UN clears use of force in Kuwait

UNITED NATIONS — The U.N. Security Council, led by the United States, voted 12-2 Thursday to authorize military action to free Kuwait if Iraq does not withdraw its occupying troops and release all foreign hostages by Jan. 15.

The only other time the council, created 45 years ago to iron out international disputes, has sanctioned force in a session arranged by the United States was during the Korean War.

China abstained, to the disappointment of the Bush administration, while Cuba and Yemen cast dissenting votes in a session arranged by the United States in a show of international solidarity against Iraq.

In an extraordinary meeting of 13 foreign ministers, the council handed Iraqi President Saddam Hussein an ultimatum to vacate the small oil-rich sheikdom that his troops invaded Aug. 2, or risk military conflict with U.S.-led forces. The session ended with a round-of handshakes and embraces.

In Washington, President Bush called the U.N. vote "a very strong and powerful message. It will go around the world loud and clear that this guy's got to get out of there."

"Our aim today must be to convince Saddam Hussein that the just, humane demands of the Council and the international community cannot be ignored," said Secretary

of State James A. Baker III, top representative for the United States as president of the council.

Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze, in a speech both tough and philosophical, warned that Saddam would be held "personally responsible" for any use of chemical weapons and breaches of the Fourth Geneva Convention guaranteeing the rights of civilians in time of war. He said the international community has shown "genuine magnanimity in giving the side which breached the peace time to think again. ... We have started the countdown of the pause of good will ..."

"Those who breached the peace should know that all necessary means will, indeed,

inexorably be used against them."

Shevardnadze later told reporters that the Soviet Union would not consider committing any Soviet troops to an international force at this time. He cited painful memories of World War II.

The resolution gives Saddam "one final opportunity, as a pause of good will," to retreat.

But the Iraqis appeared intransigent. This latest council resolution strengthens Bush's hand with Congress and the American people in calling for offensive action against Baghdad.

Nine affirmative votes were required for passage. Any of the five permanent council members could have vetoed the measure.

Ward's Cheese runs into trouble with its new neighbors in Gooding

GOODING — A local family says it doesn't trust Ward's Cheese to live up to its promises of safe environmental practices at its proposed Gooding cheese plant.

And the Arkoosh family has threatened legal action if the company's proposed waste-water dumping site decreases the value of its property near the site or damages their quality of life.

But Gooding residents and business leaders say they want the plant. And Ward's has promised to use high-tech methods to control the waste water.

Michelle Arkoosh, representing the Arkoosh family, read a long, emotional statement from her family during a public

meeting held Wednesday by the Division of Environmental Quality of the Idaho Health and Welfare Department. Arkoosh said her family's quality of life would be damaged by the smell and the flies from the site. The Arkooshes own a Gooding restaurant and run a cattle feedlot operation east of town.

The Arkoosh farm would be down wind from the waste-water dumping site. The dump site is 240 acres adjacent to

the former meat packing plant the company purchased last spring to convert into the plant. The company will plant crops best suited to use the solids — nitrogen, phosphate and potassium — in the waste water. Waste water will run through a ditch and corrugates to reach the fields.

About 75 people turned out for the public hearing on Ward's application for the permit it needs before it can release waste water on the land.

Several Gooding residents and business people spoke in favor of the plant, which will provide 25 new jobs and process milk from about 55,000 cows daily.

Larry Rice, president of the Gooding Chamber of Commerce, said Ward's is welcome in Gooding, and Gooding resident Walt Nelson said the Arkooshes

Land, sea, air taxes raise travel costs

NEW YORK — Tax collectors start shaking a little more cash out of airline passengers and motorists this weekend.

But most people facing higher taxes in the skies don't seem to be rushing to buy tickets ahead of time, perhaps because they are unaware of the latest levy.

Likewise, tax-dodging drivers don't appear to be lining up en masse at the nation's service stations to top off one last tank at the old rate.

Not that the new taxes are playing well among businesses that might catch some of the flak from consumers who will pay more to fly and drive, or even to operate a motorboat.

Travel agents have been urging air travelers to buy quickly and beat the tax that kicks in Saturday.

But several said Tuesday that few customers seem aware of the 25 percent increase in the federal tax imposed on air fares as part of the government's effort to trim the budget deficit by nearly \$500 billion over the next five years.

"They have no idea on it," said Eric Munro, chief executive of Uniglobe Worldwide Travel in San Diego, which has warned customers by phone to get tickets early. "The government is very sly about it. They have not advertised it."

The tax could become something of a windfall for the airlines, however, because many will choose to raise ticket prices to round numbers that will bring in a little extra money on top of the levy, Munro said.

Gorbachev admits he blew it with Soviet economy

MOSCOW — President Mikhail S. Gorbachev on Thursday pronounced himself and other Communists "guilty before the working class" in a candid admission of blame for the country's worsening economy and political paralysis.

He told nearly 1,000 delegates to the 28th Moscow City Communist Party Conference that the Soviet Union faced increasing difficulties with food supplies, ethnic conflict, crime and "a battle of laws that has led to a paralysis of power."

"The reasons," Gorbachev said, were "errors in the actions of central organs, above all in the Central Committee, of the Communist Party, and including the actions of the general secretary and president."

Gorbachev, 59, is both the country's president and general secretary of the 18-million-member party.

In his hour-long speech, he promised immediate steps to increase food supplies, reiterated his determination to hold the restive republics together, and urged the delegates to keep the common man in mind.

He said failure by the party leadership to address workers' concerns was responsible for its defeat in recent elections around the country.

"We are guilty before the working class, I think, all of us, and I personally take responsibility," he said.

But Gorbachev told the delegates earlier Thursday he had no intention of quitting as party leader. He also said he was firmly for maintaining the party's dominance in society.

Standing on a podium near an 8-foot bust of Lenin, he spoke confidently and extem-

poraneously, occasionally referring to hand-written notes taken while listening to seven hours of earlier debate at the conference.

The speech appeared aimed at disarming his critics, led by Russian Federation President Boris N. Yeltsin, by accepting a measure of blame while vigorously asserting that the party is on the road to renewal and can revive the country's problems.

Gorbachev and Yeltsin differ on how to go about achieving a market economy, and Yeltsin's Russian Parliament claims it can pass laws superseding national statutes.

Recall for Congress unlikely

WASHINGTON — A former Navy secretary from the Reagan administration joined the parade of former military officials attacking President Bush's Persian Gulf buildup Thursday.

Bush focused on the U.N. resolution authorizing force against Iraq, calling it a move "closer to peace."

Bush and House Speaker Thomas Foley both expressed opposition to the idea of calling Congress back for a special session to address the gulf crisis.

The president met with House leaders while keeping an eye on the United Nations, saying he hoped Security Council approval of the resolution would "send perhaps the strongest signal of all to Saddam Hussein."

Earlier, in an interview with the Spanish language network Univision, Bush said he preferred not bringing Congress back for a special session.

He wanted to sound out congressional leaders more fully. Foley, D-Wash., and Minority Leader Robert Michel, R-Ill., had lunch with Bush, and Foley said afterward, "I hope the president doesn't call back the 101st Congress. ... Re-

ports of that may be premature."

Hearings on the gulf crisis continued on Capitol Hill, with criticism-dominating testimony before the Armed Services Committee of Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga.

"The president's mistake in sending so many troops should not be compounded by a further error in using them in a premature, unprovoked ground offensive," said former Navy Secretary James Webb.

The president's decision to send 200,000 troops to Saudi Arabia earlier this month in addition to the more than 240,000 deployed after the invasion caused Democrats to question whether the United States is careening toward war.

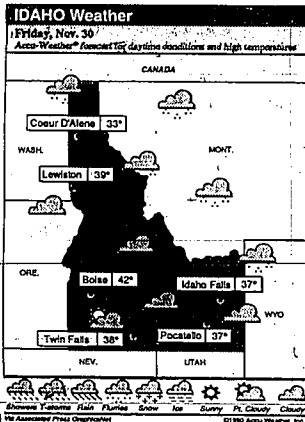
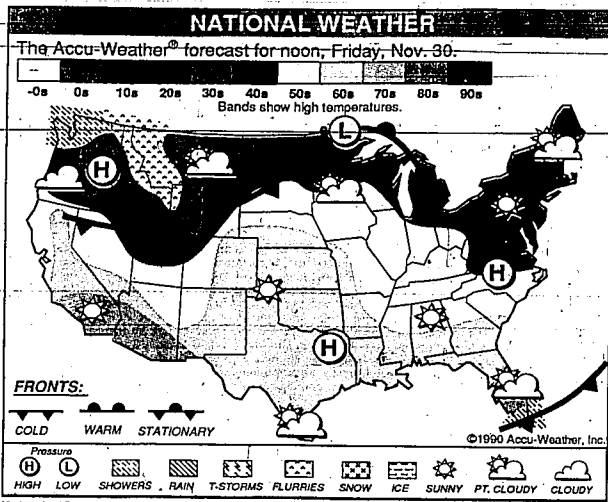
"Every single witness we've had here with differing views on other things, all of them have felt we've overdeployed," Nunn said. "Almost all witnesses have said it tends to drive you to a policy whether or not you're ready for that policy."

Webb told the panel that if Bush decides to use military force to drive Iraq from Kuwait, "he should call for an immediate resumption of the draft and then for a declaration of war" by the Congress.

He also recommended that the United States reduce the size of its gulf force and call on the allies to commit a representative number of troops.

"I worry about the shape of the new world order," Webb said. "The United States is becoming the weapon of choice."

Weather summary

The National Weather Service says a strong Pacific storm system was expected to hit the Panhandle and southern Idaho with winds gusting 40 to 50 miles an hour Thursday night.

Although the strongest winds were forecast for the more northern communities along the Washington border, conditions were expected to be breezy and rainy elsewhere when the storm passed to the south and southeast. Up to 10 inches of new snow was expected over the higher mountains.

As rain turns to snow overnight, the lower valleys also could see an inch or two accumulation.

Cloudy skies prevailed Thursday. But in the warmer south, with winds ahead of the front, temperatures reached the 40s and 50s in some valley areas and the upper 30s at the higher elevations. Lewiston was the warmest spot again at 54 degrees. Significant cooling was expected Thursday night and today with passage of the front.

The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 54 degrees at Lewiston. Stanley reported the coldest at 1 degree below zero.

Elsewhere in the nation Thursday, the highest temperature was 89 degrees at Naples and Fort Myers, Fla. The lowest was 5 below zero at International Falls, Minn.

Storm hits Pacific Northwest as temperatures dip in East

Warm temperatures again set records Thursday throughout the Northeast and New England.

The record highs included Atlantic City, N.J., 68, Boston, Mass., 69, Newark, N.J., 70, and Wilmington, Del., 69.

Temperatures fell rapidly after a cold front moved across New England and the capital Atlantic coast.

By midday, the southeast edge of the colder temperatures extended from the Atlantic Ocean across northeastern North Carolina, southwest Georgia and the Florida panhandle into the Gulf of Mexico.

A storm moved into the Pacific Northwest with high winds and the threat of more flooding.

Morning wind gusts to 56 mph at Whidbey, Wash., 58 mph at Medicine Hat, Mont., 67 mph at Cutbank, Mont., and 70 mph gusts were reported at Tatoosh Island, Wash.

Rain fell across northwest Oregon, western Washington and northeastern North Carolina.

Snowshowers extended over northwest Pennsylvania, western New York state, northeast Ohio, and parts of Michigan.

The low Thursday for the Lower 48 states was 5 below zero at International Falls, Minn.

Temperatures around the nation at 3 p.m. EST ranged from 20 at Jackson, Wyo. to 88 at Fort Myers, Fla.

"Instead of making it \$322.22, they'll make it \$325," he said. "So you're looking at not only 2 percent, but maybe 3 or 4 percent."

The hike might not seem all that bad to travelers who have already absorbed three rounds of air fare increases totaling about 15 percent. The industry raised fares across the board after fuel prices shot up following Iraq's invasion of Kuwait.

Anyone who tries to avoid higher taxes in the air won't be able to do so by staying on the ground or getting in a boat, unless they fill their gas tank quickly.

Starting Saturday, drivers will pay as much as 5.1 cents more for each gallon of gasoline, as the federal gasoline tax rises by that amount to a total of 14.1 cents a gallon.

Service-station owners don't have to pass along the taxes, but they are expected to. Major oil companies said Thursday they have no choice but to pass on the taxes, and at least one expressed unhappiness about that.

Even though pump prices will rise, the American Automobile Association doubts many, if any, motorists will fill up early to avoid paying.

"I would hope people wouldn't run out and top off their tanks," AAA spokesman Jerry Cheske said. "If everybody, and I'm talking everybody, went out and topped off their tanks, that could cause a problem with a lot of stations, and it could create a perception there is a problem with supply, which is not the case."

In addition, the taxes on other fuels also rise Saturday. The tax on diesel fuel for highway use, for example, will rise by 5 cents to 20.1 cents a gallon, while diesel used by trains will face a new 2½-cent tax.

should be more concerned about the smell and the flies at their feedlot and in the alley behind their restaurant than about the cheese plant.

"Gooding needs industry," Nelson said. "Let's not shoot ourselves in the foot again."

Local contractor Carolyn Elexpuru said she feels many of the problems the Arkooshes are worried about could be taken care of by the new technology and the quality of the new plant.

Rick Warren, waste-water manager for Ward's since April, said the size of the property will prevent many of the odor problems Ward's has experienced at the Richfield plant. That facility uses only 60 acres in the summer and 70 acres in the winter for waste-water disposal.

Mike McMasters, DEQ water quality field supervisor, said his agency is considering putting the Richfield plant under an administrative consent order — a "watchful eye" that would prevent waste-water treatment without DEQ supervision. But the order hasn't been issued yet.

Ward's Cheese was cited by the state health and welfare department's Bureau of Water Quality for discharging waste water into the Little Wood River last spring from its Richfield plant. Company officials have said snowmelt overwhelmed its holding ponds, causing the overflow.

Warren said the circumstances in Gooding are different from Richfield, he said. Ward's has hired an engineering firm from Wisconsin to assure a quality waste-water treatment process at the Gooding site.

"Concern over waste is what's gathered us here tonight," Warren said. "It's the high maintenance that prevention of waste is more important than what you do with it afterward."

"What you do to prevent the waste is of No. 1 importance," said Warren.

Warren gave a presentation that showed Ward's plans for decreasing the amount of waste water produced and treating the waste it does generate. The plan includes new equipment design, a 3-to-1 fresh-to-waste water dilution and recycling of water through a process called reverse osmosis.

A reverse osmosis membrane will separate water from whey, a cheese by-product. The whey will then be sent to the Richfield plant for further processing.

The water will be used to rinse equipment and to dilute other waste water.

In addition, 60-degree water from a new well that will be used only for cooling and will not come in contact with any product, will flow into the Little Wood River and can be used for irrigation.

Warren said the plant's waste would be organic and non-toxic and would not include human waste or manure.

"They (Ward's Cheese officials) are very concerned about being good neighbors," Warren said.

Kirby Vickers, an engineer hired by the Arkooshes, said the field where the waste water would be applied is in the flood plain of the Little Wood River, and that the berms proposed by Ward's to protect the river may affect upstream water if the river floods.

Vickers said no one, including the DEQ, has a complete application that shows the complete plans for the site. He said he would like to have that in his hand before any decision is made on the permit.

McMasters said his agency is still receiving information from Ward's, and said Vickers may have a copy of the complete application as soon as it's available.

The Arkooshes, meanwhile, have also hired an attorney and said they will take Ward's Cheese to court if the treatment site decreases the value of their property or affects their quality of life.

"We do not feel the families of east Gooding should become the sacrificial lambs for industry," said Michelle Arkoosh. "No one should have to live under the oppression of pollution."

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Regulator: Keating 5 'pushed'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The "Keating Five" senators lashed savings and loan examiners in a "full court press" of criticism at a 1987 meeting, and one of the lawmakers pushed for changes in unfavorable findings on an embattled S&L, one of the regulators testified Thursday.

Michael Patriarca told the Senate Ethics Committee, which is investigating the senators' conduct on behalf of Charles H. Keating Jr. and his Lincoln Savings and Loan, that the lawmakers appeared to have decided "that we were in fact harassing Lincoln, that we were incorrect, wrong."

Patriarca described DeConcini at the April 9, 1987, meeting as the "master of ceremonies," and added, "It was my impression quite frankly that Sen. DeConcini was negotiating on behalf of Lincoln."

He said the senator was "attempting to get the regulators to change our position on the examination, the examination findings and conclusions to more closely align with the position that Lincoln es-

posed."

Keating was contending during this period that Lincoln was sound and that regulators were trying to "lessen the institution, which was seized by the government in April 1989 at a potential cost to taxpayers of more than \$2 billion."

The regulators told the five senators at the meeting, according to a transcript, that allegations against Lincoln were so serious that criminal referrals would be made to the Justice Department.

However, Patriarca said, "The tone that the meeting took was that the senators seemed to have made up their minds, on the basis of information acquired before the meeting, that we were in fact harassing Lincoln, that we were incorrect, wrong and basically we got the full court press."

The role the senators played in the meeting with four regulators will be determined whether they intervened improperly on Keating's behalf.

The committee is in the second week of hearings on the conduct of DeConcini, D-Ariz.; John McCain, R-Ariz.; Donald W. Riegle Jr., D-Mich.; Alan Cranston, D-Calif.; and John Glenn, D-Ohio.

The five received a combined total of \$1.3 million from Keating and his associates for their campaigns and causes — most of it donated while regulators from the Federal Home Loan Bank Board were examining the failing Lincoln.

A week before the meeting with the examiners, all the senators except Riegle had met with Edwin J. Gray, then chairman of the Bank Board. Gray has testified that DeConcini offered him a bribe to benefit Lincoln and that Cranston, McCain and Glenn quietly acquiesced.

DeConcini, in whose office both meetings took place, has vigorously denied making the offer, involving Gray and the other three senators said they did not recall the proposal.

The meeting on April 9, with San

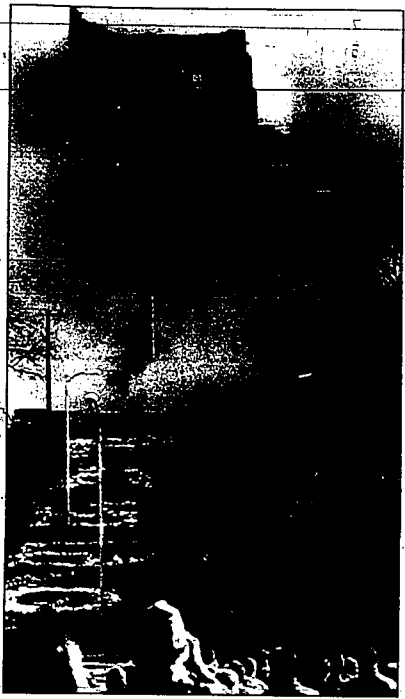
Francisco-based regulators, was scheduled because Gray was unable to answer questions about the examination of Lincoln in the previous week's get-together.

Commenting on the four senators other than DeConcini, Patriarca said:

- Glenn was "blunt" at the meeting and "seemed to have also made up his mind our behavior was somehow wrong."
- McCain appeared "uncomfortable being at the meeting and made statements to the effect of wanting to establish it was okay to be there."
- Sen. Riegle did what I would characterize as cross-examination to probe the basis for the findings that we were saying we reached."
- Cranston made only a brief appearance because he was managing legislation on the Senate floor.

Patriarca, now western regional director for the Office of Thrift Supervision, said regulators had found "absolutely nothing" practiced by the Irvine, Calif.-based savings and loan.

EPA cites progress in cleanup

WASHINGTON (AP) — Significant progress was made last year in getting polluters to assume a larger share of the cost of cleaning up toxic waste sites, the Environmental Protection Agency said Thursday.

The problem remains enormous, but EPA Administrator William Reilly said "we are making real progress addressing the worst problems at the worst sites." Polluters, after negotiations with the government, agreed in fiscal 1990 to commit \$1.3 billion for cleanup under the Superfund program, the EPA said. That was about a 30 percent increase over fiscal 1989.

At the same time, there were increases in the number of cases in which the EPA sought reimbursements from polluters for past cleanup efforts paid by the government, and in the number of administrative orders for cleanup activities. Reilly said the statistics for fiscal 1990 show "significant cleanup activity" at about a third of the toxic waste sites on the agency's priority cleanup list.

The priority list of toxic waste sites under the Superfund program includes more than 1,200 sites. Cleanup activities have been completed at only 63 sites, with work under way at another 360 sites, according to EPA figures.

Officials estimate about 100 sites a year will be added to the list through the end of the decade.

The cost of cleaning up the sites on the current list has been estimated by the EPA at more than \$27 billion and is expected to take at least seven more years. The Superfund program, which began 10 years ago, so far has cost the government about \$10 billion.

Reilly said a more aggressive enforcement policy by the EPA has prompted polluters to more easily agree to cleanup plans. The EPA said the agency's enforcement office won 285 settlements in fiscal 1990 in which polluters agreed to commit \$1.3 billion for Superfund cleanup efforts.

At the same time, the EPA took action in 78 cases to recover \$185 million from polluters for past cleanup activities paid for by the government.

Meanwhile, Reilly said the agency's overall enforcement activities involving water, air and other pollutants also increased in the fiscal year that ended Oct. 1.

During the year, 65 criminal cases were referred to the Justice Department for prosecution and 100 individuals were formally charged with criminal violations of environmental laws.

Both figures represented slight increases over the previous year, but more than double the number of such cases in the mid-1980s. During the year, however, the number of criminal cases successfully prosecuted declined from 43 in fiscal 1989 to 32 last year.

Researchers find inherited gene which can lead to breast cancer

WASHINGTON (AP) — Researchers have found an inherited abnormal gene that can lead to a high susceptibility for breast cancer, a major discovery that the tendency for malignancies to be passed from generation to generation.

In a study to be published Friday in the journal Science, a group of scientists say the cancer promoting gene was found by studying the genetic pattern in a group of families that have an exceptionally high rate of six types of cancers, including breast cancer.

"Up until now there have been no inherited genes isolated and identified which provided susceptibilities to some of the common adult malignancies," said Dr. Stephen Friend, a Massachusetts General Hospital Cancer Center scientist.

Friend, who was lead author of the study, said the mutation was found on what is called the p53 cancer suppressor gene. For people who inherit a mutated p53 gene, he said, "their chance of getting a malignancy by age 60 is 90 percent."

