Mostly overcast conditions persisted as the cars headed south toward Adelaide, 1,772 miles away. With the 36 cars from nine countries spread out over 90 miles, a torrential rain forced mussy drivers to stop and cover their cars.

"It was amazing that the satellite maps showed the only real cloud over Australia this morning was over Darwin," said race organizer Hans Tholstrup.

The entry from Western Washington University at Bellingham, Wash., took the early lead over Bic University of Switzerland.

The leaders were not expected to cover more than 300 miles the first day. The winner of the inaugural event in 1987, General Motors' Sunraycer, traveled almost 450 miles in one day to set a record.

Western Washington's car has fore and aft driver positions so the vehicle can point in either direction to take best advantage of the sun's position.

Algerian tribunal plans to try Bush
ALGERIA, Algeria — A group of prominent Algerians announced plans Sunday to hold a tribunal next week against President Bush on charges including crimes against humanity.

The group said it plans to hold the proceedings in the Algerian capital, Algiers, on Dec. 10. Foremost among the charges will be "threatening peace and world security by his preparation for an aggressive war against Iraq," the group said in a communique.

The Algerian tribunal will be headed by Ali Amar Louar, former president of Algeria's bar association. It will be made up of academics, lawyers and intellectuals active in human rights, the group said.

The tribunal is apparently not sponsored by the Algerian government. It would have no way of enforcing its sentence.

In its statement, the group said the U.S.-led economic blockade of Iraq is a crime under "laws of the international convention for prevention of and punishment for genocide."

home and see his family," Bybee said.

American soldiers have suffered from "lousy food, adverse weather and homesickness since Valley Forge," but making current employment more difficult, these mothers say, is the Saudi government's strict regulations that hinder morale-boosting efforts.

On a recent tour of the area, comedian Steve Martin visited the troops, but his routine was limited to some handshakes and a few one-liners — no stand-up act.

Packages are routinely checked for items the Saudis find offensive or not in keeping with the Moslem religion — no alcohol, pork, Christian religious objects or sexually suggestive photos.

And entertainment is mostly strict-Saudi-Arabia-is-not-existent. There is nowhere to go for a weekend of "R and R," especially for troops stationed in the desert, miles from the nearest city.

So letters and packages from home are the only solace most soldiers get.

Bybee and Butterworth send packages to their sons — Bybee's son has yet to receive any of his — but they point out that many service men and women have families that are able to send "care" packages.

Kool-Aid or Gatorade drink mixes to flavor the putrid water are among the most frequently requested items, they said. Board games, cards, books and magazines, along with cassette players and tapes are also needed.

But donations have been slow in coming as Operation Desert Shield drags on.

In a co-oper-of-an-unrepeated scene in the Blue Lakes Mall sits a pile of books, games, old magazines and other small items donated to Gifts for the Gulf. The number of items is surprisingly small, considering that the receiving station has been open for several weeks.

"We got a lot at the beginning, but it has really slacked off since then," said Kelly Klans, radio personality for KEZZ, along with Consolidated-Freightways manager Ben Lee Mall, the radio station is sponsoring Gifts for the Gulf.

Donations must be delivered to the Blue Lakes Mall location by Dec. 2 in order to assure delivery by Christmas, said Sherry Kesler, KEZZ program manager.

Consolidated-Freightways will ship the packages free of charge to a military base in California, where they will be flown to the Middle East.

"I can't say anything to make life a little easier, but we appreciate any organizers of the gift drive. A list of suggested items is available at the Blue Lakes Mall collection center."

Teen-age heart-liver recipient dies at 13

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Stormie Jones, the world's first heart-liver transplant recipient, died Sunday at age 13 after a six-year struggle that inspired well-wishers across the country.

The Texas teen-ager was flown to Pittsburgh's Children's Hospital from Dallas late Saturday after she complained of flu-like symptoms. At the hospital, Stormie "deteriorated throughout the morning and died at 9:52 a.m.," said Dr. Jorge Reyes, a staff physician.

"She deserved more," said Teresa Millikan, a family friend who spearheaded efforts to raise funds for Stormie's hospital expenses. "She was God's walking angel. She touched so many people's hearts."

"Within hours of her arrival at the hospital, Stormie's blood pressure dropped," Reyes said. She became lethargic, then suffered a heart attack, he said. Doctors tried for more than an hour to resuscitate her.

"She presented acute respiratory distress and had a cardiac arrest," Reyes told reporters. "Things happened with incredible speed," said hospital spokeswoman Lynn McMahon. Said Stormie was alert when she was taken to Children's Hospital and it had not appeared to be an emergency, she said.

"An autopsy was performed Sunday, but details were not immediately released," she said.

Stormie was 6 when she received a heart and liver in a historic transplant operation Feb. 14, 1984. The operation was necessary because she

Never felt comfortable under media's glare was born with a condition that put her cholesterol levels at 10 times normal.

Hepatitis damaged that liver and this year she returned to Pittsburgh and received a second liver Feb. 20. In July, she was again treated for hepati-

tis, which damaged her second transplanted liver. Doctors said it was a mystery how she contracted hepatitis.

Stormie, of the Fort Worth suburb of White Settlement, and her mother, Lois Purcell, left Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport on Saturday evening.

Millikan said Saturday that Stormie had not been feeling well since midweek.

"She doesn't feel good, she's tired," she said. "She hasn't been able to sleep for the past three nights. She's had it pretty rough."

Her daughter, Crystal, who was Stormie's best friend, said the ailing girl never felt comfortable under the media's glare and wanted more than anything to feel like a normal teen-ager.

"She wished everybody would treat her normal instead of like she had an operation, because she didn't like everybody asking her how she felt or if she was feeling OK," Crystal said, tears welling in her eyes.

