U.S. welcomes hostage release

SANTIAGO, Chile — President Bush on Thursday welcomed Iraq's surprise promise to free all foreign hostages but said the United States must not relax its war footing in the Persian Gulf.

"We've got to continue to keep the pressure on," he said.

In Washington, Secretary of State James A. Baker III said Iraq had told the United States that all 900 Americans held in Iraq and Kuwait would be released. And Iraqi Ambassador Mohamed Al-Mashat said he hoped all hostages would be out by Christmas.

The State Department said the Voice of America was broadcasting a message Thursday night saying, "We are making preparations to evacuate all U.S. citizens as soon as they are permitted to leave."

Bush, citing the promised release of the hostages and the easing of Iraq's pressure on the American Embassy in Kuwait, said, "It seems to be a little movement here, a little movement there."

Yet, he said, Saddam Hussein still "must

leave Kuwait without reservation, without condition."

Bush spoke at a news conference at the next-to-last stop of his five-nation South American tour while Baker, 5,000 miles away, testified before Congress to win support for a possible military strike against Iraq's forces.

Baker said of Saddam's announcement, "It seems to me no coincidence that this comes just one week, just one week, after the international community has authorized the use of force."

The Iraqi ambassador, on the other hand, said the release would be risky for his country because "the drums of war" were

still beating in the United States.

"Asked when the release would come, he said, 'I expect it's going to be within days. Of course I cannot now tell how long it will take to provide all the necessary things for departure but I hope that they will be all of them out for Christmas.'"

Officials in Baghdad said the hostages could begin leaving on Saturday.

White House press secretary Martin Fitzwater said, "We will do everything that is humanly possible to see that they get out as quickly as possible."

The dramatic move — if carried out — could well strengthen demands in Congress

Former prisoner recalls attack on Wake Island

TWIN FALLS — Today is Pearl Harbor Day, but Americans in Hawaii were the only ones being bombed and strafed by Japanese planes on this date 49 years ago.

Just ask Cecil Bowyer of Twin Falls; he was on Wake Island when it was overrun by the Japanese.

"It didn't last too long that first day, 15 to 30 minutes they strafed and bombed us," he recalls. Bowyer, 73, but the attack lasted 16 days and the Japanese finally took the island, Bowyer and about 1,500 other American prisoners.

Wake, a dot of rock and coral in the mid-Pacific about 2,300 miles west of Hawaii, was first claimed by the United States in 1898 as a coaling station for trans-Pacific routes. The Japanese presence gradually grew on the island until 1941,

when Bowyer and his colleagues were in the process of building air and submarine bases when the Japanese struck.

Bowyer was a civilian carpenter working for Boise-based contractor Morrison-Knudsen. The island was attacked the same day as Pearl Harbor, although because Wake Island is on the far side of the international date line — the date was Dec. 8.

When he heard the planes coming, Bowyer was in his barracks. He joined the others in running for cover, but to no avail.

"You don't stand still when they start shooting," Bowyer said. The Japanese eventually came ashore and rounded up the Americans — all civilians except for a few Marines — on the runway of the unfinished air base.

After spending three or four days on the runway without food and drinking water from an old fuel drum, the captives were

Former teacher at Kimberly faces 2 sex offense charges

KIMBERLY — A high school teacher who resigned last week faces charges that he had sex with a 15-year-old female student.

Court papers filed by prosecutors Thursday charge Kimberly resident Michael S. McInerney, 31, with one count of rape and another count of lewd conduct with a minor under the age of 16.

He is the second Kimberly teacher in three weeks to be charged with sex offenses.

McInerney was arrested by Kimberly police on Nov. 29 after going to the police station for questioning. Peace Chief Jim Campbell said. He was booked into the Twin Falls County Jail and immediately was released on his own recognizance, Campbell said.

He remains free and has agreed to keep in touch with police officers and to respond to a summons when an arraigning date is

set, according to court papers. Both charges are felonies.

McInerney resigned the same day he was arrested, citing only "personal reasons," Kimberly school Superintendent Richard Bauscher said. He was working his second year in the district as an industrial arts teacher.

Although he would not say whether the alleged victim was one of McInerney's own students, Campbell said the girl attends Kimberly High School. The incident allegedly occurred about the first of June, according to court papers.

The girl told Kimberly police Sgt. Craig Carroll Nov. 29 that McInerney "gave her two glasses of wine" — then showed her a pornographic magazine which they read together. She advised the wine "made her dizzy" and she felt that she was not in control of what was taking place. According to an affidavit signed by Carroll.

The girl said McInerney then fondled her breasts and "completed the act of inter-

Rites will mark Hawaii attack

HONOLULU — The 49th anniversary of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor will be marked today with a memorial service.

The service at the USS Arizona Memorial Visitor Center will honor the 2,403 people killed in the Dec. 7, 1941, attack that drew the United States into World War II.

Ted Mason, a Pearl Harbor survivor and author of the book "Battle Ship Sailor," will be the keynote speaker.

A special prayer will be offered by a representative of the World Federation of Japan-Religious Committee.

The ceremony also will include a flyover by F-15 jets from the Hawaii Air National Guard, a 21-gun salute by U.S. Marines and taps played by the Fleet Marine Force Band.

FCC will try to squeeze technology into airwaves

WASHINGTON — The head of the Federal Communications Commission announced on Thursday an endeavor to squeeze future technologies such as high-definition TV, personal phones and digital radio into the nation's crowded airwaves.

FCC Chairman Alfred Sikes, noting that Congress and his agency are making decisions today that will affect American lifestyles and economic competitiveness well into the 21st century, said the FCC will initiate a search next year for frequencies to satisfy the voracious appetites of new radio-based technologies.

"My ultimate goal will be to create a new spectrum reserve for emerging technologies," Sikes said in what was good news for a host of would-be broadcasters and telecommunications

Senate fuss court ruling seems sure

BOISE — After last-ditch efforts at a compromise settlement failed Thursday, Republicans used the disputed vote of GOP Lt. Gov. Butch Otter to gain operating control of the evenly-divided state Senate.

That virtually assured a Democratic court test over the constitutionality of the move.

In a series of tie votes broken by Otter during the past two days of fractured debate, Republican Leader Michael Crump of Idaho Falls was re-elected president pro tem of the chamber that includes 21 members of each party.

"The citizens of this state need to know who is in charge and where we are going," GOP Sen. Laird Noh of Kimberly said in the face of Democratic protests over Otter's vote.

But Democratic leaders indicated they would probably test the legality of Otter's vote before the Idaho Supreme Court once the organizing session of the 51st Legislature adjourns. That will probably be Friday.

"When put to a vote, I would expect that is how they would want it to be done," said Democratic Leader Bruce Sweeney of Lewiston, who forced Otter to vote by having his name placed in nomination for a presidential protest's post as well.

Republican leaders and Otter relied on a constitutional provision that states the lieutenant governor, as president and presiding officer of the chamber, has the power to vote when there is a tie.

Because the constitutional provision sets no limitations on the lieutenant governor's tie-breaking role, the GOP maintained it applies in any situation when an open session vote in the Senate is evenly divided.

But Democrats contended that power is limited only to legislative matters and does not extend to organizational or internal Senate issues.

With Crump secured as president pro tem, the Republicans quickly moved to organize the chamber under GOP chairmanship of the standing committees that control the flow of legislation to the full Senate.

In view of that, the GOP pressed a proposal to create a Ways-and-Means Committee comprised of four Republicans and

Snow, rain dampen sections of mostly dry nation

Dry weather prevailed Thursday across most of the nation, with rain from Oklahoma to Missouri and snow lingering over Colorado and western New York state.

A cold front brought strong westerly winds to the southern sections of the United States and wind advected the mercury to Texas and Oklahoma.

Strong, gusty winds also developed over parts of Southern California, including the Tehachapi Mountains in Kern County.

High temperatures ranged from the 20s in Colorado, Wyoming, Minnesota, Wisconsin and upper Michigan, the 60s and 70s over Florida and southern Texas and the lower 80s in Southern California.

The nation's low was 1 degree in McCall, Idaho.

Flooding resulting from earlier heavy rains continued Thursday in South Carolina and in portions of the Kanawha and Washburn rivers in Indiana.

Officials announced that record flooding in Washington state last month ravaged wildlands areas in the state's western states, with damage to Mount Baker-Snoqualmie National Forest alone estimated at \$12 million.

The Wenatchee Olympic and Gifford Pinchot forests also suffered.

Damage to roads, homes and businesses has been estimated at tens of millions of dollars and some counties were declared federal disaster areas. Two men died in "Thanksgiving" weekend floods.

California farmers got some bad weather news Thursday.

The state told farmers, who already face a grim water outlook as California enters its fifth dry year, that they may get only one-third of their scheduled supplies in 1991.

"This is not absolutely the worst case scenario, but it's close to it," said Don Long, the state Department of Water Resources' top water analyst.

taken back to the barracks and most were eventually shipped to Shanghai, a Chinese port then controlled by the Japanese.

Bowyer spent the next 44 months living in crowded barracks near Shanghai and in Japan as the Japanese used the prisoners as slaves; whenever and wherever they were needed.

The prisoners were at the mercy of their captors, and the Japanese let them know it.

"They feed you when they want to feed you," Bowyer said. "If we would have had rice three times a day, we would have been lucky."

But the punks were abusive, often hitting the Americans with the butts of their rifles.

"They didn't have to have a reason for mistreating you," he said. "They took a special joy in taking the butt of a gun to your crotch."

Remembering what it was like to be a prisoner of war, Bowyer said he can empathize with the men and women taken hostage in Iraq's recent takeover of Kuwait, especially since many Western hostages are construction workers.

"It bothers me that those people are over there," he said. "They went over there same as we went to Wake. We weren't conscripted."

When the war was finally over and Bowyer was taken to Tokyo for trial by the Americans, he was suffering from beriberi and malnutrition and had to be carried on a stretcher.

"I had a knee that was swollen to 12 inches in diameter," he said.

When he got back to the United States, Bowyer returned to his parents' home in Twin Falls.

His family moved here in 1929 when he was 12 years old. When he got older, Bowyer did carpentry work while attending the University of Idaho. When his grades slipped and he was offered a nine-month stint on Wake Island with M-K, he jumped at the chance.

"Nine months was a good job," he said. "Most carpenters' jobs lasted only days or weeks."

Now, Bowyer lives in Twin Falls with his second wife, Margaret, and two children.

He is a member of the Survivors of Wake, Guam and Cavite group and keeps in touch with many of the

men who lived through the same things he did. In 1981, Congress gave veteran status to Bowyer and other civilians taken prisoner by the Japanese during the war.

After the war, Wake was taken over by the U.S. Air Force, which still operates a base there.

In the years since the war, Bowyer has had plenty of time to think about what happened in the South Pacific.

"We were a minor thing. They (the U.S. military) had to sacrifice 1,500 men," Bowyer said matter-of-factly. "I had a little ROTC at Moscow, and I knew something had happened."

While the Americans on Wake Island were trying to fend off the Japanese, a U.S. aircraft carrier and task force were en route to get them off the island but it was ordered to turn back because the Navy couldn't risk losing a carrier in the wake of Pearl Harbor.

"Of course, I didn't sit very well with me for several years afterward," Bowyer remembered. "It's like a big football game. You can always have your quarterback the next day tell you what should have happened."

only three Democrats to ensure it would have full power of the fate of any legislation the party might deem critical.

An attempt to ratify what Democrats called the "power committee" was delayed until Friday morning, but Democrats conceded the rules that include creation of Ways and Means would also be approved in a 22-21 vote with Otter again causing the tie-breaking vote.

"Without anyone in control you end lock things down," Otter said. "I don't think the people sent us up here for a stalemate."

John Peavey of Carey, the newly-elected Democratic caucus chairman, said at the end of the day, "We're not close to making it out of court." Peavey said the Democrats are just trying to share power.

They've conceded the pro-tem, but want even committees and committee chairmanships.

"We're just talking of the new word. It's a four letter word: 'Fair.'"

If the matter goes to court, it would be at the end of the organizing session, as that Peavey called a constitutional inquiry.

"If I think it's a very good case," he said.

If it goes to court, "the court case won't hold up the Legislative process one iota," he said. The court would act promptly, and if it says "reorganize," they would do so Jan. 6, Peavey said.

He had hoped negotiations would lead to compromise, but said he sees a resurgence of "arrogance" by Republican leadership, as it was under former Senate President Pro Tem Jim Risch, who was defeated for reelection in 1988. Peavey thought it "more than coincidental" that Risch was advising Republicans Thursday.

Risch said he came to the state house and met with Republicans in their request. He said he did not meet with them in caucus.

course, the affidavit says.

Panel recommends increased research on female biology

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ignorance about female biology still impedes the treatment of breast cancer and other diseases of women, a panel of scientists said Thursday.

"There's no research on the normal breast," said Dr. Susan Love, an author and professor of surgery at Harvard. "Therefore, we don't have a clue when carcinogens are acting."

Yet breast cancer will strike one woman in 10 in her lifetime, and will kill 44,000 this year, she said.

"It is appalling that in 1990 we have little or no information on the natural course of the endocrine and tissue changes that occur during menopause," said Barbara Sherwin of McGill University.

The two medical experts were among more than 100 physicians and other scientists who gathered for a symposium.

Although panelists looked specifically at breast cancer, menopause, cardiovascular disease and clinical pharmacology, there were many common threads and a common set of recommendations.

A key recommendation was that medical professionals consider closely but also look beyond the biological factors unique to women — such as the menstrual cycle, pregnancy and hormonal differences.

"They said professionals also need to gather data on individual patients' social and economic status as risk factors — poverty, raising children alone — and on 'psycho-social' factors such as depression, occupational stress and the multiple demands on women as mothers, workers and spouses.