Dr. Andrew Feinberg, a University of Michigan Cancer Center researcher and co-discoverer of genes related to a rare kidney cancer, said the p53 discovery adds a step in the cascade of cell changes that is thought to lead to some cancers.

"From a scientific viewpoint, it is very important because it helps us understand the sequence of events that lead to cancer," said Feinberg. He emphasized that there are a number of other steps, still unknown, that cause a normal cell to become cancerous.

The p53 gene is one of a group of genes that control cell growth. The gene, in effect, blocks the uncontrolled division of cells, hence, suppresses tumor development. If this function is lost through mutation, then the cell lacks one of the controls that keep division in balance.

The mutated p53 gene has been detected in the past in a number of types of cancers, but the new study is the first to find that the mutation can be inherited.

Friend said that although the loss of the p53 function is only one of a series of steps that can lead to

cancer, it demonstrates just how fragile is the natural protection against cancer.

"Up until now, the question in the common adult malignancies has been whether any one step would make a difference and provide a susceptibility," he said. "This shows that the answer is yes. If you are born with an inactive gene in one gene, then that gives you a hidden susceptibility to malignancies."

Friend said he and his colleagues isolated the specific p53 gene mutation by studying people with what is called the Li-Fraumeni syndrome. These are families in which there is an inherited tendency to develop one of six types of cancer at an early age, often during childhood.

Breast cancer is the most common malignancy among Li-Fraumeni families, but they can also develop leukemias, brain tumors, sarcomas of the bone and cancer of the adrenal gland.

The researchers discovered the mutation in the cells of Li-Fraumeni family members who had cancer, but not in those family members who were free of the disease.

Friend said that in the affected family members the p53 mutation was found in every cell, indicating it was passed genetically from one generation to another.

The Li-Fraumeni syndrome was first described by Frederick P. Li and Joseph F. Fraumeni Jr., both of the National Cancer Institute and coauthors of the study in Science. The syndrome is very rare, with only about 200 such families in the United States.

With discovery of the p53 mutation, Friend said a screening process may be developed to determine which members in a Li-Fraumeni family have inherited the abnormal gene. When one parent in a family has the mutation, there is a 50-50 chance that each child will inherit it.

Children that show the mutation, said Friend, could then undergo periodic, intensified examinations for cancer so that the malignancies they will almost certainly develop could be found very early.

Subsidy war possible warns ag official

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department's No. 2 official said Thursday an export subsidy war is likely if the European Community isn't willing to negotiate further in the final sessions of world trade talks next week.

Deputy Secretary Jack C. Parnell said the bargaining nations scheduled to meet in Brussels are "looking at the final moments in the negotiations" for liberalizing global agricultural trade.

A major hangup has been between the 12-nation community and other nations over reducing internal, trade-distorting farm supports and export subsidies.

The so-called Uruguay Round of negotiations has been going on for four years under the auspices of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.

If the Europeans can't come to the GATT negotiating table in good faith, and discuss concrete reductions in agricultural subsidies and

the real, measurable lowering of tariff walls, then they are making the initial unfriendly moves of a subsidy war," Parnell said.

"There is little doubt that the United States will retaliate, using every tool available to us, in order to maintain our market share," he said.

Parnell also told the concluding session of the department's annual outlook conference that U.S. farmers could face even greater trade competition.

"Eastern Europe has been liberalized and we've all rejoiced," he said. "But suppose the rest of Europe seduces these countries into joining its common agricultural policy?"

Parnell said that would mean the former East Germany, Poland, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Bulgaria and Romania all would be joining the existing bloc. "Can you imagine an 18-member common agricultural policy?"

New law gives flexibility in releasing transcripts

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush signed legislation Thursday giving the National Transportation Safety Board more flexibility on when to release cockpit voice recorder transcripts after airline accidents.

The old law required the agency to release the transcript no later than 60 days after a crash.

Now, the NTSB will be able to release the transcript either when it holds a public hearing or when a majority of its staff reports on the accident are placed in the public record, whichever comes first.

Bush, in a statement, expressed concern that the courts provide prompt and complete disclosure

to all sides in lawsuits arising out of aircraft accidents.

"It is important to protect these materials from sensationalism and unwarranted disclosure, but it is also important that courts provide prompt and complete disclosure to litigants," Bush said.

The measure also gives the NTSB clear authority to examine ships involved in accidents, and guarantees the agency access to the results of drug tests on any air traffic controller or other Department of Transportation employee who tests positive after an accident. It gives the board sole authority to determine what tests are conducted after an accident and who conducts them.

City tired of stench

LYNN, Mass. (AP) — The stench from a sewage dump here is so foul that officials tried to mask it with orange extract. Next, they'll try lemon, and they might even use the scent of vanilla or almonds.

"If 'Evening in Paris' or 'Chanel No. 5' was best we'd use that," said John Casey, executive director of the Lynn Water and Sewer Commission. "Right now, lemon's the best."

The problem arose last week after workers started dumping sludge in a landfill near a new sewage treatment plant.

White House praises nuclear weapons decision

WASHINGTON (AP) — The White House on Thursday applauded the decisions by the presidents of Brazil and Argentina to renounce the manufacture of nuclear weapons.

"The prospects for a Latin America forever free from the dangers of nuclear weapons are brightened," said a White House statement by presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater.

Presidents Fernando Collor de Mello of Brazil and Carlos Saul

Menem of Argentina signed an accord Wednesday to begin negotiations with the International Atomic Energy Agency to apply safeguards to all nuclear activities within their countries.

They also vowed to use their nuclear potential "exclusively for peaceful ends" and they additionally vowed to work toward setting up a nuclear-weapon-free zone in South America.

"President Menem and President

Collor have acted boldly to enhance regional and world stability by pledging to use nuclear energy only for peaceful purposes," the White House statement said.

Bush will visit both countries next week as part of a six-day South American tour.

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


Future San Andreas Fault quakes are predicted by dating brown sediment layers to determine prehistoric quake patterns.



After digging trenches across the fault, the sediment pattern are made and dated.


Iben Browning Theory

New Madrid quake projection continues to worry, entertain

Tavern owners jammed jukeboxes with earth-shaking tunes and worried residents scrambled for water and flashlights Wednesday as the questionable countdown progressed for a major earthquake as early as next week on the New Madrid Fault.

The commotion is over a projection made by Dr. Iben Browning, who said there was a strong chance of a major earthquake Dec. 2-3 in an area that includes the New Madrid Fault—from Arkansas through Missouri to Illinois.

"We're ready for it. I have 13 gallons of water, blankets, two sleeping bags, a pipe wrench, canned food, a flashlight and a radio with extra batteries," said Debbie Brunk of Bonne Terre, Mo., which is about 50 miles from the New Madrid fault zone.

Others took the projections a little more lightly.

Bumper stickers saying "It's Iben Browning's Fault" have started popping up on cars in the region.

One tavern owner has come up with a list of songs having to do with earthquakes.

Joe Edwards, owner of the Blueberry Hill tavern in St. Louis, said he's filling his jukebox with earthquake songs and serving special drinks to "help our customers cope with any anxiety they might be feeling."

He had culled more than 150 songs, including "Dancin' on the Ceiling," "Church Bells May Ring," "If We Make It Through December" and at least 13 titles containing the word "quake."

Meanwhile, Iben Browning's daughter, Evelyn Garriss, stood by her father's projection after San Francisco radio station KCBS reported that she said her father believes there's a 50-50 chance of a major quake outside the United States.

"We are less concerned about (San Francisco Bay area's Hayward fault) recently than we continue to be about some of the other places, like Japan," she said.

Later Wednesday, she said the earlier forecast for a major quake striking the Midwest was still valid. Browning's family said he was on vacation and refused to disclose where. He has refused in the past to make any additional comment on the projection.

"We have not changed our projection," she told The Associated Press at her home in Tijeras, N.M., outside Albuquerque.

Earthquake experts and other scientists have repeatedly said that Browning's projection, which relies on the measurement of the pull of tidal forces on the earth, was nothing more than a random guess.

On Tuesday, a scientist for the U.S. Geological Survey strongly

discounted the projection in a briefing of Congressional staff members in Washington.

"I can summarize our findings by saying there is no reason... that a large earthquake is more likely to occur... Dec. 2 or 3 than it is today, three weeks from today or any day in the future," said Randall Updike, associate chief of the survey's Office of Earthquake, Volcanoes and Engineering.

Scientists agree there is a long-term threat of a major earthquake in the Midwest, but there is no significant way to pinpoint a date for when it will occur.

The seven states near or along the fault zone are Missouri, Arkansas, Tennessee, Mississippi, Kentucky, Indiana and Illinois. Some residents don't put much stock in the projection, but many aren't taking any chances.

Earthquake insurance sales have skyrocketed and state regulators from the region have formed a special committee to monitor the availability of policies amid reports that some companies have stopped selling earthquake insurance.

Schools districts up and down the fault zone, which runs from Marked Tree, Ark., northeast through Missouri to Cairo, Ill., have canceled classes for Dec. 3 and 4 and some local governments also have decided to shut down. Other state and local officials are gearing up for earthquake drills. Sales of survival kits and other emergency preparedness items also have increased in the region as businesses scramble to take advantage of the sudden interest in earthquakes.

Suit charges illegal promotion of a hormone by Dairy Board

NEW YORK (AP) — A biotechnology watchdog charged in a lawsuit Thursday that the National Dairy Board is illegally promoting a growth hormone being used experimentally in cows to increase milk production.

Jeremy Rifkin, president of the Washington, D.C.-based Foundation on Economic Trends, has used a variety of legal maneuvers to try to block the use of bovine growth hormone on the grounds that it is unsafe for human health.

The latest action is based on documents he obtained under the Freedom of Information Act that he says show the dairy board was working in collusion with the growth hormone's makers to promote the substance.

He also petitioned the U.S. Food and Drug Administration on Thursday to "immediately halt any promotional activity by FDA officials and to immediately rescind the use of this product in the marketplace until it is approved."

The FDA is considering whether to approve the hormone for routine use, but it has already allowed milk from experimentally treated cows to be released for human consumption.

William Grigg, an FDA spokesman, said the agency had not yet seen the petition and could not comment about it.

He defended the decision to allow consumption of milk containing the hormone.

"The safety to human beings is clear," he said, noting that it has no effect in humans and occurs naturally in milk. "So we've always consumed it."

Rifkin and other critics have charged that the hormone could have deleterious effects on human health. Questions have also been raised about the economic consequences of boosting the milk supply and thus presumably lowering milk prices. Rifkin said the dairy board is prevented by law from promoting such substances before they are approved by the FDA.

"The dairy board cannot put out any information regarding efficacy or safety of a product before its approval," Rifkin said. "It is a violation of the law. Nor can they collude and be in meetings with private companies to be in such a campaign." The lawsuit seeks to block the board "from continuing with their campaign to promote this prod-

uct," Rifkin said.

The board was set up by Congress to help increase the consumption of dairy products produced in the United States, said Maureen Bergen, the board's director of advertising and promotion programs.

The Department of Agriculture oversees and approves its expenses, she said, but the board is funded by dairy farmers, not the government.

Yvonne Dock, the board's spokeswoman, said she had no immediate comment on Rifkin's action or his remarks. "We're working with counsel now to come up with a statement," she said.

The documents obtained in Rifkin's Freedom of Information Act request include minutes of an April meeting in which the board agreed to spend \$1,085,000 on a public relations firm "for the management of the BST issue." BST stands for bovine somatotropin, the technical term for the hormone.

In a March 12 letter obtained by Rifkin, Ernest Miller, chairman of the board's industry and public relations committee, said that the law requires that no board funds "are to be spent to influence legislation or regulation."

Gulf military operations cause shortage of drug

NEW YORK (AP) — The military operation in Saudi Arabia has contributed to a nationwide shortage in a drug used to contain outbreaks of hepatitis A and measles, the drug's manufacturer said Thursday.

Some supplies of the drug, the intramuscular form of gamma globulin, have been diverted for sales to the military because of Operation Desert Shield, said Jane Green, spokeswoman for Rhone-Poulenc Rorer Inc. of Fort Washington, Pa.

Another factor in the shortage is that the nation's only other maker of the drug stopped selling it in August, Green said.

Armour Pharmaceutical Co., the Rhone-Poulenc subsidiary that

makes the drug, has begun producing it around the clock in response to the shortage, she said.

Green said she had no immediate information about the severity of the shortfall. Armour has not increased prices because of the situation it said.

Dr. Louis Polish of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta said his agency has gotten calls from state officials who have had "a bit of a problem" getting intramuscular gamma globulin, but that as far as he knew the states have been able to get what they needed.

Doctors use the drug during outbreaks of hepatitis A or measles to keep healthy people from contracting the disease.

Martinez gets drug czar nod

TALLAHASSEE, Fla., (AP) — Gov. Bob Martinez on Thursday flew to Washington to be nominated as the nation's next drug czar.

The appointment, which has been rumored for weeks, will take place Friday morning at the White House, officials with the Martinez and Bush administration said.

Martinez will replace William Bennett, who President Bush wants as the next chairman of the Republican National Committee. "The governor is going to overnight tonight in Washington and will be in Washington tomorrow," said Chief of Staff Brian Ballard.

Ballard would not confirm that Martinez has accepted the job as the top U.S. drug policy adviser. Other officials speaking on condition of anonymity said Martinez had accepted the offer.

Consumer spending stagnant in October

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumer spending, the driving force behind eight years of U.S. economic expansion, did not budge in October, the government said Thursday in a report analysts contend was further evidence of a recession.

"The consumer has retrenched," said economist Gilbert Benz of the Swiss Bank Corp. in New York. "I clearly supports those who say we're in a recession."

John Silvia, an economist with Kemper Financial Services in Chicago, agreed.

"It looks like consumer spending will be negative in the fourth quarter" and the gross national product will decline in both the current quarter and the first three months of next year, he said.

Consumer spending, which accounts for two-thirds of the nation's economic activity, was unchanged from September at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$3.73 trillion, the Commerce Department said. Personal incomes rose just 0.1 percent, to a \$4.71-trillion rate.

The marginal increase in incomes failed to match the 0.6 percent increase in the Labor Department's Consumer Price Index in October. It also was the smallest gain since incomes were unchanged in August 1989. Spending had posted gains each month since last May, when it was unchanged.

Disposable incomes, or incomes after taxes, also inched ahead 0.1 percent, down from a 0.4 percent

gain the previous month. It was the smallest gain since after-tax incomes fell 0.1 percent last April.

The spending and income figures were not adjusted for inflation. When adjusted, spending actually fell 0.7 percent after a 0.2 percent increase in September. Disposable income dropped 0.5 percent, even more than the 0.4 percent declines in the previous two months.

"Consumer spending can survive a lot of things — temporary shocks, consumer sentiment, oil surpluses — but three months in a row of negative disposable income suggests that people are going to have to cut back even more," Silvia said.

Indeed, Federal Reserve Chairman Alan Greenspan on Wednesday noted the shrinking employment and the number of hours worked were causing personal income to decline while rising energy prices "are squeezing many household budgets."

"This drop in real purchasing power, along with plunging consumer sentiment, does not bode well for the near-term trends in consumer demand," he told the House Banking Committee.

It was the first look at consumer spending in the final quarter of the year.

The department on Wednesday revised personal consumption in the third quarter down from a 3.6 percent annual rate in its initial report to 3.2 percent, suggesting spending was slowing toward the end of that period.



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U.S. would call the shots in Kuwait military strike

IN EASTERN SAUDI ARABIA (AP) — The United States will likely call the shots in any military strike to free Kuwait, backed by Britain, probably France and an Arab force that symbolically would be first over the border.

More than two dozen countries have sent troops to defend Saudi Arabia from an Iraqi attack, but few have said they would cross the border to liberate Kuwait. Arab governments — except Kuwait — have been noticeably silent.

More than 1,000 combat aircraft will be deployed in the Middle East. At present, Saudi forces are flanked on the west by Syrian and French troops and on the east by the Egyptians, with U.S. and British troops right behind.

A well-placed Saudi said on condition of anonymity that the Saudis, Kuwaitis, Egyptians and Persian Gulf nations would participate in any offensive "and not symbolically."

Under an agreement between King Fahd and Secretary of State James A. Baker III, the United States would command any offensive outside Saudi Arabia but must get permission from the king to launch an attack from Saudi soil.

The Saudi, U.S. and British commanders have often met regularly, but reporters in the field have seen little evidence of similar coordination on the ground.

A resolution before the U.N. Security Council on Thursday only sets conditions for the allies to decide on military action if Iraq has not withdrawn from Kuwait by Jan. 15. It does not mandate force if Iraq refuses.

But the Syrians have never spelled out what they are prepared to do beyond the original mission of defending Saudi Arabia, Pakistan, with the only other significant Islamic force, says its troops are purely defensive.

The British commander, Lt. Gen. Sir Peter de la Billiere, said Monday that coordination of air and naval forces was working "extremely well."

The United States has publicly stressed the multinational character of the military force strung out across hundreds of miles of Saudi desert.

French Foreign Minister Roland Dumas said Nov. 27 that France would deploy 150,000 troops alongside the Americans in any military action, but did not make clear whether France would put its forces under U.S. tactical control.

But he indicated integrated ground operations were still only at a planning level.

"If there's a military confrontation, it's not going to be America vs. Iraq. It's going to be 26 nations vs Iraq," said Rep. Nicholas Mavroules, D-Mass. He led a 20-member congressional delegation on a visit to troops Wednesday.

One strong indication that the United States isn't taking most of the multinational force seriously in military terms is that after nearly four months, there has not been one exercise involving all or even most nations.

Unquestionably, the winter months would be best for an offensive. It's cooler and the occasional rain softens the ground and ditches dries, making clandestine operations easier. Sandstorms are a nuisance for both sides.

"We think very much along the same lines. We like each other. We're friends. We have the same values," said MacDonald, 37.

There have been some exercises with the Saudis and British. The only one close to a serious international effort was an all-arms exercise involving U.S. and Saudi marines and American, British, French and Canadian aircraft.

But Col. Andrew Duncan of London's International Institute for Strategic Studies said too much was being made of the weather and noted that the allies in World War II fought through the summer in the desert.

Saddam accuses U.S. of forcing double standard

BAHGHAD, Iraq (AP) — President Saddam Hussein said Thursday he was not afraid of fighting the United States in the Persian Gulf and warned that he had the technology to shoot down Stealth aircraft.

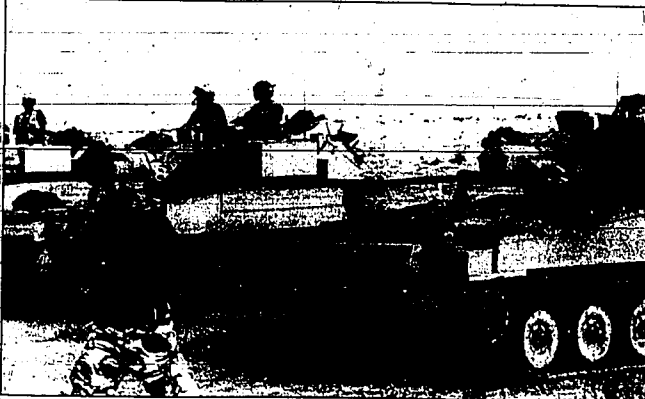
Iraq from Kuwait if Saddam refuses to withdraw by Jan. 15. In a defiant tone, Saddam said Iraq will fight "the United States and its other allies in the gulf if war breaks out." The radio said the speech was made to an Arab Youth Solidarity seminar.

Earlier, Saddam issued a statement on the official Iraqi News Agency accusing the United States of forcing the United Nations to adopt a double standard by supporting resolutions that condemn Iraq but not Israel.

The remarks came hours before the U.N. Security Council was to vote on a U.S.-sponsored resolution authorizing the use of force to oust

reports whether Saddam might have the ability to detect the Stealth jets, designed to sneak in under enemy radar, using technology sold to him by France. The Pentagon has sent 22 F117A Stealth fighter bombers to unspecified bases in the region.

In his Iraqi News Agency statement, Saddam urged the 15-nation council to link any resolution of the gulf crisis with the Israeli-Palestinian problem, a position he first insisted on soon after invading Kuwait on Aug. 2.

U.S. Marines and Desert Rats join together to practice for war

IN EASTERN SAUDI ARABIA (AP) — Thousands of miles from the diplomatic debate to fix a final deadline for Iraq to leave Kuwait, U.S. Marines and British Desert Rats jointly practice for war in the desert.

They have trained in each other's equipment, tested their radios and practiced for the first time Wednesday scouting together at night for enemy patrols. If the attack order is given, they may also fight together.

"Options are becoming fewer. War does seem a little more certain," said Maj. Hanish MacDonal, the company commander of the Queen's Dragoon Guards Reconnaissance Squadron of the British 7th Armored Brigade. The brigade is also known as the Desert Rats.

"We are ready to go now if necessary. I think the quicker the better," MacDonal said. "It'll have to be finished one way or another."

The troops training in the desert are about 7,000 miles away from the U.N. debate on setting a Jan. 15 deadline for Iraqi President Saddam Hussein to back down and have his 450,000 forces leave Kuwait. Talk of a firm date boosted the spirits of the U.S. Marines who arrived here three months ago.

"It's a target to get everybody psychologically prepared for battle. Somebody's finally saying they're going to do something," said Lt. Col. Michael Brooks, 45, company commander of the Marines' 1st Force Reconnaissance Co.

"There's some ambivalence. There's a dark side to this. We know what the costs are going to be," he added.

But Marines welcomed news that something definite may be coming. "We've been out here hanging on a string. It boosts morale," said Lance Cpl. Mike Shoemaker, 21,

who lives in California but declined to give his home town.

"If we're going to do it, let's get it done or find a peaceful solution and go home," Shoemaker said. "They set that date, and a lot of Marines went 'Yeah!'"

The Americans and British, long-time allies, have cemented a close working relationship in the Saudi desert. U.S. Marines can provide air support, naval power and mechanized infantry for the British. The Desert Rats, in turn, offer tanks, armored reconnaissance and engineers to clear minefields.

"We think very much along the same lines. We like each other. We're friends. We have the same values," said MacDonald, 37.

But more than military technology and technique is being exchanged. The British have introduced rugby to the Americans, who in turn offer softball and football.

Defense Information official says only Arab truce can stop invasion

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — Virtually the only thing that could stop the United States from invading Iraq would be a negotiated truce among the Arab nations, said Eugene J. Carroll, deputy director of the Center for Defense Information.

President Bush wants Iraq President Saddam Hussein removed from power and his military machine scrapped.