"Nobody in the world was as sweet or kind as her. There'll be nobody like her," she said.

Stormie, who turned 13 in May, had hoped to write an autobiography titled "In The Darkness." The book was to be "about my life, my family, all the pet animals I've had," she said earlier this year.

The blonde teen-ager said she liked frightening books, movies and television programs, such as the cable horror series "Tales From The Crypt" and the movie "Pet Sematary."

Conservative GOPs hope to oust Rhode Island senator from leadership

WASHINGTON — Conservatives are seeking to oust the most liberal member of the Senate Republican leadership Tuesday as part of a broader bid to strengthen their policy-making role within the GOP.

In party caucuses they are backing Sen. Thad Cochran, Miss., who is popular in both moderate and conservative wings of the party, in his effort to replace Sen. John H. Chafee, R.I., as chairman of the Senate Republican Conference, the third-ranking GOP leadership post.

Rates for several lesser party posts also are becoming ideological in nature in what appears to be a concerted effort by conservatives to win and use party posts to advance their agenda both within the Senate and in dealings with the White House.

Although a friend and supporter of President Bush, Chafee has strayed from the party line on sensitive issues of particular concern to conservatives, most recently voting to overturn Bush's veto of the 1990 Civil Rights Act. The veto was narrowly sustained.

Both Chafee and Cochran, now the Republican conference secretary, have indicated they are optimistic about their chances. The outcome is seen as uncertain.

Robert J. Dole, Kan., top Minority Whip, Atan K. Simpsun, Wyo., is being challenged, although conservatives explored the possibility of running a candidate against Simpsun earlier in the year.

On the Democratic side, Senate Majority Leader George J. Mitchell, Maine, has no opposition, and Sen. Wendell H. Ford, Ky., who made an unsuccessful last-minute bid two years ago for the post of whip, or assistant minority leader, is expected to get the job this time.

The post is now held by Sen. Alan Cranston, Calif., who announced Thursday that he will relinquish the job and will seek re-election to his Senate seat in 1992 because he has prostate cancer.

Investigation by the Senate ethics committee for their involvement with failed savings and loan executive Charles H. Keating Jr., faced probable defeat by Ford in the whip race as well as bleak prospects for reelection in California.

After Cranston withdrew, Sen. David Pryor, Ark., now the third-ranking Democratic leader and a popular figure with many of the Senate's newer members, tested the waters for two days. But Pryor announced yesterday he would run again for his current post as secretary of the Democratic Conference and endorsed Ford.

Child sex-abuse case drags on in North Carolina town

EDENTON, N.C. (AP) — Colonial-style buildings still line the business district in this town on Albemarle Sound that once was North Carolina's colonial capital. The picturesque small town retains a quaint charm.

But Edenton now is the site of the state's biggest and most complicated child-abuse case.

Prosecutors allege that over the course of a year at the Little Rascals Day Care Center, 29 children were

sexually assaulted by the owners, employees and a friend of the owner. All seven deny the charges.

With more than 400 counts, the case exceeds that of the McMartin Pre-School trial in California in which the defendants were acquitted earlier this year. One of those defendants, Raymond Buckey, was tried a second time, but the prosecution ended with a deadlocked jury in July and the charges were dropped.

The McMartin case consumed

seven years of court time and cost Los Angeles County more than \$13.5 million, making it the longest, most expensive criminal court case in U.S. history.

Many of Edenton's 5,800 residents are uneasy discussing the case here. Many have close friends on both sides, and District Attorney Harp Williams has asked residents not to spread "unfounded" statements about the case.

"I'm getting tired of hearing about

it," said Steve, an attendant at a service station who wouldn't give his last name. "I wish they'd just get gone and get it over with. A lot of people feel that way."

The case broke when someone lodged a complaint in January 1989 alleging abuse of children at the center. The state Child Day Care section in Raleigh revoked the center's license in March 1989 and one of the center's owners, Bob Kelly, was arrested shortly after.

TWA proposes Pan Am buyout

NEW YORK (AP) — Trans World Airlines offered to buy Pan Am Corp. for \$150 million in cash and \$300 in securities, the two struggling airlines said Sunday.

The proposal is contingent on Pan Am calling off a \$400 million agreement to sell U.S.-London routes to United Airlines Corp., said Pamela Hanlon, a Pan Am spokeswoman.

TWA, which also flies into London's Heathrow Airport, stipulated that Pan Am and TWA would have to sell overlapping international routes at the same time to complete the buyout, she said.

TWA proposed the buyout Friday in a letter to Pan Am. The letter proposes Pan Am shareholders receive \$1 per share in cash and securities with a face value of \$2 per share.

The securities, either preferred stock or promissory notes, could bring different market prices.

Pan Am's stock closed at \$1.62 1/2 Friday on the New York Stock Exchange.

Asked if Pan Am viewed the offer as hostile, Ms. Hanlon said she did not want to characterize the proposal.

If the Pan Am-UAL deal is not completed by Nov. 14, the route sale could be called off, Pan Am said in a statement. Pan Am said it was working to complete the route sale to United.

Constitutional law experts say Noriega tape ruling shows shocking censorship

ATLANTA (AP) — A federal appeals court ruling barring Cable News Network from broadcasting tapes of Manuel Noriega's telephone conversations with his lawyers was a shocking show of censorship, constitutional law experts said Sunday.

The Atlanta-based network, which has pledged to appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court, said it stopped televising the tapes on Saturday morning.

Noriega's attorneys, arguing that the broadcasts would endanger Noriega's right to a fair trial on drug-trafficking charges, asked a judge Saturday to fine CNN \$300,000 for each time it aired the tapes.

George Rahdert, a lawyer at the Poynter Institute of Media Studies, characterized Saturday's appellate ruling as "absolutely an astonishing illustration of censorship."