Special centers should be established at academic research facilities to study the interactions and complexities of these factors," said defense attorney Jon May said of the panel.

Families jubilant, but also wary of promise

Saddam Hussein offered relatives of about 500 American hostages the promise that their loved ones might be home for the holidays.

"It was received with joy and some trepidation.

"We've been waiting and waiting, trying and trying to get him out and hitting brick walls," said Mrs. Bliss, whose brother is among hundreds at the U.S. Embassy in Kuwait. "So this first ray of hope is like a gift."

But, hostage relatives said, Saddam's was a conditional gift.

Their high hopes won't be validated without a quick reunion — and to four months of frustration, pain and perpetual waiting.

"We're really emotional about this because Christmas is a big holiday with our family... a very special time of year," Mrs. Bliss said from Stover, Mo. "But we're being careful."

Many families said they were reining themselves in, resisting the urge to leap at what for some ap-

peared to be the first real break in the Persian Gulf crisis that began when Iraq invaded Kuwait on Aug. 2.

"The news is very welcome, but we're not throwing a celebration," said Margaret Williams, whose son and daughter-in-law are among "human shields" in Baghdad.

"We'll celebrate when we see them coming out — and not before."

Mrs. Williams said she was among a group of about 20 Americans that traveled to Baghdad this week to seek their relatives' release.

"You can't give up hope — there's always hope," Mrs. Williams said from her home in Germantown, Tenn. "But this could well be just another one of (Saddam's) cut-and-choose games."

Saddam called for the release of all foreign hostages in a directive Thursday to the Iraqi parliament, a release all hostages over a three-month period beginning Christmas Day, "if nothing mars the atmosphere of peace."

Families and friends of captive Americans could not help but cheer the long-awaited news, but they are also wary of the commitment.

"It's the first time that we've taken anything that Saddam has said seriously and we're excited," said Bonnie Anderson of Larkspur, Colo., whose husband has been held up at the embassy in Kuwait.

"But (Saddam) has a habit of putting real nasty catches on things," said Mrs. Anderson, who was among the wives and children released several weeks after the invasion. "We need more details."

"So far we've heard a lot of rhetoric — double-talk — and half-releases all hostages over a three-month period," said Ronald J., a Michigan attorney whose old friend and client is among Ameri-

Keating's relationship to senators to be aired

WASHINGTON (AP) — In compelling James Grogan to testify, the Senate Ethics Committee is summoning the person who probably knows more than anyone but Charles H. Keating Jr. about Keating's relationship with five powerful senators.

At the start of Thursday's 13th day of hearings, the committee announced a timetable for Grogan's closed-door testimony.

Grogan was Keating's main liaison with Congress. He's the man who can tie together any relationship between the money-keating raised for the Keating Eitz and their intervention with the regulators on his behalf.

Documents released in the case show that Grogan, who earlier declined to testify on Fifth Amendment grounds, had often arranged for Keating's political donations and had enlisted the senators' backing for Keating's failing Lincoln Savings and Loan.

The committee is trying to learn whether the \$13-million Keating raised for the five influenced their conduct. The senators are Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz.; John McCain, R-Ariz.; Donald W. Riegle, Jr., D-Mich.; Alan Cranston, D-Calif.; and John Glenn, D-Ohio.

Grogan, who will testify in closed session Dec. 17, was the corporate counsel for Keating's American Continental Corp. and vice president of Lincoln. He undertook several activities that could spark the committee's interest. For instance, he arranged for Keating's contri-

Cities have record high murders

The Associated Press

With nearly a month left in 1990, more than a dozen large U.S. cities already have broken their annual homicide records and others are on course to follow in the final weeks of bloodletting.

Records have fallen in Dallas, Phoenix, San Antonio, Memphis, Milwaukee, Boston and New Orleans, police in those cities report.

They have been broken in Richmond, Va., in Providence, R.I., Bridgeport, Conn., and Oakland and Fresno, Calif.

New York City recorded its 2,000th violent death of the year last weekend, when seven people were killed in one night.

The city had long since surpassed its old record of 1,905 homicides, set just last year.

Washington, D.C.'s mark of 434 homicides fell late last month, making it likely that the nation's capital, which has the highest per-capita homicide rate, would remain the murder capital as well.

Homicide records have been broken in eight of the nation's 20 largest cities.

Police in those 20 cities have recorded 7,547 homicides so far this year, up about 3 percent from last year.

The United States, already more violent than any other developed nation, appears to be getting more violent still.

"It's often said that Americans have a love affair with violence, but in reality it's more like a marriage," said James A. Fox, professor of criminal justice at Northeastern University in Boston.

"And if we don't watch out in the next few years, it may be a marriage in which death does us part."

Guns and drugs get most of the blame, but many law enforcement officials and social scientists are beginning to question something more fundamental — the way that American society places its life.

Guardian says court should let Cruzan die

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (AP) — Nancy Cruzan's court-appointed guardian is siding with her family, who have asked a judge to let the comatose woman's feeding tube be removed so she can die.

If Jasper County Probate Judge Charles Lind refuses to allow that, her parents asked him to let them move their daughter to a hospital in another state.

"We feel compelled to carry out what we believe to be Nancy's wishes. If we don't, then I feel like we would have let her down and I don't intend to do that," Joe Cruzan said from his Carterville home in southwest Missouri.

Cruzan said no decision has been made about where to move his daughter, a patient at the state-run Missouri Rehabilitation Center in Mount Vernon.

He said he thinks Lind will rule for them because "I feel confident that common sense will prevail."

The 33-year-old woman has been in a persistent vegetative state since 1983, after she was struck by a car. Her body is rigid, her hands and feet bent into claws. She breathes on her own, and at times her eyes are open and move randomly.

In June, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in the case that Missouri could keep a patient on life support in the absence of "clear and convincing" evidence that the person would want to die.

Computer loss halts astronaut's stargazing

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Space shuttle Columbia's star-gazing mission suffered yet another major setback when the astronauts Thursday lost their only working computer terminal for operating a \$150 million observatory.

Observations already lagging far behind were halted as a frustrated NASA scrambled to devise a plan to control three of the telescopes from the ground.

"We've got to bootstrap ourselves from ground zero," said mission scientist Ted Gull.

It was the latest in a series of blows to the mission, which was delayed six months by shuttle fuel leaks and suffered instrument failure within a few hours of Columbia's lift-off Sunday. The shuttle is to land Tuesday.

"I'm not sure whether to smile or to cry," said William Blair of Johns Hopkins University, revealing data of a supernova remnant that the school's telescope made before being shut down.

The four astronauts aboard Columbia were forced to halt observations Thursday morning when a flight deck computer overheated.

and automatically turned off. Moments before, they had smelled a burning odor similar to one that filled the cabin Sunday when they lost the only other terminal for operating the observatory.

The astronauts had been managing the Astro observatory's three ultraviolet telescopes with the one remaining terminal.

When the first failed computer was disassembled Thursday, its air vents were found to be clogged with lint. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration tried to bring that terminal back on line, but the smell reappeared and astronaut Jeffrey Hoffman quickly turned the machine off.

"No joy on the test. Power is off," Hoffman said.

Mission Control's James Hartsfield said there was no large release of laminar flames and the crew's air was fine. The astronauts had their breathing helmets ready just in case.

Before Thursday's computer failure, the astronauts had had to manually steer the telescopes because of lagging problems with the automatic pointing system.

Vets hope 50th Pearl Harbor anniversary will be largest yet

WASHINGTON — On Dec. 7, 1941, a 17-year-old Bostonian fresh from boot camp stood aboard the Navy submarine tender Pelias and watched Japanese planes slam torpedoes into the U.S. battleships moored in Pearl Harbor.

"The captain on the bridge was shouting at the planes with a .45," recalls Ernie Nolan, 66, who retired from the Navy in 1960 and now lives in North-Miami, Fla. "You can imagine how low the planes were if you can hit them with a .45 pistol."

As the sneak attack continued, Nolan and his shipmates rushed into smaller boats and attempted to rattle the flames engulfing the doomed battleship, U.S.S. California. "We tried to climb up on deck, but the fire was so hot below that our sneakers melted and stuck to the deck."

Nolan plans to return to Pearl Harbor next Dec. 7 for the first time since 1942. It will be the 50th anniversary of the bombing that signaled America's entry into World War II.

Details of the commemorative events are still sketchy, but planning has been underway for almost a year for what veterans hope will be the largest reunion yet of Pearl Harbor survivors from all the military services.

The 12,500-member Pearl Harbor Survivors Association holds a convention and memorial service on the island of Oahu every five years. "We fully expect to

beyond any other attendance out there," said national secretary Robert McClintock Jr., a former Navy torpedo man living in Orlando, Fla.

Among the planned highlights are a sunrise service at the Punch Bowl — a volcano crater and site of the Cemetery of the Pacific — including a "missing man" fly-over by military planes. The secretary of defense has been invited to attend, and the U.S. Pacific Command has been coordinating plans with the association for nearly a year.

The Military Vehicle Collectors of California hope to ship some 80 vintage jeeps, half-trucks, tanks and other military vehicles to the island for a parade down Honolulu's main street, according to club member and Korean War vet Skip Raimos, of Napa, Calif. The club is hoping to persuade the military to provide private, even Japanese car companies to foot the bill for transporting the vehicles to Hawaii.

"Actually, right now we're looking for anybody," Raimos said.

There will also be a sunset service at the U.S.S. Arizona Memorial, which marks the site where 1,177 men lost their lives.

The 2.1 million-member Veterans of Foreign Wars have formed a committee to explore appropriate events for the 50th, but the group has worked out few details, according to Bill Smith, a member of the panel. "It's a unique opportunity to inform the 'American' people of the unity and spirit which existed during World War II from the outset and throughout the war," Smith said.

Veggies, yogurt may be on menu

WASHINGTON — School lunches of fatty cheeseburgers, greasy french fries and ice cream will be replaced with turkey-burgers, fresh vegetables and frozen yogurt at a panel of health experts here this week.

A report released Wednesday, spearheaded by Dr. Gerald Berenson, a Louisiana State University expert on cholesterol and high-fat diets, urges Congress, the Department of Agriculture, state governments and parents to cut up to a third of the fat out of schoolchildren's diets.

"Schools should be teaching kids what's best, both in the classroom and in the cafeteria," said report co-author Dr. Michael F. Jacobson of the Center for Science in the Public Interest. "Unfortunately, far too many school-food programs provide mediocre meals — meals too low in dietary fiber and too high in fat and sodium."

The report comes in the wake of work by Birtenson whose Bogalusa Heart Study became a model for the report. His study of more than 10,000 school children over the past two decades has shown a link between high-fat diets and elevated cholesterol levels in children.

School meals may have a major effect on cholesterol levels, Berenson explained, because "school meals account for at least 25 percent of calorie intake of children, with some getting 60 percent from school meals." It is said the higher numbers are for children who eat breakfast and other snacks in school.

The White Paper report, produced by a panel of 15 nutritionists, health officials, educators and school food providers, issues menu guidelines for schools and the Department of Agriculture also urges Congress to increase funding for the Nutrition Education and Training program, which educates schools on providing nutritious meals.

But the public-interest group, Public Voice for Food and Health Policy, wants to criticize the report for relying too much on recommendation and not enough on legislation. The report only calls on Congress to mandate a change from whole milk to low fat milk in schools. Other changes would rely upon the Department of Agriculture, which Public Voice researcher Eddy McGrath Morris said, is unwise with a "Republican" administration wary of regulation.

"What's going to happen is wealthy communities that are health conscious may turn to the (suggested) system," Morris said. "But in low income areas, they are probably not going to be turning it around on a voluntary basis."

One major concern, expressed by both the report's authors and Morris, is that children of low-income families rely on school lunches as a main meal for the day, thus making the health benefits of those lunches all the more imperative.

Bush ignores bombs, praises Chile reform

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — President Bush, unfazed by a spate of bombing incidents that greeted his arrival here Thursday, hailed Chile's peaceful transition to democracy and its pro-growth economic policies.

Bush received a generally friendly welcome on the first visit by an American president in 30 years. But the bombings were a reminder that Chile has not yet escaped its fractious political past.

Before Bush arrived, leftist guerrillas exploded a half-dozen bombs overnight at sites with U.S. ties, including four Mormon chapels, a new McDonald's restaurant and a downtown park outside a hotel where some officials in Bush's advance party were staying.

The president's limousine was also hit by an egg thrown from the crowd as his motorcade passed through Santiago streets. The incidents, however, seemed designed to make a political statement rather than cause harm. Police reported no injuries.

Otherwise, the visit here — Bush's fourth stop on a week-long South American tour — went smoothly. At a colorful airport arrival ceremony, at a news conference, and at a speech to the national congress, Bush heaped praise on Chile not only for its peaceful return to democracy but its ability to generate economic growth rates that are the envy of Latin America.

Many Chileans have viewed the United States with suspicion and hostility for years because of suggestions that the United States subverted Chile's democracy in 1973, paving the way for 17 years of military rule.

With the restoration of freedom and economic growth, much of the passion against the United States has dissipated.

At the red-carpet welcome for Air Force One at the airport, President Patricio Aylwin said, "Mr. President, we welcome you with joy."

Aylwin called your presence in our land. We share common ideals," he said.

In his speech to the Congress, Bush said that Chile "has moved further, faster than any other nation in South America toward real market reform."

He said there has been an increase of 15 to 20 percent in the value of exports in each of the last five years.

One issue dividing the United States and Chile is a four-day grape embargo imposed by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration against Chile last year. Inspectors reported by some two grapes faced with cyanide in the hold of a ship in Philadelphia.