But, if Iraq, Saudi Arabia, Kuwait and the other Persian Gulf nations negotiate a settlement, "the magic solution would be the Arabs working out their own deal," the think-tank official said.

Carroll's Utah visit is sponsored by peace advocacy groups, including Utahns United Against the Nuclear Arms Race, Utah Peace Test, Physicians for Social Responsibility of Utah, the Catholic Diocese of Utah and the Interfaith Peacemaking Resource Center.

Bush has a big enough force to launch an offensive strike against Iraq, and he has been pushing the United Nations and Congress to agree with a military solution, Carroll said.

"By the time you get 450,000 people out there, you can't afford to sustain that force. When you get the gun cocked, you'd better pull the trigger or some thing will go wrong," said Carroll, former director of U.S. military operations in Europe and the Middle East.

"If you prepare for war and make no efforts to avoid it, you're going to have war," Carroll said during a visit to Ogden Wednesday. "Congress is never going to un-declare war."

The problem for Bush would be an all-Arab solution — an Iraqi Army withdrawal before an assault could be launched, possibly as early as December but no later than the end of February to avoid brutal summer weather, Carroll said.

"If they said, 'This satisfies us,' (Saddam) is going to leave (Kuwait), he's going to have certain additional rights, and he'll leave, they'll say, 'We're happy. Thank you for coming. Please don't delay. Go away.' I don't think we'd have any recourse, we're going to pull out," Carroll said.

"That would be totally short of

our objective, which, apparently for President Bush, is to eliminate Saddam Hussein, to nullify his political and military role in the Middle East," he said.

Carroll does not believe there is much chance of an all-Arab settlement because "we're doing so much arm twisting, promising military supplies to Saudi Arabia, Egypt, Turkey and other Middle East nations and favored-nation trade status to United Nations members with crucial votes."

Carroll said the United States could win a war in the Middle East, then lose the peace.

The United States could defeat Iraq in three months, but then "become unwelcome very, very quickly."

"Because U.S. forces would have to kill Arabs in the fighting, the result would be less control and less influence" for the United States, he said. "It seems like a very poor war for us."

The best solution is to stick with the economic blockade, which he said will take at least a year to force Saddam to come to terms.

Praise for symphony's sub; a Bronx cheer for bunglers

Those who saw and heard the Magic Valley Symphony Tuesday night witnessed a triumph of can-do spirit over bureaucratic bungling.

Monday morning, Ted Hadley of the Magic Valley Symphony learned that the season's star attraction - Soviet pianist and Van Cliburn competition finalist Elisso Bolkvadze - wouldn't be showing up for her appearance in Twin Falls Tuesday night.

Within hours, he had a replacement. And on Tuesday evening, Hung-Kuan Chen came through with an energetic, passionate performance of Prokofiev's First Piano Concerto and several solo compositions.

Elisso who?

Chen came to Twin Falls through the quick work of Hadley and Hillyer International, a New York City booking agency. Hillyer's Vincent Wagner called Chen in Boston at 10:30 a.m. Monday asking if he'd play the next night's concert in Twin Falls.

Chen told Wagner he would reply within a half-hour. And by 11 a.m., Hadley knew he had a new soloist. At 10:30 p.m., Chen had arrived in Idaho.

Chen said after Tuesday's concert that it marked the third time in two months he has substituted for Soviet pianists who

were unable to fulfill contracts with U.S. orchestras. The other two occasions, however, he'd had either five days' or a week's notice.

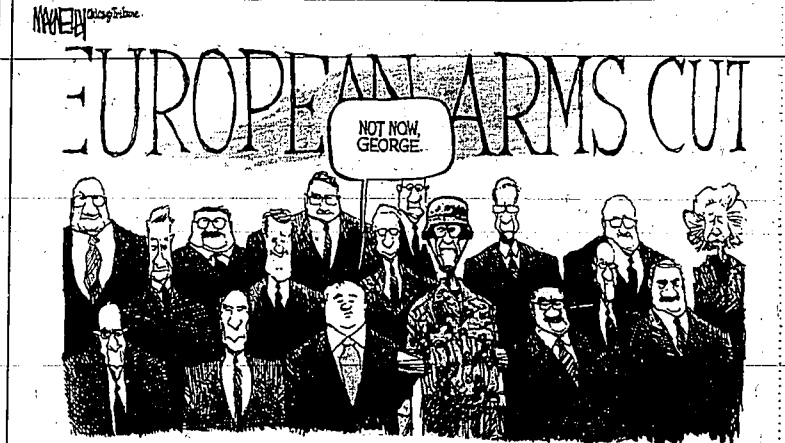
Chen had last played the Prokofiev concerto with the Houston Symphony in July. He rehearsed it once with the Magic Valley Symphony earlier Tuesday evening before the concert. He said later it wasn't a very big deal.

But it was a very big deal for arena music lovers, for all present heard the magical artistry of a young man who seems destined to be a star of classical music.

Chen deserves praise for his can-do attitude and his immense talent. But Ted Hadley and the symphony deserve kudos, too, for pulling their concert together despite the disappointment of losing Bolkvadze. Although most of our small-town symphony are not paid, they showed true professionalism.

It's a pity that similar praise can't go to the cultural-affairs officials in Bolkvadze's homeland, the Soviet republic of Georgia. Their snafu (frustrating her to prepare the wrong music) apparently was to blame for the no-show.

Let's hope the bureaucrats' performance improves. Soviet musicians can't succeed as good-will ambassadors to the West if they don't show up to play.



Struggling Poles worry about Soviets

Ah, the delicious irony. Poland stuck its thumb in Joe Stalin's eye and pulled out, not a plum, but a casino.

The Poles built a casino, with neon lights and slot machines, on the ground floor of Stalin's special gift to the Polish people: the spectacularly ugly Palace of Culture and Science.

No longer a captive nation of Germany, and no longer a communist puppet of Moscow, Poland is scrambling to create a democratic government and a free-market economy. If, along the way, the Poles can send a sly message to the Kremlin, that adds spice to the kielbasa.

I took a photograph of the Palace of Culture last March and just looked at it again. The building is ugly, all right, 37 stories of bad taste. In a way the palace is a unique triumph of architecture: A skyscraper that manages to look squat, like a Russian tank out of gas.

The Poles joke about it, and have done so since it was built nearly 40 years ago. The best view of Warsaw, they say, is from the top of the Palace of Culture, because you can't see the Palace of Culture from there.

Now they're turning it into a bigger joke on the Russians. In January, the Polish Communist Party met in the palace to vote itself out of existence.

The casino followed, and so did a huge gang of vendors, a thousand of them, who set up an informal free market outside the front door. They sell candies, jewelry, shoes and myriad other products.

At 100 West Avenue in Palm Beach or Rodeo Drive in Beverly Hills, but it's certain-

ly free enterprise.

Jokes aside, the Poles are struggling, with the government bogged down in indecision and the economy slipping. The nation's rebirth is slow, painful and drawn out, with the outcome uncertain. For Poles, life is likely to get worse before it can get better, even a little.

Yet hope persists in Warsaw and Gdansk, on the small farms and in the obsolescent factories of Poland.

If it is preferable to be there with a glimmer of hope than across the eastern border, where a nation apparently is dying. By all accounts, citizens of the once formidable Soviet Union are losing, or have lost, hope.

The Poles long have been divided on which nation they feared and disliked more, Germany to the west, or the Soviet Union to the east.

They despise the Germans as warmongers and bigots, and consider the Russians barbarians. Now, although they crack jokes about Russians, the Poles cannot help but be concerned about the possibility of outright chaos on their eastern border.

The rest of the world, too, must swallow hard at the prospect of disintegration of the Soviet Union. A splintered, fragmented and warring set of would-be independent nations would serve no useful purpose: Chaos in the Soviet Union wouldn't help the cause of freedom, or anti-communism, or peace, or anything worth having.

Considered as a single episode, only isolated

crack in the Soviet facade over the past year, or so didn't mean the end of the nation. The brave Lithuanians seemed quaint and out of step when they piped up for independence. Ethnic strife peckmarking the Soviet landscape could be dismissed as minor. The rise of the boorish and drunken Boris Yeltsin seemed but an insignificant blip, to be erased by the world's erstwhile hero, Mikhail Gorbachev.

Considered as a whole, however, it's a more powerful and menacing story to the West as well as to Gorbachev. The Soviet president is being assailed on all sides, and an unemployed machinist tried to assassinate him on Nov. 7. Nearly all the constituent republics have declared some form of independence.

Yeltsin is a powerhouse, for the moment. Ethnic warfare persists. The army and white-collar workers harvested potatoes for empty shelves. Rail cars loaded with farm produce sit untouched, while the food rots.

Crime and homelessness are soaring, and poverty burdens thousands of Soviet citizens. Fear of the future, it is said, now cripples the nation.

No wonder the Poles, despite deciding to trim the size of their army, shifted many soldiers to the eastern border. The most serious threat to Poland, they have concluded, could emerge from the dying spasms of the Soviet Union.

Odd, isn't it. One nation experiencing rebirth; another slipping toward death. Yet the dying menaces the living.

President Bush's war cries aim at defending oil, not freedom

It is impossible to imagine, but President Bush plans to have the United States in war within 60 days, and there has been no discussion or debate in the press or in Congress about the president's plans.

Should we go to war in the Persian Gulf? The president states that the United States must defend freedom wherever it is threatened. There is no freedom threatened in the Arab states. Saudi, Kuwait, the Emirates, Iraq, Iran and Syria are absolute dictatorships supported by religion. Those dictatorships have not changed for 500 years and have no plans to change for the next 500 years.

The president states that the United States must defend legitimate national borders. Kuwait was created by England in 1920 when the British put the emir on the throne, together with his full harem of wives and harem of concubines. Each of these countries, including Saudi Arabia, was created as the French and British empires withdrew. There are no legitimate national borders.

The president has described Hussein as the "Butcher of Baghdad." Hussein is just that by Bush's Connecticut-Yankee-Puritan morality,

but the Arab states do not seem to be the primary distresses by the atrocities as the president. Over Thanksgiving, President Bush showed pictures of the atrocities to the world. The world was to be whipped into a wrath and rush forward to support his war policy. The world was not outraged.

The world never responded at all. Japan and Germany do not seem to have the same tender Puritan morality as does the president. They seem to recognize that Islamic morality may be very different. If anybody should have been outraged, it should be the Arab countries; and they have not indicated any such concern.

Then the president went to visit our new Arab ally, Assad of Syria. Freedom? There is no freedom in Syria. Atrocities. The Syrians have butchered both Christian and Muslim citizens in Lebanon. Syria, in a great display of "naked aggression," occupies more than half of Lebanon - including a section of

Beirut. That naked aggression does not impress the president because it would interfere with his war plans. The Syrians were in Lebanon while the president decied Iraq's naked aggression in Kuwait.

Syria has been named the home base of world terrorism. There is a terrorist training school in Syria. The United States has identified the terrorists who killed 248 American Marines in Beirut and planted the bomb on the plane that crashed in Scotland as having been trained in Syria and sponsored by the Syrian government.

The president claims that he drives the United States to war because of American principles and that the world is enthusiastic in its support of his American policy. Yet, on each newscast, there is a discussion of Secretary Baker and the president lobbying, pressuring and cajoling country after country to support President Bush's policy. There has been no outpouring of spontaneous, enthusiastic support anywhere in the world. The president, in a dramatic Thanksgiving Day address, stated, "I have lost patience with Hussein and so has the world." Only Maggie Thatcher will join in.

If the president were really honest with us, he would let us know there are no American principles involved in the Persian Gulf. We fight for oil. Germany, Italy, France and - above all - Japan must have oil; and they are not impatient. Each one has suggested to the president that he slow down.

Although the president is going to get an ultimatum from the United Nations, there is no indication that any of these countries will actually support starting the war.

Above all, they are not contributing any troops. The United States has 400,000 troops in Saudi, including almost all of the combat troops; France has 6,000 or 7,000; Britain will have 28,000; Germany has none; Italy has none; Japan has none; China has none; and so the casualties will be suffered by the United States.

Sen. Symms said that casualties will be light. The president's absolute promise to the world is that, "We will drive Hussein from Kuwait." The Iraqis are dug in in Kuwait. There are going to have to be pushed out from their trenches and shelters one by one, and this is costly in lives.

Oil is clearly our goal. The president's itch to go to war sounds as if he is attempting to create a new American empire in the Arab arcas. U.S. control of much of the world's oil may have some very real economic merit. But to create this empire and control the energy of the world, the Army has to stay there. The president has repeatedly promised each of the Arab countries that the Christian infidel soldier will immediately be withdrawn upon smashing Hussein.

The Arab world will once again be Arab, only this time the new monster will be Assad of Syria - or in 10 years, perhaps Iran again or new dictators that have not yet arisen.

Destroying Hussein is not going to change the Arab world or the Persian Gulf or the immense tensions over the great wealth which is controlled by very few, reasonably primitive people.

Bush's itch to go to war has all of the markings of Vietnam. We will have a dramatic war, lose 40,000 or 50,000 dead, withdraw and accomplish nothing.

Lance Pl. Dickman was in the first contingent shipped to Saudi and apparently did not have enough time to arrange for his personal affairs. As a result, he got behind on his vehicle payments. Considering his location in the Saudi desert, the delivery of mail problems and the extremely difficult living conditions, he may not be totally aware of the action taken by the bank, i.e., repossession of his vehicle. As he is not in the Reserves or the National Guard, the current Military Service Act does not apply.

Having spent 33 years in the military service, experiencing the hell of three wars, observing many situations as Lance Pl. Dickman is currently in and noting the consideration and understanding of financial and business institutions in such cases as this, I cannot understand why the loan officer did not investigate further and establish a new payment schedule or give the corporal enough time to catch up on his obligations.

Germany to help feed Russians

BERLIN (AP) — More than 40 years after Moscow tried to starve West Berlin into submission, Germany said Thursday it would help ward off hunger in the Soviet Union by donating huge food reserves built up because of the infamous blockade.

A daily airlift of supplies and tens of thousands of food packages sent by CARE, the international relief organization, will also aid the crippled Communist nation, as part of a large-scale assistance program.

"The situation in the country is catastrophic. People have to fight for food. People already are going hungry," the ZDF television network said in a campaign for private donations.

Although Germans routinely rush to the aid of victims of natural disasters and other emergencies, the current wave of support is unprecedented.

Companies are contributing goods and services. German businesses and ordinary citizens pledged more than \$4 million in donations during a 45-minute telethon on ZDF, the network said late Thursday.

Newspapers are running their own donation campaigns, and the money is still flowing to various organizations.

"A Heart for Russia — We're

Taking Part" read the headline today in the mass-circulation Bild newspaper. Below the headline were pictures of prominent Germans explaining their reasons for contributing money to the Bild campaign.

The state of Lower Saxony pledged help totaling \$3 million, while the Maltese aid organization said it was sending field kitchens to cook meals for needy Ukrainians.

Even before the latest actions, Chancellor Helmut Kohl said in an appeal broadcast late Wednesday on ZDF television.

Kohl also called to mind the Soviets' role in clearing the way for the merger of East Germany and West Germany on Oct. 3.

"We all have to thank the Soviet Union in these months. I am certain that we all are ready to help," said

Kohl, who met with Soviet President Mikhail S. Gorbachev earlier this month in Germany.

Even then, Gorbachev had been reduced from the leader of a one-monolithic superpower to an imperiled leader in need of a rich Western patron.

While German politicians are not saying so directly, their support for the current relief efforts might be aimed at propping up Gorbachev as his country faces a possibly decisive winter.

Germany has been flooded with hundreds of thousands of immigrants, refugees and other newcomers. The Germans are eager to prevent another wave of newcomers — this time Soviets fleeing hunger and civil strife at home.

Today, there was a nearly non-stop stream of announcements of relief efforts that could amount to Germany's largest humanitarian program ever.

In Bonn, Kohl's top foreign policy adviser Horst Telschick said Germany would give the Soviets the so-called "Berlin reserves," replenished over the years in case of another blockade.

Those reserves include, among other items, 66,000 tons of rye, 26,000 tons of canned meat and 7,500 tons of butter. Berlin officials,

who urged Bonn to donate the food, estimate it could feed 10 million Soviets for one month.

A huge U.S.-led airlift broke the 1948-49 Soviet blockade, aimed at bringing West Berlin to its knees and driving out the Western powers.

Germans are worried, however, that their donations could wind up in the Soviet Union's growing black market.

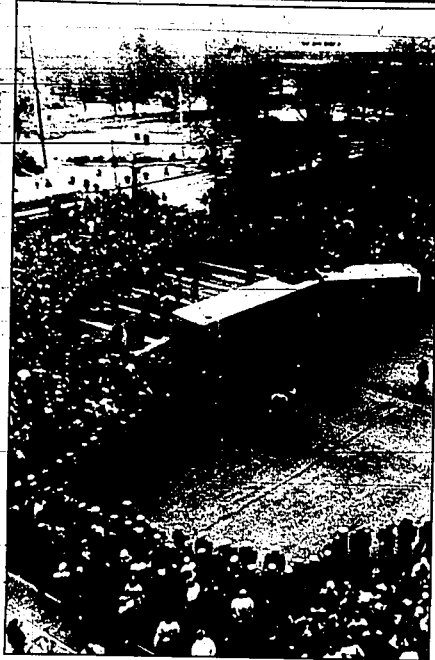
"We are supervising things ourselves," said Klaus Noeldner, head of the German branch of CARE.

"We will be distributing with the help of citizens' committees in schools," Noeldner says. "We are distributing only to individuals, those who because they are too old, or handicapped or weak can't stand on line."

He estimated that 1.2 million people in Moscow alone fall into that category. Noeldner says the organization already has enough money to send 60,000 CARE packages.

CARE packages are a part of German history and have become nearly legendary, after millions of the American-sent boxes filled with food helped save Germans from starvation after World War II.

Also Thursday, an Aeroflot transport plane filled with 37 tons of food left northern Hanover bound for Moscow.



Balkan residents stage a strike against Soviet rule Wednesday. Balkan premier quits, no successor named

SOFIA, Bulgaria (AP) — Premier Andrei Lukanov and his government of former Communists resigned Thursday under unrelenting pressure from strikes, street protests and the halls of Parliament.

The Socialist premier, blamed for the Balkan country's political and economic anarchy, accused unions and the opposition of making it impossible for him to govern.

"For me, it is therefore pointless to remain at the premier's post, and ... I resign my office," he said in a statement broadcast on state radio and television.

No successor was immediately named to replace Lukanov, a reform-minded Socialist Party member who helped oust longtime Communist leader Todor Zhivkov last November. Lukanov, 52, was appointed premier in early February.

But it appeared certain the resignation would end a four-day nationwide strike that had gained strength daily, and would draw the opposition Union of Democratic Forces back into Parliament. Its lawmakers walked out last week.

The resignation of the 52-year-old Lukanov had been expected since he and other political leaders struck a deal in talks Thursday to end a stalemate that has prevented Bulgaria from tackling its worst postwar economic crisis.

The accord came in a meeting called by President Zhelyu Zhelev, as the strike continued and Sofia's streets filled with thousands of people demanding an end to political turmoil and economic hardship.

Bulgaria is suffering its worst postwar crisis. Electricity is rationed in Sofia and elsewhere. Many basic consumer items are either rationed or unavailable.

The country cannot make payments on its \$11 billion foreign debt. The political stalemate has blocked officials from moving quickly to improve the economic situation.

But though political leaders agreed during the meeting on Lukanov's resignation, they apparently had been unable to reach final agreement on who should succeed him.

Lukanov was one of the few politicians in Bulgaria with the experience and stature for the job.

On Wednesday, the official BTA news agency said the new premier would be a member of neither the Socialist Party nor the opposition coalition. Alexander Lilov, Socialist Party chairman, agreed in an interview earlier Thursday.

BTA said political leaders of all parties had agreed that "an immediate change of government is indispensable for the formation of a new national government for the peaceful transition to democracy."

It said they also would agree soon on the outline of a further accord that will fix blame for the country's crisis, define the status of political parties, protect people from political persecution, and set ethnic policy and social programs.

The former Communist Party, which ruled Bulgaria for four decades, renamed itself the Socialist Party during the pro-democracy movements that swept Eastern Europe late last year and went on to win June elections.

Only last week, Lukanov survived a no-confidence vote in parliament and won approval of his austerity budget after the opposition walked out of the chamber.

often-violent protests. Ershad, a former general, is facing one of his worst crises since seizing power in a bloodless coup in 1982. The diplomatic sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said his support in the army appeared less solid than earlier believed.

Witnesses said demonstrations continued Thursday, but they did not know about casualties.

Kurt Hensena, a businessman based in Hong Kong, said he heard gunfire when he left his Dhaka hotel for the airport Thursday afternoon. He said there were rumors one person was killed.

The casualty toll could not be verified. The claims were made in written statements circulated in Dhaka that reached India through unofficial channels. Some previous claims of the opposition have been exaggerated.

Diplomatic sources in New Delhi said they had reports of four dead and 15 wounded in the Bangladesh capital during clashes with paramilitary forces Wednesday.

The curfew was imposed Tuesday night as part of a state of emergency Ershad declared to try to quash the growing movement against him. The decree also suspended civil rights and imposed press censorship after six weeks of

Candidate's book advocates nuclear arms

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — The businessman challenging Lech Walesa for the presidency advocates arming Poland with 100 medium-range nuclear missiles to ward off aggression and guard the country's sovereignty.

Stanislav Tyminski makes the argument in "Sacred Dogs," a self-published book which outlines his pro-business, anti-tax and anti-union philosophies.

The 260-page paperback, initially printed in July and distributed by his

campaign, appears to contradict denials made during the campaign. In an interview Monday with The Associated Press, Tyminski denied he advocates nuclear weapons for Poland.

Tyminski was not available Thursday to discuss his book. Campaign aide Krzysztof Pawlitz said that only the candidate could comment on the apparent contradiction.

Tyminski also has branded as "lies, lies, lies" published reports that he traveled to Poland at least

seven times in the 1980s on visas issued by the Polish consulate in Tripoli, Libya.

However, Polish Interior Minister Krzysztof Kozlowski said Thursday that Tyminski did make the seven trips via Libya between 1980 and 1989.

Tyminski's book is filled with military imagery, portraying Poland as a country under attack that must battle for its very existence, especially against German economic dominance. The first chapter is titled: "I Put a Weapon in Your Hand" and the second is, "Go to War!"

In his book, Tyminski devotes a full chapter to the need for nuclear weapons in Poland.