Rahdert, who represents several newspapers, said CNN was "playing with blasting caps" by defying a Miami judge's order against airing the tapes.

"It's rare in general that a news organization of any kind — broadcast, cable or print — would do such a thing," he said. "It really falls into the category of civil disobedience."

Floyd Abrams, a New York constitutional lawyer who served as co-counsel for The New York Times in the Pentagon Papers case, said the

outcome of a CNN appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court could be a landmark decision because rules involving prior restraint have been very clear through the years.

"We've almost totally banned prior restraint," Abrams said. "If the Supreme Court were to uphold the prior restraint order on CNN, this would be the first time in our country's history that any such court order had been affirmed by the court."

The ruling came after CNN defied U.S. District Judge William Hoeverter on Friday, broadcasting excerpts from the tapes minutes after the judge issued an order barring the cable network from doing so.

Humane Society proposes breeding ban to stop killing of 10,000 animals a year

SAN MATEO, Calif. (AP) — Local humane society officials are pressing for an ordinance to ban all breeding of dogs and cats. It's not that they are against puppies and kittens, they just want to stop killing 10,000 unwanted animals each year.

The debate over the proposed breeding ban is shaping into a class battle fought by responsible pet owners and breeders of aristocratic pets, and shelter workers who must euthanize thousands of those pets' poorer cousins each year.

"What is radical is what we've been doing, killing animals," said Kim Stula, executive director of the Peninsula Humane Society. "I think it's crazy that it's become acceptable to kill dogs and cats."

Under the proposal, believed to be the first of its kind in the nation, pet owners found in violation could face fines ranging from \$100 to \$500. Penalties would be waived if the animals are spayed or neutered.

"It doesn't seem right. If people allow their animals to roam outside, then I understand why they should be spayed or neutered," said Carolyn Varner of San Mateo County, who is selling two 5-month-old registered Persian kittens for \$175 each.

Panel begins investigating reports that government harassed injured workers

WASHINGTON — A House panel has begun a preliminary investigation into the federal government's treatment of its injured workers, which allegedly is so callous that it has provoked the heart attack death of at least one former-FBI agent and suicides of others, according to witnesses and sources familiar with the probe.

In stark contrast to the days when the government's disability payments were going wrongfully to healthy, fit individuals, injured federal workers have told congressional investigators that the Office of Workers' Compensation Programs has harassed those with legitimate complaints.

The government's treatment has included sending patients to as many as 26 doctors for proof-of-the-disability claim and ending, or threatening to end, compensation benefits that often are the only source of household income, said former federal employees and congressional sources said.

IRS agent says he feels abandoned, blackmailed

WASHINGTON — Mike Klein thinks he will die soon.

The former-undecover Internal Revenue Service agent, who cracked the biggest bribery case in the agency's history, fell apart physically under the stress of such incidents: the night a man with a phony mustache and a cowboy hat showed up with a double-barrel shotgun outside his metropolitan Atlanta door in 1985.

Klein escaped the apparent murder attempt, but has developed non-healing heart conditions that he now carries a monitor with him linking him directly with the hospital. Klein also has diabetes, and problems in his arteries that cause so much pain he now has difficulty walking.

A parade of 11 doctors have de-

clared him totally and permanently disabled, and he linked his problems to the stress of his undercover work.

But the government, for which Klein nearly gave his life in order to expose a man who wanted to pay him more than half a million dollars to stop an IRS criminal investigation, apparently doesn't believe the medical opinions, Klein said.

"Now they want me to go to more doctors," he said. "This harassment is killing me."

Klein's lawsuit of last year to get a lump-sum settlement from the government for his job-related disability is one of several cases being investigated by the House Subcommittee on Labor Standards, which is probing allegations of wrongdoing that have been made against the Office of Workers'

Compensation Programs, according to sources familiar with the probe.

OWCP Director Larry Rogers vigorously denies that there is any general intent to withhold benefits and said he is proud of the program's record. However, he said the release of lump sums is discretionary — in his department — and added that he does not favor such settlements.

But Rep. Ben Jones, D-Ga., said he believes that Klein has been mistreated by the OWCP and is using his congressional muscle in an attempt to help the former agent.

"I think that this constituent has shown the kind of documentation to make his case very strongly and I feel the OWCP should be more responsive and more cooperative for this man, who did a very fine job for the IRS," Jones said.

ever, he added, the office rejects 35 percent of the occupational disease claims, which includes such conditions as heart disease and stress.

"On the whole, while there have been points of dissatisfaction, I don't think there is an inherent problem," Rogers said. "In any benefit program — such as Social Security — there are going to be people who do not agree with our decisions, and sometimes the agency is going to make a mistake."

"I think it's a normal thing that when you deal with these tough, stressful, over-the-top situations over a period of time, I would think most people would become a little insensitive," the aide added. "But there comes a point to which the insensitivity becomes a bitter form of cynicism and an attitude that everyone who makes a claim is a fraud and that's what has happened there."

OWCP Director Lawrence W. Rogers said that the division occasionally makes mistakes in determining who should receive compensation, but he denied that there was a "conscious policy" to withhold benefits from deserving workers.

"What happens is, we turn them down, and they don't like it, and it goes on and on" through appeals, Rogers said. "One person had a claim with us for 30 years, and filed something like 25 or 26 appeals."

"They just build up in their mind the notion that they ought to get them (the payments)," he added.

Rogers said his office's overall approval rate for workers compensation applications is 92 percent.

Charles S. Bradford, president of the Atlanta insurance company Delta Group of Settlement Companies, said the harassment and mismanagement he has observed in the federal agency is a "scandal" that would never be tolerated outside of a federal agency.