Chilean growers are demanding compensation for losses estimated at \$330 million.

The issue was taken up during Thursday's talks here.

Bush said the FDA decision was based purely on health considerations and was not intended to punish Chile.

The Bush administration prefaced the visit by lifting sanctions imposed during the dictatorship of President August Pinochet, who ousted Chile's leftist president, Salvador Allende, in 1973.

Freedom of hostages aims toward peace

NICOSIA, Cyprus — Saddam Hussein's decision to free all foreign hostages appears to be an Iraqi gambit to avert war.

It also seems aimed at bolstering opposition in the United States to a Persian Gulf conflict.

In asking Iraq's National Assembly to free the hostages, Saddam cited "positive changes" in the Persian Gulf crisis, including settlement in the U.S. Congress for a non-military solution.

He also said "any measure that could delay war at this time was appropriate."

There are strong indications that Saddam failed to get what he wanted from the hostages and that they had become a burden, analysts said Thursday.

"Now, I think, he is divesting himself of the burden, and also taking away the biggest reason, in the minds of public opinion, for confronting him," said Philip Robins, an analyst with the Royal Institute of International Studies in London.

From the beginning, the hostages have been a public relations nightmare for Saddam. The world reacted to the detention of thousands of foreigners at least as harshly as it did to the invasion of Kuwait itself.

The way they were labeled "guests of Iraq" was ridiculed in the West. So was Saddam's attempt to portray a kindly image by appearing on television ruffling the hair of a frightened

looking child.

In responding to Saddam's announcement Thursday, President Bush mentioned the world's reaction:

"No single hostage should have been taken in the first place, and I hope ... Saddam understands that his hostage policy has incurred the hostility of the whole world."

For weeks, Saddam had said he would release everyone in exchange for guarantees against an attack — which he never received.

On Nov. 18, he said he would free all the hostages by March 25. The only condition then was "if nothing mars the atmosphere of peace."

But that step was followed by U.N. Security Council's approval of the use of force to drive Iraq out of Kuwait if Saddam does not withdraw by Jan. 15.

"I think it increasingly becomes clear that the hostages have been a burden because they depict him as a tyrant in the West," he said.

Shahram Chubin of the Graduate Institute for International Studies in Geneva said there seemed to be two main reasons for Saddam's

latest move: "U.S. domestic division on the use of force, weakening the credibility of the Jan. 15 deadline, and that the sanctions are working."

Allowing more time for the sanctions to work was one of the strongest themes from experts testifying in hearings before the House of Representatives Committee.

Right after sanctions were imposed, Bush himself voiced confidence they would succeed in forcing Saddam to withdraw from Kuwait. But his administration has shifted to the opposite view in recent weeks.

The chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Gen. Colin Powell, Defense Secretary Dietrich and Secretary of State James A. Baker III have left no doubt that administration policy would not depend on economic sanctions to force Saddam to leave Kuwait.

"As we wait, we will continue manipulating hostages, attempting to break the coalition," Baker said.

On Tuesday, Democrats in the House of Representatives voted 177-37 for a non-binding resolution that said Bush should not order and attack without prior approval from Congress.

"I think the Iraqis will try to use this to try to find an accommodation, some sort of agreement with the United States," Robins said.

Saddam's releasing the hostages now puts the United States in the position of having to negotiate seriously when Foreign Minister Tariq Aziz goes to Washington and Baker goes to Baghdad later this month, analysts said.

Walesa: Tyminski must apologize before leaving

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Lech Walesa said Thursday that if he wins the presidency, his challenger should be barred from leaving the country until he proves his campaign allegations or apologizes for "abusing Poland's good name."

Walesa told the government-owned daily Rzeczpospolita that recent charges by emigre businessman Stanislaw Tyminski "cannot be overlooked, even in the name of democracy."

The election will be held on Sunday, Walesa refused to hold a televised debate with Tyminski on Thursday night, as requested by his opponent after Tyminski backed out of a confrontation last week. Walesa showed up for that debate to find he faced only an empty chair.

"Tyminski said he wanted to face Walesa Thursday night to 'sum up' the campaign."

But Walesa accused him of plotting a last-minute assault to which he would not be able to respond because of the ban on campaigning after noon on Friday.

The challenger has insinuated repeatedly that he has damaging material about Walesa that would force the Solidarity leader into exile. Walesa has demanded proof and says no such documents could exist.

Fiscal restraint vital during economic slump

Prudence and caution should be the fiscal watchwords of the new Legislature when it meets this month.

Legislative leaders delivered a message to that effect this week at an annual tax conference in Boise, and they were right.

For the past couple of years, Idaho has enjoyed revenue surpluses that almost (but not quite) strained the Legislature's ability to spend money. But with a recession warming up in the bullpen, the challenge will be different in 1991.

The new challenge comes at an awkward time. The Republican legislative leadership that has guarded the state's fiscal affairs is threatened by the 21-21 split in the state Senate. Just when more conservative spending patterns are called for, the GOP is woozy from its November losses.

It doesn't help that one of the big players in the Democrats' gains was the Idaho Education Association. The teachers union will be looking for the spoils of victory just when voices of prudence will be calling for restraint in education spending.

One of those voices, House Speaker Tom Boyd, R-Genesee, warned this week that education will be the first target of austerity. His prediction is hardly a surprise, with education consuming the bulk of the state's general fund, chopping spending without nicking education would be impossible.

Idaho has seen some good gains in tax support for education in the past few years, gains justified by the importance of raising the standards of public education in the state. Lawmakers will need to protect those gains from recessionary ravages, but they also will have to turn sharp eyes and sharp pencils on every spending request.

Meanwhile, state agencies are acting like agencies anywhere. They have asked for a 76 percent spending increase. Is it true that bureaucrats take an oath of office that requires them to make outrageous requests for money?

With this pack of political, economic and administrative vultures circling overhead, the Legislature's need for fiscal restraint will be greater than it has been for years.

During our fat years, a Republican-dominated Legislature and a Democratic governor managed to (mostly) keep their wits and avoid excesses.

During the potentially lean times ahead, they'll need all those wits and more.

U.S. links export of food to Soviets, immigration

WASHINGTON - Bush administration policy on food assistance for the Soviet Union may be marching to the beat of a different drumstick.

Pardon the pun, but what officially are called chicken leg quarters could be part of perks as much as \$2 billion in U.S. food to be shipped to the Soviets as a result of last week's shift in administration policy.

Other Western governments have criticized the Soviet Union's rampant Soviet food shortages, and Soviet Premier Mikhail Gorbachev presented a long shopping list to the Western leaders who met in Paris two weeks ago.

But as late as the middle of last week, top U.S. officials weren't even falling back on the old excuse about having given up on the aid.

The administration's public line instead sounded a little like something from Ebenezer Scrooge. U.S. officials insisted, as they had for some time, that the Soviets have plenty of food and simply should take better care of it - at least so far as distribution of their own stores and a few other technical details are concerned.

But at his press conference last Friday, President Bush confirmed reports that the administration is reviewing its position on the issue.

He explained that a high-level study is under way of his authority to revive a 1974 U.S. trade law and extend export credit guarantees for the Soviet purchase of American farm products.

That first hint of the administration's shift in position did not reflect a sudden improvement in the Soviet economy's ability to feed itself. The country is still considered an excellent place for losing lots of food from frozen farms (or parts) and dinner tables.

And Bush told the press he is not seeking to reward the Soviet Union for present or prospective support in the Persian Gulf crisis. The two matters are "totally separate," he said, even though continued Soviet cooperation depends on Moscow's ability to deal with its economic problems.

The president did hit on a key reason for the administration's review effort, saying, "We're caught between some strong and understandable economic interests at home and wanting to stand for free and fair emigration" for Soviet Jews.

Even though, as Bush noted, much larger numbers of Jews have been able to leave the Soviet Union, the president has insisted that the country needs to codify its more liberal emigration rules into law.

He said that that codification is his condition for relaxing the 1974 Jackson-Vanik Amendment that ties both export credits and lower U.S. import duties for Soviet products

to Moscow's emigration policies.

The president had heard Wednesday, both at a cabinet meeting and in conversations with farm state senators, that agricultural and other domestic interests think they are being hurt by his stance.

Many see the lack of export credits not only as a bar to U.S. participation in future sales to the Soviet Union but also as a threat to Soviet purchases under the existing grain agreements with the United States. It calls for further Soviet purchases of 1.2 million metric tons of wheat and 600,000 tons of corn.

There is also pressure from business organizations that want the administration to quickly seek congressional approval for the more favorable duties that would come from extending "most-favored-nation" trade benefits to the Soviets.

Additionally, the U.S. National Conference on Soviet Jewry, noting the increased emigration flow, said Monday it will ask Bush to waive the Jackson-Vanik amendment.

One immediate result is likely to be an announcement that the Comintrade-Credit Corporation's widow for dispensing export credit guarantees would be opened for sales to the Soviets.

While that may not come before Gorbachev explains his plans for emergency food relief to the Soviet legislature Friday, it could be key to the meeting in Houston next week between Secretary of State James A. Baker III and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze.

Gorbachev recently has taken steps to reduce food waste. He will use both the KGB and special workers' committees to monitor food distribution and appoint a special commission on incoming food aid to make sure it does not end up on the black market.

Ocean transportation of U.S. food shipments will depend on the terms of the deals arranged through the CCC. A quick reading of U.S. cargo preference rules suggests they would apply only if the CCC credit guarantees are for terms longer than 10 years; shipments under shorter terms would be governed under this year's U.S.-Soviet maritime agreement, which has no preference formula.

The commodities in question apparently include such items as wheat, flour, soybean oil, corn, wheat germ, and those checked out here by Colonel Sandrovitch.

Ershad resigns after 8 years of rule

DHAKA, Bangladesh — President Hussain Muhammad Ershad resigned Thursday after ruling the country for eight years, handing power to an interim leader chosen by the opposition.

Ershad, a former army general who took power in a 1982 coup, had faced seven-weeks-of often-violent nationwide protests against his government.

Tuesday, he promised to step down as soon as a replacement was named.

Earlier Thursday, Ershad lifted the state of emergency in effect since Nov. 27.

Later, he administered the oath of office to Shahabuddin Ahmed, a political independent nominated by the country's opposition parties as caretaker vice-president. Then he signed a letter of resignation, making him acting president.

Originally, Shahabuddin's nomination was to be approved by Parliament on Saturday, but Ershad unexpectedly dissolved the lawmaking body early Thursday.

Onassis yacht to be sold in Greece

ATHENS, Greece — The government plans to sell the luxury yacht that shipping tycoon Aristotle Onassis donated to it in his will, a magazine reported Thursday.

The 325-foot yacht once hosted royalty, heads of state and leading jet-set personalities. Onassis also used it as the base of his shipping operations.

Opera singer Maria Callas, once romantically involved with Onassis, had her own suite on the yacht. And Jacqueline Kennedy, who later married Onassis, was another frequent guest.

Onassis died in 1975. He stipulated in his will that if his daughter Christina did not want the yacht — named after her — it should go to the Greek government.

Christina Onassis died in 1988.

The yacht was handed over to the Greek navy in 1978 and was renamed the Argo.

Dog helps his master's case with a lick

OSLO, Norway — A dog appearing as a witness in a cruelty case against his owner helped the defense considerably when he licked his master's face in court, the prosecution acknowledged Thursday.

King, a beagle-pointer crossbreed, "was led in because the judge had asked to see him, and taken out after a while," said prosecutor Ole Erik Aase in the central town of Namdal.

"He seemed very unoffended (against his owner) and at one stage licked his face," the prosecutor said.

The local Animal Protection League had reported King's owner, Inge Skomsvold, to the police. The league said it had received reports from Skomsvold's neighbors that he beat King.

But Aase said that after Wednesday's hearing the outcome of the case was "open." The verdict was due this week.

Food pours in, but Moscow needs bottles

MOSCOW (AP) — Government officials squabbled on Thursday over who was to blame for Moscow's food shortages, a Soviet Foreign Ministry spokesman said.

Humanitarian aid from abroad had topped \$160 million.

But if Western nations really want Muscovites to have a happy holiday season, they should send empty bottles. A shortage of the glass containers threatens to leave the city without vodka, wine and champagne to toast the New Year.

In the latest round of finger-pointing over shortages in Moscow that have raised fears of a hungry winter, authorities from regions that supply the capital with meat, milk and other foodstuffs denied they are withholding stocks.

There is "no need to start a witch-hunt where there are no witches," said Ly. Syrovatko, an official of the Bryansk region southwest of Moscow, in an interview published in Thursday's Sovetskaya Rossiya newspaper.

Last month, Moscow's deputy mayor, Sergei D. Stankevich, accused the regions of Bryansk, Penza and other areas of violating delivery contracts to the capital.

A. Kovlyagin, executive committee chairman of the Penza regional council, said his region fulfilled its delivery plans by 97 percent in the past 10 months. He said Penza supplied 18,087 tons of meat, out of the contracted 19,463 tons, and had ci-

lier surpassed or nearly met all its dairy contracts, the newspaper reported. The neighboring Tver region exceeded the state plan of 275 tons, 1,500 have paid 50 rubles (about \$80) apiece to join God Send since it was founded eight months ago.

The company is part of a new Soviet bride industry that includes an Italian marriage service, an international video introduction firm and half-a-dozen magazines packed with personal ads.

Behind the industry are two recent phenomena: President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's political re-

forms, which have made it easier to meet, marry and move abroad with foreigners; and the worsening Soviet economy, which has cut into the quality of many women's lives and set them to dreaming about life in the West.

"Soviet women have a lot more respect for American men than for Soviet men," said Sergei Kurochkin, 39, a former computer software designer who founded God Send last April.