He says the bomb really should be called the Z-bomb.

"Most physicists who worked on the A-bomb were forced to leave Germany by Hitler due to racist policy. ... That is why the 'A' bomb really should be named, the 'Z' bomb," he said.

Soviet retiree tries to hijack plane to Iraq

MOSCOW (AP) — While thousands of foreigners are trying to flee Iraq, one Soviet man wanted to go in the reverse direction and tried to hijack a plane to make the trip, Tass reported Thursday.

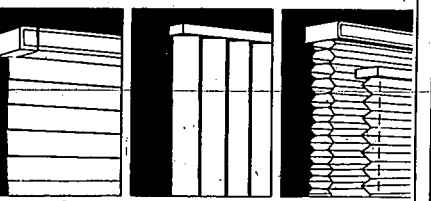
The official Soviet news agency quoted officials of the KGB secret police as saying a 63-year-old retiree passed a note to the crew of a Soviet airliner en route from Moscow to Syktyvkar in northern Russia on

Thursday. Nikolai Pylev, a handicapped man from the city of Voronezh, demanded to be flown to Iraq, Tass said.

The flight commander ignored the demand and stayed on course. Pylev was arrested after the Tupolev-134 jetliner landed in Syktyvkar, Tass said.

The brief dispatch did not give Pylev's motive for demanding a trip.

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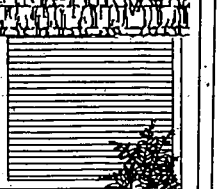

Jones: Idaho delegation needs a water watchdog

TWIN FALLS - Idaho Attorney General Jim Jones stepped away from the soap box as he steps out of office.

In comments to the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club on Thursday, the self-proclaimed "certified lame duck" espoused his views on Idaho's future and needs, including a recommendation that the state's congressional delegation hire a qualified attorney to act as a water watchdog.

"In public life, you're only as good as people on your staff," Jones told the Turf Club audience. The Idaho delegation needs someone on board who understands the importance of water issues, can monitor them and be proactive instead of reactive, Jones said.

When attorneys from Jones' office call Washington, D.C., he said they speak with polite, well-intentioned staffers who have no water expertise.

"We then have to educate the staff members, some of whom are not from the West and are not lawyers."

Jones, who helped negotiate the historic 1984 Swan Falls settlement between Idaho Power and irrigators, said he always thought that agreement solve Idaho's water problems.

"Boy, was I ever wrong."

His successor, Democrat Larry Echthawck, will face scary and serious challenges to Idaho's water, Jones said, including petitions to place five species of salmon on the federal endangered species list, applications to license hydroelectric projects on the Snake River and the necessity of protecting Idaho water from downstream interests.

But water won't be Echthawck's only challenge, Jones said. The state needs to be able to take the federal government to court when it violates hazardous waste laws.

Private businesses can be taken to court, ordered to comply and fined for violations, Jones said. But the federal government, the biggest violator of hazardous waste laws, has been protected by claiming sovereign immunity, which Jones called "a real impediment" to making the government obey the law.

Idahoans will see an effort in Congress to give states more clout to keep the federal government in line, Jones said.

Jones said an important pending case involves death row inmate Thomas Creech, who wants to marry. The attorney general's office contends a marriage would create an unacceptable security risk.

Creech is sentenced to death for a 1981 prison slaying.

Jones pointed out that this is the second time Creech has wanted to marry. Last time, four years ago, Creech arranged a marriage by proxy - his brother went to the altar with Creech's fiancée. But the minister did not know of the proxy condition, and Creech's brother decided he really wanted to marry the bride.

The couple took off, breaking Creech's heart, Jones said. But now, "Cupid has shot another arrow and I guess Tom's back at it."

Lt. Gov. Otter ready to make mark on politics

BOISE - After Democrats evened the score in the Idaho Senate earlier this month, the spotlight shifted from stunning upsets to Lt. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter.

As president of the state Senate, the ebullient Otter, 48, will cast the deciding vote in the event of a 21-21 party-line tie in the 42-member chamber.

For the first time in more than a decade, Idahoans may see Otter - a fiercely independent Republican whose views are often aligned with the Libertarian Party - make a significant mark on Idaho politics.

Otter said he intends to play an active role as the tie-breaker during an organizational session of the Senate next week and during the 1991 Legislature.

"If you're going to be a bear, you might as well be a grizzly," quipped Otter, an avid big game hunter and avid rider.

The son-in-law of multimillionaire potato king J.R. Simplot, Otter frequently espoused anti-government, conservative views during his Idaho House membership - from 1972 to 1976 - and as an unsuccessful candidate for governor in 1978.

For instance, Otter advocated state takeover of Idaho's roughly 35 million acres of public land during his campaign for governor. He lost in an August Republican primary.

He voted "hell, no" on an anti-pornography bill that passed the Legislature. Later he defended his vote. "You can say, 'Is the problem still there?' Hell, yes. 'Did the law do away with it?' Hell, no."

Warning of mushrooming state regulations outside of legislative control in 1978, Otter called for trimming state government to 1964 levels. He complained the sales tax was being used to create more government when it was originally intended for education.

He advocated electing U.S. senators from the Idaho Legislature. "Our founding fathers did not want U.S. senators elected by the people," he was quoted as saying in December 1977.

Otter helped lead the successful campaign for the property tax-limiting 1 Percent Initiative in 1978.

In recent times, Otter's political stands have been limited to a few incidents when Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus was out of town.

For instance, just weeks after taking office as lieutenant governor in 1987, Otter vetoed a bill that would have raised the drinking age from 19 to 21. The veto led Rep. Mack Neibaur, R-Paul, to say, "That just about shot him in the butt."

Otter said he would not be forced into raising the drinking age simply because federal authorities had withheld highway funds in order to compel states to do so.

"I do not perform this task lightly, but I firmly believe that the time has come to express our disapproval, as a state, of the usurpation of the state of Idaho's sovereign power by the Congress and the president," Otter said in his veto message.

Later, a new bill cleared both houses and Andrus signed it.

When reporters asked Otter how he would vote on issues now, Otter indicated he would generally vote Republican. But on regular Senate votes, lawmakers rarely vote along strict party lines.

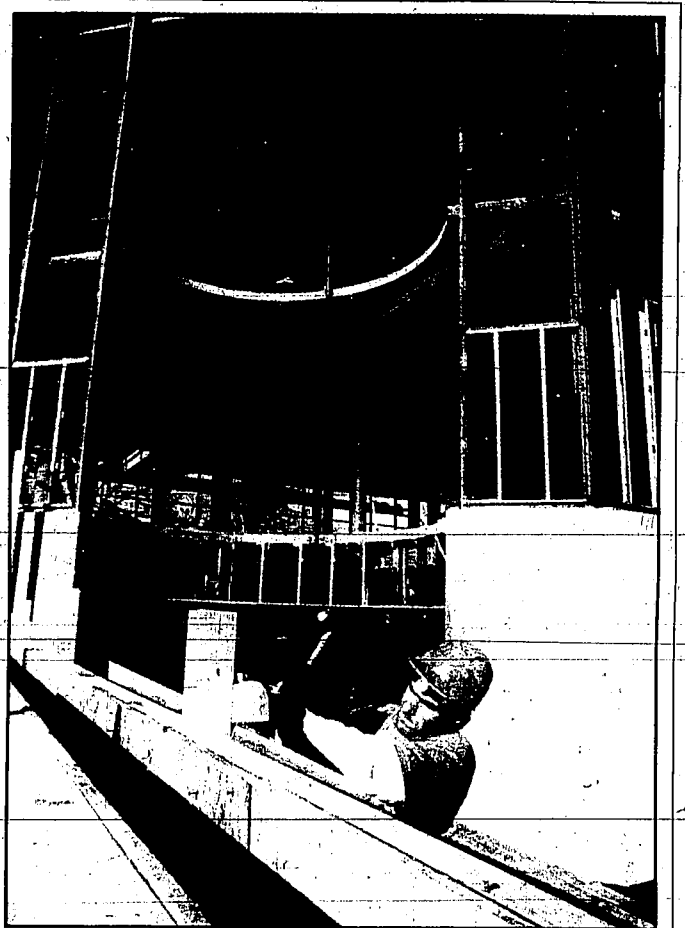
"There's very, very few issues that are totally party line," said Senate Minority Leader Bruce Sweeney, a Lewiston Democrat.

In fact, Sweeney could not remember a single significant party-line vote from the 1990 session. "There weren't any significant enough to remember what they were," he said.

Sweeney served in the House with Otter in the 1970s.

Library expansion on schedule

TWIN FALLS - Shakespeare, Dr. Seuss and Tom Clancy soon will have new digs in the expanded Twin Falls City Library.

The steel-girder frame of the new building is in place and brick masons will start work Monday on the walls, said Library Director Arlan Call. As the walls are finished, glaziers will start measuring for the windows, probably around Jan. 1.

"They tell me the more clutter, the more progress... We must be making progress," Call said amid the noise and jumble of construction Thursday.

The expansion - 21,000 square feet - is expected to be finished in February if the weather cooperates. Call said the work not only is on schedule but is on budget too.

The expansion includes three floors. The lower floor will house a children's library, a

small room for story hour and a public meeting room and lounge for parents. The meeting room will hold 60 to 75 people and with the lounge and story room will be glass enclosed.

Windows in the lower level will look out on City Park.

The second level, where the main entrance will face the corner of 4th Avenue East and Second Street East, will provide plenty of reading space under a 10-foot ceiling. Windows on the southwest wall, from the second floor to the ceiling, will let lots of light into the area.

This level will contain new materials, magazines, newspapers, reference material and a general reference and information desk. Reader stations for the handi-capped and the library's audio and video tape collection also will be located there.

The southwest corner of the second level also will have a lounge facing a large curved window that runs

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First Security will close 1 downtown office

TWIN FALLS — First Security Bank of Idaho plans to close one of its downtown offices early next year and consolidate its Main Avenue operations in the old Twin Falls Bank & Trust building.

"Once the consolidation has occurred, our downtown office will be even better equipped to provide loan, deposit and other financial services to the community," First Security Vice President Curtis H. Eaton said in a news release.

The bank won't lay off any employees in the move, scheduled to take place in early February,

First Security spokesman Arthur Montgomery said.

Twin Falls Bank & Trust merged with Salt Lake-based First Security in January after nearly 85 years of local ownership. Bank & Trust officials said the merger was necessary to compete in a changing banking industry, but it also gave First Security two offices a few blocks apart on Main Avenue.

First Security is remodeling its building on the Shoshone Street-Main Avenue intersection to accommodate the move. Included in the remodeling project are six new drive-in lanes.

The impending vacancy of the bank's 222 Main Avenue S. branch doesn't worry the coordinator of the downtown merchants' association.

"I don't think it will have any impact on downtown," Business Improvement District Manager Betsy Florence said. "They're just consolidating. It's not like a retail store leaving, which I would be real concerned about."

The district levies fees on downtown property owners to promote and maintain the area.

First Security Bank of Idaho is a subsidiary of the holding company First Security Corp. The corporation has assets of \$5.2 billion and operates 182 full-service offices in Idaho, Utah, Oregon and Wyoming.

In addition to its Main Avenue offices, the bank has Twin Falls branches at Addison Avenue and Elm Street, the Lynwood Shopping Center and the Magic Valley Mall.

Wendell ordinance requires rabies shots for dogs

WENDELL — A new ordinance requires all dogs more than a year old to have rabies vaccinations.

Also, owners will have to pay \$10 for a license — instead of the regular \$7 — if their dogs are not spayed or neutered. The council set the new regulations to increase public safety and deter the problem of unwanted puppies.

Councilman Ron Finley said an incident involving a "wee-wee" dog prompted the vaccination law. He said a dog that bit a child had to be impounded for 14 days for observation to see if it had rabies.

The new regulation will inform bite victims if the dog is protected; will stop needless impoundment; and will save the owner impound fees, Finley said.

"It makes it a lot easier on everybody," he said.

In a dispute with Mayor George Benson, Finley said the new dog ordinance should be amended to allow anyone to take a dog to the pound.

But Benson said only the city's dog catcher or police officers legally can take a dog to the pound because of liability.

Explaining an incident earlier this month, Benson said an unleashed dog had been hit by a car and was injured, but had no broken bones. He and City Superintendent Charles Strickland decided to lock the dog in the city's shop yard, feed it and let it recover there, saving the city impound fees.

Finley said the dog, which could have had broken bones, was treated inhumanely because it needed medical attention. The dog should have been taken directly to the veterinarian for impoundment, he said.

He said the lady was "white and scared" from a dangerous looking dog with a gasp on its side that was standing by her car. Finley said he couldn't find police or the dog catcher so he took the dog to the pound.

"If nobody's around, I figure anybody ought to be able to take

some injured, unknown animal to the vet," Finley said.

Benson said the dog barker or one of the city's three police officers should handle unleashed or injured dogs so the city will be protected from lawsuits if someone else doing that job gets injured.

Councilman Jack Green said if a dog is injured, it is common sense for a good Samaritan to try to take care of it. But the council took no action to amend the ordinance and allow anyone to take an unleashed dog to the pound.

In a second dispute, Councilman Dale Bunn made a motion to table a decision whether to sell a piece of city property leased by Ambrose Distributing Company.

But Benson denied the motion and said Bunn is an Ambrose employee and, therefore, is not eligible to take part in any council action concerning that company.

Bunn said he has the right to table any issue.

Finley made the same motion, with council members Jack Green and Pat Goedhard voting yes in a roll call vote.

Benson refused to call for Bunn's vote.

"This is a conflict of interest," Benson said.

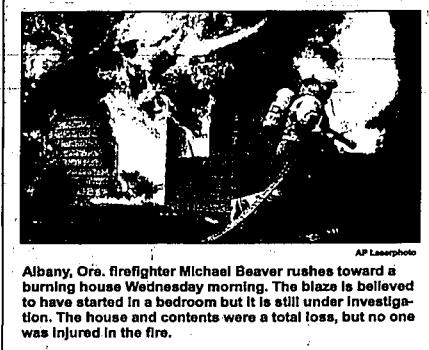
Bunn said the proper procedure is for the mayor to call for all votes and for the council member with a conflict to abstain. The mayor has no right to make a decision in Bunn's vote or abstain, Bunn said.

In other business, the council voted to give all city employees a \$25 per month pay increase, effective retroactively to Oct. 1, the beginning of the city's fiscal year. The increase does not include elected officials.

Additional pay raises included \$100 to Police Chief Kevin Blankmeyer; \$75 to Gail Carpenter, senior police officer; \$50 to Dave Fisher, certified officer; \$30 to Fire Chief Keith Hosack; \$100 to City Clerk June Holm; and \$50 to Clerk/Treasurer Raquel Braga.

Council members agreed there is not enough money to hire a fourth police officer this year. However, they said, officers from other cities' police departments will be hired to fill in for Wendell officers who are taking vacation or sick leave time.

Faculty says University of Idaho computer system in 'dark ages'

MOSCOW (AP) — The University of Idaho's antiquated computer system has left the school's researchers and instructors in the Dark Ages, a group of disgruntled faculty members contends.

A public hearing conducted by a faculty advisory committee this week recommended changes including overhauling the entire Department of Computer Services, adding new staff, placing a greater

emphasis on academic computing and giving students and faculty members more access to Macintosh computers.

"A decade of dramatic advances in computer services has completely bypassed this university," said Paul Bickerstaff, an associate professor of physics at the Moscow school.

"Computer services and the administration are out of touch with the computing needs of academics,"

Eastern Idaho Democrat chipping away at victory margin in election recount

BOISE (AP) — Democratic challenger Mike Hovey of American Falls continued chipping away at the narrow victory margin of Republican Rep. Myron Jones Thursday, but the possibility of reversing the GOP victory in the seven-county southeastern Idaho district seemed to be slipping away.

With the recount completed in five of the counties, Hovey managed to slice Jones' margin by just three to 19. Over 50,000 ballots were checked in those five counties on Wednesday and Thursday.

State and local election officials hoped to complete the recount by Friday evening, but only 4,300 paper ballots remained to be checked in Franklin and Oneida counties.

Democratic prospects were even bleaker in the party's bid to retain the state Senate seat from the same-year election. The rehabilitation of selected precincts, being conducted simultaneously with the Jones-Hovey recount, has extended the victory margin of former Republican House Speaker Allan Larsen of Blackfoot.

Larsen, making a legislative comeback after an unsuccessful 1978 gubernatorial bid, picked up two more votes Thursday's recounts of paper ballots in Bear Lake and Caribou counties to increase his margin of victory to 183 votes over Democratic Sen. Jim Chaberski of Aberdeen. The official canvass from the

Nov. 6 election had given him a 179-vote victory.

Hovey, who picked up two votes in Wednesday's Bannock County recount, added the third from Bear Lake.

The Senate recount is critical to the balance of power in that chamber, which was left in a 21-21 partisan split following last week's official canvass.

In the House race, Democrats are trying to pick up their eighth seat in the 1990 campaign so they can finally break the GOP's two-thirds majority in that chamber. The official canvass left Republicans with 56 seats, exactly two-thirds.

Meanwhile, Boise attorney Pat Costello formally dropped a formal contest of Republican Rep. Ed Osborne's 97-vote state Senate victory over election Don Lofjek. The dismissal of the petition claiming Lofjek should be seated instead of Osborne because of unspecified voting irregularities came two days after a recount in that Ada County district added the final three votes to Osborne's narrow winning margin.

First, there will be a lot of open space and seating areas.

Second, a ramp at the main entrance, as well as one going from the building to the old library, will fulfill a second promise — access. An elevator in the new building will open up all three floors of the new area.

"They will guarantee everybody can get anywhere in the building without much hassle," Call said.

Third, the library will include special areas — an Idaho and Pacific Northwest collection, meeting rooms, even children's restrooms, he said.

A satellite pedestal is being built on the roof and Call expects one day

a satellite dish will enhance the library computer system. Access troughs for computer terminals are being built into the expansion and by the end of 1991 the library could have 16 terminals, he said.

Library employees will use half these terminals; the remainder will be for library patrons to use as the book catalog becomes computerized. The computers will cost about \$30,000, Call estimated.

When the expansion is finished, workers will remodel the old library

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where non-fiction books and more reading space will be located. That remodeling is expected to be finished by June.

The completed library will be able to house 170,000 books, compared to 105,000 now, Call said. With the expansion, the library will total 41,000 square feet.

Call sees more people using the library use when the expansion is finished.

Hospital official denies he left post because of patient death

BLACKFOOT (AP) — William M. Bonnes says his resignation as administrator of State Hospital South was aimed at advancing his career, and its timing two weeks after the death of a patient was only coincidental.

Bonnes said Wednesday that he has been job searching for two to three months, but has nothing specific lined up. "I'm kind of laying back, looking at my future and opportunities out there."

His resignation Monday followed the Nov. 12 death of Wesley Harris, 35, a patient at the mental hospital periodically over the past 23 years. Bingham County Prosecutor Tom Moss said an initial autopsy report showed the death was not the result of an altercation with another patient two weeks earlier.

"In this case at State Hospital South, the staff

died four or five days later ... The doctor said it was pneumonia. We didn't say that. The doctor at Bingham Memorial Hospital said that."

No one at State Hospital South tried to obstruct the police investigation of Harris' death, Bonnes said. However, he said he told police they could not interview patients until he checked with the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare's attorney and they would need a court order to see patient records.

"I didn't make that law," Bonnes said. "If I gave over a medical record to anyone without a court order, I could be sued."

He said part of the reason for the timing of his resignation was to remove negative publicity from the staff at State Hospital South, who he said provide good care. Bonnes said he was not pressured to resign from the Idaho job or, as some news reports have indicated, from his previous position as head of a Massachusetts state mental hospital.

When Bonnes resigned as administrator of Danvers State Hospital there in January 1988, an investigation was under way into the death of a 61-year-old woman who walked away a month earlier and died of a stroke.

Bonnes' resignation from the Danvers job was unrelated to an investigation of that patient's death, his former boss said Thursday.

Louis Berman, assistant commissioner for hospital management in the Massachusetts Department of Mental Health, said an investigation of the woman's death showed that she got out of a crowded building because of inadequate security. However, it found "no inadequacy of leadership from Mr. Bonnes."

He said Bonnes inherited a facility that was at about 200 percent of patient capacity and was woefully lacking in top staff.

In light of difficulties in the mental health system in Massachusetts, Bonnes remained as administrator about the average length of time, Berman said.

ST. ANTHONY — Rejected by voters in the Nov. 6 election, Fremont County Magistrate Jerry Reynolds has announced this is his last week on the job.

Reynolds announced he would be taking accumulated personal leave through December and early January to complete his term.

No replacement has been named for Reynolds, who has been the Fremont County magistrate for 15 years. Kim Foster, 7th Judicial District trial court administrator, said a new magistrate is not expected to be named until March 1 because of budget restrictions.

Attorney to look into medical records

BLACKFOOT — The attorney for a Fort Hall man accused of a 26-year-old murder has won permission from 7th District Judge James Herndon to look into the medical records of the victim and another potential suspect.

John Hevevah Jr., 45, was charged a year ago with first-degree murder for the Oct. 29, 1964, death of 16-year-old Susan Hansen of Blackfoot. His trial is scheduled to begin Feb. 25.

Miss Hansen had driven the family car a few blocks to a Blackfoot store on the day of her slaying. The car was found abandoned nearby later that night, and her body was discovered 25 days later in Spring Creek on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation.

Prosecutors contend Miss Hansen was abducted after leaving the market and was taken in the family car to a potato warehouse in Rockford, where her head was beaten against the dirt floor. Her body then was dumped at Spring Creek, they allege.

Idaho lottery offers new holiday game

BOISE — The Idaho Lottery has unveiled its newest instant scratch game, offering players tickets with a holiday theme and a chance to double cash prizes up to \$10,000.

"Double Holiday Bucks" is the Lottery's 15th scratch game and the third with a feature giving players the chance to double the prize amount indicated by uncovering a designated symbol.

Lottery Director Wally Hedrick introduced the game Thursday along the Boise River with help from some live reindeer. Tickets are on sale at retailers statewide.

"Double Holiday Bucks lets players get into the holiday spirit," Hedrick said. "You can double your 'doe' up to \$10,000 by matching two dollar amounts with the 'buck' symbol. This game is great for gifts and stocking stuffers."

Protection stepped up for gravesites

FORT HALL — The 1991 session of the Idaho Legislature likely will be asked to provide more protection to Indian gravesites by beefing up existing state law.