"To me it's criminal the way these guys are treating these people so far, but if that's the way they do it, what do you expect of them? They'll get pulled off (the compensation rolls)," Bradford said, who is "trying to help an injured worker receive a federal benefit."

Man sets himself ablaze near queen

LONDON (AP) — A man set fire to himself Sunday and ran down a street lined with people watching Queen Elizabeth II lay a wreath at a monument to Britain's fallen war heroes.

Hundreds of people watched in horror as the 29-year-old man climbed over a police barrier set up on Whitehall Place to control crowds gathered for Remembrance Day, which commemorates the veterans of the two world wars.

The queen, her husband the Duke of Edinburgh, and dozens of government leaders including Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher appeared unaware of the incident, which took place about 400 yards away.

"The man climbed over the barrier and ran down Whitehall set himself on fire and ran," said a spokesman for Scotland Yard said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

The spokesman said police officers used their coats to beat out the

flames. The man was taken to a nearby hospital, where he was listed in serious condition. Police did not reveal his identity.

"There was a whoosh," said Geoff McPherson, a 45-year-old engineer who saw the incident. "He was

alight fully from his toes to his head, his arms and every part of his body was covered in flames. I have never seen anything ignite so quickly."

McPherson said police grabbed the man, who tried to dodge away but was tackled.

Israel replaces police officials in shakeup over Temple Mount

JERUSALEM (AP) — Two top police officials were replaced in a shakeup stemming from last month's Temple Mount killings, officials said Sunday.

The Cabinet, meanwhile, discussed a compromise move to ally international participants of Israel over the Oct. 8 Temple Mount shootings, in which 20 Arabs were killed by police gunfire.

Also Sunday, authorities announced 2,400 more Palestinians would be banned from entering Israel for security reasons, and an Israeli soldier was shot and wounded in the West Bank.

In the police shakeup, Jerusalem police chief Aryeh Bibi and Rachamim Comfort, commander of the southern police district which includes Jerusalem, were reassigned.

Both were strongly criticized in a government report on the Temple Mount killings. The report, com-

manded by a three-member investigating team, condoned the use of live fire on stone throwers and said Palestinians started the riot, but criticized police for failing to anticipate the violence.

In the wake of the report, Police Minister Ronit Allon decided to create a new police district in Jerusalem. Chaim Albalade, currently head of the central police district, will become commander of the new district, thus removing Bibi.

Comfort was replaced by Rafi Peled, currently chief of the National Police intelligence department.

The report had criticized both Comfort and Bibi for bad judgment and mistaken assessment of intelligence data in the Temple Mount incident.

Israel radio reported that Comfort and Peled will work together for several months, and then Comfort would retire early.

Bibi's name was not included in the list of new appointments. The radio said he was expected to be moved to another post which would not entail a promotion in rank.

Jerusalem was swept by a wave of Jewish-Arab street clashes following the Temple Mount shootings. In recent weeks, police strength in Jerusalem reached 2,000 officers, about one-eighth of the police force for the entire country.

In the Cabinet discussion of international criticism over the Temple Mount shootings, ministers suggested Sunday they would be willing to welcome a U.N. envoy — if the visit was not directly tied to a Security Council resolution condemning Israel.

Foreign Minister David Levy told army-radio that the possibility would be discussed both at the United Nations and with U.S. officials in Washington.

India won't extradite hijackers

CALCUTTA, India (AP) — Two Burmese students who hijacked a Thai jetliner will not be extradited as officials consider their request for political asylum news reports and officials said Sunday.

Prosecutors, meanwhile, filed charges against the two men and an official said they would be given special treatment while in custody.

The students commandeered the Thai Airways Airbus 300 on Saturday with a phony bomb made from soap and wires. They said they wanted to draw attention to the military's refusal to relinquish power in Burma to an elected civilian government.

United News of India quoted unidentified sources as saying the government has decided not to hand over the students to Burmese authorities.

A Foreign Ministry official said the government was considering their request for political asylum even though it has not been made formal. He did not say what constituted a formal request.

The plane was hijacked shortly before it was due to land in Rangoon, Burma, on a flight from Bangkok, Thailand, and was diverted to Calcutta. All 203 passengers in Calcutta aboard a special Thai Airways plane Sunday. The Foreign Ministry official said the government impounded the plane.

John Paul visits 'Living Hell' prison

NAPLES, Italy (AP) — Pope John Paul II on Sunday visited an infamous prison known as "The Living Hell," where he prayed with AIDS victims and urged drug traffickers to go straight.

John Paul told 300 inmates in the prison "chapel" that faith could help them escape an underworld of drug trafficking, violence and the Mafia. The theme has marked the pope's five-day visit to the Naples region, his longest pastoral journey in Italy.

"My dear friends, I have come to invite you to have patience, to seek goodness and mutual understanding," the pontiff told the inmates, most of them in their 20s, clad in jeans.

"Think about your families, sorely tried by your condition; think about those who love you and count on you. Carry a little serenity within you, even in this place and among yourselves."

The 71-year-old Poggionale prison is the most notorious in crime-ridden Naples, a cause of overcrowding and poor conditions. Built for 1,000 prisoners, it housed 2,700 until recently, when several hundred were transferred to a new prison.

Many prisoners are detained on drug charges and 600 are drug addicts, according to the prison. Among Poggionale's most famous inmates was Raffaele Cutolo, a convicted murderer and boss of the Camorra, a Neapolitan Mafia.

Japanese Emperor Akihito formally enthroned

TOKYO - Emperor Akihito was formally enthroned today as the first ruler of Japan to have the other role in Japanese national life than a symbolic one. But because of terrorist threats from unconvicted leftists, the brief ceremony was overcast by a massive security apparatus.