"They say Soviet men are lazy, unfaithful and rude. They want someone who will hold doors open for them."

Soviet officials have maintained that food production is no lower than last year, pointing out that the nation had a record grain harvest this year. Instead, many blame the barren store shelves on a crumbling distribution system and panicked consumers.

Many regions of the Soviet Union have halted shipments of food and consumer goods to other areas to protest policies of the central government. Rather than obey the Kremlin's demands for food deliveries to the cities at state prices they consider too low, farmers are trading directly with factories and other consumers for other scarce supplies.

Aid from abroad continued to arrive Thursday. The second of two Israeli jammers filled with fruit, vegetables, powdered milk and medicine was scheduled to land in Moscow Thursday night.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Vitaly Churkin told a briefing that \$160 million worth of food has already been sent or is in the pipeline to the Soviet Union. So far, governments and charitable organizations from 21 nations have promised or delivered aid, he said.

By Dec. 15, more than 200,000 food parcels, each weighing 22 pounds, will start arriving in the Soviet Union.

Many Soviet women want to be mail order brides

MOSCOW (AP) — Galina is tired of Russian men who expect her to do all the cooking and shopping, plus work a full-time job. She has an idea that with an American man, "things might be a bit more equal."

So she sent three photographs and an application to Nakhodka, or God Send, the first "mail-order bride" service matching Soviet women with North American men.

"Of course, if I met a very sweet American man, I would be willing to cook and clean for him, too," Galina, 36, explained in an interview.

"But at least I would be living in America."

The lure of love in a land of prosperity has hooked many Soviet women this year. More than 1,500 have paid 50 rubles (about \$80) apiece to join God Send since it was founded eight months ago.

The company is part of a new Soviet bride industry that includes an Italian marriage service, an international video introduction firm and half-a-dozen magazines packed with personal ads.

Behind the industry are two recent phenomena: President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's political re-

forms, which have made it easier to meet, marry and move abroad with foreigners; and the worsening Soviet economy, which has cut into the quality of many women's lives and set them to dreaming about life in the West.

"Soviet women have a lot more respect for American men than for Soviet men," said Sergei Kurochkin, 39, a former computer software designer who founded God Send last April.

"They say Soviet men are lazy, unfaithful and rude. They want someone who will hold doors open for them."

Ruling divided as high court views local case

BOISE — The Idaho Supreme Court produced a divided ruling Thursday in the second round of a long-running battle between Magic Valley Radiology Associates of Twin Falls and Professional Business Services, Inc. of Twin Falls.

The court affirmed an award of \$30,000 in punitive damages against the business organization; \$10,538 in commissions for the organization and an 18 percent interest rate on the judgment owed by Professional Business Services.

The court also ruled that district court improperly allowed a letter of credit to be used to satisfy the debt owed by Professional Business Services, because it expired in 1985. Finally, the court held that district court improperly awarded Magic Valley Radiology Associates attorney fees.

State extends comment time in plant proposal in Gooding

TWIN FALLS — State officials have extended the deadline for public comment on proposed permits for Ward's Cheese to discharge waste water.

The Richfield-based company proposes to establish a new cheese operation in Gooding in a building formerly occupied by a meat-packing plant. It has sought a permit to discharge waste water on the ground. The company also wants to change its permit for its Richfield plant.

Ward's was fined earlier this year for improper waste water disposal at the Richfield plant, but discharge problems there have been corrected.

Castleford sets community center auction for next year

CASTLEFORD — The city of Castleford will sell its community center building at public auction on Jan. 12.

"The city wants to recoup what it has invested in the building," said Mayor Richard Schlund, and then use the proceeds from the sale to build the city's depleted reserve and investment fund as protection against any major repairs that may occur in the future.

The council decided to sell the building as an alternative to raising water and sewer fees and taxes. The building is seldom rented and maintenance costs far outweigh any income the building brings in. The action is scheduled for 1 p.m. on Jan. 12 at City Hall.

The Castleford City Council adopted an ordinance last month stating its intent to sell the building, however, the city must wait 60 days from that date before it can sell the building to allow any city residents protesting the sale with time to circulate petitions.

So far there have been no objections filed in protest of the sale.

Former Gooding man pleads guilty to reduced rape counts

GOODING — A former Gooding man who was sentenced to stand trial on four counts of first-degree rape pleaded guilty Thursday to one count in exchange for the remaining charges being dropped.

Henry William Smith Jr., 43, submitted a written plea of guilty to 5th District Judge James May Thursday, said Gooding County Prosecutor Lynn Nelson.

Smith is currently in the state penitentiary serving a 25-year sentence for a separate conviction of lewd conduct with a child under 16, Nelson said. In that case, the court has retained jurisdiction for 180 days and will review the sentence in late January or early February, Nelson said.

Nelson said he hopes Smith will be sentenced on the rape charge at that time.

Smith was originally charged with 12 counts of rape in August 1989 after an investigation by the Gooding County Sheriff's Department. Eight of those counts were later dropped.

Smith is a 37-year-old man who now lives in Washington state, was under 18 when the rape occurred.

Smith's trial was originally scheduled to stand trial in February, but that was delayed while he completed a sentence for fourth-degree assault in Chelan County, Wash.

3 Magic Valley legislators gain leadership roles

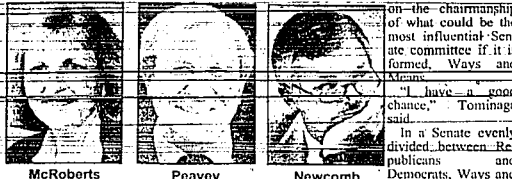

Across the aisle in the Senate, Carey's John Peavoy, an unopposed and held onto his position as Democratic caucus chairman Peavoy, serving his ninth term, is the Senate's second-most senior Democrat.

Downed water system tough on Bliss

BLISS — It's going to cost Bliss between \$6,000 and \$10,000 to repair its water-pumping system in order to satisfy a new requirement of the federal Environmental Protection Agency, and Mayor Ronald Zollinger is wondering how the city is going to pay its bills.

The city has cashed in a certificate of deposit to pay for part of the project, but Zollinger said the additional expense will still be hard for Bliss to handle. He asked Councilman Sam Bishop to travel to Boise to ask for a state grant to fund the project.

"They say they've got what, a \$30 million surplus?" said Zollinger at a Bliss City Council meeting this week. "Maybe we could use \$10,000 of that for this."

The city is currently using a jerrybuilt motor-to-pump-waste-to Bliss residents. Zollinger said he could not say when the new system would be working, but he hoped it would be before the first of the year. The plans have been submitted and some of the digging and concrete work have begun.

The city's 25-horsepower main pump motor stopped working three weeks ago following a power outage in the system. Auxiliary 15-horsepower pump was used for six days after the main pump failed, but to be turned on and off manually and was not effective, said Zollinger.

Bliss was in the middle of an upgrade of its water system when the pump motor broke. The improvement, required by the EPA, included raising the pump to ground level to prevent flood contamination, installing flow meters and a flushing system and putting in new pipe.

The EPA also suggested Bliss install an expensive gas chlorinator, but Zollinger told the council that it was not necessary for its small system. Bliss currently uses powdered-chlorine injection system.

Bliss has hired JUB Engineers and Smith Dunn and DeWitt to repair the pump and engineer the system overhaul. Zollinger estimated the cost of the project, including the new steel pipe, the crane required to raise the pump and labor costs will be between \$6,000 and \$10,000.

Better Business Bureau to open office

Decision on Friedman's future shelved until next year

HAILEY — Wood River Valley residents will have to wait until next year for a decision on the future of Friedman Memorial Airport.

Although the final draft of an extensive airport feasibility study is now complete, the Blaine County Airport Commission decided this week to hold off discussing the document until January.

The commission also ruled for now Airlines can keep air traffic departure scheduled from Friedman only for the next month, and heavy aircraft may soon be denied landing privileges at the airport.

A special meeting between the airport commission and members of a community advisory board is set for Jan. 29. It will be the first of what is expected to be many hearings on what to do about growth at Friedman.

"It is a very, very long drawn-out process," said Ryk Dinkelsberg, a visiting airport consultant from Tulsa, Okla.

Dinkelsberg warned the commission that very few new airports are being built nationwide and that there are many stumbling blocks to getting one built.

The January work session will allow the citizens' planning advisory committee to present a limited number of alternatives for either building a new airport outside of the Wood-River Valley or upgrading

Friedman to comply with Federal aviation standards.

Either choice is certain to be a costly proposition for county residents.

The relocation feasibility study concluded that it would take \$12.6 million to make needed improvements and modifications at Friedman, or \$61 million to build a new airport.

Katie, as she is called, has already attended several meetings and does not mind the commotion and has not been a problem, Chamberlain said.

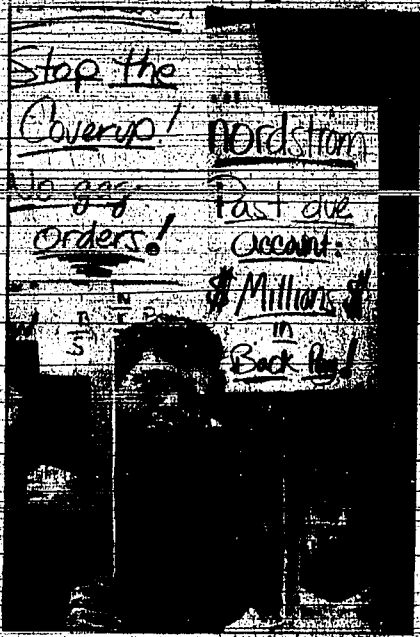
Two-and-a-half-year-old Megan Flandro slept in her afternoon, her mother said.

Idaho schools may see layoffs, cutbacks

Unexpected enrollment growth and three-year misallocations by the Department of Education could mean layoffs and program cutbacks in some Idaho school districts.
"The bottom line is that our expenses are \$3 million over what we anticipated," said Bob Dutton, associate state superintendent of public instruction for finance.
"We're still going to distribute the same amount of money, but how it goes out to districts will differ."
Nearly 6,000 more students are enrolled in Idaho's public schools this year, three times the Department of Education's projection. The student population jumped from 214,900 in September, 1989, to 220,840 in September, 1990.

right now, that we wouldn't have if their calculations had been right," said Ken Schow, business manager for the Idaho Falls School District.
"I don't want to get discouraged, but this is certainly a challenge," said Dave Tester, business manager for the Coeur d'Alene School District. "Our people understand the seriousness. I think we have a group willing to hold the line the best we can."
The Department of Education, which is projecting another 2,000-student increase in enrollment next year, will replace \$6.2 million from the Legislature in the coming year to help offset this growth.

Millions in dividends to be distributed

BOISE (AP) — The state Insurance Fund has announced it will distribute \$19.3 million in dividends to policyholders insured with the fund for at least six months between July 1985 and June 1989.
The dividend will be distributed through more than 9,800 checks, which will be mailed to Idaho business Jan. 4.
"The efforts of our policyholders to prevent residents and workers-related injuries are reflected in this substantial dividend," fund manager Merle Parsley said in a news release. "In addition, the fund's internal cost-containment program has contributed to this year's increased dividend. Last year's dividend was \$17.4 million."
Parsley said the dividend is calculated on the premium paid and losses incurred for each eligible policyholder. It represents a return of about 39 percent of the Insurance Fund's total premiums for the period.
The fund is Idaho's largest provider of worker's compensation coverage. It serves more than 12,000 policyholders representing about 65 percent of Idaho's employers, and has returned \$69 million in dividends over the past five years.

Boyd captures 3rd term as House speaker

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Mike Simpson, R-Blaine, says most people agree the Idaho Republican Party is "in shambles" and needs to be rebuilt after its smashing defeat in the general election last month.
The blueprint for that rebuilding might be drawn in moderate tones.
The House on Thursday opened its organizing session by re-electing moderate Tom Boyd of Genesee to his third term as speaker.
An eastern Idaho Republican urged the GOP to move more toward conservatism.
In keeping with tradition, the vote wasn't announced.
It came in a closed-door House GOP caucus shortly after the lawmakers were sworn in to new terms.
After both parties elected officers, the House adjourned to start work on committee assignments, a process which is expected to take until Friday.
Simpson said he didn't think his conservative message was rejected by the 56-member GOP caucus.

"No, I think the message was clear. A majority of people agree the Republican Party is in a shambles — and needs some rebuilding. There are some people who probably feel that Tom Boyd is the better job at that, obviously a majority of the caucus," he said. Boyd said his fellow Republicans wanted him to be a little more "assertive" of GOP themes.
"There will be a little change in direction, but not much," he said, after the vote. "If there's been criticism of my regime, they'd like me to be a little more out front on where the Republican Party is going. I can accommodate that."
Boyd said he would continue his effort to get along with his minority Democrats. "But I think the message I got was that they would like this

seat, this position to be used to at least get the Republican message out."
He was asked if that indicated House Republicans feel there was a lack of leadership in the state party.
"I would dare say that's the reason," he said. "The party is working on that. Our group of people would want our leadership to get that (the GOP) back up and functioning again."
Rep. Gary Anderson, R-Boise, remained GOP majority leader, and Rep. Bruce Newcomb, R-Burley, moved up from caucus chairman to assistant floor leader. Rep. Con Mahoney, R-Idaho Falls, was picked as caucus chairman. There were no contests except for the Boyd-Simpson race.