The Shoshone-Banrock Tribes are drafting a bill aimed at strengthening the Protection of Graves Act, passed in 1984 by state lawmakers, tribal attorney Jeanette Wolfley said.

The Shoshone-Banrock Tribes opposed the project, which eventually was approved by the Boise City Council. Indians argued the area was an ancient tribal burial site, but Ms. Wolfley said existing state law did not provide them enough ammunition to stop the proposal.

Environmental group to keep quiet

SANDPOINT — An environmental group says it will take no position on a plan to dredge a trough on the bottom of Lake Coeur d'Alene to keep a floating golf green from running aground.

The Clean Lakes Coordinating Council said Wednesday it lacks the expertise to judge a plan by Hagadone Hospitality Co. to dredge an underwater trench.

Hagadone Hospitality wants to dig an underwater trench 430 feet long, 180 feet wide and up to 5 1/2 feet deep to keep the golf green from running aground when the lake level drops in the winter.

'Mo Mo Society' on campus is joke

BOISE — A multi-cultural panel of Boise State University students has discussed ethnic diversity with Centennial High School seniors in Meridian.

But some of the Centennial students still believe an anti-Mormon "No Mo Society" on their campus is just a joke.

The group of BSU students Wednesday talked to 500 Centennial seniors about religious and racial issues and also related some of their experiences of living in a predominantly white society.

Teacher Penny Andrew said she asked the panel — comprising BSU students of ethnic minorities — to speak to her classes' last summer, long before she was aware of Centennial's "No Mo Society."

Ms. Andrew said she thought Centennial students, who are mostly white, would benefit from exposure to different cultures.

The "No Mo" group circulated flyers attacking the teachings of the Mormon religion this fall. School officials have said the group is not an officially sanctioned club.

Storm drain treatment law in effect

BOISE (AP) — Meridian High School junior Paul Ewert recently spray-painted neon-green silhouettes of rainbow trout next to dozens of Boise storm drains as part of a Boy Scout project.

Next to the trout was a stencil that said, "DUMP NO WASTE."

On Wednesday, Ewert visited a city storm drain.

He picked through a thick pile of leaves, uncovering plastic candy wrappers, cigarette butts, two polystyrene cups and a balloon.

"Everything that goes into these drains eventually goes into the Boise River," Ewert said.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has the same concern.

The environmental watchdog issued new regulations this month requiring Boise to develop a plan for stopping pollutants from pouring through storm drains and into the river.

Eventually, the city may have to develop a storm drainage-treatment system to replace its end-of-pipe controls.

The new regulations have officials confused, because the storm drains are regulated by different entities, including the city, irrigation districts and the Ada County Highway District.

For starters, no one has mapped the storm drain network, and no one knows how many outlets feed into the Boise River.

"One of the first orders of business is to get all the parties together," said Ron Redmond, assistant city engineer.

Under the new EPA regulations, the parties will have to file an application for a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit.

A 1988 National Water Quality survey found storm runoff to be "a leading cause" of water pollution.

Though no serious pollution has been detected from storm runoff in Boise recently, officials admit numerous pollutants get washed down the drain.

In Boise, controls consist of concrete "skimmer" boxes, which catch large debris before it flows into irrigation ditches and eventually the river.

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Deputy attorneys general who work for state agencies sometimes "share" their legal opinions because they must answer to two bosses, outgoing Attorney General Jim Jones says.

During a news conference in Idaho Falls, Jones, who ran unsuccessfully for the Republican U.S. Senate nomination rather than seeking a third term this year, repeated his call for consolidating all lawyers representing state agencies under the elected attorney general.

And while Democratic Attorney General-elect Larry EchoHawk of Pocatello says the idea deserves consideration, a spokesman for Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus says Jones may be proposing to fix a system that is not broken.

Deputy attorneys general who work for state agencies, which are headed by gubernatorial appointees, sometimes feel pressure to justify agency policy instead of giving their legal opinions, Jones contends.

"And sometimes the agencies don't get the independent legal advice they need to keep out of trouble."

Jones said consolidation would mean 10 fewer state attorneys and a savings of between \$300,000 and \$500,000.

Idaho has 80 deputy attorneys general. Twenty work in the central office in Boise, and answer only to the attorney general. The remaining 60 work in state agencies, and must answer to the attorney general and agency heads.

The arrangement "makes for a very awkward line of authority," and attorneys sometimes become agency "mouthpieces," Jones said.

And previous Republican attorneys general have pushed the idea of consolidation, only to have it shot down by Democratic governors.

Jones, who admitted having a "rocky" relationship with Andrus, said politics always has been the main stumbling block to implementing the proposal because governors have seen it as infringing on their executive prerogatives.

"I think there's some fear that somehow or another the AG's influence would help somehow to shade agency policy," Jones said.

He said he hopes EchoHawk, the first Democratic attorney general in 15 years, will convince Andrus to drop his opposition to the idea.

"I think it's certainly something worthy of consideration," EchoHawk said, citing a national trend toward consolidation of government agencies under central authority.

However, the Bannock County prosecutor said, "I'm not sure if a Democratic attorney general has any better chance at pushing that through the Legislature."

Andrus' attorney, James Johnson, said the current system has worked well over the past four years, and consolidation has been opposed by both Democrats and Republicans in the governor's office over the past 30 years.

Court of appeals upholds conviction for Deary man who squanders estate

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Court of Appeals has upheld the conviction of a Deary man charged with squandering his institutionalized mother's money on a series of items including satellite dishes, ice cream and a bar tab.

The unanimous three-member court on Thursday held that 2nd District Judge John Bengtson did not abuse his discretion in jury instruction by refusing to overturn the jury's guilty verdict against Gerald Boag.

Boag was convicted and ordered imprisoned for grand theft by illegally depleting the estate of over \$100,000 of his widowed mother while she was suffering from Alzheimer's disease in a Latah County nursing home.

He had been named guardian of his mother and conservator of her property.

While employed only part-time with savings or real property of his own, Boag as conservator purchased, among other things, a logging truck, an farm truck, three pickups, a car, two television satellite dishes and five horses. Money from

the estate was used to pay his wife's doctor bills, his personal expenses and a bar tab at a local tavern.

He maintained as conservator he had the authority to make the transactions and that all the purchases enhanced the value of his ailing mother's estate.

But when he contended the jury should be advised that under state law he was innocent of grand theft if the estate was openly and avowedly appropriated under a claim of right made in good faith, Bengtson objected.

The appellate court agreed on grounds that Boag had never claimed to have actually appropriated his mother's estate.

Instead, he maintained the expenditures he made were for her benefit, not his.

The court also held that there was

sufficient evidence to support Boag's conviction.

"The jury could infer from the enormity and nature of Boag's expenditures that he intended to appropriate to himself the items purchased," Chief Judge Jesse Walters wrote.

In another unanimous decision, the court voided the drug conviction of Gene Mauro on grounds that his guilty plea under a now-disputed plea-bargain agreement was not made with full knowledge of its consequences.

The court ruled that 7th District Judge H. Reynold George failed to advise Mauro when he entered the plea that he would not be able to withdraw it even if the district court declined to follow the plea-bargain arrangement. Mauro reached with prosecutors.

Heroes land to aid in flood relief mission

SEATTLE (AP) — River guides, ranchers, a lawyer and an inventor were among the heroes in rescue missions during some of the worst flooding in Washington state history.

The unpaid volunteers, largely members of search and rescue clubs that work closely with police, firefighters and sheriff's deputies, used jet boats, helicopters and even a World War II-era amphibious craft to pull people, livestock, dogs and cats from high water in more than half a dozen counties.

"I couldn't believe the effort they made," Skagit County Sheriff Gary Frazier said.

Faced with 19 overflowing rivers in more than a dozen counties last weekend and record flood levels in populous King and Snohomish counties, some worked virtually around the clock without pay.

Rancher Tex Holman and river boat runners Tom Choate and Corky Hunger, all members of the Skagit River Wildcat Stevedore Club in Sedro Woolley, "have been here every day ... just forgetting everything that they do for a living," said John Hunter, Frazier's chief deputy.

"They give me fuel, all the gas I can use, that's it," said John H. McAllister, 55, of Kent, who was called by King County police officer Mike Hagan as a near-legend in rescue operations.

McAllister and his two sons worked 24 hours, got a couple hours of rest and then spent another seven hours in his amphibious vehicle, built for operations like the Allied landing at Normandy in World War II.

McAllister, an inventor of helicopter gear, said he used the 35-foot blue machine to pull 211 people, a dozen dogs and half a dozen cats to safety, most in Snoqualmie.

On one pass through a flooded area, he said he picked up 53 people.

On another mission early Sunday morning, the craft encountered a washout and began tipping precariously before "we caught a winch to the railroad tracks and pulled ourselves back up," he said.

The toughest job, he said, was getting five people out of a home threatened by the Cedar River near Maple Valley about 4 a.m. Sunday after Fire-Department efforts with a

pontoon raft proved unsuccessful. "We knew they were going to be releasing water from the dam. We had about another hour to get them out of there," he said. "We got it done in an hour and 11 minutes."

Bob Bonner of Everett, a Scott Paper Co. machinist with 24 years as a Snohomish County search and rescue volunteer, said he worked in a helicopter, amphibious vehicle and motorboat from Friday night to Sunday night with only a few brief rest breaks.

"After spending most of that time as crew chief in the chopper, a U.S. 1B Huey, he said flooding along the Skykomish and Snohomish rivers was the worst he had seen.

"We were grabbing people everywhere," he said. "A lot of it, mostly, it's new arrivals, I think — people who don't understand what the river will do."

Bonner, Randy Schroder of Everett and Eric Gustafson of Darrington faced treacherous conditions in inflatable river boats and a 22-foot, flat-bottomed aluminum craft with a 115-horsepower outboard motor, sheriff's Sgt. John Taylor said.

"They were battling currents and barbed-wire fences and high winds and all kinds of horrible things," Taylor said.

Glen Pszczola, a Key Center lawyer and member of the Puget Sound Sea Rescue Association, spent six hours on a 22-foot jet boat helping to rescue 17 people and two dogs from the rambling Skokomish River south of Union in Mason County. It was his first flood mission.

"There was just all manner of things floating around there — pieces of stairwells, septic tanks, other tanks, toys, pots and pans," he said.

The only scary moment, he said, was on the first mission.

"We loaded a baby, a couple of kids, a pregnant lady, the mother and a couple of adult males," Pszczola said.

"On the way out, we just kind of slid right up on something." The boat was stuck for a moment, then was worked free with a back-and-forth engine motion.

"That turned out to be an automobile," he said.

Boise truck firm gears up for drug tests

BOISE (AP) — When drivers for Boise's Browning Trucking come in from the road next week, they will have a little job to do.

This time for a drug test. The tests are part of the program owner Dr. Browning has begun in an effort to comply with a U.S. Department of Transportation regulation.

The new law requires drivers of commercial vehicles and others who transport passengers to be enrolled in drug-testing programs by Dec. 21. "I hate to see it have to be done, but I'm not against it," Browning said. "It's a lot more paperwork and it's going to cost us."

He said the price to set up the program for his seven drivers is about \$700. After the first year, it costs \$50 per employee to renew the program.

But the consequences of non-compliance could drive Browning out of business. Some companies have been fined up to \$15,000 for violations.

"We couldn't absorb a fine like that," Browning said. "We would just have to close down."

The law covers drivers of trucks weighing more than 26,000 pounds that travel across state lines, commercial vehicles carrying more than 15 people and those that move haz-

ardous materials, said William Bensmiller, a safety specialist for the Federal Highway Administration.

It also covers railroad workers, airline pilots, and mechanics and pipeline workers in the natural gas industry.

Right now, the law requires pre-employment testing and post-accident testing if a worker involved in a traffic mishap is cited by police for causing the accident.

Potential employees are notified that they face drug testing as a condition of employment.

ing, said David Minert, regional manager of Wolfgang Associates, a Portland-based drug-testing consulting firm.

The court already has ruled that airlines and railroads must randomly test 50 percent of their employees annually, he said.

"On a practical level, we oppose indiscriminate urine testing," said Jack Van Valkenburgh, director of the Idaho chapter of the American Civil Liberties Union.

"The process is both unfair and unnecessary to force workers who aren't suspected and whose job performance is satisfactory to prove their innocence."

Bowers asks for lighter sentence

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — Ernest L. Bowers, the former Spokane businessman whose financial shenanigans left creditors in Helena and Kalispell dangling two years ago, is seeking reduction of his 10-year prison term for writing bad checks.

Bowers, now in a federal prison in Florida, filed the petition with the state Sentence Review Board, a panel of three district judges that meets periodically

to review and sometimes to change sentences.

His petition is being opposed by Lewis and Clark County Attorney Mike McGrath, who said Bowers agreed to the 10-year sentence in a plea bargain and shouldn't be allowed to renegotiate.

Bowers pleaded guilty in a state district court in July 1989 to issuing a series of bad checks totaling about \$16,000.

As part of an agreement for his guilty plea, a felony theft charge was dismissed.

In addition, Bowers pleaded guilty in U.S. District Court at Helena to two counts of mail fraud. Twenty-seven other counts were dismissed.

Bowers was ordered to first spend 63 months in federal prison for the mail-fraud conviction and then to complete his 10-year state prison term.

He has spent about one year in the federal prison in Florida and is now trying to have his state sentence amended.

His review is scheduled for late March or early April. McGrath on Wednesday filed his arguments against Bowers' request, contending prosecutors "bargained in good faith." (Bowers should be required to conform to the obligations of his agreement.)

McGrath also said the sentence was appropriate, considering Bowers' criminal history, which includes three other federal convictions, two for mail fraud.

Bowers bilked thousands of dollars from Montana businesses, including four in Helena, to support a lavish lifestyle, McGrath said. He bought the business in 1987-88 using the corporate name Squirrel.

Seattle bridge shut down after storm picks up force

SEATTLE (AP) — High winds early Thursday forced officials to close a damaged floating bridge temporarily, creating new woes for rush-hour commuters between Seattle and its eastern suburbs.

After a storm moved out of the area, the state Transportation Department reopened westbound lanes of the \$110 million bridge shortly after 8 a.m., ending a 6½-hour closure that forced many commuters "living" east of Lake Washington to find alternate routes into town.

The bridge was being stabilized by several tugboats and a giant salvage ship. The closure was ordered when a storm with winds gusting to 30 mph moved into the area.

"We just don't want to put traffic out there with the wind this high and the movement of the bridge. It is bobbing up and down quite a bit," state Department of Transportation

spokesman Bill Southern said at the time.

The westbound lanes of the Interstate 90 bridge had reopened Tuesday.

The Arctic Salvor, a 949-ton salvage ship, had been brought in overnight to help anchor the damaged span against the approaching wind and rain storm.

Twelve of 58 anchor cables on the 1½-mile bridge over Lake Washington were severed Sunday when an old floating bridge nearby was swamped by rising water and collapsed. The old bridge was closed for renovations at the time.

Crews continued to rig cables from the new bridge to clusters of huge ship anchors 200 feet below on the lakebed, with permanent repairs to be made later. All of the boats will stay until 28 temporary anchors can be attached to the bridge.

"The human rights record of the People's Republic of China is appalling," Gary Cadd of Seattle, a member of Amnesty International's board, said at a news conference.

"Hundreds of people are imprisoned for the nonviolent expression of their beliefs. Torture is used on a systematic basis as a political weapon. Many people have been tortured to death.

James Lilley, U.S. ambassador to China, and Zhu Qizhen, Chinese ambassador to the U.S., will address the closing session of the issues symposium on Saturday at the trade center.

Cadd said Amnesty International, which works on behalf of political prisoners around the world, had attempted to get a discussion of human rights issues in China and the U.S. on the agenda at the issues symposium. "But the organizers of the exposition apparently thought it would be bad for business," Cadd said.

Roger Collis, the Seattle organizer of the conference, said had put out an informal feeler to the Chinese on the subject, but was told it was too sensitive to be addressed. Cadd also said he was "disappointed to

note that neither the mayor of Seattle nor the governor of our state would stand with us today, to go on record opposing not a trade conference but gross violations of human rights."

Neither the state nor the city endorsed the conference, but neither had representatives at the press conference.

U.S. Rep. John Miller, R-Seattle, the only politician to speak at the press conference, said he sought not a halt to U.S. trade, cultural and economic contacts with China, "but to make sure that every time such a contact takes place the issue of human rights is on the table."

He said while other issues had forced events in China off the front pages, "We must keep in mind that short attention span."

The former speaker of the state House of Representatives was re-elected in 1988 in a come-from-behind victory over Democratic former Salt Lake City mayor Ted Wilson.

In August, a Deseret News-KSL-TV poll by Dan Jones & Associates showed Bangert's popularity had plummeted from 61 percent in December 1989 to 56 percent.

Bruins' defense saves the day against Jerome

JEROME — The consistency of the defense and the late arrival of some semblance of shooting touch let the Twin Falls Bruins surprise the Jerome Tigers 31-16 Thursday night.

Falling behind and trying to run its fast-paced offense two steps quicker than its ability allowed, the Twin Falls appeared on the verge of being blown out when the Tigers moved ahead 32-16 with two minutes left in the first half.

But just when the Tigers appeared to have Coach Jim Stauffer ready for a victory cigar — someone blew out the match.

The Tigers didn't score again for 10 minutes and, in fact, went from that late second-quarter interval until 17 seconds remained in the game before getting more than 10 points.

The result confirmed Stauffer's pregame worries, the coach noting the Bruin defense might be a little much for his team to handle in the season opener. Actually, the Tigers handled a couple of Twin Falls' defensive plays but when Coach John Astorquia shifted his Bruins into a half-court trap, the game spun 180 degrees.

"We couldn't handle the trap," Stauffer said, "even though we called timeout after timeout and begged and begged them to reverse the ball back out on top. I think we did it once."

"I think overall the game went on the point that Twin Falls did what it had to do. They got us out of our offense, kept it close and then came back when their offense started clicking a little."

Astorquia harked back to the 32-16 count, noting "I was wondering if this high-powered offense we've been touting the last four weeks was going to show its head. I don't think it ever did."

Astorquia said the Bruin platoon system with pressure defense and rushing offense was the difference.

"We played hard on defense and we pushed the ball back at them at every opportunity," he said. "Later in the game they started missing some of the shots you wouldn't expect them to and I think that had something to do with their legs getting a little tired."

Astorquia said his team's hustled helped allay his fears over rebounding.

"I felt we did a pretty good job most of the game. We had times we didn't block out — a couple of major ones on free throws — and they got some rebounds we shouldn't have given them. But we did well considering our size against their's."

"But it was the defense," Astorquia con-

Helping Jerome make its big turn around from a losing 1989 season to a visit to the



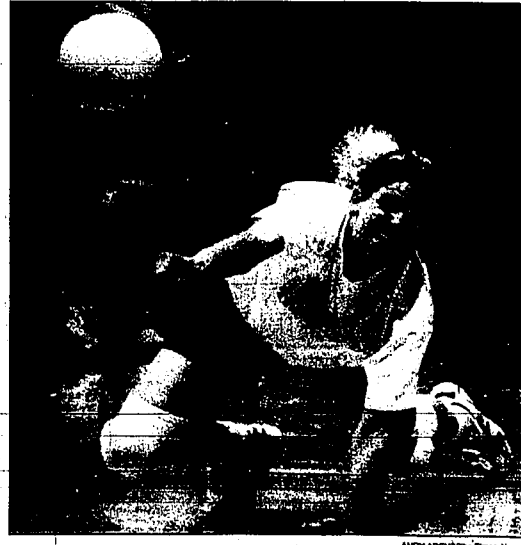

Idaho's Pearce shares Big Sky MVP honors

BOISE (AP) — Idaho running back Devon Pearce and Weber State quarterback Jamie Martin on offense and Montana State tackle Corey Widmer on defense have been named the Big Sky Conference's 1990 most valuable players.

Big Sky Commissioner Ron Stephenson also announced Thursday that Eastern Washington running back Harold Wright and Northern Arizona wide receiver Hendrick Johnson share the league's top newcomer award in voting by Big Sky head football coaches, who were not allowed to vote for their own players.

Pearce, a 5-foot, 9-inch, 194-pound junior from Portland, Ore., was a unanimous first-team all-Big Sky offense selection this week. He led the league and was second among I-AA players in rushing this season with 1,393 yards and 23 touchdowns on 267 carries, and had four of the top five rushing performances in the conference this season.

He averaged 126.6 yards rushing per game — including eight games over 100 yards and a season-high 226 yards at Boise State — led the Big Sky in scoring with 102 points and was second in all-purpose rushing with 144.5 yards per game.

Martin, a 6-4, 200-pound sophomore from Arroyo Grande, Calif., also was named to the first-team all-Big Sky offense. He led all I-AA players in total offense, averaging 337.5 yards per game and accounting for 25 touchdowns. He completed 256 of 428 passes for 3,700 yards and 23 scores. His yardage total was the second best in Big Sky history behind the 4,041 by former Idaho great John Friesz last year.

Others receiving votes for the offensive award were Nevada wide receiver and return specialist Treamele Taylor, Boise State running back Chris Thomas, Eastern Washington guard Charles Spencer and Montana quarterback Grady Bennett.

The Bobcats' Widmer, a 6-3, 258-pound junior from Bozeman, Mont., was a unanimous first-team all-Big Sky defense selection. He was among the season's quarterback sack leaders in the league with 17 while registering 93 tackles, forcing three fumbles and deflecting two passes.



Idaho Junior Devon Pearce was second among Division I-AA rushers with 1,393 yards.

He edged Boise State end Erik Helgeson for the award.

Also receiving votes for the defensive honor were Nevada inside linebacker Matt Clifton, Eastern Washington end Aaron Hansen, Idaho end Jeff Robinson and Idaho cornerback Charlie Oliver.

Among newcomers, Wright, a 5-9, 212-pound freshman from Tacoma, Wash., ended the season ranked third among Big Sky rushers. He ran 184 times in 11 games for 836 yards and a 4.5-yards-per-carry average while scoring seven touchdowns for the Eagles. He finished the season 14th in the league in all-purpose rushing with 91.82 yards per game.

Johnson, a 6-2, 180-pound junior from Tucson, Ariz., came to the Lumberjacks from Arizona Western Junior College. He ended the season as the Big Sky's No. 5 receiver with 59 passes for 1,091 yards and a league-leading 11 touchdowns.

He averaged 5.9 catches per game and was 13th in all-purpose rushing in the Big Sky with 99.18 yards per game. He averaged 18.5 yards per pass reception.