Despite a record 37,000 armed police sealing off central Tokyo since Sunday, terrorists succeeded in firing small explosive devices at more than 20 religious, military and governmental targets in and around the city. At least 10 fires broke out, but no injuries were reported.

Among the targets were the home of the U.S. consul-general near Kobe and the U.S. naval base at Atsugi. In other attacks, explosions at a number of subway stations in the heart of the city halted some lines for up to a few hours.

A radical group called Chukakuha (Middle Core Faction) claimed responsibility for attacks at a rally in Tokyo.

The sky was clear and the temperature crisp as the diminutive 56-year-old Akihito entered a broad, open-faced pavilion deep within the walled grounds of the Imperial Palace. He mounted three brass-bound stairs to a domed, 20-foot-tall octagonal platform of gilded and red-lacquered wood. Standing before a simple wooden chair, he proclaimed that he had become Japan's 125th emperor.

Noting that he'd already succeeded to the throne upon the death of his father, Emperor Hirohito, in January 1989, "in accordance with the constitution of Japan and the Imperial Household Law," Akihito said in a succinct address: "I now... proclaim my enthronement to those at home and abroad."

"I pledge anew that I shall observe the constitution of Japan and discharge my duties as symbol of the state and of the unity of the people, in the same spirit as my father," he said, reading slowly and clearly, using ordinary Japanese, rather than court language, as his father had done when he was enthroned 62 years earlier in Kyoto.

Akihito also expressed his hope that Japan would contribute to international peace and prosperity.

Prime Minister Toshiki Kaifu said the accession of the new emperor would launch the

"building of a new Japan, open to the world, vigorous and culturally rich."

Kaifu then led more than 2,000 Japanese guests surrounding the central courtyard of the palace in three rounds of "Genji Maiko" (10,000 years to His Imperial Majesty?). Because Banzai is redolent of the battle cry of Japanese soldiers during World War II, foreign guests were not asked to join in.

As the cheers ring out, a 21-gun cannonade mounted by artillerymen of the Self-Defense Forces thundered in the background.

Kaifu was dressed in black swallow-tailed coat and striped trousers rather than traditional robes as part of a carefully contrived effort to show that the government is distinct from the imperial court. Further, Kaifu spoke from in front of the emperor's throne, not from the courtyard, as was done in the past. This was intended to demonstrate that the government is no longer subservient to the emperor, but that sovereignty lies with the people, as specified in the U.S.-dictated Constitution.

Under the national charter, the emperor is officially a "symbol of the State," nothing more. Akihito's father, the late Emperor Hirohito, like his predecessors, came to the throne as a "living god" but gave up his divinity at the demand of U.S. Occupation Commander Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

The enthronement of Akihito, the first such ceremony in 62 years, is being challenged by some Japanese as central to an alleged government plan to reinstate rightist, if not outright militarist, leadership. Criticism is heightened by the government's expenditure of \$64 million in taxpayers' money for what many regard as a private affair of the royal family.

Suspicious bag of underwear causes bomb scare in Japan

TOKYO (AP) - Trains were delayed for several hours before dawn Sunday as a bomb squad disposed of a "suspicious-looking" paper bag that turned out to be filled with women's underwear.

The bomb scare came as police were on top alert against terrorist activity against Emperor Akihito's coronation, which began today.

A police spokesman in Utsunomiya, a Tokyo suburb, said a railway employee spotted the bag beneath a bridge on the Tokaido line just before 2 a.m.

The bomb squad, soon arrived at the scene, froze the bag with liquid nitrogen and transported it to a nearby river bank for further investigation. Police found a few dozen pieces of women's underwear.

"I suppose if you would have looked closely enough you might have been able to tell that it was harmless, but you never know," the official said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

The investigation led to delays or cancellations of nearly 30 passenger and freight trains, the official said.

Guatemalans choose among 12 presidential contenders

GUATEMALA CITY (AP) - After a long, bloody campaign, Guatemalans voted in peace Sunday for a dozen presidential candidates who promised an end to economic and social chaos.

Police indicated that newspaper publisher Jorge Carpio Nicolle would be in a Jan. 6 runoff vote against former Guatemala City Mayor Alvaro Arzu Ingoyen or engineer Jorge Serrano Elias. A runoff is required if no candidate gets more than half the vote. There were 3.3 million registered voters.

No voting disruptions were reported, but the violence that has marred the long campaign continued to the last minute. Carpio's Union of the National Center said one of its officials in El Quiche was killed Saturday.

On election day, however, there were no reports of violence or interference with the vote, said Ramiro de Leon Carpio, the federal human rights ombudsman.

If the winner takes office as scheduled, the 36-year-old Nicolle would be Guatemala's troubled, military-dominated history that one elected civilian had taken office from another.

"My impression is that this is a very open, honest election. I'm impressed," said U.S. Ambassador Thomas F. Shroy. "I hope the vote count is sufficiently high so it cannot be attacked as being non-representative."

Arturo Herbringer Asturias, president of the Supreme Electoral Tribunal, said the turnout was not expected to be higher than 60 percent, compared to 69 percent in 1985.

Enough returns to indicate a trend in the results were expected by early Monday.

The armed forces, who cannot vote, kept a low profile Sunday, but their armed civil patrols were in evidence in the highlands. In most places, election-day security was left to the police.

Guatemala City authorities ordered a special subsidy so that people could ride buses free of charge. Stores and other businesses remained closed, and the sale of alcoholic beverages was banned throughout the day.