Facility must provide some public service

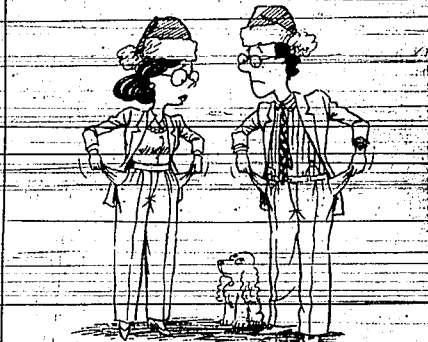
BOISE (AP) — A charitable organization must provide some public purpose services to receive tax-exempt status, the Idaho Supreme Court says.
The court on Thursday unanimously upheld a lower court ruling that part of the Good Samaritan Village, operated by a Lutheran society in Latah County, does not qualify as a "charitable organization" for tax exemption.

The society claimed that multi-care facilities such as the village shortens hospital stays for the elderly, reducing the burden on society.
But the Supreme Court noted that the facility charges for its services on a basis comparable to privately operated nursing homes.
"Although the society claims that it is a charitable organization, the district court found that no person who was unable to pay the founders fee (\$27,000) ever has been admitted as a resident of the village," the court said. Further, the district court also found that when one woman was unable to make monthly payments, she was referred to the Latah County welfare director.
The society also argued that the multi-care center, including the 67 independent living apartments, should be considered a hospital and thus qualified for property-tax exemption.
"...the definition of a hospital requires it be more than an institution which provides housing and minimal medical care for those who are ambulatory and otherwise able to care for themselves," the courts said.

Pilot in Detroit crash had personal worries

PHOENIX (AP) — Northwest Airlines pilot Bill Lovelace had just begun to get his life in order after a divorce and business failure when he found himself on the wrong runway at Detroit's foggy Metro Air-
The pilot in a runway crash that killed eight people was described by friends Wednesday as a professional-caliber magician and woodworker, a man meticulous in everything he did.

Lovelace never hesitated to fly with him," said Barbara Giannini, a neighbor.
Investigators say Lovelace was piloting a Northwest DC-9 that collided with one of the carrier's Boeing 727s on Monday, killing eight people on the DC-9 and injuring 24 others. No one aboard the 727 was injured.
Lovelace, 52, whose own injuries were minor, once was an instructor in flying DC-9s and has flown commercial airlines since 1966. Northwest officials said.
After logging 20,000 hours in commercial flight, he took disability leave in February 1985 for kidney stone treatment.
Monday's flight would have been his 13th since returning to work Nov. 25 following two weeks of ground training and 13 hours of simulator flying.
Five of the dozen flights had been into or out of the Detroit airport, but Monday's was his first without a mission at his side. Northwest said.
Three weeks before returning to active duty, Lovelace had been declared bankrupt under a petition he had filed in mid-July in federal bankruptcy court in Phoenix. Court records show he cited debts of about \$152,000 against assets of \$106,000 and a monthly income of \$421.25 in pension and retirement benefits.
The airline has described his absence as a medical leave rather than retirement.
His bankruptcy lawyer, David Engelman, said part of Lovelace's debt stemmed from an unsuccessful gift shop that he sold in 1989.
Divorced and with two grown children, Lovelace had remarried in September. He was certified as fit to fly Oct. 10 by the Federal Aviation Administration.
"Flying was his No. 1 love; he talked about it often," said Judy Wells, a friend of 36 years.
No one answered the door at Lovelace's Phoenix residence Wednesday, where a neatly trimmed kumquat tree graces the front yard of the beige stucco one-story house with heavy, brown shutters.
Neighbors offered a positive portrait of the man.
An accomplished magician, he performed as the Great Orion, complete with swishing black cape.
"Good enough to be professional," said a friend, Jack Wall.
"He's just a good neighbor," said Mrs. Judy Wells, who took over the gift shop he'd started during his medical leave. "He'd step in and see how your day was going."
Neighbor Dave Giannini, a carpenter, also knows him as "very funny, meticulous, very intelligent."
"His house, shop — anything he

did — had to be just right," said Giannini, who lives across the street from Lovelace.
"I don't honestly believe it was his negligence" that led to the collision, Giannini said. "That guy was a straight guy — even driving a vehicle he was really cautious."
Brad Zinn, a friend who patronizes Sun-Magic Shop where Great Orion posters are displayed, said Lovelace is "a very detailed kind of guy."
"Everything was just so with Bill, and I'm sure he took that into the cockpit," Zinn said. "Bill just wouldn't have wandered onto the runway without some good reason. There must have been some miscommunication."
It was Lovelace's interest in magic that led to his woodworking.
He would perform shows for schools and hospitals when he wasn't flying. And because he needed props for such tricks as sawing a woman in half, he said in a 1986 newspaper interview, he decided to make his own.
"That led to purchase of a table saw and other equipment, and ultimately to the lathe on which he shapes bowls that have sold for \$300 to \$750.

Forest Service denies Mumma on probation

LEWISTON (AP) — A top U.S. Forest Service official denies a claim the Northern Forestry center is on probation for failing to cut enough timber.
George Leonard, the agency's associate chief, dismissed a claim Missoula-based John Mumma received an unsatisfactory performance rating because he failed to cut enough timber to meet targets.
An anonymous letter circulating among both industry and conservation interests said Mumma is on probation and in jeopardy of losing his job.

The letter writer said conservationists stand to lose many of the gains they have made for wildlife and recreation during Mumma's tenure as regional forester.
"No, it's not true. John received a fully satisfactory performance rating this year," Leonard said.
"There's no question that we're concerned about the fall down in timber sale performance," Leonard said, adding there are many reasons for that failure, most of them outside the agency's control.
The writer contended that, despite Mumma's passing grade in all but one of 12 areas, namely his timbering, his job was in danger. Mumma's performance was rated satisfactory in all the others, including six relating to fish and wildlife.

Leonard said the letter is off-base, most notably because regional foresters are not ranked by such criteria.
He's raised in terms of how he manages his people and his organization. He's rated on the safety record of the region and his personal management achievements," Leonard said.

For his part, Mumma said the letter is a reflection of the interest in the agency and the lands it oversees. He did not comment directly on the letter's contention he is under fire, but admitted the Forest Service's inability to meet the timber targets has drawn attention.
This year is shaping up to be another difficult one because many of the problems facing the agency's timber sale program remain in place, he said.
These include continuing wilderness debates in both Idaho and Montana that have largely blocked many roadless areas to logging. The roadless lands originally were intended to supply a major part of the federal timber, he said.
"We just can't go back and keep harvesting off the same segments of land," Mumma said. Appeals and lawsuits have also taken their toll.

James Riley, Intermountain Forest Industry Association executive vice president at Coeur d'Alene, said he had seen the letter.
"The industry has been concerned about the timber-it said it could—in its long-range management plans for the national forests."
"We have been concerned for the last 18 to 24 months about the Forest Service's inability to perform on the timber sale program. We've raised these concerns with John Mumma and we talked to George Leonard when he was out here," Riley said.

"I would like to believe that because of the attention, this will be a solved problem," Riley said.
The industry has not targeted Mumma as the root of the problem.
"I have no reason to be critical (of John Mumma). This is the first serious issue we have brought to Mumma's attention and I think from what we have seen he has responded to the concerns we have raised fairly and pointedly," Riley said.
Tom France, National Wildlife Federation attorney in Missoula, said it is no secret the Forest Service has been under attack for failing to meet its timber targets.
"I've heard from people both inside and outside the agency that Mumma is walking a plank and may fall off at any time," he said.
Dennis Baird, who is the Idaho Environmental Council vice president at Moscow, echoed that sentiment.

Man charged in death of girlfriend's daughter

ST. MARIES (AP) — Authorities in Benewah County have formally charged a Fernwood man with second-degree murder for the beating death of his girlfriend's 2-year-old daughter.
John C. Wood, 29, is charged with the Nov. 17 death of Tasha Almandinger. First District Magistrate Neil Walter ordered him held in the Benewah County Jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond.
The child died a day after Wood brought her to Benewah Community Hospital in St. Maries. He told officials he had been watching the girl while her mother was at the grocery store when she stopped breathing.
Miss Almandinger was flown by helicopter ambulance to Sacred Heart Medical Center in Spokane, Wash. She was kept alive for a time by life-support equipment, which was disconnected at her mother's request.

Benewah County Sheriff Rodney Thromason said the child had no open wounds, but physicians noticed swelling above her left eye.
Coroner Ron Hodge said an autopsy showed she died from an injury to her brain caused by a blow from a blunt object.
Sheriff's deputies tried to arrest Wood at his Fernwood home Nov. 27, but discovered he had left the area two days earlier. Deputies alerted authorities in northwestern Washington, where Wood's ex-wife lives, and he was arrested Nov. 28 outside Everett, Wash.

"It was one of those things where you just happen to be in the right place at the right time," Everett Police Chief Erik Ramstead said of his officer, who was looking for Wood when the suspect drove past him through an intersection.



Death row slayer and fiance wish to marry

BOISE (AP) — Smiling from the witness stand at her fiance, Idaho Death Row inmate Thomas Eugene Creech, Sheryl Lynn Miller was asked the burning question.

"A lot of people want to know," said Creech's attorney, Dennis Chamey, "Why do you want to marry Tom Creech?"

"Because I love him," replied Ms. Miller, 32, a plumber's daughter who moved to Boise last year from California.

Miller's attorney, Dennis Chamey, began Wednesday in Ada County Magistrate Court Does Creech, a condemned multiple killer, have the right to marry?

"And is that right legitimately subject to the security concerns of the Idaho Maximum Security Institution?"

Creech, 40, was sentenced to death for the May 1981 prison slaying of inmate David Dale Jensen. Creech earlier had been convicted of multiple killings in California and Oregon. An appeal of his death sen-

ence is pending before the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

Creech and Ms. Miller hope to reverse a Feb. 27 decision by U.S. District Judge Arave nixing the marriage request.

Testimony in the non-jury trial was expected to conclude Thursday. Magistrate Michael Denmark heard testimony from nine witnesses Wednesday.

In his opening statement, Charney, a third-year University of Idaho law student, argued his client's engagement has made him a "model prisoner."

Since Ms. Miller moved to Boise in April 1989, Creech has had no

disciplinary write-up, he said.

But Idaho Solicitor General Lynn Thomas said Arave was legally correct in concluding that granting Creech and Ms. Miller regular visitations as a married couple would create significant security risks.

Ms. Miller denied under oath that she and Creech ever harbored escape plans, stating, "I think God will get him out of here."

But Arave testified Creech has a long history of violence in and out of prison, and cannot be trusted.

Arave outlined a possible scenario in which Ms. Miller and Creech stage a violent "mutual death pact" inside the prison south of Boise.

Thomas pointed to vaguely worded letters from Creech in which she pledges to assist him in getting out of prison, and to informants saying that Creech tried to enlist a correctional officer to help him

escape.

Arave also said he feared that allowing Creech to wed might open the floodgates to other Death Row marriages.

Condemned killer Thomas Gibson testified he also wants to marry, and another Death Row resident, Albert Beam, complained that he has been denied visiting privileges with a woman he says is his common-law wife.

Chamey brought out during his examination of Arave that security is extremely tight on Idaho's Death Row.

Before moving inmates, guards reach through slots in inmates' cells and cuff their hands behind their backs. When they move, two officers accompany them.

The warden conceded it would be extremely difficult for a visitor to slip contraband to such an inmate, since each visitor is carefully searched, and the visitor and inmate are separated in the booth by thick glass, communicating by telephone.

Feds say INEL's dirty laundry isn't that dirty

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — When proving an existing water monitoring system, Idaho National Engineering Laboratory washes protective, anti-contamination clothing at its Central Facilities Area, the waste water now runs through a sewer system and into the soil.

Officials at the U.S. Department of Energy site contend that does not pose a problem, and that the waste water is well within federal standards for releases of radioactivity.

But they continue to look for better ways to handle it and to comply with an Environmental Protection Agency mandate to use the "best available technology."

That eventually may involve building a solar evaporation pond. But in the short term, it could mean the construction of holding tanks or im-

proving an existing water monitoring system.

"They're deep into discussions now, and I would expect a decision to be made in the next month or so," INEL spokesman Brad Hager said.

Even without the holding tanks or new monitors, the INEL says it has several safeguards in place for its laundry water. Protective clothing is checked for radioactivity before being sent to the Central Facilities Area for cleaning and is checked again once it arrives. If any exceeds federal standards for contamination, it is disposed of as radioactive waste.

Water from each load of laundry also is checked for radioactivity, and monitors are in place in the sewer system.

In case of war, Babylon and Ur become targets

WASHINGTON (AP) — If war breaks out in Iraq, also known as what's below the surface there, the civilizations of Mesopotamia, the cities of Babylon and Ur, ancient places where humanity learned to write, to raise wheat and barley, domesticate animals and live in cities.

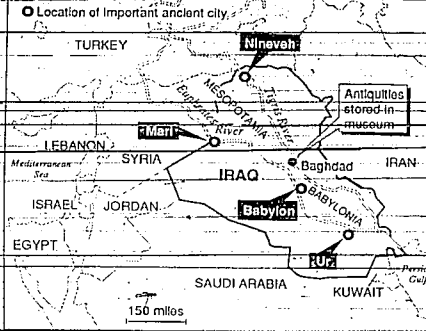
But archaeologists are increasingly sanguine about the safety of artifacts buried under the sands in Iraq's vast desert. Thousands of unexcavated sites and millions of clay tablets whose writings have yet to be interpreted will survive, even if Iraq and Kuwait turn into a battleground, these scientists say.

"Obviously, if war comes, there will be unexpected damage, but I don't think it will be calamitous, with regard to archaeological sites," except those near modern cities or other potential targets, said Robert M. Adams, secretary of the Smithsonian Institution and an eminent archaeologist known for his years of research in Mesopotamia's ruins.

Among the potential targets, however, is the city of Ur, built on the banks of the Euphrates at the dawn of history and said to be the birthplace of Abraham, the biblical patriarch.