Others receiving votes for the top newcomer award were Idaho State kicker Darren Goodman, Idaho quarterback Doug Nussmeier, Montana wide receiver Billy Coughlin and Nevada defensive lineman George Buddy.

QB's share NFL player of month award

NEW YORK — Houston's Warren Moon and Philadelphia's Randall Cunningham, who rallied their teams in November from slow starts, were named NFL offensive players of the month on Thursday.

The NFL also selected linebacker Derrick Thomas of Kansas City and Minnesota strong safety Joey Browner as defensive players of the month.

Moon, the league's top-rated passer in November, completed 66 of 97 passes for 965 yards and eight touchdowns to lead the Oilers to a 2-1 record and a share of the AFC Central lead.

Cunningham completed 59 of 102 passes for 815 yards and 10 touchdowns in November to lead the Eagles to five straight victories, including a 31-13 win over the New York Giants on Sunday.

Cunningham also rushed for 249 yards in November. He leads Philadelphia with 607 yards.

Thomas, a second-year linebacker out of Alabama, recorded eight sacks and 22 tackles and also forced four fumbles and recovering one to lead the Chiefs to a 3-1 mark during November.

Browner intercepted four passes, including one for a touchdown, and recorded 27 tackles and one sack to help the resurgent Vikings (5-6) to four wins in November.

BOZEMAN, Mont. — Junior guard Willard Dean, who sat out last season with a knee injury, has requested and been granted a leave of absence from the Montana State University basketball team for "personal reasons," his coach announced Thursday.

Dean, a 6-foot, 160-pounder from Lansing, Mich., was dressed in street clothes for MSU's Wednesday night meeting with Rocky Mountain College. He will not accompany the Bobcats on a road swing to Texas Southern and Appalachian State this weekend and his status will be reviewed by head coach Mick Durham sometime next week.

"Willard's been struggling with his amount of playing time and he's trying to decide if he wants to be on this team," Durham said. "When we come back from this trip the two of us will sit down and talk."

Dean saw action in MSU's first three games, averaging six minutes of playing time. He averaged 2 points, 1.7 rebounds and .7 of an assist in that time.

Conditions indicate smooth start for World Cup skiing

MILAN, Italy (AP) — Pirmin Zurbriggen is gone and so are some of skiing's top women competitors.

But one thing that has been missing for parts of the last three years is back for the start of the World Cup season.

Snow.

After three years of warm, dry weather, organizers hope the conditions in the Alps will allow a smooth start this weekend to a season in which Mario Girardelli, Alberto Tomba and a group of Scandinavian youngsters seek to replace the retired Zurbriggen, a four-time overall World Cup champion.

Austria's Peter Kronberger's goal of a second straight women's overall title has been made easier by the retirement of five top challengers, including 1988 Olympic medalist Michela Figini and Maria Walliser.

The 1990-91 skiing program, including the World Championships in Saalbach, Austria, that begin in late January, also will feature changes in some downhill races.

In two of the men's downhills, the starting order for the top 15 will be decided by practice times. The fastest qualified will be the first to choose their own starting position.

And in the downhills in Wengen, Switzerland, and Lake Louise, Canada, only the 30 fastest skiers in practice will qualify for the race.

These changes are considered a first step toward the reforms sought by the U.S. Ski Federation in the 23-year-old World Cup rules. The Americans say the changes would benefit competitors and their sponsors.

Some leading makers of ski outfits, such as Rossignol and Salomon, had suffered substantial losses because of a drop in winter tourism in recent years and have sharply reduced their sponsorship in ski racing.

The once-powerful Yugoslav alpine skiing team has been almost dissolved by the financial problems of the country's top ski supplier and sponsor, Elan, as well as the nation's political problems.

One of the reforms sought by the U.S. Ski Federation would allow skiers to receive bigger cash bonuses from fewer World Cup events, which traditionally are concentrated in European and North American resorts over winter weekends.

A new marketing strategy also is being pushed by the Americans and is likely to be approved by the International Ski Federation early next year. U.S. officials have threatened to pull out of the competition and organize an alternative circuit if their demands for an overhaul of the World Cup circuit were not met.

Men and women skiers each will compete in 31 races this season, which ends in the New York resort of Waterville Valley, New Hampshire, on March 20-24. Two men's races already were held this summer in New Zealand.

now competes for Luxembourg, is considered the best all-around skier among the men following Zurbriggen's retirement.

But his form is uncertain following recent knee surgery and a lower back injury that sidelined him for several months last year.

Skiers still do well in all four disciplines of the World Cup — slalom, giant slalom, super-giant slalom and downhill — and has won three overall titles, just one behind the record held by Zurbriggen and Gustavo Thoeni.

Zurbriggen, who defeated Norwegian Ole Christian Furuseth 357 points to 234 points for the overall title last year, retired at the age of 27 because he wanted to devote more time to his family.

Tomba and Furuseth, considered Girardelli's toughest rivals for the overall title, are superior to Girardelli in the slalom. But both avoid the downhill and therefore lose points in the fastest alpine discipline and in combined events.

Other title contenders such as Italy's Kristian Ghedina, young Swede Fredrik Nyberg, Austrian Gunter Mader and rising Norwegian star Lasse Kjus have difficulties in at least one of the four disciplines.

Tomba, who won two Olympic gold medals in Calgary in 1988, said he will run in the first Super-G against the wishes of his family, to seek to match Girardelli's point total.

"I must pocket points from three disciplines if I want to win my first overall title," he said. "Girardelli is the clear favorite. I come just behind him along with Furuseth, Mader and possibly Nyberg. My teammate Ghedina could be a big surprise."

You can't argue with success

Sibling rivalry remains central to famous comedy team's renown

JACKPOT — Dick Smothers says he and his brother, Tom, are used to playing for small audiences.

"Elevators, phone booths," he says.

So the famous duo — also used to playing stadiums — should feel at home tonight and tomorrow night on the small stage of Cactus Pete's in Jackpot. The show has been sold out for weeks.

"Tommy has always been looking forward to Jackpot. He used to go to high school there," Dick said, kidding, in a telephone interview from his home in Virginia. "They sent me a brochure, so I know what I'm doing. Boy, it's pretty scary."

The Smothers Brothers started in 1959 as folk singers poking fun at folk singers.

Back then, Dick recalled, if a song had 32 verses, pretentious folk groups would sing every verse and bore you to death.

"We sort of throw away the songs," Dick said. "You know the thing about how the Smothers Brothers never finish a song? That's still pretty true. We get up there and start something and then get in an argument."

Comedy is the picture, while the song is just the frame, he said.

And that comedy is always evolving as the brothers mature through the stages of life. Even from show to show, their spontaneous humor always has something new.

"Your material has to change with your age or it doesn't wear well," said Dick, who turned 51 Nov. 20. Tom is 22 months older.

"Obviously, we don't have to say 'Mom likes you best' anymore. People sort of know that. And we don't do 'I fell in a vat of chocolate,' which was one of our big songs, because people won't laugh at it. A lot of the humor we did when we were in our 20s and 30s, we're too mature for. People wouldn't buy it."

Although they no longer yet do each other-like children, today's duo follows the same consistent blend of comedy that brought them fame.

"Our act is a lot more complex, but it's still basically two brothers standing up there trying to sing the songs and arguing," Dick said. "Tommy still bumbles, but it's still honest and it's still lovable and it fits our maturity."

In the past three years, the Smothers

Brothers have done 20 one-hour television specials for CBS and have worked year-round playing for public concerts, casinos, private parties and symphony concerts with 100-piece orchestras. On the side they do commercials and take occasional two-week vacations.

In the planning stage is a television "magazine" news show for an hour in the early morning on independent stations.

Dick said the program would have the same weather-sports essentials, but would be done by funny guys instead of Jane Pauley replicas.

"It would give an alternative to the pompous look-alike morning shows," he said. "We're pretty excited about it."

As they tour the country with pianist Michael Freddy, the Smothers are sometimes joined by old friends Mason

Williams, Pat Paulsen and John Hartford.

"They're the people that grew up with us and they're still very, very good," Dick said, noting that Mason Williams — co-composer of the instrumental hit "Classical Gas" — delivered the idea of Yo-Yo Man and wrote the original Yo-Yo Man song. He helped the brothers learn the philosophy

Female superstars earn less than males

one time, Mae West and Barbara Stanwyck were the highest-paid women in the country.

Today, the belief that only male stars can be trusted on marquee dictates the terms of salary negotiations. In an interview last December with the Los Angeles Times, Meryl Streep complained: "I make half of what Dustin Hoffman makes, half of what (Robert) Redford makes, half of what Jack (Nicholson)

of Yo, which they added to their act about 10 years ago.

"We like the philosophy of Yo, the blissful mystic state of Yo," Dick said.

"Say you have an assignment and you're getting into it and the words are flowing and out of a student you look at the clock and you've been doing it for five hours! You were really in a state of Yo there. You were really flowing; you were balanced; things were happening; and if something bad came up, you wouldn't quit."

"So the mystic state of Yo is to try and to prove yourself; to get in that

balance where you're so cool you can't do it. That's what the Yo-Yo Man professes."

In talking over the recent boom in yo-yos brought on largely by Tom Smothers' expertise, Dick said he remembers the Philippine men who used to travel the country, amazing young Americans by showing off their "national sport" of yo-yo skills and tricks.

"Little kids today have the same fascination that we did when we were little," Dick said.

The toy's simplicity of just wood and cotton string, without batteries or electronic buttons, requires a concentration that draws one into the enlightened state of Yo, he said, adding, "It's a positive state. I think it's a good philosophy for general living. The Yo-Yo Man is ethical. He doesn't cheat. That's unusual to day."

Mentally ill man jailed for mutilating rare books

PHILADELPHIA - A mentally ill drifter who stole and mutilated more than 330 rare books from libraries across the country, was sentenced to a year and a day in prison. William Withereil, 39, a lanky, slightly disheveled man with brown hair, a short beard and glasses, listened without comment as the sentence was imposed by U.S. District Judge J. William Ditter.

"There has been significant evidence in this case that Mr. Withereil marches to a different drummer than many of us do," Ditter said. "It is quite evident that he gets some kind of satisfaction from the acquisition of books from libraries. He knows that he is doing wrong when he does it."

Prosecutors said in a memorandum that Withereil had traveled throughout North and Central America for five years in his yellow Isuzu camper, raiding about 20 public and university libraries.

He was sentenced on his Aug. 16 conviction on two counts of interstate transportation of stolen property — two books that had been owned by Benjamin Franklin, valued at \$60,000.

Withereil had stolen them from the rare-books room of the Van Pelt Library at the University of Pennsylvania a year earlier. He mailed the books, along with hundreds of others taken from libraries throughout the United States and Canada, to his parents' home in San Gabriel, Calif.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Walter S. Batt Jr. said that Withereil's parents had told the FBI that they never opened the boxes in which the books had been packed. In a sentencing memorandum, Batt urged Ditter to impose a prison sentence, noting that the boxes contained more than 330 books worth a total of \$193,275.

Prosecutors said Withereil was supported by his parents during his travels and did not sell any books.

Many of the books, Batt said, had been mutilated by Withereil, with pages ripped out and bindings destroyed. In some cases, Withereil, who has been described in court papers as having "severe psychological problems" as a result of brain damage, had pasted together pages of different books, in what Batt described as a "crude collage."

"Write many of the mutilated books can be repaired and restored; their value as original historical artifacts has been destroyed," Christine Ruggere, curator of special collections for the Van Pelt Library, said in an interview Wednesday.

Defense attorney Claire J. Rauscher had stressed Withereil's history of mental illness in asking Ditter to spare him any prison time. Prosecutors countered that argument by de-

scribing Withereil's theft of the Franklin books as "extremely deliberate, if not ingenious."

fewer films with a female focus are being made today than perhaps at any time in movie history.

"Actresses have a much tougher time now," says producer Mark Johnson ("Rain Man," "Avalon"). "There aren't nearly as many good roles. In the '40s, you had the great romantic comedies with strong women characters. Carole Lombard, Barbara Stanwyck, Bette Davis outdrew the men. In the '50s, Doris Day was as much of a draw as Rock Hudson. Elizabeth Taylor was enormous in the '60s.

(Barbra) Streisand in the '70s. But, for at least five years now, we haven't had a real strong female box office draw."

Never known as risk-takers, in an era of escalating production and marketing costs they are even more under the gun. Working with contracts that usually run three years, and with stockholders breathing down their necks, studio heads in the '80s began pandering to the youth audience whose repeat business held the hope of blockbuster.

Playing to that undiscriminating age group meant a proliferation of

formula films with costly special effects featuring the same handful of increasingly pricey male stars.

"Movies are so expensive that the studios want to hedge their bets," says Meryl Streep, producer of "Ghost." "They go for the four or five big male names — Cruise, Stallone, Schwarzenegger, Eddie Murphy, Willis — to bring the audience in."

Producers report that they are often encouraged to pair an actress with a male co-star as a safety net — or to cast six of them at a time to maximize appeal as in "Steel Magnolias."

Actresses like Rachel Ward ("After Dark, My Sweet") find such thinking a turn-off. "In Hollywood, you're not an actor but a commodity," she says. "I realize that we are talking about 'show-business' and not 'show art,' that there's a capitalist philosophy at work. But it's a perpetual dilemma being an actress. Had I known what I was heading into, I would never have become one."

In 1961, according to the Quigley Poll of U.S. theater owners, three women were among the top 10 box office money makers (Elizabeth Taylor was No. 1, Doris Day No. 3, Sandra Dee No. 6).

In 1981, Dolly Parton was fourth, Jane Fonda fifth, Bo Derek eighth and Goldie Hawn ninth. Last year, only one actress made the grade, and just barely: Kathleen Turner, who ranked 10th.

According to the conventional wisdom, Bette Midler can pack the house in a comedy for that all-important first weekend or two. And Streisand is a giraffe in a musical. But hot young actresses such as Meg Ryan and Julia Roberts are still considered question marks, while veterans like Jane Fonda, Glenn Close and Jessica Lange are perceived as generating more respect than revenues.

When it comes to age, Hollywood, like the rest of American society, applies a double standard. While men are said to mellow with age, maturing like fine leather, women — even in this environmentally conscious age — are much tougher to recycle.

Marked in the 1930s, Bette Davis is marveled that men "see themselves as permanently appealing and (not) to think it at all strange that they are making love to actresses who could well be their granddaughters."

Actresses in '30s, '40s had a golden age in Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD — The current plight of actresses would have seemed far-fetched in the early days of film when women were valued at least as much as their male colleagues.

In 1910, when production companies responded to public pressure and abandoned their attempt to conceal the identities of their actors, Florence Lawrence was the first to be consciously marketed for her star value.

No longer just "The Biograph Girl," her name was the first ever to appear on a movie poster. Vitaphone retailed by lifting the wraps on one of its own actresses, Florence Turner, featured in a national publication in May of that year. During the silent-screen era, childlike waifs such as Mary Pickford and the Gish sisters drew big at the box office while Norma Talmadge and Gloria Swanson also logged in strong.

During the 1930s and 1940s a new feminine ideal emerged: worldly types such as Bette Davis, Joan Crawford and Barbara Stanwyck with strong appeal to women who, for the most part, selected which movies to see.

Perhaps half of the films turned out by the Hollywood machine were "women's films," major ve-

hicles for major female stars under contract to the studios. They portrayed the poor girl who, by dint of sex and other wiles, rose in society (Joan Crawford in "Possessed"), the career woman who succeeded through wit and style and grace (Irene Dunne in "The Awful Truth"), the Spider Woman luring innocent men to their doom (Stanwyck in "Double Indemnity").

Women continued to suffer on screen throughout the '50s and '60s. Lana Turner in such pictures as "Imitation of Life," Elizabeth Taylor in "Butterfield 8," a role that earned her an Oscar.

More upbeat images were provided by Doris Day movies and variations on the classic romantic comedies that featured Carole Lombard, Jean Arthur and Claudette Colbert. Television in the late '40s, however, changed all that.

"Television, without question, cut off the older audience, and women lost control of the moviegoing dollar," says film critic and historian Richard Schickel. "The person deciding which film to see became a guy under 25 who usually headed for action films. Actresses were relegated to semi-supporting roles or to prestige films which took aim at the Oscar nominations essential to their business."

There are different rates for men and women ... and I think it stinks."

A month ago, she elaborated on the issue in the Miami Herald: "If there are four good roles a year and 60 women are beautifully qualified to play them, they'll go to the first one and try to get her cheap, and if they can't, they'll go on to the next one. We all cut our salary demands. And that's a happy economy for the people who pay us."

Sigourney Weaver, who is reportedly receiving \$4 million plus a percentage of profits for "Alien 3," is well-paid, she must make five pictures to equal the amount her male co-stars make in two. Raising the possibility of a boycott by actresses if the situation isn't remedied, she charged, "It's just sexism. Pure and simple."

Not true, says producer Mark Johnson. "The truth is that it all has to do with the market," he says. "It's

dollars and cents. More people go to see Jack Nicholson in a movie than Meryl Streep in that movie."

Actress Rachel Ward agrees with Johnson. "We don't appeal to the same number of people, so we have to take the whole scale down a bit," she says. "Anyhow, who wants \$11 million? Who needs that much money? It's just ego and a power trip. Women should take the lead and take less to make the pictures we want to make. You can't take risks on a big budget."

Merrick move toward a normal life even as his condition deteriorates. Through their help, Merrick socializes with London's elite, but few of his visitors truly sympathize with him. Ultimately, Merrick remains alone.

The CSI production will feature a motif designed by Mannen and fellow CSI drama writer Messer Laine Steel that Mannen says has never before been used in a production of "The Elephant Man."

Merrick's life in the freak show was a circus, but so was his life in the London Hospital, "except they're not paying admission," Mannen says.

"His entire life is a three-ring circus," Mannen says of Merrick. "So we're presenting it as if it were a three-ring circus," with "the play" central action taking place in the center ring.

Mannen says casting this show

was especially difficult. "I hate casting, especially when I have such talent," he adds. "I literally had all these people in different roles. But I think I made the best choices because these people are gelling into their roles."

Merrick will be played by Scott Smith, a CSI freshman who says the part demands intense mental as well as physical control. When he learned he'd landed the role, Smith says "the first thing that went in my mind was 'Can I really do this?'"

Patrons who have seen the film version of "The Elephant Man" will remember the grotesque makeup worn by John Hurt, the actor who played Merrick.

But as his predecessors in the stage role have done, Smith is contorting his body to indicate Merrick's disfigurement. Slides will be projected to show how Merrick originally appeared.

Assessing his role, Smith echoes Mannen. "Beneath someone's defor-

mities, people need to realize there is something inside all that," Smith says.

Some do realize. Mrs. Kendal is one of the few characters in the play who has genuine concern for Merrick. Teresa Hamby, who plays Kendal, points to a world stage fraught with uncertainty and the threat of war and says she hopes "The Elephant Man" will show audiences that "there are people who care about people."

Others playing key roles in "The Elephant Man" are Joe Requa as Traves; Teo Machacek as hospital administrator Carr Gomm; David Steinkocker as Ross, Merrick's freak show manager; and Kyle L. Hays as Bishop Walsham How, Merrick's spiritual guide.

Also set to appear are Roxanne Bell, Scott Bergman, Kim Bowman, Deborah Buckland, Brenda Cordes, Kelly Gates, Eric Mordhorst, Justin Rowland, Kyle Stein, Camille Whitney and Kassandra Zech.

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
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Money wrap: Examine before shredding

MIAMI (AP) — Warning! Check carefully before throwing out that wrapping paper. The dollar bills on it could be real.

Maus & Hoffman clothing stores in southern Florida has been wrapping holiday gifts in uncut sheets of 32 genuine \$1 bills for eight years. And co-owner William Maus Jr. has grown accustomed to a familiar lament.

He said many a gift recipient complains: "Oh my God, I didn't know it was real. And that's usually after Christmas, which means it's been ripped open or thrown away."

Some people ignore or simply don't believe the store's "WARNING" stickers attached to each package wrapped with the dollar bills.

The store sells the sheets for \$55 — \$23 over face value — and only to customers who make a purchase.

But the sheets are familiar holiday fare at stores throughout the nation, said Leah Akbar, a spokeswoman for the Bureau of Engraving and Printing in Washington. Bureau visitors can buy the sheets in packages of 12, 16 and 24 \$1 bills. They're also available by mail and sell for \$47, \$28 and \$10.25 respectively. Akbar said the

Small Business head chides Parker game

WASHINGTON (AP) — The head of the U.S. Small Business Administration chided Parker Brothers Inc. for showing "insensitivity to modern realities" in a game that lists "supermom" and schoolteacher as "key careers" for girls.

"Parker Brothers is sending the wrong message to young girls," said SBA Administrator Susan Engelciger. "Even Barbie dolls come with business suits these days."

"Careers for Girls" is a new board game targeted for girls ages 8-12. Players select from six "careers": super mom, schoolteacher, rock star, fashion designer, college graduate and animal doctor.

Instructions for the game, packaged in a hot pink box, include "Show us how you glow dance with your main squeeze," "Tell us the names of your eight children," and "Burn all your chocolate chip cookies."

Engelciger said the game shows an "insensitivity to modern realities in a society where women are making breakthroughs in almost every profession. ... I'm amazed that we enter the 1990s, the game doesn't include such careers as business executives, government leaders, astronauts, scientists, or moms without the prefix 'super'."

"There are no leadership or policymaking careers on this Parker Brothers game board. There are no careers requiring physical daring or strength," she added, noting that women now own 30 percent of all businesses in the United States and that the SBA projects they will own 36 percent by the turn of the century.

Company spokesman Patricia McGovern stressed the game is purely for entertainment and "is certainly not to communicate that only certain careers are limited to women."

"Obviously, Jimi Hendrix and Janis Joplin were phenomenal individuals, some of the most influential people of all time in rock 'n' roll," says Janick. "But, looked at literally, they had only one Top 40 hit."

Janick's research included former interviews and conversations with other record collectors but mostly took the form of plowing through old magazines, books and newspapers.

"A lot of checking and double-checking," he says, occasionally uncovered conflicting accounts of a hit song's origins.

McGovern said the careers were changed in 1971 to include ecology, space, sports, teaching and arts. Career changes were made again in 1979.

The game was discontinued in 1984 "because it had unfortunately lost its mass market appeal," said McGovern.

"We decided to reintroduce the game for the 1990s and target it to pre-teen girls because that is a growing niche in the market. Pre-teen girls have returned to playing board games."