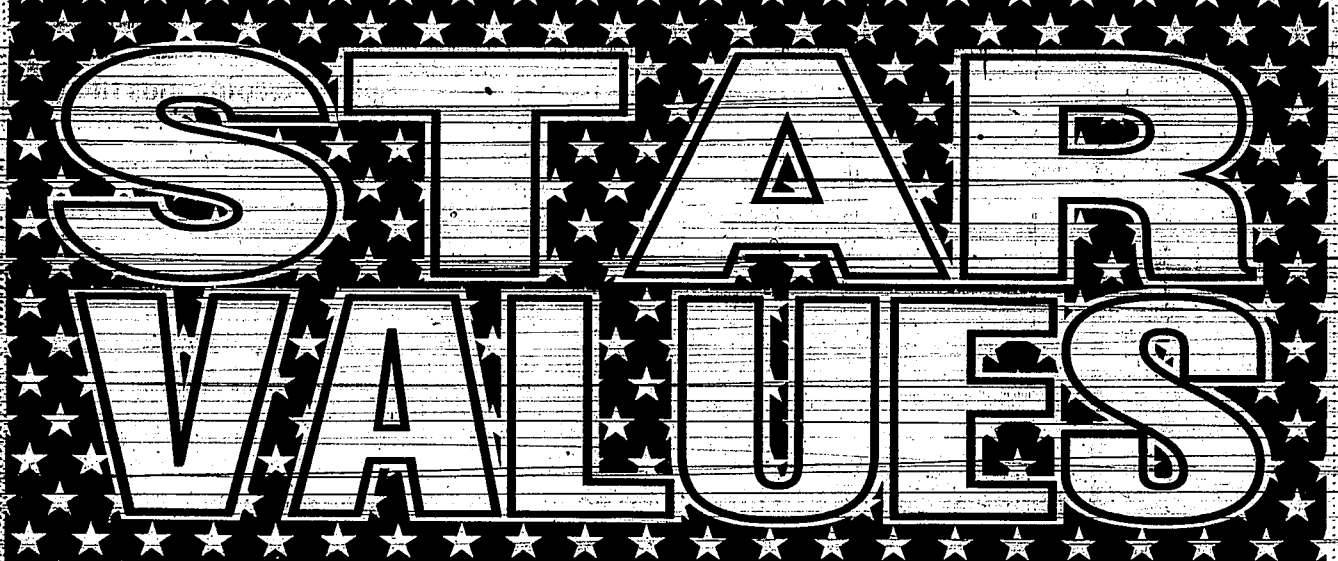
A few streets and avenues were strewn with sharp three-pronged nails to puncture vehicle tires and snarl traffic, but residents and municipal workers quickly swept the roads clean. It wasn't known who left the

nails; leftist guerrillas had called for people to boycott the vote.

The winner inherits a 30-year-old civil war, a bankrupt government, 60 percent inflation, and an epidemic of street crime and human rights abuse.

Take time to invest in yourself

In this life, each of us has the task from birth through adulthood of pursuing what psychologists call the "separation/individuation" process: moving away from parents and others to stand alone, to value ourselves, and to trust our own judgments, opinions, and decisions.

"One woman cogently expresses the self-diminishment that can come from not 'separating' and 'individuating': 'For years I felt like a liability - rather than an asset - to others and to myself. I was always trying to please other people, to say the right thing and to fit in.'"

Continuing, she says: "My lack of self-worth expressed itself in every facet of my life. If I went to a doctor, I felt so timid I didn't know something. If I went to the grocery store and the clerk looked at me 'wrong,' I was sure it was because there was something wrong with me. If I wanted to express my opinion or give someone a compliment, I felt so badly about myself, I would wonder, 'Why would they care about what I think?' I ended up feeling isolated and lonely, disconnected from people at any level."

Notice that this woman's focus is "other-centered," that is, she is looking outward, rather than inward, for her strength. And she is assessing her worth through the ambiguous cues of others. This "other-centered" focus leaves her extremely vulnerable to the whims and capricious moods of others. Since the stark reality is that there is no direct relationship between "pleasing" and gaining abundant gestures of approval. At best, these rewards are only intermittently conferred by other people.

In addition, the "other-centered" focus prevents her from furthering her development of self since she bases her movements on the movements of others.

The following are ways that you, or anyone, might focus on others - to the extreme - and at the expense of developing a self.

- letting your good feelings about who you're best on depend on others
- focusing typically on pleasing others without putting your own needs into the equation
- putting aside your own interests and hobbies to invest in those of others
- letting your fear of rejection or anger determine what you say or do
- talking another's opinion and way of doing things more than your own
- being constantly critical of yourself

Used to be, when P.E. was mentioned, many students would say "P-U!"

Ask most adults their memories of physical education classes, and they'll recall endless games of kickball, tackly uniforms and mortifying moments for the less athletic. But things have changed, at least in some schools.

Twin Falls County boasts two of the state's strongest examples of successful, innovative physical education programs. At Hansen High School, Renea Remaley was recently named Outstanding Secondary Teacher of the Year by the Idaho Association of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance.

The same organization also honored Kimberly Elementary School as an Idaho Model School in Physical Education. The physical education specialist there is Wes Remaley.

The Remaleys, who are married, face the same battle now being waged by physical education teachers across the nation: encouraging fitness among today's youth, who experts say may be the most sedentary and least fit generation in American history.

Still, the Remaleys believe it is a battle that can be won by making P.E. relevant and fun, and by supplementing gym class with other activities.

At Kimberly, 36-year-old Wes encourages games of cooperation and activities that will keep everyone involved, with no one sitting on the sidelines. "I believe competition has been stressed way too much," he says.

Two years ago Kimberly Elementary was named Idaho's Model School in Health Education. Only one other school,

Remaleys give tips on keeping kids fit

When he was a kid, children hurried back outside after school for a pick-up game of whatever sport was in season.

According to the President's Council on Physical Fitness, 40 percent of children 5 to 8 years old already show at least one risk factor for heart disease. Pediatricians across the country say one in five American youngsters is overweight, an increase of more than 50 percent in the last two decades.