What sits atop of Ur now is a major Iraqi airfield, almost certain to be obliterated by a stray bomb intended for Hilli could shatter Babylonian artifacts.

Adams said. "We probably have some knowledge, other than having walked over the surface of less than 1 percent, and it may be one-tenth of 1 percent of the existing sites," he said. "I myself must have mapped 5,000 mounds or something in that neighborhood."

So the treasures there to be unearthed over thousands of years to come are enormous. "The prospect of war — and of Islamic hostility to Westerners — raises doubts about the future of work in Jordan, Syria and elsewhere in the region. The Iran-Iraq war and the Iranian revolution of the 1970s have frustrated archaeological research in Iraq."

The threat of war raises greater concern about the safety of antiquities stored in such places as the "spectacular" museum in Baghdad, according to archaeologist Elizabeth Stone of the State University of New York at Stony Brook. "A direct hit would be catastrophic," she said.

Stone is optimistic, however. She noted that on three occasions during the Iran-Iraq war, when it seemed likely that Baghdad would be bombed, Iraq's President Saddam Hussein had priceless objects moved out of Iraq's way.

Van Beek said Saddam has been "extraordinarily active" in encouraging excavations "even given all his problems with war with Iran."

"It is always possible that a pitched battle can take place on a site" or that a general can decide an excavation would be a "good place from which to stage an ambush," he said.

But short of those quirky events, he said, most archaeological sites are far from cities or targets and unlikely to be in danger of wartime destruction. The vast majority are 30, 40 or 50 feet below the surface. "Peacetime economic development

— the flooding of a valley or damming of a river — is generally more destructive to archaeology than war," Van Beek said.

And in wartime, he said, random bombing is likely to be less destructive than the loss or looting of equipment and records and the destruction of artifacts that already have been brought to the surface.

War, of course, brings the frustration of disrupting work that may have finally begun to pay off after decades of digging. Archaeologists sometimes wait in vain for decades to return to a former work site rather than starting anew elsewhere, he said.

When Saddam seized Kuwait Aug. 2, no Western archaeologists were known to have been stranded. Work had stopped during the hot summer. Before the invasion, Stone was able to put in only three seasons of work at the "lost city" of MashKhan-ship which she and colleagues discovered in Iraq. Some 3,700 years ago, she said, it was "one of the world's 10 most important cities."

Selective Service System ready to turn on the tap if necessary

WASHINGTON (AP) — Seventeen years after the government's authority for a military draft expired, the Selective Service System is alive and well — and on standby. But if President Bush and Congress gave the order, the Selective Service could start issuing draft notices within days and supply up to 100,000 young men within a month.

Bush has said recently he doesn't want to see the draft reinstated, but it's the job of the Selective Service to be ready — just in case. The agency has 270 fulltime employees, 7,000 local draft boards and a entire system for resuming the draft if ordered to do so.

"It's business as usual because that is our mission — to be ready," Selective Service spokeswoman Barbi Richardson said. "We were ready a year ago, and we'd be ready tomorrow."

Middle East crisis.

Still, the buildup of U.S. troops in the Persian Gulf has led to growing public concern and debate about the draft, which was one of the most divisive issues of the Vietnam War. Former Navy Secretary James Webb last week questioned the wisdom of Bush's buildup of the troops in the gulf, but said the president is serious about going to the offensive, he should call for an immediate resumption of the draft to avoid troop shortages.

The president's authority to draft men into the armed forces, which had been routinely renewed by Congress every four years, expired on July 1, 1973, three months after the last U.S. soldiers left Vietnam. The military then began depending

only on voluntary enlistments.

Even if the draft were reinstated quickly, there would be a significant time lag before conscripts reached the gulf. By law, draftees may not be sent overseas for three months after induction. Lawrence Korb, a Brookings Institution analyst who was assistant secretary of Defense for manpower until 1985, said it would take a year to get conscripts trained and over to the gulf. "I don't think it (the draft) is likely," Korb said. "Military, it doesn't make sense."

Martin Rubin, another Brookings Institution analyst, said "I do not think that the average American kid has to worry about conscription." "We receive calls from members — from the young men, their wives, their girlfriends, their grandmothers, their grandfathers," the Selective Service's Ms. Richardson said. "We let them know there is a draft and we do not anticipate one."

have 14-year-old sons wanting to get information," Treber said. "Ethicals come from college students who say 'I registered for the draft a couple years ago and never thought it would amount to anything and now I'm worried.'" Treber said. James Blackwell of the Center for Strategic and International Studies said the need for a draft may in-

crease as voluntary enlistments drop off due to concern about a possible war in the Persian Gulf.

"The longer it lasts and the closer it comes to a shooting conflict, the closer we come to a draft," he said.

The Selective Service insists it is doing nothing unusual in response to the troop buildup in the gulf. Should Congress authorize a return to the draft, the Selective Service within hours or days could hold a lottery, based on dates of birth, to determine the order in which men would be inducted, Ms. Richardson said.

Top priority for the draft would be young men who turned 20 during the same calendar year as the lottery. Young men already are required to register with Selective Service when they turn 18. Once draft notices were issued, draftees would have 10 days to report to a military processing station for examination and, perhaps, in-

duction.

Only after a young man got a draft notice could he file a request to postpone or avoid military service. Reasons for a delay might include an emergency such as serious illness or a death in the family.

Others might request classification as conscientious objectors who oppose participation in war. They would be required to serve either in a non-combat position or in a civilian job that benefited the nation. Under one change that took effect near the end of the Vietnam War, young men no longer can defer military service for years because they are in college. Deferrals now last only until the end of the current semester. Requests to delay or avoid military service are considered by local draft boards made up of trained volunteers. The five-member boards meet yearly to consider sample cases — draft or no draft.

Logan residents feel the crunch without doctors

LOGAN, Utah (AP) — Of the 24 doctors "retained" for Operation Desert Shield in the most recent call-ups, eight are from Logan including the town's only two gastroenterologists and the director of the area's health department.

Because of the number of physicians involved, those remaining are asking people to delay elective surgery and locate other doctors before an emergency arises.

Dr. John C. Bailey, director of the Bear River District Health Department, is one of the physicians involved in the call up of the 138th Medical Group. Several local doctors have offered to join the department's nursing staff with consultations.

"Their jobs will also be more stressful with the other physicians suddenly called away," he said. "In my opinion, this region has been hit harder than any other in the state as far as physician depletion is concerned."

If the Middies (5-5) upset the 61-point Army Cadets, they'll achieve their first winning season since 1982. The five victories are the most in a season for Navy since '82. Chaump's team is coming off two straight victories, the first time Navy has achieved that since the first two games in 1988.

Chaump said the game is a tradition between the two schools. "I try to figure what the game is with the 61-point Army Cadets. I wonder I hope they're wrong. I try to compare the teams and try to figure out who you would think."

Chaump also doesn't think that Jim Young's last game as Army coach gives the Cadets an edge. "Naturally, it's meaningful for them, but I think that during the game the players want to be thinking 'our last game or Young's last game or who won last year,'" Chaump said.

Experience differs for California Bowl coaches

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) — Central Michigan's Herb Bornodi has a decided edge in overall experience over San Jose State's Terry Shea in Saturday's California Bowl.

But Shea has the experience of coaching before in this particular game.

Deromedi, 51, is in his 23rd year with the Chippewas, 10 as an assistant and the past 12 as head coach. Shea, by contrast, is completing his first year as head coach of San Jose's Spartans, although he spent three years as an assistant there in the mid-1980s and was offensive coordinator when the Spartans won the 1986 game — 37-7 over Miami of Ohio.

"I coached a pretty explosive team

that led the nation in total offense in 1986," Shea recalled. "But we've had our spurs this year offensively too."

The Spartans certainly did, scoring more than 40 points five times, including a 56-point barge against hapless New Mexico State.

This will be Deromedi's first California Bowl, a source of some frustration. The Chippewas last won the Mid-American title in 1980, one year before the beginning of the annual post-season competition between the champions of the MAC and Big West conferences. Fresno's new 30,000-seat Bulldog Stadium wasn't completed in time that season, when sponsors had hoped to hold the first game.

Central Michigan's frustration increased with several lost opportunities during the 1980s.

"We're a team that has knocked on that door a lot of times," Deromedi said. "A lot of factors enter into your not coming out one year as opposed to another. I thought several years we had teams that certainly were capable of coming out, only to lose team leaders."

Both teams have a 10-2-1 record. But unlike San Jose State, the Chippewas depend on defense for the bulk of their success.

"We started off with our defense being the strongest part, really the unit that was carrying our football team until our offense was able to mature," Deromedi said.

Computer technology pioneer finally receives credit for his work

MONROVIA, Md. (AP) — Brilliant ideas about computers that clicked in John V. Atanasoff's brain one cold night in a roadside bar are earning him international fame 53 years later.

At a White House ceremony last month, President Bush presented the 87-year-old retired physicist with the National Medal of Technology for inventing a prototype electronic digital computer.

For years, other scientists have been credited with a key invention that helped usher in the computers age.

"There are a million computers that go way beyond the scope of my machine, but it's

gone quite a long way," said Atanasoff, who is in frail health. He lives on a 126-acre farm in Western Maryland with his wife, Alice. When his memory lapses, she is quick to fill gaps in the story about the day her husband first visualized today's modern computer.

"It was the winter of 1937, Atanasoff, then 34, was working at Iowa State University on ways to use electronics to help his graduate students complete lengthy numerical computations. Frustrated by his work that day, he decided to go for a long drive to clear his mind.

"He liked to get in the car and drive really fast — 80 or 90 (mph)," Alice Atanasoff

said. "It was a very cold night and he drove 189 miles, across the Mississippi and looked for a place that was warm."

Atanasoff stopped at a tavern in Illinois and sat down to a couple of bourbons, she said. It was there he conceived the technological concepts that helped form the basis of modern computers today.

After that night, Atanasoff built a prototype of the computer with graduate student Clifford Berry. They demonstrated it in October 1939.

"He knew he had something that was important," Alice Atanasoff said. "He knew he had something that worked."

In 1941, John W. Mauchly, a physicist at Ursinus College in Pennsylvania, visited Atanasoff to talk about computers and look at the table-sized computing machine.

A few years later, Atanasoff left Iowa State to join the U.S. Naval Ordnance Laboratory in Washington to do research during World War II. He and Iowa State worked to patent the machine, but the patent process was never completed.

Several years after Atanasoff left Iowa State, his computer was dismantled and only a memory drum, several vacuum tubes and small electrical parts were saved.

Meanwhile in Pennsylvania, Mauchly and

J. Presper Eckert Jr. built the Electronic Numerical Integrator and Computer. The ENIAC was cited as the first digital computer. Mauchly and Eckert were granted a patent on it.

Atanasoff's earlier work with electronic digital computers wasn't revealed until the late 1960s and early 1970s during a lengthy patent rights battle between Honeywell Inc. and Sperry Rand Corp., which had acquired the ENIAC patent.

A federal judge voided Sperry Rand's patent on the ENIAC on Oct. 19, 1973, saying its developers did not invent the automatic electronic digital computer.

Miners try to fend off law reform

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) — Miners are fighting congressional efforts to reform an 1872 law allowing them to claim public land for \$2.50 an acre.

Opponents say it's a relic of the Old West that makes modern land-grabbing easy.

Supporters agree that changing the law could put thousands of miners out of work and cripple one of the nation's basic industries.

"The mining industry is in trouble. It's in deep trouble in the Congress of the United States," said Bill Grannell, executive director of the Western States' Public Lands Coalition in Pueblo, Colo.

The coalition of miners, logging interests and ranchers who use federal land, mostly in the West, has launched a petition drive to preserve the Mining Law of 1872.

The law allows hardrock miners to stake claims on public land, pay no royalties on extracted minerals and obtain title to claims for as little as \$2.50 an acre.

Hardrock minerals include gold, silver, uranium, copper, lead, zinc and zinc. The U.S. Bureau of Mines says there are about 430,000 active hardrock miners nationwide.

The law was designed to promote mineral exploration and development on federal land, which covers about 600 million acres in 11 Western states and Alaska. It applies to everyone from lone prospectors to major mining companies.

Reform proponents say they will introduce legislation in Congress to make miners pay royalties similar to those paid by companies that lease land from the government to extract oil, coal and natural gas.

Sen. Dale Bumpers, D-Ark., will submit a bill like one he pushed last session, and Rep. Nick Rahall, D-W. Va., will bring a similar bill to the House, aides said.

The bills would end the so-called patent provision that allows miners to work the land and eventually obtain title to it at 1872 prices — \$2.50 to \$5.00 an acre.

Under the current law, prospectors need to have spent \$500 on a claim to qualify for a land patent. Critics of patenting cite a 1989 General Accounting Office report that cited abuses and huge private and corporate profits.

In one example, holders of the title to 17,000 acres near Grand Junction, Colo., received a 1983 patent from the government \$42,500 for the land, then turned around weeks later and sold it to major oil companies for \$37 million.

The GAO said one 10-acre site near Mesa, Ariz., patented in 1983 for \$100, is now valued at \$400,000.

The Bumpers' bill also would charge miners' royalty fees, and require them to post large bonds to guarantee their ability to repair any environmental damage.

Miners say boosting their costs that much would force many out of business.

In 118 years, more than 6 million mining claims have been filed with the government, and 1.2 million are still active. Nevada has the most, 370,000. Arizona has 141,000, Utah 113,000, Colorado 80,255 and Alaska 32,000.

Miners have obtained title to 84,000 acres in Colorado, mostly in oil shale deposits. They gained title to 11,158 acres in Nevada, 14,475 in Montana, 16,796 in Wyoming and 8,406 in Alaska.