Sing along with a few of those one-hit wonders

Ann-Margret did it. So did Wink Martindale. So, for that matter, did Bent Fabric, Gary Numan and a singer-songwriter named Jerry Samuels who recorded marginal-taste tunes about mental derangement under the name Napoleon XIV.

While those performers might not have had much else in common, they all shared one accomplishment: Each placed one, and only one, hit in the Top 40 of the Billboard singles chart.

(For the record, those hit songs were Ann-Margret's "I Just Don't Understand" in 1961, Martindale's "Deck-of-Cards" (1959), Fabric's "Alley Cat" (1962), Numan's "Cars" (1980) and Napoleon XIV's "They're Coming to Take Me Away, Ha-Haaa" (1966).)

Making the Top 40 chart once is, of course, some sign of a good-news/bad-news feat. You don't appear quite as stellar as performers who have conquered the Top 40 more than once. On the other hand, even a lone Top 40 entry is better

than having your chart encounters confined to visits to a Rand McNally store.

In any case, the roster of those who have enjoyed this mixed blessing has now been committed to print in a new publication titled "The Billboard Book of One-Hit Wonders," written by Chicagoan Wayne Janick. The 424-page, soft-cover, \$19.95 book (published by Billboard Books) is a compendium of artists who placed only one 45 r.p.m. single in Billboard's Top 40. Restricted to the rock era, the book covers the years 1955 through 1984 (later years are omitted on the theory that those who scored a single Top 40 hit from 1985 to 1990 might yet notch a second hit). Only those artists who made the Top 40 are discussed in detail. Those who clocked in at No. 21 through No. 40 are consigned to a name-only listing in an appendix, although author Janick has written a second volume devoted to them that might see print if the current book does well.

Included in "One-Hit Wonders" are such memorable artists as Taco, the Indonesian-born resident of Hamburg, Germany, who took a

techno-dance remake of Irving Berlin's "Puttin' on the Ritz" to No. 9 in 1983. Also accounted for are the Ran-Dells, a New Jersey outfit whose "Martian Hop," a novelty number about space aliens who could really shake a leg (or tentacle), hit No. 16 in 1963. Remembered, too, are the Pikipins ("Gimme Dat Ding," 1970), Electric Indian ("Keem-O-Sabe," 1969), Bubble Puppy ("Hot Smoke & Sasafrazz," 1969) and several hundred others.

Many fit the image that a lot of readers will have of "one-hit wonder": an artist who had one brief, shining moment of chart glory, then dropped from public view.

"I'd consider the archetypal one-hit wonder to be Wadsworth Swan-gton (a group that went to No. 7 with "Sweet Mary" in 1971)," says Janick, who has been collecting records since 1956. "They came from absolutely nowhere and they returned there rapidly. I've checked everywhere, and their four names are not to be found. As far as we know, they never did anything again."

But other performers listed in "One-Hit Wonders" — including Jimi Hendrix and Janis Joplin —

were major, album-oriented stars who happened to land only once in the singles-chart Top 40 (Hendrix with "All Along the Watchtower" in 1968, Joplin with the posthumously released "Me and Bobby McGee" in 1971). Janick acknowledges that the inclusion of such performers — as well as artists who had a number of hits on the country and R&B charts — gave him pause, but in the end he decided to strictly abide by the one-pop-hit criterion for inclusion.

"Obviously, Jimi Hendrix and Janis Joplin were phenomenal individuals, some of the most influential people of all time in rock 'n' roll," says Janick. "But, looked at literally, they had only one Top 40 hit."

Janick's research included former interviews and conversations with other record collectors but mostly took the form of plowing through old magazines, books and newspapers.

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
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Untruthful man's secretive past casts shadow on ex-employee

Producers revive Asian detectives

HOLLYWOOD — Two venerable Asian movie detectives — Mr. Moto and Charlie Chan — are being revived, possibly to become lucrative series characters in the profitable mold of James Bond.

Producers Gene Kirkwood and John Hyde are developing "The Adventures of Charlie Chan" for Warner Bros., inspired by the detective created by fiction writer Eric Derr Biggers, the subject of some 20 films, most shot in the '30s and early '40s. A series of Caucasian actors portrayed Chan, who spouted pseudo-Chinese philosophy while solving mysteries with his subservient "No. 1 son."

Kirkwood was asked how he'll deal with issues of ethnic stereotyping and casting that have been raised in recent years regarding the Chan characters.

"One, we have David Mamet, who is a brilliant writer and director," Kirkwood says. "And second, we'll deal with them as Chinese people, not Americans playing Chinese as a joke. It won't be comedy."

Mamet plans to set his film in the '30s, cast a lead actor of Chinese ancestry, and make "a serious film like 'The Godfather' and 'The Untouchables' (which Mamet wrote)," Kirkwood says.

"We feel 'Chan' can be a refreshing film in the '90s. It was never done right before. We're going to do it right."

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Japan offers studios big advantages, but worries persist

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Deals for the \$5.6 billion Japanese buyout of MCA Inc. offer alluring advantages: floods of cash and technology in a perilous world economy filled with giant competitors.

But Matsushita Electric Industrial Co.'s purchase of one of Hollywood's dream factories — said the biggest Japanese purchase ever of a U.S. company — also raises deeply rooted fears.

Matsushita sought to allay those worries in announcing it planned no management or strategic changes at the company that owns Universal Studios, but they inevitably will persist, analysts say.

"The acquisition of a factory that makes, let's say, mufflers is one thing. Acquiring a central player in our cultural domain tends to raise different kinds of concerns," said Michael Radnor, a business professor who heads the international development program at Northwestern University.

Radnor pointed out that the United States is far more tolerant of foreign ownership of cultural resources than France or many other countries. Over the years, Australia's News Corp. has purchased 20th Century Fox; Japan's Sony Corp. bought Columbia; and Italian-controlled Pathe Communications bought MGM-UA.

Networks bemoan Matsushita's buyout of MCA Inc.

NEW YORK (AP) — The big television networks are using the latest foreign buyout of a Hollywood studio to bolster their effort to trash federal rules they say leave them at a disadvantage in the global entertainment market.

CBS, ABC and NBC cited the announcement that Japan's Matsushita Electric Industrial Co. agreed to buy U.S. entertainment giant MCA Inc. in a \$6.6 billion deal as evidence that foreign-owned companies have an advantage in marshaling resources for quality programs.

The deal comes only three weeks before the Federal Communications Commission's Dec. 14 hearing on financial interest and syndication rules.

The 20-year-old "fin-syn" rules prohibit the three major TV networks from having financial inter-

ests in shows they don't own and from getting into the business of selling network programs in the \$3 billion syndication market for reruns on local TV stations, cable networks and foreign markets.

The rules have effectively barred the networks from bidding for production companies that foreign companies have bought four of the seven biggest U.S. studios, including three in the past 14 months.

Laurence A. Tisch, president and chief executive at CBS Inc., said the MCA deal "accelerates the dizzying pace of consolidation in Hollywood."

"This has happened under the financial interest rules that give foreign-owned studios competitive advantages over the three American networks. There is no more eloquent testimony for repeal of these rules than these transactions

and the consolidation they have effected," he said.

Sony Corp. of Japan bought Columbia Pictures Entertainment Inc. in September 1989 and Italy's Pube Communications Corp. recently completed a buyout of MCA-USA Communications — Inc. Rupert Murdoch's News Corp., based in Australia, has owned 20th Century-Fox since 1985.

There was some indication that policymakers in Washington are hearing the networks' complaints. FCC Chairman Alfred Sikes said the MCA deal "will almost certainly affect the debate."

Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., chairman of the House Energy and Commerce Committee which oversees the FCC and telecommunications policy, said his committee will be interested in the results of the FCC examination of the rules.

"Our regulatory system should not protect foreign-owned companies at the expense of American enterprise," he said.

Hollywood studios and producers support the rules because they fear the networks' "backdoors-of-the-airwaves" would have too much power if they could also have a stake in programs.

"The three major national networks say whether a show goes on the air or not," said Jerry Leider, chairman of a caucus of independent writers, producers and directors. "It doesn't make a difference whether MCA is owned by a foreign interest or not."

He said without the rules, the networks would soon dominate the production business by demanding concessions on syndication sales from producers trying to get a show on the network.

have to be careful who controls the organs of mass communications," Radnor said. "If a guy wants to make a very critical movie of Hirohito, does it make it tougher now that two of the biggest companies are not in U.S. hands?" he asked.

Perhaps, But Radnor and other observers said they believe the profit motive will prevail — after all, foreigners are buying American studios precisely because no other country's entertainment is so popular worldwide.

Companies like Sony and Matsushita are unlikely to try to censor U.S. entertainment, said Barbara Pfeiffer, a senior associate at Ulmer Bros. investment bank, which specializes in mergers of American and Japanese companies.

"We all grow up with the movies as our best friend. We've been in front of the TV and that's the baby sitter, and prior to that it was the darkened movie house and news reels. It's such a traditional American pastime that it's understandable that

there are fears," she said. "But when you get down to it, this is a money-making enterprise. And the old saying is: 'If it ain't broke, don't fix it.'" Pfeiffer said.

"Steven Spielberg will still be making Steven Spielberg films. He won't be making Steven Spielberg Goes to Japan."

At a news conference in Japan, Matsushita President Akio Tani was asked if he would object to MCA making a "Japan-bashing" film or one critical of the late Emperor Hirohito's role in World War II.

"Something like that shouldn't emerge," said Tani, looking agitated. "MCA executives will have the proper judgment with regards to the social impact. Filmmakers must create films that are inspirational, that will be enjoyable for everybody. I can't even imagine a case like that."

David Geffen, whose record company was bought for MCA stock that brought more than \$700 million in the Matsushita deal, said those who worry about Japanese influence on Hollywood are showing "latent racism."

Few people worry about Swiss or British ownership of domestic companies, he said. Nor are questions raised about whether, say, Paramount chairman Frank Mancuso would shy away from a movie that might offend Catholics because of his religion.

For ketchum artist Hink, wood is the medium of choice

KETCHUM — Ever see a pair of antique cowboy boots? How about an antique cowboy hat, complete with worn spots and bullet holes?

"There's no such thing as a Western antique, so I make 'em," remarks Ketchum artist Robb Craig Hink.

He makes them well enough for an explosion of interest to keep him busy with one-man art shows and commissioned pieces from across the country.

The unusual twist to Hink's artwork, however, is the medium in which he makes his cowboy paraphernalia come to life — wood.

The idea behind Hink's wood sculpting is to make, precisely, whether it's boots, a hat, table and chairs or a gun and holster, look as if it's 100 years old or older, he says.

Just by looking at the creases and scuffs and the way the boot sits to one side or the other, it's apparent that these boots just might be 100 years old.

Hink tells the boots by themselves, or he might fit them onto the front legs of an old, rickety-looking bar stool.

"People like that comical side," Hink says. "My art tends to be comical, to the point it's almost whimsical."

Hink's seven-foot cactus men are a reflection of his enjoyment of his art. After completing the prickly statuette saguaros, the cactus men

are decked out with hats, guns and holsters. The holsters are even filled with wooden bullets so these sculptures are ready to face the most fearsome desperados in any neighborhood.

Hink's first exposure to wood sculpting came in his high school wood shop where he crafted some furniture which even then had sculptural elements.

Now 34, Hink worked as a carpenter, but did not sculpt anything until five years ago after he'd caught a beautiful Rainbow Trout in a stream.

It was six months later that he cut the wooden trout in half, mounting the tail end on the wall in one room with the head seemingly swimming through the wall to the adjoining room.

His humor netted him his first sell. He found his niche and has been going strong ever since.

From trout to eagles to dancing larger-than-life-sized flamingos to well-worn cowboy boots, wood sculpting has become second nature to Hink. So much so he made the commitment this past January to pursue his sculpting on a full-time basis.

One look at Hink's hands betray his profession. His calloused hands, graying with oils and cemented with sawdust, look much the same as the small shop in which he creates the myriad of pieces which now total near 1,000.

A pungent tang hits your nostrils as you enter the shop. With piles of

discarded boards over there and stacks of half-finished projects here and tools and oil cans lined up there and sawdust everywhere, right away you know this isn't the workshop of Santa's elves. They'd be much neater.

Hink keeps a notebook full of new ideas for future projects, and like many artists, says he has more ideas than time or money to create them all.

One of the more whimsical creations Hink has sold is Thunderfoot, the laid-back Caci-Lizard which graces the entrance to Napa Valley's Silverado Vineyard. In the works is Hink's Idaho-Steelhead-Wangler, an eight-foot fish cowboy complete with lariat trying to chase down a long-horn steelhead rising out of the water.

"I see things and I try to make them different, and I like to laugh at them," Hink says.

Although Hink laughs as he works, his work is serious business and requires specific knowledge and technique.

His work, which he says is a cross between functional fun things and the very comical, is made from bass wood milled from linden trees. Basswood is a soft hard wood with a clear, grain relatively free of knots. It is durable, and holds up to time and wear.

This wood is more expensive because it is kiln dried to give more strength than air-dried woods. This, plus the gluing process used to laminate several pieces together to create

the block of wood from which the piece is carved, create very durable furniture and decorative pieces.

Hink's cowboy hats, which are made to fit, are a little more expensive than those found in a clothing store (they begin at \$250), but they won't get soiled or crushed or lost in a hatbox on some closet shelf.

Gun holsters sell for between \$500 to \$600—boots start at \$300, chairs are about \$500 apiece, a 350-poung cactus can be \$2,000 and wooden chaps are priced depending on size.

Hink's favorite part of the creating process is the color phase when he gets to put the finishing touches to his pieces, adding dimension and vibrancy to a once dull block of wood.

"The part I hate worst is sanding!" Hink says with expression.

In fact, his shop sees so much sawdust that he must sometimes empty two large trash barrels of sawdust a day.

Hink shows his works at galleries in Ketchum; Jackson Hole, Wyo.; Phoenix, and Scottsdale, Ariz.; Santa Fe, N.M.; and Steamboat Springs, Colo.

Defining himself as "an emerging artist" Hink says he is continually looking for new ideas and points out that an artist's work is a growth-up size. Just for adults to Hink's hopes his next project will

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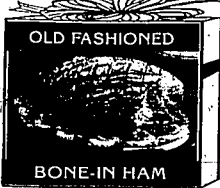
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1-artist showing at Sunspot Gallery

Reagan autobiography lags behind doggie book

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ronald Reagan's autobiography is a best-seller, but it is lagging behind the publisher of the \$24.95 Reagan autobiography, "Millie's Book," the dog's-eye-view of life inside the Bush White House.

"Millie's Book," ghostwritten by Barbara Bush, was No. 3 on last week's New York Times nonfiction best-seller list, five notches ahead of the weightier Reagan book.

The light-hearted canine narrative held down the No. 5 spot on the Washington Post's best-seller list, while the former president's 748-page memoir came in at No. 7.

"Millie's Book" was brought out in September by William Morrow & Co. and has been perched on the best-seller charts for nine weeks.

"An American Life" by Reagan was published just three weeks ago.

"It's a bit of an unfair comparison," Jack McKeown, publisher of Simon & Schuster's trade division, said. "We certainly don't divide

any success to 'Millie's Book,' but they are appealing to quite different audiences." Simon & Schuster is the publisher of the \$24.95 Reagan autobiography.

"Millie's Book" lionizes the president's English springer spaniel, wrapping a droll narrative of White House life and lore around scores of full-color pictures of Millie in the Oval Office, Millie in the Lincoln Bedroom and Millie mingling with celebrities.

All the royalties from the \$17.95 book are going to Barbara Bush's literacy foundation. Mrs. Bush penned a similar book about another pet dog, C. Fred Bush, to raise money for charity when her husband was vice president.

Sales of the Reagan book are accelerating at the major book chains and "all the vital signs" point to big sales of "An American Life" as a Christmas gift book, said McKeown.

Aspiring actors turn out for class with soap stardom in their eyes

PHILADELPHIA — "You were my husband, my lover. You were the first man I ever let inside my heart. Remember those days?" This about the time she thinks about the first time we made love. I think about the day Alli was born. I had everything with you. You were my best friend.

Amanda, weepingly says these improbable lines to Sam, even though she has walked out on him for that piece of pond scum, Evan. Actually, Amanda said this to Sam on "Another World" a couple of weeks ago (episode 6710, to be precise).

But on a recent Monday night, many an Amanda, from mother-of-two Alyson Hannigan to 16-year-old student Beth Milligan, emoted these lines in a class taught by none other than the actor who portrays that

sweetheart Sam, Daniel Markel.

This was the first installment of "Six" Nights of Soap Stars: Soap Opera Acting Technique" held at the Actors Center in Philadelphia. The class, limited to 12, sold out in two days, despite the \$400 price of admission. While the evening lacked the old Hammond swelling in the background, many a moment might have brought heartfelt tears to a stalwart sudsster's ducts, had the lighting been kinder and the set a tad more convincing. (Two hardback chairs on a naked stage didn't cut it.)

"I loved you more than anything in this world. And you walked all over me."

"I trusted him with everything and I had nothing to show for it."

"I had everything in this world and I threw it away for him."

Yes, think lines like this are easy to say? Hah! (No, try the "Hah!" again, this

time expressing it with equal parts pride and contempt.)

"You know what I like about you?" Markel told the class. "You didn't laugh at any of these lines. Sometimes I look at the script and think, this is so ridiculous, I'm not going to say this."

Amanda: "Do you know what I was like when I was alone in this apartment with Evan?"

Paulina: "Amanda..."

Amanda: "I was a self-centered, cold little liar."

No, these lines are not easy to say. These lines are not even easy to type.

For the next four Monday nights, the class of 10 women, two men — let's face it, women still dominate the soap-viewing audience — will be taught the fine art of weeping, sobbing, twitching, dramatic gesturing, righteous indignation, the fury-of-a-woman-scorned, and other

states of emotional unrest by Patrick Yvans (Cal Strickland), "As the World Turns," or "ATWT" as they say in the soap biz, Heather Rattray (Lily, "ATWT"), Jean Carol (Nadine Cooper, "Guiding Light"), Ed Fry (Larry McDermott, "ATWT"), Joh Agra (Lucas no last-name, "Another World"), and Anthony Scipio (Nelson, "ATWT"). Scott Holmes (Tom Hughes, "ATWT"), and James Horn (Clay Alden, "Loving").

That is more than six nights worth, but — can you stand it! — Rodney Robb and Anthony Scipio, who opened the Actors Center in July, are going to offer another night soap course, and another one after that. Bravo!

A kindesthearted graduate of New York University's drama program, Markel — who appears to be a prime model — has been a primary teacher for an eternity. That is to say four months.

"There's no quality control in acting," he told the class. "When it comes down to having the right look and the right attitude for getting work."

Remember the camera. There are usually three used in the soaps. "Consider whether you are putting a shadow on the other actor's face," Markel said.

Try to say your lines with simplicity and honesty. "Don't try to do too much. If the camera's right on your face, you need to keep things very simple."

Exploit your assets. "If you have great hair, show it!" Markel said after viewing student Morgan Zeller's gut-wrenching video performance as Amanda. Zeller has great hair.

Downplay, if possible, climate your weaknesses. "Try not to wear your glasses to auditions," he said this after watching Kathy

McKenna, who played Paulina. McKenna took off her glasses for her stellar portrayal.

"I would die for a part in a soap opera," McKenna said afterward. (She hit that "die" beautifully. Neither Streep nor Bernhardt could have enthused better.) "I'd like to play an upscale lady, the matriarch of the family," said McKenna, the former director of a nonprofit organization, who looked every bit the part. "But then, I would audition for a part in Popular Mechanics."

Chris Shakarjian, a former broadcasting production assistant and now an office temp, is taking the course "so that, hopefully, I can pick up a lot of useful information that might get me a part on a soap opera. Any soap will do." Like most of her classmates, Shakarjian would be most pleased with the role of a villainess.

If you want to wax heavy, they're a kind of living trophy of popular taste in America. Why?

Ah, but what to buy?

"Are You Okay?" — Was (Not Was) (Chrysalis). The Detroit-bred funk rockers are less weird but no less enjoyable and still walking like dinosaurs on these groove-laden recordings.

"Blue Sky Mining" — Midnight Oil (Columbia). This Australian quintet's latest is bold, brash, bleak, poetic and wholly engaging in a manner few albums achieve.

"Ragged Glory" — Neil Young & Crazy Horse (Warner Bros.): Young seldom disappoints when he's with Crazy Horse, and this spily uptight release lives up to the legacy of "Rust Never Sleeps" and "Tonight's the Night."

"Good-bye Jumbo" — World Party (Chrysalis): Karl Wallinger's long-incoming second effort blends influences from the Beatles, Rolling Stones, Beach Boys and Bob Dylan into something that sounds both classic and contemporary.

"Where the Pyramid Meets the Eye: A Tribute to Roky Erickson" — Various Artists (Sire): Roky who? A fair question, as Texas rocker Erickson is a name you might not know, but following includes scores of terminally hip musicians. For this package, 19 of them — including ZZ Top, R.E.M. and the Jesus and Mary Chain — sign in with loving renditions that may bring Erickson a well-deserved body of new fans.

"Heroes and Friends" — Randy Travis (Warner Bros.): The son of a country music diarch, Travis grew up with a jukebox in the house.

The 12 discs here bring that Wuritzer and some child prodigy fantasies — to life. Collaborations range from the interesting (B.B. King, Clint Eastwood) to the inspired (Merle Haggard, Tammy Wynette) to the irresistible (George Jones, Roy Rogers). "Livin' it Up" — George Strait (MCA): Strait would probably sound soulful hailing a cab. The

"From the Secret Laboratory" — Lee Scratch Perry (Manago): A key innovator of the dub style, and the ranking mad genius of reggae puts on a special effects extravaganza with raspy lyrics just this side of speaking in tongues.

'Rocky V': This 1 is a contender

HOLLYWOOD — Rock 'n' roll may never die. What about Rocky? In "Rocky V," the fifth and presumably last episode of Sylvester Stallone's Rocky Balboa saga, the writer-star once again convinces a way to make his hulking, sand-eyed gladiator the underdog. And we get whiffs of funkiness and humanity stirring around for the first time since the original "Rocky."

Review

Supposedly this is the ultimate round, the "Final Bell," the last myth of Sylvester. And Stallone — who, like legendary Sisyphus, has gone to preposterous lengths — endlessly rolling his Rock up the mountain only to let him crash down and rise again — here makes the ultimate sacrifice. He strips Rocky of the title and hits him back on the Philadelphia streets.