What can parents do to help their kids become more fit? Physical education teachers Renea and Wes Remaley, who work in the Hansen and Kimberly schools respectively, offer these suggestions:

"Stop letting the TV be a baby-sitter," Renea says. "We don't suggest nearly-limiting television viewing and Nintendo time, particularly after school. That's the time they should be outside," he says, recalling how

"Support schools' efforts to boost physical education programs both in and out of traditional gym classes." Pursue activities together as a family. "You have to encourage activity," Renea says. "If you don't, it's not going to be there naturally."

"I'm a serious pedestrian," Wes says. He, Renea and their two daughters - 8-year-old Ali and 4-year-old Ashley - regularly walk together.

Walking is ideal because it doesn't cost anything, has no age limits and requires no special equipment. "It's a great way to meet your family again," Wes adds. "We don't only walk, we talk."

Riding sleds injures children

As winter weather sets in and children bring out the sleds and toboggans, the American Journal of Diseases of Children cautions that kids need more supervision in these snow sports.

In a recent Massachusetts study of sledding injuries in a three-year period, the journal said, 211 accidents sent 192 children to emergency rooms and necessitated 19 hospitalizations.

Children in the 5-to-9 age bracket seem to have the most sled injuries, the kids who rode sleds had higher rates of injuries than those on toboggans.

The study also found sled riders generally sustained head and upper extremity injuries while tobogganers usually injured the lower portion of their bodies.

The authors of the study recommend children ride with their heads toward the back of the sled or toboggan, wear protective clothing, and best of all - a helmet.

The council has the following tips for travelers:

- When traveling, keep your medication on your person at all times; never leave it in checked baggage.
- Bring enough medicine to last your entire trip.
- If you are traveling through different time zones, check with your doctor or pharmacist on your dosage schedule.
- Keep a list of your prescriptions in case you need a refill.

FDA asks for end to use of illegally marketed drug

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Food and Drug Administration urged consumers to stop taking an illegally marketed and possibly dangerous drug used for strength training and body building. The FDA said it has received reports of more than 30 people in California, Florida and Georgia who have become ill after taking a drug called GHB, or gamma hydroxy-

butyric acid. The drug is also called sodium oxybate and gamma hydroxybutyrate. The agency said GHB can cause nausea and vomiting, severe respiratory problems, seizures and coma. California officials acted earlier in the week, urging consumers to that state to stop using the drug. GHB is sold as powder or gran-

ules through mail order outlets, health food stores, bodybuilding gyms and fitness centers. It is promoted for strength training, bodybuilding, weight loss and as a replacement for L-tryptophan. L-tryptophan, a food supplement used as a sleep aid and for depression and weight control, was ordered off the market last March when it was linked to an outbreak of a rare blood disorder called eosinophilic myalgia syndrome. GHB is being evaluated in approved clinical trials as a treatment for narcolepsy, a sleep disorder. Europe GHB has been used as an adjunct to anesthesia, the agency said. It is not approved for any use in the United States.

Exercise to strengthen the back Study says not enough being done to avoid disabilities among elderly

A strong back is the basis for an overall fit body. Developing your back muscles will give you added strength for activities that require you to pull your arms back or overhead.

The upper back consists of the middle and lower trapezius and the rhomboids which work to pull the shoulder blades back and toward the spine.

Body Lessons

The following exercise will focus on the muscles that bring the shoulder blades together — the rhomboids and the middle trapezius.

Start in a "knee lunge" position, with your left knee on the floor while your right foot is on the floor in front of you.

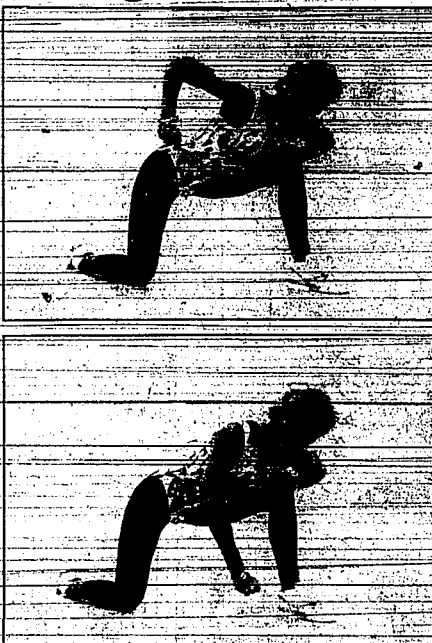
Lean your torso comfortably forward so it rests gently on the right thigh that is in front of you. Place your right hand on your right knee to help support your torso.

You may do the exercise with or without weights. If using weights, wrap the weight around each arm above the elbow joints. You can also use hand-held weights.

Regardless of the type of weights you are using, keep the left elbow bent and lift it directly toward the left side so your upper arm is perpendicular to your torso. Slowly lower your arm directly downward.

Try the movements approximately 10 times. Reverse the knee-lunge position and work the right arm. Repeat as desired.

If you choose to use weights, start with one-half to one-pound weights. Try working at a low weight for a week or two until you can do the

repetitions with ease, then gradually increase in half-pound increments. When working out with weights, remember to keep your movements slow and controlled.

Contaminated eyedrops cause woman to lose an eye; 12 others being treated

PITTSBURGH (AP) — One woman lost an eye and at least 12 other people are being treated for serious eye infections after using bacteria-contaminated drops made by a pharmacy here, doctors said.

Surgeons at Allegheny General Hospital this week discovered the drops were tainted after the woman who lost her eye was referred to them, said Dr. John Kennerdell, chairman of the hospital's ophthalmology department.

"Once this type of bacteria gains access to the inside of the eye it causes a very devastating infection," Kennerdell said. "That's why it's so dangerous."