"Mining is destroying a lot of public land in this country," said Laura Espino of the Mineral Policy Center in Washington, which is pushing for reforms.

The law enacted during the presidency of Ulysses S. Grant doesn't fit in a modern world where the wilderness is disappearing and environmental damage is mounting, said Dave Albersworth of the National Wildlife Federation.

"The law is simply an anachronism in this day and age," he said. "It's the last remaining land disposal act on the books."

Golden takes artworks beyond the limits

KETCHUM — Michael Golden can be called a jack of all trades as far as glass and ceramic artwork is concerned.

His versatility astounds the senses. After looking at a deep-carved glass etching, you can turn and come face to face with a hollow cast porcelain sculpture, and then turn to survey a case of fine teaks and earrings.

Concerned as much with pushing the limits of the process as with composing the finished product, Golden, 41, studies, examines and explores the properties of a given medium, and then tries to stretch that limit just a little further.

"Glass is a real fascination for me," Golden says.

Golden's art creates an environmental threadwork, one which runs through his glasswork and sculptures.

"What I tend to do with my sculpture tends to evoke that magic of being alone in nature, that sense of that spirit place you have when you're out there hiking around in the woods," Golden says.

On the other hand, Golden explains his glasswork as a reflection of "peak experiences."

The images that enter in his glasswork are "a celebration of the moment, of the first strike of the flint coming together to fly, or seeing an elk bugling across the meadow to his rival, or the eagle wheeling in the sky above the trees."

Golden says he enjoys working with glass because of its simplicity and also the limitlessness of its possibilities.

Golden has fused, slumped, etched, stained, carved, beveled, cast and pattern-cut glass. He has worked with monumental sizes as well as miniatures.

He says he tends to lead the field when it comes to glasswork and technical ceramics, such as a sculptural wall piece of large hollow-cast eagle feathers with shafts of aluminum leafing.

After looking at a wall-mounted Indian medicine stick, Golden says the idea never left his mind.

"What I do is I go in and get a feeling of the magic of the culture and bring it into the 21st century," Golden explains.

The sculptural medicine sticks, ceremonial lances and shields are replicas of an Indian culture, but represent today's values with ornamentation in porcelain, variegated copper, aluminum and gold.

"I find myself using medical knowledge almost as much as any knowledge I picked up when I was working at art school," Golden says.

Golden has lived in the Wood River Valley for 15 years, and has spent the last 10 years developing his talents as an independent artist.

Golden moved around the world with his military family and says it was while his family was stationed in Japan that he first began to show an interest in art.

Between the ages of 10 and 14, Golden says he would ride the trains and buses around Tokyo to sketch wildlife at the zoo and subjects at the Dietter and the National Museum. He became accustomed to using a multi-block printing technique which, when the family moved back to the United States, seemed foreign and unaccepted.

Living in Las Vegas then, Golden became interested in the paintings of works of Leonardo da Vinci and copied volumes of his work.

Golden's work became noticed, and he considered becoming an artist.

Twin Falls parole officer serves up justice with a song

Jerome — By day, Brett Reid, parole officer for the Idaho Department of Corrections at its District V office in Twin Falls, tracks at least 70 people who are on a foot of the law and are now on probation or parole.

By night, the 32-year-old Reid is a singer-songwriter whose first tape, "My Mind's on You," has just hit local stores.

Reid plays a blend of pop and country, and his strumming and singing, especially on "Baby Needs a New Pair of Shoes," "What the Lady Meant to Me" and "Woman" may remind listeners of Jim Croce.

Indeed, Reid says the late singer — known for such hits as "Operator," "Bad, Bad Leroy Brown" and "Time in a Bottle" — was a big influence.

Reid's 26-year-old son, Rowdy, is another inspiration. "I see things he does that remind me of things I did as a kid that I'd forgotten," Reid says. Relationships have left their mark on songs, too, he adds.

For Reid, music is an escape from the stresses of his job as senior probation and parole officer for the Idaho Department of Corrections at its District V office in Twin Falls.

In fact, he says he is usually most creative when he returns home after a hard day on the job.

But he has few thoughts of stardom. Most, he's just hoping his songs someday earn him the ear of a music publisher. "I think my real ambition is to be a songwriter," he says. "I'm not so interested in touring or performing."

Reid learned to play the guitar while a boy growing up in California. He moved to Idaho in 1978 to pursue a career in law enforcement, and his early years as a city policeman and county sheriff's deputy in Jerome left him little time for music.

Five or six years ago, he finally started playing in local restaurants and bars (usually with Dan Towle, who has gone on to form a band in Seattle). But it was only in the past year he has had time to record his music.

Reid often works with lyricist Elley Suzanne, who also lives in Jerome and who also works at the parole office. At one point, when Suzanne lived in Boise, the two would collaborate over the telephone.

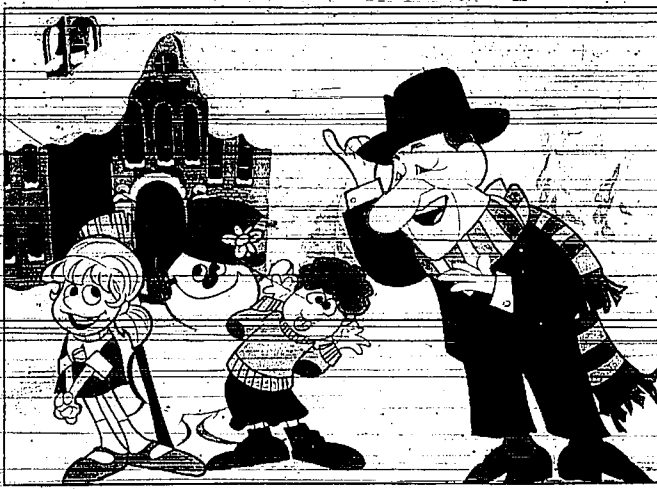

Catholic News Service offers movie, video reviews on 900 telephone line

'Did the devil make them do it? Maybe. The Catholic News Service has established a new 900 telephone number called "TV Preview Line." By dialing 1-900-PREVIEW (773-8459), you'll hear CNS reviews and classifications of recent movies and videos. The call costs \$1.50 for the first minute and 75 cents for each additional minute.

Thomas N. Loring, director and editor in chief of CNS, says his organization is just trying to reach a wider audience with its movie reviews, which have been running in Catholic newspapers across the country for years.

"You don't have to be Catholic to use it," said Loring. "Anyone with moral sensitivities would be interested in these reviews. It's not just if there's nudity or sexuality, it gets condemned. It depends on the context. The reviews are broader-based than most people would think."

The movies reviewed (in about 100 words) carry MPA ratings as well as traditional Catholic classifications: A-1 is acceptable for general patronage; A-II for adults and teens; A-III for adults only; A-IV, acceptable for adults, but "with reservations;" and "O" means morally offensive.

For example, "Home Alone," the top-grossing comedy meant for family viewing (it has a PG rating), got an "A-II" rating from the phone service. The review said, in part, "the laughter ebbs and wanes," but the "family message is heartwarming."

CNS pegged "Dances With Wolves" (PG-13) with an "A-II," saying its "sensitive treatment of Indians" compensates for "its excessive three-hour-plus length," "gory battlefield violence" and "minimal restrained lovemaking."

Not surprisingly, the sexually explicit "9½ Weeks" (R) got the first NC-17 rating, replacing the X) was labeled "O" and shrugged off as simply a "boring dramatization of the adulterous affair between writers Anis Nin and Henry Miller" that was "dull and pretentious."

Boise auction features Keveren's worldly treasures

BOISE — When Grace Smith Keveren of Twin Falls died in July, she left more than \$1 million to start a community charitable foundation.

Included in her estate were a host of worldly treasures. And they will be offered in an auction this weekend at Boise's 8th Street Marketplace, above Cafe Ole. A preview is set from 1:30 to 9 p.m. today, and the sale will start at 10 a.m. Saturday.

Sale proceeds will be added to the Keveren foundation, according to Twin Falls attorney Kent Taylor, who is administering the estate.

Among the goods that will be on

the block are a 1978 Cadillac sedan with 8,000 miles, three dining room suites, three bedroom suites, beveled mirrors, sterling-ten-service sets, Oriental rugs, four sets of fine china, Dresden figurines and other collectibles.

Taylor says the auction is being held in Boise instead of Twin Falls because of the capital city's larger market of potential buyers for Keveren's goods.

Charity was nothing new to Keveren. In 1986, she gave \$100,000 to the College of Southern Idaho Foundation, one of the larger gifts ever given to the school.

Grace Smith came to Twin Falls with her parents in 1905, when she was a small child. She later married Kenneth Keveren, and they were active in many real estate, building and investment ventures, establishing a joint foundation in the early 1980s.

She died July 13 of this year and left more than a million dollars to establish the Grace Keveren Smith Foundation, with funds to be used to help charitable projects in the Magic Valley.

Now, \$25,000 has been committed since her death to the Twin Falls Public Library. Keveren was trained in library science, worked as Twin Falls High School librarian and served on the public library's board of trustees.

Taylor says a foundation board will soon decide whether to give gifts to community groups just from interest likely after that.

'Ghost Dad' not worth bringing back to life

A Shakespearean "tour de force" tops this week's list of new videos, along with another disappointment from Bill Cosby: another curiosity from actor/director Henry Jaglom and —ugh— another Ernest movie.

Capsule reviews

GHOST DAD (1990) (MCA/Universal) 83 minutes. 2 stars. Bill Cosby, Kimberly Russell, Denise Nicholas. Cosby comes back from the dead, but this slick sitcom isn't likely to do the same for a movie career done in by the debacle of "Leonard Part 6." A ghost-widower has to help his kids after his departure — and this is a father figure created with an eye to the dollar figure. It capitalizes on Cosby's small-screen association with fatherhood while showing how convincing his television image is on the big screen. (This video supplier does not suggest retail prices on titles it deems primarily for rental.)

HENRY V (1989) (CBS/Fox) \$89.98. 138 minutes. 4 stars. Kenneth Branagh, Paul Scofield, Derek Jacobi, Judi Dench. In this mesmerizing and prodigiously inventive reassignment of Shakespeare's 16th-century historical times, director and star Branagh follows Laurence Olivier once more into the breach. And he doesn't have to settle for second place. Branagh's brilliant, fluent and intensely cinematic reading of the play sees it not as a plea for peace. It is a plea for Shakespeare's genius as much as Branagh's talent that the text commands both his and Olivier's splendid and understandably martial 1944 viewpoint. Oscar nominations: Branagh, best actor and best director; best costume design (winner).

NEW YEAR'S DAY (1989) (Paramount) 90 minutes. 2 stars. Henry Jaglom, Maggie Jakobson. These days, the characters in a Jaglom film should come with state inspection stickers — they make a noisy, noisy urban hellhole that looks like a Los Angeles — with moves to his New York home to find the previous tenants — three troubled young women — still there. 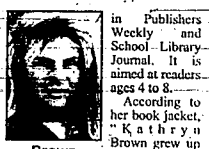
TWIN FALLS — A Twin Falls High School graduate will return to town this weekend to sign copies of her new children's book.

Levinson's warm, sentimental 'Avalon' puts emphasis on family

'Avalon' is Barry Levinson from the heart. Based on the writer-director's remembrance of his Baltimore childhood and the people who helped make it so rich, the new movie, filmed on locations in Baltimore and vicinity, is a heartfelt, lovely, sentimental (and that's not a dirty word) evocation of Levinson's parents, his grandfather and assorted relatives.

The film should appeal to all, even those who are far removed from the immigrant experience. Those who are familiar with it, however, will probably enjoy the film that much more.

The Levinson saga spans four generations, going back in flashback to the great-grandfather that "Michael" never knew.

Sam Kohninsky, grandfather to Michael, who, we must assume, is Levinson, was one of five brothers who came to America, the land where the streets were paved with gold. Baltimore and its environs have never looked better, never treated more lovingly than they do in this production.

The flashback portions, much of which is in 'slow motion,' are accompanied by piano tunes (by Randy Newman) that are usually appropriate to the time.

Review

You can't help but like the film, and it isn't only because of the locale and the photography. It's the people, too. They are a grand lot, hard-working, grateful to be here and always mindful of the fact that family life is of extreme importance.

As the film moves on, as succeeding generations take firmer hold, become a more integral part of the American scene, the family ties begin to loosen. Married-children, with children of their own, want homes of their own. They no longer want to live with their parents.

One character, a brother to Michael's mother, leaves Baltimore shortly after he arrives here, after having been freed from a concentration camp. Later, he is too busy to attend the funeral of a close relative.

Family is what "Avalon" is all about, family love and tradition as seen through the eyes of a little boy whose grandfather is the light of his life. Much of the family business is humorous.

Levinson uses tunes that don't always match the era, but that's quibbling. What the man wanted to do was share his life experience with a broader audience, and we thank him for that. Some might say that the director-writer spends more time than necessary

on certain incidents in his life, incidents that are precious to him but don't contribute that much to the larger picture, but those moments are few.

Largely, "Avalon" means the way a warm sweet film is pleasant to please, and the performers are superb. Aidan Quinn plays Michael's father, Elizabeth Perkins plays Michael's mother, Joan Plowright plays the grandmother, and Armin Mueller-Stahl, the grandfather. And of course, there is Michael, who is played by Elijah Wood. Excellent work from all.

Some will charge that Levinson is making too much use of his rose-colored glasses while viewing his past. Indeed, the only sign that the rose garden has its thorns is the scene in which two cousins, business partners, announce that they have Anglicized their Russian names.

It is, however, nice to think that some immigrant experiences can be as lovely, as relatively untroubled, as this one was.