Not an easy task. In 1985's "Rocky IV," Balboa seemed to have scaled heights so high no one could topple him. Not just a boxer, he was America's gladiator against the entire Soviet Empire, single-handedly pulverizing the Iron Curtain until the Politburo, headed by Gorbachev, rose up to chant "Rock-eee! Rock-eee!"

Here, Stallone takes Rocky back to his roots, stripping his hero of title, money, home and gloves, leaving him bare-knuckled and brain-damaged after a business maneuver by his bumbling goombah of a brother-in-law Paulie (Burt Young) goes sour and his accountant robs them all blind.

Within 15 minutes of the credits, Champ Balboa has scrounged, out of the attic, his old jacket and porkpie hat, the ones he wore while buoyantly bobbing down the streets in the original Oscar-winning 1976 "Rocky." Also salvaged are manager Mickey Goldman (Burgess Meredith) briefly back from the dead, and John Avildsen, "Rocky's" original director, solidly behind the camera once again.

Arrayed against him are the media — a pack of yapping, snarling dogs and the nefarious, George Washington Duke (Richard Gant), a nattily attired but unscrupulous black promoter, probably modeled on Don King, who keeps trying to tease him back into the ring, yelling "I'll sue!" when violence seems imminent. Against Rocky also are his own rebellious boy, Rocky Jr. (well-played

by 14-year-old Sage Stallone) and Okie acolyte and eventual turncoat Tommy Gunn — played by pro boxer Tommy Morrison, great-grand-nephew of Stallone's idol Marion Morrison, better known as John Wayne.

Of course, most of this is absurd. Champs aren't forgotten so thoroughly, especially champs partially responsible for glamor. What about his old fans? Endorsements? Vegas casinos? And what about the rapid rise of protege Tommy, compared to the glacial pace of Balboa's family life? Tommy fights 10 fights in the time it takes Rocky Jr. to dispatch two schoolyard bullies — who instantly become his best buddies.

But carping about illogic, howling unreality or massive plot inconsistencies in the Rocky series, is, by now, meaningless. It's like walking up to a lake and complaining that it is wet. This movie actually does have something all but the first of its predecessors lacked: charm. Stallone, perhaps stung by the mauling he's taken from critics and tabloids over

the last five years — the ravenous newsman may be his metaphor — has tried to resurrect Rocky as he was in the beginning: a lovable, shambling, big-hearted goof. It's a silly thing to do, but endearingly silly — rather than ferociously silly, like "Rocky II-V."

The Rocky of 1976 was part tender-hearted Brandoque idealist. But, somehow, over the years, he seemed to have fused, in Stallone's mind with his own persona and experiences, his own rise to fame and wealth.

Then, in the mid '80s, the character began to fuse with Stallone's other alter-ego, laconic, stoic killing machine John Rambo.

The whole appeal of the original Rocky — a boxer of ebullient humanity but limited skills who hung on with sheer heart when he was severely outclassed — was all but dropped. Only the shtick of improbable, last-minute success remained.

Daydream followed daydream, finally getting swollen and bloated. But the '80s are over and so are the

myths of omnipotence and money that dominated them.

What is most interesting about "Rocky V," in fact, is the way the dreams have adjusted. The '80s were that is the style of the middle three "Rockys." They are impatient, terse, super-glossy, effective — but empty. This one, despite its frequent absurdities, tries to drum up human connections again: Stallone seems to have written more dialogue here than in the last three "Rockys" combined and the cast — especially Young and Talia Shire — deliver it exuberantly.

But, more importantly, "Rocky V" signals what may be a shift in American self-perception. No longer bellicose or swaggering, the movie suggests a mood of all-around woe: the crash-and-bum of the go-go stock market, the HUD scandal and the even more mammoth savings-and-loan fiasco, may have shaken that invincibly cocky self-esteem of the mid-'80s: the era of Moltch and moob, myths and marketing hooks.

"Rocky V's" revisionism — its suggestion that money is not essential to dreams of glory — is shallow but maybe more insidious than it first appears, especially coming from a would-be vox pop movie maker like Stallone. There are lots of flawed or disble things in "Rocky V" (rated PG-13 despite language and violence) but, even though I've disliked all the Stallone series movies since 1976's "Rocky" and "First Blood," I had fun watching this one. Dumb fun, perhaps, but excesses and all, the movie made me smile. Maybe it's time to start rolling the Rock back down the hill again.

'Home Alone' packed 'em in over weekend

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Home Alone," a comedy about a kid left to fend off burglars, played to packed houses over the five-day Thanksgiving weekend, taking in a whopping \$28.7 million for the No. 1 spot at the box office.

In second place and off to a faster start than its predecessor is "Three Men and a Little Lady." The first sequel from the Walt Disney Co. took in \$19.1 million in its premiere engagement, Exhibitor Relations Co. said.

In 1987, "Three Men and a Little Lady" also starring Ted Danson, Tom Selleck and Steve Guttenberg — took in \$13.9 million its first weekend. It went on to make \$167.8 million.

"Home Alone," produced and written by John Hughes, stars Macaulay Culkin as an 8-year-old accidentally left behind at Christmas when his family leaves for a Paris vacation. The boy uses his wits to fight off burglars.

In two weeks, the movie has made \$987 million, four weeks. "Everyone seems to be coming and we're getting a lot of repeat business," said Tom Sherak, head of marketing and distribution for 20th Century Fox.

'Dances with Wolves' irresistible

Capsule reviews

DANCES WITH WOLVES (PG-13) In his first directing work, Kevin Costner has made a clear-eyed authentic vision of the frontier Northwest that is irresistible. The story of a Union officer who becomes associated with a tribe of Sioux, it has all the elements of epic: vastness, astonishing "action" sequences, exotic-seeming characters but because it's more concerned with character than spectacle, its epic quality becomes engaging, never self-congratulatory. Beautiful, memorable and full of humor, it's one of the most-winning films of the year.

HOME ALONE (PG) A 7-year-old child (Macaulay Culkin) is left behind by his parents when they jet to Paris for Christmas. Left to his own devices, he pigs out on junk

food and foils a pair of bumbling thieves (Joe Pesci and Daniel Stern). Some of the low-comic slapstick works on a fitful, Three Stooges level, but the basic idea — an abandoned child defending himself against intruders — is a bit too steamy for comfort. Chris Columbus directed from a script by — who else? — John Hughes.

MEMPHIS BELLE (PG-13) The opening is pure old-fashioned movie stuff, but once this saga of one of the gallant B-17s who flew daylight missions over Nazi-occupied Germany gets into the air, it's unstoppable — a low-key portrait of true American grit under almost unbelievable conditions.

Even when a few of its special effects are not-great, the film's over-

whelming feeling of reality holds one, while Matthew Modine, Sean Astin, Eric Stoltz and Harry Connick Jr. stand out among this 10-man crew.

PREDATOR 2 (R) More a hyped-up, ultra-violent reworking of the original "Predator" than a sequel; we're back in a jungle — this time the urban jungle of 1997 Los Angeles, where veteran cop Danny Glover clashes with federal agent Gary Busey on how to tackle another of those out-sized aliens with their incredible weaponry. Longer on hard action razzle-dazzle than imagination.

With Maria Conchita Alonso, Ruben Blades and Kevin Peter Hall as The Predator.

Endangered species

Record-maker still stamping out vinyl discs

VILLE PLATTE, La. (AP) — One of the nation's last independent record-makers — and one of the last people making any records at all — is stamping vinyl in Ville Platte.

"It's hard to pinpoint how long of a market we have. I keep joking that I want to be in the Guinness World Records for the last vinyl disc," said Floyd Soileau, whose dying business reflects the growing popularity of tape cassettes and compact discs.

Soileau, whose name is pronounced "swallow," began selling records in between stints as a part-time disc jockey at a little radio station in Ville Platte. Over the decades, he wound up making about half of all records of Cajun, zydeco and other Louisiana music.

He now presses records for a few foreign clients, between stints as a part-time disc jockey at a little radio station in Louisiana and around the United States, and his own four labels: Swallow, JIN (named after his wife, Jinver), Maison de Soul and Kom-A-Day, for comedians including Justin Wilson. He publishes sheet music and cassettes and sells everything through his wholesale business, a music store in Ville Platte and retail catalogs distributed nationwide.

Flat Town Music Co.'s four boxy presses continue to suck in vinyl, pellets, melt them and stamp them into singles and LPs.

"Our plant was never into the 50-, 100,000 runs. We were always doing 1,000 and 2,000 and 5,000 runs. Now we're down to 300 and 500 and 1,000 runs. But we're still doing vinyl," Soileau said.

The seeds of his businesses and \$400,000 payroll were sown by his family.

"My father and his father before him and his father before him and my brother, all played the fiddle," he said. "I never played an instrument — all I could do was turn the radio knob and play music."

When he was a high-school junior he worked as a deejay at KVPI radio, then a 250-watt AM station.

"It furthered my interest and knowledge of various forms of music," he said. When he graduated from high school in 1956, he was offered full-time work. "I had had enough schooling for a while, I thought, and I had a job at a radio station — what more could I ask for?"

Came the winter, though, his

hours were cut back. His boss, Chris Duplechain, suggested that Soileau open a record store down the hall from the studio.

One Saturday in the following summer, he had just begun the noon news when some record customers appeared. He finished his 15-minute taped program, called a transcription and went to the store.

"I sold a bunch of records to these people," said Soileau. "After the last customer left, my boss appeared in the doorway. He was a short person, but he looked awfully tall and big as he said, 'Son, you're going to have to make up your mind. Either sell music or play music.'"

"I said, 'What was wrong?'"

"He said, 'You put on a Christmas transcription in the middle of July. That's what was wrong.' That was the turning point where I be-

came a full-time record retailer and a part-time announcer," said Soileau. A few months later, he dropped out of KVPI.

About 1957, a bar owner he knew brought him a tape. "He handed over the tape with several large money bills and told me, 'If you can get some records made, like you told me you know where, we're going into the record business.'"

The first record featured Austin Petric and Milton Molitor, now dead but big names in their time.

"Word got out that some crazy fool in Ville Platte was making Cajun records again. Other greats came around," Soileau said. Aldus Roger, the late Lawrence Walker, Adam Hebert, Belton Richard, D.L. Menard, Nathan Abshire, the Balfin Brothers, all were on his singles.

Swallow began running its own record presses in 1975 and now has

about 80,000 titles, with another 20,000 on Flat Town's other three labels.

At the peak of his business, Soileau estimates that he put out 700,000 long-playing records and close to 1 million singles a year. He had about 35 full-time workers and a payroll of \$500,000. He's scaled back to 21 full-time and six part-time workers.

About 20 companies have stopped making records over the past five years, leaving about 20 still in the business, he estimated. And Flat Town is changing with the times.

"We've already started converting our catalog into CD," he said. "We have, I think, 11 releases out now and we have plans to probably double that, at least, next year."

Every Flat Town album on CD also is put on vinyl. Moreover, musicians who can't afford to produce records on CD will still be making records, and those who don't have CD players as well as jukebox companies still want singles.

"When you have a catalog of over 200 items and they all sell pretty well every year, it's nice especially when you can do all that in your own small town where you're from," Soileau said.

American Ballet Theatre could disband if no labor agreement can be reached

The American Ballet Theatre's board voted unanimously to authorize the executive committee to disband the company if no satisfactory labor agreement is reached with dancers before rehearsals begin next week, board Chairman Charles Dyson confirmed.

Dyson said the company, which has long been the nation's prime stronghold and showcase for classical ballet, is \$4 million in debt. But Dyson said the ABT's money problems were not the only reason for the decision. "It's partly money. That's the only thing I want to talk about," he said.

Asked whether he expects the company to survive, Dyson said, "I don't know whether it can or not."

Leonard Leibowitz, an attorney representing the dancers, said he takes the board's threat to disband "very seriously."

Leibowitz said the dancers were offered a three-year package that freezes wages in the first year. It would also cut per diems and terminate a banking concession giving the dancers single rooms when they travel. "That's more than a money issue. That's a quality of life issue for a company that lives on the road," Leibowitz said.

He declined to say what the dancers' counteroffer had been. "It's really not appropriate to go through specifics," he said. Asked whether the dancers would accept a wage freeze, he said, "It depends on the package. I'm not saying that anything is impossible."

Leibowitz blamed the board for the ABT's financial dilemma. "The real issue is not whether there is money in the bank," he said. "The issue is what kind of commitment is the board prepared to make to raise money as they ought to have been raising money all this time. They have not gone out and done a fund-raising job." The board has treated the company "like a mom-and-pop store."

Dyson said the board is "seeking a fair contract." He contended that the dancers did not respond to a contract offer made several months ago. "I don't know what they have in mind," he said.

The dancers' contract expired Oct. 31 and they are due to begin rehearsals Tuesday.

Leibowitz said the company has countered the board's offer but discussions broke off three weeks ago.

The two sides were scheduled to meet Thursday to discuss the board's action, he said.

Jane Hermann, director of the company, acknowledged that the board's action was "extraordinarily drastic," but said "it may not be as important as it may sound The board was trying to empower the executive committee to make a decision." She noted that the board also authorized the executive committee to ratify a contract.

"We very much intend to settle," she said. She said she could not identify any single issue as a sticking point in the negotiations. She said in authorizing the action by the executive committee, the board was attempting to "streamline" the process and that the full board does not plan to meet on this issue again. "We're in a limbo state," she said. "We had to determine where the power lies."

Asked whether she thought the company would disband, she said, "Oh, no, I would hope not."

Another source close to the board said that the action had been anticipated for some time because of the failure of fund-raising efforts. "The fund-raising just didn't meet any of the goals of last year. It's a choice of restricting the company in its artistic achievements or cutting back costs. No one wants to restrict the artistic achievements," the source said.

Hermann said that fund-raising last year was "in excess of what had been expected." She said the board raised about \$7 million last year, nearly \$1 million more than its goal. Still, she said, that was not enough to deal with the accumulated debt.

Dyson said money is coming into the strapped company "in dribs and drabs."

"If you know some white knight who has \$4 million or \$5 million, have him call me," he said.

ABT is currently a company of some 90 dancers, with an annual budget of around \$18 million. It has experienced periodic sieges of economic distress since the start, sometimes bringing the company to the brink of collapse.

A company lockout of the dancers in 1982, for instance, led to the cancellation of a month-long engagement at the Kennedy Center Opera House that year, before the dispute was resolved.

ABT was scheduled to begin its 1990-91 national tour with a two-week engagement at Washington's Kennedy Center Opera House Jan. 15-27.

James Garner out of semi-retirement, accepts challenge of 'Decoration Day'

By Frank Loveco

Sometimes it all comes together. Take, for instance, the "Hallmark Hall of Fame" production "Decoration Day" (airing Sunday, Dec. 2, on NBC).

This is a quiet, strong-willed, character-driven study of a retired Southern judge (James Garner) who must confront the spectators that lead his childhood friend (Bill Cobbs), an elderly black farmer, to refuse to accept the Congressional Medal of Honor. It isn't exactly "America's Funniest Home Videos." Yet this TV movie went from conception to production in a relatively quick year-and-a-half — and even coaxed the much-admired yet badly arthritic, 62-year-old Garner out of a health-imposed semiretirement.

He'd said in some interviews he didn't want to do much work anymore," relates Ann Hopkins, the producer of "Decoration Day."

"But we knew he was perfect for it, so we sent it to his agent, who loved it and recommended that Jim read it. And when Garner did, he called him back and said, 'Damn it, you're right, this is my character. I have to do this.'"

Garner stars with two-time Tony winner, Judith Ivey, who plays his romantic interest, Cobbs and Ruby Dec.

"Decoration Day" had originated as a novella by the late Louisiana author John William Corrington. It was brought to the attention of executive producer Marian Rees by a music-editor friend of hers, who'd read it and loved it. Rees — whose TV movie "Love Is Never Silent"

won the 1985 Emmy for Outstanding Drama/Comedy Special — also loved it and bought the rights to it from the Corrington estate's literary agency.

Rees took the story to Hallmark, where, says Hopkins, "they recognized immediately the story was right for their profile." Rees and Hallmark together took the story to NBC, which had aired "Love Is Never Silent," and the deal was done. Robert Lenski ("The Dain Curse," "Chiefs") was hired to write the script, which in turn enticed the actors and the director. Amazing: no rewrites ordered by temperamental actors, no re-shooting ordered by network marketing people, and no being "put into turnaround" by revolving studio/network regimens.

And, says co-star Ivey, no egoistic, martinet director, either. She

praises veteran TV-movie helmsman Robert Markowitz as working well with both actors and technology.

"My biggest emotional scene," she recalls, "was done in the rain, which was simulated and sounded like a typhoon. It was a very emotional scene and not one where someone would shout. I was very concerned about it, and starting to get distracted because I thought I'd probably have to loop it (re-dub portions of the dialogue). But he said, 'Don't worry about it — play what's real in the moment.'"

They had actor Roscoe Orman playing Tyrone, a pimp, and the writers had saddled him with all the cliches, complete with a singularly bad attitude and an caring. Now Roscoe was also playing kind and lovable Gordon on 'Sesame Street' at the same time so his bosses there asked him to choose. Roscoe chose 'Sesame Street.' At that time I was appearing in a revival of Tennessee Williams' 'Sweet Bird of Youth,' and each night I got to drag off Christopher Walken and have him castrated. One of the producers saw me in the play and it wasn't too long before I was brought in to play Billy Clyde, the new pimp in Pine Valley."

Although Billy Clyde is definitely considered an arch villain who may even be a bit crazy in the head, Cowles doesn't agree.

"I don't think Billy Clyde is crazy. He never moves away from his own rationality. I know he has an enormous ego, but he's not your typical hillbilly. No, he's street smart and very wily. He's a ladies' man who has had nothing but bad luck with women. When he is faced with almost insurmountable challenges, that's when he rises to the occa-

ABC posts first win of the fall season as Monday football scores a touchdown

LOS ANGELES (AP) — ABC won the network ratings race Tuesday for the first time in the 10-week-old fall season with a big boost from Monday night football and a Stephen King horror story.

"Stephen King's 'It' Part 2" finished second in A.C. Nielsen Co. rankings, followed by ABC's NFL Monday night showdown between the Los Angeles Raiders and the Miami Dolphins.

The most watched show on television was CBS' weekly news magazine "60 Minutes," featuring an interview with "Born on the Fourth of July" and "Platoon" film director Oliver Stone.

ABC finished first in overall network ratings with a 13.4 average. NBC was second with 11.8 and CBS third with 11.3. Last week's figures marked the widest margin between first and second place since all four World Series games were broadcast in prime time last month.

Each ratings point represents 931,000 households.

In another first, NBC's "The Cosby Show" earned the lowest ratings of its 7-year history with a Thanksgiving night repeat that plummeted the longstanding hit

NBC launches Pauley news series

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC said Monday it is putting Jane Pauley into the Sunday night ratings wars opposite ABC's top-rated "America's Funniest Home Videos" and CBS' durable "Murder, She Wrote."

The battles will start Jan. 6 at 8 p.m. EST when her "Real-Life With Jane Pauley" starts, followed by another NBC News series, "Expose," an investigative program anchored by Tom Brokaw.

Each will be a half-hour series for three Sundays a month, with Pauley's show getting a full hour on the fourth Sunday and Brokaw's "Expose" getting that night off, NBC said.

The two programs, which are the first NBC News series since the

division's low-rated "1986" newsmagazine, will take over the time slot currently occupied by the medical series "Lifestones," which will appear monthly after Sunday's broadcast.

NBC also said it is bringing back its "Amen" comedy series, which had been axed from its fall lineup after four seasons, as a midseason replacement beginning Saturday.

"The Fanelli Boys," a new situation comedy now on Wednesdays, will move to Saturdays starting this week. "Working It Out," another new sitcom, will move from Saturday to Wednesday.

Pauley's series began last summer as five one-hour specials. The shows — and a new NBC contract

— came after her controversial replacement as "Today" anchorwoman by Deborah Norville.

In becoming Sunday night regulars, Pauley and Brokaw will be part of NBC's midseason bid to overcome the low ratings the network has suffered during the first two hours of that evening.

Last month, NBC axed its new "Hull High" series, which had led off the network's Sunday night schedule against CBS' powerhouse "60 Minutes" and ABC's "Life Goes On."

NBC has since has filled the "Hull" time period with specials and movies, a spokesman said.

A permanent replacement for "Hull High" will be announced later.

Daniels comes to daytime

NEW YORK (AP) — A midday news show starring "Today" newscaster Faith Daniels will replace "Generations" at NBC, and CBS is putting in a new comedy, "You Take the Kids," the networks said.

NBC, trying to bolster its third-place daytime lineup, said seven other possible news-information series are in development, including "Women's Diaries," with former NBC News star Linda Ellerbee.

Daniels, who will remain on "Today," will be host of "A Closer Look," a half-hour NBC News series that examines social issues. It will premiere on Jan. 28, succeeding "Generations," which began in March 1989.

"Generations," which focused on two families, one black, the other white, was third in its time period. NBC said it will explore ways of keeping the NBC-made series in production for sale in syndication.

The series had improved but

"the ratings were not there," Brandon Tartikoff, chairman of the NBC Entertainment Group, told NBC affiliates by closed-circuit television.

CBS last week said it was NBC "The Hogan Family," an NBC cast-off that it had picked up and put on its Saturday night schedule this season.

Its new sitcom, "You Take the Kids," is part of its shuffle of four TV family comedies to or from its Saturday schedule.

CBS said Wednesday it was taking its new "The Family Man" off the air after Dec. 1, but would bring it back next spring.

CBS said it will return its new "Lenny," which began as a Wednesday series, as a Saturday series, starting Dec. 15, when "You Take the Kids" premieres.

The latter, which will begin CBS' new Saturday schedule, stars Neil Carter of "Gimme a Break" and Roger E. Moseley of "Magnum P.I.," as parents of a blue-collar family in Pittsburgh.

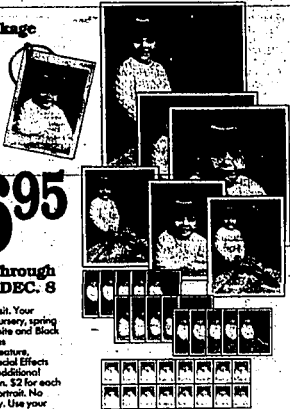

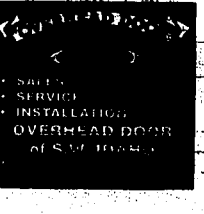