The drops were sold by Hieber's Drug Store, which has been in business for more than a century and is owned by Kilkenny. The pharmacist said he makes about 10 bottles at a time for five Pittsburgh physicians who prescribe the medication.

The drops contain a liquid solution and Indocin, a non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drug taken in pill form for arthritis. Although the Food and Drug Administration has approved use of Indocin for arthritis,

some doctors prescribe it to reduce swelling of the retina following eye surgery, Kennerdell said.

Kilkenny dissolves the pills in a liquid solution, sterilizes the mixture and bottles it.

Pharmacists commonly mix solutions not offered by drug companies to meet community needs. Dr. Harvey Miller, an FDA spokesman in Philadelphia,

The majority of the 13 patients, mostly women 55 to 78 years old, took the drops after undergoing cataract surgery during the past month, Kennerdell said.

It isn't known how many people bought or used the contaminated drops. However, pharmacist Joseph Kilkenny, who made the eye drops, told 29-30 customers bought the drops in October. They have been told to quit using the drug and return it to their doctor or the pharmacy.

Thirteen people were hospitalized for treatment, nine at Allegheny General, three at Central Medical Center and one at Eye & Ear Institute, all in Pittsburgh, doctors said. One man who used the drops is being monitored by Kennerdell but shows no sign of infection.

Doctors removed the woman's right eye last week after antibiotics failed. The 12 other patients are receiving large doses of antibiotics. Two of the patients have impaired vision and could lose an eye, Kennerdell said.

Doctors declined to disclose the patients' names.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Growing older doesn't have to mean becoming sick and frail, and health care workers should work more aggressively to reduce illness and reduce disability among the elderly, a new study says.

A committee of the Institute of Medicine said in a recently released report that there is a grim myth among the public and health care workers that growing older means an increase in sickness and frailty, and that there is little that can change this fate.

In fact, said the committee, with research, health promotion and education, much of the illness and disability of the aged can be overcome, treated or avoided.

The committee noted that health professionals who believe that little can be done to help older people achieve a high quality life will not help the elderly reach this goal. And, these stereotypes, said the committee, are self-fulfilling.

"Our misplaced pessimism gives rise to the particularly troubling consequence that many more individuals who could experience a fulfilling maturity are denied the chance by these stereotypes," the committee report said.

The report said there will be more chronic illnesses and disabilities among the elderly, but this should not temper aggressive treatment care and research.

"We should not let pessimism become an obstacle to the introduction of new research on interventions to restore and maintain function among physically or mentally impaired older people," the study said.

Since American society is gradually aging, the report said, the medical community should promote healthy lifestyles, not only for the young, but for all ages. Health workers, it said, should also "prevent the ill from becoming disabled and help the disabled to prevent further disability."

To help the elderly achieve and maintain a more vigorous life in the final years, the committee made recommendations in 13 areas:

- High Blood Pressure: Since high blood pressure often precedes stroke and heart attack, the committee said there should be programs of education, detection and treatment among those over age 50. It said Medicare and private insurance should reimburse the expense of doctor visits to evaluate blood pressure.

- Medications: Age should be taken into account in testing drugs. Health care workers and elderly patients should be more aware of the combined effects, possible from combinations of medications.
- Infectious Diseases: All people over 50 should be immunized against pneumonia and influenza. Better infection controls should be used in hospitals and nursing homes.
- Osteoporosis: Older people should be instructed about measures to prevent thinning of the bones, such as adequate calcium and vitamin D intake, and the need to maintain physical activity. More research is needed about how to best treat fractures caused by osteoporosis.
- Sensory Loss: Better services should be provided to those losing sight and hearing, and public and private insurers should cover more of these costs.
- Oral Health: More research is needed to achieve and maintain dental health among the elderly. Dental loss now is largely preventable in the elderly.
- Cancer Screening: More aggressive cancer checkups should be instituted among the elderly.

- Nutrition: Further research is needed on the minimum nutrition requirements of the elderly.
- Smoking: Even in the elderly, should be encouraged to stop. Advertising of tobacco products should be banned.
- Depression: Doctors should be trained to recognize and treat depression among the elderly, and some limitations on Medicare and insurance reimbursements for psychiatric care should be removed.
- Physical Inactivity: Sedentary lifestyles can damage health. Health care workers should promote programs to encourage elderly to get regular exercise.
- Social Isolation: Isolated individuals should be identified and means found to give them more social contact. Loneliness, the report said, can play an important role in development of disease and disability.

- Falls: Falls among the elderly are a major cause of mortality, morbidity and disability," the report said. It recommends more research on methods of preventing falls, and studies on how best to treat injuries that result from falls.

THE ACES ON BRIDGE...BOBBY WOLFF

"Nothing is easier than self-deceit. For what each man wishes, that he also believes to be true."

Demonstrates:

In a recent duplicate game, most declarers failed in the fourth heart game. They played for diamonds to be 3-2 (68 percent), and when that wish was unfulfilled, the defenders got a plus score.
Most declarers took the spade ace and rushed ahead to draw trumps, an impulse they were soon to regret. The 3-1 trump break didn't hurt, but the 4-1 diamond break did, and the net result was two diamond losers to add to one club for one down.
Kitty Cox of Irving, Texas, gave herself an extra chance. After winning dummy's spade ace, she ruffed a low spade and cashed the ace and queen of trumps. The spade queen was pushed through. East covered and Kitty ruffed, smothering West's 10. (Had East not covered, Kitty would have discarded a club.) A trump to dummy's jack drew East's last trump, and a club went on dummy's spade nine.
Kitty then turned her attention to diamonds with one big difference. Had they split 3-2, Kitty would have had an overtrick for a fine score. When they split 4-1, Kitty lost the overtrick, but not the fine score, the successful game providing more than adequate compensation.