Levinson, who has become one of Hollywood's biggest names, ends the PG-rated film with a sequence in which Michael and his son visit Michael's grandfather at a rest home. There is no word about the work Michael is doing, the career he has chosen. Maybe Levinson is saving that for another film, perhaps "Avalon II." It would not be a bad idea.

Sticky production makes 'Ghost' hard to 'Believe'

GHQST (PG-13). The movie's slogan is "Believe," not an unreasonable request. But even those who'd be happy to comply must get past a certain woolly-mindedness to its script and production. The film is a point-of-view story. With some of its actors, Demi Moore as the cracked-voice, desolate lover; Whoopi Goldberg as an extremely reluctant spirit go-between and Vincent Schiavelli as an irascible, subway-dwelling ghost — things are in the best hands possible. But Patrick Swayze as a corporate New York banker? Never in 7 million corporate years.

DANCES WITH WOLVES (PG-13) — In his first directing work, Kevin Costner has made a clear-eyed authentic vision of the frontier Northwest that is irresistible. The story of a Union officer who becomes assimilated with a tribe of Sioux, it has all the elements of epic: vastness, astonishing action sequences, exotic-looking characters, but because it's more concerned with character than spectacle, its epic quality becomes engaging, never self-congratulatory. Beautiful, memorable and full of humor, it's one of the most winning films of the year.

HOME ALONE (PG) — A 7-year-old child (Macaulay Culkin) is left behind by his parents when they jet to Paris for Christmas. Left to his own devices, he pigs out on junk food and foils a pair of humbling thieves (Joe Pesci and Daniel Stern). Some of the low-comic slapstick works on a fitful, Three Stooges level, but the basic idea — an abandoned child defending himself against intruders — is a bit too seamy for comfort: Chris Columbus directed from a screenplay by who else? — John Hughes.

'Home Alone' packs movie houses for 3rd straight week

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Despite a strong challenge from the obsessed-fun drama "Misery," the kiddie comedy "Home Alone" packed movie houses for the third straight week to claim first place at the box office.

According to figures released by Exhibitor Relations Co. Inc., "Home Alone" collected \$14.4 million in movie theaters. The story of a wily kid defending his home from two thieves already has made a remarkable \$66.7 million.

In second place was "Misery," director Rob Reiner's and screenwriter William Goldman's adaptation of the Stephen King novel, with receipts of \$10.1 million.

The film stars James Caan and Kathy Bates in a tale of a romantic writer (Caan) spending a few weeks with his No. 1 fan (Bates), who's also a psychotic torturer.

In third place, slipping 42 percent from last weekend, was the sequel "Three Men and a Little Lady," on grosses of \$8 million. It was followed in fourth by Kevin Costner's epic western "Dances With Wolves," which had ticket sales of \$7 million.

The angry alien drama "Predator II" landed in fifth with a gate of \$4.1 million and the grizzled "Rocky V" screen, \$3.9 million. 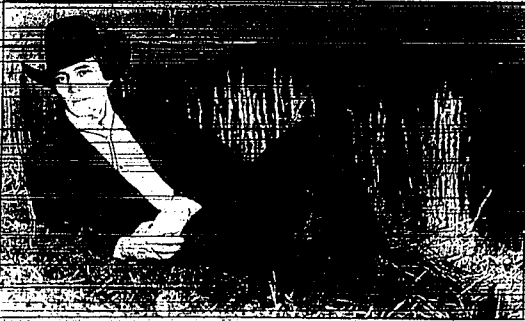

Barnhill's vibrant vocals visit Jackpot

JACKPOT - With a five-star album and songs on the charts, Capitol Records artist Joe Barnhill is appearing at Cactus Pete's through Dec. 16.

Shows are set at 8 and 11 p.m. today through Sunday and Dec. 11-16. For reservations, call 1-800-821-1103.

Barnhill has drawn comparisons to country favorites George Strait, Clint Black and Garth Brooks, but some listeners say he goes the stars one better.

"Even in a bumper crop of great male singers, Barnhill stands out with his intense, vibrant vocals and his obvious understanding of the vocals," a reviewer in Billboard remarked.

"Any-Old-Time" and "Tell Me Why (I'm

Still Crying Over You)," the two singles from the album, both made Cashbox's Top 40. In these songs and others like "You Old Flame's Going Out Tonight" and "Good As Gone," Barnhill moves from Western swing to ballads to honky tonk country.

Barnhill was born in Turkey, Texas. When he was in his teens, his family moved to Nashville, where his father (and now manager) Joe Bob Barnhill worked as a music publisher and producer.

Despite the family's immersion in music, the senior Barnhill didn't know his son wanted to be a singer until young Joe was a senior in high school.

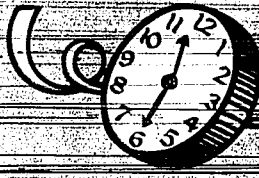
"I went through my life basically singing to myself until I got up at a party and did my impersonation of George Jones for a bunch of Dad's friends," Barnhill says in his record company biography.

From there, with his dad's attention, Barnhill started making demo tapes. He dropped the impressions, but not the influence, of classic country artists. Only 18, he continued in school to earn a music business degree at Nashville's Belmont College, and kept singing all the while.

In the fall of 1986, he signed on as the headline act at the Nashville Palace, picking up the spot left by Kinky Travis. There, he gained a loyal Nashville following and the attention of such country music heavyweights as Jimmy Bowen, who produced Barnhill's debut disc.

Al-Moir, writing about Barnhill's record in Country Music People, gave the disc his highest rating, adding, "Truth is, I'm not sure how Barnhill is going to better this. It is country through and through, with an excellent mix of styles."

Extended families take center stage as Winslows depict 'Family Matters'

There's no denying it: Reginald VelJohnson has enthusiasm. As Carl Winslow, the oft put-upon dad on "Family Matters" (airing Fridays on ABC), he looks and acts like he is having a real good time. And to hear him tell it, he is.

Now in its second season, "Family Matters" revolves around the Winslow family of Chicago. Carl (VelJohnson), a cop, and his wife, Harriette (JoMarie Payton-France), share their home with their children, teen-agers Eddie (Darius McCrary) and Laura (Kellie Shanygne Williams) and younger daughter Judy (Jaimee Foxworth); Harriette's sister Rachel (Telma Hopkins) and her toddler; and Carl's mother (Rosetta LeNoire). A frequent visitor and budding star this season is the nebbish Steve Urkel.

"If you have ever seen 'Family Matters,' you know that the Winslows are one crazy household. And VelJohnson loves it. 'I guess the theme song could be 'It's Gettin' Kind of Hectic,'" he laughs. "Sometimes we have to stop shooting because we break up laughing. We have a great time."

A big man, VelJohnson moves around the set as if he were floating. His double-takes are priceless, and he is not averse to a pratfall or two. In fact, he revels in physical comedy. He looks up to a lot of actors who are themselves "large" men: Orson Welles, Charles Durning, James Earl Jones, Charles Laughton... even John Candy and John Goodman. But VelJohnson virtually idolizes Jackie Gleason. "I loved

Gleason on his variety show, when he did Reggie Van Gleason, Joe the Bartender and Ralph Cranden," says VelJohnson. "He moved like nobody else.... That was great stuff. But I also like Lucy (Lucille Ball); what a great comedian!" VelJohnson also takes great pride in the fact that he has been compared to "the Great One," not just as a "latter-day Jackie Gleason," as one show-business paper describes him, but also as a blue-collar hero not unlike Ralph Cranden.

"Family Matters" has made a few changes since last season, and perhaps most notable is the increasing frequency of appearances by VelJohnson's pint-size, on-screen nemesis, Steve Urkel, played by Jaleel White. Last year the character became so popular that the producers decided to make him a regular cast member. "Jaleel is great," says

VelJohnson. "It's hard for me not to laugh, and I'm used to him."

Carl does whatever he can to avoid Steve, who usually walks into the Winslow home without knocking. VelJohnson's Carl hides in the closet for dreams up schemes to get Steve out of the house. "Steve is even more of a nerd than last season," says VelJohnson. "And I think he's the first black nerd on TV."

VelJohnson first came to the public's attention in his role as what else? — a cop, in "Die Hard," the 1988 bang-'em-up film starring Bruce Willis.

Soap's been in trouble for 'Generations'

"I'm a Donald Trump," says Dorothy Lyman, about her new role on "Generations" as Sam's mom, Rebecca Whitmore.

As her fans know from "Mama's Family" and "All My Children," Dorothy Lyman is a pistol. Signing Dorothy as a director and actress was to be the lethargic soap's wake-up call this winter. Dorothy sounded ecstatic about the idea.

Six days later, NBC announced cancellation of "Generations." Dorothy's Donald Trump character goes down the sink as the soap goes off the air January 25. Management surprised the production company with a pink-slip Christmas present. Dorothy Lyman didn't have a clue. She certainly didn't sign on in November to be fired three weeks later.

Although the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People wants to put up a fight urging fans to write NBC to keep the show on the air, a reversal by the network seems unlikely.

On the air since the winter of '89, the half-hour soap never clicked in the ratings. In Los Angeles, and in other cities, the show competes against the second half of the powerful CBS daytime drama "The Young and the Restless." "Generations" draws 8 percent of the fans while "Y&R" pulls in 31 percent. The only way to change that is to move the show but NBC never bothered to make that move.

There could be light at the end of the tunnel, and it comes from network management, namely Brandon Tartikoff. The soap could continue in syndication... a move the network ignored before. The syndication idea can't be dismissed because 300 episodes have been sold to France. Other stations aboard haven't rejected the idea and some local stations see potential.

Naturally, John Winther, the soap's producer, feels low. Cancellation in his mind means the kiss of death to daytime shows with central black characters. "I don't think I'm going to see an integrated show again," says the discouraged Winther.

Replacing the soap on January 28

is "A Closer Look," a midday news program with Faith Daniels. Also in the works are "A.M. Assignment, an all-female news team show; "Trialwatch," a magazine show using courtroom trial footage; and "Women's Diaries," called a soap about ordinary people.

The interracial storyline never took off and that's really a shame. Dorothy Lyman's belief that taking on racism and women's discrimination could make a sizzling soap turns into a puff of smoke.

CHANNEL CHATTER

Producer Gloria Monty isn't letting any grass grow under her feet since taking over as head honcho on "General Hospital." As a point of history, Ms. Monty made the show

the success that it was before leaving for greener pastures. Her return marks a change of direction in the storyline (which won't be evident to viewers for sometime). There will also be a shakeup in the cast and writing staff. The first to go is Brad Lockerman, who plays Skip, and rumor has it that five more characters will be deleted in the near future.

NBC, 'Cheers' still at top of ratings as Americans continue to belly up

LOS ANGELES (AP) — For the eighth time in the 11-week-old television season, more Americans believed up to the top of NBC's "Cheers" than any other show on television. Last week they saw double.

A repeat of the hit Thursday night comedy series was the most watched program in the country, helping the network win the week with a 13.1 average rating.

ABC was second with 12.4, just one-tenth of a ratings point ahead of CBS with 12.3, according to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

Each ratings point represents 931,000 homes.

NBC's victory was aided by Sunday's "Hallmark Hall of Fame" presentation of "Decoration Day" starring James Garner, which finished seventh.

The CBS Sunday news magazine "60 Minutes" was No. 2, followed by NBC's "A Different World." Roseanne Barr and her bickering brood on ABC's "Roseanne" were No. 4.

NBC's "The Cosby Show," which suffered its first loss last week to the mimed antics of Fox Broadcasting Co.'s "The Simpsons," was back on

NBC accused of age bias in transfer

NBC News has sparked charges of age discrimination by announcing it is transferring 25 producers, directors and news writers, nearly all of them over 40, into a "pool" created to serve all its news broadcasts.

Of the 21 union employees placed in the pool — nicknamed "the drowning pool" by insiders — more than half are over 50, according to the National Association of Broadcast Engineers and Technicians. Salaries of those being transferred will be cut by as much as 10 percent, the union said.

NBC officials strongly deny the discrimination charge, which the union formally raised this week with the National Labor Relations Board in a grievance proceeding.

"It looks like a concerted effort to move out senior people," said John Clark, president of NABE's Local 11 in New York.

"The company hopes they'll be frustrated . . . and that they'll leave."

But Executive News Director

Don Browne said NBC is looking for "a more efficient way to do business" in an era of industry cutbacks. "This isn't an age issue.

It's not based on anything but performance," Browne said. He notes that 18 other employees have been laid off and that most were younger people.

Pool members will be on call for assignments from any NBC broadcast instead of working for a particular program. NBC spokeswoman Peg Hubble said that while their base pay will be cut, it will be increased temporarily while they are on assignment for certain shows.

Those being reassigned from "NBC Nightly News" include investigative producer Pat Lynch, 52, who was sued unsuccessfully by Lyndon LaRouche after her reports on the now-imprisoned political extremist, and Sy Pearlman, 59, a former executive producer and Tel Aviv bureau chief who has won a Peabody and other awards.

Some staffers are incensed at

Browne's recent comment to the Washington Journalism Review that the transfers were "strictly based on ability."

"I am surprised to read that this decision was strictly based on ability," Lynch said, "particularly in light of my having received the most distinguished awards in journalism, including two Emmys, a DuPont-Columbia award and a 1990 Ohio State award."

Lynch said Steve Friedman, executive producer of "NBC Nightly News," told her that her work was "an indulgence" that "Nightly News" can no longer afford — and that he wanted people who could "churn them out."

Lynch said Friedman did not respond directly when asked if he felt she could not churn them out at her age.

"Longer investigative stories take time and money, and budgets and bottom line are a major concern right now," Lynch said. "Delays are a necessary evil because you have to be careful and responsible."

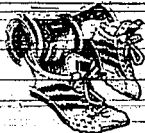
